SENATE COMMUNICATION

The following communication from the Senate (Sen. Com. No. 218) was read by the Clerk and was disposed of as follows:

SENATE COMMUNICATION

Representative Crozier introduced members of the Ewa citizens' group who are all former sugar workers and wives of sugar workers, "a group of people who had spent their lives in the sugar industry, and as we all know, sugar has become the major part of the fabric of Hawaii. Without sugar, most of us would not be here today and quite often, we have the presidents, the managers, executives of the sugar industry, we also have the union leaders here, but it is not often that we have the people who had to commit day to day to make the sugar industry what it is today. They made the sugar industry prosperous. They also created an opportunity for their children to get ahead."

On motion by Representative Kawakami, seconded by Representative Marumoto and carried, H.C.R. No. 78 was adopted.

The following resolutions (H.R.

Nos. 136 to 139) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

A resolution (H.R. No. 136) recognizing and congratulating Gladys 'Ainoa Brandt on being named the "Outstanding Hawaiian" of 1986 was jointly offered by Representatives Kamali'i, Anderson, Apo, Lindsey, Andrews, Blair, Bunda, Cachola, Crozier, Graulty, Hagino, Hashimoto, Hemmings, Hirono, Honda, D. Ige, Ikeda, Isbell, Jones, Kiyabu, Manegdeg, Marumoto, Medeiros, Metcalf, Okamura, Pfeil, Say, Shito, Tajiri, Takamine and Yoshimura,

On motion by Representative Kamali'i, seconded by Representative Anderson and carried, H.R. No. 136 was adopted.

Representative Kamali'i rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, like many others, I knew of Gladys long before I truly knew her.

"I had seen her at official receptions -- tall, proud, erect, beautiful. Standing with that set of jaw which forbids any contradiction, and then drops forward in shared respect and laughter. A striking life's portrait of the Hawaiian woman who had not only survived, but prevailed.

"I had heard of her impact as an educator. A towering figure on Kauai who had earned the respect of all—and who was left undisturbed in her position as district superintendent as governors and territorial superintendents came and went.

"I knew of her influence at Kamehameha Schools. As the guiding force to a generation of students and teachers, she demanded excellence and a respect for learning -- both in the western and the Hawaiian modes.

"It was both symbolic and significant that she was the one to urge her students to 'stand up' -- whether they were dancing the hula or entering the adult world.

"Last summer, Gladys and I became friends. For nearly a month, under the difficult circumstances surrounding the 4th Festival of Pacific Arts in Tahiti, I learned daily and personally that the legend was only a shadow of the reality.

"Yes, all that I knew and had heard about Gladys was true. She is uncompromising when 'fighting for the right'. She does have high standards of performance and decency -- for herself as well as others. And there is an unbending regard for honesty and fairness.

"But she is also fun.

"Gladys tells delightful stories -usually at her own expense -- of
growing up as the only girl in a
family of seven children, of the
strangeness of being sent to Honolulu
for an education, of the 'inside
politics' of a plantation Kapaa, and of
the school principal who would risk
being fired just so she could sneak
away to play mah-jongg with the
neighboring Chinese.

"Gladys laughs easily and often. She draws people of every age to her side. Her strength and stamina defy any guess of her age. Can this woman be of my mother's generation? On the verge of 80, and with no hesitation to work until it's done, or to play until the party's over?

"Yes. And then some.

"Gladys is deserving of the 'Outstanding Hawaiian' award. Her life's work would merit such a distinction.

"As would her recent selection as the first Hawaiian woman to be named the chairperson of the University of Hawaii's Board of Regents and that's a tough job.

"This award imparts a deep spiritual strength to its holder. As it acknowledges the work already done, it also provides a kind of mana for the work yet to be done.

"Gladys Kamakuokalani 'Ainoa Brandt is deserving of both the recognition and the future strength which the outstanding Hawaiian award conveys.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kawakami rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to add a few comments this morning in tribute to one of our honorees -- Gladys Ainoa Brandt.

"Mr. Speaker, in addition to outstanding work as a community leader and University Regent, Mrs. Brandt's reputation as an outstanding educator is well-known throughout the State. As a Representative from Kauai, I take great pride in reminiscing, and calling to mind Mrs. Brandt's pio-

neering days on Kauai.

"In 1945, after serving as principal of Kalaheo, Gladys became the principal of the then newly established Kapaa High School on Kauai. As a pioneer in education, the appointments to Kalaheo and Kapaa made Gladys the only woman school principal in the State for 19 years.

"At Kapaa, Gladys had the enormous task of bringing together the students, the parents and faculty to make the fledging rural school a part of the community, to instill a sense of community pride in the school while at the same time striving to meet the academic goals of excellence. As a lifelong resident of Kauai, I can honestly say that Gladys met her goal, and the foundation she laid at Kapaa was solid.

"During her Kapaa tenure, Gladys became the most respected high school principal and educator in the State. Gladys remained the head of Kapaa until 1962, when she was named DOE superintendant for the Kauai District. Thereafter the rest is history -- what was Kamehameha School's gain was Kauai's loss.

"Gladys, on behalf of the people of Kauai, I thank you for your life's work dedicated to excellence in education, and I congratulate you personally on being named the Outstanding Hawaiian of 1986.

"Mahalo."

Representative Anderson rose and stated:

"I have known Aunty Gladys for a number of years -- sometimes we have been together, sometimes apart, but she is a fighter. She has worked very hard for the education of all Hawaiians and all people within the State, and I am very, very proud to have been a part of this today, and I think that we have made one of the best selections that we have made in the history of the Association of Hawaiian Civil Clubs. And I am very proud to be here.

"Thank you, Aunty Gladys."

Representative Kamali'i then presented Mrs. Gladys 'Ainoa Brandt, the Outstanding Hawaiian of 1986, to the members of the House and audience.

Representative Anderson presented the honoree with a ginger lei while Representative Kawakami presented her with a certified copy of the resolution.

A resolution (H.R. No. 137) recognizing and congratulating Ruth M. Representative Kamali'i rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, Mrs. Ono is the first individual ever named to receive this award. But from the brief glimpse which this resolution provided into the work and dedication of Ruth, I think we can all appreciate why she was honored as the 'Outstanding Non-Hawaiian'.

"The Queen Emma Hawaiian Civic Club -- acknowledging the major work of their namesake -- meets regularly on the grounds of the Queen's Medical Center. Over the years, they have come to know and to love Ruth like we all. And she is now an honorary member of that Hawaiian Civic Club.

"Queen Emma holds a special place in the hearts and minds of the Hawaiian community. In her day, there were seven hospitals in Honolulu -- none of them serving Hawaiians.

"The Queen -- disgusted with the refusal of the Legislature to fund such a facility -- walked door-to-door collecting the money needed to start the hospital.

"Mr. Speaker, Ruth has that same kind of determination and drive. And if she had been alive in 1860, I have no doubt that she would have been at the side of the Queen knocking on every door she could find.

"Our community is very fortunate.

"We are blessed with individuals who are truly outstanding, whose life's work is a renewal of our best instincts and commitments towards each other.

"Ruth M. Ono cares. And she makes us care in return.

"Mr. Speaker, Ruth is being recognized today as the 'Outstanding Non-Hawaiian' of the year. But I don't think there's any question that she has a Hawaiian heart and we love her dearly.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kamali'i then presented Ruth M. Ono, the Outstanding Non-Hawaiian of 1986, to the members of the House and audience.

A ginger lei was presented to the honoree by Representative Lindsey while Representative Bunda presented her with a certified copy of the resolution.

A resolution (H.R. Representative Kamali'i rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, too often the 'work horses' of our community -- the ones who are always there to help, to guide, to see a project through -- are so reliable and dependable that we almost forget to say 'thank you.'

"Each year, the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs expresses a special 'Mahalo' to such efforts by honoring an 'Outstanding Hawaiian Civic Club member'. For 1986, as you have just heard, is Rawleen Nani Lani Fisher of the Queen Emma Hawaiian Civic Club.

"Mr. Speaker, to get a proper perspective of the significance of Rawleen's contributions, I think I should stray just a little bit, and note that I believe the Queen Emma Hawaiian Civic Club is one of the (if not the) hardest-working clubs in the Association.

"And that statement is true because of members like Rawleen. Individuals willing to give of themselves in order to provide for others.

"Rawleen is tireless in teaching anyone who wants to learn about the arts of Hawaii.

"She is deeply committed to the goal of providing scholarships to deserving Hawaiian youngsters. She works in and for our community. And she does so strengthened by her friends and family, and their similar efforts."

Representative Kamali'i then presented the honoree, Rawleen Nani Lani Fisher, the Outstanding Hawaiian Civic Club member, to the members of the House and audience.

Representative Apo presented the honoree with a ginger lei while Representative Crozier presented her with a certified copy of the resolution.

Representative Kamali'i then asked Mr. Benson Lee, President of the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs, to stand and be recognized.

But he does extend his Aloha to all of you and believe me when I say he really wanted to be here this morning to be a part of this celebration.

"Before I declare a short recess to allow the members to share their

Aloha and love with all of you, I would just like to say that you are very special to many of us; you've served as an inspiration and will serve as an inspiration to many of us; and the Chair would like to thank you for making Hawaii a very special place, not only for us but for our children as well."

At 11:51 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, "to allow the members to share their love and Aloha with you."

Upon reconvening at 11:59 o'clock a.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Graulty and Menor.

A resolution (H.R. No. 139) honoring the memory of Prime Minister Olof Palme of Sweden was jointly offered by Representatives Metcalf, Anderson, Andrews, Apo, Blair, Bunda, Cachola, Cavasso, Crozier, Graulty, Hagino, Hashimoto, Hemmings, Hirono, Honda, D. Ige, M. Ige, Ikeda, Isbell, Jones, Kamali'i, Kawakami, Kihano, Kiyabu, Lardizabal, Levin, Lindsey, Liu, Manegdeg, Marumoto, Medeiros, Menor, Nakasato, Nakata, Okamura, Onouye, Oshiro, Pfeil, Say, Shito, Shon, Souki, Tajiri, Takamine, Tam, Taniguchi, Tom, Tungpalan, Yoshimura and Peters.

On motion by Representative Metcalf, seconded by Representative Takamine and carried, H.R. No. 139 was adopted.

Representative Metcalf then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the shot that killed Olof Palme was felt around the globe because Prime Minister Palme was an example in inspiration, not only to the people of Sweden, but throughout the world. He was known for his efforts on behalf of arms control. peace and economic development. He was not afraid to tackle the most difficult of issues such as trying to find a practical political solution to the Iran/Iraq war, or leading nations in the world towards the consensus on the balance of world power and nuclear disarmament. He relied on reason and not power to move men and nations. Palme did not act as an individual. He made his people care.

"Although a policy of diplomatic neutrality left it in peace since 1850, Sweden, under Palme's leadership, was deeply committed as a society to international goals of justice, freedom, compassion, and survival.

He will also be greatly missed on the Swedish political scene. For Palme, the greatest risk to a country is complacency. As a politician, you have to try to activate people. Palme put bright colors on an otherwise dull political scene by motivating people to think in new directions.

"A great tragedy of his assassination is that we are in an age where no popular leader can mingle with his own fellow citizens, either to stir them or to learn from them. Without openness in democracy, the higher values of life themselves are in danger.

"I think we remember Olof Palme for reminding us of these higher values.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

THIRTY-FIFTH DAY

Wednesday, March 12, 1986

The House of Representatives of the Thirteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1986, convened at 10:45 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend T. Samuel Lee, Pastor Emeritus of Christ United Methodist Church, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Graulty, Liu, Menor, Takamine and Taniguchi.

By unanimous consent, reading of the Journal of the House of Representatives was deferred.

SENATE COMMUNICATION

The following communication from the Senate (Sen. Com. No. 220) was read by the Clerk and was disposed of as follows:

A communication from the Senate (Sen. Com. No. 220) returning House Concurrent Resolution No. 78, which was adopted in the Senate on March 11, 1986, was placed on file.

At this time, the following introductions were made to the members of the House:

Representative Crozier introduced students from Sweden, Peru, the Netherlands, Switzerland, New Zealand, Japan, Portugal, and Turkey who are attending different high schools "so that they can have interaction with the children of Hawaii; and being that we are becoming an international center, it's real beautiful to see so many people come here and share their cultures, their beliefs with us and they can, in turn, take our culture and our beliefs back with them to share with their people." They were accompanied by their chaperones, Mr. John Southworth, Ms. Sharon Rogers, an aide to Representative Ikeda, and Mrs. Carmen Hahn.

Representative Metcalf, on behalf of the Big Island delegation, introduced Mr. Takao Okimoto, a former Hawaii county democratic party chairman and for many years a close confidente of the late Governor John A. Burns. Representative Ckamura, on behalf of all of the members as well as the sports staff of the House, introduced and "welcomed home" their colleague, Representative Joseph Leong.

Representative Leong then rose and remarked:

"Mr. Speaker, I wish to thank the members of this Honorable Body for their expressions of aloha during my recent illness. Without your support, I don't believe I would be here this morning, but your prayers have really helped me.

"Mahalo."

Representative Cachola introduced his uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Gena Cachola, who had assisted Representative Cachola when he had moved here in 1971.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Graulty, Liu, Takamine and Taniguchi.

At 10:54 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared the House in recess for the purpose of meeting in joint session with the Senate, in tribute and honor of Governor George R. Ariyoshi on the occasion of his 60th birthday.

JOINT SESSION

At 11:15 o'clock a.m., the House of Representatives met in joint session with the Senate pursuant to House Concurrent Resolution No. 78 for the purpose of honoring Governor George Ariyoshi on the occasion of his birthday and extending aloha to him as he concludes his final year in elected office.

The Chair stated at this time:

"The Legislature is meeting this morning in joint session for a very special reason. I am very proud to share the honors of presiding over this session which convenes to honor our Governor on his birthday.

"Governor, we wanted you to know that this is a small tribute compared to your outstanding contributions to our State and to all of us who love Hawaii. As you celebrate your birthday, we look with ever-increasing admiration upon your distinguished career and with deep affection and Aloha, wish you a 'Happy Birthday.'

The Speaker then welcomed and introduced the Governor's family to the members of the Joint Session:

The First Lady of Hawaii, Mrs. Jean Ariyoshi, who was presented with a lei by Representative Okamura; the Governor's mother, Grandma Ariyoshi, who was presented with a lei by Representative Hagino; his daughter, Lynn Takemoto, who was presented with a lei by Representative Souki; son-in-law, Rick Takemoto, who was presented with a lei by Representative Hashimoto; brother, James Ariyoshi and wife, Rita; sister, Mrs. Betty Nakamura, and husband, Masa; and sister, Mrs. June Otake.

The Chair also introduced the Honorable John Waihee, Lieutenant Governor of Hawaii.

At this time, the Clerk of the House of Representatives read the Certificate of Recognition from all of the members of the House of Representatives to the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi, in honor of his 60th birthday.

The Clerk of the Senate then read the Certificate of Recognition from all of the members of the Senate to the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi, in honor of his 60th birthday.

The Chair then recognized Representative Kawakami for brief remarks, as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, on behalf of the Democratic Majority of the House, I rise to offer our birthday congratulations to our honoree, the Honorable Governor George Ryoichi Ariyoshi.

"When the Governor took office in 1974, he offered a challenge to Hawaii in his inaugural address and said, 'Nothing is gained, no one is served by those who sit idly by, wringing their hands and bemoaning their lot.' The Governor carried the challenge one step further, and encouraged 'a constructive attitude,' and invited 'all to come in and present their ideas for a better Hawaii, with the thought of working together with government to attain our mutual goals.'

"Mr. Speaker, as members of the Majority we are proud of the achievements we have forged with the Governor in making this great State move forward. We have preserved that unique quality of life that makes Hawaii a special place.

"Looking back over the past 12

years under the Governor's leadership, the State witnessed a national recession and labor problems which had a chilling effect on our economy. Those were the years in which the demands on government became even more compelling, while the abilities and the willingness of our citizens to pay for these services did not rise commensurately. Those were years of inflated dollars and reduced purchasing power. Those were the years during which many decisions were made which affected the lives of all our citizens for decades to come. And those were the years in which the government of this State said loudly and clearly with George Ari-yoshi at the forefront, 'We will be the masters of our fate and the shapers of our destiny.'

"Mr. Speaker, in closing, I note that the phrase "Hawaii, a very special place" recently made popular has its roots in the political career of George R. Ariyoshi which spans three decades. It's been over 32 years since Governor Ariyoshi, the son of immigrants, 'the boy from Kalihi,' first went door-to-door soliciting constituent support.

"To you, Governor, on your 60th birthday, best wishes for good health and prosperity for the next one hundred years to come.

"Thank you."

Representative Marumoto was then recognized by the Chair for brief remarks on behalf of the House Minority, as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, time is life, and life is time.

"Today, the Hawaiian sun shines down brilliantly on our islands. The blue waters beckon toward beautiful beaches. Visitors are enjoying themselves. Our people are toiling at their respective chores. Babies are being born, people are dying, couples are pledging their eternal troths.

"Life is ongoing.

"However, at this particular moment, at this particular place, we are most cognizant of a milestone in one person's life -- of his position, of the historic nature of this event.

"The moment is now, the man is George Ariyoshi. He is the Governor. We, the members of the Legislature, are gathered here at the State Capitol to give a little of our time, our life, to share this moment in

order to commemorate not only six decades of life, but over three decades of public service, with thirteen of these years as Chief of State. It is indeed a remarkable achievement for any person, one worthy of observance.

"We who give of ourselves to various causes and issues, give you this time today. On behalf of the Republican members of the House of Representatives, we wish you, Governor Ariyoshi, a very 'Happy Birthday,' and we thank you for the time and the commitment you have generously given to the people of Hawaii. We thank your family for the many sacrifices which elected office entails. We understand that. And we wish you all six decades more of health, happiness and life.

"Thank you."

The Speaker, at this time, turned the podium over to Senate President Wong who then recognized Senator Kuroda for brief remarks, as follows:

"Governor, Mrs. Ariyoshi, friends and colleagues of the Senate, ladies and gentlemen:

"I have the distinct honor today as Senate Majority Leader to speak in behalf of the Senate Majority, to publicly express some of the very unofficial and private sentiments we share on this occasion. This expression may not be as eloquent as the many private expressions that are many private expressions that are likely to follow this ceremony. Nevertheless, we begin simply by wishing you, Governor Ariyoshi, a very Happy Birthday.

"The other feelings and thoughts we share today are in part as joyous, but are also mixed with admiration, some regret and some gratitude.

"We are happy for you, Governor, because you are very near to a successful close of your very productive and enviable career of public service. We are happy for you because of the respect and stature you have won for the people of Hawaii.

"We admire you because for most in the Senate majority, you have been the only Governor with whom they have worked and through that mutual effort you have won their respect. For Senators Duke Kawasaki and Mamoru Yamasaki, their feelings of esteem are also based on their service with you as a senate colleague. You have set a standard, Governor, of

unquestionable integrity, honesty and consistency.

"But we also share few regrets today, regrets that things have not always been as harmonious as they could have been. Speaking frankly, your years of Governor have coincided with the Wong years, sometimes referred to by some of your close associates as the 'wrong' years. Well, right or wrong, Governor, at least we never bored you. We sometimes disagree on issues, we sometimes fail to approve a nominee and some of us even participated in that great experiment in the 1981-82 sessions when we became 'demolicans' or 'republicrats.'

"But Governor we are also grateful today because you were always one who strongly believed in separation of powers, and this is very important, and you accepted the Senate as we exercised our prerogative to disagree with the executive and opposed some issues supported by your administration. You once served as senate majority leader, and although your close friend and mentor, the late Governor Jack Burns was the executive, you yourself must have found your senate majority not always in agreement with the executive.

"So, despite those few times we disagreed, we certainly always recognized and respected your sincerity and your consistency in dealing with issues. We have honored your austere budgeting process and supported your tight fiscal management.

"In closing, Governor, I want to remind all of us that we still have a good part -- the hard-knock part -- of the session before us. We shall continue to work together for good legislation, and incidentally, if during the next few weeks, you all of a sudden think that you'd like to do something nice for the Senate majority, pass the word to the House that the lottery is OK.

"Happy Birthday, Governor Arivoshi!

"Thank you for your outstanding service to our community. We all have benefited from your leadership -- we wish you well in your endeavors.

"Aloha!"

The President then recognized Senator Henderson for brief remarks on behalf of the Senate Minority, as follows: "Mr. President, Governor Ariyoshi, colleagues:

"Some sixteen years ago, Governor, I was appointed to the Senate and I had the privilege and pleasure of being in the Body when you were serving your last senate year. Also with me were Senators Yamasaki and Kawasaki. There's only three of us left. The attrition rate isn't too good, or maybe it's too good.

"Governor, I've watched your career -- you left the Senate and ran for lieutenant governor, and of course you ran for governor and was elected three times and I look at your career and I look at my career and I think there's something similar about it -- and that is, we've both gone as far as we're going. (Laughter.)

"But seriously, Governor, we, the Senate Republicans and all of the Senate members, really want to express our best wishes to you on your 60th birthday, may you have many, many more.

"Thank you very much."

The President returned the rostrum to the Speaker and the Speaker then appointed Senator Hagino and Vice-Speaker Ige to present the Certificates of Recognition to Governor Ariyoshi.

The Chair then appointed Senators Henderson, Kawasaki, Soares and Yamasaki and Representative Kawakami to escort the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi to the rostrum. The Chair added that the appointed members were either in the Senate or the House at the same time that the governor was a member of the Senate.

Governor Ariyoshi was presented with leis by Senator Young and Representative Ikeda.

The Speaker presented to the members of the Joint Session and the guests the Honorable Governor George R. Ariyoshi.

The Governor addressed the Joint Session as follows:

"I really didn't come prepared to say anything this morning, but I wanted to express my appreciation to all of you for a very, very warm gesture of friendship and best wishes.

"As I sat here and listened and thought about some of the words that were spoken here, my mind drifted back a little bit, and I would like to take a few minutes to share some of my thoughts with you.

"By the way, I want you to know that this morning I went to the Lanakila Senior Center, because every month they have birthday days there and when I got there I was presented with a certificate giving me membership to Lanakila. They told me I, officially, today, became a senior citizen. (Laughter.)

"As I indicated, as I thought about some of the words that were uttered here, and my mind drifted back to those very early years, 1954, just thirty-three days before the primary election of 1954, three days before the filing deadline, when I was urged to run for the then Territorial House of Representatives. I recall when Jean and I got engaged on her birthday, October 30th, and she wasn't old enough to vote for me in the primary election but she made it on time for the general,

"I have always felt that my work here -- that I would not be able to do my work properly unless I had the support and understanding of my family. I have been very fortunate in having that kind of understanding and that kind of support. I recall my first legislative session 1955. Just prior to that, on February 5th, Jean and I got married. We had biennial sessions then; the next legislative session our session started on the third Wednesday in February. That year it happened to be on February 20th. Well, Lynn was supposed to be born on February 10th, but she didn't come on the 10th. As a matter of fact, Jeannie had to go to the hospital prior to that but it was a false alarm. February 10th when Lynn was supposed to be born, there was a false alarm again and Jeannie stayed overnight in the hospital and came back and Lynn decided she would not arrive until after the Legislature started. So she was born three days after the session started -- thirteen days overdue.

"The next legislative session of 1959, our first son, Todd, was born on May 4th. Our legislative session ended on May 2nd, and you know, you can't have in the journals the actions of any other day except the legislative day. But we used to stop the clock in those days, and so we have a resolution dated May 2nd, congratulating us on the birth of our son, 8 pounds 11 ounces, at Queen's Hospital, but the date was not noted; Todd was not born until May 4th. If

you look at that, the Legislature was pretty good at projecting things.

"In the next legislative session, Donn decided he was not going to take any chances and he was born smack in the middle of the legislative session, in March.

"I have some very fond recollections of the Legislature and I wanted to express my appreciation to many people that have been very helpful over the years.

"I, first of all, want to publicly express my gratitude to the members of my Cabinet who are here today, without whom I could not have functioned as Governor. The jobs they hold are not very easy. They have to come and give testimony to you, and sometimes you take the liberty of really taking out after them and that's okay, that's part of the process, and I understand that too, but I wanted the members of my cabinet to know that I hold them up in the highest esteem. A very fine group of people who have served and some who will continue to serve, and I extend to them my mahalo.

"I could not stop without expressing my gratitude to the lieutenant governor. I have been very fortunate for being blessed with a very fine lieutenant governor, one who has been very supportive. I don't care about loyalty to me as a person, but loyalty to the principles, the ideas, the causes that we have held very dear are very important, and I want to say publicly to John Waihee how grateful I am for the support and for his hard work.

