The Temporary Chair then appointed Representatives Yonamine and Auwae to escort the Honorable Ronald T.Y. Moon from the rostrum.

H.R. No. 2, electing the Honorable Calvin K.Y. Say, Representative from the Eighteenth District, and Sylvia J. Luke, Representative from the Twenty-Sixth District, as Speaker and Vice Speaker, respectively, of the House of Representatives of the Twenty-First Legislature of the State

of Hawai'i was offered by Representative M. Oshiro, and was read by the Temporary Clerk.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, H.R. No. 2 was adopted.

The Temporary Chair appointed Representatives M. Oshiro and Lee to escort the newly elected Speaker to the rostrum.

The Temporary Chair stated:

"Members of the House of Representatives, ladies and gentlemen, I present the Honorable Calvin K.Y. Say, the Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Twenty-First Legislature," and presented the Speaker with the gavel.

The Speaker took the Chair, stating:

"Members, thank you for your vote of confidence and support. I pledge to you that I will execute my duties and responsibilities with fairness consistent with Hawai'i's Constitution and state statutes."

The Chair then appointed Representatives Lee and Pendleton to escort the Honorable Sylvia J. Luke to the rostrum.

The Chair presented the Vice Speaker, stating:

"Members of the House of Representatives, I present the Honorable Sylvia J. Luke, Vice Speaker of the House of Representatives for the Twenty-First Legislature."

At 10:31 o'clock a.m., the Speaker declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At this time, the members of the House and their guests were entertained by the Ohana O Mele of Kaimuki High School and the Ka'au Crater Boys.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:17 o'clock a.m.

The Speaker took the Chair and delivered his address, stating:

"Governor Cayetano, Mrs. Cayetano, Lieutenant Governor Hirono, Mr. Oshima, Congressman Abercrombie, Chief Justice Moon, Mayor Kusaka, Mayor Apana, Former Governor Waihe'e, family, guests, and friends.

"Before I begin, let me just share one note of thanks which I want to share with all of you, and that is my Mother.

"As we open the Twenty-First Session of the Hawai'i State Legislature, Hawai'i is coming out of its longest period of economic stagnation since becoming a State. We have worked hard as a legislature to govern smartly in the hard times and it has not been easy.

"We all sharpened our pencils and excluding schools and public safety, we did cut the cost of government and cut the size of government. We didn't stop there. We reformed taxes, with the largest tax cut in our State's history. That is equivalent to two billion dollars over a six-year period, with seven hundred fifty million dollars of cuts in personal income taxes going back to the residents between 1999 and 2002. And we reformed government itself. All of these actions together have contributed to our economic turnaround by decreasing the current and future costs of government and increasing the discretionary spending of our residents and businesses.

"The actions we took were tough, yes. Some critics say we went too far, while others say we did not go far enough. The fact is that economically, today, we see the initial fruits of our labor: an economy with vibrancy, new potential and hope. Just take a look at last week's *Pacific Business News*. All the economic indicators are up ... tax revenues, employment, tourism, construction, real estate, and retail sales

"After all of these years of downward flight, we have to pull up the nose of the plane. We have to do it wisely, taking care of current debts and recognizing that we have the obligation to State employees to pay them a fair wage for doing the best job they can and always, always with an eye toward short term actions with long term benefits. That is why the two priorities of education and the economy stand out so clearly on our agenda, which the Majority Leader will cover very shortly. Let's take the right steps now and build a future in which our people have the right job opportunities and the needed skills and talents to perform the job.

"On this Opening Day, we must all remember why we are here. We are all here because we ran and got elected. We all carry with us the needs and wishes of the people. And we must embody their deepest hopes now, throughout this session, and throughout our term. Despite how hard the times have been, we do not and cannot accept failure of spirit. Criticism yes, but cynicism No. Not when behind us are the aspirations and dreams of Hawai'i's people.

"I am a small businessperson. Each morning I drive my sons to school, I go to the post office and pick up the mail for my business, then drive to my office in Kalihi. Later in the morning I drive to the Capitol and conduct my legislative business there. Frequently, I have to pick up our sons, Geoffrey and Jared, because my wife Cora is a very hardworking public school teacher. My staff is used to hearing me say in the middle of a meeting, 'Sorry, I have to go. I got to take care of my boys.'

"And hey, that's the reason why I wanted to become Speaker! So I could pick up my kids when I wanted to! After I get my boys to their next event, for me, it's back to one place of work or the other.

"If this all sounds familiar, it's because my day is a lot like most working people in Hawai'i, except, I add the role of being Speaker into my routine.

"But make no mistake of it. My day is about my family and especially my children.

"I work at my living. I am here because I believe in the future for my children. They must be the best work I ever do. To my fellow colleagues, our best work must be for our children. For they really are why we are here.

"In that light, let me introduce the pride of my life, my wife Cora and our two sons, Geoffrey and Jared.

"So this session must be about working people and their families. No individual, no political party has the monopoly on creative thinking. There are fifty-one of us and we must gauge each idea on its merit. We can differ with dignity, get beyond the easy headline and find solutions which will really work. And still remember to pick up our kids.

"I challenge each of us to think innovatively, to keep what's good and fix what isn't. I ask you to apply your creative thinking to the following items which are critical for our future.

"Today, we are at a critical point in our history. Unique opportunities surround us.

"We've all relied on a variety of industries like tourism. But I also see Hawai'i as a major player in the New Economy.

"Governor Cayetano proposes turning Kaka'ako into a viable center for research and education in high technology and biotechnology. I for one envision a total technology center which houses businesses as varied as a biomedical research center to house the John A. Burns School of Medicine to Adtech's consideration of expanding their network testing operations and headquarters. The University's presence and talents will attract the private research companies to feed off of their research and development activities.

"And let's get creative in funding this project. Do we need to do things the old fashioned way through general obligation bonds? My answer to you is No.

Let's attract private capita! through enterprise zone benefits;

Let us use certificates of participation in financing these projects;

Let us consider issuing special purpose revenue bonds to assist new businesses to relocate to Kaka'ako; and also

Let us use design/build requests for proposals.

"Biotechnology and agriculture are foundational for Hawai'i's new economy. In biotechnology, we all know about the work of Dr. Yanagimachi and his team on the mouse-cloning project. Their genetic research carries huge potential for disease prevention. But did you know that a number of local, private firms are working on breakthroughs in marine algae products, vaccine development, and tropical agriculture? Hawai'i scientists have been successful in areas such as reproductive biology, stroke therapies, new drug development from marine resources, and the virus resistant papayas.

"By applying technologies, we will grow our three billion dollar agricultural industry, which already provides more than 42,000 jobs in our State. Let's encourage companies already growing crops in Hawai'i to use our year-round growing climate to also consider doing their research and development here rather than on the mainland.

"There are creative ways to use the crops we grow. The future of crops is not necessarily in the crop itself but in the value-added product. The result is that there is greater production of the crop. An example I share with you is poi. Poi is not just being sold as poi anymore. It's all about diversification. There are poi muffins, poi biscotti, poi ice cream, and even for the Okinawans - poi andagi. And I can remember just eating poi with my fingers! Those were the days.

"Our economy is more sustainable if we can reduce our consumption of oil for transportation and provide for electricity at a reasonable price to the consumer. Given oil's rising cost and finite supply, we must seriously consider alternate fuels and increased energy conservation.

"Hydrogen has the potential to reduce greenhouse emissions, and to diversify our fuel sources while using indigenous energy. Certainly, there will be barriers to hurdle and costs to be incurred but let us pursue this and other options.

"For Hawai'i to sustain itself into the future, we must also focus on how we can better manage our resources as well as wastes. We are making progress in recycling water, converting treated wastewater and selling it for irrigation and industrial use. We need to recycle more of our green wastes, sewage sludge, and glass. The potential of recycling is that it can also generate new industries in the state of Hawai'i. A case in point, through technological innovations, a company called Pacific Biodiesel recycles and converts used cooking oil into fuel today.

"For the jobs of tomorrow, we must rethink the composition of our workforce and the way it is trained. The new economy will create employment opportunities, unparalleled in modern history, to the new workforce ---- the new workforce is the young, the elder, the welfare recipient, and the challenged, among others. We must ensure that:

The employment, training, and education system is finely adapted to the demands of the labor market;

All workers are afforded work-based educational opportunities to constantly upgrade their skills;

Schools have fully integrated workforce readiness proficiencies into their curricula; and

The full potential of public/private partnerships are realized.

"There are great possibilities for Hawai'i in the new economy. Government should help where it can, and then get out of the way!

"Let me turn now to family well-being. While so much of our energy will be spent improving the economy and ensuring a bright future for Hawai'i, we must not lose sight of the underlying purpose of all of this work --- our families and the needs of each individual.

"Let's make sure that we can meet the health care needs of our people. Recent medical advances give us hope for improved longer and healthier life. Yet there are those living and working in our community who cannot even hope to receive basic treatment needed to heal injuries or cure illnesses or simply to stay healthy. Many of those without hope are Hawai'i's keiki. We have made progress toward universal healthcare through programs like SHIP but more must be done. This year an emphasis will be placed to help cover the cost of care provided by our rural health centers, community hospitals, and nursing homes.

"All of us look with hope toward a happy retirement, yet the costs of caring for ourselves and loved ones as we age, continue to spiral. Ten years from now over 40,000 of us will need care in a nursing facility or in our homes. In Hawai'i, 85 percent of the costs of this care today, are borne by our family and friends, and most of these families deplete their assets within a year. Government cannot pay for it all, yet without some support, what hope will the elderly and their families have? We must plan for the future by considering every means available to support families in need. And some of these means may be unpalatable to some, such as State sanctioned gaming in Hawai'i, yet we must weigh all of our alternatives against a future without hope. These are our kupuna.

"With every day come new products and methods to improve our lives. Many of the pains and diseases of age can be eased, and even cured by ever-evolving wonder drugs. And yet the skyrocketing costs of these drugs make them prohibitively expensive to the elderly on a fixed income, those who need it the most. Let us help the elderly among us by exploring methods to reduce drug costs and increase availability, such as joint buying programs or even tax credits.

"School is the center of every community. And thanks to the great work of our teachers, our schools are starting to make great strides.

"On the 2000 Stanford Achievement Test, more than half of our elementary schools are now scoring at or above average! Congratulations! At the 3rd grade level, 64 percent of the schools met or exceeded the national norm in both math and reading. Even our high school test scores have improved over the 1999 results! This is great news!

"To help our teachers and students become even more successful, we need classrooms that work. The school plant should be a source of pride for every neighborhood and community. And in many instances, they are not. A major problem is the effective streamlining of school repair projects. To ensure that school construction and repair funds are used efficiently, we must establish a management consortium between the Departments of Education, Accounting and General Services, and Transportation. This cooperative group will have the talent and the authority to restore our schools as a point of pride.

"My final note on family well-being is a plea for those who are struggling day-to-day and whose voice might not otherwise be heard.

"We must take care of the working poor by increasing the minimum wage in Hawai'i. I am convinced that the best way to get people out of the poverty cycle is to pay them wages that truly support their families.

"I look to the session ahead. We have to match the complexities of the problems we face with our passion to solve them. We must offset the shortage of resources with an abundance of common sense. We must navigate through legitimate yet differing views with the compass of our shared and enduring values. And we must carry the hopes of Hawai'i through each day from start to finish.

We must practice aloha by giving it. We must give aloha by practicing it. I know we can. I believe we will. "Aloha and Mahalo! Thank you."

The Chair then recognized Representative Fox, the Minority Leader, to present the Minority's response.

Representative Fox rose and responded:

"Aloha! You have on this floor the largest group of Republicans ever to sit in the Hawai'i State House. We grew with seven new representatives, our greatest increase since statehood. To a person, these new representatives say they were elected by voters looking for change.

"We Republicans have a responsibility to offer change. We hope the majority party also heeds the public call for change. Hawai'i often seems caught up in reverence of the past, for battles fought and won long ago. But nostalgia for Governor Burns should not substitute for action in the Twenty-First Century. Hawai'i has fundamental problems that demand real change. Let's go to work, let's change, and let's begin now.

"Let me cover three changes that can help Hawai'i. First, change our approach to public education. Second, change Hawai'i's approach to government. And third, change Hawai'i's approach to the outside world.

"First comes changing public education. The current system of running public education is broken. Repeatedly, the majority has sought to do away with an elected board. And in 1997, the Governor's Economic Revitalization Task Force recommended substituting county boards for our unworkable statewide board. Republicans support county boards, with four Oahu district boards. Shouldn't we all recognize that large school districts--like Hawai'i's--just don't work?

"Republicans also favor the Governor's proposal, made when he was Lt. Governor, to elevate principals to CEO status. Give them more autonomy and substantially higher pay. In exchange, the principals would work under limited term, performance-based contracts they help negotiate.

"Hawai'i will benefit greatly from changed public education.

"Second, we favor making government smaller to lower Hawai'i's high costs. The difficulties of living here drive away residents and friends. During the 'lost decade' of the 1990s, of all states, Hawai'i sent the highest share of its population to other states.

"We pay the nation's highest state and local taxes combined. High taxes make Hawai'i less desirable to residents and investors. High taxes contribute to economic difficulties. High taxes help explain why Hawai'i had the lowest growth rate of any state in the 1990s. Not surprisingly, the American Friends study "Barely Making it on Your Own in Hawai'i" identified taxes as a leading cost for low income working families. Our excise-based tax structure hits working people the hardest, people, who have to buy food, pay rent, and sometimes lack medical coverage.

"Make government smaller and lower taxes. President Clinton presided over a major downsizing of the federal government in the '90s that reduced total payroll by 5 percent. That savings helped fund a 20 percent boost in real federal wages. In Hawai'i by contrast, the state payroll ballooned over 25 percent, leaving no funds to increase state wages after inflation. Let's instead reduce the state payroll and raise wages for those who remain. We can do so without firing anyone. Leave 45 percent of vacancies vacant in a single year, fill the other vacancies, and pay for real tax cuts. And invest in new technology that helps a smaller workforce work smarter.

"Smaller government allows working people to keep more. Eliminating the excise tax on food, medical services, and rent provides a family of four \$600 a year to spend on real needs. And, as the Governor said, tax reductions stimulate economic activity.

"Third, Republicans seek to change Hawai'i's relationship to the outside world. Hawai'i has traditionally given up natural resources to attract income, whether cutting down sandalwood, importing environment-destroying hoofed animals, changing the landscape to export sugar and pineapple, or giving up beaches, reefs, and sea life in pursuit of tourism.

"We would like to help Hawai'i compete globally and effectively for needed investment. To do so, we should move from exploiting Hawai'i's natural resources to investing in Hawai'i's people. Government can help with education, then, as the Speaker said, get out of the way. Get out of the way of clean, knowledge-based industry. Look at what works elsewhere, from Silicon Valley to Boston. Look at overseas successes from Hong Kong to Ireland. Business/government/community cooperation works best. Wealth creation comes from community-wide cooperation led by the private sector. Government supports, but the private sector leads.

"We are government. We can change. We should support, not lead. Support with better education and smaller government creating healthier, more prosperous families. Provide environmental protection. And put a healthy local, private sector in the lead. Make these changes and Hawai'i will change, for the benefit of us all. Mahalo!"

The Chair then recognized Representative M. Oshiro, the Majority Leader, who rose and responded:

"Mr. Speaker, as your remarks emphasized today that this Session will be about working people and families. Your Democratic Caucus understands that.

"Before I begin Mr. Speaker, I would like to make one brief remark. The values we believe in – the participatory principles of democracy, of justice, of equal opportunity – those values are timeless and are equally important today as they were 50 years ago.

"We recognize the devastating impact that substance abuse has on our families and communities and we will increase treatment and prevention programs.

"Mr. Speaker, your Majority Democrats will support a privately built and operated prison in Hawai`i.

"We will also implement campaign finance and election reform. We will continue to create a more efficient and responsive government workforce through further civil service reforms.

"To the Hawaiians, and the Hawaiians at heart, we shall support the efforts of Native Hawaiians by opposing attempts to eliminate existing Native Hawaiian entitlements.

"Mr. Speaker, these are just some of the items we will be addressing this year to fulfill the mission outlined by your Democratic Majority, for Hawai'i. And our vision is simple: We see a Hawai'i that provides our people with the ability to fulfill their dreams, pursue their hopes, and achieve their ambitions. "Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to this resolution and have some brief remarks.

"Mr. Speaker, I apologize to our guests, for the first day of the legislature is traditionally a time of celebration and optimism. But it is also the day on which we cast one of, if not the most important votes of the entire legislature and that is on this organization resolution.

"Organization is how we, as a legislative body, decide we will do our work; who will serve on what committees; to which individual members we will delegate the responsibility to recommend and to act for us all. Organization has as much to do with the success or failure of a legislative session as any other single factor.

"I must conclude that this organization, as proposed in this resolution, is not equipped to truly do the people's work. It is difficult, frankly, to vote against the entire organization and against this resolution as a whole, for there are many bright spots where we have, in fact, delegated the responsibility for assisting us in accomplishing the public's goals to what I think, are the right members.

"But in too many key areas, whether committee chairships or memberships or leadership positions, we have assigned members who, because of philosophical beliefs or individual capabilities, are not willing or able to accomplish what our bosses, the people of Hawai'i, demand. I fear, and believe, that the sum total of this organization may be a legislative product which, rather than producing desperately-needed change for working families, for businesses, for children or

for any of us in Hawai'i, will simply maintain the status quo and I cannot support the means to that result.

"Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 4 was adopted with Representative Case voting no.

#### INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

The following resolution was read by the Clerk and was disposed of as follows:

At 12:52 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:56 o'clock p.m.

The Chair recognized Representative Whalen who stated:

"I apologize for interrupting, but the let me explain my point of inquiry. I understand the discussion, but for the record, that discussion was not a part of. It is my understanding that there is no rule or procedure we are following that allows us to take up this matter even if it is not on the Order of the Day, other than it be customary that we do so at this time. Is this correct?"

The Chair responded to Representative Whalen, stating:

"This is correct."

The Chair then recognized Representative Whalen, and stated:

"Representative Whalen, this is your second time getting up to speak on this measure."

Representative Whalen rose and stated:

"No Mr. Speaker, the other time was for a point of inquiry. This time I am rising in opposition to the measure.

"According to Article 3, Section 12, Paragraph 3 of our State Constitution every meeting of a committee requires a public hearing where there is a decision made.

"That is our Constitution. I was pointed to the Constitution as to why we can pick up this resolution today without it being on the Order of the Day because the Constitution requires us to organize and set rules.

"That very same Constitution that was referred to as controlling authority says that we need a public hearing before a committee can make a decision. In this particular case Representatives, Vice Speaker, Majority Leader and Minority Leader sat on an advisory committee or a rules committee or whatever kind of committee you want to describe it as, but they came to a conclusion to what the revisions to our rules would be made and which ones we would be adopting.

"That decision is being handed to us today in resolution number six and the rules are attached to it too. The public had no opportunity for input, and in fact, the members of the House as individuals had no opportunity for input and therefore it is my belief, based on our Constitution, that adopting the resolution at this time is in violation and we should defer this matter to give an opportunity for a public hearing for the public to give its input, if there is any, on the rules of the House.

