Representative Tom, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 672-94) recommending that H.B. No. 3323 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3323, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RECOVERY OF PAYMENTS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Hirono and Menor being excused.

Representative Tom, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 673-94) recommending that H.B. No. 3474 pass Third Reading.

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3474, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Takumi rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I would like the members to look closely at the bill but you don't have it in front of you because it was passed out unamended. But the bill calls for a pre-employment substance abuse testing for any applicant employed by the Department of Public Safety.

"I am opposed to this bill for a number of reasons:

"One, it is overly broad. It would affect every applicant to the Department of Public Safety, not just those charged with public safety functions. This would include maintenance staff or clerical staff and so on.

"Secondly, the bill calls for. . . all testing shall be done in accordance with policies and procedures established by the Department of Public Safety."

"My concern is that there is no one to look out for the interest and rights of those applicants to develop a procedural policy that takes into account their rights of privacy and so on. As many of you know, the Police Department and the Fire Department also have similar procedures but because they are under a collective bargaining contract for those employees, a process and policy was developed that protected the rights of those employees, but also protected the concern for public safety.

"Lastly, the bill calls for. . . that any applicant who tests positive may be denied employment by the Department for three years following the test.' If you look at the Fire Department and the Police Department, they do not have such a long period of denying employment opportunities.

"So I think, overall, the bill tries to do a little too much, and for that reason I am voting no.

"Thank you."

Representative Pepper then rose to speak in opposition to this bill and requested that Representative Takumi's words be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Tom then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I just want to briefly respond to the comments made since it came out of the Judiciary Committee.

"I think this was a concern that we spent a good twenty/twenty-five minutes on at the hearing about the over-broadness, and I think it was clearly pointed out to the Committee that when you're dealing with public safety, you're always dealing with prisoners, you're dealing with a very violent situation, you're dealing with judgments that have to be made, decision-making, you're dealing with guards, and so we asked: 'Why do you extend it to clerks and other people?' But these people have to, on many occasions, go to the prisons. They have to do work at the prisons. They have to see various persons and recently, there has been several occasions of just secretaries involved in drug dealings in the prisons.

Now, these are people who don't normally work there, but that's a real over-concern. When those things are brought up of actual events, we were really concerned that there may be a real problem here.

"I think that we got to have some established rules. And I think the person in the public safety is the best person to do it, and I just want to say that all of the testimonies were very positive, and although we did ask the question about the over-broadness, as I understood it, the members were satisfied that because of the kind of subject the people you're dealing with and the exposure to the prison, that we had to, at least for now, keep it alive and go from there.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3474, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PRE-EMPLOYMENT SUBSTANCE ABUSE TESTING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Hagino, Pepper, Shon and Takumi voting no, and Representatives Hirono and Menor being excused.

Representative Tom, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 674-94) recommending that H.B. No. 3618, HD 1, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, H.B. No. 3618, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PHYSICIANS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Hirono and Menor being excused.

Representative Bunda, for the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 675-94) recommending that H.B. No. 2613, HD 1, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, H.B. No. 2613, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO JITNEY SERVICES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Hirono and Menor being excused.

"I think the bill really is rather ridiculous in its parameters. I don't think it's workable, and for those people who are going to either have to jog or take the bus after they buy a new car, I think we're going to have some real unhappy consumers.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm rising to cast a very strong vote against House Bill 1258, House Draft 1, and I would like to ask the members listen to the bill. I have two objections to this, Mr. Speaker.

"The first is the procedure. If you take a look at what was given to the public, of notification of what we were going to hear yesterday afternoon at 5:30, the bill would have been House Bill 1258, a rather innocuous bill. In fact, a member of the media mentioned to me that he had looked at this description and thought, oh, well, no big thing. I won't go and listen in on that hearing.

"The description that was provided to the public stated: 'Provides that land condemned for a public purpose shall be used for that purpose within eight years or else the land shall be offered to the original owner.' A use it or lose it conception, Mr. Speaker. And so the people that showed up to testify were the City and County which condemn land for public purposes, and the State department that condemns land for public purpose -- the Department of Land and Natural Resources. Very, very

simple hearing, straightforward bill before us. Then all of a sudden, Mr. Speaker, apparently with advance notice to those City officials and to the State officials only, in slides House Bill 3567, introduced by my colleague from Waianae.

"House Bill 3567 states: 'Provides for attorney's fees in eminent domain cases.' No public notice of this measure being on the agenda, none of the lessees in lease-to-fee conversion being informed that this measure was going to be debated and decided upon, no information on our public notice boards that anyone would know that this measure was going to be before us. So in comes what really was 3567 and becomes 1258 -- the switch.

"What does 1258, House Draft 1, do, Mr. Speaker? It provides, basically, that lessees in lease-to-fee condemnation cases that go to court will be responsible for the attorney's fees of the lessor.

"Now, there was an argument made, Mr. Speaker, and now I'm moving from the procedure which I think was the most undemocratic procedure that I have seen here -- actually since I've been in the Legislature in my four years here, Mr. Speaker -- the most undemocratic process that I've seen. If we're going to do something that affects a large number of people, especially those lessees in lease-to-fee conversion, then we give notice to those people so they can come in and be a part of our decision-making process. We don't use one bill as a vehicle number and slide the substance of another bill in. The process was undemocratic.

"Now I'm going to move to the second point of my objection to this bill, Mr. Speaker. Maybe on a philosophical level, maybe there is merit to my colleague from Waianae's position that the Land Reform Act is ... as he calls it -- 'stealing.' But that's not the bill that is before us. We are not debating whether or not we should eliminate the Land Reform Act -- repeal it. We are not debating that, and that was not the bill before us. So I am setting that measure aside because that's not the argument.

"What we have done today is on lease-to-fee conversions. We have overruled the American rule which says that each party bears her or his own attorney's fees when you go to court, unless it's provided for otherwise specifically in a contract or otherwise in a statute. We know, under the Endangered Species Act, that there are attorney's fees provided when a public group will try to enforce and successfully enforce the provisions of the Endangered Species Act. But it's the rare case, Mr. Speaker. The American rule in our nation is that each side bears his or her own attorney's fees. This measure totally reverses that.

"A matter was brought up, Mr. Speaker, as to whether or not Chapter 101 which is being amended by this bill, whether or not Chapter 101 had any impact whatsoever on the Land Reform Act. An argument was made at the hearing that ... don't worry about it. They aren't related.

"Well, Mr. Speaker, that is incorrect. When Chapter 516, the Land Reform Act was enacted, it was unclear whether Chapter 101 which is the eminent domain chapter could be used to take the fee interest from a private owner; for example, the Bishop Estate, and ultimately transfer it to another private person -- the lessee. Chapter 516, Land Reform Act, was enacted so that title passed from the lessor fee owner to the lessee through the State. In *Midkiff vs. Tom*, the United States Supreme Court held that Chapter 516 satisfied the public purpose requirement of all condemnation proceedings even though the fee went from one private party to another private party. Chapter

516, the Land Reform Act, did not create any new power of eminent domain and this is very important. It merely articulated and explained the public purpose requirement of Chapter 101 which this bill amends, and it established the basic procedure for implementing Chapter 101, eminent domain. In short, Chapter 516 is not a special eminent domain statute, but it's legislation that relies upon 101 for its authority to condemn property.

"Chapter 101, which this bill amends, is the engine which drives the Land Reform Act. That engine now will say ... lessees, you're going to have to pay the lessors attorney's fees if you challenge the price at which this land is offered to you to buy. The result of the amendment, Mr. Speaker, would be to price out of the market purchasers, because the attorney's fees of the lessor could add as much as tens of thousands of dollars per lot in small tracts.

"We basically talk about contracts of adhesion in some ways, Mr. Speaker, where the bargaining parties are not equal. This totally tips the scale. We're dealing with gun control legislation this session. This bill is an economic gun to the head to the lessee in our State. HFDC which.

At this point, the Chair interrupted and advised Representative Thielen "your five minutes are up," whereupon Representative Marumoto rose and yielded her five minutes.

Representative Thielen thanked the Chair and continued, saying:

"I'm going to reserve a little bit of time, Mr. Speaker, for rebuttal because I believe that I will have some discussions opposing my viewpoint.

"Mr. Speaker, HFDC is inevitably going to have to charge more to lessees if this bill becomes law. Right now the lessees, of course, have to pick up the costs. Once we add attorney's fees to those costs, and we are talking high-priced attorney's fees, Mr. Speaker, not our Legal Aid level of attorney's fees which is zero, but we are talking substantial amounts of money. Once we add that to the quotient of what the lessees will have to pay, how many lessees are going to have the nerve, or be willing to risk that substantial financial impact upon them to exercise what is their fair right under our present law to challenge the fair market price for the fee interest?

"What this bill does is it puts a gun right to their heads and says ... you try to challenge us and you're going to have to pay even more for that privilege of going to court. Our judicial system has never, in our State, been closed to people through economic coercion.

"This bill, Mr. Speaker, does precisely that, and I strongly urge all of my colleagues to read it. Those of you who happen to have lessees in your district, or care about the matter from a statewide perspective, I would ask you to read it and to oppose this measure. It is bad public policy, and it is bad law.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tom then rose and stated:

"I just feel compelled to say a few words in support of this bill.

"There has been a statement made here that this is one of the most undemocratic procedure that she has seen in her four years. I just want you to know, Mr. Speaker, that in no way have I ever, as any kind of chairman, if anything, have ever tried to be undemocratic with my

members in the committee. I really take affront to that statement.

"You know, not making excuses, but when you have a committee like Judiciary, you have over a thousand bills and you have only several weeks. That's the process I deal with, and it's really tough sometimes to hear everything within a time that's given to us. And so I want to say I've tried very hard to be fair to everyone in and out of the hearing.

"I want to just state very frankly that both subjects here ... yes, we did start with one eminent domain bill and we ended up with another bill, but both topics dealt with the same subject of eminent domain. It wasn't like I started with the firearms bill and I ended up with same-sex marriage, Mr. Speaker. Both bills dealt with eminent domain. I've tried to be fair, and I think what the other speaker didn't tell you ... she doesn't tell you everything.

"This bill that we did doesn't just make everyone pay attorney's fees to the state or the counties at the highest level. We limited it. It only kicks in if a state or county agency makes an offer to the landowner that is so ridiculously low ... I'll give you fifty cents for your home and the home is worth ten dollars ... and so the landowner has no other choice but to go out and get an attorney and to get appraisals and everything. That is only when the bill kicks in ... when there is such a huge disparity that the state must pay a portion of that attorney's fee, and I want to state that it is only 25 percent of the difference between the low ball offer and the actual fair market value. I want to say that if everyone deals in good faith, then we won't have this bill coming in or triggering in. If I wanted to push through bills, I wouldn't have gutted the bill to begin with, which I felt was a good bill to begin with. But I had to because the testimonies seemed very concerned by the party. And, yes, I did, prior to the hearing, call the various parties -- the counties, the state -- because they are the ones that would have to pay.

"I just want to say that I feel, again, I'll stay with what I said, that both bills deal with the same thing. It wasn't an anti-approach. One day, the media comes to me and says ... this is a Bishop Estate bill. No, it isn't. It's a landowner/lessee. ... it's a bill that barely talks about attorney's fees. It could happen to you, me, or any landowner. It wasn't intended to be a lessee bill or a lessor bill or anything. I've always tried to remain fair in whatever I've done in any bill and find compromise.

"So I want to say, Mr. Speaker, that I feel that what we did was fair, and I stand by what I did."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"I stand not to rebut but to reinforce some of the notes of my colleagues, however, less legalist but more on street language.

"I stood up on this floor last week and commended those who live vertically that they are now on an equal plane with those who live horizontally. Those who live in condos are equal to those who live in houses.

"However, Mr. Speaker, with this bill, on the verge or on the eve of the Supreme Court ruling that conversion is now an option that they have, the Supreme Court has upheld it. What we've got out there are a lot of people sitting on the fence. They have the voluntary option to go to the conversion or to go to the mandatory conversion -- not voluntarily but by the law that was upheld by the Supreme Court.

"What this bill will do, and this is the translation of what she said very eloquently but perhaps not in the street language, is going to discourage people from pursuing with the conversion process (1) because it is going to be more costly; (2) because if they can tie it up in court enough, after eight years it calls the whole deal off. The land then goes back to where it was in the beginning.

"So this is putting a very chilling effect on what otherwise the Supreme Court has ruled ... if you live vertically, you're equal to those who live horizontally, and this just chips away at that basic premise.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Amaral then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"I agree with the Chairman of the Judiciary Committee that I think adequate notice was given on this issue, and I use as part of my argument in that agreement that as he has indicated, the section being amended was 101. As our colleague across the way has indicated, Chapter 101 is categorized as the engine that moves the Land Reform Act. It is one that is of great interest to people who also support the Land Reform Act. Therefore, anyone interested in the engine would have certainly gotten sufficient notice that 101 was up for discussion.

"I think also that just as what was persuasive in the original 1258 was that the use it or lose it concept is as persuasive now in its newly amended measure through fair pay and fair play.

"I think we had more than enough input from people. As I recall, we had about six people there from the public sector, we had a couple of attorneys -- one for lessors, the other for lessees -- we had people from the general public, sitting there to testify. We had a nice, lively debate.

"But the bottom line and my support for this measure, I think, goes to the heart of the premise on the taking. If you agree with some of us that believe that some of the taking under both 516 and under 101 is mean-spirited and a greedy device to take advantage of people and if, in fact, that mean-spirited, greedy way you are also taking advantage of the mandatory conversion that looms over the heads of landowners, then certainly some protection is needed for people that are being offered substantially lower values for their land. And I believe this bill moves forward towards trying to put that protection in place.

"As has previously been said, this is not total awards. You are talking about percentages here -- five percent of what was offered and twenty-five percent of attorney's fees. This is a very cautious offer, and I think that we will, if this succeeds on the floor today, have more than enough time for discussion on this subject as this moves along and winds its way over to our colleagues downstairs. So I hope that the members will support the measure.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Bainum then rose to speak in opposition to the bill, stating:

"This bill is a giant bucket of ice water in the face of lessees of this State, and I ask you to direct the Clerk to cast a no vote for me."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"I want to respond in the two-pronged way that I originally spoke, Mr. Speaker. First, on my statement that the process was undemocratic.

"I recognize that the Chair gave his members advance notice. . . well, actually notices. We walked into the hearing and that notice was in our folders. It's very different, Mr. Speaker, from notice to the public. I would also respond to my colleague, whom I respect very highly, who is the Chair of our House Women's Caucus.

"The notice was inadequate, Mr. Speaker. There is nothing on this description which provides that land condemned for a public purpose shall be used for that purpose within eight years. What lessee would feel that if they did acquire their fee and were using it for their residential purpose that this bill would have any impact upon them at all?

"Mr. Speaker, the original bill dealt with eminent domain. The focus on the second bill is attorney's fees -- attorney's fees, Mr. Speaker. And there it is, clearly in print, but it was never provided to the public.

"On the second prong, Mr. Speaker, the substance of the bill. I don't care whether those attorney's fees are 'limited.' If we're talking high-priced attorneys, which we are, if we're talking the concept of should the lessee have to pay attorney's fees for the lessor at all, and we're taking that step, that's a major departure -- a major step -- and it certainly overrides the American rule.

"We're talking small lessees that want to be able to own their own home in fee, whether it's in the sky or on the land. Adding any additional cost when this bill triggers the provisions is going to make it just impossible for those lessees to proceed.

"What does that mean, Mr. Speaker? Does everyone deal in good faith? That's why we learned about contracts of adhesion in law school and when I was a Legal Aid attorney. We learned that the person with the money, with the bucks, with the powers, is the person in the contract with power. The lessee, with limited resources, with limited funds, without the skill, without the banks of attorneys, without the knowledge, is the party that is at a disadvantage.

"We have a situation of contracts of adhesion and what we have now is to say to the lessee . . . too bad, you don't have the bucks, you don't have the power, you don't have the staff, you don't have the bank of attorneys, but you're going to pay for our attorneys, if you go and challenge what we're saying our fee is worth in court.

"Mr. Speaker, it is, I think, reprehensible, if this body steps ahead and lets this measure even come out for a final reading and vote on the floor.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Peters then rose and stated:

"I am compelled to rise and address, perhaps, some of those concerns that my colleague from Kailua has attempted to use on this floor by misconstruing the truth. The fact is, both measures relate to eminent domain. If anyone here can tell me that attorney's fee is not part of the eminent domain process, you got to be kidding.

"This is a fairness bill. Many small landowners have called me, as well as Representative Isbell, in the course of this year and the previous years talking about their plight as well -- the many, many small landowners. I know the strategy of the media as well as the strategy of some of our detractors. They have attempted to make this a big landowner issue. You got many, many small landowners out there. They did not commit a crime. They are not criminals. Their only crime is that they own

land in Hawaii, and the Legislature passed laws for generations dealing with this power of eminent domain, the power of government to take these innocent landowners' land from them. Put yourself in their position. There are many. HHA did a report. They indicated very eloquently that the majority of land under condominiums are owned by small landowners. They worked hard all their lives, saving, making sacrifices to put their land to maximum use, to generate the income necessary to send their kids to school, and to meet their everyday needs. They are not criminals. The way you listen to the remarks being made around here, they're criminals.

"The power of eminent domain is awesome. Think about it! You have no choice. Government comes in and says, I want your property for a public purpose, and that public purpose has been messed around a little bit too much to the private inurement of certain individuals, even certain individuals on this floor. Lessees, on this floor. But guess what? The media will tell you when you steal from Bishop Estate as a trustee or you steal from a landowner who is on this floor, they're in conflict. But the lessee who is a legislator who benefits from the passage of these kinds of bills -- no mention is made. It is tantamount to saying . . . all the criminals in jail should be let loose. Their victims should be thrown in jail. Same analogy.

"Landowners are not criminals. Put yourself in their position, please, and think about it. All we're saying here is that when you use the power of eminent domain, the power to take land from people, government, and I mean government, because government is the only entity that can use this power, no lessee can use this power to take land from somebody else -- only government can -- when you use that power, be cognizant of the fact that this is an awesome, awesome tool. We expect you to use that power in a fair way, that if you're going to condemn that property, there are two things you got to prove. One is public purpose, and the other is just compensation -- just compensation. What does that mean? That means you must offer a fair market value. There are some out here that would consider it being a ripoff.

"This bill basically says . . . okay government, when you are going to take that land, you make a fair market value offer. If you lowball . . . as an example, if that land has a fair market value of \$200,000, government, if you come in to take that land and you offered \$100,000, and that matter goes to court and the landowner prevails, and the court decides it is \$200,000, then whatever the landowner had to incur as part of their cost for attorney's fees, and I'll yield to my colleague from Kailua, being an attorney, as to what that means. Forty-five percent of that cost . . . government, you will have to pay because you attempted to cheat and rip off that landowner. You were not fair,

"And so, Mr. Speaker, that's all this bill is about. It's a question of fairness. If you made the correct fair market value, then you don't have to go to court. No landowner in their right mind wants to incur their agony of going to court, having to hire a lawyer and not knowing what that expense is going to be, having to hire an appraiser, and on and on. And this is only one person. If you want to apply it to the condos, you got a hundred or two hundred lessees -- they divide that cost by one hundred or two hundred individuals. You have one landowner. And like HHA indicated in their report, these are small landowners.

"It's not a crime to be a lessor. It's not a crime to own land in Hawaii. That's the American way. Stop pushing your communistic perspectives around here."

Representative Stegmaier then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, as a renter who hasn't been able to afford to become a lessee, I ask the Clerk to cast a 'no' vote for me, please."

At this time, Representative Thielen was recognized for a rebuttal.

Representative Peters then rose and stated:

"I believe the rule says that an individual on this floor is entitled to speak twice on a measure."

At 4:33 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 4:35 o'clock p.m.

Representative Thielen then rose on a point of information and said:

"Mr. Speaker, the government is not the one to pay. It is the lessee.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1258, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMINENT DOMAIN," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading, with Representatives Bainum, Chun, Hagino, Marumoto, Shon, Stegmaier and Thielen voting no.

Representative Tom, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 719-94) recommending that H.B. No. 2928, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2928, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIREWORKS," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

"I really believe that if we intend to exercise our independence, it really is necessary to look at other sections of the law that other Legislatures have put into the Hawaii Revised Statutes, and I've cited at least one of them in previous statements that I have made regarding some of the conduct of certain members of the current administration. I believe that there are sufficient statutes on the books requiring removal from office if such budget allotments are taking place without our approval, or in spite of our own actions, that this is the route to take, and this is the best way to send a message to government bureaucrats if they are going to juggle moneys around.

"Although I applaud this measure, I think we should look to the current law as a legislative body, and as one of the three branches of government, and force those laws that we have placed on the books.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"Mr. Speaker, we've got to get beyond this arrogant futile language, and I would hope that someday this bill would come up for another amendment and get that language 'privilege' off of it.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Santiago rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"First of all, I would like to acknowledge the hard work that was put into the development and the passing of this bill by the Energy and Environmental Protection Committee, the members, and their Chair. We have a very serious problem of failing cesspools and septic tanks in certain areas of the island.

"What this bill tries to do is assess a fee to those who will be putting in the cesspool -- actually there's no cesspool allowed anymore -- but septic tanks along those areas where sewer lines are in existence. The fee would then be used to hire more personnel that would then be able to inspect those areas, and inspect those cesspools and septic tanks that are failing.

"This is not going to solve the problem because those people who are in those areas where there is no sewer many times have no alternative because even septic tanks don't work. And I am hopeful that as this bill progresses through the whole process and is looked at closely in the Senate, consideration will be made for those living in areas where there are really no alternative, and the only hope is for the City and County to ultimately do what they are supposed to do which is sewer those areas that have no other alternative and should no longer be functioning with cesspools and septic tanks.

"Finally, I believe, with some concerns from the subject matter committee Chair, the actual fee needs to be looked at when it moves over to the Senate.

"I will vote with reservations because I do see some merit to this bill. I am just hoping again that those people who have no other alternatives, that their needs will be taken into consideration by the department.

"Thank you."

Representative Beirne then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, House Bill 2644 is the subject and a concern of nearly everybody that is a homeowner or not a homeowner, especially in the rural areas. We have a serious problem with sewer lines and septic tanks and cesspools in our area, and this bill would be a good vehicle so that the Department of Health can, in fact, monitor in on the process at this time.

"In my particular area, the Kahana/Kahaluu area and further on down the rural coastline, we have a lot of problems and, of course, even with sewer lines out there, that doesn't always solve the problem either because of the gravity pull. But this particular measure would basically help the Department of Health set up some kind of a monitoring system so that they can see what works and what does not work and further prohibit any more environmental kinds of degradation.

"Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2644, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WATER POLLUTION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative M. Ige voting no.

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3055, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Hagino rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"This deals with UH tuition waivers and just to talk in a generic term about tuition waivers. I have, over the years, been a bit troubled with some of the tuition waivers, and I went back and looked at the 1954 Democratic Party platform which began the modern Democratic Party. As I pointed out in a memo that I sent to everyone, it's ironic that I couldn't find the Party platform at Party headquarters. I had to find it at Hamilton Library which I think is a good plug for the need to improve Hamilton Library. But in any case, the Party platform in 1954 said very clearly that the Party intended to substantially reduce tuition at the University of Hawaii.

"In my opinion, I think what we need to look at in the years ahead is an elimination of all tuition waivers for whatever category that we may have, whether it be ethnic, educational, military basis, you name it, but in its place, to substantially reduce the tuition at the University of Hawaii and to give up any notion that the Regents may have or State government may have, that the tuition

should be part of the pay back for the cost of running the University of Hawaii, a public university. We have to understand that it is **the** university in the State. There is no competing university of that scale in this State, and it is a public facility. While there should be a tuition imposed on students so that they do not take advantage of a free education system which oftentimes when you're given something free, it is abused, that there must be some tuition to make people realize, both students and parents, that it's not totally free and there is some responsibility.

"I believe the way to go eventually, in the years ahead, is to eliminate all tuition waivers and to substantially reduce the tuition and make it available to everyone. For those who cannot afford to pay, we should set up work/study programs or privately endowed scholarships.

"But I think, more and more, we have to get away from creating various classes in our society. There are needs for some protective classes. I don't believe that there is a need for this at the University of Hawaii. Simply substantially reduce the tuition, create work/study programs, create tutorial programs to keep those students from those classes we would like to see enrolled and matriculated at the University of Hawaii. So it's not merely a system of getting them into the university, but making sure that they graduate and become role models for various classes that they represent. I feel that this is the way to go. This makes us an inclusive society, and does not set up classes where I think classes are not warranted.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"This bill is a tribute to our veterans of which we have a hundred thousand in this State, a hundred thousand people who risked their lives, and we're giving them a crumb called 'tuition waivers.' And lest we forget some of the traditions of the Majority Party, some of the best leaders that have come out of the Majority Party have come out of tuition waivers, out of the G.I. Bill, out of benefits for having sacrificed for their country. Right now there are 53 people who are taking advantage of this -- 53 people for a manini \$15,000.

"Mr. Speaker, what I find that defends our sense of priorities when we nickel and dime some of these programs for people who have sacrificed their lives, and I know there's not too many veterans here that have gone through that experience, but as a Vietnam veteran, I think some people are missing what it means to serve the country and what it means to put your life on the line. Now, if we can help by giving people tuition to better their lives, to give them education, I say ... let's do it. Its cost-effective, there's an economy of scale. If you have sixteen people in the classroom and one is getting a free ride by a tuition waiver, you basically spend nothing. This is a free ride. It's a program that when the federal programs were analyzed, the G.I. Bill was said to be the best government program that was ever put in place. This is the State equivalent of that.

"It's a good bill, Mr. Speaker. The people who serve the country now are getting less and less acknowledged and, unfortunately, I think some things that happen in this State may be going in that direction. This bill, fortunately, turns it and sends it in the other.

"Thank you."

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"I will vote in favor of House Bill 3055 on UH tuition waivers, but I would like to clarify my vote with explanations on the two points raised by the previous speakers.

"One, as my distinguished colleague from Central Honolulu has raised, there are nearly eight thousand tuition waivers in the system at a cost of over five million dollars. There is something to be said for the validity of ... if you earn it, it's worth something. If it's given to you, you will not earn it. That is a larger problem which we have to face in the future.

"On the specific bill itself, and this refers to what my colleague from further out in East Honolulu has raised, the original bill was to extend the tuition waivers for Vietnam veterans, to heal the wounds of that war during which many people were drafted unwillingly, and sent to their deaths prematurely. In the metamorphose of that bill, it was extended to 'veterans' of Panama, Grenada, and for any campaign during which the Department of Defense of the United States of America would have been awarded a campaign medal. We're making a broad commitment to those military operations over which we have no control and over which we have no direct bearing as far as the benefits to the citizenry of this State or the State university.

"I am deeply disturbed by that addition. It was not the intent of the Committee on Higher Education to so liberally grant a tuition waiver to so many people without any control at all, especially when we are nearing eight thousand tuition waivers a year. It is quite easy to blather veterans and their sacrifices. It's also easy to blather about militaristic and opportunistic operations in Third World countries. That disturbs me greatly, and I hope that this provision can be remedied in some fashion during the rest of the session.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hagino, in rebuttal, stated:

"You know, I had this phrase that ran through my mind the last two weeks ... wisdom always comes late but only fools believe that it comes too late.

"He made a reference to Vietnam veterans and I want to point out that it was my bill. I offered the legislation that allowed tuition waivers for Vietnam veterans. That was my bill in 1987 or 1988, and certainly I am proud of that bill. I think it served its purpose at that time.

"Over the years, I have come to realize that there are times when you need protective categories, or you need to create classes of individuals and, certainly, I have supported the Civil Rights Commission and many other civil libertarian measures of that nature and employment measures. However, there are areas where I believe these kinds of classes are not necessary, and higher education certainly is one of the problems that universities all across the nation are beginning to face now -- the different classes of individuals.

"I find that very troublesome, and I believe that part of it begins with the creation of classes of individuals to get tuition waivers. It is my belief that the way to deal with educational opportunities is to go back to the founding parents, as it may be of the Democratic Party, to substantially reduce tuition and make educational opportunities available to everyone, regardless of class, regardless of circumstances, and to create a mechanism of work/study and tutorial to ensure that these people, once they get into the system, will graduate. You know, we've used tuition waivers to try to enroll numerous classes of people into the university. Their graduation rate is

abysmal -- absolutely abysmal. In my opinion, we probably do more of a disservice to those groups by creating this incentive and not providing the support mechanisms.

"So we need to look at the totality of how we deliver our educational system, and it should be available to everyone, regardless of their circumstances, and that's the point that I was trying to make. It's because every year, or every two years, we see a number of tuition waiver bills coming across our desks. I think it's time for us to look at a new direction, and that is all that I am trying to point out by my remarks on this bill, and it is not an attack on the veterans.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Not in rebuttal, but in acceptance of the kind spirit in which that was made, I commend the speaker whose hair is as long as mine when I was on a tuition waiver at the University of Hawaii. However, to remove all tuition waivers and say, everybody is the same, is to miss the very essence of what I have said. That is, when you serve your country, you're protecting what you and I have here to stand up on the floor and speak in a democratic process. There is something different about being in a war; there's something different about being in the military.

"To say that we should reduce all tuition waivers because no one really should be a protected class, what I'm saying to the gentleman is that it's different when you go and put your life on the line in the military, and that is a distinguishing characteristic which allows these tuition waivers to prevail. Being in the military is not like any other job. Even though I'm afraid that it's getting to be assumed to be and presumed to be such a case, and I think that's wherein the danger lies, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to add a personal note to the discussion because I think it is important for us to understand that putting one's life in jeopardy is not exclusively the province of those in uniform. I did happen to serve in Vietnam in a civilian capacity, and for the grace of God I stand here today because I missed the bombing of the Embassy. I just happened to be away. I also missed the My Canh restaurant bombing in which a number of my colleagues were killed.

"I don't want to make a point of this, but I'm getting sick and tired of patriotism as a part of our record.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Alcon then rose and stated:

"This is a good bill, Mr. Speaker, and as the previous speakers have said, you do a lot of sacrificing when you go to the battlefield. The only problem with this bill, Mr. Speaker, is that it doesn't take care of future wars or even World War II which I belong.

"Mr. Speaker, despite the fact that they have a lot of philosophies flying around, this is a wonderful bill.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3055, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TUITION WAIVERS FOR VETERANS," having been

read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 597-94 and H.B. No. 3179, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3179, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 598-94 and H.B. No. 3423, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3423, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Stegmaier rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"I am concerned that by allowing construction to take place all-night long, in this case until six in the morning in variance with the health laws of the State, that there would be an adverse impact on approximately 250 families living close by, and that a more reasonable nighttime construction restriction would be more appropriate.

"Hopefully, this change will be made in later drafts of the bill as it moves through the legislative process.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3423, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 599-94 and H.B. No. 3425, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3425, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PUBLIC EMPLOYEES HEALTH FUND," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 600-94 and H.B. No. 3450, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3450, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Marumoto rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I have some strong reservations on this measure. I will be voting for it but would like to express the reservations. It relates to the Hawaii Community Development Authority and I believe it grants inordinate power to this Kakaako Authority to build public facilities and charge Kakaako landowners or lessees a second time.

"Up to now, owners or lessees have been paying improvement district assessments based on infrastructure improvements 'on their street' or very nearby in their districts. Urban planning, new sewer lines, underground

electrical wiring, streets, sidewalks, and other infrastructure improvements have transformed Kakaako into the 20th century, I might add, just before the 21st century.

"However, under this proposed measure, the HCDA can build one or more 'public facilities' such as auditoriums, schools, parks, beaches, garages, community centers, government buildings and other structures -- anywhere in Kakaako and assess people again.

"People who have already paid, or are paying now, or will be paying for improvements in their neighborhood will be taxed -- again -- for who knows what and who knows where? -- something, somewhere -- in Kakaako. Or maybe Hamakua? HCDA also has jurisdiction over Hamakua. We asked these questions in the Finance Committee and have not been able to get concrete answers as to what is going to be built ... what are the plans?

"This bill has been defended as simply a form of tax increment financing or a Mello-Ross device whereby property taxes increase to pay for the improvements. But in this case, the improvement district assessments have already paid for the improvements, property taxes have already gone up anyway as a result of the improvements, and people will be assessed yet again for the new public facilities ... it's a triple whammy.

"In the past, I have supported (somewhat reluctantly) the creation of the Hawaii Community Development Authority, and strongly supported the funding of infrastructure improvements. I also favored pending measures to increase the bond authorization to sixty million dollars. But what I want to know is, what facilities will be built, where, and at what cost and to whom.

"My concern stems from the difficult road small business owners have to face in Hawaii. More often than not, they are lessees, and many of the assessments, property taxes, overhead and maintenance costs are passed down to the bottom of the totem pole -- to small business. The landowner is the big winner in the Kakaako improvement project. The benefits to the lessees and the sublessees are mixed.

"My bottom line is ... whoever is going to have to pay the bill resulting from this measure should know what he or she is paying for and how much it is going to cost.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen then rose to speak strongly against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, once again small business is going to take the hit. The House of Representatives has a Small Business Caucus, but that's not enough to just have a small business caucus. What we need to do is have a small business mentality.

"The **Star-Bulletin** recently revealed that in 1993, Hawaii was ranked third in the nation for having the highest increase of business failures. What are we doing to the small business in Kakaako? Most of those operations are on triple net leases which means that the landlord who is assessed for this massive public improvements is going to simply pass along to the lessee. The problem with this is that those people that are going to be forced to pay the assessments would be ultimately driven out of business and won't be there to benefit from those public facility improvements.

"The bill's language is extremely broad. I'd ask you to look at House Draft 2, page 2, that HCDA can assess

simply by determining the property is improved or benefitted by the special improvement program in a 'general manner or in any other manner.' I mean, you can't be any broader than that, Mr. Speaker, and the ones that take the hit are the small businesses.

"Frankly, when I look at the Kakaako area, I wonder whether it would be wise at all to have the HCDA empowered to do what it has done. We look at the two Stark luxury condominiums standing up like eyesores. Where does this benefit our small businesses? You drive through the sanitized district, and where does this benefit the people of Hawaii?

"I think the bill is a mistake. It gives HCDA even broader power, and I don't feel that they are particularly exercising their power to date in a prudent or wise manner to benefit our residents and small businesses, so I firmly vote against this bill, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hagino then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I have, over the years, been a critic of what's happening in Kakaako and I believe that, over the years, I still have yet to believe that my criticism has been misplaced. It is my opinion, looking at it in its totality, Kakaako, as planned by the State, is a disaster, and this bill only compounds that disaster. If you sit back and look at the original intentions for Kakaako which was industrial land, housing where people could walk to work, it's a total disaster, and this is going to accelerate that disaster.

"I always tell people to compare two parts of Honolulu, and I call it the 'tale of two cities.' The State took away all of the City's jurisdiction in Kakaako and began to plan Kakaako. The City continued to retain its jurisdiction in Chinatown and began at the same time of planning and rejuvenating Chinatown. I ask all of you, really ask all of you, when you have the time, either during session or out of session, it can be during the morning, midday, evening, on a weekend, to go walking through Kakaako and after you're through, go walking through Chinatown, and look at the scale of development of Chinatown versus the scale of development of Kakaako. Look at the kinds of businesses that are available in Chinatown as opposed to what is available in Kakaako. Look at how the people react and how they interact with the businesses and with each other in Chinatown. And Chinatown began with even greater obstacles, in my opinion, than Kakaako did under the jurisdiction of HCDA, and you will see -- I think you'll have the same feeling that I do -- that in Chinatown, life is on a human scale. A person can start a business there -- a person can start a business. You go to Kakaako -- let's face it -- it's going to be an upscale Ala Moana, upscale Waikiki, upscale retail shops, upscale office buildings.

"We're not going to prevent that so long as you continue to pass this kind of legislation. Sure, there will be businesses there over the next twenty, thirty, forty years. But it won't be the kind of businesses that the average person with some entrepreneurial desire will be able to start in Kakaako. It'll be far too expensive for that person -- far too expensive. Only the rich are going to be able to afford to start businesses there. You won't see it now, but it will exacerbate over the next two/three decades, and it will be a disaster.

"So I continue to criticize what's happening there and this bill only compounds the situation, so I ask all of you to do the simple thing ... go walking through Kakaako, go walking through Chinatown, and compare the difference.

"Thank you."

Representative Tam then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, please register a 'no' vote for me on House Bill 3450, HD 2, for the following four reasons:

"One, this bill is anti-business. It reinforces Hawaii's economy as anti-business.

"Two, it hurts small business. As you remember, colleagues, over 70 percent of Hawaii's revenue is generated from small business.

"Third, this bill would force all property owners rather than just the direct beneficiaries to pay for improvements, in essence everybody -- landlords and tenants -- making it very difficult in the state of economy; and

"Fourth, business in Kakaako already is being assessed on improvements by the HCDA.

"Mr. Speaker, this is a tax bill. As per your address to us at the beginning of this year, you said, 'no new taxes.'

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I join my colleagues in speaking against this bill, citing as my beginning the last sentence of my colleague. Mr. Speaker, when we opened this session, you said ... Read my lips, no new taxes, and here we go, again we're belying what we've talked to the people of Hawaii about.

"This one, Mr. Speaker, comes on the backs of the Mom and Pop small businesses, and again I remind ourselves that 86 percent of our small businesses have less than 19 employees. That means we are the small of the small. But I also remind us that 80 percent of all the jobs in the State come from the business community. Only 20 percent of us, Mr. Speaker, work for the government -- that's the federal, the state, and the county. Eighty percent come out of the private sector. What we've got here is a blow to the root of that private sector by taxing the small businesses in Kakaako.

"What we've got, Mr. Speaker, is a piece of legislation that not only, as the previous speakers have said, has interrupted the life and the flow of business in Kakaako, but in fact, Kakaako, for the last five years, has been more of a traffic snarl than it has been a business center.

"But what we're doing while they're down, what we're doing with this bill is kicking them and kicking them and then grabbing the money out of their pockets and saying ... hey, it's good for you. It's going to be best for you in the long run.

"Mr. Speaker, what should happen to this bill is what's going now in Kakaako. We ought to jackhammer it, and break it up, and destroy it.

"Thank you."

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against House Bill 3450, House Draft 2, and to vote against the bill because the previous speakers have convinced me it is not a wise measure to raise taxes, whether you call it assessments or whatnot, this year.

"Besides, the authority given is overly broad, and it behooves us to be circumspect and cautious this year and, therefore, I would like to cast a vote against House Bill 3450, but I will vote in favor of House Bill 3423.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3450, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 38 ayes to 13 noes, with Representatives Arakaki, Chun, Hagino, Hiraki, Isbell, Lee, Shon, Stegmaier, Takumi, Tam, Tanimoto, Thielen and Ward voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 601-94 and H.B. No. 3459, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3459, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE TRANSFER OF THE STATE HEALTH INSURANCE PROGRAM FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 602-94 and H.B. No. 3637, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3637, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE SPECIAL SUPPLEMENTAL FOOD PROGRAMS FOR WOMEN, INFANTS AND CHILDREN," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 603-94 and H.B. No. 3676, HD 1:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3676, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Shon rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Ordinarily, Mr. Speaker, I am very much in favor of special purpose bonds to reduce the cost of health care, and I am not philosophically opposed to spending it on computers which is what this bill does. The troublesome aspect is the timing, Mr. Speaker.

