The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Twenty-First Day.

We welcomed Mr. Moriyoshi Saito here with us last year, and he is the President of the Mainichi Broadcasting System, or MBS for short. Here in this chamber last year when the tournament was called the Tsumura Open, we welcome him back again this time as the sponsor of the Orient Leasing Hawaiian Ladies Open.

"Mainichi Broadcasting System is a co-sponsor of the Second Hawaiian Ladies Open Golf Tournament for the second year in a row. The MBS is a well-known radio and TV station in the Osaka and central area of Japan known as the Kansai area. In addition to providing drama, comedy, musicals and other radio and TV entertainment programs, MBS has been fully involved with telecasting sports events, and most notably, the MAZDA Japan Classic and the Dunlop-Phoenix Golf Tournament, both of which include women pros from America and Japan.

"The \$300,000 purse and the \$45,000 first prize money for the Hawaiian Ladies Open are considered attractive money prizes and much credit goes to MBS and Orient Leasing for their generosity. #### INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

"Mr. Speaker and members of this honorable body, this resolution honors and congratulates three generations of teachers, students, staff, and PSTA members of Benjamin Parker Elementary School.

"On March 26th, Benjamin Parker Elementary School will be celebrating its 60th birthday party as an educational institution since its inception in 1927, bringing together the families and community to return to their alma mater to commemorate and honor the school's existence as a vital contributing pillar of our educational system of the State of Hawaii.

"And what makes Benjamin Parker Elementary School so special?

"In addition to being the oldest school in Kaneohe, a disastrous fire on August 1st, 1966, destroyed all of the original buildings of Benjamin Parker School. A crash program was instituted right away after the fire to replace these facilities. Twenty-six portables were constructed within a month's time for classrooms. School opened in September, 1966, a month after the fire, without interruption. Reconstruction of the school was completed on January 8th, 1973.

"This is what community pride is all about, Mr. Speaker. This is why Benjamin Parker Elementary School is so special to the people of Kaneohe and the State of Hawaii."

Representative Tom then asked the following honorees to stand to be recognized: Naomi Matsuzaki, Principal of Benjamin Parker. "I wish to add that Naomi is largely responsible too for the success of its gifted and talented program and she, herself, attended Benjamin Parker;" Rene Haitsuka, a third generation sixth grader and Student Council President. "Rene's grandmother and parents also attended Benjamin Parker;" Marcus Kanahele, a third generation fourth grader and grandson of Clinton Kanahele, former Principal of Benjamin Parker School;" Charles Toguchi, Superintendent of Education; and Sakae Loo, District Superintendent, Windward District.

Representative Tom then asked the following supporters of Benjamin Parker Elementary School, who were seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized: Diane Weeks; Coleen Haitsuka; Carol Haitsuka, mother of Rene; Minnie Haitsuka, grandmother of Rene; Lori Leong, mother of Marcus, and other Kanahele members; Mr. Calhoun, Ohana Vice President; Nancy Hall, Ohana Secretary; Betty Loo, Marcus' aunt; Harry and Toyoko Yasuda, Rene's grandparents; and Kehau Chang, a parent.

Carnation leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Hirono, Hashimoto, Tam, Lee and Say, while Representative Tom presented the certified copies of the resolution.

Representative Cavasso rose to introduce the honoree, stating:

"First, I would like you, if you would, to picture a couple of signs or posters behind her and one of those signs or posters will have a picture of a dog and that dog would be laughing, and the sign would say, 'Pet your dog, not your date,' and there will be another one, another poster that will say, 'Sex is good, sex is great, save it for your permanent mate,' and there will be a third sign behind her. It will be a big red stop sign and it will say, 'Don't be dips, stop at the lips.' You can see why young kids enjoy it and get through.

"Coleen Kelly Mast is the author of Sex Respect and she is a young woman in tune with the needs of teens. Through ten years of teaching family life education, she discovered that her sex education courses were not meeting the real needs of teens in their efforts to live healthy lives. And she was attending evening school at that time and in graduate school, she found that other health teachers were also dissatisfied or uncomfortable with the public school sex education units and in response, in her Masters curriculum project, she did work entitled, Sex Respect, in 1983. She developed that curriculum guide for teachers and as that guide was spread, words spread mouth to mouth and from person to person and spread across this nation, and proved so successful that it is now being taught in 28 states. Her sixteen-year old class at this time, high school students, formed a travelling squad called McNamara Ambassadors of Sexual Health, a group that acted out the message with humor and joy, and they generated so much national attention to her content and the style and manner which she taught that the teaching is spread across the nation. It has just recently come to Hawaii and we thank you for bringing it here, Coleen."

Representative Cavasso then asked Coleen Kelly Mast to stand to be recognized.

Representative Fukunaga moved that H.B. No. 2038, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Kawakami.

Representative Liu rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill but with some reservations.

"House Bill 2038 concerns an emergency and budget stabilization fund which we have been calling the 'rainy day fund.' And whereas I can see the argument for the future good of the State that we do need perhaps some hedge against unforeseen circumstances; on the other hand, I hope that we don't make a habit out of stockpiling money that perhaps should seriously be considered to go back to the people of the State of Hawaii. \$50-million is a lot of money and, as amended, this bill also permits the interest on that money to go back into the special fund. I think that's a mistake, and I would hope that as this bill makes its way through this session, that perhaps it is not a ploy to stockpile money for other purposes.

"So, with those reservations, Mr. Speaker, I will be voting for the bill.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Lee rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Hawaii is a very special and unique place. We come from all over the world. We find a people, the Hawaiians, with aloha. A lot of us are descendants of people from the Far East. We traditionally have a very high savings rate. And on top of that, the cultural, social and political foundations were laid by the missionaries from New England. New England has a harsh climate. The people from New England are thrifty, hardy and enterprising. All this have united to produce what I think we find a very unique situation whereby we have a very high savings rate.

"Today's world, we have seen what has happened to the American economy. We have been living on borrowed credit. And that borrowed credit was made possible by a tax law which refunded too much money to the taxpayers.

"This bill in front of us is a very innovative, very thoughtful way of providing for a rainy day. The fact that interest would accrue is also an innovation that makes our money work while we put it away.

"And for these reasons, I think it is important to emphasize again that in the economic world in which we live, the competitive world in which we live, the competition which we face from our foreign competitors, the need to save, the high savings rate will turn out to be a very good blessing for the State and for all the people, and that is the reason I will cast my vote in favor of this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hemmings rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak for the bill, with reservations.

"Mr. Speaker, this may be another venture into foolhardy use of taxpayers' hard-earned money. The people of the Far East may be thrifty and save their money because government doesn't have their money and they have the right to use their moneys as they please, including saving it.

"Unfortunately, all the extra capital in Hawaii is going into the government coffers. We are amongst, if not, the highest taxed people in the country. I wish the people of this State had their money to be frugal with so they could save it.

"In Hawaii, \$50-million pro-rated to support a family of four represents about \$200 for each family of four. It would be nice if they had that money to save rather than having it sitting idle in a government fund.

"The people of New England no doubt were thrifty people, but the people of New England believed in people and the peoples' rights to earn and spend their money and save it as they pleased, not having government do for them what they could and should do for themselves.

"Borrowing money is one thing. The great problems of deficit spending in our country are not a result of tax cuts. Tax cuts are not spending. The great spending splurge that has been going on in this country has been as a result of budgets set in Washington, D.C.--not because The deficit in our nation is because of of tax cuts. excessive government spending and there are many of us who would like to cut government spending here in Hawaii and nationally. In fact, I oftentimes get a little bit of humor when I hear national leaders from the Majority Party in Congress talk about cutting federal spending, especially that terrible commodity--spending on defense. But oh, let someone talk about cutting spending for defense in Hawaii and that's a problem. We can't cut one cent worth of defense spending in Hawaii. I say we are all going to have to bite the bullet on the national picture and start cutting spending across the board.

"This bill may be foolhardy in that it takes money or continues to take money out of individuals' pockets and puts it under the government's mattress where it is not put to use to benefit the consumers and the people of Hawaii.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Jones rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"I just want it noted that I, too, do not believe that we have refunded too much money to the taxpayers of Hawaii which was stated by a previous speaker. We have not refunded what we should be refunding to the taxpayers of Hawaii.

"But because of the economies that perhaps this bill can bring about, I will support it on that basis.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2038, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AN EMERGENCY AND BUDGET STABILIZATION FUND," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes, with Representatives Alcon, Honda and Souki being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 2038 had passed Third Reading at 1:39 o'clock p.m.

Representative Liu rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise not to speak against the intention of the bill but I feel strongly enough in the way that it has come out and the way that it has been drafted, more so in the committee report so that, hopefully perhaps, it can be cleaned up before it passes Final Reading this session.

"I think the concern expressed during the hearing on the bill was very correct that we don't want a misinterpretation by the Department of Taxation as to what type of scientific facility we want to be exempted from the excise tax. However, the current language of the bill does read at the very tail end of the descriptive nature of the various facilities.-it ends with the term 'or other' which is a pretty broad term. Granted, the Department of Taxation has been very narrow in its reading so the bill attempts to correct the problem by including the phrase, 'but not limited to...' and then it goes on to name the same things that's in the current law.

"Unfortunately, I don't think that language really expands on what is in the current law and if the intent was to clarify it, the committee report does not do that either. So I don't know whether or not, in fact, this does give the type of direction that the Department of Taxation is going to need if, in fact, we want to send them the right message--hey, take a look at things like research in addition to just what is stated in the bill--because I think that was the example which was brought up in the committee, the question of whether a research feasibility was, in fact, a scientific feasibility. If that's what we wanted to be included, we should have stated in the committee report or stated in the bill. So I hope that perhaps with some minor adjustments in the Senate, that the bill can be clarified so we don't get embarrassed and have to come back next year again and one more time try and make it right.

"I think the movement is in the right direction; this is an area we want to capitalize on, but I feel strong enough about it to vote 'no' to send the right message to the folks in the Senate and, hopefully, I will be able to vote 'aye' on Final Reading.

# "Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2390, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE GENERAL EXCISE TAX," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Liu voting no, and Representatives Alcon, Honda and Souki being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 2390 had passed Third Reading at 1:45 o'clock p.m.

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Anderson and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

#### UNFINISHED BUSINESS

#### Stand. Com. Rep. No. 452-88 on H.B. No. 284:

Representative Metcalf moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 284, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hagino.

Representative Hayes rose and stated:

"I hope all of you consider very carefully before you vote on this bill, if you have had as I have. . .

Representative Okamura rose on a point of order and said:

"Will the speaker please indicate whether she is in favor or against the bill."

The Chair asked:

"Representative Hayes, are you for or against the bill?"

Representative Hayes answered:

"I am the author of the bill and I am for it."

The Chair asked Representative Hayes to "proceed," and she continued:

"I urge all of you to vote for it. I have had an increasingly difficult time getting to two or three simultaneous committee meetings. I've had constituents calling on me to say, we don't know what's going on, we don't get enough news, we can't keep up with things.

"I think if we had twenty extra working days, we would be able to have a longer notice of the bills that are to be heard; we'd be able to do them with more consideration; and just as an aside, the people who are in the 1989-1990 Legislature will be getting a larger salary and this would give you a chance to earn it.

"Thank you."

At 12:37 o'clock p.m., Representative Liu asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:41 o'clock p.m.

Representative Metcalf rose to speak in favor of the bill, "with the mildest of reservations," stating:

"Conceptually, Mr. Speaker, I believe that this is an issue that needs to be discussed in the community, and your Committee on Judiciary felt that an extension of the session from 60 to 80 days would not be inappropriate. However, Mr. Speaker, about this time in the session, I would actually much prefer the session to be only 40 days.

"Thank you."

Representative Souki rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and members, the reason I speak against the bill is that I think it has merits and possibly we should look at it again some other year. But I think we also need to look into the consideration of the financial impact by the additional days that the session is going to be extended. I don't believe if the community is willing to pay the legislators a wage that is commensurate with the responsibility that we have that we should have a full-time session. And if it is the intent of this bill that we should have a full-time session that the current level of salary that we have right now, or the anticipated salary that we will have effective November 1st, I don't think that would be sufficient justification. I don't believe that a modern family can exist in the pending salary increase for the legislators, and if this is going to be incorporated as a full-time measure, I believe it will make it increasingly difficult on us.

"Therefore, I ask the members here to look upon this measure very carefully. . .

The Chair interrupted and asked:

"Representative Souki, are you speaking on the same measure?"

Representative Souki answered:

"I am speaking on the bill to extend the length of the regular session."

The Chair said:

"Yes, it's extending the session for another 20 days but not on a full-time basis."

Representative Souki asked:

"Extend the session another 20 days?

The Chair answered in the affirmative.

Representative Souki continued:

"It still is going to have a financial impact and I don't think this financial impact has been measured sufficiently and, therefore, I still wish to speak against this measure until another measure can be brought to the floor to provide what is commensurate to the work that we do for the State of Hawaii.

"Thank you."

Representative Crozier rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I've been vacillating all morning on how I was going to vote on this bill but with the good Representative from Maui's eloquent statement, he's made some valid points and I do concur.

"Thank you."

Representative Alcon rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, no matter how long the session, we still go through the same routine.

"Thank you."

Representative Lee rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I am speaking in favor of the bill but against the substance.

"Definitely, there is too much work and too little time but sometimes, you know, we should consider whether we should not limit the amount of work and we have to look at that very seriously. The number of bills is overwhelming.

"On the other hand, I am speaking in favor of the bill because it's a question to be placed on the ballot for the voters to decide, and I think it is important that we have a public discussion about the manner and the length of the session.

"For that reason, I think it is worthy of consideration so I will vote 'yes'."

At 12:46 o'clock p.m., Representative Apo asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:50 o'clock p.m., the Chair stated:

"May I remind the members that we address the Chair for proper decorum. When you stand up to address any other Representative on the floor, will you please address the Chair?" Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, like the others, I believe there hasn't been enough study on this particular bill. I believe that there should be more input and if there is an impact in dollars because of staffing and other things we have to look at, if they feel that a resolution is sufficient to do a study on it, we might work it that way.

"Some years back I, myself, put in a bill to have a longer session and if that would not work, we had other means. It is very important that if we're going to have a bill and we're going to the public, we should know what the impact is going to be and for that reason, Mr. Speaker, I urge my colleagues to vote 'no.'

"Thank you."

At 12:51 o'clock p.m., Representative Anderson asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:53 o'clock p.m.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 284, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE III, SECTION 10, OF THE HAWAII CONSTITUTION, TO EXTEND THE LENGTH OF REGULAR SESSIONS OF THE LEGISLATURE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 27 ayes (less than two-thirds majority vote) to 21 noes, with Representatives Alcon, Anderson, Andrews, Cavasso, Crozier, Hashimoto, Hemmings, Honda, D. Ige, M. Ige, Ihara, Kanoho, Kawakami, Leong, Liu, Marumoto, Medeiros, O'Kieffe, Ribellia, Souki and Tom voting no, and Representatives Bellinger, Jones and Tajiri being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 284 had passed Third Reading by less than two-thirds majority vote at 12:54 o'clock p.m.

Representative Shon moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3459, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Cavasso then offered the following amendment to H.B. No. 3459, HD 1:

"Section 1. House Bill No. 3459, H.D. 1 is amended by adding the following language to the end of the first section:

SECTION 2. Section 572-7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

'Section 572-7 <u>Premarital examination requirement.</u> (a) Except as otherwise provided in this section, no application for a marriage license shall be accepted by a marriage license agent unless:

(1) [the] The female provides a physician's statement signed by a licensed physician or by a commissioned medical officer of the United States Air Force, Army, Navy, or Public Health Service verifying that the female has been given a serological test for immunity against rubella and has been informed of the adverse effects of rubella on the fetus; provided that no examination for immunity to rubella is required of the female who provides proof of immunization with live rubella virus vaccine, or who, by reason of age or other medically determined condition is not and will never be physically able to conceive a child[.]; and

(2) The male and the female both provide a physician's statement signed by a licensed physician or by a commissioned medical officer of the United States Air Force, Army, Navy, or Public Health Service verifying that they have been given an HTLV-III/LAV test or other equivalent test approved by the department of health to determine the presence of the acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS) virus or viral antibodies.'

(b) On the joint petition under oath of both parties desiring a marriage license and for sufficient cause satisfactorily proved to the judge by affidavit or otherwise, a circuit judge, if satisfied that the public health and welfare will not be injuriously affected thereby, may in the judge's discretion make an order dispensing with compliance with subsection (a). The circuit judge shall, in the judge's decision on the petition, state the judge's findings of fact in support of the order. The order shall become effective according to its tenor when certified copy of the order has been filed with the marriage license agent.

(c) The serological test for determining immunity against rubella and the HTLV-III/LAV test or other equivalent test to determine the presence of the acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS) virus or viral antibodies shall be approved by the department of health and performed in a laboratory of or one approved by the department. [Only blood samples obtained in a department clinic will be analyzed in the department's lab without charge.] All costs incurred for the rubella and the HTLV-III/LAV test or other equivlent test shall be borne by the applicants. In the event that either party to a proposed marriage tests positive for exposure to HIV or any other identified causative agent of AIDS, the western Blot Assay or a more reliable test shall be administered. The cost of the Western Blot Assay or a more reliable test shall be borne by the State. If such test confirms the positive result, it shall be the duty of the physician who administered the tests, before issuing a certificate under this subsection, to give notice of such result, in person to both parties to the proposed marriage, and to provide them with information regarding the meaning of such result and the availability of further testing and counseling, if appropriate. It shall also be the duty of such physician to notify the Department of Health, provided, however, that written informed consent of the applicants is obtained prior to the release of the requested test results to any other third party.

(d) After the completion of the serological test but prior to the issuance of the physician's statement, a written report of the test showing its result shall be transmitted to the physician by the director of the laboratory; one copy of the report shall be filed with the department by such director and another shall for one year be held on file at the laboratory for inspection by any authorized agent of the department. No physician's statement shall be effective under subsection (a) unless accompanied on the same sheet by a statement signed by the laboratory director or the director's authorized subordinate of the name and completion date, but not the result, of the test and the name and address of the person whose blood was tested, and by a statement signed by the applicant that the applicant is such person.

(e) No information secured from any examination, test, report, statement, or circuit judge's order or decision made under this section shall be divulged by any person except in the performance of the person's official duties or the person's professional or other employment, as contemplated by law, or in compliance with a court order, or except as to the person's own condition[.]; provided that section 325-4 notwithstanding, the results of the HTLV-III/LAV test or other equivalent tests approved by the department of health shall be released to both applicants for the marriage license.

(f) Any person who by fraud or wilful misrepresentation circumvents or defeats or attempts to circumvent or defeat, any purpose or provision of this section, or who, being a marriage license agent, accepts any marriage license application in violation of this section, or with knowledge that any statement accompanying the application for such a license contains any false statement issues a marriage license, or who violates subsection (e), shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than one year, or both. (g) The department may prescribe the form of the statements and the report mentioned in subsection."

SECTION 3.[2] Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed. New statutory material is underscored.

SECTION 4.[3] This Act shall take effect upon is approval.

Representative Cavasso moved that the amendment be adopted, seconded by Representative Jones.

At 1:05 o'clock p.m., Representative Okamura asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:06 o'clock p.m.

At 1:07 o'clock p.m., Representative Peters asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:21 o'clock p.m.