"Now before some members jump up and down and say this is just internal organization, there is a substantive amendment that the Republicans and some members of the majority would like to see regarding the way the House is organizing the way they decide financial matters and whether subject matter committees would actually have the control over how the money is being spent in their subject matter committees."

The Chair interjected, stating:

"Representative Whalen, the amendment is not before us."

Representative Whalen rose and continued, stating:

"I understand it, Mr. Speaker but I am discussing why it is important for the public. This resolution is not a matter of which forms we fill out and whom we go to see to get paper for our copy machines..."

At this point, Representative Lee rose on a point of order and said:

"The speaker is diverging from his initial discussion."

The Chair responded:

"The motion this afternoon is on H.R. No. 6, and H.R. No. 6 does entertain the question of the finances. I will allow Representative Whalen to finish his comments but remember there is no amendment dealing with the proposed, which you are addressing.

"I would also like to share with the members of this House, and I apologize on behalf of the Minority Leader, but the Majority Leader did circulate to the Majority Members of this House a memo asking them for their input on any House Rule changes."

Asked by the Chair to "please proceed", Representative Whalen continued, saying:

"That being the case I can't argue with what the Majority had in front of it. However, a committee with an opportunity to receive testimony, to be present in its decision making process, having the votes on the record in front of the public, is very much different than a meeting between three people bringing forward the concerns that their various caucuses might have.

"I will slow down a little bit in my flow of logic so that we can all follow along. The reason why I brought up the Finance situation is that it directly affects the public it is not..."

At this time Representative M. Oshiro rose on a point of order, and said:

"Again the current speaker is not speaking to the issue at hand. The motion is on the adoption of the rules not on any proposed amendment."

The Chair responded, stating:

"Representative Whalen, I believe the Majority Leader is correct and there shouldn't be any reference to the proposed amendment which the Minority Leader had agreed with the Vice Speaker and Majority Leader to withdraw."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker what the Representative from the Big Island is trying to explain is a "for example". If their had been a public hearing, "for example", the testifiers may have wanted the rules to reflect more power with the committee chairs to have control over the destiny of the finances and finance requests for their subject matter committees.

"He is using that as an example. We are not talking about any proposed amendment. This is a very valid point and I think it needs to be aired here. The public was shut out. The public may have wanted to come in to say wait a minute the committee rules or the rules of the House of Representatives should give more authority to the committee chairs."

Representative M. Oshiro rose on a point of order, and said:

"We are getting way beyond explanations here and we are getting into argument."

Asked by the Chair to "please proceed", Representative Thielen continued, saying:

"I would like to allow my colleague from the Big Island to continue with his "for example". He is not talking about

a proposed amendment. He is saying that by shutting out the public we have actually shut out an ability of the public to, for example, say we want committee chairs to have more control over the finances of their committees and not just put in a suggestion to finance but put in a statement saying this is the money we want to go toward environmental protection, to go toward education, etc., and unfortunately the public was not given that opportunity and that is what my colleague is trying to say. Thank you."

The Chair recognized Representative Whalen and he continued, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. That was very well spoken. That is the point I am trying to make and maybe if some of the members were listening instead of looking for reason to jump up they would follow the logic, because I specifically started off that statement that this is not merely internal matters such as how to get paper for the copy machine or another box of pens for the office when you run out. However, this directly affects how the public testifies, how the bills are being passed and the ability for the public to give their input in a timely manner in regards to the statutes that will be enacted that affects them.

"So it's a matter that directly comes under Article 3, Section 12 that requires a committee to give a public hearing to any matter where they will be making a decision. Whether or not the caucus members had an opportunity to speak to their members on the committee and make suggestions or not is not the issue. The issue is that the Constitution requires a public hearing and this resolution never received a public hearing.

"Now as a matter of timetables and what's difficult for us not an issue. We had the same circumstances with the conference committees. For years it was decried..."

Representative M. Oshiro rose on a point of order and said:

"Now the speaker is getting off the example and getting into argument and another area. He should keep focused upon his example. I think the point is well made and most members understand the point. Thank you."

Representative Whalen continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, it's one thing for the Majority Leader to have a legitimate point but to merely jump up everytime I score a zinger that he has no response to..."

The Chair interjected: "Representative Whalen, let's not get personal and address the resolution before you. I am allowing you to continue on the debate."

Representative Whalen continued, stating:

"Well regarding the point of order, in response to that, I thought that was this is about, to be persuasive, in which case you use examples and argument to persuade your colleagues. So of course, you will say things that are persuasive. I am not merely reading a definition out of a book. I am trying to persuade the colleagues and you, Mr. Speaker, on what that proper course of action is

"Getting back to that. We just recently went through this same debate regarding conference committees. It was argued that it would be too onerous to make the change. However, with the guidance and with analysis of our Constitution it was decided that it was required. Therefore, we did it because it was required. Under the same thing, whether we adopt the rules today, or we put it off until tomorrow so that we can have a public

hearing on it, it may make things difficult for one day by not having rules if you can say such. However, the Constitution requires it and we are required by our oath that we took yesterday to uphold the State Constitution and a vote for this at this time is a vote in violation of our Constitution and that is what we swore to uphold and protect.

"So whether it is inconvenient for us or whether it takes another day that we have to deal with this, so be it. We need to do what we promised to do.

"One last point, the argument that there are not rules at this point, runs counter to the discussion we had over at the table there. That by tradition and habit the prior sessions rules more or less remain in effect until we adopt the new ones. Therefore, we still have basic rules. If we had no rules there would be no points of order every three sentences I speak. Because there are rules, they are jumping up. Therefore, we have rules. We merely should put this off to have the public hearing which the Constitution requires so that the public can say how they would like us to address the matters that come before us. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Luke rose in support of the measure, stating:

"I respect the comments of the colleague from the Big Island, but I disagree that it is a substantive matter and I believe that this is an internal House matter. The Constitution provides that the rules of the House, the officers of the House and certain items must addressed as soon as the House opens and that's what we are doing at this moment.

"The reason why it wasn't on the Order of the Day is because the members and the public have received notice of the House passing the rules of the House, per stated in the Constitution, this is, as I said an internal process that is similar to us organizing the House. It also allows us to form the committee structures and members. Would we allow a public hearing process for those procedures? Would we have a public hearing on the selection of the Minority Leaders and the membership of the committees? Right now, we do not because it is directly an internal matter and we need to put this to rest and get on with our business so that we can continue on our substantive matters and the order of the day. Thank you."

Representative Fox rose in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Briefly speaking on the substance of the resolution. There are two serious concerns that we have, both of which have been highlighted in previous speeches.

"One is the fact there is no public hearing and we could amend the rules simply to require a public hearing the next time the rules are put into effect. We are not proposing an amendment today but that would have been a good change.

"The other is to change the arrangement between finance and the subject matter committees. This is a subject of some real significance that certainly would warrant the kind of discussion that takes place in a public hearing.

"So we have those concerns and I am sharing those concerns with you. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Rath rose in opposition to the measure, stating:

"For like reasons as my colleague from Kona I am in opposition to this measure.

"I would like to point to out that we could simply waive the 48 hour notice and have an almost immediate hearing and this could be on the agenda as early as tomorrow. This would facilitate everybody and would only be less than a days delay would be a good idea. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee rose in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker I would just like to say that there is not hearing requirement and that would only delay further the work of this Legislature.

"I think it is unfortunate that by the actions today we are actually delaying the work of the legislature. However, I would like to briefly speak in favor of the resolution.

"Not only is there no requirement for a public hearing and we're not shutting out the public but this requirement is to allow the members to gather information from the public. This is a matter for the House to be able to organize and by today's actions, we are letting the public know that we will organize and we are ready to continue with the people's work.

"This committee is also an advisory committee it is not a committee that the public actually really knows about and has input into and this is a precedent that has been set in the past. So I stand in strong support of the resolution."

Representative Meyer rose in opposition to the measure, stating:

"As my colleague from Kona brought out, we can carry on with our business under the rules that we adopted the last session. The nature of the rules take more time than many other issues and having just three people with only one representative from the minority side, I don't think there is adequate time and I think the comment that the Representative from Kona made about how we did change rules on the conference committee and how we do that business is a very good example that we can serve the public better if we take more time and consider improvements in the rules. For those reasons, I will be voting no on this resolution. Thank you."

Representative Halford rose in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I believe that it's been clearly pointed out that constitutionally there is a requirement for a public hearing. I agree with that perspective and I will be voting no. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 6 was adopted with Representatives Halford, Meyer, Rath and Whalen voting no and Representatives Bukoski, Chang, Marumoto, Pendleton and Souki being excused.

# ADJOURNMENT

At 1:13 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Lee, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned until 12:00 o'clock noon tomorrow, Friday, January 19, 2001. (Representatives Bukoski, Chang, Marumoto, Pendleton and Souki were excused.)

#### ANNOUNCEMENT

Representative Gomes: "Mr. Speaker, I just wanted to recognize a particular individual. Unfortunately the other day we had a prison break from the OCCC, and evidently the person who escaped is still out there and we are still trying to apprehend him. But I caught a bit of the news that day of the prison break and I was able to hear the former warden of the Oahu Community Correctional Center, Mr. Nolan Espinda. During his interview he fully accepted responsibility for what had occurred and recognized that some procedure or another had broken down and that they were going to address it. Mr. Speaker, I just want to commend him for his candor and for his forthrightness with the public and I think it was a breath of fresh air. This is the type of candor we do not often see from our state leaders and our elected officials; I appreciated it, and I believe it is reflective of the Department itself and our Committee here on Public Safety. But at any rate, I just wanted to commend Mr. Espinda for his candor and I hope that we can stay true to that kind of candor ourselves as legislators. Thank you very much."

At 9:50 o'clock a.m., the House of Representatives stood in recess, subject to the call of the Chair, to meet in Joint Session with the Senate, in accordance with House Concurrent Resolution No. 1, to receive the Governor's State of the State address.

#### JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the House of Representatives and the Senate of the Twenty-First Legislature was called to order at 10:00 o'clock a.m., by the Honorable Calvin Say, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

The Speaker then welcomed and introduced the following distinguished guests to the members of the Twenty-First Legislature:

First Lady Mrs. Vicky Cayetano. She was presented a lei by Senator Taniguchi;

The Honorable Mazie Hirono, Lt. Governor of the State of Hawaii, and Mr. Leighton Oshima. They were presented leis by Representative Schatz and Senator Chun Oakland, respectively;

The Honorable Ronald T.Y. Moon, Chief Justice of the State Supreme Court. He was presented a lei by Representative Morita;

The Honorable Neil Abercrombie, U.S. Congressman;

The Honorable James Kimo Apana, Mayor of the County of Maui;

The Honorable Jeremy Harris, Mayor of the City and County of Honolulu;

Ms. Haunani Apoliona, Chair, Office of Hawaiian Affairs;

Commander Joseph J. McClelland, Jr, Admiral, United States Coast Guard;

Ms. Sheila Watumull, Dean, Consul Corps of Hawaii;

Mr. Rolando Gregorio, Consul General of Phillipines;

Mr. Jiadoo Lee, Consul General of Korea:

Mr. Hans Strasser, Honorary Consul General of Austria; and

Mr. Benny Agbayani, New York Mets team member.

The Speaker appointed Representatives Luke, M. Oshiro and Fox, and Senators Hanabusa, Kawamoto and Slom to escort the Honorable Benjamin J. Cayetano, Governor of the State of Hawaii, to the rostrum.

Representative Kawakami and Senator Inouye presented Governor Cayetano with floral leis on behalf of the House of Representatives and Senate.

The Speaker then presented to the members of the Twenty-First Legislature and audience, the Honorable Benjamin J. Cayetano, stating:

"Members of the Twenty-First Legislature, ladies and gentlemen, please join me in extending our warmest aloha and welcome to the Governor of the State of Hawaii, The Honorable Benjamin J. Cayetano."

The Governor addressed the Joint Session as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, members of the Senate and House, Mayors Apana and Harris, Council Chairs, members of the Consular Corps, members of our military, distinguished guests, and my fellow citizens.

"This morning it is my privilege to make my seventh address on the State of the State.

"I thank the people of Hawaii for giving me the honor of leading our beloved Hawaii into the next century.

"I thank my wife, Vicky, our children, our families, friends, my cabinet members and supporters, who helped make this day possible.

"I congratulate all of you who were recently successful in your elections. For those for whom this is the very first time, our people have given you a privilege, a great honor, an experience given to only a lucky few.

"By all accounts, the year 2000 was a great year for our State. There were great stories of individual successes: Angela Baraquio crowned Miss America; Leslie Lam Mrs. America; Brian Viloria representing Hawaii in the Olympics.

"One of the most notable was Benny Agbayani. Mr. Speaker, you stole my thunder by introducing him earlier. But

he deserves a second introduction because we all know, Benny overcame adversity early in the season and he went on to win a starting role with the New York Mets, and he was instrumental in getting the Mets into the World Series. He inspired us, he inspired me, and he made Hawaii proud.

"He is with us this morning and I want to introduce him again. Ladies and Gentlemen, members of the Legislature, join me in honoring Hawaii's "Come Back Kid", Benny Agbayani. "Thank you, Benny.

"I was also pleasantly surprised this morning because I saw four of my former cabinet members here, and with your indulgence, I'd like to introduce them.

Larry Miike, former Director of the Department of Health;

Lorraine Akiba, former Director of the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations;

Tim Johns, former Director of the Department of Land and Natural Resources, who did a wonderful job under difficult circumstances: and

I am honored that she came, Ladies and Gentlemen, Margery Bronster, former Attorney General of the State of Hawaii.

"Out of respect for the limits of your endurance for long speeches, and State of the States are usually long, I have prepared a booklet that gives more details of my agenda for the next two years. This will be made available to you after my speech.

"Last year, was a great year for our State.

"The State government finished the year in sound fiscal condition. State bond ratings were upgraded and we were given high marks by national organizations for our fiscal practices.

"The State's economy, which started to recover in late 1998 through 1999, is now expanding. And the signs of positive economic growth are convincing.

"In 1995, our unemployment rate was 5.9 percent. Today, it is down to 3.7 percent -- the lowest since 1992 and well below the national average of 4 percent.

"In 2000, the Real Gross State Product increased by 3 percent -- the strongest growth in a decade. And this year, personal income will show a 5 percent growth -- the largest increase since 1992.

"For 2001, we expect a 2 percent growth in jobs or 10,000 new jobs -- the fastest growth rate since 1991.

"Tourism is up. Private construction is up. Auto sales continued at record levels for the second consecutive year. Real estate sales are up. Consumer confidence is up.

"Hawaii's economy is back, expanding, stronger, and more diverse than ever in the past decade.

"Our challenge is to keep the momentum going, to develop a strong, sustainable, and diverse economy. And to do it without destroying our beautiful environment and compromising our core values.

"The importance of a strong economy cannot be overstated. The past eight years of economic stagnation has taught us that a weak economy impairs the State's ability to provide services to the poor, the needy, and the disabled.

"That is the reality and simple truth.

"The current slowdown in the U.S. economy, the lingering recession in Japan, the rise of oil prices make it imperative that we continue to restructure our economy, reform our State government, and invest in our economic future.

"Some of our past investments are paying off.

"Tourism had a record year last year, and this year might be even better.

"One reason is our three-year-old, state-of-the-art, \$300 million Hawaii Convention Center, one of the most beautiful in the world, which is already drawing repeat conventions.

"Another is the \$60 million we give the Hawaii Tourism Authority to market Hawaii each year.

"Last year, nearly 7 million tourists visited Hawaii and spent nearly 10 percent more than in 1999, reversing a threeyear decline in expenditures.

"This year, we will focus on expanding our cruise line industry.

"In 1998, the total impact of the cruise industry in Hawaii was about \$304 million. In four years, we expect it to skyrocket to 1.4 billion dollars!

"Cruise lines are a very important part of Hawaii's tourist industry, especially for places such as Hilo and Kauai, which have not shared fully in our economic expansion.

"Therefore, I will submit a request for funding to improve docking and pier facilities with priority for Hilo and Nawiliwili harbors.

"I am pleased to report that our efforts to position Hawaii as an

international meeting place -- a "Geneva of the Pacific" -- is making great progress.

"The Pacific Basin Economic Council meeting last year was such a big success that the group made up of 1,100 corporations from more than 20 countries will return in 2002, 2003, and 2004.

"Getting PBEC was a homerun. But this year, Hawaii will score again when we host the prestigious Asian Development Bank meeting in May.

"Finance ministers from 60 member nations, CEOs and presidents from the world's top banks and financial institutions, along with hundreds of foreign and American news people, will be here.

"And because it is ADB's custom for the President of the host country to address its members, we may even see President Bush here in May.

"These international meetings go a long way towards convincing people that Hawaii is a good place to do serious business. But we need to do more.

"For more than 50 years, our tourist industry has successfully marketed Hawaii as a place of leisure – of fun, sun and surf. As a result, Hawaii has been repeatedly ranked as one of the world's top tourist destinations.

"To sell Hawaii as a good place to do business, we need to change our marketing strategy.

"Therefore, I will submit legislation for your consideration to require the HTA to use one-third of its marketing fund to promote Hawaii as a business destination. "The challenge to maintain and improve Hawaii's standing as a world-class tourist destination never ends. We must keep an eye on our competition and make the changes necessary to keep our competitive edge.

"Survey after survey on Hawaii tourism reach the same conclusion: To compete, to meet the challenges of global competition, Hawaii must provide a greater diversity of exciting and interesting experiences for our visitors.

"In response, we have included in our budget request appropriations to develop more diverse experiences and to improve Hawaii's parks, marine and wilderness areas.

"For Waikiki, I have requested funding to build our proposed new Visitor Center at the old Canon Club at Diamond Head, and to evaluate the feasibility of an urban park at the site of the Ala Wai Golf Course.

"And we have developed a vision for Kakaako.

"Kakaako is the last large parcel of undeveloped stateowned land in urban Honolulu. Its central location is perfect for a development that will serve residents and visitors alike.

"The State has been trying to develop Kakaako for more than 30 years. We've poured hundreds of millions of dollars into building infrastructure mostly on the mauka side of Ala Moana Boulevard.

"The State made huge investments in Kakaako and private land values have gone up, but little in the way of development has happened.

"When I took office in 1994, we decided to focus on developing state-owned land, mostly on the makai side of Kakaako.

"We see Kakaako Makai as a gathering place for residents and visitors alike, a place to work, to play, to teach and to do research.

"We propose that the state invest in developing a complex of attractions designed to highlight Hawaii's historical and cultural history and its science and technological achievements.

"First, we propose a world-class aquarium. Second, a science and technology center. Both will compliment the existing Children's Discovery Center, and the UH Pacific Biomedical Research Center, located out there on the point.

"We believe that our proposed aquarium will be to Hawaii what Baltimore's famous National Aquarium has been to Baltimore. Back in the 1970s, Baltimore's political leaders had the vision and courage to boldly step forward and give their city the icon it needed.

"Today, the aquarium is Baltimore's top attraction, generating nearly \$200 million in revenue each year. It's educational partnerships and programs service more than 200,000 children annually.

