INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS (FLOOR PRESENTATIONS)

H.R. No. 451, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION COMMENDING MARIANITA LOPEZ FOR HER OUTSTANDING PRO BONO LEGAL SERVICES FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE PEOPLE OF HAWAII," was jointly offered by Representatives Santiago, Hirono and Morihara.

On motion by Representative Santiago, seconded by Representative Hirono and carried, H.R. No. 451 was adopted.

Representative Santiago rose and proceeded to introduce the honoree, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, it's with great pride and honor that I present to all of you today, Marianita Lopez.

"I first want to talk about when I met Marianita ten years ago. Marianita was a guardian ad litem at that time and we worked on some Protective Services cases in Family Court. It was during that time that I really grew to know and understand the caring and the experience and the expertise that this individual showed in her work with those cases at Family Court then. We lost track of each other for a few years and we both turned up out on the North Shore.

"When I was running for office, I found out that I had a constituent and friend in Marianita, and she continued tirelessly in the community. No wonder when I was looking through the award that was being handed out by the Hawaii Lawyers Care, that her name showed up as the individual lawyer who accepted every pro bono case and did so more than any other lawyer in the State.

"I wanted to commend her and the 750 other volunteer attorneys who put forth their time, free of charge, to those who couldn't afford their services otherwise, and I also wanted to commend the Hawaii Lawyers Care for providing this service and putting this forth, that it was started in 1991.

"At this time, I would like to introduce to all of you -- Miss Marianita Lopez."

Miss Marianita Lopez then rose to be recognized.

Representative Santiago then asked the following persons who accompanied Miss Lopez to stand to be recognized: Mr. Paul Saccoccio, her husband and partner in their law firm, Saccoccio & Lopez, who was seated on the House floor; Ms. Sheryl Nicholson, President of the Hawaii Lawyers Care; and Mr. Tom Stirling, President-elect of the Hawaii Lawyers Care, who were seated in the gallery.

Representative Hirono then rose and stated:

"On behalf of the attorneys in the House, I would like to thank Representative Santiago for bringing this resolution to the floor and honoring a member of a very besieged and beleaguered profession. In fact, the attorneys are such an under-appreciated profession that

even when they do work for free, we call it pro bono so that nobody understands what the heck we're talking about. It is a very high pressure profession to be in, and I did that for several years myself and so, under the circumstances, it is really asking a lot that these seven hundred or so attorneys have given of their time -- free -- and when you think of how much attorneys get by the hour, you know, it's just a little more than plumbers, so that's a lot of money that they are giving up in pro bono services to people who otherwise would not get the kind of representation that they need.

"I would also like to mention that about 75 percent of the pro bono work need is in the area of divorce and Family Court work. As we discuss the fate of Family Court and their move to Kapolei, I just wanted to mention that because the move of the Family Court to Kapolei could really have a negative impact on the ability of the Hawaii Lawyers Care to recruit the hundreds of attorneys that do pro bono work in this area, I hope that we keep that in mind as we continue our discussions on the Family Court issue.

"Again, I'd like to commend Marianita for all the work that she has done and all of the other attorneys who have given so much of their time. I just wish that the other four thousand or so attorneys in the Bar could be as public-minded as our honoree this morning.

"Thank you."

Representative Santiago presented Ms. Lopez with a Certificate of Recognition and a floral lei, and orchid leis were presented to the others by Representatives Hirono and Hiraki.

We want to congratulate you and thank you for bringing honor to Hawaii. Thank you, Coach Tony Sellitto and your players.

"What is important about this accomplishment again illustrates what institutions are all about. Institutions are not buildings -- institutions are made of people. The Legislature is not that beautiful building over there. It's all of us over here, all the staff, and all the voters and all the public that participate in the process. A university is not a collection of buildings. It is composed of good teachers, good students, and excellent leadership.

"In the case of the basketball team, Hawaii Pacific does not have a gym. It does not have fancy cars, fancy uniforms ... what it's got is a great coach, great players, and they have heart, commitment, and they went out and they won the national championship for small colleges in the whole United States because they had that commitment, that heart, and that great ability to proceed.

"Let us also recognize that this occasion is also a recognition of a very historic merger between Hawaii Loa College and Hawaii Pacific University. This strengthens Hawaii Pacific University as the leading private institution in the State of Hawaii. It has an enrollment of more than seven thousand students. It's a first choice among most people in Honolulu for a private education. It provides a type of education, that type of flexibility that is sorely lacking in Honolulu. We wish it good and well, not only in academics, but also in their athletic program which they have done so well.

"At this point, let me also note that a women's basketball team did exceedingly well in the last few years, and we were very pleased that all of this was accomplished by great coaches -- Tony Sellitto for the men, and Ms. Brown for the women's basketball team.

"Without further ado, I would like to introduce the honorees today.

"First of all, there is someone here who has really made a commitment to Hawaii, and we love you for that, Tony," and introduced Head Coach Tony Sellitto and asked him to stand to be recognized.

"Let me add that Tony has appeared in his unique uniform which he has declined to do so on national television, and we respect you for your commitment to the people of Hawaii. Thank you, Tony."

"Our next honoree is someone we are very proud of. He made the All-American First Team," and asked Roger Huggins to stand to be recognized.

"We also have James Williams, who is the first player recruited by Coach Sellitto," and asked James Williams to stand to be recognized.

"Our fourth honoree is Andy Gardiner, who comes from Hawaii Loa,' and asked Andy Gardiner to stand to be recognized.

"And we now have the Most Valuable Player of the Tournament, the player that won or made the major contribution towards winning the tournament," and asked Lemar Young to stand to be recognized.

"We would also like to recognize two other players who could not be here today because of class schedules -- Michael Johnson, was the high scorer in the championship game, and David Smith was another high scorer and made the All-American Second Team."

Representative Lee then asked the following honorees, who were seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized: Assistant Coach Russell Dung; Neil Morfitt, Sports Information Director; Misho Ognjanovic, Casey Hines, Miko Ajanovic and Brendan Murphy, team members.

Representative Lee then noted for the record that "Mike McDaniel could not be present and neither could Shane Takeshita, who I think comes from Pearl City."

Representative Nekoba then rose and stated:

"One thing that does strikes me ... boy, these guys are tall!

"I want to congratulate you also, gentlemen, on your accomplishment. Everyone has followed, over the years, how you very quietly but very effectively built a program in basketball that is second to none in Hawaii and now it's second to no one in the nation, as far as we're concerned.

"Congratulations, Coach Sellitto, congratulations, players. They have a truly cosmopolitan team -- they have people from all over the world on this tean -- and it's really exciting, and I think we're going to expect even bigger things from you guys next year so you better watch out.

"Thank you again, very much, for bringing us so much pride.

"Thank you."

Representative Young then rose and stated:

"As an adjunct professor at Hawaii Pacific University for the past five years, I'm really pleased to extend my congratulations to all of you today.

"I've watched Hawaii Pacific grow to seven thousand students over the many years that I've been there and was really delighted at the recent merger between Hawaii Pacific and Hawaii Loa. I think it brought out the best of both academically, and certainly now we see that it brought out the best of both athletically.

"I'd also like to extend the congratulations of my husband, Dr. Everett Kleinjans, who is a professor of humanities at Hawaii Pacific University. Some of you may know him because you've been in his classes. My husband is six feet three, was an all-star basketball player for Michigan way back when, and believe it or not, he even played against the Harlem Globetrotters. So I know he'd be pleased to extend his congratulations for capping a wonderful dream season.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Bainum then rose and stated:

"I would like to extend my congratulations to the team. My wife is attending classes at HPU and she is in several classes with several of the players. My wife who has never once shown any interest in basketball, or sports for that matter, a couple of weeks ago, when you were in the tournament, became the most rabid sports fan I've ever seen.

"For that, I thank you, and I think all of Hawaii rejoice with your victory, and we enjoyed your triumphs.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"As a part-time faculty member at HPU who teaches in the MBA course, I am honored to be able to salute the national champions before us. But the question is ... how can they do it? HPU doesn't even have a gymnasium. I didn't know that. That's amazing! Doesn't even have a gymnasium and they get to be national champions.

"Also, the question is ... how can a place that was just, ten years ago, a couple of classrooms now have eight thousand students?

"Another question ... how can such people as Miss America, Carolyn Sapp, also come from the halls of HPU?

"How about Akebono -- international yokozuna? He came to HPU after going to Kaiser.

"How do they do this? How could it be possible?

"I think the answer is in the character of the coach and the individuals standing before us -- strong, determined, hardworking athletes who love academics and I know love entrepreneurship, the will to succeed, to move on, to go beyond what otherwise your circumstances and your physical surroundings dictate.

"Small HPU has done great things for small Hawaii. We're really proud of you. We commend you for bringing us these national honors and keep up the good work!

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Alcon then rose and stated:

"I would like to add my congratulations to the basketball team of HPU. I am not a faculty there but I might be a student, but then I had to think twice when Representative Ward said that he is teaching in that school. I wouldn't mind attending Representative Young's class because I think she'll pass me even if I'm flunking.

"Mr. Speaker, I think Representative Lee hit it right on the head when he said that you don't need massive buildings and massive arenas to become nationally recognized. So, at this point, Mr. Speaker, I think we have saved over one hundred million dollars by forgetting about the arena at the University and forgetting about the twin tower at McKinley.

"Thank you very much."

Certificates of Recognition and orchid leis were presented to Head Coach Tony Sellitto and to the members of the team by Representatives Baker, Lee, Nekoba, Young, Duldulao, Isbell, Chun and Beirne.

As you heard in the resolution, this Club was founded in 1918 by none other than Prince Kuhio and a group of promiment Hawaiians, and is the predecessor of the forty or more clubs that followed.

"There are clubs throughout the State, and in 1959 an association was formed with the councils from each island. Clubs on the mainland were chartered as a district council in 1989, and now there are chapters in California, Utah, Colorado, Nevada and Alaska. There has also been interest expressed from native Hawaiians in Oregon, Washington State, Washington, D.C., Texas and Florida, and it is expected that more mainland clubs will be chartered when the civic clubs meet at convention in Las Vegas later this year.

"For your information, Mr. Speaker, in tribute to the 'United Nation's Year of the World's Indigenous People' and the centennial of the overthrow of the kingdom of Hawaii, American Indian nations have been invited to the convention, and opening ceremonies will be held on the Paiute Reservation led by Paiute elders and Hawaiian kupunas. We expect a wonderful meeting between native Americans of the continent and of the Paficic.

"Before the existence of the numerous Hawaiian organizations that now help Hawaiians, the civic clubs made education a priority for Hawaiian youth, and literally provided hundreds of thousands of dollars in scholarships. The Hawaiian Civic Club of Honolulu has continued to be the leader in this effort, setting a high standard of achievement for all other clubs to follow.

"So I would like to introduce to all of you those people that are seated on the floor. I need to give you some information before I ask them to rise.

"Seated closest to you, Mr. Speaker, in this Diamond Jubilee Year, is the President of the Hawaiian Civic Club of Honolulu, Ms. Leimomi Suinn Khan. I have had the pleasure of working with Leimomi on several committees, and I know that under her leadership, her club will thrive and prosper," and asked Ms. Khan to stand to be recognized.

"With Leimomi today is Lisa Halani Berard, a civic club scholarship recipient, who was named as Hawaii's Outstanding First-Year Secondary School Teacher of 1992 by a national panel from the American Association of School Administrators. Halani was nominated by the Hawaii School District, and is here because she personifies the finest of our young Hawaiians. Mr. Speaker, this is a scholarship recipient who is giving back to her people. She now teaches at Nanakuli High and Intermediate School where the majority of the students are of Hawaiian ancestry. She requested to teach there after being educated on the mainland and, in her first year, has been an inspirational role model to the students," and asked Lisa Halani Berard to stand to be recognized.

"Also joining us is Mr. Bruce Keppeler. Mr. Keppeler is known and loved by all of us. He is the President of the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs, a good friend, and an excellent leader," and asked Mr. Bruce Keppeler to stand to be recognized.

"In the gallery, Mr. Speaker, Leimomi Khan has brought members of her Board of Directors and her club, and presidents and members of other clubs on Oahu," and asked all of them to stand to be recognized.

Representative Amaral continued:

"Following the session, the civic clubs would like to invite all of the members to join us for a short reception in Room 802."

Representative Beirne then rose to congratulate the Hawaiian Civic Club of Honolulu on the occasion of its 75th anniversary of its founding and to bid aloha to President Leimomi Kahn.

"The Hawaiian Civic Club of Honolulu holds an annual Holoku Ball and the proceeds from this function go towards scholarships for students of Hawaiian ancestry. In addition, they support the functions and events of the Oahu Council and the association of other clubs.

"Since 1918, when Prince Jonah Kalanianaole Kuhio founded the first club, the Hawaiian Civic Club movement has grown to include clubs in the farthest reaches of the

State, from Kohala and Kau in Hawaii, to Hanalei and Kekaha on Kauai. All of these civic clubs support scholarship funds for Hawaiian students. In addition, there are strong clubs spreading Hawaiian culture and discussing Hawaiian issues in six other states and there will probably be more clubs established in the next few years as transplanted Hawaiians begin to take up the message of sovereignty. They are quite aware that the votes of congregational members in their states will be important when critical decisions are made.

"With Leimomi Kahn today is a beautiful, talented young native Hawaiian woman who I am proud to introduce. Lisa Halani Berard was born, raised and educated in California. Halani is a civic club member who received financial aid from the civic clubs to assist her with college. She has a master's degree in education from the University of California at Los Angeles, and chose to come home to Hawaii to share her teaching talents. Halani Berard is an outstanding language arts teacher at Nanakuli Intermediate School. She has taken an active role in teaching, motivating, inspiring and uplifting the students at Nanakuli Intermediate School.

"Madam Berard was responsible for the development of the Hokuleia navigation curriculum presently utilized by the Department of Education. Last year, Madam Berard taught the Hokuleia navigation curriculum to over three hundred teachers statewide. In 1992, Madam Berard earned the Sally May National Excellence in Teaching Scholarship Award for one thousand dollars as the Outstanding First-Year Secondary School Teacher. All of that money was donated to her family on Kauai whose home was badly damaged by Hurricane Iniki. Madam Berard's multi-talented spirit is indeed an asset to our native Hawaiian people, and I am proud of her continued commitment toward educating the youth of Hawaii Nei.

"As a native Hawaiian, I thank you, Mr. Speaker, for this opportunity to express my manao and to my colleagues.

"Thank you."

Representative Amaral presented the Certificates of Recognition to Ms. Leimomi Suinn Khan and Ms. Lisa Halani Berard, and Representatives Kawakami, Kanoho and Bainum presented the honorees with floral leis.

H.R. No. 454, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING FOODLAND SUPER MARKET. LTD., DATA-1, THE IBM CORPORATION, AND SAFEWAY STORES FOR THEIR PROGRAMS TO DONATE COMPUTERS TO HAWAII'S SCHOOLS," was jointly offered by Representatives Arakaki, D. Ige, Chumbley, Stegmaier, Lee, Taniguchi, Takumi, Apo, Hagino, Duldulao, Isbell, Shon, Beirne, O'Kieffe, Yonamine, M. Ige, Amaral, Chun, Ihara, Kawakami, Pepper, Peters, Say, Tajiri and Tam.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative D. Ige and carried, H.R. No. 454 was adopted.

Representative Arakaki proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"I am very pleased, Mr. Speaker and members, to sponsor this resolution in behalf of Chairman D. Ige, Vice Chairman Chumbley, and the rest of your Education Committee, and I am pleased that we have this opportunity to collectively recognize the efforts of Hawaii's business community to enhance, advance and improve the level of computer technology in our schools.

"It was George Bush -- I am sure you all remember George Bush -- who said, 'To those who want to see real improvement in American education, I say there will be no renaissance without revolution.' And while renaissance now denotes a period of enlightment, just to show you how much the technology of information has changed, a student using a computer equipped with a CD Rom has access to more information than was in the Vatican library at the height of the renaissance. A noted educator has also quoted as saying, 'We do not teach people to drive cars by having them ride bicycles.'

"We were told at a recent Education Committee briefing that the ratio of work stations to user in the DOE is at best about 18 to one. And with the caveat that 90 percent of the current computers are outdated, the actual user to computer ratio more likely is somewhere between two hundred students to one computer, and the cost to correct the situation would probably make Finance Chair Calvin Say have a cow. To bring the schools up to a ratio of ten to one with the current multi-media capable computers will mean purchasing almost 17,500 new computers at a cost of over \$45.5-million. Even this ten to one ratio would provide only two computers per classroom. A more ideal ratio and one which DOE's new Mililani-mauka School of the future will provide its students this fall is a five to one ratio, meaning we would need \$125-million for the additional 50,000 computers required.

"And right now, in one of our House bills, 2156, they are exploring the use of a surcharge on cable service and telecommunication services to fund some of those computers. But the fact is, Mr. Speaker, students like my kids who have these Game Boys and Nintendos at home have more computing power in these little gadgets than their schools can offer them in their classrooms.

"Indeed, it was Dr. David Thornburg who told us at another briefing on education technology for the future that by the year 2010 or sooner, most students will not be carrying books, but instead they will be carrying these little, what they call educational oozies, and this little diskettes that they can plug into their hand-held computers to read their assignments, access their homework assignments, plug into a distant learning lecture on television at home, voice processor report on a word processor, and sending their homework by fax or modem. And this scenario will not be limited to just our educational system. Almost every job of any worth will require basic computer literacy, whether it's a storeroom clerk at Foodland, or a technician at IBM, computers will be a part of our work and home life.

"The point I am getting to, Mr. Speaker, is the reason why we honor and recognize the corporate sector for initiating a win/win/win situation. These donation programs provide schools with the opportunity to build their inventory of computers and in turn, the more computers our schools have, the better they will be able to prepare the future work for us. We will be applying for jobs at these businesses.

"The third win is that it provides these businesses with a marketing scheme that results in more purchases, hopefully, where there are groceries for computers.

"I would like to close with a quote, Mr. Speaker and colleagues, and the quote is, 'We should ponder as individuals who hold the future of our children in our collective hands. . .The future is not what it used to be. We have to prepare students for their future and not for our past.'

"And with grateful acknowledgement, Mr. Speaker, I would like to introduce our honorees on the floor today.

"First of all, I think a lot of people know who this gentleman is because he has done a lot, not only providing computers to our schools, but in many other areas of our community," and asked Mr. Maurice Sullivan, President of Foodland Super Market, Ltd. to stand to be recognized.

"Next to him, we have Mr. Anton Krucky, Trading Area General Manager for IBM Corporation; Ms. Fay Otsuji, President of Data-1; and Dr. Phil Bossert, Asst. Superintendent, Office of Informational and Telecommunication Services, for the Department of Education, representing Mr. Charles Toguchi, Superintendent of Education," and asked them to stand to be recognized.

