FIRST DAY

Wednesday, January 19, 2022

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGES

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, H.R. No. 1 was adopted.

No. 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RELATING TO RECESS DAYS FOR THE REGULAR SESSION OF 2022," resolving that the dates of the mandatory recess for the Regular Session of 2022 are hereby determined to be the 24th, 25th, and 28th days of February and 1st and 2nd days of March, on which dates the Regular Session of 2022 shall be recessed; and the dates of the recesses other than the dates of the mandatory recess for the Regular Session of 2022 are hereby

determined to be the 25th and 27th days of January, the 7th and 9th days of March, the 11th, 13th, and 27th days of April, and the 2nd and 4th days of May, on which dates the Regular Session of 2022 shall be recessed, was jointly offered by Representatives Saiki and Mizuno.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Okimoto and carried, H.C.R. No. 1 was adopted.

H.C.R. No. 2, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE GOVERNOR TO ADDRESS THE LEGISLATURE CONCERNING THE AFFAIRS OF THE STATE," resolving that the Governor of Hawaii is requested to address the Legislature pursuant to article V, section 5 of the Hawaii State Constitution at 10:00 a.m. on Monday, January 24, 2022; and that the Governor is requested to deliver the address to the Legislature remotely from the Executive Chambers, was jointly offered by Representatives Saiki and Mizuno.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Okimoto and carried, H.C.R. No. 2 was adopted.

At this time, the Speaker delivered his address, stating:

"Members, the Chair has some brief remarks. The title of this speech is Justice. Justice. So, I wanted to just start off by saying that over the past two years, Hawaii has worked together to overcome great challenges. It is a reflection of the public's resilience and sense of community. But it is also a reflection of your work here in the Legislature and in your neighborhoods.

"I know that the past seven months have not been easy for you and your constituents. Just when we thought the pandemic was over, the surge overcame all of us. I know that you have worked in your communities to vaccinate and test thousands and thousands of people.

"On September 17, 1959, one month after statehood, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. visited Hawaii and spoke here in the House of Representatives. He spoke of his work in other states and recognized Hawaii as a noble example in the area of racial harmony and racial justice. It has been 62 years since that speech. And as you know, Dr. King's teachings extended beyond race and included economic and environmental justice. It is time to reassess Dr. King's observation about Hawaii and to articulate what we can do to advance his call for justice.

"In January 2020, we were prepared to enact a proposal that would have increased the minimum wage and provided more tax relief to working families. This proposal followed a report conducted by the Aloha United Way that found that 47% of Hawaii's families were financially distressed and simply could not make it here. But six weeks later, the legislative session was suspended when the state was shut down and we were forced to defer action on our ambitious agenda.

"Since that time, I stated publicly that the House would revisit a wage proposal when conditions improved. Well, conditions have improved, and it is now time for us to act. Through the work of Representatives Onishi and Sayama, the House will advance legislation to increase the hourly minimum wage to \$18, increase the food tax credit, and make the earned income tax credit refundable and permanent. This package will give a family an additional \$33,600 in income.

"But we know that wages alone will not lift working families. Families cannot afford housing and need help. And regrettably, the demographic group that has been hardest hit and most priced out of housing is Native Hawaiians. We will appropriate \$600 million to enable beneficiaries of the Hawaiian Home Lands trust to acquire their own homes. Through Representative Holt and Representative Eli, who is the only Hawaiian Home Lands beneficiary in the House, the Hawaii Affairs Caucus will play a leading role on this historic piece of legislation. Members, it is time to give the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands the resources it needs to fulfill its fiduciary duty.

"Cultural justice requires the restoration of cultural practices. The House will expand community-based efforts to restore fish ponds and lo'i, repatriate cultural artifacts, teach financial literacy, and provide cultural training to the military. Related to this is the issue of tourism management. We need to take action now before our visitor count again reaches 10 million people. We need to better incorporate culture into tourism because by doing

so, this will also protect our natural resources. We will do this by relying on initiatives and organizations that can assist the Hawaii Tourism Authority.

"Last year, the House created a working group to propose a new governance structure for Mauna Kea. Through the work of Representatives Nakashima, Tarnas, Cullen, and Eli, and 11 community members, the House will advance a proposal that will create a management structure that will care for Mauna Kea above the 6,500-foot elevation line through an integrated, culturally, and environmentally conscious approach.

"When it comes to the environment, just two words exemplify the need for environmental justice: Red Hill. In December, the House called for the defueling and decommissioning of Red Hill. We will reiterate that call for action. The House will not allow the military to put the aquifer that supplies water to all of Oahu's residents at risk. Representatives Yamane, Lowen, Tarnas, Ohno, Ichiyama, Johanson, Ganaden, and Matsumoto began work a few weeks ago to monitor state and military progress on Red Hill. We will continue that work through the formation of a special committee on Red Hill. Its emphasis will be the containment, remediation, and prevention of contamination. And we will continue to insist that the federal government must be responsible for Red Hill costs. State taxpayers should not be asked to pay for this cleanup.

"So, members, this year, the House is proposing unprecedented legislation that, taken together, will help over 100,000 households, provide homes, and restore cultural practices that ordinary people have fought for and even died for throughout their lives. As I've said before, the House of Representatives is a leader on policy. We must continue to be that force for needed change. Like Dr. King, we cannot hesitate to institute reform so that we can achieve justice. Thank you very much and have a productive session."

The Chair then recognized Representative Okimoto, the Minority Leader, to deliver remarks on behalf of the Minority Caucus:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Majority Leader Belatti, friends, colleagues, and members of the public who are watching online, good morning and *aloha*. This is the first time I've had the privilege of standing before you and addressing you on Opening Day as the representative from District 36 and now as the minority leader.

"My staff knows all too well how difficult these speeches can be for me. The difficulty comes when I reflect on the last four years and how much I want to include in these moments. I remember how different my first session was and how hopeful I was. I had so much to say back then, and now there is too much to say. Over the last two years, the challenges have been extraordinary, but so have our communities and our people.

"First and foremost, I want to say thank you, thank you to our people and to their unwavering spirit. They have fought to lead Hawaii's comeback and recovery from the pandemic. They have made great sacrifices to keep their children educated and in school, change their business models to fit a post-COVID world, and tolerated and adapted to ever-changing mandates and regulations.

"Today, the Legislature opens to a state that needs our leadership more than ever to fight as hard as they have to ensure our future for our children. I am confident that this body is ready for the challenges. And this is why, during one of the most economic downturns in Hawaii history, our Finance Committee moved at an incredible pace to pave the way for our economic recovery, ensure crucial funding during interim, all while still crafting a balanced budget that reflects the values that this state believes in.

"While Finance was doing their diligence with the state budget, our committees on Water & Land and Energy & Environmental Protection make crucial strides towards protecting the critical resources that our state is so beloved for. I mentioned this not to boast of great victories, but because we convene today, not under the shadow of a prolonged period hardship, but under the light of resilience and responsibility, a shared responsibility each of us has to make. That the tragedies we have all gone through are hard life lessons that must be applied to solutions and not just headlines.

"On January 9th, 1790, long before these beautiful islands became a state, George Washington penned a letter to writer and historian Catharine Macaulay that included the sentence, 'The establishment of our new

Government seemed to be the last great experiment, for promoting human happiness, by reasonable compact, in civil Society.'

"Through that great experiment, there are many who believe that the experiment has failed. They couldn't be more wrong. They let perfection, or rather their idea of perfection, be the enemy of good. This state isn't perfect, and it will never be. And that is the beauty of it. It can be ever changing, it can adapt and overcome.

"We carry that mantle today in these halls that are constructed to represent that belief of a more perfect union, because the pursuit of happiness is both noble and necessary. Our constituents sent us so we could prove those words right, even in the face of seemingly insurmountable challenges and unfathomable loss.

"Although our state, like the entire country, feels more divided than ever, I have never seen our islands, our people, as united in their vision for their future. We have so much more in common than what divides us, and we feel that the most when we are at home. Whether home is a rental apartment in town, a family ranch nestled in the green rolling hills of Waimea, *nani o Waimea ē*, or a house that exists in a price range you can afford. Every Hawaiian wants and deserves many of the same things. A safe, reliable place to lay your head to rest. A stable income that allows you to provide for yourself and your family. A life free from violence and discrimination. The sad reality is that far too many Hawaiians have been left behind, and ultimately we are here to change that, to do our part in making sure every person is able to achieve the life and future they envisioned for themselves and their families, to help protect their pursuit of happiness. Therefore, I am really excited for Speaker Saiki's announcement today.

"It has been somewhat cliché for the minority leader to declare on opening day that this upcoming session will be the most consequential in history. That declaration has never felt more appropriate. As we begin the 2022 Legislative Session, with the public left outside government transparency, this has never been more important as we begin to shape Hawaii's future.

"The public's absence in these halls cannot go understated. We are opposed, nay, we must make transformational changes to drastically increase the supply of affordable housing, to expand our workforce, to invest in responsible development, and to stabilize our behavioral health system that has been struggling to help our most vulnerable, and to finally get ahold on the mental health epidemic that plagues our homeless population.

"We will be talking about how to best invest in our most important asset, our children, to make sure they have the education, training, and support that their futures need. We must support small businesses, grow our state's economy, and make sure that our recovery continues to lift up all Hawaii. How can we possibly do that without our people?

"One of the most important lessons I have learned as a legislator is to make the most of every opportunity because a second chance is never guaranteed, and tomorrow is never promised. Each of us will eventually walk out of this chamber for a final time, and once we've said goodbye, our legacy won't be measured by the titles we collect or the size of our office. Our legacy will be measured by all the ways that our people will feel from the choices we make for years to come and the ways they experience what we do with this opportunity to be public servants.

"It is the Hawaiian *'ohana* that was able to pull themselves from the brink of homelessness and keep a roof over their heads because we choose to invest in affordable housing. It is the small business owner who keeps their doors open and their employees on the payroll because we created problems that help them weather tough times. It is the young men and women who start to put future as a priority that they can achieve because we work together today to ensure that they have opportunities our parents wanted for us. It is the combat veteran who comes home from deployment and is able to enjoy the freedoms they fought to protect because we fought for them in the Capitol. It is the girl who grew up next to cane fields and blue oceans who ensures that anything is possible and that she will never be Hawaii's last.

"Our legacy will be measured not by whether or not we resolved all our problems in 60 days, but by how we use 60 days to relentlessly pursue a more perfect union.

"This session, especially as the demands of legislating puts us to the test, we cannot lose sight of the fact that Hawaii's future gets brighter when we confront our challenges with the relentless optimism that better is possible, but better will only be possible if we can be honest with ourselves, to admit shortcomings, and to fix the mistakes we've made. We have to choose if we are going to do this in our best interest or the best interest of the people. Let's make that choice together.

"Before I close, and for you all from my soapbox, I want to close by expressing my gratitude. We would not be here today if it were not for the first responders, the doctors, nurses, law enforcement, EMS professionals, and so many more who have made it their mission to help keep Hawaii safe and healthy. We are indebted to them for their service.

"I want to publicly thank my two girls, Rebekah and Emma, for their love and support. I am also grateful for my parents, my friends and loved ones, and to District 36. Thank you for putting your trust in me to represent our community. Majority Leader Belatti and Speaker Saiki, thank you for your collaboration and your commitment to service. I look forward to continuing our work together in leadership. Friends, colleagues, I am with you, let's get to work. *Mahalo.*"

The Chair then recognized Representative Belatti, the Majority Leader, to deliver remarks on behalf of the Majority Caucus:

"Thank you Mr. Speaker, Mr. Vice Speaker, House Minority Leader Okimoto, to all the members of the House of Representatives, and our hardworking staff for this opportunity to address you, and more importantly, to address the people of Hawaii on this auspicious moment. To all of you who are viewing this from your work computer, from home, from school, on your mobile devices, thank you for tuning in to be a part of this day, even though we are not able to welcome you here in person.

"It is hard to believe that we are heading into the third year of this global pandemic. It has disrupted lives, workplaces, and homes. Economic disruption, uncertainty, and pivoting has become the norm.

"One of the biggest highlights and takeaways for me about this pandemic has been how you, the people of Hawaii, have come together as communities across our state to help each other navigate through this storm. I'm going to do something that I shouldn't do, I'm going to mention some agencies, and I know I will have left out some organizations. But as we planned for this moment a month and a half ago, I imagined this room filled with representatives from the community, from places like the Hawaii Community Foundation, Aloha United Way, Council for Native Hawaiian Advancement, Hope Services Hawaii, Catholic Charities Hawaii, Maui Economic Opportunity, Kauai Economic Opportunity, Hawaii Food Bank, all of these rooms filled with people and communities that have helped us weather through this storm.

"We know that navigating this time has not been easy. We are not naive in thinking that this pandemic has treated people equally. We understand and know that inequities that existed previously have only been exacerbated. Today, our Speaker has laid out an ambitious agenda to address these inequities, these inequalities, and to march towards justice.

"We, the Hawaii House of Representatives, are committed to tackling these long standing issues, to reinvest in our communities, to ensure that we have the infrastructure, the social service programs, the schools and the teachers that will build the capacity of our people, our greatest asset. We are here to recommit to our hardworking families and individuals who make our government, businesses, and communities run.

"I'd like to share a little something with you. We have a lot of organizations that bring us ideas and thoughts and agendas and their priorities. But I want to point out one group, Aina Aloha Economic Futures, you can find it at ainaahoeconomicfutures.com. This group did a presentation to the Speaker's COVID committee over a year ago. They gathered thousands of people before this day, before this opening day, and they said, these are the things we need to do. We need to achieve circular economies that prioritize environmental and climate resilience. We need to encourage the development of regenerative business opportunities, including working with all tourism and communities to develop regenerative tourism. We need to address and empower historically marginalized and disempowered populations to advance economic equity.

"We join today with the thousands who have already come together to commit to these things. We will take the next 60 legislative days. There will be ups and downs. There will be discussions, there will be caucuses, there will be hearing and testimonies. And we welcome, we welcome all of you to come and participate. And we will revisit the reopening of our State Capitol. We will revisit the reopening of the people's House. Because it is in person, it is together, and now it is virtually how we can commit to each other. Mr. Speaker, to the House of Representatives, thank you for this opportunity and I look forward to the work of the next 60 days. *Aloha*."

Representative Ward: "Mr. Speaker, my announcement today is to mark this day as a historical day in the history of the people of Hawaii. I'm not referring to 1959, when Martin Luther King was noted, but from 1920 when the Hawaiian Homes Commission was founded. And Mr. Speaker, what came out today, I think is going to be a new day for the people of Hawaii, particularly the Hawaiian community that's on the waitlist that is now 28,000 people strong. Thank you for what you're doing. And I urge all of my colleagues to get behind, to keep the word to the Hawaiian community, which after 100 years has been lacking.

"So, thank you, Mr. Speaker. *Mahalo*. This is a day that's going to go down in history as marking a turning point for 100 years of neglect to facing it straight on. Genuinely, thank you. And for the Chair of Finance, thank you. And for all of us, this is a day that we could really fulfill a promise that we've given, but we've broken, and now we're going to turn the tide. So, *mahalo nui loa*."

Representative Kong: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As many know, my office manager, Crystal Kionia, is a Tongan. And it just so happens now my legislative aide, Yehenara Soukop, is also Tongan. In fact, she's the reigning Miss Tonga of Hawaii. And it just so happens, these leis, these beautiful leis that adorn my neck, are also Tongan. So, I ask this body to truly remember Tonga and their people in your hearts and especially in your prayers as we await to hear news from that beautiful, lovely island nation. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"Please note that the Governor's State of the State address will be at 10:00 a.m. this morning. The State of the State address will be available for members and the public to view on the House YouTube channel.

"Also, members, please note that the House will stand in recess for the purpose of the State of the State address and tomorrow is a recess day, we will reconvene on Wednesday, January 26th at noon."

RECESS

At 9:07 a.m., the Chair declared a recess and the House of Representatives stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair, and in accordance with House Concurrent Resolution No. 2 met in Joint Session with the Senate to receive the Governor's State of the State address.

JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the House of Representatives and the Senate of the Thirty-First Legislature, Regular Session of 2022, was called to order at 10:01 a.m. by the Honorable Scott K. Saiki, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

The Speaker then stated:

"The Senate President and I extend our warmest *aloha* and welcome to the Governor of the State of Hawaii, the Honorable David Ige."

The Governor then addressed the Joint Session as follows:

"Good morning and *aloha*. Before I begin my formal remarks, I wanted to make a few comments. In normal times we would gather together in the House Chambers for the State of the State address. We would have family, friends, former governors, and community leaders, and have opportunities to acknowledge and thank the many people who have helped us along the way.

"Because of the pandemic, they cannot be here in person. But I wanted to take a moment to express my appreciation for their partnership during this crisis. All of them have answered the call to serve the people of Hawaii. Speaker Scott Saiki, Chair Sylvia Luke, and all the members of the House. Senate President Ron Kouchi, Chair Donovan Dela Cruz, and all the members of the Senate. First Lady Dawn Amano Ige, Lt. Governor Josh Green, Dr. Libby Char, and all the members of my cabinet. And Mayors Rick Blangiardi, Mitch Roth, Mike Victorino, and Derek Kawakami, and former Mayors Kirk Caldwell and Harry Kim.

"I also want to thank the business community; the visitor industry, including hotels, airlines, and attractions; the Hawaii Restaurant Association; the Hawaii Business Roundtable; and all the chambers of

commerce; and our nonprofit partners who delivered help and services to support so many in need. And there are so many others, too many to name, but I wish I could thank you all. Please know that all of your efforts are very much appreciated by me.

"We've endured tremendous hardship over the last two years. Throughout the pandemic, we've sacrificed, delayed, or canceled so many of life's cherished milestones – weddings and graduations, first birthdays, and holiday gatherings.

"We've had to face shutdowns, restrictions of all kinds, and two variants that have changed how we deal with the coronavirus. And the fight is far from over. But I'm proud of the way that we, as a community, have responded to the pandemic.

"Our nurses, doctors, and healthcare professionals have worked endless shifts to provide quality care and keep our families healthy. Our teachers and principals have gone above and beyond to make sure students have the opportunity to learn despite the many challenges. Our public employees on both the county and state levels have worked together to ensure that we keep everyone safe. And you have done what you've had to do to protect all of us, by getting vaccinated and conducting your daily lives responsibly.

"This pandemic is re-defining us as a generation in the same way that the Great Depression, Pearl Harbor, and the Vietnam War shaped their generations. Events and history have a way of repeatedly testing us. Each generation must find its own strengths, its own answers, and its own path forward.

"In many instances, we've had to choose between what is best for ourselves as individuals and what is best for us as a community. As a state, we've never been one to take the easy path. Instead, we choose to do the right things for the right reasons.

"Last week, we celebrated Martin Luther King Day. He said, the time is always right to do what's right. In Hawaii, we have a name for this, *pono* or righteousness. An idea so important that it's imprinted on our state seal, *Ua Mau ke Ea o ka 'Āina i ka Pono*. The life of the land is perpetuated in righteousness.

"We have much to do this session. I have three goals this year. To continue to steer us through the pandemic, to strengthen our families and communities, and to move toward full economic recovery. With your help, I know we can accomplish all three.

"I believe everything begins with keeping us healthy and safe. Over the last seven years, we focused on modernizing our telehealth infrastructure, providing health services to underserved populations, and strengthening mental health services.

"In response to the pandemic, we moved quickly to take immediate action to protect our health; provide healthcare for another 110,000 residents under our Medicaid program, a 34% increase since the start of the pandemic; and make sure that everyone had good healthcare coverage.

"At the same time, we distributed critical medical supplies, including PPEs, test kits, vaccines, and medicines to protect the elderly, rural communities, as well as the entire state. I deeply appreciate the thousands involved in this task, whose scale and complexity rivals anything we've ever done statewide.

"Vaccinations have proven to be our strongest weapon against the coronavirus. In all, we've provided more than 2,500,000 shots at hundreds of clinics across the state. Needless to say, this effort remains ongoing.

"But the virus has been relentless in exposing gaps in our healthcare infrastructure, including critical shortages of doctors and nurses. To address these concerns, we're asking the Legislature to fund the expansion of the University of Hawaii's doctor residency program. In this way, we can increase the number of doctors doing their residency on the neighbor islands from only five to fifty. More importantly, the numbers tell us that most young doctors end up practicing where they do their residency.

"We're also asking for funding to strengthen the university's nursing program and add more clinical instructors at our community colleges. We

want to add 39 lecturers across multiple campuses to handle the increased demand for nursing programs.

"In addition, a new \$3.7 million federally funded project will improve access to health information, especially for underserved communities. The project will train and employ high school and undergraduate students to be health and digital navigators in 50 libraries across the state. These navigators will help individuals access telehealth services and find information on the coronavirus and other health topics.

"COVID outbreaks in Oahu Community Correctional Center made it clear that we also need to strengthen the medical facilities in our prisons to protect the health of our inmates, staff, and the general public. Our plans to relocate OCCC to Halawa will create a modern facility better suited to support the behavioral, mental health, and medical needs of its population. In our current budget request, we've also asked the Legislature for \$45 million to build a consolidated healthcare unit at Halawa that will allow us to deliver medical and health services there.

"Clearly, the coronavirus has shown us how persistent and adaptive it can be, as we've seen with the Delta and Omicron variants. Even as we learn how to better protect ourselves, we need to remain vigilant.

"While we work to maintain our health, we must also strengthen our families and communities. To do that, we must first help struggling families to *malama pono*, make things right for them. It means making sure that they can secure the very basics of food, shelter, and jobs.

"That's why our Department of Human Services developed online applications for SNAP benefits, formerly food stamps, and added 32,000 additional families during the pandemic. As many faced job losses, we provided \$6.6 billion in unemployment benefits, allowing those out-of-work to continue to receive essential income for their families.

"The pandemic also caused many workers to lose long-held jobs and pursue new career paths. To help them, the Department of Labor is rolling out the Hawaii Career Acceleration Navigator, with its one-stop online hub to help unemployed workers with new career and training opportunities.

"The pandemic also highlighted the need for childcare for working families and how it is essential for many to continue to hold jobs. To help them, the state's Child Care Program Office is distributing nearly \$80 million to support access to childcare and provide much needed relief for young families. These funds will support childcare businesses weathering the challenges of the pandemic, and can be used for personnel costs, training, rent, mortgage, utilities, and supplies, or equipment related to COVID-19.

"To assist renters and homeowners, we provided \$260 million in emergency rent and mortgage assistance to ensure that no family would be evicted because of the pandemic. Meanwhile, the Hawaiian Homes Commission postponed mortgage payments and provided its beneficiaries with rent and utility assistance.

"The State is also working closely with the counties to increase the number of affordable rentals on all islands. These projects include rentals in Moiliili, Downtown or Chinatown on Oahu, and more than 1,000 affordable rental units across the neighbor islands since we took office.

"Two years ago, the Legislature created Ohana Zones. Working with the county, we've opened 20 sites across all islands that provide a wide range of services for individuals and families. These projects have assisted over 5,500 homeless individuals statewide, with more than 1,300 placed directly into permanent housing.

"By increasing funding for the homeless by 68% since taking office, we've assisted more individuals to not only find temporary shelter, but to lift them out of the vicious cycle of homelessness. And our proposed infrastructure development in West Oahu will allow us to greatly increase our inventory of affordable homes, including those for teachers.

"But the biggest factor affecting homeownership in Hawaii is supply. That's why we set out to build 10,000 new homes by 2020, and we did it. We also expect to build another 3,000 homes by the end of this year.

"We can strengthen our communities in another way too. Given the recent revenue projections, we're asking the Legislature to return some of those dollars back to taxpayers. We want to issue refund checks of \$100 for every taxpayer and for each dependent. For a family of four that means an extra \$400. In this way, we'll also inject \$110 million back into our economy, giving it a boost as well.

"No community can be strong without taking care of their *keiki*, our future. Empowering our schools and enriching Hawaii's community of lifelong learners have always been among our top priorities. That's why I've asked legislators to restore funds taken away from our schools during the pandemic, for programs so important to our children's learning and for the upkeep of their classrooms.

"This includes funds to take care of those who teach our students and to support the development of new teachers, especially in areas of chronic shortages such as Hawaiian immersion and special needs.

"That's also why safely reopening schools was one of our top priorities after the pandemic hit. We knew that children learned best when they are physically in the classroom. But that wasn't possible during the early days of the shutdown. Our schools and teachers had to literally reinvent education, overnight. Virtual classrooms became a necessity, but we also learned that they could supplement in-person classes and provide opportunities that would not otherwise be available.

"That's why we're supporting the expansion of virtual classrooms and the Hawaii Virtual Learning Network. If a school on Molokai can't provide a class on physics, why should a student there be denied the opportunity to learn? We've talked a long time about distance learning, but more as an alternative to the traditional classroom. The pandemic made us realize that we could use virtual classrooms to ensure that every student has every opportunity to learn no matter where they live.

"Using the federal Governors' Emergency Education Relief fund, we're also empowering schools and teachers to innovate and create projects to recover learning lost due to the pandemic. We dedicated \$5 million for UH to launch Hawaii Online Portal for Education, which is developing curriculum for distance learning and additional training for teachers. The projects include everything from STEM education to agriculture.

"One of these projects is Ka'u Dream, a place-based, community-focused education initiative on Hawaii Island. Educators and the community have worked together to align the curriculum to career and business opportunities in Kau. They created enhanced learning activities that will engage and inspire students beyond graduation. This community-led initiative is a model for building thriving communities across the state.

"And it's time to retool our underutilized community resources. For generations, our public libraries, like the one in Pearl City, have been quietly supporting our students and communities. We want to reimagine how we use those facilities. We want Pearl City to be the role model for other libraries across the state, a place where groups can meet and exchange ideas. We want them to house early learning centers, as well as gathering places for our *kūpuna*. And we want to equip them with the latest technologies, where the community can learn, create, and enrich their lives. Reimagine, if you will, Pearl City Library becoming a beehive of activity as a community-based learning center.

"There have been a lot of things we've had to postpone because of the pandemic. One of the most important was our proposal to create a universal preschool system in Hawaii. We can't leave it there because research tells us that early learning is crucial in preparing our children for school and life in general. We will continue to nurture our early learners through our community-based centers. But let's work together to take the next step to provide preschools for every child in Hawaii.

"The real balancing act during the pandemic has been between the economy and our health. The fact is that keeping us safe and making Hawaii a safe place to visit is an essential step to restoring our visitor industry, reviving our small businesses, and re-energizing our economy.

"We ordered a mandatory quarantine for all trans-Pacific travelers to slow the spread of COVID-19 in Hawaii. And our Safe Travels program for pre-

travel testing and vaccine verification still remains the only program of its kind in the country.

"At the same time, we worked hard to keep insurance rates down for small businesses, even as unemployment ballooned. And as the economy recovers, we'll continue to make sure that our small businesses are brought along with the rising tide, through programs that expand our locally produced goods and services, support business innovations, back local manufacturers, and fund low-interest small business loans. With federal funds, the State is also helping small businesses through digital marketing and e-commerce initiatives, assisting more than 500 companies with training and virtual marketing events.

"Hawaii also became one of the safest locations to film during the pandemic, as our film office worked with producers and unions to create a plan with strict COVID protocols to resume filming here. People all over the world can now watch NCIS Hawaii, as well as Magnum P.I.

"We also know that keeping up is not good enough to be competitive. We must stay ahead of the game. That's why we're proposing to fortify the Hawaii Tourism Authority and the Hawaii Convention Center, support Hawaii Small Business Innovation Research projects, and provide fuel for our business accelerator programs and manufacturing assistance grants. We'll also launch a \$56 million State Small Business Credit Initiative to provide capital for local start-up tech companies.

"One of government's primary roles is to provide a strong and reliable infrastructure to support economic growth. Our visitor industry cannot exist without reliable airports. Our stores cannot operate without efficient roads and harbors to transport goods and services. During an economic downturn, public works projects not only build critical infrastructure, but they also provide a shot in the arm to business, labor, and the economy.

"For the last two years, Hawaii's construction industry has led the state's economic recovery, thanks in large part to our investment in public infrastructure. Those investments helped stabilize the local construction industry and, with a record bond sale of \$1.88 billion, this trend will continue. In addition, an estimated \$2.8 billion from the federal infrastructure law is expected to further boost the development of transportation, clean energy, and our internet capacity.

"And government too needs to upgrade and reinvent itself. That is one of the most important tasks we've been doing over the last seven years. Modernizing government operations across all agencies, transitioning from antiquated paper-based systems to computerized ones, modernizing our tax and payroll system, and transforming walk-in services to convenient virtual centers. And we're asking the Legislature to help us make government more efficient by replacing a statewide accounting system that hasn't been updated in the last 50 years.

"Whether it's filing tax returns or seeking a birth certificate, our goal has centered around creating greater efficiency, a larger return on taxpayer dollars, and better service to the public.

"We cannot be a strong state without protecting the resources upon which we depend. That is also a part of being *pono* and making things right. At the heart of these resources is our natural environment. In Hawaii, we're no strangers to the need to protect these islands. There's a reverence for the *'āina* that goes beyond issues of sustainability. That's why we've always been so protective of the environment.

"As an island community, we see the impacts of climate change and global warming more intensely. In 2015, three category-4 hurricanes approached Hawaii for the first time in recorded history. In 2018, torrential rain in Hanalei dropped more than 49 inches in 24 hours, setting a new U.S. record. And last year, the worst drought in decades on Maui County drove thousands of invasive axis deer into Kahului. And severe drought on Hawaii Island fueled the Mana Road wildfire, amongst the largest ever.

"We know that the climate crisis is real. But by working together, Hawaii has become a world leader in actions to fight the climate crisis. Hawaii was the first state to set a goal of 100% renewable energy by 2045, with 12 other states now following our lead. Hawaii was also the first state to commit, by law, to the goals of the Paris Agreement.

"Still, experiencing first-hand the severe impacts of climate change, we know that net-zero carbon emission is not good enough. That's why Hawaii became the first state to commit to a net-negative goal by 2045 to capture more carbon than we produce. We'll do that by protecting our oceans, expanding our native forests, and supporting sustainable agriculture. Again, my thanks to our legislators for making all of this happen.

"But we need to continue this good work. We need to retire Hawaii's last coal plant this year, establish a rebate for working families to buy electric cars, expand the State-To-Farm program to support local farmers, and move forward with the Royal Kunia Agricultural Park to encourage food self-sufficiency. Creating a more sustainable lifestyle is all part of being good stewards of these islands.

"So is protecting them from harm. The recent events at the Navy's Red Hill facility alarmed and shocked everyone. We've met with Navy leaders and let them know that their first job is to ensure that our drinking water stays safe and clean. Draining the fuel tanks at Red Hill is a good first step. But we must work to find long-term solutions. National security cannot come at the expense of our people's health. I believe we can protect both national security and public health. But it will take determination and the collaborative efforts of everyone.

"In the first year of the pandemic, we were forced to cut over \$1 billion from the budget, with every state agency scrambling to find new ways to continue to provide essential services to our residents. More than that, we faced the prospects that it would take the economy decades to recover. Describing our financial prospects back then as bleak would be an understatement.

"But we took the hard and necessary steps to address the very thing that threatened the life of our economy, the pandemic. Many wanted us to immediately fix the symptom of the problem, the devastated economy. But we needed to balance that with putting people's health first. As painful as it was, it was the right remedy for the long term, to make things *pono*. When things seemed to get better, we tempered our optimism. And we continue to do so, with economic as well as health issues.

"As you heard last month, we now expect a positive balance in our budget of more than \$1 billion. Tax collections have jumped by an astounding 27.3% over last year's totals. That's a direct reflection of the rebound in visitor arrivals, increased consumer spending, and the growing strength of our local businesses.

"We have a chance to restore painful cuts that we've made over the last two years, to repay outstanding loans, and to replenish various state funds, including loans to the Unemployment Trust Fund, the state's depleted Rainy Day fund, and cuts from our schools and state agencies that provide essential services to our people. In other words, we have a chance to safeguard our future and our children's future.

"When we face another catastrophic emergency, will we be prepared to deal with it? For the first time in a long time, we have the resources to take care of both our immediate and long-term needs. We can rebuild the solid fiscal foundation that we created before the pandemic.

"We also have a chance to pursue new initiatives, including the development of an all-inclusive broadband infrastructure. If the pandemic has taught us anything, it's about the crucial role that the internet plays in all of our daily lives.

"That's why we're leveraging state resources to maximize federal funding for broadband and proposing the largest investment in technology in our state's history, a total of more than \$400 million. We're calling it *Apakau Ka La*, 'spreading of the sun's rays.' It is critical infrastructure for the future connecting all the main Hawaiian Islands. This initiative will not only close the digital divide between the haves and the have-nots, but strengthen us as a community.

"We also recently launched the Affordable Connectivity Program, which extends federal emergency broadband benefits to those who would not otherwise be able to afford internet service. It's estimated that more than 100,000 Hawaii families will be able to qualify for internet services under this program.

"More than that, we have a chance to lift every business and every family with this incoming tide, to take everyone with us, whether we're talking about business growth, career opportunities, healthcare, housing, or education. Because, in spite of the strengthening economy, there are still many businesses on the brink of failure and many families who are struggling to make ends meet. We cannot leave them behind. As a community, it's not in our nature to leave them behind. The tide is rising, and it should lift all of us.

"Hawaii is unique. Our geography, our people, and our history. As the only island-state in the nation and as an amazing multicultural community, we celebrate our diversity. This distinction is at the heart of how we govern. There's no one-size-fits-all way of governing.

"That's why we're a government of the people, by the people, and for the people. That's not just a cliché, but a recognition that our government should reflect and respond to that diversity. This is also what has directed and shaped my decisions. It's also been one of my greatest challenges.

"There's a popular local saying: Keep the country, country. In an era that is propelling us through unprecedented changes and challenges, how do we keep Hawaii, Hawaii? How do you sustain and nurture what makes us, us? How do you do that, even as we must change to meet the times? How do you make things *pono* for everyone?

"Like our response to the pandemic, there is no easy answer. But I believe it lies somewhere deep within all of us who call Hawaii home. It lies in our willingness to share, to give even when we have very little to give. It is tucked deep within our desire to lift and lighten the burden of others. It's our deep-seated belief that we're part of a greater *'ohana* and that we have a responsibility to our community. We are all connected.

"It's taken generations, stretching back to those pathfinding sea-voyagers, to create this amazing and wonderful sense of community. There are some who fear that we're in danger of losing it through the many changes that we've endured. I am not one of them.

"From my vantage point, I see a Hawaii that remains strong and true to itself. I see families come together, even when they cannot physically get together. I see a generation reaching down to take hold of a younger one, and the young reaching up for guidance from their *kūpuna*, something we've always done here in the islands. I see a Hawaii that has been tested and tested over and over again during this pandemic. We may have bent, but we did not break.

"I believe in Hawaii, in its people and its purpose. When we work together, we can do great things, like those I've talked about today, to help all who are struggling to make ends meet, whether it's \$100 or \$400. To provide childcare for working parents and preschools for every child in Hawaii. And to create a broadband network that includes everyone in every community all across the state.

"I am proud of the work that we do. And I am proud, proud to be your governor. For all that you do and all that you are, my thanks and deeply felt *aloha. Mahalo.*"

President Kouchi then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Governor. I appreciate the emotion at the end of your speech and underscores your commitment. Based on the remarks last week in both the House Chamber, where we are today, and the Senate Chamber, we have many shared goals and the Legislature looks forward to working together with you in an effort to deliver what is *pono* for the people of Hawaii and make sure we lift up everyone in this state. On Wednesday, the Speaker said from this rostrum he supports an \$18 minimum wage. Today the Senate is holding a hearing on a bill that would raise the minimum wage to \$18. And I believe we're taking a bold first step to deliver on that promise. I'd like to declare this Joint Session adjourned."

At 10:40 a.m., President Kouchi declared the Joint Session of the House of Representatives and the Senate of the Thirty-First Legislature, Regular Session of 2022, adjourned.

And, you know, one of the things that I tried to do, and I think I failed a few times, was whenever something was happening bad here, I would think, what would Ezra do? And so, for the 16 years that I've been here, I've always tried to think of that. And I don't think I've, I think I've failed a few times thinking of that. Because he was just a great man. And I know the senior guys that are here would agree with me 100%.

"So, on behalf of his family, his wife, Pauline, who has passed, and his four children, we just wanted to share our *aloha* with him and his *'ohana*. He served here for 18 years, he was a big Christian, a big family man, and he loved to play golf, and he loved the game of golf. So, at the appropriate time, Mr. Speaker, could I offer a moment of silence for the late Ezra Kanoho?"

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

H.R. No. 4:

Representative Belatti moved that H.R. No. 4 be adopted, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in strong support. I'd like to articulate the necessity of continuing the work of the Red Hill committee and the necessity of this resolution. As the representative of Pearl Harbor-Hickam, our office has heard from constituents who continue to be displaced by this ongoing water crisis, doing their best to live out of hotels or transient accommodation, bus their children to schools where water is bottled and trucked in daily for usage.

"This resolution allows our Red Hill community to continue to consolidate the efforts of the House and continue to perform our state constitutional mandate of providing clean water to our communities. Our office and the world have now heard of the terrifying effects on our constituent's health, including not just dizziness and nausea, but neurological effects, seemingly unexplainable conditions on skin, eyes, and mental health. The long-term effects of this exposure, especially to children, is, to put it mildly, concerning.

"Mr. Speaker, almost daily, we are presented with new information. From the Navy's information, jet fuel and other materials were circulating in the Navy's water supply for over a week from on or about November 20th to after November 28th. Three wells which supply water to urban Honolulu remain shuttered. The Navy and our governor have not yet fully committed to defueling and decommissioning the cause of this crisis, the Red Hill Bulk Fuel Storage Facility.

"Mr. Speaker, the public must know that this House is doing something about this conflict and will continue to perform our duty to consolidate and convey information, to hold agencies accountable, and to work with our federal counterparts to ensure the safety of this community. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I too arise in strong support. Mr. Speaker, I have a few caveats. First, congratulations for the leadership putting this up, getting the committee formed. It's very, very important. But my advice

would be this. No Band-Aids, please. All you committee members stay strong, don't compromise, don't Band-Aid, that fuel tank has to be moved, those fuel tanks have got to be relocated.

"I represent Hawaii Kai, all of our drinking water, including what I drank this morning, comes from those wells. And my people are one to say, national defense is important, but what I drink and what I put in my kid's mouth and stomach is more important than that for immediate purposes. So, my advice to the committee, you're fortunate to be on it. Stay strong and make sure you do the right thing. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative B. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support. Thank you. This committee has a big responsibility because this is not a minor issue and not a short-term issue. I think that this committee may last much longer than we all hope it would.

"May I point out that there is a slight problem in the second whereas of this resolution. The whereas reads, 'WHEREAS, on November 28, 2021, users of the Navy's Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam water system complained of a fuel odor coming from their water.' In fact, as a prior speaker had mentioned, there were complaints prior to this November 28th date. A Washington Post story talks about complaints going back as far as June, August, and October of 2021. These are not substantiated complaints, but from what little I know about people exposed to toxic and other, how would you say, contaminants, the sensitive people are extraordinarily sensitive. And so, there may have been a reaction by the most sensitive people to fuel long before this November 28th date.

"The bigger point is that the Navy is using November 28th as the start date to document exposure recordation. The Washington Post story, December 22nd, 2021, quote, the Navy has created a registry to record people's health concerns, McGinnis said, but it is currently set up to document exposure only from Nov. 28 and forward. He said it could be revised if officials determine exposure may have started earlier. Right now, McGinnis said, we're really focused on what we understand to be the beginning of this event, which is the 28th, unquote.

"So, the 28th is an artificial date selected by the Navy based on its understanding that this is the beginning of this event. But I think that should be one of the items the committee should look into. Thank you."

Representative Johanson rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Ganaden be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 4, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING THE HOUSE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON RED HILL TO ADDRESS ISSUES RELATED TO THE RED HILL BULK FUEL STORAGE FACILITY, WATER CONTAMINATION AND REMEDIATION, AND ALL RELATED IMPACTS," was adopted.

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I have a no with reservations. I know that doesn't fit, but I want to explain why. First of all, we don't want to promote fraud in COVID-19 vaccinations. But at the same time, there's some flaws in this in that, firstly, it says, and I think unjustifiably puts churches in there. Admittedly, there are some anti-vaccine churches, but that doesn't mean they're fraudulent. So, putting the church and the state together in this bill, I think it's a little bit itchy, sketchy, and unfounded.

"The other thing, Mr. Speaker, is this bill really enforceable? This is telling the AG, get your COVID card police out there and go enforce this, and if it's millions of dollars, so be it. Is this enforceable and do we have the money to do that? That's the second point. Third point is, how, if there is a police, can we say that we want to target the 25% who's not vaccinated? Right now, we've got 75% of all the people of Hawaii are vaccinated. That's pretty high. Do we want to say, you 25%, you're the reason for this? And I know you can buy a false COVID test for \$25, evidently. But how many people are doing that? Do we have the metrics to say that this bill is needed? Otherwise, I think it's going to do more harm than good.

"For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I think this is a bill that needs a lot more discussion, a lot more kind of aiming a little bit clearer than this broad putting the churches and anybody who doesn't believe any of the issues that scientific evidence points to, whether it be some of the studies that just came out of John Hopkins that says, hey guys, the lockdowns have hurt more than they've helped. Months ago, you could be censored for saying that, you could be taken off Twitter, you could be taken off of YouTube. And now it's the truth, and John Hopkins is not a fly-by-night organization.

"The point is, we've had the moving goalposts. We've had science that says water is H₂O in Honolulu, but hey, look, if you're in Israel, it's H₃O, and if you're in Washington, D.C., water is H₅O. This science has not been good for us as policymakers. And to put this into a bill and say, look, you guys, you're a bunch of phonies, we're going to put you in jail or we're going to get the AG police to come and get you, is not good policy, Mr. Speaker. Let's ride out this wave. We don't need to put this in legislation. And for those reasons, I'm very much against this bill. Thank you."

"Thank you, Representative Ward, can I ask you, was that a WR or a no vote?"

Representative Ward: "No with a WR."

It just says if you're poor and you've got a kid in school, doesn't say your grade point average or some incentivization, if you will, that tells the kid, hey, your family is going to get a thousand bucks if you can get at least a 2.0 or a 2.5. And we know there's an inverse correlation between prosperity and academic achievement.

"So, Mr. Speaker, I'd like to see this bill tightened up a bit to where there's a nexus between giving the family money and the reason why it's being done, and it's called the DOE. Unless this is a slush fund the DOE has got too much money for, they're kind of bumping over into the Department of Human Services, and I'd like to see it encourage academic performance rather than just cash a check and forget about school. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

.000362. So, the difference from 50 years ago to today in the carbon reading is literally .00005. That is what carbon is in the atmosphere. So, we have to really take a good look at what we're doing scientifically. Just look at the numbers. And of course, when you graph this, it seems like it's such a huge difference, but it really is not. So, I just want you to know, Mr. Speaker, that this is what the truth is. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Todd rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in support. I just wanted to point out that the numbers used by the prior speaker would still amount to over a 15% increase, and that the dosage makes the poison. Thank you."

Representative Okimoto rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

However, my reservations stem from the fact that this parcel of land is located adjacent to Leahi Hospital as well as Kapiolani Community College and would be an ideal place for a center with health as well as education as its focus. And in fact, the UH is in the process of exploring this possibility at the present time. So, with that, I'd simply like to ask that there be further consideration of the best use of this parcel. Thank you very much."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of this measure. Anything that adds to the DHHL land allotment allocation is welcome, whether it's transferred from the federal, from the state, from the neighborhood board, from any other place. I think any bill that would obviate that is missing what otherwise for 100 years has been an obviously obfuscation of our responsibility, a breach of trust, if you will, to build Hawaiian homes for the Hawaiians. There are 28,000 on the waitlist, and look, this parcel is only going to make a few units, but at least it's a step forward for DHHL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Holt rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. With all due respect to the Chair of the Higher Education Committee, the fact that we're looking to transfer land to the Department of Hawaiian Homes is an amazing idea. When is the last time we tried to do it? We're 100 years into the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act and where are we at? So, although it is a small parcel with only a few, options for a few units, it's a great step forward."

Representative Branco rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. We talk about helping Native Hawaiians and we talk about putting them in the urban core. This measure does exactly that. This lot, even though it wouldn't house many, is next to a community college, next to health services, and this would be a prime spot to put Native Hawaiians and we need to consider that. *Mahalo*."

"Also, the University of Hawaii has been sitting on this lot for many years. Since 2017, they've also testified that they had plans, and nothing has come to fruition. So, it's time for us to act to help Native Hawaiians. *Mahalo*."

Representative B. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support with reservations. This plot of land, as well as other plots of land around Leahi Hospital, has been unused or underutilized for many, many decades, not years but decades. So, I welcome any opportunity to make better use of this land. I can tell you that over the decades, several ideas have popped up, none have been finalized and near approval."

"On a second note, I would suggest that language be added to the House draft. The current House draft says, 'notwithstanding any law to the contrary.' I would suggest that perhaps the words 'any law or provision to the contrary' be added. One of the main obstacles in use of this land is that the land was executive ordered by the governor to the University of Hawaii. The University of Hawaii claims that since it is a body corporate, only the university can decide what to do with this land. As you know, the University as a body corporate can own and transfer land, a responsibility that is rare in other state agencies. So, the words 'and provision' would incorporate the obstacle of the executive order by the governor."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, also in support and continuing. Contrary to the good gentleman from Diamond Head, this body, the Senate, the House trumps whatever the University is doing. Recall, we used to give them what was called sovereignty or their own autonomy. Given what we have now, we kind of cherry pick what we want to give for autonomy and what we don't. And this piece of land, which again, for the sake of the Hawaii community that's waited 100 years, that is a cheap excuse. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2288, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LAND," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, with Representatives B. Kobayashi and Takayama voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Gates, LoPresti, McDermott, and McKelvey being excused.

"I believe that a prudent, representative government would consult with parents first and create an open dialogue among parents, administrators, students, and educators. As written, it is a top-down mandate that does not allow parents to have their voices heard."

"I commend the efforts by the Children and Youth Summit attendees, and I believe that a solution can be found through input by parents first and foremost. I look forward to further discussion on this measure moving forward."

"*Mahalo*, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tam rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support, permission to insert written comments."

Representative Tam's written remarks are as follows:

"In support. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The bill that we are debating on the floor today updates our sexual education standards in our public school to be more inclusive of all students. Currently, our standards follow a narrow view that excludes the LGBTQ+ community. A concern has been raised that students are not ready to learn this information and it may be uncomfortable to learn. However, public education aims to ready our students for adulthood. The Legislature should not prevent standards simply because it is uncomfortable because that would be a disservice to our kids and could lead to unintended consequences in this adulthood. It is important to note that Section 3 of the bill requires all programs under this proposal to be medical and factually accurate. I would never vote for a bill such as this unless it is medically and factually accurate."

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Reservations, brief comment. I was a no on this bill in committee, and I've really been thinking about it a lot over the last few days. And while I do still have serious reservations about the bill, I realize that ultimately, it's about the kids and how they feel in their environment. I would just like to caution the Legislature and really recommend to the body that we make sure that we consult parents and have them be a big part of whatever it is we're doing. So, thank you very much."

Representative Woodson rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. Mr. Speaker, I wanted to commend my colleague for reconsideration of his vote in committee. And I did want to inform the body that this is a Keiki Caucus priority, it's part of our bill package. And it came to be part of our package as the top priority of the Children and Youth Summit. So, the young people involved in that summit identified this above

even the climate crisis as something that they really felt strongly about. And over the course of the interim and in preparation for session, I've heard a great deal from young people, and all of the response has been supportive across the spectrum. So, thank you for considering this bill and I hope to see it passed. *Mahalo.*"

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. I'm not going to talk about the rail and the money that they've spent and not spent. And in the hearts and minds of many constituents in this state, are totally incompetent to do it when they can't even have the rails where the tracks fit the wheels, how can we have a hospital system that's going to be run by the government? The government has shown it is not able to run what otherwise should be in the private sector. And this bill is saying, hey, Hail Mary, give it to the Department of Health, and let's see what, this is a crap shoot, is the point, Mr. Speaker, and I don't want to be part of that. Thank you."

Representative Marten rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I rise in support. I used to work there. It's very under-utilized. And having the Department of Health take it over to have programs that focus on mental health, I know that's something that we really need in my community and we have a shortage of, and that's not something that private hospitals do. So that's something that our Department of Health needs to take over. Thank you."

"So, what I'd like to do is just study the problem and let us learn to see if sand burritos are an appropriate tool for our toolbox. I'm certainly not suggesting that we would just start using them everywhere, but there may be certain instances at certain homes or certain properties where they could be appropriate. So, I'd just like to find out. Thanks very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tokioka rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support and I'd like to ask that the words from the Representative from the North Shore be inserted into the Journal as if they were my own, and I'd also like to insert written comments as well," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Tokioka's written remarks are as follows:

"The Representative from North Shore mentions that this is an increasing problem statewide, not just on the North Shore. There is also no clear evidence that sandbags cause or worsen erosion in other areas... So, let's

continue seeking opportunities to help our Hawaii residents living on our coastal shorelines save their homes."

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I know it's not third reading, but I never know when I'll have the chance to make my comments so I'm doing it now. Kona coffee and Kau coffee and other specialty coffees are world renowned products. They are difficult to farm, limited in quantity, and they're special. Other regions, other states, other countries don't allow what we allow here, which is for their geographic origin name for a specialty product like this to be used on products that aren't that product and that don't reflect the quality that people expect.

"In Hawaii, we allow coffee blends that contain only 10% of Kona coffee or whatever origin coffee, one coffee bean in 10, an amount that in blind taste tests cannot be detected, to be sold under the name Kona. Some people will say the important thing is truth in labeling, but the reality is we know that these labels mislead people. If they didn't, they wouldn't be used. That is the point, to put the name Kona or Kau or Hawaii on coffee that is 90% not that and sell it for more. The deception is the point.

"By allowing this deceptive practice, we're damaging the reputation of our specialty products and we're decreasing the value of the products that are grown here and are 100% that product and we decrease the revenue to the farmers that grow them. Every farmer that testified on this bill testified in support. And I would argue that the Legislature has a greater obligation to support our local farmers than to undercut them with a state law that allows people to make a little more profit on imported coffee they are selling based on deceptive labeling.

"People have also made the argument this year that there's inflation and we have some obligation to provide affordable coffee. I think it's a completely fallacious argument. This is a specialty product. We're not here to provide affordable luxury sports cars or designer brand clothing or specialty coffee. There are other choices on the shelves if people want affordable coffee, and we shouldn't undercut our farmers and then make the argument that this is somehow for the good of low-income families. I guess those are the comments I wanted to make, and I think it's long past time that we pass this legislation. I hope this is the year that we can do it."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, strong support. We must protect our local coffee market. And may the comments of the previous speaker be entered into the Journal as my own. A historical moment for both of us."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, Mr. Speaker. And I ask that the words of the Representative from Kailua-Kona be inserted into the Journal as if they were my own.

"One of the most important and special things about Kona coffee is that it's one of the only coffees in the world that is picked and produced by hand. And that's something that's special about Kona and Kona coffee. It contributes to the flavor, but it's also something that we need to think about when we're thinking about the farmers who do this every single day and spend their livelihoods doing something like this. So, thank you very much to the chair for passing this out, and I hope that it will continue forward, and we can get it passed this year. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1517, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COFFEE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Okimoto voting aye with reservations, and with Representative McDermott being excused.

Representative Hashem, for the Committee on Agriculture, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 97-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1768, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Water & Land.

Representative Aquino, for the Committee on Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 108-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1953, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1953, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONCESSIONS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Luke and McDermott being excused.

Representative Aquino, for the Committee on Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 109-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1619, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and

H.B. No. 1619, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PEER-TO-PEER CAR-SHARING INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Luke and McDermott being excused.

Representative Quinlan, for the Committee on Economic Development, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 110-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1516 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1516, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REGULATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Luke and McDermott being excused.

Representative Quinlan, for the Committee on Economic Development, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 111-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1592 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1592 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Okimoto rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1592, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AN INTERSTATE COMPACT TO PHASE OUT CORPORATE WELFARE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Okimoto and Ward voting no, and with Representatives Luke and McDermott being excused.

Representative Quinlan, for the Committee on Economic Development, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 112-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1407 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1407 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Clark rose in opposition to the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Clark's written remarks are as follows:

"Queen's Health System testified against this bill, HB 1407, because it would face an annual increase in expense of \$3 million should this bill be enacted. This would directly and negatively affect Molokai General Hospital, the only hospital on the island of Molokai, which is a part of my district."

Representative Kapela rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Okimoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1407, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE GENERAL EXCISE TAX," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Kapela, Okimoto, and Ward voting aye with reservations, with Representative Clark voting no, and with Representatives Luke and McDermott being excused.

Representative Quinlan, for the Committee on Economic Development, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 113-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1960 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1960 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Aquino rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Request a ruling on a potential conflict. I work for a non-profit," and the Chair ruled, "no conflict," and that the ruling would extend through *sine die*.

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1960, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NONPROFIT ORGANIZATIONS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Luke and McDermott being excused.

Representative Quinlan, for the Committee on Economic Development, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 114-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1828, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1828, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE TAXATION BOARD OF REVIEW," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, with Representatives Luke and McDermott being excused.

Representative Quinlan, for the Committee on Economic Development, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 115-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2437 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Health, Human Services, & Homelessness.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2437, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Health, Human Services, & Homelessness, with Representatives Luke and McDermott being excused.

Representative Quinlan, for the Committee on Economic Development, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 116-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2219 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2219 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Okimoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2219, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO A BANK OF THE STATE OF HAWAII," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Okimoto voting with reservations, and with Representatives Luke and McDermott being excused.

Representative Quinlan, for the Committee on Economic Development, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 117-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1962, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs and the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1962, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs and the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tarnas rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Holt rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. Yesterday I gave a speech that was written 40 years ago about the plight of the Hawaiians and the hope that they had in the creation upon OHA. I've had a lot of people come up to me and tell me it was a great speech, thank you, everybody. But one that really got to me said, it was a great speech, but it was really sad that to see the hope they had 40 years ago, and nothing happened. Nothing happened.

"So, here we are 40 years later. One of the lines in the speech is that the dream of salvation is founded upon the belief that the Hawaiian will one day control his own destiny. Last year, they wanted to pass a bill to possibly do some casino to fund DHHL. We didn't pass it. It was approved by the commission this year, this study is approved by the commission, the Hawaiian Homes Commission, and I just hope that we can put it back into our own hands. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marten rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Okimoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative McKelvey rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, no vote, brief comment. Mr. Speaker, this is a good shot across the bow which says, hey, we need money. We're DHHL, we don't have enough money, as the previous speaker from downtown said. We had hopes and then the funding would go and hopefully the \$600 million that's on its way will not be interrupted or diverted or detoured.

"But Mr. Speaker, gambling is not the way to fund the Hawaiian Homes Commission. This is not the right way, but it's kind of like, hey, we'll take anything we can get. But this is not the legitimate way for this body to treat the people who are the host culture, the ones who have waited 100 years for housing, the ones who have actually been very patient, very gentle. But to say we've got to put in gambling to do that, the quick fix is the wrong way to go. We have got to more genuinely look them straight in the eye and say, look, you deserve this, we're going to fund you legitimately. We're not going to do it on a crap shoot, we're not going to do it on the game of chance, which this is.

"So, with that, Mr. Speaker, good intention but it's a shot across the bow saying, hey, we need money. And I totally agree with that. But in terms of the methodology of it, I totally disagree. Thank you."

Representative Kapela rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support. Mr. Speaker, I agree, gaming can be dangerous. We have issues with gambling. People have lost their houses, families. I get that, I get that. This bill is for a study. And whether you're for gambling or not, the simple fact remains, people in Hawaii take 300,000 visits a year to Las Vegas, Nevada. People of Hawaii spend approximately \$1 billion in Las Vegas, Nevada, every year.

"Again, I'm not saying gambling is bad or good, but it is legal in 48 other states. I don't know where this will go, but I think a study will probably look

at the pros and cons and tell us maybe gambling is not good for Hawaii. But I'd like to see that study done so at least we know. For those reasons, I support this measure. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Eli rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tam rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No vote and a brief comment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I appreciate what this is trying to do for the Native Hawaiian community. But we already know what the studies have shown, and that is that gambling is one of the leading causes of bankruptcy amongst families right now. And I get that many people will fly to Las Vegas to gamble, but at least they have a round trip ticket to come back so they can build back some of the funds that they lost and for their family. And for those reasons, I'm still going to be a no vote."

Representative Holt rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Second time. At the base of this, I understand it's about gambling, but I'll read it one more time. The dream of salvation is founded on the belief that the Hawaiian will one day control his own destiny. His own destiny. Mr. Speaker, I thank you for putting forth the \$600 million for DHHL, but this is their plan. This is how they want to fund the housing. So, we're saying that we're just going to tell them what to do? That whenever we feel like we're going to fund them, we're going to give them money? So, why do we have a department, then? We should just get rid of the department. The commission should just go away."

"Forty years, Mr. Speaker. I know this is not OHA. DHHL has been around for 100 years, 100 years, people dying on the list. Anybody else go to the gaming conference this year? I did because I went to go find about all the ails of gambling. No, they don't exist. Las Vegas doesn't want Hawaii to gamble. No, that's not the truth. I went, I talked to these guys."

"We're just going to sit here and talk about bankruptcy. What about all the bankrupt Hawaiians? What are we doing to help them? We're making like gambling doesn't exist. HPD has testified that there's 70 to 100 game rooms on Oahu at any given time. What are we doing about that? Do we have any gambling mitigation in place? Hawaiians are going into bankruptcy. Everybody's going into bankruptcy. What is our solutions, Mr. Speaker? Yesterday we've got, trying not to transfer lands to DHHL. We always have excuses not to do it. What is our excuse to do it? When are we going to help? Thank you."

Representative Sayama rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support. When we say that a lot of folks from Hawaii like to go to Las Vegas, it's very true. But they're also moving there. Why? Because they don't have homes. Many of those families, hundreds, if not thousands, locals, Native Hawaiians are alike. And I believe that while gambling may not be a golden ticket, it might not be a perfect answer, it's something that the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands is requesting that we study. I think that's really worthy of studying, investing in the money to do that."

"Like the previous speakers have mentioned, it's no secret that gambling is prevalent in Hawaii. I think it's going to happen anyway. We might as well regulate it safely, responsibly, in a way that mitigates the social negatives that come with gambling and try to take all the advantages of gambling and dedicate that to a worthy cause to create homes for our local families, our Native Hawaiian families who've been waiting for years, generations, really. So, with that, I stand in support. Thank you."

Representative Tokioka rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. Thank you very much. I voted many times against gambling bills on this very floor. But what this bill asks for specifically, in bold print, study the feasibility of revenue generation from limited casino gaming, and address the potential public health and safety concerns arising from limited casino gaming. That's what it says in the bill. So, I don't think we can make bad decisions with too much information. And for those reasons, I support this bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support. I think the Vice Chair of Economic Development hit the nail on the head. This is an issue of self-determination, the commission voted on it, the commission wants it, and that is why I support it. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kapela rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Still in opposition. Hawaii is home to over 2,500 unique and individual sex trafficking survivors. These are women and children who are victimized and trafficked here on our shores. And bringing in gambling will only make that number rise. If we care about women and children, then we need to ensure that gambling doesn't happen on our shores. And if we truly care about the future of Native Hawaiians, then we should be focusing on economic and social justice initiatives, not gambling with their futures."

Representative Todd rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in support. I just wanted to note that there are some legitimate concerns regarding the future of gaming within our state, which is why we should study those potential concerns and potential negative health outcomes, which is exactly what the study intends to do."

"I also did find it pretty ironic last year that many of the folks who came out to testify against the legalization of some sort of limited casino gaming are many of the same folks who support the legalization of marijuana. I think that there is a very distinct parallel between the two in that marijuana is already being consumed in Hawaii, but we're not stepping up as a regulator to capture that revenue, there are negative health outcomes but those health outcomes already exist. I feel like gaming is very similar in that anyone who wants to gamble within Hawaii is already gambling in Hawaii. The difference is, we are not stepping up as the regulator, we're relying on institutes like VICE to try and control these operations, but they're happening in all of our communities as is. Anyone who wants to gamble on an app can do so already with no consequences, but we are not capturing any of that tax revenue, we are not stepping up as a regulator, we are not collecting data."

"So, I believe a study like this, which again is just a study, and which could potentially discuss, out in the open, all of the potential negative outcomes and all of the positive outcomes, makes a lot of sense, in the same way that I think studying the impact of legalizing and regulating marijuana makes a lot of sense. That's all I have. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Second time in opposition. Mr. Speaker, for a few of us who have been here for a little while, particularly the old, the longest serving is underneath the clock to the left or at least to my left, he knows and I know that we've heard, we've been here, done this, the same old, same old. Study it, we're going to do it, we travel there, we do it. So, nothing is new, even though the need for revenue of DHHL is very real."

"But do we want to make the poorest community in Hawaii poorer? That's what this is going to do, 80% of all the people who gamble lose. So, if we only got the people and the dens for gambling, whether there be wherever they are on Oahu, let those guys carry on. And for those who say, well, we're foregoing revenue, if you look at the other states who did this, Mr. Speaker, they back out the appropriation from their departments and they fill it with gambling. Then when gambling goes down, they say, well look, we don't have any money."

"My point is, DHHL is going to lose money if this bill passes and gambling is legalized, because the states that have relied upon education say, oh, this is great for the *keiki*. As soon as the gambling revenue went down, they didn't replace it with actually executive budget. So, this is a lose-lose proposition. And again, for those who have been here for a while, this is kind of the same old, same old that we've gone through, and it's no different. What we've got to do is legitimately fund DHHL. That's what the whole argument is about. This is kind of like another way of getting our attention. As I said earlier, it's a shot across the bow. Pay attention to the Hawaiians. Keep our promise. Put the \$600 million that was in there steady as you go and every year, increase it. But gambling is a quick fix, it is the wrong way to go. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations and brief comments. Thank you, sir. I see this as not just a study. I've been around the block enough times to know that when a department says they want to do something and then they ask you for money to do a study, it's basically they're asking for a budget to create an argument for why they should be allowed to do what they already want to do or what they said they want to do. And I'm not interested in giving half a million-dollar budget to create a study that tells us the foregone conclusion of what they want the answer to be. So, I have little trust that that would actually happen. So, for now, I'm at reservations, but in the future, I can't see supporting this. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matayoshi rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations, Mr. Speaker, brief comment. I generally am against gambling and legalized gambling in Hawaii. I really consider it something of a regressive tax on the middle- and lower-income individuals living here. And whilst casino gambling, if we do legalize it in a limited capacity, it'll still go underground for the people who don't meet whatever qualifications we put in.

"So generally, again, I'm still against legalized gambling. I'm voting with reservations because this is just a study. But as the Representative from Ewa pointed out, studies typically go a certain way, they're almost like expert witnesses in law, they're going to go a certain way if the department wants it to go a certain way. I'm certainly going to keep an open mind as I read the study, but with reservations for now. Thank you."

Representative Branco rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, Mr. Speaker. We love to use Hawaiian phrases to look across the ocean or travel or to search for knowledge. We love to use our Hawaiian words. We love to use our old *'ōlelo noeau* to generally support our arguments. But when it comes to Hawaiians actually looking for knowledge, you're going to use that against us.

"I remind everyone, this is a study. My community does not agree with gambling. But this is a study, this is an opportunity for information, and this is an opportunity for the Hawaiian people to self-determine their future. So, let's stop saying what is right or what is wrong for Hawaiians and let's let Hawaiians speak for themselves, because I'm getting tired of other people telling our people what is right. So, let's remember that. This is a study seeking knowledge. We always want other people to seek knowledge. *Mahalo.*"

Representative Gates rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Har rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support, brief comments. I appreciate the passion from many of our members. At this time, Mr. Speaker, may I please incorporate the words of the Representative from Lihue, the Vice Chair of Economic Development, and the Representative from Kailua into the Journal as if they were my own. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1962, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GAMBLING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs and the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Gates, LoPresti, Marten, Matayoshi, McKelvey, Okimoto, and Tarnas voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Eli, Kapela, Perruso, Tam, and Ward voting no, and with Representatives Luke and McDermott being excused.

Representative Quinlan, for the Committee on Economic Development, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 118-22) recommending that

H.B. No. 2177, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2177, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"This is requiring if you're young or old, that you are to file your taxes electronically. Mr. Speaker, I have reservations as my position. Some people in any district that we represent, number one, may not have a computer, and number two, may not be very savvy to be able to file by technology. I can see why our former colleague, who's now the head of taxation, would want to do this, because it makes their job much, much easier, and they can flag different difficulties, *et cetera*. But I think this is a little bit too much, too quick, unless they phase it in or have it, if you're a particular age you don't have to do it, I don't know. There's a better way to do it, and I'm not sure how many places in the rest of the country that they would require electronic filing. I know the IRS is nearing that, but whether the state should be doing that to me is very questionable. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, reservations."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2177, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE TAX ADMINISTRATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Ward voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Luke and McDermott being excused.

Representative Quinlan, for the Committee on Economic Development, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 119-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2178, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2178, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Okimoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2178, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAX EXPENDITURE ACCOUNTABILITY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Okimoto voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Luke and McDermott being excused.

Representative Quinlan, for the Committee on Economic Development, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 120-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2227, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2227, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE "MADE IN HAWAII" PROGRAM," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Luke and McDermott being excused.

Representative Ohno, for the Committee on Corrections, Military, & Veterans, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 121-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1650, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Health, Human Services, & Homelessness.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1650, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OFFENDER REENTRY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Health, Human Services, & Homelessness, with Representatives Luke and McDermott being excused.

It's like taxing yourself out of debt, I just don't see how it can be done. So, with that, Mr. Speaker, no and confusion that sends the wrong signal to our energy-wise community. Thank you."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you. I would just suggest that members read the bill if they have questions. In support."

Representative Okimoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

So, this is a huge liability, even though it's a warm and fuzzy, feels good, in terms of what the litigation that it can raise is very, very serious. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, it's good, but it's got some really downside economic fines that could be levied. For those reasons, with reservations."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. "Mr. Speaker, no vote, brief comment. Mr. Speaker, this allows advanced practice nurses to administer death with dignity, i.e. assisted suicide. If you look at the numbers, the metrics are the majority, if not over 90% of the doctors, don't want anything to do with death and dying. I mean, it's like your cardiologist on the morning they're doing some of that and then some of the other things that they may be associated with.

"What we're doing is passing it off, if you will, to the nurses. I asked in the committee, I never got an answer, how many of the nurses would be like the doctors saying, hey, this is fine, but I don't want to do it. I know it's an accessibility issue. And in the hearing, it also said it was like, hey, the waiting period is too short, and I know this tries to correct that. And I said, you should do what the poster child of the death with dignity has done, that's John Radcliffe. The Representative of District 40 and I met with him regularly throughout the last 18 months of his life. He stockpiled, or no, he preordered, if you will, almost six months ahead of time his medicines that he would actually take and then his demise would then follow.

"So, I don't see the need for the bill in the sense until we know what the nurses are going to do, in terms of what people could stockpile for it. So, with those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I think we need to examine this rather than loosening it up. Thank you."

Representative Kitagawa rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition and a few comments. Last year, I shared my concerns regarding piecemealing APRN legislation and shared the need to look at legislation related to APRNs in a holistic manner. As you may remember, I introduced two resolutions last year in an attempt to address these concerns. These resolutions passed the House but did not pass the Senate in its original form, which originally included convening a working group to determine the gaps in access to health care and the potential role APRNs may play in addressing these gaps, as well as an unbiased analysis of APRNs and physician assistants by the Legislative Reference Bureau. Therefore, because these did not pass the Senate, there was no working group to discuss these issues and no report from LRB.

"My concerns still exist regarding the way we are looking at expanding the scope of practice for APRNs. I very much appreciate the work that APRNs and nurses do, especially during this pandemic, and my concerns do not take away from the fact that they play a critical role in our healthcare system.

"However, like I shared last year, I still believe it's important to have conversations that look at this issue holistically, including with multiple stakeholders, to discuss what the role of APRNs and other healthcare professionals should be in addressing the many healthcare concerns that we have in our communities. At some point, without having these discussions, the distinctions between the different types of healthcare providers, including physicians, becomes blurred. Thank you for letting me share my opposition to this bill."

Representative Eli rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Quinlan rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Kitagawa be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Holt rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in opposition, brief comment. Growing up in Kalihi, which I'm very proud of, it's really tough. We got all the housing projects, we got all the homeless people, we got the homeless shelter. And we got the jail. It's been 100 years. And about 10 years or so, our community was told that we're finally going to get rid of the jail. We're going to get rid of the jail, we're going to move it, and we're going to get all these great services or whatever we're going to get to replace the jail. And now we're here saying, no, psych, we're not going to do it. So, I appreciate the introducer and the intention of the measure, but our community has been bearing the brunt of this for too long, and I really look forward to moving this forward. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in strong support. As the representative of District 30, which includes Oahu Community Correctional Center, I am proud to support this bill. The replacement of the Oahu Community Correctional Center will stand to cost the State around \$1 billion, as articulated by Architects Hawaii, the current plan by the Department of Public Safety. This bill and its amendment represents a compromise between advocates, the Criminal Justice Oversight Commission, and the

Department of Public Safety. The Department of Public Safety has articulated in numerous ways as well alongside the community that we need to replace the Oahu Community Correctional Center. It stands on 19 acres of state land.

"Just last week, there were instances of attacks on guards and numerous safety issues regarding inmates. There are not many individuals who are articulating for the entire abolition of a new facility here in the state, as has happened in the Bronx, New York, San Francisco or Los Angeles, California. The Hawaii State Oversight Commission, the Hawaii Criminal Justice Research Institute, have not yet really been involved in policy here at the state, and this is an opportunity to slow this project down to allow them to be involved.

"There are numerous bills being moved through the Legislature right now, years in the making, discussing bail and parole reform, alternatives to incarceration, which discuss alternatives to incarceration primarily targeted towards women, towards parents, and towards Native Hawaiians. The task force on HCR 85 discussed this in 2019. The oversight commission was unanimous in saying that they want a moratorium or a pause on a new facility. If we are indeed intent on allowing them to perform their statutory duties, then this bill will allow the public to engage in that process, to engage in a conversation in those meetings. If the public wants more input on an RFQ or an RFP process or a moratorium, or to avoid the instances of inappropriate lobbying by corporate prisons, as has happened here in this state and in other states, then that will happen through this bill. Thank you so much."

Representative Holt rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Still in opposition. The current Representative from District 30 makes a good point. People are getting attacked and it's going to cost us \$1 billion. So, if we don't move it, how much is it going to cost and when are we going to start moving it? When are you going to be okay to move the jail? If we don't go now, it's going to cost \$1.5, \$2 billion, more people are going to get attacked?"

"I grew up in the district. That thing, that's a, you go down Dillingham and you come up on this big fenced-off barbed wire building. We're going to leave it there so we can check with different people how to build a jail? We went through all these processes. EISs are done. Plans are made. Money is spent. I appreciate the previous speaker's commitment to the Native Hawaiians, but Mr. Speaker, our community needs this jail gone. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2516, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, with Representative Kong voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Holt and Okimoto voting no, and with Representative McDermott being excused.

The House of Representatives of the Thirty-First Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2022, convened at noon, with Vice Speaker Mizuno presiding.

The invocation was delivered by Representative Aaron Ling Johanson, after which the Roll was called showing all members present, with Representatives Har, Kitagawa, D. Kobayashi, LoPresti, Lowen, Matayoshi, Perruso, Todd, Tokioka, Ward, and Wildberger participating remotely via videoconference, and with the exception of Representative McDermott, who was excused.

By unanimous consent, reading and approval of the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Fifteenth Day was deferred.

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition, brief comment, please. This is formally known as HB 1567. On the streets it's known as get out of jail free or felon privileges and rights. My point, Mr. Speaker, is this is a no bail bill. You don't have to show up because you don't have any skin in the game. And I think this is in an opposite direction. If we look on the mainland, what's going on in these cities that where there is just a real outbreak of a crime—"

Representative Belatti rose to a point of order, stating:

"Point of order. We just need to see Minority Leader Emeritus on the screen. We can't see him. Thank you."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"I was looking at the bill, actually. Hold on one second. I'm going right back. Thank you, Majority Leader, I didn't know my face was so desirable.

"On the street, it's known as a get out of jail free. It's for the felons who basically know that it's a revolving door. And this, having no bail or no skin in the game is not going to stop them. The point is, this issue I brought up in the committee hearing, and Kat Brady, all of you know who Kat Brady is, she said, well, because I said the bill is not needed and it's going to be to a disadvantage and encourage or enable, if you will, people who are criminal. And she said, well, in 2019, we passed a promissory note option where if you don't have the money, and I know there's a bleeding heart, look, you're poor, we don't want to punish the poor, but the poor can sign an IOU, a promissory note. And if they do show up, it's canceled.

"So, Mr. Speaker, the point is we don't need this. It's an encouragement and it's an enabling which if we see what's going on in the mainland and we learn from it, hey guys, this is not good policy, it's just not good policy. I don't care how many people are getting overcrowded or whatever. We've got to protect our citizens, our constituents, and this is not the way to go. Let's do the promissory note, make them sign. If they have less than \$100 to their name, let them sign their promissory note, let them show up. That's the whole point. Let them show up and let the judicial process and the wheels of justice move. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I hope this bill doesn't go farther than today or next week. Thank you."

