SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 932 on H.B. No. 189, HD 2:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 189, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Alcon rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of the budget with a few caveat to the Judiciary Department.

"So far, from what I have heard and read in the newspaper about the Judiciary Department, has been very, very negative. Mr. Speaker, I feel that they haven't been doing their work and yet we have been constantly increasing their budget. I wish that they would settle down and get to cleaning up that part of the government.

"I feel that the Judiciary Department, Mr. Speaker, is very inaccessible, they have barricaded themselves with electronic equipment and it looks like it's even harder to get into the courts here in Honolulu than it is to get into Fort Knox. And I don't see why they have to do it because those buildings are swarming with sheriffs anyway and I haven't read of any threats to any lives for all the employees that are working in those buildings. And I feel also, Mr. Speaker, that the lives of the employees of the Judiciary are no more important than yours and mine or any other government employees.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Metcalf then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Metcalf's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in support of House Bill 189, HD 2.

"This budget represents a detailed review of the budget requests submitted by the Judiciary which was done with the various program objectives and desired outcome in mind; the overall view of case filing trends in the appellate, circuit, family and district courts; and other pertinent information which substantiates workload growth. Our approach was relatively simple. Staffing requirements without proper supportive justification were rejected. To that end, necessary resources were provided to enable the Judiciary to meet growing demands especially in the family and district courts. Because of recruiting and retention problems, the need for permanency of temporary positions was given due consideration. Programs that had growing concerns, especially in the area of 'abuse', were given special attention. Such programs included Domestic Violance, Child Advocacy, and the Office of the Public Guardian.

"As noted in the Legislative Auditor's report of January, 1989, there were critical findings that pointed towards the need for a Chief Information Officer. We are in agreement with the Auditor's recommendation and have proposed funds to be appropriated for the creation of such a position. Leadership and direction are drastically needed and vital to the success of a well designed, organized, and integrated automation system. In our budget review, it became obvious that there is a real need for knowledge and know-how to immediately assess and assimilate current needs as well as for a broad-based background to project future automation requirements. Strong managerial skill is also highly important to meet the requirements of this executive position. This Chief Information Officer will be charged with the full responsibility for all automation requirements and the development of a plan of action that will ultimately meet the desired goals and objectives of the Judicial court system and related staff support.

"Your Committee recommended the appropriation of funds to support office automation and the enhancement of existing systems. The use of computers to alleviate repetitive and duplicative work is a cost-benefit option

that makes good business sense. Office staff efficiency in routine clerical duties will undoubtedly increase. Word processing application, electronic mail, calendaring, data base management, etc., are all accessible utilities which will enhance productivity. Mainframe interfacing is technologically feasible with today's PC compatibility and flexibility. The 'prober', an existing system that tracks offenders, has proven results. Enhancement of this system will again achieve flexibility with multi-user capability. Other automation supported includes desktop publishing, accounting automation system, disk storage, HAJIS for the neighbor islands, computer technology, and telecommunications. Potential system networking will further enhance efficiency due to the sharing of data within work groups and on a state-wide basis. Automation is imminent and the approach used provides for essential and cost-benefit software and computer equipment. The purchase of PC's to satisfy immediate needs is not expected to conflict with long term requirements for computing systems.

"Purchase of service requests for funds have been rising at an average rate of approximately 15% per year from 1987 to 1991 or at a cost of \$2.6-million over the four year period. We recognize the importance of these services provided by private organizations. However, there is a need to evaluate these programs. To address this concern, a proviso has been included in the Judiciary 1990-1991 beinnium budget that requires the establishment of formal procedures and the development of cost-benefit measurements that determine how effective funded programs are in producing desired results. These periodic evaluations and/or monitoring strategies will be the delegated responsibility of the Judiciary.

"Our approach to the budget is, I believe, a fiscally reasonable one aimed at ensuring public confidence in a just and expeditious legal process.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 189, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE JUDICIARY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes, with Representatives Hayes, Shon and Tajiri being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 189 had passed Third Reading at 12:08 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 933 on H.B. No. 646, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Fukunaga and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 646, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE OFFICE OF HAWAIIAN AFFAIRS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes, with Representatives Hayes, Shon and Tajiri being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 646 had passed Third Reading at 12:09 o'clock p.m.

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 205, HD 1:

Representative Souki moved that H.B. No. 205, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Souki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"First of all, I would like to thank the members of the Finance Committee and my Vice Chairman for all the hours that they spent in working on this budget and hearing all the other Finance bills and for their input. Otherwise, this budget would not be made available.

"I would also like to thank my staff, staff of the Finance Committee -- really, a staff for the House -- who, in these last few weeks, have been working day and night to prepare this budget. And if you don't mind, I would like my staff to please rise so that we can look at these guys who didn't get too much sleep. So guys and gals, please rise, so we can show the members here that you are still awake. Thank you very much.

"You know, Mr. Speaker and members, sometimes I wonder why they continue to come back and volunteer as staff. I think we must examine that a little more closely.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill provides for the operations and the capital improvement programs of the Executive Branch for the fiscal biennium 1989-1991. It is a relatively large budget, larger than we've had in the past, amounting to \$8.4-billion for the biennium.

"It is the keystone to the comprehensive fiscal package developed by the Finance Committee, which includes major tax relief measures and a significant tax credit.

"This bill provides for the initiatives of both the House and the administration, specifically:

"Four our public schools, funding is provided for a program to initiate the school based management program to give schools more flexibility in decision-making, in order to provide quality education for all of our students.

"In order to ensure a high level of education, funds are provided for increased training for administrators, principals, and teachers, and that amounts to approximately \$1.2-million the first year, and \$3-million for the second year.

"This bill also provides for significant funding for construction of classrooms, cafeterias, libraries, and administration buildings, as well as for the repair and maintenance of school facilities, which provides for approximately \$19-million for CIP, and \$45-million for repair and maintenance

"For higher education, funds have been provided for upgrading and expansion of educational programs within the University system, which includes a CIP of \$86.3-million, and repair and maintenance of \$14.2-million for the first year, and \$33.6-million and \$11.6-million for the second.

"These include funds for the College of Education to enhance the quality of teachers in our public schools, and for the expansion of the Nursing Program at both the University and community colleges.

"Funds are also provided to enhance student services which includes the \$15.5-million for a student services building.

"Other major construction projects authorized include the final phase of the Kapiolani Community College which amounts to \$18.3-million and \$4.1-million for the biennium, and also includes the construction of the School of Architecture for \$14.5-million.

"In the health and human services area, funds are provided to assure that basic needs were met for all the people of our State.

"Specifically, funds are provided to strengthen the child welfare services programs, as well as to address 'worker burnout' within this program. We provided 75 new positions for that program which provided for a \$2.5-million and \$2.8-million increase.

"Your Committee also supported programs to assist the elderly. It provided construction money for housing facilities in the Central and Leeward areas of Oahu, providing for \$13.5-million.

"To alleviate our State's traffic problems, your Committee has approved funding for additional contraflow lanes to service Windward Oahu, a pilot ride-sharing program.

"Funds are also authorized for the upgrade and construction of our highway system in all counties, including Kalanianaole Highway on Oahu, Honoapiilani Highway on Maui, and the Saddle Road on the Big Island, a total of \$228-million for the first half of the biennium and \$66-million for the second half.

"In response to increased visitor arrivals, funds have been provided for continued renovation, increased security, and upgraded visitor information system, and that provided for an increase of \$4.1-million.

"In the area of economic development, your Committee believes that the quality of life for our residents hinges upon the strength of our State's economy.

"To ensure an economy which is diverse and has growth potential, your Committee has funded programs for industry promotion, high technology, space administration, and the film industry. The funds for these programs amount to \$12.8-million for this year and \$12.1-million for the second half.

"And for the programs for tourism, we provided funds amounting to \$17.5-million of which \$15.7-million will go into marketing in order to continue to support our major industries.

"We also provided funds for the agriculture diverse promotion which amounts to \$1-million and \$800,000, and also to combat the fruit fly, \$170,000.

"And for the environment which has played such an important role, if we are going to continue to be the 'sunshine State' and to keep our waters pure, we have provided an increase of approximately 68 percent, and \$4-million will be for the natural areas reserve program to protect our watersheds.

