WHEREAS, in 1990, the Sealaska Corporation donated two 200-foot Sitka spruce trees that were carved by master canoe builder, Wright Bowman, Jr., into the hulls of the proud voyaging canoe, Hawaiiloa; and

WHEREAS, five years later, the canoe's crew and other Hawaii residents had a unique opportunity to express their appreciation to the donors on a memorable sailing tour of eleven towns and villages on the coast of Southeast Alaska; and

WHEREAS, Hawaii's people are deeply indebted to their Alaska brothers and sisters for their past support -- and also for their generous gift of a house post, created by Tlingit master carver, Nathan Jackson, to commemorate the historic Alaskan voyage of Hawaiiloa; and

WHEREAS, it is a great privilege for the State of Hawaii to host the visiting Sealaska Corporation delegation -- and to strengthen a relationship that is built on the stronger foundation of shared values and traditions of the indigenous people of both Alaska and Hawaii;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, BENJAMIN J. CAYETANO, Governor of the State of Hawaii, do hereby proclaim March 13, 1998, to be Sealaska Corporation Day in Hawaii and welcome our visitors from Southeast Alaska with warmest Aloha.

Representative Okamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 3024, SD 1, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro.

Representative Pendleton rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I will be casting a 'no' vote on this particular bill because again we are moving forward with

special funds and taking things away from the privy of the Legislature where they would rightfully belong. Thank you."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose and asked the Clerk to register a "no" vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Jones then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"The primary reason for establishing a special fund for the Animal Quarantine Station is to make this program self-sustaining. This fund will still be under the scrutiny of the Legislature. Like other funds, airport funds, highway funds, harbors special funds, these are all special funds and they are under the privy of the Legislature. This quarantine special fund will be no different.

"The Department cannot continue to finance this program through general funds. It really is imperative that we switch over to special funds to make this program self-sustaining and not dependant on the State general funds for financing. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I feel that if you have a special fund that is self-sustaining, you often will find that these could go up in case costs go up, in case you want to continue hiring the same number of people. I think it's not a wise use of taxpayers' dollars, and an imposition on people who have to use the Quarantine Center. Also the number of animals will be decreasing as technology makes this not as lengthy a process. So for all those reasons, I will be voting 'no.' Thank you."

Representative Fox then rose and asked the Clerk to register a "no" vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Moses then rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The Chair of Agriculture has helped convince me that just like all those other special funds which we have no say over, I think we should have a say over this. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative P. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 705, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CIVIL SERVICE EXEMPTIONS FOR THE JUDICIARY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Arakaki, Case, Chang, Garcia, Goodenow, Hiraki, Ito, Kahikina, Menor, M. Oshiro, Say, Stegmaier, Tarnas, Thielen and Yonamine being excused.

Representative Tom, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 841-98)

recommending that S.B. No. 721, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Okamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 721, SD 1, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative P. Oshiro.

Representative McDermott rose and asked the Clerk to register a "no" vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pendleton then rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the reason I oppose this particular measure is twofold. First, during the hearing in the Judiciary Committee, we had testimonies from a number of people, one of which represented the Hawaii State Bar Association. The concern they raised was that raising the fees without a prior study, which would evaluate how these fees would impact working middle class, indigents, or other residents of Hawaii who may have to avail themselves of our Judiciary system, passing this bill without such a study would be inappropriate because we don't know how the fees will impact these people.

"For example, Mr. Speaker, if one looks at the bill, on the first page of this bill, line 6, you see that the fee for that particular item is being raised from \$25 to \$75. On line 13 of that same page, you see that the fee is being raised from \$30 to \$100. On line 5, page 2, the fee is going from \$100 to \$200. On line 6, which has to do with, if you're appealing to a circut court it goes from \$30 to \$100. On line 20, from \$15 to \$100, and these are but a few examples of the dramatic increases in fees. We're talking about more than a hundred percent percent increase in some of these cases.

"Mr. Speaker, also note that the monies from these fees are not necessarily earmarked for Judiciary expenses. They go directly into the general fund. So those are the concerns that were raised during the hearing, and for those reasons I'm going to be voting no.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tom then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"First of all, the fees that were originally introduced to us were well beyond what we made it to. I mean these fees that we have are well within the limits and we scaled it down. The second thing is that many of these fees haven't been raised since 1972. That's 20 something years, I can't count, but since 1972 these fees have never been raised. I don't think that it's going to be so unreasonable that people won't be able to afford it.

"We have to raise it. We haven't raised it for over 20 years. So just to say that we're against it because of the concept is not enough. Just to say we don't like hot water, meaning we don't want all water, I don't understand the whole argument because eventually fees have to be raised. That's life.

"The fees go to the general fund so that it is going to benefit all of the people of the State of Hawaii. I don't think that to object to the bill because of a concept that we shouldn't be raising fees is valid. I think even the Hawaii Bar Association said that, that they're not against the fees being raised per se. They just want to make sure that it's still accessible to the people. I believe that the way the House Judiciary did it, we did scale down tremendously, Mr. Speaker. Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, as I read through fee increase, it looked to me it was the Indonesian rupiah, which has been devalued to the point where you've got 70 percent of what it used to be, you've got to put on a double, and a triple in some instances. And because there has not been a leadership change in Indonesia since 1967, does that mean everything that they're doing now is right? Does it mean that we can double and triple fees just overnight? I don't think that historical argument actually holds water, Mr. Speaker. This is a bit excessive, cruel, and unusual punishment on the public, and therefore I'll vote no."

Representative Yamane then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Contrary to some of the former speakers, if you take the cost of living index, and you take the fees of 25 years ago, the increase would be greater than what the Judiciary Chair has made it. He has reduced the fees from what was originally requested by the Judiciary.

"Mr. Speaker, if the cost of living has gone down, then I can see we should reduce the fees. The cost of living has not gone down. If there is concern about the fees going into the general fund, if those of you are interested, you can look for yourselves at the Judiciary budget every year and you'll see the amount of revenue is shown on the Judiciary budget. So when you say that the fees are just going into the general budget, that is not totally correct. The Finance Chair has access to total revenues generated by the Judiciary and by court and the fees do not total up to what the total Judiciary budget is. So maybe we should increase the fees even greater to pay off the Judiciary budget.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"A couple of things that I heard are really getting me concerned. It's as if the taxpayers of this State don't pay any taxes. The last time I checked, government is supposed to help in the Judiciary with our courts so some of that funding doesn't all come from fees. And if we're already paying taxes and the Judiciary is our third branch of government, I think it's worthy and appropriate for this body to take some of our tax money and spend it in the Judiciary.

"So the other question with regard to the reduction, I don't think that was the argument of my good colleague from Maunawili and Enchanted Lakes. I think his point was that we haven't studied this. We're simply guessing in the dark. We seem to do a lot of that in this body, and I don't find that to be the appropriate way to legislate. No study has been performed. HSBA said, contrary to some of the discussion here as if they were in favor of this bill, they were in opposition. Maybe not because they didn't want to see fees increase, but they were concerned that we were increasing fees without any sort of backing or understanding or knowledge, to simply be grabbing the number that we felt was appropriate. It's this kind of legislation that leads to the demise of our stature and the public's trust in us -- when we just simply grab numbers.

"I don't think there was any testimony with regard to inflation at the time of the hearing so I'm curious as to why that's being advocated here on the floor now. For the following reasons, Mr. Speaker, I'll be voting no. I would hope that we'd have better, well-rationed, studied

information before we go and increase/decrease fees for that matter.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Moses then rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I'm not objecting, Mr. Speaker, to the concept. I'm objecting to the fee, 300 percent in most cases here. This is for those who seek to use our justice system. As you have heard, they've already paid for a lot of that with their tax money, and I think what we are doing is maybe forcing some of the people out of the market, so to speak, so that they won't even be able to get access to the Judicial System.

"Mr. Speaker, I think we need to see what are the actual costs of these filings, just of the filings. I have no objection to paying a proper fee that actually costs the same or covers the cost of the filings, but this doesn't appear to be contained in this measure. This appears to be a tax. It's just money going into the general fund with no direct linkage back to what it's suppose to pay for. The numbers, themselves, where do they come from. Are these PFA's? We heard that term the other day. Are these just 'picked from the air'? Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Meyer then rose and asked the Clerk to register a "no" vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Halford then rose and asked the Clerk to register a "no" vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Jones then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"When the Judiciary came into the hearing, they mentioned that they didn't raise the fees on these items for over 20 years. They presently collect little over \$15 million from the fees in the Judiciary. With the increase, this would have brought in about an additional \$2.5 million. After 20 years, I thought this was reasonable. But after considering everything, the Committee decided to bring down the fees. And the fees were dropped drastically in some areas. I thought this was a good compromise. This bill still has a way to go to the Finance Committee, and I think we'll have another shot at it. Maybe then we can raise it some more.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"The public finds the OIP an invaluable resource in assisting them to get copies of this information. I, myself, have had the experience of being 'stonewalled' from a State agency when I wanted to see public information. Without the help of the Office of Information Practices, I'm very confident that I would never have been able to see the information that I wanted to look at, which was indeed public information.

"This bill will change the duties of the Office of Information Practices and limit it only to looking at whether boards throughout the State are operating in an open manner. I guess you'd call this a compromise. To me, we are taking a valuable organization and keeping them in name only and reducing them to being responsible for a very small amount of oversight compared to what they did before. And for that reason, I vote no. Thank you."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I also rise to vote no on this same bill. May the remarks of my colleague, Representative Meyer, be entered as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

"My reservations on this bill is that it doesn't go far enough. We ought to be getting rid of the requirement that this bill calls for, for shipment of vehicles interisland. It's easier to ship a vehicle out-of-state than it is between the islands. Those of us that live in rural areas, a lot of people don't understand this requirement. Their ownership papers may be a hundred miles away from the

pier and it's a real hardship. Stolen vehicles are shipped in containers. It's a well known fact that that's what's going on. So we ought to get rid of the licensing requirement, and I will carry that message to my friend, Representative Menor, when it gets to his Committee. Thank you."

The previous language in the bill said that if you 'wilfully evade or interfere with an investigation', then you will incur a penalty. I think we could keep that language in there, and I would prefer the bill much more.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Thielen rose in support of the bill with reservations, stating:

"I am concerned about allowing the Department to interview employees during working hours on the job and then making the failure to allow that to happen to be subject to penalties. There are instances where this could cause a great problem for the progress of a particular job, where it could maybe even be somewhat dangerous, where it is not in the best interest of moving that project forward. And I'm just not comfortable with that language in the bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Moses then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I also voted with reservations in Committee. It's the same thing that Representative Marumoto said, basically that if you fail to provide payroll records within ten days, you're basically a criminal according to this bill, even if the person who keeps those records had a massive heart attack. So I'm all for substituting some kind of wording that says 'knowingly' or' willingly' withhold those records.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"Shipping rates to Hawaii are double what they should be because of the Jones Act. Shipping costs between Hawaii and the mainland are double. They should be decreased because it forces us to eat all Canadian meat and to ship our cattle on 747s, and lest it be said that I am meandering from the resolution, Mr. Speaker, the point is that this resolution has the spirit and the intent of the airline industry what we need to do for the shipping industry. Therefore, it's a good resolution and I encourage all the authors and those who brought it this far so far.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"Anyway, with this title it could become a very extremely expensive measure which will cause our workers' compensation claims to skyrocket and our businesses and government to suffer. Therefore, I am voting no.

"Thank you."

Representative Pendleton then rose to declare a potential conflict stating that his wife is an elected member of the school board, and the Chair declared "no conflict," and then asked the Clerk to register a "no" vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tarnas then rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"This bill just made it out of the Education Committee, and I must say, I'm the reason why it just made it out. I decided to vote with reservations so that the measure would move forward. But I have tried and tried to understand and remain open to be convinced that an appointed school board at the state-wide level was the thing to do. But I have not been convinced of that. And as we're getting further and further along in this session, I really do have to make my decision that elected school boards make sense when they're closer to the people. And speaking for my own district, which is there on the Neighbor Island, that they would like to have county school boards. So I would like to vote no on this measure. Thank you very much."

Representative Stegmaier then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Just to mention that I'm in favor of state-wide appointed boards because the county boards would be prohibitively expensive. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen then rose and asked the Clerk to register a "no" vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Fox then rose and asked the Clerk to register a "no" vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward then rose and asked the Clerk to register a "no" vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative McDermott then rose and asked the Clerk to register a "no" vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Meyer then rose and asked the Clerk to register a "no" vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose and asked the Clerk to register a "no" vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Halford then rose and stated:

"For the last time on this issue, I want to say that in American democracy we have chosen the form of government that we have legislatively and judicially. The three branches of government are very expensive and very time consuming. And we choose them and we live with them because they're the best form of government. And they're worth every penny and more. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2211, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Fox, Halford, Kawananakoa, McDermott, Meyer, Moses, Pendleton, Tarnas, Thielen and Ward voting no and Representatives Aiona and Takamine being excused.

Representatives Tom and Garcia, for the Committees on Public Safety and Military Affairs and Judiciary, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 999-98) recommending that S.B. No. 2249, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

"This is another fee that I find myself in support of, Mr. Speaker. It's a fee that we charge criminals to get medical services. I'm willing to risk losing the convict vote, so I support this. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the joint report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. No. 2249, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CORRECTIONS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Aiona and Takamine being excused.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. My concern is about the environmental self-audits. I am not comfortable with that. I don't feel that those are in the best interests of protecting our environment. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2347, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ENVIRONMENT," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representative Thielen voting no and Representatives Aiona and Takamine being excused.

Representative Yoshinaga, for the Committee on Energy and Environmental Protection, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1016-98) recommending that S.B. No. 2350, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. Representative Okamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2727, SD 2, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro.

Representative Tarnas rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I don't think we should delay the implementation of the tax increase on cigarettes."

Representative Thielen then rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. There was testimony before us in the Committee today by the Health Department and the testimony showed that, from a public health perspective, any effort to defer Hawaii's nationally recognized progressive cigarette tax would result in more children smoking. I wish people would really take a serious look at this bill and I hope it will not move forward.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Moses then rose and stated:

"On the same measure, Mr. Speaker, I'd like to cast a no vote. I did the same on the House version which appears to be the same. I don't believe we should be singling out the military. If we're really truly committed to stopping smoking, ban it, but don't just try to tax it

and use it to gain revenue. And I think this is singling out our military, and there's some of these facilities that are going to be required to do certain stamping that are federal property, they're not subject to State law. It may be in the harbor or at sea and when they pull in, what do they do then when they can go through all of this hassle and then go back to the State and say, well, we're exempt, and get their money back? I just don't think it's the way to do business.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2727, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Moses, Tarnas and Thielen voting no and Representatives Aiona and Takamine being excused.

Representative Tom, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1019-98) recommending that S.B. No. 2399, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Okamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2399, SD 2, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro.

Representative Tom rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill, as amended today by the House Judiciary Committee, establishes a pilot Clean Elections Project for the House and Senate races for the year 2000. Any person who wants to become a 'clean money' candidate has to first file a declaration with the Campaign Spending Commission, at least 120 days before the Primary Election, stating that the person will comply with the 'clean money' requirements of this act.

"Second, collect from voters in the district 30 qualifying \$5 contributions for the House, or 60 for the Senate, and once certified, Clean Elections candidates receive a debit card that must be used to pay all expenses. The line of credit is basically \$20,000 for Senate races and \$10,000 for House races for both the Primary and General Elections amounting to \$40,000 for Senators and \$20,000 for House members.

"Because we do not want to bankrupt the Hawaii Election Campaign Fund where this money will be coming from, the Campaign Spending Commission can reduce these amounts if there is not enough money. The Commission shall also maintain a reserve of \$250,000, but once these amounts have been lowered, Mr. Speaker, candidates have 10 days to withdraw as Clean Election candidates without penalty.