Representative Arakaki then asked the following persons, who were seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized: Ms. Shelley Crowe, Marketing Manager for IBM Edu-Quest, from Seattle, Washington; Ms. Susan Nonaka, Ms. Crowe's counterpart here in Hawaii; Ms. Diane Okuda, PR person for IBM; Mr. Steve Okubo, General Manager for DATA-1; and Ms. Shirley Kuma, Marketing Director for Foodland Super Market, Ltd.

Representative D. Ige then rose and stated:

"As a registered engineer of the House, it really is a great pleasure for me to be able to participate. It's clear that the demands of the people of Hawaii far exceeds the means, and it is refreshing and I am convinced that it's leadership on the part of the private sector as these companies have shown, that really allow us to push the schools over the top, and I would just like to congratulate and honor all of them.

"When I graduated with my engineering degree at Manoa a number of years ago, I came very close to accepting a job with IBM in San Jose, and I'm certain that my life would have been different if I did that, and I just recently purchased a couple of computers from DATA-1 for my office, and so I appreciate all of their efforts. And clearly, Foodland has been the leader and innovator in providing technology for our schools.

"I think it's a wonderful opportunity for us to be able to honor all of these people here this afternoon.

"Thank you."

Representative Alcon then rose and stated:

"I would also like to congratulate Mr. Sullivan and also the Foodland outlet. Although, Mr. Speaker, I cannot speak about the future, but I would like to speak about the past.

"Thirty-one years ago, Mr. Speaker, I had the opportunity of first meeting Mr. Sullivan at their headquarters in the vicinity of Kaimuki High School. During that time, Mr. Speaker, we had a program called DECA, and Mr. Sullivan and all the other stores in the city participated in that particular program whereby we sent students to school half-day and went out to work with different businesses in the afternoon.

"After thirty-one years, I would like to thank Mr. Sullivan for all his graciousness and his kindness in helping education in the State of Hawaii.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kanoho then rose and stated:

"I, too, would like to add my thanks to our generous donors who, by their contributions, demonstrate that they really care about our youth and recognize the value of education.

"I have known Mr. Sullivan from having been in Rotary and, indeed, as has been alluded to by Representative Arakaki, he has been most generous, and he prefers to be called Sully. He is responsible for so many scholarships that have been awarded our youth.

"I would also like to thank Anton especially, because we were on a golf course at Kaanapali when he first shared the idea of coming up with a very generous donation in computers to the children of Kauai, and we thank you as well as the other donors.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"I also would like to thank Mr. Sullivan. He was a major factor in our being able to start Hawaii's first children's museum. And for those of you who have seen it at Dole Cannery Square, I think that we owe a great deal of acknowledgement and gratitude to Mr. Sullivan, and the children of Hawaii certainly thank you also."

Representative Amaral then rose and stated:

"Clearly, we have a group of people here that have done a great deal, but I must add also my mahalo to Mr. Anton Krucky who, not many know, but he is also part-Hawaiian, and Mr. Krucky is the person that was instrumental in having developed the Alulike Computer Training Program that has truly become a model, so thank you Mr. Krucky."

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"I would like to especially thank DATA-1, IBM and Foodland, including Safeway, but above all, I would like to thank Sully because he and his company had the foresight to be the first one to locate on the pineapple field out in Mililani. They were the first supermarket out in Mililani and early pioneers are grateful that he had faith in the community and also for all the wonderful things he has done, not only in computers, but also in the Rotary Foundation. Above all, I think Foodland was the first to offer the charge plate service, and that has been a great convenience for all of us.

"And today, we would like to say, from my district and from myself personally ... thank you, Sully, for being such a great citizen of Hawaii.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Chun then rose and stated:

"I would also like to extend my warmest mahalo to everyone that we are honoring today.

"Mr. Sullivan, although I have never met him, he has touched my life and many of the youth volunteers in the State through his support of In-Track which is a youth volunteer program of Rotaries. And also, on behalf of the children of my district, thank you very much to all of you. They have been beneficiaries of your generosity."

Certificates of Recognition were presented to the honorees by Representatives D. Ige, Kawakami, Bainum and Chumbley while Representatives Chun, Duldulao, Kawakami and Ishii-Morikami presented them with floral leis

"As a State winner, Scott will also travel on an allexpenses-paid trip to Washington, D.C., accompanied by his teacher, to compete in the nationals on May 25th and 26th, which will be hosted by **Jeopardy** game show host, Alex Trebek."

Representative Nekoba then introduced the honoree, Scott McCord, and asked him to stand to be recognized. Accompanying Scott on the House floor were his parents, Gary and Nancy McCord; and Dr. Lorraine Henderson, Principal of Kailua Intermediate School.

The honorees all rose to be recognized.

Representative Nekoba continued:

"Again, Mr. Speaker, I think when things like this come up and it's a public school student, it just more and more reinforces the fact that we have a high quality public education system and we need to support it as much as possible because these are the leaders of tomorrow, and especially if they can help us find where we want to go, it's going to be even greater.

"On behalf of all the House members, we do congratulate you, Scott, and wish you well and wish you luck in the nationals.

"Thank you."

Representative Young then rose and stated:

"I am very pleased to honor Scott McCord. It's really a wonderful example of family and school working together to achieve the potential of a very obviously bright young man. I was talking to the family just a few minutes ago and they were saying that his father had travelled extensively in Asia when he was a child, and he developed this love for geography from hearing about his father's travels and, in fact, when he was three years old and his mother said, 'Let's go to Chinatown,' he barked because he thought it was going to be a long, long trip and not just to downtown Honolulu. But the parents also revealed that very early in his life, he had a fifth grade teacher, a Mr. Yent, at Aikahi Elementary School who further sparked that interest in geography with him, and apparently he has continued to have the love and support of his family and his schoolmates and his school teachers in developing his love of geography.

"I understand this is his first trip and his farthest trip to Washington, D.C., and we wish him a lot of luck.

"Thank you."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"I also would like to congratulate you, Scott. Those of us on the Windward side are very, very proud of you. We're also proud of Principal Henderson's work at Kailua Intermediate School. I think that those of you who have known about her work realize that we have here one of the best examples of a dynamic leader who is making the public school system work really well and with excellence. Mr. Scott McCord certainly demonstrates that excellence.

"In speaking with Scott before today's session, I learned that we now have maps that are having to be replaced at least on a yearly basis, and I think that we

have before us a young man that is at the cutting edge of where geography exists today in our changing world. I applaud him, and I also hope that someday he will be sitting here on the floor in this chamber as a State representative and chair of the Education Committee so he can make sure that other students in our State have the advantage that he has had under Dr. Henderson's leadership at Kailua Intermediate School.

"Thank you."

At this time, Representative Nekoba presented Scott McCord with a Certificate of Recognition and floral lei while Representatives Chun, Young and Suzuki presented floral leis to the other honorees.

"Years ago, I saw the TV ad that had a pile of trash being thrown out by a passing car that landed at the feet of a stately American Indian. He turned slowly towards the camera at which point we see this tear coursing down his cheek. That scene, for me, was the beginning of my environmental awareness and I imagine that I was not alone. That is why I wanted to honor these fine young advertising professionals today.

"AD 2 is a club of advertising professionals from many different firms who each year volunteer their services, free of charge, to develop a media campaign for a deserving non-profit group. This year AD 2 adopted the fine group EARTHTRUST.

"Mr. Speaker, I am certain that these folks before you today will, by their work, be just as influential in enhancing environmental awareness as that of the antilitter ad of which I first spoke. It is also likely that this group could do more to encourage ecological awareness than a hundred resolutions produced by a legislative environmental committee.

"It is my pleasure today to recognize the fine work of AD 2 members, and it is an honor to introduce to you, Mr. Speaker, and my colleagues, our guests today."

Representative Bainum then introduced and asked the following honorees to stand to be recognized: Linda Ayers. AD 2 President; Ruth Academia, AD 2 National Government Relations Chair; Melissa Chang, Government Relations Chair; Pat Tadaki, AD 2 Public Service Co-Chair; and Mr. David Hack, EARTHTRUST Campaign Director.

Representative Morihara then rose and stated:

"I would like to take this time to congratulate and really commend AD 2 HONOLULU for their extraordinary efforts in behalf of EARTHTRUST. I realize that EARTHTRUST itself is a tremendous organization, and for AD 2, private individuals have put more effort than money, and we know what extra effort means to these people in the way of valuing it as much higher than monetary donations.

"I just wanted to add my congratulations to them.

"Thank you."

Representative Nekoba then rose and stated:

"I was very surprised to come in today ... I was here to congratulate Mr. Hack and then I find out that two people who I worked with in the past -- Melissa and Ruth -- who took me under their wings and helped me out when I was working in PR, are also being congratulated, so thank you very much, ladies.

"I would like to add that Mr. Hack is a constituent in my district and so I am sure I am going to be knocking on his door, and he'll be letting me know about EARTHTRUST. I want to congratulate you.

"Thank you."

Representative Hiraki then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I just wanted to add my appreciation for their work, and I would also like to mention that my constituent, Melissa Chang, is also the sister of Senator Tony Chang."

Representative Chun then rose and stated:

"I just wanted to congratulate all of you. I know the young ladies before you are very active, not only in AD 2, but other community activities. It's really exciting to know that the altruism that they are displaying in what they are doing here is alive and well in the younger generation, and I hope you will be able to inspire a lot more people.

"Thank you."

Representative Hirono then rose and stated:

"I just wanted to add my congratulations and thank you to AD 2 and EARTHTRUST, and I couldn't let this moment pass without noting that Melissa Chang whom, it seems that we all know, but more importantly than the fact that she is Senator Chang's sister, she is the daughter of Ethel Chang from my office who we all refer fondly to as Mother Chang.

"Thank you."

Representative Alcon then rose and stated:

"I'd like to also add my congratulations. Now if this is a beauty of people who work with the environment, they are also worth preserving.

"I would also like to mention that Miss Academia is from Kalihi."

Certificates of Recognition were presented to the honorees by Representatives Nekoba and Herkes, and floral leis were presented to them by Representatives Duldulao, Tam, Bainum, Hiraki, Santiago and Morihara.

H.R. No. 457, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING ANNALISA DELA CRUZ, WINNER OF THE 1993 HAWAII SPELLING BEE," was jointly offered by Representatives Pepper, Beirne, Isbell, Takumi and Yonamine, and was read by the Clerk.

Representative Pepper rose and proceeded to introduce the honoree, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and fellow members, we are honored to have with us today a young scholar of outstanding merit -- Miss Annalisa Dela Cruz, Hawaii's 1993 State Spelling Bee Champion.

"In this day and age, with the advent of WordPerfect, WordStar, and the gamut of word processing spellcheck programs available to us, it is both inspiring and encouraging to know that there are still people out there, who like Annalisa, can spell; that is, those who know that 'accommodate' takes two c's and two m's, I hope, and that 'all right' is spelled as two words though more and more it has become 'alright' to spell it as one word, and that there are altogether -- one word -- fifty-one members in the House; that is, when we as a body are 'all

together' -- two words. Oh, boy! You see, not even the most sophisticated spellcheckers in the market can handle that

"With her discipline, dedication, and will to succeed, Annalisa is a fine role model for her peers. We commend this outstanding eighth grader from Aliamanu Intermediate School for setting great challenges for herself and pursuing these challenges.

"We wish Annalisa the best of luck as she embarks on an even greater challenge when she represents Hawaii in the national competition to be held in Washington, D.C. next month.

"And to whomever has said who cares about spelling, consider the embarrassment experienced by former Vice President Quayle when the entire nation became aware of his error in spelling a 'potato.' It was, you recall, a young student who spelled the word correctly.

"Today, we honor another young student who seeks, not to embarrass, but to focus our attention on scholarships and dedication to intellectual achievement.

"Mr. Speaker and colleagues, may I present to you Miss Annalisa Dela Cruz, the winner of the 1993 Hawaii State Spelling Bee."

The honoree, Miss Annalisa Dela Cruz, then rose to be recognized.

Accompanying Annalisa on the House floor were her parents, Mr. Antonio Dela Cruz and Mrs. Madonna Dela Cruz; and Mr. Clifford Fukuda, advisor from Aliamanu Intermediate School, who then rose to be recognized.

Representative D. Ige then rose and stated:

"I don't know if there's anybody who's been keeping count this year, but it seems like 1993 has truly been a banner year for the public school system.

"I just wanted to add my congratulations to Annalisa. For all that's been said and done about the public school system, it is clear that we have quality students and quality products, and Annalisa, you serve as a role model and an inspiration to all of the 200,000 public school students throughout the State.

"Thank you very much for your commitment and dedication."

Representative Duldulao then rose and stated:

"I, too, would like to add my congratulations to Annalisa and to your parents. You folks have been a real shining example to all of us.

"On behalf of the Filipino community, I would like to again extend my congratulations, and we wish you well."

Representative Alcon then rose and stated:

"I would like to inform you, Mr. Speaker, that my children also graduated from Aliamanu Intermediate School, and my wife also taught at Aliamanu Intermediate School, so you can see, Mr. Speaker, that even us immigrants can make something out of ourselves.

"Thank you very much."

At this time, Representative Pepper presented Annalisa Dela Cruz with a Certificate of Recognition and Representatives Isbell, Suzuki, Chumbley and Ihara presented the honorees with floral leis.

"Mr. Speaker, I'm rising to speak in favor of House Resolution 419 and H.C.R. 476 and those are Standing Committee Reports 1530 and 1531, but also, Mr. Speaker, in addition, to what I consider to be an omission in the resolutions.

"I think we all know about the Hale Mohalu case, Mr. Speaker, and about the people that have struggled for almost a decade now to regain a portion of the Pearl City site for housing for the elderly and the disabled, including those with Hansen's disease.

"The Hale Mohalu group, a non-profit group, has been successful in getting a lease, Mr. Speaker, for one-half of that Pearl City site. They, more than anyone else, Mr. Speaker, know how difficult it is to develop housing in the State of Hawaii, how difficult that is for a non-profit organization to develop housing in the State of Hawaii. They have the land, they have a committed group of volunteers, they have some seed money from the State, they have a great deal of support from the State administration, and including from the Director of the Department of Health, who has committed to a number of beds at the to-be built facility. The difficulty is that the housing for the elderly and the disabled, including the Hansen's disease people, has not broken ground because of the difficulty in getting housing started in our State.

"I believe that those people should have been included as one of the groups, and I recognize that the committee on which I sit did at least put in the words that the groups are not to be limited to the following, but I think it would have indicated more of our legislative support if we had added the words 'Hale Mohalu' in there and given them at least the same acknowledgement that we give to unnamed university graduate students. This is a

named group, Mr. Speaker -- the Hale Mohalu Non-Profit Organization. They have been working tremendously hard, and I believe that they need our encouragement and our help.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the reports of the Committee were adopted and H.R. Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1558) recommending that H.C.R. No. 146, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

Representative Say moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.C.R. No. 146, HD 1, be adopted, seconded by Representative Kawakami.

Representative Isbell rose to speak against the concurrent resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, my concern is the process of this. This resolution was introduced by the developer and if we're going to start passing resolutions which had to do with submerged lands and easements, I would think that it should be done by the Department of Land and Natural Resources which is the proper role that the Department plays.

"I would like to bring your attention to Chapter 171 in the HRS which has as a subchapter, **Miscellaneous**. Under **Miscellaneous** comes this section. It also talks about exchanges, and it is very clear in here. . and it says here 'that the Department shall submit for introduction to the Legislature a resolution.' That's for exchanges for disapproval. In this same chapter, in the same subsection, on 171-60, it states that 'there shall be a concurrent resolution adopted,' but it doesn't necessarily say in the same language, but it talks about the Board 'may by negotiation and without recourse after the Governor and authorization by the Legislature by a concurrent resolution. . .'

"So what I am getting at, Mr. Speaker, is that in that same area under **Miscellaneous**, it talks about the Board as the one that puts it in. I do appreciate the fact that the House Finance Committee put in a lot of things. I mean there's several months of approval they had to go through. They had to get their SMAs, their CDUAs, their zoning approval, and subdivision approval, and I mean it just goes on and on. And that kind of language in there tells me that it's a premature resolution.

"We wouldn't even have to have this, and we wouldn't have to have all this language in if we had just let the Board of Land and Natural Resources do it in the course of its proceedings, so I would like to suggest to you that there are three other developers just waiting to see what happens with this because I can guarantee you, they'll be in here next year asking for the same thing — and that's Ooma, Kohanaiki and Pokukano — which are developments right down the south end of West Hawaii.

"Also, one last thing that's mentioned to you ... this is in a contested case hearing right now, and I find this to be very premature. I do not think that it's a good thing for the Legislature to be passing a resolution when that very issue is in a contested case hearing.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

At 1:11 o'clock p.m., Representative Baker asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:12 o'clock p.m.

Representative Thielen then rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm speaking against this on the merits as well as procedurally. The concern I have, Mr. Speaker, is that a resolution such as this should have gone to our Water and Land Use Planning Committee or to Ocean Recreation and Marine Resources, or probably a combination of both, and instead, the resolution had a rather short circuit and went to the Finance Committee and then popped out here on the floor. I do not believe that the Finance Committee is the subject matter committee over a matter such as this and I really believe that we should not allow this process or sanction this kind of process.

"Secondly, Mr. Speaker, the resolution tries to put a foot on both sides of the fence or I guess it should be a leg on both sides of the fence. And frankly, it can't do that. On page 3, in the first WHEREAS, it states, 'WHEREAS, the adoption of this Concurrent Resolution does not constitute legislative approval or disapproval of the project; now, therefore,' ... then you go on down into reading the RESOLVED, '...the Board of Land Natural Resources is hereby authorized to grant an easement over and/or to lease to Mauna Lani Resort, Inc. et cetera.'

"So, while it says on the one hand, Mr. Speaker, that this doesn't constitute legislative approval or disapproval, in the WHEREAS, we are doing precisely that. We are approving, notwithstanding the attempt to couch it in a rather obscure fashion. We are taking an action today, and I hope everyone here in this chamber is very clear about that. We are authorizing the Board of Land and Natural Resources to go ahead and to grant the easement or to lease and again, Mr. Speaker, we have not had an opportunity in the subject matter committee to really examine all the land use environmental ramifications of doing this. Therefore, I do not agree with going forward with this resolution.

"I received some information, Mr. Speaker, from the Sierra Club, the Hawaii Chapter, and they point out some of the environmental consequences -- the environmental problems. They also point out that residents of the Big Island haven't had a fair opportunity to comment on this resolution, and there again is the problem when it goes only to Finance which is the money committee, not the subject matter committee.