Representative Matayoshi rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, brief comment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I do want to point out that, as the previous speaker said, the previous speaker doesn't seem to be against the concept of this because he is in favor of the promissory note provision. What this bill does is it simply allows certain nonviolent

offenders with a bunch, kind of a laundry list of exemptions, to be not jailed prior to their hearing.

"So, we all know about the jail overcrowding situation. This bill was meant to alleviate that. If they commit another crime while they're out, this bill does not apply. So, we're not releasing violent offenders onto the streets. If someone is unlikely to return, then this bill will not apply. I think the Representative from Hawaii Kai is maybe misconstruing and over inflating the risk to society that this bill purportedly causes. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, second time in opposition, just a brief retort. If what the good representative has just said is true, then the mainland crime spree would not be in the no bail areas and particularly those cities where it's a revolving door and they look at the smash and grab guys, they're in and then they're out, they're in and they're out, because they know they don't have any skin in the game, they don't have to put up bail.

"Pretrial hearings are weeks and sometimes months delayed. The point is, when you do the crime, you should do the time. And this says, basically, if you do the crime, you got all the time in the world to do anything you want to do. And to say that there's nobody committing crimes after they're out and no bail is incorrect, incomplete, and there's plenty on the record, which I don't have immediately to cite, but there's plenty on the record, otherwise I wouldn't be so against this bill. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, this is a get out of jail free. It's, what do they call it, soft on crime and it's not good policy for the State of Hawaii and for our constituents. Thank you."

For these reasons, I have introduced HB 1757 to help allow for xeriscaping in planned community associations. Xeriscaping, if used in the state, can help to save up to 70% of water that is currently being dumped into the ground in places like Ewa Beach where it's practically a desert climate. And we need to start doing more commonsense things and allowing xeriscaping, whereas most homeowner associations disallow that. So, thank you very much, and I want to thank the chairman of CPC for passing this."

"So, this is a bad precedent. Very, very, very bad precedent, which I think we need to avoid lest we get into an ideological, hey, we can tell you whatever to do and we're going to reward you, particularly your neighbors.

"I know the nation really just cringed when it was where you turned your neighbors in in the Soviet Union, and now it's such an everyday occurrence in China. This is just not the best place to go. And for those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I hope everybody sees this. We always talk about slippery slopes, but we never know what it means. This one really means what it says. Turn in your neighbor and you get money. Very bad incentive system. Thank you."

Representative Ichiyama, for the Committee on Pandemic & Disaster Preparedness, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 270-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2120, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, no vote and a brief comment, please. Mr. Speaker, this is relating to Medical Cannabis Day. First, let me say, medical cannabis has done miraculous things for people with cancer and as a palliative. My difficulty with the bill is it sends the wrong message. When we say this is cannabis day, it says to young people, hey, this is cool, it's cannabis day, let's get on with it. But why not a codeine day or when people really are almost near death, they use morphine, why not a celebrate morphine day?"

"I'm not sure, Mr. Speaker, this is what it's supposed to be or is this sending a subtle message from this legislature to the public saying, hey, we're coming up on recreational marijuana and this is our—"

The Chair addressed Representative Ward, stating:

"Representative Ward, focus on the merits. Focus on the merits, good or bad, focus on the merits."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"I know I can't say motive, but I can't see any reason why we want to do cannabis day when we've got really a drug epidemic, we've got a suicide epidemic, we've got all of these things that are drug related, opioids, *et cetera*. And I can think of more honorable things, as I said earlier, a morphine day would make more sense. There's more use of morphine in hospitals than there is cannabis. So why we're celebrating cannabis, particularly for young people, for old people, not a problem, but for young people seeing that this is a day we can celebrate, that's not the message that I think a legislature responsible for the welfare of its citizens and their safety is what we should be sending. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Okimoto rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1957, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MEDICAL CANNABIS DAY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, with Representative Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Okimoto and Ward voting no, and with Representative McKelvey being excused.

Representative Gates, for the Committee on Culture, Arts, & International Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 274-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2056, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representatives Tarnas and Lowen, for the Committee on Water & Land and the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 279-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1669, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1669, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Kong rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations. For some years now, we have heard of the destruction and the problems associated with sea level rise. But no one actually explains to us what the rate of sea level rise is, they just presume. So, like I did with the carbon readings, I used a third party, in that case was Blue Planet, this time I'll use the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's data to highlight what sea level rise is.

"So, NOAA has records not just for the last year or 10 years, but for the past 100 years on sea level rise. And sea level rise is 1.55 millimeters per year stated for Honolulu, which this bill refers to in Waikiki. You have to imagine 1.55 millimeters. There's 10 millimeters in a centimeter,

approximately two and a half centimeters per inch. Now, when we refer to tides, we're talking about feet. But when we're talking about sea level rise, we're actually referring to millimeters. So, if all this destruction has been happening in the past, it kind of doesn't really make sense because 1.55 millimeters is literally this big. It's real tiny.

"So now they talk about example, king tides, right? So that's on average, what, nine, ten inches above the high tide? But we all know, from our elementary school science, that this is affected by the moon and possibly the sun, depending upon its alignment. So, we're comparing feet to millimeters. And we're attributing all this destruction to the rise in millimeters, one or two millimeters. So, if it's two and a half, three feet at the king tide, one and a half millimeters doesn't even show up. You can't fathom how minuscule this is. So, I could go on, but I think my point is made. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Todd rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you. In support. I just want to note that there was an interagency report released literally today that was kind of led by NOAA, which is referenced by the prior speaker, and they anticipate 10 to 12 inches of sea level rise by 2050. So, I think it's an appropriate time to really start planning ahead. What we really should be doing is dedicating hundreds of millions of dollars per year specifically to this issue. If you're on the Big Island and you're very mountainous, outside of maybe the downtown Hilo and Kona area, there's not going to be as much impact. But if you're in Waikiki and you're practically built on a swamp as is and a lot of it's backfill, then there's going to be significant impacts. Thank you."

Representative B. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. Sea level rise is visible in Waikiki in very dramatic fashion. I would point out that three coconut trees fronting the Outrigger Reef Hotel have been cut at their base because they have been damaged by sea level rise and has had water lapping up to them for so many years that they finally were a danger. Also, at Outrigger Reef Hotel, the outer wall facing the ocean has boards covering holes in the wall for about 40 feet or so. I can show you pictures of these damages in my office. I can also show you, on the internet, pictures of the Outrigger Reef Hotel with these three coconut trees still standing.

"Further, there is a cut or a break in the concrete walkway in front of the Sheraton Waikiki Hotel. A concrete stairs that used to descend from the walkway is no longer open because the concrete foundation under this walkway has completely washed away. The stairs are literally standing there in midair without any base to them. There is also another place in Waikiki closer to the Outrigger Reef Hotel, where the concrete walkway has fallen into the ocean. So, we have dramatic instances of sea level rise in Waikiki. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations. If the first speaker's data is true, even though they're citing the same source with different interpretation, this is the state of the art of science, and unfortunately, the weaponization of science. Also regarding the last speaker, as a retailer in Waikiki at the Royal Hawaiian Hotel for 15 years, I literally saw what he just said come and go, because the tides shift the sand from the Ewa to the Diamond Head every so many years. So, what he's observing is a natural phenomenon. The sand comes back. And if that doesn't happen, we buy sand from California and fill in in front of the Royal Hawaiian Hotel and fill in in front of the Sheraton Waikiki. That has happened year and year again.

"Again, the data is there, but what we've got to do is interpret it correctly. And that's where the first speaker is saying, let's follow the science to where it's exact, and know that when you cite the source that it's real. So, Mr. Speaker, I have reservations because this is almost like COVID. It depends on where you get your data and what country and what organization is giving it to you. And for those reasons, Mr. Speaker, with reservations. Thank you."

Representative Tam rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. I would like to have the words of the Representative from Hilo and the Representative from Diamond Head inserted into the Journal as if they were my own. And a brief comment in support. As the representative from Waikiki, we see sea level rise. As a resident and as their representative, I see it every single day. And last year we poured millions of dollars in beach reclamation just so we can combat it. This bill would give us another tool to help us save money in the long run and to help us combat this devastating effect so that we can continue to have this beach for generations to come," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Okimoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kong rose to respond, stating:

"With reservations, thank you. You cannot actually change the data. This is interesting. So, we have scientific data and we have scientific consensus. Two different things. They don't take into account, like the good Representative from Hawaii Kai mentioned, the tides, the erosion that takes place. So, there are other factors in play here. If you can see sea level rise, I'm amazed, at 1.55 millimeters. I mean, that's a stated data fact. You can't change that. You can change the consensus, though. For example, real quickly, if I may digress, when I gave my carbon readings, .00036, that came from Blue Planet, and then someone spoke up and said, well, it's a 15% increase. Well, you get .00036 times 15% or .15, it's still .00005. The data hasn't changed, but the way they use a consensus is it changes your mindset, and they are two different things. So as a technician, as you well know, I'm following the data, not the consensus. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. "Sometimes, and particularly during COVID, the film industry finds it difficult to replace an extra at the last minute, and might employ a state or county employee to prevent shutdown of production. The problem this bill sets out to address is a non-issue, but the unintended consequences of passing this bill could lead the film industry to move productions out of Hawaii by creating unnecessary & excessive red tape."

But the point is, there's probably a couple of dozen states that have put down mandates, and now we're putting all of this stuff in Hawaii to be more severe.

"I would lastly cite the John Hopkins study that I think probably is probably the more credible of any institution or data research, a set of experts who said, hey, mandates are more harm than good. So, I think it's like, it's out of the, I think that's called an iconic, no that's, there's a term that says you're out of sync with the times that you're in. This bill is out of sync with what we need in terms of what hopefully in a few months, there are not going to be any mandates. So, if we pass this and I think it goes in effect in June 2023, no it is repealed in June 2023, which is good as a safeguard but I think it'll look a little funny if in effect before that, we've basically taken down the mandates and we've opened up this beautiful building again to the

people of Hawaii, which we should be doing, hopefully, Mr. Speaker very, very soon and very, very quickly."

The Chair addressed Representative Ward, stating:

"So, please refrain and keep your remarks on this bill only."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"And I know there's a lot of people watching this bill because they're thinking that this is a little bit going after them. And I would yield to the next speaker who probably is going to say what it means to those who have not a vaccination. Thank you. Mr. Speaker."

Representative Okimoto rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

And I would just propose that if this does move forward, it should be considered that this power shouldn't apply to imposing new parking fees where they never existed before, or to imposing parking fees over a certain percent increase, perhaps, or maybe narrowing it down to just Ala Wai. But this is hugely concerning and should be for anyone who's had issues with DOBOR in their districts with small boat harbors."

Representative Marten rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations please and brief comments. I have concerns, I'm not sure, I tried to find out how this will apply to the parking in the Ala Wai area for surfers currently using Kaiser's, Ala Moana Bowls, and I would oppose any measure to make that paid parking. So, I haven't clarified how this bill will impact that. Thank you."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations as well. I know there's more discussion to be had and it may be limited to certain situations or areas, but I'm getting a lot of concern from my local permit holders who are worried that without this kind of mechanism for public input, that fees could be raised. And while the commercial entities would have no problem being able to pay them, that could displace them by a matter of fact from being able to use the facilities to which they are permittees. So, thank you."

Representative McDermott rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative LoPresti rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tam rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, Mr. Speaker. This bill was brought forth by constituents of Waikiki who are fearful of their safety or have been victims of criminal activity in the area and sometimes in their own homes. It is no secret that Waikiki is one of the most well-known areas in the world. Millions flock there every year, believing that it is a safe area to spend their vacation. However, they soon find out the hard way that they end up becoming victims or statistics, and that ultimately affects the surrounding neighborhood and the people that live there. As a result, we see headlines like, Waikiki crime made up 17% of Oahu offenses over past week, recent violent crime leaves Waikiki residents on edge, or HPD searching for attempted murder suspect after Waikiki shooting, and the list goes on.

"It has gotten very bad that Waikiki residents have teamed up with Honolulu Police Department for neighborhood patrols, and the prosecutor is working to solve the habitual offender situation going on. Despite our efforts, members of the patrol have found 85 repeat offenders, all who have been arrested and cited in Waikiki, and the number continues to grow. Frustration over this has been echoed by the city prosecutor and police officers who believe the system is broken.

"We often see Waikiki as a tourist destination and a business destination, but it's also a neighborhood. We have families and senior citizens that are scared that they're going to be victims. And I am grateful for the many who have testified in support of this measure and some who are willing to share their stories of what happened to them.

"By passing this bill, we will provide some much-needed support to the city when it comes to protecting our neighborhood. And I wanted to thank the Chair of Economic Development for giving this bill a chance. For these reasons, I stand in support of this measure."

Representative D. Kobayashi rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, a no vote for me and comments. I fear this kind of measure sets a very dangerous precedent. The last thing I think Hawaii wants to become is a place where there are certain enclaves where locals aren't allowed, regardless of the reason. And while that's not the intent of the measure, I'm sure that could snowball into something like that. If you go to places in the Bahamas, in the Caribbean, and Jamaica, there are places where it's very clear that only people of a certain type are even allowed in those areas. And I really don't think we want to become that, and this kind of measure starts to move us down that path. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations. And because of the enforceability of this, the only way it can be enforced if we adopt some of the things that they do in communist China."

Representative Holt rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative LoPresti be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations due to the effect it could have on my area of KaaNapali with our local population."

So, I hope this is not a sneak or, what would you call, a Trojan horse for critical race theory. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, with reservations. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support and just a brief comment. I did want to provide clarification that critical thinking is not critical race theory, they're two very different things. So, let's stick with the language of the measure. *Mahalo.*"

So, I really hope that this measure moves forward and these other gardening activities are allowed. We shouldn't outlaw gardening. And this bill helps to get rid of that ridiculous thing. Thank you."

But Mr. Speaker, you know of the poetic, I think it's a short story where the starfish have filled the shoreline and the beach is just filled with starfish. And this bright young man kind of walks up to it and says, oh, this is really bad news, I'm going to start throwing them back into the water. But another young man comes up and says, hey, what are you doing? You got so much here there's going to be no difference at all that you're going to make in doing this. And he says, well, watch this. He picks up another one and throws it in. It'll make a big difference to that one.

"Mr. Speaker, this is the whole thing about this little piece of land that the UH is probably going to fight for. But I think it's a very significant move that we mean what we say when we're for the Hawaiians to get back on the land. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations. This is the relating to education, which is actually a great gesture for those families who have low income, they can get a scholarship for their kids. And this bill reminds me that 48% of the people of Hawaii, the ALICE study says they are one paycheck away from homelessness.

"The difficulty I have with this is that this is supposed to incentivize education, but there's no nexus between their kids in school and the amount of money. My fear is that they get an extra few hundred bucks, they're not going to spend it on their kid's education, which I would hope that this bill would be aimed for. So, for those kids who are poor and the really high achievers, I would say by all means we should just let it go. But some of those are perhaps not.

"And as I said in an earlier speech, the highest correlation between student achievement is parental involvement. If the kids don't have their parents care about what they're doing, the kids don't care. The parents don't care, the kids don't care. So, this thing is missing the nexus between the parents and the kids to give the kids an incentive to excel in school. Otherwise, I'm not sure why we're doing this, because otherwise they have welfare and other things to subsidize them. And this is for educational purposes, but it needs a nexus. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I think we can improve it. Thank you."

Representative Kapela rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

"Thank you. I'm in support. I first want to start, I'd like to thank the Chairs of Agriculture and Consumer Protection & Commerce for hearing the measure and moving things along. I do think that it's part of an important conversation about how we're going to make good on our strategic agricultural goals that we've set for ourselves. But also, we're trying to find the proper balance between meeting those goals and ensuring that we are a good steward for our public trust lands. So, I'm excited that we're having this conversation.

"Just for perspective, this bill only would apply to the neighbor islands. And specifically, the issue I'm trying to address is that in East Hawaii, we have two agricultural parks, one in Panaewa, just outside of my district, and one in Pahoa. And in those areas, over 90% of those leases are due to expire in the near future. In the Panaewa area, 20 out of 22 will expire on the exact same day. Those leases average around 12 acres. So, relatively small family-run farms. And in the Pahoa area, 90% of them will expire in a six- to seven-year window, and those farms average out about eight acres.

"So, what we're trying to address specifically is these small family operations, these are not large industrial farm enterprises, and the fact that we do not have the demand to replace these farms as it currently stands. The current waiting list on the Big Island specifically, which is island wide, is about 50 who have actually shown interest. That does not mean that they will have the qualifications or the follow through necessary to actually take on these leases should they expire. It's also worth noting that these leases do not expire tomorrow, so anyone expressing interest currently would not necessarily be interested in taking on those leases down the road.

"So, to me, we do have a problem to address, and it's not the fact that we have these leases held by current productive small family farms, but the problem that we need to address is the lack of agricultural land made available on the neighbor islands to meet this demand. So if we are 50 short, or whatever that metric would be for fully qualified, bona fide farmers, whether it ends up being 20 to 30 that can actually meet those qualifications and who are interested, then we should simply open up another agricultural park to make those lands available. The response should not be essentially forcing these folks to relocate if they have the funding or to shut down. Nothing is accomplished if we do that.

"But I do recognize that there is an important balance to strike here between providing a fair opportunity for farmers to enter these lands, while also ensuring that the lands continue to be productive and that we move towards our strategic goals. So once again, I'd just like to thank the body for continuing the conversation. And I recognize that there is more work to do to strike that proper balance, and I'm committed to doing my best to find that balance. Thank you."

"No vote, brief comment. I think that I'm concerned about this bill, I'm opposing this bill, because it assumes that the Land Use Commission is a barrier to affordable housing. And I think it's not often that we see the Farm Bureau and the Sierra Club in agreement, and on this measure, they're both in opposition. So, I think that it's a signal that maybe we should reconsider the assumptions underlying this measure. *Mahalo*."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1840, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DISTRICT BOUNDARY AMENDMENTS," was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Kitagawa, LoPresti, Lowen, Marten, Matsumoto, McKelvey, and Tam voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Ganaden, Kapela, Okimoto, Perruso, Quinlan, and Wildberger voting no.

Representative Johanson, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 545-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1434, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1434, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE COUNTIES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative Johanson, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 546-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1568, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1568, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURE," was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Johanson, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 547-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1830, HD 1 be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1830, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE SELF-INSURANCE AGAINST PROPERTY AND CASUALTY RISKS," was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Johanson, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 548-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1809, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1809, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Johanson, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 549-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1811, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1811, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENERGY," was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Johanson, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 550-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2399, HD 1 be referred to the Committee on Finance

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2399, HD 1 be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative McDermott rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Okimoto rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2399, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WASTE MANAGEMENT," was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Har and Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives McDermott and Okimoto voting no.

Representative Onishi, for the Committee on Labor & Tourism, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 551-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2510, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2510, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Quinlan rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative McDermott rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition, Mr. Speaker. A living wage is a human right. According to the self-sufficiency study conducted by the Department of Business, Economic Development & Tourism, a minimum wage worker needed to earn over \$19 per hour to survive in Hawaii last year. According to the National Low Income Housing Coalition's most recent Out of Reach report, minimum wage employees must work 114 hours per week, roughly the equivalent of three full time jobs, in order to afford a one bedroom apartment here in the state.

"Last year, as working families struggled to recover financially from the pandemic, the median price of a single-family home in our state surpassed \$1 million, as property investors just continue to use our islands as their own private monopoly board. Working families need relief now. They cannot afford to wait until 2030 to earn enough money to survive, as this bill proposes.

"This isn't about money, it's about people. It's about the people in our communities, it's about the people in my community who can't afford their rent, who struggle to pay their bills, and who don't know if they're going to be able to feed their own children tonight. If we truly care about the most vulnerable members of our community, then we cannot in good conscience tell them that they have to wait another decade to earn what our own government says they needed to earn just to survive last year.

"We continuously guarantee our constituents that we will put people before profit. Now we finally have that chance. Senate Bill 2018 crossed over to the House and is waiting for action. It raises the minimum wage to \$18 per hour by 2026 and has a clean date. We should refer Senate Bill 2018 to committee. We should hear it. We should send it to the governor's desk as quickly as possible. Doing so would send a clear message that we are committed to putting people's needs before corporate greed and delivering hope to all in our state.

"I wholeheartedly support some of the tax credits and the provisions in this bill, like making the earned income tax credit permanent and refundable and increasing the food credit. Other vehicles, though, are moving through both chambers, in the House and the Senate, to address those issues, and we can pass those to deliver the tax fairness that Hawaii's people need and deserve.

"This year, let's not run away from change. Let's find the audacity to overcome political interest for the sake of the public interest. And let's act swiftly to uplift the fortunes of working families who will never attain a basic survival wage if this bill becomes law. Working families are the backbone of our economy. They deserve immediate support now, not another decade of broken promises. And that's why I'm in opposition to this bill, Mr. Speaker. Thank you."

Representative Takumi rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Well, first I'd like to incorporate the words of the speaker from the Big Island as if they were my own, but I vote in support. The working people of the state deserve a significant pay raise. I know that there's some pressure to vote with reservations and no on this, but the way I see a vote on second reading, Mr. Speaker, is that we're voting on whether or not to send this bill on to the next committee. And I have faith in the process and in my colleagues in the Finance Committee that they're going to improve this bill.

"There are some really good things in here that I couldn't in good conscience vote against. The refundable earned income tax credit, in part two. The expansion of the food tax credit in part three. Part four I think needs the most work, I agree SB 2018 would be much better, and I fully expect, again, the Finance Committee will help improve this part of the bill. I also expect if, Mr. Speaker, if this bill moves over to the Senate, that they'll probably substitute part four with what they put in SB 2018. Part five expands the eligibility for household independent tax credit. That's great. Part six helps to educate citizens about withholding options so you don't need a Ph.D. in economics and taxes to understand how taxes work and how you can save your family money.

"For these sorts of reasons, I think this bill takes concrete steps to improve the quality of life for working families, and I cannot in good conscience vote against a minimum wage increase. Thank you."

Representative Ganaden rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tam rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Wildberger rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support, please, brief comment. As many of you know, I've championed a \$15 minimum wage since I came to the House in 2019. I had high hopes that my story as a small business owner already paying that wage since 2015 would help move this issue. Well, albeit late to the game and behind the market, I'm thrilled to see this body endeavoring to bring higher wages, not just \$15 an hour, but \$18 an hour, eventually to working families across the state.

"In Hawaii, we have arguably the highest cost of living. It's exacerbated by the pandemic impacts for the last two years. This wage relief, combined with the refundable earned income tax credit, will be a welcome step up for struggling families trying to make ends meet. Thanks, Mr. Speaker."

Representative D. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, comments. So, I've heard a lot of criticisms on this bill from both sides. There are hopes for me that we can fix some of the problems with this bill by amending it in future committees. So, I take a similar

position to some of the prior speakers that let's try to get this through and see if we can fix some of the issues, like not doing it until 2030 to get to \$18, a dollar a year for eight years, I think we can do better than that.

"Also, maybe not the same increase for the tip credit, which allows sub-minimum wage to be paid to tip-receiving employees. And also take a look at increases where we've adjusted that to only increase the wage based on average wages that employers might decide to pay, rather than the CPI, which reflects actual cost of living for people.

"So, these are all issues that hopefully we can address with future amendments. I'm just kind of realistic on it that we have far less ambitious wage bills in the non-election year that were not passed. This is our chance to get it, when we're trying to do bills like this in election year, I think we take what we got here. So, that's the basis for my support for this. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition with brief comments. In my view, this vote is about trust. Over the last several years, as long as I've been in office and prior to that, working class people in Hawaii have been hurting. And throughout this time period, they have continued to put their trust in us. And on Opening Day, we as a body really stood before the people of Hawaii and committed to fight for them, by making the EITC refundable and permanent and by raising the minimum wage to 2018. They heard our promises. My community heard our promises, and they're trusting us to make good on those promises.

"I think to operate in good faith, we really need to radically amend this bill so that these changes happen sooner. The expectation of my community is not that they would have to wait until 2030. I think for that reason, this bill threatens to betray the trust that my community has put in me.

"I agree with previous speakers. This bill does make important steps in the right direction around EITC, making it refundable and permanent. But I just think we have to go further, and we have to do better, and we can. So, I trust that the House will be the body that comes up with the best measure for the State of Hawaii, and this bill is not it. For that reason, I vote in opposition."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I have a with reservations and a brief comment. Mr. Speaker, we tend to treat something the way we call it. If this is a living wage, it's too low. If it's a training wage, it's too high. What's the reality here? Well, the reality is, if you listen to what the Chamber of Commerce and the Retail Merchants have said, hey guys, the timing is not good. We're basically surviving and now we want to hit them with a minimum wage.

"Now remember, for those of you who think of only the employer as the bad guys, they are the ones who hire the people that give us wages. Our economy is 30% government, about 70% private sector. So, we got to keep the private sector alive. So, we got to know what the timing is. The second thing is, if we're going to have young high school kids starting out at \$18, some of these guys are just going to shed employees or they're not going to hire them or they're going to cut back hours of some. The point is, they've got to survive, they have to adjust, and right now they're having the most difficult time to survive.

"Some people tend to forget also that we have mandated health care, Mr. Speaker. That adds \$3 to \$4 per hour. Right now, according to the highest paid minimum wage in the nation is Washington, D.C., at \$15.20. New York City is \$15. If we take ours to \$3 to \$4 to \$5 on top of our minimum wage, we are, without even this bill, one of the highest, if not the highest in the nation because most states don't have mandatory health care. That is a very key issue.

"But Mr. Speaker, let me back up and look at really the wide angle of what we're talking about. I was particularly impressed with the Big Island Representative's speech. What we have is a failure of this economy to meet the needs of our people. If we are the progenitors or the architects of the economy, we have failed, Mr. Speaker. Forty-eight percent of our people, and I said earlier the ALICE study, I just can't get that out of my system, 48% are one paycheck away. I make it as a metaphor of the family of eight.

This guy's got a job, he's got eight kids, three he can feed okay, two are on rations, and the other three are totally food bank or welfare.

"Our economy doesn't fit the size of the needs of our families. We've got to work on economic diversification. We've got to work on higher jobs. And I've said so many times on this floor, we have the opportunity to create a pharmaceutical industry with high paying jobs that does COVID-19 testing, and we've kind of sat on our hands. You've got to be a bit more entrepreneurial. You've got to be a bit more sympathetic to those who don't have the wages per hour to do have the wages per hour.

"And lastly, Mr. Speaker, I would say in all humility, we as representatives make \$32 an hour, and that's certainly something that's not in this bill, but it is one of the statistics. So, \$15.20 DC, \$15 for New York City, and probably the equivalent in Honolulu with health benefits. Thank you."

Representative McDermott rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, just to amplify my reservations, I don't want them to be construed as any way negatively towards the Chair, I know he's trying to find a balance and strike and even temper. And so, my reservation was simply for me to tag it and keep an eye on it as it makes its way through. I know the Chair and the committee are doing the best they can. Thank you, sir."

Representative Okimoto rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tokioka rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I do have some concerns on this second reading bill, but if I can get permission to enter those comments into the Journal, I'll do it that way. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tokioka's written remarks are as follows:

"I rise in support, but as I've said before in the past, my major concern is the impact on the very small mom-and-pop businesses. My grave concern is the tip credit because if we fail to raise the amount, those very small mom-and-pop businesses will either 1. Shut down or 2. Pay employees under the table. Either way, it's not good for the economy."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support and would like the words of the speakers from Ewa and South Maui entered into the record as if they were my own. Hits the nail on the head insofar as how I feel with this vehicle moving forward. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Wildberger rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, one more brief comment. I would just like the record to show that benefits are not wages. People cannot pay their rent or buy groceries with benefits. Businesses have been paying prepaid healthcare for over 50 years. Just like work comp, it's a cost of doing business. You cannot call benefits wages. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2510, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INCOME," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Matsumoto, McDermott, Tam, and Ward voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Ganaden, Har, Kapela, Okimoto, Perruso, Quinlan, and Takumi voting no.

Representative Onishi, for the Committee on Labor & Tourism, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 552-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2440, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2440, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO

PUBLIC WORKS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Morikawa, seconded by Representative Matsumoto and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering a certain House Bill for Third Reading by consent calendar.

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 2272, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 2272, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative LoPresti rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Strong support. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I think this is a really important measure, and actually, I should ask for a ruling on a potential conflict, I apologize. I'm the president of a homeowner association," and the Chair ruled, "no conflict," and that the ruling would extend through *sine die*.

Representative LoPresti continued to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thanks. The reason I stand up on this, Mr. Speaker, is I think this is one of the most important actual affordable housing bills we're going to pass, I hope, out of the Legislature this year. Because what it does is it requires developers to do a study to determine what the real cost of the housing is going to be. There's been so many projects, in fact, I can't think of a single project in the history of the state where the developers have done a really good job of estimating for the consumer what it's going to cost to own a unit when it's a condo or a townhome like where I live. Because inevitably what happens, Mr. Speaker, is when those associations are turned over to the people who live there and not just run by the developer, the prices skyrocket, the prices skyrocket because there were bad estimates, if we can even call them estimates, as to what it would really cost for maintenance fees and the like. And I believe this bill will help to address that.

"One of the things I'd like to see improved before this passes into law, and I hope the Senate looks at this in particular, is that it can be greatly improved if we require an independent third party to make those estimates. Otherwise, we might be setting ourselves up to have another bill a few years down the road when perhaps an unscrupulous developer, such things are fictions, but they might just make up numbers that qualify and meet some loophole in this law, but really fail to meet the intent of the law. So, I do hope that the Senate and that our House colleagues can make sure that it's an independent third-party review and not just something by the developer. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2272, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONDOMINIUM ASSOCIATIONS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

At 12:43 p.m., the Chair noted that the following bill passed Third Reading:

H.B. No. 2272, HD 1

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

The following resolution (H.R. No. 9) was announced by the Clerk and the following action taken:

H.R. No. 9, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING A COMMISSION TO IMPROVE STANDARDS OF CONDUCT," was jointly offered by Representatives Saiki, Aquino, Belatti, Branco, Clark, Eli, Ganaden, Gates, Hashem, Hashimoto, Holt, Ichiyama, Ilagan, Johanson, Kapela, Kitagawa, B. Kobayashi, LoPresti, Lowen, Luke, Marten, Matayoshi, Matsumoto, McKelvey, Mizuno, Morikawa, Nakamura, Nakashima, Nishimoto, Ohno, Okimoto, Onishi, Perruso, Quinlan, Sayama, Takayama, Takumi, Tam, Tarnas, Todd, Woodson, Yamane, and Yamashita.

Representative Belatti moved that H.R. No. 9 be adopted, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I just wanted to say that I support this resolution. I think it's really important that we create this commission, this external commission, and I have a lot of confidence in the people who have been named to it, and I'm excited to examine their findings."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I have a yes vote with a couple of comments, which means with reservations. This bill is very, very, very needed. It's very timely. We have been embarrassed by what happened last week and the week before, in which actually started years and years ago.

"But this is the equivalent of having a commission that says, look, when you see a car thief, they walk by a car and the keys are in the car. We only then look at the car thief as the issue, the behavior of the car thief. This commission is going to look at behavior and what the structure is, but I think we need to look at what is it when the structure of the situation, i.e. the keys are in the car, that we need to pay attention to also.

"And Mr. Speaker, I do this with all respect, that the structure of our committee system that concentrates, and this is a bit of what Gary Hooser said, concentrates power in so few people, is when you have a committee chairmanship, look at the people who got the corruption charges. They were in those positions because there was no accountability or check and balance to them. And there is discipline where you don't want to lose the size of your office or the position that you have, that's I know too much inside baseball, but the public needs to know this.

"And particularly the last issue that I would say that should be amended into this bill, is that the way that we're doing our hearings almost conditioning testifiers to stand on their testimony because we want to get through it quickly. But if you're a member of the public, you don't get any testimony until the hearing is over and then you can see it. And if everybody stands on their testimony, even we legislators don't get the testimony until 10 minutes before the hearings."

The Chair addressed Representative Ward, stating:

"Alright Representative Ward, please confine your remarks to the resolution."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"So, I'm saying that that is a flaw. Which means, okay, the guy who steals the car, you've got to teach them ethics. You've got to pump it into their system to be more accountable. But if you've got the structure of the situation where it makes these temptations happen, we're looking at only some of the symptoms rather than the cause. And that's the structure of our system needs to be more open to the public. It needs to be more transparent and accountable. If there was accountability, that would be it. And I know this is going to address that, but it's not the full picture because it says you've got to teach the thief in the car not to steal the car if the keys are in it. And I'm saying you've got to look at the keys in the car. And this bill does not go that far. Therefore, it's good, but it's with a lot of flaws. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose to respond, stating:

"I just wanted to point out that this resolution does call upon the commission to provide recommendations to further the goals of the Code of Ethics, lobbying laws, campaign finance laws, and other applicable laws and rules. So, I think that it's important that we understand that our internal rules will also be subject to scrutiny, and I think that's really important and I think that that actually reflects a great deal of courage on the part of the House leadership and I applaud that. So, I look forward to pretty substantive recommendations."

Representative D. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you. Support with reservations. So, to take the example by the Representative from Hawaii Kai one step further, to me, this is more a

situation of we're focused on stopping people from stealing cars while we have a state-sanctioned program that allows widespread theft of cars. So, we work on the margins about how to react to a situation where we have a couple of reps that were accused of taking money under the table.

"Now what happens every day, which is really the elephant in the room to me and it's completely legal, is for people to give large campaign contributions, either personally, through PACs, through every relative they have, through the employees of their company, to politicians that can then legally take whatever action to support that donor. Now that is where pay for play and money in politics comes from. I think everybody knows that.

"So, if we want to address the real issue, say we had campaign contribution limit of \$20, \$100. Problem solved, money is out of politics, pay for play is over. So, there are obvious prescriptions to fix this, and I wish we would start taking a harder look at those. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I want to commend the person from Wahiawa, the representative who said, well, we're going to look at our House Rules. My point is to look at the House structure. And Mr. Speaker, some of us were here in the early '90s when, some of you freshmen will be shocked at this, we didn't have voting in committees. There was no voting in this legislature. I mean, it shows how far we've come, but how much the power has been so centralized, and the accountability has been lessened. And because of that, that's what happened in these last two instances of corruption. The point is, look at the structure of the situation, function, and design, and all those things make a huge difference as to the way people behave.

"Having said that, Mr. Speaker, I would hope what the good Representative from Wahiawa said is true and we will look at the structure of the Legislature, we'll look at the way hearings are held, we'll look at the way the people are not really involved to the point of having immediate information to give feedback to the issues at hand in the hearings. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you. I'd like to adopt the words of the speaker from Manoa as if they were my own. And I totally agree with him. And actually, there are vehicles, Mr. Speaker, I think in JHA right now, that would provide an avenue to actually put some of these discussions into motion. So, I hope that gets considered, with all due blessing from my end, obviously, and because I believe there are things we can do now rather than waiting for a commission to make recommendations. But that being said, I support the measure."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 9 was adopted, with Representatives D. Kobayashi and Ward voting aye with reservations.

By unanimous consent, the following concurrent resolution (H.C.R. No. 11) was referred to Printing and further action was deferred:

H.C.R. So, contrary to the fact that it's expensive, even with the tax credit, even though I know that's not on this particular bill, we have a ratio for every dollar that the state spends, we get \$4 to \$5 back because of the labor and all the expenses that we are having been paid by the industry. So, this is a moneymaker.

"And Mr. Speaker, even if you're just, I forget what they call him, a grabber, you carry the camera around, you're making \$75,000 to \$85,000.

These are the kind of jobs that we need to get out of that ALICE study where 48% of the people in Hawaii are one paycheck away. This is a great bill, and I look forward to everybody voting for it. Thank you."

This measure is yet another product of cooperation between government advocates, the commission, and the Legislature, and illustrates that immediate action is already occurring."

However, Mr. Speaker, due to advances such as IaaS, there is a depth of cloud resources for both storage and enumeration of these meetings as to create meaningful compendium of all of the various government and public hearings that have occurred which have been recorded."

However, I believe the change we made to ensure that it only applies to nonprofits that have filed a report with the campaign spending commission will limit its scope to political PACs as opposed to that of other types of nonprofits. This measure also showcases the things that are being done by this legislature to bolster transparency and accountability thereby bolstering public support."

Representative Gates's written remarks are as follows:

"I stand with reservations on HB 1570, HD1. As we have seen with previous bans throughout history, blanket bans do not necessarily stop our constituents from finding ways to purchase things like flavored vapes. With minors not allowed to purchase flavored tobacco products, they unfortunately resort to the black market which are substantially more dangerous to the end user. Black markets will continue to sell prohibited products, which is why I am in support of placing taxes on these items for the funding of cessation programs to help those with smoking addictions."

We shouldn't have to do it separately, and we shouldn't have to have a bill like this. Because of that, I have reservations, because the local banks are making a lot of money on this and they should be able to put this pCard in there without any inconvenience whatsoever. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative D. Kobayashi rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in opposition. So, I think it's framed as really a buy local issue. Really what it is, is what we've been talking about, it's a giveaway to some local moneyed interests here that's really not in the interests of the taxpayers of Hawaii. As a result, I'm a no vote on this measure. Thank you."

Representative Wildberger rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support with a brief comment. The agency that awarded this contract to the Bank of America testified that they did not know that the Bank of America owes the State of Hawaii and the people of Hawaii hundreds of millions of dollars due to bad mortgage practices. And while I like to see state agencies saving money and that not necessarily a local bank should be given priority over another bank that can provide electronic services that could save the state money, at what point do we declare an entity unqualified for such benefit if they have been a bad actor? Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1909, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROCUREMENT," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Ward voting aye with reservations, with Representative D. Kobayashi voting no, and with Representatives Eli and Kapela being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 741-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1567, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1567, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in strong opposition. Mr. Speaker, this is the no bail bill, this is the get out of jail free bill, and this is a killer bill. Mr. Speaker, this is why the lady was bludgeoned outside of the courthouse in Kapolei just a few weeks ago. This is somebody who committed a crime against a policeman then turned around, got let out without any bail, turned around with the club, basically said it was the trunk of a tree, and bludgeoned a woman. This is what this bill does, it'll allow these guys to go out scot-free.

"Mr. Speaker, this is not the policy we want to have. Crime is on the uptick. People need to know that we are protected, that there's safety and we're not soft on crime. And this is probably the worst possible thing that we're learning from the mainland, that it's happening time and time again. That with no bail, you got no skin in the game. And no skin in the game means you go out and you do anything you want to do.

"Now, having said that, I brought this up in committee, and Kat Brady, and all of you know who Kat Brady is, she said, actually, we have a promissory note. A thing that you can sign if you can't afford bail, you just do an IOU. So, Mr. Speaker, this bill is not necessary. It's contrary to all civilized society. And in terms of the Pavlovian cause and effect, stimulus and response, this incentivizes these people, particularly when we see smash and grab in any and all things happening in this nation. This is bad news, this is a bad bill, Mr. Speaker. Thank you."

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, Mr. Speaker. Okay, so first of all, it's very clear in the bill that if you are a violent offender, this does not apply to you in any way, shape, or form, including if you are on parole or a number of other factors are taken into account. But really, I want to speak to why this bill is important. In this country and in this state, it is possible to go to jail for traffic offenses. So, we've essentially done, imagine this, you're a low-income person, you're driving your car, you get pulled over by the police for speeding but you're also uninsured. And then things happen, life happens, you miss your court date, now you've got a bench warrant out for your arrest. So you get picked up another time because you're riding dirty because you can't afford to get your tags fixed, you can't afford to pay your registration, and now you've got a bench warrant out for your arrest and now you're going to jail. So, what we've essentially done is criminalized poverty. Thank you very much."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, regarding my good friend from the North Shore, I think he's very good at the euphemism that this is. Mr. Speaker, this is a bill that basically, because we're so full in our prisons, it's a money saver. We're jeopardizing the safety of the public by saying, hey, we don't want to spend money on a new prison, we don't want to spend money on keeping the prisoners in there. This is simply a cost-cutting mechanism. And if you look at all the literature, that's basically the only theme that consistently puts this together. This crying for the victim or for the poor guy who does all of these felony things, that's all nonsense. This is simply about saving money, taking the overcrowding, and endangering the public. It's that simple. It's that all about the Benjamins, it's about the money. Thank you."

At this time, the Chair stated:

"Okay thank you Representative, and members, again, please focus on the merits of the bill. Why is this bill good for the state or why is this bill bad for the state."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. I'd first like the words of the Representative from the North Shore entered into the record as they were my own. And I would just like to say to speaker that the last time I checked in this country, someone is innocent until proven guilty," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Lowen's written remarks are as follows:

"Kona coffee is a world-renowned specialty product grown on Hawaii Island, with a rich cultural legacy that is entwined with Hawaii's history. Kona coffee is difficult to farm, limited in quantity, expensive, and special. Other regions, other states, and other countries don't allow what we allow here. They observe strong protections of their geographic origin names which guarantee the quality and authenticity of their regional products—Idaho potatoes cannot be called Idaho potatoes if they are not actually 100% Idaho potatoes; the same applies for Vermont maple syrup, and France's Champagne wine, to name a few. Not so in Hawaii, where we allow our valuable geographic origin names to be used to market products as being something that they are not. The geographic origin name for a specialty product like Kona Coffee should not be used on products that aren't representative of the region, that don't reflect the quality or the value that people expect, and that contain only 10% Kona Coffee.

"Under Hawaii law, we allow coffee blends that contain only 10% Kona coffee—one coffee bean in 10—an amount that cannot be detected in a blind taste test—to be sold under the name Kona. The labeling law requires that the '10%' is disclosed on the label, and some argue that the important thing is truth in labeling, and that consumers know what they are buying. But the reality is that we know that these labels mislead people—if they didn't, they wouldn't be used. That is the point—to use the name Kona or Kau or Hawaii on coffee that is 90% not that, and to sell it for more. The deception is the point: to allow this exploitation of the good reputation of real Hawaii coffee to increase the amount of money that blenders can make on cheap, imported coffee beans by passing them off as a boutique product from Hawaii. While this increases profits for coffee importers, it undercuts the price of authentic locally grown coffee beans, reduces revenues for hard-working local farmers, and exports the economic benefits of our coffee industry out of state instead of keeping dollars in the local economy.

"House Bill 1517 proposes to increase the percentage requirement from 10% to 51%. For many years we've fought to get 100%, so this bill represents a compromise reached in hopes of moving the needle in the right direction. During the hearings that this bill has had thus far in the 2022 legislative session, every farmer that submitted testimony was in support—all of them. Opposition came from mainland-owned blenders ('Hawaii

Coffee Company') and greedy retailers and restaurants who want to be able to offer a product that looks like it is locally produced, and to claim that they are an establishment that supports local farmers, without having to pay the higher cost to actually support local farmers. It is time that the Legislature listens to the farmers about what is best for them, and not to other entities with their own self-interest in mind who claim to be able to tell us what they think is best for farmers.

"The opponents of the changes to our origin labeling laws have made the fallacious argument that inflation and rising costs for consumers mean that we should not pass this bill. We, the State Legislature, do not have an obligation to make a specialty product (which isn't even authentic) affordable over helping the local farmers that grow it. While the Legislature does have a duty to ensure that our citizens have access to food, water, shelter, and many other things, gourmet specialty coffee isn't on that list. The Legislature has an obligation to support our local farmers, not to undercut them with a state law that devalues their authentic locally grown products.

"Coffee importers also sometimes argue that should they stop buying Kona coffee for blends, coffee cherry will go unsold and unused. However, we have seen this disproven over the past couple years. The pandemic led to a huge drop in the sale of blends due to a lack of tourists, yet coffee cherry prices are at their highest point ever, and demand has not decreased. The market for Hawaii coffee has changed dramatically over the last two decades and many growers are now able to sell their crops direct-to-consumer via online sales. The worldwide demand for 100% Kona coffee far exceeds supply and the value of the crop is at a record high. Hawaii's coffee farmers have among the highest cost of production anywhere, particularly due to labor shortages, inflationary pressures, and the threat of invasive species on the island. Inflation, supply chain issues, labor shortages—these are all arguments for why our farmers need our support more than ever, not arguments for why we should continue to allow 10% blends that benefit retailers, restaurants, and blenders who are only interested in their bottom line.

"Questions were also raised this year about challenges with enforcement and the lack of technological capacity in the state to test roasted and blended coffees to determine authenticity. Enforcement of coffee blend laws is not dependent on DNA or other testing technology—there are ways to determine if coffee counterfeiting is occurring without these tests. Furthermore, simply passing any law that increases the minimum percentage will have a huge effect on the market regardless of enforcement capacity, because all but a few bad actors will choose to comply with the law, and won't risk the consequences of breaking it. So, while the Legislature should also support funding of additional staff and equipment to facilitate enforcement of coffee labeling laws, lack of enforcement capacity is not a valid argument against passing a stronger law; it is a red herring.

"Coffee labeling bills have been introduced and have failed to pass the Legislature for decades now. Some of my colleagues now roll their eyes and say 'this, again?' and crack jokes about the coffee bill. Their attitudes teach the new members—wrongly—that this isn't an issue worth taking seriously. However, the truth is that the Legislature has failed for so many years to act in the best interest of local farmers, to support Hawaii-grown products, and to protect our local economy. It's time to do more than just talk about the value of supporting local agriculture. It's time for this legislation to be passed."

She said, this is something that would help protect me. So, for the women and for those who are subject to working late at night are in the streets, this bill says, you know, anywhere nearing public transportation, any public building, even this building, our parking lot, electric tasers would not be useful.

"So, I think we're doing kind of an overkill. We're trying to do with electric tasers, which is now legal, the same that we've done with arms. And I think that's going to be very unfair to those who are vulnerable, who are having predators and other people who they can actually push back if they have this, or they don't have this bill, but they've got the taser where they can actually use it. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"Mr. Speaker, in support. I know it surprises a lot of people that I support this bill, but it's from personal experience and I feel I owe my constituents and my colleagues an explanation. For me, it has to do with personal experiences of attempted violence against me and my family members. The current law requires you to retreat, and in each of the situations where I've found myself in situations of potential violence, I've been able to do that. I have self-defense training, I know that's the wisest thing to do, and I was able to do it. But it's not always the case that people can do that.

"This is especially the case in situations if you can think of a lone female being assaulted. The law requires her to potentially retreat. And the fact of the matter is, if that's a situation that you can imagine, you can also imagine that person is going to be followed and be in a more vulnerable situation in retreating.

"That's exactly what happened to me and my wife in Chinatown a few years ago. There was an attempted mugging next to the police station. I was literally touching the police station and a guy came up and tried to mug us. And without getting into the details on the Floor of the House, the safest thing for me to do in that situation would have been to physically, actively defend myself, and I'll tell you why. Because we did retreat into the police station, the guy followed us into the police station and continued trying to press his assault. At which point I had to very clearly demonstrate to them that he was surrounded by police officers. They were all behind the glass. And he finally came to and realized where he was and that's why he left. Now imagine if I'd gone into a 7-Eleven instead of a bodega or a restaurant,

the guy would have continued to press this assault and we would have been cornered.

"There are situations where we need to be able to help people know that they have a strong right to self-defense. That they don't have to run away and cower because they might be prosecuted for simply standing up for themselves, their family, defending their children. That's happened to me at a public park where a group of guys tried to come at me with my kids. It's one thing when I'm by myself and I have to defend myself, but when you're with family or with friends or with children, you need to have a much stronger protection so that you're not thinking about, well, what am I legally allowed and not allowed to do in this situation? But you can act in the right way for that situation.

"This is not a shoot first bill. Hawaii does not have the same epidemic of gun violence that we have in the mainland. If we did, I wouldn't support this bill. If we had laws that allowed everybody to go around concealed carry, then this could be potentially very dangerous. But it's not that, it's something that I think has been blown out of proportion when you look at the actual kinds of gun violence in our state versus the mainland. I don't suspect we're going to have the same problems that we've seen elsewhere. That's why I support it. Thank you."

Representative Tam: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Friends, many of you may be distressed, as I am, about the recent events in Ukraine. As many of you may know, sunflowers are the national flower of Ukraine, and they also represent peace and hope and are a symbol of strength and endurance. To show our solidarity and support for the Ukrainian people, our office would like to share sunflowers with each of you to display outside of your office. They are grown locally and organically in Waimanalo. As we navigate our busy work schedules, I hope these sunflowers add a bit of light and joy to your day and serve as a reminder to keep the people of Ukraine in your thoughts. So, please stop by our office in Room 317 to pick up one."

Representative Eli: "*Mahalo*. I wanted to congratulate our colleague, the Representative from Kaneohe. Yesterday, he and his wife welcomed a healthy baby boy, Connor George Matayoshi. So, just wanted to congratulate he and his wife."

Representative Yamane: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just wanted to acknowledge that it was brought to my attention from the young representative to my left that today is Girls' Day. So hopefully I can speak on behalf of all men to all the women who once were girls, Happy Girls' Day. And for everybody here that, if it wasn't for a woman, you wouldn't be here today. Thank you."

Representative Marten: "I just wanted to wish a Happy Birthday to the Chair of Agriculture."

Representative Matsumoto: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Speaking of Girls' Day, it's that time again, the Women's Legislative Caucus Easter Basket Drive. So we're going to be donating to the same four organizations, the Domestic Violence Action Center, IHS, Parents And Children Together, and the Salvation Army. So, you can do a hybrid again. You can either donate money virtually on their individual sites or you can put together a basket. The event is actually going to be on April 7th, but I always like to give people a lot of heads up to start putting their baskets together. So, there will be a flyer in each of your emails today, so please check that out."

Vice Speaker Mizuno: "I did have a question, Representative, if I may, who's going to be the Easter Bunny this year?"

Representative Matsumoto: "That one's still under wraps. That's going to be coming up. There will be some videos leading up to the event and you can all guess at that point."

Representative Ward: "I have two announcements. Good news, bad news. No, great news. I'm very honored to say, and I know many of you heard me speak on the floor. The FDA has approved Oceanit, Patrick Sullivan, spit in the cup, after two years of trying hard. Now the gates are open for a spit in the cup 10-minute test, \$20. Well, hopefully it's going to be on the shelves soon in Longs and CVS and Walgreens, *et cetera*."

"The bad news. All of you know, the pincer movement in Ukraine has begun. The suffering among the Ukrainians is severe. So, in addition to the great gesture of putting sunflower in your front office, also come by my office and get a flag. This is something we've printed up and something that I think will show our solidarity. And for all of those who are drinkers of vodka, please don't drink Russian vodka. Thank you."

Vice Speaker Mizuno: "Thank you, Representative Ward and other members, along with Representative Tam and Representative Gates, I know there are so many other members who are working to stand in solidarity with Ukraine. Thank you so much members."

I find this really anti-business, it's something that is not worthy of this office. Thank you."

And my concern is that now Waimanalo Gulch will not be shut down, the lease will be extended because the Legislature will not allow us to have any place where the City and County can site a new landfill. So, for those reasons, I'm with reservations. Thank you."

No. 2229, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COASTAL EROSION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Kapela, Perruso, and Wildberger voting no, and with Representatives Matayoshi, McDermott, and Nakashima being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 905-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2276, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2276, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INVASIVE SPECIES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes, with Representatives Matayoshi, McDermott, and Nakashima being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 906-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2288, HD 2 pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2288, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Takayama rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support."

Representative B. Kobayashi rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2288, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LAND," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes, with Representatives B. Kobayashi and Takayama voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Matayoshi, McDermott, and Nakashima being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 908-22) recommending that H.B. No. 426, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 426, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Onishi rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. On this bill, I would like to see more clarity that these benefits apply to the children of residents of the State of Hawaii. So, with that, I'll be voting with reservations."

Representative Wildberger rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you. In support. I'd like to thank the committee chairs for moving this bill forward from last year, it means a lot to the service members' families who will be affected by this bill if we're to pass it. I know there's been some discussion about whether or not it's necessary because there's already federal tuition support for dependents of deceased veterans. And basically, the main goal of this bill is to broaden the scope so that dependents of combat related, 100% totally disabled veterans and Purple Heart recipients can qualify. And there is a robust residency requirement for this, and I think it's at least five years, forgive me for not having that detail. This bill was modeled after a program at Oregon State University. Many other states offer similar benefits to honor the service of those who are willing to put both their lives and their livelihoods on the line for all of us. *Mahalo.*"

Representative Marten rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations. I support the intent, but I just want to make sure it's clarified that federal funds will be used when they're applicable instead of state funds."

Representative Hashimoto rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations. I'd like to echo my colleague from Hilo in some of his concerns, I'd like to see that cleaned up as it moves along. Thank you."

Representative Branco rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations. I have the same concerns as the Representative from Hilo. *Mahalo.*"

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thanks. Reservations and comments. I have similar concerns, but my larger concern is, you can get 100% disability if you have sleep apnea. One in four respiratory claims are for a sleeping disorder. And so, I totally support the intent of it. But if you suddenly develop a sleeping disorder, now your kids get to go to college for free. And that's not what we're trying to do with this bill, I'm sure. Thank you."

Representative Tokioka rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tokioka's written remarks are as follows:

"I have always supported the military but as a representative who has introduced bills for tuition waivers at community colleges and as a Native Hawaiian who has always advocated for educational waivers for Hawaiians, I think we should start there first."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Probably not my job to do this, but I did pull up the bill, which is pretty easy to do. In support. And it does clarify that the disabilities are caused by

military service and also that these tuition benefits would apply to people who have been domiciled in the state for at least five years. So, those concerns that have been raised are actually addressed in the bill already."

Representative LoPresti rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I just want to say, well, to you, I guess, I don't know if I can say in response, is that you can actually still get a sleep apnea designation from that definition. Thank you."

Representative Holt rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2312, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PRISON REFORM," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes, with Representatives Matayoshi, McDermott, and Nakashima being excused.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 912-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1682, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Kapela rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in opposition and with a brief comment. This measure is a SPRB for a waste to energy plant. A waste to energy plant is a waste management facility that combusts waste, or burns it, to produce electricity. This type of power plant is sometimes called a trash to energy municipal waste incineration energy recovery or resource recovery plant. Waste to energy is often described as a good way to extract energy from resources, but in fact, it works against the circular economy, producing toxic waste, air pollution, and contributing to climate change, all without delivering on what it promises.

"We have to oppose incineration of all kinds. Incineration is not considered acceptable because of its adverse environmental and health effects and the destruction of materials that can be conserved while saving energy through other management methods. Incineration is a form of destructive disposal, and no type of incineration, including waste to energy and plastic to fuel, mislabeled as chemical recycling, are considered recycling.

"Furthermore, such facilities tend to be sited in disadvantaged or oftentimes Native Hawaiian communities, thus raising environmental justice issues. We, as a legislature, have a commitment to having 100% renewable energy and being a clean economy by 2045. If we are going to meet those goals, then we cannot support any type of project like this. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1682, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ISSUANCE OF SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS TO ASSIST NEXT LEVEL SOLUTIONS GROUP INC.," passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 2 noes, with Representative LoPresti voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Kapela and Perruso voting no, and with Representatives Matayoshi, McDermott, and Nakashima being excused.

But this is a half a loaf that's going to rot away and it's just going to kick the can down the mountain and we're going to come back again and again and again. Look what we've done for two years. We've sat on our hands about this issue. Mauna Kea is still a very important issue to the Hawaiian community, and all of those issues, and the scientific issues, have to be taken into consideration. So far, again, I repeat, we're kicking the can down the mountain and we're going to come back and it's going to bite us. Thank you."

Representative D. Kobayashi rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Perruso rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Wildberger rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kapela rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

I think it is very clear where we must stand, and that is why this resolution was brought forth today. This resolution is in no way targeted towards the Russian people. This resolution actually asks for the Russian government to release any Russian protesters that have been detained for exercising their right to speak.

"Although Hawaii may be a world away from this conflict, it is our moral obligation to stand with the Ukrainian people. And I want to thank you, Mr. Speaker, and this body for allowing the Chair of Culture, Arts, & International Affairs and I to introduce this resolution. Thank you."

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"In strong support, Mr. Speaker. *Slava Ukraini*."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, strong support, brief comment. Mr. Speaker, everything that President Zelenskyy said is true. The Ukrainians are resolute, they're strong, they're committed. And I have personal experience, having been at the Bush White House, working with Ukrainians on democracy and governance. I've jogged around the track in Kyiv. And everything that's going on points to either a withdrawal of the Russians or elongated urban warfare. It's unfortunate.

"So, this is a very timely piece of legislation. I commend the author for bringing it to us, for passing out sunflowers yesterday. And by the way, there's still some flags left in my office for those of you who want the Ukrainian flag. But the point is, it's very timely and it's very pointed to what otherwise we would think that people could get away in the 21st century with such behavior as this.

"And lastly, Mr. Speaker, I want to thank the CEO of Par Pacific, who if you read the Civil Beat this morning, they said that they are suspending all

petroleum oil and other products from Russia for our consumption. So, Mr. Speaker and colleagues, it looks like the price of gas will go up, but it's for a great cause for a great people. And as my colleague from the North Shore said, *Slava Ukraini*. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Gates rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. May I have permission to insert the words of the Representative from Waikiki into the Journal as if they were my own. And I want to thank this House for standing with the people of Ukraine. As we know, it's a travesty what's going on there, humanitarian crisis. And even though it may not be so close to home, we know that it's affecting us across the board, whether it's through economy, through our gas prices, or just the hurt and pain that our residents are feeling for the people of Ukraine. Thank you, Mr. Speaker," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Branco rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"In strong support. Many of you know, I served as a U.S. diplomat prior, defending American values across in the most volatile regions across the world. Whether I was in Venezuela or whether I was in Colombia or Pakistan, there was always one pervasive factor working against our diplomatic efforts, and that was Russia.

"I experienced Russia's antagonistic influence directly when we received information, when I was in the Special Representative for Afghanistan and Pakistan's Office, that Russia was paying bounties to the Taliban for the killing of American soldiers. And experienced it again while stationed in Venezuela and saw Russia's financial and military aid thwart a popular uprising that just barely failed to oust the brutal dictator Nicolas Maduro from power.

"The world is witnessing a new Russian-made crisis. Putin now intends to attempt to seize key population centers, decapitate Ukraine's government, and install his own handpicked regime in its place. Putin is attempting to upend the post-Cold War order and has plunged Europe into its gravest security crisis since World War II. For those of us living in Hawaii, it may be tempting to think, why should I care about a conflict happening almost 8,000 miles away, halfway around the world. Members, I'm telling you, it's imperative that we do.

"Ukraine is fighting to enjoy the same basic rights that Americans are promised at birth. Free speech, security in a democratic society, and equal protection under the law. Ukraine's courage to defend its democracy threatens despots like Putin. And if the United States does not respond vigorously to Russia's attack, it would only embolden other adversaries around the world to challenge the delicate global security order. Given Hawaii's strategic position in the Pacific, this would put our state at particular risk.

"While cyberattacks originating from Russia are a daily reality for American businesses and government agencies, the Department of Homeland Security has warned that we should be on heightened alert and be prepared for potentially crippling Russian cyberattacks. Everything from power grids to internet service and air travel. Hawaii is no stranger to these kinds of attacks. Just a couple of months ago, cyber attackers shut down three of Hawaii's government systems, and Hawaiian Electric reports they are attacked by hackers originating from Russia almost daily.

"This crisis is still developing, and the situation on the ground is going to change quickly. Russia's disinformation campaigns will go into overdrive, and it's more important than ever to only trust information that is verified and reported by trusted sources. Just as we are sending our prayers to the people of Ukraine, we must also send our prayers to the Russian people. Let's remember that this is not the Russian people's war, this is Putin's premeditated and unprovoked attack.

"While no one knows how this crisis will be resolved, it is important that we put our political differences aside and come together as Americans to stand for our values and our allies' struggles for freedom. The peace, safety, and livelihood of millions depend on it. Thank you."

Representative B. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. I'd like to remind people that Hawaii has had Ukrainian immigrants from over 100 years ago. Before and after 1900, there were two groups of Ukrainians, one approximately 600 people, who came to work at the sugar plantations. In addition to those people who worked at the sugar plantations, there were individuals from Ukraine that came to Hawaii. One very notable family, the Lui-Kwan family from Hilo with 11 siblings, has a grandmother from Kyiv. So, the world is small. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I am in strong support of this resolution. And I just wanted to encourage this body at this moment to do the difficult work of critical self-reflection about American military intervention in other countries. And I look forward to similar kinds of opposition from this body to those kinds of interventions. *Mahalo*."

Representative D. Kobayashi rose to speak in opposition to both measures, stating:

"Speak in opposition. I've heard all the comments, valid comments from a lot of my colleagues on this issue, if you replaced in all of these comments the country of Russia with the United States, and Ukraine with any of these countries, Syria, Iraq, Afghanistan, Libya, Yemen, Somalia, or Pakistan, you would also have valid statements. Our country, in an average year recently, has dropped 26,000 bombs on other countries of this planet. That's an average of 72 bombs a day, average of three bombs an hour.

"So, my criticism is not in saying what the Russian government is doing is improper, but I just have not seen similar resolutions condemning us for our military aggression as the United States, the country that Martin Luther King Jr. describes as the greatest purveyor of death and destruction and war in the history of the world. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, second time in support. First to request the remarks of the Representative from Kailua and Waikiki be entered into the Journal as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"And then I would add, one of the implications that we've not spoke of, but I think the last two speakers are oblivious of the role of America in keeping the peace in the world, is that when Xi Jinping looks at Taiwan and sees what Putin did to Ukraine, this is going to come close to us. If Taiwan is attacked, Okinawa and a lot of the Pacific Islands are not going to be safe.

"This is real politics, this is not love America, hate America, this is about the reality of those guys who have got power and what they'll do with it. And remember, America, if we weren't in World War II, we would have land in Asia, we'd have land in Europe, if we were not the peacekeepers. So, we have a big role to play.

"Don't blame your government, blame people who are asleep in what the reality is of what Putin is going to do and what Xi Jinping, for the last 20 years, has also had his eyes on Taiwan the way Putin has had his eyes since 1991, when Ukraine became an independent country. So, let us wake up America, let us wake up Hawaii. Be attentive to our good brothers and sisters in Taiwan, maybe the next target. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you. In strong support. While this isn't the place to debate American foreign policy, I do reject the shocking, utterly shocking equivocation stated earlier by a couple of colleagues. But my main concern for history with this crisis is, I teach political science, among other things, and one of the things that my students and I discussed last week when this invasion began is the historical consequences for nuclear proliferation.

"In the 1990s, Ukraine gave up its nuclear weapons, in part to demonstrate that a smaller country doesn't need nuclear weapons to survive. And they gave them back up to Russia. And the idea was that the international community was going to stand by them and help protect them. And sadly, that has not come to pass. And also sadly and dangerously, the lesson to be

taken by other smaller nations in the future is perhaps that they'll need to maintain their nuclear arsenal to prevent this sort of aggression in the future. And so even if, God willing, things work out somehow with this current crisis, future states will look back and try to learn the lessons that perhaps they should maintain their weapons.

"I participated with many of my colleagues in visiting our sister state, Hiroshima, a few years back. And I got to visit ground zero of one of the nuclear bombs that went off there and the horrible devastation that that has wrought. And it's led me to commit myself to try to do things to help prevent nuclear proliferation. And if anything, that should have been included in this. Sorry, I'm a little emotional. Very strong support. Thank you."

Representative Tokioka rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you. In support. And I think by Par doing what they did sends a clear message to everyone in the state, and I think we can all do our little part. If anybody, which I highly doubt in this body, eats beluga caviar, then don't purchase it, or Russian vodka, don't purchase it. We can send messages that way as well. So, thank you for the authors who drafted the resolution and I'm in strong support."

Representative Wildberger rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support. Thanks to the two reps that put this resolution together. And I hope that people in charge of airspace are making sure that oligarch types are not coming into Hawaii by private aircraft. It's much too easy to leave anywhere around the Pacific and fly into Hawaii without a whole lot of notice, especially into Maui, where we have high end resorts that attract that ilk. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 28 and H.C.R. No. 32 were adopted, with Representative D. Kobayashi voting no, and with Representatives Matayoshi, McDermott, and Nakashima being excused.

"PROPOSING AMENDMENTS TO ARTICLE VII, SECTIONS 12 AND 13, OF THE HAWAII CONSTITUTION TO EXPRESSLY PROVIDE THAT THE LEGISLATURE MAY AUTHORIZE THE COUNTIES TO ISSUE TAX INCREMENT BONDS AND TO EXCLUDE TAX INCREMENT BONDS FROM DETERMINATIONS OF THE FUNDED DEBT OF THE COUNTIES."

Said measure passed Third Reading in the Hawaii House of Representatives on this date.

They were formed as a very responsive entrepreneur, Cliff Slater, very conscientious citizen. And I'm afraid that if we don't grandfather these guys in, this is like knocking out Chanel or knocking out Bvlgari or any of those really serious top-class designers. Mr. Speaker, I don't think it's fair to Maui Divers that's been around for 70 years or so that we suddenly should just zap them out. We have to protect our coral, but we also have to protect our businesses. And they hire dozens of people, and for dozens of years, they've been an integral part of our community. So if we're eliminating them with this bill, I would ask for further consideration by the ongoing committees that they look at this as a way of at least grandfathering those that were in business doing this before 1960 or 1990 or something to that effect. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Branco rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. To the comments from the Representative from Hawaii Kai, this bill is not about stopping industry. There is an exemption in the bill. In order for companies to harvest black coral, pink coral, gold coral, they need a state-issued permit from DLNR. In the bill, state-issued permits are exempted. So, this is not about killing business, this is about protecting our coral and understanding business as well. *Mahalo.*"

Representative Johanson, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 932-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2280, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2280, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Har rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. May I request a ruling on a potential conflict? I live in a planned community association," and the Chair ruled, "no conflict," and that the ruling would extend through *sine die*.

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2280, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REAL PROPERTY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

Representative Johanson, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 933-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2028, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2028, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Nakashima rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support of 933. Mr. Speaker, although the Department of Health emphasizes the danger of unpasteurized milk, this fear mongering must be confronted. Forty-four states have already legalized the sale and distribution of raw milk. It's time to Hawaii to also do the same. The DOH uses CDC data from 1993 to 2006, a span of 13 years where there are 1,500 cases of unpasteurized products causing illness. Not unpasteurized milk, unpasteurized products. Milk, which equates to approximately 115 cases per year, these incidents of illness must be placed in context and be examined from the relative risk, not single points of data. For example, the same timeframe, the FDA estimated that fresh produce was responsible for 8,000 E. coli infections. Eggs were responsible for over 6,500, processed foods over 3,000, sprouts 1,500, where raw milk during that same time period was associated with 10.

"The CDC reports that there are an estimated 48 million foodborne illnesses diagnosed each year in the U.S., of which the consumption of which only about 42 or .005% each year are due to the consumption of raw fresh milk.

"We want to support local farmers, where responsible farmers know their animals, their cows are pasture raised. Raw milk will be produced on a micro scale. And this bill supports local businesses, animal welfare, sustainability, and local economy, and individual rights to have the freedom to access an in-demand commodity. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Matayoshi rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Morikawa rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Mr. Speaker, when I was a very young child, we grew up in poverty and raw milk was all that my family could get their hands on. So, I enjoyed this very delicious milk, for those of you who never tried it. When they started to pasteurize it, I told my mom, this milk is green, it's not ripe yet. Mr. Speaker, if we talk about sustainability, this is where we have to think about going. I'd also like to request the words of the Representative from District 1 to be inserted as my own. Thank you, Mr. Speaker," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2028, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RAW MILK," passed Third Reading by a vote of 40 ayes to 10 noes, with Representative Tokioka voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Har, Kong, Marten, Matayoshi, Okimoto, Onishi, Perruso, Sayama, Tam, and Tarnas voting no.

Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 937-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1860, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1860, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Sayama rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. First, I'd like to thank the Chairs from the Consumer Protection & Commerce Committee, as well as the Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs Committee for their help in passing and improving this measure. During a time when workers were being laid off and families were struggling with the pandemic, catalytic converter thefts were sweeping the nation. In Hawaii, thousands of catalytic converter thefts were stolen and being sold off to recyclers and scrap dealers without oversight and regulation, leaving families with no car to go to grocery or to get their kids to school or go to work. These catalytic converters costs anywhere between \$500 to \$1,000 to replace and take months to get to Hawaii.

"Mr. Speaker, over the past two years, I've worked with HPD, the City and County's Prosecuting Attorney's Office, the Attorney General's Office, as well as members of this House and Senate to draft a bill that addresses this issue, and today I am proud to have the bill that we have today to vote on, and I look forward to seeing it pass through the Legislature. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1860, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CATALYTIC CONVERTERS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 938-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2084, HD 2, as amended in HD 3, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2084, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO IMPORTANT AGRICULTURAL LANDS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative McKelvey voting no.

Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 939-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2135, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2135, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HISTORIC PRESERVATION REVIEWS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 940-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1979, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1979, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HABITAT CONSERVATION PLANS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 941-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2034, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2034, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Har, Kapela, and Tokioka voting no.

Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 942-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2042, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2042, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Okimoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2042, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SOLAR ENERGY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Har, Okimoto, and Tokioka voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives D. Kobayashi and McKelvey voting no.

Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 945-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2416, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2416, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, reservations and a brief comment. I just am very concerned that this bill specifically targets the good guys, Mr. Speaker. I am totally for transparency and funding of campaign expenditures by non-candidate committees, that's why I signed the bill. But I did not realize that we were just going after non-profits who, frankly, many of them in my mind are the good guys. Thanks."

Representative Kitagawa rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support with a few comments. Over the past year, I have been working with the Campaign Spending Commission as well as the Attorney General's Office to come up with this bill that addresses the issue of dark money in campaign spending. Dark money occurs when an organization, such as the 501(c)(4) nonprofit, raises funds to use on campaign expenditures, such as donations to candidates, mailers and fliers, and other electioneering activities, in an attempt to influence the outcome of an election. It is dark money because the organization is currently not required by law to disclose the identity of its donors. They simply can funnel money into a non-candidate committee as a lump sum donation so the public never knows who the money came from.

"501(c)(4) organizations are tax exempt social welfare organizations. They must be operated exclusively to further the common good and general welfare of the community. Unlike 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations that cannot engage in political activities, 501(c)(4) organizations can engage in some political and campaign-related activities as long as it is not their primary function. Arguably, this means that a 501(c)(4) could use 49.99% of its funds to influence elections while still maintaining its tax-exempt status and hiding their donors' involvement in political campaigning.

"Currently, the IRS does not use any of their funds to investigate these activities to ensure compliance. Therefore, 501(c)(4)s can engage in and spend unregulated amounts of money on political activity without

consequence or oversight, conceivably well above the allowed 49.99%. This is happening not only at the national level, but also at the local level.

"To clarify some false narratives about this bill, I'd like to highlight a few points. This bill only applies to 501(c)(4) organizations that meet the current requirements under law for non-candidate committees. If a 501(c)(4) does not engage in campaign-related activities, this bill would not apply to them. Concerns were raised in testimony that this bill would create a chilling effect on individuals participation in the political and democratic process, and that people may be discouraged or afraid to donate to organizations that engage in electioneering because their identities would be disclosed.

"However, this bill better protects community members who choose to donate to 501(c)(4)s. Under this bill, the donor must give consent to have their donation used towards elections or supporting candidates. This provides the donor with upfront information on what their donation will be used for. If a community member does not want their identity disclosed, they would choose to not have their donation be used towards election-related purposes. This protects the donor and uses their donation only for the purposes that they intend.

"Concerns were also raised that 501(c)(4)s are being singled out through this bill, when other entities also engage in dark money. I agree that we should address all aspects of dark money and that it is in the best interest of the public to do so. The first draft of this bill cast a wide net and attempted to address all forms of dark money. However, in doing so, concerns arose, since it is difficult to create a one-size-fits-all solution to addressing all avenues of dark money.

"This bill is a first step in the right direction. The public deserves to be informed of who is paying to influence elections. Just as maximum disclosure and transparency of currently regulated candidate contributions and expenditures are important, closing the loophole on dark money to ensure maximum transparency and disclosure only serves to achieve the same public good. We must not let the perfect be the enemy of the good. Through this bill, we are taking steps to ensure disclosure and transparency in elections and are moving the state in the right direction. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative LoPresti rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to change my vote to a no vote. I think quoting Voltaire on something like that just is a bit over the edge. Again, this is clearly targeting something like the Sierra Club, which has nationally thousands of people who are donating a few bucks to them. And yeah, occasionally they might do a mailer against one of us, and it doesn't mean that we should then legislate against them. It's really disappointing because there is dark money in politics. There's severe dark money in politics from big moneyed interests that have far more an effect on elections than a few 501(c)(4)s. So, I'm going to change my vote after that speech to a no. Thanks."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support and may I have the words of the Representative from Kaneohe adopted as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2416, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAMPAIGN SPENDING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives D. Kobayashi and LoPresti voting no.

Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 948-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2069, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2069, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GIFTS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 949-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2025, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2025, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE SUNSHINE LAW," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 950-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2125, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2125, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in strong opposition. This bill relates to official school business, we could say official monkey business, Mr. Speaker. As I've said many times on this floor, there is a very, very, very strong correlation between parental involvement and student achievement. This bill throws a blanket of cold water on parental involvement.

