INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

The following concurrent resolutions (H.C.R. Nos. 1 and 2) were announced by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

H.C.R. No. 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RELATING TO RECESS DAYS FOR THE REGULAR SESSION OF 2006," relating to the mandatory recess for the Regular Session of 2006, determined to be the 23rd, 24th, 27th, and 28th days of February and the 1st day of March, 2006; and the dates of the recesses, other than the dates of the mandatory recess, for the Regular Session of 2006, determined to be the 24th and 26th days of January, the 6th, 8th, and 29th days of March, the 10th and 12th days of April, and the 1st and 3rd days of May of 2006, pursuant to Article III, Section 10 of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, was jointly offered by Representatives M. Oshiro and Finnegan.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Finnegan and carried, H.C.R. No. 1 was adopted.

H.C.R. No. 2, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE GOVERNOR TO ADDRESS THE LEGISLATURE ASSEMBLED IN JOINT SESSION," on the 23rd of January at 10:00 a.m., was jointly offered by Representatives Say, Takai, M. Oshiro, and Finnegan.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Finnegan and carried, H.C.R. No. 2 was adopted.

At 10:49 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At this time, the members of the House, their guests and audience were entertained by the Society of Seven Las Vegas

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:11 o'clock a.m.

At this time the Speaker delivered his address, stating:

"Mahalo, S.O.S. Las Vegas for today's electrifying entertainment. Please join me in thanking our performers today. And please join me in expressing our appreciation to the Filipino community as it celebrates this 100th Anniversary in Hawaii.

"We are also deeply honored today, that the father of former Representative Ben Cabreros is with us. Mr. Juan Santanela Cabreros is a *sakada*. The first group of Filipinos to come to Hawaii a century ago. His humble beginning was a start of a great migration that now find Filipinos on the verge of becoming the largest ethnic group here in the State of Hawaii.

"Ben, ask Papa to wave his hands. Papa, raise your hand for the audience and the Members of the House.

"Also with us are Elias Beniga and Angel Ramos. They are also decedents of *sakada*. Please join me in giving them a warm welcome. Elias and Angel.

"Governor Lingle, honored guests, members, ladies and gentlemen Aloha. Welcome to the opening of the 2006 Session of the Hawaii State Legislature."

"You know, most parents work hard trying to make life better for their kids; better than it was for us when we were growing up. The value of doing this is taught by almost every religion and culture on this planet. And for all of us, I believe this is called stewardship. We must be good stewards today, to build a better Hawaii for tomorrow.

"We are facing a big challenge as a nation, and as a state. But our people are looking for real leadership. Our ability to be good stewards will be tested in a different way this year – for all of us as Members of the House. In many ways, this year will be a very defining moment in Hawaii's history.

"Why? For the first time in 14 years, we begin our deliberations today with a budget surplus. So instead of trying to figure out what to cut and what to say "no" to, we are in a very different set of challenges. Let's call it today, the \$600 million question. No one seems to have much trouble coming up with an answer to that question. All of us this afternoon will find, there's a long line of people with answers.

"We need to take a collective breath, a deep breath and think hard before we decide what to do. As good stewards, we know we carry a significant responsibility on our shoulders. And we must make the right choices. Why? Because we may not have another chance like this for a long, long time; when you reflect and think about it. Each one of us must choose, and we must choose wisely.

"Cutting taxes is an easy thing to do and maybe that's what we'll decide to do at the end of the day. \$300 million is a lot of money, but when you add up your share of the refund, what do you get? Enough extra money to buy another loco-moco or a plate lunch every week? If you add it up, it may.

"Or else, think about what else we could accomplish with that money. I always say, think about our kids sitting in a classroom where the roof is leaking, without a decent cafeteria, without enough books in the library. Think about our harbors that are falling apart. Think about the water we need to grow our own food. Maybe you think we should continue to import 90 percent of the food and energy we use every year. Think about how much money you need to buy a house. Most of all, think about the future our kids will inherit if we don't make the right choices.

"The world is changing fast. But right now we have, we have, the opportunity to invent our future. We have the means to do it. We have the brains, the heart, and the strength to do it. And now we also have the money. But, do, do we have the will? That is the question I pose to the Members of this House.

"Let's start in the classroom where our future begins. We do have a big backlog, a huge backlog of school repairs. I respect the Governor in wanting to spend \$63 million to fix our schools. But personally, it's not enough. It's not enough. We need twice that amount, and we need it now to get our schools back up to par.

"We know, that we want to be good stewards. But to build a better Hawaii, we must make the quality of our public schools the number one priority. We need to listen to the rising tide of voices in Hawai'i that they demand that we get our priorities straight.

"We started on the right track two years ago when we did pass comprehensive education reform. We gave principals and teachers, the power to make decisions at the school, and inside the classroom. We raised teacher salaries. Now let's finish the job by fixing our public school buildings this year. This is our highest priority. And we propose, all of us as Members of the House propose, spending a \$150 million to fix our schools.

"At the University of Hawaii, we will provide the additional \$85 million to undertake repair and maintenance of our campus buildings. Our kids deserve better and now we have the means to do it. As good stewards, we can do no less.

"But our schools are more than just places to learn. They are critical shelters for emergencies. It's not a question of if, but when, another hurricane strikes Hawaii again. Personally, we can't rely on the federal government to help us out. And Katrina taught us that

lesson. When it comes to trouble, we need to stand on our own. The sooner we act on that knowledge, the better it is for all of us.

"So when we fix our public schools, we need to strengthen these school buildings for public shelter in an emergency. We need to make sure that adequate shelter is provided for our animals as well. We saw what happened again in New Orleans as thousands of people refused to leave their homes, because there was no place to take their family pet.

"Government must set the standard for good stewardship. Our schools, and other public buildings should be models, for renewable energy also. The people of Hawaii have waited too long for a real energy policy. A policy with long-term incentives, for renewable energy – may it be wind, solar, geothermal and bio-fuels.

"Living green is now the new 'red white and blue.' There is no reason that Hawaii shouldn't lead the way in demonstrating what can be done by living green.

"The traditions of our culture are wide and deep. They teach us that we are more than just the sum of our parts. Our culture is rooted in the land. And here is our stewardship for the future. Our open lands and green spaces are a big part of what makes Hawaii a very special place. Last year, we took a bold step in establishing the Legacy Lands program. This program protects our most precious resources for future generations. As good stewards, we must increase the funding for our Legacy Lands that we have presently.

"You've seen it on television; you've seen it on the media. Waimea Valley showed all of us what can be done when public and private groups work together. Today, I call on all private landowners to join us as good stewards of the land. We must help the farmers who grow food on our land and restore the precious water system that supports our very way of life.

"Private landowners must learn the wisdom of leaving the land better off than they found it. Private landowners must stop treating our farmers as short-term tenants and private landowners must join us in the public-private partnership to fix our irrigation systems. We will help you to make those repairs. We recognize that it's in our common interest to do this. But in exchange for our help, we would like to insist that the adjacent areas to those irrigation systems be designated as Important Agricultural Lands.

"I listen to farmers; I listen to business forecasters. They both agree: Diversified agriculture is a wave Hawaii can ride into the future. Nobody should feel safe knowing that we now import almost all our foods. We need to grow local. And local it shall be as we move into the future. All around our Islands, groups of farmers are breaking new ground in diversifying agriculture; but they need private landowners to give them more than just a one-year lease. It's hard to grow a business when you don't know what your future on the land will be.

"Good stewards look out for the land and they also look out for the people living on the land. And so, housing is a big problem. We all know that. We intend to help solve it also. Right now, working men and women are getting squeezed out. They can't buy. They can't afford to rent and our homeless population is growing and they need our help.

"Let me be honest with you. I couldn't afford to buy my home today at the price the County says it's worth.

"To help our Island's working men and women, we will increase funding for public-private partnerships to build more affordable housing and rentals over the next five years. Our five-year-goal is to put ten-thousand new affordable homes on the market.

"Good stewards know that the promise of a brighter future is the greatest legacy we can leave to our children. For the first time in our

history, we have the opportunity to create new businesses and better paying jobs that don't hurt our environment. We have worked for a long time to build new industries that complement and respect Hawaii's natural resources and beauty. Now we are at a tipping-point and the opportunities for our children's future hang in the balance. We are in a position to realize the payoff in new jobs being created in life sciences, community healthcare, digital media, advanced technology, telecommunications, ocean sciences, and alternative energy.

"We, as this House, will envision a \$100 million innovation fund to stimulate economic development in these areas. But it's not enough just to give out the money. To make sure that we achieve the results, we will put project funding in the hands of the experts. And we will create a public-private partnership to provide business and marketing assistance to the projects that are approved. The bottom line for this fund is better paying jobs for our future *keiki o ka aina*. The bottom line for this investment is when a local parent can turn to a son or daughter and say, 'You don't have to leave the Islands to have a decent future.'

"Can we achieve this? I believe we can. In fact, it's already happening, here in this State. Today we have some unsung heroes of this new success, sitting with us today. You know, we don't always remember how important it is to celebrate our success. So I want you to meet them this morning. Maybe you noticed them earlier. And I think they were answering their e-mails on their 'Blackberries' while I was speaking, but that's okay.

"I wanted to introduce you to Dustin Shindo of Hoku Scientific - who was here earlier. His company is doing pioneering work in cell membrane research. Dustin was in the Chamber, but he told me he had to close the deal. And I said, 'That's great.' I know we all wish him good luck in closing that deal.

"Hoku Scientific is a great example of Hawaii's potential for homegrown ingenuity. Dustin, and his former Waiakea High School classmate, Kaleo Taft, developed an effective technology for fuel membrane research. Dustin and Kaleo successfully launched their company's Initial Public Offering just last year.

"Randy Cates. Randy raises Moi. Hard to believe he raises Moi. But Randy's company is the first aquaculture firm in the nation to be granted an open-ocean leasing agreement to raise fish in submerged cages offshore. Hawaiian culture recognizes the Moi as the fish of the Ali'i. Thanks to Randy, it's now being raised and exported across the United States for everyone's enjoyment.

"My good friend Hank Wuh, is the founder and CEO of Cellular Bioengineering. This Iolani graduate recently received the "2005 R&D 100 Award" for the development of the Neural Matrix Chip. The chip that Hank and his brilliant team at CBI developed was rated one of the hundred most significant innovations in the United States last year.

"Vaughn Vasconcellos is president and CEO of Akimeka, LLC. This Kamehameha Schools graduate served in the United States Army for fifteen years before starting his own high tech company. Akimeka has operations on Maui and here in Honolulu. One of the most important things is their electronic-based health services that help keep our military safe.

"Dr. Richard Diverse. Richard, Director of Instrument Research for Plain Sight Systems, chose to remain in Hawaii and build his company on the Big Island. This UH Hilo graduate is responsible for the development of an entirely new class of instruments based on optical domain computation for chemical measurement. I have to be honest with you, Richard, I have no idea what it is. But Richard's device will soon become the gold standard for this technology.

"Next, Dr. Anton Krucky, CEO of Tissue Genesis. Dr. Krucky is developing tissue replacement products to improve survival rates for

trauma injuries, cardiovascular diseases, cancer and metabolic diseases. Dr. Krucky moved his business to Kaka'ako to work more closely with the new medical school. Tissue Genesis invented a Biooptimization System, as a way of creating an engineered environment for cell and tissue growth.

"Finally, Myron Thompson and Robin Danner are the driving forces behind Hawaiian Homestead Technology. Their company does top level work in digital imaging. The people who work for Hawaiian Homestead Technology come from Anahola, Waimanalo and Papakolea Homesteads. In less than a year, these workers have learned new skills and landed new jobs with a future. And most important, these good technology jobs are helping economically challenged Native Hawaiian communities. The profits from Homestead Technology are invested back into the community.

"Please join me, all of you, in expressing our appreciation and support for these pioneers of Hawaii's new innovation economy.

"Our guest, and all of us here today, share a common belief; that in the rush toward technology, we can never lose sight of the human person. We will not undertake these challenges just so we can boast of having a bigger economy. We're doing this to raise the standard of living for everyone. We are doing this to make good on our commitment as good stewards today who will build a better Hawaii for tomorrow. We must build this society and our educational system to maximize our people's ability to innovate, export and compete.

"My heart tells me the best is yet to come for Hawaii. My heart tells me our people will soon be doing even greater things. My heart tells me we will rise to the challenge. And along with all of you, I am grateful to be here and see it happen. Aloha and Mahalo."

The Chair then recognized Representative Finnegan, the Minority Leader, to present the Minority's response.

Representative Finnegan rose and stated:

"Thank you Mr. Speaker.

"Aloha and Mabuhay, Mr. Speaker, collegues, and guests. Mr. Speaker, thank you for recognizing the Centennial of the Filipino sakada, or farmer, and the contributions Filipinos have made in Hawaii. I was fortunate to accompany the Governor on her Hawaii-Philippines mission trip. It was an enriching experience that helped me re-live, reflect, and understand my own family's Philippine origin.

"Please allow me this opportunity to introduce two people who have shaped my life. Behind me is my mother Francisca Suan Ledesma. My mother was born on Moloka'i, a daughter of a pineapple field worker that came here from the island of Cebu in the Philippines. No stranger to hard manual labor, for years, my mother worked at a charcoal farm doing whatever it took to keep the business going. It often meant carrying 5-, 25-, and sometimes 50-pound bags of charcoal while covered in black soot.

"And this is my father, Douglas McArthur Quejas Berbano. He was born and raised in a family of very humble means in Aparri, Cagayan. My father applied to the United States Navy every week for a year. Two years after his initial application, the Navy informed him that he would be a United States Navy Sailor. After serving his country, my dad worked 12-hour days in construction, 6 to 7 days a week, also taking side jobs whenever time permitted.

"Over the years I've watched my mom and dad struggle to provide a better life for our family. Because of their hard work and perseverance, we progressed from a small apartment in Kuhio Park Terrace, to a rental in Pearl City, to realizing home ownership in a 4bedroom townhouse in Uluwehi, Waianae. "I know that my parents' way of life and their hard work ethic are familiar and common to many people in Hawaii. I often wondered why people of Hawaii's threshold for taxes are so high.

"In reflecting since my return from the Philippines, I believe I've uncovered a reason. Hawaii's people are generous and sacrificial people. As I have pointed out, my parents are examples of the willingness to sacrifice of themselves to make better lives for others. This is an aspect of Hawaii that makes it a wonderful place to live.

"If you ask my father today what he would do with Hawaii's tax surplus, he would probably say, 'Help the homeless or improve education.' Notice that there would be no request for personal benefits or rewards. This is a man whose body is tired and worn. He should be retired, but instead he works a full time janitorial job in order to make ends meet. I couldn't be prouder.

"This is exactly why your Republican Caucus is focusing on pursuing the tax relief issue this session. Sure - you have heard this mantra before from Republicans, however, it could not have more relevance than it does today. The hardworking citizens of Hawaii have shouldered the crippling load in our high tax; high cost of living State and they definitely deserve a break.

"We have prepared legislation to increase the standard deduction, eliminate the general excise tax on food purchases and medical services, and create a long-term care tax credit among other tax relief measures to help Hawaii's families. We stand ready to review budgetary requests to ensure that they are reasonable, effective and deliver results.

"We must be mindful of the "baby boom" generation that will retire in the next few years, leaving a substantial hole in the workforce. This group will depend on young workers and the government to assist them through their golden years. Baby boomers supported the economy through strong and weak times for many years and we must not repay them by robbing their already fixed incomes.

"We are seeking tax breaks not just for those who are retired or approaching retirement. We must also consider the young workers responsible for carrying us into the future. With the high price of real estate, today's young adults feel there is no hope for homeownership. The message we're sending, regardless of intent, is 'That's the price of paradise; take it or leave it.' As leaders of this State, we must give them a fighting chance to raise their families here at home. Considering the challenges our youth face, can we honestly say we're doing a good job?

"Hawaii is not conducive to starter families. Many who wish to marry and raise their children here are faced with the ultimate dilemma: struggle to stay afloat in the islands or leave in search of a more affordable place to live? Let's ease the stress on these families by returning their hard-earned money in the form of tax relief.

"College graduates quickly discover the harsh realities of living in Hawaii upon receiving their first paycheck. No matter what the chosen profession, be it teachers, hotel workers, doctors, bus drivers, lawyers, or small business owners - no one is exempt from the financial obligations of a growing government.

"Few make enough money to purchase homes. They work day to day and sometimes cannot see the light at the end of the tunnel. Growing up we had an expression for that hopeless feeling and it was 'kill fight'.

"With the walls closing in on Hawaii residents due to the skyrocketing property taxes and substantially increased rents, people can barely keep their checking accounts out of the red. But if we weren't bad enough, next year we will realize one of the largest tax increases in our history with a more than 12% increase in the General Excise Tax.

"When is enough - enough? When we drive out Hawaii's best and brightest to other lands for better opportunities? When we do not have enough of a workforce to support our growing elderly population? When we have to work 2 or 3 jobs just to make ends meet, leaving our children to fall into wrong hands and dangerous situations? When people have so little they become consumed by their desperation and we lose the war on crime, the war on drugs, the war on domestic violence? Odds are you know people in these situations

"To the Legislature's credit, initiatives were made to address all of these problems. However, we often ignore the foundational fiscal problem of over taxation.

"Some say, "What about education?" Your House Republicans support quality schools and a learning environment for our children. But, we must also be prudent and realistic. There is over half a billion dollars currently appropriated to attack the repair and maintenance of our educational buildings and grounds. Appropriating more money, in and of itself, will not repair buildings any faster until we streamline the process of completing the work and paying for it. Let's not allow money to sit and do nothing.

"Some say, 'What about the poor; those who need our help the most?" Hawaii is known for even taxing them. This group really needs immediate tax relief. They also need other measures like innovative programs in addition to raising the standard of need for government assistance. Yesterday, the Department of Human Services held a press conference explaining how they've been handcuffed from spending \$35 million for programs aimed at assisting children and families with needs or who are at risk.

"There is no better time to take action than now. Hawaii's generous people will continue to give. Our government will continue to take. Republicans are ready to invest in people by letting them keep more of their hard-earned money. Mr. Speaker and colleagues, your Republicans, though just 10 of 51 in this House, are passionate, dedicated, and we are ready to work in concert with you for tax relief. Or we are willing to roll up our sleeves for the uphill battle this Session on behalf of Hawaii's people so they can reach the unreachable star.

"Mahalo, Maraming Salamat Po, and God bless."

The Chair then recognized Representative M. Oshiro, the Majority Leader, who rose and responded:

"Thank you Mr. Speaker. Before I embark upon my remarks, Mr. Speaker, I would like to take this opportunity for all of us to recognize the sacrifices of the past and the present of our Armed Services. I look around the room, Mr. Speaker, and I notice there are many, many here who are either retired, have family members, or loved one, serving right now overseas. So, let us recognize them. Any of you seated here in the gallery or on the floor, who are members of our Armed Forces, active or retired, National Guards or Reserves. Please rise to be recognized by very grateful and humble people. Mr. Speaker.

"Thank you Mr. Speaker. Aloha Governor Lingle, Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. Aiona, Congressman Abercrombie, Congressman and Mrs. Case, Chief Justice Moon, OHA Board Chair Apoliona, Mayor and Mrs. Hannemann, Mayors Kim and Arakawa, Council Chair Dela Cruz, former Governor and Mrs. Ariyoshi, former Governor and Mrs. Waihee, former Lieutenant Governor Hirono, Associate Justices of the Hawaii Supreme Court, distinguished guests, colleagues, friends and families.

"It is indeed an honor to stand in this Chamber today, to share the highlights of the Democratic Caucus with you and the people of Hawaii"

"First, let me say that I too thoroughly enjoyed today's entertainment. Celebrating the anniversaries of immigrants to Hawaii is a very special part of who we are as a people. In some way or another, we are all immigrants to Hawaii and share a common appreciation of our forefathers and early arrivals to these shores.

"You see Mr. Speaker, whether you trace your roots to the first Polynesian voyagers, European explorers or Missionaries, Chinese or Japanese field hands, or Portuguese or Korean laborers, we are all bound together by a common heritage of people in search of a home and a better life for their children and themselves.

"As I look across the gallery of the sea of multi-ethnic faces, men and women who have descended from immigrant families and who are now our community, government, and business leaders, I wonder how many states, in our great nation, have opened their legislature, their sessions honoring their ethnic diversity? How lucky we are to live in a place where diversity is celebrated. Indeed, Dr. Martin Luther King would have been proud of what Hawaii is and proud of what Hawaii is becoming. Indeed, Hawaii is No Ka Oi.

"Mr. Speaker, today, on behalf of the Democratic Caucus, let me congratulate all of those of Filipino ancestry, including my colleagues and members of our Filipino Caucus -- Representatives Abinsay, Berg, Cabanilla, Finnegan, Magaoay, Pine, and Sonson. To all Filipinos and Filipinos at heart, I say 'Aloha' and 'Mabuhay'. 'Mabuhay' to Filipinos in Hawaii, '100 Years and Beyond.'

"Those last two words, 'and Beyond', Mr. Speaker, are important. If we truly honor the 100 years of the past -- all the blood, sweat, and tears, hardship, loss, and sacrifice, of the generations that came before us -- we must be as responsible as they were to save and invest for a better future, to think about the next generation, and to work together for that most promising tomorrow.

"Mr. Speaker, Hawaii has passed through some rough waters over the past 15 years. We have shown our grit and resolve by withstanding the challenges of the Persian-Gulf War, the SARS Epidemic, and the terrorist attacks of 9/11. It was during these challenging and uncertain times that your Democratic Legislature made prudent budgetary and policy decisions to create the large surplus we enjoy today.

"Indeed, under the exemplary leadership of Speaker Emeritus Joseph Souki, yourself as former Chair of the House Finance Committee, and the current Finance Chair Dwight Takamine, we remained committed to the common good and forged sound public policy that provides us today with a \$600 million surplus. Mr. Speaker, I only wish that Governor Cayetano was here, so that I could publicly thank him and give credit where credit is due.

"For my freshmen colleagues, Mr. Speaker, let me remind each of you that this surplus did not come easy. And it did not come fast. There were no free lunches. But we kept the faith in each other, and together as a community of one people, one *Ohana*, one State, we weathered these storms.

"Now that the state economy is booming -- thanks to the strong foundation built in the past and the sacrifices of all of us, we have a budget surplus that presents us with a great opportunity. It is a great opportunity with an even greater responsibility.

"Mr. Speaker, we are an island state subject to the global winds of fortune that no man can assure. And, if we are not wise in preserving our resources and developing new initiatives, we will be dangerously dependent on others for our well-being. We will lose our most precious privilege – the freedom and independence to direct our own

future, the ability to chart our own course, to be the master of our own destiny, to be steersman of our own canoe.

"Last year, your Majority Caucus focused on achieving and maintaining 'quality of life' for all who are blessed to call Hawaii home. Working with a broad base of stakeholders, who were successful in passing landmark legislation to preserve Hawaii's most precious resources and protect our important agricultural lands for farming. We addressed the critical issues facing our State from education to health care to public transportation.

"This year, we set our sights on investing in the future. We will do so with these guiding principals:

"We will invest our surplus to ensure that our children will have the skills to compete in the global economy and to excel in new industries.

"We will invest our surplus to maintain the balance between economic growth and open space, diversified farming, and ecological diversity.

"We will invest our surplus to increase energy efficiency and renewability today so that we will have the energy resources needed for tomorrow.

"And we will invest our surplus in ways that support the expansion and sustainability of a diversified economy.

"Mr. Speaker, honored guests, it is with great pride that I share with you the highlights of the Majority's agenda.

"At the top of our agenda is public education. We have toured some of the neediest school facilities throughout the State. We have listened to parents, teachers, and children themselves. If we are to expect greater performance from students and teachers, we must provide them with safe and clean schools to teach in, to learn in. We will spend \$150 million on the repair and maintenance of our public schools, and an additional \$80 million in our classrooms. We will also retrofit our schools to serve as emergency shelters in time of need.

"As we look to the future, Mr. Speaker, we also see new communities coming up throughout the State that require construction of new school classrooms.

"To meet this need, we will use certificate of participation funding - known as COPS - to finance private developers. We will leverage \$50 million of public funds and its interests to lease back payments and use by developers to build new schools. This innovative public-private partnership will support new housing projects and schools being built together.

"We must also consider the serious repair and maintenance of our University of Hawaii system and its 13 campuses. For too long, we have repair and maintenance projects for other needs, and much of their infrastructure is in serious disrepair. As such, we will spend an additional \$84 million on repair and maintenance, with \$50 to \$60 million for operations.

"Mr. Speaker, the backlog of repair and maintenance projects throughout our school system and the University of Hawaii is staggering. But now that we have the means, let's add another "R" to the 3 "R's" of Reading, Writing, and Arithmetic. Let the 4th "R" be 'repair' and for doing it 'right'.

"The Economy. Mr. Speaker, last week, the House and Senate unveiled a joint package that centered around the revitalization and promotion of agriculture. It also builds upon our legacy of commitment to our local farmers and small businesses - the 'Moms and Pops' - because farmers of today will play a greater role in our economic future of tomorrow.

"Many of the fresh foods and local produce that we buy at the grocery store – or at the market place - or enjoy at our restaurants are supplied by local farmers. Diversified agriculture is alive and well, in Hawaii, and holds great promise. But not only that, Mr. Speaker, if Hawaii should ever be faced with a shipping strike or natural disaster, the food we get from local farmers will sustain us during these times of crisis. This is more about public safety than only about keeping the country, country.

"Today, our farmers need help. Our State and private irrigation systems are in need of serious repair. Repairing old flumes and ditches will not come cheap, but rebuilding them from scratch would cost a king's ransom and more.

"We propose to establish a \$50 million fund of which to repair our irrigation systems statewide. We invite our private landowners and farmers to break bread at the table of common interest and shared rewards.

"We will also elevate agriculture in our economy by enhancing the role of the Agribusiness Development Corporation, by transferring responsibilities for marketing, land management, and irrigation system development to the ADC, with the Department of Agriculture retaining its important regulatory function. Farmers, landowners, and consumers will all benefit from these initiatives.

"And we will not stop at the fields and the forest, but also invest in the laboratories of science and technologies and cultivate home grown inventions, inventors, and plug the hole in the dam of human capital and talent leaving our State and country.

"Mr. Speaker, you and I have talked about this for years. We have wanted to do this for years. We have longed for an opportunity, but lacked the resources to devote funding for sometimes risky, but important research and development. Your Democratic majority believes that now is the time to make that commitment.

"We will devote \$100 million, and establish an annual dedicated source of funding to support research in life sciences, biotechnology, renewable energy, agricultural, medical sciences, and the Cancer Research Center of Hawaii.

"The results will be high paying jobs for Hawaii's best and brightest, with business profits and new technologies remaining in the State. These funds will be used for projects that develop businesses related to the life sciences.

"The results will be high paying jobs for Hawaii's best and brightest, improvements to our quality of life as we find new cures for illness and disease.

"Mr. Speaker, one day we will look back to this moment, and know that we started this program so that Hawaii will one day be the Life Sciences Center of the Pacific.

"To complement this infusion, we will focus on workforce development for high need areas, such as construction, heath care, and nursing. Using monies from the public funds, we will partner with federal government funds, and create new programs within our University community college system for purposes of building a local work force. Home-grown talent, like home-grown food, is just as good, Mr. Speaker, and quite often even better.

"Housing. Mr. Speaker, it is no exaggeration to say that we are in a housing crisis. Hawaii's lack of affordable housing and the need for shelters must be considered a priority for everyone in this State. No community is immune from this human tragedy. Are we not our brother's keeper?

"The Joint Legislative Housing and Homeless Task Force has worked diligently throughout the year, traveling across the State to assess our needs listening to our communities.

"The Majority Package will follow their recommendations to increase funding for the Rental Housing Trust Fund for programs for homeless and transitional housing; create developer incentives to build moderate income homes; set aside public lands for self-help community housing; and repair our vacant public housing units.

"How we resolve the crisis today, Mr. Speaker, will have a deep impact on all of us, rich and poor, Republican and Democrat, *Malahini* and *Kamaaina*. It does not matter if you live in Waianae or Waialae, we are all in the canoe together and we must use our surplus to address this problem now.

"Energy. This year alone, the cost of crude oil shot up dramatically, directly resulting in higher costs for gasoline and electricity, and indirectly causing prices to rise like everything else.