"There's a concern that the project will result in the public shoreline being privatized. Do we want to do that? Do we want to say to the Board of Land and Natural Resources ... go ahead down this way?

"Even with the fourteen land use steps that are set forth in the resolution, the basic bottom line is, we're saying ... go ahead, Board of Land and Natural Resources, grant it. I don't believe that we should take that step without having more information before us and being able to deliberate on that in the subject matter committee.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Shon then rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"There has been a lot of discussion this year as to whether or not we, as a legislative body, are sensitive to the environment. This, it seems to me, is one shining example that we are willing to take the benefit of the doubt for those who would want to put our environment at risk, but we are not willing to take the benefit of the doubt of all those groups that have made it their business to be our watchdog on the environment. We've said to them ... we don't really care about your position on this, we're going to go ahead as the House of Representatives and say, we think this is a great idea. But I wonder how many individuals in this honorable body have had any

exposure to this issue, to the site, to the environmental issues. How many of us are going to vote for this resolution simply because it has come out of one of our committees, and because a developer has requested it? And how many will place the benefit of the doubt on our fragile environment -- the shoreline -- which, incidentally, the tourist industry is anxious to point out again and again is really one of the key elements as to why people come to Hawaii? Are we collectively willing to blindly endorse this kind of development when indeed, as it has been pointed out, the very committees that are supposed to be overseeing this for environmental and other concerns were not even given that opportunity?

"It seems to me, in the context of other actions which protect the public and the consumer and the environment, in terms of our tort system ... oh, we've eliminated joint and several liability. The access for recourse, if this developer should do a very bad job, is now severely limited -- thanks to the action on a previous bill. What is the record that we are putting forth this year, Mr. Speaker? I would suggest that if we vote for this resolution now, we've essentially stated where our bias is as a collective group. We're open for business -- come on down.

"I urge all of you to think very carefully, not whether or not it might be a good idea to pass this resolution, but whether or not it is wise to send this signal to our constituents that our bias, without analysis, without referral to the appropriate committees, that our bias is in favor of developing submerged lands. That's what this resolution is about. Not knowing anything about this issue for most of us, I'm sure there has not been the opportunity to seriously review this. If we vote for it, go right ahead. This, to me, is a very, very unwise move. I could not be further from the stance of the Speaker on this. I will vote against it.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hagino then rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"Every year we pass a number of resolutions that many of us probably don't even pay attention to them. However, when concurrent resolutions deal with the exchange of lands, or submerged lands, or with water permits, these resolutions have the effect of the force of law due to Chapter 171.

"Now, it is quite correct that in previous years, a resolution like this was handled by the Water/Land Committee, the Ocean and Marine Resources Committee, and oftentimes the Transportation Committee as a tripartite hearing, and this resolution in fact did come to the Water/Land Committee when I was chair three years ago. And let me tell you, it's quite true what the Representative from the Big Island said that if you grant this, other resolutions like this will come about. So when this resolution was introduced three years ago, there were also several other resolutions. One of them was for a similar development on Olowalu on Maui. AmFac wanted to proceed with some marina development on that side of Maui, so it is quite sure that this is going to open up the floodgates. Those resolutions were held by the three chairs at that time, however, I see we're now proceeding.

"Let me tell you why these things have the force of law over and above Chapter 171. There was a reference by a previous speaker about Hale Mohalu. Now, those of us who were in the Legislature about ten years ago, we had a similar resolution asking that the Department of Land and Natural Resources consider using the Hale Mohalu land for a sports complex, and the chairman of that

committee at that time assured us that it was only a request to the Board of Land and Natural Resources. A number of us were in support of the Hale Mohalu patients that wanted a portion of the land set aside for Hale Mohalu. It was a very heated debate and the resolution did pass.

"Now, I took the time to go review the agendas and the staff reports for the Land Board regarding the Hale Mohalu land, and let me tell you the staff reports on the Hale Mohalu land at that time — ten years ago — said, 'Because the House wanted us to give the land to a sports complex in Pearl City, it is the recommendation of your staff that the Land Board give the land for a sports complex in Pearl City.' That led to a number of years of litigation and a great deal of time, pain and agony before a compromise was finally resolved.

"The Land Board, based on my experiences, takes these requests very seriously -- very seriously -- and this is over and above Chapter 171, requirement of law Chapter 171. Believe me, they will act on this resolution, and they will grant that easement and all the other permits that are requested. So don't fool yourself -- this is not a simple resolution.

"Secondly, you know, read the resolution itself. You know, we talk about creating a Global Village, educational, cultural and recreational activities ... you know, let's not fool ourselves. This is a tourist, high-class development. You can couch it in whatever terms of art that you prefer, but let's not fool ourselves in what we're creating here. It's going to be a marina. Only the rich live in marinas. The poor people go down with their throw nets and their hand poles, and their inner tubes and lay nets. The rich people have marinas. Let's not fool ourselves. Cut through this Global Village bullshit and get to where it really is.

"I urge all of you to vote against this resolution."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"As the representative of the 6th District within which this project lies, I am not even going to begin to talk about being a NIMBY because five years ago, in the representative from Hilo's office, the same developer gave the whole Big Island delegation a dog and pony show on a marina that they were going to produce, and they wanted our help in getting the legislation through that the previous speaker referred to. The one thing about the marina was that it was going to be like a giant toilet. It would flush two times a week and here we come ... we have the animal in a disguise coming in to us under H.C.R. 146, and I am wondering why this is happening.

"When the marina came, the entire village of Puuako was totally opposed to this. Now, all of a sudden, the community of Puuako is being offered, if they can go through with this Global Village if you will, to be hooked up to their sewage treatment plant. They will also be provided an exit road in case of fire. And what has happened now, Mr. Speaker, is the Puuako community is divided in half.

"The representative on my right has said that there was no comment on this. Mr. Speaker, I would totally agree with her and in my survey that's in the mail today, I am asking for this very comment from the people of my district. We need to keep in mind that there is a marine life conservation district several bays north, and the thing that I have a real trouble with is they call it 'protected Cove' that will enhance marine recreational activities. I believe this is a red herring, and once this thing is done,

it's going to be the invitation for the marina that they couldn't get three years ago.

"What bothers me is in the sixth WHEREAS on page 1. It allows them to blast the reef and dig it out, and my understanding is it's 200 feet by 400 feet. From the standpoint of local people, this part of the reef is an important tako (octopus) breeding ground.

"Mauna Lani has done marvelous projects in the past, it will do marvelous projects in the future. But, Mr. Speaker, we cannot let our double A waters be exposed to a toilet being flushed.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At this time, Representative Nekoba rose to cast his no vote.

Representative Pepper then rose to cast his no vote.

At 1:29 o'clock p.m., Representative Apo asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:31 o'clock p.m.

Representative Takamine then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with respect to House Concurrent Resolution 146, HD 1, first of all, I think a number of legitimate concerns have been expressed here, and I would like to express my appreciation to the Finance Chairman for some of the amendments that have been included. This resolution was originally referred to your Committee on Water and Land Use Planning and subsequently was waived over to Finance, and when that was done there was some concerns about whether or not there might be any undue advantage gained by the developer in passing such a resolution. But I think, based on the amendments that the Finance Committee has put into the resolution specifically indicating that it is not the Legislature's intention to, at this point, judge the merits, that it would be premature for that to occur at this juncture, and that what we are doing is we are allowing the process to go forward, that there is an additional WHEREAS provision that has identified each and every process that this developer would have to go through, just like any other developer would have to go through, and that each process, on the merits, would judge this project, and with the opportunity for the public to participate would then impose any conditions that are deemed necessary and appropriate.

"It is my understanding from the Department of Land and Natural Resources that whereas they would be the ultimate party that finalizes any lease regarding the submerged lands, that they would be looking to any other conditions that are imposed in proceeding through the various processes, and that any finalization would be dependent upon those conditions being met satisfactorily.

"Mr. Speaker, the other point I wanted to comment on is that the waiver itself ... when your Committee on Water and Land Use Planning agreed to the waiver, it was, number one, based upon the time limitations imposed by the legislative calendar, but more importantly, Mr. Speaker, the resolution itself and the situation faced by the developer did require that it go through all of these processes, and therefore again would be judged on the merits and any action taken at this point, as one of the former speakers indicated, would be pursuant to Section 171-60, which requires authorization of the Legislature by concurrent resolution for the Department of Land and

Natural Resources to begin its discussion regarding any lease concerning submerged lands.

"And with respect to that, it seems as though there were concurrent ongoing processes to provide for the needed checks and balances in the process, and it seemed as though the value, because certainly that's the legitimate question ... what would be the value gained by passing such a resolution? Clearly, it's no mystery that the Big Island right now faces a serious economic situation and given that this project does provide some opportunity for relief regarding that and based on all of the foregoing, I will be supporting this resolution.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"I remember, as a freshman, I stood up and said, 'We shouldn't go knee-jerk pro-labor or pro-management, we shouldn't go knee-jerk pro-development or anti-development, or pro-marina dwellers or pro/anti-marina dwellers...' and, by the way, all people who live in marinas are not rich for the edification of the representative who said that Hawaii Kai may be filled with rich people.

"My point, Mr. Speaker, is saying this ... unless the memory of this body be lost in the self-righteousness of this resolution being put to the breast of everyone who is beating their own, we, this very body, passed the Ewa Marina twelve months ago which is a development of a boat harbor and a residential development in Barber's Point, and no one was beating their chests and breasts and saying, oh, these marina dwellers are this or we are going to have submerged lands do that. No one said a thing about it. I mean it's good that we're alert to this, but let us not say that we are sacredly putting our trust now on something we have no knowledge of because we have already done it.

"Secondly, there is nothing wrong with living in Hawaii Kai, for those of you who haven't lived there.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tam then rose to cast his no vote, stating:

"For the record, Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, I would state that the administrative process of public input should be completed before this body grants an easement. The Department of Land and Natural Resources stated in its testimony before the Finance Committee that they are only beginning to review the project application which would take about a year.

"The question is at this time ... why the rush?"

The Chair then stated:

"I should remind the members before we proceed that the motion was that Standing Committee Report Nos. 1550 to 1558 and their concurrent resolutions and attached resolutions be approved, so the motion is for all of this -- not individually."

Representative Kanoho then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"As a member of the House Finance Committee, Mr. Speaker, it was out of those concerns previously expressed by the opponents of this resolution that those fourteen provisions were included and to ensure that the expressed concerns would be addressed; otherwise the Department of

Land and Natural Resources would not be authorized as required by statutes to give their prior approval.

"I think there's also another very important concern that needs to be touched upon, and it's that there is a tremendous amount of expense and time required to abide and fulfill the requirements of those fourteen provisions, and anyone in that position would need to know in advance what the Legislature's intent might be if indeed all of those fourteen provisions are met. Conversely, if one would undertake the time and expense to abiding and fulfilling those fourteen requirements and not have legislative approval, that would be a terrible thing, indeed.

"Thank you."

At this time, Representative Hirono rose to cast her no vote.

Representative Santiago then rose to cast his no vote.

Representative Arakaki then rose to cast his no vote.

The Chair reiterated:

"Again, I wish to remind the members that the motion is from 1550 to 1558. We will be moving for the whole motion and not for an individual Standing Committee Report."

Representative Hiraki then rose to cast his no vote, stating:

"I still have some reservations and concerns about the environmental effects, and also this resolution attacks ceded lands, and OHA did testify against this resolution."

Representative Hagino then rose and made the following motion:

"Mr. Speaker, in view of your statement that the motion is to approve Standing Committee Reports 1550 through 1558, I would like to move to amend the motion to delete Standing Committee Report 1558 from that motion."

The motion was seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Shon then rose to speak in favor of the amendment, stating:

"Speaking in favor of the amendment, Mr. Speaker, I think this is justified because the nature of this resolution is so fundamentally different from the other resolutions. The other resolutions are advice and whatnot. This resolution is essentially more akin to a bill because of Chapter 171, that it is quite justifiable and appropriate that all those who like the other resolutions not be forced to lump it all together, and that indeed this is a serious permit-granting resolution in the true sense of a permit. And for that reason, I think it is quite appropriate that it not be a part of the single page, two or three page movement, but that we do separate it so that people can feel that they can voice their approval or disapproval on this specifically.

"For that reason, I speak in favor of the motion."

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak in favor of the amendment, stating:

"Just to let you know, I will be voting in favor of the resolution -- Standing Committee Report 1558/H.C.R. No. 146, HD 1. However, I think this is a serious procedural question. I think when we do take a motion by the page,

that we should be able to designate which resolution or bill that we wish to vote against because we don't like to lump them all together and have one vote for the whole page if we just object to one measure. I think that if we follow this precedent, I would prefer that we, in the future, take every piece of legislation one by one rather than having a motion by page. For that reason, I will speak in favor of the motion to split off the last resolution from the others.

"Thank you."

At 1:44 o'clock p.m., Representative Taniguchi asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:52 o'clock p.m.

The motion to amend the motion to separate Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1558/H.C.R. No. 146, HD 1, from the others on the page was put by the Chair and carried.

At 1:54 o'clock p.m., Representative Baker asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:55 o'clock p.m.

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1550) recommending that H.R. No. 102, HD 1, be adopted.

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1551) recommending that H.C.R. No. 105, HD 1, be adopted.

Representative Say moved that the reports of the Committee be adopted and H.R. No. 102, HD 1, and H.C.R. No. 105, HD 1, be adopted, seconded by Representative Kawakami.

Representative Cachola rose to speak in favor of the resolutions, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, during World War II, the Filipinos fought side by side with Americans, giving up their lives, and lots of things like their properties, and also, Mr. Speaker, they suffered a lot. One of these occurrences is what we call the 'Death March.'

"In 1946, after the war, the United States assigned a Vice Consul or a Consul to see to it that the rights of the Filipinos who fought side by side with the Americans will be naturalized as U.S. citizens, but we don't know what happened after that. Ever since 1946, the Filipino veterans are still fighting for their rights and, you know Mr. Speaker, this resolution calls for our Congressional leaders to help initiate and support existing legislation being taken up by the U.S. Congress about giving equal treatment and benefits to World War II veterans, the same as what is provided to other United States veterans.

"This resolution, Mr. Speaker, stands to correct a wrong, or at least try to help the Filipinos who are here in the United States. There's a lot of them, not only in California, but a lot of them here in Hawaii that are having a hard time. The Filipino community is helping out, and this resolution is one of the things that they have fought for. They are still fighting for it. The least we can do during the twilight of their lives is to support this resolution.

"This resolution is based on equity and fairness, and I urge all the members of this House to vote in support of this resolution.

"Thank you."

Representative Alcon rose and requested a conflict ruling, saying that he is a Filipino and a World War II veteran, and the Chair ruled "no conflict."

Representative Alcon then spoke in favor of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is a rightful resolution. In fact, let me just state again that the State of Hawaii has done a good job in trying to solve some of the problems that those people had when they came over, especially when they were sleeping on cardboards over at the Philippine Consulate. It was at that time that our Hawaii National Guards came to their rescue and lent them 43 cot beds and 60 blankets, but as I have stated before, Mr. Speaker, all of them disappeared, but then at least that is a good move by the State of Hawaii in trying to help everybody.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Duldulao then rose to speak in favor of the resolutions, stating:

"In the interest of time, I just want to add that these resolutions address a long overdue process in that it calls for fairness and equal rights.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the reports of the Committee were adopted and H.R. No. 102, "HOUSE RESOLUTION URGING HD 1, entitled: ACTION TAKEN TO BE PROVIDE NATURALIZED FILIPINO WORLD WAR II VETERANS WITH ALL RIGHTS AND BENEFITS TO WHICH UNITED STATES VETERANS ARE ENTITLED," and H.C.R. No. 105, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION URGING THAT ACTION BE TAKEN TO PROVIDE NATURALIZED FILIPINO WORLD WAR II VETERANS WITH ALL RIGHTS AND BENEFITS TO WHICH UNITED STATES VETERANS ARE ENTITLED," were adopted.

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1552) recommending that H.R. No. 295, HD 1, be adopted.

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1553) recommending that H.C.R. No. 305, HD 1, be adopted.

Representative Say moved that the reports of the Committee be adopted and H.R. No. 295, HD 1, and H.C.R. No. 305, HD 1, be adopted, seconded by Representative Kawakami.

Representative Santiago rose to speak in support of the resolutions, stating:

"Anytime, Mr. Speaker, you or my fellow colleagues do get a chance to come out to the beautiful North Shore of Oahu, I do want you to take notice that as you drive past Waimea Bay, instead of looking to your left and noticing the beautiful blue ocean and nice waves crashing onto the shores, take a look to the right, look up into the mountains, look at the blue tarps, look at the makeshift shacks, and know that the entire mountainside - every single cave, every single crevice -- is presently inhabited almost exclusively by the homeless mentally ill. If you

would like to see further what a problem this is, drive about another seven miles down the road, go past Crawford Convalescent Home, notice a large stonewall to your left, and if you like, go over the wall, and you will notice another entire community, primarily of homeless mentally ill.

"I liken this to a time bomb that's about ready to go off, and I want everyone to understand that the fastest growing population of our homeless are the homeless mentally ill and the very vulnerable single women. And as you come to the North Shore and pass through Haleiwa and you look over and you see the first homeless village that was built in Hawaii and you think that we made strides dealing with our homeless population, please remember that this resolution is the beginning of what I hope to be our commitment to addressing a very serious problem.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the reports of the Committee were adopted and H.R. No. 295, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION URGING THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO WORK WITH THE HAWAII HOUSING AUTHORITY AND OTHERS TO DEVELOP A COMPREHENSIVE BROAD SPECTRUM PLAN TO PROVIDE HOUSING WITH APPROPRIATE SERVICES FOR HOMELESS MENTALLY ILL PERSONS," and H.C.R. No. 305, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION URGING THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO WORK WITH THE HAWAII HOUSING AUTHORITY AND OTHERS TO DEVELOP A COMPREHENSIVE BROAD SPECTRUM PLAN TO PROVIDE HOUSING WITH APPROPRIATE SERVICES FOR HOMELESS MENTALLY ILL PERSONS," were adopted.

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1554) recommending that H.R. No. 429, HD 1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Say, seconded by Representative Kawakami and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 429, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING A DETERMINATION OF WHETHER TIME SHARE INTERESTS SHOULD BE CONSIDERED TRANSIENT ACCOMMODATIONS AND AS SUCH BE TREATED THE SAME AS OTHER TOURIST ACCOMMODATIONS IN HAWAII," was adopted.

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1555) recommending that H.C.R. No. 466, HD 1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Say, seconded by Representative Kawakami and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 466, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING A DETERMINATION OF WHETHER TIME SHARE INTERESTS SHOULD BE CONSIDERED TRANSIENT ACCOMMODATIONS AND AS SUCH BE TREATED THE SAME AS OTHER TOURIST ACCOMMODATIONS IN HAWAII," was adopted.

