### ORDER OF THE DAY

#### SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Morikawa, seconded by Representative Matsumoto and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering a certain House Bill for Third Reading by consent calendar. (Representative Ohno was excused.)

#### UNFINISHED BUSINESS

##### H.B. No. 1383, HD 2:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 1383, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Kitagawa rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matayoshi rose in opposition to the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matayoshi's written remarks are as follows:

"I am conflicted, though I am ultimately voting no at this time. There are certainly advantages to decriminalizing possession of small amounts of marijuana, replacing prison time with a fine. Our correctional facilities are overcrowded, and we gain little, if anything, by incarcerating people on minor offences relating to minor marijuana possession. Prison can turn minor offenders into hardened criminals, with no options when they are released. Incarceration also costs the taxpayers, when our schools and infrastructure are already woefully underfunded. We also must consider the lives affected by current statutes; a disproportionate number of Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders are being held in our correctional facilities. A minor marijuana possession charge can derail the life of a resident that can be a productive member of our society.

"That being said, the fine must be high enough to discourage the use of marijuana, which I still consider harmful to society when not used for medicinal purposes. I favor community service or rehabilitation programs over a monetary penalty, and I hope this bill will be revised as such. I have also received testimony from my district, all of which is against this bill, and note that all of our law enforcement agencies are similarly opposed. Ultimately, I would like more information on how this bill will affect Hawaii's citizens and how many criminal records only have marijuana possession of three grams or less marring them. If the benefits I listed above will not be accomplished by this bill, then we are loosening the reigns on marijuana for no reason."

Representative DeCoite rose in opposition to the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite's written remarks are as follows:

"In opposition. I oppose this bill because it's a safety issue. On one hand, we say that the Federal Government has jurisdiction over the state, however, now it is like we're making our own rules. My question is, do we have to change this every time we see fit?

"We are still dealing with the medical marijuana dispensaries, and while people may need it, we still have problems with testing. Every individual reacts differently to the product. I believe medicines belong in the pharmacies. If it is truly a medicine, then it should be covered by insurance.

"Our law enforcement people do not support decriminalization. We also have complaints from schools where kids are bringing it in and encouraging their peers to try it. It is accessible and way too easy to get by our kids. *Mahalo*."

Representative Johanson rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Eli rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, opposition and my comments now. I want to keep in the same spirit of continuity here, Mr. Speaker. The theme of my remarks are what some of us know as a very fond saying in a particular ethnic community, *kodomo no tame ni*, for the sake of the children, Mr. Speaker, I'm going to mention why I'm against this particular bill.

"The first reason is that decriminalization is *de facto*, if not *de jure*, legalization, and is the slippery slope we don't want to tread on. Mr. Speaker, the indication of all the past states that have gone this route, beginning with Seattle in 2003, Oakland 2004, Denver 2005, San Francisco 2006, Massachusetts 2008, Connecticut 2011, down 12 all the way down to New Hampshire in 2017. Of these 15 jurisdictions that I've noted, eight of them now have legalized recreational marijuana. Mr. Speaker, this is empirical evidence of the slippery slope that we're on.

"Now some have said, well, look we never intended to do recreational. Well, intentionality is certainly signaled by what we're doing here on the floor today. And 12 of those 15 states are now perched on that slippery slope for recreational marijuana.

"The fact is that decriminalization has quickly paved the way to legalization. And I quote the great prophet who used to be a part of this body, Marcus Oshiro, he said, if we do medical marijuana and have eight dispensaries, we will within three to five years do decrim and recreational. I know the good administrative law judge is not with us today, but his words will resound to those of who were on this floor when he did those very profound words for what now we are today faced with, the decriminalization.

"Decriminalization increases marijuana use, causes more traffic accidents, and causes the black market to thrive. Let me deconstruct that a bit. Mr. Speaker, without mentioning any names, somebody on the floor today, this morning on the television said that we want to crack down on DUIs, we want to get serious with DUIs. Well I ask, if you want to be serious with DUIs, how are we then now adding another drug to the body and the blood of those people who are driving to endanger more of the public? What side of our mouth are we speaking on?

