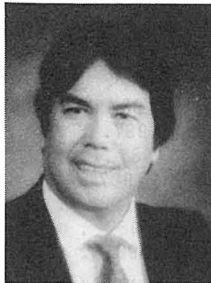

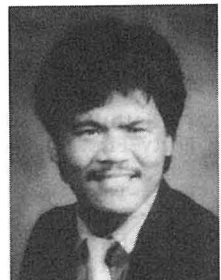

FIRST DAY

Wednesday, January 21, 1987

In accordance with the provisions of Section 10 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, the Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, was called to order at 10:00 o'clock a.m., Wednesday, January 21, 1987, by the Honorable Richard S.H. Wong, Temporary Chairman of the Senate.

The members of the Senate and audience then rose for the National Anthem and "Hawaii Pono!" sung by the Kamehameha Schools Glee Club.

The Temporary Chairman then appointed Senators Nakasato, J. Wong and Ikeda to escort Father Robert J. O'Donnell, Associate Pastor of St. Philomena Church, Honolulu, to the dais for the invocation.

The Senators escorted Father O'Donnell to the dais and were discharged with thanks.

The Divine Blessing was then invoked by Father O'Donnell.

Nominations now being in order for a temporary clerk, Senator Yamasaki nominated T. David Woo Jr., seconded by Senator McMurdo.

On motion by Senator Fernandes Salling, seconded by Senator Chang and carried, the nominations were closed and T. David Woo Jr. was appointed as Temporary Clerk of the Senate.

MESSAGES FROM THE GOVERNOR

The following messages from the Governor (Gov. Msg. Nos. 1 and 2) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

Gov. Msg. No. 1, informing the Senate that he appointed Donna R. Ikeda to the Senate to fill the vacancy of W. Buddy Soares, effective December 26, 1986, and pursuant to Sec. 17-3, HRS, Representative Ikeda shall succeed and complete the term of Senator Soares as State Senator from the Eleventh Senatorial District in the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, was referred to the Committee on Credentials.

Gov. Msg. No. 2, informing the Senate that he appointed James K. Wong to the Senate to fill the vacancy of Charles T. Toguchi, effective January 20, 1987, and pursuant to Sec. 17-3(1), HRS, Representative Wong's term will expire on General Election Day of 1988, was referred to the Committee on Credentials.

Senator Hagino then moved that a Committee of three be appointed by the Chair as a Committee on Credentials to examine the certificates of election of the newly elected members of the Senate and to submit a report of its findings to the Senate, seconded by Senator Aki.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried and Senators Young, Hagino and George were thereupon appointed by the Chair to serve on the Committee on Credentials.

At 10:20 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 10:23 o'clock a.m.

Senator Young moved that Special Committee Report No. 1 be adopted, seconded by Senator George and carried.

The Committee was thereupon discharged

with thanks.

At this time, the Chair recognized Senator Cobb who rose to remark:

"Mr. Chairman, I note we now have two Senator Kobayashis and two Senator Wongs in the Senate but please remember, two 'Wongs' don't make a right."

The Temporary Chairman then appointed Senators Blair, Menor and Reed to escort Chief Justice Herman T.F. Lum of the Hawaii Supreme Court to the dais to administer the oath of office to the newly elected members of the Senate.

The Senators escorted Chief Justice Lum to the dais and were thereupon discharged with thanks. .

Chief Justice Lum then administered the oath of office to the newly elected members of the Senate, standing at their respective desks.

At this time, the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

Nominations of officers of the Senate being next in order, Senator Cobb placed in nomination the name of Senator Richard S.H. Wong as President of the Senate, seconded by Senator Henderson.

Senator Kuroda then moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator Mizuguchi. The motion to close the nominations was put by the Chair and carried unanimously, and the Temporary Clerk was directed to cast a unanimous ballot for Senator R. Wong as President of the Senate.

The ballot having been so cast, Senator R. Wong was declared unanimously elected as President of the Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987.

At this time, the President welcomed and introduced the following distinguished guests to the members of the Senate and guests:

Governor John Waihee and Mrs. Lynne Waihee;

Former Governor George R. Ariyoshi and Mrs. Jean Ariyoshi; and

Lt. Governor Benjamin J. Cayetano and Mrs. Lorraine Cayetano.

The President then addressed the members of the Senate and guests as follows:

"Governor Waihee, Lt. Governor Cayetano, Chief Justice Lum, distinguished

guests, members of the Senate, ladies and gentlemen — good morning and aloha to you.

"My fellow Senators, once again you have honored me by selecting me to be President of this honorable body. To you, my deepest mahalo. You have my pledge that I will do my best to merit the faith and confidence that you have placed in me.

"As I look about me in these chambers today, I feel a powerful sense of the change of times. This is the first time since I have been in the Senate that there has been a new governor of the State of Hawaii. Governor John Waihee represents a new generation coming into political maturity. Welcome, governor. I am sure I speak for all the Senators in saying that we look forward to working with you and your administration during the coming session.

"Reflecting again on the change of times, I note the changes taking place right here in this body. Of the Senators that I served together with when I first came to the Senate, there are only six of us remaining.

"Today, we are welcoming that same number of new members to this honorable body. I know today is a day of special pride and happiness for our new colleagues and for their families. I would like to extend special recognition to them. I am going to ask them to stand so everybody can see what a good-looking new group of Senators we have. Ladies and gentlemen, may I present Senator Russell Blair, Senator Donna Ikeda, Senator Ron Menor, Senator Dennis Nakasato, Senator Rick Reed and Senator Jimmy Wong. Senators, welcome to the Senate. We know you want to be full participants and contributors in the workings of this body. We will certainly give you every opportunity to do just that.

"As Senate President, I am expected to outline what I perceive as some of the major issues before the current legislative session. Everyone expects me to put in a word for my pet bill, the lottery, so I will just mention it now so you know I have not forgotten. Now that that's done, let's go on to those issues that will be taking up much of our attention this year:

- First, action on upgrading our educational system is certainly a major priority for this year. We will give priority to meeting the needs of the individual school. We want resources to reach the teachers and students of the individual school and to help make each school a better environment where teaching and learning flourish. We will also review what progress has been made to implement educational reform in response to what the National Commission on Excellence in

Education has recommended. We will encourage and support school reform proposals in pursuit of the goal of developing our children to their highest educational potential.