"Many may not be aware, but Queen's Health Care System is one of the competitive bidders for the Health Quest System and the request for proposals have gone out, and one of their competitors is a coalition of small financially marginal community health centers which are very, very important for delivering care for marginal populations as well as rural areas.

"What we are giving here, Mr. Speaker, is an extra edge -- the power and approval in favor of the State to one bidder versus the others. I would feel much more comfortable if this were special purpose bonds to whoever won the bid, or for whoever won the bid to come in after that and ask for assistance for the computers. As it turns out, the community health centers which are competing for this bid and which provide most of the care for the homeless and others -- these folks have the greatest

problem with computers and we are not giving them assistance.

"The Queen's Health System, a four or five billion dollar enterprise, is able to compete in the arena of convention centers and everything else. I think that we should be more cautious when we're granting these bonds to look to see if there's a larger context. I personally feel that this bill would be quite proper if Queen's had won the bid and was coming in for computers to lower the health costs for Health Quest. But the bids have not been won and this does, I believe, give an extra advantage to one of the big players and, therefore, disadvantage to the smaller players.

"For that reason, I would like to vote no.

"Thank you."

Representative Alcon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"This is a good bill except for the fact that the health system for Queen's includes Molokai and somehow, as you know, Mr. Speaker, I have been screaming about the proper health facilities in Molokai. Now we are granting two hundred million dollars, and I hope that even a fraction of that would go to improve the community hospital which they operate in Molokai.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3676, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Amaral, Hagino, Shon, Takumi and Tam voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2622, 2644, 2746, 2919, 2945, 3055, 3179, 3423, 3425, 3450, 3459, 3637 and 3676 had passed Third Reading at 10:36 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 621-94 and H.B. No. 2177, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2177, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FISHING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3133, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE RELIEF OF CERTAIN PERSONS' CLAIMS AGAINST THE STATE AND PROVIDING APPROPRIATIONS THEREFOR," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 634-94 and H.B. No. 3134, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3134, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"I would oppose one provision of this measure which charges child care facilities for criminal history record checks when they hire employees. Government schools and agencies are exempt so I feel child care agencies should also be exempt.

"A previous committee had exempted non-profit child care facilities, and I thought this was a very good idea, for one of the most important reasons government requires background checks on prospective employees in the child care industry is to protect our children from persons who have a record of child abuse.

"The Finance Committee agreed with the premise of charging for criminal history information, but removed the exemption for non-profit child care facilities. Not only do I believe this exemption should be restored, but it should be extended to even for-profit child care institutions and perhaps even pre-schools.

"So, for the sake of our children, I hope this will be the case eventually.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Thielen then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"I am rising to echo the concern of my colleague. I sat on the subject matter committee and we realized in the subject matter committee that non-profit child care

facilities just don't have the money to be able to pay for those record searches.

"The problem with this is that State law does mandate that they have to get them. So what we're doing, really, is eroding away that very thin margin of money that they have to operate the non-profit child care facility.

"I was sorry to see that the Finance Committee felt that we should dip in to that non-profit organization and ask them to pay for this record search.

"I would certainly hope that on the Senate side, they would be more aware of the concerns that we've had in our subject matter committee, and also add back in that exemption.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Chun then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to say that I would like to vote with reservations for the same reasons expressed by the two previous speakers.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3134, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CRIMINAL HISTORY RECORD INFORMATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Tanimoto rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"I would just like to share an expression from the County's point of view.

"Mr. Speaker, I understand the purpose of House Bill 3739 is to expedite the construction of school facilities by exempting developers from State and County zoning and building requirements for five years, subject to some provisions.

"The intent is good; however, I need to let you know the County's position that if it means being somewhat like Act 15, or if it means somewhat like being DHHL and what has happened in Paneawa, and I think that from past experience, I can tell you that if we exempt some of the things that they wish to do, it's a County and State issue as to who will build bus turnarounds. If they are exempt from just building the building and not dealing with the turnaround area for buses, especially where we live in rural areas we do have lot of bussing, it becomes a tremendous problem for the Department of Education, as well as the County Police Department, and nobody wants to take responsibilities yet. Children are unsafely dropped off on streets, and so I just wanted to make my position clear that I do support the bill but I do have some reservations.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3739, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Yonamine rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, there is an old Texas saying that goes ... 'If you always do what you've always done, you'll always get what you've always got.' House Bill 3532, House Draft 2, will always see to it that what we always get is what will always be helpful to good government and the people of Hawaii. This bill allows the Office of the Legislative Auditor to conduct a comprehensive statewide performance audit of government operations. Unlike individual performance audits, this will not be an evaluation of how well any particular person is performing, but rather to determine how well each position in a particular program fits into the framework of an efficient government delivery of services.

"Mr. Speaker, make no mistake about it, this audit is an evaluation of the State government's services to its people. This is an evaluation to see if we are actually doing what we said we would do, to make it possible for our citizens to be better off than they were 'yesterday.' Through the audit, we will challenge the basic assumptions of the Executive Department's missions and objectives, programs and services; review the functions, organizational structures and staffing levels of all agencies; identify services that may be superfluous, duplicative or outmoded; and make recommendations for appropriate changes.

"This bill begins first with a pilot project and initially limits itself with examining one up to four departments in the Executive Branch. These are tough fiscal times ahead of us, as you know, Mr. Speaker. The Performance Audit will give us a better hold in determining the 'right size' of government services to the fiscal realities of the near future. Our citizens deserve an audit to determine what we will 'not always get what we have always gotten,' but that we will continually renew ourselves to better serve our people.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3532, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO A STATE GOVERNMENT PERFORMANCE AUDIT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2175, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BOATING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 665-94 and H.B. No. 2449, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2449, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TORT LIABILITY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 666-94 and H.B. No. 2972, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2972, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ADMINISTRATIVE REVOCATION OF DRIVERS' LICENSES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 667-94 and H.B. No. 3445, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3445, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE CONSERVATION DISTRICT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 668-94 and H.B. No. 3446, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3446, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SUBSISTENCE FISHING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative M. Ige voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 669-94 and H.B. No. 3716, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3716, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATED TO CENTRAL COORDINATING AGENCIES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 3739, 3145, 3326, 3447, 3532, 2175, 2449, 2972, 3445, 3446 and 3716 had passed Third Reading at 10:45 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 680-94 and H.B. No. 2186, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2186, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO

MOTOR VEHICLES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 681-94 and H.B. No. 2909, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2909, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GOING OUT OF BUSINESS SALES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Duldulao voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 682-94 and H.B. No. 3432, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3432, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Stegmaier rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill with reservations, be entered into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Stegmaier's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in support, but with reservations.

"The genesis of this bill was the contention that the Consumer Advocate and Public Utilities Commission could not properly accomplish the work in a rate-making case and generate a decision within the nine months presently required.

"The Economic Development and Business Concerns Committee was told that without an augmentation of the staffs of the Public Utilities Commission and the Consumer Advocate, continuing to meet the nine-month decision-making deadline would not be impossible.

"With this assurance, House Draft 1 added the qualification that extensions beyond the nine-month decision-making deadline would only be authorized if the Public Utilities Commission and the Consumer Advocate received no further staff.

"This qualifying provision was removed by a committee which heard the bill subsequently.

"The nine-month decision-making rule of the Public Utilities Commission is an important rule which should be rescinded only if it is impossible to meet it.

"Should House Bill 3432, or another bill augmenting the staffs be passed this session, this bill would become unnecessary. That's why the qualifying language of House Draft 1 which was taken out in House Draft 2 is needed.

"For these reasons, I support this bill but with reservations."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3432, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC UTILITY RATEMAKING PROCEDURES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative White voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 723-94 and H.B. No. 2913, HD 3:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2913, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 724-94 and H.B. No. 2760, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the joint report of the Committees be adopted and H.B. No. 2760, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Bunda rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Bunda's remarks are as follows:

"This bill is prompted by my concern for the landowners of smaller parcels who are the lessors for just a few lessees.

"That land was purchased with money which many of them earned at five cents, ten cents, fifty cents, one dollar an hour, for a few of them, fifty cents, or a dollar for the whole work day -- twelve hours, not eight. Land on which they might have been born, or raised, or on which their children grew up or died from a sickness medicine could not cure back then. Land upon which now comparative strangers live who have not learned its history and who do not care to learn its traditions.

"Many former lessors of smaller parcels have given up because they were tired, because they could not afford the expense of defending their interests against the sovereign government seeking to condemn -- some would say confiscate, one among us says steal -- their land. I need not repeat the sad tales told by or about former landowners.

"There may not be too many of them left -- very likely most of them have already been forced to give up title to their land.

"But for those few -- this bill grants some relief. A while ago, I heard from the lessor of just a few parcels. He was willing to sell his land but he wanted to be sure that the lessees are bona fide Hawaii residents and owner/occupants -- not speculators, not absentee owners. He asked if lessees could be required to demonstrate that they qualify for the homeowner's real property tax exemption.

"The landowner also said he was concerned about being left holding the bag if lessees were later found to be ineligible because they had filed false applications. In that event, he thought those lessees should be required to reimburse him for the costs incurred, per lot, for the landowner's costs in defending against that one application.

"That's what this bill does -- it is a small step, just a little bit of improvement.

"Since the adoption of Chapter 516, the Land Reform Act, the procedures which have been developed are detailed and complex. But based on past experience, certain improvements are also necessary. And again, continuous quality improvement can reduce complexity, save time, and reduce overall costs.

"Although these steps are small, they will improve the process. With these refinements, the process can continue to go forward in a fairer, more efficient fashion.

"I urge all my colleagues to vote aye on this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2760, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RESIDENTIAL LEASEHOLDS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 725-94 and H.B. No. 2176, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2176, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PROCUREMENT, CONTROL, DISTRIBUTION, AND SALE OF PETROLEUM PRODUCTS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 726-94 and H.B. No. 2419, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the joint report of the Committees be adopted and H.B. No. 2419, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Duldulao rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"It has long been recognized that as licensed, doctorally trained, independent mental health practitioners, psychologists oftentimes make the clinical determinations regarding mental illness, substance abuse, and dangerousness to self and others that are required for formal proceedings.

"It is a psychologists duty to protect their patients from harming themselves and to prevent their patients from harming others. However, this cannot always be done in a timely and efficient manner given the current situation. Currently, only a psychiatrist may involuntarily commit a patient who is dangerous to himself or others.

"Furthermore, there is a severe shortage of doctorally trained psychiatric professionals within the rural areas of the State of Hawaii. This is especially true of the neighbor islands. Therefore, many psychiatrists are not available to make emergency admissions of patients where admission is necessary and there is a breakdown of care for the patient. Through the passage of this bill, some of these problems can be eliminated. Qualified psychologists, meeting all the specified requirements of the Department of Health, will be allowed to make voluntary as well as involuntary mental health admissions thereby addressing the shortage of psychiatrists on the neighbor islands and providing a desperately needed service.

"I would like to point out that many psychiatrists were opposed to this bill for various reasons. They were able to get together with the psychologists and hammer out amendments to this bill which were acceptable to most of the parties involved. I think they should be commended for their willingness and ability to work together towards a solution rather than bicker. We can all learn a valuable lesson from their actions.

"Therefore, I urge all my colleagues to support this bill to meet the needs of many people in Hawaii, and to solve the crisis which is very much avoidable.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2419, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PSYCHIATRIC FACILITIES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 727-94 and H.B. No. 3400, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3400, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 728-94 and H.B. No. 3255, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3255, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 729-94 and H.B. No. 598, HD 1:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 598, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Apo rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill, I think we're all aware, would extend voting privileges to the student member of the Board of Education, and I feel like the real bad guy expressing reservations about that concept. Let me be very clear. I'm not opposed to a student member of the Board having voting privileges, and I will get to some of the reasons with respect to my reservations about the process by which the student takes a seat that is almost equal in terms of their right to vote.

"As a matter of general public policy, Mr. Speaker, it just seems interesting to me that throughout this country and this State, we have essentially created an age of majority which is eighteen that is built on the assumption that intellectual and emotional maturity, in terms of a judgment, does grow with age, and we have sort of arbitrarily said ... at age eighteen, students and children become adults. I don't know what scientific evidence there is upon which that public policy is built, but nevertheless, here we are so that in the case of a driver's license, a student has to reach a certain age, to be trusted, to be extended the privilege and the responsibility of driving a car. And the drinking age ... we went through a huge thing trying to lower that from 21 to 18. Students cannot get married without parental consent. In fact, there are numerous occasions wherein parental consent and the judgment of the parents must be invoked to allow this student to enter into an agreement or to assume responsibilities.

"So, given that general public policy posture, it seems interesting to me that we would sort of end run that

concept and extend full voting privileges to a student on the Board of Education, probably one of the most critical, important public office to be held in this State, and it seems to me that maybe sometimes, in looking at this issue, we might even be demeaning the role of a voting member of the Board of Education. I don't know.

"I will qualify these comments, Mr. Speaker, by telling you that in sitting through the public hearing in the Education Committee, I was totally impressed by the students who were there to speak on behalf of this measure. In fact, we went toe to toe on this issue and I think they bested me, so I don't have any problems with the fact that there are probably some students out there who are probably qualified to sit as a voting member of the Board.

"Now, my real reservation is not that a student should not be extended a voting privilege, but the process by which they get there. There is something wrong with the appointment process that would, in fact, elevate a student to become a voting member of the Board when all other members of the Board have to go through the trial by fire of running for election and running for office, a fundamental principle of representative democracy. So, if a student wishes to serve as a voting member of the Board, I believe we ought to be looking at legislation that lowers the age for which a student may be eligible to run for election and that, in fact, is the opportunity and the privilege and the responsibility to serve, should not be limited to students who are part of the student government system, that all students -- elementary school, whatever -- should be eligible to put their names or have their names put on the ballot and to run for the office. I think that would present a very stimulating, intellectual and emotional development process. That would prepare the student to actually go out and campaign and earn the seat just as all the other members of the Board.

"So I am going to vote for this bill, but I couldn't let the bill pass without expressing my reservation and, again, so that I don't seem like the really bad guy that some students are probably going to think I am, I am for a student voting member of the Board. It's just the process that I have a lot of problems with.

"Thank you."

Representative Nekoba then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, thank you for giving me the chance to speak in favor of House Bill 598, which proposes an amendment to Article X, Section 2 of the Hawaii Constitution, to allow the student member of the Board of Education to vote.

"It has been stated that: 'There's a difference between interest and commitment. When you're interested in doing something, you do it only when it's convenient. When you're committed to something, you accept no excuses, only results.'

"Right now, students have an interest on the Board of Education through the representation of a non-voting student member. If you vote in favor of House Bill 598, you will be giving Hawaii's students more than just an interest in the decision-making and policies that directly affect them ... you will be promoting their commitment to our educational system by ensuring their voice will be heard and not just taken into consideration.

"It is time to recognize that our students are not only capable of handling the responsibilities that come with a vote, but they are also prepared and eager to meet the challenge of the task. In return, a voting student member

could gain the valuable opportunity to learn how the educational process is determined, how to express themselves and the views of their peers clearly and concisely, and most importantly, learn how our system of government is run as an equal voice, not just an onlooker.

"Students should be considered for what they can contribute as a voting member of the Board of Education. Although they may not have accumulated the years and accomplishments of other members of the Board, they can offer experiential insight that reflects contemporary issues which can be added to the collective educational experience of the Board.

"Questions have been raised over the constitutionality of the bill, but I ask you to remember that there once was a time when women were not allowed to vote for their leaders because some felt that women were neither capable enough, nor to be trusted with determining such important issues. It is true that today's students will have the opportunity to become voting members of the Board of Education after they have graduated from the school system, but today's students should have the right to determine the decisions that affect them now, and not have to wait for the day when they can no longer directly relate to the problems of today's youth.

"Why is it so hard to provide students with the opportunity to prepare now for the future we so desperately hope they will embrace? I read on a Department of Education banner once that said, 'To believe is to achieve.' And that's true, for if we believe the students, take them seriously, allow them to contribute to our educational system, they **will** achieve. I have no doubt about that.

"I ask all of you today to show your faith in the youth of Hawaii and our educational system by voting in support of House Bill 598. Our students **can, have, and will** make the right decisions. Let's give them a chance to prove it.

"Thank you."

Representative Takumi then rose and requested that Representative Apo's remarks be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 598, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE X, SECTION 2, OF THE HAWAII CONSTITUTION, TO ALLOW THE STUDENT MEMBER OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO VOTE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 730-94 and H.B. No. 3336, HD 1:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3336, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Alcon rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is a good bill and I was disturbed when I found out that the University of Hawaii does not offer a course in labor management or labor relations.

"Hopefully, the message will get to the University of Hawaii that we need some courses in labor because of the fact that we are a labor intensive state.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3336, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LABOR EDUCATION AT THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2186, 2909, 3432, 2913, 2760, 2176, 2419, 3400, 3255, 598 and 3336 had passed Third Reading at 10:58 o'clock a.m.

At 10:59 o'clock a.m., Representative Amaral asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:00 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 731-94 and H.B. No. 3443, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3443, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OCCUPATIONAL SAFETY AND HEALTH TRAINING AND ASSISTANCE FUND," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 732-94 and H.B. No. 2259, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2259, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to praise House Bill 2259, relating to government efficiency and government organization. When I stand up, it's not always pointing negative things but positive things, because, Mr. Speaker, this is probably one of the more positive bills for the future business of government. In fact, it's one of the first chances to really stand back and introspectively look at what we're doing here. It says ... whose kuleana is this? Is it government's or the private sector? I think that introspection is good because, like today, once the train pulls out of the station, it's hard to really stop it and you kind of stand back and see where we are and where we're going.

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to see it as the Lincoln Bill which said: 'Government should only do for the people what they can't do for themselves,' and I think this bill kind of reminds us that, you know, if something that government can do, do it. But if it's the people who can do it, let them have their way. And, Mr. Speaker, we all know the data. Government has grown and grown and grown, and the private sector is withdrawing ... it's getting smaller and shrinking. I think this bill will give us good dialogue to say ... how can we stop that? How can we at least get the kuleana shared equally and preferably on even keel in the future?

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Yonamine then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Let me just repeat what you all know, colleagues.

"Mr. Speaker, we in government, as well as our counterparts in the private sector, must face the daily challenges of finding solutions to meet the dramatic changes in our society. Since statehood, and especially now, we have seen a revolution in information technology, broad and new access to government data by private citizens and the media, greater expansion in government services, and a change in the public's expectations as to what government should provide. We are not changing government -- society is changing government.

"Having said that, as citizens make sacrifices in our tight economy, we must also do our part by making tough and unpopular decisions to eliminate waste and inefficiency in government operations. It is apparent that Executive departments in the Executive Branch need to be changed in structure and effectiveness to better serve the people of today.

"In 1993, we adopted a resolution requesting a study on the efficiency of Hawaii government. A Governor's Interim Commission was created with representatives by big and small profit and non-profit businesses, public employee unions, Executive Branch, county government, legislative agencies, public administration, academic leaders, and the general public. This Interim Commission had many, many meetings, conducted six public meetings, two public broadcasts over Olelo, and also with studios in Kauai and Hawaii, and over 4,500 surveys distributed to individuals throughout the State. It is our time to take up the challenge and do the work by establishing a commission to do its work in less than eighteen months.

"This bill creates a temporary commission to review government's current mission, goals, organization, and performance. The commission will recommend structural changes to improve efficiency by reassessing the number of positions and how they are deployed within the eighteen departments. We need to do the evaluation of programs and services provided.

"You have already passed the bill to amend the Constitution to make permanent a commission on government efficiency and organization to meet every ten years, very much like the Reapportionment Commission.

"This bill is a comprehensive, people-based approach to manage government change for today, and set our course for the future needs of the 21st century.

"Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2259, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO A COMMISSION ON GOVERNMENT ORGANIZATION AND EFFICIENCY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 733-94 and H.B. No. 2851, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2851, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR SPECIAL PROSECUTION UNITS AND VICTIM WITNESS PROGRAMS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 734-94 and H.B. No. 3101, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3101, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INSURANCE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 735-94 and H.B. No. 3135, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3135, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE JUVENILE JUSTICE INFORMATION SYSTEM," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 736-94 and H.B. No. 3158, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3158, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Arakaki rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"My reservations, Mr. Speaker, is what this bill is about -- chore services and establishing standards. I think for those of you who aren't familiar with chore services, I think it's recognized that the chore services that the Department of Human Services provide allows many disabled people to be independent and to work. It also allows a lot of our family caregivers to stay at home and to provide assistance to their family members.

"The concern that we had in the Human Services Committee, and we understand why the Department wanted to make this change, because with the advent of Health Quest, under the current rules, people with up to 300 percent of income eligibility would be able to access this program and, of course, we don't have enough people, we don't have enough funds, to go up to that level. However, there was some concern that perhaps there need to be a floor. You know, if we took away the ceiling, we need a floor so that at least we establish the standard at which people should qualify.

"Under this bill, and it's been reamended to go back to the Administration's original bill, it allows the Department to set those standards, and we have gotten commitment, verbally, that they will honor the current poverty level standards. However, the concern we have, I think, is that we know that there is a commitment from this Administration, but those commitments may not be there next year. I think, as a policy matter, this Legislature should be able to say, and should say, that this is a program for the people -- for disabled people, for families who are caring disabled family members -- and this helps them. This helps them to be self-sufficient, and this keeps them out of institutional care. We should be saying that as a policy matter, and so we should say who qualifies and who doesn't, and at what level people should qualify.

"With that reservation, Mr. Speaker, I hope this bill moves but we need to look at the policy issues.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Chun then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I speak in favor of this measure with reservations, and echoing the sentiments of the previous speaker."

Representative Santiago then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to say, you know, being a member of both committees, I want to, first of all, commend both chairs of the committees. I know both were wrestling with an issue that is very, very difficult, but I want the members to realize the economic impact of a bill like this in the long run. We spend a little bit for family members to care for their disabled and elderly in the home to prevent institutionalization. When we begin to start cutting back, we risk having members no longer able to do that, being forced to see their loved ones institutionalized. Many times, when this happens, the State ends up having to pay a lot more in the long run.

"This is the concern that I think the previous speakers talked about, and I wanted to underscore the fact that ... yes, we have some very tough fiscal constraints on us. We have to make some tough decisions, but as this bill progresses through the entire legislative process, at some point in time we are going to need to address the long-range effects that a bill like this will have on us from an economic as well as a humanistic standpoint.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3158, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELIGIBILITY FOR CHORE SERVICES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Amaral and M. Ige voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 737-94 and H.B. No. 3176, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3176, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LANDS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 738-94 and H.B. No. 2197, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2197, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 739-94 and H.B. No. 2234, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2234, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NATUROPATHY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 740-94 and H.B. No. 2491, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2491, HD 2,

entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DISPENSING OF PRESCRIPTION DRUGS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 741-94 and H.B. No. 2605, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2605, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LIQUOR," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Amaral, Beirne, Chun, M. Ige and Shon voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 742-94 and H.B. No. 2640, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2640, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HAZARDOUS WASTE BROKERS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 3443, 2259, 2851, 3101, 3135, 3158, 3176, 2197, 2234, 2491, 2605 and 2640 had passed Third Reading at 11:11 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 754-94 and H.B. No. 172, HD 3:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 172, HD 3, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"This is really an excellent bill. We're now getting serious about reducing the number of uninsured motorists on our roads.

"This bill will require the establishment of an on-line computer network and data base to be used to verify the existence of insurance prior to registration, renewal, or transfer of registration of a motor vehicle.

"What this is going to mean is that we can track those vehicles that are on the road that are driving without insurance, where the driver has obtained a no-fault card, cancelled the insurance policy after receiving the card, and then continues to operate the vehicle, driving without insurance. That raises everyone's rates in this State, as we know.

"Mr. Speaker, this is an excellent measure that says ... we're now going to get tough on drivers who drive without insurance, and we have an effective way to do it. We've come of age, Mr. Speaker, in the computer age, and we're using the computers in a very positive manner on this measure.

"I congratulate the author of the bill. I believe that he did a significant job for the people of Hawaii.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 172, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO

MOTOR VEHICLE INSURANCE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 755-94 and H.B. No. 979, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 979, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Tam rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"I have reservations, Mr. Speaker, because I would like to see some changes, in terms of this bill, and send a message across to the Senate.

"Mr. Speaker, I understand, in terms of the purpose of this bill, that because of the financial situation of the State of Hawaii and also the concern over the senior citizens of the future, senior citizens do not have much dollars in terms of spending capacity. One of the things that I've noticed, in terms of being in this system, is that our pension plan system for retirees is very inadequate to maintain a life here in Hawaii. Most senior citizens receive only two percent of their base pay; for example, if they only make a thousand dollars a month, forever as long as they live, they make only two percent of that thousand dollars and that's really insufficient dollars to pay for survival.

"What I suggest is that we make it proportionate, in terms of increasing their pension funds, if we are to expect them to pay for part of their health care.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 979, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC EMPLOYEES HEALTH FUND," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative M. Ige voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 756-94 and H.B. No. 2005, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2005, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE RENTAL HOUSING TRUST FUND," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 757-94 and H.B. No. 2221, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2221, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LAW ENFORCEMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 758-94 and H.B. No. 2450, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2450, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION TO IMPLEMENT THE PROJECTS OF THE WEST MAUI WATERSHED MANAGEMENT PLAN," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 759-94 and H.B. No. 2708, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2708, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AMENDMENTS TO ARTICLE X, SECTIONS 2 AND 3, OF THE HAWAII CONSTITUTION TO CHANGE THE COMPOSITION AND POWERS OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 172, 979, 2005, 2221, 2450 and 2708 had passed Third Reading at 11:15 o'clock a.m.

At 11:16 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:23 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 760-94 and H.B. No. 3106, HD 3:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3106, HD 3, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Nekoba rose and offered the following amendment to H.B. No. 3106, HD 3:

"SECTION 1. House Bill No. 3106, H.D. 3, is amended by amending Section 2 thereof to read as follows:

"SECTION 2. The department of land and natural resources may exchange public lands for the privately owned land designated in Act 348 as approximately 368.70 acres identified by the tax map key (I) 4-2-05:01 for the preservation of Mount Olomana as a historic landmark, providing the exchange meets the statutory requirements of section 171-50, Hawaii Revised Statutes, except for the provision of legislative disapproval by concurrent resolution contained in subsection (c). Furthermore, the exchange shall not take place if it would reduce the combined land holdings of the ceded land trust."

At 11:24 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:25 o'clock a.m.

Representative Nekoba rose and moved that the amendment be adopted, seconded by Representative Takamine.

Representative Nekoba rose to speak in favor of the amendment, stating:

"When we passed Act 348 last year, we all celebrated the idea of preserving a landmark which was supported by people throughout Hawaii. By making Mt. Olomana into a State monument, we hoped to secure for generations to come, a perpetual benefit to all people, but most of all, for the native Hawaiians who have strived for so long to save their proud heritage. With Act 348, we authorized the Department of Land and Natural Resources and the Office of State Planning to work with Asahi-Kanko, the owner of the 370-acre parcel to try and arrange an exchange of land for their property.

"This year, the Office of State Planning informed us that they had reached an agreement on a piece of property to be exchanged with the Mt. Olomana land. The tax map key area was identified in the bill, which passed through the Water and Land Use Planning Committee, then through the Finance Committee, without any opposing testimony. To my surprise, last week the Office of Hawaiian Affairs suddenly revealed that there was no way that they would support a ceded land swap involving revenue-generating lands. This then created an entirely misconstrued interpretation of the bill's purpose, which was originally to preserve an important historical and cultural landmark, and turned it into a conflict with the native Hawaiians. This was never the intent of this bill.

"However, with this amendment today, I hope that I can restore native Hawaiian's faith that we will not disregard their rights for any cause, no matter how noble the reason. Queen Liliuokalani said in 1917, 'I could not turn back the hands of time, but there is still time to save our heritage. Never cease to act because you fear you may fail.' Today, with this amendment, there is still time to save our heritage. This amendment will remove any reference to ceded land being used in exchange for Mt. Olomana.

"In closing, Mr. Speaker, I would like to extend my Mahalo to leadership for allowing me this very rare opportunity to rectify this situation by proposing a floor amendment today. I would also like to thank Chairman Takamine and Chairman Say for providing the means for passage of this measure in their committees. Their sensitivity to this subject and their willingness to support this bill is much appreciated. I would also like to acknowledge the Save Mount Olomana Association who, for the past fifteen years, have dedicated their efforts to protect Mt. Olomana.

"Colleagues, I hope that you will support this amendment so we can protect Mt. Olomana and preserve the land for native Hawaiians.

"Thank you."

Representative Arakaki then rose to speak in favor of the amendment, with reservations, stating:

"The Hawaiians have a term, and it's called 'Makaala', and it means 'to be watchful and vigilant.' Apparently, people who had the kuleana, or responsibility, for these lands perhaps were not watchful or vigilant in looking after the best interest of the beneficiary -- the native Hawaiian people. I think it was acknowledged that this was a mistake and an oversight, but perhaps this is an opportunity, or it is a reminder of what the Sovereignty Advisory Commission came up with as one of the recommendations, and that was that they wanted to see a moratorium on ceded lands as well as the trust lands from any sale and transfer, and they felt that this was not only to protect the land base until such time when a sovereign Hawaiian nation was formed, but it was also seen as a recognition and a good faith gesture from the State government to protect the primary land base of the Hawaiian nation which is basically a ceded public land trust and the Hawaiian Homesteads, and I don't think anyone would argue the merits or the intent of this exchange or transfer. After all, many of us are very much in favor of preserving that special place called Mt. Olomana.

"However, we also have a responsibility to the native Hawaiian population and we need to be aware of all sides of the argument. And I am really grateful to the introducer of the bill for making this amendment, and to

leadership for considering this unusual move and allowing these changes to be made. I guess there is some commitment to look at other possible exchanges.

"My only reservation is that it does still allow that possibility of exchanging for ceded lands which are income-generating or revenue-producing, and that would be a major concern because although it may not reduce the basic land trust areas, I think it's important for the Hawaiian people to retain the revenue streams, not only for now, but for future generations. So, with that, Mr. Speaker, I speak in favor of this amendment.

"Thank you."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"As a long-time supporter of the Save Mount Olomana organization, I am standing to speak in strong support of the amendment, Mr. Speaker. We don't want to be in a position where we are pitting saving our historic areas and our beautiful landmarks against those who also wish to preserve the integrity and the corpus of this ceded land trust. So this bill will avoid that conflict, that head-on conflict.

"I also would like to thank the former chair of the Water, Land and Hawaiian Affairs Committee, as it was then called, for his farsightedness and his help. We wouldn't be where we are today had that former chair not taken it upon himself to move the Mt. Olomana issue and the concerns forward. Mr. Speaker, he went out to the community and held one of our committee hearings right there at the slopes of Mt. Olomana where he was able to hear firsthand from the people who have struggled so long and hard to save that historic landmark. I really thank his farsightedness ... that set us on the steps toward where we are today. We started going on a collision course, Mr. Speaker, with ceded land trust. This amendment today will avoid that collision.

"I also would like to commend the introducer of the amendment and the Speaker, and the whole process ... to say that this process right now shows that we can, on Third Reading, step in and correct measures that should not go forward in the manner in which they are given to us. So it means that we no longer have to be afraid of introducing amendments to bills on Third Reading. We can do so, and we can pass bills, amended, that will better serve the people of Hawaii.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Chun then rose and stated:

"I also rise in strong support of the floor amendment and would like to personally thank the introducer of the floor amendment as well as leadership. I know that through the judicious use of the floor amendment, we can create legislation that will meet the needs of Hawaii's people.

"Thank you."

Representative Young then rose to speak in support of the amendment, stating:

"Rarely do I echo the words of the House Minority Floor Leader, but in this case I really appreciated her comments and I would like to echo them.

"I'd also like to say about a comment on what the representative whose district includes the historic Mt. Olomana that, yes, floor amendments are very rare, but in this case it is very germane to this point, and in no way, shape, or form was this bill ever intended to deprive

native Hawaiians of land or lease revenues. On the surface, it did look like a terrific deal -- 370 acres of land for 2.75 acres of land. But I do want to inform the members of the House that no member of the House was involved in the negotiations, and no member of the House was informed of any objections to this agreement until after the bill had been redrafted and passed out of committee.

"I think this floor amendment sends a very strong message to the Office of State Planning that they must take off their blinders, and they must work out an agreement that doesn't include ceded lands. I think this is a very strong message to them.

"This bill is aimed at protecting Mt. Olomana, including Kanahau Heiau, a relatively pristine heiau in its face. It is intended to protect the landmark that is important culturally and historically.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tam then rose to speak in support of the amendment, with reservations, stating:

"My reservation is based in terms of the last sentence under Section 2, where it says, 'Furthermore, the exchange shall not take place if it would reduce the combined land holdings of the ceded land trust.'

"I wish to make it known that we have to think in terms of the valuation of the land, not only in terms of acreage. After all, we are talking about ceded land which is reimbursed in terms of value to the Hawaiians.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand to speak at this historical moment, in favor of the bill, but more the procedure of the bill.

"As a freshman, I was told ... what we've seen today would never happen, and it has happened. My confidence in you, the leadership, Mr. Speaker, has increased. The fact that we can do, we've just done. This is very significant. I waited four years for today because they told me it will never happen, and we're doing it right now. So to make it significant, I'd say -- let's do it again."

Representative Amaral then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in support of the floor amendment and to note therefore that I intend to change my 'no' vote to this measure as a result of the amended language. I note, Mr. Speaker, that the substance of the amendment is to take out the words 'Kapalama, Oahu,' which were identified as part of the land trade.

"I know many people are quite excited about the opportunity to do floor amendments. I am far more excited about the policy statement that we made with respect to ceded land, and that is that with some intentionality, we do not want to erode away the corpus of the ceded lands trust significantly because that is the future for native Hawaiians.

"I note also that we are trustees of the other 80 percent of that pro rata share, and we have a responsibility to preserve the corpus for the non-native Hawaiian as well. So both populations, I think, applaud the effort of this body today, and we thank you, Mr. Speaker, for allowing us to do it.

"Thank you."

The motion to adopt the amendment was put by the Chair and carried by voice vote.

On motion by Representative Nekoba, seconded by Representative Takamine and carried, consideration of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 760-94 and H.B. No. 3106, HD 3, as amended in HD 4, was deferred, and in accordance with Article III, Section 15 of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, printed copies of H.B. No. 3106, HD 4, were made available to the members of the House at 11:24 o'clock a.m.

At 11:38 o'clock a.m., Representative Okamura asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:41 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 761-94 and H.B. No. 3151, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3151, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 762-94 and H.B. No. 3194, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3194, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Ward rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Let me preface my remarks by saying that some of the best things can and do come out of the Department of Transportation, but in this instance I think it's the worst that we're allowing to happen.

"Mr. Speaker, at a time when budgets are tight, taxpayer's money is tight, we have upon our shoulders the responsibility to make sure that we keep the money that we do have and not give it away. In this instance, we're giving away twenty million dollars to the Department of Transportation under fear of the Feds that they are going to 'interfere' with our airport construction. The five percent that every department in the State of Hawaii pays to the general fund for various service fees, we are eliminating that five percent and saying ... DOT, your director and the Budget and Finance director, get your heads together and tell us what's fair. The last time that they paid their money in was twenty-five million dollars. They got their heads together and they said ... well, it's only worth about \$3.2-million.

"My question, Mr. Speaker, is: One, are the Feds bluffing? And two, why are we doing this now when we need every nickel and dime that we have? We have a discussion with nickels and dimes in No Hope in Dope, the adolescent mental health programs, the teen pregnancy thing went out the window, and here's twenty million dollars we're giving back to the Department of Transportation. And make no mistake -- that's literally what we're doing. We're giving twenty million dollars back to the Department of Transportation because the five percent of which they heretofore had given, we are saying ... you know, you don't have to give us that.

"This, to me, is the justification for the overspending of which some of us feel is with the airport people mover, with that gargantuan size of the international terminal, and with some of the 'no Hawaiian sense of place' that the inter-island terminal has. These are not deserving of our vote to overspend another twenty million dollars, or to bail out what they've bought, in terms of property outside of the airport.

"Mr. Speaker, every department pays the five percent. Why should we exempt the Department of Transportation from paying the five percent, then subtract from our general funds of which are very tight, and the Chair of Finance has a very good job of guarding them, give up twenty million dollars? Even if I am wrong and maybe if you're right, I would contend, Mr. Speaker, we can postpone this for another twelve months before 'Big Brother' comes down and says ... hey, it's not fair. I think we are bending under their bluff and we're giving away twenty million dollars, and it makes it look like we don't know what our priorities are.

"I'm afraid that I can't agree with this bill one iota.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Oshiro then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the State of Hawaii receives annually millions of dollars in discretionary grants from the federal government for airport development, and noise compatibility improvements -- millions of dollars.

"One of the conditions that was placed upon use of these federal funds is that all revenues generated by our State airport system must be expended only for capital and operating costs for the airport system, or for related issues or facilities to air transportation. They must be spent for these purposes.

"In the July 1993 report, the Inspector General of the United States Department of Transportation reported that an audit of our airport revenue fund found that the five percent statutory central service transfer from the airport revenue fund to the general fund was excessive, and that this transfer does not accurately reflect the true cost of providing central services. This is from the federal government in their audit. Thus, the federal government gave serious consideration to place our State, Mr. Speaker, in default of our assurance that we would not allow any diversion of airport revenue funds for non-airport-related services and to mandate appropriate monetary restitution.

"Although the State was subsequently determined to be technically in compliance with this provision due essentially to a grandfather clause, the Federal Aviation Administration has informed us that this State will not be eligible for federal airport discretionary funds until the central service transfer is based upon the actual cost of central services.

"These federal airport discretionary funds which we have received for a number of years -- millions of dollars for the past so many years -- are very much needed, Mr. Speaker, for various airport capital improvement projects throughout our entire State. Loss of these federal dollars would impose a substantial burden, Mr. Speaker, upon our airport landing fees, which we are presently negotiating with the airlines, and other use charges at the airport to finance these much needed improvements. It will impose a substantial burden on this and the effects would just be magnified toward our economy.

"The sole intent and purpose, Mr. Speaker, of this bill is to ensure the continued receipt of these federal airport discretionary funds by complying with this federal mandate regarding use of our airport special fund.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3194, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MANAGEMENT OF STATE FUNDS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Ward voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 763-94 and H.B. No. 3451, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3451, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FUNDING FOR PUBLIC UTILITIES REGULATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 764-94 and H.B. No. 3456, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3456, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FINANCIAL EXEMPTIONS FOR THE COMMUNITY HOSPITALS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 765-94 and H.B. No. 3466, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3466, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Marumoto rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"My 'no' vote here has to do with the proposed salary increase than with the preferential treatment of a few people. Why is the Paroling Authority singled out for favorable treatment over other appointees? When we are closing out unfilled positions and restricting the rest of civil service to very small raises, why give a select few raises of up to 17 percent? It may be as low as 10 percent but it could be as high as 17 percent.