"In closing, Mr. Speaker and members, I would like to say that your Committee on Finance has worked diligently to submit a budget which is sensitive to the needs of the people, and to be fiscally responsible.

"It represents a package which meets the urgent needs of today in order to prepare for the new challenges and exciting opportunities of tomorrow.

"Mr. Speaker and all members, I urge you to vote in favor of House Bill No. 205, House Draft 1.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I think consistency is something that is important in modern life. I am very proud once again to speak against the State budget. In doing so, in no way am I speaking

against the very hard work of our Finance Committee Chairman, his staff which we acknowledged here today, and members of the Finance Committee on both sides of the aisle.

"Mr. Speaker, I could go into a long dissertation about the budget, item by item. I could talk about more money being spent on the many programs every year. I could talk about the rhetoric that comes up about how this budget is an investment in the future and how it is going to make everything better. But I think I'd rather ask some questions because we have been doing this for a generation now -- dramatically increasing spending in all these programs.

"Has education gotten better? Has the plight of the truly needy in our society gotten better with increased spending? Have social service programs gotten better? Has the need of the mentally ill in our society improved? Have our hospitals gotten better? Have our transportation services gotten better? Have we been able to fight pollution in the environment effectively?

"I think these answers often come from the people. I think the answers to these questions have also come in numerous audits that are handed to us. It is interesting when the audits are handed to us. They don't talk about the lack of resources or the lack of staff. They talk about mismanagement in all the audits.

"So, I'd rather talk about the philosophy here, and the philosophy is -- let's not demand more accountability from government, let's not demand more efficient and cost effective management. Let's spend more money. Let's create more programs, and I don't believe that this will solve the problems. If it had, we'd all be living in a paradise because, for a generation now, we consistently spent more money, and we've consistently raised taxes.

"For instance, just an overview, the State population over the last several years has grown roughly 1.5 percent a year. State government personnel count, as reflected in this budget, is growing over three percent a year, adding in one year alone over 1,146 public workers.

"How long can we sustain an economy when government is growing faster than the population. Who is going to be working for who?

"Mr. Speaker, this budget, in its committee report, talks about taxes. It talks about the surplus. Where did the surplus come from? It didn't come from efficient government spending. It came from overtaxation of the working people of Hawaii — the people we're supposed to be working for. Most of the surplus will be spent in this budget, leaving to the credit of our Finance Chairman in this budget, \$200-million rebate. Match that against the one dollar that the Senate's proposing and we may have a problem.

"Nevertheless, the growth rate of taxes is 11.5 percent a year. Government is growing and spending 11.5 percent more because it is taking in that much more. Yet, the personal income of the people that are paying these bills is only going up an average of five percent a year. This can't continue.

"So the difference is, the philosophy of government. We have to return to government that facilitates private citizens controlling their destiny, controlling their social programs and welfare, and controlling their own economy, because government has not and will not do a better job of the individuals. If this formula continues, sooner or later, the people of Hawaii will join, hopefully, numerous elected officials in demanding a change.

"Mr. Speaker, I speak against the budget on the philosophy bit. Government has to stop growing and the private sector has to start flourishing.

"I urge my colleagues to give serious consideration to this. It is a general philosophical change that I think is long overdue and sooner or later, the people of Hawaii are going to figure out that government is not working for them. They are working for government.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Horita then rose and requested that her remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Horita's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill No. 205, House Draft 1, relating to the State budget. This bill will appropriate funds for numerous projects which benefit all the citizens of the State of Hawaii.

"House Bill No. 205, House Draft 1, funds the areas of economic development, employment, transportation, environmental protection, health, social services, education, and culture. Continued development and improvement in all of these areas is essential to the wellbeing of our State and I am in full support of this goal.

"At this time, I feel that the efforts of Chairman Souki and his staff on the House Standing Committee on Finance should be recognized for their tremendous efforts while writing this bill. I also commend the cooperation and service the staff provided to the subject matter committees of the House. The Executive Budget could not have been completed in such a timely and efficient fashion without their fine work.

"In the area of labor and employment, this bill funds activities geared towards increasing the opportunities for training workers in the high-technology and visitors industries. Success in these areas will provide better jobs in Hawaii and create a larger pool of 'employable' workers.

"Economic development will be enhanced by further diversification in agriculture, more aggressive promotion of Hawaii as a visitor destination point, and continued support of local business. The importance of strengthening our island economy is evident when we consider the growing role of international business in the Pacific Basin.

"Higher Education is promoted through upgraded teacher training in the College of Education, expanded student services and activities, support of the College of Ocean and Earth Science and Technology, the School of Hawaiian, Asian and Pacific Studies, and the School of Architecture, and increased opportunities for cultural enrichment. Included in the budget are substantial monies for repair and maintenance and operational expenses.

"Mr. Speaker, we, the Legislature, have a unique opportunity to address all of the needs of the State of Hawaii at once, rather than emphasizing one area to the disadvantage of another. The citizens of our State require and deserve the services of the State government and we must lend our full support to measures which provide for those services.

"I urge all my fellow representatives to vote in favor of this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"I think we all recognize, including the 'loyal opposition,' that there are many needs when we talk about the people of Hawaii. When we talk about needs of the elderly, our children, the disabled, low income and our children and youth at risk, the needs are many, and many of those decisions as to what areas we will emphasize, what needs will be met, are our decisions to make.

"I want to thank the Chairman of the Finance Committee and also the Vice Chairman and the members for their work in helping us to decide where our priorities will be. I want to especially thank them because. . .and I think Representative Hemmings made some very good points.

"Our institutions continue to grow and I think we can use our prisons as an example. Many times, we use our prisons as dumping grounds for the problems we have in our society and we are going to be building more and more prisons until that time we recognize that we need to meet the basic needs of our people. And we need to look at programs and proposals that will provide prevention and intervention in order to provide this long-term cost.

"And I think our budget meets a lot of these needs in terms of providing alternatives, providing community based services as alternatives to institutional care.

"We have programs for the elderly to prevent long-term institutionalization. We have programs in our communities for foster care for at-risk children, and I would like to once again thank the Chairman and the members of the Human Services Committee for helping us to meet some of these needs.

"Thank you."

Representative Fukunaga then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in support of this bill and perhaps in response to the prior comments from the Minority side, I would like to say for the record that this year, the Finance Committee Chairman and his staff have served as an exemplary model of the efficiency and producing outstanding work in very short order.

"I think a few weeks ago, we had a number of instances in which the Capitol and the Legislature was under fire for not being able to produce documents on a timely basis. I think we should note for the record, Mr. Speaker, that the Chairman and his staff have not only brought out all of the bills in very timely fashion, but have accorded all of the members of this House copies of the budget as well as those Finance bills that have been produced on very timely basis and have done an outstanding job in the interim.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of the measure and to correct some misstatements made by the Minority Floor Leader.

"The distinguished Representative from Kahala has asked that the government stop growing and to let the private sector grow. This is a misstatement of the historic development of the Hawaiian economy. The fact is that the private economy has grown tremendously and has fueled the growth in every sector of our society in the

private development of infrastructure, as well as the State meeting its responsibilities for the public sector.

"Let me illustrate.

"The retail sales are a very good indicator of future revenue projections because of our excise tax. According to the Bank of Hawaii, between 1983 and the middle of 1988, visitor arrivals increased by about 35 percent, and real retail sales increased by almost 25 percent. Indeed, in 1988, the projected gross in retail sales was 14.4 percent. This translates into an increasing amount of revenues for the State. The proportion between visitor arrivals and retail sales is not really matched step by step. But the rise in visitors has overwhelmed increase in every other area of economic activity in the State of Hawaii. We owe the tremendous growth in our economy to the booming tourism and especially within weeks and years, to the growth in tourism from the East.

"There's also another benefit. Much of our construction boom is fueled by foreign investment from the East. What this means is that while the private sector is growing tremendously and in the retail area, outpacing the growth in government expenditures, the public sector still needs to deal with basic investments to meet the needs of the tourist industry, particularly in infrastructural development such as wastewater treatment to protect our beaches and our waters, or as the Governor stated, 'our front yard.'

"Therefore, when we look at the whole picture, what we find is that the State has adopted and fostered the development of private business, specifically in this area of tourist income, and from that tourist income, we derived the great surplus that we enjoy today. And we need to spend that surplus, put it back in the tourist industry.