"Also this bill does not allow Clean Election candidates to receive additional funds to match the excess spending of non-participating candidates. That was done because of the fear we didn't want to bankrupt the Elections Fund. But it will certainly give people the opportunity who would otherwise not have the opportunity to run as 'clean money' candidates under this law.

"Clean Election candidates cannot accept private contributions or any loans. The only private money a candidate is allowed to receive is 'seed money' to test the waters. This 'seed money' cannot exceed \$100 per contributor and the aggregate cannot exceed \$1000 for Senate races or \$500 for House races. 'Seed money'

cannot be spent during the Primary, General, or Special Elections.

"The reason this bill has been changed to apply to the legislative races rather than the races for governor and lieutenant governor is to allow us to gather more information about the effectiveness of this Clean Elections Program as it applies to several different races and in several different districts. Also enacting this project in the year 2000 rather than 2002 ensures that any necessary changes to our campaign financing laws can be adopted sooner.

"The effective date of this bill, Mr. Speaker, is July 1, 1999 -- not 1998, but 1999. In the meantime, the Campaign Spending Commission has to conduct a study in conjunction with the League of Women Voters, Common Cause Hawaii, and others to determine the feasibility of this pilot program. If the report comes back in the negative, we still have time to amend this law which we will pass now to make it work with the financial resources available.

"Members, we have a long history, and I think we can say that under the leadership of Speaker Souki, we have had a long history during these past six years of being committed to reducing the influence of special interest money in our campaign system, and of supporting public financing for political campaigns.

"The bill before us this evening is another step in that direction. If we can make this program work, in the year 2000, for legislative races, we can then apply it to all races thereafter. I urge my colleagues to vote in support of this bill for Second Reading. Thank you."

Representative Halford then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I want to speak in favor of this bill because I think it's important that we have good campaign reform ideas that are being discussed in the Legislature. I want to be in favor of this bill moving on for further consideration and to say that I'm in favor of discussing constructive reform for campaigns for the future.

"The one aspect of this bill that I think is very responsible is its effective date July 1, 1999. I think that that reflects the sincerity of wanting to have a dialogue and come up with meaningful solutions as opposed to just 'railroading' something through to affect this current election in some particular preferential manner.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McDermott then rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"I haven't had a chance to read this thoroughly, Mr. Speaker, but a couple of things jump out at me. Number one, we're awfully free to spend the taxpayers' money which I really don't think we should do. Number two, I don't think this will actually solve the problem. I think it will increase it because there are candidates out there who are not totally serious and I don't see what would stop them from jumping in and spending \$10,000. And then what it causes the serious candidates to do is actually go out and instead of raising \$10,000 or \$15,000, they have to go out and raise \$30,000 or \$40,000. So I have some little concerns, but I'll wait until Final Reading. Thank

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2399, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTIONS," passed Second Reading

and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Aiona and Takamine being excused.

Representative Stegmaier, for the Committee on Education, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1020-98) recommending that S.B. No. 2625, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Okamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2625, SD 1, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro.

Representative Moses rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd just like to say that I have some reservations on Standing Committee Report No. 1020-98 which in the Education Committee we affectionately refer to as the Omnibus Education Package.

"There's many good ideas in there. There's one I have some problems with and I've discussed those earlier in Committee. I'll be waiting for the Third and Final Reading, but I just want to express that I do have reservations about the bill as it is in today's form."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2625, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Aiona and Takamine being excused.

Representative Stegmaier, for the Committee on Labor and Public Employment and Consumer Protection and Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1021-98) recommending that S.B. No. 2386, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative McDermott rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"It's a well-intended measure, but I question the feasibility. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the joint report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. No. 2385, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION," was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representative McDermott voting no, and Representatives Aiona and Takamine being excused.

Representative Thielen: "Mr. Speaker, I would just like to note that you look very fine in your industrial hemp Aloha shirt."

The Chair responded: "Thank you very much. I tried to take a good smell of it and it did me a lot of good."

Representative Kawananakoa: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I have two announcements. The first one, I just wanted to note for my colleagues and to yourself that tomorrow we'll be having a forum on small schools. It will be in Room 423 starting at 11:00 a.m. and it will run to about 1:00 p.m. I note that we have national experts on small schools and their successes. Dr. Mary Ann Raywood will be with us. The Principal of Kapaa Elementary School from Kauai is going to be with us. And also teachers and parents and administrators from other schools in Hawaii, like Mountain View on the Big Island and Wailupe here on Oahu will also join us.

"The public is invited to also attend. And I should note that it is co-sponsored by the League of Women Voters Education Committee and also, Mr. Speaker, your Republican Caucus. This is a first forum in a series of forums we hope to have here in Hawaii utilizing national experts on educational reform. I invite all our colleagues to please join us. It will be an educational experience, pardon the pun, for all of us.

"The other thing I wanted to note, Mr. Speaker, is that yesterday we celebrated the 127th birthday of Prince Jonah Kuhio Kalanianaole Piikoi. He was a great American, a great Hawaiian, and also Hawaii's delegate to Congress for over 20 years. Mr. Speaker, I had the great honor to offer a few words at the Federal Building on behalf of my Tutu Kane Kuhio, and it was a very

moving day for me. Actually a pleasant day as the rain parted for a moment or two as the sun shone through.

"Mr. Speaker, I hope I might be able to have my remarks entered into the Journal so that my colleagues at their leisure might have a chance to reflect upon the many accomplishments of our delegate to Congress, one of Hawaii's most favorite sons," and the Chair "so ordered."

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I think I'd just like to close by mentioning or stating Hau'oli La Hanau e Ke Ali'i Maka'ainana -- Happy Birthday, Hawaii's Citizen Prince. Mahalo."

Representative Kawananakoa's remarks are as follows:

"Aloha, Aloha Kama'aina,

"Hawaii pauses today to remember one of her most distinguished sons.

"Jonah Kuhio Kalanianaole Piikoi is remembered by some for the positions he held: Hawaiian Ali'i, Royal Prince, Delegate to the United States Congress.

"Others recall him for his accomplishments: Hawaii's National Parks, self-rule by the counties, securing suffrage for women in Hawaii, the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act

"But the true measure of a man -- what distinguishes him, what marks a man for greatness -- is how he responds to the call, that each one of us has, to serve our fellow man.

"Prince Kuhio was a servant.

"Jonah Kuhio Kalanianaole was a great man, not because of his position, not because of what he accomplished; but because of his character, because of how he answered the call to serve.

"It would be too easy for us today, three-quarters of a century after his passing, to dismiss the life of this man who, seemingly, had it all. But the student of human nature recognizes that, all too often, it is the trials and testings that mold a man; it is in adversity and setbacks that the human spirit is refined and forged; it is through overcoming the private afflictions and tribulations of the heart that the greatest victories are won.

"Jonah Kuhio Kalanianaole was a great man because he met his challenges with dignity and courage; he was a great man because he faced adversity with optimism and strength; he was great because, in the face of personal loss, he never lost sight of his responsibility and his duty and his call to serve the people of Hawaii.

"In the same measure that he was a servant, Prince Kuhio was also a rebel.

"In our well-ordered and sanitized society of 1998, we tend to think of rebels as wild-eyed, raving madmen. But many of the great servant leaders in history were rebels. They refused to accept the status quo; they often gave up their positions of power, privilege and comfort in order to champion the greater good for society, to advocate for those less fortunate, to speak for those without power or position. George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Mahatma Gandhi, Martin Luther King, Jr., Prince Kuhio.

"Personal struggle may temper a man to fight for others. Maybe the taste of injustice in one's own life arouses a passion for equity; the sting of intolerance produces the balm of fairness.

"As a young man, Prince Kuhio was not only schooled in the ways of the modern-Western world, but as a prince of the court and possibly future King of the Hawaiian people, he was also taught the ways of his ancestors. He excelled in the ancient Hawaiian warrior style of wrestling called 'hakoko.' Perhaps it was his training in this art form that enabled him to take a hit, roll with it, and to use the energy of his opponent to come out on top, victorious.

"After ten years of intensive training for royal service to the Hawaiian people, training that began when he was 12 years old, Prince Kuhio witnessed the overthrow of the Hawaiian Monarchy. Two years later, the young prince was doing hard labor behind the bars of Oahu Prison having been tried and convicted by the new government of treason. His crime? Taking up arms to restore his beloved aunt, Queen Lili'uokalani, to her rightful throne.

"Upon his release from prison and after a season of traveling abroad, Prince Kuhio returned to once again serve his people, becoming involved with the Home Rule Party, a party largely consisting of royalist Hawaiians.

"However, when the Home Rule Party took control of both Houses of the Territorial Legislature, party leaders decided that no other members of the legislature would have a voice in governing and they made every effort to keep other legislators in the dark about their decisionmaking.

"Prince Kuhio, who only a few years before had been imprisoned for fighting for Hawaiian sovereignty, attempted to convince his colleagues to open the process to all -- to allow everyone the chance to be heard.

"When the party leaders turned a deaf ear to Kuhio's plea for fairness, he led his second rebellion. His impassioned and eloquent arguments for openness and fairness caused so many Hawaiians to abandon the Home Rule Party that it was soon powerless and defunct.

"Some find it ironic that Prince Kuhio agreed to run as a candidate to be Hawaii's Delegate to Congress at the urging of some of the same men whom he had taken up arms only a short while before.

"I don't find it ironic at all. I find it astute and totally in keeping with Kuhio's overriding purpose to which he had dedicated his life: to help the people of Hawaii. He had done everything in his power to restore the monarchy. Now he realized that the best way he could serve his people would be to provide a strong voice for them in the halls of the United States Congress.

"He had taken a hit, rolled with it, and used the energy of his opponents to propel himself into an advantageous position. A position where he could effectively fight for his people and for all the citizens of Hawaii.

"For the remaining twenty years of his life, Prince Kuhio served as Hawaii's Delegate to Congress. But lest anyone think he went to Washington with a special-interest agenda, please consider some of the highlights of his career on Capitol Hill.

"He was the first Congressional Delegate to advocate statehood for Hawaii.

"He secured federal funding for the development of Pearl Harbor as an important defense center for the United States.

"He brought the National Parks system to Hawaii.

"He successfully argued for the creation of the several county governments in Hawaii, in order to bring true home rule to the people at the grassroots level.

"He ensured that the 19th Amendment to the United States Constitution, which granted women the right to vote in the states, would apply to Hawaii as well.

"And of course, perhaps his greatest accomplishment and one which many today consider the culmination of his Congressional career, was the enactment of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act.

"A servant to his people and to all the people of Hawaii...a rebel willing to fight for his principles, yet principled in his fighting, Jonah Kuhio Kalanianaole will always stand tall in the anthology of Hawaii's heroes.

"A Prince of Hawaii...a Counter-Revolutionary...a Delegate to the United States Congress...but above all, a great man who dedicated his life to serving his fellow man.

"Thank you for answering the call, Tutu Kane Kuhio. Hawaii is a far better place for your having passed this way.

"Hau'oli La Hanau e Ke Ali'i Maka'ainana!

"Happy Birthday, Hawaii's Citizen Prince.

"Aloha, Aloha na Kama'aina."

"Mr. Speaker, my opposition is based upon line 14, page 1, which says the OHA budget will be decreased by a certain percentage. It happens to be that the percentage is zero. But Mr. Speaker, I contend, until we have the guts, the nerve, the wherewithal to put that in our budget, I don't believe we should be putting that in anyone else's budget until we clean our own house.

"Because of that and because it's Second Reading, even though in the Committee it indicated I did vote aye, it was a verbal, it was an oversight, and the OHA budget should not be hit any different than our own.

"Thank you very much."

Representative McDermott rose and asked the Clerk to cast a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kawananakoa rose in support of the bill with reservations, stating:

"On the same measure, Mr. Speaker, I have some reservations. If, in fact, the language, as my good colleague has pointed out, indicates a positioning for this bill to otherwise have some of its funds reduced, I certainly on Third Reading would be voting no. I believe the Office of Hawaiian Affairs has been shortchanged for many a year and one-tenth of one percent, I believe, is what they are allocated out of our State budget. I think they are doing quite a lot with quite a little.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pendleton rose and asked the Clerk to record an aye with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Moses rose and asked the Clerk to record an aye with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Fox rose to speak in favor of the bill with reservations, stating:

"This bill came over from the Senate with a federal Hope Scholarship tax credit and with long-term care credit. Particularly on the second item, I find it disturbing that we removed, in the Finance Committee, the provision on long-term care credit. This is supported by the Senate as we know from the bill coming over from the Senate. It is also supported by the Administration. And it's a very sensible thing to do — to offer people a credit on long-term care. It's sensible because money spent by individuals on long-term care is money saved the State

"And this is particularly so in the case of money spent on long-term care insurance which will be deductible under the provision that the Senate had in the bill and it was taken out by the House Finance Committee. Because any money that is spent on insurance is money saved the taxpayer at the time it comes from Medicaid to pay for people who no longer can cover their long-term care expenses. So sound fiscal policy dictates that we support this tax credit. It is 'penny-wise and pound foolish' to take this credit out.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Meyer rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye with reservations for her and requested that the remarks made by the Representative from Waikiki be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, following the logic and passion of the Representative from Waikiki, I have a similar request that his same vehemence of which is so logical and a 'nobrainer', Mr. Speaker, be entered into the Journal as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Marumoto rose and requested that the remarks of the Representative from Waikiki be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Kawananakoa rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the Representative from Waikiki is very popular today and I want to have his words entered into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

"I also would like to note that this is an IRC conformity measure. I believe when we came out with our original tax plan, we had suggested true conformity by a tax simplification and reduction policy that could end up with your tax form looking like a postcard.

"What we wanted to do was incorporate all of the wonderful credits and ideas that were offered by our federal government here at the State level -- the widening of the brackets, the larger standard deductions, the greater exemptions for children and family members and dependents. Our particular plan that we had raised in September of last year. . .

Representative M. Oshiro, at this point, rose on a point of order.

The Chair said: "You're obviously out of order. You're going back to another bill. Will you please confine yourself to the IRC conformity."

Representative Kawananakoa continued, saying:

"I'm afraid we didn't have a chance to hear the bill so you're correct, I am out of order in that respect.

"But I wanted to note that there are a lot of good things that the Federal Code incorporates into our tax laws, and I think we could learn quite a bit from the Federal Code if we were to truly adopt more of it and move away from our State Code which happens to have such a high measure of burden upon the most needy in our society. So with that, Mr. Speaker, I will vote with reservations."

Representative Moses rose and asked that the words of the Representative from Waikiki be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only) Representative Pendleton rose and asked the Clerk to note an aye with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Thielen rose and stated:

"I also would like to express reservations and ask that the Representative from Waikiki's remarks be inserted into the Journal as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Halford then rose and asked the Clerk to record an aye with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Santiago, for the Committee on Health, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1071-98) recommending that H.C.R. No. 63, as amended in HD 1, be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Okamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.C.R. No. 63, HD 1, be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, Hawaii prides itself on its diversity, its racial, ethnic, and particularly cultural diversity. We teach that no one should be considered inferior, in fact, they should be proud of their language, traditions, and cultural practices.

"This resolution, however, objects on the borderline of a cultural practice and a tradition that's practiced by one of the new and growing religious groups in Hawaii, the Muslim order, or of the Islamic faith. The resolution notes that genital mutilation, in the context, is a little bit other than the removal of the clitoris. It doesn't say that, but that's what it is. It's not somebody smashing, but it's something that's slightly different than that. In effect, the Western equivalent of a chastity belt.

"My reservations are because of its cultural tradition and we should hear from the cultural purveyors before we act on this. I know it's the Finance Committee that it gets to next. I am saying, let us stop this chauvinistic practice, but let us do it in a very culturally sensitive way. Let us hear from the Muslim community of Hawaii before we proceed and do a slam dunk on this. I have contacted various members who will be getting feedback to say, yea or nay, or some modification.