- Second, the impact of the federal tax reform on our own state tax system needs to be addressed; additionally, we need to decide on the utilization of the revenues from the hotel room tax which has just gone into effect; the fiscal constraints which had restricted the state's actions over the last several years have eased and we can now give some consideration to new and innovative programs to meet the needs of our people.
- Third, a review of our corrections system, with the possibility of a new administrative department for this very critical area will occupy an important part of our agenda.
- Fourth, strengthening the role of the Health Department -- both in the delivery of health care and in the environmental protection area -- will have to be addressed by the Legislature over the coming weeks; additionally, I would like to see some thought given to the very serious catastrophic illness problem which confronts many of our people and their families.
- Fifth, the advancement of Hawaii's economy, in terms of creating jobs, promoting business and trade, and strengthening Hawaii's international role will, I expect, be a major area of focus; I fully expect a lot of attention will be devoted during the session to the concerns of business and the improvement of Hawaii's business climate.
- Sixth, Hawaii's role as an island state in the middle of one of the world's great resources, the Pacific Ocean, has the potential for great advances. We need to work aggressively to realize that potential.

"I believe that Hawaii's role in the Pacific community — in terms of trade, cultural interchange, telecommunications, fisheries, ocean technology and development — needs to be nurtured and developed. Hawaii is in a very advantageous position to capitalize on regional trading possibilities with U.S. Senator Spark Matsunaga now chairing the key Finance Subcommittee on International Trade. We should actively work together with him to promote Hawaii's future. The Pacific community is where our future lies.

"I am pleased that many of my fellow legislators share my dream for Hawaii and

the Pacific. In the next several weeks and months, the Legislature will be moving forward to advance Hawaii's leadership role in the Pacific Region. We are strengthening our ties with legislators from our fellow American-flag island neighbors — American Samoa, Guam and the Northern Marianas. We are working together with the West Coast states — Alaska, California, Oregon and Washington — on ocean issues of mutual concern.

"The Western Legislative Conference, comprised of legislators from the entire Western Region — 16 states and territories in all — will be meeting here this September and the conference program — which we are helping to prepare — will concentrate heavily on ocean resource and Pacific regional issues. Over 500 delegates are expected to attend — state legislators, government officials and business leaders.

"I see the conference as our opportunity to showcase Hawaii's role in ocean and Pacific regional affairs. It will be more than just another convention. It will be a catalyst for change, for Hawaii to move forward and demonstrate leadership and initiative. Hopefully, this will strengthen our state's chances for leadership in both the Pacific and Western Regions and for being on the leading edge of the vast changes — technological, cultural, economic, social and political — which are coming in the Pacific.

"Very shortly, I expect to appoint a special committee to work together with the House to prepare for this important conference. The Legislature has already been devoting much time and effort in preparing for this conference over the last two years. There is much work yet to be done and we need to proceed ahead. The committee is charged with making sure the conference is a success.

"The age of the Pacific is fast approaching and I am extremely excited about the possibilities and the potentialities. I had mentioned my interest in this area at this time last year and I am gratified at the advances which have been made just in the past year — with foreign language education in the schools, with programs at the university for international careers, with research and development activities, a notable internationally-recognized example being at Keahole.

"These are very exciting times here at the Legislature. The momentum for Pacific regional development and for ocean resources looks very promising. I am really looking forward to even further advances during the coming session.

"With these new developments, and with

the new governor and new administration, the sense of change that I feel will, hopefully, become a reality.

"Hawaii has firmly moved into the era of the 1980's now and firmly moving towards the 21st century.

"There is a new age, a new time. The time is right for change. I am reminded of the words from Ecclesiastes:

'To everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven:

A time to be born, and a time to die;

A time to plant, and a time to pluck up that which is planted;

A time to kill, and a time to heal;

A time to break down, and a time to build up;

A time to weep, and a time to laugh;

A time to mourn, and a time to dance;

A time to cast away stones, and a time to gather stones together;

A time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing;

A time to get, and a time to lose;

A time to keep, and a time to cast away;

A time to rend, and a time to sew;

A time to keep silence, and a time to speak;

A time to love, and a time to hate;

A time of war, and a time of peace.'

"To everything there is a season, and we are entering into a time for change — a time for bringing on the new and moving away from the old.

"A new governor, a new spirit, a new legislature, a new time — let's get them all together to accelerate and direct the change.

"Again, mahalo and aloha."

Senator Henderson, Minority Leader, then responded as follows:

"Governor and Mrs. Waihee, Lt. Governor Cayetano and Mrs. Cayetano, Chief Justice Lum, former Governor and Mrs. Ariyoshi, Mr. President, distinguished guests, fellow Senators, ladies and gentlemen.

"I have been a member of this Legislature for 16 years, and I am still moved by the ceremonies of the opening day. It marks the beginning of a sixty-day period, where we gather for the purpose of discussion and deliberation, to deal with new problems and solve old ones.

"In preparing my remarks for today, I went back into the Senate Journals and looked up some of my previous opening day speeches. It seems as if each year I speak on the same issues, and I fear that my comments are beginning to sound recycled. However, there is hope, because this year, our new governor has expressed some of the same concerns, and it looks like we're going to get executive support on these matters we have long advocated.

"For example, for years we have introduced bills calling for tax reform. Now, with the passage of the Federal Tax Reform Act of 1986, we are forced to examine and restructure our income tax brackets and rates which have not been changed since the mid-1960's. Without affecting the fiscal soundness of our state, we must strive to provide our citizens with equity and fairness in our state tax structure. We also support the governor's belief that there should be a repeal of the general excise tax on food. Two weeks ago, Time magazine ran an article which included Hawaii as one of the highest taxing states in the country. This is a situation which must be corrected.

"Attention to taxes does not end here. The transient accommodations tax requires earmarking provisions. We support the administration's belief that part of the revenues be returned to the industry. Specifically, we propose that they be earmarked for the HVB, but we also propose provisions which would include a division of the proceeds between the convention center and the counties. After all, the convention center was the original impetus for the tax, and that is where a good part of these revenues belong.

"In addition, Hawaii continues to receive negative publicity for its poor business climate. In order to attract new businesses to the state and to foster the viability of existing ones, this perception must be overcome.