"I want to express my appreciation to all of you -- members of the Legislature, those of you who give of your time and your energy, those who make the sacrifice. I can say, that as one who has sat in your chair, that it is a very tough job that you have. People take your work for granted. They assume that often-times, because of some of the cynicisms that exist in the community, that you try to do things to screw up things. Yet I know, through my personal knowledge, my personal friendships, my personal relationships with each of you, I know how hard your job is, how difficult it is to make the right decision. We don't live in a world where everything works out by formula and if you ask somebody to add two plus two it always comes out the same way. In the work that you do, there are no definite answers. The decision that

you make have to be carried out, implemented by others, human beings are involved, there are no simple formulas and I know that everyone of you, whenever you make a decision, you try to make the very best decision that you possibly can. That's the easy part of your job. But the hardest part of your job is to try to come out with what is in fact the best decision, the right decision. You have pros and cons on every issue, and you're torn apart by people who say you should go one way and others who say you should go another way. I know that in most instances, most of you try your very best to make the decision that you feel will be in the very best interest of the people in this community.

"I don't profess to say that you and I are always right but I know that when the decisions have to be made, at the time the decision has to be made, you have searched your heart, you have searched your conscience, you have attempted to do that which is in the very best interest of the people of this community and I appreciate that very much.

"Senator Kuroda talked about us not always being together on the issues. I want you to know that that doesn't bother me one bit. I think that it is very, very important for every person, each one of you, to be convinced that when you make a decision, that's the decision you personally believe to be the very best, not what I believe because you and I are different individuals. We have different experiences. It is a decision you must feel in your own heart that it is in the very best interests of the people, I appreciate that kind of effort, and whether the position agrees or disagrees with mine is not important because most of the time we're going to be together on the things that are important for the people of this community and that is what really is important, that is what really counts.

"I truly feel very strongly about the separation of the executive and the legislative branch. It is my responsibility to make proposals to you and sometimes we don't get them through right away, and sometimes it takes a few sessions for an idea to nurture and for it to get through. But my feelings always has been that a good idea will survive and that at some point it will get massaged and worked out. And though it is not in its original form there will still be some way that the problems will be properly addressed.

"I do not have the benefit of the public hearing process that you all When I make a proposal and send it down to the Legislature, it has not been with the kind of public input that each of you get in your committee work. I recognize that and I accept the value of that the process in which you are involved, and the public hearing process that makes it possible for the citizens of this community to come and present testimony for and against a measure. It is a process that I am not involved in. You really represent the ideal of a democratic society, an opportunity for the citizens of our community to come in and to present their ideas to you, to be critical of what you do, to give you the various ramifications of any measure that appears before you. It is a very, very important process and it is that process that I recognize.

"I want you to know, not as governor, but as a citizen of this community, I am truly very grateful to each of you who take the time to go out and campaign to get elected, to serve in the legislative body, to put yourselves under tremendous pressure, to make various difficult decisions you have to make, to agonize, to anguish over some of the decisions you have to make. I feel for you, I respect you for that, I extend to you my gratitude on behalf of Hawaii's people.

"My one plea to you as we move into the future is to always remember that what is good for us today, or what was good for us yesterday, may not necessarily be that which will be the very best for us tomorrow; that circumstances and time change and that we have to be constantly aware of the changes that are taking place not just here in Hawaii but even more importantly, the changes that are taking place outside of Hawaii in the countries of Asia and the Pacific; and changes that are taking place in the policies of our government as they affect the international arena in this part of the world.

"The other thing that I really wish is that you would never, ever forget is that people of this state are one people. We have talked about Hawaii being a special place and no world, no nation, no state, no community can be better than the people in the community. The strength of our community comes from our people. We have a very special group of people, different from people in any part of the world; people who trace themselves back to many parts of the world and whose parents, grandpa-

rents, great grandparents came from those various parts of the world and various parts of the United States. All have brought with them the culture, the language, the history, the music of the place from which they came. We are a very diverse community. We are a very different people, and this is the one place in the world where we can look at another person who is different and we can say to ourselves that that person is different, I respect him, I respect her, I understand, I appreciate the differences that exist in us.

"By each group, each person in our community retaining their own identity, we can be a very diverse community, a community of people of differences, but a people who are united because of these differences. That's the future of Hawaii. People remaining together, being together with all of the differences.

"It is my hope that as we move into the future we will understand that; that we will continue to remain a community with a great deal of diversity, but a community united; that whatever we do, we will do in the name of fairness and equity that when we do for one, we do for all; that we do not try to separate our people and do things on the basis of differences that may exist however you line these differences up in terms of ethnic background or cultural differences or even in terms of how long a person has been a part of our community.

"In my very fervent plea to you that if we can do that, Hawaii will continue to remain a very, very special place, a place that will be a laboratory for human beings working together, playing together, feeling together and caring for each other.

"I want to extend to you my gratitude once again. My very fondest, my very warmest Aloha to all of you."

The Chair then called on Ms. Yvonne Perry to lead the members of the Joint Session and audience in singing, "Happy Birthday" to Governor Ariyoshi, followed by the joining of hands and singing of "Hawaii Aloha," led by Mr. Palani Vaughn.

At 12:01 o'clock p.m., the President of the Senate declared the Joint Session adjourned.

Upon reconvening the House of Representatives at 2:23 o'clock p.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representative Menor.

Representative Kiyabu moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1961-86, as amended in HD2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Souki.

Representative Kiyabu then rose to speak in favor the the bill, stating:

"This bill provides for the supplemental appropriation to the Judiciary for fiscal year 1986-87. It amends Section 3 of Act 169, which was passed last session.

"Mr. Speaker, your Committee on Finance carefully reviewed the Judiciary supplemental request for one-and-a-half million dollars. Your Committee also responded favorably to some of the recommendations submitted by the Committee on Judiciary.

"As indicated by the amendments made in this bill, the adjustments reflect a net addition of half-a-million dollars. Basically, the bill provides for the Judiciary to meet the costs for the increase in services to those abused or neglected children needing legal assistance and placement in protective shelter.

"The major portion of the supplement is for the Judiciary to cover the costs of janitorial functions, repair and maintenance, and telephone services. These operational responsibilities have been transferred to the Judiciary from the Department of Accounting and General Services.

"Mr. Speaker, all the members of the Committee on Finance have worked diligently with an acute sense of fiscal responsibility in submitting this bill before you. We will continue to make every effort to base our decisions on fully substantiated facts. To do otherwise would be an insult to this Body and our public obligation to the people of Hawaii.

"In conclusion, Mr. Speaker, I urge

that all of the members of this Body vote 'yes' on the appropriation measure for the Judiciary.

"Thank you."

Representative Jones then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I speak against this bill with a lot of regret but I want to start off by sharing how much I appreciate the chairman of Finance conducting an open hearing and entertaining many questions on this. And I'm proud to be a member of the House where we can discuss issues like this, Mr. Speaker.

"I think that my concern stems from a number of issues that have still not yet been answered; and although I voted for last year's judiciary budget, I still support that budget, I'm glad that it's going to be there. If we were to kill this bill today it will only mean added problems. But, on principle, I think that my concerns stem from a number of issues that still have not been answered to my personal satisfaction.

"Those questions include whether the sheriff's office should be a police agency, why officials bought equipment without seeking required competitive bids and why court workers prepared food for political fundraisers on state time.

"It doesn't state why they need a duplication of our police force; some of the members here think they do, but I think not. I don't believe a wheelchair policy much has been happening.

"Is the sophisticated training program for recruits and sheriffs justify the need to preserving the laws of the state. Strange, there is a new mechanism at the HPD, and so I don't think it is necessary.

"Can the state justify the need for the sheriffs SWAT team on the budget? I don't think we can always meet the needs of the program and although the SWAT team had its name changed, what are the disciplinary guidelines for the sheriff's program to ensure it be fulfilled. How do they not rule on the right of a candidate's behavior?

"What are all the requirements of the bidding process?

"Is the matter of emergency hires still cleared up? The Chief Justice before said that the original 113 emergency hires were to be eliminated. There is still the cost of supporting emergency hires.

"Have we addressed the issue of the hiring and firing of state officers. I'm sure we have not. We have not seen the end of supporting legislative guidelines for sheriff's judgments with the state taxpayer's taxes.

"Do we have a full accounting for the use of the State's employees supporting the preparation of food for political fundraisers? A full accounting should take place.

"The fiscal officer referred to the office of sheriff's accounts as a "holding fund." But this still does not answer the question of this account and about the Attorney General's investigations and findings. The first question is the "special accounts."

"Mr. Speaker, although I appreciate much of what the Judiciary does, this larger amount of appropriation I think, we can absorb, and because of this, the concerns that the citizens are speaking of, I think, without establishing a safe police force are some of the things I consider questionable in management practices and because the court ..."

The Chair then interrupted Representative Jones and stated:

"Representative Jones, the Chair would like to remind you to keep your comments germane to the subject matter at hand. All of those questions that you raised obviously are administrative in nature; you being a duly elected official have the responsibility to seek out those answers. The Judiciary has an open door; anyone of you having those kind of questions can see the Chief Justice or the administrators of the court system to provide those answers for you. Please proceed."

Representative Jones proceeded with his remarks, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

"Because I'm referring to what I have been speaking regarding the court of the land or the court employee not be involved in any kind of politics and because of that and because of Third Reading, that ahead of time, I'm going to vote 'no' on the bill."

Representative Marumoto then rose

to speak against the bill, stating:

"When the Judiciary presented their 1985-87 budget to the Legislature they explicitly stated at that time, in accordance with the law, that their budgetary request exceeded the budget and Finance - set spending ceiling. However, the Judiciary did not make this announcement in 1982, 1983, and 1984.

"I was around in those years and I should have been paying attention. I was rather remiss in not noticing that these budgets were excessive. Rather I was expecting that the Judiciary budget bill committee report, upon passage, would have stated this fact along with the amount that the budget would exceed the ceiling, the percentage of the overage, and the reason for the overage. After all, this is set down in the Constitution.

"However, the Attorney General has determined differently -- that such notice on bills is required only when the aggregate of the budgets go through the general fund ceiling -- the aggregates of the legislative, judicial and executive budget. This is in spite of the fact that the statutes speak of explicit ceilings for each branch.

"This bill before us raises questions which should have been answered years before:

"Is it fair that this budget should exceed the spending limit when the executive budget contrains itself within the ceiling?

"Is it fair if the Governor restricts executive department funds when the Judiciary goes untouched.

"This session we have declined to examine this perplexing problem. If the next legislature also tosses aside this hot potato, then the 1988 Constitutional Convention, if it does happens, must address this issue.

"I am not the only one who believes this subject should be broached. Last year the Senate Ways and Means Chair introduced a bill which would prevent the Judiciary from proposing a budget which went over the expenditure limit.

"Senator Yamasaki posited, in another measure, that the Governor, Speaker and Senate President, acting in concert, restrict the court appropriation when revenues turn out to be less than anticipated.

"The Governor, likewise, expressed concern about the entire situation. I quote from a Honolulu Advertiser article of over three years ago (Feb. 12, 1983): 'Governor George Ariyoshi said yesterday, he'd like to regain spending control of the budget of the State Court System.'

"'Ariyoshi said he's not interested in interfering with the basic work of the courts. He said that as Governor, however, he should have some say in the overall amount of dollars flowing from taxpayers to the Judiciary.'

"'The 1978 Constitutional Convention changed the rules governing the judiciary budget. The courts now present their spending plans directly to the Legislature instead of sending them through the state budget office.'

At this time, Representative Kawakami rose on a point of order.

The Chair directed Representative Kawakami to state his point.

Representative Kawakami asked:

"Could you have the speaker address the Chair instead of the T.V. set upstairs?"

The Chair responded:

"Representative Marumoto, the Chair will amend that comment slightly. Would you keep your remarks germane to the subject at hand. Please proceed."

Representative Marumoto then proceeded:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, -- if I could finish the article.

"'As a result,' Ariyoshi said, 'The Judiciary gets and spends whatever it can wrangle out of the Legislature - irrespective of overall financial conditions and spending restraints on the rest of government.'

"'The Judiciary budget should be packaged as part of an overall balanced state spending plan,' Ariyoshi said, 'and then if conditions worsen and spending restrictions are required, the Governor should have the power to restrict spending in the court system as well as within his own departments.'

"'Chief Justice Herman Lum recently said he would try to restrict judiciary spending in light of the state's current budget shortfalls. But Ariyoshi said those restrictions are voluntary.' "That is the end of the article sir, this is the end of my speech. I appreciate your indulgence in letting me have my say.

"I protest this entire '85-87 Biennial Budget because it went over the ceiling last year and I feel it takes from education, corrections, welfare, housing, health and other human services; therefore, I am voting "no."

"Thank you."

Representative Souki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I would like to remind the members, especially those across the hall, that this is a very modest budget, three-fourths of the money was transferred from DAGS over to the Judiciary, merely a technical function, and I would also like to ask the members across the hall that they should not cloud the issue; they are speaking out to the supplementary budget for this year; they are not talking about past years.

"As far as the management of the Judiciary, there is a legislative audit that should be made and I think that at that time, then it can be made clearer to this Body and to the general public.

"The role of this Body right now is to review the supplementary budget and as the Finance Chairman stated, 'we have a two-sharing relationship with the state and we are very careful in procuring the finances for the Judiciary in the State of Hawaii.'

"Thank you very much."

Representative Jones then rose and stated:

"I would like to mention that when I spoke, I was not attacking the oversizing of the budget. I was speaking toward the policies concerning certain budget items."

The Chair responded that the point was well taken,

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1961-86, HD2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE JUDICIARY", passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Cavasso, Hemmings, Jones, Liu and Marumoto voting no.

The Chair d'rected the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 1961-86 had

passed Third Reading at 2:37 o'clock p.m.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT

Representative Tungpalan, for the majority of the Committee on Employment Opportunities and Labor Relations, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 630-86) recommending that H.C.R. No. 4 be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Tungpalan, seconded by Representative Takamine and carried, the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 4 entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING A STUDY OF THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE COMPENSATION FUND", was referred to the Committee on Finance.

THIRD READING

The following bill, which was on the calendar for Third Reading, was read throughout, and the following action taken:

H.B. No. 1741-86, HD1:

Representative Kiyabu moved that H.B. No. 1741-86, HD1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Souki.

Representative Kiyabu then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill 1741-86, HD1.

"The purpose of this bill is to amend Act 300, Session Laws of Hawaii 1985, to provide supplemental appropriations for fiscal year 1986-87.

"Mr. Speaker, since 1959, when the First State Legislature met, we have engaged in fulfilling the promise of statehood. In many ways, much of that dream has been accomplished.

"Today, we stand at another cross-road. Our choices now will impact the next 25 years.

"This budget is a result of your committee's commitment to a funding approach that addressed the need to:

be fiscally responsible; and

act decisively to set a foundation for the future quality of life for all our citizens. "This budget before you is sensitive to the changes in the economic environment since we adjourned last April:

First, your Committee on Finance is aware of the potential loss of federal funds due to the sequestering provisions of the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings Amendments and considered alternative courses of action. However, at this point in time, Mr. Speaker, your committee has taken a position that any decision on contingency funding for those federal programs that may be affected by the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings reductions is premature. Your committee will consider the alternatives when the magnitude and impact on all federal funding can be identified.

Second, your committee has found it necessary to review most of the program appropriations made for the biennium because of the lower general fund revenue estimates established by the Council of Revenues. Last year, we made appropriations based upon growth rates of 8.1% for fiscal year '86 and 7.6% for fiscal year '87. On January 10th of this year, the Council updated their revenue projections to reflect lower growth rates of 4.8% and 6.2% for each of the respective fiscal years. The lowering of the growth rate translates to a 100 million decrease in anticipated general fund revenues.

"With these key variables identified, and in view of our dreams to continue to make Hawaii a better place, House Bill 1741-86, HD1, provides the following:

1. For economic development

\$2 million for promotion and marketing of Hawaii's visitor industry

\$10 million for improvements to the road, utilities, and other support services in tourist resort areas statewide

2. For our children's education

\$2 million for the early provisions for school success program for children with learning difficulties

\$250,000 for a program to prevent juvenile delinquency through a pilot early intervention program

3. For Higher Education

\$327,000 for a student information program to support student registration and academic advising

\$500,000 for PLATO, a computer based education system to supplement undergraduate instruction

\$266,000 to expand library resources among the UH system libraries

4. For our Prisons

Critical actions were taken to meet the requirements of the consent decree issued against our prison system. \$7.9 million was provided for programs and facilities

5. For the care of the $\frac{\text{Develop-}}{\text{mentally Disabled}}$

Funds for institutions such as Waimano Training School and Hospital were increased

\$700,000 has been designated for services to the mentally retarded and developmentally disabled to make sure that they are treated with human dignity through quality services

6. For <u>Social Services</u>, we provided

\$800,000 to complete the network for child and spouse abuse services

7. To support Government Services

\$1 million for DIPIRM, a statewide information processing and management system which will integrate all the state departments on the same computer system

\$300,000 to implement the long awaited comprehensive net income tax processing system which will expand the tax department's ability to audit more returns

"Mr. Speaker, I believe your committee has fulfilled its responsibility to the people, with this budget. It accommodates the Governor's recommendations as well as many of the various subject matter committee recommendations. We have been judicious in our funding choices. At the same time, we have taken decisive action in setting the stage for the next 25 years.

"I wish to thank the members of the Finance Committee for their hard work, patience and cooperation to bring forth this budget. I would also like to thank the committee chairmen for their understanding and cooperation. And further, I would also like to thank my staff for working hard and spending long hours here.

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, I urge you to vote in favor of H.B. 1741-86, HD1.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1741-86, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE FISCAL BIENNIUM JULY 1, 1985 TO JUNE 30, 1987", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 1741-86 had passed Third Reading at 2:44 o'clock p.m.

Representative Graulty then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House: We honor today a group of doctors from Hawaii, seven extraordinary and special people. They are members of a medical mission they appropriately called, "The Aloha Mission." Seven doctors who left their homes and their modern practices of medicine last December and travelled ten hours by D.C. 10 to Manila and another 1 hour by domestic jet to Vigon, Ilocos Sur.

"There are but a few places today unreachable by jet, by telephone or

by television. Man has conquered time and distance and made the world a very small place. Yet, there exist so much suffering, so much we have yet to conquer, and suffering exists everywhere -- in the soup kitchens of our large cities, to the hungry children of Africa. And the Philippines, the land of my birth, Mr. Speaker, three to four young children die each week from malnutrition. Half the nation lives below the poverty line, twenty percent of employable adults have no jobs at all, and another forty percent hold no more than part-time jobs. The predicted growth rate for its economy this year is between -1 and 1 percent. The suffering is broad, and the poverty abject.

"Health care in the Philippines is a luxury. Only through charity can most Filipinos can ever expect to go to a hospital for needed surgery. There is little equipment in the provincial hospitals and hardly ever are there the needed supplies.

"And so when seven members of our multi-ethnic medical family of Hawaii came to Vigon, Ilocos Sur, bringing equipment and supplies, performing surgeries, training the local physicians and nurses, our ambassadors of aloha were greeted like heroes and gifts from heaven. For five consecutive days, working less than acceptable conditions, these seven extraordinary doctors saw 1,100 men, women and children, performing 22 plastic surgeries, 11 urologic operations and 36 eye surgeries. Five days later, they left our sisterprovince, Ilocos Sur, exhausted I'm sure, but convinced of the need to go back and do more.

"Why did these doctors do this? In December of all times and paid their own way, their own hotel bills, their own meals, gave up their precious vacation time, sacrificed lost income. Why did they do this?

"Mr. Speaker, I believe a doctor is a healer, not a businessman; because it was good for the soul, because we are one world, one people.

At this time, Representative Graulty introduced the honorees as follows: Dr. Don Parsa, Chief of Plastic Surgery at Queen's Medical Center and Director of Plastic Surgery at the John A Burns School of Medicine who, while in Ilocos Sur, performed cleft palate repair and treated burn scars; Dr. Ming Chen, an opthalmologist, specializing in cataract surgery and intraocular lens implants; Dr. Jeffrey Davis, an opthalmologist, specializing

in neuro-opthalmology who, while in Vigon, performed cataract surgeries and radial keratotomies; Dr. Papaco, an anesthesiologist; and Dr. Erlinda Cachola, the coordinator of the mission and a recent winner of the Jefferson Award for Community Services and "who specializes in internal medicine and is the inspiration of one of our own Representative, Romy Cachola, and since Representative Cachola was also part of the delegation, I feel it would be appropriate at this time if we also asked him to stand and be recognized."

"Mr. Speaker, there were two other doctors who went to the Philippines last December who are not with us today, and I'd like to mention their name -- Dr. Antonio Tan, who is a urologist, who last night had to unexpectedly leave for the Philippines on an emergency, and the seventh member of the team, Dr. Claude Caver, who likes the Philippines so much he is now in the Philippines on retirement with his wife, Sephie."

Before presentation of leis, Representative Cachola rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, Representative Graulty and members of this Honorable Body:

"Thank you for this honor which you have bestowed to the Aloha Medical Mission.

"It was certainly a meaningful and unforgettable experience for me, to be a member of this mission for the past two years. I personally witnessed how these doctors worked just to make a miracle happen in the lives of the less fortunate people. Day and night they worked hard without compensation. Their airfare, hotels and other expenses as a matter of fact, Mr. Speaker, came from their own pockets.

"Mr. Speaker, the spirit of giving to others is certainly a good feeling. I hope that all the doctors that are honored today will again join us in two more projects that we are doing this year: first, is the health fair at St. Anthony's Church, which will be held in August of this year, the second one will be surely the next Aloha Medical Mission. We don't know where we'll be going -- most likely Timbuktu -- also in December of '86.

"Mr. Speaker, by the way, one of the members of this Aloha Medical Mission is a tough and gutsy lady. She happens to be my wife and with all the awards she has been receiving lately, I better watch out because I might just find her on the other side of the fence, running against me. I cannot afford to do that.

"Mr. Speaker, I know she is not perfect, but to me, she is the best.

"Thank you."

In addition to myself, we've got Representatives Hagino, Hemmings, and Okamura from the House of Representatives who will be joining myself on the panel on Sunday from 10:00 to 11:00 o'clock a.m. Also joining us will be State Senators Ben Cayetano and Mary Jane McMurdo and Councilwoman Bornhorst.

"Special thanks need to go out to Representative Marumoto who has been involved in putting this panel together; and I would just like to encourage on behalf of all the legislators who will be serving on the panel, to please participate and call in your pledges. This is a kind of a special challenge also we are posing to the State Senate. We beat them in the Aloha Fun Run with our legs, now let's beat them with our pocket-books."

The Chair then stated:

"To add to that I believe you have the senior member from the Leeward area, Representative Kihano. Is that correct?"

Representative Menor responded:

"Yes, Representative Kihano will also be on that."

Representative Tam: "The Chinese community within the state, will have a lantern parade this coming Saturday. It will start at 6:30 o'clock p.m., commences from the State Capitol to Chinatown."

Representative Marumoto rose on a point of information.

The Chair directed Representative Marumoto to state her point.

Representative Tom then rose and stated:

"I, for one, personally am very proud and privileged to speak in favor of this resolution.

"What does a volunteer mean to me?

"Imagine, Mr. Speaker, if all of our legislative bills, all of our committee reports, all of our resolutions, the tons of reading materials, the books we read for business and pleasure, even the newspaper were all not in print, just imagine that for a moment, that these materials had to be transcribed page by page into printed material so that each of you could read it.

"I guess that if each of you are actually faced with the difficulties of having all of your materials put into print, I doubt very much if anyone could really imagine the frustrations, the scarcity of materials available and just the simple joy of gratefulness and thankfulness to find materials prepared so that each of you could read it in print.

"I personally can appreciate some of the frustrations because for me, materials either has to come in braille or in tape so that I can perform my duties as a legislator, as a lawyer, and even as a father to my children reading just the simplest story books to them in braille.

"And who do you suppose does a good deal of the brailling and recording? It's volunteers, people like those who we are recognizing today; hard-working individuals who have given so much of themselves, without the expectation of financial compensation, people who just want to help others like me and other blind and handicapped people make a go of their lives. They want to enable handicapped people the opportunity to attend school, to compete in classes, to work in their jobs, to read for pleasure and to just to keep up with the current events of the day.

"Members, the next time you pick up a printed material, newspaper, magazine, cookbook, a bill just don't take for granted that it's there, be thankful and grateful it's there.

"Although we are recognizing six individuals today, there are over 81 volunteers serving the library for the blind and physically handicapped and I am certainly proud to be a recipient of their volunteer services. To each of you who are being recognized and the people in the gallery, I personally thank you for myself and for the many handicapped people who use your services.