"Basically, it's a Loudoun County bill where all this started, where the parents were objecting to curriculum, i.e. CRT. If any of you were aware of what took place yesterday, 1697 regarding teachers being forced to teach sexual practices using basically a graphic cartoon pornography. Mr. Speaker, maybe a lot on this floor are not listening, but the mama bears are listening, and they came out really in large numbers yesterday.

"So, Mr. Speaker, let us know that transparency in curriculum is going to be an issue if 1697 passed, and it's now in the Senate. And it's something that this bill says, if you harass or impede or intervene with a government 'education worker,' you can be fined \$2,000 or put one year in jail. Can you imagine that, Mr. Speaker? That's shooting a fly with a shotgun. The point is that parents have a right to curriculum transparency, and right now we don't have that.

"Also, during the Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs hearing, which I sit on, we were promised that we would have a letter from the attorney general that would explain their approval and how they, in effect, wrote the bill. We were also promised in the Judiciary Committee that Acting Superintendent Hayashi would give us a number of experiential or, the metrics, if you will, which I always ask for in committees, how much has this been a problem? And he said, well, so far, we can only count six instances where the parents really interfered with an education worker. Six, Mr. Speaker. I mean, I can think of six times a policeman is spit on, but we don't categorize, if you spit on a policeman, you're going to get a \$2,000 fine or a year in jail.

"So, Mr. Speaker, this is really an overkill. It's really something that says, you parents, we don't want you to become too involved in the PTA. We don't want you to object in the curriculum. We don't want you to say what is your values versus our, quote, the state values. And Mr. Speaker, if we look at what Loudoun County did to the election in Virginia, Governor Youngkin, on this basis, basically won his race because the government said, we are in charge of your kids, you have nothing to say.

"Mr. Speaker, this goes beyond, it's an overreach. And Mr. Speaker, I therefore say the only way we can make fair the fine of \$2,000 or one year in jail is to recommit this bill to committee, to work on it, to make those penalties fit what otherwise is the charge. Mr. Speaker, I therefore move to recommit this bill."

Representative Ward moved to recommit H.B. No. 2125, HD 2, seconded by Representative McDermott.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the motion to recommit, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, right now, we know that we have to protect. We love our teachers. This is not anti-teachers. But we also love people getting involved in their government. You know, a lot of us get harassed--"

The Chair addressed Representative Ward, stating:

"Alright, Representative Ward, the Chair will provide latitude, but please confine your remarks to the recommittal."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"Well, primarily because, as I said earlier, \$2,000 fine and one year in jail is overkill, Mr. Speaker. That's basically the basis of it. But I want you to know that this body, Mr. Speaker, in the last election, in the last, how would you call it, Star Advertiser, in otherwise the survey of how we're doing, we had an approval rating of 18%. This makes us a class of our own. If we don't lower those things, they're saying, you guys elevate yourself as the political class, we peons who are not of any standing have to be punished by doing this.

"The point is, Mr. Speaker, we should treat everybody equally. And if we want a bill like this that says, and there is one legitimate complaint there, they're doing the voicemail, they're plugging up the email lists. But Mr. Speaker, that should be across the board. It shouldn't be just the DOE. It should be any department. If you're jamming their voicemail, if you're jamming up their email, this should be committed to that transfer just for all departments and not just the DOE. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I think we would be better in the eyes of the electorate if we treated and respected parents more than this bill does because it basically says you have no rights in our school system, sit down and shut up. Thank you."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in opposition to the motion to recommit, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition to the motion to recommit. First, Mr. Speaker, I would note that this bill has a defective date, so this has to still continue on to the process. And secondly, what we've seen during the course of this pandemic is that educational workers in particular have been the subject of much harassment, and that is what this current bill is seeking to address. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in opposition to the motion to recommit, stating:

"I stand in strong opposition to recommitment for many of the reasons mentioned by the previous speaker. But I will also say that this bill does not call for an unreasonable expectation to be placed upon parents and their behavior on public school campuses. I think that it's reasonable to expect them to engage in civil behavior. Thank you."

Representative Woodson rose to speak in opposition to the motion to recommit, stating:

"In opposition to the recommitment please. Mr. Speaker, this bill, HB 2125, HD 2, is not about taking away parental voice. It is not. This bill is about protecting our principals and our vice principals and our other administrators in this new world we find ourselves in as it relates to the COVID-19 pandemic and some of the frustrations that our parents have shared. Of course, it's common sense that the Department of Education, within their constructs, they have systems and subsystems in place that not only encourage parental involvement, they actually facilitate parental involvement. That is very important to mention.

"It's also important to mention, as the previous speaker in favor of the recommitment had said, that there is a direct positive correlation between parental involvement and increased learning outcomes over time. And so of course, that is articulated in our Hawaii Revised Statutes. That is also in many ways promulgated in Board of Education policy around this particular issue.

"But again, if parents have legitimate concerns about pandemic operations, or more broadly speaking, it is okay, and it is encouraged for our parents to share those concerns. That is healthy in our system. However, it is not okay if those same parents are being abusive to our administrators, as has been reported across the state. It is not okay if our administrators, principals, vice principals, others are receiving harassing comments on a regular basis. It is not okay if they are receiving sexual and lewd comments, as has been reported across the state. It is not okay if they're receiving death threats on a daily basis across the state, as has been reported. It is not okay if these administrators are receiving comments like, we know how many kids you have, we know where you live and we're coming for you shortly. All of that is not okay.

"And so, what this bill does is it seeks to provide additional statutory layers of support to address that particular issue and also subsystems in place

to support that aim because our principals and vice principals cannot do their job optimally if they are worrying about themselves, safety, or their family's safety. And so for that reason and others, I humbly ask his body to not support this recommitment and to support this bill. Thank you."

Representative Tam rose to speak in opposition to the motion to recommit, stating:

"In opposition to the recommitment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This bill is a good bill. I believe that parents should have the right to engage in civil discourse. But no one should have to be harassed when they're doing their job, especially education workers. And when they are harassed, I believe that it will have a negative impact on the education of our kids. So, for these reasons, I am in opposition to the recommitment and I am in support of this bill."

The motion was put to a vote by the Chair and upon a voice vote, failed to carry, with Representative Holt being excused.

(Main Motion)

Representative Matayoshi rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations and a brief comment. As a former educational worker who has been harassed in the past, I really do sympathize with the administration and the teachers who have to continually go through that kind of harassment. But that being said, we have laws on the books already to protect educational workers and everyone in our society from harassment. And if this harassment is taking place, and it is, I really encourage the Attorney General's Office to vigorously prosecute those people who are taking actions that rise to the levels of harassment that are currently on the books.

"That being said, it seems like the issue that this bill is trying to address is harassment, not against necessarily the people, which we already have laws on the books for that, but harassment against the educational institutions itself. We kept getting testimony from the superintendent and others about parents filling up voicemail boxes and doing other harassment-like activities to the institution. So, I think that this bill should probably be amended to allow for a different harassment standard or crime against educational institutions themselves, rather than the employees who are already protected under our harassment statutes.

"And I'd just like to really encourage the Attorney General's Office too, to start more vigorously pursuing and prosecuting those parents who are harassing educational workers and administrative staff to the level where it falls under our harassment statutes. I think it's absolutely unacceptable that parents have been taking these actions and threatening teachers and administrative staff, even veiled threats, and have not been pursued to the fullest extent of the law. We've got to crack down on that and I encourage the AG to do so. Thank you."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Unfortunately, because it's final call time, I'm going to have to go no on this measure. But I do want to vigorously adopt the words of the previous speaker in encapsulating my concerns with the measure. I applaud the Jud Chair for working on this thing, trying to aim it at educational institutions. But the examples given in the committee hearing by the department, I think, concern me. Because when pressed, they said it had to do with parents leaving too many emails, too many phone calls. And we really start to hit a slippery slope when that becomes the metric of possibly applying a law that could have serious ramifications to the individual.

"Parents are concerned, especially parents with SPED kids. Rightfully so. They may call or email several times because they're not getting an answer. But to have that over them potentially is a little too much. I'm hoping the Senate can work on this measure, though, and incorporate the comments of the previous speaker and that it can come back to us with these things addressed. But until then, I'm not going to be able to support the measure. Thanks."

Representative Tokioka rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I voted with reservations in the committee and we were fortunate enough to have a good debate and dialog. And a colleague sitting right next to me talked about two words that were in that bill that was going to be hard to enforce, and it was annoy and alarm. During the committee, the Judiciary Chair heard from all of us and said he was going to take out annoy. He wasn't certain on alarm, but when I'm looking at the bill, alarm is out. So, I support the bill now because it's a lot easier to enforce. So, thank you for that opportunity and thank the Judiciary Chair and the members for the dialog during committee."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I just want to reiterate what my previous colleague had mentioned on the Judiciary Committee. We went over this with a fine-tooth comb, Mr. Speaker. And we took out, I think, those aspects that were objectionable. Certainly, some people had spoken that harassment does and should cover some of the activities that teachers and administrators have experienced. And I echo my colleague from the windward side who is saying we really need to see that the AG follows through on prosecuting some of these things.

"But this bill, I think, has evolved and been reshaped so that it is simply looking at the harassment of the institution in a way. And that is, I think, fine. I don't think it's going to in any way hamper parent involvement with their student's education. Thank you."

Representative Okimoto rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations please, brief comment. I just want to say that I think I'm probably one of the few people that can understand both ends of the spectrum in this bill, from the teacher perspective and the parent perspective. And while, again, I appreciate the intent, I do have to vote with reservations at this time because I think that this bill needs to really get the consideration of the parents. We really need to consider that. And I would like to ask for permission to adopt the words of the Representative from the windward side, from Kaneohe, into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kapela rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. We already have harassment laws and they really just need to be implemented and used. I'm concerned that if we create another harassment law, that those two things could be conflicting. So, I would also like the words of the Representative from Kaneohe to be inserted into the Journal as if they were my own. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kitagawa rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Branco rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Matayoshi be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ohno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Mr. Speaker, I support this bill because of a discussion with other DOE employees who are affected by this bill. I do certainly believe that they should have employees within the department to handle these harassment claims specifically. And while there are laws on the books, there is a very nuanced way in which parents can threaten DOE employees. The amount of personal information that is available for anyone is alarming. When someone calls you, leaves anonymous voicemails or emails citing your family and your children, I think we have an obligation to do something more, and it certainly alarms me. So, I do hope the department can do more for this because the way that the public can find personal information about DOE employees while also knowing where you work on a daily basis is a scary thing. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Second time in opposition, Mr. Speaker. If it is the will of this body, Mr. Speaker, to pass this and allow it to take effect in law, I would say, just be apprised that the mama bears in HB 1697, which says you will teach Pono Choices 2, when they storm the Capitol, if they do, or if they come and they say bad things and they shout a little bit, don't be surprised, Mr. Speaker. Because this is the bill that would protect them. This is now the bill that's going to put them either one year in jail or \$2,000 fine. HB 1697 is coming, and we'll see what happens. But if it's the will of the people here, just be prepared to stick with what you've said today on this floor. So, when it does happen, you're not going to backpedal and say, well, we didn't really realize that the mama bears protecting their kids and knowing what curriculum they want or don't want in school is not allowable. For that, Mr. Speaker, this is a wake-up call with this vote. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2125, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OFFICIAL SCHOOL BUSINESS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 43 ayes to 7 noes, with Representatives Branco, Kitagawa, Matayoshi, and Okimoto voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Kapela, D. Kobayashi, Kong, Matsumoto, McDermott, McKelvey, and Ward voting no.

Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 952-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1986, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1986, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Just reservations and brief comments. My concern is that when the Board of Education became an appointed board, which frankly I disagree with, I think we should go back to an elected board, there was a push to get specific members for specific subjects. We require math and social studies and ELA and all sorts of things. I think it is, to quote my colleague in front of me, a slippery slope, but a real one to start saying this board member must be an expert in this and this board member must be an expert in that. And that is my concern with this. Certainly, I think the governor who appoints these positions should consider having somebody with expertise in various areas, I don't know that we should legislate it. Thank you."

Representative Branco rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. This bill would appoint one of the representatives at large on the Board of Education to be a Hawaiian immersion expert. You asked why we may need this? It's about equity. We are a state that has two languages, English and *ʻōlelo Hawaiʻi*, and unfortunately our *ʻōlelo Hawaiʻi* community has gotten the short end of the stick. And so, this is to make sure that our Hawaiian speakers, our *kumu*, our Hawaiian immersion schools have the proper voice and the proper advocacy at the forefront of education policymaking.

"I can share with you a story, my own personal story. My great grandfather would go to school and get beaten for speaking Hawaiian. He would then go home and he would also get lickins for speaking English. A child who had nothing wrong for just speaking his native tongue. And this is a history that is still here in this body. This is a history that's still here in this state, and this is generational trauma. I'm not the only Hawaiian family that has stories like this. We have to start a process of healing and we have to uplift our native people. *Mahalo*."

Representative Holt rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. I would just like to read a little bit of the preamble of this measure. 'The legislature also finds that Native Hawaiians currently make up almost twenty-four per cent of the entire student population in the State. Due to the high presence of Native Hawaiian students in the public school system, it is imperative that the State guarantee appropriate representation on the board of education to fulfill its constitutional duty to promote Hawaiian studies and the Hawaiian language and to provide a voice for Native Hawaiian students, teachers, and faculty.

The legislature also finds that existing law does not require any member of the board of education to be an individual who has expertise in Hawaiian studies, the Hawaiian language, or Hawaiian immersion education. The legislature believes that to better promote the study of Hawaiian culture, history, and language in public schools, as required by the state constitution, there must be some representation of the Hawaiian community on the board of education.' Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, strong support. Mr. Speaker, education is the engine of upward social economic mobility. We know that the Hawaiian community is lacking in some of those areas, socioeconomically near the bottom of the ladder. But lest I say things that are redundant and less eloquent as the Representative from Kailua, for the second time on this floor, Mr. Speaker, would you enter his remarks into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Wildberger rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Just as someone who studied languages in university, I would like everyone to understand that if you don't perpetuate and encourage and preserve language, then you cannot perpetuate and preserve culture. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1986, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative LoPresti voting aye with reservations.

Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 954-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1823, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1823, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Matsumoto rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto's written remarks are as follows:

"The title of this bill is 'Our Care, Our Choice Act.' This title refers to the patient's ability to choose the way in which they pass on, but there is another person affected by this bill that should also have a choice – the medical personnel. In the past few years, we have been reminded of how important it is to value and respect our medical workers, and an important aspect of this respect is allowing them to make their own choices in the types of medicine they practice.

"Nurses and physician assistants often join the medical field because they want to help others, because they want to save lives. Medical personnel who do not wish to participate in ending another person's life should not be forced to do so. Even if a bill does not explicitly state that staff will be required to participate in euthanasia, there needs to be a clause outlining their right to refuse without repercussion from their employers.

"In addition to expanding the types of medical professionals that can perform medically assisted death (MAID), this bill proposes to reduce and remove certain safeguards that were put in place to protect patients. Perhaps most concerning, this bill waives the waiting period entirely for patients whose attending provider attests that the patient will die within the 15-day waiting period. A physician can only reliably predict that a patient will survive days and not weeks once the patient has entered the actively dying phase. Additionally, economic considerations surrounding medical assistance in dying may urge certain individuals and organizations to promote potential savings in [1] medical care (aggressive treatments, costly medications, long durations of hospital visits) and [2] social security (the elderly constitute a majority of terminally ill patients who are likely to consider MAID). There are well-documented disparities in access to health-care services, with people from lower socioeconomic backgrounds, those with lower health literacy, and members of ethnic and racial minorities being

less likely to receive adequate care, including palliative care services. This also especially affects individuals with physical disabilities or with psychiatric illnesses.

"Leaving the option of MAID open, as well as putting the onus on the patient, does not allow them the time and structure for processing the meaning of their request. Waiving a mandatory waiting period may be peripheral to the parallel, comparatively quick timeframe wherein individuals typically decide their EOL care."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1823, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," passed Third Reading by a vote of 41 ayes to 9 noes, with Representative Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Eli, Har, Kitagawa, Kong, McDermott, McKelvey, Okimoto, Tokioka, and Ward voting no.

Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 955-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2344, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2344, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROBATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 957-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1757, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1757, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PLANNED COMMUNITY ASSOCIATIONS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 959-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1413, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1413, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ABANDONED VEHICLES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative McDermott voting no.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 961-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2329, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2329, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HISTORIC PRESERVATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Okimoto voting no.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 967-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1747, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1747, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUILDING CODE COUNCIL," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 969-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1752, HD 2, as amended in HD 3, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1752, HD 3 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Wildberger rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition, Mr. Speaker. While I applaud this measure's efforts to incentivize landlords to rent to recipients of Section 8 housing vouchers, I am unable to support this proposal in its current form because it does not include a strong prohibition against housing discrimination based on an individual source of income. Honolulu remains one of the largest metropolitan areas in the United States that does not prohibit this kind of discrimination, which worsens housing insecurity for low income residents, the majority of whom are women. Eighty-three percent of Section 8 recipients are women. As of November 2020, 17 states also prevent discrimination against Section 8 housing voucher recipients. We need to join those locations and prohibit rental discrimination for our most economically vulnerable neighbors."

Representative Perruso rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Kapela be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, Mr. Speaker. There's a lot of problems with the Section 8 program, which is why a lot of landlords don't participate in it. Section 8 is an incredible federal resource that gives money to the tenants directly, and they only pay 30% of their income on housing and the federal government picks up that balance.

"And I understand the concerns raised by the previous speakers, but I'd like to say that there's a problem with the Section 8 program in Hawaii which prevents landlords from participating when they don't have enough security deposit to pay for trashed units. When it takes months and months to even get into the program because of the paperwork involved. When it takes several months to even get the unit inspected. These are reasons why landlords are not participating in the program.

"So that's why we have to fix the system to encourage landlords to participate, because even if we pass a bill to say you cannot discriminate, we're still going to have these problems. These are the underlying fixes that are needed. And I really want to acknowledge the Vice Chair of Housing, Representative from Wailuku, who spent the interim with stakeholders to address these concerns to get to the root of the problem and to recognize that we need to deal with the staffing issues, we need to improve the systems and create incentives for landlords in order to fix the problem. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Mr. Speaker, what's missing in this whole debate is one factor that I will cite Senator Inouye for being the progenitor and the genius behind it, and with Peter Savio's suggestion. Little known to very many people is the fact that Section 8 can actually be rent-to-own, there's actually an ownership provision. And as we bemoan the lack of housing in Hawaii, I've never seen one instance where you can actually be Section 8 and become a homeowner. Mr. Speaker, that needs to be somewhere built into our housing policies and it's not and I don't see it in this bill, but that is a key issue. Senator Inouye did it out of a discussion between housing experts, in particular Peter Savio, and how we can leverage the poor to be homeowners. And when you're a homeowner, you've got a stake in the American dream. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I would like to add the words of the Chair of Housing into the record as if they were my own. She's absolutely correct. Until this problem can be fixed and modernized at the federal level, what she is doing will go a long way towards getting landlords to accept Section 8 clients and providing more housing opportunity in our very tight affordable housing rental market right now. So again, thank you, in support," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1752, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 2 noes, with Representative Wildberger voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Kapela and Perruso voting no.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 970-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1829, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1829, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BONDS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 971-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1917, as amended in HD 1, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1917, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AFFORDABLE HOUSING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1494, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SPECIAL ENFORCEMENT SECTION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 990-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1507, as amended in HD 1, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1507, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Okimoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Branco rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. I think the wealthy should pay their fair share of taxes. But according to the Tax Foundation of Hawaii, the bill includes a broad-based tax increase, perhaps larger than what we intended. And so, I'm just concerned with our fragile economy that a tax increase would be inappropriate at this current time. *Mahalo.*"

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, Mr. Speaker. First off, I have to thank the Chair of the Finance Committee as well as the Chair of the Economic Development Committee for moving this measure forward. It's time for Hawaii to tax the rich. Hawaii saddles our low-income neighbors with the second heaviest state and local tax burden in the nation. While families who earn less than \$20,000 per year pay 15% of their income in state and local taxes, those who make over \$450,000 annually pay only 9%.

"Hawaii is also one of only nine states that taxes all capital gains profits that are from the sale of stocks, bonds, investment real estate, art, and antiques at a lower rate than ordinary income. This capital gains tax loophole privileges almost entirely high-income taxpayers, including nonresidents who profit from investing in real estate in the islands.

"If Hawaii were to tax capital gains at the top marginal tax rate, we would bring in \$160 to \$180 million in new revenue, according to the Hawaii Department of Taxation, 97% of which would be paid by the top 5% of income earners in our state. The bottom 80% would pay nothing at all. That amount is far more than enough to make our state's earned income tax credit

refundable and permanent. As an economic stimulus, the EITC contributes up to \$1.24 in economic activity for every \$1 it returns to workers.

"As the Hawaii Budget and Policy Center noted in a recent report, research on the EITC shows that the credit contributes to long term economic and health gains for families and people of color who are much more likely to earn low wages in Hawaii due to systemic racism. These are the individuals who would experience the greatest benefit from strengthening the EITC, making it an effective anti-racist policy as well.

"The benefits of strengthening the EITC are clear in the islands, especially given our skyrocketing cost of living and housing crisis, both of which have worsened during the COVID-19 pandemic. Asking our state's wealthiest residents to pay their fair share to deliver financial security for our most vulnerable neighbors is a deal that working families cannot miss out on. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, requesting the words of the Representative from Kau entered into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative LoPresti rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Kapela be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Also in support on the measure and just a few comments. Remember when we passed EITC before, there was a lot of lament, a hollow victory because it wasn't refundable. And this bill finally closes the gap in doing that. It's a meaningful tax credit for working class people. We give tax credits to a lot of people who, quite frankly, are wealthy and don't need them. This one actually goes to the people who need them the most. And it's very fiscally responsible in generating new revenue from increasing, as a previous speaker said, capital gains tax rates on those areas, which will bring us in line with other states. So, thank you."

Representative Perruso rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Kapela be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1507, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAX FAIRNESS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 5 noes, with Representative Okimoto voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Branco, Kong, Matsumoto, McDermott, and Ward voting no.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2088, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FINANCING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 4 noes, with Representative Onishi voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Har, Kong, McDermott, and Tokioka voting no.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1009-22) recommending that H.B. No. 886, as amended in HD 1, pass Third Reading.

No. 1965, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROPERTY FORFEITURE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Har, Okimoto, and Tokioka voting no.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1019-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2146, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2146, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MARRIAGE LICENSES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative McDermott voting no.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1020-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1239, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1239, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LAW ENFORCEMENT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Kong, McDermott, and Okimoto voting no.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1021-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1827, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1827, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PULEHUNUI COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Wildberger voting no.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1024-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1840, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1840, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Wildberger rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. I just want to share a story about a development project in Maui that the developer cleverly chopped up their 30-acre parcel into 15 acres so that they could get away with not having the robust examination of the Land Use Committee. And with the exasperated

testimony of the Land Use Committee, frankly I'm surprised to see this measure going forward. They're a pragmatic organization, they know that we pass stuff that might not be great for our communities, and so they offered amendments.

"But this is just developers coming to the Legislature and getting the rules changed so that they don't have to abide by the oversight. And sometimes the Land Use Committee is the last stop to protecting our community plans and the development that we would like to see instead of the luxury development that builders want to build but are not necessarily serving our communities. So, thank you, in opposition, Mr. Speaker."

Representative LoPresti rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Hashimoto rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Strong support. First off, I would like to thank all of the committees that heard this bill, including Water & Land Committee, Finance Committee. I think this is a true work in progress and it is something that we've been working very hard on through the interim. And I think we finally, through the Finance Committee, came to some type of agreement with the State Land Use Commission that is somewhat something that both the counties and the State Land Use Commission can agree with. And I think in the previous version, up to 50 acres would be delegated to the county. And I think that gave some type of heartache to the Land Use Commission, but I think we came up with some proposal that made it palatable to both.

"There still will be some State Land Use Commission approval after the counties get to approve it, but it does add a timeframe that the State Land Use Commission gets to approve it. And it also adds in very specific criteria that the State Land Use Commission has to review, they cannot be more broad than what the counties reviewed. So, it should speed up the process of what the State Land Use Commission is able to review projects. This will also not allow parceling, and I think a lot of times developers were looking at parceling because they wanted to get under that 15 acres. And so, we're giving the counties the ability to look at 50 acres. So, we stopped the parceling and the correct provisions of what we put in place to protect land use designations are actually followed.

"So, I think this is a very good bill. It's something that I think the counties really wanted, and we worked closely with the counties because they believe in true home rule. And I also believe that the counties are the ones that have to enforce a lot of the provisions that are put in in land use decisions. And so, we wanted to figure out if we could find a way and move forward. So, again, I thank the Water & Land Chair and the Finance Chair for really making this happen, and the CPC Chair, to really figure out a way to make this all work. So, thank you. For those reasons, I truly support this bill."

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition, and may I please have the words of the Representative from Wailuku entered into the Journal as if they were my own with a brief comment. Mr. Speaker, while I'm in opposition to this bill, I strenuously object to the notion that this is simply developers coming to the Legislature. It strikes me at this time, the eyes of the state are upon us, the eyes of the public are upon us. And to imply simply that because one does not agree with the contents of a bill that the process has been somehow unduly influenced, I think is very unfair. And I don't think that that's what this body needs at this time. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1840, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DISTRICT BOUNDARY AMENDMENTS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 41 ayes to 9 noes, with Representative LoPresti voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Kapela, D. Kobayashi, Kong, Lowen, Marten, McKelvey, Perruso, Quinlan, and Wildberger voting no.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1025-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2511, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2511, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Holt rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. Last year, Mr. Speaker, our budget included a record amount of CIP to DHHL, over \$70 million. Thank you very much to the Finance Chair and CIP Chair for that, and everybody. That's over \$20 million than the previous high, which is amazing. And Mr. Speaker, this measure appropriates \$600 million, \$600 million with the intention of assisting 6,000 individuals getting off of this waitlist. By my math, with ten Hawaiians per household, nah, five Hawaiian per household, it's about 30,000 people who will attain housing by this measure. We still have a long way to go, Mr. Speaker. It's still 22,000 people who will still be on the list after this measure.

"I've always been a strong advocate for Hawaiian issues, but as the kids say, this one hits a little bit different. In the fall of last year, I had the privilege of attending the 100th anniversary of the signing of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act in Washington, D.C. It was only my second time in D.C. as it's not really my favorite place, it's cold, it's far, the food is different, but the reason for being there in the company that I had made it well worth it.

"We were able to take a tour of the Capitol, provide *ho'okupu* at the Kamehameha statue, visit the Library of Congress where we met Deb Haaland, the first Native American to serve as cabinet secretary, where she addressed all of us who were there. We were able to view the original documents of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act. They brought it out so we could take a look at it.

"We had a good number of participants, including the Council for Native Hawaiian Advancement, Kamehameha Schools, the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs, Hale O Na Alii O Hawaii, Native Hawaiian Education Council, Papa Ola Lōkahi, OHA, DHHL, and other organizations. We had about 40 or 50 of us, which is a good-sized delegation. but in what's going on in all of D.C., we're just a small part. And to think that 100 years ago, Prince Kuhio was all by himself. One individual, all by himself, 100 years ago.

"Thank you to all of you who helped play a part in this role. Like I said, we have a long way to go. But Mr. Speaker, I'm very proud to stand here on this floor, taking this step forward to help make an impact and remove people off this list."

Representative Wildberger rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support."

Representative Marten rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I rise in strong support and I wanted to express my appreciation to House leadership for putting so much money, rather than just words, on this important issue."

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you very much. Mr. Speaker, in strong support. This bill will help build housing for Native Hawaiians who are disproportionately homeless, disproportionately living in overcrowded living conditions, and who have been waiting on the DHHL waiting list for years. So, I'd like to ask that the words of the speaker from Kalihi be included as my own. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Strong support. Mr. Speaker, I hope this is the beginning of a wonderful relationship. I want to thank the Chair of Finance and the creative ideas that she has put forward in this. I'd like to request the words of the Hawaiian Caucus Chair be entered into my own. And to know, Mr. Speaker, this is probably going to build probably at \$500,000, maybe 1,200 homes. I would think if we convene and do the same thing next year

and the year after, then the wish of Prince Kuhio will have been fulfilled. That there will be Hawaiians returned to the land, there will be justice. And for those that have waited so long, hopefully they will come with open Capitol and thank everybody for what they're doing. This is a great beginning, we just have to follow through. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Branco rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. When I look at the amount of money here, \$600 million, it's more than just a dollar sign. For us Hawaiians, this is a fulfillment of dreams. Dreams of our ancestors wanting to own their own home or having their own home in their own native land. And so, I thank the body for working on this. This is a great step forward. But this doesn't mean we're *pau*. We have a lot of work still to do. We also need to couple this with land in the urban cores across the islands. And so, I look forward to continuing the work on housing Native Hawaiians. *Mahalo*."

Representative Ichiyama rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support with a brief comment. A few weeks ago, a constituent called me, she lives in Moanalua Valley, her name is Kaimo, and she wanted to share with me her support of this bill and ask that I support it because her father was Dickie Nelson. And he recently passed away in Kona, and he was one of the beneficiaries who died on the waiting list. And she asked that I share his name in his memory and her support for this bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2511, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF HAWAIIAN HOME LANDS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1026-22) recommending that H.B. No. 2510, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2510, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Wildberger rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tokioka rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I do have some concerns, but I'd like to ask permission to insert comments into the Journal. Thank you."

Representative Tokioka's written remarks are as follows:

"I am voting in support of this bill but I do have concerns for the very small 'mom and pop' business, especially right now as we are coming out of a global and economic pandemic. This bill includes an increase in the tip credit that is meant to help small restaurants who have tipped employees. In the Senate's version of a wage bill, it does not address tip credit at all. I would like to see the tip credit increased going forward because the current tip credit affords restaurants 13% of the minimum wage to be reduced from the current hourly wage. When the minimum wage gets to \$18 per hour, the tip credit will only be 6.5% of the hourly wage. What I see potentially happening is restaurants will either be closing because they can't afford to pay their employees or paying their employees cash, under the table. Neither of which would be good for the employee or the state. My passion for this particular section of the bill comes from being a part owner of three restaurants prior to my time in office. I understand the struggles that restaurants go through and how hard it is to keep the doors open."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. Today is International Women's Day. And I wanted to take this moment to remind us that fighting for a living wage is also fighting for gender equity. A substandard minimum wage such as that included in this bill, while I appreciate the movement that we have made on the measure, does mean the continued exploitation of women's labor because 60% of minimum wage workers are women and 22% of those have children. A sub minimum wage tip credit, such as that included in this measure, also means

the continued exploitation of women's labor because 70% of tipped workers nationwide are women. And the poverty rate for women working in tipped roles was nearly two and a half times the rate for workers overall.

"I want to be clear that a living wage is not about providing relief or assistance to the working class. This is not about legislators or businesses helping workers. This is simply about fair compensation for the labor of minimum wage workers who are disproportionately women and people of color. If you spend eight hours a day laboring to build profit for your employer, it is my view that you deserve to be paid enough to meet your basic needs for that day, and anything less than that is theft of your time, your labor, and your life. Thank you."

Representative Sayama rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with strong reservations. First, I'd like to thank the Chair of the Labor & Tourism Committee for his work to addressing this complex and contentious issue. Over the course of this and previous sessions, this body has reviewed and debated various versions of this measure, with a focus to help families who are really struggling to continue life in Hawaii, and they're wondering whether to move to the mainland. Now, after a long two years of this pandemic, we have an opportunity to help them. To provide Hawaii with a holistic policy to assist those laboring to earn a better life for themselves and their families.

"Unfortunately, I cannot say this measure in its current form lives up to this objective. After speaking with economists, business leaders, advocates, and business owners in my district in Kaimuki, I urge members of this House and Senate to consider a more gradual rate of increase in the state's minimum wage, as was reflected in the original version of 2510.

"To tell a story of a business owner in Kaimuki, she started her business from a food truck with a simple goal and dream to provide quality ice cream products with local flavors. After a year of hard work, she opened a store in Kaimuki, employing 15 staff, with the lowest paid worker being a high school student making \$12 an hour with an additional \$7 an hour in tip. When the pandemic hit, and faced with new financial challenges, she, like many other business owners in my district, made the difficult decision to cut her own salary to keep her staff. During these two years she made no money from her business, drawing from her reserves to make ends meet and keep her business afloat and employees employed.

"Like her, many businesses in my district have sacrificed to help the community to keep people employed during an economic and health crisis. I cannot speak on behalf of all small businesses in Hawaii, but for the businesses in Kaimuki I can say for certainty that a \$13 jump by 2023 will mean cutting jobs, it will mean price increases, it would mean that this inflation that we are currently experiencing now would be exacerbated. It simply would be crippling.

"I know this House and Senate wants to ensure working families can earn a quality life. But this measure does not accomplish that. And so, I urge this body, as well as the Senate, to further consider amendments to this measure as it passes through this legislative session. Thank you."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition. I appreciate the Chair of the Finance Committee for accelerating the timeline for implementing an \$18 per hour minimum wage increase for low income employees. Yet this measure still falls short of what working families truly deserve. The Raise Up Hawaii Coalition recently released a profile of the average minimum wage worker in Hawaii. Oftentimes, we think this worker is a high school student or a teenager. That is incorrect. The worker is likely to be female between the ages of 25 and 39. She possesses some college experience and often works in the service industry.

"When we hear comments from the business community about the minimum wage being a training wage, we know that it's a falsehood. Similarly, we have data to prove that raising the minimum wage will not have a significant impact on small businesses. During the last round of minimum wage increases from 2014 to 2018, the number of people employed by small businesses grew by 3% and the total number of small businesses grew by 8%. When we hear people from the business community

or from the restaurant industry say that creating a living wage will lead to job losses, we know that too is a falsehood.

"I continue to oppose increasing the tip credit as this bill does. We need to stop using the phrase 'tip credit.' What we really are talking about is a tip penalty, where tipped employees are paid less simply because they have the kind of job that they perform and they get tips. Studies have shown that the tip penalty significantly worsens sexual harassment and sexual violence in the service industry, which is dominated by female employees. They are reluctant to report misconduct from customers who sexually harass them because those are the same people who pay the tips that they rely on to pay their bills.

"The heartlessness of those who oppose a living wage was on full display at the very first hearing for this bill, at which the president of the Retail Merchants of Hawaii, Tina Yamaki, said the minimum wage worker doesn't deserve a raise because, in her words, they don't know how to brush their teeth or take a bath without training from their employers. That is classist, that is racist, and that is wrong.

"We still have time to do better. And that is why I urge this body once again to hear and pass Senate Bill 2018, which raises the minimum wage to \$18 an hour by 2026 without increasing the tip credit. That is the kind of economic justice that working families deserve. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Matsumoto rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition to this measure. I'll start with what I agree with. I agree that our families are hurting in Hawaii. People are living paycheck to paycheck and they're leaving our state because they cannot afford to live here. We need to change that. People are struggling and they need help. What I don't agree with is the how.

"When we were considering a minimum wage increase to \$13 in 2020, I was willing to support the bill. Then COVID hit, and before we shut down the Legislature, I gave a speech on this floor stating I agreed with the increase, but now is probably not the time. Here we are today considering a much greater increase, a 78% increase to the minimum wage, when the economic climate is much worse.

"We are putting almost all of our hope in raising the minimum wage when there are so many other ways to achieve the same goal. And it's something that I have been focused on for the last few years. It's why I've introduced bills to help local families, like a bill to lower the income tax. A third of our paycheck is taken away from taxes. Collectively, we have some of the highest taxes in the nation. Imagine the impact that we could make if we gave people more of their hard-earned money back so they can spend it the way that they feel is best for them.

"For years, I've introduced a bill to eliminate tax on necessities like food and medical services. This would immediately help people in their everyday lives, and it's a measure that almost all of the other states have enacted in our country. I've also introduced bills for those with children, opportunities for assistance with childcare. And these are the things we need to focus on more, not just a dramatic increase in the minimum wage.

"Raising our minimum wage is not going to ultimately help the people of Hawaii in the long run. Over the last two years, our island's small businesses have weathered storm after storm. They've had to deal with government-imposed restrictions that were put there for the intended health and safety of our population. But there was constant uncertainty. They were forced to close, and then they were allowed to reopen, and then they got closed again, and then reopened. And it was back and forth. And with mounting pressure from stifling mandates to supply chain crises, hundreds of businesses ranging from startups to family legacies were given no choice but to close their doors. And for those who remain, the challenges are far from over.

"Just a few days ago, the vaccination passport requirement was lifted. We are not well into an economic recovery. We're still in the midst of really difficult times. I think so often we think we're just going to raise the minimum wage and it's not going to affect some corporate employer. And in so many cases, it's not just a faceless employer, it's people like my mother.

"My family has had Peterson's Upland Farm in Wahiawa for 112 years. My great grandfather started the farm in 1910 and we supply local fresh eggs

to people in our communities, as many of you know. My mother works 12 to 14 hours a day to keep our farm afloat, but we operate on razor thin margins as many farmers do. And these last few years have been especially difficult. Not only has there been uncertainty with what we are allowed and not allowed to do, but the general cost of business is going up.

"At the beginning of last year, it was \$14,000 to ship and buy feed for our chickens. Just last month, it was \$18,600. That is a \$4,000 increase just for the cost to feed the chickens, not wages. That's a 33% increase. Being an island state with no feed grown here locally, we have no option but to ship in. And with all of the unrest currently going on throughout the world, it's only going to get worse. Just yesterday, my mom had to order more egg cartons, and that price has gone up astronomically because the price of cardboard has gone up.

"People say it's not going to matter, but if this bill passes, the best-case scenario is that we cut half of our labor force on the farm. We would have to let go of half of our workers, some of which who have worked on our farm for over 30 years. It's hard enough as it is to find people to work on the farm. But if this passes, who is going to want to work on the farm that is a very labor intensive job?"

Representative Okimoto rose to yield her time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto continued, stating:

"We talk about supporting agriculture on this floor all the time. Use it as an industry to replace tourism to be self-sufficient. But yet we're passing policies that are detrimental to so many farmers. But more realistically, if this bill passes, we will have to shut our doors within the next two years. And we have seen historically in our state, once a farm goes out of business, they're not going to start up again. Once it's gone, it's gone.

"My heart breaks for my mother. After four generations of serving our community, our farm is probably going to be forced to close its doors and I know she's going to feel personally responsible that the business closed under her watch. But with everything compounded and everything going on, it's not her fault.

"My family's story is not unique. This is the story of small businesses across our state. We're currently in a high inflation environment, and it's only going to get more difficult for businesses to operate. The big box and the chain stores will be fine. They can afford to automate their systems, they can have more self-checkout lines. Who we're really hurting is our local business owner and ultimately their staff. All we're doing is inviting big businesses to come in and take over our state because the small guys can't make it.

"Testimony from local businesses made it clear that the significant wage increase is going to be a final blow. The chamber did a survey with 450 members, with 50% having 25 or less employees. Two thirds of the businesses responded that they'd have to cut staff. Twenty-seven percent said they'd have to lay off half of their staff. And a third of the businesses said they would be forced to shut down completely. This is going to result with a lot of people without jobs.

"So, with all of the uncertainty of the pandemic, with all of the unrest going on around the world, and still being in a very difficult economic climate, this is not the time to be significantly raising the minimum wage. But it is the time to help those in our community by other means, and we can do that. The Legislature can help people. I completely agree with the section of the bill that ensures that the state earned income tax credit is permanent and refundable. But the majority of the burden should not be on the backs of local businesses who are trying to provide goods and services for our local communities, like my family. We, the Legislature, need to find a reasonable, multi-pronged solution for the people of our state, and we should be the ones to help. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Sayama rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, still with reservations. While I do like to cite economic papers, case study, economic theory to inform my decisions on legislative matters, when it comes to the minimum wage and how it could affect small businesses, I like to listen to small business owners. Specifically, small business owners in my district. They're the ones with the most skin in the game and I know that these business owners care for their employees. The

reason why I know that? During the pandemic, some of these guys said they were going out of business. The community came in full force to purchase these products. We've lost five small businesses in Kaimuki, and I know there would have been more if the community did not support a lot more of them. And so, I could trust my business owners when they tell me that this minimum wage increase will cripple them, that they will lay off workers. I don't turn to economic theories. I don't turn to case studies. I listen to my constituents. I listen to my business owners. And I trust them when they tell me that this policy would hurt them. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tarnas rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in opposition. I've heard the falsehood that this is not a training wage. The falsehood is, in effect, it is a training wage and it's not a living wage. How you name something is how you treat it. That's why we are against profiling and other kinds of discriminatory terms. When you call somebody something, you treat them in such a way. If this is a living wage, we've got a mistaken idea of what is macro and microeconomics or what capitalism is.

"The second falsehood, Mr. Speaker, is that my good friend from being raised on an egg farm was joking when she said, hey, if we're going to survive after 100-and-some years as an egg farmer, we're going to have to cut employees. Mr. Speaker, that is not a falsehood, that's the reality, and that's the reality that's missing in the speaker from the Big Island who said that was a falsehood.

"The point is, Mr. Speaker, we have not enough economic business, entrepreneurial sense to know and understand what's going on out there. But I know this, people are leaving. We're the highest taxed, we're the highest you name it, and we are not fulfilling our role. And I call this, and I usually put a metaphor together, it's like a guy who's got a job, he's got eight kids, he makes enough money to feed three of them, two of them are on rations, and the other three are right with the government welfare, food stamps, and everything else.

"We have not the size of the economy to feed our families, to make our families supportable. This is a macro economic issue down at the micro level at the minimum wage. But Mr. Speaker, when falsehoods come to this floor, they have to be refuted. So, this is a training wage."

At 12:06 p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:09 p.m.

Representative Okimoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2510, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INCOME," passed Third Reading by a vote of 42 ayes to 8 noes, with Representatives Okimoto, Sayama, Tarnas, and Wildberger voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Eli, Kapela, Kong, Matsumoto, Perruso, Quinlan, Takumi, and Ward voting no.

THIRD READING

At this time, the Chair stated:

"Members, please note on page 31, House Bill 2464, HD 1, SCR 793, will be deferred to end of calendar."

H.B. No. 2464, HD 1:

By unanimous consent, action was deferred to the end of the calendar.

H.B. No. 1597, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 1597, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1597, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTRICAL CONTRACTORS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 3 noes, with Representative Har voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Kapela, McDermott, and McKelvey voting no.

H.B. No. 2293, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, H.B. No. 2293, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

H.B. No. 2422, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, H.B. No. 2422, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SENTENCING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

H.B. No. 2075, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 2075, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tokioka rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. No vote and just a short comment. I think we have ample gun laws in Hawaii, and we don't need this bill to protect anybody. Thank you."

Representative Matsumoto rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto's written remarks are as follows:

"I stand with reservations on this bill as it is unconstitutional as determined in *Yukutake vs. Conners* in the US District Court of Hawaii on August 16, 2021.

"The bill extends the permitting time period from 10 days to 30 days for gun acquisitions, but that does not change the unconstitutionality of the permit requirement. And narrowing the scope of the inspection from all guns to a specified subset does not change the judgement that says the Police Departments 'are permanently enjoined from enforcing ... in-person firearm inspection and registration requirement.'"

"The modifications of the statutes in this bill are going to be taken to court again at great time and expense. Changing minor details of the unconstitutional practice does not uphold the spirit of the District Court's decision.

"Here is the decision from J. Michael Seabright, Chief United States District Judge (pgs:31-32):

HRS § 134-2(e)'s requirement that "[p]ermits issued to acquire any pistol or revolver shall be void unless used within ten days after the date of issue" is declared unconstitutional in violation of the Second Amendment. Defendant's officers, agents, servants, employees, and all persons in active concert or participation with Defendant are permanently enjoined from enforcing HRS § 134-2(e)'s 10-day permit use requirement for handguns. To be clear, no other language in HRS § 134-2(e) is found unconstitutional.

HRS § 134-3(c)'s requirement that, with the exception of certain licensed dealers, "[a]ll other firearms and firearm receivers registered under [HRS § 134] shall be physically inspected by the respective county chief of police or the chief's representative at the time of registration" is unconstitutional in violation of the Second Amendment. Defendant's officers, agents, servants, employees, and all persons in active concert or participation with Defendant are permanently enjoined from enforcing HRS § 134-3(c)'s in-person firearm inspection and registration requirement. To be clear, no other language in HRS § 134-3(c) is found unconstitutional."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2075, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIREARMS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 6 noes, with Representative Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Har, Kong, McDermott, Okimoto, Tokioka, and Ward voting no.

H.B. No. 1459, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 1459, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1459, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO JUVENILE RESTITUTION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Har and Tokioka voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Kapela, D. Kobayashi, and Wildberger voting no.

H.B. No. 2197, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 2197, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Perruso rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2197, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GAMBLING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 2 noes, with Representative Perruso voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Kapela and McDermott voting no.

H.B. No. 1732, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 1732, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Matsumoto rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto's written remarks are as follows:

"In 2021, the Legislature allowed for citizens to carry electric guns for their protection. This bill would not allow the owner of the electric gun to carry it, even if not operational, basically anywhere they would need to use it. For example, not at a public school, not on public transportation, no state or city building or their parking lots, and the stadium. This seems to defeat the purpose of allowing electric guns for personal protection."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matayoshi rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, reservations and brief comment. I'm not against the concept of this bill, I do think it's, on further reading, it might be a little bit too broad, but I just want to note my reservations as to the number of locations that this would cover. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1732, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTRIC GUNS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 38 ayes to 12 noes, with Representatives Matayoshi and Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Eli, Gates, Har, Kitagawa, Kong, LoPresti, McDermott, McKelvey, Okimoto, Takumi, Tokioka, and Ward voting no.

H.B. No. 1453, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 1453, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you. Opposition, brief comment. Let's not further criminalize traffic offenses or poor driving. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1453, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRAFFIC VIOLATIONS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 41 ayes to 9 noes, with Representatives Kapela, D. Kobayashi, LoPresti, Lowen, McKelvey, Perruso, Quinlan, Tam, and Wildberger voting no.

H.B. No. 2213, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 2213, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Just with reservations. I support the idea behind this bill, but, as I've noted before, the title, Relating to Mail Theft, the contents of the bill have to do with FedEx and UPS packages property and not with mail or mail service. And so, I think this could present a constitutional issue down the road. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2213, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MAIL THEFT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 3 noes, with Representative McKelvey voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Har, Kapela, and Tokioka voting no.

H.B. No. 2074, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 2074, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Wildberger rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2074, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CREDIT FOR TIME OF DETENTION PRIOR TO SENTENCE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representatives Tokioka and Wildberger voting aye with reservations.

H.B. No. 2024, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 2024, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tarnas rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support of this measure. With your direction, this House took on a job that nobody else was willing to do. But we needed to do it, and that was to evaluate an alternative management framework for Mauna Kea. If people had listened to the University of Hawaii's presentation to the Land Board when they were requesting their new lease, they did evaluate several different possible futures. And when they came to this particular one, which is a management framework without the UH, they said, we really aren't going to evaluate this, we'll leave this to somebody else to do. Well, with your leadership, this House did exactly that.

"I recognize this is a challenging bill. And this is my district, I have constituents who support astronomy on Mauna Kea and constituents who say Native Hawaiians need a greater voice in the governance of Mauna Kea. My goal in taking part in this whole process was to achieve both of those. I recognize the paramount importance of Mauna Kea and the very serious responsibility that we have to manage this public trust resource. There is very strong opinions on all sides of this. And this debate is not over as to what is the best management framework for Mauna Kea.

"Through this bill, I'm seeking a path forward that provides for a substantive role for Native Hawaiians in decision making about the management of Mauna Kea and a stable future for astronomy on Mauna Kea. I hear from opponents of the bill that the future of astronomy is endangered with this bill. I respond by saying that this new management authority will need to decide about future leases for the existing observatories and for any new observatory that is proposed for the *mauna*. These decisions must be made after careful review of the proposed facility, close consultation with all stakeholders, evaluation of the environmental impact, and the determination of just and fair compensation that is to be paid for the privilege of building and operating a facility on Mauna Kea.

"The directive to the authority to prepare a plan to return the summit to its natural state is justified as an alternative option when evaluating the continued use of the existing observatories or the construction of any new observatory. The bill was amended to say that this plan to return the summit to its natural state should be prepared at the time that the ground-based observatories are considered obsolete because of space-based technology.

"Personally, I hope that the observatories will be allowed to continue to operate on Mauna Kea for many, many years to come and continue the great discoveries that they are providing to all of us on Earth. I don't expect that space-based telescopes will replace ground-based telescopes anytime soon. But this decision that we are talking about really needs to be made by the authority, not by the Legislature. And this authority is to have a greater, more substantive involvement of Native Hawaiians in the decision making on the *mauna*.

"We made significant improvements to the bill. It still needs more work. This reason I want to continue the discussion on the bill, send it to the Senate, I urge the Senate to work with this bill and improve it, send it back to the House so we can conference on it and find a path forward that is best for the *mauna* and for Hawaii. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Nakashima rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. I rise in strong support of HB 2024, Relating to Mauna Kea. Last year, this body adopted House Resolution 33, House Draft 1, establishing the Mauna Kea Working Group to develop recommendations for a new governance and management structure for Mauna Kea that collaboratively engaged all stakeholders, particularly the Native Hawaiian community.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for giving me, representative for Mauna Kea, the honor and privilege of serving as the chair of this critical working group. The working group developed a report of its recommendations and it was presented to you in January. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for giving me and the working group this opportunity to chart a new course for the *mauna*. Mr. Speaker, House Bill 2024 reflects the Mauna Kea Working Group's vision for a new future for Mauna a Wākea. It reflects a shared hope and dream for a better future for the *mauna* that includes astronomy and reflects our Native Hawaiian values. Mr. Speaker, House Bill 2024 shows that we can do better for Hawaii and care for our environment and our *mauna*.

"In closing, Mr. Speaker, I would like to acknowledge the members of the working group. We dedicated six months to support this assignment and share information, learn together, and more importantly, shared our respect and *aloha* for Mauna a Wākea. There were several members in the audience earlier today, and I would like to ask that we include the list of the community members of the working group in my text. Thank you."

Representative Holt rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations. I previously voted no on this measure, and my opposition to this measure was never about the contents and the work that has been done by the working group. I appreciate the chair, I appreciate all the members who have taken the time over the months and many, many, numerous meetings to get to where we are today.

"I still have the same concerns, the strong concerns that a lot of members expressed when we did that decision making for the one hearing we had. I wish that we had more than one hearing in the House. I wish that we had, you hear the voices, they're here, it's loud. They need a venue to speak their truths. By us putting it one day on a Saturday, I don't feel like that was the best way to go about it.

"But Mr. Speaker, this measure is of such importance, I will not let the mechanics of it be the reason I vote no. Last Friday, we had our last talk story with the Hawaiian Caucus with Auntie Noe Noe Wong-Wilson, Auntie Pua Kanahele, and Mahina Paishon-Duarte, who are all participants of the working group. The discussion that we had put to rest a lot of the fears and concerns which brought about my previous no vote.

"Mr. Speaker, when I initially heard about the privacy agreement and saw the meeting minutes that came out of the working group, I had major concerns. This is not how we do any other working groups, why are there special conditions for us? But what I learned through the discussions was that although there was a little bit of a slow start to get to know each other and build the respect level, that there were a lot of very respectful and productive conversations which produced this product, what you have today.

"Mr. Speaker, we as a government have a long way to build back the trust of the Hawaiian community and the community in general. But to me, this could be a first step, but only the first step. Whether we pass this bill or not this year, this working group needs to continue with broader support from the public, hopefully including the other house. And we need to continue

these conversations and we need to build upon what has been worked on over these last few months.

"But in our discussion, we learned that these meetings only started in September, and we're in March now. It's not even one year. We can't stand here and say that we're going to put to rest decades-long issues in six months. So, although I do appreciate and thank everybody for all the work that's done, I look forward to the long process going forward and continuing to work on this issue. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I too stand with reservations on the measure. I would first like to adopt the words of the previous speaker as if they were my own, because it really hits the nail on the head, my concerns going along," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative McKelvey continued, stating:

"In committee, I said this bill represents the good, the bad, and the ugly. The good were some of the amendments that were made in response to public testimony, like for instance, removing the old abandoned not used telescopes that are up there anymore.

"When I was your Economic Development chair, I went up there with some professors who lamented the fact that you have students who could benefit from the use of telescope time, Native Hawaiian students. And telescope time, Mr. Speaker, is like pilot hours for pilots. It's what gives kids who want to be in the astronomy field a chance to up their credentials to stand out from other programs. And here they were, like you once mentioned, like the thing out of Star Wars with the eye coming out of it, this rusty shuddered telescope just sitting there. And also reexamining the issue of commercial activity, as was stated by the speaker from Kihei back in the committee hearing as well.

"Unfortunately, though, there are some bad things, and one is that this is an authority, an absolute authority, one that will last. This bill is envisioned, and the commission is envisioned to last in perpetuity. Twenty, thirty, forty years, what happens in that time if they make decisions in that group that run counter to the community, to Native Hawaiians everywhere? I mean, this is something that needs to be examined.

"But I think the one thing about it, though, is I've heard over and over again in talking to many people on the sides of the issue, and that is this. The present situation is untenable. To do nothing, to have no conversation whatsoever basically kicks the can down the road. And I think that's one thing. And speaking to one person of the bill, I said, if you were a representative, how would you go on this thing if you were in my shoes? And they said, we would support it with reservations to signify the amount of work that needs to be done. But the work cannot continue, the conversation can't continue unless there is a way to continue it. And so, I just want to echo my reservations on the measure today. Thank you."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations, Mr. Speaker. I appreciate this measure's efforts to address the longstanding criticism of the University of Hawaii's mismanagement of the *mauna*. I agree with those criticisms and the fact that we must remove UH as the manager of Mauna Kea. As a Native Hawaiian woman though, I want to state that this measure must not enable a process that leads to the construction of TMT on Mauna Kea. This is not just about a telescope or the role of astronomy in Hawaii. It's about the ongoing displacement of Hawaiian people within our own homeland.

"We are taking steps this year to rectify some of the problems facing Native Hawaiian people, including appropriating \$600 million for Hawaiian Home Lands. That is a generational investment in the well-being of Hawaii's native people. We should sustain our focus on undoing the legacy of colonialism and historical trauma that continues to harm the Native Hawaiian community. We should rededicate ourselves to restoring Hawaiian stewardship of our *āina*. It is, after all, our land, Hawaiian's land, that was stolen, colonized, and corporatized. To repair those historical injustices, we should uplift Hawaiian's rights to self-determination, especially when it comes to the fate of our most sacred spaces.

"I am glad that we are finally addressing the mismanagement of Mauna Kea, which has been detailed by Hawaiian cultural practitioners and our state auditor for over a decade. Let's use this as an opportunity to rebuild the public trust for our islands, for native people, and not just another telescope on sacred ground. Thank you."

Representative Takumi rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Wildberger rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations and hopes for an inclusive process for this very important work. I was very encouraged after the Hawaiian Caucus meeting we had the other day, that the folks that have worked on this have been extremely comprehensive, extremely cooperative, and extremely collaborative. And I look forward to this being a healing and inclusive result. Thank you."

Representative Kitagawa rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Perruso rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Kapela be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, no vote with reservations. And I know there is not a category no with reservations. But there is something good in the bill, it's better than nothing. But there is something better than nothing that I think we can do and that we should still be working on. My problem is that there's too much virtue signaling of what we've done and what we can do. My sense is, eventually this is just going to kick the can down the mountain and this stuff is going to rise up again and hit us in the face. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, no vote with some virtue and with reservations. Thank you."

Representative Okimoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Quinlan rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representatives McKelvey and Holt be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Gates rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Holt be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Branco rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations and may I adopt the words of the Representative from Kamuela as if they're my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Branco continued, stating:

"And a brief comment as well. The Mauna a Wākea stewardship authority legislation will establish a new paradigm for managing and caring for our *wahi pana*, significant cultural, historic, and ecological important places in Hawaii based on Hawaiian culture, values, and principles. Also important is the need for the Native Hawaiian and community participation in the formation and ongoing oversight of these entities and these special places.

"This is one of the reasons I vote WR, is I believe that the astronomical community should have a seat at the table. But more importantly, this hard conversation happened, and this is a move forward. And only with hard conversations can we get to a consensus. And I believe that we have gotten there, but we still need one more voice at the table. But also, what's most important is to note that this is equity for Native Hawaiians. And with the working group that is proposed, Native Hawaiians will have a significant amount of equity at the table. *Mahalo*."

Representative Ward rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Holt be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2024, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MAUNA KEA," passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Branco, Gates, Holt, Kapela, Kitagawa, Matsumoto, McKelvey, Okimoto, Perruso, Quinlan, Takumi, and Wildberger voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives B. Kobayashi, D. Kobayashi, LoPresti, Lowen, and Ward voting no.

Representative Ward rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, would it be possible to hear some rationale why it's being recommitment? Just as a rationale for the recommitment just as a query, point of information."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the motion to recommit, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support of the motion for recommitment. This measure is addressing a very critical and important issue in our community, but it needs more time for discussion and further development in the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Okimoto rose to speak in opposition to the motion to recommit, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to the recommitment. Mr. Speaker, our America's founders considered self-preservation to be a fundamental natural right of all people, so much so that they codified this in the Second Amendment. Recommitting this bill feeds into the idea that citizens must seek permission to exercise their fundamental right to self-preservation. Therefore, I urge this body to send this piece of legislation to the Senate, Mr. Speaker. Thank you."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, point of information. Is this a recommittal time certain or a recommittal that goes forever and ever?"

The Chair then stated:

"The latter, this is a permanent recommittal."

The House of Representatives of the Thirty-First Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2022, convened at 12:02 p.m., with Vice Speaker Mizuno presiding.

The invocation was delivered by Representative Angus L.K. McKelvey, after which the Roll was called showing all members present, with Representative Ichiyama participating remotely via videoconference, and with the exception of Representative Kitagawa, who was excused.

By unanimous consent, reading and approval of the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Twenty-Eighth Day was deferred.

ORDER OF THE DAY

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1027-22) recommending that H.B. No. 1600, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

But we've got a \$16 billion budget and if we can't give some chump change to start the prevention of COVID for the future of the State of Hawaii, for the people of Hawaii, we are conspicuously absent. For those things, Mr. Speaker, I'll save the \$600 million for the Hawaiians for the third reading. Thank you."

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. We have more seawall resos on the OD today, and the first one today is a property, if anybody didn't look up the TMK, at Kawaiiki Beach Park. While our director of the Department of Land and Natural Resources, when she's speaking to television cameras, says she's not going to do anything to jeopardize our beaches in Hawaii, she wrote testimony in support for all three of these hardening projects. So, in opposition. Thank you very much."

The House of Representatives of the Thirty-First Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2022, convened at 12:06 p.m., with Vice Speaker Mizuno presiding.

The invocation was delivered by Representative Dee Morikawa, after which the Roll was called showing all members present, with Representative Ichiyama participating remotely via videoconference.

By unanimous consent, reading and approval of the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Thirtieth Day was deferred.

ORDER OF THE DAY

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Water & Land, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1032-22) recommending that S.B. No. 204, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 204, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AQUATIC RESOURCES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Water & Land, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1033-22) recommending that S.B. No. 573, SD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 573, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WILDLIFE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Morikawa, seconded by Representative Matsumoto and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering a certain House Bill for Third Reading by consent calendar.

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 1600, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 1600, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Luke rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise to speak in favor of House Bill 1600, House Draft 1, this is the budget for the executive branch. But before we begin, let me first thank the committee and the chairs. The last two years have been really difficult, and I know the chairs struggle, alongside with every member of the House, as we looked at some of the devastating cuts. And we just wanted to thank all the chairs for their patience and working with the Finance Committee and our staff to craft the budget that we have today. I know it's been challenging, and we're just thankful that we are here today to address all the needed programs within the State of Hawaii. So, I just wanted to send my deepest appreciation to all the chairs and the committees for their hard work.

"I also wanted to send a special thanks to the Vice Chair. He has not just taken the role of the vice chair, but he has also done CIP for the State and for the House as well. So, my deepest appreciation to my friend from Makawao for stepping up and filling this really difficult role. One of the first things he said to me was, oh this kind of not easy, eh? So, I know he has a deeper appreciation for what we do as well, but I really appreciate him, and I see the diligence and the hard work that he puts in. So, my deepest appreciation to the Vice Chair.

"And, of course, everything that we do and even in our in our offices, we can't do our work, whether it's House majority or House minority or even the running of session through Clerk's and Sergeant-at-Arms, we can't do our job the way that we can without our staff. So, I would like to introduce my staff. First up, of course, we have Nan Kalupahana, who doesn't sit with his colleagues but sits behind me just to make sure that I don't make mistakes, and watching, make sure that I say everything correctly. But, Nandana Kalupahana, I couldn't do my job if it wasn't for Nan. So, if you can give a big round of applause to Nan.

"And my office manager is here, when I call your names, if you could stand up very quickly. My office manager is Rachele Lamosao. And members, you can hold your applause until I'm done. So, in the front staff we also have Edwin 'Maka' Ayers and Devan 'Kahale' Ibuos. And under the research staff, it's headed by Randall Hiyoto, and you guys just remain standing, and then his right hand is Stacey Tagala. And under the research section we have Jackie Araki, Anita Hsiung, Joy Nakashima, and Cindy Ng. Under the budget section, we have the budget chief who is Riley Fujisaki, he also stepped up in this role really quickly. Missing is Julie Yang, the supervisor. And with him will be Aldric Ulep, Jon Kawamura, and our session staff Casey Nakamura, who is none other than the daughter of Representative Nakamura, Jared Kimura, and Megan Reish. And so, if the members could help me in congratulating and thanking the Finance staff. Thank you very much.

"Mr. Speaker, this budget includes \$8.5 billion in general funds and \$16.6 billion in all means of financing. As I stated earlier, to state that the last two years have been difficult would be an understatement. The State faced a budget deficit nearing \$3 billion just a few years ago. But thanks to the federal relief funds and the Legislature's commitment to build up the rainy day fund, we were able to salvage many of the critical social safety net programs which were planned for a significant reduction."

Representative Tarnas rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Luke continued, stating:

"Thank you very much, Representative. This year, we're seeing a completely different budget scenario. After the governor submitted his budget to the Legislature, the Council on Revenues upgraded its revenue projections twice. What we have today is an unprecedented opportunity to address many unmet needs within the state with strategic and forward-thinking approach.

"I want to begin by talking about our obligation to our Native Hawaiian population and honoring our Hawaiian culture and heritage. As we announced at the beginning of this session, I'm proud that this legislature is making a significant commitment to address the long-awaited individuals on the DHHL waitlist. Although that is not incorporated within this budget, the money commitment is a part of the overall financial plan.

"In addition to the \$600 million set aside by the Legislature, this budget, thanks to the CIP Chair, also includes \$41.5 million to build an affordable rental project for DHHL beneficiaries. In addition to that, \$30 million for lot development and \$5 million for repair and maintenance. Together, this is the largest single appropriation made in one year. At the same time, we cannot forget the needs of the homestead communities. That is why this budget also includes \$10 million for homestead services.

"The resurgence of Native Hawaiian language has to be supported. *ʻŌlelo Hawaii* is an official language in the State of Hawaii, and we should encourage parents who want their *keiki* to be educated through Hawaiian immersion programs. That education actually starts at the preschool level. That is why this budget includes \$2.8 million, including 14 positions under

the Imi Loa program at the University of Hawaii, Hilo, to begin a teaching pathway for emergent preschool programs.

"Mr. Speaker, it is our responsibility to preserve and protect our natural resources and provide the means to manage our state lands. Kahoolawe Island Reserve has made tremendous strides toward restoration of the land and cultivation of Hawaiian culture on Kahoolawe. This budget provides additional positions and \$500,000 to support their good work.

"At the Legislature, we have the benefit of sharing ideas and expanding on the successes within our state. Building on the good work of the Hanalei community and the Hanalei Representative to re-envision Haena park, this budget provides \$16 million ceiling and \$1.2 million to fund 28 positions at the state parks to address destination management and for upkeep of state parks.

"Also part of our mission is to protect our natural resources in controlling invasive species. Time and time again, we hear new species coming onto our shores and damaging some of our natural areas. I'm proud that the House has continuously demonstrated our commitment to aggressively tackle state's invasive species program problem. That's why this budget includes multiple areas that we're planning to tackle. Let me spell out a few of them. Four hundred twenty-five thousand dollars to fight invasive pest species such as the coffee berry borer beetle, which has been something that, especially the Kona representatives, had fought really strongly for; spittle bug problem; and now, the Japanese beetle. These all impact the state's coffee and ranching industries, and they need our support.

"This budget also provides \$900,000 to address the increasing axis deer population. And it's a huge problem, especially on the neighbor islands. Albizia trees have continued to be a problem, so this provides \$645,000 to clear albizia trees surrounding the State Veterans Cemetery, and I want to thank especially the Hilo representatives who have fought really hard for the clearing of albizia. This also provides \$1.7 million for Rapid 'Ōhia Death Response. This was not included in the governor's budget, but because the House has been really aggressive on this front, I wanted to thank the members for again fighting for 'ōhia death response."

Representative Morikawa rose to yield her time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Luke continued, stating:

"And because we're constantly trying to tackle problems after the invasive species are here, we will be providing an additional \$1.5 million to fund Hawaii Invasive Species Council so that they can be ready when the next invasive species come ashore.

"Mr. Speaker, what is special about Hawaii is its people. We have a duty to care for the most vulnerable. This budget makes significant investments to individuals in need. But I want to highlight just a few of them. Just in the recent years, and time after time we hear horrific accounts of failures within our state to care for children under the state's jurisdiction. This budget provides \$2.9 million in new money and to establish 48 new positions, along with extensive training for personnel and IT improvements at the Child Welfare Services Program. And thanks to many of the efforts, especially the Waimanalo Representative and the Leeward Representative, for making this a priority. I fear that this may not be enough because it's not really about funding. But I think we have to do better. And the Finance Committee members will continue to work with our subject matter chairs, Health and Human Services Chairs, to do what is necessary in the best interests of the child.

"The Office of Long-Term Care Ombudsman ensures that our *kūpuna* are safe and getting the care they deserve. However, relying on volunteers with limited resources deprives the agencies of fulfilling that mandate. This budget provides \$276,000 for five new program specialists to make sure that every island is staffed correctly.

"Criminal justice reform continues to be a priority for the House, and thanks to the CMV Chair and Vice Chair for continuing on this fight. And I think we are proud to say that the Finance Committee, along with the House, did not fund the \$15 million request for the construction of the new OCCC. And thank you for all your efforts in making sure that this was heard loud and clear by the committee members.

"Rather, our focus was on reentry. The recidivism rate among incarcerated women is 50%. Out of 200 incarcerated women, for 100 women to continue to go through our jail system is not a good response. In order to reverse that trend, this budget invests \$5 million for reentry program and support services at the Women's Community Corrections Center's Intake Center. We are hopeful that this will reverse the trend and provide the support services as they come out of prison. And we want to especially thank the Women's Caucus for leading the effort and especially the only member who was on Zoom today, thanks to her efforts and the Women's Caucus, Majority Leader, and all the members of the Women's Caucus for fighting for justice for the incarcerated women population. So, my heart goes out to all of you folks.

"Substantial amounts of federal relief funds were used to stabilize both the Department of Education and the University of Hawaii budgets last year. This budget goes beyond just restoring federal ARPA and ESSER funds with general funds. For DOE, to name a few, this budget provides \$32.5 million to address shortage differentials to retain and recruit teachers for special education, Hawaiian language immersion, and the hard-to-fill locations. This also provides \$1.1 million for classroom supplies, instructional materials, and technology to provide equity of access to students. It also provides over \$1 million for 17 positions to make the pilot Special Education Teacher Mentoring Program permanent. In addition, \$500,000 for commercial enterprises to allow high school students to expand and invest in their commercial enterprises, \$2.4 million for 18 positions to establish a new nursing section for the DOE, \$6.3 million to furnish equipment to equip new classroom and school buildings across the state. These are some of the few things that we're putting into the DOE."

Representative Branco rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Luke continued, stating:

"Thank you very much. In addition to that, for the University of Hawaii, this budget provides \$4.8 million for the expansion of Community College Promise Program. This will serve an additional 2,164 students. This budget also expands the Promise Program to the four-year colleges, including UH Manoa, UH Hilo, and West Oahu, \$19.3 million will serve an additional 4,882 students. And I think this House will commit that this is to ensure that money is not going to be a barrier to higher education, and I wanted to thank the House members for their support. In addition, this budget made significant investments toward Title IX programs and JABSOM's graduate residency programs for neighbor islands.

"Lastly, one item to note is the \$33 million for broadband expansion, which will be used to match over \$200 million in federal funds for broadband. This is an example of how this budget sets the framework for the future. We have a lot of work to do, but I'm glad to be a part of this body to do that work together. I humbly present this budget for your consideration and support. *Mahalo.*"

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support of this budget, it's a good budget, and I agree with just about everything the Chair of Finance has said, except for a couple of things and particularly for two things that are missing. The first thing that I said was conspicuously absent was in my second reading speech which says, we should have our own pharmaceutical industry. Oceanit, spit in a cup, 20 bucks, 10 minutes, we need to promote as much as we can to keep our people safe. Which is related to the second thing that's missing.

"Mr. Speaker, half of the kids that are in public school are low income. If we are in charge, as the managers of the governing body which has an effect on the economy, if half of our citizens are low economic, on the low-income level, we're not doing our job. So, it's a great budget, but if we still have half of our kids, half our families that are low income, all of you know the ALICE study that says 48% are one paycheck away from homelessness, that is totally unacceptable. If we're responsible, we need to do a better job.

"Now to the good part of the budget, \$600 million for the Hawaiian Homes Commission. That is historical. It's inspiring. It offers hope to a community that's been waiting 100 years and has 28,000 people on the waitlist. Mr. Speaker, not because the money is going to go a long way, if you actually look at the numbers when you look at infrastructure and

probably the house running 250, maybe infrastructure running \$100,000. It's going to probably make maybe 1,200 houses or 1,200 people off the waitlist, which is 2,800. Which means if we do this every year for the next two sessions, we're going to be able to take the waitlist down to zero. Not rocket science, but it's leverageable.

"The point is, Mr. Speaker, we've got to do for the Hawaiian community, which we promised long, long, long time ago. And as you know, when you're at the bottom of the socioeconomic ladder, highest incarcerated, highest incidence of diabetes, least in homeownership, educational achievement, this bill means an awful lot. I hope DHHL can deliver it, they can put the houses in the place that they're supposed to be. And Mr. Speaker, that this body not weary in its well doing, that we continue to support what, as the Chair said, this is a historical moment for the Hawaiian community to have so much money so quickly. But still, we've got a long ways to go, Mr. Speaker.

"So, thank you for this, for the Speaker, for the Vice Speaker, and for the Finance Committee for the progress that we've made. And hopefully the progress will make an economic development in the near future. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1600, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Tokioka: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. On behalf of the Kauai delegation, I'd like to announce, and I'm sure most of us saw this morning, that the John A. Burns School of Medicine announced that Dr. Priscilla Chan and Mark Zuckerberg gifted a \$10 million, six-year commitment that directly assists Kauai's physician shortage. Kauai's medical training track is one of the multi-pronged programs that the funding will go to and be directed at. Through the Kauai medical training track, six medical students from JABSOM will be accepted into this program annually beginning this summer, July 2022. The program will fund tuition fees for all four years and will also fund transportation and lodging. The students will have to have ties from Kauai or any neighbor island.

"This is an incredible, incredible grant. I know the chairs of Health and Education appreciate this grant as well. I also found out that the Kauai health indicators note that Kauai alone has more uninsured people, more strokes, and more hypertension, and more adults with cancer than the rest of the State of Hawaii. I just got this information today, and that's astounding. We also know that education is the equalizer for local students, and this gift is going to make a big, big difference in the community that these kids come from and will hopefully stay and live on Kauai and work on Kauai.

"And speaking to Dr. Jerris Hedges, the dean of the medical school, and I completely agree with him when he explains, to address Kauai's physician shortage we need more medical students from Kauai, and we must expand our medical training on Kauai. So, in closing, once again, on behalf of the Kauai delegation, we just want to thank Dr. Priscilla Chan, Mark Zuckerberg, and his entire team for this generous, generous gift. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for this opportunity to say that publicly."

They are released back into society with very little skills or capacity, despite years of incarceration and missed opportunities.

"We were also surprised this year by the lobbying efforts of the Women's Prison Project, a coalition that spans multiple sectors and is across party lines. I was pleasantly surprised in how much I agreed with former Republican Governor Linda Lingle that we need to effectuate significant criminal justice change here and across America. Just years ago, versions of the corrections committee was all about enhancing sentencing. Now, the conversation has changed to reduce incarceration, to rehabilitate community members, and to support victims.

"If we pass this and the other measures that are before us, about half a dozen of them, we will be making a significant change here in the State of Hawaii. We are all very close to the justice system. Addiction, poor decisions can affect all of us or all of our families. This measure shows our shared humanity across multiple sectors, across party lines. Thank you so much. I think that we should pass it and pass the other bills that are associated with it for future generations. Thank you so much."