"So while this reso is very called for and very necessary, because it is not a present procedure, it is something that because we are Hawaii, we are different, we are the diversity of diverse cultures that we should be sensitive as we proceed on this. And I beg the indulgence of the Chair of the Finance Committee and all the members until we see and hear very loud and clear what the Muslim community has to say. And that if there's any woman who walks around it in the State of Hawaii with this, she's not going to feel like she's inferior because it's against the law for her body to be as it is.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"The previous speaker said he would like to handle this subject with sensitivity, but on the other hand I notice in

the WHEREAS that it is not a very sensitive procedure. It points out 'the medical community has deemed this practice to have devastating health risks including pain, trauma, bleeding, infection, injury to adjacent organs, shock, chronic infection, painful menstruation, scarring, infertility, pain during intercourse, numerous childbirth complications, and even death.'

"For that reason, I think this practice should be outlawed worldwide. So I hope that this resolution is passed. Thank you."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I think it's clear that we need to have discussion, and perhaps, study this particular conduct of perhaps some people in our community. I understand the concerns for religious and/or cultural sensitivities. However, I think this is calling for a study. It is absolutely appropriate that we do consult with the Muslim community, but at the same time to turn our heads on this particular issue, I think would be ill-advised. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. We don't need a study. We need to stop, outlaw, ban female mutilation of our young women. And I would think that every single member of this body would stand up in wholehearted support of that. It's a barbaric, terrible procedure; no excuse for it in our nation.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I first learned of this FGM, as they refer to it, at the NOWL Conference which we women legislators attended this summer. And since, have read about it in the Journal of the Seventh Day Adventist's Church and in Time Magazine. Several states have already passed legislation banning this procedure. I wouldn't actually even call it a procedure, it's a practice.

"I think this resolution is basically a gesture of the court to women around the world. And I hope that we'll support it not only as a woman's issue, but also as a human issue. I think Representative Ward has a very good point that we should be culturally sensitive, and I certainly agree with his idea of consulting with the Muslim community and other communities. We already have talked to people at the East-West Center and we will continue talking with and about it.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Morita then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I just wanted to point out to the members that there is a book written by Alice Walker, who wrote the 'Color Purple.' She also wrote another book called 'Possessing the Secret of Joy,' and that is when I first learned about this practice. And this is over five years ago. I, too, agree that we should be looking at an outright ban of this practice. And yet the United States has even offered political asylum to women trying to get free from this type of practice. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 63, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF

HUMAN SERVICES TO DRAFT LEGISLATION PROHIBITING FEMALE GENITAL MUTILATION IN HAWAII," was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Cachola, Menor, Say and Suzuki being excused.

Representative Santiago, for the Committee on Health, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1072-98) recommending that H.C.R. No. 192, as amended in HD 1, be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 192, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE AUDITOR TO ASSESS THE SOCIAL AND FINANCIAL IMPACTS OF REQUIRING COVERAGE FOR EARLY INTERVENTION SERVICES TO CHILDREN FROM BIRTH TO AGE THREE OR UNTIL SERVICES ARE NO LONGER DEEMED MEDICALLY NECESSARY," was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, with Representatives Cachola, Menor, Say and Suzuki being excused.

Representative Santiago, for the Committee on Health, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1073-98) recommending that H.C.R. No. 174, be referred to the Committee on Education.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 174, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING A STUDY ON THE BENEFITS OF A PEER EDUCATION PROGRAM AS A FORM OF ALTERNATE DISPUTE RESOLUTION AMONG TEENS IN HAWAII," was referred to the Committee on Education, with Representatives Cachola, Menor, Say and Suzuki being excused.

Representative Santiago, for the Committee on Health, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1074-98) recommending that H.C.R. No. 227, as amended in HD 1, be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 227, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING A STUDY OF THE COST IMPLICATIONS OF ENACTING A DIRECT PAYMENT LAW FOR DENTISTS," was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, with Representatives Cachola, Menor, Say and Suzuki being excused.

Representative Santiago, for the Committee on Health, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1075-98) recommending that H.C.R. No. 223, as amended in HD 1, be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 223, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE AUDITOR TO CONDUCT A STUDY OF MANDATORY HEALTH INSURANCE COVERAGE FOR MENTAL HEALTH," was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, with Representatives Cachola, Menor, Say and Suzuki being excused.

Representative Santiago, for the Committee on Health, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1076-98) recommending that H.C.R. No. 123, as amended in HD 1, be referred to the Committee on Education.

Representative Okamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.C.R. No. 123, HD 1, be referred to the Committee on Education, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro.

Representative McDermott rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is a well-intended measure, and I appreciate the effort by the authors to put this forth. I empathize with them and agree with their intent, but by the philosophical objection, I think this is an example where the scope of our government has gotten out of control.

"This deals with school-based health clinics. Mr. Speaker, when I was going to school, and I'm sure when you were going to school, the health clinic was you went down the hall, there was a nurse, you got an aspirin. If we're really sick she took your temperature, you lay down on a cot. If you're really very sick, they called your mom or dad and they picked you up and you went home. That's not what we have here. As a matter of fact, if you ask most of my constituents they'll think: what is the health room? Well, that's exactly what I just described. But that's not the direction that our State is going in, and certainly not the direction of these clinics.

"I think the scope of these clinics is way beyond that. I would even say it's out of control to a certain degree. 'Every student will become literate, confident, caring, think critically, solve problems, and communicate effectively.' Someone, please tell me how that fits the mold of the idea of the traditional health room. It doesn't. We're throwing everything in here but the kitchen sink. And I think if we hold our breath, that's going be in there, too.

"Where we're going is, we want to have mini hospitals with mini psychiatric wards on each high school campus. And that's more marvelous if we could afford it, but we can't.

"Mr. Speaker, I stand here and I criticize you guys for the budget, and here is a measure that says we want to restore funding to something. I can't vote for that and not be a hypocrite. I mean, if I voted for this I'd be a hypocrite.

"Mr. Speaker, I've read this resolution and House Draft, which is much better than the original one, I must say, and I commend the Chair for correcting it. But still, my wife and I are pretty good parents, I think, she's much better than I am. She does the yeoman's amount of the labor around the house, but we can't measure up to this resolution, I can't as a parent. My wife and I with our three young sons, I can't do everything that's in this resolution. So how can we expect a 'school health clinic' to do it when a health clinic is supposed to be: Johnny scrapes his knee, Johnny is supposed to come in to get some rubbing alcohol on the scrape and a Band-Aid. That's what the health clinic is for. It's not a psychiatric ward. We're out of control on this.

"So I urge, and I know it's not going to happen obviously, but I urge that the body not pass this measure. And for those who say, tell us where to cut and we want everything, I'm saying, don't fund this thing. It's an example of our government that's gotten out of control. We don't need to spend the money here. A health clinic

should be a nurse in a room taking care of the kids, not a psychiatric ward or anything else. Thank you."

Representative Arakaki then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In all deference to the previous speaker, Mr. Speaker, I think a lot of us wish we could return to the past and how things were because I think a lot of us do remember how things were in our schools and how things were in our families. But the reality today is that our families are not 'Ozzie and Harriet' families. They don't live in houses surrounded by white picket fences. And the schools are no longer safe havens. I think all we have to do is look at the headlines in the news to see the kinds of problems that we have in our schools.

"The fact is, Mr. Speaker and colleagues, a lot of our kids are in school with some real baggage that they bring because of the problems that society has created for them. And I wish we could have good parents like the good Representative, you know, who are concerned about their kids, about their education and their health, and their well-being. But again reality is we have problems, and if we didn't we wouldn't have kids who are being abused and neglected. That's reality.

"The fact is when these kids come to school with that kind of background, they're not able to learn. They're not going to be able to maximize their potential as students. Not only that, they create disruption that cause problems to the teachers, for their fellow students. On top of that, a lot of them require remediation. So the question is: how do we assure that students come to school healthy and ready to learn? Some of them don't even come to school with something in their stomachs.

"I think we really need to look at reality and see how we're going to meet this challenge. The common thing that I think all our students have is that they all have to go to school. If this is the best way to provide at least a minimum of health care services, then we ought to do it because that's what's right. Unless we can assure that our kids are in good health, I don't think we can expect them to learn and to do their best to really realize their potential. I think we need to look beyond some of these smaller issues and look at the big picture, and look at what it means to our kids' future.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Santiago then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to just, I guess, comment on some of the comments I heard earlier. We oftentimes hear of cutting funding, and we hear about this is where we can save, etc. And hiaving had first-hand experience with these school health centers, overseeing one in my community for a long time, I wanted to point out some of the amendments that we made and why these amendments were put in and what they mean.

"The amendments are in line with what we did five years through the Board of Education's policies that required any schools with SCBM's already in place to allow for the planning of what these centers were supposed to be about to occur from the ground up. We oftentimes are criticized about how these centers are planned from the top down. The centers that are in existence and have been working and are protected and are fought for by the communities who have seen them work were planned from the ground up. It is not the government. It was not the department saying, you will do this. It was the families, the parents, the students, the communities who came in and said, this is what we need.

"Why do we need this? Because if we don't fund some of these programs, we pay for them ten-fold later on when those kids who did not have access to these services are not dealt with in preventive way.

"These school health centers have proven to be so effective that as we have gone backward here in Hawaii, when five years ago we funded it and we provided the necessary funding to start three pilot programs, on the mainland it was just beginning. Today, the mainland has grown and these centers are all over. Why? Not because some government decided that it was going to work, but because the parents, the students, the communities believed that these preventive programs saved government money in the long run.

"These are not clinics that hand out condoms. These are not what we've heard some of these horror stories about. These are places where students go. They do receive counseling, if that's necessary, otherwise they receive basic minimum things. Parental consent is even talked about in the resolution and it's put in there in writing. So I wanted to clarify this for the sake of all the members. I believe very strongly that if we are going to be caring and we are going to go where the kids are, let them -- the parents and the communities -- tell us how we should proceed. That's what this resolution calls for.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Moses then rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"I know where the previous speakers' hearts come from, but I'm just reading the words in the resolution. First of all, on page 2, it starts, 'WHEREAS, to achieve excellence in school, students need: to be wanted; to be valued; a positive vision of the future; safe, orderly schools; strong community support; high-quality care, including health care services; and adults they can trust.' Nowhere does it say, that students need to learn. The first one there should be students need to learn.

"On page 3, Mr. Speaker, it lists a couple of items that the school support group should be able to provide. It says, 'schools that are safe and caring; and an environment that is focused on teaching and learning.' My personal belief is Number 2 should be Number 1. They are there to learn.

"Further on page 3, in the third paragraph, it says, 'WHEREAS, the community, in partnership with the schools, is the best resource to decide upon the most appropriate services for the program.' And paragraph 4, it says, 'WHEREAS, it is essential that the Departments of Health and Education, under the auspices of the Board of Education's policies, respect parental involvement and notification in the development of the program.' But then it goes on in paragraph 5 to say, 'regardless of what services a community deems appropriate, the program must focus on facilitating access to primary health care.'

"So in other words, it talks about community involvement and then negates it and says, we're going to do it anyway. So I have those kinds of concerns, Mr. Speaker, and believe me, as a parent of seven, I know what is fundamental and what is required. And that's to educate our children and I'm all for that. But if we must have health clinics, I'm all for that too, but I don't believe they should be integrated with the school system. They can be across the street. They can be next door on Health Department property, not on the school property because I, as a parent, want to have final say what happens to my child. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 123, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO MAKE THE SCHOOL-BASED HEALTH CLINIC PROGRAM PERMANENT, TO RESTORE FUNDING TO THE PROGRAM AND EXPAND IT TO REACH OTHER HIGH SCHOOL CAMPUSES, AND TO WORK WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO INTEGRATE THE PROGRAM INTO THE COMPREHENSIVE STUDENT SUPPORT SYSTEM," was referred to the Committee on Education with Representative McDermott voting no, and Representatives Cachola, Menor, Say and Suzuki being excused.

Representative Herkes, for the Committee on Legislative Management, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1077-98) recommending that H.C.R. No. 59, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 59, HD 2, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THAT THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH RECOMMEND TO THE LEGISLATURE SPECIFIC TREATMENT PROGRAMS TO ADDRESS THE INCREASING PROBLEMS OF ADOLESCENT ALCOHOL AND DRUG ABUSE THROUGHOUT THE STATE," was adopted, with Representatives Cachola, Menor, Say, Suzuki and Tom being excused.

Representative Santiago: "I was so hesitant. . .it's not an announcement that I really feel I want to make."

It's going to be at 'high noon' LSD, which is Legislative Standard Time, so it's going to be more like 12:30 p.m.

"But we have so far recruited five of our team members and we're going to see how well they 'stack up' against the competition. We have Representatives Marcus Oshiro, Takai, Hiraki, Marumoto and Fox, and they all have their 'can do' spirit and, hopefully, they won't make fools of themselves tomorrow, although, it is April Fools tomorrow. In all seriousness, this is part of our kick-off for our Food Bank Food Drive. And I think we all know how much some of our people are hurting. So hopefully, this is a fun way of getting it started, but I want to urge all of you in your offices to start collecting your donations for the Food Bank. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Whalen: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like the record to reflect that the words from the Representative from Foster Village were not my own."

Why don't we make the Convention Center really bustle, practically 24 hours a day with programs, instead of spending more money.

"I really would ask the Committee on Higher Education to take a serious look at this. We've got a lot of better places to put our money.

"Thank you."

Representative Kahikina rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"In these times where we have very little resources, our community in Waianae is looking at all kinds of alternatives to better educate our children. And tourism being the number one industry in Hawaii, we really believe that this Makaha Inn would serve its purpose not only internationally, but also for school-to-work transition, so I would encourage my colleagues to support this resolution.

"Thank you."

Representative Jones rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the former Makaha Sheraton is presently not being used. There's a church group that uses this facility now and the only charge is for the maintenance of the facilities. There are 270 rooms that are vacant. There's a restaurant that's really not being used. There's an 18-hole golf course out there that has a two-year contract on and after that the Sheraton owners will be looking for other uses. There's a whole lot of things there that really would be good for training -- actual on-the-job training -- for students in the tourist industry. And this is really an ideal opportunity for us to at least look at it.

"All the resolution says is to do a feasibility study, whether it's worthwhile or not to use these facilities as a training center for the University. And this feasibility study also could be a good classroom project for students. Anyway, I urge everyone to support this measure. It really looks like an opportunity that we shouldn't forego.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Fox moved that the amendment be adopted, seconded by Representative Kawananakoa.

Representative Fox rose to speak in support of the amendment, stating:

"The IRC conformity bill was before us last year. It was at that time that the federal government proposed that tax credits be offered, and we were offered the opportunity to conform State tax law with federal law. This year we have a new IRC conformity bill, but because the new bill refers to the section of the Internal Revenue Code that deals with medical care deductions, it has been necessary to once again put in our face, the fact that

Hawaii is not conforming with federal law on this measure. So we have a very wonderful opportunity here, as a body today, to bring again what we didn't do last year and we can do this year.

"We can bring the State Code in conformity with federal law and give people the tax deductions that they need to support long-term care, both for the purposes of buying health insurance to deal with long-term care, and for the expenses that many of us have to bear when our elders are going through long-term care facilities, or our children, anybody who requires long-term care qualifies for this deduction.

"It's a wonderful opportunity. The Governor and the Administration favor it, the Senate favors it, so let's round it off and do the right thing.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kawananakoa rose to speak in support of the amendment, stating:

"It baffles me that the federal government has seen it as aegis to come out with a credit or a deduction that our families and our elders can use in order to reduce the cost of elderly and long-term health care concerns, Mr. Speaker. It behooves us to have our families take care of themselves, to have our elders living with family members, so for them the tax break is an opportunity of taking care of our elders instead of dumping them on the State that so often happens because the cost is so horrendous, Mr. Speaker. I find it difficult to understand why we would not want to give an incentive to people our age to buy long-term health care insurance. I mean that's the reasonable thing to do. That's what we should all be striving for.

