"As always, even as a non-smoker for the last fifteen years, it bothers me that we continuously take away the rights of people. I would hope that the Chairman for Judiciary would see fit to make sure maybe that people respect one another. I know of many smokers today who don't need bills. They automatically leave a room if there's non-smokers present. We don't need to continuously take the pendulum from where we started and go too far, and I think that's what we continuously do when we have bills that take away the rights of people, and it's bothered me and I just wanted to let you know that I would like to go no."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose and requested that Representative Anderson's words be inserted into the Journal as his own and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Peters then rose and requested that the remarks of Representative Anderson be inserted into the Journal as his own and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative M. Ige rose and requested that his remarks, against the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative M. Ige's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to speak against the passage of this measure. I would, however, like to recognize the hard work of Chairman Shon in putting together such a sensitive bill, and I agree with the living will section 100 percent.

"However, I am deeply concerned by one small section of this entire 18 page bill that allows the withholding or withdrawal of life-supporting procedures in absence of a declaration.

"I do not believe that a verbal statement made by the patient to either a physician or to the patient's friend or relative may be considered by the physician to withdraw or withhold life-supporting procedures.

"This language is far too broad and far too vague and invites potential abuse.

"I hope the Committee on Judiciary will give its most serious consideration to amend this section in question."

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Reverend Christopher Eng of the Waipahu United Church of Christ, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Apo, Peters, Souki, Takamine and Yoshimura, who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Twenty-Third Day.

This year we are quite apprehensive because our tax revenues are going down, and the reason is that tourists are not coming to our islands as they did in numbers like last year. The HVB estimates that tourist arrivals will be down twenty percent and we will likely lose about \$460-million in tourist expenditures. The Hawaii Visitors Bureau has asked us to exercise our personal diplomacy in contacts to get people to visit Hawaii.

"I am very pleased to report to the House that my wife and I have succeeded in persuading her cousin to come here, and indeed we have also persuaded them to visit Poipu because we know that Kauai is suffering a lot more than Honolulu is and these visitors will help Poipu. They will be staying at Stouffers in Poipu for the rest of this week."

Representative Lee then asked his visitors from Chicago -- Lori, a banker with Northern Trust, and her husband, Kent Nerenberg, who runs a carton company -- to stand to be recognized.

Representative Kanoho introduced a group of 19 students who are members of the Kauai District Student Council representing Kapaa, Waimea and Kauai High Schools. They were accompanied by their teachers, Rudy Seo, David Kagawa and Shelley Pascua, and Lynn Sato, district resource teacher.

Representative Thielen introduced her niece, Cynthia Allison Chase, a former Varsity volleyball player in the University system.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

H.R. No. 98, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION CONGRATULATING THE PEARL CITY HIGH SCHOOL SYMPHONIC BAND, 'THE WORLD'S BEST HIGH SCHOOL SYMPHONIC BAND,' ON ITS INVITATIONAL ACHIEVEMENT AT THE MID-WEST INTERNATIONAL BAND AND ORCHESTRA CLINIC," was jointly offered by Representatives Hashimoto, D. Ige, Yonamine, Alcon, Apo, Arakaki, Baker, Bellinger, Bunda, Cachola, Chang, Chun, Fukunaga, Hagino, Hirono, Honda, M. Ige, Ihara, Isbell, Kanoho, Kawakami, Lee, Metcalf, Okamura, Oshiro, Santiago, Shon, Souki, Stegmaier, Takamine, Tam, Taniguchi, Thielen, Tom and Yoshimura and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative Hashimoto, seconded by Representative D. Ige and carried, H.R. No. 98 was adopted.

Representative Hashimoto rose and prior to introducing the honorees, stated:

"Mr. Speaker and colleagues, right before the session convened today, we were entertained by the world's best high school symphonic band. Those of us from Pearl City have always believed that we had the best band, not only in the State of Hawaii, but the world. For many years, our band has brought our community together through its many accomplishments.

"The superb achievement of the Pearl City High School Symphonic Band cannot be over-emphasized. One hundred of the nation's very best bands were invited to apply to this prestigious world-class Mid-West International Band and Orchestra Clinic. Of the one hundred bands recommended to apply, only four from the United States were chosen to attend and perform along with the bands from 33 other countries.

"Our symphonic band began practicing from July and did not stop until one hour before their instruments needed to be loaded on a plane bound for Chicago. Over 8,000 of the world's most famous conductors and composers attended this three day event at the Chicago Hilton. The best band is saved for the last night and Pearl City High School performed on the last night. After the first number, our band received three curtain calls and at the end of the concert, they received a standing ovation and five curtain calls.

"Mr. Speaker, we are all very proud and pleased that now the rest of the world recognizes what we in Pearl City have known all along, that we do have the best symphonic band in the world.

"At this time, Mr. Speaker, I believe Representative David Ige has a few comments he would like to add."

Representative D. Ige was recognized and he rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just had a couple of remarks.

"You know, as the very first president of the Pearl City High School Band in my freshman year, it is with extreme pride that I can participate in this proceedings here this morning.

"I just wanted to make one correction. This Band and Orchestra Clinic really is not a high school activity -- it's high school, it's college, it's professional. So it really is the epitome of music excellence in the world.

"Much has been written and said about the quality and what's wrong with our public school system in Hawaii, and I think it is just very appropriate that we spend a few moments in these chambers this morning to really honor what the best of what the school system has to offer. These students are examples of what we can achieve when talented young people, dedicated teachers and administrators, committed parents, and a caring community work together for all of us.

"I'm really honored to be participating in this this morning.

"Thank you, and I believe that Representative Yonamine has a few comments to offer."

Representative Yonamine was recognized and he rose and stated:

"Thank you.

"Like what Representative Ige says, what's good about public schools, and you see it today. Having been a Pearl City Band booster since 1979, it seems as though once you are a band booster, it only seems and feels like you are a band booster for life. But I do know that once you are a band member, you are indeed a band member for life.

"I congratulate each one of the band members for being a member of the outstanding concert band, as well as the marching band and the stage bands, and all of the combos and combinations that they play in throughout the year. After watching a stirring half-time show at a UH game, Jim Leahey said, 'This Pearl City Band is the best band in the WAC.'

"Excellence in concert marching and marching band starts at the top with the director. And that's why it's a special privilege to give recognition to the person who is responsible for all of this excitement -- Mr. Mike Nakasone -- who has also recruited an outstanding staff and volunteer directress to assist him over the years.

"Mike Nakasone believes that any student who wants to play in the band should be given that opportunity to do so and no one is excluded, and that is why it's still remarkable that he can still mold over three hundred band members, the State's largest band, into outstanding band units, and he is the person who gives leadership and inspiration to those around him.

"My two daughters are typical examples of those who fell under the Naksonian influence. One was a section leader, the other the president of the band. They are like so many thousands of students who, because of the Naksonian influence and maybe despite the Naksonian influence, have a deep interest in music and the performing arts long after high school. They had good times, good friends, performed to their best. They forgot the hard practices, Well's camp, and so forth. But they have treasured their activities with the band as an unforgettable experience in all of their high school years.

"Each one of you band members have achieved what others have not, and I hope that you will treasure your moments for the rest of your lives.

"Thank you."

Representative Hashimoto then rose and on behalf of Representatives D. Ige, Yonamine and herself, introduced the following honorees who were seated on the Chamber floor: Miss Susan Tsunoda, President of the Band and representing the young men and women of the Pearl City High School Symphonic Band; Mr. Michael Nakasone, Band Director; Mr. Tommy Kamisato, Band Director; and Mr. Gerald Suyama, Principal of Pearl City High School.

Representative Hashimoto then asked the members of the Pearl City High School Symphonic Band who were seated in the gallery to stand to be recognized.

Representative Young then rose and stated:

"As a former clarinet and alto saxophone player in my high school band, I just wanted to say I was on my way to a decision-making meeting at 11:00 o'clock when their program ended and I felt compelled to go downstairs and thank them in person. The music was absolutely

wonderful and I only wish that they could play for us every day and set the tone for our meetings every day.

"Thank you very much. It was really great!"

Representative Chang then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would just like to inform the members of this body and members of the band and the audience that Mike Nakasone is from Hilo, a graduate of Hilo High School, and in his younger years, he was a member of one of the State's most popular bands, the Mop Tops."

At this time, floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives D. Ige, Baker, Chun and Yonamine while Representative Hashimoto presented Mr. Nakasone with a House certificate of recognition.

"This morning, to be honoring the Pearl City High School Symphonic Band, we in the Legislature struggle with problems of excellence for years and years and years, and when something like this happens and we have a symphonic band which is the world's best in the high schools, it makes us proud of the job we do here, knowing that there is some influence in the public school system. So it is really an honor for us today to honor this symphonic band and it gives me that great pleasure to have you here this morning."

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 571 on H.B. No. 99, HD 2:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 99, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Say.

Representative Anderson rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to speak on behalf of the bill, however, I do have some reservations, and I would hope that they would look at it on the other side. I'm not sure that we need this particular bill because we might have this already in the State Plan, in housing. I don't know exactly what we would need in the way of staffing and how many, so for those reasons I do have a few concerns.

"Thank you."

Representative Arakaki rose to speak in favor of the bill, with some concerns, stating:

"I just hope the task force, if we do approve this bill finally, will look at Items 6 and 7 as a top priority and that's developing strategies to expand the development of low-income housing, and number 7, formulating methods of addressing the growing demand and limited supply of rental housing for low to moderate-income families.

"I think many of the problems we are facing now, especially with the homeless, is a vestigial legacy of the Reagan Administration where he managed to cut 70 percent of the housing and urban development budget. And when asked what would happen to many of the funds that were supposed to be for low-income housing, his response was that if we develop a need in the private sector, the private developers would step forth and meet that need. Obviously, that hasn't happened. By the same token, our Administration, in response to the housing crunch, has decided to become a developer and to develop single family market homes. So that's another concern should the State be a developer.

"My contention is that we need to look, number one, at what is the role of government in terms of meeting the needs of people who don't have the resources for housing; and number two, I think we need to look very closely at all these resources, these different funds that we're creating. It's sort of throwing money to meet the housing crisis, and we have really no sense of what progress they're making with all these different funding mechanism, and I think we should be inspecting those funds very closely and, hopefully, this task force can address some of those concerns.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Alcon rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to speak in favor of House Bill No. 99, HD 2, with some warning. I think HFDC is just sitting in that comfortable office that they have rented at Restaurant Row. I wish that they would get off of it and start building some affordable homes.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Peters then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, we have grappled with this problem for quite a while. We haven't done anything about it and now all we're going to do is assign it to a committee.

"The Majority Floor Leader talks about the Reagan Administration imposing certain kinds of constraints. Let's set the record straight. The function of government here on the local level as well as the State of Hawaii has done a piece-poor job of building homes by allowing developers and homeowners to secure the proper kind of zoning to proceed with this issue of providing affordable homes to Hawaii. It doesn't take any money. It doesn't take all that kind of imagination. The State of Hawaii owns 1.3 million acres of land. What has it done with it? Through generations, this institution has provided for conversion, the stealing of land, from people who have gone over backwards providing for affordable housing in Hawaii. Bishop Estate has provided for more affordable housing than any other institution in the State -- Period! And we get screwed because of it.

"We've seen back-to-back escrows because of this Act 516. We talk about providing for means of preventing speculation. Lip service again!

"What about land trusts? We have a bill before CPC to prevent that kind of speculation from going on. We allow for land trusts and even the Real Estate Commission, by virtue of their rules, mandate that in order for you to become a realtor, you've got to know how to use this mechanism of hiding your land and hiding any of your ownership out there that you have in land. So individuals having ten, twenty different parcels of land out there put it under a land trust, and now it becomes personal property. Not real property -- personal property! So they escape from paying conveyance taxes so they rip us off that way. But secondly, they go down to Kapolei as a first time homeowner and says to HFDC, put me on the list. What can HFDC do? Nothing, because they hid, by virtue of laws that we pass around here, their holdings in real estate under that land trust. So let's stop giving lip service around here. 1.3 million acres and what are we doing with it? We have a fiduciary responsibility. Leasehold is the way to go! You let the landowner and in this particular case, the State of Hawaii, put their money by their mouth and provide for the proper zoning. That's all you need. You don't need any money."

At this point, Representative Souki rose on a point of order and said:

"I believe this discussion has sort of drifted away from the intent of the bill, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair responded:

"Representative Peters, you've heard that concern."

Representative Peters then said:

"Mr. Speaker, I thought I would give that concern. I've heard his concern and I take exception to his observation.

"The point is, if we're going to have another committee established to do the things that we should be doing and the State Administration or the City and County. . . the City Council is a bunch of wimps! They pass Bill 81, taking care of a few lessees -- for what? Can't they stand up and say, hey look, there's a way of helping those who are reasonable and eligible. Let's do so.

"This measure again adds lip service to the real problem. I must admit that the Housing Committee has

come a long way. It has come a long way. Some of the things that we've done there, I feel very good about. I support this measure with reservations, Mr. Speaker.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"I had the privilege of being in Vienna, Austria, about three months ago and across from the Vienna Opera House, in the underground where the subway is, were homeless people and the homeless people there were not related to the Reagan Administration. . .

Representative Alcon rose on a point of order and asked:

"Is the speaker supporting or against the bill?"

Representative Ward answered:

"Like Representative Peters, I'm going to give it to you at the end.

"There are homeless people there. . .

The Chair interrupted and said:

"Representative Ward, are you speaking for the measure?"

Representative Ward answered:

"I'm in support of it, sir."

Representative Souki then rose on a point of order and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, we need some decorum here. When you get up and you make a speech, you declare whether you're for or against the bill."

Representative Ward continued:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak for this bill, in that the international phenomenon of homelessness is not the fault of the Reagan Administration nor the Bishop Estate and neither of those are relevant to this task force. It's important that the best minds of this State put themselves together and come up with a solution.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 99, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative M. Ige voting no, and Representative Bunda being excused.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 572 on H.B. No. 370, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Say and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 370, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE REPATRIATION OF NATIVE HAWAIIAN HUMAN REMAINS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Bunda being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 99 and 370 had passed Third Reading at 11:57 o'clock a.m.

At 11:58 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:03 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 573 on H.B. No. 1177, HD 1:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and H.B. No. 1177, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Say.

Representative Anderson rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"I have some reservations on this, Mr. Speaker. I'm not too sure that we need a totally electronic voting system. It also bothers me that we still have the voting under the Lieutenant Governor who at times has endorsed, he has made speeches in favor of people, and I don't know if that's really the thing to do if you're in charge of elections.

"Over and above that, this bill would exempt from civil service some people and in those respects, Mr. Speaker, I do have some concerns, and I wish the Committee would look at this one when it goes over.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1177, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR A TOTALLY ELECTRONIC VOTING SYSTEM," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Bunda being excused.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 574 on H.B. No. 1288, HD 2:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and H.B. No. 1288, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Say.

Representative Thielen rose and stated:

"I would like to speak in favor of House Bill No. 1288, HD 2, with one caveat. The bill calls for an appropriation of \$50,000 for a master plan for culture and the arts and special attention to the possibility of Bishop Museum playing the role in the development of a museum of science and technology.

"We have a museum of science and technology for children that many of us have worked very hard to get established. It's open at Dole Cannery Square. Our First Lady is the honorary chairperson of the Hawaii Children's Museum, and I would just hope that this would not take away from the existing museum or else be a duplication.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1288, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CULTURE AND THE ARTS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Bunda being excused.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 575 on H.B. No. 2109, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Say and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2109, HD 2,

entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC HEALTH AND VOLCANIC AIR POLLUTION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Bunda being excused.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 576 on H.B. No. 2138, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Say and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2138, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Bunda being excused.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 577 on H.B. No. 851, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Say and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 851, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE CAPITOL TOUR AND INFORMATION PROGRAM," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Bunda being excused.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 598 on H.B. No. 2034, HD 1:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2034, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Say.

Representative Tatibouet rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, one's labor is the most valuable property that one has to sell. If I wish to work for a small wage and someone wishes to hire me, why should the law forbid it?

"I oppose this legislation because it will harm those who we need to help most -- the young, the elderly, the handicapped, and the new immigrants.

"This body considers countless pieces of legislation to provide all sorts of human services for these very same people. What comes out again and again in testimony is that, that which they need the most is a job, a place in our living and working community, real wages and the self-esteem, independence and hope for the future that a job brings.

"The noted black economist, Walter Williams, in a 1986 column reflected on his own early years in poverty in Philadelphia: 'None of these jobs paid much, but then I wasn't worth much. But the real value of early work experiences is much more important than the little change a kid can earn. You learn how to keep a job. You learn how to be prompt, respect and obey superiors, and develop good work habits and attitudes that can pay off in the future. There is the self-respect and pride that comes from being financially semi-independent.'

"If a young person is willing to wash cars for \$2.50 an hour to gain work experience, is it the right of government to tell him that he can't do it?

"Here in Hawaii, we have a problem with gangs and many of our youth. If we raise the minimum wage, we will contribute to forcing even more of them out on to the streets with nothing to do.

"Has anyone considered the consequences to our hundreds of non-profit agencies here in Hawaii that are

out there across our State delivering direct services to those most in need? Non-profits depend on the minimum wage employee to fill many unique roles -- not in their administration level but at the outreach level -- where our needy citizens are.

"As an example, three years ago I worked hard to bring a Girl Scout Latchkey Program to the young girls of Kalihi designing it to use the resources within the community for everyone's benefit. Representative Arakaki and Representative Chun's father were among those who helped make this happen. We had no money to do this with but with the help of some donors, we were able to fund a five-day-a-week program using as staff Kalihi immigrant housewives. We have trained them, given them new skills, provided jobs that they could do in their own surroundings with no transportation needs and they could work four hours every afternoon, allowing them to still be wife and mother to their families. They are at minimum wage today and they are so pleased to have this beginning in America. We are now servicing over 200 girls in three schools which we couldn't do if the minimum wage were raised.

"Other agencies -- the list could go on and on -- also have positions that are at minimum wage opportunities, but it's a win/win for all -- for the person employed who couldn't otherwise be and for the agencies delivering the services. Shall we deprive the people their service of these essential services?

"In another vein, in 1989, the Hawaii State Department of Labor and Industrial Relations identified 35,000 minimum wage earners in the State of which 12,000 or one-third are in tipping categories. I imagine that many of my colleagues here today spent time working in a tipping category at some point in their teen years or while they were pursuing an education. I did. I worked as a waitress in a small restaurant during my college years. My salary paid only for my books. It was minimum wage, but it was my tips that paid entirely for my tuition through college!

"Having spent over 20 years here in Hawaii in one of many businesses that have tipping categories, both in personnel administration and in operations, let me assure you that tipping is still alive and well.

"As recently as a couple of years ago, I pulled a full shift when there was an unexpected emergency in a small hotel. Over the years I have spent many days as a roommaid, waitress, bellman, and parking valet. I'm really good with the heavy luggage. The tips were phenomenal! Any of you here today would be very pleased to work for those tips and the wages were unimportant. I did turn the tips over to the other employees to share on those particular occasions and they were delighted to have them.

"As a Vice President of Human Resources, I seldom have any trouble at all filling these positions, most of which are at or close to minimum wage.

"Of the other minimum wage earners, those starting out, those who are handicapped, those who are elderly -- a federal study in 1986 showed that 93 percent of minimum wage earners were not responsible for raising families and 70 percent of them lived in families where at least one other member held a job.

"In Hawaii, from my experience, these are the newly arrived immigrants and our teenagers, many of whom are high school dropouts. They are the ones who will lose out.

"Remember, we are talking about consequences beyond just the minimum wage for it only serves as a wage floor. All other wages must rise in relation to the new minimum wage. Businesses, small or large, especially the hundreds of small businesses we have in Hawaii, just cannot afford this rise in wages as proposed by this bill. It will force them to delete jobs at the very least. I ask my colleagues to consider the net loss to Hawaii that may result from raising the minimum wage:

1. The loss of employment to the individual himself and along with it, the loss of his self-esteem, the loss of his chance to start out;
2. The shrinking of the economic pie by the loss of his productive contribution;
3. The financial loss to our community in supporting him in his idleness with unemployment compensation, welfare, etc.;
4. The cost of funding training programs at the taxpayers' expense to get him reemployed at a higher level; and
5. The loss to our citizens as a whole by having consumer prices driven up to cover the higher labor costs.

"This bill has considerable negative potential. It does have good intentions but it can produce bad results.

"Lyndon Baines Johnson loved to say, and I quote: 'Come now, let us reason together.' If we would truly reason together we would know that beginners are worth less on the market than experienced workers. But you cannot make a man worth a given amount by making it illegal for anyone to pay him less. You merely will deprive him of the right to earn the amount that his abilities and situation would permit him to earn. And you will deprive the community of Hawaii of the moderate services that he is capable of rendering for all of us.

"For these reasons, I cast my vote against the bill.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Arakaki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"You know, Mr. Speaker, last year several of your legislators spent the night on the street to meet the homeless face to face and I would strongly suggest for those of you who haven't done so, it would really help to widen your perspective. Many of us were shocked that there are homeless people who are not your stereotyped, lazy, shiftless individuals. And actually some of them are working -- wage earners.

"In our discussion last year on the A+ After-School Program, we found children being left at home alone because parents couldn't afford child care. And that very Girl Scout Program that was mentioned by Representative Tatibouet, many of those girls were forced to stay at home to care for their siblings and many of their parents cannot participate because they are out working.

"In one of our House's major initiatives last year to respond to gangs and gang problems, which was engineered by Representative Amaral and Representative Metcalf, we found that many immigrant youths were unsupervised because their parents were out working two or three jobs.

"Mr Speaker, these are people that we represent and these are people that need our voices, they need our

compassion, because they are living at the edge and their ranks are growing. Our families are falling off the edge because basic needs are not being met. It is estimated that a bread winner will have to make over \$10 an hour here in Hawaii to meet the basic needs for a family of four. This is called a living wage, not a minimum wage. At minimum wage, even with the proposed increases, welfare is still a more viable economic option when you throw in the cost of shelter and child care. Isn't it any wonder then that close to 80 percent of those on our welfare rolls are single parent women.

"This measure expresses, albeit to a very small degree, the collective conscienceness and commitment of the Democratic Party to assure the basic needs of the working men and women of Hawaii need to be met, and your Democratic Majority stands in strong support of House Bill 2034.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"The things that Representative Tatibouet and Representative Arakaki said are true. My concerns, Mr. Speaker, is that the federal government is planning and looking at raising the minimum wage. If you have tried to work with people that are on welfare and we preempt federal government, we then take away from them, and the food stamps and other things that they are able to get from the federal government will come in and supersede us. They have to go ahead and make sure that the dollars that they raise goes along with the food stamp programs and others.

"But over and above that, Mr. Speaker, if we were to look at some of the values that people talk about, we can't legislate values -- family values. That's up to the individuals. I work seven days a week many, many times. So does my wife and my daughter, my son-in-law, but we make time. And the reason that we work is because we are all working to make sure that we can take care of our families. But you can't legislate that, ladies and gentlemen. That's inborn, that's us.

"The problem here is that when we did ask the Department of Labor how many people came in and asked for this, we didn't get any. The Department of Labor, the unions and others came in and voiced their concerns for this. Not one of the people that supposedly we're trying to help came in to testify that they needed more money. Out of the 35,000, sixty-five percent were tip earners; twelve percent had second jobs. I provide jobs for people that have second jobs and I pay above minimum, but some of them haven't come out lately so I was up at the stadium in the last two weeks cleaning Rainbow Stadium because I have a bid on it, and it has to be cleaned before it is opened up. So we all have responsibilities, but to go ahead and legislate for 12,000 people who didn't come in and ask for this because maybe they are on food stamps so they have other concerns that they're going to be having programs taken away from them because of our good heart.

"So that's what I look at, Mr. Speaker, is the need for this kind of legislation, and I think that we should look at it when the bill comes back, make some calls or go down to the Welfare Department, and find out how we in fact are going to be helping, or are we depriving these people of some of the services that they deserve.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stegmaier then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of the bill with reservations, and my reservations have to do with the likelihood of the bill's significant inflationary impact and because of its likelihood that families of the working poor will not really ultimately be benefitted. Over the years the debate has been based upon ideological lines. But I would like to read from the words of a progressive thinker who challenges both liberals and conservatives to rethink this debate. He asks conservatives to accept that, for millions of Americans the U.S. economy in the 1980's does not reward hard work with the income that a family can live on. Despite their romance with free markets, our economy lets millions of working families stay poor, however hard and long they work. If we are to redeem the pledge of the American work ethic that anyone who works hard in America will not have to live in poverty, he suggested government will have to help to do it. And he challenges liberals to face the evidence that the minimum wage, despite its progressive beginnings, now has certain regressive effects. In the late 1980's, four of every five minimum wage earners are not poor, and legislating a raise is not an efficient way to help those who are, he says. Worst yet, the poor, most of them gaining nothing from a higher minimum wage, have to help pay for it along with everyone else. It is undisputed that the cheap effect of a higher minimum wage today would be to increase incomes, not for working poor people, but for a group of workers who are predominantly part-time, second earners in middle-class families, Mr. Speaker.

"Today, though, I am in a quandry and my quandry is that although there are concepts such as the earned income tax credit which is gaining broad acceptance as an alternative to the minimum wage, I have nothing to offer as an alternative to this bill today. And for this reason, I will support this bill with reservations.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Alcon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"As you noticed, Mr. Speaker, the previous speakers, except for Representative Arakaki, are from a well-to-do area. In my area of Kalihi, Mr. Speaker, we have a lot of people who are working at the very minimum and as far as they coming over to ask for minimum wage, Mr. Speaker, let me just tell you, they're too busy to feed their families.

"If we go back in history, Mr. Speaker, unions were formed because the haves did not share their profit with the have-nots. In fact, it was also a fact that unionism was brought about because the common people were taken advantage of.

"Let me just say, Mr. Speaker, that we have a lot of homeless today because they cannot afford to pay the rent that the haves charge them. And if we give them a half-way decent minimum wage, I think they would be able to earn a decent living.

"The federal government has stated, Mr. Speaker, that you have to earn at least \$15,000 to be above poverty. And computing that by the hour, one is supposed to earn at least \$7 an hour. We are just asking for the very minimum to live above water.

"So this is a good bill. This has long been awaited for and I wish to say that all advantages of working is also included in my remark because of the fact that, you know, when you work, you get to learn responsibilities, good habits, and so on, but let's pay them for the amount of work that they do.

"Senior citizens have been referred to. Let me just tell you, Mr. Speaker, that a lot of senior citizens are also living under poverty level but they're not asking for minimum wage. They can get by with what they have but they would like to see their children and grandchildren be able to have an equal chance, and I think this will give them the opportunity to live decently.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I would like to address the economic objections to raising the minimum wage. The distinguished Representative from Kahala has cited the net loss of employment, self-esteem, and other factors in opposing this bill. The point is that economic developments in Hawaii have belied her assertions. We have a very good economy, we have the lowest unemployment rate in the country, and indeed she may take solace in the fact that the net worth of a person is indeed set in many instances by the market. The market has already raised the minimum wage for many because of a shortage of labor. We all know that.