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand, Com. Rep. No. 1556) recommending that H.R. No. 353 be adopted.

On motion by Representative Say, seconded by Representative Kawakami and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 353, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING THE NATATORIUM AS A 'LIVING MEMORIAL' AND A

SYMBOL OF PRIDE FOR ALL THE PEOPLE OF HAWAII," was adopted.

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1557) recommending that H.C.R. No. 386 be adopted.

On motion by Representative Say, seconded by Representative Kawakami and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 386, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING THE NATATORIUM AS A 'LIVING MEMORIAL' AND A SYMBOL OF PRIDE FOR ALL THE PEOPLE OF HAWAII," was adopted.

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1558) recommending that H.C.R. No. 146, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

Representative Say moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.C.R. No. 146, HD 1, be adopted, seconded by Representative Kawakami.

At 2:03 o'clock p.m., Representative Arakaki asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 2:04 o'clock p.m.

Representative Thielen rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"I'd like to draw the members' attention to HRS 171-53(c). This law on the books states: 'The Board, with the prior approval of the Governor and the prior authorization' and authorization is the key word, 'of the Legislature by Concurrent Resolution may lease submerged lands. . .et cetera.'

"What this does is ... a member from the Hamakua region alleged that this wouldn't really give the developer an undue advantage. I just read the laws to you which states that if the Legislature authorizes by resolution, then the Board can go ahead and lease these submerged lands.

"Look at the language in the resolution. 'BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives. . . the Board of Land and Natural Resources is hereby authorized to grant an easement over and/or to lease. . . et cetera,' and it goes on into the submerged lands. So the question about whether or not there's undue advantage gained by the developer ... the answer is, you bet, if we go ahead and pass this resolution.

"I was one of the attorneys that was helping the Hale Mohalu group and so I can speak firsthand by the impact of this kind of a resolution upon the Board of Land and Natural Resources. Because the Legislature had passed a resolution saying the Board was authorized to lease the Hale Mohalu site to the private youth group, the Board went ahead and acted as if that was the mandate. That was thrown back at us. We had to go into court to battle on that. Because of the resolution, the court ruled in favor of the private youth group who was going to be able to have eleven acres of prime land in Pearl City for one hundred dollars a year. And it wasn't until we were able to enlist the cooperation of the City and County of Honolulu which refused to grant any permits for building until some accommodation could be reached at the negotiation table, that we were then able to regain half of that site for housing for the elderly and the disabled and the Hansen's disease people.

"So you're saying this isn't an undue advantage? Of course it's an undue advantage and it's more than that. It's a mandate that the Board of Land and Natural Resources takes and holds and acts upon, so today, if you're ready to do this, today, by passing this resolution, this means that that project is going to go ahead.

"The fourteen different items are merely the hoops they jump through. None of the hoops will close off and stop them from proceeding with this use of submerged lands and their developments.

"I still say, Mr. Speaker, that we have not looked at the project as a whole to decide whether or not we should authorize it to go ahead, and I believe that therefore today we should cast a no vote on this resolution."

Representative Ward then rose on a point of order and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the previous speaker, while before stating her point, was interrupted by a recess, and I think for the sake of tradition and decorum on the floor here, we have to understand that Masons clearly points out, on page 156, that a motion to recess cannot be made while another has the floor. I think that needs, for the sake of tradition now that we have Masons, to be known that when someone is speaking, please let them at least finish, and that's what the rule says, Mr. Speaker.

"Thank you."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose and stated:

"First of, I want to thank the Chairman of the Finance Committee because this concurrent resolution was a marathon one in his committee hearing last Thursday night, and I also appreciate very much his points that had to be granted before such a grant to the Board of Land and Natural Resources be made.

"I would like to call your attention to the third WHEREAS on page 2 which says, 'WHEREAS, it is imperative that prior to the granting of an easement over or the leasing of submerged lands for the development of the Cove project, that all environmental, economic, and social impacts be thoroughly evaluated;' and then I must repeat again the BE IT RESOLVED where it says, '...the Board of Land and Natural Resources is hereby authorized to grant an easement...'

"For these reasons, Mr. Speaker, will the Clerk please cast a no vote for me.

"Thank you."

Representative Shon then rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"I want to emphasize one more point, and that is that indeed this is one of the few cases in which the Legislature acts as a permitting authority in the same way that all of those listed on this resolution are. I ask you ... what would you think if the coastal management consistency process in the Office of State Planning simply said, well, if the others go along, we'll go along? What would you think if the water quality certification under Section 401 of the federal Clean Water Act if the State Department of Health said, oh, we'll go along if you go along. That's essentially what this resolution today is -it is a granting of a permit. It must be granted for this to happen. It is the granting of a permit in the absence of findings of all of these other permitting authorities. And that is why it is justifiable to break this off as a separate measure. The granting of a permit -- a very rare portion of our State law which puts us in this position -- should

not be granted in the absence of findings from these other entities, from these other agencies. That is why this is so serious.

"There may be many of you who think that the marina is a good idea but I pose to you the question of legislative authority. Is it a good idea for anyone to grant a permit on the basis of ... if they go along, we'll go along? That, to me, is the crux of this issue.

"That's why I'm speaking against this, and why I would like to request a Roll Call vote.

Representative Isbell then rose on a point of clarification and inquired:

"I just needed to know ... are our previous comments and our votes pertinent to this or do we have to do it over again?"

The Chair answered:

"It's pertinent. If you are speaking the second time, it's being counted as a second time, and your comments would be pertinent."

Representative Isbell thanked the Chair.

Roll Call having been requested, the motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 146, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE BOARD OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES TO GRANT AN EASEMENT OR TO LEASE CERTAIN SUBMERGED LANDS AT SOUTH KOHALA, HAWAII, TO MAUNA LANI RESORT, INC.," was adopted by a vote of 30 ayes to 16 noes, with Representatives Arakaki, Bainum, Beirne, Chun, Hagino, Hiraki, Hirono, D. Ige, Isbell, O'Kieffe, Pepper, Santiago, Shon, Takumi, Tam and Thielen voting no, and Representatives Amaral, M. Ige, Nekoba, Okamura and Yonamine being excused.

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1559) recommending that H.C.R. No. 317 be adopted.

On motion by Representative Say, seconded by Representative Kawakami and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 425, HD 1; 1573 and H.C.R. No. 470, HD 2; 1574 and H.R. No. 50, HD 1; 1575 and H.C.R. No. 59, HD 1; and 1576 and H.R. No. 181, HD 1, be adopted, seconded by Representative Kawakami.

Representative Hirono rose and stated:

"Since I wish to have my no vote recorded on 1572 and 1573, would it be proper to amend the motion to exclude those two items from the main motion?"

The Chair answered:

"Yes, or you could divide the question."

At 2:19 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 2:21 o'clock p.m., Representative Hirono rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you for the clarification. I'd like to withdraw my motion."

The Chair "so ordered."

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1568) recommending that H.R. No. 159 be adopted.

On motion by Representative Say, seconded by Representative Kawakami and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 159, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING A REPORT ON PROGRESS BEING MADE TO ACCESS WATER RESOURCES FOR THE SETTLEMENT OF HAWAIIAN HOMESTEAD LANDS," was adopted.

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1569) recommending that H.C.R. No. 161 be adopted.

On motion by Representative Say, seconded by Representative Kawakami and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 161, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING A REPORT ON PROGRESS BEING MADE TO ACCESS WATER RESOURCES FOR THE SETTLEMENT OF HAWAIIAN HOMESTEAD LANDS," was adopted.

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1570) recommending that H.R. No. 281, HD 1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Say, seconded by Representative Kawakami and carried, the report of the

Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 281, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING A MANAGEMENT AND FINANCIAL AUDIT OF THE HAWAII VISITORS BUREAU," was adopted.

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1571) recommending that H.C.R. No. 284, HD 1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Say, seconded by Representative Kawakami and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 284, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING A MANAGEMENT AND FINANCIAL AUDIT OF THE HAWAII VISITORS BUREAU," was adopted.

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1572) recommending that H.R. No. 425, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, be adopted.

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1573) recommending that H.C.R. No. 470, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, be adopted.

Representative Say moved that the reports of the Committee be adopted and H.R. No. 425, HD 2, and H.C.R. No. 470, HD 2, be adopted, seconded by Representative Kawakami.

Representative Marumoto rose to speak against the resolutions, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, these call for a voluntary financial disclosure of print and broadcast media, and I think it's overly broad. I understand this is simply voluntary, and people are very emotional on both sides of this issue, and I think the timing was that it immeidately followed the incest bill which sort of exacerbated the debate on this.

"But I feel that there's too many media that do occasionally report on news or editorials of importance to their readers. For instance, I think it would cover magazines that pertain just to surfing, or newspapers that just cater to gays, or even like a Hawaiian music radio station. It would pertain to Japanese TV programming because all these media do occasionally report on an issue of importance to their listeners or readers or watchers. It would pertain to the League of Women Voters' newsletter or the Sierra Club newsletter, and it would ask for voluntary disclosure of people that I don't think we really are that interested in finding out where they are coming from

"It requests owners to disclose their finances and an owner might be just a silent partner or stockholder. It would ask a publisher to voluntarily disclose and it could be like a Chinese language newspaper, some other arcane and insignificant publication; it would ask managers to disclose and it might be somebody who has a classified section of the newspaper. It would catch all editors and you really don't need to see the financial disclosure of a food editor or a sports editor or an entertainment editor.

"It would ask producers for their finances, and my daughter is a producer, Mr. Speaker, for Channel 13, and she produced Quizzard and Bingo and once in a while she does UH sports. I don't think that her finances are of great importance. This would cover Harry Kojima's cooking show too, whoever produces that. We ask reporters to divulge and I don't think we need to know all the finances of, for instance, Ka Leo reporters. These are University reporters who are really students and they write editorials from time to time, too, so I think this is overly

broad. It treads on infringement of the First Amendment and I think we should allow a lot of discussion in this area, and I think we really don't have to find out or to disclose what their holdings are.

"So for those reasons, Mr. Speaker, because this is much too overly broad, I will be voting against these resolutions.

"Thank you."

Representative Thielen rose to speak against the resolutions, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, actually these resolutions show that the media is doing a good job. It's really a thermometer on how well they're performing because all of a sudden, because of the full disclosure that they are doing -- the good job that they are doing -- the Legislature now is trying to bully them. It's a bully resolution, Mr. Speaker. It goes to reporters to say ... you people who probably have very minimal salaries, are now going to have to go through a whole disclosure process because we don't like what we're reading in print about us. Well, that's just too bad.

"I think that the press should never be tampered with, Mr. Speaker, and I will call to mind an old quote that I think both you and I remember: 'Freedom of the press is a flaming sword; Use it justly, hold it high, and guard it well.' I believe very strongly in that. This resolution does everything it can to cut out the light of that flaming sword and to put it back into darkness. That's not the answer, Mr. Speaker, that's flatly not the answer.

"I asked for staff to put together a muzzle -- actually a gag -- and I think this is not a mustache, this is a gag. Mr. Speaker, it's what we are trying to do to the press...

At this point, Representative Baker rose on a point of order and stated:

"Can we have some decorum in this chamber?"

Representative Thielen continued:

"This is what we are trying to do to the press today -to gag them, and I think that this resolution is shameful.
It has no place in this chamber and we have no business
trying to gag the press of our State.

"Thank you."

Representative Hagino then rose to speak against the resolutions, stating:

"Far be it for me to defend the media -- I've had my problems with the media -- and far be it for me to defend that son of a missionary, Thurston Twigg-Smith. In fact, we made him probably a billionaire.

"I think this resolution may be the result of some disgruntlement by a number of people over the corporate media in America today. Certainly, I am one of those people who have opposed the joint newspaper agreement and the anti-trust exemption. I think if there was some concern, and I looked at the resolutions and the committee reports, and there was concern over the enormous profits of these media empires, and if there was some concern, that perhaps the federal anti-trust exemption should be amended to include that whenever a paper or entity sells its newspaper, that there be a special tax placed on them if they sell and they operate under a joint newspaper agreement, that a special tax come into place and they don't walk home with mega-millions of dollars of profit. That will be the way to get back at the

corporate media empire, Mr. Speaker, but not at the reporters and the editors who I think are the guardians of the First Amendment.

"It's funny that in the last four years, we've seen what has happened with the concept of democracy all through Eastern Europe and through many countries in the world such as Burma and South America. We've seen that democracy is a very important right that is intrinsic in human nature, and we also see that the right to speech and the right to the freedom of the press are very much a part and parcel of the concept of democracy.

"It seems to me that we are going in the opposite direction in our State. We've always stood up for free speech and free assembly and many rights such as these, and I think that these two resolutions really take us backwards. It is my understanding that there is no such resolution such as this in any state. We attempted to pass a law on this matter. I think the deep kinds of efforts that we make really do not hold Hawaii up into the kind of shining light that we should be as a hallmark of democracy.

"Therefore, I really urge all of you to vote against these two resolutions, and if you do have a complaint against the corporate media, that these complaints be best handled, I believe, in the anti-trust or tax laws.

"Thank you."

Representative Santiago then rose to speak in favor of the resolutions, stating:

"I stick my neck out every once in a while and I'm going to do it on this one. I'm going to rise and speak in support of these two measures and I do so with some mixed emotions. For those of you who were entertained in our Finance Committee hearing the other night when we took this measure up, it was quite emotional, and we did talk about some of the issues that Representative Hagino just mentioned about the displeasure at times with what the media prints.

"What I find so interesting in this measure, and I see my colleague, Representative Amaral, is not here today. She spoke very eloquently the first time this came up about how interesting we find it to have such opposition to something that's totally voluntary and something that we've asked them to develop on their own. We talk about free speech ... let me ask anybody who, as a result of us being in public office and having fully disclosed everything -- what we own, what interest we have, what leis we receive and everything else -- has that inhibited anybody from getting up and saying what's on their minds on this floor? I would say not. Certainly, I can attest to that.

"So let me say that I don't see how having a voluntary measure such as this, to find out if there are some conflicts of interest that is occurring for someone who has as much influence as the media has on our public, it's something that everybody is going to get so upset about. I'm not going to stand up on a soap box and defend the press. I think they can do that on their own and they do it very well, and I am sure they'll do it very well on this particular issue again. But I do find it interesting that we have so much concern about an issue that they can do voluntarily. We're saying ... you guys develop how and what you want to do if you want to do it. It's something that we have a responsibility, as politicians and representatives of our communities, if this is a concern, and I think it is, to bring forth.

"And further let me say, when we talk about free speech and we talk about the continuation of this discussion, I'd like to see what my esteemed colleagues over in the Senate would have said about a measure like this, in all their wisdom, and see if they can come up with some amendments to improve something like this, and I will again hopefully not get up too swiftly, but I rise in support of this.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose to speak against the resolutions, stating:

"I will begin with the commendation for the author whose tenacity, intuitiveness, vigor and pursuit to seeing this thing through is commendable. However, in Charlottesville, Virginia, there was a similar individual with the same tenacity, and freedom-loving, and energy beating hard in his breath, and his name was Thomas Jefferson. And Thomas Jefferson said if given the option to have government without the press or to have the press without government, 'I would choose the latter.'

"Now this resolution is voluntary. This resolution is not something that we are forcing them to do. But in the same way as the Judiciary Committee last year established the fact that verbal disrespect is the first act to violence, as soon as you call somebody a name, as soon as you say the s.o.b. this or that, that is the next thing that precedes the punch in the nose or the blackeye, or the tripping, or the physical violence.

"And what we have here, Mr. Speaker ... this is the banana peel -- and I didn't bring one on the slippery slope of the censorship of the press. This is the first slip of which next time, in those when we're gone will say, well, this year -- 1993 -- we brought up the fact that when we asked them to voluntarily show me your assets and I'll show you my opinion kind of perspective, and then they may go a little bit further. That is what this slippery slope is about.

"And lastly and, quite frankly, Mr. Speaker, I'm going to be quite embarrassed when this body and this State are held up to the ridicule by this country and this country's press when they say ... look what Hawaii did after 200 years of the freedom of the press. Hawaii had the gall and the audacity to say ... we want you to show us your assets before we show you our opinion. I don't think that's good for this State, and I think this is a bad precedence.

"Thank you."

Representative Bainum then rose to speak against the resolutions, stating:

"I voted for this measure during the Judiciary Committee hearing because I believed this resolution deserved additional discussion and research. As part of my research, I read and was struck by the words of Franklin D. Roosevelt written in September of 1940. FDR wrote, 'Freedom of conscience, of education, of speech, of assembly, are among the very fundamentals of democracy and all of them would be nullified should freedom of the press ever be successfully challenged.'

"My diagnosis of this resolution is that no matter how innocuous it may appear in its present state, it might mutate into the first challenge of the freedom of the press.

"For that reason, Mr. Speaker, please ask the Clerk to record a no vote on these resolutions for me.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hirono then rose to speak against the resolutions, stating:

"We may not like or agree with what the media reports, but a free press is so fundamental to our democracy that I cannot support even a resolution which is intended to send some sort of message to the media, and it appears that the message is something like ... since we all have to report our financial interests, you are to be required to do so also, or we're going to request that you do so.

"Why stop there? Why not ask for the disclosure of financial interests from our CEOs, their officers, all of our major companies, our utilities, our union leaders -- where does it all end? Don't we want to know what motivates them to do whatever it is they're doing?

"Hassling the media is not going to restore the public confidence in the political process. Doing our jobs well will."

Representative Say then rose to speak in favor of the resolutions, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the purpose of these two resolutions is to urge the local print and broadcast media to voluntarily establish a financial disclosure system that would provide the public with information such as the revenue sources and assets held by those in the business of providing news stories and editorials for the general public.

"Mr. Speaker, let me begin by saying that there are no ulterior motives behind these resolutions. The idea of the inception was brought up at the hearing that we had on a particular bill in the Finance Committee, and one of our good collegues in the Minority proposed this to Representative Thielen. We are not trying to influence or alter anything that the media chooses to present. If read thoroughly and interpreted properly by the lay person rather than attorneys, these resolutions do not fly in the face of the First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution. Rather, these proposals are intended to give the public a point of reference as far as where the information givers are coming from. The issue here today is not about the right to free press, rather it is about a perspective. And I agree with one of my colleagues from the Moiliili/McCully area.