"Mr. Speaker, I would challenge anyone of our members to address the issue of long-term health care problems and the tremendous liability that we will face as the 'baby boomers' enter into their aging years. We don't have an answer for that. We clearly cannot address that cost concern.

"This is a means by which to have our public -- the people -- to think about investing in their own long-term health care insurance policies and planning for their retirement. This is akin to an IRA. We know how much success we've had with that, with the private sector and people going out and putting away investments for their retirement -- for their golden years. But here we are, denying that same credit, that same deduction, that the federal government, which I should note is bipartisan in its effort to pass this legislation on the federal level, to bring that to the constituents and the people of Hawaii.

"It makes sense. We should allow for this credit or for this deduction as it applies to long-term care services for the elderly and also for perhaps our age group that should be buying long-term health care insurance, which we took a poll here. I'm not too sure how many of us have actually planned for that. This might give us the incentive and the means by which to actually purchase those insurance policies. Mr. Speaker, it is a clear, wonderful way to move to give our public the incentive to do the right thing. I see no reason why we should not This amendment addresses it. It allows for pass this. this great idea to continue on its course, and I hope my colleagues would see the importance of passing this amendment.

"With that, I certainly look for a bipartisan effort as the basketball game was a bipartisan effort, Mr. Speaker, and to pass this amendment. However, I will be calling for a roll call at the appropriate time once discussion is through on this particular measure.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Say rose to speak against the amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and members of this House, first and foremost, any elected official on this floor has a major responsibility -- a responsibility of balancing one's budget.

"The current draft of this bill, which reflects the IRC conformity introduced by the Administration, had a cost of approximately \$8 million to \$8.9 million attached to it. When the bill came to the Finance Committee, it had additional IRC conformity amendments such as the Hope credit, Mr. Speaker, which the Finance Committee took out at a cost of \$17.7 million, the Lifetime credit of \$16.7 million, and last but not least our long-term care deduction of \$8.5- to \$9.3 million, a total of about \$42.9 million to \$43.7 million.

"I, too, would like to support the long-term care deduction, the Hope credit, and the Lifetime credit. However, it will be irresponsible at this point in time to include these items in the IRC conformity measure.

"During the hearing, all of the members of the Finance Committee had numerous testifiers supporting the three elements that were in this particular measure, and I asked them all a very simple question. I asked them if anyone had any suggestions as to how we could pay for these credits or deductions. No one came forward to offer any suggestions except for Mr. Craig Hirai. When I asked him: would you be willing to incorporate an increase in the insurance premium tax to offset this loss? And the insurance industry said 'no.'

"As for the comments about the Administration supporting the long-term care deduction, they are true. But they supported the deduction as a separate measure last year. They did not want to jeopardize this year's conformity bill, and keep in mind that the Administration's budget was not balanced as a result of the Council on Revenues' projections. As a matter of fact, due to the March revision by the Council, even the House plan needs to accommodate right now an additional \$25 million. If you add that cost to this bill, we are looking now, Mr. Speaker, as we move into conference a deficit of over \$68 million if we incorporate it one percent by the Senate.

"As I said earlier, I would like to support these elements because I truly feel they are very worthwhile programs. Because they are in the Senate version of this bill, they will be conference items, Mr. Speaker, if they agree with the 4.5 percent. If we are able to find the resources, we will consider them and include them. However, Mr. Speaker and members, remember this: the difficult decisions that will have to be made will have a tremendous impact. The long-term care deduction will cost the State approximately \$8.5- to \$9.3 million that was given to us by the Department of Taxation.

"It would be very wonderful to support the proposed amendment, but let me put it in a different perspective for all of you this afternoon. We cut the Peer Education Program at a cost of \$527,000. We cut and abolished the Commission on Persons With Disabilities which cost \$600,000. We cut and abolished the Commission on the Status of Women which cost us \$101,000. We also cut the Aquaculture Development Program which cost \$303,000, and we cut and abolished the subsidy to the Bishop Museum at a total price of \$847,000. Plus, Mr.

Speaker and members, twelve more programs brought the total to over \$5 million.

"I ask all of you right now, as we move into conference, if we can accommodate another \$9 million in programs or services or credits. It will be a very tough issue as we move into conference because all of you on this floor have seen the Senate bills that have come over, as far as giving all of these exemptions, credits, deductions, and the underinsured measure that will be heard this afternoon for the health systems and centers of \$3- and \$4 million. Where are they getting the revenues?

"Mr. Speaker, let's be honest once more with the public. I, too, am going through some tough times with my in-laws in regards to long-term care. I, too, am going through a rough time with my father in regards to long-term care. If I had the opportunity I would have, but not at the expense of the other services and programs which the members of this House really wanted to restore.

"Thank you."

Representative Pendleton rose in support of the amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, just two brief points as to why this floor amendment makes sense. First of all, I would say, as my grandmother said: 'enough study.' When I did serve on the House Health Committee or the Human Services Committee, I learned that we have a long history of studying this problem. It's a very difficult and challenging problem - very complicated. We've all gone to the annual or biennial breakfast at the Canoe Club to discuss with people this serious problem. People are trying to figure it out. I asked my Office Manager to look into our files to see how many reports and studies and documents we have on this and they go back years and years, all kinds of suggestions. Enough study, now is the time to do.

"The federal government has found the wherewithal to go ahead and move forward with actually trying to create tax incentives for people to plan. Again, this would apply a tax deduction so that people can go ahead and get long-term care insurance. At least it helps make it more affordable for people to do so. This is real action, it is not more study. It is real action, and I think that is what we need to do.

"My second point is that while it costs money to have this particular deduction available to Hawaii residents, I think in the long term it makes sense. Why? Because if people don't have this kind of insurance and wait until the very end, often what they are forced to do by the circumstances — by the income, the fiscal economic circumstances of each and every family — they divest themselves of what property they have, gifting it to their relatives and they go the Medicaid route, and we all know who picks up the bill for that. So it's either pay now or pay later. And I believe it makes clear sense now to have these kinds of incentives so that people can go ahead and are able to afford long-term care insurance. It's much less expensive than to have to force people later on to go the Medicaid route and have us pick it up on the other end. It makes fiscal sense in the long term.

"And again, we have a huge budget with hundreds of millions of dollars in it. Can we really not find the few million dollars that it would take to implement this conformity with the federal government? We can find money to bring beauty queens in a beauty pageant here. Can't we find the money to take care of our elderly?"

Representative Arakaki rose to speak against the amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to start by thanking the author of the amendment for bringing forth this issue, because I think we do stand together on the importance of addressing the concerns of long-term care. It is something we as policymakers need to face and we can't stick our heads in the sand because it is going to hit us like a tidal wave. The fact, though, is that we also can't make decisions in a vacuum and although it makes good policy sense because it is a good investment, we also need to look, like the Finance Chair said, at the big picture.

"And for me, Mr. Speaker, and I hope for many others, if we let our conscience help us decide what kinds of decisions we make, we have to look at some other shortfalls and budget cuts that affect the very lives of people, especially young people, and those are some of the real investments we need to make. When we cut programs like Infants and Pregnant Women at Risk, we cut Sex Assault Victims' Services, and we cut Peer Education and all these other programs that benefit the lives of young people, I cannot in good conscience say that we can also invest this \$8 million in long-term care tax benefits. And I agree with the previous speaker that we need to look at our priorities, and I agree with him, if we can find money for beauty pageants we need to look at our priorities and see where the money is best invested and we, as policymakers, I think, need to search our souls on that issue. But for now I would say, as one of your Co-Chairs, Mr. Speaker, of the Joint Committee on Long-Term Care, this is one of the issues we are looking at for the future. And I am hoping that in the very near future, we will have the resources to accommodate this very important policy.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Moses rose to speak in support of the amendment, stating:

"I heard a few minutes ago about the \$8 million or \$8.5 million to \$9.3 million in lost revenue, but I beg to differ with the distinguished Representative that we are going to see that money. That's because we don't have the manpower in the State to go sifting through all those federal tax forms and going line by line to determine what their deductions are and whether they are legal in this State or not. It's a very, very difficult and time-consuming matter. Now I don't say that people should knowingly violate the law, but I think most taxpayers out there are going to be quite confused that the federal government allows the deduction and we don't, and it's all for the sake of generating revenue.

"What we should be looking at is what's right. And what is right is if our citizens have the foresight to try to take out insurance for when they need it to provide for themselves, why shouldn't we reward them at least a little bit? We're not giving them money, we're letting them keep some of their money as a credit for preparing for their future. Likewise, long-term care medical expenses should be treated like all other medical expenses.

"Mr. Speaker, if we don't allow these kinds of deductions now, we the State, the taxpayers of the State, will be paying for this forever. It's time to let the people do what is right for themselves with their money, and it is their money. It is not our money. I just don't understand this belief that by taking it now somehow we're doing the right thing for the people. Let them spend their money the way they know they must to provide for themselves and their families from now and

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McDermott rose to speak in support of the amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think this is a refreshing idea. This is the way we should do things here. An incentive -- a tax credit -- to provide long-term care for the sick, aged, elderly bedridden of our society. This isn't a government-funded program. This is enabling people to keep their sick and elderly at home so I support this measure.

"Thank you."

Representative Suzuki rose to speak against the amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, as one of the older members in this body, I buy long-term care insurance and many of my constituents do, and I think it would be great if I could participate in the overall reduction of the \$8.5- to \$9 million in taxes that our citizens would enjoy by having this benefit. But I think we also must make our decision based on a larger perspective. I make my decision not because of the State taxes or federal taxes, it's a personal need

"Now that the federal government has installed this law, I will receive a benefit although it could be larger if the State participates. But let me just explain to you what the federal benefit does. We shouldn't make our decision just because the State doesn't pass or adopt or conform to the Internal Revenue Code. The federal taxes, compared to State taxes, are about three times the amount that one would pay in State taxes, so the benefit would be three times larger. Those that do participate in spite of the fact that the State doesn't pass the law will get a benefit of three times the figure cited, or about \$25.5- to \$27.9 million in reduced federal taxes by participating in this federal law. So this should not prevent people from participating.

"Our action here on this amendment will not prevent people from participating, but it would be nice. But at this time I don't think we can, for the reasons cited by our Finance Chair. We cannot do it right now.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Okamura rose to speak against the amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I don't think there's a member here, whether Democrat or Republican, that's against this proposal and this issue has been around for a number of years. But I do agree with the Chair of the Finance Committee that it would be irresponsible at this time because of the shortfalls that we have encountered to pass this at this time.

"Also, Mr. Speaker, the Legislature which unanimously adopted legislation last year creating the Long-Term Commission, and this Commission is comprised of senior citizen leaders who are involved with the long-term care issue and they are looking at this issue comprehensively. They are also looking at this issue of tax credits and one of the things they are considering is: who buys long-term care insurance and who will benefit? The wealthy maybe, and they probably will purchase long-term care insurance. The poor? Very doubtful that they will buy. So they are looking at it comprehensively and they will be coming back before the 1999 Legislature with their recommendations, and I think that would be an appropriate time to look at this and also when our revenues increase.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in support of the amendment, stating:

"You know, our tax forms are so complicated that we, here in Hawaii, should conform to as many of the good provisions in the federal Internal Revenue Code (IRC) as possible, and when we differ on these individual provisions -- the deductions and exemptions -- it makes our calculations for individual tax forms all the more complicated. What we strive for really should be simplicity and we really should look at 'piggy-backing' our taxes on the federal form which several states have implemented.

"This particular provision will save Hawaii money because it cost us \$50,000 for each person in a long-term care facility that is on Medicaid, and often they have stripped themselves of their assets or they don't have any money. But it would be much better if we provide people an incentive to save and spend their own money for long-term care. So for those people who can afford it, we really would be saving ourselves some money.

"Thank you."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose and stated:

"Twice I heard that it was irresponsible for us to pass this measure. I find it irresponsible for us not to find cost-saving measures in government to find the revenues. The answer that was given to us: well, in order to do this we have to increase the 4.5 general excise tax. Maybe we should take out the 5 percent. Hell, we make it 10 percent, we could do anything we want to here in the plast Hawaiian kings, we could build monuments for the past Hawaiian kings, we could build monuments for health care service providers. The point of the matter is that we waste money in government everyday.

"You know, I simply point to the newspaper a couple of weeks back where the Auditor noted that the Department of Transportation neglected to invest some \$360 million. That was \$4 million she calculated in lost revenues. That's waste that is spitting out of this State government on a daily basis. That's one example of one department on one given incident. Four million dollars, half of the money needed to fund this worthy project, this worthy need.

"So we talk about ideas and directions for this government to move in order to meet the necessities and the good services we want to provide and/or the tax credits in order to allow our private citizens, our citizens of the State of Hawaii, to do what they deem best with their money. Why don't we take a look at the waste in government? We offer a proposal here. . .

The Chair interrupted and stated:

"Will you please confine yourself to the measure which is an amendment to the IRC conformity."

Representative Kawananakoa replied:

"I am, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair said:

"Well, please proceed and limit yourself to it."

Representative Kawananakoa continued, saying:

"I will limit myself to the amendment and the rationale for the reason why it is not irresponsible. It is not irresponsible because I submit to you that we could find

these savings in government. Hundreds of millions of dollars could be found within our departments. For any of us to sit here and to advocate that our departments are as efficient and as business-minded and are using the cutting edge business technologies and the management techniques of our counterparts in the private sector, then I'll sit down. But I don't see that happening in our departments, and in case after case, our Auditor goes out and finds tremendous waste in government. So we talk about if we had the resources, we'd love to fund this. If I had the resources, Teenage Pregnant Mothers and Nutrition, Persons With Disabilities, the Status of Women, the list goes on and on of the cuts that we're making, maybe we don't need to make the cuts if we got rid of the waste.

"There are other options besides tax and spend. We're offering those options. I hope the Governor hears this message because he could take action and reduce the. . .

The Chair interrupted and said:

"Again, Representative, we are not talking about the Governor. We are talking about the conformity bill."

Representative Kawananakoa continued, saying:

"I'll limit my remarks. We are very responsible. We are looking at the overall budget and to argue here that this is an irresponsible measure because we can't find the resources, well I submit that we can find those cost-savings within government. If there were another Majority in the House, we'd have the ability to find those resources. . .

The Chair interrupted and remarked:

"It's a cold day in Hell. Please proceed."

Representative Kawananakoa responded:

"Mr. Speaker, if you like to make comments, I'd ask you to join us on this floor of the Legislature and not side-whip from the side here, from your. . .

The Chair stated:

"Representative, you are going all over the place and you're inviting a comment. Please proceed."

Representative Kawananakoa then said:

"I'll ask for a ruling later. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At this time, Representative M. Oshiro called for the question, seconded by Representative Okamura and carried. (Representatives Cachola, Garcia, Hamakawa, Menor, Saiki and Ward were excused.)

Representative Kawananakoa rose and requested a roll call vote.

The request for a roll call was put to vote by the Chair and upon a show of hands, the request was granted.

Representative Case's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, on its face this resolution appears to represent a straightforward request that the Federal Trade Commission simply 'reevaluate' a consent order effectively precluding the merger of the retail assets of Shell Oil and Texaco in Hawaii. In that goal, it appears to be harmless and I can support it.

"My reservations are that the testimony makes clear that, at least to some, the end goal of this resolution is to reverse the FTC's action and allow a merger which would further consolidate Hawaii's already highly centralized gasoline market. Since Shell and Texaco chose not to testify on this resolution, we were unable to confirm what is otherwise obvious -- that they want to overturn this action -- a scary thought considering the monopolistic trends in Hawaii in delivery of this vital commodity.

"Instead, the independent Texaco retail operators were put out front to argue that dire consequences would befall them if divestiture proceeded as ordered. No doubt their concerns are sincerely felt, but I doubt that their operations would fail because they switched suppliers, and I do not, in any event, feel that these concerns warrant taking the far graver risks to a far broader class of citizens presented by reversing the divestiture to which Shell and Texaco have already consented.