At this time, the honorees were introduced and asked to stand and be recognized. They are as follows: Mrs. Peggy Dack, a volunteer for the past 20 year for the library; Reverend Frederick Von Husen, a braillist and volunteer for 71 years; Mrs. Florence Seto, a volunteer recordist for 4½ years; Mrs. Alice Oka, a volunteer braillist, who is a newcomer; Mr. Clay Nadao, an assistant attorney general and a volunteer recordist; and Ms. Elaine Torigoe, head of the transcribing services section for the library who oversees the entire operation of the transcribing program and coordinates the work for the volunteers.

Also recognized were 17 volunteers who were seated in the gallery along with Alithea Chong who does all of the braille work for Representative Tom in his legislative work; Lydia Ranger, who is the head librarian for the blind and visually handicapped; and Mr. Bart Kane, the state librarian.

Orchid leis were presented to Mrs. Dack by Representative D. Ige; to Rev. Von Husen by Representative Hirono; to Mrs. Seto by Representative Lindsey; to Mrs. Oda by Representative Takamine; to Mr. Nadao by Representative Ikeda; to Ms. Torigoe by Representative Metcalf and Representative Tom presented a certified copy of the resolution to Mrs. Torigoe.

"Representative Tom, just an observation from the Chair.

"You've made your colleagues aware that we should become more sensitive to our material being in letter form and how difficult it may be for the blind. But you know, I see you as the bridge to the handicapped.

"You play the piano so well, you're always "up" on your committee meetings. Maybe the members of this House aren't so sensitive because we look at you as another member of the House with no handicap. You make it seem so very easy. I think we are very much aware of the difficulties that you face, but you have shown tremendous leadership on your part as well as quite possibly, you did your job too well in representing those handicapped individuals in this state."

At 11:25 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the chair, "in order to allow the members to share their aloha and best wishes with our honorees here this morning."

I happened to be one of the judges this year and these men were judged on strictly what they said and nothing else, and I can tell you that I didn't know the Vice Speaker was so young. He can run for another couple of years.

"Gerald is certainly an inspiration to all of us. I can say that what really impressed me when I judged him was his honesty. As for Donald, it's his honesty and straightforwardness, and I just wanted to add my two cents how proud I am to have been a judge and to have these three people before this honorable body today.

"Thank you."

Representative M. Ige then rose and stated:

By unanimous consent, H.B. Nos. 1954-86 (SD 1), 1995-86, HD 1 (SD 1) and 2119-86, HD 1 (SD 1) were placed on the Clerk's desk and, in accordance with Article III, Section 15, of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, printed copies of H.B. Nos. 1954-86, SD 1; 1995-86, HD 1, SD 1; and 2119-86, HD 1, SD 1, were made available to the members of the House at 11:00 o'clock a,m.

At this time, the following introductions were made to the members of the House:

Representative Tam introduced 15 seniors from the Hawaii Baptist Academy. They were accompanied by their teacher, Mr. Peter Finelli.

Representative Nakasato introduced 50 students from Kaewai Elementary School. They were accompanied by their teachers, Mrs. Yokomura, Mrs. Abe, and her 'kupuna', Mrs. Kamimoku.

Representative Andrews introduced 16 students from Kula Elementary School on Maui. They were accompanied by their teachers, Muriel Wright and Diane Sakamoto.

Representative Honda introduced 18 students from Baldwin High School's Key Club on Maui. They were accompanied by their advisers, Barbara Huntley, Ken Kurokawa and Allen Minibog.

Representative Hagino, prior to introducing his guests, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, today marks the 26th anniversary of an incident in South

Africa 26 years ago called the Sharpville Massacre. At that time, 69 blacks were gunned down on the streets of Sharpville by the government of the Union of South Africa, and today is the 26th anniversary. As a small gesture, last year this House adopted a resolution calling upon the South African government to put an end to the horrible system of apartheid that has been in operation in that part of the world for a number of years.

"We have with us today several guests who are touring the United States and are currently here in Hawaii to talk about their experiences — growing up and living under that oppressive regime in South Africa. They are touring the country to ask and encourage states of the Union to drop or to end their investments with corporations that are currently doing business in South Africa. And by way of educating ourselves, the Africans of that country refer to that country as Azania and not South Africa.

"These two people are courageous individuals and are currently in political exile from that country. One of them has been imprisoned and beaten and physically tortured for daring to talk about freedom. We have presented them with a certificate earlier which was signed by many of the members of this body, and at this time, I would like to introduce the two people who have demonstrated much courage and willingness to stand up for freedom for the many millions of blacks and mixed races in South Africa."

Representative Hagino then asked Elizabeth Sibeko who was seated in the gallery to stand and be recognized.

Representative Hagino continued:

"The next individual was a close friend of murdered martyr of South Africa, Steven Beco. He also shared the same cell that Steven Beco shared in South Africa."

Representative Hagino then asked Twiggs Xiphu who was seated in the gallery to stand and be recognized.

Representative Hagino continued:

"They will be speaking tonight at 7:30 p.m. at the University of Hawaii, Manoa Campus. They will be speaking at the auditorium in the Art Department. I encourage members and people in the audience to attend

if possible.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Manegdeg introduced a former colleague, Mits Uechi.

Representative Okamura, on behalf of all of the members of the House, introduced a Council member from Israel, "who is visiting Hawaii as part of the Rotary Club of Hawaii Exchange Program where there are six professional individuals from Israel that are visiting Hawaii for forty days, and I believe, sometimes next year, a similar group from Hawaii will be going to Israel, and I would like to add that the gentleman I am going to introduce was actually born in Iran and moved to Israel at the age of 5 and has since been a Council member from the age of 25. I would like to add also that they do not get paid as it is strictly voluntary service and they meet during the evenings and on weekends, and he is actually a fulltime economist in Israel. And so, on behalf of all of the members, I would like to wish him a special Aloha and Shalom."

Representative Okamura then asked the Honorable Onshalom Sadak and his host, Mr. Jack Richardson, who were seated in the gallery, to stand and be recognized.

Representative Cavasso asked Sheldon, a student at Hawaii Baptist Academy and with the group of students from that school, to stand and be recognized.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

A resolution (H.R. No. 186) extending best wishes and aloha to twenty private goodwill ambassadors of peace from the Soviet Union visiting Hawaii during the week of March 18, 1986 was jointly offered by Representatives Peters, M. Ige, Ikeda, Kawakami, Marumoto and Okamura and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Marumoto and carried, H.R. No. 186 was adopted.

Representative Okamura rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it is indeed an honor this morning for all of us to have with us the presence of twenty individuals from the Soviet Union on their second goodwill mission. Unlike yourself, Mr. Speaker, I will not attempt to be a linguist and I would not like to embarrass them by introducing them individually for fear of mispronouncing their names. I would like to introduce, however, their leader, Mr. Zagan Felof, and I would like to ask that all the rest of them also rise to be recognized. Please stand."

Floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Hashimoto, Hirono, Isbell, Kamali'i, Marumoto, Kawakami, Souki, Tajiri, Crozier, Kihano and Hagino.

At this time, some members of the delegation entertained the members of the House and audience with popular songs of the Soviet Union.

The Chair said:

"On behalf of the members of this House, we would like to express our appreciation for sharing a piece of your culture with us this morning.

"Before I declare a short recess in order to allow the members to extend your aloha personally to them, I would like to say a few words on behalf of all of you and the Speaker. I am not trying to be a linguist; I am just trying to follow the Speaker's orders in trying to make all of you feel a little bit at home. Excuse me if I make any mistakes. I appreciate your patience.

"Dorogie Druziya is Sovetskovo souza; Dobro pojalovats na Gawaii; Poost nasha pogoda boodiet dobroi k vam; Poost nashi liudi razdeliat ich lubov s vami; Poost pamiat o Gawaii boodet s vami viechno; Aloha. (Dear Friends from the Soviet Union: Welcome to Hawaii. May our weather treat you kindly; may our people share their love; may the memories of Hawaii be with you forever. Aloha.)

"The Chair would also like to mention that...please give our regards to Dr. Boris Krylov who brought the first delegation here. And you can be assured that you will always be welcomed in this State."

At 11:39 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a short recess, subject to the call of the Chair, "in order to

allow all of you to share your aloha and best wishes with our friends from the Soviet Union."

Upon reconvening at 11:48 o'clock a.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Anderson, Blair, D. Ige, Lardizabal, Menor, Souki, Takamine, Taniguchi, Tungpalan and Yoshimura.

Representative Crozier rose and said:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to make an observation or an inquiry."

Directed by the Chair to "proceed," Representative Crozier said:

"I don't know who I should direct this to...maybe our Majority Floor Leader because he introduced this resolution. I am under the impression that while we brag that Hawaii is the melting pot of the world and we accept all the different cultures and we try to share in the different practices of the many cultures. I've been told and it's been confirmed by both Representative Taniguchi and Representative Bunda that in the Soviet Union, when two men greet, they kiss on the lips. Maybe when they come back next year, Representative Okamura can, you know, greet for all of us."

Representative Okamura responded:

"I would like to practice with Representative Crozier."

The Chair ruled Representatives Crozier and Okamura out of order.

Representative Blair rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it is my privilege and honor today to introduce to the members of this body the Teacher of the Year for 1986, but before that introduction, I would just like to augment what the Clerk has read very briefly.

"It's impressive enough just to hear a list of the things that he's involved with and he would impress you with his energy and his willingness to commit that energy to the children of Hawaii. When you meet him, what comes out even stronger is the passionate commitment to his profession and to the children of Hawaii.

"And I think later on I hope to be able to have him make an appearance before the Education Committee to report back on what he participated in in Washington, D.C. and what some of his ideas for Hawaii in conformance with the same problems that occur with varying degrees of intensity in every state. I think the committee will be impressed more by his willingness to say what he feels directly, bluntly, because he feels so strongly that the needs of our children have to be paramount in our minds. I think all of us who have been here any length of time realize what a significant part of our budget and therefore of our work here in the Legislature the educational system is

but I think until we actually hear of the passion that can be brought, and the eloquence that can be brought to bear by a person such as Mr. Choy who has devoted his life to the education of our children, we can't truly appreciate the significance of our role in the significance of our responsibility and I look forward to his appearing before the Education Committee."

Representative Blair then asked the honoree, Mr. Reynold Choy, to stand and be recognized. Accompanying Mr. Choy was his wife, Jenny Choy, "also a teacher, and therefore, no doubt she is able to understand him better and accept the strength of his commitment to his job"; and his two daughters, Samantha and Rebecca.

Representative Blair continued:

"Because Mr. Choy, while his individual accomplishments are very noteworthy, I think we have to also realize that he stands, not just for his own accomplishments, but symbolically he represents all the teachers from all of the schools in all of our districts, and therefore, to help us to realize that, I have asked Mr. Radcliffe if he could also be here today."

Representative Blair then asked Mr. John Radcliffe of the Hawaii State Teachers' Association to stand and be recognized.

Representative Blair continued:

"And all teachers are, to some degree, at the mercy of the administration of the school system, and therefore, recognition of Mr. Choy would not be complete unless we would also give some recognition to the Principal who has helped him to accomplish as much as he can as an individual teacher, and therefore, I have asked Mr. Charles Goo from Roosevelt High School if he could be here today."

Representative Blair then asked Mr. Charles Goo, Principal of Roosevelt High School, to stand and be recognized.

I would just mention briefly in passing that he's known to other people in this chamber including yourself and one of his former students, Blane Nakamura, who is with the Sergeant-at-Arms Office so just in looking at this room, there's several lives within this room that he has touched. You can imagine the impact that he has had on the community, and therefore, I think it's very appropriate that we make this presentation today, and I thank you for allowing me the opportunity."

Although a Republican, she is bi-partisan in her relations with Representatives and their staff, and her old and trusted transistor radio has been replaced by new electronic headwear but she still welcomes all who enter.

"Mr. Speaker, I am proud to introduce to this body a very tough and hardworking lady who has given many years of her time to this Legislature. Our best estimate at this time is almost nineteen years, and who I hope will continue with us here at the Capitol for many years to come, Mrs. Edith Ronald, otherwise affectionately known as 'Auntie Ayraud'."

Representative Okamura rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the leadership of tomorrow is found in the youth of today, and therefore, it is almost impossible to over-estimate the importance of providing solid education and training for our future leaders. The YMCA Youth Legislature Program provides excellent opportunities for teaching our future leaders about Hawaii's political process through a simulated legislative session.

"The 1986 session has considered fifty bills and resolutions in the past three days and has brought together fifty-four high school participants from the islands of Hawaii, Kauai, Maui and Oahu. They have tackled such tough issues as the hotel room tax, to toughening sentencing for rape. One of the key issues that they very recently decided on was the killing by very close vote of the lottery.

"I would like to, at this time, introduce the elected youth leaders of the 37th YMCA Youth Legislature."

"But that responsibility -- to the Hawaiian Homes trust, program and objectives, and the well-being of present future leasees -- that responsibility does not belong to Hawaiian Homes alone.

"A significant measure of the program's attempt to, finally, fulfill the mandate of the trust rest with us here at the Legislature.

"If I may, Mr. Speaker, I would like to quote from our State Constitution: Article XII, 'Hawaiian Affairs', Section 1:

'...the proceeds and income from Hawaiian Home Lands shall be used only in accordance with the terms and spirit of [the Hawaiian Homes] Act. The Legislature shall make

sufficient sums available for...the administration and operating budget of the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands...'

"Mr. Speaker, after eight years -four biennium budgets -- this Legislature still refuses to accept its
constitutional responsibility. And
worse, violates its trust and fiduciary
responsibilities by continuing the
practice of using trust revenues to
pay for administrative and operating
expenses in the department.

"These positions are needed. They should be filled with experiences and able individuals, in as responsible and as expedient manner as possible.

"However, these positions should also -- as required by the State Constitution -- be funded in the State budget, not with special fund monies from the trust.

"I will vote for this bill, but I do so reluctantly, and with a sense of a sadness that we will not accept our responsibilities here in the Legislature because a great wrong is continuing.

"Thank you."

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 81, 425 and 934 had passed Third Reading at 12:12 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 793-86 on S.B. No. 1886-86, SD 2, HD 2:

Representative Kiyabu moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1886-86, SD 2, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Souki.

Representative Tungpalan rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill but with reservations.

"My reservation is based on the point that I would have preferred that two percent of the monies collected from this hotel room tax be set aside for a convention center. I do feel that the State could gain much more revenue if we were to proceed with our convention center. And I do believe that the funds derived from this tax would have been most appropriate to build such a center.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Blair rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I concur with the remarks of the previous speaker.

"Thank you."

Representative Hemmings rose and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, could I have Representative Tungpalan's remarks entered into the Journal as mine also?"

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, we have gone in depth saying that the tourists that we are getting today, the convention center was going to upgrade. But what we have done in essence with this bill, I believe, is to charge five percent for what we have been saying is a tourist that is not really what we were looking for as far as a convention-type tourist. We are going to charge them five percent and give them nothing.

"We are also going to have to look at, Mr. Speaker, the possibility of losing some revenue. And I don't think that it is fair at this particular time when we have already \$17-million over and above last year, to go ahead and tax a group of people when we don't need the funds. Now, if we are going to set it aside and we're going to have to pay for infrastructure, I believe that we should then put it for the convention center, wherever it may be, and when the time comes, we can pay for it.

"But just to say we're going to charge people, put it in the general fund, and then later on we're going to find that we need more money so we'll charge them more, I don't think is fair. And I really don't feel like going into conference and fighting that point all the time, Mr. Speaker, so I wish that my colleagues would vote against the bill.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Marumoto rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I made some remarks on Third Reading and they still hold. I still feel that five percent is a bit excessive, that we should earmark a portion of the tax for our tourist industry, that our convention center is very important and we should get it off the ground, that we need a commission to start work on this as soon as possible.

"Thank you."

Representative Kamali'i rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill embodies the single-best approach to what is popularly-known as 'the hotel room' or 'tourist' tax.

"Such a tax is long-overdue.

"Economists and monetary experts may analyze this measure as an 'export' of taxes or an 'import' of capital. But for most of us -- whether sitting here in this chamber or living on any one of our islands the basic issue resolved by this tax is one of fairness.

"It has been unfair for those who visit our State and use our public roads, parks, water, sewers, police and fire services -- to bear no direct responsibility for the cost of such facilities and services.

"By this measure, a fair and reasonable linkage of the public costs generated to maintain tourism, and the revenues raised from the industry will then be established.

"An estimated forty million dollars will be collected with this 9% excise tax. All such monies will be deposited in the State general fund.

"Earlier versions of this bill required a specific share to the counties and the Hawaii Visitors Bureau. Such 'ear marking', in my opinion is bad policy. But have no difficulty imagining that such appropriations and others to meet community needs will then be possible through general fund expenditures.

"There are some within the tourism industry who have strenuously argued that the revenues from this tax should be 'ear-marked' for the construction and cost of a convention center.

"How is that fair? Or rational public policy?

"Why should the people of this State bear the sole burden of -- not just the existing drain and support offered tourism through governmental services and our resources -- but also of a major new facility and services that everyone agrees will be a 'losing proposition'.

"Arguments over the possible site of such a facility have only served to distract public attention.

"What we have witnessed is not unlike the controversy surrounding the Statue of Liberty and a potential convention center at Ellis Island.

"Like the Statue of Liberty, I believe that Hawai'i is a symbolic 'welcome' of openness, caring, and mutual concern. Hawaii - what beckons and draws people to our shores is a beauty of consideration, and of cherishing what nature has given and we may all enjoy.

"They know they do not come to

Hawaii seeking a convention center.

"And again, like that project -- we would do best by both our ideals and a sense of practical reality, to use the money for repair and restoration; for maintaining the beauty that is ours, instead of attempting to 'sell' what we only lose by making the offer.

"Mr. Speaker, I urge all of my colleagues to vote aye for and to persist in the full enactment of this measure.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1886-86, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO A TRANSIENT ACCOMMODATIONS TAX", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Anderson and Marumoto voting no, and Representative Menor being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 1886-86 had passed Third Reading at 12:20 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 794-86 on S.B. No. 1655-86, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Kiyabu moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1655-86, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Souki.

Representative Crozier rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I was a participant at the 1978 Constitutional Convention and I sat on the Hawaiian Affairs Committee and this legislation here was one of the problems we tried to wrestle with. We spent many, many hours trying to figure out a way how we could get the people on Hawaiian Home Lands into the main stream of our economy.

"One of the problems they have right now is when they get on Hawaiian Home Lands, their property cannot be put up for refinancing like most of us can. Every time we make an addition to our house, the equity in our house goes up. Every time somebody on Hawaiian Home Lands does that, that doesn't mean anything because they cannot go to the banks

for refinancing. As this has been going on, we in the more traditional type of leasing or purchase of land, have been able to send our students or our children to school or to college by second mortgage. The people on Hawaiian Home Lands have never been given this opportunity because of the way the laws are written. This bill here will allow them to now get general leases and be able to refinance their homes or get second mortgages.

"There are risks involved. Just like us, when we refinance, we take the risk. The people on Hawaiian Home Lands will be able to take the risk, but yet they will be able to take advantage of the gift or the right that the rest of us have, and hopefully, more of their children will be able to go to college or get higher education by this mechanism.

"Mr. Speaker, I salute the Hawaiian Home Lands Commission and the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands. They have created a new opportunity for the people on Hawaiian Homes, and I would let everybody know this is great legislation. It just moved into the process without much recognition, but it is truly great legislation.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1655-86, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAIIAN HOMES COMMISSION ACT, 1920, AS AMENDED", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Menor being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 1655-86 had passed Third Reading at 12:22 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 795-86 on S.B. No. 1652-86, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Kiyabu, seconded by Representative Souki and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1652-86, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Hemmings and Liu voting no, and Representative Menor being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 1652-86 had passed Third Reading at 12:23 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 796-86 on S.B. No. 1961-86, SD 1, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Kiyabu, seconded by Representative Souki and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1961-86, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ALOHA TOWER DEVELOPMENT COR-PORATION", having been throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 41 ayes to 9 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Blair, Cavasso, Hemmings, Ikeda, Isbell. Jones, Liu and Marumoto voting no. and Representative Menor excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 1961-86 had passed Third Reading at 12:24 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 797-86 on S.B. No. 2166-86, SD 2, HD 2:

Representative Kiyabu moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2166-86, SD 2, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Souki.

Representative Cavasso rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this with reservations.

"Mr. Speaker, I speak with the utmost...you know, I speak in favor of studies and bringing information into our House, but I also speak with reservation that this study should consider all aspects that you consider the free market, that should consider that the demand for work...Let me start over again, Mr. Speaker. should consider the fact that the people who come out to work choose the job they desire to work in, that we have a system of laws which will protect our people from discrimination in their jobs, that the laws are in existence right now, and that we should be cautious to evaluate and use the existing laws to protect us from discrimination in the market place. If this study will consider the existing laws, I'm in favor, Mr. Speaker.

"Thank you."

Representative Ikeda rose and requested that her remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Ikeda's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in support of S.B. No. 2166-86, S.D. 2, H.D. 2.

"Mr. Speaker, in 1984 the Legislature established a temporary commission on comparable worth. This commission was to have submitted recommendations on comparable worth to the 1986 Session of this Legislature,

"I followed the deliberations of the commission with the greatest interest and anticipation. I had great hopes, Mr. Speaker, that we would be able to move ahead this year to establish a system of pay equity. Thus, I was most disappointed when the chairperson informed me that members of the commission were unable to come to a consensus on recommendations to the Legislature. The chairperson did, however, present a compromise position calling for a comprehensive study with subsequent action based on the results of that study. The bill before us today closely follows that recommendation.

"Mr. Speaker, I have long been concerned about what has come to be called 'comparable worth'. I have gathered together and reviewed as much information as possible on this issue. No doubt remains in my mind that pay disparities do exist between traditionally male-dominated and female-dominated employment. there is no doubt in my mind that we must correct these disparities to allow our economy -- and society as a whole -- to achieve full development. This bill is a big step in the right direction.

"Mr. Speaker, this past summer I had the opportunity to examine global problems and trends as a delegate to the U.N. conference on the DECADE FOR WOMEN. Let me assure you that this particular problem is not indiginous just to Hawaii or the United States. It is of international concern. At the conference, the member countries committed to 'equal pay for work of equal value' as a FORWARD LOOKING STRATEGY and, this bill, mandating a comprehensive study of pay equity and with a commitment to eliminating any dis-

parities thus uncovered, will put Hawaii in the forefront of human rights legislation.

"Mr. Speaker, I urge my colleagues to join me in voting to assure equal employment for all Hawaii's people."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2166-86, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO A JOB EVALUATION STUDY", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Menor being excused.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 798-86 on S.B. No. 2095-86, HD 1:

Representative Kiyabu moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2095-86, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Souki.

Representative Apo rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in support of this bill with reservations.

"I would just like to briefly note, Mr. Speaker, that while enterprise zones in themselves are a good idea, I do not believe that in and of themselves, they are much help in terms of trying to create economic development in any community. I believe in the absence of the real programs that are needed which are business incubators, entrepreneurial programs, that enterprise zones in and of themselves really don't do that much.

"I would hope that somewhere down the line, if this bill passes, that the several bills we have on the table creating incubator facilities and creating entrepreneurship programs could be marriaged with the enterprise zone concept either at the County or State level so that we come with a holistic package of services that in fact would, number one, have the effect of saving all those businesses that now go down the tubes in areas such as Waianae simply because people don't know how to operate businesses.

"So, if we take care of that problem, I think that enterprise zones in the long run would be very good, so for those reasons, I will vote for the bill but with reservations.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hemmings rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"It has been the experience of many businesses in this State that the biggest obstruction to their health and welfare in economic prosperity has been government regulation, government intervention into the private sector economy, and government taxation.

"This is a positive step in the right direction because this will deregulate government intervention into the private sector by creating free enterprise zones for the private sector by eliminating government intervention, by providing certain business benefits such as tax credits, general excise tax exemptions and other local incentives. This will go a long way to let the business community enlarge, know that they can go into an area and not have to compete against government and government programs to have successful businesses.

"Repatriating control of the economy to the private sector will go a long way into increasing economic prosperity in this State, and I think this is a very fine measure, and I congratulate the Majority Party in recognizing this and sending this bill on to the floor for passage today."

Representative Tungpalan rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

"I would like to have the remarks of my colleague, Representative Hemmings incorporated into the Journal as though they were my own.

"Thank you."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2095-86, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENTERPRISE ZONES", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Menor being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 1773-86, 52 and 774 had passed Third Reading at 12:30 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 806-86 on S.B. No. 1762-86, SD 1, HD 2:

Representative Kiyabu moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1762-86, SD 1, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Souki.

At 12:31 o'clock p.m., Representative Anderson asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:45 o'clock p.m.

