INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

H.C.R. No. 2, requesting the Governor to address the Legislature assembled in joint session on Monday, January 22, 1996 at 10:00 a.m. in the Chambers of the House of Representatives, was jointly offered by Representatives Souki, P. Oshiro, Okamura, Amaral, Arakaki, Ward and Thielen.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Ward and carried, H.C.R. No. 2 was adopted.

At 10:32 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At this time, the members of the House and their guests were entertained by the Makaha Sons and Chinky Mahoe's Kawaili'ula.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:45 o'clock a.m.

At this time, the Chair delivered his Opening Day remarks, as follows:

"Governor Ben Cayetano, Lt. Governor Mazie Hirono, Chief Justice Moon, members of the Congress -- very pleased to see you here; county council chairs, distinguished guests, colleagues of the State House; and the 'Speaker' of my own house -- my lovely wife, Frances -- aloha

"Before I go on, I also want to pay respect to the delegation from Fukuoka Prefecture, Japan, led by Representative Tanaka.

"It's great to be back at the Capitol! This majestic building with its unique design symbolizes the history and culture of our islands and our open door policy of government.

"Take a look at this magnificent chamber. It is designed to represent the volcanoes that created our islands ... to represent growth, change -- and rebirth -- to remind us that government is constantly evolving to meet the changing needs of our people.

"As elected officials, we are only temporary tenants here. The institution that this building represents will one day be the responsibility of our children. Remember ... it is the children's future that will be affected by the decisions that we make here.

"What better way, then, to reopen the State Legislature than by recognizing the efforts of Ke Ala Hoku, which means the pathway of the star.

"In 1995, over six thousand students looked forward and asked, how can we chart the right course for Hawaii? Their voice was soon joined by thousands of others in the community, with divergent background and philosophies. The result was a blueprint for Hawaii's future, with measurable benchmarks to gauge progress.

"This morning, two students from the Youth Steering Committee of Ke Ala Hoku -- our future leaders -- are with us. Please stand and be recognized Ms. Jeannele Macey and Mr. Mike Gscheidle.

"Let me read in part from the Preamble of Ke Ala Hoku:

'The youth of Hawaii have spoken -- the voyage must begin now, and all of the people of Hawaii must work together to say on course to reach this destination. Open your mind and envision the future of Hawaii as the youth see it.'

"So let us do just that: Envision the future through the eyes of our youth.

"There are many problems on the minds of young people. Their education. The cost of living. Getting meaningful work. Protection of our environment. Breaking the web of drugs and crime. In other words, will Hawaii's future be their future?

"They may well ask: Is government relevant?

"More and more people ask if government is focusing on the right things. Is it self-critical? Does it change with the times and position us for tomorrow? Younger people in particular wonder if government is more interested in protecting special interests than protecting their future.

"And all of us wonder, in our desire to take on too many challenges, have we failed to recognize the limits of government? Is our will to do the right thing out of balance with the resources we have to do it? If we're on a path which leads to mortgaging away our children's future, we have an obligation to change course. We must remember that the burning star of Ke Ala Hoku is the future.

"Today, I will touch on actions which are practical, with short-term benefits and long-term impacts. They recognize our limited resources, they call for partnership, and they ask everyone to give a little.

"Let's start with something as basic as the cost of living. We can offer consumers a way to reduce one of their major expenses -- automobile insurance.

"We will introduce a bill that gives people a choice in auto insurance. They can have the lower premiums and increased coverage. Or they can have the option to sue and the amount of coverage they want. Or they can choose to drive without insurance and take their chances. Each choice carries its own risks and benefits. And each will have its price. It will be up to the consumer.

"Perhaps just as importantly, this new system will do something we tried very hard to do in 1995. It will eliminate the fraud, false claims, and frivolous lawsuits that have made Hawaii the second most expensive State in the nation for automobile insurance.

"Let's now consider the larger economic picture.

"We are an island. We require the inflow of capital for economic stability. We have a product. We sell it all over the world and it brings in new capital, and that product is tourism.

"Right now, our single greatest priority in developing this product is to make sure that our investment in the convention center pays off. We've worked long and hard to reach this point. Together with the travel industry, we must complete the center quickly, promote it energetically, and make it the most successful facility of its kind in the Pacific Basin.

"In addition, we must support our promotional efforts by working with the federal government to obtain waivers requiring visas from emerging markets like Korea and Taiwan. We are competing for the market on a global basis. We need green lights, not red ones.

"Let's also make it easier for businesses to do business in Hawaii. Let's systematically review the departmental procedures for approvals, licenses, and permits to reduce red tape and shorten the time for approval.

"In the area of education, our public schools need to be revitalized. We must bring the full power of citizenship and partnership to our schools.

"The students tell us that they don't feel safe in their own schools. It's tragic when anti-social elements turn what should be the joyful experience of learning into a real fear of physical danger.

"To restore a proper environment on school campuses, we will introduce legislation this session that gives principals the authority to expel students who threaten others or engage in violent or abusive behavior.

"Over 70 percent of our students do not graduate from college. Given the needs of the private sector for a trained work force, we will support improvements in school-to-work transition programs. I applaud the work of the Transition Advisory Committee, now working with Leeward schools to bridge the gap between learning and working. Applied knowledge is a critical element in successful public education.

"So, too, is individual citizenship. Parents and other members of the community are needed to help our schools move forward. This year we will introduce legislation which limits personal liability, making it possible for more people to volunteer their services in our schools.

"No single educational issue is a greater test of changing times than the Hawaiian Language Immersion Program. The demand for it has grown enormously at a time when the traditional financial resources are limited. I ask that the Legislature, the Department and Board of Education, OHA, Hawaiian organizations and the business community come together around this issue. We need to join forces around a long-term plan.

"We must also remember that a great state needs great institutions of higher learning. Because of the severity of recent cuts, we are in danger of losing this essential resource. Such a loss would be a threat to our children's future. The House of Representatives is opposed to further cuts to higher education.

"We cannot offer visitors or residents the quality of life they deserve while crime is on the increase.

"The public is fed up with crime. They don't want dangerous people on the streets.

"There is a direct link between the growth of violent crime and the ice epidemic. This drug is especially dangerous because the users believe they are invulnerable and commit the most violent of crimes. We must stiffen the penalties for production, sale and use of ice. "There is an alarming growth in serious crimes being committed by juveniles. We must lower the age from 16 to 14 at which a family court judge may waive jurisdiction of a juvenile in order to be tried and sentenced as an adult for serious crimes.

"Regarding adult crimes, the public must not be endangered by the premature release of dangerous felons. Hawaii's prisons are already too crowded to keep all our prisoners. And it will only get worse. To protect public safety, we have no choice but to add more high and medium security beds in this state.

"I also recognize the need for increased drug prevention programs. I propose that a percentage of asset forfeiture monies be used to support them.

"Regarding housing, the state can no longer attempt to make everyone a homeowner. Indeed the direction must be to deregulate and lift government-mandated affordable housing requirements. Let the marketplace do the job.

"At the same time, we must increase our efforts to spur the development of rental housing. Government must take steps to ensure that all Hawaii's people have shelter.

"We will seek improved efficiency by consolidating the Housing Finance and Development Corporation and the Hawaii Housing Authority into a single agency.

"Turning to welfare, we must rethink the level of government intervention in people's lives -- and the division between government and personal responsibility. There's a big difference between good intentions ... and good policy.

"Government does have a responsibility to be there for those who are out of work, out of a home, and out of options. But government help should be a springboard to self-sufficiency, not a destination.

"Government's role should be to facilitate the move from welfare to independent living. That means creating incentives that encourage able-bodied adults to return to work.

"Let's work to reform the welfare system to:

- * Utilize family, community and government resources;
- * Create work opportunities;
- * Establish minimum work requirements; and
- * Set incentives to become self-sufficient.

"Today, it might be said that the biggest issue of government is government itself.

"I expect when the Governor delivers his State of the State address, we will hear a discussion of financial policy and his view of where his administration wants to take government. Knowing the Governor, I expect it to be a practical vision, undaunted by the hard choices.

"In the quest to make government operations more productive and efficient, I offer these suggestions.

"One, let us determine those state activities which no longer demand government involvement. Then eliminate them. The days of across-the-board reductions as a budget fix have passed. The real issue is priorities.

"Two, support the most efficient use of technology to improve communication between government and the

public, reduce the cost of paperwork and improve the information flow between government agencies.

"And three, in addition to efforts to control the cost of government, we need to examine the viability of a state 'rainy day fund.' This fund would be used only when our economy is so crippled that it threatens basic government services.

"Is government relevant?

"Yes, if we are not afraid to ask the question.

"Yes, if we recognize the limits of government.

"Yes, if we focus on issues instead of personalities.

"And yes, if we all work together.

"In closing, I would like to end my remarks by again quoting from Ke Ala Hoku:

'Our vision of the future will become a reality with the support of the community, business, and government. Let this vision be our guiding star as we raise the sails together and voyage toward this future.'

"Members, we cannot disappoint our children. Let's get to work.

"Thank you."

The Chair then recognized Representative Okamura, Majority Leader, who responded:

"Mr. Speaker, Governor Cayetano, Lt. Governor Hirono, United States Senator Akaka, Congresswoman Mink, my good friend Congressman Neil Abercrombie, Chief Justice Moon, distinguished guests, family and friends ... on behalf of the Majority members of the State House of Representatives, I bid you all Aloha ... and welcome to our House.

"Mr. Speaker, I rise this morning with a sense of reverence and a heart of joy, at once again being back in our legislative home, the house of the people, our State Capitol.

"I am pleased this morning to hear that this House, under your leadership and wisdom, has chosen to listen to the voices of our youth, and has welcomed to our chamber, two of the brightest of these young stars. As the youth of Ke Ala Hoku themselves have written, who better to help chart our course to the future than those who will be living in it!

"Mr. Speaker, as pleased as we are to see these young faces brighten our day, we are saddened that one of our own is unable to share in this joy. I speak of the late Representative from Kalihi -- our friend, our colleague, and dedicated servant of the people -- the Honorable Emilio Alcon. While we all mourn his passing, I feel that his spirit is still with us, guiding and assisting us in our charge and responsibilities.

"And to this end, allow me, Mr. Speaker, to extend, on behalf of yourself and all the members of this body, our official welcome to the newest member of our House, Representative Felipe 'Jun' Abinsay.

"Mr. Speaker, as you have stated, there are many challenges facing us as we begin this session.

"I stand before you today, to inform you that your Majority members are ready, indeed anxious, to proceed with the task which is before us.

"We are prepared to engage the community and our colleagues in forthright discussion, to forge consensus from disparity, to set priorities, to develop public-private partnerships, and to make tough, realistic decisions. In short, we are prepared to meet the challenge.

"Our efforts this session, however, must go beyond simply meeting today's needs. While our constituency fully expects that we will respond to the priority issues and concerns of our community, they also ask for something more.

"Mr. Speaker, the people of Hawaii desire a vision, a plan, a blueprint, that shows the way and charts the course toward a safer, healthier, more harmonious society.

"Mr. Speaker, as you know, during the latter part of December your Policy Subcommittee on Vision, chaired by Representative Annelle Amaral, and ably assisted by co-chairs Representative Ed Case and Representative Marcus Oshiro organized a set of facilitated discussions to define a vision, establish outcomes, and set legislative priorities.

"To you, Mr. Speaker, for your support of this process, and to the chairs of the sub-committee, I say 'Mahalo' for a job well done.

"This exciting and thought-inspiring process was open to all members of the Majority Caucus, and resulted in the development of consensus around a number of important legislative initiatives to advance a shared vision.

"What we seek, Mr. Speaker, are a number of simple things, things which when taken together, provide us with comfort, confidence and hope for our future:

- * A school and community environment that is free of fear and intimidation;
- * A job market and economy that is ripe with opportunities;
- * A social safety net that cares for those who cannot care for themselves, and restores self-sufficiency to those who are able-bodied;
- * An environment in harmony with sustainable uses and community values;
- A community that treats substance and family abuse as a social concern before it becomes a criminal one;
 and
- * A government which is responsive, efficient, and, yes, Mr. Speaker, relevant!

"This is the course we wish to chart; and which, through a partnership of business, labor, government and the community, we can and must achieve.

"Mr. Speaker, we look to the wisdom of your thoughts and the compassion of your heart. We will open our House and extend our hand to all who wish to participate. We will place public interest above special interest. And we will work as one, to attain this vision and bring peace, harmony and hope to these special islands that we call home.

"Mr. Speaker, your Majority members are ready. Let us commence!

"Thank you."

The Chair then recognized Representative Ward, Minority Leader, who responded:

"Governor Cayetano, Lt. Governor Mazie Hirono, Chief Justice Moon, members of Congress, Mr. Speaker, former Governor Ariyoshi, and previously elected officials who have been here in the past, my fellow Representatives, spouses, and guests:

"Welcome back to the place of the people ... a sacred, momentous day -- Aloha!

"This is your place, but on this day, when I cut my teeth as a freshman, war was declared. It was January 17, 1991.

"Here we are, five years later, and another war has been declared, and that's on the budget. We have run out of money!

"We have almost a \$200 million budget deficit facing us, Mr. Speaker, and a very skeptical public wondering where did all the money go.

"Confucius said, 'The first thing you should do when you find yourself in a hole is to stop digging.' Clearly this is the session when we must stop and admit that excessive spending has put us in the hole where we are today, and though some would blame it on the economy, it only allowed us to get caught. The economy allowed us to get caught in what we are doing in our spending.

"Mr. Speaker, Republicans want to chart the course for the 21st century.

"I heard you and the Majority Leader say, we have a vision, we will rely upon the youth. Your Republican Minority offers you a road map. We offer you a chart for the 21st century, for the long haul for the people of Hawaii.

"First, we are encouraged by the opportunities that these hard times offer. We can get back the common sense, we can get back the government by accountability. And, after all, Mr. Speaker, looking into the history of Hawaii, the Republicans have been the authors of much of the paradigms shifts in the past. We are the ones who now promote an idea and find it picked up by the opposing party. And even you, Mr. Speaker, sounded like Newt Gingrich when you talked about work fare, you talked about technology, you used the P-word by saying we want to have efficient government. That's competition in government, that's privatization, that's renewing America, which the Majority Party, our party, is saying that we have to change America to make us a unique and prosperous land. And, what had the Governor of our State, Ben Cayetano, been doing this past year that earned him the title of 'Republicrat'? What did he do? It is our Republican philosophy and principles that he and the State of Hawaii are increasingly relying upon. And there's no magic, it's as simple as three words --BECAUSE THEY WORK. That's the key. What's practical, what's common sense, what's accountable.

"So, Mr. Speaker, we are challenged by these hard times. We take it as a challenge and an encouragement and offer these six navigational charts to take Hawaii into the 21st century:

"The first chart is an attitudinal chart -- 'THE BEST IS YET TO COME.'

"The first chart which is an attitudinal chart says 'the best is yet to come' because we should never accept the notion that Hawaii's best days are behind us. Some of

you who have come to ask for money have been told, 'Look, we're out of money, we're never going to reach the pinnacle that we had in the past.'

"We must never say to Hawaii's people, be they poor, be they middle class, be they young, be they old, that 'your time has passed, and you must either move to the mainland or lower your expectations if you are going to stay in paradise.' That's not the price of paradise that the Republicans were writing about. This body, this government -- and I see a lot of department heads -- must rid ourselves of the thinking that if you want to get ahead in Hawaii is the equivalent of being put on the wait list of the Hawaiian Homestead. You either die waiting, or die of a broken heart, and that's not what we want to do with the people of Hawaii. We want to remake Hawaii the opportunity society that every one of our predecessors that stood here in the House of Representatives and in the Senate said ... that's the hallmark of Hawaii, an opportunity society. We want to give everybody who tries the best chance to make the best that they are. And that's what the first chart says, Mr. Speaker. We are world class, we have world class potential -- THE BEST IS YET TO COME!

"Now, for practical purposes, the second chart says we must grow our economy and energize business. In the colloquial, it's the economy, stupid!

"House Republicans believe it's time to stop growing government and unleash the entrepreneurial energies of our private sector. We have 85 out of every 100 jobs coming out of the private sector. We've got the best of Tokyo, Manila, Washington, New York, Samoa -- wherever -- we've got the best entrepreneurs in the world right under our midst. We've got to unleash the energy.

"Mr. Speaker, a true 'Thumbs Up Hawaii' would be not higher taxes and not more regulations, but lower taxes and lower regulations that the Republicans are calling for.

"I was pleased, Mr. Speaker, to hear you say 'well, let's get rid of the red tape, the bureaucracy, and let's get around the regulations.' That is well and good but it needs the political will to back it up, Mr. Speaker, and I am glad that you said that you intend to do that.

"Our legislative proposals will cut 30 percent off of workers' compensation and no-fault insurance, eliminate capital gains if you invest in Hawaii ... you invest outside which not only is brain drain, but we have a capital drain, that we are losing all of our base of money. We're saying, you invest in Hawaii, we're going to take off that 10 percent capital gains tax. We're also saying if we want to look towards Asia for the future sources of growth, then we want to make sure that when we get those visitors from Taiwan and Korea, that they've got lower landing fees, Mr. Speaker, when they come to our airport.

"One last note about the economy. Please read OUR lips: NO GAMBLING IN HAWAII! We don't buy, we don't endorse, we don't believe those fancy mainland radio ads that say, 'Why go to college when you can win the lottery?' Mr. Speaker, we don't want that broadcasting over our radio stations. This is a 'fiscal elixir' that we are flirting with, but more and more it smells like snake oil and we don't think the people of Hawaii are going to put it on their suntanning on the beaches of Waikiki or otherwise.

"So let's not let gambling dominate this session and get us off track ... no endorsement of horse racing. On the same token, I would personally add, let's not let the Supreme Court intimidate us into using government as the vehicle of the 3 percent to change the marital habits of the 97 percent.

The third chart, if we are to stay on course to the 21st century, we must have competition in government, Mr. Speaker, the P-word you used.

"Competition in government is breaking out all over the world -- from Russia to Hungary, to parts on the mainland and all over. Yet Hawaii stubbornly resist the cost efficiency and the savings that implicitly are made. I am glad that you alluded to doing that and I hope you follow through with it, Mr. Speaker.

"But some suggestions we have. We want to make that as part of the prevailing state policy, that before we do anything, we say, well, can it be done by the private sector? Mean it and then in effect, do it! We as a caucus will offer you, Mr. Speaker, blueprints for the privatization of such manini things like the printing of the Hawaii Revised Statutes to such horrendous profit-making and cost-saving things as privatization of the prisons. We are calling upon the private sector for the planning, building and running of our prisons, Mr. Speaker. And though you, interestingly, have called for a new bed space, medium security or what otherwise you have said, we are saying, for the same money we are currently paying to 'deport' prisoners to Texas and Connecticut, we could build and maintain private prisons right here. And what's the Republican difference by saying that from what you said, Mr. Speaker? Your tax dollars stay here, encouraging and supporting Hawaii's economy!

"The fourth chart into the 21st century. We must deter crime and increase public safety.

"The Mayor of Honolulu often cites a thief in Waikiki that committed 135 crimes and has not been put in jail once. Mr. Speaker, and I am going to put this one to you, many of your followers have said, we have no other options but to be soft on crime. The consequences of such a stance are getting more obvious and more obvious. There is no correlation between crime and punishment in Hawaii any longer.

"Republicans are opposed to further cuts in punishment, Mr. Speaker -- further cuts in punishment. City Prosecutor Keith Kaneshiro has said that the jail door is not a revolving door, it is an open door. A typical thief will commit 200 burglaries before he will get caught and will probably never go to jail.

"So, Mr. Speaker, in addition to creating more bed space with private prisons, Republicans are introducing bills to create detention centers and boot camps that will keep criminals off the streets, while at the same time providing rehabilitation for their drug needs and other training needs.

"Fifthly, the chart into the 21st century, we must lower the cost of living in Hawaii by providing consumer choice in health care and auto insurance.

"It's time to make 'no-fault' our fault, if we don't pass it this session. We offer a bill that fixes the dilemma that we are in, in addition to introducing medi-saver accounts where people are accountable for their health, and the savings that they get when they stay healthy, they can put it into their own retirement plans.

"Lastly, Mr. Speaker, all charts to the future say that we must restore accountability in government and leadership.

"House Republicans want our behavior as government servants to mirror these hallowed halls, this august

surroundings, that we would do this session what is right, what is true, and what is best for the people of Hawaii that sent us here. In essence of the Hawaiian sense of place, I quote it by saying, we should be at our best in such august surroundings to the taxpayers who paid probably \$74 million.

"Now, House Republicans are calling for three costsaving measures and getting government back to accountability.

"We're first calling for the abolishment of the 'High 3' retirement system. No more fattening of legislators as they are put out to pasture. We are also calling for an elected attorney general, we are also calling for term limits for elected officials. As you've said, these seats don't belong to us, they belong to the people.

"In summary and in conclusion, Mr. Speaker, House Republicans are ready to set the course for the 21st century, and we firmly believe we are headed in the direction that the people of Hawaii are going. Today is the day we put our oars into the water, and we invite you, Mr. Speaker, and your Majority to join us. Clearly, if we follow these six charts, these road maps into the future, clearly, THE BEST IS YET TO COME for all of Hawaii Nei.

No. 8, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION CONGRATULATING AND RECOGNIZING THE MEMBERS AND DIRECTORS OF THE PEARL CITY HIGH SCHOOL MARCHING AND CONCERT BAND FOR THEIR ROLE AS AMBASSADORS OF THE STATE OF HAWAII," was jointly offered by Representatives Takai, Yonamine and Takumi and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative Takai, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, H.R. No. 8 was adopted.

Representative Takai rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"As an alumnus of Pearl City High School and now as a State Representative for that community, I am particularly proud, along with my colleagues in this distinguished body, to honor and recognize the accomplishments of the Pearl City High School Band and its Band Director, Mr. Michael Nakasone.

"As ambassadors of the State of Hawaii, the Band recently had the greatest honor on New Year's Day when they opened the 1996 Rose Bowl Parade. This Band, as a representative of our beautiful State, has the distinction of being the very first band to open the parade throughout the rich history of the Rose Bowl.