"The bottom line is, Mr. Speaker, we have enough studies from Colorado and California to know that this is a dangerous public health hazard and a public safety hazard. Ask any of the Police Department who testified for this bill. They are totally convinced, because they see it up front and close, that this is not a good policy for the people of Hawaii.

"The good Representative, Speaker Emeritus tried to warn us Tuesday with an amendment to say, what do you do when one of your employees has a few tokens before he comes off the sidewalk and into the employer's place of work and then he causes somebody to die or injures himself and then the employer is held liable? That was the whole point of his, I think the legal term for you lawyers is *respondeat superior*, when there is the responsibility of the employer for all the acts of the employee. In this case it would be exempted if somebody comes in with their decriminalized marijuana and already in their bloodstream doing dangerous things. Can you imagine a school bus driver toking before he gets behind the wheel because he had a bad night with his spouse or something? And ask the chief of police on the Big Island if there are not more drug DUIs then there are alcohol DUIs, and this was a number of years ago he told me that.

"Lastly, Mr. Speaker, for the sake of our children, marijuana fries the brains of our *keiki* and drains the life force out of them. If you're young, it's going to fry your brains, and they have proof of that, physiologically. That the synapses that when you're 16 or below—"

Representative Say rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"I didn't realize that time has gone, I must be on something. Mr. Speaker, the point is this. Brains that are unfarmed when they're constantly exposed to THC, the one that's the psychogenic phenomenon chemical, the synapses don't get connected, and if they do they, I can only say they fry or they fizzle, like when bad connections spark. And I cite a 2018 study, rather recent, in the American Journal of Psychiatry that showed that marijuana use is more detrimental to the developing brains of teenagers than, and I underline, alcohol, Mr. Speaker.

"And something that is very clear that some people think is, well, we got to make it more accessible because somebody is going to ruin their federal career because they got a decrim, or they have a record and we don't want young people who are bright-eyed and bushy-tailed to have their reputation spoiled. Well, Mr. Speaker, I would predict on this floor today that eventually smoking marijuana is going to be like you get a traffic ticket, they're not going to count it. But in the meantime, the Federal Government has this a Schedule A drug. This bill goes contrary to the law of the land of this nation. So, somebody who wants to get a federal job, yeah probably it's going to hurt them. Otherwise, it's not going to matter whatsoever, like a traffic ticket does not matter.

"On the suicide issue, in terms of the study of 2018 that said, seven times more likely to commit suicide than those who are not regularly smoking marijuana. Mr. Speaker, we already have a suicide crisis. The other irony is, we have another bill in this House that says, we've got to have a suicide prevention hotline, as well as, there's a bill with a lot of money in it. We're going at cross purposes. It says, if you're young and you're smoking marijuana, seven times more likely to attempt suicide. So rather than a suicide crisis or intervention, let's just not start promoting marijuana. It's kind of a no brainer, Mr. Speaker.

"Having said what Marcus Oshiro of this body has said and what we see in the studies of Colorado and other places, we have arrived at those three to five years, Mr. Speaker. The bottom line is this. Evidence shows that decriminalizing marijuana is bad for our state, bad for our *keiki*, and a bad policy for this body to adopt. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, a very strong no. Thank you."

Representative Okimoto rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in strong opposition against House Bill 1383, HD2. I solicited the input of my community, and they are vehemently opposed to the decriminalization of marijuana. I've also received feedback from my schools indicating that marijuana use in Mililani is on the rise. This is a great concern to them. Statistically, statewide, marijuana use by public school students increases by 42% from sixth to twelfth grade. What kind of message does this send to our *keiki*? As a mother and an educator, I have strong concerns about the short- and long-term effects this would have on our children. Having two daughters of my own who attend public schools, play sports, and attended countless events in the community, I worry about how this bill would affect their lives and the lives many other *keiki* and residents in our state.

"Knowing what we know about the serious negative effects of secondhand cigarette smoke, how can we assume that this will not also be the case, if not worse, for secondhand marijuana smoke? Just as the Minority Leader mentioned, research shows that marijuana can affect a child's brain development and their short- and long-term memories, which in turn affects their cognitive levels and ability to function in and out of school. As an educator, I cannot see how we as a Legislature can allow that.