"We can no longer afford to take energy for granted. Conservation is not just for environmentalists. It must be practiced by everyone, and government should lead by example.

"Your Democratic Majority will set aside \$100 million toward energy conservation in public buildings by installing energy efficient lighting, cooling and heating technologies that will cut our electricity bills and use our natural energy sources.

"We will also propose a 'Pay-As-You-Save' pilot program for residents to finance the cost of a solar water heaters through their monthly electricity bill. We believe it will be a 'win-win-win' for power companies, landlords, and tenants alike.

"Our energy package also includes pilot projects in our schools to install sun-powered batteries and photovoltaic system where roof repairs are already scheduled.

"Mr. Speaker, we will make permanent the renewable energy tax credit and increase the credit for both residential and commercial properties that install solar panels.

"We will also consult and partner with such groups as the Apollo Alliance and meld technology with labor, and labor with industry. Our energy package will be a hallmark of this Session.

"In closing, Mr. Speaker, your Democratic Majority agenda for 2006 was built by a vision for the future - a vision of what Hawaii can and will be, if we plan thoughtfully and demonstrate the political will to make the right decisions today for the future we want tomorrow.

"It is all about investing in our future. It is all about believing in ourselves and each other. It is all about believing that there are endless possibilities in the hearts and minds of our youngest citizens. It is about faith in the future and the promise of today.

"When we opened this Twenty-third Legislature last year, I shared with you my pride and reverence for the Democrats who served this Chamber fifty-one years ago. Not only did they make history, but they laid the foundation for our Hawaii built on the unchanging principles of equality, opportunity, and justice for all. Yet, what really led them to do all this was really their never-ending desire to make life better for their children and their children's children. I have come to believe this more and more each year as I reflect upon my own legacy.

"In words of one of my heroes, Bono, of the group U2 sums it up in a song.

One love, one blood, one life, you got to do what you should

One life with each other, sisters, brothers, one life, but we're not the same. We get to carry each other. Carry each other. One.

"So as we celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the first Filipino immigrants to Hawaii, it is fitting that we honor a great contributions and sacrifices of the *sakadas* – who made Hawaii better for us today. And all immigrants, for they shared a common bond of hardship, longing, and sacrifice - a vision of what Hawaii could be and should be, and we are blessed by their love for Hawaii and their unceasing drive to make their dreams come true.

"Your Majority Members are continuing this legacy of our immigrant forefathers and predecessors and we have created a vision of what Hawaii can and should be. Mr. Speaker, we each were born for a time such as this. The legacy of the past has already been laid for the legacy of the future. All we must do, is do as they did.

"Aloha, Mabuhay. Thank you Mr. Speaker."

The Chair then called upon the Most Reverent Clarence "Larry" Silva to deliver the benediction.

The Speaker then asked Representatives Takai, M. Oshiro and Finnegan, and Senators Kim, Hanabusa and Hogue to escort the Honorable Linda Lingle to the rostrum.

The Governor was presented with lei by Representative Thielen on behalf of the House of Representatives, and Senator Whalen on behalf of the Senate. The Speaker then presented to the Members of the Twenty-Third Legislature and the audience, the Honorable Linda Lingle, Governor of the State of Hawaii.

The Governor then addressed the Joint Session as follows:

"Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, Lt. Governor and Mrs. Aiona, members of the Legislature, Chief Justice Moon, Chair Apoliona, cabinet members, Congressman and Mrs. Case, Mayor Arakawa and Mrs. Arakawa, Mayor Baptiste, Mayor Kim, members of the counselor corps, distinguished guests, and to all the people of Hawai'i. Aloha and good morning.

"It is a great privilege to once again come before you to talk about our State's future. It is a hallmark of American democracy that governors across our nation are given the opportunity to speak freely about the challenges their states face as well as their hopes and dreams for the future. This, and other freedoms we too often take for granted, are being fought for today in distant lands across the globe. Thousands of miles away, countries that suffered under tyranny for decades are now budding democracies because of America's leadership and sacrifice.

"In the recent elections in Iraq, people walked as far as eight miles just to exercise their right to vote. Thanks to the efforts of America's armed forces, democracy is gaining a foothold in Iraq and Afghanistan, and we in America are safer. While in Iraq, our own Hawai'i National Guard 29th Brigade Combat Team conducted thousands of patrols, destroyed dozens of weapons stockpiles and detained hundreds of insurgents.

"Perhaps equally important, these American soldiers provided thousands of Iraqi citizens with clothing, food, purified water, shoes, school supplies and medical care. And they provided Iraqi citizens with a sense of hope and security that resulted in a 90% turnout for voting in the sector patrolled by the 29th Brigade. Allow me to take a moment to recognize some of our heroes who are with us this morning.

"Seated in the gallery and just recently returned home from Iraq is the Commander of the 29th Brigade, Brig. General Joe Chavez, Sgt. Major Robert Inouye, members of their brigade, and their families. Please stand and be recognized.

"These soldiers represent the more than 3,000 men and women of our Hawai'i National Guard and Army Reserve who answered the call of duty and served with honor in Iraq, Kuwait and Afghanistan.

"On behalf of all the citizens of Hawai'i, welcome home, and thank you for your sacrifice and for ensuring a safer world for future generations.

"Today, it is once again my great privilege to report on the state of our State. This year's address is made more meaningful by the presence of our soldiers.

"2005 will go down in history as one of our best years ever.

"The economic indicators are strong, investment is robust, and people are optimistic about the future.

"Our work force grew by 3% this year, one of the fastest growth rates in the nation.

"Our unemployment rate decreased to below 3%, the lowest in the nation.

"Total personal income grew by 8%, the biggest increase since 1990, and the third largest increase in the nation.

"Our gross state product, the most comprehensive measure of the economy, increased 4.7% in 2004. That is the biggest increase since 1991, and the fourth biggest increase in the nation.

"Visitor arrivals in 2005 are estimated to have reached 7.4 million, the first time in history that we had more than 7 million visitors in a year.

"And employment in the construction industry is nearing record levels.

"As strong as those numbers are, they alone don't capture the full story of our success during the past year.

"We achieved longstanding goals, from opening a new medical school in Kaka`ako, to establishing a refuge to protect our precious marine resources in the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands.

"We strengthened our ties to Asia. Our delegation to China and Korea returned with significant agreements covering education and economic development. The businesses that went on the trip already expect to generate more than \$100 million in new business.

"We regained our fiscal equilibrium because we were willing to make the tough choices, and exercise restraint in our spending.

"When I came into office in 2002, the State was spending \$215 million more than it was collecting.

"Today, rather than red ink, we are projecting a \$574 million positive balance. This is a turnaround of over three-quarters of a billion dollars in just three years.

"Now is the perfect time to share the results of this success with the people who made it possible, taxpayers who are struggling with the high cost of living, including skyrocketing housing prices and property taxes.

"It is also the right time to address many unmet needs, from dilapidated school buildings, to a lack of access to healthcare, to deteriorating public housing and a growing homeless population, to overburdened transportation systems.

"And it is obviously the best time in many years to save for the future while making smart investments in those areas that will secure a brighter tomorrow.

"I want to talk first about the least glamorous of my proposals, setting aside more money to meet unexpected challenges in the coming years.

"I am suggesting that we double the size of the State's Rainy Day Fund from \$55 million to \$110 million. Combined with the \$188 million in the Hurricane Relief Fund, this is a good start in creating a cushion for those times when the unexpected occurs.

"Putting aside more money for a rainy day is the responsible, prudent and smart thing to do. And it is exactly what responsible individuals do when they have an increase in their income, because they know that the unexpected can and will happen.

"At the same time we are putting something aside for future unexpected events, people need help right now in coping with the high cost of living.

"I want to use about half of the State's \$574 million surplus for tax relief for those who need it most.

"I was disappointed last year when my proposal to raise the standard deduction was not adopted because it meant that those struggling to make ends meet would fall further behind.

"The bottom line is that we are collecting income taxes from people who simply can't afford to pay them.

"Given our current fiscal condition and projected future revenue, we can raise the standard deduction further than I suggested last year, to 75% of the federal level.

"Moreover, raising the standard deduction helps hundreds of thousands more people than the Earned Income Tax Credit. It is simple for the State to implement, and easy for taxpayers to understand.

"I realize there are other points of view on how to get money back into the hands of our citizens, including President Bunda's call for adjusting the income tax brackets.

"I like his approach as well. That is why I am calling on the Legislature to adopt both ideas.

"Combining an increased standard deduction with a widening of the income tax brackets would reduce the tax burden by \$86 million and benefit over 80% of taxpayers and their dependents.

"It would mean that a family of four earning \$50,000 or less a year would save an estimated \$568 a year.

"This proposal alone, however, is not enough to make a real difference for families coping with higher housing costs, higher property taxes, higher car registration taxes, higher electricity rates, higher water and sewer bills, higher medical bills, and higher food prices.

"In light of higher prices for so many necessities of life, I am proposing two additional tax relief measures this year in recognition of the reality that people are facing across our State, especially the hundreds of thousands who are living paycheck to paycheck.

"First, I am suggesting that we grant a \$100 per person tax credit to those households earning \$50,000 or less a year in order to offset the taxes people pay on food, medical services and non-prescription drugs. I think it is unconscionable that we tax people for eating and getting sick. This tax credit would equal \$400 for a family of four and would benefit 707,000 taxpayers and their dependents.

"Finally, I am proposing a one-time tax refund of \$150 per exemption for all but the highest income residents. A couple with two children would receive a check for \$600 early next year. This one-time tax refund would benefit 857,000 taxpayers and their dependents.

"The advantage of including a one-time refund in the tax relief package is that it gets money to people now when they need it, but it preserves our future options since we are not committed to pay it in the coming years.

"If the Legislature enacts this \$285 million tax relief package, a family of four earning \$50,000 or less would receive \$1,568. Let me repeat how much a family would save, \$1,568. This is enough to pay a year's tuition at a community college with money left over for books, enough for a family to pay its electric bills for a year, or enough to pay off the mounting credit card debt that many are carrying.

"I don't view this session as a fight between tax relief or more money for education, or between education and saving for a rainy day, or between saving for a rainy day and securing our economic future through investments in new energy resources. I view it as a chance to literally have it all.

"Perhaps not in the exact form and amounts that each of us wants, but surely we can manage to compromise now that the treasury is full. We must resist framing the discussion in terms of either/or, but rather we should frame it in terms of how.

"Education must be one of our highest priorities, and is deserving of more support. It is our hope for a better tomorrow, both for us as individuals and as a State. Over time, it can wash away the barriers of disadvantage.

"Almost all of us have been in a DOE or UH building that was run down, peeling paint, lack of electrical power, broken fixtures and worse. And new housing developments have created over-crowded conditions at some schools.

"I am proposing a dramatic increase of \$132.5 million for K-12 public education, including \$90 million in additional funds for school construction and repairs and maintenance. This money is on top of the \$570 million already appropriated, but not yet spent by the Department of Education for a total of \$660 million. These are big numbers, although they are not as large as some have suggested.

"Before we give the DOE a blank check, we must be certain we are getting our money's worth for the more than \$2 billion we are already spending each year on K-12 operations, and the \$570 million already approved to construct, repair and maintain our schools.

"Besides the need for a robust repair and maintenance program and new school construction, the DOE is facing a severe teacher shortage. I am proposing four laws to immediately address the shortage.

"One, allow retired DOE teachers to be hired for difficult to fill classroom positions for 24 months without any loss of retirement benefits.

"Two, start a Master Teacher Program that would pay a \$10,000 a year bonus to any of the 111 National Board Certified Teachers who agree to teach in an underperforming school for three years. They must mentor the other teachers and would be allowed to return to their original school.

"Three, create an Emergency Certified Teacher Program that would allow anyone holding a bachelor's degree or higher to teach in the subject in which they have degrees as long as they complete the substitute teacher training program or similar course.

"And four, use \$500,000 to reestablish the Hawai`i Educator Loan Program, and reduce the amount of time you must teach from 10 to 6 years in order to qualify for loan forgiveness for tuition at any certified teaching program.

"I have also included money in the Supplemental Budget for 100 more students in the College of Education at Manoa and West O`ahu and 150 more students from the community colleges who would transfer into the College of Education.

"The charter schools are an important adjunct to the traditional DOE schools. This important option for parents, students and teachers has never received fair and equal funding and we should change that this Session.

"Also, we should give the charter schools their own school district so they are able to receive funds directly from the federal government.

"This will be a net gain for our state school system.

"I am also requesting that you remove the cap on the number of charter schools so that we can establish seven new charter schools around the State that would use environmental education as their foundation. I view environmental threats as one of the most serious problems for us to address. It is increasingly important that future generations have an understanding of these issues and the choices we will face in the years ahead.

"I have included money in my Supplemental Budget to establish these seven charter schools throughout the major islands, including two on the Big Island. I hope you will give this proposal your most serious consideration. "While public schools garner most of the education headlines, both good and bad, our University system is equally important and deserving of additional support. Last month I proposed that the UH receive an additional \$45.6 million in operating funds and \$252 million more for facilities, including \$175 million in private funding to make the dream of a West O ahu campus a reality.

"These proposals include the money needed to repair crumbling buildings throughout the UH system, to increase campus security, expand workforce education in nursing, teaching and the construction trades; to fund the College of Pharmacy at UH-Hilo, and to support the Hawaiian Studies program.

"A good education is still the surest way to a higher-paying job, but even with rising wages, the price of rental housing and home purchase is out of reach today for too many people. The supply of rental housing has tightened and Hawai`i ranks 48th in home ownership. And as anyone knows who has visited Ala Moana Beach Park, the breakwater at Kahului Harbor on Maui and other areas across the State, the number of homeless among us is growing.

"It is simply not *pono* for our families to be living in cars, people to be sleeping in the doorways of businesses downtown or on picnic tables in our parks. There is no one silver bullet to solve the problems of homelessness and affordable housing, but there are many good ideas that can and should be enacted. We should begin by learning from our successes.

"I am proud to report that the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands has awarded more residential leases and provided more families with opportunities for home ownership in the last two years than in the entire decade of the 1990's. This fact is impressive, but let me share with you the human side of this success.

"This is a letter written to Hawaiian Homes Commission Chairman Micah Kane after the recent awarding of homestead lots in the Lai'opua subdivision on the Big Island.

"Dear Mr. Kane. I am writing to thank you and the DHHL administration for all of your love and support yesterday at the selection meeting in Kailua-Kona. I cannot express the emotion that I felt from the very beginning of the meeting. The pule from Kaulana Park was truly spirit filled. I did not know what to expect at this meeting. When I saw my husband's name, Wendell Kualaau, on the big screen and heard his name called, I couldn't help but to feel an emotion of finally. Then I watched him hold his composure and his emotions through the whole process. Each and every one of you practically held everyone's hand through the entire procedure. Your administration was so organized and displayed such a sincere congratulations to each of the awardees. I don't know what it feels like to win the lottery but I imagine that this was pretty close. We all need hope in life to carry on and to have a future to look forward to. DHHL gave that to so many Hawaiians vesterday. Once again, thank you for an experience that will live in my heart forever. Aloha, Teresa A. Kualaau."

"It is important to note that every home built by DHHL means there is one less family competing for an affordable home in the open market. DHHL's success has been so dramatic that the Building Industry Association recently named Hawaiian Homes Commission Chairman Micah Kane as its Housing Advocate of the Year.

"This Department achieved this success through many innovative programs, such as leveraging federal rural development funds, preselection credit reviews, and ongoing counseling to assure successful home ownership. Such approaches can serve as a model for other affordable housing programs.

"But we need more housing for our non-Hawaiian residents as well, so I am making good on my commitment to ask the Legislature to redirect Legacy Lands tax money from the general fund into our

housing funds. After all, there is no greater legacy that we can leave our children than a home they can call their own.

"Coupled with this infusion of additional State funding, I am proposing that the Legislature authorize the use of special purpose revenue bonds to encourage the construction of additional workforce housing across the State. Special purpose revenue bonds have proven to be a successful tool for funding private schools, hospitals and economic development projects. It is time to apply this tool to meeting our housing needs.

"To address the problem of homelessness, I am proposing that we spend \$10 million to renovate and repair existing homeless shelters, which have long suffered from neglect, and another \$10 million in grants for supportive housing. The importance of this funding cannot be over emphasized. Experience has shown that the homeless need more than just a roof over their head. They need services as well, substance abuse counseling, mental health treatment, and job training, that will give them the tools they need to stay off the streets. Supportive housing provides all of that in one package.

"I have submitted again this year a complete package of housing proposals, including: increased rental subsidies, a program to pay the first month's rent and security deposit, the lack of which keeps many people homeless; streamlined land use processing, and a redefinition of affordable housing in order to qualify more families.

"Lastly, we need to keep our eye on the ball and severely restrict the raiding of any of our housing funds as has been done to the tune of more than \$200 million over the last 10 years. I am proposing a new law to require that any future diversion of funds meant to finance housing projects would need a two-thirds vote of the Legislature.

"While tax relief, education and housing may be the State's most obvious needs, access to medical care and social services has also suffered during the lean years and now requires more funding. Now is the time to move forward to extend MEDICAID coverage to more low-income children and adults. I am proposing programs to extend coverage to an additional 29,000 people over the next six years, with the majority of the cost borne by the federal government.

"It is also time to restore dental coverage for needy adults, specifically preventive care for adults in the MEDICAID program. This is both the humane thing to do and the smart thing to do since a lack of preventive dental care will lead to the need for more painful and costly oral surgery for which the State would be obligated to pay.

"I spoke earlier this morning about the environmental threats we could face if we fail to teach our children the concept of good stewardship of our lands, oceans and other natural resources. And while teaching stewardship will help protect our resources over the long term, we need to invest now in various environmental programs and projects. That's why we've asked you to approve a record \$92 million budget for the Department of Land and Natural Resources that is unprecedented in scope and scale.

"The disrepair of our State parks deserves immediate attention. Residents and visitors alike expect and deserve better than broken or filthy restrooms. I have asked you for an additional \$10 million to repair our park facilities as well as additional funding to clean them more regularly and to provide nighttime security patrols. And I am again calling on the Legislature to invest in the repair and reconstruction of our small boat harbors.

"Besides this additional spending, I am proposing strict new penalties for those who illegally trespass into our forests and who steal timber, including our precious koa.

"Additionally, I am asking that revenues derived from forest reserves be used to expand and enhance forest stewardship.

"I am also proposing that we continue the successful partnerships with private landowners in order to encourage more habitat conservation plans on private lands. This law is set to expire next year.

"Respect for nature and respect for our native Hawaiian culture go hand in hand. To lose this would be to lose the very essence of our islands. A vibrant host culture enriches and benefits all of us. I pledge my continued support for those programs and efforts that preserve and perpetuate the Hawaiian culture.

"Of all the tasks that government undertakes, none is more fundamental than ensuring the safety of our citizens. The natural disasters of the past year made it clear that civil defense preparedness is a necessity, not a nicety. Last month, I announced a comprehensive emergency preparedness package. There are many components to that package, but the bottom line is this.

"First, we must harden our public and private buildings, to better resist natural disasters when they do hit.

"Second, we must be better prepared to respond before and after a disaster strikes by: modernizing our warning systems, stockpiling supplies, doubling the funds available to respond in the first hours after an emergency, and entering into an agreement with other states so we can call on them for aid when disaster strikes. We are the only state in the nation that has not yet signed that agreement and I am asking the Legislature to authorize us to do so now.

"Third, we must create additional shelter spaces including special areas for those needing medical care, and a place where people can bring their pets. We learned from Hurricane Katrina that the unwillingness to leave pets behind can lead to human death and injury.

"And finally, we must adopt severe penalties for those caught looting during or after a disaster and make it a serious crime to attack a civil defense worker.

"In addition to natural disasters, there are other, more subtle threats to our security that we must address.

"Our dependence on imported oil leaves us vulnerable to price swings and shortages of supply. Earlier this month, I proposed a sweeping set of proposals designed to move us from our decadeslong overdependence on imported oil toward energy self-sufficiency based on renewable resources.

"If we are going to achieve self-sufficiency, we will need to push hard on many fronts. State government needs to lead the way by building more efficient buildings and using less oil itself. Weaning ourselves from oil won't be cost-free, but we must do so if we want our economy to survive the next time the price of a barrel of oil increases by 50%.

"I am proposing a bold new initiative to make Hawai`i the center of America's development of hydrogen as an alternate fuel source. Already internationally recognized leaders in this field have expressed interest in using Hawai`i as the place where hydrogen can move from the research phase into production.

"Additionally, we need to provide expanded tax incentives for people or businesses who install energy efficient appliances, solar hot water heating, photovoltaics or wind energy systems.

"We also need to encourage the development of biofuels as a substitute for oil, fuels through farming. Just as we want to mandate 20% alternative fuels for electricity production by 2020, we also want to adopt a standard of 20% use of biofuels in gasoline by 2020.

"The price of gasoline is just one of the challenges that we face when we drive each day. Another is gridlock on our highways. This is why I am seeking an additional \$137 million for highway construction for projects such as: the North-South Road and Kapolei Parkway on O'ahu, the expansion of Kuhio Highway on Kaua'i, the realignment of Honoapi'ilani Highway on Maui and the design of an afternoon contra-flow zipper lane on the H-l Freeway.

"Along with improved traffic flow, we have an obligation to make sure that pedestrians are safe when crossing the street. Just last week another senior citizen was killed by a driver while crossing the street in a marked crosswalk. This 86-year-old kupuna, who was so full of life, was on her way to buy supplies for centerpieces for her church choir. The news story said that Betty Tanaka Santiago's great grandchild asked, "But why can't I see her anymore?"

"My heart breaks for Mrs. Santiago's family. I am very angry about this senseless loss of life.

"I am proposing tough new measures to place traffic violators in jail and to revoke their driving privileges for failing to yield the rightof-way to a pedestrian.

"We must not abandon our search for solutions to this and other very difficult problems that continue to plague our State, most notably drug abuse.

"I am again calling on legislators to recognize that tougher penalties for repeat drug offenders and the manufacture of ice are essential if we ever hope to make a dent in this community crisis.

"But we also need to increase prevention efforts. As an example, I am proposing \$10.2 million in federal funds to expand the About Face and Healthy Lifestyles programs for at-risk youth and needy adults. This new spending will allow us to double the size of these programs.

"Director Ted Daligdig and students from the About Face program are with us today. Please stand and be recognized.

"I have shared a wide range of ideas with you today that I believe all fit into the following basic framework, ensuring that our economic prosperity continues, ensuring that we all share the benefits of that prosperity, and ensuring that we protect those things that make Hawai'i so special.

"Of all the things that make us special, one of the foremost is our diversity as a people. Remember the euphoria we all felt last year when the Little League team from 'Ewa Beach won the world championship? Where else would you find a team that close-knit with kids named Memea, Aliviado, Ranit, Javier, Guevara, Fe'au, Baniaga, Rosete, Enos, Aglipay, Kam and Tirpak? Just like that team, as a State we draw strength from our diversity. And we truly believe that it is right and proper to help those in need.

"These two characteristics of diversity and a desire to help others blended together for our troops as they not only fought wars in faroff lands, but helped people who were different than them. The soldiers from Hawai'i always treated the Iraqi and Afghan people with respect.

"As one of our returning National Guardsmen shared his experiences with me at a welcome home ceremony at Kalaeloa, tears came to his eyes as he spoke of having to leave the Iraqi children behind. Our ability to show aloha for others, including people from vastly different backgrounds...is one of our greatest sources of strength.

"I'm also reminded of our diversity as we begin the yearlong centennial celebration to mark the journey taken by the first 15 Sakadas who arrived on the Big Island from the Philippines in 1906. Like so many before them and so many since, they were driven by a dream, a dream of a better life, of hope and opportunity. From those humble roots, today the Filipino community makes up almost 25% of our population. Its members are among the leaders in all walks of life, from business to politics to the professions.

"Earlier this month, I had the privilege of retracing the journey of the Sakadas as part of an official delegation that traveled to the Philippines to celebrate this landmark event. That journey reminded me of the obligation that those of us in public service have to keep Hawai'i a place where diversity is respected, and where the dreams of our people, regardless of their origins, can be fulfilled.

"This is the final State of the State Address I will have the privilege of making during this term of office. I'd like to take this opportunity to thank the members of the Legislature for working with me to move our State forward. While we haven't always seen eye-to-eye, the debate has benefited the public and often made the results better.

"I'd also like to thank the 50,000 State employees, my colleagues in public service, who work hard to make life better for the citizens of this State.

"There is one State employee in particular whom I would like to recognize today. He is Francis Lum, our State's protocol officer. Mr. Lum has worked directly with five different governors, beginning with Governor Burns. He is retiring after 58 years of service, 40 as the State's protocol officer. Please join me in acknowledging the dedication and commitment of this exemplary public servant. Mr. Lum is a true public servant. It never mattered if he was working in a Democratic Administration, in a Republican Administration. Whether he was dealing with the House, the Senate, and the Executive Branch. He was exemplary and I will miss you terribly Mr. Lum.

"My final thanks go to the people of Hawai'i for giving me the chance to serve. Whether here at home, or traveling on the mainland or in foreign countries, wherever I go, whoever I talk with, I am always so full of pride because I represent the best people in the best place in the world.

"In closing I can say with gratitude and humility that the state of our State is better today than it was 3 years ago. It is better today than it was last year and if we have the political will to work together to make the correct choices during this Legislative Session, the state of our State next year be even better and stronger and more promising. Let's commit to work together to ensure that our economic prosperity continues. That we all share in the benefits of that prosperity and that we protect those things that make Hawai'i special. We have the opportunity; we have the means, now together let's seize the moment. Mahalo and God bless to all."

President Bunda then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Governor. We certainly do have a lot of work to do this session. Your proposals will be a subject of much discussion in the coming weeks and it is our hope that we can find some common ground for the good of the people of Hawaii. At this time, this Joint Session of the Legislature is now adjourned."

At 11:00 o'clock a.m., President Bunda declared the Joint Session of the House of Representatives and the Senate of the Twenty-Third Legislature adjourned.

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:00 o'clock midnight, the House of Representatives adjourned until 12:00 o'clock noon, Wednesday, January 25, 2006.

"Perhaps, funding this would yield value in excess of the surpluses that we now see in our coffers. So I just wanted to take this opportunity again to say that I hope we will fulfill these constitutional mandates soon. Thank you."

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 1861:

Representative M. Oshiro moved that H.B. No. 1861, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Moses rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I know it is Third Reading and there's no way to go back and look at this bill a little more. And I was not in the Committee. So I apologize.

"I just have a little concern that the Board of Education is the governing body over the Department of Education, it just seems to me that they would deserve to take a look at some of these documents in proceedings. And there was no testimony from the Board. So we have no idea if they think that this is a good idea or not. Thank you."

Representative Pine rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Yes Mr. Speaker, I have similar concerns. Particularly in the fact that if you just read the bill alone, it seems like we're taking away the Legislature's directive to be accountable to the Board of Education. And so, just because I don't know that much about this bill, I just wanted to voice my strong reservations and hope that we're not taking away a requirement to be accountable to us and the Board. Thanks."

Representative Takumi rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. I had to put on the glasses so I can see you better. Just as a clarification on this bill, and if any Member has any questions regarding any bill, they're more than welcome to come in, talk to me so I can explain the rationale behind it.

"This bill, what it does is it repeals the requirement for an annual report submitted to the Board of Education on all principal transactions. In another words, on an annual basis, the Superintendent submits a report to the Board listing every principal in the system and whether or not they got promoted, retired, they left, whatever the case may be.

"This was a Board-initiated request. There were 7 bills proposed by the Department of Education. This was one of them and as people who know the process, any bills submitted by the Department has to be approved by the Board. This bill was approved by the Board. It had their support. And it's basically a housekeeping bill.

"Secondly, more importantly, Mr. Speaker, this raises a whole question that we tried to embed in the Re-inventing Education Act of 2004. And that is, the Department and the Board should really be able to control their own destiny.

"I do believe the Legislature should not be in the business of saying, "Superintendent, provide a report to the Board." It should be the Board that requests the Superintendent to provide reports to them on a timely basis. This is a report that they don't feel they need. It's in statute. I believe we should repeal it.