"The second part of the complex is a proposed science and technology center, which will showcase Hawaii's strengths in astronomy, ocean marine sciences, biotechnology and volcanology.

"A few weeks ago, we took a big step forward in making this project a reality when the Bishop Museum Board decided to relocate their proposed Science and Technology Center to Kakaako.

"This is a win for Bishop Museum, which you designated last year as a state museum, because Kakaako is a far superior

site for their science center than Kalihi. And it is a win for the State because the Bishop Museum's plan fits perfectly in our vision for Kakaako Makai.

"In each case, the State is working in partnership with the private sector. On the proposed aquarium, a private 501-C nonprofit foundation was formed. The task force, headed by Walter Dods of First Hawaiian Bank, is comprised of leaders from the University, business, labor and the community reflecting all groups, political and social.

"The task force has pledged to raise \$20 million in private funds to augment the State's investment of \$50 million -- \$20 million of which will be revenue bonds.

"The fact that a group of respected private citizens are prepared to raise \$20 million for the aquarium is remarkable. I know of no other state project for which such a large commitment was ever made.

"Whether it is civil service reform, economic development, or education, the people of our State expect and deserve bold action from their political leaders. But nothing big will ever be done by people who think small.

"I believe we have an opportunity to do something bold, something which will redefine the character of our waterfront. And after emerging from eight years of economic stagnation, I think the time is right.

"If we work in partnership with the private sector, with business, labor and the community, I believe Kakaako can become, as one of our daily newspapers put it, a "grand statement, a masterpiece of design that will instantly become a worldwide symbol of Honolulu's rebirth."

"Our greatest asset in marketing Hawaii to the world is our breathtaking natural environment.

"Limited resources cannot support unlimited growth. And economic growth should never come at the expense of our natural environment.

"With your approval, I propose a long-range study of our State's carrying capacity to help evaluate our State's ability to endure growth.

"I have asked Dr. Seiji Naya of DBEDT to head this project. We will look at whether the State's infrastructure and our natural resources can survive such growth without being damaged.

"The results of this analysis will be used to create a strategic plan to make sure we balance our economic interests in maintaining tourism with our duty to protect our natural environment.

"For years, our State parks have served our needs. They have been a haven for our people to take a break from their busy lives to enjoy the outdoors.

"Well, our parks system because of the economic downturn over the past few years, needs our attention now. We must repair worn facilities, upgrade older ones, and otherwise beautify these parks.

"I propose spending \$22 million in capital improvements to repair and maintain our State parks.

"For the long-term care of our parks, I am proposing that half the money from the hotel room tax that does not go for marketing be used to improve and protect our State parks system.

"Every day, I am thankful that I live in the most beautiful place on earth. Over the years, so much of it has changed. Where there were once overgrown kiawe trees, now there are hotels, and where there were cane fields, now there are homes and businesses

"But there are still a few places left in Hawaii where native plants grow wild and undisturbed. The State has been slowly acquiring some of the most treasured pieces so that we can keep these wild places wild.

"We acquired the historic compound south of Kona that once served as the residence of a chiefess of Hawaii.

"On Maui, we got the famous - or infamous - road to Hana designated as one of the nation's "Millennium Legacy Trails."

"With your help we bought the spectacular Ka lwi Coastline here on Oahu.

"On Kauai, we have ended a 20-year controversy by banning commercial motorized boating on the beautiful Hanalei River.

"And just this month, we acquired beautiful Lumahai Beach, made famous in the movie "South Pacific." And we will do more.

"In my first State of the State address six years ago, I shared with you my belief that Hawaii's potential for economic diversification was promising in three areas: High technology, healthcare and biotechnology.

"There were some skeptics who thought Hawaii had no chance for success in developing a high technology industry.

"Well, they were wrong. The number of high technology companies in Hawaii has nearly tripled in just five years.

"The passage of Act 178 in 1999 and Act 297 last year gives Hawaii's high technology companies some of the best incentives in the nation.

"This session we will propose additional changes to these laws to give greater incentives, which will make Hawaii more attractive to high tech businesses.

"We have already attracted a number of impressive high tech companies, and I am pleased that they have recruited many of Hawaii's best and brightest to return home.

"Last Wednesday, a speaker lamented the brain drain of Hawaii's best and brightest to the Mainland. Many were forced to leave Hawaii because of the lack of opportunities. Well, we are bringing them home.

"We invited a few of them to be here this morning, but when word got around a whole bunch showed up. They come from about a dozen of Hawaii's high tech companies. They came home because they found good paying, challenging high tech jobs, and because they love Hawaii.

"They are an energetic and dynamic group. They've organized and will help spread the word to other Hawaii residents on the mainland about the opportunities in Hawaii's growing high tech industry.

"Mark my words, I believe these young professionals and entrepreneurs, Hawaii's best and brightest, will be a vibrant and dynamic force in building Hawaii's high tech industry.

"Members of the Legislature, please join me in welcoming home Hawaii's best and brightest.

"Nothing is more important than the education of our children.

"That's why we spared the Department of Education's budget, while cutting every other department.

"Over the past six years, we made education our highest priority. We increased teacher salaries, extended the school year by seven days, and built a record number of new schools and classrooms.

"This year, I ask you to approve my request for \$290 million for school capital improvements -- \$90 million for the construction of new schools and classrooms, \$100 million for repair and maintenance, and an additional \$100 million to renovate our older schools and bring them up to par with the new schools. In all, it totals \$290 million or 29 percent of our proposed \$1 billion capital improvement request.

"And Mr. President, if you would like to add another \$100 million to the total, we will support you."

"In addition, I propose spending \$21 million to buy 18,000 new computers for our public schools. This will bring down the ratio of students to computers from 6:1 to 4:1.

"Hawaii's children must learn to use this technology because it will open doors of learning and knowledge ordinarily not available to them. It will help teach them the skills of critical thinking. It will allow them to learn from student counterparts around the world. And it will help them discover and experience the exciting world of the Internet. Please support our request for these computers.

"And when our students are given the proper tools they can compete against anyone. Members of the Legislature, I would like to introduce to you a group of students from Kapolei Elementary School who will make all of us proud of our public schools.

"These six children competed in a national computer competition called Think Quest Junior. They walked off with the top simulation award in the nation with their interactive site entitled, "Values: Making Choices for Life". That's a quote I used last year in my State of the State.

"They are here in the gallery today with the Kapolei Elementary School technology coordinator Michael O'Connor. Mike, would you and the students please stand. How do you like that? They go head to head with the rest of the country and come out number one. Congratulations. Thank you, Mike, and students.

"When I had the honor of serving as your Lieutenant Governor, we created the "A-Plus" after-school program. For nearly 12 years now, "A-Plus" has been providing quality after school care to elementary, latchkey children.

"More critical than "A-Plus," however, is the need for quality preschool care for three and four year olds. Learning has its greatest impact during a child's formative years. This is why preschool is so important to a child's development.

"When our Administration began in 1994, less than 1,000 of about 16,400 needy three- and four-year-old children in Hawaii had access to preschool.

"By working in partnerships with the Good Beginnings Alliance, Head Start and other private preschool providers like the Kamehameha Schools, the State successfully placed 8,400 of these children in a preschool program.

"We now propose a universal access preschool program for all needy children. No general funds are needed. Under the direction of Susan Chandler we have reallocated resources being used for other things. Instead, we will utilize federal, private, and other monies to give preschool access to the remaining 8,000 children by 2004.

"I consider this program, which we call "Pre-Plus," such a high priority that I have asked Lt. Governor Hirono to head it.

"I ask for your support in bringing universal preschool to all our needy children.

"The University of Hawaii is not just a place of higher learning; it is also a driving force for the economic development of this State.

"That is why I am proposing we support Dr. Cadman's vision for a brand new, world-class medical school in Kakaako Makai.

"The new medical school will be the foundation of Hawaii's healthcare and biotechnology industries. At \$141 million for the first phase, it will not come cheap. But it will help develop a biotechnology industry that has the potential to bring more than 50 million new dollars into the State each year. I ask you to support Dr. Cadman's vision. He is here today, unannounced Dr. Cadman, please stand.

"Last year, you supported my proposal to give an extra \$1 million to four specific schools: Engineering, international business, medicine and at the Community College, high technology training.

"I am pleased to report to you that these schools, headed by innovative and entrepreneurial Deans, have produced some outstanding results. The School of Business, for example, leveraged its \$1 million dollars by four times to expand its school of e-commerce.

"These disciplines are important to our efforts to develop a skilled workforce for high technology, healthcare and biotechnology industries.

"I ask you again to support our request for \$1 million each to the same programs. But, this year, I am also asking for an additional \$1 million boost for the University's Department of Information and Computer Sciences.

"Nothing is more important than access to education, whether it be a lower or higher. This has always been important to me. I am a person who had to go away just to get into a junior college in California. But California, at that time, had access for everyone. Today we have access.

"And I want to share with you my plan to give Hawaii's high school graduates greater access to higher education in the University of Hawaii system.

"I propose establishing a scholarship program, which would pay the full tuition of any public or private high school graduate with a "B" average who is admitted to a school in the University of Hawaii system.

"I propose that the \$175 million now sitting in the Hurricane Relief Fund be deposited into the State Rainy Day Fund, and that the interest earned on that combined deposit be put into a fund for scholarships fund called the Hawaii New Century Scholarship.

"This is not a new idea. It is patterned after Georgia's immensely popular "Hope Scholarship", which is supported by a state lottery. Hawaii can do the same things without a lottery. All we need is bold and innovative thinking. I ask for your support on this project.

"I am pleased to report that the purchase of the Hemmeter building was completed in December. The State Foundation on Culture and Arts will begin planning for the Foundation's new home

"The purchase makes real a vision developed more than 30 years ago. When Governor John Burns established the State Foundation, the concept was to create an art museum — an art museum without walls.

"But Governor Burns himself believed the State Foundation would need a permanent home. Governor Burns and Mayor Neal Blaisdell, the Republican Mayor of Honolulu at that time, put together a search committee to find that home. And they did.

"The committee recommended the old YMCA building. Isn't it amazing how we've come full circle because that building is the Hemmeter Building which we just bought in December. John Burn's vision is now a reality.

"Amazing, isn't it, what great things can be done when partisanship is set aside and political leaders work together.

"Last year, we set an agenda to modernize state government. While some progress was made, much remains to be done. Therefore, we will renew our efforts to reform civil service and restructure government.

"We will propose to revise the criteria used by fact-finding panels and arbitrators in making awards to require arbitrators to consider the state's fiscal condition, including healthcare costs.

"We will continue to follow a policy of only agreeing to collective bargaining agreements that increase the efficiency and productivity of government workers.

"We will propose legislation that will give the state the right to privatize and curb overtime abuse. These reforms are long overdue.

"We have seen them for the past six years of my administration. If you're not going to pass them, tell me in advance to we don't go through the trouble. But I want you this year to give it a shot. Let's make it happen. Let's reform civil service and let's restructure the State Government.

"During the past year, the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands continued its unprecedented pace of building homesteads and returning Hawaiians to the land.

"During this Administration, more homesteads will be completed than at any other time in the 80-year history of the program.

"And, by the end of our Administration, we will have secured the resources and completed the planning to allow the next Governor to match our eight-year production in just four years!

"In this coming year we will:

"Welcome kupuna into the first ever Hawaiian Homes Kupuna project, a partnership with OHA – and I want to thank Haunani Apoliona and OHA for that partnership. It's going to produce great results.

"Hand over keys to Hawaiian families entering the first ever rent-to-own project on Hawaiian Home Lands;

"Complete the first ever multi-family development project at Kalawahine on Oahu; and

"Break ground on the first-ever Hawaiian Home Lands community on Lanai.

"What a great job Ray Soon and the Hawaiian Homes Commissioners have done! I want to acknowledge Ray and the Department.

"Clouding the good work of the department, however, is the recently filed lawsuit Barrett vs. State of Hawaii challenging the constitutionality of OHA and the Department.

"It is a broadside attack on Hawaiian programs and on our Constitution.

"I believe that OHA, established under the State Constitution and approved by the people of this state, Hawaiian and Hawaiian at heart, and the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, established by Congress 80 years ago, will withstand this attack.

"And I pledge that I will use every authority vested in me as your Governor, every resource available to my Administration to successfully defend and protect the rights of native Hawaiians.

"I know there is legislation pending that proposes to merge OHA and the Department. At this time, I would urge caution. I think that under other conditions, this might be a good idea, but it places OHA and the Department at greater risk because each entity has different legal origins. I would ask that this bill be withdrawn because I will not support it.

"In recent years, I was forced to cut services to the most vulnerable among us. This, while we cut taxes to get the economy going again, paid for arbitrated pay raises, and spared the Department of Education from any budget cuts at all

"We tried to avoid cutting these social services. We left no stone unturned to find additional revenues. We raided special funds, implemented the payroll lag, froze hiring, eliminated positions, but in the end state programs for the poor, the needy, the disabled, the weakest among our citizens suffered.

"Well, now that the economy has rebounded, this Administration's highest priority is to restore and, where appropriate, expand social services.

"We've done much to improve the efficiency of the programs that provide people's most basic needs, such as food and shelter

"Our welfare reforms have received national recognition. Recently, the State received a \$5 million cash bonus from the federal government for being a national leader in welfare reform. We lead the nation in getting more people on welfare working again, earning more and getting off the welfare rolls.

"But we must do more.

"Since 1992, the homeless population has decreased by 40 percent. And we assisted in developing 4,500 affordable rental-housing units -- a record for any Administration.

"But the need is still there and we must and we will do more.

"One-third of all of our federally assisted public housing units are located in the neighborhood where l was born -- Kalihi-Palama. These units are old and in dire need of improvements.

"That's why I am proposing a \$10 million appropriation to supplement federal funding that will revitalize the Kuhio Park Terrace and Kuhio Homes.

"The people in our public housing programs deserve this, and I ask for your support!

"Caring for our disabled and elderly is a huge problem for many families.

"I, personally, have known the struggles of trying to care for an elderly, infirm, parent at home. I will request from you a modest \$2 million in funding to expand our Kupuna Care and Nursing Home Without Walls programs. I ask you to support this modest request to help our senior citizens.

"Last year, I asked you to increase the minimum wage. Our bill was bottled up in committee and died. There are many new people here this morning and I again will submit a new bill and ask you to support the minimum wage.

"I was heartened to hear the House Speaker last week support increasing the minimum wage. An increase will uplift the lives of more than 16,000 of Hawaii's workers. If we want more people to get off welfare and back into the workforce let's make sure they get paid a decent wage, and let's do it this year.

"Drug abuse is a problem that has devastated the lives of millions of people and their families. It is the major force that drives crime. It permeates society, affecting people from all walks of life, regardless of race, sex, age and social status.

"For decades, the federal, state and county governments have waged a "war against drugs," relying mainly on law enforcement and punishment to deter illegal drug use. And politicians have taken advantage of this situation.

"Last year, the voters in California stunned political experts by approving Proposition 36, which declares drug abuse a health problem and mandates treatment for first and second time non-violent drug offenders.

"Despite opposition by virtually all of the state's law enforcement community, most of the judges, and some health care groups, Proposition 36 was approved by 61 percent of the California voters.

"Proposition 36 signals a shift in philosophy that is beginning to sweep the nation. California, which has more than 200,000 inmates in state, county and local jails it is expected to save the State alone, more than \$200 million in incarceration costs and \$550 million in capital costs for new prison construction. California has built ten times the number of prisons than they have colleges.

"California has followed the lead of Arizona, which in 1996 approved a similar law. The latest studies indicate Arizona has achieved a 61 percent success rate.

"It's time for a shift in philosophy here in Hawaii. Therefore, I will submit legislation that will mandate treatment instead of punishment for non-violent, first-time offenders.

"To give the State time to take an inventory of available drug treatment programs and to establish "best practices" standards to assure high quality, effective treatment programs, I propose that the bill go into effect on July 1, 2002. Funding for the new program has been requested and included in our budget.

"This is a major departure from our current philosophy of treating drug offenders. I ask for your most thoughtful deliberation and support because I know this will be very controversial as you hear the bill.

"Over the next few months, you will be faced with making difficult decisions.

"I urge each and every one of you to remember that those to whom government has the greatest duty to serve -- the poor, needy, disabled -- those who cannot always provide for themselves.

"After 26 years in public office, I am familiar with having to make tough decisions. I have always let my conscience be my guide, regardless of the political consequences.

"Making sure this State prospers in the 21st Century, making sure the quality of life improves, and making sure that we take care of those in need of services will require strong leadership and cooperation from all of us. It is my hope that we can work together to do what is right for the people of Hawaii.

"The people of Hawaii deserve bold leadership. Let us give to them and guide our beloved Hawaii to even greater heights!

"Thank you very much. Aloha!"

Senator Bunda rose and stated:

"I am confident that we will do our best to work with you Governor. To make your dreams of a better Hawaii our dreams of a better Hawaii and to make your vision of the 21st Century the roadmap we use to find our way there.

"Some may propose different ways to get there but I have no doubt that we all agree on where we want to end up. A State that can boast a high quality of life for all of its residents. A State that will look back on your term of office as visionary yet practical as progressive yet compassionate and most of all a time of responsible leadership.

"If there is no further business I declare this Joint Session adjourned."

At 10:45 o'clock a.m., the President declared the Joint Session adjourned.

# JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Twenty-First Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2001, was called to order at 10:03 o'clock a.m., by the Honorable Robert Bunda, President of the Senate.

At this time, the Senate President welcomed and introduced the following honored and distinguished guests to the members of the Twenty-First Legislature:

Senate President Bunda then appointed Senators Kanno, Hanabusa, Chun and Slom and Representatives Hamakawa, M. Oshiro and Pendleton to escort the Honorable Ronald T.Y. Moon, Chief Justice of the Hawai'i Supreme Court, to the rostrum.

Senator Fukunaga and Representative Kawakami presented Chief Justice Moon with floral leis on behalf of the Senate and the House of Representatives, respectively.

Senate President Bunda then presented to the members of the Twenty-First Legislature and guests, the Honorable Ronald T.Y. Moon, Chief Justice of the Hawai'i Supreme Court, saying:

"Members of the Twenty-First Legislature, ladies and gentlemen, please join me in extending our warmest aloha and welcome to the Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court, the Honorable Ronald T.Y. Moon."

Chief Justice Moon addressed the Joint Session, as follows:

"Let me just initially thank President Bunda for introducing the members of my immediate family who are here. He neglected to mention one person who is part of the immediate family, I don't want him to throw a tantrum, but it is my brother Eric and his wife.

"Before I begin my formal remarks I would like to share a dream I had last night. I was here in this very place with all of you. Just as I was about to begin my speech an angel appeared and offered me a choice of infinite wealth, wisdom or beauty. Without hesitation, I selected infinite wisdom. 'Done,' said the angel, and disappeared in a cloud of smoke. Now all heads turned towards me and I looked like I was in a daze. After a lengthy pause, Pat Mau-Shimizu who sits right here in front of me, whispered, 'C.J., say something.' I then looked at all of you and with my new gift of infinite wisdom said, 'I should have taken the money.'