Representative Anderson then rose

to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Originally, I was against this bill, the reason being that years ago, the people in Corrections actually were in business and they do not have any investment. The machinery is bought by the taxpayers of this State; they do not pay any overhead, but I have understanding with the Corrections people right now that they will be working with the business community. They will not be, for instance, retailing anything where they could be working to either make or manufacture, if you want to, supplies that they could be selling to someone else in the industry whereby the people could purchase it from them at a wholesale price and then in turn could go ahead and sell this as a retail item.

"In the past, if you remember, we were making koa bowls, etc., and what we were doing is allowing them to sell it. And they were selling them at below the retail price. Consequently, business people were upset. This way here, they could go ahead and manufacture these bowls, go ahead and pass on the cost that it cost them, the business people could purchase it, and they could in turn sell it out in the open market.

"For that reason, Mr. Speaker, if the Correctional facility is indeed going to work with the business people in this community, I am for the bill and wish my colleagues will vote for it also.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Hemmings rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill can have a very positive effect on the people that are most concerned about the present prison system. First and foremost, it can have a positive effect on all the prisoners. Seems now that we have a crisis in our State corrections facilities, basically because we are warehousing people with nothing positive for them to do. This will give them productivity and the opportunity to help earn their keep and pay for their own way.

"Secondly, it will give them economic opportunity to possibly pay back in a real way to society for their incarceration.

Thirdly, I think this bill will have a positive effect or could in the future on the people who will be recipients of criminal injury compensation which is by coincidence the next bill we are voting on. Possibly if we can produce productivity for the criminals in jail, they will have the opportunity to make restitution to the people that they have injured and this will have a positive effect on everybody concerned.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1762-86, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REMOVAL OF CONSTRAINTS INHIBITING THE ESTABLISHMENT AND EXPANSION OF CORRECTIONAL INDUSTRIES", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 1762-86 had passed Third Reading at 12:49 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 807-86 on S.B. No. 1718-86, HD 1:

Representative Kiyabu moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1718-86, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Souki.

Representative Ikeda rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the Legislature requested the Legislative Reference Bureau to do a study back in 1984 on the subjects of criminal injuries compensation, as well as the victim witness protection program. That study still hasn't been completed. As such, Mr. Speaker, there really has been no real evaluation of the criminal injuries compensation program. In particular the way awards for pain and suffering are made. And for this reason, Mr. Speaker, I will continue to vote against this measure until we have some idea of how this program is working.

"In theory, it's a good program. In theory, we can't find fault with it but we are spending a whole lot of money on it every year, and I think that we should be assured of the fact that there are adequate guidelines being applied when awards are being made or denied.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair

and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1718-86, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE COMPENSATION OF CERTAIN PERSONS UNDER THE CRIMINAL INJURIES COMPENSATION ACT AND PROVIDING APPROPRIATIONS THEREFOR", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Hemmings and Ikeda voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 808-86 on S.B. No. 2478-86, SD 2, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Kiyabu, seconded by Representative Souki and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2478-86, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

On motion by Representative Kiyabu, seconded by Representative Souki and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1695-86, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NATUROPATHY", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Marumoto voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 811-86 on S.B. No. 2190-86, SD 1, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Kiyabu, seconded by Representative Souki and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2190-86, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "ABILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HAWAII HOUSING AUTHORITY",

having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 1695-86 and 2190-86 had passed Third Reading at 12:51 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 823-86 on S.B. No. 1188, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Kiyabu, seconded by Representative Souki and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1188, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 1188 had passed Third Reading at 12:52 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 824-86 on S.B. No. 1780-86, SD 2, HD 2:

By unanimous consent, action was deferred to the end of the calendar.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 825-86 on S.B. No. 564, SD 2, HD 2:

Representative Kiyabu moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 564, SD 2, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Souki.

Representative Nakata rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak for Senate Bill 564, SD 2, HD 2, with reservations.

"Senate Bill 564 was an excellent bill, crafted by the Legislative Water Commission over a period of 3 years. Senate Bill 564, SD 2, is an acceptable bill, but barely. Senate Bill 564, SD 2, HD 1, and its unnumbered predecessor were terrible bills, giving away ownership of water to private landowners and setting up a free market in water.

"But thanks to the efforts of Representative Kawakami and Representative Kiyabu, those sections of HD 1 which made S.B. 564 primarily into a vehicle for affirming claims to private water rights have been eliminated in H.D. 2. Unfortunately, the extent of possible amendment to HD 1 was limited by the insistence of

a prerogative of prior concurrence. House Draft 2 remains critically flawed.

"House Draft 2 represents a successful effort by powerful private interests in confrontation with almost all other interests in our State -- to effectively prevent the State from meeting its 'obligation to protect, control and regulate the use of Hawaii's water resources for the benefit of its people', and to effectively prevent the Legislature from establishing 'procedures for regulating all uses of Hawaii's water resources'.

"At no time -- whether in SD 2, HD 1, or HD 2 -- has the House Committee on Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Affairs been presented with a version of a proposed water code that embodied the alleged issue of State versus County control of water resources. Statements about 'home rule' have been a smokescreen for the one -- and the only real -issue on which the various proposed versions of a water code have focused on. That issue has been whether, when, and to what extent the uses of the water resources of Hawaii will be subject to public control and protection rather than private and unregulated use by the major corporate interests which dominate much of the economy and politics of Hawaii today.

"House Draft 2 fails the test of meeting the basic requirements of the Constitution by several specific criteria. House Draft 2 does not meet the constitutional mandate to 'establish procedures for regulating all uses of Hawaii's water resources'. At best, procedures in HD 2 are established only for regulating uses of those water resources already in or near a state of crisis.

"Even for those waters in or near a state of crisis, HD 2 does not meet the Constitutional mandate to 'protect ground and surface water resources'. In the procedures and tools which HD 2 establishes for the designation and management of a 'water resource management area', neither the criteria for designation nor the public agency powers of management of designated areas are sufficient to begin management before irreversible harm is done or to carry out sufficient to the water resources from occurring.

"The Constitutional amendment mandates that the Legislature shall -- by law -- assure appurtenant rights.

These are the only rights that the Constitution mandates the Legislature to deal with. H.D. 2, however, not only does not mention appurtenant rights. It also actually provides a basis for extinguishing such rights.

"The Constitution explicitly approved the principle of 'riparianism' through the mandate that the law (the water code) should 'establish criteria for water use priorities while assuring. . .existing riparian uses.' But H.D. 2, rather than buttressing this principle of riparianism, actually eliminates any such principle through a blanket approval of transport of water from any and all sources to any and all locations -- free from all public management and/or approval.

"Finally, the provisions of H.D. 2 which provide for the public management of ground water resources are actually less equal to the task than are the current provisions found in HRS Chapter 177.

"In short, H.D. 2 does not meet the mandates of Article XI, Section 7 of the Constitution concerning scope of public water use management, types of water use rights, nature of water use principles, or extent and adequacy of water resource protec-While failing to meet the tion. mandates of the Constitution, H.D. 2 at the same time decreases certain existing capabilities for public agency water resources management now found in the Hawaii Revised Statutes, and thus, in certain ways, H.D. 2 actually narrows water use control capabilities now available in the State and/or Counties.

"There is no question that water, its protection, and management of its use is a very complex issue. In view of complexity and time constraints, it would be inappropriate to point out all of the specifics of the problems of H.D. 2. But because of the great importance of the water code which our Constitution requires, and in order to illustrate how H.D. 2 fulfills neither the specific mandates of the Constitution nor the minimum requirements for safeguarding stressed water resources through appropriate public management prerogatives, I'd like to point out in some detail the following problems.

"1. The Constitution mandates that appurtenant water use rights shall be assured by the State Water Code. These are the oldest and most fundamental water rights that exist in Hawaii. Appurtenant rights refer to the amount of water used for taro

irrigation on any land prior to the Mahele. Rights to such quantities of water continue to the present day. But, in H.D. 2, appurtenant rights are never mentioned at all. H.D. 2, in Section 1, lines 6-8, asserts 'uncertainty regarding the status of water rights. . . requires the Legislature to devise a statutory solution'. If we then read Section 21, which states: 'All or any part of any water use may be extinguished if it is not used for four consecutive years. . . ', it seems that H.D. 2 achieves exactly the opposite of that intended by the constitutional mandate to assure appurtenant use rights. That is, H.D. 2 provides a basis for eliminating the right to enjoy appurtenant water uses. Appurtenant or Kuleana water use rights are, for the most part, the rights of the 'little guy' -the small land owner.

Section 17 of H.D. 2 states that water 'may be transported and used beyond overlying land or outside the watershed from which it is taken' without any State approval or review. This provision is directly contrary to the principal of riparianism recognized in the Constitutional amendment. And it totally negates an important tool of public water management -- i.e. required public approval of transport of waters -- affirmed by the Hawaii Supreme Court in McBryde vs. Robinson. In this sense H.D. 2 again seems more oriented toward eliminating or minimizing options for public management than in upholding the intent of the Constitutional amendment.

"Mr. Speaker, I have additional comments which I would like to submit for the journal but in conclusion, I would like to say that were it not for the absence of a statewide interim bill and the assurances I have received from other colleagues, the positive changes may yet be possible in conference. I might have urged you, my colleagues, to shelve H.D. 2, but perhaps with the public alerted and the Legislature aware that we live under the eye of a watchful public on the eve of an election, we may yet salvage something from conference committee.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Additional comments of Representative Nakata are as follows:

"3. Section 19(b) of HD 2 states that no preserved use of water in a designated water resource management area may be modified by increasing the quantity of water used, the time

of taking of the water, or the point of diversion of the water. What is patently left out of these prohibitions is the non-allowance of modification of preserved uses by changing the place of use of the water used, or changing the purpose for which the water is used. By definition, a designated water resource management area is an area in which the water resources are already undergoing stress. Therefore, almost all the water available for allocation would probably be taken by 'preserved' uses -- or uses grand-fathered in from before designation. Very little water would be likely to be left for 'permitted' or new uses acquired through permit from the BLNR after designation. By not requiring a new permit for changes in places or purpose of use of waters covered by preserved uses, effective public control and protection of the water resource is precluded. For example, changing a preserved groundwater use from watercress farming to manganese nodule pro-cessing could have drastic effects on an endangered groundwater area. No irrigation waters would remain to percolate back through the ground to recharge groundwaters. The same could be said for using stream waters on adjacent land for taro, or lotus root, or mixed crops. In these cases, a relatively high percentage of the water initially used might return to the adjacent stream either directly or indirectly. But if such a 'preserved' use is changed to hotel or industrial consumption, the effect on the 'designated' area -- i.e. already stressed stream system and competing users -- could and most likely would be major.

"Currently, under HRS Chapter 177 -- the Groundwater Use Act -- such changes in place or purpose of use in designated groundwater areas require a new permit. Applications for new permits affords the BLNR a chance to review overall desirability and effects of proposed changes. It also offers the county in question the opportunity to comment and make recommendations to the BLNR. House Draft 2, however, offers neither an opportunity for county comment or BLNR review and approval. The public loses, the water resources -ground or surface -- more than likely will suffer harm, and only the big land owner stands to benefit. Goodbye to opportunities to control corporate greed or corporate raiders.

"4. The criteria for designation of water resource management areas found in Section 18 of HD 2 also fall short of those currently found in

Chapter 177. The result is a case of terminal deficiencies, if on no other basis just that of minimal requirements for protection of our precious resources. groundwater familiar with the nature and history of groundwater use knows that major problems can and do occur even with only a small percentage of the 'sustainable yield' being used, let alone the 90% that HD 2 sets. Placement of wells, pumping patterns, and overlying land uses can have major and disastrous effects on groundwater recources and uses.

"Were it not for the absence of a statewide instream-use bill (which somehow got shelved in the process of modifying an absolutely unconscionable HD 1) and the assurances I've received from other colleagues that positive changes may yet be possible in conference, I might have urged you, my colleagues, to kill HD 2. But, perhaps, with the public alerted and the Legislature aware that we live under the eye of a watchful public —on the eve of an election, we may yet salvage something from conference."

Representative Kiyabu rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill but in doing so, I would like to commend the Chairman of Water, Land for his input in getting these amendments made so that we can bring this bill out into conference.

"This has been, I think, one of the most difficult bills this session and the Chairman of Water, Land has tried to get all of the different interest groups' interest taken care of in this bill, and so this bill is not in its perfect form but I think it has come a long way and I would really like to commend the Representative from Palolo, and I urge all members to vote in favor of this bill so that we can go into conference and come out with a fine water code.

"Thank you."

Representative Kamali'i rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it is with grave reservations, that I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

"Mr. Speaker, after a while, as legislators we run the risk of voting for amended measures, not because the last draft is what we would wish for -- but because it seems so much better than the version it replaced.

"Clearly, this misplaced sense of relief instead of real conviction guided and continues to direct many of us in supporting this bill.

"Perhaps we are wrong in doing so. I truly pray that we are not.

"Although there has been little public media coverage of the deliberations and competitions which have molded this bill -- my personal belief is that the 'water code' is the single-most important piece of legislation we will consider this session.

"The future of our State and the well-being of our people for the next two generations and beyond will be directly -- and perhaps irreversibly -- affected by the final form of this bill

"That is why, Mr. Speaker, it is so critical for us to approach this legislation with: (1) a firm grasp of what is mandated by the State Constitution in Article XI, Section 7; (2) a clear understanding that our first obligation is to protect and promote our water resources for public benefit; and (3) that to fulfill these responsibilities will require a 'setting aside' of traditional legislative prerogatives and our tendency to see 'compromise' as both necessary and conducive to the public good.

"Finally, Mr. Speaker, House Draft 2 is a tremendous improvement over House Draft 1. But that is to say very little.

"This draft is still fatally flawed and fails to either implement the Constitution or to protect the water of Hawai'i for her people.

"The primary difficulty is that this draft is silent where it should be most eloquent:

- 1. An explicit assurance of existing water rights -- especially of the highly-vulnerable riparian and appurtenant water rights of small property owners, farmers, and kuleana tenants -- is not included.
- 2. A state water plan to manage, protect, or regulate water -- critical elements to avoiding crisis -- is not included.
- 3. A separate, quasi-authority -like that envisioned with the creation
 of a deputy director of water resources in the DLNR guided by an
 advisory citizens group -- is not
 included.

- 4. An adjudication process to encourage public participation and to avoid costly court proceedings is not included.
- 5. A clear and coherent statement of native Hawaiian water rights --central to an understanding and advocacy of all water rights -- is not included.

"Instead, this draft speaks in ways and on subjects which are prohibited, not required by our State Constitution:

- 1. Existing rights may be extinguished, not assured.
- 2. Management and protection are 'triggered' when water allocations are at 90% of the sustainable yield --virtually at the point of collapse and exhaustion of the water source.
- 3. The board's power to resolve competing or conflicting uses is strictly advisory, and public awareness of such hearings is limited.
- 4. And worst of all, there are remaining, critical inferences that water and water rights are being conferred by this draft, and may then be bought and sold, transported without regulation, and exercised with a total disregard for community needs.

"As with so many other mandates from our State Constitution -- time, advisory reports, and legislative deliberations have not provided adequate measures articulating responses to pressing public needs.

"When the adequacy and quality of water first came to public attention about ten years ago, a number of 'gallows humor' jokes began to make the rounds.

"One of those so-called jokes could apply to present versions of the water code.

"As mandated by this bill, an inventory of water uses will be conducted. I can imagine the water expert who manages that inventory coming back to us in a few years and announcing, 'Well, I have some good news and some bad news. What do you want to hear first?'

"Tell me the good news.

"Well, in ten years, all our water sources will be contaminated by pesticides or compromised by salt water intrusion from over-pumping. "My God, if that's the good news -- what's the bad news?

"There won't be enough to go around.

"Mr. Speaker, as I said, I will vote for this draft. This issue and the need for a responsible water code are too important for us to lose our opportunity, in conference committee especially to forge a constitutionally-correct and critically-needed version of the water code for all the people of this State.

"But on its own, this draft would not be acceptable.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kawakami rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"It has been seven years ago since drafting a water code that would be acceptable by this House that was initiated way back in 1979, and I concur with the Chairman of Finance that the Chairman of Water, Land really struggled to get this bill out. Anything dealing with water or land has always been controversial in this State, and especially in the Legislature. And I think we finally came out with a bill through the efforts of the committee, and I hope that in conference they may be able to clear up some of the questions that arose this afternoon on the floor.

"Now as far as water rights, since early '60's, this matter has been litigated in our courts. Now for us to legislate at this point and to make determinations as who has these basic water rights, I think is not proper.

"Now as far as adjudication process, I don't see how we can really simplify cases dealing with water or land in this State because of its limited quantities.

"Mr. Speaker, I think we should live by the old adage that 'if it's not broken, don't fix it.'

"We on the neighbor islands feel that the problems on water is still not as critical as it is here on Oahu. So what this bill calls for is to at least begin the recordation and monitoring of water resources on the neighbor islands and this is presently lacking. So, in a sense, this bill will start something moving whereby when we get to a critical stage in water management, that we'll have the necessary data to make the proper decisions.

"Mr. Speaker, I think this is a good start in trying to get a water code on the books and I know it's very difficult and it is going to be difficult in conference to resolve all the issues, but at least we are heading in the right direction and trying to satisfy the mandate of the Constitution.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, what everybody else has said earlier is true. There are a lot of complications with this bill. And what bothers me, and I'm not an attorney and I don't know maybe all the practical ways of changing these things, but when I can look at the bill and see that there is a declaration of policy that says all waters and then it defines it and leaves out private, it looks like the counties are going to lose jurisdiction over certain waters, that the board is going to take over.

"The Windward people in committee we heard can have 40 million gallons transported over the hill, and yet whenever there is a water shortgage and we have the water on this side of the island, our allocation is less than those people that they're transporting it for, and that bothers me. What bothers me even more, Mr. Speaker, is everybody is saying that we can go ahead and change this later. Well, let me tell you -- this is going to belong to the department, and anytime that you have tried to amend any problems in a department, that's a cold day in hell. And the reason that I say that is because it's not like any normal bill. It's not a bill that's going to take care of a particular district. The departments have to make that change and they will only change it if they believe there is a problem.

"Right now this bill, Mr. Speaker, is going into conference. I am voting 'no' because I don't think that it's fair that I go in that conference and I'm not going to go with the House version, and I'm going to be a thorn in my chairman's side, and if that's what everybody is thinking, every bill that's come up today, there's been very little discussion and we have gone through one heck of a lot of bills. But if you think that your job is to go over there and change it, then I think you are really doing an injustice because you don't need a person knifing you and saying, 'it's better the other way'. So, you

better stand up, be counted, vote for or against, but don't sit there and say we'll make changes later and nothing happens, and then tell your constituents we really tried because I don't believe that's true.

"Thank you very much and I hope you vote against the bill."

Representative Metcalf rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, perhaps the observations that you've heard this afternoon will give you some flavor of what Representative Say has gone through this session, but then I think the Chairman of Finance and the Chairman of Water, Land should be commended for their efforts in bringing this bill to the floor today.

"Thank you."

Representative Kamali'i rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I know that the Chairman of Finance and the Vice Chairman of Judiciary have complimented the Chairman of the Water, Land, but I want to say that it doesn't just take one person to work on a bill like the water code. I think congratulations is in order for every member of the Water, Land Committee that worked on this bill. We worked hard many weeks, frustration, so in complimenting the chairman, Mr. Speaker, I also want to compliment the colleagues of mine that sat on this committee.

"Thank you."

Representative Souki rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, I wish to take the opposite attack. Even though I have the greatest respect for the Finance Chairman, I have some reservations for this bill.

"As a member of the Constitutional Convention in 1978, I spoke against this amendment. I felt that this amendment would begin to dilute the powers of the respective counties; it would further centralize the extreme centralization of the state that we have here; it would provide for more regulations for those who wish to use water, and looking at the results of the bill, in spite of all the great work that has been done, I see a tremendous potential for these kinds of things to happen. I can see the powers of the counties and their

water boards being diminished. I can see that they're being attached with fees, that we will require additional work and paper work and time, and Mr. Speaker and members of this body here -- time, responsibility and autonomy for the respective counties that you come from and the people are very important and you must not lose sight. Even though we are members of this House with statewide responsibilities, we are still members of the respective counties and we still need to work on these daily activities that require county governance.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker and members of this valued House."

Representative Say rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor and just to say 'thank you very much' to the members of the committee and yourself for providing us the opportunity of educating ourselves with regards to the Water Code.

"What you have heard this afternoon, Mr. Speaker, are the diverse
problems that I had to face in trying
to come up with a compromise of a
statewide water code. I was telling
the Majority Leader this particular
measure is similar to 1966 which is
the land use law that was passed,
and I can recall the vote when I was
reading the Land and Power was 27 to
22.

"This issue here, yes, is a tough issue that Representative Kamali'i's correct and Representative Nakata, and it was because of their involvement that I tried to come up with a very, very worthwhile compromise. I know I have been criticized about the process which I think I was very democratic in having a Senate Bill on a House Draft 1 for a public discussion with testimony. We've gone through seven weeks of public dis-cussions. We broke it down first with the county and state relation-The following week, we covered the area of water rights since I thought water rights was a major problem and it has been said on the floor this afternoon, it is. And that's why the House Draft 1 tried to address that problem. We also looked at what the state agencies should it be which we all decided the Water, Land Committee which was the Land Board with the two responsibilities of irrigation systems and water development divested from its role.

"But, first of all, I'd like to say once more to compliment and thank all

the members of the Water, Land Committee and for you, Mr. Speaker, for giving us the opportunity of traveling throughout the outer islands in August, from the island of Haweii all the way to Kauai, and for the members who are not on the committee, what you have heard this afternoon is the true facts that you have so many diverse points of views, and in trying to come up with the compromise on a statewide water code, it is awfully tough.

"So if there is one person to shoulder the blame of what the House Draft 2 is, I would say to all of you, I'll shoulder that particular blame.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 564, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE WATER CODE", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Anderson voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 564 had passed Third Reading at 1:17 o'clock p.m.

"I would like to know why the bill is being recommitted?"

Representative Andrews answered:

"Mr. Speaker, some review of the action the committee took in circulating the Committee Report and agreeing to proceed with the bill, our review found that, first, going back and taking a look at the testimony there was certainly. . . all the testimony that was given was very weak, to say the least, and second of all, it creates quite an inconsistency in the law as it now stands.

"Last year, we passed out a bill allowing golf courses and driving ranges within the ag district on the non-prime ag lands, believing that these were open-space activities and should be considered like any other recreational activities that presently allow on ag lands. To remove just a small portion of that provides quite an inconsistency and that's basically the feeling of both chairmen that discussed this matter, that if you're going to allow the larger projects which we do agree that are open-space recreational-type activities on ag land, then these smaller activities should also be allowed.

"The second thing too is that most driving ranges would be on properties of fifteen acres or less which are presently under total county jurisdiction whether those lands are prime or not and so, for much of the cases and probably in many cases, that this would involve the jurisdiction of the State. There is no jurisdiction of the State anyway as the present statute exists.

"I hope that answers your question."

Representative Ikeda responded:

"Yes, it does. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ikeda then rose to speak against the motion to recommit, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I feel, in looking at this Committee Report, it covers two committees, only one member voted no on the Committee Report -- everybody else signed free and clear. I believe that through this process of holding a public hearing and making a decision, the committee has voted, and I think that it is terribly wrong and it sets a bad precedent for this Legislature and this body to then reverse their stand on a bill on the floor. I think that every member of this body has the right and is entitled to vote either in favor or against this measure and I would rather see it brought to a vote rather than recommitted for the reasons given by the chair.

"And for this reason, Mr. Speaker, I vote against the motion.

"Thank you."

Representative Onouye rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this measure with certain reservations.

"I share the concerns of many people about the ever worsening insurance crisis. I am well aware of the skyrocketing cost of insurance premiums and the near insurmountable problems these rates create. Obviously, something must be done to slow the meteoric rise in costs both to the insurer and the insured. However, I am concerned that perhaps this bill, while well meaning, will have the inadvertent result of leaving some injured people with inadequate compensation to pay their medical bills.

"This bill would limit the 'deep pocket' of government. As we all know, under current law, the State or counties can be held one percent liable and yet pay 100% of the costs. While on the surface this seems odd at best, the underlying social policy makes such 'deep pocket' liability totally rational.

'deep pocket' laws were "The created in response to the wishes of our society to insure that people who suffer catastrophic injury properly cared for during the rest of their lives. Earlier, lawmakers saw that awarding damages based solely on the percentage of culpability could not insure the care of the injured. Therefore, it was decided that although seemingly unfair the person or organization most able to pay would pay the bulk of any award. It was decided that any unfairness of joint and several liability was far outweighed by the insurance provided for and by society to the injured.