"It is gratifying that Governor Waihee has recognized this problem and has espoused the idea of exempting capital and exported goods from the general excise tax. We would also recommend that an exemption for transactions between affiliated corporations be included in order that businesses not be penalized for operating in a certain form.

"Our business climate would also benefit

if we finally close the book on workers' compensation. If you look at the numbers on frequency and benefit levels nationwide, you will see that Hawaii suffers from the highest frequency rates in the country, but average or lower benefit levels. Our costs are high because our frequency is high. The solution is to decrease our frequency levels so that we can increase the benefits.

"We will also continue to support tort reform. Specifically, the abolishment of joint and several liability except in cases of collusion or joint action. We feel that the return to a system based on fault is essential to controlling the rising insurance costs which burden our businesses in the state.

"Last year, we created a form of alternate disputes resolution in an effort to alleviate the problems faced by our overburdened courts. No less an authority than Warren Burger, former Chief Justice of the United States has said:

'Our system is too costly, too painful, too destructive and too inefficient for a truly civilized society. To continue to use the adversarial process for the resolution of conflicting claims is a mistake -- that is his word -- a mistake -- that simply must be corrected.'

"While we recognize the importance of the judicial process, we strongly feel that serious consideration be given to expanding the use of alternate methods of dispute resolution.

"Tort reform, in and of itself, is not adequate without effective insurance regulation. We need to provide the insurance commissioner with adequate staffing and equipment to do his job. New York State, for example, appropriates \$41 million a year to its commissioner's office. Texas has a budget of \$37 million. In contrast, our insurance commissioner is funded at \$1.3 million and does not even have a full-time actuary. It is clear that the funding and staffing is inadequate, making it difficult, if not impossible, for the commissioner to carry out his duties effectively.

"A good business climate is essential for our islands' economic development. It will attract a greater quantity and quality of businesses, providing us with a more diversified economic base. In addition, it will create more jobs for our children.

"In order to secure our children's futures, we also have to improve the quality of our education. This requires two things: good teachers and a good educational system.

"First, to obtain good teachers, we have to offer them better pay, and we support

the governor's proposal to substantially increase teachers' salaries.

"Second, a system based at the district level is best equipped to educate our students and respond to their needs. Decentralization of the school system will bring money out of the bureaucracy and into the classroom.

"As we place emphasis on our youth, let us not forget our elderly who also require greater consideration by this Legislature. Our older citizens are finding it more difficult to obtain long-term health care, and too often the financial burden of long-term care is an economic disaster. Already on fixed incomes, and especially vulnerable to inflation, these citizens must be protected against any unforeseen costs. It is tragic that people who have worked hard all of their lives preparing for their retirement cannot be provided with greater protection. It is clearly our responsibility to deal with this issue.

"During the past campaign, Governor Waihee stated that he supports establishing a separate department of corrections. This has been a long standing position of our caucus, and we are hoping that this year it will become a reality. Corrections is a major operation, and it needs to be removed from the Department of Social Services and Housing.

"We will also continue to support home rule proposals. Each county should be given greater roles in land use, water regulation, and development. In addition, the counties require additional monies. The real property tax is no longer an adequate source of funding. This session we need to examine various methods for giving the counties different means to collect revenues. These include: transferring general excise tax revenues from the construction activities of resort projects to the counties where the projects are located; earmarking a portion of the transient accommodations tax for the counties; and, certainly, eliminating the general excise tax on the sale of goods and services to the counties.

"Finally, we cannot forget our environment. What do we think when we think of Hawaii? We think of beautiful beaches and parks, which makes this state such an attractive place to live in and visit. Hawaii, however, suffers from litter problems. On our shorelines, in our water, on our streets and in our parks, empty bottles, cans, and food containers are discarded by careless and irresponsible people. Unless we begin a program of litter control, our beautiful paradise will turn into a garbage dump.

"In the past, Governor Waihee has stated that the day after the elections there will

be no partisan politics — and that, my friends, is as it should be. All of us here are legislators representing the people of this state. Naturally, we will disagree on various issues because we all represent different segments of the community. This is part of the process of a representative democracy. But the bottom line is that we need to do what is good for our beautiful state, for its people, and for its businesses.

"Mr. President, we, the members of the Minority, pledge our support towards the achievement of this goal. Let us go to work, so that in April, when we leave this Capitol, we can say we came here to do a job, and we did it well.

"Mahalo and aloha."

At 10:52 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:37 o'clock a.m.

The President, at this time, announced that nominations were in order for the office of Vice President of the Senate.

Senator Solomon then placed in nomination the name of Senator Patsy K. Young as Vice President of the Senate, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi.

Senator Holt moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator Matsuura.

The motion to close the nominations was put by the Chair and carried unanimously, and the Temporary Clerk was directed to cast a unanimous ballot for Senator Patsy K. Young as Vice President of the Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987.

SENATE RESOLUTION

A resolution (S.R. No. 1) pertaining to the election of officers of the Senate was offered by Senators Hagino and Henderson, and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Senator B. Kobayashi, seconded by Senator Henderson and carried, S.R. No. 1 was adopted.

The President then administered the oath of office to the elected officers of the Senate as follows: T. David Woo Jr., Clerk; Richard K. Perkins, Assistant Clerk; and Bienvenido C. Villaflor, Sergeant-at-Arms.

At 11:40 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:29 o'clock p.m.

HOUSE COMMUNICATION

A communication from the House (Hse. Com. No. 1), transmitting House Concurrent Resolution No. 1, which was adopted by the House of Representatives on January 21, 1987, was read by the clerk and was placed on file.

Friday, January 23, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:38 o'clock a.m., with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Father Joseph Hooper of the Cathedral of Our Lady of Peace, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Holt and R. Wong who were excused.

The Chair announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Second Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Mizuguchi introduced a group of teacher-lobbyists of the HSTA Political Action Committee and their leader, Ms. Karen Ginoza, who were sitting in the gallery.

Senator Nakasato then introduced Mr. Anthony Quinn, accompanied by his wife, Iolanda, Mr. Bill Mett of Center Art Gallery, Ms. Irene Dessewffy, and Ms. Lynn Cook of the Visitor Industry Education Center, as follows:

"Madam President and honorable colleagues, I have a very special presentation to make. Center Art Gallery. This is the only place in the world where this exhibition will be held, starting tonight.