'I sincerely believe that the public has a right to know if the information presented by the media is influenced in any way by their financial interests. I believe that the media has too often mislead the public with inaccurate or incorrect information -- with no viable way for the public to dispute or disclaim such information which was also attested to by Representative Tam during decision-making in regards to, Mr. Speaker, having a small section in this paper to say, this is incorrect or a slur that was incorrect the previous day. Once the damage has been done, the damage is done. As we all know, information that the media presents to the public is very vital. It affects all of us as far as one's reelection or election to public office. And ultimately, Mr. Speaker, it shapes one's decisions. In that respect, Mr. Speaker, the public has a right to know about those that are giving them this information.

"Receiving information from the media is, I would say to the general public, for me, is a one-way street. There exists very little opportunity for the average citizen to interact with those that are presenting the news and editorials to them. This situation then relies heavily on the media being fair and objective. Mr. Speaker, I was very hurt one morning listening to one of our radio talk shows, telling the general public ... I'll give you a hundred pogs if you can tell me where one of our good Senators was. I don't like to hear that kind of thing on the radio, Mr. Speaker. And to that particular

individual, an elected official, he could be put to that kind of a test. A hundred pogs to the general public ... where's one of our Senators? Is he in Las Vegas? Is he in Los Angeles? Where is he? The person who calls up will get that hundred pogs or fifty pogs. This situation then relies heavily on the media being fair and objective. I ask then ... how is an individual to judge that fairness and objectivity for all? What point of perspective does one have to judge the credibility of those presenting the so-called facts to them? I believe that the proposals contained in these resolutions begin to address this situation. By asking the media, members, to voluntarily disclose their financial interests, the general public that we all represent, will be better able to decide for themselves if a news story or editorial was perhaps influenced by an outside interest, or was indeed presented objectively. It will not be a definitive source for dispute, but nevertheless, Mr. Speaker, it gives the public another point of view -- another perspective -- a perspective which is totally non-existent today. Again, members, the public will be better able to decide for themselves.

"Mr. Speaker and members, the media are not virtuous—they are a business, and you folks all recognize that business. To buy a full-page ad is five thousand dollars in your reelection campaign. They must and will always do what is necessary for them to remain economically viable, and they can be influenced financially.

"Mr. Speaker and members, let me re-emphasize the fact that this proposal is strictly voluntary. We are simply asking the media to act in good faith and to let the public know if they are involved in any outside financial interests. The media will have the choice to establish their own disclosure system, or do nothing at all. It is entirely up to them, as far as what Representative Santiago and I have stated.

"Mr. Speaker and members, however, if they choose not to pursue this disclosure system, it will be very unfortunate for the public -- the people that elected us. At the very least then, these resolutions have promoted, for all of us, a very healthy dialogue and discussion on a highly important issue. It is my hope that such discussions continue in the Senate.

"I ask all of my colleagues for their favorable consideration of these two measures.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tajiri then rose to speak in favor of the resolutions, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, these two resolutions are being characterized by some previous speakers as being flippant or in some measure, on the part of some of us or the sponsor, is some measure of vindictiveness or some way of getting back at the media. But I don't see this as such. I believe this is a very, very important piece of legislation, perhaps even the most important one that we will pass this year. Why do I say that? Because it is not really what is important to us, as elected officials, or what is important to the media that is important. What is important, and democracy rests on this, is that we have a well-informed, knowledgeable population. cannot flourish with people who don't understand what's going on and are not knowledgeable in the workings of government or thinks otherwise. You know, when we make a mistake, it should be found out. That is the role of the media. But is it the role of the media to report a slanted version and report it as news and then go and hide behind the First Amendment? I have a little trouble with that. We got to understand that when the Constitution was first written, we had no Gannetts, we had no Don Ray medias, or the media group. We are talking about mega-conglomerates that are now calling themselves the media.

'In the House Finance Committee, I had brought this subject up and it was Mr. Portnoy, who is the legal counsel for the media -- he has been the legal counsel according to him for the last twenty years -- who admitted the fact that today we are not playing on an even or a level field. He admitted that point blank -- straight. The funny thing is that the media would like to have the public, maybe, understand that it is a level playing field. Let me quote you from the Honolulu Star-Bulletin editorial, April 19, 1993. In the second paragraph, it 'In both cases, government officials believe savs: something is terribly wrong with the media in Hawaii because they are unhappy with the overall coverage. They also believe that the scales are always tipped in favor of the all-powerful press and there is no recourse to rectify or improve the unsatisfactory journalism.'

"The question I have to the media -- whoever wrote this: Why is it that Mr. Portnoy's comments and belief and his admission that it is not a level playing field -- why was that not also carried in this editorial? If you just read this and the public would just read this, they would believe that we're saying it, and it is only our opinion.

"This editorial also said: 'One of the media's most important roles is to observe and analyze the people being paid by taxpayers. An independent press, free to report and comment on public officials and operations, is one of the great safeguards of democracy.' There is no argument here. I don't think any of us would take exception to that. The problem with that ... where are they coming from?

"We assume that the media factually reports on public officials and our operations, if you just read those words. Second to the last paragraph, 'As for the lack of recourse available to disgruntled politicians, several exists -- letters to the editor and calls to the newsrooms.' Did you ever try to make a correction? There are some of us who tried -- some of us who, in the past in our political lives, have written letters to the editor.

"Did any of you take notice on the Advertiser's account of what happened in the Finance Committee. The second to the last paragraph says, 'Media attorney, Jeffrey Portnoy, who represents the Advertiser and other local news organizations, has testified that no other legislative body in the nation has passed a law mandating members of the media to disclose their financial information. The resolution,' he says, 'is clearly unconstitutional and infringes on free speech and press as well as privacy.'

"The second to the last paragraph says that 'this law mandates members to disclose,' and it doesn't. This very article that is supposed to cover what these resolutions we're talking about is wrong by itself. It doesn't even have relevance here because it is referencing another instrument -- not the one that was before the House Finance Committee. Is it through incompetence? Oversight? Or was it placed there just by design? We don't know.

"I guess I can tell the members of the media ... please report right, report correctly, because the very fiber of our democracy rests with the population that is informed. We can go on and on and discuss this, Mr. Speaker, and a lot can be said and a lot of arguments can be made. But if this erupts to be a turf battle between politicians and the media, the only people to lose will be the people. I don't believe that we're asking too much from them. If the position of the media is that they stand behind the First Amendment of the Constitution, I don't see how we can applaud, or require, or even suggest, the requirement

that we, as elected officials who are part of the main part of the Constitution, have to divulge our assets. There's some degree of hyprocrisy here.

"As I've told Mr. Portnoy in our Finance Committee and Mr Grier, all of us here -- sitting in this chamber -- we are certified every two years by the people. How do we re-certify the media? The answer was ... by the amount or the people buying the newspapers. And my answer to that was I know a lot of my friends who buy the newspaper only for the orbituaries, some of them only for the sports section, some of them to see what movies are going on, and a lot of wives to see what kind of sale Star Markets or Foodland is having.

"You know, Mr. Speaker, I'd like to close by saying this. If each of us can look and check our conscience ... over the years I've heard a lot of people -- elected types -- question the role of the modern media ... if something is not done, if the people are not made aware of the realities of what the media is doing, then we have a sad future laying before us, not only in Hawaii, but in the United States. We cannot keep on going and having entertainment passed off as factual.

"I hope that some of you, that all of you in fact, would vote on these resolutions because we are not looking at this as a media versus politicians. I truly believe that this is in the best interest of the people.

"I thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stegmaier then rose to speak against the resolutions, stating:

"These resolutions, in my opinion, ask that the media abide by standards that are reserved to public officials and, Mr. Speaker, since the media are not public officials, I ask the Clerk to record no votes for me.

"Thank you."

Representative Hagino then rose and stated:

"I had not intended to speak again on this measure but after listening to the longest speeches of the prior two speakers — not Representative Stegmaier's — I felt that I am more afraid of these resolutions than I was before. When it is discussed as one of the most important resolutions, it gives me some fear that if there is no voluntary compliance, that we will enact laws next session.

"You know, to make comments such as a lot has happened within two hundred years, or the modern media has changed, would leave an unsuspecting public person -- someone in the public -- to believe that had Thomas Jefferson, or John Hancock, or any other framers of the Declaration of Independence or the Constitution had been alive today, that they would not include the First Amendment as part of the Bill of Rights. None of these people would have done it. This is what you are left with. I would warrant, Mr. Speaker, that Madison and Monroe and all of these 'parents' of the American Constitution would say, if they were alive today, that, yes, it would still be a First Amendment right and they would reaffirm that. In spite of all the problems we may have with the corporate media today, I have no doubts in my mind that Thomas Jefferson today, Tom Caine and people who wrote the Federalist papers, people who wrote the Constitution, would tell you, again and again, that the First Amendment is probably the most cherished right in any democracy.

"Now, let's look at some of the stories that the media or press has carried in the last six months. The problem with the Stadium Authority and its director, Ken Kiyabu; the scandals of the ERS; the uproar of the Governor's judicial appointment to the Supreme Court; in our own turf -- the koa benches. These are the kinds of stories that have appeared in the press in the last five or six months. We may not like some of the stories but hasn't the public been educated because a few reporters, a few editors, decided that they were going to run the story and face any kind of retribution that this Legislature may enact on them? You know, I think that takes courage, and let's not forget that. Sure, we may not like a story now and then, or maybe quite often. I didn't like some of the stories but to throw out the possibilities that we will not have this kind of journalism, I think really gets to the heart of these resolutions.

"Also, the previous speaker mentioned his concern about a radio station passing out free pogs. You've got to understand that the laws are different as it pertains to the electronic media and as it pertains to the free press. For example, twenty years ago there was a radio station called KTRG. Some of us may remember that. That station was extremely reactionary -- extremely racist -and when their license renewal came up, a number of people in the community protested to the Federal Communications Commission and documented all the instances where that radio station had committed a number of violations. The FCC did not grant that station a license renewal. I think all radio and television stations still have to get renewals every five years or every seven years. That is a different situation from trying to put a chilling effect on the First Amendment. So there are other avenues that are available as it pertains to the electronic media and if aggrieved legislators want to pursue that, that is the proper avenue.

"The concerns about the corporate media, as I stated before, you can go seek changes in the anti-trust law, you can seek changes in the tax laws -- that's the way to get back at the corporate media. But to put any cloud or chill on the First Amendment, I think, is a very, very grave mistake, Mr. Speaker, and I urge all of you to vote against these resolutions.

"Thank you."

Representative Pepper then rose to speak in support of the resolutions, stating:

"The tenor of this debate at this point leads me to point out that your Finance Committee voted 15 to nothing to hold the bill which would have required financial disclosure by the media, and we were right. We reported out these resolutions requesting disclosure, not requiring anything, and again we were right.

"Mr. Speaker, in the interest of time, I request that the remainder of my remarks be included in the Journal," and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Further remarks by Representative Pepper are hereby inserted:

"Democracy depends on an informal citizenry. These days, we are almost entirely dependent on the media for our information. It seems to me we have a right to judge the quality of that information. One aid in making that judgment about quality is to know whether something other than who, what, when, where, why, may be directing the reporting of information; namely, how much. We hope not. But at this point, we could use a little bit of reassurance.

"In these resolutions, we merely request. We request only voluntary reporting. We request that the media

develop their systems for voluntary reporting. Mr. Speaker, that doesn't sound like bullying to me. That doesn't sound like a threat to the First Amendment to me."

Representative Chun then rose to speak against the resolutions, stating:

"As in the discussion in our Judiciary Committee, I would have supported something that was less broad than what's here before us today. I believe that the owners and editors of different media need a little more scrutiny in terms of their financial interests, but in terms of those camera people, writers, et cetera, I don't necessarily agree that this should apply to them.

"If this resolution passes, it may show that some people in the media really need to get better pay. That may be a positive outcome of this. At the same time, I believe this discussion has been extremely healthy. I think that the public needs to be very critical of both their elected officials, as well as the media, and to look at anything that is presented to them with some grain of salt and critical thinking.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"What I'm hearing from a number of members who support this resolution is that they don't like what the media is saying. I think what we need to do is take a look at the difference between the news reporters who are out there stating the facts. Maybe sometimes they are incorrect in their interpretation, but we certainly have available to us the ability to send in a letter to the editors to ask for a correction in the paper. I notice the papers regularly print those corrections, and we are able to rectify it if a news reporter, a line person, doesn't pick up a story exactly correct. I look at this as real retaliation against those news reporters, and those are the last people that we should be challenging or attacking. They are there to report the facts, and it's tremendously important that they do so.

"I heard the Chair of the Finance Committee say something that to me was absolutely chilling, that these proposals in these resolutions, and I quote him: 'Begin and start to address the problems...'

"So, what are we looking at? Censorship by the State of Hawaii? It appears to me as if that's the direction it goes.

"I've been in a lot of David and Goliath battles, Mr. Speaker, representing the side with David -- the real minority -- and I guess I stand here again in the minority. Maybe the editors were against us, maybe the editors wanted H3 built, maybe the editors wanted Hale Mohalu demolished, maybe the editors wanted Camp Kailua torn down, and maybe the editors wanted Ameron to be able to build the quarry. But for those of us who were on the side of David, fighting against the H3, fighting to save Hale Mohalu, fighting to preserve Camp Kailua, and fighting to keep Ameron out, the point is, Mr. Speaker, those news reporters reported the facts. Their editors may have been on the other side ... that's what the editorial page is for. But those reporters were out there, fairly reporting both sides of the issues based upon the facts. That's where we get the information out to the public, and the public is able to form its own opinion.

"I think that these measures are retaliation because some people don't like what they read in the paper, Mr. Speaker, and I conclude my remarks by asking, or moving for a Roll Call vote."

At 3:06 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 3:08 o'clock p.m.

Representative Peters then rose to speak in favor of the resolutions, stating:

"As the introducer of this resolution, I think I should disclose my intentions, contrary to those that have been expressed by the Minority Floor Leader.

"The media, as we know, is the most powerful entity in society today, and I challenge anyone who denies that. Talk about David and Goliath. All you have to do is read the resolution. Take two or three minutes, whatever it is, but read the resolution. Are we tampering with what they say and how they say it? What they write and how they write it? Of course not. I don't care what the heck they write and how they write it — that's their business. But any entity with that kind of awesome power, that is granted certain kinds of privileges or rights under our laws, should be held accountable to some extent. There is no accountability.

"In the past, we had some rather strong libel laws and so the message to reporters and editors alike was ... go ahead and write what you want but be aware -- if you're libelous, you're going to get sued.

"I submit to you, Mr. Speaker, that our libel laws today are like gummy bears -- no teeth! There is no libel law and so the media continues to be reckless. Let me share with you, and I quote a message that was written in Mid-Week by one of our commentators when I introduced the bill on disclosure. He said, and I quote: 'Representative Peters is absolutely wrong. The media has the absolute right to report irresponsibly if that is the course of action they want to take. The rest of us have the absolute right not to buy their product or their service.' I consider that the epitomy of arrogance. You talk about power.

"That aside, all we're asking for is a little sunshine to have a gleaming hope, if you will, in increasing that flame on the First Amendment. The people have a right to know. Would you let any strangers into your house without knowing who they are? Yet, everytime you turn on the radio and television and you buy a newspaper, you know who it is that is writing that article or that's conducting that talk show. Many of them are intruders—they're strangers—and they are protected! Don't you think the public would be well served to know who these people are and what kind of interest they have, if they slight the article one way or the other that, in fact, they may have some interest?

"Maybe I should end with a question that I'm sure the media would have asked us if we hesitated to disclose ... WHAT DO YOU HAVE TO HIDE?"

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"I didn't intend to stand up, but I think with my experience in the Third World and under dictatorship, I've got to mention it because we're all creatures of our own experiences. By the way, I'm speaking, as before, against this. The previous speaker, however eloquent, didn't persuade me, Mr. Speaker.

"What I think we're missing, and I'm going to bring up the five dollar word we used last week -- myopia. I agree with the articulateness, the conceptual framework of it; however, the myopia of the reality of the society

without a free press is frightening. . .disturbing. And as an American, we've got to be able to look beyond what are some of the short-term gains versus the long-term institutional downsize. I've seen where there's teeth against the press; I've seen where there's exile; I've seen where there's muzzling; I've seen where there's imprisonment; and I've seen where there's even death if we take it to the extreme.

"Now that's a different reality because it's a different country. But you get to those places by slipping and playing, if we are, with the concept which the framers said ... this is the fact; we have freedom of the press. If you vote against this resolution, you're voting for freedom of the press. If you vote for it, you're voting for freedom from the press, and that's what I hear is being spoken of -- freedom from the press!

"As public servants, it'll never happen. We are a creature of it, we are encaged by it -- it's reality. But let's not go to the Third World to learn how free and how coveted we are as Americans to have this freedom, that we don't on a short whim throw it out.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee then rose to speak in favor of the resolutions, stating:

"I had not intended to speak but after hearing everyone else speak, I think it is important to point out what is really at stake here. It is the freedom of the sponsors and supporters to speak their mind. That's freedom of speech.

"I do not buy the argument from my distinguished colleague from the left, although he is on the right, that a vote against this is a vote for freedom of the press and that a vote for the resolutions is freedom from the press. I think a vote either side is for freedom of the press, or freedom of the media, or freedom of speech. That's all.

"It's really refreshing to hear all these different speakers express their points of view. I think what we ought to be careful about is that we do not fall into what I would call, argumentum ad absurdum. The wheel is not going to fall apart either for the press, either for the journalists, or for all of us if these resolutions pass.

"So, in exercising my freedom and expression on the First Amendment, I will vote for the resolutions.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At this time, the Chair recognized Representative

Representative Baker then rose, and the Chair asked:

"Are you rising on a point of order?"

Representative Baker answered:

"No, Mr. Speaker, I rise to move the previous question."

The Chair then said:

"The motion has been made to move the previous question "

The motion was seconded by Representative Ihara.

Representative Thielen then rose to "amend the motion to divide the question. We discussed that in recess a few minutes ago. . .

The Chair responded:

"There is a motion on the floor for the previous question. You're out of order."

Representative Thielen then moved to amend the motion.

The Chair responded:

"You cannot amend that."

Representative Thielen then asked:

"Would you please explain why?"

At 3:17 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 3:21 o'clock p.m.

Upon reconvening at 3:21 o'clock p.m., the motion to move the previous question was put by the Chair and carried unanimously.

Representative Thielen rose and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, is it now timely to move to bifurcate this media disclosure resolution from the rest of the measures on this page?"

The Chair answered in the affirmative.

"Representative Thielen then moved to have the media disclosure resolution bifurcated.

The motion was seconded by Representative Ward.

The motion to bifurcate the media disclosure resolution from the others was put by the Chair and failed to carry by voice vote.