"We are denying judges raises this year because of the tight money situation, and not entertaining any raises for other departmental appointees. Why, then, favor three persons? No doubt they work very hard and they are very deserving of raises, but I contend, so do a lot of other people who work for state government.

"So, Mr. Speaker, for the sake of equity and fair play, I am voting no.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would just echo my colleague's concern in saying to this body that if we legislated everybody's salary increase by the way we're doing in this bill, we probably would have to have about ten thousand bills per session, and we'll never get out of here if we do it one by

one, and again, with the leaps of the percentages which are beyond what the economy and our budget can afford.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3466, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII PAROLING AUTHORITY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 7 noes, with Representatives Duldulao, Marumoto, Pepper, Tam, Tanimoto, Thielen and Ward voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 766-94 and H.B. No. 3266, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3266, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR NONPOINT SOURCE POLLUTION CONTROL," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 3151, 3194, 3451, 3456, 3466 and 3266 had passed Third Reading at 11:50 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 767-94 and H.B. No. 3506, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3506, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Amaral and Beirne voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 768-94 and H.B. No. 2553, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2553, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Morihara rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill with reservations, be entered into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Morihara's remarks are as follows:

"This bill allows for Emergency Medical Services personnel to provide, continue, or withdraw life sustaining procedures based on a physicians order based on a written declaration.

"My concern is that the situations which Emergency Medical Services are performed are not ideal for making informed legal decisions. By their very nature, emergency response can be a hurried and confusing situation. Opportunities for errors in identity, prognosis, and legal standing under those circumstances are very possible. We may be opening Health Care and Emergency Medical Services providers to difficult legal situations. I hope the Department of Health considers these concerns very carefully when they adopt rules, regulations and protocols."

Representative Duldulao then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Unfortunately, Hawaii's laws do not provide the authority for ambulance personnel to honor living will declarations for the terminally ill.

"Currently, when a request for ambulance service is received through the 911 system, the ambulance has a duty to respond and provide emergency medical services in accordance with established protocols. Therefore, if an emergency situation arises involving terminally ill patients in which resuscitative measures must be initiated, ambulance personnel are required to perform this duty even if it is against the patient's will. A living will can only be honored by a hospital physician.

"The present situation does not appear to be beneficial to anyone involved. It seems reasonable that if a terminally ill patient does not want to be resuscitated if it means prolonging their pain and agony, we should honor their wish. Unfortunately, there are numerous documented cases in which this has not happened, and not only does the patient suffer but the family of the patient also feels pain and a sense of betrayal because their loved ones wishes were not honored. Emergency personnel are also emotionally drained with the feeling that they caused increased suffering for the patient.

"This bill, Mr. Speaker, will allow ambulance personnel to honor living will declarations and to provide compassionate care to terminally ill patients. Compassionate care means that ambulance personnel would provide comfort and support for the patient by performing basic procedures, such as administering oxygen. This program would also provide EMS personnel, under the control of strict protocols, with various ways to revoke the 'Do Not Resuscitate' orders, thus dispelling any thought of euthanasia or assisted suicides. It seems that this would be in the best interest of all parties involved, especially the patient, and will allow the patient to truly 'rest in peace.'

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2553, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 769-94 and H.B. No. 3290, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3290, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ENFORCEMENT OF THE STATE ETHICS CODE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 770-94 and H.B. No. 1317, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1317, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DISCLOSURES IN REAL ESTATE TRANSACTIONS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 771-94 and H.B. No. 2241, HD 1:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2241, HD 1, having

been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Pepper rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, failing to meet one's child support responsibilities is wrong and we must do what we can to make sure that people do meet their responsibilities in this area.

"But a program to shame those who fail to meet their responsibilities by the 'Most Wanted' poster system proposed by this bill is potentially dangerous. Shame is such a powerful force in Hawaii that I can envision someone being so shamed for himself or herself and for his or her family that the person reaches a tragic conclusion as to how to deal with that shame.

"Mr. Speaker, I don't want, in any way, to be responsible for a single suicide and, therefore, I must vote no on this measure.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2241, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ENFORCEMENT OF CHILD SUPPORT OBLIGATIONS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives M. Ige and Pepper voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 772-94 and H.B. No. 3199, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3199, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Marumoto rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This bill grants the University of Hawaii an exemption from Hawaii's famous billboard law so that it may raise additional revenues to help support UH athletics.

"On the outside, it looks like this is a very reasonable bill. It just allows temporary advertising on any stadium fence owned by the University, and the proceeds are toward a worthy cause to be 'specifically earmarked to expand women's programs.'

"We already allow advertising on scoreboards, but now we want to expand the privilege to fences and it may not mean it will stop at one fence. I am afraid that other school fences will look invitingly bare and then some groups later will say ... well, why not allow a worthy non-profit organization to realize a little revenue by putting up one temporary sign, and it will only point inwards.

"While I applaud the University for looking at new and creative ways to raise revenues for worthwhile programs in these fiscally tough times, I hate to see the Legislature exempt anyone, especially a government entity, from a law which safeguards and preserves Hawaii's beauty and environment.

"Since 1965, the Outdoor Circle has been instrumental in fighting to preserve our billboard law -- an ordinance that is unique in the nation. The Outdoor Circle believes, and as a member, I agree that sufficient means exist to advertise at the Aloha Stadium and at UH athletic facilities through the use of permitted scoreboards.

"Our lack of obtrusive signage, that means no large signs, billboards or neon, adds to the charm and beauty of our islands. We need to guard against becoming cheap and tawdry. The Waikiki street scene already borders on the honky-tonk.

"Let us not jeopardize the integrity of Hawaii's billboard law by passing this legislation.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pepper then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, we spend a great deal of money through the Hawaii Visitors Bureau advertising the beauty of Hawaii. Athletic events at Aloha Stadium seen on TV, such as the Pro Bowl, bring the brightness of our sun and relaxed mood and dress of our people into cities and towns on the mainland.

"And now this bill brings us the opportunity, through advertising on any scoreboard, to send the glory of products such as Preparation H or athletic shoes to those back on the mainland. Mr. Speaker, we don't need the revenues this bill will produce badly enough to visually corrupt our environment in this way.

"In addition, Mr. Speaker, the Outdoor Circle believes that this bill may compromise their wonderful and successful efforts to keep our environment from advertising ugliness.

"I am willing to run the risk that, in fact, that danger may exist. Therefore, I will vote no on this measure.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I begin by asking a question. How many signs do you have in your campaign in your front yard or in your front window or in the store, or all of us -- how many do we have in our yards? And if so, how big are they? And why are they not there? Because there is a billboard law in Hawaii that says ... that is ugly. You may be beautiful as a candidate, but that's ugly in terms of our environment which is unique in the Pacific and unique to Hawaii.

"What we've got here, Mr. Speaker, is it says ... if you're Big Brother, you can be exempted from the law of the land. If you're Big Brother, you can go in there and you can advertise, and you can sanitize your conscience by saying ... no alcohol, no cigarettes. I didn't know Preparation H was even trying to get a place on the billboard, but that may be where we are making exception which, as Representative Marumoto said, may go out the window into all the schools and say ... hey, this is a good way to get revenue.

"Is this policy or is this a quick buck kind of a scam in this bill, Mr. Speaker? I think policy is what this whole Legislature is about, and this is not a good one.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Bainum then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill with reservations, be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Bainum's remarks are as follows:

"I rise to speak in favor of this measure but with great reservations.

"One of the many wonderful things about Hawaii is that we do not have the obnoxious eyesores of billboards and out-of-control signage. Much of the credit for our beautiful state-of-affairs can be directly attributed to the tireless work and vigilance of the Outdoor Circle.

"The Outdoor Circle has expressed great concern that this measure might be opening the door to an onslaught of billboards and ugly signage. I agree with the Outdoor Circle. While it is admirable that the University system is looking for ways to raise revenues from non-tax sources, I believe we would all be better served by reordering our spending priorities rather than toying with this possible 'slippery slope to signage.'

"Thank you."

Representative Alcon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, if you read the bill, it does not advertise art work. It is an advertisement within a captured audience. Besides, it's nice to see some good advertising once in a while, whether it's Preparation H or some others, because this is a work of art, Mr. Speaker. I know that I have gone across the continental United States and I had appreciated all the billboards that were displayed. And, besides, it is also a sign that when you are driving across the country, you are almost to a city if you see billboards.

"Mr. Speaker, we are protecting the billboard sign but let's not forget, Mr. Speaker, that it is against our freedom of speech.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Arakaki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I am not speaking or rebutting on the merits of the arguments or the merits of advertisement.

"However, I did want to recognize and thank both the Finance and the Higher Education Chairs for allowing the amendment that the Higher Education Committee had put in which provides that no advertisements for alcohol or tobacco products shall be permitted at the University of Hawaii events. It may seem like a minor amendment but I think, in terms of a policy statement, it says a lot, especially when many of these events affect our young people. I think it's an important policy statement, so I want to thank both committees for leaving that.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3199, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OUTDOOR ADVERTISING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Isbell, Marumoto, Pepper, Tam and Ward voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 773-94 and H.B. No. 3421, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3421, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MILK," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 774-94 and H.B. No. 3481, HD 3:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3481, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR A WELLNESS INDUSTRY COMMISSION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 775-94 and H.B. No. 3596, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3596, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLE AND MOTORCYCLE INSURANCE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 776-94 and H.B. No. 1241, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1241, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"I am speaking in favor of it, Mr. Speaker, because this will delete twelve deputy director positions. It's a good start in down-sizing State government which has grown to excessive proportions over the last eight years. It's only a start, and it's like firing a squirt gun at a bonfire. But we are beginning, Mr. Speaker.

"There are also many positions in State government which are unnecessary, redundant, and a waste of taxpayers' money. One example ... is it really necessary to have an executive assistant and a senior assistant in addition to a director in the Office of International Relations. Clearly, an office of this small size. . .

At this point, the Chair interrupted and asked Representative Thielen to "please speak to the merits or demerits of the bill."

Representative Thielen continued, saying:

"It is the merits of the bill, Mr. Speaker. I am speaking in support of it but it doesn't go far enough. I'm talking about offices such as OIR could have been incorporated in the parameters of this bill. I think we've set out on a good track, but I don't think it goes far enough. We multiply the OIR example by the hundreds of different State departments, divisions, and offices, and we'll have a better picture of what a true down-sizing of government could do.

"I would say that this is a first step on what should be a long process. I hope we can speed up the process and streamline, and make our government more efficient.

"Thank you."

Representative Tam then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"This is one of the things I have been emphasizing for a number of years, in terms of taking a bold step to eliminate wasteful spending in government. The dollars

can be used for more direct services to the taxpayers of the State of Hawaii. We need to eliminate the 'fat' and believe me, the Administration is 'fat.'

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I am speaking for this bill which cuts unnecessary positions. It's probably something we should have done a number of years ago. It's something that I said earlier ... introspective looking back -- seeing what's needed, what's not needed.

"I would, however, disagree with the previous remark saying that there should be some other positions cut. I would, in fact, say some of those deputy director positions probably should go to the Office of International Relations, and I want to assure my colleague that myopia is curable with corrective lenses which I hope she has just been demonstrated with."

Representative M. Ige then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, if our goal or objective is to move away from tourism and to look at diversifying our economy and making education first, I don't see the reason for deleting the assistants or the deputies from the Department of Economic Development and Tourism or from Education, nor from Human Services, and from the Department of Health.

"I just feel that if we're to clearly define our goals for where we're headed, that these deputies would not be affected, and that I wish that other deputies in other areas that we deem not priority areas be removed and not the deputies that are on this measure.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1241, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative M. Ige voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 777-94 and H.B. No. 2333, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2333, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Bainum rose to speak in support of the bill, with strong reservations, stating:

"My reservations have to do with the fact that this bill does not have anyone on the Convention Center Authority that represents the community's interest.

"Mr. Speaker, the communities of Waikiki and the surrounding areas know the convention center is coming. All we want to do is to live as harmoniously as we can with such a large structure.

"This bill would extend the life of the Convention Center Authority, and that's right. This bill, though, adds three members from the Hawaii Visitors Bureau, the Hotel Association, the Hawaii Convention Park Council to be ex officio members. How about the residents? How about the community?

"These same people -- the Convention Center Authority -- came down before a committee hearing to kill two bills that would have put community representatives on the Convention Center Authority. For that reason, I have strong reservations.

"My hope is that as this bill moves through the process, that we can have community input. The Authority does a fine job. They have nothing to fear from having community input. In fact, I think they will be benefited.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Chun then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I speak in strong support for this bill, but I would urge the Senate, as it passes through, to look at community involvement on the Board itself. I think that's a very good idea.

"Thank you."

Representative Tam then rose and stated:

"On House Bill 2333, House Draft 2, I wish to register an aye vote 'with reservations' for the reason that Representative Duke Bainum mentioned in regards to no residents being represented, and also to the fact that I question the extension of the Authority to 1998 when there is a question of accountability to them at this time.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2333, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE CONVENTION CENTER AUTHORITY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Hagino voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 778-94 and H.B. No. 2366, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2366, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Stegmaier rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"This bill would establish a filing fee surcharge in addition to the initial filing fees in any civil action in order to fund the indigent legal services assistance programs of our State.

"I have three reservations about this bill as it is drafted presently.

"First, the bill appears to take another bite out of the hide of small business and the average taxpayer while adding to the overall expense of government operations and making only a minimal impact on the quality of life of the poor in our community, something that was acknowledged in the testimony I have read concerning the bill.

"Second, we need to be aware of other less onerous funding sources. The bill is being considered at a time when the new federal administration is recommending significantly more funds for indigent legal services. I just got word that in President Clinton's budget, he has requested a one hundred million dollar increase for the Legal Services Corporation, from four hundred million dollars to five hundred million dollars nationally, a

sizeable portion of which would filter down to us here in Hawaii.

"Third, I have a concern that we, as a Legislature, should be making the tough decisions about prioritizing among programs and determining the extent of funding for these programs. I believe that funds for legal services should be from the general revenues which are subject to the changes in legislative priority setting, and the legal services program should seek State revenues just as all other service providers seek funds.

"We, as a Legislature, are renegeing on our responsibilities by having the Administrative Director of the Courts make decisions about which programs to fund. I would add that the role of the Legislature should probably be extended rather than curtailed to determine how to avoid duplication among our local legal services entities that have been established to serve the indigent. As a former VISTA volunteer, for instance, who worked in a poverty law firm, I know that alternative dispute resolution is not used as much as it could be, and perhaps the Legislature should interfere to emphasize this change.

"Based on these reservations, but with an understanding of the need to fund legal services for the indigent, I am in support of this bill but with the reservations as I have enumerated.

"Thank you."

Representative Thielen then rose and requested a conflict ruling, saying, "I would like to disclose that I was a Legal Aid attorney for five years," and the Chair ruled "no conflict."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2366, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LEGAL SERVICES FOR THE INDIGENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 779-94 and H.B. No. 2631, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2631, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENERGY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 3506, 2553, 3290, 1317, 2241, 3199, 3421, 3481, 3596, 1241, 2333, 2366 and 2631 had passed Third Reading at 12:14 o'clock p.m.

At 12:15 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:18 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 780-94 and H.B. No. 3153, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3153, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Arakaki rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"The reservations I had in the original bill, this bill would have allowed the Department to develop rental units using Hawaiian Home lands and rent them at fair market rental value to the general public with preference given to native Hawaiians, and also to award lots or units to the general public with preference to native Hawaiians.

The concern was that because the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands is charged with putting native Hawaiians on Hawaiian Home lands, I think they and the Legislature will be criticized for allowing the general public, or non-native Hawaiians, to be put on their lands because the native Hawaiians could not afford the fair market rental.

"We tried to address those concerns by allowing, or mandating, that the Department provide these rentals at a 35 percent discount before they allow the general public to have access or use at the fair market rental value. I guess the concern is still there; however, the entire clause has been deleted so I just wanted to mention that for the record as this bill moves on to the Senate.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3153, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAIIAN HOMES COMMISSION ACT, 1920, AS AMENDED," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Amaral voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 781-94 and H.B. No. 3324, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3324, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PERMANENT AUTONOMY FOR HILO AND MAUI MEMORIAL HOSPITALS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 782-94 and H.B. No. 3426, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3426, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ACCREDITATION IN INSURANCE REGULATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 783-94 and H.B. No. 3428, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3428, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE INSURANCE CODE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 784-94 and H.B. No. 2647, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2647, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Bainum rose and requested that his remarks, in strong support of House Bill 2647, HD 2, be

entered into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Bainum's remarks are as follows:

"This bill is the result of numerous meetings held during the Energy and Environmental Summit proceedings, involving an extremely diverse group of individuals interested in environmental education (EE). It is the diversity of this group that underlines the need for the passage of this bill. Representatives from academic institutions, private businesses, nonprofit organizations, government agencies and the general community managed to reach consensus in response to Hawaii's growing demand for EE.

"The primary purpose of this legislation is to create an environmental education clearinghouse/data base that would:

- (1) Assist educators and the public in finding out about the environmental learning opportunities and resources that already exist;
- (2) Help the many service providers (private businesses, nonprofits and government agencies) coordinate their efforts. This would encourage providers to avoid duplication of services, and would lead to a more effective utilization of limited EE resources; and
- (3) Encourage environmental education as an important, integrated element in school and public programs -- leading to wise use and protection of our State's precious natural resources.

"To accomplish these goals effectively, House Bill 2647 recommends the establishment of an independent, volunteer environmental education council to advise and supervise a contracted coordinator.

The council:

"The council will be made up of a minimum of 12 representatives from academic institutions (both lower and higher education), private business, government agencies, and the general community. All members of the council will have an existing involvement, interest, or association in environmental education.

The coordinator:

"The coordinator will also be experienced in the field of environmental education. He/she will be responsible for organizing and retrieving existing EE services and materials and inputting this information on an electronic data base that will be accessible to the public.

"Through the organization of existing resources, the coordinator will be able to identify EE gaps, and will be in a position to recommend actions to resolve them. The identification of such educational gaps would aid in more effective design and use EE materials.

"Environmental education is the single most important element in dealing with the variety of environmental problems now facing our State. Without an 'environmentally literate' population, our ability to deal with these issues will be severely constrained, if not impossible.

"With this in mind, this bill would implement one of our most effective strategies to deal with these issues. House Bill 2647 will begin establishment of an integrated, cost-effective program which will make development,

implementation, and delivery of EE programs much more effective. Thus, the \$100,000 investment called for in this bill can be justified by the necessity of the work involved. Passage of this bill may be the best investment we can make for the future environmental health of our State.

"I would like to express my thanks to the numerous individuals who participated in the Energy and Environmental Education Committee. From the countless hours spent drafting legislation to the continuous flow of testimony and letters of support, these people have demonstrated that they are truly dedicated to improving the quality of Hawaii's environmental education: Tamar Chotzen, Chris Summers, Colleen Murakami, John Steelquist, Lynn Carey, Jackie Miller, Pauline Sato, Kathy Kawaguchi, Charlotte Kawazoe, Terry O'Halloran, Kate Braden, Bruce Carlson, Jeff Stark, Kathy Jaycox, Paul Forestell, Meagan Jones, Bob Butterfield, Russel Elwell, Sherwood Maynard, Carol Hopper, Annette Kaohelaulii, Jean Omaye, Kersten Johnson, Jane Dewell, Dean Higuchi, Paul Lister, Stan Michaels, Amy Sheridan, Jack Morgan, Clara Olds, Shirley Robinson, Bob Rock, Maile Sakamoto, Eva Tasaki, Chris Woolaway, Karen Tanaka, Susan Stayton, Tobi Hezel, Muriel Roberts, Robert Goodman, Christina Meller, Myra Immings, Dr. Arthur King, and Devon Nekoba."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2647, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 785-94 and H.B. No. 2731, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2731, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION TO PROVIDE FOR INCREASED PUBLIC ACCESS OF LEGISLATIVE PROCEEDINGS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Hagino voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 786-94 and H.B. No. 2897, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2897, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE NATURAL ENERGY LABORATORY OF HAWAII AUTHORITY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 787-94 and H.B. No. 3093, HD 3:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3093, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 788-94 and H.B. No. 3301, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3301, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HIRING OF ATTORNEYS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 789-94 and H.B. No. 3325, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3325, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PERSONNEL EXEMPTIONS FOR THE COMMUNITY HOSPITALS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

At 12:29 o'clock p.m., Representative Arakaki asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:32 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 790-94 and H.B. No. 3333, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3333, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Isbell rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is the Panaewa Hawaiian Home Lands housing bill that came out of the Housing Committee.

"I would like to extend my appreciation to the Finance Committee for hearing the bill, number one, which is always a major victory in anybody's language, but also for passing it out and although I disagree with the non-concurrence which I wasn't asked at all for prior concurrence for some of the changes, I do appreciate the fact that it's going to the Senate and that we will still have an opportunity to improve on its contents.

"The bill does not follow the language which we felt was very important in the Housing Committee. It allows for three million dollars to be used from Hawaiian Home Lands' special funds, but it doesn't give them any direction and it's no direction that got us here in the first place. If the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands had properly monitored, as well as the Housing Finance Development Corporation with which they had a joint venture, I don't believe that we would be here even debating a bill such as this.

"Mr. Speaker, the problem I have really is that the people of Panaewa are the ones who have had to take the brunt of all of this. If you and I had purchased a home and we paid a certain amount and it was told to us that that was what we were getting, I think we would all be outraged to find out that it was much less than that. I'm happy that the bill still talks about the fact that the homes do not meet the criteria that they were meant to, and that in the near future we will be able to make some changes on that.

"I also am concerned about one item that was said that if we don't require the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands to use their own funds, there's a concern that they might not owe after the performance bond to get reimbursed for the sloppy job. I really have some problems with that because I would wonder how many times they haven't gone after a performance bond or other things that should have been done, and I am not surprised that perhaps it's happened before.

"I would like to again thank the Finance Chairman and do appreciate the fact that we have a bill before us. It's going to be very tough to defend the House position if there's any changes that come over from the Senate, so I would hope that perhaps we would use the same system of the floor amendment kind to allow us, in the future, to perhaps deviate a little bit from the House position.

"I thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Arakaki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with great reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, every once in a while we are called upon, as legislators, to make a difference. Not to do things because it is expedient, but to do things because it is right; not to bow to power and influence, but to stand up for justice and speak for those whose pleas have been falling on deaf ears.

"Mr. Speaker and members, we have 51 families living in Panaewa residential lots 3 and 4, families whose dreams of home ownership have turned to nightmares. And while the news media has focused on the termites that have devastated their homes, the greater harm has been the eating away of the spirits of individuals and families. These people have suffered the indignity of living in homes of poor quality, intimidated into accepting the inferior materials and substandard construction. What has happened to this community borders on the criminal. These people feel a sense of betrayal from the State agency that is supposed to look after the best interest of their native Hawaiian beneficiaries.

"Mr. Speaker, if we fail to heed their pleas, then we shall have confirmed their suspicions. Instead of hope, we shall leave them more pilikia. If we show insensitivity, they will be forced to use litigation against the State to seek remedy. Now, is this what we want? Is this the only way to solve this problem? There are times, Mr. Speaker, when we must show ha'aha'a, or humility. To be able to admit that a mistake was made and instead of working so hard to look for blame, work hard to hoopono -- to make things right for the people we serve. If this was done early on, much of the grief could have been avoided. Instead, the Panaewa homesteaders have developed a deep mistrust for the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, and questions the intentions behind every move.

"Now, House Bill 3333 in House Draft 1 form, was the Housing and Hawaiian Affairs Committees' response to acknowledge and incorporate the residents' concerns. We know it would have been easier to perhaps just pay them off -- let them fix their homes. But we want to also give them back their sense of pride -- pride in home ownership -- which they really deserve.

"So, Mr. Speaker, I strongly support this bill and, hopefully, with the leadership of our Housing Chair, we can continue to work towards a solution where everyone wins. And, hopefully, we can come up at the end of the session with a bill that will respond to the needs of these people.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Beirne then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the process itself of the native Hawaiians obtaining a lease, I believe, needs to be revisited. For the Panaewa sites, as a whole, over 800 native Hawaiians had the opportunity to be amongst the many that were interested in the properties with just 50 being chosen.

"Mr. Speaker, a lot of the problems really stem from the beginning when they got chosen, how much they had to put down, the process of getting into the home, the process of the punch list and checking off what was right in the home and turning those punch lists in. Mr. Speaker, many of the residents that were awarded the leases did not have the opportunity to really work hand-in-hand with those that were in authority to say ... this looks defective, that looks defective, this is maikai, and so on and so forth. Going through this process, it seems that they themselves started to feel the neglect or the lack of communications between themselves and those that were in authority at that particular time. I think that the process itself needs to really be revisited.

"There are many other projects that are opening up, Mr. Speaker. One in particular is the Paukukalo in Maui. They're doing the same thing. What they're saying to the native Hawaiians that get accepted is ... please, live in the house for a little bit. Check off on the punch list what you feel is necessary and having done that, then come back and tell us what needs to be done.

"That's why I'm speaking with reservations for the bill, because the process itself needs to be looked at. It needs to be revisited. I feel that the people in Panaewa have accepted their plight and will work slowly to go ahead and correct the problems.

"I think, Mr. Speaker, that the Housing Committee and the Hawaiian Affairs Committee really, really thought this out thoroughly, and I would ask that our colleagues support this and let it be seen through the process and through the Senate and see how we can further assist the Panaewa residents.

"Mahalo."

Representative Alcon then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill with reservations, be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Alcon's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill should have been unnecessary if the agencies in authority sent their engineers to inspect the project. The Hawaiian Home Lands sent a project engineer only once and HHA did not send any engineer. The Housing Finance Development Corporation has a platoon of engineers and yet did not send anyone to check the project."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3333, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PANAWEA RESIDENTIAL LOTS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 791-94 and H.B. No. 3365, HD 3:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3365, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SOCIAL WORKERS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 792-94 and H.B. No. 3440, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3440, HD 2,

entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WATER QUALITY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Tanimoto voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 3153, 3324, 3426, 3428, 2647, 2731, 2897, 3093, 3301, 3325, 3333, 3365 and 3440 had passed Third Reading at 12:36 o'clock p.m.

At 12:37 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:30 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 793-94 and H.B. No. 3465, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3465, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE CORRECTIONS POPULATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 794-94 and H.B. No. 3607, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3607, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Chang rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, on the front page of this past Sunday's **Advertiser**, there was an article on the 77,000 acres of agricultural lands that are threatened by the potential closing of many of our sugar plantations. The reporter interviewed some of our State and industry leaders, and I was very disappointed because it seems they have already given up on sugar.

"Mr. Speaker, as you know, we have already spent millions of dollars in sugar research. Our sugar companies have invested much in the way of infrastructure, equipment and employees. We have even shared our sugar-growing expertise with foreign nations who are now competing against us.

"There are other products like ethanol that can be produced from sugarcane and many other agricultural products.

"This bill would mandate the use of certain percentages of ethanol-blended fuel for use in motor vehicles in Hawaii by 1996, if it is competitively priced with gasoline. There are already eleven agricultural-based states that mandate ethanol blends for their vehicles.

"This measure would assure potential ethanol developers a market for their product, in planting crops and to use ethanol.

"Mr. Speaker, ethanol is a proven fuel. Establishment of an ethanol industry in Hawaii would give our citizens the assurance that the State is committed to reducing our dependence on imported fuel while helping to stave off the immense impact of unemployment, encourage the productive use of our agricultural lands, and diversifying our economy.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3607, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GOVERNMENT ASSISTANCE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 795-94 and H.B. No. 3609, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3609, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LIQUOR LICENSE FEES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 796-94 and H.B. No. 3630, HD 3:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3630, HD 3, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Arakaki rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, self-determination and Hawaiian sovereignty -- these two terms are linked. Self-determination is a foundation upon which Hawaii sovereignty must be built. Self-determination is why people have fought toward independence. It is what led our American founding forefathers to engage in a revolutionary war at the price of American lives. Self-determination is the basis of our democratic form of government. It is why our government and Legislature exist today.

"Mr. Speaker and colleagues, I remind all of you that the Sovereignty Advisory Commission was a creation of the State Legislature as recognition of the indigenous people of Hawaii's right to self-determination. It was our commitment during the 100th Anniversary of the overthrow of the Hawaiian government to right a wrong.

"Through the Sovereignty Advisory Commission, we established a group of remarkable individuals, gave them a seemingly impossible task of allowing hundreds of native Hawaiians and part-Hawaiians representing a total spectrum of lifestyles and perspectives, a chance to express their views in their home communities. They expressed anger, they expressed frustration, they expressed outrage. They expressed a sense of betrayal by a government who stole their identity a hundred years ago and continued to treat them as helpless, mindless wards of the State. Mr. Speaker, I saw and heard with my eyes and ears, these Commission members accused of being puppets of the State, sent to push the State's agenda on the Hawaiian community.

"These commissioners showed great humility and understanding in taking the abuse. In fact, in the process, two commissioners have since passed away. One of them, Uncle Victor Jarrett, represented the mainland Hawaiians, and I remember sitting next to him and he told me about his dreams -- to see all Hawaiians united one day. Another commissioner who was a former colleague, Kinau Kamalii, also suffered a heart attack and is now recovering. In their struggle for credibility, it was apparent to them, as it was for me, that credibility had to be achieved through the Sovereignty Commission becoming an independent election board.

"Your Hawaiian Affairs Committee rejected that proposal because we felt it would be a waste of valuable resources and like starting over again with a new election

board. Your Committee felt the best compromise would be to provide more autonomy and separation to the Sovereignty Commission. Mr. Speaker, if we fail to respond with the same kind of understanding and humility that the Commission showed to their constituency, then we shall have undermined their credibility and affirmed what they have been accused of.

"Mr. Speaker, I will vote in favor of this measure, hoping that we can somehow deal with the constitutional concerns and allow the autonomy that this Commission deserves.

"Mr. Speaker and colleagues, I believe that the Sovereignty Advisory Commission represents the fortune and future of the quest for a sovereign Hawaiian nation. I believe that the sovereign nation of Hawaii shall rise like a Phoenix from the ashes of a tragic event that occurred over a hundred years ago. But as the Phoenix starts to spread its wings and ready itself for a flight, I don't think we should be there to tether its legs and restrict its flight. We need to let the sovereign Hawaiian nation fly free to soar and determine their own destiny.

"Mr. Speaker, in recognition of the hard work of the Advisory Commission, I would like to just add as an addendum to my comments the list of Sovereignty Advisory Commission members.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Members of the Sovereignty Advisory Commission are as follows:

Louis "Buzzy" Agard: An advocate of Hawaiian rights and the future protection of the community. He is a former member of the Hawaiian Homes Commission.

'Ilei Beniamina: Born and raised on Ni'ihau and presently lives on Kaua'i where she is on the faculty of Kaua'i Community College. She co-founded Ho'ola Lahui Hawai'i Hawaiian health care system and Aha Punana Leo. Her work in Hawaiian programs for the Ni'ihau community gained her recognition as Citizen of the Year.

Allen Hoe, Esq.: An attorney in private practice who has devoted a major portion of his time and energy in efforts to promote educational opportunities for Hawaiian youths and to right the wrongs committed against them in 1893.

Victor Kealakuhilima Jarrett: Was instrumental in promoting the Mainland Council of the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs. He served as first Vice-President of the Las Vegas Hawaiian Civic Club. Uncle Victor passed away on January 19, 1994. In his work as commissioner, he strongly advocated for all Hawaiians, resident and non-resident, to be able to vote in the Hawaiian sovereignty plebiscite. His dream was for all Hawaiians throughout the world to one day be united as one people.

Barbara (Hanchett) Kalipi: Has been a social worker with Queen Lili'uokalani Children's Center on Moloka'i since 1975. She was born and raised on Ho'olehua Homestead lands and has been involved in Hawaiian community issues over the years.

Rev. Natalie "Tasha" Kama: An awardee of a Hawaiian Home Lands agricultural lease in Keokea, Maui. She was nominated by the Waiohuli-Keokea Homesteaders, Inc., and appointed by the Governor for the island of Maui on the Sovereignty Advisory Commission.

Kina'u Boyd Kamali'i: O.H.A. trustee-at-large and represents O.H.A. on the Commission. She is Administrator of the State Health Planning and Development Agency; served as Chairperson of the Native Hawaiian Study Commission as a presidential appointee; and was Minority Leader of the Hawai'i State House of Representatives.

Mahealani Kamau'u: Has been a Hawaiian rights advocate since the early 1970's. She was raised on the islands of Kaua'i and O'ahu. She currently serves as Executive Director of the Native Hawaiian Legal Corporation.

Dennis "Bumpy" Kanahele: Has been an advocate for total independence in the Hawaiian community for many years. He is very protective of indigenous Hawaiian rights as basic human rights and believes strongly in international law and the domestic laws that protect us today. Kanahele resigned as a member of the Commission on January 8, 1994. He felt that the apology law passed by the U.S. Congress and signed by President William Clinton in November 1993 constituted an acknowledgement that control over Hawai'i by the U.S. and Hawai'i state governments is illegal. On January 16, 1994, he and the 'Ohana Council proclaimed that Hawai'i is now an independent state and can already seek recognition from other countries and the United Nations.

Kamaki Kanahele: Represents the State Council of Hawaiian Homestead Associations, is President of Nanakuli Hawaiian Homestead Community Association, and serves as an O.H.A. trustee.

LaFrance Kapaka-Arboleda: Has been a native Hawaiian rights advocate for the last 20 years. She spent four and a half years in Bush, Alaska, living and studying the Alaska Native Claims Act. She is the current Executive Director for Habitat for Humanity on the island of Kaua'i.

H.K. Bruss Keppeler, Esq.: An attorney in private practice. He is the President and represents the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs on the Commission. He has been active in Hawaiian affairs since 1966.

Poka Laenui (Hayden F. Burgess, Esq.): An early advocate for Hawaiian sovereignty, he has acquired experience in international advocacy and gained international recognition as an expert on the rights of indigenous peoples. He is Director of the Institute for the Advancement of Hawaiian Affairs, the President of the Pacific Asia Council of Indigenous Peoples, served as the Vice-President and political advocate for the World Council of Indigenous Peoples in numerous international forums, and was selected by the United Nations to address the General Assembly on the opening day of the International Year for the World's Indigenous Peoples.

Robert Lindsey: Has had an interest in Hawaiian rights and issues since the 1970's. A native of Waimea, Hawai'i, Bob works for Kamehameha Schools/Bishop Estate as Region Manager for the island of Hawai'i.

T. Aimoku McClellan: President of McClellan & Smith, Inc., a marketing, sales and technical writing firm. He recently challenged and suggested amendments to the methods used by the State Supreme Court to appoint Kamehameha Schools/Bishop Estate trustees. He is a member of the Native Hawaiian Chamber of Commerce and serves as First Vice-

President of the Kamehameha Schools Alumni Association.

William Kalaniuli Meheula, Esq.: Lawyer with McCorriston Miho & Miller and belongs to the Native Hawaiian Bar Association. He served as the pro bono lead counsel in *Ka'ai'ai v. Drake*, the first successful native Hawaiian trust claim litigation against the State of Hawai'i.

Ann Kukakina Nathaniel: Serves on the Hawaiian Homes Commission; the Board of Directors of Alu Like, Inc.; and the Board of Directors of the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs. She is President of the Hawai'i County District Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs and the Prince David Kawanakoa Hawaiian Civic Club. She belongs to the Ahahui Ka'ahumanu Helu 'Eholu and the Pana'ewa Hawaiian Homelands Community Association.

A'o Pohaku Rodenhurst: Was nominated by Na Kupa O Ku Ho'one'ene'eu Pono. She is a Hawaiian with nine children. As an advocate for self-determination for all kanaka maoli, she is working for the community to achieve spiritual and physical knowledge so the people can make well-informed decisions and have choices to understand sovereignty and self-sufficiency for the future.

Representative Beirne then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill should be supported, with reservations, because it provides for and recognizes the wishes of the present Sovereignty Advisory Commission; that is, that the Commission be a completely separate entity, unaffected by State directives.

"Mr. Speaker, the bill that we are addressing, House Bill 3630, also came with another bill that had to do with the moratorium on all public and ceded lands. That bill also went through our Hawaiian Affairs Committee and also through the Water and Land Committee. Somehow, Mr. Speaker, that bill was not passed out and heard. However, this bill is still on the agenda.

"Mr. Speaker, I am asking that my colleagues, as well as yourself, be mindful of the fact that sovereignty is about self-determination. That means that Hawaiians must decide what is best for them. Once they do decide, they will unite. The initial process should remain free from the influence of State directives, at least until the basic decision is made on whether or not the Hawaiian community wants sovereignty.

"Mr. Speaker, the Sovereignty Advisory Commission has done a very hard task out there, working and expanding to reach out to the many Hawaiian people and community. Mr. Speaker, when they came to us on the Hawaiian Affairs Committee, it was in hopes that they might have an election so that new commissioners might be elected to the process because many of the Hawaiians were identifying with the commissioners as being part of the State government. We felt, Mr. Speaker, that it was best for us, the State of Hawaii, to save that funding of having another election and go with the appointed commissioners that Governor Waihee had appointed, and that is because it was the Hawaiian organization that submitted the names to the Governor to be appointed. Very recently, at their last convention, if you will, or get-together, there were 189 huks that were represented -- 189 native Hawaiian huks -- where everyone had the opportunity to go ahead and share their manao on what was before us, coming out in the Legislature. The feedback was really that the question was not necessary because the process itself on sovereignty had already

begun many, many years ago, but they did come to some consensus that further dialogue on the process should continue.

"Mr. Speaker, it's very, very important that this bill, with reservations, go through the process so that our Hawaiian people, our native Hawaiian people, might be able to find some trust in government, and I don't know if that's fair to say at this time, considering that the moratorium bill was not heard.

"Mr. Speaker, again, just a reminder that this bill would help in some way. Hopefully, give the Hawaiians their opportunity to decide for themselves. And I hope that as it goes through the process, that perhaps the Senate might see fit that the commissioners should have the autonomy that they want. They do not want to be an advisory group, Mr. Speaker, and if it affects Sections 3 and 5 of the Constitution, I think perhaps we should start really seriously looking at how we can better this bill through the process.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3630, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HAWAIIAN SOVEREIGNTY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 797-94 and H.B. No. 2996, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2996, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Yonamine rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is another of the many far-reaching bills that our committee has worked on. I wish to thank Vice Chair Suzuki and members of the Labor and Public Employment Committee for spending many, many hours on workers' compensation. And I want to thank you, Mr. Speaker, and the leadership team, and especially Chairman Say and the Finance Committee, for the support they have given us, not only with workers' compensation bills, but with all of the other far-reaching bills that I mentioned earlier.

"Mr. Speaker, one of the biggest issues facing the 1994 State Legislature involves the many serious problems in workers' compensation. The law was designed to benefit workers by guaranteeing just and timely compensation for job-related injuries. The intent of the law, though, has been blunted. Something's gone wrong with workers' compensation.

