So we got used to after six years of going to our games and not having our team win so it is really. . .you cannot imagine how excited I am that the team wins."

Representative Horita then asked the following honorees to stand to be recognized: Danny Alvarez, representing James Williams, team captain; Robert Milho, team captain "and has been picked to the All-Tournament Team in the State Tournament;" Brad Stewart, First Team ILH All-Star and "was named Most Valuable Player in the State Tournament;" Mr. Darryl Gabriel, head coach and named Coach of the Year for the ILH and the State; and Mrs. Loretta Krause, Principal.

Representative Horita then asked the following team members who were seated in the gallery to stand to be recognized: Matt, George, Ken, Henry, Walter, Leon, Ryan, Kalia; Charlene and Velma, managers; Robin, trainer; Pat and Richard, assistant coaches.

"These four girls who are sitting on the floor today with their head coach have so many honors that I am not going to bother to go through all of them.

"When I called the high school, it was actually in response to the Boys' Basketball Team having won the State championship again and I was told that the Girls' Volleyball Team has won five consecutive ILH championships and has never received any honor and never been recognized. So I thought, you know, I can't have the Boys' Basketball Team come down and not have the Girls's Volleyball Team here so they are here today and I think they are really excited.

"I would just like to say in closing that the school, while very small--the graduating class this year has 52 students--while the school is very small, it exemplifies a school that has a well-rounded program that excels in scholastics and excels in athletics, and I think that is what we want all of our children coming through our school systems to aspire to."

Representative Arakaki proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the resolution speaks very well of the accomplishments of the Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Honolulu as they celebrate their 25th anniversary.

"With your permission and with the indulgence of my fellow members, I would like to share some personal

insight as a volunteer who has just completed ten years as a Big Brother.

"When I first started in the program, I had every intention to be a role model for some fatherless boy and not unlike our esteemed Senate Judiciary Chairman, I pledged to make a man out of a boy. I wanted to teach him to play sports, to be courageous, to be stoic, and to stand up for his rights, and maybe it was fate that matched me with a boy who disliked himself, a victim of psychological abuse, a problem child, and a failure at such a young age. It was then that I realized that teaching a boy to become a man was not as important as nurturing his growth as a person. It is indeed a sad commentary that the macho values we instill in our youngsters are the very ones that lead them to trouble as adults. I often wonder about all those young people who ended up in trouble. I wonder if one act of compassion would have changed the life, or if there was one person who truly cared, a life would have been more meaningful and productive. People ask me why and how I continued to volunteer in programs such as Big Brothers. Mv response--commitment and time.

"In our Human Services Committee, we hear many requests for programs to help young people and many have unique and innovative approaches to working with troubled youngsters. But new techniques, fancy program titles, or high levels of funding are not the keys to success of a program. Rather, it is a level of commitment to those who work with the youngsters that will determine success.

"The fact that a program such as Big Brothers and Big Sisters can succeed in helping many youngsters to the commitment of its volunteers is proof of that. The standard reply one gets when trying to recruit prospective Big Brothers or Big Sisters is, 'I am too busy,' or 'I don't have time.'

"Being a Big Brother or a Big Sister or, for that matter, a parent, a grandparent, an aunt or an uncle, means making time and making space for a child. Making time is not measured in quantity but in terms of quality and quality time means not just being there but sharing oneself and taking a genuine interest in the child. And I've always felt that if more adults made a commitment to spending quality time with our youngsters, we wouldn't have as many troubled kids as we do today.

"The staff and agency does a heck of a job of providing support and recognition for the volunteers that made the time and commitment to help our young people. But for me, Mr. Speaker and fellow members, a hug for my Little Brother and being told that I am the best Big Brother in the world is all the motivation I need to continue.

"Mr. Speaker and fellow members, I am very pleased to introduce to you our special guests representing Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Honolulu and I will ask them to stand to be recognized.

"First is Miss Pam Kekumano who is the Executive Director for Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Honolulu; we have I. Leslie Levitt, President of the Board of Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Honolulu. Mr. Levitt is also a volunteer. He is a director for employee benefits for Beck Kudlich & Swartman, Inc.; Miss Bonnie Freitas, Big Sister and a Board member. She is also a volunteer. She is the Personnel Manager at Aloha Airlines; and finally we have Debbie Horn who is a media consultant and President of Horn Communications.

"I also want to introduce my Little Brother sitting up there in the gallery. He is Donny Creighton. He is eight years old and Donny is a student at Kamehameha Schools. He is very active, very inquisitive, and I think he is going to be one of our future right tackles for Kamehameha. I also have his mother, Miss Dolly Creighton, and my two aides, Pricilla Dela Cruz and Elizabeth Pagba."

His creative vision of show business drove him to complete a degree in business economics and operate several successful nightclubs here in Hawaii.

"We are very proud of his contributions. He serves as a very positive role model for our local young people and his future aspirations is to become an actor in California. We thank him and Dolly for portraying in that one hour special the first authentic depiction of Hawaii's history and culture. "At this time, Mr. Speaker, I would like to introduce our honoree, Mr. Heine Fountain," and asked Mr. Fountain to stand to be recognized.

Representative Kawakami presented Mr. Fountain with a cigar lei while Representative Okamura presented him with a certified copy of the resolution.

Representative Tom then rose and remarked:

"Mr. Speaker, I don't see Dolly here. I really wish she was here. I would have sung a song for her but I do want to say that my son Matthew who was here several weeks ago was standing right next to Dolly at the end when the Honolulu Boy Choir sang, and he was just tickled pink and I think we are going to keep that tape forever because she touched him, so I wanted to touch him after since it's the closest I got to her. So, may I ask that next time someone does a resolution, get Dolly down here.

"Mr. Speaker, my first thought is that Mr. Fountain is a graduate of Damien High School. I am also a proud graduate of that school, but basically my second thought would be in the spirit of competition that when you look at the members from the St. Louis alumni--Representative Lee, Representative Leong, Representative Say, and my colleague here on my right Representative Crozier, I am sure you would agree, Mr. Speaker, that although St. Louis may be more in quantity, Damien men are much better looking.

"I was particularly moved by having her named because I remember my own thrill when I was named for one of the first groups of Jefferson Fellow awardees and I just hope that the award brings her as much joy as it did me.

"Thank you."

Representative Shon then rose and said:

"I just want to say that before the Health Committee, we have had an unofficial statistician on a whole number of issues and it has always been Loretta Schuler who came in with handwritten testimony. It was quite often more detailed and more helpful than the department's testimony and we are very, very grateful for her input on a wide variety of issues. And so I think we all should be very, very grateful that we have resource people like this to help us out through the caverns of darkness and complexities in health."

Representative Shon then asked Loretta Schuler to stand to be recognized.

"Mr. Speaker, last year the Smithsonian Institute opened an exhibit for the Bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution which focused on the war-time evacuation and internment of 120,000 Japanese/Americans. Before the exhibit even opened, the Institute had received sacks of mail questioning why the Smithsonian Institute was covering the story of those people from Japan which should be seeking relief from the Japanese government instead of reparations from the United States. Apparently, these letter writers failed to recognize that many of those who were evacuated during World War II were citizens of the United States.

"That is why the work of the film producer whom we honor today is so important. She has taken a story with which many of us in Hawaii are familiar and brought it to the broader American public.

"In A NISEI SOLDIER, an Emmy Award winning documentary that was telecast nationwide on PBS, Loni Ding brought the story of the 442nd Regimental Combat Team to the American people and told them about these young Japanese/American men who volunteered to fight during World War II at a time when their people were being questioned about disloyalty and how they went on to become the most highly decorated combat team in United States history.

"In her latest film, THE COLOR OF HONOR, she addresses a story which is even less well known. She talks about the 6,000 young Japanese/American men of the Military Intelligence Service who used their language ability to interpret radio messages, translate captured documents, and interrogate enemy prisoners in the Pacific theater of the war. For forty years the MIS story went untold because of the vow of secrecy that was imposed on intelligence operations. But Douglas MacArthur's Military Intelligence Chief credited the men of the Military Intelligence Service with having saved countless allied lives and having shortened the war by two years.

"It took a Chinese/American filmmaker to bring these stories of patriotism before the American public, at a time when Congress is still deliberating on the need for redress and reparations for the injustice which was perpetrated upon Americans of Japanese ancestry during World War II. She has helped awaken the American public to the principle which Franklin Roosevelt recognized with the formation of the 442nd Regimental Combat Team when he said, 'Americanism is not and never was a matter of race or ancestry.'

"For this socially relevant work and for her outstanding accomplishments in film on behalf of the Asian/American media community, Loni Ding deserves our highest commendation."

Representative Kotani then asked filmmaker Loni Ding to stand to be recognized.

Representative Hagino presented the honoree with a lantern ilima lei while Representative Kotani presented her with a certified copy of the resolution.

H.R. No. 287, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING THE OTA CAMP MAKIBAKA ASSOCIATION, INC.," was jointly offered by Representatives Kotani, Oshiro, Taniguchi and Shito.

On motion by Representative Kotani, seconded by Representative Oshiro and carried, H.R. No. 287 was adopted.

Representative Kotani proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in the early '70s there was a wave of activism that spread through our local communities. We saw people in Kalama Valley, Waimanalo, Coconut Grove in Kailua, Chinatown, Waihole/Waikane, Ota Camp and other communities challenge the prevailing wisdom that more is better and that development should be allowed to proceed without consideration of the communities that would be affected.

"I first learned about Ota Camp when I was a student at Roosevelt High School and I happened to be on my way to the State Library when I passed by the Capitol where the Ota Camp community was holding a rally against the threatened evictions. It startled me to see ordinary working people, elderly Filipinos, men, women and children from a quiet Waipahu community at a demonstration. But this neighborhood was fighting for its life at that time.

"Those who believe that these people were only seeking a handout from the State was sadly mistaken. Anybody who had worked with the Ota Camp residents and have come to know them, as I came to know them in subsequent years, know that this is not the case and that they have always maintained a broad perspective on their struggle. Whenever other communities have needed help, the people of Ota Camp have been there to offer their support and to advocate that decision making should be based on the needs of the common people. "Today we accept that land use decisions and development approvals must be scrutinized in view of the concerns of our local neighborhoods. After fifteen years, the Ota Camp struggle has borne fruit, not only for the residents themselves who are now their own landlords, but for all the poor and working people of our islands. Therefore, I am honored to introduce our guests, the Board members of the Ota Camp Makibaka Association."

Representative Kotani then asked the following honorees to stand to be recognized: Audie Domrique, Darrell Tagalog, Tandy Tagalog, Nora Quizon, Nora Batista, and Pete Tagalog, the leader of the Ota Camp Makibaka Association.

Floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Hirono, Kawakami, Hayes, Isbell, Taniguchi and Oshiro, while Representative Kotani presented Mr. Pete Tagalog with a certified copy of the resolution.

At 12:27 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:41 o'clock p.m.

## Thursday, March 31, 1988

The House of Representatives of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1988, convened at 11:45 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Reverend Roy Sasaki, Pastor of the Kahuku United Methodist Church and Hope United Methodist Church of Kaaawa, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Hirono, D. Ige, Pfeil and Shito, who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Forty-Third Day.

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Anderson and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Forty-Third Day was approved.

At this time, the following introductions were made to the members of the House:

Representative Jones introduced Dr. Donald Sills, Mr. Bill Doty and Mr. Glenn Kimber, key speakers for the upcoming Making of America Conference on the U.S. Constitution and how it was developed to be held on April 26, 27 and 28.

Representative Jones then introduced Mr. Dave Corsen and his family, saying: "One of the great, exciting things about the Reagan Administration has been the promotion of volunteerism and we see that taking place all over our great State and in America as well. And one of these organizations that has been raised up to meet the needs of a lot of refugees in Latin America, going down to the Honduras/Nicaragua border, has been a totally voluntary organization taking mercy missions of hospital goods and doctors going on their own accord with these shoeboxes of parcels of clothing and socks, bandages for the children in these refugee camps. And this is not sponsored by the government and they have thousands of volunteers across the nation that participate with this organization who do Christian emergency relief all over the world, including Pakistan as well as in Honduras, and Mr. Dave Corsen, President, started the organization and he has just finished his 24th trip into Honduras."

Representative Jones then introduced Mr. Joseph Douglas, "a very important person, a quiet man but one of the most courageous man that I know. Several years ago he lived in a three bedroom home like many of us here in the islands live in, in Nicaragua. He was a teacher and the Sandinistas took over and tried to force him to teach Marxism and threatened to kill him so he had to flee from there because of his belief in God and does not believe in Marxism/Leninism. He fled from there, became a refugee in Honduras with his family and they lived on nothing for years. Because of that, he went from being a school teacher to where he had to fight for freedom for his country and he is now a Contra. He is travelling in America, telling about the atrocities done against his people in Nicaragua."

Representative Anderson introduced Mr. Chauncy and Mrs. Betty Widemann, "two very hardworking people from Kailua."

Representative Okamura introduced 39 Juniors from Aiea High School. They were accompanied by their teacher, Mrs. Jane Fujii, and Josie Abuan, counselor.

Representative Kanoho introduced Mr. Calvin Kai from Kauai.

At 12:01 o'clock p.m., Representative Liu asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 2190 and 2041 had passed Third Reading at 12:48 o'clock p.m.

## S.B. No. 3164, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Takamine, seconded by Representative Yoshimura and carried, S.B. No. 3164, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COLLECTIVE BARGAINING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Pfeil and Shito being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 3164 had passed Third Reading at 12:49 o'clock p.m.

## S.B. No. 3206, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Shon moved that S.B. No. 3206, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Leong.

Representative Cavasso then offered the following amendment to S.B. No. 3206, SD 1, HD 1:

"SECTION 1. Senate Bill No. 3206, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, is amended by adding he following language to the end of the first section:

'SECTION 2. Section 577A-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"Section 577A-3 **Providing information.** (a) Public and private hospitals, or public and private clinics or physicians licensed to practice medicine [may], at the discretion of the treating physician, <u>may</u> inform the spouse, parent, custodian, or guardian of any minor patient of the provision of medical care and services to the minor or disclose any information pertaining to such care and services after consulting with the minor patient to whom such medical care and services have been provided under this chapter.

(b) If the minor patient is not diagnosed as being pregnant or afflicted with venereal disease, such information as well as the application for diagnosis may be disclosed, at the discretion of the treating physician after consulting with the minor patient.

(c) If the minor patient is diagnosed as being pregnant and decides to undergo surgery or treatment to induce abortion, actual notice of the intended surgery or treatment shall be given in person or by telephone by the treating physician or physician's agent to at least one of the minor's parents, custodians, or guardians, or unless the treating physician has received a written or oral communication from a referring physician certifying that the referring physician or an agent has given actual notice, unless the surgery or treatment to induce abortion is certified by the treating physician to be necessary to prevent the minor's death or disability and there is insufficient time to provide the required notice.

(d) No notice shall be required under this section if:

(1) The attending physician in good faith certifies in the minor pregnant female's record that the abortion is necessary to preserve the minor pregnant female's life or physicial health and that to provide the notice required by subsection (a) would result in a delay that would be likely to adversely affect the minor pregnant female's life or physical health;

(2) The abortion is authorized in writing by the person or persons who are entitled to notice;

(3) The minor pregnant female is or has been married pursuant to chapter 572;

(4) Pursuant to section 577A- a judge determines that the minor pregnant female is mature, and capable of giving informed consent to the proposed abortion;

(5) Pursuant to section 577A- a judge determines that the performance of an abortion upon the minor pregnant female without notification to her parents, guardian, or conservator would be in the minor female's best interests; or

(6) The minor has by court order or otherwise been freed from the care, custody, and control of her parents.

(e) No notice shall be required under this section to a parent who has committed or is alleged to have committed an offense under part V or part VI of chapter 707, or an offense under chapter 709, and the offense or alleged offense has been brought to the notice of public authorities.

(f) Any person who performs an abortion upon a minor pregnant female with knowledge that the notification required by this section has not been given, or in reckless disregard as to whether the notification required by this section has been given or not, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

(g) Failure to give the notice required under this section is prima facie evidence of failure to obtain informed consent and of interference with family relations in appropriate civil actions. The law of this State shall not be construed to preclude the award of punitive damages in any appropriate civil action relevant to violations of section 577A-3 or this section. Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit the common law rights of parents."

"SECTION 3. Chapter 577A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by adding two new sections to be appropriately designated and to read as follows:

<u>a minor pregnant female elects not to allow the</u> notification of one of her parents or guardian or conservator, any judge of a court of competent jurisdiction shall, upon petition or motion by the minor or by her next friend, and after an appropriate hearing, waive the notification requirement if the judge determines that the minor pregnant female is mature and capable of giving informed consent to the proposed abortion. The judge shall ensure that the minor or her next friend receive assistance in preparing or filing the petition or motion and shall ensure that the minor's identity is kept anonymous. If the judge determines that the minor pregnant female is not mature or if the minor pregnant female does not claim to be mature, the jduge shall determine whether the performance of an abortion upon her without notification of her parents, guardian, or conservator would be in her best interests and shall waive the notification requirement if the judge concludes that the minor pregnant female's best interests would be served thereby.

(b) Such a minor pregnant female may participate in proceedings in the court on her own behalf, and the court may appoint a guardian ad litem for her. The court shall, however, advise her that she has a right to court-appointed counsel, and shall, upon her request, provide her with such counsel.

(c) Proceedings in the court under this section shall be anonymous and shall be given such precedence over pending matters so that the court may reach a decision promptly and without delay so as to serve the best interests of the minor pregnant female. A judge of the court that conducts proceedings under this section shall make in writing specific factual findings and legal conclusions supporting the judge's decision and shall order a record of the evidence to be maintained including the judge's findings and conclusions.

(d) A court conducting proceedings under this section shall issue written and specific factual findings and legal conclusions and shall order that a confidential record of the evidence be maintained.

(e) An expedited anonymous appeal shall be available to any such minor pregnant female for whom the court denies an order authorizing an abortion without notification. An order authorizing an abortion without notification shall not be subject to appeal. No filing fees shall be required of any such minor pregnant female at either the trial or the appellate level. Access to the trial court for the purposes of such a petition or motion, and access to the appellate courts for purposes of making an appeal from denial of the same, shall be afforded such a minor pregnant female twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week.

(f) The supreme court shall adopt any rules necessary to ensure that these proceedings are handled in an expeditious and anonymous manner.

(g) No fees shall be required of any minor who avails herself of the procedures provided in this section or of section 577A-3. Section 577Aword, phrase, or clause of this chapter or the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall be held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the provisions, words, phrases, clauses, or application, and to this end the other provisions, words, phrases, and clauses of this chapter are declared to be severable.'"

Representative Cavasso moved that the amendment be adopted, seconded by Representative Medeiros.

Representative Cavasso then rose to speak in favor of the amendment, stating:

"I speak with some sorrow as well. James said, 'To one who knows the right thing to do and does not do it, to him it is wrong.'

"It is our responsibility and right to encourage and promote parental involvement and support of children. There is only one medical procedure in Hawaii for which parental involvement is not required. A girl under the age of 18 cannot even go to Pearlridge Shopping Center and pierce her ears without the knowledge and permission of her parents. Parents are accountable and responsible for the care and welfare of their children and yet we are forbidding, preventing, and keeping them from being involved, Mr. Speaker, with one of the most traumatic experiences a child, woman, or family could go through.

"I have spoken with most of you here, one by one, and asked if you would support parental notification if it came to a vote on the floor and enough of you have said 'yes.' Your conscience will let you know the right thing to do and if you don't do it, that's wrong.