"We also have the responsibility, whether a parent or not, to ensure the safety of our *keiki*. By allowing the decriminalization of marijuana, we open

a Pandora's box of situations where their lives may be put at risk. Imagine someone driving under the influence of the drug, or an educator coming to work high on the drug, which actually happened in Mililani back in 2006. Would we as a legislative body be able to sleep at night knowing that we have allowed these types of unsafe events to occur, endangering the lives of our children, friends and family? I, for one, am not willing to take that chance. Not when it comes to the lives of my loved ones.

"Even putting all of that aside, the decriminalization of recreational marijuana still conflicts with federal law. By passing this law, we inadvertently burden our hard-working police officers with a moral and ethical decision to enforce state law over prevailing federal statutes.

"I strongly implore the members of this Legislature to take a step back and consider all the effects that the decriminalization of marijuana will have on our communities. I'm not willing to take that risk. For these reasons, I cannot support this bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative B. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise with slight reservations. Mr. Speaker, this bill involves the decriminalization of possession of three grams or less of marijuana. I would note that three grams is about the weight of a penny. Today's penny, made mostly out of zinc, is approximately 2.5 grams. The old penny, the copper penny, used to be 3.11 grams. So, this decriminalization involves the weight of marijuana equivalent to, approximately, a penny. This is a tiny, half step decriminalization.

"I would note further that this is not legalization. There are 13 other states that have taken larger steps toward decriminalization. Also, I would note that the selling of any amount of marijuana is still a crime. Further, that the definition for hazardous and detrimental drug has not been changed in this HD 2, as it was in the prior draft.

"And lastly, I would note that marijuana is recognized as a cause of addiction. It does lead to bad behavior and it does, if used regularly, permanently alter brain functioning. So, this bill does recognize in part that marijuana does have detrimental effects, but it does go a very small, half step toward decriminalization, and for those reasons I am in support with some reservations. Thank you."

Representative Todd rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in support. I really hate when people quote other people in speeches, I think it's really tacky, but I thought this was appropriate, so ignore that for now. So, this speaker said, like that of millions of other Americans, my thinking has evolved as I've learned more about this issue. I decided to get involved because of the struggles of our country's veterans and the opioid epidemic, after learning how descheduling the drug can potentially help with both crises. Of course, these were the famous words of John Boehner, who once said several years ago while he was in leadership in Congress that he was unalterably opposed to decriminalizing marijuana. But now that there is profit to be made, a change of heart, perhaps.

"Beyond that, I just wanted to say that virtually every argument made here today in opposition to this legislation could easily be applied to alcohol, and we've already seen that prohibition does not work for alcohol, it's not currently working for marijuana. I think this is a very reasonable step in the right direction. I think the last thing we want to do, I think, you know I'm a high school coach, and I'm under no illusions that probably all of my players, probably nearly everyone in the public school system and the private school system here is at least experimenting with marijuana, and I think it's kind of ridiculous to move forward with policy that would criminalize those actions when this is relatively commonplace. Thank you."

Representative Takayama rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. Mr. Speaker, I think we can agree that we do not wish to glorify the use of marijuana, nor encourage the use of cannabis by young people. But I hope we can also agree that punishing people caught with possessing small amounts, very small amounts of cannabis, by putting

them in jail is neither advancing public safety nor the best use of our correctional justice system.

"In 2017, Mr. Speaker, the LRB conducted a study of the impact of our drug laws, and one of the things it looked at was it examined how people were punished, those caught possessing small amounts of marijuana. Current law is that's a crime of promoting a detrimental drug in the third degree, petty misdemeanor punishable by up to 30 days in jail. The LRB study found that in one year there were 397 arrests, 209 court appearances, 108 convictions, and 69 persons incarcerated in jail for this offense. And bear in mind that this is the offense of possessing one ounce or less of cannabis. The proposal before us would decriminalize, as the previous speaker from Kapahulu mentioned, three grams, which is not an ounce, not even half an ounce, it's 1/10 of an ounce of cannabis. So, for those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I ask my fellow members to support this measure. Thank you."