Well, I think we have a responsibility to do our numbers before we pass it on to them. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, with reservations, hoping enlightenment from my colleagues. Thank you."

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support. Being in the minority for 16 years, it's great when we have an opportunity to work together and when everybody agrees on something, as with this measure and the body's overall reaction to the crisis at Red Hill, given our limited legal authorities that we have. Quite frankly, I'm not sure everyone is aware of it, but we're basically at the mercy of the federal government. That's part of the problem.

"Mr. Speaker, I think this is a great measure. I think the body is prudent in doing it because we don't know what's going to happen. And what I mean by that, Mr. Speaker, is a real time snapshot for the body. Where are we right now? Well, we have a memo from Secretary Austin saying that he was going to close the facility. But there is no timeline. There is not a target date or a completion date. Even the great John Kennedy said, we're going to go to the Moon by the end of the decade.

"We don't have a target date. We don't even have a start date. What we have is this nebulous, vague promise, and in there, direction to the commanders to start thinking about this in a different way, this fueling issue. The only time frame we have is 12 months that we're told it will take to start to empty the tank until they're all empty, that's it. But we don't have a start date, no completion date. So, that's the Austin memo, then that's what we're basing all our hopes on, this secretary of defense memo. It doesn't have the force of law.

"The omnibus bills that were recently passed by Congress were great. All the remediation money we need, all the money for families to reimburse them for the hotels and all that stuff has been taken care of. But in both of these bills that were recently passed, there is no memo or any notion of closure, there is only funds to defuel and repair infrastructure and remediation. In fact, the latest omnibus bill states the DOD will prepare a new report looking at all, and I emphasize the word all, options to store fuel in the Pacific. That includes obviously the status quo.

"So, my point is, Mr. Speaker, it's great that this body is engaged and moving forward. My point is, we're not out of the woods yet. Thank you."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I rise in support. Regarding the previous speaker's discussion, I am in total agreement that we're not out of the woods yet. I further think that we are fulfilling our constitutional duties under the State Constitution to provide clean drinking water for all of our constituents. So, despite us not having all of the power of the federal government, us complying with the needs of the Constitution, as we are doing in this bill and in other bills and in previous resolutions, are in full support of what our communities need.

"Also in response, we are not yet sure about the process by which the County's Board of Water Supply will enter into a moratorium for the issuance of new water permits. If this were to go into effect, this would have a significant impact on the economy here on Oahu for building contracts, for development, for the various unions that we work with, for the various working class jobs that people do in construction. We don't have a process by which the Board of Water Supply will decide how to give out permits once a moratorium has happened. We don't have a process or a timeline from the Department of Defense for the defueling or the decommissioning of these tanks moving forward.

"There are many questions yet unanswered, that I'm hoping that your Committee on Red Hill and this body can help find answers for prior to the conclusion of the legislative session. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, support. And I would like the words of the previous speaker and my colleague from Ewa Beach to be entered into the Journal as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"And, Mr. Speaker, my point is this, I have a concern about the way the bill reads on page two, line one. It says that the money will be reimbursed *vis-à-vis* what is called, the Department of Health will pursue the reimbursement. That's pretty wimpy and weak as far as I'm concerned. It

should say will obtain the reimbursement and with the timeline. So, as we kick this down the line, if you will, I think we have to tighten it up. It looks like, well, you can pay it back, you're going to pursue it. You know, you can pursue something for years and years and years, like the TMT and other things, you just keep kicking the thing down the line. So, I think we need to tighten it up and be serious about this because my people, and there's many people in this building, our constituents, drink this water, and we got to be assured that it's pure. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McDermott rose to respond, stating:

"Still in support. I want to acknowledge my friend from Kalihi's work in the very beginning. He spearheaded a call for an investigation and that helped get the ball rolling, excellent job there. And I think we're all in agreement. But as of Monday, my dear colleague was talking about the legal process, as of Monday afternoon, they hadn't withdrawn their permit request and in the legal case review. So, they have two things going. They have a permit request and then a legal appeal in court, and they haven't withdrawn from either of those.

"So, when you combine all of that and the fact that there's no dates, for start, no target date, let's have it done by 2025 or something like that and then you work towards that. There's nothing except his aspirations, his desire to have this done. But as you know, it requires a line item with funding next to it. There's not even any money in here to plan to move any time soon, no money to plan a move, let alone no money to move. So, that's where we're at. And we're going to catch it because the public is under the impression it's closed, it's a done deal, finished. That's not closing anytime soon. Thank you, sir."

Representative Har rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition. I'm sorry, guys, I know we all want to go home because it's a long weekend, but very quickly. Number one, in the CPC Committee, none of the county planning departments testified on this measure. This bill, beginning January 1st, 2023, would prohibit county planning departments from issuing any building permits on new construction if in fact there are 10 or more parking stalls in that new construction building and all 100% of the stalls must be EV ready. That said, my issue number two is, I think that this bill absolutely is an evisceration of home rule.

"Secondly, my issue is affordable housing. If this bill applied to luxury units, no problem whatsoever. But when you apply a bill like this to market rate or affordable housing, you have now increased the cost of that housing. This is going to have an absolute detrimental impact upon the affordable housing industry, as well as our market rate industry, only increasing the costs for our local residents.

"The City and County of Honolulu dealt with a similar issue two years ago. And they, in fact, put in an exemption for affordable housing at about 100% and below AMI because they recognize 80% to 100% is workforce housing. So, if this bill should move forward, I implore the subsequent committees to please consider exempting affordable housing. Thank you."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. First of all, just to point out that this would only apply to multi-unit dwellings. So, not all building permits. But what we were sent over from the Senate basically put this requirement in place but put the onus on apartment owners to pay for it after the fact. And that is like 10 times more expensive than if it's included in the building up front. So, to us, it was more of an equity issue to think we're going to put some requirement in law that EV charging facilities must be installed, but to have it done after the fact instead of upfront with the construction of it, when the cost of it is much, much cheaper.

"The City and County does have a law that I think is pretty weak and the exemption for affordable housing was due to political compromising, *et cetera*. But in my view, it's really a detriment to low- and moderate-income individuals. It makes it inaccessible for them to purchase an electric vehicle and to realize the savings that they could enjoy if they were able to have an electric vehicle by not being able to charge it at home. So, we're still working on this issue. We got over what we got from the Senate and tried to work to make it better. Thank you."

Representative Onishi rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in opposition. And I'd like to have the words of the Representative from Kapolei added as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Onishi continued, stating:

"Also, I'd like to add that this requires 100%, all of the parking stalls in a development, to be EV charging ready. It does not take into account, and the people who were there to testify could not tell us what is going to be the future of zero emission vehicles. Yet at this point, we're trying to make this a mandate across all new development, and we don't even know if hydrogen vehicles, for example, are going to be three, four, five years around the corner where that's going to be the more environmentally friendly type of vehicles and maybe even more affordable than electric vehicles, yet we're putting in all this infrastructure, requiring all this infrastructure and costs that could affect development.

"One of the things that concerns me is, yes, the City and County already has standards for new development, but it's at 25%. And in my mind, that makes a lot of sense because you don't even know how many of those units would have electric vehicles or some other type of zero emission vehicle. So, with that, I am strongly opposed to this measure at this point. Thank you."

Representative Lowen rose to respond, stating:

"Still in support, Mr. Speaker. I would just suggest that the Representative from Hilo do some looking into the viability of hydrogen vehicles for passenger cars, the price point, the market readiness, the cost of hydrogen fuel, especially if you expect to make it from renewable resources. Because I would say that the direction that this industry is moving is, for those of us that spend a lot of time working on this issue, is pretty clear. And that is that electric vehicles are going to be the future for passenger cars.

"There is a place for hydrogen for heavier duty vehicles, for transit, for the long distance things like trucking, *et cetera*, and manufacturing, there's a huge place and opportunity for a future for hydrogen. But I and many others who work in this area do not see that it's going to be for passenger cars. And so to continue to entertain this and invest state funds in two paths at once really poses a loss to taxpayers, a misuse of taxpayer funds. It's a

real opportunity cost. And I think that we need to go all in on electric vehicles for passenger cars. That's the future."

Representative D. Kobayashi rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Okimoto rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representatives Onishi and Har be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kong rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Same request, still in opposition. What's interesting is, we do not know the advancements of technologies. I mean, every day something new happens. I mean, who could think that we could charge our phones with a portable charger now? Who knows one day that electric vehicles will not have portable chargers? If we are going to invest and put in this infrastructure, it may not even be needed in the future. And by the time this bill and this all takes effect, all this permitting and everything, it might be too late, if we're going to spend all that money committing ourselves when who knows what the future will bring in technologies. Thank you, Mr. Speaker," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. I'd like to enter the words of the Chair of Energy & Environmental Protection into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Branco: "On Saturday will be Prince Kuhio Day, and tomorrow we will celebrate it, and I just want to share a few words about this great statesman, civic leader, sportsman, and heir to the throne of the Kingdom of Hawaii. I look with awe and humble aspiration at the life of Prince Jonah Kuhio or Ke Ali'i Maka'āinana. Most remember the great accomplishments this honored *ali'i* achieved. My inspiration comes from the many hurdles he overcame. At the age of 24, he participated in the 1895 Wilcox Rebellion against the Republic of Hawaii. This uprising was unsuccessful, and Prince Kuhio was sentenced to a year in prison, while others were charged with treason and sentenced with execution. Distraught, he self-exiled himself for a year in Africa.

"The people begged him to return, and he did because he needed leadership that our people needed. He rose above the anger, the disappointment, and dedicated himself to serving the Hawaiian people. His

success was not in protest but was astutely learning and successfully navigating lawmaking as Hawaii's delegate to the United States Congress.

"It is reported Kuhio arrived in Washington, D.C. with much excitement, though the reality of the racial prejudice quickly set in. When President Theodore Roosevelt greeted Kuhio in 1903, he balked at the name Kalaniana'ole. 'I shall not call him Prince Cupid, and I cannot pronounce his last name. I never would be able to remember it, anyhow,' the president complained. 'Can't we cut it off somewhere and make it simpler?'"

"Prince Kuhio devoted his life to helping his people. He survived displacement, imprisonment, disappointment, and prejudice. As a lawmaker, I applaud his strength and character, his commitment to doing what is right, even when faced with failure and rejection. Truly, one's best successes do not often come from life's greatest disappointments. *Mahalo*."

Representative Ward: "Mr. Speaker, I am compelled to say in the spirit of bipartisanship, I want to thank the gentleman from Kailua for mentioning the meaning and the seriousness, as well as he being the founder of the Republican Party, of which a lot of us stand for us. So, thank you very much and happy Prince Kuhio Day, Kalaniana'ole Day. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McDermott rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I stand in strong support obviously and my comments can be related to both of these following two resolutions. I saw in the paper today that \$5 million was appropriated to the UH School of Engineering to continue work on fuel tank safety. What we do know is that prior to this, they were trying to develop a tank within a tank solution, which would take us up to about 2035 or something like that.

"This brings me back to pause, all these breadcrumbs are around telling us these things aren't getting shutdown anytime soon. There's no target date to close them down. That's why this thing is so important, to let them know of our intentions. There's no target date to close this, there's not even an estimated target date. At least Kennedy said, we're going to go to the moon by the end of the decade. But we don't have that.

"What we have is defueling. We finally got the money for defueling, which this addresses, but defueling is not a decommissioning, they are two distinctly different things. And I would encourage my colleagues to read the defueling order from the State Department of Health, which I have on several occasions. So, there's no start date, there's no finish date. That's why this resolution is important. And there's no money, Mr. Speaker, to shut it down. There is not even a dollar in this big federal budget that was just passed. A dollar, there's not even a dollar to plan, to plan on shutting them down.

"All we have is a statement from the secretary of defense on a memo. That's not a legal document. In order for this to close, we need the Congress to articulate in legislation, just like they do with the BRAC, that this facility will be closed by X amount of date, 2022 or 2023, and they work their way backwards to meet that target. That's the way they always do it. When they invaded Normandy, June 6, 1944, they didn't say, well, we'll figure it out at some point. They set a date and they worked their way back to accomplish that mission. And I believe they can accomplish the mission. What I don't believe is that it's going to close, and certainly not anytime soon. So, that's why these resolutions are so important, and the work of the body is so important. Thank you, sir."

It takes Washington, D.C. from what otherwise is a constitutionally designated capital of the nation and makes it just like all of us, a state. I think if you look at the numbers, it's got 718,000 people, which would mean one House seat, but it would be two Senate seats. The House of Representatives, the Congress has already passed this. It's probably a DOA, dead on arrival, in the U.S. Senate. So, I'm not sure what our motivation is to do this. And I know we can't impute motivation, but it looks like it's stacking, on a partisan basis, one side of the aisle, rather than for the other. And why we'd want to go against the Constitution to do this, I just don't understand. So, for those reasons, Mr. Speaker, this is a national gerrymandering for the sake of one political party and to the detriment of the other. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, this is not good policy. Thank you."

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"In support, Mr. Speaker, brief comment. If you were to travel to Washington, D.C. and you would find yourself stopped behind a car of a resident and you took a look at their license plate, on the license plate it would say, no taxation without representation. Thank you."

Representative McDermott rose to speak in opposition to both measures, stating:

"No vote please, Mr. Speaker, and may my sentiments reflect the speaker from Hawaii Kai's remarks."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, for my good friend from the North Shore, I really appreciate his input. However, I lived in Washington, D.C. for five years and I had a license plate that said, it didn't say what he said, but he should know, as all of us should know, that the highest paid individuals in the nation are within that 135 mile radius. They are not hurting, they are prospering, and they want to leverage that prosperity into political leverage, and that's the issue. It's not whether taxation without representation, they have more representation, they have Congress basically as a city council. So, they have access to all the power, all the individuals, and all the capital that they need. Now there's a lot of different issues that are going on in terms of the murder rate, *et cetera*, but in terms of, they're saying, taxation without representation, that's a little bit off the wall. Thank you."

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"In support. I'd like to ask that the words of the Representative from North Shore be entered into the Journal as my own. And also, would like to note that in 2019 there were 692,000 people living in Washington, D.C. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Tam rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I would like to have the words of the Representative from the North Shore inserted into the Journal as if they my own. I also want to make note that the population of Washington, D.C. is currently higher than the population of Wyoming or Vermont, and both of those states could send two senators to represent them and one congressional member to the House of Representatives. And it's simply unfair that individuals who are living in Washington, D.C. do not have

adequate representation. And for those reasons, I am in support of this measure," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Okimoto rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her on both measures, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her on both measures, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"In support. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to have the words of the Representatives from North Shore, Waikiki, and Kauai entered into the Journal as if they were my own. And just point out, there are a lot of economically disadvantaged residents of Washington, D.C., unlike the implication that all of the residents of D.C. are congresspeople or lobbyists or so on, that is not factual," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Mr. Speaker, this is a debt that's being paid by this generation. I mean, obviously none of us prohibited that.

And there is a rise and a renaissance of Hawaiian language. But I think this is very appropriate. The same way, Mr. Speaker, I don't know if some of, maybe one representative was here when I was here, when Peter Apo and I in 1993, when the nation had the Clinton apology to the Hawaiians. Representative Apo, a Democrat, and myself, sponsored a state apology to the Hawaiian people for the overthrow. So just as a footnote to this, this is important. There's a turning now, if you will, of what's going on in the Hawaiian community. Again, I commend the leadership for the \$600 million that is going into building more Hawaiian homes. It's time for the renaissance to get politically engaged as much as it has been socially and economically. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the reports of the Committee were adopted and H.R. "Mr. Speaker, thank you. Since it's up for adoption, I'd like to stand in strong support of the resolutions. During the committee hearing on these resolutions, we had a testifier from the area educate us on the fact that the region alone takes about 45 minutes to cover. And when you couple that with the time it takes for response of the police from the Kapolei area, there's clearly a need for this to happen. So, I just wanted to stand in strong support because I think it's long overdue. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support. And I want to say that this speaks to the lack of staffing for HPD across the island. And I think that all of the members are aware that we are short 250 members of HPD and it affects all of our communities. And I recognize that it is affecting the Leeward Coast in the most dramatic ways. So, for those reasons, I support this effort."

Representative Har rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. May I please first have the words of the Representative from Lahaina entered into the Journal as if they were my own. And secondly, we have, I think if you look at the shift in population, the Leeward side has grown over the last 10, 20 years. We know that's the second city where all the development is slated to occur. And as a result, our communities have all gotten bigger. There should be some type of per capita allocation with respect to police officers. We all recognize the fact that HPD is having a hard time hiring right now and that the current mayor has made a pledge to try to actively recruit. But that said, we continue to have major problems on the west side because of response times. So, that is why I stand in strong support of this resolution. Thank you, Mr. Speaker," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"In strong support. And my exact sentiment was expressed by the gentlewoman from Wahiawa, and may her words be put in the Journal as my own with her permission," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you. In support. First, I'd like the words of the Representative from Wahiawa and Kapolei entered into the Journal as if they were my own. I just wanted to speak to some of the facts on this, that our district is so large, the police district for the west side, it stretches from Kaena Point all the way to Iroquois Point. And even if there's something as simple as a traffic light outage, we have to have HPD take officers say, from Nanakuli and Waianae, so there's almost no officers there, just to come direct traffic in Ewa Beach, and vice versa. It's a public safety issue. It's vital that they simply divide it up. The idea is they're going to divide it up in two so that there are two police districts so that the people are adequately served for the growing population. It's desperately needed for the west side. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the reports of the Committee were adopted and H.R. Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1527-22) recommending that H.C.R. No. 17 be adopted.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 17, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES TO CONVENE A TASK FORCE TO DEVELOP A FERAL UNGULATE MANAGEMENT PLAN FOR WEST HAWAII," was adopted, with Representatives Eli, Todd, Woodson, and Yamane being excused.

Representative Ohno, for the Committee on Corrections, Military, & Veterans, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1528-22) recommending that H.R. No. 182 be adopted.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.R. No. 182 be adopted, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in strong support. I'm going to try to do this without a mask on. This resolution requests the Department of Land and Natural Resources to conduct public forums to solicit input from the community regarding the lease of state lands to the military. I'd like to give my personal and professional thanks to the Corrections, Military, & Veterans Affairs Committee for hearing this measure and for our vibrant discussion.

"This resolution would not affect military lands like those at Pearl Harbor, which was delivered to the United States under quasi legal arrangements with the government of the Kingdom of Hawaii in a reciprocity treaty, which was the result of what was later called the Bayonet Constitution of 1887, so called because of the duress placed upon the government to cede land and power to Americans. This would not affect significant parcels of Kaneohe or Kauai or the Northwest Hawaiian Islands.

"What is being considered is lands owned by the state, by the people of the state. Twenty-three thousand acres at Pohakuloa, 4,370 acres at Kawaiiloa at Poamoho, 1,170 acres at Kahuku, 760 acres at Makua. The U.S. military leases these lands for a dollar a year. When the leases were issued, they were for 65 years and those leases expire in 2029. What is important to note with these parcels is that the State is the landlord. Unlike recent issues with Red Hill, the ultimate power lies with us here at the State Legislature. We should also note that we do not have a military designation in the Hawaii Revised Statutes. We treat these lands as any other.

"As indicated in the testimony, when these leases were issued, there was no federal EPA. There was no Hawaii State Constitutional Convention. There was no requirement for the State and its agencies to engage in public discussions, the EIS, or the NEPA processes. Mr. Speaker, it is time we ask the community what they want. Of course, the DLNR must still undertake the EIS and NEPA processes, and those are already underway. And it may be argued that those engagements with the community over state land are sufficient. I argue they are not. They were not sufficient in discussions over the use of Mauna Kea. And they are rarely seen as sufficient to include the narratives of indigenous and working-class communities.

"This resolution would ideally prepare future versions of this House for a conversation of the use of this land. As this is state land, we can foresee that leases being a major point in future gubernatorial and federal conversations and about how we continue to partner with the United States military. A possible result would be that the Department of Defense and its branches returns to the State with a modified request for these lands. Or that we address the Hawaii Revised Statutes to include things like rent, rights to access, and other rights in alignment with the decisions of our Supreme Court.

"Mr. Speaker, this resolution can be seen as joining international efforts to reverse the historic effects of colonialism and the oppression of native and working-class communities. It has become a rallying call in the internet era. Landback, one word, landback. More than that, Mr. Speaker, this is your House reacting to the living memory of citizens who have advocated for decades for peace, for an appropriate relationship to the U.S. military in support of the land."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. I think the most important element of this resolution is that it calls upon the DLNR to assert the responsibility and take on the *kuleana* of being the landlord in these conversations in these negotiations. So, our community has been involved in this conversation since 2021. We've already started the EIS process and there has been a process of community input. But it is striking to me that the organization developing the recommendations and the entire narrative around this conversation is the military. And we need to step forward as a state and really take responsibility for this process and to own this process. And I think this resolution moves us in this direction. And I'd also just ask that those community members who have already submitted testimony and have participated in the process, that that testimony be considered and included in the DLNR's report."

Representative Branco rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Holt rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. I'd like the words of the Representative from Kalihi to be inserted into the Journal as if they were my own. Thank you very much," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

And the reality is, those who have them are not going to give them up.

"Who, just a few weeks ago, was sabre nuclear rattling in Russia? Mr. Putin. So, to sign on this, I don't think it's the word naive, but it's not practical. It's not something that has ever worked, even when we have had agreements, there's been cheating on the part of those in various large countries that have nuclear weapons. In fact, if anything, the world is, and it's the crazy part of the world, that's rushing towards them. Look what Iran is doing. Look at the deals that have been cut, delayed, and now reframed to where we may have, in a matter of months, a nuclear Iran.

"So, we, the U.S., the world leader, are going to turn around, say, well look, we're going to really forestall those or forgo them. There's nothing wrong with promoting peace, but this is not the way to do it. The way that

we've done it in the past has been mutually assured destruction, realizing that nobody wins when it's MAD. When you're MAD, nobody wins. And that's the realization. That's the reality therapy. This is more of the surrender. This is more of the Chamberlain kind of compromise, the way of saying, well, we'll give up ours if you give up yours, but you got to do it first. And this is a gesture that now, when the U.S. is trying to keep Russia off of the Ukrainians, this is not the message to send to the Congress or hopefully nobody in the Ukraine or in the Russian society will actually ever get wind of this. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, a very, very strong no for bad public policy in this reso. Thank you."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"In strong support. I have the pleasure of representing thousands of individuals from Micronesia. Many of them are here because generations ago, the United States and other countries bombed parts of Micronesia. And the health effects have been carried over. The trauma of bombing and displacing thousands of people is not just some abstract idea, but it's affecting people right here in our community. In light of that, in strong support."

"Mr. Speaker with all due respect to the origin of this reso, to the author on the Big Island, I respectively will change my with reservations from my last vote to a no vote with the following notations. If we're to learn from history, we cannot erase it. We have to learn what Captain Cook and all the heinous activities that he did. Erasing his name, yeah, it's going to be kind of like maybe for three to six months say, yeah, we got rid of Captain Cook. But the memory of Captain Cook, the guy we thought was a god and then we had basically a slaughtered god needs to be in the annals of history.

"If we take away these things, it's like taking, as I said earlier in a speech, let's take McKinley High School because of what President McKinley did, *et cetera*. And what happened with the people who were the alumni of McKinley High School, they said no way. There's a survey that was done also on should Captain Cook be removed, 604 people said no, of the 1,000 people. In other words, 60% of the people think that this is not good policy,

Mr. Speaker. And this is actually, as I like to say, metrics of which oftentimes we do stuff intuitively or on the take and don't really look at the numbers.

"For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, if we start saying with Captain Cook, then what is going to be next and then next and next? The cancel culture is, I know, a 'me too' kind of culture where we get in a role and then we want to stay in it and then suddenly we forget who we are. Americans are bad enough in geography and history as it is. We know time and again that we are probably 17th in the world in terms of our understanding and educational level, math, science, *et cetera*. This diminishes the State of Hawaii. It's not good policy.

"And again, this is nothing personal with the author, I think she's a great representative. But this is not a policy that is going to be good for the people of Hawaii, particularly for our young people who need a solid education. And Captain Cook and what he did is part of that solid education. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tam rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I majored in history in college and I can tell you I've learned nothing simply from just whether a place is named after a person or not. You learn more about history through books. So, I just want to make that note. We're not erasing history and we're not making society less smart or less knowledgeable about the individual. Books still exist, and you can learn a lot of history from books."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. This resolution is not about cancel culture, it's about restoration, as we're doing across our entire state, restoring native place names in the State of Hawaii. That's it, thanks."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 27, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE UNITED STATES CENSUS BUREAU TO RE-DESIGNATE THE CENSUS-DESIGNATED PLACE KNOWN AS CAPTAIN COOK ON THE ISLAND OF HAWAII AS KA'AWALOA AND REQUESTING HAWAII COUNTY TO REMOVE ALL REFERENCES TO CAPTAIN COOK AS A PLACE NAME ON THE ISLAND OF HAWAII," was referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, with Representatives McDermott and Ward voting no, and with Representatives Hashem, Holt, Ohno, and Todd being excused.

Representative D. Kobayashi, for the Committee on Legislative Management, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1540-22) recommending that H.R. No. 112, as amended in HD 1, be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.R. No. 112, HD 1 be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Branco rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. House Bill 2511, which will give Native Hawaiians \$600 million, is an opportunity, and this is an empowerment of the Native Hawaiian community. House Resolution 112, which would create an oversight committee, is basically telling Native Hawaiians, we want to empower you, but through what we want. This is not empowering Native Hawaiians, this is paternalism.

"If we go back to House Bill 2511 giving the \$600 million, there's already reporting requirements in the bill. And the intent of the bill is for acquisition, not construction, which House Resolution 112 is addressing. Also, the resolution puts an erroneous deadline on the process as well. And so, I want to reiterate the point that there is a difference between oversight and paternalism, there is a difference between condescension and empowerment, and this resolution does not empower Native Hawaiians. *Mahalo.*"

Representative D. Kobayashi rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you. Speaking in opposition. My initial read on this bill was on the surface of it, it seemed to be a constructive bill. But upon further review and hearing the words of my colleague from Kailua, I fully agree with him and I'll be a no as well on this. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I totally agree with the previous two speakers, except it's the wrong message to the wrong people. This is not to give a pejorative position against the Hawaiians that they can't manage their own affairs, it's not paternalism. It's basically to all of us in this room and in the Senate, because heretofore, for 100 years, we've never trusted the Hawaiians with money. And this is a position to make sure that those things, those people who are in this body and the other body, think that the Hawaiians can't handle their own money. It's an assurance because we've got a watchdog committee looking over them. Those who know real estate, those who know finance, those who know CPA in the dollars and the cents.

"So, I regret that it's looked at as a paternalistic thing, but it's really for those who have been in this legislature for 50 to 60 to 70 years who don't give the Hawaiians time of day. Now they got their money. In fact, I've got an article by the Tax Foundation, hey guys, you sure you can trust the Hawaiians with \$600 million? This is what that reso is all about. It's not about paternalism and watching over and whether they can spend it or not, it's whether we trust the Hawaiians. And this is a kind of a safeguard, a watchdog, if you will, to allow people to be confident that when they have people like Peter Savio or others who are watching over the money, people are going to say yeah, that's credible.

"Because right now, like the Tax Foundation is saying, we don't know if they're going to spend it. Over the past years, they've got unspent money from the federal government. That was a big issue Civil Beat put up. You guys don't know how to spend your money, you've wasted the money.

"So again, I want to assure my colleagues, this is something that says, have confidence in the Hawaiians because you've got people who are confident and pro Hawaiian. Because for 100 years, we've caused them to fail. And this is \$600 million, which they've needed billions and billions of dollars, years and years and years ago. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, this is a bill that makes some sense."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. No vote, please, and would like the words of my friend from Kailua entered in the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative McKelvey continued, stating:

"I'd also like to echo the sentiments of the chair of the committee that passed this resolution forward that is now obviously retracting their support in doing so.

"There's plenty of mechanisms in place, Mr. Speaker, for fiduciary integrity, and we have a Department of Hawaiian Home Lands commission that works as an open body of many stakeholders and the beneficiaries to basically, they themselves want to expend these funds as quickly as possible. They've been coming to this body over and over again asking for more funding. I applaud the work of the Finance Committee and the members in advancing the measure that will give them this money. And I think to put through a resolution, an oversight committee on top of that, will defeat the purpose of the underlying measures. Thank you."

Representative Gates rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Marten rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No vote please. And I just wanted to briefly comment that this body, the leadership, has already shown their commitment to this bill by writing it and most members here signed it. So, we don't need another resolution to give us confidence, that bill demonstrates our confidence."

Representative Tam rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Perruso rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Branco be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ganaden rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Sayama rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Quinlan rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No vote. I'd like to ask that the words of the Representative from Kailua be entered into the Journal as my own. I also wanted to note that the Representative from Hawaii Kai raises the issue of accountability for the use of the \$600 million. And I think that is an important concern as well. We do have a commission that is going to oversee the use of the funds. And I also feel that the Judiciary Committee recently passed a bill, a Senate bill, we amended the bill to include language that DHHL come up with a strategic plan for the use of the \$600 million by county. And we asked that the plan address the preferences of those on the waiting list, whether it's for sale or rental housing, and the other tools that can be used to assist with for-sale housing. So, I believe that tool, that bill, if it proceeds, can help to build the accountability with the funding that the Legislature is proposing. So, a no vote for me. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

At 12:23 p.m., Representative Belatti requested a recess and the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:30 p.m.

Representative Belatti rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representatives Marten, Branco, and Nakamura be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Morikawa rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representatives Marten, Branco, and Nakamura be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Takumi rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Woodson rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

"I'll follow leadership. No vote."

Representative Wildberger rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Nishimoto rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative LoPresti rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Takayama rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tokioka rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No vote, and may I ask that the words from the Representative from Manoa be entered into the Journal as if they were my own. He is the committee chair and I'm following his lead," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Tokioka then rose, stating:

"Point of clarification, Mr. Speaker. Was there a vote count on the previous resolution?"

Vice Speaker Mizuno: "Yes, we've got a vote count going."

Representative Ward rose, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise on a point of personal privilege to tell all my colleagues I yield to the will of this body. There's probably, I counted 27 votes, it was only 26 votes. But my point of rising for a point of personal privilege is to thank everyone for allowing the attention to be drawn to the Hawaiian community. And I think this is good. Whether you win or lose, the point is, they need our attention, they need our help. Whether it's one reso or another reso, that's the point. We have accomplished a lot here. This is the first time since the Representative from Pearl City and I, as the oldest members here, have ever had this kind of a debate on the floor.

"For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I'm very grateful to everybody, whether you voted for or against or otherwise, and I was almost convinced to be number seven. But I still think we need to draw attention to the Hawaiians, and that's what we have accomplished. Thank you, sir."

The Chair then stated:

"Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1540, House Resolution 112, House Draft 1 will not move because it had 27 no votes."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and failed to carry, and the report of the Committee was not adopted and H.R. This body, the Finance Chair, has seen fit to allocate almost \$3 million to expand the workforce at Child Welfare Services, which is very much needed, I'm sure, and also training. But that should be accompanied with some help in the management of those additional resources. And I think this audit could help a very resource-strapped branch do a better job using those funds. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the reports of the Committee were adopted and H.R. "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Because they're up for adoption, strong support for both resos, written comments to the Journal, if I may. And that a new twist in this is the presence of S corps now coming in and buying up our properties and creating illegal vacation rentals. So, with that, strong support."

Representative McKelvey's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of these resolutions. Mr. Speaker, unlicensed transient vacation rentals have become a scourge upon our neighborhoods. Given the new influx of tourism from around the world because of the post-pandemic pent-up demand, the incentive is even greater for people to convert part of their homes or even garages and yards into transient vacation rentals. Additionally, Mr. Speaker, the days of affordable transient vacation rentals, licensed or not, are over. Unscrupulous individuals can earn sometimes 10 times the amount of a legitimate vacation rental or hotel room on the open market and through the internet. With this huge financial incentive and its overwhelming demand, without strong enforcement by the counties to crack down on this activity, to increase fines, and create other types of deterrence, it is easy to see that every available space in our communities could be taken up by unlicensed underground vacation rentals, not only creating a blight on the quality of life of our neighborhoods, but also taking away desperately needed living areas for our working families to be able to find affordable long-term rentals in our community."

"In opposition. I want to emphasize that coffee leaf rust is a very, very serious disease that does need to be dealt with. I want to make sure that every penny that the State is spending to fight this disease is spent in the right way. And this came through our committee and the Department of Agriculture testified that the science behind using organic fertilizers to fight this is not only cost prohibitive, but the science is not there, that it's just not effective.

"So, if we are going to be urging the Department of Agriculture to be spending a lot of money on a treatment that is not scientifically based, I just cannot stand in support of this measure. Thank you."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. The reason this resolution was introduced is because there are organic coffee farmers in my community and across our state that can't utilize some of the subsidies that the DOA is currently allowing. Organic farmers need an organic option in order to continue to have their organic certifications. So, I trust the farmers in my district, and I will continue to uplift their voices. Thank you."

Representative Tokioka rose to speak in support of both measures with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations. As a member of the Agriculture Committee, we heard the same testimony and had the same concerns at that time. So, with reservations. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"In strong support. So, this testimony was provided before the Committee on Agriculture. And I did want to add to this conversation by saying that, oftentimes, the science is lagging around organic methods. So, while the scientific studies have not yet been completed, they are in the process of being completed and this work is being done. It just is not the kind of work actually that we have enough of. So, we don't have enough investigation into these questions. And I think that the farmers saying that the strength of the plants can be helped with organic fertilizer as a preventative measure in addressing coffee leaf rust, I think that that's important testimony."

Representative Onishi rose to speak in opposition to both measures, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition and can I have the words of the speaker from Kaneohe added in the Journal as my own. And I'd like to also add that I have had discussions with I guess the foremost expert in regards to coffee in the State of Hawaii, who works for CTAHR. And she also believes that the best way to address the coffee leaf rust is through the treatment with fungicides versus the use of fertilizer. Fertilizer does not significantly improve the treatment of coffee leaf rust on coffee trees. So, in opposition. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Marten rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her on both measures, and the Chair "so ordered."

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Representative Kapela: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Today is Transgender Day of Visibility. Today and every day we celebrate our transgender community. We have much to celebrate today but I also want to take a moment to recognize the continued harms facing our trans community, specifically transgender women of color. Of the 375 trans and gender diverse people who are reported to have been murdered last year, 96% of them were trans women or fems, 89% of those killed in the US were people of color, and 43% of those killed were migrants. We, as a body, must do more to end the epidemic of violence and discrimination towards trans women and girls of color who continue to be killed and assaulted at disproportionately higher rates than the rest of the queer community. I yield to the Representative from Wahiawa and Co-chair of the House Keiki Caucus."

Representative Perruso: "Mr. Speaker, according to the CDC, almost 2% of high school students identify as transgender. Applied to all youth, this means that there are at least 1.3 million or more trans youth nationwide. And of this number, 80% of transgender students said they've avoided bathrooms because they felt unsafe or uncomfortable, 64% of transgender students avoided gym class because they felt unsafe or uncomfortable, and 59% of transgender students had been required to use the bathroom that did not match the gender they live every day. We can do more to ensure transgender youth feel safe, seen, and heard in our educational institutions. Thank you, I yield to the Representative from Waikiki and Chair of the House Equality Caucus."

Representative Tam: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Trans people live in poverty at elevated rates, and for trans people of color, these rates are even higher. Around 29% of trans adults live in poverty and as well as 39% of black trans adults do, 48% of Latino trans adults; and 35% of Asian, Alaska Native, Native-American, and Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander adults do as well. More than one quarter, 29% of trans adults, have been refused health care by a doctor or provider because of their gender identity. This sobering data reveals a health care system that has failed to meet their needs. As we move forward, I hope that we continue to prioritize policies that uplift the well-being of our transgender and non-binary community. Our trans community needs more than just visibility. They need action and attention. A happy Transgender Day of Visibility. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lowen: "Thanks, Mr. Speaker. I just wanted to remind everyone, the Environmental Caucus is hosting a 2:00 p.m. informational session on Zoom to get an update from the Cesspool Conversion Working Group and everyone is welcome to attend. I know it conflicts with some hearings, so you're welcome to have a staff person attend in your stead if you can't. And I think Zoom invites were sent out to everybody."

Representative Ward: "Mr. Speaker, lunch will be served immediately after session, with Bishop Silva giving a message in Room 437, your office and mine. Thank you."

Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented two reports:

"Carole designed the logo for the National League of Families, which someone took and put on a flag, and now we have the POW and MIA flag. And Carole is a resident in Nuuanu, and she's married to Captain Jim Hickerson, who was a POW. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, strong support and may the words of Captain McDermott be entered into the Journal as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

And then when the alumni heard of that, they said, hey, wait a minute.

"And right now, in the hearing that we had regarding Captain Cook becoming no longer Captain Cook, there is a petition which was signed by 2,600 people, but there was not evidence that they were people from the area. And then there was other testimony in the hearing that there was narratives that said, people love Captain Cook, regardless of the history, we have to learn from history, *et cetera*.

"So the point is, Mr. Speaker, this is a good bill if it comes from the grassroots, it's got to be the people in Captain Cook who say, yeah, we no longer want to be called this. And that's my only reservation. It's well-intended, but unless we do the McKinley High School processing, this is premature. It should be the people who are under that jurisdiction and their decision, not just a handful of people. And if that can be proven, I will certainly change my vote. Thank you."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, Mr. Speaker. Thank you so much. There are a number of community individuals who have come forward, talked about, and even testified in front of the committee on how important this measure is. It

absolutely is grassroots, and it comes from individuals who are born and raised, have ancestral ties to Kaawaloa. So, thank you so much."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative McDermott rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support. I thank the authors of this resolution, and it's requesting the United States Department of Defense to prepare a plan to decommission Red Hill fuel facility. Why do we have to do that, Mr. Speaker? We don't own it, we don't control it, it's not ours. I take such gratitude to this body for actually doing this, articulating what must be done, because the federal government hasn't done this and we're the ones telling them they need to do it. They should be doing it themselves.

"And I just want to reiterate, there is no estimated time closure of this facility, there's no even estimated begin date on when they're going to close

down. As we saw last week when the 30 gallons was released, in the past, last Friday there was 30 gallons released in the afternoon, I'm sure you folks know that, that wouldn't even have made the news, we wouldn't even have paid attention to it.

"Now, some poor fellow lost his career over it, and I just want to note for a moment the impact that that has on that gentleman. He's been here less than a year. He inherited a 100-year-old system which hasn't been maintained properly, clearly, and is fatigued and cracks all over the place. And less than a year he's there, and now they had to put a sacrificial lamb out there, so they gave this guy up. For the rest of his life, he's going to carry this around because this was his big major command. An O-6, he wants to become an admiral, right, he's a colonel. And they fired him. He's going to get a desk job somewhere for two, three months and then retire. But he's going to carry this the rest of his life. That's just an aside.

"But I support the measure, I support what the body's doing. It's a shame that we're the ones leading this charge, but we are, nonetheless. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"In strong support. Mr. Speaker, this resolution is the work of your Red Hill Committee. It is the intention of this House to hold the U.S. Department of Defense and Navy accountable for the significant and foreseeable cost to the state moving forward. It is the further intention of this House to ensure that the United States Department of Defense, the Navy, and others remediate the damage caused to the southern Oahu basal aquifer, land surrounding the Red Hill bulk fuel storage facility, and Pearl Harbor.

"In early May, pursuant to the existing court order, the United States Navy is going to be giving a report to the State Department of Health, as well as the body, as well as the Board of Water Supply and the community. What we hope to see in that report is a description of the accident as it happened. We can hope to see a description of the oversight that the Navy had with a variety of federal contractors. The incident that happened on May 6th, which led later to an incident that happened on May 20th, which led later to the poisoning of the water supply that fed 93,000 human beings. We can also hope to see some continued oversight, some changes in progress, and some discussion for how they might remediate this.

"If we don't see that, it is likely that we will have to come back next year to discuss how we're going to pay for all of this. How, if the Board of Water Supply is going to be issuing a moratorium on water permits throughout urban Honolulu, how that will affect water payers who are existing water users, how it will affect permits moving forward, and how the Board of Water Supply will discuss how it's going to do those new water permits equitably. This is going to be of great concern to our economy, to the state, and to the county. Again, thank you for passing this measure and we continue to serve this body."

Representative McDermott rose to respond, stating:

"My colleague has done tremendous thinking, the gentleman who previously spoke, tremendous thinking out-of-the-box on how this is going to affect our water usage going forward. This catastrophe that's happened at Red Hill and how the permitting allocation, I mean, I chatted with him and he's thinking two steps ahead how this is going to affect us here locally. But I'm still stuck in the mud, so to speak.

"One thing I don't want to do is blame the Navy, because they do what they're told. They work for us. They'll do what we tell them. We tell them to shut down, they'll shut it down. We just got to put it in writing. We have to tell them what to do. They work for us. We own the Navy. They work for the president, the secretary of the Navy, the secretary of defense. The policies are developed by Congress like we develop policy here, and then they implement it. So, we're waiting on Congress to tell them to shut it down. Congress has not told them to shut it down and attach money to it yet. That's why we're doing it. We're telling them, hey, shut it down.

"So, I just want to be careful blaming the men and women in uniform, because they do what they're told. And if the president, Joe Biden is our president, he's also, I believe, a member of your party, Mr. Speaker. He could close this thing down tomorrow."

The Chair addressed Representative McDermott, stating:

"Mr. McDermott, the party has nothing to do with the resolutions."

Representative McDermott continued, stating:

"Okay, I don't know what party he's a member of then, but he could shut it down tomorrow. He's the president, okay? The president could shut it down tomorrow. Secretary of Navy could shut it down tomorrow. When you get to the secretary of defense, he can kind of pause it but he doesn't have the ability to do these things, neither do the other two, quite frankly, without the money from Congress to shut this down. It's going to cost money, \$4 to \$10 billion. We got \$1 billion proposed coming in a proposed budget, which I think it, well, that's asked for to defuel, but not to decommission. Those words are important and they're missing.

"When you talk about shutting it down, it's decommissioning. Defueling is just emptying, clean it up, fix the *puka*, find the *puka*, and reapply for a permit. That's what the order says, I've read the order. In any case, I just don't want us to blame the men and women in uniform because they do what we tell them. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, support. Very simply and briefly, this is about clean water for Hawaii Kai, in my district, and for every district on this floor and in the Senate, and in the City Council. Short of clean water, Mr. Speaker, we don't have too much going for us. So, this is a very imperative, must-pass bill."

Representative B. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. I support the resolutions, but if anything, they do not go far enough. The Navy is currently preparing a plan to decommission and defuel on its own terms. It is not following the State Department of Health order, which was given last year, that the plan be prepared by an independent consultant. The consultant that the Navy has chosen seems to be quite qualified, but Department of Health is contesting that this consultant may not be independent.

"Further, the Navy has not accepted that the State Department of Health has the authority, per federal legislation regarding underground storage tanks, to order the Navy to decommission and defuel. That issue is hung up in the courts and likely not to be decided in context with the Red Hill situation. So, this resolution is fine, but there are other loose ends still to be tied. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose in support of both measures and asked that the remarks of Representatives B. Kobayashi and Ganaden be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

And I do think that if we respect science, we would listen to scientists and not create policies that try to create unachievable things for science.

"So, I support the intent, as does the Society for Hawaiian Archeology, but this bill actually creates loopholes. Instead of maintaining fines for people or developers who damage historical properties, this creates a loophole to say that they're only going to be fined if they damage pre-contact historical properties, which the Society for Hawaiian Archeology is saying is not entirely scientifically definable by the mechanisms that they have to do that sort of thing.

"So, the intent is totally a support, as again, does the Society, but it creates loopholes and it also creates possibilities for ambiguities in court, it actually could create more court challenges and these things that get very sloppy and we're going to have to come back and fix this if this passes. So, for now, I'm reservations, if only because I want to get on the conference committee to be a continued part of the conversation. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

I do think we need more computer science resources, I think that the Board of Education should do that, and I think part of the reason we're looking at legislation for this is because the Board of Education is no longer an elected body and they're no longer accountable to the people. So, that's the root cause. But as an educational professional, I have to object and say no. Thank you."

Representative Woodson rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Per the previous speaker, I appreciate his comments. There is always a healthy discussion that happen

between boards, legislatures, other bodies that deal with education. It's an emotional topic. But when it comes to situations that will move our state forward, if they have statewide impacts, then that is within the Legislature's authority to move in that direction.

"And we know, Mr. Speaker, that one of the things that are incorporated into many high-performing public school systems is that they actually align formalized curriculum with marketplace need. And so, as in previous sessions, Mr. Speaker, there's been some gentle movement to focus on the space of CTE and computer science, because we want to make sure that our kids can also capitalize on those types of opportunities. And so, yes, the board can make that decision, but also the Legislature can as well, and it's consistent with past bills that have passed regarding the same topic. So, for that reason and others, I stand in support."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I stand in support as well. I'd just like the words of the Chair of Education entered in the Journal as if they were my own, and would like permission to insert written Python code into the Journal. And one equals one, Mr. Speaker," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2142, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COMPUTER SCIENCE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives LoPresti and Perruso voting no, and with Representatives Costales, D. Representative Nakamura rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to vote no on this measure. The private activity bonds, right now we have a ceiling every year from the federal government of \$328 million. Previously, we have been told that this doesn't affect the State at all, that we should just go ahead and approve special purpose revenue bonds because it won't affect very much. The Vice Chair of Housing and myself and others have done a deep dive into private activity bonds over the interim and during the session, and we found out that there is a huge impact for each and every special revenue bond that this body approves. And that for every dollar taken away, we lose the opportunity of doubling the revenues that we receive from the federal government through low income housing tax credits.

"So, it's very important to scrutinize each and every one of these SPRBs that are not health related and to be laser focused. If we want to solve our affordable housing crisis, we must use the resources at our disposal to build as many homes as possible. We have developers who have projects. We have a lot of feasible projects that are applying for very few of these bonds.

"So, I stand in opposition and I hope that if, over the next six years, if we focus on using private activity bonds for affordable housing, we can build close to 10,000 units over the next six years. So, standing in opposition to this bill."

Representative Hashimoto rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in opposition. I'd like the Chair of Housing's remarks entered into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Hashimoto continued, stating:

"And I do want to expand just a little bit. I think the House is really taking the lead in trying to figure out, in collaboration with the Senate, in trying to figure out what are we going to do for the future of our private activity bond ceiling. And I think this is the first step. We don't want to issue any more SPRBs, that's the first step. I think we're going to try and pass a law this year that will try and clean up the bond cap, because I think, when we talk to the Hawaii Housing and Finance Development Corporation, they always tell us we don't have enough bond cap to issue the low income housing tax credits.

"So, we're committed to the cause. I think we need to stay as laser focused on housing. It's when you take a look into our community, that's the biggest issue and will continue to be the biggest issue. And so, I think this entire body needs to make that commitment and ensuring that we stay focused on that issue. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I too am also going to vote no on this measure, I still have to turn in my green slip. And would like the words of the Chair of Housing entered into the record as if they were my own. And thank her for the work that she's doing in pointing this out to the members," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No vote as well. And I'd just like to say, I'm repeatedly impressed by the Chair of Housing's acumen that she brings to this job in educating the fellow members and I want to thank her."

This idea of an innovation center is an opportunity for Kauai schools to establish a wellness center, a partnership with other organizations to teach our next generation about food sovereignty and entrepreneurship, enter into agreements with businesses and community partners to use their equipment expertise experience to create classrooms where teachers and students learn and work alongside industrial professionals, and to get local food into our schools.

"The big question is the cost to acquire this facility and whether the funds will be utilized efficiently to make this happen. If this should pass, and since the funds would be appropriated to the Department of Education, it is my hope that the department can negotiate a reasonable cost to acquire the assets that are already placed on state lands and have sufficient funds to accomplish this proposal. Because there is no doubt that we need to move in this direction of agriculture innovation. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

If there's anything wrong with our voting, our elections, it's always like what's free and fair, *et cetera*, it's not the system itself.

"The problem with ranked choice voting is people don't know what it is. I've asked so many people, can you explain it to me? In fact, my office, as I said earlier on this floor, asked me to explain and I got halfway through and I said, well, call the Office of Elections. The Office of Elections couldn't explain what it is. So, how can we expect our constituents, Mr. Speaker, to say this is good? The point is, this is confusing, it's sophisticated, it's a bit of a fad in some places. But this is not needed. This is going above and beyond for a reason that I don't understand.

"Even though I should say, for the record, every time it's come up, it's failed, and it deserves to fail because it's going to be confusing to the people

who otherwise vote for us or against us in a very simple way. We like, we don't like, not, oh, we want to know who's in block number one. Can you imagine running a track meet with, well, this is the first place runner, and then these guys, because of that one, gets to be knocked out and they get their votes. It's very sophisticated. If you're an Australian, you get used to it. But it's kind of like putting a metric system at the gas pumps. America maybe five or ten years ago said, we're going to use the metric system and we're going to use meters instead of gallons or liters instead of gallons. And they put it in all the pumps. And then suddenly after they pump gas for a while, they said, hey, this is crazy. I don't even know and understand it.

"So, ranked choice voting is rank, and I think it eliminates choices that are very clear cut for the people of Hawaii. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I think we're beating around the bush in the wrong direction. Thank you."

Kobayashi being excused.

Representatives McKelvey and Nakashima, for the Committee on Government Reform and the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1837-22) recommending that S.B. No. 555, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that S.B. No. 555, SD 1, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, point of information or point of personal privilege. Would the Majority Leader take a question regarding the meaning of this bill and its contents to be understood correctly?"

At 1:31 p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:38 p.m.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, a couple of things. First, I'd like to withdraw my question to the Majority Leader. And secondly, to thank the Speaker for a clarification which otherwise, look, I heard this in the Judiciary Committee, I'm on the Judiciary Committee. And not to say that the language is loosey goosey, but we never got the answer that we got today on the floor, and words make a difference. And today it's clear that this is a fundraiser prohibition only when this state legislature is in session. And it doesn't say

if you're the governor and you're always in session that you cannot raise money or the lieutenant governor or the city council or the prosecutor, because that's the way it was read in the committee hearing.

"Only today on the floor do I understand what this bill really means. But look, the language is a bit loosey goosey. And if some of the people sort of have a sense of, well, you sure you're not going to come against this. I'd like to see the committee report or whatever we do after we vote on this and I will vote for it. I have reservations, but I'll vote for it. But let us be very clear, this is not something that we're pushing everybody aside. We're trying to do it for the sake of clarity that when we're in session, we're not going to ask people for money, and it goes across the board. But we're not shutting anybody down, because that was the reading in the Judiciary Committee hearing that we left with, and I'm not the only member of that. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, with reservations and thanking the Speaker for the clarification on the floor, not in the committee. Thank you."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. I would just like to note that if the previous speaker had been at the reconsideration hearing that was held, he would have had his questions answered then and could have seen that we took steps with the Speaker's guidance to make this bill much better and to pass it out in the form which the members, I think, will support. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. No. 555, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAMPAIGN FUNDRAISING," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading, with Representative Ward voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Costales, Holt, and D. Kobayashi being excused.

Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1838-22) recommending that S.B. No. 2082 pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2082, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ABUSE OF FAMILY OR HOUSEHOLD MEMBERS," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading, with Representatives Costales, Holt, and D. Kobayashi being excused.

Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1839-22) recommending that S.B. No. 2780 pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2780 pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Wildberger rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Perruso rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kapela rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Reservations, Mr. Speaker, brief comment. I believe this bill just unifies the capacity for U.S. customs and immigration naturalization services to arrest under state law. It just clarifies what is already under law. And I think that we have some understandable and necessary reactions to seeing ICE being given broader authority to arrest individuals under state law. And I think that our wariness should continue indefinitely. But I think that this just clarifies what is already in statute. Thank you."

Representative Tam rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2780, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE POWER OF ARREST," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading, with Representatives Ganaden and Tam voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Kapela, Perruso, Tokioka, and Wildberger voting no, and with Representatives Costales, Holt, and D. Kobayashi being excused.

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of Senate Bill 2298, SD 2, HD 1. However, I rise with reservations.

"The purpose of this bill is to increase the penalty to employers who fail to lawfully pay their employees. Specifically, this bill raises the penalty to a class C felony, with a minimum fine of \$500 dollars. First and foremost, I want to be clear that I support the intent of this bill. Those bad actors who willfully do not pay their employees should in fact be prosecuted. The issue, however, that I have with this bill, is that inadvertent mistakes often occur during the payroll process. While I very much appreciate this bill allowing the employer the ability to cure any breach of the law, particularly for inadvertent mistakes, many employers often make inadvertent mistakes continually. For example, in the construction industry, payroll can be quite daunting and complicated, particularly for general contractors and subcontractors. As a result, inadvertent mistakes occur. While I understand that it is not the intent of this measure to criminalize honest payroll account errors, I just want to ensure that we are not criminalizing the accounting errors of honest employers.

"It is for these reasons I must respectfully stand in support, but with reservations, on SB 2298, SD 2, HD 1. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

I know some districts have been prioritized, and I hope that the Finance Committee will be very generous in the appropriation so all schools can be air conditioned so the brains of these young kids can really

apply and excel rather than, I know my colleague in Aina Haina, some of the kids actually passed out because it was so hot in the classroom. So, this is a very important bill and I appreciate it. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm not sure what the state's doing with our Board of Education lately. We have another bill here to

require a set category of expertise in order to be in charge of our schools, Mr. Speaker. Now, does this list include people who are experts in mathematics, in classroom management, in English language arts, in any of these things that our children need to know to learn? Is there somebody required to know critical thinking? Is there a PhD in education? No, there's not. There is real estate finance. Now the governor has to pick somebody able to do real estate finance, health care, advanced manufacturing. I challenge anybody in this room to tell me where any advanced manufacturing is in this state and what companies do it, but we're going to require the person who's in charge of Board of Education be capable of being an expert in energy, in health care. These are important things, Mr. Speaker. But why we are creating this nexus of categories of expertise in industries to be in charge of our schools is beyond me.

"And this thing has sailed through the Legislature with very little opposition. I'm disappointed even to see the groups that support this. And really, it's just pushed by the Chamber of Commerce. We're going to put our businesspeople in charge of our schools. Schools aren't businesses. Schools exist to educate the children to not just become a labor force, Mr. Speaker, but to be able to have a meaningful life, to find ways to develop as a human person. And along the way, they'll have jobs. If we give them the basic skills of reading, math, language, then they'll be able to do these sorts of things. But being a master in advanced manufacturing doesn't give you an iota of qualifications to be in charge of our schools. And we need to stand up against this silliness. And I'm very strongly opposed to this, and I wish more of my colleagues would join me in paying attention to what we are doing to the Board of Education with these requirements."

Representative Perruso rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative LoPresti be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative McDermott rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative LoPresti be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Woodson rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I appreciate the comments that have been shared on the floor. Some of those articulations actually are requirements in terms of being knowledgeable about best practices, being knowledgeable about school. What this bill seeks to do actually is, it says that you also need to understand governance structures as it relates to DOE systems. That is also important. And it gives recommendations on certain industries that are aligned with marketplace needs. And again, it goes back to looking at what are some of these school systems doing that are yielding these strong outcomes for our students.

"By the way, as a quick caveat, Mr. Speaker, do you know that in Singapore, as an example, most of those kids are college and career ready by the time they exit the 10th grade. So, what does that mean for our competition? Are we truly making sure that our kids are internationally competitive? And so, in Singapore and other high performing systems, they actually work with marketplace to make sure that they're aligning marketplace needs with curricula. Those same businesses actually are partners with the public school systems, and they are sharing resources, talent, time, even teachers. And so, this is a way to move in that direction. And these are just really recommendations. So, I humbly ask my colleagues to support this proposal."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, Mr. Speaker. I share the view of Ewa Beach, that we've got to do better. But this is a chance to do something different and better. We don't want empty suits on the board. At the same time, we don't want a rigid application of some of these things. But let's face it, 48% of our people are in poverty, and the way to get socioeconomic mobility is through education. So, we've been tweaking it, and this is another tweak which he disagrees with. But I think we've got to try things to be much better because education is the way that people are going to promote themselves, their life, their future, their careers, and everything.

"So, education is the key. And so far we have not excelled, Mr. Speaker. I don't know, given how we are and what numbers in the national rating, but we've got to do all we can to make sure that our kids excel. Now, if this thing doesn't work out, the former speaker can say, look, I told you so. But let's

try it and let's see if these people, who are in the private sector, who have knowledge about stuff and are not empty suits, can do better than what we are doing now. Thank you."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. I would like to acknowledge the previous speaker and to say that I'm surprised that we are in concurrence. I think this bill is a very, very good measure because as you look at some of the most exciting things happening in public schools now, things like the emerging health care academies that we see in Waipahu. All of these programs depend upon collaboration with the private sector in these emerging fields of health care, business, technology, entrepreneurship.

"So what this measure is doing is helping to make sure that our board is attuned to the needs in our community to find those high paying sectors of employment where we can design our system so that our kids are staying home and earning living wage jobs. Not minimum wage jobs, living wage jobs. And so, for that reason, I support this measure strongly. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Perruso rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. So, I'm grateful for the acknowledgment that this work is already happening in the public school system and that it did not require the presence of these kinds of expertise on the Board of Education, that this collaboration is possible without the folks who are sitting in positions of power making policy decisions around standards, curriculum, teacher training, and so on, be from those particular sectors in the private sphere. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose to respond, stating:

"I just want to point out, first of all, I support us having an educational system that helps develop a potential workforce who can work in these areas, Mr. Speaker. But I remind you, Mr. Speaker and my colleagues, that the list that is put in this bill is 12. As of now, there are 11 members on the board. The bill says that the governor must appoint a board that collectively has all of these expertise experiences. There's one more level of expertise than people, and only one of those things are education.

"Basically, what that means is you couldn't possibly probably have just two teachers, two educational professionals, on our Board of Education. That's absurd. The idea that we are going to replace educators with somebody who is just an expert in health care, manufacturing, and entrepreneurship, and require that when there aren't even enough board member seats to cover these 12, is intentionally pushing out education experts for these things.

"It's not that I think anybody's opposed to having somebody who is capable of developing a school system that can lead to health care, no. But to require this long laundry list of Chamber of Commerce stamp approved areas of industry, it's, this is insane, right? And this doesn't make any sense, and it doesn't stand the test of reason. And I think we are all in agreement that these are good things, but to make it a requirement that this is the only thing that makes you capable of being able to stand for the Board of Education in the State of Hawaii is just wrongheaded, to put it kindly."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I'm grateful for the conversation that we're having today, but I do think that if we are moving measures like this, I just hope that one day we can also ensure that we have a teacher on the Board of Education as well. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support and with the backing of the Majority Leader, her point about living wages, education is the key to a living wage. And with that, I want to say, which I regret as being a 14 or how many ever terms that I've had, 12 terms, the one thing that we haven't done on this body is to get the economy to where 48% of our people are out of poverty. The ALICE study says one paycheck away for 48% of our people. We are failing our job and the educational system is how we can skyrocket those people.

"Education is the key to socioeconomic mobility. And we got to try better because so far, we haven't got our people out of poverty. And one of the big

responsibilities is to make sure that each of our districts have living wages and people are prospering. Not just wondering, well, am I going to go to the mainland so I can survive or I can buy a house someday? So, we need living wages, and that's the way that education is the driver and the route and the ladder to reach that. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Matayoshi rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just want to correct a misconception, in section 2, subsection (b)(5), it does list certain fields, but it says, as many fields as possible. So, it's not a requirement, there's no requirement language in here, and people can be experts in more than one of these fields. Thank you."

At 12:55 p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

Representative Ichiyama's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for the opportunity to submit these written comments in support of SB 2780.

"I am in support of this measure because it will correct our state laws to accurately reflect the proper federal agency with arrest powers. Currently, HRS §803-16 incorrectly gives the power of arrest to the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS), an agency that does not have the authority to make arrests under federal law. USCIS is responsible for processing applications for immigration benefits, such as permanent residency or citizenship; it is not a law enforcement agency.

"This bill deletes the incorrect reference to USCIS and replaces it with the correct agency, United States Immigration and Customs Enforcement – Homeland Security Investigations (HSI). HSI is the principal investigative arm of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security and has broad law enforcement authority under 19 USC §1589a. HSI special agents are responsible for investigating transnational crime and threats, specifically criminal organizations that exploit the customs and immigration laws of the United States. Their priorities include combating cyber and financial crime, countering human trafficking and child exploitation, promoting public safety through efforts to curb drug trafficking and gun violence and protecting sensitive technologies from being exploited.

"In Hawaii, HSI special agents work extensively with our local law enforcement to target transnational organized criminal activity. These investigations often involve violations of both federal and state criminal law, which makes it important for HSI special agents to have state arrest authority. Several county police departments submitted testimony in support of this bill because of their collaborations with HSI on complex investigations involving illicit drugs and sexual exploitation of children. As a small island state, we need to utilize every resource available to promote public safety and protect the residents of Hawaii. For all these reasons, I am in support of SB 2780. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2780, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE POWER OF ARREST," passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives D. "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise with reservations. And, like my colleague from Ewa Beach, this is about water. It's not about Red Hill, but it's about water. And this is about the water commission, which is very important to the Hawaiian Homes Commission. And this bill, quoting Bill Aila, basically puts the Hawaiians, Mr. Aila, as a second-class citizen. Because it says you can be a member but you're ex officio and you can't vote. Mr. Speaker, why are we doing this? The Hawaiian homesteaders who are farmers or pasture, they need water. I personally was a consultant in Hoolehua on Molokai a

number of years ago, and they said if we had more water, we could do much more economically, we could plant more, we could have more prosperity.

"So, this bill started out giving them official status with nonvoting and then became ex officio with voting, and now they're non-voting and ex officio. This is a slap in the face, a poke in the eyes to the Hawaiian community that needs water. If any group needs water, it's the Hawaiian homesteaders. So why are we kind of going forward two steps and then we go back seven steps and say, you're not ready for a seat at the table, Hawaiians, but if you are, you're ex officio and you don't have a vote. Mr. Speaker, this is embarrassing. If anybody needs a seat at the table with a vote and being officio, it's Mr. Aila. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you. Just with reservations for now and hope that the issues can be addressed in conference by the committees."

Representative Perruso rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations, noting the testimony of the Department of Land and Natural Resources."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. And if 90% is there, I think there's going to be a lot of blowback if we shut down 90% of that particular industry.

"So, with those, Mr. Speaker, I hope we delve into this a little bit deeper. It's kind of a new area. It's for the environment, obviously. But it's got to be done in either scientific ways or ways that are gradually phasing it in rather than, hey, 90% of everything on the shelves in the cosmetic places, Longs, *et cetera*, you're out of here. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, reservations till further information and science proceeds. Thank you."

Representative Marten rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, I rise in strong support. I think as recently as the 1990s, we didn't use microbeads, we didn't put plastic as fillers in our cosmetics. We could certainly go back to those times and use whatever it is they used as fillers before. Again, these plastic microbeads serve no function other than filling up the volume. And we could actually do better by having more product, smaller packaging, and keep the plastic out of our oceans. Thank you."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. This is an incredibly important and timely bill as it directly and immediately addresses the risk to the health of our children and strikes home to my district in particular. Mr. Speaker, last year the community was shocked to learn that Lahainaluna High School had numerous bathrooms and sinks that were being serviced by water pipes that were made of lead and were not only leaching lead into the water, but were also compromised and as a result, discharging dirty and foul smelling water. Mr. Speaker, in this day and age, the 21st century, to have our schools being serviced by lead pipes is absolutely unconscionable. The science is clear that lead in any form, especially in drinking water can cause brain damage, organ failure, and many different types of cancers. I thank the Chair of Education, the Chair of Finance, and the Governor for moving this bill as quickly as possible. I know it will come as welcome news to the parents, teachers, and the community, that we are working to help address the lead pipe issue that is prevalent in Lahainaluna High School and other schools across the state."

activity, this is very risky to the State. We give them no training, no sexual harassment training, no any kind of other training that state employees are required to get. There's a lot less supervision than a lot of state employees have in their jobs and duties. And there's also just a lot less accountability for these students in these positions, unlike a state employee who has their job and maybe pension at stake. So, because of that, I'm with reservations. Thank you."

Representative Woodson rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. I appreciate the Vice Chair's comments with regards to the potential extension of liability to the State. That is true, but it is for the benefit of our kids, it's for the benefit of our students. This proposal seeks to establish legal mechanisms needed to make sure that these particular commercialization programs are successful. And we know that we've seen that these programs increase entrepreneurship ability for our kids, we know that the type of learning that is happening is interdisciplinary, defined as we have English, math, science, art, all happening at the same time. And the research shows us that, per this type of learning, that students are engaging and retaining the information at a much higher rate.

"And so, what this means in real life application is, let's just say that you have a robust farm to school program at one of our local high schools. They put together a business plan they define as the students, the students then present this business plan to a local grocery store. The local grocery store accepts, and students are now selling product in this local grocery store. Someone gets sick, this bill would afford those students additional protections. So, we are providing our kids with protection so they can receive this higher level of learning.

"Secondly, it has a dualistic purpose, Mr. Speaker. And that is, a lot of these businesses want assurances that if they work or they partner up with our schools, again, we want to encourage that from happening. They want to make sure that they are not liable for any potential lawsuit. So, this shifts that responsibility, that legal responsibility, to the State. And so, if we say that our kids are our future, let's add this provision so that they can have this additional protection for our kids. And so, for that reason and others, I stand in strong support. Thank you."

Representative Ganaden rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Woodson be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, with reservations. I certainly applaud the intent of the measure. I just am skeptical and share the Representative from Kaneohe's concerns, and I would like the words of that representative entered in the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative McKelvey rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representatives Matayoshi and LoPresti be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, Mr. Speaker. And I would like the words of the Chair of Education to be entered into the Journal as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Har rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representatives Matayoshi and LoPresti be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3092, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COMMERCIAL ENTERPRISES IN SCHOOLS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representatives Har, LoPresti, Matayoshi, and McKelvey voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Lowen being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2001-22) recommending that S.B. No. 2670, SD 2, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2670, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII STATE LESBIAN, GAY, BISEXUAL, TRANSGENDER, QUEER, PLUS COMMISSION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives McDermott and Ward voting no, and with Representative Lowen being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2002-22) recommending that S.B. No. 3168, SD 2, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 3168, SD 2, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, just with reservations with respect to those exemptions. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3168, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOMELESSNESS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Perruso voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Lowen being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2014-22) recommending that S.B. No. 2021, SD 1, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2021, SD 1, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

At this time, Representative Ward offered Floor Amendment No. 1, amending S.B. No. 2021, SD 1, HD 2 as follows:

SECTION 1. Senate Bill No. 2021, S.D. 1 H.D. 2, is amended by amending Section 2 to read as follows:

"SECTION 2. Section 10-13.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"§10-13.5 Use of public land trust proceeds. Twenty per cent of all funds derived from the public land trust, described in section 10-3, or \$21,500,000 from the trust, whichever is greater, shall be transferred to the office in fiscal year 2022-2023, and each fiscal year thereafter, and expended by the office[~~as defined in section 10-2,~~] for the purposes of this chapter. The moneys transferred pursuant to this subsection shall constitute the annual pro rata share of public land trust proceeds due and owing to the office.

For purposes of this section, "all funds derived from the public land trust" shall mean the same as "total gross receipts."

Representative Ward moved that Floor Amendment No. 1 be adopted, seconded by Representative McDermott.

At this time, the Chair stated:

"By agreement of the parties, we'll limit debate on the floor amendment to three speeches, one in support, second in opposition, and a third for rebuttal."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I know the parameters make this a short debate, but this one probably deserves debate for the third power because it's been debated for 44 years. Mr. Speaker, the history of this bill, which is being amended, is because of the confusion of what 'all' means. If you remember,

President Clinton said, what depends on what 'is' is, and this is what depends on what 'all' is.

"And here's the issue. In 1978, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs was created. Two years later, this body, this legislature, says, hey, you guys should have 20% of all the derived income from the public lands. Mr. Speaker, now we fast forward. What has taken place in the last 44 years is that basically 'all' has been dependent upon the term defined as 'net.' Net means, and some of you are businesspeople, when you have your gross sales, all of the sales, then you pull out your expenses and then you get net.

"So, what this bill is about, and I commend that it's been a long way coming this far and I commend the Finance Chair for actually bringing it back to being 'all' rather than 'net.' But Mr. Speaker, 'all' is still confusing. So, the floor amendment is so simple, so much about one word, 'all.' And it says, as this is the only way the floor amendment makes any meaning or purpose, is that, for purposes of this section, all funds derived from the public trust shall mean the same as total gross receipts. Total gross receipts means all gross receipts, no expenses subtracted, no administrative fees subtracted, no net.

"Mr. Speaker, the point is, this has been a long battle since the formation of OHA and I think it's time that we pay up, if you will. And I'm not going to talk about DHHL and we've never paid for the housing for the Hawaiians. But it's time that we do justice for the Hawaiian community. Some of you will remember that in the '70s and the '80s, we had a Hawaiian renaissance. Presently, Mr. Speaker, there is a Hawaiian renaissance 2.0 and it's political. There's a rising up. And I would ask all my colleagues to vote for this, to give credibility to the new Hawaiian community that's rising up but demanding that, hey, this is the law, you guys haven't done it, now let's do it. So, let's make 'all' clear that it means gross and not net, it's that simple. And I look forward to the debate that follows with this amendment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Luke rose to speak in opposition to the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong opposition. This bill, Senate Bill 2021, Senate Draft 1, House Draft 3, with the concurrence of the Judiciary Committee and Judiciary Chair, we have worked very closely with Office of Hawaiian Affairs to put in what is in House Draft 3. I have spoken to the executive director of Office of Hawaiian Affairs, and she relayed to me that the introducer of the floor amendment has not consulted with OHA. My recommendation is, when we're dealing with Office of Hawaiian Affairs and the affairs of Hawaiian affairs, we consult with the people who are directly impacted.

"The language in the bill already corrects what the floor amendment addresses. The devastating part about this floor amendment is this, it specifically eliminates 'as defined in section 10-2.' What that means is the expenditure of money, when it's expended by the office, it eliminates the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. So, now it creates confusion of who will receive this money and who will expend this money. It could be any office at this point if we don't make it specific that Office of Hawaiian Affairs is the one who should be receiving this money. That is why it's even more important to consult with Office of Hawaiian Affairs to make sure that language that is being adjusted does not severely hurt Office of Hawaiian Affairs and dismantle this thing. So, thank you very much. So I encourage every member to vote no."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. We know the argument of apples and oranges, I think that's what we've just heard, we heard about apples and oranges. The fact is, OHA, whether you're Hawaiian in OHA or outside of OHA, wants 20% of the public lands. This bill does not say that. Gross proceeds is what the issue is all about. And if there was a 44-year track record of genuine intent to fulfill it, we wouldn't be here today, Mr. Speaker.

"So, what we've heard is obfuscation and ways of delaying, kicking the can down the road, saying, well, look Hawaiians, you're not ready for the gross proceeds. And look, it'll get voted down. But remember, this is going to go down in the history of the Hawaiian community that we had a chance to say genuinely in this bill that they deserve 20% and not an obfuscation and not a way of saying, well, we really didn't do this. Ward, you didn't talk

to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. I've talked to the Hawaiians for years and years and years, and they had not been given the 20%. That's what this bill is all about, and that's why defining it as 'all' is what the amendment will make very clear, it means gross and not net. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I wish everybody to vote for the Hawaiian community by saying yes and not no on this amendment. Thank you."

The motion that Floor Amendment No. 1, amending S.B. No. 2021, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RELATING TO INCREASING THE PAYMENT AMOUNT FOR THE OFFICE OF HAWAIIAN AFFAIRS' PRO RATA SHARE OF THE PUBLIC LAND TRUST," be adopted, was put to vote by the Chair and upon a voice vote, failed to carry, with Representative Matsumoto being excused.

(Main Motion)

Representative Holt rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. So, it is definitely up to the Legislature to define what is owed to Hawaiians. In 2001, the Hawaii Supreme Court ruled in Office of Hawaiian Affairs vs. the State of Hawaii, OHA won, that Act 304 was effectively repealed by its own terms so that it once again was necessary for the Legislature to clarify the Office of Hawaiian Affairs' constitutional pro rata share and the statutory allocation of the 20% of all funds to be managed and administered by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"In its decision, the Hawaii Supreme Court affirmed Yamasaki observing, 'the State's obligation to native Hawaiians is firmly established in our constitution. How the State satisfies that constitutional obligation requires policy decisions that are primarily within the authority and expertise of the legislative branch. As such, it is incumbent upon the legislature to enact legislation that gives effect to the right of native Hawaiians to benefit from the ceded lands trust. See Haw. Const. art. XVI, § 7. ...[W]e trust that the legislature will re-examine the State's constitutional obligation to native Hawaiians and the purpose of HRS § 10-13.5 and enact legislation that most effectively and responsibly meets those obligations.'

"So, again, in 2006, Office of Hawaiian Affairs vs. the State of Hawaii, OHA II, the Supreme Court was consistent in its ruling in OHA I, 'it is incumbent upon the legislature to enact legislation that gives effect to the right of native Hawaiians to benefit from the ceded lands trust.'