"Besides the accolades received by the Marching Band, Pearl City's Concert Band has been internationally recognized. The Concert Band was the 1992 recipient of the prestigious and internationally-recognized John Philip Sousa Foundation Sudler 'Flag of Honor' award, the highest international recognition of excellence in concert performance by a high school band.

"Behind the spotlight and the attention that this band has received is a truly remarkable teacher. Mr. Michael Nakasone, the school's band director of 18 years, was recognized in 1995 as one of the ten best band directors in the nation by the Band World Legion of Honor.

"Most recently, Mr. Nakasone was honored with the 1996 Teacher of the Year award by the Department of Education.

"Mr. Nakasone began his band directing career at Wahiawa Intermediate in 1968 after earning a master's degree in music education from the University of Hawaii at Manoa. Following a four-year term as Mililani High School's band director, Mr. Nakasone started his incredible 18-year career at Pearl City.

"As Pearl City High School celebrates its 25th anniversary, we are especially proud to recognize one of the school's and this State's truly remarkable teachers.

"Today, we are privileged to have with us the following," and introduced Mr. Michael Nakasone, Band Director, his wife, Brenda; Mr. Thomas Kamisato, Band Director; Shawn Wakumoto, Student Band President; and David Hirano, Drum Major, who were seated on the House floor.

The honorees rose to be recognized.

Representative Takai then asked Mr. Mark Yasuda, Band Booster Club President; Mr. Gerald Suyama, Principal of Pearl City High School; and more than 200 members of the Pearl City High School Marching Band, who were seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized.

Representative Yonamine then rose and stated:

"Fellow colleagues, this morning we are honoring the Pearl City High School bands, the members of the Bands, and 'The Man.' As Representative Takai mentioned, you have seen them at the Rose Bowl Parade, and they have performed in many, many settings and performances throughout the year.

"This Band Program has always been the 'Gifted and Talented Program' in the public schools, long before this term was coined.

"The Pearl City Band epitomizes the highest standards of excellence in musicianship, and it has achieved the highest honor in the State, National and in the international level.

"First the Band -- the Marching Band and the Concert Band. The Marching Band is more than a Marching Band. You have seen them at the UH halftime shows ... it is a showmanship band, it is spectacular. It is more than marching; it is a rich mixture of showmanship, stunning array of flags, props, colors, difficult music, cannons firing, precision dancing, banners galore, and also featuring other groups too. This makes the show entertaining and a highlight of UH home games every year. It is a spectacular sight; it is a three-ring circus ... Barnum and Bailey actually pales in comparison, believe you me!

"The show gets bigger and better; it is always creative and innovative. Mr. Nakasone, Mr. Kamisato, and the volunteer staff, the very dedicated Band Boosters Club, and many volunteers willingly help to make this extravaganza possible.

"You know when the school is opening every September because you hear the band practice throughout the summer, but more so, you know the school year is about to begin when you hear them practice Sunday evenings.

"The Concert Band has achieved the highest honors. Adjudicators from the mainland have always given superior ratings to this Band. As the resolution notes, the Concert Band has achieved the highest award nationally and has culminated its efforts with an appearance with the highest, most prestigious convention in the world, in Chicago.

"The most extremely difficult pieces are played by these outstanding musicians, and the music becomes alive and engulfs you. Believe you me when you hear the Concert Band, this is 'chicken skin' time!

"This Band becomes alive not because of a magic wand, but because of the wand, the baton, of 'the man' who orchestrates, directs, interprets, inspires, demands, and brings pride and a sense of real accomplishment and satisfaction to the students.

"And now 'the man.' Why was he chosen State Teacher of the Year?

"Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, Mr. Nakasone is first and foremost an extraordinary teacher. He is dedicated, hard working, and totally committed to his students and the Band Program. He sets a personal example for his students, and I marvel at his conscientious efforts beyond the call of duty.

"He understands students. He is a motivator. He inspires students. He encourages them to higher levels of achievement. And, above all, he demands and expects the highest standards of excellence. He sets high goals for himself. Through long hours of practices, he instills discipline, builds confidence, improves students' playing skills, and deepens their appreciation for music. He is simply a tremendous direction and pace setter, and his energy level has hardly diminished over the years, even though he is getting older, as he told me.

"The Pearl City Cultural Arts Auditorium was constructed to showcase the outstanding Pearl City Bands. He has envisioned this auditorium to be used by other programs in the high school as well as by the complex, district schools, community organizations, and special interest groups on Oahu. It is now a reality, thanks to all of your help, and especially the help of the House Leadership. This auditorium was officially opened on November 19, 1995. This is indeed the 'House that Mike built.'

"I cannot overstate our strong admiration for his personal and professional sense of self and strong sense of well-being which enables him to do so much and so well for the students. He truly deserves the recognition and our appreciation of his work.

"And members of the Band, we thank you for making him look good. Without you, you know where he'd be -probably teaching at Kahoolawe or someplace.

"Behind and in front of him is Brenda Nakasone whose unwavering support has enabled Mike Nakasone to excel. She has volunteered in so many ways all these years, and has helped his cause immeasurably. She truly exemplifies the person who is always there as a caring and helpful wife, parent, and Band booster.

"Mr. Tommy Kamisato, the very able Band Director who works side by side with Mr. Nakasone to keep up the good work.

"And to you, the President of the Band, Shawn Wakumoto ... by the way, my daughter was also President of the Band ... and to the Drum Major, David Hirano, thank you for assuming this leadership role in the Band. Keep up the good work!

"Mr. Speaker, on behalf of Representative Takai, Representative Takumi and myself as the Pearl City Representatives, we want to congratulate you, members of the Band, the Band Boosters, Mr. Nakasone and Mr. Gerald Suyama, Principal of Pearl City High School, for your support of the Band throughout the years. And members of the Band, keep up the good work, and thank you for making all of us so very proud of the public schools.

"Thank you."

Representative Takumi then rose and stated:

"Unlike my colleague to my right here, I and Representative Yonamine did not graduate from Pearl City High School. Unfortunately, the school didn't exist when we went to high school, so it shows you the generation gap, I guess, but it doesn't take away from the fact that all three of us who represent the district are very proud of the accomplishments of the Pearl City High School Band under the leadership of Mike Nakasone.

"I particularly want to point out the contributions that the parents and the Band Boosters make to this endeavor because we all know without the parents and the Booster Club, this thing wouldn't go anywhere.

"I would also again like to add my congratulations to Mike and everybody involved, and I would just like to say that you not only have made Pearl City proud, but the entire State of Hawaii.

"Thank you."

Representative Chang then rose and stated:

"Many of you might not know but Mike is a graduate of Hilo High School, a couple of years older than I, and he had a terrific rock and roll band. I also belonged to a band, and we kind of looked up to them as one of the best that Hilo ever produced.

At 9:55 o'clock a.m., the House of Representatives stood in recess, subject to the call of the Chair, to meet in Joint Session with the Senate, in accordance with House Concurrent Resolution No. 2, to receive the Governor's State of the State address.

JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the House of Representatives and the Senate was called to order at 10:09 o'clock a.m. by the Honorable Joseph Souki, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

At this time, the Speaker welcomed and introduced the following distinguished guests to the members of the Eighteenth Legislature:

Ms. Samantha Cayetano, daughter of Governor Cayetano;

Lt. Governor Mazie Hirono

Floral leis were presented to Lt. Governor Hirono by Representative Dennis Arakaki and Senator Les Ihara, Jr.

The Honorable Ronald T.Y. Moon, Chief Justice of the State Supreme Court

A floral lei was presented to Chief Justice Moon by Senator Malama Solomon.

The Honorable Jeremy Harris, Mayor, City and County of Honolulu, and Mrs. Harris;

The Honorable Stephen Yamashiro, Mayor, County of

The Honorable Keiko Bonk-Abramson, Council Chair, Hawaii County;

The Honorable Ron Kouchi, Council Chair, Kauai County; and

Major General Jan Wepster, Deputy Commander, U.S. Army, Pacific.

The Speaker appointed Representatives P. Oshiro, Okamura and Ward, and Senators McCartney, Baker and Liu to escort the Honorable Benjamin J. Cayetano, Governor of the State of Hawaii, to the rostrum.

Representative Amaral and Senator Ikeda presented Governor Cayetano with an ilima lei and a maile lei on behalf of the House of Representatives and Senate, respectively.

The Speaker then presented to the members of the Eighteenth Legislature and guests, the Honorable Benjamin J. Cayetano, stating:

"Members of the Eighteenth Legislature, ladies and gentlemen, please join me in extending our warmest aloha and welcome to the Governor of the State of Hawaii, the Honorable Benjamin J. Cayetano."

The Governor addressed the Joint Session, as follows:

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. I was wondering if Earl Anzai is here. Some of you may have noticed his

new hair style. I just wanted to say that the rumor that we are shipping him off to Texas is untrue.

"Good morning and aloha.

"Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, members of the State Legislature, Lt. Governor Hirono, Chief Justice Moon, Mayors Harris and Yamashiro, members of the City and County Councils, members of the Consular Corps, our friends from the military, honored guests, my fellow citizens:

"Before I begin my second State of the State address, I want to thank my family, my friends, my hardworking cabinet for the support they gave me over the past year. They were there when I needed them and I will never forget it. In my first State of the State address, I focused almost entirely on the State's budget crisis. This morning, I ask for your indulgence as my address will be a bit longer than last year's. I intend to cover a bit more

"My administration took office in the midst of the longest economic slump in Hawaii's history. We found ourselves facing the worst fiscal crisis in our State's history.

"After only 45 days in office, we were forced to take action, and we did. First, we cut spending. I gave education the highest priority. The Department of Education was cut only 3.1 percent, the University of Hawaii 8.9 percent, while most other departments experienced cuts ranging from 10 to 22 percent.

"Second, fourteen programs were eliminated and many others were downsized.

"Third, we abolished nearly 1,200 jobs, including 600 warm bodies.

"It was not easy. It was painful. It had to be done, and we did it. Today, there are 2,750 fewer employees in the Executive Branch of the State government than there were one year ago.

"State spending has fallen for the first time in years. Today, the State spends less than it did in 1993.

"We have made good progress toward restructuring. I want to give you some examples.

- * The Department of Accounting and General Services has cut the average building time for a classroom by one-third. We think we can do better with your help.
- * The Department of Health, with Transportation and Land and Natural Resources, developed a team approach to permit approvals. In four months, they cleared up a \$400 million backlog in federal Clean Water permits for construction. One of these projects was the \$78 million Ford Island Causeway. Two weeks ago, ground for this project was broken.
- * We cut sick leave and overtime abuse at the prisons, and at Halawa alone, we saved \$1 million in overtime costs.
- * Our Tax Department has been innovative, streamlining the filing process with a one-page individual income tax form. Tax information is now on the Internet. Electronic filing of a tax return is now being developed.
- * Our libraries -- also innovative. Using technology, our libraries have increased by more than seven

times the newspapers and magazines local readers can access. There's some wonderful stories at the library. It tells you a little bit about what the human spirit can do when called upon. The Kailua Library, for example, used the innovative self-directed work team approach. This is the approach where the janitor will help the person at the counter, and the person at the counter will help the janitor when time permits. And using that approach, with less people the Kailua Library increased its reader output from one thousand to two thousand books a day. Today, library hours have been restored to what they were before the fiscal crisis.

* We have also just implemented a pilot program to put all State bid notices, requests for proposals, and other legal notices on the Internet. When fully implemented, it will save the taxpayers millions of dollars in newspaper advertising costs.

"Now, let me turn to our current efforts to deal with the budget crisis.

- * We propose to consolidate or eliminate State boards, commissions and other bodies which we believe are unnecessary or outmoded.
- * We propose to abolish the Hawaii Labor Relations Board, the old HPERB, the Board of Human Services, the Fisheries Coordinating Council, and other outmoded bodies.
- * We propose to abolish the State Office of Planning and the Office of Children and Youth, moving their necessary functions to appropriate departments.
- * We propose to phase out the Land Court.
- * We propose a single Office of Housing. This will consolidate the Hawaii Housing Authority, the Housing Finance Development Corporation, and the Rental Housing Trust Fund.
- * We propose that the Hawaii Labor and Industrial Relation Appeals Board be restructured so that each member of the three-member panel can hear cases singularly. This is to reduce their backlog of cases.
- * We propose to reform our Civil Service System.

"No other event demonstrated the need for reform more than the recent layoffs of 600 State employees last year. The specter of mostly young and oftentimes excellent State workers being bumped solely on the basis of seniority could be defended, I suppose, thirty years ago when the individual worker had few legal rights to defend him or herself from ruthless employers. Then, seniority was a useful and much needed right. It makes little sense for us today to let this practice continue.

"If we want to make government better, we must reform the Civil Service System to include merit along with seniority as a factor in determining an employee's rights. In this connection, I am truly pleased to know that the Hawaii State Teachers Association and the University of Hawaii Professional Assembly have publicly expressed their support for a merit-based system. To the unions, I say, we are ready and willing to work with you and the Legislature in considering these reforms.

"I cannot tell you today that our fiscal crisis is over. But we are in a better position than we were one year ago. Working together, I think we will do better again next year. We have submitted our financial plan. It has been carefully constructed. If you disagree with our recommendations, we are open to your ideas.

"But in order to avoid massive layoffs, you must replace spending cuts or revenue increases, dollar for dollar. For example, our proposal to save \$47 million through a one-time payroll lag has been criticized. That \$47 million represents approximately 1,300 State jobs.

"We will join and we applaud both the House and Senate in your effort to establish a "rainy day" fund. This is something that is long overdue and we're happy to join you. We have a constitutional duty to balance the budget. Working together, I know we can do it.

"Let me now turn to discuss some of the priorities of my administration.

"Our ability to fulfill our dreams and meet our responsibilities -- for social services, to protect the environment, to offer each child a quality education -- are all tied in to the strength of our economy. That is why restoring economic momentum is my top priority. I will be releasing a report entitled, "Restoring Hawaii's Economic Momentum," prepared by Dr. Seiji Naya. This report covers comprehensively our economic development plan. I urge you to read it because my address today, although extensive, will not be able to cover everything.

"State government cannot spend itself into early recovery. That is a lesson that we have learned. Our hope for economic recovery must come from the private sector. It is the private sector which must be the primary stimulus to the economy, providing jobs and income to our people.

"There are some good signs. Presently, tourism seems to be rebounding. Japanese visitors are returning in greater numbers. And the economic recovery on the mainland should give us yet another boost.

"But much more must be done. Our challenge is to adjust government policies to allow the private sector to recapture its momentum. The first major change is one of attitude toward business. The State government must be a facilitator for the economy and not just a regulator. This requires a major change in the historical 'us against them' attitude. Government, business, and labor must develop a new attitude of partnership and cooperation. We have begun that process.

"Let me talk about some of our industries.

"Construction. To help the construction industry, we have increased our efficiency in processing permits. In some areas, we have reduced delays for public building projects by at least one-third. These reforms have allowed me to release nearly \$600 million in State capital improvements for schools and other infrastructure by the end of this fiscal year. These reforms will also reduce project costs in the private sector and provide more jobs.

"Housing. We will redefine our housing policy to get the State out of the business of competing with the private sector. The State's main housing responsibility must be to increase rental housing and shelter for the disadvantaged, those whose housing needs are not being met by the private sector.

"In addition to restructuring our housing policy, we will provide incentives to private developers to build rental housing in joint developments with counties, mutual housing associations and non-profit organizations. And we will end the State's well-intended but failed so-called 60-40 affordable housing rule and leave it to the counties to negotiate such details with each developer.

"Workers' compensation. We will press our efforts to bring down the cost of workers' compensation. We propose setting up a non-profit domestic mutual insurance company, owned and run by the businesses now in the assigned risk pool. This concept has been successfully used in other states to lower the cost of workers' compensation. We believe it can work in Hawaii.

"Automobile insurance -- one of the hot topics last year. I hope it's not too hot this year. Changes in our workers' compensation medical fee schedule are already reducing automobile insurance premiums. Recently, AIG, a major automobile insurance company, announced it would reduce premiums by 25 percent. We have our own proposal, and I hope to work with Senator Holt and Representative Menor in developing a package that's agreed to by everyone. We will propose automobile insurance reform that preserves the right of injured persons to seek just redress while reducing premiums by 35 to 40 percent.

"Hawaii cannot be a major player in the global economy without first-rate telecommunications. When I took office one year ago, Hawaii had one wired-based telecommunications company. It was a monopoly. You. . Representative Herkes I believe it was, and I want to congratulate him, introduced a bill to start the process of deregulation. We agreed and we supported that. You passed that bill, and today, one year later, Hawaii has three wire-based and three wireless telecommunications companies. As a result, our local banks have financed approximately \$1 billion -- we think it's more -- but \$1 billion for telecommunications infrastructure development.

"Next year, we expect to have a choice of telephone carriers and potentially experience 30 percent lower consumer costs. Within three years, we expect to have complete statewide telecommunications service with satellite and fiber optic links across the Pacific to Asia. This will give Hawaii the capability of being part of the global economy and becoming a major player in the Asia-Pacific region. All of this was accomplished without spending one State dollar. We, the Executive Branch and you the Legislature, did it by simply changing our State law to free up competition. It's a great example of what we can do even when we do not have money.

"Last month, two dozen small Hawaii companies were able to sell nearly \$1 million worth of made-in-Hawaii products in just two hours through the cable telemarketer QVC. The QVC officials said it was the most successful sale of products ever. This experience tells us that there is a high demand for made-in-Hawaii products on the mainland United States. We will help market these products.

"But even more promising for Hawaii products and Hawaii's professional services is the huge and rapidly growing Asia-Pacific market. We talk about this a lot, but few truly understand its magnitude and potential. Let's talk about the biggest nation and that economy -- China, 1.2 billion people, huge Guandong Province. I have never heard of Guandong Province until last year, believe it or not. That Province has 71 million people -- more than France or Italy or England. And yet, most of us know more about France, Italy and England than we do about Guandong Province. It has been estimated that China needs to spend \$800 billion over the next decade to build an infrastructure to support a developed economy.

"China is a huge market but it is only a part of the Asian-Pacific market. American companies are there. Motorola, for example, expects that one-half to two-thirds of its future business will be from this market alone. We in Hawaii need to prepare ourselves to find our niches in this huge Asia-Pacific market, and we can do it for our

products and for our professional people, and we are already there.

"GTE Hawaiian Telephone, Hawaiian Electric, Bank of Hawaii are already doing business in the Philippines. Our architects, our engineers, our resort developers are being solicited to help develop infrastructure in several provinces in China. Our people are doing things all over the world and we in government don't know too much about it. Well, we need to help them. To encourage our local firms to go after this business, to expand the opportunities in the Asia-Pacific market, we are introducing legislation which we hope you will support to eliminate the General Excise Tax for certain exporters of professional services.

"Let's take the private sector investment. We need private sector creativity and investment if we are to increase our capacity for future growth. The State simply does not have the resources or the ability to do it all alone. We must create the appropriate business climate to make this happen.

"Therefore, we intend to come to you to change the Enterprise Zone law, to enhance the Enterprise Zone program by modifying the restrictive rules to create high-value jobs in knowledge-based industries such as health care and technology.

"Of course, the engine that drives our economy is tourism, and we must continue to assist the private sector to market Hawaii as a world-class destination resort. In this connection, the State's \$350 million investment in the Convention Center will play a critical role in attracting professional and business visitors. It will fix Hawaii as a world-class business destination beyond the turn of the century. More importantly, it will provide a vast array of benefits, including more jobs, investment, and trade. As Governor, I will take every step to ensure that the Convention Center will open on time, as planned.

"Honolulu's waterfront from Kewalo Basin to Keehi Lagoon has long been acknowledged as Oahu's premier untapped asset. Progress by past administrations has been made on the waterfront, including the Aloha Tower Marketplace and the Kakaako Waterfront Park. I want to see the day when Hawaii's people can walk from end to end along the waterfront. As they stroll along, they would pass green grass with tree-shaded benches, glistening beaches, and inviting shops and restaurants. At Honolulu Harbor, they could stop to watch a bustling commercial harbor. Adjoining the Kakaako Waterfront, they could visit a world class aquarium. At Keehi Lagoon, they would see a water sports center with world championships in kayaking, sculling and canoeing. Development of Honolulu's waterfront is an important part of our efforts to restore economic momentum and we would like your you to support us.

"I believe Hawaii can be the health care center of the Pacific. As you know, we recently hosted the Mayo Clinic in an effort to get them to establish a presence in Hawaii. We will continue our efforts to develop a health industry which services the people of Hawaii and the Pacific Rim. But the private sector is already ahead of us and we must help them. Private hospitals such as Straub, Queens and Kuakini have already launched similar initiatives. They understand what the market is like out there. Straub, for example, has brought in the world reknown Joslin Diabetes Center of Boston. We will support their efforts and we will launch our own initiatives.

"Science and technology. Another promising area of economic growth for the State of Hawaii. Many don't realize it but we already have substantial assets:

- * The leading center for astronomy in the Northern Hemisphere is on Mauna Kea.
- * The most powerful super computer in the U.S. for imaging is at the Maui High Performance Computing Center.
- * The Pacific Missile Range Facility on Kauai is the most advanced high-tech center in the world for surface, air, and underwater naval training.
- * The University of Hawaii houses one of the leading ocean research programs in the world.
- * Next month, we will dedicate the Pacific Disaster Center in Kihei. It will be the first link in a world network of disaster centers.

"We must build on these assets to develop high-tech programs and businesses. To develop a strategy for the best use of our resources, I am forming a Governor's Task Force on Science and Technology, and I have asked the Lt. Governor Hirono to chair that task force.

"Kapolei, the Second City. I am committed to making the Second City of Kapolei a vibrant center to live, to work, to learn. The development of Kapolei will improve the quality of life for all Oahu residents. Housing in Kapolei is affordable and will continue to be affordable. When jobs go to Kapolei, traffic congestion in Honolulu will be reduced and people will be able to live close to where they work.

"The University of Hawaii at West Oahu is an integral part of the dream of Kapolei. As you know, we recently completed a land exchange agreement with the Campbell Estate for a site in Kapolei. In exchange for 58 acres at the Hawaii Raceway Park, the State will receive 950 acres for the new campus. This exchange will make it possible for the State to build the West Oahu campus without draining funding from other UH campuses. West Oahu will serve not only the people of Leeward/Central Oahu—the fastest growing area in the State—but our entire State and the people of the Pacific Rim. With your approval of the land exchange and with your approval of the funding mechanism that we will be submitting to you, we will build this campus without any general fund appropriation.