"The Board is under its total authority at present to request any and all reports of the Superintendent that they deem necessary to conduct their business. So they do not need a law for us to tell them that they need a certain report. And that's the whole impetus behind this bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 1861, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Meyer and Thielen being excused.

At 12:11 o'clock p.m., the Chair noted that H.B. No. 1861 passed Third Reading.

"One being the new special fund, the New School Construction Special Fund that allows the DOE to enter into financing agreements without the approval of the Director of Finance. The DOE would be allowed to incur that. That would become a State obligation without regard to the statewide budget. That was the concern of the Budget and Finance.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I want to thank Budget and Finance and the Department of Education for working together to create a better system of transparency in the way CIP money is managed and released. I am hopeful that this new process will be beneficial for all those involved, including those at the school level.

"Make no mistake that there currently is \$210 million available for Repairs and Maintenance and CIP projects for Fiscal year 06-07. In the Governor's supplemental budget, she offers an additional \$90 million, and the House Majority is suggesting an additional \$150 million. The DOE is asking for \$368 million and for the funds to be

deposited into SEFI. No proposals have come forward to even meet half of what DOE is asking for. It is extremely important to fund our school facilities; however, DOE isn't the only department that needs help with facilities. The University of Hawaii has major facility challenges, some in dilapidated conditions. I just ask that in our desire to help the DOE that we do not ignore other areas of desperate need. These projects did not show up overnight. For decades we ignored repairs and maintenance. Let us move forward in a responsible and realistic manner accountable to the taxpayers of Hawaii

"Currently, this bill has a blank amount for additional appropriations for operations for the DOE for 06-07. I am a strong supporter of sending any new money for education directly to the school level to work in line with Act 51 and the Weighted Student Formula. Please consider HB 3208, a mechanism to fund money directly to the School Community Councils, to use at their discretion. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Moses rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just have reservations too. I believe the Comptroller and Budget and Finance need to be involved with the process."

Representative Meyer rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

"California last week became the first state to declare secondhand smoke a toxic air pollutant, putting tobacco fumes in the same category as diesel exhaust, arsenic, and benzene, because of its link to breast cancer.

"The article goes on to talk about how breast cancer is linked to a lot of other kinds of cancers including incredibly, cervical cancer which the Women's Caucus has a project on this year. So I'd like to have permission to put the remainder of this article into the Journal. Thank you very much," and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lee submitted the following article:

"Secondhand smoke is air pollutant, Calif. Rules Link to breast cancer puts fumes in rank of arsenic for first time By DON THOMPSON Associated Press

SACRAMENTO, Calif. - California last week became the first state to declare secondhand smoke a toxic air pollutant, putting tobacco fumes in the same category as diesel exhaust, arsenic and benzene because of its link to breast cancer.

The unanimous decision by the state Air Resources Board relied on a September report that found a sharply increased risk of breast cancer in young women exposed to secondhand smoke. It also links drifting smoke to premature births, asthma and heart disease, as well as other cancers and numerous health problems in children.

"If people are serious about breast cancer, they have to deal with secondhand smoke. That's what this is all about," said Dr. Stanton Glantz, director of the Center for Tobacco Control, Research and Education at the University of California - San Francisco.

"This is a seminal, international document," Glantz said. "It's impossible to underestimate what a big deal this is."

The report by scientists at California's Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment drew on more than 1,000 other studies of secondhand smoke and blamed the fumes for 4,000 deaths each year in California from lung cancer or heart disease alone.

The most significant new finding cited by state officials is that young women exposed to secondhand smoke increase their risk of developing breast cancer between 68 percent and 120 percent. The disease kills about 40,000 women in the United States each year.

That conclusion conflicts with a 2004 report by the U.S. surgeon general. Sanford Barsky, a researcher writing on behalf of the R.J. Reynolds tobacco company, told the board the state report "either ignores mentioning or does not give the appropriate weight" to studies refuting a link between secondhand smoke and breast cancer.

California scientists say their research is more current than the surgeon general's report. The state report went through an exhaustive review that delayed its release for nearly a year but ensures it is based on sound research, said Dr. John Froines, director of UCLA's Center for Occupational and Environmental Health and head of the scientific review panel.

R.J. Reynolds spokesman David Howard said regardless of the dangers from passive smoke indoors, no research supports regulators' decision to declare it an air pollutant.

"No studies exist that show that exposure outdoors leads to any increased risk of tobacco-associated illness," he said.

The air board must next consider regulatory steps to reduce exposure to the smoke, a process that could take years.

"This is no longer some crazy, California, Left Coast way of thinking," said Cynthia Hallett, executive director of Berkeley-based Americans for Nonsmokers' Rights.

She cited smoking bans that have been enacted or are being considered across the nation and in other countries.

Much of the initial effort in California will focus on public education, said Paul Knepprath, vice president for government relations at the American Lung Association of California.

The Honolulu Advertiser Sunday, January 29, 2006 Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you. I rise with reservations. I know that we took a look at this bill I believe last year and possibly even the year before. I stood up with reservations then and I have not changed my mind. Until I see the details of the bill, I'm very concerned that it says 'prohibit smoking.' At least in the Committee Report, it says, 'prohibit smoking' in public places and places of employment.

"I really feel that you're going to force people out on the sidewalks, in the street. I really don't understand. If it's saying you can't smoke at all in the facility, which is where I think they're headed, then where are you going to put these people? So, I think we don't like smoking but we need to find appropriate places for them. And I don't agree with this total elimination. Thank you."

Representative Moses rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I have reservations also. I don't smoke. I quit cold turkey 13 years ago. I never wanted to go back and never feel the urge to. I don't think smoking is good for you. But I have a problem with the... You know, in some of the work places, of course, it's been negotiable to date at least. It's a negotiable item. But also more than that, if we really are opposed to smoking, as a State, and as a Body here, let's stop taking the tax money from cigarettes and let's ban the use of cigarettes in the State of Hawaii. It's simple. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Green rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support of this bill. The place that we're going to put our workers is in the ground and in their graves. So I strongly support this bill."

Representative Meyer rose in support of the measure with reservations, and asked that the remarks of Representative Evans be entered in the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2260, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SMOKING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 20-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2060, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2060, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Pine rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you. Last year, I had some concerns about this bill. I'm speaking with reservation. Well actually I'm voting no. I'm not agreeing personally with some of the things I'm about to say, but I'm trying to think on the other side, what parents who think and believe in that are sending their kids to our public schools.

"I'm assuming that this bill relates to sex education partly in our public schools. I was concerned last year because in the Finance Committee I asked specifically, a proponent of this measure, what exactly are they teaching kids in these schools? It says, 'age appropriate' in this bill.

"However, age appropriate could mean very different things to many different parents. For example, this bill requires that the people teaching this sex education in our schools have to teach contraception. And I can tell you that I have a very large religious community in my district and they don't even teach their kids that, because they don't believe in it. So while I'm open-minded myself, I am just expressing the views of the parents that send their kids to these schools.

"The other concern that I had last year, I asked the same question in the Finance Committee. I said, since there are parents that may have beliefs that the rest of the society do not believe in, are you contacting these parents to specifically tell them ahead of time, what their children will be taught? And they had promised to get that information to me, and I've asked it several times during the Session last year and they never gave that information to me to prove that they're actually doing that. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Moses rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations. I have some of the similar concerns. I just look at the list of testifiers. I don't see any parent organizations there. I don't see any church groups there. So I think that we're leaving out a large segment of our society. Maybe the teachings are great. But I haven't seen what it is. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stonebraker rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Also with reservations. Considering that the proponents of the bill have offered to capitulate with age appropriate education. My concern is that their recognition of what is appropriate for a certain age is contradictory to what many parents would feel. I know that in Massachusetts, a number of students as young as kindergartners are being thought the use of condoms, mutual masturbation, and even 'fisting'. If you don't know what that is, you can look it up.

"But this is inappropriate but there are some people, and the supporters of this bill will say that it's absolutely appropriate for a six year old to learn about mutual masturbation and some other things like that. I don't think it is appropriate and I'd like to keep some of these groups out of our schools."

Representative Cabanilla rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support of this measure. This argument about age appropriate can last for '40 days and 40 nights'. But I believe that we have our Department of Education that looks at this. And other members in the community that would look at what age appropriate sex education would be. But to close a long discussion about what is appropriate and not appropriate is for us to look at the bigger picture. This is something that we need for our youth. We deal with diseases like venereal diseases, AIDS, and so on. And unwanted pregnancy.

"I don't think that we need to mandate sex education in our class. We just have to believe that our leadership in this subject matter can come out appropriate to the most of us. We can never come to a 100% agreement on this matter. But I think that we should go with what we think is best for most of us. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stonebraker rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to close by mentioning that one of the primary proponents of this bill, the ACLU, is notorious for its protection of pedophiles. Thank you."

Representative Lee rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lee's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of HB 2060 relating to medically accurate sex information.

"Each year a million American teens become pregnant and approximately half of all teenagers ages 14 to 18 have engaged in sexual intercourse. Two-thirds of the girls who have engaged in sexual intercourse in this age group become pregnant unintentionally.

"The incidence of sexually transmitted diseases has been increasing for the first time in over a decade. One quarter of all new STD cases occur in the adolescent population.

"While abstinence is the best way to avoid pregnancy and STD's, research indicates encouraging abstinence is not the most effective way to reduce pregnancies and the spread of STD's. Surgeon General David Satcher's 2001 report, "Call to Action to Promote Sexual Health and Responsible Sexual Behavior," stressed the importance of accurate information about sex and its possible consequences in addition to encouraging our youth to abstain from sexual intercourse.

"HB 2060 requires that any recipient of State funds that provides information or programs about sex, family planning, pregnancy or sexually transmitted diseases must not only present information on the benefits of abstinence, but must also provide accurate information about contraception and its role in preventing pregnancy and the spread of STD's including HIV/AIDS. To minimize unwanted pregnancies and the abortions that often follow and the spread of STD's we owe our youth the best information available.

"Mahalo Mr. Speaker, for the time. I encourage my colleagues to vote yes on this measure."

Representative Sonson rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. I would like the record to reflect that I'm adopting the words of the Representative from Lower Waipahu, Upper Ewa as my own," and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative B. Oshiro rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, Mr. Speaker. Just very briefly to counter some of the prior comments. I believe one of the testifiers, the ACLU's mission is actually to stand for the constitutional rights of everyone. Whoever it is. And it doesn't necessarily have anything to do with pedophiles. Thank you."

The Chair then stated:

"Members, we've had a lot of discussion on this. It's going to be referred to the Committee on Judiciary. For those members who are part of the Committee, you've heard the discussion on Second Reading. So with the input that you have, I hope you'll come up with a better bill as we move into Third Reading."

Representative Kahikina rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"I'd like to just register reservations and put in a request that information be given to us on what the medically accurate information is."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2060, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," passed Second

Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representative Pine voting no.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 21-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2082, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Education.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2082, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR SCHOOL-BASED SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT FOR MIDDLE SCHOOLS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Education.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 22-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2095, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Education.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2095, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Education, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"On Standing Committee Report 22-06, I rise with reservations. I just noticed, unless it's incorrect, the Committee Referral just says Health. My question would be, if the intent is to ask our schools to provide suntan lotion, it's going to have a cost. And so it's not referred to Finance.

"The other thing is, if a child does get skin cancer, can they go back and say, 'Well, gee, the schools didn't provide adequate sun care protection.' So are we now creating a liability situation? So I just want to bring that up to the Members and if it is only going to the Health Committee, you know I have some concerns. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2095, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SUN PROTECTION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Education.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 23-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2045, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Higher Education.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2045, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PERINATAL CARE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Higher Education.

Representatives Kanoho and Abinsay, for the Committee on Water, Land, & Ocean Resources and the Committee on Agriculture presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 24-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2146, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2146, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LAND USE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

The Chair announced:

"Prior to the recess, we had the introductions of our audience and now we would like to take up the Senate Communication."

SENATE COMMUNICATION

The following communication from the Senate (Sen. Com. No. 3) was received and announced by the Clerk:

Sen. Com. No. 3, transmitting H.B. No. 1949, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS TO PROVIDE FOR THE EXPENSES OF THE LEGISLATURE, THE AUDITOR, THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU, AND THE OMBUDSMAN," which passed Third Reading in the Senate on February 2, 2006.

SUSPENSION OF RULES

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the rules of the House be suspended for the purpose of considering a certain bill on Final Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried. (Representatives Halford, Kahikina, Kanoho, Marumoto and Saiki were excused.)

FINAL READING

Representative M. Oshiro moved to agree to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H.B. No. 1949 (SD 1), seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried. (Representatives Halford, Kahikina, Kanoho and Saiki were excused.)

H.B. No. 1949, SD 1:

Representative M. Oshiro moved that H.B. No. 1949, SD 1, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Meyer rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm going to be voting with reservations on this bill. I know that our staffs are all waiting eagerly for this bill to pass. And I think my reservations aren't going to stop that. But one reservation that I expressed in the Finance Committee was the fact that there's a provision in this bill that appropriates \$100,000 for the Legislative Auditor to audit the Youth Correctional Center. In my mind, that was an unusual way of funding that. That should have come as a separate bill. A stand-alone bill which would have a hearing.

"In the Finance Committee, there was nobody from the Executive Branch there to speak to that. I don't think they were really even aware that that provision was in this budget. So that I just don't think that's the way we should operate. I think we should be more transparent and every bill should have a hearing. That is not the

usual part of this bill. So I felt that there wasn't enough communication to people that might want to come and testify.

"Also, two days ago when you discussed the 48 hours dealing with this bill, and the bill was on our desk. I didn't look at it. I wasn't aware that the Senate had amended the bill. In fact, it wasn't until yesterday that they passed it on Third Reading.

"I'm somewhat troubled with this bill, having to do with fairness issues. The discussion and argument on the Senate side dealt with fairness. And some of the things that came up were the fact that Senators on the Majority side had two staff people during the interim, where the 5 Republican Minority Members did not.

"So they were being funded, the Majority was being funded with an additional person to handle correspondence and to do all the kinds of things that we all have to do and with less people to help us. That to me is an issue of fairness.

"As far as the reduction that was made in the Ways and Means Committee, I don't know where that money was appropriated. I mean, who was going to receive it and for what position or whatever. But I think ..."

Representative Takai rose to a point of order, stating:

"Point of order, Mr. Speaker. Thank you. I think the speaker is speaking to something totally out of our jurisdiction. In fact, the governance of the Senate is beyond your scope as Speaker, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair then ruled:

"That's correct but it is part of the Senate Draft that we are adopting today. So please proceed, Representative Meyer."

Representative Meyer continued, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. That's absolutely right. The Draft that we sent to the Senate appropriated \$7,216,979 for the operation of the Senate. The bill that came back to us was \$340,000 less.

"There is no explanation in the Committee Report as to what that reduction was. What it represents. Because of some of the lack of fairness issues, or at least the perceived lack of fairness as we are all elected by constituents of very nearly equal numbers of constituents, it only seems proper that we should all be given the same amount of resources to do our jobs. So for those reasons, I'll be voting with reservations. Thank you, Mr. Speaker"

Representative Stonebraker rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would also like to voice my reservations and include the words from the good Representative from Kahaluu. Adding to that, many of us know that it is the responsibility of the House to hold the 'purse strings'. So when it comes to spending money and allocating that to the Senate side, I'm very grateful to the previous speaker for indicating to us what may be an issue of unfairness that is going on perhaps in the Senate.

"It's important that we know that in the interim, the Minority members did not have an equal amount of staff, even though they do serve an equal amount of people. Those kinds of things are very important for us as we vote on these because all of us hope to have a fair and equitable means of funding for every Representative regardless of Party. For those reasons, I'm very grateful that this has come to light. Thank you."

Representative Pine rose in support of the measure with reservations, and asked that the remarks of Representatives Meyer and Stonebraker be entered in the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Finnegan rose in support of the measure with reservations, and asked that the remarks of Representatives Meyer and Stonebraker be entered in the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I will also vote with reservations. I always stand up for parity. I would like to have the words of the Minority Floor Leader incorporated as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Stevens rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations and the same request," and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Also with reservations for the same reasons."

Representative Moses rose in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations and the words of the previous speakers. Thank you."

Representative Chong rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support. To the comments raised by the Representative from Kahaluu in regard to the audit for the Youth Correctional Facility, I think we need to do the audit. The audit is in my district. Its operations clearly affect the well-being of my community, especially in terms of security. I don't see a need to wait to have that audit."

Representative Luke rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Just briefly in support. I also wanted to speak a little bit about the audit for HYCF. Mr. Speaker, the notion that there was no awareness on behalf of the Administration is not true. Whether they knew it when the House Committee heard it. You know, it's irrelevant by the fact that when it went over to the Senate, it was clearly in the budget.

"If the Administration wanted to come and object to the audit, they could have come in front of the Senate Committee. Since we heard that bill, we have heard nothing from the Administration whether anybody objected to the audit.

"The second thing is in August 2005, the Department of Justice came down with a very scathing report of the HYCF and the administration of the HYCF. For us to float a bill as opposed to doing something on behalf of the Legislature would be absurd, because then we would be losing five months before we can actually act and find out more clearly what's going on. I think we need to act now. We need to act fast.

"In the meantime, the ACLU continues to have battles with the HYCF administration and the Lingle Administration. We continue to have abuse at HYCF. That's not something that we should be happy with and just allow it to go on.

"It's also not true that something like this has never happened before. We have done this in a serious situation like the <u>Felix</u> situation. Thank you."

H.B.

Representative Moses rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you Mr. Speaker. I just ask the previous speaker to present to me the documented proof of the abuses. Thank you."

The Chair then stated:

"Thank you very much. She will, after."

Representative Pine rose to respond, stating:

"Yes, Mr. Speaker. I thank the previous speakers for the comments. I just want to make it clear that the Members of the Minority are not against this audit. We believe it's a very serious problem going on with the teenagers and the students there. We're just concerned about the process, Mr. Speaker. We want everything to be transparent here.

"And also, there's also very serious problems like homelessness and people that are losing their families for various reasons. I say we speed all those things up and pass all those things right now. Instead of waiting five months to house these people. Thank you."

Representative Ching rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Stonebraker rose to respond, stating:

"Very briefly, Mr. Speaker. We do agree that an audit of the Youth Correctional Facilities is in order. However, it is surprising that when it comes to light, that a Body counter to us, being a bicameral Legislature here, the Body on the other side. When it comes to light that there has been some injustice as far as funding of positions, it's rather surprising to find no reservations on the part of this Body from the other side of the isle. We don't want to make an issue of this.

"However, it should be something that upon coming to light, that the Senate has had some questionable practices in the past. It would be forthcoming to have a little reservation about that. I'm sure many of the people in this Body were not aware of what was going on, on that side. But now that it is brought up ..."

Representative M. Oshiro rose to a point of order, stating:

"Point of order, Mr. Speaker. I believe the remarks by the current speaker are not germane to this bill before us. The process and procedures of the Body on the other side are not relevant to the discussion in the House Chamber."

The Chair then stated:

"Thank you very much. Representative Stonebraker, could you confine your remarks."

Representative Stonebraker continued, stating:

"Well, pertaining to the spending, the funding, which is primarily the duty of the House. We let the money go. Now if I gave money to my children and I say, this is only to purchase such and such a thing. If I learn that they have purchased other things, I'm going to be concerned the next time that allocate money in that direction.

"So in light of that, finding out that there has been some lack of parity on the other side, I would think that this Body would show some reservation when it comes to voting on this. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1949, SD I, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS TO PROVIDE FOR THE EXPENSES OF THE LEGISLATURE, THE AUDITOR, THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU, AND THE OMBUDSMAN," passed Final

Reading by a vote of 48 aye with Representatives Halford, Kanoho and Saiki being excused.

Representative Finnegan: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As you know, a lot of us are wearing Red for Women today in regards to heart disease. I just wanted to bring awareness to one situation. That is, if you are experiencing pains in your chest, neck, arms, or that sort of things, and please let your elderly parents know that one of the things that I've learned through my husband, who's a fire captain at Kuakini Station, is that you should always call 911 first before trying to call a doctor, or call a family member or anything like that, because those minutes will count. So that's a very important piece of information. I would like to pass it on to Dr. Green to talk a little bit more about the 'Go Red For Women' Day."

Representative Green: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Thank you, Minority Leader. It's an important day because what we're really talking about is, half of our population who, just like the men have heart attacks, have cardiovascular problems, and they have real needs for care.

"Historically, research was done on men. That's something that is really good to know. For many decades, dating well back into our previous centuries, the way we did scientific research, especially in cardiovascular problems, was we had study groups that were only composed of men. Actually, white men for the most part. So what we learned over the years, as far as heart health goes was mostly how best to treat men. Cardiovascular disease in women isn't exactly the same disease as it is in men. We still have to be careful about smoking. We all have to be careful about our diets and all the other risk factors. But there are different presentations. So it's really good that we're addressing this today.

"Finally, Mr. Speaker and colleagues, several people came up to me and they wanted to know if I would say something specifically about a dear colleague of ours. I went to our colleague, Helène Hale and asked her. She gave me permission to make a statement about

"Cardiovascular fitness, vascular fitness in general, affects all of the blood vessels of the body. I just wanted to say, I'm proud to see that one of our colleagues, who has worked through a health problem, is recovering and is contributing to us in an extraordinary fashion, is here with us today having experienced some of these problems that we're honoring today by wearing red and talking about the issue. So I really think it's a good and honorable thing that we're doing today to bring special awareness to cardiovascular disease in women. Particularly in honor of Representative Hale"

Representative Caldwell: "Brief announcement. You know last week Friday, Betty Friedan passed away, the author of Feminine Mystique. Today they're having a memorial service for her at Riverside Drive in Manhattan. For some of us, for example, maybe the Representative from Kaimuki/Kapahulu wasn't born when Feminine Mystique was written. It really helped change the world of women in our country. It resulted in great progress in terms of women in business, women in politics, our current Governor has benefited from what Betty Friedan started. Hopefully we'll see it in further progress. There's much more that needs to be done.

"I thought it could be appropriate at this time to have a moment of silence for Betty Friedan and reflect on what she's done for our country. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

At this time, the House of Representatives stood for a moment of silence in memory of *Feminine Mystique* author, Ms. Betty Friedan.

Representative Cabanilla: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to rise in defense of all of us and the Clerk, as well as for you. I believe the reason why our staff didn't get paid last Friday is because the Executive Order wasn't signed, because the Governor was out of town. I believe the Lt. Governor was in the building. I was just wondering how come the measure to allow our staff to get paid wasn't executed. I stand corrected if I'm wrong with my assumption. But from what I was told, that was the cause of why my staff as well, didn't get paid. Thank you."

Representative Arakaki: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The Committee of Health will be reconvening at 1:00 p.m. in Conference Room 329 for the purpose of hearing one last bill on our agenda and also to make decisions on the measures that we heard in the morning. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Karamatsu: "Your Members of the Economic Development & Business Concerns Committee and Labor Committee will reconvene in Room 423 at 2:15 p.m."

Representative Pine: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Not to continue in this conversation but I just wanted to make clear that it has nothing to do with the Governor. I think it has everything to do with a particular legislative Body here. I'll talk to Representative Cabanilla about what happened there."

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Please note me having reservations on 86 and 87. And just short comments. I am currently a part of the Health Task Force. I know that we are expecting a report come either mid-February hopefully, or the ending of February. I'd like to see where that goes before we move forward. Thank you."

Representative Meyer rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her on both measures, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ching rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her on both measures, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pine rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her on both measures, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Stonebraker rose to speak in opposition to both measures, stating:

"I'd like to register a no vote on both of these please, Mr. Speaker. I'm sure that we'll have a lot of debate on these coming up. We will see these in their future Committees. But this is of course to create the Hawaii Health Authority and for Universal Health Care, to study it. Mr. Speaker, to summarize, this has been studied all over the world in different countries where it's failing. I think it would be disastrous.

"In it's current form, \$1 is allocated. We can save the trouble of passing this bill. I'll give a dollar here to end it. But Mr. Speaker, this is bad idea. And it comes up every year. If you want the health care system to look like the DMV, then this is the bill to do it. But I think it's a bad idea. Thank you."

Representative Green rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, in support. These two bills, we want them to keep moving because we are, as the Minority Leader stated, in the process of a good dialogue to look at whether our system needs to be changed. In some countries around the world, it has benefited the people greatly."

Representative Moses rose to speak in support of both measures with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, reservations on both measures. You know, maybe Universal Health Care is good for some countries, but how come they're all trying to come here? Thank you."

Representative Cabanilla rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in support of this measure. Our health care system is at stake in this State. We are plagued with the high cost of health care. So studying this measure or other measures, it's worthwhile. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the reports of the Committee were adopted and H.B. No. 2670, HD i, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce with Representative Stonebraker voting no, and with Representatives Chang and Souki being excused; and

H.B. No. 2103, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Higher Education with Representative Stonebraker voting no, and with Representatives Chang and Souki being excused.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 88-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2162, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Higher Education.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee

was adopted and H.B. No. 2162, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RURAL HEALTH CARE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Higher Education with Representatives Chang and Souki being excused.

Representative Magaoay, for the Committee on Legislative Management presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 89-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2259, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2259, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Sonson rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"On page 4. Yes, a quick comment in support of Stand. Com. 89-06. Mr. Speaker, you might have noticed a huge headline in the newspapers this Saturday. \$100 million was brought into the State. Mr. Speaker, by just looking at that, it seems that there are millions of dollars coming into the State. We probably have no idea where it's going and how it's being used.

"The current Administration has greatly impacted the amount of money, federal funds, that are coming in. And it's terrific. However, the body, which has been established, the Legislative Auditor, which is the body I think that we need at this point; because we need to be sure that the money that's coming in, the federal funds that are coming in, will be spent wisely.

"Let me tell you one thing that has been done that presents the concern that will be resolved by this. Mr. Speaker, \$100 million is actually brought here because there is now an obligation of the State to continue. We have no choice on it because we have been obligated, unilaterally by the Administration to a contract with the federal government. But we must continue.

"Indeed we have been subsidizing the federally qualified health centers, and we've been willing to do so. However Mr. Speaker, the Legislature has not had anything to say regarding the continued funding over 6 years, which made this amount of federal funds coming in. Moreover, Mr. Speaker, the money that is going to be brought in within the next 6 years, \$50 million every year seems to be targeted to be distributed to private hospitals.

"Again, Mr. Speaker, federal funds are coming into the State. The Legislature at this point has no say in how it's being distributed. We don't know whether or not the programs being funded by these funds are the best. We don't know whether or not we're getting the best bang, I've always wanted to say this, for the buck.

"So, Mr. Speaker, funding these positions that has been created, as the Legislative Analyst, is wise. It's again, in adopting words from the Administration, it's not going to cost the State anything because it's going to be federally funded. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Finnegan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, in support. I just wanted to make a couple comments in regards to these federal funds. Yes, these federal funds should be credited to the hard work of the Administration because they've been working very hard to get us these additional funds.

"We've seen a lot of positive affects from that in regards to making payments to some of these private hospitals who take care of our Medicaid clients. So I definitely think that we're heading in the right direction. I don't think that there's ever been a time, at least I haven't been a part of any conversation, memos, or letters that have said that the Administration does not want any guidance, leadership, from the

Legislature. So I will stand in support of this measure. But I definitely think that that ability is already there. Thank you,"

Representative Meyer rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising with some reservations on this measure. I noticed in the Committee Report it says, 'the purpose of this bill is to take steps, to activate the dormant office', dormant office at the Legislative Analyst. So for many years, we have had no need for this position.

"My concern is that because we have a surplus, we're finding ways to spend it. I believe that the present Administration has, at least in some of the departments, the Department of Human Services, they have maximized the use of the federal money. I think each department; it's their responsibility to account for the federal money. They are working in that arena day in and day out. I just question the needs of this. So that's the reason for my reservations. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2259, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OFFICE OF THE LEGISLATIVE ANALYST," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Chang and Souki being excused.

Representative Magaoay, for the Committee on Legislative Management presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 90-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2712, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. "I'm sorry Mr. Speaker. I'm a little slow on the uptake. Just quickly on Stand. Com. Report Number 95. I would just like to register with reservations. I'll just withhold my comments for Third Reading. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2138, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COASTAL ZONE MANAGEMENT," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Chang and Souki being excused.