"How bad are the problems?

"I cite just two examples out of many, many examples. Program costs and employer premiums have hit new heights. In the six years ending 1992, workers' compensation program costs increased by over 225 percent. Medical costs increased even more -- 275 percent! Workers' compensation is now a \$450-million industry.

"Another example: Many injured workers must wait as long as three years for their just and timely compensation. One worker even waited for seven years!

"There are many, many examples of what has gone wrong with worker's compensation, and I must point out

that everyone connected to workers' compensation contributes to the problem and, therefore, everyone must contribute to the solutions.

"Your Committee on Labor and Public Employment has received extensive information on the status of the workers' compensation system. We studied a recent report of soaring medical costs and attorney fees. We reviewed the 1984 Legislative Auditor's recommendations, noting that fully half of them had been ignored for a number of different reasons.

"We personally consulted with those directly involved with workers' compensation -- the employers, union, representatives of the medical and legal professions, and injured workers themselves, the insurance companies -- gaining valuable insight into this highly complicated system.

"Two things are clear. First, action is unquestionably needed. More importantly, however, that action has to be comprehensive. Short term, quick solutions to long-term, complex problems only beget more problems.

"This bill is significant in that it will cause a complete, system-wide analysis of the entire workers' compensation process and the way the law is being implemented. It will take a collaborative approach toward a complicated set of problems that have languished since 1986, the last time action was done by the Workers' Compensation Commission.

"House Bill 2996, House Draft 2, establishes a commission of seven, including an appointment by the Speaker of the House and an appointment by the President of the Senate, that will meet for up to six months starting this July. This is definitely not an easy task. Each of the seven members must be knowledgeable about workers' compensation. Each must realize that no single solution will be satisfactory to all; that tough decisions and choices must be made if the system is to be reformed and remain humanitarian. These people must remain strong and unafraid, and this is what we call the 'Guts Commission.'

"The Commission will review the existing workers' compensation laws, the regulations and benefits; its effects on business and labor; the roles of medical and legal providers; system deficiencies from the viewpoints of managers and workers; and issues of waste, fraud, and abuse. The Commission will submit its findings and an action plan with recommended legislation before the next session of the Legislature.

"Further, Mr. Speaker, the 'Guts Commission' will continue to meet every three years thereafter, submitting reports and findings to subsequent sessions of the Legislature. This ongoing process of assessment and review will ensure that future concerns can be identified and addressed before they spiral out of control, and that we will be able finally to resolve the agonizing problems that now beset the system and prevent injured workers from receiving the 'guaranteed just compensation' to which they are entitled under the law.

"Mr. Speaker, this vital legislation will provide continued, long-term, well-reasoned solutions and oversight to the workers' compensation system.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2996, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WORKERS' COMPENSATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 798-94 and H.B. No. 3327, HD 3:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3327, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ESTABLISHMENT OF AN AGENCY FOR COMMUNITY HOSPITALS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 799-94 and H.B. No. 3453, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3453, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII HURRICANE RELIEF FUND," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 800-94 and H.B. No. 3430, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3430, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INSURANCE REGULATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 801-94 and H.B. No. 3463, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3463, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE TRANSFER OF PUBLIC SAFETY FUNCTIONS AND EMPLOYEES FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE TO THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 802-94 and H.B. No. 3644, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3644, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Duldulao rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, there are many problems with this bill which I am very concerned with. One thing the bill does is to add a new exemption to injuries covered by workmen's compensation. Therefore, employees voluntarily attending a company picnic, or even a more formal social function where the employee is not 'required' to attend but is 'voluntarily' expected to attend, would be excluded from accessing workers' compensation if they are injured at such a function.

"The adjustment of the medical fee schedule through the use of the Consumer Price Index and the ten percent additional provider fee had been deleted by this bill which poses a problem. Amending this section alone, without a comprehensive review of all medical and health related costs, and without an analysis of the potential and negative effects of such change, is not prudent public policy. This could result in fewer providers willing to care for injured workers.

"Another problem with this bill, Mr. Speaker, is in the computation of hourly wages. The amendment calls for the average number of hours worked by the employee in a week during the period used for computation to be used to calculate the average weekly wage. However, this poses a problem to many people who work two or more jobs to make ends meet. Oftentimes, employers will only employ someone nineteen hours a week to get around the requirement of paying for health benefits. If a worker is injured at one job, then the employee cannot work at his/her other job either. The workers' compensation benefit would only reflect the wages received from the part-time job and does not reflect the employee's inability to work at all. Benefits under workers' compensation do not match the employee's full wages as it is. To diminish an injured workers income even more, as this provision calls for, is not fair to the injured worker.

"A problem arises under the penalties for fraud section. An amendment was made regarding restitution of wages to the source from which they came if fraud is discovered. However, this does not take into account the fact that some fraud occurs at a point in time other than at the beginning of the actual injury. No flexibility for this type of situation is allowed. This provision calls for the complete restitution of funds, not restitution from the point at which fraud has been determined to have actually taken place.

"It seems as though this bill makes it very difficult to obtain workers' compensation, even for the honest workers. In many instances, it does not seem to be fair to the average worker and is almost as if a worker must beg to be compensated when injured.

"Therefore, Mr. Speaker and my colleagues, I urge you to vote down on this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Kanoho then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and fellow members, this bill is second only to education in addressing the most critical issues facing businesses, both large and small, in Hawaii today. The amendments in this measure would significantly reduce the cost of doing business in our State and not only help to improve our image in that regard, but send a clear message that this body does have the courage to render some difficult but fair and just decisions on workers' compensation.

"This bill does not take away any benefits to which an injured employee should be entitled. Let me repeat that because it is such an important factor for everyone to know ... this bill does not take away any benefits to which an injured employee should be entitled. Neither would we ever attempt to take away any benefits that an injured employee is justly entitled.

"Mr. Speaker, the fact that a meaningful workers' compensation reform bill is being considered for Third Reading in this House is more than a minor miracle. In a very bold and unprecedented action, your Democratic Majority officially expressed in writing, in its Majority Package, words to the effect that the 'serious problem of workers' compensation abuse and fraud would be addressed in this session.' Mr. Speaker, I well remember your very courageous statements in your Opening Day speech on this very subject.

"It is truly unprecedented that this omnibus bill would even be scheduled for a hearing by the Labor Committee, and I wish to express my appreciation to Chairman

Yonamine for doing so. Likewise, to Finance Chair, Calvin Say, for also subjecting himself to a marathon hearing, and for acting so positively and fairly in passing out this measure which is now in our hands.

"The Committee Report does accurately reflect that there was considerable testimony in opposition to this bill. It is important to clarify that nearly all of the opposition came from chiropractors and podiatrists whose fears and concerns were totally relieved by the deletion of the section relating to attending physician. Incidentally, there were seven other sections, or parts of sections, which were also deleted and that I was a primary advocate for the deletion of most of these sections.

"I think that it would also be important for me to very briefly touch upon the five sections which were retained in the bill. The first excludes from compensability, certain recreational and social injuries. Still included, however, under workers' compensation are recreational and social injuries which occur on employer's premises, or in those cases where employee participation in such activities provide substantial benefit to the employer. Another section restricts a part-time employee's work comp wages to the average number of hours actually worked. Presently, an employee may work ten hours a week but would receive workers' compensation payments based on a full 35-hour week so that he receives more for remaining at home on work comp than returning to duty in his regular part-time job. We need to mention here that this does not change the PPD (permanent partial disability) or PTD (permanent total disability) or death benefits that part-time workers receive.

"One of the five retained sections doubles the penalty on employers or insurance companies who default in payments to employees. Of the remainder, one establishes a Safety Education and Training Fund while the other establishes a more appropriate means of determining medical fee schedules involving the Director of the Department of Labor. The fifth authorizes the Director of Labor, and it is only with his authorization, that restitution can be ordered in cases where benefits may have been fraudulently received.

"This bill has regrettably been perceived in some quarters to be a one-sided pro-business bill. This measure will help businesses from going out of business as so many already have. This bill will help businesses to stay in business, which means that workers don't lose jobs and that workers are given employment and workers can earn wages to support families. This then, perhaps, can even be a pro-worker's bill, not only from the standpoint of job creation and job retention, but helps employees' morale because good workers and good workers do represent the majority of our employees. These good workers do not appreciate and, in fact, resent abuse and fraud.

"Mr. Speaker, I am so overjoyed. I can hardly believe that this is really happening. It's been a few years since I've done it but I'm ready to do some handstands with Representative Nekoba in celebrating his floor amendment. A written statement on workers' compensation abuse and fraud in the Majority Package; a similar reference in your Opening Day speech, Mr. Speaker; a hearing on the workers' compensation reform bill by the Labor Committee and subsequent action by the Finance Committee, and now being discussed for Third Reading ... I have never been as proud as I am now to be a member of the House of Representatives.

"I hope House Bill 3644, HD 2, will be passed resoundingly by this body because it is the right and fair thing to do and does not take away benefits to which injured employees should be entitled. While those of us

who strongly support this measure will also do our utmost to effect its passage in the Senate, we can all be proud, very proud of our actions, regardless of what may subsequently happen.

"Mr. Speaker, Chairman Yonamine, Chairman Say and members ... thank you very much for your support on this critically important measure.

"Thank you."

Representative Marumoto then rose and requested that Representative Kanoho's remarks be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Ward then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with slight reservations, stating:

"If there's anything I remember, Mr. Speaker, as a freshman when I spoke on the floor, I said, 'We shouldn't be knee-jerk labor or we shouldn't be knee-jerk management. We should do what's best for the people of Hawaii.'

"If we look at the data in the crisis of what we're going through now in workers' compensation, the data is this and it's unequivocally ... for every ten percent increase in workers' compensation rates, a one percent decrease in employment results. We have before us now a twenty percent rate increase that's before the State Commissioner which means two percent of the labor force would be decreased on the basis of that.

"This is a lose/lose proposition. Labor doesn't win, management doesn't win. We've got to do something, Mr. Speaker. And contrary to the accolades of handsprings and flipping and promises that were made by the Majority Package, I don't think we've gone very far because if this bill stays the way it is, we've only played on the outside of the real issue of getting cost under control. We haven't got cost under control. In fact, even the thing about fee-splitting which was innocuously, or mistakenly taken out, it's where if a doctor had an X-ray unit that they sent their patients to, that would be an illegal use of taking a double dip at the client.

"Mr. Speaker, we have a long way to go, and I would only encourage the Senate to at least put fee-splitting back in, and as the chair of the subject matter committee said, 'to have the "Guts Commission" really take a gutsy look at this,' and get this under control. Otherwise, the small business community that's crying out hard and fast that there's a crisis going on will have gone on deaf ears, Mr. Speaker.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Takumi then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"If you read the bill, it says in the beginning that this represents a significant step towards comprehensive reform, but I urge my colleagues to look at the bill and see ... where is that reform? Where are the significant steps?

"I think the previous speaker indicated that the workers' compensation insurance has gone up and the Insurance Commissioner recently granted a twenty percent-plus increase. Look at the bill and see whether or not these reforms will address that increase. I say, it doesn't.

"Take Section 2 which is already covered by case law regarding the provision about getting injured on social

activities. Again, that is well covered by case law. There's really no need for that section.

"Section 4, on the computation of weekly wages, can be and will be handled by administrative rules by the Department of Labor as they are proceeding forward to revamping their entire rule-making structure to take into account situations such as the part-timers and temporary total disability.

"Section 6, on restitution for fraud. Again, that is already handled in Chapter 386-52, and if you look at the incidence of fraud as compiled by the Department of Labor ... take, for example, the years 1990 to 1992, in that three year period, there were eighteen cases of fraud out of a hundred and fifty thousand claims. Of those eighteen cases of fraud, all the claimants paid restitution and fines to the source. The restitution was paid to the source. So again, this section is redundant.

"I would like to echo the comments made by the Labor Chair when he talked about House Bill 2996, that workers' compensation cannot be approached in a piecemeal fashion. We have to take a long and hard look at where the fault lies, where some of the solutions lie, and I think the Advisory Commission is the correct place to address that.

"This bill merely is a piecemeal approach and, therefore, I recommend that my colleagues vote no on it.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3644, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OCCUPATIONAL INJURIES AND ILLNESSES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 39 ayes to 12 noes, with Representatives Amaral, Apo, Beirne, Duldulao, Hagino, Hiraki, Hirono, Menor, Shon, Takamine, Takumi and Taniguchi voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 803-94 and H.B. No. 3657, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3657, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Tanimoto rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I was pleased to be able to sign and be an introducer of this measure, but at this time I am a little disappointed at what House Bill 3657 has become. Basically, we are passing an omnibus bill which codifies and puts together all of the current education statutes, which is good. But it really does little to improve education. I apologize for somewhat being skeptical of this bill, but I badly want to see education improve in this State of Hawaii, and I think we are sidestepping the real issues that we need to get to better education.

"There are a number of provisions in the bill that are red flags. The first one is that we mandate school/community-based management in one breath. But on the very next breath, we stipulate that the school-based management group can proceed as long as we don't lose currently employed school personnel and that, to me, is where we need to start to make some decisions. If the schools, through its SCBM, have determined that there are positions that are no longer needed, I think they should be given the opportunity to replace these positions, or delete the positions and use the funds as necessary for providing more input into the classrooms.

"It really is time, Mr. Speaker, that the Legislature and State government stop basing policy decision on preserving warm bodies. I find myself making this statement here before you as a freshman, and I know that it's a hard statement for me to make, but I think if we really want to make improvements in education, we need to look all around us. We see it in the federal government where our President has said we need to down-size government and cut 250,000 employees. We see it in the private sector with IBM, Polaroid, all the major companies, down-sizing people and using electronic medias and things to make ourselves more efficient. I think we need to address that and we really need to start looking at privatization, not as the mechanism of anti-unionism, but really as a tool that is cost-efficient.

"Mr. Speaker, I support House Bill 3657 for anything it can do to improve education for young people. If it gets parents and communities to move forward, then that's great. If it strengthens the performance of evaluation for teachers and educational officers, we have made progress. If it promotes higher performance standards for students, and greater accountability for schools and the Department of Education, then we can stand proud.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for permitting this 'new guy' to give his 'maiden voyage' today.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3657, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 3465, 3607, 3609, 3630, 2996, 3327, 3453, 3430, 3463, 3644 and 3657 had passed Third Reading at 2:09 o'clock p.m.

THIRD READING

The following bills, which were on the calendar for Third Reading, were read throughout, and the following actions taken:

H.B. No. 2344, HD 1:

Representative Ihara moved that H.B. No. 2344, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Ward then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This bill seeks to amend the lapse of a one million dollar appropriation to the Legislative Reference Bureau which we passed last year. The irony, Mr. Speaker, is that if we had privatized, as the last speaker said, if we had privatized the printing of the Hawaii Revised Statutes, instead of debating this on the floor today, we can actually be flipping through those texts.

"Mr. Speaker, there is no argument about the need for the revision of the statutes. It's not been since 1985 that they've been reprinted. The point is that we are now revising them in the midst of an economic throe of hard times, but yet there's a million dollars that we are going to have to throw out to get them printed.

"What's at stake is whether we use the million dollars of our cash flow up front, or we ask a private company to do that. Privatization in this area is nothing new.

There's been bus systems, roads, prisons, refuse collections, emergency ambulance systems, and I underscore, Mr. Speaker, **43 other states do not publish its own law books. It puts out to the private sector who puts all the bills and then gives all of the free books back to the government.** In our own State, we have The Michie Company which is a national publishing company that recently testified before the House Finance Committee and mentioned the benefits that would be inherent in this relationship by privatizing the publishing of the Hawaii Revised Statutes. This is the alternative to providing a million dollars of taxpayers' money into this publication. It could shift the entire financial risk and outlay from the State to the private sector, while maintaining the quality control over the editing, designing, the accuracy. . . even Sam Chang could have his footnotes exactly to the fonts and the size that he, himself, prefers. I know he is a very astute man and he's a real stickler on the way he wants it done.

"The point is, Mr. Speaker, we could pay 'zero' dollars rather than the million dollars that we are now being asked to approve. At a time when we have so many social, economic and educational needs, it would seem only wise, it would seem only commonsensical. I don't think this has to be a profound speech for something that's very simple, that it's a way of taking our cash and leveraging it into the private sector and making better use of taxpayers' money.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2344, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PUBLICATION OF THE HAWAII REVISED STATUTES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Tanimoto, Thielen and Ward voting no.

H.B. No. 2391, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, H.B. No. 2391, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROCUREMENT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 3131, HD 1:

Representative Bainum rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Bainum's remarks are as follows:

"As each day I wish that we could more rapidly develop superior techniques to manage the many deadly diseases striking down our population, so I also daily hope that we can be intelligent enough to devise better means of managing the plague of prostitution that has swept over Waikiki. Neither problem is easy of solution, but if we do not continue to do our best, we will never rid ourselves of these health and money-draining factors in our lives.

"Prostitution affects the physical health of this State and its ability to attract visitors here. Prostitution insults innocent families out for an evening stroll, and insults through its openness our essentially unanimous collective belief that this activity should not be permitted.

"Will House Bill 2308, HD 1, finally STOP prostitution in Waikiki? Unfortunately, no. But it will make it more costly to practice and it will temporarily remove some of the more flagrant prostitutes from our sidewalks. It is one more nail in the crate that will finally contain this evil. It is one more proof that lawmakers and the public they represent are very, very tired of a few hundred professionals making our efforts look quite amateurish at times.

"I personally believe that until we truly begin to treat EACH and EVERY customer of these services with equal penalties, including jail time, as we now try to impose on the prostitutes, the world's oldest profession will be all too active within my district.

"This bill does not, unfortunately, go that far. I join, however, with my affirmative vote to at least add one more nail to that crate."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2308, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROSTITUTION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Pepper rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"First of all, I support this measure which expands consumer protection by providing a three-day rescission period when purchasing a new or used car. My reservation, however, has to do with the dealer's holding of the buyer's trade-in.

"The current bill implies that the buyer must leave his or her car at the dealership for up to three days before taking actual possession of the new vehicle. Furthermore, if the buyer chooses to exercise his right or her right to cancel the sale within the proposed three-day rescission period, the dealer could legally take up to ten days to return the buyer's trade-in. Potentially this could result in the buyer being without his or her trade-in car for as many as thirteen days. I believe this would create an unnecessary and unjustified hardship.

"I don't think, in the drafting of the bill, this was the intent. Therefore, I express my hope that the language pertaining to the buyer's trade-in will be clarified and corrected as House Bill 2363 moves forward.

"Thank you."

Representative Thielen then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"In support all of those potential buyers of new or used cars who are going to be put out and catapulted onto the bus or on foot if they choose to exercise their rights to a rescission -- Mr. Speaker, the bill is a pro-consumer bill. I understand the intent of the Representative who originally introduced the bill, and I applaud that intent. However, I think the provision that is on page 2 of the bill is really silly. I mean, it makes the buyer that wants

to exercise rescission rights take the buyer's trade-in into the new car dealership. The buyer exercises the contract to buy the new car, cannot take possession of the new car if the buyer wants to retain the three-day right to cancel that contract, and the buyer has to leave that trade-in vehicle there in the lot. It's the leaving of the trade-in vehicle at the dealer's that really creates the hardship. It's just impractical.

"What does the buyer do? We talk here about -- the buyer goes out on foot, the buyer goes home with a friend, the buyer takes the bus -- the buyer is without a car to be able to get to her/his job.

"So the common sense approach would be to fashion a provision on page 2 that would say ... okay, the buyer will enter into a contract where if the trade-in vehicle is in any way materially damaged or in other ways altered, then that whole contract is subject to cancellation on the dealer's side. But the buyer can use her/his car in the meantime until actually picking up the car that that buyer has purchased.

"I hope I've made that clear, because I would really like us to watch this bill on the Senate side to come out with something that helps the consumer but doesn't catapult the consumer onto the jogging path.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tam then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I wish to register a no vote on this bill for the reason that Representative Pepper had mentioned.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2363, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Marumoto, Tam, Tanimoto, Thielen and Ward voting no.

Representative Ihara moved that H.B. No. 3212, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Duldulao rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"I would begin by saying, 'about time.' This is truly an emotional issue for me but I must go on and say that this bill coming out from the Consumer Protection Committee makes history.

"In reforming the health care delivery system, both on the local and national level, there are several areas that we need to focus our attention on. These areas include: primary health care, health promotion and disease prevention, and access to affordable, appropriate and acceptable health care services.

"Mr. Speaker, it is without a doubt that access to quality health care should be our main focus. Access has been and continues to be an obstacle impacting on populations in rural and underserved areas of our State, and it has also been difficult for such groups as the elderly and the poor, the two groups of people who are currently increasing in numbers, to achieve this access to care. Oftentimes, these patients, many of whom are on Medicaid, are denied access because of the low reimbursement. They are then forced either to use emergency rooms which are very expensive as an alternative for routine care, or to wait until their problem requires hospitalization. That is another very expensive venture. Both of these alternatives are very costly to both the citizen and the general population, not to mention that it restricts vital health care services for people who really need emergency or hospital care.

"As emphasis is being placed on primary health care in clinics and other community settings throughout the nation, Hawaii needs to take a step in this direction. For three years now, Mr. Speaker, we have debated the idea of allowing qualified nurse practitioners to perform a service which they are already allowed to perform in 43 states. It is time for us to move on. I repeat, it is time for us to move on. This should not be a question of doctor's rights, nor should it be construed as a battle between nurses and doctors. Rather, we should attempt to work together in an effort to alleviate health care costs while maintaining quality and access to health care.

"Let us put aside our bickering, and I am outraged to hear physician's disparage the care delivered by nurses and treat as second-class citizens. The United States has the best and highest quality of health care in the world. Let's improve this health care quality by improving on its access. It is time Hawaii moves on into the future.

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to thank you at this time for allowing me to work with you in the interim on this matter, and I also would like to thank all my colleagues who have supported me on this bill.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Stegmaier then rose and requested that his remarks, "in qualified support of this bill," be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Stegmaier's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of H.B. No. 3212, HD 1, but with qualified support.

"In past sessions I have opposed extending prescriptive authority to nurses. I believe that physicians distribute drugs too readily to patients, as it is, and extending the ability to prescribe drugs to nurses was philosophically objectionable.

"This year, my philosophical objections have been overcome with the very cautious manner in which this bill has been drafted. First, it's a two year pilot project. Second, the list of drugs that may be prescribed is to be developed by a Formulary Council comprised of advanced practice registered nurses, physicians, pharmacists, and a member of the general public. This representative council will hopefully assure a limited set of pharmaceuticals only.

"Third, and most important, the prescriptive authority will only be granted by the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs where the nurse meets strict standards of educational and experiential development and where a formal prescriptive authority relationship has been voluntarily entered into between a physician and a nurse.

"While this is a tight bill which will remain as such during the two year pilot project, we must be alert to attempts subsequently to change that all-important prescriptive authority relationship between physician and nurse, which protects the public and provides us with the most available and affordable medical care possible."

Representative Cachola then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill with reservations, be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Cachola's remarks are as follows:

"I would like to commend those who worked long and hard on House Bill 3212, House Draft 1, including the Chairman of the Consumer Protection and Commerce Committee, for his careful handling of a difficult issue, the physicians for their efforts to develop workable alternatives, and the nurses for their persistence in advancing their profession.

"I base my reservations on the following shortcomings of House Draft 1:

- (1) Members of the Formulary Council should be appointed by the Governor, not the Board of Nursing, to ensure impartiality;
- (2) The length of the pilot program should be five years, not two; and
- (3) The widespread geographic locations allowing prescriptive authority will make the pilot program too different to accurately and carefully monitor.

"The bill, as drafted, would erode the quality of health care delivered in the State and threaten the safety of the public, unless additional supervision measures are added. Although cost containment is one of the most frequently cited reasons for allowing prescriptive authority for other health providers, most of the other states that have experimented with this idea have discovered that it does not lower medical care costs.

"In addressing the issue of access to care, the Legislature should only allow prescriptive authority in

areas with clearly identified access problems so that quality and safety of care will not be greatly jeopardized.

"Furthermore, under the proposed program, collaborating doctors will still be held liable and subject to suits.

"I sincerely hope that this body can work out a suitable arrangement after further deliberation on this difficult matter. In doing so, we must keep in mind the interests of the patients, and not just the nurses and doctors.

"For the above reasons, I intend to vote aye with reservations on this bill."

Representative Bunda then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I suppose this is a bill whose time perhaps has come. It represents an attempt to compromise the concerns which have been voiced by all persons concerned.

"What is significant of this measure is that 45 other states have enacted legislation granting their advanced practice registered nurses the authority to prescribe medications in varying degrees, including complete independent practice in some states. Nurse practitioners have been prescribing medications for at least ten years in some states.

"None of these states have encountered safety problems significant enough to prod these Legislatures to repeal such legislation.

"In fact, Mr. Speaker, in testimony supporting prescriptive privileges for advanced practice nurses, Senator Inouye notes that research of nurse practitioner prescription practices found that only two percent of the prescriptions were changed after consultation with a collaborating physician, and that only two drugs were changed to different drug categories.

"The physicians and nurses have had four years to come up with this kind of legislation which is satisfactory to them. This was not done to our satisfaction, unfortunately. In fact, at our request, last year the Center for Alternative Dispute Resolution convened to try and resolve this matter. The parties met for six weeks and regrettably no consensus was reached.

"Accordingly, Mr. Speaker, this bill has been drafted to accommodate the concerns of the respective parties by your Committee.

"As we approach the new era of health care reform in this country, it is imperative that we look to new possibilities to improve the quality of care and access to care in the areas of primary, preventative and community health care. This bill will go a long way to establishing these important health priorities for our citizens in Hawaii.

"Mr. Speaker, I urge all of my colleagues to vote aye on this measure.

"Thank you."

Representative Young then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"I would just like to say that sometimes the results of compromise are not quite what everybody hopes in the parties but I think, in this particular case, I have watched the Committee members work on it over the years. I

have not been on the Committees and I must say that the process has been maturing for all.

"I commend the Chairs of the Committees involved, the members of the Committees and the parties that were involved. I think the spirit of cooperation that it proved in the end is certainly worthy of our Legislature, and I commend them.

"Thank you."

Representative Shon then rose and stated:

"I'd also like to add a few words of praise for this bill moving on. In my recollection, this is the third time the House has passed some form of prescriptive privileges, but this is perhaps the first time that it has reached as much attentive consensus as this bill has. There are still concerns that I'm sure both parties have in this bill, but I would like to especially commend the continued efforts of both Chairs of the Committees, as well as the efforts of two members who have often been on the other side but, historically, are now supporting some form, and that's Representative Bainum and Representative Cachola who have been working behind the scenes with their colleagues and with various interest groups to try to bring them around to slightly more flexible positions.

"I'd also like especially to commend, however, all those nurses in the field who for years have worked without recognition and without the esteem that they deserved in the truly collaborative health care world. They are beginning to emerge as perhaps the new center for quality care and appropriate care in the United States and in Hawaii.

"It's interesting to note that I usually don't have praise for the military, but Tripler Hospital and the Veterans Administration Hospitals throughout the nation have long had prescriptive privileges, and Hawaii is now catching up or beginning to catch up with the military.

"I once again want to commend all those who kept with it throughout the years in pursuing this. It's not over yet. There's still concerns with the bill and there are many more votes and many more discussions to be had in the Senate, but I am very pleased that such a broad consensus has been reached to push this form of the bill forward, and I would like to praise all those who have been involved with this.

"Thank you."

Representative Amaral then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Rather than repeat what everyone has said and which, by the way, I am in total agreement with, I hope that we can send a good, clear message to our counterparts downstairs. And I hope that this spirit of cooperation and working together infects them as well so that we will eventually see this measure pass in this legislative session.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 3212, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NURSES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Alcon, Marumoto and Ward voting no.

Upon reconvening at 2:37 o'clock p.m., Representative Beirne was permitted a late introduction and she introduced a group of students from the University of Hawaii, Hilo. They were accompanied by Auntie Pua Kanahale, Gail Makuakane London and Sam Gaison Evangelista.

Representative Ihara moved that H.B. No. 3274, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Shon rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is a kind of bill that makes us search for what directions we're going, and makes us probe deeper into how the system works or doesn't work.

"I would first like to begin by clarifying a misimpression. The Committee Report states that ... 'Your Committee heard testimony in support of this bill from the Department of Health.' I think that's misleading because I have just been in touch with the Department of Health and I have their testimony here, and it is in opposition to the bill. According to their testimony, it says ... 'This bill appears to be counterproductive to the development and operation of managed care plans which offer high quality health care in a predictable and cost-effective way,' and therefore oppose this bill as currently written. Mr. Speaker, the reason I think the Health Department and others have problems with this bill is because our system is based on a collective attempt by providers and consumers to reach agreement on contracts for health care that attempt to at least hold down or suppress the rising cost of health care.

"It has been said, Mr. Speaker, that this is a bill for choice. Yes, it is. You can choose any doctor and that physician can choose to bill you how much they may want, more than an HMSA or other plans' fee schedule. Now we know, in our debates over workers' compensation, no-fault, that the fee schedule is one of the key elements that we have attempted to utilize in bringing cost under control. In fact, a couple of years ago, there was no fee schedule for no-fault, and that fee schedule was imposed in an attempt to hold down health care costs.

"It is said, Mr. Speaker, that this is a bill to help connect world consumers with non-participating specialists. This is true. This is one of the problems of the current system which I think this bill attempted to deal with, which is that there are physicians who are outside the system and if you go to them, you pay a hundred percent -- period! But the fallacy of this is, rather than bringing those physicians under the fee schedule, we are saying to primary care providers and others ... go ahead, leave the fold. Depart from the umbrella of fee schedules. And so, if you are a rural physician providing primary health care and there aren't a lot of choices, you have very little incentive under this bill to remain under the fee schedule because you can simply say ... well, I'm not going to participate, and I'll get reimbursed anyway. And if I believe that my customers can pay a hundred dollars for the service, I'm not going to reduce that price because HMSA is going to kick in some money. Maybe the cost will then be \$120 or \$130.

"The issue of controlling health care costs is an attempt to balance what a fair price is for providers for what a fair cost is for consumers. We join insurance plans to spread those costs. Those who are outside the insurance plan, like uninsured motorists, increase the cost for everyone else. Those who are within help to spread those costs.

"Today, we say to a consumer or a business ... sign up with someone like HMSA or other provider and if you do, they will negotiate with the business for a better rate than if each individual bought their own individual fee for service contract. It's the collective group that brings their costs down -- the wholesale market and the guarantee of that market. They can do this because they impose a fee schedule and other cost containment approaches, and that's why it costs less than just buying it individually. HMSA or others do not provide services to those who don't pay premiums, and they don't pay doctors who don't belong to the system unless there's a special type of referral that is absolutely necessary.

"This bill goes one step further. It says ... don't bother to belong to this system and live within a fair fee schedule. We'll reimburse you anyway.

"Now the issue of specialists being outside of that system is a problem. There is no doubt about it. But this bill is not the solution for that because this moves us away from attempts at managed care, back into the world of the laissez-faire, fee-for-service approach. And frankly, we know that there are members of the profession who hold that image very dearly. When they got the avocation to become physicians, that image was of an individual entrepreneur -- a small business person who would go out and hang up their shingle and provide health care. That fee-for-service, independent image is very much cherished by a portion of the medical profession, and I am sympathetic with those who see a world changing faster than they want to change. But I am not so sympathetic as to say that we should impose a new law which will penalize the larger portion of consumers.

"Hawaii has from a third to a half less cost for health insurance because so many people are covered and because we do this, more or less, collectively, and because we have managed care that is growing every day. The trend on the mainland is to grow towards collaborative managed care system.

"Now, there are many who are critical of managed care, who don't want to see this happen, but I would say to you that the cost for the consumer, for the average primary care service, is best preserved under a fee schedule when collective groups negotiate on behalf of consumers. If you go out and you want to buy your health insurance as an individual, go right ahead today, but you will pay, and pay big bucks. This moves us slightly more in that direction. I have great fear that although it is intended to help those situations where specialists are outside the fold and you're paying one hundred percent, although it is intended for that, the real impact is going to be to remove the incentive of doctors to be under the fee schedule and, therefore, prices will drift up and you will pay more, especially in rural areas or in pocket markets where a primary care physician can say ... you gotta come to me anyway, why bother participating under this fee schedule. I'll give my HMSA or whatever reimbursement and charge that much more. It's already bad enough for those who have to pay twenty percent. It's already bad enough. I would say that we should have channeled our efforts into finding ways to help pay for the specialists, or bring them under the fold, rather than insist that the consumer go to more physicians who are not under the fee schedule.

"That's the problem with this bill and, I think, in discussions I've had with the Chair, that he has problems with managed care and this is moving or holding back from it, and I am admittedly much more of an enthusiastic supporter of those kinds of arrangement. But as the Health Department said, and as the Committee Report failed to reflect, this bill is counterproductive to the development and operation of managed care plan. I ask you ... are you really confident that going back to the world of fee for service, that not being under a controlled fee structure is best for your constituents? I don't think we can say that with confidence, and I think the issue of those specialists who are non-participating has to be addressed in different ways, but not to pass a law that spreads across all specialties, all primary care, all circumstances -- all circumstances. . .

At this point, the Chair interrupted and advised Representative Shon, "you have exceeded your time," whereupon Representative Pepper yielded his ten minutes to Representative Shon.

Representative Shon thanked the Chair and continued his remarks, saying:

"This applies to every circumstance and it says to doctors ... the kinds of arrangements that you have agreed to participate in before with a limited amount of income from each service, that we are going to remove that ceiling. We're removing the ceiling on health care costs, and let's not kid ourselves. It is the rapidly escalating health care costs that are driving health reform nationally and in Hawaii as well. Even Hawaii is getting too expensive -- even Hawaii! And we're not where the mainland is right now. This bill is a step back.

"For these reasons, I think we should refrain from endorsing the removal of the ceiling for the cost of health care, and we should try different methods to try to bring those specialists into the fold rather than suggesting that the entire system of collective negotiation for health care should be allowed to collapse.

"Thank you."

Representative Alcon then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I had a bad experience going to a doctor, and he had no sign in his office that said that he is not a participant for any medical plan.

"As you know, Mr. Speaker, I participate with Medicare and also HMSA, and all the previous doctors that I had gone to did not charge me for additional charges because they were participants of those plans. But this particular doctor, after having the Medicare and the HMSA plan reimburse him for his services, billed me for added services. I don't know whether it was added services, but added fee, Mr. Speaker.

"Now, this bill would say that it is a right of choice. I don't think it was because I didn't choose to go to that doctor because of the fact that he is a doctor, and I thought he was my friend too, but, you know, when it came to the fee, he and I parted company.

"Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I am voting against this bill because of my traumatic experience."

Representative Bunda then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Just to clarify what the other speaker had said that ... yes, the Department of Health was in opposition to this

measure; however, the Committee Report stated that which was taken from their testimony, that they strongly supported the rights of choice. I would like to make that very clear.

"This bill is about choice, Mr. Speaker. It will ensure the right to choose the physician who will treat your loved one when he or she is ill in a fee for service health plan.

"Do we really need this bill?

"This bill codifies the current practice of HMSA ... the practice of free choice in selecting a physician for its participants. This is in both sections of the bill. But this freedom of choice is eroding.

"Consumers are not aware of this erosion of their ability to select the doctor of their choice. HMSA is currently using preferred provider lists to 'control' the consumer's selection of his or her doctor.

"This is in part the trend in the health care industry today for cost containment. It is causing health care insurers, like HMSA, to move toward limiting choice of doctors with controlled panels. In other words, HMSA is 'cherry-picking' their doctors on its preferred provider lists.

"Mr. Speaker, this is not fair to the public!

"Currently, if a consumer chooses a doctor not on the controlled panel lists, then he or she pays more money out of their own pocket. This is the choice they can make today and have been making.

"Some of the members have expressed concern that this bill will increase health care costs. Mr. Speaker, with or without this bill, health care costs will increase and are increasing. This is not a secret. We all know this.

"This bill helps to assure that consumers will continue to have the freedom to choose their doctors. Only if the doctors charge more will the consumers pay more. The bill provides that the consumers are to pay for this extra cost -- for this freedom to choose.

"This bill keeps HMSA's panel of doctors from becoming 'exclusive clubs' comparable to the 'closed panels' of doctors in health care maintenance organizations such as Kaiser.

"Consumers have the impression that they do have a choice of physicians from fee-for-service plans. They are not aware of this trend by HMSA toward 'controlling' the panel of doctors from which they are to select from. This bill protects the freedom of choice that these consumers believe they already have, or they would have chosen Kaiser or other HMO's.

"This bill also, Mr. Speaker, ensures that the consumers are getting what they believe is free choice in their fee-for-service health plans.

"Mr. Speaker, just as eternal vigilance is the cost of liberty, so, too, there is a cost for the freedom to choose.

"I ask all of the members to vote 'yes' on this measure.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"I just want to explain my vote against the measure.

"I sympathize with those who feel the changes that are coming about in the health care field, and these changes

are pretty severe for people who are affected individually. For all of us, what is most important is how we react and how we relate to these changes.

"I would just like to point out that even HMSA is evolving. Not only HMSA is evolving to a health maintenance organization, but you have an old, established specialty clinic like Straub Hospital and Clinic that is now going into transformation to a health maintenance organization. The Honolulu Medical Group has also given up its autonomy, its freedom, by becoming part of HMSA's network.

"We face a very difficult period in not only health care as an industry, but in our personal health care makeup. It's going to be very difficult for us, and the bill itself does not accord with developments in the economy of either the State in general, or of the health care industry in particular.

"There is no mistake about it. The changes will affect all of us, and I cast my vote with a measure of sadness because in my youth, the traditional fee-for-service and the family doctor were the norm for all of us, and now we are in a larger context, in a larger industrialized or organized society, that permits a different kind of decision-making, one that borders, as the previous speaker says, between choice and not having that choice. It's very sad, but I think that in retrospect, if we look at life in general, change is inevitable and will come about with or without whatever legislation we do.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pepper then rose to speak "in strong opposition" to the bill, stating:

"Most of the reasons for voting against this bill have been expressed very articulately by other speakers. I simply want to point out that it is true that health care costs will continue to escalate. Health care costs will continue to eat up the profits of small business; health care costs will continue to be a problem for the State Health Fund.

"But what we hope to accomplish over the next few years is simply to bring the escalation of health care costs, the rate of health care cost increase, down to something near the consumer price increase. That's about all we can hope to accomplish over the next few years, and we're going to try to do this in a variety of ways.

"The Health Quest represents an attempt to do this managed care system, preferred provider organizations represent an attempt to do this, if we are not able to bring health care costs down. It is going to absolutely and completely destroy our economy over the next few years.

"This bill would make it harder for us to try to achieve those rather minimal goals and, therefore, I am in strong opposition.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Duldulao then rose and stated:

"I would just like to briefly explain my no vote on House Bill 3274.

"The purpose of this bill is to require health insurance providers to permit their insureds to use the services of outside physicians, provided that the insureds pay the increases in cost, if any.