Representative Wildberger rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Standing in support of this measure. My community sent me here to help destigmatize adult-use cannabis. We're not obviously ready to go there yet, but it's an inevitable path. I'd like to insert the words as my own from my colleague from Hilo. *Mahalo*," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Matsumoto rose in opposition to the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. At this time, I rise in opposition. My fear is that this bill has unintended consequences far beyond merely decriminalizing certain offenses related to cannabis and is not, in fact, in the best interests of the State or the constituents we represent.

"Decriminalization of these offenses limits the court's ability to provide services to members of our community who are struggling with addiction. By removing criminal penalties for these violations, our state courts will no longer have the authority to judicially supervise offenders. Court ordered counseling or intervention services will no longer be an option in these cases.

"This is concerning particularly as it relates to younger, first time offenders. Research compiled by the National Institute of Health suggests that cannabis use is likely to precede use and abuse of other licit and illicit substances that ultimately lead to the development of more serious addictions later in life.

"This measure would eliminate the court's ability to intervene early in the cycle of addiction and thus have a deleterious impact on the most vulnerable among us, our youth.

"I fear that HB 1383 will have other unintended consequences by placing a heavier burden on our already strained judicial system.

"This bill, as written, would allow those charged with certain cannabis-related offenses occurring prior to the effective date of this legislation to apply to the court for an order of dismissal.

"This bill, as written, would require the court to consider expungement petitions for criminal convictions related to cannabis, regardless of how old the conviction might be.

"These provisions would, without doubt, create significant delays and backlogs to a judicial system that is already pushed to capacity.

"Unintended consequences, Mr. Speaker.

"Because this bill would decriminalize the possession of three grams of cannabis or less and makes possession of these amounts punishable by fines only, offenders fitting this category cannot be adequately supervised by the

courts, and thus would never be required to go through drug treatment programs that offenders may sorely need.

"Furthermore, offenders who cannot afford to pay the fines imposed would likely not be required to do so. For those offenders who can afford to pay the fine but fail to do so, the State must resort to civil process for collection. Therefore, there is no impetus for the offender to pay, as the language of the bill states the State 'may' impose fines as opposed to 'shall' or 'must.'

"As a body, we have been working to strengthen our laws, particularly in light of the recent incidents including that of the case of the impaired driver who struck and took the lives of three individuals.

"This bill, Mr. Speaker, opens the door to access and makes obtaining cannabis much less difficult. Thus, while we express our desire to tighten up our DUI laws, we're making it easier for people to obtain intoxicating substances.

"Finally, the finite resources of our judiciary, particularly as it relates to retroactive expungements for certain violations, will be significantly and irrevocably constrained, and I fear that public safety will suffer as a result.

"I am opposed to this bill and believe we need to re-evaluate our approach to this issue. The potential negative impacts for both the individuals and the communities we serve is too great to ignore.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just wanted to say a few words in strong support, Mr. Speaker. I think this is one of those issues that inevitably ends up in our lap and we have responsibility to take on. And I want to really thank everybody from the community and our stakeholders from all sides who've weighed in on this important issue, because we couldn't have this debate we're having here today without hearing from our communities.

"And one of the things that we've heard loud and clear is that, for generations before us, marijuana has been something that has been widely available in our communities, whether we like to acknowledge that or not. The question, as policy makers, is what we do in response to that. How do we treat it, how do we treat people, how do we build a better community based on the facts before us and not a political or emotional or any other response that we might have? And in that debate, when we look at the facts, when we look at the data, we discover that the systems that we've had in place, long before any of us have been here, have not been working.

"I think it was alluded to by one of our previous speakers that, like prohibition, like our war on drugs, nationally, our policies have not been working to deter substance abuse, drug use, to empower people to build better lives and restore their sense of self-worth, to invest in their own education, jobs and the like. That's, I think, the discussion that this bill starts to move forward with.

"Mr. Speaker, what this bill is not is a legalization bill. And I respect our colleagues who've spoken in opposition from the minority, but what I've not heard is data relevant to decriminalization. I've heard a lot of anecdotal speak about legalization. That is not what this bill is, and I want that to be clear.

"Mr. Speaker, when we talk about decriminalization and when we talk about the experience that other states have had, many who've already taken this step and then some, what we find when we look at the analysis, the analysis that our good Public Safety Chair had referenced, which was a comprehensive look at what all the other states are doing, we find that, and I quote, the decriminalization of small amounts of marijuana does not appear to have led to major increases in the consumption of marijuana. And it goes on to list a whole bunch of other things.