"This bill seeks to lighten the burden of the 'deep pocket' on government. Indeed, in recent years the State and counties have been hit hard by large claims resulting from joint and several liability. Something must be done but I wonder if the provisions of this bill will not inadvertently leave some injured persons unprotected and uninsured.

"I will vote in favor of this bill because I hope that it will help ease the crisis this State faces regarding insurance but I cannot help but be concerned that while well meaning, we are undermining long standing, and beneficial social policy.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ikeda rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of S.B. 2258-86, SD 1, HD 1, but I do have some reservations.

"Mr. Speaker, most of the provisions in this bill are similar to those in H.B. 1692, HD 1 which this House previously passed and, thus, I will not discuss them again. I would like to focus instead on the new provision addressing joint and several liability.

"Mr. Speaker, we have had much discussion this session regarding the joint tortfeasor statute. State and county representatives have testified regarding the increasing danger of public entities as 'deep pockets'. They have presented evidence showing the amounts paid out in judgments and, even more alarming, the settlements paid, when the government is the only solvent defendant.

"I think that what we need to realize is that every taxpayer in this State ends up contributing to that deep pocket. I don't disagree with the State or counties paying their proportionate share in cases where they are found to be at fault. I do object, however, to paying for more than our fair share.

"The present system makes government an easy target and we end up having to defend ourselves more often because of this. State and county attorneys have also indicated that settlements are often made to reduce costs in cases where the State or counties are only minimally involved because to do otherwise would be to risk paying an even greater amount.

"Mr. Speaker, the Chairman of the Judiciary Committee has made a laudable attempt to develop a compromise position, but the joint tortfeasor provision in this bill will provide only minimal relief to our local governments.

"The bill limits joint liability for public entities to actions in which they are found to be more than 10% negligent. For any suit in which they are found less than 10% responsible they are liable for only a proportionate percentage of the damages. The committee report, however, does not explain what '10%' was chosen as the turning point. My review of other jurisdictions with limitations on joint and several liability shows no state with this form of arbitrary delineation between 'joint' and 'several' liability.

"In addition, Mr. Speaker, the provision that this section shall not

apply if the State or county had prior notice of the condition which is the subject of the action is almost enough to completely nullify the entire section.

"Mr. Speaker, in spite of its draw-backs, I believe that the problems I have raised can be further reviewed and addressed in conference committee and I hope this will be. For that reason, I will vote in favor of the bill.

"Thank you."

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:59 o'clock p.m.

Representative Isbell rose and stated:

"I rise to speak in favor of S.B. 1965-86, HD 1, but with reservations.

"The Order of the Day calls this the grossing-up of income and that is true but the rest of the bill also has to do with reimbursement. This has been a very large controversy over the past two years, and last year we did amend the law to clarify what is reimbursement.

"One of the problems that we've had is that a merchants' association, for instance, would accept money from the merchants and as a passthrough, buy the advertisements and promotions. They may receive an additional amount of money for that activity but that is all. The rest of it goes directly through them -- it's like a conduit. I could add that in this House, if you were all to have a fund-raiser and I was the conduit and you give me each a hundred dollars and I go to the advertisers and I go to the building and I make all the arrangements but, in addition, you give me \$10 for my work. The full \$100 that each of you gave to me goes directly to that fund-raiser. The \$10 is my work, for my gas and everything else, but I'm not a paid employee of yours. I just simply do it as a service and that's what many times a merchants' association is.

"What the Department of Taxation has been doing is charging me the full \$110 from each of you as gross income, which is grossly unfair. The merchants' association is the same way. They should be charged only for that \$10, if anything, for gross income and that's why we passed the bill last year to clarify that, and if you will notice on page 2, last year we took out the word 'unless' and we put a period and we made it very clear that where the person receiving such reimbursement also receives additional reimbursement or monetary consideration, that is gross income. Now, we're going back to the old way with this bill and we're going to make it injustice again. I'm going to end up having to pay for the total amount that's passed through me like a conduit, just as the merchants' association.

"What I would like to see is the Department of Taxation, instead of crying wolf and saying that we are going to lose \$400-million because everybody's going to take advantage of this. They're so fast to cry 'wolf' but they're so slow to promulgate their own rules that would have made it very clear that the case law is in the books. They would make it impossible for the State to lose \$400-million in income from taxation. I feel that it's time that we stood up and said, 'Department of Taxation, do your job and do it now and don't change our rules just because you're so slow', and that's exactly what's happening.

"I would hope that everybody votes for this because there are a lot of good things in the bill and we are helping the grossing-up in corporations but I tell you for reimbursement, this is a step backwards and I hope that all of you will talk with the Senators, and I hope that we look carefully at how we are changing laws just to accommodate the Department of Taxation and their fears, when their fears would be totally abated if they would simply do their job and promulgate the rules that they should have a long time ago.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speak-er."

Representative Anderson rose and requested that "Representative Isbell's words be put in the Journal as my own."

Representative Blair rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I have had a little difficulty deciding how I wanted to vote on this

bill but I think I finally made up my mind. The reason I've had some difficulty with it is because I see a lot of merit to putting the gun to the head of the liquor wholesalers in hopes that they will give us back a hundred-odd million dollars to which they are not entitled.

"The problem that I have with it is that we are holding the gun, not to their head, but to the consumer's head, and consequently, I am not sure that the tactics are going to be successful, and I am also concerned that if this game of chicken is played with sufficient fervor, the losers in the end may be all of our constituents. Therefore, while I hope that this tactic is successful, even at this point I can't really accept it.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2308-86, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LIQUOR", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Blair, Liu and Marumoto voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 2308-86 had passed Third Reading at 2:07 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 495, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Kiyabu moved that S.B. No. 495, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Souki.

Representative Onouye rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Recently, I conducted a random poll of my district. After contacting over seven hundred of my constituents, I found that over seventy percent of these people are in favor of the State lottery.

"Mr. Speaker, I do not think my district is unique in a strong support for a lottery. I believe that a similar poll conducted in any House district would render the same results -- a strong support for a State lottery. I, like most of us gathered here today, have received many telephone calls and letters opposing the lottery from certain groups. However, I do not feel that these groups truly represent the wishes of our constituents.

"As a member of the subject matter committee that heard this bill, I was informed of the concerns that opponents of this measure have regarding the concern about an increase in crime resulting from a lottery but not a single person testifying was able to provide any conclusive statistical evidence to support such a claim.

"As to concerns about people on the lower end of the economic spectrum wasting their limited financial resources on a lottery, I am concerned about such a possibility. I doubt any of us gathered here today are comfortable with the prospect of people going without the basic necessities of life. However, I feel that it is wrong for us to deny the majority of Hawaii's people an activity which they strongly desire. It is very sad that certain people in our society tend to mismanage and squander their money. Indeed, if these people spend their money more efficiently, the quality of life would be improved.

"However, the lottery is not the issue here, but rather, education and counseling. If people waste their money on the lottery, it will not be an indictment of the lottery, but rather, will point out the need for educating our people for better fiscal management.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tam rose and stated:

"I wish to speak against Senate Bill 495, SD1, HD1, which is entitled, A Bill for an Act Relating to the Establishment of a State-Operated Lottery System. I wish to make it clear that I am voting 'no' because as a State Representative, my job is to vote on good and effective legislation. In this case, Senate Bill 495, SD1, HD1, is a poorly organized and written bill. I would not be acting as a responsible legislator by voting 'yes' to the contents of the bill.

"Specifically, my objections to Senate Bill 495, SD1, HD1, are as follows:

"One, in regards to page 3, under the heading of 'Qualifications of Commissioners', there is no qualification or reflection as to appointing commissioners who have knowledge of anything about lottery. The commissioners are supposed to be experts in the technical area of lottery, especially since they will act on administration of a lottery system in our State of Hawaii, a very special

place to all of us. I ask the question: 'Does not specifying technical expertise mean that appointments will be based on political favoritism?'

"Secondly, on page 15 of the bill it reads: 'It is the intent of this chapter that the commission may authorize the use of any type -- any type -- of lottery game that has been conducted, at the time this chapter takes effect, by any state government-operated lottery in the United States or any other type of lottery game that the commission determines will achieve the revenue objectives of the lottery consonant with the public good.'

"Thus, there is no defined forms of lottery games specified in this bill, especially the part that reads 'any other type of lottery game that the commission determines to achieve the revenue objectives of the lottery with the public good'. The question is, how can we leave the option open for a non-knowledgeable and non-expert body of commissioners to determine the types of lottery games good for Hawaii? It makes no sense to formulate a commission made up of non-knowledgeable and non-experts to experiment with various types of lottery games suitable for Hawaii.

"It is a more responsive act for us to pass a resolution to study the various types of lottery games best and successful for Hawaii and its people -- best and successful in the form of revenue and security means for Hawaii. We speak of Hawaii as a special place, and exceptional State, so let's be assured that we establish the right lottery games for Hawaii. I am concerned about lottery that is successful for Hawaii and its people. I have no assurance of this in this bill. We speak of the lottery of generating revenue for our State of Hawaii. From my practical business standpoint, one of possibility is ended. There is no assurance of this through Senate Bill 495, SD1, HD1.

"In the past, many constituents of even mine and my fellow colleagues have said that lottery will provide extra funds with the assurance of, in this case, of this bill. We could lose our pants on an experimental form of lottery, rather than a successful form of lottery, to stimulate economy for Hawaii. Let's study the various forms and systems of lottery of other states that have it. Use the positive workable forms and systems of lottery and discard the negative forms of lottery of the states.

"Therefore, this year, I will be introducing a resolution to study the best type for our State.

"Thank you."

Representative Apo rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to oppose the measure.

"Mr. Speaker, I am in no uncertain terms opposed to legalized gambling for the State of Hawaii.

"Mr. Speaker, under your leadership for the past several years, this House has consistently gone on record as opposing any form of legalized gambling for the State of Hawaii. However, the continued persistence of the Senate coupled with the increased pressure to create new revenue and also the recent expressions of public support for this measure now finds the lottery bill before us on the House floor. . .up for Third Reading. . .and one step away from the Governor's desk.

"Mr. Speaker, there is no question in my mind that there is widespread support from the general public for this bill and I know that many of my colleagues are heavily inclined to vote yes on this measure, not as a matter of conscience that tells them that legalized gambling is wrong Hawaii, but out of fear that a no vote may cost them some votes this election year. Mr. Speaker, I've heard the argument that our job is to carry out the popular will of the people and since this bill enjoys public support who are we to deny the public's will. This argument is seriously flawed for if we apply the popular will to all measures that come before us, we should also oppose forever any proposal to raise taxes since that issue is never popular with the people.

"Some of my colleagues, Mr. Speaker, support this bill with the argument that a state operated lottery is the cleanest and least noxious form of gambling and while that may be true I would apply the pregnancy test to this issue. There is no such thing as being a little bit pregnant...you either are or you aren't. The same goes for gambling. The degree to which we allow gambling is not the How could we continue to issue. discipline our school students for the nickel and dime crap games when at the same time we send them the message that gambling is okay only when the State says it is and only when the State plays the role of the house and collects it's percentage of the action?

"Mr. Speaker, regardless of what other states choose to do, it is unthinkable for me as an individual and a legislator, to support the notion that our government would sanction by law, set up, and manage a gambling operation as a legitimate business enterprise designed to actually encourage our people to gamble. The constant media bombardment through state supported advertising campaigns that entice people to take a chance would never end and, in fact, would probably escalate in intensity as our need to fill the State coffers with new monies grows. After all, we would be in business, and business is business.

"Mr. Speaker, I would also note that there are some not so widely discussed negative effects of the lottery. First of all, I think we understand that the lottery does not create new dollars for our economy. The effect that it will have is a redistribution of consumer spending dollars. A person walking into a retail outlet with \$5.00 as an example, who might have spent the whole five on groceries will now earmark a percentage of the same purchase power toward a lottery ticket. would be good for the State who then collects a major percentage of each lottery dollar instead of the 4% tax. This is bad, however, for the retailer whose gross revenues on retail items is reduced by the amount the consumer spent on lottery tickets which they might have spent on a purchase of goods. The effect of this redistribution of spending should be looked at much more closely and I think, Mr. Speaker, if we would have checked the State of California whose recent experience with the lottery has shown a decline in retail revenues, particularly in the low income areas.

"Mr. Speaker, I cast my 'no' vote on this bill because I truly believe, as a matter of conscience. . .as a matter of setting an example for the children of Hawaii...as a matter of maintaining the subtle but important lifestyle feature of wholesomeness for our island way of life. . .as a matter of socio-economic integrity I do not subscribe to the argument that ends justify the means. . .Mr. Speaker, many members of this House are wavering on this issue. . .looking outside of their conscience for guidance because somehow, deep down in their heart, I believe they do sense a degradation of Hawaii's moral character if they were to support S.B. 495.

"Mr. Speaker, we have before the House and Senate several good tax proposals directly aimed at resolving our revenue problem. This is the forum I believe that should form the boundaries of the battleground for more revenue.

"If it comes down to it, I am more willing to sacrifice a few district needs if the option is to sacrifice, even a little bit, the moral fibre and societal integrity of our people. Gambling to me is an unacceptable trade off. I could never feel comfortable that this Legislature would choose to supplement the State budget at the expense of those of our people who will surely end up casualties of any gambling scheme.

"Mr. Speaker, I submit to you that the public support this bill seems to enjoy, is not based on the public's desire to help out the State budget. The public support is largely fueled by their desire for a chance at instant riches and a willingness to accept the eventual casualty count. I am unwilling to accept any casualties. The risk is unnecessary, arbitrary, and clearly an irresponsible approach to a problem that has many other solutions.

"Mr. Speaker, when John F. Kennedy wrote his best selling book 'Profiles in Courage' this is the kind of situation he was talking about. Certainly a vote that runs counter to the popular will of the people takes some courage, especially on an issue that has received as much publicity as the lottery. But, that is what we are here for...to temper the passing storms of public emotion and voting our conscience on the basis of what is good or bad for Hawaii in the long run -- not on the basis of what is popular or good for election year politicking.

"Mr. Speaker, in closing I would plead with my colleagues on both sides of the aisle to stand together in a moment of courage and unanimously strike down this proposal that would establish legalized gambling in this great State of ours. It would be a great source of pride for me, Mr. Speaker, if today Republicans and Democrats alike could stand up as one voice and send a loud and clear message to the children of our State that Hawaii is a very special place and the House of Representatives of the Thirteenth Legislature unanimously voted to oppose it and keep it that way.

"Thank you."

Representative Kihano rose and stated:

"That was a pregnant speech and I would like to, Mr. Speaker, with your permission, to include my colleague from Waianae's speech as part of my own."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Crozier rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, there's an old slogan in show business: 'Never follow a dog act or children's act because you cannot win'. But in the Legislature, you should never follow our illustrious speaker, Representative Peter Apo. He is one of the most dynamic speakers we have here, and I don't know why I'm doing it but I'm following him, and here goes.

"Mr. Speaker, I am one of these gentlemen that he spoke about that was against the lottery. I don't believe that the lottery is the correct way to raise moneys. I believe philosophically that we're supposed to tax the people on productive money on our income tax or on our taxes generated through the sales excise tax -- what have you. You know, there is an old saying. . .on television. I think the gentleman's name is Mr. John Hausten -- the guy that acted on the lawyer show. He comes out on the commercial for Smith Barney. He says, 'This company does things the old fashioned way. We earn it.' I seriously believe that's how we suppose to do. We support to earn our tax dollars.

"However, Sir, I'm not worried about pre-election. This is not why I've changed my way. I've changed my way because my title is Representative, and if I get a clear, dynamic statement from the people of my district, I better pay attention. This is not a moral issue with me. This is a philosophical issue. Okay? I would estimate that something like 80 per cent of the people want lottery. I cannot walk down the street without somebody coming up to me and say, 'Hey, Mike, vote lottery. I was down at the Bobby Sox program, down in Nanakuli the other day, Saturday morning. As I walked through the ball park, people yelling, 'Eh, Mike, brother, no forget lottery now!. Yeh, yeh, yeh, yeh. You know, every place I go, I get friends, sir. They also told me, sir, to remind the Speaker about how they feel. I said, 'I would.' I go to community meetings -- that's one of the issues that we discuss. You folks have seen the many people that come from my district and I've introduced them at the beginning of the sessions. When I talk with them, I ask them, 'What are your feelings about lottery?' Eighty per cent of them are for it. In fact, they all got their recommendations how they suppose to win or what they are going to do with their money. I know that's wishful thinking. I know they chasing rainbows, but they want it. I go to my neighbors, friends and neighbors, even my family -- my family wants it. In fact, my mother even threatened me. She said if I don't vote for lottery, she's going to throw me out of her will. Now, that's a joke -that's a joke. I told my mother I was
going to say it and she said, 'you betta not'. No, but in all sincerity, wherever I go, I go down to the spa and you know it's a good place -- it's a good place to get the sense of what the people have to say. You know, you sitting there only in your shorts and you chatting with your fellowmen, everybody wants lottery, and I held the line all the way through, but the one that clinched it all is when I went to church, and I gotta share this with you folks. Nobody can make up a story like this. You know, for those of you who know the Catholic religion, the communion or the holy communion is the most sacred time through the process. Well, I was going up to communion. One of the other guys in the line nudged me and says, 'Eh, Mike, no forget the lottery eh?' And Mr. Speaker, that's when I caved in. I caved in because I got the message that the people want lottery -- not because I'm afraid of re-election. We all wanna come back, but I am their Representative, I am their messenger. They have told me this is what we want. If it was a moral issue with me, maybe I'll hang tough, but I don't see it as a moral issue, and that's why I will be supporting lottery.

"Thank you, Sir."

Representative Anderson rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, over and above everything else that was said, if in fact, while we were in committee, any of us who was listening very carefully heard any testimony that actually said it's going to bring us additional crime, it's going to benefit or really hurt only those people who could least afford it, and I've said it before and I'll say it again, we cannot continuously go ahead and legislate

for a small minority group who, regardless of whatever we do, are going to do whatever they want to do. I know many of them. They are very close to me and my friends and they gamble today and they'll gamble tomorrow, and even the Police Department had to go ahead and realize that and they did not argue the point. They are gambling with food stamps, they are gambling with welfare checks, you name it. We all gamble.

"If I found statistics that we could correct it by not having, I would be the first to vote against it, not just because it's a people vote do we have to go ahead and initiate this, but there is nothing documented that it's wrong. So the people want it. I've heard all the pros and the cons, and I'm voting for it strictly because there's not enough to go against what the people want. If there was documented proof, I would be the first to go ahead and vote against it, go back and hope to Heaven that my constituents would understand why I voted against it. But if they ask me and they said, 'Did you receive any documented proof that this is going to be bad for us', I honestly cannot say that. No one has given us that.

"For that reason, I'm going to vote for it, and I would hope that everyone of you consider it and never mind re-election or whatever, I'm glad we're gonna have a chance to vote for or against, but do it on the merits of the bill. And I'm going to vote for it and I wish my colleagues would too, Mr. Speaker.

"Thank you."

Representative Ikeda rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I do have some reservations about this bill.

"Mr. Speaker, from a purely practical standpoint, I don't think that the lottery is a good idea.

"First of all, it will be costly to set up and I don't believe that it will generate enough additional funds to meet our needs. The games must continue to vary or the stakes increase in order to keep people interested. And so, there is no telling how long the lottery boom may or may not last.

"My greatest concern regarding a lottery, Mr. Speaker, has been the potential for increased criminal activity. However, 22 other states

now have lotteries, some for quite awhile, and there is no concrete evidence to show that the establishment of a lottery has increased crime in these areas.

"I can recall the same fears being expressed some years ago when we revised our penal code to permit social gambling and I must admit that I shared those fears then. Yet permitting social gambling has not radically changed our society or contributed to an increase in crime in this State, so my fears regarding crime have been somewhat ameliorated.

"Another concern expressed is that a lottery will have an adverse effect on the poor because they will tend to spend a greater proportion on their income on the lottery rather than on necessities. This may be true. However, Mr. Speaker, people will spend as they want to regardless of what we do. I have spoken to several people who presently send money to other states and Canada to purchase lottery tickets. Others who can ill afford it, in my opinion, bet illegally on sports events. Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I don't believe that we as legislators can continue to insist that people do what we think is best for them or what we think they should do with their lives.

"As a legislator, I have concluded after reading and listening to all of the arguments, both pro and con, that there is no overwhelming reason to oppose the lottery and so I will vote in favor of this bill even though I personally do not feel that it is the best way to raise revenues in this State

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Onouye rose in rebuttal, stating:

"I believe my responsibility here as a Representative is to be much like a judge. You have to weigh the issues on both sides. On one side, we have the potential increase in our economy, and also the people of the State —the majority want it. On the other side, being on the subject matter committee, I've only heard hearsay —oh, the crime might go up, or the poor people will spend all their money. I cannot base my decision on this hearsay, and therefore, again I say that we should support this measure.

"Thank you."

Representative Andrews rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I assume that the purpose of this bill is not to provide the taxpayers with just another service or product. The fact is that the ability to participate in a numbers game, or lottery, is presently readily available in our community, legally or illegally. From time to time, we can participate in legal lotteries from many of the local fast food outlets and every year, various magazines solicitations come to our promising instant millions. People only rush and return the contents of the envelope. Right now, you can run down to your local drug store and take a chance in winning a trip to New York or \$25,000 and all these for free, Mr. Speaker, or you can go out and play the illegal numbers game that exists in our community. can bet on anything from football, baseball or any other sport that's going on. All this type of betting with odds that are far better than any that would ever be given by the State in this proposed lottery.

"So, Mr. Speaker, I believe that what we are talking about here is more money for the State, a new and easier way to collect revenues is just another form of taxation.

"Mr. Speaker, it is this revenue side of the picture that I question. The unreliability of the estimated gross, the small net when compared to the gross take, its effect on the overall economy of the State, and the cause and effect relationships that will cause a reduction in revenues from our present tax resources.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill proposes to bring in about \$10- to \$20-million from our present economy in ticket sales.

"First of all, Mr. Speaker, I doubt the accuracy of the figures. Most other states with established lotteries find a gross of about 1 per cent of gross State revenues. For Hawaii, that would come to a gross of about \$15-million. The net again based on State averages is that the State keeps about 40 per cent or, in other words, what we are talking about here is six million dollars, a six million increase in the revenues to the State, not 10, not 20.

"The tendency to overestimate revenues is common. For example, Maine, a state with a similar base as ours, estimated \$10-million in 1983, received \$3.7 million. Mr. Speaker,

we all know what happens when you overestimate revenues. We provide programs and promises to the people that we cannot keep. This in turn pushes our desire to find additional revenue sources even higher. These additional revenues, again based upon the experience from other states, are found by increasing taxes, the very thing we were trying to avoid in the first place. This point is best exemplified by John Quinn, the New York State Lottery Director, when he said: 'There have been complaints from people when they voted for the lottery. They felt their taxes wouldn't go up. If they believed that, they were unrealistic.' And that is just what we are doing here today, Mr. Speaker. We have a proposal here to solve some of our revenue problems that is to totally unrealistic.

"Mr. Speaker, we must also try to understand what the effects are going to be if we are removing \$20- to \$50-million from our economy. Mr. Speaker, the lottery is going to remove a large sum from circulation and certainly we must understand that this is going to have some effect on the overall economy of this State. Will it increase unemployment? Will it have an effect on the present tax structure? Mr. Speaker, these are unanswered questions -- questions I have never seen answered to any satisfaction. Thus, Mr. Speaker, I can only estimate the overall effect of the lottery.

"The California Grocers' Association reports in their new lottery they have up there, 4 to 8 per cent decrease in merchandise sales from a large percentage of its members who participated in last year's sale of lottery tickets. The report went on to say that the store officials from four large Southern California grocery chains reported the decrease in sales matched the amount spent in those outlets on lottery tickets. Mr. Speaker, if we apply these figures to Hawaii, we can come up with a rather large decrease in general excise tax revenues from this sector of our economy alone. In the 1982 census of retail trade done by the U.S. Census Bureau, it reports that Hawaii's 797 grocery stores had a combined total of \$1.1 billion in sales in that year. If the figures from California's study will apply to Hawaii's total sales on groceries, the State would lose approximately \$1.1 million in excise tax from grocers alone. An example on the front cover of that report, Mr. Speaker, I'll read you a quote, and it says: 'Because customers spend their

money on tickets, which have very little margin rather than merchandise, our business has been damaged by it — the lottery.' I understand that we are not the only businessmen who feel this way. What about the other sectors of our economy? What is the effect going to be on them? Mr. Speaker, we do not know the answers to these questions. What we do know is that the effect will not be beneficial.

"Mr. Speaker, from all of this, I can draw the following conclusions. We will not get the revenue we expect, the State will lose income from other sources, and the pressure to raise taxes would be even stronger after we pass the lottery than before.