"But what we need to address ourselves to is the real fundamental cleavage, division, the malady in our society that those at the top are rewarded handsomely. Chief Executive Officers make in the million dollars or more and those at the bottom barely scraping by.

"We have to really take more than this measure in our recognition of the social consequences of the direction in our economy. In other words, we have to raise the minimum wage as a means of expressing our concern and seeking to help those at the bottom. But in the longer run, we need to look at the maldistribution of incomes, and that maldistribution has brought about a very, very serious problem of society which is the great diversion between income and the high prices of housing, both for ownership as well as for renting.

"So in summation, I don't think the economic arguments put forth are any barrier to what we are doing today. It's the very least we need to do to express our concern and try to help in some little way the people who populate places like Kalihi.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2034, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE WAGE AND HOUR LAW," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Tatibouet voting no, and Representative Bunda being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 1177, 1288, 2109, 2138, 851 and 2034 had passed Third Reading at 12:27 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 1040, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Say and carried, H.B. No. 1040, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES EXCLUDED FROM COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AND MAKING APPROPRIATIONS AND OTHER ADJUSTMENTS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Bunda being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 1038, 1039 and 1040 had passed Third Reading at 12:29 o'clock p.m.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 604) recommending that H.B. No. 1748, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

By unanimous consent, consideration of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 604 on H.B. No. 1748, HD 2, was deferred, and in accordance with Article III, Section 15 of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, printed copies of H.B. No. 1748, HD 2, were made available to the members of the House at 11:30 o'clock a.m.

Representative Souki, for the majority of the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 605) recommending that H.B. No. 237, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

By unanimous consent, consideration of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 605 on H.B. No. 95, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION COMMENDING THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES AND THE MEN AND WOMEN OF OPERATION DESERT STORM FOR THEIR SUCCESS IN CARRYING OUT THE UNITED NATIONS MANDATE, AND REAFFIRMING OUR SUPPORT OF UNITED STATES POLICY FOR PEACE IN THE MIDDLE EAST," was taken from the Clerk's desk and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative Lee, seconded by Representative Bellinger and carried, H.C.R. No. 95 was adopted.

Representative Lee rose to speak in favor of the resolutions, stating:

"Just 60 days ago this House rallied together, as did the entire nation, in support of the men, women and families of the United States Armed Forces.

"Operation Desert Storm is now a historic achievement.

"We owe that achievement to the courage and bravery of all the men and women in Operation Desert Storm, our men and women above all and the Marines from Kaneohe in particular, and especially General Norman Schwarzkopf, but also all the men and women of the other 27 nations in the allied coalition -- those who have come as far away as Singapore and Senegal.

"We grieve for those who have fallen, we are horrified by the rape and plunder of Kuwait, and we are deeply saddened by the suffering of the Iraqis and other innocent victims.

"We do take comfort that the family of nations, when confronted with such blatant criminal conduct, did not turn the other way. It is easy to turn away. The United States did turn away when Iraq used gas on the Iranians and later on its own people. We even turned away when Iraq sent a missile into the USS Stark, killing so many of our sailors.

"This time even the Soviet Union did not turn away. It condemned the Iraqi annexation of Kuwait. The Soviet Union voted for the United Nations resolutions. Even China did not turn away. It simply abstained.

"This collective security action, unprecedented in history and the dream of President Woodrow Wilson and

President Franklin Roosevelt, has finally come into fruition.

"Thanks to the decisive leadership of President George Bush and his strong team of lieutenants -- Secretary of State James Baker, Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney, and Chief of Staff General Colin Powell.

"President Bush has said he wants to be a healer. Indeed, he has started to pick up where President Jimmy Carter left off 10 years ago when he brought peace between Israel and Egypt.

"Secretary Baker is now in the Middle East, meeting with all the parties and seeking common ground for peace between the Arab states and Israel, between Arabs and Israelis, between Palestinians and Israelis.

"We can only pray that this quest for peace can succeed.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Metcalf then rose and requested that the remarks of Representative Lee be inserted into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

At 10:25 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:30 o'clock a.m.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 604 on H.B. No. 1748, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Say and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1748, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR PUBLIC EDUCATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 1748 had passed Third Reading at 10:31 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 605 on H.B. No. 237, HD 2:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 237, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Say.

Representative Apo rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"The purpose of this measure is to request the Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism to conduct a study on the feasibility of creating public storage facilities for petroleum products.

"As I understand it, the purpose here is to offset what some feel to be a monopoly on oil in Hawaii, simply because a couple of companies have the capability for

storing large volumes and that because of this perceived monopoly, we have discouraged other oil companies from moving into the market for lack of storage facilities. So the proposal apparently, among other things, is asking the State to provide and to lead the way for storage facilities in order to encourage other major oil companies to enter the market, thereby having the effect of reducing prices. I have no problem with the concept of government intervening in the market system as a referee, refereeing between competing interests.

"Mr. Speaker, the role of government, I think in this day and age, sometimes we need to stop and question. Basically, there are three things that government has to do with respect to our job servicing our citizenry.

"In the first area, we are mandated by Constitution to do many things. We have no choice when mandated by the Constitution.

"Secondly, there are many things we are required to do that are mandated by contract, for instance, collective bargaining.

"When it comes to dealing with the free enterprise and market system, in the past, government has been asked simply to serve as a referee between competing interests. But the tendency today, I believe not just in Hawaii but across the country, is for us to intervene in the market system to the benefit of one competitor and against another. This is where I have a problem.

"This specific measure doesn't upset me in that it is one of many attempts, I believe on the part of State government, to intervene in the market system and to affect outcomes, again to the benefit of one against the other. And I would suggest, Mr. Speaker, that at some point in time, either the Legislature or the Executive Branch of government, or perhaps both of us in a joint effort, need to examine this as a matter of policy and to what degree we are willing to intervene in the market system in what I consider to be perhaps an unfair manner.

"So with those remarks, Mr. Speaker, again I support the bill; I think it will move forward. I commend the Finance Committee for showing wisdom in deleting the appropriation, but I have no problem with the DBED of filing a report to us twenty days prior to the next session.

"Thank you."

Representative Thielen rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I am concerned about the bill and I am speaking in opposition to it.

"It does not place the government as the referee. It's an unwise interference in the workings of the free market. In general, I believe that market works best when government stays out of it. In this case, government interference will, in the long run, serve to inflate both taxes and gasoline prices. And for these reasons, I oppose this legislation.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"The reason, Mr. Speaker, is because I don't believe that we should be using tax dollars to do a study which the original bill calls for and if it goes over to the Senate, I'm afraid they might put the money back in.

"We keep saying that we might have a monopoly and, consequently, we want to see that the State buy a storage tank thereby giving the other oil companies a chance to purchase oil a lot cheaper than buying it from their competitor. That sounds good, Mr. Speaker, but I bet you any money that as soon as we add something like that, there would be one of us wise ones who would say, I think we would need a couple of dollars for a particular program and we're going to start saying, you're going to have to pay a penny or two more for your gas and, consequently, the State is in the gas business and the gas prices would go up. What we need here, Mr. Speaker, is for private enterprise to take their own damn storage tanks and put gas in there and if not, build their own refinery.

"We got caught up a few years ago with getting involved in private enterprise and I'm afraid that we're going to lose a \$30-million industry like our dairy industry for the same reason. We thought there was a monopoly and rather than saying, have your own processing plant, have your tanks or whatever, we said, 'No, we will allow you to have your processing plants on the mainland and we'll go ahead and make sure that you can take care of the industry down here in Honolulu.' And Hawaii is in trouble because of that and we could be losing an industry.

"I don't think that we have enough knowledge in government to get involved and take away the rights of free enterprise. I believe that we need competition. It's good for everybody. Being in business and a small businessman, I still believe that the large people make us more competitive even though we're small. And for that reason, I will vote against this, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This bill would put the government in the gas business -- from the huge storage tanks on the ocean front, to the trucks, right to the service station. But quite frankly, even as a freshman, I think this is going to be one of the worst pieces of legislation to come from this body. I don't think you have to be a Republican or a fiscal conservative to know that it would be a disaster to put the government into the oil business. This runs directly contrary to the economies of the world, from those who are in Eastern Europe going towards market economies, to governments that are privatizing their oil business, their electrical business, their telephone businesses.

"There is only one thing that this is consistent with, and I think it's tradition and one thing that I think our Representative has warned us against. There is a centralization or a spirit of control within this government. It started with the monarchy. It went with the appointed governors and with the governors from the 1959 independence. I think we have to guard about always wanting to control something, in particular here where it crosses the line between the public and the private sector.

"I think the people don't want this bill. The people of Hawaii don't deserve it, and I hope you will vote against it.

"Thank you."

Representative Lee rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I share the reservations that have been expressed by a number of speakers on the floor and I think they have a great deal of merit but I think there's too much highverbalie (hyperbole) and overstatements so

we have to focus on the bill itself. It simply requests for a study. No money is involved and I think most of us know what the answer would be like, but when we look back at the history of pricing of gasoline in the State, I must commend the Administration for taking those actions which have slowed down the increase in prices of gasoline.

"The Lieutenant Governor's action, the continual publicity by DBED, and studies like this are important because they bring out the issues and while I deplore government getting into this area, I would reluctantly support this measure because it is part and parcel of the concern which the Administration is showing towards a very essential commodity. So I will vote 'yes' with reservations.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Oshiro rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, unlike our counterparts within the continental United States, our geographic location in the middle of the Pacific severely limits, to a certain degree, the importation and distribution options for gasoline in our State. In order to compete effectively on the wholesale distribution level, it is necessary for one to acquire a bulk supply of gasoline, adequate terminal storage space, and proper distribution facilities. With the cost of transporting bulk gasoline to Hawaii and storing it in newly constructed terminal facilities extremely exorbitant, it appears, Mr. Speaker, that the only reliable option for the new competitor interested in entering Hawaii's gasoline market would be for that entity to acquire these necessities from existing Hawaii based oil companies.

"It is our understanding, Mr. Speaker, that oil companies presently doing business in Hawaii have various 'exchange arrangements' with one another. These 'exchange arrangements' include agreements to exchange gasoline, to share distribution pipelines, to buy and sell additives from one another, and for the shared use of terminal storage facilities and services.

"It is quite evident, Mr. Speaker, that with such an interdependence upon one another, that the acceptance of a new competitor wishing to enter into similar 'exchange arrangements' may not be readily accepted by Hawaii's oil companies. Hence, Mr. Speaker, the prospects for a new entity entering into the Hawaii gasoline market is highly unlikely.

"Unfortunately, one of the by-products of this is alleged to be a lack of true competition within Hawaii's gasoline industry. House Bill 237, HD 2, charts an inquiry into the creation of a publicly owned, tanker accessible storage facility for gasoline imports. This measure further requests a determination as to whether a public petroleum products storage authority to import, store, distribute and market petroleum products would be feasible for the State of Hawaii. Once all of these factors, variables and cost considerations are known, Mr. Speaker, we will then be able to deliberate on whether or not this endeavor should be further pursued.

"The intent of this bill, Mr. Speaker, is clear. . . to, in the end, lessen the cost of gasoline for residents of our State. I truly believe, Mr. Speaker, that it is incumbent upon us to research into and to fully assess the various alternatives available in addressing this situation.

"Thank you."

Representative Hagino then rose and requested that the concerns of Representative Apo be inserted into the Journal as his own "although I will be voting in favor of this bill," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Alcon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, government is not going to go into business with this study. A study is a prerogative of government when it is in the best interest of the people of Hawaii, and I don't see why my loyal opposition on the other side of the aisle have to speak against this. They will benefit from this and business will flourish.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson then rose in rebuttal, stating:

"I haven't seen a study yet that we haven't put into effect when it seems to be that when it's against the competition out there in the retail market. What we have held back on in many, many instances is study after study after study in areas that we should move because that is our job in government, be it education, be it in the area of transportation on highways and things. We constantly study that to death but anything that is going to upset the market, we seem to do one fast study and then we get involved and we tell all of our people out there that are in the competitive business, this is what we're going to do for you because it's good.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 237, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HAWAII'S PETROLEUM INDUSTRY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Tatibouet, Thielen and Ward voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 237 had passed Third Reading at 10:45 o'clock a.m.

At 10:45 o'clock a.m., Representative Arakaki asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:46 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 606 on H.B. No. 339, HD 2:

By unanimous consent, action was deferred to the end of the calendar.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 985 had passed Third Reading at 10:46 o'clock a.m.

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Say and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 548, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Yoshimura voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 514 and 548 had passed Third Reading at 10:47 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 610 on H.B. No. 2159, HD 2:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2159, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Say.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"The legislation reaffirms the State's commitment to provide health care and other services to those afflicted with Hansen's disease. This commitment includes safe shelter and other necessities required by Hansen's disease patients for them to maintain an independent life with dignity. Specifically, the legislation proposes to assist patient residents of Kalaupapa to move to other places to live independently if they wish to do so.

"Mr. Speaker, a coalition of churches, non-profit groups, and human service organizations have been trying to do just that for over three years. The coalition has leased 5.50 acres of the Hale Mohalu site in Pearl City from the Board of Land and Natural Resources to build housing for persons with Hansen's disease, the elderly, and other disabilities. The project has been on hold for three years because the government is requiring the coalition to prepare a portion of the drainage canal which runs through that site.

"Last year, fortunately, the Legislature appropriated some funds for these improvements but it wasn't enough. This means that the housing for the Hansen's disease patients can't get off the ground. The burden and expense of repairing a public facility should not be placed on a coalition of churches and non-profit groups while they are trying to build this needed housing, and I sincerely hope that the Senate will use this bill as the 'vehicle' to overcome the obstacles to building this much needed housing at Hale Mohalu.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of H.B. 382, HD 1, relating to cable television systems. This bill calls for one per cent of the gross revenues of each cable television operator to be deposited into the Public Broadcasting Revolving Fund for use in program production by the Hawaii Public Broadcasting Authority.

"This funding will tremendously pioneer innovative and creative Saturday morning programming for Hawaii's youth; high quality productions of international programs; and continue the new science and natural history series, 'Facets.'

"Federal law allows the State of Hawaii to collect up to 5 percent of cable operator's gross revenues as a franchise fee. At the present time, only about 3.5 percent is being collected.

"Apparently 0.5 percent is used by the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs to administer cable programs, and on Oahu, 3 percent goes to Olelo, the corporation for community television to support its activities.

"Most franchise authorities across the country do levy the full federally allowed amount of 5 percent. House Bill 382 offers the advantage of directly benefitting the cable viewers by providing them with enhanced cultural, educational, and informational programming produced by their own local public television station. And so I ask that we all support H.B. 382, HD 2."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 382, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CABLE TELEVISION SYSTEMS, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 651 on H.B. No. 51, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 51, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Thielen rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I am speaking in favor of H.B. No. 51, HD 1, but with serious reservations and concerns.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill allows the Kakaako developers to fulfill the requirement that they provide affordable housing by allowing them to develop it outside the boundaries of the Kakaako project. The bill also permits the developers to segregate the affordable housing in Kakaako from the so-called Beverly Hills type towers. This effectively will ghettoize the affordable housing.

"To avoid this segregation between rich and poor, we should pass the bill as it was originally drafted, so that the developers must build the affordable housing within the Kakaako District and within the specific project.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At 12:02 o'clock p.m., Representative Anderson asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:05 o'clock p.m.

Representative Hiraki then rose and requested that the words of Representative Thielen, with respect to House Bill No. 51, be inserted into the Journal "as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Bellinger then rose to speak in favor of the bill, "regarding some of those concerns that were expressed by the previous speaker," stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the adjustments were made in this bill to restore the mandate which requires that affordable housing be placed into Kakaako. It will ensure that the good and sound principles of urban planning be utilized there.

"And in terms of the concerns over the lack of ability to integrate housing in particular building, I would like to note that during those particular hearings, all of the people testifying, including the housing alliances and the various groups, all agreed that the portion of the bill which requires the integrated and horizontal developments were not going to be practical and not going to be workable. And for those reasons, those particular aspects were eliminated.

"I think that this bill provides a good framework for the development over there that HFDC will have the flexibility to ensure that the affordable housing requirement can be

met there and they acknowledged during those committee meetings that they should be able to fulfill all of those affordable housing requirements within the Kakaako District.

"Thank you."

"Representative Thielen, in rebuttal, stated:

"With all due respect to the Representative, I was a Legal Aid attorney for five years. I dealt with people who were segregated into low-income housing projects. That is not a way that we bring people out of poverty -- by keeping them separate and not even equal. And so my objections still stand."

Representative Say then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Say's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of H.B. 51, HD 1.

"I'm sure all of you are aware of the redevelopment efforts currently underway in the Kakaako District. This area is gradually being transformed from a crowded, rundown industrial area to a modern community. While much of Kakaako's recent notoriety has been caused by the development of luxury condominiums, very little attention has been given to public projects which have been completed or are underway -- all of which benefit our residents.

"Of particular relevance to this bill, are the nearly 1,000 affordable housing units already completed, under construction and committed in private projects. House Bill 51, HD 1, ensures continued production of affordable housing by requiring the provision of such housing as a condition of development in Kakaako. The simultaneous delivery of affordable housing and other public benefits and the redevelopment of Kakaako will enable the creation of a community which will meet the vital needs of our residents.

"A notable amendment that this bill made to the original version of House Bill 51 also affects the delivery of affordable housing.

"As originally introduced, House Bill 51 proposed to repeal a law which would enable the delivery of more affordable housing on Oahu. That law, Act 86, SLH 1990, reflected the efforts of the Legislature to address a critical housing problem which existed then and still exists today. It allows developers to build affordable housing units outside of the Kakaako District to satisfy the affordable housing requirement for projects developed in Kakaako. Because of high land prices in Kakaako, the Legislature believed it was prudent to provide HCDA with the flexibility to evaluate proposals offering to build affordable housing outside of Kakaako. This flexibility is especially critical if the development offers significantly more affordable housing than required in Kakaako.

"House Bill 51 attempted to remove that flexibility. House Bill 51, HD 1, proposes to retain it.

"Over the last few years, we have made a significant commitment to alleviating the housing shortage in this State. We must sustain that commitment by empowering those government agencies responsible for the delivery of affordable housing with the necessary tools to resolve the problem.

"I strongly urge my colleagues to vote in favor of House Bill 51, HD 1."

At 12:07 o'clock p.m., Representative Arakaki asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:09 o'clock p.m.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 51, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative M. Ige voting no.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 858, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RECYCLING, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Anderson voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 653 on H.B. No. 101, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 101, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 804, 1007, 982, 1553, 51, 858 and 101 had passed Third Reading at 12:10 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 661 on H.B. No. 918, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 918, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HIGHWAY SAFETY, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 662 on H.B. No. 825:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 825, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LICENSING OF PSYCHOLOGISTS, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 663 on H.B. No. 1003:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1003, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WORKERS' COMPENSATION INSURANCE, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 664 on H.B. No. 999, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 999, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WORKERS' COMPENSATION INSURANCE, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Anderson voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 678 on H.B. No. 1539, HD 2:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1539, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Tatibouet rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"It is widely known that we have over \$400-million stashed away in the Employment Security Fund. It is also widely known that the State of Hawaii has one of the lowest unemployment rates in the country. It seems capricious and arbitrary for us to be passing a bill that would be further taxing employers, saddling employers with an additional tax of .02 percent for a training fund for employees, when we are actually at a situation where we have every employee employed if necessary and where employers have been conducting continuous training in all categories of employment throughout the State -- sufficient training to bring employees up to whatever level is necessary in order to be hired.

"I feel that there are many other things in this bill that could be spoken to but in the interest of time, I will just cast a strong no vote.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Thielen rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to echo Representative Tatibouet's remarks in opposition to this bill. The bill attempts to do something the private sector can do better, and it taxes the private sector to do it.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson then rose and requested that his remarks, against the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Anderson's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against H.B. 1539. This bill deals with two completely separate issues: Hawaii's excessive unemployment insurance fund and the employment and training fund.

"I am not opposed to lowering the taxable wage base to ease the tax burden of Hawaii's employers. Hawaii's employers already pay too much into the unemployed insurance fund. Today, the UI fund sits at a fat \$400-million, the highest proportion in the nation.

"This \$400-million, and the interest generated by it, is locked in a federal fund and not accessible to the people of Hawaii. This money, paid by local employers, could have been better used to increase wages or create new jobs. I do support the portion of the bill which addresses this problem.

"However, I do not support the employment and training fund. This amounts to an unnecessary taxation of employers.

"Small businesses do not need and will not use this training program. Each small business is unique. The majority of small businesses conduct their own personalized training, specific to their particular needs.

"Union shop employers already provide contributions to apprenticeships and training funds. In addition, under most collective bargaining agreements, the union shall be the sole source of employment. It would be unfair and unjust for employers to pay for a program they will never use.

"Moreover, provisions in this bill allow the Director of the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations to require employers assisted by these programs to contribute an additional 50 percent of the training cost. In other words, you must contribute whether you use the service or not, and if you do use the service, they charge you twice.

"There are more than 75 public and private training funds available. Today, government training program slots go unfilled.

"Furthermore, another tax burden would be generated by the proposed increase in unemployment benefits and the lessening of the earning eligibility to qualify for benefits, as stated in Sections 3, 4, and 5 of the bill.

"Benefits have increased annually. There is no reason to tamper with a tested and proven formula which has worked well for years. The end result will be more individuals collecting benefits, and at a higher rate, thereby increasing taxation requirements.

"In today's tough economic environment, businesses need relief, not continued and additional expenses."

Representative Yonamine then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Yonamine's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I speak in support of House Bill 1539, HD 2, entitled, 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Employment Security.'

"The purpose of this bill is to amend Hawaii's Employment Security Law to provide a more equitable contribution system with an adequate but not excessive reserve fund and thus give temporary tax relief to employers who contribute to the State Unemployment Compensation Fund.

"This bill meets the purpose of the Unemployment Fund while providing tax relief to employers. As of 1992, employers would pay UI taxes on wages up to \$7,000 on one contribution scale. Further, wages above \$7,000 to the State average annual wage would be taxed on one of three schedules based on the ratio of current reserve fund to adequate reserve fund.

"Therefore, I urge passage of this bill."

Representative Marumoto rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This is a good news/bad news bill, and first I will give you the good news.

"I applaud the lowering of the unemployment insurance tax because the lowering of the taxable wage base to \$7,000, the unemployment insurance UI tax will be rolled back for calendar year 1991 only. But even one year is great because the Federal Unemployment Fund is bloated and as Representative Tatibouet mentioned, it contains over \$400-million which we can't reach.

"The fund is considered more than adequate and will be able to withstand worst case scenario of a 12 percent

unemployment rate with workers drawing unemployment compensation for two whole years.

"The one year roll back is great because the money will not be salted away in this federal fund but it will stay in Hawaii, in the economy, in businesses to expand and to hire more workers, and to increase wages and profits, and to invest in growth. Unfortunately, this roll back is only for one year and not permanent.

"The bad news part. Accompanying this tax decrease is a new tax of .02 percent to pay for the establishment of more job training programs. There are already enough job training programs, many people testified. This new tax will negate the benefits of the roll back.

"Thanks to the Chairman of Finance, this new tax is slated for only one year. Forcing employers to pay for more training programs is questionable. Most prefer to train their own personnel. Larger businesses may be able to use mass-trained people but small businesses almost always train their own workers very informally on the job, but all businesses will pay this tax but few will use its supposed benefits. Small businesses should be exempt from the imposition.

"The message is simple. Make the tax roll back permanent. Don't impose the new employment and training tax but if you do, please exempt small businesses.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1539, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMPLOYMENT SECURITY, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 7 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Bellingier, Marumoto, O'Kieffe, Tatibouet, Thielen and Ward voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 679 on H.B. No. 917, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 917, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE TRANSFER OF ALL FUNCTIONS, POWERS AND DUTIES INVOLVING THE REGULATION OF OCEAN RECREATIONAL BOATING AND COASTAL ACTIVITIES, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 680 on H.B. No. 608, HD 2:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 608, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Say rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Say's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in support of House Bill 608, HD 2.

"First, I would like to commend the Chairman of Judiciary and the Chairman of Finance for supporting the passage of this 'hardwork' legislation. The proposed amendments to House Bill 608 are important to the efficient and effective operation of the new administrative license revocation system for those arrested for driving under the influence of alcohol. I support the provisions

which place more responsibility with the arrested driver, including relicensing fees and the responsibility of subpoena service to requested witnesses.

"I am in total support such as the elimination of the need for a prosecutor, which returns the procedures to those appropriate to an administrative hearing instead of a 'mini' version of a criminal trial and which will decrease the total budget for operation of the system.

"To be effective, an administrative license revocation system must be efficient. A cumbersome law or the inefficient underbudgeted administration of the law will not achieve the desired goal of removing dangerous drivers from the road quickly. I believe the new amendments are essential for the creation of a workable system.

"I hope all 51 members support this measure."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 608, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ADMINISTRATIVE LICENSE REVOCATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative M. Ige voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 681 on H.B. No. 954, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 954, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INTEGRATED SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Anderson voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 918, 825, 1003, 999, 1539, 917, 608 and 954 had passed Third Reading at 12:15 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 682 on H.B. No. 865, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 865, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LOW-INTEREST LOANS TO DISASTER VICTIMS AND MAKING AN APPROPRIATION THEREFOR," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 683 on H.B. No. 675, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 675, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 684 on H.B. No. 607, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 607, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE JUDICIARY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 685 on H.B. No. 776, HD 3:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 776, HD 3, having

been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Thielen rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, although I support the bill which allows the sale of wine at discount trade exhibitions, I oppose giving \$10,000 to an international wine conference when this State faces so many serious problems. The government has no business paying people to drink wine.

"I had always heard that Republicans drink wine and the Democrats drink beer. I think this bill shows that the Democrats not only drink wine, they're proposing to pay for it with the money of the taxpayer.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Shon then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"In spite of our zeal to promote just about every function of tourism this year, personally I think it is ridiculous that we should be using some of our limited resources to promote an international wine conference. I am sure the producers of such wine have ample resources to promote these conferences. At the same time in which we are reducing funds, reducing funds from many, many organizations and programs, at the same time that clinics that deal with alcoholics in our urban areas are actually getting less funds this year than past years, I do not see the justification for spending a single penny on this.

"I recall two years ago when some of us had the challenging experience of spending a night with the homeless, and I slept at IHS and I recall waking up in the early morning, as all of us were awakened, by an individual who had gone into convulsions in the corner, and I asked a member of the staff what was going on. And the problem was this person was under severe withdrawal from alcoholism. I'm sure if we have an extra \$10,000 rolling around, the Kalihi-Palama Clinic which services IHS or IHS directly could well use that \$10,000 to help the individuals who are involved.