"Governor and Mrs. Cayetano, Vice Speaker Luke, President Bunda, other distinguished Legislators, Lieutenant Governor Hirono and Mr. Oshima, members of the federal and state Judiciaries, Korea's Counsel General Lee and other special guests, family, and friends:

"It is my privilege to have this opportunity to be here today to tell you about the work of the Hawai'i State Judiciary. We can all be proud of the efforts of our Judiciary employees and volunteers. I am pleased to have this opportunity to publicly thank each and every one of our Judiciary employees for their continuing commitment, dedication, and outstanding work on behalf of our third branch of government. And, to our more than 2,000 volunteers, we say "thank you" for unselfishly giving of your time and talents in helping to alleviate some of the load on our overburdened staff. All of our volunteers provide an invaluable service to the Judiciary, and I appreciate this opportunity to publicly recognize a very special one.

"Eighty-year-old Mike Maeda has contributed nearly 4,000 hours since he began volunteering with the courts and, currently, works three full days a week. Mr. Maeda is often called upon to help Judiciary offices, such as the Bar Examiners Office and the Family Court's legal research department and court management services branch. Judiciary employees who have been the grateful recipients of Mr. Maeda's services wholeheartedly agree that he is reliable, efficient, and accurate in his work. Not only is he willing to do any task assigned to him, he does so with a positive attitude, working diligently until the job is done. Needless to say, Mr. Maeda is an invaluable asset to the Judiciary and exemplifies the Aloha Spirit that makes our state so special. Ladies and gentlemen, would you please join me in recognizing Mr. Mike Maeda.

"As I present this my fifth State of the Judiciary Address to this distinguished body, I believe it is time for a change. Therefore, my address today will contain very few statistics. I will not refer to any of the Judiciary's budget requests, or to our legislative package. I do, however, want to spend a few minutes on a subject I have discussed in previous State of the Judiciary addresses because many of you are new legislators and because the number of legislators with legal backgrounds continues to decline. That subject, which remains a topic of paramount concern, is the role of the third branch of government and, in particular, the concept of judicial independence.

"Achieving a free and independent Judiciary was part of our national struggle for independence. As James Madison stated during the Constitutional Convention in 1787, 'If it be essential to the preservation of liberty that the Legislative, Executive, and Judiciary powers be separate, it is essential to a maintenance of the separation that they should be independent of each other.' In a constitutional democracy like ours, the Judiciary determines whether the actions undertaken by the legislative and executive branches of government conform to principles of law enunciated in our state and federal Courts take abstract ideals -- like equal constitutions. protection and due process -- and infuse them with life by resolving specific controversies that engage the deepest human passions and aspirations. In that process, the third branch of government is charged with the responsibility of defining the limits of governmental power and authority and protecting basic individual rights, such as freedom of expression, freedom of religion, the right to be heard before being deprived of liberty or property, and the right to an attorney.

"By fulfilling this role, courts defend minorities that might be overwhelmed by the numerical strength of the majority, or the economic power of the wealthiest sectors of society. We attempt to safeguard the frail and defenseless against those instances where misguided public passion tramples upon the rights of the less fortunate, or where the schemes of the unjust jeopardize the welfare of society as a whole. By adhering to a system of reasoned precedent, courts also provide order, stability, and predictability to the capricious and chaotic events of life. Stated somewhat differently, the Judiciary protects the individual from the excesses of society and protects society from the excesses of the individual. By regulating the equilibrium between these forces, courts preserve individual initiative and opportunity, foster the realization of human potential, and maintain social harmony and prosperity.

"Courts are, in this sense, the institution most accountable for the preservation and maintenance of our democratic The executive and legislative branches of heritage. government strive to be directly and immediately responsive to the popular electoral will. The judicial branch, on the other hand, is the guardian of the architecture of democracy itself. While courts generally give deference to rational enactments of the legislature, it is still the courts' duty to invalidate a statute that violates constitutional prohibitions. distinctive function in no way makes the judicial branch superior to the executive or legislative branches. Rather, it simply means that we have been assigned to perform a different role, with a different perspective. Courts must respect the unique responsibilities entrusted to the executive and legislative branches. We strive to do so in every decision we make and pledge to continue doing so. Likewise, if democracy is to work, the legislative and executive branches must respect the unique responsibilities entrusted to the judiciary. We ask that you continue to appreciate our need to sustain judicial independence, so that we may best fulfill the obligations of the judiciary's special mandate. With your understanding and assistance, I am certain that not only can we enhance the function of the Judiciary, but we can strive to renew the promise of democracy for our respective branches of government in order to serve our own generation and the generations to come.

"Because a strong, separate, and independent Judiciary requires adequate compensation for its judges, I want you to know how grateful I am -- how grateful we all are -- for the salary adjustment you made last year. Although it has made a tremendous positive difference, just one month ago, my friend and colleague, Kevin Chang -- one of our outstanding jurists -- left the state bench to work as a federal magistrate judge, earning approximately \$26,500 more annually than he did as a state judge. Judge Chang served with distinction, and, surely, the federal bench's gain is the state bench's loss. It is a loss we must work to minimize in the future. I, therefore, hope you will agree with me that the challenge now is to ensure that it is not another ten years before the next increase.

"But, let me be clear; we agree with the Judicial Salary Commission's recommendation that judicial pay raises not be requested in the upcoming fiscal biennium. However, we also agree with the Commission's conclusion that "the current process... is fundamentally flawed, and, therefore, should be changed as soon as possible." As some of you may know, the Judicial Salary Commission is securing a commitment from the Cades Foundation to commission an independent study to identify a more timely and objective mechanism for determining judicial salary adjustments. We sincerely hope you will support such reforms in the future.

"As I reflect on the state of the Hawai'i Judiciary, I find myself struggling with the notion that "perception is reality." Although I don't believe that perception is always reality, it is accepted by many as such. There are two particular perceptions I often hear voiced about the Judiciary that I believe are actually misperceptions. The first is that judiciaries, including Hawaii's, are insular institutions that operate in secret, and the second is that the judiciary has not changed the ways it resolves disputes in over a hundred years.

"I believe we have made great strides to combat the perception of secrecy and to, as they say, "let the sun shine in." Our Judicial Evaluation Program and Court Navigation Project certainly qualify as tangible examples of more openness and greater access.

"It is worthy to note that Hawai'i is one of only 13 states with a judicial evaluation program. All currently eligible fulltime trial judges have received evaluation results that provide valuable feedback to help them improve their performance, both in and out of the courtroom. In addition, evaluation results are provided to the Judicial Selection Commission and serves as a source of information for retention. But we did not stop there. To address concerns that the evaluation process was completely "in-house," this Fall we enlisted the assistance of former judges, retired practitioners, and community leaders to meet with individual judges to review the judge's evaluation results and provide suggestions for improvement. To our knowledge, we are the only judiciary in the country without retention-elections to have people from outside the Judiciary involved in the evaluation process in this manner. Also, starting this month, we implemented a pilot project to evaluate appellate judges and justices, becoming only the third state in the country with an appointment system to do so.

"Our Court Navigation Project also exemplifies our efforts to let the sun shine in on the courts. This past year, we began one of the most comprehensive court-based assistance programs in the nation. The capital improvement funds you appropriated two years ago, combined with a quarter of a million dollars in federal grants, was used to launch the Ho'okele Court Navigation Project on August 8, 2000. The growing number of litigants who represent themselves can now receive one-on-one assistance from customer service centers located in the entry ways of the Honolulu District and Circuit courthouses.

"The demand for Ho'okele services has far exceeded our expectations. Since opening five months ago, the project's three stations have helped over 20,000 court users on O'ahu, directing them to appropriate courts, offices or agencies as well as helping them to complete court forms and/or explain court procedures. Almost 100 of these court users have taken the time to fill out customer satisfaction survey forms; some even took the time to write directly to me. These surveys and letters represent a cross-section of our community -- such as, persons adopting children, individuals seeking a divorce, and small business owners trying to collect on a debt. They represent court users from all corners of the island -- from Hawaii Kai to Makaha, from Kailua to Ewa Beach.

"I am proud to tell you that every single one of these letters and surveys has been overwhelmingly positive, and we have been pleasantly surprised, not just by the volume, but also by the intensity of the public's reaction. We read again and again, "Outstanding customer service"; "I would not have been able to do it otherwise"; and "It made all the difference in the world." In one letter, a court user with a complex problem stated that the concerned and caring Ho'okele staff provided the best customer service experience she had ever had! Comments like these reinforce and re-energize our commitment to make the courts more accessible, to demystify the legal process, and to remove the perception that there is a veil of secrecy covering the courts.

"The second misperception pertains to the way the judiciary resolves disputes. I've heard the argument presented something like this: The horse and buggy have been replaced by cars and planes; the phonograph has been replaced by compact disc players; the surgical knife has been replaced by the laser; yet, courts still resolve disputes the same way it did a

century ago. I respectfully disagree and refer to the criminal justice context to illustrate why.

"People involved in the criminal justice system, both nationally and locally, have been advocating a more balanced approach to crime control that would redefine the system in very fundamental ways. Although the prosecution and punishment of offenders have an important place in crime control, there are limits to this traditional approach. I believe that an effective balance must be attained between traditional law enforcement and a problem-solving, restorative approach that rebuilds individual lives and communities. Rather than focusing solely on how much punishment is inflicted, restorative justice focuses on repairing and preventing the resulting harm by involving those affected, including victims, communities, and offenders. Judges and court officials must make a concerted effort to develop additional methods to integrate restorative justice into the Judiciary.

"To that end, I recently issued a Resolution reaffirming the Judiciary's commitment to restorative justice and the delivery of services in a balanced manner in accordance with governing law. The Resolution also reiterates the concept of Pono Kaulike, which is our own way of saying equal rights and justice for all. Restorative justice-type programs exist in the Hawai'i Judiciary, largely due to the legislature's support and commitment. A well-known example is the Hawai'i Drug Court program. The drug court model is both cost-effective and life-affirming. On O'ahu alone, the drug court program saves taxpayers between approximately \$600,000 and \$800,000 per year, which savings reflects, in part, the difference between what it costs to treat and rehabilitate offenders in the drug court program and what it would cost to incarcerate them. The program provides additional social and economic savings in the form of lower rates of recidivism (or re-incarceration). The life-affirming qualities of the program are evident in the number of drug court graduates who have successfully confronted their addiction-related issues, found jobs, returned to school, reunited their families, regained custody of their children, and re-entered their communities as productive, law-abiding citizens.

"Real-life stories of successful drug court graduates abound. One such story may be found in the life of Ms. Reyna Abordo. At the age of 24 and after years of addiction to "ice," Reyna was arrested for fraudulent use of a credit card, promoting a dangerous drug, theft in the first degree, and forgery. As a result of her convictions, Reyna's three children, then ages 4, 5, and 6, were removed from her care and taken into protective custody. Although initially resistant and apprehensive, Reyna entered the drug court program in 1996. During the two years in drug court, Reyna reported for drug treatment and counseling, resulting in significant changes in her behavioral attitudes.

"Today, Reyna has been drug-free for four and a half years, has been reunited with her three children, and is employed as a manager for Times Supermarket. She enjoys canoe paddling and doing volunteer work at her church, working with women addicted to drugs. She is currently focused on her college education, which she began during her participation in drug court. After completing her undergraduate work, she plans to pursue a Master's degree in social work.

"As a result of her hard work and commitment, and with the assistance of the drug court program, Reyna has overcome her addiction. She is a loving mother and provider for her children as well as a productive and respected member of her community. I would like to recognize Ms. Reyna Abordo, who is here today on behalf of the 165 drug court graduates who have successfully completed the program and who remain drug free. Reyna, we are extremely proud of you -- will you please stand.

"The Judiciary continues to commit significant resources to expanding and enhancing the drug court model throughout the state. The Maui Drug Court program was launched this past summer. A juvenile drug court on O'ahu will begin in March, and Drug Court programs for the Big Island and Kaua'i are in the planning stages.

"Clearly, drug courts represent one significant example of how the Judiciary, with support from the legislature, can offer restorative justice programs that address Hawaii's changing needs and accommodate a wider range of rehabilitative services.

"The judiciary's efforts in the area of jury reform represent another example of our commitment to being in the forefront of providing more effective ways to resolve disputes. In my address to you last year, I promised that I would update you on the results of our jury innovations pilot project. As many of you will recall, the project involved several innovations including allowing jurors to take notes and to suggest questions to be asked of witnesses, and informing jurors about the law applicable to the case before, rather than after, the attorneys' closing arguments. The goal of the pilot project was to gather experience and empirical data about the effect of these and other trial innovations on members of the jury, the attorneys, and the participating judges.

"I am pleased to report that the results are striking. Jurors reported being more engaged in the trial, more attentive to courtroom activities, and better able to recall points made by the attorneys. According to judges and attorneys, trials did not take significantly longer when jurors asked questions or took notes, and their workload did not increase. When asked if any of the innovations impacted negatively on the trial or the rights of a party, the overwhelming response was "No." Although other jurisdictions have studied or tested one or more of the jury innovations addressed by the Hawai'i pilot project, no other court has conducted as lengthy a pilot, or one involving as many innovations.

"As a result of our evaluation of the project, the Hawai'i Supreme Court, this past year, adopted amendments to several court rules relating to jury trial procedures that now allow all trial judges to utilize various jury innovations. Our commitment to improving juror satisfaction, comprehension, and recollection has drawn the positive notice of courts around the nation.

"It has been said, and I agree, that the Judiciary has a monopoly on how justice is dispensed and that this monopoly places us in a fiduciary relationship with the public. Nothing short of being on the front line of needed reform will satisfy that obligation. Our drug court programs, Ho'okele Court Navigation Project, and jury reforms are tangible manifestations of our deep commitment to continually reexamine the way we do business.

"Although the state of the Judiciary remains strong, I am concerned about the public's seeming disenchantment with government — and that includes the Judiciary. Disenchantment with the judiciary can be seen in our experience with jury service questionnaires, which help us determine if a citizen is qualified for jury service. Over the past several years, fewer and fewer citizens are returning juror qualification forms. This is of great concern to me, as it should be to anyone committed to a system of government "of, by, and for the people." Unfortunately, our experience with jury qualification questionnaires appears to reflect a larger sense of public disenchantment. Somehow, we must do

better job of engaging the public in the business of the courts because, if the public is to have trust and confidence in the courts, it must be engaged in the judicial process. Indeed, jury service provides every citizen an opportunity to become actively engaged. The rewards of such service can be profound. It is not uncommon for jurors to share with our judges that their experience as a juror was moving, educational, enlightening, and, even on occasion, life changing. Allow me to share an excerpt from a letter written by a juror to one of our judges. She states, 'I wanted to write you a personal note to thank you for making my recent experience as a juror a very positive one. Although I really didn't want to be chosen, after it was all over, I'm glad I had the opportunity to serve. I'm telling all my friends and family how enlightened and educated I was by the entire process." Based on my own personal experience as a trial judge and through feedback from other judges, I can tell you that many jurors -- even the most reluctant ones -- have expressed similar sentiments.

"Now I don't mean to leave you with the impression that all citizens resist jury service. In fact some are quite eager to serve. I'm told by one of our trial judges that during the selection of a jury in one of her cases, an attorney asked a perspective male juror, 'Sir, if you were picked for this jury, do you think you could follow the courts' instructions?' 'Yes I'm pretty sure I can,' replied the man. 'After all, I've been married for forty years'

"Ladies and gentlemen, and, in particular, members of the legislative and executive branches. I pledge to you that the Judiciary will continue to reach out by providing useful information to the public, sponsoring forums for meaningful learning opportunities about the courts, and leading discussions about court procedures and the laws under which we operate.

"It is important for the public to recognize and appreciate that reaching out is a two-way street, and we hope it will extend its hand in return. I encourage the public to examine our judicial system and let us know which programs and policies are working and which we might need to reform. I look forward to hearing from them and from you.

"On behalf of the 1,700 employees of the Hawai'i State Judiciary, I thank you for your support, your encouragement, and your passion for excellence. Working together, we can ensure that we continue to promote the effective, efficient, and fair administration of justice.

"Thank you for your attention."

Vice Speaker Luke, in closing, rose and stated:

"Thank you Chief Justice Ronald Moon. We are fortunate that the responsibility to uphold the law we have created in these chambers is in the capable hands of yourself and your fellow justices.

"It is gratifying to hear your vision and the plan of action that the Judiciary will follow. Your words remind us in these opening days of the legislative session that we must remain aware of the relationships that exist between the branches of our government.

"Although we have different responsibilities, the challenges that face the Judiciary are not separate from the challenges that face the Legislature or those that face the Executive Branch.

"Our ultimate goal is the same, to faithfully represent the interest of the people of Hawai'i.

"On behalf of Senate President Bunda and the members of the Senate and on behalf of House Speaker Calvin Say and the members of the House of Representatives, the Legislature appreciates your recommendations for positive change and stands ready to take action on these issues.

"I hereby declare this Joint Session of the Legislature to be adjourned."

At 10:37 o'clock a.m., Vice Speaker Luke declared the Joint Session adjourned.

# THIRD READING

S.B. No. 890, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Takamine moved that S.B. No. 890, SD 1, HD 1, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Kawakami.

Representative Djou rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, as we're debating our budget in consideration, there's a lot of pressure on Hawaii's State budget. I know our teachers want a raise, and a number of our public workers want a raise. With these pressures on the budget..."

Representative M. Oshiro rose to a point of order, stating:

"Is the current speaker speaking in support or opposition?"

Representative Djou stated that he was speaking in opposition to the measure, and the Chair then asked him to "please proceed."

Representative Djou continued: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. We should lead by example here within our own House. I don't believe that if we're trying to give raises to the public employees, and to our teachers here, we cannot also give ourselves raises. We should be leading by example to try to

maintain as small a budget as we possibly can. Furthermore..."

Representative Oshiro again rose to a point of order, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, there is no pay raise to ourselves in this bill before us."

Representative Djou responded: "I recognize that Mr. Speaker. What I was speaking to was increasing the size of our budget.

"Also, the Hawaii State government is, per capita, the largest state government in the nation. I believe we should try to do our best..."

Representative Lee rose to a point of order, stating:

"Excuse me, I believe that the speaker is diverging from his original point."

The Chair responded: "Representative Lee, I will allow Representative Djou to continue with his discussion as it is in regards to the budget.

"Representative Djou, please stay within the budget."

Representative Djou continued: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The point I'm trying to make is that Hawaii State government is too big. We, when we operate our own houses, should try to do it as efficiently as possible. That's what we're telling our departments to do and the State government to do. We should do it ourselves too. That's why I'm rising in opposition to this. Thank you."

Representative Moses rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Likewise, I think that we have to set the example in-house. I hope then, that we're sending a message to all the other bargaining units, that four percent might be big enough. But we haven't spelled that out yet. And I do think there are good items in this increased budget, such as relating to equipment and to the Felix Consent Decree. There are good items in there. But as far as the pay raise for staff, even though it's my own staff, I think that we should not be doing it at this time. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Jaffe rose to speak in opposition to the measure stating:

"Again, to echo what's been said before. I believe that we all ran on the notion of trimming the size of government; becoming more efficient with what we do. I think it sends a very bad message to everyone that the first thing we do is vote in a pay raise for our staff. Thank you."