Representatives Takumi and Sonson, for the Committee on Education and the Committee on Human Services presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 96-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2364, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representatives Sonson and Arakaki, for the Committee on Human Services and the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 97-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3130, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 3130, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Ching rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise with deep reservations on Stand. Com. Report 97. This bill, I have said, and I suppose it's an old issue that comes up every year. It has a wonderful intent in protecting children. However, what I find difficult with the bill as written right

now is that it does not take into account the whole picture. At the crux of it is the anonymity.

"On page 2 of the bill it says, anonymity, confidentiality, and freedom from prosecution for parents may encourage them to leave the newborn infant at a suitably safe place. There's speculation as to what encourages someone to abandon their baby at any given place. But the problem with the anonymity part of that is that it causes many problems down on the line because it forever severs the relationship of that parent and child, and the ramifications as you know are medical. You can see there is no medical history required or asked for in this bill. The medical history can change. Then if you can't find the parent or the child, and you're in need of plasma or bone marrow, or such, of course can't find the person. So that kind of defeats the purpose.

"Secondarily, what does not change? Medical conditions change. Some people don't know they're going to get diabetes in ten years. But they might. What doesn't change is people's identity, their ethnic background, their genetics. So we're finding that many diseases are oriented towards what particular ethic group you might come from. So as it's written, I still have problems as it is written. But I will go with reservations because of the intent. Thank you."

Representative Moses rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Arakaki rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support of this measure. I just want to note that now, we're just one of five States that don't have some type of safe haven or safety net provisions. Really, this really is a life saving measure. Even if it only saves one life, I think it'll be worth it.

"I also want to note that, although I didn't have a chance to talk to my colleague from Liliha, last year, we did make some amendments. The current bill reflects those amendments to allow the personnel at the hospital, fire station, or police station; although they may not inquire as to the identity of the person leaving the newborn child, they can inform the person that the information may be voluntarily put forth regarding any medical history, including major illnesses or disease. It also allows the personnel to ask the person leaving the newborn child, about the history of the child.

"So I think we need to keep the fact that the information has to be confidential, unless it's volunteered. But with that, I think to the greatest extent possible, we want to be sensitive to the issues brought up by the Representative from Liliha. Tthank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative rose Finnegan and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Meyer rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3130, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD PROTECTION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Chang and Souki being excused.

Representative Arakaki rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in support of the measure with some reservations. Thank you. I'm supporting this measure because I'd like to support the Chair of Human Services and his concerns for the problems that were brought up, especially in light of the many interim briefings that they had on the problems at the Youth Correctional Facility.

"I guess my concern is that over the years we've really not provided the needed resources at the Youth Correctional Facility. In fact, the Office of Youth Services has needed to fulfill their mandate. And I would hate to see our Youth Correctional Facility become just another prison.

"There are many corrections that need to be made. I'm just hoping that along with the reformation and this new structure, there'd be added resources provided, because without the resources, it's like just rearranging the deck chairs in the *Titanic*. It's going to take a great deal of resources to turn the ship around.

"There's a Department of Justice settlement that was just issued. There was also a finding in the District Court against the Administrators, both of the Office of Youth Services and the Administrator for the Youth Correctional Facility. And these are very grave charges that were made of abuses against young people who are wards of the State. I don't think we can allow this to continue happening.

"So I'm hoping that by supporting the Chair and his efforts, that we can resolve this problem and get immediate action and provide especially the emergency funding that the Youth Correctional Facility and the Office of Youth Services need to make the changes. So with that, Mr. Speaker, I urge everyone to support this measure."

Representative Moses rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"I'd like to note my reservations on the measure. I believe it's another level of bureaucracy and it's not going to solve the problem. It's just going to make it worse. Thank you."

Representative Sonson rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. This is a very important measure, Mr. Speaker. This measure as it moves along, will actually help to solve the problems that has been undergoing at the HYCF, OYS. OYS oversees HYCF. In the agreement that's been reached by the State and the feds that was signed yesterday, also mentioned by a prior speaker, actually speaks to HYCF as having the problem. What the bill does is to isolate HYCF on itself, give it more autonomy, and also ensure that the resources are indeed provided.

"The concern of the Health Chair that the resources has not been given to OYS in the past is true. We have not. However, we are not there now, we are here. We are trying to face a problem that's been created by the lack of resources in the past. New resources must be afforded to the facility. As I read the agreement between the Federal Government and the State of Hawaii, it seems to indicate that there will be a monitor, Mr. Van Fleet, who will be overseeing this agreement to ensure there's implementation of the conditions contained therein.

"It also states here that there will be identification of new resources in the federal side, to ensure that we are successful. HYCF must be successful. It is their duty to ensure that the kids that go in there are treated for mental health, medical needs. And treated in such a way to ensure that they are safe from each other, that they are safe from the workers that work there, and so forth, that they are free from harassment, and the other things that were complained about in the separate lawsuit brought on by the ACLU.

"This bill, as it moves forward, I hope that, Mr. Speaker, that everyone can continue to look at it and support it because it is indeed very important that we do not fail in meeting all the conditions that are contained in this agreement with the DOJ. If we fail, then a lawsuit will ensue. A consent degree is not and I would backup, I would like to credit the State Attorney General in doing a fine job in negotiating with DOJ to ensure that we don't have a federal consent decree over our heads; that the DOJ is allowing the State to try to address the concerns and the problems that are brought on by the ACLU head-on and be given an opportunity to fix it within three years.

"As stated in the article that's been written in *Honolulu Advertiser*, Mr. Bennett has said that the work has already been done. And thanks to the Committee that worked over the interim, that looked and identified the problems that were complained of. It is the interaction between that Committee that was formed, and the questions that they've asked the Administrators of the facility that has started not only the dialogue going, but actually the work going. There have been massive improvements already, although there are a lot of things to be done. And yes, we do need the resources and we need your support. Thank you very much."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. "I'm assuming we're talking about 110. Mr. Vice Speaker, I rise with reservations regarding this bill. I have a very serious concern about carving out the requirement for licensing for certain unlicensed contractors for repairs. I feel this is a very, very, very important

issue for many of our property managers. You know, incidental repairs. But as long as we're going to require a whole large group of small businesses to follow very strict requirements for licensing, which includes many, many requirements for insurance and other requirements, that we have to be very, very careful about who we allow to do unlicensed work because of the potential liability and injury to the employees of the business community.

"So again, with very strong reservations. I really, really, request that we proceed very cautiously on extending unlicensed activity."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. Because what I'm very, very concerned about is the studies on the mainland have shown, when you do these types of release of taxes, it just adds to the profit coffers of the oil companies, which is

money still coming out of the backs of our people of Hawaii. So if we're going to take away gross excise tax, which I support in many measures as we all, know, let us please proceed cautiously with some type of protection that this doesn't end up being another profit column for the oil companies."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2877, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GENERAL EXCISE TAX," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Chang, Kahikina and Kawakami being excused

So I think we should take a look at this one. Thank you."

"Yes, thank you, Vice Speaker. I stand in very, very strong support. I wanted to take this opportunity to speak to what exactly is Mutual Benefit Society. What it is in our laws. This is, the Mutual Benefit Society is a law that was passed in the early 70s. Mutual Benefit Societies were created by nurses to attempt to expedite healthcare to the people of Hawaii. Basically the workers, the employees of the small business community of which the Prepaid Healthcare Act mandates coverage.

"This started off as a very, very wonderful concept. However, the Mutual Benefit Society Law has not been looked at or reviewed since the early 70s. What is happening now is that the members of the Mutual Benefit Society, especially the healthcare organizations, the members which our employees and workers have no voice in the management appointment of the Boards of Directors, or even have the ability to bring forth any special hearings or request to address management of the Mutual Benefit Societies.

"What we need to do is we need to have that particular law looked at but if not at least some type of oversight that the rights of our employees are protected as the owners and members of the Mutual Benefit Societies and that's the reason that I am standing in very strong support and I ask that my fellow colleagues really take a look at the Mutual Benefit Societies laws as it stands. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. Sounds like a good bill and God knows, I mean I'm a Marine. Most police officers, you know, they end up coming from the military and such. We're all for them. My problem with it is it's a negotiable item and if they're unhappy with the maintenance allowance that they get now or the uniform or the weapons they get now, they should negotiate that contract. What we're doing is setting it up so anytime a bargaining unit in this State doesn't like what they bargain for, they'll come back to us and ask us to make them whole again and I think it's a dangerous precedent. We ought to be very careful."

Representative Ito rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm in support. Mr. Speaker, this is not a collective bargaining issue. This is a public safety issue. This version will allow officers, to buy equipment, offer some monetary relief to help minimize a pay differential between Hawaii police officers and that of other jurisdictions. It's a valuable tool for the retention and equipment of our officers, and this will help address the State shortage issue in our police department. If you read this Sunday's paper there was an article on Chief Correa and he explained it clearly that they need some help. Thank you."

Representative Meyer rose in support of the measure with reservations, and asked that the remarks of Representative Moses be entered in the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Yamane rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support. Our officers are on duty 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. They're required to report in and respond to situations even though they're off duty. If we value our safety, want to make sure that our communities have adequate officers, if you want to tackle the issues of drugs, ice, property crimes, murder, and incidents against the innocents, then we need to start standing up and supporting the men and women that make our community safe. Thank you."

Representative Waters rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. We need to support our brave men and women in blue and I like to incorporate the words of the Chair of Public Safety as my own," and the Chair "so ordered."

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This goes back to the police officers. This is a tax credit for law enforcement officers. I'm speaking with reservations. Again it's a negotiable item. We heard it on the previous measure that we should support them and I do support them and therefore, I will support their bargaining unit to get more money for their uniforms, etc. This is a tax credit so they can go out and buy vests, bulletproof vests. They're issued bulletproof vests now. Some of the officers don't care for the vest that's issued to them. They think it's too heavy so they go out and buy a different one and that's fine but I don't think we should pay for it. I think they should go back and negotiate for the vest that they choose. There are more of them than us and I think they could do that. Thank you."

Representative Stevens rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise up with reservations. Thank you. I certainly support the police officers safety. The reason for my reservations is that we did receive some testimony if these officers buy these upgraded vests, their insurance policy would be null and voided. If they were injured when they were wearing those vests. So I would like to see as this bill moves along perhaps that loophole could be corrected. Thank you."

Representative Ito rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. Mr. Speaker, this bill is to assist our law enforcement officers by providing a one time, one time tax credit to purchase non-departmental bulletproof vest. Right now the tax credit reimburses police officers for an amount equal to the difference between the cost of a high quality vest and the cost of a department-issued vest. The department-issued vests do not adequately withstand the stress of daily use. For example, an officer's perspiration, weight, and body size are factors that can contribute to the failure of a vest with a possible result of serious injury to the officer. Again, Mr. Speaker, this is not a collective bargaining issue. This is a public safety issue. Thank you."

Representative Yamane rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Standing in strong support. We've been hearing about supporting our police officers. Well what does support mean, Mr. Speaker? The Director of Taxation states that this legislation will result in a loss of approximately \$10,000 to \$15,000, Mr. Speaker. One time, \$15,000. Is that what we call support? Thank you."

Representative Ching rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, in strong support. Our police officers put their lives on the line for us. And if individuals need certain types of vests to protect them to the greatest extent possible, I would like to stand in support of protecting those that protect us. Thank you."

Representative Kanoho rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. A ruling on a potential conflict. I have two sons who are police officers," and the Chair ruled "no conflict."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2131, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAX CREDITS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Chang, Kahikina and Kawakami being excused.

Representatives Ito and Caldwell, for the Committee on Public Safety & Military Affairs and the Committee on Labor & Public Employment presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 126-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1999, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1999, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Halford rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Moses rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, in opposition. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The Adjutant General's Office, our major defense and civil defense agency in this State, is doing an annual review. Actually, a reorganization review and it will be due in October of this year. We're looking at reorganization. I think what we're doing here is we're jumping the gun. They testified against this measure and they said, 'Let's wait until the reorganization review is published this October and see what is needed.' Thank you."

Representative Stonebraker rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Stevens rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you. I would just like to register a no vote. We did receive really compelling testimony in opposition from the Department of Defense in Committee. Our Civil Defense Department has just received national recognition for their tsunami readiness and I feel that the organization should be allowed to complete their reorganization study before we pass this measure. Thank you."

Representative Finnegan rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pine rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ito rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. You know, Mr. Speaker, you know, this will give the Governor, first hand information to react. Right now within the chain of command, it goes through several bureaucracies. And if you saw what FEMA did on the mainland, it wasn't within the cabinet. It was detached from the cabinet so the response time was very, very slow.

"Mr. Speaker, with our increased concern about terrorism and natural disasters, Hawaii's state of readiness to respond is critical to the safety, welfare, and defense of our people. It is imperative that our Civil Defense team has the authority to act quickly and therefore I believe this proposal merits further discussion.

"Mr. Speaker, I just want to say that the reason why they got the award is because of our package last Session about the hurricane preparedness. So again it was the Legislature that took the initiative. Thank you."

Representative Meyer rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I'm rising in opposition to this measure. Having lived through Hurricane lniki right in Kauai, sort of in the eye of the storm and seeing how well that the Civil Defense worked with the National Guard, which is under, is now under General Lee's command, I think you needed that coordination between those two groups. Many people that come out to work for the Civil Defense are volunteers and I mean they work very hard but it's not a pay job, and I think they benefit greatly by being attached to a bonafide military organization. And I think we ought to wait till that report is

completed before we move forward with this. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations. Thank you. I really appreciate the comments from the Chair of Public Safety and what the intent of the bill is. I would just like to think that we could address those concerns about quick response time in another manner than creating another department. Thank you."

Representative Ching rose in support of the measure with reservations, and asked that the remarks of Representative Evans be entered in the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Yamane rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Ito be entered in the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 1999, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO A DEPARTMENT OF CIVIL DEFENSE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Finnegan, Halford, Meyer, Moses, Stevens and Stonebraker voting no, and with Representatives Chang, Kahikina and Kawakami being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Judiciary presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 127-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2521, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2521, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR COMMUNITY ANTI-DRUG FUND," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Chang, Kahikina and Kawakami being excused.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. "Mr. Speaker. Thank you. Mr. Speaker, I'd like to have a no vote cast for me on House Bill 1840, please. I don't support the safe harbors. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1840, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONSERVATION," was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representative Thielen voting no, and with Representatives Chang, Kahikina and Kawakami being excused.

Representative Morita, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 135-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2039, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2039, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker. I'd like to speak in support of this measure. This measure is part of a package of legislation that was put forth by the Mililani Drug Free, which is a community group in Central Oahu. And I just briefly would like to say that Hawaii is currently experiencing a severe housing shortage and we need to ensure that every available property is habitable especially for our *keiki*. We also need to give landlords and law enforcement officials guidance on what constitutes a thorough decontamination. I have additional written remarks that I'd like to insert in the Journal. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker," and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lee's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker. With the popularity of synthetic drugs like crystal methamphetamine, clean up of illegal drug production facilities has become a major problem.

"Many of the chemicals used in the production of crystal meth are toxic especially to children. These chemicals include volatile organic chemicals like toluene, acetone, methanol, petroleum distillates and ethers, lead (depending on the manufacturing method) and mercury (also depending on the manufacturing method).

"When illegal labs are discovered, human habitation of the premises is often unsafe. To determine whether living in the building is safe and to conduct necessary clean up, it is important to adopt regulations for the testing and decontamination of property used for the production of illegal drugs.

"Hawaii is currently experiencing a severe housing shortage. We need to ensure that every available property is habitable especially for our *keiki*. We also need to give landlords and law enforcement officials guidance on what constitutes a thorough decontamination."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. "Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support of this measure. In my district, over the past couple of years we suffered with several grounded vessels that really are an eyesore and pollute our beaches. And sometimes the bureaucracy to get them removed off the beaches has been troubling. I would like to applaud Chair Kanoho and the WLO Committee for moving along this measure. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2397, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GROUNDED VESSELS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Chang, Kahikina and Kawakami being excused.

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support. This bill is a perfect example of what we as legislators need to do, which is to establish policy and release the law to the Administration to implement. And this dismisses the sunset that was imposed and I strongly support this measure. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2518, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE AND COUNTY TORT LIABILITY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Chang, Kahikina and Kawakami being excused.

Representative Sonson rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"I believe 146, Relating to Child Endangerment. I believe this measure, and I'm speaking with strong reservations, Mr. Speaker. This would make it illegal actually to leave a child and a child is defined as under the age of 9 in the bill, unsupervised in a motor vehicle. We may open up certain circumstances where we really have to take a look at.

"What's going on in our schools today is that if you go to Waipahu Elementary, when the bell rings and it's time to go home, children that are 9 years old may walk home. This bill says that we can't leave them without supervision in a car and yet we're going to be allowing them to walk home. This may lead to a situation where shall we then lock up our kids in the school to ensure that they are safe.

"I think that there are a lot of concerns out there regarding or as a result of what has happened to a child that was accidentally abducted when this person tried to steal a car. I'm not sure if we're not just overreacting with legislation such as this. It did fix up at least a more concerning portion of it where it was actually at age 15, which I think is very unreasonable. That if you leave a child in a car supervised but by a person, another child that is age 15, it would be a criminal act. So although we did improve some, Mr. Speaker, I still think we really need to think about this some more and perhaps look at what other things are impacted by this bill. Thank you."

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I like to speak in favor of the measure. Mr. Speaker, would you leave \$1 million in your car? Would you let your child play with a loaded gun? Of course not, not even for a minute. Lots of caring and responsible parents have left their children alone and around a car not realizing the risks involved. Some parents think it's okay to leave a child in a car alone while they run into a store, quickly drop off dry cleaning or drop off another child in school. The dangers are real.

"The results of leaving a child unattended in or around a vehicle can be deadly and in the hands of a child, a car is a lethal weapon. It's dangerous to leave children unattended in or around a vehicle because children are naturally curious, they like to pretend to drive and they can set the vehicle in motion. Young children are impulsive, unpredictable, and move very fast. I'm sure you know that, Mr. Speaker. They can quickly get into the path of a moving vehicle.

"Young children have very poor judgment and little understanding of danger, they're not aware of the hazards of motor vehicles. Children left in vehicle with keys in the ignition are at risk of being taken with the vehicle. Children can activate power accessories and become trapped in windows or sunroofs. The Center for Disease Control and Prevention reports that from July 1, 2000 through June 30, 2001, an estimated 9,160 children age 14 years and younger were treated in US hospital emergency departments for injuries caused by being left unattended in and around motor vehicles.

"A local merchant observed people are more concerned about taking their wallets and purses out of cars than about leaving their keiki alone in a car. The recent incident in Wahiawa on the day that this bill was passed I think illustrates my point. Thank you very much "

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1787, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD ENDANGERMENT," passed Second Reading, and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading with Representatives Chang, Kahikina and Kawakami being excused.

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support. The only reason that I'm standing is I just think this is part of the whole package that we're trying to push forward on affordable housing. What I'd like to see in this bill, if at all possible, is to construct teacher housing and student housing on or adjacent to the planned State facilities. If it's just a possibility to include that in there. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2240, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AFFORDABLE HOUSING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Caldwell, for the Committee on Labor & Public Employment presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 179-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2237, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Education.

Representative Meyer rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising in support with some fairly strong reservations. This bill creates a collective bargaining unit for substitute teachers of the Department of the Education including, the way that it was amended, it also now includes part-time substitute teachers working less than one-half of a full-time equivalent. It also covers part-time employees working more than 20-hours. So this may be people doing janitorial work, cleaning rooms and things such as that.

"Substitute teachers are defined as casual employees. Establishing a collective bargaining unit for substitute teachers would set a precedent for other casual employees. Additional cost would incur such as medical and other employee benefits, the number of hours worked, and the benefits received would create an administrative challenge to determine cost-sharing arrangements. All substitute teachers would be required to be teacher trained and be subjected to

similar employment qualifications of high educational standards and be licensed, according to No Child Left Behind.

"Only 44% of the 4,100 substitute teachers are presently licensed. This would adversely impact the pool of substitute teachers. This bill will also extend bargaining rights to substitute teachers, but not to other half-time ... No, that's incorrect. That was the original bill.

"Another reason I was surprised that this bill came out is because there was a task force of substitute teachers and out of that, that was not of priority for them to join a union. They wanted medical insurance or a \$700 bonus if they worked 90 days out of the year. But as far as the union, the bargaining unit, that was not one of their priorities. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2237, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COLLECTIVE BARGAINING IN PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Education with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

I just think that we should not be getting in the middle of what should be a collective bargaining situation, when you're talking about wages. So that's why I have strong reservations."

Representative Sonson rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support of this Spyware Bill. First, I'd like to thank the Chair of CPC for moving this bill out. Mr. Speaker, the purpose of this bill is to protect Hawaii. The purpose of the bill is to protect Hawaii computer users from attacks by malicious software programs, oftentimes called "search and replace," which use

their system in order to gather confidential information or are designed to compromise the confidentiality, availability, or integrity of data on a user's computers.

"The bill allows the Attorney General or a prosecuting attorney to seek up to \$2,500 per violation, and includes a provision for private individuals to seek up to \$5,000, or three times the amount of actual damages caused by the malicious software, whichever is greater.

At present, Mr. Speaker, there are 12 States that already have laws similar to this measure. Hawaii needs to be defended against the onslaught electronic threats on the Internet. House Bill 2256 will deter companies that make a profit by exploiting the security vulnerabilities of consumers and malicious software programmers, known as 'hackers', from attacking Hawaii computer users with impunity. I strongly encourage my colleagues to support this measure.

"The companion bill in the Senate died, Mr. Speaker. The reason for that is that there was objection from the police department, seemingly because they said it would be difficult to enforce. I believe, Mr. Speaker, that because the bill provides for private enforcement also, I think we should keep it alive and keep it moving. It is important for computer users, such as you and me, to ensure that there is at least something on the books that hackers will look at which will in itself form a deterrent. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2256, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONSUMER PROTECTION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2308, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENERGY," passed Second Reading and was referred jointly to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce and the Committee on Higher Education with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Morita, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 193-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3218, pass Second Reading and be referred jointly to the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns and the Committee on Agriculture.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 3218, pass Second Reading and be referred jointly to the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns and the Committee on Agriculture, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, I am going to cast a no vote on House Bill 3218. Thank you. I do believe that we need to get more information about genetically modified organisms that are presently in Hawaii. I think it needs to be much more transparent. The bill needs some work. I look forward to supporting it later on. Thank you."

Representative Kanoho rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3218, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GENETICALLY MODIFIED ORGANISMS," passed Second Reading and was referred jointly to the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns and the Committee on Agriculture with Representatives Kanoho and Thielen voting no, and with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Transportation presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 194-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1807, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1807, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro. Representative Moses rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise with reservations. This is talking about steel plates over ditches and such in the road. A very good idea, we should have them. Motorcycles are especially susceptible to hitting a steel plate. What they want is a warning before it. Good idea, but we already have standards for that. We have national standards that apply. Our State highways already comply with this. The county says they already do too. So I'm not sure if it's private people that are putting out steel plates without any signs. So signs are needed, but we have to make sure we don't go afoul of the federal guidelines for our roads. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1807, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HIGHWAY SAFETY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Transportation presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 195-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1812, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1812, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Moses rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is red light photo cameras. It may be a good idea. I'm speaking with reservations. Thank you. It may be a good idea. The problem is the camera takes a picture of the license plate and the intersection. It doesn't take a picture of the person, the driver. I know it talks about, well, it's expected that it's the registered driver unless you prove that somebody else is driving your car. That's all well and good. But I think when you get to court, it's going to require that you prove who was actually driving it. And the camera won't do that.

"The bill itself says: No summons or citation pursuant to the photo red light imaging detector systems program shall be issued unless it contains a clear and unobstructed photographic, digital, or other visual image of the driver of the motor vehicle.

"That's right in the bill itself. Yet in the other places in the bill, it says: picture of the license place at the intersection. So, there's some conflict. Thank you."

Representative Harbin rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in complete support of this measure. My Neighborhood Boards in my district, in Chinatown and the Keeaumoku area, we are trying so hard to protect our elders. I guess I'm one of them too, because I've almost gotten run over a couple of times. But we need to, we need to start implementing deterrents because it will make our drivers be a little bit more considerate of the people in the crosswalks. Thank you."

Representative Stevens rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Harbin be entered in the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Stonebraker rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm opposed to this measure. I was here when we had that traffic cam debacle a couple of years ago. It actually is a

nice breather from the monotony that happens. A lot of people were here. There's a lot of things going on in the news.

"I think the general consensus from the people in the community was that the traffic cameras really weren't working to deter speeders or accidents. But really they were in place to generate income. I think that was the feeling of many people in the community. I felt the same thing.

"The problem with that program was that the cameras weren't set up in the rural neighborhood areas where they were needed the most. But they were set up in very large thoroughfares, Mr. Speaker, where the most amounts of tickets could be generated. And so what you had is people breaking the speed limit and receiving a ticket in the mail, when they had really only gone two or three ..."

Representative Souki rose to a point of order, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, point of order. I believe the Representative is speaking about a bill that has long since seen its demise. It doesn't have any relevance here to this bill. Thank you."

The Chair then stated:

"Representative Stonebraker, please proceed but confine your remarks to the bill dealing with the red lights."

Representative Stonebraker continued, stating:

"I appreciate my esteemed colleague's concern for the subject matter here. Thank you for interrupting me, Mr. Souki.

"Mr. Speaker, the issue is that it's generating money. The real problem is not that we don't have cameras. The problem is that we don't support our police officers. For years, this Body has refused to allow the unadjudicated traffic fines to go directly to the police officers. Here is another example that since we have not supported the police officers directly, allowing them to keep the money that they worked for in giving tickets, in keeping law and order on the street. Now, my concern is that we're going to put up these traffic cameras that will be not designed to keep safety, not designed to protect pedestrians, but rather they'll be another way that we can generate income.

"The Standing Committee Report even says that this is to be administrated by the counties and the funds will go in a general fund. I haven't been able to see thoroughly the text of the bill itself, but I believe what's going to happen is the counties are going to administer and the State is going to reap a windfall. I don't think this is fair and I don't that this is the way we should go about protecting our citizens. Thank you."

Representative Souki rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, point of information. If I can for this Body here on this particular bill. I wish to speak in favor of this bill. The money is going to be deposited in the general fund only as it prepares to disburse the money to the counties. It goes into the general fund and then to the respective counties. Thank you very much."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1812, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HIGHWAY SAFETY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representative Stonebraker voting no, and with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Transportation presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 196-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1901, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1901, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Moses rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is another pedestrian safety measure. I'm in support but with reservations. And I'm all for protecting pedestrians whether they be *keiki*, the elderly, or any of us at any age. This one provides for red flags at the intersections. So you pick up a red flag, hold it out, cross the street, put it in a bucket. My reservation is not with protecting the safety of the people, but I just can't see this working. I can't see the flags remaining in the bucket. I think they'll end up walking across the street themselves. Thank you."

The Chair then stated:

"For the edification of the Members of this House, this particular measure has two more Committees to make the crossover. So it's going go to Judiciary, where the Committee Members on Judiciary will have another opportunity to address the concerns that are being voiced."

Representative Stonebraker rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Very briefly, Mr. Speaker, in opposition. This kind of regulation I think should raise a red flag for anyone of the legislators here. This is ridiculous."

Representative Finnegan rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker. I like to speak in favor of the measure that we just passed. Mr. Speaker, I'm well aware that we have a time crunch here, but I think that it's important to speak about this measure because it's another way to look at how we can cut down our dubious distinction of being the leader in the nation in pedestrian deaths.

"In 2005 we began to crack down on drivers who failed to yield to pedestrians. Media outlets ran stories warning drivers to yield to pedestrians. The police department focused their enforcement on drivers that fail to yield to pedestrians. And as a result drivers became more aware of pedestrian right-of-way laws, but in 2005 we have 33 pedestrians killed by cars so obviously something's not working. We're just about the worst in the nation.

"So a few years ago, Salt Lake City, Utah, faced the same problem. The National Transportation Agency ranked the city first in the nation in pedestrian deaths and as a result, Salt Lake City tried this unconventional method to protect pedestrians. They did have success. There've been a number of other cities in the nation that have tried this and have found it successful.