"I have mentioned wastewater treatment but also the large expansion is needed to make the Honolulu Airport a first-class international airport which it is today, but which would need to be expanded to meet the future growth, and I think it is important to recognize that the private sector has grown; therefore, the public sector needs to meet its responsibilities.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Leong then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"As a next door neighbor of the Finance Committee, I find that the Chairman and his staff worked diligently, putting in long hours until the wee hours of the morning and throughout the days. I believe they have done an excellent job and more so, the Chairman has been very fair.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Apo then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in support of the measure and then rebut the Minority Floor Leader's comments.

"In all due respect to the 'loyal opposition,' we are constantly reminded by Representative Hemmings that the private sector ought to be allowed to do everything for us.

"For the record, we were reminded this morning in committee, the private sector he refers to, the single largest investment in Hawaii comes from England, followed by New Zealand and Australia, and Japan, a distant third. If we expect that this private sector which represents 75 percent of the investment in these islands to

take care of places like Waianae, our education system, et cetera, et cetera, I think we are dreaming.

"Secondly, it does not surprise me that the Minority Floor Leader chose the Republican Party line headed by eight years of Ronald Reagan who made the same complaints about government spending too much money. We saw the results of that. It's tripling of the deficit within that eight-year period, running up a deficit that exceeded all previous presidential administrations. So on the one hand, when the Minority Party is out of power, this rhetoric comes forward constantly. Apparently, the highest levels of government, once they took the reigns, they did worse than the Democrats did in terms of the federal deficit. And the worse part of it is that they did not take care and maintain the safety net that we did have in place for the less fortunate people of this country.

"If we were to apply the same philosophy the Republicans have brought to national government to the local level, what we would have is no social programs and the largest National Guard outfit in this country.

"So, I would remind the Minority Floor Leader that in all due respect, and they certainly are entitled to their philosophy, that I have yet to see Republicans in power deliver the goods based on their remarks and their criticism of the Majority leadership. So I would rest my case with those remarks.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Bybee then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I would like to also add my comments to respond to some of the Minority Floor Leader's comments and that is, specifically the point of how our population is rising at only a certain rate but yet government is increasing at a higher rate. That implies that the people, the actual population, is paying the full fare for the cost of government and that clearly isn't the case.

"We have a substantial tourist industry which has many visitors that come and supply substantial moneys and we use that, Mr. Speaker, to pay for many of the programs and that has supplied much of the surplus that we have. As our society grows and becomes more complex, we clearly need more laws and more laws indicate we need more government.

"We are enjoying a beautiful lifestyle in Hawaii. Our health is the highest in the country. As I drove home last night, after a community meeting hearing about complaints of the high taxes, I looked around and saw beautiful homes, well-paved streets, good schools, a very fine lifestyle, Mr. Speaker, and we have to pay for that. And I would suggest that Mr. Hemmings, when he drives home in the evening, also sees a very nice community that he is very proud of.

"But people want these services. They want basic programs to be funded. They want many of our programs to be increased and I would suggest, Mr. Speaker, that the people are in support of this budget. I applaud the suggestions that we need to keep an eye on it but I think, Mr. Speaker, it is something the people of Hawaii want and I support it."

Representative Hemmings, in rebuttal, stated:

"I want to sincerely thank the previous speakers for their opportunity to rise on a point of rebuttal because I'm glad you're debating the budget for a change rather than ramming it down our throats. I'm glad you're standing to defend your spending and your high taxes. I'd also like to, item by item, go over some of the things that were said.

"I agree with the good Vice Chairman of the Finance Committee that Representative Souki has run a very efficient organization, and the good Representative from the North Shore that the Finance Committee has worked hard. No one is questioning that. It's what you've done that is being questioned, not how you did it. You've done it very efficiently and very well and I'm very proud, incidentally, that this House heard all the bills that we transmit to the Senate which is an issue I think will come up later. So I make no qualm about the work.

"Regarding the good Representative from Mililani Town who loves to preface his remarks about Kahala, first, I'd like to tell that good Representative that I'm very proud of Kahala. Some of the greatest doctors, some of the greatest labor leaders, some of the greatest workers and contributors to the culture and arts, and some of the very fine people from all walks of life, come from Kahala.

"Regarding the economy, I think the good Representative from Mililani Town, once again, underscores one of the problems with our economy. It's overly dependent on tourism. We have no economic diversity. We do have a brain drain in this State and we are spending and living off a golden egg laid by the tourist industry. Heaven, help us if something ever happens, like an airline strike which happened several years ago. It would bring our economy to our knees. There is no economic diversity and I am also, as a legislator from Kahala, very concerned, not about foreign investment in our economy. That's good and healthy, but foreign ownership of our economy and foreign ownership of our land is driving up the costs to the people of Hawaii. They can't afford to buy homes, like the Representative from Kailua alludes to, in our own land because they cannot afford it. Our young people are facing a bleak future with not even having an opportunity to buy a home in their own land.

"The good Representative from Waianae mentioned government spending, and I'm glad he is so insecure about the eight years of economic prosperity brought on by the Reagan Administration. Eight years of very low inflation, eight years of reduced interest rates, eight years of unprecedented economic growth. But we also know that national debt has increased twofold and it is a serious problem, but I would like to remind the good Representative from Waianae that Congress makes the final budget.

I'd also like to remind him that for years, we Republicans, on this side of the aisle, have offered the Majority Party an opportunity to petition Congress to put a lid on federal spending and cap it like our State Constitution has -- not to exceed income. But the Majority Party has failed to do so because they want their Democratic colleagues to bring home deficit-funded programs to our State. Let's be honest and let's be fair. The budget is made by Congress and this body refuses even to hear a resolution to put a cap on federal spending as we, Republicans, would like to do.

"Mr. Speaker, the good Representative from Kailua, once again, underscored how important tourism is to our economy and how overly dependent we are. But ask the people in small business around this State about the hardship they are having making ends meet. Ask why we have two-wage earning households here. Why both husbands and wives have to work. Ask the Tax Foundation about the average family spending over 35 percent of their income just to pay for taxes. Ask them why the average worker in Hawaii has to work two hours

and 47 minutes every day just to pay their taxes -- the single largest expense paid by anybody.

"And I find it rather ironic that the good Representative from Kailua rises to talk about what great expenditures these are for good schools when he, himself, is the big, loud voice from over the Koolaus about the school crises and how we need school based reorganization and all of the problems that he is going to solve with all the bills he allegedly authored.

"Mr. Speaker, I agree with the Majority Party --Hawaii is a special place. Hawaii is a special place because of the gifts of God and the gifts of our good, diverse people in the spirit of aloha. Hawaii could be a better place if we, in government, would give the people more free enterprise, more self-initiative, and more selfaccountability, to make Hawaii a better place.

"I would like to thank all of the previous speakers for the opportunity to rebut their remarks.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cavasso then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would also like to join in the rebuttal of the Majority Floor Leader's comments.

"Mr. Speaker, we are a nation and the people who, eight years ago, were under high interest rates, under incredible inflation rates, a people who seemed to be losing our way and we now, under the leadership of a president, President Reagan, and a philosophy that says that the individual should be encouraged to stand up and demonstrate initiative, a philosophy that says small businesses should be encouraged to take a chance as we have historically done as pioneers, a philosophy that says family is central and more important than government and the government is to serve the people and the family, and I point out a philosophy that President Reagan helped in bringing greater tax benefits to the family. For example, the \$2,000 personal exemption for individual family members across the nation on the federal level, and yet we, in Hawaii, cannot give the same personal exemption, at least we haven't yet, to our own Hawaiian We bring our State taxes into line with the people. federal tax system except when it comes to taking care of the family and because we've only come into agreement with the federal taxes at the places where it actually increases our taxes and not at the place, for example, with the family exemption where we would reduce our tax input, we have a large tax surplus this year.