"The problem with this, Mr. Speaker, is ... who will control this cost? Nobody.

"Number two, the concern that I have is that, according to the Committee Report, it was noted that a study by our Auditor is required. That's true. Before we can mandate anything, we need a cost or assessment study from the Legislative Auditor.

"To me, Mr. Speaker, I feel that this bill is a bill from the specialized doctors and, therefore, with all of those concerns that I have, I am voting no.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 3274, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH INSURANCE PROVIDERS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 32 ayes to 19 noes, with Representatives Alcon, Arakaki, Beirne, Chun, Duldulao, Hagino, Hiraki, Hirono, D. Ige, Isbell, Lee, Nekoba, Pepper, Santiago, Shon, Takumi, Tam, Taniguchi and Tanimoto voting no.

H.B. No. 3213:

Representative Ihara moved that H.B. No. 3213, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Tam rose and requested a conflict ruling, saying that he is a part-time travel agent, and the Chair ruled "no conflict."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 3213, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRAVEL AGENCIES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 3017:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, H.B. No. 3017, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NO-FAULT INSURANCE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 2599, HD 1:

Representative Ihara moved that H.B. No. 2599, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Herkes rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, most utilities are one-way service -- electricity, cable, water, and fortunately sewer. Telephone is the only one that provides two-way service.

"This is important for the rural districts of our State. It is a health and safety issue for single mothers, the elderly, people at risk.

"There are alternatives to most utilities, or alternatives to electricity. There are alternatives to municipal water. There are alternatives to municipal sewer, but there are no reasonable alternatives to telecommunication.

"Many people in the rural areas of our State are on party lines or no service at all. The existing utility has given us a variety of reasons that they cannot provide service to some of these areas, and they were so compelling in their arguments, I thought they were actually testifying in favor of the bill.

"There are companies that service rural areas in this nation. Alaska has 23 different telecommunication companies. They have been in contact with me since this bill was serviced. The state of Washington has 12 different companies, many of whom service the rural areas. The state of Nebraska. We're probably the only state that has singular telephone service.

"Under Section 269-16.9, the PUC can determine that an area is underserved, but then it is the rural area or the small telephone company against the might of the utility to prove its case, and that is just not a balanced fight.

"What House Bill 2599 does is it levels the playing field just a little bit and it kind of puts the word 'public' back into the Public Utilities Commission, and it requires the existing utility company to show cause as to why they should not be replaced. And then it is in the wisdom of the PUC to see if the alternative providers can provide these rural areas with some service.

"This bill merely levels the playing field. It gives these rural areas an opportunity to gain access to telecommunication service.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2599, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TELEPHONE SERVICE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 2238, HD 1:

Representative Ihara moved that H.B. No. 2238, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Bainum rose to speak in favor of the bill, "with major reservations," stating:

"Mr. Speaker, what this bill would do is expand the scope of naturopathic practice, particularly in regards to prescription privileges and natural medicine.

"Mr. Speaker, with the tight budget this year, we don't have that many folks coming up here for money, but we do have an item that is much sought after, and it's this thing right here -- prescription pads -- and for good reason. It's a very powerful weapon -- a weapon against diseases, and it can do much good but in the wrong hands, unfortunately, it can do much bad.

"This bill, Mr. Speaker, is much improved from the one we heard in Committee. It has been narrowed in scope, but it still is too broad in language. As this bill moves forward, I plan to monitor this bill very closely, and I hope that we can tighten up the language. If not, Mr. Speaker, we should then look very carefully at defeating this measure.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2238, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NATUROPATHY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Cachola, Kanoho, Marumoto, Menor and White voting no.

H.B. No. 3602, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, H.B. No. 3602, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO

GOVERNMENTAL ASSISTANCE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, H.B. No. 3024, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LIQUOR TAX," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, H.B. No. 2590, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE BONDS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 2284:

Representative Ihara moved that H.B. No. 2284, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Suzuki rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"This bill is not a criticism of State government. Rather, this bill would encourage State agencies to explore other avenues such as the private sector in order to fulfill its mandate of serving the public interest.

"Presently, there does not exist any provision in the Hawaii Revised Statutes which would require State agencies to justify expansion. House Bill 2284 would amend these sections by requiring State agencies to demonstrate why any proposed expansion or new program is a necessary function of State government through a justification statement. And if justified, that the State agencies further demonstrate that such changes cannot otherwise be implemented by the private sector at a lower overall cost to government. Only if these two important conditions are satisfied can we then proceed to responsibly and with a greater commitment, find the resources to fund these additional governmental programs.

"The concept of privatization must move out of the realm of 'theory' and become a practical reality. In addition, because society's needs continuously change with technology and attitudes, we must continuously examine whether government-provided service is needed or justified. We can no longer afford to ignore sensible and obvious alternatives to current governmental budget woes. Fiscal prudence makes it imperative for the State to be required to explore other avenues such as privatization, which also includes purchase of service, in order to maximize the State's resources.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stegmaier then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Along with the workers' compensation reform bill passed earlier today, this bill represents yet another legislative action to be more resourceful, to be more efficient, and to entertain whatever approach to providing services would work the best.

"I want to express my appreciation for the collaborative support on the part of traditionally divergent interests

which has been displayed concerning this bill. I would suggest that such a display of cooperation augurs well for our ability to resolve the difficult societal issues which will challenge us in the future.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Ward then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"This measure, by its title, is provocative in and of itself. It says State programs are prohibited if privatization is feasible.

"Mr. Speaker, the issue is choice and we are reminded that Henry Ford said, 'Maltese comes in any color as long as it's black.' Heretofore, privatization came in any color in Hawaii as long as it was in the private sector. This bill says ... let's examine that. Let's see if it's possible to put it into the public sector.

"Mr. Speaker, I can't speak for my colleagues but I know a number of us in the Minority Caucus are behind this. I know a lot of people here in the Small Business Caucus are behind it. It's a chance to get a new framework, a new methodological perspective, on the direction of government. The public is behind it, and as a symbol of that a survey was conducted by the National Federation of Independent Business. They found that 90 percent of the people voted to hold down government, or to not expand or create new programs, and by doing so keep taxes at a minimum because everytime there's a new government program, inevitably, taxes occur. This is exactly what House Bill 2284 is attempting to do and, Mr. Speaker, we applaud that and celebrate it.

"With this bill, privatization can be started as soon as possible and, quite frankly, Hawaii is right down near the bottom of all the states in even experimenting or conceptualizing privatization programs. This puts us back in the race. It gives us a chance at looking at better government.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen rose and stated:

"I would like to applaud the Representative who introduced this bill. I think it is an excellent measure. As a member of the Legislature's Small Business Caucus, I am speaking in strong support, Mr. Speaker, of this bill relating to privatization.

"The concept of privatization is moved out of the realm of ideology into the practical and today, Mr. Speaker, we again move to move Hawaii into the practical realm of privatizing whatever we can in our government. If there ever was an idea whose time has come, it is privatization. Government payrolls have grown out of control, far in excess of the State's population growth. Taxes have grown ... we all know that; our constituents know that, and government services suffer from lack of funds. Privatization is a tool, and it's a tool which will help to reform government. I'm glad that we are adding to Hawaii's toolbox.

"I thank all of those who have participated in this and those members of the Small Business Caucus. It's very exciting, Mr. Speaker, to see these small steps toward positive change.

"Thank you."

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I wish to echo the support of my Republican colleagues and speak also as a member of the Small Business Caucus on House Bill 2284 -- privatization.

"Although it has taken the Legislature a while to get to today, meaning passing legislation which says privatize first, we have been practicing privatization in Hawaii for a number of years. Mr. Speaker, the millions of dollars we invest annually in purchase of service is privatization, and this purchase of service continues to be successful. These many private social service agencies and consultants save the taxpayers' money and provides quality service to the very needy people in our community

"Thank you."

Representative Apo then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in strong support of the bill with only one reservation, and that is, it is not retroactive to 1959.

"Thank you."

Representative Tanimoto then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is a pro-small business bill and the bonus effect is that we can improve government efficiency and probably reduce costs. But even more than that, ever since I got involved with government, I have been an advocate for privatization. Following my previous speakers, we do have privatization in government, but this really allows us to then really look at the areas in which we can do privatization.

"And the most encouraging thing about this bill, absolutely encouraging, as I stated earlier, we shouldn't look at privatization as an anti-union mechanism and that it's really a pleasure to see many of the labor unions coming along to support this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2284, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PRIVATIZATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 3369:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, H.B. No. 3369, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MERCHANT BANKING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2590, 2284 and 3369 had passed Third Reading at 3:18 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 1258, HD 1:

Representative Tom rose and requested a conflict ruling, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, before I make my motion regarding House Bill 1258, House Draft 1, I would like a ruling from the Chair on a possible conflict based on the following circumstances.

"Mr. Speaker, I have been a practicing attorney since 1973. In my practice, I have represented numerous clients, Mr. Speaker -- lessors, lessees, drunk drivers, misdemeanors, people seeking divorces, and the list goes

on and on. As a legislator and as Chair of the House Judiciary Committee, I must consider and act upon various and sundry issues for the purposes of legislation which are of general application.

"In the past several days, allegations of conflict of interest and attacks upon my integrity have been made with respect to the performance of my duties as a legislator. Upon these set of circumstances, Mr. Speaker, am I in conflict in taking any action on this bill?"

The Chair ruled "no conflict."

Representative Tom then moved to recommit House Bill 1258, House Draft 1, relating to eminent domain, to the House Judiciary Committee, seconded by Representative Menor.

Representative Thielen rose and stated:

"I would like to say ... today, I am standing in firm support of recommitting, killing this bill. There was my colleague across the aisle who made an allegation that I was speaking from a 'communist perspective.' I was speaking for democracy, Mr. Speaker, for the democratic process, for full disclosure of what we are going to consider in this House of Representatives, and for fair play to those people that could be affected by the measures.

"I think the only correct thing to do is to recommit or kill this bill, and I certainly will vote in favor of the motion.

"Thank you."

Representative Amaral then rose to speak against the motion, stating:

"I think that if some of us had some problems with respect to House Bill 1258, then we could make our point here on the floor. We could talk about the process; we could talk about the contents of this bill. I actually, as one member on this floor, resent terribly that the discussion on the merits of the bill are not what is before us and are not what's moving us to recommit this bill, but actually who we do business with.

"I think all of us, as legislators, should be very fearful if we are put into the position where we have to look closely at how we gain our revenue outside of this place before we can bring measures on this floor, and be bullied and pushed into recommitting a piece of legislation, not on its merits, but on how it is we make our money. Clearly, I heard you, Mr. Speaker, say there was no conflict of interest here. Clearly, I believe there is no conflict of interest. And I think it's a sad day when this bill gets set aside by the bullying tactics of a small handful of people.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose on a point of information and asked:

"Discerning the terminology of recommitting and killing, as the media reported yesterday, I would like to be clear that if this bill is going to come back out, I would like to say something. If it is going back and staying in committee, I will let it rest."

The Chair answered:

"Representative, when you recommit bills, you recommit it to the original committee. That goes back to the Committee on Judiciary."

Representative Ward asked:

"But is there time for that to be heard by the public?"

The Chair answered:

"That's the choice that you have to make, Representative. You have to figure it out yourself."

Representative Ward responded:

"Having said that, Mr. Speaker, I would exercise to speak for this measure to recommit it then.

"As we stand before the cameras, what the last Representative said, I would hope, as we institutionalize public accessibility to everything that we do publicly or privately, we will not be fearful of in that someone might discover it. Democracy is an open process. It has to be maintained open. Whether there's a misinterpretation of it, that is in the eyes of the beholder. However, to fear that we are going to be discovered, I think is a misconception of what we are as representatives of the people.

"Having said that, Mr. Speaker, if this bill does come back out, I think those for, or whatever intimidating groups, are going to become more numerous because the whole State of Hawaii is watching us when we do not do things openly, when we do things covertly, when we do things under the table, when we do things shortcutting the process of allowing the people to participate, that's where this thing is going to grow bigger and bigger. That's why I'd rather say ... let's get it over with and put it behind us rather than let this thing carry on.

"Thank you."

Representative Amaral, in rebuttal, stated:

"Just by way of rebuttal that when this does come up for discussion again, then those on the opposite side will become numerous, and we will be here also."

Representative Hirono then rose to speak in favor of the recommitment, stating:

"This is a bill that we all know affects lessors and lessees -- two groups that have been diametrically opposed to each other for so many years. I personally have been working on these issues for over a decade as has Representative Peters, and while we had different opinions on this issue, we certainly gave each other the respect and accord that is warranted in a discussion that affects so many people. It is for that reason that when we discuss these types of issues, we have to bend over backwards to accord both sides a fair opportunity to be heard. That did not happen in this case.

"I fully expect that should this have come up in a way that both sides would have had notice that, yes, there would have been hundreds of people coming out and testifying on either side, but that is the process. That is what we should have followed.

"Thank you."

Representative Peters then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak with a great deal of reservations regarding the recommitment of this measure. It's unfortunate that it can't take its normal course. There were some rather disparaging remarks made on Friday relative to this process, and the way in which this measure was presented to all of us and is before us today.

"Democracy is not a myopic perspective. The representative form of government -- the truly representative form of government -- has built-in conflicts and we have to recognize and understand that, that it is not fair to have, as an example, only employees' perspective be represented on this floor without the employer's perspective being represented. Representative Ward, I am sure, would concur with that.

"The same is true with respect to leasehold. It's not fair to have only the lessees' perspective be represented on this floor and not the lessor's perspective. You know, Mr. Speaker, there were some really harsh remarks being made about the way in which this bill was amended -- in the open, in public hearings -- and the measure was all-inclusive, relating to eminent domain.

"Some of the 'bleeding hearts' on this measure, on the floor, should be reminded that this morning we amended House Bill No. 3106, House Draft 3. Was there a public announcement? Was there a public hearing? All I'm saying is, you know, if we're going to be consistent and fair, then have it applicable all the way around. You can't have your cake and eat it, too. Okay? Representative Tom and others have been subject to a great deal of pressure -- character assassination, if you will. We can't allow ourselves, as Representative Amaral so aptly put it, to be pressured by these groups who intend to be unfair.

"This is a fair bill. This bill also helps lessees. Think about it! In situations in which government uses its awesome power of eminent domain to condemn a leasehold for, as an example, a park or highway. . .

At this point, the Chair interrupted and asked Representative Peters to "please speak on the merits of the recommitment."

Representative Peters thanked the Chair and continued, saying:

"Mr. Speaker, part and parcel of that motion is this measure. It was characterized as an anti-lessee bill. I take exception to that. It's a lessee bill, too. In situations when a leasehold is condemned -- and a leasehold, as all of you know, is a contract between a lessee and a lessor. If that is being condemned and the interest of the lessee and the interest of the lessor is being taken for say, a park or road, the lessee joins in partnership with the lessor in fighting a tyrannistic government that does not want to give a fair market value for that taking. Don't be myopic in scrutinizing this bill because it is applicable in many, many different areas.

"Mr. Speaker, regarding the issue of conflict, I know a few years ago, Councilman John Henry Felix used the power of government to take our lands from us in Kahala. We were forced to sell to him that parcel of land for \$258,000. He immediately turned around and sold it for \$3.2-million, and he considered leasehold such an evil device that he used the proceeds from that sale to buy another leasehold. Where was Common Cause in that observation? Where was the media in that observation?

"Again, they've become myopic and fashion their observations only to suit their own purposes. Did you ever ask the question ... who was to benefit from leasehold condemnation? Who do you think lives in Kahala? The common laymen? They make millions on the backs of Hawaiians.

"We talked about the media. This Sunday, they characterized the getting together of Hawaiians in support of Bishop Estate/Kamehameha Schools on this whole issue

of taking of Hawaiian lands. The Hawaiians were united and they called the press in. And how did the media characterize that get-together and that unity? They called it 'divisive.' You steal from Hawaiians but that's not divisive. I want you folks to know that Hawaiians, like any other ethnic group, has the right to agree and disagree. We're no different than any other ethnic group. I remember certain comments being made about ... you Hawaiians can't get together on this and can't get together on that. And all of a sudden, when we decide to get together and unify against the stealing of Hawaiian lands, the media characterizes it as divisive. . .

At this point, the Chair interrupted and asked Representative Peters to "please speak on the merits or demerits of the recommitment."

Representative Peters thanked the Chair and continued:

"I am trying to.

"This bill is a fair bill and it grieves me that we have to recommit it. It is a fair bill. It doesn't take a rocket scientist to figure that out. Just read the measure -- just read it!

"Common Cause. Media. Yes, you are nervous. Yes, you are concerned, that Hawaiians are unified on this issue and I can understand you calling it 'divisive.' You should be afraid -- you should be afraid -- because we will not yield. Not when it comes to stealing Hawaiian lands. You steal our souls, and guess what? You probably reformed aloha. You converted aloha to your pocketbook. Don't ever talk to me about aloha. You don't even know the meaning."

Representative Apo then rose to speak against the motion to recommit, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, it's unfortunate that the whole issue of leasehold, of which this bill is a part in a larger context, has been characterized as a Bishop Estate/Bishop lessees' issue.

"I'm voting against the recommitment, Mr. Speaker, because I wish to guard, one of these days, the media and Common Cause who talk to the numbers of Hawaiians -- small landowners -- who can lose their land. There are several that are in the process of condemnation or at least the process has begun where absentee owners are beginning to file against the small landowners.

"So it's unfortunate that for these past few years, it's always been a Bishop Estate issue, and I say it's not a Bishop Estate issue. It's unbelievable to me and, as you know, Mr. Speaker, I very seldom ever spoke out, but I am just really tired that we move from the age of adverse possession, which was stealing, to the age of leasehold conversion. And so the rape and the stealing continues against the Hawaiians.

"Mahalo."

"At 3:36 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 3:39 o'clock p.m.

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I will cast a 'no' vote against the recommitment of the measure before us. I would like to explain very briefly that I do so, not because it's a Hawaiian issue, or a Bishop Estate issue, but because many landowners are non-Hawaiian, including Chinese,

Japanese and others. It is a property issue, and the title of the bill is, 'Eminent Domain Proceedings.' Therefore, I'll cast a 'no' vote on this measure.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair then stated:

"I wish to let the members know that the Chair has been very liberal in letting the discussion move on. However, you don't speak on the main motion at all, henceforth the Chair will not allow you to speak on the main motion, only on the motion on the recommittal back to the major Committee."

Representative Marumoto then rose on a point of personal privilege, stating:

"I feel personally aggrieved here on the floor today. One of the speakers had referred to people in Kahala who had taken advantage of converting to fee on the backs of the Hawaiian people. Since Kahala is in my district and the residents there are my constituents, I feel compelled to somehow come to their defense. . .

The Chair interrupted and stated:

"You have stated your predicament and it's so noted, Representative Marumoto."

Representative Marumoto thanked the Chair.

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to refocus on the motion that is before us.

"We are not debating the merits or demerits of the Land Reform Act; we are not speaking about conflicts of interest. What we are speaking about is whether or not this matter should be recommitted to the Committee. The matter should be recommitted to the Committee, Mr. Speaker, because that action will speak out loudly and strongly in favor of open government and democracy.

"Mr. Speaker, had this matter been fairly noticed, had the lessees been as informed as the Bishop Estate's attorney was informed, then we would have filled the Mabel Smyth Auditorium, Mr. Speaker.

"So the issue before us is democracy -- a fair hearing for both sides. I applaud the recommittal, and I stand in strong support of the recommittal. The testimony that is available to every member on what was before us in that Committee is from the Bishop Estate attorney, City and County Parks Department, City and County Public Works, and the Department of Land and Natural Resources. No one else. So no one on the other side had notice, and that is not democratic.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The following representatives then rose to cast their 'no' votes: Representative Kanoho, Representative Bunda, Representative Beirne, Representative Alcon, Representative Ishii-Morikami, Representative Chang and Representative Herkes.

Representative Tajiri then rose to speak against the motion to recommit, stating:

"You know, I'm just sitting here listening to all this rhetoric that's going on and I find something very amusing. We all forget that we are serving in a representative democracy.

"Some would like us to believe that we've got to answer to all of the people all of the time, and that is the biggest fallacy that is being perpetuated in the State of Hawaii by the media. Let me say that again. . .

At this point, the Chair interrupted and said:

"Representative, I'm going to have to call for the vote right away. You need to speak on the recommittal and only on the recommittal."

Representative Tajiri continued, saying:

"I am speaking on the recommittal process and the recommittal, Mr. Speaker. But, as has been mentioned, this recommittal is basically based on the fact or the assumption that there was not enough information given prior to the motion being taken previously, and I am suggesting ... if that is the case, then we can disband ourselves because with the electronic media, there is no need for us to be here as a representative form of government. Think about that.

"I am urging all of you to vote against this motion. This is a ridiculous situation that we've put ourselves in. We're taking ourselves from the process and in doing so, asking for a recommittal.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Nakasone then rose to cast his 'no' vote.

At 3:45 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 4:20 o'clock p.m.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1258, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMINENT DOMAIN," was recommitted to the Committee on Judiciary, with Representatives Alcon, Amaral, Apo, Beirne, Bunda, Chang, Herkes, Ishii-Morikami, Kanoho, Lee, Nakasone and Tajiri voting no.

H.B. No. 2928, HD 1:

Representative Ihara moved that H.B. No. 2928, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Tam rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, I stand before you to vote in favor, very strongly, on House Bill 2928, HD 1.

"First of all, I would like to thank the Judiciary Chairman and his Committee members for having such a fine bill come out of the Committee in regards to fireworks regulation.

"This bill, by the way, bans aerial fireworks statewide rather than interfere, in terms of the culture and heritage of the Chinese community, whereby we in the Chinese community use firecrackers to celebrate our various cultural events.

"Also, a real problem, I understand, in working with the City Council also is really in terms of fires due to aerial fireworks, not firecrackers, whereby I experienced that for myself. One day, I went up on the roof of my house and I found the remains of an aerial firework on the house, and it was pretty scary.

"Thank you very much for the support."

Representative Duldulao then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I would like to begin by saying 'thank you' to our Judiciary Chairperson, Representative Tom, for seeing the light. Terry, I know you've seen the light in my bill.

"I feel, as a public servant serving my community, I feel that my obligation is also extended to look at statewide issues and that this fireworks bill is a statewide firework bill.

"Again, I thank and I commend the Chair of the Judiciary Committee in seeing the light of this bill and spreading the light to all the different parts of the State.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2928, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIREWORKS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 3167, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, H.B. No. 3167, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII CIVIL RIGHTS COMMISSION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 3651, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, H.B. No. 3651, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRUSTS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 3303, HD 1:

Representative Ihara moved that H.B. No. 3303, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Bunda rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Bunda's remarks are as follows:

"This bill provides a legal remedy to consumers who purchase used motor vehicles that turn out to be 'lemons.' For almost a decade, Hawaii has had a new motor vehicle lemon law to provide consumers with recourse when their vehicle sustains defects which are covered by the manufacturer's express warranty. However, it does not provide protection when the manufacturer's warranty is not operational.

"I'm sure that we have all heard stories of people who buy used cars only to have them break down repeatedly. It is, believe me I had one breakdown, and it is an extremely frustrating experience. This is especially true when a consumer is told that they have no legal recourse since the vehicle was purchased 'as is' from a dealer.

"At the House hearing on this bill, a consumer testified that he did not even make it home from the dealership before the used car he purchased died on him. The Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs testified that this is hardly an isolated occurrence.

"This bill provides for specific rights to used car buyers. It requires dealers to give consumers a written

warranty when they buy a used car, covering the essential parts of the car. The duration of the warranty will depend upon the number of miles on the car at the time of purchase.

"Several other states, such as Connecticut, District of Columbia, Massachusetts, Minnesota and New York, have enacted similar legislation over the past few years. The used car lemon laws enacted in other states generally create a warranty of at least thirty days on specified parts. Like Hawaii's new car lemon law, the used car lemon law specifies the criteria for the car to become a lemon.

"Hawaii's progressive new car lemon law provides consumers with legal remedies and an arbitration program which serves as a forum to address consumers' complaints with manufacturers. Similarly, the Used Car Lemon Law will provide a legal remedy for consumers who buy used cars that turn out to be lemons by requiring used car dealers to provide basic warranty coverage for qualifying used cars sold to Hawaii buyers.

"Mr. Speaker, I urge all my colleagues to vote aye on this pro-consumer measure.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 3303, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO USED MOTOR VEHICLES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 2279:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, H.B. No. 2279, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COASTAL ZONE MANAGEMENT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 3258, HD 1:

Representative Ihara moved that H.B. No. 3258, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Tam rose and requested a conflict ruling, saying that he is a part-time life insurance salesman for Metropolitan Life, and the Chair ruled "no conflict."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 3258, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INSURANCE, ANNUITIES AND SECURITIES ACTIVITIES OF BANKS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Hirono, Menor, Takumi and Tam voting no.

H.B. No. 2464, HD 1:

Representative Ihara moved that H.B. No. 2464, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Kanoho rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and fellow members, this bill represents the continuing efforts to improve the State's purchase of service subsidy and grant-in-aid process which is embodied in Chapter 42D.

"We have come a long way, a very long way, from those days three to four years ago when this Legislature

scrutinized each of the many hundreds of purchase of service and grant-in-aid requests and determined the level of funding for each program. It was a most difficult, time-consuming and agonizing task, as you well know, Mr. Speaker, because we were all so heavily lobbied by each and every provider, not once, but several times throughout a legislative session.

"That was bad enough, but the real problem, however, lay in the fact that as individual legislators, we did not have the resources nor the capability to really evaluate any of these requests, nor could we evaluate the performance of the providers in meeting stated goals. It was really impossible for us in the Legislature to determine the appropriate level of funding between providers in each program area, let alone determine funding levels between various major program areas.

"The end result was that as much as we tried not to, the decisions for funding levels were too easily influenced by effective lobbying. Thanks to your foresight and persistence, Mr. Speaker, Act 335 was implemented through your personal efforts in 1991. As you well know, an unsuccessful attempt to do so in 1990 indicates that effecting such a change was not easily accomplished -- even for the then powerful Finance Chair.

"This bill reflects interim work by representatives of providers, consumers, State departments and agencies, and was further refined by an Ad Hoc House Finance Sub-committee which considered and incorporated expressed concerns, particularly from provider and consumer representatives.

"Primarily, this bill allows for five year contracts based on funding availability and appropriation by the Legislature which considers need. This and other amendments will make the POS/GIA process more efficient and cost-effective. Of equal significance, I believe that the important ingredient of trust and confidence has also been enhanced although there is still much apprehension which yet needs to be overcome.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker, Chairman Say, and members for making the POS/GIA process more manageable, and one that can also be administered more fairly.

"Thank you very much.

Representative Morihara then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, please have the Clerk note my support, with reservations, on this bill.

"Thank you."

The Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2464, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PURCHASE OF SERVICE CONTRACTS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Shon voting no.

Representative Tom for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 809-94) recommending that H.B. No. 2921, HD 1, pass Third Reading.

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2921, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Young then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Members, I can't imagine that there are many of you who haven't had a positive interaction with a horse sometime in your life ... perhaps as a child, riding a pony in a fair, perhaps at a rodeo, or polo game, or maybe even some of you owned your own horses, or perhaps you certainly saw the Clydesdale horses that brought great joy to you at many of the numerous events. Certainly, watching Hawaii's magnificent Pau riders whose fame has led to invitations to appear from all over the world brings us great pride -- they're Hawaii's own. These activities reflect the horse industry not familiar to many of us, but an industry feeling threatened by high insurance and frivolous lawsuits.

"At the first Committee hearing, there were over 400 letters of testimony in support of this measure, and I must say it was second only to a very notorious bill that was referred to the Judiciary Committee. The testimonies represented statewide support from horse and stable owners, horse haulers, and other people sharing an interest in horses. They simply want to stay in business and maintain their way of life.

"The bill would protect equine sponsors and professionals against groundless claims while making them responsible for wrongful conduct resulting in injury or death. Seventeen other states have already passed similar legislation, and in its current form, this bill provides more protection for the riders and participants than most of the other states.

"Members, I ask for your support on this bill.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2921, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EQUINE ACTIVITIES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3502, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A

STATEWIDE ARTS, CULTURAL ACTIVITIES, AND EVENTS DATABASE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 818-94) recommending that H.B. No. 3585, HD 1, pass Third Reading.

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3585, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Bunda rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Bunda's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, the issue in this measure is very emotional and controversial.

"This bill, however, provides guidance to the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) on factors to consider when deciding whether a public utility should be required to construct new high-voltage transmission lines underground or aboveground. The PUC, Division of Consumer Advocacy of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, and Hawaiian Electric Company and its subsidiaries are in support of this measure.

"The question before this Legislature is one of policy and priorities. Some members have expressed a desire to mandate the placement of utilities underground by statute. However, the costs for such a decision, for example, to underground all existing and currently proposed power lines on the island of Oahu has been estimated to increase a typical residential customer's electric bill by \$213 per month according to a study conducted in 1993 for the City's Planning Department.

"Although some may disagree, I believe that there are still many unanswered questions about the health impact of electric and magnetic fields (EMF) and that to mandate a policy of either the ratepayers or the taxpayers paying the additional costs of undergrounding is premature. This measure is a compromise at this time to permit the PUC to determine whether the lines shall be placed underground, while considering important public policy issues.

"These issues or factors referred to in the bill are:

- (1) Whether there is a benefit that outweighs the costs to place the electric transmission system underground -- benefits such as prudent avoidance for communities;
- (2) Whether there is a governmental public policy requiring the electric transmission system be placed underground and that there are funds committed for the additional costs -- such as federal or city requirements and funding;
- (3) Whether ratepayers consent to bear the cost for undergrounding;
- (4) Whether any governmental agency or other party such as developers are willing to pay for the additional costs of undergrounding; and
- (5) Any other relevant factors.

"It is believed that this measure balances the interests of consumers and the public in requiring undergrounding of lines where appropriate in spite of the high costs after a thorough consideration of these public policy guidelines by the PUC.

"Mr. Speaker, I urge all my colleagues to vote aye on this measure.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3585, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Thielen voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2990 and 2780 had passed Third Reading at 12:21 o'clock p.m.

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 2500, HD 1:

Representative Say moved that H.B. No. 2500, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Kawakami.

Representative Say rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, I would like to speak in favor of this measure just to convey a message to all of you that this particular budget reflects the signs of our economic times. The supplemental request of the House Finance Committee is about a total of \$3.5-million, and it is through your leadership and the leadership of the House that we have been creative in finalizing a supplemental budget request that does a lot for the people of the State of Hawaii.

"I am very proud to have a Vice Chair, Bertha Kawakami, to be working with because when the hard issues were made, I went to her and said ... what do you want to do -- up or down? And she always made the response for me.

"I would like to thank the members of the Finance Committee. It is the product of this budget that reflected the voices and input of the members of the Finance Committee.

"And last, but not least, I must also recognize the hardworking staff of the Finance Committee ... the three chiefs -- Dean Seki, our chief analyst; C.J. Leong, our chief researcher; and Rod Tanonaka, our new father, and the staff. (Representative Say asked all of them to stand to be recognized.)

"One final comment, Mr. Speaker and members of the House. This particular budget is just the beginning of a long and arduous journey. It now travels to the Senate where it will probably be revised, worked on, and also delete some of the positions that we take. But I must say that I'm very proud of what we have here this morning. I'm very proud that the position that we have taken reflects our conservative posture in looking towards the future.

"On behalf of the Finance Committee and myself, I would like to say 'thank you very much' for giving me the opportunity of developing a House position."

Representative Ward then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"I shall say three things, Mr. Speaker.

"One, as a freshman, this was the hardest vote that I made because I knew it was a very important one, but I had the least amount of information on the basis of which to make it. Having been a member of the Finance Committee of which I enjoy and I am very proud to be a part of, I know now that this is the most important vote, Mr. Speaker, but I still don't have a whole handle on that, so as I mention three things -- about the people on the budget, the process, and the priorities -- bear in mind that it's with a notion of improving what we have gone through and that we will go through in the future.

"Let me begin with the best first -- the people. The people who have stood, who was acknowledged -- Representative Say and his crew -- that's the best part of the whole budget, Mr. Speaker. The people who are behind it. The people who put up with the long hours, the hard work, and particularly, Mr. Speaker, I would commend this time the strategic thinking that went into the budget process. For example, we have milked the sacred cow. We have raided special funds to make sure the priorities in this State are being met this time.

"Secondly, we historically have pierced the veil of the warm-body policy. Heretofore, we would never touch that.

"Thirdly, we have generally held back increases even though there are a few people who are getting more than they should. We've generally held back pay increases -- very fiscally responsible. And we have also generally, in this case specifically, told government offices' rent personnel that we want to have a ten percent roll back or a ten percent decrease in the amount of money that the State is paying for rent.

"However, having said that, Mr. Speaker, we didn't keep with what you said from the podium on the first day of no new taxes. We've user-feed up the cost of living in Hawaii as of this budget, Mr. Speaker. We've added fees to such things as the water we drink, the water we flush, recording fees, and filing fees. We'll get an extra eight million dollars because of this, but these are monies that will not go into the general fund and then get reprioritized because they are going into special funds.

"The problem with this and the other budgets we've had over the past few years is that the budget is becoming a series of squirreled-away special funds in which we, as the Legislature, bound by the Constitution to administer, have no way of touching it. User fees and too numerous special funds are warnings to us in this budget, Mr. Speaker, and I say 'warning' advisedly because user fees and special funds are becoming the buzz words as substitutes for priorities for our fiscal responsibility. We are too frequently relying on the nexus between an activity and a fee rather than how does it fit into our policy. In other words, just because something is a special fund, it gets a priority rather than ... what is our policy? Where does education fit in? Where does transportation fit in? and so on.

"We have rather than creating policies that favor certain activities and then funding those activities by the normal budgeting process, we're setting up a myriad of special funds in a policy vacuum. And the departments are wise to this. If you notice the trend, every department's coming in for a special fund. They're saying ... well, raise this user fee and we can get more revenues but, by the way, we want you to stick it in this special fund. Therefore, there's really no net gain in terms of policy and priorities on this floor.

"The Legislative Auditor has warned us about this, the Tax Foundation has warned us about this, that too excessive special fund squirreling away works Representative Say, his Committee, this Legislature, out of a job. If everything we do in the budget is fixed because fees and allocations are already predetermined, as one person said ... we might just as well go home. We don't have to come back because the budget is already a done deal. Or that we've turned over our decision-making process to the Executive Branch in what constitutionally is this Legislature.

"The danger, Mr. Speaker, is that the user fee roll that we are on can lead to various dangerous conclusions. One of the places this can lead is to a Yugoslavia. This is where, if taxation simply becomes a matter of you pay for what you use and you keep what you don't use, this is like what Slovenia said to Macedonia ... you are not paying your full share, we're going to cut you off, and I'm not going into the history of Yugoslavia. But a lot of that was it. Some parts of the country were not pulling their weights and some parts, I know, are like Third World countries, in terms of the economic contribution to the State of Hawaii coffers. We are going to be penalizing if we take these user fees logic to the extreme. We will have districts fighting districts. We will have priorities of one area following another area, and it just won't work to the extreme that we've seen them in other places fail.

"My point, Mr. Speaker, in saying that is that we have to be led by priorities. Priorities mean that we know where we're going; we know what we're doing. If you look at this budget, you'll think it was a transportation budget. The majority of the pages are coming out of the Department of Transportation. It's not the majority in Education, it's not the majority in some of the areas that the budget script actually claims it is. We must get our priorities straight, Mr. Speaker. I admit that I have a conflict of interest because it's my bias that there shouldn't be a people mover at the airport, but that's in there. Renovation of the Capitol money is still in there. We've got things that just don't seem to go away. There's also money that should be in there -- the twenty million dollars that we gave back to the Department of Transportation, which I am not saying is going into the people mover and the bullet train at the airport. But the other day we passed a bill that said ... your five percent to the kitty of the general fund is not needed. Department of Transportation -- you can go away scot-free.

"Mr. Speaker, my last comments about the budget are about the process, and these are probably the more important, Mr. Speaker. I base my remarks humbly on the two years of my experience on the Finance Committee in trying to study the Finance Committee process.

"Mr. Speaker, first, the budget process is too secretive. Your Minority, for example, Mr. Speaker, has tried and has never seen the wages paid nor the number of employees this very House has in activity and in function. We've never found that out. Not knowing these things, we guess, we assume, we trust. When in the Finance Committee hearings, we never are given full data by the departments ... how much money do they have in this kind of fund or that kind of fund, how many employees are full-time/part-time, exempt, non-exempt part-time, exempt temporary employees. Mr. Speaker, we never find that out. It's like a cat/mouse game that if we don't ask the right question, they never give us the right answer. That's the process that's too secretive, too much of a dodging and weaving rather than straightforward logic ... let's see the numbers, let's see if it's a priority, let's see if it's open.

"My next point about the process, Mr. Speaker, and in the interest of time, I'm going to make it very brief, is that the Legislative Auditor has sent out the warning about numerous times having made the budget process work against us. Her latest report of December 19, 1993, for example, states that there is \$2.8-billion in a continuing appropriation's fund, and this goes back since 1981. I repeat -- \$2.8-billion sitting around, unused, since 1981. I ask you ... is this the best fiscal policy and fiscal process to follow? This was reported by Mr. Borreca in one of his articles. It's basically saying ... if these funds are there, why are they not being leveraged and better used rather than being squirreled away and being put into a rather passive process? And in comparison, this makes the Governor's announcement in his State-of-the-State that we have two hundred million dollars for school funds that are not used look like we're pikers. We've got \$2.8-billion. Two hundred million is small in comparison.

"Again, my point, Mr. Speaker, is that without priorities and a rational budget process, sound State policy is not possible, and I think that's what should be our driver. It's sound State policy. If we've got over two billion dollars floating through our construction project system, no wonder the temptation for corruption or inside dealing is there. The State's fiscal system should not be tantamount to favoritism, nor so tempting that it makes each department into its own profit center, hoarding its own money.

"Finally, Mr. Speaker, there's very little likelihood that this body and the taxpaying public will know if they've got their money's worth out of the budget process because there's no measure of effectiveness with any teeth that we have ever put into effect. We have yet to develop quantitative measures that tell us what we are doing is right or a program we are funding should be discontinued. When was the last time we have cut a program? When was the last time the department of government was cut because we measured its effectiveness?

"I'd like to use as my ideal the Department of Labor ex-offender program. The Department of Labor has evaluated the program that says ... if you're an ex-offender going through its program, sixteen percent of you will go back into prison. If you didn't go through the program, sixty-five percent of the people are caught again and go back to prison. This is a clear indication that we are getting our money's worth, Mr. Speaker."

At this point, the Chair interrupted and said, "Representative Ward, you've gone beyond your time," whereupon Representative Marumoto rose and yielded her ten minutes.

Representative Ward thanked the Chair and continued his remarks, stating:

"Again, Mr. Speaker, in conclusion, I applaud Chair Say, his staff, and the Finance Committee for a job well done. But it's within the archaic PPB system which shouldn't mean 'professionally processed baloney,' but it does often too much. It's something that came in process and in existence before Representative Nekoba was even born.