"So, subsequently, the Legislature enacted Act 178, Session Laws of 2006, which took effect on June 7, 2006, and specifically acknowledged that, 'the State's obligation to native Hawaiians is firmly established in the state constitution.' So, that's the year that \$15.1 million was set for the interim amount that was paid to OHA, 2006.

"So, I'm glad that we're here in 2022 finally updating the amount to OHA, but we still have a long way to go. Twenty one point five million dollars, while a great step forward, thank you to the Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs Chair as well as Finance Chair for moving this bill forward, but by the DLNR's last accounting, the ceded land revenues are \$205 million, and 20% of that is \$41.75 million.

"Why is this important? I think we all got this testimony from a student named Hema Watson. He's submitted a letter on behalf of Ka Leo O Nā 'Ōpio in a collaboration of individuals and organizations dedicated to Native Hawaiian youth civic engagement. I'll just read the end part. 'If we had been granted this money before, I believe my people would not be stuck where they are right now, as deep as they are right now. Why do our programs lack funding? Why do we have a shortage of educated Hawaiians? Why do we ask and not receive? It sickens me to know how severely starved we are as a community and how vehemently we have been denied growth and proper healing.'

"So, I agree with him, and I urge you to support Senate Bill 2021, SD 1, HD 3, so that we as *kānaka maoli* can begin to build up ourselves, rise as a collective, and become a more *pono* Hawaii. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Luke rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. Senate Bill 2021, Senate Draft 1, House Draft 2 now statutorily sets the allocation from the gross revenues from 15.1 to 21.5. Let me just make it clear that even the 15.1 has

been an interim measure, and I wanted to make it clear that on page 8, when we say, 'the moneys transferred pursuant to this subsection shall constitute the annual pro rata share,' but I wanted to put in the legislative intent that the intent is to make this a interim pro rata share as the working group continues to figure out and work together on what is owed to Office of Hawaiian Affairs, not just in back pay but in the future as well. Thank you very much."

Representative Todd rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in support. This has been something that a lot of people have been working on for a number of years, dating back to definitely before I was in the Legislature. And I think this is definitely a big step in the right direction, and I'm really encouraged by a lot of the language that was reinserted or inserted for the first time at the Finance Committee. And so, I'd like to thank the Finance Chair and also the Hawaiian Caucus Chair for advancing this issue."

"I think one of the big concerns that arose during testimony was that the departments kind of do whatever they want. They define proceeds however they want, they define what they feel like they should pay us. Some departments pay \$0, some pay 20% of what they feel they owe. So, none of it really makes any sense. So, I'm hopeful that the working group will find more clear definitions, and that this figure is indeed something that is temporary and hopefully much more temporary than the original 15 was and proved to be."

"So, I think just in general, this is something we can feel good about as it goes forward, provided that that working group actually holds these departments accountable. I think it was pretty disturbing, in fact, hearing the testimony from DLNR specifically in what they feel like they owe or what they feel they're obligated to give. And I think just in general, we can all agree that there's way too much open for interpretation. So, I'm hopeful that that will not be the case going forward. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Half a loaf is better than a full loaf, if you can't get a full loaf you get a half a loaf. So, this bill is good. And I know I don't feel comfortable, some people don't feel comfortable doing math in public. But as DLNR has set out that the revenues in the total proceeds from the public lands is \$400 million, 20% of \$400 million, do the math, is \$41 million, \$40 million."

"This bill says, hey, we're going to bump you up from 15 to 21 to maybe 31, but it still doesn't go to the 20%, Mr. Speaker. So, we're talking out of two sides of our mouth. We're saying we're going to give you 20%, it's in the bill, but actually when it comes over to giving the cash, it doesn't add up. So, Mr. Speaker, do the math, it's very simple. We need to say gross and gross only, not the net in all these other sort of creeping up to being what we otherwise should have fulfilled 44 years ago. Thank you."

Representative B. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. I think that the working group portion of this bill is very, very important. The bigger picture is this, public land trust moneys should go to support five different purposes. The betterment of Native Hawaiians is one of those five. And the Legislature has given Native Hawaiians special access to this public land trust money. But remember, there are four other purposes that public lands should benefit. And these are very important purposes. So, let's not cut off our nose to spite our face."

"We want to support purpose number one, public schools and other public education institutions, a la University of Hawaii, which gives over a half million dollars per year to Office of Hawaiian Affairs. Betterment of Native Hawaiians is purpose number two. And if my memory serves, purpose number three would be farms and homeownership. Again, a very important matter. Purpose number four would be public infrastructure, which includes everybody, including public infrastructure that helps Native Hawaiians. And purpose number five is even broader, lands for public use, which includes everybody, including Native Hawaiians. So, let's be careful that we also remember that there are four purposes for public land trust, and we need to support them all. Thank you."

Representative Holt rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Still in support. The second purpose was the only one that a body was created, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, to house the 20% of funding. Education gets way more than 20% of that funding. And as the Representative from Hilo mentioned, some of the departments said, if we have to give OHA their money, then what are we going to do? Well, they can ask for money in other ways. OHA only has this funding method and it's constitutional. The SLDF, we don't even know what they do with their money. Audits came back that they do whatever they want. So, we need to follow our constitutional mandate, give them the 20% and let them deal with it. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Holt be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Har rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support and may I please adopt the words of the Vice Chair of Economic Development, both speeches, into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2021, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INCREASING THE PAYMENT AMOUNT FOR THE OFFICE OF HAWAIIAN AFFAIRS' PRO RATA SHARE OF THE PUBLIC LAND TRUST," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Lowen being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2015-22) recommending that S.B. No. 3114, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3114, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MARRIAGE LICENSES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative McDermott voting no, and with Representative Lowen being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2017-22) recommending that S.B. No. 1121, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1121, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Lowen being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2018-22) recommending that S.B. No. 2623, SD 2, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2623, SD 2, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Perruso rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2623, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAIIAN HOMES COMMISSION ACT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 4 noes, with Representative Perruso voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Eli, Kapela, D. Kobayashi, and Tam voting no, and with Representative Lowen being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2020-22) recommending that S.B. No. 3189, SD 2, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 3189, SD 2, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Perruso rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3189, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GAMBLING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 2 noes, with Representative Perruso voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Kapela and McDermott voting no, and with Representative Lowen being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2023-22) recommending that S.B. No. 2473, SD 2, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2473, SD 2, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Wildberger rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In strong opposition. Mr. Speaker, I greatly appreciate the efforts of my colleagues and their work listening, asking questions, reading documents as part of the investigatory committee that looked into the audit of ADC. And we did develop legislation. I'm sad to say that that legislation died before getting a final hearing in its last committee on the Senate side. And I recognize that some of the reforms, in a watered-down way, have been included in this measure that also addresses the question of ADC.

"I want to say that my opposition comes from, really, two kinds of considerations. And the first is, I think it matters who we listen to when we make policy. And all the small farmers who provided testimony oppose this measure because it transfers ADC to DBEDT, away from the Department of Agriculture. Similarly, the Farm Bureau, which represents the larger farmers, also opposed that component of this measure. So, I think listening to farmers, this doesn't make sense because the work that ADC does is primarily around land management, and DBEDT does not have any experience in this area.

"And secondly, I am also concerned that the focus of oversight shifts. So, for ADC, so any bills in the future moving forward won't come to the Agriculture Committee. And I think the agricultural community expects to have those conversations with us. We're developing a certain level of knowledge about license agreements and land management and healthy soil practices, and I think ADC really needs to be part of those conversations. So, for those reasons, I oppose this measure."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I want to thank the Chair of the Agriculture Committee for working on this measure. Mr. Speaker, according to the audit investigatory committee report, 'the Committee made findings and recommendations related to updating ADC's authorizing statute, strategic planning efforts by ADC, greater oversight of ADC's Executive Director by the ADC Board, strengthening ADC's policies and procedures, and improving ADC's financial and accounting practices.'

"Senate Bill 2473, Senate Draft 2, House Draft 2 remains a work in progress, but already delivers on all of these recommendations listed in the report.

"I look forward to this bill moving forward as this legislature continues to advance initiatives, not just on the Agribusiness Development Corporation, but on all other agricultural initiatives as we look to improve and increase local food production and local food consumption. Goals that this body has already determined since last session are very important strategic goals for our state. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative LoPresti rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2473, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives LoPresti and Wildberger voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Kapela, D. Kobayashi, McKelvey, and Perruso voting no, and with Representative Lowen being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2024-22) recommending that S.B. No. 2837, SD 2, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2837, SD 2, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Wildberger rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition please. While I'm a huge animal advocate, I feel like we're not doing enough as the state to tackle the challenges that feral animals are having on our *āina*. Whether you're talking about ungulates that are decimating agriculture or creating damaging runoff on our reefs, or nuisance by feral chickens, or disease spreading feral felines. We think we've got to get serious about this.

"And while trap, neuter, release is very popular with people whose, in my opinion, misguided efforts to feed animals but not provide for their health care is simply creating and perpetuating the spreading disease and suffering of animals on our lands. So, in strong opposition and I hope that next year we can do a little bit more to address these challenges. Thank you."

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I stand in opposition to the bill and ask that the words of the Representative from Kihei be entered into the Journal as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Nakamura continued, stating:

"I also have a few comments. There are two national wildlife refuges in District 14, the Kilauea Point Wildlife Refuge and the Hanalei National Wildlife Refuge. Both are sanctuaries for endangered birds and plants. Over a three-year period, the Hanalei National Wildlife Refuge attributed the deaths of 252 endangered waterbirds, the Hawaiian common gallinule, Hawaiian coot, Hawaiian stilt, Koloa duck, and Pacific golden-plover, to feral cats.

"Nesting seabirds are also at risk. Feral cats are suspected in the deaths of 22 Laysan albatross chicks during a three-year period in 2015. And recently, a feral cat was caught on camera killing and dragging an endangered Hawaiian petrel out of the nest by the Kauai Endangered Seabird Recovery Project. This is a regular occurrence.

"Mr. Speaker, according to the DLNR, cats are the only known reproductive hosts of toxoplasmosis parasite. Toxoplasmosis reproduces in the feline digestive system, and the single cat can excrete 145 billion eggs per year in its feces. Once released into the environment, these eggs can infect other animals, including humans, both on land and in the ocean. Toxoplasmosis parasites create cysts in the muscle and organ tissues and can cause inflammation in the human heart, liver, and brain. And to date, there have been 15 endangered Hawaiian monk seal deaths that are attributed to toxoplasmosis infection.

"In humans, toxoplasmosis can impact the human system and has been known to primarily impact pregnant women and unborn children. During pregnancy, this infection can result in severe damage to the unborn child, cause miscarriage, stillbirth, and substantial birth defects.

"SB 2837, Mr. Speaker, does not make exceptions for culturally sensitive areas such as salt ponds in Hanapepe. It does not take into account sensitive seabird habitat nesting areas, and does not avoid areas where our monk seals hang out.

"Our federal, state, and county governments are doing everything they can to save our native birds. The County of Kauai has installed shielded lights at county parks and pays the state government \$10,000 for every downed shearwater. For over four years, night football games, high school football games, were canceled to protect our birds from light disorientation during fledging season. Our Kauai Island Utility Cooperative, cruise ships, and resort properties have habitat conservation plans and measures to reduce endangered bird takes on Kauai. Passage of SB 2837 will undo many of the efforts to address endangered birds on Kauai and throughout the state.

"Mr. Speaker, we all acknowledge the need to control feral cat colonies. Because this is a polarizing issue, we must bring stakeholders together and have the needed conversation on how to reduce feral cat populations. I believe the common ground is that cat abandonment has to stop because it perpetuates this vicious cycle. This is a difficult conversation that will require professional facilitation to make happen.

"Mr. Speaker, the assertion that colonies will phase out over time with a trap, neuter, release policy has not been proven in Hawaii. So, a pilot program is needed before we adopt this policy statewide. And such a pilot program would fund the trap, neuter, release of feral cats in specific areas, require the consent of landowners for a feral cat colony, require feeders to register cat colonies and make quarterly reports, and monitor the phasing out of colonies over time."

Representative Ichiyama rose to yield her time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Nakamura continued, stating:

"Thank you. Mr. Speaker, this bill is premature and will have dire consequences for Hawaii's native bird and aquatic species, expose the State to liability under the Endangered Species Act, and negatively impact human health. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in opposition. I would like the words of the previous two speakers entered into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative LoPresti continued, stating:

"And I'd simply like to add that what this bill is proposing to do, Mr. Speaker, is to create a policy, a state policy of releasing an invasive species back onto the *ʻāina*. That's at the heart of what this is. It's creating state policy to release an invasive species back into the environment.

"This body can no longer reasonably claim to both support endangered species and enable the sustainability and growth of cat colonies, which TNR does. TNR is scientifically proven not to work, except in exceptional circumstances. And we need to take a few steps back and reexamine this issue. Thank you."

Representative Holt rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. May I have the words of the previous speaker inserted into the Journal as if they were my own. In opposition. And I'd also just like to quickly note that I think it's unfeasible for us to task our already strapped Department of Land and Natural Resources to do a statewide cat count. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Todd rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in opposition. A wise man once said that a half a loaf is better than a full loaf, if you can't get a full loaf. This bill is a half a loaf, and in this case, I disagree, we'd be better off passing nothing. It sets a very dangerous state policy. I did a quick Google on how many cats are in Hawaii, and the number is way more than I expected. The best estimates right now are roughly two million feral cats. That is a lot.

"I'm a cat guy. I have two cats. I have three feral cats that live at my house and we feed, they live outside of my ramp. We got them spayed and neutered. They scratched my wife to crazy to bits, and that's kind of what it takes to make this happen. There's no way you're going to spay and neuter your way out of two million cats, as the feral cat problem. It's not physically

or fiscally possible. This is a half loaf at best, and probably not even that, probably a quarter loaf. Thank you."

Representative B. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations. In committee, I voted no. But in the long run, I'd like to see feral cats reduced by any means possible. I would think that given the restrictions of the title, we can only concentrate on one methodology for reducing feral cats. But I think it's obvious that different areas could benefit from different methodologies of reducing the cat population. In this case, I will settle for even a quarter of a loaf. Thank you."

Representative Matayoshi rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Morikawa rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just want to express my reservations on this measure. And I know that the Representative from District 14 has done extensive studies on this, and the Kauai County Council, at the time that we were trying to address it. And it is definitely something that we need to put high on our list of priorities. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Sayama rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations, brief comments. I'm not convinced that spayed and neutered is the best policy to address this incredibly vast problem, as the Representative from Hilo mentioned. However, I don't mind if taxpayers who want to pursue this policy give in to this special fund, rather than the State having to unnecessarily fund it every year through GIA grants. So, if people want to pay for this policy, they'll feel free to do so, but I certainly won't be checking off that box in my tax forms. I strongly look forward to further discussions on different alternatives we could address this pressing problem for our environment and for our communities. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose to respond, stating:

"Still in opposition. I just would be remiss if I didn't mention, as some of my former colleagues had, is that I love cats too. I grew up with cats. When I was a child, I think I had four or five cats from the time I was a kid till I went to high school. So, this isn't a cat hating vote. And for the record, I'd like to put their names in the record, it was Six Toes, Magic, Tiger, and Goldie. I love those cats, but we need to do something."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The Chair then stated:

"Members, please note that this bill may not yet be purr-fect, but it will go to conference committee."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2837, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE SPAYING AND NEUTERING OF ANIMALS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 37 ayes to 13 noes, with Representatives B. Kobayashi, Matayoshi, Morikawa, Perruso, Sayama, and Tokioka voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Gates, Hashimoto, Holt, Kapela, LoPresti, Matsumoto, Nakamura, Quinlan, Takumi, Tam, Todd, Wildberger, and Woodson voting no, and with Representative Lowen being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2027-22) recommending that S.B. No. 3289, SD 2, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 3289, SD 2, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just wanted to thank and recognize the Chair of Department of Labor and Tourism and the Chair of the Finance Committee to put this bill forward. I'd also like to recognize the Association for Retarded Citizens for their tireless advocacy, their leadership. And I think we will all, Mr. Speaker, benefit, I think all working people will benefit from this bill because it gives them a tool, a way to save for their retirement in future years. Thank you."

Representative Luke rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. First off, let me just thank the organization AARP for their continued efforts on this bill. It's been a long journey, and thanks to their participation in the working group to come up with what we have today. Also, let me thank the Labor & Tourism Chair for his advocacy and his work on this bill.

"This bill, initially, I think some of the states have an opt-out provision. I think for the recognition by AARP to understand some of the concerns for an opt-out program has pivoted very quickly and work tirelessly to put together the first in the nation opt-in program. The opt-in program here, what we see today, is special only because it also provides an incentive program to allow for members of the public who are not currently in any type of employment-related retirement system to be part of this group to help save for their future.

"The opt-in program in this bill provides \$25 million, which is \$500 for the first 50,000 people who will participate in this program. Even with an opt-out program, the estimated number that we were looking at was around 60,000-something. So, I think if this program is successful, then we would probably see equivalent measures and equivalent participation.

"What is interesting about this program is it reduces the administrative burden. In an opt-out program, some of the administration and what we have seen is the administration and the agency spent a significant amount of time with paperwork to try to process individuals. In this situation, we have individuals, hopefully with a lot of education and outreach by the department, will gladly join this program.

"The other thing is, we wanted to just thank a special *mahalo* to Department of Labor for stepping up and wanting to take on this challenge. This is going to be a long process. We anticipate a lot of participation by both the advocacy group and the Department of Labor to make this a successful program. But once it's implemented, we have high hopes for it. So again, *mahalo* to AARP and your steadfast support of this program.

"I would be remiss if I don't also mention the prior Labor Chair for his work, the current CPC Chair, who has worked really diligently on this issue as well. So, a lot of hard work went into this, and it's been a long time coming. But I'm just proud of this body to have worked on this together. And we look forward to continued success in a retirement savings program that benefits the entire state. *Mahalo*."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. If I may have the words of the previous speaker entered into my own, and I would just like to note, this is the kind of bold action that our legislature needs to take and that we've been working on many years, as stated by the previous speaker. I think while this is being supported and advocated for by our senior members of the AARP Hawaii Chapter, this is really a benefit for all young workers. And so, this is about *kūpuna* looking out for those coming behind them. And for those reasons, I stand in very, very strong support of this measure. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tokioka rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. I'd also like to thank the AARP for their strong advocacy of this bill. The reminders, I didn't need them, you had me at hello. We have, on Kauai, many seniors in contact with us constantly, and this is one of their priorities. So, thank you for doing what you do. And this bill will do a lot of good things for the people, the seniors, in the future. *Mahalo*."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Also in strong support. And nothing happens in a vacuum, as you know, Mr. Speaker. And right now at the federal level, the U.S. House of Representatives, with bipartisan support, has passed a federal measure that will mirror this measure. And should the U.S. Senate adopt it as well and it be signed into law, this measure before us will actually accompany the federal one and create more of a savings opportunity for our senior citizens who don't belong to a retirement plan already. Thank you."

Representative Sayama rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you. In strong support, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to thank everyone who was involved in this measure, especially the strong advocacy from the AARP. But I'd like to also build upon the Majority Leader's words that this is a measure, a policy, for the young workforce. And so, I really urge that the young workforce look at this policy and take advantage of it. And I hope that through stronger financial literacy education, that we would be able to have more participants in our retirement savings program. Thank you."

Representative Tam rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. As an aspiring *kupuna*, I definitely support this bill because it will help a lot of young people be able to fulfill the dream of retiring in their home. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3289, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HAWAII RETIREMENT SAVINGS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative McDermott voting no, and with Representative Lowen being excused.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:38 a.m.

THIRD READING

S.B. No. 2163, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that S.B. No. 2163, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2163, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NEGLIGENT HOMICIDE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Tokioka voting aye with reservations, and with Representative D. Kobayashi voting no.

S.B. No. 2347, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, S.B. No. 2347, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 555, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that S.B. No. 555, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Matayoshi rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matayoshi's written remarks are as follows:

"I want to make it clear that the 'regular session or special session of the state legislature' referred to in this bill is only when both chambers are in session. This does not include times when just the Senate is in session for confirmation votes. Article 3, Section 1 of the Hawaii Constitution defines the 'legislature' as 'two houses, a senate and a house of representatives.' Thus, for this bill, the 'state legislature' is in session or special session only when both chambers are in session.

"Also, if the concern is that public officials should not fundraise while making legislative decisions, it is odd that the county councils and other offices are tied to the state legislature's session when their decision-making does not align with that time period."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 555, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAMPAIGN FUNDRAISING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes, with Representative Matayoshi voting aye with reservations.

S.B. No. 775, SD 2, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that S.B. No. 775, SD 2, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tarnas rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Nakamura rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 775, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE TRANSIENT ACCOMMODATIONS TAX," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Nakamura and Tarnas voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives McDermott and Takumi voting no.

S.B. No. 514, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that S.B. No. 514, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

At this time, Representative Ward offered Floor Amendment No. 2, amending S.B. No. 514, SD 1, HD 1 as follows:

SECTION 1. Senate Bill No. 514, S.D. 1 H.D. 1, is amended by amending Section 3 to read as follows:

"SECTION 3. (a) There shall be allowed to each qualifying resident taxpayer who files an individual income tax return for the 2021 taxable year, a one-time general income tax refund that shall be refunded. The refund provided under this Act shall not be used to offset any tax liability under title 14, Hawaii Revised Statutes, of the qualifying resident taxpayer.

The amount of the refund shall be \$1,361 multiplied by the number of qualified exemptions to which the qualifying taxpayer is entitled; provided that, for the purposes of this refund, multiple exemptions shall not be allowed based on age or deficiencies in vision, hearing, or other disability. This amount reflects approximately one-third of the state's

nearly four billion dollar budget windfall, divided among the 734,673 taxpayers.

(b) As used in this section, "qualifying resident 21 taxpayer" means an individual taxpayer who has been a resident of the State, as defined in section 235-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, for at least nine months regardless of whether the resident was physically in the State for nine months. "Qualifying resident taxpayer" shall not include any person who is claimed or is otherwise eligible to be claimed as a dependent by another taxpayer for federal or Hawaii state individual income tax purposes.

(c) The refund shall not be available for:

(1) Any person who has been convicted of a felony and who has been committed to prison and has been physically confined for the full taxable year;

(2) Any person who would otherwise be eligible to be claimed as a dependent but who has been committed to a youth correctional facility and has resided at the facility for the full taxable year; or

(3) Any misdemeanor who has been committed to jail and has been physically confined for the full taxable year.

(d) The refund shall only be allowed for qualifying resident taxpayers who file a state income tax return for the 2021 taxable year on or before December 31, 2022. Failure to comply with this filing requirement shall constitute a waiver of the right to claim the refund provided under this Act.

Representative Ward moved that Floor Amendment No. 2 be adopted, seconded by Representative McDermott.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This has been a very robust discussion about things that affects the AARP, the *kūpuna*. This one affects everybody in the State of Hawaii, Mr. Speaker. This is an amendment for what otherwise was symbolic, i.e. the governor wanted to give \$100. And I understand the Chair of Finance said, well, let's make it \$300. This amendment says, let's make it real, let's make it substantive, let's not make it symbolic, but real.

"And it's based upon the figures that the study done by the foundation, the Grassroot Institute. And they said, look, there are 734,000 taxpayers, and we should be giving at least a third or a billion dollars of our surplus. And Mr. Speaker, if you recall in the beginning, the Constitution said every surplus over two years has to go entirely to the people. Mr. Speaker, we are being very shortchanged on what constitution. I know we've amended it and we've done other things. But this one is to say, let's make it according to what the grassroots says and give \$1,361. That's \$1 billion divided by 734,673 taxpayers.

"This is the fair way to go, Mr. Speaker. Our people are hurting. Often I speak on this floor, we have the equivalent of 48% in the ALICE study saying we are at the poverty level, we are one paycheck away. This would be real and substantive, not symbolic of a hundred or a couple of hundred, \$300. It would be that which people will remember this session for the generosity of this session. It would be a real refund of \$1,361, and this amendment would show we're serious. That is for the people of Hawaii. And Mr. speaker, the bottom line is this. This is their money, not our money. Let's give it back to the people it belongs to. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Luke rose to speak in opposition to the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong opposition. First of all, I disagree with what the Representative of Hawaii Kai is insinuating as a surplus. Mr. Speaker, we are here to do our job and we are here to balance. And one of the things, what do we say in the beginning of session and what do we say during our budget speech? With any type of funds and surplus funds we have, the number one thing that we committed to doing this year is to help Native Hawaiians. The \$600 million commitment to DHHL, and in addition to that, the budget also provides not just \$600 million, it also provides significant amount for lot development.

"The significant thing of that and, also raising the pro rata share of Office of Hawaiian Affairs from the initial amount to what it is now, those are

significant things. And I think for the body, the preference is to take care of these needs that have been unmet for many, many years. It is our obligation to take care of these needs so that the future generation and future legislators don't have to deal with some of these things that we have a responsibility to do.

"The other thing that this body is committed to doing is making the EITC permanent and refundable. That comes with a price tag of \$50 million. But I think there is a commitment by this body to take care of the most vulnerable population of this state. In addition to that, we're talking about affordable housing. The amount that we have invested in affordable housing for the last 10 years in putting about \$300 million has generated 10,000 units. This year, because of the aggressive efforts by the Housing Chair, we are looking at putting aside significant amount again for affordable housing.

"How about for our schools? In fact, the Hawaii Kai Representative just recently talked about needing AC in all the schools. Why would we jeopardize putting school supplies and AC in our schools just so that we can take care of some of, we have a responsibility to take care of many of the needs. Reinstating adult dental, this is something that was lost in 2009, but it comes with a price tag as well. Mr. Speaker, we have a constitutional duty to take care of our vulnerable population, and we have a constitutional duty to take care of and balance the needs of the State. So as such, I strongly oppose this measure. And I think first and foremost, we need to make sure that we have money set aside for DHHL before we make any other commitments. Thank you very much."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Still in support, I'm not convinced yet. The favorite German word I have is called *zeitgeist*, the spirit of the moment. People struggling to get gas in their car at \$5-plus a gallon, to pay food that is inflationary. I went to Costco the other day and beef was like \$37 a pound. Can you imagine if you're a struggling family, how inflation, the highest in the last 40 years, is taking toll? The spirit of the moment is people need help.

"Of course, though, I appreciate what you said about the Native Hawaiians is prioritized, \$600 million. But there's another 734,000 taxpayers out there who are really struggling. And I keep citing the fact that we are good at feral cats, we're good at doing, we had a bill that was on the consent calendar that says, hey, if you're on the beach, you can't put many chairs. We're down in the minutiae, but for the big economic issues, Mr. Speaker, we let that stuff go by.

"I give you the example time and again. It's a guy who's got a job, he's got eight kids, three he can afford to feed, two are on rations, and the other three, it's got to be total government soup lines, subsidies, *et cetera*. We don't have an economy this size to meet the needs of our families. That's the major issue. So, in the meantime, we have these bailout subsidies here and there.

"But now this is a substantive thing rather than symbolic, that is \$1,361. So far, \$100 to \$300 makes it look like virtue signaling. Hey, we did, we gave you guys money back, pat yourself on the back. Mr. Speaker, we need some economic renaissance. And in the meantime, we need to give people a way to make it through when they can barely get their tanks filled, their table filled with food, their refrigerators, and just being able to stay above water. That's the difficulty, that's the *zeitgeist*, that's the spirit of the moment where instead of symbolic, this is actual. It's \$1,361 that we can return to the rightful owners, and that's the 734 taxpayers in the State of Hawaii. Thank you."

On motion by Representative Morikawa, seconded by Representative Matsumoto and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering certain House Bills for Final Reading by consent calendar.

FINAL READING

H.B. No. 2392, HD 1, SD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 2392, HD 1, SD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Yamane rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Standing in strong support. Mr. Speaker, the state faced a huge health crisis two years ago and we are continuing to address that. Mr. Speaker, the measure before you is an emergency appropriation. I would like to take this opportunity to thank my Co-Chairs in PDP and the Finance Chair working together. Mr. Speaker, we became aware of the concerns about addressing the needs of the people of Hawaii, especially our *keiki* and our *kūpuna*. At that point, we worked with BNF and the Department of Health to make sure that one, we took care of the services for the people of Hawaii. That required money to be addressed and to continue the services to address this pandemic.

"Mr. Speaker, the measure before you has \$171 million in emergency funds. I do want the members to know that the goal is to use state money for that measure now. However, we are going to be seeking FEMA reimbursement for its totality. Mr. Speaker, I do have a brief statement from our director of health. 'The Department of Health is grateful to Speaker Saiki; Chairs Ichiyama, Yamane, and Luke for the collaboration and assistance in introducing and shepherding Representative Yamane's HB 2392 through the legislative process. This bill will enable the Department of Health to recoup funds expended for COVID-19 actions that resulted in Hawaii *keiki* and *kūpuna* experiencing the lowest case rate and the second lowest mortality rate in the United States. Respectfully, Director Dr. Elizabeth Char.' So, Mr. Speaker, thank you for the leadership getting this measure forward, as well as the collaboration with this administration. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2392, HD 1, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 1339:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 1339 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support with just brief comments. House Bill 1339 follows through on Article III, Section 19 of the Hawaii State Constitution, which states in part, subject to the provisions of this paragraph, the legislature may provide for the manner and procedure of removal by impeachment of such officers, i.e., the governor and lieutenant governor.

"What HB 1339 sets forth is the process of articles of impeachment that would have to be initiated and introduced and adopted by this House and that the Senate would be set to prosecute those articles of impeachment. House Bill 1339 also outlines causes for impeachment for the governor and

lieutenant governor for malfeasance in office, corruption, dereliction of duty, or other high crimes or misdemeanors.

"God forbid we should ever have to use or utilize these impeachment statutory provisions, but this is an important measure to ensure accountability as we move forward and as we have seen at the national level where we have in fact seen two impeachment proceedings in recent times. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Mizuno rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Mizuno's written remarks are as follows:

"Under Article III, Section 19 of our Constitution, 'the legislature shall by law provide for the manner and procedures of removal by impeachment of the appointive officers.' This applies to another other than the governor and the Lt. governor. There is no language in the Constitution that calls for the legislature to adopt a statute creating procedures for impeachment of the governor or Lt. governor. So this is unnecessary from a procedural standpoint. However, Section 19 also says that the governor and Lt. governor (as well any appointive officer) can be removed upon conviction of impeachment 'for such causes as may be provided by law.' Section 2, therefore is appropriate, but it should be expanded to include appointive officers, not just the governor and Lt. governor."

Representative Tokioka rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in opposition. This bill, HB 1339, was passed last session. Went from this chamber over to the other chamber and it sat there and it came back, and when you look at things, and I've been around this legislature for 16 years now, and when you look at bills and an absolutely clean bill comes back in the next session, and we're talking about impeaching two people. This bill talks about other appointed people, but this current language talks about impeaching two people.

"And so, I have some concerns, I have a lot of concerns about that. And other people around this building have commented to me about why do we need this bill. But if we're going to do an impeachment, then I would think that everybody in this chamber, if they're going to impeach somebody, would want it to be done by two thirds of the body, and that language is not in here. It's in the current law. But if we're going to initiate the proceedings, I would want us to have two thirds vote.

"There's a lot of things that in this bill are just kind of odd because it's new language, which contradicts with old language in the bill, in HRS, but it doesn't strike out the old language. And everybody, this is an absolutely clean bill. So, when we vote on this bill, it's done. So for that and other reasons, Mr. Speaker, I'd also like to ask to insert comments into the Journal, additional comments, because I'm thinking this bill is going to pass, but there's some other things I want to say, but I'm not going to prolong this discussion. But, in opposition and I don't think it's necessary. Thank you."

Representative Tokioka's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm trying to find legal justification as to why this bill is unnecessary.

"Art. III Section 19 says that '[t]he legislature shall by law provide for the manner and procedures of removal by impeachment of the appointive officers.' This applies to another other than the governor and the lieutenant governor. There is no language in the Constitution that calls for the legislature to adopt a statute creating procedures for impeachment of the governor or lieutenant governor. So, this is unnecessary from a procedural standpoint.

"However, Section 19 also says that the governor and lieutenant governor (as well as any appointive officer) can be removed upon conviction of impeachment 'for such causes as may be provided by law.' Section 2, therefore, is appropriate (but it should be expanded to include appointive officers, not just the governor and lieutenant governor)."

Representative Okimoto rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Tokioka be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Har rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Tokioka be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1339, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO IMPEACHMENT," passed Final Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representative Mizuno voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Har, Kong, Okimoto, and Tokioka voting no.

31st LEGISLATURE, REGULAR SESSION OF 2022 JOINT HOUSE and SENATE COMMITTEES ON CONFERENCE PROCEDURES

The Senate and the House have agreed to the following special procedures for all 2022 Regular Session Committees on Conference. These Conference procedures shall be effective from 8:00 a.m. on Monday, April 18, 2022, until 11:59 p.m. on Friday, April 29, 2022.

1. Definitions

For purposes of these procedures:

"Chairs" refers to all of the designated chairs and co-chairs of a Conference Committee.

"Conference Committee" refers to the conference of the House Committee and the Senate Committee assigned by their respective chamber to resolve the differences between the House and the Senate over a particular measure.

"Lead chair" refers to the chair of the House Committee or the Senate Committee who is listed first on the Action Sheets, as provided by the respective chamber.

"Lead committee staff" refers to the staff of the lead Chair from the chamber from which the measure in conference originated.

"Managers" refers to all members of the House and Senate assigned to a Conference Committee.

2. Conference Committee Scope and Amendments

The authority of the Conference Committee shall be limited to resolving differences between the Senate and House drafts of a measure.

- a. With the exception of the Executive Budget, the Judiciary Budget, and the Budget of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, a Conference Committee shall not amend a measure by inserting any unrelated or new subject matter.
- b. To assure the integrity of individual measures, the merging of two or more distinct but related measures into one encompassing measure shall not be allowed.

3. Conference Committee Meeting Times and Places

Conference Committee deliberations shall take place only between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m.

A Conference Committee shall meet in the conference room assigned or reserved, pursuant to the Conference Room Scheduling Procedures and Guidelines and Room Assignment Schedule, as attached.

4. Initial Public-Meeting Notice

The electronic signatures of all chairs shall be obtained before the notice of an initial meeting is posted or distributed. Prior to offering the initial meeting notice for signatures, the chairs shall consult with one another on the information to be included in the notice.

Chairs shall provide at least 24-hours public notice of the first meeting of the Conference Committee and are strongly encouraged to provide

more than 24-hours notice whenever possible. Written notices shall be submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for posting on the Legislature's website and distribution. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.

5. Notice of Subsequent Meetings

- a. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting but the lead chairs of both chambers agree to meet again before 9:00 pm on the same day, the lead chairs of both chambers shall publicly announce at the meeting the time and place at which the Conference Committee will reconvene. Written notice of the reconvening of the Conference Committee on the same day is not required to be distributed. However, written notice containing information on the subsequent meeting shall be submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk or the House Sergeant-at-Arms for posting on the Legislature's website as soon as possible. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.
- b. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting but the lead chairs of both chambers agree to meet on another day, the lead chairs of both chambers shall publicly announce at the meeting the date(s), time(s), and place of the subsequent meeting(s), and submit written notice to the Senate Chief Clerk or the House Sergeant-at-Arms for posting on the Legislature's website. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.
- c. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting and the date(s), time(s), and place of future meetings are not publicly announced at that noticed meeting, chairs shall ensure that a written meeting notice, signed electronically by the lead chairs of their respective chamber, is submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk or the House Sergeant-at-Arms for posting on the Legislature's website at least 24 hours in advance of the next meeting of the Conference Committee. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.

6. Attendance at Meetings

- a. To convene the initial conference committee meeting only the lead House and Senate chair must be present. All other conference committee managers, especially any co-chair, should attempt to be present.
- b. Once a conference has been opened, reconvening of any subsequent meeting of a conference committee shall require the following:
 - i. For the Senate, the lead chair or a co-chair must be present.
 - ii. For the House, the lead chair must be present.
 - iii. All other conference committee managers, especially any co-chair, should attempt to be present at the convening of and during each meeting.
- c. For decision-making at a meeting, a quorum must be present. "A quorum shall be a majority of the House Committee managers and a majority of the Senate Committee managers and shall include the lead House and Senate chair and majority of the chairs of the Conference Committee for their respective chamber." See Section 9.a of the "Procedures." The lead House and Senate chair of the conference committee must be part of this quorum.
- d. For a fiscal measure, the chair or co-chair representing the House Finance Committee and Senate Ways and Means Committee must be present during decision-making and give their approval.

7. Conference Discussion

Except as authorized by the respective chairs, only the respective chairs may speak during conference. All other managers or other authorized persons shall be recognized by their respective chairs before speaking on any issue.

8. Decorum in Conference Committee Meetings and Courtesy to the Public and to the Managers

- a. Managers shall respect the differing views of other managers and conduct themselves in a courteous manner.

Someday soon probably we will have them in Hawaii.

"But in support of this resolution I just want to add one thing in that, when I worked at USAID in the Office of Democracy and Governance, we had a conference in Kyiv, not Kiev, that's the way the Russians say it. I did a jog around the national track and listening to the people of Ukraine, sometimes, Mr. Speaker, it was like they loved democracy and freedom more than we as Americans. They were just so much to the genuineness of what it's about to be a spirit of freedom. And I only say that to say that when we hear President Zelensky start talking about we're going to fight to the end, they really mean that, Mr. Speaker. And this is a great gesture from the State of Hawaii to say, hey, we're with you, we support you, and these refugees hopefully are going to be taken care of."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Also in strong support. And in the spirit of bipartisanship, would like the words of the previous speaker, except for jogging around the capital, entered into the record as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

"Mr. Speaker, this was a labor in which everybody came together with a common goal to address these issues throughout our state. And we're glad that this bill is here today in support of what Department of Health is trying to do, protecting all of us. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Ruling on a potential conflict. This bill directly impacts Hoakalei Resort, where I reside," and the Chair ruled, "no conflict."

Representative LoPresti continued to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you. In support, then. I support this because the people in my district and my community, my neighborhood, have been waiting for over 10 years to be able to use what is now called the Wai Kai Lagoon, used to be a marina. And they deserve to have access to amenities that they were promised. So, I'd like to see this bill passed so that the people in my community can enjoy some version of amenities that they've been promised. Thank you."

"While there are many people, especially from the South Maui community, who are worthy of this honor, at the end of the day, to name this institution after Ms. Mink is a solid choice given the years of service she has in all levels of government. Although Patsy resided in the Windward side of Oahu when she was elected and served in Congress, she grew up and spent many years here on Maui, especially in South Maui where many of her family members lived and became an indelible part of our Maui Nui community. Her accomplishments are many but as a congresswoman representing Hawaii, she consistently found ways to try to divert federal

dollars to Maui for multiple projects, especially legacy projects for preservation.

"As a staffer in the State Senate, I distinctly remember Patsy Mink pulling down one of the largest ear marks ever, to try to preserve a huge swath of land as a natural area reserve and park for the community, despite opposition from then Republican local leaders determined to turn the area into mega resorts. Although the developers prevailed and we were robbed of this legacy due to her untimely passing, her steadfast determination and dedication in trying to achieve this victory to keep Maui - Maui will always be remembered and serves as a beacon to the many young people who will attend this school for years to come."

He got in his plane and he jumped across, who knows where he is today, but we know he's safe. He ran away from his people, he ran away from his country, the exact opposite that President Zelensky is doing now. I would like to see him become a Nobel laureate, a Nobel Peace Prize winner.

"But I would also say that the cruelty that the Russians, through Putin, is showing is unconscionable. There was a I think CNN or a Fox News story

that said, it was a Russian lady with a *babushka*, and she was saying, when the Germans were here, they didn't shoot us, they shot the soldiers. But the Russians shoot the civilians. Unconscionable, Mr. Speaker. That is a barbaric thing that I think is not tolerable in a civilized world. And unfortunately, this thing is not going to end, because as long as the Ukrainians live, as long as that spirit of Zelensky lives, Russia is going to have a real fight on its borders continually. Russia is behaving like a pariah, not a civilized nation.

"And I hope with this resolution that we send the signal that, hey, the world doesn't agree with you. Get in step with it, Putin. And we know the Russian people are good people. When they got leadership the way they have it, it's going to be a fearful future.

"And Mr. Speaker, to bring it home, and the off ramp of this is, we in the Pacific, if we have a Chinese Xi Jinping looking at Putin as a type of behavior to emulate and to become like, and he attacks Taiwan, Mr. Speaker, the Pacific is going to blow up again, as it did during World War II. That is my greatest fear, that Taiwan is in jeopardy the way that Ukraine is. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, this is a great resolution, a great signal to send to the world. Thank you."

"We're in 2022 and is he calling Representative Branco's grandfather a liar? I wonder, because we've been making lots of progress, lots of progress. And for, this kind of went off last night and people have been messaging me about this and I've been wondering if I should even bring it up because it's a really touchy subject. But as somebody reminded me, there's great harm when a former governor casually dismisses shared experiences because he didn't experience them. So, it's just a reminder that we still have a long way to go, Mr. Speaker, and Hawaiians are still struggling in their own homeland. Thank you."

ORDER OF THE DAY

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Morikawa, seconded by Representative Matsumoto and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering certain House and Senate Bills for Final Reading by consent calendar.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 209-22 and H.B. No. 1600, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1600, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Luke rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill 1600, House Draft 1, Senate Draft 2, Conference Draft 1. This budget includes \$8.7 billion in general funds and \$16.9 billion in all means of financing. It also includes around \$6 billion in capital improvement projects.

"Let me first begin by thanking my staff. It's not only that they work hard, their attention to detail and in-depth knowledge assists me in producing a good work product on behalf of you and the House. I am grateful to each and every one of them and I would not be able to do what I do without them. And although they did not want to come down because they wanted to hide in their offices because that's how they are, can we just give them a round of applause? And one special individual is actually in the media room, that's Nan Kalupahana, if you could stand, he's here so I don't screw up the

numbers. But that's how they are, they make sure that we do the best work and we present the best case for the State of Hawaii. And I think all of us, we have staff members and staff members here and we don't thank them enough. So, thank you on behalf of the House.

"I'd like to thank all the committee chairs, and if all the committee chairs could stand up. Thank you to all the committee chairs for all that you have done. I'm going to look at the ones who gave me the hardest time so I won't get sad. So, if I look at you directly, you know who are, let me see, I'm going to look at some of you guys and go, oh, good God, for the last several days it's been so hard. But I value every single one of you and all the work that you have done, especially the Finance members, thank you very much. So, if we could give these folks a round of applause. Okay, you can sit down because it wasn't all about you.

"And if I could just recognize all the Finance members. They went through a lot the last two years and this year, and it was a roller coaster. And if all the Finance members could stand. And these members were there when the state needed them. These members were there when we had \$3 billion deficit spending, long hours, weekends with me to craft the very hard last two, three years. But what a great day it is today.

"I want to thank Chair Dela Cruz and his staff for the long hours they spent in crafting this budget with us. So if we could give the Senate chairs and Chair Dela Cruz and his staff as well.

"And I specifically want to point out and specifically want to acknowledge GIA Sub-Chair, if you could stand and remain standing. And in spite of his peculiar taste in his dressing and outfit and the fact that we have gotten so much education in how to dress and how not to dress and how to act, it's a wonder that he can read the hundreds and hundreds of applications while he takes his sweet time picking out the exact matching ties and exact matching flower sometimes, and the ascot. So, it's a wonder."

Representative Johanson rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Luke continued, stating:

"I'm amazed that he went through 300-plus applications this year. But I think one of the things we appreciated the most was how fair he was. And he took care of the needs of the entire state in looking at all the many applications that came in. What was telling about the applications this year was that many of the long-standing applications that have never come in for a GIA, have come in this year. That told us how hard it was for some of these organizations to make it through the last two years. And I think that put even more pressure on the GIA Sub-Chair. And so, thank you very much, and he deserves a round of applause.

"And of course, I want to thank the Vice Chair, and if he could stand. I didn't even say anything, what if it was going to be bad? But thank you for his work in passing the CIP budget that provides needed infrastructure for the entire state. But more specifically, he was my rock and he was my guide throughout the whole process. So, I really want to thank him.

"Governor John Waihee was recently quoted as saying this session was a banner year. Banner year for Native Hawaiians. What he actually said was not just a banner year, a billion-dollar year. And I think that deserves a great round of applause. Tyler Gomes, deputy director of DHHL, was very skeptical and was also quoted as saying he was getting ready for a big letdown when we announced in the beginning of the year that we will commit \$600 million, but he was supremely happy with the commitment made at the beginning of session and that the Legislature and this body stuck with it till the end.

"And we are here today, and we did that. When given the opportunity, due to increased revenues, we provided the largest total appropriation in the history of our state for the benefit of Native Hawaiians. I think each and every one of you folks deserve all the credit and for all the things that you have done for the community. So, if you could just stand and just raise your hand and just say, hey, we did it. Stand up, everybody.

"We appropriated \$600 million for DHHL to develop plots, purchase lands, and provide down payment and rent subsidies for individuals on the waitlist. We could have stopped there because a \$600 million commitment is a huge single-year appropriation. But we didn't stop at \$600 million, did

we, Mr. Speaker? Towards the end of session, through the leadership of the Speaker of the House, the State came to a resolution in the Kalima case, which only resulted because of the increased revenues and in having discussion with the Attorney General's Office to nudge the settlement. It resulted in a \$328 million settlement, which we have been unable to resolve for decades. And now we are able to at least look some of these people, the plaintiffs who have been waiting on the waitlist for decades, to say we were able to reach a settlement so that we can try to move forward on many of the people on the waitlist."

Representative Onishi rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Luke continued, stating:

"So, with the \$600 million to DHHL, \$328 million to settle Kalima, we could have stopped there. But we didn't. And if Sylvia Hussey could stand up. For about a decade, the pro rata share of the ceded land revenues to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs remained at \$15.1 million. As no real discussion occurred about ceded lands revenues, this legislature made a decision to reset the amount at \$21.5 million. Not just prospectively, but retroactively, resulting in a one-time payment to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs in the amount of \$64 million.

"And the reason why I wanted to recognize Sylvia Hussey is because this didn't just happen overnight. We could have easily said, hey, the administration and Office of Hawaiian Affairs have not negotiated, but we're just going to nudge them to negotiate, do a working group, and then see if they come out with some resolution in the future. But we didn't do that. It took hours and days of negotiation with Office of Hawaiian Affairs, with Sylvia and Chair Hulu and others talking about what is something that is equitable and fair at this very moment when we have the revenues, because next year we may not be in the same position again. So, we wanted to thank you and Chair Hulu for being available and having a discussion with us to arrive at this decision today.

"But again, that wasn't all. We also provided \$10 million for homestead services and \$20 million for DHHL lot development. Additionally, to support the perpetuation of culture and history, thanks to the work of the Culture & Arts Chair, we provided \$17.5 million to Bishop Museum, \$2 million for ongoing support to Iolani Palace, \$500,000 for Kahoolawe Island Reserve, and permanent funding for Aha Moku Council, and I think Mahealani Cypher is walking around and she may visit you folks because she is so thankful for the commitment of this legislature to make Aha Moku Council ongoing funding permanent.

"For the last several years, we have been discussing how to help the ALICE families. And that was a reminder our Labor Chair constantly reminded us. AUW report found that some of the largest cost drivers for the ALICE population were taxes, housing, and childcare. By making EITC permanent, and stand up Gavin, you know I was pointing at you and Christy, remain standing, don't be shy, by your consistent message and advocacy to making EITC permanent, we, in addition to making EITC permanent and the \$300 tax rebate, your efforts and the efforts of the State House and the Legislature, a family of four this year could potentially have \$1,600 of tax rebates. And thank you for your constant advocacy and your support throughout the many years. Thank you.

"As for housing, thanks to the efforts of the Housing Chair, this legislature is appropriating \$300 million to build rental housing, that will be in another bill, and \$23 million for a \$500-per-month housing subsidy."

Representative Tarnas rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Luke continued, stating:

"And \$5 million for a homeownership program. In addition to the \$600 million in DHHL, this amounts to \$1 billion-worth of government programs that will build rental housing and homeownership for the very needed population within our state. Thank you.

"For early learning expenses, we have been told that half the three- and four-year-olds don't have preschool access. That is about 20,000 kids out there who don't have the ability to be able to go to preschool and other childcare areas. That is why this legislature has appropriated \$200 million to build more preschools in another year. That will amount to about 150 classrooms, equivalent to about over 2,000 additional seats. That will not

take care of all three- and four-year-olds, but it's a huge step forward in a commitment that we made two years ago. And thank you very much for the Legislature and the Senate, especially, for agreeing to the \$200 million to build more preschools. And this year we're also providing \$6.9 million for Preschool Open Doors and provide Hawaiian-medium preschool pathways.

"In addition to caring for our ALICE population, this legislature helped our most vulnerable population. For the first time since 2009, we will once again provide adult dental services for the Medicaid population. Thank you to the efforts of many of you, because this has been a priority for many of you, especially on Kauai, especially on many of the rural areas that needed adult dental for our Medicaid population. So, thank you very much.

"We're also expanding postpartum coverage from two months to twelve months, and this has been a priority for the Women's Caucus members. And if I could recognize the Women's Caucus, sisters stand up, Women's Caucus sisters. This bipartisan group of women legislators have not only fought for post-partum coverage, they have fought for Title IX, they have fought for sex trafficking victim support, sex assault victims, and many others. And they work behind the scenes, many times quietly, to nudge many of the important bills that help the State of Hawaii. So, thank you very much to my sister legislators.

"This also provides more money for Kupuna Care. And we will ensure that no girl will ever be without a menstrual product at school by appropriating \$2 million into this budget. Special recognition goes out to the Ma'i Movement, and especially Sarah Milianta-Laffin with HSTA, who had been a strong advocate. And she had brought 30 Ilima Middle School and engaged middle school students to come and testify in front of many of the hearings. And to see students be engaged in that manner, it just gives us a lot of hope and inspiration for our future generation. So, thank you.

"One of the things that the Legislature and the media and others have really not talked about but it's a true sleeper this year, and I want to talk about sex trafficking victim support. This budget not only creates a new Sex Trafficking Abatement Office within the Attorney General's Office, but we're also funding victim witness support services and \$400,000 for an emergency shelter for sex trafficking victims."

Representative Nakashima rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Luke continued, stating:

"This has been an ongoing and painful discussion, but we are happy to report that we're not only creating a new office to tackle this real problem, but also support an emergency shelter. And I want to recognize the Representative from Nanakuli and Representative from Kau, or whatever the new area that you have because of reapportionment, I can't even describe it, but you know who you are. So, thank you for your efforts.

"Of course, this budget, we also provided significant funding to support our teachers and schools. And thank you HSTA for continued patience. This budget provides not only money for differentials, but it also provides pricing, repricing methods, and other cost item to deal with long awaited compression issues. So, we just wanted to thank the teachers for their work, especially during the pandemic.

"It also provides protection to natural resources, and thank you to both the EEP Chair and the Water & Land Chair for your continued fight in making sure our natural resources are protected, helped our agriculture industry, thank you to Ag Chair and many others, especially the representatives from Hilo have really fought hard for ag concerns. So, I think the assistance for the ag industry was huge this year.

"It also appropriated monies for safety net programs and many other notable things, which at this point I won't go through because it's already 21 minutes I have spoken. But I am humbled and grateful that I had the opportunity to finish my last budget with this budget and all the significant bills we will be passing today. *Mahalo*."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in the spirit of bipartisanship, I stand in strong support of the budget, particularly with the enthusiasm in the details she gave about the Hawaiian community. I want to just do a footnote and supplement that,

yesterday I met with Leona Kalima in the hospital. She sends greetings to everyone. She is delighted, but also frustrated because she learned about this, Mr. Speaker, in the newspaper. No one consulted her. She was just wondering why would others, being that it was her case in 1999, 23 years ago that this all started.

"And with that, it's where \$328 million is good, even though I think it's like 900 have died on the 2,700 list. So, what we have left is with one-third left to the attorneys and then one-third left, or about \$121,000 for each plaintiff, depending on how long they've been on the list. Given the median price of housing is \$1.1 million, maybe \$121,000 can get you a parking stall.

"The point is this, we've done well, we should celebrate, and this is the most applause I've ever heard in a budget speech, but, Mr. Speaker, we have just begun, really, to do what for 100 years, if you remember when Prince Kuhio in 1921 said, we are going to put a house, a pasture, or an ag lot for the Hawaiian community. Now, with 28,000 on the waitlist, we've come a long way.

"Yes, this is a banner year. But I would say whoever comes into the chair of Finance with that same spirit, then we will accomplish what we have intended to do for at least 100 years. For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I hope we do not get weary in our well doing for the people of Hawaii and for Leona Kalima, who loves her people. We should give her a round of applause for Leona Kalima and what she has done. Can we do that, colleagues? For Leona Kalima, let's hear it for her. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support and very brief comments. Mr. Speaker, 16 years ago as a freshman legislator, I was told the most important bill that we could pass that is an expression of our values, our priorities, is the state budget bill. So on behalf of this House and on behalf of this majority, if I could thank the person who has steered us through many a difficult water pathway and provided us with what I think is some of the best expressions of the very best values of the State of Hawaii, if we can give a round of applause to the Chair of Finance. Thank you."

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I, too, would like to thank the Finance Chair, Finance Vice Chair, and committee members for producing this budget that reflects our values, our core values. And embedded in the budget, as the Finance Chair mentioned, is the adult dental care for adults on Medicaid. So, the children were covered, but the adults were not. So, this resulted in a lot of emergency visits to the ER because preventive dental care could not be given and paid for. So, this bill goes beyond the basic request, which was to restore the dental benefits. This adds additional benefits. It's the option number two that our advocates had asked for. And this will go a long way to reducing overall costs of dental services to our adults. So, thank you, Chair.

"And I also would like to mention that embedded in the budget also is the lifting of the cap for our Division of Parks within DLNR. And this is so critical because as we talk about destination management, this cannot happen unless we invest in our beautiful parks that attract the visitors to Hawaii and are used by so many of our own residents. I think during the pandemic, everyone discovered the outdoors, the hiking, our beach parks, and the lifting of the cap gives DLNR the ability to improve our trails, to improve our restrooms, to put in parking reservation systems, bring in interpretive signage and rangers, all of these great things that will make Hawaii an even better place to visit for our visitors and for our residents to enjoy. So, *mahalo* to our outgoing Finance Chair for the incredible work on this budget."

Representative Yamashita rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. In support. I was going to insert comments, but maybe I'll just say a few words. First of all, I'd like to thank the Chair. This year people looked at me and they said, you look very tired. And I wasn't tired. You know when your hard drive is full and it's just a lot to take? And I sat on Finance for 14 years, and of that 14, 10 was with this chair, and I appreciate this last year because she exposed me to almost everything possible that Finance goes through. And I really, really appreciate that. And it was just like getting so much information so fast and everything like that.

"And this year was a very, very special year as far as Finance goes. It was a record number in many ways, \$6.28 billion in CIP, of that, it's highly unusual, but we had \$375 million in A funds, which is really, really unusual. And so, complicated by the MOE just made it very difficult. But I appreciate all of that. And usually I would talk about all these great things, and there were a lot of great things in the budget, but this is the first time the operating budget just will outshine the CIP budget by far. And there was a lot of great things in there. Mr. Speaker, I'm going to finish by inserting most of my comments, and that'll be the detail of what I believe are highlights in the CIP budget. But I just wanted to stand to just personally thank her for all the years and all the mentoring. Thank you very much."

Representative Yamashita's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I speak in support of the budget. HB 1600, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1 appropriates \$500,000 in general obligation bonds to the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism for plans and design for a feasibility and cost study to redevelop the convention center.

"Mr. Speaker, the intent is to (1) perform a study to identify and assess alternative financing, project delivery, and cost recovery mechanisms to redevelop the convention center; (2) propose specific financing, cost recovery, and project delivery tools to be implemented at the convention center; (3) analyze barriers and strategies to implement alternative financing, project delivery, and cost recovery mechanisms for the convention center; (4) prepare a request for information or request for proposal; and (5) make recommendations, including any proposed legislation, needed to implement the redevelopment of the convention center.

"Mr. Speaker, the intent is also to ensure that the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism consults with the following persons in performing the study:

- (1) The president of the Hawaii Tourism Authority;
- (2) The director of the Office of Planning and Sustainable Development;
- (3) The administrative director of the Office of the Governor;
- (4) The director of finance;
- (5) The executive director of the Hawaii Community Development Authority; and
- (6) The director of planning and permitting for the City and County of Honolulu.

"Mr. Speaker, this budget also appropriates \$9,000,000 in general obligation bonds to Maui Health System for repairs, renovations, expansion, and upgrades to Maui Memorial Medical Center, Kula Hospital, and Lanai Community Hospital. The intent is to receive a report on the use of this funding from the chief executive officer of the Maui Health System, including details on the scope of work, expenditure breakdowns, and project implementation status for every capital project constructed, operated, improved or maintained with funds from the State including general obligation bond fund appropriations, no later than 45 days prior to the regular session of 2023."

Representative Tam rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. As a first-year freshman lawmaker here, sitting on the Finance Committee is very daunting, especially knowing that we will be handling the state budget. So, I believe I speak on behalf of my entire freshman class that all sat on Finance when I say that I want to thank the Chair of Finance for guiding us, for teaching us, and for allowing us this wonderful opportunity to learn. And the things that we are going to carry moving forward is going to help us become better lawmakers to represent the values of Hawaii. So, I want to thank you, thank you, thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1600, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

"PART V

SECTION 8. From the American Rescue Plan funds appropriation for disease outbreak control (HTH131) as appropriated in House Bill No. 1600, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, the sum of \$5,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the procurement of rapid antigen tests to detect coronavirus disease 2019, with preference given to procuring such tests that have received emergency use authorization from the United States Food and Drug Administration, and that were developed in the State of Hawaii."

SECTION 3. Senate Bill No. 3048, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by adding a new section beginning at page 5, as appropriately placed to read as follows:

"PART VI

SECTION 9. In accordance with article VII, section 9, of the Hawaii State Constitution, and sections 37-91 and 37-93, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the appropriations contained within this Act will cause the state general fund expenditures for fiscal year 2022-2023 to exceed the general fund expenditure ceiling by \$213,189,484, or 2.10 per cent. The general fund expenditure ceiling will be exceeded for the following reasons:

- (1) The appropriations made in this Act are necessary to serve the public interest; and
- (2) The appropriations made in this Act meet the needs addressed by this Act."

SECTION 4. Senate Bill No. 3048, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by renumbering sections 8, 9, and 10 as sections 10, 11, and 12, respectively.

Representative Luke moved that Floor Amendment No. 3 be adopted, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Luke rose to speak in support of the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support of this floor amendment. We are trying to correct three sections. The appropriation amount needed to be \$1.5 million as opposed to the \$500,000. The second part is to allow emergency approved FDA test kits to also be used by Department of Health

for test kits and antigen tests. The third section is to meet the constitutional mandate when we exceed the expenditure ceiling. Thank you very much."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in strong, strong, strong support. Why would I say strong three times? Because on this floor, I've spoken so many times about Patrick Sullivan and the Oceanit, spit in a cup, which is now stick it in the nose, he's shifted, but he's got FDA approval. And I love what is in Section 8, because Section 8 says, hey, we want to get a local procurement of an antigen test, a rapid test. Mr. Speaker, I hope that means Oceanit, I hope it means Patrick Sullivan, because we're right on the precipice of having a new pharmaceutical industry. He has 65 PhDs already on his staff. They can do a number of things, not just with COVID but so many different things for the health of our people, as well as the Pacific and general world. So, with that, Mr. Speaker, strong support, this is a historic day, and my apologies for keep mentioning this time and time and again, but hopefully this is the day that we've made that it's actually going to happen. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and thank you, Chair of Finance."

"Earlier this year, the American Lung Association's State of Lung Cancer Report announced that Hawaii was last in the nation for early detection of lung cancer. In fact, over 50% of people who are diagnosed with lung cancer end up dying within the first five years of their diagnosis, making lung cancer the number one cancer killer in the state more than breast, prostate, and colorectal cancer combined.

"We worked closely with the Lung Association and other advocates to figure out how we could increase early lung cancer screenings in the state, and the answer is we don't know. We don't know why Native Hawaiians have one of the highest rates of lung cancer of any group in the nation. We don't know why less than 3% of people at high risk for lung cancer receive low-dose CT scans, a form of early lung cancer screening. We don't know which of the models to increase lung cancer screening implemented in other communities will work best for Hawaii's unique population.

"Senate Bill 3367 brings together the top people in the state to help us find out not only why but how we can increase early lung cancer screenings in Hawaii. I am grateful to my colleagues in the Finance Committee who have helped to appropriate \$250,000 so that needed research can be conducted and a lung cancer awareness campaign can be developed and launched by the Department of Health.

"I'm very proud of this bill because lung cancer has touched the lives of my family, as it has for thousands of other families in Hawaii. Next year, we will have received a full report which will have steps for the state to take to make sure that the people of Hawaii are receiving the proper prevention and early diagnosis that are needed. Because, as the Lung Association always says, when you can't breathe, nothing else matters."

"I'm proud to rise in support of Senate Bill 2822 today, which authorizes the Department of Education to provide trainings on asthma as well as trainings for youth suffering with asthma and their families.

"Asthma is the most common childhood chronic disease. Native Hawaiians and Filipino youth are even more susceptible to asthma, and those on Hawaii County, Maui County, and West Oahu are most affected. This bill creates the needed framework for the Department of Education to equip teachers and other staff that work with children to understand and respond adequately to our *keiki* with asthma.

"I had the pleasure of talking to various teachers and school principals who expressed that managing asthma is an issue for many of their students. This is particularly troubling during the time of COVID-19 as a classroom teacher can't tell the difference between coughing from or coughing from a contagious disease, like COVID-19. Many times, teachers have just minutes to respond to a child experiencing respiratory distress due to uncontrolled asthma.

"*Mahalo* the American Lung Association in Hawaii for helping with the drafting of the legislation and sharing published research they have helped develop on the subject. *Mahalo* also to the many advocates that helped push this bill through the various committees, the Chair of Education, who helped co-author the bill, and the Finance Chair who moved this bill through her committee."

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1688, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REGISTRATION OF VEHICLES," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives McDermott and Ward voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 24-22 and H.B. No. 2416, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2416, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Kapela rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition with a brief comment. As good government advocates have pointed out throughout this session, this bill seems to narrowly target certain nonprofit organizations like Sierra Club or the Hawaii Children's Action Network, while allowing other deeply influential organizations off the hook, like the Chamber of Commerce. That doesn't make sense. The political tentacles of groups like the Chamber of Commerce are very far reaching. They should not be given special treatment under our campaign spending laws.

"Additionally, I've recently learned that measures similar to this one were proposed as part of the administration's prior efforts to suppress the political activities of the *kia'i* on Mauna Kea. While I'm not saying that this bill is specifically related to those efforts, it could have unintended consequences of limiting the political rights of Native Hawaiians who are engaging in cultural protests.

"In a year in which we are passing transformational legislation for the Native Hawaiian community, I believe that we should be very careful about the unintended consequences of measures like this, which may be used to

erode the freedom of speech and expression that is essential to making progress on Hawaiian issues."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations. First, I'd like the words of the previous speaker entered into the Journal as if they were my own. I was a no on this and I've changed to a reservation because some of the conference committee changes that have been made to the bill, which I appreciate. But I still share some concerns. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kitagawa rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. I'd just like to point out that this bill actually, which relates to dark money, in the conference committee draft, it only addresses nonprofit organizations that are registered as non-candidate committees, which means that they are already engaging in campaign-related activities. So, if a nonprofit organization does not engage in any electioneering or any kind of donations to candidates or engages in any type of activity related to elections, they are not under this bill. It is only related to those who engage and are qualified under current law as a non-candidate committee. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support of House Bill 2416, CD 1. And I would just like to underscore the comments of the Vice Chair from CPC. This is about disclosure, at the end of the day. And dark money, from whatever advocacy group on the political spectrum, needs to be subject to sunshine. And this is, at the end of the day, a disclosure bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2416, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAMPAIGN SPENDING," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives LoPresti and Perruso voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Ganaden and Kapela voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 27-22 and S.B. No. 152, HD 1, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 152, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD PASSENGER RESTRAINTS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 32-22 and S.B. No. 2990, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2990, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative McDermott voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 39-22 and S.B. No. 3140, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 3140, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Kapela rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. Cannabis legalization is on the horizon. And while some people may be reluctant to accept that, it's clear that the movement for legalization is picking up steam. While well-intended, I am very concerned that this measure may set a very dangerous precedent for holding small cannabis operations accountable for crimes that are actually committed against themselves.

"With regard to both legalization and the expansion of the medical cannabis industry, cannabis advocates are championing a horizontal framework in which numerous entities are able to participate in the cannabis

marketplace by focusing on their individual areas of specialization. When legalization comes, which it will, demand will be so high, no pun intended, that the current dispensaries won't be able to produce enough product to meet it. We will need to empower dozens of new operations to participate in the growth, distribution, marketing, and scale, and sale of cannabis products, many of which may be truly small businesses.

"So, we should not be setting a precedent for criminalizing those operations when someone steals their product, rather than focusing on other ways to deter theft. To do so only perpetuates the false belief that cannabis is harmful to our community. It's not. So, we need to be working to dismantle legal barriers to the development of our cannabis industry, not building more roadblocks to its success."

Representative Perruso rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3140, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIFORM CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES ACT MANDATORY REPORTING," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Perruso voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Kapela voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 41-22 and S.B. No. 3085, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 3085, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Perruso rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I stand in opposition with brief comments. So, when I first started, I've been asking questions about this bill all session, and I think that this is actually a sleeper bill because all of the responses I've gotten have just been that this bill is simply an update to existing law that was only last updated in 1984.

"The stated purpose of this bill is to update, it says in the preamble, the punitive sections of the military justice code within the state military forces in Hawaii. The authors argue that the current Hawaii Code of Military Justice lacks the necessary disciplinary options to provide for 'effective and efficient good order and discipline in the state military forces' without providing any evidence to support this assertion, either in the preamble or in any of the supporting testimony.

"This is important because the National Guard is a unique branch of the U.S. military that has both state and federal responsibilities. We all know that the guard routinely responds to domestic emergencies such as natural disasters, and it supports military operations overseas, which can sometimes be controversial. But presidents and governors have also used the guard to respond to civil unrest, which has at times caused controversy in various states and in various situations. It is this second area of responsibility that should give us pause.

"This bill will tighten control of enlisted members by officers and commanders through stricter delineation of provisions relating to apprehension, restraint, and confinement of suspects, punishable offenses, non-judicial punishment, and confinement. This code will require more total submission to authority. I worry that this kind of power and control in the hands of the wrong governor could lead to very destructive outcomes in cases like the protests we saw on the *mauna* and in other examples of peaceful disobedience. For these reasons, I oppose this measure."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations, brief comment. Just like to note that the State does maintain original jurisdiction in many of the issues that are brought up by this bill in family law, in criminal law, and a variety of other things. We would hope that the State maintains that original jurisdiction moving forward. Of course, if you are a member of the National Guard, you do subject yourself to this military code of conduct for things like treason, subordination, the kinds of things that our civilians don't subject ourselves to. Hoping that we keep an eye on this moving forward. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3085, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII CODE OF MILITARY JUSTICE," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representative Ganaden voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Kapela and Perruso voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 44-22 and S.B. No. 3041, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 3041, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just wanted to footnote, in support, this is the claims against the State, which is the Kalima case, which I earlier alluded."

At 11:12 a.m., Representative Luke requested a recess and the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:16 a.m.

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, my original request was to put my earlier remarks into the Journal. That's all my speech," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Holt rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. What a great day, colleagues. \$320 million back into the hands of Hawaiians. That's all I got to say. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. First time again in 16 years I will be standing in strong support of this measure. As you know, I for years have voted against it for the fact that a lot of the claims being made against the State are repeated claims that agencies refuse to address, which keeps just having more and more payouts. But the fact that Kalima is now finally being settled is so monumental and so huge and such a long overdue gesture of justice that that warrants the fact that I stand in strong support of the bill today when previously I have not. Thank you."

Representative Branco rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. I'm glad we were able to come to a resolution for this for Native Hawaiians. It's greatly appreciated and it's going to be significant. But I also want to recognize the fact that, why do Hawaiians have to continuously sue to get what is rightfully deserved to us? And we need to understand that, and we need to stop that. And it's just sad that Hawaiians constantly have to sue to get the resources that are mandated to us in the Constitution. And so I just wanted to say that, but I'm very grateful for all the hard work the body has done to find a resolution. *Mahalo*."

Representative Har rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representatives McKelvey and Holt be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Marten rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. So, Leona Kalima is my constituent. And I had reached out to her when I heard the news about this bill. And I actually invited her to be with us today, but the doctor would not let her leave Queens, where she is. But she did say, she did text. She said, please give the assembly my *aloha* and support for our 23 years of service to the courts, *mahalo*, God bless you all. So, I just wanted to leave that positive note with you folks from her. Thank you."

Representative Tokioka rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. I didn't think I was going to do this, but because this bill is at this stage, Mr. Speaker, can I ask for a ruling on a potential conflict? My mom and now my sister has been on this list for the last 45 years," and the Chair ruled, "no conflict."

Representative Tokioka continued to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"And just to say thank you to many of the people in this building or in this caucus and our colleagues in the Senate. And one of the people that has been fighting for this from the day he got here, and I'm so proud to be associated with him, is the Representative from Kalihi. There was not a day on this floor that he has not been fighting for Hawaiians. And this is a great day for all of us. *Mahalo* Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"One more request for remarks in the Journal from the gentlemen from Kalihi and Kailua. My exact sentiment. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3041, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR CLAIMS AGAINST THE STATE, ITS OFFICERS, OR ITS EMPLOYEES," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 46-22 and S.B. No. 665, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 665, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO VIOLATIONS OF CAMPAIGN FINANCE LAW," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 51-22 and H.B. No. 2197, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2197, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GAMBLING," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Kapela and Perruso voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 52-22 and H.B. No. 1567, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1567, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tam rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you. Just a no vote with a brief comment and permission to insert written comments into the Journal. I appreciate the work that is being done on this bill. However, I believe that it still needs a lot more work to address some of the concerns raised by my constituents. And I'll summarize many of those concerns in my written comments. Thank you."

Representative Tam's written remarks are as follows:

"While I support the intent of the bill, and after speaking to many of my constituents, I cannot support the bill at this time. The advocates are correct that we must do something to solve overcrowding in our prisons and jails, however, the solution cannot be a Band-Aid solution. The solution must be heavy investments in education, job retraining, and affordable housing, which many of my constituents have advocated for.

"At the same time, I do not believe this bill better or worsens the situation that we have regarding Hawaii's crime rates, especially in Waikiki. Many of my constituents and visitors to the area are oftentimes faced with harassment, which is a non-violent petty misdemeanor, meaning that those committing harassment would be released back on the streets, rather than potentially be jailed at the judge's discretion.

"In my district, 94% of crimes committed in Waikiki are so-called 'non-violent' crimes. They include larceny, burglary, harassment, and auto theft. This measure would require judges to release such offenders. Judges should be able to evaluate all factors on a case-by-case basis to determine whether a person is a danger to the community, will be a risk of appearing in court, or will re-offend once released.

"I appreciate the work from my fellow colleagues in crafting this bill to address the concerns by various stakeholders, but at this time, I cannot support the bill before us today."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, brief comment. This is bail reform. This is advocacy. This is the work of advocates over the last several years to reduce unnecessary incarceration in our state. We will be joining other states like New York, New Jersey, and California that have seen a reduction not only in incarceration, but a reduction in crime across their communities.

"Right now, we still house numerous individuals who are simply too poor to find their way out of incarceration. This bill addresses many of the issues that advocates have brought up. Again, thanks to the Vice Chair of Judiciary for his advocacy in working with numerous stakeholders in talking this out.

"A brief asterisk to this, at the very end in the last committee, the prosecutor for the County of Honolulu requested that another charge be removed from it. Possession of a dangerous drug in the third degree, that's the most common charge for people who are picked up for methamphetamine use. The notion was that people who are picked up for this would be directed to residential treatment centers, things like Hina Mauka, Sand Island Treatment Center, on Maui, MEO B.E.S.T. Despite much of the work to fund nonprofits and homeless treatment centers, we are still underfunding these residential treatment centers. So that's something to work on for next year. Again, thanks to the people who worked on this."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"May I rise and say a few things about this in opposition? Mr. Speaker, this is the get out of jail free bill. I've spoken about it many times. It is a danger given the conditions in this state as well as in the nation where we have an outbreak of crime. We have defund the police as kind of an ethos that's going on in a number of cities. Fortunately, we don't have it here.

"But it's something where people seem to think this is for those who are so poor, they can't get out of jail. Well, I was told by Kat Brady, who you know is a great advocate of the prison system and for the prisoners, she has a real heart for them. She says there's a promissory note that was passed maybe three or four years ago, which says if you don't have the \$100, you sign on, and if you don't show up for trial, you've got to pay the promissory note. It has not been implemented.

"But why we're doing this get out of jail free stuff is, to me, counterproductive and a step backwards. And for those who think, well, this is not going to hurt anybody who's nonviolent. Well, there's a *puka* in this particular bill because, for example, violation of an injunction against harassment and harassment by stalking are examples of charges for which a defendant could be automatically released. So, Mr. Speaker, there's some loopholes in this thing that is very dangerous. Particularly, I would think anybody in the Women's Caucus would not want a stalker to be let out without bail.