The motion to adopt the reports of the Committee and the resolutions was put by the Chair and carried, and the reports of the Committee were adopted and H.R. No. 425, HD 2, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION URGING PRINT AND BROADCAST MEDIA PERSONNEL TO VOLUNTARILY DISCLOSE ASSETS AND REVENUE SOURCES," and H.C.R. No. 470, HD 2, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION URGING PRINT AND BROADCAST MEDIA PERSONNEL TO VOLUNTARILY DISCLOSE ASSETS AND REVENUE SOURCES," were adopted by a vote of 37 ayes to 11 noes, with Representatives Bainum, Chun, Hagino, Hirono, Marumoto, Morihara, O'Kieffe, Shon, Stegmaier, Thielen and Ward voting no, and Representatives Amaral, M. My reservations about these resolutions briefly, Mr. Speaker, is that it doesn't leverage such military reality such as North Korea's nuclear threat and the strategic importance that Hawaii, for the last two hundred years, has had preeminence.

"In view of the economic reality of Hamakua Sugar, these resolutions should be more likely directed at the economic conversion of sugar rather than the military conversion of Hawaii. That's where we really need the conversion and that's really where we need the economic task force.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the reports of the Committee were adopted and H.R. "Thank you."

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS (FLOOR PRESENTATIONS)

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 458 and 459) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

H.R. No. 458, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION CONGRATULATING AND COMMENDING THE FOUR 1993 LEADERLUNCHEON XVI HONORES OF THE Y.W.C.A. OF OAHU, FOR THEIR EFFORTS IN DEVELOPING AND PROMOTING WOMEN, GIRLS, AND FAMILIES IN HAWAII," was jointly offered by Representatives Young and Baker.

On motion by Representative Young, seconded by Representative Baker and carried, H.R. No. 458 was adopted.

Representative Young rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"For sixteen years the YWCA of Oahu has sponsored the LEADERLUNCHEON to recognize women honorees who are local heroes and role models, and whom by honoring them, we bring honor to ourselves.

"All the honorees are chosen by the selection committee which seeks individuals and organizations, which have brought to the attention of the community important issues for action.

"You may remember some of the past honorees. They were Irmgard Farden Aluli, Haunani Apoliana, Naomi Campbell, Doris Ching, Carole Kai, Ruth Ono, Joyce Tsunoda, and Janice Wolf -- just to name a few -- they number almost one hundred.

"So today we're pleased to recognize the 1993 honorees.

"The first one is Gladys Kamakakuokalani Ainoa Brandt, in her 8th decade, still impacting education, culture and the arts in Hawaii. She graduated from McKinley High School, earned her teaching certificate from the Normal Schools here in Honolulu in 1927, and then started teaching in the public schools in Maui, Honolulu, and Kauai, became Principal in several Kauai schools, and then District Superintendent of the Kauai public schools.

"She left Kauai to become Principal, and then Director of Kamehameha Schools, from 1963 to 1979, provided leadership while contributing her own ideas in the continual unfolding of Princess Pauahi Bishop's dream of education for Hawaiian children.

"She was a member and then Chair of the Board of Regents, University of Hawaii, from 1983 to 1989, and brought insight and expertise to this governing board seeking to expand opportunities for minority students.

"She serves on the Native Hawaiian Historic Preservation Council, of OHA, devoting herself to assessing sites and developing policies to protect these important cultural areas.

"She also currently belongs to several commissions and she has received many honors, among them the 1991 Outstanding Senior Citizen of Oahu; the 1990 Distinguished Alumnus, College of Education, University of Hawaii; and the 1986 Outstanding Hawaiian.

"I am very pleased to introduce to the members -- Gladys Brandt."

Gladys Brandt then rose to be recognized.

"Our next honoree, Dr. Margaret Y. Oda was the very first graduate of the Doctoral Program in the College of Education of the University of Hawaii. She devoted 39 years to teaching children and improving public education, rising to State Deputy Superintendent of Education in the Department of Education. She also established the State Foundation Academic Program, the Honolulu District Middle Schools, the Honolulu District Learning Centers, and the Business-Education Partnership. She designed and implemented the Public Schools of Hawaii Foundation, serving as Executive Vice Chair

"And, I think it is rather wonderful that we have today 'OLELO filming this particular session because, as noted before, she was the first Chair of the Board of 'OLELO, the Corporation for Community Television, founded in 1989 and dedicated to public access.

"She is currently the Chair of the Kuakini Health System, the parent organization of the Kuakini Medical Center and the Geriatric Center, and will oversee the Master Plan for continued growth.

"Members, I am very pleased to introduce -- Dr. Margaret Y. Oda."

Dr. Margaret Y. Oda then rose to be recognized.

"Our next honoree -- Cherye R. Pierce. She is a community leader, has organized hundreds of volunteers for auctions, dances, concerts, celebrity roasts, fashion shows and cookbook sales, thus raising \$1.5-million for organizations, including the Honolulu Symphony Associates, the Honolulu Academy of Arts, the Honolulu Community Theatre, the Hawaii Family Stress Center, Friends of the East-West Center, Bishop Museum, Junior League of Honolulu, Temple Emanu-el, and Rehabilitation Hospital of the Pacific.

"As an example, with a talent for recruiting and encouraging new volunteers to learn fund-raising skills, Cherye, as Chair of the Heart Ball, orchestrated the efforts of 36 volunteers in 1987, 58 volunteers in 1988, 67 volunteers in 1989 to raise a grand total of \$439,000 for the American Heart Association, Hawaii Affiliate.

"In 1989, the very same year as the Heart Ball, Cherye Pierce doubled her efforts to co-chair the Opera Ball, organizing 26 volunteers, inspiring team spirit, and raising \$101,000 for the Hawaii Opera Theatre. In addition, she belongs to numerous boards and organizations for which she raises funds.

"I am pleased to introduce to the members of this House -- Cherye R. Pierce."

Cherye R. Pierce then rose to be recognized.

"I do want to note that I have long been involved in LEADERLUNCHEON and several years ago, I was asked to chair the Board's first Organization Award Nominating Committee. It was really quite a struggle to find organizations in Hawaii that provided equal opportunity to women and an atmosphere that was very safe and healthy for women, and our first award winners at that time were American Trust, KHNL TV, we've also included McDonalds, and Hawaii Pacific University.

"This year, we're pleased to honor Aston Hotels and Resorts-Hawaii. They are unique in Hawaii as being the only major hotel chain with women as general managers, with women holding over 25 percent of its general manager positions statewide, that is 6 of 24, thereby breaking the 'glass ceiling' for women in upper-level hotel management.

"Aston Hotels and Resorts-Hawaii is exceptional also in that women hold 66 percent of its corporate senior executive positions, that is 28 out of 42, which include Vice Presidents, Assistant Vice Presidents, Division Directors, and Department Managers. It was founded in 1948 and now with hotels and employees on Oahu, Maui, Kauai and Hawaii, Aston Hotels and Resorts-Hawaii further demonstrates their commitment to women with company policies regarding nondiscrimination, sexual harassment, educational training opportunities, and family leave. And the executives of Aston Hotels and Resorts-Hawaii generously give considerable time, service and financial support to the YWCA, the Girl Scout Council of Hawaii, and Assets School of Hawaii for dyslexic/learning disabled children.

"In addition, the CEO of Aston Hotels, Andre Tatibouet, serves as the Chair of the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights in Hawaii, and has served as Chair of the Visitor Industry Charity Walk.

"I am pleased, at this time, to introduce Jane Tatibouet, a former colleague of ours, who is Vice President of Government Affairs and Community Relations who will be accepting the award for Aston Hotels and Resorts-Hawaii."

Jane Tatibouet then rose to be recognized.

"Also with Jane are members of the managing staff of Aston Hotels and Resorts-Hawaii who are sitting on the Mauka side," and asked them to stand to be recognized, as follows: Mari Day, Ruth Shiota, Liane Sunn, Lorinda Waltz, Sheila Scarlett, and Doris Oldenburg.

Representative Young continued:

"Members, sitting on the far end of this group of outstanding women is the co-chair of YWCA LEADERLUNCHEON event, Ms. Lily Yao.

"Ms. Yao was herself a former honoree. She began with Pioneer Federal Savings Bank as a teller in 1968 and today, she is the President and Chief Executive Officer of Pioneer Federal Savings Bank -- the first woman President of a major financial organization in Hawaii. She is also the President of the Chinese Chamber of Commerce.

"As a YWCA Board member, I'd like to speak in her words, as she would encourage everyone to attend the LEADERLUNCHEON XVI on Wednesday, May 5th, in the Coral Ballroom of the Hilton Hawaiian Village because the luncheon gives you an opportunity to acknowledge the importance of the contributions of women and the leadership role they perform in our community, and you can honor your outstanding woman employee in your office and the proceeds from this, of course, go to the YWCA's programs.

"I'd like to introduce to you the Co-Chair of this great event -- Lilv Yao."

Ms. Lily Yao then rose to be recognized.

Representative Young then asked the following women, who were seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized: Susan Shintani, President of the Board of the YWCA; Joan Wight, Executive Director of the YWCA; and Beverly Sears, the Public Relations and Events Specialist.

Representative Baker then rose and stated:

"I rise to add my commendations, not only to the honorees on the floor with us today, but to the YWCA for all of the outstanding programs that the Y undertakes, and for providing this opportunity to showcase some of the exemplary women in our community.

"Thank you."

Representative Tam then rose and stated:

"I would like to offer my congratulations, especially to a dear friend who is sitting before us -- Lily Yao. She is the President of the Chinese Chamber of Commerce and on behalf of the Chinese community, we thank you for initiating the Chinatown Clean-up Day. And members, if you are not busy this coming Sunday, at 10:00 o'clock in the morning for about three hours, we will clean up Chinatown, so bring your brooms and gloves and bring your dirty clothes.

"Thank you."

Representative Kanoho then rose and stated:

"I would like to very much add my thanks and congratulations to these very special women leaders who are most deserving of the recognition being bestowed upon them today, but there is one extra special to me whom I have known for fifty years. When she first came to Kauai in 1943, she made quite a splash because, not only was she Hawaiian but as you can well imagine, she was a dazzling beauty at that time and still is.

"As indicated by the Vice Speaker, Gladys Brandt served as Principal of Kalaheo School for two years, and seventeen years as Principal of Kapaa High School before rising to assume the responsibility of Superintendent, and she has been on Kauai for so long that we've always thought of her as a Kauai girl.

"Her zestful life is clearly indicated by her involvement in so many activities in helping others. She's a scholar, she's an educator, a community leader, but most of all, I look at her as just a wonderful person with real genuine warmth and a terrific sense of humor. You are and will always be my queen of queens.

"Thank you."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"I also want to congratulate the honorees today and one that is very special to me -- Jane Tatibouet.

"Jane has touched so many lives of so many people -young women throughout our State. She's been a leader
with the Girl Scouts. She's been a leader in making sure
that the young women have mentors and are able to
shadow people so it will affect their lives as they are
young and growing up in what they will have to look
forward to in the future. She is articulate, intelligent,
dynamic, and a true example of a woman leader in our
State. I am particularly proud of you, Jane."

Representative Marumoto then rose and stated:

"I'm so happy to greet four of my dear friends today. To Mrs. Brandt who has devoted her life to education, we think you are a great role model, and I dare say you've been a great role model longer than anyone else in Hawaii. We are very proud of you as a woman leader.

"And Dr. Oda also has been a great leader in education. She is admired by the Japanese community and in particular by Japanese women who have not been as prominent in decades past as they are these days. We appreciate her contributions.

"And to Cherye Pierce, a neighbor and a friend ... she has done so much for the arts -- the Symphony, the Opera, and organizations such as the Junior League and the Heart Ball -- and we really appreciate your contribution and welcome your continued contribution to our community.

"And to Jane Tatibouet of Aston Hotels, she is a woman who is indefatigable. She has more energy and drive than anyone I know and she takes on tremendous tasks. She raised the money to build Assets School, and she's worked tirelessly for the Red Cross, and she was President of the Girl Scouts while she was running for office and while she served. I would have thought that would be a good excuse to resign for a little while, but all four of these women are really great. The Y did a wonderful job this year and I'm glad you're being commended.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"I, too, stand to commend the best and the brightest that we have sitting in front of us, and one in particular who use to be a member of the gang of three, Mr. Speaker. When we were freshmen, she was among us and she's dearly missed, particularly her wit, her hard work, her entrepreneurial perspective, and yes, Mr. Speaker, her long and her smiling speeches, if all of you remember that. But to me, she will always be General Schwarzkopf -- the hardworking, hard-driving, getting the job done Jane Tatibouet. And, like General McArthur who said, 'I will return,' Jane shall return.

"Thanks for visiting us today."

Representative Herkes then rose and stated:

"I can't let this opportunity go by without adding my praise to Gladys Brandt who I have admired for years. I've always been very, very impressed with her outstanding contributions to the State.

"Of course, to my hotel colleague, Jane Tatibouet, and to Mari Day and the rest of the executives from Aston, my congratulations to you also.

"Thank you."

Representative Yonamine then rose and stated:

"First, I want to commend all of you outstanding honorees and your organization, the YWCA, for presenting something like this to the community and to the House of Representatives.

"I wanted to especially recognize Dr. Margaret Oda. There are many, many good things that go on in the public schools. One of the things was the outstanding dedicated teachers, educators, administrators, parents and

support staff. But in my eight years as a member of the Board of Education, I will always remember the privilege of working with Dr. Oda because she personifies the outstanding leadership, commitment to people, she cares about students, and she gave outstanding leadership in all of her major, major roles throughout your career, so Dr. Oda, I commend you again. We certainly miss you in the public schools.

"Thank you."

Representative Stegmaier then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the resolution did not mention an earlier job that Dr. Oda had at Kaiser High School as a Principal there, and I just wanted to share with the members that her tenure was a time of growth and a very successful time for the school, and we thank you very much for that. In particular, there is one time which really stands out in the minds of lots of people of the Hawaii Kai community where Dr. Oda showed particular guts and gumption. I don't know that she even wants to be reminded of this, but I wanted to bring it to the attention of the members. She kept her word and cut short a graduation ceremony when fireworks erupted a second year, endangering the crowd assembled at that ceremony. It's that kind of strong and principled leadership which distinguished Dr. Oda's educational career, and we thank you very much for that."

Representative Chun then rose and stated:

"I wanted to also add my appreciation and congratulations to all of you. To Gladys Brandt, for bringing honor to McKinley High School. As a graduate of McKinley, I am very proud of what you've been doing for our community.

"To Dr. Oda, for providing the leadership within the Department of Education, when I was a student, and also now as the Chair of the Kuakini Health System, the Medical Center that resides in the district that I serve. Thank you for your leadership.

"And to Cherye, thank you for helping and persevering and getting the funding for non-profits. It's so important and we really appreciate your efforts.

"And to Jane, as a colleague, it's good to see you back here, and I know you've inspired a lot of young people with the Girl Scouts in particular.

"And to Lily Yao, as President of the Chinese Chamber of Commerce, I think you've inspired a lot of young Chinese women.

"Thank you."

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"I would not like to let this opportunity go by without saying a few words.

"First, I would like to thank the good Vice Speaker for allowing me to become part of the celebration today, but above all, I think there are two obvious facts and why we may reiterate too often such obvious facts ... it is very important to do so.

"First, you note the political significance that the resolution was offered by Vice Speaker Jackie Young and Majority Leader Roz Baker. That is the political significance of our celebration today.

"But I would like to also point out a social and economic significance of great importance to Hawaii --

the importance of our tourist industry, and what Jane Tatibouet has done in the past to bring us to a greater awareness of the equal opportunity and the limitless possibilities for women to rise to the best of their ability. If you look at all the Aston managers, they are all women and they hold high-paying, responsible jobs. We want to thank Jane for being here and bringing us to this great awareness because there's too much said about the tourist industry that is not really accurate.

"And thank you again, all of you. I am very pleased to have this opportunity to say again the obvious facts.

"Thank you."

Representative Kawakami then rose and stated:

"I would like to take this opportunity to offer my congratulations to all of the women leaders here today, and I especially want to recognize two outstanding women who have influenced the lives of many of us and the many, many students they have come in contact with. Mrs. Gladys Ainoa Brandt and Dr. Margaret Oda are two outstanding, long-time, dedicated educators who have given of their lives to influence and shape education today and who continue to serve our community in a myriad of service activities.

"It has been a privilege and an honor to have had the opportunity to work with these two role models in the quest for excellence in education.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At this time, Certificates of Recognition and floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Cachola, Hiraki, Lee, D. Ige, Chang, Ward, Herkes, Santiago, Kanoho, Ihara, Kawakami, Chun and Baker.

Representative Okamura rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, Mele Kalikimaka ...

"It may seem a little early and unusual to be celebrating Christmas in April, but not for these four special women that are here today, representing their organization, Christmas in April.

"Very often, we find ourselves caught up in the human 'rat race,' and we forget what is truly important and essential to our well-being and the happiness of those around us. We often need to be reminded of what is truly important and essential in our everyday lives. They are basic acts of kindness, whether it is giving a stranger your loose change when they come up short in the grocery store, pulling over in traffic hour to help someone with a flat tire, or just holding the elevator door open for five more people even when you're in a rush.

"It is these everyday kindnesses that add a little Christmas spirit into our everyday lives. The Junior League has shown us that Christmas isn't just one day of the year when we exchange presents with family and friends. They do not limit this spirit of giving, serving and loving others just to December 25th, but rather, they provide all of us with an example that we all should follow -- Christmas should be an everyday event in our lives.

"This is what Christmas in April*Oahu is all about.

"Christmas in April*Oahu will dedicate and kick-off on April 24th to rehabilitate homes owned by the elderly, impoverished and disabled, so that they may live with the dignity and independence all of us deserve. One of the seven special projects will be to add a handicap ramp around one of the homes so that the owner will be able to access his home safely and easily.

"I would like to thank the community spirited volunteers of Christmas in April*Oahu, not only for their commitment towards the improvement of the quality of life for the people of Hawaii, but also for reminding us of the true Aloha Spirit. They are 'the' true Aloha Spirit. They are, as their motto goes, 'Na Lima E Kokua Aku' -- the hands that help."

Representative Okamura then asked the following honorees who were seated on the House floor to stand to be recognized: Mrs. Valerie Adams, President of Christmas in April; Mrs. Mina Humphries, Fundraising Chairperson; Mrs. Mindy Tucker, President-elect of the Junior League; Mrs. Carol Lee Owen, Public Relations Chairperson and President-elect of Christmas in April.

Representative Chun then rose and stated:

"It's also my honor, on behalf of everyone here, to recognize the Junior League and everyone that has participated in the Christmas in April program.