Representative Cavasso rose to speak in favor of the amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this motion to amend House Bill 3451 to allow and provide and require marriage AIDS testing for marriage applicants in Hawaii is what's being said here. The Representative asked me in detail what it's doing.

"The bill will provide that both the male and the female applicant for a marriage license will be receiving a test for AIDS. We are currently testing for rubella only in Hawaii so only the female marriage applicant at this time receives a blood test. This would expand that to include the men as well.

"The bill further provides that the Eliza test or simple test be used first, that if the Eliza test comes up positive and in Hawaii, it would be double Eliza test, then they would be required to undergo a confirmatory test called the Western Blot.

"The initial test would be paid for by the marriage applicants as this bill is worded right now, and I was on the phone with Illinois just an hour before session and the double Eliza test is costing as little as six dollars in Illinois. Our Department of Health here in Hawaii gave us a high estimate of fifteen dollars per Eliza test. They said it would be likely to cost ten but to be safe, they should say fifteen. The bill provides that the marriage applicants pay for that test first.

"The second confirmatory test which would be required less than one percent of the time at this point, according to the figures of the State Health Department, that's about how many false positives we look like we're getting. The Western Blot test would then be paid for by the State of Hawaii and the State of Hawaii has estimated that test to cost twenty-five dollars. So the cost is not excessive.

"The bill would not forbid people from marrying. It simply brings it out into the public--into the open--and allows that woman or man who is going into that marriage to have the opportunity to know what they are going into. They can then take precautions or not marry as they choose, but at least they will know. In the last sixty days. . . the Illinois bill has only been in effect for sixty days. In the last sixty days, four marriages which would have gone in with AIDS have been identified and those people have the knowledge to make a decision to get married or not get married, to have children or not to get children. The cost savings to the State of Illinois has been estimated at \$85,000, just on those four positives because they calculate what would have happened with dealing with the children of positive AIDS marriages.

"This bill came before our House last year. Forty-one of us co-sponsored this bill.

"In my community, 78 percent of my constituents support AIDS testing for marriage applicants. There is only one question asked in my community that received a higher response than marriage testing for AIDS. That was the gasoline by the gallon and we passed it. I understand from other Representatives that our questioning or sending questionnaires into their community that they are getting the same percentage-70% to 80% favorable toward testing for AIDS.

"The purpose of the bill will be to help protect our marriages. We have a responsibility as a government to help insure that the marriages are healthy. We have already done that with rubella, with the children, with testing, with license marriages, we work with the people. Marriage is such an important stabilizing factor in our community and this bill, this amendment, will help to make that marriage just that much more secure.

"In Massachusetts, two days ago, the paper said that one in five hundred children are being born with AIDS now. This test might help to preclude some of that. It's inexpensive--six dollars, ten dollars. It's important to the people of this community--78 percent support. It seems to be something that has touched the individuals in this Legislature because it was supported by forty-one members--80 percent.

"We can go forward and I ask you to support this amendment which will help to relieve concerns for those people getting married, to protect our community, and to protect our children. It's not a costly thing and can be done effectively.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Shon rose to speak against the amendment, stating:

"First of all, Mr. Speaker, I am not sure what this has to do with vital statistics. But I would like to comment on the content itself.

"It is true that we considered this very carefully last year and overwhelmingly rejected it. There are a number of reasons why we rejected it including cost, confidentiality questions, driving the disease underground. I am not going to provide a lengthy explanation of why virtually every possible health professional and organization have rejected mandatory testing at marriages, including the Surgeon General's Center for Disease Control, the American Medical Association, Hawaii Medical Association--I can make a long list if I need to.

"I should point out that everyone who goes in for a marriage license is encouraged to voluntarily go and get free testing at one of our clinics. They are stronly encouraged to do that. If 78 percent of the people want to do that, they can do that. We are very much in favor of encouraging people to voluntarily, confidentially, receive testing for the HIV antibody.

"I would also point out that we have another bill, an important bill, before us this year which would

standardize the procedures for testing and this bill does not conform to that.

"In short, I think that we have duly considered this a number of times. Health professionals have considered it, health professionals who are very much interested in fighting the AIDS epidemic as effectively as possible.

"The underlying danger of discrimination seems to be very much a part of the issue and it also is related to those who are most interested in promoting mandatory testing, have also been very much associated with wanting to discriminate, oppose to laws which protect against discrimination.

"I urge all of you to accept the judgment of many of the best health professionals who are working as hard as they can on this issue, across the country and in Hawaii, that this is the wrong direction to go.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cavasso, in rebuttal, stated:

"First, I would concur with the previous speaker that it would be nice to have this testing be free for all marriage applicants, and I would encourage the Senate to amend this bill when it goes over to the Senate to provide for free testing. But they need to look at it in their finance committee and look at the impact. I am saying that if financing is a concern in the State of Hawaii as has been expressed and it has been expressed that this test is too expensive for the State to perform, then let the marriage people put their six or seven or ten dollars into it.

"Second, this bill can be amended to comply with any standardized procedures that we bring forth. In fact, I recommend that we do ask the Senate to put a double Eliza test in here and then a Western Blot, but this bill does basically comply with the standardized procedures and that bill which I strongly support.

"And as far as the accusation that this is sponsored by people who want to discriminate, I say that that is an improper accusation. The people who want this bill care about people, they love our State, they want to see marriages secure. I, for one, care about the people who have AIDS, and I would just like to make that clear, please.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hemmings rose to speak in favor of the amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, two points that the Chairman of the Health Committee brought up and I would like to share a different perspective on.

"AIDS is a virus that does not discriminate. It is a plague that threatens the very existence of our society. It is one of the worst plagues they say since the bubonic plague that reeked such havoc on medieval Europe. It is a medical problem. It is a medical problem that should be addressed in medical terms.

"Secondly, Mr. Speaker, regarding voluntary testing, we do not make laws in this body for people who volunteer to follow the law. We make laws for people who refuse to abide by common sense and the laws of the State of Hawaii.

"Therefore, testing of people getting a marriage license for AIDS virus would be the sensible medical thing to do and there is nothing discriminatory in doing something that is sensible.

"I urge my colleagues to give this careful consideration. We are talking about the health and welfare of people and to vote 'yes' on this amendment.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cavasso rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, may I add one bit to that rebuttal? I forgot to address confidentiality. Confidentiality is addressed in this bill and I fully support confidentiality and this is not to be publicized. This information is for the prospective husband and wife and the Health Department...

At this point, Representative Peters rose on a point of order and stated:

"In all due respect to my colleague across the way, and the rules are very clear that you are entitled to speak on this floor twice on a particular measure. I hope the leadership around here would make that observation so that everybody is treated fairly on this floor."

The Chair thanked Representative Peters.

Representative Apo rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against the motion to amend simply because I wanted to make it clear to the Minority that there are members of the Majority that would support such an amendment.

"I think the problem we have here is in considering the title of the bill, that we may be jeopardizing the primary motion to pass this bill on Third Reading by making an improper insertion with language that is not consistent because the title is not broad enough. I think that is the major question on the minds of many of the Majority members--not wanting to jeopardize the legal status of this bill by making an improper insertion.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cavasso then rose and requested a Roll Call vote on the amendment.

At 1:36 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 1:40 o'clock p.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representative Takamine.

Roll Call having been requested, the motion to amend H.B. No. 3459, HD 1, was put by the Chair and failed to carry by a vote of 32 noes to 10 ayes, with Representatives Anderson, Cavasso, Hemmings, Jones, Liu, Marumoto, Medeiros, O'Kieffe, Pfeil and Ribellia voting aye, and Representatives Bunda, Crozier, Hashimoto, Horita, Peters, Say, Tajiri, Tom and Yoshimura being excused.

"Mr. Speaker, my opposition to this bill pertains only to Section 2 which would, in essence, change the definition of lodging house, tenement house, group home, group residence, group living arrangements and room houses from facilities housing three or more persons to one housing four or more persons.

"In 1986, Mr. Speaker, our Legislature enacted this three minimum definition for such facilities. To, among other things, specifically address the regulation of halfway houses which are community-based facilities catering primarily to former alcohol and drug abusers. For many of these half-way houses, Mr. Speaker, they do have three people residing in them. Should this bill be enacted in its present form, these half-way houses with three persons residing in them would escape regulation. While I do support the need for these types of facilities within our community, I do strongly feel that they should be properly licensed and regulated.

"Should our House decide to pass this bill this morning, it is my hope that amendments can be made prior to Final Reading to Section 2 of this bill to retain the present three minimum definition for these types of facilities.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee ws adopted and H.B. No. 2345, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ROOMING HOUSES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Anderson and Oshiro voting no.

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3299, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Kanoho rose and requested a conflict ruling, stating that he was employed by Hawaiian Telephone for 39 years and now retired. The Chair ruled "no conflict."

Representative Kanoho then spoke against the bill, stating:

"This bill provides funds to conduct the feasibility study on various services provided by Hawaiian Telephone such as coin-operated telephones, telephone-shared tenant services, and interisland telephone service, and addresses the question of bypass.

"On first glance, this seems to be a very sensible approach to resolve questions and to provide direction. However, Mr. Speaker, these issues have already been thoroughly reviewed and acted upon by a very professional, well-trained and competent State agency with voluminous input and at considerable expense and at a cost which probably doubles the \$150,000 being appropriated. A direction for the State on these issues has already been determined.

"In essence I am voting against this bill because the feasibility study being proposed has, in fact, already been conducted by a commission which has acted fairly and rendering decisions which are in the best interest of the general public.

"Thank you."

At 10:27 o'clock a.m., Representative Okamura asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:28 o'clock a.m.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3299, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR A STUDY OF THE DEREGULATION OF CERTAIN TELECOMMUNICATIONS ACTIVITIES TO PROMOTE THE GROWTH OF THE TELECOMMUNICATIONS INDUSTRY IN THE STATE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Cavasso, Hayes, Kanoho and Liu voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 3299 had passed Third Reading at 10:29 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 632-88 on H.B. No. 2046, HD 1:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2046, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Shon rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I won't speak often today but because of the dozens of people who have contributed to putting this bill together, I feel obligated to make a few remarks.

"The first is that for all the talk that we've had about fighting this dreaded disease, this is the first attempt at a comprehensive action plan to deal with it. In three areas -- education and information, health care and treatment, and AIDS administration and coordination -- we've constructed what amounts to an action plan, a framework that would, hopefully, guide us into the future. "The bill specifically targets school age children, college students, health care workers, employees, highrisk groups such as those who are abusing IV drugs, prisoners in our correction institutions, and these are targeted for high priority education, information and counseling and, Mr. Speaker, it has often been said that education and counseling is the only vaccine we have so far to deal with AIDS.

"This bill specifically targets community-based services for monitoring and setting of standards. It provides for client-centered case management which in many cases may provide a model for case management for the elderly and other concerns. It expands our efforts to help people get off of potent drugs like heroin.

"The bill places resources where they are seldom placed, Mr. Speaker, with effective community base groups. These are most often the most competent at networking and coordinating our efforts. And while we might fantasize that AIDS is an isolated topic in health today, the fact is that many of our non-profit organizations which we rely on to carry on other missions are being forced to shift resources to deal with AIDS. And if we expect these many non-profit organizations to continue to help us in a wide variety of areas, we are going to have to help them cope with the impingement on their mission that AIDS presents.

"And this bill also tackles one of the stickiest questions, the most difficult questions, that AIDS has presented, and that is the entangled and constantly shifting area of AIDS and the law and confidentiality and the use of the computer.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill could also be entitled 'The Hepatitis B Bill of 1988' for, indeed, we have an epidemic of Hepatitis B; we have an infection rate far above that on the mainland. It is estimated that four percent of our population are infected and are carriers and that one percent or one quarter of those will actually come down, unfortunately, with liver cancer. That means 100,000 cases in the ten years, Mr. Speaker. And, indeed, the methods and the means that we have to deal with Hepatitis B are almost exactly the same as those to deal with AIDS.

"This bill could also be called 'The Anti-Drug Act of 1988,' for within it are vigorous programs to help our youth avoid the use of drugs, programs to get people who are on drugs off of drugs, programs to educate many and the dangers of high-risk behavior.

"This bill could also be called 'The Health Education Act of 1988,' for we are setting the stage for more permanent and more effective way of dealing with health education in our schools, in the workplace, for the first time, we are providing a team that is going to go out and work with employers on health issues related to the workplace.

"This bill could also be called 'The Community-based Health Act of 1988,' for we are taking important steps to ensure that our community-based services which are absolutely essential for controlling health care in the future are going to be well monitored.

"We could also call this 'The Medical Records Act of 1988,' for as we move into the age of the computer, as we struggle to share more information, we are going to have to deal with the very sticky problems of how we move this information from computer screen to computer screen -- who sees it, who uses it, what third parties get lists of what clients.

"Indeed, you have before you the outlines of the State's health agenda for the 1990s. It's prevention, it is education, it is community-based services, case management, drug prevention, medical records, workplace health, infection control. I have made this topic, not on my own choice but because it has been thrust upon us, one of the highest priorities for health this year. We cannot wait, we cannot linger for others to take the initiative, and we must set an agenda, and I thank you for your support."

Representative Cavasso rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"The basic philosophy and the need to deal with this disease is being properly addressed in this bill and I support wholeheartedly in that sense.

"However, the portion which specifies the agencies that are going to be used, the moneys that are going to be spent, and how it is going to be spent, is, I believe, to be inappropriate for us in this Legislature to be given that direction. In fact, the testimony that has come before the Finance Committee further supported that belief on my The testimony was overwhelmingly against part. specifying particular agencies in here. The Department of Health, for example, wanted to have the ability to specify and look at the different agencies, to put it out to competitive bidding, to define what the program was, and to put those definitions out for the community to bid on and for different agencies to come in and look at. It looked like the private testimony that came in from citizens -- Leon Siu and some of the others -- that pointed out the need to allow this to be controlled by the Health Department was articulated well and I gathered from the response of the Finance Committee that we were moving in that direction. I was surprised to see in the last night at 11:30 p.m., to see the item still in the bill.

"So, I expressed those reservations and perhaps in the Senate side, they will give more control back to the Health Department. It is my feeling that we need to leave control in the Health Department. The Health Department is accountable to us and they report to us, and we should let them control these programs, lead these programs, and I thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2046, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 633-88 on H.B. No. 2059, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Fukunaga and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2059, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR RESIDENT ASSISTANTS IN OLDER ADULT HOUSING FACILITIES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2046 and 2059 had passed Third Reading at 10:38 o'clock a.m.

#### Stand. Com. Rep. No. 634-88 on H.B. No. 2876:

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Fukunaga and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2876, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION

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FOR A HYPERBARIC TREATMENT CHAMBER SYSTEM," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 2876 had passed Third Reading at 10:39 o'clock a.m.

# Stand. Com. Rep. No. 635-88 on H.B. No. 3420, HD 2:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3420, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Hemmings rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"The State of Hawaii has the opportunity to give tax refunds to the taxpayers of Hawaii because of the huge surplus we have in the State coffers because our people are the highest taxed in the nation. At this time, with all this surplus money, we are in fact, with this bill, heaping a new tax on businesses. And what's really ironic about it is that it is a double-dealing bill because we are heaping a tax that we, last year, said we gave a tax cut to. I reference page 3 of the bill, line 5, 'Under this Act, the employers' unemployment insurance tax will be reduced and a new tax of equal amount is assessed for the worker training trust fund.'

"And I do have to remind everybody in this House that a tax is a tax is a tax. Oftentimes, taxes are passed because, oh, we're not taxing anybody, we're not taxing the consumers, we're not taxing the poor working man, this is a tax on business. Business does not grow their money on trees. Business gets their money from consumers and the productivity of the workers of Hawaii that's where taxes come from. This is a tax on the people. It will take money out of our economy. It will allow employers to give the money to the insurance fund for the government to handle rather than money going to provide for pay raises and new job opportunities.

"The first line of the bill says, 'The legislature finds that if Hawaii is to maintain its competitive edge in the world economy. . .,' if we are going to maintain our competitive edge on the economy, we better get the economy out of control of the government and give it back to the people in business and the workers of Hawaii.

"This bill continues over-regulation. This bill further gives control of the economy to the bureaucrats sitting in government, and this bill, most importantly, is in light of the huge surplus we have of money, is a tax increase.

"I urge all the members of this House to think clearly about this and vote no."

Reprsentative Liu rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I would like to echo the sentiment of my colleague by indicating that this is one of the most creative bills that I have seen in a long time -- well thought out, very clever, a very smart person drafted this bill. It's not to say it's not someone from this House but it's just to describe that someone who did it was very good.

"This bill not only creates one fund but it creates two special funds. And it is very interesting because the first fund is used to fund the second fund, and all of that is based on what has been described as a new tax as pointed out by the prior speaker.

"My concern with these two new funds is the lack of guidelines which are provided for in the bill. I think the

sentiment and the intent is fine. Yes, there are changes going on in our economy. Yes, workers will need to be retrained. They will need to take a look at what other options they have should they get laid off or there be a change.

"But on page 4, where it indicates that 'The moneys in the security fund shall also be used to provide interest free loans and other financial assistance to employers aimed at preventing permanent layoffs and dislocations. . . in accordance with rules and regulations prescribed by the director.'

"I have great concern as to whether or not that insures accountability to those in this House and those across the way, as to whether or not the moneys will go to companies, to employers, that deserve such interest free loans and whether or not the jobs saved are really going to be jobs saved, or whether we, in fact, will be feathering someone's bed.

"Finally, I have concerns about the worker training trust fund from the standpoint that the last purpose for which the moneys from the fund can be used is in the very broad language which states that the moneys can be used 'to fund and financially support the program objectives of the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations.' Much too wide open, I think, for such a bold move in what is a well-intentioned bill.

"I hope we watch this very closely as it makes it way through this Legislature. I think it is a dangerous bill, and I hope that it does not become law at the end of the 1988 session.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3420, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMPLOYMENT SECURITY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 43 ayes to 8 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Hemmings, Jones, Liu, Marumoto, Medeiros, O'Kieffe and Ribellia voting no.

"There was a clear consensus that there was a shameful lack of viable alternatives to probation or incarceration for our youngsters. We've heard many stories about juveniles having arrest records an arm long before they are committed to the Youth Correctional Facility. And while some choose to blame the Family Court judges, it is understandable why they choose the Youth Correctional Facility as a last resort because commitment invariably leads the youth down the path to adult prison.

"Your Human Services Committee recognizes prevention and intervention as bywords in many of our deliberations. As an analogy, think of having an infected wound and watching it fester to a point where it becomes life threatening and requires hospitalization. Wouldn't it be far better and more economical to treat the infection at its inception rather than wait till it becomes a major problem?

"We need to provide the alternatives and support systems to enhance the laws that provide special protection to our juveniles.

"Our goal is for our juveniles to avoid the high cost of detention and incarceration.

"Thank you."

## Stand. Com. Rep. No. 665-88 on H.B. No. 2020, HD 2:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2020, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Hemmings rose to speak against this bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I have some remarks about the bill which I would like to briefly summarize and have the remainder inserted into the Journal."

The Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

**Representative Hemmings continued:** 

"Much of the land proposed in the Land Bank already is designated conservation or agricultural land. Therefore, we have it within our power to protect this land with existing law.

"Number two, the State of Hawaii already controls a good portion of the land of the State of Hawaii -- approximately 35%. And we are having a tremendously difficult time managing our existing resources.

"Number three, the bill does not designate specifically by tax map key map which lands we're talking about so we don't know exactly whose lands we're buying and, more importantly, what the eventual cost will be.