"I'm not going to bring up the issue of Kapolei, but they let out that guy with the mental problem and he bludgeoned somebody right in front of the courthouse in Kapolei. Those things should never happen, Mr. Speaker. And this bill kind of lends itself to that sort of, well, we want to give everybody a break. And crime is, you got to be sympathetic with the felons. Well, I think being soft on crime is not the way that you're going to prevent crime. But it's bills like this that really loosen the grip on a society that's getting very, very liberated to break the law with impunity.

"And I'm not going to talk about the red-light bill, but that's one of the things, we run red lights in Hawaii with nobody's going to catch me or see me, except there's a bill that says there's a camera coming. My point is, Mr. Speaker, we've got to draw the line in the sand when we're going to be able to discipline people and when we're not going to. And this is the one that just loosens all of that for corrections in our system of hopefully civilized behavior. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1567, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CRIMINAL PRETRIAL REFORM," passed Final Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 6 noes, with Representatives Eli, Kong, Matsumoto, Okimoto, Tam, and Ward voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 53-22 and H.B. No. 2075, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2075, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tokioka rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No vote, Mr. Speaker. Every year we go through bills that deal with firearms. And most of us know here that this state has the most strictest gun laws in the United States of America and every year we add on to that. This is another one of those bills. In this particular bill, there was a lawsuit between Mr. Yukutake and Clare Connors. And the judge in that case ruled, Judge Seabright ruled that there was no harm to public safety on this particular issue. And so, I'm not sure why we have to do this again. Most of the concerns for public safety is covered in the current bill, prior to this bill, if it passes. So, for those reasons, I'm a no vote. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2075, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIREARMS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 43 ayes to 8 noes, with Representatives Eli, Har, Kong, Matsumoto, McDermott, Okimoto, Tokioka, and Ward voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 55-22 and S.B. No. 2065, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2065, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Todd rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations. As someone who was employed within the fishing industry for several years, I just think that this bill is maybe slightly hypocritical in that a majority of the fishing done on Oahu, goes to the auction, are done by enormous multimillion dollar longline vessels that go up for weeks at a time, that have extremely high technology applications. And it just seems like a little overkill to ban the use of a \$300 to \$400 drone by an individual fisherman when you look at it against what they're competing against, especially up on Oahu.

"This isn't the case for the neighbor islands. Neighbor island fishermen, these are typically very small businesspeople who operate as part of their income. Very few are actually professionalized to the point where it's their entire income. So, this just seems like a step a little bit too far, maybe too quickly, and should potentially be reexamined. But I do support the intent in trying to ensure that we're not overfishing. So, with those reasons, I am in reservations."

Representative Quinlan rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Ruling on a potential conflict. I drone fish at my mom's house," and the Chair ruled, "no conflict."

Representative Quinlan continued to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. Drone fishing, when done properly, leads to fewer fouled lines, less lost tackle. In short, Mr. Speaker, less junk in the ocean. So, I would argue that if you are a responsible fisherman, drone fishing is better to the environment than traditional methods. Thank you."

"Mr. Speaker I rise in strong support of this measure which is in dire need for our communities on Maui and Molokai. The population explosion of axis deer has absolutely decimated our agricultural community, destroyed native vegetation, endangered fauna, and has led to the suffering of the animals themselves.

"Mr. Speaker, besides crippling the ability of local farmers to help meet local food production goals, the ravenous appetite of these herds is also taking away grazing opportunities from legitimate agricultural operations, such as our cattle farmers, and threatens our ability to provide local meat for our people. Additionally, the herds of axis deer and their foraging grass and other plants to the bare roots is causing massive erosion problems. The effects of erosion, especially when we have rain storms, further cripples the ability of our farmers to be able to sustain crops. The damaged terrain and lack of topsoil makes it nearly impossible to re-plant native species insofar as not having the proper soil in which to thrive. To add insult to injury, because of the denuding of the vegetation, much of this topsoil is ending up in the ocean where it is covering the reefs and killing our coral population, which in turn endangers our fish stock, which again hurts cultural gathering practices and damages our efforts to create local sustainable food supplies from the nearshore waters.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill will allow us to make a serious inroad into the problem and will also help to serve many masters insofar as staving off the multifaceted damage that is occurring because of the uncontrolled population of this introduced species. My only hope is that our congressional delegation can work to lift the USDA ban on the sale of deer meat so that

we can turn lemons into lemonade. By using the culled animals caught by hunters, we can provide a new protein source for our community; one that will also be attractive to visitors."

against it and each time it fails, it looks like it's going to pass this time. But I want you to know it's still confusing. Even the Office of Elections, that my staff inquiry, couldn't explain it. So how we're going to explain it to our constituents? And I know, look, it's only a special election if it's congressional, *et cetera*. It's basically the slippery slope that I'm afraid that, well it's very sexy and it's kind of confusing, but let's give it a run.

"The difficulty is that if the system is not broken, why fix it, Mr. Speaker? Everybody who is in here did the first past the post. It worked. Why we got to do ranked choice voting? I mean, look, you already got a super majority. You want more people? Is that the motivation for it? I mean, look, we got four members here, you got 47. I think ranked choice voting, if it wasn't to your advantage, you wouldn't use it, because we don't see it as to our advantage. And in that sense—"

The Chair addressed Representative Ward, stating:

"Alright, Representative Ward, please stay away from intent and motive."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"Well, I'm looking at the national polls which say your party is more in favor than mine. Let me leave it at that, but say, every year we've had it and it's failed, this year it's going to go. Let's take a look at it and see what happens. The test of the pudding is in the tasting. So, let's see what happens, Mr. Speaker. Thank you."

Representative Tokioka rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations, Mr. Speaker, for totally different reasons from my colleague from Hawaii Kai. Because I actually think it's going to help the minority party in this circumstance. He might not agree. But to my friend here, I don't think it's going to get any worse, all due respect."

Our state's teacher shortage has hit my community the hardest. The schools in my district are extremely remote and highly impoverished, and the teacher turnover rate is exorbitant.

"We know that the root cause of Hawaii's chronic teacher shortage is low pay. This bill, coupled with the funding to alleviate salary compression and to extend the teacher shortage differentials that is contained in the state budget, will go a long way towards addressing that problem. So, teachers have been fighting, and we know this, for professional pay for years. Today we are finally showing them the support that they have earned for being the people upon whom our children's dreams are built and our society's future depends. So, Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2819, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TEACHER COMPENSATION," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Marten rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Morikawa rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thanks so much, Mr. Speaker. Unfortunately, I stand in opposition to the measure, just a few words as to why. I appreciate the efforts in trying to be made insofar as renewable energy and diversifying our portfolio. But for my area in particular of Leeward Maui, intermittent renewable energy such as photovoltaic is an important part of the component for meeting our renewable energy needs. And I think it will have a unintended consequence by creating a disincentive for the power companies to continue to offer rebates for additional PV coming online. The PV industry in my area is also become an economic engine as well. And I think also, with other technologies on the horizon, with wave and other types of renewable energies, may be precluded by this measure. So, for that, I unfortunately can't support it."

Representative LoPresti rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Nakamura rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lowen rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lowen's written remarks are as follows:

"While possibly well-intended, the policies prescribed in this bill could unintentionally lock Hawaii into a future of higher rates, higher reliance on imports, and higher greenhouse gas emissions compared to other possible pathways that might be precluded if the policy outlined in this bill is enforced.

"Among other things, this bill establishes minimum percentages to be applied uniformly to each island's grid irrespective of differing aspects of each islands' energy resources, of 'firm' renewable generation, as well as a threshold of 45% for any single type of resource, so that no grid can rely on more than 45% of any type of resource.

"It is unclear where these arbitrary percentages are derived from, nor why it should be up to either the Legislature or the Office of Planning to determine any such percentages. The Hawaii State Energy Office, the Public

Utilities Commission, and our electric utilities all have far more expertise in energy policy and Hawaii's energy systems, and yet none of these entities were consulted in establishing these percentages. Furthermore, it is not evident that establishing any percentages for 'firm' power or to limit certain resources is something that should be prematurely determined in state policy rather than left to the market and to the grid planning and project approval processes already in place.

"This bill is based in part on an assumption that 'firm' renewables are reliable and that variable resources are unreliable, which is an extremely outdated, over-simplified and ill-informed way to categorize the universe of energy resources. This perspective fails to recognize the many types of supply and demand-side resources are part of Hawaii's energy systems including things energy storage demand-response programs, energy efficiency programs, and the integration of customer-sited resources. The grid of the future will be more flexible than the grid of the past and more focused on balancing resources to meet demand in the moment. It is a paradigm shift from how grids have historically been operated, and there will certainly be many challenges to overcome. The policies in this bill will only add to those challenges, discourage innovation, and delay inevitable change at the expense of ratepayers, taxpayers, Hawaii's self-sufficiency, and the planet's environmental health."

Representative B. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations. This is a well-intended bill. It does have appropriations which are worth passing. The bill does not have teeth. It is not regulatory. It does not stop anyone from going to more renewables, if only because it amends the state plan. The problem, of course, is that Kauai has already exceeded the 45% cap, which is in this bill. And it is likely to remain above the 45% cap as years go on. So, unfortunately, well-intended, but with defects. Thank you."

Representative Costales rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tokioka rose, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Can I remove my reservations vote on CCR 138."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. Kobayashi, LoPresti, McDermott, McKelvey, Perruso, Takayama, Takumi, Tam, and Wildberger voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 141-22 and S.B. No. 2862, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2862, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support again and very excited. In 2016, the State Legislature appropriated \$100 million to install air conditioning in 1,000 classrooms, which were completed at the cost of tens of thousands of dollars each. Today, approximately 4,000 classrooms still need to be cooled. And in passing this bill, we are beginning to finish the job that we started six years ago.

"This measure allocates \$10 million for classroom cooling, which should provide AC to between 1,500 and 2,000 classrooms using brand new AC technology. Those AC units will not only be more energy efficient, according to the DOE, they will also come with filtration systems that will help to alleviate the health impacts of COVID-19, as well as the vog that jeopardizes the health of Hawaii Island *keiki*.

"So, if school is cool, then our classrooms must be too. So, *mahalo* to the Chair of Education and *mahalo* to the Chair of Finance and to everyone who

has worked on this for years to ensure that our children have the safe and healthy learning environments in which they need to reach for the stars."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support. And my district in East Honolulu has the exact sentiment from the good Representative from the Big Island, may I use her words in the Journal as if they were my own. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2862, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 142-22 and S.B. No. 2824, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2824, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. I'll be brief, but I'd like my comments on third reading on this bill entered into the Journal. I just want to point out, this is the BOE member qualification bill. And this is a good example of why people in the public think legislators can't count. There are 11 members of the BOE and we have 13 requirements for expertise in this bill, only one of which is education. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Woodson rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, Mr. Speaker. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just want to point the previous speaker to the text of the bill. It's all of about four pages and it offers a rebuttal to his argument. The National Association of State Boards of Education, which really is the premier entity that looks at board of education policy, they are impartial, and they provide guidance and recommendations to state boards of education across the country. The National Association of State Boards of Education, they state that boards of education should look at policy prescriptions that enhance equity, that improve student achievement, and that remain forward thinking. And specifically, they look at things that will emerge in the future. Future oriented is the term that they use, Mr. Speaker.

"And so, again, the idea is that we want to make sure that our kids in the State of Hawaii are internationally competitive. And so, the department and the board like to use the term, college and career ready. But really, we need to make sure that our kids are globally competitive because that is, in essence, the rub. And one of the things that you see, again, in high performing public school systems across the world, is they actually align marketplace need, both current and emerging, with formalized curriculum as one of the components that you see in high performing school systems.

"And so, Mr. Speaker, that is a best practice. That is a best practice. And the text of the bill also specifically references, per the previous speaker's grievance, that the board members shall obtain as many of these characteristics as possible. That's found on page four, Section 2, lines 11 and 12, under paragraph five. And so, for these reasons, Mr. Speaker, we want to make sure that we are moving in the right direction with regards to our Department of Education. And I urge my colleagues to support this proposal. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose to respond, stating:

"In opposition still. I was happy to keep my remarks short, but I'm happy to debate this. There's been a move, Mr. Speaker, to corporatize education in this country, and institutions like the one cited in this bill have been criticized as one of those things that are helping to corporatize education.

"The language that's in this is precisely right, that the board shall collectively have the knowledge, experience, and proven expertise in as many of the following fields as possible, Mr. Speaker. Again, only one of which is education. That language specifically can and, I guarantee, will be used to exclude BOE nominees in the Senate for approval, because we already have somebody in education. We don't have somebody who's an

expert in energy, because we need somebody who's an expert in energy to figure out what the ELA standards should be. That we don't have somebody who's an expert in real estate, because somehow we need somebody who's an expert in real estate to help set education policy. And energy, advanced manufacturing, and finance, things like that.

"Nobody is opposed to having people who are experts in fields that are going to help people get an education for workforce development. But requiring it in statute is a bridge too far."

Representative Perruso rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative LoPresti be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. While I support this proposal, I have to note that a study was already performed a few years ago that clearly shows that coffee blenders are taking advantage of Kona and Kau coffee farmers, the vast majority of whom live and work and farm in my district. They are undermining these farmers' economic well-being and financial security by continuing to steal our iconic Kona name while using very little Kona coffee in their actual product. This is commercial exploitation, this is economic abuse, and it must stop.

"I am confident that the study envisioned by this bill will once again demonstrate the need to better protect our coffee farmers who have been waiting decades, not just one, not just two years, decades for action. So, let's please make sure that in the future we don't make them wait much longer for the legal protections that they need in order to uplift their profits and safeguard their livelihood."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. And I agree with everything said by the previous speaker. I'm confident the study will come out in favor of changing the labeling laws. It's the right thing to do, and at the least it will remove an additional obstacle that has stood in the way for a while. I'd also like to request, I wrote an essay that was published in Civil Beat on March 13th, I'd like that inserted into the Journal," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.) [See: Lowen, N. (2022, March 13). Rep. Nicole Lowen: Support Local Farmers By Fixing Hawaii's Coffee Labeling Law. *Civil Beat, IDEAS: Essays.*]

Representative Lowen continued, stating:

"And in addition to all the reasons why this is the right thing to do that are laid out in that essay, I'd like to add one more, which includes that continuing to encourage importation of large amounts of green coffee from other locations is what has brought pests like coffee berry borer and coffee leaf rust, and other pests that also threaten our coffee industry and potentially other industries as it helps bring additional invasive species into the state."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1517, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COFFEE," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative McDermott voting no.

Representative Perruso rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I am in opposition. So, I am standing in opposition not because I don't support preschool and funding additional classrooms for preschools, but I think that if we dig deeper and we look at, for example, elementary schools in all of the complexes around our state, we will find schools that are threatened with closure because their enrollment has dropped where we have classrooms that are available for these precise kinds of preschools. And, so, I think that we should be working with the Department of Education. This is going to be difficult, however, because we are moving the School Facilities Authority, according to my understanding, away from the department to DBEDT. So, I think that my concern with the School Facilities Authority is not only that they're not completely set up, of course, but that I continue to oppose the privatization of this public function. So, for those reasons, I oppose this bill."

Representative Woodson rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. This bill is important. The previous speaker is correct in that in statute it does say that EOEL should work with the Department of Education to establish more pre-K classrooms. That is, in fact, the case, that's happening right now. But we also know that that is not sufficient to get us to the number that we need, which is 100% access by 2032. And so, this bill will afford us more flexibility to actually meet that goal by providing additional classroom space to afford more of our three- and four-year-olds opportunities to have a great head start. Thank you."

Representative Luke rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. The School Facilities Authority is not moving to DBEDT, it will be retained in Department of Education. That was one of the last, some of the draft that was being discussed in conference. School Facilities Authority will remain with the Department of Education. And the intent of this bill, because it's public monies, the whole intent is to refurbish some of these classrooms for preschool classrooms. As some of you may or may not know, in the Waianae complex, there were unused classrooms that can be refurbished, right away actually, to accommodate preschool kids, because, as you know, preschool kids, you can't use even the elementary school facilities because of the height of the restrooms and some of the tables. So, the intent is for us to work with not just EOEL, but DOE and SFA to refurbish and remodel some of our current unused DOE facilities to accommodate the around 20,000 kids who don't have access to preschool right now. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose to respond, stating:

"Still in opposition. While I am grateful for that amendment to the bill that would have transferred School Facilities Authority to DBEDT, I think that, in hearings over the course of session, I have had multiple opportunities to interact with the leadership of SFA and AS Tanaka in the DOE. And at every single point on the leadership of SFA, Alan Oshima, Ed Sniffen, and then also AS Tanaka, have reiterated that SFA will not be engaged in refurbishment, repair, and maintenance, but they will be only dedicating their efforts to new buildings. And so, that's really the source of my consternation. So, if we can address that, I would love to see those monies being spent in precisely the way the Chair of Finance has outlined. *Mahalo*."

Representative Todd rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in support. I just wanted to thank the Finance Chair, the CIP Chair, and the Education Chair for their work. But also, the foresight going back several years to really lead this effort towards universal pre-K. As someone who has a daughter who is currently in preschool, I recognize that that is not achievable for every family. It's much less expensive in Hilo than it is in most parts of the state. And even then, it's about \$10,000 a year, give or take. And that's purely post taxation unless you've set yourself up accordingly."

"So, I'm just thankful that this money is headed toward something we can all really believe in. And there is specific language enabling the SFA to appropriate these funds towards any other costs that they deem appropriate to increase student capacity. So, there is a little bit of flexibility in that way. And I really think this is probably something we can all really feel comfortable with, or most of us at least, and really trending us in the right direction."

"And I also wanted to point out now, and the reason that I'm standing up, is that there also is \$2.9 million in the budget bill going to 'Imiloa specifically for pre-K immersion schoolteacher education. And while that's not directly tied to this bill, it is kind of working in conjunction. So, I just wanted to express my appreciation. Thank you."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. Early learning advocates make a very clear distinction between preschool and child care. While both services provide important opportunities for children, they are not the same. Child care advances the socialization of children who are too young to enter our learning system. It is also important for developmental resources for parents who are working full time. Preschool, on the other hand, is foundational in preparing our *keiki* to become active and engaged learners as they enter the education setting.

"We should not conflate child care and preschool as a matter of public policy. So, I'm very glad that we are passing this measure to correct the oversight in Act 46, which sought to expand access to child care statewide. We must build a quality preschool system that is led by excellent educators.

"Over the last few weeks, my office has been conducting a study of preschool policies that our state has adopted. After analyzing data from the Accountability Resource Center of Hawaii, we found that over 600 classrooms may be available for preschool programming in our public school system. We would need about half of that space to expand preschool programming to the same number of children who were once served by junior kindergarten, which served 10 times as many students as are currently enrolled in programs managed by the Executive Office on Early Learning.

"We should never allow public funds to be spent on private educational programs at any level, which is a philosophy that is enshrined in Article X, Section 1 of the Hawaii State Constitution. According to the attorney general, the Preschool Grant Program created by Act 46 was only constitutional if the programs that received grants did not prioritize learning. That's not preschool, that's child care, as this bill appropriately recognized.

"So to that end, this bill will facilitate millions of dollars in funding to improve child care delivery while preserving the constitutional integrity of our pre-kindergarten system, a system that we can strengthen by investing in our public preschool programs that use public school facilities."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3110, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD CARE GRANT PROGRAMS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 215-22 and S.B. No. 1297, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1297, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ISSUANCE OF SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS TO ASSIST MAUIGROWN COFFEE, INC.," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Kapela voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 216-22 and S.B. No. 2070, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2070, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS TO ASSIST THE HAWAIIAN LEGACY REFORESTATION INITIATIVE TO RESTORE HAWAII'S FORESTS AND NATURAL RESOURCES," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative McDermott voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 229-22 and S.B. No. 2473, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2473, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Wildberger rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2473, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT," passed Final Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representative Wildberger voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Kapela, D. Kobayashi, McDermott, Perruso, and Tam voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 230-22 and S.B. No. 3334, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3334, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 232-22 and H.B. No. 2510, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2510, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition, Mr. Speaker. So, over the past few months, it has become increasingly difficult for me to continue voting no on this measure. When you look at what's been happening in terms of the rising cost of living, rising costs of energy worldwide, I am starting to think that maybe \$18 an hour really is the appropriate figure for us to move to.

"However, I'm still in opposition, Mr. Speaker, and I'll tell you why. It's for my small business owners. It's for the many, many small businesses that contribute so much to the fabric of my community and my district who have been absolutely battered by the events of the previous few years, and many of whom will not survive another year or two of down sales and higher labor costs and higher supply costs.

"Mr. Speaker, over 50% of our total employment in the state is provided by small businesses. That's over 200,000 people that are depending on mom and pop operations so they can feed their families and pay their rent. Mr. Speaker, I'm not an economist. In fact, I'm pretty sure nobody in this room is an economist. I don't know what the consequences or the unintended consequences of passing this measure will be. I really pray and I hope that 10 years from now we can look back at this measure and say it was absolutely successful and Representative Quinlan, you were a fool for voting against it. But as of this time, I still have serious concerns, and that's why I am a no. Thank you."

Representative Wildberger rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. I'm thrilled to be able to see this measure make it all the way through the process. And we're going to be able to give our low wage workers a 19% raise as of October. And that's a great bump, a great start to increasing our wage. As I've shared many times, I walk the small business talk. And my small business is currently paying \$20 an hour to entry level workers. So, I'm glad to see this measure go forward. And I wanted to express my appreciation for the excellent compromise that was reached between the Senate and the House in offering an important tip credit for the struggling restaurateurs who have endured both the pandemic, staffing shortages due to the housing crisis, and supply chain issues. Thank you."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. As I have said on this floor before, a living wage is a human right. All session long, advocates for working families have called on us to raise the minimum wage to a level that will allow workers to meet their most basic needs. They have also asked us to strengthen the Earned Income Tax Credit, which is our state's primary form of tax relief for working class families.

"By passing an \$18 an hour minimum wage, we are resetting the conversation about what is possible in terms of delivering economic justice

to working families, not just for our state, but for the entire nation. When this bill's final raises take effect in 2028, minimum wage workers will earn over \$16,000 more than they do today. And the EITC will only further uplift their financial outlook.

"I believe that we can do even more, though, to support the working class. When we reconvene next year, we should consider eliminating the tip penalty that undermines the prosperity of tipped workers and subjects them to sexual harassment. We should also further link minimum wage increases to the cost of living index so that worker's wages are not determined by politics. And we should consider raising the wage beyond \$18 per hour sooner rather than later, since that is what workers needed to earn in order to survive last year.

"Nonetheless, this bill is a huge win for working families and a historic victory for our state. This is truly the work of Hawaii's people and a measure that will uplift everyone's fortunes, from restaurant servers to small business owners, and will enhance the bottom line of our entire economy. So, thank you to every single member who made this possible and thank you to the advocates who advocated tirelessly."

Representative Johanson rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support. I just wanted to say, there are multiple parts to this bill, and I think credit goes to the many people who worked on it. I appreciate very much the work of the Labor Chair for getting done what eluded me for my four years as Labor Chair. I appreciate the progress that we have made on minimum wage, and undoubtedly that's received the bulk of the attention in the dialog, which is why I wanted to focus the bulk of my remarks on the Earned Income Tax Credit.

"We throw around EITC as an acronym, and we expect that everybody universally understands it. But the truth is, most people do not. It took me a long time to learn and many years of participating in the dialog, and I don't know that I'm an expert in it at all. But certainly, it's not commonly something that the public is clamoring for. Even though, Mr. Speaker, the Earned Income Tax Credit affects 103,000 Hawaii low-income and moderate-income families.

"This is a pervasive benefit, but one, again, that goes often unsung because tax policy is not always the juiciest cause *du jour* to talk about. It's often esoteric and it's dependent on money. And for years, decades, really, both the House and the Senate even debated its creation. We are certainly not the first state in the union to enact it. In fact, we were number 20-something, long after the federal government enacted it. But progress arrived in 2017 when we first enacted this bill.

"When first enacted, it was nonrefundable, and it existed for five years. As we approach that five-year expiration, there was a lot of work that went into it. And even though it was a good basis, Mr. Speaker, if your tax liability exceeded what the credit was, there wasn't incentive for you, as a low- or moderate-income family, to even file for the credit because you just didn't qualify.

"Some of the changes, colleagues, that are revolutionary in this bill, not only is making it permanent keeping that prospect out there for all of our working families in perpetuity, but the making it refundable is so critical because if your liability exceeds that credit at that floor, you are now able to get money back. And that's huge for people in ways that we don't know.

"But one of the reasons that this doesn't always make it to the forefront of public attention and public consciousness is because these 103,000 families, these many constituents that are affected, are so busy working and so busy struggling to make a living that they don't have time to come down to the Capitol to protest, they don't have time or the inclination to hire lobbyists. So, except for a few plucky advocates and legislators armed with the righteousness of the cause, it's not one of the things that often draws the masses to the Capitol.

"But that's why what we're doing, colleagues, today is so special, because in spite of the fact that there aren't always paid lobbyists or industries behind this bill, there are plucky and dedicated advocates, but also having to advocate for many other circumstances. It makes our passage of this bill today so special. And there is a single driving force behind both the original enactment of this bill, as well as this bill today. And I would like to thank the Finance Chair for being that force. And I'd like to say, for all the working

families who benefit from this credit, that there are people who are at the Legislature, both in the House and the Senate, who I think are really trying to do the right thing and work for the public interest. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Rather than give my own speech, I would just like the words of the previous two speakers entered into the Journal as if they were my own. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative D. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Speaking in support. My support is based more on the principle of you can't always get what you want, but if you try sometimes, you get what you need. I would prefer to have seen no tip penalty in here. I'd prefer to see a true living wage, which I think \$18 still falls short of. But given the conditions that we work under here, and both politically and economically, I'll take the \$18 and terms we have now. So, I'm speaking in support. Thank you."

Representative Ganaden rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representatives Kapela and Johanson be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Tam rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I would like to have the words of the Representative from Aiea inserted into the Journal as if there on my own, and a brief comment. The bill before us today will provide some much needed relief to working families that are currently struggling. Many of us on our paychecks, just like the working families, it requires to take home pay, spend it mostly on rent, medical bills, and car payments. With this bill, we raise the disposable income, thus putting more money into the pockets of working families. Studies show that people stimulate the economy when they have more money to spend in their pockets. And therefore, that helps our small businesses. And therefore, I believe everyone benefits from this bill. And for those reasons, I am in strong support," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Tokioka rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I do have reservations on some of the things that I talked about on the first cross, so can I ask that my floor speech from the first crossover be entered into the Journal for this speech," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Tokioka continued, stating:

"And just to say that, I understand what people talk about with the tip penalty. But I started in the restaurant business when I was 15 till just before I got here, in the State Legislature. And I know what it's going to take for a restaurant to make it. They're struggling and we just came out of a pandemic.

"And I don't think it's going to impact the big restaurants, but it's certainly going to impact the small mom and pop places, which many of us have them in our neighborhoods. And I talked to many of them when I'm back on Kauai, and they're going to suffer. So, I think a couple of things may happen with them. They're either going to close or they're going to go under the table and pay their employees cash. And neither option is good, Mr. Speaker. But as far as the minimum wage, most businesses, big businesses are paying that amount. I just feel the smaller businesses are going to get hurt.

"So, with that, I'm happy that we are passing this bill, but it's not bringing me joy for some of the people that are going to get hurt with the tip credit not moving up to the minimum wage standard. And I know the Finance Chair and this body fought hard for the tip credit, but it's certainly going to show up later on down the road. Thank you for this opportunity to talk on this bill."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I stand in support as well on the measure. As my good friend to the right here said, it's a compromise bill, but a bill that tries to take into account the testimony that was received by many small

businesses. Mr. Speaker, nothing happens in a vacuum, and there have been a lot of other measures and things that this body has done to assist small businesses that may not be covered under this bill insofar as small businesses that aren't restaurant businesses.

"Let's look at the unemployment insurance, Mr. Speaker. Let's look at the fact that we helped to stave off a huge increase in our unemployment insurance schedule. Let's look at the facts, speaking of restaurants, that we gave \$50 million for the restaurant card. Let's look at the fact that the Earned Income Tax Credit, as was spoken by my good friend, the Chair of CPC, and may I have his words entered in the Journal is if they were my own. The EITC being refundable and permanent means that families will now go out and spend money, spend money at many of our small businesses," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative McKelvey continued, stating:

"But, Mr. Speaker, more can be done for our small businesses. I'm so happy that the Chair of Finance, along with the Chair of WAM, has left next year's legislature with a \$500 million surplus potentially, and that I'm hoping that this body can continue to do things like we've done in the unemployment insurance arena to assist small businesses with further tax rebates and benefits so that they can continue to recover from the pandemic.

"And I like to joke, while this does make a meaningful increase in the minimum wage, many businesses, as the good Representative from Kihei pointed out, are already paying more than that. The most popular signs and banners this election year are 'now hiring.' And, Mr. Speaker, that goes to the fact that many businesses are already, in today's tight labor market, having to pay more than this. But to have a baseline where workers know that they will be paid something that will allow them to live in Hawaii, to be able to survive here eventually, is a good thing. For all those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I stand in support. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representatives Kapela and Johanson be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Okimoto rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations, please. May also request to have the comments inserted to the Journal as if they were my own from the Chair of CPC as well as the Representative from the Lihue, Kauai," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Okimoto continued, stating:

"Brief comments as well. Mr. Speaker, I rise with earnest reservations today. As someone who grew up hearing the stories of our relatives working in the pineapple or sugarcane fields for less than a dollar a day, I know the importance of having an excellent job with a good income. It's a way out of poverty for many. It allows people to provide for their families. And we all know the immense sense of dignity that comes from being able to support oneself.

"While some employees would undoubtedly make more money with an increase in wages, many of their colleagues would pay for it with cuts to their work hours and even the loss of their jobs. That's because good businesses are experts in adaptation. When they are forced to pay employees more with no corresponding increase in revenues to help pay for it, they have to resort to some combination of cutting employees hours, laying off employees, replacing employees with automation, shipping jobs overseas, passing the costs on to customers, or permanently closing their doors. Most of the time, the cost of a higher minimum wage can be entirely passed on to customers. As many customers refuse to pay or are unable to afford higher prices and end up buying less of what the business is selling, that leads to more hours cut, more layoffs, and more employers, especially our small businesses, shutting their doors for good.

"Mr. Speaker, in a study by Georgia Tech professor Qiuping Yu and her colleagues, research was conducted using a dataset from a national fashion retailer. Their research shows that an increase in the minimum wage, while having a negligible impact on total labor hours used by the retailer, leads to a 27.7% increase in the number of workers scheduled per week, but a 21% reduction in weekly hours per worker. These changes translate into extra

workers and less hours per worker per week. Such scheduling adjustments reduce the total wage compensation per worker and may also reduce eligibility for benefits. They also show that the minimum wage increase reduces the consistency of weekly and daily schedules for workers, making it challenging to secure financial stability and coordinate with a second job, child care, or other personal demands.

"The Harvard Business Review stated just last year that a mere increase of \$1 in minimum wage led to an average net loss of nearly \$1,600 per year in reduced hours, eligibility for benefits, and schedule consistency per employee.

"Mr. Speaker, the primary role of minimum wage is training, because any job is the best kind of training for future more specialized jobs. The overwhelming majority of economists agree that raising the minimum wage will mean fewer job opportunities for lower skilled workers. Jobs that were previously available to them as training jobs or entry level positions will now be replaced with more qualified and trained individuals, or simply move to autonomous services if they can afford to do so.

"Mr. Speaker, it is not just the private sector that will take a hit. When the government mandates a hike in the minimum wage, there will be some winners, but there will also be a significant number of losers. Someone must pay for the cost of the increase. Taxpayers will carry this burden as the higher costs of the unfunded mandate is handed down to our state and county governments. Unskilled young Native Hawaiians pay in the form of fewer job opportunities, and consumers pay as businesses pass on the cost of the mandate through higher prices. Mr. Speaker, it is likely that this measure would directly hurt the very people it is intended to help.

"There are better ways to increase people's wages that don't create destruction in the process. We have heard all session about how industries such as our restaurants and retail services will negatively be impacted by this. Many will have to shutter their doors indefinitely. There is, however, one industry that I see that has only been touched on briefly, the childcare sector. Mr. Speaker, the average childcare worker makes about \$12 an hour. Whereas some industries such as restaurants and retailers can respond to minimum wage hikes by reducing their workforce, eliminating certain employee benefits, cutting back on facilities and equipment, or automating jobs, strict childcare regulations leave little room for childcare centers to adjust to cost increases. A childcare provider's only viable option is to pass the wage increases on to families in the form of higher pricing."

Representative McDermott rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Okimoto continued, stating:

"For providers in high cost areas that are already paying near or above \$18 an hour, the impact would be small, but costs could increase tremendously for providers in low cost regions. While we know how beneficial it is for children to have one parent at home until they are school aged, the reality is here in Hawaii that staying home is not an option for many lower-income and working class folks and single parents. And raising the cost of child care only makes an already difficult situation even harder.

"Based on recent surveys from the Chamber of Commerce and their affiliates, coupled with studies on the impacts of minimum wage in localities, and the testimony of so many of our business owners, there is no doubt in my mind that this bill will cost people their businesses and have little to no impact on the real problems facing the cost of living in our state.

"So why am I voting up on this? Because as hard as this is, I believe in compromise. The Chamber of Commerce came out and said that if we are intent to pass this piece of legislation, then at least stagger it to give some of our people a fighting chance. And \$18 by 2028, a permanent refundable tax credit, and a tip credit was the compromise.

"Mr. Speaker, I only hope that when I leave the chamber to go meet with my business owners in my community, as I have been throughout the pandemic, some of whom may lose everything, that they will be as understanding as I have been. However, I don't blame them one bit for being rightfully upset, and I share with them a mutual frustration about the direction of the state.

"Mr. Speaker, to conclude, government cannot artificially create good pay. It results in unintended consequences and the people who should be most helped are often the most harmed. I deeply and sincerely hope that when this distinguished body reconvenes to these chambers next January, that it seriously begins to consider removing many of our regressive taxes, which are a primary cause of the cost of living in Hawaii, and focus their efforts on eliminating government-created barriers that significantly hinder our ability to create work and higher wages. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Matsumoto rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition to this measure. Our families are hurting in Hawaii. People are living paycheck to paycheck and they're leaving our state because they cannot afford to live here. People are struggling and they need help. This is a bill that I have wrestled with all session. There are really great parts of this bill. But I have reservations whether it's the best path forward.

"I have made a commitment during my time in the legislature that I don't vote reservations on a final bill, I either vote yes or no. And so, I made the very, very difficult choice today to vote no, even though there are really great components. I wholeheartedly support making the Earned Income Tax Credit refundable and permanent, as this will really benefit low income and working people, it will increase economic activity, and counteract regressivity in the tax code. This is so important and so needed for our communities.

"When we were considering a minimum wage increase to \$13 in 2020, I was willing to support the bill. Then COVID hit and before we shut down the Legislature, I gave a speech on this floor stating that I agree with the increase but now is not the best time. Here we are today considering a 78% increase to the minimum wage when the economic climate is so much worse.

"We are putting so much hope in raising the minimum wage when there are so many other ways to achieve the same goal, to support working families. That's why I've introduced bills to lower the income tax. A third of our paycheck is being taken away by taxes. Collectively we have one of the highest taxes in the nation. Imagine the impact that we could make if we gave people more of their hard-earned money back in their pocket. For years, I've introduced a bill to eliminate tax on necessities like food and medical services. This would immediately help people in their everyday lives, and it's something that most other states do.

"Over the last two years, our island small businesses have weathered storm after storm. Businesses have had to deal with government-imposed restrictions that were put there for the intended health and safety of our population. But there was constant uncertainty of what was allowed and what wasn't allowed. With mounting pressure from stifling mandates to supply chain crises, hundreds of businesses, ranging from startups to family legacies, were given no choice but to close their doors. And for those who remain, the challenges are far from over.

"When this bill passed through the House, I shared the difficulty that small businesses like my 112-year-old family farm in Wahiawa will face. I've talked to several small businesses in my community that have been there for years and they shared how they would really struggle. People like Joann Shigeoka from Shige Saimin and Miriam from Barrio said they'd most likely go out of business if this passes.

"Not only has there been uncertainty from the pandemic, but the general cost of business has gone up. Big box and chain stores will be fine. They can afford to automate their systems and have more checkout lines. Who we're really hurting is our local business owner, all the employees that work for them, and their families. We're inviting big businesses to come in and take over our state because the small guys can't make it.

"I agree that in difficult times everyone needs to pitch in to help, businesses and government together. I would have been in support of a multi-pronged approach with a slight raising the minimum wage, making the EITC permanent and refundable, and many other forms of tax relief, like eliminating the GET and an income tax reduction for the residents who need it most, especially since we have a surplus in our budget this year.

"Our communities do need help. The Legislature needs to continue to work to find a reasonable, well-rounded solution for the people of our state that doesn't rely on such an immense increase in the minimum wage. Going forward, we need to focus on other ways to lower the cost of living in our state and to support our communities. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2510, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INCOME," passed Final Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Okimoto and Tokioka voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Kong, Matsumoto, and Quinlan voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 233-22 and H.B. No. 2288, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2288, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LAND," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 234-22 and H.B. No. 2024, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2024, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tarnas rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in support of this measure. As we began to engage in serious policy discussions on the management framework for Mauna Kea, it was clear to me that the primary focus should be on what is best for Mauna Kea itself. As an environmental planner for my entire career here in Hawaii, over three and a half decades, I recognize that environmental stewardship is an important public and personal responsibility. A healthy environment supports our quality of life.

"In my work on this bill, I had two main objectives for a new management framework for Mauna Kea. First, respect our indigenous people by providing a substantive voice for Native Hawaiians in the management decisions for Mauna Kea. Secondly, ensure a stable, supportive future for astronomy on Mauna Kea through a community-based mutual stewardship model.

"We have all seen over the past several years that the status quo of Mauna Kea's management needs to change. Native Hawaiians do not feel they have had a voice in the management of the *mauna*, and that needs to change. The astronomy community feels that they do not have the relationship of mutual respect and benefit, which they really want to have with the community, including and especially Native Hawaiians, and that also needs to change.

"Mauna Kea is of paramount importance to our community. Mauna Kea is also the best place on the planet for astronomy. Recognizing this competitive advantage for astronomy, the Hawaii State Government has invested significant resources on Mauna Kea through state agencies and the University of Hawaii. Over the last 50 years, long-term leases have provided the security for U.S. and international organizations to invest billions of dollars in constructing and operating observatories on Mauna Kea. Today, astronomy has a total economic impact to the state of approximately \$220 million annually, generates about 1,300 jobs statewide, and provides significant STEM education and workforce development opportunities for our community.

"My district includes the town of Waimea, where there are two headquarters of major observatories operating on Mauna Kea. My constituents, including Native Hawaiians and those who are not of Hawaiian ancestry, have made their voices known, saying, we support astronomy that is done with respect for the environment and Native Hawaiian cultural values and provides education and employment opportunities to Hawaii's people.

"The directors of the Keck Observatory, Subaru Telescope, and Gemini Observatory recently released a consensus statement on the principles for the future management of astronomical facilities on Mauna Kea. These principles are consistent with the policies of the Astro2020 Decadal Survey, which guides the future of astronomy research in the United States. These

principles have also been endorsed by other national astronomy organizations.

"In their statement of principles, these Mauna Kea observatory directors have stated, 'We strongly believe there is a vibrant and sustainable future for astronomy on Maunakea - a future based on a community model of astronomy in which relationships and partnerships between the community and astronomy thrive, upheld by the values of respect, collaboration, and inclusion. The observatories are permitted by the state to conduct activities on Maunakea lands - public lands that are important to multiple stakeholders and of great cultural importance to the Hawaiian community. We, [the observatories on Maunakea,] are grateful for our privilege of observing the Universe from Maunakea.'

"The Maunakea Observatories also stated, 'It is through the lens of this framework that we remain deeply committed to ensuring the local and native Hawaiian community is included as we work together in forging a positive future for Maunakea.... We seek a community-based mutual stewardship model which will allow astronomy to thrive alongside other interests, sensitive to the needs of the local community.'

"Based on all this, it was clear to the State House that the status quo was no longer acceptable. We felt the Legislature had a responsibility to grapple with this very difficult and contentious issue and develop an alternative management framework for Mauna Kea."

Representative Branco rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tarnas continued, stating:

"Thank you. Our legislative purpose was not to criticize the University of Hawaii and its management, but rather to learn from the UH experience and recommend a management framework that builds on these lessons. The State House formed the Mauna Kea Working Group, through your leadership, Mr. Speaker, to engage with numerous representatives of the Native Hawaiian community who had demonstrated a sincere commitment to the stewardship *kuleana* of Mauna Kea.

"The dialog and deliberations of the Mauna Kea Working Group were done with respect and humility. We learned a lot from each other and recognized we share common values and a sense of responsibility for careful stewardship of Mauna Kea. I am deeply grateful to the working group members who gave their time, *mana'o*, and commitment to this process.

"The working group recognized that the controversy regarding management of Mauna Kea is connected to larger questions and longstanding issues, not all of which can be addressed in this legislation. But we can and what I believe we have done in this legislation, is create a framework for managing Mauna Kea which provides an alternative path. One which provides a substantive voice for Native Hawaiians in the process of Mauna Kea's management while supporting a sustainable future for astronomy on Mauna Kea.

"Mr. Speaker, when an issue is so controversial, the easy option for us as a legislature is to leave it to another year, another session, another administration, another entity to craft a solution. And for members of our communities, the easy option is to stand aside and criticize the system without engaging in the harder work of moving towards a solution. I am deeply grateful to my fellow legislators, the stakeholders, and the members of the community who were willing to come to the table to find a better path forward. And the Native Hawaiian community leaders who have been part of the working group and this legislative process have brought their *mana'o*, their hard work, and solutions-oriented thinking, which is the heart of this legislation.

"The Maunakea Observatories and the astronomy community have done their part by acknowledging how having a better relationship with the community, especially the Native Hawaiian community, is of vital importance to their work and values. The university has done their part by participating fully in the discussions in the Mauna Kea Working Group and listening to the concerns and criticisms from others. And they also made systemic changes in their own administrative organization through the establishment of the Center for Maunakea Stewardship.

"I am grateful for these strong leaders who are steadfast in their commitment to the process. Their engagement made it possible for us to

envision the possibility of a brighter future for Mauna Kea. This measure takes a carefully balanced approach by stating that it is the policy of the State to support astronomy that is consistent with a mutual stewardship paradigm in which ecology, the environment, natural resources, cultural practices, education, and science are in balance and synergy. This approach is consistent with the approach supported by leaders in the Native Hawaiian community, members of the Mauna Kea Working Group, and leaders in the astronomical community in Hawaii and the nation.

"The process of arriving at this conference draft involved not only a yearlong working group, but also extensive hearings, consultation, and testimony from stakeholders and community members at every step of this legislative process. Now, I ask my colleagues here in the State House to support this legislation, which provides a new path forward for managing Mauna Kea. It creates a *kuleana* for everyone who cares about the future of the *mauna*. I ask all the stakeholders to embrace the opportunity and now do the hard work of engaging collaboratively in the process established by this new management framework and move forward together. And, Mr. Speaker, may I have permission to enter additional remarks into the Journal. *Mahalo*."

Representative Tarnas's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in support of this measure.

"As we began to engage in serious policy discussions on the management framework for Mauna Kea, it was clear to me that the primary focus should be on what is best for Mauna Kea itself. As an environmental planner for my entire career in Hawaii, I recognize that environmental stewardship is an important public and personal responsibility. A healthy environment supports our quality of life.

"In my work on this bill, I have two main objectives for a new management framework for Mauna Kea:

- Respect our indigenous people by providing a substantive voice for Native Hawaiians in the management decisions for Mauna Kea.
- Ensure a stable supportive future for astronomy on Mauna Kea through a community-based mutual stewardship model.

"We have all seen over the past several years that the status quo of Mauna Kea's management needs to change. Native Hawaiians do not feel they have had a voice in the management of the *mauna*, and that needs to change. The astronomy community feels they do not have the relationship of mutual respect and benefit which they really want to have with the community, including and especially Native Hawaiians, and that also needs to change.

"Mauna Kea is of paramount importance to our community, including Native Hawaiians, non-Hawaiians, cultural practitioners, scientists, artists, hikers, photographers, star-gazers, and so many more. Mauna Kea has significant environmental and cultural importance.

"Mauna Kea is also the best place on the planet for astronomy facilities because of a combination of environmental factors, including our mid-Pacific location far from the continent, clear dark skies, and stable temperature, wind and humidity conditions.

"Recognizing this competitive advantage for astronomy, the Hawaii State Government has invested significant resources on Mauna Kea through state agencies and the University of Hawaii to provide road access, communication and data networks, support facilities, administrative services, and resource management. Over the last 50 years, long-term leases have provided the security for U.S. and international organizations to invest billions in constructing and operating observatories on Mauna Kea. Today, astronomy has a total economic impact to the state of approximately \$220 million annually, generates about 1,300 jobs statewide, and provides significant STEM education and workforce development opportunities for our community.

"My district includes the town of Waimea where there are two headquarters of major observatories operating on Mauna Kea. My constituents, including Native Hawaiians and those who are not of Hawaiian ancestry, have made their voices known, saying, 'we support astronomy that is done with respect for the environment and Native Hawaiian cultural values, and provides education and employment opportunities to Hawai'i's people.'

"The Directors of W.M. Keck Observatory, Subaru Telescope and Gemini Observatory released a consensus statement on the principles for the future management of astronomical facilities on Mauna Kea. These principles were subsequently endorsed by the Board of Directors of the Association of Universities for Research in Astronomy (AURA), a consortium of 47 US institutions and 3 international affiliates that operates world-class astronomical observatories for the National Science Foundation (NSF) and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA).

"In their statement of principles, these Mauna Kea observatory directors stated, 'We strongly believe there is a vibrant and sustainable future for astronomy on Maunakea – a future based on a community model of astronomy in which relationships and partnerships between the community and astronomy thrive, upheld by the values of respect, collaboration, and inclusion. The observatories are permitted by the State to conduct activities on Maunakea lands – public lands that are important to multiple stakeholders and of great cultural importance to the Hawaiian community. We are grateful for our privilege of observing the universe on Maunakea.'

"Their statement of principles also refers to the following policy from the Astro2020 Decadal Survey, which guides the future of astronomy research in the U.S. 'NSF, NASA, DOE, facility managing organizations, project consortia, individual institutions, and other stakeholders can work to build partnerships with indigenous and local communities that are more functional and sustained through a Community Astronomy approach, and by increasing the modes of engagement and funding for: (i) meaningful, mutually beneficial partnerships with Indigenous and local communities, (ii) culturally supported pathways for the inclusion of Indigenous members within the profession, and (iii) true sustainability, preservation, and restoration of sites.'

"Referring to Astro2020, the Maunakea Observatories stated, 'It is through the lens of this framework that we remain deeply committed to ensuring the local and native Hawaiian community is included as we work together in forging a positive future for Maunakea.... We seek a community-based mutual stewardship model which will allow astronomy to thrive alongside other interests, sensitive to the needs of the local community.'

"Based on all this, it was clear to the State House that the status quo was no longer acceptable. We felt the Legislature had a responsibility to grapple with this very difficult and contentious issue and develop an alternative management framework for Mauna Kea. Our legislative purpose was not to criticize the University of Hawaii and its management, but rather to learn from the UH experience and recommend a management framework that builds on these lessons.

"*Mahalo* to the Native Hawaiian community leaders who have been part of the working group and legislative process brought their *mana'o*, hard work, and solutions-oriented thinking which is the heart of this legislation.

"*Mahalo* to the Maunakea Observatories and astronomy community who have acknowledged how having a better relationship with the community, especially the Native Hawaiian community, is of vital importance to their work and values.

"*Mahalo* to the University of Hawaii leaders who participated fully in the discussions in the Mauna Kea Working Group, listening to the concerns and criticisms from others, and also making systemic changes in their administrative organization through the establishment of the Center for Maunakea Stewardship.

"I am grateful for these strong leaders who were steadfast in their commitment to the process. Their engagement made it possible for us to envision the possibility of a brighter future for Mauna Kea.

"This measure takes a carefully balanced approach by stating that it is the policy of the State to support astronomy that is consistent with a mutual stewardship paradigm in which ecology, the environment, natural resources, cultural practices, education, and science are in balance and synergy. This approach is consistent with the approach supported by leaders in the Native Hawaiian community, members of the Mauna Kea Working Group and leaders in the astronomical community in Hawaii and the nation.

"The authority created by this bill would be attached to DLNR with its headquarters at UH Hilo 'Imiloa Astronomy Center or some other facility on Hawaii Island. The bill articulates that ecological protection, environmental sustainability, natural resources, cultural practice, education, and science would all be fostered in a mutual stewardship paradigm.

"In the conference draft bill, there is a five-year transition period during which UH handles day-to-day operations while the new authority develops plans for stewardship, financial support, leasing process, limitations on the number of observatories, and a moratorium on new leases during the transition. The authority recommends establishing a Mauna Kea Reserve on some of the land and submits regular reports to the Legislature. The current observatories can begin discussions with the authority about their future leases for their facilities.

"After the five-year transition, the authority assumes the powers and responsibilities of DLNR [Department of Land and Natural Resources] and LUC [Land Use Commission] over the lands in the Mauna Kea Reserve. The authority assumes the position of UH relative to the master lease, takes over day-to-day management, and would have the authority to assign leases. All current leases would still be in effect until 2033.

"Decommissioning the Caltech Submillimeter Observatory and Hoku Kea are still in the bill, but the authority is responsible for developing any other limitations on observatories.

"The authority is tasked with the responsibility to develop, negotiate, and execute agreements that support astronomy. This includes education, training, employment, and professional development opportunities for state residents. The practice of the observatories granting UH a certain amount of observing time, which is a very valuable commodity, will continue to be part of future leases. The bill sets a minimum floor of 7% of viewing time going to UH with a priority for research programs that involve Hawaii students (including UH, public schools and Hawaiian language schools) and projects that collaborate with Hawaiian culture and cultural practitioners. The bill also appropriates additional funds for K-12 public education programs in astronomy-related fields of learning at the University of Hawaii at Hilo, 'Imiloa Astronomy Center.

"The Conference Draft of the bill includes the operating principles of *mauna aloha*, *'ōpū kupuna* and *holomua 'oi kelakela*. It does not include articulation of the Kumu Kānāwai, a set of statements which describe the Native Hawaiian cultural worldview and values relevant to the stewardship of Mauna Kea. But the authority would be able to choose to incorporate these Kumu Kānāwai principles into its own rules and operational plans.

"The board members would be appointed by the Governor in the first year and confirmed by the Senate. The composition of the management board includes seats for the chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources, the Hawaii County mayor, chair of the UH Board of Regents, an individual with 'aina resource management expertise and specific experience with Hawaii Island-based management, an individual with expertise in p-12 public education, a representative of Maunakea Observatories, an individual with business and finance expertise and management experience, an individual who is a lineal descendant of a practitioner of Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practice associated with Mauna Kea, an individual who is a recognized practitioner of Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices, and two members selected by the Governor from a list submitted by the House Speaker and Senate President.

"The process of arriving at this conference draft involved not only a yearlong working group, but also extensive hearings, consultation, and testimony from stakeholders and community members at every step of this legislative process.

"Now, I ask my colleagues in the State House to support this legislation which provides a new path forward for managing Mauna Kea. It creates a *kuleana* for everyone who cares about the future of the *mauna*. I ask all the stakeholders to embrace the opportunity and do the hard work to implement this bill by engaging collaboratively in the process established by this new management framework and move forward together. *Mahalo*."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise with reservations. Mr. Speaker, I really appreciate the comments of the speaker from the Big Island, who represents that district well, has stated eloquently and articulately the position. However, because of the volatility of this situation, I'm a bit skeptical. I would like to see it more so as a pilot to see if it works, and then we change it and adjust it. I'm not sure that given the history of this issue, we are going to have a settlement or, as I said in a different speech, the test of the pudding is in the tasting. When we see what he has said come true, then it shall be done. But until then, I remain skeptical. Thank you."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I too rise in support, however, I have reservations, which was reflected by the speaker earlier. In fact, may I have the words of the Representative from Hawaii Kai entered in the Journal as if that were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative McKelvey continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I reached out to members of the Native Hawaiian community about the CD 1 draft, and they have concerns with the fact that the membership may not reflect what they feel should have been the end result, Mr. Speaker. However, it's a phased-in approach. It's an approach which will allow time for future legislatures to come back and look at the composition issue. It's been a year in which I think many of the concerns can be addressed down the road. However, Mr. Speaker, I think that the concerns are so valid that I have to have reservations with them going forward.

"Mr. Speaker, at the end of the day though, as we started this, all my reservations were grounded, and not a no vote, in the fact that for the bill to fail means we're left with the status quo of one entity having complete and unilateral control and decision making over the entire area. And that those who have a different voice, those in the Native Hawaiian community in particular, won't have the ability to echo that voice.

"And I was talking to one of my Maui colleagues, Mr. Speaker, and they brought up the fact that the Big Island delegation in the House and the Senate have worked hard on this and have had hours and hours and hours of meetings with many different stakeholders from many different areas. And in the end, it's self-determination for them. They are the elected representatives and senators of their island. And so, therefore, as one from Maui who if was in the same position would appreciate the support to be able to work with my community, I think therefore the measure should go forward. But that doesn't dilute the concerns that I and many others have

with the measure and hope that in the future that these concerns can be addressed so that there is greater inclusivity and specifications for the members of this working group to ensure that all the voices are heard. *Mahalo*."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations. I was originally opposed to it, but I really do appreciate the changes in the work that's been put into this. My reservations largely stem, Mr. Speaker, from one specific line in the bill and I'd like to talk about that, section -6(d), line 3, that the framework may include a set of principles for returning the lands used for astronomy research to their natural state whenever observatories are decommissioned or 'no longer have research or educational value,' Mr. Speaker. Why include that phrase? That's what really concerns me.

"There seems to be a faulty logic that somehow the fact that we have space-based astronomy and space-based astronomy will continue to grow, that somehow that might lead to ground-based astronomy becoming obsolete, and that's faulty logic. The shovel is not obsolete because we have the backhoe. The magnifying glass is not obsolete because we have the microscope. So, my concern, Mr. Speaker, is this language of 'no longer have research or educational value' will be weaponized. It will be weaponized by those who want to get rid of all astronomy on the *mauna*. And that's where my reservations are. What gives me solace is the intent of this bill, in section 8, is it is very clear that the support of astronomy is now the policy of the State. So those are my comments. Thanks."

Representative D. Kobayashi rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm speaking in opposition. So, I've heard many proponents of this working group describe this as really a win-win situation, that everybody's happy on this, everybody's bought off on it. For this particular predicament, where I think you consider it basically the ultimate zero-sum game, I don't see any win-win possible here. I think what we're hearing is basically window dressing for what the intent is of this, which is really to legitimize the building of the telescopes.

"And make no mistake, I think regardless of all the pretty wording, that's exactly what we're doing right here. And there are certain things that I think you can navigate, certain outcomes, but I think when you hear the proponents of this talking about how this is going to work to make everybody happy, those who consider the telescope to be a desecration as well as those that consider astronomy the most important thing in the world, it really doesn't make any sense for there to be any win-win on this. And I think you've got to really look through the pretty wording and see what we're really doing here. And as a result, I've done that, and I'm a clear no on this. Thank you."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. Mr. Speaker, I have to be very honest. When we engaged in this process, I was not confident. I could remember back and look at the standoff that we saw at Mauna Kea. And I was thinking, how are we going to navigate through all of this? But, Mr. Speaker, thanks to the hard work of your committee members on this, the skillful facilitation of the Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs Chair and the Water & Land Chair, as well as the Representative from District 43, they took months to navigate a process that brought stakeholders together. And the words and the phrase that I take away from the speaker from Waimea's comments is that what they have built and designed is a community model of mutual stewardship, an alternative management framework going forward. Again, several years ago, I could not see a way forward, and we have that way forward because they have done the difficult work of bringing stakeholders together.

"Now, that work has not been for nothing. At the highest levels of astronomy now, at the National Academies of Sciences and the Decadal Survey on Astronomy and Astrophysics 2020, we are hearing these words of community models, of stewardship and management. So, whatever happens with the outcome of this bill, this work of this House and this committee has already had an impact at national levels and changed the conversation. And that is precisely what this state is great about. What the

culture of Native Hawaiians is great about. It's about mutual stewardship and bringing people together and to see a way forward.

"So, my hope is that this bill is more than just pretty words. It's already made a difference at national and federal levels. And there are conversations not just happening on our islands but in other places. Because the rights and the voices of indigenous people need to be heard. And for me, it is a good day that it was the work of this House committee, it was the work of this House body that said, let us find a way forward. And my hope is that this bill will move forward and that we see that this management model is implemented in this state. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kapela rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Nakashima rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. About seven months ago when I was charged with leading this working group by you, sending me on an odyssey, I was not sure where we would end up. However, given the experience I've had, I'd like to thank you for giving me the opportunity to lead this working group and to come to know all of the members of the working group.

"I'd like to read for the body a letter received by Dr. Noe Noe Wong-Wilson, who is a resident of my district and who was a member of the working group. And she writes, 'I am writing to ask you to support HB 2024, HD1, SD2, CD1, Relating to Mauna Kea. The establishment of a new Mauna Kea Stewardship and Oversight Authority which will be responsible solely for the care and well-being of Mauna Kea will set a precedent for a true community-based & government partnership for stewarding the most important natural, cultural and historic resources we have in Hawai'i which is the 'āina. I do believe that good stewardship can place the interests of the mauna, cultural practitioners, community, education, and science including good astronomy and conservation efforts in alignment. The plan for transition of stewardship from UH to the new authority will be challenging but the plan is well thought out and will require cooperation from all parties. If the well-being of Mauna Kea is the common goal, the transition can be achieved with support from everyone including you, our elected officials.

"Mahalo for your hard work through the last few months. My experience on the Mauna Kea Working Group and supporting this bill through this year's legislative process has been enlightening, exciting and sometimes daunting. I have witnessed the earnest dedication that our elected officials must give to the process in order to make good decisions for the people and our beloved home.'

"So, I'd like to thank Dr. Noe Noe Wong-Wilson for her words of support, and I'd like to also ask permission to include the names of the other working group members into the Journal. Thank you very much."

Representative Gates rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Holt rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations. My reservations for this measure have always been about the process of how we got here. Thank you to the Chair of the Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs Committee for leading the working group. But we didn't have any participation from the Senate until the last couple of weeks in session. And thank you very much to the Chair of the Higher Education Committee in the Senate for coming together and working on this with us, as we had previously heard there would be no cooperation. So, at least we're here at this point.

"But just because we have this bill doesn't mean the issue is over. Those who participated in the working group are very thankful and do appreciate the work product. I'm not sure that's the common theme across the Hawaiian community. My stance has always been to continue this conversation and not try to fix it in one time. It's obviously not of super importance, we have a five-year transition period so we could use a year or two to tighten this up a little bit more. But I am very thankful that we could sit in a room with a bunch of Native Hawaiians and get a respectful discussion. And I hope that we can continue this moving forward. Thank you."

Representative McKelvey rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Holt be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Tokioka rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Holt be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2024, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MAUNA KEA," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Gates, Holt, Kapela, LoPresti, McKelvey, Tokioka, and Ward voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Hashem and D. Kobayashi voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 235-22 and H.B. No. 2260, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2260, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CANNABIS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Okimoto voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 249-22 and S.B. No. 3289, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 3289, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Sayama rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. As the Legislature moves measures to put money into working families' pockets right now, this bill looks to help their families when they retire. Currently, tens of thousands of Hawaii's private sector employees have little access to or no knowledge of investing in their retirement future. Even small businesses, who want to provide employees with retirement benefits, simply are unable to due to the cost and complexity of managing a retirement program.

"Without a robust retirement plan, workers will continue to step into retirement only to fall into poverty and grow dependent on public assistance programs. Today, however, we shine a light on this bleak future. Thanks to the dedicated advocacy of AARP and the collaboration and leadership of the Chairs of Labor & Tourism, Consumer Protection & Commerce, and Finance, this bill will establish a state retirement savings program.

"This program represents a strong commitment to helping local businesses and their employees open and enroll into a retirement savings program. Combined with \$1 million for education and outreach and a \$500 match for the first 50,000 employee participants, I am extremely hopeful we will see more workers save for their future and live with dignity as they age. This was no small feat, and I'd like to again extend my warmest thanks to

everyone who was involved in making this measure possible today. Thank you."

Representative Luke rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. This has been an issue that has been on the Legislature's table for several years. And thanks to the advocacy of AARP and many of the members here, we are here passing a really good bill. This bill allows for individuals who would like an opportunity to participate in a retirement savings, only because their employers do not provide any type of 401k or other opportunities, an opportunity for the first time to be able to participate. Thanks to the efforts of the prior Labor Chair, who is the CPC Chair, and the current Labor Chair.

"This is an example of the Legislature grappling with a very tough issue and trying to figure out a way where it's not just providing money but finding a way to implement it correctly. And this is an example of where the working group and the interim work really work. And so, we wanted to just thank all the members, especially the members of the working group and especially AARP, for bringing us this far on something that is workable, something that is good for Hawaii's workers, and something that we can be all proud of.

"And this will be a first in the nation of an example where other states have shied away from an opt-out system. And now they have an example that they can use to look at perhaps a successful opt-in with significant amount of investment by the State. So, thank you very much."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3289, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HAWAII RETIREMENT SAVINGS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative McDermott voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 250-22 and S.B. No. 2021, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2021, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Holt rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. For the betterment of Native Hawaiians, for the betterment of the conditions of Native Hawaiians, that's what this bill is about. And that's why the Office of Hawaiian Affairs was created in 1978. This may seem like a smaller bill this year, with \$600 million going to DHHL and \$328 million going to the Kalima case, but let me assure you that this measure is just as important.

"Why is it important? It's important because we are exercising our clear authority as a legislature to set OHA's pro rata share closer to the 20% that they're owed. I've stood up here and read all the constitutional stuff and sections in the HRS, I won't do that today. But to be clear, by anybody's accounting, either OHA or DLNR's, we're still far short of that 20% number. Probably around 10% with this \$21 million. So, we still have a long way to go.

"Mr. Speaker, I introduce this bill every year, and I'm very thankful to stand here. And thank you to the Finance Chair, the Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, I'm not going to go down the list, everybody, thank you guys so much. To be here on final reading increasing this amount is amazing.

"So many good things have happened for Hawaiians this year. And I've kind of been numb to it all with how much money is flowing into our community until this morning. And this morning, I was walking back from picking up breakfast for my grandma, and I was standing on the corner waiting for the light. And I turned around and I looked in the graveyard, it's across the street from my house. And I saw these two Hawaiian flags, not flapping in the wind, just straight up. I could see both flags just blowing in the wind. And it just hit me, the progress that we're making and the lives that will be changed by what we're doing here.

"But Mr. Speaker, also in that graveyard is a not so happy reminder of the progress we have made. In the graveyard is buried Joseph Kahahawai, 90 years ago, in 1932, he was murdered. I won't go into the case, the Massie case, but we've obviously come a long way since then. This additional

\$5 million a year and the fact that we are acknowledging that we have been underpaying for so many years is just amazing. And with all the progress made, Mr. Speaker, as evidenced by the comments I referenced in my floor speech a couple of weeks ago, we still have a long way to go. Thank you very much."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in strong support with mild opposition. Why do I have strong support with mild opposition? Well, this bill is about what the previous speaker said, getting the 20% to the OHA, which doesn't actually give the 20%. That is the difficulty. But let me go back to Governor Waihee in saying that this was a banner year. Clearly it was a banner year, in fact, not only because of the money, but because this is the most debate I've ever heard in my however many terms I've been here about Hawaiian issues, and in a positive light, Mr. Speaker. So, I think this is really historical that we're not only giving money, but we're talking about it in a positive way and we want to be more constructive.

"Having said that, Mr. Speaker, I would remind my colleagues that the Constitution says clearly that there should be a 20% of the revenues to the benefit of OHA to do its claims. In fact, it even did a study in 2015 that said of the just about \$400 million of the lands that it should get 20%, there should be about \$78,900,00 that would go to them. And referencing the previous speaker, we're about halfway to that 20%, Mr. Speaker.

"And I know there's a working group, you can say, hey, there's a working group, they're going to figure it out. Well, how many times have they tried to inventory the lands, how to figure the lands, when will the working group actually say, not only will there be a 20%, but it will be on gross. Because we reneged on that and said, well, we actually can do net. And Mr. Speaker, I think we shortchanged the Hawaiian community.

"I guess the bottom line is this, and I'm going to quote the Representative from Kailua. When we have in the Constitution, we have by statute what is rightly owed to Hawaiians, why do they have to go to court? Because if this doesn't come to pass to be 20%, this is another Kalima case in the making, Mr. Speaker. That shouldn't have to happen, but it may happen. And I think we'll be regretting all the good things that we've done today, because if they don't go, it's not going to progress what ultimately is this. Mr. Speaker, the Hawaiian community needs self-determination. To get self-determination it needs money and it needs money that is rightly owed. I'm not talking about sovereignty, I'm talking about self-determination, which may a degree of sovereignty contain.

"Mr. Speaker, the Hawaiian community is in a rising renaissance. We'll know more about it in the 2022 election in a few months. But there's a new awakening. Some know that the cultural renaissance began in my district at Kalama Valley. When George Santos, the pig farmer, laid in front of the tractors that were going to knock down his farm. And Kalama Valley was going to be built by Bishop Estate.

"The renaissance now is a political awareness, a political consciousness that says, hey, we are the Hawaiian people, we are the indigenous people, we are the ones that have got all of these statutory rights but we got to go to court to enforce them. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I hope today, as a banner year, a banner dialog that we have, is going to be a continuation of a good relationship and a fulfilling of what has been promised for years and years to the Hawaiian community. Thank you."

Representative Belatti rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support of Senate Bill 2021, Conference Draft 1.

"The persistent question about the payment of public land trust monies to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs has been a decades long question that has yet to be fully resolved even under this bill. But this bill takes a critical and significant step forward towards meeting the State's obligations to Native Hawaiians and sets up a political process to resolve this moral obligation. We must continue this political process moving forward as envisioned by the Conference draft.

"In examining this issue over the past interim, the House Investigative Committee created by House Resolution 164 (SLH 2021) noted the long political history and background to the creation of and political decisions surrounding ceded lands and the public land trust. The House Investigative Committee ultimately recommended that 'there be additional inquiry into the public land trust and ceded land revenues by the appropriate House legislative committees.' I am grateful that when faced with unexpected revenues, the House Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs Committee and the House Finance Committee, along with the Senate Hawaiian Affairs and Ways and Means Committees, took up this important recommendation, and have crafted this measure to assist the State in meeting its obligations for the betterment of the conditions of Native Hawaiians."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2021, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INCREASING THE PAYMENT AMOUNT FOR THE OFFICE OF HAWAIIAN AFFAIRS' PRO RATA SHARE OF THE PUBLIC LAND TRUST," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations. I am just disappointed that the final version of this is a much weaker bill than what this legislature started off with. Thank you so much."

And what's exciting about this bill is that we will be using \$4 million in general funds to leverage \$19 million in federal TANF funds that have been sitting unused each year.

"I just want to take this time to, Mr. Speaker, thank our Finance Chair for working with me during the interim to structure this bill, our Vice Chair of Housing for sitting through so many meetings to craft this bill, and I want to give a shout out to the Department of Human Services, Benefit, Employment & Support Services Division and the TANF staff for being a real partner in crafting this bill. I finally want to thank the 28 co-introducers. *Mahalo* to all of you for your support in helping the neediest families in Hawaii."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'll be brief, but I too, I just want to stand on this in strong support. Mr. Speaker, when you're asked, when we're asked by people, and I spoke earlier on the floor amendment for this reason, what have we done to address the cost of living, we need to point to this bill as well, Mr. Speaker.

"In my district alone, rents are spiraling thanks to the new wave of investment acquisition of houses and apartments and condominiums. And this measure here will help our people in being able to meet, at least somewhat, these challenges. And Mr. Speaker, to tap these unused federal funds just sitting there that could be utilized by the people of Hawaii, amounts, in my mind, to government waste. And for us to draw these monies down and put them in the pockets of working families to help combat the high cost of rent, not only is it a cost of living measure, but also is a waste corruption measure too. Because money unused is money wasted. So again, thank you to the Chairs of Finance and Housing for this bill. It's very important. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2233, HD 1, SD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE FOR NEEDY FAMILIES," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

"Mr. Speaker, in support, brief comments on HB 2515. This majority package bill, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the select committee and my colleagues that represented the various committee chairs and district area representatives. Mr. Speaker, I truly believe that your committee worked diligently with entities like Board of Water Supply, Department of Health, and the military to actually have a resolution in which we are looking at the closure of the fuel tanks. Mr. Speaker, this measure here before you regarding the laboratory, I think will then, which we are going to try to secure federal funds as part of the settlement moving forward, will then actually help all people of Hawaii and be used in a wide variety of situations to protect our *'aina* as well as the people of Hawaii. So, on behalf of everybody, thank you."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, Mr. Speaker. May I have the words of the previous speaker entered into the Journal as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ganaden continued, stating:

"And a brief comment. This bill is absolutely necessary in order to expedite the testing of our groundwater. Prior to this, we were shipping these test vials out to California for a lab. Famously at the beginning of this emergency in January, some of those testing vials got displaced, there were some other issues. How dangerous this is can't be understated. If we don't get this in time, we could easily see our freshwater being inundated by not just jet fuel, but a variety of other things.

"So, my thanks to the other members of the Red Hill Committee on working on this. Of course, there's a lot of work to do. This has been an evolving crisis that our various elected officials, from the governor to our legislature, our city and county elected officials, and our federal delegation have been working on diligently. It's one of the first times, I mean I'm new but I don't know of any other instance in which all elected officials have been in complete agreement as to what the necessity is to defend our constitutional rights to clean water and to advocate for our communities and for the health of our continued environment. So, again, thank you to the other folks that worked on this with the Red Hill Committee, and we're going to keep our eye on this in the interim and hopefully in the years to come."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2515, HD 2, SD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative McDermott voting no.

HOUSE SPECIAL COMMITTEE

Representative Belatti, for the Special Committee to Consider Miscellaneous Communication Nos. 1001 and 1002, presented a report (Spec. Com. Rep. No. 1).

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee and the recommendations contained therein be adopted, seconded by Representative Okimoto.

Representative Har rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, may I rise on a point of personal privilege? Mr. Speaker, I just want to apologize again to you, this body, my family, my constituents, including the petitioners, who I've had the honor and privilege of representing for the past 16 years. I again want to apologize for any shame and embarrassment that I caused, and I humbly ask that you find it in your hearts to forgive me. At this time, Mr. Speaker, may I request additional comments into the Journal, and I respectfully request to be recused from this vote."

The Chair addressed Representative Har, stating:

"Yes, you are excused from this vote, Representative."

Representative Har's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to address the House Special Committee Report No. 1-22, Regarding Misc. Communications 1001 and 1002 ('Report'), dated on April 29, 2022. From the outset, it should be noted for the record that the Misc. Communications were submitted by the father and mother ('Petitioners'), of one of my political opponents, who ran unsuccessfully against me.

"Secondly, it should be noted that the Report repeats in several places that 'the Committee would be guided by principles of fairness and impartiality consistent with the protection of constitutional due process rights.' Accordingly, the Committee had a duty to act as an impartial, third-party adjudicator. It was, therefore, the Petitioners' burden to prove, under the clear and convincing standard, that there was a violation of House Rule 62. The Petitioners failed to meet their burden presenting only their personal 'statements,' and unsubstantiated media reports.

"Thirdly, I would like to highlight for the members, one portion on page 12 of the Report. Specifically, the portion of the Report at which my attorney, Mr. Luke gave his presentation before the Committee on April 13, 2021. 'Mr. Luke asserted, in relevant part, that the OVUII charge against Representative Har was not dismissed on a technicality and the "judgment of acquittal is a very high standard" whereby the prosecution had failed to meet their burden of proof. 4/13/22 Hearing at p.24. Mr. Luke argued that the District Court thoroughly reviewed all the witness testimony presented at trial, including the testimony of arresting police officers and the AnyPlace Cocktail Lounge staff who served Representative Har, along with all of the body camera video footage of the arrest, and correctly acquitted Representative Har of the OVUII charge. Mr. Luke concluded that this Committee should similarly dismiss the petitions against Representative Har.'

"Finally, I must insert these written remarks because of the many inaccuracies and misleading statements in the Report and to clarify the House Journal.

- On page 1, the Report states, "[t]he Special Committee was charged with investigating whether Representative Sharon E. Har ('Representative Har') conduct involving alleged incidents of driving while intoxicated, driving without an auto insurance policy, and driving the wrong way on a one-way street on February 22, 2021, violated House Rule 62, which sets forth the body's Code of Legislative Conduct."

"On its face, the Report explicitly makes clear that it was formed to re-prosecute me for the alleged OVUII, which clearly violates due process and fairness, under the doctrine of double-jeopardy.