"The bill would establish a pilot flag program similar to the highly effective flag program of Salt Lake City. Several of Hawaii's most dangerous intersections as chosen by the Department of Transportation will be provided with containers and day-glow flags. Over the course of two years the data would be collected on the effectiveness of the flag program. Twenty days before the 2008 Legislative Session a report will be provided to the Legislature. At that time the Legislature will decide the fate of the program based on its effectiveness.

"The flag program is unconventional in many ways. For one, the use of a flag is completely voluntary. Secondly, unlike the majority

of pedestrian safety measures it approaches the problem of pedestrian safety from the pedestrian side. Clearly the most unusual aspect of the flag program is how well it has worked in other cities. Will it be as astoundingly effective here in Hawaii? Your vote in favor of this bill will allow us to find out. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1901, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PEDESTRIAN SAFETY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representative Stonebraker voting no, and with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Transportation presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 197-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1904, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1904, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRAFFIC SAFETY AT PUBLIC SCHOOLS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Transportation presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 198-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1953, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1953, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Transportation presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 199-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2234, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2234, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Ching rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in strong support of this measure. I agree with many of the premises here on the Standing Committee Report, Relating to Motor Scooters and I would like to add that a number of our other densely populated neighborhoods also suffer noise pollution. This an issue that while it perhaps has not gotten the proper coverage, it is a real quality-of-life issue for us. Especially our elderly who have spent their many years and their resources to purchase a home only to not be able to sleep at night, and to have it eroded by inconsiderate mopeds and motor scooters that are actually being altered at times, I believe by the stores themselves. So in strong support, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2234, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR SCOOTERS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Transportation presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 200-06) recommending

that H.B. No. 2264, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2264, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STREET LIGHTING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Transportation presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 201-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2655, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2655, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Stonebraker rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2655, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLE ACCIDENT INVESTIGATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Transportation presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 202-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2214, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2214, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Moses rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is relating to the Rental Motor Vehicles Surcharge Tax. If this Body remembers, we used to charge a \$2 tax for rental vehicles. I'm in support with reservations. And then we raised it to \$3 a few years ago, and it's due to sunset August 31, 2007. So it's good. I like the sunset. I like taking less tax from the people even if they're visitors.

"The problem with this is we're reverting it early back to \$2, and it's estimated by DOTAX that's it about \$17 million loss for the Highway Special Fund, where this money goes. Now the problem with that loss for the Highway Special Fund is that that money is already figured in to the plans for the construction of the roads and the repaves of the roads, and much of it is matched 4 to 1 by the federal government.

"So by taking this money out of the Highway Special Fund, we're going to drop some of the projects that have already been planned through the OMPO planning process and they're already in our constrained STIP, State Transportation Improvement Plan.

"So I don't know who is going to make up the money. I guess the Legislature could put some money from the general fund into the Highway Special Fund, but I'm not sure if we can or not. Thank you."

Representative Ching rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, with reservations as well. I wanted to reiterate the concerns of taking a \$17 million loss to CIP projects, a loss to supplements of the CIP projects as well. I think that we are already an attractive, I understand from the tourism industry, we're the most desirable place to visit. So I don't think that lowering taxes needs to be, in this particular case, to visitors, needs to be encouraged to make us more attractive. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2214, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RENTAL MOTOR VEHICLE SURCHARGE TAX," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Transportation presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 203-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2244, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2244, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE MOTOR VEHICLE RENTAL INDUSTRY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Transportation presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 204-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2735, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2735, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT APPROPRIATING FUNDS FOR BRIDGE SIGNS ON HANA HIGHWAY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Saiki, for the Committee on Hawaiian Affairs presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 205-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3216, as amended in HD I, pass Second Reading and be referred jointly to the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection and the Committee on Legislative Management.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3216, HD I, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ISLAND OF KAHO'OLAWE," passed Second Reading and was referred jointly to the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection and the Committee on Legislative Management with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Takumi, for the Committee on Education presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 206-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1884, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1884, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Finnegan rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising in support with reservations. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I surely support measures like these for programs and positions like the Hoa Aina O Makaha. The

reservations that I do have though is that we are going directly opposite in where we wanted to be with the weighted student formula and we should really try to resist so that we can build the weighted student formula to what its intent was supposed to be. So that's my reservations. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1884, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representatives Ito and Chang, for the Committee on Public Safety & Military Affairs and the Committee on Tourism & Culture presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 207-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2000, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2000, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker. I rise with reservations. I believe there's really good intentions in this bill because we always worry about people getting hurt from fireworks, but I really worry about government going too far in looking at the behavior of people. The best example I have is young people like to run around in playgrounds. And if you look at children you think, in my mind sometimes, they're just accidents waiting to happen, and it takes adults to teach them and educate them about you know the potential hazards. A good example in the parks is swing sets and swings. If you don't teach your children to be careful, you're going to get hit by a swing. So I really have concerns how far we're going to go with outlawing and restricting fireworks. Thank you."

Representative Moses rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising in support with reservations. Yes, Mr. Speaker. This measure bans non-aerial common fireworks that means sparklers, snakes, those such of things that our children use. It bans them only in counties over 500,000. I guess that's us. And it bans the use of them on the Fourth of July. Only on the Fourth of July. I don't know what the intent of the measure is. If it's to stop fires, well then let's look at the fires that were started this last Fourth of July.

"There were a lot of fires where I live, out Leeward way especially. Most of them were by arsonists. They were not caused by the normal use of fireworks even the aerial fireworks. That's not what caused the fires. Ask the firemen. They were caused by arsonists. They were caused on purpose either by using flares or by setting brushfires.

"So it doesn't seem like this measure is for the purpose of stopping fires. It seems it's to punish the patriotic celebration of the Fourth of July. Thank you."

Representative Cabanilla rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise with reservation on this measure. I think every now and then, or every year, we always look at fireworks and we always blame fires on fireworks. I think it's time for us to realize that every time we visit this topic we're visiting tradition. I've lived in Hawaii for 40 years and one of the things I look forward to is New Year's and July 4th because I get to enjoy myself and watch my children play.

"I think rather than looking at this fireworks bill in the way we are looking at it now, we should look at people's behavior and how they use it, rather than restrict sales. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stevens rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support with reservations. I just don't feel that we should take one holiday and eliminate the celebration, the traditional type of celebration of that holiday and leave it for the others. If our intent is to ban all firework use, I think it should go across all holidays. Taking the Fourth of July out of all the other holidays that we traditionally celebrate with fireworks, I just think it's not achieving the purpose that we would set out. Thank you."

Representative Meyer rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising in opposition to this measure. I feel that this is just an incremental way to have the Legislature eventually ban all fireworks of every kind, totally. I was born and raised in Hawaii. This was always an exciting time. In our neighborhood for the Fourth of July, New Year's, it is a cultural practice. It's something that is so much a part of Hawaii and I would hate to see that gone.

"The area that I represent has people of all ethnic persuasions. When I go door to door, I have people that say they have stopped voting when we banned fireworks, the aerials and put a restriction where you had to pay a permit to get the firecrackers. Last New Year's in Kahaluu it was pretty quiet actually, and I think the record will show that they had a record amount of permits that people bought to buy the fireworks.

"It's just it seems like there's a lot of people that just don't want to have fun. I think the few nights out of the year is not you know something that is not bad. I understand why the firemen would rather not have to put out fires, but I think we have to look at the whole picture and not just do away with the little pleasures in life that we still have. Thank you."

Representative Takai rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of this measure. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just wanted to mention to you and the Members that when we take a look at State law governing fireworks, we're only taking a look at two holidays. New Year's Eve and the Fourth of July. So let's be very clear that we're not talking about just banning it for the Fourth of July. State law only allows fireworks on New Year's Eve and the Fourth of July. It also permits the use of fireworks for cultural and religious, or weddings and those types of things. But what we're looking at right now is restricting the use of fireworks during the Fourth of July.

"I think it's a good move on our part because if you take a look at the debate we had when we considered banning fireworks across the board, the one thing that resonated though all the debate was this: Hawaii's a very special place with a unique culture. People do celebrate New Year's and New Year's Eve in a special way. We understood that and we continue to appreciate that and that's why I think we continue to utilize fireworks during New Year's Eve. However I don't think you can use that same argument for the Fourth of July. In fact if you take a look at the Fourth of July as compared to New Year's Eve, most people, myself included, don't necessarily celebrate the Fourth of July as we do New Year's Eve. So I think this is a good attempt at addressing some of the concerns that the firefighters have and that we as a community have.

"My hope in the future, because I made this very clear years ago, is that we eventually ban all the use of fireworks and we go and enjoy fireworks from the standpoint of being spectators at these grand million dollar events put on by General Growth Partners or whoever. That's what I hope to do, but in this case I think we should take a look at the Fourth of July as being an event where we can go and participate in firework shows and not necessarily create fires across the entire State. So I support this measure. Thank you."

Representative Sonson rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker, in support and request that the words of the prior speaker be inserted into the Journals as my own," and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Sonson continued, stating:

"Two speakers ago, someone talked about those little things in life that we go through when we're young and we miss it. It brought to mind an incident when I was young when I was playing with firecrackers. I was very curious to see what would happen if I held one in my hand and let it blow up. These are little pleasures in life that I really want to forget, now that I'm old.

"It's stupid to blow your hand off, but those are the things that you do when you're a kid. Like I said I don't miss those little pleasures. Again as I grow up, Mr. Speaker, I realized that it costs money to buy these things, and there's a lot of poverty all over the world. We're lucky that only 10 to 14% of our children in Hawaii are living in poverty. But you know there are a lot of states that are way up high. We happen to be better than the national average. Every cent that I blew up when I was a child, if I had that right now, I could put it to better use."

Representative Meyer rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker. The speaker is straying far from the bill as poverty and these kinds of data that he's bringing in have nothing to do with this bill "

Representative Sonson continued, stating:

"That's right, Mr. Speaker. I'm really going way out of hand and luckily, I still have my hand. So I'm really encouraging that we should limit the use of fireworks as the prior speaker said. And it is not to limit our the way we show our patriotism either. Anyway, Mr. Speaker, I support this bill. Thank you."

The Chair then stated:

"Members, let's proceed on because it is Second Reading and it's going to go to Judiciary where they will have another chance at it."

Representative Pine rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ching rose in support of the measure with reservations, and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ching's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise with strong reservations on H.B. 2000. While I agree with the Hawaii Police and Fire Departments that the increase in injuries and property damage from fireworks are serious concerns, this particular draft is problematic.

"First, this piece of legislation as drafted is not equally applied throughout the State of Hawaii. H.B. 2000 would ban the sale of non-aerial fireworks on the Fourth of July in counties with a population of more than 500,000 residents, ultimately affecting only those residing in Honolulu County.

"Second, there are better solutions. Studies report that bans such as those described in this bill would contribute to the promotion of

black markets. According to the State Department of Health, over 50% of the people treated for fireworks-related injuries during 2006's New Year's festivities were under the age of 15. We need to make sure vendors are enforcing the laws by checking the I.D.s of customers, and that parents are adequately supervising their children. Through public announcements the State can better educate people on firework safety.

"Lastly and perhaps most importantly, as public policy makers, it behooves us to be mindful of the power of the message legislation sends to the community. As currently drafted, H.B. 2000 is demeaning in its discrimination to the celebration of our country's birthday, which has been marked with fireworks celebrations from the first anniversary in 1777. The Fourth of July binds Hawaii to our fellow states and nation, and this draft is contrary to the values of civic spirit."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2000, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATED TO FIREWORKS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representative Meyer voting no, and with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Morita, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 208-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1941, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1941, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC UTILITIES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Morita, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 209-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2503, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2503, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DERELICT VEHICLE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representatives Souki and Morita, for the Committee on Transportation and the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 210-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3097, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 3097, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PETROLEUM STORAGE FACILITIES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Karamatsu, for the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 211-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1970, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Labor & Public Employment.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1970, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Labor & Public Employment, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I have strong reservations about House Bill 1970. The reservations relate to the fact that if this bill becomes law we're going to really slow down our efforts to create low and affordable housing for our people. I think we have to look at it at in a much more comprehensive way. You put this requirement in and the housing just comes to a halt. It won't be able to go ahead. Maybe some day something like this will make sense, but not today when we have homeless on the street and other families that are desperately trying to find a place that they can live in whether it's rental or be able to buy. Thank you."

Representative Meyer rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I'm rising with some reservations on this bill. I'm concerned like the previous speaker about adding to the cost of housing. I believe that this bill sets up an artificial staffing requirement that is difficult to comply with and to enforce. It will also operate as an impediment to putting more practices and trainees on the work site. It's calling for more licensed people and that will automatically disqualify a premises. Thank you."

Representative Stonebraker rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kahikina rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, as your Chair of Housing I stand in support with reservations if this does affect affordable housing. It is getting my attention."

Representative Finnegan rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, please note my reservations with similar concerns."

Representative Ching rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, my reservation on 211 and 212 with similar concerns."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1970, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONTRACTORS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Labor & Public Employment with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Karamatsu, for the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 212-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1972, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Labor & Public Employment.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1972, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Labor & Public Employment, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Stonebraker rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Finnegan rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, please note my reservations with similar concerns."

Representative Ching rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, my reservation on 211 and 212 with similar concerns."

Representative Halford rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kahikina rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1972, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTRICIANS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Labor & Public Employment with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Karamatsu, for the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 213-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3118, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 3118, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I speak in favor of this measure. I do have reservations however. The purpose of the bill is to allow responsible corporations that will take into consideration the interest of its employees and the public in areas such as the environment, and allowing businesses to incorporate as responsible business corporations.

"I think the goals of these corporations are very idealistic and very noble but perhaps a little unrealistic. Testimony came from the Democratic Party of Maui and some other individuals. The part where I have serious reservations is that it exempts these corporations from the corporate income tax, and so I just wanted to point that out. Thank you."

Representative Finnegan rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, reservations with similar concerns. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3118, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CORPORATIONS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Karamatsu, for the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 214-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2524, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2524, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, this bill will disallow automatic permit approvals. A lot of people testified for this bill because they're philosophically against automatic approvals. But some agencies who are probably for it said they had problems dealing with it because when there was a vacancy or lack of quorum, there might have been automatic approval even though the number of people who were there voted against the measure. So rather than killing the entire automatic approval bill law, I think we should look to amending it, and perhaps making some leeway when there is a lack of quorum or when there are vacancies. Thank you."

Representative Ching rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2524, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PERMIT APPROVALS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Karamatsu, for the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 215-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2594, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2594, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROCUREMENT," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Karamatsu, for the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 216-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3067, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3067, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE FUNDS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representatives Karamatsu and Caldwell, for the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns and the Committee on Labor & Public Employment presented two reports:

(Stand. Com. Rep. No. 217-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3074, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance; and

(Stand. Com. Rep. No. 218-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3073, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the reports of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 3074, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, and H.B. No. 3073, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Stonebraker rose to speak in opposition to both measures, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I believe this is a study to see if we should create a Hawaii Construction Authority. I believe that it's unnecessary and therefore I'll be voting no on this.

"The next measure is actually the creation of the Hawaii Construction Authority so we're doing a study and creating it at the same time. So I believe this is waste of money and we don't need it. So I'm going to be voting no on both of these. Thank you."

The Chair then stated:

"The Chair will entertain the motion that we address both of these measures at the same time. Standing Committee Report Nos. 217 and 218."

Representative Meyer rose to speak in support of both measures with reservations, stating:

"I'm rising in support with strong reservations on both of them. On Stand. Com. Report 217, which creates a task force. I believe you got too many people on the task force, and I'm troubled by the fact that there's no representation from non-signatory contractors. Thank you."

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in support of both measures with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I have reservations on these two measures. I believe that it would increase cost, cause delays, and this oversight committee will actually, when bringing complaints, will also bogdown the Department of Labor, who will be hard pressed to handle all the complaints. Thank you."

Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of both measures with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I have reservations for this same reason expressed by the previous speaker. Mr. Speaker, we just have got to stop doing things that can slow down the delivery of low and affordable housing.

"Everything that we have on our desk today and everyday henceforth we should look at through that perspective and say what's going to hurt our delivery of the low income and affordable housing. If it's going to hurt it, or might hurt it, put it on the side. Deal with it in another three, four, five years. But right now the main focus has got to be streamline. This in no way streamlines. This just adds a whole nother overgloss of bureaucracy, and it will not help deliver those projects. Thank you."

Representative Harbin rose to speak in support of both measures with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise with very, very strong concerns about this bill. It also surprises and shocks me that it's being couched as an economic development tool for the success and growth of the Hawaii construction industry. The construction industry along with other industries in this State are so heavily, overly regulated, controlled, reports, you name it, that the administrative costs for the end product to the people that need it the most. And right now, the homeless and low income housing is very upfront on our agenda.

"But to add another layer of oversight that can create more havoc for our struggling businesses that are just trying to get their employees out there working without another authority, I find really, really not an economic development tool but, in fact, a tool of slowing growth."

Representative Moses rose in support of both measures with reservations, and asked that the remarks of Representative Thielen be entered in the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Stevens rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations on both measures for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ching rose in support of both measures with reservations, and asked that the remarks of Representative Thielen be entered in the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Finnegan rose in support of both measures with reservations, and asked that the remarks of Representative Thielen be entered in the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Evans rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote on both measures for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the reports of the Committees were adopted and H.B. No. 3074, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Evans and Stonebraker voting no, and with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused; and

H.B. No. 3073, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce with Representatives Evans and Stonebraker voting no, and with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representatives Karamatsu and Caldwell, for the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns and the Committee on Labor & Public Employment presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 219-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2335, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2335, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Meyer rose in opposition to the measure, and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Meyer's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I am rising in support of HB 2335 with some reservations. The bill as written requires the public utility furnished telephone service, in our case that would be Hawaiian Telcom, to disconnect the telephone number of any person who has advertised as a licensed plumber or electrician when they are in fact not licensed.

This requirement puts the telephone company in a very compromising position. They could be found liable if a person died because they could not reach 911 due to the disconnected line. The utility could be found liable for wrongful termination of service. It is also possible that the Board of Electricians and Plumbers could provide the utility with an incorrect name or number causing an innocent person to lose phone service, which could negatively impact their business. I don't believe we should put the phone company in this position. Hopefully this bill will be amended as it moves through the process. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2335, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHAPTER 448E, HAWAII REVISED STATUTES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce with Representative Meyer voting no, and with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Kahikina, for the Committee on Housing presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 220-06) recommending that H.B. No.

2991, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2991, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Harbin rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I am rising with reservations on this. Thank you. First of all, I want it to be known that housing is at the very forefront of what I believe in, and what I need, and what I personally need. But I just want to start bringing it to the attention of my fellow colleagues here as we move along trying to solve these problems, we have to make sure that we understand that we have some inherent problems in the existing system.

"For instance with the special revenue bond this is a very, very good vehicle for attempting to deliver a need that our people need through nonprofits and I support that totally. But until we come to grips with, and deal with, the encumbrances that come along with these special revenue bonds such as a very questionable ... We don't we haven't figured out yet whether or not Chapter 104 even applies to this. And if Chapter 104 does apply to these special revenue bonds for the low income housing, then what we've done is we taken a special project, given it special revenue bond capabilities, and then what we're doing is covering it with another 20% to 30% of increase of administrative cost to comply with these Chapters.

"So I think we need to really look at some of the underlying cost drivers and we maybe need to look at maybe revising, I believe it's Chapter 201G where we can increase the exemptions for nonprofits from the Chapter 104 requirements. I think it's at a half million now, and perhaps maybe we need to raise that substantially so that we can give them the true benefit of what we're trying to do with these SPRBs. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2991, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Kahikina, for the Committee on Housing presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 221-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2992, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2992, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to speak in favor of 221. I feel that a special purpose ... Changing the Constitution is not necessary to achieve low-income housing and all those noble goals. Also I feel that in the event we pass the Little Davis Bacon Law to cover special purpose revenue bonds, it would increase cost and defeat our purpose in trying to provide low and moderate income housing. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2992, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AMENDMENTS TO THE HAWAII STATE CONSTITUTION RELATING TO SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Morita, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 222-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1021, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1021, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC UTILITIES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Morita, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 223-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1913, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1913, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SOLID WASTE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Morita, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 224-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2508, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2508, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WAIVER OF ABANDONED VEHICLE PUBLIC AUCTION REQUIREMENTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representatives Morita and Abinsay, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection and the Committee on Agriculture presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 225-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2873, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Transportation.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2873, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Transportation, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Moses rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising in support with reservations. I'm in support of the portion of the bill that talks about trying to deal with invasive species, and putting some money into a fund to do that. That's important to do, although I have problems with creating more and more special funds because they usually end up getting raided somewhere down the line.

"But it also takes a certain percentage and a disclosed percentage at this point from the Harbor Special Fund, which I don't think is a very good idea at all, and from Airport Revenue Fund. I think that may cause a lot of problems in the future too. We'll end up having to put the money back in from somewhere else. So let's just take money out of the general fund and pay for combating invasive species. Thank you."

Representative Stevens rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support with reservations. I don't feel that money should be taken from the Harbor Special Fund. Our piers are deteriorating and we need that money to keep the piers and our harbors in working order. Although I do believe that fighting invasive species is a very, very good cause and we do get them through the ships that come to the harbors. I believe the Harbor Special Fund should be reserved for taking care of the harbor itself. Thank you."

Representative Pine rose in support of the measure with reservations, and asked that the remarks of Representative Moses be entered in the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Finnegan rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2873, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INVASIVE SPECIES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Transportation with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representatives Morita and Abinsay, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection and the Committee on Agriculture presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 226-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2263, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2263, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONTROLLING INVASIVE SPECIES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Caldwell, for the Committee on Labor & Public Employment presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 227-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2950, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2950, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Meyer rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising in support with reservations. Last year we passed a bill that reinstated the Voluntary Employee's Beneficiary Association Trust for the HSTA. This bill will broaden it to cover all unions.

"I'm somewhat concerned because we did experience a lot of savings in the Employer Union Trust Fund, and I think most of us saw where we didn't have to make payments for a month because there were those savings. I think with broadening this to all unions it may have the effect that everyone's premiums on healthcare will go up. Thank you."

Representative Stonebraker rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"I agree with the previous speaker and I'd like to voice my reservations as well."

Representative Takumi rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support. Mr. Speaker, the previous two comments reminds me after you read *A Million Little Pieces*. It's hard to separate fact from fiction.

"The facts are that this bill does nothing to enlarge the VEBA coverage. Last year's bill actually did that. Last year's bill was not just limited to the HSTA. It was open to any bargaining unit. This bill is merely a housekeeping bill so that a union like the HGEA doesn't have to create a VEBA Trust for every single one of their bargaining units, but it can be done as a union in general. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Takai rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Takumi be entered in the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2950, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO VOLUNTARY EMPLOYEES' BENEFICIARY ASSOCIATION TRUSTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. Representative Caldwell, for the Committee on Labor & Public Employment presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 229-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2646, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred jointly to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce and the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. Representative Caldwell, for the Committee on Labor & Public Employment presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 230-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1867, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1867, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WORKERS' COMPENSATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Caldwell, for the Committee on Labor & Public Employment presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 231-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2647, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. Representative Caldwell, for the Committee on Labor & Public Employment presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 232-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2694, as amended in HD I, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2694, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Harbin rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"I'm getting slow. I rise on 232. I'd like to state my very, very large, substantial reservation. The purpose of this bill if I can just recap it real quick, is to attempt to increase or tamper with the reimbursement rates for certain physicians, the medical providers. Then it goes on further to talk about the inordinate amount of paper work that the physician networks have.

"I'd really like to caution my fellow colleagues here in the House if you were not here back in the 90s when we attempted to tinker with the workers' comp system, and the only outcome was the capping of reimbursements to the physicians. It has had a horrible affect on our medical provider network, so I'm going to ask that we really, really proceed with caution as we start to do this and perhaps maybe we really need to look at having some type of a good working relationship with the providers, with the Department of Labor, before we take any radical steps as we did in the 90s. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2694, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WORKERS' COMPENSATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Caldwell, for the Committee on Labor & Public Employment presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 233-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2695, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. Representative Caldwell, for the Committee on Labor & Public Employment presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 234-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2698, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2698, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Harbin rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker. I'm at 234. Again with strong reservations on this bill. I think we're headed in the right direction. I think that this bill, the purpose of this bill is to try to establish some type of standardization of forms. This is one of the biggest problems we have in our work comp system.

"About three or four years ago when I was with the Chamber of Commerce, as a small business advocate, the Chamber strongly worked with the Department of Labor and with this Legislature and the then Governor to attempt to try to get some type of funding directed specifically to the DCD, which is the Disabilities Compensation Division of the Department of Labor. They are terribly, terribly under, not only understaffed, but they are under computerized.

"As of 6 months ago unless things have changed in my new capacity here, and not as a person out on the streets. The only way that you can submit forms was by a fax. The fax machine breaks you can't get your forms in. They need help. They need computerization before you can even start to standardize forms because the forms need to be standardized from the employer to the provider to the employees everywhere.

"We need this but, we need to enable that Department and we need to really look at some funding for them specially to get them online in this electronic world. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2698, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WORKERS' COMPENSATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Waters, for the Committee on Higher Education presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 237-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3029, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Public Safety & Military Affairs.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3029, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII," passed Second

Reading and was referred to the Committee on Public Safety & Military Affairs with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representatives Waters and Takumi, for the Committee on Higher Education and the Committee on Education presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 238-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2440, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2440, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIFORM ATHLETE AGENTS ACT," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representatives Saiki and Kanoho, for the Committee on Hawaiian Affairs and the Committee on Water, Land, & Ocean Resources presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 239-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2113, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2113, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO KULEANA LANDS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 240-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3087, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 3087, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Harbin rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm sorry I have to rise again with reservations and actually I may end up having to oppose these measures that are going to be coming before us that deal with procurement.

"I'll speak on 240 and what I'll do is stay seated on the rest of the procurement issues for today. I need to really, really, really get into the record my position on procurement. We have spent I think, the last two years trying to deal with: Do we want procurement? Do we want controlled procurement? Do we want to ... What do we want to do?

"I feel that we as policymakers, we need to make a decision. We're either going to be a State that has even-handed, across-the-board, uniform procurement. We cannot be allowing our tax dollars and the trust that our taxpayers put in us to be handed out to different agencies in different ways so that the providers of the services have no way of knowing what are the rules, what is the game plan for certain departments.

"This bill I think starts off correctly with the assumption of at least establishing a chief executive officer as the procurement officer. At least we can earmark someone that is responsible. But I think to raise the threshold amount before we have these people trained in how and what procurement is, I think is putting the cart before the horse and we really, really need to lay the bar of responsibility to not only this particular agency, but to all. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3087, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROCUREMENT," passed

Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 241-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1992, as amended in HD I, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1992, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising with reservations on 241. I really like the part of the bill that looks to raising the cigarette tax by 2.5 cents per cigarette for dealing with Native Hawaiian programs that assist uninsured with focus on smoking cessation, prevention, education, and treatment of diseases caused by smoking. That makes sense to me

"What I don't like about the bill is that we're trying to fund community health centers by taxing cigarettes. I think if we need money for community health centers then we should just say it and look on how we're going to do this. I don't believe we keep using cigarettes for a way to get money to fund programs.

"Like I said, I support the idea of the Hawaiian Program because it's the focus is smoking. But like I said, with community health centers, I think we should look at funding elsewhere. Thank you."

Representative Moses rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support with reservations. Actually I'm not in support. I have to vote no on this, Mr. Speaker. The problem is, it is a tax increase. It doesn't matter whether it's from cigarettes or anything else. It's a tax increase.

"Once again, I'll say if we don't want to have the health problems that are associated with smoking, we ought to ban smoking in the State of Hawaii, but instead we keep taxing the cigarettes and we get more and more money from it. So we don't really want it to go away because if it went away, how would we fund these rural health centers? We also take money from the big settlement. We take a lot of money from that. So again if we want to fund rural health care let's do that. Let's not tax eigarettes to do it. Thank you."

Representative Green rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I appreciate the comments from both of the previous speakers. They make good and correct points.

"The point of this bill is to do a couple of things. Very briefly as we increase the cost of tobacco, fewer people smoke and it has exactly double the effect on young people so for every dollar that a pack of cigarettes cost more, 5 to 7% of adults smoke less, and it's double the effect on children. So it has a very good effect.