"I also join the Minority Floor Leader in commending the Finance Committee and the Finance Chairman and the work they've done. However, I join the Minority Floor Leader in saying that we cannot continue to increase the size of our government three times when three times our population increases. We cannot continue to increase the spending of government two times the amount of income our people are earning -- our working people and otherwise. And I say that at least our people want to have the freedom to have initiative again and part of that will come by reduced government.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Apo, in rebuttal, stated:

"I guess the difference between Democrats and Republicans can be characterized by comparing the one-third of the national budget that is spent on guns and bombs versus the one-third of the State budget which is spent on education. This is a very clear demarcation of philosophy in terms of applying. And while it is true that

it does require Congressional approval, I think we all know that the Executive pretty much takes the lead in preparing the budget although I realize the Congress does prepare its own budget.

"I just get tired of hearing from Republicans that the private sector is going to take care of everything. And if you apply that philosophy, what we ended up with after eight years of Ronald Reagan was 232 criminal indictments of people as high as those sitting on his cabinet. All of these indictments were related to the private sector, in terms of contracts that were issued.

"And I am addressing our budget because the point was we're talking about political philosophy and how money should be spent. It is true that the Democrats tried to be, as I think government should be, which is all things to all people. And certainly, there will never be a day when we can achieve that goal, but it is a noble purpose. It is one that I think we should continue to support.

"Republicans tend to want to be selective in which areas of society they choose to spend money on and choose to support. And I am proud to be a Democrat, and I will always subscribe to the Democratic philosophy that everyone in this country deserves equal attention whether it's profit producing or not.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Liu then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think this has been one of the more lively debates that we've had on this subject in the past few years and I've enjoyed it, and I think it has been good for the public and it's been good to get some of the basic philosophical bases out on the table.

"When I signed the committee report, I noticed that I was the only one that had the indication that I signed 'with reservations.' I almost signed 'I do not concur,' but when the phrase came into my mind, we live in an imperfect world and, as such, I decided to support the bill in the hopes that we can make it a little more perfect by working on it between now and the end of session.

"One of the areas of major concern that I have is that we are going over the spending limit, a spending ceiling which was voted on by the people of Hawaii over ten years ago, supported by the people of Hawaii in the form of a constitutional amendment, which really told us that people want us to set priorities, that people want us to, as tough as it may be, to make selections, and understanding that government cannot do all things. We are going over that spending ceiling by ten percent. Ten percent is a lot of money -- \$234,871,530, according to the first page of the budget.

"My other concern, Mr. Speaker, along with the indication that we are going over the spending ceiling, is that the Constitution also states that the reasons therefore; that is, the reasons for going over the spending limit should be given. The Chairman of the Finance Committee did give a very eloquent explanation of the general priorities that this document lays out for us. But I think what is written here and what has been stated in support of the measure has fallen short of the constitutional requirement that we really explain why and where the expenditures are coming through.

"It is a concern because accountability -- accountability -- is the major area where we need to improve. The audits, as mentioned by the Minority Floor Leader, and there have been many -- the DOE, our purchases service area, the University and its spending of moneys on

conservations efforts, whereby we've found that they don't know whether or not they conserved anything, audits on the Judiciary -- all of these have talked about the lack of accountability. And the reason for the constitutional requirement that we do talk about the reasons for going over the spending ceiling is to at least provide for us, ourselves, as well as the public, an understanding of why we are exceeding something which the voters have spoken on and said they want. I hope we can do a better job between now and the end of session.

"Also, Mr. Speaker, what disturbs me about the budget process and has always disturbed me over the years, whether it has been in the subject matter committee or this year on Finance, is the way the Executive prepares the budget. And I think the lack of questioning, somewhat because of time, somewhat because of just the nature of our process, but I think it is a legitimate thing to look toward, is the lack of real solid, sound accounting practices in creating this document before us from the administration. That is, when they provide us numbers and estimates of how much an item costs, whether it be fixing a roof, or perhaps expending money to rent houses for community-based treatment centers, we have no idea whether or not these figures are based on a true ascertainment of what is going on in the marketplace, or whether it comes off from one individual's head. I found instances where you ask a certain department why is it that this cost is at this level, say to fix the roof at old Triple C, and they say that they called one vendor. 'You didn't call two or you didn't talk to more than one individual?' He answers, 'no,' and yet, everyone of us know that if we went out to fix our home, to construct our home, we would ask more than one person. We would ask more than one vendor to at least get a ballpark figure, that everybody was playing fast and fair and being honest with what they were providing us in terms of costs and figures. We don't ask that enough. I think we'd like to many times. I recognize the time constraints, but we should consider that. The administration should do a better job.

"Also, Mr. Speaker, I'm concerned about the number of special funds that we are creating this year. I probably would have more to say later during the session. I think a warning flag is needed today because, again, the issue of the spending ceiling is in question here. If we create too many special funds, we make the spending ceiling almost worthless in terms of its effect to keep controls that, again, the public has said they support. If we create too many special funds, we lose oversight -- legislative oversight -- which is still a necessary quantum factor in creating sound fiscal policy and to create a chance for the public to have input.

"For all these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I have grave reservations on this measure. I represent an area which has a good mix of different kinds of economic levels in terms of citizenry. I am a Republican. I hope that we can do a better job between now and the end of session.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cavasso then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, one last final comment. I'm also speaking in favor of the budget with reservations, and to symphatize with the Majority Floor Leader's concerns about those less fortunate in our community. We do need to take care of widows and orphans, the handicapped, and those people who live in outlying districts such as mine.

"But, Mr. Speaker, there is a balance. There's a place for initiative, and the opportunity to go out and take your family, and work to the best of your ability, to take a chance, and to move out, and we must be cautious as a government not to take it away, that self-initiative, not to take away the place of the family, and yet, even as a government, we do need to help those in need so I'm concerned, and I share Repesentative Hemmings' concern that we are not yet in balance.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm in favor of the bill but I am concerned about some of the comments coming back and forth as far as the Minority and the Majority. colleague across from Kailua -- I went to the same meeting as he went to last night and I heard some of his comments, maybe I'm a little naive, but when he says that he went out and looked at the beautiful streets and houses, schools, and the rest of it, and how great we are, and how lucky we are here in Hawaii, I didn't hear that when he was running. I heard what a lousy job we were doing on the Windward side and how the money was not being equally divided. We have lousy streets, schools run Yet today, because we are on a party type of discussion, all of a sudden, everything is rosy. He goes to the meeting last night and says we have all these wonderful bills coming down and they should pass. I agree that we're going to need flexibility when we go across. So we're not going to pass all of the House bills or all of the Senate bills and we all know that or we should, and we are a little over.

"We have some good programs here. That's why I'm going to fight for the budget as hard as I can as in the past, and I would hope that when we do come to a conference committee, that all the members of this House remember that we're not Minority and Majority, but we are a house against the other house. But right now, we are a division as far as the Minority and Majority, and as a small businessman, I can understand the frustrations that the Representative is talking about from Kahala and the Representative, our Floor Leader, because I want to make sure that my tax dollars are being spent as wisely as So, in that case, Mr. Speaker, I'll be we should. watching the budget like everybody else, but I would like to congratulate all of those who have worked so hard and to make sure that we do a good job when we fight with the Senate.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 205, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Hemmings voting no, and Representatives Hayes, Shon and Tajiri being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 205 had passed Third Reading at 12:55 o'clock p.m.

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:57 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Heinmings and carried, the House of Representativesd adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m. tomorrow, Thursday, March 9, 1989.

Representative Horita then proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, for the past twenty years, the Hawaii Jaycees have had their Outstanding Young Persons' Award program. Each year, three exemplary citizens have been chosen on their achievements, contributions in the area of personal improvement, economic innovation and social improvement within the context of major contemporary problems, by voluntary government service, scientific or technological contributions, cultural enrichment, academic, moral and religious leadership.

"Representing the Hawaii Jaycees today is Mr. Clifford Ogata. The 1989 recipients of the award are Guy Fujimura, Gary Kelly and Keith Katsuda.

"Mr. Fujimura is a Secretary-Treasurer for Local 142, ILWU. I guess he is a familiar face around these parts. He received his degree from the University of Hawaii-Manoa, and has served on the Oahu Development Conference, the Governor's Commission on Hawaii's Economic Future, and currently serves on the Boards of Hawaii Dance Foundation, Neighborhood Justice Center, and the State Water Commission.