Representative Takamine rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think that a good point has been made. As a legislative body, we should lead by example. And I think that in doing so, we cannot lose sight of the function of the important role that we play. Clearly, there is a four percent increase in the House portion of the Legislative budget. I think it's important for the members to understand that in the previous four years, we have led by example. We have had a zero percent increase over four years. And that's in keeping with the entire economic environment that the state of Hawaii was faced with. We are fortunate that the state of the economy is now improving. We need to be steadfast. We need to make sure that all the decisions that we make are in keeping with continuing that economic recovery.

"However, in losing ground in the past four years, I think some of our colleagues have even made reference to the point that being able to attract and retain good staff has become more difficult. As the economy has improved, as more jobs have been created, competition, certainly for those who have the highest qualifications, will mean other opportunities. I think at this point, given the economic recovery in process, with some of the signals that not only the economists have given, but even the Administration in its own budget, that this is a prudent approach and an attempt to address those concerns. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Gomes rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Just a couple of quick comments counter to the previous speaker's remarks. I do not think that Hawaii's economy is back. I do think we have to hold the line. Unfortunately, this measure was not referred to the Legislative Management Committee so I was unable to see the details and then, the specific rationale as to why we need a four percent increase at this time.

"Like the speaker from Makakilo, I do favor some of the initiatives, especially the monies that we need to look at the Felix issue in particular. But for those reasons, and also because I am just not convinced that we're using the money as efficiently as we should, and that's no slight to you Mr. Speaker, of the way things have gone.

"But again, I just haven't seen the details and so for those reasons, I'm going against the bill. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 890, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS TO PROVIDE FOR THE EXPENSES OF THE LEGISLATURE, THE LEGISLATIVE AUDITOR, THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU, AND THE OMBUDSMAN," passed Third Reading by a vote of 42 ayes to 6 noes, with Representatives Djou, Gomes, Jaffe, Meyer, Moses and Rath votting no and Representatives Chang, McDermott and Stonebraker being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 890, SD 1, HD 1, had passed Third Reading at 12:51 o'clock p.m.

Bailey Inspired Creativity in Teachers

CLIFTON Bailey should have, long ago, been recognized for the hero he has been in Hawaii education. As a brand new principal, he had the courage to embark on a new and untried school reform path even though it departed from the direction in which the Department of Education was moving.

For 12 years he continued on his way, with minimal support and acknowledgment, and without the formal up-the-line recognition due a successful reformer.

He had seen ills he could not abide and had the courage to confront them head on.

Bailey was named principal of Kapaa Elementary in February 1989, his first and only principalship. He was disturbed to find youngsters as young as 7 being slotted into tracks from which they could never escape.

He was saddened to see children still in elementary school being taught in high school fashion, with 50-minute classes and a different teacher for each subject. He was dismayed about the tight grade-level organization that interfered with fourth-grade teachers coordinating with third and fifth.

So he did something about it. When the chairman of the Senate Education Committee visited Kauai and publicly declared Kapaa to be too big, Bailey saw his opportunity. He realized that he could help Kapaa's 1,500 youngsters by dividing the mammoth campus into separate schools within schools.

He did so by giving teachers the opportunity to design and operate their own distinctive programs collaboratively.

He used to tell the story of how, having obtained a grant from the Senate to pursue the idea, he sadly announced he was returning it when no groups stepped forward. Finally, the night before the deadline, two groups did step forward albeit tentatively.

Over the years, it grew to five groups and, finally, eight. Today, there are seven.

The arrangement had been tried on the mainland but was brand new to Hawaii. Bailey made it work.

He did so by empowering teachers to be creative and then helping them to become so.

He used discretionary funds that came his way to employ a "teacher facilitator," a role he created to provide assistance to teachers on whatever matters they sought help in, including grantwriting.

Bailey put the teachers in charge of their own design teams. Not all Kapaa teachers were enthusiastic about the new arrangement, but on anonymous questionnaires several years later, more than 90 percent acknowledged that they were being encouraged to stretch and grow, and that they were being helped by the principal in assuming the risks of trying new teaching approaches.

He knew how to be a leader. He put assistant principals in charge of managing the school, while he focused on leading it. And while teachers are always suspicious of administrators, Bailey's gentle, patient manner, and his transparent desire to see people grow narrowed the typical divide between teacher and principal.

It's too bad we don't have medals for educators, as we do for soldiers. Bailey certainly earned one. In a highly centralized system like Hawaii's schools, he showed extraordinary courage in continuously risking his personal welfare – his professional future – for the children in his care.

It took an accomplished leader and a solid administrator, as well as a person willing to dedicate himself completely to the task, like Cliff Bailey. With his death, he leaves a terrible void. The children of Hawaii have lost a champion who not only empathized but who really managed to come through for them.

Representative Morita submitted the following remarks:

"Mr. Speaker, on behalf of the Women's Caucus, I rise in support of House Bill 77.

"House Bill 77 appropriates \$25,000 as a donation on behalf of the State of Hawai'i for the Women in Military Service for America Memorial. This is a very modest effort to honor our nation's women veterans. Since its inception, the Memorial has been run by a non-profit organization that does not receive any federal funds. Hawai'i has the dubious distinction of being the only state that has yet to make a monetary donation for the operation and maintenance of the memorial.

"This memorial serves as the gateway into Arlington National Cemetery. It is the only major national memorial that honors the nearly 2 million women who have served in this country's armed services. The memorial also recognizes women who served in direct support of the armed services in organizations like the Red Cross, USO, Special Services, and Public Health Cadet Nurse Corps.

"Many do not realize the valuable contribution that women have made to our nation's defense. The Memorial is an important symbol in educating and perpetuating this history in a unique way. "Her-story" is preserved through an interactive database documenting the individual experiences that make up the collective history of America's servicewomen.

"When the Memorial was dedicated in October 1997, Hawai'i's 7,700 women veterans of the armed services were well represented at the Arlington National Cemetery ceremony. Hawaii shares a long relationship with the military, which maintains a vital presence in our island community. Again, HB 77 gives the State of Hawai'i an opportunity to correct an embarrassing oversight and confirm that we truly value the contributions of all women in uniform.

The cost of freedom is high and this Memorial is a permanent reminder that women have helped to pay the price."

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"The Women in Military Service for America Memorial will be a fitting tribute to the military women who have served their country. It is important that Hawaii support this project because it is my understanding is that we are the only state thus far that has not supported the project.

"We would like to honor the many active duty women stationed in Hawaii. Washington DC presently has the largest number of active duty women, but Hawaii is number two. So let's honor those who have served in the past and the many women who are here in Hawaii today in the Army, the Navy, the Marine Corps, the Air Force and the Coast Guard who are serving today. Mahalo."

"Mr. Speaker, I'd just like to say that our own Majority Floor Leader is a veteran, and one we should be proud of and I hope that we will support this. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Souki for the Committee on Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 15) recommending that H.B. No. 135, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 135, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD PASSENGER SAFETY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, with Representatives Case, Davis, Hiraki, Thielen and Whalen being excused.

Representatives Arakaki and Kahikina, for the Committee on Health and the Committee on Human Services and Housing, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 16) recommending that H.B. No. 105, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 105, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT SERVICES,"

passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Case, Davis, Hiraki, Thielen and Whalen being excused.

Representatives Arakaki and Kahikina, for the Committee on Health and the Committee on Human Services and Housing, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 17) recommending that H.B. No. 293, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 293, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH CARE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Case, Davis, Hiraki, Thielen and Whalen being excused.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health, presented a report (Stand. Com. No. 18) recommending that H.B. No. 223, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 223, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative Pendleton rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think that this is a well-intentioned bill. The proponents of it are sincere in advocating their cause. I am familiar with the subject matter, and having had the privilege of serving on the Health Committee in the past, I have spoken with the physicians, MDs, as well as optometrists. As I consider the public safety questions, I find myself lining up with the ophthalmologists because of the arguments and the facts that they have presented. So I ask that the Clerk register a no vote for me on this measure. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McDermott rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"The optometrists are great guys. I have my own family optometrist who testified in support of this. And I was one who voted with reservations in the hearing. This is a very difficult vote for me.

"But I am convinced that the bill, in its current form with the injectibles provision, is one that I'm not comfortable with supporting, so I am going to vote no for that reason. But I will keep an open mind. Thank you."

Representative Rath rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Moses rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I just have concerns that an optometrist, although well meaning, may not know the underlying medical history of the patient. And without medical knowledge, they may inadvertently apply medications that are not tolerable. Thank you."

Representative Halford rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered." Representative Auwae rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Meyer rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Takai rose to speak in support of this measure, stating:

"Today, all fifty states have enacted laws granting optometrists therapeutic privileges. Presently, 37 states allow optometrists to prescribe oral medications for the treatment of eye disease. Forty-five states have recognized optometrist qualifications to treat glaucoma. Initially, seven states had formulary committees. Today, Hawaii is the only state that has a Formulary Committee.

"With the national trend to allow optometrists TPA [therapeutic pharmaceutical agents] privileges, the issue of safety to the public has not been jeopardized. Since 1976 when optometrists in West Virginia were allowed to prescribe TPAs, no TPA laws have ever been repealed. According to CNA, the insurance company that currently provides professional liability coverage for over 8,000 optometrists nationwide, claim records for the last five years show that there have been no claims filed specifically attributed to the prescription error on the part of one of their insured optometrists. And since 1993, there have been no increases to their professional liability rates for optometrists.

"Optometrists are prescribing therapeutic agents safely. Passage of H.B. No. 223 is necessary because of the lengthy time it takes optometrists to be able to prescribe the latest and cost effective eye medications. Currently, optometrists can only prescribe medications from the 1998 Physicians Desk Reference or PDR. Since 1998, newer medications have become available. Unfortunately, this directly affects people in Hawaii.

"The Formulary Committee, which we propose to eliminate, has worked hard. But due to the extreme delay in authorizing optometrists the use of the latest medications, this process needs to be done by the Board of Examiners in Optometry like the forty-nine other states.

"There are some concerns, legitimate as they are, regarding the use of injectibles. Mr. Speaker, I just wanted to mention that during the discussion of this bill, that issue really didn't come up. I urge the Chairman of the Consumer Protection Committee with which this bill will head on to now, to really look at that issue. But as far as the Committee on Health, we really believe that the Formulary Committee must be eliminated in order to help the citizens of Hawaii. Thank you very much."

Representative Gomes rose to speak in opposition to the measure and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, stating:

"I concur with the previous remarks that Minority members have made thus far. Thank you Mr. Speaker."

Representative Fox rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Bukoski rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Jaffe rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 223, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OPTOMETRY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, with Representatives Auwae, Bukoski, Fox, Gomes, Halford, Jaffe, McDermott, Meyer, Moses, Pendleton and Rath voting no and Representatives Case, Davis, Hiraki, Thielen and Whalen being excused.

Representative Arakaki for the Committee on Health, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 19) recommending that H.B. No. 352, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 352, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROFESSIONAL COUNSELORS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, with Representatives Case, Davis, Hiraki, Thielen and Whalen being excused.

Representative Arakaki for the Committee on Health, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 20) recommending that H.B. No. 651, pass Second Reading and be referred jointly to the Committees on Education and Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 651, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CRIMINAL HISTORY," passed Second Reading and was referred jointly to the Committees on Education and Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, with Representatives Case, Davis, Hiraki, Thielen and Whalen being excused.

Representative Garcia for the Committee on Public Safety and Military Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 21) recommending that H.B. No. 176, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative Fox rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, according to the Committee Report, this bill was opposed by the Honolulu Police Department. And in the Committee Report it also discusses the problem that this bill may pose for the currently existing law which requires a mandatory term of imprisonment for people sentenced for possession or distribution of crystal methamphetamine, commonly known as 'ice'. I think that's a very, very serious matter and I hope that the next Committee will look carefully at it and make sure that we keep the present law in place because that's what makes Drug Court work. It's the hammer of a mandatory prison sentence that sends 'ice' users into treatment programs. And we need to keep that hammer. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 176, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, with Representatives Case, Davis, Hiraki, Thielen and Whalen being excused.

Representative Morita, for the Committee on Energy and Environmental Protection, presented a report (Stand. Com. No. 22) recommending that H.B. No. 654, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

# STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Representative Morita, for the Committee on Energy and Environmental Protection, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 23) recommending that H.B. 1596, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. 1596, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative Hale rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I think most of you know that I come from the Island of Hawaii, the home of Madam Pele. We get very excited when somebody tries to tell us how we should run our affairs. We believe very much in homerule.

"I object to this bill not because, I am unnecessarily opposed to an energy plant or that I am opposed to the issuance of special revenue bonds for a plant. This proposal has come to us because Hilo Coast Processing Company intends to put in, or have already put in, a proposal in answer to the County of Hawaii's request for proposals of how to dispose of our solid waste

"I think in this bill we are putting the cart before the horse and I particularly object to page two, where we say "Hilo Coast Processing Company's Waste to Energy Facility will use incineration and air pollution control technology that has been in successful operation for twelve years". We don't know where this was done. There's no information given to us about such a successful operation.

"The bill states: "For the foregoing reasons the Legislature finds and declares that the issuance of special purpose revenue bonds under this act, is in the public interest and is beneficial to the public health, safety and general welfare". I'd like to point out that no environmental impact study that has been done. No information has been given to us as to whether this is true. But the Legislature is going to authorize them to issue special revenue bonds in the amount of 25 million dollars for one company. The County has asked for these requests for proposals from many different sources and I have great faith in our new administration and the County to clearly investigate the health, welfare and general safety of all such proposals. But the Legislature hasn't done it. We haven't taken this bill out to hearings and the public on our island.

"When I asked the Representative from Hilo Coast Processing whether this bill was absolutely necessary for them to make their proposal, he admitted that it was not necessary. We are putting the cart before the horse. When I also asked him if they had consulted anyone in their community, because I have never heard of their proposal and being a Representative of the county, although it is not my district, I would certainly have seen some reference to it, I was told they had not told anybody that they were going to do this.

"We don't like decisions made for our county from Honolulu, the Legislature or the Governor or even the Mayor unless it's taken out to the public for their reaction. All I'm saying is that we have not done this. We are putting the cart before the horse and I realize this will be going to Finance which is Representative Takamine's district and I hope he will very seriously consider these arguments and hopefully wait until the county makes a decision as to whether they really want to do this before we authorize such revenue bonds. Thank you."

Representative Whalen then rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Rath rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Having worked on the County Council with the Representative from Puna, I agree with at least part of her statements. Thank you."

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 33) recommending that H.B. 132, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred jointly to the Committees on Economic Development and Business Concerns and Labor and Public Employment.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. 132, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred jointly to the Committees on

Economic Development and Business Concerns and Labor and Public Employment, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative Whalen rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I would only like to mention that I am opposed to this measure because it is not going to a committee where I sit on, and therefore, I will not have an opportunity to make my concerns known.

"Generally I have problems with the bill but something that I feel is really offensive to anyone who supports this notion is that if you work for any other union other than a public union you are forbade basically from smoking. But if you work for the State then it's an item you can negotiate. I don't' think that's fair to the people of Hawaii to differentiate between them in such a manner. So my vote is no."

Representative Auwae then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Rath rose in opposition of the measure, stating:

"I think we are regulating business quite enough without continuing it on to a greater degree. Thank you."

Representative Gomes then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Stonebraker rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I find that government has its place and this bill is invasive and it extends beyond the limit that government has and I vote no on this. Thank you."

Representative Meyer rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"This bill goes as far as to say that any business with two people, that's about any business or anybody who ever thought of being in business. I just think this is not something that our small businesses need to be saddled with. Thank you."

Representative Takai rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I just wanted to point out a few things.

"First of all, this bill does nothing more than codify what the executive branch has done since 1997. As a matter of fact, on October 10<sup>th</sup> of 1997, the Governor issued Executive Order 9714, which specifically prohibits smoking in work places regulated and run by the State of Hawaii.

"In addition to that Mr. Speaker, the City and County of Honolulu, two years ago, passed an ordinance which restricts smoking in work places of two or more individuals. So in other words, for the entire island of Oahu, what we are doing right now is passing what current work places, both public and private, now have to follow.

"There were some objections raised in the committee hearing and I think we have addressed those. As a matter of fact, the business league came in and were objected to the fact that we were requiring each employer to come up with a work place smoking policy, and as you can see on pages two and three of the revised bill, we've deleted that requirement. "So, what we are doing is basically putting in State law what already is being practiced for the past two years for the City and County of Honolulu and for the State of Hawaii for the past three years. Thank you Mr. Speaker."

Representative Whalen rose to continue his remarks in opposition, stating:

"For the City and County of Honolulu, if that's what their elected people want is fine. But just because the Governor orders something doesn't mean that we have to capitulate to it.

"My point was that, to require this unilateral decision of all private businesses, to not allow smoking in enclosed areas, and have the public unions able to negotiate it as they go through their negotiating process is wrong.

"The fact that the City of County of Honolulu does something and the Governor has an Executive Order for state buildings does not make it good for the rest of Hawaii. We are made up of multiple islands, we have elected officials from various counties and I don't think it's the jurisdiction of this House or the Senate or any other body to decide what's best for everyone else in the State, because of what they feel is good for Honolulu. Thank you."

Representative Souki rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Moses rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 132, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SMOKING IN THE WORKPLACE," passed Second Reading and was referred jointly to the Committees on Economic Development and Business Concerns and Labor and Public Employment, with Representatives Auwae, Gomes, Meyer, Rath, Stonebraker and Whalen voting no, and Representative McDermott being excused.

Representative Pendleton rose to speak in support with strong reservations to the measure, stating:

"As we know from the Committee Report this bill would abolish the cap on QUEST enrollment. The intent may be good to allow more people into the program but reading the testimony causes me to have some serious concerns.

"The Department of Human Services has testified that abolishing the cap could result in two very serious consequences. Because of those consequences I would have

to vote with reservations at this time and may change my vote on Third Reading as we learn more.

"One of the consequences, Mr. Speaker, is a very negative one. It decreases and knows that there could be a problem with complying with the federal requirement. An increase in expenditures could cause non-compliance with what the federal describes as budget neutrality provisions. Of course this could result in the second consequence, which is jeopardizing of the continuation of the entire program.

"Further, without federal approval, without state funds that could be used to continue QUEST, and again with the tremendous expenditures that we have, and unrelated sort of issues, Felix etc., this could be a very serious problem.

"So, at this time I am voting with strong reservations Mr. Speaker."

Representative Gomes rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"I concur with the previous speaker's remarks and would go with reservations on this measure. Thank you."

Representative Djou then rose and asked the Clerk to register and aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Rath then rose and asked the Clerk to register and aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Fox then rose and asked the Clerk to register and aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Meyer then rose and asked the Clerk to register and aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Jaffe then rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Moses then rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kahikina rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"As an evidence of our integrity to the people of the State of Hawaii, your Committee on Human Services and Housing deliberated a vehicle that would express our concern for the uninsured people.