"Therefore, I think it would be foolhardy to spend many, many millions of dollars of taxpayers' money creating a Land Bank when we don't know exactly which land we are going to use and when we specifically don't have enough resources to take care of existing lands.

"Therefore, I would urge my colleagues to reconsider this bill and vote no.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hemmings's remarks are as follows:

"The original bill appropriated \$98-million for the State to purchase land for a 'Land Bank.' The bill was amended in the Finance Committee deleting the \$98million and replacing it with \$1.00.

"Much of the land for the proposed 'Land Bank' is already designated conservation and/or agricultural land and is already protected by law from commercialization and development.

"The State of Hawaii already controls approximately 35% of the land in the Hawaiian Islands and the truth of the matter is that it does not have the wherewithal or the resources to care for the land it presently owns. All you have to do is walk around Diamond Head and look at all the rubbish and terrible neglect that scars our best known landmark. If the State cannnot adequately care for what it already has, there is no justification for millions of taxpayers' dollars to be spent on acquiring more land.

"The bill, as it is presently worded, does not actually specify exactly what land is to be bought. As a result, there has not been enough done to make clear exactly what the cost would be.

"I believe that we all want to protect certain sites in the Hawaiian Islands from exploitation, but this boondoggle bill is not the way to do it."

#### Representative Anderson rose and stated:

"I would like to agree with my colleague and go 'no' on this particular measure. It's not only that we do not have priorities on this, Mr. Speaker, but there is also another bill that sets up a commission who will go ahead and land bank. We're going to pay them. They have a wish list and then they are going to be able to come back to the Governor or whomever and never back to the Legislature. They will be spending taxpayers' money and we have nothing to say about it. I think that this is wrong, Mr. Speaker.

"Also, Mr. Speaker, if we were to go ahead and purchase all of these lands, there are other appropriations that we have here on other lands that we can land bank. The whole idea of land banking is great, but until such time as we prioritize, know what we are doing, put a dollar figure on there, I would hope that my colleagues would vote no.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative O'Kieffe rose to speak against the bill, with reservations, stating:

"While I agree there are certain prized properties like Makalawena that should be preserved from development and for future generations, I am concerned how the list of 58 pieces was derived and why provision was made only to purchase them. When you consider that the State already owns 36.5% of the lands, and when you couple that with what the counties and the federal government owns, it boils down to the fact that government owns 50% of the lands in our State.

"The bill states that 'the concept of land banking, the immediate acquisition of land from future public benefit, is vital to controlling the future growth, development, and land use within the State.'

"The question I was asked is, can't land already be effectively controlled through the Board of Land and Natural Resources, the Land Use Commission, the County Planning Commissions, and the County Councils and as we recently learned from Makalawena by the public?

"Mr. Speaker, the original version of the bill calls for an appropriation of \$98-million. As I know several of these parcels intimately, this figure would be more reasonably considered a down payment. What then is the real figure with which we will be dealing?

"In addition, at least one parcel has a group of private homes already established on it. If condemnation proceedings are initiated, it should be apparent that these properties and others like it would be vigorously protected and will certainly result in antagonistic and expensive litigation. Will the litigation cost be included in this bill?

"The Committee Report appropriates one dollar so that a more accurate amount can be determined at a later date. While we have children sharing textbooks and going to school in teachers' lounges, and while affordable housing is at a crisis stage, is it really appropriate to think about buying more now when government has 50% banked already?

"While I agree with the basic intent, I would hope that when this bill reaches the Senate, they will amend it to include the criteria used to select the parcels. The public will have a chance to concur with the selection and that the parcels be specifically identified by tax map key number.

"In addition to asking the Department of Land and Natural Resources for a realistic appraisal of each parcel be tantamount to unleashing a pack of money-hungry speculators.

"On the other hand, it is not unreasonable to get a reasonable estimate of the total as well as to have each prioritized.

"And finally, I would ask that the exchange of lands be a permitted means of acquiring the cited parcels.

"I hope that I will be able to vote 'aye' on this bill when it comes back from the Senate.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative O'Kieffe then asked for a conflict ruling, saying that his family is in escrow for part of one of the parcels denoted in H.B. 2020 and that escrow was established before the introduction of this bill.

The Chair ruled "no conflict."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2020, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE PURCHASE OF LANDS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 42 ayes to 9 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Hashimoto, Hemmings, Jones, Liu, Medeiros, O'Kieffe, Peters and Ribellia voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 2020 had passed Third Reading at 11:20 o'clock a.m.

At 11:20 o'clock a.m., Representative Souki asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:32 o'clock a.m.

"Mr. Speaker, now I would like to go ahead and say that our statewide trail and access system is in need of repair and I, with pleasure, see that we are going to be dealing with this and encouraging access to those trails and encouraging hikers to get into the mountains and enjoy the nature.

"Thank you for the opportunity to speak in favor of this, Mr. Speaker."

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The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3238, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO A STATEWIDE TRAIL AND ACCESS SYSTEM," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Fukunaga and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3558, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CLAIMS INVOLVING THE STATE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 3558 had passed Third Reading at 11:35 o'clock a.m.

# Stand. Com. Rep. No. 671-88 on H.B. No. 3416, HD 2:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3416, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill requires that we allow a farm loan for \$5-million. According to the report, this is going to be an interest rate and collateral to be decided by the Board of Agriculture.

"However, Mr. Speaker, early on this year, in Finance, we had a bill for our own State to have money put in our banks. The banks have to come up with a 110 percent collateral.

"On this particular bill, it's leaving that up to the Board of Agriculture. How can we go ahead and say that we want our banks to have 110 percent collateral but we can let out our taxpayers' money and leave it up to the Board to decide what kind of collateral they need. Over and above this, Mr. Speaker, I am very sympathetic to the people of Honokaa, but also, Mr. Speaker, there was another bill earlier and the same gentleman had a chance to help some of the people on this island and was not as responsive as he wants us to be.

"For that reason, I am going 'no' and I would hope my colleagues would go no."

#### Representative O'Kieffe rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak with reservations for H.B. 3416, HD 2.

"Mr. Speaker, my district, West Hawaii and East Maui, is almost 100 percent totally dependent on its economic well-being by the impacts of agriculture, aquaculture, ranching and visitor industry. I do not think there is anyone in this room who is not supportive of the sugar indusry.

"As the bill states, the industry occupies approximately 184,000 acres of land and employs nearly 6500 employees with an annual payroll that was a 129-million in 1986. This is a significant industry whose demise would have a significant negative impact, particularly on my home island of Hawaii.

"There's several areas of the bill which concern me greatly; in particular, loans would not be subject to the restrictions in Section 155-3 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes. These are loans that can be made by Farmers' Home Administration, the Federal Land Bank, and private lenders, among others.

"However, and I quote from the bill, 'The department of agriculture may insure up to 100 percent of the principal balance of a loan, plus interest due thereon, made to a sugar grower by a private lender who is unwilling otherwise lend the applicant sufficient funds at reasonable rates.' The question that must be asked, Mr. Speaker, is why won't other lenders make the loan? If it is too risky for them, isn't it also too risky for the State?

"I quote from a letter to the Editor in last Friday's WEST HAWAII TODAY. 'As one who earns his livelihood from agriculture and who is applying for a small Department of Agriculture loan to expand, I take offense at the State's readiness to deplete the entire DOA loan fund by loaning \$10-million to Francis Morgan's failing sugar company. If the State is truly committed to self-sufficiency through a diversified economy, then it better wake up the current agriculture and aquaculture trends blooming throughout the State.'

"Another concern of mine is that H.B. 3416 would not require collateral. Is this fair to other struggling businesses? Will the Department of Agriculture be as lenient to the aquaculturalist as was quoted above?

"During testimony on this legislation, the Chairman of the Department of Agriculture cautioned that and I quote: 'There should be some fiscal control to maintain the integrity of the agricultural loan program.' She went on to say that the provision for a 100 percent loan insurance 'would be tantamount to providing a conditional grant.' She did not recommend passage.

"The Dean of the College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources, and the Chairman of the Governor's Agricultural Coordinating Committee both stressed the importance of having sugar remain viable, and concurred with the Department of Agriculture on their recommendations for amendments. The President of Hamakua Sugar who will be the primary beneficiary of this legislation testified, and I quote: 'I will be able to provide more than adequate collateral to the State.' To my knowledge, no other grower indicated that collateral would present a problem and yet, this draft is not a requirement.

"In addition, Mr. Speaker, there is nothing in H.B. 3416 which states that a sugar company must use the proceeds only for its sugar operations. In the case of the sugar company indicated above, such a favorable loan could be used for its feedlot and meatpacking operations and that would put them in a distinct competitive advantage with other cattle ranchers and producers on my island.

"Mr. Speaker, I fully understand the body's effort to help the sugar industry in any way we can. I can only hope that when this bill reaches the Senate, that body will consider some of the things that I have mentioned; namely, that any loan made be collaterized and the proceeds only be used for sugar operations.

"I urge my colleagues to support this bill and my reservations.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Crozier then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to speak in favor of the bill with grave reservations, and I will just be reiterating basically what Representative O'Kieffe had to say.

"I am concerned about the collateralization, or the lack of, in this bill. And also, it has been said that one of the reasons that company is in trouble is because they are trying to diversify. And one of the ways they are trying to diversify was to get into the feedlot business. If their company is in trouble because of their experiment and by doing that experiment, they were competing with other existing feedlots, I have a problem when the experiment fails and they come to government for a bailout. If this is purely for sugar and sugar related activites, I have no problems, but when this bill comes back, and I am sure it will, if there is no kind of protection to limit their activities with these moneys so that they can continue to encroach on other existing businesses with government aid, I will probably vote no.

"I send this message to the owner who is trying to get the loan and I hope the Senate takes into consideration what I had to say.

### "Thank you."

"Mr. Speaker, just briefly, I would like to first state that I am inclined to favor the appropriation of \$150,000 to our neighbor island obstetricians and gynecologists because our rural areas are in need of their services and because liability premiums today, as I understand it, is still increasing for our physicians.

"My reservations however, Mr. Speaker, is that we not bandaid the tort system which may possibly need more fine tuning. And, Mr. Speaker, that the State not set precedents in funding liability premiums for anyone who walks through our doors. What I am driving at too, Mr. Speaker, is that we may be taking on an unnecessary cost which could be better addressed by passing equitable tort reform for our medical community.

"May I caution our medical community, Mr. Speaker, that by accepting these moneys, in essence, you would be admitting that meaningful medical tort reform may not be needed. To the opponents of tort reform, this is what they want. The question of tort reform is not over yet, Mr. Speaker, and the issue will undoubtedly surface in the future again. To the people who are opposed to reform and are saying there is no crisis, may I submit to you that by passing this legislation, it is evident that the liability crisis is still with us.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marumoto rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I couldn't agree with the previous speaker more and would like to have his words taken as my own."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

It is not a clean-type propellant which thrusts this sized rocket into space. The toxic waste and debris could drift to Kona if the present drift of volcanic smog is any indication. Pahala and Naalehu may also be affected by air drift carrying pollutants.

"Kona is especially vulnerable to pollution because of the lack of tradewinds and inversion system.

"It is my hope that the choice of the consultant to undertake the EIS is of the highest calibre and possesses the expertise necessary to evaluate the industry, social impacts and, most especially, the environmental effects upon the areas of Ka'u and Kona utilizing air quality base line studies and monitoring."

Representative Taniguchi's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to speak in favor of this bill, House Bill 2914, HD 2. It is a bill which will provide much needed relief to residents of Manoa who have suffered damage to their homes and who have had to live with the day-to-day anxiety associated with this problem.

"Initially, a few homeowners in Manoa experienced movement of the soil under their homes. The recent heavy rains in December and New Years flooding intensified the movement of the ground and expanded the affected area. Today, the area encompasses some 150 residences. A number of the residents have been forced to move out of their homes for safety reasons. The rest of them live in fear of more movement and damage to their homes each time it rains.

"House Bill 2914, HD 2, would go a long way towards improving the lives of these residents. It would provide monies for drainage and utility improvements. It would also allow discussion of a relocation plan and reconstruction or rehabilitation loans to qualified residents. Ultimately, this bill would also allow the University of Hawaii to benefit by getting faculty housing units that it would have had a hard time getting funded through the regular budgeting process.

"In closing, I would like to acknowledge the many unsolicited letters of support the residents have received from my colleagues and the assistance of the various chairmen and the committee members involved in passage of this bill.

"I urge full support of this bill."

# Stand. Com. Rep. No. 695-88 on H.B. No. 2330, HD 2:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2330, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Cachola then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted in the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Cachola's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of H.B. 2330, HD 2. This measure will establish 'Operation Nightingale,' a joint public-private program to increase the supply of registered nurses in Hawaii.

"Currently, we have about 800 vacant registered nursing positions. If we don't come up with some creative ideas, our health care system will be in big trouble.

"Under Operation Nightingale, the State Department of Health will provide classroom space, books, review materials, and instructors to prepare eligible nursing graduates from American and foreign nursing schools for the State nursing examinations. Participating private hospitals have agreed to pay current salaries to qualified personnel who are in their system and have the desirable characteristics to become registered nurses.

"State operated hospitals will also participate and graduate nurses not working in hospitals will also be eligible to participate if their employers are willing to pay for their salaries while they are in the program.

"We have a chance now to help these applicants improve their salaries, maintain their current standards of living while they study, and do something about the nursing shortage.

"It is estimated that the exam preparation would be four to six months. We have obtained support for the idea from hospitals, the Hawaii Nursing Association, the University of Hawaiii, the State Department of Health, and the Department of Labor.

"The classes will prepare candidates for the Hawaii State Nursing Board examination and the Certificate for Graduates of Foreign Nursing Schools. Operation Nightingale will be aimed at nursing graduates who have yet to pass the examinations but are working in paraprofessional jobs such as licensed practical nurses, nursing aides, ward clerks in hospitals, care homes, and the private sector.

"Recent studies include a report of the University of Hawaii entitled, 'Strategies to Address Shortage and Retention of Registered Nurses in Major Acute Care Hospitals in Greater Honolulu,' released in December 1987. The report projects an 11% vacancy rate in Hawaii's nursing positions. If temporary hires from the mainland are excluded, the figure would rise to 20%. A study by the Hawaii Task Force on Nursing Education and Service found that 66% of the Hawaii hospitals surveyed have nursing vacancies.

"Some hospitals are closing wards and patients are wait-listed. Emergency room beds are also being used due to the nursing shortage.

"The time for a serious response to a critical nursing problem is now. I urge a unanimous vote for H.B. 2330, HD 2, on Third Reading.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee ws adopted and H.B. No. 2330, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NURSING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2851 and 2330 had passed Third Reading at 11:56 o'clock a.m.

## Stand. Com. Rep. No. 696-88 on H.B. No. 2055, HD 1:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2055, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Liu rose to speak in favor of the bill with some reservations, stating;

"Mr. Speaker, I think the intentions in this bill are very noble. I think to break the cycle of dependents, perhaps this is the way to go. But I am concerned that we are not sure what the implications of a long-term program such as that envisioned in House Bill 2055, House draft 1, will be.

"\$3.6-million for a pilot project is a lot of money. I am afraid that the results are going to be inconclusive and if they are inconclusive, I wonder if this body, in a future forum, will be able to make some tough decisions and perhaps say 'no' to future funding of this program. So many times we see pilot projects continue on and on and on without any real evidence of success or failure.

"I am going to vote in favor of this bill however, hoping that we can get some conclusive evidence in the future, and hoping that we keep this thought in mind as we vote on many other bills that deal with many other 'pilot' projects.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Arakaki rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"When we developed this package of benefits, the key factor here is not to give a handout, but to give a handout, and if I may present an analogy, for many of the families and while 70% of them single parent families headed by women, they are trapped in the home, so to speak, and if you can imagine families stuck in a hole and you give them a ladder with only one rung at the bottom and one at the top and nothing in between, there is no hope for that family to climb out of that hole.

"The whole purpose of this transition program is to fill in those rungs so that these families who are receiving AFDC payments, who are draining part of our economy, and who are counterproductive, we are trying to buy these transitions so that they can become productive citizens and that their children also can benefit from these.

"So, I would like to ask the membership to support this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ribellia rose and asked that the record "reflect Representative Liu's remarks as that of my own, please," and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Cavasso then rose to speak against the bill "for three basic reasons," stating:

"Number one. We have health classes in the schools right now. We have the teachers and the people that can handle health-related courses and take care of the instruction of our children.

"Number two. This bill is vague in its description of what the program would provide and there is suspicion that this would lead to school-based clinics as similar bills have in other states across the nation. School-based clinics serve as abortion referral programs for young girls, sometimes expressly stated, sometimes not.

"Number three. This bill could and should include greater parental involvement. We don't even have parental notification when it comes to family planning related services and abortion. This says that it is going to encourage family involvement, and yet we still have special laws and exceptions in our State that keep the families from being involved with their young children. And we need to get back and later on in this session, deal with this subject again of parental involvement in young children's choice of abortion and other health-related activities.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2385, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TEENAGE HEALTH," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Cavasso, Hemmings, Jones, Medeiros and Ribellia voting no.

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2029, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill calls for \$1,250,000 to appropriate for space-related work at the University of Hawaii. It seems to be a good figure because the other bill, 2028, that I didn't vote on--I voted no on but I didn't speak on--also has \$1,250,000 and that's to do an EIS study.

"Also, Mr. Speaker, in our space program, we sort of leave out the federal government. Yet, I think we could look for federal government to come up with matching funds. I think they're the ones in the space program right now, and we don't seem to be going in that direction.

"For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I am going to vote against this bill and I would hope my colleagues follow.

"Thank you."

Representative D. Ige rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, maybe a well kept secret to a lot of people is that the University of Hawaii is a tremendous economic engine. Just to remind the Representative across the way here, the University, on average, gets three dollars for every dollar that we put--that is State and private moneys--in the Institute for Astronomy. In the Institute for Geophysics, the University gets seven dollars for every dollar that we put in. So the federal government and private sector are more than tripling the State investment.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson, in rebuttal, stated:

"I am not against the University of Hawaii in their program. I am against how we come up with figures. \$1,250,000, as I say, is a figure that we seem to be pulling out of the air. You can't take every program and say this is what it is going to cost. If we're going to come up with something, I would hope that we would more factual.

"Thank you very much."

Representative D. Ige, in rebuttal, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I have sixty pages of justification on several different projects that the University will be pursuing that I will be happy to loan to the Republicans.

"Thank you."

Representative Say rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to speak in support of this measure and that during the passage of this bill to the

Senate, that maybe someday in conference, we will be addressing the issue or the policy statement of classified research for this particular area.

"The Chairman of Water, Land Use, gave the committee members the opportunity to go to Barking Sands, at which time the Captain stated very openly that classified research is a major area where the University should be involved and I hope, with the passage of this particular appropriation, classified research can be adopted by the Board of Regents.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2029, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR SUPPORTING SPACE-RELATED WORK IN THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII SYSTEM," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Anderson voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 2029 had passed Third Reading at 12:10 o'clock p.m.

At 12:11 o'clock p.m., Representative Okamura asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:24 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 705-88 on H.B. No. 3548, HD 2:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3548, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Liu rose to speak in favor of the bill "with some reservations," stating:

"As I've stated in the past on similar measures, I think, not all, but a number of these cases point out that we still do need tort reform, that the State is still being used as deep pockets in a number of cases.