"Mr. Speaker, just for these reasons, along with the moral issues that include the increase in crime, regressiveness of taxation, and the fact that the State will soon find itself forced to extensively advertise for ticket sales in a manner that would be flatly illegal if state governments weren't exempt from federal trade regulations. And Mr. Speaker, not only is the lottery unlikely to be very profitable, but by its nature, undermines the integrity of this State.

"Thank you."

Representative Liu rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"First of all, on what exactly will happen to our economy, I think the facts and the other states that have had lotteries would have shown that if they were so disruptive to those economies, repeal of those laws which set up those other states' lotteries would have occurred. That is yet to happen and there really is no indication that that will happen. Yes, there will be adjustments, but can we say that they will be all bad? Can we really say that the problems of providing another outlet for people is wrong? No one has mentioned the possibility that we might be able to take in some monies now that are going to illegitimate type of games. Perhaps that would increase our revenue in-flow.

"Today, I will be voting with a clear conscience and I will wake up tomorrow morning, feeling no more or less courageous than those of you who vote no.

"On the technical side, let me say that I've compared this bill with those other enabling legislation in other states and I see it as not being lacking in controls and qualifications in various sections of the bill.

"We are here talking about choice. This lottery, if it is enacted, does not mandate that everyone participate. People can make up their own minds, and they will. And if for some reason -- one year, two years or three years, if for some reason those who are against the bill are proven right, I am sure that future Legislatures will take note and make the necessary changes or even repeal this act. But I don't believe that will happen. I think this is something which has too long been on the back burner, and it is fortunate today that we do have a chance to give the people of this State another choice in their lives.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Souki rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, I wish to speak for the bill for a number of reasons.

"One is that, as members of the House, we should not moralize for the people of the State of Hawaii and determine what is right for them, what they should have and what they should not have. I believe that the public, for these past few years, have spoken loudly and clearly that they want the lottery, not only as a means of enhancing their money but as a form of entertainment. And like the previous speakers for the lottery, it's almost unanimous for those people that I see on the street that asked for this lottery, and I think we won't be respectful to the public who elect us if we attempt to legislate morality.

"And Mr. Speaker and members, we speak about the poor who will be affected by the lottery. I want you to know that for sixteen years, I was an executive director for an antipoverty agency, working solely with poor people, and I can tell you and the members here that poor people, because of their limited income, are better able to balance their books than we are. For the most part, they are poor because of circumstances that are beyond them -women with children who can't work. elderly, disabled. But these people know how to budget; they can discern what is right and what is wrong, and it is insulting to them to say that they are going to be affected by this program here. It is also insulting to the State of Hawaii when,

for years, the public has been asking for this lottery and we vote against it.

"That's all, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Apo, in rebuttal, stated:

"While it is true, Mr. Speaker, that it is probably not possible to legislate morality, I would remind my colleagues that murder is a moral issue, rape is a moral issue -- many, many moral issues, and I think gambling also falls in that category.

"Secondly, those who expressed or for those who write off the argument about the syndicate not being able to penetrate the lottery system, you know, it's really hard for me to understand how we can condemn gambling as an activity simply because it is run by the syndicate, and yet, turn around and say that if the State operates a gambling operation, that makes it moral and that makes it okay.

"This argument does not wash, and I would ask all of my colleagues to look at that question and vote their conscience.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lardizabal rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it's been a long day and a long morning but I would be remiss if I did not speak up against the measure. My fellow colleagues have already expressed themselves so eloquently on the pros and cons of the bill, I'd like to provide my own opinions, if I may.

"You know gambling is...lottery is part of gambling and gambling has many, many aspects to it but if I may just to discuss gambling in general. Gambling is an industry that's highly organized, well financed and it seeks like other businesses to increase their returns on investments. If I may quote the 1981 State Legislature magazine, I quote: 'There's a danger that a gambling industry's growth can overtake a state's ability to regulate or control that industry. This is especially true in small states where the regulators are few in number and the state is dependent upon that income.

"A few weeks ago, I met, on the airplane going back home to Kauai, another state legislator from the State of New Hampshire. Her name is

Virginia Earne. As you know, the State of New Hampshire has a population base almost equivalent to Hawaii -- about a million people. They began their lottery some years ago and then they discovered that population base was insufficient for the increasing demands for new revenue. And what happened? It joined with the tri-states -- two other states so that they could increase that base. So this is an indication that once you start, you cannot stop if you depended upon that revenue. Also, Mr. Speaker, the industry is going pellmell in the United States today. About \$60-billion worth of waging is made by Americans and is popular, yes -- very popular.

"With respect to my colleagues who state that they represent the will of their constitutents, I say this to you in all earnest: you represent the voters but we also represent young children that cannot vote and can't speak for themselves today. We represent the values. They look to us for leadership -- ethically, morally, politically, government. And to say that the majority of the voters want lottery is half the truth. You know deep down inside the effects of gambling, lottery, crime, prostitution, etc. It's a popular thing. Dope, marijuana are popular but we don't legalize it because we know there are social and health costs. Porno, et cetera. The argument that it is popular is the reason to vote for it -that's hogwash. You and I represent children -- the future. They cannot think for themselves today. here to think for them. The seniors and those that can vote can make that choice if they want to but you and I represent other people too.

"Mr. Speaker, I have some testimony here I'd like to continue and if I am short of time, please let me know but I must speak out.

"The legalization appears to increase more gambling into other areas, and my colleague across the aisle stated that they needed facts about crime and so forth. And I quote Mr. Jerry Fulcher, executive director of the Delaware Council on Gambling Problems, report in the April 1981 issue of Gaming Business: 'An average increase of more than 200 per cent in Gamblers Anonymous participation in New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware and Maryland since the opening of the Atlantic City casino.' According to a federally funded study, the Delaware Council admitted that as many as 86 per cent of the gamblers or compulsive gam-

blers and the American Institute of Insurance estimates that as much as 40 per cent of the nation's white collar crime is related to gambling and quote these figures and write to these people.

"Mr. Speaker, in gambling and lottery, there will be winners and losers. Let me enumerate the winners. The operators who stand to gain money, the marketing promoters, the media, printers — they stand to gain money to be winners. The machine companies that make this lottery machines — the one-arm bandits, etc. — they're winners too. Illegal gamblers who will piggy-back the system that you want to create—they'll be winners. Point one per cent of those who gamble will win while 99.9 per cent will lose, and in the short run the state will be a winner. And lastly, the other winner gamblers must borrow money from to play.

"The real losers -- our youths of this nation, and this State and this community.

"Three months ago, my daughter who is sixteen, came to me and said, 'Dad I have a project to do in school about gambling.' She did a good job of researching. I did not attempt to influence her decision and conclusion. I gave her information, took her to the library, to people and others through her own discovery. And she did conclude that the real losers would be the young youth of this community. She realized that. But she also realized that there was money to be made. And the lesson that I drew from this with her was this, that no matter what you do in life, you've got to work hard for it, you've got to work honestly for it, you've got to study for it, and you've got to do it for yourself -there is no free ride. And that value, I want to impart to her, and that legalized gambling may be a short cut but it's not the way that I want her to grow up in this community.

"So when I hear people say that I must represent my community -- your community is more than just the voters. There are nearly two hundred thousand students out there looking at us for leadership. Give them the leadership. Stand up. The message that we will impart upon our young people today, Mr. Speaker, is more important to me than the \$10-million that it may bring to us in the short run, because I believe that in

the long run there will be problems worth more than \$10-million in lost lives.

"You know, we talk about the social cost. None of you here have spoken yet about the social cost. I know of a family, if I may continue, Mr. Speaker -- for many years their father was a gambler, a compulsive gambler. The young child sat on his father's knees for many years watching gambling go on -- card games, dice. The child witnessed stabbings, fights, and the worst of it. This continued for years in the high school years. The child, from high school, used to thumb a ride to the place where his father was gambling, to catch a ride home, some 12 to 15 miles. His father married a younger woman who was also a compulsive gambler, waiting to strike it rich day after day, night after night. One day the child went to the pool hall to wait for his parents and that mother called the police to have their son arrested, perhaps because they did not want to be bothered. Thev are going to strike it rich. home, don't bother me, son.' The result -- the child went to jail. One day, when the Family Court found out the situation, they took that child away from that home. I can't continue on this because it is very personal. I know the family very well. But the social cost is just something you cannot put a dollar figure on. You can't balance the budget with that kind of social cost.

"Mr. Speaker, if there's nothing else I can impart to my colleagues today, if you have one ounce of doubt as to the usefulness of lottery and gambling in this State legalized, perpetuated by the State, then vote 'no' with me. Those of you who are married and who have young children, I can't go home tonight and talk to my young son, 13, and daughter, 16, and tell them, go ahead children, the State says it's legal now to the lottery -- go ahead and gamble. It's right because the State says its right, legally. I think it's wrong. It is not a moral issue -- it's a social issue for me. The youth of this community look to us for that leadership. If we cannot give them the leadership, then, you seriously must question who to represent -special interest, the majority rule, or can we stand up and vote our con-science? Please vote against the measure.

"Thank you."

Representative Tam rose and

stated:

"Speaker, I have some further words against this bill.

"It has been said this afternoon that we Representatives of various districts of the State of Hawaii, represent our constituents -- the will of them. Let me say this -- that we represent them in a respectable manner whereby we look at details of any bill, especially this one. I look for the flaws of the bill and if there's none, vote for the bill. I stated earlier, I said that they are flaws in this bill.

"Number one, I summarize again: Qualifications of commissioners and if there are none, in essence, expertise.

"Number two, how much economically will the State of Hawaii, the people of Hawaii will benefit if the lottery is not known at this time.

"Therefore, I strongly suggest that we adopt a resolution to further study the issue of lottery and come up with facts and figures, things that we can hang on to and say, we did our job. I am concerned about making lottery successful, not only economically, but also socially for enjoyment. As one properly and responsible in representing our constituents and also representing, among with others of my colleagues, other residents of the State of Hawaii.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to have a rebuttal against some of my colleagues' remarks.

"One of them was that we were going to lose because people were going to be spending their money elsewhere. Let me tell you, Mr. Speaker, where were their concern today when you could have businesses lose and go out when we had the tourism tax, and where were they when we were raising the liquor tax that could put the people out of business? Where were your concerns then?

"And a moral issue? I put in a bill on this floor, not in this floor, in this House, for castration of rape, because children were raped. Nothing happened. And murder? We're had a hearing but never has it come

to the floor and, Mr. Speaker, that's where the fight should be -- on this floor. You're either for or against. They either fly or they die, and it has nothing to do with the chairman, it has nothing to do with, is he, she or whatever, good or bad. It's the merits of the bill. You get a chance to kill this in committee, and it's fine, but anything that has as much concern as some of the issues that are in this Capitol, we should have a hearing, and on this floor, and we should have the debates and fights, and when you are finished, believe me -- man, woman or child -- you'll feel a lot better the next morning when you're shaving or putting on your make-up because you'll know that inside, you did exactly what you felt was right, and I don't think that there's anything wrong with this.

"As far as children goes, I'm bringing up a grandchild like anybody else bring up their own kids, and I'll certainly teach him that when we have something that's voluntary, he is going to have to make sure that he runs his own budget. I gamble, I go to Vegas and gamble..on a dollar. I don't play \$5.00 tables or \$25. I gamble what I can afford and if people cannot do that, that's their problem. You cannot legislate for individual families, individual concerns. It's got to be for the mass and if at certain times if they don't tell you something, then you can look at other groups and find out what their concerns are, and you take it from all of the information you have. But so far, all I've heard is, you want statistics, we've got it. It's on this floor today.

"I've sat in both primary and Finance. I didn't hear the people coming up that came in to testify. I didn't hear them coming up and saying, 'We really have the information that you need.' I've gotten my own information in my office as far as what the other states are doing. I'm not using it here because I'm not that sure but neither is anybody else. I'm not sure as far as the dollars, but they have not said that there's going to be the crime and that there's going to be the destruction that this particular bill is supposed to do. So I'm still going to vote for it and I wish you would too.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hemmings rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"First I'd like to compliment you, Mr. Speaker, for having this issue

come to the floor and letting democracy exercise itself here in such a reasonable fashion. I think it's very healthy the exercise we're going through today.

"There are two basic issues we're talking about. We're talking about whether our society is going to accept any form of gambling and then, secondly, whether or not there's financial reasons to accept gambling as a means of generating revenues for the State.

"So often it's been said that if we don't remember our history and our past, we'll be condemned to re-live it. Since time immemorial, human kind in organized societies has fought certain moral, social and ethical problems that have been brought about by vices -- vices such as prostitution, vices such as drugs, overconsumption, and these vices have taken their toll on societies who have refused to consistently fight against them. We'll never totally get rid of prostitution, we'll never totally get rid of murder. But the minute we drop our guard and we stop fighting these vices, our society is doomed for trouble.

"So on the issue of lottery as a form of gambling, I speak against it because you cannot make something right that is a vice by simply legalizing it. It will only promote more of it.

"Secondly, I've heard several times mentioned today on the floor that there's pressure to increase revenues in the State. I am very perplexed by that statement. There is no pres-sure. We're facing a surplus of possibly \$70-million in our revenue collection -- \$70-million this year. We instituted a mechanism to actually go to the very expensive exercise of refunding the taxpayers a dollar a head just so we'll comply with the constitutional mandate of refunding people their tax money. I've heard the excuse used that Gramm-Rudman is a mandate to increase taxes. Gramm-Rudman is a blessing in disguise. It's demanding that we in government cut government spending so we don't have to take more money out of the private sector, out of people's pockets who work hard for money, and squander it.

"For that reason, I'm urging you to all vote 'no' against the lottery because it's just another means where money and in this case unjustifiably so, is taken from people and given to government. But what we in govern-

ment have to do and should do is use the opportunity to cut government spending rather than finding another means of taking money from people. So I see no justification -- moral, social, or ethical or financial means -to increase taxation in legalized gambling in Hawaii.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pfeil rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, we have been hearing practical arguments against a State lottery. I would like to voice some philosophic objections.

"Before I became a member of the Legislature, I believed that a lottery would raise large sums of money for the State, that it would be fun for those participating and that it would not hurt anybody. I now believe that the last of these would not be true.

"Mr. Speaker, we get out of life what we basically put into it. Taking responsibility for one's self, and being successful, mean knowing the relationship between cause and effect. A lottery in our State would encourage the belief that successes do not come from one's own efforts. It would further confuse the understanding of the relationship between cause and effect in our lives, and would erode the values that we, as a policy-making body, should stand for.

"My position against the lottery will not be popular in my district. I believe, however, that my position is correct.

"Mr. Speaker, the State should always take the 'higher road' in its decisions. We have the opportunity to do this with a 'no' vote on this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Okamura rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I concur with the Representative from Makakilo that this bill is indeed a popular one and I, too, have received many, many queries as to how I was going to vote for it and if I am supporting the bill, including my parents.

"I oppose the bill, however, because I think it is going to open the doors to other forms of gambling and unlike my colleague across the aisle who stated that if in the long term we find that there are very negative

consequences to this legislation, that later legislators would possibly repeal this bill. I disagree with that. I think that once you enact legislation which is very popular, there is no turning back and if anything, in the future, how do we say no to bingo, casino gambling, cock-fighting or pari-mutuel betting, some of which legislation we already have in the hopper today. So I believe that it is a very, very bad precedent, and something that in the long term all of Hawaii would lose from.

"Thank you."

Representative Blair rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, very briefly because I don't believe in beating a dead horse, I would like to ask that Representative Apo's and Representative Andrew's remarks be included as my own in the Journal. In addition, I would make one point or emphasize one point.

"If the members would look on pages 11 and 12 of the bill, they will see that we are mandating the director to engage an independent firm experienced in the analysis of advertising, promotion and public relations and that we are designating that, although at this point the figure isn't given in the bill, we are going be designating some certain portion of the revenues to be used to promote gambling among our citizens. finally, if you turn to page 14, there is a mandate that the lottery shall be initiated and continue to operate so as to produce the maximum amount of net revenues.

"So this isn't really a situation as some have described it, not here today, but in other circumstances similar to our collecting a tax on liquor or our collecting a tax on tobacco where we accept the vice because it provides revenues. In those cases, the State is collecting revenues but at the same time that we collect the revenues, we inhibit the public from consuming tobacco, or alcohol, by making it more expensive.

"This is dramatically different in that this is the first time the State has ever. . .excuse me, those of you who disagree with calling it a vice, but this will be the first time that the State has ever put itself in a position of actively promoting vice among its citizens, and if vice is too harsh a word, I don't think there's anyone who's really stood up today and said that gambling is good for our society,

and yet, this is exactly what we will be doing. We will be promoting gambling, and I think that it's really something that we should be loathe to do, and therefore, I would urge that we all vote against the bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Cavasso rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, we have one million people in Hawaii and as the Representative from Kauai indicated, there's a trap -- a lottery trap coming down...

The Chair interrupted:

"Representative Cavasso. . .

Representative Cavasso said:

"I shall rise to speak against it, Mr. Speaker."

Directed by the Chair to "please proceed," Representative Cavasso continued:

"Between two and ten million people are in bondage across America -- two to ten times the population of Hawaii -- trapped by gambling right now. A lottery trap as I said before, Mr. Speaker, rips off the would-be gamblers who can least afford to lose. The poor who wish most intensely to be rich, the lottery dream offers odds of winning that are worse than the odds of their being hit by lightning.

"We learn from history what we haven't learned from history. Historically, gambling does attract corrupt people. Other states have suffered from racketeers, thieves and under-the-table payoffs. Studies show that lotteries return the least amount of money -- gambled money -- back to winners. At the same time, tax revenue gains are minimal if you need to keep Hawaii clean.

"Often, where life is in government, we are tempted to do something wrong in order to accomplish good. Better education and human service programs are good things, but we cannot fund them with money we get by trapping our people."

Representative Anderson rose on a point of information and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, if I remember correctly, is this the only bill because the House Bill version that we had about a week ago, or two weeks ago, or when the heck it was. . .

The Chair interrupted and said:

"This measure came over first."

Representative Anderson asked:

"So we accepted the Senate version from last year and this is the only vehicle -- isn't that right?"

The Chair answered:

"That is right."

Representative Anderson asked:

"May I ask for a roll call vote then, Mr. Speaker?"

The Chair then said:

"Roll call has been called for. If there are no further discussions...

Representative Kamali'i rose and stated:

"I'm glad that a roll call has been called for because I am ready to vote. I have sat here and I have listened.

The Chair said:

"Representative Kamali'i. . .

Representative Kamali'i said:

"I rise and now will vote in favor of this bill. I think everyone will have their choice. They will pick up their pen and they will go 'aye' or 'nay' and I think the people of this State should also be given a choice, whether they want to buy a whopper or they want to buy a lottery ticket. That's their choice.

"So, I call for the question."

Roll call having been requested, the motion was put by the Chair and S.B. No. 495, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A STATE-OPERATED LOTTERY SYSTEM", having been read throughout, failed to carry by a vote of 18 ayes to 32 noes, with Representatives Andrews, Cachola, Cavasso, Apo, Blair, Graulty, Hagino, Hemmings, Hirono, Honda, D. Ige, M. Ige, Isbell, Jones, Kawakami, Kihano, Lardizabal, Leong, Lindsey, Manegdeg, Marumoto, Menor, Metcalf, Nakata, Okamura, Pfeil, Shon, Tajiri, Takamine, Tam, Tom and Peters voting no, and Representative Levin being excused.

S.B. No. 2048-86, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Kiyabu, seconded by Representative Souki and carried, S.B. No. 2048-86, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 2048-86 had passed Third Reading at 3:12 o'clock p.m.

DEFERRED MATTER FROM EARLIER ON THE CALENDAR

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 824-86 on S.B. No. 1780-86, SD 2, HD 2:

Representative Kiyabu moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1780-86, SD 2, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Souki.

Representative Kiyabu rose to speak in favor of S.B. 1780-86, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, stating:

"This bill together with S.B. 2127-86, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, which is recommended to pass Third Reading next on today's calendar, represents a landmark in our budget execution process. Landmark in the sense that we are recognizing the importance of our educational programs by granting the Department of Education and the University a status that will be unique in comparison to all other departments. Under our present laws, all departments are required by law to follow budgetary allotment and disbursement procedures as established by Budget and Finance and DAGS.

"We have always acted in a fiscally responsible manner in appropriating budgets within our fiscal capacity to provide essential services for our people.

"Mr. Speaker, as you know, a budget is a plan of action made with the best available data on the anticipated revenues of the fiscal year ahead. Even with the best laid plans, which include provisions to ensure the Legislature's intent when actual revenue collections do not meet the projected collections, changes must be made to such expenditure plans. The power to alter the expenditure plan lies with the Governor. The budgetary and disbursement procedures have allowed our Governor to maintain this State's

fiscal integrity. Hawaii's fiscal track record over the past ten years is one which most states would envy.

Mr. "However, Speaker, sterling fiscal record has not been totally accomplished without costs, as there have been subtle expenses and missed opportunities associated with these controls. Although the subtle expenses and missed opportunities can be tolerated in most programs, we should not overlook the impact that these controls have had, especially in regard to limiting the delivery of quality education to our young people.

"The amendments proposed by this bill will give both the Department of Education and the University of Hawaii, through their executive officers, independence from current system of budgetary controls. This is in accordance with satisfying the constitutional intent to give the Board of Education and the Board of Regents jurisdiction over the internal organization and management of a statewide system of public education. This is a rational approch to granting administrative flexibility to both institutions in order to achieve the program goals and objectives of formal education on a statewide basis. Your committee believes that granting these institutions budgetary and expenditure responsibilities gives them some measure of independence and the necessary tools to respond expeditiously to changing educational program needs. As a result, these institutions will be given the opportunity not only to improve decision-making in the budgetary process which is sorely lacking in the current system, but also to effectuate a systematic analysis of programs in the pursuit of desirable objectives of public education.

"The authority to establish ceilings with which these institutions must allocate their resources in light of changing revenues, however, will still remain with the Governor. In the final analysis, it is the intent of your committee that accountability will not be sacrificed within the budgetary process. The Legislature will not abdicate its responsibility to oversee our fiscal resources by granting administrative flexibility to both institutions.

"I urge all members to vote for this bill and the next bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Lindsey rose and

stated:

"I rise in support of this bill and in the essence of time and with your permission, I would like to have entered into the Journal Representative Kiyabu's remarks as being my own.

"Thank you."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Anderson rose and stated:

"Looks like I am going to speak against the bill. It seems like I am doing a lot of going against this morning or this afternoon.

"Mr. Speaker, the reason that I am against this is because I do not believe that the Department of Education is the same as the University of Hawaii. We have had the argument in Finance. Someone said that they are exactly the same because they have the Board of Regents and the Board of Education, and that both have the Superintendent and President of the University.

"There is a great difference.

"The Board of Education is an elected body, not an appointed body. We have had problems with the educational system for years and last year or a year before, if you remember correctly, we had two bills where the Superintendent would be appointed by the Governor of this State regardless of who he or she was and I agreed to that, the reason being it then has the accountability and there is an umbilical cord between the department and the Governor of this State.

"Right now, the Governor, at times, does not fund programs that you and I may think is essential and that's because the Board of Education may say that it is good, and in his own mind he does not believe it, and if the Superintendent says it's good, he's taking the Board's side, and if he says it's no good, then the Board gets mad at the Superintendent and that's been the conflict for years.

"And to go ahead and give them the same rights as the University is only going to put another level of confusion to the Governor of this State. And that's the way I honestly feel and that's the way I'll vote. I'm against this bill and I hope you'll consider.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tam rose to speak in favor of this bill, stating:

"I think this bill is long overdue in terms of giving autonomy in essence to the Department of Education as a comparison or similarity to the Hawaii Board University of of Regents. Everyone knows, to this day, that the Board of Regents are appointed officials and in comparison to the Board of Education, are elected officials. I am saying, in essence, that if we give autonomy to the University of Hawaii, it is only rightly so that we give autonomy to the Board of Education.

"For those members on the Board of Education, our elected officials like you and I -- everyone of my colleagues here -- take away that right is to say that the people are not responsible in electing their elected officials. Therefore, I am in favor of this bill.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1780-86, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ALLOT-MENT SYSTEM AND THE EXECUTIVE BUDGET", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Anderson and Medeiros voting no.

Representative Manegdeg, on behalf of Representative Graulty and himself, introduced 3 classes of eighth grade students from Moanalua Intermediate School accompanied by their teacher, Ms. Laurie Nesser, and chaperones, Mr. Hal Nakanishi and Mr. Viller.

Representative Cavasso introduced four students from Waimanalo Elementary School "who had wrote me a letter on a problem in our community and brought it to my attention and to the Department of Health, and I appreciate them doing that." They are as follows: Shannon DeSilva, Alvina Ohia, Fred Silva and Derek Medeiros accompanied by their teacher and chaperone, Mrs. Gott.