"All this amendment says in eleven simple words is, 'A parent should be notified before their child has an abortion.' The ADVERTISER poll says 80 percent of Hawaii wants required parental involvement. My support for this need was further confirmed a few weeks, just before our recess, and I have shared this story now with just two members of this House and it's not something that I choose or want to share; however, I feel compelled.

"My wife was three months pregnant last month when she called in alarm saying, 'Come home quickly! I'm bleeding badly, I need you, and I feel like I've lost my child!' I sped home and put her in the station wagon and rushed to the hospital. They took her in, told me to wait outside while she was checked by the doctor. I waited and waited and waited, asking to come in apparently not enough. But when I finally was let in, I was told that a D&C had been performed. My wife thought that she had already miscarried when we went to the hospital. She thought she had already lost the child. The doctor told 'You are completely dilated and we need to clean her. you out. We need to do a D&C to stop the bleeding. Afterwards, somehow in the conversation the word 'abortion' was used and my wife asked, 'You did an abortion? I don't understand. There was still a child?' The nurse said, 'Yes.' 'Was our child still alive?' don't know."

"Can you understand the anguish and the mental and emotional trauma? My wife said, 'I didn't understand. They said they needed to clean me and they gave me a statement to sign, and a thought came that I need to call you, but then the pain hit again and the fear and the thought slipped away and without realizing what was really happening, if only you had been there to ask some questions to help me think. If only I'd called for you, if only you'd been notified.' Well, the good news is that my wife's okay and our child is with the Lord, and our doctor says, 'Go for it again, have more children.' We went to see our regular doctor and in discussion afterwards about this incident, the doctor said we could have waited half an hour, an hour--there was no rush. There was time to question, time to do tests.

"The point is. . .the reason I share this with you is that, as an example, that my wife was under physicial and emotional pain and stress and had I been there to give perspective and support calmly, it would have been better. How much more do children need the support of their parents? My wife is experienced, on guard, Mr. Speaker. I am a Representative dealing with this exact subject. If we can be hurt who are watching, by failure to notify and call for my support, how much more can others be hurt?

"Some tried to speak against the constitutionality of parental involvement. The force behind that is wrong. The U.S. Supreme Court has upheld at least five times that parental involvement in the abortion procedure is constitutional, that parental involvement is desirable, especially because of the peculiar vulnerability of our young children. The court recognizes the right of parents to bring up their children and have recognized the rights of children to benefit from the love and counseling of their parents.

"This amendment is in full accord with rulings by the United States Supreme Court. Mr. Speaker, this amendment is in fact overcautious. . .

At this point, Representative Apo interrupted and yielded his ten minutes to Representative Cavasso.

Representative Cavasso thanked the Chair and continued his remarks, saying:

"This amendment is in fact overcautious, taking into account lower Circuit Court decisions which will be years away from influencing us directly if they are ever heard by the Supreme Court, if ever. In this amendment there is no time requirement, Mr. Speaker, for 48 hours or waiting periods. Only one parent need be notified and there is judicial bypass available; for example, when a child is exceptionally mature or subject to other risks such as abuse.

"Lastly, I would like to recall the admiration we Americans have expressed for men such as Andrei Sakharov from the Soviet Union who stand up for human rights in the face of regular government procedures which stifle liberty of courage and conscience. Floor amendments are heard and voted upon with conscience in Washington, D.C. chambers from legislative to California. Our rules in Hawaii provide opportunity for bold and courageous decisions in public before all people and I think that is what we desire and that's what's good for our State, that's what we all want. Let not prejudice or bigotry of political parties, whether it be Republican or Democrat, Independent or other, keep us from individually doing what is right. Two years ago we individually doing what is right. individually called the lottery bad for Hawaii with a call, on behalf of our children, by Representative Peter Apo which I've often quoted. Last year we individually stood against according preferential treatment through the gay Representative Eloise Tungpalan stood up rights bill. with courage and voted her conscience.

"How many. . .how many Andrei Sakharov's are there in this American state of Hawaii who put right first? You who know the right thing to do and does not do it, for him it is wrong. How many. . .how many?" Representative Jones rose to speak in favor of the amendment, stating:

"I want to thank Representative Cavasso for his bold stand and I know this amendment has the chance of snowballing Hell of passing today, and I am very saddened that it will be the victim of politics instead of conscience. I understand that and I have lived with that for six years and I will continue to live with it as a citizen here in the State of Hawaii.

"I think it is a tragic day in our State when my daughter can't get her ears pierced unless I give permission but she can have an abortion and her Daddy will never know. The majority of us on the floor of this House know it is absolutely stupid not to pass this amendment, but I have a lot of confidence.

"One of the greatest influence on my life was Mahatma Ghandi. Ghandi said one thing will go on in time and that is the truth. The truth of the matter is that the holocaust of our age will be stopped and some of us will look back and tell our grandchildren, 'yes, people smirked on the floor of the House but other people listened,' and eventually there was change.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At 1:02 o'clock p.m., Representative Apo asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:05 o'clock p.m.

Representative Metcalf then requested that his remarks against the amendment be inserted in the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Metcalf's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against the motion to amend S.B. No. 3206, SD 1, HD 1, relating to maternal and child health concerns.

"Senate Bill No. 3206, SD 1, HD 1, would enable the Department of Health to administer programs to reduce infant and maternal mortality and morbidity, and otherwise promote the health of women of childbearing age, mothers, families, infants, children and adolescents. The types of services to be provided involve critically needed perinatal care, prenatal education and training, baby care, adolescent health care and family planning services. The programs as proposed would, in my opinion, greatly enhancee the optimal health and wellbeing of this targeted group.

"My colleague from the 20th District has proposed an amendment to Senate Bill No. 3206, SD 1, HD 1, that would require parental notification prior to a requested abortion procedure by a minor.

"There can be no doubt that each and every legislator on this floor favors parental involvement in the delicate decision of a minor who requests an abortion. There is no question that the viewpoints of a parent, or another responsible family adult member for that matter, prior to making a decision is something to be encouraged.

"Luckily, many reputable studies indicate that across the nation 90-95 percent of teens do in fact consult with their parents before making a decision to abort.

"I think the problem we all must grapple with as policy makers is the 5 to 10 percent of teens who do not consult

with their parents. Those same studies indicate that in a large majority of homes those young women come from are partially, if not totally, disintegrated. In those cases we also find that a disturbing high percentage of those pregnant teens contemplate suicide, dangerous and crude self-abortion techniques, or in the case of mainland jurisdictions, driving across state lines to gain access to the desired services, as alternatives.

"The challenge for us sitting on this floor today is to find a practical yet legally defensible solution. Given the history of Hawaii's constitutional provision which specifically provides that the right of privacy, '...shall not be infringed without the showing of a compelling state interest...', I believe that the amendment proposed does not meet the constitutional mandate.

"Moreover in dealing with such a sensitive issue, I firmly believe that public hearings should be held to get all viewpoints prior to passage in this floor. This type of amendment should be carefully scrutinized by our State's premier constitutional law experts and the question concerning the necessity of a State constitutional amendment should be posed. To do anything less would be irresponsible and violative of the oath of office we took in which we pledged to uphold the constitution of the State of Hawaii.

"Mr. Speaker, it is for these reasons that I will cast a vote against the proposed floor amendment to Senate Bill No. 3206, SD 1, HD 1."

At 1:06 o'clock p.m., Representative Cavasso asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:07 o'clock p.m.

The motion to adopt the amendment was put by the Chair and failed to carry by voice vote.

The motion to pass S.B. No. 3206, SD 1, HD 1, on Third Reading was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 3206, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH SERVICES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Cachola and Jones voting no, and Representatives Pfeil and Shito being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 3206 had passed Third Reading at 1:07 o'clock p.m.

## S.B. No. 2328, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Fukunaga and carried, S.B. No. 2328, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DEPOSITS OF PUBLIC FUNDS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Anderson voting no, and Representatives Pfeil and Shito being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 2328 had passed Third Reading at 1:08 o'clock p.m.

At 1:08 o'clock p.m., Representative Liu asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:09 o'clock p.m.

#### UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1023-88 on S.B. No. 3151, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 3151, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Liu rose to speak in favor of the bill "with some reservations," stating:

"I know we want to develop high tech industries in the State. I know that there are a number of ways to do this. One of the ways is to provide forms of needed capital and needed investment for new companies that intend to come to Hawaii. We're just very concerned though with the use of special purpose revenue bonds for a particular company which, although it may be one of a kind for now, the ramifications for the future is a little disturbing.

"The markets are very favorable right now in the areas of loans. I know special purpose revenue bonds are bonds whereby the full faith and credit of the State are not behind the bonds and yet there's always some concern in the back of my head that if something goes wrong with the project, there's no doubt that we have given it the stamp of approval by the State. Budget and Finance does not come by to testify for or against these bonds. That has always been a concern on my part so I just hope that these questions are kept in mind for now and the future as we take a look at individual corporations/companies which are not quasi-public in nature coming before us for this type of financing.

"But with some doubt, I will be voting in favor of this measure.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Crozier rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I was fortunate enough to see the prototype of the electrical motor that this company is trying to work on. This is only one aspect of the company. They do research and the whole thrust of Hawaii's energy is to maximize the talents that we are able to produce out of the University of Hawaii, and this company will be using that talent. They want to not create products for mass consumption but they want to create innovative ideas and products so that other companies elsewhere can buy the patterns and then make the businesses.

"This is heavily into research. It is a clean industry and it will maximize again the potential of the youth of Hawaii, and I speak in favor of this bill.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3151, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ISSUANCE OF SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS TO FINANCE A HIGH TECHNOLOGY DEVELOPMENT PROJECT IN THE CITY AND COUNTY OF HONOLULU," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Pfeil and Shito being excused.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1024-88 on S.B. No. 118, SD 2, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Fukunaga and carrried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 118, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A JUVENILE JUSTICE INFORMATION SYSTEM," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Pfeil and Shito being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 3151 and 118 had passed Third Reading at 1:12 o'clock p.m.

#### **ANNOUNCEMENTS**

Representative Takamine requested waiver of the 48hour notice requirement for hearing Senate Bills 2818 and 2267, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Takamine: "Your Committee on Labor and Public Employment and your Committee on Finance will be holding a joint public hearing this afternoon at 2:00 p.m. in Conference Room 310 to hear Senate Bill 2818. That will be followed by a public hearing by your Committee on Labor and Public Employment only to hear Senate Bill 2267. Decision-making to follow. The hearings will be held in Conference Room 310."

Representative Liu rose and asked whether or not Representative Takamine would yield to a question to which Representative Takamine replied in the affirmative.

Representative Liu asked Representative Takamine to "indicate what those two bills related to," and Representative Takamine answered: "Senate Bill 2818 deals with unemployment insurance. It's an administration bill dealing with training fund. Senate Bill 2267 again deals with collective bargaining and which employees are to be included and not included in the bargaining unit."

Representative Liu thanked the Chair.

Representative Hagino rose and requested waiver of the 48-hour notice requirement for hearing Senate Bills 2070, SD 1; 2563; 2718; and 2943; and for decision-making only on Senate Bills 2451, SD 2, and 1541, SD 2, HD 1, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Hagino: "There will be a public hearing this afternoon at 1:30. First, there will be a joint hearing with Judiciary and IGR, followed by Judiciary only, followed by decision- making only by Labor and Judiciary, followed by Health and Judiciary, Conference Room 328 at 1:30."

At 1:19 o'clock p.m., Representative D. Ige asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:20 o'clock p.m.

Representative D. Ige: "We will be having a Majority caucus at 6:30 p.m. in the Majority Caucus Room."

At 1:20 o'clock p.m., the House of Representatives stood in recess until 7:00 o'clock p.m. this evening.

## NIGHT SESSION

The House of Representatives reconvened at 7:50 o'clock p.m.

The Chair then directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Pfeil and Shito.

#### THIRD READING

The following bills, which were on the calendar for Third Reading, were read throughout and the following actions taken:

## S.B. No. 3210, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Shon, seconded by Representative Leong and carried, S.B. No. 3210, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO VITAL STATISTICS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 3210 had passed Third Reading at 7:52 o'clock p.m.

## S.B. No. 3287, HD 1:

Representative Shito moved that S.B. No. 3287, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hayes.

Representative O'Kieffe rose to speak in favor of the bill but "with serious reservations," stating:

"This bill addresses a problem which has plagued our State for many years--a problem of affordable housing for our citizens. Recent figures show that only 51.7 percent of Hawaii's residents are fortunate enough to own their own homes. Compared to the national average of 64 percent, the statistics for Hawaii are not only appalling, they are abysmal. Hawaii ranks 49th, next to dead last in the U.S. in percentage of owner/occupied units.

"Under the circumstances, there is no question that something must be done. Every person grows with the dream of one day owning his/her own home. We must assure everyone tonight that that dream is still attainable.

"But, Mr. Speaker, I have serious reservations on certain provisions of this bill. For one thing, this bill exempts HFDC projects from county planning and zoning laws. The counties will be denied their voice in the process which so directly affects them. This bill will take away their home rule right to determine the type and rate of development within their boundaries.

"This bill also concentrates this tremendous power in a single non-elected body. I fear this is both unfair and unwise.

"Our government has been founded on the wisdom that checks and balances are necessary to ensure that government acts in the best interest of all the people. By doing away with the counties' right of approval in this instance, we will have eliminated an important check and balance.

"I hope that our good intentions will lead to the creation of affordable housing and still retain the wishes of the counties.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ribellia rose to speak in favor of the measure "with reservations," stating:

"As a planner by training and experience in the City for ten years, I have witnessed the long-standing problem of affordable housing and the problem continues to grow. It's to the point of frustration for myself and I suppose many, many people in our community, and certainly, the problem is even more exacerbated in recent times by the rising residential land values and prices. So, it is an acute problem that has been with us for almost twenty years since the expansion of and the development of our State as a result of tourism.

"Something needs to be done. And it is because of these considerations that I favor the bill but my reservations has to do with the impact the bill may have on county home rule. Weighing the values of county home rule against the need to do something about the acute housing shortage, I find that in committee testimony that it was persuasive to me that the home rule power in question was never really exercised, at least in the City and County of Honolulu, and that is by testimony.

"So, while the principle is still at issue here, I think the balance, at least in my mind, favors doing something very active, very aggressive in the area of acute housing shortage.

"So, with those reservations, Mr. Speaker, I am going to vote in favor of this measure.

"Thank you."

Representative Shito rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"This session, the members of the Hawaii State Legislature have dedicated ourselves to meeting one of the major challenges of our time--the provision of basic shelter and affordable housing for the people of our State.

"We all know first-hand that for many the simple and essential requirement of our walls and a roof are beyond economic reach. And we know that for far too many, the family dream of owning their own home is just that--a dream.

"And so we have taken upon ourselves the challenges to be the architects of a new housing vision and program. We have moved forward with bold and critical action, and as the remaining days of this session unfold we will continue to do so. I fully expect the final product to be a historic housing package for the people of Hawaii.

"Senate Bill 3287, HD 1, will give us one more tool to build the homes we envision. It is an essential element of the total housing commitment to which we are dedicated.

"The bill amends Chapter 201E, giving the State Housing Finance and Development Corporation greater flexibility in developing needed housing statewide without sacrificing public health and safety. The measure appropriately extends this flexibility at a time when we will accelerate the development of State-supported housing. It does so by placing a five-year moratorium on certain provisions of Part III of the chapter which may inhibit this acceleration.

"During the hearing conducted by the Committee on Housing and Community Development on this bill, we hear considerable strong testimony from county authorities.

"It is our belief that this measure does not remove the county from the planning process. Common sense dictates that the State must coordinate planning and design with the counties at the front-end to ensure project appropriateness. Should the State fail to do so adequately, the county should express its concerns in the public hearings called for in this measure. Some might say the issue is home rule; I say the issue is homes.

"Fellow members of this House, all of us want a Hawaii where the disadvantaged have shelter and where working families have a place to call their own. Senate Bill 3287, HD 1, in concert with the housing package now in the able hands of this Legislature, will help us deliver on this dream.

"I ask all members of this House to support this measure.

"Thank you."

Representative Hayes rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill and particularly in support of the way the Chairman handled it. When I first went to the hearing, I was prepared to vote against it. I had had a lot of lobbying from the City Council. During the course of the hearing I was confused. I wasn't sure who was right, and the Chairman wisely deferred the decision until he had a chance to go through everything. I am convinced that he did as good a job as could have been done in accommodating the conflicting concerns.

"I urge everyone to vote for it.

"Thank you."

Representatives Hemmings rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This bill is another bill in the long list of bills that we have seen introduced this session with a good intent, or hiding behind a good intent, but with bad execution.

"The facts are that the cost of living in the State of Hawaii is the result of many factors, one of which is government stranglehold on the economy.

"Our State government has 35 percent of the land; it certainly has the resources to make available a lot of land and benefits to make affordable housing available to the people. We have failed to do so and now we are going to give the State government more centralized control of those resources.

"This bill will preempt county home rule completely in spite of the hearings that allegedly would go on in the district. The hearings are the hearings--the counties will have no input in ultimately deciding where, when and how affordable housing will be made.

"This bill will concentrate even more power in unelected officials in the State executive branch of government. We know by the State Constitution that in our State, we have one of the most powerful executive branches in government where the Governor has line-item veto over spending. It is awfully difficult and I know the people in Finance Committee will attest to find out where and how the monies are being spent. We've experienced that in the recent past with several issues.

"This bill amounts to more empire building in the Governor's Office.

"I think it is dangerous for any society to have so much power concentrated in centralized government. There are other governments that had centralized control of their economies, they don't have free enterprise, and they have tremendous problems.

"There is a positive alternative to this, and the positive alternative is to give tax cuts, credits, and incentives to the private sector in concert, in partnership, with government to build affordable housing. Make available more State land for housing. Streamline the bureaucratic hoops that act as costly barriers for housing development. "Mr. Speaker and fellow members, if we had a great track record in the past of making affordable housing available through the State resources, this bill might make sense. But since we don't, why give more control to a centralized power structure that does not have a positive track record? Let's allow the counties to continue to participate in partnership with the private sector in trying to build an economy that will be controlled by the people, not by a handful of elected and unelected officials sitting in Honolulu.

"I urge you all to vote against the bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Levin rose and stated:

"I also rise to support the bill but with grave reservations and would also ask that the submittal to be made by Representative Metcalf be inserted in my name also."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Tajiri rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill with grave reservations and I, too, like my colleague from the Big Island, would like to have Representative Metcalf's remarks entered in the Journal as my own.

"Thank you."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Souki rose and stated:

"I rise to speak with some reservations and request that Representative Metcalf's remarks be entered in the Journal as my own."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Cavasso then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against the proposal and I suspect, Mr. Speaker, that I could probably use the statements of the gentleman from the Big Island to go against the bill.

"However, Mr. Speaker, I have statements of my own that I would like inserted in the Journal."

The Chair "so ordered."

Representative Cavasso's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against this bill. Although I agree that affordable housing is desperately needed in this State, I believe that this bill is not the answer. It simply has the potential for the possibility of abuse and have unintended negative side-effects.

"Firstly, I question this bill's exemption of HFDC projects from county planning and zoning laws and its elimination of the projects from the counties review and approval process. Instead of cooperating with the counties in reviewing the merits of the project, we are essentially painting them out of the picture. We will be taking decisions that affect the patterns of growth and population away from those with the interest and expertise in the use of their land.

"Secondly, this bill concentrates the approval process in an agency composed of appointees rather than a body elected by the people. The determination of what qualifies as an eligible project will rest with an agency that is not directly accountable to the people. The possibility that such power could be abused ought to give us all pause.

"Lastly, it seems incongruous that the counties are responsible for provision of essential services such as water, sewer, trash collection, police and fire protection. If developments are permitted without coordinating these projects with planned increases in the essential services, the health, safety and comfort of our residents could be compromised.