"Mr. Speaker, my point is ... we need to revise it. We've got good people running it. We need to prioritize, but we've got to re-energize the budget process the way that Representative D. Ige is trying to re-energize education, the way we're trying to make this a better place to live. We've got to look at the budget process, we've got to get our priorities. We've got to keep these good people in the system, and I thank you for this chance to speak on it.

"Thank you."

Representative Tam then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I wish to, at this time, thank Chairman Say, members of the Finance Committee, and also the Finance staff. I don't envy your job because I was once a budget analyst in the Ways and Means Committee -- long hours, and you don't get to see your family also.

"I wish to state very highly that I am in favor of this budget and speak on one issue with which I praise Chairman Say for doing. I speak on the elimination of the State Administration's management waste. I am in favor of eliminating deputy directors in the departments. The savings of these dollars is being used to provide more direct government service to the residents of Hawaii. In essence, we, as members of the House of Representatives, are showing that we are being more accountable in the use of taxpayers' dollars and demonstrating our independence from the Executive as per our role requires in the Constitution of the State of Hawaii. In other words, we are acting as the check-and-balance to that of the Administration.

"As time goes along during this legislative session, I am expecting more cuts in the Executive fat so that we, as legislators, can fund more direct services. An example of

existing Executive fleet which I have been speaking about for about a year or so is the State passenger vehicles. Members, we have over two thousand passenger vehicles -- over two thousand of them. We can eliminate two-thirds of them by giving mileage instead, and we can save on an annual basis, just on repair and maintenance alone, three million dollars. . .

At this point, Representative Okamura rose on a point of order and asked the Chair to "have the speaker keep his comments germane to the bill before us."

The Chair asked Representative Tam to "proceed."

Representative Tam thanked the Chair and continued, saying:

"I'm talking about the budget in terms of how we can provide more funds.

"Three million dollars can be saved from repair and maintenance of our State vehicles and we can put that money back into education, human services, health, and so forth. I'm going to push for that continuously and I hope that we all will push it.

"Finally, Mr. Speaker, I ask that the Governor help us out in taking this bold step to cut his Administrative waste of top management spending for you see, Mr. Speaker and colleagues, we could do it more if we had quarterly financial reports. But, unfortunately, the Administration doesn't want to give us that. I want to send a message to Governor Waihee that he should be more like former Governor George Ariyoshi and eliminate top management wasteful spending.

"Another thing I would try to push for also, and I know my colleagues want it too. We need forty-five million dollars to maintain our so-called systematic repair and maintenance system for the Department of Education. We have less than that. If we don't get that forty-five million dollars, our schools will be in bad disrepair. Governor, please help us find the dollars.

"Thank you."

Representative Chun then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I wanted to thank Chairman Say and Vice Chair Kawakami, the Finance members as well as staff. I think they made a very genuine effort to help in the area of social services.

"With regards to our present fiscal year, we're spending a little less than \$495-million of general funds, and in the proposed House version of the supplemental budget, we will be adding another \$30-million or more thereof for the funding of the general assistance Aid to Families With Dependent Children and foster care payments programs. This is to assure that the basic needs of our poorest families are met. I know it was very difficult to find this kind of money in a very fiscally austere year, and I really appreciate the efforts that have been made.

"I wanted to mention that Chairman Say was given some other information about some of the shortfalls in other social service programs and I know, at this time, we don't have the funds for these particular programs, but I did want to make the House members aware of some other areas that, hopefully over time, through negotiating with the Senate, we may be able to fund in part or in full.

"One of them is in the area of youth gang response system. We have a shortfall of about \$599,000.

"In the area of child care, we have a gap group of children that would benefit very greatly from child care experience and these are developmentally delayed children. At this time, there is no funding in our State budget that would actually speak to their needs because of federal restrictions.

"Also in the area of respite care for family members that need long-term care, there's also a need for more funding to help them, especially the families that are in crisis. They've been taking care of their loved ones for many, many years, and having to care for them twenty-four hours a day. So if there's any relief that we can give these families, they would be greatly appreciated.

"Also in the area of Child Protective Services, for a long time we have had difficulty in retaining social workers, and also handling the case load that continues to increase every year. Representative Santiago and Representative Isbell and others had met with the social workers themselves, and they're experiencing case loads of 80 to 90 cases per social worker where a case load of about 20 would be more appropriate for them to really give good attention to these families.

"The last point would be in the area of personal care and chore services where families want to take care of their loved ones but need just an added time to get some assistance outside the home for a little bit of time either to go shopping for the family members or to bathe them, or feed them while they're at work. This is another area of shortfall.

"With that, again I would like to thank Chairman Say and his Finance Committee and staff for a very admirable job in this area.

"Thank you."

Representative M. Ige then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, it's always difficult to speak against the budget.

"First, let me say that I feel badly because of the tremendous amount of energy and time the Finance Committee members spent crafting this measure, not to mention the countless hours of the Finance Committee staff. I'm sure they spent many days and nights to have brought this measure before us today. So to all of those who participated directly or indirectly in putting this budget together, let me extend my personal appreciation.

"Mr. Speaker, my concern is that this budget has too many priorities, trying to satisfy everyone in the short-term instead of making the necessary sacrifices so that we can satisfy everyone in the long-term. It is during uncertain economic times like these that require us to clearly define our goals and move ahead with a sense of purpose.

"This budget, as written, is like a ship leaving the harbor with no map, no direction, no final destination in mind -- destined to end up somewhere.

"I'm glad that the Committee Report identified our first priority as education, but I'm concerned that words like 'we will make every attempt' or 'do everything possible' is not good enough.

"If Hawaii's future is tied directly to the quality of education, then why not just say that we 'shall fund,' not 'make every attempt,' or that 'we have made it possible,' not 'we will try to do everything possible.'

"Anyone reading this budget must be able to feel and believe beyond a reasonable doubt, clear and convincing, what we have done is truly to make education our priority in this State.

"How? By our actions, not our words. By what is actually in the budget.

"We owe it to our future to go beyond words. Let's show them.

"Another priority outlined is the economy.

"I believe, for the benefit of all, we must diversify our economic base away from tourism, that tourism is not the only answer and yet, we again fund tourism activities.

"We have a unique opportunity before us.

"Never have Legislatures had so little to work with and, most significantly, never have the taxpayers truly believed that the State revenues generated is far less than what was expected.

"Now is the time to prioritize. Now is the time to chart our course.

"Last year, while I was in Washington, D.C., there was at least one violent death per day.

"A guest from California the other week stated, 'Hawaii is great compared to some parts of California.' Gangs and violence may not be out of control, but it's safe to say that it may be on the verge of it.

"Traveling across the State, I see more graffiti. I see more gang-related activity. I see more people waiting for food around Nimitz Highway. I see minority groups banding together; people passing out brochures asking tourists to leave our beaches; one group accusing others of stealing land. If we fail to provide the leadership now, what you see will only be the beginning.

"Is it too much to hope for us to use this budget as our beacon of direction? Our means of bringing people together to make the necessary sacrifices today for the benefit of all tomorrow?

"We must clearly define our goals and move ahead with a true sense of direction. Mr. Speaker, I hope the next budget will be like a ship leaving the harbor with a final destination in mind. A destination that defines our aspirations, our hopes, our dreams, who we are, and what we believe in. What those who came before us worked so hard for. What those of us in the present are working so hard for.

"Only then will we be the masters of our destiny, striving to achieve our preferred future.

"I know we have brain power; I know that we have the commitment; I know we have the love of these islands in our hearts. The only questions remain ... if not us, who? And if not now, when?

"Thank you."

Representative Alcon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is a good budget. It may not be the most perfect budget, Mr. Speaker, but with the resources that we have, this is what we can come out with.

"The process has been criticized a while ago. Let me just say that the person who criticized the process has done more input into this budget than anyone of us. Let me also say, Mr. Speaker, that the Chairman was open to all suggestions and if there was somebody who could offer some sources of new money, the Chairman of the Committee would have been very happy.

"Let me also say, Mr. Speaker, that the Chairman was gutsy enough to shift some funding from schools that do not need it now to schools that really needed the funds.

"We have not touched transportation, Mr. Speaker, because of the fact that they are special funds. But let me just also say that when we took out some money out of some special funds, the person that criticized this objected to it, and yet he tells us that we are not able to control some of the money.

"Let me also say, Mr. Speaker, that the use fee is not a tax. You don't have to use the facilities if you don't want to pay for it. If you use it, pay for it. I think that is very equitable.

"As Governor Burns has said, and let me paraphrase: Any damn fool can criticize.

"Thank you."

Representative Hagino then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I will be voting for the bill, but I would like to have the Journal reflect that some of the sentiments mentioned by Representative Marshall Ige are those of my own. (By reference only)

"Thank you."

Representative Young then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"The representative from the Windward District talked about a ship leaving the harbor. The ship has to have some fuel, and the goal of the Finance Committee is to develop a budget that brings State spending under control by providing essential services and meeting very important needs.

"The budget that the Committee developed is responsible, and it does look to the future by controlling the growth of government spending so that the State can live within its means now, and especially over the next few years.

I commend the Finance Committee for all their hard work, and the staff.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2500, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative M. Ige voting no, and Representative Suzuki being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 2500 had passed Third Reading at 12:53 o'clock p.m.

"However, I must say that even prior to her winning this pageant, Kalli had already established herself as a shining example of Hawaii's youth through her very impressive list of accomplishments; such as, numerous speech awards, membership in over ten school organizations in which she has held offices, such as President of the Laie 'Just Say No To Drugs.' Her volunteer work includes making gifts for the elderly through the National Junior Honor Society; she has participated in beach clean-ups; and she has done many other things, and she has done one of the things many of you know is one of my favorites -- she was a volunteer with Prevent Child Abuse Hawaii, and the list really goes on and on. It's very impressive. Through all of Kalli's great efforts, she has made many friends from all over the country, received a college scholarship, and earned the respect and praise of the State of Hawaii and its people.

"Today, we congratulate and honor Kalli Kamauoha on being crowned America's Favorite Teenager, as well as for all of her other previous achievements and those which are certain to come in the future. Congratulations Kalli, we are all very proud of you."

Representative Beirne then rose and stated:

"Kalli Kamauoha -- we are very, very proud of you and for the many things and activities you have been involved in. Both Representative Santiago and myself, having the honor of having Kahuku High School in our districts, are very pleased at this time, Kalli, that you have come this far, not only to represent the Laie community, Kahuku High School, but also your family.

"Kalli, your father and your mother, I am sure, are very proud of your achievements, as is the recognition of your little sister that is not here today, that also was recognized with her achievement. Kalli, your father tells me that his line and his lineage -- the Kamauoha family -- overlaps quite a bit into the Kamauoha line in Laie. I'm sure that the Hawaiian part of you, Kalli, shows in you achieving those things that you have.

"I would like for you to know, Kalli, that we colleagues in this Seventeenth legislative body take very much pride in acknowledging teenagers in their achievements in the State of Hawaii. Congratulations in all you do and when you reach Kahuku High School in the senior level, we hope that you will also join us here at the Legislature to learn more about government.

"Mahalo."

At this time, Representative Santiago introduced Kalli Kamauoha, America's Favorite Teenager, and asked the honoree to stand to be recognized. Accompanying Kalli on the House floor were her parents, Spencer and Cydne Kamauoha, and her younger sisters, Chelsea and Noelle, who then rose to be recognized. "Cydne and I worked closely together. She worked at Kahuku Health Clinic for years and so we've gotten to know each other over the years; and my former tennis partner who I don't play anymore because he never lets me win."

Representative Santiago then presented the Certificate of Recognition to Kalli, and floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Apo, Beirne and Bainum.

"Primarily because, one, I don't understand it, and some of the logic behind it, I think, needs to be opened up at this Second Reading, Mr. Speaker, otherwise, I would let it go by.

"I speak against the bill that basically eliminates the premarital blood test for Rubella. Instead of before marriage, it says it will be before birth so there's a premarital test. It seems that the logic of it is that 25 percent of births are out of wedlock so, therefore, there's a need to do the premarital. However, if you look at the data, the present system has worked very well. Only one out of one hundred thousand come down with Rubella, whereas a number of years ago it was rather extreme.

"The point is, Mr. Speaker, the present system is working so why don't we, using common sense, do both -- premarital as well as prenatal -- so the women won't have any chance of getting it rather than shifting it to no premarital and only prenatal, especially when we have immigrants, and we have other people coming in who will not have had these Rubella screenings to take place prior to that. The way the bill is proposing it, it looks to me like ... hey, public, we're going to check you for TB, but only after you got TB. It doesn't seem to make chronological or common sense, and that's why I alert the House on Second Reading, Mr. Speaker.

"Thank you."

"In questioning the Judiciary, it appears clear that if we do locate it in Kapolei, that we can link people up through television and use today's modern technology so people will not necessarily have to drive to the court. For orders to show cause and the other motions that occur in the Family Court, a lot of them can be done through televised linkup with the center being at Kapolei and convenient to those 43 percent who would drive there.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Chun introduced Kyle Chock, past Governor of the Youth Legislature, and a resident of upper Liliha.

Representative Hirono then rose and stated:

"I had the honor to have dinner with the Model (Youth) Legislature people on Friday night and I sat next to Tori Agoot, and I am just so happy that she has been elected as the Governor. I met her father on the Big Island.

"Congratulations, Tori! I'm very excited for you, and all of you.

"Thank you."

Representative Young then asked the Pages, who were seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized. "These students come from all over the State, and they service the Youth Legislature during the session. They are the future leaders of the Legislature."

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS
(FLOOR PRESENTATIONS)

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 402 and 403) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

H.R. No. 402, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING AND HONORING THE TRI-SCHOOL ENSEMBLE THEATRE COMPANY," was jointly offered by Representatives Menor and Lee.

On motion by Representative Menor, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, H.R. No. 402 was adopted.

Representative Menor rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"It gives me a great deal of honor and privilege to be able to introduce to this distinguished body the members of the Tri-School Ensemble Theatre Company. I believe that the resolution that was co-sponsored by both Representative Lee and myself, which was strongly supported by all of the Central Oahu legislators, speaks for itself.

"However, I just wanted to say briefly how very impressed we are with the accomplishments of our young performers. Your accomplishments definitely are a positive reflection, not only of our public school system and the performing arts activities that are, in fact, sponsored by our public schools, but also for all of the communities of Central Oahu. You know, although the Windward side of the island oftentimes gets more publicity in terms of the performing arts activities that are present in the public schools, I think that the achievements of these youngsters demonstrate that the performing arts and drama activities are definitely alive and well in Central Oahu.

"Finally, I just also wanted to offer my commendation to Mrs. Sharon Abrigo who is a resource teacher and who also is the leader of this program, and its efforts and hard work have made the achievements and accomplishments of the performing arts program the success that it is."

Representative Menor then introduced the members of the Tri-School Ensemble Theatre Company who were seated on the House floor, and asked them to stand to be recognized, as follows: Mrs. Sharon Abrigo, leader of the program; Tia Gross, a student performer; Matt Brooker; Tracy Nishimoto; and Christi Young.

Representative Menor then asked Joey Lee, Kuulei Miura, Scott Bert, Jr., Jessica Czachorowski, and Renee Prince, who were seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized.

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"I would like to begin by reading a letter that was published in the **Honolulu Star-Bulletin** last night, and the headline reads: **Mililani High's Arts Program Instills Pride in Students**, and the letter reads as follows:

"Thank you for the lovely article about Tri-School productions at Mililani High School written by Berle Burlingame. 'Milk With Your Roll' really captured the essence of what a program in the performing arts can encourage its students. That is, self-confidence, self-esteem, self-discipline, and teamwork.

"The public has graded our school system a "C". However, many of our programs and our teachers are giving "A" performances. Tri-School productions at Mililani High is an example of that."

"It is my great honor to do so today because this House, this body, a few years ago, recognized one of its most illustrious alumnus, Thomas Lee, and I appreciate that honor a great deal more than he probably did.

"The resolution speaks about several things and it is very important that we re-emphasize how important it is for our educational system. First of all, it integrates military dependents in the Central Oahu area with local students, and these local students are from Waialua, Leilehua and Mililani. And not only that integration of students but also the three schools, and the three schools with the elementary schools in the area, above all with Kipapa which has a very thriving drama program.

"May I also add, at this moment, the sterling performance of Casey Hengel, a sixth grader at Mililani-waena School. She was the star of the Manoa Valley Theatre spectacular, a very successful play -- 'Ruthless' -- and I predict that she will wind up on Broadway one day. And mind you, she's a product of the public school in Mililani.

"Now, the plays that have been a real staple of the Tri-School productions are plays that are historically and socially relevant. The two this year show that very clearly. What I am driving at is that it is very much like the Manoa writing program. You cannot segregate and teach a subject only by itself. You have to integrate it. The Manoa writing program instills writing skills and communication skills in every possible subject -- in physics, in chemistry, math, et cetera -- not only in English literature. So this is the same with the drama program. The students learn about a history of the programs in Russia under 'Fiddler on the Roof.' They learn about the caste system in Haiti; they learn about the historical events in American history; the trial of witches in Salem with all its emotions; and all the things that really revolt us today but were relevant in those days.

"Finally, let me just add, in a very short period of time and playing in the cafeteria. Other places have performing arts centers and theaters, but Mililani has a cafeteria and in that cafeteria the students have to take down the cafeteria tables and chairs and do their own scenery, all by themselves, and of course, with the help of a very, very involved parent, Mr. Earl Kosaki. Eaton is his son who won the Sterling Scholarship last year. Mrs. Briggles has an amazing record of having produced two Sterling Scholars in drama and three finalists, and I think the people out in Laie must be tired of seeing her every year there.

"Mr. Speaker, it is my great honor to be able to say these remarks to my friends, as well as to our audience outside of this building, because our schools have a program. They may have problems -- yes, they do -- but we have a program.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Santiago then rose and stated:

"I could not pass up this opportunity to acknowledge a constituent and a friend, Sharon Abrigo. I just wanted to, through this acknowledgement, thank her for the hard work she gives to the students. You know, during tough economic times, I think we often focus in on some of the more nuts and bolts things when it comes to education. During these times, we underestimate the true value that the arts play in the total development of the human spirit and our soul, and it is through individuals like Sharon that keeps reminding us about the needs.

"I take my hat off to you, Sharon, and to all the students, and I see some from Waialua. I think we can all really take the true example from you.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Nekoba then rose and stated:

"I also couldn't let this woman pass by because I am a Windward side thespian, as Representative Menor pointed out, and I just wanted to add also my congratulations to you.

"I was involved with theater with Mr. Bright, and I know what a time commitment that you have all put into this, and I am even more impressed by your dedication to the arts. Thank you very much for your time and your heart. I hope you will continue with the arts.

"Thank you very much."

Certificates of Recognition and floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Morihara, Taniguchi, Amaral, Pepper, Shon and Oshiro.

H.R. No. 403, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING OUTSTANDING STUDENTS OF MILILANI HIGH SCHOOL WHO HAVE WON STATEWIDE RECOGNITION AND WILL REPRESENT HAWAII ON THE MAINLAND," was jointly offered by Representatives Lee and Menor.

On motion by Representative Lee, seconded by Representative Menor and carried, H.R. No. 403 was adopted.

Representative Lee rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"The letter that I read earlier speaks about only one program -- the drama program -- which we believe has earned an 'A', but there are other programs at Mililani High School which have earned 'A's as well, and today, we recognize five distinct groups of students who have done exceedingly well and who have won statewide recognition and will represent Hawaii on the mainland. It's very difficult to describe how they do it, but I think what is very important is that it begins with the student himself, and we cannot add or detract from what they have done. They have done it by themselves with perhaps the support of their parents and teachers.

"Without going through a great deal of detail of how they did it, why we're doing it today, let me just simply

introduce them because by introducing them, I think we find some of the reasons why they are honored here today.

"Let me begin by introducing five honorees on the House floor and later on the people in the gallery."

Representative Lee then introduced and asked the following honorees to stand to be recognized: Christina Staples, a Sterling Scholarship finalist in business; Vanessa Casiano, editor of the much-admired school newspaper, **The Trojan Times**; Nathan Shurtleff in fine arts (photography) and also in the drama program; Doreen Au, a Sterling Scholarship finalist in science. "She won twice in a row for two years in running and she will again go to Birmingham at the International Science Fair"; and Keiko Price, "someone I have known from her elementary school days at Mililani-uka School, and I had the great honor to present her a certificate at that time, and lo and behold, she is here today as an All-American swimmer, the only high schooler in Hawaii who is an All-American swimmer."

Representative Lee then asked the following persons who were seated in the gallery to stand to be recognized: Keiko's mother, Mrs. Carol Price, Vice Principal at Aiea High School, her grandfather, Mr. Amioka; Mr. and Mrs. Au, Doreen's parents; Cecilia Gregory, "an outstanding student who won first prize in sports writing and her article was reprinted in the **Honolulu Star-Bulletin** a few days ago;" Mr. Gregory, her father; Miss Francine Matsuda, photography teacher; Wesley Endo, mentor of Patrick Underwood, and the industrial arts teacher at Mililani. "You wouldn't believe it but Mililani has an excellent and very strong program in industrial arts, and it has won first prizes in automobile mechanics, as well as in house building;" and Keala Hanusey, a student photographer.

Representative Ward rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"I rise because this is not just a bill, it's basically an economic development project which can save the State of Hawaii, or can mislead us into thinking that we have a silver bullet or an elixir called ethanol, and Mr. Speaker, I rise to share a few reservations so the best and the brightest brains will, hopefully in the Finance Committee

and thereafter, look at this, not just as a mandated monopoly of which basically the bill is saying ... you will have ten percent ethanol in your tank and you will pay for it regardless of price.

"I have two concerns. One is that one plantation is all that we need for this, according to some planters' information; and secondly, that if the federal subsidy pulled out, all the millions of dollars to do the infrastructure may be at a loss, so the economic incentive to do it may be lacking.

"I also understand, Mr. Speaker, that the price of gas could go so high that we could be jeopardizing the well-being of the people of Hawaii. Now I know a lot of the farmers who would love to have a mandate ... you must buy Japanese cucumbers from Waianae or Waimanalo, but we know that they are ten to sometimes thirty percent higher.

"My concern is that if we legislate this, we've got to know if, in fact, the prices are going to go up that the Legislature should be one of those who approve it.

"Secondly, we have been told that it would actually be cheaper to bring in ethanol but that misses the point of preserving sugar.

"On the idea of mandates and research that if, in fact, we wanted to save sugar, all of us, Mr. Speaker, including every tourist, would simply have to eat 14 candy bars per day. All sugar in every plantation would be preserved as it goes.

"Here's my point. We need to look at this with a feasibility study, not just saying ... you will use ten percent ethanol. It's not a silver bullet. It's not going to be magic. Anybody can mandate a market from this legislative point of view but to really think about it seriously is why I stand and speak, and I hope the Finance Committee will look at some of those options.

"Thank you."

The Chair interrupted and said:

"Yes, Representative, that's a nice quote but that's not an announcement. I must call you out of order."

Representative Thielen replied:

"It's an announcement, Mr. Speaker, in honor of one of our country's foremost patriots, and that 219 years ago he made this speech. . .

The Chair responded:

"You're quoting. We've got your quotation. If you have an announcement, please proceed. Otherwise, I will call you out of order."

Representative Thielen then asked for a recess, and at 12:59 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 1:01 o'clock p.m., Representative Ward rose and stated:

"If anyone ever wonders why my colleague is so feisty and so verbal, it is because her relative is Patrick Henry. That's where it came from. . .

The Chair responded:

"That's not an announcement, members. You're getting out of hand. Recess."

At 1:02 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 1:03 o'clock p.m., the Chair stated:

"Any further **announcements** . . . to the liberal interpretation of what an announcement is."

Representative Thielen rose on a point of personal privilege to ask for clarification of why the announcement about Patrick Henry wasn't an acceptable announcement.

The Chair replied:

"It's a little different. I think it's much more expanded. Will you please sit down . . . you're out of order. I don't think the Minority should disrupt the Majority in the House. You should respect the will of the Majority."

Representative Chun then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I wanted to announce that the challenge is on for the Hawaii Foodbank. The Senate and the House have entered a competition this year again and I would like to announce ... starting March 28th, we will be gathering food donations, as well as five dollar cash donations, from individuals if you are willing, and I know that last year, we actually were record-breaking, both the House and the Senate. I hope that we will be able to do that again. Actually we have 452 House staff members, and I hope that everyone can contribute and bring their donations to Room 1112."

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Representative Ward rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, this is a tradition that we are going to celebrate on Saturday -- Prince Kuhio. We are going to honor a man who has made noble contributions; I note, one, the Hawaiian Homestead which he was renowned for beginning. As Hawaiian lands and culture slipped away, Prince Kuhio, the representative to Congress from 1903 to 1921, is the one who brought those two hundred thousand acres into being.

"And a lesser known fact, Mr. Speaker, is the fact that Kalaupapa was the research hospital that he first put together for those with leprosy which heretofore many leaders never paid much attention to.

"Lastly, I would say that Prince Kuhio was a loyal Republican, probably the highest ranking Hawaiian Republican that existed, and I'll now sign off by saying ... HAPPY KUHIO DAY!"

Monday, March 28, 1994

The House of Representatives of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1994, convened at 11:45 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Representative Ezra R. Kanoho, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Hagino, Takamine and Tanimoto, who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Thirty-Sixth Day.

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Thirty-Sixth Day was approved.

ORDER OF THE DAY

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS
(FLOOR PRESENTATIONS)

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 404 and 405) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

H.R. No. 404, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING AND COMMENDING THE HIGHLANDS INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL BAND, RECIPIENTS OF THE SUDLER CUP AWARD," was jointly offered by Representatives D. Ige, Takumi and Yonamine.

Representative D. Ige moved that the resolution be adopted, seconded by Representative Yonamine.

Representative D. Ige rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the resolution speaks for itself. I just wanted to add a couple of personal comments.

"The Sudler Cup is like the Nobel Prize for scientists and humanitarians, gold medal for athletes and world championship. It is the highest honor that any Intermediate School band program can achieve, and this is an international program recognizing long-term excellence in band programs throughout the country, Japan and Canada. It clearly is an honor that comes once in a lifetime for many people.

"Many people know about the Pearl City High School Band and the excellence that it has achieved, and the numerous awards and presentations -- their presentations at the UH games and the Pro Bowl. But clearly, anybody who lives in Pearl City knows that the band program starts at Highlands Intermediate School. And over the many, many years, the program has grown and continues to excel. I've known, and I've spoken with the Pearl City High School Band director many times, and he said that the day Boniface Leong retires, he'll probably retire from the band program because to try and carry on without him is very difficult.

"I just wanted to add a personal note. I had entered the band in the 60's for those students who are there. As a seventh grader, I was playing the saxophone at that time, and I remember about two months into the program, I got this note saying that Mr. Leong wanted to meet with me after class. So I was there and I was second/third chair saxophone at that time. I thought ...

alright, I made it. I'm going to be first chair. So I went into his office and Mr. Leong goes ... 'You know what David, you play too loud.' And I went, 'What?' And he said, 'You play too loud. Have you ever thought about changing instrument?' And I said, 'Well, I guess. . . I'm a team player, I can buy into that. So what instrument do you want me to consider?' 'How about the tuba?' And I kinda went, 'Tuba?' But needless to say, in six weeks, with Mr. Leong's instruction, I entered my first solo contest and won my first band medal which was for a tuba solo. So clearly, Mr. Leong has been known to work miracles. Since that time, I did go on and as many Pearl City High School students and Highlands Intermediate School students, I was part of a record and part of the High School State Band, and it's something that I play to my kids all the time.

"But clearly, I think anybody who has come into the program know that Mr. Leong and the band program are really the heart and soul of the community, so I just wanted to congratulate them."

Representative Yonamine then rose and stated:

"My two daughters, Shirley and Laura, were members of the band, Mr. Leong, and they still have this love of music. They still play the piano, the recorder, the baritone and trombone, and other things that they play whenever they get to the house. So the one thing I remembered about Mr. Leong and members of the Highlands Intermediate School band was the fact that they performed well, they enjoyed themselves, and he works them extremely hard, and they bring good pride and joy to the school, to the community, and to the State.

"Like Representative David Ige says ... every professional athlete gets his/her start from a coach. Every symphony member started at the very beginning with a tutor. All of us will never reach the elite class but something is planted in our hearts and minds. So for all of you here, as well as for the members of the Highlands Intermediate School band, we will always have something in common -- good coaching, good mentoring, sound fundamentals, good discipline, life-long interest in music and the performing arts, and the sheer joy and love of performing and achieving. That is what makes the members of the band and you, Mr. Leong, a remarkable, dedicated professional, a teacher, director, coach, motivator, mentor, tutor, and maybe even a fun guy -- right, members? I will never forget the classic black pens of Highlands Intermediate.

"Mr. Leong's students usually win about 80 percent of the solo and the ensemble competition, and his members usually make up about seventy to eighty percent of the Eighth Grade Select Band. So in his own right, and in his own way, this band has performed so well and this is the success story of Highlands Intermediate School band and its remarkable instructor, Mr. Leong.

"Today, we pay tribute to all of you and commend you all for getting the award and for your travels to Washington, D.C. Tomorrow, band members ... you all will go on to higher levels and greater achievements. We're all very proud of you for bringing pride to the school, the Pearl City community, and the State.

"Thank you very much, and good luck in the future."

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"I wish to assure Representative David Ige to my right and Representative Yonamine in front of me that there are a few of us who do not live in Pearl City, but we do

know why the Pearl City High School band is such a great band in the State, and that's because of Highlands Intermediate School. And behind Highlands Intermediate School's band is the great teacher, Mr. Leong, and it has always been my contention that the public schools in Hawaii can do a very good job if we have good students, supportive parents, and above all, great teachers like Mr. Leong.

"So congratulations on your singular honor and may you bring back more in the future.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Isbell then rose and stated:

"I would like to add my congratulations to you as well as the band members out there, but I want to also tell you know that it's also a very healthy sport to do. Now most people think of band as producing music, but I can tell you that it also is a very healthy thing, especially if you blow a wind instrument.

"As of yesterday, I played in the Hulihee Palace Band in the concert, and I've been playing baritone horns since I was in intermediate band, and that's why I'm so full of 'hot air.' It really keeps your breathing great, you're healthy, you've got to be living well to be able to blow a horn -- right? I just want you to know my husband is the Band Director/Band Master for Pahoa and Konawaena High Schools, as well as on the mainland for over thirty years. You'll probably know him but he has, of course, been a French hornist for years -- a concert French hornist -- and that is how we met.

"Band brings people together and it also is a very healthy thing to do. And I want to congratulate you because you're exposing these young people to something they can do for all of their lives if they really have a desire, and it's more than a hobby. I believe that what you're doing is giving them a spiritual as well as a feeling of wonder when you can play together in a group as well as a soloist, and make music out of almost anything that you handle.

"So I want to congratulate you, and thank you for being here with your band, and I look forward to your concert later on.

"Thank you."

Representative Herkes then rose and stated:

"I guess making hot air and politicians go together. I want to add my congratulations as an erstwhile second chair clarinetist in the Hilo Intermediate School band 48 years ago, and then when I went to that school in Manoa Valley (Punahou) that Representatives White, Young and I graduated from. I, too, switched, but not to the tuba. That was too heavy. I switched to baritone sax because I learned although it plays similar notes as the tuba, you didn't have to march with a baritone sax, so it was a good reason for me to switch.

"But I do want to add my congratulations to you. It's one of the fondest memories I have of both intermediate school and high school.

"Thank you."

Representative Young then rose and stated:

"I can't resist this either. I have to add my hot air to this.

"I don't know Mr. Leong or the Highlands Intermediate School band, but like Representative Herkes and Representative David Ige, I was second chair on alto sax and clarinet in my high school band, and I have great memories of marching on the field with other high school bands with Gabe Baltazar being my idol at that particular time until my saxophone was stolen when I was in ninth grade, and I just gave it all up.

"I was reminded very recently that you could be both a politician and a saxophone player as we know from the President of our United States.

"Congratulations!"

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 404 was adopted.

At this time, Representative D. Ige rose and introduced the honorees and asked them to stand to be recognized, as follows: The band members who were seated in the gallery; and Tyson Shimomi, Kimberly Teruya, Chanlynn Nakamiyo, Mr. Boniface Leong, the Band Director, and Mrs. Jane Himeda, Principal of Highlands Intermediate School, who were seated on the House floor.

Representative D. Ige then introduced Mrs. Barbara Leong, wife of Boniface Leong, who works in the Sergeant-at-Arms Office; and his daughter, Bonnie.

A Certificate of Recognition was presented to Mr. Leong by Representative D. Ige, while Representatives Takumi, Yonamine, Young, Chumbley and Chun presented floral leis to the honorees.

H.R. No. 405, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION CONGRATULATING AND COMMENDING ROY AND NYLE HALLMAN FOR THEIR TWENTY YEARS OF DEDICATION TO THE HONOLULU BOY CHOIR AND THEIR CONTRIBUTION TO THE PEOPLE OF HAWAII," was jointly offered by Representatives Stegmaier and Tom.

Representative Stegmaier moved that the resolution be adopted, seconded by Representative Tom.

Representative Tom rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"We all stand here and speak from our hearts as legislators, and we argue all day and we talk about bills. I just wanted to stand here for a moment as a parent and tell Roy and Nyle how much they have touched my life and the life of my family.

"I have a boy who is sixteen years old now, who started off when he was six years old. I remember going into Mr. Hallman's office, and the piano and everything, and I think I was more scared than he was that my son had to sing 'You Are My Sunshine,' and I think he was probably one of the youngest to make the Honolulu Boy Choir many years ago and stayed for six years.

"Roy and Nyle ... I don't know if I ever told you. I know I privately told you, but I want to publicly tell you now that we will always love you -- our family -- and I'll always remember all of the great things you've done.

"You know, we had to go to numerous rehearsals. These kids got to perform at the greatest places, whether it was a church, or school yard, or one of the ritziest hotels in the world. And I'll tell you, you've never seen so many kids brought together -- all ethnic groups, walks of life, rich and poor -- all brought together. When you

talk about cooperation and spirit, Roy was able to bring out the best in a child. I don't know how he did it ... these kids wanted to sing. They had something to work towards and everyday in my life, when I look at my son, I always see something in him that came from Roy and Nyle. Whatever it is ... it's a spirit of giving, of being sincere, of compassion, of just singing in the shower. I mean even when he sings in the shower, I think of Roy and Nyle. I remember that you always had these tapes with Nyle singing with the piano ... I hear it over and over and over. I can't believe it.

"When I heard that you folks were retiring, it was like something got cut out of me -- the spirit, a part of me -- and I want you to know, Roy and Nyle, that you folks have brought so much joy and love to a lot of young men in this State because they knew the art of singing and to enjoy, and to cooperate, to love. I want you folks to know that there'll never be anyone that can replace you there. I'm sure of that. But I know that your legacy will live on and on with the Honolulu Boy Choir. Even as I speak now, I can hear 'We Are Young Men of This Country,' and I hear those little voices and I'll say it to you, Roy and Nyle ... just thank you so much for touching so many lives and making so many people so proud to be a member of the Honolulu Boy Choir because it was one. It was something that you built and it will never die.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Stegmaier then rose and stated:

"We are honoring a truly remarkable couple today. The resolution refers to the variety of places the Hallmans have taken the Honolulu Boy Choir and mentions other facts. But I want to talk about something that was only alluded to in the resolution and that Representative Tom just mentioned ... the sacrifice of time, energy and money to make the Honolulu Boy Choir such a success. Applying their religious values and beliefs in their work, the Hallmans founded the boy choir as volunteers, and have remained probably the only volunteer, director, and accompanist of a comparable choir in the country.

"As a result of their financial sacrifice and the generosity of many others, the Honolulu Boy Choir membership has been available to all boys 7 to 13 years of age. Of the more than 2,500 boys whose lives have been impacted by the Hallmans, many have come from middle and upper middle-income families, but over the twenty-year life of the Boy Choir, at least a third of the boys have come from families who were receiving some kind of government assistance. The Hallmans and the Board of Directors of the Choir, including the late John Bellinger of First Hawaiian Bank, and Maurice Sullivan, who we have honored recently, wanted to ensure that there were no barriers to participation.

"The Hallmans readily acknowledged that the Boy Choir would not have been possible without the understanding and strong support of the Central Union Church and the part-time, nominally-paid staff of Doug Mossman; Blake Nuibe as General Manager; Concert Coordinator, Leo Kama; Head Counselor, Anne Ili; and Kumu Hula, Chinky Mahoe. And most important, the parents of the boys themselves who were willing to give that much more time and energy to the Choir, knowing that the Hallmans were volunteering their efforts.

"Speaking of sacrifice, Mr. Speaker, the Hallmans have not had a vacation to speak of in twenty years, unless you call summers touring the world with 75 boys and 12 chaperones a vacation! Perhaps most telling about the Hallman's own values and purpose for founding the Choir was the tour which they found most satisfying ... that

which took the Choir to American and Western Samoa where they were greeted with open hearts and homes, and all had a truly unforgettable life experience.

"What are the Hallmans to do in retirement? They're still at work at Central Union Church -- directing and/or accompanying the Church's six choirs of which the youngest group is the four to five-year old choir group, and they are looking forward to a vacation trip this summer that will take them to Dallas for a convention of organists -- just the two of them!

"Mr. Speaker, may I introduce to the members Roy Hallman and Nyle Hallman."

The honorees, Roy and Nyle Hallman, who were seated on the House floor, rose to be recognized.

Representative Stegmaier then asked Kathryn Hallman, their daughter, "who, over the years, has been a great supporter of the Honolulu Boy Choir," who was seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 405 was adopted.

Representative Stegmaier then presented a Certificate of Recognition to Mr. and Mrs. Hallman while Representatives Ishii-Morikami and Tom presented pikake leis to the honorees.

At 12:14 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:21 o'clock p.m., Representative Beirne was permitted a late introduction and she introduced to the members of the House two friends visiting from California, as follows: Mary Lee Travis, "a realtor and sales associate in Santa Cruz. She also is a court-appointed child advocacy for abused children. She also serves on the Second District of the Children's Commission in Santa Cruz County"; and Pat Driscoll, "President of Driscoll Development Company who does affordable housing in Santa Cruz. She also serves on the Board of Directors of Hospice, and works very closely with placing children in homes in the Santa Cruz area."

LEWIN, M.D., AND NORMAN GOLDSTEIN, M.D., IN CELEBRATION OF DOCTOR'S DAY 1994," was jointly offered by Representatives Duldulao and Pepper.

Representative Duldulao moved that the resolution be adopted, seconded by Representative Pepper.

Representative Duldulao then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"It is with great pleasure that I rise to speak in support of this resolution. It has been over 60 years ago since our doctors were first honored on a day designated as 'Doctors' Day.' As they did sixty years ago, our doctors today continue to maintain the highest standards of their predecessors in providing the best care possible for their patients.

"As Chair of the Committee on Health, I have become increasingly aware of the many sacrifices that our colleagues in the medical field make every day, and have the greatest admiration for their selfless devotion to their patients and their profession. I am sure we all have been under the care of a doctor at some time and share a debt of gratitude to all in this honored profession.