"Here, we have a case of \$1,500,000 to a former policeman and former fireman, very well familiar with the roads in the area, who had been drinking all day at a cance race, gets into an accident, and we end up deciding it's worth our while because of the potential of being dragged into court, to expend \$1,500,000 to settle the case.

"We also have another case where an inmate spills boiling water on his hand, and yes, obviously he is injured. That's a problem of whether or not, again, the State should have to be involved as a total deep pocket on this type of situation, I think, indicates that the law is wide open. It provides those who want to find it a chance to cause the taxpayers of the State more grief.

"So I would hope that when we vote on this measure, we consider the other implications involved with it.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hemmings rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"There is a very specific problem in this bill with the settlement as it pertains to the Warner sexual discrimination case in the Office of the Sheriff. Because the case never went to trial, it would be difficult to argue on the merits of the complaint. All we have to do is accept this settlement.

"There exists a very serious problem with the mechanics of the case. That is, under the present collective bargaining laws, the defendants can, in fact, have the State pay for their defense as has happened in this case. Sixteen defendants, each with separate counsel, received contracts for initial defense costs up to \$25,000 per defendant. According to the Judiciary, \$130,000 has already been spent and there well may be over \$100,000 in additional expenses that have not been received. Settlement costs \$186,000 as reflected in this bill. There are undocumented costs in the Attorney General's Office, so it is easy to see when you add them all up that settling just this one case is going to cost the taxpayers over half a million dollars. The point is that the State is in a no-win situation.

"Future civil plaintiffs know that by enjoining numerous State employees in a complaint, that the State loses because the cost of defending itself, even if the State prevails in the eventual decision, is larger sometimes than the decision itself. Something must be done to rectify this bizarre situation.

"There is a second more serious problem. Although the case and testimony may never be heard, there is a strong possibility that the plaintiffs are wholly justified in filing the suit. Although in this one case has been settled at enormous cost to the taxpayers, it would indeed be a travesty of justice to have the people who may be responsible for this situation get away uninvestigated and scot-free. I do believe that the civil service laws were never designed to have civil servants get away with atrocities. We have to find out what the Judiciary is going to do to rectify this situation so we make sure that the taxpayers do not continue to pay for bizarre decisions like this.

"I urge all our colleagues to take closer look at these and similar situations when they come before us for payment.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hirono then rose and requested a conflict ruling, saying that "my law firm was involved in one of the cases."

The Chair ruled "no conflict."

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 726-88 on H.B. No. 2002, HD 1:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2002, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Hemmings rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill "with mild reservations" be entered in the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Hemmings' remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill represents a lot of good work by legislators and by the commission that studied this issue. We wish to do something positive that will make public documents more accessible.

"However, this bill exempts the Legislative and Judiciary branches, and also creates an Information Officer in the Governor's Office. Hopefully, this situation will be remedied by amendment."

Representative Metcalf rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be entered in the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Metcall's remarks are as follows:

"With the great proliferation of governmental records at all levels of government, two great, contending concerns have arisen respecting them. These records contain essential information about the operations and decisions of government. It is important, therefore, that members of the public have adequate access to this information as a basic check upon governmental actions. Corrupt practices, misfeasance, ineptitude, and injustices to individuals become much harder to conceal.

"At the same time, governmental records often contain information about specific persons. Such information may be injurious to an individual; it may, only, be embarrassing; or it may be simply a matter of privacy for its own sake. There is intrinsic injury when even innocuous information falls into strange hands. Privacy is a respected right in the United States.

"Both of these concerns--freedom of information and right of privacy--are in potential conflict. Proper guidelines and a balancing of interests are essential to prevent potential conflict from ripening into irremedial and damaging collision.

"I would like now to recognize the members of the Governor's Committee on Public Records and Privacy, chaired by Mr. Robbie Alm, as well as their counsel, Mr. Matthew Chung, for their fine efforts with regards to this matter.

"This measure seeks to accomplish the goals of good government set forth above. As such, I am of the firm belief that this bill is worthy of becoming law, and would therefore urge all of my colleagues to join me in supporting its passage."

Representative Arakaki rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"The House bill is part of the human services child care and parenting package and it was developed in response to recommendations made by the Office of Children and Youth's Conference on Child Abuse and Neglect and also our public informational briefing on child abuse and neglect helding during the past interim.

"Again, the consensus was that prevention was the most effective and economical approach to dealing with child abuse and neglect. And while House Bill 2054 is a Majority package item, I am sure the entire House will agree that we need to reaffirm the important role of the family as a basic social unit. We need to send a clear message to our State agencies and the people of Hawaii that families are our primary concern, and if anyone needs reasons, let me quote from a report by the Health and Community Services Council Work Group, and I 'Families have changed and the laws, attitudes, auote: government policies and agency practices that help families have not kept up with the changes. Families are fumbling, stumbling, and failing because we still think of Mom and Dad and kids -- of Dad working, of Mom cooking, and of the kids all doing their best in school.'

"The average family of four in Hawaii needs \$32,000 a year, or almost 30 percent more than the national average, to keep above poverty. The average wage earner in Hawaii makes about \$16,000 a year which is 15 percent below the national average. Therefore, Hawaii has a higher proportion of multi-wage earner families. The highest proportion of women in the workforce and 70 percent of the jobs held by women are low-paying ones.

"We as responsible legislators need to show vision and foresight in preparing for childcare needs. We need to show our support for women as an integral part of our workforce.

"Finally, Mr. Speaker, just as we recognize the spouses as partners in a family's economics, we, as male counterparts, need to show more responsibility for quality, affordable and available child care.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Jones rose to speak against the bill "with some regret," stating:

"In the new draft that is before us today, there are a number of terms in there that I think are very, very important for us to take note. In these days when we're trying to build world class resorts in our State, it says, 'Conditions imposed on developers of transient accommodations,' is the title of the paragraph. I think even that word 'transient,' we have redefined to be anything under 180 days. We're not just talking about the hotels here. But transient--we have redefined in our own House for the purpose of the tourist tax to five percent.

"But the big word that really scares me here is the counties shall, not may but shall, require land developers to provide services, facilities, and programs to mitigate the needs created by major new development projects. And it goes on to what they shall include.

"I think the language is much too strong. I think it is going to send a very negative business signal to people who want to build world class hotels over here for they are not going to have to provide things like programs, or what kind of programs are these? And what's the intent here? Are they going to have to provide all kinds of multi-million dollar child care facilities, et cetera, et cetera.

"I think perhaps some of the intent might be noble; I think it's also a copout because they don't have the guts to pass this in their own counties. They want us to pass for them.

"My personal feeling is that the language is much too broad, much too undefined, and much too strong, and it is on that basis, with regret, I would ask my colleagues to vote, at this time, against this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Say rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I would just like to say a few words in opposition to this, just to make my personal feelings known to the Chairman. I commend the Chairman for passing out a measure that is trying to address...

At this point, Representative Apo interrupted on a point of order and said:

"Mr. Speaker, would the speaker please address his remarks to the Chair."

The Chair said:

"Representative Say, could you address your remarks to the Chair?"

Representative Say continued:

"Yes, okay.

"In trying to address this issue, I didn't talk to the Chairman so I want him to know this afternoon why I am going down.

"The idea of leveraging or negotiating some sort of a deal with the developer is a good idea. My concern is that we already have it in Chapter 46, Part 7, which is the development agreements.

"Presently, for those who are in the real estate business, which I am not, in respect to each of the four different counties, they have different types of ordinances that deal with development agreements, and I could list a few of them for you.

"At this time, for the county of Oahu and I don't know about the other counties, there is a park dedication ordinance, there is a possibility of a land exchange, there is a question of development agreements in regards to the allocation of water, if there is enough water the development would be constructed, infrastructures in terms of developing their highways also. Properties that are donated for public facilities is another portion of this development agreement. Other developers have developed trust funds and the social well being of their respective community is taken into account through scholarships or other donations.

"And last but not least, the county of Oahu has a development agreement in regards of providing housing units. So what I am saying is that I can understand the Chair's position in passing this measure out, but for me, I personally feel it is just redundant, and that is why I am going to be voting no at this point.

"Thank you."

Representative Kotani rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, many of us in the House have graduated to these chambers after schooling in grassroots community oganizations. We know through our direct experience that the monied interests in our society have a disproportionate influence on the political process through the use of paid government lobbyist, campaign contributions, mass media advertising and sophisticated direct mail campaigns, and other expensive avenues of political influence.

"Grassroots community organizations, on the other hand, lack the same resources and have to rely on lowcost methods such as leafleting to get their word out.

"While I have no problems with imposing the requirements of this measure on those distributing commercial handbills, I do have a problem with the measure that would impose another constraint on those organizations that already face numerous obstacles in making their voices heard.

"Under this bill, petitioners trying to save Sandy Beach, native Hawaiians and Hawaiians at heart trying to leaflet to get the word out about Makua Valley or Kahoolawe, workers who are on strike trying to distribute leaflets to people crossing the picket line to inform them about their cause, as well as those who support right to life trying to spread their message about morality, would all have to carry around trash receptacles if they were going to go out to leaflet and, otherwise, they would be faced with the prospect of being subject to a fine up to one thousand dollars.

"Under those circumstances, I believe that this bill is flawed. Why make things harder for the little guy?

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hayes rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"In Waikiki, my constituents claim that they walk through a maze of litter and it sullies the appearance of the streets and gives the people walking by the feeling that they have to sort of run the gauntlet. "Perhaps Representative Kotani can prevail on the Senate committee that takes up the bill to put some exemptions for the groups that he speaks for. But this was designed to put some curbs on the commercial handbill peddlers.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 3208, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LITTERING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 36 ayes to 15 noes, with Representatives Arakaki, Cavasso, Crozier, Hagino, Hemmings, M. Ige, Jones, Kanoho, Kotani, Levin, Ribellia, Shon, Takamine, Tom and Yoshimura voting no.

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stting:

"I am not sure, Mr. Speaker, this bill is supposed to be on car rentals and if a person gets a ticket and they are a tourist here or a visitor, they throw that ticket away. If in forty-five days the car rental has not sent in name, address, et cetera, to the Police Department or the Violations Department, they should be able to pay the fine. If a person throws away a ticket, I am not sure how long it takes. I don't think our Traffic Violations Bureau at times is up on everything, and it might take over fortyfive days and would be charging the car rental business people a fine that's really not theirs and through no fault of theirs. They are not aware of the people throwing away the ticket and, consequently, it would be an unfair burden.

"For that reason, I am going to vote no, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 3060, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR AND OTHER VEHICLES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Anderson voting no.

Representative Liu rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I believe here that the privileged communications between university researchers and human subjects which this bill attempts to grant perhaps goes a little too far into an area that perhaps need not occur with the hopeful passage of House Bill 2002.

"The granting of a statutory privilege, I think, is a very important thing. We usually reserve that to very special relationships--doctor/patient, attorney/client, priest and their followers.

"I have great hesitation to grant that same sort of privilege in an area of research at the university or any other institution when we are not really sure what areas of research we are talking about where we're really not sure where the general public welfare may require some disclosure of the information which might be revealed through some kind of research. I think it is an area of some unknown consequences and we should go very slow, so I would like to register my hesitancy by casting a no vote on this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

"Being one that goes to many football games, be it UH or when different groups have their activities, one of the traditional ways of sharing the color and the festivities is to release balloons into the air. You know, after you leave the shorelines of Oahu and before you reach Japan, or the Philippines, you have to go five thousand miles of ocean. And when these balloons rise up and they drift out over the ocean, the odds that they will come down and do any damage to any creature is quite remote.

"If this bill was speaking only those aluminum-type balloons, I would be in favor of it, but it speaks to any balloon. So, for one who likes to watch the balloons rise at a football game, especially when the UH team is going to win a game, or the Hula Bowl, or the Pro Bowl when Hawaii is on TV across the nation, I think it would be a detriment. We would lose a lot of the color. I know it is not unique to Hawaii to have balloons but it still adds to the festivities.

"So, for that reason, I just made up my mind right now, and I just want to vote no.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This particular bill says that what we can do is release ten balloons and that doesn't seem to be like a large amount. You know, if it's like a hundred or a thousand, maybe then we could look at it and say, well, maybe it's too excessive. But for ten balloons, with no studies, there's no reason to pass this. I, most certainly, can't vote for it. I understand that the people that came in to testify just said that they themselves had no data to prove that it was endangering any animals in the water.

"So, for that reason, I am going no, and I wish that all of my colleagues would.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose and asked whether or not Representative Crozier would yield to a question, to which Representative Crozier answered in the affirmative.

Representative O'Kieffe asked:

"Representative Crozier, in all seriousness, when the balloons go up, they burst. The tradewinds take the balloons out in the ocean. Can the fish digest balloon material?"

Representative Crozier answered:

"Again, if you want to look at the ocean, once you get past one mile or mile and a half outside of any of our islands, it's a desert out there. There is not very much fish--once you outside. Okay? The fish along the shorelines, there's a lot of fish that reside within the reef structure. But once you get past that, it's a desert. There ain't nothing out there except migratory-type fish-the tunas, the whales and what have you.

"So, for the odds of some fish digesting a balloon is quite remote. Chances are that the fish will be intoxicated with mercury, or lead, which has been proven, so what are we going to do? We're going to ban any kind of products going into the ocean because they are going to affect any fish out there? Balloons are the most remote of all.

"Again, I said if these were the bigger, tin balloons, then I would have a problem. But a little balloon that the little kiddies blow up, you know, we are over-reacting.

"Thank you."

Representative O'Kieffe thanked the Chair.

Representative Jones rose and stated:

"I just want to thank the founder of Crozier Reef for informing me of this and because of his testimony, I will also go against it.

"This is just another step towards creating new programs. The JPO system for many, many years has worked successfully in the State and this is just foisting off another program under the taxpayers that heretofore worked very well.

"For the information of the members of this body, so far with today's appropriations, we have directly appropriated approximately \$45-million worth of bills, including the one dollar bills. If the one dollar bills are counted in their entirety, for the original sum put in, we will have appropriated \$198-million and that does not include what we are going to appropriate in the supplemental budget.

"And once again, we are spending money, duplicating, reinventing the wheel, creating new programs that are supposed to augment or supplement what already should be successfully done with existing resources. And just somewhere, sometime in the future, we are going to have to put a stop to this. And it's the taxpayers' money that we are spending. Sooner or later, the voters of Hawaii are going to find out that we're not doing them a favor by spending their money. Maybe we can start doing them a favor by saving their money.

"So, I rise to speak against the bill and I will vote against it, Mr. Speaker.

### "Thank you."

Representative Anderson rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I really would feel remiss if I did not speak in favor of the bill and I would hate to do that to my fellow colleague, but being a former JPO and a graduate of the public schools, I think that the times have I have been fighting for that program for changed. many, many years, but if you look at the liability that the State is looking at, if you would look at the increase of traffic, if you look at our people today--our young people that are out on the streets--and with the increased traffic, I believe the program is really in jeopardy because a young person today is having a hard time trying to make a decision of when to blow a whistle and when to put out a sign to stop the traffic. A lot of times, it is where we have red lights and green lights and I say that's really great. But where we have no traffic light system, to try to have a young person use good judgment, they mean well,

but it could cost the taxpayers rather than really not costing us.

"So, for that reason, I am going to vote up and I just wanted my colleague to know why.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hemmings, in rebuttal, stated:

"If anybody wants to solve the problem of liability in this State, vote for meaningful tort reform, not spending money on programs such as this.

"As far as the young peoples' abilities to make decisions, the young people have intelligently made decisions for many, many years and they can continue to intelligently make decisions, and sometimes I think, as reflected in some of these bills, the young people can probably make more intelligent decisions than sometimes the elected officials can. Therefore, I remain no on this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

What I oppose in this bill is the fact that the sugar companies selling their waste material to the electric company was selling their energy at one of the lowest rates in the State and they were tied in on a longterm contract.

"Now, in order to assist the sugar people, the electric company states that we will help you raise your rates for the purchase of the energy, the bagasse. However, we are going to have to pass this cost on to the people of the Big Island. Now, Hilo Electric, I believe, has been having a windfall all these years with this low rate. Now, they have an attempt to assist the people and they are going to have to assist the sugar people who would have been having the benefit and the windfall of dollars, but they in turn is now going to soak the whole general public so that they can maintain the profit that they have been making.

"And with this, sir. . .this is my reservation on this House Bill 2999."

I think it can be interpreted to preclude agreements by individuals with the University to share the commercial value of their inventions or new discoveries, or new ideas that are patentable, or copy writable, or saleable, and I think it might send the wrong message to those in the University community; that is, instead of encouraging them in this area of research and development and invention, it might discourage them or drive them underground because of fear that this particular statute would force the revenues from those discoveries to all flow to the revolving fund. "I hope that is not the intent of the bill. I don't think it is but it's not stated very clearly in the bill or the committee report.

"For that reason, I raise these concerns and hope that they can be worked on or clarified as we make our way through the session. If not, I would feel compelled to vote no on Final Reading.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson rose and stated:

"I would like to have Representative Liu's remarks entered. . .I would like to vote no; however, I would like to have his remarks inserted in the Journal as my own.

"Thank you."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, I rise to speak in support of House Bill No. 2688 which also relates to a House Bill previously mentioned as 2715.

"This bill establishes a voting student member on the Board of Education.

"Public education is ultimately dedicated to the benefit of students. But when it comes to making important decisions about education, we adults often act as if students should be seen, but not heard.

"We encourage our young ones to participate in government and we spend a great deal of time teaching them the principles of a democratic government. But in reality, they are shut out from participating in the decision-making process of the one government institution that has the most important role in their daily lives, the Board of Education.

"When I was a student, and like many of you before, I disliked school because I did not find it interesting and challenging. But no one asked me as to why I disliked school or how I felt it could be made more interesting or challenging. Today, many students are still saying that they dislike school and, at the same time, they are not being asked to be involved in making their education more interesting and challenging so that they may take advantage of gaining knowledge through our educational system.

"One of the points made in the book entitled, <u>Search</u> For Excellence, is that the most successful business organizations are those in which management stays close to the customer and tries to satisfy the customer's needs. For the Board of Education, the ultimate customer is the student. How can we find out what makes education interesting and challenging to our students if we do not involve them fully in the decisions of the Board?

"This bill will establish that students are full partners in public education. It has been said by many that students' opinions are of no value. If that's the case, we are actually putting ourselves down as adults. How do most students come up with their opinions or values? From us adults.

"I urge my fellow members to support this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Marumoto rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I think student input at the Board of Education would be very valuable. We would welcome their insight and there are some very intelligent students who could really add another dimension to the deliberations. But I think I would prefer to see students represented as a non-voting member or non-paid member.

"There's a question in my mind which I haven't been able to resolve yet and it is if we add another voting member, we may disrupt the one-person one-vote balance on the Board of Education, and if I do receive a satisfactory answer on this, I may reconsider my vote at another time. But until I get all my questions answered, I am 'no' at this time.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Cavasso rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"We already have an ex-officio member on the Board. Students have involvement, Mr. Speaker, on the Board and they've had it since 1969, and this is good. But to give them a voting part of that Board, I believe is improper. "The previous speaker said that the customer should have a vote in the business and how the business runs, and that just doesn't make sense. Mr. Speaker, when you have a business, the customer gives you advice and counsel and his input but he doesn't have a vote on the Board of Directors and how that business runs.