"The less smoking we have in this State decreases overall health costs very, very dramatically. Without tobacco in the country we would save \$500 billion. Those are national health numbers. \$500 billion annually.

"And finally the purpose for giving the moneys to the federally qualified health centers, while I completely agree that we should essentially fund them well, because there are 13 health centers across the State, geographically well-placed to take care of our uninsured,

underinsured, and families that in general are more poor than other families. I was instructed directly by the Director of Health and other people in leadership positions in government that if I wanted to find money for new programs or expanding programs I liked, I had to go find it on my own. I'm not a rich guy so I couldn't fund them personally. We had to find a measure that would actually get money directly to go into these health centers.

"So this has a really nice coordinated effect. We'll have less in the way of chronic health and expensive health problems for the State and at the same time, moneys will go while we're preventing those illnesses into the places where we have our greatest need to take care of the uninsured. So I actually think this is a perfect mechanism. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stonebraker rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I have strong support for this measure, Mr. Speaker. I would like just like to ask that the remarks from the Representative from North Kona be entered in the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Meyer rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1992, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CIGARETTE TAX," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representative Moses voting no, and with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representatives Arakaki and Sonson, for the Committee on Health and the Committee on Human Services presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 242-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3123, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Public Safety & Military Affairs.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 3123, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR HURRICANE PREPAREDNESS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Public Safety & Military Affairs with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representatives Arakaki and Sonson, for the Committee on Health and the Committee on Human Services presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 243-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2941, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2941, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representatives Arakaki and Caldwell, for the Committee on Health and the Committee on Labor & Public Employment presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 244-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3128, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 3128, HD 1, pass Second Reading and

be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker. On 244, I rise with strong reservations. I have real concerns about a universal healthcare system, and I won't go into all the details of that. But I am struck by something on page 2. Interesting, whoever authored this bill is really making some really interesting and strong statements that I don't believe reflect probably me and some other members of our Body, but I'm just going to read one paragraph. I haven't read the rest of it but, there must be other comments in there I wouldn't agree with, but this one particular.

"Let me frame it for you. The three biggest cost-drivers of healthcare in the United States and Hawaii today are associated with the following: a profit driven complex of payments; reluctant, multipayer, health insurance bureaucracies competing to insure only the healthy; and the wealthy by leaving those who need healthcare the most to the taxpayers.

"There's a lot of editorial comments in this legislation right now and I just have some concerns about that. But also I have concerns about the whole concept of universal healthcare. So with reservations. Thank you."

Representative Meyer rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I'm rising with the same reservation as the Representative from Waimea. Thank you."

Representative Hale rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Yes, Mr. Speaker, thank you. I strongly support this. Every major civilized nation of the world can take care of their people. We can't take care of them. We have to stop thinking about money and thinking about welfare. Thank you."

Representative Stonebraker rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I'll be voting no on this and I'll vote no on it till the very final Reading, with these brief comments. A study once said, and I agree with it, if you think healthcare is expensive now, wait until the government runs it.

"We've seen how the government runs the Department of Motor Vehicles, the education system. To put them in charge of health care, well one could argue on a philosophical level, why don't we make government run auto insurance? What's the difference? There's a lot of people that don't have auto insurance and they drive. Well the same argument is made to provide universal health care. Well, there's a lot of people that aren't insured. The problem is that there's so much evidence from around the world that people are waiting in lines and dying for treatments that they need to have done, procedures that they need to have taken care of immediately. And it's just not getting done.

"We have the best healthcare in the world. The medicine here is fantastic. As a matter of fact, Mr. Speaker, my father was diagnosed and is recovering remarkably from Guillain-Barre syndrome and my colleague from North Kona probably knows a lot about that. But what was amazing was going into the hospital, the emergency at Queen's. We found that the care was tremendous. It's hard to compare the amount of attention that one receives. Now if you made a universal healthcare system, what you would have is everybody down there just to get attention.

"Now when we were there, there was a woman and I don't want to make any personal judgment, but she was uncontrollable by the

security guards because she was flighty, she was wandering off, she talked about this, that and the other. And really all they wanted to do was provide for her but she wouldn't sit in one place and wait for the nurse to get her name and number. And my father appropriately leaned over to me and said, now could you imagine what would happen if there was a universal healthcare system. This place would look like Aala Park. Everybody would be here for this drug, that drug, this treatment, that treatment. And everybody else that might really need treatment, who is undergoing dialysis or other serious ailments, would be shutout. And that's exactly what happened in Canada and other parts of the world.

"The rate of death for prostate and breast cancer is doubled in Canada and England because of this system. This system doesn't help the people. It hurts them. And for that reason, I'll vote no. Thank you."

Representative Green rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Just brief comments in support of the concept. And I would remark that the first patient I ever saw had Guillain-Barre syndrome, in 1995. Conceptually, I think that we need to get healthcare for everyone in the United States of America. And I think that once universal healthcare becomes a reality, it will be an American form of universal healthcare. I cannot say what that will mean. I'm not advocating a new tax on the people of America or the State of Hawaii.

"What I'm trying to do when bills like these come forward is to say, we really have to have an honest and large dialogue that includes all of the players, the hospitals, the insurers but most importantly the consumers of health care which is every single one of us. So going forward, if the system worsens, if it becomes more expensive or excludes even more people from getting care, that we're prepared as Americans to take care of all of our own. So I hope people will keep their minds open. A lot of these bills are meant to keep discussion going because it's probably the most principle issue that will affect all of our constituents. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cabanilla rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in support of this measure. I believe that this bill has something to do with a single-payer system in which they take care of the billing for all the different companies because billing drives the cost by 30 percent. By funneling them to a single-payer system, that 30 percent becomes a savings. And let me just say that it doesn't have anything to do with the delivery of healthcare. It has something to do with billing. And we have to do something with our healthcare, Mr. Speaker. The cost of insurance is going so high that if we don't do any intervention, the system and all the insurance companies dealing with us will go bankrupt.

"It's nearing its demise. Everybody wants a lot of coverage, expanded coverage. And we now as a society believes that health care is a right as opposed to a privilege. And if you want a lot, you have got to be willing to pay a lot, and right now we're not willing to pay a lot. Thank you."

Representative Moses rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support at this point, at least with reservations. It creates another special fund which is one thing that I don't like right off the bat. But also, we have tremendous medicines here that cost a lot, and we're not allowing for that fact in all of our discussions. We're talking about healthcare being so costly. Well yeah, because it is good healthcare. Usually you pay for what you get.

"People from Canada, universal healthcare, they flock across the border to get treatment. In fact, our waiting list is very long for most countries trying to come here. I don't see any Americans waiting in line to go to countries with universal healthcare just to get good health care. They want to get their healthcare here. So I think we ought to bear that in mind. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Finnegan rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ching rose in support of the measure with reservations, and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ching's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise with strong reservations on this bill. Single payer systems have raised a quality and timeliness of care issues and may require complex and expensive financing arrangements. During the 2005 Legislative Session, HB 1304, HD1, SD2, CD1 was passed creating a temporary healthcare task force to investigate the different options available to provide health care to all of Hawaii's residents. The task force was appropriated \$200,000 with which to "contract for services and studies as necessary". Since the task force has not yet made recommendations regarding a single payer system, HB 3128 is premature. Thank you."

Representative Marumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Stevens rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Thielen rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 3128, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTHCARE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce with Representative Stonebraker voting no, and with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 245-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2819, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 247-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2902, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. "We also passed a measure Mr. Speaker, House Bill 2778 on Second Reading, and this is Relating to Language Access. As a result, this is going to create an office under that Department of Labor. And I would just like to speak more, hopefully, on this measure at the appropriate time. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 2779, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DISCRIMINATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes, with Representatives Arakaki, Cabanilla, Saiki, Schatz and Takamine being excused.

H.B. No. 1787, HD 1:

Representative M. Oshiro moved that H.B. No. 1787, HD 1, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. I have some written comments to submit to the Journal. But I just wanted to say one thing about this HD I, that I hope that the Senate will restore a provision contained in the as introduced version, that requires driver license exams to have a question in this provision. Teenage parents and teenage babysitters are the most likely to be unaware of the dangers of leaving keiki in a vehicle unattended. For the majority who have children later in life, it's important for them to be made aware of the dangers of leaving unattended keiki in cars. After their initial driver's test, drivers generally do not take a written exam for many years. We need to take advantage of the opportunity to inform drivers of the dangers of leaving keiki unattended in vehicles. I ask that my colleagues support this measure and send it on to the Senate. Mahalo."

Representative Lee's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of HB 1787, HD1, Relating to Child Endangerment. Many people do not realize how dangerous it is to leave small children in cars for even short periods of time. It is dangerous for the child and for those in close proximity to the car as well

"In 2005, four vehicles on Oahu were stolen with *keiki* inside left there by their parents or babysitters while running quick errands. All four of these incidents ended without major tragedy, but unfortunately that is not always the case.

"Hundreds of these kinds of incidents happen every year in the United States and unfortunately we are not immune to them here in Hawaii. Most of us remember the tragic accident on the Windward side in late 2003 where a little girl died from hyperthermia after being left in the backseat of a car.

"To give two further examples, a 10-week old baby died in a car in North Carolina when the car caught on fire. The baby's mother had gone into the Lyle Creek Elementary School to pick up another of her children who was in kindergarten. She had only been away from the car for a few minutes.

"In Hamilton, Massachusetts a 2-year old was run over by a minivan (and fortunately survived) after he and his sister accidentally put the vehicle in neutral while they were playing in it. The sister jumped out, but the little boy got caught under the vehicle.

"HB 1787, HD1 would put parents on alert that leaving their *keiki* in cars for even short periods of time is very dangerous. The bill makes it a traffic infraction to leave a *keiki* unsupervised in a motor vehicle.

"While I hope my colleagues will support this HD 1, I also hope the Senate will restore a provision contained in the 'as introduced' version that requires driver's license exams to have a question about this issue. Teenage parents and teenage babysitters are the most likely to be unaware of the dangers of leaving *keiki* in a vehicle unattended. For the majority who have children later in life, it is important for them to be made aware of the dangers of leaving unattended *keiki* in cars. After their initial driver's test, drivers generally do not take a written exam for many years. We need to take advantage of the opportunity to inform drivers of the dangers of leaving *keiki* unattended in vehicles.

"I ask that my colleagues support this measure and send it on to the Senate. Mahalo."

Representative Halford rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Herkes rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Mr. Speaker, this is just a policy call. With these types of annuities, one of the problems is that they're sold to seniors promising them a return in the period of time when they're not going to be alive. So this is a senior protection act. It's a model bill that was given to us by NCOIL. When I was at the NCOIL meeting in November, we spent a lot of time on this issue.

"So the question is, do variable annuities come under the securities administration or under the insurance division? The consensus from NCOIL was that they are an insurance product, basically, and should be under the insurance division. Then this bill really calls for protection of seniors being sold those variable annuities. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2969, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ANNUITIES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representative Marumoto voting no, and with Representative Takai being excused.

Representative Chang, for the Committee on Tourism & Culture presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 268-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3238, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3238, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OUT-OF-STATE SALES OF TIME SHARE INTERESTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Takai being excused.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. Representative Stevens responded, stating:

"To recommit."

The Chair responded, stating:

"Yes, absolutely right. Okay, you got it."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 1975, HD I, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES," was adopted, passed, and recommitted jointly to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce and the Committee on Health, with Representative Takai being excused.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Transportation presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 274-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2746, as amended in HD I, be adopted, passed, and recommitted to the Committee on Transportation.

Representative Berg rose to speak in support of the motion to recommit with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd just like to register a vote with reservations. Taxes are a methodology and avenue for us to enhance

quality of life. They're not intended to exacerbate problems of fuel prices. So I'm with reservations. Thank you."

Representative Moses rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising in support with reservations. All the testimony we got from the Civil Defense is that they already do this. This is just adding another delaying factor to them trying to plan as they do now. Thank you."

Representative Meyer rose in support of the measure with reservations, and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Meyer's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm rising in support of HB 3232, but with some strong reservations. This bill, as written, will appropriate funds to support the efforts of a newly created commission on disaster hazards. It will also pay for additional work, to be performed by the Civil Defense Division, to update information relating to disaster hazards and make that information accessible in electronic form. I believe this bill will divert the Civil Defense Division's efforts from its main purpose, which is preparing for and training volunteer members for Hawaii's next natural disaster.

"Mr. Speaker, in addition, the testimony from both the Civil Defense Division and Department of Defense was tepid and less than enthusiastic. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ito rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. Mr. Speaker, this bill will establish a Commission on Disaster Hazard Information to oversee the process of compiling information relating to disaster hazards across the State into a manageable and accessible electronic form and keep the information up-to-date. The University of Hawaii concurs with the necessity of making sure that this information is verified and valid. This will greatly enhance our State's ability to make comprehensive mitigation plans for the safety of the Hawaii people. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3232, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CIVIL DEFENSE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Kanoho and Takai being excused.

Representative Ito, for the Committee on Public Safety & Military Affairs presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 285-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2444, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2444, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Moses rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This bill, right in the bill itself it says, "no state or county agency, commission, corporation, department, or any other authority of the state or county, shall expend any federal funds provided by the Unites States Office for Domestic Preparedness under the State Homeland Security Program, unless the department of defense submits to the legislature." And then it goes through a bunch of things they have to submit.

"My contention is, Mr. Speaker, nowhere in the bill does it say what the Legislature will do with that. It goes on to say if the Legislature is not in Session, the reports will be submitted to yourself and the President of the Senate. Again, it doesn't say what the Legislature will do or that the Legislature must approve. So I don't understand why we're putting this burden on the Department of Defense for expending federal money on preparedness. Thank you."

Representative Stonebraker rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'll be voting against this. I'm assuming that it's for the same reasons. I was reading on other bills when the previous speaker was speaking. But in a time where we need to be extra cautious with what we do regarding natural disaster and our emergency needs, I think most importantly, we've seen with some examples, especially in the Gulf Coast states, where the inflexibility of the government agencies has led to an exacerbation of much of the problems caused by natural disasters. So for those reasons, I believe that this bill goes in the opposite direction. I believe it makes it more rigid and more difficult to local agencies to spend the money that they need and to get the assistance that needs to be gotten to the residents in the area as quickly as possible. This will go in the opposite direction, making it more difficult to do that. So for those reasons, I'll be voting no. Thank you."

Representative Ito rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. Mr. Speaker, all this bill does is require the State to disclose a plan for homeland security. While it is important to ensure that Hawaii is safe from terrorists and threats of harm, the public should have a general idea of what the priorities are and how the taxpayer dollars are being spent. For example, Hawaii is 95% dependent on food and other goods being shipped in and through Hawaii harbors and Neighbor Island harbors. Protection of this transportation hub would be critical for homeland security.

"Furthermore, our hospitals and other industrial manufacturers use nuclear materials that could be used to build a nuclear weapon. We need to know if our homeland security plan addresses the safeguards of such materials. Mr. Speaker, we need to know what concerns are being addressed. Thank you."

Representative Meyer rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising in support with some strong reservations. My concern is that as written now, this bill would limit the Department of Defense's ability to spend funds in a timely manner. It will restrict the expending of funds received by the Department of Transportation Port Security Grant of Health. It will delay implementation of federally mandated safety and security improvements to our transportation facilities. In this time of terrorists, as well as some of the concerns that the bill has, but my concern is for homeland security and any kinds of terrorist threat, that we don't want to tie the hands of the very people that we rely on to keep us as secure as possible. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Finnegan rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Please note my strong reservations and that I'll be looking in the future to understand this bill a little bit more."

Representative Pine rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Same request, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ching rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Stevens rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Halford rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2444, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Moses and Stonebraker voting no, and with Representatives Kanoho and Takai being excused.

Representative Ito, for the Committee on Public Safety & Military Affairs presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 286-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2448, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2448, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Kanoho and Takai being excused.

Representatives Saiki and Kanoho, for the Committee on Hawaiian Affairs and the Committee on Water, Land, & Ocean Resources presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 287-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2930, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2930, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HAWAIIAN TRADITIONAL AND CUSTOMARY PRACTICES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Kanoho and Takai being excused.

Representatives Herkes and Arakaki, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce and the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 288-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1872, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1872, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising in strong support of House Bill 1872. Thank you. Mr. Speaker, we all know that it's important to be able to provide prescriptive drugs, particularly to our seniors at a cost that is affordable. Unfortunately, that's not been the case in the

United States or particularly here in our island. Americans pay the world's highest drug prices. We paid more than 81% than buyers in Canada last year. And also at 81% higher than in six Western European countries. In 2000, the differential was 60%. So we're just on a upward scale with the high cost of prescriptive drugs. We pay 108% more than the French for the same drugs. 118% more than the Italians. 58% more than the Swiss. And that's the country with prices closest to those in the United States.

"This bill is an effort to increase access to affordable prescriptive drugs, Mr. Speaker, by allowing the consumers of this State to obtain an injunction or damages or other relief when a drug manufacture or its licensee sells drugs for an excessive price. That part of the bill may be changed as we go to Judiciary. And the Committee Report does indicate that the Judiciary Committee should look at the legal aspects of the bill. What it does is, which should not be changed or modified in any way, it will require the drug industry to justify why it's medications cannot be priced more reasonably when the prices are compared with four high income industrialized countries. And the prices here, locally, exceed 30% over those four highly industrialized countries. Then the drug industry has to justify why we should be paying these excessive prices.

"It's all in the best interests of the consumer, Mr. Speaker, that we have this information. And I think it's also telling to note that the only entities that testified against the bill are the drug manufacturers who are reaping in these huge profits. Thank you."

Representative Green rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. A very brief story. A constituent and patient called me the other day and said, 'Dr. Green, my medicine, I ordered it from Canada because it was 60% cheaper and it was seized.' She wanted to know why the medicine was seized. It was a federal thing. But she had this medicine called Plavix, which is meant to keep the blood a little thinner when aspirin is not enough. She had a heart attack and she needed to not have another heart attack. So she didn't have her medicine. And then she had to go rebuy the medicine that was taken from her.

"Now I'm not advocating or even broaching the subject of whether or not we should be able to get medicines from Canada or other countries. But it was so expensive that she then couldn't purchase the medicine when she went to rebuy it here. And had to wait once again for all the paperwork and processes to go by. So she went six or eight weeks without having that medicine that decreased her likelihood of having another heart attack. It's the same medicines used for strokes.

"So, it's such a conundrum for people that are on fixed incomes that we need a bill or some kind of bill that just provides for common fairness because it's absolutely a real situation. A lot of people can't afford their medications and are at increased risk for very, very serious complications. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in favor of this bill but I have some reservations. I can tell we're going to have an interesting time in Judiciary with this measure. This one, this bill would go into effect when the wholesale price of a patented prescription drug in the State is more than 30% higher than the comparable price in any high income country. These countries would be the United Kingdom, Germany, Canada, and Australia. And I'm kind of wondering whether we have somebody in the Department of Health who's checking these prices, or some Attorney General who maybe checking the prices in these countries. I think that sounds like a kind of a lot of work to chase down these prices in all these countries to determine whether there's a 30% differential.

"I do not like excessive prices. I wish our drug prices were lower. I'm not certain that this is the proper vehicle, the proper route to take in getting lower prices. But I think it's a little bit unwieldy to prove where the prices are 30% lower, and when, on what day. You've got a moving target here in Hawaii too. We have all different prices at all different points in our State. So I have my reservations. I'm looking forward to hearing testimony on this in the next Committee. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 1872, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PRESCRIPTION DRUGS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Kanoho and Takai being excused.

Representatives Herkes and Arakaki, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce and the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 289-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1873, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 1873, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PRESCRIPTIONS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Kanoho and Takai being excused.

Representative Herkes, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 290-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2076, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2076, HD 2, be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Stonebraker rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"I have some reservations on this measure, Mr. Speaker. Currently, the law allows for the treatment of minors as far as in regards to medicine. Primarily, the concern of many people is the administration of abortions to minors without the consent of a parent. That's embarrassing."

The Chair stated:

"That's okay, just turn your phone off."

Representative Stonebraker continued, stating:

"You're not supposed to call me here. Just kidding. I'm sorry, Mr. Speaker. Please forgive me.

"This bill, what it does, Mr. Speaker, is it allows for parents to be involved in plastic surgery. To me, it just seems very awkward that parents don't have the right to be involved in any other forms of medication or surgery or treatment, except for plastic surgery. It seems to be illogical. It continues to violate the rights of parents to be involved with their children's medical treatment. Thank you."

Representative Sonson rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. In support with the same reservations as the prior speaker. In addition to my reservations, Mr. Speaker, testimony was brought forward that this is actually a bill that's targeted towards minors, who are predominantly the clients of the Waikiki Health Center. The bill, though as promulgated, as stated in this measure, defines medical services too broadly. As I understand it, the Center does not provide anything more than

primary care. So I think that in order to address the issues of that particular entity, we should limit this bill indeed to just primary care.

"Right now, it does include major surgery, heart transplant, kidney transplant, whatever it may be because it's defined as any care treatment service or procedure. So as this bill moves forward, Mr. Speaker, we should take a look at this and try to limit it in order to not have the doctor substitute for parents' right to determine what happens to their 14-year old. Thank you so much."

Representative Pine rose in support of the measure with reservations, and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pine's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak with reservation on HB 2076, HD2.

"This bill proposes to improve the provision of medical services to youth that do not have a parent or guardian to authorize medical procedures. Within the State of Hawaii, there are many teens that are either homeless, runaways, from Micronesia or other countries, with no parents in the State, or otherwise lacking adult supervision. The bill allows these teens the ability to receive seriously needed health services, while acknowledging a minor's right to privacy and control of their own health services. The bill also allows providers to accept the consent of a minor if a physician determines the minor understands the benefit and risk of medical care and the services are for the minor's benefit.

"As written, the bill appears much broader than its intent because the bill would allow all 14 year old minors in the State of Hawaii to have access to medical services without parental consent. Although this may not be the bill's intent, the bill may cause conflict for those children with parental guardians who cover the children under their health care plans, in situations such as pregnancy. Therefore, the bill should be narrowed to reflect the intended purpose.

"The wording of the bill also raises concerns as to how the bill may affect care to children who are not at risk described in section one of the bill. For children who are unable to carry out their care without assistance, as in the case with those children with chronic disease such as asthma and diabetes, the bill fails to account who would be responsible for covering the costs of long term care.

"In its current form, HB 2076, HD2, is the right step in providing much needed emergency medical services for those minors who are in serious need of medical care, but the bill still needs to be narrowed for its intended purpose. For these reasons, 1 am voting with reservations on HB 2076, HD2."

Representative Finnegan rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Arakaki rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. Mr. Speaker, I just want to point out that we actually had this law in place several years ago. It was tied to the operations of the Youth Outreach Program in Waikiki. As the Chair of Human Services mentioned, this is primarily targeted to homeless youth. When we talk about parents, I would agree with the Representative from Hawaii Kai that I think in every case possible, we want parents to be involved in the decisions, especially when it comes to the healthcare of minors.

"But for these youths, there actually is no connection with their parents. I think we don't want to deny some needed healthcare that a lot of time is urgent for these street children. Therefore, what we're doing is we're just allowing for these decisions to be made. In terms of the family planning issues, we're told that these are rights that they already have given by law. So we're not extending anything beyond what is in the current law.

"I don't think there's any real cause for alarm because in most cases it's the very everyday decisions that have to made, especially in primary care to make sure that these young people even if they're runaways and on the street, that they can have access to the care that they need. So I would urge everyone to support this measure. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Representative Green rose to speak in support of the measure, stating

"Just a very brief comments in support. I think that everyone needs to know that the tenor of this bill is to focus on basic primary healthcare services. Just to be up front, probably at the community health centers also. None of those centers do perform abortions. We don't have to have that whole debate now but we can work on the language together I'm sure. Just to make sure that for essential and necessary care, and it's almost always basic care, that the minors can get it rather than get no care. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2076, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MINORS," was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Kanoho and Takai being excused.

Representatives Arakaki and Sonson, for the Committee on Health and the Committee on Human Services presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 291-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2106, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2106, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE GENERAL EXCISE TAX," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Kanoho and Takai being excused.

Representative Kahikina, for the Committee on Housing presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 292-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1852, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1852, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE CONDEMNATION OF LAND IN NANAKULI, OAHU, FOR A PUBLIC HOUSING PROJECT," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Kanoho and Takai being excused.

Representative Kahikina, for the Committee on Housing presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 293-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1886, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1886, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Kanoho and Takai being excused.

Representative Kahikina, for the Committee on Housing presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 294-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2964, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2964, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Harbin rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise with reservations. The intent of this bill is to transfer land to nonprofits for self-help building and affordable housing and I applaud that and I support that concept. However, I really feel that we need to take a very strong look at the implications and the possible underlying impacts by the requirements of Chapter 104 on the transfer of land to a nonprofit.

"Right now the exemption is at only a half a million dollars and if we want this to really work without the consequences of a 20% to 30% increase in expense that we need to address that issue simultaneous with any type of transfer. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2964, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AFFORDABLE HOUSING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Kanoho and Takai being excused.

Representative Kahikina, for the Committee on Housing presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 295-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1853, as amended in HD I, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1853, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RENTAL HOUSING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Kanoho and Takai being excused.

Representative Kahikina, for the Committee on Housing presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 296-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2239, as amended in HD I, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2239, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LAND ACQUISITION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Kanoho and Takai being excused.

Representatives Sonson and Luke, for the Committee on Human Services and the Committee on Judiciary presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 297-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2371, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2371, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN EMERGENCY APPROPRIATION FOR THE HAWAII YOUTH CORRECTIONAL FACILITY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Kanoho and Takai being excused.

Representatives Sonson and Arakaki, for the Committee on Human Services and the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 298-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1822, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 1822, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COMMUNITY CARE FOSTER FAMILY HOMES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Kanoho and Takai being excused.

Representative Sonson and Arakaki, for the Committee on Human Services and the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 300-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2097, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2097, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Stevens rose to speak in support of the measure, stating

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of this bill. The purpose of this bill is to provide caregivers with some financial relief by providing \$1,000 tax credit to every eligible caregiver providing care to one or more elderly relatives requiring such care. Mr. Speaker, I have some personal experience. I am a caregiver for my elderly mom and it's usually the wishes of an elderly person to stay at home as long as possible. This bill is a good start in recognizing the efforts and sometimes the sacrifices of caregivers who work really hard to allow their elderly loved ones to stay at home and enjoy the life that they have. Thank you."

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the measure, stating

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support and I'd like the words of the Representative from Waikiki to be recorded into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ching rose to speak in support of the measure, stating

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Also in strong support. Similarly I had recently experienced in what it is to be a caregiver and I appreciate this bill. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2097, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAREGIVERS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Kanoho and Takai being excused.

Representative Sonson, for the Committee on Human Services presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 301-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2365, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2365, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NOTICE TO FOSTER PARENTS FOR CHAPTER 587, HAWAII REVISED STATUTES, CHILD PROTECTIVE ACT HEARINGS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Kanoho and Takai being excused.

Representatives Kahikina and Kanoho, for the Committee on Housing and the Committee on Water, Land, & Ocean Resources presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 302-06) recommending

that H.B. No. 2566, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2566, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Harbin rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I once again rise with very strong reservations on this bill. I again am totally, 100% in support of dealing with our affordable housing crisis. However, I question two things. One again, transferring \$60 million for construction of housing makes it subject to Chapter 104 thereby increasing the cost 20% to 30%. And my second reservation is if we in fact, as policy makers, should be stepping in to micromanaging an authority that has overall planning of a distinct such as Kakaako. Thank you."

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating

"I rise with strong reservations. I believe the intent of trying to get affordable housing in closer to the downtown core of Honolulu is a good idea, conceptually. But I actually believe this bill has some unintended consequence that I wanted to point out to my colleagues. That is so far, the Alexander and Baldwin residential property is still on the books. It has not been discontinued as an idea. And so if the Alexander and Baldwin, two residential, housing projects go up, what I see is actually the State ending up subsidizing those two buildings being built, because if you read the way it's written, it says subsidies and other assistance could come from this fund for qualifying multifamily ownership housing units for households with incomes at or below 140% of the median family income.