"Mr. Keith Katsuda also graduated from the University of Hawaii-Manoa with a degree in secondary education and is currently a trust operations assistant with First Hawaiian Bank. He has served as President of the Honolulu Jaycees and his leadership abilities were recognized nationally when he was awarded the Charles Cult Memorial Award as one of the top forty Jaycees Chapter Presidents.

"Mr. Gary Kelly was born with congenital cataracts, and despite the loss of 90 percent of his vision, earned a psychology degree from the Georgia Institute of Technology, and designed devices to assist people with disabilities at Emory University. Representative Oshiro, for the Committee on Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 934) recommending that H.R. No. 18, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

Representative Oshiro moved that the reports of the Committee be adopted and H.R. No. 18, HD 1, and H.C.R. No. 16, HD 1, be adopted, seconded by Representative Bybee.

Representative Liu rose and stated:

- "Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against both resolutions.
- "Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against both resolutions, not because I believe that the final result won't be useful. I rise to speak against them because I am opposed to the Legislature -- to this house -- being placed in the position

by those who do the planning for this State's harbors, airports et cetera, buildings, that put us in a position of having to correct things that should have been done right the first time.

"The questions concerning the deep draft harbor were readily foreseeable many, many years ago. I think we all can recall the discussions that went on as to whether or not the deep draft harbor would be large enough, would be deep enough, to handle the various types of cargo ships that would be developed in the future. Nevertheless, the Army Corps of Engineers, although being a federal organization, but with the State went ahead and built what we have now. I probably wouldn't be making these comments if the deep draft harbor weren't so new, but it is very new. And here we are having to study the need to enlarge and make it useable. We will have to and it is something which is unfortunate that we have to spend time and money in doing this. It is similar to the situation with our State buildings where we found out that now the bill to correct them for access to the handicapped will be at least \$27-million.

"My vote today, Mr. Speaker, again is not a vote against the work of the Transportation Committee and its hardworking Chair, but again, to protest to the administration that we should not be placed in a position in the future where on major capital improvements to the State, we have to come back very shortly after they are built to make corrections.

"For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I would like the Clerk to please cast a 'no' vote for me on both resolutions.

"Thank you."

Representative Hemmings then rose and stated:

"Since this is a voice vote, I share the same concerns as the Minority Leader. I would like to ask the Clerk to likewise cast 'no' votes for me."

Representative Apo rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think many of us in the House do share the loyal opposition's concern with respect to the history of the development of the Barber's Point draft harbor. However, that project was initiated under a previous administration and I would commend the Waihee administration for wanting to bite the bullet and finally bring about some resolution with respect to master planning and develop some sort of user needs analyses in order to determine what this harbor will eventually be best suited for.

"So, I don't understand the 'no' votes on the part of the Minority Leader and Minority Floor Leader since this resolution is designed to address the very concerns that they have expressed.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"As far as our community, it is important that we create a safe and healthy environment for our families and for leadership. That is why they are here. It is important for us to empower people in the decision-making process and to enroll them to participate in the decision-making process. And that is why they are here. They want to learn how we make decisions and they want to get the feel of what we do. And so, many of us here are hosting people from all over the states as part of this training program.

"And, like Representative Baker mentioned, this is their seventh year, and I do want to recognize their leaders."

Representative Arakaki then asked the following persons to stand to be recognized: Martha Turner who is the cochair of this project; and Pamela Kutara who is the County Extension Agent for the UH Cooperative Extension

Program. And they have 52 members who are participating, approximately 30 who are attached to various offices. So, I would like to recognize all of them as one group," and asked them to stand to be recognized.

They are among the few whose very mention of their names evoke images of compassion and a commitment to serve humanity with an almost total disregard for personal gain or their health and safety.

"Today, we have the opportunity to honor such an As you know, Mr. Speaker and fellow individual. members, the issue of the homeless is one that frustrates us from the halls and conference rooms of our State Capitol to the congressional chambers and presidential offices of Washington, D.C. We will continue to debate and discuss the growing crises of the homeless in Hawaii and America. We shall bicker over who is to blame, and we shall argue about who is responsible for solutions. There are some who will even try to convince us that people choose to be homeless. But there is neither comfort nor safe refuge in the streets. Just ask the number of growing homeless families and children, and the rising numbers of mentally ill street people. And consider the fact that our prisons are being filled at an alarming rate with homeless individuals who turn to crime in order to obtain shelter and meals. While government, in its usual ponderous manner, contemplates its response, there are people and agencies in our communities who, in the spirit of true compassion and caring, are providing resources for those who really need help.

"Today, we have an opportunity to say 'thank you' to one such individual. We have that chance to say 'we love you and we appreciate what you do and what you stand for '

"Mr. Speaker and members, let us embrace this kind and gentle man in the same manner in which he has embraced so many who are in need.

"It is my pleasure to introduce to all of you -- Father Claude Du Teil."

Representative Arakaki then asked Father Du Teil to stand to be recognized. Accompanying Father Du Teil were his wife, Roberta; his son, Bob; his daughter, Susan Du Teil Langford and her husband, Jim Langford.

Representative Shon moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1117, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Leong.

Representative Shon then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"I know it is unusual on Second Reading, but this is an unusual bill and it may be the only time that we have a chance to pause before we go into the budgetary discussions and look at mental health per se.

"Mr. Speaker, we all heard to our dismay rather recently that we are number 51 in the nation in mental health. It is an embarrassment, it is a tragedy, and it is something we have to do something about. And we've asked ourselves -- how in the world could this have happened?

"And I think the answer is that mental health is something that people don't like to think about. For years, the State Hospital has been neglected. We have not put the funds into it and this is not a singular myopia, Mr. Speaker. Neither Republicans, nor Democrats, nor Socialists, nor Libertarians, or anyone else, has chosen to make this a number one priority of the program. And if you have visited the State mental hospital as I have, you could not be unmoved by the deteriorated conditions that you see there that we impose on our mentally ill friends.

"Mr. Speaker, it is very fundamental to recognize that there is a movement in the United States, as well as in Hawaii, for much more humane integration of the mentally ill in our community, in so-called community-based services and housing. And we're not talking about the wholesale deinstitutionalization that has happened in the past on the mainland where people were turning to homeless over this. We're talking about a much more comprehensive continuum of services that are viable alternatives to housing or warehousing people in a state hospital.

"I am happy to report, at this conjecture, that the years of recriminations and debate that have gone on among consumers, advocates, health department, is hopefully beginning to subside. This year, very recently, there has been convened a number of mediation sessions where consumers and advocates and families and friends and professionals have gotten together and hammered out some language that they feel really does represent a consensus agreement.

"In recent years, we have required that our health insurance include mental health treatment. We have made a new commitment for a new State hospital that is not the end of the system but simply one part of it, and we have committed ourselves to constructing housing, clubhouses, many other services.

"Mr. Speaker, this particular bill is unusual in that we have attempted, at this juncture, to look at what has been absent from the table in a single package for mental health this year. The administration budget came down and it had a lot more money but it was not a complete package. It was not until now that we have actually been able to see what has been missing. Can we see a large, comprehensive picture of what we need to do to get us out of the cellar on this issue? We have asked ourselves some questions of the programs, Mr. Speaker.

"First, is the program important to move the Department of Health towards a new and more effective approach towards mental health?

"Two, is the program important to create a balanced and comprehensive system and to avoid the continuing development of fragmented and incoherent system?

"We have asked ourselves, is the program important to alleviate the most critical needs of the severely disabled mentally ill? And we have asked questions regarding whether or not it contributes to a consensus.

"There is a lot of interesting and important items in this bill, and I hope that those who are on Finance and others who are interested will take a look at it because without a comprehensive package, we are all going to be subject to perhaps justifiable criticism that we did not do anything about mental health this year. It makes a difference.

"And so with that, Mr. Speaker, I would like to thank the indulgence of the colleagues, but I think it is an issue that if we don't focus on it, and if we don't force ourselves to deal with it, each and every one of us, that it will slide again and again as a second and third priority. It is really important that those who have mental health problems are seen as just as important to us as those who have physical problems of a more conventional nature.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"I am also greatly in favor of more services for the mentally ill and I would like to have the words of the Health Committee Chairman inserted into the Journal as my own.

"Thank you."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Anderson rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I wouldn't want my colleagues to think that we have never looked at mental health, or been involved, or concerned. In fact, if you'd like to look at deplorable conditions, Waimano Home is that way.