"To those who say this bill is necessary to expedite the building of affordable homes, let me remind you that during testimony, no instance was ever offered where the counties failed to meet the 45-day requirement or disrupted a project through the use of their tail-end veto power. Let me further remind you that it was the State, through the Office of Planning that blind sided the Kapolei development, not the counties.

"I hope that you will agree with me that the ends do not justify the means, and that there are more palatable solutions available, solutions which are fairer to the counties and the people, solutions which are just as effective. And I ask that my colleagues will join me in voting against this bill."

Representative Liu rose to speak in favor of the bill "but with some serious reservations," stating:

"Mr. Speaker, affordable housing is a very valid issue to make a priority for this administration and for this Legislature. It is too bad that we don't have a bill before us that could allow the freedom to the private sector to move as it has indicated that it would if it had that freedom, measures in a bill from the administration that would include many of the things mentioned by the speaker prior to this, Representative Hemmings. It is too bad.

"The bill before us has a lot of flaws. A lot of us here with reservations understand that as well as those who vote no. I respect those who will be voting no because I know it is not a vote against affordable housing and I don't think anyone on this floor or in this coming election should make any such interpretation of those votes.

"I also hope the administration would take these concerns and reservations to heart as really a warning signal, that if they are granted this power and the attendant monies and other bills that are associated with this bill that after five years, or hopefully sooner, that this administration will produce.

"And it also sends a warning signal should this bill become law to the counties that they must improve their systems to perhaps give us more confidence in the future of their abilities to produce.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Andrews rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"First of all, in reading the bill on the existing law, it is not my understanding that this bill has anything to do with affordable housing. It's being passed as a transfer of a very minor power for review process of the county to the State under the guise of affordable housing.

"I can read to the members a very short sentence that already exist in the existing law and describes the powers of the Housing Finance and Development Corporation. It says that they 'or any private developer who meets their goals shall be exempt from all statutes, ordinances, charter provisions, and any rules of any governmental agency relating to planning, zoning, construction standards for subdivisions, development and improvement of land, and the construction of units thereupon."

"Mr. Speaker, that section exempts presently the Housing Finance and Development Corporation, and again any private developer who meets their goals from any county rule or law. It did have within that section a review process of 45 days if the county would take action. If they took no action, it would be an automatic approval. If they took action to review the process and find that it did not fit within the ability of their existing infrastructure to satisfy the development, then they could reject the project.

"I think the matter of public policy, the matter of believing that our Council people act in good faith for the public, if the project was a good one and one that would benefit our citizenry and promote the goals of affordable housing, there will be no way they will reject the project.

"And so again, this bill really does nothing for affordable housing because all the tools the Governor needs and all the tools the Governor wants are already there. This bill just takes away the last review process that an elected body had--the County Council--and transfers that review process to an appointed body, a body appointed by the Governor.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Peters rose and stated:

"I have some written remarks in opposition to this measure that I would like to have inserted in the Journal and, in addition, I would like to also incorporate Representative Andrews remarks as though they were my own."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Peters' remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise tonight in opposition to the passage of Senate Bill No. 3287, HD 1.

"It is my understanding that the counties remain steadfast in their opposition to this measure, and I concur with their opposition.

"As originally drafted, this bill removed elected county officials from the responsibility of guiding growth and development within their respective counties. The amended version before us tonight still contains such language.

"Will this bill expedite the provision of affordable housing? No!

"Will it ensure lower priced housing? No!

"The only purpose this bill achieves is the elimination of the ability of the counties to implement their own, publicly approved land use plans, by allowing the HFDC to unilaterally approve and/or develop housing-related projects without the concurrence of the county governments. The same county governments which will be held responsible for providing those new communities with essential public services and facilities. "I have found no positive purpose for this bill. The current process of county review which takes no more than 45 days has worked, and continues to work well. To date, all State projects submitted to the counties have been approved within a 45-day period. The 45 days which could possibly be saved by cutting out county review will do little to expedite a development process which typically takes two, three, or even four years already. It is not the county 45-day review process which is the cause of unreasonable burden in developing affordable housing.

"We are ready to vote on a bill with no clear, identifiable benefit; but with several clearly detrimental side effects:

- Usurpation of the county land use planning process;
- Separation of development approval from the provision of public services and facilities;
- Concentration of development approval authority into the hands of a single, non-elected agency;
- Elimination of the checks and balances of county governmental review; and
- Removal of an important opportunity for public review and input.

"It is not too late to respond to these concerns and act appropriately. I will vote 'no' on Senate Bill No. 3287, HD 1, and urge my fellow House members to do likewise."

#### "FACT SHEET SENATE BILL NO. 3287

The basic purpose of Senate Bill No. 3287 is to:

(1) Delete the requirement that the legislative body of each county review and approve the Housing Finance and Development Corporation's rules pertaining to health, safety, building, planning, zoning, and land use.

Upon adoption of these rules, they shall have the force and effect of law and shall supercede, for all projects in which the State through the corporation shall participate, all other inconsistent laws, ordinances, and rules.

(2) Delete the requirement that the legislative body of the county in which a project is proposed, review and approve the preliminary plans and specifications of that project; including the review and approval of exceptions from statutes, ordinances, charter provisions, and rules relating to planning, zoning, and construction standards.

(3) Delete the requirement that 60% of the units constructed by an independent developer in cooperation with the Housing Finance and Development Corporation be sold in price ranges within the purchasing power of lower income purchasers.

The <u>underlying impacts</u> of Senate Bill 3287, however, are that this bill would:

(1) Seriously undermine the County land use planning process.

The County planning process is mandated by State Statute. The General and Development plans which implement that mandate have been formulated and approved only after extensive public review and input. To allow projects to unilaterally circumvent these plans would make meaningless the public planning process.

(2) Sever the relationship between development approval and the provision of public services and facilities.

> The County Councils are accountable to the people for the provision of water, sewer, and trash collection, for transportation infrastructure, parks and open space, as well as police and fire protection. The county's ability to provide these essential services depends greatly on the ability to determine the pace and location of housing and urban growth.

> If planning and zoning responsibilities are not integrated and coordinated with the programming and provision of public services and facilities, the quality of community life will be seriously jeopardized.

(3) <u>Concentrate development approval authority into the</u> hands of a single, non-elected agency.

The ability to circumvent County planning and zoning laws, as well as the determination of what constitutes an eligible project (including the percentage of affordable units) will rest with the Housing Finance and Development Corporation, an agency which is <u>not accountable to the people</u>.

(4) Eliminate the checks and balances of County review.

Removal of the counties from the review and approval process will minimize public scrutiny of the desirability and feasibility of proposed projects, as well as intimate local review and assessment of the impacts of the proposed project on the surrounding communities.

(5) Allow commercial, industrial, and resort projects to also by-pass the county review and approval process.

An eligible project is defined as one which is primarily designed for lower income housing. The percentage of low-income units required, however, is not specified. A complete new community, with commercial, industrial, resort, and a percentage of affordable housing units could qualify as an eligible project.

(6) Allow for construction contracts of eligible projects awarded on a non-competitive, non-bid basis.

The Housing Finance and Development Corporation is exempt from the public advertisement and bidding law.

(7) <u>Remove an important opportunity for public review</u> and input.

Currently, development proposals are given a public hearing at the City Council to allow residents of the affected and surrounding community an opportunity to present their concerns and opinions in an open, well-noticed, public forum.

Removing the counties from the review and approval process may effectively remove the public from the decision-making process."

At 8:10 o'clock p.m., Representative Anderson asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 8:11 o'clock p.m.

Representative Hagino rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would just like to say a few words in support of this bill and it is support of this bill without any reservations.

"I've been in office ten years and while several decades ago ten years would not be a long time and I would still be a young Representative but because of all the changeovers, ten years seem to be a very long time now.

"In all the ten years that I've been in office, I've never seen any measure step or steps taken toward creating housing for our citizens. This year, through both the efforts of the Governor and certainly our own efforts in the Senate and House, I think I've seen the best collection of bills involving appropriations, and funding measures, and changes in statutory provisions that I think I can honestly say that we are finally taking a measure step to provide housing for all of us. And I do say all of us because there are many of us on this very floor who have difficulty securing housing for their families, so I have no reservations towards this bill and I think this is going to be part of the hallmark of this Legislature and the people will remember us for these measures.

"Thank you."

Representative Isbell rose to speak in favor of the bill "with some reservations," stating:

"I would hope that the HFDC uses more innovative types of housing to lower the cost so they can do more housing for people and that they also widen the group. Right now they are talking about a gap group from the \$90,000 to \$140-\$150,000 type of housing. To me, that is not the gap group that truly dreams of owning a home. If this bill will help them to lower the cost and to bring in more innovative types of housing and make it available to a lot more people, then we have accomplished something.

"Therefore, I will be voting for the bill.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Anderson rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the other night in Kailua, I was ready to vote no on this. I've been talking to county people and the whole bit. One of our members from the Kailua Neighborhood Board who I am sure did not mean to in any way have me take this out of the newspaper, but Mrs. Anita Cunnicut, chairman of the Kailua Neighborhood Board's Environmental Committee, did make a statement because she was worried about what was happening to our lands and what's going to happen in the year 2000 for housing for our children.

"I think, Mr. Speaker, after all of the years of looking at what is happening to our housing programs, how the counties and the State disagree with each other every now and then, there's mistrust between the political people, there's constant changing because the community decides that they do not want something in their area, so we change. I think it is about time that we take a stand and I realize that lots of us had problems with this but if we don't make the changes now, we'll never have affordable housing for our children. And as a person who has a daughter growing with three children, I am more than normally relying on us to make those kinds of decisions because I would like to see my grandchildren my daughter have a home someday of their own and not have to worry about high rents and a few other things.

"For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I will be going up.

"Thank you."

Representative Tom rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, nearly twenty years ago the Legislature recognized that there is probably no issue of greater magnitude, importance and complexity facing the State of Hawaii than the challenging problem of designing comprehensive and sensitive solutions for our State's expanding housing requirements.

"You know, legislation was enacted in the past creating a number of innovative housing programs and during the past eighteen years, nearly 9800 affordable housing units were produced. Additionally, 5000 families were able to purchase the fee simple interest in the lands underlying Despite these efforts, however, a critical their homes. shortage of housing still exists. We just have not simply done enough and it disturbs me that, for example, in 1980 there were over 40,000 overcrowded house units on Oahu alone, and that there was an equal number of substandard housing units. It disturbs me that in 1987, nearly 35,000 low- and moderate-income households on Oahu alone paid an excessive amount of their income for rent, that more than 5000 families were on waiting lists for public rental housing of which roughly 1500 or 330 percent were elderly families.

"There is a current statewide housing shortfall or more than 20,000 units and by the year 2000, a total of 85,000 units will be needed of which 75 percent or over 64,000 units will be needed to be in affordable category. Now, these statistics are overwhelming but the issue before us is not statistics, or the numbers of households needing housing.

"There are those who tell us that the dillution of people power, county power, City Council power will hurt our effort to produce affordable housing. I disagree.

"Senate Bill 3287 provides for public input for all concerns through the public hearing process in the county of the proposed project. The spirit of creating affordable housing is being kept alive. In order for the dream of affordable housing to become a reality, I believe that the truth of the matter is it cannot reach full implementation under current law.

"I want to take this opportunity to applaud the Governor's action in finally taking a positive lead in getting the ball rolling in support of the production of affordable housing. And I am confident that through his past actions that he is going to continue to work hand in hand with the public and private sectors to ensure that each individual will have an opportunity to have a roof over his or her head. We can no longer rely on existing housing projects that are falling short of the mark. We cannot operate with the business as usual attitude, relying on small discreet State-initiated developments, or relying on private developers to produce housing at price levels that do not generate adequate amounts of profit.

"At this time I wish to state that for the following reasons, I urge all of you to vote up on Senate Bill 3287, House Draft 1.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. Stand. Com. Rep. No. 993-88 on S.B. No. 3197, SD 2, HD 2:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 3197, SD 2, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Hemmings rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"It is difficult to get a handle on this bill at this time because it is not in its final form. When it came from the Senate, it had a graduated conveyance tax and I see now that that graduated conveyance tax has been eliminated which makes this bill absolutely innocuous. It doesn't do anything. I don't know why we just don't kill it like it should be. But I have a feeling from the plethora of WR's that are on this bill that it is going to end up being quite different than what we pass today. Therefore, I speak against it.

"This bill is another bad bill hiding behind a noble cause. The noble cause is rental assistance. Now, who can speak out against rental assistance? Well, Mr. Speaker, the State of Hawaii is going to spend and collect from the people of Hawaii close to \$3-billion this year. We will burn up \$450-million of the taxpayers' hardearned money that is now surplus that we could have, as the Minority Leader suggested at the beginning of the session, refunded to the people of Hawaii.

"It seems to me out of all of that money, we could have provided rental assistance for the people who really need it. No, but what we are doing in the wake of this huge surplus, we are creating a new tax. It's unbelievable, with all the surplus money that we have that with this bill, as it came from the Senate and as it probably will end up, we will have a new tax.

"This is a conveyance tax alright. It will convey tax hardship on the conscientious businesses and workers of Hawaii and further our reputation as one of the states with the highest taxes, the highest cost of living, and most definitely a difficult place to do business.

"Rather than increasing taxes on everybody in Hawaii, why don't we say, hey, come to Hawaii, it's a great place to do business. Why don't we provide positive incentives like cutting taxes and providing positive means for people to flourish here?

"I speak against this bill because I think it is headed in the wrong direction and I urge all our Committee members who signed it 'WR' and everybody else to be on the alert for it. It's a bad bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Say rose and requested that his remarks against the bill be inserted in the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Say's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to express my reservations about the bill (Senate Bill 3197, SD 2, HD 2).

"I am concerned about the amendments to Section 247-7 which earmarks excess funds from the conveyance tax to fund other programs. I am concerned about the possible ramifications of this action both in the precedent being set, earmarking general funds for a revolving fund, as well as the problems which could result by the possible by-passing of the Bureau of Conveyances to avoid payment of the tax and the effect this would have on the credibility of the Bureau of Conveyances and subsequent real estate transactions."

Representative Metcalf rose and requested that Representative Say's remarks be "included as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Cavasso rose to speak in favor of the bill "with reservations," stating:

"As a tax increase, this bill is bad news. As the bill is currently worded, the portions of the bill which would have provided the graduated tax increase have been left out and I think the Finance Committee made a wise move in doing so, and that the Senate position is wrong and that we should go into Conference Committee and hold the House position and keep this bill empty.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ribellia rose and requested that his remarks against the bill be inserted in the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Ribellia's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against Senate Bill 3197, SD 2, HD 2. This is not a vote against affordable housing or rental aid to the disadvantaged. The intent of this bill is commendable. However, I believe that the bill is not the proper way to go about creating affordable housing in Hawaii on grounds of fair play and equity.

"I vote 'no' on this bill because I believe it is unfair to place the burden of the creation of affordable housing only on those who choose to lease or sell their homes and properties. Furthermore, I believe that the affordable housing and rent subsidies can be attained more effectively by State incentives to the private sector for such housing and through cooperation with the counties and their efforts to develop affordable homes and rentals.

"Finally, this Legislature has given the State administration millions of dollars and a county override power towards the development of affordable homes. Accordingly, the case for the need for the proposed conveyance tax sought under Senate Bill 3197 has not been made. For these reasons, I must vote against this bill and ask that my colleagues join me in that vote."

"Secondly, we see here the tacking on of the incubator complex attached to the Department of Business and Economic Development. This has some concerns as to the looseness of the language in that area. I would hope that that would be tuned up during Conference Committee, and hopefully in future Legislatures and sessions, the need to tack on completely different parts of various bills into other bills although it has been used in the past, hopefully the somewhat rampant use of it this session will be cut down.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

"First of all, I would like to thank the Finance Committee for reacting to the fiduciary responsibility by removing a holiday because not only do people have holidays but when government has holidays and construction workers work on government projects, they have to stay home and they don't get paid so I don't think Dr. Martin Luther King wanted people to actually lose wages of it. For that reason, I thank the Finance Committee.

"The second part I would like to bring up is that because of Dr. Martin Luther King, the Civil Rights Act of 1964 was passed and that is probably the most significant bill passed in this century. And the ramifications of that bill is still being. ...we're still learning about it and civil rights for many groups are still being exercised and we are reaching out.

"And to bring the point home to this legislative body, we can relate to the one-man one-vote. That concept evolved a few years later after the 1964 Civil Rights Act, and for that reason, I am supporting this bill. "Thank you very much."

Representative Kotani rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I have prepared written remarks in favor of Senate Bill 251, SD 1, HD 2, that I would like to have inserted in the Journal," and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kotani then said:

"I would also like to add a few remarks in favor of this bill.

"The amended bill before us is the result of the work of the Finance Committee Chairman, the Labor Committee Chairman, and the Majority Leader under your leadership, Mr. Speaker. It is also the result of the efforts of those of us in the House and the many people who testified before our committees and signed petitions to ensure that the issue would not die this session.

"It represents quite a turnaround from the situation during the last session and even at the outset of this session.

"Twenty years ago today, Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr. was assassinated at the Lorraine Hotel in Memphis, Tennessee. Today, we will show that his dream of non-violence and social justice is alive and well in Hawaii.

"Through the passage of this bill, let us also declare that we, too, in Hawaii have a dream. We have a dream that the day will come when the immigrant Filipino, and the newcomer Black or White from the mainland will not face the bigotry of narrow-minded 'localism' but will be welcomed as valued participants in our local community; we have a dream that one day the Hawaiian kid from Waianae or the Samoan kid from Kahuku will be able to share the same aspirations and ambitions for the future as the private school student from Kahala; we have a dream that we will see the day when there are no more homeless in need of shelter, no more hunger that is left unsatisfied, and no desperation that is not met by compassion and support; we have a dream that the day will come when Hawaii, the shining beacon of hope for humanity in the Pacific, will cast its light not only with the promise but with the reality of a society in which all men and women are accepted as equals and are striving for the common good.

"On this day, let us remember Dr. King and let us dream of better things to come.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Further remarks by Representative Kotani are hereby inserted:

"Mr. Speaker, I was only in elementary school when Reverend King led the March on Washington in August 1963. But I grew up in a world that was transformed with the dream that he shared with so many others. During my childhood years, America turned its national attention to the needs and desires of the poor through programs which were inspired by the March on Washington. Reverend King told people who had been taught to deny their own dignity, 'We are somebody.' In Hawaii, his message was spread through ethnic studies programs that emphasized the history of Hawaii's working people, the history that had been ignored in favor of the history of the missionaries and sugar planters. It reverberated in an ethnic pride that gave birth to the Hawaiian Movement and the Hawaiian Renaissance of the '70s and '80s. Dr. King spoke of the fact that peace and justice were inseparable, and helped us to see that our vision of building a better America could not be separated from a commitment to our global community. His personal legacy is immense, yet what is important is not the individual man, but the dream that he represented and came to symbolize. As the committee report states, this State holiday commemorates 'all who have dedicated their lives to civil liberties, especially those who have participated in the struggle for social justice and human liberty in Hawaii.'

"This session, we have talked much about Hawaii's future. We have talked about the need to build new industries that will diversify our economy and provide quality jobs for our people in the future. But man does not live by bread alone; he must also be sustained in matters of the spirit. Through this legisltion, we in the House will remind those who come after us that Hawaii, the Future State, cannot only be a place of economic prosperity, but must be a place endowed with a richness in spirit."

Representative Cavasso rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, it recognizes a man by name and lifts him up as a place of honor. It brings a hero for our children to look up to and that's good. It's good that we do not simply call this by some innocuous name that has no meaning, and it's good that we call it by name.