"On balance, I do not think the Legislature should eventually act in this fashion even if seemingly innocuous. Thank you."

Representative Okamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.C.R. No. 99, HD 1, be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro.

Representative McDermott rose in opposition to the resolution and asked the Clerk to cast a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative McDermott explained his opposition, stating:

"While this is a relatively benign resolution, I would just like to note for the record that the Public Health Service, the American Medical Association, the American Cancer Society, the American Glaucoma Association, the American Academy of Ophthalmology, the National Eye Institute and the National Cancer Institute all opposed the medical use of marijuana.

"I say that we should let the scientists decide it and not make it a political issue.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward rose and asked the Clerk to cast a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tarnas rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"I recognize that this measure is drawing attention because of the subject matter of marijuana and its use for medical purposes. I want to be very clear about what this resolution does. It specifically states that we are urging the federal government to enact legislation to expedite research into the medical efficacy of marijuana.

"The whole purpose of this resolution, Mr. Speaker, is to base our decisions on good science. The National Academy of Science, the National Institute of Health are all working on this right now, and I feel it is incumbent upon us to show our support for basing decisions on providing medically significant pharmaceuticals to those in need and basing those decisions on good science, not on politics.

"I think this measure is very responsible. It states specifically the same recommendation that came from the Hawaii State Substance Abuse Task Force which was formed by the Legislature previous to this one -- the Eighteenth Legislature. And so I feel that this is truly a responsible measure. We're not making any conclusions, rather we're stating that these decisions must be based on good science, and we're urging the federal government to expedite the research to make that decision.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pendleton rose to speak in support of the resolution with reservations, stating:

"My reservations have mainly to do with the Legislature again stepping into an arena best left to non-political bodies. I have no opposition to getting more information to urging Congress to do what it can to expedite research. However, how many times have we done this with other kinds of prescriptive medications? How many times have we done this with other kinds of medical procedures -- new surgical techniques, new types of prosthetic devices?

"You know, the Food and Drug Administration presently is looking at dozens, if not hundreds, of new medications which have potential lifesaving effects which could be very beneficial. Yet we take no position on those sorts of medications. Perhaps they don't have the attention of the public at this time, but it seems odd that we would focus on this one particular substance and raise it to a level that we haven't done to many other kinds of important medical procedures of prescriptive medications. So those are my reservations."

Representative Halford rose and asked the Clerk to record an aye with reservations for him, and requested that the words of the previous speaker be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Moses rose and asked the Clerk to record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tarnas rose and stated:

"I would just like to say a few more words and that is: why is the Legislature actually taking action? And the reason for this is that the federal government has not been moving on this issue for years and years and years. It was ten years ago that the Drug Enforcement Administration's chief of administrative law judge recommended the rescheduling of marijuana because he stated that it is 'one of the safest therapeutically active substances known.' But the DEA rejected that recommendation. And it was only because of State action, specifically the California initiative, that spurred some action by the federal government in starting the researches of the National Institute of Health and the National Academy of Science.

"So I believe it is very appropriate that states take action in this matter because no pharmaceutical company

is moving on this because this is not something that pharmaceutical companies produce. It is a naturally occurring substance. And so it is because of State action that the federal government is now moving. We're adding our voice to the other states, saying: 'please do your job, federal government.'

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McDermott again rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the THC -- the active ingredient -- is available in prescription form, and I realize that maybe some patients have problems with that. But once again, the American Medical Association is against this. As a practical matter, let's just think about it for a second, and I have joked around with some members in the hallway -- how the heck do you control dosage? How effective is the marijuana cigarette? I mean, it just doesn't make sense to me. For that reason again, I am voting no."

Representative Santiago rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"As the Chair handling this measure, I just wanted to perhaps share with the members: we did hold the bill. The testimony was very compelling. The evidence and the facts that were shared by the proponents of the bill were also very compelling. We have at least eight states who have already legalized and taken a position on this issue. We have now a conflict with the federal government occurring in the State of California where the physicians are quite concerned about the legal ramifications for following state law that is inconsistent with federal law. We have individuals who have testified in front of our Committee — very emotional testimony. These are individuals who are in need of some relief to the pain that they may have to endure during the latter parts of their lives. And for many of them, this is a very important issue.

"What we have tried to do with amending the initial language of this measure is say to the federal government: 'do not continue to simply not respond to the very loud voices and very compelling reasons, but to at least conduct on a more rapid basis the studies that we know need to be conducted so that the research and the scientists can in fact, within their realm of authority and expertise, give back to us factual information.

"The synthetic form of THC that had been mentioned by a previous speaker has not, for whatever reason, been able to perform the kind of remedial type of need that the patients require. As a result, the most responsible effort that I think has come out from our Committee is to not make a very bold statement, not make any assumptions, but simply to say to the federal government: let's try to have a universal policy developed at some point. Let's not just continue to punt on this issue to the State. And what we're doing is lending our voices to other states in the entire country to say to the federal government: 'let's look at this, let's deal with it, and let's move on in a sensible and responsible manner.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kawananakoa rose and requested the Clerk to cast a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.C.R. No. 46, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING AN ACTION PLAN TO PROMOTE HAWAII-GROWN AND HAWAII-MADE AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS," was adopted, with Representatives Chang, Kahikina, Menor, Morihara, Say, Takamine and White being excused.

Representative Jones, for the Committee on Agriculture, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1188-98) recommending that H.C.R. No. 240, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 240, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING THE ORGANIC INDUSTRY AS AN AGRICULTURAL COMMODITY GROUP," was adopted, with Representatives Chang, Kahikina, Menor, Morihara, Say, Takamine and White being excused.

Representative Garcia, for the Committee on Public Safety and Military Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1189-98) recommending that H.C.R. No. 90, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

Representative Okamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.C.R. No. 90, HD 1, be adopted, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro.

Representative Kawananakoa rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you. I have the great honor of sitting on the Public Safety and Military Affairs Committee. It gives me great pleasure to see that we're passing this resolution out in support of our Filipino Veteran community and all the work and sacrifice that they provided our great nation.

"The fact that we are, once again, requesting that our federal delegation take this issue to Congress and to otherwise bring home what is appropriate is very heartening. I understand, as we speak now, that

Congress is contemplating a hearing on this particular measure and with all deliberate speed, we hope to fulfill an obligation, I believe, that is long outstanding.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, there is a saying among those of us who have served that 'there are no atheists in foxholes.' So too, all soldiers are equal. There's no soldier more equal than others. All who have served know that you can't give benefits to one and deny them to another. So as in life, so also in death.

"This resolution, Mr. Speaker, is only to get back the equity and what American democracy is all about. So, Mr. Speaker, I commend the Military Affairs Committee for doing this and I encourage all future legislators and legislatures to do year after year after year 'until kingdom come' to get this resolution passed and not to give up.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pendleton then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I have some prepared remarks which I would like inserted into the Journal," and the Chair "so ordered."

"But very briefly, I would like to just share some information pertinent to this particular House Concurrent Resolution 90. On Friday, I was on the telephone with Chairman Robert Stump, who is the Chairman of the United States House Veterans' Affairs Committee, and he assured me that they will be holding a hearing on the House Resolution that is Federal Resolution 836.

"I think that our Legislature, at least our House in passing House Concurrent Resolution No. 90, is very timely. Now we have an opportunity to move on the federal resolution and with the economy nationally the way it is, this might be the only opportunity we have to move that resolution through because of the amount of appropriation it would take. So I again stand in strong support of this House Concurrent Resolution, asking our congressional delegation to support the move for fairness and equitable treatment of the Filipino-American Veterans.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pendleton's additional remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in strong support of House Concurrent Resolution Number 90, House Draft 1. Mr. Speaker, this resolution asks for the continued support of the Hawaii Congressional delegation.

"I strongly favor this resolution because it makes clear to our representatives and senators in Washington, D.C. that we here in Hawaii want favorable action on the Filipino Veterans bill.

"Mr. Speaker, I think it is fitting and proper that I set forth some of the historical background so as to afford us all a more complete understanding as to why we want to urge favorable congressional action on this issue.

"Mr. Speaker, the federal Filipino Veterans bill, H.R. 836, was given a positive boost recently when Congressman Robert Stump, Chairman of the United States House Veterans' Affairs Committee, announced that

the bill would be scheduled for a public hearing perhaps as early as this Summer. While no guarantee of passage out of the Committee was made, this is undoubtedly an important development.

"Mr. Speaker, though this is federal legislation which is beyond the jurisdiction of state legislators, this does not mean that it is of no interest to state residents or state officials. As patriotic citizens we all should take note of this positive move by the Congress, for this federal legislation will have a significant impact on veterans throughout the various states of this country and perhaps on those presently residing overseas as well.

"Mr. Speaker, the Filipino Veterans bill would amend Title 38 of the United States Code so that certain types of active-duty service in the organized military of the Government of the Commonwealth of the Philippines and the Philippine Scouts would be treated as active duty service for the United States. This would mean that many Filipino veterans would receive certain U.S. Veterans Administration benefits because their service during World War II would count as service rendered to and for the United States of America.

"The consequence of passing the Filipino Veterans bill, Mr. Speaker, would be that Filipino veterans would receive greater benefits than those presently received. This does not mean that they would be given special benefits. This would only mean that they would finally, after decades of waiting, receive equal and equitable benefits for services rendered during wartime. These are benefits they had been promised years ago.

"As we all know, Filipino veterans fought for the United States in the Pacific Theater during World War II. They numbered about 200,000, and they were commanded by American military officers and were assured by various officials that their service would result in equal military benefits and that the process of acquiring American citizenship would take into account their valiant efforts. Unfortunately, whatever hopes Filipino veterans had about 'equal treatment' were dashed by the Federal Rescission Act of 1946.

"The unacceptable pattern of disparate and inequitable treatment of Filipino veterans as manifested in the Rescission Act was part of a larger body of formal public policy. Mr. Speaker, this was and is unfortunate. But this is the sad truth. It was preceded by President Franklin D. Roosevelt's Executive Order of 1941 and continued in Public Law 89-640, which passed the United States Congress in 1966. The policy had the effect, for example, of taking into consideration the currency exchange rate when paying benefits. The United States has veterans in many countries, but only when it comes to veterans in the Philippines does the U.S. take into account currency exchange rates.

"On this subject United States Congressman Saylor delivered the following words on the chamber floor of the U.S. House of Representatives in 1966:

'In 66 countries around the world, men and women who served in the Armed Forces of the United States are sent checks on the first of every month by the Veterans Administration in dollars. But if you happen to be a veteran who served with the Army, Navy, or the Air Force of the United States and you live in the Philippines, the Veterans Administration rules and regulations do not apply to you. A different set of standards applies. If you lost an arm, a leg, or you were wounded in the defense of the flag of the United States and you live in the Philippines, you receive only half of the compensation paid to servicemen in the United States.'

"Later Congressman Saylor asked his fellow Members of Congress to do what was right:

'Do not forget that many of the people taken into the service in Europe, in Italy and in Greece, were not American citizens. If you were living in this country and you were taken into the service, you are entitled to your benefits because you served the Untied States. If we do not make any other exceptions among the 66 nations, why do we do so in the Philippines? Why do half way? Why not give to the Filipinos, those brave men who served in our armies, the same benefits?'

"A detailed discussion of the nuances and details of the Filipino Veterans bill would require much too much time and is therefore beyond the scope of these remarks in favor of this House Concurrent Resolution, and so suffice it to say, Mr. Speaker, that this House Concurrent Resolution Number 90, which urges continue support by our congressional delegation, is a good measure.

"Mr. Speaker, the intended consequence of our resolution is to advance the federal bill, H.R. 836. H.R. 836 is worthy of becoming the law of the land. But before that can happen, there must be a public hearing.

"Mr. Speaker, Congressman Stump did the right thing when he decided to schedule this federal bill for a public hearing. The federal bill recognizes and finally acknowledges the reality that Filipino veterans fought beside American military forces for the United States, thereby rendering invaluable service to the United States, and should be accorded fair and equitable treatment.

"As state legislators, Mr. Speaker, we stand in strong support of fairness and equity to Filipino veterans. We welcome the news that this bill will receive a public hearing. And we should do everything we can to see that the bill is passed out of the U.S. House Veterans' Affairs Committee.

"Filipino veterans have patiently waited for fair treatment since the close of World War II. Now we have the opportunity to correct a wrong and to do what is right. In 1998 we have the opportunity to see that justice is done.

"Mr. Speaker, thank you for the opportunity to shed some light on this issue. I urge my colleagues to also vote in favor of this House Concurrent Resolution."

Representative Cachola then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, when we were researching this particular reso, I found out that there's a lot of my relatives and neighbors way back in the Philippines who died. As a matter of fact, my father-in-law who was a guerrilla, was tortured and killed when my wife was only about two years old.

"However, Mr. Speaker, those who died are not the ones who will be the beneficiaries of what will be the benefits that will be given if Congress will enact a law that gives Filipino Veterans equity rights, the same benefits as all other veterans.

"Mr. Speaker, most of the veterans now, whether they are living here in Hawaii or United States or those living in the Philippines, are now in their late 60s, or 70s, or early 80s. They don't have that much years left for them. I think it's about time for all of us, especially the United States Congress, to do the right thing. And that is to give equity rights for these Filipino Veterans.

"You know, Mr. Speaker, the Filipinos who fought valiantly during World War II, even after the fall of Bataan and the fall of Corregidor practically did it on their own, hiding in mountains with the help of the population to resist aggression. They were the ones who really carried the torch of freedom not only for the Filipinos or the United States, but to all free-loving countries worldwide.

"It is for this reason, Mr. Speaker, that we should strongly support this resolution and urge our congressional leaders to support it. Maybe if there's another amendment that I should add to this, if there be any other committee to look into it, is to give copies to all members of Congress, both the House and the Senate, and not just our congressional delegation.

"I would like to commend the Chairman of the Public Safety and Military Affairs Committee for doing such a good job. And I urge all of you to please pass this resolution. Thank you."

Representative Moses then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would be very remiss if I didn't mention that I'm a member of VFW Post 1572 which, with the exception of me and two other members I believe, is represented by the 1st Philippine Infantry Battalion. These men and their families have sacrificed for many years. They are Americans. They fought with us, side by side with us. For them to get insufficient treatment or less treatment than Americans after being side by side in the same foxhole fighting the same enemy, I think is a disgrace. They need to get the same treatment that all of us get. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 90, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING CONTINUED SUPPORT BY HAWAII'S CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION ON LEGISLATION AND OTHER ACTION TO PROVIDE EQUITY TO FILIPINO-AMERICAN VETERANS WHO SERVED IN THE ARMED FORCES OF THE UNITED STATES OR JOINED THE PHILIPPINE SCOUTS BEFORE OCTOBER 6, 1945," was adopted, with Representatives Chang, Kahikina, Menor, Morihara, Say, Takamine and White being excused.

Representative Hiraki, for the Committee on Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1190-98) recommending that H.C.R. No. 149, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 149, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION STRONGLY URGING THE FEDERAL AVIATION ADMINISTRATION, THE U.S. SENATE COMMITTEE ON COMMERCE SCIENCE AND TRANSPORTATION AND THE U.S. HOUSE COMMITTEE ON TRANSPORTATION AND INFRASTRUCTURE TO PROMOTE ACTIONS TO ENSURE HAWAII'S ROLE AS A TEST SITE IN THE FLIGHT 2000 DEMONSTRATION PROJECT," was adopted, with Representatives Chang, Kahikina, Menor, Morihara, Say, Takamine and White being excused.