"If we were going to do anything years and years ago, we asked if we could take the State Hospital and have it put up at Waimano. We own lots of land up there. Take all of our institutions and move them in one location but nobody was concerned at that time. And it's not that we didn't want to put the money there, it just wasn't an issue that was going to come up.

"We are now looking at it and I think the Governor, because of our lack of putting funds where they should have been years ago, all of a sudden we are looking like we are spending millions and millions of dollars, but in fact, it is something that has been looked at, has not been taken care of, and I think we can all share the Chairman's concerns, but it's everybody's concern. We have been looking at it.

"Thank you."

Representative Leong then requested that the remarks of the Chairman of the Health Committee be inserted into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Bybee rose to endorse Representative Shon's comments, stating:

"I believe a society is often rightly judged on how it addresses the needs of those who are least able to address their own needs and in Hawaii, the Aloha State, I believe has long ignored the needs of those who have suffered from mental illness and we need to address that as our highest priority, Mr. Speaker, so I speak in favor of this bill."

Representative Stegmaier rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I want to express this from the point of view of someone who has, within my own family, a sister who, for some fifteen years now, has been severely mentally ill.

"I am in favor of this bill as it is represented to be a package of important legislation for the mentally ill to the extent that it supports families in taking care of its own loved ones. And to the extent that it does not really focus fully on the need to support families in taking care of their mentally ill siblings and children, I want to express my reservations that perhaps this bill needs to be augmented in the future.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Duldulao rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"My district, Waipahu, is also suffering from the neglect of mental facilities, and I strongly support this bill.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1117, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MENTAL HEALTH," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

At 12:42 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:47 o'clock p.m.

"I believe the first responsibility, irrespective of how busy we are, is to this floor and to this chamber session, and I would just like to go on record in terms of recording the fact that I am very upset about it.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair responded: "Your point is well taken."

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:34 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m. tomorrow, Thursday, March 23, 1989.

"The resolution speaks for itself with respect to their accomplishments, but I would like to read an excerpt from the director of the program in one of their brochures: 'The National Heritage Fellowships, of all the activities assisted by the Folk Arts Program, these fellowships are among the most appreciated and applauded because they present to America a vision of themselves and of their country, a vision somewhat idealized but profoundly longed for and so, in significant ways, profoundly true. It is a vision of a confident and open-hearted nation where differences can be seen as exciting instead of fear-laden, where men and women of goodwill across all manner of racial, linguistic and historical barriers can find common ground in understanding solid craftsmanship, virtuoso technique and deeply felt expressions. The vision is the more significant and the more moving by being centered on everyday people. Artists who don't particularly look or act like artists, perhaps, and they have been brought to public attention by other everyday people because the National Heritage Fellowships are open to all and this includes the nomination process. There are no nomination forms and anyone can nominate. It's worth noting, too, that each of these artists is a link to the past and the future and authentic exponent of a traditional form at a time in history.'

"In closing my remarks, Mr. Speaker, I know sometimes in our public hearings and in our budget decisions, we often question some of the allocations that we make in the area of the arts and other activities like that and, Mr. Speaker, I have always been a strong supporter of the arts because I think this is what separates us from animals. When we define quality of life, it is the arts and culture that give us that quality of life and, as such, I think it is deserving if we wish to continue as a civilized nation, that we pay more attention in this area.

"We do have a very, very fine Folk Arts Program and I will be introducing you to that coordinator."

Tuesday, March 28, 1989

The House of Representatives of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1989, convened at 11:30 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Reverend Richard Matsushita of the Aiea United Methodist Church, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Chang, Hashimoto, Horita and M. Ige, who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Fortieth Day.

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Fortieth Day was approved.

At this time, the following introductions were made to the members of the House:

Representative Apo introduced his nephew Mark Perkins, a senior at Lahainaluna High School, and a participant in the Youth Legislature.

Representative Metcalf then asked Wesley Eggerman, a participant in the Youth Legislature who had left a note of appreciation to him, to stand to be recognized.

Representative Alcon then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, yesterday, I had the opportunity to address the youth legislators in your behalf and they presented a beautiful opening session and after I got through addressing them, they introduced a resolution after which they stood for a rousing ovation for you, Mr. Speaker. And at this point, Mr. Speaker, I would like to thank all the members of the Youth Legislature for according us a cup of kisses.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Isbell then rose and stated:

"Yesterday, I had the privilege of watching the Youth Leg go through their swearing-in ceremonies and their speeches and it was really quite a thrill to watch, and I am very proud to see these young people doing a great job here on the floor.

"I would like to, at this time, introduce them to the members of this Legislature," and asked the members of the Youth Legislature to stand to be recognized.

Representative Marumoto asked Cecily Tatibouet, a participant in the Youth Legislature who has "done a lot of work for the Girl Scouts," to stand to be recognized.

Representative Marumoto then asked Jonathan Okinaka to stand to be recognized and thanked him for his note of appreciation.

Representative Apo then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, we have the honor to have the Lieutenant Governor with us on the chamber floor this morning, and I would like to take this opportunity to

introduce him to this body, and I believe he has a presentation to make."

Lieutenant Governor Ben Cayetano responded:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, I have in my hand a trophy and this trophy is called 'The Bad Bunch Perpetual Trophy,' which is given to the team that has lost a softball game.

"Before I go into my remarks, let me explain a bit about this history of this trophy. As you know, there is a Governor's league where the Senate plays the House and the House plays the Lieutenant Governor's Office and we play the different State agencies.

"Well, a couple of weeks ago, I had the dismal experience of standing on the House floor being presented this trophy because my office had played the Senate and we were soundly trounced.

"Today, I have another experience -- a more pleasant experience.

"Yesterday, as you know, Mr. Speaker, you and I were watching the game between the members of the House and the Office of the Lieutenant Governor's staff. And needless to say, although the House members performed well, I was really surprised that the flashes of brilliance showed by Ed Bybee, Mazie Hirono, Paul Oshiro, Dennis Arakaki and, in particular, we prevailed. I think the final score was 11 to 7. I want to give a special thanks to Sam Lee who was playing right field for us as a member of the House and accounted for about four of our runs, I believe. Sam, thank you very much. Very good with the hidden ball trick. Whenever we hit the ball out that way, Sam couldn't find it.

"In any event, Mr. Speaker, I want to thank you for holding up the truly 'big guns' in this House because I know that if Representative Peters and Representatives Yoshimura and Souki and some of the others had played, and Representative Apo in particualr, maybe the score would have been a little closer -- maybe 11 to 10 or something like that.

"In any event, I thank you for this privilege here today and I want to present to you this trophy. It's a banana as you can see. I hope that you will see fit to play the Senate and maybe pass this on to Senate President Dickie Wong.

"Thank you very much and aloha."

Representative Bybee then rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

H.R. No. 209, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING THE 1989 YMCA YOUTH LEGISLATURE PROGRAM," was jointly offered by Representatives Kihano, Kotani, Arakaki and Hirono and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representativ Kotani, seconded by Representative Arakaki and carried, H.R. No. 209 was adopted.

Representative Kotani then rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"On behalf of my colleagues, I would like to offer congratulations and best wishes to the YMCA Youth Legislature Program, which celebrates its fourth decade of activity in 1989.

"Representatives Arakaki, Hirono and I are former participants in the program, and my first encounter with legislative politics was when I participated in the YMCA Legislature as a member of the Youth House and I spent two years there. It was a splendid introduction to legislative politics.

"In fact, I remember I learned a little bit about parliamentary maneuvering. During one of the sessions, one of the controversial bills was a bill to lower the age of majority to the age of 18 which was a measure which I supported. But we knew that the vote would be close and when we failed to extend debate time, I thought that we would lose. Therefore, I decided on the brilliant strategem of casting my vote against the bill so that I would be able to move to reconsider and buy us more time to convince more people to vote with us. Unfortunately, I had made a slight miscalculation. The bill did fail and it lost by one vote — the vote which I cast against it — and the session ended before we could reconsider action on the bill.