- On page 4, the Report states: "[a]t the outset, the Chair explained that the Committee would be guided by principles of fairness and impartiality consistent with the protection of constitutional due process rights."

"Mr. Speaker, if this was in fact the case, the Committee should have been dismissed immediately after I was acquitted in the district court matter. The principles of double-jeopardy dictate that any issues raised before the Committee which derived from the district court case should have been barred. Unfortunately, numerous questions from the Committee members and statements from the Petitioners related directly to the alleged OVUII incident, and had already been adjudicated by a Court of Law. This was clearly in violation of my due process rights and contradicts misleading statements in the Report that the Committee was guided by principles of fairness and impartiality consistent with the protections of constitutional due process rights.

- On page 5, in the third paragraph, the Report states my trial dates were continued six times for various reasons.

"To be clear, the Courts were closed due to COVID, and that was the reason for the continuances.

- Further on page 5, the Report is misleading and states, "Representative Har's 'jury-waived' trial began on..."

"For the edification of the Chair, you Mr. Speaker and the Committee members, there is no such thing as a 'jury-waived,' trial in matters dealing with OVUII. All cases are bench trials. For the Report to outright state that my trial was 'jury-waived,' insinuates that I waived my right to a jury trial. It is another inaccuracy in the Report and is misleading. Accordingly, I submit this to clarify the Report and record.

- On page 6, in the third paragraph, the Report states; "[t]he Chair advised the parties that the Special Committee would be considering reliable and trustworthy supporting evidence from the parties."

"No information pertaining to the OVUII should have been submitted as the matter had already been adjudicated. At best, however, the Petitioners submitted only: (1) a signed statement by Father Petitioner which reflected his personal opinion; (2) a signed statement by Mother Petitioner which reflected her personal opinion; and (3) unsubstantiated news articles and media reports, which are known as hearsay. This information, under the clear and convincing standard, was not reliable and trustworthy supporting evidence. The Report, again, is inaccurate and misleading.

- Page 9 of the Report notes that there was a request, presumably by the House, for the official transcripts of the pretrial and trial proceedings ("Transcripts").

"To be clear with taxpayers and in the interests of transparency, there should be a disclosure by the Committee as to how much was expended in taxpayer funding to procure the transcripts. Moreover, upon receipt of the Transcripts, the Committee could have easily ruled at that point. The Transcripts substantiated the Declaration I submitted. Instead, the Chair 'determined' that a hearing was necessary, yet gave no reason as to her determination. The Transcripts further substantiated that the allegations made against me by the Petitioners were not true. In fact, the Report explicitly states that 'it was not shown by clear and convincing evidence that Representative Har made the statement, "do you know who I am," or that any statement she made involving her identity was intended to influence the police officers or curry favor.'

- Pp. 14-16, make clear that the House Committee ordered the exhibits that were introduced at my pretrial hearing and trial. These exhibits were given to all of the Committee members.

"I continue to submit that this was in direct violation of my due process rights since the OVUII case had been adjudicated on January 10, 2022. The trial exhibits were directly related to the charge of OVUII. And the matter had been adjudicated by a court of law. Accordingly, there was no reason for the Committee to request access to the exhibits introduced at my trial and to 'review them.'

- Page 17 of the Report again states, "[i]n exercising its duties, the Special Committee was guided by the principles of fairness, due process, and past practice of the House of Representatives in handling matters of alleged drunk drivers by former members of the House of Representatives."

"In the interest of transparency and for the record, there has never been any former House Leadership that has 'handled' a matter of alleged drunk driving by former members of the House of Representatives. It is for the Court system to adjudicate these matters to ensure fairness, and due process.

"I submit that by proceeding with the Committee, the Chair violated the principles of fairness and due process by allowing any issues related to the OVUII to be raised again before the Committee.

- Page 18 of the Report contains one of the most egregious and inaccurate representations. In the first paragraph, the Report states that "... that she endangered others, including a moped that swerved to avoid her and other cars that she potentially could have hit."

"Left out from the Report was the fact that the officer who testified to this, was impeached on this specific statement (as well as other statements) he made in the courtroom, on January 10. His police report, which was written shortly after the incident, did not corroborate much of his verbal testimony. With respect to the alleged moped rider, my attorney explicitly brought to the attention of the officer, that there was no mention of a moped rider in his police report. He admitted it was not. Accordingly, Mr. Speaker, I want to clarify for the record that page 18 of the Report does not accurately reflect

the evidence adduced at trial and submit these remarks to clarify not only the Report, but the House Journal pertaining to acceptance of Special Committee Report 1-22.

- On page 21, the Report states, "[a]ccordingly, the Committee did not find clear and convincing evidence supporting a violation of House Rule 62.2. or 62.4(8)."

"If the Committee found no wrongdoing or breach of any law or rule, it is confusing that the Committee would then proceed to make recommendations against me.

"I want to clarify for the Journal and the Report again, all questions asked by Committee members pertaining to the charge of OVUII violated the principles of fairness and my due process rights. As the Report notes, '[t]he Committee acknowledges that the criminal proceeding related to this matter was dismissed and a judgment for acquittal entered by the District Court. However, the Special Committee notes that the issues before it are not an invitation to relitigate the criminal charges against Representative Har, which have since been resolved in her favor.' Even this statement is misleading because it conflates the fact that I was acquitted and the dismissal was ancillary to the acquittal.

"Due to the many inaccuracies and misleading statements in the Report, I respectfully insert these remarks. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and Spec. Com. Rep. No. 1 was adopted, with Representative Har being excused.

FINAL READING

Representative Belatti moved that the House reconsider its action previously taken in disagreeing to the amendments made by the Senate, and to agree to the amendments to the following House Bills, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried:

H.B. No. 2088, HD 3, (SD 2)

FINAL READING

H.B. No. 1570, HD 1, SD 2:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 1570, HD 1, SD 2 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Wildberger rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With strong reservations and in solidarity with the advocates who have been working so hard and hoping for a bill that didn't have amendments created by the industry offering so many exemptions. We know that one in three high school students is vaping. We know that one in five middle school students is vaping. And the irony isn't lost on me that our feeble colleagues that are addicted are vaping while we're discussing this bill. The advocates are so exasperated, they'd rather wait another year than have a compromise bill passed. But that's what we do here is compromise. And appreciating the efforts of this bill's introducer and his desire to continue to work on this, I offer my reservations in solidarity with the advocates who care so much about our public health. *Mahalo*."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition, Mr. Speaker. Forty-two percent of Native Hawaiian high schoolers statewide currently vape. With neighbor island communities at the forefront of this epidemic, 35.4% of Hawaii Island high schoolers currently vape, with 57% of Hawaii Island high schoolers saying that they have tried vaping. That's nearly 10% higher than the state average.

"The tobacco industry has a history of targeting communities of color, women, LGBTQ communities with flavors, and specifically the menthol flavor. This bill contains an exemption that would leave over 1,000 flavored products on the market. This broad exemption language was requested in written testimony by a tobacco lobbyist, the same company that holds over 30% of the vaping market share and its largest shareholder is Altria, the parent company of Philip Morris. The State of Hawaii filed a lawsuit against

this company in 2020 for its predatory marketing towards children, and several other states have settled similar cases for millions of dollars.

"Incremental progress does not work when dealing with the tobacco industry. They aren't afraid of short-term losses if they can protect their profits in the long term. So, I humbly ask you to ask yourselves why a tobacco industry lobbyist would offer an amendment to a flavor ban bill instead of outright opposing the bill? We can't be so short sighted. What seems like small progress today could be a gaping loophole for years or even just months down the road. The compromises that we make now and the compromise that we're making in this bill is using our *keiki* and using their futures as bargaining chips.

"So, I strongly support a comprehensive ban on the sale of flavored tobacco products. But agreeing to a tobacco industry amendment is something that I cannot do. My responsibility is to my constituents, and that compels me to think about the long-term consequences of short-term compromise. So, for this reason, I have to vote no."

Representative Yamane rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, standing in support with strong reservations. Mr. Speaker, as chair, we want to bring to this body bills that bring both sides together. And at times we are successful, at times, Mr. Speaker, we bring bills in front of the members that both sides don't like. But that's a good thing, because that means both have to give.

"However, Mr. Speaker, this measure before you has some significant concerns that I would like to mention. But beforehand, Mr. Speaker, I want it to be clear that myself and members of the committee are in opposition to any sale of tobacco products, flavored or not, to minors. That was a consistent message that we wanted to make sure resounded, that we wanted to do what we could do to ensure that flavored or regular tobacco products would not get into the hands of our youth. Some of that discussion included meeting with principals to get those products off our school campuses and make sure that there were no avenues, both in stores or online, to get into the hands of our youth.

"However, Mr. Speaker, the measure before you, I would like to express some concerns and have it inserted into the record. Mr. Speaker, many of you received testimony from the Hawaii Public Health Institute, who is asking for the bill to be killed. Mr. Speaker, in my discussions with them, they brought up that currently in the federal exemptions discussion nationally regarding the substance abuse, substance regarding vaping, there are two major exemptions that could include up to, as mentioned earlier, thousands of products.

"Mr. Speaker, in this measure, also dated April 25th, at my request since there were multiple positions stated, we asked the Department of Health to take a stand. Mr. Speaker, I would like this also be inserted into the record, that they provided me on April 25th that they are in opposition to HB 1570.

"Also, the language of the current bill was commented on by the written testimony by the Attorney General dated April 1st, which express some concerns that I would like to highlight as this bill moves forward. Specifically, the issue that the title is relating to youth vaping and that in the language it talks about all tobacco products. I did try to get clarification from the attorney general, and as you know, lawyers, they move in between actually saying yes or no sometimes. So rather than deal with that, I'm going to just submit their testimony on the language that is before you into the record.

"Mr. Speaker, also before you, we have a measure in which will directly impact both the community as well as the Department of Health. And so, I just wanted to make sure that all this is in there for the members to consider. And again, I would just like to highlight that I have some strong reservations. Thank you."

Re: H.B. 1570, HD1, SD2, Relating to the Youth Vaping Epidemic

The Coalition for a Tobacco-Free Hawai'i (CTFH) writes to express concerns regarding the current exemption language in HB 1570, HD1, SD2, which excludes from the bill's ban on the sale of flavored tobacco products "any product that has received a marketing order or other authorization the United States Food and Drug Administration pursuant to title 21 United States Code section 387j." (Page 10, lines 11-15). For the reasons outlined below, CTFH asks that the House not reconsider its earlier disagreement to the Senate version of the bill.

The current draft of HB 1570 leaves over one thousand flavored products, including menthol cigarettes, on the market.

House Bill 1570's current exemption language – an amendment requested by a tobacco industry lobbyist – broadly sweeps in many more products than merely those granted FDA's Premarket Tobacco Application (PMTA) marketing orders. Pursuant to 21 United States code section 387j any new tobacco product must undergo premarket review by the FDA, unless that product received a Substantial Equivalence Marketing Order upon a finding that the product is "substantially equivalent to a tobacco product commercially marketed. . . in the United States as of February 15, 2007".¹ Some new tobacco products may be exempt from even Substantial Equivalence requirements if the new tobacco product is a modified version of a predicate product and the FDA finds, in part, that "the proposed modification is minor and to a legally marketed tobacco product." **Therefore, even if HB 1570, HD1, SD2 passes into law, flavored tobacco products may continue to be sold in Hawai'i if they are granted PMTA marketing orders, Substantial Equivalence marketing orders, or are granted an exemption to Substantial Equivalence requirements. This includes over one thousand flavored tobacco products.**

Products that fall under this exemption and are therefore not required to submit to the PMTA process include but are not limited to certain menthol cigarettes (such as Virginia Slims Menthol Box²), flavored pipe tobacco (such as Sutliff #208 Apple Flavored³), flavored pre-filled cigar shells (such as Cyclones

Honey⁴), and flavored shisha (such as Al Fakher Apricot, Banana, Rose, Plum⁵). All of these products were exempt from the PMTA process because they received Substantial Equivalence Marketing Orders from the FDA or were otherwise exempt, and would therefore be exempt from the flavor ban enacted pursuant to HB 1570, HD1, SD2 as they were "authorized" under 21 U.S.C. 387j. Products granted PMTA marketing orders would also be exempt.⁶

The FDA has yet to issue decisions on e-cigarettes that have the largest market shares and/or are popular with youth.

Although the FDA has issued decisions on 99% of new electronic nicotine delivery system products submitted for PMTA review, it has yet to grant or deny marketing orders on e-cigarette products being sold under the brand names JUUL, Vuse, NJOY, Logic, Blu, SMOK, Suorin and Puff Bar.⁷ Many of these products are incredibly popular among youth, and come in flavors such as lemon ice, cool mint, and watermelon. Should the FDA grant marketing orders for these products, they would be allowed to continue being sold in Hawai'i under the exemption provided by HB 1570.

Exempting menthol cigarettes will disproportionately exclude Native Hawaiian communities from the health benefits of a flavor ban.

For decades, the tobacco industry has profited from targeting youth of color and other marginalized and low-income populations. African American, Native Hawaiian, and Filipino communities are disproportionately affected by the harms caused by tobacco. In the bill's current form, HB 1570 carves out many products that have historically been heavily marketed to these communities. In Hawai'i, 78% of Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander smokers use menthol cigarettes.⁸ **Menthol is also one of the most popular flavors among high school e-cigarette users.**⁹ The Coalition has serious concerns that leaving menthol combustible cigarettes on the market may inadvertently cause youth to switch to smoking combustible menthol cigarettes if their preferred e-cigarette flavor is no longer available.

For these reasons, CTFH urges the House to **not reconsider its prior disagreement to HB 1570, HD1, SD2, and, instead, work with advocates and stakeholders to pass a strong, comprehensive flavors bill in 2023.** Please do not hesitate to let us know if you have any questions or concerns. 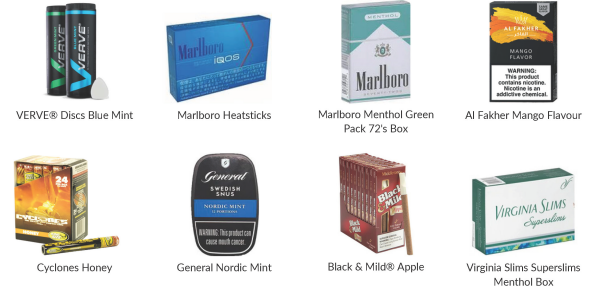

HB 1570: A FLAVOR BAN IN NAME ONLY

HB1570, HD1, SD1 contains a tobacco industry amendment that leaves over 1,000 flavored tobacco products on the market. This undermines the intent of the original bill and makes the "flavored tobacco ban" meaningless. Here is a sampling of flavored tobacco products that would be exempted:

PENDING PRODUCTS

While the FDA has denied thousands of marketing orders for most flavors of e-cigarettes, they have yet to make a decision on thousands of menthol-flavored e-cigarettes. These flavors are still extremely popular and appealing to youth, and it is unclear if the FDA will authorize menthol e-cigarettes.

SUBJECT: H.B.1570, H.D. 1, S.D. 2 - Relating to the Youth Vaping Epidemic

The Department of Health (DOH) opposes H.B. 1570, H.D.1, S.D.1 because of the inclusion of the FDA language that cedes state regulatory authority on flavored tobacco products to the federal government. The DOH strongly recommends the following amendment to Section 2, (7), Page 10, line 10 to line 15:

Flavored tobacco product" means any tobacco product that contains a constituent that imparts a characterizing flavor.⁷ ~~but does not include any product that has received a marketing order or other authorization the United States Food and Drug Administration pursuant to title 21 United States Code section 387j.~~

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I wanted to say that I stand with reservations, support with reservations. And I wanted to say that it's really important that we work on this issue. This has been a top priority of the Keiki Caucus for years now. And I really appreciate the work of my colleague in this area. He's very passionate, dogged, and single minded, in fact. Those are compliments.

"I think that this exemption is an almost fatal flaw and I'm deeply worried about it. And if not for the commitment of my colleague to continue to work on this measure, and my understanding of the strength and the passion of our advocates, and I know that they will also continue to work to eliminate this exemption, I would be voting in opposition. But I have faith in the process and that we're going to continue to fight for a flavor ban."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No vote, brief comment. As noted by the Office of the Attorney General, we still have yet to define vaping itself. I think that this bill has so many issues that we need to return next year with a better draft. Thank you."

Representative Matayoshi rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. It seems like we're all in agreement that vaping for minors especially is bad. It seems like we're all in agreement that Hawaii is one of the top in the nation in terms of minors vaping. And it seems like we're all in agreement that flavored vaping targets these minors and is creating an epidemic of massive proportions that my generation, my kid's generations, are going to have to deal with. There is no real debate or room for disagreement that nicotine is a highly addictive substance. And it seems like we're all in agreement that we need some kind of control over it.

"Unfortunately, there really is no regulation on vaping right now. And that's what I want everyone to understand, we are at zero right now. We are at the floor right now. We have nothing protecting our kids right now from flavored vaping products. And although this bill does have an exemption that I did not put in, that I would love to have taken out, it's better than nothing. And even if this exemption is opened up as wide as possible and the FDA starts willy-nilly approving applications, we're going to be at the same place that we're at right now.

"So, the thought that there are thousands of potential products that might be approved by the FDA at some point in the future, that's a red herring. We've got nothing right now, we're allowing all the vaping products on the market right now. And I don't understand why certain organizations are against any kind of forward progress on this issue. We have tried for years in this chamber to pass any kind of flavored vaping ban or restriction or legislation. And we stand here right now, hopefully about to pass something, hopefully about to give our kids some kind of hope that they don't have to be addicted to nicotine for the rest of their lives.

"It baffles me that we are balking at an exemption that is, to me, a phantom exemption. If you look at the PMTA process, it's quite difficult. There are a number of different things and loopholes that companies have to jump through that, does it benefit the health in a greater degree than it hurts it and so on and so forth. There's a reason that only a handful of products have been approved so far.

"And if you actually read the email that was sent to us, the examples that were being given are a certain kind of flavored pipe tobacco, a certain kind of chewing tobacco, a certain kind of peach flavored cigar. These are not the kinds of things we're trying to stop here. I believe there's only one vaping product or maybe two that have actually made it through this process. What this is going to do is it's going to take out nearly all of the flavored vaping products off the market in one fell swoop in Hawaii. That is the kind of progress I need. That's the kind of progress we need, honestly.

"You're right, this bill is not perfect. It's not going to get rid of 100% of all flavored vaping products. It's not going to somehow prevent any kind of flavored vaping products from making it to the black market. This is not going to prevent every single child in Hawaii from flavored vaping ever. That would be a miracle, I've never seen a bill written as such. But what it will do is it will get rid of the flavored vaping products in Foodland. It'll get

rid of the flavored vaping products in Longs. It'll get rid of the vape shops that are selling legal products to people over 21 who are then turning around and selling these products on Instagram, on Facebook, and so on and so forth. It'll make flavored vaping products much more expensive on the black market, or hopefully restrict their access at all, and at least make them more expensive so that kids can't afford these.

"This is forward progress on this issue. I do not want to start from ground zero again next year. I think we need to take what we've got and work on it next year. So, I really appreciate all your support and thank you to the Speaker for bringing this motion back for consideration. But please, please, let's make progress on this issue and not start from the starting line again next year. Thank you."

Representative Tam rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations. This bill is definitely slightly flawed. However, I believe that it will help us move the needle when it comes to fighting this epidemic. So, I just want to express these reservations and to express my commitment to removing that exemption as we move into next year. Thank you."

Representative Takumi rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tokioka rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. I'd also like to ask for a point of information, Mr. Speaker. Because one of the things that has not been discussed with this bill is it's not on the current Order of the Day. And I know technically we can do this, but people are watching us. So, my point of information, Mr. Speaker, is could we have waited till *sine die* to vote on this bill and put it on the Order of the Day, and people in the general public could have seen what we're going to be voting on this bill on *sine die*?"

At 1:42 p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:44 p.m.

Representative Tokioka continued, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I do know the technical rule, Mr. Speaker. And thank you for the clarification, Majority Leader. But I'm sure some people on this body are going to get calls from both sides. And I wanted to address that too. A lot of times we say, when you pass a bill and not many sides agree, it's a good bill. In this bill, all the sides don't agree and it's a bad bill.

"So, I want to insert the floor speech of the Health Chair. Because none of us, there is absolutely not one of us on this floor that supports kids getting flavored vapes as products to vape. None of us support that. But we got to come up with a better bill. And I just wanted to share my concerns about the process because I know we can do it like this, but it would have been better if we did it on *sine die*, because I know we're going to be passing other bills on *sine die*. So, for that, I just wanted to state my opposition to this bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Quinlan rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Yamane be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Gates rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in opposition. I believe, as the Chairman on the Committee on Health stated, we here as a body do not support any youth vaping, whether it's flavored or non-flavored. And I think that'd be the same for flavored alcohol as well, we don't support our kids drinking flavored alcohol as well but it's okay for our adults to use it in our current laws as of right now. And I support the intent of the measure and I want to thank the author for all his hard work. As I know, this has been a project he's been working on for quite some time.

"But my opposition rises because I don't think that prohibition will work. As we look at the history of prohibition, whether it's alcohol or fireworks, in Hawaii we still find access to it. And again, that's why I rise today, because I feel like with this flavor ban, what we'll see is an explosion in the

black market. Because as we know, kids are not purchasing these flavored vapes from retail locations that are legal to sell them, they're purchasing it on online, through a friend.

"And I challenge our members to go on Facebook, go on Instagram, type in flavor bars. You'll see there's over a dozen sellers of these flavor bars. And that speaks to the need for enforcement and making sure that we have the capability to enforce these types of behaviors and these illegal sales that are happening on the black market. And I feel like if there was somewhat of a tax on this flavored e-cigarettes or vapes in general, that that money could be used to provide the resources and funding needed to curb this type of behavior that we're seeing in our youth across the state.

"On top of that, Mr. Speaker, the federal government is going through a rulemaking process to establish regulations on flavored e-cigarettes and that we should allow for the federal government to supersede us with that, because that will also put Hawaii on an even playing field with the rest of the nation. Because what I can foresee, too, is that there's going to be other states that will continue to sell flavored vapes, as we ban ours, and will be importing them into our marketplace as well.

"On top of that, we collect almost \$9 to \$10 million in tax revenues from flavored vapes and e-cigarettes combined. That could be, again, used for curbing this type of behavior. And my goal is to find something meaningful that will actually solve the issue of the youth vaping epidemic.

"Mr. Speaker, I think that we should let the problem pay for the solution by taxing these types of products and making sure that also the over 500 retail establishments and 1,000-plus jobs aren't lost in July. Because when this bill is enacted on July 1st, essentially all vape shops across the state will no longer exist. And all those jobs, all those in unemployment, and people are going to be struggling to find jobs, and that would be something I'd hate to see, Mr. Speaker.

"Again, my point is that we are banning these products from, not just the youth which aren't able to purchase it at retail locations, but from the adults. And I feel like the adults that are legally purchasing them will influx into the black market and we'll be spending money on trying to catch people on the black market selling it when we could do better regulation and come up with a better bill. To conclude, Mr. Speaker, I would ask that I can adopt the words of the Health Chair as my own inserted into the Journal. Thank you, Mr. Speaker," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Okimoto rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representatives Yamane and Tokioka be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Aquino rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Har rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representatives Kapela and Yamane be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative D. Kobayashi rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. I'd like to take the words of the Representative from Waianae as well. And this is really no different than what we're looking at with the regulation for alcohol, strip clubs, anything else where you have to show an ID and be 21. It is illegal to purchase any vape product without an ID if you're 21. So, we're not banning all alcohol products or any other adult only product. So, we need a little consistency on this. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1570, HD 1, SD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE YOUTH VAPING EPIDEMIC," passed Final Reading by a vote of 36 ayes to 15 noes, with Representatives Aquino, Perruso, Quinlan, Tam, Wildberger, and Yamane voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Costales, Ganaden, Gates, Har, Holt, Kapela, D. Kobayashi, Kong, Matsumoto, McDermott, McKelvey, Okimoto, Takumi, Todd, and Tokioka voting no.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2511, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Holt rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support. I considered just putting in written comments today, but I can't pass up this opportunity. I don't know if we're ever going to have another day like this, colleagues. This bill, as my counterpart in the Senate Hawaiian Caucus said, is the largest commitment to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands in its existence, \$600 million. I feel like a broken record up here, but it's an amazing day, Mr. Speaker.

"The amount of lives that will be changed by this bill, I never thought we'd be standing here today. Seventy-seven million dollars last year was a record high in infrastructure costs for DHHL, and to be having almost ten times that amount of money being directed to the department is unfathomable. It's been noted that the deputy was a little bit skeptical that we'd get here. We're here, Tyler, we made it to the last day, man. Thank you so much to the deputy, to the Finance Chair, to the CIP Chair. I didn't prepare for this one today because I was just so excited. But thank you, guys, everybody, so much. I can't wait to get this money spent. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, strong support. Like the previous speaker, I too wanted to note the historic moment quoting Governor Waihee, this is a banner year for the Hawaiian community. I know if we project how many houses they're building per year, we're probably another 10 years out, having waited 100 years to where we are today. So, Mr. Speaker, the point is, this is a great beginning, but let us continue the momentum. So, we genuinely and sincerely are going to build for the homes that Prince Kuhio in 1921 had promised and now is being fulfilled. Thank you and thank everybody who had their fingerprints or their hand, their voice, their lobbying, whatever they did, this is a good thing. Thank you."

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. Can I ask that the words of the Representative from Kalihi be entered into the Journal as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Nakamura continued, stating:

"And I'd just like to add that this past weekend our Majority Floor Leader and I had the opportunity to be a part of the DHHL lot award for 51 lots in Anahola in my district on Kauai. And it was amazing to witness so many

families who have been on the waiting list for years and years. One woman, over 40 years on the waiting list, finally got her lot award. And she came to the front, in front of the photo of Prince Kuhio, and just cried in happiness.

"Mr. Speaker, these funds, the \$600 million, gives DHHL the tools to develop infrastructure, develop the lots, and for the first time, flexibility to use the funds for mortgages and for rental assistance. So, we're thinking outside of the box and we're giving DHHL the tools and the time to implement. So *mahalo* to the Finance Chair, to the Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs Chair for their support, and to the Senate for taking our majority package priority and bringing it to this day where we can vote and support this historic measure. *Mahalo*."

Representative Branco rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, may I have the words of the Representatives from Kalihi and Kauai adopted in the Journal as if they're my own, and brief remarks. As the good gentleman from Kalihi said, this is great news and it's fantastic. And as Governor Waihee said, this is a banner year for Hawaiians. But I want to also say, this is a banner year for Hawaii. Many non-Hawaiians also benefit from living on Hawaiian homesteads. And this is a huge investment into our economy as well. And so, I just want to applaud the body for our work, for helping Hawaiians, and also just to reiterate the fact that when Native Hawaiians benefit, all of Hawaii benefits. *Mahalo*."

Representative Morikawa rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to request the words of the Representative from Kapaa to be put in the Journal as if they were my own. And I'd just like to say that it was touching to watch these 51 lots be awarded. I cried so many times. I don't know how much more tears I have for today. But I'd also like to say that this is exciting for me because it speeds up the process in my district. So, we'll be seeing more homes come up quicker than we ever anticipated. So, thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I too rise in strong support. I would like the words of the Chair of Housing and the Representative from Kalihi and Hawaii Kai entered in the record as if they were my own.

"Villages of Leiali'i, Mr. Speaker, which is in Maui, phase one was started and homes were built in 1986. There was a promise in the plan to build phases two and three and to bring much more affordable, needed housing to beneficiaries. Since 1986, I was a senior in high school, Mr. Speaker, just to let that sink in, I'm an old guy now. And because of this bill, we are now going to finally see the realization of the infrastructure and the homes that have been promised so long ago. And the affordable rentals, Mr. Speaker, I can't speak how important that's going to be to our Native Hawaiian population, many of whom are desperately seeking affordable housing in our area.

"So, this bill to me personally is important, it's important to our community. And a rising tide floats all boats, as the good representative from the windward side summed up in his own words, and I'd like them adopted as well. And thank you, Finance Chair and all the members for what you have done this year. It is truly unprecedented for everybody. *Mahalo*," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2511, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF HAWAIIAN HOME LANDS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Quinlan being excused.

H.B. No. 2512, HD 2, SD 2, CD 2:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 2512, HD 2, SD 2, CD 2 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Yamane rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, you asked our Committee on Health, Human Services, & Homelessness to address the growing problem of homelessness. Mr. Speaker, with the help of Finance Chair, we have a

bill today that will invest \$15 million into a program that has proven to work. Mr. Speaker, the Ohana Zones Program, with coordination of the counties, especially the City & County of Honolulu, where we talk with the mayor and in their organization as well as HPD to continue a program that directly impacts those in most need. So, Mr. Speaker, today you have a measure here before you that not only invests \$50 million, provides needed exemptions so a variety of programs can implement programs to help our most in need now. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2512, HD 2, SD 2, CD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OHANA ZONES," passed final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, and with Representative Quinlan being excused.

H.B. No. 1800, HD 2, SD 2, CD 2:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 1800, HD 2, SD 2, CD 2 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with support but with reservations. With reservations with support, if I can put it that way. I have a mixed feeling, and this is why I am standing up and speaking on this. Three weeks ago, I introduced my sister-in-law from South Africa. She was in the gallery and she reminded me, related to this bill, Mr. Speaker, there is green colonialism that's going on in the world.

"What is green colonialism? Never heard of it. That is the developed world is saying, you guys in the developing world, you're going to have to use solar, you're going to have to use windmills, and get off of the fossil fuels. And Africa and the rest of the countries are saying, hey, guys, you guys developed on this, you're polluting our planet, don't leave us out of the economic development equation.

"Mr. Speaker, you know I was a Peace Corps volunteer in the middle of Borneo, I was a country director in East Timor, I was a United Nations worker in Africa. One third of the population of the world goes to sleep sick, hungry, or injured, Mr. Speaker. Green colonialism is real. So, if this is a great bill, but let's not forget the rest of the world, just like we don't forget those who are poor and disabled in the State of Hawaii, let's not forget the rest of the world. There are seven-point-something billion people in the planet. We've got to make sure green colonialism doesn't spread the way the other colonial, well, you know what happened in the colonial wars. And we're still fighting some of that stuff in Ukraine with the Russians.

"Having said that, Mr. Speaker, with reservations, but with the idea that those who are in, and I applaud there's many champions here on the floor, Mr. Speaker, who love the green revolution. But let there be a mindful in the back of their head that green colonialism is living. And if anyone wants to be in touch with the third world, just let them see some of the statistics on the health, the hunger, and the injuries that they go to bed with every night. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. This bill is about us taking responsibility for our emissions and our actions. The U.S. is the highest per capita emitter of greenhouse gas emissions, and I would agree with the Representative from Hawaii Kai that when we talk about climate change, it's important to remember that developing nations are deserving of the same opportunities that developed nations had when they were developing.

"The reality is that to tackle climate change, it's going to take action from developed nations, primarily not only to take responsibility for our own emissions, but to help developing nations and to help finance climate action in other countries. So, I think everybody is on the same page on that.

"This bill is about us taking responsibility for our own emissions here in Hawaii. And primarily what this does is fund a study to look at what are our pathways forward to decarbonization economy-wide, including looking at considerations of environmental justice, frontline communities and low-income communities, so that nobody gets left behind. So, again, in support. Thanks."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1800, HD 2, SD 2, CD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CLIMATE MITIGATION," passed final Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 3 noes, with Representative Ward voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Kong, McDermott, and Okimoto voting no, and with Representative Quinlan being excused.

H.B. No. 2424, HD 1, SD 2, CD 2:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 2424, HD 1, SD 2, CD 2 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Yamane rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Standing in strong support. Mr. Speaker, whenever a child, a *keiki* of Hawaii is injured, harmed, or killed, it impacts our community. Last year an incident happened which called upon the community and many of our members to ask why? What do we do? So, your Committee on Health, Human Services, & Homelessness, as well as your Committee on Finance and the Finance Chair, took on this task, Mr. Speaker. We wanted to make sure that no *keiki* again is put at risk.

"So, what you have today is a bill that puts \$8 million into resources. Resources that will include increasing information technology, increasing compensation for services to help fill and retain vacancies, help the permanency support programs. Mr. Speaker, we're going to ask the department to come back to us next year to tell us what specifically needs to be done within the department.

"And, Mr. Speaker, on behalf of all the children, both in foster care and adoptions, we don't want them to be left behind. So, we have language in here, Mr. Speaker, that every child that is in placement that needs to be monitored will be monitored and protected. So, Mr. Speaker, I'm glad to be here today to provide you a bill that not only puts the resources where it needs to be but reinforces the fact that our *keiki* are important and will not be left behind. Thank you."

Representative Luke rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. We have been grappling with the Child Welfare Services, Child Protective Services, for years. And year after year we have been asking the Department of Human Services, what other actions or alternatives or different type of approaches do we need to protect the children who are under the jurisdiction and protection of the State? I think, even as you saw the process of where this discussion happened this year, you saw the challenges and how the Legislature grappled with this issue.

"So initially, when the House draft of the budget came out, we appropriated significant amount of additional positions to fund more either caseworkers or social workers within the Child Welfare Services. And Department of Human Services came back and said, well, we don't need those positions. And it was baffling to us because we thought, if you have more caseworkers, isn't it just common sense that you will go out and monitor situations and find the best way to protect our *keiki*? So, we were puzzled.

"And through the session, we looked at different alternatives, whether it's pay differentials or a different type of monitoring. And when the Senate bill came out, it wasn't until a few weeks, maybe even a couple weeks ago, that several providers came out and spoke up and had confidential meetings with a few of us and even Senator San Buenaventura. And then we realized what we were doing was not completely accurate.

"Department of Human Services did not need new positions only because some of the services that were being provided were being contracted out to nonprofits like Hale Kipa and Catholic Charities and others that went out and monitor. Over the years because the amount that was given to these nonprofit organization or service providers have not increased, and in fact, they have in one situation canceled because Department of Human Services lacked the funds to fund those organization, that has led to some of the disconnect between us protecting kids under the ward of the State or within the jurisdiction of adoptive families or even foster care. That was a huge revelation.

"And I would like to thank actually Kevin Dayton, which is very unusual, because Kevin Dayton, who's probably not here, he should be here but the one time we're actually thanking the media he's not here because he thinks something more interesting in the Senate is happening, clearly. But Kevin Dayton over the years has continued to stress, what is this state going to do to protect kids, kids under the protection of our state? And what will the department and the Legislature do to make sure that no additional, no other kid is under either some harm or under some kind of injury because of the situation that they're in.

"And I think it's because of the continued advocacy of the media, Civil Beat, and others in the district and the community, the providers had the courage to step forward. Before, they didn't have the courage to step forward. And because of that action, they realized there were legislators and there was this body, including the Health and Human Services Chair, including Representative from Waimanalo, including many in the leeward areas, including members of the Senate who were willing to listen, who were willing to figure out what the problems were, and take those suggestions and the commitment to continue those discussions that gave them the strength to confront come forward, and that's why we have this bill today.

"And I'm so encouraged because in the beginning of session, I think the Representative from Waimanalo and I had a discussion about, okay, let's just keep this going, because something will pop up, some idea will come out. And we struggle because we kept saying this is not the right method, we know, but we have to continue."

Representative Ward rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Luke continued, stating:

"Thank you, Representative from Hawaii Kai. And I think because we continued to keep that discussion going and because we went out and listened to some of the foster parents, listened to grandparents, listened to the community, that we have this bill today. And that's what we are here to do. And I'm just so very proud of this moment. Thank you."

Representative Marten rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support, strong support. I just want to say how appreciative I am. I tried to author a bill that really sought collaboration, before session, from DHS, from DOH, from DOE, from foster parents, from nonprofits that work with them. And at that time, I wasn't able to get any help from DHS in finding something that they wanted that could help improve the situation. And they opposed this bill, and it made it very challenging.

"And I really am so grateful that the Chair of Health and Human Services took this on, and the Chair of Finance was committed to it in one form or another, whether it was a bill or the budget. And because of their efforts, along with their Senate counterparts, despite reluctance from the affected agency, they were able to come up with something that I think will really make a difference, that is so important to my community. Waimanalo has a long history of being foster parents and adoptive parents of foster kids. And in talking to people that have been around a long time, it has changed. Things used to be better than they are now. There used to be more services, resources, there used to be more supervision, is what they tell me.

"So, I'm very hopeful that with this bill we will bring it back at least to where we were before and hopefully make it better. And I appreciate the commitment of this body to make that happen and the generosity of funding it. *Mahalo.*"

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2424, HD 1, SD 2, CD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD WELFARE SERVICES," passed final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, and with Representative Quinlan being excused.

Representative Belatti moved that S.B. No. 3048, SD 2, HD 1, CD 2 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. This bill provides \$300 million to the Rental Housing Revolving Fund that's administered by the Hawaii Housing Finance & Development Corporation. For the first time, \$150 million of the \$300 million can be used for families making between 60% to 100% of the area median income. So, this is for our working families.

"Up until now, this group has not had the resources, we have not provided funding subsidies to nonprofit and for-profit developers to target this income group. And this is the group that leaves Hawaii every year because there's no housing available. So, I'm thrilled to be able to support this bill today. We will, between this bill and the DHHL waitlist bill of \$600 million, will have close to \$1 billion this year to address affordable housing concerns. And this will translate into 5,000 to 6,000 additional housing units for all families in Hawaii. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to stand in strong support. May I have the words of the Chair of Housing entered into the record as if they were my own. And I believe that 60% to 100% figure is quite profound, Mr. Speaker. This is the group upon which the hammer stroke has fallen the hardest. This is the group that is in most dire need of affordable rental housing assistance. This is the group that is desperate for the help of the State of Hawaii and the Legislature. And for that and for the people of my district in Maui, I'm truly grateful for the work that she and the Vice Chair have done, as well as the Finance Chair. Because this group is the one that has been left behind and has had to leave our shores because of it. So, thank you again to both of them and to the members of the body," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 3048, SD 2, HD 1, CD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE FUNDS," passed final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

At 11:09 a.m., the Chair noted that the following bill passed Final Reading:

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I hope to not speak out of turn or take the thunder away from the awesome work of the Finance Chair. I'm in strong support, Mr. Speaker. I was told that a budget is a reflection of values. Last year, we saw that during the height of the pandemic, this body reined in revolving funds, had the confidence to tax visitors at an appropriate rate, and allowed the counties to do the same. We saw over the last year that the market absolutely absorbed this nominal increase for visitors. There was no racket or uproar regarding a tax debate. People came and they will continue to visit. I hope that this body ensures that these rates stay in place and that we continue to work with the Senate and the Governor so that we can continue to tax at an appropriate rate and fund our communities as they are required. Thank you."

Representative B. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. Some people will say that we are on a spending spree. We have \$1 billion for Hawaiian programs, we have \$1 billion in duplicated funds, to be sure, for housing. But we are also on a saving spree with \$1 billion in savings, when you add the \$500 million in this bill that will go to the rainy day fund. I believe we will have, with the \$500 million, \$997 million combined in rainy day fund and hurricane fund. So, we are doing both spending and savings.

"Kudos to the Finance Chair for also looking at out to \$300 million for the pension fund. Two days ago, we also put \$300 million in the health insurance fund. So, I think that we can say that we have both taken care of immediate needs, but we are also looking toward the future and putting in a very large and healthy cushion for the next Finance Chair. Thank you."

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Representative Eli: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Today is National Day of Awareness for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women. And I have had the privilege of working with the women in this body to address issues such as this. But I did want to take the time to share a story about a missing woman from my district.

"Melissa Estoy was 25 years old when she was last seen at Nanakuli Beach Park in an area known to those that reside there as Zablun Beach. It was the afternoon of January 16th, 2018. Surveillance footage from the area showed Melissa walking into the ocean but did not show her return to her car. The vehicle, a 1991 gold Honda Accord, was found two days later at the beach with her belongings inside, keys in the ignition and windows rolled down. A search in the ocean turned up no sign of Melissa and she remains missing. Many investigations were done into tips that were given since she went missing and none has led to her recovery.

"And so, I just wanted to take a moment to remind us of all the indigenous women across this country that go missing every day and remain missing. So, *mahalo*."

Representative Kapela: "Melissa's story is not unique. As the Representative from Nanakuli stated, there are thousands of missing and murdered indigenous women across our state and our nation who have been silenced. So, the missing and murdered indigenous women's movement is a movement that advocates for the end of violence against native women. It also seeks to draw attention to the high rates of disappearances and murders of native peoples and the silence of these women and girls.

"So, while we have so much to celebrate today as a body, it shows that we still have work to do. And because of that, I'd like to ask for a moment of silence at the appropriate time to honor the native women and to remember the native women and our sisters who have been murdered and our sisters who we are still searching for, including Nanakuli resident, Melissa."

At this time, the members of the House of Representatives stood for a moment of silence to honor and remember native women who have been murdered or are missing.

Representative Morikawa: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In the Star-Bulletin's newspaper on Sunday, December 31st, 2006, a letter from our current Speaker and Finance Chair was printed. I have framed it and kept it in my office as a reminder of their intent to reform the State House. I want to share some highlights of this letter.

"One key indicator of how the Legislature will conduct business is the way it selects its leaders and committee chairpeople. The Senate has gone in the right direction with its focus on openness. Unfortunately, the same cannot be said of the House of Representatives.

"We must recognize that we were elected to serve the general public, and that it is not too late to bring about reform. By working with the Senate leadership, the House can implement a progressive agenda that will improve the Legislature and residents' quality of life. Here are a few things that we can do.

"Increase ethical standards. The House needs to prevent self-dealing, which results in bad legislation and policy decisions. We must set higher standards and learn to enforce them -- even against our colleagues.

"Approve immediate tax relief for working people. Programs such as the earned income tax credit can provide more than \$20 million annual tax relief for thousands of working families in Hawaii. The federal government and 20 other states already have adopted the EITC. Hawaii should provide this and other tax relief to our residents.

"Pass an aggressive renewable energy agenda. In recent years, the House has watered down bold proposals to reduce our reliance on oil. We can no longer afford to do this. We must set a comprehensive plan to reduce our dependence on foreign oil and its effect on other facets of our economy. We cannot continue to prolong action if we are to become more self-sufficient.

"It is time to put aside the old way of doing things. We believe that our generation and those that follow deserve a sharp and aggressive Legislature that will work for the public interest. We hope the House is up to the task."

"Mr. Speaker, you and the Chair of Finance have finally accomplished your dream of over 15 years ago. Congratulations, and thank you for your love of Hawaii. Thank you."

Representative Ward: "Mr. Speaker, I understand this is the time that we have the last chance to publicly thank those who are leaving and it would be appropriate to say a few things? Thank you. And I was reminded by the

gentleman who wears an ascot and is one of the best dressed people, if I'm not brief, I'm going to have a difficult time this afternoon.

"First to thank all of you 11 who are leaving, may the winds be behind you. And I would be amiss if I didn't say that this side of the aisle is going to lose 50% of its numbers. That's a big percentage. But I want to point out first, my little brother from Ewa Beach, Representative McDermott, by name, it's been a pleasure serving with you. As a Marine, I know you're up for the battle that you have for the U.S. Senate, and may the Lord lead you accordingly.

"And to my colleague from Mililani who we hope to call Councilmember Okimoto, the best to you and to all of the things that you've done with Representative Matsumoto and myself, we greatly appreciate. May the winds be behind you and may those seats that you fill now be filled by the equally qualified, passionate, committed. And for everybody, remember, it's not about you, it's about the people of Hawaii, that's why we're here. So, congratulations to all of you that following winds be behind you."

Representative Mizuno: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Could I have the words from my good friend from Hawaii Kai placed into the journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

"I'm going to ask for your kind indulgence. The majority members, I support them in their reelection or their bid for a new venue. Representative Luke, I got your back. It's a given, I support our majority members.

"Going to say something in the spirit of bipartisanship that I didn't get to say a couple of years back when a good friend from the GOP retired. I miss my old friend Representative Thielen, and I regret not saying anything because right after that they did their announcements, we presented certificate and lei, and then we're done. So, I'm not going to lose this opportunity.

"I want to thank the good representative, Minority Leader Okimoto. A couple of months ago we did a Civil Beat, Civil Cafe. And they're going over the salient points of the bills for this session. Interestingly enough, I think Val and I agreed on everything. In fact, we almost agreed on everything she brought up during that Civil Beat Cafe, that I think gambling is one of the issues we disagree. And I just wanted to thank the members but thank Minority Leader who is so humble, goes door to door, really shows that her constituents are her employer, displays that she's a public servant, places everybody in the state above her. And because of Minority Leader, our communities are better, our state is a better place, and I think I've learned a lot from her. So, God bless you.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. And for all the members who are departing, like my good friend from Hawaii Kai said, God bless all of you. We love you. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative LoPresti: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just want to give my fond *aloha* to all the members who are departing. But I especially wanted to thank my colleague from Ewa Beach. He and I, though radically different in the political world, we share the same faith and we share the same commitment to the values and principles that guide us. And that's why I have such a deep respect for him. Because though I disagree with pretty much everything politically that he stands for, as he does me, I know it comes from a place of genuine intent where he's trying to make the world a better place as he sees it and I'm trying to make the world a better place as I see it. And that's what brings most of us here to this place. And I just want to honor him and his family for their service and sacrifice to my community, to our community of Ewa Beach. And it was an honor serving with you, Bob, for three terms, and I wish you the best. *Aloha*."

Representative Ganaden: "I'd like to thank the Chair of Corrections, Military, & Veterans Affairs for his guidance for me, a freshperson, over the last two years. I think we were both nervous meeting each other at the beginning of last session and he showed me absolute professionalism, a way to act in this building, and a way to react to the public that I'm going to carry forward through the rest of my career with all of you. I think it's unfortunate that we don't get to work together in the coming years, and I was really looking forward to it. So, just a big thank you."

Representative Perruso: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just want to say that I'm a mess because I think we have so much to be proud of this session. The

least of which, in my view, is the funding. I think that this body together has really made a shift. And at the same time, I'm just very sad to see some of these colleagues, all of the colleagues who are leaving. And thank you for your contribution to our work."

Representative Ilagan: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I have an event announcement. In honor of each of our staff in each of our offices and the support House staff, the freshman class, there's 10 of us. Please stand up freshmen, please stand up, because you have put time and effort for this. The freshman class prepared shave ice, halo-halo, and cotton candy to say thank you. And this *mahalo* House staff event is from actually all the members and sponsored by you, looking at you, Mr. Speaker. On behalf of all the House members, please come to Room 329 at 2 p.m. to grab shave ice and halo-halo and cotton candy. We want to say thank you very much to all of our House staff of your hard work for making us successful."

Representative B. Kobayashi: "Mr. Speaker, may I say a few words about departing members? I think all of the departing members will be missed. Everyone makes a contribution. And who knows who will replace you? Will it be someone of equal stature and ability? I hope that you all have a productive and long career, even as you leave this body."

"I'd like to say some particular words about what I believe is our biggest loss, and that is our Finance Chair. She has been Finance chair for 10 years through the best and worst times. She is the best Finance chair or best money committee chair that I have served with. She has cognitive complexity to see the various parts, sometimes contradictory. She understands that sometimes the sum of the parts equals the whole, but at other times the whole is greater than the sum of the parts. Especially when we come to her with our picayune little line items for this and that. And she smiles graciously and says, we'll see what we can do. Of course, sometimes nothing is done. But nonetheless, the good humor and graciousness of at least accepting that we have valid concerns is much appreciated."

"During most of our tenures here, the budget was underwater. That is, the annual revenues were less than expenditures, and we survived on the basis of the large carryover balances. And then came COVID, the biggest economic downturn in our history with virtually zero tourists. And we luckily got bailed out in large part by federal government, Congress."

"And then this year, if there is any poetic justice, we have the largest budget surplus in history. And we have, I believe, spent it well for many good purposes as well as, as I said earlier, put into savings the largest amount that we have ever had in history. So, kudos aplenty to our departing Finance Chair. Thank you."

Representative Tokioka: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. On behalf of our class, and there's only five of us left, Rep. McKelvey, who is one of our class members, is leaving us. And I know all of us working with him throughout the years, our classmates have enjoyed his humor and his wackiness at many times. So, to the Rep. from Lahaina, we're going to miss you. *Aloha*."

At this time, the Chair stated:

"So members, as you know, we have nine members who will be leaving the House and we wanted to give them an opportunity to make some farewell remarks."

At this time, the Chair recognized Representative Luella Costales, who was appointed in 2022 by Governor Ige, and who was presented with a certificate and lei by Representative Mizuno on behalf of the Members of the House.

Representative Costales: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Since I've only been here technically for half a session, I'll try to take only half of the allotted time. But I guess to start, just a few days ago when we were doing the final roll call, I just sort of sat in amazement and thought, how did I get here? And it really had me reflecting. I thought of my father, who today would be 117 years old. He was born in 1905 and came from the Philippines in 1923. And I think his wish for me was just to go to college, that was it. As I think a lot in our community, that's our wish for our own children, including my own."

"So, to sit here, it just really amazed me. So, I started reflecting on my journey. And unfortunately when the seat in District 39 opened up and someone had asked me my thoughts about filling the seat, I thought,

absolutely not, this is really for the younger people, this is their time, I've done my work. But at the same time, I did have to honor the request, the fact that they came to me and asked, would I consider it?"

"So, I think all of those who saw in me that it was a possibility, I think, coming from South Central Los Angeles and a small, tiny Catholic school on Martin Luther King Boulevard, where I think most of us were probably felt unseen, to come here and represent an entire district, it just really blows me away."

"For my friends who have supported me all the way, and many of them have been watching religiously through YouTube, and they're in other states, namely Vancouver, Washington, and Los Angeles. And it's really led to discussions on the invocation. Who is giving the invocation, what are they about, what's their story? What are some of the Hawaiian issues we weren't aware of? So, it was good to know that others were really watching the work that all of you are doing and really honoring your thoughts and just helping to expand that knowledge. So, I thank all of you for really providing that."

"We would always joke that it's like they were here with us every day and they really wanted their names inserted into the daily Journal. So, I just want to really recognize Susan Malveau in Vancouver, Washington, and Ingrid Richardson Leon, both of whom I've known since second grade and we've been friends, and they've put the care of their sons as my godsons, and for me vice versa."

"When thinking about this seat, again I had to look at the reasons for doing so and what is my role in this? And I would like to acknowledge up in the gallery, one of my staunchest supporters and brightest mentor is Amy Agbayani. I share her as a mentor with so many people in our community. She has paved the way for us and somehow she has room for all of us to believe in the best of us and to believe in the possibilities of all we can do, and to say, hey, I'll help you through it, you're not going to be there alone. And Amy and her team of women and men and students and seniors have all been there for so many of us. So, I do want to just recognize the value she is in our community. And for me, I'd say after leaving this body today and after the end of session, that's what I want to be when I grow up. It's what I've always been saying. And so, I hope to move into that realm of supporting so many others who want to fill the seats that we have here and that will be vacant."

"Also want to mention Molly Mamaril, who's sitting next to Amy. She is my colleague over at the Oahu Economic Development Board, and very young, very bright, very smart, and one of the biggest reasons that I'm here with all of you today. I see a lot of my young self in Molly in getting involved in a lot of issues in the community, the environment, Black Lives Matter, seeing her put her time and commitment into it. But also seeing that they didn't have a lot of friends, they didn't have that relationship that would connect. And thought that maybe by taking this role, I could help bridge that and encourage them and also support them in saying I did it, I know what it takes, and I know you can do it too, and I'll be there to support you. So, Molly, thank you so much for the inspiration that you provide."

"I want to thank the Governor for appointing me. And for you, Mr. Speaker, for your hard work in ensuring that I came on board. Quickly things were taken care of, everyone gave me so much attention to make sure that I would be well prepared. From the Chief Clerk, Sergeant-at-Arms, the Chief Attorney, the wonderful IT department and people that are in it. All of this was possible only because of all of you, so I thank you."

"And finally, I just want to say thank you to the chairs for the committees that I served on. Chair Woodson, you were amazing, you were great, you were a mentor. You had the time when things didn't make sense to me, you made the offer to help, and I took it with full heart. And you spent a lot of time just getting me up to speed. So, I appreciate that and all the good that you do. Chair Takayama, Chair Ichiyama, and of course, Chair McKelvey, who I've known probably the longest for a while."

"It was a historic session. So, to be part of the menstrual equity bill, the Filipino issues, and seeing a GIA being supportive in my district for child and family services shelter, in which my own family members have had to take advantage of, and to see that we can help support that, I'm very grateful."

"I had the most incredible staff. Shanell Cullen, Mai Cullen, Mason Sadiarin, thank you so much. They're exceptional. They are probably the

brightest, the most caring and committed staff. I know they've been through a lot and they've been an example in resiliency, just being able to pick up and move on. And they were a big comfort when my boss and good friend, Pono Shim, passed away during session and ensured that everything could be carried on. I leaned on them so much and they really helped to lift. And I thank all of you for signing the certificate, I think we had about 48 members who signed the certificate for Pono on both sides. So, that really means so much to our community and all of those who love him.

"And finally, I would like to add one more volunteer, Trevor Nagamine. Trevor, many of you may know he's worked in the House, in offices in the Senate for many years, was a student of Miss Perruso's. It's been really hard to Rep. Perruso, because I've known her for so many years as an educator of my own children as Miss Perruso. But Trevor, knowing him since I think middle school to come in and offer help, I really appreciate that. So many of you have been supportive, I won't go through all the names, I will thank you in person and give you hugs to thank you and to show my gratitude.

"And lastly, my family, my three kids, William Nakao, Lia Nakao, David Nakao, as they continue their work in the nonprofit and education, and social work, and also in the supporting immigrant legal services. I thought I could rest and relax, they've got it, but it looks like not. So, I'm going to be joining Amy to really help our youngsters and students kind of continue the work that we're doing here today.

"And finally, my mother, who is at home watching, she's 91 years old. And many of you know that she's been in hospice care, which is why she isn't with us today. But she's my rock, she's our everything, she's our matriarch. And we're just valuing the time that we do have with her. I don't wear the color red usually ever, but I have been wearing it more this session just to honor her and so that when she watches TV she can see that and know that she's always with me.

"In wrapping everything up, I do want to share the words that I've shared at the invocation earlier, which is the words of Auntie Pilahi Paki and her prophecy that I learned and Pono Shim has shared with so many. And I'll summarize but, in the 21st century, the world will look for peace and they'll look to Hawaii because Hawaii is the key and the key is *aloha*. And I just want to thank all of you here for your *aloha*, for helping me carve another notch in my key that has not only unlocked a lot of good things and *aloha* for me in moving forward, but has also helped to lock things. A lot of negativity and misconception that a lot of people share that we have about the work and the people that are done here. So, I'm so grateful and *mahalo*."

At this time, the Chair recognized Representative Patrick Pihana Branco, Class of 2020, who served as vice chair of the Committee on Water & Land, who is our young statesman of the House, and who was presented with a certificate and lei by Representative Tarnas on behalf of the Members of the House.

Representative Branco: "In my previous life, I moved around quite a lot and I had to say a lot of goodbyes. This will be the hardest. First off, I want to thank my community. Kailua and Kaneohe Bay were such a strong force. People joke about us sometimes that we talk too much, but we're such a powerful force and I'm so grateful for our community.

"To my family and friends, thank you, you've always been there to support me. And I told you folks from when I was going to move away from home to go to war zones, you were always there. I also want to thank my staff, Nikki Oka, Chiemi Bryant, Sheila Ringor, Alan Muneoka, and especially Charlotte Farmer, who's always a constant and a friend.

"I'd also like to thank my buddies. Rep. Sayama, you have the best smile, so always smile. Representative Ilagan, you can make any tense session happy, make people laugh, it's a special gift you have. And also to Representative Troy Hashimoto, you have such a big heart, and thank you for always loving. Speaker, thank you so much. Every time I come to meet with you, I feel like your eyes are piercing my soul and I don't know what you're thinking, but thank you for always listening. Chair Luke, everyone told me to be careful with you. And every time I came to see you, I just wanted to hug you and just say thank you. You're so caring and you're so loving and you do that to everyone. And you care and you love our state. Thank you.

"Kyle, thank you for being such a strong mentor to me and being a good friend. Aaron, it's going to be the hardest to say goodbye to you. Remember the first time we spoke, we spoke for three hours. And you've always been a constant friend. And Chair Tarnas, when Speaker asked me what I wanted out of a chair, I had told him I would like to be under a chair that I can learn and grow, and a chair that's super smart. And Speaker hit it on the head, I couldn't have asked for a better chair, thank you. So, I made it through the thank yous, that was the hardest part.

"Just some reflections of being here, right? What compels us to be here? Stay late, go through these endless calls. Those from the neighbor islands, to take some time away from their family. What compels us to do this? And it's *aloha 'āina*, it's a love of our land, that's why we're here. This is the work that we're doing. And it just shows how special Hawaii is. Whether your family is new here or your family is here for generations, you love this place, we all love this place. And this is what makes Hawaii special. I have been to many places in the world, but no place has the feeling of home like Hawaii. And so even though I'm departing, I know that this state is going to be in good hands because of your commitment to our people and to our beautiful state. *Mahalo*."

At this time, the Chair recognized Representative Val Okimoto, Class of 2018, who served as the minority leader, a tough job that she has handled with grace and dignity, and who was presented with a certificate and lei by Representative Ward on behalf of the Members of the House.

Representative Okimoto: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I will do my best, I have to write things down otherwise I get pretty *wala'au*. I just ask for forgiveness if I go over the allotted time limit. First of all, I want to thank you, Mr. Speaker, and your leadership team for being gracious and respectful to me as the minority leader. Thank you to the House Sergeant-at-Arms. Rod, you and Tamah and your staff have been incredible to my staff and myself over the last four years and have truly been a blessing. Thank you for always forgiving me when I made a freshman mistake and doing all that you do to keep this body safe.

"To Brian, Rupert, and the Chief Clerk's Office staff, thank you very much for taking care of all the members and making sure that we properly fulfill our duties as legislators. Especially thank you for making sure that we were in our seats for roll call every day. *Mahalo* to the Printshop that supports all of us. And thank you, Tammy, for dealing with my office and our many printing *faux pas*. I want to thank also all the supporting staff in this Capitol, from the accounting to IT to even our dear office custodian, Ligaya. We would be nothing here without you.

"To the House Minority Research Office, thank you for providing the services you did to the Minority Caucus. And to the majority caucus staff, thank you very much for the service to this body and to the people of Hawaii that you provide. I would like to extend a special thank you to my minority caucus members, Representatives Gene Ward, Bob McDermott, and Lauren Matsumoto. Rep. McDermott often told me that our caucus was like having a dysfunctional family and that leading them was like herding cats. Well, Bob, I will say that you definitely spoke the truth. But despite our differences, I can confidently say that you each have shown me the example of what serving our constituents should be. Thank you for the opportunity to be your minority leader this past year. I wish you all the best in your future endeavors.

"Thank you to my chairs, my beloved Chairs Onishi, Woodson, Quinlan, Takayama, and Kobayashi for allowing me to have a voice in committee, for seeking out my input and accepting it, for answering my questions, and most especially, for allowing me to vote my conscience without consequence. Thank you to my beloved people of District 36. It has truly been an honor to serve and represent you over the last four years. Thank you for allowing me into your homes and hearts.

"I would be remiss to not be thankful especially to my office *'ohana*, some who are here today and those who are here in spirit. Thank you to Jame, my first OM, for teaching me exactly what a legislator should do and be. For walking me around the building my first year just to make sure I was in the right place at the right time. And for teaching me and your protege, Eric, all you know about legislation and policy. I will say that Eric has been a much better student than I was, but this building has truly lost a master of policy when it lost Jame Schaedel.

"Thank you to Eric for being there with me through the thick and thin. Thank you for letting me text you at all times of the day and night because I had a question or forgot something, and for keeping my calendar straight, because everyone in my office knows that if it's not on the calendar, I don't know it exists. You are more than an office manager to me, you are a brother. Thank you to Kao for jumping in as my chief of staff during an unprecedented session last year. Your positive energy has been a great addition to my office.

"Almost last but not least, I want to thank my family and friends, some of who are here today. Thank you to my mom and dad, Dennis and Anita Aquino, who sacrificed so much for me so that I would have every opportunity possible. That any opportunity I strive for in my life, I always credit my local roots and being grounded in my life to my upbringing on Kauai, my beautiful home island. And I know it is because of the hardworking, honest, and faithful example of you both, mom and dad, that I'm here today.

"Thank you to my Mililani *'ohana* who loves and supports me and my girls. I want to thank Jessie for believing in me and supporting me, no matter what goal I may be chasing, and for having faith in me and our savior. And most especially, thank you to my two beautiful daughters, Rebekah and Emma, they were very unhappy that I pulled them out of school today, but I kind of told them I'm going to pull a mommy card and be selfish today, they're here with me. You have been so patient so much over the last four years. While I know neither of you asked for this life in politics, I hope one day you both know you are the true inspiration and motivation behind everything I do, for all I do is to help you and the future of our *keiki*. I love you both so very much. No title is greater to me than that of being your mom.

"And these final, final thanks go to my fellow colleagues, many of you who I love so dearly, of the House. The ones who are here today, the ones who came before us, and the ones who will follow us. *Mahalo* to all of you for your unwavering service to the public on behalf of your constituency that you honorably represent. Public service is a noble, humble, and worthy duty for all of us here who strive to serve the great people of Hawaii. I am grateful for the opportunity I've been blessed with to have served with you the past four years. *Mahalo nui*. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At this time, the Chair recognized Representative Tina Wildberger, Class of 2018, who served as vice chair of the Committee on Government Reform and the Committee on Energy and Environmental Protection, who has never been hesitant to say exactly what she thinks about something, and who was presented with a certificate and lei by Representative Hashimoto on behalf of the Members of the House.

Representative Wildberger: "In keeping with my assigned attributes, I would like to extend obsequious adulation to everyone who provided me with any kind of support, benefit, advice, camaraderie, sorority or fraternity, thank you all. I'm going to use my time, and I did time it, to share some thoughts about an existential issue that's happening right now on the federal level that I think is very important to have some words spoken about here on this floor. And since it hasn't happened yet, I'm going to use my time for this subject today.

"With the serious consequences facing 100 million women across our nation and the reality that *Roe v. Wade* is about to be overturned, I'd like to share some pro-life considerations.

"Pro-life means supporting Becky, who found out in her 20-week scan that the baby she was so excited to bring into this world developed without life sustaining organs. Pro-life means supporting Susan, who was sexually assaulted on her way home from work, only to learn a month later that her assailant planted seed.

"Pro-life means supporting Teresa, who hemorrhaged due to placental abruption, leaving her family to make the impossible choice to save her or her in utero baby. Pro-life means supporting Cathy, who had her innocence ripped away by someone she should have been able to trust, and her 11-year-old body isn't mature enough to bear the consequence of that betrayal.

"Pro-life means supporting Melissa, who's working two jobs to make ends meet and has to choose between bringing another child into poverty or feeding the children she already has because their father walked out on them.

Pro-life means supporting Brittany, who realizes that she is in no way financially, emotionally, or physically able to raise a child. Pro-life means supporting Emily, who went through IVF, ended up with six viable implanted eggs, requiring selective reduction to ensure her safety and the safe number of fetuses.

"Pro-life means supporting Jessica, who's finally mustering the strength to get away from her physically abusive spouse, only to find out that she's pregnant by that monster. Pro-life means supporting Vanessa, who went to her confirmation appointment after years of trying to conceive, only to hear silence where there should have been a heartbeat. Pro-life means supporting Lindsay, who lost her virginity in her sophomore year with a broken condom and now has to choose whether to be a teenager mom or just a teenager.

"Pro-life means supporting Courtney, who found out she's already 13 weeks along, but the egg never made it out of her fallopian tube so either she terminates the pregnancy or risks dying from internal bleeding. Pro-life means supporting George who is hate-raped after someone found out he was assigned female at birth and can't come out to his family, can't come out to his community, or his work. Pro-life means supporting Nicky, who presents as a man and has a uterus and is intersex. He can't afford to raise a child, he can't afford time away from work to deliver an infant, recover, return to work to find he's lost his position.

"You can argue and say that these issues are pro-choice, but the truth is they are pro-life. Their lives, women's lives, humans who have uteruses, those who identify as women and those who do not. Everyone loves someone who has had to face this choice. And I hope next year's legislature will take the decisive action to more firmly codify protections for abortion in our statutes and constitution and provide funding for neighbor island women to access that right. Because the right to privacy and body autonomy is only useful if you don't have to buy a plane ticket and fly somewhere else to get it. Maui County might as well be Mississippi.

"Colleagues, it's been my distinct honor and privilege to serve the people and the *'aina* of South Maui for the last four years, and I thank you all very much. *Aloha*."

At this time, the Chair recognized Representative Takashi Ohno, Class of 2012, who served as chair of the Committee on Corrections, Military, & Veterans and the Committee on Intrastate Commerce, who was elected in the year of same sex marriage and never flinched on that issue as a freshman, and who was presented with a certificate and lei by Representatives Belatti and Morikawa on behalf of the Members of the House.

Representative Ohno: "In support, Mr. Speaker, with reservations. Mr. Speaker, serving in the Hawaii State Legislature was a dream job of mine. And just like many people here, we all have so many folks to be grateful for, so I have many people to recognize. First, the good people of District 27 who took a chance on me 10 years ago and sent me here. I'm still baffled that they made that choice, but I hope I've done well by them.

"To the House staff who make us look good, give us a place to do our work, and make sure our work stands up in the court of law. Brian Takeshita, the Chief Clerk, with Rupert Juarez, previously C.J. Leong. Sergeant-at-Arms, Rod Tanonaka, previously Kevin Kuroda. Casey Hines at HMSO, Lisa and Joan were before him. Thank you to all those folks.

"Thank you to all the advocates and community and public that come and testify before us. We found out during the pandemic, this job is not the same without them. We miss them, and the Capitol community is something that's special and something that really touched me.

"Thank you to my colleagues, all of you folks here and all the folks who I've served with over the past 10 years. There is no group that I'll ever meet that's more kind, smart, and cunning. It's because of all these folks that I have a seat at the table, a mic in hand, and a vote to cast. I'm grateful for them.

"I have a special thank you to my office manager, Jenna Takenouchi. She's been with me for 10 years and she's been a wonderful, wonderful partner. What I admire about her is that she makes big things seem small. And in all my years in office, I can confidently say, bringing her onto my team was the best choice I've made.

"Now, Mr. Speaker, I have many shortcomings as an elected leader, but I'm thankful for the many folks in this caucus and in this room who have served as role models for me. Thank you to those members in this body who show so much humility when there's so much reason not to be humble. Many of these folks put their head down, they solve real state problems, and they consistently be the bigger person, even when they have so much reason to feel slighted. Many of them are anonymous outside their districts. And I gather probably the people in their district don't quite know the contributions these members make to the state. My only reasoning for why they keep being the bigger person, biting their tongue, and solving problems is just their simple love of Hawaii. Thank you to those members in our body who take on the weight of the world on their shoulders.

"This work is not only intellectually demanding, it's really emotionally draining. And there are folks in this body who take on enormous tasks and do so almost effortlessly. However, I do know that those members agonize over their decisions. There are tears behind closed doors. And some of these folks who have to make these hard decisions lose friendships because of that work. I admire them and I hope to one day be able to carry the weight of the world on my shoulders like they do, and still give five minutes to your friend and do so with a smile.

"Mr. Speaker, this, serving in the Hawaii State Legislature, has been a dream job of mine. There will never be a better job that I have anywhere in my career. But this dream job, it's still a job. And jobs change. I have a hypothesis that some of the skills that we've all gained here, listening to people, identifying their problem, pursuing a solution, my hypothesis is that it also could benefit us all outside of this building. I don't know if that's the case, but I encourage you all, stay tuned and please stay in touch with me. It's been the honor of a lifetime to serve with you all. *Mahalo*."

At this time, the Chair recognized Representative Aaron Ling Johanson, Class of 2010, who served as the chair of the Committee on Labor & Public Employment and the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, who is the best speech writer in the House and is a mentor for so many, and who was presented with a certificate and lei by Representative Belatti on behalf of the Members of the House.

Representative Johanson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As I rise to speak for the last time on this House floor, I'm struck by so many things. I'm wearing the same, well, you can't see it, but I am wearing the same tie today that I wore on Opening Day of the 2011 Session when I first got elected. I haven't worn it since because I received a lei on opening day of 2011 that permanently stained it. And while I used to view that stain as a blemish and the tie as ruined, I find my time at the Legislature has helped me to reevaluate and to see it in a new light. It's simply a tie with character.

"My tie's journey is very indicative of life, the many unexpected events that arise and how we choose to deal with them. Since Opening Day of 2011, many years have passed and much, much has changed. But as I reflect, one thing has remained the same and stands out to me the most. I recently learned about dispositional gratitude or the practice of noticing and appreciating positive aspects of life from an amazing, soon to be Yale freshman who will undoubtedly change the world. As I close out my 12 years in the House, I'm left with an overwhelming sense of gratitude and a heart of thankfulness.

"Being a state representative for the communities that raised me has been the privilege of a lifetime. I'd like to start by thanking my office family. Each of you has been so incredible and I couldn't do without you. Sean, David, Jen, Marie, Steve, Sharon, and especially my office manager, Dorene, and the many people I've been privileged to work with over my 12 years. You're my family and my safe haven. Thank you so much for everything.

"To HMSO, Chief Clerk's, and the Sergeant-at-Arms, I thank you so much for all your hard work and for putting up with me and all the work that I end up engendering. A special thanks to Ali and Michael in HMSO. Thank you both also for putting up with me, our committee's workload and the volume, and to the two of you for doing such an amazing job in facilitating the Labor and Consumer Protection & Commerce Committees' work.

"I'd also like to thank each and every one of you for allowing me the privilege of serving as a chair for these past six years. You've allowed me to pursue an array of ambitious reforms and sometimes outside the box ideas. To all my past vice chairs, thank you for your support and help.

"As I look at each member, I realize that I've learned a lot, something from each of you and every one of you. And on a lighter note, some notable examples include frugality from Matayoshi, street smarts from Stace, and constancy from my friend of over 28 years, Lisa. My current vice chair has been everything from my high school student government comrade and debate foe, she's very good at debate, to my fastest canvasser in one of my roughest dog-filled precincts.

"To my neighboring area colleagues, it's been a real privilege to serve alongside of you. Moanalua and Aiea is such a special region, and your partnership to strengthen this region and its diverse communities has left an indelible imprint on me and our community. *Mahalo* to the CIP and FIN Chair for helping us to build up our communities and for the many projects that will benefit this region for generations to come.

"To Nishimoto, Della, Nakashima, Dee, Onishi, and so many others, thank you for adopting me into the family. And to Saiki and Sylvia, your friendship has been both professionally and personally life changing, and I'll be forever grateful.

"I've always believed that to whom much is given, much is required. And I've endeavored to give my all to this incredible opportunity. And as this season of service in the House of Representatives comes to a close, I'm looking forward to giving my all to other worthy endeavors.

"For nearly two decades, my family has fully supported my seemingly crazy aspirations, and that support has allowed me to chase my dreams while working at the White House, the U.S. Treasury, and the Hawaii State Legislature. Each time I utter my plans, my faithful parents would respond with the same unwavering support, even if I could tell that they were secretly thinking, where does our only son come up with these absolutely crazy ideas? I wouldn't be here without them, and I'm looking forward to reciprocating that support and being there for them with my all in this next season of their lives.

"To my friends, my volunteers and supporters, people like Wally Naito and Kosei Yamane who maintain their exquisitely detailed Japanese wooden fences who would desecrate them every election cycle by literally nailing my signs to these beautiful fences, to the many volunteers who have canvassed tens of thousands of pieces, and especially to the folks who would stand on the side of the road with me for the activity and the only campaign activity that I really, really, really do not care for, I'm so grateful and wouldn't be here without their support.

"And most of all, thank you so much to the amazing people of Moanalua Gardens, Foster Village, Aiea, Lower Pearlridge, Red Hill, Aliamanu, and Fort Shafter. You've given me the privilege of a lifetime to represent you for the past 12 years. Thank you to the many community leaders who faithfully serve our region and inspire me every day to be a better leader with their tireless work on behalf of our community. To the people of my district and my region, I say thank you for your support, your grace, and your friendship. I am truly, truly blessed to hail from such a special area.

"And to all of you who remain to carry on the good work of the House, I wish you nothing but the best and hope that no matter what unexpected events come your way, the result, like my tie, will simply be an adding to your character and the character of the body. It's been an incredible 12 years and thank you all so much for everything."

At this time, the Chair recognized Representative Henry J.C. Aquino, Class of 2008, who served as chair of the Committee on Transportation and the Committee on Public Safety and Military Affairs, who is one of the most unflappable members of the House who nothing fazes even when his bills are leveraged or killed, and who was presented with a certificate and lei by Representative Yamane on behalf of the Members of the House.

Representative Aquino: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I don't know whose idea it was for this guy to give me my leis but thank you very much. First and foremost, a big *mahalo* to the people of Waipahu, who afforded me this amazing honor and privilege to serve in the House since 2008. It's been a struggle to find the right words for today. But what I can say for certain is that it's been a blessing and an honor to serve alongside all of you, Mr. Speaker.