"Let me turn now to the neighbor islands.

"Clearly in our push for economic development, we recognize the overriding importance of our neighbor islands. I have begun discussions with the Mayors of the counties to deal with important issues which affect their respective counties. We are taking steps to ease the pain of structural dislocations caused by the phase-out of sugar and pineapple, and to encourage the transition to new We are encouraging investment in economic bases. forestry, diversified agriculture and cultivation of energyproducing crops, and perhaps the building, by the private sector, of a minimum security prison on the Big Island. Already, several private firms have expressed interest not only in commercial forestry, but also in building the prison. And I am engaged with Mayor Yamashiro in discussing these matters to the fullest and finding out ways in which the State and the County of Hawaii can work together.

"While I am on the business of prisons, let me digress for a minute. It is not in my prepared text. But we, and I know you are concerned about prisons, will expand the facilities at Waiawa. We will put people who have drug addiction problems in Waiawa, expanding the current program from 37 people to 200. Mayor Harris of the City

and County of Honolulu graciously offered to help us build this facility and, Mr. Mayor, I accept your offer.

"One last thought on the neighbor islands, and there are so many issues which affect the neighbor islands, of course, but we know that we need to promote tourism -- the visitor industry -- on the neighbor islands, and we will do all we can to help by building airport facilities which will allow direct international flights to those islands, and we will work with the counties in doing this.

"Let me now touch briefly on other important issues -the environment. When I got elected, I appointed a
member of the Sierra Club to head the Department of
Land and Natural Resources. Everybody was a little
worried ... he turned out okay. He has convinced me
that part of our challenge is to protect our natural
resources, our endangered species, our land and water.
The other is to manage and improve renewable resources
-- our forests, oceans, parks and beaches -- for the longterm access, enjoyment and public benefit.

"He has developed, and I agree and I support this project, a 'string of pearls', a State park system with at least one major wilderness park on each island -- Na Pali on Kauai, Kaena and Ka Iwi on Oahu, Makena on Maui, and the Kona Coast on the Big Island. We ask for your support in making this string of pearls State park system a reality.

"One of the most troubling issues that has faced us, a very difficult and complex issue, is welfare reform. We will submit to you a welfare reform package that insists on individual and family responsibility and that provides opportunities to build self-reliance and self-sufficiency. Last year, we instituted a work requirement for the Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) Program. It generated some controversy. We had no choice because the dollars were scarce. But as a result of this program, the number of those employed has increased more than four times, and the number of those who have gotten off AFDC is twice what it was last year. It seems to me that we are on the right track.

"Last year, we also began a new Public-Private Employment Partnership that asks private sector employers to participate with the State in expanding job training programs. We will build on this effort which provides employers with motivated workers who can, with some help, exit the welfare rolls.

"A tragedy a few days ago on Kauai focus on the Department of Hawaiian Homes. Let me state that as Governor I believe that it is important that we do everything we can to provide native Hawaiians with homestead lots and lands. Last year we proposed, and you agreed, a \$600 million settlement of the Hawaiian Home Lands claims. This means that for each of the next 20 years, the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands will receive \$30 million to develop their lands for the Hawaiian people. In order to speed up the process even further, we propose making available lands in Hawaii Finance and Development Corporation projects in Kapolei, Leialii, Lahama and Kealakehe in Kailua-Kona to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands. The good thing about this proposal is that we accomplished two things: First, we provide land with infrastructure to a department which is hungry for such land, which has a waiting list that is too long. Second, we addressed the problem of the \$30 million a year payment. We feel that this is very, very promising and we hope that when we come down with our package to make these transitions that you will support us.

"Education has always been my highest priority. Our young people are our future. And we should do all we

can to provide them with quality education. For that reason, with the authority that I had vested in me, I spared the public schools from any budget cuts. In my version of the budget, I did not cut one cent from the \$631 million school instructional budget. The cut was supposed to come out of administration.

"A few years ago, I chaired the Legislature's Task Force on Educational Governance. The Task Force made many recommendations. The Legislature adopted some of them when it passed the Education Omnibus Bill three sessions ago. The thrust of the Task Force's work and the Education Omnibus Bill was to give the Department of Education and the public schools greater autonomy. That has been done. Two years ago, you gave the DOE lump-sum budgeting. Since then, more schools have established School Community Based Management Councils, involving parents and community members in individual school decision-making.

"Now is the time to give our educators some space, to give them the opportunity to implement some of the reforms we have established, to let them teach without us -- you and I -- burdening them with new laws and new demands. Over and over again, I hear from teachers that they are unable to keep up with the laws and the rules and regulations that we crank out of this particular building. So, let's give them some space. Let's hold them accountable; let's see what the results are. But in the meantime, let's do all that we can to provide them with the resources that they need to do the job.

"Building a better future is not simply about economic survival. It is also about fulfilling our most cherished dreams and aspirations for our children while being compassionate to those who need our help.

"Not a day goes by that I do not ask myself, 'How can Hawaii fulfill its destiny and reach its full potential?'

"Hawaii is a wonderful place. We have so much to offer others. Not just scenery and climate, but a rich diversity of peoples and cultures. The Aloha Spirit. Unique skills, knowledge and experience that come from our unusual location and history.

"Most people now understand that we live in a fast-changing global economy. We cannot let Hawaii get lost in the shuffle. In order for Hawaii to take its rightful place, Hawaii's economy must be strong and our people prepared. That means we must diversity and grow.

"In the forceful words of Robert Reich, President Clinton's Secretary of Labor, in his book, "The Work of Nations", the value of a nation can be measured in the skill of its workforce. And so the State and so the individual. This means that our people must be made relevant to our economy during this period of highly-charged change.

"How will we do this? In four distinct, yet inter-linked, ways.

"First, we must create the proper technological infrastructure to eliminate the disadvantages of distance that we face. Last year, we took a giant step in eliminating that disadvantage.

"Second, we must help our young people acquire the skills, the knowledge and the attitudes that enable them to compete on a global basis. We must support education.

"Third, we must create a positive business climate. Not just lip service to that idea, but an environment in which our government -- and let me say that again -- our

government is a facilitator, not an obstacle to healthy business growth.

"Fourth, and most importantly, we need to believe in ourselves again. We need to believe that we can go out into the world and accomplish anything we set out to do. We need to believe that -- given the proper tools, including education -- our children can go anywhere they want, compete with anyone -- and win. We need to believe that we can achieve all that we dream of right here in Hawaii nei. I believe this economic downturn is coming to an end, but the Hawaii that emerges when it does end will not be the one we remember from the 1970s or 1980s.

"Good fortune will not simply fall on us as it has in the past. We are going to have to face the problems that confront us, make tough decisions, and push forward aggressively for what we believe is right.

"We will all be judged, all of us here this morning, by what we accomplish together in the next few months and years.

"I do believe that times are getting better. I believe that the economy will improve. Certainly, I am going to do everything in my power to do so.

"I truly believe, however, that if we all work together, and we set aside our personal agendas, our egos, that we can turn this crisis, this very, very serious fiscal crisis, the worst crisis in our State's history, into a great opportunity to build a better Hawaii.

"Thank you very much and aloha."

Senate President Mizuguchi then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Governor, for your thoughts.

"The Legislature appreciates your insight on the issues we face in putting our fiscal house in order and laying the foundation for a stronger financial future.

"The House and Senate stand ready to work with your administration on the budget, executive branch reorganization, and economic initiatives.

"We want to assure you that our doors will be open to you for consultation and discussion on matters of mutual concern. Let us both move forward with optimism and resolve.

"Having no further business, I hereby declare the Joint Session of the Eighteenth Legislature adjourned."

At 10:52 o'clock a.m., the President declared the Joint Session adjourned.

ORDER OF THE DAY

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION (FLOOR PRESENTATION)

H.R. No. 21, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING THE HAWAII OFFICE OF THE AMERICAN FRIENDS SERVICE COMMITTEE (AFSC)," was offered by Representative Takumi and was read by the Clerk.

Representative Takumi moved that H.R. No. 21 be adopted, seconded by Representative Kahikina.

Representative Takumi rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC) was founded in 1917 by American Quakers to provide conscientious objectors to war with a construction alternative to military service. Today, with international

headquarters in Philadelphia, nine regional and more than 40 program offices across the United States, and program operations overseas, AFSC carries on programs of service, development, justice and peace.

"In 1947, the AFSC was a co-recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize for its relief work in Germany after World War II

"Throughout its history, the AFSC puts its faith in the ability of people and communities to respond creatively. The AFSC believes that conflicts can be resolved nonviolently, that enmity can be transformed into friendship, strife into cooperation, poverty into wellbeing, and injustice into dignity and participation.

"Locally, this has meant working with the homeless, native Hawaiians, women, immigrants and others who are marginalized by society.

"Mr. Speaker, the value of the AFSC's work was brought home to me recently with the tragic death of Hilbert Smith, the homesteader on Kauai who faced eviction by the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands. I do not know if this tragedy could have been prevented. I do believe, however, that we in government can always do a better job in assessing potential conflicts and working out peaceful resolutions. We can learn from organizations like the AFSC on how we can do this better.

"Let me leave you with the words of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. who, upon accepting the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964, said, 'Nonviolence is the answer to the crucial political and moral questions of our time; [it is] the need. . . to overcome oppression and violence without resorting to oppression and violence.'

"At this time, Mr. Speaker, permit me to introduce our honorees," and asked the following honorees, who were seated on the House floor, to stand to be recognized: Ms. Susan Alexander, a committee member from the regional office in Pasadena, California; Ms. Nancy Aleck, George Harris and Ms. Judy Kern from the local committee in Hawaii; and Ms. June Shimokawa, a staff member of the local office.

Representative Hiraki then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, growing up in Hawaii, I had never heard about the American Friends Service Committee or ever knowingly met a Quaker.

"Actually, there were many things that I never heard about until I went to school on the mainland. One of those things that I learned about late in life was that during World War II, 120,000 Americans of Japanese ancestry were forced into internment camps although they committed no crime. It was one of those events that I could not believe occurred -- certainly not in America. Well, it did happen and recently, as a country, we acknowledged that it was wrong and a process for healing was started.

"The question for me, however, was how could an injustice like this have occurred? Who in the community spoke out on behalf of the Japanese Americans opposing this action? The answer is, very few. The American Friends Service Committee was one of only two groups that I know of that had the courage to publicly and vigorously oppose the internment of the Japanese-Americans even though it was risky at that time to hold such views.

"It is not easy to speak out when there is an injustice, especially when it does not directly affect you, but we must remember the words of Pastor Martin Niemoller who was interned in a Nazi concentration camp during World War II. He said, and I quote: 'In Germany they first came for the communists and I didn't speak up because I wasn't a communist. Then they came for the Jews, and I didn't speak up because I wasn't a trade unionist and I didn't speak up because I wasn't a trade unionist. Then they came for the Catholics, and I didn't speak up because I was a Protestant. Then they came for me -- and by that time no one was left to speak up.'

"On behalf of all AJA's, I wanted to publicly thank you today for your help during our time of need. To the American Friends Service Committee, please continue your fine work toward justice and humanitarian service to all people throughout the world. I wish you many more years of success.

"Thank you."

Representative Yoshinaga then rose and stated:

"I just want to extend my personal congratulations to not only the American Friends Service Committee, but also to someone who I have a history with, and that is June Shimokawa who I have known for several years. She has always been a wonderful person in terms of helping others, and I just want to extend my personal congratulations.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and $H.R.\ No.\ 21$ was adopted.

At this time, Representative Takumi presented Ms. Alexander with a Certificate of Recognition and orchid leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Chun Oakland, Kahikina, M. Oshiro and Takai.

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INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION (FLOOR PRESENTATION)

H.R. No. 25, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION CONGRATULATING THE PLAYERS AND COACHES OF THE 1995 UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII WAHINE VOLLEYBALL TEAM ON THEIR UNDEFEATED SEASON AND BIG WEST CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIP," was jointly offered by Representatives Takai, Lee, Case and Souki and was read by the Clerk

Representative Takai moved that H.R. No. 25 be adopted, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative Takai rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

"Today, I am particularly proud, along with my colleagues in this distinguished body, to honor the accomplishments of the 1995 UH Wahine Volleyball Team.

"This team, in achieving an undefeated regular season, truly captured the imagination and hearts of people across our State. Cheering could be heard throughout our neighborhoods by the numerous people who watched the games on television and in the confines of the Special Events Arena.

"Children, particularly young women, immediately forgot the Pink Power Ranger and suddenly wanted to be a Rainbow Wahine.

"We celebrated the success and accomplishments of a team of young student athletes from our university system. These young women were not the flashy images of 'sports idols-with-an-attitude.' Instead, they are approachable role models who remind us that when we put diversity ahead of divisiveness, cooperation ahead of cockiness, and aloha ahead of attitude, the resulting spirit of lokahi and kokua can achieve great things.

"Aside from their commitment to excellence, what really distinguishes these athletes is their mutual admiration for their fans and supporters, and their unflappable spirit and love of the game. This is why we

came to love them, and this is why our children celebrate them.

"Mr. Speaker, the accolades can go on and on.

"Although this season may have fallen short of the ultimate goal, I am confident that the resulting rewards will be seen in the not too distant future. It will be seen in players who play for the team rather than their own glory. It will be seen in the young women who strive to become members of the UH Wahine Volleyball team ... some who may be recruited, some who may walk-on, and some, who while they may not make the team, will at least remain to receive a UH education and become the 'seventh player' in the stands.

"Mr. Speaker, I wish to congratulate and commend all the players and coaches for the excitement and pride they have conferred upon all of us through their outstanding play this season.

"You have honored not only yourselves, but your parents, your school, and the people of the State of Hawaii

"Mr. Speaker, last night I spoke with Baron Gushiken of my staff. His mother is gravely ill and for this reason, he is not able to assist in today's presentation.

"Last year, when the UH Wahine Volleyball Team excelled, Mrs. Gushiken was fighting terminal cancer. Baron said that watching the games with his mother meant so very much to her. He wanted to tell you that in some very special way, you helped her through a very tough time in her life. For this, Baron and his mother are grateful.

"As this time, Mr. Speaker, I would like to introduce our honorees," and asked the honorees, who were seated on the House floor, to stand to be recognized, as follows: Kelli Cordray (No. 4); Lori Garber (No. 10); Lori Higashida, (No. 2); David Shoji, head coach; and Howard Wallace, associate coach.

Representative Takai continued:

"Some of the players could not make today's ceremony. Many of them had classes and conflicts in their schedules that prevented them from coming.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I am very happy today to join Representative Mark Takai in honoring the University of Hawaii Rainbow Wahine Volleyball Team. We are not only honoring the University of Hawaii, but for me it is a personal pleasure because we are honoring one of the fine representatives of pulchritude from Mililani, and may I add again that she lives in the same neighborhood as I do, and you will instantly recognize why she is one of the finest representatives of pulchritude from Mililani," and asked Lori to stand to be recognized.

"We mustn't forget some of those who are responsible for this," and asked Mrs. Shirley Higashida, mother of Lori who was seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized.

"I think at a time like this, it would be superfluous for me to make any further remarks to what Mililani means to all of us at the University of Hawaii.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Case then rose and stated:

"If the Representative from Mililani is entitled to brag about his constituent, then I would like the same opportunity as to one of mine, Coach Dave Shoji. But I would like to tell you a little bit about him not as a coach, but in his other life as husband and father of three

"During the interim, I undertook the most stressful endeavor of my life, coaching a five and six year old boys soccer team. Dave's son, Eric, was on that team, and Dave religiously attended all the practices and the games, leaving immediately after the games to go down and get ready for the evening game.

"Now you might imagine what it was like to coach Coach Shoji's son in front of Coach Shoji, especially as a first-time coach. But Dave gave me the courtesy of letting me make my beginner's mistakes without interference (although he did a little bit of kibitzing from about five or ten yards behind the sidelines.)

"Now Dave's wife, Mary, by the way, is a very accomplished physical education teacher and a coach in her own right, and she also attended all of the practices and games. But she didn't follow Dave's lead in terms of laying off us amateurs, so we did the only wise thing --we made her a co-coach, and then we all learned a great deal.

"By the way, it IS genetic. Eric was the best player on our team. Thanks for the experience, Coach.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I have been part of the Rainbow Wahine Hui -- the support group for women's athletics at the University of Hawaii -- from its beginning about twenty years ago under Donnis Thompson, the Athletic Director for women. I have been honored to watch Dave Shoji coach our team for all these years. Women's volleyball was at first considered a 'non-income' sport, which meant the coaches received just three thousand dollars for accepting the responsibility of the daily drills required to build a championship team.

"Dave Shoji led our women's volleyball team from the beginning -- winning the first national championship in 1979. Dave has guided this program through the ups and downs of no budget, no full-time coach, to Title IX short falls -- to what we know today as an important women's sport. A winning team! Admired and loved by the people of Hawaii, Dave is a wonderful role model for our younger athletes.

"Congratulations to you, Dave, and to all the women on our volleyball team!

"Dave, we are already looking forward to our next season!

"Thank you very much.

Representative Nekoba then rose and stated:

"I would just like to extend my congratulations and as one of the proud few who was present on the night that we broke the record of over a hundred thousand people. I can attest how exciting the games were, and how wonderful to see the players play truly as a family and really support each other. In fact, there was one memorable match because the other team was talking

trash and you guys beat them anyway, and that was probably the best part about the whole game.

"I want to thank you all very much, and I will see you next season.

"Thank you."

Representative Swain then rose and stated:

"I would also like to give my thanks to this team. I come from a volleyball family myself. I played at 80 pounds ago -- it feels like 80 years ago -- and we lost to Punahou in the State finals.

"But I would like to thank them because I know many people that would not go out to dinner, would not leave their homes ... I have one member of my family that would not even fly to the other island when she was supposed to because the Rainbow Wahine games were on.

"So I want to thank them and just say, thank you for the many wonderful memories. It was very, very exciting this year."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 25 was adopted.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION (FLOOR PRESENTATION)

H.R. No. 27, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION CONGRATULATING THE BYU-HAWAII WOMEN'S VOLLEYBALL TEAM FOR WINNING THE NAIA NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP FOR THE SECOND STRAIGHT YEAR," was jointly offered by Representatives Lee, Santiago, Tarnas, Yamane, Abinsay, Jr., Pepper, Stegmaier, Kawakami, Say, Takai, Swain, Kahikina, Isbell, Jones, Meyer, Halford, Anderson, Takumi, Morihara, Chun Oakland, Amaral, Case, Garcia, Kanoho, Nakasone, Ward and Yonamine, and was read by the Clerk.

Representative Lee moved that H.R. No. 27 be adopted, seconded by Representative Santiago.

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"The resolution itself tells all about the achievements of the BYU-Hawaii Women's Volleyball Team. It is an incredible accomplishment by a group of people not only this year, but also in the many years in the past when they won championships of the NAIA Women's Volleyball Division.

"What I want to do today is say a few kind words, a few words about another piece in the mosaic of great diversity which we call Hawaii. We tend to forget other places which are somewhat far removed from Hawaii.

And in Oahu, although it is only 38 miles away, BYU-Hawaii has carved a niche not only in women's volleyball, but also in higher education and in meeting the needs of higher education in Hawaii as well as throughout the world.

"BYU-Hawaii has an enrollment of 2,000, and there are sixty countries represented there. Indeed, on the volleyball team before us today, three of the members are from Brazil, two from Yugoslavia and one from Samoa, and that's an indication that BYU-Hawaii prides itself on being the most international university in the United States.

"Of the 2,000 students, 437 graduated last year, and the BYU-Hawaii campus has been noted for producing many teachers, 75 of them for the schools in Hawaii. Most importantly, the students work -- almost 600 of them work at the Polynesian Cultural Center. And you wouldn't believe it, but BYU-Hawaii is also the only university with a natural history museum of Hawaii with some ten thousand items on display.

"The place that BYU-Hawaii has played is also illustrated by its graduates. Among its first graduates at a time when the school was very small and it was called the Church College of Hawaii, were Charles Toguchi, former Superintendent of Education, and Lokelani Lindsey who was District Superintendent on Maui.

"With that brief introduction of this piece of our mosaic from Laie on the other side of the island, permit me, Mr. Speaker, to introduce our honorees today, and if I may indulge in a bit of whimsy because we Chinese read from right to left so we will start from the right side, and please hold your applause until everyone has been introduced, so the last shall be first," and asked the following honorees, who were seated on the House floor, to stand to be recognized: Trainer Dawn Kurihara; Assistant Coach Jay Akoi; Assistant Coach Mike Apo; Ipo Tuinei, Rachel Nihipali, Lindsay Miller, Aletha Gomez, Carrie Crippen, Nue Chang, Daniela Carneiro from Rio de Janeiro; Snezana Bosnjak, Doris Bikar from Yugoslavia; Ana Alves also from Rio de Janeiro; Ui Aalona; Coach Wilfred Navalta, Coach of the Year; Becky Laubach, Second Team All American from Waianae; and Aniki Valiengo, the All American top ten NAIA Player of the Year.

The honorees then rose to be recognized.

Representative Lee then asked Mr. Eric Shumway, President of BYU-Hawaii; Duff Tiddle and Jeff Hansen, who were seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized.

Representative Santiago then rose and stated:

"It is with a great deal of pride that I stand before my colleagues in this chamber today and honor all of you from BYU-Hawaii.

"This past year, I had a chance to get to know the people of BYU-Hawaii and the school a little bit better. I got to teach on the campus ... I got to teach a couple of courses there. One of the things that came across to me that I will always take with me is the sense of ohana and the true sense of pride that the school has. It was quite an experience.

"The student athletes that you see before you today, my colleagues, truly does represent the cross section of the school out there and winning, being the tradition that it is out there, is not everything. I think that one of the things that I got from being there and playing basketball sometimes with even President Shumway who, by the way, has a tremendous outside shot -- just to let you all

know -- really gave me a sense of what the school is all about, and teaching there this past year, I come away with, again, thanking you for bringing to Hawaii the recognition that we all really appreciate. So members, it is a great day today for us to honor them for all of the achievements that they have done and all that I know you will continue to do in the future.

"Thank you."