"So in these august chambers, when Majority Floor Leader Peter Apo forgets the name of one of the individuals whom he is supposed to introduce in a floor presentation sponsored by his office and asks, 'Mr. Whomever-You-Are' to stand to be recognized, or when Representative Hirono, a fellow Youth Legislature alumnus, announces that the next public hearing of the Consumer Protection and Commerce Committee will be held in Room 327 in the Capitol, which happens to be my office, or when our good Speaker forgets my name and keeps trying to recognize 'Representative Chang' when I stand to take the floor; in other words, when it's business

as usual in the State House of Representatives, I remember the days of the Youth Legislature and count my blessings for the way in which it prepared me for these proceedings.

"In a more serious vein, Mr. Speaker, the purpose of the Youth Legislature was and continues to be 'to develop within each person the attitudes, skills and responsibilities of active citizenship.' The program allows our young people to acquire the parliamentary and organizing skills that will be needed by the stewards of our future. And it encourages the kind of student whose father, like my father, may be a mechanic with a seventh grade education, or the student whose mother might be a single parent working as a secretary or a waitress — the working class student who would never have believed that it was possible to aspire to serve in these halls — to be able to test their ideas in debate against their private school peers, to ponder over weighty decisions in the dignified chairs in these chambers and to begin to dream of achieving what had once seemed impossible.

"That is why it gives me great pleasure to recognize the 40th session of the YMCA Youth Legislature.

"At this time, Mr. Speaker, I would like to recognize several of those future leaders who are beginning to shape the ideas, skills, and visions that will guide us in the first decades of the 21st century."

Representative Kotani then asked the following honorees to stand to be recognized: James Seto, Youth Speaker of the House, a Kalani High School senior; Sherrie Encarnacion, House Attorney, a Kailua High School junior; Greg Yamasaki, House Clerk, a Punahou School freshman; Nicole Yuen, House Chaplain, a Lutheran High School junior; Christopher Bataad, House Sergeant-at-Arms, a Mililani High School freshman; and Nelson Higa, State Director, the adult coordinator of the 40th Hawaii State YMCA Youth Legislature.

Representative Kotani then asked other members of the Youth House of Representatives who were seated in the gallery to stand to be recognized, and continued, "Among these young leaders, I would like to thank Youth Representative Dorothy Shiguki for the very kind note that she left on my desk."

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to note also that, in the past, the YMCA Youth legislators have often preceded us in their bold actions. Last session, the Youth Legislature passed a bill to establish a Martin Luther King holiday before we had seen fit to do so. And this session, the Youth Legislature passed a measure providing for school-community based management. Let us be advised by their actions.

"Finally, Mr. Speaker, the participants in the 40th YMCA Youth Legislature and their advisors have asked that I extend their warmest aloha and appreciation to you for your unqualified and consistent support of their efforts and the entire program.

Floral leis and certified copies of the resolution were presented to the honorees by Representatives Arakaki, Kotani, Hirono, Duldulao, Kawakami and Baker.

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"When I participated in the Youth Legislature, it was called then, many years ago, 'Model Legislature' or 'Model Leg' and now I notice that they call it the 'Youth Legislature,' and I just want to make a comment that many of our members would like to be known as the Youth Legislature also. But judging by the way we

played softball yesterday, I don't know, we may have some doubts.

"But, indeed, I think they've grown beyond being just a model Legislature, judging by the actions that I have seen in their committee work and here on the floor, and they've grown to a point of sophistication far beyond when I participated, it was more of a social event then anything else.

"So, I want to congratulate those who participated and especially the YMCA, and I want to thank them for the opportunity that I had and also thank them for continuing to present the opportunities to our young people in Hawaii.

"I also want to recognize 'Mr. Stud Buns' who had my chair, Wayne Choy, and I hope it's safe to sit in my seat.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hirono then rose and stated:

"As with Representative Arakaki, when I served as a participant in the Youth Legislature, it was called 'Model Leg' and I must say that society really changes us, and at the time that I particpated which I must say was about gosh! over twenty years ago, I think, and, you know, the kinds of issues that we faced then were rather simple compared to some of the kinds of issues that the Youth Legislature tackle these days, and I really commend the YMCA for continuing to sponsor this very important opportunity for our young people.

"Certainly, at the time that I participated, I had absolutely no idea that I would actually run for office. So this is the germ of something that is planted and you never know when it's going to come to fruition. And I would like to thank the members of the Youth Legislature and all of you sitting up there for participating. This is going to be something that may come back to you many years hence, and it is going to be an opportunity of importance and significance.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"This bill seeks to clarify the Hawaii State income tax laws to comply with the federal provisions and it seems apparent that a good portion of the surplus we have in the State coffers right now are due to tax reorganization in the wake of the federal reorganization. What has happened here in Hawaii is that we have taken away, as the federal government has done, many of the deductions, but we have not correspondingly reduced the rate of taxation in the brackets so the net result is a tremendous increase in taxation out of the pockets of the working people of Hawaii.

"This bill, though worded fairly cleverly in the committee report, talks about clarifying with respect to limitations to standard deductions, allowing parents to include on their returns the unearned income of their minor children, and provide for increases in taxable income. So these provisions will further erode the deductions from the tax code here in the State of Hawaii. And unless there is corresponding reductions in the rate of taxation, the result is going to be an increase for the workers of Hawaii.

"The surplus that is presently being experienced in the State of Hawaii, in my opinion, is not due to the efficiency and frugality of the spending of this body. It's the heavy taxation on the workers of Hawaii and, therefore, in speaking to this bill, I hope that when we recodify our local tax laws to conform with the federal laws, we will likewise reduce the rate of taxation to correspond to make it fair and equitable to the workers of Hawaii.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Souki then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I just want to remind the Minority Floor Leader that the difference between the State of Hawaii and the federal government, as far as the tax laws, is that the federal government is a large debtor nation with a huge deficit -- among the largest in the world -- and the State of Hawaii has a surplus. That's all.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Hemmings, in rebuttal, stated:

"I want to thank the Finance Chairman for bringing that point to our attention. I am sure he will be there to testify in favor of the resolution being offered to impose on the federal government the constitutional amendment restricting deficit budget-making. I am sorry that his Democratic colleagues who control the budget-making

mechanism of the federal government -- the U.S. Congress -- has chosen to spend more than we take in. And I don't think it is anything to brag about here in the State of Hawaii that we have such a high rate of taxation, that we have a huge surplus. The billion dollars that is sitting in the State coffers right now that we're hastily trying to spend is surplus that came from overtaxation.

"My office is full of audit after audit after audit about the State's problems in the different agencies of government. With all the problems, none of the audits say that they need to spend more money. They say it is a management problem.

"The taxpayers of Hawaii are extremely generous. The reason we have a surplus is because we are amongst the highest taxed people in the nation. The three thousand people that came down here yesterday to call for a rebate were calling for money to be returned to them. It came out of their pockets.

"And I do appreciate the Finance Chairman's remarks in bringing up these points so I'd have the opportunity to rebut them.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

H.R. No. 223, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING AND COMMENDING HONPA HONGWANJI MISSION OF HAWAII," was jointly offered by Representatives Kotani, Arakaki, Ihara, D. Ige and Oshiro and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative Kotani, seconded by Representative Arakaki and carried, H.R. No. 223 was adopted.

Representative Kotani then rose and stated:

"On behalf of the co-introducers of the resolution, I would like to offer the following remarks regarding the Honpa Hongwanji Mission which this year celebrates the centennial of its founding in Hawaii.

"Today, we pay tribute to an institution whose legacy is almost inseparable from the history and welfare of the Japanese community in Hawaii.

"After the Jodo Shinshu sect established its Mission in the Hawaiian Islands in 1889, Hongwanji temples have served as havens of mutual support for struggling immigrants working in a strange land. The Mission established language schools, counseled families, sponsored martial arts instruction, and formed Young Buddhist Associations. During the plantation strikes of the early 20th century, the Hongwanji temples offered refuge and support to workers who had been evicted from their homes by the plantation owners. During the twenties, the language schools sponsored by the Hongwanji joined in the suit against the Territorial government that resulted in a U.S. Supreme Court decision that established the right of parents to send their children to foreign language schools. For the pioneer Issei and Nisei, Hongwanji temples served as pillars of stability and continuity, enabling Hawaii's working people to better endure the rigors of the plantation system in Territorial Hawaii.