"I think we have made a mistake when we have taken their birthdays and honoring Washington or Lincoln and gone back to call it the Presidents' Day when our children have nothing with which to really identify and so in that sense, I believe it's good that we lift up a man as an example for our children.

"Number two, Mr. Speaker, I think it is good that we have taken Discoverers' Day and replaced it with this, that we have taken that holiday which also at one point honored a man by name--Columbus--and could have honored others by name but when we simply call it Discoverers' Day, it loses some of its meaning for our kids. It does not set the example that is good and I think it is proper that we should replace Discoverers' Day with this holiday.

"There is another holiday that was adjusted--Good Friday--and it is right that we retain Good Friday. I think one of the testifiers. . .in fact more than one of the testifiers in the committee before Finance said that Martin Luther King himself would be displeased if we were to take away that day which honored the beliefs that he stood for as well.

"Therefore, I speak in favor of this and thank you for the support of this body."

Representative Lee rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I speak with some trepidation following the eloquent words of Representative Kotani. I would like to add two points.

"One, it is fitting that we call the day Martin Luther King Day because names have a meaning. When we think of George Washington, we think of the United States of America and the nation he led. When we think of Abraham Lincoln, we think of the emancipation proclamation. And Martin Luther King is the epitome of civil rights. It is fitting that the day is called by his name. "The second point I would like to make is that by declaring this holiday, we acknowledge that Hawaii, although a unique and special place, is part of the United States of America. And that part of the United States of America that we are honoring today is the beginning of a very black and dismal history in slavery. But continuing through the emancipation proclamation under Abraham Lincoln and then twenty years ago, a tragic death, but nonetheless I think we can all rejoice in his dream that we can be free as Representative Kotani stated. Not only the Blacks but we of the other races who make up this great nation of ours. So by declaring this day a State holiday, we are acknowledging that we understand and we appreciate the history that has gone ahead of us before we became a State and now as we face the future.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 251, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE HOLIDAYS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Hemmings rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and colleagues, there are alternatives to this bill and to the politicized, monolithic, and mismanaged State Hospital system as reported in the legislative audit.

"Those alternatives include hospital authority, a nonprofit community-managed hospital, or privatization where appropriate. The alternatives also include a wide array of diverse medical care delivery components such as long-term health care centers, surgery centers, urgent care centers, and other private sector initiatives.

"It is indeed regrettable that the residents of the neighbor islands especially are being held hostage to a State Hospital system where the State mandates its own monopoly through the CON process. Consumers are paying for medical service once as customers as they go to the hospitals and then once again through tax subsidies and operating costs, and also subsidies through the CIP system. It is important to note that the vast majority of doctors and public employees working in the system are conscientious and hardworking and they, too, are being ill-served by the mismanaged State Hospital system. We share their frustrations.

"Rather than passing this bill, let's work to get the State out of the hospital business where appropriate and allow, especially the outside islanders, access to quality and affordable medicaid and medicare system in hospitals served by the private sector that would do the job better for less money.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Fukunaga and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3018, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SCHOOL PERSONNEL," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 3018 had passed Third Reading at 1:28 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1134-88 on S.B. No. 3219, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 3219,

SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

At 1:28 o'clock p.m., Representative D. Ige asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:30 o'clock p.m.

Representative Hemmings rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the bid system, if managed honestly, can serve the taxpayers well. It assures quality goods or services at the most affordable prices.

"Several years ago, there was an attempt to exempt an airport concessionaire from the bid process. This body, in its wisdom, shot that bill down and as a result the State made possibly seven hundred million extra dollars over the next five years by having the concessionaire go to the bid system. They bid \$1.2-billion for five years' worth of services. The next highest bidder was \$350million. The bid system made the taxpayers a tremendous amount of money.

"Most recently, Mr. Speaker and colleagues, we have seen the State Hospital system with an extremely unethical, and fiscal irresponsible business contract. It may even be illegal. And that was the hospital business management contract where \$105,000 was going out to have basically a company fill out medicaid forms for people coming into the hospital system.

"The bid system would have eliminated that from happening. Incidentally, there were collection agencies that were interested in bidding and they were denied access because of a secrecy clause in the contract. I am sure we all will be hearing more of it as time goes on.

"The bid system is designed to accommodate open, honest public spending of money. This puts the hospital system at odds with that philosophy. Even though it is amended back in, allowing them to go to the bid system for equipment, it does give them the flexibility to take whatever bid they want so it is just a formality.

"Mr. Speaker, first of all, maybe we should get the hospital system out of State hands but if we are going to have to have it, maybe we can let them play by the rules that have served and should serve the taxpayers well.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3219, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ADVERTISEMENT FOR BIDS REQUIRED; EXCEPTIONS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Hemmings, Jones and Liu voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1137-88 on S.B. No. 2024, SD 1, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Fukunaga and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2024, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OCEAN RESOURCES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 3219 and 2024 had passed Third Reading at 1:34 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1152-88 on S.B. No. 2273, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Fukunaga and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2273, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE WAGES AND HOURS OF EMPLOYEES ON PUBLIC WORKS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

On motion by Representative Levin, seconded by Representative D. Ige and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3229, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC HIGHWAYS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

## Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1182-88 on S.B. No. 2021, SD 2, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Metcalf, seconded by Representative Hagino and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2021, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE XI OF THE HAWAII CONSTITUTION TO ADD A NEW SECTION RELATING TO HAWAII'S SOVEREIGN RIGHTS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 2273, 3229 and 2021 had passed Third Reading at 1:35 o'clock p.m.

## Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1183-88 on S.B. No. 2868, SD 1, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Metcalf, seconded by Representative Hagino and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2868, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SMOKING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 41 ayes to 10 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Bunda, Honda, Jones, Medeiros, Peters, Ribellia, Say, Souki and Yoshimura voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 2868 had passed Third Reading at 1:36 o'clock p.m.

## Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1184-88 on S.B. No. 2869, SD 1, HD 2:

Representative Metcalf moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2869, SD 1, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hagino.

Representative Liu rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I am voting 'no' against this bill because I don't think that the measure will be saving us any money or time in promoting good health. I am not opposed to the sentiments in the bill but it seems to me to be pretty clear that federal law prohibits the states from legislating in this area and the forum for this discussion should be in Congress according to the federal law. And I see us, in fact, passing a bill which could land us in the courts, could spend a lot of time with the Attorney General, and the cost that are entailed by that and by the time we get it resolved, if we do, the feds may change the law to the way we want it anyway, and so what do we accomplish except a pretty good PR move perhaps.

"For that reason, I will be voting 'no' on the bill, not because I don't think the sentiments are correct, but I think it gets us involved in an area that the federal law clearly states that we don't have the authority to do.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ribellia rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against the bill also, and may the Clerk record Representative Liu's remarks as mine in the Journal."

"The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Primarily, I don't believe that we have the right but I think it's against free enterprise that we can turn around and say, you cannot go ahead and distribute anything free.

"Now, we have laws on the books that says that we cannot sell cigarettes to minors and I think that this is fair and this is right and they won't give the cigarettes to minors because the law says that they are not to have it. But to say that you cannot do things within private enterprise and give it away free because we don't think it's right, I believe is against everything that I've ever believed in. I think we have the right to distribute whatever we have as long as it's pertaining to the laws.

"And for that reason, I am voting 'no.'

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Shon rose and stated:

"Very briefly, I think that we all recognize why it is not wise to pass out free booze on the corners. Why do we have laws like this, Mr. Speaker? It has to do with health, it has to do with protecting people, it has to do with wise public policy.

"Secondly, I would observe that there are a number of states and quite a number of municipalities that already have such laws.

"We are well aware that the tobacco industry has quite a lot of fire power in the legal area. If these laws were seriously flawed legally, all those laws would be challenged in court. So far, Mr. Speaker, none of them have been.

"Thank you."

Representative Lee rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I think it is very wise public policy building on a precedent which the federal government has made in the last twenty years. First, in prohibiting advertising on TV for tobacco products, and the Surgeon General's report, and the warning labels on the cigarette products.

"I think it is about time that we again illustrate to the rest of the country how forward we are in our thinking. The inter-island airlines were the first to ban smoking on the flights and now Northwest is leading the way much further than what has been mandated by the federal government.

"And in this respect, this bill is again showing why Hawaii is a special place that we are willing to go forward on very progressive legislation.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson, in rebuttal, stated:

"I think if I owned an airline and I didn't want people to smoke on my airplane, that's my business. And if I lose business because of it, then I have to stand the jerk.

"In a case like this, Mr. Speaker, we also have cholesterol. Does that mean that people are going to be told, don't eat eggs? Because, supposedly, according to the doctors, for some people it causes a heart problem. I eat a dozen eggs one morning--a dozen eggs! Does that make it wrong? Can somebody turn around and tell me, you're not allowed to eat a dozen eggs, Anderson.

The Chair interrupted and remarked: "You must have a lot of cholesterol."

Representative Anderson continued, saying:

"That is true. But if so, then it is my cholesterol.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Peters rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I talked about it in caucus. It's just the mentality. I am against this kind of mentality. You know, I recall smoking about four or five packs a day. I don't smoke now--that was forty pounds ago, but that was my choice.

"To say that you can't distribute something free like this, it is just asinine. It's going a little too far. I'm just against any kind of ban against smoking--period. That's my position and I am just against this kind of mentality."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2869, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SMOKING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 38 ayes to 23 noes, with Representatives Alcon, Anderson, Apo, Bunda, Cachola, Crozier, Honda, M. Ige, Ihara, Jones, Leong, Liu, Marumoto, Medeiros, O'Kieffe, Oshiro, Peters, Ribellia, Say, Shito, Souki, Tam and Yoshimura voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 2869 had passed Third Reading at 1:43 o'clock p.m.

# Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1185-88 on S.B. No. 3217, SD 1, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Metcalf, seconded by Representative Hagino and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3217, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1186-88 on S.B. No. 2336, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Metcalf, seconded by Representative Hagino and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1541, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1188-88 on S.B. No. 2579, SD 1, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Metcalf, seconded by Representative Hagino and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2579, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE OF ALCOHOL," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 1541 and 2579 had passed Third Reading at 1:46 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1114-88 on S.B. No. 3188, SD 1, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Fukunaga and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3188, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 3188 had passed Third Reading at 1:47 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1040-88 on S.B. No. 3195, SD 2, HD 2:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 3195, SD 2, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Hemmings rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is a companion bill of House Bill 3287 which unilaterally took the land use decisions on affordable housing out of the domain of counties and gave it all to the Governor. This is another bill of empire building.

"If the bill was going to go in the form that it is now with only two dollars to go upstairs, I could vote for it. But we know it is going to end up costing the taxpayers one hundred twenty or more million dollars.

"In the purpose clause of this bill, it talks about the high cost and limited availability of residential designated and zoned lands, something the State could have solved a long time ago without this bill, particularly on Oahu. The cost of construction, something the State could have solved a long time ago by doing things such as workers' compensation insurance reform, and tax incentives to drive the price down.

"It talks about the relatively high cost of living. The high cost of living in this State is not foisted on the people by alien beings. It is foisted on the people by government policy--government policies of bureaucracy and increased taxes. All of those things are things that the State could do to provide for affordable housing. But what are we doing instead? We are going to take \$120-million of taxpayers' money and give it to one person in one office and other unelected officials that work for him and ask him to provide us with low cost housing.

"I am not speaking against low cost housing; I am speaking against the foolhardy way of attaining it. Low cost housing could happen in this State if we let the counties and free enterprise work together in partnership with government to bring it about, not having the Governor's Office have a monopoly on it all.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Souki rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"For the last twenty and thirty years when the county and private has been developing housing in this State, we find ourselves presently with a gap of approximately 85,000 homes by the year 2000. I think it speaks of what the problem is, that private enterprise and the local government cannot alone resolve this housing problem.

"I believe that the Governor and the House and the Legislature are about to embark on a very novel plan, an innovative program for housing, to eliminate this major housing gap that we have so that by the year 2000, we should reach a goal of taking care of three-fourths of the homes and provide housing for 65,000 people, and it should be known that this will be on a partnership with private and with the local government.

"Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3195, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Hemmings voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 3195 had passed Third Reading at 1:50 o'clock p.m.

# Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1083-88 on S.B. No. 2595, SD 2, HD 2:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2595, SD 2, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Liu then rose and requested a conflict ruling, saying that he "sits on the volunteer Board of Trustees for the organization."

The Chair ruled "no conflict."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2595, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MAIN STREET COMMUNITY

DEVELOPMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1049-88 on S.B. No. 3095, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Fukunaga carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3095, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS FOR MANUFACTURING AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 6 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Hemmings, Jones, Liu, O'Kieffe and Ribellia voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 2595 and 3095 had passed Third Reading at 1:51 o'clock p.m.

At 1:52 o'clock p.m., Representative Apo asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:54 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1135-88 on S.B. No. 2063, SD 2, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Fukunaga and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1135-88 and S.B. No. 2063, SD 2, HD 1, were recommitted to the Committee on Finance.

At 1:55 o'clock p.m., Representative Okamura asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:56 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1199-88 on S.B. No. 2298, SD 1, HD 2:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2298, SD 1, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Kanoho rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I wish to speak against this bill.

"Much has already been said in opposition to this bill which the members of this body are already familiar with. Rather than belabor all these points of opposition and to avoid redundancy, I would like the Clerk to include my written statements of opposition into the Journal.

"Thank you."

The Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Kanoho's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, through your leadership and direction, the House of Representatives of the Fourteenth Legislature will be proudly remembered in the annals of our history for its visionary initiatives touching upon every facet of our lives-economic development, education, energy, environmental protection, health, human services, the sciences, tourism and much more. Regrettably, Senate Bill 2298, SD 1, HD 2, will unnecessarily use public monies to finance the 'Workers' Comp Fund,' and detract from this great list of accomplishments.

"The establishment of an insurance agency funded by a State loan is totally unneeded for the following reasons:

"(1) A State funded entity will not reduce Workers' Comp rates (its intended purpose) because such rates are determined by the Rating Bureau and Insurance Commissioner and will apply to all Work Comp carriers.

"(2) Workers' Comp rates (and premiums) have decreased by nearly 32 percent in the past two years, and are expected to drop by another 10-20 percent as a result of continuing, good experiences in Workers' Comp costs.

"(3) Workers' Comp costs have decreased because of successful employer accident prevention efforts; appropriate controls and judgments by the Labor Department at both its hearings and appellate levels; by better follow-up and supervision on the part of employers; and increased awareness and cooperation by the insurance industry (including the insurance commissioner) to reduce Workers' Comp rates.

"(4) All businesses, small and large, are violently opposed to this measure, although the proponents of this bill indicate that it is intended to help business.

"(5) The experiences of other states indicate that Workers' Comp Funds do not alone have any beneficial effect on Workers' Comp rates. Moreover, in these states, available information indicates sharp increases, even where monopolistic policies are enforced.

"(6) Rather than utilize public funds, the proponent organizations of this measure should utilize their own monies, since they seem to believe that much profit is being realized by Work Comp insurance carriers.

"(7) Success of our American economy lies in the free enterprise system with the involvement of government only in activities which cannot be supported by the private sector. The entry of government in the insurance industry is a violation of this principle and will result in unfair competition and/or waste of valuable public resources.

"It must be noted that a State funded Work Comp Agency may yield a higher dividend return. This is primarily the result of securing good risks to help assure its initial success. This could only serve to negatively impact the privately funded carriers who would lose such accounts.

"With all these factors weighing so heavily against a State funded Work Comp carrier, I can only surmise, very disappointingly, that many legislators who voted for this measure have done so under the strong influence of the bill's proponents. While I have and will always accept, and in most cases respect the voting decisions of my colleagues, we must have the conviction and courage to take a position which is in the best interest of the people of Hawaii as a whole.

"Mr. Speaker, for all these reasons, Senate Bill 2298, SD 1, HD 2, is a very bad bill and I will be urging the members of this body to oppose its passage."

Representative Liu rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Although, as the prior Representative has stated, much has been said on this bill. I believe that more can and will be said on this bill, so I rise to speak against it. "I think it is unfortunate that we continue to foster the myth that the State getting into the insurance business is a good idea. How many times do we have to lose the taxpayers' money? How many millions of dollars will we have to squander before we understand that? This is another step in that direction.

"This bill and the committee report attached to it tries to go through all kinds of convoluted language to try and assure the reader that somehow we will be separated, that the State will be separated for the implications of what happens in the future with the moneys in this fund.

"Mr. Speaker, it's a shibai.

"Everything which was added in the House draft does nothing to separate the fact that there would not be a State fund but for this Legislature passing laws creating the State fund. That fact will not escape any creditor, any shareholder, any attorney down the road that is looking for a deep pocket, should this fund go belly up, should any mismanagement occur. You can put in all kinds of language about the loans being the only appropriations forever in the future and we know that we can change the law on that at any time. We can talk that the property and the assets are the funds alone and that's fine, but what about the liability? The liability will still rest with us in the end. We are still attaching this body for now and for the foreseeable future to the agency of the State--the Budget and Finance--at least for administrative purposes even after the loan is repaid. A number of the Board members will still be appointed by the Governor. The problems with the management of the funds will still be there.

"The insurance commissioner has to approve of the plan before the fund is even administered. So, rather than making the fund less dependent on the State, that requirement probably puts us in greater danger of being open to liability in the future because that clearly places the State in a knowing position concerning the future plans for this fund.

"Mr. Speaker, on other issues related to the overall issue of liability, both in the general tort area and in workers' comp, in the past few years we have heard the cries for those in opposition to the real change to the fundamental law saying, there is no consensus, we don't know what's going to happen if we change the law. Major sectors of the society in Hawaii have disagreements over this so let's go slow. Let's sit down and talk about it. Let's try and work out compromises. And so, by and large, that has occurred. We did not have major tort reform. We did not have major reform of the workers' comp system. And to some degree, that attitude has assisted the State but I would say, 'Why now?' Why now instead of sitting all the diverse parties together and saying, 'okay, we have a problem, let's see where each of us can make reasonable compromise, let's see where we can see each others' point of view--why can't we do this on this issue when we supposedly did that on the others? I think it shows a lack of leadership; I think it shows a lack of understanding of the dynamics of the area of liability, both in the areas of workers' comp and others.

"What about other state funds? They certainly don't show that they are making a lot of money for the taxpayer or coming out ahead. We always like to point to California as the leader in legislation of all kinds, but the California fund is quickly being criticized by all sectors in California. It is not helping the environment for doing business and creating jobs in that state. The working people in California--those who are affected the most by that workers' compensation state fund--had not seen any rise in benefits for three years. And ultimately, we have to ask ourselves, will the consumers of this State, the people on the street--are they in fact going to benefit one iota from this measure? And the answer, Mr. Speaker, is 'no.'

"I would hope that those who go to conference on this bill, should it pass today, would heed these words, would exercise the leadership necessary to bring about a better approach to the concerns that I think we all do have on workers' compensation, that instead of getting us involved in an insurance business like some other type of measures will be conceived of, and we can come back next session or the session after that to take a look at it.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative O'Kieffe rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"As we all know, many claims have been made to justify the implementation of a Hawaii Workers' Compensation Fund. Proponents point to experiences in other states with state funds, such as California, Ohio and Minnesota, as reasons why Hawaii should consider adopting a state fund as an appropriate vehicle to lower workers' compensation rates. With these persuasive arguments and over \$450-million in surplus tax monies sitting in State coffers, the \$10-million appropriated by this bill may seem both reasonable and attractive. However, before we buy this vehicle, I ask my colleagues to look at it a little closer, to kick the tires, look under the hood and get a full disclosure on the bill of sale before we write the check and drive it off the lot.