"In addition to honoring all doctors on this special day, I am very pleased to recognize two doctors who have made noteworthy contributions in their fields and have received special recognitions during the past year.

"The first honoree needs no introduction to this body. He is no other than Dr. John Lewin, our State Director of Health. Dr. Lewin has served the people of Hawaii in the State Department of Health for almost fifteen years, the last six and a half years as the Director. For his vast contributions, both on a State and national levels. Dr. Lewin was recently recognized by the American Medical Association as the recipient of the prestigious Dr. Nathan Davis Award.

"Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, it is my pleasure that I recognize at this time, Dr. John C. Lewin. Dr. Lewin, will you please rise to be recognized."

The honoree rose to be recognized.

"With Dr. Lewin this morning is his lovely and very supportive wife, Susan Lewin."

Mrs. Susan Lewin then rose to be recognized.

"The second individual whom I have the pleasure to introduce this morning, Mr. Speaker, is Dr. Norman Goldstein who is a practicing dermatologist and a clinical professor at our medical school. Dr. Goldstein has made noteworthy contributions in bringing sun-intensity awareness to the people of Hawaii, and has made numerous other contributions in the civic as well as medical fields. In recognition of his many achievements, the Hawaii Medical Association has named Dr. Goldstein as their Physician of the Year.

"Mr. Speaker and colleagues, I now present to you Dr. Norman Goldstein."

Dr. Norman Goldstein rose to be recognized.

Representative Marumoto then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to say a few words in favor of the resolution, in particular about Dr. Goldstein who I have known for many, many years -- maybe over two decades.

"I thought I would just like to share with this body the fact that he has devoted many of his volunteer hours to

his interest and passion which is historic preservation. He shares that interest with his wife, Ramsay, a brilliant artist, who has captured the spirit of many of the buildings here in Hawaii.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"I personally would like to thank Jack and Susan, both of you, because you both made a tremendous contribution to our State. I think Jack ... you're one of the few directors in this State that grow younger each year, and it's because you love what you are doing. It's a very deep commitment, and I also really appreciate your responsiveness to the environmental health of our State.

"Thank you."

Representative Alcon then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it is an honor to honor Dr. Lewin because of the fact that he is a country doctor from Upcountry, Kula, and coming from the country, of course, he knows all the symptoms of illnesses that we have.

"But I would also be remiss, Mr. Speaker, if I didn't pay tribute to our own House doctor, Dr. Bainum. Let me just say, Mr. Speaker, that Dr. Bainum had treated me two times during the session, and I have called him, not as a representative oftentimes, but I have called him Dr. Bainum because of the fact that he is looking after the welfare of the members of the House.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Bainum then rose and stated:

"You know, I have been happy all morning. I woke up this morning and I said ... Good morning, Duke, it's Doctors' Day! I really did, and every year I get happier when it comes to be March 30th. It's really nice to have a day dedicated to a profession, and I hope we all pause for just a moment, sometime during the day, not to reflect on the many controversial issues that are facing this body regarding physicians and health care, but rather to reflect on all the contributions that physicians make every day to the citizens of this State.

"I particularly want to recognize our honorees today. I don't know if everyone realizes what a prestigious award Nathan Davis is. It's highly sought after and one that Dr. Lewin can certainly be very proud of, and all of us can be proud of that he has received that award.

"Dr. Goldstein, I know how many people are alive today because of your skill in detecting such diseases as melanoma and other diseases. So your educational efforts and your clinical skills are certainly admired, and it's an honor to have you here today.

"I also want to extend my thanks to the Chair of the Health Committee in appreciation of their introduction of this resolution.

"And, thank you, Representative Alcon. He's a good patient."

Representative Stegmaier then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in support of the resolution as well, and to mention some specific information about the way that Dr. Goldstein, my constituent, has contributed to the health of the people of Hawaii and elsewhere around the world.

"He has been working with lifeguards from the City and County of Honolulu and with law enforcement officers who direct traffic in the burning Hawaii sun, providing them with brochures, sunscreen, and information about sun-protective garments, and urging them to wear sun-protective identity jackets.

"Dr. Goldstein, in addition, has spent twenty years trying to convince the television stations to include on their weather reports sun-intensive index information which tells us how the day's sun will affect various skin types during certain hours. He has been very successful with the UV meter and has been able to install it on the beach at Waikiki, and is working to get such meters installed at the University of Hawaii campus, Mauna Kea, and other locations.

"Finally, concerning another interest of Dr. Goldstein ... he has amassed a sizeable collection of books on the subject of tattoos, in addition to twelve dozen slides, tattoo equipment and other paraphernalia. He has assisted the Adult Friends for Youth in participating in removing gang and pornographic tattoos, and was presented with an award for his laser treatment of tattoos. The late professor of dermatology at the University of Paris nicknamed him 'the tattoo guru.'

"For the long hours of research work and dedication of Dr. Goldstein, he will have a lasting impact on the way that all people around the world deal with exposure to the sun.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Cachola then rose and stated:

"I'd like to extend warm congratulations to Dr. Goldstein. I have known him maybe five years, and also to Dr. Lewin.

"My wife is a doctor and I forgot to greet her 'Happy Doctors' Day' today, but you know what I got to do tonight so I will send some nice red roses and to let her understand that I do appreciate what she is doing, and I can also relate to what Dr. Goldstein is doing. I understand he has done a lot of humanitarian activities, and also a lot of doctors are doing the same thing. They do the Aloha Medical Mission work, and it takes a lot of character and a lot of hard work really to do this kind of thing. And for that, Dr. Goldstein ... my congratulations.

"I also would like to extend warm congratulations and best wishes to all the doctors here. We know we have been doing battle with them or helping them out, but let's forget about that today and we say to all of them ... aloha and mahalo."

Representative Morihara then rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"I just wanted to note to Jack and Susan the many years of service to Kula Hospital and the Maui community that they have given in the past, and just wanted to say that the people of Kula miss you, and we would certainly welcome you back anytime."

At this time, Representative Duldulao rose and introduced the doctors who were seated in the gallery, and asked them to stand to be recognized, as follows: Dr. Fred Holshuh, President-elect of the Hawaii Medical Association; Dr. Len Howard, representing the Honolulu County Medical Society; Ms. Susan Foo, representing the Hawaii Medical Association Alliance; and Dr. Stephen

Wallach, Legislative Committee Chair of the Hawaii Medical Association.

Representative Duldulao continued, saying:

"Thank you all for your selfless devotion in enhancing health care for the people of Hawaii, and for representing the many doctors whom we honor today and to whom we extend our warmest mahalo and aloha.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cachola then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I forgot to say something, and I'll be remiss if I'm not going to say it.

"Really, the spouses of doctors should also be congratulated because they suffer a lot more than doctors."

Representative Cachola then asked Mrs. Wallach, wife of Dr. Stephen Wallach, and other members of the Medical Auxiliary, who were seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 407 was adopted.

Representatives Duldulao and Pepper presented the honorees with Certificates of Recognition, and Representatives Hirono, Kawakami and Yonamine presented them with floral leis.

H.R. No. 408, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION COMMENDING LEIMOMI MO'OKINI LUM FOR THE OPERATION AND MANAGEMENT OF THE MO'OKINI HEIAU," was jointly offered by Representatives Okamura and Young.

Representative Okamura moved that the resolution be adopted, seconded by Representative Young.

Representative Okamura rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and colleagues, today, we are very honored to have with us a very special living treasure and keeper of the traditions of old Hawaii. Leimomi Mo'okini Lum and her family have dedicated their lives to not only preserving the native Hawaiian culture, but unselfishly sharing that knowledge and history with others through their family treasure -- the Luakini Mo'okini Heiau.

"The Luakini Mo'okini Heiau, located in Kohala on the Big Island of Hawaii, was constructed in 440 A.D. and was used primarily for human sacrifice and associated rituals. A mere one thousand yards from the birthplace of Kamehameha the Great, this heiau was reserved for only the most sacred of ceremonies and only ruling chiefs, kings and stewards were allowed on the premises.

"The stewardship of the heiau has been charged to the Mo'okini family for generations. They have maintained the grounds and enforced the kapu of only allowing members of the ali'i to visit the premises -- barring outsiders for many years.

"In 1977, Leimomi Mo'okini Lum was named Kahuna Nui, or high priestess, of the heiau and became responsible for its perpetuity. Her first act as Kahuna Nui was to lift the kapu restricting visitors to those of the ali'i class, thereby opening up a part of Hawaii's past.

"In deciding to lift the kapu, Aunty Momi envisioned her family heiau as an educational resource for Hawaii's children. She and her family welcome thousands of students each year to the heiau where Aunty Momi shares the rich history, culture, and mysteries of the site. Her philosophy is rooted in the belief that knowledge of the past is necessary to acknowledge our identity in the present, and allow us to look toward the future. The children of Hawaii have benefitted tremendously from the legacy of the Mo'okini family and the unselfishness of the Kahuna Nui -- Aunty Momi.

"Today, the heiau, which is registered as a national historical landmark, as well as being one of only three State monuments, continues to serve as an important resource of native Hawaiian culture and education. In 1993, over 85,000 children, residents and tourists visited the site and departed with a greater appreciation and understanding of the Hawaii of old.

"To Leimomi Mo'okini Lum and her ohana and staff ... Mahalo from all of us for your vision and for sharing your family legacy with the people of Hawaii.

"Thank you."

Representative Nekoba then rose and stated:

"I had the good fortune of visiting the Mo'okini Heiau, and the even greater fortune of meeting Aunty Momi and her husband who have been working on this heiau for so long. They showed us the correct way to enter the heiau, the way to be respectful, to present our hookupu, and most of all, I think, to open up to us what it was like to be Hawaiian in those days and what the Hawaiians would go through when these things would happen, and it was an amazing experience. I don't think I'll ever forget it.

"But I think the most amazing thing is that I met Aunty Momi one year and every time I see her, she has open arms, a big hug for me, and she tells me she loves me every single time she sees me. That makes me feel even better.

"I thank you for your aloha and your kokua to me, and I wish you all the luck in the world.

"Thank you very much."

"Representative Herkes then rose and stated:

"I would like to add my congratulations to my dear friend, Leimomi Mo'okini Lum, and to her husband, General Lum. They are very dear friends and I've heard some wonderful, wonderful stories from her about her treasure.

"Thank you for being with us today."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"I join in congratulating Her Excellency Aunty Momi -- Mrs. Lum -- who is a treasured citizen of the community of Aina Haina of which I work for.

"As she lifted the kapu, so did her husband lift the defenses of the State of Hawaii as General Lum, who is also in the office of Senator Inouye. Both together are truly treasures of Hawaii and both deserve deep-felt congratulations.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kanoho then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I wish to add my brief congratulations to our honoree. Both Momi and Alex are indeed very special people for their long list of achievements, a good part of which we all know about and have already been well expressed.

"There is one element of their well-being that stands above all, and it is the special kind of help which they have rendered and will continue to render to countless number of people because to know Momi is to know that there is a special being that watches over us all, and that makes her a very, very special person indeed.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Young then rose and stated:

"I first met Momi Lum twenty years ago when she was a police officer with the Honolulu Police Department, but I did not see her again for many years, and then our paths began to cross. Seven years ago, just about this same time on Easter weekend, I was a houseguest in Kohala with Mahina Rapu who I introduced earlier, and on Easter Sunday, at dawn, Mahina led a very small group of us, including my husband Ev, to the Mo'okini Heiau where Mahina chanted for world peace. At the same time, her mother, on Easter Island, was chanting for world peace. And I knew that I was in a very special place at a very special time.

"And then two years ago, when the bill came through to preserve the Mo'okini Heiau as one of our state and federal monument, I again met Momi Lum under very mysterious circumstances which some of you know about, and I was pleased at that time to be on the Water, Land Use and Hawaiian Affairs Committee with Representative David Hagino and had the pleasure and the opportunity to then shepherd the bill through the House. Recently, Momi met with Mahina for a one hour meeting which turned into a seven hour reunion, and I knew there was something. They had never met before and I knew it was meant to happen.

"I congratulate her for being such a great legacy to the children of Hawaii with her educational center, and it certainly is a tribute to Momi Lum and her husband, General Alex Lum, and I congratulate them both.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Tanimoto then rose and stated:

"I, too, like Representative Nekoba, have had the wonderful experience of being at the heiau, and I want to really thank her for lifting the gate, so to speak, in allowing the people of Hawaii to share that experience that I experienced in 1990 with the children from Hawaii, and there've been thousands of children who have come. I think that that is an experience ... if you're there at dawn, like we were, and to go through experiencing the heiau and what it stands for. It just gives you a feeling that you believe that there is a being and someone will look after you.

"But most of all, I want to thank them for all their efforts, and I've worked on several projects on behalf of the County and some of the private development people there, and I know the countless hours that they spend making it available to the people of Hawaii.

"Again, I congratulate you, and Representative Ward ... I'm sorry, but they live in Kohala.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kawakami then rose and stated:

"I'd like to offer my congratulations to two grand people and friends -- the Mo'okinis -- and I would like to tell you that, you know, on two occasions, the Finance Committee was very lucky to go and visit the heiau. On the first visit, Mr. Speaker, you were Chairman of the Finance Committee, and we got lost, and we got stuck with our van and they were all there to push us out, and we did get to the heiau. And the second time, with Chairman Say last summer, and the Committee has gained a lot.

"We learned a lot, and we also saw how much these two have labored to make the heiau a place where everyone in Hawaii can enjoy. And I want to say to you ... the next time we go back, hopefully it will be on Children's Day, as was mentioned the thousands of youngsters who come to visit the place. We'd like to see that.

"But thank you and I want to say, certainly, for all your dedication, your labor of love, your energy in perpetuating the Hawaiian culture, preserving and making this available for all the people of Hawaii.

"Thank you."

Representative Apo then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to add my personal congratulations to Aunt Momi and the General.

"But I thought it would be appropriate to comment ... Mr. Speaker, one of the more chilling aspects, of course, of the Luakini Heiau is that it was used for human sacrifice. But I think, for the record, supporters must understand that the Hawaiians had a very humane way of doing it, and that is, the candidates were simply referred to three committees, at the end of which process they were executed."

Representative Beirne then rose and stated:

"Being native Hawaiian and being very sensitive to native Hawaiian kinds of issue, being very culturally sensitive, may I say to you, Aunt Momi, that we appreciate everything that you have done to open up the heiau to others. I want to just share a few words, as a freshman legislator, when I came into this body, I was invited by the Majority Leader to go holo holo and visit the site on the Big Island. When I asked what was the occasion, the comment that came back to me was that it was for hooponopono purposes, for a cleansing, and not being facetious or not being hooyo, you know, I said I was already clean and didn't need to go through that process, but I would like to someday be able to be invited to go through that process with you and your ohana.

"It gives me great pleasure to recognize you at this time. My staff person, John Kanekona, is also a Mo'okini, and another member of your ohana has married into my ohana, the Pinky Crowe line -- the Hiram family.

"So, congratulations, and may you always excel in all that you do.

"Mahalo."

Representative M. Ige then rose and stated:

"I, too, would like to share a few comments in support of this resolution.

"Mr. Speaker, you know, way back when Uncle Tony Kunimura was here, I remember spending many hours

listening to some of his real life experiences and I really felt that I could just sit for days listening to this individual, and I considered him a gift. In meeting Mrs. Lum, I feel the same way in that we can sit for a long period of time and you wouldn't even feel the time going by, listening to her commitment to the future.

"I, too, consider her one of the 'treasures' of this State ... to realize that this heiau was really one for sacrifice and how she has single-handedly turned it around to be a vision for the future -- for the children -- and to see her plans, or with the amphitheater for that site, to hear my son come home from his excursion from elementary school saying ... 'Dad, you know, I saw whales; we saw sharks swimming at this cove with fresh water spring within the ocean.' As a non-Hawaiian, I stand here and I say ... I hope that we can do everything in our authority to try and preserve, encourage, and perpetuate this family tie of this very unique and sacred ground.

"With that, I ask my colleagues to please be aware of trying to give Mrs. Lum the support that she needs in this venture for our children.

"Thank you."

Representative Marumoto then rose and stated:

"I would just like to thank Momi for escorting us -- the Finance Committee -- through the heiau. I was on that trip when you were Finance Chairman and it was an awesome experience visiting the heiau and the birthplace of Kamehameha the Great.

"An odd experience happened while we were there. It was a beautiful, sunny day -- there was not a cloud in the sky -- but we were told that it frequently does rain when people go inside the heiau and no sooner had the entire Finance Committee and staff walked into the heiau, then it started to rain -- very slowly but very steadily -- and persisted in raining until we walked through the heiau and came out, and then it stopped raining. And it was still very sunny -- the sun was shining, there was not a cloud in the sky. It was a real 'chicken skin' experience.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 408 was adopted.

At this time, Representative Okamura rose and prior to introducing the honoree, introduced the ohana, staff and supporters, who were seated in the gallery, and asked them to stand to be recognized, as follows: Alexia Carvalho, their daughter; her husband, Claude Carvalho, and daughter, Dayna Carvalho; Oliver Lum, their son; Bill Malakaua; Ululani Suiso; Sister Maria Rosario; Stacy Kuwata; and Mahina 'Rapu' Rapanui.

Representative Okamura then introduced and asked Kahuna Nui Auntie Momi Lum, "a very special person, spiritually a very powerful woman, and indeed one of the great 'living treasures' of Hawaii," to stand to be recognized. Accompanying her on the House floor was her husband, Major General Alexis Lum, a former Adjutant General of the State of Hawaii, and currently a Special Assistant to United States Senator Daniel Inouye, who then stood to be recognized.

A Certificate of Recognition was presented to Auntie Momi by Representative Kawakami and a pikake lei by Representative Say. Floral leis were also presented to the honorees by Representatives Young and Tanimoto.

At 12:33 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:43 o'clock p.m.

And while channel surfing, Mr. Speaker, I happen to see all of the very moving testimony for and against this and, quite frankly, Chairperson Duldulao should be commended for the grace with which she handled some very heavy possible flash points. It's not an easy issue.

"Mr. Speaker, my point of standing is to say ... of course, we should examine the issue, but I say it's premature to put the redefinition of death as part of it. Let's look at it, let's see what it has to say about it, let's

lighten up about saying that we're possibly going to redefine death out of this resolution. And, hopefully, the Judiciary Committee will be sensitive because, really, this is a life and death issue. It's only a resolution, but it's got some far-reaching implications.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS
(FLOOR PRESENTATIONS)

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 409 and 410) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

H.R. No. 409, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING AND COMMENDING JAMES YOUNG FOR HIS ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND DEDICATION TO PUBLIC BROADCASTING," was offered by Representative Souki.

Representative Okamura moved that H.R. No. 409 be adopted, seconded by Representative Ihara.

Representative Okamura rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and colleagues, today we recognize the accomplishments of a man who had dedicated himself and his career toward improving the quality of education, entertainment and communications technology for the people of Hawaii.

"After thirteen years as Executive Director with KHET-Hawaii Public Television, Mr. James Young retired last November, leaving behind a legacy of quality programming, prudent planning, and a long-range vision in charting a course for public television in the State of Hawaii.

"Among the numerous achievements in Mr. Young's career, perhaps the most familiar to all of us is his initiative in developing the Hawaii Interactive Television System, more commonly known as 'HITS.' Through this innovative telecommunications program, we have been able to broadcast a variety of legislative proceedings to our constituents on the neighbor islands, thereby broadening our reach and allowing greater participation in the legislative process.

"Additionally, HITS has enabled students in small schools, particularly in the rural areas of the neighbor islands, to benefit from expert instruction that would otherwise be unavailable to them. Using its resources, high school students across the State take advanced placement calculus from a master mathematics teacher located on Maui, and a single science teacher on Oahu instructs 14,000 fifth and sixth graders on all islands each week.

"Supplementing James Young's creative vision is his strong leadership skills and management savvy. During his tenure at KHET, he effectively stabilized the station's ability to withstand the severe federal and state funding cuts to public television during the mid-80's through a fiscal policy that has allowed the continued broadcast of quality programming. He, along with his management team, successfully increased the viewership of public television and guided KHET from 14th place in 1980 to 2nd place in the national public television system.

"To James Young ... mahalo for your dedication and leadership in setting the standard of excellence in telecommunications and quality education as Hawaii approaches the 21st century.

"Mahalo."

Representative Okamura then introduced Mr. James Young and asked the honoree to stand to be recognized. Accompanying the honoree on the House floor were his wife, Libby Young, and daughter, Katie Young, who then rose to be recognized.

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"I would like to add a few words in support of the resolution and specifically to honor the accomplishments of Mr. Jim Young, and to mention those things which I think ought to be added to the accolades that our Majority Leader has made.

"I think it's very important to realize that nothing is always done right off the bat, and Mr. Young has laid the foundation for a number of things which will make Hawaii Public Television a stronger and more influential force, not only in Hawaii, but also nationally. When he was faced with a shortfall in funding, he was able to get the cooperation of the Department of Consumer Protection and the cable television people to help with the funding of necessary equipment purchases.

"And then he was also able to lay the foundation for Hawaii becoming an anchor of the Asia Now Program, which is shared between NHK-Japan, the Seattle Public Television and Hawaii Public Television. That would be a tremendous asset, not only for public television per se, but also for our tourist industry because it will showcase, not only to the mainland but also to Asia, what Hawaii is all about, what its people are like, and how we could fit into the scheme of things in a gradually global economy and global society.

"Finally, I think we will be remiss if we do not acknowledge that behind Mr. James Young is Libby Young, and it's always been a pleasure to meet her. It's also been a little sad when we cannot help her as much as we would like to, but nonetheless, it's always a pleasure to see both Jim and Libby here and elsewhere, and I am so pleased to see them sitting up front there.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative D. Ige then rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"I've had the privilege of working with James Young for a number of years and I've always respected his vision. A lot of people don't really know that the public television has really positioned themselves very well to be a leader in the Pacific Basin with their strategic plan, and he has been a real key part of that.

"I also wanted to mention the fact that the HITS system has been very instrumental in our public access activities. HITS has been very supportive, in terms of our conducting statewide public hearings, and using the capacity on HITS to really deliver statewide interactive electronic committee hearings, so I also wanted to note that for the record.

"Lastly, I just wanted to note that he is an engineer and engineers somehow tend to stand out for a number of reasons. I would also like to commend Libby for her efforts on behalf of the Windward community.

"Congratulations, and thank you."

Representative Kanoho then rose and stated:

"I would like to add my thanks to our honoree today for all of his achievements already cited, and to also congratulate him as a top engineer with a company called

GTE Hawaiian Telephone, and that we can expect great things coming out of GTE with his presence there.

"Congratulations, Jim."

Representative Tom then rose and stated:

"I just want to let you know that the nominee is married to Libby Young who is one of the finest people around. She happens to be at the Windward Community College which is in my district, and we need money this year. I just want to make sure that her husband's accolades should also go to her, too.

"Thank you."

Representative Young then rose and stated:

"I'm sorry there isn't a conflict of interest here -- my last name being Young. Unfortunately, I'm not related to this wonderful family. I wish I were, and I congratulate them very much.

"I echo the words that were said before about James and, of course, Libby's been just wonderful with Windward Community College in helping us to be all aware of the problems there, and we do wish there would be more money in the budget.

"I will say here that I'm sure Katie, in the years to come, will probably be on the floor of the House being honored for some wonderful achievement.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Beirne then rose and stated:

"I would be remiss, Mr. Speaker, if I did not say anything about the couple that is before us today.

"The old saying is that ... behind every successful man is a good woman, and I would like to share that Libby Young was my professor up there at Windward Community College in journalism, and she certainly has done very much in this field, not only for Windward Community College, but also for public broadcasting.

"Congratulations!"

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 409 was adopted.

At this time, Representative Okamura presented Mr. James Young with a Certificate of Recognition, and floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Ihara, Bunda and Young.

H.R. No. 410, entitled, "HOUSE RESOLUTION COMMENDING AND CONGRATULATING THE PACIFIC AND ASIAN AFFAIRS COUNCIL FOR ITS FORTIETH ANNIVERSARY," was jointly offered by Representatives Taniguchi, Hirono and Say.

Representative Taniguchi moved that H.R. No. 410 be adopted, seconded by Representative Say.

Representative Taniguchi rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, by this resolution, we honor the Pacific and Asian Affairs Council for its achievements in bringing an awareness of international affairs to Hawaii over the last forty years.

"Each year the Council sponsors the visits of diplomats, political leaders, journalists, and scholars passing through

our State. These people share with us their knowledge of cultural, economic, and political events which are shaping our world.

"In the public and private high schools, in the community colleges, and at the University, the Council has worked tirelessly to bring international perspective to the educational curriculum. Through the Council's work, Hawaii's young people have been taught that it is important for their future to have an understanding of events around the globe.

"Mr. Speaker, I urge all members to vote for this resolution."

Representative Hirono then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"When I was going to high school at Kaimuki, I was a member of PAAC, and there is one very vivid convention or PAAC conference that I attended as a high school student, and our entire delegation, I think, from Kaimuki High School all supported the Vietnam War, and I was going to school during the height of the war. I remember encountering a group of students from Roosevelt High School who have been taught by one of their very famous teachers, Setsu Okubo, and their entire delegation was against the Vietnam War.

"It just goes to show that PAAC was even then a forum for the students to express their opinions, and as it turns out, in high school we are very much shaped by the opinions of our teachers and when we encountered the Roosevelt students, we said ... well, they feel that way about the war because of Mrs. Okubo.

"Again, I'm very grateful for the experience with PAAC. I've known Gerald Sumida for many years. I thank him for his commitment to all the discussions that take place with PAAC, and I certainly hope that the students now are perhaps more broad-minded, shall I say, than some of us were when we were going to high school.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Lee then rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"Since my distinguished colleague from the center of Honolulu has spoken about her youth, I think it'll give me the license to do so, saying for my youth, and it goes back pretty far. As a matter of fact, I recall vividly Owen Lattimore and the problems that the Pacific and Asian Affairs Council had at that time during a period of intolerance. And it's always so good to see that history proves that intolerance was intolerance at whatever time it was. In that respect, I really appreciate what the Pacific and Asian Affairs Council has done for students, particularly in my youth, it was students in the college age.

"A more recent memory of what PAAC has done and that was with high school students. My daughter, Kammy Lee, was once an applicant for a scholarship and had a wonderful, wonderful interview with the people from the Pacific and Asian Affairs Council. That confirmed to me that an organization that has such vitality over a long span of years is one that deserves recognition, and I'm so happy to see all of you here today.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward then rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"I would join my colleagues in commending PAAC, the foremost keepers of the international culture of Hawaii.

"Mr. Speaker, when you live in the middle of the Pacific, international relations are ~~the~~ relations of Hawaii, and I commend this group for keeping us focused on international relations and bringing us such renowned international speakers and creating us very international-minded people.

"However, international myopia does set in sometimes in Hawaii. We get accused of being provincial and the person I'm trying to nudge is not here who otherwise people will understand. But, Mr. Speaker, the good that PAAC does sometimes is so broad that we miss the point of it because we forget we are a Pacific and an Asian nation.

"I would commend one of the persons who has committed his life and his time to that -- General Wolff, who not only volunteers his time for PAAC now, but also represents the nation where half of my family lives, as the Consul General of Malaysia, so General ... thank you for giving to the community.

"Mr. Speaker, I would say ... let us continue to think globally as this group directs, but as you direct us to act locally.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Alcon then rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"You know, it makes me very happy, after 29 years, Mr. Speaker, the community colleges are finally given some credit for education. It has been mentioned when we were paying tribute to Mr. Young, and it is also mentioned now when we are paying tribute to the Pacific and Asian Affairs Council. At first, Mr. Speaker, I thought PAAC meant Political Action Committee, but I find that it has a better meaning, and I'm very happy that we are honoring them. Maybe next year, Mr. Speaker, we will honor the community colleges for 30 years of excessiveness.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 410 was adopted.

At this time, Representative Taniguchi rose and introduced the honorees who were seated on the House floor and asked them to stand to be recognized, as follows: Mr. Gerald Sumida, long-time Chairman of PAAC, and a partner in the law firm of Carlsmith Ball and Wichman; Mr. Herbert Wolff, President of PAAC; and Diane Peters-Nguyen, Executive Director.

Representative Taniguchi then presented Mr. Sumida with a Certificate of Recognition and floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Hirono, Kawakami and Say.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Hundreds of us marched the other evening but all the marching and all the talking cannot seem to rid our streets of these merchants of greed.

"It will, unfortunately, be resolved in the chambers of the City Council and in the court system, but the State must do its part and must support the City Council in the fight against the T-shirt vendors, and I think these resolutions at least indicate that the State is supportive of the City's effort. It has been long in coming, and I urge the support of these resolutions.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

We worry about a lot of things that we do not benefit from, but from something that we have benefitted, we just ignore it.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill moves back campaigning from a thousand feet to three hundred feet in our polling places. I believe this is a giant step backwards, however, for the privacy of our voters. At a thousand feet, you had a semblance of privacy. At three hundred feet, basically what we are going to do is have all the polling places look like a waving holiday. Quite frankly, I don't believe the public's going to like that, and even though we've had some constitutional warnings about it, I think using my colleague's term, this is a 'wimp' reaction to it.

"I don't think we want to make billboards out of our polling places, and frankly, this one is conceding to that. I think we can do a better job and by keeping it at a thousand feet, the integrity of the privacy of the voter and at least the aesthetics, in addition to that.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tom then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I just want to state very quickly here that we're trying to conform with the U.S. Supreme Court ruling. Their ruling is really a hundred feet and no more. We went three hundred so we're trying to challenge that but to go beyond that would be very difficult.

"So I'm just saying that we're not doing this because we feel like doing it. It's a Supreme Court ruling that said that we have to adhere to it.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward, in rebuttal, stated:

"I encourage the Judiciary Committee, by putting it threefold. However, if threefold is a challenge, why not go sixfold or sevenfold, and then we've got some substantive distance of separating the people from all of these courted signage. So if we're going to get in trouble at three hundred feet, why don't we make it seven hundred so at least when November comes around, there will at least be peace in the arena.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Alcon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is a good bill. In fact, I look upon it as anti-incumbent because it will permit the neophytes who are running for office to be closer to the polling places, and in that way they can campaign a little more effectively.

"The one thousand feet distance, Mr. Speaker, was a great advantage to all the incumbents because they are already well-known, but this three hundred feet ... I wish that the Chairman of the Judiciary Committee had adopted the federal regulations, but we still have two years to think about it. We don't have a presidential election until 1996.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm rising to speak in favor of Senate Bill 2393, and with some comments that I'm hoping for more in the bill as it goes into conference committee.

"This is the firearms control omnibus bill. On page 6, if the members will look at this, what it will do is starting on July 1, 1995, no person shall be issued a permit for a pistol or a revolver unless the person has some form of education in firearms. But what the minimum requirement is, Mr. Speaker, is a total of at least two hours of classroom instruction which may include a video.

"Mr. Speaker, I call this a 'wimp' course, and I believe it is a 'wimp' course, because if we are going to issue permits for people to be armed -- to have a pistol or a revolver -- those people need to know how to handle those lethal weapons safely.

"What I am proposing, Mr. Speaker, is as this bill goes through to conference committee, that we look at including two-hour field experience, a two-hour course where someone is going to take this weapon and learn how to point it, how to handle it safely, and to make sure that that person is not dangerously armed. And so I hope, Mr. Speaker, as this bill moves into conference committee with the Senate, that we can really put some teeth into what now is a 'wimp' course.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2393, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIREARMS AND DANGEROUS WEAPONS," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Tom, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1155-94) recommending that S.B. No. 2515, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2515, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN

AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE VI, SECTION 4, OF THE HAWAII CONSTITUTION, TO CHANGE THE COMPOSITION OF THE APPOINTEES TO THE JUDICIAL SELECTION COMMISSION," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Tom, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1156-94) recommending that S.B. No. 256, SD 2, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

By unanimous consent, consideration of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1156-94 and S.B. No. 256, SD 2, HD 2, was deferred, and in accordance with Article III, Section 15 of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, printed copies of S.B. No. 256, SD 2, HD 2, were made available to the members of the House at 11:30 o'clock a.m.

THIRD READING

The following bills, which were on the calendar for Third Reading, were read throughout and the following actions taken:

S.B. No. 2366, HD 1:

Representative Ihara moved that S.B. No. 2366, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Thielen rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"When I read the Committee Report, Mr. Speaker, I was really rather surprised because it states that the 'Committee received supporting testimony from the Marine Spill Response Corporation. Testimony was also received from the Department of Taxation, the Tax Foundation of Hawaii, and the Sierra Club, Hawaii Chapter.'

"I assumed that this meant all of these entities were in support of the bill. Well, when I talked to the Sierra Club representative, I learned that, no, the Committee Report was misleading, and the Sierra Club was certainly not in favor of this measure.

"I am concerned on two levels, Mr. Speaker.

"One is that our Committee Reports are really designed to notify members what has gone on in the committee, and to state if there is opposition. Because the members then that have not sat in those committee hearings will be alerted to certain groups, certain organizations, certain departments that may not have wanted this bill to have passed. Unfortunately, that flag did not go up on Standing Committee Report 1093-94.

"What this bill does, Mr. Speaker, is it gives the oil industry a retroactive tax exemption for equipment purchases that were mandated by federal law. The federal law requires the oil industry to purchase this oil spill equipment. The tax break comes to over three hundred thousand dollars.

"When I stop and take a look at what that does and compare that with where three hundred thousand dollars could be used in our State, I really can't support giving the oil industry this kind of a tax break. I would much rather have that three hundred thousand dollars available to help with all of the human service needs that we are facing and having to really struggle to find the dollars to fund those human service programs. Now we're going to be able to give the oil industry three hundred thousand

dollars. I wish we were going to be giving it to the human service programs instead, Mr. Speaker, so I will cast a 'no' vote on this."

Representative Alcon then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"You know, it is better for us, Mr. Speaker, even if we spend three hundred thousand dollars. When we need the equipment, it is readily available instead of waiting for somebody from the West Coast to come over and try to save us. I think the Alaskan spill has taught us a lesson that unless we react immediately, we will not be able to contain the oil spill. Even right now, Mr. Speaker, the people in the affected areas in Alaska are still suffering, so this is a damn good bill, Mr. Speaker.

"Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2366, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO USE TAX," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 6 noes, with Representatives Bainum, Hagino, Hiraki, Hirono, Shon and Thielen voting no, and Representative Peters being excused.

S.B. No. 2378, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, S.B. No. 2378, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE BONDS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Peters being excused.

S.B. No. 2591, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, S.B. No. 2591, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAX CREDITS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Peters being excused.

S.B. No. 2653, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, S.B. No. 2653, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LIQUOR TAX LAW," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Peters being excused.

S.B. No. 2913, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, S.B. No. 2913, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CLAIMS ON WARRANTS NOT PRESENTED AND PROVIDING APPROPRIATIONS THEREFOR," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Peters being excused.

S.B. No. 2964, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, S.B. No. 2964, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE GENERAL EXCISE TAX ON MANUFACTURING AND PRODUCING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Peters being excused.

S.B. No. 2965, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, S.B. No. 2965, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO A STATE GENERATION-SKIPPING TRANSFER TAX,"

passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Peters being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 2366, 2378, 2591, 2653, 2913, 2964 and 2965 had passed Third Reading at 12:27 o'clock p.m.

ANNOUNCEMENT

Representative Nekoba rose and requested waiver of the 48-hour hearing notice requirement for decision-making only on Senate Bill 2837 which was heard on March 29th, and which will be added to the April 5th agenda, in Conference Room 1310, at the end of the regular 9:00 o'clock hearing, and the Chair "so ordered."

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION
(FLOOR PRESENTATION)

H.R. No. 411, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING AND COMMENDING KUALOA-HEEIA ECUMENICAL YOUTH (KEY) PROJECT, MOILIILI COMMUNITY CENTER, PALAMA SETTLEMENT, PARENTS AND CHILDREN TOGETHER (PACT), SUSANNAH WESLEY COMMUNITY CENTER AND WAIKIKI COMMUNITY CENTER FOR THEIR MANY YEARS OF DEDICATED SERVICE TO THE PEOPLE OF HAWAII," was jointly offered by Representatives Chun, Arakaki, Beirne, Hirono, Ihara, Hagino, Bainum, Young, Alcon, Tom and Cachola, and was read by the Clerk.

Representative Chun moved that H.R. No. 411 be adopted, seconded by Representative Arakaki.

Representative Chun rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"Not often enough do we celebrate and recognize the good work of those who dedicate their lives to community development. April 4th through 9th has been proclaimed Community Centers Week by our Governor.

Community centers are an invaluable part of our community, bringing members together in a multitude of positive and meaningful ways. They provide recreational activities for children, youths, and adults that promote team spirit and camaraderie. They provide cultural and artistic enrichment experiences for families and individuals. They provide educational classes for those who want to improve their knowledge base, as well as those who recently arrived to the islands from other countries.

"Community centers continue to provide a host of leadership, character building, and enjoyable programs that hearten our souls, stimulate our minds, and invigorate our bodies. Thousands of people living in Hawaii have been touched by the work of our community centers. Children's lives, including many of us as children, have been shaped and continue to be shaped by the people working and volunteering at these community centers. In this day and age, where we have more single parents and dual working parent households, the role of community centers and the significance of their work is magnified. The children, in their formative years, can play and work together in an environment of an extended family which the centers do provide, where people of all ages interact, nurture and care for one another.

"We honor six community centers today who represent other community centers statewide, like the Boys and Girls Clubs, the YMCAs, the YWCAs, and various other organizations. Each of these centers are doing a tremendous job that prepares, enriches and inspires so many of us to live full, productive and happy lives.

"On behalf of our House of Representatives, Mr. Speaker, and all of us, and the people of Hawaii, congratulations to all of you for your dedicated efforts.

"Thank you."

Representative Arakaki then rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"Representative Chun and I, a couple of weeks ago, had a chance to speak to the YMCA's Model Legislature, and we both have fond memories of the 'Y.' I think we both grew up at the 'Y.' In fact, one of the gentlemen sitting there, Mr. Richard Kato, was my teacher in swimming, and I haven't drowned yet so I guess he did a good job, and he still looks the same. I don't know how he keeps looking so young. But I think a lot of us here have some real fond memories of these community centers, whether we grew up in an urban area, like I did in Kalihi and downtown, or whether you came from Maui, or the Big Island, or Kauai.

"These centers were places where we felt safe, places where we could find friends, places where we could find substitute parents, and in a lot of respects, their challenges today are greater because I think back then, we had a great sense of community and people were more willing to look after each other. Nowadays, with the breakup of the nuclear families, we find we have more single-parent families, we find we have more families where mothers and fathers are busy working two or three jobs, and we find that kids are sometimes either at home by themselves or out in the streets getting into trouble. And so the challenge to many of these community centers, whether they service the elderly, adolescents, or children or even preschoolers, the challenges are very great, in terms of the families that they service.