Representative Meyer then rose and stated:

"I am the Representative from Laie and I cannot tell you what a joy it was to see the victory that they had. As Representative Santiago has said, the feeling of ohana in Laie is undescribable. You all have to go there once to feel it. The campus in Laie is beautiful; the students are beautiful; the faculty are a close-knit group that know their students by name.

"Coach Navalta, I have never met before until today, but I sat in his living room with his beautiful wife while I was campaigning. He has a very large family and most of them are girls so you can see that he naturally falls into coaching women.

"I would like to congratulate the BYU-Hawaii team for a job well done.

"Thank you."

Representative Isbell then rose and stated:

"I would like to congratulate Assistant Coach Jay Akoi who happens to be a very special person, not just an assistant coach, but he was the one who started this whole thing in 1979 and led them to become a national power by 1983 and without any scholarships.

"So I would like to, at this time, just recognize this very special person as the backbone of the beginning of the women's volleyball at BYU-Hawaii.

"Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and $H.R.\ No.\ 27$ was adopted.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 30 and 31) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

H.R. No. 30, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING THE MEMBERS OF THE REVIEW COMMISSION ON THE STATE WATER CODE FOR THEIR INVALUABLE CONTRIBUTIONS TO IMPROVE THE STATE WATER CODE," was offered by Representative Souki.

Representative Amaral moved that H.R. No. 30 be adopted, seconded by Representative Takamine.

Representative Amaral rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, on your behalf, it is indeed an honor for me to rise and speak in support of this resolution that recognizes the nine members of the Review Commission of the State Water Code.

"Act 45, Section 5 of the Session Laws of Hawaii 1987, established the Review Commission and gave it a mandate to perform a comprehensive review of the State Water Code and develop recommendations for our consideration.

"It should be noted that Act 45, which passed on May 29, 1987, contained the legislation that created the State Water Code. The Act required that the Review Commission begin its work five years following the passage of the State Water Code and complete its work within a period of two years. This was a formidable timetable indeed for these members.

"As the resolution stated, the Review Commission held 52 regular meetings, 12 public informational meetings, and 11 public hearings. It compiled a data base of over 700 people and organizations and in order to keep the general public informed of its work, established depositories on all major islands to allow the public to review the minutes of the meetings, written comments, and any other documents relating to the on-going work of the Commission.

"By statute, the Review Commission ends this year. But before doing so, I think it is important to give special recognition to the diligent effort of the hard work of these committed volunteers.

"Today, it is an honor to be able to present to you the members of the Review Commission that were able to attend," and asked the following honorees, who were seated on the House floor, to stand to be recognized: Mr. Ray Sato, Vice Chair of the Review Commission; Ms. Charlene Hoe, Secretary of the Review Commission; Ms. James Apana from Maui; Mr. Alan Inaba from Hawaii; and Mr. Douglas MacDougal, Chairman of the Subcommittee on Legal Research.

Representative Amaral continued:

Missing today are Mr. Fred Trotter, Chairman of the Review Commission; Ms. Bina Chun and Mr. Alan Murakami.

"I should note also, Mr. Speaker, before yielding the microphone to the other members that in addition to the Review Commissioners here, Mr. Warren Iwasa acted as the Executive Director of the Commission. (Mr. Iwasa came onto the House floor and was recognized). Also, Mr. Keahi Renaud acted as the research assistant." (Mr. Renaud was seated in the gallery and rose to be recognized.)

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Takamine then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I guess from water comes life, and with those few words I think we get some insight into the broad, far-reaching impact of the State Water Code. Therefore, the dedicated work that the honorees have been involved with does make a tremendous difference for the people of Hawaii.

"Your Committee on Water and Land Use Planning has just completed during the interim a statewide set of public hearings, and the instrument that was critical to the discussion in those public hearings was the end result of the work by these individuals. And, therefore, on behalf of your Committee, Mr. Speaker, we really do recognize and thank these individuals for the hard and dedicated work that they did put into the effort. Certainly, in doing so not only created additional opportunities for the members of the State community to participate in that important dialogue, but they also elevated the level of discussions at the deliberations that the State Legislature will be engaged in this session.

"With those few words, I wanted to add my own personal thank you and appreciation to each of the members.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kanoho then rose and stated:

"I would like to add my congratulations and thanks to the work of the Review Commission, especially to its Vice Chair who lived on Kauai for 19 years, and we have not had the opportunity to thank him appropriately and formally for his good work on Kauai as water manager for the Kauai system. But in addition to that, while he was on Kauai, he was the number one UH booster and had golf tournaments scheduled ... by the way, I miss playing golf with you, Ray ... and for all the golf tournaments that he sponsored.

"But as I was telling him, for the entire 19-year period that he was on Kauai, the economy was booming. Then he left, and the economy took a downturn and it has been in the doldrums since then, so we need you back on Kauai, Ray.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, just another perspective ... we heard a prior speaker mention that from water comes life. I have heard on many occasions the chairperson of the Review Commission refer to water in quoting Mark Twain, and that is, 'Whereas Whiskey is for drinking, water is for fighting.'

"It is very important that we realize that water is one of our most cherished needs and elements here in our islands, and all of the good work that you have done.

"I would like to congratulate you on making a thorough review of our water code and, at the same time, both keeping the fighting down and the whiskey drinking down also."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 30 was adopted.

At this time, Certificates of Recognition and floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Amaral, Chun Oakland, Takamine, McMurdo, Kawakami, Isbell and Thielen.

H.R. No. 31, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING RYAN DOTE FOR HIS OUTSTANDING ARTICLE ABOUT THE STATE CAPITOL BUILDING," was offered by Representative Tom.

Representative Tom moved that H.R. No. 31 be adopted, seconded by Representative Ito.

Representative Tom rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, when the Legislature vacated the State Capitol following the 1991 session, I felt a real sense of sadness and nostalgia because, quite frankly, I really wasn't sure whether I would be returning to this place where we work each day to make Hawaii a better place, and this place that many of us call 'home.' We will always cherish this place in our hearts because of the many wonderful and lasting memories we have shared here

"When I read the newspaper article entitled, "Proud Reopening of Our Unique Capitol" written by our honoree, Ryan Dote, in the Sunday edition of The Honolulu Advertiser, on January 7th of this year, I was deeply moved -- deeply moved -- by its powerful, yet gentle, simple and descriptive words, because even a sightless person like myself, who has never visually seen the State Capitol, could understand and experience the true essence of the historical and picturesque beauty of our State Capitol.

"Ryan is 11 years old and currently is in the sixth grade at Iolani School. For his fourth grade Hawaiiana class, Ryan wrote a paper describing the historical background, design, symbolism and unique beauty of Hawaii's State Capitol. His thoughtful words in the recent newspaper article are most appropriate upon our return to this special place.

"While Ryan was attending Hauoli Na Keiki Preschool, his class visited with Uncle Joe Tassil of the Capitol Tours and Information Office, who entertained them with numerous historical and moving stories about the Capitol. This is a tour which Uncle Joe Tassil has led hundreds of times, touching the lives, hearts and minds of thousands of children, visitors and residents.

"Nothing I can say, Mr. Speaker, can better describe the power, simplicity and beauty of this place we call home more vividly, eloquently and clearly then Ryan Dote's words, so please permit me to read just an excerpt from his article describing the State Capitol through the eyes of a child, and I quote:

'Nothing about the design of the Capitol is accidental. The building resembles a volcanic island. The curved legislative Chambers are in the shape of the volcano that created our islands. The Capitol is built in a pool

of water to symbolize the Pacific Ocean with the volcano rising up from it.

'The 40 pillars that encircle the building represent Hawaii's graceful palm trees.

'The open roof, representing the summit of a volcano, welcomes the wind, the rain, the sun, and the moon throughout the Capitol's interior. Chandeliers of nautilus shells and brass in the House and Senate Chambers by German artist Otto Piene represent the sun and the moon.

'There is a large cast State Seal, 15 feet in diameter, hanging from the ceiling over each of the two entrances. Each seal weighs 7,500 pounds.

'Tadashi Sato's "Aquarius" mosaic on the rotunda floor is made of 600,000 blue and green ceramic tiles and is 36 feet in diameter. When viewed from above, the mosaic looks like Hawaii's tidepools.

'Hawaii's people may now again enjoy a Capitol that is very symbolic of our State's heritage.

'Not just an ordinary building, our Capitol's design represents our unique State: a volcanic island rising in the Pacific Ocean whose open summit welcomes the wind, rain, sun and moon, looking toward the heavens for guidance.'

"At this time, Mr. Speaker, before I introduce our honoree, I would like all of us to recognize the 'father' of the orator of bringing the beauty to the people of the State to the State Capitol, Mr. Joe Tassil, who is the Tour Coordinator of the Governor's Office of Information."

Mr. Joe Tassil, who was seated in the gallery, rose to be recognized.

Representative Tom then asked the honoree, Ryan Dote, who was seated on the House floor, to stand to be recognized. Accompanying Ryan on the House floor were his mother, Charlene Dote, and Mr. James Dote, father, and an employee of the State Personnel Services, who then rose to be recognized.

Representative Yoshinaga then rose and stated:

"I would just like to share with my colleagues here a personal story that Ryan and his family represent really the best and the brightest of Hawaii. I met the Dote's over six years ago, actually through our children that we met, because my daughter and Ryan are in the same Suzuki method of violin practice and performance.

"The Dote's really are a beautiful and wonderful and humble family, and I hope they don't mind my sharing this, but I am privileged to call them my friends.

"Congratulations!"

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"We have been talking about water and if water gives life, then words give spirit, and I think that's what this young man has done for our Capitol and Representative Tom's reading about something that otherwise we would never got the meaning of.

"But let me flash back to when I first heard what we were going to do today, I was rather confused. I said, 'What is this -- are we warming up to the press? Who is this Ryan Dote that we should have a member of the press here?' because I know how some of you feel about the press. Or, it was this when the judge struck down the

Financial Disclosure Act that we passed a few years ago that we're now going to warm up to the press properly. 'Who is this Ryan Dote that he should come here?' He wrote as a professional, as a seasoned educated journalist, so I didn't detect anything in his work. But then when I learned that he was of the fourth grade vintage of Iolani School, I said, 'My goodness, this man must be commended for what he has done.' This young man who, at the fourth grade, has informed us that this was the Schuman Carriage land before. He gave probably more data about this Capitol than any other journalist heretofore, and we know we've written a lot about this Capitol, but not once, my colleagues, did he mention the koa benches.

"Therefore, in his objective way and in a most informative way, we believe that this young man has a destiny ahead of him. He is a man of promise, a young man who is probably a wordsmith ahead of his time, and on behalf of the Minority, young man, I have been allowed the privilege to say, if you're looking for a job in the Minority Research Office, you have one.

"Congratulations to you and your family."

Representative Ito then rose and stated:

"I just want to congratulate Ryan Dote for his outstanding article about the State Capitol Building, and I want to wish him the best of luck in his future endeavors.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 31 was adopted.

At this time, Representative Tom presented a Certificate of Recognition to Ryan Dote, and floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Thielen, Meyer and Ito.

That rule made a lot of sense and still makes a lot of sense. It says, okay, subject matter committee, your expertise is, for example, transportation. If we the Finance Committee are going to change your bill substantively, we better check back with you as a committee and find out whether or not we should be doing this. That makes sense because it leaves the expertise where the expertise belongs.

"The problem is, Mr. Speaker, the rule was being violated left, right and center because in the rush of the legislative process, the afternoon committees weren't consulting the subject matter committee, weren't consulting anyone. So now this rule is proposing to say, they must consult the chair of the subject matter committee.

"Well, I would prefer a more democratic process that the entire committee be consulted. But I can understand that we may have to take half a loaf rather than the whole loaf, and at least a half a loaf will be the committee chair of the subject matter committee, so I can support the bill.

"I hope that this time the afternoon committees will abide by the House Rules and actually do that consultation because that is what will end up resulting in better legislation.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Okamura then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the intent of this resolution is to put into effect a practical and realistic process of prior concurrence. A process which ensures true prior concurrence from the primary committee chair; a process which enables the House to efficiently conduct its business, given the very real and pressing time constraints under which we work; and a process which reduces the likelihood that a bill will miss a deadline simply because of an inability to obtain prior concurrence.

The current rule, Mr. Speaker, as we know is very admirable and idealistic; however it has not worked, as

our Minority Floor Leader indicated. There have been instances when, due to time constraints or other concerns, the second committee chair has proposed and made changes without any consultation with the prior committee. And when there was an honest effort to contact the primary committee, rarely was the entire membership of the primary committee consulted because of time constraints.

"Mr. Speaker, the Senate has no rule for prior concurrence. Nor do most legislative bodies at all. Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure, the acknowledged standard for most legislative bodies, has no provision for prior concurrence. In this respect, Mr. Speaker, our House is indeed very unique and very open.

"For this reason, Mr. Speaker, as well as additional comments that I have which I will insert into the Journal, I speak in favor of this resolution."

Additional comments by Representative Okamura are hereby inserted:

"For our rule to work as intended, however, this very practical and realistic amendment is a necessity.

"The merits of this bill are clear:

- (1) It requires a committee chair, who wishes to amend a bill which a prior committee had primary responsibility for, to obtain the concurrence of the primary committee chair before such an amendment is even proposed for consideration:
- (2) It facilitates the timely achievement of prior concurrence by allowing the primary committee chair, rather than the committee itself, to concur with the proposed change. This does not automatically cut anyone out of the process. The primary chair may still consult with and get the input of his or her members.

What the rule does accomplish, is that it avoids the necessity (and all the red tape) of the primary committee having to reconvene simply for the purpose of granting prior concurrence.

It also eliminates the possibility that the primary committee chair may be unable to obtain a quorum of members, which could stall indefinitely the progress of the bill.

This specific change will help prevent a bill from missing a deadline and dying in committee simply because the primary committee was unable to meet, was slow in meeting, or was unable to reach agreement.

(3) Finally, Mr. Speaker, this change provides a process for resolving the issue of prior concurrence when the chairs of the two committees are at impasse.

By allowing you, Mr. Speaker, to meet with the chairs, to hear their differences, and to render a decision, eliminates the possibility of stalemate, and allows for a bill to proceed on its merits, rather than die on a procedural technicality.

"In short, this amendment is a practical and realistic step toward a workable process of prior concurrence. It is an opportunity to facilitate the business of the people.

"Your Majority supports this change, and asks that all members of the House do likewise.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 29 was adopted.

Representative Tarnas then rose and stated:

"If we could, for a moment, reflect on the courage and strength of the crew of the space shuttle Challenger and our own native son, Ellison Onizuka.

"That fateful day of the shuttle accident is so vivid in my mind that it seems like two days ago, not ten years ago. Its memory will be forever seared into our collective minds, and may their passing not be in vain. May they serve as shining beacons to encourage our ongoing effort to support education, research and development of science and technology, to continue our search for knowledge, and our quest for the stars.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, as many of us know, we have one member of the Hawaii Psychological Association in our midst.

"Today, I have the rare opportunity of announcing that they have given an award to our colleague who, when I mentioned to the Speaker that she was the Hawaii Psychological Association Legislator of the Year, he said that it's probably because she has a hole in her head (laughter).

"Well, this is the Hawaii Psychological Association's Legislator of the Year, my colleague Representative Cynthia Thielen."

Representative Thielen rose and thanked the Chair.

Representative Amaral: "I would like to make an announcement to the members that if it's still going on, we have a rally taking place in the rotunda today to support the package of measures dealing with crimes against women, and we invite the members to join us at the rally."

I guess it's the same way some of the medical profession don't want to necessarily associate with Dr. Kervokian because it puts a taint on their profession.

"The intent of this bill is very laudable, but until I get further information, I would say 'no, with reservations' because I'm not sure what it's going to do in terms of helping those who are in the needle business versus those who want to get access to needles. I think it raises a number of questions.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hamakawa then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill does not mandate participation by Longs or any other drug store, but simply authorizes Longs or other stores to participate should they choose to do so.

"Thank you."

Representative Pepper then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill will save lives.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2503, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committees on Judiciary and Consumer Protection and Commerce, with Representative Ward voting no.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:08 o'clock p.m.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Ninth Day.

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Ninth Day was approved.

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

Gov. Msg. No. 121, transmitting copies of the 1995 Report of the Commission to Promote Uniform Legislation of the Department of the Attorney General, was read by the Clerk and was placed on file.

At this time, Representative Thielen rose and stated:

"I would like to introduce to all of my colleagues, 51 bears that are sitting on your desks.

"When the call came out from Representative Arakaki to help the children in Bosnia, I called Liberty House and I said, 'Would you please help?' They explained that they had a policy that they only donate in-state because they want their help to remain in-state. But because this was a very significant request to help the children in Bosnia, they, for once, bent their policy and donated all 51 bears to the House.

"I purchased the tags attached to each bear and if you'll look at the tags, they open on one side and you can put your House of Representatives card, put a small message on your card, and then tape the edges of your card. If you could all place them in your outgoing mail tray, I know that the Clerk would probably be delighted to pull around a cart and pick up 51 bears today so they can be delivered to Representative Arakaki.

"I would also like to introduce my Teddy Bear Team, Mr. Speaker, up in the gallery," and asked her staff to stand to be recognized, as follows: Michele Hardin, Office Manager; Lael Weyenberg and Rebecca Alakai, session staff; and Diana Clifford, legal volunteer from the University of Hawaii, William S. Richardson School of Law.

Representative Thielen continued:

"To the children in Bosnia, aloha from the House of Representatives with love.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair responded:

"Thank you, Representative. I hope that you will include that in your donation record as something that was given to you."

Representative Isbell then rose and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, do all 51 of the cost go to Cynthia Thielen?"

The Chair answered:

"I believe that she should record all 51 so we don't have to record any of them."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"If you all don't want to bother with the recording, I'd be very glad to do it. I deeply appreciate Liberty House's help in this because it has made it possible for all of us to share our aloha with the children in Bosnia."

The Chair responded:

"It's the ruling of the Chair that Representative Thielen will record for all of the House."

Representative Isbell thanked the Chair and stated:

"I do appreciate it. I want to thank you for doing this, Representative Thielen, because I think it's a wonderful gesture on the part of the House, and it's especially nice of you to accept them all with your budget."

Representative Isbell then introduced two people from Kona, Hawaii -- Julia Luat and Marion Bush.

ORDER OF THE DAY

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION (FLOOR PRESENTATION)

H.R. No. 33, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING BRIAN C. VILORIA AS "THE 1995 NATIONAL JUNIOR OLYMPIC BOXING CHAMPION IN THE 100-LB. WEIGHT DIVISION," was offered by Representative Abinsay, and was read by the Clerk.

Representative Abinsay moved that H.R. No. 33 be adopted, seconded by Representative Garcia.

Representative Abinsay rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, I rise to speak in support of the resolution.

"First of all, I would like to thank my colleagues from Districts 37 and 36 from Waipahu for giving me the honor of recognizing an outstanding young man who has not only excelled as a fine athlete by winning the National Junior Olympics Boxing Championship in Marquette, Michigan, but has also proven himself to be an exemplary honor student at Waipahu High School.

"The exceptional young man I am referring to is Brian Viloria. Last June, Brian represented the State of Hawaii at the prestigious National Junior Olympics Boxing Championship in the 100-lb. weight class division. His victory in Marquette put Brian in the national ranking of amateur fighters. He was selected as one of four top junior boxing champions in the country and they competed in the Elite Camp Box-Off to earn a spot in the International Dual Competition between Canada and the United States. In July of 1995, Brian won the International Dual Championship by a first-round knockout, and that's 1 minute and .02 seconds into the first round. He is very much in contention to be selected to fight in the Olympics.

"Brian started training as a boxer at a tender age of six, where his boxing talent was discovered by his own father who also serves as his coach. Years of discipline and hard work got him where he is today. Boxing experts say he has not reached the top of the sport yet. He has a bright future and many say he is on his way to become another world champion from Hawaii.

"Brian excels in almost every endeavor in his young life. Aside from being a remarkable student from Waipahu High School, he is also a member of the Varsity Wrestling Team, and received the Award for Outstanding in the Scoring the Most Escapes (22) during the 1994-95 season.

"With so many accomplishments already at such a young age, one wonders what is next for Brian? Well, Brian's next goals are to compete in the Olympics and go on to college to study art.

"Brian, I congratulate you on your successes in the ring as a champion boxer and off the ring as a model student. You are truly a living proof to Hawaii's youth that with perseverance and hard work, dreams do come true.

"On a personal note, I am honored to have your family as long-time friends and very privileged to have personally worked with you, Brian, in a Sports Festival held at Kalakaua Gym last October where kids from Kalihi had the chance to watch your boxing talent, and I know they were thrilled when they got your autograph.

"Brian, thank you for being a role model for our youth and my best wishes to you and your family."

Representative Abinsay then introduced Brian Viloria and asked the honoree to stand to be recognized.

Accompanying Brian on the House floor were Mr. Ben Viloria, his father and coach; Mrs. Rosemary Viloria, "the very supportive mother"; Mr. Henry Sasaki, President of the U.S.A. Boxing Association of Hawaii; Mr. Clyde Igarashi, Vice Principal of Waipahu High School; and Judge Victor Viloria, grandfather of the honoree, visiting from the Philippines. They all rose to be recognized.

Representative Abinsay then asked other members of the family and Brian's supporters, who were seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized.

Representative Garcia then rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in the short time that I have had a chance to meet with Brian and his family in my office, I was pleased to learn that Brian lives just down the street from me in Waikele. And if they don't have a Neighborhood Watch Program in that particular neighborhood, they already have one because they got

somebody up there that can do the duty of a neighborhood watch person.

"Brian continues the great tradition of fighters that came out of Waipahu -- the Yasui brothers, Jesus Salud and Andy Ganigan. You heard that he is a 4.0 student at Waipahu High School -- straight A's. I don't know how he does it because he devotes three hours a day to his training, his community service added to that plus the homework and chasing girlfriends ... I really don't know how much time he has in a day. We only have 24 hours, but apparently he manages to fit all of that in one day.

"His father, Ben, told me that he got his son, Brian, interested in boxing to keep him out of trouble. Not that he was in trouble, but it has worked. Now I am pleased to know that Brian also works in the S.M.I.L.E. program out at Waipahu High School. He works with his peers and with younger children to seek alternatives to drugs and gangs.