"In the wake of anti-Japanese sentiments which followed the Pearl Harbor attack at the outset of World War II, the Mission's language schools were closed, its temples were shut down, and many of its priests and lay leaders were interned. During the war years, the Hongwanji Mission faced the wrath of American xenophobia and cultural bigotry. The organized activities came to a standstill in a period when much of the cultural heritage of Hawaii's Japanese was abandoned. While religious leaders faced repression at home, Nisei members of the Hongwanji temples who risked their lives for America on the battlefields of Europe, were not permitted to wear the Buddhist symbol on their dogtags.

"Nevertheless, the Mission and its work outlived the racism and wartime hysteria of the 1940s. Today, the Jodo Shinshu sect is the largest Buddhist sect in Hawaii with 40 ministers and 36 active temples throughout the islands. The temples have continued to serve as centers of Japanese culture in the islands and have accepted a broader contemporary role by providing child care and other community services, encouraging discussion of present issues, and supporting interdenominational relief work. Yet in the 1980s, there are still those who accuse Buddhism of being an alien religion contrary to the creed of a so-called Christian nation.

"The history of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii recalls a traditional Japanese saying: 'Kuro ga atte fukai jinsei ga wakaru; through suffering comes understanding.' As we elected officials are challenged to set worthwhile examples of caring leadership, let us reflect on the legacy that this institution shares with our other island faiths. Our search to build a better society should encompass the same values handed down by the Mission in its first 100 years of service to the people of Hawaii - the ageless values of perseverance, compassion, profound respect for life and tolerance of other creeds and cultures.

"At this time, I would like to recognize our honored guests."

Representative Kotani then asked the following honorees to stand to be recognized: Bishop Junjo Tsumura, who has guided the Mission for the past three years; Dr. Albert H. Miyasato, President of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii; and Reverend Yasuaki Hayashi, executive secretary of the Mission and the administrative aide to Bishop Tsumura.

Floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Amaral, Isbell and Marumoto while Representative Arakaki presented Bishop Tsumura with a certified copy of the resolution.

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"I remember, as a young child growing up, going to a temple on Friday mornings and also going to Sunday school on Sunday, and that just attests to the cultural diversity and opportunities we have here in Hawaii.

"But I especially enjoyed listening to the Reverend while attending services at the temple, and there is one story that I remember he told us about these two boys who were on the railroad track, and they were both on the rails and they were trying to see who could walk the farthest on the rails. And needless to say, neither of them could get very far, but what happened was they found out that if they reached out and touched each other and held each other's hands, they could travel for as far as they wanted to, supporting each other. And I just thought I would relay that story before we go to conference.

"But even beyond the kinds of lessons that we learn through the stories, I think the values -- the cultural values, the cultural awareness -- that were passed on through the Hongwanji Mission is something that we all kept with us, and I would also like to pay tribute to the Hongwanji Mission for playing such a vital role in many lives for the people here in Hawaii.

"Thank you."

Representative Apo introduced three young ladies "who work very hard in the area of special education. They are here lobbying for the reinstatement of some items in the budget like educational assistance."

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

Representative Cavasso then rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to cover a little bit of the background of these girls. This is essentially the same softball team that won the softball championship last year -- the State championship -- with one exception. The Representative from Kaneohe gave us a gift of an additional pitcher this year from Castle so now we have the two best pitchers in the State of Hawaii, and I would let you guys know that we still have our other one coming back next year so we're a threat.

"Out of the last four years, these girls have played on the team every year. They won the State championship as freshmens. They won the OIA that year and came back to win the OIA again as sophomores. They didn't take the State championship as sophomores but they did as juniors, and now they have done it again as seniors. And these three girls here today are representing the entire team.

"If I could ask the girls to stand as I introduce you: Dora Mortensen. Dora was the pitcher this year, the senior pitcher. We have two pitchers and she originally came from Kaneohe and joined Kailua this year; Ualani Cochran. Ualani played the position of right field and she was also voted as the 'Most Valuable Player, All Tournament Team;' and Denise Kamakea. Denise originally comes from Waimanalo and now Kailua, and she played second base."

Floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Anderson, M. Ige and Bybee while Representative Cavasso presented them with certified copies of the resolution.

At 11:55 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

H.R. No. 252, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION COMMENDING AND CONGRATULATING WALTER LAPPERT FOR BEING SELECTED HAWAII'S EXPORTER OF THE YEAR FOR 1989," was jointly offered by Representatives Kanoho, Kawakami, Apo, Arakaki, Baker and Lee.

On motion by Representative Kanoho, seconded by Representative Kawakami and carried, H.R. No. 252 was adopted.

Representative Kanoho then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, on behalf of Representatives Apo and Kawakami, I am most honored to provide some additional insights on one of Kauai's most illustrious and well traveled citizens to the members of this body.

"Born in Vienna 67 years ago, this high spirited adventurer and entrepreneur's life has been punctuated with world travels that have included studying in Prague and Paris, visits to Algiers, Morocco and Martinique and to an Ecuadorian plantation where he became a distiller, shipping his goods to the United States, Panama and to the military forces in Ecuador and Venezuela.

"He later opened up another operation in Venezuela where he was also the sole distributor of certain well-known 'spirits.' He also spent some time among the headhunters along the banks of the Amazon River.

"In 1983, after giving his three restaurants in Sausalito to his son, Walter and his wife, Mary, retired to Kauai, ostensibly to 'get away from it all.'

"Their brief 'retirement' came to an end after buying ice cream cones that 'tasted like old socks.'

"It was out of the belief that he could produce a better product that **Lappert's Aloha Ice Cream** was born in a small Hanapepe store.

"Today, six years and 125 flavors later, their handpacked local concoctions that range from guava cheesecake to poha berry are sold by more than 100 employees in 75 stores and dozens of restaurants in Hawaii and California.

"His formula for success combines three essential elements: A strong work ethic, the premise that quality is the most important guideline in his business, and a philosophy of sharing his success with those who have helped put him in the market. His production manager, previously unemployed for four years, now supervises several employees and earns in excess of \$40,000 per year. I believe Mr. Lappert is sincere when he says that his people are his family, his ohana. His 'bottom line,' more than money, is success, and working with people.

"It is little wonder then that Aloha Ice Cream yielded annual revenues in excess of ten million dollars in 1988, generated from a Kauai manufacturing and packing plant where 30 employees produce tens of thousands of tubs each month and exporting more than six million pounds of ice cream sorbet each year. With Japan contracts just engaged, production is expected to triple in the next two years. Incidentally, he is also exporting about five to seven thousand pounds of coffee per month and he told me just a few minutes ago that he expects that his coffee production should exceed his ice cream business.

"In closing, Mr. Speaker, I cite excerpts from a recent interview that reflect the sentiments of this well traveled man for the beauty of Kauai and its people: 'I'm very proud of this success, I'm proud of those 30 people on Kauai. My endeavors in Hawaii are not for money. My endeavors in Hawaii are for the people of Hawaii, and for the islands. When I landed in Lihue and drove by that sugar mill, my youth came back to me. I wouldn't live anywhere else in the world -- this is my last love affair in life.'

"Mr. Speaker, it's quite apparent that this man has great taste and sound judgment in selecting Kauai as his home. Even more apparent is the fact that he has served the people of Kauai with a double scoop of his aloha spirit. It is with this sense of 'aloha' that he has recently indicated to me his desire to share his success by giving of himself in helping the youth of Hawaii in some way. We are currently developing possible ideas to fulfill his latest dreams.

"These facts that I have presented this morning are well documented, for Walter has been recognized for his exploits in feature articles by Midweek, Gourmet magazine, and the Spring 1988 issue of Family Wealth, a Time Incorporated publication.

"Mr. Speaker, on behalf of Representatives Apo and Kawakami, and the people of our Kauai community, it is my privilege to present to you and the members of this honorable body, Mr. Walter Lappert, 'Exporter of the Year'."

Representative Kanoho then asked Mr. Walter Lappert to stand to be recognized. Accompanying the honoree was his wife, Mary; son, Michael, "who still operates the three restaurants in Sausalito, and his wife, Jessica.

Floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Kawakami, Apo, Baker and M. Ige while Representative Kanoho presented Mr. Lappert with a certified copy of the resolution.