"The students are involved and their opinions are important but they have not reached the age of majority, the parents, the people 18 years and older who are voting and making the decisions in this community, still hold the final responsibility for making the decisions and that responsibility should rest with people who are of voting age, who are of parenting age, who are of family age, who are of the age of responsibility, and I would, therefore, cast my vote against granting a voting membership to a student.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tam, in response to Representative Marumoto's question, said:

"I have checked with the Chairman of Judiciary and this proposal does not affect the one-man one-vote question.

"Thank you."

Representative Metcalf then rose and remarked:

"Mr. Speaker, Representative Tam is correct."

"I appreciate the previous speaker's concern for the home schoolers and it certainly is my hope that his intention with this bill comes out correctly. However, my reading of the bill is that this would make it more difficult for home schoolers to gain approval in the State, that it would an extra step in the approval process, and that it would make it a lengthier process.

"I also point out that the Department of Education, the home schoolers, the alternative education people, and the Board of Education are in the process right now of reviewing the regulations relating to alternative and home school educations and working on those with attorneys, and I think that it is unwise at this time to change the law by deleting the portion of the law which allows for tutoring from the statutes before that is worked out which most of the argument is revolving around right now.

"So it seems that both the previous speaker and myself have the same goal in mind; however, I feel sure that this bill might hinder rather than help and I, therefor, cast a no vote."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 3469, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COMPULSORY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 6 noes, with Representatives Cavasso, Hemmings, Jones, Liu, Medeiros and Ribellia voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 3469 had passed Third Reading at 4:43 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 2076, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that H.B. No. 2076, HD 1, be recommitted jointly to the Committees on Housing and Community Development and Consumer Protection and Commerce, seconded by Representative Anderson.

At 4:44 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 4:45 o'clock p.m.

Representative Jones then rose to speak against the motion to recommit, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think that this is of such importance to the State of Hawaii that we need to have a vote on this on the floor in terms of the bill itself.

"We have worked for years to address a major problem with families, many of them moderate and lower income retirees who are facing significant lease rent renegotiation in residential properties. Some of them had to pay over \$300 and renegotiate the lease rents, many of whom are Democrats.

"My colleagues across the way supposedly want to speak for the people of the State of Hawaii. To recommit this bill after all these years of work is not good for these people.

"This formula has been developed, it has been reworked, we had testimony on it. There are families in our State who will be directly impacted from us ignoring this problem. I do not believe that we would want to stand in front of some of those families that are going to be paying two and three hundred dollars a month lease rent right now if they were here. I wish they were.

"I want to ask my colleagues not to recommit this. I want to ask my colleagues to vote against this motion. Let's get it before us and let's really be the parties of the people of the State of Hawaii.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2076, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REAL PROPERTY LEASES," was recommitted jointly to the Committees on Housing and Community Development and Consumer Protection and Commerce.

## H.B. No. 2333:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Anderson and carried, H.B. No. 2333, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAIIAN HOMES COMMISSION ACT, 1920, AS AMENDED," was recommitted to the Committee on Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Affairs.

#### RECONSIDERATION OF ACTION TAKEN

Representative Apo moved that the House reconsider its action taken earlier on H.B. No. 2653, HD 1.

At 4:48 o'clock p.m., Representative Liu asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 6:07 o'clock p.m.

Representative Liu seconded the motion to reconsider action taken earlier on H.B. No. 2653, HD 1.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried.

Representative Apo moved that H.B. No. 2653, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIREARMS," be recommitted to the Committee on Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Affairs, seconded by Representative Liu and carried.

### H.B. No. 3131, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Liu and carried, H.B. No. 3131, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DISPOSITION OF PUBLIC LANDS," was recommitted to the Committee on Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Affairs.

H.B. No. 3396, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that H.B. No. 3396, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Liu.

Representative Hayes then offered the following amendment to H.B. No. 3396, HD 1:

"SECTION 1. House Bill No. 3396, H.D. 1, is amended by amending lines 21 to 24 on page 2 to read:

"The legislature funds, then, that the construction of a convention center at the International Market Place site or the Magoon Estate site or the site which lies offshore from Fort DeRussy and Duke Kahanamoku Beach between 450 to 600 yards and the consequent revitalization of that part of Waikiki are acutely desirable for all of Hawaii. The"

SECTION 2. Subsection (a) of section -5 set forth in lines 14 to 23 on page 11 and lines 1 to 4 on page 12 of House Bill No. 3396, H.D. 1, is amended by adding item (3) thereto to read:

"(3) That certain site lying offshore from Fort DeRussy and Duke Kahanamoku Beach between 450 to 600 yards."

Representative Hayes moved that the amendment be adopted, seconded by Representative Hagino.

At 6:11 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 6:12 o'clock p.m.

Representative Hayes rose to speak in favor of the amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, as the Waikiki Representative in the State Legislature, I have been uneasy about the location of the proposed convention center since Opening Day this session. I know and anyone living in Waikiki knows that the community is saturated with traffic and that there really does not seem to be any room for any more.

"I have discovered that a number of the people who own stands at the International Market Place are neighbors are mine. Many of the people who work there are constituents. The people who have houses across from the Magoon property say, look, how could you permit a convention center here. And I felt rather distressed at the lack of a Waikiki alternative until just about four-five days ago when one of my constituents who had discussed with me an offshore convention center last summer finally came up with a presentation.

"What is proposed is an offshore convention center with an approach between Fort DeRussy and the Waikiki shores along a bridge or causeway. This offers an opportunity to solve a number of other problems if such a bridge or causeway and convention center extended into the ocean. This would then become a logical center for the ferry stop being proposed. It would make delivery of convention display materials very, very easy from the airport or Honolulu Harbor with no addition to city traffic. It would provide a place where a much needed launching ramp for small boats which do commercial tour operations and scuba diving could be placed. Currently, there is no space between Keehi Lagoon and Hanauma Bay for such a ramp, and it could provide a place where people could have little insets for pole fishing. I think if it was seriously considered that the opportunities for enhancement of life in Waikiki for conventioners and residents would be unlimited.

"I would like to propose that House Bill 3396, with the amendments added, thus becoming House Draft 2, be adopted."

Representative Hemmings rose to speak against the amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the amendment is, in my opinion, illconceived and a day late and many, many millions of dollars short.

"First of all, I do appreciate the piece of information that was handed out about this offshore island as it would be because it does acknowledge that a convention center at Kakaako would not be good for Kakaako or downtown Honolulu economic development, so I think that's one thing we can be proud of which further supports the effort of putting the convention center where the tourists are which is in Waikiki.

"In looking at this piece, we see that the grand total for building it would be \$134-million as it is estimated roughly here, and in return for that, according to these plans, we will get roughly 3,000 square feet of floor space which is essentially what the Coral Ballroom already is. It doesn't seem like a very wise investment.

"Third of all, the aesthetics and the environmental aspects of it are very serious and if you think that you have two or three hundred Koreans in the International Market Place upset with the disruption of their business, I can guarantee you'll have many thousands of more offshore water recreational surfers, boaters and everybody else--they'll be ten times more upset with this proposal.

"Mr. Speaker, we spent three years kicking this issue around. We've had five studies, the last one cost the taxpayers close to \$600,000. Let's get on with the The Governor took a stand. business. He proposed International Market Place or the Magoon Estate. The Tourism Committee passed out a House verv conscientious bill supporting that effort. It looks like after all of this time, we may be able to achieve having a convention center to benefit our number one industry at no cost at all to the taxpayers. It is too great of an opportunity for us to have pass by because we cannot, at this last minute, do something offshore.

"And I also might mention procedurely, according to House Rules, passing this amendment essentially might kill the bill because the final draft of the bill, according to the Constitution, has to remain on our desks for 48-hours and, according to legislative rules which, in the Senate, is in agreement with, we would have until midnight to pass this bill. So, the two don't add up.

"I am urging my colleagues--let's get on with the business. Let's vote this amendment down and let's have the private sector build the convention center to benefit our economy and our workers.

"Thank you."

Representative Hayes, in rebuttal, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would remind my colleague with whom I worked very closely on many issues that the size of the convention center is quite flexible. It could accommodate any number of people and that the cost in the no-cost convention center is very high in terms of the impact on the residents of Waikiki. I think it's really too much of a cost.

"Thank you."

The motion to adopt the amendment was put by the Chair and failed to carry by voice vote.

Representative Shon then rose to speak in favor of House Bill No. 3396, HD 1, stating:

"I would like to commend the Chair of this Committee who has been under tremendous workload and pressure to come out with something.

"I think it is important for us to acknowledge the context in which the community sees this issue. There have been many members of our media that have long ago decided, I believe, to report this in a short-handed manner--economic development versus nimby (not in my backyard), or economic development versus indecisiveness.

"For those of us who said, let's wait, let's study this a little more, in the past, we can truthfully say that not giving in has saved the State a hundred and fifty million dollars. I doubt, however, that tomorrow's headlines will read, 'House Saves Taxpayers Millions.' More likely, 'The House Finally Makes a Decision,' Mr. Speaker. I think it is important to acknowledge that there has been, what I consider, a lack of objectivity, and perhaps a carelessness in reporting this issue.

"We've come a long way in one year, Mr. Speaker. Last year, the tourist industry told us it was imperative for us then to spend a hundred and fifty million dollars. Now, we are considering proposals to get it for free. Unbelievable!

"Last year, the tourist industry and the Senate told us we had to put the center on public open space. In fact, the busiest golf course in the world. Now, we have a growing consensus that it will be on privately-owned land. Unbelievable, Mr. Speaker!

"There are a lot of things about this issue that have been unbelievable, and credibility is one of the most important casualties of some proponents of the convention center over the years. I think it is very important to acknowledge also that the lack of direct cost to the State is an intoxicating and seductive element that has left us to say, oh, yes, yes, we want a free one.

"However, I must caution that the remarks made by a Representative earlier on a previous amendment are very true, that Waikiki is congested, that the impacts are not negligible and that we should, as we proceed with this convention center idea, begin to make a list of those amenities that we can offer those residents in Waikiki as some small trade-off for the impact will surely come to their neighborhood.

### "Thank you."

Representative Cachola rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, over the past few years, the subject of a convention center has been the focus of intensive work and debate by the Legislature and other public and private organizations.

"Although we can agree that the center is needed, tremendous misunderstanding arises whenever we discuss the location of such a facility. During this session, as well as the last session, the House Tourism Committee has examined numerous potential sites including Magic Island, Kakaakao, Fort DeRussy, Honolulu Zoo and Jefferson School. Through the process of examining the sites, the House has now determined that the site should be in Waikiki, either at the International Market Place or the Magoon site.

"Selecting two sites is in my mind a responsible decision for the House at this time. The House has been presented with two proposals by potential developers for the development of a convention center facility at no cost to the State, in exchange for height, density, and zoning overrides. Since the proposals presented are still conceptual in nature, it is not prudent at this time to select one site.

"Based on convention center studies, reports indicate that there is no such thing as a perfect site. Even the proposals for the Magoon site and the International Market Place have social impacts which need to be addressed, such as the traffic problems and the displacement of businesses or residents.

"The House is very sensitive to the concerns of those affected by the convention center. As such, this bill provides for the establishment of a Convention Center Authority which will have, among its powers, the responsibility to promote the placement and development of a rapid transit system in Waikiki to solve the traffic problems.

"We received testimony as well as proposals from Maru of Japan to provide free rapid transit system subject to certain studies being done. And also the authorities and power to assist in the relocation of displaced businesses or residents which should complement the expressed intention of the private sector and the developers to assist the dislocated businesses or residents.

"Also, the committee report reflects the parameters for the whole project, not just the convention center but also the hotels and condominiums with the aim in view of attracting other serious developers to make proposals to this project. We think that we have good prospects for this. For example, after the Kakaako site received publicity, I received phone calls and letters from developers interested in developing a center at no cost to the State in return for development rights.

"At the conclusion of last Friday's hearing, I was asked if I will be fighting with Senator Holt and the Senate regarding the choices for the convention center site. I do not intend to fight with Senator Holt or the Senate. Rather, I hope to stimulate a friendly, constructive and a productive dialogue with Senator Holt and the Senate so that we may resolve this highly sensitive issue this year.

"In summary, House Bill 3396, HD 1, provides for a win-win situation for most if not all of Hawaii's people because of the following reasons:

"Through the use of private funds, private developers will provide a convention center at no cost to the State, thereby saving the State approximately one hundred fifty million dollars. The savings is just on the structure. If there are any improvements like sewer, water and the light that the State should undertake that or the City, as the case may be.

"Number two, the House expressed its sensitivity to those directly affected residents and businesses in Waikiki. This bill provides a way to address the social impacts with the assistance of the private sector.

"Number three, the convention center will stimulate additional revenues which can be used to fund other needed projects such as low cost housing, education, health, human services and other worthwhile programs. "I believe that the convention center, when it comes to its operation, will not have any deficit in the sense that we don't have to pay any interest at all since the convention center is given to us free.

"Before I close, I wish to thank the member of the Tourism Committee and the Finance Committee for their contributions and input to House Bill 3396, HD1, and I believe that passage of this bill is a giant step forward in providing a world-class convention center for Hawaii.

"Mr. Speaker, it is for these reasons that I rise to speak in favor of this bill and I urge all my colleagues to vote in favor of this measure.

"Thank you."

Representative Lee rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I wish to compliment the Chairman of the Tourism Committee and all the people who worked so hard and especially to the eloquent expose by Representative Shon.

"I would like to say very clearly that we are not giving it free; it's been built by the private sector because it is for the profit of the private sector. And in this respect, I think it is time that we give credit where credit is due.

"The Representative from Kahala has been saying for quite a long time that a private sector should build the convention center. And he deserves credit for saying that all the while we were grappling with this issue. And he should take a bow in this respect. He is no longer simply a voice in the wilderness.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Crozier rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, not to take anything away from the illustrious Representative from Kahala, but I would also like to give credit to the man who made the latest choice as the International Market Place.

"Mr. Speaker, four years ago I said, why don't we put it in the International Market Place? Many of you scoffed and laughed at me, but I appreciate that none of you ridiculed me so I went forward, I found a little space on the curb and I sat there and I waited. This year, a man of wisdom walked by and said, let's put it at the International Market Place. I am proud now to walk alongside Governor Waihee in his choices. I am proud to see that we have a man who is just a little bit ahead of his time.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 3396, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONVENTION CENTER," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Hayes voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 3396 had passed Third Reading at 6:31 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 2077, HD 1;

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Liu and carried, H.B. No. 2077, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LEASEHOLDS," was recommitted jointly to the Committees on Housing and Community Development and Consumer Protection and Commerce. H.B. No. 3205, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that H.B. No. 3205, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Liu.

Representative Crozier rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, for this go-around, I have two times I can speak for this go-around. I would just like to make a few comments to my fellow colleagues here.

"What this bill does is that it gives the lessees the right to take over the building at the end of the lease. All of us are not thinking long range, or the history of a lease. Most of these leases are made for a length of 55 years, 65 years, and there are leases that are made for 75 years. In some cases, we are talking about two-and-ahalf generations of lands being tied up on the one building.

"What this bill does is that it gives the building to the tenant or extends the lease for another ten years. So in some cases, these leases will go on to 85 years.

"Mr. Speaker, I have to pause for a second. I need to get a ruling from you.

"Mr. Speaker, I am a lessee in a condominium. Do I have a conflict? And if this bill passes, I would benefit by this."

The Chair ruled "no conflict."

Representative Crozier continued with his remarks, stating:

"Just to set the record straight.

"What I am trying to get at is when I bought my property or my structure, I made a contract with the landowner for 55 years. I would have to pay land rent for 55 years and I also made a contract with Bank of Hawaii that they would let me the money and I will pay for thirty years to pay off that mortgage. After I pay off the mortgage, after thirty years, all I have left is twentyfive years of lease rent to pay. I've gotten full use out of that building, almost twice the amount of use that is necessary. At the end of that, I agreed, knowing what was going on, to give the building back. The odds are, I ain't going to be around. The landowner agreed to tie up his property for a minimum of 55 years. Some others agreed to tie it up for 75 years. What we are doing right now is we are creating a situation so that that landowner may have to tie up his building or his property in perpetuity.

"Mr. Speaker, something is wrong with that. How does the landowner ever get out of that process? We created the laws, we created the situation for landowners to create housing to resolve our social needs. Now, once they got into this system, we're not letting them out.

"Two hundred years ago, we had a constitutional convention in Philadelphia. When the issues were discussed there, the two main issues that were discussed were, first, how was the government going to function? The second was property rights and contracts. The things we brag about most--the Bill of Rights was not addressed in the constitutional convention. That was the third issue.

"The first issue was property rights. I agree, since 1934 we started to chip away at property rights. But in this case, we chipped too far. We've locked the owner of property into a situation where they may never get out of. We're talking about tying up lands for two-and-a-half generations. Nobody expected that, but we are going to do that. Why? I don't think there's anybody that can really answer the reason why. If somebody bought into that lease late on into the process, that's not the landowners fault. If that person didn't know the rules of what was in the contract, that was not the landowners fault. Maybe it was realtor's fault. But the landowner fault. Maybe it was realtor's fault. But the landowner had one lease that that person was dealing with--just one lease! Nobody who changed in the lease, no matter who assigned to other people, the landowner kept his same position. He did not increase his equity. He is expecting at the end to be free to do other things. But what we are doing here is we are going to tie the landowner in forever.

"Mr. Speaker, I have grave reservations. I would ask my colleagues to take a look at it. Don't think about it in five years or ten years--think about it in generations. We're doing things in this place for future generations. This bill is talking about future generations.

### "Thank you."

Representative Hayes rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"The prior speaker talked about the landowner tying up his land for 55 years. There is nothing unusual about that. What is unusual is that at the end of the 55 years, after someone else has paid the property taxes and paid lease rents and the landowner could have the appreciated value of the land and he also gets the building.

"This is the only State in the union where this is permitted. It was permitted in Pennsylvania I think before our Constitution was written, but not anymore. The reason it is not permitted anywhere else and the reason it should not be permitted here is that it is an unconscionable contract. You have the theoretical choice of extracting your apartment from the building of which it is part and doing this without disturbing any of the building or causing any damage to your neighbors.

"This is no choice. This is not an option. The only choice you have is to give up what you have invested your life savings in and your time and effort and your hopes.

"For many of us, the awareness that there was a reversion clause at the end of the lease has come quite recently. I've been here twenty years and I knew about the reversion clause four years ago. At that point I was an apartment owner, I had committed most of my savings into that apartment, and I had expected it would be something I would leave for my children. I find that it is just a promise to be allowed to live there.

"I suspect that if we fail to pass this law that one day, not too far off, some purchaser will discover more promptly than I did that he has been taken and will bring a suit against the salesperson and against the prior owner for failing to reveal the existence of this booby trap at the end of the lease. I think if that were to happen, it would be a statewide embarrassment--a disgrace. I hope that instead of waiting for that, the members of the House approve this bill.

# "Thank you."

Representative Peters rose to speak against the bill, stating;

"I think it is important for me to share with the members that these bills--3205, 2077, 2076--we're all part of the scheme to steal land and I mean steal.

"The surrender clause is presently in every one of our leases. It is in black and white just as every other provision that is binding on the landowner and the lessee.

"You know, I grew up in Nanakuli. Quite a few of my constituents, I guess have visited OP, stood before the court and the judge and says, 'Gee, your honor, I never understand the law. I never understand the contract.' And guess what the judge told him? 'Ignorance of the law is no excuse.'

"Now I take Representative Hayes as a rather sophisticated, articulate, and very intelligent lessee, along with the countless others who are out there.