"Never in my wildest dreams — and I do have a few wild dreams now and then — have I ever imagined that I would get to introduce Mr. Anthony Quinn."

Senator Solomon then interjected:

"Madam President, it is an honor for me to present a lei to Mr. Quinn because my grandmother, Mrs. Louise Beamer, had the opportunity to be the Hawaiian consultant when Mr. Quinn starred with Bing Crosby in the movie 'Waikiki Wedding.' I think it is one of the first films that was made in Hawaii and a pioneer for the visitor promotion for Hawaii.

"I've always heard about Anthony Quinn. It is really an opportunity for me to meet you, Mr. Quinn, and on behalf of my grandmother and myself, I welcome you to Hawaii. Thank you."

At this time, Mr. Anthony Quinn and his wife, Iolanda, rose to be recognized. Mr. Quinn was presented the Senate certificate of recognition by Senator Nakasato and lei by Senator Solomon. Senator Mizuguchi presented Mrs. Quinn with a lei.

FOURTH DAY

Monday, January 26, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 10:06 o'clock a.m., with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Mrs. Leslie Jackson of the First Church of Christ Scientist, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Menor and Solomon who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Third Day.

At 10:10 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 10:11 o'clock a.m.

At 10:12 o'clock a.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator George and carried, the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair to meet in Joint Session with the House of Representatives, in accordance with House Concurrent Resolution No. 1, to receive the Governor's State-of-the-State address.

JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives was called to order at 10:36 o'clock a.m., by the Honorable Richard Kawakami, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

At this time, the Speaker welcomed and introduced the following distinguished guests to the members of the Fourteenth Legislature:

The First Lady of the State of Hawaii, Mrs. Lynne Waihee. She was accompanied by her two children, Jennifer and John.

The Lieutenant Governor of the State of Hawaii, the Honorable Ben Cayetano; the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Honorable Herman Lum; former governor of the State of Hawaii, the Honorable George Ariyoshi; the Honorable William F. Quinn, former governor of the State of Hawaii, and Mrs. Quinn.

The Honorable Frank F. Fasi, Mayor of the City and County of Honolulu; the Honorable Niklaus R. Schweizer, Dean of the Consular Corps in Hawaii; a very special guest, the Honorable March Fong Eu, Secretary of State of California and her husband, Mr. Henry Eu; the Most Reverend Joseph Ferrario, Bishop of the Catholic Diocese of Hawaii; and

Cabinet members of the Governor and all the honored guests who were present.

The Chair then appointed Senators Young, Hagino, Blair, Henderson and George, and Representatives Alcon, Okamura, Apo, Liu and Anderson to escort the Honorable John Waihee, Governor of the State of Hawaii, to the rostrum.

Senators Solomon, George, Ikeda, A. Kobayashi, McMurdo, Young and Fernandes Salling, and Representatives Hayes, Fukunaga, Hirono, Horita, Hashimoto, Isbell, Tungpalan and Marumoto then presented Governor Waihee with ilima leis on behalf of the Senate and the House of Representatives.

The Speaker then presented to the members of the Joint Session and guests, the Honorable John Waihee, stating:

"Members of the Fourteenth Legislature, ladies and gentlemen, please join me in extending our warmest aloha and welcome to the Governor of the State of Hawaii, the Honorable John Waihee."

The Governor addressed the Joint Session as follows:

"Thank you.

"I used to always wonder what Governor Ariyoshi felt like with all of these leis. I feel like falling forward. Thank you very much for this token of friendship and fellowship.

"Senate President Wong, Speaker Kawakami, members of the Fourteenth State Legislature, Aloha.

"It is a privilege for me to stand before you today to offer my new administration's view of tomorrow.

"Today, as we look ahead, one thing is crystal clear. The 21st Century is the Pacific Century. Rapidly moving world events have shifted the focus of economic activity from Europe and the Atlantic to the dynamic nations of Asia and the Pacific. The United States and Japan now account for almost one-half of the free world's output and nearly one-fourth of total world trade.

"These are imposing magnitudes. On top of them, real dynamism is also found in the newly-industrializing areas of Korea, Taiwan, Singapore and Hong Kong, and the resource-rich countries of Indonesia, Malaysia, Thailand, and yes, the new

Philippines. In addition, China with her accelerated reform and modernization program, will become a formidable force in the years ahead.

"Indeed, the Pacific Century is already here, and the 21st Century, in which most of Hawaii's people will be earning their living and aspiring to their dreams, is just around the corner.

"The real question is: Are we ready to take up the challenge; are we willing to assert our initiatives; and are we able to devote our energies to making the 21st Century, Hawaii's century?

"We have all heard the rhetoric before -- Hawaii, the Hub of the Pacific. It's a catchy cliché, and in its better days, a justifiable one.

"But it is now time to bury it.

"Yes, Hawaii is in the center of considerable economic activity, but ships are passing us by and planes are flying over and beyond. And yes, Hawaii is used as a center for communications between East and West, but if we do not master the new technologies, the age of information and telecommunications will easily elude us.

"And, yes, Hawaii is a multi-cultural society with strong ties to Asian-Pacific countries, yet our foreign language instruction has been lacking. We cannot help the rest of the world break down the communications barrier without first crossing the language barrier ourselves.

"And, yes, Hawaii is a beautiful place to live and visit, but Pacific-wide businesses are still more likely to play here than to stay here and work.

"Too long we have been at the hub -- at the center -- in the middle.

"Now it is time to seize upon new opportunities and to move into the forefront. If we want the 21st Century to be our century, we must move to the cutting edge of Pacific affairs and make it our century.

"To do this, we must turn the corner of this century with authority. We must lead the way rather than merely beckon for attention. To do this, we must make an investment in our people, our human capital, by re-energizing our educational system from top to bottom. We must recognize forthrightly that we are living in an era of limitations, and yet we have great strength in our natural resources. Hawaii's future is in her people, her land, her ocean, and yes, her sky.

"Just as with our natural resources, there

are limits to what government can do. I will not use this day to recount the decline of federal aid to local governments. Suffice it to say that for more than a long while now, state and county governments are on their own.

"But lead we must, and lead we will. And that means knowing the problems and allocating resources at our disposal in measured priority. It means strategic planning from the smallest county office to the fifth floor of the State Capitol. It means governmental partnerships with our educational institutions, business, labor and the community to chart a course of action which will get us where we want to be, when we want to be there.