"In raising the cap, although the discussion was made by the Department of the concerns that was brought forward by the previous speakers, it is our belief that the Committee on Finance will definitely look into that matter. But as far as the concern of the human element, your Committee chose to pass this measure out, as an evidence of our integrity to the people of Hawaii. Thank you Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pendleton continued his remarks in opposition, stating:

"I don't question the integrity or the intent of the Committee members. But our concern is for the bigger picture. We don't want to cause this very good program to be jeopardized all together because of problems with the federal government. "As a matter of standing by integrity, I have serious concerns and reservations and I look forward to more information during the Finance hearing, regarding this measure."

Representative Arakaki rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I think if anyone looks at the number of people who are uninsured, in terms of health insurance, we had one of the best programs in the whole country because of pre-paid health and our coverage of Medicaid. In a way, Quest did a lot to help enhance coverage. However, due to budget limitations, the Department placed an artificial cap on enrollment. In terms of budget neutrality requirements which the previous speaker spoke of, the budget neutrality has more to do with per enrollee then it does towards the universal budget for Quest.

"So as the Director admitted, there's really no cap on the number of enrollees that we can have. However, the number of enrollees has to be matched in terms of the States contribution. But the State's contribution also brings in new monies, in terms of federal dollars, because the HICFA is required to match on a 53% basis to the State.

"So it's a false economy to say that we have this cap. Because what it does is it creates problems for healthcare institutions and I think if you talk to the hospitals they're in deep trouble financially, because basically we have placed the burden on their backs, as well as on the backs of the providers.

"In a lot of cases, the providers don't want to provide care to people of low income. I think we need to rethink whether it is economical to place these kinds of caps and whether we should look at maybe investing in proper health for those who are uninsured and underinsured. Thank you Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee rose in support of the measure, stating:

"I think one point to be made here too is, when people are uninsured, what they do is go to seek care that is more expensive. This would be in the emergency room, which is extremely expensive care.

"So I think that when we are talking about cost we have to look, as Representative Arakaki has said, at the broader cost to the community."

The Chair addressed the body, stating:

"I think we have had a lot of discussion on Standing Committee Report No. 40, which will be passing Second Reading and be referred to Finance.

"At that point, Chair Takamine, Vice Chair Kawakami and the entire Finance Committee membership will take a look at this particular issue, if the Chair and Vice Chair schedule it for a hearing with all of the discussion that we have had."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 340, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HUMAN SERVICES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative McDermott being excused.

Representative Chang, for the Committee on Tourism and Culture, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 41) recommending that H.B. 21 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

I'm really concerned that if this bill passes in its present form, a lot of frivolous suits would be taken out. When these businesses have a problem, they have to report to the Department of Health. They will be fined. But you know, you could just sit down at the Department of Health, wait until the paper work comes in and say, 'Hey, these are the bad guys. Let's sue them.' It's sort of a double jeopardy thing and it doesn't do any anything to help the standard of our water. Thank you Mr. Speaker."

Representative Schatz rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Very briefly. This bill codifies a constitutional provision giving citizens the right to sue under the Clean Water Act. It is consistent with the recent decision in South Kona.

"Furthermore, frivolous suits are very uncommon according to the Environmental Law Institute, and I'd be happy to provide the members with that documentation. The money, if there is any, if there is any money exchanged from the litigants, is going to go to the Department of Health. There was a concern expressed previously about this being sort of a 'gravy train' for environmental organizations. So the money will go straight to the Department of Health and not give incentive to environmental non-profits.

"And finally, if an individual or an entity, doesn't violate the Clean Water Act, they don't have to worry about this bill or this legislation. Thank you Mr. Speaker." Representative Bukoski rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"I'd like to stand with reservations on the same measure and I have several suggestions for Representative Schatz that I would like to take up with him later on."

Representative Djou rose and asked that the Clerk register an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Souki rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with due respect to the Majority, I wish to express my support with reservations."

Where the male prison population doubled between 1985 and 1995, the female population tripled, largely due to the harsh sentencing that incarcerates female non-violent offenders -- first-time drug offenders.

"Research establishes that women in prison have different needs than male inmates, due in part to the female offenders' disproportionate victimization from sexual or physical abuse and the responsibility for children. Women offenders are more likely to be addicted to drugs, have mental illness and to have been unemployed before incarceration, than men. And women have different pathways to crime, than men.

"Programs for women must be based on their needs, not modeled after programs designed for men. Thank you."

Representative Pendleton rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"The Windward Community Correctional Center is situated in my House District 50 in Kailua and I've had the opportunity to visit and speak with the people residing there and with the people who work there. And as Representative Morita has aptly put it, some of the problems are very difficult and unique to women. Most of them are there for their drug problems and those kinds of additions. And I really appreciated all the people there who work and volunteer there, and the counselors who work with the women.

"And I want to thank the Women's Caucus for introducing this measure and I commend the Chairman of Public Safety for moving this bill forward. It's much needed legislation. I look forward to visiting again, with Windward Community Correctional Center and speaking with them about this particular bill and the previous one that would have an effect on them. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of this measure, and I also wanted to take this opportunity to announce to the members that on Friday, if you have not yet put it on your social calendar, we will be holding the first of a series of what's being called the 'New Aloha Economy Days.' It will be held here at the State Capitol and lunch will be provided for the members. Like last year, we will be providing the members an opportunity to 'survey the landscape,' if you will. The members of the High Technology Trade Association [HTTA] will be holding a trade fair on the fourth floor of this Capitol, and sharing with you the programs, and the personnel, and everything involved with the 'New Aloha Economy.'

"This bill, Mr. Speaker, fits right into the theme of this first event on Workforce Development. I am glad to see this bill, which is a priority of the Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii, who by the way, I spoke to on your behalf Mr. Speaker, at a breakfast some weeks ago. As this bill is advancing, I would like to give the members of the succeeding committee support please, for this program.

"And while we understand that money is tight this year, I would like to see how this bill, as it comes for appropriation, might work with a program already in place. Although it is fast falling out of favor, there is the Employee Training Fund [ETF] administered by the Department of Labor. I have had discussions with the Chamber and the Department of Labor to see how the ETF might be better administered, and to see that the monies that are already in that Fund might dove tail with the intent of this measure. So I urge the members to give their support. Thank you."

Representative Gomes rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of the measure, and just a question to the previous speaker if I may. Regarding the 'New Aloha Economy' initiative and whether that includes elements of the old economy and the high tech part of it, in regards to Agriculture, and if those components will be part of this 'New Aloha Economy' initiative."

The Chair then asked: "Representative Garcia, would you like to respond to the questions?"

Representative Garcia responded: "There are some eighty some-odd vendors and I haven't checked to see whether or not they have elements of the old economy.

"Specifically to your question about Agriculture. I understand the Representative bringing that question to the floor because of the hearing we had this morning before the Agriculture and the Higher Education Committees. The 'New Aloha Economy' touches base with all these concerns raised by the previous speaker. The membership of the HTTA speaks of biotechnology as the kind of thing that we talked about this morning. So I would invite the Representative and all the others to take a look at what the HTTA has to offer, and if they don't, then perhaps you might want to take that up with the Association. Thank you."

"I again want to suggest that we hold the line on any spending increases whether they be for salaries or otherwise. Mr. Speaker, all of our staff certainly deserves raises for the hard and good work that they do. I just think, once again, that our economy is not back. Things on the mainland, there are very ominous signs economically, and I think the situation in Asia is sputtering at best. I think we just have to proceed very carefully at this time with our money and how we spend the very vast resources that we already have.

"So for those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I'll be going with reservations"

Representative M. Oshiro rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think this measure is an appropriate measure at this time because it provides salary adjustments for the Ombudsman Office, LRB, and our much appreciated State Auditor. I note, for the members' attention, that these salary adjustments are being made to reflect the fact that there have been none for the past 11 years.

"And knowing that we rely upon these agencies to produce for us reports, studies and analysis for our decision making, I think this is a wise investment in these talented agencies that we rely upon.

"Mr. Speaker, this is one example of us supporting these institutions and these people so we can attract and retain these quality workers. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I ask that the members support this measure. Thank you."

Representative Djou rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Schatz rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"To be opposed to this bill I think would perfectly exemplify the phrase: 'Penny wise, and pound foolish.' In particular, I want to talk about what the Auditor has provided to this Legislature this Session. She has provided, with the

help of some consultants, a report that is going to help us to save, hopefully on the order of tens of millions of dollars within the context of the Felix Consent Decree.

"She is also helping us to address the looming educational officers shortage, and she just does a wonderful job. To not give her a pay raise after 11 years because the economy may or may not be back again, I think, is 'penny wise and pound foolish.' We have to recognize talent where it is and recognize what we need in this Legislature. And we certainly need an excellent Auditor, and we have one. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Djou rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I'd just like to clarify, for the record, my opposition. I do not oppose. I think I agree with the distinguished Representative that the Auditor has done a wonderful job. I have always made the point before, Mr. Speaker, that as we are trying to give raises for our rank and file, this perhaps is not the time we should talk about raises for the senior management here. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Rath rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Suzuki, for the Committee on Legislative Management presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 78) recommending that H.B. 1012, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative M. Oshiro, moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1012, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative Gomes rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I'm not exactly sure what this measure is intending to do, but it seems to me to be; and I realize as someone coming up for election in two more years, it may affect me. But it seems to be more protectionist and overly paternalistic. I think that the voters are perfectly capable of figuring out if someone who is running for office in their district is not qualified or capable to represent them. This, whether a candidate decides to move into the district the day before the election or the day before the primary, or not. So for those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to this measure. Thank you."

Representative M. Oshiro rose in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in strong support of this measure. The intent of this bill is to address the problem that we all agree exists in occasions of 'carpet bagging.' That's what this bill does. It proposes a Constitutional Amendment that would require that before you seek office to represent a certain district, that you live there. And that you live there before you file your nomination papers for the primary. This is supported by the Office of Elections, the League of Women Voters, and Common Cause of Hawaii. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1012, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN

Representative Djou rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Jaffe rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kanoho rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise to speak in support of both Stand. Com. Reports 88 and 89. First of all, I do appreciate the expressions of concern on the part of those who have said so, because that is a demonstration of warm aloha for the displacement of those month-to-month tenants. I did think about standing on a 'point of order' because this bill does not address that. It really would be taken up in HB 695, which is not before this body. In fact, it is still in Committee.

"However, Mr. Speaker, this measure, HB 537 simply increases HCDA's capability from \$35 million to \$150 million. And I must point out that Special Facility Bonds are not obligations of the State. These will eventually become private loans through a private entity. A Public Facility Bond is nearly similar to a Special Purpose Revenue Bond except that the facility is located on government property. So again, I emphasize, that this does not represent an obligation of the State and neither would the State be liable for any default on the part of the private lender.

"Mr. Speaker, addressing the question of concern which is a very legitimate one. The reason that HB 695 was deferred in Committee..."

The Chair reminded Representative Kanoho that HB 695 was not being addressed at this time and directed him to confine his remarks to Stand. Com. Rep. Nos. 88 and 89.

Representative Kanoho continued: "Certainly. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The concerns expressed are being addressed with the respective departments involved in terms of litigation, relocation, and some kind of assistance. And we're very confident that we can satisfactorily address those concerns. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Gomes rose to speak in support for the measure with reservations, stating:

"Just with regard to my concern with any additional authority for HCDA to spend or increase additional funds. I question, I'm not certain we're getting the biggest 'bang for our buck' as it is from that organization."

Representative Bukoski rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair 'so ordered."

Representative Ahu Isa rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair 'so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 537, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Bukoski, Djou, Jaffe, Rath and Thielen voting no and Representatives Arakaki, Souki, Stonebraker, Takamine and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Kanoho, for the Committee on Water and Land Use presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 89) recommending that H.B. 554, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

"Mr. Speaker, there is a relocation of businesses issue and I don't want to have us have a repeat of the situation when we evicted so many businesses in the Kaka'ako area. Thank you."

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"I question whether public funds should be used for a private facility such as an Ocean Science Center. Thank you."

Representative Jaffe rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kanoho rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, 1 have similar comments on Stand. Com. Rep. Nos. 88 and 89 in that this would provide for a project that the whole state can become very proud of.

"I think many of us have visited such facilities throughout the country and foreign destinations and have been impressed. And this indeed, can be something that Hawaii, all of us as residents and as visitors, can enjoy. And the idea here is to employ, as much as we can, private funds at no cost to the State. Other options are being looked at that do have a lot of potential where this may become a private-government partnership. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Gomes rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I like the concept of an aquarium. I'm not in favor though, of the placing it in Kakaako. For the reasons already cited and, in addition to some of the traffic congestion that already exist in that area due to its heavy usage. So for those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I'm voting no on Stand. Com. 89. Thank you."

Representative Bukoski rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Luke rose in to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"The center will generate an estimated 700 jobs in the construction industry. The center will create a major economic impact. It's expected to create another 150 new permanent jobs and generate between 600 and 1000 additional jobs in this area. The Kaka'ako area has been underdeveloped for years and the State is providing an avenue to provide economic impact and further growth in the area.

"I understand some of the concerns that have been brought up and we'll take a look at it as this bill moves through the process. I think what we need to do is take a look at different alternative bond funding methods, but in concept, I think we should support it and we should continue our discussion. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and Carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 470, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, with Representatives Arakaki, Souki, Stonebraker, Takamine and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Ito, for the Committee on Education presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 103) recommending that H.B. 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative McDermott rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd just like to cast a 'No' vote on Stand. Com. Rep. No. 103, HB 2, HD 1. I have just a few comments, going back and forth on this.

"In my first term here I was against it. My second term I supported it as I fell under the influence of that Representative from Pearl City. But now, I'm back to my old self, and I just don't think that a 17 year-old has the breadth and life experience to make decisions on curriculum and teaching issues.

"I'm just beginning to grasp it, and I've been here several years. So for that reason, I'm going to vote No. Thank you."

Representative Ito rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in strong support of HB 2, HD 1. This bill proposes an amendment to the State Constitution giving the student member of the Board of Education voting rights on all matters except decisions regarding personnel.

"Efforts have been made since 1988 to allow the student member voting rights. What makes this session's efforts noteworthy is that for the first time, the Board of Education has supported the effort.

"Legal questions that have been raised have been addressed by the Attorney General. The Attorney General has no legal objections to a voting student member.

"Your Committee realizes that we must recognize and reward students who have shown all the competency and intelligence of those adults around them.

"Your Committee has amended the bill by adding language to include legislative findings justifying the purpose of this bill. For these reasons, I ask that HB 2, HD 1, be sent to the next Committee, Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs for further consideration. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Bukoski rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you Mr. Speaker. I'd like to stand also in strong support of Stand. Com. Rep. 103. I just want to note that I was very impressed with the amount of participation by the students that were present at the hearing. And I agree with all the statements that were made by the previous speaker. And for these reasons, I strongly support this measure and I'm very encouraged by the kind of participation we're getting by our young adults. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Case rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I must be falling under the influence of the Representative from Pearl City as well. Several years ago I started out, like the prior speaker, opposing this measure. Frankly, I thought it was virtually one hundred percent political correctness. But I think I've come to the conclusion that there are, in fact, instances in which the student can and should be a full voting member.

"My reservations are simply that I believe the voting exemptions in the bill, to personnel issues, are too narrow. I believe that there are other areas in which we should, in the big picture, and I'm leaving political correctness aside, provide for further exemptions before we send this to the voters for their thoughts. And frankly, I think that that by doing so we would assist the measure in being approved by the voters as a Constitutional Amendment.

"The actions that I am referring to are primarily procurement and some of the hardcore fiscal issues. I think in terms of overall policy and overall direction, those are perfectly legitimate areas for the student member to comment, but not to vote on. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, with Representative McDermott voting no and Representatives Arakaki, Souki, Stonebraker, Takamine and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Ito, for the Committee on Education presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 104) recommending that H.B. 1390, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Tourism and Culture.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1390, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ARTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Tourism and Culture, with Representatives Arakaki, Souki, Stonebraker, Takamine and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representatives Kanoho and Morita, for the Committee on Water and Land Use and the Committee on Energy and Environmental Protection presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 105) recommending that H.B. 50, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. 50, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative Meyer rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you Mr. Speaker. I'm rising to register support with reservations on Stand. Com. Rep. No. 105. This is a bill that was introduced for the purpose of providing funds to the University of Hawaii to develop a multi-use ocean-floating platform.

"The bill that we heard in Water and Land Use would have appropriated \$100,000 for this purpose. The proponents of this measure didn't even bother to come to the hearing. I think with all the competing needs for appropriations, that these folks should have at least made the effort to send a live person to present their testimony.

"I'm also somewhat concerned because the remnants of another floating platform which I'm sure had a good purpose, a scientific purpose, are still sitting on the reef in Kaneohe Bay. So I have a lot of considerations about these good ideas. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 50, HD I, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AN OCEAN FLOATING PLATFORM," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Arakaki, Souki, Stonebraker, Takamine and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representatives Morita and Kanoho, for the Committee on Energy and Environmental Protection and the Committee on Water and Land Use presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 106) recommending that H.B. 1460, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. 1460, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative Case rose in support of the measure and asked that his remarks be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Case's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, while undergrounding utility lines is clearly a vision becoming reality elsewhere and the future here, the related issues are complicated. This bill as introduced proposed: (a) a representative committee to consider these issues in a deliberative fashion; and (b) a three-year moratorium on construction of high voltage lines on this island while that commission deliberated.

"I support this bill because it authorizes the needed commission. However, I have nothing but the deepest concern for deletion of the moratorium at the urging of electric utility monopoly, Hawaiian Electric Industries. What does HEI want: for this commission to talk about these issues in the abstract while HEI rams through major developments directly affected by the commission's work? Why isn't HEI willing to have the committee, on which it will serve, complete its work before advancing proposed projects that, by HEI's own statements, need not proceed now? This is simply another case of bad faith on the part of HEI in preaching but not practicing concern for the public welfare."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 1460, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO UNDERGROUND UTILITY LINES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, with Representatives Arakaki, Souki, Stonebraker, Takamine and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Hiraki, for the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 107) recommending that H.B. 240, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 240, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHECK CASHING," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading, with Representatives Arakaki, Souki, Stonebraker, Takamine and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Hamakawa, for the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 108) recommending that H.B. 527, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 527, HD I, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INTERSTATE FAMILY SUPPORT," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading, with Representatives Arakaki, Souki, Stonebraker, Takamine and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. 1589, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative Case rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"For those of you who like me have feared that the primary response of the legislature to the budget challenges we face would be revenue generation, please take a very close look at this bill. Because I think it's the first one that can fairly be put in that category and it takes a little bit of explaining. Basically what this bill does is to include within the definition of a hotel operator, for the imposition of the transient accommodations tax, the actual amount for a hotel room by a wholesaler.

"The TAT is actually a tax on the hotel owner for the amount of money that the hotel owner receives for the sale of the hotel owner's room. Although it shows up on the visitor's bill, it's simply a 'pass-through;' the hotel owner is responsible for it.