Representatives Stegmaier and Morihara, for the Committees on Education and Higher Education, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1191-98) recommending that H.C.R. No. 212 be adopted.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.C.R. No. 212, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION AND THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII TO CONSIDER INPUT FROM THE PRIVATE SECTOR IN FORMULATING CURRICULUM," was adopted, with Representatives Chang, Kahikina, Menor, Morihara, Say, Takamine and White being excused.

Representative Yonamine, for the Committee on Labor and Public Employment, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1192-98) recommending that H.C.R. No. 84 be adopted.

Representative Okamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.C.R. No. 84 be adopted, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro.

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I am strongly in favor of the intent of this. I really am not too sure we should legislate this, but this is a resolution just requesting the use of the word Aloha. But I think we should all be pushing the spirit of Aloha all the time.

"The DBEDT had a hearing on Hawaiian entertainment and one thing that I got out of it was that, although the live shows in Waikiki were dying, the Hawaiian music is experiencing quite a renaissance on the Mainland and in Japan, and CDs are doing quite well. So we are exporting the Hawaiian culture and music, and Aloha along with it, across the globe. We should also promote our other aspects of Hawaiian culture and hula and everything that goes along with it—the love and the friendship and gratitude which the word Aloha incorporates.

"I think we should all live for the day when we see Aloha Friday celebrated around the world. In Bosnia, Somalia, the Middle-East, Bangledesh or Buenos Aires, wherever, if you could all imagine, Aloha Friday worldwide. Thank you very much."

Representative Aiona then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm glad to see that the Legislature is requesting State employees to use the word Aloha when answering the phones and in other aspects of our business day. I just want to caution you, Mr. Speaker and members, that in our hearing, when we did hear the measure, there was a lot of mockery, I guess, for lack of a better word, of the word Aloha.

"When we do speak about the word Aloha, please do not mock the language and insult the language by doing it in a sort of 'non-Hawaiian' way. The word Aloha has a deep-rooted meaning and I certainly wouldn't want to see the word Aloha being trivialized and would caution members and others, when they do use the word Aloha, to really understand the meaning and if you don't mean it, don't say it.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 84, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING ALL STATE EMPLOYEES TO USE THE WORD 'ALOHA' AS AN OFFICIAL GREETING WHEN MEETING THE PUBLIC OR ANSWERING PHONE CALLS FROM THE

PUBLIC," was adopted, with Representatives Chang, Kahikina, Menor, Morihara, Say, Takamine and White being excused.

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Ocean Recreation and Marine Resources, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1193-98) recommending that H.C.R. No. 114, HD 1, be adopted.

First of all, I want to acknowledge the fact that your team of can stackers followed up a great victory in basketball with a victory at can stacking. Thanks to the engineering skills of Representative Takai, we were able to stack cans up to over eight feet tall, and I have proof. And we handly defeated the Senate. Along with Representative Takai, there were Representatives Marumoto, Hiraki, Fox and M. Oshiro, so 'thank you' for their efforts.

"I also want to mention, in our collection drive I want to acknowledge Representative Ken Ito's Office. They were ahead with 310 points, followed by my office with 260, and being energy efficient like her Committee, Representative Terry Yoshinaga with 176, and we also have Representative Say, Representative Case and also the Chief Clerk's Office, all over a hundred points. I just want to make note also that we have a few offices with zero next to their names. I won't be naming them today, but please, if you haven't contributed, please make an effort."

are there. I've witnessed it. I've been a part of it for a year and I'm grateful and thankful that I can bring all of that to a close right here at home, and I thank each and every one of you for that. So thank you very, very much."

"I once had a conversation with President Mortimer, and I suppose he didn't know what my position was on this, and so perhaps in trying to say words that would please me, President Mortimer said: 'Yeah, Pendleton, until we get more Filipinos accepted we won't have any credibility.' That led to a conversation where I said: 'What we need to do is not work on trying to reconfigure the mission's policy or lower the standards somehow. To me, that's kind of insulting as a Filipino. What we need to do is focus on "beefing up", improving, making stronger our secondary and our elementary school system,

so that more and more will be qualified and ready and prepared for U.H.'

"My other comment, less substantive than that, Mr. Speaker, has to do with the first paragraph where it reads: 'The purpose of this concurrent resolution is to request that the Superintendent of Education submit a report to the Legislature', and I believe the next word should read 'on', 'on the status of efforts' and 'effort' probably should be pluralized, especially since this resolution has to do with education, we want to get it right.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose and stated:

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1238-98)

recommending that S.B. No. 2633, SD 1, HD 1, pass Third Reading.

Representative Okamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2633, SD 1, HD 1, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro.

Representative Case rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Basically, I think this bill in its current form is a misdirected attempt to deal with what I do agree is one of the major economic problems we have in the State today, and that is the high cost of commercial and industrial land, particularly lease-hold. I do believe that we're going to have to address that particular problem legislatively in the immediate future, but I do not believe that this bill will solve that problem.

"I do believe it will have unintended consequences. The most direct unintended consequence that I can conceive of at the moment is that the cost of lease-rent arbitrations will probably double immediately. I don't think that's good for anybody.

"I do vote in favor of the bill based on the representations of the Chair of the Consumer Protection and Commerce Committee who believed that it was necessary to keep this bill alive while we await an Auditor's report which we had agreed to request last year to dispose of this issue once and for all. That Auditor's report is expected momentarily. I do hope we review that Auditor's report carefully and act upon it one way or another so that we can put this particular issue behind us. But I also hope that if we don't get that Auditor's report, we do not act on this bill this year. Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, what has been said is true, exact and reasonably correct except there's a major flaw in that bill. That is, its enactment date is 2010. That is an insult to the leasehold community of Hawaii, of which there are approximately 100,000 units, who live in condos or townhouses.

"And quite frankly, it makes us look like we're a little lame or a little slow or a little bit pre-meditatively stalling on this issue. If we're going to do it legislatively, I've never seen a bill with 12 years as a waiting period. Mr. Speaker, I think we can do better than that, and because of that I have some serious reservations."

The Chair responded: "Thank you very much. I believe there is a reason for that."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"There is a reason, but I don't think I agree with it. We need to get a report."

Representative Cachola then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, on the same bill that the Representative from Aina Haina spoke, the reason why we put the year 2010 as the effective date is so we can have continued discussion during conference committee. The process is such that if we put an effective date of July 1, 1998, there's a tendency that the Senate might accept it. There's a possibility that we should try to tighten the bill, and that's the reason why we put in an effective date 2010. I hope the Representative in Aina Haina understands the process."

The Chair responded: "Thank you very much. You are awaiting the report from the Auditor's office."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I will withdraw if the good intention of what is made is followed through with. Sometimes I think when we've got these very serious matters before us that these can be misleading. And we've got tax matters and other matters that we need to have very specific details on. So I will take the Chair's word at face value and wait and see. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2633, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REAL PROPERTY APPRAISALS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes, with Representatives Arakaki, Menor, Meyer, Say, Takamine and Tom being excused.

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1239-98) recommending that S.B. No. 2866, SD 1, HD 1, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3002, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MEDICAL ASSISTANCE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes, with Representatives Arakaki, Menor, Meyer, Say, Takamine and Tom being excused.

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1241-98) recommending that S.B. No. 3213, SD 2, HD 1, pass Third Reading.

Representative Okamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 3213, SD 2, HD 1, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro.

Representative McDermott rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"This is a fee increase, Mr. Speaker, and I'm going to vote against that. Quite simply, whenever we raise fees, I'm going to vote against it. When we decrease them, I may remain silent or I may not. Thank you."

Representative Moses then rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I think the bill is well intentioned and there's very good things in here that calls for an insurance license fee and it would be used for continuing education. That sounds very good. However, I notice in the bill that one-half of the money collected will go to the general fund. That makes this a tax bill,

Mr. Speaker, and I'm opposed to raising taxes. Thank you."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. For the same reasons that were just set forth by the prior speaker, I'll be voting 'no' and have his remarks entered into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative M. Oshiro then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, it's my understanding that this bill is a product of the industry or the licensed insurance practitioners out there, and that this is their bill and they came forward to the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs seeking relief on this particular measure. The idea being, Mr. Speaker, that these people who are licensed under DCCA rules wanted to ensure that the licensing process, as well as the regulation process, as well as the training process and continuing education process, would be well funded so that yearly classes and continuing education and courses for the insurance sales people will be provided.

"Some of the proponents, when you look at the Committee Report, are the Hawaii Independent Insurance Agents Association, the Hawaii State Association of Life Underwriters, and the State Farm Insurance Companies. And for these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I support this bill. Thank you."

Representative Pendleton then rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. My wife practices insurance and I spoke to her about this measure. The education requirement -- continuing education -- is something that their industry genuinely wants. I asked them about the money going to the general fund: what does that have to do with ensuring that the licenses are taken care of, the training, etc., because once the money gets to the general fund, it can be used for whatever purpose the Legislature sees fit.

"She wasn't aware of that. I don't think the industry testified in favor, specifically. I don't think the fact that part of the monies go to the general fund is at the heart of what the industry wanted. That's something the Legislature did separately. Again, I wasn't their 'in' person for the hearing and for the testimony, but I don't think that that was the core of what they wanted. They wanted the continuing education. They wanted sufficient funding to make sure that the licensing, etc. is well funded. So if that's the concern, we should have all the money — the fee — go towards those purposes and not have some of it go into the general fund. For that reason, I'm voting no. Thank you."

Representative Yamane then rose and stated:

"I'm doing this with much regret, but I rise in support with serious reservations on this bill.

"The logic behind the bill is that industry wants it because we are one of a few states that don't have reciprocity like other states as far as insurance agents here having rights in other states. The vast majority of the states all have reciprocity with licenses so they can sell in any state. There are a number of agents here that represent clients in the Mainland that would like that same privilege. I myself being an insurance agent only

practice on this island so I don't have a problem with that.

"I don't appreciate having to pay higher fees, but the reason behind the higher fees, which the industry concurred with, is to set up this program. Because the Insurance Commissioner is going to have to come up with rules, is going to have to come up with programs, and have to designate who and what courses are going to have to be the criteria for this reciprocity, that's the reason for it. It's very logical. The industry came forward themselves for it. There are a number of agents that are not in favor of it, but there is a great deal of logic behind it. And with serious reservations, I will support this bill."

The Chair responded: "Thank you very much. I believe the question is in the general fund and not in the bill itself."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I hadn't intended to give rebuttal, but some of the statements with regard to the industry wanted this, and therefore, we should turn our head and allow it to happen. As the Minority Whip has already mentioned, that isn't the whole truth.

"Clearly the industry wants to have better educational process so that they can keep their standards up and to keep out, perhaps, not as ethical and/or as well-trained insurers in our islands. As was just mentioned by my good colleague with regard to reciprocity with other states, that's another good reason to have this educational process in place. But with regard to having them pay an extra fee so that it will go to the general fund, almost as if we're asking them: you want to better your industry, you want to make your practice a better one, that's great.

"But we're making them pay an additional fee. We're having them pay, I guess, a premium to do the right thing. Just the opposite of what we should be doing by giving them an incentive, we're asking them to pay a premium. They want this so bad, they're willing to pay extra money into the general fund. That's not right. We should support them in their efforts to better their industry without the 'highway robbery' of an additional fee or an excess fee. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3213, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INSURANCE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 39 ayes to 6 noes, with Representatives Halford, Kawananakoa, McDermott, Moses, Pendleton and Ward voting no, and Representatives Arakaki, Menor, Meyer, Say, Takamine and Tom being excused.

We are going to have an opportunity to discuss it in our respective caucuses, and I would hope that everyone would take a look at it.

"I'd also ask that members call legitimate antique dealers in your own communities and get their input on this before we cast a final vote on Tuesday.

"Thank you."

Representative Tarnas rose and stated:

"I've also received numerous phone calls and having friends who have been in this antique dealer business, I do feel that it's a stretch to include them.

"I'd also like to have a 'no' vote recorded on my behalf," and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pendleton rose and asked the Clerk to register a "no" vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative McDermott rose and asked the Clerk to register a "no" vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Marumoto rose and asked the Clerk to register a "no" vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose and asked the Clerk to register a "no" vote for him (the Chair "so ordered"), saying:

"A 'no' with a message that if we do this, we're sending to the business community a sense that we're not very pro-business. I think antique dealers don't deal in things that are pawnbrokered. So I think we have to be

careful that we're putting these in here that we will be discerning when we pass this next week.

"Thank you."

Representative Stegmaier rose and asked the Clerk to record and aye with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kawananakoa rose and asked the Clerk to record a "no" vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Meyer rose and asked the Clerk to record a "no" vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Moses rose and asked the Clerk to register a "no" vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Case rose in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, before we all overreact to the phone calls we have been getting from antique dealers, and so that we can make an informed decision on this bill, I want to provide a little bit of background for the respective caucuses.

"This is part of the legislature's efforts over the last two years to crack down on property crime. Our property crime rate is still one of the highest problems in the country. Essentially what is happening is that stolen goods are easily 'fenced.' They get fenced through a variety of places: pawnshops, second hand dealers, antique dealers, swap meets, et cetera.

"Over the last years, we have addressed pawnshops, with their agreement, two ways. The first is requiring people that come in to deliver goods to these entities for resale to leave a thumbprint behind. that has proven to be a great success.

"The second item is to ask these entities to hold goods hold goods that they receive for resale for a certain period of time to allow police investigations to be completed. The House has proposed thirty calendar days, which is also acceptable to these entities.

"Now the antique dealers have come in very late in the game. If they have concerns, I believe those concerns should be focused on the holding period. But this bill is generally a good one because it assures that their profession, as well as the other professions, are recognized as not being the conduit for the disposition of stolen goods.

"So I would simply urge colleagues to reserve judgment and instead understand the motivations, read the testimony, and consider the alternatives before they leap to the conclusion that this is a bad bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Thielen rose and stated:

"I'm rising again to speak in opposition to the bill, Mr. Speaker.

"Let's just be perfectly clear who we are targeting by this bill -- the Carriage House which is located in Kapahulu, the Antique House and the Royal Hawaiian. We are targeting very respectable antique dealers. There's also an antique dealer in the Davies Pacific Center.

"I think that we have overreached with this bill. And I would ask again, at our respective caucuses, that we all really take a look at this and see whether or not we shouldn't just 'table' this bill for this year and take a look at another way to go about what we're trying to do, which is to reduce crime.

"Thank you."

This would set up a special fund that would collect the money rather than return it to the taxpayers, and I think we should stick with the Constitution.

"Thank you."

"My one concern is, though, that if the Governor feels it is important to have information regarding, say, the fiscal impact of certain rules or impact on small business with respect to these rules, the DCCA doesn't need to give that information to the Governor under this bill and we may very well want to have that kind of information. So those are my reservations on this particular bill."

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2292, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE FUNDS," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading, with Representatives Hiraki, Menor and Takamine being excused.

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1301-98) recommending that S.B. No. 2063, SD 2, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Okamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2063, SD 2, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro.

Representative Thielen rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, there are a number of provisions in this bill that are good, but there are certain provisions that are so bad and take us so far backward in protecting our natural resources and our lands that I just cannot vote 'yes' on the bill.

"One of the main concerns I have is found on page 2 of the Standing Committee Report. It's item number 5, and it requires intervenors to have an ownership interest in the land at issue. You turn to page 6 of the bill. What the bill is eliminating is a long line of hardly fought and deeply contested cases where intervenors had standing, such as the Sierra Club, Life of the Land, you name them. It's all the environmental groups that had the courage to stand up and challenge certain land use decisions. Those cases are found in the Hawaii Reports. They were usually brought by non-profit environmental organizations. The attorneys representing those organizations generally did so pro bono because no one else was willing to step forward and help them.

"Now we are saying that if a person or a group such as this wants to intervene in land use decisions, they are not going to be allowed to do so. We're really narrowing the standing that has been so difficultly won for these groups that have protected our lands in the islands.