"Having set this context, I would like to discuss with you the major actions this administration proposes which you will be seeing in a more detailed form in the days ahead:

"First, if we are going to lead in the Pacific Century, we must invest in our future.

"As Aristotle said years ago, '... the fate of states, empires, and nations depends on the education of youth.'

"If we are going to achieve educational excellence, we need to make a substantial commitment to education. I am prepared to do that; but I will not be content to simply transfer ever-increasing sums of money in the vague and certainly misguided hope that this alone will make the difference. We must see that each additional dollar generates a measurable improvement in the quality of our educational product.

"The question of the hour is: How can we give new life to our educational institutions that will free a child's imagination, renew a teacher's commitment, satisfy a parent's yearning, and inspire a people's support?

"Obviously, the answer requires that certain essentials be tended to. In the budget before you and in the supplemental budget to come, you will find appropriate sums set aside for repair and maintenance and the purchase of needed equipment.

"However, the full answer to that question requires more, much more -- it requires innovation and leadership from all concerned with the educational process. We cannot satisfy today's concerns by merely expanding yesterday's responses. We cannot grasp tomorrow's possibilities by restricting our sight to today's limitations.

"We must unshackle our educational institutions, permit them to innovate, and hold them accountable for the results. It is that desire for and commitment to

creativity and vision which can be found in our educational institutions that I intend to nurture and support.

"Last week, President Simone testified that the University of Hawaii has attained a position from which, with proper support, it could become a world-class university in a number of selected programs where its comparative advantage allows it to fill a special niche. Furthermore, the university could be regarded throughout the state and the world as outstanding in every program it offers.

"The university could become the premiere university in the Pacific rim.

"What a possibility!

"Well, President Simone, I accept your challenge. Let's do it. Let's build the University of Hawaii into the kind of premiere Pacific institution that our people's destiny deserves.

"This will not be an easy task since the resources of this state are not infinite. However, we can do it, if we are willing to make the hard decisions that lead to educational progress. Among the hardest decisions to make are those which reallocate existing resources for new initiatives . . . but times change and budgets constructed to meet older concerns must be adjusted to reflect newer needs and changing priorities.

"We will have adequate resources to achieve our goals only if in addition to new monies, we are willing to reallocate existing resources from lower priority programs to higher priority ones. To do this, I propose to form a new partnership with the university.

"I am prepared to allocate \$30 million over the biennium for new and enhanced initiatives at the University of Hawaii, provided that the university funds one-third of the amount (\$10 million) through the reallocation of its existing resources.

"In the spirit of partnership, the initiatives to be funded with this allocation will be left to the university's discretion subject to the condition that such initiatives be consistent with the vision of a Pacific university and the university's strategic plan.

"Likewise, I make the same proposal to the governing authorities of our public school system: Review your programs, plans, and priorities for those initiatives and innovations that will enhance the quality of education in our schools, and for every dollar that you reallocate from the existing budget to support these efforts, I will recommend an investment of two matching dollars, up to a maximum of \$20 million.

"Let the Department of Education take advantage of this opportunity to deal with the nagging problems of our educational system:

- If more individualized attention would improve our students' verbal abilities, then consider reducing the size of English and writing classes.
- If the reduction of class size and lengthening of learning time are priorities, then at least pilot the concept of year-round schools. We all know that reducing class size across the board while adhering to the traditional school year would require resources far greater than we have.
- If learning centers, which have been tried with great success thus far, hold the potential for reducing duplication in course offerings, while offering the enrichment of the curriculum, then promote them.

"The specific programs to be founded by this proposal should be appropriately left to the discretion of our superintendent and board of education. However, we must insist that each new initiative produces measurable results.

"We must launch a concerted effort to introduce progressive and constructive change into our institutions, that they may respond vigorously to the altered circumstances in which we find ourselves. And as yesterday's headlines bear witness, there is no area in which change must be brought to bear more rapidly than in education.

"In partnership with the University of Hawaii and the public school system, we can begin to transform our educational system to meet today's problems and to take advantage of tomorrow's possibilities. This is well worth our investment.

"The students of today want jobs for tomorrow. And so, truly, if we are to move to the forefront of the Pacific, we must take strong and immediate economic action.

"Our first economic initiative must be to strengthen our existing industries within the global economies which surround us.

"For tourism, this means an international convention center. This center would be designed not only to meet the needs of our vital visitor industry, but also to augment Pacific trade and services. Our convention center will be able to serve all potential customers. It will have a positive international outlook and it will be designed

to meet the language and informational needs of international participants. I envision a center which will enable us to achieve both our goals in quality tourism and Pacific-wide trade and commerce.

"My friends, so long as the issue is the location of the center, we will have no center. I will submit to you a proposal for an international convention center authority. This authority will have a specific mandate and deadline to determine the nature, site, funding mechanisms, and management structure of the center. The authority will gather data and hold public hearings to accomplish this. I propose that we get this authority into business by session's end.

"Last session, you enacted a transient accommodations tax. It is sound economic policy and just common sense that a reasonable portion of the revenues collected through this tax be designated to programs and projects which enhance the visitor industry. I propose that not less than 40 percent of the funds realized from this tax should be designated in budget appropriations for programs and projects that will support our state's number one industry.

"We must also move forward to strengthen and diversify our islands' economic genesis, agriculture. For agriculture is not only a business with considerable value and potential, it is a way of life for our people and a way of life for the land itself.

"To do this, we propose:

- increased marketing and promotions of our islands and their products;
- improvements in our pesticide programs, including a biological control program with an arsenal of non-chemical weapons to fight agricultural pests and weeds; and
- the upgrading and consolidation of neighbor island agriculture facilities for more effective one-stop service for our farmers.

"Agriculture and tourism have long served us well and deserve our continuing support. But we have given considerably less attention to a thriving, bustling segment of our economy, small business, which is responsible for so much of our job formation. We must not neglect existing and developing business which has served us well, and which has demonstrated its commitment to these islands.

"For many in the private sector, obtaining the necessary resources for growth is an

impediment in capital-short Hawaii. Moreover, financial instruments which are available in other locations do not exist in these islands.

"To aid in the financing of business development, I propose an adequately funded, innovative loan program for business startup and expansion, and a modified capital loan program, which is flexible enough to fund larger, less restrictive loans in cooperation with established financial institutions.