"So if the hotel owner is successful in getting the rack rate for the hotel that's what the tax is paid on. If the hotel owner sells the hotel at a discount because it's the last night of occupancy or because it extends a kama'aina rate or for whatever reason, that's what the tax is based on. If the hotel owner sells a block of rooms to a wholesaler at a discount in order to sell in volume, the tax is paid on the amount that the hotel owner receives from the wholesaler.

"Now what is happening in this bill is essentially that the TAT is being proposed to be imposed not on what the hotel owner gets, but on the value of the room as sold by the wholesaler. So if the wholesaler gets a 30% discount, the TAT would be imposed not on the 30% discounted rate that the hotel owner gets, but on the resale value of that room.

"Now this bill was presented to the Committee on Tourism and Culture as a loophole in the law. It was presented as a situation where, essentially, we always meant to incorporate the wholesaler's profit in the Transient Accommodations Tax. That's absolutely false, and that is borne out in the testimony of the Department of Taxation which I will simply read:

"Under current law, the TAT is imposed at the rate of 7.25% on the 'gross rental' or 'gross proceeds' derived by an operator. This bill extends the TAT base, by among other things, amending the definition of operator and we note the following. First, the expansion of the TAT base is contrary to the original intent of the law, which was enacted to tax the taxpayer who owned and operated the hotel."

"Now the intent of the bill is clear. The intent of the bill is to generate revenue and, in fact, the Department of Taxation has estimated that the revenue gained from this bill is approximately \$30 million based upon an increase in the TAT tax base by \$400 million. The question here is whether that is what the TAT is supposed to be imposed on. And I would submit that the original intent and what we should continue to impose it on, is what the hotel operator, the owner, actually gets for that hotel room.

"If the wholesaler, for example, sells the room at a higher rate than what the wholesaler bought the room from the hotel owner for, the wholesaler pays a profit on that. So it's not as if the wholesaler is getting away with something. The wholesaler is being taxed upon any profit that the wholesaler makes. So the bottom line here is that this is a quite imaginative way, in my mind, of generating more revenue in order to pay for expenses when we are best left to the budget balancing process by controlling the expenses rather than generating revenue. So I would urge my colleagues to take a very close look at this bill and make sure it doesn't get out of the next committee. Thank you."

Representative Fox rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in opposition. We in Hawaii are engaged in a very competitive economy when it comes to competing with other visitor destinations. And a big factor in the competition is the price that we charge for our rooms in Hawaii.

"The TAT went down very hard with the hotel industry because it took its cost item up to 7.25%. This is an attempt to raise the cost of a hotel room in Hawaii even more and to interfere with the ability of the hotels to compete effectively against hotels elsewhere in the world.

"The people who work in the hotels depend on our hotels being competitive for their livelihood. Their jobs are based on hotels being competitive and being full. So if people think they're serving the cause of labor in the hotels by favoring a measure that makes our rooms more expensive relative to rooms elsewhere in the world, I would caution them to think again and to leave the TAT where it currently is. I am opposing this bill. Thank you Mr. Speaker."

Representative Rath rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Case be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Souki rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Case be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Pendleton rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representatives Fox and Case be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Gomes rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition and I concur with the previous speakers."

Representative M. Oshiro rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"As everyone knows here, our job is to set public policy. And this Legislature can make public policy on this previous law - to amend the law if it so deems fit. The fact that \$30 million might be raised from this change in the law is encouraging in a sense that we have a lot of needs to address in the area of education, in the area of tax exemptions, in the area of tax credits. So I appreciate this measure being forwarded to the Finance Committee.

"Secondly, Mr. Speaker, I think we need to remember that, I believe it was last year that, the hotels themselves raised the average room rates across the board. The fact of the matter is the visitors still did come. And I believe recent projections show that we are having a windfall of tourist arrivals and visitors. Thank you Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, please register a no vote for me on this measure. It's hard for me to believe that I voted for this in the previous Committee. Thank you."

Representative Moses rose to speak in opposition to the measure, and asked that the remarks of Representative Fox be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

"I'd like to add that just because people are still coming doesn't mean we should start turning them away by raising taxes."

Representative McDermott rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representatives Fox and Case be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Thielen rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the Clerk register a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Transportation presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 113) recommending that H.B. 414, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. 414, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative Rath rose in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"While I concur with the intent of this bill, the fines on entering a crosswalk, or not yielding in a crosswalk, or not using a crosswalk, start out at \$250 for the first offense, \$500 for the second, \$750 for the third. I just want to point out, I think those fines are excessive and I know what happens in a practical sense. When fines are excessive, police officers tend to just warn a violator as opposed to actually writing them a ticket, so it's defeatist in that way. But the irony of this is, it would make jaywalking or not yielding to a pedestrian, a higher fine than running a red light or running a stop sign. And I think that in the zeal to try to remedy a very real and dangerous problem, we've gone, as we often do in this House, a little bit too far. Thank you Mr. Speaker."

Representative Moses rose in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"I agree with the previous speaker, with reservations. And I also want to point out that the bill says that drivers of vehicles should stop at least one car length from a crosswalk or pedestrian when a pedestrian is crossing the street. Now I understand Mr. Speaker, that that doesn't say 'will' or 'shall,' it says 'should.' But that leaves a lot of discretion up to the Officer present. And I'm afraid that if you stop a full car length away from an intersection to allow pedestrians to cross, you're going to be backing up quite a bit of traffic.

"And I also don't see how you can tell that a pedestrian is about ready to stop off into the crosswalk when you're a car length away. You may be much closer than that before you realize there's a pedestrian trying to enter the crosswalk. Thank you Mr. Speaker."

Representative Djou rose in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you Mr. Speaker, on the same matter, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 113, I rise with reservations. This is a good bill. I support it. But my concerns are the same as the previous speakers. The fines appear a little bit excessive. Thank you."

Representative Halford rose in support of the measure with reservations, and asked that the Clerk register an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Stonebraker rose in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"It's interesting to me that this bill has written in its definition as a pedestrian bill of rights in regards to the fines being excessive. So I'd like to register a with reservations vote. Thank you."

Representative Meyer then rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"The high fines are of some concern. But I also feel that I'd like to see it amended where some of the fines that are received from this particular infraction could be earmarked for making special blinking lights and things for certain crosswalks that have repeat accidents at them. I think that we could save a lot of lives if we used some more high-tech type procedures to make motorists aware that they are coming up on a crosswalk in many instances. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Over the past 14 years, 35% of pedestrians who were injured or killed, were in a crosswalk. Clearly some changes are needed to our current laws. Driving conditions in Hawaii have changed drastically in recent years due to the increased number of vehicles and other factors on the roads. Pedestrians have the right to feel safe on our roads and not be the target of aggressive and inattentive drivers.

"As I was sitting in my seat listening to some of the comments about the fine being too high, I reflected back on what the cost of, not only human life is, but medical injuries. How much do you think the cost of a broken hip is? Is it that \$750, is it \$1,000, is it \$1,200? No, it ranges someplace in the range of \$25,000 to \$50,000 not to mention the cost of the pain. I don't think you could put any price on a human life. I think this bill is long overdue, I know that there were amendments made to the bill to require rather than a stop, yielding. But I think even the bill in it's original form was reasonable and was long overdue here in our State.

"Twenty years ago, people used to stop for people in crosswalks. What has happened to our sense of fairness? Thank you very much."

Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"About twenty some odd years ago I asked then Senator Dennis O'Connor, to introduce a bill requiring drivers to stop when a pedestrian entered the crosswalk. And it seemed to me insane, that we didn't have that sort of law on the books. Dennis said, 'Well I'll do it Cynthia, but it's not going to make it through.'

"Well, it's taken us 20 years with a lot of faster traffic, a lot more road rage and a lot of people that aren't paying attention when people enter the crosswalk. Or they play games with, 'Is the pedestrian looking at me?' And if the pedestrian's looking at me, then I can speed ahead, taking off the tips of her or his shoes. It's a very bad situation, speaking from the Kailua side, and that's why I introduced a somewhat similar bill last year that made it out of the House.

"And I congratulate all House members that were here last year that passed that over to the Senate. It sank in the 'then' Transportation Committee Chair's Committee who lived in a rural area and didn't see the need for it, in spite of senior citizens calling him, school groups, teachers, etc., I think this is a good step. I think that we ought to put it in, and I think that the fines are necessary to show that we're serious. No one likes to have to pay a fine, but I would like less to see a driver hit a child in a crosswalk because that driver was trying to get to work two seconds faster.

"The roadways are insane nowadays, and we need something that's going to protect people. And I think that this bill is at least a step forward. I will send a copy to Dennis and say we're moving ahead, and if he has any influence in the Senate, to be sure to make sure they hear the bill. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 414, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE TRAFFIC CODE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, with Representatives Luke and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Transportation presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 114) recommending that H.B. 415, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 415, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HARBORS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, with Representatives Luke and Yoshinaga being excuse.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Transportation presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 115) recommending that H.B. 1268, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1268, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLE SAFETY INSPECTIONS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, with Representatives Luke and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representatives Morita and Ahu Isa, for the Committee on Energy and Environmental Protection and the Committee on Economic Development and Business Concerns presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 116) recommending that H.B. 1256, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the joint report of the Committees be adopted and that H.B. 1256, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative McDermott rose in opposition to the measure, stating:

"This was a joint referral, and I respect both of the Chairs. Particularly, I know the Environmental Chair, no one has a commitment to the environment like that Chair. My concern is the cost that will be added, 5 cents for less than 24 ounces. If you buy a quart of milk, that's an additional 15 cents. I understand the intent is very laudable. We already have recycling centers that will take glass products so if people want to make extra money, they can already take the glass. That's what people do with the cans. You see the people picking up cans.

"So there is recycling already taking place. I appreciate the intent and the Chair's commitment to the environment. I just think that the fee at this point is a little too much for me. Thank you, Sir."

Representative Rath rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the Clerk register an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 1256, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, with Representative McDermott voting no, and Representatives Luke and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Hiraki, for the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 117) recommending that H.B. 237, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. 237, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative Rath rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the Clerk register an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition with a few comments. I'm opposed to this for the reasons I was opposed to the original statute that we passed out here last year. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 707, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, with Representative McDermott voting no, and Representatives Luke and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Kahikina, for the Committee on Human Services and Housing presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 122) recommending that H.B. 550, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Hale rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I am particularly in support of Part II of that bill appropriates \$2,684,000 because of the lava flow that destroyed the whole town of Kalapana. The Legislature back in, I think it was 1991 or 1992, appropriated money for a housing fund for these displaced people. And they also indicated that a subdivision was to be built in Kalapana. That subdivision has been sitting unfinished for nine years and these poor people whose homes were destroyed in Kalapana, have not been able to move into this subdivision because the roads and the water and the utilities have not been put in.

"I'd like to point out that there's another bill which I introduced, which has been referred to Finance Committee to use money in this fund to finish that infrastructure which I hope will do it. Without the infrastructure, the roads cannot be built. But I do support this and I commend the Committee for their work. "Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 73, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Luke and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Kahikina, for the Committee on Human Services and Housing presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 133) recommending that H.B. 636, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 636, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REIMBURSEMENT FOR NONINSTITUTIONAL PROVIDERS OF MEDICAL CARE FOR SERVICES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Luke and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative McDermott rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker. We in the Minority often beat you over the head, the Majority, about tax increases, tax credits, and what not. And here's a situation where the Chair is proposing a tax credit for low income renters and we need to acknowledge that. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 747, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Luke and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Kahikina, for the Committee on Human Services and Housing presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 135) recommending that H.B. 209, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. 209, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative Pendleton rose in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think the intent is very good. We want to find ways in which we can provide quality dental care to people who otherwise can't afford it. But if you look at this particular measure, Mr. Speaker, what I oppose is the way in which we seek to provide dental care to people who otherwise, can't afford it.

"My understanding of the bill is that we would do so by allowing people who are dentists, who perhaps have received dental training but have not yet passed the Hawaii Dental Licensing Examination, to take care of people who couldn't pay for dental care. That's akin to saying that if you're poor and you can't afford a lawyer, we'll find the people who couldn't pass the bar exam, or for whatever reason haven't taken the bar exam and you can get those lawyers. At least we find a public defender for the indigent. With dental care, Mr. Speaker, at least we should create tax incentives, create a structure, so that people who are dentists or who are licensed can treat people who can't afford it. I think that that would be a superior means of achieving the same good results. So for those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I vote no."

Representative Arakaki rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you Mr. Speaker, I'd like to stand in support of the measure and just in brief response, the reason why this bill is so important. I think most of you know we have many dentists, per capita, to meet the needs of Hawaii's population. But I think we also realize, that we have one of the worst incidences of dental cavities, especially for children. We have a problem serving many adults, especially through the Quest program because, except for emergency care, they're excluded. So the question is, if we have a lot of dentists, why then, do we have so many people going unserved?

"Basically, the problem is because we have certain populations that the dentists don't want to serve because they're not very good patients. We also have areas throughout our State, especially on the Neighbor Islands, that dentists will not go to because there's not an adequate population. And we have populations like children, and senior citizens, and the disabled that dentists don't want to serve. Basically they have so much business already, they can say 'no' to these types of populations.

"So, how do we serve this under-served population? I know the concerns. I appreciate the facts that the Minority Floor Leader has expressed, because we do not want qualified providers providing, to the population no matter what their income brackets are. The fact is, the Dental Board, under this bill, will be required to come up with the regulations and rules.

"And I also want to point out that we already do provide exceptions. In the case of Hansen's Disease patients as well as on a temporary basis for eleemosynary organizations that provide dental care. This is just an extension so that our community health centers and other low cost dental providers can expand their coverage. So hopefully, everyone will support this bill, at least move the discussion onwards. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Meyer rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I think you know from previous years, I'm one legislator who is always pushing for the highest standards for medical care which is somewhat of a divergence of my usual position. But I'm very clear that dental problems are a terrible thing for the poor, especially because there's so few options for them.

"There was a special briefing which I attended, as many of you did. The Catholic Charities and other organizations are doing the very best they can to get dental care out to these rural areas where many children never see a dentist. And in this bill, what they're trying to do is make use of a resource, which is retired dentists who are interested in doing charitable work. It's not as if they are unlicensed or dental school dropouts. These are folks that have had dental practices in different parts of the country. They have passed their dental exams and they've retired in Hawaii. And they are a ready, willing group of very talented professionals. I don't now if there are very many of them, but just the fact that they are there and willing to provide this very important work, I think

that perhaps we should look at this bill with a little more charitable eye. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Leong rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As you know, I come from a family of dentists where we've discussed this very much. I know the Dental Association has been in contact with my husband about this. And I think it is very important for us to realize that we do want to help the poor. We do want to help those that are in need for dental work. But you also have to watch out for the consumers because unless you have someone who's already trained, I think we could have many unforeseen problems, and that's what we're looking at.

"I think that we have to look at alternatives to how we can help these people. I know there's some people who are retired dentists who could come in and help these other people. But they're already qualified. But you're looking at people who have not passed the Board. And I think that's what we need to be very careful about and for that reason, I do not speak for this bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McDermott rose and asked that the Clerk register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Halford rose and asked that the Clerk register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 209, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DENTISTRY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, with Representatives Halford, Leong, McDermott and Pendleton voting no, and Representatives Luke and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Ito, for the Committee on Education presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 136) recommending that H.B. 15, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 126, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COMPUTER ACCESS BY MINORS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, with Representatives Luke and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Meyer rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"On the renewable energy standard power purchase contracts, I am against this. The purpose of this bill is to

reduce the time to negotiate a power purchase contract for renewable energy producers with the utility company. And the motivation is good. They want to speed this up. But the time limit that this bill calls for, six months, is not reasonable. The PUC testified that this just couldn't be done. The Consumer Advocate felt that this was something that was best handled by the PUC.

"I think that we have to be careful as legislators. This is a very complex area. While these different groups, the monopoly utility, and the renewable energy providers are getting closer, I've been listening to testimony for seven years now. They're getting closer but I don't think we can dictate from this building as to what should be done in that industry. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Souki rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Meyer be inserted in to the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kanoho rose in support of the measure with reservations, and asked that the Clerk register an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 742, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RENEWABLE ENERGY," passed Second Reading and was referred jointly to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce and the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, with Representatives Meyer and Souki voting no, and Representatives Luke and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representatives Abinsay and Takumi, for the Committee on Agriculture and the Committee on Higher Education presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 148) recommending that H.B. 1287, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1287, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Luke and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Morita, for the Committee on Energy and Environmental Protection presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 149) recommending that H.B. 1385, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1385, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NET ENERGY METERING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, with Representatives Luke and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 150) recommending that H.B. 130, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. 130, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative Stonebraker rose in support of the measure with reservations, and asked that the Clerk register an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Moses rose in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm sure I'm going to hear from the author of the measure, but I can't understand why we're building another bureaucracy. We want to inspect and enforce people who sell tobacco. What kind of inspection do we need? Adjudicating fines and penalties and training and educating... I can understand not selling to minors, but I don't understand how much training and adjudication is going to be necessary. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Rath rose in support of the measure with reservations, and asked that the Clerk register an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Meyer rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"I feel that maybe the Attorney General's office is taking advantage of this pot of money and thinks we can pay for a couple more lawyers. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 130, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TOBACCO PRODUCTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, with Representatives Luke and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Morita, for the Committee on Energy and Environmental Protection, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 151) recommending that H.B. 1386, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1386, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DISTRIBUTED ELECTRIC GENERATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, with Representatives Luke and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Ito, for the Committee on Education presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 152) recommending that H.B. 1391, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Tourism and Culture.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1391, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ARTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Tourism and Culture, with Representatives Luke and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Ito, for the Committee on Education presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 153) recommending that H.B. 224, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. 224, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative Case rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that his remarks be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Case's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I support this bill because it would decentralize the Board of Education. My reservations are that it does not propose replacing the elected with appointed members. I would not object to elected members if the BOE's role was purely advisory. But the combination of a highly politicized elected board with decisionmaking authority over the administration of our public schools has proved disastrous to a whole generation of education in our state."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 224, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, with Representatives Luke and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Ito, for the Committee on Education presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 154) recommending that H.B. 1302, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. 1302, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative Ontai rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I rise in opposition to Stand. Com. Rep. Nos. 154 and 155. Mr. Speaker, these bills are quite innovative and they are definitely thinking outside of the box, but I think they go too far. I feel it appears to be an abrogation of our responsibility as a legislature and it's creating a new political subdivision of the government by kind of divorcing or separating the Department of Education. I feel that our constituents are asking us for more responsibility, more accountability. I think that this will increase the division between the constituents the taxpayers, and the Department of Education, and the Board"

Representative Moses rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to both Stand. Com. Rep. Nos. 154 and 155. We already have a fourth branch of government, I guess, and that's the press. And this is creating a fifth branch of government. I can't see why we are always opposed to breaking up the statewide Board of Education and go to local school boards in the counties or in subdivisions of the counties.