"We just got through a report. Most of you had an opportunity to read it. The administration has decided to spend over a hundred thousand dollars on. Some of those indicators, some of the data are rather revealing. Do you realize that 70 percent of the lessees there are not owner/occupants? They're investors. They're speculators. So they are making money out of that lease. This morning's newspaper, THE ADVERTISER, rather revealing--SOLD, when the price is right. It talks about this couple who were kind of disturbed initially when the realtor came to her and asked her to consider selling. But eventually, the price got right. They sold for \$6million. That's on lease property. What did the lessor get? What did the landowner get? He's locked into a lease rent for thirty years. Six percent of the property value was way back when? Back in 1959 or what have you.

"When you pass a law here mandating that they sell, I tell you what--the Princess is turning over in her grave to think that you would rip off her beneficiaries. Who do you think you're kidding? You're breaking a contract. Everyone of around here knows about giving your word, shaking hands. We signed the contract even with our constituents that we represent their best interests and welfare here and do what is right.

"Bishop Estate is tired of being the scapegoat. We're not going to take it anymore. At least I am not going to. You're not going to rip off the Hawaiians anymore. Last year was the year to celebrate the Hawaiians, right? The Year of the Hawaiians! This is the year to screw the Hawaiians--right? Well, you come on--who do you think you're kidding?

"Thirty/twenty-five is taking. The courts have ruled that, and any one of those Representatives here who say that this kind of provision in a lease contract is unconscionable, then take it to court! We have a fair process here in America. If it is unconscionable, take it to court. That's where you get your remedy. But every darn time somebody has a problem with the big guy--the big unions, big corporations, Bishop Estate, big landowner, let's get it in the law. These guys are monsters. They're unconscionable--right?

"We've done more for housing than any other entity in this State and I dare anybody to challenge me on that. You show me! We got involved way back--when? Representative Crozier, two years ago, stood on this floor and shared the fact that when his father was here, they pointed fingers at Bishop Estate for not making their lands available for housing, for not making the attempt to assist in providing for the housing needs of people in this State. My predecessors did their job--they opened their lands up. They got involved with FHA 235 and 236. They locked themselves into lease rents for thirty yearsfixed, at six percent return! You think that's a fair return?

"How many of you can go to the bank today and borrow \$100-, \$200-, \$300,000 at six percent? Or any amount of money for six percent? We did it. So, who's ripping off who?

"And on that basis, you listen to a few loud mouths out there that have no basis for their arguments and you turn around and rip us off, and you call that justice, right?

"Who's unconscionable? Who's unconscionable?

"Our surrender clause is in black and white. It's part of a contract, a contract that has been approved by the Real Estate Commission and all the other parties involved. You know what this problem represents, Mr. Speaker? It's lessees ripping off lessees and they're blaming the lessor.

"Well, I'll tell you what. The law prohibits the lessor-the landowner--from getting involved with assignments, from getting involved with lesse selling that lease some other individual. Now, if you got us involved, that's another matter. But you prohibit us from doing that. And you blame us?

"The surrender clause, the lease rents, the total package of a lease is all part of and parcel of one another. They are all inter-related. You just can't come in the middle of a football game, after the first half, and decide to change the rules on us and say that's fair because it isn't fair!

At this point, Representative Apo interrupted and yielded his ten minutes to Representative Peters.

Representative Peters thanked Representative Apo and continued his remarks, saying:

"What I think is fair to say is that we're sick and tired of being the scapegoat when, in fact, we've done more than our share in providing for the needs of housing in this State and I mean affordable housing.

"I hope all of you vote this unconscionable measure down.

"Thank you."

Representative Hirono rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this session the Housing and Consumer Protection and Commerce Committees have spent many hours addressing the issues of lease rent renegotiation, mandatory lease to fee conversion, surrender clause issues. These bills did not represent a scheme to steal land. These bills represented an effort to address the real concerns on the part of lessees.

"What we have before us is a bill that deals with the surrender clause. The Housing Finance and Development Corporation study on the leasehold conversion issue for condos and co-ops found that many lessees were totally unaware and, in fact, continued to be unaware that surrender clauses exist in their leases. There are some 98,000 condo units in the State of which over 60 percent are in leasehold. This translates into over 60,000 leasehold condos in the State with these types of surrender clauses in their leases. And, of course, 60,000 condo units translate into many more people living in these units than 60,000. "We know that the lessees were astounded, astonished to find out that at the end of their lease, they would have to simply walk away from their units without any compensation for all of the money that they put at the time, the sweat, their tears, into their units. They were supposed to just walk away. This is patently unfair. This represents thousands of dollars, as I said, in the sweat of the lessees. We realize that there are lessors who also put in a lot of sweat and tears and all of that.

"You know, this is a very difficult issue. Nobody stands here saying that this is a simple issue and gee, all we have to do is pass this bill and everything is going to be fantastic. You know, people on both sides of this issue have very seriously considered this and we are attempting to do what is fair.

"What is called for in this bill is that at the end of the lease term, the lessee be given a ten-year extension of the lease term or compensation for the fair market value of the improvements to the project. In addition, this bill prohibits the use of surrender clauses henceforth in these types of lease contracts so that henceforth, we never have to be faced with this type of contract which results in people having to walk away from their units after having spent thousands and thousands of dollars of their money, only to be told, gee, goodbye, you get nothing. This is really an attempt on our part to address some very serious societal concerns on the part of lessees. You know, some issues raise such serious community and societal concerns that it is not good enough for us to say, take it to court, resolve it there. That is not a responsible response in my opinion. And this is a bill that says, lessees we want to address your genuine concerns.

"I urge my colleagues to vote in favor of this measure."

Representative Crozier rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to use my second time speaking against this measure.

"The last speaker mentioned that some of the lessees had to walk away from their lease. Let me get back to the time frame again. We talk about 55 years, 65 years, 75 years, some of these leases are tied down to. Who walks away after 75 years? If you're 20 years old when you bought the property, nobody is going to walk away. If you're still around, you're going to be in a wheelchair-you'll be rolled out of that place. It's unrealistic to think that these people are going to stay the length of their contract. Maybe the people in between have moved it on, have sold to each other, and the last one has the short term.

"That's not the landowners fault. The landowner has been sitting there, in some cases for 75 years, waiting their turn and the odds are that they ain't going to walk away when it's over. It's going to be their kids or their grandchildren. Two generations down the line, we're locking them in. That's my main concern.

"Mr. Speaker, let me share with you why I feel so strongly about this.

"Last year was the celebration of the Bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution. I made it a point to learn as much as I could about the issue. I watched every documentary on TV. I watched the Bork hearings, the Iran-Contra hearings, I got any book I could find to read up about the Constitution. I even took a class in Constitutional Law so that I could kind of understand almost as much as many of my colleague here--the lawyers, our great lawyers who spent years studying the Constitution. You know, while I was studying, sir, one of things I did understand, or come to understand, is why America is great. America is great because we have a middle-class system. We have the middle-class. You look around this room, I don't think anyone will raise their hands to say that they come from royalty. Most of us brag that we come from the peasant stock but every one of our parents and grandparents had the dream to get everyone of us out, get us out of the peasant class and become middle-class Americans. And part of being a middle-class American is being educated and taking on responsibilities.

"The other part about being middle-class is the right to private ownership. These people who got their lands now are just a bit ahead of the rest of us. Why are we trying to take away from these landowners? Why, because they have been able to get a hold of land so from that they were able to get their kids educated so they can become lawyers.

"Mr. Speaker, our grandparents and our parents wanted us to do what is right--not necessarily what is popular. That's why they worked the canefields. That's why they worked the pineapple fields, so that they can create the arena so that their kids can benefit, and the middle-class system in America, the free enterprise, is that arena. Now, if we're going to be in that arena, let's play properly. I challenge every one of my colleagues here, and especially you lawyers that understand the Constitution, that understand property rights--what are we doing? Are you making your grandparents proud of you?

"Mr. Speaker, next year we are going to celebrate the year of the Chinese. This year we celebrating the year of the Okinawans, or it's a couple of years away. Last year it was the year of the Hawaiians, couple of years ago it was the year of the Japanese--everybody have their time of the year of some nationality. When they came, they came as peasants and they look at you folks now. They're proud. They say, from my loins look what I produced! The leaders of Hawaii! Act like leaders of Hawaii. Look into yourself. Dig down, dig down and see if you're doing what is right, what is proper.

"Mr. Speaker, thank you very much."

Representative Tom rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, it is a difficult moment for me to get up here to speak on this because, as you know and this body knows that I've always supported the rights of lesseesalways. I have lessors, I have lessees in my district. I am going to vote against this bill. I think it is important that in explanation for my vote, I owe it to my constituents.

"You know, I don't see this bill as any kind of scheme to be very honest. I don't see this bill as a lease versus fee bill. That's not why I'm voting down.

"When I was in law school many years ago, one of the classes that I took was Contract Law. Contract Law which was taught to me has an offer, an acceptance, and consideration. It's a binding document. That's what I was taught. One of the sacred things when two people enter into a contract, they make an agreement, whether it's in writing or oral. You know, even after I went to law school, I became a lawyer and I am very proud now to be a legislator.

"One of the things that I have always maintained in whatever I did, or whatever I do, is to keep my word. If I make an agreement with anyone, I will not break it. That's important. That's what trust is about; that's what honor is about; that's what this whole system is about. Of course, we have to be aware of what we are doing but I don't think one makes an agreement without being aware of what he is doing.

"In this bill, it not only seeks to abolish the surrender clause but it seeks to abolish this clause since January 1950, to all leases that had the surrender clause since January 1950. We're not talking about future agreements; we're talking about retroactive agreements. And I don't think anyone could respect me for going up to anyone of you here in this room today and say that agreements that I've made with each and every one of you five years ago, ten years ago, fifteen years ago, whatever it is, I'm breaking it. I can't imagine that.

"And I think that this bill goes a lot deeper than just a matter of fee versus lease, and the surrender clauses in the future. It goes a lot deeper than that because it seeks to change and amend contracts which were made, some, what 38 years ago to now. I can't buy that, Mr. Speaker, and I think that before we make such a law merely to try to clear up inequities, I am a firm believer that if there is an inequity, let's fix it and let's deal with it, but let's not break agreements that were in black and white because it goes a lot deeper than a fee versus lease.

"We're hitting at the entire concept of trust, of honor, of agreements, and that's what this whole system is about. And that's why I am voting down, not because I don't agree with them--lessees or lessors--because I try to be fair in all decisions that I make. We all here try to be fair. Well, let's consider what we're doing in this matter when we look at our own everyday dealings in life.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Shito rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, very briefly, I must say this to all the members of this House that the three bills that came before us, it was deliberated, it had a fair hearing, it moved out of Committee, and we are following due process. And today it is before this entire body for further consideration.

"The two prior bills that were mentioned, 2076 and 2077, got that, and this bill before us now is for that process so let us begin that process.

"Thank you."

At 7:07 o'clock p.m., Representative Peters asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 7:11 o'clock p.m.

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I didn't intend to speak against the bill; however, Mr. Speaker, since I've been on lease land for some 27-1/2 years and I sold fee simple to go into lease, I thought it only proper to tell you in my thirty years of marriage, 27-1/2 years on lease land is a lot of years. I signed two contracts. The first, for 7-1/2 years. I lived in the home, we were going to move to Kahaluu, put the house up for sale and somebody broke the contract. They decided not to sell the home in Kahaluu. But my lease land in Enchanted Lakes had the clause--the surrender clause. I went two blocks down the road. I've been in my home now for almost 22 years. The clause was in the second.

I am not the brightest person in the world but when I sign something, I sure as had to sit down with my wife, sit down with somebody that we decide is intelligent enough to give us all of the information and in there, they told us what we were getting. My reason for selling fee to go to lease was that I had about 10,500 square feet in Waimanalo but I wanted a better home, a better neighborhood, and a better school for my daughter. For that reason I moved.

"And if it was not for Bishop Estate and Joe Pao, I would have never had the opportunity at 26 years of age to get a three bedroom, a bath and a half, a two-car garage, all of the appliances, and the disposal for \$18,500. Not in those days. Also when I bought my home which was FHA-approved, the Joe Pao Company made a mistake. They said that my garage should have had a cement garage, not a wooden. The guy called me up and said, 'Whitney, we made a mistake. However, if you go ahead and pursue it, by contract you can make us build a wall.' I said, 'That's not what I bought, that's not what our agreement was,' and we got the wooden.

"So, ladies and gentlemen, what you get you should read exactly what the contract is all about. I'm not saying that I agree with Bishop Estate, or Castle, or Campbell, or anybody else. But contracts are something that we all have to live by regardless of whether they're right or they're wrong. And if they're wrong, you try to find another way to get out of them. You don't try to force them to sell what they have to get out of it, to change the laws that they have to get out of it.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Peters rose and stated:

"I want to point out to you, Mr. Speaker and members, the Chairman of CPC has clearly indicated that the report weighed in behalf of the lessee. It was lessee concerns, as she indicated, they were considered.

"I want all of you to know they are all sensitive, caring, small landowners out there that you're tampering with. It's not Bishop Estate only, Kamehameha Schools. What about those small landowners who worked awfully hard to save their money, to buy the land, to build the condominium for the purposes of improving themselves and their families and offering them a better life. What about those people?

"House Bill 2077 was designed to leave those owners out. But not this bill. They are directly affected by this and you are forcing them to give up an asset to an investor. Seventy percent of the condominium lessee owners are investors--speculators. What kind of rationale do you have for breaking the contract and forcing a landowner to give his or her asset, forcing them now, giving his or her asset to an investor. And guess what? Quite a few of those investors don't even live here in Hawaii and it is a windfall for them. Hallelujah! The landowner is a resident of Hawaii. He pays taxes here. He raises his kids or her kids, and it's their land, and you're forcing them to sell to foreigners? Not for selling, I mean take, if you will. You're breaking a contract, their contract, and you're forcing them to eat it. You're taking an asset from them and you're giving it to rip off artists. You think you'll be proud of that kind of legislation?

"Yes, I think you should stand up and be counted, shove aside all those euphorisms and the bull, read the bill. Like Representative Tom says, it's breaking the contract. It's going all the way back to 1950, and you're giving it to speculators. In addition to that, you're giving it to foreigners too--nonresidents. I hope you're proud of that.

#### "Thank you."

Representative Crozier then rose and requested a Roll Call vote.

Roll Call having been requested, the motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 3205, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LEASEHOLDS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 26 ayes to 24 noes, with Representatives Alcon, Anderson, Andrews, Apo, Bellinger, Bunda, Cavasso, Crozier, Honda, M. Ige, Ihara, Kanoho, Kawakami, Leong, Medeiros, O'Kieffe, Oshiro, Peters, Say, Souki, Tajiri, Taniguchi, Tom and Yoshimura voting no, and Representative Horita being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 3205 had passed Third Reading at 7:24 o'clock p.m.

"To Representative Bertha Kawakami, whom we are privileged now having among our ranks, to the Kawakami children, Wendell, Kendall and Lyndell, and others in the Kawakami family, we share with you on this day the sorrow and the joys of reminiscing. "Members, please rise and join me in a moment of silence before we recess and remain standing for the appropriate motion to recess."

The members of the House of Representatives then rose for a moment of silence in memory of the late Richard A. Kawakami.

## SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Anderson and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

#### UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 832-88 on H.B. No. 2483, HD 2:

By unanimous consent, action was deferred to the end of the calendar.

### THIRD READING

The following bills, which were on the calendar for Third Reading, were read throughout and the following actions taken: Representative Souki moved that H.B. No. 2081, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Souki rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, to some degree, a great deal has been said about this bill that we have before us, and there was an exposure in the press, in television, so without going into great depth, I would want to include my remarks in the Journal if I could, Mr. Speaker. However, I would want to, if I could, summarize the speech and possibly acknowledge some people who worked very hard to provide us with this budget here."

Directed by the Chair to "please proceed," Representative Souki continued:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, the document that you have before you is one that has taken many hours and many days and, in fact, you can say about a year to prepare. In this document, what it contains is a great vision for the future, what we have been talking about, to prepare for future alternatives for the State. And this has come about because of your leadership, Mr. Speaker, in appointing, during the interim, the special committees on telecommunications, space ports, on the convention center, access -- all of these gave us the impetus and the information and the research that we needed and, of course, including that is the waterfront. To come back and bring all of the information that was gathered during the interim and provide this information to the caucus and to the subject matter committee chairmen, together with the assistance of the subject matter committee chairmen who went on to provide the necessary information and bring it up to the Finance Committee for their passage. And so, Mr. Speaker and members, what you have here is a product that has not sprung up overnight, but has taken months to come into a full vision -- something that we can be very proud of and I think that the State can be proud of this House for doing such a great job.

"And furthermore, Mr. Speaker and members of this House, I would like to thank, of course, the staff of the Finance Committee who has worked so hard in the preparation of this document here. Literally, day and night, it takes a special kind of person to sit in the Finance Committee and yet some of them come back and they volunteer to come back the following year again. I have never quite understood that but thank God that we have people like that who are willing to serve us with the great kind of pay that we provide for them.

"And, of course Mr. Speaker, I also want to thank the Majority Attorney's Office, the House Research, for being so cooperative and working so hard, especially with the Majority package, and the subject matter committee chairmen who worked very hard in their subject area and beginning to meet with them and going over them individually on their particular subject matter areas where they feel so strongly about and they advocated so hard for to put their needs in the budget which is recorded in here, and I wish to commend them for an excellent job and for being so understanding.

"And I also want to thank the members of the Finance Committee without whom we would not have this document. It is only through the Finance Committee approval, insight, understanding, analyses and recommendations can we come up with a budget like this, and I thank them very much for their understanding and for their hard work.

"And Mr. Speaker and members, I want to give special attention to a person in the Finance Committee who has worked very hard, especially during the last two weeks. There was a personal crisis in my family and she took over where I left off, and she did an excellent job and I would like to commend the Vice Chairperson for doing an excellent job in carrying on the ball and leading the Finance Committee in my absence, and she has been a delight to work with.

"So, members of the House, I hope you will look upon this document and vote for it accordingly.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker and members."

Representative Souki's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, House Bill 2081, House Draft 1, represents a product in which:

one) each member of the committee had full opportunity in determining the funding of the programs of our State; and

two) each subject matter chairmen shared their views and recommendations.

"In addition, this budget reflects the findings of the budget oversight activities which were conducted during the interim.

"There were two overriding concerns in formulating this budget. First, to remedy the operational problems which have been stifled in the past by a lack of adequate resources.

"Second, to lay the foundation for Hawaii's role in the Pacific Basin. The future economy of Hawaii cannot rest only on tourism, but in the exploration and realization of the economic importance of Hawaii's location in attracting investment from the business worlds of the east and west.

"By developing Hawaii as a center for world-wide commerce and industry, a solid and diverse economy will need to be created to ensure greater job opportunities for the future generations of our State.

"This bill provides the resources necessary to address the operational problems which have been previously left unattended.

"For our schools, your Committee has funded:

- \* an increase in teachers and support staff;
- \* improvements in educational equipment; and
- \* the upgrading of our school facilities, along with implementation of preventative maintenance measures to ensure an environment which is conducive to learning.

For our children and families, your Committee has funded:

- programs to strengthen and enrich the family nucleus by providing for quality child care programs; and
- \* an increase in the workforce for prevention of abuse and neglect of our children and senior citizens.