"These initiatives will not conflict with conventional sources of financing, but they will provide much needed stimulus to the vital small business sector of our economy.

"In the same vein, I propose that we implement a progressive reduction of the trigger for unemployment compensation assessments. The compensation fund is sound and has adequate resources, and reducing the level of assessments will allow capital to remain in the private sector and finance growth.

"These proposals are designed to stimulate existing business. We would be remiss, however, if we did not recognize the private sector's complaints that government has not been responsive to business.

"Business needs a friend in government to advocate its needs and interest. When we say 'Hawaii means business,' we need an advocacy-oriented department to prove it.

"Thus, I propose to you legislation which will reorganize the Department of Planning and Economic Development, leaving the department free to lead the way and set the pace for business growth and development in Hawaii. As a watchdog for business, the department will review all proposed state rules to measure their impact on the economy.

"Our second economic initiative is the creation and expansion of new industries. We propose a combination of research and development, accelerated marketing programs, and new industry incentives to accomplish this.

"First, in keeping with our desire to assume a position of leadership in technology, I have set in motion the necessary planning for development of a satellite launching facility on the Big Island which can take advantage of Hawaii's unique geographical advantages.

"This is not a speculative venture. I intend to see ground broken in five years.

"To get the project moving, however, I will appoint a special committee, a working group, to come up with a solid plan for

implementation.

"This summer we will sponsor, in concert with a conference being organized by Senator Matsunaga, a governor's conference on space which will have access to international experts on the subject.

"Out of the conference and the committee's work, I expect to obtain a detailed blueprint for action on the development of a spaceport, the particulars of which I will submit to you upon the convening of the 1988 regular session, together with multi-year funding requests and authorizing legislation designed to put the project on the ground.

"I might add that we must also expand our burgeoning ocean industries, through needed CIP at the Natural Energy Lab and the Hawaii Ocean Science and Technology Park at Keahole, Kona.

"The new industrial opportunities we seek will not come to us without effort on our part. The time has passed when we can afford to rest content that the rest of the world would beat a path to our door.

"We have become in recent years highly competent at promoting Hawaii as a place to visit. Now it is time for us to turn those skills to the proposition that Hawaii is a great place in which to invest and to work.

"We must have a strong and effective marketing program both to advertise Hawaii as a place to do business and to improve the sales of our products. We must carry this effort overseas. We must knock on doors of potential partners in growth. As a part of this effort, I recommend that we staff promotional offices overseas, as do some 30 other states.

"One of our growing new industries is film. The section of the industry which makes commercials and other independent productions is worth in excess of \$50 million a year, with even greater potential. Yet, it is hamstrung by an onerous permit system. I recommend that you give the state's film office the authority to issue all necessary permits on a one-stop basis.

"Our third economic initiative involves the impact of taxes on business. I think that we are all in agreement that part of our economic malaise stems from the weakness of our domestic manufacture. We need to create more goods for export.

"Yet, Hawaii is one of the few states which taxes exports. Additionally, we need to encourage business to develop in Hawaii. However, we tax the sale of capital goods within the state and we tax the importation of such goods.

"We will submit to you a proposal to relieve our businesses from these taxes.

"No discussion of our economic future would be complete without a commentary on one of the most basic aspects of economic activity, the ability to move people and goods from one place to another.

"Thus, we are proposing major capital improvements for airports, highways, and harbors for the upcoming biennium.

"Regarding ground transportation highlights on Oahu, the sooner we get started building H-3, the faster we can finish. I would like to see us start in June and finish in six years.

"We will also be undertaking many other ground transportation projects on Oahu, and I am determined that the state and city together can beat the bottlenecks and get traffic flowing.

"To help us, I have asked Lieutenant Governor Cayetano, the author of a 1977 bill on staggered work hours, to investigate creative ways that we can alter work and behavioral patterns, so that everyone isn't trying to get to the same place at the same time.

"We will also move forward with major work on state airports and neighbor island roads. With the new Lihue Airport being opened next month and a new terminal being completed at Kahului, I look forward to the expansion of the airfield at Keahole as a highly significant new undertaking.

"If we are to bring about the change we want in the world in front of us, we have to change government. I have appointed a cabinet of changemasters. Let me share with you now our view of what government must be, if it is to be on top of tomorrow. For there is no better place to make changes than within government itself.

"One area of government that affects us all is taxation. As you know, the enactment of tax reform at the federal level has placed the burden on Hawaii to adopt the federal provisions. Although neither we nor the Federal Government can determine the actual impact of the Tax Reform Act, the act creates a need and an opportunity to restructure Hawaii's tax system.

"One tax that has troubled many of us is the excise tax on food, because it is levied against our basic necessities of life. This tax constitutes a regressive burden on those least able to pay: the poor, the young couple trying to get a start in life, the senior citizens trying to survive on a fixed income.

"Because this is such a basic issue, I am proposing relief in the form of a new \$50 tax credit per person for food items, in effect, a rebate on the taxes paid at the supermarket.

"In addition, we must restructure the income tax rates and brackets to minimize the negative impact of the Federal Tax Reform Act.

"With respect to government organization, we will submit to you a bill for the creation of the Department of Public Safety.

"As you know, tougher laws and sentences have put our corrections system to a desperate test. We are now working on the first and second increments of the Halawa Medium Security Facility which is scheduled for opening in the summer of this year, and this will provide us with our first full measure of relief from the overcrowding at the Oahu Community Correction System. You will review budgets to fund positions to staff these new facilities, as well as CIP proposals for additional facilities on Oahu and Maui.

"But we need an appropriate organizational structure to house a program which has grown so large as to overshadow its parent agency. The Department of Public Safety will: provide more effective administration of our prisons, consolidate all elements of incarceration in one single agency, and place the appropriate focus and accountability in one department.

"It is also time to reconsider our planning activities by separating these functions from DPED and establishing an office for strategic and long-range planning.

"While these changes are occurring, we also will be examining closely the Department of Health, which is ripe for change. I anticipate new arrangements to give flexibility to the state-county hospital system. We also must examine carefully the best arrangement for our environmental protection programs, but this is the work of more than one session.

"Also, all government service from business registration to medicaid payments, will be improved through our proposal to computerize government operations. This will require a total of \$38 million in federal and state funds. In addition, we are now undertaking to integrate state government voice communication, which is primarily telephone at present, with our electronic data processing activities to fully harness the new technologies for a more responsive government.