"As President of the Honolulu Neighborhood Housing Services, I am looking forward to Saturday's event. I know we're going to be waking up and starting work at 6:30 in the morning. Representative Dennis Arakaki and I will be at a home in Kalihi, basically doing the flooring of the home of an older woman and repainting her home -- the exterior -- and whatever else she needs, and I hope that this will turn into something that will be an annual event, if not, a monthly event, and hopefully will inspire other organizations to take up this kind of giving.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Marumoto then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the Junior League is an organization which is nationwide and composed of women who want to learn how to be effective volunteers, and they do great things in the community. They've started projects like Action Line, Hale Kipa, the Zoo Hui, the Friends of Iolani Palace, and the Ewa Spouse Abuse Shelter for Child and Family Services. They have done a lot more and I can't remember all the worthwhile projects, but we really need them in the community. They do really great things and they really teach us the value of volunteerism -- getting together and getting a job done. remarkable project and that it is a real hands-on, getdown-and-dirty, worthwhile, very much needed, community project, and Valerie was just telling me that a construction worker was watching them and inquired as to what they were doing and when he realized that they were fixing up a house on a volunteer basis, he pulled out twenty dollars from his wallet and gave it to them as a donation and asked that they come out to Waianae next year to fix up some houses and they indicated that they would.

"So thank you so much for all your work. We really appreciate it.

"Thank you."

STATEMENT OF OBJECTIONS TO SENATE BILL NO. 1641

Honorable Members Seventeenth Legislature State of Hawaii

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 1641, entitled, 'A Bill for an Act Relating to the State Capitol.'

The purpose of Senate Bill No. 1641 is to allocate office space in the State Capitol for the exclusive use of the legislative branch or of the executive branch, and to require the Department of Accounting and General Services to provide operational and maintenance services for the spaces to be occupied by the Legislature. However, various vital services necessary for efficient building operations and maintenance are not addressed in that exclusive allocation. No space for building operations and office functions of essential services, such as security, informational services, and custodial storage, Those building operations and office is provided. functions are not within the control of the Legislature. Lack of space within the building will preclude efficacious operations and maintenance. Further, operational flexibility and organizational needs are hampered since statutory revision will be required whenever space allocations need to be addressed. Assignment of office space through legislation is impractical.

In addition, while provisional space for the executive branch on the fourth floor may be designated by the Legislature, the bill effectively causes the Department of Budget and Finance to be relocated, creating operational difficulties and potential disruptions in integral daily services and activities of the executive branch.

Furthermore, whenever an agency, other than the Department of Accounting and General Services, controls a building, that agency both budgets and provides for its own operational and maintenance services. That methodology is generally the most efficient. However, under this bill, no budget for operations and maintenance is provided.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 1641 without my approval.

The purpose of this bill is to amend section 466-4(a), Hawaii Revised Statutes, by increasing the number of active certified public accountants on the State Board of Public Accountancy from four to five.

This bill is substantially similar to House Bill No. 438, which was also passed by the Legislature and which I intend to approve. Since House Bill No. 438 accomplishes the purpose of this bill, there is no necessity to enact this bill.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 802 without my approval.

On motion by Representative Bunda, seconded by Representative Ishii-Morikami and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 126, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PHYSICAL THERAPY," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 126 had passed Final Reading at 12:19 o'clock p.m.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 5 on H.B. No. 1975, HD 2, SD 1. CD 3:

Representative Say moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1975, HD 2, SD 1, CD 3, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Stegmaier.

Representative Chang rose to speak in strong support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, fourteen months ago, little did anyone fully realize the immense changes that would befall the Hamakua community. Nor did anyone fully realize the powerful impact of the closure of Hamakua Sugar Co. on the lives and lifestyles of those who, for years, made sugar their livelihood. Now, fourteen months later, Hamakua Sugar Co has ceased its operations, and many people face a future with uncertainty and apprehension. Yes, a lot can happen in fourteen months.

"No, this bill does not make any false promises that will usher in a new 'golden era' of sugar for the Hamakua community. But this bill will allow a fourteen-month harvest of existing sugar cane on the Big Island under an eight million dollar State loan guarantee.

"Mr. Speaker, I realize that this bill, in and of itself, will not take care of the needs of those who are displaced from their jobs as a result of the closure of Hamakua Sugar Co. This bill is not, nor was it ever intended to be, a panacea to all the worries and needs that have arisen as a result of the company's closure.

"What this bill is intended to do is to give about 400 employees the 'go ahead' to harvest cane that is still growing. Reassurance and encouragement, Mr. Speaker. In addition, this bill provides the workers of Hamakua Sugar Co. and their families with a means of livelihood for the next fourteen months. Sustenance, Mr. Speaker. And finally, this bill provides the people of the Hamakua community with valuable time. Time in which these workers and their families can use to pursue various avenues and alternatives, plan for their future, and make important decisions about the course of their lives. We're talking about confidence, promise and self-esteem. It's called hope, Mr. Speaker.

"As we well know, retraining people, diversifying agriculture, redesignating land uses, and coming up with workable and sound solutions do not happen overnight. For these reasons, it is imperative that we embark on a prudent and well-thought course of action that works toward the betterment of the Hamakua community in the long run. One course of action is to enable the employees of Hamakua Sugar Co. to once again commence and conclude harvesting of the 14,000 acres of sugar cane that still remains.

"Not only will this bill provide a steady source of jobs, income, and security for Hamakua employees and their families for the next fourteen months, but this bill will also help stave off the immense impact of unemployment as a result of the company's recent closure. In fact, according to an independent assessment, this fourteen month 'transition period' is expected to generate \$5.1-million in net profits, before taxes and debt service. The harvest will also reap tremendous economic and social benefits to the State by maintaining a reliable source of employment in the Hamakua community, retarding the infusion of unemployment benefits, and reducing social services and other expenses that have resulted from the March 31st closure.

"And according to the Governor, harvest of the remaining crop will avoid \$18-million in county property taxes the estate would owe if Hamakua Sugar Co. lands are taken out of agriculture use before June 30, 1994 (under a 20-year land dedication provision).

"This bill gives prompt and ready relief and assistance to the Hamakua community. And to those who have written off this bill as just a 'Band-Aid' solution, I say to them that it is better to help the people of Hamakua now than it is to turn away an outstretched hand. Let us not forget the years of hard work, sweat, and toil that Hawaii's sugar plantation workers have contributed to the State. Their labor has reaped immense benefits and has yielded great rewards for our State.

"And finally, I wish to thank you. Mr. Speaker, the Governor, the Chair of the Economic Development and Business Concerns Committee and the Chair of the House Finance Committee, and the respective committee members who brought this measure to the floor today. But most of all, I wish to thank the representative of the Hamakua district for his persistence and hard work in enabling this well-thought mechanism to help the Hamakua community and the community-at-large.

"Fellow colleagues, I urge you to support this bill.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Takamine then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, House Bill 1975 represents a positive investment in people. It stands for putting people first.

"House Bill 1975 appropriates \$800,000 for a loan guarantee which will assist the Hamakua trustee to obtain a loan of up to eight million dollars from a commerical bank. This will make possible implementation of a harvesting plan that would yield a profit of approximately five million dollars over a period of fourteen months.

"This harvesting plan, Mr. Speaker, was carefully crafted by identifying the best fourteen acres of sugar cane fields at Hamakua. It took into account the condition of the factory and other equipment, and it involved discussions with the workers about what would be necessary to make the plan work.

"Mr. Speaker, House Bill 1975 contemplates obtaining a 'super priority status' on the crop from the bankruptcy judge. The crop which has been valued at fifty million dollars by two independent assessments would become the primary collateral for securing this commercial loan, thus minimizing any risk to the State.

"Mr. Speaker, this plan would not only keep four out of every five Hamakua workers on the payroll during the harvest period, but would potentially save the taxpayers millions of dollars.

"Without this bill, Mr. Speaker, our government will pay more than five million dollars in unemployment benefits alone. Without this bill, Mr. Speaker, human services costs in our Medicaid, general assistance and other human services programs could run to more than ten million dollars a year. Without this bill, Mr. Speaker, what was previously a twenty-million dollar annual payroll that contributed to the Big Island economy would be totally lost. Without this bill, Mr. Speaker, the electrical power situation on the Big Island would become even more critical. Without this bill, Mr. Speaker, fifty million dollars worth of cane in the fields would go to waste.

"And, Mr. Speaker, by passing this bill, what we will be saving -- which cannot be measured in dollars and cents -- will be much human dignity.

"Mr. Speaker, while lowering the potential costs to taxpayers and addressing the social consequences to the community, House Bill 1975 is only the first step in our approach to responding to the Hamakua situation.

"Through the assistance of the budget conferees and with the help of the two chairpersons, further opportunities to create alternative employment and develop economic potentials in the Hamakua area will be presented when we vote on the budget. Moreover, Mr. Speaker, the budget contains provisions that will allow the

community to be better able to address its urgent medical and housing concerns.

"In addition, Mr. Speaker, Senate Bill 1063 which is still being worked on in conference will create a mechanism through which government, the private sector, and the community can work together to implement sound economic planning for the district. We will have an opportunity to evaluate these measures in the very near future.

"Mr. Speaker, while House Bill 1975 will not solve all of the community problems, for the price of \$800,000, it will buy us valuable time -- time to allow community and economic development efforts that have been started to take root; time to develop job training, diversified agriculture, and human potential alternatives so that when the harvest ends, new opportunities will exist. Instead of losing jobs, dignity, and hope, Hamakua families will have new options and the support necessary to take advantage of them.

"Mr. Speaker, House Bill 1975 is the first piece of a broader investment in the future of the Hamakua community and the economic health of our State, and is the appropriate and necessary response that protects taxpayers, preserves financial assets, and provides a compassionate and humane transition for the people of the community.

"In closing, Mr. Speaker, I would like to express my sincerest appreciation to the many individuals whose hard work helped to bring this bill this far, and to you, Mr. Speaker, and to each of my colleagues, no matter how you vote on this measure, I want to thank you for your understanding, for your support, and for your sensitivity on this matter.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand to speak in defense of the displaced workers of Hamakua Sugar. For too long these people have been lied to about their future. It is time to be truthful with them.

"Now, for many months the Waihee/Cayetano administration has known the likely outcome of the bankruptcy hearings of Hamakua Sugar. Yet, nothing has been done to consider the long-term needs of the workers and the pensioners whose lives have been so devastated by it. Nothing was done in consideration of the lost medical benefits -- benefits which the workers were guaranteed, which they desperately need, and which they no longer have.

"No answers have yet been provided as to a resolution of the housing dilemma.

"Now, after raising the workers' hopes several times with false promises; now, after the company has closed down after the workers have been laid off; now, after the company has shut down the mills; now, after the facility needed to ship the product has been shut down; now, after the fact, the administration is still misleading the workers of Hamakua.

"Mr. Speaker, it is unconscionable of the Waihee/Cayetano administration to toy with these peoples' lives in this manner.

"The administration is asking the taxpayers of Hawaii to come up with eight million dollars for one more

harvest, arguing that this eight million dollars will produce a profit.

"The Governor says that there is some forty million dollars worth of cane in Hamakua's fields. Senator Kobayashi maintains there is little risk in a loan guarantee because the crop is worth fifty million dollars. There is a ten million dollar discrepancy between these two estimates and Trustee Sakuda states that he was unable to complete an accurate inspection of the fields due to time constraints. Let's be realistic ... no one is very sure of the actual value of the cane.

"The question here is not one merely of dollars, rather, it is a question of priorities.

"Allow me to read some of the quotes from my constituents which express their feelings on this matter. I quote: 'I do not support further financial aid to Hamakua Sugar Company. Some of the employees at the plantation are saying that the crop is not worth harvesting since it has been neglected and given very limited care since it was planted.'

"From another taxpayer, I quote: 'The State of Hawaii would do better spending its money on the development of businesses and industries for the 21st century.'

"And from yet another, and I quote: 'I am shocked at the amount of money the State government is spending on private industry -- the recent loan to Hamakua Sugar, the bail out of Hawaiian Air. This is not State business. No wonder taxes are so high. I feel our State is without leadership.'

"Mr. Speaker, if the Waihee/Cayetano administration can find eight million dollars to invest in the future of Hamakua, I believe there are far more effective ways to use these dollars.

"If we are truly concerned about the well-being of the people of Hamakua, we should be investing these dollars in their economic future, not in a lost dream. This money should be used as seed money to encourage new businesses along the Hamakua Coast.

"It is also imperative that some sort of reeducation and job training be made available to the unemployed workers.

"The pensioners must be given security in housing and in health benefits which they were promised and which they are owed. These funds are too much to squander in a program right away to bring us back to the status quo.

"It is time the Waihee/Cayetano administration look at investing our tax dollars in the future of the community, not in its past.

"It is time to get these peoples' lives off the roller coaster of expectations and disappointments.

"It is time for us to show the leadership expected of us. It is time to work toward a viable tomorrow for the people of Hamakua. And, Mr. Speaker, there is an old saying ... if a dog bites you the first time, it's his fault. If he bites you the second time, it's your fault.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Herkes then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is a very easy bill to walk away from politically. I mean this is just a small little community over in the Big Island that many of you have

probably never even been to. But there are many reasons to support it -- equity, fairness, compassion. And aren't we the party -- the Majority party -- of compassion for the people of this State, our community?

"The risk is minimal. Mr. Speaker, the returns are many in helping keep this community together.

"I was recently talking to a prominent businessman in North Kohala that described the activities of the Kohala Task Force and all of the problems that we had with that, but he said the bottom line of that task force was that it kept the community together, and today, Kohala is a thriving, vibrant community, and that should mean a lot to all of us.

"The closing of sugar operations in Hawaii -- Big Island -- is not new. I've seen Kohala Sugar go down, Puna Sugar go down, Hilo Sugar go down, a number of smaller plantations, and you know it's not because we don't know how to grow and sell sugar ... we're the most efficient sugar producers in the world.

"The Reagan/Bush administration has been more interested in the last few years in subsidizing Third World countries and more concerned about their people than they are people like those in Hamakua and Honokaa. We have allowed Third World countries to dump sugar in the American market and allowed them to subsidize this nation's sweet tooth. That's the essence of the problem.

"Were there other opportunities for this land? Sure. There is some alternative land use opportunities presented. You know, Mr. Speaker, our land use laws are so complicated, so cumbersome, that the opponents had ample time to marshall their forces in opposition to these alternative land uses and because of the world economy, that window snapped shut on us. And so those opportunities are beyond this.

"There's no magic solution to sugar. There's no magic crop waiting in the wings. Last year we heard about the Jerusalem artichoke that was going to be planted in all our sugar fields and solve our energy problems. We don't hear about that anymore. This year there's a magic enzyme that's going to turn sugar into ethanol, but what they don't tell you is that the plant costs ninety million dollars and the fuel costs \$2.50 a gallon, and I don't see investors and consumers lining up for that kind of a deal. We are exploring every alternative for land use, whether it's biomass or whatever, to try to make use of our sugar lands. There is no magic solution.

"But let me tell you ... harvesting this last crop in Hamakua will extend the life of sugar in Kau and keep those people busy, and I want to tell you, that is very important to me.

"The island of Hawaii has had a number of natural and economic disasters, cumulatively probably worse than what we experienced in Kauai. Kauai was very sudden of course ... it happened in a few hours. But in our case, my word, we've got these luxury hotels sitting vacant, jobs are down. And why did we build luxury hotels? Because the State said all we wanted was the finest and the best without any real study about the long-term marketability of these hotels. Coffee's got its problems. Macnut is facing a worldwide glut of inferior product that we've got to face up to. Papaya has its ring-spot virus that the Chairman of Agriculture and I are struggling with. Our entire tropical fruit industry on the Big Island is suffering from the problems of the fruit fly; anthuriums had its blight. We've had one thing after another on the Big Island -- tidal waves, earthquakes, lava flows, floods, wind, drought, even snow. We don't need this rug pulled

out from under this community just yet. This gives us a little more time.

"For example, there's four hundred people on a plantation water system that, because of the fact that this plantation is closing through a chapter proceeding, we could not go in and solve some of these problems because of the problems of dealing with the bankruptcy laws. And I will tell you that I, for one, am sick and tired of hearing what could have been done, or what should have been done, or suggest that the Big Island's labor, business and social communities just sat on their collective hands and did nothing. That's an insult to those people. And to suggest that the representative from Hamakua did nothing but direct the people to the proper welfare lines is a gross injustice to his dedicated and hard work in behalf of the people in his district.

"I urge my colleagues to support this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hagino then rose and requested that his remarks, in support of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Hagino's remarks are as follows:

"My father's side of the family comes from the Hamakua Coast where my grandfather's mill in Wainaku was closed down (ten to fifteen years ago). I was filled with a great deal of sadness. When I drive by the old roads leading to the old house, that grief always returns. So I share that same grief that the Hamakua community feels and that the employees and families affected by the shutdown of the Hilo Coast Processing Company will feel next year. What can be done?

"This bill which seeks to guarantee a loan of eight million dollars so that there can be one more year of harvest is an important but small part of the answer. The one year extension will buy time. But time to do what? The obvious answer will be it will buy time to retrain workers. For what jobs? There was an article in the paper several weeks ago about a report by an economics professor stating that job retraining by and large do not work. Many times we train people for jobs that do not exist or for jobs that soon become obsolete themselves.

"The bottom line is that we need jobs that these sugar cane workers can fill. Tourism is not always the answer.

"Again, where are the jobs? This bill does not go far enough. We must create jobs. And it can be done. Most of you have heard me criticize many of the Kakaako development projects. You are no doubt tired of hearing me, just as tired as I am of having to constantly speak out against those same projects.

"But bear with me for just a few moments. The millions of dollars currently planned for Kakaako can be better spent on the Big Island. Two good purposes will be accomplished. It will spur economic development in East Hawaii, and it will give us breathing space and time in Kakaako. We have spent well over one hundred million dollars there. It is time to pause and look at what we have done.

"Therefore, take the money for the Twin Towers at McKinley -- \$85-million -- \$28-million in GO bonds with an additional \$27-million in revenue bonds. There is also \$15-million to relocate facilities in the area makai of Ala Moana Boulevard. There is three million dollars to relocate the Kewalo Basin marine mammals -- itself an issue of controversy.

"We are talking about \$103-million of funds. What shall we do with this \$103-million? Designate UH-Hilo campus as a community development district. The Hawaii Community Development Authority, which has some experience in urban planning, can plan that campus as a college town. I am talking about a residential college community with the commercial and recreational amenities, additional classrooms and research facilities.

"This massive infusion of money will create construction jobs and later work at the UH-Hilo and Hawaii Community College campuses. We have now created jobs for which we can retrain those sugar cane workers. In fact, I would doubt that we would need much in the way of retraining. The most important achievement will be the creation of jobs.

"This opportunity is available for just this one legislative session. I implore the Big Island delegation to seize the opportunity. In the next few years, attention will be centered on the development of a four-year college at West Oahu. The window of opportunity will open for just a short period of time."