"First, let's have a look at claims that rates in California, Ohio and Minnesota have been moderated by having a state fund. In California, premiums have increased 41 percent since 1985 while benefits to injured workers have not increased since 1984. In Minnesota, despite starting a competitive state fund in 1982, workers' compensation rates have increased 60 percent and now it has the fourth highest rates in the nation. A dubious distinction, considering it was in fourteenth place four years ago. Ohio, which has a monopolistic state fund, requires employers to carry the state fund or be selfinsured. This State has experienced a 30-50 percent increase in rates to compensate for a deficit of \$1.5-The so-called 'success' of these experiences billion. should be red flags to all of us and give us pause to think.

"As to the claims that a state fund will induce competition to the market and thereby lower rates, please consider some significant facts that belie this. There are already over two hundred private insurers writing workers' compensation insurance in Hawaii. Predictions based on the Minnesota experience state that, at best, Hawaii's State Fund could write only \$20-million, 8 percent of the \$262-million workers' compensation market. Does this sound as if competition is needed or will be provided?

"Doubts have also been raised by people such as Dr. John Haldi, the State's consultant on workers' compensation, as to whether the State has the necessary expertise and background in underwriting, claims handling, data processing, and financial experience essential in undertaking this enterprise. With over two hundred companies already writing workers' comp, where will a fledgling non-profit independent public corporation find the expertise to ensure economic viability? If we look to the State's dismal past record in running other insurance ventures, these doubts are quite prudent. I'm sure we all remember the Thrift Guaranty Fund that required a \$30-million bailout from the State after going bankrupt. I think most of us can also recall the Patients' Compensation Fund that also went bankrupt and currently has \$20-million in outstanding liabilities.

"The fear that this \$10-million appropriation is only the beginning is quite real considering the State's prior experience with Thrift Guaranty and Patients' Compensation Fund. Certain investment counselors have estimated that \$40-million may have to be poured into the fund to ensure solvency--with the taxpayers of Hawaii footing both the financial burden and the risk.

"Under the circumstances, Mr. Speaker, I fear that a State fund is fiscally unwise and unwarranted. By providing for such a fund, we once again put ourselves in the position of avoiding the real issues...addressing those elements of workers' compensation that do not make it fair to workers, business owners, and insurance companies alike.

"I ask my colleagues to join me in voting against this bill. This is one vehicle we ought not to buy.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Crozier rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, on September 2nd through September 4th, we had a Hawaii Workers' Compensation State Fund Conference at Ala Moana Hotel. At that conference many people in the community, both business, labor and legislators, were invited to participate, to take the time to understand the merits of a state funded workers' compensation program.

"Prior to that conference, I was against State Fund. Being one with limited background in insurance, I felt that private industry should be totally responsible for it; however, I had a need to learn more about the issue. I thought business had a need to also learn. I thought my fellow colleagues had a need to learn to enlighthen themselves a little bit more about the issue. Mr. Speaker, you know I am not a special person, I am just an average legislator. I made the attempt to go. What was very disappointing to me was business intentionally boycotted the conference. They kept themselves in the dark. Their argument was that it's a sales pitch. Okay, business survives on sales pitches. We, in this process, function by listening to people giving us sales pitches, and we should have honed our ability to see through the sales pitches.

"What was more disheartening for me was the attendance of my colleagues at that conference. We had something like ten, sir--ten legislators out of 76. And both the House and the Senate should spend the time to come down to the Ala Moana Hotel and listen. And to be honest with you, it was quite boring, but I thought I had an obligation to the people of Hawaii to get down there and try to learn, try to listen, try to see through the sales pitch. But you know what happened? I bought into the sales pitch because they put arguments before me that convinced me that they do have a good program. So, when my colleagues stand up and make all these statements, they pontificate how bad workmen's comp is. I wonder how much research they've looked at, or how deep did they dig on the other side of the issue.

"When they talk about the different state funds, nobody talks about Arizona. Why aren't you folks talking about Arizona? Did any of you take the time to look at what Arizona has to offer? Arizona has a mature plan. They have been around since 1969 and let me just make a few comments. The rate stabilization--they've had the same and I'm quoting them: 'To summarize the rates of the workmen's compensation insurance in Arizona, effective October 1987, will be the same level as the rates effective October 1, 1979. Eight years, they still at the same rate. Admittedly, they went up but they were able to come back down. Efficiency. The Arizona State Fund has averaged an 18 percent administrative expense ratio from 1976 through 1986. A comparable administrative expense ratio for private insurance carriers is 35 percent. None of my colleagues are challenging these statements. These are bold statements for an insurance state fund to make, but nobody from business comes up and says Arizona is giving inaccurate information.

"In fact, with about 30 percent of the market place insured with the state fund, more dividends, more dividends were returned to Arizona employers by the fund than by all private carriers combined. The employers are benefitting by this program. The moneys are coming back to their company, to their plants, to their facilities, so that they can reinvest.

"Market share. Arizona State Fund says, first we deliver one product--workers' compensation insurance. Second, we deliver our product in one area--Arizona. Third, our product has the best price and service and even with packaging on multi-state coverage, the competition must market a higher quality product or lose the customer.

"Finally, when the market turns and private carriers pull back their operations in Arizona, we were there ready and able to provide a needed workers' compensation coverage.

"Mr. Speaker, all of these arguments were presented at the conference, but business boycotted and my colleagues, for whatever reason, they did not show up to listen to the sales pitch. Had you listened to the sales pitch, you could have rebutted it but nobody's doing it. Just ten legislators took the time to go and listen.

"For that reason, sir, I am supporting this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I don't doubt what the Representative says is true, that there are different states that have workers' comp state funds that are working.

"The problem is, and I am not against a state fund as long as we adopt all of the laws that that particular state has that's working. And we've gone into conference after conference where we've asked them to accept all of the laws. And over and over, they said there's nothing wrong with our laws. If there's nothing wrong with our laws, then we should not be in trouble. Then the private sector would not be against this. They would be out fighting for it. But you don't hear them fighting. In fact, when we had the people from San Francisco here and we were talking to them about their Workers' Comp Fund, they said we are now getting maybe 30 percent, but we really don't have a full line of media coverage. We only have airlines, we have the radio, we have television-they didn't miss the media, but they were only getting 30 percent. And I am not sure what Arizona is getting.

"But I would gladly, sir, accept any state fund if we would accept all of the laws of that particular state and for this reason, I am voting no, and I wish my colleagues would also, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Bunda rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to preface my remarks by saying that it has never been my intention and I am sure not all of you are either, to limit our workers' compensation laws to the point of denying benefits to those deserving just compensation, and I firmly believe that we must have a fair system which benefits the employee and the employer.

"The system we have today, Mr. Speaker, although it may not be a perfect one, is part of a long-term foundation which was laid in 1966 when the Democratic Party of Hawaii prepared a document called the New Hawaii. In it our past leaders recognized the importance to think long term by setting up the parameters under which you and I work within. They were committed to the proposition that 'all segments of our society must be partner,' in order to strengthen our economic base. To achieve this goal, the document further states that 'promote the economic climate by encouraging employment and improving the laws regulating business and related transactions.'

"It is important that all members of our productive system, be it management, labor, and consumer, be beneficiaries rather than victims of the changes which are occurring presently.

"With the workers' compensation bill that lies before us, Mr. Speaker, we all can agree that both the merits and demerits of this measure have been very convincing. But regardless of how much we justify the facts for or against the bill, it does not preclude us from passing it. In addition, it would merely be an excuse to say that this measure will serve as a check to the insurance industry by using it as a data base.

"I go back to the quotation, 'improving the laws regulating business and related transactions' which was cited previously. We, legislators, past and present, have discerned that there is a difference between regulating and competing. We have distinguished the mechanism which we have properly placed to provide the check and the balance of the insurance industry and that, Mr. Speaker, was the creation of the insurance commissioner.

"And permit me to be bold by saying that any crises or any wrongdoing which goes undetected or unchecked may be the fault of our regulators. But contrarily, what we have before us is not of improving the laws of an already highly regulated industry, but instead, what we have before us is the establishment of a non-profit organization by government which needs \$10-million to turnkey its operation and which is in direct competition with the insurance industry. This is an act opposite to all segments of our society being partners.

"In rate setting, Mr. Speaker, according to this measure, the ultimate decision rests with the insurance commissioner. I ask you, what have we accomplished? The answer is 'nothing,' because the insurance commissioner is already charged with that responsibility. Yes, we, as legislators, had cause to be alarmed in the past because of soaring rates but I believe our regulators and the Legislature have been responsive and as a result, rates presently have been on the decline. Perhaps then, Mr. Speaker, what we should be really concentrating on is not a State Fund but a real need to staff properly the insurance commissioner's office.

"Finally, Mr. Speaker, I firmly believe we should not get into another fund and if we do, it seems we have not learned from our past experiences such as the Thrift Guaranty Fund and the Patient Compensation Fund, and I believe staffing adequately the insurance commissioner's office would be more cost efficient and more prudent.

"Mr. Speaker, because of the above, I am voting 'no' for it."

Representative Liu, in rebuttal, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it seems to me that if the State is out to promote information and fair information on this subject, then views from all competing sides should be presented at a seminar.

"Unfortunately, this was not the case this past summer and I think any individual or any group that decided not to attend because they knew that they had a philosophical as well as informational based opposition to this State Fund had every right not to attend because, in fact, opposing views were not solicited to be part of the program. I don't have to spend four hours of my time listening to a sales pitch. I've researched this issue as much as anyone.

"Concerning Arizona, I think the Minority Floor Leader has explained well the problems and differences between the Arizona State Fund versus the potential Hawaii State Fund. And if we want to talk about mature funds, there are a lot more that are in trouble than are in good health.

"So finally, Mr. Speaker, let me end by saying that the Republican Caucus today will be voting fully informed, and we will be voting fully for the benefit of the working people of this State who ultimately are going to have to pay the bill for this Fund at the breadline, at the supermarkets, gasoline stations, and in their taxes.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Jones rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Just briefly, Mr. Speaker, there's some questions I would like my colleagues to consider today. I think that as we are making a major large investment of our taxpayers and the voters' money, we should really analyze what is the liability of the State of Hawaii when we start special programs to meet the needs of individual company coverage. Can a State organization do that? I doubt it. We have not been able to provide that level of personnel for two other funds which we have lost massive amounts of money on. Why does it seem that some of the only ones that favor this Fund are those special interest who are going to be moving a lot of this money around, making big commissions out of investing this money for the State at the expense of the taxpayers. We just cannot afford to get involved in this until some honest questions like these are answered and we should go to seminars but we have to be careful that we don't buy the sizzle but that we buy into the meat. And as we look into places like Arizona, we either ask questions like, what was the legal environment there? They would be different from ours. And how should our laws be changed like the presumption clause? What about the vested funds that have been with We've got a big huge reserve and us since 1969. personnel resources.

"I think that a lot of good intentions might be behind this Fund but it definitely is not for the people who are supposed to benefit and that's the employers and the employees. So, why do we buy the sizzle when frankly, there is no meat behind it. I do not believe that the voters in my district want me to commit them to a liability of tens of millions of dollars by funding this Fund with the questions that we still must have to answer.

"Therefore, please, vote against this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Crozier, in rebuttal, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, we spent \$150,000 for that seminar and that seminar tried to answer many, many of the questions presented right here on this floor by my colleagues from across the aisle. Had they gone to the seminar, those questions may not have been asked today. They may have come up with different questions, more meaningful questions. But had they just read the reports, they were all in there.

"For that reason, sir, I ask my colleagues to support this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Cavasso rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Insurance rates have been and are continuing to drop in Hawaii. This Comp Fund is not necessary. Other states with work comp funds such as Alaska and Minnesota are among the highest rates in the nation and every single business or business group came to testify against this Fund. Those people whom it is designed to benefit are testifying against it, they don't want it, we don't need it, it's inappropriate for us.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2298, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HAWAII WORKER'S COMPENSATION STATE FUND," having been read throughoutl, passed Third Reading by a vote of 31 ayes to 20 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Bellinger, Bunda, Cavasso, Hashimoto, Hayes, Hemmings, Jones, Kanoho, Liu, Marumoto, Medeiros, O'Kieffe, Oshiro, Peters, Pfeil, Ribellia, Say, Shito and Tajiri voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 2298 had passed Third Reading at 2:29 o'clock p.m.

Representative Tam rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Too often in the past, our school buildings have been allowed to run down--broken windows, leaky roofs, peeling paint, and other signs of disrepair, gave our students the impression that public education was not a high priority in the State of Hawaii. The Governor and the leadership of this House are to be commended for their assistance that public schools should be second to none and that we deliver quality education to our public school students. When we say quality we mean, not only quality educational programs, but also quality educational facilities.

"In the past few years, the Legislature has approved generous funding to repair our schools. This bill will assure that these schools do not again fall into disrepair. The bill provides statutory authority for a systematic maintenance program which will be ongoing and permanent.

"Last year, House Resolution No. 84 requested DAGS to develop this program. Your Committee on Eduction held informational public hearings statewide on a community basis on this issue during the months of October and November of last year. All of the testimony was in full support of a continuous maintenance program.

"In stressing the point of a continuous maintenance program, I would like to make a comparison. If a buyer of an automobile buys a car under warranty, that buyer is requested to do certain things in terms of maintenance. If that buyer does not do so, that buyer ends up paying more money on maintenance on his or her car and also may void the warranty.

"This is also true of our public buildings. A systematic maintenance program will save the taxpayers money in the long run. A House budget contains an extra \$10-million to continue the accelerated pace of repair and maintenance and to establish a systematic maintenance program which blends in with this bill to establish a permanent maintenance program.

"In my discussion this past weekend with the Governor of our State of Hawaii, he expressed strong support for this program of a permanent maintenance system. We intend that every public school student, every parent, and every teacher will know that the Legislature places a high priority on public schools, that public education is firstclass education.

"In closing, Mr. Speaker, your Committee finds that it is of grave importance to use Senate Bill 1539, SD 1, HD 1, to establish a permanent maintenance program and eliminate a nightmare that has haunted this State of ours for many years.

"I thank all my members on the Committee on Education in working very hard towards a permanent maintenance program. I urge my fellow members to support this bill.

"Thank you."

No discussion has come about concerning future cost. Will the Judiciary have to come in for extra staff in this area or some sort of funds to subsidize this counseling? And quite frankly, I don't know whether or not counseling at this stage of the situation for people who get involved in this area will be that helpful. Lacking that kind of information, both concerning effectiveness and cost implications for the future, I will be voting 'no.'

"Thank you, Mr. Speakr."

At 2:59 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

"I believe, especially the women in this chamber and those open-minded men, would like to also see equal protection under the law on this particular item. Too often in the past, the women have been victimized by prostitution in our country and the men who are providing the money to make that industry viable, are walking away scot-free.

And it's also going to spend \$9-million setting up an information-type promotion of business and once again, if you want the telecommunications business in Hawaii, create tax incentives and enterprise zones. Don't spend taxpayers' money trying to create an artificial environment for business.

"This is another boondoggle bill in a vintage administration saying one thing and doing another. Therefore, I urge my colleagues to vote 'no' against it."

Representative Liu rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"To add to the statements of the prior speaker on the Part 2 section of this bill which creates a Hawaii Information Network Corporation attached to the Governor's Office, some interesting things which will be part of this new office, new bureaucracy, includes exemption from the competitive bidding process for a number of things, including hardware for computers and software, as long as they get two-thirds approval from the Board of Directors. I think that's a major circumvention of general State policy in the area of biddings.

"Secondly, legislative review does not occur until after three years have lapsed; \$9-million is appropriated. I think this is an area where some in the private sector can be faulted because I think there's a sense that a lot of this money could go to one of them or a number of them under special contracts, et cetera. They just don't know who yet so I think the idea is, better stay quiet until we see what happens.

"For that matter, Mr. Speaker, I will be voting 'no' on this bill.

"Thank you."

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 1265, 2848, 2644, 1223, 3230, 2267 and 2819 had passed Third Reading at 3:11 o'clock p.m.

At 3:11 o'clock p.m., Representative Anderson asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 3:14 o'clock p.m.

## S.B. No. 3233, SD 2, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Anderson and carried, S.B. No. 3233, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENTERPRISE ZONES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

## S.B. No. 2451, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Anderson and carried, S.B. No. 2451, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ACCIDENTAL INJURY LEAVE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

## S.B. No. 574, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Anderson and carried, S.B. No. 574, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FINANCIAL DISCLOSURES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

## S.B. No. 2818, SD 2, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that S.B. No. 2818, SD 2, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Anderson.

Representative Hemmings rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I have the pleasure once again to stand up and speak against Senate Bill No. 2818, SD 2, HD 2.

"Mr. Speaker, this is another tax, believe it or not, with all this wonderful surplus that we milked the people of Hawaii, the workers and the laborers and all their hard-earned money out of their pockets, and we're going to add a new tax to get more money that government can allegedly spend.

"I think it is interesting to note for those of you who don't already know that the Tax Foundation on their annual computations of the average wage earners in Hawaii reports that two hours and forty-four minutes of every work day spent by the workers of Hawaii are paying for government. That's more than they spend working to pay for housing, food, or anything else. I wish I could honestly say they were getting something for their money.

"This particular bill in 1988, we gave a one year moratorium on the total amount of money collected for unemployment tax. That's because we have \$250-million--taxpayers' money--under the government mattress in Washington, D.C. doing nobody any good but just sitting there. That money, or a good portion of it, if it was here in Hawaii it could be creating jobs, it could be creating economic diversity, and creating opportunity for more taxes in the future to be paid to existing tax resources.

"But rather than extend the moratorium, what we are going to do is we are going to put a tax in place and we're going to give it to the infamous Department of Labor because they have been so good at creating jobs and economic opportunities in Hawaii. And we're going to create a skilled workforce in Hawaii without increasing employer taxes by increasing the taxes already here.

"If we kept the money in the private sector, that money could create job opportunity and believe me the private sector would respond in kind by creating their own skilled work force. We have no economic diversity because of taxes like this, and I urge my colleagues that it is time we really give serious consideration to the philosophy of our government.

"If, in fact, increased taxes and increased government regulation, and increased programs were going to benefit our economy, we would be sitting on a gold mine because that's all we've been doing for the last twenty years. But the performance of the recent twenty years has done just the opposite, and I urge us to stop this foolhardy expenditure of taxpayers' money. Let the private sector spend the money as they see fit. Let the workers of Hawaii keep the money in their pockets to create their own economic opportunity and their own prosperity because government has failed miserably in doing so.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2818, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMPLOYMENT SECURITY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 41 ayes to 10 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Cavasso, Hemmings, Jones, Liu, Marumoto, Medeiros, O'Kieffe, Pfeil and Ribellia voting no.

## S.B. No. 2822, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that S.B. No. 2822, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Anderson.

## Representative Marumoto rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against this measure becuse I believe that just to conform with the Penal Code is a poor excuse for this bill.

"Perhaps we are concerned about inflation which necessitates our raising this dollar limit but I cannot condone raising the amount before unemployment insurance fraud becomes a felony. By changing the limit from \$200 to \$300, we are providing a license to steal another \$100.

"That is the reason why I will be voting against this measure.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2822, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMPLOYMENT SECURITY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 41 ayes to 10 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Cavasso, Hemmings, Jones, Liu, Marumoto, Medeiros, O'Kieffe, Pfeil and Ribellia voting no.

S.B. No. 3146, SD 1, HD 1:

By unanimous consent, action was deferred to the end of the calendar.

S.B. No. 112, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that S.B. No. 112, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Anderson.

Representative Liu rose and requested that his remarks, against the bill, be inserted in the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Liu's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against this bill.