"But we can't treat state government as if it exists in a vacuum. It is a partner with

local government in the delivery of services.

"The Legislature has been working hard to make the government product better. Over the last two years, committees of the House and Senate have worked with the administration and the counties to discover needless overlaps in state and county programs and recommend improvements.

"To continue this process, I'm pleased to announce that I have appointed former City Manager Director and new State Director of Transportation, Ed Hirata, to chair an executive task force of cabinet members, whose departments have county overlaps, to work with you to take the all-important next steps.

"A significant part of the task is to do away with state and county territorial disputes that serve no one. There is a dramatic case in point on the doorstep of our city — Magic Island State Park — which is completely surrounded by the city's Ala Moana Park. There is no point in making a distinction between state and city jurisdiction here, so as a demonstration that I mean business, I offer Magic Island Park to the city to be incorporated in their city parks system. From that initiative, we should move on to a more comprehensive and mutually agreeable division of responsibility for the administration of state and city parks.

"Similarly, I call for discussion between the executive and legislative city and state branches to return revenues generated by traffic enforcement to the county governments. To my way of thinking, such an action is in order, provided that county governments are prepared to take responsibilities commensurate with the funds that they receive. What is important is that we begin to review these issues to move forward together to improve government for all of us.

"In facing the larger social problems, the different levels of government must be able to join together with one another and the community at large, or we will not prevail. On that count, it is difficult for any of us to talk about plans for tomorrow, when we may lose our children to the perils of drug abuse.

"I want to thank the various community groups who are involved with drug education programs, 'Just-Say-No' programs, as well as the concerted efforts of our law enforcement authorities. I ask you now to do even more, and I offer you the support of my office. I am asking my attorney general, in concert with each county prosecutor and other law enforcement authorities, to discover new means and resources for ending the drug industry in our state.

"Finally, it would be incongruous for us to talk and dream about a Pacific Century without acknowledging the Hawaiian foundation upon which our visions are built. So it seems entirely appropriate that we would begin this new era in the Year of the Hawaiian. We honor those who first came to these precious shores and who, in turn, embraced later arrivals in a bond of aloha that unites us today as one people, one state.

"I would be remiss, however, if I failed to mention that while there are many descendants of Hawaii's original people who have been and are doing well in our state, there are many who feel lost in the land of their ancestors. To these individuals, we must reach out and say that your government has not forgotten you.

"In the months ahead, the Department of Health will institute new initiatives to combat the high incidence of disease among Hawaiians.

"Special funds should be allocated from the state budget to cover certain administrative costs for the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, freeing trust fund monies to be reallocated for infrastructure and economic development purposes.

"I was there at the birth and creation of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. I have no illusions that easing OHA's difficulties will be easy or always pleasant, but we do no one any justice by avoiding the tough issues. For example, it is time that we start negotiating a fair settlement to the issue of ceded land revenues that protects the public's interest while allowing OHA to carry out its fiduciary responsibilities.

"In closing, indulge me this reminder. In our determination to bring about change in our educational system, economy and government, let us be guided by one premise that does not change. We are here for people, most especially those who do not have the same opportunity to embrace life as we do.

"As we enter a new era of social and political history in our state, we have an extra burden to insure that the changes we do make do not come at the expense of the less fortunate. For government with no heart is no government at all.

"We are here for the handicapped, the disabled, and the needy. This commitment will not change.

"What we must change is the manner in which we honor this commitment. New solutions and new partnerships are at hand and we merely need to seize the opportunity. Just last Friday, state government, city government, the

university, and the Hawaii Ecumenical Housing Corporation joined together in a spirit of nonpartisanship and without concern for territoriality to create a temporary residence housing project on Kokea Street for people uprooted by urban renewal. This is a commitment of government.

"And we are not here merely to build buildings and make capital improvements. We are here to build attitudes and make improvements in our human capital. By statement and deed, we must demonstrate that not only are all men created equal, but that all men and women are equal.

"And we are here to honor the island tradition of respect, reverence, and care for the elderly. As we move forward with public policy formulation in a rapidly changing world, we will not jettison one of the most basic of human values — 'Honor Thy Mother and Thy Father.'

"We are here for people because government is people. Yet, there are those in our society who feel they have no voice in their government and fail to participate. If the participation base of government is narrowing, then we have got to broaden it. We need a political system which is more exciting, open, and responsive. One solution is the presidential primary proposed by Lieutenant Governor Cayetano. Let's bring choice to the people.

"Our version of all of Hawaii's people moving forward to reach their Pacific destiny is pretty heady stuff.

"But, my friends and colleagues, I say that the only thing between us and the realization of this vision is the critics who say we can't do it.

"Well, I have these words for those naysayers.

"I heard the Speaker of the House, and he says we can do it.

"And I heard the President of the Senate, and he says we can do it.

"And I heard the words of our Republican leadership on both sides of the Legislature, and they say we can do it.

"And there are 76 of you who ran for office because you had a dream for the people you serve and the guts to go out on the line for it.

"And you believe we can do it.

"We cannot let the tough and challenging deliberations ahead diminish these dreams. For these dreams are the marrow of our

ideals, the fiber of our courage, and the fuel for our tomorrow.

"As we embark upon a difficult journey through a world of change, our destination is the future, our traveling companions, the hopes and aspirations of the people of Hawaii.

"Let's test our dreams and stretch our imaginations. Let's do it! Let's go for it!

"Thank you."

Senate President Richard Wong then rose and stated:

"Thank you very much, Governor Waihee, for sharing your visions and aspirations for Hawaii with us today. I think we here in the Legislature share a great many of the goals that you have set, and we look forward to working together with you and your cabinet to help to bring them into reality. I am

sure that in the next few weeks here at the session, you will be sending to us specific implementational legislation and proposals. For our part, we pledge to you that we will give them full attention and consideration.

"Again, Governor, thank you very much for appearing today before us.

"If there be no further business by the members of the Senate and the House of Representatives, I now declare the Joint Session adjourned."

At 11:26 o'clock a.m., the President declared the Joint Session adjourned.

Senator Solomon then rose on a point of personal privilege and stated as follows:

"Mr. President, your Committee on Higher Education has been conducting its hearings and I'm sure it's public knowledge that the governor has been more than generous in his supplemental budget in his efforts to fulfill his plans for a Pacific destiny.