"So if you think about this you could build a high-rise. Alexander and Baldwin could build this high-rise on the backside of the buildings where it faces away from the ocean. They could take the less desirable properties. They could put them into qualifying for this. The State actually subsidizes and gives them money and then it pencils out for them because the houses or the condo units on the front side of the project that face the ocean, they could actually make a lot of money I suspect on those in this type of real estate market. So I think there's an unintended consequence, and in fact I don't believe the State wants to subsidize them. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2566, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Kanoho and Takai being excused.

Representatives Kanoho and Souki, for the Committee on Water, Land, & Ocean Resources and the Committee on Transportation presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 303-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2875, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2875, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FISHING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Kanoho and Takai being excused.

Representatives Kanoho and Souki, for the Committee on Water, Land, & Ocean Resources and the Committee on Transportation presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 304-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2533, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2533, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Green rose to speak in support of the measure, stating

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I just wanted to ask my colleagues to consider this bill closely because what it does it allows the counties to look at using impact fees, the other counties that is, to use impact fees if they're significant infrastructure needs that have been unmet. Currently in our statutes only Oahu is able to deal with this if they choose to apply impact fees, which is my understanding because their population is 500,000 or greater. This bill simply removes that language for the State so that the other counties, if those county councils and individuals in the county think they need infrastructure dollars can use impact fees to help them.

"It's particularly important on my side of the Big Island where they feel there's some shortage of infrastructure and they're looking for ways to get it. From my dialogue with a lot of the development community, they've been very much in favor of working with the local areas to use some of this so-called, impact moneys to help out. So I think really we can work out language, but this is a bill I would like my Oahu colleagues to join our Neighbor Island colleagues to get passed. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Moses rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support with some reservations. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. You and the Body remember I'm sure, the debate we had in this House a couple years ago about the impact fees to build the North South Road. Many considered it a tax on the developer. Basically we passed it because the developer was interested in paying the fees so that they could get the road built so that they could develop. So it was a win-win, and that we had no problem with and it's worked out well. But there's some problems in this bill I think that need to be straightened out and I'm sure they can be

"One is Section 2 of the bill, and is supposedly redundant according to most of the people that have seen it. It defines public facility capital improvement costs as the cost of land acquisition, construction, planning, and engineering, etc., etc. So it should be looked at I think a little closer.

"Section 3 has several problems. It substantially alters the impact fee legislation that we passed earlier by removing the requirement that seven specific factors must be considered. So it leaves it a little more vague and it does not say what the percentage is. The impact fees are based on an objective and fair process in the current law, but now it looks like these decisions may be left up to the agency and it will create a problem and raise questions of fairness. Again the developer in the previous instance felt this was a good idea, they wanted to proceed. Now I'm concerned about, will they say, 'This is not fair. Don't do this to us.'

"It also removes the developer's ability to claim offset payments. So that will make it less desirable for the developers. Further the county, at least City and County of Honolulu says that they don't believe the wording in that section, Section 3 will stand judicial scrutiny. So, Mr. Speaker, I'm just pointing there are concerns that we need to work out as this bill moves forward. Thank you."

Representative Herkes rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. Mr. Speaker, about eight years ago we passed an Act in this Legislature requiring counties to pass defensible impact fee ordnances, and we gave them a year to do it. That was about I think, eight years ago. The County of Hawaii is

just thinking about it. Trying to comply with that law. I used to work for Kamehameha Investment Corp., we were developers. And I would take projects into the County Council of Hawaii and they would say, "Oh boy, here comes Kamehameha Schools so we'll sock it to them." The quote, impact fees were out of line and we'd lose the project. And that's why I think the defensible impact fees are important. Developers should know up front what's happening. We require counties about eight years ago to adopt one. So that's why I'm opposed to this bill."

Representative Cabanilla rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support with reservation on this measure. My reservation lies with full understanding of this bill, mainly because every resident on the Leeward side that's a member of a planned community, a certain amount of their payment goes to impact fees. It's with their understanding that this money collected for impact fees is for their infrastructure in our area. I don't understand if this money that we're collecting right now from the people on the Leeward side, will be shared by people on the other islands. I think that if it's put forward, the impact fees will serve specific area, then that should be it. But if it's otherwise, then I will welcome my colleagues from the other islands to take part of it. But as of now I believe that the impact fees we're collecting are for our particular region. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stonebraker rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I'd just like to register a no vote and I'll reserve my debate for this for Final Reading."

Representative Meyer rose in support of the measure with reservations, and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Meyer's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I am rising in support of HB 2533 but with some serious reservations. The bill as written substantially alters the existing impact fee statute. It all but removes the requirement that seven specific factors must be considered in determining the proportionate share of the public facility capital improvement costs a developer is required to pay by way of impact fees. This is a major shift away from determining impact fees based on an objective and fair process.

"Section 3 of the bill also removes a developer's ability to claim offset payments. Offset payments are defined as a reduction in impact fees designed to fairly reflect the value of non-site related public facility capital improvements provided by a developer pursuant to county land use provisions.

"If this bill were to pass in its present form, it would leave an agency to determine impact fees without having to justify them, which would surely raise questions of fairness for developers."

Representative Harbin rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Very strong reservations, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Finnegan rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ching rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Evans rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2533, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO IMPACT FEES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Herkes and Stonebraker voting no, and with Representatives Kanoho and Takai being excused.

Representatives Souki and Arakaki, for the Committee on Transportation and the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 305-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2640, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Moses rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. We already authorized the counties to assess an additional half percent GET Tax for mass transit. This measure now says that we want to take part of our GET on gasoline and give that to the counties basically for mass transit again. Thank you."

Representative Finnegan rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Marumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Stevens rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Meyer rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd also like to register a no vote on this measure. This is another special fund, another place to squirrel money away. After all the funds that were taken out of the Highway Fund over the years, I think we need to keep that money for highway repairs. Thank you."

Representative Thielen rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Stonebraker rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pine rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Halford rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Harbin rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ching rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to speak in favor of the measure. Mr. Speaker, the nexus between gasoline sales and mass transit is obvious. All of us who buy gasoline for our private vehicles should support the increase funding this bill would provide for mass transit including purchasing buses and subsidizing bus fares. Similarly those who drive vehicles with poor fuel efficiency would contribute more to this special fund than those who drive fuel-efficient vehicles. The measure is intended to enable the poor and low income mass

transit riders and bus riders to have better access to transportation by allowing for fare subsidization programs to be established on a sliding scale based on income. I have further written comments to insert. Thank you."

Representative Lee's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of this measure. This bill will establish a mass transit special fund and directs the general excise tax revenues collected on gasoline sales to the new special fund. The funds would then be disbursed to the counties to assist them with mass transit issues.

"The nexus between gasoline sales and mass transit is obvious, and all of us who buy gasoline for our private vehicles should support the increased funding this bill would provide for mass transit, including purchasing buses and subsidizing bus passes. Similarly, those who drive vehicles with poor fuel efficiency will contribute more to the special fund than those who drive fuel-efficient vehicles.

"The measure is intended to enable the poor and low-income mass transit riders to have better access to transportation by allowing for fare subsidization programs to be established on a sliding scale based on income.

"I recognize the concerns raised by the testimony in opposition to this bill by the Department of Taxation, where they note the obvious, but hard-to-estimate, impact on general fund revenue this bill would involve. This is a cost that I think is worth paying. As for their argument that Honolulu County already has a GET surcharge to fund mass transit, I would counter that this bill would not supplant those monies but rather supplement them. Without this bill the City and County of Honolulu would receive their share (0.5%) of the 4.5% GET on gasoline sales, this bill would provide the remaining 4.0% on this particular product.

"I urge my colleagues to support this measure. Thank you."

Representative Meyer rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Just kind of a brief rebuttal. The taxpayers of this State and this County. Let's just start with this County. We already subsidize The Bus by about 75% to 80%. That's a direct benefit for people that are riding the bus. There's no question in my mind that if we go through with this mass transit we will be subsidizing that at a very high level. There is a point at which we have to look at what makes sense. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair then stated:

"The bill is going to the Finance Committee and they will have a lively discussion on this."

Representatives Morita and Kanoho, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection and the Committee on Water, Land, & Ocean Resources presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 327-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2174, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2174, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representative Morita, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 328-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2314, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2314, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAX CREDITS FOR ENERGY STAR RATED APPLIANCES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representative Karamatsu, for the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 329-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2805, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. Representative Harbin rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to 331. The reason for my opposition is I really question using the SPRB process for a company that is not even registered to do business in the State of Hawaii, and has no place of residence or anything in the State of Hawaii. So I just raise that as a potential policy issue about what our policy should be as far as SPRBs. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2878, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS TO ASSIST TRADEWINDS FOREST PRODUCTS, LLC," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representative Harbin voting no, and with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representative Karamatsu, for the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 332-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3077, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3077, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ISSUANCE OF SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS TO ASSIST ROSETTE STEEL HAWAII," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representative Karamatsu, for the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 333-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3019, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3019, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HIGH TECHNOLOGY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representative Karamatsu, for the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 334-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3058, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 3058, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, on 334, I rise with reservations. In reading the Committee Report, it says that they can establish operational bank accounts of foreign denominations in out-of-state locations, which is fine. But if you take this in context with another bill that we're passing out today, that we're not going to audit the High Tech Innovation Corporation, that we're going to do some exemptions. When you put these two together, I have some real concerns on that. Thank you."

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to express some reservations. I have very similar reservations on this bill. This would provide an exemption from Chapter 40 and it would result in HTIC, the Innovation Center, not being subject to DAGS supervision and pre-audit. The Comptroller could no longer supervise their expenditure to ensure that their funds are properly spent and comply with the Executive Orders and rules. They would not be able to pre-audit the expenditures to make certain appropriations are proper. They also would be exempted from Chapter 36 and 38. That was a problem for me too. Testimony was in opposition from B&F. So I would just want to express these reservations as this bill goes forward. Thank you."

Representative Halford rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ching rose in support of the measure with reservations, and asked that the remarks of Representative Marumoto be entered in the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Meyer rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The Chair stated:

"Members, this is going to the Finance Committee so for those who are on the Finance Committee, please address the issues that were brought to our attention."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3058, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HIGH TECHNOLOGY INNOVATION CORPORATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representative Ito, for the Committee on Public Safety & Military Affairs presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 335-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2332, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2332, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PRINCIPAL PRIVATE DETECTIVES AND GUARDS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representative Ito, for the Committee on Public Safety & Military Affairs presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 336-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3226, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 3226, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro

Representative Moses rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support with some reservations. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair stated:

"Representative Moses, you're on Finance, right? Do you want to address it in Finance since we have a time constraint? But I'll let you say a few words with reservations if you want."

Representative Moses continued, stating:

"Okay, I'll bring it up but there are several issues that need to be addressed. It's just that it only applies to certain high-rises, not to other facilities that could benefit from it, and it makes the Tax Department the expert in determining who benefits from this. I don't think they can do it. Thank you."

Representative Cabanilla rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'll be very brief. This bill has something to do with ... I have strong reservations. My reservation comes from the fact that I'm a taxpayer and I'm also a member of the Human Services Committee. I think that making a blanket policy on taking the initiative to retrofit these buildings, although I support the intent, I think these buildings should be safe. However, we're talking about a major high-ticket item here. Just imagine how many high-rise buildings we have in Honolulu. I would rather see these tax dollars spent on fixing our schools, building more homes for the needy, the disabled and the homeless. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3226, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BUILDING IMPROVEMENTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representative Ito, for the Committee on Public Safety & Military Affairs presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 337-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3231, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 3231, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Moses rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Meyer rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Finnegan rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3231, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT ESTABLISHING A STATE COMMISSION ON EMERGENCY RESPONSE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representative Ito, for the Committee on Public Safety & Military Affairs presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 338-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2595, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2595, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Stonebraker rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Moses rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Finnegan rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tanaka rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support for this bill. Family visits are important aspects of the rehabilitation process. It is beneficial for inmates to have direct contact with their loved ones. I know personally how bad the situation is in Maui Correctional Center. At MCC, family visitations are routinely cancelled without notice, leaving family members, some of whom have flown in from Molokai and Lanai, alone in the parking lot unable to see their loved ones. And the reason often given by Maui Correctional Center is that they have a shortage of adult correction officers or ACOs. To me, this is not an excuse. MCC has known about the staff shortage for a while. Yet, nothing is done to improve moral or recruit new employees. This is not right. And the individuals who hurt the most are the inmates and their *ohana*.

"H.B. 2595 aims to ensure that pre-approved and prescheduled family visits are honored by the Department of Public Safety and that incarcerated inmates have the opportunity to visit with their children and families. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Moses rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In brief rebuttal. I agree with every word that the previous speaker said. The problem is there's not enough correctional officers. So we can't just direct that these visitations occur when we don't have enough officers. Also there could be an infraction by the inmate that precludes him from seeing visitors. And it doesn't allow for that. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ching rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2595, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FAMILY VISITS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representative Moses voting no, and with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representative Ito, for the Committee on Public Safety & Military Affairs presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 339-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3092, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the reports of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 3092, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Stonebraker rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Moses rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Finnegan rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Cabanilla rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in opposition of this measure. Although I support the intent of expanding the Halawa Correctional Facility, I think that we here as a Body wanted longer and harsh punishment for our criminals. However, we're short of prisons. And I think we need

both. As we go forth, for us to carry on our intent, we should also support it by doing the right thing to support more prisons. Thank you."

Representative B. Oshiro rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise with some reservations on this. I do support the actual initiative for us to take a look at what we're going to do with our prison systems. I don't think we've seen enough leadership in this area. As long as people are going to be asking for more mandatory sentences and for longer prison terms for all of the many crimes that we have on our statutes, we do need to make sure that there's a proper infrastructure. My reservations come around in the area of expanding the Halawa Community Prison, which is in my district. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3092, HD I, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Cabanilla and Moses voting no, and with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representative Kahikina, for the Committee on Housing presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 340-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2598, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2598, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Tanaka rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in strong support of H.B. 2598. We need to support our *kupunas*, just as they took care of and taught each of us. They are linked to the past. Their knowledge and experience shapes future generations in society. I know that many of us, myself included, are over 55-years old and can relate to being raised on plantation-style housing. While I have no doubt that these homes are warm and loving, years of wear and tear have made them rickety and unsafe. Unfortunately, house renovation and repairs are not cheap, especially for elderly individuals trying to enjoy their retirement and golden years.

"This bill will aid those *kupunas* living in potentially hazardous and deteriorated housing by providing them with low-interest loans. Thank you to Housing Chair Kahikina and the members of the Housing Committee for supporting this measure. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2598, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representative Kahikina, for the Committee on Housing presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 341-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2990, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2990, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE MORTGAGE CREDIT CERTIFICATES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representative Kanoho, for the Committee on Water, Land, & Ocean Resources presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 342-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2943, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2943, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

The then Chair stated:

"Representative Caldwell, this may be your last chance so please say something."

Representative Caldwell rose to speak in support of the measure, stating

"Actually, Mr. Speaker. It is a very good bill. And it is addressed towards the victims of Manoa flood although, I think it's something that could be expanded to victims of flooding anywhere in the State. Thank you very much."

Representative Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising in opposition although I sympathize with the flood victims. Mr. Speaker, my home was flooded twice up to the level of about two and a half feet. I think we need to consider very carefully, are we going to set up a State policy that in any event of a flood, we are going to help the victims of that flood? And do we have the funds to do that? Or is it better that the people are able to get National Flood Insurance Program flood insurance. I didn't have that for the first flood. And it was a sorry lesson I learned. I did have it for the second flood. I just don't think we should single out a small group of people, as much as I sympathize with them, because probably more than anyone else in this Chamber, I've been through it twice. But I don't think we should single them out to give them this tax credit. Thank you."

Representative Finnegan rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, also in opposition and just similar comments as the Representative from Kailua, as well as, we have had flood victims in our area with Mapunapuna, as well as Moanalua and Foster Village. So I have the same comments. Thank you."

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations. I also, in my district, have many flood victims. But the other comment that hasn't come up yet is also, maybe a needs assessment. I know this year we're looking at affordable housing and helping low-income. Maybe if we had a needs assessment for low-income people, that would be more in line with what we're trying to do this year. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2943, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RELIEF OF MANOA FLOOD VICTIMS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representative Finnegan voting no, and with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representatives Caldwell and Karamatsu, for the Committee on Labor & Public Employment and the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 343-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2691, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2691, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm in opposition to H.B. 2691. Thank you. This would have to do with, the title is prevailing wages. It would form a very large joint Labor Management Committee to watch over construction projects in the event that there's any violation of the Little Davis-Bacon Act. I will just simply note that employees can now take civil action against employers for various violations. So I don't think we need a joint Labor Management Committee to watch over every individual project. This may extend it to non-governmental sponsored projects. That means private projects. So I think it's a big step toward a lot more paperwork and higher cost for construction. Thank you."

Representative Harbin rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in complete opposition to this measure. I will try to proceed in my usual delicate manner as I address this issue. I'm also going to request that I'd be able to sit in on the Finance Committee when and if this bill does come out. I really question a quasi-public, or I guess, a private committee which claims to possess experience and expertise in the construction industry, to have the right to sue private employers on the behalf of employees. We have an agency that's mandated to do this.

"During the interim, I sat in on many wage standards meetings and saw statistics. It's quite interesting that for a little minimal clerical errors, which happen quite a bit in completing certified payrolls, that there are these real *manini* errors that were corrected, employers made the employees whole. It was considered a big deal. It raised the number of citations for the employers. It was all types of employers. And I really question a policy of giving a Labor Management Committee, which has no statutory right to be going after private employers in any size, shape, or form. I look forward to some more in-depth discussion as to why we need something like this. Thank you."

Representative Meyer rose in opposition to the measure, and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Meyer's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I am rising in opposition to HB 2691. This bill would allow a federal Labor Management Committee established under 29 USC 175-a to bring an action for injunctive in other relief against contractors who fail to pay prevailing wages under Chapter 104 HRS on public works projects. These federal labor management committees are only formed when a collective bargaining agreement is in place. The problem here is this bill would give the committee the right to bring injunctive action against a contractor regardless of whether there is a collective bargaining agreement in place or not.

"I would question the legality of the committee to bring injunctive action since they are not the injured party. The injured party is the employee and they have a neutral advocate in the State Department of Labor and Industrial Relations Enforcement Division."

Representative Stevens rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Finnegan rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Thielen rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Stonebraker rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ching rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2691, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PREVAILING WAGES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Harbin, Marumoto, Meyer and Stonebraker voting no, and with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representatives Caldwell and Karamatsu, for the Committee on Labor & Public Employment and the Committee on Economic Development & Business Concerns presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 344-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2692, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2692, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Stonebraker rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Harbin rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to say no to this bill. I, like many of us in this Chamber, we are here for one very specific reason, which is to try to, at least in this Session, to find some way to have, develop different means, mechanisms of funding our need for affordable housing. It is these types of bills that will interfere with controlling the cost of affordable housing. I really wish that we would pause, take a look at what it is that we're trying to do. Are we trying to deliver affordable housing to our people, or are we not? If we are not, then let's continue to pass these types of measures. If we are, let's stop and think about what we are doing to the cost of affordable housing. Thank you."

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Again, I'm in opposition to this measure. I think this would require that Little Davis-Bacon Act, the State prevailing wage law to cover a lot of private projects. Especially those that are financed by special purpose revenue bonds. I've said this many times on the Floor. We use these bonds to allow public utilities, medical centers, housing projects, industrial bonds, independent schools to get lower priced financing. So when you add this type of layer over these projects, it increases the cost. It causes delays. And time is money. So it certainly increase the cost of our affordable housing that we're so concentrated on this year.

"I question the title of this bill, and the previous bill. This was entitled "Public Works," and yet it really covers private projects. I would hope that the next Committee would take a serious look at it and not even hear this bill. Thank you very much."

Representative Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm voting no on this measure as well. Thank you. Mr. Speaker, I'd like to also have the remarks of the Representative of Kakaako entered into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Thielen continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, it's once again, we're not looking at how we're going to deliver low-income and affordable housing. That should be the primary focus of this Legislature this Session. That's the huge drastic need. Bills like this are going to hurt. And they're actually going to stop some of those projects. So I think we need to answer to those people who so desperately need housing if we go ahead with this bill. Thank you."

Representative Cabanilla rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of this measure. I believe this came up because we have a lot of contracts with the federal government here in town that mainly repair a lot of military projects. These contractors are bringing in people from California thereby affecting our local job market and the industries in town because as federal contractors, they don't have to abide with our rules. We would like them to hire our own people. So it's about protecting our own turf, Mr. Speaker. Thank you."

Representative Moses rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I'll just go with reservations at this point. I wasn't going to say anything but the last speaker commented on hiring out-of-state worker, but the problem is we can't hire enough carpenters within the State to do the jobs that we have already. So that's why we have to go out-of-state. Thank you."

Representative Stevens rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Meyer rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I'm rising in opposition to this measure. This bill just creates a tremendous expansion of public works jobs. The body of law that created the public works rules and requirements, it seems very clear to me that this was to cover just public works. Jobs that were initiated by the State government, county governments. But because of an opinion by the Attorney General, the justification for this bill has come about. I would like to see this whole thing go to the Supreme Court of the State of Hawaii. I think one Deputy Director up at the Attorney General's Office could very possibly be wrong.

"The Department of Labor couldn't possibly have the staff and space to monitor all kinds of additional jobs that we're now going to call public works that we never called public works before. In this situation there is not governmental contract agency. If Hanahauoli School decides to build something with SPRBs, they are the contractors. Not a county or State department. So there's a whole lot of problems with this bill, but it seems very clear that the whole genesis of this is to expand almost, double, triple, the jobs that will now be considered public works and we don't have a department that could handle that. Thank you."

Representative Caldwell rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Just one brief comment. In support, Mr. Speaker. We've heard both in Committee and now on the Floor about opinions of the Attorney General. I like to just point out that this same Attorney General in written opinions has given the Governor the basis for vetoing numerous bills in the three years I've been here. Those opinions of the Attorney General are valid for the Governor when she wants to veto something. And now when you get an opinion from the same Attorney General, not one but two, Mr. Speaker, somehow that opinion no longer counts. We're doing what the Attorney General has asked us to do. Thank you."

Representative Finnegan rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ching rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2692, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC WORKS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Ching, Finnegan, Harbin, Marumoto, Meyer and Stonebraker voting no, and with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 345-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3017, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3017, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TOBACCO PRODUCTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 346-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2376, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2376, HD I, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN EMERGENCY APPROPRIATION TO THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH FOR THE EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES SYSTEM BRANCH," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 347-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2187, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2187, HD I, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Magaoay rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, on this Standing Committee Report 347, I stand in strong support. I'd like to thank the Chair of Health who pushed this out. It's really a critical matter for us on the North Shore, on the Windward and Leeward side, and also the island of Kauai. The service has been provided by DOD for the air ambulance. It's been provided to us. This will be going out as of March 31st of this year.

"Right now what we're trying to do is provide some kind of stopgap, hopefully a temporary measure, as the unit is deployed to Iraq. What we're looking at right now is that hopefully this is a tool for us to find a service, and not only looking on Oahu, maybe we can use it as a model to look at different islands like Kauai which doesn't have this service. So it goes to Finance and I ask my colleagues for their support as we look for a permanent solution. Hopefully it's temporary for us at the State, and hopefully the DOD takes over. Thank you."

Representative Pine rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pine's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in strong support on HB2187HD1.

"As all of us know that the 12 Black Hawk helicopters with Charlie Company of the 25th Infantry Division's combat aviation brigade who have over the past 31 years served as Hawaii's guardian angels in the sky are being deployed to Iraq in August for a yearlong mission to protect the United States from terrorism. These brave military men and women have transported over seven thousand patients and saved countless lives by transporting patients from rural areas of Oahu to downtown area hospitals. I wish them Godspeed during their mission.

"HB 2187, HD1 will appropriate funds (\$600,000) to the Department of Health to contract with a government agency or U.S. military branch to provide intra-island only roto-wing aeromedical services for rural Oahu.

"It is the duty of this Legislature to pass this bill. We have the duty to make sure that our citizens are protected and cared for. This important legislation guarantees that our rural communities will have access to aeromedical services.

"We all know how bad traffic can be here in Honolulu. Some of us have even been late to committee meetings because of the heavy traffic. Imagine a child on the Leeward Coast who is in need of immediate emergency attention. Without this bill, that child would have to be loaded into an emergency response vehicle and transported from the Leeward Coast to downtown Honolulu through heavy traffic.

"We owe it to that child and to all our citizens to make sure we have reliable aeromedical services on this island. That is why I am supporting HB 2187. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2187, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representatives Arakaki and Sonson, for the Committee on Health and the Committee on Human Services presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 348-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3116, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 3116, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Arakaki rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support of H.B. 3116. I just want to note this is probably a proud moment in our Legislature's history. I did want to thank the Majority Leader and my Vice Chair for their efforts in negotiating and crafting this public-private partnership. And I also want to note the Department of Human Services and Director Koller and the Health Committee agree that investing in children's health is probably one of the best things we could do for our future. So I'd like to ask everybody to remember this moment and hopefully we can celebrate this at the end of Session."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 3116, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII CHILDREN'S HEALTH CARE PROGRAM," passed Second

Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representatives Herkes and Arakaki, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce and the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 349-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1869, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1869, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising in support of this bill. Thank you. Mr. Speaker, the bill deals with an aspect of pharmaceutical research that highlights the growing trend of drugs being rushed to the market without adequate trials and lack of input, and also with lack of information provided to physicians.

"The bill provides that a manufacturer or laborer of prescription drugs shall post on the Internet information concerning any clinical trial that the manufacture conducted or sponsored. Specifically it's supposed to post the name of the entity that conducted the clinical trial, summary of the purposes of the clinical trial, dates during which the trial is taking place, and information concerning the results of the clinical trial, including potential or actual adverse effects of the drug.

"That's important information for our consumers to have, Mr. Speaker. When you look at the Vioxx drug problem and the constant downplaying of any negative finding, or not answering the concerns raised by physicians, we see that this information is really important to our consumers. So I would urge my colleagues to vote in favor of this measure."

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, please cast a no vote for me on this measure. The pharmaceutical companies had no problem with disclosing some of the results of their later clinical trials, but they said earlier ones would be problematic. Also there's one feature in this measure that is retroactive and calls for clinical trials to be on the Internet if sponsored on or after October 2002. So I think we should take another look at this measure. Thank you."

Representative Meyer rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 1869, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ADVERTISING BY DRUG MANUFACTURERS AND DISCLOSURE OF CLINICAL TRIALS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representative Marumoto voting no, and with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representatives Herkes and Caldwell, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce and the Committee on Labor & Public Employment presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 350-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2320, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2320, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INSURANCE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representatives Herkes and Luke, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce and the Committee on Judiciary presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 351-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3244, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 3244, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro

Representative Finnegan rose in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to just note my very strong support."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 3244, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO IDENTITY THEFT," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

Representatives Sonson and Arakaki, for the Committee on Human Services and the Committee on Health presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 352-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1821, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. Representative Ching's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you Mr. Speaker. I rise in strong support of House Bill 3108 - Relating to Education.

"The time has come to give teachers the choice of where and how they need to spend their allotted funds for classroom supplies. It is our responsibility as the State of Hawaii to prepare each child to succeed in today's society and work force, and being technology proficient and innovative are important in achieving this goal. The debit card program for public school teachers will enhance education.

"Firstly, teachers need creative curriculum. Every child is unique and has different learning skills and needs. One size doesn't fit all. Debit cards liberate teachers to be free in their way of reaching children. Elements of innovation are a must in a classroom.

"Secondly, teachers need flexibility. Debit cards give teachers the freedom to go to different providers of supplies, rather than the restricted options of vendors that appear on the supply list. Teachers come across situations in which they have limited tools and not all events can be foreseen. Flexibility in curriculum is essential.

"Lastly, debit cards encourage a relationship between businesses in a school's community and the school. As members of an island State, relationships help us succeed and contribute to the success of a community as a whole. When we reach out to the 'mom and pop' stores within a community, they will be more inclined to support and get involved with the school in the future. Community relationships will strengthen with a debit card program, as well as boost morale and serve as an appealing tool to recruit teachers."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3108, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

There's maybe even concern that they're being used for drug deliveries. My problem with the bill is that the HRS already requires that mopeds be inspected and the laws actually broader than this current law that the bill we're looking, the bill that we're looking at. But HRS also allows police to issue the citations already. But bikers could just put on pipes to pass the test. It's very easy then they take the pipes back off. So there's not assurance. Thank you."