"If you take a look at part of the language that's being eliminated: 'All other persons may apply to the commission for leave to intervene as parties. Leave to intervene shall be freely granted.' That was fought for in the 1970s and won, and now in the 1990s we're shutting

the door on those land use groups -- the groups that protect our environment. I can't understand why this body is moving backward. I can't understand why we are doing these kinds of things.

"Mr. Speaker, it's tremendously important that we allow the environmental groups the opportunity to intervene, to have this standing to intervene. That language there -- 'leave to intervene shall be fully granted'. It's taken right out of a State Supreme Court case. This was under Chief Justice Richardson, the author of many of our fine land use decisions in the Supreme Court.

"We're just moving backward, Mr. Speaker, and things are turning more conservative, folks. But I really question this, and it's not going to end up with a better Hawaii. It's not going to end up with better land use decisions. We're slamming the door on the very groups that have defended our land and our decisions and have helped us to preserve what is left of Hawaii's beautiful areas.

"Yes, there are some good things in here, but please take a look at this before Final Reading. Please take a look if you really want to be known as the group that moves away from what we fought for in the 1970s, what we won in the 1970s. Some of you, I think, were colleagues with attorneys such as Boyce Brown who, for so many years, led these wonderful battles. Some of you learned from him. Some of you learned as other lawyers learned from reading those cases.

"You're reversing yourselves. You're going toward a very conservative 'keep the public out' kind of an attitude on this. And I don't think your children are going to sit here on these chairs some day and be happy with what you've done. So I'd really ask you to take a look at it.

"Thank you."

Representative M. Oshiro rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"I would just like to address the concerns of the previous speaker. As I look at page 6, paragraph 3, although there is an ownership provision that has been inserted into this bill and the statute, there is another provision there that allows the person who can demonstrate that they have or will be substantially affected by the proposed change that their interest in the proceeding is clearly and substantially distinguishable from that of the general public, shall be admitted as parties upon the timely submission of an application for intervention and intervenor status.

"So I believe there is a mechanism here for them to come to the table to intervene and to become part of the proceedings.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tarnas rose to cast a no vote, saying:

"I do have similar concerns about the intervention status. I think that should be granted freely. In fact, that's one of the reasons why the LUC is useful, because it does have the ability for intervenors to come in. However, I think you can maintain intervention status, broadly defined, as long as we can insert language that is inserted into this bill which says that interventions must be contesting matters of State interest. That's the crux of this whole thing. The LUC should be focusing only on State interest.

"I do have other concerns as well, Mr. Speaker: the 150 acre provision. I'm concerned about that when it comes to agricultural land because the State has a responsibility to protect agricultural land, and I really don't want to give that up to the counties for agricultural land with parcels of 150 acres or less.

"In the matter where intervention requests are required to be submitted in writing to the LUC for consideration no later than thirty days after the date of petition for boundary changes filed with the LUC, I have a problem with that, just because you have to assume that the process will fail and will not represent your interest and so you intervene with that assumption. And I would like to come up with a system where you people will have a chance of using the system to make it work and if it doesn't work, you'd have the ability to intervene at basically as an appeal.

"And so, with those concerns I'd really hope that we can look at this in conference and I would like to vote up on the final bill because we do need land use reform. But unfortunately, I haven't been able to have my say and participate in this process because I don't sit on the Committees for doing it, but I do hope that the Conference Committee can take some of these considerations into their deliberations in conference.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Morita rose and asked that a no vote be cast for her (the Chair "so ordered"), saying:

"Many of my concerns echo many of the comments made by the Representatives from Kailua and Kohala."

Representative Meyer rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye with reservations (the Chair "so ordered), saying:

"I'm concerned about the 150 acres. That's a whole subdivision and you'd also have the ability to rezone ag land which the previous speaker has said that that should be a State function.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, in response to the Majority Floor Leader's comments, I would like to explain. Yes, the word 'substantially' has been added. Standing will be given to those groups that can demonstrate they will be so directly 'substantially' and immediately affected by the proposed change. What's eliminated is that 'move to intervene shall be freely granted.' So we know what's going to happen. The battles will be fought on whether an environmental group will be allowed to having standing and many of those battles will be lost. We won them in the 1970s. Now twenty years later, we move backward.

"There's another concern I'd like you all to look at. Look at what's being eliminated on page 19 of the bill. The Land Use Commission will no longer look at the impact of the proposed reclassification on areas of State concern, such as preservation or maintenance of important natural systems or habitats. Now, why the blazes are we taking that out? The Land Use Commission no longer will be paying attention to maintenance of valued cultural, historical, or natural resources. Why the blazes are we eliminating that?

"We're not moving forward, Mr. Speaker. And I hope on Monday, that you all take a look at this very seriously and give it the consideration that it deserves. I'd be very happy if it doesn't come out on Tuesday for a vote.

"Thank you."

Representative Santiago rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I want to ask that my vote be entered with reservations (the Chair "so ordered"), but on an issue like this I do want to take a closer look. I represent a district that oftentimes have many land use issues that are of deep concern. So I will take a closer look at it during further debate.

"Thank you,"

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2063, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LAND USE," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading with Representatives Morita, Tarnas and Thielen voting no, and Representatives Hiraki, Menor and Takamine being excused.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1302-98) recommending that S.B. No. 2259, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Okamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2259, SD 1, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro.

Representative Ward rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is hot off the press. In fact, literally in our hands we have the Xerox residual. However, as we look at this bill, this is a 'mother' of all bills -- there are ten bills in one. This is the ERTF, this is the resurrection of the 4.5 percent general excise tax increase. This is the attempt to give the Senate a chance to recant their position to pass the general excise tax.

"Mr. Speaker, when we began our session we asked for wisdom and discernment in prayer. This is neither wise nor discerning to put this 'poison pill' among those ten to do what otherwise very wisely has the TAT tax go from 11.5 percent back to 11 percent. That's a very good piece of it. In the other eight, they seem reasonably sound and reasonably rational. We are taught not to build houses on sand but on rock. We are taught to build a society and an economy on sound principles. And if this bill continues to tax ourselves into prosperity, continues to base itself on the premise that if we just tax the people long enough, we will have prosperity.

"Mr. Speaker, that is not discernment, that is not wisdom and this, unfortunately, is a step backwards, and I am voting against it.

"Thank you."

Representative Moses rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, there is no way to disguise this bill. It's titled properly. It says: 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Taxation,' and that's exactly what it is. And my colleague just mentioned: provide for a new general excise rate of 4.5 percent, increase the use tax to 4.5 percent, impose the use tax on imported services, increase the transient accommodations tax (TAT) to 11 percent. It's a tax bill.

"And as my colleague also mentioned, this thing is still hot. We haven't had the chance to see it. All we had a chance to do was turn to the Committee Report and see that this is just another way of taxing the people of Hawaii.

"Please enter a 'no' vote for me, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Say rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, for the edification of the members of the House, Senate Bill 2259, HD 1, is a compilation, yes, of ten measures that were introduced in this House, respectively.

"The biggest hangup that the Minority may have is in reference to House Bill 2568 that is deadlocked in the Senate Ways and Means Committee, which was the House position, Mr. Speaker, when it went over.

"I am really enjoying this debate, in all candidness to all of you, because there is nothing as far as the 'poison pill' in this measure. There is nothing! To incorporate House Bill 2568, HD 1, the people of the State of Hawaii will have a tremendous windfall in their savings of their personal income taxes: 25 percent for the first two years, 35 percent in the third year. There is a tax credit for the low income, a double tax credit exemption for the retirees. I look at that as being very positive for the people of the State of Hawaii. And how do we pay for it? In cutting the State budget for the next three years, and raising the excise tax by .05 percent. One of my colleagues said that was about 37 cents and I said: 'No.' The 37 cents per day was based on 5.35 percent.

"I am very honored that the members of the Finance Committee agreed with me in lowering the TAT, Mr. Speaker. As far as listening to the industry, that is also struggling along -- the tourist industry, the hotel industry -- from 11.5 percent back down to 11 percent, which the industry agreed to. They were upset at the beginning on our original House bill because of the .05 percent increase. And now we have listened to the industry, Mr. Speaker and members of this House.

"The GET exemption for aviation cleaning facilities -for the past three years and this year, we had measures
that Chancellor Joyce Tsunoda asked us to support for the
community colleges. There are members that have asked
the Committee on Finance to look into areas of how we
can make the State of Hawaii much more attractive in
bringing in this industry -- teaching these mechanics and
pilots.

"The GET exemption for real estate investment trusts (RITS) will be a major boon for this economy. And why we are granting the exemption is because the real estate investment trusts, as a trust, do not get the profit of all the rentals that come in because it goes to the investors of the trust. And why should we tax them --- the real estate investment trusts -- half a point at 4 percent, Mr. Speaker? Throughout the country, RITS are just making a lot of money and you folks have read the business magazines. That was a way to circumvent and adapt to the federal tax laws also.

"In House Bill 1012, HD 1, we have incorporated that for the income-splitting for tourist-related services as well as goods.

"Mr. Speaker, there are ten measures that I asked the public this evening to look at which is the total package on behalf of economic development and economic opportunities toward jobs. Isn't the number one priority that we saw in the survey by one of our local dailies that job opportunities were the major concerns and worries of our people? I hope we are not 'naysayers' here this evening, but individuals who have the courage to develop a package of giving the people of the State of Hawaii an opportunity.

"One group, in reference to Senate Bill 2065, SD 1, agreed that if we would adopt the general exemption for sales between wholesalers, the original package doctrine, they would support the .05 percent increase. And that was the Hawaii Food Industry Association. Why, Mr. Speaker? This exemption, for example, gives a wholesaler who has a representative here who brings it in and then sells it to a wholesaler, the 4 percent cuts the pyramiding. Why should the manufacturer's representative here that brings it in for another wholesaler

be assessed the 4 percent when he sells it to the wholesaler?

At this point, Representative Nakasone rose and yielded his time

Representative Say thanked the Chair and continued, saying:

"This is all pro-business. Can I have a conflict because I'm a wholesaler? I thought we were all here in our goal and endeavor to address our business climate. And these ten measures in the bill, Mr. Speaker, will allow the business community in the State of Hawaii to survive the global market.

"I wasn't prepared to speak and I told the Minority when we came to this session that I hope the Minority would not speak on Second Reading. But I am happy to discuss the ten measures that we have incorporated in the bill, and like I told the members of the Finance Committee this is the only 'vehicle' we have alive, and I think the members of the Finance Committee realize that. And as I said to the members of the Finance Committee and to the members of this House, our reckoning will come by tomorrow or by next week when we see the proposals of the Senate if they are responsible and balanced, tied to their financial plan and the budget.

"So at this time, Mr. Speaker, I would just like to ask all of my members to support this measure on Second Reading and we will have a much more lively debate on Third Reading.

"Thank you."

Representative Kawananakoa rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I vote 'nay.' The Chair asked us not to be 'naysayers' but I am voting 'nay.' I understand my good colleague's concern with the other good measures that are in this particular bill, as it is now referenced at some 147-150 pages.

"Mr. Speaker, you know very well that we didn't have the time to offer an amendment to excise the excise tax because we believe in the good measures that are also couched in this bill. But as it is now, we're being forced to vote on it all in one because we just received this bill, maybe five or ten minutes ago, without the opportunity to offer an amendment so we could clearly show the people of Hawaii where we stand. That we stand with the other resolutions or the other aspects of this bill. But we cannot, and we continue to stand in opposition to an increase in the excise tax.

"It was also mentioned the issue is jobs and we've been saying from the start that this will not create jobs. The stimulus to the economy is too little. I know last Monday we had a great rally here and a great discussion on increasing taxes. It was interesting to note that there were no Minority views allowed to discuss their concerns at this rally.

"I would simply say now that we are pushing this off until Tuesday and that there will be a 'showdown' on Tuesday. And I can only say that this Representative will continue to vote 'no' on an increase in the excise tax, and I encourage the rest of my colleagues: do not be cajoled along with the notion of, let's keep this alive, as we discussed on the first crossover to the Senate. Many of our Representatives were asked: please keep the idea alive. Maybe the Senate will come around to our way of thinking. It seems clear to me that the Senate is not coming around and that argument shouldn't hold much water. So I encourage my colleagues to have the fortitude

and the courage that was mentioned earlier to vote their conscience and not just to keep another ball in the air. When it comes to solidify the direction of this State, we need to give guidance, we need to give leadership, and that is up to us in the House of Representatives.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tarnas rose to speak in opposition to the bill, stating:

"Despite all the excellent provisions in the bill, I did make a commitment to my constituents not to support an increase in the general excise tax, and I have to honor that commitment because those are the people I work for. For that reason, I have to vote against this measure.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pendleton rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"As my distinguished colleague from Nuuanu has said, there are many good provisions in this bill. Provisions which we have talked about for a long time, provisions which we wholeheartedly embrace. But unfortunately, these are coupled with the GET increase and so that is why I'm going to have to be voting no.

"It is interesting that the Chair of Finance spent so much time singing the praises of things that we all agree on. Our opposition has nothing to do with all of the other tax reduction proposals. We welcome those. We wish there were two separate bills: put the GET increase in one separate bill and you can get a unanimous vote on all the rest of the tax reduction proposals. But it's the GET increase that concerns us.

"The reason why it concerns us is because even the ERTF, their Task Force, their Working Group, did not recommend this, even at the ERTF level. They did not say that this was the heart of the program, that this was the centerpiece, that this was the most important piece of the whole program when they gave a town meeting in Kailua. They de-emphasized it. They said the GET increase is just one of the many things that they want as an entire package. There are many things that we can talk about. We're not going to enumerate and number which one is most important.

"Mr. Speaker, the Legislature has compromised on the corporate tax reduction. We have compromised on the issue of reducing the pyramiding on the services side. We have compromised on the issue of abolition of the Land Use Commission to duplicative land use. compromised on the issue of County Boards. All of these things were recommended by the ERTF. We're willing to compromise on those things but when it comes to the GET increase, that's the heart of the matter. where we have to draw the line in the Senate. That's what apparently was the centerpiece of the ERTF program according to certain members. Well, I disagree. I don't think the GET increase was the heart of the program. If we are willing to discuss and to make amendments and changes to the ERTF proposals on all those other measures, why can't we do that on the GET increase measure? This was not the heart of the program. You can ask anyone. Tom Lappart, he will not say that this was the centerpiece. . .

Representative M. Oshiro rose on a point of order and said:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe that this bill is regarding the House tax proposals and not the ERTF proposals and we should debate that particular matter."

The Chair answered:

"Representative, please continue and confine yourself to the measure. Thank you."

Representative Pendleton continued, saying:

"I will. Mr. Speaker, if we want to pretend that this has nothing to do with the ERTF, we can do that.

"Finally, I will be voting no because of the GET increase, but I do want to make a comment that procedurally, having this bill voted through the Finance Committee so late today and coming before us again. . .you know, it's many, many pages long -- 155 pages long. Is this the best way to make these tough, difficult decisions? I think many businesses in this State have to make some very, very tough decisions -- Queens, Liberty House, et cetera. I don't think that they say: well, let's wait till the very last minute and let's give our Board of Directors information minutes before they need to speak on these minutes before they need to vote. I don't think it's prudent. I certainly don't think it's the optimal way of making some of these tough decisions. Apparently, we think that that's the way we need to operate here. Maybe that explains why we are facing some of the challenges we are facing today.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McDermott rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I've tried to vote against every tax increase and like the good Representative from Kona, I took the same pledge of oath. I told my constituents I won't vote for any tax increases. And as the Representative from Makakilo pointed out, this 'baby' is worried. I'm a pretty big guy but I have trouble lifting it because it has so many taxes in it. I can't lift it up.