"But suffice it to say this, we know that we can do better. And for us, we know that the way that our system currently responds to these challenges when someone is caught with marijuana, is to charge them with a criminal

offense, to put them in jail, to put a permanent mark on their record. Which, when you talk with people who've come in to testify, who've called some of our offices, saying, you know what, when I was a kid, when I was in high school, when I was in college, as an adult, I was caught and I have this permanent mark on my record which has prevented me from getting loans for college, from qualifying for jobs that I might otherwise pursue, from doing all the things that I want to do to contribute to society in a meaningful and positive way.

"Our policies are perverse, they are inverse and backward, we ought to be helping people, not punishing them in a way that destroys lives and limits potential. So, Mr. Speaker, what we need to do is to stop destroying those lives. What we need to do is not sending people to jail where they're mixing with a whole bunch of other people who've done some real serious crimes, and ultimately at the end of the day we're creating more hardened criminals. That is not the kind of thing that I think we want.

"And Mr. Speaker, when we talk about jails especially, and I think there's been a lot of talk about that recently, we have an obligation to build a criminal justice system that works, that we can afford. And it's our responsibility as stewards of taxpayers' dollars to make sure that we're spending those resources appropriately, and not just building more jails, spending hundreds of millions of dollars at a time to house people for offenses that just don't make sense.

"Mr. Speaker, what this bill actually does is not legalize marijuana, it decriminalizes three grams or less, which is minute. By far and away, we are the smallest threshold state, if we were to pass this in law, of any state throughout the United States. The next legalized, decriminalized threshold is 10 grams."

Representative McKelvey rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lee continued, stating:

"Thank you. The average is actually an ounce. And on top of that, not only do we have the lowest threshold, the most conservative threshold, that we're moving forward within this bill, Mr. Speaker, but the fines associated are among the highest. The lowest fines throughout the country are \$25, \$25 in many cases for up to an ounce. Mr. Speaker, here we're not only going less than an ounce, we're going three grams and the fine is \$200, eight times that. The average across the country is \$100. So we're taking this far more seriously and far more conservatively than virtually any other state, including states that have moved forward with this and found actually even better results than they imagined. Which is, I imagine, what we're going to find here.

"Mr. Speaker, if you actually read the bill, if you actually read what this does, what we find is that we have an opportunity here to fix all these problems that I've mentioned before when it comes to criminal justice, when it comes to opportunity, when it comes to taxpayer dollar investment in facilities. So, if we want, ultimately, to improve lives and give people that opportunity, we have to stop putting permanent marks on their record for things which just don't make sense. If we want to actually reduce crime, we have to stop sending people to jail and letting them become hardened criminals and adding to our problem.

"And Mr. Speaker, most of all, if we want to reduce substance abuse and drug use, not only for marijuana, but for everything else, we have to think about how we can spend our dollars better. And in this case, we're spending \$146 a day to put someone in jail. That money can be better spent, \$146 a day treating people for alternatives that actually work. And that is what this bill, Mr. Speaker, is all about.

"So, with that, Mr. Speaker, I just thank you and thank all the stakeholders who've worked on this bill from our community for their efforts thus far. Thank you very much."

At 12:46 o'clock p.m., Representative Belatti requested a recess and the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:50 o'clock p.m.

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. It's not a specific rebuttal but a generic conceptual framework. If you listen to everybody, Mr. Speaker, who has spoken for the bill, they're at the micro individual personal smoker's point of view. My perspective is from the greater societal point of view, the macro, if you will. Who America is. What it does in the world with its economy, with its health, with its education.

"And from the point of view of the micro, the individual, yes, I mean, we don't want to hurt these people, but we have a greater cause in our society and who we are as a people to progress as the leaders of the world. And for people kicking back and just smoking our dope is not going to make it, Mr. Speaker. That's my point. And this is going to lead to other things. We've got enough opioid crisis, We've got enough things that we have to do with DHS and people who are in poverty. This is only going to complicate that.