"So, in speaking for the Waipahu contingent that also includes the Greater Waipahu -- your Vice Speaker, the Majority Floor Leader as well as Representative Takumi -- we are proud and pleased to have someone of Brian's accomplishment and caliber to represent Waipahu as well. They elected me to fight for the people of Waipahu but I am glad to see that somebody can fight for himself.

"Also, Representative Abinsay noted that Brian is training for the Olympics. He is a little young for Atlanta, but in four years he will be ready for Sydney. I am a little worried though, and I am concerned because I was told that Brian has not had a fight since the National's. It has been about eight months, Mr. Speaker. I have been told that the caliber of the competition here in Hawaii doesn't quite measure up, so I am extending an invitation to any member of the House if they are willing to put on the gloves and keep my man here in tune, keep on his training and his conditioning. If you want to go at least three minutes -- I'm not saying three rounds, Mr. Speaker, three minutes -- with Brian, we can keep him trim and in condition. Anybody willing to take that up, please come and see me in my office, Mr. Speaker, anybody else who is interested in keeping Brian in shape.

"But I want to thank Brian and I want to especially thank his family ... he has a great network of support from his family and friends. I told Brian that it would be important for him to keep this network intact not only with the training, but to get him to where he wants to be in life, if he wants to pursue boxing as a career. I think the network of family and friends will be important as well

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward then rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, having only one qualification -- the toughest course I had at the University was boxing. Probably the only one that I failed, but probably the one that gives me the most admiration and respect because, Mr. Speaker and members, this week has been a real inspiration from our youth -- Ryan Dote and his article and what Brian Viloria, having not only exceeded in his professional boxing, but in academics.

"I want to say you have not only broken records by those 18 bouts, but you have broken the stereotypes that many have about people who box. 4.0's would be an impossibility for them to think of. You're on your way to a world championship.

"We honor you; I stand in honor of you; and I am afraid that I will not be able to really take up that challenge that's been offered.

"Congratulations to you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 33 was adopted.

At this time, a Certificate of Recognition was presented to Mr. Brian Viloria by Representative Abinsay and a lei by Representative Kawakami. Other members of his family on the House floor received floral leis from Representatives Garcia, Chun Oakland, Isbell, Amaral and Marumoto.

At 12:45 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:52 o'clock p.m.

Representative Hiraki, for the Committee on Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 21-96) recommending that H.B. No. 3383 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Amaral moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3383 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Ward rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak with reservations. . .I'm sorry, no with reservations. . .

The Chair asked:

"NO with reservations? Why not just a plain no."

Representative Ward responded:

"Mr. Speaker, I knew I would probably get a retort on that. We have yes with reservations which means you're for but you got reservations. I'm voting no but I've got some reservations, because it's a good idea but it has, for the following reasons, some pukas in it and it needs an amendment is what I am saying.

"Number one, this is in regards to the use of our \$200 million CIP funds. Two hundred million dollars is all we can afford -- that's all constitutionally we are limited to. We have already committed by statute \$90 million of those for the building of schools which is untouchable, even though I know there's some flirtation to build prisons with those. That is already a fixed amount. We have another \$30 million that goes to the Hawaiian Homes, and to the figures that Representative Say would remind me almost makes the wiggle room impossible to build in another \$64 million.

"Here's my point, Mr. Speaker. Why can't we pay them over time? Whatever small interest we could pay with would be worth it. Why take a \$64 million hit at one stand? We know that the fund that this is going to go into is already fat with \$300 million -- the Airport Special Fund has \$300 million in it. I would ask my colleagues ... since when are we afraid of the Feds, that they are going to come down on us and say, give us that \$64

million? I think we are cowering before our time. And also, it's still equivocable as to whether we do have to pay it fell swoop now or that we may pay it over time.

"The point is, Mr. Speaker, we have wiggle room -there is an ability to do this without hitting us now while we're down. This is both hitting us and kicking us while we're down when we have a budget deficit.

"For the sake of that, I submit a no, with reservations, so we can amend that, and we can pay it over time.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Meyer then rose to register her no vote, stating:

"The purpose of this bill is to authorize the issuance of general obligation bonds to obtain funds to reimburse the Airport Revenue Fund for the use of airport funds inadvertently used to purchase the lands in Campbell Estate.

"I object to the word 'inadvertently', Mr. Speaker.

"The Transportation Committee is being too kind. The Federal government has very strict limits on how airport funds are to be expended. This was an inappropriate use of the airport funds. The Administrator at the Department of Transportation, at that time in charge of airport funds, sent a memo to then Governor Waihee telling him that he could not authorize this expenditure. The purchasing of the Raceway Park and the feedlot were an inappropriate use of these funds. You could not tie it to the airport because the scheme of relocating tenants at the airport to Campbell Industrial Park was not feasible. The tenants there were not interested. They could not run their businesses from that location.

"How is it that the Governor now has no responsibility? When the man from the Department of Transportation sent the memo and said 'no,' the authorization came directly from the Governor's Office, and yet the Governor has no responsibility. . .

At this point, the Chair interrupted and asked Representative Meyer to "please stick to the merits or demerits of this measure and stay clear of politics," and asked Representative Meyer to "please proceed."

Representative Meyer continued, saying:

"Well, Mr. Speaker, the whole reason that we are now talking about these general obligation bonds is to pay this back because the Federal government did indeed find that this was inappropriate. Now the taxpayers must take the hit and pay back the \$64 million. The people that received the money have no responsibility; the people that authorized the expenditures have no responsibility.

"I don't think this should go unnoticed, and I have a very hard time going along with this when we have this limit on general obligation bonds and this will stretch us beyond the limits, and other good causes will have to take a back seat because of this.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Amaral then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Allowing for the previous comments having been made, the recognition certainly exists that it is a debt owed and, therefore, a debt that must be paid. I think that we certainly stand by the approval of paying off this debt which is the intent of this vehicle, House Bill 3383.

"Certainly, if others have amendments that they want to put on the table and suggest, they can tell us the source of other revenues. I think we'd all be happy to consider it, and we would appreciate hearing from them.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair stated:

"It should be noted that this is being referred to the Finance Committee and one of the speakers is a member of the Finance Committee. They will have time to do whatever they need to do then."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3383, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS AND MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE REIMBURSEMENT OF THE AIRPORT REVENUE FUND," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Meyer and Ward voting no.

Representative Arakaki introduced a group of Okinawa Prefectural Assembly members, as follows: Mr. Chiken Kakazu, Speaker; Mr. Jhosei Shimoji; Mr. Masaru Koki, cousin of former State Senator Stan Koki; Mr. Katsuhide Higa; Mr. Noriaki Kakazu, "one of my long-time friends"; Mr. Takeshi Onaga, Mr. Kokichi Iramina, Mr. Yoshikazu Tamaki, Mr. Eitoku Iha, Mr. Moriaki Ota, Mr. Osamu Ishikawa, Mr. Seizen Hokama, Mr. Saku Miyara and Mr. Masahiko Takara, Assembly members. They were accompanied by Mr. Masaharu Yoshida, Councilor, Executive Office of the Governor; Mr. Kishin Nakasone, Assistant Chief, Office of Secretariate, O.P.A.; Mr. Hiroki Tatsuno, Assistant Secretary, Office of Secretariate, O.P.A.; Mr. Seiichi Yagi, General Staff, Office of Secretariate, O.P.A.; and Mr. Rick Higashiona, former Director of the Department of Transportation.

Representative Arakaki continued:

"They are here on a mission. They have been in Washington, D.C. to talk about some of the problems associated with the military bases in Okinawa. I think a lot of people don't realize that over 75 percent of the military presence in Japan is sited in Okinawa, which is a real injustice when you consider that over 200,000 lives were lost in the battle of Okinawa during World War. II. They are here to appeal both to the U.S. government and also to the military.

"I think being that we have such a close relationship between Hawaii and Okinawa ... we do have a sister/city and prefectural relationship. They also asked that we support them in spirit and to empathize with their problems.

Representative Amaral then rose and stated:

 $^{\prime\prime}$ Mr. Speaker, earlier today, I met with the Honorary Consul of Sri Lanka, Baboo Wickramaratne.

"On February 4, 1948, Sri Lanka became a country independent of British colonial rule and so for the last 48 years, against some very difficult odds, has become an outstanding example of democracy with a strong socioeconomic system.

"Actually, it's interesting to note that the voter turnout with the 1994 Presidential Election was over 70 percent in Sri Lanka.

"Sri Lanka has one of the highest per capita levels in South Asia. Since its independence, it has made a commitment towards free education which goes from both primary all the way up to the university level, and so it has a literacy rate of over 90 percent of its population --both men and women.

"The other thing that I am rather interested in is that Sri Lanka presently has a woman president who succeeded a woman president, and President Chandrika Kumaratunga is committed to a number of political proposals aimed at resolving the ethnic differences that exist there.

"The House has acted in a certificate to extend its warm aloha on the National Day of their homeland to the Honorary Consul Baboo Wickramaratne, and we do want to welcome him today here, and so we ask that he rise in order to be greeted by the members of the House."

The Honorary Consul Baboo Wickramaratne, who was seated in the gallery, rose to be recognized.

Representative Shon rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the issue of ecotourism is one that has been brought before us for a number of years now, and as it evolves, it clearly must be done with the greatest

amount of intelligence, information, and sensitivity to the natural areas that ecotourism will impinge upon.

"I find it rather odd, at a time when we have entered a mania of multiple referrals, that not a single natural resource committee was thought of to be important in this bill. And I find it very odd that it is the Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism that is leading the charge to tell us the sensitivity about the use of public and private conservation lands. Public and private conservation lands are not seen as the purview of the Department of Land and Natural Resources anymore, or the Department of Health, or anybody else except Business, Economic Development. The preservation of fragile resources ... we see this repository of knowledge in DBEDT? Streamlining of the land use process ... well, we don't want the Department of Land and Natural Resources to be involved with that.

"Mr. Speaker, even when you get to educating the public on the importance of protecting the environment, what does DBEDT do for that? Even the Department of Education is not considered a lead on this. I strongly object that none of the natural resource committees were seen to be important enough to be included in this, and that the bill itself feels that Business and Economic Development is the primary and sole contacts to coordinate efforts for ecotourism.

"In many, many areas of the State, we are struggling with enforcement, with maintenance, with preservation of the most sensitive areas, and we know there are plenty of folks who would love to drive a bus up to the edge of the trail and take lots and lots of people up where they really don't belong. We also know there are areas where they can be brought. Who knows these areas -- DBEDT? No. It is not the Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism. It is the expert in this area -- it is the Department of Land and Natural Resources. Where are they? Are they trusted in this process?

"Ecotourism is held out to us as a great potential niche, a boon, to our visitor industry, and yet, are we going to pursue this with the idea that we are not interested in the leadership of those departments that are charged with protecting fragile environments? That's what this bill says and by the pathway of this bill, we are reinforcing that. We are saying that natural resource jurisdictions are not relevant.

"For that reason, I strongly object to this bill.

"Thank you."

At 12:25 o'clock p.m., Representative Arakaki asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:27 o'clock p.m.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in favor of the bill "with serious reservations," stating:

"Not having had the bill come before us, either in the Water and Land Use Planning or Energy and Environmental Protection Committees -- the environmental committees -- I wasn't aware of the bill until the Chair of the Energy and Environmental Protection Committee eloquently expressed his concerns.

"I share in those same concerns, Mr. Speaker. I really think we have to ask ourselves the question: Does the environment exist to promote tourism, or do tourists come to Hawaii because we protect our environment?

"I think this bill is focusing and putting the wrong emphasis first. And I think it is something that we all ought to watch, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Garcia then rose to cast an aye vote with reservations, stating:

"For the reasons that were enunciated by the Chair of the Energy and Environmental Committee, and just to note, Mr. Speaker, that in your Water and Land Use Committee, we did hear testimony from the Department of Land and Natural Resources to indicate that they do have an on-going task force on this very subject. I am sure, and I hope that DBEDT is talking to the Department of Land and Natural Resources on this very same matter.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cachola then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, let me enlighten this body why I introduced this bill and passed it out. I read the report made by the department as well as the tourism industry management, and I wasn't satisfied with it.

"This bill is just a follow-up of that report so that it will not be a half-baked kind of a report. If you look at the bill, if the concern of my colleagues is that the Department of Land and Natural Resources is not part of the task force, on page 2 are the members of the task force. Aside from the Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism, we have the chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources, the President of the University of Hawaii, the mayor of each county, the President of the Hawaii Visitors Bureau, two members with experience in the visitor industry to be appointed by the Governor, and two members with experience in protecting the environment to be appointed by the Governor.

"I can see their concern, Mr. Speaker, but if this bill didn't go to their committee, I think they will have a shot at it in some other ways. By looking at this bill further, I know that this bill will go to the Finance Committee as it goes through the process.

"My real concern about this, Mr. Speaker, is that we spend so much money looking at ways to promote ecotourism here in Hawaii, and I found out that the report is meaningless, so this is just a continuation of that study. Hopefully, once this thing is set up, we can come out with a better ecotourism report. I am also fully aware that there is coordination between the Department of Business, Economic Development and the Department of Land and Natural Resources, and they are always saying there is no money to spend.

"However, I introduced this bill so that there will be a hammer that will be forcing them to continue this study. Otherwise, it will be just talk between the departments, and I know for sure that nothing is going to be done.

"It's for that reason, Mr. Speaker, that I introduced the bill and passed it out.

"Thank you."

The Chair stated:

"It is going to the Finance Committee. It will come back to the House again."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2883, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO

ECOTOURISM," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Shon voting no.

Representative Thielen rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill would allow a collection agency to collect from a University of Hawaii student who is unable at that point to pay back his/her student loan. It would allow the collection agency to also be able to get collection fees from the student.

"That's something that we don't allow anywhere else in our laws, and I really question the wisdom of targeting our students and making them subject to this excessive fee. These are students that are trying to enter the economy at a very difficult time. They've received an education and as long as they are making a good faith effort to try to pay back those student loans, I don't see why we allow a collection agency to heap on their collection fees on top of the student loan.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of House Bill 3587 and would like to add a few words of explanation.

"When we say students, we think we mean everyone, but that's not true because those students in default of their loans are a very, very small minority. Fortunately, Hawaii has one of the lowest default rates, one of the lowest bankruptcy rates, throughout the country.

"The point about student loans which is not being repaid by students who have completed their education, who have finished their education and have gone elsewhere, is that they have made an obligation. The Federal government itself has passed legislation which permits collection agencies to collect the cost of the borrowers for federal loan programs.

"We are talking about the State Loan Program which is funded by the taxpayers. We owe it to the taxpayers to recover the moneys. It is not all students, it is not all students who are in default -- it is only those students who refuse to pay their loans.

"The University will send one, two or three letters and say very politely, please pay your loan. If the University, after a year or two years, has no response, then it will turn the matter over to a collection agency, and this very small minority who are leeching off the public should be made to pay for the cost of recovering that loan.

"We are only following the wisdom of the federal fathers in Washington when we pass similar legislation as it is in this bill, House Bill 3587, and I urge my colleagues to vote in favor of it passing Second Reading so that it may move to the Finance Committee.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair stated:

"This bill is going to be going on to the Finance Committee."

Representative Thielen rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I recognize that. If I may, Mr. Speaker, I would just like to remind my colleague, the Chair of the Higher Education Committee, that it's not only the fathers but the mothers that are back in Washington, D.C., too, and even some who are not mothers. I don't like to link it to just assuming that Congress is all male. It's not anymore.

"I understand the Chair's comments; I appreciate them. It would be very nice to have language in the bill saying it only applies to students who refuse to pay their loans.

"Having had some experience as a Legal Aid attorney, I know that collection agencies don't give a rip about what the debtor, if I use that term, is trying to do to be able to repay the loan. I don't like to give them this added hammer."

The Chair stated:

"It should be noted that this bill will have to come back to the floor again so let's limit the discussion on this item."

Representative Lee then rose and remarked:

"I just wish to acknowledge and apologize for my inadvertent chauvinistic reference to the fathers and not to the mothers because if it weren't for my mother, I wouldn't be here today, would I?"

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2989, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LEGISLATIVE FISCAL AND BUDGET ANALYSIS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3174, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE MOTOR VEHICLE INDUSTRY LICENSING BOARD," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Shon, for the Committee on Energy and Environmental Protection, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 134-96) recommending that H.B. No. 2588, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

Representative Amaral moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2588, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Thielen rose and requested the Clerk to cast a no vote for her on H.B. No. 2588, HD 1, and the Chair, "so ordered."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose and requested the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair, "so ordered."

Representative Kawananakoa continued:

"I would like to explain some of my reasons.

"Taking a look at the bill and understanding its purpose, it sounds like it's a good bill. We want to help protect and mitigate any kind of harm to our residents in the State of Hawaii that may be impacted upon them by commercial activities.

"However, I am concerned that this particular bill goes too far and may put out of business many of our small restaurants that are currently using stoves or other burning materials within our commercial and residential areas.

"I understand the genesis of this bill may have stemmed from the fact that California Pizza Kitchen uses a woodburning stove and some of the smoke that comes out of their restaurant, their establishment, is perceived to be causing illnesses with some of the residents in that area. It is a highly congested area; however, we also have a very important need for allowing these businesses to continue.

"I am certainly not opposed to protecting our citizenry; however, I believe this bill is too broad and would cause more confusion in our already troubled economy.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Shon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"It is true that the original origin of this bill dealt with wood-burning issues; however, we completely shelved that particular notion and focused on the great dilemma in all urban areas as well as non-urban, that the language that was already in the statutes is very, very broad, but provides virtually no guidance to the Department of Health as to how they might approach some of these sticky issues. In fact, the California Pizza Kitchen and others have spent an inordinate amount of time and hours trying to work with the Health Department that has no guidance on this issue. I think if you talk with them now, you will find that they want closure, they want some clarity, as to how nuisances will be dealt with.

"The issue of whether or not there should be woodburning, as I noted, the committee has decided not to deal with, but rather to provide some general criteria for the Health Department in their already extremely broad language in the law, already much broader than this. This actually narrows down some suggested parameters for them to develop a dialogue and bring clarity and closure, both for the commercial and residential interests.

"As I noted, an inordinate amount of time that has gone into some of the problems with these restaurants, residents, the Health Department, whatever. . .(At this point, the microphone went dead.)

At 12:21 o'clock p.m., Representative Amaral asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:22 o'clock p.m., Representative Shon remarked:

"I think we've had enough nuisances this morning, Mr. Speaker, I'll sit down."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I share my colleagues' concerns and would register a no vote for two reasons: One, I don't think the people of Hawaii want a smell patrol for the small business community for policing them.

"Number two, I think this is a slippery slope to get into the residential area of where odors are often offensive. We have such things as kim chee, bagong, look mun, Limburger cheese, and so forth, of which those of you who have condominiums in your district know that those residual odors have come to be a problem.

"My position, Mr. Speaker, is, where reasonable people will reason together, these issues can be solved. But let us not open the door by having a smell patrol to go and look at small business and then let this spill over into our community of which we tolerate these smells, we eat these smells -- these smells are ourselves, if I may say. So I don't think we should be poking our noses into this.

"Thank you."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose and stated:

"I simply would like to note that if in fact this particular nuisance statute may help to alleviate and clarify the law as currently on the books, I'd be willing to move forward with it at Third Reading; however, I'd like to retain my no vote until a later date when it can be further reviewed and see if it does actually improve the system.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marumoto then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for her, saying:

"I see that it covers only commercial activities. I think if it is indeed a problem, it should cover all activities.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2588, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce with Representatives Kawananakoa, Marumoto, Thielen and Ward voting no.

Representative Shon, for the Committee on Energy and Environmental Protection, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 135-96) recommending that H.B. No. 2935, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Transportation.

Representative Amaral moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2935, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Transportation, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Pepper rose to register his no vote, saying:

"Mr. Speaker, I have spent the morning working on issues of what is euphemistically called 'welfare reform.' What this means is that we haven't got the money that we need to take care of our disabled and vulnerable citizens.

"Under those circumstances, Mr. Speaker, I don't think I can comfortably vote for conservation license plates and for an appropriation therefore.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2935, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONSERVATION LICENSE PLATES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Transportation with Representative Pepper voting no'

Representative Shon, for the Committee on Energy and Environmental Protection, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 136-96) recommending that H.B. No. 2940, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Human Services.

"Mr. Speaker, the district that I represent and the place that has been a home for my family for five generations has many natural treasures. From the beautiful Pali Lookout to the majestic heights of Alewa and Kamehameha to the falls of Liliuokalani Gardens to the natural spring waters of Kunawai Springs where Hawaiian people went to heal themselves, our district is blessed with all of these natural wonders and many more.

"District 27 is also the home of many historic landmarks -- the Oahu Country Club, Foster Botanical Gardens, Natsunoya Tea House, Mochizuki Tea House now Kunawai Terrace, the Kuan Yin Temple on Vineyard Boulevard, the Korean Consulate, Japanese Consulate, and the Consulate of Taiwan and China. Other well-

known places in the district include the Liliha Library, medical and rehabilitation facilities like Kuakini Medical Center, Saint Francis Medical Center, Maluhia Hospital, Rehabilitation Hospital of the Pacific formerly the Children's Hospital, and others, and the Liliha Market for its delicious char siu and roast pork, Young's Fish Market known for its delicious laulau, B&S Store for its great shave ice, Moiliili Mochi and Candies, and Masu's Massive Plate Lunch -- popular businesses who more recently were added to our neighborhood -- and the list goes on.

"But of these historic and well-known landmarks, there is an establishment that is most popularly associated with Liliha and that is none other than Liliha Bakery. It is known for its scrumptious baked goods, like their famous coccoa puffs (I had written this before I knew the cocca puffs were coming), the onolicious freshly cooked breakfasts, and Liliha pancake mix, to name a few. The children growing up in the community and grown-ups alike have fond childhood memories of peering into the large glass window, watching the talented cake makers decorate the beautiful cakes with such finesse and quickness.

"Our honoree, for 25 years, has dedicated his life to making this business truly a historic landmark, a wonderful community gathering place, and a bakery known throughout the State as producing consistently over time very delicious meals and baked goods. Koji Nochi has been very generous, especially in his support of the seniors in our community, and has for many years donated to the Lanakila Multi-Purpose Senior Center which is the largest senior center in all of Hawaii.