"I do not see the justification for spending money for every single tourist event that we may want to attract here. And I think it is somewhat an affront to those organizations that spend so much of their time in dealing with the number one, the number one substance abuse problem in our State which is alcoholism, that we should be funding a conference which essentially would promote it. This has nothing to do with religion or prudishness. It has to do with common sense and a very serious problem in an year of limited resources.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, last year we appropriated something like \$25,000 for a feasibility study for an international wine conference. This year, we appropriate the \$10,000 to put the so-called feasibility study into actual practice.

"Now, when we are crying poor, that our taxpayers can't receive tax refunds, we can't have real tax reform, and we can drop the budget for the homeless, we can drop the budget for education, and we can drop the budget when we are trying to get affordable housing, I think it's just absolutely unconscionable that we can even consider \$10,000 for an international wine conference.

"If we had a blustering wine industry which is only on Maui and that's in a very small stage right now, maybe we could compete. And yes, the President did use Maui wine at the gala opening of his term. But I just think it is unconscionable for this to even be a part of our package, and I hope that the rest of you people who agree with me will vote no on this measure because it simply is inappropriate when we are talking homeless, education, and affordable housing.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Young then rose and requested that Representative Shon's remarks against the bill be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Apo then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I feel compelled to rise and at least offer a few words of support for the bill.

"While I appreciate the rhetoric presented by those who oppose it, I think we are getting a little confused here between mandating the people to become alcoholics and abuse. I would call to the body's attention, Mr. Speaker, that the single greatest cause of crime in our community, of alcoholism, of so many of the social ills, are part and parcel of tourism. There are major studies that have been funded that tell us that in every major tourist destination where tourism is an integral and dominant force in that community, these things -- drugs, crime -- go with it. What does it say? Does that say that tourism is something that we need to get rid of because these conditions are created by that, and I would set the same standard to wine.

"Wine, in and of itself, as is beer and any other alcoholic product, in and of themselves, I don't believe is bad. What we have is a behavior problem. We continue to treat the symptoms of the problems rather than dealing with the problem itself, and on that count I agree with the previous speakers. We need to do more about alcoholism and drug abuse. But I believe throwing the baby out with the bathwater may not be the way to go and so, for that reason, Mr. Speaker, and particularly because I think there is a chance that Hawaii might be able to launch some sort of viable wine industry. I don't believe the state of California which is the leading wine producer, I believe in the country, suffers too great economically because wine is produced there. So I would say that I agree with the previous speakers in that we do need to do more in the area of providing help to those people who are afflicted or who do abuse drugs and alcohol, but I don't believe not helping the wine industry grow in Hawaii is the answer.

"Thank you."

Representative O'Kieffe, in rebuttal, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it's conceivable that the person who threw the baby out with the bathwater had a little too much of that marvelous product that comes in the screw-top bottles.

"I maintain that the visitor industry is a \$10-billion industry to our State and if the private sector can't come up with \$10,000 to put on an international wine tasting conference, then there is something wrong and someone is squirreling away the profits of a \$10-billion industry.

"The argument is still lame. As long as our children are going to school in teachers' lounges and having to take classes in cafeterias, there should be no money spent

by the government for such frivolous things as an international wine tasting conference.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 776, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PROMOTION OF INTERNATIONAL EVENTS, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 31 ayes to 20 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Arakaki, Bellinger, Chang, Chun, Duldulao, Fukunaga, D. Ige, M. Ige, Kawakami, Marumoto, Okamura, O'Kieffe, Shon, Stegmaier, Tam, Tatibouet, Thielen, Ward and Young voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 686 on H.B. No. 1699, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1699, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FOREST STEWARDSHIP, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 687 on H.B. No. 1382, HD 2:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1382, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Tatibouet rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"While I thoroughly support the concept of school inspection and the necessity for it, I feel there is already a hierarchy of specialists in the DOE and within DAGS that can perform these duties and should be performing them. I further understand that there have been recent very successful private/public partnerships of citizens of our State which have done school inspections and I believe that the \$25,000 requested in this bill would be far better served by putting it into human services, health services, and the homeless in our State, and in or into providing the cafeterias and libraries that schools really need. I think the principals are on site and the DOE has the program set up and that we don't need to add another layer of an inspection process. However, I will vote in favor of the bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson then rose and requested that the remarks of Representative Tatibouet be inserted into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1382, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR SCHOOL INSPECTIONS, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 688 on H.B. No. 1685, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1685, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS FOR NOT-FOR-PROFIT CORPORATIONS THAT PROVIDE HEALTH CARE FACILITIES, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 689 on H.B. No. 264, HD 2:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 264, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Bainum rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Bainum's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker and fellow legislators, while I would have much preferred that the original 65 percent of customary fees be passed to the providers, I hope this, at least, is a signal from the Legislature to the health care industry that, yes, we do recognize the tremendous increases in your costs over the years.

"And, to the people of Hawaii, yes, we do recognize that the low payments to provider has limited your access to medical care that you need and deserve.

"We have been blessed in Hawaii with one of the most dedicated health care systems and cost effective systems in the country.

"I hope the providers will see our sincere attempt to recognize this and I hope our economic situation will improve through the next year so that the full measure of this bill may be enacted.

"To medical care providers who subsidize 40 percent of the health care delivery system to make available medical care for all of our citizens, I salute you all.

"I urge my fellow representatives to vote in the affirmative for this measure."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 264, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MEDICAID, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 865, 675, 607, 776, 1699, 1382, 1685 and 264 had passed Third Reading at 12:28 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 690 on H.B. No. 928, HD 2:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 928, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in favor of the bill, with one reservation, stating:

"The bill gives very broad powers to the Department of Health, including the power to enter and inspect any building or place, specifically to review and copy records. Unlike other sections in the law relating to hazardous waste, this bill doesn't protect against the subsequent release of confidential information obtained during the inspection of records. I hope that the Senate will address this omission in House Bill No. 928, adding similar language which is contained in other sections, empowering the Department of Health, specifically HRS 342 J-6, which protects against the release of confidential information obtained in such examinations and puts a limit upon the official's duties and scope of their opportunity to inspect and release that information.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 928, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LEAD ACID BATTERIES, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 693 on H.B. No. 1061, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1061, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE PARKS, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 694 on H.B. No. 2049, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2049, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS TO ASSIST OLOKELE SUGAR COMPANY IN IMPROVING ITS ELECTRICAL POWER GENERATION CAPABILITY, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 816, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CLAIMS BY THE STATE, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Tatibouet and Ward voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 697 on H.B. No. 397, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 397, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE

ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS AND MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE CITY AND COUNTY OF HONOLULU, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 698 on H.B. No. 895, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 895, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INDIVIDUAL HAWAIIAN HOME LANDS TRUST CLAIMS, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 928, 1086, 1697, 1061, 2049, 1720, 816, 397 and 895 had passed Third Reading at 12:30 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 699 on H.B. No. 1542, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1542, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 700 on H.B. No. 1564, HD 2:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1564, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative O'Kieffe rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I have some concerns that I hope the Senate will address when the bill goes over to them. While I support the concept of undersea research, I have great concerns with the HURL (Hawaii Undersea Research Laboratory) Project because of the potential of what it can come up with. The bill states that the 'University of Hawaii provides the State of Hawaii with a manned deep submergence capability for the study and assessment of the living and geological resources of the 200-mile Hawaiian exclusive economic zone (EEZ).'

"For those of you who are aware of what's happening in the ocean, we are one of the great sources for manganese mining, cobalt, and undersea seamounts. When a test scraping was made two years ago off the west coast of Hawaii, the silk plume was checked by satellite and it took thirty-three days for that plume to dissipate in the water.

"I am concerned that with federal money, and this is partially federally funded, according to the Act of \$3-million, that the Fed's put in for an EIS more than six years ago on studying the manganese mining project. It was 99 percent of the testimony that went against that hearing when the Fed's came over. And the one question I asked at the end was, 'With three hearings on Oahu, on Maui and Hawaii with the testimony against, were they still going to go ahead with the \$3-million expenditure of a feasibility study?' And the Fed's said, 'Yes.'

"So the purpose of my comments, Mr. Speaker, is to put up a red flag that our island waters may be in jeopardy if this is a way of getting to the undersea mining of manganese nodules and the destruction of our waters. So, I only offer that as a warning and I hope the Senate, when they hear it, will take it into consideration in their testimony.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1564, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE HAWAII UNDERSEA RESEARCH LABORATORY, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 701 on H.B. No. 249, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 249, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ISSUANCE OF SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS TO ASSIST UTILITIES SERVING THE GENERAL PUBLIC, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 702 on H.B. No. 1512, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1512, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative O'Kieffe rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This bill has been touted as a way to improve the chances of challengers and under-funded candidates.

"Currently, the State law is that deductions on political contributions are not to exceed \$100 to a political party or an aggregate amount of \$500, of which not more than \$100 may be made to a single candidate. A vital requirement for the deductibility is that the candidate must abide by the State campaign spending limit.

"Far from encouraging greater participation and improving the chances of challengers to incumbents, this bill will result in fewer but larger contributions. Since the aggregate amount remains set at \$500, but individual contributions will no longer be limited to \$100, this bill will have an effective opposite to what its proponents indicate. Instead of five \$100 contributions, people may now make two \$250 contributions.

"The worst part about this measure is that it removes the link between deductibility and the campaign spending limit. I am at a loss as to how this is being construed as some kind of reform which will improve the political climate in our State.

"I agree that more encouragement should be given to the individual to support their candidates; that is vital to the health of our electoral system. I also agree that challengers should be given the same advantages to compete with the incumbents. But this bill will accomplish exactly the reverse of what its proponents claim.

"I might add that the House has foregone a perfect opportunity to enact some very genuine and very far-reaching reforms which would have really improved the political climate in Hawaii for the average voter. My colleague, Representative Barbara Marumoto, introduced a whole series of campaign and election reform bills which would have very effectively taken the focus of elections off of dollars and cents and put it back on issues and people. The majority was apparently threatened by that thought, and what we have instead is a very poor -- and in fact counter-productive -- substitute.

"Since this body is not interested in improving the elections process, let us at least refrain from making it any worse. Please join me in opposing this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"The bill allows these tax deductions for contributions to political candidates, even for contributions to candidates who have not agreed to limit their campaign spending. I think that's a serious mistake. It removes one of the incentives to accept the limit on campaign spending and it encourages the sort of runaway spending that makes fundraising a full-time job for politicians in other states. We're going down the wrong road.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marumoto rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I do think the authors of this bill had very good intentions but I think things have gotten a little backwards in the process.

"There was an interesting story in this morning's paper and I just would like to read you a couple of quotes: Common Cause said, 'We think this bill will encourage spending,' which is the exact opposite of what we want to see. And from Ian Lind, publisher of **The Hawaii Monitor**, he said, 'There are people out there who are going to give the \$250 to fifty people,' (he means candidates) and this apparently means you could deduct the whole shibang. If this is indeed the fact of the bill, I think we should take another look at it.

"Mr. Speaker, I would, rather than reading the entire article, I would ask that it be inserted in the Journal.

"Thank you."

The Chair asked:

"You want the article inserted into the Journal?"

Representative Marumoto answered:

"If I may, sir."

At 12:35 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:38 o'clock p.m., the Chair stated:

"Representative Marumoto, the Chair would allow your comments in reference to the article only be inserted into the Journal but not the article itself."

Representative Thielen then rose and asked:

"I would like to direct a question of clarification. In the bill, it appears to say that an individual taxpayer can give unlimited amounts of \$250 to individual candidates and if I am reading that correctly, that means that if there are potentially one hundred candidates running for office, a taxpayer can donate \$250 to each of those individual candidates and take that tax deduction, if I'm correct, and if I should direct that to the committee that heard the bill. I'm not sure of the interpretation of this, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Souki rose and stated:

"Representative Thielen, that is correct."

Representative Thielen thanked the Chair and stated:

"Then I stand firmly in opposition to this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This party who are politicians and for all of us who are politicians, we are going to be more suspect because of this bill. This bill will discourage those 50 percent who already don't register or vote and it gives a disincentive for a campaign spending reform or for those in this House or outside to fall under the campaign spending limits.

"Campaign spending reform, time and again on the federal and local level, has been said to be the avenue and road to reform of the political arena.

"This bill sends us in the opposite direction. It's going to give us all a lot more money but I think it's going to put a bigger taint on us as politicians. This is not good legislation.

"Thank you."

Representative Ihara then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Ihara's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is intended to encourage grassroots participation in the political process by allowing donations to all candidates to be tax deductible.

"Currently, political contributions from political action committees, corporations, and lobby groups make up, I believe, too large a percentage of contributions received by candidates, including our own.

"This bill does nothing to encourage these types of donations. Instead, House Bill 1512 encourages individuals in the community, the small donor, to participate in the political process -- just like the PACs do.

"Mr. Speaker, I believe the Legislature should strive to maintain a balance in contributions received by political candidates, and try to tip the scale in favor of the individual, and candidates' grassroots supporters throughout the State."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1512, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 7 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Lee, Marumoto, O'Kieffe, Tatibouet, Thielen and Ward voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 704 on H.B. No. 45, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 45, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WORKERS' COMPENSATION, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 705 on H.B. No. 2045, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2045, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HAWAII'S INTERNATIONAL ROLE AND TELECOMMUNICATIONS, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Anderson and Tatibouet voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 706 on H.B. No. 270, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 270, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL OF HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTES, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 1542, 1564, 249, 1512, 1557, 45, 2045 and 270 had passed Third Reading at 12:44 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 707 on H.B. No. 640, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 640, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS TO ASSIST AN INDUSTRIAL ENTERPRISE, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 708 on H.B. No. 907, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 907, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE TRANSFER OF FUNDS AMONG BUSINESS LOAN REVOLVING FUNDS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative M. Ige voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 709 on H.B. No. 544, HD 2:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 544, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in favor of the bill, with one reservation, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the Department of Health has advised me that there is no need for public notice on the rules for this program because the program and the rules are already in place. In other words, since they are in place, it's not necessary to go through the Chapter 91 rulemaking procedure again. However, I do want to note that this bill sets a dangerous precedent in exempting the program from normal due process requirements without

explanation. The Hawaii Administrative Procedure Act should not be weakened by exemptions to the Act.

"Thank you."

Representative Cachola then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Cachola's remarks are as follows:

"I rise to speak in favor of House Bill No. 544, House Draft 2. This bill would extend Operation Nightingale, a proven, successful program for alleviating the acute shortage of nurses in Hawaii.

"In 1991, Hawaii will have a shortage of about 1,300 nurses. The trend shows that the shortage will increase, not decrease.

"Private hospitals are thinking of importing foreign nurses. For them to get licenses, Operation Nightingale will play a vital role.

"I urge my colleagues to vote in favor of this bill."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 544, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NURSING, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 710 on H.B. No. 1398, HD 2:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1398, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative O'Kieffe rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the time has come for a total commitment to excellence to be made to Hawaii's public schools. To achieve this goal, it is vitally essential that we support distance learning technology to the best of our abilities. When we think about Hawaii, we can never forget about the geographical distance which surrounds it. And as a chain of islands, Hawaii has many distances within itself. Thus, distance learning is all about Hawaii.

"House Bill 1398 supports this innovative DOE program. By encouraging electronic instruction, interaction, and communication throughout Hawaii, the nation, and the world, this program will promote equal educational opportunities for Hawaii's high school students from Kauai to Kau. Supporting distance learning is supporting Hawaii and excellence for Hawaii's public schools.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1398, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR DISTANCE LEARNING AND TECHNOLOGY SERVICES, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 711 on H.B. No. 1509, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1509, HD 1,

entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SPECIAL IMPROVEMENTS AND SERVICES, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 712 on H.B. No. 1757, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1757, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Yonamine rose and requested that his remarks, against the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Yonamine's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, the purpose of this bill is to allow the price for school meals to be set administratively by the Superintendent of Education to ensure that moneys received from the sale of meals total not less than thirty percent of the total operating cost of the school lunch program.

"While there is a need to offset increases in the rising cost of food, labor, utilities, repair and maintenance, equipment and operational costs, I am concerned that passage and implementation of this bill will affect the people who are least able to afford this increase. The school lunch program is partly based on the theory that a child whose basic needs are met initially, and this includes good nutrition, will turn that child into a better learner. To make the school lunch program financially out of reach of large numbers of children will have a definite impact on the education of these children.

"Therefore, I strongly urge defeat of this bill."

Representative O'Kieffe rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is the school lunch program and just like the A+ Program, I would like to see a way where those that can most afford the school lunch program pay for it themselves. Right now, those that qualify for the free lunch program have to present a card which is a stigma.

"I would like, when this bill goes over to the Senate, that there be some way that this stigma can be eliminated. I don't feel that people who cannot afford certain necessities of life should be pointed out with a card as a person who can't afford a necessity of life. So I would like to have the Senate consider a different way of letting those who can most afford the school lunch program pay more of their fair share other than the taxpayers, but more to the point, please make it possible so that those that qualify for the free lunch program don't have this stigma hanging like an albatross around their neck.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stegmaier rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Just to express that my reservation and my opposition to this bill have to do with the fact that in the process of determining what the cost will be, there won't be the public input that up to now there would be. If this bill passes, these amounts will be administratively set.

"Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1757, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SCHOOL LUNCH, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Horita, Santiago, Stegmaier, Yonamine and Yoshimura voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 713 on H.B. No. 992, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 992, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PERSONAL CARE SERVICES, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 714 on H.B. No. 1881, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1881, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Thielen rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill appropriates taxpayers' money for an international flight training center at Honolulu International Airport or another facility in Hawaii. For years the private sector has done a good job at training pilots. Now the bill proposes to give more than \$700,000 in tax money for pilot training. There is no reason for the government to interfere in this area.

"In addition, I query: 'Where will we put the training center?' Honolulu Airport is one of the twenty busiest airports in the world, and the third busiest in the country in international flights. A training center would add considerably to the congestion.

"A training center would not be compatible with existing land uses elsewhere in the islands. We can save the \$705,732 for better uses, such as housing for the homeless.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tatibouet then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I feel it is totally inappropriate for government to be entering into establishing a pilot training school when this can be totally done and has been successfully done across the United States and around the world by airlines funding their own program. I think this is an example of a situation where the public sector is entering into private enterprise that's totally inappropriate and unnecessary. It does not benefit our citizens nor does it directly benefit our businesses since this can be provided elsewhere.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Other reasons I would like to echo what my colleagues are saying is that other than that, the testimony from Aloha Airlines, Inc. said that they would consider any graduate. They did not say that they would hire any graduate, and I read the testimony several times to make sure that I am making the right decision by voting against this rather than just with reservations. I didn't believe that we should go out and get involved with the training school when in fact we didn't know what we were going to do with our students.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1881, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AN INTERNATIONAL FLIGHT TRAINING CENTER, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Anderson, O'Kieffe, Tatibouet, Thielen and Ward voting no.

"This bill provides \$100,000 for the development and study of tourism and its future potential in the State, both the up side and down side of it, so to speak. I feel it is totally inappropriate for government to do something that the private enterprise has done very well for the last 90 years.

"Yesterday, the Moana Hotel, which is considered the cradle of modern tourism in Hawaii, celebrated its 90th birthday in Waikiki, and for those past 90 years the tourism industry has grown and flourished and has become the major industry of the State over a period of time without the interference of government.

"I think that we do have proper zoning process, planning process, and such individual functions in the counties as the Waikiki master planning process which is going on to take care of concerns that people might have regarding the overgrowth of tourism, and as far as the promotion and increased growth of tourism, I think private enterprise has proven that it can do it extremely well.

"I think it is again a waste of the government's money to be asking for \$100,000 for expenses of this nature which belong totally in the purvey of the private enterprise and that the people of Hawaii should benefit from those funds instead.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Anderson then rose and requested that Representative Tatibouet's remarks be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 449, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR TOURISM, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Anderson, O'Kieffe and Tatibouet voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 721 on H.B. No. 1057, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1057, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PRIVATE ACTIVITY BONDS, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 722 on H.B. No. 1955:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1955, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR A COOPERATIVE STUDY BETWEEN THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES AND THE UNITED STATES GEOLOGICAL SURVEY FOR THE PURPOSE OF CONDUCTING AN ANALYSIS OF THE STATEWIDE WATER RESOURCES MONITORING PROGRAM, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 723 on H.B. No. 1471, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1471, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Tam rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, while I firmly believe that the State of Hawaii will benefit from a diversification of our economy -- especially if we manage to capitalize on the dawning of the Pacific Century -- I do not find House Bill 1471, HD 1, to be the most viable means of achieving the internationalizing of our economy.

"As described in House Bill 1471, HD 1, the proposed Office of International Relations, which is to be established within the Office of the Governor, will consolidate activities of an international nature and serve as an informational clearinghouse, while also assuming a liaison role.

"As worthy as these functions may seem, however, I am not convinced that existing public and private sector agencies and organizations such as the Department of Business and Economic Development, the University of Hawaii, the East-West Center, and the Pacific Forum cannot communicate to work together on international activities for Hawaii.

"Lastly, the office of International Affairs currently exists within the Office of State Planning. I am most reluctant to endorse the creation of yet another State office that would generate more paperwork without productivity. Let us spend Hawaii's taxpayers dollars wisely.

"Thank you."

Representative Tatibouet then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I feel that it is appropriate for Hawaii to be concerned about international relations but I think the setup statutorily of an Office of International Relations is inappropriate for the State. Hawaii is a state and not a country. We do not need to duplicate some of the efforts of the federal government which are available to us and we do not need to set up a Department of State at the taxpayers' expense of the State of Hawaii. I think it is inappropriate since many of these functions are happening through our other departments and specifically in the Office of Planning that we should embark on such a venture and ask our taxpayers to support this venture when there are such other needy programs needed by the citizens of our State.

"Thank you."

Representative Metcalf rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Just to note that, Mr. Speaker, two years ago you appointed a special interim work group on this subject chaired by Representative Taniguchi and numerous people appeared before the group, including representatives of the federal government, and advocated that the State establish such an office.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1471, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INTERNATIONAL ACTIVITIES, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Tam and Tatibouet voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2194, 981, 1454, 2174, 806, 449, 1057, 1955 and 1471 had passed Third Reading at 1:00 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 724 on H.B. No. 333, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 333, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR AN AGRICULTURAL PARK, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 725 on H.B. No. 455:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 455, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FEES FOR HIGHWAY BEAUTIFICATION AND THE REMOVAL OF ABANDONED VEHICLES, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 726 on H.B. No. 808:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 808, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COUNTY FUEL TAX CHANGES, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 727 on H.B. No. 1254, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1254, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Tatibouet rose and stated:

"I will vote in favor of the bill with reservations. My reservations are that this is calling to transfer the responsibility for an international tourism consulting center from the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism to the Governor's Office of International Relations. I think, as of last Friday, a deputy director of the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism has been appointed -- a Mrs. Barbara Kim Stanton -- that we now have the 'T' part of that department fully operating. That is the Tourism Department and I think, therefore, it is inappropriate that we should take a specifically tourism consulting function out of that department for which it has just been created and move it into the Department of International Relations.

"I understand that this is international tourism consulting but it is specifically for tourism and, therefore, I would cast my thoughts that it should be left with the Tourism Division of the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1254, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TOURISM DEVELOPMENT, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 728 on H.B. No. 259, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 259, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TOURISM, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 729 on H.B. No. 1705, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1705, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION TO THE DEPARTMENT OF BUSINESS, ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT, AND TOURISM FOR THE COMMUNITY-BASED DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 730 on H.B. No. 1999:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1999, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, very quickly, the bill's effect, as far as I can see, creates a fraud unit which I believe is a thing that we should all be agreeable to. But the part that I didn't go for, Mr. Speaker, is that it also said fraudulent practices by the insurance companies. I don't know really of any fraudulent insurance companies and to have that in the bill...I can understand that as an insurer I might have a fraudulent type of a claim, but to say that an insurance company is fraudulent, I can't see that, Mr. Speaker, and for that reason I will be voting no.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1999, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INSURANCE FRAUD, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Anderson voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 731 on H.B. No. 1349:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1349, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Yonamine rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Yonamine's remarks are as follows:

"The purpose of this bill is to establish a volunteer coordination demonstration project that establishes programs to coordinate volunteer activities at two school complexes and their communities.

"Both the Department of Labor and the Department of Education spoke in favor of this measure. The project will enable students, teachers and parents to conduct worthwhile service in the community. The project will also enable community citizens to offer their services to the schools. This measure is in line with the purposes of the National and Community Services Act, which was passed by Congress last year. In both measures, our community citizens are urged to give volunteer service and in the process, develop a lasting attitude of continually wanting to assist one another.

"Therefore, I strongly urge the passage of this bill."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1349, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR A VOLUNTEER COORDINATION DEMONSTRATION PROJECT, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 333, 455, 808, 1254, 259, 1705, 1999 and 1349 had passed Third Reading at 1:02 o'clock p.m.

At 1:03 o'clock p.m., Representative Amaral asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 1:10 o'clock p.m., the Vice Speaker assumed the rostrum.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 732 on H.B. No. 1022:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1022, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SPECIAL FACILITY REVENUE BONDS, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 733 on H.B. No. 1278, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1278, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Duldulao rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"This legislation has been long awaited. It will allow and provide opportunities to our teaching profession to flourish. Professional development and growth of our educators are vital. It will allow them to further their knowledge and plus, the end result will be passed on to our children as their beneficiaries.

"The salary increases that this provides through their effort in self betterment is an added incentive.

"Thank you."

Representative Metcalf then rose and requested that Representative Duldulao's remarks be inserted into the Journal as his own, "and also note that the Senate is two-thirds of the way through their O.D.," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1278, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 734 on H.B. No. 1815:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1815, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR AN ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT DATABASE, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 735 on H.B. No. 897:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 897, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Marumoto rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I am disagreeing with the development of the film facility and the creation of a special fund to support the studio. My reservations are many, but mostly I am opposed to the location, and secondly, I disagree with another special fund. There is very little we can do about the location because the location was given to them by Executive Order. The studio has already obtained all the necessary state and county permits and the project will be constructed. It will be put on the Kapiolani Community College campus, in an area that KCC had hoped to put their future physical education facilities. It makes for a slightly crowded facility.

"Several years ago, we appropriated \$7-million for land acquisition and construction for the studio. This year's budget will include another \$3-million to supplement this appropriation and to complete the construction.

"The bill before us today establishes a special fund for the studio and rental fees from the rental of the studio are to go into this fund as will our legislative appropriations. But I feel that the rationale for the creation of this fund is very weak. And we all know that the income would be insufficient to cover the cost of maintenance in running the facility. In addition, a recent Legislative Auditor's report questioned the need for so many special funds in the State. So, I think we should seriously look at this and all new funds to assess their rationale and need.

"In protest, I vote no.

"Thank you."

Representative Tatibouet then rose and requested that Representative Marumoto's remarks be entered into the Journal as her own, "except that I will be voting in favor of the bill with extreme reservation," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 897, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII FILM FACILITY SPECIAL FUND, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Marumoto voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 736 on H.B. No. 889, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 889, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FAMILY LITERACY, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 737 on H.B. No. 1517, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1517, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COUNTY REVENUE, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 738 on H.B. No. 1453, HD 2:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1453, HD 2, having

been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Arakaki rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"It was Thomas Jefferson who once said, 'The care of human life and happiness is the first and only legitimate object of good government.' I agree with Jefferson and perhaps that is why I have some basic philosophical disagreement with the notion that government should be involved in the promotion of private industry.