"Being around for nearly 14 years, there's a certainty that you'll pick up things along the way that are teachable and meaningful memories and moments. I've learned so many lessons, too many to count. But the ones that I would like to share are lessons on the institution, about humility, self-control, collaboration, and perseverance.

"From the floor sessions where freshmen members are called upon to answer questions from the Speaker at any time of the session to test your institutional knowledge and to make sure that you're paying attention, to getting your bill held in committee. I would like to thank former Representative Jerry Chang for that teachable moment in humility. As a freshman, he introduced me to the vote to hold. Long story short, he heard one of my bills in his committee, Higher Ed I believe, and voted to hold. I'm a freshman at the time, my very first session. In fact, I didn't know what that was. I really thought it was a good thing. But I found out that it was not. What a way to get introduced to the legislative process, Mr. Speaker. *Mahalo*, Jerry, for that.

"In my early days in the House, the old timers always shared that we needed to learn to pick and choose our battles and to choose wisely, and to distinguish the differences between needs and wants. It is something that I've held on to and shared with our younger members over time. Oh, and here's another lesson that I learned, Mr. Speaker. If you're planning to vote no on a bill, please make sure that the Speaker is not on the text thread.

"I've also learned that we're all public servants and we never get to serve in this chamber without the help and support of many people. I would like to recognize them at this time. *Mahalo* to the Chief Clerk's Office, Printshop, Sergeant's office, and the custodial staff for always taking good care of us. Thank you to the HMSO staff and the LRB office for working with my office over the years. *Mahalo* to all of you.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker and your predecessors, for the opportunity to serve as a committee chair for several committees. And you, Mr. Speaker, allowing me to serve as co-convenor of the Filipino Legislative Caucus for the last several years. A very special *mahalo* to Speaker Say for trusting me as a sophomore to head a committee for my first time and having confidence in my abilities. I'd also like to express my appreciation for our colleagues of today and the past, as I've mentioned earlier. Whether you know it or not, each of you have played an impactful role in my experience here. I value each and every one of you.

"My hope for all of us sitting here today on the floor is that we continue our own journeys, whether it's in our current capacities or elsewhere, in the spirit of service. Let's continue to do our very best on behalf of our people and our great state. My best wishes to all of you. And *mahalo* for the memories.

"In particular, I'd like to wish my last classmate standing from the class of 2008, the good Representative from the Big Island who also chairs the Judiciary Committee, all the best. Don't let these younger guys push you around and make you go faster.

"A special *mahalo* and shout out to my amigos, the Representative from Waipio Gentry and our former colleague from the 39th House District. Thank you for your friendships and hard work over the years. Who would have thought, Mr. Speaker, that a three-member faction could play a role in this 51-body chamber? Maybe our friends in the minority can take notes. Thank you, Gene.

"Kidding aside, *mahalo* to my friend from the 37th District. Despite the harassment, bad ethnic jokes, and putting up with his emotional side, I'm truly grateful for our brotherhood. As the good Representative from Kauai once said, sometimes you want to hug 'em, sometimes you want to choke 'em. *Mahalo*, Rep. Yamane.

"A special acknowledgment of thanks to my office staff headed by my office manager, Maureen Andrade, please stand. She's been with me from the very beginning. Thank you so much. *Mahalo* to my session staff, Jayne Nantkes and Raniele Reyes, please stand. I'm truly grateful for your hard work, commitment, and service to the 38th House District.

"A very special acknowledgment for my parents. As some of you may know, in 2019 I lost my father after a short and fierce battle with lung cancer. He was my rock, Mr. Speaker, and I just hope I made him proud. Lastly, a

very special *mahalo* to my family, especially my wife, Cyndi. I think she's still here. Cyndi, please stand. Thank you for always supporting me and the family. Definitely would not be here without your love, patience, and sacrifices. Thank you and I love you very much.

"I'd like to close with scripture as a prayer reminder for all of us. And let us not grow weary of doing good, for in due season we will reap if we do not give up. Galatians 6:9. Let's keep working hard no matter where we are for the people of our great state. Let's always strive for better in the future. Thank you again, Mr. Speaker, my colleagues, it's been a privilege to serve with all of you. *Mahalo*."

At this time, the Chair recognized Representative Bob McDermott, Class of 1996 and Class of 2012, who is the kind of guy who wears his heart on his sleeve, and who was presented with a certificate and lei by Representative Matsumoto on behalf of the Members of the House.

Representative McDermott: "First of all, I want to thank God for showering me with blessings, including the blessing to be here and serve with all of you. I want to thank the staff all the way from the custodians, everyone in this building up to the Governor's Office. I particularly want to note Sergeant-at-Arms and Tamah-Lani. When I had injured my back, I don't know if you remember, but I certainly do. I was in grave, great pain. I couldn't walk. Poor Representative from Hawaii Kai was trying to lumber me around at 300 lbs., and he wasn't having much success. She made sure I was taken care of, that I could get from point A to point B, and I'll never forget her checking on me constantly.

"Mr. Speaker, you and I have shared probably more time in the past two years in the elevator riding up than we did in the previous 25. And this is a compliment, you are the OG progressive, you are the Dr. Dre of progressives, you're the original. And don't let anybody tell you otherwise because I've seen you in action and you were the original one. Finance Chair, I said my private goodbyes to you, but your kindness will not be forgotten. Majority Leader, same thing, I've grown to have a friendship with you.

"Mr. Speaker, well, I have to keep it short. So, I just want to say I want to acknowledge my brother from another mother, the colleague from Ewa Beach. As he pointed out, there's not much politically we agree on. But we start from that reference point, but we enjoy a good friendship. I call him at times when I am troubled about something, not necessarily political, but going on in life. And I don't know if you follow Ewa Beach politics, but it's still kind of the wild wild west out there. And one time during a reelection campaign, he and I were on the side of the road out by Fort Weaver, thousands of cars coming, and we're arguing, yelling at each other with our big signs up. I guess people thought we were talking about politics, we were arguing about Catholic doctrine. It's a true story.

"I want to talk about my minority members. Val, first time I met you, I saw your million-watt smile and I said, she's a winner. And she had all these people supporting her and I knew she would be successful. And she works hard. And as a mom with two young children, I don't know how you do it. Lauren, they should give you a cape as superwoman because you've got a two-year-old and a five-year-old and I don't know how you do it, plus that long drive in. But you are super organized, extraordinarily talented, and you have taught me, along with the fellow from Moiliili, that you attract a little bit more flies with sugar than vinegar.

"Lastly is my big brother. Well, not lastly, my big brother. I can't talk about him, Mr. Speaker. He is the reason I got elected. So, if you don't like me, you got to blame him, and I'm sure you will. But if it wasn't for him, I wouldn't have got elected, and he has been a mentor and a big brother throughout the years. And this is over since 1994, we've known each other. I love him, Mr. Speaker, I have practiced this speech a little bit, and each time I thought about him, I broke down and cried. So, I'm not going to do that.

"Finally, Mr. Speaker, now this is finally. Aside from my staff who I introduced earlier, any success I've had in life or been able to stumble into accidentally is due to my wife, my bride of 36 years. I still hold her hand because I'm afraid someone's going to steal her from me. I've got a mirror, let's face it. A mother of eight, a grandmother to ten. She is the reason that I've been able to do anything. So, honey, thank you. *Aloha* and God bless you all."

At this time, the Chair recognized Representative Angus L.K. McKelvey, Class of 2006, who served as chair of the Committee on Government Reform, the Committee on Economic Development & Business, the Committee on Higher Education, and the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, who is one of the more multi-dimensional thinkers in the House and someone who never takes things personally, and who was presented with a certificate and lei by Representative Clark on behalf of the Members of the House.

Representative McKelvey: "I guess Representative Clark drew the short straw. I'm joking, thank you so much, Representative, I greatly appreciate it. And true to my style, I dropped my certificate. Well, Mr. Speaker, colleagues, to quote the band the Grateful Dead, what a long strange trip it has been. 2006 was a really different place. I got sucked into politics because I was ticked off at the fact that the money, the CIP for West Maui had died in the House yet again. And so, I decided, you know what, I can either complain, I can get mad about it, or I can do something about it. I can go and try to make a difference. I can leave the place I love to come into a place I only spent time as a staffer before and had seen it from that view.

"And you think as a staffer, you're like, wow, I would never do what these guys are doing in a million years. I like being able to go to the grocery store and not get yelled at. But I knew it was for a greater cause. A cause, I think, that binds all of us, because we wanted to take care of our community, our family, our friends, the people who mean the most to us. We want to see them be lifted up by the work that is done in a place, for me on Maui, that is far away.

"And so, with that, I came over here and what an experience it was. I was lucky to be part of a class of unprecedented size of 13 members, including you, Representative Ward, as a returning quasi-freshman. And at that time the State House, when we came in, the average age was well above our years. I mean, Sharon, we were what, the young under 40 crowd, Della, these upstarts coming into the State House of Representatives. I look at my younger colleagues now and I'm like, wow, you want to talk about upstarts? But we all came in and from the word go it was a bang.

"And we were blessed to have many people here to mentor us along the way. For me, it was Bob Nakasone. He took me aside, he looked me up and down, and he threw dried squid on the desk and looked at me, okay, braddah, you going eat this? Are you one local or you one of those loudmouthed Californians from Lahaina I hear about all the time? And from there, a friendship was born between he and I.

"Mr. Speaker, I made a conscious decision to leave this august body and all of you who I love and have enjoyed working with because I wanted to have the honor and privilege of being able to say goodbye. There are so many of our members who've gone before us who were never given that opportunity. I think about my good friend Joe Bertram, who, as one lobbyist said, didn't have a mean bone in his body whatsoever. The kindest, gentlest soul you ever met.

"I think about my dear friend, and I know she would be so proud of us today for what we've done for the Native Hawaiian community, Representative Mele Carroll, who left this earth not seeing what she worked so hard for over the years. Tirelessly just trying to better the lives of her people. I think she looks down upon us today.

"And I learned a lot with my freshman class. We discovered that, wow, there's 13 of us, we might actually be able to effect change right away. And we had the Speaker of the House and the potential speaker come and address us. And we became quite tight knit from the word go. And we had quite the amazing stories and adventures. Jimmy, I remember the *kanalua* vote. We were like, what's *kanalua* mean? Oh, it simply means you pass until the final round. And Jimmy goes, I'll tell you what *kanalua* means, it means you have no guts, except he didn't use the word guts.

"Sharon, you and I have been colleagues in arms on voting no against claims against the State more often I think than any legislators in history. And while it became a badge of honor through thick and thin to do it, I think it also was a statement of the values that we always tried to keep throughout the years. To maintain, to be true to the average folks out there. To make sure that when the decisions are made, they're not made in the best interest of upstairs or down the street, but in our homes and our towns.

"I want to also go ahead and I want to thank my family. And I want to thank my lovely wife, Val, she has been through a lot with me, she's been there for me. And we've had quite spiritual discussions and political ones. And she reminds me to, hey, you do it for us and for the people like us, our friends. You don't do it for the people who have private jets, you do it for regular folk.

"I also want to go ahead and I want to remember somebody who was with me, who was like, you go, Angus, you run and do this, who was my steadfast champion. One who every time I'd come home on the weekend, she would listen with just absolute interest at every little nuance and turn in this building, every decision, every back story. And that I lost her just this last year, it's my mom. And many of you knew her. She was not only a source of inspiration to me and a guiding foundation, a rock, but she was to the town I live in and my community. And it was very hard for me losing her. I think I'm finally grieving for her right now. But I know the decision I'm making to move forward in my life is the decision that she would have said, if she had been here sitting next to me. And of course, you know her, those who knew her, she would insist she be sitting on this floor right now with a lei on. And she would be like, right, it's time to move on, Angus, and serve your community in a bigger way. Because you've done the work for your community here and you meant a lot to us, but you need to try to see, you can do more, what you can do for everybody in this town.

"And I may not be successful. We, none of us may be. We serve at the will of our community and they may not support us in our endeavors. But I can tell you this, that no matter what we do in life moving on, I know it'll be a richer experience. I know that we will have had qualities that we now carry with us that were made because of our friendships. We've broken bread together and we've crossed swords together. We've laughed together, we've cried together. We have faced the onslaught of communities. We talked about the session of marriage equality, which was the most chaotic, inspirational thing I'd ever seen. We talked about Superferry, where we had people in droves in and out of the building like you wouldn't believe.

"We talked about the little things, the big things. Things that at the time we thought was going to change the world and in 10 years you're like, whatever happened to that bill or law? And little things that we did, especially during the pandemic, that made a huge difference in people's lives. And I think that's really what has continuing to try to do something bigger and better, helping people with their UI, such a *manini* thing, you'd think. Helping to give them money to get the resources they need so they wouldn't starve was so important to me, I can't tell you. To get emails from a mother saying thank you for your help, because of that my kids will have food this Christmas, they will have presents.

"And Mr. Speaker, through this journey, when I first came in here, I was very blessed to have an amazing office manager. And she came in and she was like, wow, what did I get stuck with this haole guy here? And Wendee Wilson taught me a lot. And she was my rock and she worked hard. And she became a friend and a family to me. And it was kind of fitting, as we come full circle in many things, that she came to work with me yet again. And I definitely could not have done it without her. And I know going forward I won't be able to do it without her and her family. Her son, Kamana, it was funny when I first came in, was a little kid, smart, intelligent, playing video games on his computer. And now he's a grown, young, articulate man who's playing video games on his computer.

"Oh, and finally again, Mr. Speaker, I want to thank you. And I want to thank Sylvia. And I want to thank Della. Dee, how many text messages did you get? Yes, no, up, down, pull the green slip, no, maybe. I appreciate Nadine. I think Takashi really said it the best. There are people who are doing amazing things to actually move the needle like they've never been moved. And I thank you for everything you've done because I profoundly have seen change that I didn't think would ever happen. To stop the broken record we all hear every election year.

"I want to thank my Republican colleagues. Val, Bob over there made me feel uncomfortable in an elevator several times. And Gene, of course, you, my brother from another mother, the voice of the conscience in my committee and a statesman. Many times I was not the most pleasant chair and was abrupt and quick with you and we had our battles, but you were always there to shake hands and to be the bigger person and to remain friends. And I appreciate all of you. You've added a strong voice to representation of Hawaii, a counterview that needs to be represented.

"And to all the young reps I've gotten to know, and what really sucks about this COVID thing is I lost a year to really get to know you better. But I'm absolutely blown away by all you already. Just last night, to put a skit together in 5 minutes. It took what, Sharon, Jimmy, what, us a week and a half and we still couldn't get it right, Della. You guys have incredible courage, fortitude. You're not afraid to make the tough decisions, you're grounded, and I hope that you will stick with this because you are needed now more than ever. And I know if my mom was here, she'd be like, right, especially to see strong, young, independent women in politics. Both my senior members who've served with me, like Nicole, to Jeanne, to Lisa, all of you, she would be so proud of you because she was one who had to shatter glass ceilings that were impenetrable at her time. And to know that you were here and continuing to make a difference and fight for true representation would make her proud. So that's all I really have to say. I thank you from the bottom of my heart. I thank my community. I thank my island. My watch has ended. *Aloha.*"

At this time, the Chair recognized Representative Sylvia Luke, Class of 1998, who served as chair of the Committee on Finance and the Committee on Judiciary, who will go down as the greatest Finance chair in state history, and who was presented with a certificate and lei by Representatives Nishimoto and Yamashita on behalf of the Members of the House.

Representative Luke: "I was kind of crying until Nishimoto made a snarky remark, and I'm so glad I'm leaving because I don't have to deal with his snarky remarks daily, although he probably will call me at 10:00 a.m. when he wakes up to give me smart, snarky remarks. Mr. Speaker, I would first like to thank my family, especially my husband and my son, Logan. As you know, family members make sacrifices so that we can be here. And so, if there's family members up there, if you could stand. Come on, I see you Val, family members stand. Nobody wants to take me up. The one who is not standing is my husband, see, now you know my pain.

"And I want to thank my staff, all my present and prior staff for making us all better people. And I'm trying to get the Speaker to cry, but he has a heart of stone so he's not going to cry, so I'm going to keep trying until he's going to shed some tear. My heartfelt gratitude to the residents of my district for giving me the honor to represent them the last 24 years. I took my first oath of office when I was just 30 years old, and I thought I was young then. Imagine all the young representatives here today, Representative Tam, Representative Gates, Representative Kapela, all those others and all the semi-young ones like Matayoshi, Lisa, and Stace. You folks inspire me. I thought I was young then. But to be filled in a chamber with young legislators like Greggor and all you folks, Jackson, you folks inspire me.

"And I am thankful for every lesson that I share with all of you folks. During my tenure, we visited so many people, especially on Finance trips. We went to Lanai, we went to Molokai, we went to very remote areas to learn about issues that were important to them and to find solutions for challenges of the future. Every piece of legislation we passed here, every line item in the budget, comes from negotiation and collaboration. The measures that we have sent to the governor emerged after hours of public engagement and discussion. They were created with input from both chambers and informed by real experiences of all of our communities.

"This year, I'm thankful for our revenues because we were able to pass monumental legislation that will impact the lives of so many people for many years to come. And I think that was only possible, I'm going to take a breath, and that was only possible with the help of each and every one of you from true collaboration, not just with the members of the House, members with the cabinet, members with the Senate, and the ability for all of us to work together. To my colleagues, I feel very privileged to have served alongside every one of you. I'm grateful for the relationships I made. Each of you inspire me to do better and be better. I will treasure our friendships I have made over the years.

"Some of you often ask me, especially Representative Nakamura, how do I do what I do, withstanding many criticisms and carrying the burden of others? That's because I have learned from many of you. Although you don't explicitly live by these four rules, I have watched you and you live by these four rules. And they are, be the first to take the blame, be the last to take the credit, forgive each other often, and forget the wrongs against you. It has truly, it has been an honor to serve with all of you. God bless and *aloha.*"

Speaker Saiki: "Thank you, Representative Luke. Could all of our departing members please stand, all of our nine members? So, to our departing members, thank you. These members take with them collectively 103 years of House service. This group represents the best of us. They have a conscience, they keep their word, they are advocates, they are problem solvers. Some of them have a distorted sense of humor, but they all care and want Hawaii to move forward. The House will not be the same without you. We will miss all of you. On behalf of our entire state, thank you for your work and service and best wishes going forward. Thank you."

The Chair then recognized Representative Belatti, the Majority Leader, to deliver closing remarks on behalf of the Majority Caucus:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. That is such a hard act to follow. I'm going to start by just saying, first of all, thank you to all of our staff, the Chief Clerk's Office, in our research offices, in our communications offices, in all of our individual offices. We could not do this work without you. This work that over the last two years has been some of the most challenging work that has been done by a state legislature.

"So, again, hard act to follow all of those speeches. Since 2018, for the last five years, I have struggled with opening and closing day speeches. Today, the speech is no different and is no exception. It is even harder because of the tremendous change that this body will undergo, as demonstrated by the speeches that have preceded mine today. So, here's a little insight. There's probably a little bit of a formula to these closing day speeches. We talk about all the tough issues that we worked on. We talk about the promises that were delivered. And we talk about how democracy is a work in progress.

"We know that this session has been unprecedented, historic, consequential, a banner year. These are just some of the words that have been used to describe this session. I'm going to allow the next two speakers to talk about the things that we accomplished. I want to focus my speech on the moments that are the in-betweens and how democracy is, in fact, a work in progress.

"For me, the in-betweens are the most important moments in this place. These are the moments in between everything that we do that the public never sees. These are the moments when we fight fiercely. I'm going to break protocol because everyone has been doing it all day. Representative Nishimoto, these are the moments when we fight fiercely. Representative Mizuno, when we struggle with negotiations. And for all of you, when we either cry with one another or laugh deeply together, because at the end of the day, we are humans and we feel the burdens and the slings of our jobs. And in many ways, we understand those burdens that each one of us carries. And I hope it's those in-between moments when we are friends, despite the words and the tempers that might flare, and the factions that we may be in. But we are friends. And that is the most important thing.

"I want to talk about those in-between moments, when you connect with the people you serve and you realize that the work that you are doing makes all the difference in the world. I'm reminded by this because of something that Representative Holt talked about yesterday, how he read testimony from Hema Watson and noted the historic moment we were investing finally in our Native Hawaiian *keiki* and future.

"For me, those constituents were Willy Shum and John Kimmell II during the marriage equality debates, and I was so privileged to be able to attend their marriage after we passed that historic law. For me it was Jari and MJ Sugano, the reason why we struggled to pass medical cannabis dispensaries, decades after we had already passed and legalized medical cannabis. I hope for every one of you, and I know you do, you have those in-between moments with your constituents when you know that the work that we do makes all the difference.

"The third in-between moment I want to talk about, and I wish this for all of you, it's that in-between moment when you find that mentor who helps guide you through the legislative process. Through the turbulent waters you know that we also went through each and every day of the 60 days of a legislative session. And each and every day of a busy interim, especially when you are given assignments and you take them on gladly.

"I have had one of those mentors. And I didn't stand up earlier and say it, but I want to quote back to you what she said on my very first opening day.

Now, I want to correct the record a little bit. Some people think that on my first opening day, I was pulled along with these two senior members. And let me tell you, I was going out on my own because I was like that Representative Kapela, who's going to just stand up and speak. And go for it, girl. But I was going to do it anyway, and these two mentors of mine, unbeknownst to me, were going to stand with me. I didn't ask them to stand with me, but they did. Because they understood that a young voice needs support.

"And this one mentor of mine in her speech, and this is what I'm going to take away from her, she said, 'we are all reformist by nature and that's why we run for office, to bring changes that will benefit the public and make government responsive to its people.... Many of us became legislators with hopes and dreams to do great things, solve real problems.'

"And that is what we need in our legislative mentors. I know for some of you, those mentors were Representatives Takamine, Herkes, Nakasone, and Say. And I think we all have to find those mentors, whoever they are. So, for my wish for the younger legislators is that you find those mentors. We're here. But then that you, yourself become a mentor someday.

"I'm going to take those words from my mentor and live by that, if I am so lucky to be able to return. Because we have to, we have to keep doing the work of the people to do great things and solve real problems.

"And I'm going to shift to democracy as a work in progress, because we need to move away and I do have to talk about some substance. For all that we have done this year, democracy is, in fact, a work in progress. We have to build on the historic measures we passed this year. House Bill 2511 connected to the \$600 million consequential appropriation to DHHL to address its decades-long waitlist. We are requiring them to submit a strategic plan about how this assistance will be used and expend this money wisely in three years.

"Senate Bill 2021, \$21.5 million annually to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs and a one-time \$64 million appropriation to OHA for just a portion of the income and proceeds from the Public Land Trust. But what did we also do? We put in there a working group that is going to have to determine how we allocate funds for the future. This is a political question that we have to continue to work on. Because why? Democracy is a work in progress.

"Mauna Kea, House Bill 2024, there is a five-year transition period in which the new Mauna Kea Stewardship and Oversight Authority will take over the reins of management and stewardship. Our work is not done there.

"Senate Bill 2473, the reformation of the Agribusiness Development Corporation, where we have reformed ADC, a troubled agency, so that it no longer reflects the plantation days of the past but it has to address the new world so that we can have food security for our people. And I know that some will struggle with the fact that ADC has been transferred to DBEDT, but that is why we must come back. Because it is a work in progress.

"House Bill 1800, Hawaii State Energy Office, where we're asking them to study to determine our pathway to decarbonization and to identify the challenges, opportunities, and actions that need to be taken in the transportation and agriculture sectors. The transitions and actions that need to be built into our state's energy workforce and how we will consider the impacts and mitigation measures to our frontline low-income communities that so often carry a greater burden than other communities as we struggle with climate change.

"House Bill 2000, the \$200 million for the School Facilities Authority to construct new school facilities, and the renovation, and improvement, and expansion of existing school facilities to increase pre-kindergarten student capacity. We have to come back to make sure that they deliver on both of those promises. Democracy is a work in progress.

"House Bill 1579, where we have extended the date of the transfer and transition of the Oahu Regional Health Care System from the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation to the Department of Health to December 2025. Why is that critical? Because we need the continuum of care for our *kūpuna*.

"And finally, Senate Bill 2076, this one is a little bit closer to my heart, it's a sleeper bill. It appropriates \$200 million in federal funds to UH for planning and implementation of broadband statewide. It requires the University of Hawaii and the Hawaii Broadband and Digital Equity Office

to convene a working group to determine the appropriate governance structure to implement, operate, and maintain broadband infrastructure development in the state. If we have learned anything from this pandemic, we have learned how important we need to stay connected to one another. So, broadband is going to be another five to ten-year project.

"Members, we have to do all of this. We have so much ahead of us. And yes, we can celebrate those things that we have accomplished, and we should. But there is so much work ahead of us. And I will leave you with this one thing, this one *'ōlelo*. *'A 'ohe hana nui ke alu 'ia*. No task is too big when done together by all. That was shared with me by the deputy director of Department of Hawaiian Home Lands. It is fitting for this day. It is fitting for this moment. And my *aloha* to all of you, because I know wherever we are in this state that this body of 51 and the bonds that we have created will take us to a future that is brighter, where there is no task that is too big when done together by all of us. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair then recognized Representative Okimoto, the Minority Leader, to deliver closing remarks on behalf of the Minority Caucus:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. And thank you, Majority Leader Belatti, for your words. Four years ago, I entered the doors of this building bright-eyed and bushy-tailed, having no prior legislative experience, nor even really knowing what to expect. I am sure many of you witnessed me walking in a complete square to locate my office every day. The one thing I did know back then was that I had a heart to serve the people of Mililani and of our beautiful State of Hawaii. I am grateful that that passion to do so is even stronger today.

"Tradition in the minority dictates that the minority leader should, in a way, rebuke what the majority delivers. That's not my style, that's never been my style. I've learned through these four years that a productive and efficient legislator is not just critical of the other side, but more importantly, respectful and understanding. Republicans, Democrats, Hawaiians, non-Hawaiians, locals, transplants. We are not adversaries, we are *'ohana*. And sometimes *'ohana*, well, we disagree on things. We're all in this *pā'ina* together, and we get to live in the greatest state in the country, our state.

"It was our state that saw the first two Asian-American U.S. senators in Republican Hiram Fong and Democrat Daniel Inouye. It was our state that met the tides of World War II at its doorstep and stood firmly to protect the democracy this country holds so dear. And it is our state that is taking the initiative to correct historical wrongs. The passing of the \$1 billion to our Native Hawaiian community is indeed a monumental moment in our history. And I am proud, as those of us who were able to stand together yesterday, to have been a part of it. To all the Native Hawaiians past, present, and future, while there is still much work to do, your perseverance and grace through these many years will see your people thrive and flourish as they once did. And I believe that with all my heart.

"Mr. Speaker, colleagues, I want to impart on you some final thoughts as we end this legislative session. In a world filled with distractions, it is almost impossible to avoid getting caught up in the things you can't control. When we focus on the things we have no control over, we forget about what's most important, our own backyard. Each one of us here can take another to a place in their district that has deteriorated, been neglected, or abandoned. Places in our own backyards. As you walk your districts and reconnect with your constituents, see if any of those places in your backyard are better than before. If not, then there is still plenty of work to do. And if we spend a little more time cleaning up our yards, the world will be a better place.

"When we feel as if we have no fight left within us, may we remember the words of our dear President Teddy Roosevelt, in one of my favorite speeches, his speech entitled 'The Man in the Arena.' 'It is not the critic who counts; not the man who points out how the strong man stumbles, or where the doer of deeds could have done them better. The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena, whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs, who comes short again and again, because there is no effort without error and shortcoming; but who does actually strive to do the deeds; who knows great enthusiasms, the great devotions; who spends himself in a worthy cause; who at the best knows in the end the triumph of high achievement, and who at the worst, if he fails, at least fails while daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who neither know victory nor defeat.'

"I pray that as we depart from this chamber floor today, regardless of what paths we may take, that we will never forget what is most important. And that is taking care of the people in our state, our own backyards. For our people here deserve better than what we have been providing them. May we not sit quietly, timid, and afraid to stand up for what is right, but may we be like the man in the arena, strong, resilient, having integrity and purpose, willing to take risks because nothing great was accomplished by those who simply watch idly. Most importantly, may we love and respect each other regardless of what side of the aisle we sit, our ethnic backgrounds, or which neighborhood we come from. For that is what makes this beautiful state, our State of Hawaii, special. And that is how God has intended us to be. *Mahalo nui loa.*"

Speaker Saiki then gave his closing remarks as follows:

"Thank you, Representative Okimoto. The Chair has some brief closing remarks. So, first, thank you to our staff, Sergeant-at-Arms, Office of the Chief Clerk, Printshop, our custodians, the Legislative Reference Bureau, our research offices, and our individual staff offices. Also thank you to the Senate. Thank you to Senate President Kouichi for not being a reactive person and for always staying above the fray so that he can help solve problems. And thank you to all of the members of the Senate for not leveraging all of our bills during conference.

"So, on Wednesday morning at 12:30 a.m., after the adjournment of our Tuesday floor session, I received a text message from a media commentator who has often been critical of the Legislature. And the text read, 'thanks, I understand the Legislature has delivered real results for real people, 100%.' As we know, that text is completely accurate. And the credit goes to each and every member of this body.

"When you take a step back, there was no guarantee that this session would end the way that it did. And that is because in the past two years, every conceivable obstacle has been thrown at all of us. But you were resilient, and you overcame all of the hurdles to deliver real results for real people. A \$1 billion housing package that targets those in need, Hawaiian home land beneficiaries, families earning less than \$100,000, homeless persons. An \$18 minimum wage, plus an increased working family's tax credit that will result in an additional \$30,000 in income for a family of four. The closure of Red Hill. A tax rebate of \$250 million for Hawaii taxpayers. Mutual stewardship on Mauna Kea. And child welfare services, especially for foster kids and for adoptions. You know that our list this year is just too long to repeat.

"When we opened our session on January 19, I quoted from Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s speech that he gave here in the House of Representatives 62 years ago. His call for justice, cultural justice, environmental justice, and economic justice, resonates today. And your work has met Dr. King's call in a significant way. The bottom line is this, you have shifted the arc of justice in Hawaii in just one year.

"Yesterday at the Hawaiian Caucus event, I mentioned that I view this legislative session as a breakthrough. It was a breakthrough because the Legislature envisioned the possible and then implemented it. In the process, you were unafraid to take on the most complicated and controversial issues. This is exactly how a legislature should operate. And as a result of your work, hundreds of thousands of people will have opportunity and a better chance in our state. So, thank you for your work and have a great summer."

ADJOURNMENT

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 2076, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to Broadband Service Infrastructure."

The purpose of this bill is to have the University of Hawaii (UH) and the Hawaii Broadband and Digital Equity Office (BDEO) jointly convene a working group to determine an appropriate governance structure to implement, operate, and maintain broadband infrastructure in the State. For fiscal year 2022-2023, BDEO is appropriated \$360,000 to fund three full-time administrative positions, and UH is appropriated \$200,000,000 in federal moneys for planning and implementation of a statewide broadband initiative.

While the bill as a whole has merit, I object to the \$200,000,000 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023, funded through moneys from the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA), Pub. L. No. 117-2, to be used for planning and implementation of a statewide broadband initiative, designated in section 4 on page 6, line 19, of the bill. The appropriation of \$200,000,000 in ARPA funds to UH appears to be redundant with the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Funds (CSFRF) and Capital Projects Fund appropriation for the broadband initiative in the Department of Budget and Finance's budget. Further, because many of the requirements for the initiative will be capital improvements in nature, these funds will not count towards meeting UH's "maintenance of effort" (MOE) based on U.S. Department of Education guidelines for ARPA's Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief MOE compliance – higher education capital improvement funding is specifically ineligible.

The appropriation will also limit the Administration's ability to balance out fiscal year 2022-2023 appropriations and expenditures to ensure compliance with the MOE requirements.

Section 16 of Article III of the State Constitution provides that, "[e]xcept for items appropriated to be expended by the judicial and legislative branches, the governor may veto any specific item or items in any bill which appropriates money for specific purposes by striking out or reducing the same." Because of the foregoing objections, I have taken the following action pursuant to my line item veto authority:

Stricken out the \$200,000,000 appropriation made from ARPA moneys for fiscal year 2022-2023 in section 4 on page 6, line 19, of the bill, to be used by UH for planning and implementation of a statewide broadband initiative, and changed the amount to \$0.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 2076 with the appropriation made from ARPA moneys for fiscal year 2022-2023 totaling \$200,000,000 stricken from the bill.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO BROADBAND SERVICE INFRASTRUCTURE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the provision of equitable and robust access to broadband continues to be among the State's most pressing challenges. Hawaii needs to invest in open access, carrier-neutral cable landing infrastructure to attract transpacific fiber optic cable companies and expand its fiber connectivity to the world and throughout the islands, particularly in rural, underserved, and unserved communities, to achieve the digital equity necessary to build a resilient digital economy. Attracting partners with the necessary technical expertise and resources can develop Hawaii into a strategic communications and knowledge hub in the Pacific. This hub would incorporate a robust global communications network and provide cloud platforms to establish next generation applications, such as artificial intelligence and smart communities, in Hawaii.

The legislature further finds that to build a robust broadband infrastructure, the State must act quickly to take advantage of various federal and private funds available this

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year. For example, the 2021 federal Consolidated Appropriations Act earmarks:

- (1) At least \$30,000,000 for the department of Hawaiian home lands;
- (2) \$3,200,000,000 nationally in an emergency broadband benefit for low-income Americans to become connected or remain connected to broadband;
- (3) \$250,000,000 nationally for a new telehealth pilot program;
- (4) \$300,000,000 for a national grant program to fund broadband in rural areas; and
- (5) \$65,000,000 for the improvement of the nation's broadband maps.

The legislature notes that the first phase of deployment of these federal funds, in part, supports the South American Pacific Link, a transpacific fiber cable project that would connect Hawaii to South America, Central America, and the east coast of the continental United States. Additionally, over \$100,000,000 is available from the United States Department of Transportation Federal Highway Administration to address the

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broadband capacity to support telecommuting through pilot projects focused on building broadband infrastructure.

Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to ensure that the State takes full advantage of available funds to build and maintain the broadband infrastructure necessary to sustain interconnectivity throughout islands by:

- (1) Requiring the University of Hawaii and Hawaii broadband and digital equity office to convene a working group;
- (2) Appropriating funds to the Hawaii broadband and digital equity office for three full-time equivalent (3.0 FTE) administrative positions for the operation and administration of the Hawaii broadband and digital equity office; and
- (3) Appropriating federal funds to the University of Hawaii for the planning and implementation of a statewide broadband initiative.

SECTION 2. (a) The University of Hawaii and Hawaii broadband and digital equity office shall jointly convene a working group to determine the appropriate governance structure

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to implement, operate, and maintain broadband infrastructure development in the State.

(b) The working group shall consist of the following members, or their designees:

- (1) The president of the University of Hawaii, who shall serve as co-chair;
- (2) The strategic broadband coordinator, who shall serve as co-chair;
- (3) The director of finance;
- (4) The director of commerce and consumer affairs;
- (5) The comptroller;
- (6) The director of business, economic development, and tourism;
- (7) The director of health;
- (8) The superintendent of education;
- (9) The chairperson of the Hawaiian homes commission; and
- (10) The mayors of the counties.

(c) The co-chairs of the working group shall invite the following individuals to become members of the working group:

- (1) The governor;
- (2) The State's congressional delegation;

2 (4) Others as recommended by the working group.

4 (1) Provide recommendations for an appropriate governing

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 1600, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to the State Budget."

The purposes of this bill, the Supplemental Appropriations Act of 2022, are to adjust and request appropriations for the fiscal biennium 2021-2023 to fund the operations and capital improvement projects of the Executive Branch agencies and programs.

While the bill as a whole has merit, I object to the following appropriations for the reasons indicated:

Appropriations in this bill that are funded by the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund (CSFRF) of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA), Pub. L. No. 117-2, § 9901, 135 Stat. 4, 223 (2021) (American Rescue Plan funds), need to be reprioritized due to: (1) an over appropriation of the American Rescue Plan funds; (2) additional funding needed by the Department of Education (DOE) and the University of Hawaii (UH) to meet the federal Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund (ESSER Fund) Maintenance of Effort (MOE) proportional funding requirements; and (3) replacement funding for the appropriations impacted by my veto of House Bill No. 1147.

The amount of American Rescue Plan funds appropriations made in this bill (twenty-two appropriations) and in Senate Bill No. 2076 during the 2022 regular session plus the American Rescue Plan funds appropriations made in various acts during the 2021 regular session, and American Rescue Plan funds allocations made by me pursuant to chapter 29, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and section 67 of the General Appropriations Act of 2021, Act 88, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, total \$1,746,037,985, an amount that exceeds the State's American Rescue Plan funds allocation of \$1,641,602,610 from the U.S. Department of the Treasury by \$104,435,375.

Under the federal ESSER Fund's MOE requirements pursuant to the ARPA, the State must maintain a proportional level of funding for the DOE and UH (calculated separately for each) for fiscal years 2021-2022 and 2022-2023 relative to the State's overall spending level for fiscal years 2021-2022 and 2022-2023 that is greater than or equal to the average of the State's proportional level of funding for the DOE and UH relative to the State's overall spending for the three prior fiscal years. Failure to meet the federal ESSER MOE requirements may have adverse consequences on the State's receipt of federal ESSER education moneys. In this instance, while the DOE received additional general funds for specific purposes, I understand that the DOE may not be able to fully expend these moneys in fiscal year 2022-2023 to meet its proportional percentage. Further, I understand that insufficient general funds were provided to the UH to meet its proportional percentage for fiscal year 2022-2023.

Additionally, with my veto of House Bill No. 1147 due to the violation of the prohibition against "gut and replace" actions during the legislative process, the vetoed American Rescue Plan funds will be used in part to provide funding for the Hawaii Tourism Authority and the Convention Center.

Based on the above, I object to the following American Rescue Plan funds appropriations in the bill:

1. The \$660,000 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for BED 100 - Strategic Marketing and Support, for office renovation expenses, designated in section 3, item A-1, on page 2, line 8, of the bill.

For the following two general fund appropriations, I object to the acquisition, upgrade, and operation of the Wahiawa Irrigation System and Lake Wilson reservoir without doing proper due diligence. A project of this nature is a major undertaking that poses significant legal, regulatory, and financial burdens for the State. As I understand neither the Department of Agriculture nor the Department of Land and Natural Resources has done any due diligence work that would be a prerequisite for undertaking a project such as this. Consequently, it is unclear if sufficient funding is provided to acquire the designated parcels; repair and expand the spillway to bring it in compliance with dam safety requirements; operate the dam and irrigation system; and operate and maintain the Lake Wilson reservoir area. Further, there is no clear framework as to the responsibilities of the Department of Agriculture, the Agribusiness Development Corporation, and the Department of Land and Natural Resources with respect to operating and maintaining the Wahiawa Irrigation System and Lake Wilson reservoir. For these reasons, I am reducing the appropriations to provide sufficient funding only for due diligence work such as a feasibility assessment study/preliminary design report, survey and planning, environmental impact statement preparation, and other due diligence costs.

1. Of the total \$29,616,732 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by general funds, for AGR 141 - Agricultural Resource Management, \$22,500,000 for the upgrade of the Wahiawa dam and spillway and purchase of fee simple lands, and \$500,000 for additional operational support and maintenance, totaling \$23,000,000, in section 3, item A-13, on page 4, line 36, of the bill and \$22,500,000 of the \$26,000,000 amount in the proviso in section 6.1 of Act 88, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, as added by section 4(1) on page 64, line 3, to page 65, line 2, of this bill.

2. The \$800,000 appropriation of the total \$3,811,324 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by general funds, for AGR 161 - Agribusiness Development and Research, for irrigation management, designated in section 3, item A-14, on page 5, line 10, of the bill.

For the following general fund appropriation, I object to the expenditure of moneys to the Hawaii Emergency Management Agency for infrastructure, construction, design, equipment, and site plans for the First Responder Technology Campus. I understand that planning and permitting for the Campus is still in its initial stages. Further, a master plan must be prepared in order to subdivide the Campus to make possible participation and development of the facilities by non-State agencies. It appears highly unlikely that these steps can be completed before funding for the project lapses on June 30, 2024. Additionally, it is unclear why development funding for the Campus is being provided to the Hawaii Emergency Management Agency as it is a potential occupant of the Campus, not the agency responsible for developing the Campus.

1. The \$35,000,000 appropriation of the total \$51,680,292 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by general funds, for DEF 118 - Hawaii Emergency Management Agency, for infrastructure, construction, design, equipment, and site plans for the First Responder Technology Campus, designated in section 3, item I-24, on page 51, line 20, of this bill and described in the proviso in section 18.3 of Act 88, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, as added by section 4(23) on page 81, line 14, to page 82, line 3, of this bill.

For the following general obligation bond fund appropriation, I object to the expenditure of moneys to the Hawaii Technology Development Corporation (HTDC) for plans, design, and land acquisition for the First Responder Technology Campus and Cybersecurity Data Center, Oahu. For the reasons noted above, I believe that additional land acquisition for the Campus is premature. According to the draft environmental impact statement prepared for the Campus, development is planned to take place in six phases over the next fifteen years. The initial phase, which is programmed for fiscal year 2023-2025, is estimated to cost \$100,000,000-\$150,000,000 and will involve construction of a roadway into the existing Campus property along with drainage and utilities in preparation for the full Campus buildout in subsequent phases. Additionally, it is unclear why the HTDC is acquiring a parcel of land classified as conservation.

1. The \$17,800,000 capital appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by general obligation bond funds, for BED 143 - Hawaii Technology Development Corporation, designated in section 3, item A-19, on page 6, line 33, of the bill and in section 26, item A-12.01, of Act 88, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, as added by section 5 on page 92, line 40, of this bill.

Section 16 of Article III of the State Constitution provides that, "[e]xcept for items appropriated to be expended by the judicial and legislative branches, the governor may veto any specific item or items in any bill which appropriates money for specific purposes by striking out or reducing the same." Because of the foregoing objections, I have taken the following actions pursuant to my line-item veto authority:

5. Stricken the \$2,000,000 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for LBR 903 - Office of Community Services, designated in section 3, item 8-3, on page 9, line 17, of the bill and changed it to \$0.

6. Stricken the \$3,541,937 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for LBR 183 - Disability Compensation Program, designated in section 3, item 8-8, on page 10, line 27, of the bill and changed it to \$0.

7. Stricken the \$10,000,000 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for TRN 501 - Oahu Highways, designated in section 3, item C-27, on page 16, line 20, of the bill and changed it to \$0.

8. Stricken the \$120,000 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for LNR 402 - Native Resources and Fire Protection Program, designated in section 3, item D-4, on page 20, line 32, of the bill and changed it to \$0.

9. Stricken the \$5,000,000 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for HTH 131 - Disease Outbreak Control, designated in section 3, item E-2, on page 23, line 29, of the bill and changed it to \$0.

10. Stricken the \$41,238,400 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for HTH 212 - Hawaii Health Systems Corporation - Regions, designated in section 3, item E-9, on page 25, line 30, of the bill and changed it to \$0.

11. Stricken the \$832,500 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for HMS 501 - In-Community Youth Programs, designated in section 3, item F-5, on page 31, line 2, of the bill and changed it to \$0.

12. Stricken the \$520,000 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for HMS 503 - Hawaii Youth Correctional Facility (HYCF), designated in section 3, item F-6, on page 31, line 8, of the bill and changed it to \$0.

13. Stricken the \$10,800,000 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for HMS 224 - Homeless Services, designated in section 3, item F-16, on page 33, line 2, of the bill and changed it to \$0.

14. Stricken the \$2,577,064 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for HMS 904 - General Administration - DHS, designated in section 3, item F-29, on page 36, line 3, of the bill and changed it to \$0.

15. Stricken the \$1,300,000 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for UOH 800 - University of Hawai'i, Community Colleges, designated in section 3, item G-22, on page 42, line 35, of the bill and changed it to \$0.

16. Stricken the \$700,000 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for AGS 881 - State Foundation on Culture and the Arts, designated in section 3, item H-2, on page 44, line 22, of the bill and changed it to \$0.

17. Stricken the \$728,080 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for LNR 806 - Parks Administration and Operation, designated in section 3, item H-6, on page 45, line 30, of the bill and changed it to \$0.

18. Stricken the \$4,000,000 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for BED 130 - Economic Planning and Research, designated in section 3, item K-4, on page 55, line 40, of the bill and changed it to \$0.

19. Stricken the \$33,333,334 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for BUF 101 - Departmental Administration and Budget Division, designated in section 3, item K-5, on page 56, line 8, of the bill and changed it to \$0.

20. Stricken the \$60,000 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for AGS 879 - Office of Elections, designated in section 3, item K-8, on page 56, line 34, of the bill and changed it to \$0.

21. Stricken the \$635,350 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for HRD 102 - Workforce Attraction, Selection, Classification, and Effectiveness, designated in section 3, item K-22, on page 59, line 40, of the bill and changed it to \$0.

22. Stricken the \$84,000 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for AGS 240 - State Procurement, designated in section 3, item K-37, on page 62, line 26, of the bill and changed it to \$0.

B. Items Funded by General Funds

23. Reduced the \$29,616,732 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by general funds, for AGR 141 - Agricultural Resource Management, designated in section 3, item A-13, on page 4, line 36, of the bill by \$23,000,000 and changed it to \$6,616,732 and reduced the \$26,000,000 in the proviso in section 6.1 of Act 88, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, as added by section 4(1) on page 64, line 6, of this bill, by \$22,500,000 and changed it to \$3,500,000.

24. Reduced the \$3,811,324 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by general funds, for AGR 161 - Agribusiness Development and Research, designated in section 3, item A-14, on page 5, line 10, of the bill by \$800,000 and changed it to \$3,011,324.

25. Reduced the \$51,680,292 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by general funds, for DEF 118 - Hawai'i Emergency Management Agency, designated in section 3, item 1-24, on page 51, line 20, of the bill by \$35,000,000 and changed it to \$16,680,292 and also stricken the \$35,000,000 in the proviso in section 18.3 of Act 88, Session Laws of

Hawaii 2021, as added by section 4(23) on page 81, line 17, of this bill and changed it to \$0.

C. Items Funded by General Obligation Bond Funds

26. Stricken the \$17,800,000 capital appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by general obligation bond funds, for BED 143 - Hawaii Technology Development Corporation, designated in section 3, item A-19, on page 6, line 33 of the bill and changed it to \$0, and in section 26, item A-12.01, of Act 88, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, as added by section 5 on page 92, line 40, of this bill and changed it to \$0.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 1600 with the appropriations stricken or reduced as described above totaling \$167,055,015 in American Rescue Plan funds, \$58,800,000 in general funds, and \$17,800,000 in general obligation bond funds.

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moneys from the appropriation that are unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date."

The original form of this bill was to appropriate moneys for capital improvement projects for the fiscal biennium 2021-2023. In Conference Draft 1, the bill was amended to delete the capital improvement projects and in its place, inserted operating appropriations for various State agencies. We note that this amendment does not fall outside the scope of the subject of the bill as expressed by its title, "Relating to the State Budget." However, this amendment fundamentally changes the original bill's general purpose, which was to appropriate moneys for capital improvement projects.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 1147 without my approval.

This bill is objectionable because it would significantly diminish one of the main purposes of the agricultural park program, which is to make affordable agricultural lands suitable for farming available to new farmers and other small farm operations to assist them in becoming commercially established. The existing maximum lease term incentivizes established farmers to expand their operations to larger properties and supports the growth of new farmers by making affordable lots available for lease. There are currently 243 interested farmers seeking to lease the State's limited agricultural park lands. The lease extension provided by this bill could potentially allow current lessees to remain on the land indefinitely through unlimited extensions in thirty-year increments, precluding others from having a fair opportunity to seek and enjoy this public benefit.

The purpose of this bill is to amend the procedure by which the Governor selects and appoints the representative of labor on the Hawaii Labor Relations Board (HLRB), which is composed of three members who represent management, labor, and the public. Section 89-5(b)(2), Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), currently allows the Governor to appoint the labor

representative from a list of three nominees submitted by mutual agreement from a majority of the exclusive representatives of the collective bargaining units.

This bill amends section 89-5(b)(2), HRS, to require the Governor to appoint the single nominee selected by a simple majority of the exclusive representatives of the collective bargaining units as the representative of labor on the HLRB. The bill also provides that if the Governor fails to appoint the person within twenty days after the exclusive representatives submit the name of the person to the Governor, then the exclusive representatives shall transmit the person's name directly to the Senate for confirmation.

This bill is objectionable because it is silent on whether or not the confirmation by the Senate effectuates an appointment without any further action by the Governor, creating ambiguity in the appointment process.

This bill is also objectionable because of the cost of a potential special session. This bill is silent on what would happen if a vacancy in the position of the representative of labor occurs when the Senate is not in session. For this provision to be implemented when the Legislature is not in session, when the exclusive representatives submit to the Governor their single nominee, the Governor either would have to convene a special session of the Senate or would have to make an interim appointment of the representative of labor pursuant to Section 6 of Article V of the Hawaii Constitution and submit that person's name for confirmation during the next session of the Senate.

Furthermore, this bill is objectionable because it diminishes the Governor's authority to select the labor representative to the HLRB by requiring the Governor to appoint the single nominee selected by the exclusive representative of the collective bargaining units instead of from a list of three nominees.

The purpose of this bill is to permit the State's Medicaid managed care and fee-for-services programs, health insurers, mutual benefit societies, and health maintenance organizations to cover telephonic behavioral health services when: (1) telehealth services are technologically unavailable at the time the patient is scheduled to receive a behavioral health service; (2) the behavioral health service is a medically necessary covered health care service; and (3) the health care provider has provided the patient with an in-person behavioral health service within the twelve months preceding the telephone service. Also, the bill clarifies that telephonic services do not constitute telehealth.

This bill is objectionable because there is a potential for a negative impact on the well-being of individuals who need behavioral health services. Although the bill clarifies when telephonic services may be covered, and provides guidance to health insurance providers, the final bill may be interpreted to strictly limit insurance coverage for telephonic services. Specifically, health insurance providers may use the provision to restrict or exclude coverage of telephonic services unless the service meets the three criteria listed in the bill, whereas the current law does not have a restriction. This bill would then have the unintended consequence of restricting access

to necessary behavioral health services, inconsistent with the goal of promoting continued broad access to behavioral health services for individuals in remote areas, or individuals without access to technology. Vetoing this bill will allow for additional discussion and clarification on a bill in the next session that would align with expanding access to behavioral health services, with a workable framework for health insurance providers.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 2424, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to Child Welfare Services."

The purposes of this bill are to expand the investigative powers and responsibilities of the Department of Human Services (OHS) Child Welfare Services Branch to include inspection of families who have adopted or taken guardianship of former foster children, establish a Malama Ohana working group to recommend transformative changes to the child welfare system, and appropriate funds for contracted services to support and monitor families receiving permanency assistance for former foster children.

This bill is objectionable because it seeks to monitor and investigate families that have adopted or taken guardianship of former foster children and who receive permanency assistance for that child, in ways that would violate the Constitutional rights of those families [*sic*]. The monitoring would include unlimited investigations of these families if at any time there had been a complaint filed with OHS about that family, without regard to the merits of the complaint, and regardless of whether or not the complaint was ever substantiated. These investigations would be allowed for the length of the child's minority, even when the Family Court found the legal relationship to be in the best interests of the child and approved the adoption or other permanent legal relationship between the child and the family. The objection is that this bill will expand the State's duties to monitor and interfere with permanent family relationships in a way that will violate the Constitutional [*sic*] rights of those families, without any evidence of harm or threatened harm to the child that is in the family. It would allow overreach by the State to interfere with safe, stable families, and allow the OHS to monitor and surveil families that have adopted or taken guardianship of former foster children, so that the families can never live free of government intrusion in their lives, a right which all other families take for granted.

Although the trauma experienced by the community over the loss of a former foster child is real and cannot be dismissed, the solution cannot and should not violate the constitutional privacy rights and basic dignity of every family that has taken in and provided love and stability to a former foster child. For example, the expanded authority to OHS could be used by a child's abusive biological parent to initiate unwarranted and repeated investigations of the child's new family, in an effort to disrupt the child's adoptive home, thereby preventing the child from ever feeling safe and stable in their new home.

In addition, the amendment of the bill in conference committee, without the opportunity to obtain public input, by adding a large, well-funded working group to recommend transformative changes to the child welfare system is subject to challenge. The working group would have twenty-one members and be co-chaired by two identified members who are vendors that contract with OHS to provide services to OHS clients. Another twelve members would be members of or be designated by one of these co-chairs. One co-chair would be the executive director of Effective Planning and

Innovative Communications, Inc. (EPIC 'Ohana) or their designee. The other co-chair would be the executive Officer of Hale Kipa, Inc., or their designee. Both EPIC 'Ohana and Hale Kipa, Inc. are vendors that contract with OHS to provide services to OHS clients.

Four members of the working group would be members of "Na Kama a Haloa", which is a program or project of EPIC 'Ohana. Eight members of the working group are meant to represent different constituencies of the Child Welfare Services branch including foster youth, birth parents, and resource caregivers. All eight of those members would be identified by Na Kama a Haloa. In total, thirteen of twenty-one members of the working group would include five members who are part of Epic 'Ohana, including a co-chair, and an additional eight members who are identified by Epic 'Ohana or its associated program, Na Kama a Haloa.

Having two-thirds of the working group comprised of contracted vendors or their designees is especially problematic because the bill specifically exempts the members of the working group from chapter 84, HRS. Chapter 84, HRS, creates standards of conduct that are normally in place to prevent conflicts of interest and promote public transparency and accountability. This means that the majority of the working group, who will be making recommendations about the services OHS provides to its clients will have a current financial interest in the provision of those services, and will be exempted from the ethics standards that prohibit financial conflicts of interest.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 2424 without my approval.

The purpose of this bill is to create stronger economic incentives for new taro farmers, improve the livelihoods of existing taro farmers, and reduce the cost of poi for local residents.

This bill is objectionable because it is not an effective way to achieve the bill's purpose of helping taro farmers by lowering cultivation and production costs through the proposed exemption as a way to reduce the cost of poi for local consumers. The bill's exemption would not apply to "bulk buyers or shippers of raw or value-added taro products, supermarkets, or big box stores" (see bill at page 5, lines 10-12). This was apparently to limit the exemption to taro farmers in the cultivation and production of unprocessed taro, and not to allow retailers and wholesalers to claim the exemption on retail sales of poi and taro products. However, the wording of the bill will still allow certain retail sellers such as drug stores, convenience stores, and restaurants to also claim the exemption from a general excise tax (GET). The exemption will give these retailers a commercial advantage over supermarkets and big box stores that are not entitled to claim the exemption. A more effective way to help taro farmers and avoid the unintended tax benefit to just certain retailers, would be through the provision of direct grants to taro farmers as opposed to the GET exemption in this bill.

Section 5 of Act 116 specified that the authorization to issue the subject special purpose revenue bonds would expire on June 30, 2022, five years later. Section 39A-317, which is in part X of chapter 39A, provides that "no authorization shall be made for a period exceeding five years of its enactment." This bill attempts to extend the bond authorization lapse date beyond five years in violation of section 39A-317, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

This bill requires direct-to-consumer genetic testing companies to adhere to certain requirements pertaining to the collection, use, and disclosure of genetic data.

This bill is objectionable because while the bill's purpose to protect the consumers' privacy and confidentiality is admirable, the enforcement mechanism provided in the bill appears to be problematic. Specifically, the bill requires the Office of Consumer Protection (OCP) to bring actions to enforce violations through the Attorney General, thereby depriving OCP of its independent authority under section 487-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), to initiate actions for the violation of laws enacted for the purpose of consumer protection. In addition, it is not clear whether a consumer would retain the right to file a claim for an unfair and deceptive trade practice under chapter 480, HRS, for a violation of the prohibitions or requirements set forth in the bill. The lack of clarity may inadvertently and undesirably deter consumers from filing their own claims against direct-to-consumer genetic testing companies under chapter 480, HRS.

The purposes of this bill are to (1) allow Department of Education students to fulfill graduation requirements by taking world language, fine arts, career and technical education, or computer science courses; (2) establish a scholarship at the University of Hawaii to encourage students majoring in education to take a computer science course; (3) require the University of Hawaii to establish computer science pathways for students majoring in education; (4) require teacher licensing and certification to include computer science; and (5) appropriate funds for the computer science in teaching scholarship program at the University of Hawaii.

This bill is objectionable because it imposes a new admissions requirement on the University of Hawaii (UH), which will be applicable to all campuses. As written, this bill would require that applicants for admission have successfully completed a world language, fine arts, career and technical education, or computer science class. This requirement would effectively preclude many adults from entering the UH Community College

system. Approximately one-third of all community college applicants are over the age of 25 and would not have met the proposed admissions requirement. In addition, UH's Community Colleges work hard to provide opportunities to those who did not complete high school. The new admissions requirement set forth in this bill would create a barrier to public higher education that could impact thousands of potential adult learners.

Furthermore, this bill diminishes the power of the Board of Education (BOE) to formulate statewide educational policy, as established by Section 3 of Article X of the Hawai'i Constitution. The BOE already has a policy regarding high school graduation requirements; under the constitution, any revisions to those requirements should be made by the BOE, and not by the Legislature.

The purpose of this bill is to amend section 11-118.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to provide that a constitutional ratification question printed on a ballot must be "simple, concise, and direct to the extent practicable." This bill also amends section 602-5(a), Hawaii Revised Statutes, to authorize the Hawai'i Supreme Court to issue, upon a written request by the Senate President and/or the Speaker of the House of Representatives, a written opinion (1) stating whether a proposed constitutional amendment and the corresponding constitutional ratification question are "simple, concise, and direct to the extent practicable" and (2) if they are not, providing a detailed and specific explanation of the reasons for the court's conclusion. The Supreme Court is to respond within fifteen days of the date of the written request and its opinion shall not be appealable.

This bill is objectionable because it raises a separation of powers issue with respect to the Legislature and the Judiciary. *See Schwab v. Ariyoshi*, 58 Haw. 25, 564 P.2d 135 (1977) (the doctrine of separation of powers prohibits any branch of government from unduly interfering with the constitutional functions of the other branches). Also, this bill is objectionable because it authorizes the presiding officers of the Legislature to request that the Hawaii Supreme Court issue an improper advisory opinion (1) stating whether a proposed constitutional amendment and the corresponding constitutional ratification question are "simple, concise, and direct to the extent practicable" and (2) if they are not, providing a detailed explanation of the reasons for the court's conclusion. Advisory opinions generally do not have a detailed factual record or the benefit of prior legal analysis or advocacy from adverse interests regarding the issues that a proposed constitutional amendment often presents. Further, insofar as this bill requires that the Supreme Court respond to the Legislature within fifteen days of the Legislature's written request, it does not afford the Supreme Court with reasonable time to fully consider and research a proposed amendment and issue its opinion, which will not be appealable.

The purposes of this bill are to diversify the State's renewable energy profile and reduce the State's reliance on fossil fuels by requiring (1) the Office of Planning and Sustainable Development (OPSD) to update the state energy plan; and (2) to amend the economy and energy plans in the Hawaii State Planning Act to, among other things, require a minimum of 33.33 percent of renewable energy to be generated by firm renewable generation on each island, and to limit the percentage of any one type of renewable energy source to 45 percent of all generation for each island, except for geothermal energy. The bill provides that the percentages may be updated by concurrent resolution.

This bill is objectionable because without robust factual support or comprehensive cost analysis it prematurely establishes arbitrary percentages that will render at least the County of Kauai out of compliance due to that county's advancements in promoting solar energy. Fixing numerical limits that do not consider the different circumstances on each island is problematic. The bill also pits different renewable technologies against each other based upon a dichotomy between firm and intermittent energy sources that is becoming obsolete. As a result, it imposes additional regulatory obstacles that may impede opportunities to find a more cost-effective mix of renewable technologies or to develop new innovative technologies that do not fall within the definition of firm power. The attached "Summary: Estimated current compliance with the requirements of SB2510, by island" summarizes some of my concerns.

Additionally, the bill appears to supersede a Public Utility Commission's stakeholder-based process to update energy-efficiency portfolio standard framework, which has been in effect since 2012, in favor of a new process with OPSD as the single decision-maker and an appeal to the Governor's Office. In addition, the bill misuses chapter 226, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), which function is to establish state goals and objectives, in an effort to create a regulatory scheme that would be more appropriately created through chapter 269, HRS, which currently provides a statutory framework for renewable portfolio standards.

Further, Section 14 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i states in relevant part: "[n]o law shall be passed except by bill." An amendment to statutory provisions is a law that requires the passage of a bill. Accordingly, an attempt to amend provisions in the bill by adoption of a concurrent resolution would likely be found legally invalid for not meeting the requirement under Section 14 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i.

The purposes of this bill are to expand the Renewable Energy Technologies Income Tax Credit (RETITC) to include new categories of renewable energy technology systems that are eligible for the RETITC and to impose caps on the amount of credit that may be claimed by a taxpayer and the total amount of tax credits for certain renewable energy technology systems that may be claimed in a taxable year. The bill would apply to taxable years after December 31, 2021.

This bill is objectionable for several reasons. First, this bill has a significant administrative flaw in that it creates an aggregate \$20 million cap without designating a certifying agency to ensure that the aggregate cap is not exceeded. Further, the bill requires tax credits to be prorated if the cap is exceeded, but because the tax credits are processed when received, taxpayer's claims for credit after the cap is exceeded will have to be denied, prorated, or adjusted due to the aggregate cap having been exceeded, and those taxpayers may incur a tax liability with penalties and interest. The uncertainty about whether a credit will actually be available when claimed could have a chilling effect on the willingness of the public to install new renewable energy systems. Second, while the measure attempts to define what a "system" is for purposes of calculating the credit, the Department of Taxation has indicated a problem with calculating the allowable credit for "storage systems" because it is to be calculated based on output as opposed to storage capacity. Finally, even though the bill's intention appears to incentivize installation of firm renewable energy systems and long-duration renewable energy storage systems, it retroactively applies to the entire tax year of 2022. As a result, the bill would allow a taxpayer who already installed a renewable energy technology system before the enactment of this bill to also receive the tax credit, thus failing to incentivize installation of additional systems.

The purpose of this bill is to amend sections 208 and 209 of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act, 1920 (HHCA), to prohibit a lessee of, or successor to, a Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) homestead lease who has sold or transferred the interest in the lease for personal gain, from being placed on any waiting list maintained by DHHL for an award of a homestead lease under section 207, HHCA.

This bill is objectionable because data collected by DHHL indicate that less than one-half of one percent of pastoral and agricultural homestead applications, and less than four percent of residential homestead applications, were submitted by beneficiaries who previously held a lease, and the majority of those were made to a family member without remuneration. Only a small number of applicants had transferred their lease for a fee or other personal gain and then applied for a subsequent lease. The bill therefore would not have an appreciable impact on other waiting list applicants' ability to receive homestead lease awards. The additional restrictions imposed by this bill could have unintended consequences for other beneficiaries. Further, DHHL's administrative rules already prioritize for new lease awards, those applicants who have not previously held homestead leases.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 2623 without my approval.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 2707, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to Collective Bargaining."

The purposes of this bill are to require the employer to initiate negotiations on repricing of classes within a bargaining unit within thirty days of the employer's receipt of the exclusive representative's written request to negotiate and to establish that an employer's failure to initiate the requested negotiations within such time frame or the parties' failure to reach an agreement within ninety days of the exclusive representative's written request to negotiate or by January 31 of a year in which the collective bargaining agreement is due to expire, whichever is earlier, constitutes an impasse to which the impasse procedures in section 89-11, Hawai'i [sic] Revised Statutes (HRS), shall apply.

This bill is objectionable because it creates a very short timeline within which to negotiate and agree on repricing. Because repricing is a highly technical and often contentious matter, this bill may result in inability to reach agreement within the new timelines, thus necessitating a resolution of an impasse by an arbitration panel. Mandating unresolved repricing requests to the impasse procedures would jeopardize an employer's ability to create and maintain a pay structure and pay relationships that are equitable for all classes of work by evaluating jobs based on a consistent set of criteria. If multiple arbitration panels make repricing determinations, there will no longer be a consistent application of repricing criteria.

This bill undermines the current classification and pricing system, eliminates the employer's discretion in repricing matters, and will lead to costly arbitration. An arbitration panel, which might lack the necessary repricing expertise, could render a decision that could impact not only the classes of work for which negotiations had been demanded, but could also impact other related classes of work, thereby significantly altering and potentially weakening the current system of job evaluation and pricing relationships.

The existing negotiated repricing process already provides the unions with the opportunity to submit negotiated repricing requests, and they can also choose to submit these requests to arbitration in accordance with section 89-11, HRS, in its current form without this bill.

Additionally, while current impasse procedures under chapter 89, HRS, are lengthy, expensive, and unpredictable, they only occur every few years. Such would not be the case with this bill.

Finally, the bill is not clear on when the repricing requests may be submitted, or who would pay any additional arbitrator's fees.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 2707 without my approval.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 2824, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to the Board of Education."

The purpose of this bill is to amend the minimum qualifications for Board of Education nominees. The bill amends section 302A-126, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to (1) add a new qualification relating to relevant experience - i.e., that "the board collectively shall have knowledge, experience, and proven expertise in as many of the following fields as possible, including education, workforce development, critical industries to the State, emerging fields, energy, advanced manufacturing, health care, business, technology, entrepreneurship, real estate, finance, or organizational management[;]" and (2) clarify that the understanding of best practices, one of the existing minimum qualifications, should come through "organizations such as the National Association of State Boards of Education or similar organizations[.]"

This bill is objectionable because it poses a threat of corporatizing public education, undermining deeper public educational goals, and devaluing professional expertise in education and childhood development. Industry-track academies and Career and Technical Education programs are already present and thriving in our public schools, due to collaboration between educators and the private sector. These programs demonstrate that workforce development does not require changing the professional composition of the Board of Education (BOE). Section 3 of article X of the Hawaii Constitution provides, in pertinent part, that the BOE "shall have the power, as provided by law, to formulate statewide educational policy[.]" Decisions about Hawaii's education system should be made by professionals with experience and expertise in developing life-long learners. I believe that diversifying the BOE is important in creating a statewide school governance structure, but the diversity of backgrounds in this bill is unbalanced and does not include other important backgrounds such as culture, arts, international education, parents, and even student representation. Additionally, experts in the private sector fields referenced in this bill may not have the experience and expertise needed to make nuanced policy decisions around standards, curriculum-development, and teacher training.

Furthermore, this bill undermines the autonomy and decision-making power of this office. The bill requires the BOE to collectively have knowledge, experience, and proven expertise for thirteen areas, where only eleven positions are available. Education is only one of the thirteen areas listed in the bill; the other twelve areas of expertise are corporate-focused and unrelated to the oversight of a statewide public education system. Compliance with this bill would virtually guarantee that educational experts will be far outnumbered in the BOE's composition and could be excluded from consideration for appointment altogether.

The purpose of this bill is to create a Healthy Soils Program (Program) to improve soil health and increase carbon sequestration. It requires the Department of Agriculture (Department) to: (1) create a statewide soil health assessment; (2) provide farmers with education and technical assistance; (3) establish standards that apply to the Program; and (4) subject to available funding, issue financial incentives to implement farm management practices.

This bill is objectionable because the Department does not possess the elements of a science-based soil management and education program. The bill does not provide the resources or guidance to create what would amount to a new division within the Department. Senate Bill No. 2056, which this Legislature passed in the 2022 Legislative Session, and which I enacted as Act 189, requires the Office of Planning and Sustainable Development, along with the Department, to undertake a soil classification study for the future regulation of agricultural lands. That study should be completed before a bill such as this is enacted. In addition, improving the capacity of existing programs such as the Greenhouse Gas Sequestration Task Force, which was established by Act 15, Session Laws of Hawaii 2018, and the initiation of the Hawaii Carbon Smart Land Management Assistance Pilot program in Senate Bill No. 3325, which this Legislature also passed this session, and which I enacted as Act 185, will lead to better outcomes.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 3089, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to Emergency Management."

The purpose of this bill is to amend chapter 127A, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), to: (1) clarify that powers granted for emergency purposes shall not be construed as permitting actions inconsistent with the State Constitution; (2) provide for greater clarity and specificity regarding the scope of suspensions of law; (3) require that Hawaii's emergency management system include coordination between state and county emergency management functions, where appropriate; (4) add the definition of the term "severe warning" in section 127A-30, HRS; (5) authorize the Legislature, by an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, to terminate a state of emergency, in part or in whole, declared by the Governor, but to also authorize the Governor to re-declare the existence of a state of emergency that has been terminated; and (6) clarify the legal framework governing the extension and termination of emergency periods.

This bill is objectionable because a premature termination of a state of emergency will create an impossible situation where county mayors will have to rely on their limited emergency powers to respond to an emergency without State assistance. This latter situation, if allowed, could jeopardize federal assistance, which generally requires the State to provide assistance before counties receive federal assistance. Additionally, because the county mayors lack the authority to suspend state laws, their emergency responses during a local state of emergency are still confined by state laws, including the laws that regulate driver's license expiration dates and gun registration deadlines. A gubernatorial state of emergency needs to be in place to suspend state laws that may affect counties' ability to effectively respond to emergencies. A premature termination of a state of emergency may significantly impede counties' emergency management capabilities.

The authority given to the Legislature in the bill to terminate a state of emergency would severely interfere with the Governor's duties and legal obligations to provide for the public health, safety, and welfare by limiting the Governor's ability to determine the duration of a state of emergency or disaster within the State if the circumstances giving rise to the state of emergency continue.

The purposes of this bill are to (1) require any electronic audio or visual recording of a board meeting to be maintained indefinitely as a public record on the board's website or an appropriate State or county website, even if written minutes of the meeting are posted; (2) require that the written minutes contain time stamps linked to the recording, if the meeting was recorded; and (3) repeal the option for boards to provide recordings with accompanying written summaries with time stamps in lieu of written minutes.

This bill is objectionable because it ultimately reduces public access to timely information regarding board actions by eliminating the incentive, under current law, for boards to record their meetings. Under current law, if a board records its meeting, it has the option to post the recording together with a document summarizing the meeting discussions and containing time-stamps for each discussion item, or the board can prepare and post written minutes. If the board records the meeting to aid in the preparation of written minutes, the board is not required to retain the recording once the written minutes are posted.

Recordings consume considerable data storage space and most boards share a limited amount of data storage space on their department's website. This bill would require a board to maintain the recordings indefinitely, make the recordings publicly available on the board's website, and would also require the board to prepare and post written minutes containing time stamps linked to the recordings. The new requirements under this bill would discourage rather than incentivize boards to record their meetings. The unintended result of this bill would be delays in posting of written minutes, particularly for boards with a small staff or for boards with no staff and only volunteers.

Finally, this bill is an unfunded mandate as it will result in increased personnel costs to comply with the new requirements, increased data storage and website configuration expenses to store all the recordings indefinitely,

and the potential for increased litigation expenses relating to the indefinite period of the recording retention requirement as well as accessibility claims under the Americans with Disabilities Act about the format of the recordings posted on State websites. These anticipated increased agency costs were not funded in this bill.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 3172 without my approval.

This bill has an effective date of January 1, 2023; provided that, if this bill becomes an act, on December 31, 2027, the act shall be repealed and section 237-23, Hawaii Revised Statutes, shall be reenacted in its previous form.

This bill is objectionable because it may lead to undesirable consequences that go beyond the intended purpose of the bill, which is solely to exempt certain nonprofit organization fundraising income from the general excise tax (GET). The Department of Taxation notes that the bill will have the unintended consequence of making certain types of income currently exempt from the GET, such as passive income, subject to tax. Thus, enacting this bill would negatively impact the general public, public entities, and nonprofit organizations.

Moreover, the Department of Taxation estimates that this measure will result in a general fund decrease of \$1,400,000 in fiscal year 2022-2023; \$3,500,000 in fiscal year 2023-2024; \$3,600,000 in fiscal year 2024-2025; \$3,600,000 in fiscal year 2025-2026; \$3,700,000 in fiscal year 2026-2027; and \$3,800,000 in fiscal year 2027-2028.

This bill is objectionable because it will have a significant adverse impact upon government agency operations. The full waiver of search, review and segregation fees for virtually all records requests acts as a disincentive for records requesters to narrow the scope of their requests, thus resulting in the consequential increase in overbroad requests. Agencies, the majority of whom do not have dedicated personnel responding to records requests, will be vulnerable to UIPA lawsuits, which will increase costs to government agencies through awards of attorneys' fees and costs to plaintiffs filing those lawsuits. As a result, agencies may be forced to prioritize responding to records requests over the agencies' primary functions. Eleven government agencies testified with concerns or in opposition to this bill due to the adverse effects of the waiver of search/review and segregation fees upon agencies.

Furthermore, there is no funding allocated to lead these working groups, support their work, and produce annual reports to the Hawaii Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation Commission. Neither the Department of Transportation nor the Hawaii State Energy Office has the additional resources to support these working groups. Implementation of this bill will have a negative fiscal impact on these agencies.

The bill does not contain any standards and the Hawaii Wing - Civil Air Patrol is ineligible for a grant under the standards for grants made to private organizations by the Legislature in chapter 42F, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), as there is no record of the Hawaii Wing - Civil Air Patrol having applied to the Legislature for a grant, and it is not incorporated under the laws of the State. Even if the Legislature intended for the Department of Defense to procure the services by contract, it does not appear that any exception to the requirements of chapter 1030, HRS, exist under these circumstances.