Representative Ching rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. I wanted to also mention that I agree with the previous speaker on what he had to say. There've been reports to my office that moped drivers at 2:00 and 3:00 a.m. in the morning. A couple people have reported that they believe them to be drug dealers. But what we know is that fatalities have skyrocketed because of the retrofitting of mopeds. Also we know that our elders who spend all their money to have a nice home, it's affecting their quality of life. Something has to be done about mopeds. In strong support."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2677, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOPEDS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Halford, Takai and Thielen being excused.

"Mr. Speaker, I rise with a strong no on this provision. Vocational rehab is a tool that is used for our employees that have been permanently injured and are unable to return to their job. Voc rehab is a self-referral process to help our employees gain gainful employment in other areas. What this attempts to do is to expand it to those that are not permanent and give them the same benefit. I was under the assumption coming into this Session that we were on a quest for some type of work comp reform because of the brokenness of the system. These types of measures are the types of measures that will set us back tenfold. Vocational rehab is one of the most quickest growing expense cost drivers in the work comp system. It's a self-referral system. I think before we start making these expansions of benefits, we really need to stop and take a look at the whole system, which is horribly broken. Thank you."

So I'm appreciating that we're not voting these bills down. But instead, keeping our minds open so that by the end of the Session, if we need to act, we can. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations. Just one comment that if this moves forward, I do hope that they look at things like getting rid of the Certificate of Need and how to promote private and competitive healthcare in Hawaii also. Thank you."

Representative Halford rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you. With reservations. And just to point out that the bill as it is now certainly deserves reservations. The speaker from Kona made a good point about further deliberation. Thank you."

Representative Tsuji rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm paying attention. Thank you very much. Mr. Speaker, I speak in strong support of H.B. 2763. During the last Session, we finally recognized the value and the importance of this invasive Coqui frog eradication. This bill really has embraced the

Big Island majority. This is one of the packages that we've made into the Legislative Session this Session. It talks about appropriation originally for the Island and the County of Hawaii. But in final realization, we realize that this is more than a County of Hawaii concern. We realize it's the continuing concern and effort of a statewide eradication program. It involves all counties throughout the State of Hawaii. The appropriations amount has been deleted and we urge continued support. Thank you very much."

Representative Sonson rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"In support, Mr. Speaker. But you know, I have some reservations on this. I think we're going about this war on frogs in a very limited way. It's a band-aid approach. We're giving only a slight amount of money. Last year, we gave \$100,000, I think. Whereas this one calls for \$1 million. But when I was on the Big Island just two weeks ago, I was reading the paper about what the actual need is to eradicate. The war on frogs must escalate to a point of \$45 million. Either we commit to this war on frogs or we find other ways to eliminate the problem. Coqui mochi was suggested, but I don't know whether or not that's even appropriate for the Big Island.

"Mr. Speaker, prevention might be something we can do. Containment might be something we can do. But eradication for the Big Island is not going to happen with \$1 million. It's going to cost \$45 million according to the government official, I believe from BLNR. So more money for the war on frogs."

Representative Chong rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Tsuji be entered in the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I rise in strong support. Thank you. I hope that we continue moving this bill forward and do provide appropriations because the beauty of us getting involved is that we're actually empowering the local people to take charge of themselves, and what this problem is creating for them. What this money, I think, will do is give the ability to the counties to provide equipment, to provide some grant money and support to the local people that are coming together in these kind of Coqui frog patrols to educate their neighbors and to actually know how to solve the problem if in fact they bring plants home with Coqui frog on them. So I think the money that we give goes an awful long ways to fighting this battle.

"The other thing is in many areas of the Big Island, it's probably, some of the neighborhoods, there's thousands and thousands of them. So to totally eradicate, I think they've come to a point where they know that that probably won't happen. But what they can do is they contain it. And that's very important on the Big Island, to contain those areas. Thank you."

Representative Hale rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Yes, all I can tell you, if any of you have 30,000 Coqui frogs all night long, you'd all be for all of this. Thank you."

Representative Abinsay rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Yes. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Also in strong support. But first, I would like to adopt the words of the Vice Chair of the Agricultural Committee as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

"And now for the edification of our colleague from Waipahu, we would like to also mention that aside from the two million that we originally requested on this measure, with the work of the Hawaii Invasive Species Council, they were also given a certain amount of

dollars, we're talking about millions. And one of the components or responsibilities of this Council is to also address the Coqui frog problem. So I hope that will address the concern of our colleague. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2763, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION TO ERADICATE AND CONTROL THE COQUI FROG," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Kahikina being excused.

The purpose of this bill is to provide for much needed parking space in Kakaako by authorizing the University of Hawaii in consultation with the HCDA, to enter into agreements with private developers to expedite construction of a parking structure at Kakaako Makai. As you know, Mr. Speaker, the medical school is very close to our harbors and our container yard. I would just like to urge that the location for this parking structure not interfere with our cargo operations down at the harbor. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2479, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE CONSTRUCTION OF A PARKING STRUCTURE AT KAKAAKO MAKAI, OAHU," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Kahikina being excused.

Not only am I very proud to have had Senator Fong as a constituent, but I'm blessed to call him a friend and mentor. He was truly a kind and generous man who always made the time to help young people. This scholarship would honor his legacy.

"As an aside, might I note that it was a nice, remarkable find to see that when I taught at Maemae, that Senator Fong is in many of our national textbooks, and also that he is the first Asian to ever been nominated for the U.S. presidency. Mahalo."

She suffers from juvenile diabetes, but in spite of that she's had the courage to come forward and advocate for others who also suffer the same condition. Her name is Natasha Garcia and because I'm not sure whether this bill is going to be heard in Finance, I just wanted to read her name into our Journal, so that we can credit her and also acknowledge her for her courage in advocating for research, and also to raise funds personally, and asking us to help her raise funds for the research of juvenile diabetes. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2074, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO JUVENILE DIABETES CURE RESEARCH," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Kahikina being excused.

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of this measure Relating to Health. The purpose of the measure is to appropriate funds for important emergency services at the Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center.

"To reiterate: this bill makes an appropriation to WCCHC to:

- Provide vital health care services to an estimated population of 40,000 people; and
- Ensure continued twenty-four-hour emergency room and ambulatory service to Leeward, O'ahu.

"The Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center is a vital part of our health care delivery system for the medically under-served in Waianae. Access to adequate emergency health care for all persons certainly is one of the most significant needs of our community. Thank you, Mr. Speaker"

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to declare a potential conflict. I am a member of the Corporate Board of the American Cancer Society," and the Chair ruled "no conflict."

Representative Meyer rose in support of the measure with reservations, and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Meyer's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm rising to support HB 2047 with some serious reservations. Personally I believe this bill goes way too far. It is one thing to prohibit smoking in State offices and buildings, but quite another to dictate to the counties and private employers what they must do on their premises. State government should not usurp the counties' home rule rights, nor should it interfere with private property rights. Business owners who own or lease their premises should be free to run them as they see fit. This bill as written is overbearing. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2047, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary, with Representative Kahikina being excused.

Representative Chang rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Karamatsu rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Carroll rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Finnegan rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Yamashita rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Stevens rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Chong rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Halford rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Sonson rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, can I not vote on this? I actually walked out of the room because I really didn't know what to do on this particular measure, but as I walked out and sat down ... Yes, I am in support with reservations and I want the discussion to go on. As I sat down I came up a memory of what was said, and I think it's worth noting of what the psychiatrist said. I have no objection of a psychologist prescribing psychotropics. However, he also then goes on to say that we have to balance the reason why we're pushing this forward, which

is access versus consumer protection. There was a issue whether or not the curriculum for the psychologist to take, because there's a curriculum that's been submitted and there's a question whether or not it was sufficient to address the whole array of phsychotropics that a psychologist will have to prescribe in lieu of having a medically trained psychiatrist to prescribe.

"So as this bill moves forward, I hope that we all look at that. That there's an open mind at least in the psychiatrist side saying that, 'Yeah there's a way.' But however we must take a look at the safety, the safety of the consumers to see whether or not the curriculum is sufficient to address that. I would have a suggestion and I did suggest this to my good friend, the doctor, who is the introducer of this bill. I said, "You know, this measure is limited to prescriptive authority only in the rural areas where there is an access problem. However maybe we should ask what kinds of psychotropics are being dispensed at those areas to see whether or not we need the whole array of psychotropics." Because, Mr. Speaker, as he explained it to me. Most of the need out in the rural areas is really something that could be addressed by a much more limited prescriptive authority which is only for antidepressants.

"As you know we had a big debate last Session regarding what kinds of access consumers would have as to psychotropics and I think I was mistaken when I said that the whole array of psychotropics had to do with something like Mel Gibson going crazy in one of his movies. I was wrong. I think those kinds of psychotic behaviors like Mel Gibson displayed in the movie are addressed by psychotropics that are antipsychotic. I learned this as I go on. And actually the kinds of needs that are in the rural areas could be addressed by antidepressants. They are less dangerous, have less side effects, and etc. And I think that if the discussion would go along those lines I think more Members would probably consider prescriptive authority. Anyway, Mr. Speaker, that's my piece. Thank you very much."

Representative Cabanilla rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"I would like to register a reservation with this measure and if I may briefly state why I have reservations. This prescriptive authority that's now written in this bill requires a psychologist to work with a medical doctor. I would much rather see this psychologist work collaboratively with a psychiatrist, because a lot of this psychotropic medication that they write are very potent and has a lot of side effects. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Yamane rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Hale rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I would just like to say that we just had a hot discussion on this and it was passed by the Committee and it will go to another Committee so that's enough right now."

Representative Evans rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Green rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. So let me sum up the big dialogue for the group here. We're talking about giving psychologists the right to prescribe medications, but specifically medication for mental health issues, about 3% of all the medications that are prescribed by any health care professional. The reason we need this, and I'm convinced we need this is the following.

"A person stands on the edge of a cliff literally, and gets sunburned, for 5 hours, comes in with second degree burns, they see their primary care doctor. The doctor treats him for sunburn they think, and find out later that they were suicidal standing on the end of the cliff, literally. This is the kind of testimony we had about this. Now why on earth would we give psychologists the right to prescribe something that someone went through medical school and then residency for 4 years, and then additional 3, 4, or 5 years to prescribe? The reason is this, we don't have psychiatrists prescribing in the rural countryside areas, in the health profession shortage areas.

"This bill only allows, only allows for prescriptions in community health centers and others like the Hawaiian Health Center. Places that there are no psychiatrists and there aren't any other ways to get care. So the psychiatrists who have chosen not to go there over the past 20 years cannot deliver that care have left this vulnerable population. People from a socioeconomic standpoint, if they have mental health problems gravitate to areas where they can possibly afford to live. To Ocean View, to Ka'u, to the rural areas around the State. The psychiatrists don't go there.

"No one has more respect from me than the psychiatrist and their expertise. We don't want a second-tier system. What this bill is about is getting psychologists the right to prescribe when, number one, they're in a collaborative relationship with a doctor of medicine. That will not change. In fact, I'm sure that the compromises ultimately will go to a point where there will always be in a collaborative relationship because they will be doing it only at Community Health Centers where the doctors still don't have enough time to prescribe those medications. We won't do anything unsafe because we're not going to have some lack of supervision. We're completely prepared to negotiate the curriculum. That was set forth after a long discussion.

"I don't know if everyone is aware of this but last year we passed a resolution, which forced a task force of six people, two psychiatrists, two psychologists, Senator Baker, and myself to sit down and talk about these issues. The last thing I want to do is do something that's unsafe for people, but everyday that the majority of the poor don't get this kind of care, they remain subject to suicidal ideation, catastrophic problems. They can't get their medicines. It's not a perfect world.

"Every doctor should come to you and say they have reservations. There's no question, colleagues, that that's important. But the bottom line is every weekend I see three or four people that are suicidal. They couldn't get their medicines. These are rural ERs that I'm working in. They couldn't get them because there was no doctor available, there's no psychiatrist available. The solutions that you'll hear from the Psychiatry Association, again a well-respected organization with excellent professionals, would be we could do more tele-medicine. I also put in a bill for that. We can do other things such as provide residency coverage. All of these recommendations amount sadly to solutions that might, might account for less than 5% of the problem."

Representative Yamashita rose to yield his time, and the Chair, "so ordered."

Representative Green continued, stating:

"Thank you. And I'll wrap up. But the bottom line is this. That these two groups, the psychiatrists and psychologists, are urged more by me than by anybody else to find negotiated ground on the curriculum, number one. The relationship with the professionals, number two. And number three, very possibly the formulary, the extent of the formulary because there's no question we don't want to make things more dangerous for a patient.

"But everyday that we don't do something which has sadly amounted to many years where we haven't taken definitive action. All the recommendations that came from the Psychiatry Association, we had years to take up. We actually got a task force together and they still didn't come up with any substantive recommendation that would account for more than 5% of the problem.

"So we got to do something if not this year it's another year that poor mental health patients will go untreated. That's all you really need to remember. Now when people say there's controversy, it will be hammered out between the professionals on both sides. I've told them that. But we really can't afford any longer to neglect this group of people. Thank you, colleagues."

Representative Schatz rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, a ruling out of a potential conflict of interests. I'm the Executive Director of a not-for-profit that provides psychiatric services to adults with mental illness," and the Chair ruled "no conflict."

Representative Schatz continued, stating:

"Thank you. I'd like to vote in favor of this and adopt the words of the Vice Chair of Health with the exception of the part about being an ER doctor," and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kahikina rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I stand in support of this measure and ask that the words from my colleague from the Big Island be entered in the Journal of my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kahikina continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker I fully agree with the doctor. Coming from Waianae and as I was going through trying to investigate the homeless crisis. We find that a lot of the homeless are mentally ill. It was sad for me to find out that many of them are turning to ice because they don't have the medical treatment that they need.

"Now I got elected, this is my 12th year. For 11 years we've been dealing with the same issues. And for 11 years these psychiatrists have been promising that they will go into this narrow, limited areas such as the community centers. Mr. Speaker, maybe they have gone there but that's not enough. We need more.

"Lastly Mr. Speaker, if I were to be sick and I would listen to advice, I would listen to a doctor before I would listen to any other professional. Thank you."

Representative Arakaki rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support of this measure. And this is not the first time we're introducing this measure although this is the first time that the Health Committee has passed it out of Committee, and it was a rather narrow vote. But last year, we deferred the bill in order to study the matter further. You heard from the Vice Chair from Kona, and I think he was a perfect person to lead this task force because not only is he a prescribing doctor, but he also works in an underserved area.

"Actually, as he said, we need this bill to sort of force the parties to come to a compromise, because I mean there are arguments on both sides. I think there is a way to compromise and to craft a measure that may not satisfy everyone, but at least it will assure patient safety and at the same time address the access issue. For those who have reservations, especially those who come from a Neighbor Island and those who come from rural areas, I really want you to ask yourself, who are the psychiatrists that you have within your island and within your zip code? And if you can name them that's fine. But also, I want you to visit your community health centers because these are

people who really don't have access like you and I and most of us here on the Floor.

"We have access probably to the finest providers because we can afford it and because most of us, for those of us who live in Honolulu, we have access to psychiatrists or even psychologists. But we have to think about those who probably need the services the most and who needs the services critically. We have to think about them. And that's who it's directed to. It's not directed to the whole population. It's just directed to those that we feel are very vulnerable and don't have the kind of access that's needed for the needed services. So if you have reservations, then do some research and ask those questions. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Moses rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm remaining with reservations. I heard all my colleagues, and I've heard our colleague from the Big Island, who is a doctor. One of the things I heard was that the psychologist would be doing this, at least in communications with a medical doctor. It wouldn't be in total isolation. My concern over this is maybe there's an underlying cause that's being missed. Maybe it's a tumor or some other disease and not just you know a mental condition. And that could be missed without a doctor.

"I understand the rural health centers don't have doctors and I think that our solution should be to ensure that they do have adequate medical care at those facilities, even if it's you know out in the Old West. Doctors hopped from town to town, I mean, at least have some visitation. But I'm just concerned about that they will be treating the symptoms and not the underlying cause. Thank you."

Representative Kanoho rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support but with reservations. Just want to clarify that it could have been a no except for the words of wisdom from the Chair of Health and the Vice Chair of the Health Committee. Thank you."

Representative Green rose to respond, stating:

"Just a brief clarification, Mr. Speaker, again in support. That the health centers will have doctors. They do have doctors. In fact, they're federally mandated to have a full-time physician. They'll also have other providers there.

"The expectation is these patients will be seen in a follow-up with a physician or in consultation with a psychiatrist, but the reality is that there's so much mental health need in this population that they can't get appointments. They never can get appointments with psychiatrists, virtually. Virtually never. With the doctors, the primary care doctors, they have a very difficult time getting consultation, maybe every six weeks. You've all been burdened by the phone person on the other end when you call and they'll say, 'Okay we can see you in eight weeks.' Well, if you're suicidal or depressed eight weeks won't do it.

"So what the plan is, is they will actually be able to see someone, who then can give them the definitive care, who then will speak to the doctor. And if they think it's desperate, they will get them in to see the doctor. But right door is closed and we have to open some door to these people. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair then stated:

"Members, we've had a lot of discussion on this matter. You all realize it's going be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce. For those of you who are on the Committee, you've heard the discussion with reservations and in strong support. May we proceed on at this point?"

Representative Stonebraker rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2589, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PSYCHOLOGISTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce with Representatives Stevens, Stonebraker and Thielen voting no, and with Representative Kahikina being excused.

Representative Caldwell, for the Committee on Labor & Public Employment presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 410-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2952, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2952, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Stonebraker rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Harbin rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I stand in opposition and absolute no to 410. I did not hear you move on. I'm very sorry. This is going to be a very... I'm going to be speaking all Session on these bills of these types on this particular issue. Just so that some of us in this in this Chamber can understand why I am so concerned about this type of language.

"Chapter 104 is the Chapter that I have been repeatedly saying is going to have a very large, substantial impact on our ability to deliver affordable housing to our people.

"Chapter 104 and this particular measure in particular is attempting to 'jerry-rig' the statute by requiring that the Department of Labor become the collector of certified payrolls. And why do I say jerry-rigging? Because there was an innocuous, and very innocuous Attorney General's opinion on one section of Chapter 104, without looking at the entire Chapter. And what that did was it raised issues and questions about certified payrolls and government entities.

"So this measure like many others that are going to come before us are going to attempt to address this questionable AG's opinion on one section by appointing an agency to become a government contracting agency when in fact the government contracting agency has no control over the money, the funding, or the relationship between the employer and employee.

"So we need to look at this not just as little pieces of the statute. I think we need to step back and look at the entire statute and the impact that it is, will have on our ability to deliver affordable housing. Thank you."

Representative Marumoto rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Harbin be entered in the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Meyer rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising in opposition to this measure. No, I'm not going to speak on it right now. Thank you."

Representative Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm voting no also, Mr. Speaker. And as I've said a number of times on bills of this sort, we have to examine them with a magnifying glass to see what their impact will

be on our need - our absolute need to create low income and affordable housing.

"Every time we do something like this, we prevent this State from moving forward in delivering those needed units. I think it's really important, Mr. Speaker. I mean I wish that the Majority Leadership would sit down at a table, and I'll gladly provide magnifying glasses. But sit down at a table and just go over the legislation in total and pinpoint the ones that are going to stop affordable housing and low income housing, and housing for the homeless. And when those are going to prevent that, set them on the side and say maybe in two years maybe in three years, but not now. Because our primary focus, we're going to stay focused, we're going to deliver those housing units. This bill will hurt that effort. Thank you."

Representative Moses rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Thielen be entered in the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Stevens rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Finnegan rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ching rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Thielen be entered in the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2952, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC WORKS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Ching, Finnegan, Harbin, Marumoto, Meyer, Moses, Stonebraker and Thielen voting no, and with Representative Kahikina being excused.

Representative Herkes, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 411-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2931, HD 1, be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2931, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GENERATED ELECTRICITY," was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Kahikina being excused.

Representative Kahikina, for the Committee on Housing presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 412-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2176, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2176, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Harbin rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise with strong reservations. This is another bill that I think has got wonderful intentions and I really want to support it. But I think it's a dream if we think we're going to accomplish until we resolve the issues that we discussed in Standing Committee Report 410. I encourage us to put these things together when we talk. Thanks."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2176, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING," passed

Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Kahikina being excused.

Representative Kahikina, for the Committee on Housing presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 413-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2368, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2368, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Arakaki rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I speak in support of this measure. And I want to start by thanking the Chair of the Housing Committee for considering the amendment that we made to this measure to exempt families with children, the disabled, and the elderly from this expedited, eviction process. And I guess my concern as a policy maker is we have a public housing program that essentially is a safety net for people without housing. And to think that we're going to expedite the process with that where we actually are cutting holes in that safety net, and allowing people to become homeless. People who have children, people who are disabled, people who are elderly.

"The question is if we take away public housing, what do they have left? Do we want put them in shelters or do we want to allow to be on the streets? We have few alternatives so in a way I'm hoping we can force a discussion on what do we do with people who can't afford rents even in low income rental housing. And what can we do perhaps in helping them to manage their finances because many times that's the problem, that they fall behind a rents and once they do, they can't really catch up.

"So I believe we need to hold people accountable to pay their rent, but I believe that our State agency shouldn't be thought of as landlords or even Simon Legree and be allowed to just toss people out, and for us to make it easier for them to do that. So, Mr. Speaker, I hope we can continue this discussion, but in the meantime I hope we can consider the most vulnerable in our population as an exemption. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Finnegan rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. It's been a while since I actually visited this issue because I'm no longer on this Committee. However, I'm going to go by memory. I'm voting with reservations. One of the reasons why this bill came forward, I believe if I remember correctly is that there are situations where people take advantage of the eviction process. And many times we've discovered that there are areas where there's families that will go and you know spend for other things, other things that are not as priority as housing. And what's happening is in these situations there are other people that need this public housing, that they are living on the beach or don't have a home.

"And so what they wanted to do was not cut the eviction process short just to get them these people in public housing, just to get them out sooner. But it was basically to say stop manipulating the eviction process and take this seriously, and we'll help you through this process so that you can stay in public housing. But pay your rent first. And then from there you know if you're truly having a hard time, I think that there are those types of mechanisms in place where they can get help.

"So I'm like I said I need to revisit the situation a little bit better, but as it goes forward I'd just like to voice my reservation because of that."

Representative Sonson rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Reservations and the words of the prior speaker be inserted in the Journals as my own," and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Sonson continued, stating:

"In addition, Mr. Speaker, it's not only rent that these people are being evicted for, it's also for breaking house rules like brining in people at all hours of the night, drug use, and what not.

"So as long as there are similarly situated people waiting in line. People with children, elderly, disabled that are waiting in line who have never had the chance to get into the housing yet, let's not make exceptions for the troublemakers. Thank you."

Representative Meyer rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"I just wanted to rise with reservations and ask that the words of the Minority Leader be inserted in the Journal. But brief comment about the fact that when people are breaking the rules and are not paying their rent and the word gets around, it's demoralizing for the other people that are doing what they're supposed to do. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2368, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC HOUSING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary, with Representative Kahikina being excused.

Representative Ito, for the Committee on Public Safety & Military Affairs presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 414-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2996, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2996, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro

Representative Cabanilla rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in opposition of this measure. This measure has something to do with repealing the prohibition against the manufacture, possession, sale, or acquisition of detachable ammunition magazines for pistols with capacity in excess of 10 rounds

"Mr. Speaker, I believe that we have the constitutional right to bear arms. However allowing us to have high capacity magazines just because criminals have access to it is not right. Just because criminals can carry this that doesn't mean that those of us who are law abiding should do the same.

"We now live in civilized times. We're no longer in frontier times and besides if you can't defend yourself with 10 rounds, you might as well forget it. Thank you, Mr. Speaker"

Representative Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. A no vote please for many of the same

Representative Moses rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, Mr. Speaker. All we're doing here is complying with federal law. It's been repealed federally this prohibition, and we're just conforming. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2996, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIREARMS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary with Representatives Cabanilla and Thielen voting no, and with Representative Kahikina being excused.

Representative Ito, for the Committee on Public Safety & Military Affairs presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 415-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2192, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred jointly to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce and the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2192, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES," passed Second Reading and was referred jointly to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce and the Committee on Judiciary, with Representative Kahikina being excused.

Representative Ito, for the Committee on Public Safety & Military Affairs presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 416-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2446, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2446, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Stonebraker rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I have reservations on this measure. This would allocate \$11 million from the Hurricane Relief Fund for increasing capacity at Queen's Medical Center. I appreciate Queen's Medical Center and I support what they're doing there, but my concerns have to do with the Hurricane Relief Fund."

Representative Moses rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, basically the same comments. I'm in opposition. In opposition, Mr. Speaker. This does take the money from the Hurricane Relief Fund. If we want to give it to a private hospital, do a grant-in-aid, do it out of the general fund. Don't use the Hurricane Relief Fund."

Representative Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. A no vote for the same reasons please."

Representative Finnegan rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I did have reservations on this and it's mainly before we get to the Hurricane Relief Fund part. Just doing it for one hospital kind of concerns me as well, so I'll be with reservations for now."

Representative Ching rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Meyer rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Reservations, Mr. Speaker. I note that the original bill was for \$11 million. Thank you."

Representative Halford rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Caldwell rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, a potential conflict. My wife serves on the Board of Queen's," and the Chair ruled "no conflict."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2446, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR INCREASING POWER GENERATING CAPACITY FOR THE QUEEN'S MEDICAL CENTER," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Moses and Thielen voting no, and with Representative Kahikina being excused.

Representative Ito, for the Committee on Public Safety & Military Affairs presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 417-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3121, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3121, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CIVIL DEFENSE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Kahikina being excused.

Representatives Takumi and Caldwell, for the Committee on Education and the Committee on Labor & Public Employment presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 418-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2552, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2552, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Kahikina being excused.

Representatives Takumi and Caldwell, for the Committee on Education and the Committee on Labor & Public Employment presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 419-06) recommending that H.B. No. 2962, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2962, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Kahikina being excused.

Representatives Takumi and Caldwell, for the Committee on Education and the Committee on Labor & Public Employment presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 420-06) recommending that H.B. No. 3098, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 3098, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHARTER SCHOOLS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Kahikina being excused.

Representative Waters, for the Committee on Higher Education presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 421-06) recommending that H.B. No. 1924, be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative M. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1924, be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Harbin rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I stand in complete support and in total excitement that we actually have something to help the local and small business community.

"On Opening Day, I was really pleased that you invited and had on the Floor, I think it was four or five budding, growing, small, young, small businesses. This is great. Small businesses employ over 98% of all our workers are employed by the small business community and so often because we're so busy working they get lost in the shuffle here at the Legislature.

"I am happy to see that we are attempting to support them and help them with development and training because being in business is a constant, constant not only battle, but a need to learn and modernize and grow. I encourage that we move this bill out and I encourage that we all support this. And I believe there's another bill that hopefully will make it to the Floor soon, which will be a complement to this, which will enable DBED to reach out and assist these businesses with their business and retention and expansion.

"So let's keep this moving. Let's support our business community because these are the backbones of our economy and they're going to be here if and when our economy starts to cool down. Thank you."

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I also have reservations on this measure. You heard some of the problems from my colleague. The main problem is of course you still have to dial with this measure and we can outlaw that too and then you can't use cell phones at all. But I have seen people right behind me on the freeway putting on makeup and we're not outlawing that.

"When I ask the police isn't there a law against distracted driving and they said only if you get in an accident and they can say that that's the cause. It should be the same thing with cell phones. If you're weaving and bobbing and you end up hitting a car and you get stopped then and they say you were using a cell phone. Okay, then that should be a penalty for you but to just outlaw it completely I think is not good. Thank you."

Representative Ching rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

"Members, this measure will be going to the Judiciary Committee also to look into the legal aspects of it."

Because in essence, we'll be losing a total between \$4 and \$5 million for that Fund. Thank you."