"Where is the public purpose? When tax dollars are appropriated and expended, our citizens have every right to expect that all or part of the public will be beneficiaries. I know they justify their appropriations by saying that a healthy industry insures a stable employment market. Well, that argument is as plastic as a grass skirt and as empty as coconut bras that we're trying to promote. Benefits may trickle down to ensure employment for those low-paying industry jobs. But the biggest beneficiaries are those 'fat cat' hotel owners and tourist-related businesses, many of whom don't even live here. And unlike our local owner such as the Tatibouets, those foreign owners don't give a damn about our social economic problems. I think it's obscene to think that we're helping to line their pockets while some of our children go unsheltered and underfed.

"Think of that as an investment, some proponents say. Well, I can think of better ways of investing tax dollars. I can show you how dollars for quality prenatal care can ensure the birth of healthy babies. I can show you how dollars for nutrition programs such as WICK, and their expanded food and nutrition program can ensure healthier children. I can show you how quality early education can save over \$8 in future negative costs such as welfare, prisons, and remedial education for every dollar that we invest. And for those who don't want to invest in our kids, think about acquiring mountain and beach lands, dedicated to recreation and open space for our future generation. Think about alternate energy and recycling.

"These are the investments of public dollars we need to make in behalf of Hawaii's people, and these are the long-term, long-range visions we need to pursue.

"I am not against helping our visitor industry and I do realize it is a lifeblood of our economy. And perhaps through financial incentives such as tax credits, we can help the visitor industry to maximize their marketing dollars. Yes, it will mean less for the coffers, but at least we have the assurance that it is money spent by the visitor industry and not some quick-fix crisis response that will last for just a few months.

"Again, think about what Thomas Jefferson said, 'that the care of human life and happiness is the first and only legitimate object of good government,' and in the selling of Hawaii, let us not sell the people of Hawaii short.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I have some reservations but not with the bill itself. I would wish that some of our comments, when we make them and refer to a representative, that we would not refer to them from where they are within an industry or where they are within our social status any more than I would say an attorney that works for a union or a person that works for an estate or whatever.

"We are all representing what we believe is right and in this particular bill, I don't agree with everything that's

said. I do have reservations. I wasn't going to make a speech on it, but I don't know if in fact we are looking at a \$4-million bill that's going to be spent well, spent at the right time. There are many concerns that I have on this and for that reason, Mr. Speaker, I would be voting for the measure but with great reservations."

Representative Alcon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is a good bill. You know, you have to understand, Mr. Speaker, in order to make money you have to invest money. And this bill, from a very modest \$6-million was chopped down to \$4-million, and we are looking forward to bringing in the money that my colleague from Kalihi was complaining about -- not having enough money for the people that are poor.

"We have to consider also, Mr. Speaker, that most of the people from Kalihi are working for the tourist industry and if we don't have the tourists coming to this island, then it will be just too bad for Kalihi.

"For that, Mr. Speaker, this is a good bill."

Representative Souki then rose and requested that Representative Alcon's remarks be inserted into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Thielen then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"I would like to echo the very eloquent speech of Representative Arakaki. We are talking about human service, non-profit organizations that are coming in and begging for \$20,000, \$30,000, and they have the direct contact with the people that so desperately need those services.

"I think we ought to give very, very serious consideration about allocating \$4-million for this bill and take a look in our hearts and our souls as to what we are doing to those people who so desperately need the small amount of help that they are seeking from us. It's a tight budget year. We don't have enough to go both places, and I am concerned about where our priorities are.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose to "express some reservations on House Bill 1453," stating:

"I would just like to remind this body that the visitor industry is a \$10-billion a year industry and if they can't come up with the money to do their own promotions, the private sector on the Big Island formed BIG to take care of their own promotions on the Big Island. I don't see why we in government should be having to put up these kinds of moneys when you have incidences like Representative Arakaki has pointed out. I, too, feel for the homeless and I, too, feel for the children who go to bed without their stomachs filled.

"I think we ought to look at our priorities and take a real good look during this session on where are our priorities. And when you have a \$10-billion industry, I think there's a lot more contribution that they can make rather than taking it away from women who need nutrition and prenatal care, and children who go to bed hungry.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Taniguchi then rose on a point of order and said:

"I'm sorry, I missed whether the previous speaker was speaking in favor or against the bill."

Representative O'Kieffe responded, saying:

"I believe I said 'with reservations.'"

Representative Taniguchi then asked:

"Are you voting in favor of the bill?"

Representative O'Kieffe answered:

"I am voting in favor of the bill, with reservations."

Representative Taniguchi thanked the Chair.

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"This is not a rebuttal but since Representative Souki has accepted Representative Alcon's remarks as his own, I just want to welcome Representative Souki as an honorary member of the Kalihi gang.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative D. Ige then rose and requested that his remarks, against the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative D. Ige's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand to speak against this measure.

"I am very supportive of the tourist industry and the vital role it plays in the Hawaii economy.

"I do not believe, however, that State funds should be spent on marketing and advertising. The current budget contains \$16-million for advertising Hawaii as a tourist destination. I believe that the funds would be better spent in other ways, such as expanding and improving beaches and access, and other infrastructure improvements."

Representative Cachola then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Cachola's remarks are as follows:

"I rise to speak in favor of House Bill 1453, House Draft 2.

"The war and the recession have caused hardship to our visitor industry, sending a rippling effect reaching the whole State economy. The more fragile neighbor island economies have been hardest hit.

"Experts had earlier projected a 10 to 15 percent decline in visitor revenues for the first quarter, but current indications show that visitor revenues could fall 30 percent. This translates into a revenue loss to the State of about \$40-million from direct general excise and transient accommodations tax revenues, without factoring in any multipliers.

"There were many concerns about funding for health, human services, and other essential State services. Some felt that the recovery promotions should be funded by the private sector, and that State funds should go to other areas.

"However, the private sector has already committed promotional funds in amounts many times greater than

ours and will continue to bear the greatest share of the promotion burden, but the appropriation in this bill will promote Hawaii in general. This campaign will be a jump start as a supplementary but crucial portion of a marketing effort that includes promotion of the entire State and individual destinations.

"As Tourism Chair, I am very sensitive to the need for State health and human services funding, which is particularly important to the Kalihi area that I represent. I am also aware of the tight budget conditions this year. However, the appropriation in this bill should be looked on as an investment, not an expense. This allocation by the State will result in an increase in economic activity and increased revenue, allowing greater funding for all State programs, particularly education, human services, and health.

"I urge my colleagues to vote in favor of this bill."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1453, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TOURISM, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 6 noes, with Representatives Amaral, Arakaki, D. Ige, Shon, Stegmaier and Yoshimura voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 739 on H.B. No. 1059, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1059, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Isbell and Stegmaier voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 741 on H.B. No. 937, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 937, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 1022, 1278, 1815, 897, 889, 1517, 1453, 1059 and 937 had passed Third Reading at 1:25 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 742 on H.B. No. 1047, HD 2:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1047, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Tam rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I do not concur with the amendments proposed in House Bill 1047, HD 2, relating to telecommunications.

"Before I proceed, I would like to add a comment that, as I have done in the past, I am trying to be consistent in terms of opposition towards non-civil service positions having the same type of benefits without going through our respective laws.

"Amendments to existing legislation will expand HAWAII INC.'s role in bringing new businesses into the State and permit employees of HAWAII INC. to receive

the same benefits as employees in State government without regards to the civil service laws.

"In my view, Section 206P of the Hawaii Revised Statutes provides adequate latitude for developing Hawaii's information industry. I also believe that the establishing of a special fund in these times of low revenues is inappropriate; revenues would be better applied to funding public service needs.

"Results attained in the coordinating, collection and distribution of information are yet to be affirmed. The information network must prove itself as a viable enterprise. To do this, we must provide for the creation of a stable, civil service workforce -- as opposed to the proposed exempt status sought -- to nurture the growth of this fledgling industry. Let us not increase low moral among our State's civil service employees by ignoring Hawaii's civil service law.

"The Department of Budget and Finance should implement the purposes of the office on the basis of existing statutes, until the concerns expressed are addressed.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1047, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TELECOMMUNICATIONS AND INFORMATION, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Bainum and Tam voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 743 on H.B. No. 1021, HD 2:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1021, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative O'Kieffe rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this Highway Fund bailout is not as fair as it may seem.

"The Administration first proposed raising the gas tax, the vehicle weight tax, and the vehicle registration fee. The House Transportation Committee then decided that a two dollar surcharge on car rentals was a better idea than raising the fuel tax.

"Now the Finance Committee has decided to have its cake and eat it too. What we have before us is -- a fuel tax hike of 5 cents per gallon, from 11 cents to 16 cents per gallon; a rental car surcharge of \$2.00 per day; a 50 percent to 131 percent increase in the annual vehicle weight tax, depending on the type of vehicle; and a doubling of annual vehicle registration fees.

"On the surface these may seem to be reasonable measures to provide needed revenues to the Highway Fund by increasing the contributions of those who use the highways most. But there are important issues which need to be raised.

"Just like last year's authorized excise tax increase for mass transit which, as you will recall, the Minority unanimously opposed. The State is trying to solve its problems of inefficient management, questionable contracting practices, and mispending of taxpayer money by upping taxes in our already overtaxed State. And who gets the short end of the stick? Just like last year -- the

people who can afford it the least. That's what will happen if this body passes this measure.

"Every element of this plan is regressive. It is the disadvantaged who will feel it most when they pay at least 5 cents more per gallon and twice as much for registration fees and vehicle weight taxes.

"This plan is also unfair to rural residents, especially those on the neighbor islands, where population centers are far apart and families must use their cars to commute because of inadequate or, in most cases, non-existent public mass transportation.

"It is easier to argue these increases right here in Honolulu where the automobile is a social ill, and where TheBus system and other alternatives to the car are available and convenient.

"Alternative transportation is not an easy option for rural residents. For many of them, taxing the automobile is taxing one of life's necessities. Of course, this is quite consistent with the Majority's long-standing policy of taxing groceries and medical care, but it is nevertheless wrong.

"We need to consider the impact of this tax hike on the economy as well. Our visitor industry -- our State's largest provider of jobs and tax revenue -- is in jeopardy. Recession is rearing its ugly head. Thousands of jobs are threatened, further endangering Hawaii's already struggling residents.

"It is not a smart move to hurt our economy further and increase the cost of living by raising taxes. With visitor counts low and destinations world-wide scrambling to compete for tourists, now is hardly the time to increase the costs of vacationing here and the cost of renting a car.

"And while we're on the subject of car rentals, please keep in mind that our own residents who travel inter-island often use rented cars. Budget Rent-A-Car reports that an average of 40 percent of its rentals here in Hawaii are made at Kamaaina rates. Bear in mind also that rental cars make up only about 5 percent of the State's vehicle count.

"What is most infuriating, Mr. Speaker, about this latest tax increase is that the general excise tax on fuel is being returned to the General Fund -- our State government's answer to the famous black hole. On the one hand, government is taking money from the people and saying we have no choice but to raise taxes if we want to maintain our roads, and on the other hand government is using money replaced by tax increases for other purposes.

"This is a con-man's approach to finances and reveals a cynical and disturbing trend in our State politics. Every time the government wants to wring more money out of the people, it puts one over on the taxpayer by linking the tax increase to a popular need. This technique is being used with varying degrees of success all over the country.

"Unfortunately, it seems to work perfectly here in Hawaii.

"Certainly, Honolulu needs to alleviate its traffic problems. Certainly, the Highway Fund cannot be allowed to collapse. But using these legitimate needs to justify repeated tax increases conveniently avoids any discussion of the overall fiscal picture.

"It avoids the whole idea of priority-setting. It avoids the concept of cutting back on less important items for the

sake of vital needs. A wine-tasting conference is a perfect example of asinine spending with our homeless want for shower and a telephone to leave a message for their inquiry to work.

"The Legislature's reaction to the whopping revenue surpluses in recent years was to go on a spending binge. And even with today's unclear fiscal picture, make no mistake -- there are plenty of places for the State to save money without sacrificing vital programs.

"The bottom line, Mr. Speaker, is our fiscal chickens are coming home to roost. We may be able to prevent this, but only if we face our responsibility to make some tough choices now.

"Hawaii's residents already face one of the highest costs of living in the country, and, not coincidentally, one of the worst tax burdens in the country. The answer to every problem cannot continue to be to raise the taxes!

"Please join me in voting 'no' on this bill and voting 'yes' on efficient spending instead.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At 1:32 o'clock p.m., Representative Arakaki asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:37 o'clock p.m.

Representative Souki rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I just want to remind some of the members here that the Highway Fund is a user fund. If you use the highway, you pay.

"Back in 1981, we were supposed to raise the tax because the fund was running short. At that time, in the wisdom of the Legislature, instead of raising the tax they chose to divert the 4 percent excise tax which normally goes to the General Fund to divert that to the Highway Fund. What it meant was the General Fund was short of revenues for the programs that we all espoused, and since that day we have never had the courage to raise the tax. Now, we are on the verge of either having our roads not being maintained properly and the Highway Fund going into deficit spending, or find some other means of funding the highway which I cannot think of right now.

"To remind some of the members, we spend approximately \$30-million a year to maintain the highways of the State. Effective July 1st of this year, the revenues will drop down to \$16-million plus the fact we need to settle some affairs with county and state roads where there is question about purchasing the roads from the counties to put it back into the state so they can provide the proper care. There is a number of transfer roads that they've been talking about for a number of years but because of the lack of funds, we have not been able to do anything. This tax will enable us to do that.

"Further, I want to remind the members that as far as highway improvements other than H-3, there is no money available for building of new highways and highway improvements. Normally, through the graciousness of the federal government, they provide \$11-million for primary funds. All of that is now going to H-3.

"How are we going to pay for the highways on Kalaniana'ole, in Halawa, Saddle Road, Kona, Maui, Kauai, if not for the Highway Fund? May I also remind the members that the federal government recently raised

the gasoline tax 8 cents, but that did not go to assist us in highway funds. That money was put into the General Fund to defer the debts. Not one cent of that increase in gasoline tax is coming down to Hawaii or to any of the states.

"Whether we like it or not, this tax is necessary. Nobody likes to tax. I have to face my constituents like you, but there are times when we need to be courageous, we need to make courageous acts. And we speak about taking care of our highways, this is the chance to do it. We have a choice -- maintaining your highways adequately or not.

"You say -- make priorities. What kind of priorities? Whether I will fix this road or not? That's not a priority! You have an opportunity to repair all the highways.

"What about the transfer of funds? It's back to where it belongs -- in the General Fund. It doesn't belong in the user fee. We need the funds there to pay for the programs you espouse -- the homeless health care, substance abuse. If you look at the budget tomorrow, you will find that there's quite a bit of dollars we didn't think we had but were put back in. How do you think it got there? Through the transfer of funds!

"Now let me remind you, if this excise tax should go back into the Gasoline Fund and the Highway Fund, the budget needs to be treated accordingly.

"It is very important that we look at two items in this bill. One is, put the 4 percent excise tax where it belongs -- in the General Fund -- and to make sure that we have sufficient funds to maintain our highways.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker, and members."

Representative Santiago then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I am in support of House Bill 1021 with reservations.

"I don't think there is a person in this House who spends more time or drives on our highways on a day to day basis more than I do. I understand the need for those of us who use the roads to pay for that use.

"I am concerned, however, of the burden carried by the rural residents whom I represent. I, therefore, am very hopeful that the shares of the money that is going to be generated from this bill will be subsequently justly allocated.

"Thank you."

Representative Young then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"I am very impressed by the amount of revenues that may be generated for the Highway Fund as a result of this tax and I am also heartened by the fact that the excise tax made by going into the General Fund will provide perhaps with some more moneys for the kinds of programs -- the human services programs that we need.

"I, too, like Representative Santiago, am very concerned for the rural riders and those who come a long distance to come here who live in the outside areas because the homes are more affordable but, therefore, have to pay more gasoline and probably fill up more than most of you.

"So, I hope this is a signal for the next session that we provide more alternate means of transportation. There are many people in the rural areas who do not have the

bus services that are available in urban areas. They have to stand for many long minutes and sometimes as long as an hour to come into Honolulu. There are not enough shuttle buses or other kinds of transportation for people who live in outlying areas. So, I hope this bill is successful. It signals a call for looking at alternate means of transportation for those who live outside of the urban area.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Anderson rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I am speaking against the bill; however, not for the same reasons as most others. I can understand transferring your 4 percent tax -- I'm going back to the user fee -- but we're also taxing \$2 for your rental cars. And I was hoping that we would look at a dollar.

"We don't do anything with mopeds because there's certain groups that we don't want to pay for that. But they're users also and they have a great number that are really not a benefit to all of us who drive.

"You also have tour buses in other areas that we could also try and find them and charge them another dollar.

"For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I would hope anyone from the Senate would look at the full amount of users and not just a use but the full amount. And if they are using our highways in great numbers then, by all means, charge them a user tax.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Marumoto then rose and requested that her remarks, in favor of the bill with grave reservations, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Marumoto's remarks are as follows:

"Please allow me to express my grave reservations on this bill.

"Can we talk about the proposed 5 cents a gallon tax increase on gasoline? My message is simple. Let's not institute the tax increase on gasoline.

"Let us, instead, continue to take the 4 percent general excise tax on gas and put it into the Highway Fund rather than into the General Fund. The amount raised by the gas tax is roughly equal to the amount raised by the excise tax. (\$21-million to \$19-million).

"Keep the surtax on rented cars as proposed in this measure. This will be paid primarily by tourists.

"And I suppose we should pay for keeping our roads and highways in good shape, so I am not opposing the need to increase our registration and weight fees.

"But shall we not increase the gas tax? Before the session ends, we should all talk about this subject."

Representative Stegmaier then rose and stated:

"I wish to speak in favor of this bill. While I've been looking at testimony that was provided to the Finance Committee and was interested to find that there were words expressed by the Tax Foundation of Hawaii that supported the intent and the philosophy of this bill. Among the words of the representatives of the Tax Foundation were those that supported the bill because it is a user tax and that the amount for each car owner would

be based upon the degree of use by the individual of our State's highways. And the conclusion was that this was good public finance policy.

"Furthermore, the Tax Foundation went on to say that some will argue against any tax increase at all. Certainly, an increase in these tax resources will add to the overall burden of taxes in Hawaii and, of course, that is a concern for all of us. But the representatives of the Tax Foundation went on to say that no increase in highway user taxes will mandate a reduction in Highway Fund expenditures. And if people are willing to put up with fewer road repairs, more traffic congestion and increased highway risks, then this avenue is viable.

"Mr. Speaker, I feel that as a representative of a district that would benefit significantly eventually by the widening of Kalanianaʻole Highway, that it would be hypocritical of me to advocate, as my constituents have for years, that the widening of the Kalanianaʻole Highway take place and at the same time not provide the millions of dollars in funds necessary for paying for the project.

"For this reason, Mr. Speaker, I support this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"I rise to speak against the 5 cents increase in all due respect to those for and against, and those who live in the district which is adjacent to mine.

"The first objection I have is that we're not calling a spade as a spade in this instance. We're having a 5 cents increase and then we're taking 4 cents away from that, and 5 minus 4 is 1, so actually we have an increase of one cent. We haven't said to the public that as we increase 5 cents, we are going to take 4 away from this fund, and this fund is so important and no one realizes it more than I do on Kalanianaʻole Highway, that we should keep the 4 cents in there if the highway and the potholes were that serious.

"Secondly, we have surpluses in other surplus special funds but because of what we have chosen as administrative off-limits, we have not taken those funds and put them in the highway funds, as if a family in this State ran out of money for food and went to borrow money instead of taking money from its gas or its repair budget.

"This government has a lot of money but we have not administratively and creatively financed these things and that if we have a problem with potholes, let's do it honestly and straightforwardly, and that's why I am against this.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Oshiro then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, one of the most important functions that government is charged with is to provide roads and highways to meet the ground transportation needs of our State. It's quite evident, Mr. Speaker, that providing an adequate network of highways is imperative, and that such a network is intimately linked with many of the social and economic activities of both our residents and our visitors.

"The dollars which we presently utilize, Mr. Speaker, to finance our highway maintenance and construction program comes from our Highway Special Fund, which consists primarily of revenue from various motor vehicle

user fees. These user fees, Mr. Speaker, are incorporated into a financial plan which is designed to meet our highway maintenance and construction needs over a six year planning period. Because these highway user fees, Mr. Speaker, are generally not sensitive to the effects of inflation, it is inevitable that at the end of each planning period, that an infusion of additional revenue will be necessary. Needless to say, Mr. Speaker, we have, this year, reached the end of our present six year planning period.

"Anticipating the emergence of this highway revenue enhancement issue this year, our Legislature, during the past two sessions, has searched for various alternatives to minimize the revenue enhancement needs that we would be faced with this year. In 1989, Mr. Speaker, this Legislature authorized, and the United States Congress concurred, with a measure to allow the transfer of dollars from our Airport Special Fund into our Highway Special Fund to finance various capital improvement projects. In 1990, Mr. Speaker, this body further authorized the use of general fund dollars to finance additional highway capital improvement projects. Unfortunately, Mr. Speaker, with general fund dollars somewhat limited this year, and with the prospects of Congressional approval for additional transfers from the Airport Special Fund unlikely, it appears that it will be necessary for this Legislature to either increase existing user fees, or to create a new source of revenue for our Highway Special Fund.

"House Bill 1021, HD 2, provides an alternative which will meet the economic needs of our highway construction and maintenance program. While there are many different scenarios and options available, the bottom line, Mr. Speaker, is that this Legislature adopt an equitable and reliable revenue enhancement plan for our Highway Special Fund.

"I am very confident, Mr. Speaker, that we will succeed in this most essential endeavor.

"Thank you."

Representative Yonamine then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Yonamine's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, the purpose of this bill is to increase revenues for the State Highway Fund by increasing the annual motor vehicle registration to \$23; increasing the vehicle weight tax, implementing a rental motor vehicle surcharge of \$2 a day and by increasing the amount of the State fuel tax from 11 cents per gallon to 16 cents per gallon.

"While I realize that the tenor of the times seems to pull against any type of tax increase, there is a greater need to maintain our roads and highways in such condition which will make them safer and more convenient for all users. To not have a viable and solvent highway fund now will, in the long run, cost the State many more millions of dollars. Let us consider inflation and the increased dollar costs to repair roads and highways made even more deteriorated because of delays in re-surfacing, re-alignment and extension. I also wish to note that this bill does not tax everyone. Rather, it asks the users -- the drivers -- to share in the burden of maintaining the highways they are using.

"Therefore, I urge passage of this bill."

Representative Tam then rose and requested that his remarks, against the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Tam's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, while I wholeheartedly support the maintenance of our highways to provide safe driving conditions for motorists, I am reluctant to support this measure because of the increase in the fuel tax. I believe that our already overtaxed citizens deserve reduced levels of taxation and user fees, not an increase as is reflected in the Finance Committee's HD 2 of the bill. As a member of the Transportation Committee, we did not recommend an increase to the tax at the fuel pump.

"The burden of paying for no-fault insurance should not be placed on the shoulders of everyone who enjoys the privilege to drive. Law abiding citizens who are insured should not be assessed the cost of insurance for others through the fuel tax."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1021, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE HIGHWAY FUND," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 39 ayes to 12 noes, with Representatives Amaral, Anderson, Bainum, Bunda, Fukunaga, Hiraki, Isbell, O'Kieffe, Tam, Tatibouet, Thielen and Ward voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 744 on H.B. No. 518, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 518, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COMMUNICABLE DISEASES AND MAKING AN APPROPRIATION THEREFOR, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 745 on H.B. No. 942, HD 2:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 942, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Tom rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, as Chairman of the House Committee on Human Services, I think one of the most compelling areas that really made a real and lasting impression on me this year, really an area that really hit home for me, was this whole realm of homelessness. And that is to say, human beings who must live on the streets without a home to go to, who are forced to live in substandard homes. I realize just how lucky I am that after a long day's work, I have a home to go to. But for many, not having a home to go to is a reality of life. I think the word 'homelessness,' when I think about that word, is synonymous to such feelings as loneliness, emptiness, hunger, and without anybody or anyplace to turn to. To make matters even worse, society seems sometimes to turn its back to homelessness. After all, homeless people aren't money generators. We try to put them in the closet sometimes and hope that it'll go away.

"I'm extremely hopeful that the positive attitude of the Waihee Administration and of the Legislature, hopeful that we are now really confronting the homeless problem head on with financial assistance and providing shelters, all kinds of shelters -- emergency, transitional, permanent

-- and this will serve as a first joint step towards eradicating homelessness in the State of Hawaii.

"You know, this bill serves as a vehicle by providing a homeless shelter stipend to homeless families by declaring that prior to July 1, 1992, homeless shelter stipends and transitional shelters shall be as much as \$350 per household unit of four members per month, and that prior to the same date, the stipend for emergency shelters shall be as much as \$10 per person per day.

"This bill also affords provider agencies the authority to set aside a portion of shelter and service payments from homeless families in excess of the amount received in homeless shelter stipend payments in a savings account to be made available to the homeless families after they get out of the shelters and ready to go on their own.

"What is more significant is that this bill recognizes the problem of homelessness and seeks to do something about it. We know that many homeless are young people -- young families with small children -- that 40 percent of homeless family members are young kids under the age of 6 and that there are in excess of 3,000 families who are homeless each day in this State and more alarming, that the homeless families changed daily, keep multiplying. Now, it's stemming into the gap group population, living from paycheck to paycheck.

"In February, your Committees on Human Services and Housing organized a briefing on homelessness and I want to take this opportunity to commend the Housing chairman, Chairman Isbell. I'll tell you, she has tried very hard in trying to search for ways to have decent, affordable housing for our homeless population. Many of you attended this hearing. We heard the true stories of the homeless -- from homeless families in their own words. I am not ashamed to say, Mr. Speaker, that some of us cried at that hearing. And those of us who did not cry on the outside certainly cried on the inside.

"Today, let us turn our tears into action and continue to show our homeless that we, too, care. Let us continue to wage this all-out war on homelessness and conquer this problem once and for all.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Young then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with some reservations, stating:

"I have some concerns about the word 'transitional' as it now stands. I think the plans, as we heard, are excellent and, as echoed by Representative Tom, are very fine. The transitional nature does not accommodate. Because they want to encourage it to be transitional, they do not allow for toilets or showers to be built inside of the shelters as it now stands. Yet, they target women and children as their primary groups -- either single parent families.

"The first site that they have selected is Waimanalo which is the only clearly identified site, and I happen to represent that area. It is a concern. The weather is not always hospitable there, and it is important that these women and children be protected and not have to get up in the middle of the night or various times of the day to go to an outside toilet or shower. I implore you all to look at modifying the plans to include that.