Representative Bunda introduced forty-six students from the Wahiawa Storefront Program accompanied by their teachers, Mrs. Colectoma, Mrs. Debbie Wentworth, Ms. Sherrie Yoshimoto, Mr. John Honjiyo, Mr. Craig Tsutsui, and Mr. John Okinaka.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 237 to 239) were read by the

Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

A resolution (H.R. No. 237) congratulating Dr. Gloria Valde for being the first female of Filipino ancestry to be licensed to practice dentistry in Hawaii was jointly offered by Representatives Cachola, Kihano, Manegdeg, Bunda, Graulty, Hagino, Tungpalan, Menor, Lardizabal, Cavasso, Honda, Isbell, Levin, Lindsey, Nakata, Onouye, Shon, Tam and Taniguchi.

On motion by Representative Cachola, seconded by Representative Kihano and carried, H.R. No. 237 was adopted.

Representative Cachola then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and members of this Honorable Body, the person we are honoring here today is Dr. Gloria Valde who is the first female of Filipino ancestry to be licensed to practice dentistry in the State of Hawaii.

"But before presenting her, Mr. Speaker, allow me to augment what is stated in the resolution.

"As most of us here, we are aware that the Filipinos first came to Hawaii in 1906 based on information gathered. It took approximately 30 years before the first Filipino dentist was ever licensed. His name was Dr. Borha, who practiced dentistry until the end of World War II.

"Based also on information that we got, it took another 40 years before the next dentist was licensed and the first Filipina to be licensed to practice dentistry in Hawaii. This lady dentist happens to be our honoree today, Mr. Speaker.

"Perhaps the reason why it took so long for Filipinos to move up is because of the stringent requirement placed on dentists for our foreign graduates. For example, before the board dental exams, the State of Hawaii requires an individual to have licensure in dentistry from the country of origin.

"In other states, like California, foreign graduates without licensure from their country of origin are allowed to take the exams right away. In Hawaii, individuals or candidates are limited to taking the exams three times; but other states, again in California, there is no limit for them to take the exams.

"In Hawaii, written exams results are good for only five years while in other states, most especially California, they are good for a lifetime.

"Individuals in the dentistry profession must go through many obstacles in order to be duly recognized for their education, training and dedication. Unlike other professions which receive a fairly easier time in getting integrated here in Hawaii, Mr. Speaker, foreign dentists must endure all these obstacles. Very often some find themselves in hotel jobs, maintenance work or other positions which some consider to be demeaning for their professions, and achievements which has to be garnered through hard work, perseverance and determination truly deserves recognition.

"Being the first in anything, Mr. Speaker, deserves attention. Dr. Gloria Valde has certainly prevailed amidst countless obstacles. She is accomplished not only in her career as a dentist, but also as a mother, wife and respected community leader. It gives me great pleasure and honor to pay tribute to Dr. Gloria Valde."

At this time, Dr. Valde was asked to stand and be recognized. Accompanying Dr. Valde was her husband and also a dentist, Dr. Felix Valde, and children, Jane, a junior at U.C.L.A. and Julie, a sophomore at U.C.L.A. All were also asked to stand and be recognized.

Floral leis were presented to the honoree by Representative Kihano; to her husband, Felix, by Representative Tungpalan; to Jean by Representative Graulty; and to daughter, Julie, by Representative Manegdeg, and a certified copy of the resolution was presented to Dr. Valde by Representative Cachola.

Representative Cachola also recognized many of Dr. Valde's relatives and friends who were seated in the gallery.

A resolution (H.R. No. 238) extending aloha and best wishes to Antonio Caneiro Jacinto was jointly offered by Representatives Hemmings, Souki, Anderson, Andrews, Cavasso, Hashimoto, Honda, D. Ige, Ikeda, Jones, Levin, Liu, Manegdeg, Marumoto, Pfeil, Say, Tam and Taniguchi.

On motion by Representative Hemmings, seconded by Representative Souki and carried, H.R. No. 238 was adopted.

Representative Hemmings then rose

and stated:

"The social fabric of Hawaii is very strong and vibrant fortunately because it is a weave of many ethnic persuasions and we here in the Portuguese community are especially proud of our heritage.

"This morning it is a great pleasure for me to represent a diplomat representing the country of Portugal.

"Mr. Speaker, I won't belabor the point; I think all of you realize the role of the Portuguese in the history of Hawaii and therefore I would like to now, at this time, introduce the Honorable Antonio Jacinto, who is a very close advisor and representative of the new president of Portugal, President Soares. He is on a mission around the world visiting different countrymen in various places such as Macao, Oakland, California, Massachusetts and here in Hawaii, he is visiting fellow Portuguese. There are over a hundred and fifty Portuguese settlements around the world and Portugal is a major contributor to the settlement of peoples around the world."

At this time, Representative Hemmings introduced the honoree who was accompanied by Mr. Richard Capania, a native of New York City who is with the State Department and a linguist and an interpreter for Mr. Jacinto, and Mr. John Felix, consul of Portugal here in Hawaii, "who has raised the consciousness of the people of Hawaii about the Portuguese in Hawaii over the last several years."

Floral leis were presented to the honoree by Representative Tungpalan; to Mr. Capania by Representative Ikeda; and to Mr. Felix by Representative Marumoto, and Representative Hemmings presented to Mr. Jacinto a certified copy of the resolution.

A resolution (H.R. No. 239) extending best wishes and aloha to the West Lake Madrigal Singers was offered by Representative M. Ige.

Representative M. Ige then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, this morning we are honored to have this group from the great State of California. Accompanying them is their conductor, Mrs. Jane Campbell." At this time, Mrs. Campell and the members of the West Lake Madrigal Singers were all asked to stand and be recognized.

Representative M. Ige continued, saying:

"In this group, Mr. Speaker, is a product of a local boy raised in the city of Waikiki here in Honolulu, the internationally renowned author and doctor, Professor Bill Ouchi, his daughter, Sara Ouchi," who was asked to stand and be recognized.

"Sara, we both in the House and Senate were blessed to have dad come over and share his thoughts with us a few months ago before we began our deliberations.

"Mr. Speaker, also in the gallery, we do have the daughter of Mrs. Campbell, Elizabeth, and chaperones, Ms. Frances Henneger and Ms. Gladys Eilen." All were asked to stand and be recognized.

At this time, Representative Okamura presented a certified copy of the resolution to Mrs. Campbell.

Representative M. Ige then remarked:

"Mr. Speaker, the group requested that if it be possible to share two numbers with the members of this House," and the Chair responded in the affirmative.

After singing a rendition of "Ah, He is Fair" and "Hawaii Aloha", the Chair, on behalf of all of the members of the House, thanked the West Lake Madrigal singers.

Representative Apo rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I just want to clarify some questions that came up in caucus which I was not prepared to answer.

"Under this bill there had been a one year provision to allow an individual owner of a commercial fishing vessel to transfer ownership of that vessel into a corporate structure which is initiated by the owner himself. The one year provision allowed the commercial fishing owner a one year period in which he could do this without losing his mooring slip. That one year provision lapsed in May of 1985 because that is all the original legislation provided for.

"That provision was deleted in the current version of the bill because the Department of Transportation has now instituted a rule which maintains the one year provision in perpetuity, and secondly, it limits the transfer of ownership to a one time basis so that the individual owner can only transfer, through the corporate setup, once. So that if he were to purchase a second boat and wanted to incorporate on that basis, he would not be allowed to do so.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2206-86, SD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COMMERCIAL FISHING VESSELS", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Kihano being excused.

S.B. No. 2169-86, SD1:

Representative Tungpalan moved that S.B. No. 2169-86, SD1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Shito.

Representative Hagino then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"First of all, by way of understanding employee benefits, I would like to point out that this bill proposes to amend the workers' compensation law.

"There are a number of employee benefit laws, for example, unemployment insurance, temporary disability insurance, prepaid health as well as other laws, and those are the primary employee benefit laws. There are four in number.

"There is a difference in the conception and the philosophy behind each of these four different employee protection laws. In prepaid health, unemployment insurance and temporary disability insurance, we have in the statutes numerous statutory exemptions. Some of these exemptions exclude various classifications of employees. For example, in the unem-

ployment law, we have nineteen exemptions by statute excluding workers from unemployment insurance.

"We have also other statutory exemptions where many workers are affected based on the number of hours that they work. For example, on the prepaid health, if you work nineteen hours a week or less you are not covered under the prepaid health act. You also are not covered if you work nineteen hours a week or less under the disability insurance act.

"Under unemployment insurance, a person must work thirteen weeks, or basically fourteen weeks, in order to qualify for coverage under that act. So you see, there are numerous exemptions. Also, in the prepaid health act, there is a ninety day waiting period before anyone is provided the benefits of this act.

"There are no such statutory exemptions under the workers' compensation. The primary reason for that is that under the workers' compensation, you are dealing with the potential catastrophic or long term illness or accidents which will disable a worker from earning a living for sometimes periods of years or a lifetime.

"In the case of a catastrophic death, the law provides under the workers' compensation law, benefits to various dependents and beneficiaries if they meet the statutory test. There are no such statutory exemptions under this law as opposed to the other laws primarily because of the potential catastrophic dangers.

"The few exemptions that are in this law deal with, and they are very specific: service for charitable organization in an unpaid or voluntary capacity; if you are a student and you get a scholarship or some other kind of student aid grant, you are specifically exempted.

"There are some cases of very tragic incidents where, for example, ten years ago, a student who was on a scholarship at the University of Hawaii, was performing work and he was tragically killed in a bulldozer accident. It went up to the Supreme Court and the Supreme Court ruled, of course, that the exemption applied and his death was not covered and his family could not recover any benefits.

"But basically, with these few exceptions, because of the potential

of these catastrophic illnesses and deaths, we have not, until today, attempted to carve out these statutory exemptions.

"I would like to point out that there are two categories of workers that will be exempted now from coverage. First, is the vacuum cleaner salesman and while I can understand some of the frustrations that some of the distributors have come up against over the years, I would like to point out the language that we have used in this bill.

"Now they have talked about the problems of how do you deal with independent contractors. But if you look at the amendment that is being proposed to the workers' compensation law, if you are a vacuum cleaner salesman, you can be required to work an 8 to 5 job by your distributor or employer, you can be required to comply with house or company rules, you can be required to take a lunch period when the employer so specifies, you can be required to take a vacation which may be paid or not, you may be required to do all kinds of directives by the employer such as, quotas that must be filled, number of calls that you must make per week and sales that you have to close. What excludes you from workers' compensation coverage in this amendment is that if you are paid by commission, you are no longer protected by the workers' compensation law. We are not even dealing with the situation of whether that salesman or salesperson is indeed an independent contractor. For the first time, we are dealing with the methodology of payment to this worker and using that methodology of payment to exclude him or her from the protection of the workers' compensation law.

"Now, this opens the door, I think, to a lot of other situations. For example, many journeymen mechanics are required to own their own tools. They are required to make various calls to repair vehicles. Are they going to be classified next as an independent contractor because they own their tools similar to the independent-owner occupant of a taxicab? I think these are the kinds of situations that these two amendments are going to presage for many of us.

"Now, the danger of amending the law and carving out statutory exemptions is that you deal with catastrophic problems under the workers' compensation law. I would like to point out that although there may have been many frustrations ex-

pressed by the employers and business people about the workers' compensation law, there is one protection to the employer or to the business people and that protection is this: in Hawaii, the workers's compensation law is the exclusive remedy of an injured worker. There are some occasions, of course for example, where a truck driver may be driving the employer's car -- a truck making a delivery -- and he is struck by a third party. That truck driver, of course, can raise an industrial claim for his injury and may file a third party suit against the party that struck his truck and injured him. But other than those kinds of situations, workers' compensation is the exclusive remedy and there is a cap put on the benefits that can be paid out, for example, the maximum compensation per week, the average weekly wages, the number of weeks of payment.

"When you begin to carve out exceptions I believe what will happen is that workers' compensation in Hawaii will no longer become the exclusive remedy for industrial injuries.

"I pointed out in caucus earlier and I would like to bring this up again. There was a case -- and this is not the only case on the mainland -- this happened in Texas where a welder was badly burned on a job. Five months later after the severe burn, he sustained a heart attack and died. If you were a workers' compensation lawyer, the first thing that going to come to your mind is, 'hey, this guy had an industrial injury, five months later he has a heart attack, maybe I can link up the heart attack with the bad burn. I am going to talk to the doctors.' What if the physical stress of the body trying to repair itself that overloaded the heart causing the heart attack? Was it a psychic or mental stress that caused the heart attack? Whether I prevail or not, the most important thing is that under the death benefit section of the laws of Hawaii, I have a cap, I can only get six years of benefits for the widow or the dependents in this case. So there is a limitation of the bene-

At this time, the Chair interrupted Representative Hagino and remarked:

"Representative Hagino, your time has run (out)."

Representative Metcalf then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I will yield my time to Representative Hagino."

The Chair then directed Representative Hagino to proceed.

Representative Hagino continued his remarks, stating:

"What happened in this case in Texas is that the widow did not file a death benefits claim but filed a separate tort action. And this is what the court did and it's reported in the current issue of Forbes magazine which may surprise Representative Hemmings that I do read and subscribe to (Forbes Magazine). court awarded the widow 3.7 million dollars in compensatory damages against Getty Oil, the employer of this injured worker, and it also awarded \$24,999,999.00 in punitive damages against the employer. So you can see, in Texas with this particular case, this death claim which would have been the exclusive remedy in Hawaii became a part of a tort claim thereby exposing the employer far in excess in what the workers' compensation benefits would have entitled the widow in Texas. I think this is what happens when you begin to carve out these exemptions.

"Now I pointed out the problem with the vacuum cleaner salesman, I can understand the frustrations of the taxicab drivers. I have been labor chairman and we've dealt with this before.

"I think specifically what can be done in this situation, if it is correct as has been reported by the various chairmen of the committees that considered this bill, that indeed the Department of Labor has ruled that in many cases if the owner-driver of the taxicab meet certain tests that he is not covered by workers' compensation coverage. If we are worried that there is a gray area as to whether a particular taxicab owner or driver is covered or not, the simple way to deal with this is to specify, by resolution, that the Department of Labor promulgate a rule and regulation specifically on this work category using their experiences as to what constitutes an 'independent contractor.' The definition used for independent contractors can then be applied to this specific occupation and by the promulgation of the rule and regulation, this rule can then be used by the various dispatcher services or the brokers of these taxicabs in informing these owner-occupants as to whether they are covered or not, and if indeed they are not covered, then

they ought to provide some kind of backup insurance plan or disability plan for themselves in case a catastrophic accident should occur.

"But for all the reasons that I have stated, I believe this bill is a very bad precedent. We should not use the argument that, 'sure, we have statutory exemptions in the other labor laws of the state.' There is a very major qualitative difference between the other benefit laws in the state of Hawaii and the workers' compensation laws. We are establishing a very bad precedent. I think the effect is not going to be just on the worker, but it will be on the employers.

"I would like to point out one last thing. Under the third party suits in the Hawaii workers' compensation law, the employer and the insurance carrier is entitled to a subrogation of the damages if the injured worker prevails in the third party suit. By removing these two categories of workers from the workers' compensation law, there is no subrogation should the worker prevail in a tort action against the employer, against a co-employee or a third party or a private party that may have injured him or her. So this protection which is a subrogation of claims will not be afforded the insurance carrier or the employer.

"For all of these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I ask all of you to vote against this bill. I think there are other ways of handling the problems noted by these two particular occupations.

"Thank you."

At 12:04 o'clock p.m., Representative Apo asked for a recess, and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:12 o'clock p.m.

Representative Cavasso then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the previous speaker, I think, doesn't understand quite completely the situation here, and I would like to address it best I can from my personal experience and understanding.

"There is a way for self-employed people, the insurance salesmen that are on their own to be covered under the workers' compensation law. The speaker indicated that when a salesman has his hours controlled, his lunch controlled and such that he should not be considered an independent contractor. I agree with that. That's true. He's not considered an independent contractor, he's considered an employee and should be covered under workers' compensation.

"This law is only going to apply to those people that control their own hours, their own lunches, set their own standards. This law is going to allow vacuum cleaner salesmen that are controlling themselves and taxi drivers that are controlling themselves to work as independent job-controlling people.

"When I started out first as a landscaper, I went as an independent contractor, an independent person, a self-employed person. In essence, I was a one-man job, and I was not covered by another employer under workers' compensation, so I went out and got my own insurance on myself. I went out and got my own unemployment insurance, my own TDI, my own related work comp. coverage.

"As a self-employed person, as a vacuum cleaner salesman who wants to protect his family and his life, I would be wise to go out and get his own insurance as I did and as any of these others do.

"The insurance that I went out and got as a one-man job also included death benefits. They cost a lot less than they would have cost to a regular contractor for a whole company. As a single person, I saved money by doing it on my own.

"I see this as giving the vacuum cleaner salesman, the taxi drivers, people who work on their own, who lease equipment to do their job and such, who get dispatches through radio or television or mail, who set their own hours, who go or don't go as they choose, we're giving our people freedom again.

"The vacuum cleaner salesmen themselves are asking for the opportunity to go out and work and to get their own insurance to insure themselves to work in their own way.

"The vacuum cleaner salesmen, as our landscape contractors, are already exempt from current unemployment insurance and temporary disability laws. The IRS for both the landscape contractors and vacuum cleaner salesmen says that commission salespeople are independent contractors. I work on a commission. I

walk out and say that I'll do this job for this much, just like these gentlemen are, just like a taxicab driver does.

"The Department of Labor, as far as taxis are concerned, has come down with an administrative decision saying as long as a cabdriver is independent, they are not subject to the law. Workers' compensation appeals board said that taxi drivers are independent contractors. appellate courts including our Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals say that they are independent contractors. This is merely codifying what is already being done into law. It's us telling them, "hey, you're not children, you're on your own. If you want to be an employee then let Sears control your hours and you'll be covered under workers' compensation. If you want to be a self-employed contractor, then you set your own hours, you set your own transportation needs, you identify what your needs are, you set your own insur-ance, you meet the needs of your family," and that's what taxi drivers are asking for, that's what vacuum cleaner salesmen are asking for, that's what small business in Hawaii is asking for -- freedom from so much required control by the government. This does not deny them the right of coverage; it simply says that if you want it, you're going to get it yourself, you pay for it yourself.

"On the other hand, if they want to stay working for Sears, Sears will cover them. This law does not take that away.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Apo then rose to speak in support of the bill, but with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the previous speaker has sort of swayed me on this as I was going to vote for it free and clear.

"My reservation comes from looking at the maritime industry whereby under the Jones Act, maritime personnel do not qualify, or are excluded from, the workers' compensation act. And I am wondering that by doing this, which automatically grants these employees because they are still an employee-employer relationship irrespective of any independent contracting position that the employee may have, now qualifies them to file suit under tort law. The maritime industry is going under exactly because of that, and I'm wondering if particu-

larly the taxicab companies -- people like Charley's Taxi who run on a real marginal profit -- one tort liability suit would put their company out of business. Although they may support legislation like this, I wonder if they ought to take a closer look at the effect that this kind of legislation has had on the national level to the maritime industry. They might have second thoughts as to whether they really want to be excluded from making those worker comp. payments.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Graulty then rose to speak in support of the bill, but with reservations, stating;

"Mr. Speaker, this bill poses a real dilemma for me because in trying to determine whether one is an employee or an independent contractor, this is a subject of much litigation in employee benefit law.

"Various indicia are used by the courts and administrative bodies to determine whether, in fact, that individual is an employee or an independent contractor. For example, on the mainland this issue is particularly rife when it comes to the trucking industry. Many truckers own their own rigs; likewise in the taxicab industry, it's a well litigated issue.

"I think the most famous case in this particular field has to do with newsboys in the New York Times where the court ruled that newsboys were independent contractors rather than employees.

"Many of these kinds of cases have been decided on a case by case basis, and I think if we look at the taxicab drivers, I don't believe that there has been any case to my knowledge where a court or an administrative body has ruled that a taxicab driver is not an independent contractor.

"That's what poses the dilemma for me, Mr. Speaker, because I can't say the same for the vacuum cleaner salesman, and I think what we have here is a situation where we are trying to 'shoot a flea with an elephant gun' because once we pass this particular bill, I don't think it will matter anymore what the indicia are of whether an individual is an employee or an independent contractor.

"Per se, we are saying a vacuum cleaner salesman is exempted under the workers' compensation law and we remove from the administrative body and the courts the ability to deter-

mine, on a case by case basis, whether in fact, one is an employee or an independent contractor. I am not so sure that that's really fair under the circumstances.

"The second point that I wanted to make, Mr. Speaker, is that while it might be good for business to be able to remove these kinds of individuals and occupations particularly in the salesmen-salesperson category, have to bear in mind that the costs for the injuries that these people sustain are still being borne or will be borne by the taxpayer under the welfare program if they are not covered under workers' compensation. There is a concern on my part that as we move into this area of exclusions from workers' compensation laws, that we may find increasing burden on the taxpayers under the welfare system.

"It is for that reason that I would hope that while we might pass this bill at this time, that we hold the line on giving further exemptions particularly to the salespersons. As I said, I don't have any problems with the taxi drivers; I think it's fairly well settled in the law that these are independent contractors, but vacuum cleaners, the cases may change as indicia of control may change from different employer to employer. For that reason while I support the bill, it is only with reservations.

"Thank you."

Representative Hagino then rose in rebuttal to Representative Cavasso, stating:

"In regards to the category or that occupation of vacuum cleaner salesperson, the bill does not address the problem that he brings out about whether these vacuum cleaner salesman should have the freedom and independence to control their own hours, do the kind of sales that they want to do, see the kind of clients that they want to see and make the kinds of commissions.

"The unfortunate thing is that this bill is passing without any House amendments so your committee report does not have the Senate bill; but for my good friend from across the Pali, I would like to read the specific amendment. The exemption is this: 'service performed by a vacuum cleaner salesperson for an employer if all such services performed by the individual for the employer are performed for remuneration solely by way of commission.' In other words, his

example that he gave, 'hey, if you want to sell vacuum cleaners independently, get your own disability coverage; if you want coverage, go work for Sears.' Sears can demand all of their vacuum cleaner salespersons to be paid by commission solely and that salesperson, if this bill is passed, is no longer covered under workers' compensation laws. There is no right of choice for this salesperson. The amendment that is being proposed is very specific. There is no right of being independent; there is no independent contractor status; you have all the required nexus between the employee and employer and you are not covered under the Hawaii's workers' compensation law so long as you are paid by commission. That is the only test. Are you paid by commission or not? None of the employeeemployer relationships or the test for an independent contractor now apply. So the example that have been used is not correct. This law makes it very clear the exclusion for this occupation,"

Representative Anderson then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, contrary to what my colleague said, years ago I worked for Fuller Brush. Any samples that I had, vacuum cleaners, etc., I purchased. I was an independent person.

"Last night I had a young man come to my house working for a brush company selling Electrolux -- late at night, willing to put on demonstrations. He is an independent individual. He does not have a certain time, he pays for his own gas, he does everything.

"If as a business person, I am willing to bring in a product, say, a vacuum cleaner, and I will give you over and above my cost, 50% of anything, and then I find out I'm going to pay workers' comp., I'll say, 'I'm sorry, it's costing me 20% so I'm going to give you only 30%." I have that cost burden that I'm going to have to take. The man says, 'I can get my 20% cheaper than you can,' or 'I have my own insurance because I represent other things.' There could be many factors. He is losing 20% because I am paying something that he is more than willing to take on by himself or herself. And that's the case that we have here.

"The same goes for your taxi drivers. If that person leases, buys or whatever his own automobile, he can leave it in the garage as long as he's paying whatever he has agreed on. If he's leasing it, he has to pay so much a month; if he's going to use the car radio they're going to go ahead and charge him so much. He is an independent person. He does not have to answer that radio call; he or she does not have to go to work at a certain time; they are independents.

"And there are many more cases and that's why I believe there is a resolution because there are many, many more people who are independent contractors and we will not look at it.

"It's a very emotional issue and I can understand some of the people being concerned, but it's been asked for by those people because they feel that they in turn could make more money, because their employer, I'm sure, is having to pay for something that they may have themselves or they can get cheaper, or that their wife -- in my case, I do not even have a medical insurance to be a legislator. I have been under my wife's policy for years so why would I take on another policy from the same insurance company? So you have to look at it in those respects and be a lot more realistic than just saying, 'I think that they should have it because they don't want it, they have asked for this.

"Thank you very much and I hope you vote for the bill."