"Mr. Speaker, we won't support the tax reform for the income tax brackets by robbing Peter to pay Paul. We're lowering tax rates on one hand and raising the excise tax on the other because we don't have the courage to cut government. It was mentioned before, when our budget came out, we cut about 1.8 percent. That's not enough. And if people ask: 'where are you going to cut?' I say: 'cut the Rent Subsidy Program which services about 644 families.' That's not everything but it's a start. That's one program, and I'm on record to say that we should eliminate that one. But we haven't done enough. We need to go further and we shouldn't tax our bosses.

"Thank you."

Representative P. Oshiro rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, while the primary intent of this bill is to position various measures for our upcoming House/Senate Conference Committees, I would like to offer a few comments on the tax reform provisions that are contained in this bill.

"The personal income tax reduction proposal, Mr. Speaker, is a very comprehensive one, which blends several different components together into a single package which will significantly lower taxes for the residents of Hawaii. So while it may be very tempting, Mr. Speaker, to take certain parts of this tax reduction package and to applaud or to criticize its parts, that would not fairly reflect, Mr. Speaker, the true intent and the true impact of this tax reduction proposal.

"This measure, Mr. Speaker, consists primarily of two major components. First and foremost, this proposal implements a major reduction in personal income taxes, which is estimated to total in excess of \$800 in tax savings for our residents over the next three years. To minimize the negative impact that this \$800 million revenue loss will have upon State programs and State services, to minimize that, the second part of this measure increases the general excise tax by 1/2 of 1 percent. And I need to emphasize, Mr. Speaker, that the only reason for this increase in the general excise tax is to partially make up for the \$800 million in personal income tax relief. That is the only reason.

"When viewed together -- the partial income tax reduction and the excise tax increase -- when viewed together as a package, this proposal is estimated to result in a \$460 million tax reduction for the residents of Hawaii over the next three years. And I truly believe, Mr. Speaker, that the additional dollars that our residents will gain by this proposal, will encourage additional spending which will, in turn, result in the strengthening of our economy.

"Mr. Speaker, as we move into Conference Committee, it is imperative that we enter into these deliberations with a fundamentally sound, and fiscally responsible tax reform package which is a part of our overall financial plan. And that is what we have done, Mr. Speaker.

"I truly believe that the House has taken a very balanced approach in the development of this tax reform proposal, which includes a significant reduction in personal income taxes, a tax revenue enhancement initiative, along with a major reduction in government expenditures. And while, Mr. Speaker, at present, our tax reform proposal which we will be entering into conference with, while at present the House tax reform proposal may differ substantially from that of the Senate, I certainly do believe that with continued dialogue and discussion, that we will emerge at the end of this session with a tax reform measure that will be an integral part of our effort to revitalize Hawaii's economy.

"Thank you."

Representative Fox rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, we are in a serious economic crisis in Hawaii today. I would really encourage all 51 members of the House to try to come together on a solution to the economic crisis that we face to the other, and to put aside partisan differences and really search out a solution that can work for the people of Hawaii.

"Unfortunately, what we have before us this evening is a gigantic 'sugar-coated pill' that at its core is a pocket of lethal poison, and that is the excise tax increase. Part of the sugar-coating that we're looking at this evening is a \$10 million reduction in the taxes that tourism-related businesses have to pay. That's designed in part to draw those industries into supporting the 'poison pill' of an excise tax increase. Another \$10 million that we have is to bring aboard, as the Representative from Palolo, the Chair of our Finance Committee has pointed out, the Hawaii Food Industry Association. To bring them aboard, we have sugar-coating of \$10 million in a tax break for them. It is all designed to move through this \$120 million 'poison pill' of the excise tax increase. This increase is not necessary and it would be really good if we'd all work together to take this off the table.

"We do have a proposal to reduce income taxes by \$230 million. We can pay for that \$230 million without increasing excise taxes. If we do away with the \$20

million that we proposed tonight, we do away with the credit of \$42 million that we have to put in so that 'poison pill' will go down. That's \$62 million in credits that we're incorporating to get the 'poison pill' down our system. The total cost now of the excise tax 'poison pill' is only \$100 million -- that's only three percent of our general fund budget.

"If we can find \$100 million in savings in this government and, Mr. Speaker, I say that if the House and the Senate together are up to that challenge, we can find \$100 million more worth of savings in that budget. If we find \$100 million more in savings, we do not have to increase the excise tax. That's all we need. The bill is now down to \$100 million since we obviously have \$20 million worth of savings that we talked about tonight -- a hundred million dollars.

"I believe that's an entirely achievable objective, Mr. Speaker, and I believe that we should all -- all 51 of us and all 25 of those in the Senate -- should work to find that \$100 million in savings. We can do it and we can thereby avoid hitting the people of Hawaii with an excise tax increase in a down economy, hitting the tourists who visit Hawaii, including many tourists from Japan who've indicated very clearly their lack of interest in the consumption taxes. We can avoid having them be faced with higher taxes because we are talking about charging the tourists higher taxes. That is what it's about when we talk about an excise tax increase. So let's take that off the table, let's find \$100 million worth of savings. Let's reduce the general fund by another three percent, and we can have it all.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stegmaier rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I want to focus on our need to cut government spending so significantly that we force ourselves to streamline our government, and we force ourselves to cut waste and end duplication of government services. In the area that I am familiar with -- education, health and human services -- Mr. Speaker, I still see much duplication and much waste.

"The general excise tax increase that is in this bill will keep from reducing government to the level that we need to make these changes to government that will open up opportunities in the private sector and, therefore, eventually stimulate our economy. For these reasons, I am in opposition to this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Ahu Isa rose in support of the bill with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I am against any increase in the general excise tax and I will continue to oppose any increase. But we need a 'vehicle' to take to conference. And I am not being fooled because I know this increase will hurt the poor, the elderly and people on fixed income. A lot of people don't look down the road when they file their income taxes and that they will get back a return. They look at the dollars that they take to the supermarket and whenever they have to purchase something, they have to count their pennies to pay their taxes. I know, at this point in time, Mr. Speaker, we have nothing to bring to the 'table', as the Chair has said.

"This bill incorporates nine measures that will stimulate our economy and create jobs. I look at some of them here exempts the general excise tax on exported services, exempt hotel room rentals from the general excise tax, provides a general excise tax exemption for real estate investment trusts, exempts wholesalers from the .05 percent general excise tax assessments.

"It is only fair, Mr. Speaker, that we give this bill a chance. It is only fair to our constituents at this point, and I commend the Chair of Finance, and I have faith in him as we go to conference at this point.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Case rose to in opposition to the bill, stating:

"Briefly, Mr. Speaker, my objection remains the increase in the general excise tax, which I regard as a failure to 'face the music.' Frankly, I also have questions or reservations, I'm not sure which, on a number of the exemptions that are in this bill. I think we have to realize that exemptions can be worthwhile, but they can also be bad when they shift a disproportionate tax load over onto non-exempt taxpayers.

"So as I look in here, I note that we need to explain why it is, for example, that we are proposing an exemption for employee leasing companies, or telecommunication services. The more exemptions we have, the more urging or compelling the argument to raise the general excise tax to raise revenue from a smaller tax base, which I think is exactly the wrong way to go.

"Thank you."

Representative Thielen rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, my opposition comes because of the increase in the general excise tax. I pulled something off of the Web, and it's a recent Governor's speech of the Bank of Japan. 'The Japanese economy has not shown any definite signs of recovery since its reaction to the rise in the consumption tax rate in April 1997. Rather, economic recovery appears decelerating.' I think we can take a lesson from what they have learned and experienced.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Santiago rose to speak in support of the bill with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, what really gets me is at least what I'm hearing tonight, and I'm really pleased to hear that there's acknowledgement on the part of those who are voting against the bill, that within the measures, and most of these we've heard before, there is the largest decrease in the history of our State.

"I know when I came down here, I told my constituents that I'll do the best job I could. I served them honestly with integrity and I have tried, for the last couple of weeks now, to speak to as many people as I could, who are voting against the measure, to come up with an alternative -- show me how. And I keep hearing, you know, we need to 'face the music', we can have it all if we don't raise the general excise tax -- let's just go down a little bit more on the income tax. And I say, surely, that's easier to sell. And I think with the help of the media -- they're still here but they turned off their cameras. With the help of the media explaining to the public that this whole focus and this whole debate seems to be only about the .05 percent increase, that's all that the message is going to get out.

"What I'm really concerned about and what I try to get the economists -- the experts in this area -- to talk about is: how much of the stimulus do we have to absolutely look at to get this economy going? Because we can debate till the end of time what's the right thing to do, et cetera, et cetera, But I think the bottom line for me and the legacy that I want to leave when I leave this place, however way I go out, is that I didn't just think about like right now because the economy needs to get going,

"What we're talking about here is \$800 million -- \$340 million is going to be looked at through the general excise tax, 30 percent of that is going to be exported, I imagine, to the visitors if I'm hearing the correct figures and the total deduction of \$460 million. And I hear that we've not cut enough in government and every time we say, well, where more are we going to look at, I hear vague generalities about, well, there's waste here and there's a little bit waste there. We can cut a little bit here, we can cut a little bit there. And I say to everybody: hey, let's look very closely at every one of those suggestions. I know I've looked at it in the department that I'm overseeing, and what I see is a department that is totally demoralized because they are having cuts that affect people. I sometimes refer to and I see some of my people up there talking about the Peer Education Program that's on the block to be cut as non-essential. essential services.

"So I share with you, Mr. Speaker and my colleagues, that I'm hopeful that by the time this session is over, that we will have achieved the goal of trying to stimulate the economy and really taking some tough choices, whatever they may be, and that be the goal primarily, because if we don't, the hurt that we're hurting with now will get worse, and I truly hope we don't take the easier 'sell', maybe the tastier 'pill', and try to have our cake and eat it too, which is to say: we're not going to go so far down. Everyone will understand if we don't raise the general excise tax. If there's a way that we can do it, who in their right mind is going to say: 'me, me, me, I want to raise the general excise tax.' Who in their right mind is going to do that? You know, I don't think anybody sitting here wants to do that. But I think everything else I've looked at, every other solution that has come my way, is not going to accomplish the goal that we know we need to achieve, Mr. Speaker. And I'm searching, like the rest of you. We still have time. If there is a way to do it, let's find it. We haven't found it yet, obviously, Chairman. We've been looking high and low and under every rock. But, Mr. Speaker, I'm still hopeful.

"Mr. Speaker, I share these words with you only because the silence is deafening on the part of those who are in support of the measure. I'm hoping that the statistics that you shared in your article will come forward in terms of how other states have dealt with this before the end of session.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Meyer rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"It is very difficult for me to vote 'no.' I just voted with reservations in the Committee. I have been an outspoken critic of the fact that we haven't reformed our personal income tax here since about 1965. Little by little, the residents of this State have been taxed more and more because we've made no adjustment for inflation. We have the very worst income tax in the country with the lowest threshold, the highest rate. You may look at some tables but they are not comparing apples and apples because some of the other states tie the state tax. You are

able to subtract your federal tax. . .we just have the worst possible thing, and I'm very anxious to see this reformed.

"But I personally feel that the excise tax is one of the most onerous taxes. And again, the graphs that we look at that are circulated around again are not accurate, because we're always being compared with other states' sales taxes and our excise tax is not a sales tax. And it is such a painful tax on the self-employed, people that perform services. It's that 4 percent right off the top, right at the gross, whether they're profitable or not.

"Obviously yes, I wanted this bill to come out of Committee. It's the only 'vehicle' we have and it's the only chance of getting some kind of income tax relief for the people of Hawaii, but I would rather see the income tax reduction loss, or spread over a few more years, so that we can finally make it more fair, but not increase the excise tax.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Aiona rose and asked the Clerk to register a "no" vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Goodenow rose in support of the bill and asked that the remarks of the Representative from the North Shore be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Marumoto rose in opposition to the bill, stating:

"I don't believe that this is an economic stimulation package. The Bank of Hawaii economist said this several times to us in November. He said it was a restructuring of our taxes as befits our being increasingly a service economy. So I don't think this will really help our economy or job creation. I think it will really hurt our small businesses and our lower and middle class, especially the middle class, and it will hit them right in the gut.

"I think we have an opportunity to kill the excise tax increase at this point because it is deader than a dried thing in the Senate I hope -- we'll know tomorrow. But if we kill it now, it would be a good thing. If we keep it alive and allow it to go to conference, it could turn into a 5.35 percent monster, and I would hate to see that. It would be much worse than the present 4.5 percent. Also the TAT, the hotel tax, can go from 11 percent to 12.35 percent in conference. I think we've got to be very much aware of how much these taxes could hurt our economy.

"The Representative from Kailua cited the fact that the consumption tax in Japan went from 3 to 5 percent and their economy plummeted over 11 percent, and they are in a very critical situation now. We have got to be very cognizant that our economy could go into a 'spin', that the Japanese economy could also go into a 'free fall', and I think we have to take some bitter medicine now and cut our spending.

"I regret I have to vote 'no' on this measure because there are some good things in it, but I think because we're at such a critical juncture in our economy, this is something we must do.

"Thank you."

Representative Takai rose and asked the Clerk to register a "no" vote for him and requested that the words of the Representative from Manoa be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2259, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading, with Representatives Aiona, Case, Fox, Kawananakoa, Marumoto, McDermott, Meyer, Moses, Pendleton, Stegmaier, Takai, Tarnas, Thielen and Ward voting no [with additional noes of Representatives Halford and Whalen as noted below], and Representatives Menor and Takamine being excused.

Representative Marumoto then rose and called for a division of the House.

The Chair responded: "We just had a vote, Representative."

At 6:30 o'clock p.m., Representative Kawananakoa asked for a recess, and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 6:36 o'clock p.m., Representative Whalen rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, as Representatives of the House, we are all entitled to have our 'no' votes registered and at the last vote, I was deprived of that privilege to have my vote registered. I understand the discussion and the Speaker's desire to end it, which I agree with by the way. However, I do feel that I was entitled to have a 'no' vote registered."

The Chair responded:

"Representative, you are out of order. The vote was taken and you did vote. In fact, you voted 'no' along with all those who voted 'no', so at the request for an aye or a nay, you voted nay. It was so recorded."

Representative Whalen: "I'm rising on a point of personal privilege."

Chair: "State your point."

Representative Whalen: "The other Representatives had the opportunity to have their 'no' vote registered in the Journal. I'm simply asking for that same privilege that was granted the other members."

Chair: "You will be given that privilege on Tuesday. This is Second Reading, the vote has been taken."

Representative Whalen thanked the Chair.

Representative Halford: "For the sake of representative democracy, and for the sake of my constituents' right to know how their representative voted, I am asking that you formally record my Second Reading 'no' vote on SB 2259, SD1, HD1.

"In the complex dynamics of this 51 member House, occasional deviations from correct form will occur. In these instances, prudent action is both the best approach and the whole solution.

"Thank you for recording my 'no' vote."]

At this time, Representative Okamura was permitted a late introduction and he introduced to the members of the House Mr. Paul Kawaguchi, Senate Clerk, and Mrs. Carol Taniguchi, Assistant Clerk of the Senate.

Representative Arakaki rose and stated:

"In all this debate over economic and fiscal policy, I think it is important to keep our perspective and remember why we make these decisions. They're basically for our children and for our future generations. So tomorrow, we're having a handful of hardy and committed individuals who will be 'walking the talk' and putting feet on our faith and, hopefully, faith in our feet, to really talk about and emphasize the importance of our children as we visit different programs and agencies. If anyone wants to join us, I would welcome them. We're going to start tomorrow at 8:30 a.m. here at the Capitol.

"The other announcement that I have: we are going to try out a new way of raising revenues for the State. We are going to have a demonstration project. It's called a 'dunking' booth. This is going to be next Wednesday during our recess. If it works, we may use it as a revenue-generating measure. But we need volunteers and we need Representatives who are willing to volunteer to be in the dunking booth and the proceeds will go towards the Foodbank. And it's going to be a challenge to see who can raise the most amount of money and pledges. Somehow, Mr. Speaker, I think if you volunteered you'd probably raise the most, so please think about it."