"I believe that this is an area where conforming with the IRC would be bad public policy. Tax deductions of up to \$100 per candidate per taxpayer with a cap of \$500 per taxpayer is reasonable and encourages small contributions to campaigns which is something all the political experts, and campaign reformers support. Taking away this deduction is one more signal to the general public that we do not welcome their participation in the political process.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 112, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 7 noes, with Representatives Cavasso, Ihara, Jones, Levin, Liu, Pfeil and Ribellia voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 3233, 2451, 574, 2818, 2822 and 112 had passed Third Reading at 3:20 o'clock p.m.

At 3:21 o'clock p.m., Representative Anderson asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 3:43 o'clock p.m.

## **STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS**

Representative Metcalf, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1200-88) recommending that S.B. No. 3226, HD 1, pass Third Reading.

Representative Metcalf, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1201-88) recommending that S.B. No. 3248, SD 2, HD 1, pass Third Reading.

Representative Metcalf, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1202-88) rcommending that S.B. No. 2871, SD 1, HD 1, pass Third Reading. Representative Metcalf, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1203-88) recommending that S.B. No. 2448, SD 1, HD 1, pass Third Reading.

Representative Apo moved that the reports of the Committee be adopted and S.B. Nos. 3226, HD 1; 3248, SD 2, HD 1; 2871, SD 1, HD 1; and 2448, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Anderson.

Representative Liu then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against all four bills on Supplemental Calendar 1.

"Mr. Speaker, I am voting to register my concern that the Minority had no specific notice that these bills would be cropping up on a supplemental calendar today. I think it's unfair. I do know that these bills have to go over; they do have to cross over because they have been amended, but I think with all due respect, Mr. Speaker, there should have been some better processing along the way so that although they meet the technical requirements and the legal requirements for passage today, however we did not get notice that these would appear on the Order of the Day for today.

"For that reason, I am registering my protest by voting 'no' on all four bills.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Metcalf rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in support of all four bills.

"At first, I would like to thank the Minority Caucus, I think, for their hospitality shown me this morning in allowing me to present the explanation of the bills to the Minority Caucus. I will note, Mr. Speaker, that they had no questions.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I am against all four bills. It's not the bills themselves but the procedure I think that the Minority Leader was objecting to, and I would like to have his remarks inserted in the Journal as my own, please.

"Thank you."

The Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered." (By reference only)

At 3:45 o'clock p.m., Representative Peters asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 3:46 o'clock p.m.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the reports of the Committee were adopted and the following bills, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Anderson and Liu voting no:

S.B. No. 3226, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE LAND FIRE PROTECTION LAW";

S.B. No. 3248, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BOTTLED WATER";

S.B. No. 2871, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH INFORMATION"; and

S.B. No. 2448, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO VEHICLES LEFT UNATTENDED ON PRIVATE AND PUBLIC PROPERTY".

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 3226, 3248, 2871 and 2448 had passed Third Reading at 3:47 o'clock p.m.

#### MATTERS DEFERRED FROM EARLIER ON THE CALENDAR

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1070-88 on S.B. No. 2269, SD 1. HD 2:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Anderson and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2269, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Liu voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 2269 had passed Third Reading at 3:48 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 739, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that S.B. No. 739, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Anderson.

Representative O'Kieffe rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"At the first crossover, March 7th, I rose to speak against House Bill 2020. At this time, I would like to ask the Clerk to insert those remarks into today's Journal with the following addendum:

"Although the original S.B. 739 was gutted and the substance of H.B. 2020 added, I am pleased to see that one of my concerns, 'the exchange of lands,' has been added in Section 171.

"This bill is still too wide as it doesn't specify TMK's or realistic value for the 58 parcels. A one dollar figure is grossly inadequate just as \$98-million in H.B. 2020 may be grossly understated.

"While I agree with the basic concept of land bank, government already owns 50 percent of the land in the State. It's already banked.

"I hope the Conference Committee will consider my concerns in their deliberations and that I can support the concept when the conference draft comes back for Final Reading.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative O'Kieffe's remarks of March 7, 1988 on H.B. No. 2020, HD 2, are as follows:

"While I agree there are certain prized properties like Makalawena that should be preserved from development and for future generations, I am concerned how the list of 58 pieces was derived and why provision was made only to purchase them. When you consider that the State already owns 36.5% of the lands, and when you couple that with what the counties and the federal government owns, it boils down to the fact that government owns 50% of the lands in our State.

"The bill states that 'the concept of land banking, the immediate acquisition of land from future public benefit, is vital to controlling the future growth, development, and land use within the State.'

"The question I was asked is, can't land already be effectively controlled through the Board of Land and Natural Resources, the Land Use Commission, the County Planning Commissions, and the County Councils and as we recently learned from Makalawena by the public?

"Mr. Speaker, the original version of the bill calls for an appropriation of \$98-million. As I know several of these parcels intimately, this figure would be more reasonably considered a down payment. What then is the real figure with which we will be dealing?

"In addition, at least one parcel has a group of private homes already established on it. If condemnation proceedings are initiated, it should be apparent that these properties and others like it would be vigorously protected and will certainly result in antagonistic and expensive litigation. Will the litigation cost be included in this bill?

"The Committee Report appropriates one dollar so that a more accurate amount can be determined at a later date. While we have children sharing textbooks and going to school in teachers' lounges, and while affordable housing is at a crisis stage, is it really appropriate to think about buying more now when government has 50% banked already?

"While I agree with the basic intent, I would hope that when this bill reaches the Senate, they will amend it to include the criteria used to select the parcels. The public will have a chance to concur with the selection and that the parcels be specifically identified by tax map key number.

"In addition to asking the Department of Land and Natural Resources for a realistic appraisal of each parcel be tantamount to unleashing a pack of money-hungry speculators.

"On the other hand, it is not unreasonable to get a reasonable estimate of the total as well as to have each prioritized.

"And finally, I would ask that the exchange of lands be a permitted means of acquiring the cited parcels.

"I hope that I will be able to vote 'aye' on this bill when it comes back from the Senate.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hemmings rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against the bill.

"Mr. Speaker, could I ask the Clerk to insert Representative O'Kieffe's comments as if they were my own in the Journal, please?" The Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Crozier rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, first of all, unless we have an exact purpose for the use of lands, I feel very uncomfortable about the general concept of land banking. The great nation of New Zealand has a policy there where if you don't use your lands they charge the higher tax. The idea is that all lands are supposed to be put into production so that the nation can benefit by it.

"What I am concerned about this bill is that this 50 some odd parcels that have been potentially designated as something that would go into the land bank. . . a couple of weeks ago I checked around and I checked with the Department of Land and Natural Resources and I asked where did this list come from. And their remark to me was, 'Oh, this is an old wish list that we put together a few administrations ago that has just been sitting around.' Well, someone came to get it and asked for it and they plugged it in.

"Now, I don't know if we are really serious about looking at the different parcels of land. Let me explain the one piece of property that I am familiar with. In there they talk about the shoreline lands in the Campbell Industrial Park area. If anyone is familiar with the Campbell Industrial Park area, all of that land is in production--be it the feedlot, be it a chemical plant, be it a petroleum refinery plant, be it a deep-draft harbor, be it West Beach--all of that land is already being used. Why is this one piece of property that I am familiar with in that list? The argument may be, well, it's alright, we can just take it out.

"I have another sense. I don't know, I can't put my finger on it but because so many pieces of property are in there, maybe, and just maybe, there's a hidden agenda. Maybe we are setting up one piece of property to be land banked and instead of flagging it out, we are burying it like a card in a deck of cards--52 parcels--hopefully, we won't recognize what the play is. I am concerned about that.

"I ask my fellow colleagues to support me in voting this bill down.

"Thank you very much."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose and requested a conflict ruling, saying, "My family is in escrow on a piece of property in Item No. 2, Wailea Bay, and we went into escrow before either these bills hit the deck in this chamber."

The Chair ruled, "no conflict."

Representative Lee then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"As I've said on another occasion, this represents a very imaginative and very forward-thinking part on all of us to make sure that our heritage remains intact and we do this at an opportune time because the State is in a financial position to do so. I am sure that when the bill is looked over and when the specific pieces of land are considered, all the interests of everyone are going to be taken into account, not only of the State or the people, but also the landowners involved. It is going to be a matter of give and take. "What we are trying to do here is to make sure that our heritage, the land that is ours, the land that involves beaches, scenic and natural beauties that contribute to the beauty and the attraction of Hawaii--we want to make sure that this heritage remains intact, not only for ourselves but for our children and grandchildren.

"For this reason, I urge my colleagues to vote for this bill because it would be too late in a few years when the land becomes more precious, more valuable, both in terms of money and in terms of precious development, and we would like to make sure that we can live a contribution from this Legislature that will be remembered for decades thereafter.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, regardless of what the prior speaker said, there is a lot of people that own land that is their heritage and they are worried that they have homes on it and we're going to buy it. And yet, they are way down on the list. There's no priorities, they don't know where they stand, or why they're even on them. Another gentleman came up and told us that he had just purchased and he is worried.

"There are parcels here that we have not received a priority list on. We don't know who is going to buy it, why they are buying it, but we do have a commission. Now, I voted for the commission because I thought this bill was dead. I have nothing against land banking but just to take a list and say originally that there's \$98million and we're going to purchase land and then we don't prioritize, we don't give any figures on, we don't know if it's going to cost us a dollar or a million dollars or thirty-five million or a hundred and fifty million. I mean there's absolutely nothing.

"I am hoping that the chairman and the rest of them, when they go into conference, will delete that section where it has all of these different parcels and allow us to start from scratch on what we need, why we need it, and who it is going to benefit, rather than an old wish list that some people haven't even checked to find out if they're new owners and did they inherit it, were the leases upwhatever reason that it's in fee that we want to purchase.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

At 3:55 o'clock p.m., Representative Kanoho asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 3:56 o'clock p.m.

Representative Peters then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I share for the record that this list here was put together rather capriciously. It is my understanding that a few of the chosen, perhaps one of the members from Mililani, was one of those chosen in these halls to put their request in. But quite a few did not have that opportunity. The Republicans just went down because procedurely they thought something was wrong but for the record, procedurely putting together a list of properties that this body would like to have in the name of land banking certainly doesn't make sense. I have a lot of properties out in Waianae that people out there would like to see in land banking too. "I got the same response that Representative Crozier had and I initiated the request or inquiry to the Department of Land and Natural Resources. It was a list that somebody put together a number of years ago because they were being pressured by our committee who originally had the House bill referred to it to come up with something. They did, and after talking to the chairman they put it together by way of asking a few members here what kind of wish list they had, but others were eliminated--right?

"Representative Kotani talked about bigotry--that's it! I talked about the Hawaiians not wanting to have their lands ripped off--they're getting screwed again. That's exactly what this is. You gotta be kidding! At least the Japanese from Japan, they wouldn't put their money by their mouth. They are not going to rip us off. They will pay the fair market value, sometimes even higher. They're the ones getting ripped off. But we nurture the bigotry and we nurture the discrimination when we pass something like the Martin Luther King Day. If that isn't bigotry, I don't know what is.

"Thank you."

Representative Hemmings rose on a point of order and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, was the previous speaker addressing this bill or some other bill?"

The Chair answered:

"I believe in general he was talking about lands--yes."

Representative Hemmings thanked the Chair.

Representative Jones rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I am appalled, I am really appalled that we would spend \$100-million. Do our taxpayers know we're going to spend \$100-million which we could give back to them for a wish list? I just cannot imagine--this just boggles my mind that we can sit here with this audacity and do this.

"And I think Mr. Peters' comments were very much in order. Only the people being ripped off here are the taxpayers of the State of Hawaii. We have a constitutional amendment mandating that we would return excess moneys. We're not returning it, we're spending \$100-million on peoples' wish list.

"I strongly encourage my colleagues to vote this down.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Souki rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"For those who are speaking about the excess of dollars being spent, I would like to say that this is probably the best bargain the State ever had. All we have in the budget is one dollar. That's a bargain!"

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 739, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LANDS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 35 ayes to 16 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Bunda, Cavasso, Crozier, Hashimoto, Hemmings, M. Ige, Jones, Kanoho, Liu, Marumoto, Medeiros, O'Kieffe, Peters, Ribellia and Say voting no. The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 739 had passed Third Reading at 4:03 o'clock p.m.

#### S.B. No. 3175, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that S.B. No. 3175, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Anderson.

Representative Crozier rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, first of all, the reason why I'm standing up so much to speak right now is because anytime there's a bill that I had problems with, I just ask the Majority Floor Leader to move it to the end of the calendar so that we could have some kind of an order so that people weren't just standing up and speaking on different bills at different times. So it is my little contribution to an orderly process.

"Now, I want to explain why I keep standing up. I don't want to have an image, you know, of just speaking constantly.

"The reason I am against this bill, sir, is not that I don't want to see the State make more moneys with their investments but my major concern is the potential, and I use the word 'potential' for problems, for graft, for misappropriations. We've never had in the history of the State of Hawaii any kind of misuse of this authority, nor am I saying that the present administration would misuse this authority, nor an I saying that the next administration will.

"However, when you are moving \$100-million around and you start talking to different people across the United States where you're going to put these moneys, if you don't have a strong oversight on that one individual who will be determining where the investment goes, the potential for problems are there. That is my major concern.

"Right now, the way we have it is all the banks in Hawaii are looking at each other and they are looking at our Budget and Finance Director so that's our built-in oversight committee. But as we move across the United States, our bankers here cannot watch as closely, and in a few years--five, ten, fifteen years from now, there may be some Budget and Finance Director who does not have the same standards or scruples that we have today that may take advantage of where he or she places those funds. A kickback here and a kickback there, you know, nobody's gonna know. But the people of Hawaii will be hurt by that type of graft, and that is why I am voting against this bill.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 3175, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DEPOSIT AND INVESTMENT OF STATE FUNDS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no. with Representative Crozier voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 3175 had passed Third Reading at 4:05 o'clock p.m.

#### S.B. No. 3146, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that S.B. No. 3146, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Anderson.

<sup>&</sup>quot;Thank you."

Representative Hayes rose to speak in favor of the bill but "with grave misgivings," stating:

"The background for this was that in the area of leasehold properties, there is at least one. . . I guess you'd call him a highway man who swoops in sometimes in the midst of discussions between unit owners and landowners and skims the cream off. He will offer the landowner a larger price than the unit owners have judged as the correct price on the basis of their appraisals, then he will call a meeting of the apartment owners and say, 'this is the way it is. You will have to pay me so much by such and such a time and if you don't, the price will go up by so many dollars a month, sometimes a year,' and because of this surrender clause, the unit owners are panicked.

"What happened to the bill in the House, this Senate bill on which I am speaking, was that in effect the highway man has permission to continue his operation with no chance of slander. The bill has been amended so that a single refusal amounts to a rejection of the offer of land and that unless a hundred percent of the unit owners accept the offer, it is a rejection. At that point, the free enterprise man can say, 'well, we've given you the right of first refusal so we can go ahead and do what we want.'

"In the Senate amendments to our House bill, some rather sensible things were done for one, the condominium association was given the power to buy all the land if 65 percent of the unit owners approved. No one was to be forced to buy the land and once the purchase was made, the owners who could not or would not buy the land were simply leaseholders but the association became the landowner.

"It's because of the good things about the Senate action on our bill, coupled with some of what are called Steve Cobb's Christmas tree amendments, in this case he added the restrictions on bed and breakfast properties to this bill.

"Because of these facts, I hope it will go to conference because I think there's a chance that in conference it can be improved. For that reason, I'm voting for the bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Crozier rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I will be voting 'no' on this bill just for the reasons my colleague from Waikiki has stated, and also because of the nightmare that it will create for the apartment dwellers. They'll be started in the process and if they don't finalize that thing in enough time, then they lose out. I think this bill would do them more injustice than they realize.

"For that reason, I will be voting 'no.'

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 3146, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROPERTY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 7 noes, with Representatives Bunda, Cachola, Crozier, Hashimoto, Kanoho, Peters and Yoshimura voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 3146 had passed Third Reading at 4:11 o'clock p.m.

# INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 346 and 350 to 352) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

No. 346, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION CONGRATULATING AND RECOGNIZING THE PACIFIC BUSINESS NEWS," was jointly offered by Representatives Kotani, Anderson, Andrews, Arakaki, Bellinger, Bunda, Cachola, Fukunaga, Hagino, Hashimoto, Hayes, Hirono, Honda, D. Ige, M. Ige, Ihara, Kanoho, Kawakami, Kihano, Leong, Levin, Metcalf, O'Kieffe, Okamura, Oshiro, Peters, Pfeil, Ribellia, Say, Shito, Shon, Souki, Tajiri, Takamine, Tam, Taniguchi, Tom and Yoshimura.

On motion by Representative Kotani, seconded by Representative D. Ige and carried, H.R. No. 346 was adopted.

Representative Kotani rose to introduce the honoree, stating:

"After unsuccessfully attempting to break the record set by the good Representative from Mililani last session, I know that my colleagues realize that I take great pleasure in recognizing Hawaii's valued citizens and honoring their contributions. I am certain they also wish that I would try to restrain my pleasure-seeking and take up bowling instead.

"Be that as it may, I am sure that all of us agree that it would be remiss of us if we fail to recognize and congratulate the Pacific Business News for its twenty-five years of service to our community. And, of course, one cannot speak about the Pacific Business News without mentioning its founder, editor, and publisher, George Mason.

"For the past quarter century, Pacific Business News has printed all the news that's fit to print about Hawaii's business community. Many of us in the Capitol rely on PBN for information that the dailies have missed and to get the pulse of the business community.

"Hawaii's economy has changed greatly in the past twenty-five years, moving from the Big Five companies of Territorial Hawaii to the small businesses of the present. Today, over 87 percent of businesses in Hawaii employ less than twenty people. "Perhaps, the most important role of Pacific Business News has been to constantly emphasize and advocate and to bring to the forefront of public consciousness that maintaining the health of the State small business community should be a high priority goal. And while we may not always agree with Mr. Mason's editorial which is as it should be with an independent press, the new awareness of the concerns of small business that Mr. Mason and PBN have promoted has not left the members of our House of Representatives unaffected.

"This session we have acted on legislation to establish one-stop permit processing, to require payment within thirty days by the State to private vendors, and to provide information on financial assistance available to small businesses in an effort to make it easier for small businesses to do business in the islands.

"Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I would like to introduce the editor and publisher of Pacific Business News--Mr. George Mason."

Representative Kotani then asked Mr. Mason to stand to be recognized.

An ilima/ti lei was presented to Mr. Mason by Representative Fukunaga, while Representative Kotani presented him with a certified copy of the resolution.

Representative Fukunaga then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and members of this honorable body, it gives me great pleasure today to speak on behalf of this resolution.

"This year, the House focused on the theme, investing in our future, to underscore the importance of supporting our public school system, the University, and new economic development initiatives and space, telecommunications, Pacific/Asian relations, and waterfront development.

"In keeping with this theme, I would like to introduce to you a shining example of an individual whose little publicized community activities are true expressions of an investment in Hawaii's future. That individual is Frank DeLima.

"While we have all been busy here at the Legislature over the past few months, Mr. Speaker, Frank DeLima has once again been spending a lot of his time visiting the public elementary schools on Oahu. And I might also add that he began this practice, first on the neighbor islands where for the past several years he has also visited all of the schools on the neighbor islands as well. Let me quote from a recent interview from <u>New You</u> magazine in which he says: 'By using humor as a breakthrough, you can get some beneficial value across to our children.' His talks involve practical topics such as developing good study habits, the importance of knowledge, the importance of strong family ties, and most of all the necessity for good laughter. By opening up young peoples' minds, he has done his part to make sure that they are not held back by peer pressure. This is the time when their minds are most open and most impressionable.