"Also, the term 'transitional' requires that full services be provided to these people. Our community has been briefed on the plans. The community is moving towards full support of this transitional shelter and so we encourage you, as this bill moves forward in the

Legislature, that we look at providing full services as put forth by the planners of this program.

"Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 942, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOMELESS PROGRAMS, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 746 on H.B. No. 919, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 919, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE WAIKIKI AQUARIUM, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 747 on H.B. No. 899, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 899, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HIGH TECHNOLOGY DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Anderson voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 748 on H.B. No. 805, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 805, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE FUEL TAX, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 756 on H.B. No. 782, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 782, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURE ACTIVITIES, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 1047, 1021, 518, 942, 919, 899, 805 and 782 had passed Third Reading at 2:02 o'clock p.m.

At 2:03 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 2:54 o'clock p.m., the Speaker resumed the rostrum.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 757 on H.B. No. 2067, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2067, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICTS, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 764 on H.B. No. 980, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 980, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative O'Kieffe rose to speak in favor of the bill, with very severe reservations, stating:

"To those of you who do not know the situation, the road to the telescopes at Mauna Kea, from the bottom of the Saddle Road to Hale Pohaku which is the halfway point at 9,000 feet, is all paved. Now, from Hale Pohaku to the last four miles to the summit is not paved, and then the last four miles to the summit is paved.

"Now, those of you who come from the mainland perhaps know what black ice is. This is paved with asphalt paving and when the temperatures are below freezing, which is almost all year round, and you get the rain up there, you get a sheet of ice.

"Now, this is a good bill but it doesn't go far enough. It doesn't protect the person who is driving up without a four wheel drive. It used to be it had to have a four wheel drive to get up there from Hale Pohaku. It was adventurous people in Volkswagens who could get up. There have already been a number of cars which have already gone off the mountain because there are no guard rails. Canada/France-Hawaii Telescope has already had several of their own vehicles go off the road. So while this bill will help people like Canada/France because it allows the University of Hawaii to use studded snow tires, it does nothing to the average citizen to help provide their safety.

"So, I would urge the Senate, when they hear this bill, to ensure that all guard rails are established, especially in the areas that are paved because once you slip on black ice, you're going over. Anyone who has gone over that mountain is not going to have an easy time getting back up. And I would also like to have the Senate reflect in their bill that anyone could purchase studded snow tires and use them rather than just the University of Hawaii. If this is not done and this road is paved all the way up to the summit, I guarantee you we're going to be looking at some very large lawsuits.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 980, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 991, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII HOUSING AUTHORITY, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Peters voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 771 on H.B. No. 896, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 896, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROCUREMENT, CONTROL, DISTRIBUTION AND

SALE OF PETROLEUM PRODUCTS, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 772 on H.B. No. 1000, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1000, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TEMPORARY DISABILITY INSURANCE, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 774 on H.B. No. 19, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 19, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative O'Kieffe rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Drivers between the ages of fifteen and eighteen need to develop newly developed driving skills. Renewing licenses during these formative years may increase their driving knowledge and ability.

"Because, as this bill indicates, fifteen to eighteen year olds are inexperienced drivers, I introduced legislation requiring permit holders to be accompanied by a licensed driver eighteen or older. As the law now stands, a person with a temporary learner's permit can drive with any licensed driver, even if that licensed driver is younger than they are. Is this really what was intended when the original law was written stating that a person with a temporary learner's permit must be accompanied by a licensed driver while operating a motor vehicle?

"With boom boxes and cruising top priorities, all too often safe driving procedures are not high on any under the age of eighteen's list of priorities. Any teenager will tell you that he does not consider himself to be a child, but as the law still stands, it effectually allows children to teach children how to drive. Fifteen, sixteen, even seventeen years, is not mature enough age to take the responsibility for the actions of someone driving a car. Most drivers under the age of eighteen do not have enough experience to teach another person how to drive, which is the entire purpose of a temporary learner's permit. After all, practice makes perfect and with a maximum of two years of experience, a driver under the age of eighteen is far from perfect. A minor, someone under the age of eighteen, has not yet had a chance to tune the judgment that is necessary to set an example for someone with a learner's permit. The responsibility of supervising an unlicensed driver should be restricted to experienced drivers. Eighteen year-olds are not only more experienced drivers, but are generally more mature and less likely to make severe errors in judgment while in the passenger seat next to an unlicensed driver. This is one reason why they can receive a four-year license. . .

At this point, Representative Metcalf rose on a point of order and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the Representative appears to be speaking to a bill heard and held by the Judiciary Committee and not the bill before us."

The Chair asked:

"Representative O'Kieffe, is this on House Bill No. 19, HD 1?"

Representative O'Kieffe answered in the affirmative and continued his remarks, stating:

"Hawaii's driver's licensing laws have many loopholes which can be potentially threatening to other drivers in traffic situations. These laws need serious revision, starting with House Bill 19. Drivers between the ages of fifteen and seventeen should be required to renew their licenses every two years. Before taking the renewal test, a driver will review the Hawaii State Driver's Manual, going over the laws and safe driving procedures. These safe driving procedures will be fresh in their minds long after they have renewed their licenses and may even one day save their lives.

"In closing, Mr. Speaker, I urge the passage of House Bill 19 and other bills which will keep inexperienced drivers off Hawaii's roads. And I hope the Senate will consider some of my suggestions and amend this bill by allowing teenagers with two-year permits to only be able to drive with licensed adults. My intent, of course, is to make Hawaii a safer place to drive.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson then rose and requested that Representative O'Kieffe's remarks be inserted into the Journal as his own and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered." (By reference only)

"The residents of my district in Waikiki and Ala Wai suffer the burdens of excessive littering. Garbage floats down the Ala Wai Canal. Wind blows fast-food wrappers down our streets.

"House Bill 930 requires mandatory penalties for littering on public or private land and water, including tossing litter from a car window.

"The penalty includes a monetary fine -- and I believe more importantly -- four hours of required community service picking up litter.

"This bill protects the environment, cleans the environment, and educates offenders.

"We must preserve our clean and healthy island lifestyle -- for ourselves and for future generations."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 930, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PENALTIES FOR LITTERING, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

"As stewards of animals who are trusted into our care, we can do no less than support this measure."

"I would call this excellent legislation. I would say it is overdue; it's the mother of all creative ways of solving our highway repair problems. As all of you know who drove here, and that's probably all of you, we have the hardening of the arteries in this State. Our roads are constricted, they are congested, not only with traffic, but also capricious coning and roadwork that happens during the day.

"This bill will study the feasibility of putting construction between 6:00 in the night and 6:00 in the morning. And if there's any district that needs it, it's all of us but also the East Honolulu people who are very frustrated with the problem of the night construction, not only because of the Kalaniana'ole Highway, but because there was a Cable Vision truck that was parked and coned off a section, and 70 people called the Department of Transportation and asked, 'Has the highway construction begun?' And it hadn't begun. Because construction happens during the day, we have a way of infringing upon the movement of the people in this State. So this is innovative, it's creative, and I think the Chairman of the Transportation Committee should be commended.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1201, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ROADWORK, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative O'Kieffe rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I hope all of my colleagues know that a significant part of my personal legislative package each session contains measures aimed directly at eliminating the senseless slaughter on our State's highways caused by people driving DUI.

"Sixty-one percent of our State's highway fatalities last year were known to have been caused by people driving under the influence of alcohol. How many more were caused by people driving under the influence of drugs?

"The purpose of this bill is 'to provide for the revocation of the privilege to drive motor vehicles or mopeds upon the refusal to submit to a blood test where there is probable cause to believe that the person is under the influence of drugs.'

"Yes, there's a blood test, and yes, there is a hair test which can determine if there are drugs in the system. But nowhere is there a schedule which determines when a person is impaired.

"I had a bill drafted that was similar to the bill before us now, but I held off introducing it.

"The idea is noble and the idea is appropriate, but it's the cart leading the horse at this time.

"I drafted my bill after a police commander in my district told me about a person whom they stopped for driving erratically. The person failed the field sobriety test, was arrested, taken in, and blew a zip on the breathalyzer. They knew he was stoned on something, but didn't have the law to test for anything other than alcohol.

"That's why a bill like this is necessary -- especially with the language spelled out amending Chapter 286, Section 151(d).

"However, when I offered my bill to attorneys to critique, the consensus was that it wouldn't fly because of the lack of medical data telling how much of a drug constitutes impairment.

"While you can test the blood and hair for the presence of drugs, to my knowledge, there is no significant data that can tell anyone the point of impairment.

"I am also concerned because the proposed legislation is silent on what drugs to test for.

"While I am sure that the introducer's intent was to provide a vehicle to prosecute those who abuse drugs -- just as those who abuse the most abused drug of all -- alcohol, how do you protect those who are under a physician's care and are taking prescribed medications? Should not the most widely abused drugs like 'crystal meth,' 'crack cocaine,' 'cocaine,' 'heroin,' 'speed,' and 'LSD' be addressed first?

"Because of these reasons, I would think that this bill, if passed, would be declared unconstitutional as well as unenforceable, and ask that you join me in defeating this bill at this time.

"I have introduced a House Concurrent Resolution that requests the Department of Health to determine maximum allowable levels of controlled substances and to determine what levels constitute impairment.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and ask that they would support that resolution when it comes through."

Representative Bainum then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Bainum's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker and fellow legislators, I speak in favor of this measure. House Bill 1884 makes great strides in getting drivers who are under the influence of illegal drugs off the road.

"This bill allows law enforcement officers to require a blood test for illegal drugs, if the police officer has probable cause to believe the driver is under the influence of drugs.

"Drunk driving is both dangerous and illegal, and we have the means to crack down on it.

"Drug impaired driving is just as dangerous -- perhaps even more so -- but right now Hawaii does not have the means to do much about it.

"This bill will allow us to handle drug-impaired drivers the same way we handle drunk drivers."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1884, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE OF DRUGS, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Chang and O'Kieffe voting no.

Representative Thielen rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I agree with the intent of the bill and I think it is good legislation, but there are two provisions in it that I cannot support.

"The bill empowers the counties to impose civil fines for violation of any county ordinances or rules after an administrative hearing. If the fines are not paid, the county can then add the fine to the alleged violator's water service bill or driver's license renewal fee. A citizen who owes a civil fine should not have his or her water shut off or his or her driver's license not renewed if the person is unable to pay, or if there is a dispute about the administrative, not court, imposition of the fine.

"And my concern is while we set this bill into life, the counties are the ones that would be putting together the rules and regulations and I cannot feel guaranteed that they will not go ahead with this water fine imposition and also putting the assessment on the renewal of the driver's license.

"I would hope that the Senate would take a look at those two sections because the legislation otherwise, I feel, has merit.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1226, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COUNTIES, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Tatibouet and Thielen voting no.

"Mr. Speaker, I speak in favor of H.B. No. 27, HD 1, with reservations.

"Mr. Speaker, I voted for this bill in committee because it empowers the Director of Transportation to make reasonable regulations for airport safety. The bill authorizes the Director to adopt rules regulating noncommercial activity. The Director may not, of course, promulgate rules which infringe on the constitutionally protected free speech. The bill allows only limited and reasonable rules regarding the time,

place and manner of free speech. No regulation of the content of speech is authorized by this bill, and based on that understanding, I support the bill."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 27, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AIRPORT ADMINISTRATIVE RULES AND PENALTIES, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

"This bill sends our longline fishermen two hundred miles out to sea after which they have for years, up until now, been twenty miles out to sea. I believe it's just a bit too punitive is my point. Even the testimony indicated that seventy-five miles would totally resolve this situation, and in the practical sense, even the Coast Guard cannot enforce anything out beyond seventy-five miles.

"I feel, Mr. Speaker, because a large segment of this group are Vietnam refugees, it looks a bit like an anti-refugee bill. I don't think this is the message that this body would want to send even though I know that those people have been boat people and they are going to be productive, entrepreneurial citizens of this State. I think the recommended seventy miles would have been sufficient without going overboard to the two hundred miles.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 972, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LONGLINE FISHING, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Chang and Ward voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 872 on H.B. No. 515, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 515, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative O'Kieffe rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak strongly in favor of House Bill 515 but with one strong reservation.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is an enlightened and humane piece of legislation. It recognizes the inherent right of an individual to refuse all unwanted medical attention.

"Man, through his ingenuity, has created a new form of human existence -- minimal human life. It is life lacking in both dignity and quality, but minimal life sustained by man-made supports.

"Although physicians can now maintain biological functions almost indefinitely, they are often unable to cure the underlying disease or injury. The costs to all involved are often enormous -- both financially and emotionally.

"Mr. Speaker, imagine yourself remaining indefinitely on the threshold separating life and death, suspended and sustained there by artificial support.

"Imagine your pain and anguish if it was your loved one lying there.

"Imagine your pain if it were you lying there unable to escape the prison of your body.

"House Bill 515 goes a long way to clear up the existing statute which is unnecessarily vague and restrictive. It provides clear guidelines to both physicians and patients, thereby eliminating fears and threats of lawsuits and providing peace of mind to those who don't want to be caught in the limbo of a living death.

"I do, however, have some concerns about the durable power of attorney.

"I have on my staff a person who sat with a beloved relative as he died after being removed from a life support system. The decision to remove that life support was made by his wife who had in her possession a durable power of attorney.

"Although he had an illness that was debilitating and would eventually be terminal, he was by no means in an irreversible comatose state nor had he lost all of his cognitive abilities...

At this point, Representative Metcalf rose on a point of order and stated:

"With all due report, the bill has received a durable power of attorney provision. The bill before us does not."

The Chair thanked Representative Metcalf for the correction.

Representative O'Kieffe then said:

"I'm sorry, I stand corrected."

Representative O'Kieffe continued his remarks, stating:

"Medical technology has blurred the definition of death. Where death was once a province of fate, it is now often a matter of human choice.

"This bill offers the means to enable persons to clearly specify their wishes and to refuse life-sustaining treatments.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is not only about dying with dignity. It is also about the quality of life.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Duldulao then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"For a while I was convinced that this is a good bill but as I read the bill itself, you know, I am convinced that this is a very dangerous piece of legislation. There are serious oversights that I ask you and my colleagues to carefully consider.

"Number one. The last page of this bill which is page 18, talks about verbal statements given to the physician or

friend. That verbal statement, Mr. Speaker, is a very questionable matter and it opens abuses to the system.

"I also have a problem in reference to category people who have lost their ability to interact with others, or incompetent person as defined in the bill itself, and it includes a definition of people who is impaired by reason of mental illness. I am quite bothered by this definition, Mr. Speaker. Mental illness? Are you saying that these people with mental illness are under this living will provision, that they are no longer able to interact because of their mental disabilities?

"Another concern that I have is that there needs to be a presumption in favor of life for people who have not declared that they want to be denied the provision of nutrition, fluids, and other basic procedures such as insulin for people with diabetes. And based on traditional interpretation of law, there is a presumption that people generally want to live and that innocent people should be provided basic care, especially food and fluids, necessary to sustain life.

"This bill, towards the presumption for life that rightfully exists in law by declaring that there is no presumption, that people consent to the provision of basic sustenance unless they have declared otherwise.

"If this bill is passed in its current form, a court could use the no presumption clause to rule that food and fluids and life-sustaining treatments such as insulin for people with diabetes can be denied to people who have not specifically declared that is what they want.

"This legislation will make it easier for guardians to authorize the denial of basic sustenance to those who have not said they want to be dehydrated or starved.

"And lastly, Mr. Speaker, some people who say that they don't want to be kept alive really do not mean that they want to be killed by the denial of food and fluids.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Santiago then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"The basic idea of this bill, I think I support, and for those of us who work with the terminally ill on a daily basis, we do see the need for clarification.

"I do, however, object very strongly to the inclusion of nutrition and fluids as life-sustaining support systems, and I want to make that very clear to my colleagues.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Shon rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, when I think about this bill, the words that come to mind are 'dignity' and 'respect.' There is no more intimate and personal time for all of us than our last days as we prepare to leave this world. For those who feel strongly and clearly about how their final days and hours shall be spent, this bill offers a greater opportunity for personal control. No one wants to give up control of their most private moments, and this certainly pertains to one of them. As I look at what the bill does, however, it is very modest in that it codifies recent Supreme Court decisions that have been made as to what constitutes medical treatment.

"This bill has had a long history in attempting to make it through the Legislature and I would like to personally thank all those groups and advocates and families who

participated in trying to put together a bill that would indeed clarify our existing law; indeed respect life; dignity; respect privacy. I think this bill does that. All of us, I think, have very serious and personal views as to the end of life and the importance of it, but I am convinced that from many, many different dynamics, this bill proceeds with that sense of respect -- for the conscience, for the privacy, and the intimacy of each individual. And we should emphasize that this is in the context of an individual who specifies in their living will what they would want to be done. Some of the language that has been cited really simply emphasizes that in the absence of a living will, current practice of respecting what someone has said shall be enforced, and that's what goes on now in the absence of a living will.

"I would again like to express the gratitude of the many, many people and many, many points of view -- religious leaders included -- who were involved in putting together this bill. And I would like to thank all the members of the Health Committee who worked hard on it, whether they had reservations or not. We put a lot of concerns in the Committee Report, and also the members of the Judiciary Committee and the Judiciary Chairman who reported this bill out. I'm very confident that when it does emerge again this session, it will continue to contain that respect and that dignity that we all want for those in their last hours.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"I would like to stand corrected for giving some misinformation in my floor speech regarding durable power of attorney, and I would like to thank the Chairman of the Judiciary Committee for his cogent point of order."

Representative Ward then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"As with all bills, there are good points and there are bad points, and I think this bill is flawed for a number of reasons.

"First, the good part of it is that it's true that medical science can keep us alive for an indefinite period, and this bill gives us the dignity to say when to pull the plug and when to cut off the food and the water.

"However, the flaw is because we are now institutionalizing starvation as a medically legal procedure, we need to be very careful. This procedure needs to be used guardedly and with total respect.

"The problem is that this decision is allowed to be made by a single physician. Even a hemorrhoid operation requires at least two opinions.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 515, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LIVING WILLS, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 6 noes, with Representatives Duldulao, Horita, M. Representative Tam rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"House Bill 894, HD 1, which proposes to dissolve the State Plan Policy Council and establishes a statewide planning system, seemingly provides for a more coordinated, systematic approach to implementing the State's plans.

"I am not convinced, however, that the proposed process is necessarily desirable in a democratic system that is noted for debate and the free exchange of ideas. Given the rapid socio-economic changes that our State is increasingly being subjected to, I believe that it is all the more important to occasionally step back and review what has transpired. Existing statutory provisions provide us with such an opportunity, and as necessary, we have the time to revise our views.

"Many State councils are part-time. The State Plan Policy Council is mandated to be advisory to the Legislature. To separate planning and budgeting functions is a sound business practice and preserves the checks and balances.

"I may add that one of the rationales for eliminating the Council was that they were on a part-time basis. In the case, Mr. Speaker, I would want to state that they may as well eliminate us as we are considered part-time too.

"While we may at times bemoan the slowness of government, I believe that in this instance, 'deliberate speed' toward achieving a quality future is worth waiting for. I am not prepared at this time to proceed in a hasty manner without a clear focus on what is to transpire as a result of hasty implemented plans that may not fully include the views of those who are either directly or indirectly affected by government actions. For the sake of 'sunshine,' Mr. Speaker, I oppose House Bill 894, HD 1.

"Thank you."

Representative Morihara then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, with reservations, be entered into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Morihara's remarks are as follows:

"It is my concern that there be adequate checks and balances between administrative departments and the Legislature."

By putting the Council under the Department of Budget and Finance, the bill will require the Council to get IRS approval every time it wants to look at certain kinds of tax information. This will add red tape and hamper information-gathering vital to the Council's work.

"In addition, by eliminating one of the four reporting dates, the bill cuts one of the most important functions of the Council and that is, keeping our legislative body informed of tax revenue forecasts. Eliminating the January reporting date means that at the start of session, the Legislature has to guess about the revenues the State will receive. That is not conducive to intelligent lawmaking.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tatibouet then rose and requested that Representative Thielen's remarks be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Souki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Just a minor correction. There will be a reporting period to the Legislature and it's going to be on the first Wednesday of February. The Finance Committee felt that at that time it would be a later figure and we will be able to work better with the Council on Revenues' recommendations to the budget. Representative Ward rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"In 1926, the Hoopuulua lava flow displaced a number of Hawaiian families. Just six years prior to that, the 1921 Hawaiian Homes Act was passed. Today, in 1991, we have neither settled the displaced victims of the 1926 lava flow nor settled the displaced indigenous Hawaiian population in their own land. Thousands of Hawaiians remain on the waiting list, some of them dying, I understand, because they have not had their house built. And just last week, the Chair of the Hawaiian Homes had to come to the Judiciary Committee to beg for water for her homelands.

"Mr. Speaker, this is wrong. Hawaiians should not have to beg for water, nor should they have to wait till 1991 to correct the lava flow of 1926. The Hawaiians should not have to stand in line until they are no longer significant.

"With this bill and others, this body needs to muster the political will to solve the Hawaiian housing problem and not ten, twenty, thirty or forty years later.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 340, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LANDS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to have the bulk of my comments in favor of House Bill No. 945, HD 2, be placed into the Journal. However, what I would like to publicly state is that a lot of commendation and gratitude, first of all to Chairman Terrance Tom and his Vice Chair Chun, and also to the Department of Public Safety and they also need services, for really working together with very limited time to address some of the concerns that we had, in terms of the size of the Women's Correctional Facility, and also to address some of the concerns expressed by the community and the Save Olomana Association, and through a lot of mediation, a lot of compromise, they did come to a very equitable solution, and hopefully, from here on they can start to focus on the real issues regarding women's correction and youth correction, and that they can focus on the population and try to rehabilitate the population as best possible.

"With that in mind, Mr. Speaker, thank you."

Further comments by Representative Arakaki are hereby inserted:

"The Women's Community Correctional Center at Olomana has been the subject of recent controversy and debate for the Department of Corrections (now Department of Public Safety), the State Legislature and the windward community, not so much over the urgent need to replace or renovate the current facility, but more for the size and location of the proposed facility. The State Legislature, at the insistence of the Human Services Committee with concurrence from the Senate Corrections Committee, compromised on an agreement to limit the initial planning and construction of the new facility to 96 beds. Meanwhile, studies would be conducted to provide a study of alternatives to incarceration for women as well

as an assessment of the number of beds that would actually be needed by the State.

"I'm confident that the study will show that we do not need a large women's facility and that alternative programs would not only be more effective in providing rehabilitation but also reduce the need to incarcerate women to only those who have committed violent crimes and/or to those who are prone to violence. For the most part, the women who are currently incarcerated share the common traits and history of poverty, being abused as children, poorly educated, and having low-self esteem. You are probably aware that the population is disproportionately of part-Hawaiian or Pacific Islander ethnicity and there is a growing number who are mothers of young children.

"I personally believe that our prisons are receptacles of our failure to deal with basic human issues. They represent a sense of hopelessness we feel for an individual and the larger our facilities become, the greater the sense of hopelessness and helplessness. I do not want to see large sprawling institutions that become warehouses for those who have lost hope, and I strongly feel it is especially inappropriate when it comes to women and youth.

"For those reasons, I am requesting that you have your Department of Public Safety consider planning and construction of smaller facilities for women and youths at the site of the current Youth Correctional Facility at Olomana. This would not only provide greater assurance that larger, sprawling facilities would not be built, but would also allow the preservation of the integrity and vista of Mt. Olomana, which the windward community has been concerned about.

"Although I have been assured that the initial phase of the Women's Correctional Facility will only have 96 beds, I am also told that the infrastructure planning and construction will be for 250 beds. While we both may be committed to a smaller bed size capacity, who knows where we will be five to ten years from now and whether we will be able to sustain that commitment. With the infrastructure in place and the land available, there could conceivably be prison walls and fences on the Olomana hillsides.

"I realize the urgency of the planning and construction of a new facility because of the ACLU's consent decree but I also want to ask that more thought be given to the long range impact that the decision of the site and size of the new facility will have on our environment. The decision made will impact not just our lifetime, but future generations as well. The ACLU realizes the enormity of this decision and has expressed a willingness to 'back off' to allow the State more time to consider a smaller facility (site is not an issue to them) and developing more alternatives to incarceration. Rest assured, you have my commitment as a legislator to continue to work for more alternative programs for both women and youths during the upcoming session. Until then, I ask your consideration to help us make a sound decision we can all live with."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I also would like to express my gratitude as a Windward representative and one who has worked with the community to preserve Mount Olomana, and also to address the concern of housing the women prisoners in a humane manner.

"I really thank Representative Tom for all of his hard work, and thank everyone else who was involved in

making this possible, including the Director of Public Safety.

"Thank you."

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 340, 979, 977, 2009, 945, 1033, 958, 627 and 1707 had passed Third Reading 3:59 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 508, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that H.B. No. 508, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Ward rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This bill, at most, is marginally constitutional in that testimony indicated that at most we could copyright the format but not the content of our statutes. Let's not put our laws up for sale but let them proliferate on their own. If anybody wants to have the laws of the State of Hawaii in any part of the world or whatever, they can proliferate that -- all the more power to them.

"Thank you."

Representative Amaral then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"The intent of the law was to get to the commercial use of the Hawaii Revised Statutes and to regain some of the recompense for the commercial use of our statutes. Therefore, the provision in House Bill 508 exempts non-commercial use and sets up provisions for the Revisor of Statutes to enforce and to monitor this non-commercial use.

"I think it makes a lot of sense. We are certainly not the first state to do this. In fact, we are closer to the last. Therefore, I support the passage of this bill."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 508, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII REVISED STATUTES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 6 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Marumoto, O'Kieffe, Tatibouet, Thielen and Ward voting no.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, H.B. No. 1251, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII REVISED STATUTES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 2214, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that H.B. No. 2214, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Thielen rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this seemingly innocent bill is a lawyer's dream, and the judicial system's nightmare. If it passes, any attorney who dislikes the effect of a law can question

not only whether the law applies to his or her case, but also whether the Legislature did enough research before enacting the law. A lawyer could argue that a study cited by the Legislature is not as good as a study the lawyer found, and therefore the law should be declared invalid. This will put a huge burden on judges to become experts in social science, and it will mean an increase in the length and cost of court cases.

"The bill will significantly chill our ability to enact social policy legislation. Any legislation which does not have virtually unanimous support will become vulnerable to challenge.

"The proper place for this sort of debate and documentation is right here in this body, in the Legislature. If any member of this House feels that there is inadequate factual support for a bill, she or he can simply vote against it, and urge other members to do the same. Let's not drag the judges into this State House of Representatives.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Peters then rose and stated:

"I rise to speak in support of House Bill No. 2214 and just simply state for the record that this is a simple bill. It basically gets us back to basics. It makes us tell the truth. When we find it necessary to pass laws that have a major impact on the rights of the people, House Bill No. 2214 requires us to be objective and to be fair.

"Current practice has the Legislature weaving into its laws legislative findings that can be based on nothing more than our own feelings and creative inventions. These findings can even be lies and these lies can become part of the law. This means that what exists today are laws which deny our citizens their basic constitutional rights and which are justified by legislative findings that no one else can find. Today, the way the Legislature discovers its findings could be compared to the story of the blind man in the dark room at midnight, searching for a black cat that isn't there, and he finds it.