For the health of our people, your Committee funded:

- expansion of our emergency medical services, particularly in the rural areas of our State, to assure prompt and timely medical services to all citizens;
- additional preventive and community based programs for the physically handicapped and mentally ill; and
- \* complimentary programs to combat the spread and fear of AIDS.

"This bill also provides the resources needed to meet the challenge of establishing Hawaii's role as a leader in the Pacific.

"For economic development, your Committee has funded programs in the areas of the space industry, telecommunication, and waterfront redevelopment.

"For the University, your Committee has funded higher education programs to facilitate technological research and to conduct innovative demonstration projects for the development of new businesses.

"In conclusion, Mr. Speaker, this bill provides the supplemental funding needed to take positive actions to improve the manner and efficiency in which our state government operates and delivers quality services to the people of our State.

"Furthermore, this bill accentuates our commitment today of meeting the far-reaching challenges of tomorrow.

"Mr. Speaker, I recommend passage of this bill and urge all members of this body to vote favorably.

"Thank you."

Representative Tam rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the House budget for public schools and libraries reaffirms our commitment to quality education in Hawaii. An additional \$19.4-million is included in the education budget of the House.

"The House has responded to the long standing problem of establishing a systematic maintenance program for our school facilities. Ten million dollars has been added to the \$21.7-million already in the budget to sustain the accelerated pace of repairs and to initiate the planning for a computerized maintenance schedule. This appropriation is not merely a short-term expenditure to repair our schools; it is also a long-term investment in a plan which will guarantee that our school facilities will not be allowed to fall apart before our eyes which was the case in past years. In addition, \$500,000 has been added for night security at high-risk schools.

"In response to new staffing goals passed by the Board of Education last year, the House budget has included \$5.3-million to hire three hundred and fifty-three employees, which are teachers and educational assistants, for our special education classes. We hope that this improvement in education programs for the handicapped will result in a reduction of law suits brought against the Department of Education by parents of special education children. We believe that it will also mean that some of these children will be returned to the regular classes more rapidly which will result in substantial savings in the long run for education. "For some time, the Department of Education has had a problem retaining personnel in temporary positions. A 1986 Auditor's report recommended that the Department make a determination of which temporary positions should be converted to permanent positions, based on projections regarding future staffing needs for each program, and report their findings to us. The Department did this last year and in this budget we have allowed for the conversion of up to one thousand eight hundred and eighteen positions.

"Funds have also been added for an automated financial management system and continuation of the learning centers at high schools. In addition, \$300,000 has been included for the parent networking program at the school level.

"The parenting networking centers have been very successful in involving parents in the education of their children. This grass-roots effort is the result of a pilot program which was concluded in 1986. It should ultimately reach all public schools in the State. I can think of no programs more important to quality education. If we are to achieve quality eduction in Hawaii, there is no better way than to expand this valuable program.

"Funds have also been added for the public libraries in terms of new bookmobiles, ten new library employees, expanded security services, and an automated catalog for the library for the blind.

"Education continues to be a top priority of the House of Representatives. The schools and libraries in every district will benefit directly from the improvements included in this budget. On a recent trip to Taiwan at my own expense last year, I was greatly impressed with the substantial investments of money in education made by the government there. The Chinese people say that their economic miracle which includes a trade surplus with the United States of over eighty billion dollars is a direct result of their large investment in education. If we are to be a Pacific power, we would be well advised to follow their lead.

"I thank my members, colleagues, and their staff for being instrumental in putting together the State's education budget.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Liu rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill but with some serious reservations.

"Mr. Speaker, the Chairman of the Finance Committee extolled the virtues of this budget and its vision for the future, and his points about some sort of cohesive view that this budget will bring for this State. With all due respect, Mr. Speaker, I think this budget is no better or no worse than past budgets. I think we still have the system's problems that we have had in the past, basically piecemeal putting things together. Hopefully, the numbers will add up.

"We look at the numbers and our hardworking staff indicates that we're somewhere around \$459-million of new money in this budget, not including new CIP, and that amounts to about a 16% increase in new moneys which is quite a difference from past practices where, in fact, in fiscal years 1976-77, we had increases of only 4%; in 1978-79, an increase of 1.8%; 1980-81, an increase of 5.4%; 1982-83, an increase of 2.5%; 1984-85, a .04\%; 1986-87, 1.9\%; and now we're shooting up to 16%. Looks like we are doing a job on the surplus. And that does not include a lot of separate bills which we passed the other night which are not yet included in the budget.

"It will be interesting to see how all of these pieces will fit in some grand picture that won't end up looking like a duckbill platypus. A piece here and a piece there and we're wondering what we got.

"But there are some good things in the bill. I think the points mentioned by the Chairman of the Education Committee makes a lot of sense. We have spent much too long in the area of special education and not addressing it and have opened ourselves up to a lot of problems in those areas, so I am happy to see an initiative in those areas.

"I am happy to see that the budget includes a number of small appropriations but those which will have broad impact such as the ice/air cooling machines, both at Kamuela and Kula, which will help the agricultural sector in those areas.

"But, Mr. Speaker, in terms of whether or not this budget actually directs us in an area toward a better tomorrow, I have serious doubts and, hopefully, that will occur by the end of the session and if not, fine, but let's call the budget what it is--a difficult process under the circumstances and one which is far from anything which I think we can really be totally proud of.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hagino rose and stated:

"I rise to speak in favor of this bill and I believe, at least in my area, the area of human services, and for that I thank all the members of the Committee. I do feel that in the area of human services, there clearly is a better tomorrow for the constituency that are most impacted by the area of human services. I cannot think of a subject matter that has been left untouched by this budget.

"We have added funds to meet the growing concerns of the elderly. In addition to all of the programs mentioned in the committee report such as the various demonstration projects of providing housing assistance by a separate bill passed earlier, we are meeting the needs of the elderly in terms of medicaid services by providing them with a new concept of long-term health care called Adult Day Health.

"In the area of child care, we have provided much needed funds for parenting information hotline, for parenting switchboard, increased services to help train more child care providers to meet the growing need that working parents have for their children.

"In the area of juvenile services, we will be providing more funds to create alternatives for our juveniles who may happen to come to trouble with the law. These services would leave them away from incarceration at the Hawaii Youth Correctional Facility.

"In the area of public assistance, we are giving a much needed increase in the public assistance amount to those who are most needy in our society.

"In the area of veterans' services, we are creating a new Office of Veterans Affairs which will be given the kind of attention that has long been neglected in the past. They will be assigned to the Department of Defense and in addition to that, we will be providing, hopefully this session, a sight for a new cemetery for the veterans. "In the area of family abuse and neglect, additional funds have been provided. For pregnant mothers, we have now expanded the medicaid services so that pregnant women can have health services immediately, at the very moment when a family care is most critical.

"So I cannot think of a single subject area in the area of human services that has been neglected. I think that Hawaii is at a period of greatness in its history and I think that this budget, certainly in my area, reflects that great potential--the human potential--of all of our citizens to participate in a better tomorrow.

"For that, I thank the members of the Committee, the staff in my office and the Vice Chairman's office, the staff of Finance, and all the members of the Finance Committee, especially the Chairman and the Vice Chairman.

"Thank you."

Representative Taniguchi rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with regard to higher education, I believe the University, under this budget, has done very well. This year's budget looks boldly toward the future, yet at the same time, reflects the immediate and real needs of the University.

"With regard to culture and the arts, I am happy to report that additional moneys have been appropriated for many worthy projects.

"Mr. Speaker, please allow me to take this opportunity to commend Chairman Souki, Vice Chair Fukunaga, members of the Finance Committee, along with the Finance Committee staff, for a job well done.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2081, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes, with Representatives Alcon, Bellinger, Hemmings, Jones, Leong and Levin being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 2081 had passed Third Reading at 9:17 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 3102, HD 1:

Representative Souki moved that H.B. No. 3102, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Souki then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I wish to speak for the motion. In the interest of time, I want to include my remarks in the Journal."

The Chair "so ordered."

Representative Souki's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker and members, the bill before you amends Act 218, Session Laws of Hawaii 1987, and provides supplemental appropriations to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs for fiscal year 1989.

"In reviewing this request, your Committee on Finance focused on the delivery of the programs which would benefit the Hawaiian people. "To strengthen the execution of programs, funds have been provided to improve OHA's administrative efforts. Resources have also been provided to facilitate the development of a land management plan.

"The supplemental appropriations contained in this bill will ensure OHA's ability to provide services and programs integrated with other state and private agencies in our community.

"Mr. Speaker, I recommend passage of House Bill 3102, House Draft 1, and urge the members of this body to vote favorably.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 3102, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE OFFICE OF HAWAIIAN AFFAIRS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes, with Representatives Alcon, Bellinger, Hemmings, Jones, Leong and Levin being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 3102 had passed Third Reading at 9:18 o'clock p.m.

#### MATTER DEFERRED FROM EARLIER ON THE CALENDAR

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2483, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Souki's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill provides supplemental appropriations for the Judiciary for fiscal year 1989. It amends Act 375 which was passed last session.

"Mr. Speaker, your Committee on Finance carefully reviewed the supplemental requests by the Judiciary in conjunction with recommendations submitted by your Committee on Judiciary.

"This bill will assure the necessary resources for implementation of protective services to those children and families coming before the family courts.

"Funding was also included to facilitate the efforts of the court workers who carry out the mandated responsibilities of our court system. This will be achieved by the funding of electronic data processing throughout our State court system.

"Mr. Speaker, the funding will enable the courts to respond to the judicial needs of the people of our State, and provide services in an efficient and timely manner.

"Mr. Speaker, I recommend passage of House Bill 2384, House Draft 2, and urge the members of this body to vote in favor of this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Metcalf rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I would just like to thank the Finance Chairman, the Finance Committee, and the Finance staff for the hard work that they did on this budget.

"I urge my colleagues to support it.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2483, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE JUDICIARY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes, with Representatives Alcon, Bellinger, Hemmings, Jones, Leong and Levin being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 2483 had passed Third Reading at 9:19 o'clock p.m.

At 9:20 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 9:25 o'clock p.m.

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Anderson and carried, S.B. No. 3011, SD 1, passed First Reading by title and further action was deferred.

They were accompanied by Grace Dixon of Representative Lee's Office.

Some Girl Scouts have brought them to the Capitol for, this morning, they were in the Governor's Office where he signed a Proclamation recognizing the 76th anniversary of the Girl Scouts and to show Hawaii's appreciation for the thousands of girls who have benefitted from this organization over the years."

## INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

No. 163, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING JAMES CORREA FOR BEING NAMED VOLUNTEER AMATEUR COACH OF THE YEAR BY THE UNITED STATES BASEBALL FEDERATION," was jointly offered by Representatives Takamine, Alcon, Andrews, Apo, Arakaki, Bellinger, Bunda, Cachola, Cavasso, Crozier, Fukunaga, Hagino, Hashimoto, Hayes, Hemmings, Hiraki, Hirono, Honda, D. Ige, Ihara, Isbell, Jones, Kanoho, Kihano, Kotani, Lee, Levin, Liu, Marumoto, Metcalf, Okamura, O'Kiefie, Oshiro, Ribellia, Say, Shon, Souki, Tajiri, Taniguchi, Tom and Yoshimura. On motion by Representative Takamine, seconded by Representative Tajiri and carried, H.R. No. 163 was adopted.

Representative Takamine rose and proceeded to introduce the honoree, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this morning, it is indeed an honor to introduce to the members of this House a person who has not only brought pride to the Big Island community, but a person who has brought pride to the State of Hawaii.

"The resolution, Mr. Speaker, speaks clearly of the role Jimmy Correa has played in our community and, therefore, I will not reiterate what has already been stated.

"However, I would like to underscore that Jimmy is really the epitome of a family man and has, with his good wife, Kikue, nurtured and raised a family of eight children, including Alan, Mary, Christine, Aileen, James Jr., George Thomas, and Andrew. And, Mr. Speaker, it is in addition to maintaining a solid family life that Jimmy has devoted so much of his personal time to coaching so many Big Island ball players. He has touched the lives of many, many players and the Correa touch has not only meant developing keener baseball skills, it has also meant developing much character.

"Mr. Speaker, before introducing our honoree, I would like to further note that though Jimmy has retired from active coaching, he still remains active in the community. And if I can just mention some of the organizations that benefit from his many talents, they would include being a Commander for the American Legion, Aloha Post 16, being the President of the Big Island Umpires Association, being the Patriotic Officer for the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Onizuka Post 4779, and being the Sports Activities Chairman for the Papaikou Senior Citizens Club.

"Mr. Speaker, it is with much pride that I introduce to you and my fellow colleagues, Mr. Jimmy Correa."

Representative Takamine then asked the honoree, Mr. James Correa, to stand to be recognized. Accompanying Mr. Correa was his youngest son, Andrew. "Andrew is presently a student at the University of Hawaii at Manoa and I believe was coached by his father for approximately twelve years or so. He is presently preparing to become a teacher and, in fact, with Andy, five of the eight Correa children are presently teachers by profession."

Representative Takaine then asked Andrew to stand to be recognized.

White carnation leis were presented to Mr. Correa and Andrew by Representatives Hirono and Isbell, respectively, while Representative Takamine presented the honoree with a certified copy of the resolution.

Representative Tajiri then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would just like to share some thoughts with my colleagues here and yourself. I guess all of you know that this is the first time I've picked up the mike to say anything on this floor this year and I think in the last few years that I have been here.

"But it gives me great honor and privilege to be a part of acknowledging this great gentleman from Hilo. I feel that this honor has been long awaited. Most of us youth from Hilo have either played for Jimmy or have in some way been affected by this great man. Jimmy really is someone that is a good role model that the youth of Hilo can follow. I've played for him, I've coached against him, and in all the games that I have seen him participate in and also with the practices and everything, he has carried himself as a gentleman and as a terrific role model.

"My congratulations to you, Jimmy, and thank you very much."

Representative Levin rose and stated:

"May I also briefly say this is a time when we pay homage to a very fine individual but I don't want people to think that he is perfect. In spite of his skills, he could never teach me how to hit a curve ball.

"Thank you."

Representative Metcalf rose and remarked:

"Inasmuch as all my Big Island colleagues have commented on the virtues of Mr. Correa, I would just like to also add that in 1980, when Puueo and Wainaku were part of the House district I was running in, Mr. Correa passed brochures for me."

Representative Isbell rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I will leave any comments about the League of Women Voters to Representative Lee, but at this time, I would like to mention that Representative Lee is one of the male members of the League of Women Voters and in consonant, there is recognized today that the wife of Allen Saunders who helped to found the League of Women Voters is here with us.

"I would like to introduce the people here, our guests, and Representative Lee will make some comments after which we will do our presentation."

Representative Isbell then asked the following honorees to stand to be recognized: Arlene Kim Ellis, President of the League of Women Voters; Dorothy Lum, Vice President; Katherine Low, Director; Marion Saunders, the wife of one of the founders; and Dorothy Murdock who is a member of the League of Women Voters.

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I am very proud to be a member of the League of Women Voters, and today, the members of the League are very proud because they are celebrating the 40th anniversary of this community-minded organization.

"When I first learned about the League, mostly through the debates which it sponsored, but about five years ago when I was on the Mililani Neighborhood Board, I found the League a great resource organization in land use, land planning, and in the environment. In this respect, the League has played a major role in the dialogue about how we plan to develop our island and the whole State of Hawaii.

"May I refer to a communication which was sent only a month ago by Arlene Ellis, President of the League, in which she evaluated the administration's housing proposals in Ewa and she found them worthy of consideration because the program is in accordance with basic general plan and land use policies for a secondary urban center in Ewa. This is the tenor of the League's contributions to education, not only to the public, but also of public officials.

"Last year, in October, the League published one of its many studies. It was entitled, <u>Should There Be a Board</u> of Eduction Primary Election?

"The League itself does not take a position but by presenting the pros and cons, it helps you understand the problem and really points you towards a solution. It says that the arguments for a primary election for the Board of Education are that the field be narrowed so the voters could focus on fewer candidates to learn their qualifications and positions. The media may give more publicity because it is easier for the media to cover a smaller number of candidates. Then there will be debates or TV or radio interviews. The Legislature, that is the House, has answered this question in the positive. We have passed on Third Reading House Bill 2049.

"This is the kind of stuff the League has helped us with and I am very proud to be associated with the League and to be able to draw on their resources.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Apo, Bunda, Ihara, D. Ige and O'Kieffe, while Representative Lee presented Ms. Ellis with a certified copy of the resolution.

"In this area, we have other departments who have the responsibility, who have the staff who can do this type of action planning--DLNR, the Department of Transportation, HCDA, to name a few. I can see down the road this resolution and others like it setting us up for not only a big price tag in the end, but in terms of bureaucracy, request by the Office of State Planning for more personnel because we have given them more responsibilities to handle.

"So, I raise the red flag now. I will be voting against this motion for the reason stated. I hope my colleagues join me.

"I would ask the Clerk to have a 'no' vote recorded for me at the proper time.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I speak against the resolution and to save time, I wish that you would put the Minority Leader's words as my own into the Journal, please."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Hayes then asked Dr. James E. Hall to stand to be recognized.

"Linda Carlson who is the Executive Director of the Mental Health Center has been active in volunteer work for many years. She served on the Crisis Center and the Waimano Home but her main interest has been in the mental health field. Her professional background was in the area of management."

Representative Hayes then asked Linda Carlson to stand to be recognized.

Representative Marumoto then rose and stated:

"It is my real pleasure to give you a little background on Dr. Thomas S. Merrill because I am a long-time acquaintance of he and his wife and it's a real pleasure. I am really impressed with him.

"Dr. Merrill was born and raised in Hawaii. From 1970 to 1977, he was a Senior Vice President of Fawcett/McDermott/Cavanaugh, a major advertising agency here in Honolulu. He came back here and went into practice. He has been President of the Hawaii Psychological Association in 1984-85, and many of us have seen him here testifying. ## INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

- Representative Shon then rose to introduce the honorees, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, we have seated with us today some outstanding leaders in the promotion of health on really an international scale.

"Mr. Speaker, there are times when we think of wise international role in terms of trade, or telecommunications, or finance, or fisheries, or tourism, or other areas of economic development, but sometimes we forget that one of the most effective and meaningful areas of involvement with our Pacific and Asian neighbors is in terms of public health.

"And indeed, our School of Public Health has been in the forefront of international affairs and cooperation from world sanitation, projects in Indonesia to Headstart Projects in Micronesia and American Samoa, to helping with data systems for health promotion.

"And indeed, our University has been involved with a number of really interesting and exciting cooperative agreements with universities in Thailand, Beijing, Indonesia, Korea, Manila the Phillipines--all over the Pacific and Asia. We can really be proud that our outreach in this health area is creating the sense, I think, for ourselves for our own responsibility, that we have a role to play and we also have a lot to learn from these interactions.

"I would like to introduce, at this time, our distinguished guests.

"First of all, an individual who is really very important to the State of Hawaii, and many of you may not know but Dr. Windom directs the activities of the Public Health Service and this includes Health Resources and Services Administration, Alcohol Drug Abuse, Mental Health Administration, the Centers for Disease Control, Food and Drug Administration, the National Institutes of Health, and the Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry. The importance of the federal effort and our cooperation with this just cannot be underestimated, Mr. Speaker, so without further adieu, 1 would like to introduce a very important person who is Dr. Robert Windom."

Representative Shon then asked Dr. Windom to stand to be recognized.