"Thus, while we are now planning for the final weeks of our session and major decisions about how we would be allocating our resources, it is a privilege to honor and acknowledge the contributions to Hawaii's children that Frank DeLima has made.

"I might also mention, Mr. Speaker, that Mr. DeLima is also a true reflection of the teachings of Father Damien whom this State will be honoring between April 8 and April 17th. So, just to kick off the festivities and to honor both the memory of Father Damien and his modern-day counterpart, Frank DeLima, each of you has been presented with a genuine Leonard's malasada.

"At this time, may I introduce to our guests and to this honorable body, Mr. Frank DeLima."

Representative Fukunaga then asked Mr. Frank DeLima to stand to be recognized. Accompanying Mr. DeLima was his mother, Mrs. Pearl DeLima; and seated in the gallery were his manager, Mrs. Millie Fujinaga, proprietor of The Noodle Shop; Aunty Carrie DeLima Farias, Aunty Dorothy Silva; Aunty Carrie Young; Aunty Sissy Garlasa, Aunty Helen Washburn, Sister Judy Correa, Godfather David Chow; and one of the students whose life has been enriched by Mr. DeLima's visit, Roddy McGregor.

Representative Hemmings then rose and stated:

"It gives me great pleasure to stand up and speak on behalf of this resolution. Being of Portuguese ancestry, it's especially gratifying to have a true son of Portuguese ancestry honored here today.

"You know, Mr. Speaker, we Portuguese here on the floor sometimes feel a little discriminated against because we, all through the year, see Chinese queens, Filipino queens, and Japanese queens honored here, and we never have a Portuguese queen. Now, I am not saying that Frank's a Portuguese queen but he's ceertainly the next best thing we can get our hands on today.

"Seriously, Mr. Speaker, this man, through his humor, has given us much, and most importantly, he has allowed us to laugh at ourselves and that is a true gift that he has given all the people of Hawaii and it is a pleasure to have him here today and have him honored.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Souki then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, I am very proud that I have one of my own here. I'm of Portuguese blood too, and I believe it goes beyond. . . I think Mr. DeLima here speaks not for the Portuguese but for the world. His style is international and historically, so is the Portuguese. I think he has merrily turned on his style and for his good work, especially in visiting the hospitals and the schools, I think this is more important than even his good humor which we all appreciate. But for your great humanistic spirit, I applaud you. I also applaud for having all that Portuguese aunties. I have never seen so many Portuguese aunties in all of my life.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Crozier then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, even though I have been, I guess, anointed as a Portuguese person, I wish I was, you know, and I wish when I do pass on, when I go to Heaven, I will be in the Portuguese section. I shared that with one of the Representatives today and he said, 'You don't want to go there because they're gonna make too much noise.' But, you know, after looking at all of Frank's aunties and uncle and Godfather up there, I'm wondering who's left in Punchbowl.

"You know, what I really want to say at this time is not to take anything away from Frank and we appreciate his coming, especially coming from Damien--it's not very often we have anybody of substance in the chambers from Damien, you know. You know why I'm doing this? Because he did a number on me at the Democratic Party fundraiser, you know. He really got after the St. Louis guys so this is my chance.

"What I would really like to bring up is some of you may remember about three years ago, Frank DeLima came and performed in our Opening Day and during the program, there was a lady up there, outside the glass, pounding on the glass, jumping up and down, and you know, we all looked up--Wow, we got this big shot Frank DeLima entertaining us but there's a bag lady up there throwing a fit, you know, and Frank was cool enough to say, 'Oh, hi Ma,' and he did a twenty minute routine on talking to his mother out there. But come to find out, that really was his mother. Mrs. DeLima, you offered a lot that day--thank you very much.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Fukunaga presented Mr. DeLima with an ilima/maile lei and a certified copy of the resolution and Representative Souki presented him with a ti/cigar lei.

On motion by Representative Bellinger, seconded by Representative Ribellia and carried, H.R. No. 351 was adopted.

Representative Bellinger rose to introduce the honoree, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, over the last eight years the cast and crew of Magnum have just thrilled not only the people of Hawaii, but they have also captured the imagination of the world. There is one definite thing I think, though, that needs to be clarified right off the bat. The 'P.I.' is not for Portuguese Investigator.

The Chair interrupted and remarked, 'That's Philippine Islands.'

Representative Bellinger continued, saying:

"I believe that's where the next series is going.

"The promotion of Magnum and the opportunities that the film industry bring here to Hawaii are truly a tremendous benefit. During the last eight years there has been over a hundred and sixty-two hours of programming with over \$200-million in funds injected into our economy. The cast and crew have become a very integral part of our island.

"During the off season, I work at the Makai Research Pier at Makapuu and they do quite a bit of their filming out there. And over the years I must say that they are a very professional and friendly group of people and it's just a great delight to have them be representative of all its exciting and good and beautiful of our State.

"Now with the end of the show, however, there is a few lingering questions that can probably be answered. During the shows, each character has had certain things they've been identified with and so for the producer, you know, maybe you could write us a note to find out, number one, will Ice Pick ever be able to retire in Hawaii without Rick constantly calling him up for cigarettes? Will TC's helicopter ever be safe from bullets and running out of fuel on its way to some unknown island that we've never heard of? Will we finally hear the end of, 'My, God, Magnum, what are you up to now?' Is the wine cellar truly safe once and for all?

"Earlier this morning, I just finished a long distance call with Mr. Robin Masters and he and I successfully negotiated arrangements where I will protect the estate, the Ferrari, and the wine cellar, so those questions we already know the answers to.

"I would like to introduce an individual who, for some reason, I think generated an awful lot of the crowd here and he is no stranger to all of us."

Representative Bellinger then asked Mr. Tom Selleck to stand to be recognized. Accompanying Mr. Selleck were Chris Abbott, supervising producer; Charles Floyd Johnson, co-executive producer; Rick Weaver, producer; and Mark Schilz, associate producer.

Representative Hemmings then rose and stated:

"I am Portuguese--that is why I am talking again. I am sorry yesterday was a long day also, Tom. I know my colleagues are tired of seeing me stand.

"I would like to put a little serious spin on the resolution honoring Tom Selleck and his colleagues here today. So often when we have new business ventures or new activities coming to our neighborhoods, there automatically arises what sometimes are called nimby's-not in my backyard syndrome. And quite honestly, when Tom Selleck and Magnum came to the 24th District on the slopes of Diamond Head, there was that resistance-we don't want this activity in our backyard from some of the short-sighted people in the district I serve. But this is a good lesson for all of us because the Magnum crew, the Magnum business, has been a tremendous asset, not only to the people of the 24th District, but the people of the entire State and have also let us know that there is an industry out there that we, with a little bit of imagination and with a little bit of incentive, can capture here to benefit all the people of our State.

Representative Bellinger reported that this over a hundred sixty-two shows generated \$215-million dollars worth of gross revenue and about \$100-million of that was spent directly in Hawaii. The rest was spent in L.A. where the show was really headquartered. If the show or future shows like this were headquartered in Hawaii, the \$215-million would all be spent in Hawaii. So it is a

great industry, and I think Tom Selleck and the cast and the crew of Magnum has shown us, as its predecessor Hawaii Five-O, that Hawaii can be the host of this great industry, and I hope it can become a continued reality for us all, and I would like to, on behalf of the constituents of the 24th District, offer our heartfelt congratulations and thank you to Tom Selleck and the crew of Magnum.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Bellinger then asked the supporting crew and all those people associated with the Magnum show, who were seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized.

Representative Bellinger then asked the Chair for permission to have Mr. Selleck address the members of the House and audience, to which the Chair answered, "Permission granted."

Mr. Tom Selleck addressed the members of the House and audience, stating:

"Thank you, everyone.

"First of all, I want you to all know that I am really truly honored to receive this recognition from the House of Representatives. It's kind of an icing on the cake for me, the cake being the privilege of living and working in Hawaii.

"As you and Representative Hemmings pointed out, Magnum has directly spent in excess of \$100-million in the State of Hawaii. Without any multiplier effect, that's \$100-million pollution free, tourist industry promoting, revenue producing dollars. I say this not for the purpose of self-congratulation but to remind you that this kind of figures may very well become a thing of the past. After twenty years of Hawaii Five-O and Magnum, there is really no likely successor to provide the foundation and the economic base for the film industry in Hawaii. The high cost of filming here and losses in network television share of the market have combined to make the film industry in our State less than competitive.

"Now, I hope you will ask what, as legislators, you can do about this. And first of all, in my opinion, the State should not go into the film business. There is, however, there really is one thing that needs to be accomplished immediately. Hawaii must have a studio facility. Now, that is not as difficult to accomplish as it may first appear because we already have one. The problem is that we may lose it. And since no one asked me, here is my solution to that dilemma.

"First of all, restructure the prohibitively expensive lease for the Diamond Head studio facility so that it becomes attractive to new producers. That facility should not be looked on as a revenue producer but rather a carrot to attract potentially far greater revenue. When the facility costs \$25,000 a month, when the facility requires \$1,300 in taxes, when the facility is required to pay \$1,000 a month in facility permit, I don't think we are sending the right signals.

"Second, use the moneys from your already established studio development fund to compensate the University of Hawaii for its loss in revenues. Now, I think that it can be as simple as that, and that is just the first step, but it is a beginning.

"Hawaii has truly been very, very good to me and I would like to now help to put something back, and I sincerely hope that you accepted these remarks in that spirit. "Thank you for your time--Aloha."

The Chair remarked:

"Thank you very much, Mr. Selleck. I would like you to know that this is the first time that we have a public hearing in the chamber with the House sitting as a Committee of the Whole."

Next, he served as Administer for Kuakini Hospital for twenty-one years, transforming it from a small rural-type hospital to one of the foremost medical facilities in Hawaii. He was also an instructor in the Military Intelligence Services during World War II teaching Japanese language to those in the MIS, and is currently Chairman of the City and County Commission on Aging.

"As we can see, his interests and activites have been varied and valuable. Just recently, I found out he was the moving force for the King Kalakaua Bronze Statue which will be placed in the Fall within the Maritime Museum Grounds at Pier 7. His efforts to enrich Hawaii is continuing, even after seventy years of service to Hawaii.

"Mr. Speaker, at this time, I would like to ask Mr. Kenji Goto to please stand and be recognized."

Representative Hiraki then asked many of Mr. Goto's friends from the United Japanese Society and the Chigukai of Tendai Mission, who were seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized.

Healing is a universal need in this world, Mr. Speaker, for what the world truly needs is more love of neighbor.

"Today's special guest is one of the leaders in an organization that has had the courage to extend the hands of Aloha and love in a terribly dangerous and tragic part of the world.

"Freedom Medicine takes volunteers and delivers a basic sense of humanity in healing, in training, to those ravaged by the war in Afghanistan. And while we sit safely here, perhaps offering opinions on what should be done, perhaps adopting this policy or that, these people have chosen to put their lives on the line to do something positive in a very negative circumstance. I am told there are over six million refugees. I am told that the water, clean water, has been wiped out. There is malaria, there is rampant disease, and this organization, in a very culturally sensitive way, is training people of that region to go into villages as paramedics to deal with medicine and healing on their cultural terms, not ours, and it is a very effective organization.

"Freedom Medicine people are among those that I list as heroes, Mr. Speaker, and so it is my honor to introduce to this honorable body, on behalf of all those who are in the field and here, a member of the Board. . .a founding member of the Board of Freedom Medicine who has served on the Board since its creation, a practicing attorney here in Hawaii for the past twenty years -- Mr. Howard Green," and asked Mr. Green to stand to be recognized.

Representative Shon then asked Mr. Joel Warren, Operational Manager for Freedom Medicine in Hawaii, who was seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized.

Representative Hirono presented Mr. Green with a carnation lei, while Representative Shon presented the honoree with a certified copy of the resolution.

# Thursday, April 7, 1988

The House of Representatives of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1988, convened at 11:15 o'clock o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Reverend James E. Furman, Pastor of St. Peter's Episcopal Church, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Alcon, Andrews, Apo, Bellinger, Horita, Ihara, Lee, Pfeil, Say and Taniguchi, who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Forty-Seventh Day.

On motion by Representative D. Ige, seconded by Representative Anderson and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Forty-Seventh Day was approved.

Representative Hagino rose to introduce the honoree, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, before introducing the honoree, please allow me to preface my introduction by pointing out that I will be presenting two resolutions for two individuals for recognition today. If there is a common theme in both resolutions, if there is a common bond between these two men who have never met each other before, if there is a common dream that they share, it is that of freedom.

"Our first honoree, John Kauffman, represents the spirit of creativity and its ability to liberate ourselves from the mundane toil of daily living. Mr. Kauffman is an accomplished playwright director and actor. One of his early achievements was winning an Emmy Award for a production called, <u>The Indian Experience</u>. Most importantly, five years ago, he came to Hawaii to serve as the Artistic Director for the Honolulu Theater for Youth. It is this gentleman who is responsible for those delightful, thought-provoking and uplifting plays that our children and youth enjoy. It is through drama that he has inspired children and youth with a spirit of creativity.

"John Kauffman is of Nez Perce descent. The Nez Perce, I will remind you, is one of the proud Indian tribes personified by the tragic hero, Chief Joseph, who defied the United States calvary to the very end. Raised on an Indian Reservation in Idaho, John Kauffman has drawn upon this heritage to write and to produce an original drama entitled, According to Coyote.

"It is this one-man show which will be performed in Moscow. It is this same show which had its premiere in Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C.

"This is a most singular honor. I cannot think of another playwright/director/actor who has been invited by the heads of states of the two most powerful nations on this earth to perform his own work in their nation's capital.

"Members of the audience, my fellow colleagues, I present to you a truly creative individual, a truly creative spirit, and someone who has brought pleasure to all of us -- John Kauffman."

Representative Hagino then asked Mr. Kauffman to stand to be recognized.

Representative Hagino then asked Jane Campbell, Managing Director of the Honolulu Theater for Youth, and Jedaida Sashai, a friend of the honoree and a longtime volunteer for the Honolulu Theater for Youth, who were seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized.

Representative Hirono presented Mr. Kauffman with a maile/pikake/ilima lei, and Representative Hiraki presented him with a certified copy of the resolution.

H.R. No. 478, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING AND HONORING DUMASANI KUMALO FOR HIS WORK ON BEHALF OF THE CAUSE OF FREEDOM IN SOUTH AFRICA," was jointly offered by Representatives Hagino, Kotani, Alcon, Anderson, Andrews, Apo, Bellinger, Bunda, Hayes, D. Ige, Isbell, Kanoho, Lee, Leong, Levin, Medeiros, Ribellia, Shito, Takamine, Tam, Tom and Yoshimura.

On motion by Representative Hagino, seconded by Representative Kotani and carried, H.R. No. 478 was adopted.

Representative Hagino proceeded to introduce the honoree, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, our next honoree again represents this theme of freedom. Is there a community, a race, or nation on this earth that does not desire the political freedom to guide its own destiny?

"We in Hawaii have had a taste of the yoke of tyranny. The Hawaiians lost their independence and much of their land; the plantation system oppressed many ethnic groups. But we need not accept this bondage. 'Breathes there a man with soul so dead,' as Robert Louis Stevenson wrote, that does not thirst for freedom and equality.

"Our honoree is a respected South African journalist who has been in America since 1977. Born into the dehumanizing system of apartheid, he can tell you what it's like to live each day in that system. He began his career as a journalist by writing for a number of newspapers, all since banned by the South African government.

"Now, why would a government do that? Well, as noted earlier, he wrote about the exploitation of miners in the coal mines of South Africa. He wrote about the police abuse and the brutality and murders of Blacks in detention. He was a friend of Steve Biko who was killed while in detention some ten years. The life and times of Mr. Biko was so compelling that Sir Richard Attenbourogh, the director of the Academy Award winning film, GANDHI, felt compelled to make his next film, CRY FREEDOM, on the life and times of that great hero of South Africa.

"Due to the oppression that increased after Steve Biko's death, Mr. Kumalo was forced to leave South Africa. In coming to America, he was awarded the Ford Foundation Human Rights Fellowship. Since that time, he has been a tireless spokesman for the cause of freedom of his native

land. He is an eloquent spokesman of the conditions of Black Africans in that country. By coming to Hawaii, he has now taken his message to all fifty states of this country.

"At this time, Mr. Speaker, I would like to present to you our honoree, Mr. Dumasani Kumalo," and asked Mr. Kumalo to stand to be recognized.

Representative Hagino then asked Renee Furuyama, President of the Hawaii Committee for Africa, and John Kagehiro, a member of the Hawaii Committee for Africa, who were seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized.

Representative Fukunaga then presented Mr. Kumalo with a maile/ilima lei, and a certified copy of the resolution was presented to the honoree by Representative Kotani.

No. 479, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION EXTENDING CONGRATULATIONS то THE MEMBERS OF THE HAWAII KAI BOBBY SOX SEVERAL LEAGUE AND RECOGNIZING OUTSTANDING ATHLETES FROM THE LEAGUE," was jointly offered by Representatives Ribellia, Jones, Anderson, Apo, Arakaki, Bellinger, Bunda, Cachola, Hagino, Hiraki, Hirono, Honda, D. "Mr. Speaker and members of the House, it is with great pleasure that I present to you several outstanding young women from the Hawaii Kai community who participated in the Hawaii Kai Bobby Sox League ever since childhood and these young women are with us today, and I would like to introduce them as well as the League president."

Representative Ribellia then asked the following honorees to stand to be recognized: Mr. George Pacheco, President of the Hawaii Kai Bobby Sox League; Miss Ann Williams, a Junior at Kamehameha School and named the ILH Player of the Year, "and their No. 1 pitcher"; Miss Katherine Burseth, a Junior at Kaiser High School, "who plays short-stop for Kaiser and is a three-year starter and has a .357 batting average"; Miss Carol Higa, a Senior at Kaiser High School "who plays left field and was a member of the All State Tournament Team. She will be attending Hawaii Loa College next year on a softball scholarship"; Mahealani Wong Leong, a Sophomore at Kaiser High School, and "is the team's designated hitter and plays first base. Her batting average is a whopping .360"; Laura Lottington, a Junior at Kaiser High School, "who plays third base and was also a member of the All State Tournament Team"; and Mr. Wade Okuma, Head Coach of Kaiser High School's Women Softball League.

Representative Jones then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, as they are standing, I will make this short so they don't have to stand too long, but I have been a sponsor for a number of teams over the years and I am really impressed with the students themselves and leadership that they developed into. And so we're very proud to have Hawaii Kai representatives this morning and congratulations to all of you.

## "Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Floral leis and certified copies of the resolution were presented to the honorees by Representatives Liu, Hemmings, Jones, Bunda, Crozier and Ribellia.

H.R. No. 480, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING HAWAII SCIENTISTS FOR IMPROVED TERMITE CONTROL," was jointly offered by Representatives Shon, Arakaki, Crozier, Hayes, Hirono, Honda, Kanoho, Kawakami and Leong.

On motion by Representative Shon, seconded by Representative Crozier and carried, H.R. No. 480 was adopted.

Representative Shon proceeded to introduce the honoree, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I hold in my hand a flask crawling with the dreaded Formosan subterranean termites. These termites have been a perennial problem in Hawaii as well as, in some cases, in the mainland.

"The new technology that we are honoring today is simple but elegant. It's the kind of research that we should be in the forefront of. It's the kind of research that we should be pouring hundreds of thousands of dollars into to prevent the needed use of toxic and unhealthful pesticides such as chlordane and heptachlor which we are using in Hawaii now to treat this termite.