"Ladies and gentlemen, our people, and I mean our people, deserve better. This bill simply says that when the Legislature seeks to change peoples' basic rights and attempts to justify those changes in the law by saying, 'The Legislature finds this or the Legislature finds that,' those findings must be based, not on fiction, but on fact. Consider this, if you will, to be a truth enabling law for the Legislature. After all, the peoples' rights are at stake and those are pretty high stakes.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to applaud Representative Peters because this is exactly the kind of debate that should go on in this chamber. It should not take place in your Caucus Room, it should not take place in our Caucus Room, it should be out here on the floor.

"You're saying that legislative findings can even be lies, that we have to have a truth in labeling law in the Legislature. I say that should happen right here on the floor of the Legislature where we freely debate these issues, where all of the points are brought out, and where we can make these decisions. I do not feel that we need to be muzzled, to feel that we have to cite the perfect report that is not disputed. That is not our job here in this forum. It is to bring this matter out for public debate and after we have that full debate here on the floor and again I say, not behind closed doors, but here on the

floor where we debate the issues back and forth, then we can reach informed decisions.

"And I applaud you again, Representative Peters, for standing up and debating this issue. That is what this whole system is all about.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I think the distinguished Representative from the other side of Oahu has made a non sequitur. Everything that has been done in this body or in the committee is public. It is not only in public but adequate notice is given before the hearings, and after the hearings the bills and the legislative findings in the committee reports are filed. And we also have a debate here and it is completely open. What she claims to be. . .

At this point, Representative Apo rose on a point of order and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I have no problem if Representative Lee is rising to a point of personal privilege but I believe he would have to state that because his remarks are not germane to the issue at hand."

Representative Lee responded:

"Let me state again that I speak in support of the bill. The bill provides that legislative findings or declarations made in the bill or in the committee report should include references to factual documentation. It should not be simply a declaration of the belief of the committee or the chairman or of any party.

"I'm responding to the non sequitur that this is being done behind closed doors. This is absolutely false. What are we doing here right now? It's all in the open and people up in the gallery are listening in. And what we need to focus on is exactly what Representative Apo, the Vice Speaker, has pointed out -- the germaneness of what I say here refers to what is in the bill. The bill requires that declarations must be backed up by factual evidence. Otherwise it is simply a legislative finding in the sense of the beliefs of the committee or the chairman of that committee.

"Indeed we will make our findings when we vote on the bill, whether we vote for it or against it, and I intend to vote for this bill because it contains a very important principle. We should be making declarations based on fact and not on other impermissible evidence.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, exactly what we were talking about -- legislative findings. If perhaps we did have more dialogue on Second Reading and had a chance to say we have concerns, let's amend, then maybe we could find these findings that's going to be improved so that a chairman, or a committee person, would then be able to have a better idea on the legislative findings and where our concerns are.

"This is not debate. This bill will pass because we have not had a chance to debate. That is not legislative debating. That's not really behind closed doors, if you want to call it that, because we have open caucuses and naturally if anybody shows up, none of us say a damn word. So what happens? You talk about being muzzled?

You know, it's terrible that we tell everybody how much sunshine we have and then when we open it up for sunshine, what happens? Nobody says anything! Then they 'namu-namu' behind.

"So I am afraid, Mr. Speaker, that this bill doesn't really do what we want it to do.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to speak against H.B. 2214 on the contention that we are politicians and not scientists. Except for the days of the philosophers, kings or the technocrats, I think the day of the politician becoming a scientist is not in the past going to have a vote nor in the future.

"For example, what are the abuses that this bill could be put towards? What were the findings when segregation in this great country was legalized? What about the separate but equal doctrines? What were the findings? What about when slaves only had certain rights or votes of certain colors -- certain rights? What were the findings?

"The findings were the mood of the people. The political will should not be confused with the scientific will, and the political will should not be confused with the bibliography or an annotated footnote, or something that comes out of academia, even though in all due respect for those who do have PhD's in this body.

"Again, Mr. Speaker, we are politicians -- not scientists.

"Thank you."

Representative Metcalf then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, some of us are politicians and some of us prefer to consider ourselves legislators and feel that we can always do just a little bit better. And that's what this bill is all about.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2214, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 7 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Hagino, Marumoto, O'Kieffe, Tatibouet, Thielen and Ward voting no.

Representative Arakaki rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"There was a very small article in both this morning's paper and this afternoon's paper about a woman, Marlin Madrid, who is 20 years old, who was killed by her husband in a domestic dispute, and I guess our papers recently have been filled with these kinds of events and occurrences and I guess it had special meaning today because I found that the person who was killed, Mrs. Madrid, was a constituent of mine who lived in my district. I suppose, even though I don't know her personally, I suppose I should be responsible for at least trying to protect her rights and looking after the welfare of the people who live in my district.

"This bill is a step forward. It will provide for a cooling off period, and I think Representative Amaral and the rest of the women in this House should be really proud of putting forth and advocating this type of agenda. But for people like Mrs. Madrid, this type of measure is not really enough and a little too late. And I'm really afraid that we're going to have a lot of other women being killed and being permanently disabled or scarred, mentally and physically, if we don't really start to take action and really take a strong policy stand against this type of domestic violence. And I think it's a real shame that when you think about it, most women, most spouses, are at risk when they are at home. It's a shame because you would think that a woman and a spouse should be the safest when they are at home. Unfortunately, that is not the case. And I think we need to work a little harder to ensure that type of safety and well-being for the women of Hawaii.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Amaral then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I find it interesting in the way laws develop and the way the community begins to understand the complexity of problems.

"With respect to this particular provision in HRS, when we talked about a cooling off period and we provided twelve hours for a cooling off period, it was to give Daddy a chance to cool down a little bit, get his head together so when he comes home, he doesn't hit Mama anymore. Now, truly, we as a society are beginning to recognize that the cooling off period isn't just for Daddy to cool down. The cooling off period is necessary so that the woman can get a temporary restraining order to keep him away from her so he doesn't continue beating her and the kids. It's necessary for her to get legal counsel. It's necessary for her to find alternative shelters instead of going into the homeless environment.

"And so I strongly support the passage of this measure and commend the good work of the Chairman of the Judiciary Committee who gave recognition, not only to the 24-hour period that's necessary during weekdays, but also with respect to weekends. If a person is beaten on Friday and there is no service available for her -- a legal

protection or attorneys or shelters -- that that protection goes to her the entire weekend and gives her all of Monday to begin looking for help.

"Yes, I do believe that this is a big step forward and that, finally, we are beginning to realize how terribly dangerous this crime is and that it is no longer a crime just between husband and wife, but an anathema to the entire society that must be dealt with seriously.

"Thank you."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"This is not a gender bill. I was talking with a constituent just this last Saturday whose father would come home after having had a few toots and his wife would proceed to take the frying pan to him. And after one whack on the side of his head, he would go on to a saddle room or he would go to sleep, and no one would dare go into the saddle room because his dog was lying there. The children and the wife would not come into the saddle room because Daddy was asleep.

"There is abuse and there is no reason for abuse -- for people to abuse one another, for children to abuse one another -- but let's not say that this is an entire bill affecting only the women of this State. It's affecting some of our men, too, and I just feel that we ought to keep that in mind that it's not a one-sided issue.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 363, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DOMESTIC VIOLENCE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 941, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, H.B. No. 941, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ASSISTANCE TO HOMELESS FAMILIES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 923, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that H.B. No. 923, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the intent of this bill is praiseworthy and I have absolutely no argument with asbestos abatement. However, the bill may be going overboard in its quest to ferret out asbestos. Specifically, I have concerns about the Fourth Amendment rights of search and seizure. And perhaps, in this bill, we are a bit aggressive in our pursuit of asbestos in entering and inspecting premises. This bill would allow us to go in and investigate and clean up even without a warrant. And criminal penalties are involved -- extremely harsh penalties.

"So, I advise that we tread most carefully in crafting this bill. I ask that our best legislative legal minds review this measure and ensure that it will guard the public and still pass constitutional muster.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 923, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ASBESTOS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 1927, 1891, 363, 941 and 923 had passed Third Reading at 4:24 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 2210, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that H.B. No. 2210, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I noticed this bill makes it illegal to steal pets, and I do think it should be amended to make it illegal to slaughter dogs for consumption. In response to inquiries, this bill pertains to all-colored dogs -- not just black dogs.

"I'm not sure my remarks are totally germane to this bill which would increase penalties for the theft of pets, but as you well know, Mr. Speaker, this has gotten to be sort of a running joke between us. Nevertheless, I feel strongly that we should not be consuming 'man's bet friend.'

"Thank you very much."

Representative Alcon then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, we in Kalihi do not slaughter dogs. We make use of them in some other ways except human consumption. So I just want to make sure that everybody knows that it's not only the Filipinos that eat dogs."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2210, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LOST AND STOLEN PETS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 595, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, H.B. No. 595, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FAMILY COURT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 648, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, H.B. No. 648, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TORTS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 1063:

Representative Arakaki moved that H.B. No. 1063, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Very briefly, Mr. Speaker, it says that this gives 'the public the standing to sue in courts of this State to enforce laws and regulations intended to protect the environment.' I find no fault with that. I don't see any reason why they couldn't sue anyway.

"I think what this does is that it stands out, telling everybody that we believe that they have the necessity really, more than the right, to sue us at all times. And as a taxpayer, it keeps bothering me that we pass bills that tell everybody to please sue us so that they can go ahead and bring something to a halt and make a couple of bucks, and it's really costing everyone, and it's causing a problem."

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Metcalf then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I note that last session we had one attorney in the Republican Caucus and this year, apparently, we have six."

"But the fact of the matter is that the public has no standing to sue under the environmental laws and regulations. This bill pertains to measures conferring the right to regulate and enforce upon the State and without this bill, if the State doesn't have the resources to do this kind of enforcement, then it simply is not that."

Representative Anderson then rose on a point of information and asked:

"May I ask a question of our Chairman of Judiciary?"

When asked by the Chair if he would yield to a question, Representative Metcalf responded, saying:

"Mr. Speaker, my policy is I don't yield to questions," and asked for a recess.

At 4:25 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 4:27 o'clock p.m., Representative Anderson rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I did get the question answered but I was worried because I am not one of the six attorneys in our caucus. I was a little worried that I wasn't going to get the right information, and it does take care of another problem."

"Thank you."

"Sixty-one percent of our State's highway fatalities last year were known to have been caused by people driving under the influence of alcohol. How many more were caused by people driving under the influence of drugs?

"The purpose of this bill is 'to provide for the revocation of the privilege to drive motor vehicles or mopeds upon the refusal to submit to a blood test where there is probable cause to believe that the person is under the influence of drugs.'

"Yes, there's a blood test, and yes, there is a hair test which can determine if there are drugs in the system. But nowhere is there a schedule which determines when a person is impaired.

"I had a bill drafted that was similar to the bill before us now, but I held off introducing it.

"The idea is noble and the idea is appropriate, but it's the cart leading the horse at this time.

"I drafted my bill after a police commander in my district told me about a driver whom they stopped for driving erratically. The person failed the field sobriety

test, was taken in, and blew a zip on the breathalyzer. They knew he was stoned on something, but didn't have the law to test for anything other than alcohol.

"That's why a bill like this is necessary -- especially with the language spelled out amending Chapter 286, Section 151(D).

"However, when I offered my bill to attorneys to critique, the consensus was that it wouldn't fly because of the lack of medical data telling how much of a drug constitutes impairment.

"While you can test the blood and hair for the presence of drugs, to my knowledge, there is no significant data that can tell anyone the point of impairment.

"I am also concerned because the proposed legislation is silent on what drugs to test for.

"While I am sure that the introducer's intent was to provide a vehicle to prosecute those who abuse drugs, just as those who abuse the most abused drug of all -- alcohol -- how do you protect those who are under a physician's care and are taking prescribed medications?

"Should not the most widely abused drugs like 'crystal meth,' 'crack cocaine,' 'cocaine,' 'heroin,' 'speed,' and 'LSD' be addressed first.

"Because of these reasons, I would think that this bill, if passed, would be declared unconstitutional as well as unenforceable, and ask that you join me in defeating this bill.

"I have introduced a House Concurrent Resolution that requests the Department of Health to determine maximum allowable levels of controlled substances and to determine what levels constitute impairment.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Chang then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This bill would allow law enforcement officers to require a blood test for drugs if there is probable cause to believe the driver of a motor vehicle is under the influence of drugs.

"Mr. Speaker, blood testing is an invasion of one's body, an invasion of one's privacy. We are not talking about breath or urine testing, but blood, which will be extracted from our citizens. With all of our concerns about sterile needle exchanges to prevent HIV infection, are we now going to put other citizens at risk by sticking needles into their bodies? We want to decrease the risk of HIV and AIDS for our citizens, not add another opportunity for a mistake and infect someone in the name of law and order. Let's use urinalysis to test for drugs if that is our concern.

"This bill goes beyond keeping our roads safe. It increases our health risk and invades our privacy.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Shon rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I cannot let go a comment which I feel pertains to other kinds of drug testing, and that is the drawing of blood has never been shown to be a risk for getting HIV. And I think it is very important to make that point in due respect to the other speaker. This is not an HIV issue.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

And I am not sure that the defamation law that is already on the books, Mr. Speaker, doesn't really cover already what this bill is attempting to do. I don't think it's balanced legislation.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I'm happy that this bill came up, being one who had some brochures passed out at the last moment by people on the Majority side. I am very happy that this bill is here and I would hope that it would pertain to all of us. I think that we're all going to have problems with people that run and send out information that is not true and factual.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Cachola then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Cachola's remarks are as follows:

"I rise to speak in favor of House Bill 215, House Draft 1. This bill would help to deter false and misleading campaign advertising. This bill would provide for expediting political campaign defamation actions.

"This is a non-partisan effort which applies to all political parties and offers no special advantages or penalties to any particular group.

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, if we look at expanding the coastal zone management area to cover the entire land mass of the State including forest reserves, and establishing a special management area single-family dwelling approval for new single-family dwellings, I am afraid we are expanding this to the point that it may not be a measure that we can all agree on because of the areas that we live in.

"For this reason, Mr. Speaker, I am against this at this particular time, and also the shoreline setback from 40 feet to 150 feet really has a problem with the shorelines of the entire State.

"For this reason, I will be voting no."

Representative Young then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"In the past, our policies and procedures have been to view our natural resources in a fragmented manner.

"This bill, at last, acknowledges the fact that there is a relationship between our forests and our beaches by including the forest reserves and the coastal zone management.

"Members of the House, this bill is about coastal erosion. We have said that tourists are our major source of revenue but that is only because they are lured to Hawaii by our beautiful beaches.

"Yes, this bill increases the shoreline setback. Many of you grew up playing on the beaches of this island State. Your childhood memories of wide and clean beaches are, unfortunately, fast diminishing in the memories of children today.

"Our beaches are eroding. This bill addresses this situation and moves to preserve and protect our coastal resources."

Representative Santiago then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in reviewing the bill and having presented it to community members who will be affected by it -- I do represent the largest area that this will have an impact upon -- it came to my attention and it was very disheartening for me to hear that community input from those who may be directly affected by this bill was not sufficient at least from the testimony that I heard from my constituents.

"For that reason and for the reason that I am concerned about the small landowners who may be negatively affected by this bill, I speak in opposition.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stegmaier then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"This Administration-sponsored bill is a product of months of public debate and discussion. During the course of 1990, twenty-six public workshops and meetings were held throughout the State to discuss and improve the CZM Program. The result is the bill before us today.

"Let me just go over a few of the highlights.

"The bill improves the management of our valuable coast and coastal resources, and by improving the State's management we provided clear guidelines to the counties to locally administer the shoreline setback provisions. As a result, we will be able to protect our valuable coast and coastal resources for our children and children's children.

"Since the time the CZM Program was originally established thirteen years ago, our population has increased substantially. In addition, the growth of our tourism industry has been tremendous. Both of these factors have impacted dramatically on the use of our valuable coastal resources. To protect our scarce and vulnerable coast, we must ensure proper management of our natural resources and environment.

"Mr. Speaker, the provisions in this bill are balanced and well thought out based on twenty-six public meetings and are sponsored by the Office of State Planning and with their thoughtful concern about balancing on the one hand development, and on the other hand protecting our environment.

"I encourage my colleagues to support this bill.

"Thank you very much."

No. 893, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COASTAL ZONE MANAGEMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 27 ayes to 24 noes, with Representatives Alcon, Anderson, Baker, Bellinger, Bunda, Cachola, Chang, Chun, Duldulao, Hashimoto, Honda, Horita, M. Ige,

Lee, Marumoto, Okamura, Santiago, Say, Souki, Tajiri, Tatibouet, Tom, Yonamine and Yoshimura voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 893 had passed Third Reading at 5:07 o'clock p.m.

At 5:07 o'clock p.m., Representative Anderson asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 5:09 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 938, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that H.B. No. 938, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Shon rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is our annual purchases of service bill and I think it is very important that we have a discussion on this so I beg the indulgence of my colleagues, but I feel very strongly that this is at the very root of legislative prerogative and of grassroots funding and of grassroots government.

"This bill really attempts to take away certain powers of the Legislature and turn it over to the Executive. This is the same Executive system and I don't fault individuals but a system. This is the same Executive system which routinely eliminates from purchases of service funding, legislative initiatives. Let me repeat that. The legislative initiatives which we put in the budget, year after year after year, when the next budget comes back to us, those are often not even on the list. There is not a commitment currently to the kinds of programs which we feel our constituents need and which we add to the budgets.

"Secondly, a couple of years ago, a good faith attempt was made by our Department of Budget and Finance to do a cost effective analysis of the various purchases of service organizations. They struggled and flopped around with it. In the end, it was a complete disaster. In fact, if you remember two years ago, the purchases of service was submitted to the Legislature extremely late, to the great anxiety and consternation of all the organizations as well as members of this body, who had to deal with the budget that was not even before us.

"The purchases of service providers, in fact Mr. Speaker, are very seldom informed as to whether or not they are on the list well into the legislative session. We receive phone calls constantly. At the beginning of the session, we submitted our application -- we don't know if we're in, we don't know what amount it is. You cannot argue by experience that the Executive system is sensitive to the needs -- the planning needs -- of these organizations. There is currently in the Executive system no interagency review of the purchases of services before they go out for request for proposals, or even afterwards as they come in.

"This is most starkly evident for children's programs. We direct millions of dollars for programs that plug in to our schools each year, and yet, the Department of Education declines to inform the Department of Health or the Department of Human Services as to what schools need which program and which are the higher priorities. In hearing after hearing, their response is, 'Oh, whatever you want to fund is fine with us.' There is not a coherent interagency commitment to the funding of these programs. There is no peer review of these programs.

"A couple of years ago, we had the interesting experience of reviewing about \$20-million worth of proposals in the evening where every single provider had to come in with a two-page summary and to present their case in front of the other providers. I can tell you that there were many, many proposals which, just by looking at the body language of the other peers in the room, were totally ridiculous or extremely well-founded. When presented to a body of their peers, the providers do gain insights and we gain insights.

"That system is not in place to the Executive system that we are turning this over to. There are no public hearings for the assembly of the purchases of service list except as they may exist in this legislative body. It has been pointed out that there's nothing to prevent a particular committee, if they want to have hearings in the interim, but that's not the same as a public hearing on the assembling of a budget that is done at a time when everybody knows that the budget is being assembled. We are the only body that has any kind of public hearings on these and this is going to be turned over to a system which does not require public hearings. The red tape which is already a feature of the system for these organizations, in my view, will actually be increased in this bill. Annual reviews will be required without the addition of staff to organizations and departments which barely can keep track of what's going on anyway. The end result of this is that there is definitely going to be a lot of paper being sent out to each and every organization for them to fill out at the end of the year, and it will come back and it will stack on someone's desk.

"Mr. Speaker, we are the grassroots channel for funding many of these programs. I believe that this bill, although sincerely intended, is to put some kind of a cap on what some may consider a runaway system of funding, as misplaced priorities, by cutting out our public input because I believe these organizations and this system needs more scrutiny -- not less scrutiny. It does not include improvements in the system at the administrative level. It doesn't include interagency review for each and every section although there is a very worthy advisory committee established. It gives up, Mr. Speaker, legislative prerogative, legislative powers, which we are very unlikely ever to get back. I am always concerned when this Legislature considers itself as a second class arm of the government. Not only are we punting on the assembly of the list for POS's, we are handing over powers which we should have for grassroots funding of organizations.

"This will not remove, incidentally, the overwhelming lobbying which we received because the provisions of this bill say that we will fund in various categories, lump sums for various needs. But organizations can come to us for grant-in-aid. What is an organization going to do seeing the lump sum, not knowing if they are on the list or not? Every single one of those organizations is going to be before this body with an additional grant-in-aid request -- an additional one! We will have hundreds more than we have now. And consider the confusion, Mr. Speaker, between an organization that comes in and says, 'Well, I don't know if I'm on the list or will be on the list or not. The Department says they like our program but after all, they haven't gone out with the request for proposals yet.' 'The advisory committee hasn't reviewed it yet. I don't know if I'm in it or not. You've got to fund me with a separate grant-in-aid.' I don't see where this streamlines the system at all, Mr. Speaker.

"In addition, we are now perhaps on the verge, in the next year or two, of restructuring health care funding in this State to maximize medicaid funding. If you look to the neighbor islands where most of the hospital care and the acute care is provided by our community hospitals, we

are embarking on a road where those hospitals may very well redefine themselves, not only as acute centers, but health care centers and primary care centers through which we will bundle lots and lots of community services which will then qualify, by virtue of that grouping, to more medicaid funding and medicaid funding at 100 percent cost base reimbursement. That, my fellow colleagues, represent additional millions of dollars to the State. I ask you, has this bill been reviewed in light of that dramatic possibility? No, it hasn't.

"The issue here, as presented by this bill -- the intent -- has somehow put a handle on the runaway cost of private organizations going up from 1982 -- I think it was six or eleven million dollars. It's now seventy something million, and the request is for \$150-million. Yes, the decisions are difficult. And why are there so many requests? Because the needs are up there. And why are we receiving those requests? Because our constituents and the advocacy groups and the people that we represent are asking for them. And because the Administration budget does not contain a process that everyone has confidence in and does not contain the number that we have confidence in. And we find that every year. It is absolutely true that our review of these organizations and funds is somewhat superficial. But the answer to superficial review is not to remove the only public scrutiny we have. The answer is to beef up our staff, to beef up our review, and to create a process administratively that we have greater confidence in.

"This bill does not create that kind of system. Yes, it has an advisory committee looking over the whole thing -- that's a good feature of the bill. Yes, it does extend to three months the funding of those organizations so they get paid in a timely manner. That's a good feature of the bill. But the overall thrust is to remove from us the eyes and ears of the grassroots, to remove from us the ability to say, yes, we want to fund this organization; no, we don't want to fund that one. We know that in the process, if I say, here's a lump sum of \$10-million for alcohol and drug abuse, and we don't have a list yet but this is what we think it will cost. Having not had that dialogue with those organizations, this is what we think it will cost says the Administration. What is the likelihood that that \$10-million will get out of this Legislature as \$10-million? Very little. It will be down to \$8-million, down to \$6-million, ah, they can do it with less.

"The integrity of the human services and health budgets requires that there be real faces, real organizations, real bodies out there. I have no doubt that this will continue with the process.

"The Senate sent over a very modest bill which I tend to like much better. There are things that we are going to be doing, I believe, in the funding of health and human services, particularly health, which could revolutionize the amount of money available from federal sources and outside sources. And we will also revolutionize the way in which we fund our community hospitals. I think this is premature. I think what we should be doing, if we insist on improving the system this year, is that there be a genuine dialogue between all the committees involved, which was not the case, and I am perfectly willing to engage in that dialogue between now and the end of the session.

"But this bill removes our legislative prerogative. It removes a certain amount of public input. It removes our ability to interact with the system and it turns over to an administrative system that has not proven to be adequate, and we have not packed that bill with things to fix it. And so I very respectfully ask all of you whether you vote aye or against, to consider this very carefully as we proceed through the session. This is at the very root of

legislative power and involvement and grassroots public input. I appreciate the difficulty that the Finance Committee, in particular the Chair, goes through in this. We all go through it, but difficulty is not the same thing as saying we shouldn't do it, and I do not have the confidence that this bill represents an improved administrative system.

"Thank you."

Representative Duldulao then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with great reservations, stating:

"As your Vice Chairman of your Committee on Health, I, too, share the deep concerns, the frustration, of the Chairman of your Committee on Health.

"I am voting for this bill with great reservations, Mr. Speaker, by giving the POS's this last chance, and I hope that the speech that was eloquently given by the Health Chairman will be heard by the people that make these POS's, and hopefully, that the system will work for the future.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Souki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, this is our annual POS bill, and as you can see there is some differences within the Majority, and that's the way it should be. The POS's have grown and burgeoned tremendously over these years and it's not that there's not many deserving agencies out there -- there's many.

"The problem is, as part-time legislators, we don't have a handle on them. We have no idea, for the most part, whether they're performing the task that we funded them to do. There's over 700 purchases of service agencies that we fund, and every year we fund more and more and more. And when we fund these purchases of service agencies, we have no idea how they are doing after we fund them. But then, there are new ones that come in the next year, and being legislators and being of great heart and sensitivity -- that's the type of people we are -- we continue to fund them.

"But at some point in time, they begin to tax the budget. It begins to tax the resources of the State. Even more important, we need to make determinations of which ones out there are doing a good job, that we should fund them sufficiently more and substantially more, whether it's two, three or five percent that they may give right across the board, because we don't know.

"There are purchases of service agencies that should not be funded but we cannot face that, and there are purchases of service agencies that should be getting substantially more and we don't know that. And that is why I am saying, in this bill, we have an advisory committee made up of purchases of service providers to review and to make recommendations to the departments. And we will provide block grants to the different departments. It doesn't mean that we're abrogating our responsibilities. As we do that, we can get the Legislative Auditor to go in and review if they are following the intent of what we provided for that. But more important is to have a handle on the agencies out there as to whether they are doing an adequate job out there or not. And this is what we must do. And this is what this legislation intends to do.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kanoho then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, we, who are supportive of this bill, recognize that it's not perfect but with the subject as complex as it is, it will be very difficult to do so. I would submit, however, that this bill would be a substantial improvement over the present system, and I would submit that the responsibilities being placed where it belongs -- in the departments -- and requiring them to monitor and do a better job of making referrals to us.

"And I would submit also that the Legislature will still be the final body to make those approvals as we do in all budget matters, and we will have control and we will have oversight.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Lee then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I simply ask that the remarks of the previous speaker, the distinguished Representative from Kauai as well as the remarks of the distinguished Representative from Maui, be inserted into the Journal as if they were my own."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"It concerns me greatly that we have many purchases of service that we're funding that do overlap, but I don't know whose priorities these are going to be. And when it says that these people could come in, it doesn't say that they are going to get anything. If, in fact, we are going to give the amount in full, the amount that the Budget and Finance is going to say this is where it's going, then, in other words, the only other alternative we have is to look at their priorities and say, well, if this is going to be funded in total and we disagree with you, then we're going to have to restrict your priorities and put ours in.