"But here, we're going one step further and we're saying not only do we want it statewide, we want to give them taxing authority and treat them as a political subdivision. I'm not sure, but that may even be unconstitutional. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pendleton rose in opposition to the measures and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and that the remarks of Representative Ontai be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Rath rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative McDermott rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, on the same measures I'd like to cast a no vote, and give comments on Stand. Com. Rep. No. 154. This idea is worthy of discussion, it is a bold move and it is worthy for discussion. The only problem is that when Budget and Finance commented on it, they said that it was the Legislature's policy call. However, if we're going to do this, it would make sense to eliminate the State income tax at the very same time because that is roughly equal to the amount of money that the BOE, in their retail tax would supposedly bring in.

"We're missing that part of the equation, Mr. Speaker, and I believe because we're missing that, the elimination of the State income tax to make this revenue neutral, it's fatally flawed at this point. Therefore, I cannot support it, although I do respect the Chair. I served with him for three years and he's a good man even though he's never heard one of my bills. Thank you."

Representative Yonamine rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you Mr. Speaker. I speak with reservations on both Stand. Com. Rep. Nos. 154 and 155. The fact is both bills don't go far enough. Whenever we try to reform the public schools, and we've done this on many occasions in the past by proposing or enacting legislation to either make them more powerful or less powerful, the fact remains that we have not taken a real good look at what's going on with the public school system.

"In this case, with Stand. Com. Rep. No. 154, if we do want to give the Board of Education full authority, governing and administrative autonomy, we need to also amend the Constitution where it gives us [legislators] that authority as quasi-school board members. It's called 'underlaw.' That phrase would have to be amended too in order for us to give the Board of Education full fiscal and operational autonomy.

"The other thing here is that the Board of Education's election process is flawed, and we've mentioned it many times. It's under court order. Under the 'one man, one vote,' we arrived first at 9 members and then 13. And whatever the formula, something has to be done to make the Board of Education more responsive and accountable to the very people that they should be representing. Whatever reapportion issue comes up in the form of a bill will be challenged in court. I'm pretty sure of that because this will violate the 'one man, one vote.' So whatever formula we come up with, more Board members for example, or down to the regional level, or county level. That I believe would be under full consideration and full dispute and discussion.

"Now, most important, if you want to reorganize the Department of Education, you better look at reorganizing DAGS, DOH, DOE's CIP program, the Department of Transportation, all the repair and maintenance, and all youth services programs and projects. These would then have to be reorganized under the Department of Education. Now that's going to take considerable time to plan it out and see if it is possible to reorganize it all under the Board of Education, if you truly wish to give them the full autonomy as is the intent of both Stand. Com. Rep. Nos. 154 and 155.

"And as for the tax revenue, there's never been a discussion on the projection of the tax revenues. How much will be the Board be assessing and getting for the public school system? That tax projection has never been discussed or projected out to say that we ought to be giving the Board of Education tax authority. Because of these ambiguities and unanswered questions, I would advance the bill, with reservations, hoping that if these things don't get answered, that we kill these bills. However, we should continue to discuss reforming the public school system. Thank you."

Representative Fox rose to speak in opposition to the measures, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm in opposition to these two measures that we're discussing, Stand. Com Rep. Nos. 154 and 155. According to the committee report on Stand. Com. 154, with this measure, the BOE will be able to focus on the educational needs of Hawaii without being constrained by the fiscal requirements of the rest of the State.

"Mr. Speaker, I find that sentence absolutely frightening. The idea that we would start making tax policy in the State without any reference to the fiscal requirements of the rest of the State, is exactly why we have to keep authority over taxes within the Legislature while granting them as much autonomy as possible to the running of the school systems. The control over how much money is pulled out of the pockets of the people of Hawaii to support government has to remain with the elected body, the legislature. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ito rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of HB 1303 and its accompanying bill, HB 1302. These two bills are not reorganization bills. Mr. Speaker, under the provisions of these bills, the DOE will no longer be a part of the Executive Branch, and would be both fiscally and administratively independent.

"HB 1303 also creates a committee to ensure a smooth transition for the DOE. This bill presents a bold new vision for governing education in Hawaii. The DOE would have complete fiscal autonomy that would enable the Department to establish a much more effective system of accountability. As the governing body of the Department, the Board of Education would be able to control both the funding and policy making, and would no longer be restricted by the State's other financial obligations. For this reason, I ask my colleagues for their support of these dynamic and worthy bills. Thank you Mr. Speaker."

Representative Case rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to both measures. I'm reluctant to rise in opposition to a bold and innovative bill because I like it when such bills cross our floor to debate and I certainly know the Education Chair to be a bold and innovative kind of guy.

"But I think there are two basic fundamental policy problems with this approach. The first problem was already alluded to by the Minority Leader earlier. It's <u>our</u> job. It is our job in the Legislature to determine and prioritize state resources. It is <u>our</u> job to decide whether the education community should have more resources or less resources relative to the rest of the state.

"And the reason that we should have to do that, and the reason that we do it, is because it is also our job to collect revenues and to determine the effect of those revenues on the overall economy of the state and to fairly allocate that revenue base over the people of this state.

"And if we do not have control, if we do not have the ability to inter-relate that principle with budgetary items which consume fully one-third of our general fund or more, we are not going to be able to do our jobs, and we cannot do our jobs. And I would go a step further and say that I think the message of this bill, fundamentally, is that we don't want to do our jobs. We don't want to worry about that portion of the general fund, which is really the portion for education. What we really want to do is turn that over to the education community and let them worry about it and leave us the other two-thirds.

"That is not the way to go. If our decision here is that education is getting an insufficient amount of resources in this State, then let's either take the resources from somewhere else, explain that to the public, and say that we decided to divert resources to the education community. Or let's fairly debate revenue enhancement measures, if my colleagues want to do that here on the floor. But let's not basically avoid our responsibility by giving this over to the education community. That's a bad move in terms of over-all philosophy.

"The second thing that I want to address is the comment by the Education Chair that this would increase accountability in the education community. I don't think that that's true. I think that when you turn over tax authority to one particular community who has only one goal here, to provide education, I don't see where that enhances that community's incentive to provide for efficiencies within that community if they can easily turn to a revenue generating mechanism. I don't see where the incentive is for them not to go there. In fact, we have major problems in education, many of which are due to inefficiency and administration, and I think that the only thing that keeps the lid somewhat on that situation is that the Legislature keeps on saying to the education community, 'You've got to operate this thing a little more efficiently.' And if we haven't been doing a sufficient job of that, then that is where we should go.

"But turning this responsibility over to the education community is not going to make that community more efficient, and neither is it going to keep that community focussed on the expenses and administration side. They're going to go straight to the revenue side. I think that that is going to be a mistake for the education community as well as for the rest of the state. Thank you."

Representative Meyer rose to speak in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representatives Case and Fox be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

"Thank you Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to these two measures and would ask that the words of the Representatives from Manoa and Waikiki be entered into the Journal as if they were my own. And I would just like to add a few words, and the word I would use is not 'bold,' but 'scary.'

"When we live in a state that has some of the highest taxes in the entire nation, we don't need another taxing authority who has to worry about nothing but raising revenues for their single job. Thank You Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stonebraker rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition of Stand. Com. Rep. Nos. 154 and 155. As we're here giving birth to the fourth branch of government. We're in labor. You can feel the labor pains. And in the report it says that the purpose is to amend the State Constitution, which is a bold move in itself. But it says that it would be enabling a political subdivision of the State, the Department of Education. And this is enabling a group to levy

up to 9% on all tangible property. This, in my opinion, is a slap in the face of the taxpayers of Hawaii. It says that they're not paying enough now.

"On one side I'm torn, because if this measure passed, it would ensure a Republican Majority in 2002. But at the same time it mentions that this is very difficult, in the third paragraph of the report. It's very difficult to establish a clear line of accountability in the DOE under the present scheme.

"Speaking of schemes, this bill proposes as a constitutional amendment: BOE total fiscal autonomy. Talk about lack a of accountability. I think that this measure is insane and I hope it dies."

Representative Thielen rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

"The one important thing we need to emphasize about this bill, is that it does provide for complete immunity on the part of our lifeguards. This is somewhat a 'Catch 22' situation. And all of the members should understand that the Committee did deliberate at length on whether or not we should include in the bill immunity except for those cases where there was negligence or gross negligence, or wanton disregard, or wanton neglect.

"The problem here, Mr. Speaker, is that if we included that language, then the counties and the State would be subjected to suits and in all probability, would need to render payment, because it is so very difficult to prove that one is not negligent, even grossly negligent.

"And so what it comes down to, if we included that language of negligence or gross negligence, we would end up not having lifeguards on the beaches. And not having lifeguards on the beaches would mean we would continue to lose more lives. Without that qualifying language, and we thought in Committee that initially that that would be a responsible approach, that the State and the counties should demonstrate a degree of responsibility by inserting in the bill immunity except for negligence or gross negligence. But if we did, we would continue to lose lives because the counties and the State would not have lifeguards. And it's a terrible situation. It may seem ironic and it is, that having that provision would end up that we would lose more lives.

"So I ask the members, especially as we move this bill on to Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, that that be considered. It is absolutely necessary, that this bill be passed out in the current form. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representatives Arakaki and Kahikina, for the Committee on Health and the Committee on Human Services and Housing presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 176) recommending that H.B. No. 411, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 411, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PRESCRIPTION DRUGS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

Representatives Arakaki and Kahikina, for the Committee on Health and the Committee on Human Services and Housing presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 177) recommending that H.B. No. 91, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 91, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR RESPITE CARE SERVICES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 178) recommending that H.B. No. 282, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 282, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE COUNCIL ON DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 179) recommending that H.B. No. 646, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. 646, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative Stonebraker rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, if I could register my reservations on Stand. Com. Rep. No. 179, regarding the syringes? It's just a concern of mine that if we flood the public arena with syringes, the question remains: Where would they end up? On the beaches and public parks?' It's just a health issue. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 646, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE SALE OF STERILE SYRINGES FOR THE PREVENTION OF DISEASE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 180) recommending that H.B. No. 699, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 699, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SUBSTANCE ABUSE TESTING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 181) recommending that H.B. No. 1075, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. 1075, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative McDermott rose to speak in opposition to the measure:

"Mr. Speaker, this deals with facial tattoos - primarily, permanent eyeliner and permanent lip liner. I think those things should be applied by a plastic surgeon and not just a cosmetic or tattoo artist because it is so sensitive around the eyes. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1075, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TATTOO ARTISTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, with Representative McDermott voting no.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 182) recommending that H.B. No. 85, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 85, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAREGIVERS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 183) recommending that H.B. No. 917, pass Second Reading and be referred jointly to the Committees on Consumer Protection and Commerce and Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 917, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CLINICAL SOCIAL WORKERS," passed Second Reading and was referred jointly to the Committees on Consumer Protection and Commerce and Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 184) recommending that H.B. No. 945, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 945, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SOCIAL WORK," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 185) recommending that H.B. No. 1306, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1306, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BIRTH DEFECTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Abinsay, for the Committee on Agriculture presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 186) recommending that H.B. No. 1323, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Water and Land Use.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. 1323, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Water and Land Use, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative Gomes rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is a measure that deals with the Kailua Reservoir in Waimanalo. First, I want to thank the Agriculture Chair and the Chair of Water and Land Use. For the Agriculture Chair for hearing this matter in the first place and for the Chair of Water and Land Use for recognizing the importance and passing it on to Finance in time for the First Lateral.

"Members, this is the situation in Waimanalo. It's an earthen dam that, for almost two decades now, two departments, the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Land and Natural Resources have had, at least from the public's perspective, battled over who has jurisdiction, and who has responsibility to maintain this reservoir, and who has responsibility to keep it up to date and to operate it in the event of heavy rains and floods -- potential floods.

"However, while that discussion has been ongoing between the various departments and bureaucrats, people that live immediately below the reservoir, have had to deal with the fact that no one was taking care of the reservoir. And in the event of heavy rains, the reservoir flooded-over, inundated adjoining property and threatened lives and livestock.

"Mr. Speaker, this measure is very important and I would urge the Chair of the Finance Committee and the Finance Committee members to take a good hard look and to provide the appropriate funds that are needed to maintain and repair

and preserve this reservoir. This will prevent, if we do it correctly, exposing lives and property to great harm and it will also, Mr. Speaker, address a concern that has been festering in the community because the community, at this point, sees government as the enemy. And that should not be the case. They've come to us as a last resort to help them with this matter. So, for those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I stand in support and urge our members to support it as well. Thank you very much."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1323, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Water and Land Use.

Representative Hamakawa, for the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 187) recommending that H.B. No. 1001, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1001, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GARNISHMENT," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Hamakawa, for the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 188) recommending that H.B. No. 168, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. 168, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative Fox rose to speak in support of the measure, with reservations, stating:

"The composition of the task force is pretty heavily stacked against the minority. It's the way it's put together. Representation from the Governor, from the Speaker and from the President of the Senate adds up to seven members of the majority and then there's provision for two minority members.

"So, I'm a little concerned about the weight on that. If you look at the Elections Commission, the group that picks the head of the Office of Elections, that's a much more balanced ratio. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 168, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTIONS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Hamakawa, for the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 189) recommending that H.B. No. 462, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 462, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIFORM ARBITRATION ACT," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Hamakawa, for the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 190) recommending that H.B. No. 1516, as amended in

HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1516, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ATTORNEY'S FEES FOR APPOINTED COUNSEL," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Hiraki, for the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 191) recommending that H.B. No. 586, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 586, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE CONVERSION OF PROFESSIONAL AND VOCATIONAL LICENSES," passed Second Reading, and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Hiraki, for the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 192) recommending that H.B. No. 653, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 653, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT INSURANCE BENEFITS," passed Second Reading, and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representatives Hiraki and Hamakawa, for the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce and the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 193) recommending that H.B. No. 201, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the joint report of the Committees be adopted and that H.B. 201, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative Case rose in opposition to the measure, and stated that he would reserve his remarks until Third Reading.

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to express some reservations on Stand. Com. Rep. No. 193, H.B. No. 201. This bill was to delay the effective date of the Privacy of Health Care Information Act, Act 87, of Session Laws of Hawaii 1999. I have reservations because the State medical privacy bill has had opposition from many sectors of the medical and insurance community. I think we should consider repealing this law rather than putting it off yet a second time. Thank you."

Representative Gomes rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think that the Privacy Act, should be repealed rather than extended for a number of reasons. Primarily among them is the fact that we do have a federal statute that's coming on line soon. Companies and entities that have to deal with that statute are already spending money and planning time to prepare for that federal Act and they shouldn't have to be taxed with possibly planning for a State Act as well. So for those reasons, Mr. Speaker, thank you."

Representative Pendleton rose to speak in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representatives Marumoto and Gomes be inserted in the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

"My concern has to do with the tremendous amount of expense and time companies may have to expend to prepare for this. Because when they look for a bill that may become law, their attorneys have to get them geared up even though it's 2004. They still have a standard of practice that the attorneys have to follow to get their clients prepared for a law which may become law. I think it would probably be best for us to just repeal it outright at this point and to allow the Feds to handle this issue."

Representative Hiraki rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"With the advent of the electronic age and the increased role of the Internet, concerns are raised in the United States about how private health care information was being handled. On the federal level, the federal government passed in August 1996, the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 which they called HIPAA.

"The purpose of HIPAA was to streamline costs through standardization. A component of HIPAA discussed security and privacy of protected health information. The proposed rules through the various parts of HIPAA were published in the federal register from May 1998 to August 1998. During this time, a record number of comments were received on these privacy proposed rules. The final privacy proposed rules were published just recently on December 28th, the year 2000. And with comments taking up over a thousand pages of reading, it will become effective on February 26, 2003.

"Concurrently with the federal government's attempt to look at medical privacy, the Hawaii Legislature passed in 1999, Act 87, which established that individuals have a legal right to privacy with respect to personal health information and with respect to information about their medical care and health status. Act 87 imposes this complex scheme of notification, authorization, and extensive record keeping for personal medical information, enforced by pretty severe civil and criminal penalties.

"During the 1999 passage of Act 87, and during the 2000 Legislative Session, no major opposition to Act 87 appeared. In fact, during the 2000 Legislative Session, only two minor amendments were made despite the fact that these proposed rules were being published and contained federal preemption provisions. However, when the law finally became effective in the State of Hawaii, chaos ensued. For whatever reason employers, or workers' compensation carriers, etc. finally took a look at Act 87 and realized it may apply to them. Act 87 effectively caused a general disruption of routine business practices. By August, a Special Session of the Legislature enacted a one-year moratorium on the law to allow time for more amendments to be made. So during the interim, the summer and fall of 2000, the Office of Information Practices set up a Task Force to amend Act 87.

"The Task Force prepared a 76-page report which attempts to make Act 87 more workable, Mr. Speaker. However consensus on what these provisions would be were difficult to reach. And in fact, a dissenting report was also issued as part of this Task Force report. As previously mentioned, the privacy rules were published on December 28, 2000 and become effective on February 26, 2003. With the new development, many Task Force members have withdrawn their support for the Task Force report and are requesting Act 87's delay or repeal.

"The question posed before us then is this: Which course should the Hawaii State Legislature take given that HIPAA's privacy rules just came out in the late part of December of the year 2000?' Mr. Speaker, sometime in the future we may find it necessary for whatever reason to repeal or amend Act 87. However, at this point in time Mr. Speaker, the prudent course of action should be the delay on Act 87 to the year 2004 which is over a year past the effective date of the federal HIPAA to determine if Act 87, in whole or in part, would be necessary, preempted, or become redundant with the implementation of the federal law.

"With the new Administration and the new Congress in place, there was already talk of repeal or amendment to this federal law. So essentially what you have, Mr. Speaker, is a federal law becoming almost like a moving target. And it's very difficult for the states, at this point, to kind of understand what the law will look like in the year 2003. Given the complexity and anticipated changes, for us to claim that we understand HIPAA and all it's consequences is really, at this point and time, unfounded. We must fully understand the federal privacy rules, with all its one thousand pages of comments, before discarding Act 87.

"Again, it has just been over a month since the federal privacy rules were published. At this time, delaying the effective date of Act 87 is, Mr. Speaker, the most prudent course of action. Some might say, 'Well, why not repeal Act 87 and just enact another law in the future?' The simple answer, Mr. Speaker, is that it is much more difficult to enact new legislation than it is to amend a law that is already on the books. While HIPAA is being implemented, the best course of action is to follow what is being done in the rest of the country, and that is to just wait and see. This can only be accomplished by postponing the effective date of this Act. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 201, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PRIVACY OF HEALTH CARE INFORMATION ACT," passed Second Reading, and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading, with Representatives Case and Pendleton voting no.

Representative Hamakawa, for the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 194) recommending that H.B. No. 1004, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1004, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ORIGINAL JURISDICTION OF THE HAWAII SUPREME COURT," passed Second Reading, and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Hamakawa, for the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 195) recommending that H.B. No. 523, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 523, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE OF LAW," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Hamakawa, for the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 196) recommending that H.B. No. 1538, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1538, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIFORM CHILD-CUSTODY JURISDICTION AND ENFORCEMENT ACT," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Morita, for the Committee on Energy and Environmental Protection presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 197) recommending that H.B. No. 369, as amended in HD 1, be recommitted to the Committee on Energy and Environmental Protection.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Lee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 369, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RECYCLING," was recommitted to the Committee on Energy and Environmental Protection.