"This is not a new abstract idea, Mr. Speaker. In the December issue of <u>Hawaii Architect</u>, this new technology was featured. It indicates that the cost of preventing these infestations is estimated to be at over \$60-million a year. The termite, as I mentioned, is something that every new homeowner faces as to how they are going to deal with this, usually by spending money to have dangerous chemicals sprayed in and around their house. And I think it is very timely as we proceed along this session as the year of housing where the State is going to get involved with building thousands and thousands of units, and this is the kind of technology we should be integrating in our specifications at the State level for these new houses. Everyone who is a potential homeowner of these new houses should be insisting that this and other technology such as solar energy should be part of our new housing developments.

"The man who is really responsible for this who has led the research team is with us today. He is originally from Hilo; he is educated in entomology at the University of Hawaii, at the University of California Berkeley; he is a veteran of the 442nd. Since 1958, he has been with the University leading research on ways to prevent the needed use of pesticides in our State.

"At this time, I would like to ask you to welcome Dr. Minoru Tamashiro," and asked Dr. Tamashiro to stand to be recognized.

#### Representative Shon continued:

"Also, Mr. Speaker, just to further emphasize that this is very practical application, one of Hawaii's prominent companies, Ameron HC&D, has put out a special brochure just on basaltic termite barriers that featured Dr. Tamashiro, and we have in the audience today two representatives of Ameron HC&D."

Representative Shon then asked Alan Kino and Fred Sekiya to stand to be recognized.

Representative Kawakami presented Dr. Tamashiro with a lantern ilima lei, and a certified copy of the resolution was presented by Representative Shon.

At 11:50 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

"Were this bill to be considering penalties on both sides of the story, on both sides of the aisle to deal with the workmen's compensation problem, then I would support it. However, this is a one-sided bill and improper and I vote against it and ask others to do the same.

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2045, SD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Shon rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"The reason why I am speaking on what seems to be a rather small bill, Mr. Speaker, is that this relates to energy conservation, an area which I believe very firmly we have allowed ourselves, perhaps inadvertently, to drift into a position of indifference on.

"A few years ago, we were all very concerned that we are 90 percent dependent on imported oil, that we had to beef up our programs for energy, alternate energy, energy conservation, we had a vigorous solar energy association that was selling hot water converters in homes, we had insulation, and we had a number of tax credits.

"What is happening in the last few years, Mr. Speaker, is that the Reagan Administration and Washington has felt, well, let's support the oil industry, forget it for energy conservation and these other things, and the State said, oh, okay, let's do that too. And as the feds have slowly reduced the number of tax credits, we have just acquiesced and said, oh well, gee, must not be a very effective tax credit anymore, let's eliminate it altogether.

"Mr. Speaker, I think that this is symptomatic of an attitude which would be similar if you went into the hospital and the doctor found that the patient was sick and so the solution would be, let's take him out back and shoot him. The patient is sick, Mr. Speaker, the tax credits are not adequate. But we should be beefing them up, we should be encouraging industries, and businesses, and homeowners, and contractors to integrate solar energy and conservation measures, and I think this bill and our action today to totally eliminate this small little credit is symbolic of our attitude these days that energy conservation is no longer the great attractive area. We're into underwater cable and the alternate energy, but the most cost effective way of saving energy and of saving the environment is through energy conservation -- how we design our buildings, how we insulate our pipes, the whole works.

"So for this reason, Mr. Speaker, I am urging people to consider -- do we want to take this symbolic act of

wiping off the books one more encouragement in an area where we are the solar state? We are the state with the greatest potential for alternate energy. A few years ago, we were going to be energy self-sufficient in the year 2000. Boy, that got dropped like a hot potato! I rally feel that it's this kind of thing we have to be a little more careful about. We have to reevaluate. We're not in an energy crisis today but it could come again, and here we are wiping it off the books. So for that reason, Mr. Speaker, I will vote against this bill. Please record a 'no' vote.

"Thank you."

Representative Hayes rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to endorse Representative Shon's speech. I think if Hawaii, a sunshine state, turns its back on credits for solar energy, it's a very sad day for the country.

"Thank you."

Representative Lee rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I would like to record that the distinguished Representative from midtown has been very persuasive and I think we should oppose this although seemingly symbolic act but nonetheless meaningful of turning our backs on energy conservation. So let my vote be recorded in the negative.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Crozier rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, yesterday when I was driving down, I think on King Street, I passed a home where I saw a roof and it looked some solar heaters had been disconnected and I thought to myself, my goodness, how we are regressing, and to see this bill come up today is also another statement that we forgot what happened in 1976 through 1980. So, for that reason, I will be voting no.

"Thank you."

At 12:37 o'clock p.m., Representative Shito asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Representative Andrews rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, after consultation with my Vice Chairman, I thought maybe I better say a few words regarding Senate Bill 2045.

"This bill applies only to a tax credit that was available for people who took advantage of it as of December 31, 1984, and in effect, it applies to a \$30 credit that some people took, and the Tax Department doesn't believe there are any or would be very few who carry that credit over after 1984 and plan to apply to some future tax return. It's not a credit we can use today. It applied only to insulation, not to solar hot water heaters -- solar heating. And it's really a housekeeping measure to clean up the statutes regarding credits that are no longer available and no longer used." At 12:43 o'clock p.m., Representative O'Kieffe asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:44 o'clock p.m.

Representative Liu rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I don't dispute the Chairman of the Committee who spoke previously concerning the actual effect of the bill. However, I think for myself, in voting 'no', the message which was so eloquently put forth by the Chairman of the Health Committee still makes sense in that the direction of the bill is the wrong one which is by taking out the section of the law, the concept of the tax credit, of encouraging development of solar devices, is not the right direction to take, that perhaps the bill should have reinstigated the tax credit for those devices installed since 1984. Instead we are, here in this bill, removing the concept altogether from our laws.

"For that matter, I will be voting 'no' on the bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ribellia rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"May the Clerk record Representative Liu's remarks as my own, please."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Repressentative Ribellia thanked the Chair.

Representative Crozier rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, can I change my remarks to an affirmative remark now?

"Mr. Speaker, I am one that believes heavily in listening to the debate that takes place on the floor and I have been swayed to and fro on this issue, but I appreciate the good Representative from Kamuela asking for a recess. During the recess, I was heavily influenced by my colleagues surrounding me, both in front and back and on both sides, and they were able to impress on me that this was like how the Representative from Maui said, it was a housecleaning bill, and I misunderstood this to be an extension of Reaganomics, and I did not want to give our outgoing President his last shot at dismantling our energy policy. So now I have been more enlightened and I would like to now say that I support the bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Metcalf rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"If the members of this body will note, normally Representative Andrews gives only one speech each session. This session he has outdone himself and has actually given two and I thought that that being the case, I would like to have his remarks included as my own in the record.

"Thank you."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Shon rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I am speaking again against the bill. I would simply remind the ambivalent upon us that the state of Massachusetts' and its Govenor have just recommended a broad extension of its solar energy and its energy conservation tax credits.

Representative Souki rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I wish to speak for the bill and I want to remind the members to rise above all the smoke and vote for the bill."

"Mr. Speaker, I spoke against this bill on Second Reading with the hopes that the language would be cleaned up in some version. "The problem here is the phrase, 'All proceeds from commercial exploration of inventions and intellectual property developed at the University would also be deposited into the revolving fund.'

"The language is much too broad. There are cases where development of a technology or idea may be done at the University but not totally under the auspices of the University, nor would funds totally from the University may be involved in that development. You might have the individual spending some of his overtime work involved in it and feel justifiably so that the ideas or inventions developed that more than just might be required under a certain type of research project was involved in the invention. As such, that person would feel, rightfully so, that not all of the commercial exploration or not all the proceeds therefrom should go to the State. The language is much too broad.

"I think, unfortunately, someone is going to take this and enforce it and in the end, discourage the development of ideas for commercial use in the State which might occur in association with the University.

"It would be easier to speak with reservations in the hope that in reading the comments in the Journal that future implementers of the law would do so with the thought in mind that I don't think the intention of this bill is to stifle that type of thinking. However, given that the bill is again before us in the same form as it was before the comments were made on this floor concerning the problem and nothing has been done, I feel compelled to vote 'no' and would hope that the members of this session do so also.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

## INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 482 and 483) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

H.R. No. 482, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING AND HONORING THE PEST CONTROL INDUSTRY ON THE OCCASION OF HAWAII PEST CONTROL MONTH," was jointly offered by Representatives Hirono and Hiraki.

On motion by Representative Hirono, seconded by Representative Hiraki and carried, H.R. No. 482 was adopted.

H.R. No. 483, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION EXPRESSING SUPPORT FOR THE HAWAIIAN CANOE RACING ASSOCIATION AND EXTENDING BEST WISHES FOR A SUCCESSFUL 1988 SEASON," was jointly offered by Representatives Apo and Anderson.

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Anderson and carried, H.R. No. 483 was adopted.

#### SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Anderson and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

## UNFINISHED BUSINESS

S.B. No. 83, SD 1:

By unanimous consent, action was deferred one day.

S.B. No. 2405, SD 1:

Representative Hirono moved that S.B. No. 2405, SD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Shon.

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I am not necessarily against healthy babies or well babies, but I am against the process that we're doing. I feel that this bill is improper. You have an Act 331 that we put in last year and it says in that purpose on 1: 'Proposed Mandatory Health Insurance Coverage Impact Assessment Report. There shall be a concurrent resolution passed requesting the Legislative Auditor to conduct a report that assesses both the social and financial effects of the proposed mandated coverage.'

"With this piece of legislation, I believe it is flawed because there was no concurrent resolution passed, Mr. Speaker, and over and above that, the funds that went in to this particular report should not have been.

"For that reason, because it is flawed and because last year, the other bill that we sent up on healthy babies was flawed. The Governor turned that one down. What you're asking the Governor to do again is to reject this bill because it also has a flaw. I believe that's our responsibility and for that reason, I shall be voting 'no' on this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Hirono rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"In terms of clarifying the procedures under which this bill was considered, it is true that last year this Legislature passed Senate Bill 815 which became Act 331, and as the Minority Floor Leader has stated, this Act requires that before the Legislature consider any mandated health care benefits bill, that the Auditor's Office must, pursuant to concurrent resolution passed by the Legislature, conduct an assessment of the social and economic impact of the mandated coverage.

"Within Act 331, the Legislature appropriated last year \$50,000 for the Auditor to conduct a study on Senate Bill 518 which is the predecessor to the bill before us today. Senate Bill 518 also was on mandated well baby coverage.

"The Auditor's report was done pursuant to the assessment criteria established in Act 331. It is true that in addition to the passage of Senate Bill 815, we did pass Senate Bill 518 which was last year's well baby bill and that bill was vetoed partly because the Governor agreed with us that an assessment should be done by the

Auditor's Office. Again, I reiterate that that assessment was done.

"To provide everyone an opportunity this session to address this issue again, as well as to address the findings of the Legislative Auditor's report on well baby coverage, both the House and the Senate introduced separate bills relating to this issue and both the House and the Senate passed these bills. And what is pending is the Senate bill which is still alive.

"If the argument is that we should have passed the concurrent resolution anyway, asking for the study which has already been done, pursuant to criteria established, then that would certainly be a duplication of effort and a total waste of time and money. I find it odd that the Minority Caucus is even raising such a point. This argument raises form over substance and I urge my colleagues to vote for this measure.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson, in rebuttal, stated:

"I will go along that the study was done anyway. But I want to save time for everybody because it's getting late.

"On the last in conclusion in the report, if you want to go ahead and take a flawed bill, and if you want to go ahead and say we did the report regardless of what the mandate says in Act 331 which we passed, then that's fine. But at least go along with a \$15,000 report and the conclusion says, 'The proposed bill supports a valuable service but it imposes coverage when none is needed.'

"Then why go ahead and take a report, ask for it, pay for it, even if it's flawed, and then go against everything that the report said.

"I would urge my colleagues to vote 'no', Mr. Speaker.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2405, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH INSURANCE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 42 ayes to 6 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Cavasso, Hemmings, M. Ige, Jones and Pfeil voting no, and Representatives Horita, Ihara and Kihano being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 2405 had passed Third Reading at 12:50 o'clock p.m.

At 12:50 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:51 o'clock p.m.

At 12:58 o'clock p.m., Representative Shito asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

"This is long overdue for the State Legislature to send a very strong signal to the people of Washington that we believe that reparations are due. More than two generations have passed since the end of World War II and nothing has been done to correct this wrong, and I think these resolutions are apropos and very timely.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"Mr. Speaker, this concerns an issue that's very much in contention in the district I live in, and what the unfortunate part of it is is that there is a bill in the Legislature right now that was originally going to appropriate \$500,000 to clean up Diamond Head, one of the State's most recognized landmarks.

"For the record, it does need cleaning up. There's opala on the sides and at the lookout areas; State land along Fort Ruger side is unkept and an eyesore, and definitely an aesthetic liability.

"What is unfortunate is that different interest groups that are concerned with this resolution could not come to a peaceful solution to their differences to provide for aesthetic improvement. As you well know, there is a group of private people that wished to lease some land from the State to put a tennis complex on. A lot of information was discussed in the neighborhood about this and the neighborhood is split. There are certain people that are against the tennis complex and certain people in favor of it.

"This resolution will have the State participate in preempting any peaceful solution to the problem, there's always a chance that we could have the best of both worlds. We could have preserved the integrity of Diamond Head and had an aesthetically pleasing recreational resource put in the area being disputed. It's one of those difficult issues and unfortunately, this is an instance where I think time could have probably been served well by having the private sector, along with the different interest groups, try to settle it without legislative mandate.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Souki introduced 20 students from the Maui District Students Organization. They were accompanied by Mr. Tosh Seki.

Representative Arakaki introduced a group of honored guests from Okinawa, saying:

"Mr. Speaker and members, chaganjuu. That's our Okinawan greetings to all of you.

"This year, the United Okinawan Association of Hawaii adopted as its theme, Ichariba Chode, and what this means is when we meet, we shall all be brothers and sisters. And in keeping with this theme, we have some very special guests from Naha, our sister city, and I should also want to mention Okinawa Prefecture and Hawaii are sister states and Ryukyu University and the University of Hawaii are sister universities, so in keeping with this theme we have some very special guests from our sister city.

"This year marks the 27th anniversary of this sister city relationship and we have a group who's here to help observe the 1988 Okinawa/Naha Festival and it's a product and cultural exposition which will encourage the people of Hawaii to experience the Okinawan culture and this will be held April 16th through the 24th at Daiei Holiday Mart Department Stores.

"Leading this group is the Honorable Kosei Oyadomori who is the Mayor of Naha City and he believes that the goodwill and friendship between Naha and Honolulu is so important that he is leading a delegation of more than 400 government officials, Naha business people, and highly respected Okinawan performing artists to Hawaii to participate in the festivities.

"And I might mention to those who weren't able to attend the reception we had for them, he invited us to bring double that amount of people to Okinawa and to his city. So, Mr. Speaker, I hope we can take him up on that. "And I just want to say that I hope this body recognizes the Mayor for his efforts in promoting economic development because as our Governor said, this is the Pacific century, or in Japanese they call it Taiheyo Gidai, and so with all the focus on the Pacific and economic development, I think it is really important to keep this cultural ties with our sister cities and states in the Asian and Pacific front.

"Without further ado, I would like to introduce our guests.

"First of all, we have the Honorable Kosei Oyadomori, the Mayor of Naha; Mr. Genru Tomori, Chairman of the Naha City Council; Mr. Seisho Kohatsu, who is the President of the Okinawa Prefectural Federation and this Federation is\*similar to our Chamber of Commerce. He is also the President of the Takunan Steel Company; Mr. Maurice Yamasato, 1988 President for the United Okinawan Association of Hawaii; and the rest of the delegation includes members of the Okinawan City Council; members of the Okinawan Prefectural Industrial Federation; and dancers who will be performing at Daiei."

Those studies aren't going to be done by gnomes or menehunes, they are going to be done by public workers. Many of them will come back next year. The ones we like, we'll choose to implement; the ones that we don't like, we'll implement more studies.

"And I do want to qualify this facetious remark. I am recommending that possibly in speaking to this resolution, as I am doing now, that we may want to implement a study to see if we should not have in our state government an Office of Bureaucracy and Studies and it can be attached to the Governor's Office. We can affectionately refer to it as the BS Department of the Governor, and therefore, we'll have a place to send all these studies.

"Seriously, I believe the time is long come when we should start looking to doing more decision-making rather than the studies and when we do have studies, we should look at them and take them seriously even if sometimes they say things we don't like to hear.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Metcalf rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"I would just like to nominate Representative Hemmings to be the director of that department."

Representative Peters then rose on a point of order and asked:

"Could you have that motion read again. Was Representative Metcalf's observations part of that motion?"

Receiving a negative answer from the Chair, Representative Peters said:

"I was wondering, if he needed a second, I would second it."

Representative Hemmings then rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, we certainly know how political this organization is that runs the Executive Branch of government and has hegemony over all three branches of government. Since I'm in the Minority Party, I'll have to concede that position to one of the members of the Majority Party that's really looking for a high three to retire on.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Representative Kotani rose to speak in favor of H.C.R. No. 90, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the fiscal concerns of the retirement system must be balanced against our commitment to social justice and human decency.

"South Africa is a country in which 23 million Africans live in a subordinate status to 4.7 million whites. It is a country in which the Black majority has no real political rights, it is a country of racial separation, and the State of Hawaii should not allow any of its public moneys to be invested in such a way that it reinforces or even condones the South African apartheid policy.

"Studies conducted by Chemical Bank, the U.S. Trust Company and Trinity Investment Management Corporation have shown that South Africa free companies have out-performed the stocks of companies with South Africa holdings with the minimal amount of added risk. Also, companies such as American Express and Merrill Lynch handle South Africa free portfolios with no negative impact.

"This legislation requires that the ERS begin immediate divestment of South African holdings but allows a fiveyear period for the completion of the divestment process. It reaffirms our vision of Hawaii, the future state, as not only a place of economic prosperity, but a place endowed with a richness of spirit.

"As a legislative initiative of the coalition for divestment that was organized by students at the University of Hawaii, this resolution also indicates that the fires of idealism still burn on our campuses today and that also is cause for hope for our future.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cavasso rose to speak against the resolution, stating;

"I also speak against racism and prejudice, Mr. Speaker. However, I have spoken with a gentleman from

South Africa, a Black gentleman who has stated to me that he believes that the taking away of investments is more hurtful to the Blacks in South Africa than leaving those investments there, that it will hurt them more than anybody in that economy, and therefore, I ask others to vote against this resolution and register my negative vote, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hagino rose to speak in favor of the concurrent resolution, stating:

"First of all, let me request that the words of Representative Kotani represent my words in the Journal."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Hagino continued:

"I would add one thing and this has been pointed out to me by one of the speakers from South Africa earlier this year and he says, 'How nice of the people of America who said not to divest the moneys. How nice of you to care so much for us Black people and us colored people in South Africa. I didn't know you had such humanitarian interest.' And then he went on to point that thirty years ago, the American investments in South Africa was somewhere along the level of about \$50million. Since those thirty years have gone by, the American investment has climbed into the billions upon billions of dollars, and yet the life of the Black of the South African colored person has not improved in any one bit. Life is just as harsh, police tactics are getting worse, the tensions are mounting, there are murders of innocent Blacks, Blacks who would like to speak for freedom.

"How can we say that this American investment has brought about a better way of life for the Blacks and colored people of South Africa?

And so it was with a great deal of facetiousness he said, 'How kind of you to think of us by investing your money in South Africa.'

"I call upon all of you to please support this resolution."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the joint report of the majority of the Committees was adopted and H.C.R.