"I think this is where I have some concerns. If, in fact, we would be looking at which are the ones which are overlapping, are we in fact funding a purchases of service where most of the money is going to an administrative body rather than to the groups that we want them to go to, then I think I would be a lot more in favor of something in a study in that factor rather than just saying, we're going to do a study. This is how it's going to be done, and those dollars will go to those people.

"And I do have those concerns and that's why I will be voting no, Mr. Speaker.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Yonamine then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I speak in support of House Bill 938, HD 1. I have also submitted comments for the Journal, and I would like to add additional comments.

"If you don't have this bill, what do we have to include in Chapter 42? How do we go about developing the mechanism to seek the solutions to the problems raised by Representative Shon? Whose responsibility is it? Is it the legislative branch, or the executive branch, or both?

"And the POS's and the grant-in-aids are largely the creations of the Legislature as the previous speakers have pointed out. It was a paltry \$6-million in 1981; it is now \$76-million in 1991 -- ten years later. In the last three

years alone, the Legislature has added \$5-million in 1987-1988, and \$18.3-million in 1989-1990. When it comes to human and social needs, the fact is we have been most responsive to the needs of our constituents in our district and the State. So while the money is plentiful, we never did worry about whether these grants or POS's we used well or fulfilled the purposes that we intended for. For reasons you may know, we simply funded and turned all of these over to the departments to implement. We simply do not have the resources, manpower, expertise and time to do what a legislative branch of government should be doing. I repeat the same question -- if we cannot do it, then who can?

"The Legislative Auditor's report of 1988 points out major concerns and flaws in the Chapter 42 process. Let's do something about the situation now. This House Bill 938 will enable the departments to identify and assess those needs for services, evaluate the most appropriate service delivery systems for Hawaii, and these include identification of critical and essential services which government must provide people of all ages. It calls for a plan in which objectives, unmet needs, emergency needs, and on-going needs will always be funded equitably, systematically, fairly, and objectively so that we can meet the needs of all of the people by the government and social agencies. Most important, it forces the departments to meet, to talk, to coordinate, and even reorganize around common services and similar cluster of services.

"This bill is a plan that can take up to four years because it is a complicated process. But it provides for a significant input from the private sector and those providers who are best able to deliver the services, who know most about the programs, and who will be most affected by the POS grant-in-aids and subsidies.

"At the same time, we are not giving up our responsibilities. In a very planned way, this bill still provides for agencies and constituents to see it, to come to us. We still have significant impact who are representatives, on our Council, interim hearings, public hearings, informational meetings before, during and after each session, and anyway you know best as legislators.

"We will incorporate the many steps that are necessary to make a new Chapter 42 successful and effective. And these include new models, as were mentioned earlier -- lump-sum management, regional government, community development boards, anything that can be developed moving into the second and third year.

"House Bill 938 is not the perfect bill as Representative Kanoho has pointed out, but let's give it a chance so we can always amend this bill so that we in turn can be most responsible and responsive to the many human needs of this State.

"Thank you."

Further remarks of Representative Yonamine are hereby inserted:

"The purpose of this bill as amended in its entirety is to establish a new chapter on grants, subsidies and purchases of service and to repeal the existing Chapter 42. Under this measure, the State agencies could/would first identify and assess needs for services, then evaluate the most appropriate service delivery system. If the agency determines that the services can be better addressed through a private provider, this measure would provide the mechanism for not only this type of need but also for unanticipated needs where requests could be submitted directly to the Legislature for consideration. The bill, as amended, also provides for an advisory

council which would assist decision makers in indentifying community specific priorities, funding recommendations and new or expanded services.

"Over the years our private providers have given thoughtful and much needed services to our communities which State agencies are either not prepared nor staffed to provide. The recipients of such services have benefitted greatly and thereby, our State is the better for this. I am glad that in our zeal to provide for more accountability, we will be able to call upon the private agencies to provide their advice and expertise in making the review system more fair and equitable, while meeting identified needs.

"Therefore, I urge passage of this bill."

Representative Alcon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, sometimes we forget that we are legislators instead of administrators.

"I have to tell you, Mr. Speaker, that the list of POS providers is getting larger and longer, and the money is getting smaller and smaller to provide for them. No amount of public hearings, Mr. Speaker, can stretch the amount of money that we have available for those people.

"I am happy that we are experiencing a monetary famine. Now we can sit down and re-evaluate and reassess some of the programs that we have and make sure that they will benefit the people of Hawaii.

"My concern, Mr. Speaker, is that there is no accountability from the providers. I don't even know how much money goes down to the intended beneficiaries.

"There are layers and layers of administrators in every provider, with hefty salaries.

"I am sure that the Administration knows more than the legislators do as to who could provide better services for our children. Funding is hard, Mr. Speaker, but the Finance Committee has done its best to allocate the money that is necessary to take care of some of our problems. My only concern, Mr. Speaker, is I wish that the agency that provides for those help will only subtract some of the papers that the providers will have to fill up.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Horita then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of the measure.

"May I request that the comments of the eloquent speaker from my neighboring district, Moanalua Valley, be inserted into the Journal as if it were my own."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 938, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GRANTS, SUBSIDIES, AND PURCHASES OF SERVICE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 40 ayes to 11 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Arakaki, Bainum, Hirono, Isbell, O'Kieffe, Shon, Tam, Tatibouet, Thielen and Ward voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 938 had passed Third Reading at 5:38 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 2123, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that H.B. No. 2123, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Lee rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"It seems to be a minor bill but it encroaches on a very large problem -- the governance of our educational system in the State.

"Our very first bill that we passed today was House Bill 1748, HD 2. It establishes a Blue Ribbon Commission to look into the governance of the educational system. It calls for public hearings and public forums throughout the State. We have thought it was such a great idea that we have provided \$100,000 to fund the work of this Blue Ribbon Commission. This Blue Ribbon Commission enjoys the support of all elements who are interested in the reform of our educational system.

"The bill before us, H.B. No. 2123, was essentially to enlarge the Honolulu District School Advisory Council and then a provision was inserted making the councilors appointed by the School Board rather than by the Governor.

"I would have supported the bill if it had provided for direct elections of the councilors. Those members in the Central District of the School Advisory Council believe that the best course for them, in terms of reform of governance, is in direct elections by the people, and indeed, they would prefer to have a more drastic reform of the system whereby the various districts are responsible for policy within those districts.

"Grant as they may be, what we have before us is a choice of doing things the right way, or doing things the piecemeal way. And for that reason, I think all of us who support the Blue Ribbon Commission, public forums and public hearings chaired by people from all walks of the educational system, as well as by the public including the Business Roundtable, I think we ought to go and do things the right way, and for that reason I will be voting against House Bill 2123.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stegmaier then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"What I would like to emphasize is that the bill, as it is drafted now, would have the Board of Education pick the members of the School Advisory Councils and yet, practically speaking, the School Advisory Council members would then be reporting directly to the Board of Education.

"I don't think that there will be an encouragement of independent thought and variety of opinions by having the same individuals who are picked by the Board then report to them. I don't think that was the original intent of the legislation to establish this School Advisory Councils. And even though I understand from the testimony that the present system of gubernatorial appointments is certainly imperfect, and I understand the concern of the Chairman of the Education Committee and members of the School Advisory Council, I don't think that this approach provides the proper solution.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Tam then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill No. 2123, HD 1, specifically in regards to the District

School Advisory Council. The topic of discussion is the essence of the District Advisory Council

"Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, as presented in the public hearing which the Education Committee of the House of Representatives had, and I may add that our hearing notices went out four to five days or even more, to a list of over 600 people on the mailing list. As indicated by the Council members who attended, the purpose of the District School Advisory Council is to advise the Board of Education on the development of policies and other educational matters and in doing so, in terms of the testimony, two things came out of the bill in essence.

"Number one, the Honolulu District School Advisory Council wanted to enlarge their appointments from five members to seven members because of the large size of the Honolulu District, being the largest school district within the State of Hawaii. They wanted to better serve the communication efforts of their constituents in taking back the information to the Board of Education members and try to work with the Board of Education members. After all, that is the meat of the crux that you are trying to do today in terms of all levels of government, whether they be the executive branch, the legislative branch, or the judicial branch.

"The second item that came out of the bill, in terms of proposal, was that the School Advisory Council wanted to be appointed by the Board of Education for several reasons as indicated.

"Number one, as they indicated quite clearly in the testimony, no direction or communication from the Governor who appointed them. They wanted some leadership which they did not receive, unfortunately.

"Number two, when there was a vacancy for many, many months, there was no reappointment by the Governor, which they expressed in terms again the desire to air out into the community and express to the constituents, the people, the residents of the State of Hawaii's concerns to the Board of Education.

"And thirdly, to enhance the communication between the Councils and the Board of Education.

"Fourth, enhance the ability of Council members to advise the Board of Education members on the development of policies and other educational matters.

"Mr. Speaker, to sum it up, this bill's proposal embraces more communication between the residents of the State of Hawaii, through their Council members, with the Board of Education, and there is a strong desire for working relationships of all.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2123, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 38 ayes to 13 noes, with Representatives Arakaki, Baker, Hashimoto, Horita, D. Ige, Lee, Marumoto, Okamura, O'Kieffe, Souki, Stegmaier, Tatibouet and Yoshimura voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 2123 had passed Third Reading at 5:46 o'clock p.m.

At 5:47 o'clock p.m., Representative Arakaki asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 5:48 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 891, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, H.B. No. 891, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LAND USE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 43 ayes to 8 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Chun, Horita, Peters, Say, Souki, Tajiri and Tom voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 891 had passed Third Reading at 5:49 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 202, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that H.B. No. 202, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Chang rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Although its intent to discourage scattered, low-density residential developments on agricultural lands is a good one, it may also pose some other problems. Especially on the Neighbor Islands and especially on the Big Island, many farmers are part-time farmers, making a living by farming on lots that are less than five acres. Developers, if limited to having to develop agricultural lots five acres of more would be forced to increase the price of these lots because more infrastructure will be needed, or may be discouraged to even develop these agricultural lots. Larger lots would mean longer pipes and electrical lines. This would price these lots out of the reach of the very people we are trying to help. Smaller lots would bring the needed infrastructure for the farmers and part-time farmers to a price that would enable them to make a living.

"Mr. Speaker, let's not increase the size of these agricultural lots just to get at the gentlemen farmers. Let's help the real farmers by making sure that the land is used for farming and not for country estates.

"Thank you very much."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the Department of Agriculture testified that five acres is a viable farm unit size for certain intensive diversified agricultural activities. I submit, Mr. Speaker, that in rural communities like Hana, an economic unit of two acres or more can be very viable, especially those who are subsistence farming. Forgetting the gentlemen or hobby farmer for a moment, there are people in our State whose only form of livelihood is to hunt, to gather, and to fish, and to raise what food they have on their own property.

"To limit the size of these farm units to five acres would deny these people the right to live on their own land as they work. In addition, when you have a situation like Hamakua Sugar which is now trying to get out of difficulties, if the bill were to go through, this could preclude the conclusion -- the successful conclusion -- of the Hamakua Sugar land sale. It also would hurt other developers who have already depended on the one acre lot for their rural agriculture subdivisions.

"For these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I am voting no on this measure and I would like the others to join me also.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 202, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT ON LAND WITHIN THE AGRICULTURAL DISTRICT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 39 ayes to 12 noes, with Representatives Baker, Chang, Chun, Horita, M. Ige, O'Kieffe, Peters, Say, Souki, Tajiri, Tatibouet and Tom voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 202 had passed Third Reading at 5:51 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 1982, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that H.B. No. 1982, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Isbell rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"This bill is about leases -- leases for land under condominiums. We would not be voting on such a bill today if the landowners were more sensitive to the high impact that these lease rents have on the condo owners who lease the land on which they live.

"No one dreamed that land which leased for \$12 a month twenty or thirty years ago would go up to \$41 per square foot for a lease rent, for some well over \$2,000 per month today. But that is what is happening now and could potentially happen to other lessees whose renegotiation for lease rents are coming up.

"There are many small landowners who own only one piece of land under a condo building. They do not want to be forced to sell that one piece of land by mandatory conversion.

"So what can the Legislature do about it? House Bill 1982, HD 1, is a response to the lessee and the lessor.

"This bill excludes those single landowners. There continues to be an overriding concern of this Legislature for the small landowners. There is no hidden agenda. They keep their lands.

"This bill does not require mandatory conversion. For those landowners who own two or more parcels under condominiums, they may refuse conversion and opt for the lease cap based on condo valuation and the Consumer Price Index. Or they can do what is available to them right now: Sit down and talk with the lessees and find out what they can afford to pay and come to an agreement.

"The lack of friendly, personal communication directly between lessors and lessees appears to be why we are here today as well. Apprehension and the unpredictability of what the lease rents will be at renegotiation have created chaos for the lessees.

"This bill is only for the lessee owner-occupant.

"The qualification to trigger any discussions requires that the condominium building must have 15 percent owner-occupants in it to begin with. Then 25 owner-occupants or 50 percent of the total of owner-occupants who have lived in the condos for three years or more may apply for conversion. If the landowner refuses, the lease cap is triggered.

"It is very possible that although the lessees would like to convert and the landowner is willing, the lease fee

interest is so high they cannot afford to buy. This bill also triggers a lease cap for those people.

"If the owner-occupant lessee sells the condo during the twenty years following lease caps, the landowner is rewarded by sharing in the land appreciation at the time of the sale.

The crux of the problem is the ability to pay the lease rent. What has happened to 'hoo pono pono'? The Hawaiian system of sitting down and talking out our problems. From the small landowners to the very largest -- the need to talk to each other, lessors and lessees, is so basic. And the need applies to all lessees -- can the owner-occupant afford to pay the renegotiated lease rents? And can the non owner-occupants continue to find renters to whom they can pass on the accelerated lease rents after renegotiations? And what does this do to the 'affordable' rentals leasehold condos were noted for?

"House Bill 1982, HD 1, is our attempt to target the owner-occupants and their ability to pay lease rents while at the same time allow the landowners, large and small, to hold on to their lands.

"I ask for your support of this bill.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with certain reservations, stating:

"While small landowners, who have ably presented their case have deeply-held and justifiable reasons for their opposition in this controversy, so do condominium owner-occupants who are permanent residents and fear losing their homes, with their payments of principal, interest, lease rent and taxes paid through the years.

"My greatest reservation with this bill is that I consider a small landowner to be someone with a small parcel containing one or two lots. But in this bill, as defined by the staff of one of the major leaders in this effort, the small landowner is basically defined as anybody other than Bishop or Campbell Estates or Parker Ranch, for that matter, regardless of race or national origin.

"I find it difficult to have the same degree of sympathy for someone who owns one parcel that includes many large square blocks in Waikiki as I do for the genuine 'Mom and Pop' landowners who, in my district, are owner-occupiers and who rely on their small parcels for their livelihood, or the legacy for their children.

"It is important that we carry through with this effort to resolve a very difficult dilemma in our State, but I certainly would hope that as we continue this effort after the crossover, we are able to find a better formula to limit protections which are supposed to be for the small landowner to the genuine small landowner.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Duldulao then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"As a legislator, I believe that my job is to pass legislation that is fair and just for all. This piece of legislation before us is an attempt address the real property leases, and I commend and applaud the Housing Chairman, Representative Isbell, as well as Representative Hirono, for their intelligence, their patience, and their effort to look at a piece of legislation that pertains to leases which is very important in our State.

"However, Mr. Speaker, this present legislation before us has a lot of gray areas that needs to be uncovered. Although the words 'mandatory conversion' have been substituted by a lighter wording, the essence of it is still there. It's either going on a mandatory conversion or lease rent cap.

"I have problems on this one, Mr. Speaker, because as I read through the bill, it seems to me that we are not truly addressing the needs of the people that we are here to help. The formulas that were given in the bill to calculate the lease rent are not true and founded formulas. And again, you know, I believe that the formulas that are there will not help the people that we are really intending to help on this bill.

"Also, this bill lacks a provision that would tell us, you know, the income qualifications of people that we are really targeting. We are not really certain if we are really reaching out to the elderly, one single income, fixed income, that truly need our help. If we don't have the income qualifications, Mr. Speaker, it is very hard for us to determine whether we are helping the right people or not. And again, the formula was presented in light of appraisal, that if the appraisal is \$482,000 for example, that you're paying a lease rent of \$1,400, as opposed to a property in another area that has a lower appraisal and you are paying a lower lease rent fee each month. We don't know what is the distinguishment of who owns that property with the higher appraisal value. Is it the poor man or the rich man?

"For this and other reasons, Mr. Speaker, I have to vote no on this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Bunda then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I am concerned that we have not taken a much needed longer look at what is fair and equitable on this issue. I agree that we have a problem -- a problem that I feel that both parties still can work out. But as drafted, we are passing a law that gives government the go-ahead to intervene in the contracts which parties have mutually agreed to.

"I am deeply concerned, Mr. Speaker, about the impact which this bill would have on the sanctity of contracts. Contracts are not agreements that people enter into lightly. They are the products of mutual agreement between parties, a meeting of the minds, if you will. Contracts are the foundation of the success of our American economy. And they affect not only businesses, but people like you and I. Each one of us knows that when we enter into a contract, we expect the other party to adhere to what the contract says. And not only do we expect it, we rely on it.

"Mr. Speaker, I really feel that there has been no real clear message from the Legislature to allow the communication process between the lessor and the lessee to work. I hear statements like, 'Oh, the lessor is willing to work with the lessee,' to 'Oh, my lessor is not willing to negotiate.'

"But, Mr. Speaker, the question, and I agree with Representative Isbell is that, have we allowed real dialogue between parties to take place? Have we given them the chance for win/win discussions? Have we let the process work? Or have we, Mr. Speaker, intervened prematurely? And, yes, there are questions as to who's kidding who? Whether there is a real interest on both sides to sit down and be flexible, let's give it a try.

"We cannot pass legislation that will cause the breach of thousands of contracts without carefully considering and knowing the ramifications of our actions. I submit that this bill is not a product of such careful consideration. While I applaud the efforts of Representative Isbell and Representative Hirono in attempting to find a workable solution, I am not so sure that this vehicle is the prudent, well-thought solution that we seek.

"As I read the bill, I am concerned that voluntary conversion in actuality really means mandatory conversion in disguise. I question whether the applicability percentage of 15 percent for conversion is valid. The question again is, why 15 percent? Is there a basis for 15 percent?

"I am also, Mr. Speaker, perplexed that whether the lease rent cap formula is reasonable and correct. Still, under this bill, many of those on fixed incomes will fall between the cracks. Now, the irony is that those estimated 40 percent of 'Mom and Pop' landowners who we were intending to placate are against the bill, and they would be the lessees in this situation who will fall between the cracks.

"In closing, Mr. Speaker, I emphasize that in seeking solutions that will truly help the people of this State, we should proceed carefully. That means knowing all the facts and knowing very clearly who it is that needs and deserves our help. It also means weighing each proposed solution and knowing the ramifications of the solution we decide on. We must study the impact, not only on the big landowners, but also on the little guy. And we must know the legislation that will impact the future as well as the present. I know, Mr. Speaker, we can have a win/win situation, but I have this deep misgivings about whether we understand these implications well enough to pass this bill in good conscience.

"Mr. Speaker, for these reasons, I will be voting no on the bill."

Representative Shon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would hate for those of us in this chamber not to feel the sense of urgency that is felt among many who live in condos in the State, and I would relate one incident that to me brings that very much home.

"In the last election year, as I would stand on the corner of a particular area near a bunch of condos waving signs, every time I stood there, an elderly gentleman would cross the street -- a very busy street -- come up to me and put his hand on my shoulder and say, 'Now you are for mandatory conversion aren't you?' And I would say, 'Yes, sir, I am.' And he would go back across the street and it would be difficult to watch this process because the cars were fast and furious and I always wondered if he would make it across the street. But the next day, he would come back again and he would say, 'We just wanted to make sure that you were for mandatory conversion.' And this went on for literally months and he represented a whole collection of elderly individuals who were extremely anxious, to put it mildly, about this situation about what their lives would be in the future when rents went up, whether or not they would be cast out of their homes. And I think that one of the most important aspects of this, to me, is that this is not an issue merely between one contract party and another. This is in a very human way, an issue between investors and investment and someone's home, and that is why we are here today with a sense of urgency. It is because it is peoples' homes -- their very security of basic needs that is at stake.

"I personally am for mandatory conversion across the board. I introduced a bill as such. I personally have no problem with lease cap rents across the board as in Bill 81. I also don't have any problem with rent control per se. There are condominiums in my district that have single landowners -- they're not small ones, they're very large ones, as a matter of fact. I think of one which has mostly elderly in it. They would not be covered by this bill. I think of many hundreds and hundreds of renters who, by being excluded, yes, their rents may go up with it.

"In spite of this, in spite of the compromises that had been made, I think this is a bill that represents a vehicle, a concept of ideas and a lot of discussion that must go forward. The sense of urgency is there. Peoples' homes are involved. Peoples' sense of security are involved. I would hope that, as this bill goes on, that there would be reconsideration of some of the other ideas. But, nevertheless, this represents a tremendous leap forward from the last year when we were stalemated.

"An earlier speaker noted, 'Oh, maybe we haven't given people enough time to talk,' or 'Oh, there were arbitration sessions and mediation sessions,' and on and on and on. There's been a lot of talk in the past but I only see in this recent months a real dialogue beginning -- a real dialogue between the parties. I think it is very exciting that such a polarizing and difficult issue as this, that we are on the brink of legislation that attempts to meet the needs of many different parties even though, in my view, it's not the bill I would have written.

"I would also like to commend the Chairs of the two committees that did a tremendous amount of work and a lot of the members of those committees who met tirelessly, who went through the bills, who suggested this and that, you know, I have never seen this much true dialogue on this issue since I came into the Legislature. And I think it is commendable to the entire body that we begun to wrestle with this in earnest.

"I urge you all to support this because it is an important and urgent vehicle to keep alive, to keep going, to strengthen, to nurture. We should not put this off for another year.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Amaral then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"As the former Vice Chair of the Housing Committee, it was my honor to be privy to a great deal of discussions two years ago with respect to the issue of mandatory conversion and to go through some very painful times when we were considering bills that at least, in my perspective, appear to be one-sided and unfair. It is with a great deal of pleasure, therefore, that I am finally able to vote in favor of a bill that deals with the issue of leasehold. And the only reason that I am able to vote in favor of this bill is because of the very provisions that have been talked about earlier.

"One of the poignant messages that was brought to the committee, at least as I sat there for two years and now as I sit this year, was the concern from landowners that did not hold great, large tracts of land, that were not part of what was considered to be the oligopoly and the control over land, that were simply people that were connected to the land because their kapuna left their land to them, and they chose to use the land in a way that developers encouraged them to use it. The developers benefited from it and now we're being punished because of that particular usage of land. Therefore, when we included

the exemption of small landowners, as defined in this bill, as only just one parcel of land. My feeling was we were finally beginning to treat people fairly. When we put in the provision that allowed for a three-year occupancy, prior to applying for a lease rent cap for the owner-occupant, I thought finally we're dealing with people that choose to be here, that intend to reside here -- not the speculators, not the investors, not the scammers who are going to make their money off of our land, much the same way we saw them do it with the passage of the Land Reform Act.

"When you saw the inclusion of the provision that the lessor has the option to choose, whether or not to convert or whether to hang on to the land and use it in perpetuity, then finally I knew that those trusts that exist for the benefit of native Hawaiian people was protected -- land to stay in perpetuity.

"Finally, in all good conscience, I could support this measure and I do support this measure. If I have one thing to say about maybe one failure of the bill, perhaps the only failure of the bill, is the lack of proper recognition to land tenure as it exists here in Hawaii to how the Hawaiians valued land, and it was not in terms of the Western concept of money and making money, the lack of recognition perhaps to the spiritual and cultural connections that we have to our land. Perhaps that and only that is the thing that is yet not dealt with in this bill with some fairness. But I hope that as this bill makes it way through, that that kind of language can be reinserted and proper recognition will be given to the fact that we cannot use our continental mentality that we bring with us from continental U.S.A. and apply it to land ownership here where land is finite and limited to this tiny little island here.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Bainum then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this measure. I have extensive written remarks which I ask to be included in the Journal," and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Bainum continued, saying:

"I would like to commend the efforts of Chairs Isbell and Hirono in blending together the different thoughts of views and recommendations, and ideas that came together in this bill.

"I also would like to say that years ago, this body in the State Legislature, addressed the problem for single family homeowners. I believe it is high time that we give the homeowners who live in condominiums the same right.

"This bill is a step in the right direction and I urge your support.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Bainum's remarks are as follows:

"This bill addresses some of the same serious problems encountered by single family lessees prior to the passage of the Land Reform Act of 1967. The purpose of the Land Reform Act was to enable more of Hawaii's citizens to own their own home without fear of eviction. However, this bill is not a mere extension of the Land Reform Act. The Land Reform Act was a mandatory conversion bill which required landowners to sell their land. This bill provides the landowners with the choice between conversion and acceptance of reasonable profits from lease rent caps that are restricted to true owner

occupants with limited incomes. Most of the State's condominium apartments will be unaffected by this bill (This includes the 60-70 percent which are not owner-occupied and 12 percent of owners who will not meet income requirements.) Furthermore, it addresses the concerns of landowners that the apartment owners who convert and the apartment owners who receive a break in their lease rents will make windfall profits by selling their apartments. This bill requires apartment owners to share any such profits from resales with the landowners.

"We need to remind ourselves that these apartment owners, for the most part, were faced with a 'take it or leave it' situation when they first leased their apartments. In many cases, they did not even see the master leases. Many of them were not aware that they would one day be faced with the possibility of surrendering their apartments to the landowners. And neither landowners nor lessees realized that rising land values would far exceed increases in their income leading to such unpredictable lease rent increases.

"Furthermore, many of the apartment owners who did have some understanding of their situation had every reason to believe that their elected officials would help them just as the elected officials before them had helped the single family home owners.

"As I have indicated, this bill does not give apartment owners the same relief that was given to single family home owners. But it does provide relief to those who own no other residential property and who have limited income. For this reason, I urge my colleagues to support this bill."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think, number one, that I want to really thank the Chairman. She has worked very hard; I've known her for many years. She's a tough fighter and she tries her best to make sure that everybody is taken care of.

"However, Mr. Speaker, I think that this bill is going to separate some of the small landowners. It says one parcel and you don't have to worry. We're not talking about heights and size but one parcel. There are some people who have gone in and I guess for financing. They have had to separate the parcel and in one case that I know on the Windward side, they have two condominiums on a split parcel of land. And there's other people in Manoa that have a parcel that could be in trouble. So, they're small landowners; they're not large.

"Representative O'Kieffe said that his people on the Big Island are one parcel but maybe a large parcel of land. So, you own one parcel in Waikiki -- it's still a parcel. It's still left to you -- you still have concerns. It's not going to be easy to say that this person should have more because they live in a particular district so we can't really look at them and they shouldn't have the rights to keep their land.