"The world is a dangerous place. We have to be strong, Mr. Speaker. This weakens us. In terms of public safety and the macro of who we are as a people and a society, we have to think of that too. And I, again, I sympathize with those individuals who are going to have a mark, but as I said earlier, later it's going to be like you get a parking ticket when you're caught smoking. So, we're taking this too serious at the micro level and missing the macro at the greater societal level. That was basically the point. Not a rebuttal of any individual, but just to characterize this, it's a bigger issue than what we've got here on the policy. Thank you."

Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising in support of the bill, Mr. Speaker, as an independent Republican. There is such a thing, fellow members. If we talk about the greater societal genre out there, we would look at the 78% to 82% of the people that are saying, just decriminalize it and make it legal. Let us be the deciding people who are going to decide whether or not we want to imbibe.

"As a disclosure, in the '70s, yes, I tried it, and no, I didn't like it. So, that was the end of that. But could have been, I could have been nailed with a criminal conviction. That's the thing that we're doing today, is we're saying it's not criminal if you have three ounces of cannabis, and that's a very good step to take.

"I have two improvements to bill, Mr. Speaker. The first is, let's stop using the racist term in our state law. 'Marijuana' came out of the '30s, and it was aimed at Mexicans, with a great deal of fear and hatred. 'Marijuana' is not scientific, there's nothing scientific about it, it's just flatly racist. So, let's go back to 'cannabis.' And once we move the discussion into a scientific area and we call it 'cannabis,' it becomes less scary. 'Marijuana' was meant to scare you. It was meant to have you be afraid. It's not the word we should be using.

"The other recommendation I would make, and I guess it may be for next year or maybe years afterward, I think we ought to free the plant. And I think we ought to listen to what the vast majority of the public is saying, leave it up to us. Some people would choose that as a way to relax after work instead of kicking back a six-pack of beer or slugging whiskey or some other hard liquor that we know can impair people's judgement, we know that that can lead to bad things and addiction. I think that the worst thing that you could have from someone relaxing at night and smoking cannabis is maybe laughter and a little bit of munchies. So, let's stop being afraid, and let's change the term. Cannabis. Thank you."

Representative Tokioka rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. And after all this great debate on the floor, I'd like to call for the question. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At this time, Representative Tokioka called for the previous question.

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Short comments in support, Mr. Speaker. Thank you very much, I'll try to keep this very brief. In support. In the 1960s, heroin devastated the United

States. In the 1970s, cocaine hit our country. In the 1980s, crack cocaine devastated our inner cities and was connected to a single race. By the early 2000s, crystal meth devastated America and hit Hawaii extremely hard. In 2010, opioids devastated our people, claiming thousands of lives. Today, fentanyl is the new killer.

"What does this relate to in this bill? It's to address one commonality in all the drugs that I just stated, whether it's alcohol, tobacco, or the drugs I just listed. It's addiction. We need to focus our efforts on addiction. I look at this bill as a way to address addiction. This bill can really focus on rehabilitation, and not incarceration. We need to build school houses, and not jail houses. So, for those reasons, if we can continue to move this bill smartly and with the proper safeguards, I'm going to continue to stay in support. So, I'm up on this bill, thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ichiyama rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Takayama be entered into the Journal as her own, and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ichiyama's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support of HB 1383, as amended. I had serious reservations about this measure as it moved through the House and came to the floor. I am grateful for the amendments made by the House Judiciary Chair as they significantly narrowed the scope and effect of the bill. Instead of decriminalizing possession of any amount of marijuana, we are now looking at only three grams (roughly the weight of a penny). Also, the bill contains a defective date, which means it will come back to the House for final consideration and vote. I will continue to carefully consider the input of my community as this bill moves through the legislative process.

"Finally, I would note that this bill is NOT about legalization of marijuana. Even if this bill passes, the use, possession, distribution or sale of marijuana will still be a crime, except for medical purposes. I do not support legalization of marijuana and would oppose any efforts to permit recreational use in Hawaii. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1383, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MARIJUANA," passed Third Reading by a vote of 34 ayes to 16 noes, with Representatives Johanson and B. Kobayashi voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Aquino, Cachola, Cullen, DeCoite, Eli, Har, Kitagawa, Kong, Matayoshi, Matsumoto, McDermott, Okimoto, Say, Tokioka, Ward and Yamane voting no, and with Representative Ohno being excused.