"Thank you for honoring our community with your presence in the neighborhood, for being a sparkling treasure in Liliha, and for bringing much pride to the people of our district. We honor your years of dedicated service and wish you and your family much luck and prosperity in the years ahead."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, from the neighboring district, House District 26, we would also like to extend our thank you and our great mahalo for all of your work, and affording much of your hospitality 24-hours a day to the people of the 26th House District. For that, we're very grateful.

"Thank you."

"Unfortunately, the Representative here in the pretty purple suit forgot to mention that that bakery has the very best hamburgers not just in town, but anywhere I have ever eaten."

"I am in support of moving forward with some means by which to care for our elderly and obtaining insurance for their old age. However, I note that the committee report and also the bill leaves open the financing for future negotiations.

"I guess the future legislators. . . and I might not be here the next time, I would like to register my concern that we keep an eye on how we are going to fund this particular important program.

"Thank you."

Representative Arakaki then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Despite its title on long-term care, I'm not sure about the life of this bill, being that it is going to go to Consumer Protection and Judiciary and later to Finance. But it is an issue that I have been speaking to, I guess for the past ten years, and it seems like such an issue of compelling interest to the people of the State of Hawaii that I think we need to stand up and speak about how important this bill is, and how important the concept of providing long-term care is, especially when you consider that by the year 2020, people of ages 65 and over will constitute over one-fourth of Hawaii's adult population.

"Mr. Speaker, I think many of us here are at the leading age of the baby boom population. We are going to be in that mix and it may seem like quite a distance timewise, but I think those of us who have a vision of what we should be preparing for need to be concerned about it right now, and the cost of long-term care is increasing every year.

"When you consider that over one-third of the elderly are disabled, I don't think we can stick our heads in the sand anymore. I can't understand why we're not willing to face this issue and make a commitment, but I just hope that this bill can move forward and be an expression of our commitment by at least establishing this trust fund so that we can someday, hopefully very soon, make a commitment to address this very important issue.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pepper then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, there has been sadness and, in fact, tragedy in our community because of our failure to adequately provide for long-term care and there is everyday now, struggle by people trying their best in the absence of appropriate mechanisms for dealing with this issue.

"It's time to move, it's time to begin to do things which will still take many years in order to accomplish.

"I am in favor of this bill and request that additional remarks, which are the remarks of the previous speaker, be included as my own.

"Thank you."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Kawananakoa rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"If we take a look at the committee report, it gives you the purpose for this bill and lays it out quite succinctly that it is to repeal the constitutional requirement that excess revenues be returned to the taxpayers. I don't think I need to read any further as you probably understand my opposition to this bill at this point. I would also note that the Tax Foundation of Hawaii did more than simply comment on the measure, I believe they were in opposition to the measure.

"I am opposed to this piece of legislation to repeal one of our constitutional mandates set forth by the 1978

Constitutional Convention because it substantially reduces the amount of money that would be going back to a taxpayer if they overpaid the government. If we were able to run more efficiently and come forward at the end of the year with a surplus, why should we not either give the dollars back or credit our taxpayers for the ensuing year? In the past, we have given out anywhere from one dollar to \$125 per taxpayer. It is substantial.

"One of the reasons given in the Judiciary Committee for pressing this bill forward is because they believe that it may be a required amendment to the Constitution in order for us to have a rainy day fund. I am in support of the rainy day fund; however, I don't believe that this constitutional amendment is required before we can go ahead and implement the statutory rainy day fund. We have hundreds of special funds already. I don't see why we can't have one more although I am not necessarily in favor of another special fund.

"I would also like to note that if we had a 10 percent surplus in any given year, I believe our rainy day fund requires a cap of only putting 5 percent of any excess money into that particular fund. What would we then do with the other 5 percent? Should we not return it to our loyal and stalwart taxpayers, or at least credit them on their next income tax or the next year's taxes?

"Those are my objections to this bill moving forward, and I would hope that others would have a chance to take a look at it. I note that it is being referred to Finance so perhaps they can put in a language to the effect that we could change the entire repeal and perhaps just implement the sections with regard to a rainy day fund if they so find that it is necessary to have this constitutional amendment.

"Thank you, Mr Speaker."

Representative Okamura then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill repeals a requirement but not our legislative prerogative. Our current fiscal dilemma has highlighted the need for fiscal management.

"Repealing the mandatory refund of excess revenues has several benefits: One, excess revenues, if any, could be diverted into a rainy day fund; two, in times of economic slowdown, these funds will be available for programs and services; and three, any refund, if appropriate, can still be made via legislation.

"Also, Mr. Speaker, under the current provision, when we do return one dollar to the taxpayers, the cost of doing that is a lot more than returning those moneys, so we would actually be saving taxpayers in times when we don't want to refund any moneys.

"But ultimately, Mr. Speaker, this bill provides added flexibility and it still gives the Legislature the right to return excess revenues to the taxpayers.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose to register his no vote, saying:

"A note to my colleagues that changing the Constitution is not going to teach us how to manage our fiscal affairs. You don't balance your budget by changing the Constitution. I think what we've got is a knee-jerk reaction by saying ... well, we don't have a rainy day fund we should have; therefore, let's go back and examine the wisdom of the 1978 Constitutional Convention. I think this is an over-reaction.

"As I said in my Opening Day speech -- 'THE BEST IS YET TO COME!' -- and this thing needs to be in place so when we get back to where it was where there were surplus revenues, like our seats, the people have the money belonging to them. The money doesn't belong to us. This is a constitutional area where I think we shouldn't touch.

"Thank you."

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"I rise to announce that I will vote for the bill but I would like to point out my reasons for voting for the bill are somewhat more precise.

"The excess revenues are not only taxes which people pay but there was a very mischievous provision in our Employees' Retirement System whereby any revenues generated by the System itself over 8 percent were returned to the general fund and that has, in effect, resulted in a predicament whereby the fund is not only underinvested, but also that when the returns are less than 8 percent, then we have to make up the State's contributions from our general fund which theoretically are all tax revenues.

"However, during the period of rapid economic growth, over a period of ten years, the ERS returned to the general fund one billion dollars. And the year in which the Legislature provided a rebate of \$125 million, the ERS was drained of reserve funds because they went to the general fund of the State.

"I think it is very, very important that we take measures to limit any refunds to taxes, or people who paid for them, not to revenues generated by other means and particularly by the Employees' Retirement System. Therefore, when we look at fiscal responsibility, we should not only institute a rainy day fund for the entire State itself, but also that we should institute a reserve fund for the ERS to take care of those years when income from these investments are less than desirable because of economic downturns.

"Further, I would like to convey to the Finance Committee, in my opinion, a very important distinction that we make in any rebate. According to our current income tax laws, those who have many dependents can decrease their income tax liability, but in the rebate, those with many children or many dependents, will increase the rebate. There is no responsibility, no connection or linkage, as our good auditor, Mrs. Higa. was saying, between the revenues and what should be rebated. It is very important that we make a distinction between revenues generated by the general excise tax. revenues generated by income tax, and revenues generated by other means. In this respect, those who paid the most should, of course, be proportionately.

I think that this bill does require our affirmation in order that we may proceed with a more precise definition of what really is mandatory in fulfilling our fiscal responsibilities.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Meyer then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I think it's a very serious thing when we look at repealing an article or part of the Constitution, and we should move very cautiously whenever we are thinking of doing that. I believe very strongly that this money does

belong to the taxpayers, and I think this was considered very carefully in the Constitutional Convention.

"I would just bring the attention of my colleagues to the committee report. When the vote was taken on this particular issue, there were a great many members that were excused and were not there to register their votes. Out of fifteen members, six voted aye, one was no, two with reservations, and six were absent. So I would just ask that the members of the Finance Committee look very carefully at this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose and stated:

"I just wanted to make note to one of the prior speakers notion regarding legislative prerogative and the fact that the Legislature in future years, if it sees fit, can always give back the money to the taxpayers. I think that's right at the heart of the issue.

"This is a constitutional matter. This is not a choice for us to decide. 'Whether or not to give surplus money back to the taxpayers.' The taxpayers, our constituents, and the people of Hawaii have spoken. They want to have the excess revenues, if any.

"I believe we have a lot of flexibility in spending. I would like to see less flexibility in that spending and as far as saving, I think our taxpayers should be allowed to save their moneys as they see fit.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3302, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING THE REPEAL OF ARTICLE VII, SECTION 6, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF HAWAII, WHICH REQUIRES THAT EXCESS REVENUES BE REFUNDED TO TAXPAYERS UNDER CERTAIN CONDITIONS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Kawananakoa, Meyer and Ward voting no.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Representative Yonamine, for the Committee on Labor and Public Employment, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 231-96) recommending that H.B. No. 3008, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative Amaral moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3008 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Takumi rose to ask the Clerk to register a no vote for him, saying:

"I would like a few moments to state the reasons why.

"I think if the members look at the committee report, they'll see that the bill is related to employment practices. Essentially what the bill will do is allow private employers to put on their application form a generic question saying, 'Have you ever been convicted of a felony within the past seven years -- Yes or No?'

"I believe that question is too far-reaching and would basically serve as a screening device for employers not even to consider those who happen to have a criminal record

"I do believe that employers in Hawaii have a duty to exercise reasonable care in hiring and retaining persons who, because of the nature of their employment, may pose a threat of injury to members of the public, and there is a problem about increased liability for negligent hiring. I do believe we need to protect employers from that; however, that can easily be done by saying at the time of the job interview or at the time of offering the position to the applicant, the employer may ask at that time -- 'Have you ever been convicted of a felony that is job-related?'

"The whole intent of the bill is to try to screen out people who are applying for a job and they may have a criminal record that is job-related. For example, applying for a job where you handle money. Now clearly, if you have been convicted within the last seven years of embezzlement, or theft, or pilferage, I think those are reasonable grounds to deny you a job because you will be doing something that you were convicted of.

"I think members do know the Penal Code. For example, in the Penal Code, importing aerial fireworks is a Class C felony; importing an iguana into the State is a Class C felony. I fail to see how if you are convicted of importing an iguana in the last seven years, whether that should bar you from seeking employment.

"Alu Like, also in their testimony, stated that their concern is that since they run an ex-offenders' program, it's hard enough to place ex-offenders into the job market. And what this bill would do, as it is presently written, would essentially again make it even more difficult when, in fact, we should be trying our best to reintegrate exoffenders into the community as contributing members of society.

"I just wanted to flag that out because I realize that it is going on to the next committee and, hopefully, that committee can look at some of the concerns that I raised.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Shon then rose and requested the Clerk to cast a no vote for him, and asked that Representative Takumi's remarks be inserted into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Shon further stated:

"It would seem to me that if I were a convicted felon coming out of prison and trying to decide or struggle personally with -- shall I associate with the group that is likely to lead me into trouble again, or shall I try to reintegrate into the healthy workforce -- that I might just bail out of that second option feeling that people will not hire me because they will know immediately that I have a record. Even if some employers were willing to hire folks with felony convictions, how many of those who are trying to get their lives together may feel that it is just hopeless to even strive for that job?

"With those thoughts, I would like the next committee to also consider that.

"Thank you."

Representative Yonamine then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Three things had happened while we were discussing this bill. One was that the private sector employers are asking for only what the public sector employers are getting right now, so it's an issue of equity -- it's an issue of equity.

"Secondly, I think we are also concerned about increased liability on the part of the employer if and when an employee or someone in the company does commit a serious crime, or a serious crime of a physical nature. So the question here is: How do we bring that in balance with the civil rights and the restitution and rehabilitation of someone who may be an ex-felon?

"So that's two things that we really dealt with very deeply.

"Thirdly is that we're asking the Civil Rights Commission to promulgate new rules and regulations in these 'grey' areas because we are concerned that we ought to bring equity to both the public and private sectors that will be very fair to the applicant or employee, that they are not abused or be discriminated against if they are being hired.

"I think with those things in consideration, we pass the bill along, but the key to all of this is bringing the public sector, the private sector with the Civil Rights Commission to work out these very fine 'grey' areas that didn't be put into law.

"Thank you."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"The prior speakers have spoken quite eloquently on the issue and it is imperative for us to remember that many of our private sector businesses are in quite a dilemma.

"On the one hand, if they discriminate based on someone's criminal record, they have a wrongful employment discharge or wrongful hiring suit brought against them. On the other hand, if they hire the person, knowing that the employee has some problems, and that employee commits that same crime on the job and hurts someone in the public, now they are liable for negligent hiring.

"I think what we are attempting to do is to find a balance by which we can both secure the privacy of the individual and help them get into society and work and, at the same time, afford our private sector the security and the shield from liability which otherwise places them in a Catch-22.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"My concern with this particular legislation is the fact that basically we are attempting to rezone a particular district without the necessary safeguards required in a zoning process. I understand the difficulty at this point in particular areas that will be affected by this legislation and the desire to be able to put two households or two homes on any particular lot. However, I am concerned about whether we will have the proper infrastructure and health and safety concerns.

"I realize that the amended version does attempt to address those concerns; however, I'm cautious as to the bureaucratic extension of work required by the City and County, and that there may be an alternative mode by simply extending the ohana zoning that is currently allowed for residential lots to agricultural lots that may incorporate the intent and purpose of this bill to allow families to build a second home on their agricultural lots so that our families can remain in Hawaii and our young ones don't have to move away.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Jones then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Essentially, this bill attempts to address the housing needs in certain areas of this island. Basically what it does by census tract, it tries to identify areas like Waianae, Nanakuli and Maili, where we have over three hundred individuals living on the beaches, and we have many families in that area that have extended families living in housing that are really in cramped up condition.

"What this bill does is, it is trying to address the problem because there are many, many areas in Waianae, Nanakuli and Makaha that have roads, water and electricity running alongside the lots, and many of these lots are underutilized, unlike Manoa or Hawaii Kai, where for one reason or another the people are not able to build another home on their lots.

"Even under ohana zoning, there are cost items that many of these residents cannot meet, so what this bill does is it gives the people an opportunity, a window of opportunity for maybe three years, to look at the housing situation, and we're trying to address the concerns raised by the City and County and other state and county agencies to address their concerns on health and safety. So what it does is, although it exempts individuals from certain county and state regulations, it does not exempt them from health and safety regulations. Also, it requires that adequate infrastructure should be in place to allow the individuals to build another home.

"I think this bill addresses many of the concerns that were brought up in the committee hearing, so I urge the members to support this bill.

"Thank you."

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

(FLOOR PRESENTATIONS)

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 44 and 45) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

H.R. No. 44, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION CONGRATULATING THE QUEEN AND PRINCESSES OF THE 1996 NARCISSUS COURT AND HONORING THE PRESIDENT OF THE CHINESE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE OF HAWAII," was jointly offered by Representatives Chun Oakland, Tom, Chang, Lee, Kawakami, Abinsay, Amaral, Cachola, Isbell, Ito, Jones, Kahikina, Morihara, Okamura, Santiago, Say, Souki, Stegmaier, Takumi and Tarnas.

Representative Chun Oakland moved that H.R. No. 44 be adopted, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative Chun Oakland rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"The first Chinese immigrated to Hawaii over the past two centuries and have made significant contributions to the cultural, political and economic life of our island state.

"I am honored today to present to you, Mr. Speaker, and the members of this honorable body, the Queen and her court of the 47th Annual Narcissus Festival, sponsored by the Chinese Chamber of Commerce.

"The young ladies before you epitomize all that is good, decent and beautiful about the Chinese people and the Chinese culture. Like the beautiful and fragrant Narcissus blossoms cultivated in the lunar year time for good luck and good fortune in the coming years, the 1996 Queen and her Court will serve as goodwill ambassadors for the Chinese in Hawaii and on behalf of the Chinese Chamber of Commerce as they travel throughout the states and visit many lands -- the Mainland and internationally.

"The rigorous training, public appearances and Narcissus Pageant selection process have prepared them well for the challenging and fast-paced year ahead and recognizes them for their beauty, intelligence, poise and knowledge of their Chinese heritage.

"At this time, I would like to introduce to you and the members of the House, the 1996 Queen and her Court. First, I would like to ask Queen Elyn Yao to stand. Elyn was born in New Jersey, and is the daughter of Dr. Winston Yao and Frances Yao. Employed as an assistant account executive for the Limtiaco Company, she is a graduate of Bellevue High School in Washington and the University of Washington where she received a bachelor of arts degree in communications, specializing in public relations. Elyn enjoys dancing, running, hiking, skiing and coaching cheerleading. She is a resident of Liliha so it's especially an honor to introduce her. May I present again, Queen Elyn Yao."

Queen Elyn Yao rose to be recognized.

"First Princess Jodie Ching was born in Los Angeles, California. She is the daughter of Cordell and Marie Ching. Employed as a third officer for the American Hawaii Cruises on the S.S. Independence, she is a graduate of Mt. Carmel High School in San Diego, and the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy at King's Point. Jodie enjoys traveling, exploring other cultures, painting, teaching Sunday school, fishing, baking, bowling, crafts and community services. She is a resident of Kaimuki. May I present to you First Princess Jodie Ching."

First Princess Jodie Ching rose to be recognized.

"Second Princess Kimberly Lai was born in Honolulu and is the daughter of Norman and Carol Lai. She is a graduate of Castle High School, Windward Community College and the University of Hawaii where she double majored in international business and finance. Kimberly enjoys hiking, sailing, and community service, and is the service project chairperson for the University of Hawaii Mortar Board. She is a resident of Kaneohe, and I would like to present to you again, Second Princess Kimberly Lai."

Second Princess Kimberly Lai rose to be recognized.

"Unfortunately, Third Princess Summer Young could not be with us. She was not feeling well today but I would like to honor her by sharing a little bit about her.

"Third Princess Summer Young was born in Honolulu and is the daughter of Gordon and Rebecca Young. Summer is a graduate of Punahou School and Mun Lun Chinese School. She is a freshman in the honors program at the University of Hawaii where she is double majoring in psychology and Mandarin. Summer enjoys Tahitian dance, hula and surfing. She is a resident of Manoa, so let us honor her also by a round of applause. (The members of the House gave her a round of applause.)

"Fourth Princess Anna Tam was born in Honolulu and is the daughter of James S.K. and Chiu Wen Tam. Employed as a planner/researcher by LUC, Inc., she is a graduate of St. Andrew's Priory and the University of Hawaii where she majored in civil engineering. Anna enjoys reading, Chinese dance, hula, traveling, drawing and art. She is a resident of Waimanalo. Please welcome Fourth Princess Anna Tam."

Fourth Princess Anna Tam then rose to be recognized.

"The President of the Chinese Chamber of Commerce, Renton Nip, at the last minute, could not be with us and he does thank us for honoring him. However, I feel it is important to say a little bit about this gentleman before I introduce the President-elect.

"Renton, who many of you know, is part of a long list of distinguished presidents of the Chinese Chamber of Commerce. An honors graduate with distinction from the University of California, Berkeley, he received his Juris Doctor degree from Columbia University Law School where he was a Harlan Fiske Stone Scholar. He is President of the large kamaaina company, Chun Kim Chow, Ltd., and is a partner in the law firm, Foley Maehara Nip and Chang.

"Mr. Nip has served as a per diem judge in the State of Hawaii District Court and served in many other government service positions. He is presently the director of Bank of Honolulu, and for ten years he has been on the Board of Directors of the Chinese Chamber of Commerce. He and his wife, Renee, are proud parents of Richard, 11. and Melissa. 6.

"Mr. Nip's expertise in international business transactions and corporate law, among others, makes him well qualified to carry out his duties as President of the Chinese Chamber of Commerce as it further strengthens its ties with the local community, the Mainland, and the Far East. And so, I would also like to recognize Mr. Nip although he is not here for his efforts this past year and many years previous. Can we put our hands together for him? (The members of the House gave Mr. Nip a round of applause.)

"And we are honored with his presence today, the President-elect of the Chinese Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Kenneth Chong -- Welcome."

President-elect Kenneth Chong then rose to be recognized.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee then rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"A short while ago, we talked about federal mothers, and today it is my honor to follow one of the newest mothers in the House -- Representative Chun Oakland. She has said all that I would like to say about the Narcissus Court, the history and the culture that it represents.

"My few remarks are directed to my colleagues and to the audience that this is the time for the Chinese New Year and the Queen and her Princesses will be holding court in Chinatown on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, and I urge anyone of you who would like to sample some of the Chinese culture, particularly the cuisine, to join in the festivities and say -- KUNG HEE FAT CHOY!"

Representative Kawakami then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and colleagues, I just want to let you know that Mr. Ken Chong and I were classmates at the University of Hawaii and we were long-time friends. I haven't seen him for many, many years, and it's great to see him, and look what he's doing now -- escorting beauty queens -- so he's come a long way. Welcome, Ken.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"I would like to join my colleagues in congratulating the Queen and her Court for the epitome of the beauty and the brains in the Chinese community.

"And, Mr. Speaker, perhaps some day, my daughter, Johanna Mei Ping, will be sitting there.

"Congratulations, and as Representative Lee has said -- KUNG HEE FAT CHOY!"

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 44 was adopted.

At this time, Certificates of Recognition were presented to the honorees by Representatives Chun Oakland, Saiki, Lee, Takai, Chang and Say, and floral leis were presented to them by Representatives Arakaki, Ito, Marumoto, Anderson and Kawakami.

H.R. No. 45, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING FEBRUARY, 1996 AS DRUG-FREE HAWAII AWARENESS MONTH," was jointly offered by Representatives Souki, Pepper and Chun Oakland.

Representative Pepper moved that H.R. No. 45 be adopted, seconded by Representative Chun Oakland.

Representative Pepper rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, we have a number of modern health plagues and dangers in our communities to be concerned about -- AIDS, tuberculosis and new strains of disease-causing organisms among them. Not the least of these plagues is substance abuse, Mr. Speaker. The Hawaii

Legislature, recognizing the frustrations in the community over the continuation of this problem year after year and the damage which it causes to all parts of our society, requested in 1994 that the Hawaii Advisory Commission on Drug Abuse and Controlled Substances set up a task force to examine Hawaii's drug prevention strategies and to 'recommend an appropriate balance of Hawaii's resources among drug abuse prevention, enforcement, and treatment activities.'