"Representative Bunda talks about contracts and that's a big factor because Representative Shon says it's not just a contract, it's an investment, and he's right! I've watched people make investments because they are going to get more interest, they were going to do better. That's why they made that investment. And when it failed in banks and other areas, we had to bail them out because they said, that's not fair, so we bailed them out because they made a decision to try to make more money and it goofed. And that was their investment.

"Also, Mr. Speaker, rising costs. I'm not sure if a person is saying, I'm paying \$15 a month on my particular place and now I'm going to be paying \$150. Is that the rising cost? Is that fair? I'm really not sure what some people can afford to pay because I pay that much in tax and I realize that there is a rising cost because we have inflated land costs.

"And, Mr. Speaker, the caps. Does this then mean that some people will say, well, I'm not going to be able to charge what I want to because they're going to cap it. Then I won't put anything into repairs and maintenance, and that could have a real bad factor on that investment that they have. And the bill itself, in areas that say that this pertains to the lessee, you go to the section, it pertains to lessor in one of the areas, and that's why I'm not sure about the bill, and is it where we can fix it up? Is it legal or not, where it says. . .let me find the page. Anyway, it says, pertaining to the lessor, a lessee that they can use alternatives in Section 31, for instance.

"Section 31 is alternatives for lessors to mandatory conversion. It's the wrong section. And there's other flaws in the bill itself. But we are trying, and we are trying to do the best because we are concerned that there's many, many people out there who are going to be hurt. And that's why I'm voting for this particular measure. I'm hoping that all landowners that are small landowners and large landowners are going to be able to come out of this along with the lessees, and that we can get along together without fighting constantly over a contract and who owns what.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tatibouet then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"I feel that the Legislature has, for close to thirty years, had the time to deal with this problem. It was coming inevitably on down the road ever since condominium and cooperative legislation was passed by this body. And I feel that while we can never achieve a totally win/win situation, that this at last is an attempt at perhaps an imperfect solution, but one which comes the closest to which we have been able to find thus far.

"I believe that Chairperson Isbell and Chairperson Hirono and the members of their committees have worked long and hard on this. I've been honored to serve on the Housing Committee and see the kind of effort that the respective chairpersons have made. I feel that this body needs to, at this time, take the bull by the horn, so to speak, and proceed.

"I personally would agree with many arguments that have been made by those speaking both pro and con. I think we share many of the same concerns and our constituents share the concerns as well. But I think we have to put some of these concerns aside and for the future of our citizens, whichever side of the coin they are on, so to speak, we have to proceed with this bill, and I urge my colleagues to vote in favor of it.

"Thank you."

Representative M. Ige then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"First of all, let me recognize the efforts of both Chairs, but also the Representative from Waikiki who made himself available and spent a lot of hours working on this issue with many of the members.

"Mr. Speaker, I consider this as one of my most difficult decisions in my legislative career. On one hand,

we have a handful of landowners who come in year after year to share with us their many sacrifices made to invest in land ownership. Now, with this bill, they are about to see government force them to choose between two poisons.

"On the other hand, we have thousands who have signed the contract to lease and now wanting the government to intervene, allowing them to buy in fee. The right of fee simple ownership by a few versus the right of home ownership by thousands. This bill before us is to have found the delicate balance. Allow me to share just two concerns that I feel are major concerns with this bill.

"This bill does not offer protection to those who need it most. The person who bought a penthouse for \$100,000 ten years ago, now carrying a worth, say \$700,000, and living on fixed income will have no protection. What's going to happen to this individual, or this couple, if they cannot pay the renegotiated lease rent cap? Where will they go? What story will they use? And yet, the very same example a person who bought on the first floor of a condominium ten years ago for \$60,000, whose condominium is now worth \$300,000, who had four CD's worth over \$5-million in the bank and can show income stream, will be protected by this measure. Why? Because it's difficult to address income stream for individuals or couples. I understand that.

"The other concern that I have, Mr. Speaker, is the shared appreciation clause. One interpretation, I believe that at one of the hearing nights, a State official said that if a person gained \$100,000 in profit within two years, that entire amount would go to the land owner. Where's the fairness in that? Why should the lessee end up with nothing when in fact the lessee paid and upkeep the condominium that they had.

"Another interpretation of that exact same shared appreciation clause is that, in fact, a portion of that profit should be shared equally with the landowner and the lessee. Where do we begin to get an idea of what this law really means? Who are we leaving it up to? Why are we neglecting our responsibilities as lawmakers to somebody else? That's our job, Mr. Speaker.

"I know you heard it before but I truly believe we need more time. We have identified the major issues and I am confident that with time, we will be able to crack a measure that will be fair to both parties.

"My last thought. To the small landowners who have only one building on one parcel of land -- sleep not, rest not, you are exempted from this bill. But believe me, come next year, it will be your turn.

"Thank you."

Representative Kawakami then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, members of the House, I rise to speak in opposition to House Bill 1982.

"There were two strong beliefs in my family which were instilled by my parents when I was very young. First of all, it was to pay the taxes on the aina and never sell it. Secondly, get an education, no matter how much it costs. And I am a progeny of these beliefs.

"There were many days when we struggled to survive, when we labored long and hard to harvest the fruits of our acreage, to pay taxes, and it was not unusual to go to bed hungry -- just to pay the taxes on our aina!

"And those truths are not just for my family but for many of our small landowners as well. They endured

these hardships. They struggled, they saved, and they worked the land. And many decided to improve their parcels, then rent it or lease the land to afford to send their children through college, and now, they just want to realize the rewards of their deferred gratification, their long-range planning, and arduously long hours of toil.

"Mr. Speaker, I don't feel that any landowner should be put under the gun. House Bill 1982 is unjust in that it forces a landowner to sell his land to another who thinks it is his right to own a piece of Hawaii by breaking the contract which he signed and understood. These contracts which I speak of were agreed by both parties mutually -- in good faith -- and they are illegal and they are binding, and they should be enforced.

"While I commend both Chairs -- Hirono and Isbell -- for trying to be everything to everyone, I have many problems with this bill for I feel that it will cause more problems down the road. And many of those problems were in many areas of the bill that I am also against which were mentioned by colleagues so I will not reiterate again. But for my perspective, I feel it is an unfair measure to the landowner.

"Many new people to these islands approach land issues with a western concept that was mentioned, that land exists only to be bought and sold. The Hawaiians, on the other hand, see their world as comprised of warm, conscious beings who provide guidance and reassurance, and by being in harmony with the nature that surrounds them, they experience fulfillment and a sense of belonging. Our State motto -- Ua-Mau-Ke-Ea-O-Ka-Aina-I-Ka-Pono -- commonly is translated to mean, The Life of the Land is Perpetuated in Righteousness. And to those of us who treasure our land, like we treasure our existence, that motto means the life force of the land on which our own life depends continues when things are properly ordered, correct and just.

"I say, let's use what we have learned, that we have labored over in committees, in small conferences, to dialogue more during the interim, and make it a truly win/win situation. I think there are many flaws and I think we have a good beginning but let's work more on it.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kanoho then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Before expressing my reasons for opposing this measure, Mr. Speaker, I want to acknowledge the Committee Chairs because they did work long and hard and spent much time and I believe were honest and sincere and did make concessions to address this long-standing, very controversial and sensitive issue. Most of my sentiments have been expressed by those who spoke before me in opposition to this bill so I will try not to be redundant. However, there are some points which need some additional emphasis and I want to touch upon some factors not before discussed.

"My first concern, Mr. Speaker and fellow members, focuses on the right of property ownership. I believe we all believe in the right of property ownership because it is a pillar of our free enterprise system which has made the United States the greatest nation in this whole world. The right of property ownership -- to own our own homes, to have ownership of the roof above our heads, to have ownership of the land on which our homes sit, and to walk on that land -- is the most desired goal.

"Mr. Speaker, how ironic it is that the proponents of this bill would now, as in the past, think nothing about

taking someone else's right of property ownership to satisfy their own desires. To force someone else against their will to relinquish that right, to force someone else against their will to break a valid contract between property owner and renter, to void a contract between lessor and lessee, to forcibly take from one that is legitimately owned by that person to give to another -- this is simply not right. And now through this bill, this Legislature continues to insist in effecting this injustice. It's wrong, it's unconscionable.

"I know that the bill indicates that this is voluntary conversion, but the bill states that HFDC for units that petition for conversion for acquisition shall acquire leased fee interest in the units through the power of eminent domain or by purchase under the threat of eminent domain, and that doesn't sound like voluntary conversion to me.

"The bill expounds on the great opportunity to provide land ownership, but by taking land from another? Are we really serious in providing land ownership to the people? Rather than taking it from a private entity, shouldn't we consider State-owned lands.

You're familiar with the figures. There are 4,112,388 acres of land in this great State. 1.5 million or nearly 36 percent of that land is owned by the State; 410,000 or 10 percent by the federal government; and by comparison, the largest private owner -- Bishop Estate -- owns 350,000 acres or 8.51 percent. Why don't we consider State lands. You're familiar with these set of figures as well, that 1.96 million acres are in ag lands. Another 1.6 in conservation, and only 178,000 zoned for urban.

"Those who are proponents of this bill, if you are truly serious about providing opportunity for land ownership, these are the areas to focus your efforts, our efforts -- on State-owned agricultural lands.

"Mr. Speaker, the bill rightfully acknowledges and credits three Hawaiian Trusts -- Bishop Estate to meet the educational needs of Hawaiian children; the Lunalilo Trust to care for the poor, the destitute, the infirmed and especially the aged of Hawaiian blood; and the Liliuokalani Trust for the benefit of orphans and other destitute children of all races but with preference to Hawaiians. Despite this recognition of the beneficial actions of these Trusts, this bill, we feel, would have negative impacts on the last of these viable Hawaiian trusts -- the Bishop Estate. For example, Mr. Speaker, there were 140,000 acres in the Lunalilo Trust when it was founded first in 1871. Sadly, tragically, all that remains today of that 140,000 acres in the Lunalilo Trust is less than one acre -- 18,000 square feet in Kona valued at \$150,000, and 6,000 feet on Oahu valued at \$75,000. All that remains of that original 140,000 acres equate to 6,020,000,000 square feet. I have no idea what the value was at that time nor what the value would be today. But I can assure you it would have represented a substantial amount. My heart, especially being Hawaiian, weeps at that tragedy. With regard to today's current value of that Trust, about the only value that it has is the 7.9 acres which is conveyed to the Trust is Lunalilo Home Road, through legislative action, and is probably worth about \$8.8-million. But let me state very clearly that the lands which were lost by the Lunalilo Trust were not materially impacted by the mandatory conversion process, except for a few acres in recent years.

"We don't need any help in losing our lands. We have learned very painfully that it is the loss of our lands to any reason that the viability of our trusts can be diminished, perhaps destroyed.

"It is for all these reasons and those mentioned by others before me that I oppose this bill.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Ward then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I've been waiting for Representative Peters to speak because I kind of geared my remarks around his and I was going to say something about, you know, what's best for Bishop Estate is not best for the State of Hawaii. This is a 900-acre argument. They've got 350,000 acres. I can't say that so I won't, Mr. Speaker.

"But let me start out with a quote from Representative Abercrombie who was a part of this body who feels very strongly about this bill. If he was here, he would say that this bill is a good bill because it is fair and it is equitable and it's just, not only for now, but for the future. It is fair now because it settles or tries to settle the lives of 100,000 condominium dwellers. There's 100,000 people out there, people. 300,000 of them live in houses -- single family dwellings -- 100,000 live in condominiums.

"This bill gives them an option to either buy their condominium or have a lease cap. Some in the Hawaii Kai area have \$33 a month -- very little, very small monthly rent. The renegotiation letters that have come to some townhouses has gone as high as \$1,200. Old people on fixed incomes cannot survive on that. It gives an option of land ownership in fee ownership -- very important thing that we need now.

"This bill addresses the future of Hawaii, not only because my district is high in condominiums, but all of you in the future are going to have condominiums in your district. How are we as a body going to keep Hawaii unique? How are we going to keep it in open space? That is something that we have pledged to protect in the Constitution. As we house our people, we have only one option, and that's to go up in the air. The future of Hawaii is up in the air. Singapore is an example with three times the population, half the land mass. Condominiums and townhouses have solved their housing population and inevitably, Mr. Speaker, this State would go that same route.

"Some previous speakers have said, well, we need more time. Well, I think the Lieutenant Governor has summarized that by saying, 'All the arguments that you've heard against lease to fee conversion were basically said when the single-family conversion came up.' That's really when the humans cried. That's when thousands of acres went out of small and large landowners -- thousands of acres! This is a 900-acre argument. This is two Diamond Heads! But it's 100,000 people they're going to be affected by, so time to study and to rethink and to dialogue, I think, has been beyond us -- it has passed us.

"If you look at the system and its historical origins, and I passed out a summary of that research to you, that basically says that kingdoms and feudal societies had leasehold conversion. You use it and then you give it back. And what we're asking those 100,000 dwellers out there in condos and townhouses, is you pay the \$100,000 or \$200,000 and now you've got to give it back. The surrender clause is what this body has to get behind it. We have to get beyond the leasehold landholding system. To buy something and then give it back to the landowner is inherently unjust and unfair.

"This bill would put us closer to the contemporary landholding system, and in all due respect for the

Hawaiians and the kapuna system, today is the system where leasehold is not in the contemporary setting.

"So, Mr. Speaker, I contend that the future of Hawaii and the present is being served by this bill, and the future of Hawaii is up in the air.

"Thank you."

Representative Tom then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, it is with a very heavy heart that I stand here today before you to speak in opposition to a bill which purportedly seeks to benefit owner-occupant lessees of condominiums and other multi-family projects.

"Before I start, I want to say very personally -- I want to say very personally to Virginia and to Mazie, Representatives Isbell and Hirono -- you've made a real terrific start. And I mean that when I say that. The bill -- you put a lot of work in it and I do appreciate the work that you put in, and I know many lessees do.

"Mr. Speaker, I represent many lessees who live in my district, whose dream is to own their own homes in fee simple. That is to say that many of my constituents who are lessees want to own a piece of the rock and very candidly, Mr. Speaker, I don't blame them. You see, for me as a former lessee myself, I always recall the day when I converted my home from lease to fee. My dream became reality because of patience, negotiation and parties willing to reach a fair agreement.

"However, as a legislator, common sense, fairness and logic must accompany emotions and dreams. As a legislator, I must and I am compelled to consider this bill as I would any other piece of legislation. I have a duty to examine each proposal that is before me and ask myself, is it fair? Does the legislation cure the social problem being addressed? Will passing a bill create bigger problems? Does it serve to balance and protect the various and sometimes competing interests of all concerned parties? It is not a matter of mere numbers, Mr. Speaker. It is not a matter of which sides has more supporters for you see, if mere numbers was the deciding factor, then making decisions would be very easy and very simple.

"My philosophy has always been -- we must do what is right and equitable, not what is convenient and popular.

"House Bill 1982, HD 1, although with good intended purpose, is in reality, flawed with confusion, filled with wordiness, and with formulas and rhetoric which boggles even the most meaningful and open minds. I ask my fellow colleagues tonight, in considering the passage of this bill, how many of us read this bill in its entirety? And more importantly, how many of us really understand and appreciate what it is saying? How many of us really know its true and lasting impact on lessees as well as lessors. Many see this bill as a quick-fix because conversion or establishing a cap on lease rent would solve the leasehold problem. I don't agree.

"First, through the power of eminent domain, a lessee may purchase the leased fee interest in the subject property. You know, when I went to law school -- that was many years ago -- one of the first lessons I learned was that contracts between two or more consenting individuals was very sacred and should not be breached. A handshake, a verbal agreement, a written document, all add up to the same result and we share them here -- in this very building. Relationships and trust among human beings, a lease agreement between a lessor and a lessee is

also a living and valid contract. Now, we are told that it's okay to walk away from it midstream.

"This bill specifically states, and I quote: 'Any provision in any lease or contract contrary to the intent or purpose of this chapter is void.' Voidness in this bill also applies to trusts and estates. But to further complicate matters, this bill also mandates another option -- setting a cap on lease rent. You know, personally I have no problem with this solution so long as the cap is a fair one, an equitable one -- an equitable ceiling for the lessor as well as the lessee. For the lessor, it is only fair that he receives an equitable return on his investment. For the lessee who, on many cases, is on a fixed income and calls his land his home. It is unconscionable for that lessee to have to abandon his home merely because he cannot afford a fair lease rent. This bill closes its eyes to the real issue of fairness and affordability.

"I have always advocated, Mr. Speaker, the establishment of a lessee trust fund to assist lessees who cannot afford to pay a fair lease rent. That is the fair solution to address our dilemma of being fair to our lessors and lessees.

"Under this bill, what does it mean when it says, and I quote: 'For condominium with appraised values of less than 150 percent of the average of the preceding three month's median sales price for planned unit development units, lease rents are not to exceed the greater of either of the following:' and it goes on and on and on.

"The bill addresses appraised values of less than 150 percent, appraised values of greater than or equal to 150 percent but less than 175 percent, 175 percent but less than 200 percent, and again it goes on and on.

"The bill also relies on figures contained in the Multiple Listing Service at arriving at a fair cap. But how fair of an indication is the MLS for the benefit of lessees as well as lessors?

"The bill also states that at the end of the lease term, as one avenue, lessors and lessees agree, and this is what we've been talking about all night, and it's there. But it says here in the language, 'that both parties agree to an arrangement that is mutually agreeable to the qualifying lessee.' I ask you -- fair to who?

"I am always going to support legislation as long as I am here -- legislation that would seek to address the concerns of all parties, not just one, but all. Does this bill do that?

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Peters then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Obviously you know where I stand on this matter. I think I've made some comments in the past, saying that we as Hawaiians shouldn't be apologizing for being here first. Some of you can go back to your country. This is the Hawaiian's country. We were a nation before the overthrow of our Queen, before annexation, before the Great Mahele. And you know when I talk about the history, there are some who think I am a racist. Well, I guess we gotta live with all the opala, whatever that concept and that perception may be.

"As you know, I, and many others in this community consider this bill to be the next, in a continuing series of steps, to systematically deprive native Hawaiians of their cultural birthright and their constitutional privilege to hold property. I have made it no secret that I personally regard all of these past and present attempts to take our

land as nothing more than stealing. And I know that word has made some in our community feel rather uncomfortable. Stealing!

"Since I have not detected any sense of remorse or hesitation in the efforts of those who press for more of this type of legalized larceny, I can only conclude that their discomfort must arise from a preference to commit these flaps -- stealing -- under the friendlier, more socially acceptable shrouds of land reform, or leasehold conversion. Call it what you will. It has always been, is now, and always will be nothing more than stealing our land and our rights.

"Mr. Speaker, I have a whole slew of observations to share but I guess I will deviate a little bit and not bore you with some of the stats.

"Representative Tom talks about the flaws and the inconsistencies of this bill. I recall, at the Democratic Convention, the coalition -- the Hawaiians -- finally got to the table and they worked out language that basically stated that both sides of this issue should be fairly dealt with. Evidently, the titular head of our Party doesn't understand the word 'fairness,' by virtue of bringing down 1058. And perhaps some of us here have forgotten the meaning of fairness by including the findings, by including the different provisions and sections of this same bill into 1982.

"You know what a leasehold is and whose interest it is? How about a leased fee interest? You know anything about 516 -- the infamous land reform bill? Again, stealing. But enough innuendos. Let's get down to facts. For the record, tax map key -- okay? Let me show you what 516 has done. Tax map key, and I've got a whole slew of them here, 35007-036. We were mandated to sell to this lessee this parcel of land in 1981. He had bought the lease for \$380,000. The same year we were forced to sell him our lease fee interest, by the way, the same terminology that's been used in this bill, for \$75,290. And collectively, his total investment came out to \$455,290. In four years, he sold it for \$4.3-million -- a profit of \$3.8-million. We should be proud of ourselves. It certainly is the land of opportunity, but on whose back? Are we proud that we became millionaires on the backs of lessors? On the backs of Hawaiians? It gets better. Tax map key 35008-010. This person bought from us this land for \$127,900. He bought the lease at \$215,000 with a total investment of \$342,900. Two years later, he sold it for \$1.8-million, a holding period of 1.5 years. Tax map key 35025-018. This person bought from us the lease fee interest of \$101,678. He paid for his lease \$127,500. When you total both of that together, he spent \$229,178, total investment. That same day, in back-to-back escrow, same day that he bought from us, he sold the unit for \$1,150,000 -- a holding period of zero, and he made \$920,822. Now, I can go on and on, entering into the record all of these transactions that have occurred. Here's one, right on Kahala Avenue, on the beach. Tax map key 35059-011. He bought the lease for \$975,000. He bought the lease fee interest from us for \$1,365,191, for a total investment of \$2.3-million. Then he sold that the same day, same day, for \$21-million. . .

At this point, Representative O'Kieffe rose on a point of order and notified the Chair that the ten minutes was up, and "we'd like to know what section of the bill he's referring to."

Representative Say rose and yielded his ten minutes to Representative Peters.

Asked by the Chair to "proceed," Representative Peters continued, saying:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

"In reference to the Minority Floor Leader's remarks, I am addressing the issue as is stated on Page 3 of House Bill 1982, HD 1: 'The Legislature declares that this Act serves the following public purposes: . . . (3) Extending the reach of the policies identified in and furthered by chapter 516.'

"These are all transactions, not innuendos -- facts that have occurred under 516. Are you proud? Why not? And you wonder why we have bills relating to reforms in the way we do business.

"Let's start off with legislative findings or even the committee report. How many of you can say that you've been party to and you put the words together for the legislative findings? I saw one that I liked. Representative Amaral who talked about our history -- something that people hesitate talking about or even teaching, for that matter. I like that but you manipulated that to fit your means. Same ends -- to steal.

"I resented the remarks made by the Chair of Housing who indicated that we did not sit down with lessees, that we do not honor the 'hoo pono' process. I take very, very strong exception to that. You want to talk about Sandalwood? That seems to be the item for the condominium that basically has come to the forefront. We bought the lessees position on that. It was their Board of Directors who came out with the figures and we bought it! Seventeen percent decided not to sign. Everyone of those individuals had lessees receive letters from us. We pointed very clearly that if they had any financial difficulties in meeting this figure and they needed help, that all they had to do was come in and we would try to work it out. Granted, we're not using the same formula here. It doesn't address the issue of affordability.

"Representative M. Ige's remarks are very astute and to the point. Who are we taking care of? Those individuals on fixed income? Those in need? Come on, show me. Show me in this bill where there is an income criteria. Show me! You can't find it! Representative Duldulao's observations are accurate in that sense. Who do you think you're kidding? We wanted to help, we wanted to be the responsible entities to society. Like Representative Tom says, those are realities out there. You got more lessees than lessors in the world. You got more employees than employers in the world. So what? Are we going to lean on the side of numbers and noises as opposed to being fair? Well, I guess you didn't have a lessor in the House before -- now you do.

"This bill isn't fair. It doesn't address the real issues out there. We recognize there are some who are on fixed income and who want help. And all we're saying is, fine. Those are the kinds of people that we want to help. This bill does very little, if anything, probably nothing for them. There is no income criteria here. It is based on the value of your condominium. It has nothing to do with whether you are on fixed income and whether you are in need -- nothing! So, who's kidding who?

"Lease fee values -- it's clear by this tax map keys and transactions in real estates that have occurred by virtue of selling their interest. These are owner-occupants, by the way. Some of them no longer live here. They made their money and ran. They left us the high prices. That's what 516 has done. It has exacerbated the problem. It has not solved anything. Why? Because our qualifications under this leaves the same kind of loopholes that 516 left. The person can hide all of his landholdings in a land trust, corporation or partnership. Why can't we plug those holes? Stealing! Lease capping is stealing.

"You want to talk about rent control? We have controlled our rents for thirty years. We have capped it for thirty years and we get penalized for it. You want to cap and help those who are needy? Why don't you cap their utility bills? Why don't you cap their maintenance costs?"

At this point, Representative O'Kieffe rose on a point of order and notified the Chair that Representative Peter's ten minutes was up.

Representative Okamura then rose and yielded his ten minutes to Representative Peters.

Asked by the Chair to "proceed," Representative Peters continued his remarks, saying:

"Thank you, Representative Okamura.

"If we are going to be fair, let's look at everything. You can't say that lease rents are the only problems that these people face. Everything else has gone up. Property taxes have exceeded 1000 percent. When you talk about 1000 percent, you mention that in this bill. You know, I don't know what you're trying to prove but if you go from a dollar to ten dollars, that's a thousand percent. Ten dollars to a hundred dollars -- that's a thousand percent. What's so onerous about that when everything else is going through the ceiling? Real estate values have exceeded 1500 percent and by virtue of these examples, it has gone through the ceiling -- even greater than that. But again, you want to penalize the very people who have allowed for affordable housing in Hawaii, and that's the big landowners and the small landowners. Why are we being picked on? Why are we being ripped off? Because our numbers aren't as great as the lessees out there?

"Mr. Speaker, obviously I can go on and on but I think I will end by simply sharing with you an observation, if I can find it. (Probably the Chairman of Finance hid it. He does that quite often to me.) You know, I got this from some individual who serves as a Senator now across the way. I recall taking him and a number of other individuals when I was Speaker to Washington, D.C. and was impressed by that process and by what he saw there. He came back with a plaque and this is something I want to share with all of you as we deliberate over this issue, and I quote: 'The greatest danger to liberty lurks in the insidious encroachment by men and women of zeal -- well meaning without understanding.'

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At 7:15 o'clock p.m., Representative Bunda asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 7:17 o'clock p.m.

The Chair then stated:

"I believe we've had a lot of discussion on this bill. I have allowed all of the members of this House to have their input and I believe we're ready to take the vote on this bill."

Representative Hirono then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"As you indicated, Mr. Speaker, we've had a lot of debate on this issue and clearly this is a very difficult issue. Your Committees on Housing and CPC have had hearings on this measure, or this type of measure, for every year for the past eight years. Clearly, this is not a

bill about numbers because if it were so, a bill like this would have passed many years ago.

"I would like to thank the Chair of the Housing Committee, Representative Isbell, for her leadership, perseverance, and fairness in shepherding this bill. I would also like to thank the members of her committee who took the time to put their heads together, to come up with this bill.

"I would also like to thank all the people who provided their input, both pro and con. In particular, I would like to thank Representative Peters because we have heard him over these years and we know that his feelings on this issue are heartfelt.

"Clearly, there are right-minded people on both sides of this issue. However, the road that brought us to this path has been long and hard, and this is a bill that represents an attempt on our part to fairly deal with an issue that has so divided the Legislature and this community for so many years.

"I encourage my colleagues to support this measure."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1982, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REAL PROPERTY LEASES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 39 ayes to 12 noes, with Representatives Bellinger, Bunda, Duldulao, M. Ige, Kanoho, Kawakami, Lee, Peters, Say, Tam, Tom and Yoshimura voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 1982 had passed Third Reading at 7:20 o'clock p.m.