"Also, Mr. Speaker, participating in many of these international events is an individual who really represents our teacher, our cooperator, the future of Hawaii in the Pacific; a person who is really a leader in public health, in Pacific/Asian affairs; someone who not only do we cooperate with but I think we're going to learn a great deal from as we mature in our role as being partners in the Pacific. I would like to introduce Dr. Jose T. Villagomez."

Representative Shon then asked Dr. Villagomez to stand to be recognized.

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"Joining our honorees today, Mr. Speaker, is the University's surgeon general, if you want; someone who has really taken the School of Public Health at the University into many, many international directions. He is involved in the Governor's Initiative for Pacific Basin International Health, and someone whom we can really be proud of in his association with the University of Hawaii--Dean Gerry Michael.

"And finally, Mr. Speaker, joining our honorees is an individual who is head of our Pacific Bio-Medical Research Center at the University. He is Project Coordinator for Research Centers for Minority Institutions and is very active in developing the laboratory training and other key components for AIDS infrastructure here in Hawaii--Dr. Fred Greenwood."

## INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 215 and 216) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

H.R. No. 215, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING AND COMMENDING THE ALOHA MEDICAL MISSION," was jointly offered by Representatives Cachola, Kihano, Alcon, Bunda, Apo and Hashimoto.

On motion by Representative Cachola, seconded by Representative Alcon and carried, H.R. No. 215 was adopted.

Representative Cachola rose to introduce the honorees, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and members of this honorable body, it is with great pride that I introduce to you the 1987 Aloha Medical Mission Team.

"The Aloha Medical Mission is a non-profit organization funded by the Philippine Medical Association of Hawaii in 1982. Since then, physicians and lay volunteers of the Aloha Medical Mission have been paying their own way, giving up their practices for ten days, and donating medical services, medicine and hospital supplies for different areas of the Philippines. In the last five years, they have served Bricol, Ilocos, Negros regions, and recently, Palawan Island.

"Palawan Island is a remote island on the southwestern edge of the Sulu Sea. It has a population of 400,000 people and is endemic for malaria. The Aloha Medical Mission Team went to Palawan and serviced approximately 3000 patients and performed about 300 surgeries and donated 60 large boxes of medical supplies in a period of five days. Six members of the team fell ill on the evening they arrived on Palawan Island. Though still weak, most of them were up the next day to see a seemingly endless line of patients under the blazing sun. It was a fantastic experience witnessing the miracles of the Mission.

"On behalf of the Aloha Medical Mission Team, I wish to express the lessons learned in this humbling experience. It is a good feeling to be able to give. In healing, the Mission members are being healed in return. In an environment torn with strife, the Mission members do not know the meaning of risk. In their willingness to help, they do not stop to ask if the patient if communist or not, good or bad, rich or poor--they don't discriminate. Towards the last day of the mission, the thoughts of the members were on the patients who will be left behind untreated. Deep into the night, they worked longer and longer to treat as many patients as possible.

"One doctor had a harrowing story to tell. He remembered seeing a patient unable to walk because his scar tissue connected both thighs and he is sentenced for life. On the last day of the mission, the doctor realized that this patient did not return for treatment. The doctor could not sleep that night so he looked for this patient early the following day all over town. He was relieved when the patient was found. Surgery separating the scar tissue was performed and the patient can now walk normally. "Mr. Speaker and members of this honorable body, it is my pleasure to individually present to you the 1987 Aloha Medical Mission Team. Please hold your applause until all members are acknowledged. Members of the Mission who are present, when your name is called please rise to be recognized. I know that there are about 25 members of the Mission, only six are here today. They are all busy people, Mr. Speaker."

"People who are unable to see for many years because of cataracts are now able to see. Thanks to Dr. Jorge Camara and Dr. George Plechaty, ophthalmologists.

"Children born with cleft lips or cleft palates who hated to look at themselves in the mirror and who are being ostracized in the school can now proudly smile and look at their classmates. Thanks to Drs. Ernest Spaulding, Don Parsa and Peter Johnson, plastic surgeons.

"A woman who had to walk several miles to be treated by the Mission is now free of ovarian tumor as large as a watermelon. Thanks to Drs. Alenita Pacpaco, James Wong and George Shimomura, obstetricians and gynecologists.

"Other surgeries were done by Dr. Ramon Sy, ear, nose and throat specialist, the leader of the group; Dr. Manuel Abundo, general surgeon; and Dr. Andrew Morgan, urologist.

"Among the lay volunteers are Mrs. Miriam Morgan, a registered nurse; Bill Edwards, who both assisted in the surgeries and Lillian Uy, Esquire, clinic and supply coordinator.

"Members who are busy putting patients to sleep so the surgeons could operate are Drs. Fred Pacpaco, Michael Maung, Cheng-Hock Seah, anesthesiologists.

"And approximately 2,700 medical cases were handled by Drs. Erlinda Cachola, co-leader of the Mission; Quentin Uy and Gildo Soriano, internists; Dr. Arturo Salcedo, pathologist; and Dr. Ned Stoughton, dermatologist.

"Comprising the media team who worked hard in documenting the good deeds of the Mission are Bob Campbell, Channel 9 cameraman; Rick Carroll, <u>Honolulu</u> <u>Advertiser</u> reporter; and Stacey Sakamoto of Channel 9, the lady known as the 'insect repellent lady' who saved the team from contracting malaria by sharing her insect repellent spray with everyone.

"Let us commend the members of the Mission for they are truly the ambassadors of goodwill for the State of Hawaii.

"Mr. Speaker and members of this honorable body, it is my pleasure to present to you the 1987 members of the Aloha Medical Mission."

Representative Cachola then asked the honorees to stand to be recognized.

Representative Apo then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it's not often that I am moved to offer floor remarks on a congratulatory resolution but I make an exception on this presentation.

"Mr. Speaker, this floor, over the years, has seen us honor many well-deserving individuals and organizations for high achievement. Without diminishing the accomplishments of others who have been invited to come before us, I believe this group, the Aloha Medical Mission is deserving of special recognition.

"Mr. Speaker, the Aloha Medical Mission is truly a mission of heart that underscores the word Aloha. It's a mission that transcends the global politics of nationalism, it's a mission that transcends the global politics of economics, and it's a mission that brings us face to face with tremendous human suffering transcending the fear for personal safety and requiring no small measure of personal sacrifice. It's a mission that brings full blossom to the spirit of Aloha...under the flag of this great state as an unsurpassed display of human caring from people to people substituting suffering and despair with hope.

"Mr. Speaker, of the many achievements brought to us from abroad by other citizens of Hawaii, I cannot think of one that makes me stand prouder than the Aloha Medical Mission.

"To the past and present members of this Mission, I say to you that the 51 members of this House salute you and stand in awe of the depth and new meaning that you bring to the word Aloha. May the flag of Hawaii and all it represents always fly proudly in the wind of human caring as a symbol of the heartbeat of its people. You do the people of this State great honor.

"Mr. Speaker, though I may be walking a thin line in setting perhaps undesired precedence for floor action, I am compelled to ask this House in joining me in a show of appreciation and pride in one of our own members who, along with his wife Erlinda, has served as one of the key players in the success of the Aloha Medical Mission."

Representative Apo then asked Representative Romy Cachola to stand to be recognized.

Floral leis and certified copies of the resolution were presented to the honorees by Representatives Apo, Hashimoto, Isbell, Hayes, Kawakami, Alcon and Cachola.

Representative Tam rose to introduce the honorees, stating:

"It is my pleasure to introduce to you four beautiful young women. I am proud to say that I can do that although I am married right now.

"We also have with us an eligible bachelor. He belongs to the Honolulu Chinese Jaycees.

"These beautiful young women are representatives of the Honolulu Chinese Jaycees, an organization that helps promote the culture and heritage of the Chinese community in Hawaii from the ages of 21 to 39 years old. As you may recall, previously in the session, we introduced the older generation of Chinese but now we have younger ones who also contribute much to society here in Hawaii. "Without any further ado, Mr. Speaker, I would like to introduce our honored guests."

#### ANNOUNCEMENTS

Representative Crozier rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, last Friday we passed many bills on Second Reading. I would like to take this opportunity to make a few comments about one specific bill, if I may. Asked by the Chair to "state the bill," Representative Crozier answered, "Senate Bill 251, a bill relating to State holidays."

Directed by the Chair to "proceed," Representative Crozier stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I am in favor of the bill but with some grave reservations and before I get to my reservations, I would just like to preface my remarks to show why I am supporting the bill.

"This bill deals with making Martin Luther King a State holiday and I am all for making that holiday for that gentleman.

"Going back into our American history, at the U.S. Constitutional Convention of 1787, even at that convention, in the debates with the North and the South, the blacks were only allowed to be considered only threefifths of a person. The North tried very hard to win the South over but they realized that they could not make the union one if they stayed on that issue. So it didn't happen until the Civil War where we finally got rid of slavery. And at that time three major amendments to the Constitution took place--the 13th, 14th and 15th Amendments: freeing the slaves, due process and equal protection under the law and also the right to vote.

"After that, by 1887, all legislative matters or legislative initatives dealing with civil rights came to a halt. For the country it was almost a hundred years when nothing happened in the legislative arena. The Supreme Court took the lead, a very slow lead, to try and find the balance."

At this point, Representative Anderson rose on a point of information and asked:

"Speaking on a bill that we had Friday which passed by title--doesn't speaking today set a precedence on this?"

The Chair answered:

"I am allowing Representative Crozier to just insert his reservations on this particular bill--Senate Bill 251, SD 1, HD 1."

#### Representative Anderson inquired:

"If you're going to set that kind of a precedence, does that mean then that others that want to speak against the State fund or other issues are going to be able to do so?"

The Chair answered:

"I will make the decision when the time comes."

Representative Anderson thanked the Chair.

Representative Crozier continued his remarks, saying:

"I thank the gentleman from Kailua to give me a chance to catch my breath and my thoughts. Now I can go on for a few more minutes.

"We're at 1877 where the Legislature stopped addressing the concerns of the Minorities. Nothing happened until 1956 when Rosa Park refused to go to the back of the bus in the South. She was eventually. . . they had a boycott and eventually she was tried and convicted. But in that boycott emerged a new leader. That leader was Martin Luther King. From there they were able to coalesce, bring the blacks together and eventually, through demonstrations in the South--in Birmingham, in the march of Selma--bring the agenda to the nation. And from there, through the use of TV, the middle-class America realized what was happening in the South.

"Then came the 1964 Civil Rights Amendment. With that, many things changed, sir. It didn't only change across the United States, it changed right here in Hawaii. Many of us forgot how the prejudices were here in Hawaii. Of the six major ethnic groups in Hawaii, all five of the six had different ways of manipulating the other ethnic groups. Only one was not able to have the clout to manipulate the rest and that was the Filipino group. The reason for that was because the Filipinos were still not part of the middle class. They were still, for use of a better word, in the peasantry. After that, had they been able to be in the middle class--own lands and property and what have you--they would have used the same ways or they would have found their own way to infringe upon the other groups just like the Haoles, the Japanese, the Hawaiians, the Portuguese, and the Chinese.

"Because of the Civil Rights movement, these things have come to pass. They're gone now. People don't even know about them but they were there. Mr. Speaker, you're old enough to remember. I was just old enough to experience things in 1964. For you young whippersnappers after 1964, you guys don't remember. They're all gone and I won't go into the details. I don't want to dredge up too much of the old negative history of Hawaii.

"The point I am trying to make, Mr. Speaker, is that I do feel strongly for Martin Luther King. But when we make a holiday, we also have to understand the realities. And this is why I have reservations.

"First of all, Hawaii is only one of three states that has more state holidays than we do. It is our responsibility to understand the fiduciary impact of making this holiday.

"Mr. Speaker, I would appreciate it if the Finance Committee would take a good hard look and see what happens when we add another holiday. Primarily I am speaking of the construction industry where I spent many years. Everytime any construction industry has a job with the State, and many construction companies do, if there is a holiday they have two options--they either pay the men time and a half, and some unions double time, or keep the men off the job.

"Mr. Speaker, in the construction industry right now, everytime it rains these people have to stay home. They don't get paid. They don't have sick leave, they don't have vacation pay like everybody else. They have to survive out there on their own. Taking away another day from them removes eight hours' pay for these individuals.

"It's also a fact that if we're going to have a holiday, and I want us to have a holiday, I think our Finance Committee should really look seriously about finding a new. . .or removing one of the days that no longer has a statute that it originally had and make a trade-off.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

At 12:36 o'clock p.m., Representative Anderson asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:36 o'clock p.m.

Representative D. Ige: "Your Committee on Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Affairs, jointly with your Committee on Planning, Energy and Environmental Protection, will be having a hearing tomorrow morning at 8:30 a.m. in Conference Room 328. Decision-making to follow if time permits."

Representative Takamine then requested waiver of the 48-hour notice requirement for hearing Senate Bill 2819 and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Takamine: "Your Committee on Labor and Public Employment and your Committee on Health will be holding a joint public hearing tomorrow morning at 8:30 a.m. in Conference Room 310 on Senate Bill 2265. Thereafter, your Committee on Labor and Public Employment will be holding a public hearing for that Committee on several bills and Senate Bill 2819 to be added to that agenda. Decision-making to follow if time permits."

Representative Cavasso rose and requested permission to make a few comments on Standing Committee Report 925-88 and Senate Bill No. 2298, Senate Draft 1, House Draft 1."

At 12:39 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:41 o'clock p.m.

They were accompanied by their professor/adviser, Dr. Joe Selner. Representative Tom introduced Damien Freitas, an eighth grader at King Intermediate School who is "earning his Boy Scout merit badge." He was accompanied by Kaloa Robinson, aide to Representative Tom.

Representative Jones introduced a group of American History students from International College.

Representative Okamura introduced 14 Juniors and Seniors from the University of Hawaii, College of Business Administration, and members of the Hawaii Management Association. They were led by Candace Uesato, "my good friend."

"And that is why it gives me great pleasure today to recognize the 39th session of the YMCA Youth Legislature Program. To paraphrase the words of Archibald Cox: 'The old measure things as they are against the past that the old remember, but the young measure things as they are to an ideal of what things ought to be.' And may I add that we, in the House of Representatives, also have something to learn from these young men and women because two years ago, one of the bills that passed the Youth Legislature made Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday a state holiday, and I hope the Legislature would be able this year to join in passing our bill to recognize Dr. King.

Ige, Ihara, Isbell, Jones, Kanoho, Kawakami, Kihano, Kotani, Lee, Leong, Levin, Marumoto, Medeiros, Metcalf, O'Kieffe, Okamura, Peters, Pfeil, Ribellia, Say, Shito, Souki, Tajiri, Takamine, Taniguchi and Yoshimura and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative Oshiro, seconded by Representative Tom and carried, H.R. No. 233 was adopted.

Representative Tom rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and members of this honorable body, we are truly honored to have with us this morning the John Aki family who was selected as the 1987's Hawaii Family of the Year by the Child and Family Services and the HONOLULU ADVERTISER in celebration of National Family Week from November 22nd through November 28th.

"You know, as I was reading about the Aki familyabout their accomplishments, their activities, about their strong religious involvement in the Mormon Church, about their close family ties, and how they worked together as a family unit, I didn't see them really as any different than any other strongly knit and close family. But something about them made them really special.

"We know that Hawaii is blessed with many deserving families. But I do know this. What makes the Aki family a very special family is that each member of this family, whether we are talking about grandpa, grandma, the parents--John and Lydia--their children, and even the extended family, the ohana--they all work together as a team to get things done.

"Let me just give you an example. You know, a few years ago hard times hit this family--financial hard times, not just any hard times, really tough hard times. Changes in the household were made. Everyone sacrificed. Cold showers were taken to save electricity, the little extras were eliminated, and strict budgeting was practiced. And although John was a principal at the time, still is, he taught summer school. Lydia also taught summer school and night adult education classes to make ends meet. And throughout this agonizing ordeal, everyone became an even closer knit family.

"Just this past year, they had a challenging family project--a project that more families should do. They built 1600 square feet of an addition to their home. What a fete! According to John and Lydia, this project would give each child insights, to give each child skills for the future, and everyone pitched in. They did digging ditches for the plumbing, the carrying, the holding, the nailing, the lumber--everything! Everything with their hands. A lot of hard work. It takes a lot of guts, a lot of pride, and what a sense of satisfaction each child felt to see his or her handy work at its final stages.

"This wholesome family is one of value plus. Love alone abounds in their home. Teamwork in their construction project, hard work and sacrifice are values money never can buy. These are practiced constantly in this home. The trials endured have strengthened this family, and the Aki family are truly an outstanding family."

Representative Oshiro then introduced and asked the following honorees to stand to be recognized: Mr. John Aki, Jr., Principal of Ilima Intermediate School in the Ewa Beach area; Mrs. Lydia Aki, an instructor for multipli-handicapped children at Laie Elementary School; Keoni, John's son and a Junior at Kamehameha Schools; Naomi, John's daughter and a seventh grader at St. Ann's School; Jonathan, John's middle son and a fifth grader at Heeia Elementary School; Mr. John Aki, Sr., John's father; Mrs Aki, John's mother; Katherine Choy, sister-in-law from Hong Kong; and nephews Peter, Andrew and Cyril.

Floral leis and a certified copy of the resolution were presented to the honorees by Representatives Oshiro, Tom, Hirono, Apo, Hashimoto, Medeiros, Marumoto, Hayes, Isbell, Taniguchi, Tom, Kawakami, Fukunaga and Takamine.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 3310 had passed Third Reading at 12:21 o'clock p.m.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 981-88) recommending that S.B. No. 2837 pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Fukunaga moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2837 pass Second

Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Anderson then rose to speak against the motion, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, although I believe that tax credit is good, I still believe more firmly that we should be giving four percent off of food. That's immediate, that's today, and that's not in the future. I have been saying this for years. I know that most people, especially in an election year, would say this is the wrong thing to do Anderson, but I still firmly believe that four percent off the food is what the people need and especially our people on fixed incomes, and I will continue to vote the way I do until we see the light and do that.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2837, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE EXCISE TAX CREDIT," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 982-88) recommending that S.B. No. 2829, SD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Fukunaga, seconded by Representative Kawakami and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2829, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INCOME TAXATION," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 983-88) recommending that S.B. No. 1184, SD 2, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Fukunaga moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1184, SD 2, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading, seconded by Representative Kawakami.

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I am for the bill but I have some reservations.

"Upon checking, Mr. Speaker, to find out where the testimony was, there was only one piece of testimony that came in. I am not sure what the money is going to be used for, exactly where it is going. From my understanding, even in the testimony, it says exactly the same thing as we have on the committee report. There is no breakdown to increase as far as the original bill. On Senate Draft 1, it was to take it from \$50,000 to \$200,000. We have taken it back down to \$100,000 with the original bill and I really don't understand where this money is going to on a transition, and for that reason I do have some reservations and I will continue to try and find out exactly where all the money is going to be spent.

"Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1184, SD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GUBERNATORIAL TRANSITION," passed Second

Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representatives Shito, Levin and Crozier, for the Committees on Housing and Community Development; Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Affairs; and Intergovernmental Relations, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 984-88) recommending that H.R. No. 134 be adopted.

On motion by Representative Shito, seconded by Representative Levin and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.R. No. 134, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING A STUDY OF THE USE OF MOBILE HOMES," was adopted.

Representatives Shito, Levin and Crozier, for the Committees on Housing and Community Development; Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Affairs; and Intergovernmental Relations, presented a joint report (Stand, Com, Rep. No. 985-88) recommending that H.C.R. No. 97 be adopted.