"I am very happy to say that most of them have a long history. They have a tradition, but they've also been able to be flexible and change according to the times. It's really with a great deal of pleasure that we can honor them for the work that they do on behalf of Hawaii's families, and helping to keep our families strong and flexible as well. It's a real great honor to honor them as well.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Bainum then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to congratulate all the community centers here today, but in particular to speak of the Waikiki Community Center. I can think of no other community center that lives up to its name as does Waikiki Community Center, located in Waikiki, where there's many isolated high-rises. It truly is a center for our community and it does a wonderful job in many, many areas. Gerri Lee, in particular, is a tireless and an inspired leader, and we all appreciate her efforts.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Yonamine then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I wasn't going to say anything except that I worked with all these guys, with all these agencies. I just can't add any more to the excellent comments by Representative Chun, Representative Arakaki, and Representative Bainum, except maybe to point out that, as they've mentioned, community centers are indeed the roots of the community. At the other center, the reconciling center, the center in which people can gather to play, to meet, and do things that just brings more life and vitality to the community.

"So in commending and recognizing these community centers, whether it's Moiliili Community Center -- I grew up in Moiliili -- Susannah Wesley with Kalihi, Palama Settlement with Palama, and the KEY Project in Kahaluu, and even Waikiki Community Center, and even the Parents and Children Together, which is known as the

PACT, in Kalihi ... I think you've done a tremendous job. Keep up the good work, and we're very proud of what you do.

"Thank you."

Representative Beirne then rose and stated:

"We have Richard Kato there from the KEY Project in Kahaluu, the Director of the Kualoa-Heeia Ecumenical Youth Project, and of course, Richard has played a key role in many activities that go along with our community out there.

"Richard, today is a special day of acknowledging your achievements. We want to congratulate you and the rest of your company that you are here with today.

"Keep up the good work ... Kahaluu needs you, Heeia, and all the way down to Kualoa. Richard is also instrumental in being supportive of my family center proposal for a bill, and I'm sure that when it does get off and running, he will be the first to lend his support. Mahalo, Richard Kato.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 411 was adopted.

"Today, there are over one hundred businesses statewide and 650 direct jobs.

"Goal number 2: A desired physical environment.

"This industry truly complements Hawaii's unique environment. Clean, unique and self-sustaining.

"The aquaculture industry is the kind of industry that, with our support and encouragement, will bring us to our preferred future.

"I ask my colleagues to support this measure."

"This measure would appropriate two million dollars in funds for this year. It is an emergency measure to pay overtime costs. Some of the money is apparently for adult correction officers, or guards, who are accused of overtime abuses, and I'm hoping that anyone who does abuse the system does not get paid.

"Unfortunately, as the Committee Report alludes to, the Department has to overstaff guards to avoid expensive overtime, and I feel that the Department should curtail unwarranted overtime rather than hire more bodies to deal with the situation.

"The Director of Public Safety has told us that he wishes one hundred and fifty-two more positions to alleviate the cost of overtime, and I think this is a revolting situation. I think it calls for a reorganization of the system, and I hope that someone could deal with this situation soon.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"If you're cheating the system and the system we are now appropriating two million dollars for, it doesn't seem logical that unless, as my colleague said, that if you are accused of falsely claiming overtime, that this appropriation should not apply to you. It would seem only fair that that be billed into it, and if it is not, I think we are making an error by giving this money to individuals who otherwise wouldn't deserve it.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. Representative Arakaki rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Earlier in the session, back in January, I had a chance to write to both the Attorney General and the Chief of Police, basically because of a concern that I had. I don't know if other communities are noticing, but there has been an increase in the locations and the incidence of graffiti all over the city. I'm not sure how it is on the neighbor islands or in other communities, but in my community in Kalihi, it is very noticeable. And the Police Department did admit that it's an indication that the number of gangs have been growing over the past couple of years. In fact, the ones they're tracking have almost doubled and gang membership -- the ones that they tracked -- is over a thousand individuals, and these are kids from ten years old up to young adults. I guess the argument is going to come down to how much we have, in terms of resources, in order to provide for a gang response system.

"But I think it is important for all of us to realize that, you know, if we don't provide the kinds of prevention programs that these funds provide for -- these are to keep kids out of gangs and to help our law enforcement community to keep track of these gangs -- we're going to have to pay for it in terms of increased criminal activities, drugs, weapons, and eventually, they are going to end up in our criminal justice system in our prisons. So we are going to be paying that money on the backhand anyway.

"So I'd say ... if we're going to have to pay, let's pay up front, keep the kids out of gangs, keep them from damaging our environment, and marring the walls and scenery in our communities. I think there has to be a greater effort, not only from the law enforcement community, but from our programs and our citizens as well.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Chun then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I wanted to mention that in my community as well, there has been a real increase in graffiti, as well as other criminal activity, a lot more burglaries going on, and I know that the good work of the youth service providers that we honored here, as well as the Police Department and other law enforcement agencies, need to be supported by the Legislature.

"I know that the Finance Committee was very generous in its appropriation of five dollars which is an indication that we are quite serious about that. So I appreciate the Finance Committee, first of all, passing this legislation out, and also hope that we do get funding for this at the very end.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair responded:

"Thank you, Representative. I'm sure the Chairman will keep an eye on that."

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION
(FLOOR PRESENTATION)

H.R. No. 412, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING AND COMMENDING THE WAIKIKI LIFELONG LEARNING CENTER FOR THEIR DEDICATED SERVICE TO THE PEOPLE OF HAWAII IN PROMOTING LITERACY AND OPPORTUNITY THROUGHOUT THE COMMUNITY," was jointly offered by Representatives Bainum and Ihara, and was read by the Clerk.

Representative Bainum moved that H.R. No. 412 be adopted, seconded by Representative Ihara.

Representative Bainum rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"I'd like to commend the Waikiki Lifelong Learning Center for their dedication and commitment to the people and industries of Hawaii. This program's achievements go far beyond words. The lives that are touched and the people whose lives are enhanced are an obvious indication of the Center's success.

"A testament to the achievements of the Center can best be expressed by an incident that was described in a newsletter that I read not long ago. It talked about a man who became a student at the Center after an experience at a telephone skills workshop at his workplace. He approached the instructor and he quietly told him he couldn't fill out the form because he couldn't read the questions, and even if the questions were read to him, he couldn't write the answers. At the beginning of his lessons, he couldn't read anything at all and the only writing skill he had was to slowly, painstakingly and often inaccurately, reproduce his name. To make a long story short, the man has been promoted now since emerging from the Center to a position where he has greater responsibility and independence. And more importantly, this man has gained confidence, heightened self-esteem, and is more comfortable communicating now with his co-workers. And for the first time in his life, he is self-sufficient. He lives on his own and he controls his own finances. Now that is what I consider a true success story.

"It is very reassuring to know that the Waikiki Lifelong Learning Center is here to help the over 154,000

individuals in Hawaii who cannot read past the fifth grade level. It gives me, hopefully my colleagues here and the people of Hawaii, hope for a brighter future. And I am truly honored to have them in my district."

Representative Yonamine then rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"I can really attest to the good work of the Lifelong Learning Center because my daughter was on the staff, and from time to time she would come home, very enthusiastic about the exciting things that she's doing at the Center, and she picked all of this up from a very good, dedicated staff which was doing good work, as Representative Bainum had pointed out.

"So I really want to thank you members of the Lifelong Learning Center that sponsors the department, Mr. Nakanelua, and Dean Dolly, for the good work you're doing right now. I commend you all on behalf of the House of Representatives.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"I just realized that I was one of the speakers at the Lifelong Learning Center's conference at the Sheraton just a few weeks ago. And I would commend them for their practical approach and the hands-on opportunities that it gives the people, that no one is at a dead-end job at any of those hotel industries because of what opportunities they have and what I think is the basic American sense of ... if you want to improve yourself, here's an opportunity that is made available.

"Mr. Speaker, I talked about small business and how, if people wanted to start one, here's some of the things you have to do, and there was quite a bit of interest.

"I thank you for inviting me and thank you for being here, and I commend all of you for your hard work.

"Aloha."

Representative Young then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to add my commendation to the group also. I'm pleased to see that the University of Hawaii, College of Education, is working in partnership with the businesses for this. I see lifelong learning and aging as the only way to go versus the other choice that we have, so I really commend all of them.

"Thank you."

Representative Alcon then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, every time we talk about people who are not able to read and write, or illiterate, they always refer to Kalihi. I'm glad that Waikiki is doing well because the people that work in Waikiki are from Kalihi, and I'm glad that they're doing something to help us. For that, thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 412 was adopted.

At this time, Representative Bainum rose and introduced the honorees who were seated on the House floor and asked them to stand to be recognized, as follows:

Dr. John Dolly, Dean of the University of Hawaii, College of Education;

Ms. Charlotte Magaw, "who works in the Room Control at the Aston at the Waikiki Banyan Hotel and has attended both classes and tutorials offered by the Learning Center. Ms. Magaw related to me that she believes her work has really improved as a result of her attendance at the Center, and she has been encouraging all her fellow workers to attend as well";

Mr. Dayton Nakanelua, Director of the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, "and of course the Department works with the small businesses to help with funding and the training of the students";

Mr. Roy Yamamoto, Rooms Division Director of the Hawaiian Regent Hotel, and is representing Mr. Steve Kawagishi, President of Otaka Hotels and Resorts; and

Ms. Noelani Ching, Assistant Director of the Learning Center. "She and the staff of the Learning Center have worked closely with the partners and volunteers to serve the employees of the partners and small businesses in Waikiki.

Representative Bainum then asked Roxanne Burnett of the Aston Hotels; Ms. Arleen Arakaki of the Learning Center staff; Ms. Annette Fujinaka and Ms. Barbara Luckner-Loveless from the College of Education, who were seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized.

A Certificate of Recognition was presented to Dr. Dolly by Representative Bainum, and floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Young, Say, Ishii-Morikami, Chun and Ihara.

At 11:58 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:05 o'clock p.m.

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1156-94 on S.B. No. 256, SD 2, HD 2:

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 256, SD 2, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Tom rose to speak in "strong support" of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, by unanimous vote of all the members present, the House Judiciary Committee now presents to the House a tough, new and sensible approach to the health issues presented by second-hand smoke.

"As we sit here today, there is no State or County guidelines for smoking in private work places, and there is no State or County laws or ordinances which provide for any control over second-hand smoke in restaurants.

"I have read and listened to those who oppose this bill. None has dared, Mr. Speaker, to challenge the indisputable fact that this bill will actually provide relief to non-smokers, and those who worry about the presence

of second-hand smoke where they work and eat. Instead of discussing the merits of this bill, we hear the cries of those who bemoan the loss of their power to override the decisions of the State Legislature.

"The issue of the health of the people of this State is too important to be subject to differing rules and standards from county to county. Why should smokers and non-smokers be treated differently from Maui to Kauai, or from Oahu to the Big Island? What arguments can be proposed to justify this disparate treatment?"

"In the past, Mr. Speaker, when smoking was considered little more than a nuisance and annoyance to others, regulation was left to the counties. But now, when recent research has made it clear and apparent that second-hand smoke is a health issue, policy decisions to protect workers and the public should be treated no different than any other health issue. We are, for good reason, known as the 'Health State' and not the 'Health County.'

"I don't want to see counties adopt or not adopt smoking policies based upon economic competition between counties for the visitor dollar, and I don't think it's good public policy for this body to require businesses to make capital improvements to improve their air quality and, at the same time, permit another jurisdiction to remove the motivation for those improvements.

"It is no secret that many of those who are opposed to this measure before us would like to see cigarettes outlawed altogether. It's always easy to propose a ban on this or a ban on that and a ban, ban, ban, but the Judiciary Committee has recognized that compromise is possible on this issue of second-hand smoke without jeopardizing either the economic health of the State, or the physical health of our residents and visitors.

"This bill requires all private employers with five or more employees to adopt the smoking policy to accommodate their workers. It bans the distribution of tobacco samples within five hundred feet of schools or youth facilities, and it requires restaurants to meet ventilation and indoor air quality standards set by the world's foremost body responsible for developing and setting standards for engineers to use in the design and operation of heating, ventilating, and air-conditioning systems in all types of buildings. Older ASHRAE ventilation standards, as it's known, are an integral part of Hawaii's own ventilation requirements as adopted in Chapter 236 of Title 11, Administrative Rules of the Department of Health, Chapter 39, so that there is no question that ASHRAE ventilation standards have been accepted by our own Department of Health. The purpose of these standards is to set forth in the standards as follows, and I quote: 'To specify minimum ventilation rates and indoor air quality that will be acceptable to human occupants and are intended to minimize the potential for adverse health effects.'

"Mr. Speaker, each year, any restaurant -- any restaurant -- which permits any smoking at all must have a mechanical engineer certified by the Health Department that the restaurant meets these standards. The Health Department can conduct spot checks of such restaurants at any time.

"In summary, Mr. Speaker, adoption of this measure strikes the proper balance and addresses and meets the concerns of smokers, non-smokers, public health professionals, businesses -- large and small -- workers, employers, residents and visitors.

"It is for these reasons that I urge the passage of Senate Bill 256, House Draft 2.

"Thank you."

Representative Shon then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the contents that were just outlined by the Judiciary Chair are steps forward if taken by themselves. However, it's important to realize that the preemption for any county to go beyond these basic standards is definitely not a step forward.

"The first thing to realize about this bill is that it does not impose conformity -- it does not impose conformity. And why is that? Because it does not prevent a restaurant or business from completely banning smoking. The argument that somehow, by the passage of this bill, we have set now a conformed standard across our entire visitor industry, businesses, and whatnot, is simply not true. In fact, in our discussions about this bill, it was pointed out that some businesses are already considering banning smoking in their restaurants so the notion that this prevents an uneven application of health protections is not correct.

"Secondly, it was asserted that this does what we do with all of our health laws -- preempt the counties. That is not true. Many of our counties have health departments, many of our counties have health initiatives ... we do not preempt them.

"Thirdly, it is very common for us in this state legislative level to pass a law for a basic standard and then to allow the councils and the citizens to petition those councils to go beyond that. That is the basic tradition of the interaction of state and county laws. It is very rare for us to say to a county ... you cannot go beyond this basic standard.

"Now, the reason why this is an obvious concern for all those who want to protect health relates to a national trend. The **Wall Street Journal** very recently reported that in the past twelve months, dozens of cities around the country have passed extremely tough non-smoking laws, both stirred by last year's Environmental Protection Agency's report that found second-hand cigarette smoke causes cancer. They quote: 'Local ordinances are by far the most important successes in tobacco control.' At the state and federal level, the tobacco industry is remarkably powerful, and you do not see the kind of successes we see at the local level that's happening nationally. Now, as part of the fight against tough smoking restrictions at the local level, Philip Morris and other tobacco industry spokespersons have been aggressively lobbying at State Capitols to pass laws that preempt restrictive municipal ordinances.

"The fact that the contents of this particular bill may go beyond our existing controls is well outweighed by the fact that no county council will be able to further pursue the protection of the health and the safety of their residents beyond the standards in this bill. They'll have to come back to us. And for all of you who live in areas where residents cannot readily come on down to the Capitol, and for all of us who live in areas where residents happen to work there during the day, and we have all our hearings during the day practically, there is an access issue and a democracy issue that relates to home rule. The county councils have often heard extensive testimony on matters that overlap with the State and go beyond the State standards. We know because this is in the news everyday.

"The reason I believe that the tobacco industry wants this particular provision is that they feel, nationally and

locally, they will have an advantage in short-circuiting efforts at county councils to better protect workers.

"Our health laws and the concept of the 'Health State' is not limited to the people in this room, nor should we limit the efforts of all our citizens and all our Democratic elected bodies. We should encourage every aspect to pursue the health of our citizens and safety of our citizens. If we were to be truly preemptive, we would say ... no business can ban smoking. We don't say that. That would be an absurd assertion. If we were truly committed to this notion that there shall be one law, period, for everybody, we would not allow restaurants to ban smoking. My goodness, that might compromise our tourist industry, but we know it doesn't.

"Examples have been cited where our airlines were ahead of the national airlines in banning smoking on inter-island flights. That turned out to be an economic positive move. Are we going to restrict the counties and the county councils and the citizens who would petition them from pursuing these other avenues? Remember, the language of the bill says those county ordinances are out the window. All the testimony that we received by citizens, by businesses at the county level -- out the window because we decide that we are the only determinants of how best to protect health.

"I believe that this is a cooperative venture, as we move down the road, to understand what does impose on our health and how we can best protect ourselves. Our understanding of smoking has come a long way. We have a long way to go. This is not an issue of ... pass this bill because a ban is a bad idea. This is the issue of whether or not our basic State standard is a preemptive standard or a basic minimum that we encourage all aspects of our society to explore beyond. We are talking about people who work and live in second-hand smoke all day long -- all day long! We are talking about pregnant women who must decide between their health and the health of their prospective child and their job. It is no secret that the City and County of Honolulu has gone beyond the desires of some businesses and other interests. That is a decision made by the elected representatives of the City and County of Honolulu.

"Everytime we dislike a zoning law or other ordinances, are we going to pass a bill to preempt it? I would say that if we do pass this bill, in spite of the worthy contents of greater control, that they will be dancing in the corporate offices of Philip Morris because this is one more victory in the preemptive strategy, and I think it is unwise. If the bill does pass, I urge that the Conference Committee remove that provision.

"Thank you."

Representative Tom, in rebuttal, stated:

"The ordinances apply as of this year to preempt as of January 1, 1994, and no other ordinances."

Representative Duldulao then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"If indeed our mission is to pass sensitive or good legislation, then we must deal with the truth -- what the people like, and what is good for the people of the State. I'm here to present to you the facts and the truth of this matter, Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues.

"As Health Chair, I dealt with a lot of smoking bills before my committee. These bills that I have dealt with are a lot tougher, stricter, and would truly -- would truly -- protect the health of the non-smoker. If we claim today that we are passing a bill that would make history, and

that would be a tough non-smoking bill, that we are being misled. The truth of the matter is that this piece of legislation before us does not really protect the non-smokers.

"I would just like to add that I would urge my colleagues to please use your conscience when you vote up on this bill, and you know what I'm talking about. It's not because we favor special interest groups, but we should pass laws and do our job as legislators, and think what is in the best interest for our constituency. That should be our main objective.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Amaral then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in part I support this measure because I think what it brings to the workplace and to the statewide arena is a sense of predictability at the consistency and policy, as well as the uniformity in how we are going to deal with the issue of smoking.

"I think, Mr. Speaker, that we are poorly served if we define ourselves as needing to limit the purview of the action of this body. I think that what our constituents call upon us to do is to have some vision, and to set goals for the health of the entire State and not to bend to the pressures of certain local constituents. I think the chairman and the committee has tried to take that challenge on with the kind of measure that you see before you today.

"I hope that our colleagues will look closely at the language of this measure that tries very hard to bring into balance the concerns of the medical community, and of the people that are concerned about second-hand smoke, as well as trying to bring some balance to the people that run our hotels and businesses and who are our employers, who walk around constantly asking the question ... what is the ordinance today, and what is the law today with respect to smoking?

"I think it's time for us to begin to define the policy that looks a little further ahead than simply the nose before us.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Bainum then rose and requested that his remarks, in support of the bill, "with grave reservations," be entered into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Bainum's remarks are as follows:

"One, I like many aspects of this bill.

"Two, what I do not like is the preemption aspects of this bill. My hope is that as this bill emerges from conference, this portion of the bill shall be deleted.

"Over 400,000 Americans per year die each year from smoking. Thousands more die from secondary smoke.

"Mr. Speaker, I am concerned about the workers of Hawaii. To those who work in our State's restaurants, their lives could well be in jeopardy if we do not do all we can to mitigate secondary smoke.

"It is my sincere desire that during conference, this measure will emerge even stronger against smoking and without the preemption clause.

"Thank you."

Representative Arakaki rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I understand this is an attempt to compromise some of the concerns regarding smoking in public places, and I admire the Chair of the Judiciary Committee for his skill at crafting compromise solutions to some of the measures before us.

"I just want to cite an observation that I think there are some instances where issues cannot be compromised, and I think we need only to look at the State Capitol renovations which we've been taking major criticism on because of the cost. But you know Mr. Speaker, and our colleagues know, a few years ago we made that decision to spend over forty million dollars to have asbestos removed from the State Capitol. . .

At this point, Representative Okamura interrupted on a point of order and stated:

"Can we have the speaker please contain his remarks to the measure before us."

Representative Arakaki responded:

"My remarks are very pertinent to what is being discussed today."

The Chair then said:

"Well, please get on with your point, Representative."

Representative Arakaki continued, saying:

"The point is that we made that decision to spend that amount of money -- a major sum -- basically because of the health and safety concerns, not only the citizenry who use the State Capitol, but many of us and our workers as well. And I found out that one of the major reasons why it cost so much was because it's painstaking to remove the asbestos because of the workers being at risk of breathing in the asbestos, and it couldn't be done on a floor by floor basis because of that. Maybe some people can't see the connection because they realize that asbestos is a very harmful product, but I think more and more, like one of our colleagues pointed out, the Center for Disease Control is likening second-hand smoke as just as dangerous as the asbestos. I think eventually that point will be made.

"But it comes down to ... why should we compromise the health and safety of our citizenry? And I think when it comes to our children, when it comes to either kamaainas or malihinis, the health and safety of our people cannot be compromised.

"Thank you."

Representative D. Ige then rose to note his support of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"I do have some concerns about the preemption of the county authority, and I hope that it can be deleted in conference. If it is not, then I probably will be voting 'no' on Third Reading."

Representative Alcon then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Will the Clerk note that the statements of previous speakers who are opposed to this bill also reflect my own feeling. In addition, Mr. Speaker, I would like to add some.

"Mr. Speaker, this is the first time that I am in tune with my colleagues here, going in the opposite direction. I am speaking, Mr. Speaker, in opposition to this bill because of the fact that it is an anti-home rule, anti-small business, anti-freedom of choice, and anti-everything.

"Mr. Speaker, you know, if we let this thing go through whereby we have to preempt the rights of the counties, there is another bill that is supposed to be before us and that's the fireworks bill, and it is also preempting all the rights of what is left of the counties anyway.

"Mr. Speaker, there are a lot of people who talk about second-hand smoking or second-hand smoke. They don't have to stay. They can always go away. But it's nice for them to have second-hand smoke so that they get immuned to it. That's why we worry about immunities, Mr. Speaker, because of the fact that we try to stay too clean, so we lose our immunity for some of the diseases that we are afraid of, and for those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I urge all of you to please turn this down."

Representative Santiago then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I just want to briefly mention, as Representative D. Ige before me, although I would have voted with reservations, I feel so strongly about the preempted clause that if it is taken out in conference, because I don't believe that those of us who are voting no have received enough numbers to kill this bill, if the preempted clause is taken out, my final vote will be unequivocally in support of it because I do want to acknowledge the efforts put forth by the Judiciary Committee.

"I think it's fine for the State to set a thought in process and indicate to the counties what we would like to see them do, but I do believe in the home rule concept, and I think it is something that is so important for us to respect that I am going to have to vote no on this measure.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 256, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SMOKING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 35 ayes to 13 noes, with Representatives Alcon, Arakaki, Chun, Duldulao, Hagino, Hiraki, Isbell, Lee, Nekoba, Pepper, Santiago, Shon and Takumi voting no, and Representatives Herkes, Menor and Takamine being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 256 had passed Third Reading at 1:32 o'clock p.m.

"Basically, Mr. Speaker, my point is that if our colleagues would look at what is happening out there in the rural communities, they will find that these kinds of pilot programs have lots of merit and funding should be set aside to keep it going.

"Thank you very much."

We're going the other way right now. We're actually looking to cutting the Capital Loan Program to fund other programs because of the tight money situation.

"This is just a red flag to say ... hey, this might cost us more money. It might be a good idea, but we would rather see it done privately than through the State.

"Thank you."

For years, the Judicial Selection Commission has been providing six names for every vacancy and that meant there would be five rejects for every appointment. Many very well-qualified people kind of were like cannon fodder. Their names were put forward many, many times and rejected as many times. I think the self-esteem of many have suffered from these multiple rejections, so with a fewer number of people nominated, there will be fewer rejections. As a matter of fact, I had a bill to reduce the number to three and that would have even resulted in fewer rejections.

"But another reason and more important that a lower number is desirable is that it would reduce the workload of the Judicial Selection Commission. This is a voluntary commission but it works very long and hard hours, so I heartily endorse this measure and hope that the House draft prevails through conference and then to reality.

"I would expect that if this does pass, we will see the commission nominate a lower number of people. In other words, four rather than six, and time will tell.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2294, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE JUDICIARY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes, with Representatives Herkes, Menor and Takamine being excused.

"The only reason why I'm speaking against it is that inasmuch as it gets very smoky during New Year's, the reason I'm speaking against it is that it is also preempting the rights of the counties.

"Thank you."

Representative D. Ige then rose and stated:

"I just wanted to provide my support with reservations

"I do have problems with the provisions for preemption of the counties. I do believe if a county wanted to totally ban fireworks, that they ought to be able to do that.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. S.B. No. 1605, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, S.B. No. 1605, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO

LIABILITY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes, with Representatives Herkes, Menor and Takamine being excused.

S.B. No. 2393, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Ihara moved that S.B. No. 2393, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Tom rose to speak "in strong support" of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, through personal experience as a former deputy prosecutor, I saw the terrible consequences of the criminal or careless use of firearms. The indelible memories of the grief and suffering inflicted upon the families and friends of gunshot victims left me determined to use whatever influence I have to prevent further tragedies from occurring.

"As a legislator, Mr. Speaker, I've supported and continue to support laws which offer real progress to the battle against senseless violence. Through the years, this Legislature has created the toughest gun control laws of any state in the union. For example, for carrying a loaded gun in a car, the penalty is ten years in jail. For carrying an unloaded handgun without a license, the penalty is ten years in jail. We require background checks anytime someone seeks a permit to acquire a rifle, shotgun, or pistol.

"Now, Mr. Speaker, after review and amendment of seven bills sent over by the Senate, the House Judiciary Committee is proud to present to this body a comprehensive, omnibus firearms control bill. For the first time in this nation, a state Legislature is poised to adopt a measure which will mandate that those who wish to purchase a handgun must complete a course in the safe use and storage of firearms. We will impose absolute liability upon the owner of a handgun for any damages caused by his weapon. We will require the registration of all rifles, shotguns, and pistols whenever they are purchased or acquired. We will authorize immediate seizure of all firearms and ammunitions from those who threaten injury to any person. We will prohibit the possession of any weapon by a person who is dependent upon or abusing drugs or alcohol.

"I urge my colleagues to study this bill carefully. The members of the Judiciary Committee have done so, and the fourteen members present unanimously voted to support the passage of this measure. The Committee realizes that no bill is perfect, Mr. Speaker. We were not able to include a provision requiring training at a firing range because, very frankly, law enforcement advised us that the facilities were unavailable, but this does not discourage me for the education provision we do have makes us the first state in the nation to take this progressive and sensible step. This education requirement, in combination with the proposal for absolute liability, will cause many people to reconsider their decision to purchase a firearm. We have developed a public/private partnership for safety, training and education unique to the United States.

"Mr. Speaker, I want to address the critics, the media, who have disparaged the arguments I have made against including a ban on handgun purchases in this bill. I clearly stated at decision-making my reasons for believing that a ban on the purchase of handguns is an experiment which will leave violence and tragedy in its wake. Not once was my argument reported that a ban will create a new, dangerous, and completely unregulated black market in handguns. I ask those critics ... how will the police be able to keep track of handguns if their purchase goes

underground? How many needless deaths will be caused because every neighborhood will have an illegal supply of handguns ready for purchase -- no questions asked, no waiting period necessary, no training needed? To believe this won't happen is to ignore the harsh reality of life. As I have stated before, we may live in Paradise but we don't live in Utopia. We must deal with the practical realities of the world we live in and adopt policies which will work, not those that sound good on paper.

"Finally, Mr. Speaker, I'd like to give a special thanks to you, to House leadership, and to the members of the Judiciary Committee. Together, we have crafted a proposal which, I believe, will become a model for the nation.

"I urge every member of this House to follow the unanimous recommendation of the Judiciary Committee, and for the safety of every member of our community, adopt this omnibus firearms control bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Alcon rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to vote yes, with reservations, on this bill for the simple reason that we are making criminals of legal gun owners. We are requiring them to undergo some training that they already have.

"And also, the best thing that could be done and it has been done before, Mr. Speaker, is to provide amnesty for illegal gun holders although I still feel that, regardless of what we do, the criminals will still be loaded with guns.

"Thank you."

Representative Amaral then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, unfortunately, part of my background has been to deal, as the first responding officer, with far too many cases of the abuse of firearms and, in the not too distant past in my life, had to deal with the families left behind as a result of the poor handling of firearms. So it is quite often that my natural reaction to support any control that we can have on the existence of firearms. I will say that the law enforcement community has made it clear they were hoping that our Committee would go much farther in the control of firearms. But I think the Chairman of the Judiciary Committee has met a very fair standard in working on the amendments of this particular provision.

"There are a number of things I find especially exciting about this measure. One is the firearms training portion. Far too often, people purchase weapons with no idea of how to store it properly, and no idea of how to handle it properly. I've seen people that have purchased weapons that involve the use of a magazine, or a clip, and didn't even know how to remove the magazine from a gun. It frankly made me wonder why they even bought the thing. I especially like, and I think we're the first state to propose that this kind of measure be in the law.

"The other thing that I have to say is one of the best things about this bill is the control of firearms for any person having either an ex parte or a temporary restraining order out against them. At a time when far too many victims die with a temporary restraining order in their hands, and that restraining order has carried no protection for them, then I think we need the protection of removing weapons from persons that have threatened other individuals, or have restraining orders or ex parte orders against them.

"I hope my colleagues will support this measure also.

"Thank you."

Representative M. Ige then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I support firearms control, but I must note today that it's really not the guns -- it's people.

"Mr. Speaker, I believe the passage of this measure will lull the community into a false sense of security, believing that we have taken care of crime when, in fact, we have not.

"Mr. Speaker, graffiti seems to be on the rise in our communities. Yesterday, it was mentioned on this floor that quite possibly gang activities have also dramatically been on the rise ... two drive-by shootings in recent months. This, in my mind, is a clear indication that crime, if left unanswered, will forever change the complexion of our State.

"In voting no on this measure, I hope that we will be able to prioritize, to sacrifice today, investing more in crime prevention programs, youth gangs, juvenile delinquency, the development of quality, meaningful youth jobs -- an investment that will ultimately reduce crime in our communities.

"In these times, we do not have the luxury of trying to satisfy everyone. We must set priorities. We must clearly define our goals, our direction, and move forward.

"I sincerely hope that later in the session, I will be able to support this measure as a part of a comprehensive anti-crime package for this State.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2393, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIREARMS AND DANGEROUS WEAPONS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 1 no, with Representative M. Ige voting no, and Representatives Herkes, Menor and Takamine being excused.

Representative Thielen rose to speak "in strong support" of the resolutions, stating:

"I want to again thank our former Chair of the Water, Land Use Committee, Representative Hagino, for his strong leadership in setting the Mount Olomana situation on the right track. Again, I remember back to that night when his car broke down. In fact, I drove him back over to Honolulu after the long community hearing. But he came out to the community -- the whole committee came out to the community -- and I really appreciated our going to the community rather than asking them to come down to the Capitol. We held a lengthy hearing where all of the different people testified as to the strong, compelling justification for preserving Mount Olomana for all of Hawaii's residents.

"That bill then went on forward and was passed, ultimately vetoed by the Governor, but we turned around and achieved our objective directly with the former Board of Land and Natural Resources Chairperson, William Paty.

"We did do a lot of work. Many people came before us in this struggle, people have joined us since, and we now are sitting here with a measure that is saying to the State ... let's complete the negotiations. Let's get Mount Olomana into public ownership so everyone that drives to and from the Windward side can look at that scene of beauty, realizing that it is protected forever.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"Makaha 'Ohana' Project includes areas like the Waipahu Adult Community School, the Head Start Program, the Family Literacy Program, and the Leeward Community College which provides staff and training."

Representative Yonamine introduced members of the Workers' Comp Task Force, comprised of the Building Industry Association of Hawaii and related associations, a very active group for the workers' comp reform.

Representative Kanoho then rose and stated:

"Although they have been appropriately recognized, I want to thank all of those who have come to support the workers' comp reform, in particular, in support of the efforts that the House has attempted to initiate for its workers' comp reform."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm very glad to see that you also are wearing one of these badges on your shirt, and I am delighted to see that. I would also like to welcome all of the people who have taken time off to come here today to tell us that we must have workers' compensation reform NOW!

"Thank you all for being here."

Representative Alcon then rose and stated:

"Among the people that came over to ask for workers' compensation reform are people from Kalihi, so I would also like to acknowledge them."

Representative Cachola then introduced Wally Miura, Elroy Chun, Debbie Mudd and Audrey Hidani from Kalihi, and asked them to stand to be recognized.

Representative Lee then asked "the young lady representing Mililani," to stand to be recognized.

ORDER OF THE DAY

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION (FLOOR PRESENTATION)

H.R. No. 413, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING AND HONORING MONTE ITO FOR 56 YEARS OF SERVICE TO THE SPORTS LOVING PEOPLE OF HAWAII," was jointly offered by Representatives Tanimoto and Lee, and was read by the Clerk.

Representative Lee moved that H.R. No. 413 be adopted, seconded by Representative D. Ige.

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"All of us sponsor floor presentations, mainly of individuals and organizations near to us, whether in our districts or who have contributed significant achievements to the community or to the entire State.

"Today, we are going to recognize and honor an individual who has had an extraordinarily remarkable career over 56 years. His achievements are described in the resolution and I will not speak about them. I will speak about the person who has touched my life. As you know, each of us has been influenced one way or another by outstanding individuals who are not members of the family. These individuals include teachers, friends, acquaintances, co-workers, or whoever has had an impact on our lives.

"With Monte Ito, he was the person who inspired me to write. Strange as it may seem, he was already at the **Honolulu Advertiser** with the great sportswriters of that generation, and perhaps in the history of journalism in Hawaii, and among his colleagues were Red McQueen, Dan McGuire and Andrew Mitsukado. But Monte has been there until March 31, 1994, with the **Honolulu Advertiser** for over fifty years, writing about all the great moments in Hawaii's sports history, as well as the small moments like his Dawn Patrol which has been out every week for over 66 years, playing golf in all the different courses throughout the island.

"Now, why and how did Monte touch my life?

"I used to cover sports events at the old Honolulu Stadium, the termite-ridden, wooden stadium. I was the legman. I brought back the box scores. The **Advertiser**, in those days, was printed at 10:00 p.m. They always

held up the last story -- the biggest event. There were no television, very little radio, and everyone, the next morning, will buy the **Advertiser** to find out what happened at the Stadium, whether it was a baseball game, or at old Civic Auditorium when there was a basketball game. I brought the box scores and gave Monte a description of what happened and he would sit there with his old Underwood typewriter and peck away. In three minutes, he would have the story ready. He gave it to me to read and then it went into the paper which we read the next morning.

"I marveled at how this person who came out of the **Hawaii Hochi** was able to write English so elegantly, so succinctly, and to tell what happened of an event he never personally saw. He relied on me as his eyes and ears and a reporter, and I marveled how quickly he did it, and I decided I would like to do the same, too. I was only fourteen at that time, and he inspired me to be the writer that I think I would like to be, and I want to thank him today.

"For that reason, it is a personal note in our youth, as Representative Hirono has alluded to a few days ago, and I draw back to my youth to tell you about a history of Hawaii, the history of journalism in a specialized area, perhaps in sports, but writing knows no bounds be it sports, politics, or what else, and Monte was the finest craftsman that I have ever seen anywhere. He was a real local boy from Puunene."

Representative Tanimoto then rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"You know, it's really miraculous when a person can stay in a career for fifty-plus six years of writing -- 56 years in total. I always say, when you get up in the morning and if it's hard to come to work, it's time to change. But for the twenty-five or thirty years I've known Monte, since I was at the University or just prior to getting there, he always had that pleasant look like work was a wonderful thing to come to, especially writing about golf I think was one of his favorite pastimes. I know him as the Captain of the Dawn Patrol when he took the writers out to the golf courses early in the morning to do some inspection.

"But I know, from the stories I've heard, being somewhat of a younger person than Monte, about the inspiration he was to many writers and motivation for others to continue and pursue being a sportswriter or writer in general. Monte has covered so many of sports most famous kinds of activities, but I know that there's a couple of special moments in his life, and I believe it was when Ted 'Chico' Makalena won the Hawaiian Open in 1966, and Monte did a fantastic job of covering it. I think that maybe David Ishii's golf victory in the Hawaiian Open was also a special moment for Monte and again, you know, he's written something about me as being the first guy going to the NCAA, representing the University of Hawaii, and he has been accredited with being one of the most accurate writers in Hawaii because he comes personally, belly to belly, to all the golf people and contestants.

"I feel honored to have been a part of several parts of his life in which many, many people have honored him, and one in particular was in 1990 when he was inducted into the PGA, or the Golf Hall of Fame. Also back in 1975, I was still an active participant in the golf world and the National Public Links Team which I had the honor of representing Hawaii three times, but in 1975, when we did have the national championship on the island of Kauai, Monte was also honored there by the National Public Links group and particularly those from Hawaii.

"So Monte, as you know, besides being a great sportswriter, has really taken golf in this State to where it is because of his commitment, his love for the game, but Monte, you still have that terrible putting stroke. Oh, no, excuse me ... you have that 'wonderful' putting stroke. You know, I show up at the tournament and they tell me, 'Monte's your partner.' I said, 'Don't worry, Monte, as long as you can putt, we will have a wonderful time,' and a wonderful putter he was.

"Only one mistake, Monte, you put that I went to the University in 1956, and I went to the NCAA that year. My dear friends always thought that, gee, I started in 1956 and I graduated in 1967. They know I went to school a long time, Monte, but not that long.

"But again, it's a pleasure to speak up for this resolution, and I cannot think of a more worthy gentleman to be called the 'Godfather of Hawaii Sportswriters.'

"Thank you."

Representative Young then rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"It's difficult for me to let this opportunity go by because although I haven't seen Monte recently, my memories go back many, many years, almost to the start of his career. In fact, when I was a teenager and I began playing golf, and I was one of Walter Negroski's junior golfers, though I never made the headlines -- I was never good enough -- it was something to look forward to because Monte always wrote about the junior golfers, always gave us more play than most people would. I was really pleased to always wake up in the morning and read what he had to say about the matches that we played. He played a big part in those too few brief years that I did participate in tournament golf, and I always looked forward to his columns, and I commend him for his excellent work all these years. I'm really pleased that we are honoring him, Representative Lee.

"Thank you."

"Excuse me, Representative, you're bordering on the basis of it being partisan. Will you please speak to the merits of the resolution rather than on the basis of it being partisan. Please proceed."

"That's exactly my point, Mr. Speaker.

"The resolution now will have broad-based representation, and it will be a non-partisanship representation. The members that will be the steering committee that will be involved in developing 'benchmarks' to accomplish the strategic vision of the State will be a non-partisan group, Mr. Speaker.

"For that reason, I support the resolution."