Representative Takamine rose to speak against the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against the measure, but in the interest of time, I would ask that all of Representative Hagino's comments be incorporated into the Journal as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Cavasso rose to speak in rebuttal, saying:

"Mr. Speaker, there is still the right of choice, there is still the right of salary and payroll by Sears as they do for some cases, and in other cases, completely by commission. We are giving the people the right of free enterprise and we should give them that. I doubt very much that Sears -- Sears is a nation-wide organization -- I doubt very much that in Hawaii to get around this law they would cut out all employees who sell vacuum sweepers in Hawaii. They're selling on the floor, they're working by hours, they're

working controlled and they come under the guidelines that the Department of Labor has for employees. Otherwise, they're self-employed and the word that I was looking for was 'sole proprietorship'."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2169-86, SD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WORKERS' COMPENSATION", passed Third Reading by a vote of 38 ayes to 12 noes, with Representatives Hagino, Hirono, D. Ige, Lardizabal, Leong, Levin, Lindsey, Nakasato, Nakata, Shon, Takamine and Yoshimura voting no, and Representative Kihano being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 2169-86 had passed Third Reading at 12:29 o'clock p.m.

"I had the opportunity to go to Ewa School on February 12th, Lincoln's Birthday. They have a statue of Lincoln there and every year in the morning they have a program for Abraham Lincoln. I am sure that the children will always take those memories with them as they move on through life and remember how great a man Abraham Lincoln was, not because it was a holiday, but because they actually had to do something to commemorate that individual.

"I would hope that as this resolution goes through the process, maybe it could be changed that on May Day when many of our public schools where we have programs saluting our many ethnic groups, we could incorporate that Martin Luther King should be recognized on that day. If we do have to give it a holiday, instead of giving it to all of the state employees, when our teachers' union have their annual day off to go unionize, have that day for the children to salute Martin Luther King.

"I would just like to make a point that I'm not against minorities; in fact, I'm the most minority-type person in this whole Legislature. All the different bloods in my body, not one blood has the majority. So, I am a minority.

"I again just would ask that as this thing goes through, that we take a look and make it an active type of day, we could save a lot of money, we could make it meaningful and Martin Luther King really can be appreciated by the people of Hawaii.

"Thank you."

Representative Souki then rose to

speak against the resolution, stating:

"I wish to speak against this resolution because the state has enough holidays. It's an added expense to the state and I think we can honor this great man in other ways than to have an additional day of rest for the state of Hawaii. In fact, there have been some complaints among many of the people out there that we already have too many holidays. And for this reason, and for this reason alone, I would want to vote against the motion.

"Thank you."

A resolution (H.R. No. 263) honoring Mrs. Betty Kawohiokalani Ellis Jenkins was jointly offered by Representatives Leong, Kamali'i, Crozier, Lindsey, Anderson, Apo, Tungpalan and Peters.

On motion by Representative Leong, seconded by Representative Kamali'i and carried, H.R. No. 263 was adopted.

Representative Leong rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it is my distinct pleasure to introduce our honoree this morning, Mrs. Betty Kawohiokalani Ellis Jenkins, to you and to this distinguished body.

"Betty Jenkins is one of those rare and gifted individuals that has con-

tributed so much to the youths of Hawaii in the field of education and to the Hawaiian community. Since her retirement in 1983 from the Haleiwa Elementary School as a teacher, she has continued her deep involvement with the youths of Hawaii by serving as a Community Kupuna Coordinator for the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. This job has taken her to all the neighbor islands to be responsive to the needs of the Hawaiian community. For her dedication and service, Betty was selected and she participated as the Mo'i Wahine, Queen of Aloha Week in 1985. I have known Betty for over twenty years, being involved with the Hawaiian Civic Club movement.

"At this time, Mr. Speaker, I wish to introduce to you our honoree, Betty Jenkins."

Representative Leong then asked the honoree to stand and be recognized.

Accompanying Betty were her husband, Jack Jenkins; her father, Mr. Richmond Ellis; Mrs. Elizabeth Ellis and their daughter, Nalani; and Ken Aina of OHA. Seated in the gallery were Sam Apuna and Malcolm Chun.

Representative Kamali'i then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, next year we will celebrate the year of the Hawaiian -- 'Ho'olako.'

"And without the individual efforts and dedication of people like Betty Kawohiokalani Jenkins, there would be little to celebrate.

"It is difficult for many people in Hawaii, especially those born after World War II or who came to the islands after statehood, to know or to understand the shame and the silence of being Hawaiian. Or to know and to understand the personal strength which was required for Hawaiians themselves to reject stereotypes of limitation and laziness.

"Betty has told the story of how, as a student at Kamehameha School, she was told that she would never be a teacher -- that Hawaiians were not qualified for such positions. She proved them wrong. But that took determination, perserverance, and a deep inner confidence of both self and of being Hawaiian.

"Today, many people believe that fight is won.

"Everywhere there is evidence of renewed vigor and accomplishment, of efforts, not just to preserve, but to practice and to live our culture.

"But the fight is far from over, especially for Betty.

"Betty is the OHA-designated and DOE-acknowledged coordinator for the Kupuna Program in our public schools. In this role, she continues to confront and to successfully overcome the reluctance of our educational system to acknowledge the value of Hawaiian ways, and ways of doing.

"What is the certification process for a Kupuna? What is the class plan for a Kupuna Program? How are pay scales developed? How are class materials prepared?

"Typically, the answer is, 'Ask Betty. . .she'll know, or she'll find a way.'

"We are all finding our way, Mr. Speaker. But pride and honesty and dignity must be the guides.

"It usually is not a wise thing to attempt a translation of a Hawaiian name if you are outside the family and unaware of their genealogy. But a literal reading of Kawohiokalani is a description of a high Ali'i who was not required to bow before the King or Queen.

"Kawohiokalani Jenkins, in whatever company, always stands tall."

An ilima lei was presented to Mrs. Jenkins by Representative Okamura while floral leis were presented to the others by Representatives Apo, Tungpalan, Ikeda, Kamali'i, Anderson, Crozier and Lindsey. A certified copy of the resolution was presented to the honoree by Representative Leong.

A resolution (H.R. No. 264) commending John W.A. Buyers for his generous contributions toward the strengthening of Hawaii's economic posture and for enhancing Hawaii's beauty was jointly offered by Anderson, Representatives Apo, Andrews, Blair, Bunda, Cachola, Crozier, Hagino, Hashimoto, Hem-Honda, Hirono, Isbell. mings, Kamali'i, Lardizabal, Liu, Manegdeg, Medeiros, Menor, Metcalf, Nakasato, Nakata, Onouye, Pfeil, Say, Shito, Shon, Souki, Tajiri, Tam, Taniguchi, Tom, Tungpalan and Yoshimura.

Representative Apo rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, just a few words about this great guy, 'Doc' Buyers.

"Mr. Buyers is Chairman of the Board and President of C. Brewer & Co., Ltd. which is Hawaii's oldest company. He has had total operating responsibility for C. Brewer since 1975 and under his leadership, the former Big Five company has changed primarily from an agricultural enterprise to a diversified agribusiness marketing company. Some of the more well-known brand names produced by C. Brewer are Maunaloa macadamia nuts, Maunalae guava juice and Gaviota fertilizer. A native of Pennsylvania, 'Doc' was graduated cum laude from Princeton University in 1952, and in 1962 he was awarded an Alfred Peece Sloan Fellowship at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, enabling him to earn a Masters Degree from M.I.T. Sloan School of Industrial Management.

"Prior to becoming President and Chief Executive Officer of C. Brewer on August 15, 1975, Mr. Buyers had been President and Chief Executive Officer of General Waterworks Corporation, a position he held for four years. Previously, he was Vice President (Administration) of International Utilities Corporation, now I.U. International. Prior to joining the I.U. organization in 1966, Mr. Buyers held several executive positions with the Bell System, the last of which was Division Operations Manager for the Bell Telephone Company of Pennsylvania. He also worked for the Proctor and Gamble Company of Cincinatti, Ohio.

"Mr. Buyers has been active in community and business organizations and most recently as Co-chairman with the wife of our Governor, Mrs. George Ariyoshi, of the Statewide Re-forest Station Project of 1985, which was titled, 'A Million Trees of Aloha' and several of us here have participated in some of the plantings out at Wahiawa. As Chairman of the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association in 1981 and again in 1985, he has lobbied successfully in Washington, D.C. to achieve legislation protecting the domestic and troubled sugar industry. He has been Chairman of the Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii, the National Alliance of Businessmen and the California and Hawaiian Sugar Company in 1983, 1984 and again in 1986. In addition to being a Director

of C. Brewer and eleven of its subsidiaries, C&H, HSPA, he has served or does serve on the Boards of First Hawaiian Bank, the Chamber of Commerce, the Research Corporation at the University of Hawaii where he was recently elected Chairman. He was also a trustee of the University of Hawaii Foundation and its President from 1980 through 1984.

"And at this time, Mr. Speaker, this really busy guy here, I would like to ask you 'Doc', if you would please stand up to be recognized."

Representative Apo continued:

"Mr. Speaker, with all his duties, I'm sure he must be getting some help somewhere and I suspect that he probably gets a lot of help from his wife, Elsie here, and I would like you, Elsie, to stand up and be recognized also."

Carnation leis were presented to Mr. Buyers by Representative Hashimoto and to Mrs. Buyers by Representative Anderson. Representative Apopresented the honoree with a certified copy of the resolution.

Representative Jones then rose and stated:

"Knowing 'Doc' and his wife personally has been a very meaningful thing to me and a real inspiration.

'Doc' is a coaches' coach. He's 'Mr. Enthusiasm' -- everybody loves him who knows him. He's an entrepreneur's entrepreneur. He reminds me of the guy on the TV commercial with the Remington Rand thing. He says, 'I like it so much, I bought it.' Well, 'Doc' likes Hawaii so much that he's buying his company and he's keeping it here and that means an awful lot to all of us here. And as I think about one of the major things that we've had together here is making jobs in Hawaii. 'Doc' has been a major force in trying to make sure that happens, and it is a great honor to have him here with us today because he instills in us the enthusiasm and love for our State that we all just love to see.

"'Doc', we love you and thank you very much for being with us."

Mr. Satoh, of course, is not here but accepting the certificate on his behalf is the Chancellor for the Community College System, Mrs. Joyce Tsunoda, who will be travelling to Japan and taking this certificate with her for a presentation in that country."

Representative Apo then asked the following honorees to stand and be recognized: Mrs. Joyce Tsunoda; Peter and Kathy Esposito, children of the late Vincent Esposito; Mrs. Gladys Brandt, Chairperson of the Board of Regents; Mr. Mel Sakaguchi, Provost of Leeward Community College; Mr. John Connor, "who is responsible for a re-vitalization of interest in Japanese studies at Leeward Community College and in fact is every bit a very large part of this effort"; and Mrs. Esposito, wife of the late Vincent Esposito.

Floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Tungpalan, Levin, Okamura, Onouye and Kamali'i while Representative Apo presented them with certified copies of the resolution.

A resolution (H.R. No. 266) congratulating Aiea and Kalakaua Lions Clubs jointly on the occasion of their 35th charter anniversary was jointly offered by Representatives Nakasato and Okamura.

On motion by Representative Nakasato, seconded by Representative Okamura and carried, H.R. No. 266 was adopted.

Representative Nakasato rose and stated:

"You know, in my six years here, this is only the second time I have a floor presentation to make -- the first time was five years ago when both Lions Clubs celebrated their 30th anniversary. Somehow, no matter how hard I try, I just cannot get the distinguished families like the Jenkins

here, or the pretty young girls that have come before us. Representative Jake Manegdeg has his Filipino Queen and her beautiful court; I know Representative Rod Tam, hiding back there, has his Narcissus Queen and her beautiful court; and yesterday, Representative Taniguchi went hogwild. He brought over two Queens and their courts.

"But instead today, sir, I bring forth to you the backbone of our community -- the Lions Club. Let it be noted that there are 68 Lions Clubs -- the resolution has a mistake, it says 38 -- but there are 68 Lions Clubs with over 2,200-plus members. We also have 7 Lioness Clubs so you can see it is a pretty big organization.

"Along with Representative Tom Okamura, today I would like to share with you, and I have the pleasure and the privilege to present the two Lions Clubs -- the Kalakaua Lions Club and the Aiea Lions Club. Put together, they have over 70 years of unselfish community service. Now, not only does both these Clubs do all that the resolution spoke of, but we must also note that they build the bus shelters that Representative Crozier and Representative Apo use whenever they catch the bus. That's very important. They walk for eyesight and the blind and some of us are going blind over here. They host the young high school Leos or what we call the Junior Lions. They also present Christmas presents to the needy, statewide. They sponsor the Junior Olympics for our kids, and they run softball leagues for our school children -- the young school children. The Lions also give student scholarships to further their education, and much, much more. But the biggest thing that the Lions give, sir, is that they give from their hearts, and the Lions never ask or never expect anything in return.

"At this time, sir, I would like to ask all members of the House who belong to any kind of Lions Clubs or Lioness Clubs, to please stand.

"Thank you.

"As you can see, the Lions not only give in community service but they also give with good legislation."

Representative Nakasato then introduced Mr. Paul Akana, President of the Kalakaua Lions Club.

Representative Okamura then rose and stated:

"I am not going to try to talk like Representative Nakasato -- I concur with everything that he has said. I am currently not a member of the Lions Club; however, our former colleague and current councilman, Arnold Morgado, and myself have been asked to join and we will be shortly after the session is over. And I would like to say that we're very, very proud to become members of your very worthwhile organization.

"At this time, I would like to introduce the President of the Aiea Lions Club, Mr. Kenneth Ho. Will you please stand to be recognized."

Representative Okamura then asked the following members of the Aiea Lions Club who were seated in the gallery to stand and be recognized: Mr. Alfred Fernandez, past President; Mr. Wilbert Ho, also a past President; Mr. Alex Casella, First President; Mr. Kiyoshi Nakashima, past President; and Mr. Ben Cordial, Second Vice President.

Representative Nakasato then asked Mr. Don Yamato, the incoming President for the Kalakaua Lions Club, who was seated in the gallery, to stand and be recognized.

Floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Tungpalan, Marumoto, Ikeda, Hashimoto and Hirono while Representatives Nakasato and Okamura presented them with certified copies of the resolution.

Representative Leong rose and stated:

"When I entered the chamber this morning and I saw a group of Lions coming into this chamber also, I thought we were having our Lions convention here. I know it is not scheduled until sometime in May. I know that there are a number of Lions and Lionesses in our midst this morning, and what I would like to put a plug in for Lionism is that it is the largest service organization in the world comprised of over 1.4 million members. So, like we all say, the Liones say, the Lioness would say: 'I am proud to be a Lion.'

"Thank you."

"Mr. Speaker, I really appreciate the work of the Lions in their assisting in the fingerprinting of children. They've had this Keiki Identification Program going for several years now and they're training their own people to finger-print children and they've participated all over the island in this endeavor, and it puts a lot of parents' minds at rest. We thank you very much for your good work."

"Mr. Speaker, to be quite honest, I never had the opportunity to meet and talk with Mr. Lyman until this morning when I did have the privilege of sharing some of his thoughts. I've heard much about him; I've heard his reputation and the many good things that he has done for the people of Hawaii. And after meeting him this morning, I begin to understand why his reputations are there but I think, more importantly, I begin to understand why they call him 'Papa.'

"Mr. Speaker, at this time, if I may ask Mr. Lyman to rise to be recognized by this body."

Accompanying Mr. Lyman was "his lovely wife, Mrs. Lyman," who was asked to stand and be recognized.

Representative M. Ige then asked the following persons who were seated in the gallery to stand and be recognized: Mrs. Iwako Nakajima; her daughter, Miyoko Nakajima; her grandson, Mr. Mitsunori Miwa --friends of Mrs. Lyman from Tokyo, Japan; their chaperone, Mrs. Loretta Sato; Mr. Jack Darvill, President of Kamehameha Schools; and Mr. Neal Hennes, Director of Communications at Kamehameha Schools.

Representative Crozier rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, every so often the spirit just comes to me and I have to say something, but I'll make it short.

"Mr. Speaker, in my lifetime, I used to sit with my Dad and we used to talk. . .I mean we would talk for hours on end about Hawaii -- old Hawaii, the future of Hawaii -- and in these conversations, there's always an adult conversation. "And one of these individuals is 'Papa' Lyman.

"He's told me many stories about how 'Papa' Lyman was an educator, and I guess his favorite one was talking about how 'Papa' Lyman was the first one to create his farm on the Big Island, Puna, and start the papaya industry over there, and he also talked to me about how 'Papa' Lyman was a very forceful legislator and a productive businessman.

"So, just on behalf of my Dad, 'Papa' Lyman, I would like to salute you and thank you very much.

"Aloha."

"All the accomplishments that were indicated of 'Papa' Lyman, I would like to say this -- that he is also an accomplished cribbage player."

Representative Lindsey then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I will keep this short and simple not so much in the essence of time, but because I believe this is how the lady whom we are honoring today wants it to be.

"I believe the resolution speaks for itself and I would simply wish to add this to it: It seems in the political world, we live and exist in an atmosphere of distrust. We are sometimes uncertain and unsure of those around us, including the press. But I will say this: This feeling does not include and does not apply to Hildegaard Verploegen. Along with her many wonderful attributes, there is a dimension which shines through and shines through very brightly. She is one whom you can trust.

"When you say in confidence to her, 'this is off the record,' you do not have to worry about turning the pages of the evening paper to find she has quoted you. She is a person of her word. In keeping our public informed on the status of public education here in Hawaii, she has served us well and we look forward to her continued work with the Star-Bulletin.

At this time, the honoree was asked to stand and be recognized. Accompanying the honoree was Mr. Francis Hatanaka, Superintendant of Education, and Mr. Earl Arruda, president of the Hawaii State Teachers Association

Mr. Hatanaka by Representative Hashimoto; to Mr. Arruda by Representative Hirono; and a certified copy of the resolution was presented to Ms. Verploegen by Representative Lindsey.

Representative Kawakami then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, in the early ages of my career here in the House, I was very fortunate in having Ms. Verploegen be my key committee person when I was chairman of a committee.

"She had been a reporter for a long time and I met her at a time when she left the state to take care of her parents in Montana. Knowing what the weather was like in Montana, she hurriedly came back to Hawaii in early January and at that time was unemployed. I was very happy to have her as one of my staff.

"As the comments made by Representative Lindsey, I think that one session that she spent with us and knowing the inner workings of the legislature, I think this in itself, has made her an excellent reporter and one that we all can trust.

"Thank you."

A resolution (H.R. No. 324) honoring Captain Robert L. Alverson, Director of the Pacific Maritime Academy and President of the Hawaii Sea Cadet Foundation was jointly offered by Representatives Apo, Shon, Anderson, Andrews, Cachola, Cavasso, Hagino, Hashimoto, Hirono, Honda, Isbell, Jones, Kawakami, Kihano, Lardizabal, Levin, Manegdeg, Nakata, Okamura, Onouye, Oshiro, Pfeil, Say, Shito, Souki, Tam, Taniguchi, Yoshimura and Peters.

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Shon and carried, H.R. No. 324 was adopted.

Representative Shon then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it is one of the challenges of government today, I think, to be aware of and provide support for the many talented and dedicated citizens who enrich our community. Sometimes their efforts are well publicized; but often their labor of love is hidden from our view. Fortunately for our state, they personers

"Captain Bob Alverson is one of those special people whose talents and aloha touch hundreds of young people in Hawaii. In all the years I've been involved in education, I can say that I have never known anyone who has better 'genes' for teaching than Captain Alverson.

"He works with young people who often cannot fit in with the formal school system; they walk a daily tightrope between barely sticking with it and dropping out. It's no secret that our public school teachers, as talented as they may be, find themselves frustrated and unable to reach many of these students.

"Enter Bob Alverson -- with a passion for the sea and a drive to instill in these students the knowledge, the discipline and the love of hard work which are necessary to make one's living on the ocean. Captain Alverson and his wife, Dottie, are no-nonsense teachers. The ocean and its vessels are no-nonsense challenges.

"Year after year I've seen him take students whose only apparent future was unemployment and transform them into young seamen. They sense instinctively that he knows his topic well, that he cares deeply for the future mariners of Hawaii, and that if you're willing to work hard, he is willing to work just as hard to insure that you qualify on the Coast Guard exams.

"Mr. Speaker, I don't know how many of you have seen the facility in which Captain Alverson works his human miracles. It is a hot and aged quonset hut in Kakaako. If we got the same amount of productivity out of the rest of our government, we would have plenty of funds left to cope with Gramm-Rudman, Mr. Speaker. Captain Alverson does not complain about this as he would rather make do without any additional bureaucratic strings. He will not compromise his sense of quality for someone else's sense of paperwork.

"Mr. Speaker, over the years Captain Alverson has graduated hundreds of sea people of all ages from his Pacific Maritime Academy. He is also one of the founders of a fairly new program, The Hawaii Sea Cadet Program, now being offered to our public school students. This is funded through contributions from maritime organizations, charitable foundations and the like. It helps make a direct connection between young students and the future job in a hands-on context which is often far more effective than classroom work.

"While we are over here in our air-conditioned buildings debating how to create jobs for the next generation, Captain Alverson is in his quonset hut or out on the boat on the ocean actually creating those jobs at minimal expense to all of us, I might add.

"In spite of the small amount of state support, Captain Alverson is always one with a quiet voice, a dignity, a gentleman, a man of aloha, and it is a great honor to be his friend."

At this time, the honoree was asked to stand and be recognized. Accompanying Dr. Alverson was his wife, Dottie, along with Captain Cecil Gray of the Coast Guard. Both were asked to stand and be recognized.

In the gallery, Representative Shon recognized a contingent of Pacific Maritime Academy boosters which included Ms. Ruth Nishihara, Captain Bob Paine, Mrs. Kelly, Lt. Carlson of the Coast Guard, Captain Raleigh, Mrs. Herbert and Captain Alverson's mother, Mrs. Alverson.

Representative Apo then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I thought it would be appropriate for me to just mention my first experience and encounter with Captain Alverson who came out to Waianae to seek my help in establishing a small boat operators licensing course.

"The class consisted of twenty-two males and females, most of whom we would consider to be 'high risk' in that they were basically low achievers and some had a lot of trouble reading and writing. When Representative Shon refers to 'miracle,' this man truly works miracles.

"This course I am talking about is a college level course; and when you take a group of people who have a tough time reading, and try to cram in a one-year course in a three-month period, that takes some doing. There was only one person who did not pass the two-day eight hour Coast Guard exam.

"Captain Alverson even went so far, with the kokua of the Coast Guard, to allow for those of the students who could not read to allow the Coast Guard to make an exception and administer this eight-hour exam by oral questions.

"Twelve of the twenty-two are now

gainfully employed in the maritime industry. One is out for a first mates license with the Dillingham Tug and Barge and several are working on the neighbor islands. Most of these boys, one of them which I know, Buffalo Kealana, would have, probably today, remain on the beaches, hanging out, drinking beer, doing all those things these people normally do. But through Captain Alverson's direct intervention in their lives that he turned them around, they are now productive citizens with families who enjoy the benefits and the fruits of his labor, and for that, Captain Alverson, my sincere mahalo and also to the Coast Guard for their kokua, and you, too, Dottie.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Floral leis were presented to the honoree by Representative Isbell, whose son was a direct beneficiary of Captain Alverson's education; to Mrs. Alverson by Representative Shon; to Captain Gray by Representative Hirono and Representative Apo presented a certified copy of the resolution to Captain Alverson. Representative Pfeil presented a gift to the honoree on behalf of Captain Raleigh and Mrs. Herbert.

"So as the chairman of the Legislative Management Committee, I realized that we have a lot of temporary help here where we can maximize their potential. When I got back, naturally I checked with you, and we started this program to have the Chambers open during the session, and not to my surprise, but I am sure it will surprise the rest of my colleagues, that since January 20th, we have had over 11,000 visitors sit up in the gallery and have that presentation. I think that is quite impressive, that 11,000 visitors come. About half of them are schoolchildren from Hawaii and local people. We also have a few coming in from the mainland, Canada and Japan.

"What is so meaningful about this program, Mr. Speaker, is that a lot of people walk over to Iolani Palace and Iolani Palace represents a monument to the history of Hawaii.

"This building (State Capitol) represents the present and the future and it is a dynamic and alive place and I am extremely proud of this building and I hope we can continue to share the aloha that generates out of this place for our visitors.

"Thank you."

Representative Apo then rose to speak in support of the motion, stating:

"Just very briefly, Mr. Speaker, I happened to spend a lot of time at the Capitol during this past interim.

I saw many, many people come into the Capitol area and sort of wander around, run up and down the elevators with very little guidance. On several occasions I have taken time out to give them some aloha and show them around myself. So there is definitely, in my opinion, the need to implement, after session adjourns, the intent of this resolution and I hope that we can see fit to do so.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."