"Mr. Speaker, the task force has now made its report to the Legislature and a number of measures have been introduced to implement their recommendations. It should be noted that one of those recommendations is that a higher priority than at present be placed on cost effective demand reduction, prevention, education and appropriate treatment. It is in that spirit that the Coalition for a Drug-Free Hawaii, in partnership with government, business, labor, health organizations and community groups, is sponsoring DRUG-FREE HAWAII AWARENESS MONTH, and it is with great pleasure that I ask my colleagues to greet and recognize two people who play important roles in our efforts to reduce the demand for drugs.

"Sandra Lacar, Executive Director of the Coalition for a Drug-Free Hawaii, who was a member of the task force, and Mr. David Higgins, a member of the Board of Directors of the Coalition for a Drug-Free Hawaii. Will you both stand please."

Ms. Sandra Lacar and Mr. David Higgins then rose to be recognized.

Representative Arakaki then rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"I guess I am sad to note that usually at this time of the year, we honor our participation in the drug-free effort with a poster and mural contest which we've done for the past three years. Unfortunately, this year, because of budgetary restrictions at the Department of Education, and also because Family Sunday was done away with, we no longer have that avenue to participate as legislators in this effort to provide the drug-free message to kids in high schools and intermediate schools. But I think there is a really compelling reason why we should be involved in whatever way possible.

"Last night, Representative Abinsay and I went to Farrington High School for a drug-free meeting for parents. We would have been happy if that auditorium at Farrington High School was packed with parents and kids; unfortunately, there was only a sparse number of people there. The message was so compelling and yet so few people heard it.

"When we think about the problems of substance abuse, unless we're directly affected, we tend to think it's not our problem. But it's not just a problem for the user and the abuser. When you think about how substance abuse affects everyone, whether we're talking about health care or education, our courts and even our highways -- they're all affected by substance abuse and it hits us everyday.

"When we talk about crime and prisons, they are at the center of the problem. I think if we did an analysis of how much they affect our budget, especially in the areas of health, human services and law enforcement, I think we'd all be staggered and we'll all make it a top priority. But even more important, I think it's not just dealing with the problem -- it's, how do we keep our kids from being involved with drugs?

"Unfortunately, some of the kids that I work with, some of them are no longer with us because some of the kids

have died either from overdose, or some have committed suicide, and some have even been murdered because of bad drug deals. And once that happens, you can't bring them back. Some of them are also in prison and we continue to pay the price. And so I think it is imperative and incumbent upon all of us to do whatever we can to prevent substance abuse.

"To those who feel that it is not their problem, or for those who think we've lost the war on drugs, I would just like to end with a quote: 'It is better to light one candle than to curse the darkness.'

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Chun Oakland then rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"I just wanted to say 'thank you' to Sandra and to Dave for their efforts in inspiring young people to actually get this message out about being drug-free.

"They have a very active youth component to the Coalition for a Drug-Free Hawaii headed by Christine Ferrara, and they are super. They've supported in so many ways community efforts to get the word out -- not to use drugs -- and I think it's very effective that the young people themselves are spreading this word and actually influencing very positively other young peoples' lives.

"Thank you."

Representative Herkes then rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"Substance abuse is a national epidemic and a national disgrace. It impacts my district severely. I remember, a few years ago, introducing a bill to try to make the town of Pahoa drug-free. The audacity is that in that effort, the support came from the children; the opposition came from the adults.

"In a discussion with educators just a few days ago, they tell of 20-year olds who are recruiting high school students to sell 'ice' to the elementary school students. That degree of abuse in our youth is alarming. I support the efforts as indicated in this resolution.

"Mr. Speaker, I am no stranger to substance abuse. I'm an alcoholic who has been alcohol free for 21 years, and I know the role that education and that support, particularly support, plays in helping somebody recover from substance abuse.

"I am honored to be able to be part of this support for this resolution today, and thank you very much for your efforts."

Representative Garcia then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"I also represent a district that is impacted by the drug problem as the previous speaker. I also rise, Mr. Speaker, to speak as a parent, and in my way to thank Sandra and Dave and the others involved in this effort.

"This morning as I was rushing off to drop my kids off at school, negotiating through the traffic of our Honolulu, and through the rain, the traffic jam, and the tension rising because the minutes were ticking away, and I realized that my kids will be tardy as we were going off to their school, my little girl -- she is 7 years old -- helped to break the tension by rustling through her backpack and making such an effort that I had to notice. She reached in with great effort to get her Drug-Free ribbon and she proudly put it on herself and said, 'I have to wear this

today, Daddy, because this is,' as we say in the resolution, 'Drug-Free Hawaii Awareness Month.'

"We do what we can as lawmakers, as expressed by my colleague from Kalihi, to deal with discourage. I am also involved in a project out at Waipahu where we were the beneficiary of a grant to deal with drug education and prevention. But in the hurly-burly of doing our work for the public, I sometimes wonder whether or not I am doing my work as a parent on this very problem, and I would like to thank Sandra, David, and all those others who volunteer their time to help us parents get the message out to our kids, even those as young as my 7-year old daughter.

"Thank you very much and keep up the good work."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"I simply wanted to express myself. We notice here that that is the call for us legislators and for the State and the Coalition for a Drug-Free Hawaii, and I will be wearing your red ribbon for the remainder of the month. But I would also like to join in the Coalition and to pledge that I will promote the healthy, drug-free lifestyles, to raise public awareness about substance abuse issues as stated in some of our fliers.

"As was mentioned so eloquently by prior speakers, this is a terrible dilemma that we are facing in our schools, in our homes, and in our communities. And with that, I also notice the discussion about the war on drugs and the overwhelming odds against our winning, but I must say that if we can change the direction of one child, and if we can reset that child in the right path, then we are winning the war on drugs.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Yoshinaga then rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"I just want to congratulate Sandra Lacar who I have very happy and fond memories about in working on a strategic vision for the YWCA. Congratulations, Sandra.

"I also wanted to end on an uplifting note that the youths and your vision are being affected by your program. Representative Saiki and I, just this morning, participated in a wonderful community event with Mr. Peter Uyehara, the Principal of Lunalilo Elementary School, of which I am a graduate. And all the little ones were so fabulous, with McGruff and some other invited guests. We walked around our community for the school to basically elevate community awareness that these young children, between grades 1 through 5, are going to say no to drugs.

"Aloha and mahalo."

Representative Kanoho then rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"I had the pleasure over the past couple of years, Mr. Speaker and members, to meet with and work with David Higgins who has come in diligent support of various youth programs, not only youth programs involving youth but, in particular, programs that involve youths at risk. When he first came in, I had to ask myself the question ... Is he for real? ... because there was no apparent gain or any kind of a reward for him. It soon became apparent that he is a very caring person and cares for the community and, in particular, cares for the youth of the community.

"I have been so very much impressed with you, Dave, and all the work that you continue to do ... thank you very much."

Representative McMurdo then rose and stated:

"I would like to say that the most important thing that we can do to get control of the overcrowding in prisons is a drug-free Hawaii, and thank you very much for your efforts."

Representative Tarnas then rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"As an alternate member of the Substance Abuse Task Force with the Health Chair, I have to note that by supporting this resolution, we are in fact pursuing one of the recommendations which is, that through education, prevention and treatment, we would be taking an innovative step in addressing substance abuse problems in the State

"I do commend the Coalition for a Drug-Free Hawaii for their efforts in this regard, and that when we consider bills to support this effort for education, treatment and prevention, that we remember this day.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Morihara then rose and requested that the comments of the previous speakers be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 45 was adopted.

At this time, a Certificate of Recognition and a floral lei was presented to Ms. Sandra Lacar by Representative Pepper and a floral lei was presented to David Higgins by Representative Chun Oakland.

At 12:50 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:07 o'clock p.m.

Representatives Yonamine and Menor, for the Committees on Labor and Public Employment and Consumer Protection and Commerce, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 292-96) recommending that H.B. No. 2844 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2844, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WORKERS' COMPENSATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Pepper, for the Committee on Health, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 293-96) recommending that H.B. No. 3485, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3485, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DISTRIBUTION OF CIGARETTES IN PACKAGES

CONTAINING LESS THAN TWENTY CIGARETTES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative Takamine, for the Committee on Water and Land Use Planning, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 294-96) recommending that H.B. No. 2839, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative Amaral moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2839, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Case rose and requested the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Thielen then rose to ask the Clerk to register a no vote for her, saying:

"Mr. Speaker, if the members will look at their list of who voted how on this bill, you'll see that out of ten votes, four were with reservations, and one was against and that was myself.

"The Police Department are concerned about it, and I certainly am. What it will allow hunters to do is to go into the forest with pistols and revolvers. Although they'll have to be a certain size, they still can carry those weapons into the hunting area.

"The concern of the police is that it could create some very dangerous situations where someone who has no intent of hunting is in there with a pistol or a revolver for other purposes that may not be lawful, and it mixes something that is normally a lawful activity -- the hunting -- with maybe some other kinds of illegal activities. But we're arming people, and I think unwarrantedly, under this bill.

"So I'd ask everyone to take a look at it. It goes to Judiciary next, and those of us that sit on Judiciary will get a second 'shot' at it, so to speak.

"Thank you."

Representative Meyer then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"In the hearing, there were a great many people that testified on this bill, and I think one of the reasons for the bill is that many pig hunters who are hunting and their dogs trap a pig and maybe the pig is attacking the dog --they'd like to save their dog and kill the pig -- but with the rifle, oftentimes they kill both.

"It was also brought up that with a pistol, you are aiming at a prey very much closer to you, so there's less chance of shooting another hunter who is maybe thousands of yards away. You have to be much closer to the prey that you're hunting.

"I personally feel that it's a good bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McMurdo then rose to ask the Clerk to register a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lee then rose to ask the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Amaral then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I certainly note the concerns of people that are rising to notify us, but I point out to the members that the function of the Judiciary Committee is to deal with these issues -- issues of law enforcement, public safety and crime prevention, and certainly, the prominent testifiers before that committee tend to be the people from the Police Department.

"I have no doubt that these concerns will be raised and proper consideration will be given to it. Knowing that, therefore, I certainly support it coming up for discussion before the Judiciary Committee.

"Thank you."

Representative Takamine then rose and requested that his comments, in support of the bill, be entered into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Takamine's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, of all the votes I have cast, my vote in support of H.B. 2839, HD 1, is one of the most difficult. The difficulty comes not from the merits of the bill, because I believe that it is good legislation.

"The difficulty that I face in casting my vote on this measure comes from questionable lobbying on this bill. On the evening before the bill was heard in the Water and Land Use Planning Committee, I received a letter supportive of the legislation that ended with the following:

'P.S. Our membership enjoys incomes far above the Hawaii average. They almost all hold positions in business, and government employment, of substantial influence. We would be happy to provide you with a list of membership to prove this fact. Please support us and we will recipricate [sic] in your next campaign(s) [emphasis added].'

"After receiving this, I had to seriously consider how to proceed in a proper manner. In seeking input on this matter, I consulted the Ethics Commission and obtained the advice of our House Legal Counsel. I ultimately decided, first, to not participate in decision-making on the bill in committee, since I would have been required to make a recommendation on its approval as the Chairperson.

"Second, I decided that a written response to the letter was necessary. My response follows:

'Dear President Hogue: This refers to your letter dated February 1, 1996, regarding House Bill 2839 (hand gun hunting). I am always pleased to hear from Hawaii's citizens interested in particular legislative measures.

'However, I must also reply that I cannot permit my vote to be influenced by the final sentence in the postscript of your letter promising reciprocation in my next campaign in exchange for my support of H.B. 2839 now. The most basic reason for this is that I always vote my conscience as best I can after fully studying the matter at hand and by listening to and reading the public testimony. I assure you that I have studied H.B. 2839 carefully with a view to supporting the best legislation possible consistent with the public good. I receive full compensation under law for my performance of this public duty. I do not expect or accept any further benefits or reciprocation for this public duty.

'The promise contained in your letter is somewhat vague in that it does not specify the kind of "support" expected or "reciprocation" promised. However, I note

that Hawai'i Revised Statutes, Section 710-1040(a) prohibits anyone from making a bribe to a public official, meaning to offer, "directly or indirectly, any pecuniary benefit upon a public servant with the intent to influence the public servant's vote, opinion, judgment, exercise of discretion, or other action in his official capacity."

'Section 710-1040(b) prohibits any public official from accepting, "directly or indirectly, any pecuniary benefit with the intent that his vote, opinion, judgment, exercise of discretion, or other action as a public servant will thereby be influenced."

'Please understand that in saying this, I recognize that your letter makes no specific offer of a "pecuniary interest." However, I raise this point to indicate the potentially serious misconduct that your offer of quid-pro-quo might suggest. I hope you can appreciate my position which demands that I must not only perform in an ethical manner but must also avoid all appearance of impropriety as an elected Representative.

'Finally, you should know that before I received your letter, I was fully prepared to support H.B. 2839 when it comes before our committee. Now, however, after discussing your letter with our legal counsel and the State Ethics Commission, I have decided that in order to avoid any appearance of impropriety I am:

- '(1) Recusing myself from all active participation in my committee regarding this bill;
- '(2) Having the committee's vice chair (Representative Nekoba) conduct the hearing in my stead; and
- '(3) Refraining from voting when the question is called in committee.'

"Mr. Speaker, I am confident that this bill will move forward. However, that creates my dilemma. On Second Reading, our legislative procedures do not allow for me to be excused from voting on this measure, and there is a question of whether I would be fulfilling my responsibility to my constituents if I were to not cast a vote. I felt that, above all else, my response needed to address the question of public confidence in the integrity of the legislative process.

"Mr. Speaker, I considered very seriously the option of voting against the measure (though I believe it is a good bill), to send a message that lobbying which (in my opinion) crossed the line of propriety, should not be tolerated.

"At the same time, I realize that the letter could have simply been in artful wording, with nothing improper intended. I also realize that there was no specific offer made, and none will be made because of my response. In light of the foregoing, I have decided that I best represent the interests of my constituents by voting in support of the measure. However, Mr. Speaker, I felt that I must explain, on the record, the basis for my decision.

"Mr. Speaker, I fully realize the heavy responsibility that comes with the honor of serving as the Representative for the First District. I realize also the great importance of protecting the integrity of the legislative process, especially during the current times.

"Mr. Speaker, I feel that I have made the best decision given the circumstances, and I thank you for the opportunity to provide background information and the rationale for my decision."

Representative McMurdo then rose and stated:

"I voted no on this bill in committee and it seems pretty inconsistent, without some explanation, to turn around and vote yes now."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2839, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HUNTING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Case, Lee, McMurdo and Thielen voting no.

Representative Pepper, for the Committee on Health, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 295-96) recommending that H.B. No. 3484 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Amaral moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3484 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Anderson rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered.

Representative Anderson continued, saying:

"I am concerned that we're putting a tax on cigarettes just to get teenagers to stop smoking. And some of the testimony that we heard. . .we know that kids will start into smoking for many reasons.

"The Waikiki Health Center talked about the homeless children, the runaway children, and I really hope we would put the emphasis on programs for our youngsters to try to get them to stay active and not have to get into using cigarettes, drugs or alcohol. But just putting a tax on cigarettes, the kids will sti! get it, so I am very concerned that we better spend more attention to after school programs, getting parents to be better parents and whatever else it takes to keep our teenagers active.

"Thank you."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose to register his no vote, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kawananakoa continued, saying:

"I would like to note that the prior speaker's concerns I share; however, I have another concern I would like to raise, and that's the issue of taxing.

"Again, we see another tax. Although we impose this tax on perhaps a very discriminated populace in our communities, nevertheless it is a tax. It is raising taxes once again. For that reason, I will be voting no.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pepper then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the testimony in the Health Committee leaves me with no doubt that, in fact, this measure will prevent some teenagers from beginning to smoke and, therefore, from becoming addicted.

"Issues related to taxation and the money that this might bring in are appropriate for the Finance Committee. But from a health standpoint, there is no question in my mind or the minds of most of our committee members that this, along with a number of other measures, will in fact reduce the use of tobacco by teenagers.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose to speak in support of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"I would like to believe and agree with what the Chair of the Health Committee has just spoken, that in effect when you do put the price up, the demand does go down. Ironically, the demand for smoking among young people in the last few years has actually gone up and every state, such as ours, has increased the price. Last year, it didn't work. Is it going to work this year, or are we going to create another black market? A 66 percent increase in tax is a tax is a tax by any other name.

"I know this is for purposes of behavior modification, but as we've just celebrated a Drug-Free Hawaii Month, look, it's illegal to have drugs; in fact, it's expensive to have drugs. And we're saying -- well, when it comes into the area of tobacco, it's going to work. And I wish it would be right in what you're saying.

"Mr. Speaker, my suggestion to the ongoing committees and, by the way, a footnote to the Majority Floor Leader and to yourself, Mr. Speaker, is that even though the specialized committee only looks at their arena, this is the arena where we talk about everything — we are specialists in all discourse, on all events and occasions of legislation for the people and the policy of the State of Hawaii. So I don't think there's anything special about whether Judiciary's got more lawyers and there are more PhD's in the Health Committee. We all have a responsibility to say what we feel is on the mind and the hearts of the people of Hawaii on all issues.

"Having said that, Mr. Speaker, I would like to suggest to the next committee ... if this doesn't work, let's pull back on it, let's sunset it. Let's have some quantitative measures to what we say we're going to do, and if they don't work, let's admit it rather than pretending that the Emperor has clothes on, like we do on other bills, and we keep continually reiterating on an assumption that if we put the price up, it's going to work. Let's get something in place to measure the efficacy of this and if it doesn't work, let's admit it and then change it.

"In one footnote, Mr. Speaker, because not everybody buys their products from Costco -- in bulk purchase. I want you to know, Mr. Speaker, that in every country other than Western Europe and America, Asia and Africa sell cigarettes by the stick. It's a common practice. From what I heard from my colleagues, this is such an aberration of the sale of cigarettes. The world, by and large, sell cigarettes at what we're trying to change, and I'm speaking up now to Stand. Com. Rep. No. 293-96 (H.B. No. 3485, HD 1) about the distribution. This is a common practice, and I know the point is to get accessible cigarettes out of the hands of kids. But what about those who are adults and they're poor who can't afford to buy a whole stick or a whole pack and have to buy by the stick? Somebody's got to speak for those who are also unable to do this. Unfortunately, as I said, we can't all afford Costco bulk purchases.

"Having said that, Mr. Speaker, I would also suggest that in this one, if it doesn't work, let's change it; let's go back to those who come from Asia, those who come from Africa, and they are vendors here -- let them go back to giving their people the way that their methodology has always been so we don't have to change it.

"My point is to build in some mechanism that says -- if the assumption of this body is correct, let's carry it on but if it's not, let's have a way of tripping it up, making it right if we're wrong. "Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Meyer then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Stegmaier then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"In addition to the concerns that have already been raised, I just want to clarify that the only person who came to testify, who works with young people, did admit in questions and answers that he felt that this tax increase would have negligible impact on the young people with whom he works.

"My other concern is that the projected \$3 million in additional revenues which would be obtained by this tax increase would go into the general fund and would not be targeted to deal with the continuing problem of widespread tobacco use among the young.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3484, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE CIGARETTE TAX AND TOBACCO TAX LAW," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Anderson, Kawananakoa and Meyer voting no.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Hawaiian Affairs and Housing, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 296-96) recommending that H.B. No. 3919, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3919, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAIIAN HOMES COMMISSION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative Menor, for the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 297-96) recommending that H.B. No. 4145, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 4145, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII HURRICANE RELIEF FUND," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Santiago, for the Committee on Ocean Recreation and Marine Resources, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 298-96) recommending that H.B. No. 3275 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3275, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR INFORMATION AND REGULATORY BUOYS TO DESIGNATE THE NO-WAKE ZONE IN MAMALA BAY OFF WAIKIKI," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Yonamine, for the Committee on Labor and Public Employment, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 299-96) recommending that H.B. No. 1042 pass

Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1042, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMPLOYMENT," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 300-96) recommending that H.B. No. 3552, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3552, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GENERAL EXCISE TAXATION," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Morihara, for the Committee on Agriculture, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 301-96) recommending that H.B. No. 936 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 936, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INCOME TAX," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Morihara, for the Committee on Agriculture, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 302-96) recommending that H.B. No. 3975 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Water and Land Use Planning.

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3883, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII FOR ORNAMENTAL PLANT RESEARCH," was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Lee, for the Committee on Higher Education and the Arts, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 308-96) recommending that H.B. No. 3446, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Amaral moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3446, HD 2, be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Yoshinaga rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I am, as you know and my colleagues know, for growth for the State of Hawaii in creating a good vision for our youth. However, I do have great concerns about the focus of this measure at this time in that we have many problems in aging districts, such as mine, where again we represent the urban core areas, that our facilities and infrastructure are deteriorating and are in great need of repair and maintenance, and other focus in terms of its continuing mission to serve our State.

"With respect to the dilution of those efforts and in terms of urban renewal issues that I am very concerned with, I have reservations that expansion to West Oahu at this time without addressing such concerns on our urban core areas is premature.

"Thank you."

Representative Thielen then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"I am a little bit confused because I sat through the committee hearings also, and I understood that it would have a negative financial impact. I also noticed that the Department of Budget and Finance, the local 'scrooge' for most programs if they are going to have a negative impact, submitted testimony in support and supports this. I would further state that as a non-traditional student who went back to college after having four children, I was very grateful that the University of Hawaii at Manoa welcomed me in even though I was an older student.

"I look at the committee's report, recognizing that the University of Hawaii-West Oahu has developed into a school for such non-traditional students whose average age is 32 and who work and commute to classes. I think that the concept of that University is very sound.

"I also think that our population center is certainly moving toward that area, and since I saw no testimony that indicated a negative financial impact, I stand in support of this bill, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kahikina then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"I am a graduate of West Oahu and I am very thankful for that opportunity. But I am also concerned about the human infrastructure of our Second City, and that is the opportunity for our kids to go on to higher education.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3446, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII - WEST OAHU," was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Chun Oakland, for the Committee on Human Services, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 309-96) recommending that H.B. No. 3459 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3459, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Chun Oakland, for the Committee on Human Services, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 310-96) recommending that H.B. No. 2525, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2525, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DOMESTIC AND SEXUAL VIOLENCE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Morihara, for the Committee on Agriculture, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 311-96) recommending that H.B. No. 2900, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2900, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR AGRICULTURAL RESEARCH

AND DEVELOPMENT," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Stegmaier, for the Committee on Education, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 312-96) recommending that H.B. No. 3071, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3071, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES IMPROVEMENT SPECIAL FUND," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Chun Oakland, for the Committee on Human Services, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 313-96) recommending that H.B. No. 4131, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative Amaral moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 4131, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Santiago rose to ask the Clerk to cast a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Santiago continued, saying:

"First of all, I would like to commend the Chairman of the Committee for the hard work that she put forth. I know this is one of the most difficult issues that we have ever faced. I believe this is the most important bill that I have yet seen in all of my tenure in the House. I believe, Mr. Speaker, that there are some very good things in the bill that we have talked about for a long time and I hope that as the bill weaves its way through the process, these good things will come out of the body.