Representative Takumi then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"The bill before us today represents the collective wisdom of the parties who are directly impacted by the closing of the sugar company. The bill makes good economic sense. It saves unemployment insurance and other human services costs, and maintains some of the payroll which then goes back into the local community. Furthermore, the bill would give more time to continue the painful transition needed to ensure that the workers and their families are taken care of.

"And time is exactly what is needed, Mr. Speaker, for the closing of a plantation is not like the closing of a bank or a hotel. It signals the end of a lifestyle, and a rich cultural heritage from which many of us can trace our roots.

"Mr. Speaker, I would also like to take this opportunity to offer my appreciation for the efforts made by my colleague who represents Hamakua. I know that it has been and continues to be a time of anguish for him and his community. He has more than met the challenge of trying to come up with an equitable solution. And I say this with the realization that I, along with my colleague from District 37, also represent a plantation community that may be facing the same situation as Hamakua. I can only hope that when and if that time comes, that we will be able to deal with it as well as the Big Island representative from District 1.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stegmaier then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"As the Chair of the Economic Development and Business Concerns Committee, when I first heard about the loan guarantee about two weeks ago, I had some misgivings. First, it sounded like other appropriations of aid in years gone by that didn't result in the economic renewal or rejuvenation which we had hoped for. It was also hard to discount the concerns of small business people that we were giving preferential treatment to one company and one set of employees over other companies for which such largess would not be extended.

"However, Mr. Speaker, the more I have learned about the situation in Hamakua and about the impact of the bill, the more favorable I have become towards this loan

guarantee. The issue for me, Mr. Speaker, was whether this guarantee was in the public interest and I have concluded this guarantee is in the public interest because it is a good investment of taxpayers' funds. speakers have talked about the reasoned specifics on financing and I would like to emphasize that this guarantee will allow us to plan and implement a smoother transition from sugar to other kinds of employment for the four hundred plus employees working the harvest over the next fourteen months. We will be monitoring and encouraging the work of the Department of Labor and We will be monitoring and Industrial Relations and the Department of Business and Economic Development and Tourism in this retraining transition effort very closely to make certain that our common goals for the people of Hamakua are met during the fourteen-month period.

"Mr. Speaker, I am pleased with the very purposeful package of proposals which the first bankruptcy trustee, Mr. Sakuda, who, by the way, apparently has said that he would like to manage the harvest over the next fourteen months and we're very happy that he is going to be involved. So, intimately with the effort, it contains such elements as financial sacrifice on the part of the workers, a profit-sharing plan for the workers to be awarded at the end of the harvest in order to keep the attrition rate down, and lastly and most importantly, the State being designated by the court as the super priority creditor to ensure the return of that \$800,000 investment.

"I am confident, Mr. Speaker, that this loan guarantee can result in a successful ending to Hamakua Sugar Company which has had many financial problems over the years, and it allows us to complete its life on a positive note.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Isbell then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I would like to add a bright note to all of this. The housing situation is being looked at and we have met. Last year we passed a bill called the mutual housing association which allows the people who are living in an area, whether it be a group of homes or a condominium or apartment building, to purchase that to a mutual housing non-profit association.

"The Neighborhood Reinvestment Corporation is a nonprofit organization which assists in this way. It has federal training. They come in and teach the people how to become owners of their property. It is very possible that there are options available for the people of Hamakua that live in the homes to be able to actually purchase the land under them and to be owners of the homes as well.

"With this all in place, and they have already started this discussion, it would appear to me that the best thing we could do is give these people another fourteen months where they can live together in that community. This gives them time to form this mutual housing association and become landowners and homeowners without having to be condemned by the county because some of the homes are in poor shape. But with this option also comes an opportunity for them to get loans and grants for non-profits from other possibilities such as the Hawaii Community Foundation or other places.

"So I would like to state that this bill is very important to keep things moving so that the people have an opportunity to buy their homes and become a part of a mutual housing association.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"I would like to say very simply that I am deeply moved by the words from the representative from Hamakua, the representative from Puna/Kau, and the representative from Kona/Milolii. I wish to tell them that I stand fully behind them and their constituents and all the people on the Big Island in full support of this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"You've got to know when to hold them and you've got to know when to fold them. You've got to know when you've got fifty million dollars on the ground, you just don't fold up on them. At the same time, you've got to know when you don't throw good money after bad. And if you recall, in 1880 when Hamakua was founded, it was the spirit of entrepreneurialship that moved it. It was not until 1920 when the seven mills that were created contracted to five, and then in 1966 it went down to four, and in 1973 it went down to two, and in 1987 it went down to one for efficiency's sake, not for the sake of money, but for efficiency and the economy's upscale.

"However, Mr. Speaker, in 1988 the writing was put up on the wall that said ... 'Sugar is fading; we need money to keep us afloat.' The writing on the wall went straight to this Legislature in the form of a ten million dollar loan at three percent interest. And, Mr. Speaker, to my knowledge, that ten million dollar loan is still outstanding. That was the writing on the wall that said sugar is fading, we may have to have some last ditch attempts, as we are now, to save it or to hold it up.

"I think we can be optimistic that those 23,000 acres do hold promise for either a ten months or fourteen months of crop, and as for accolades for Mr. Sakuda, his numbers seem to make pretty good sense. It looks like there's enough money for some profit. Coopers and Lybrand seem to mesh with that same reasonable amount of at least near or break-even analysis, and as others have indicated, there's a good chance of putting people back to work, buying time, tranferring payments, before otherwise the grand curtain is down on sugar.

"However, Mr. Speaker, having said all that, as a management consultant and one who looked at Mr. Sakuda's deal, if you will, in detail, I'm very troubled by two things. And as my colleagues have indicated how grateful they are if we all vote for this and how grateful the people of Hamakua are, what I don't understand in the deal is ... why do we have to bribe the workers to come back and give them a ten percent cut of the action? In Mr. Sakuda's restructuring, we've got a profit-sharing of ten percent. It's got to go into the kitty. Now I would think, being that we're reviving Hamakua, that would be sufficient. But why we've got to bribe people to come back to work, I have no idea. It seems very strange.

"The other part of the deal ... just to run Hamakua, we're paying \$120,000 a month. So if you add the professional fees of the administrator and the profits that are going to go into the laborers, half of the money that the State should be reaping goes out the window.

"Mr. Speaker, I have a problem with the way that deal is being structured. I thought we were helping them to get back on their feet, not to milk the company. The way it looks, half the profits are going out the door, or to have management and the laborers kind of skim it off ... this is our last bite of the apple; let's take as much as we can

get. I've got a real problem with the way the deal is structured. I would hope the Department of Agriculture would really look straight at that.

"Now for some reality therapy. If and when the money that is there doesn't come back to us, we are -- those of you who are worried about this -- we are going to get land banking out of it. We don't get our money out of it, we're going to get land, so in the long run there is no real risks. It may be that we get in kind as our return.

"So in conclusion, Mr. Speaker, our money is on the line, but really what's on the line I feel, from the ultimate outcome of this, is leadership. We need sound management to go in there and really do an excellent job of cleaning what is left in the ground, making it at its maximum of economic value, and yes, Mr. Speaker, helping Hamakua's people to get back on its feet, to recharge the spirit of the people, but ultimately, Mr. Speaker, that we all keep our eyes open to the reality of what we are seeing before us. And that reality is that the era of sugar is dying and not anything that we do in this room is going to prevent that inevitability. You can't run away from lightning, you can't postpone the inevitable. We've got to look at this eight million dollars as part of the phasing out and part of what is going to be the funeral cost for the people who see Hamakua dying in that area.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I feel very deeply for the people of the Hamakua region, but I'd like us all to take a step backward and just look at why we are where we are today. Certain of my colleagues have said ... quit calling it a Band-Aid approach. Other colleagues have said ... don't say what we could have done with other land use planning. Don't stand up today and challenge this measure -- this eight million dollar loan guarantee.

"Well, on behalf of the taxpayers in the State of Hawaii and on behalf of the people in the Hamakua region, I have to stand up and say something, Mr. Speaker. I look at where we are today and where we should have been if we had had leadership in the administration on the top floor.

"We have known about the problems of Hamakua. I personally have gone over to the region and gone through the mill. I've talked to department heads to say ... what could we be doing, while we still had the opportunity to do it, before we ended up just with an eight million dollar loan guarantee. I've talked with the trustee, Paul Sakuda. I've talked with Big Island residents. A representative from my staff has sat in on all of the federal court bankruptcy proceedings. And again we are left with a lack of leadership that has brought us to the position of saying ... we are going to be the State guarantor to an eight million dollar loan.

"What that means is ... if there is a default on the loan, we are behind it. It means we are setting \$800,000 out of the general fund aside as the backup for this loan. So there is impact. There's an impact upon the general fund and there's an impact upon our possible tax dollars if the harvest does not pull through. I've heard fifty million dollars in the ground, forty million dollars in the ground. When I look at the trustee's affidavit, he's trying to forecast but without all of the information that he needs, and there is a possible profit of \$2.7-million or a possible profit of \$5.1-million. We won't even know until tomorrow if we qualify for super-priority status in the bankruptcy court. I hope that would happen, but we

don't know. We're going to be passing the bill today but we won't know if we get that status until tomorrow.

"I see us at this step and if the one thing we don't take out of this is knowledge of the experience, then the whole experience is wasted. I hope we are learning from this, that we don't come in with what now is a Band-Aid for the people on the Hamakua region, that instead we take a look at it in 1988 and say ... that place is in trouble. What do we do? How do we help the people of Hamakua?

"Sugar is on the decline -- it will not be able to keep the region alive. We've had five years, and the administration -- the Waihee/Cayetano administration -has had five years and they've done nothing. If we had gone in there and implemented a Hamakua Rural Redevelopment Authority and allowed that Authority to step forward and invite the private sector in, we wouldn't be sitting here in the position we are today. We have to learn from those mistakes. We absolutely have to learn from those mistakes, Mr. Speaker. If we truly put people first, we would have acted with the leadership those people needed to revitalize the area. We would have left these people with their human dignity rather than leaving them, watching the clock tick away month by month by month, by month. And that is the problem, Mr. Speaker. We have not had leadership dealing with this issue. And again, I point to the top floor in this building.

"This is a noble attempt to try to bail out the Hamakua region. But if you're talking about a bailout, you really would anticipate that the bailout would mean that the boat would then be able to sail onward. In this situation we don't have that. All passengers involved -- the State, the employees, and the region -- will be shipwrecked without a solid future.

"According to the Board of Land and Natural Resources Director, Jack Keppler, the eight million simply prepares the region for a soft landing after an orderly wind-down. And rather than backing a soft landing at a cost of eight million, we could have implemented a comprehensive regional development plan, propelling Hamakua into a viable economic future. Mr. Speaker, frankly, we're taking a myopic approach to this problem. We're saying ... we'll harvest the sugar, but again we are not looking at the overall situation.

"We do have a resolution that will be before us which calls for a study of establishing a Rural Redevelopment Authority. That's great, but spend the year studying and then on the eve of the final days of the harvest, we'll have the results of the study and if then we step forward to act, then we may have a Rural Redevelopment Authority that will be in place to take a step forward and do something for the region.

"Frankly, the region can't make it, Mr. Speaker, without the private sector. Unfortunately, this measure does nothing to encourage the involvement of the private sector, or to lay the groundwork for the private sector to step in. If you want long-term jobs, and those aren't going to be just government jobs, you must involve the private sector and you must set up the land use scheme that will allow them to come in and to come in on an active participatory basis.

"Mr. Speaker, we could not get this loan without our State guarantee so that leaves a serious question about the viability of that loan. I'm really deeply troubled about it, Mr. Speaker, because what it does do — what this whole situation does with the lack of leadership — it leaves the people as pawns in this political game, standing there saying they want to be able to work, they want to have a viable economy, they don't want their region to die.

"And again, Mr. Speaker, I am deeply, deeply troubled at the five years' advance warning that this Waihee/Cayetano administration had and they did not act. So today we have this loan guarantee measure before us that again is not solving the problem for the people of Hamakua, and later we will have a wimpy resolution calling for a study of ... shall we create a redevelopment authority. This isn't leadership, Mr. Speaker, and I cannot support a bill that is going to spend eight million dollars on a funeral when we should have used our resources, our collective wisdom, and our leadership, to celebrate and create the rebirth of a rural redeveloped Hamakua.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Baker then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"You know, Mr. Speaker, hindsight is always 50-50, and while the necessity of this bill is disheartening, I am pleased that we were able to put together a plan to address the short-term needs of the people affected by the untimely closing of Hamakua Sugar Company and allow us the time to provide for the long-term needs of the community.

"The measure before us today represents the coordinated efforts of both private and public agencies and organizations who share our concern for the people of Hamakua. Through the proposed loan guarantee, Hamakua Sugar will be able to extend its operations up to an additional fourteen months and harvest up to an additional 14,000 acres of sugar cane with a potential net income of \$5.1-million. We say 'potential' because all of these estimates are based on very, very conservative estimates.

"This measure does not, as some have suggested, revive Hamakua Sugar Company. It does not benefit the company. The biggest winners, Mr. Speaker, in this proposal are the loyal employees of Hamakua Sugar who will be able to continue their employment and provide for the needs of their families. The additional year that this proposal provides will allow the employees to prepare for the transition from life on the plantation to a new career and new challenges.

"Mr. Speaker, because I represent a former plantation community that faced a similar, though less abrupt, transition, I know how important time is when it comes to folks who have to deal with the social, economic, and lifestyle changes that come when you move from an agricultural society or economy to something else. This measure allows that orderly transition and adjustment and allows for training and new economic activities to take place.

"This measure, too, is only part of our overall strategy to assist the people of Hamakua. The other economic stimulus retraining and education measures are in other vehicles that we will be considering on Monday.

"Additionally, the State stands to benefit by making this loan guarantee. We stand to conserve a considerable amount of resources by guaranteeing the loan. Some thirty-five million dollars in savings will be realized through deferred costs in unemployment insurance, human services, housing, and health care, and these cost savings to the State far exceed the \$800,000 commitment necessary to guarantee the loan.

"Additionally, perhaps just as important, is that the Big Island economy will get a reprieve through the continued economic activity and the generation of power that the company provides.

"Mr. Speaker, I stand with my colleagues and many others who have not risen but will be supporting this measure, to add my support and commendation to the representative from Hamakua for his diligence, his hard work, his commitment to work continuously on behalf of the people of the Hamakua region. He has exhibited leadership and perseverance because he is tackling a very difficult problem.

"This bill represents the first part of the strategy that he and others have been working on to assist the people of Hamakua.

"I urge all of my colleagues to support this measure and send a strong message to the people of Hamakua that we are going to stick by them, we're going to work with them, and we're going to help them through the challenges that they're facing, and the new opportunities ahead.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Chun then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I am very thankful to the representatives from the Big Island that have been extremely supportive and actively working towards a solution. I really feel, as the Human Services Committee Chair, there was really a lot of concern for the Hamakua families and how the closing of the sugar company would affect their lives, and I appreciate what the representatives from the private and public sectors have done for us.

"I think the most important message that was shared with us by the representative from Hamakua is that we are preserving human dignity, and I thank him for that."

Representative Hirono then rose to speak in favor of the measure, stating:

"The Majority Leader's remarks touched upon all of the social, economic, and plain humanistic reasons for this bill," and requested that Representative Baker's remarks "be put into the Journal as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Alcon then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, when we talk about leadership, I think this House has taken the leadership by introducing this bill and providing those people of Hamakua the help that they need in order to ensure their future. For the other side of the hall, or shall I say stance, who claim that we do not have leadership, Mr. Speaker, we had shown all the leadership that we have, and they have not.

"I wish to tell you, Mr. Speaker, they talk about having private enterprise do the work. It was private enterprise that ran Hamakua Coast Processing and look what happened to it! We the people -- the common people -- we the members of the House who love the common people, came in to rescue what had happened to the workers. And if they want to talk about leadership, they have not shown it, Mr. Speaker. I think they are blind to a lot of facts that they should have researched before getting here and blame somebody for lack of leadership.

"This bill that is providing for Hamakua, Mr. Speaker, is minor compared to all the help that the private leadership in the savings and loan had helped for themselves. And yet it took government to bail them out.

They were not helping poor people -- they were helping themselves.

"Now, if this is the kind of leadership that we need, we might as well forget about having such a leadership. This House had come to help the people of Kauai, and we have also come to help the people of Hamakua. We are for the poor people, Mr. Speaker, and if this is not leadership, then I know what it is, Mr. Speaker -- it's compassion.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"It was a hundred and one years ago that Grandpa Marumoto came from Japan as a contract worker to work in the fields of Hamakua, harvesting sugar for twelve dollars a month. And for all the past workers of Hamakua Sugar, I am hopeful that this last harvest will be successful.

"Thank you."

Representative Nekoba then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"We've heard today about taking a step back and looking at the situation, and I think what we need now and what this bill does is, instead of taking a step back, it takes a step forward. And it takes a step into these peoples' lives and tries to help them.

"I've listened to all the deliberations today and I was struck by the compassion that the representative from the Hamakua Coast, for whom I've had the honor of working next to these past three months, has. He's taught me a lot about working for the people, being a representative of the people, and really showing compassion for them. And I think that's what this bill does, and that's why I am supporting it.

"Thank you."

Representative Young then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Our colleagues across the way are very fond of pointing their fingers upstairs to the fourteenth and fifteenth floors to the occupants we have up there. I say that the lack of leadership that we have been suffering over the past twelve years has been due to the occupants of the White House -- the Reagan/Bush administration that has been in leadership for twelve years and the economic decisions that have happened in the past. . .

At this point, Representative Thielen rose on a point of order and asked:

"Is the representative speaking to the measure or to the presidency of the nation?"

Representative Young answered:

"I'm speaking to the measure as far as the economic consequences of what has happened in the United States of which Hawaii is a part of.

"And I would also like to say that there is a cliche that redundancy is the hallmark of communication. I know my colleagues across the way are also very fond of cliches, but let me repeat again that the facts of this situation is that the income from the harvest, less expenses of harvesting, will produce a positive net cash flow based upon the trustee's plan of up to \$5.1-million

for the full fourteen months' harvest. The harvest will generate an anticipated \$2- to \$2.5-million in additional tax revenues for the State. The harvest will ensure continued power generation for the community and the Big Island as a whole, and unless the harvest is completed, the crop valued by two independent assessments of more than fifty million dollars will be wasted

"This is a low risk, high reward effort, and I urge our colleagues to support this measure.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1975, HD 2, SD 1, CD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GOVERNMENTAL ASSISTANCE," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives O'Kieffe and Thielen voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 1975 had passed Final Reading at 1:14 o'clock p.m.