"First of all, I would like to point out the disregards that would provide incentives are excellent and, again, I commend the author of the bill. I think that she has done a wonderful job of dealing with this complex issue. We are allowing for educational unit credits and an automobile to be disregarded, and these are good things in the bill. However, I also find mixed messages in the bill and I need to ask the Speaker to please bear with me. I know this is Second Reading, but this is very, very important to me.

"The mixed messages that I wanted to point out is in the bill. It states clearly on page 3 that thousands of Hawaii's children's lives are at stake, and yet, later on in the bill, it talks about removing the amounts that are provided to the families based upon the uncooperation of the family in the work program that they are going to be setting up. I would suggest that this be amended so that just the amount of the grant that is going to the family that is scheduled for the parent be looked upon, being terminated, or reduced at 20, 80 and 100 percent over the course of a few years.

"I'd also like to point out that also on page 3, it says, 'Contrary to popular imagination, most aid to families with dependent children families do not remain on the welfare rolls forever -- sixty-two percent remain for less than two years with the average stay being thirty-five months.' In other words, the average stay is less than three years, contrary to what many people think about people who are on welfare staying on forever and ever. Given this, we find out that for the majority -- a large percentage of the majority -- welfare works, at least

AFDC works. These individuals get on and they get off, and the goal is accomplished.

"I want to point out, too, that this public/private partnership that is being put forth here is a great idea. I think it's time that we began to elicit the support of the private industries.

"I'd also like to point out, however, that many, many months of work looking into those industries that would participate in a program like this has found less than one hundred jobs would be created through this kind of an effort. Of that one hundred jobs, those who have said they would participate object vehemently to the language on page 6, line 8, asking for mandatory payment into an educational trust fund. Given that, they said they won't participate.

"I'd also like to point out that the Jobs Program right now has about 4,300 individuals in place already by the department in jobs which would most likely get pretty close to meeting the federal requirement that we're all so worried about that's going to come down when the Feds look at welfare reform.

"This bill does also talk about the need for us to be prepared for those reforms, and I ask that these specific percentages that were put into the bill in response to our anticipation that the federal government will require that, we delete it and we give some flexibility to the Department of Human Services because, as they have pointed out in my conversation with them the last couple of days, we do not expect the limits in the federal block grant to be as severe as we first thought in September. Given that, there is no reason for those percentages to be put in so clearly.

"On page 16, line 9, this entire clause has already been deemed to be unconstitutional. I see no reason for this to be put into the bill as it further caters to the stereotypes that we have about poor people.

"I would like to also point out that on page 23, the entire Part III regarding child support should be in a separate bill. I think if we're going to look at welfare reform, we should look at welfare reform and we should look at it as a bill.

"This whole section where we talk about the \$50 pass through is another concern for the Finance Committee because that would definitely throw up the entire budget that the Department of Human Services has already forwarded to us.

"I would like to point out that in that clause on page 32, line 14, they talk about the director's involvement and it is my understanding that the director would have nothing to do with the AG's office in dealing with that child welfare issue.

"On page 42, Part IV, this is another thing that should be in a separate bill. I like the idea. I know the individuals who work with the handicapped. I just don't think that that should be included in this bill if we're going to talk about welfare reform, one of the most sweeping measures we will ever face as a body.

"Now I get to page 46 and I will try to limit my comments, and feel free to call me out of order, Mr. Speaker.

"On page 46, Part V, the miscellaneous provisions. I find the language in this portion of the bill, quite frankly, objectionable. I think it again caters to the stereotypes we have about people who are on welfare. It asks specifically that we look at trying to have family caps. It also has

something in here about prohibiting AFDC to illegal aliens -- illegal residents. The truth is, that's already done. And why put something in the bill that we already know is not being done other than to continue to foster the idea that somehow there are illegal residents out there who are getting AFDC? It talks about holding true those who are sponsoring those people who come over here. They already do that.

"It talks about school attendance. It talks about how we are going to use school attendance as an incentive to keep people on AFDC.

"All of this is from a negative perspective. When will we begin to start to ask questions about the redistribution of our economic wealth? When are we going to stop dealing with the poor as if they were in a vacuum? At what point in time will we as a nation, collectively, stop looking down upon the most vulnerable of our society whenever things get tough which is what they are right now. They're tough here, they're tough throughout the country. Immediately, what do we do? We decide, well, why is it tough? Because those guys down below -- they are getting a free lunch from all the hard work we're putting in.

"People have said to me ... you know, Representative Santiago, you only come in and you say, well, this is no good. I put force on issues that I think would be good in terms of redistributing the economic wealth of this State. Until we begin to address those issues, all of this is shortighted, it's punitive, it's mean spirited. I don't even want to get into what I think about it as a Democrat, and I ask the members of this body, as this bill goes through, I think we need to look closely at it.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Arakaki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I want to acknowledge the expertise of the previous speaker, and I share many of his same concerns, but I also want to point out that the genesis of this bill was actually at the end of last session when the Chair of the Human Services Committee started taking some of the issues that we knew we were going to be facing and took them out into the community to hear the concerns. Even during her pregnancy and giving birth, all during that time, she was involved in communicating with the community, and those directly involved with the concerns of welfare reform.

"I think this bill has been through so many reiterations, you know, it's like chop suey. But I think it reflects what the community out there wants, and what the people in the system who are responsible for providing public assistance want, and what we as policymakers want to address, albeit it is not a perfect bill. I think it needs a lot of work.

"I just wanted to make a point that it's not for the lack of input, that I think everyone was given the chance to give their thoughts and their feelings about this bill, even the welfare recipients. I think we need to acknowledge the Chair of the Human Services Committee for being so open up to the last minute. In fact, we weren't even sure this bill was going to make it out of committee because even up to the last minute, she was still willing to take input and make changes, and I think it's going to continue to change as what happens at the national level continues to change.

"Mr. Speaker, you sent me to Washington, D.C. in December to engage in policy discussion on welfare

reform and Medicaid reform. Even at that time, other legislators weren't sure what they were going to do. Some of them wanted to wait until the Federal government and Congress came down with their block grant programs and their policies. But I think you and the rest of Leadership, we feel that we are the policymakers, we are the ones who should be setting what welfare reform in the State of Hawaii should look like. And this is what we're doing -- we're setting the stage for welfare reform. And some of these measures may not pass the muster of what Congress passes, but I think very clearly it states what our concerns are, and I think one of our major concerns is that we have safety nets for all the people involved in providing assistance, especially to our families

"It is not a perfect bill, but hopefully, as it moves on in the process, that more people will have input and we can address some of the concerns that the previous speaker mentioned as well as other members. It's something that we should all be concerned about.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Saiki then rose and requested a yes vote with reservations, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Hamakawa then rose and requested a yes vote with reservations, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Garcia then rose and requested a yes vote with reservations, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Swain then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"I would like to thank the Human Services Chairperson for a visionary bill. It is something that is long overdue. We are at the point of running out of money. We have to look at where this money is going. She has taken that and decided that she can institute reform with our support and our help.

"None of us like to see the poor out there. But, Mr. Speaker, we have to stop giving people fish and start teaching them how to fish. We are running out of fish. We need to teach them how to go out and support themselves, and this bill will start to allow us to do that.

"Thank you."

Representative Garcia then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Let me just say that this Representative was on welfare at a time when he was growing up in his district. And yes, I did get fish, much needed at that time -- I am not ashamed to say that -- but I did learn to fish on my own.

"I would like to think that the concerns raised by my colleague next to me. . .I would like to think that the next committee would address those and that this body would think of that, and both of us who are Democrats, to realize what we are doing when we say that we are trying to set the stage and trying to take a proactive stance in regard to what the people in Washington are trying to do. And think of people like me who had depended at one time on the welfare program, and those of us who were able to learn to fish on their own because of that.

"Thank you."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"I just wanted to stand in support and to recognize that this is not a party bill. This is not Democrat, this is not Republican -- this is moving forward in the State of Hawaii. We need to move forward. We are not trying to pull out the safety nets. We are simply trying to help people move in the right direction by putting incentives in our welfare system.

"This bill provides that if you go to work, if you educate yourself, if you attempt to look for a job, then you will continue on the welfare system, albeit there will be cuts over time. As a policy matter, we're saying over a period of five years, your amount of welfare benefit will be reduced. Again, an incentive not to stay on welfare.

"I appreciate the previous speaker's note of the need at many times in our lives for many of our citizens for some help, and I believe we all agree with that statement. However, I also agree with the prior speaker from Kauai that we are running out of fish and we need to help people, encourage people to learn how to fish, and not simply to be giving out fish.

"With those remarks, I hope that we will keep this discussion in terms of a policy for the State of Hawaii and not let it slip down a slippery slope of Republican or Democrat rhetoric.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, both you and I have a background of working in poverty programs -- you, with HCAP, and I was with Legal Aid as an attorney for five years.

"I don't believe in stereotypes because I dealt with people day by day, and they don't fit into molds. To the extent the bill does that, I think it was not intending to, and I think we can look at that in the next committee and try to eliminate any stereotypes that are there.

"I'd also like to say strongly that if you take a look at our Minority caucus' votes in the past, where we were against freezing the cap on AFDC benefits to lower income recipients, we voted against freezing those caps. You take a look at where we stood as a group, and I don't think it's fair to politicize this, and I really resent anyone trying to do that. We are in Hawaii, not on the mainland, Mr. Speaker. . .

At this point, the Chair interrupted and stated:

"Will you please stick to the item of the bill."

Representative Thielen responded:

"Yes, I am," and continued her remarks, saying:

"We are in Hawaii, and I think you have to take us for what we are, and what our records have shown.

"I also like, Mr. Speaker, Section 4 of the bill. I think it's a very positive section, and it provides for assurance that child support will be paid. When child support is paid by the non-custodial parent that is able to make those payments, that eliminates the need to even be in the AFDC program.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Chun Oakland then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"I appreciate all the prior speakers' comments and listen with an open heart.

"The bill before you reflects ideas from years of concerns and suggestions made by persons on welfare assistance, those who advocate very strongly on behalf of people on welfare, and the general public. It is also in combination, reflective of the anticipated changes in welfare mandates at the Federal level.

"This omnibus welfare reform bill contains elements that support work opportunities for those on welfare, and provide greater incentives to families so that they are able to keep more of their earnings. It also recognizes the correlation between the absence of child support and the absence of child care that creates or places many families in the situation of needing assistance through the aid to families with dependent children.

"There is much concern that has been expressed, and I can feel that concern. At the Federal level, it still isn't clear what in fact will be coming down from the Federal government. The bill contains all the aspects of what we think may come down, and we hope that through this public dialogue, that we, as legislators, will be able to know what best to take as elements of good policy to assist people on welfare, and also offer the opportunity for the public to make comments to help us mold policies in anticipation of various changes.

"So, again, I look at this particular measure as an opportunity for free discussion. It has a wide range of different options, and I welcome and I am sure the other members of this House welcome, that kind of participation from the public on this very important measure.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 4131, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HUMAN SERVICES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representative Santiago voting no.

Representative Kanoho, for the Committee on Legislative Management, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 314-96) recommending that H.B. No. 2726, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committees on Judiciary and Consumer Protection and Commerce.

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2726, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE AUDITOR," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committees on Judiciary and Consumer Protection and Commerce.

Representatives Menor and Tom, for the Committees on Consumer Protection and Commerce and Judiciary, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 315-96) recommending that H.B. No. 4142 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 4142, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE VII, SECTION 12, OF THE HAWAII CONSTITUTION, TO ALLOW THE USE OF REVENUE BONDS FOR THE FUNDING OF A STATE PROPERTY INSURANCE PROGRAM PROVIDING

HURRICANE INSURANCE COVERAGE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representatives Menor and Tom, for the Committees on Consumer Protection and Commerce and Judiciary, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 316-96) recommending that H.B. No. 4144 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 4144, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE VII, SECTION 12, OF THE HAWAII CONSTITUTION, TO ALLOW THE USE OF SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS FOR THE HAWAII HURRICANE RELIEF FUND," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representatives Menor and Tom, for the Committees on Consumer Protection and Commerce and Judiciary, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 317-96) recommending that H.B. No. 3402, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Amaral moved that the joint report of the Committees be adopted and H.B. No. 3402, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Kawananakoa rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Again, I note that this is going to raise the fee -- a tax -- on annuities. I find it very difficult that we would be raising a tax on people who are attempting to save for their old age, who are attempting to put into their insurance policies a means by which they can cover their loved ones. This is not a good idea.

"Again, philosophically I oppose this bill even though I know it is a small amount -- I believe it is 50 cents per annuity or a certain percentage of a tax. However, we add this with a nickel coming to the Department of Education, we have traffic code changes, we add this to the 50 cents we heard earlier with regard to the cigarette tax or a dollar per package. We add, we add, and it all amounts to quite a lot after a while.

"I needed to make those remarks, and I'd appreciate the Clerk to register a no vote.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Your nickel and diming or, in effect, punishing the rich, if you will, for the sake of what I know is a shortfall and a concern as was with the previous bill for those who are without.

"However, a rose by any other name is a rose, and this is a tax increase. There is probably a better way to go about it than the way we are here.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen then rose and asked the Clerk to cast a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Thielen continued:

"Mr. Speaker, this is one of the probably few times I have been on the same side as State Farm Insurance on a measure"

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 3402, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INSURANCE PREMIUM TAXES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Kawananakoa, Thielen and Ward voting no.

Representative McMurdo, for the Committee on Public Safety and Military Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 318-96) recommending that H.B. No. 3543 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3543, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CORRECTIONAL INDUSTRIES ADVISORY COMMITTEE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative McMurdo, for the Committee on Public Safety and Military Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 319-96) recommending that H.B. No. 3967 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3967, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PERTAINING TO PUBLIC SAFETY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

THIRD READING

The following bills, which were on the calendar for Third Reading, were read throughout and the following actions taken:

H.B. No. 2601, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, H.B. No. 2601, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO JURORS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Tom being excused.

H.B. No. 2603, HD 1:

Representative Amaral moved that H.B. No. 2603, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Kawananakoa rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"You may note that I rose with reservations on Second Reading, stating that I would hope the next committee would be able to take a look at my concerns. However, this bill didn't have another committee to go to, so it is

right back before us again in the same form as it was when we voted on it on Second Reading.

"I rise in opposition because I am very concerned, after making another review on this amendment to our Hawaii Revised Statutes, that what we might be doing is keeping many of our populace out of the juries.

"If we take note of this particular amendment, it would require a juror to be able to read, speak and understand the English language. Now, most people can understand and most people can speak the English language here in the islands, and I think that may be a good prerequisite to being a juror. However, to formally be able to read the English language may be a little too restrictive. I can think of many elderly folks of different nationalities -- Popo, Tutu and others -- that would not necessarily be able to read the English language and yet we will exclude them from being a potential juror.

"I raise the attention of this esteemed body to what occurred in the South when various states attempted to keep Blacks from being selected as jurors. They enacted laws requiring a literacy test -- being able to read -- thereby sufficiently and significantly restricting the numbers of Blacks entering into the Jury Pool.

"Mr. Speaker, times have changed and I don't believe that discrimination was the intent of this bill. However, I am very concerned that that may be the unintended result. For that, I vote no, and I realize there is no committee to hear this. The next committee is the Senate. Perhaps in Conference Committee, at that time I won't have an opportunity to speak, so I speak now. I hope that the other members of this body will take a closer look at this particular bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative White then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think it's important to point out that this is simply a change in the way this particular provision is stated in the Hawaii Revised Statutes. It is not changing the intent of the law. It has been a requirement that people be able to read, speak and understand. We're just changing it from a double negative to a positive.

"I would like to point out also that if you are the accused, sitting in this body and sitting on Judiciary as a non-lawyer, has given me the opportunity to review all sorts of things. And even though I can usually understand English and I can read it and write it, it's still very mysterious when we get into Judiciary matters, and I would just like to submit to this body that if you are the accused, I think you might really wish that every person on the jury is able to read and understand English because we make very heavy decisions, and it is very important that those decisions be made with clarity and with true justice.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Even though if my colleague from Maui said that we don't understand English because maybe double negatives mean positive, because if this bill says that the functional illiterate of which, Mr. Speaker, we've got forty to sixty percent of our people who are functionally illiterate, and we say you can't come in, this contravenes what otherwise is, you are by law given the option of a jury trial by a jury of your peers.

"The notion was, at least my understanding of it was, in the original bill, you could be able to speak and understand English, but you didn't have to read. This draft says you've got to be proficient which, as my colleague said, is tantamount to a poll tax or a literacy test

"Mr. Speaker, having worked with the functionally illiterate -- as I may have spoken in my last sentence -- there is no correlation, at least in my experience of working with the unemployed and the underemployed. Having been with the CETA program, there is no correlation between education and one's success in business, and there has to be no correlation between one's ability to have common sense, justice and equity, and knowing what, in effect, all of the sophisticated footnotes of perhaps jury's notes are given. Even I've been told of people serving on juries that there's not much reading going on anyway.

"So I think we have to measure this and if the language is as he said, let's make it very clear and get away from this obfuscation.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Amaral then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"I'd like to reiterate the Vice Chair's clarification on this. We believe, Mr. Speaker, the judges presently query the jurors on their ability to read, speak and understand the English language.

"Personally, Mr. Speaker, if I am sitting before a jury and I am aware the documents will be handed to them that will help establish whether or not you're going to take my property from me or whether or not you're going to incarcerate me for the rest of my life, I really would prefer that the jury of my peers is able to read that document we are submitting for them to understand, because of the way the responsibility that they are giving over my freedom or my property.

"I strongly support this measure and hope that my members will as well.

"Thank you."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I find it necessary to add a few more comments in regard to this bill. I continue to stand in opposition.

"It was mentioned by previous speakers that if they were before a jury, they would want to know that those jurors could read. If I were before a jury, I would like that also. However, put yourself in the position of some person who doesn't have the background nor the education that we have, who has been charged with burglary or assault or any other crime, and wanted to have a jury of his peers and not having the possibility of having someone on the jury that doesn't read in the same way as that person doesn't read.

"I think the prior comments also neglect to understand the jury process. The attorney, the public defender, can always ask that a juror be removed for good cause, and I would imagine if it was a complicated business litigation suit that if a juror couldn't read, there may be good cause to have that juror removed. There are certain preemptive strikes that they can also make to have the jury honed down to an appropriate jury for the particular case.

"So I am still very concerned that what we are doing is precluding the opportunity for a full selection from our populace for the jury. With those comments, I still register a no vote.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2603, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO JURORS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 43 ayes to 7 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Kawananakoa, Marumoto, Meyer, Stegmaier, Thielen and Ward voting no, and Representative Tom being excused.

H.B. No. 3046, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, H.B. No. 3046, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PENAL CODE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Tom being excused.

H.B. No. 3047, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, H.B. No. 3047, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CRIMINAL DAMAGE TO PROPERTY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Tom being excused.

H.B. No. 2620, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, H.B. No. 2620, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SENTENCING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Tom being excused.

At this time, the Chair recognized Representative Thielen and she stated:

 $^{\prime\prime}Mr.$ Speaker, I am rising also against House Bill 2603.

The Chair responded:

"Representative, I am all through with 2603. We went on to 2620. I will not recognize you on 2603. I provided an exception for Representative Kawananakoa because I missed him. We went from 2603 to 2620 so, therefore, no further discussion on 2603."

Representative Thielen: "I just have a point of clarification."

The Chair stated:

"No further discussion on 2603."

Representative Thielen: "I am not discussing; I have a point of clarification, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair asked Representative Thielen to "state your point of clarification," to which Representative Thielen responded:

"The bill that I read, as it originally stated, did. . .

The Chair asked:

"Is this on 2603?" and ruled Representative Thielen out of order.

At 1:57 o'clock p.m., Representative Okamura asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:58 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 2868, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, H.B. No. 2868, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HIGHWAY SAFETY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Tom being excused.

H.B. No. 3370:

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, H.B. No. 3370, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE TREASURY CASHIERING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Tom being excused.

H.B. No. 3566:

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, H.B. No. 3566, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ELECTRONIC FILING OF TAX RETURNS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Tom being excused.

H.B. No. 4075:

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, H.B. No. 4075, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SECURITIES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Tom being excused.

H.B. No. 3367:

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, H.B. No. 3367, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE INVESTMENTS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Tom being excused.

H.B. No. 2622:

Representative Amaral moved that H.B. No. 2622, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Pepper rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, car theft is an annoying, an offensive, and a costly crime. We have every right to be resentful of the repeat offender who takes from us what we have earned.

"But mandatory sentencing, Mr. Speaker, means that somebody has to go to jail. Mandatory sentencing for a property crime when the effect may be that we will need to take money which should be going to build schools and use it to build prisons, that, I cannot support, Mr. Speaker, and therefore, I vote no on this measure."

Representative White rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I certainly respect the comments of my colleague, but the concern that we have is that this is an increasingly frequent crime that must be dealt with. I think all of us share the concern that we must provide some disincentives to certain proliferating crimes. Maybe we don't have the kind of space that we need to incarcerate everybody that perpetrates a property crime at this time. I would like to think that this disincentive will tell somebody that they shouldn't be taking cars, and maybe we don't have to fill up our prisons because the threat is there.

"So, Mr. Speaker, I would like to ask my colleagues to support this measure because it is not a bill that we passed just with the thought of the number of beds in mind, but rather, the thought of creating some punishment for crimes that are becoming all too frequent.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2622, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SENTENCING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pepper voting no, and Representative Tom being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2601, 2603, 3046, 3047, 2620, 2868, 2401, 3339, 3365, 3370, 3566, 4075, 3367 and 2622 had passed Third Reading at 2:00 o'clock p.m.