"Mr. President, I find that I have to report to my fellow Senators and my fellow colleagues that upon being approached by the media as to our position here in the Senate on how we plan to fulfill our governor's Pacific destiny, I would like to remind them that the obligation of the University of Hawaii - Manoa, the community colleges, and University of Hawaii - Hilo is to serve the needs of local students first. We are a land grant university and we have an obligation to be sure that our needs are met here in the State of Hawaii first before looking at other proposed plans.

"I was very distressed in regards to basic education, i.e., undergraduate courses, where 50 percent or more of our student body is involved at the university. The majority of those courses now are being taught by part-time lecturers because proper money and dollars are not put towards improvement of our basic education.

"As chairman of the Higher Education Committee, I find it impossible to look at these grandiose plans if the foundation of the university is not met first which is undergraduate courses.

"There was an article printed in the paper today as to my suggestion to look at Hilo College as a possibility for Pacific and Asian studies. I don't think that this is a 'way out' request. In the article there was a rebuttal by President Simone who reported to the committee that he feels that the use of the East-West Center is critical in the development of our Pacific and Asian studies. What the newspaper failed to report is that I asked President Simone, 'What is our existing relationship with the East-West Center?' He said the East-West Center is a separate entity from the University of Hawaii; we have to pay to use the facilities at the East-West Center. A negotiation that was done more than ten years ago.

"I asked the president, 'Well, president, are we going to be renegotiating our relationship with the East-West Center?' He couldn't answer my question.

"I think before the president starts making these remarks in the newspaper of how we can dovetail these programs I think the president should have a clear understanding of how we are going to make that possible.

"Another thing, Mr. President, which I was quite astonished about is when I asked the president how many agriculture students do we now have enrolled in the College of Tropical Agriculture and he said we have a mere 80 students. I would like to clarify that for the record because this was a public hearing and for the public, we have approximately 800 agriculture students -- 600 undergraduates, 200 graduates.

"Mr. President, I think that our president of the university should start attesting to matters at home before coming to the Legislature and asking for millions and millions of dollars to look at expanding our programs involving abroad when he cannot even answer these kinds of questions. I'm just educating my fellow colleagues, I think this is very, very important as we all sit here, to just remember that the mission of the university system is to take care of our local concerns first.

"Another issue that was brought up which I thought was, well, quite astonishing. He proposed that the Chinese studies facilities be next to the Korean studies. I asked him where Hawaiian studies was going and he said, 'Oh, we're planning to build that facility next to the park.'

"I would like to remind all of our colleagues here that Hawaiian studies is one of the basic foundations to our history and our culture here in the State of Hawaii. I think that it would behoove all of us, in our inquiries of the president while he is making his lobbying visits to your offices, that he be reminded that we have an obligation ... if we are not going to perpetuate our own Hawaiian culture here in the State of Hawaii, how can we expect to be the leaders and become the repository for the rest of Polynesia.

"Thank you very much, Mr. President."

At 11:53 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:54 o'clock a.m.

Senator Cobb also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, this being a day for statements of personal privilege I would like to add my own for the record.

"I noted in Sunday's paper a decrease in the charge card rate on one of our local

charge cards by one financial institution followed within 48 hours by a similar announcement from another.

"Just for the record, I'd like to note that such an announcement of reduced interest rates on charge cards is for the first time in over six years, despite a more than 60 percent drop in the prime rate over the same period of time. That announcement came only after my House counterpart chairman and I were quoted publicly as indicating a willingness to move in this area ... to reduce charge card rates legislatively

or by encouraging competition such as the importation of foreign banks. It does beg the question then, Mr. President, which came first, the chicken or the egg. Thank you."

THIRTEENTH DAY

Friday, February 6, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:40 o'clock a.m., with the President in the Chair.

At this time, Senator Solomon rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, your Committee on Higher Education had a hearing yesterday on all of the community colleges. There was a question that was posed by the Chair to President Simone in regard to the West Hawaii College on the kinds of educational programs that will be offered. The president replied that we needed a feasibility study because no such study was done and he had requested of the committee if we could perhaps look at an appropriation for the study.

"This morning, I was informed by my staff members that there was a study done way back in the 1960's during the Governor Burns' administration by Shelley Mark who was the director of the planning and economic department and who is now with the College of Tropical Agriculture. I'm sure Senator Yamasaki and Senator Henderson ... the senators with a long political history and yourself, Mr. President, and maybe Senator Young, would remember that there was, in fact, a plan that was submitted for consideration, and this was before Hilo became a four-year college, recommending that the college be built in West Hawaii, as opposed to Hilo.

"So, Mr. President, at this time, I would like to advise my colleagues that providing educational services to West Hawaii was not a new idea. This has been an ongoing struggle and an ongoing concern for us here at the Legislature and, of course, if we're going from the '60's to the '80's we're looking at over 26 years of discussions. So I would advise President Simone that before he makes erroneous remarks and erroneous testimony to the Committee on Higher Education that there was no feasibility study done in regards to providing educational services to West Hawaii, he should do his homework regarding the history of the university.

"Thank you very much."

Senator Holt also rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, last evening, in the Honolulu Star-Bulletin, there was a big article on 'Signs of the Tourism Slowdown Detected.' In reading the article, I was

following closely to find out what the basis was for this article to come about and I found there was a lot of truths and misstatements that were made. There was one particular area that I was quite concerned about, Mr. President, and as a former quarterback I know how it is to be a 'Sunday morning quarterback' and what it is to have people be 'Sunday morning quarterbacks' after the game's already finished. But, last year, we had a lot of deliberation and discussion on the transient accommodations tax and there was a lot of heated discussion. We had the hotel association and the visitor industry representatives getting down here in the pits, on the second floor in Senator Yamasaki's and Senator Kuroda's committees, to fight hard to have their voices heard in this process over here. I mean these people were willing to stand up and be counted to come forward to testify.

"In the article, yesterday, there was a quote from a Chicago-based Hawaii market manager of United Airlines and he said, 'This year, I am a little concerned.' This person's name is Tony Bacci. And he goes on to say that air fares are still not bad but they are not heading downward. Then it goes on to say, 'The hotel room tax, no one likes, Bacci said. I think it has affected some of the incentive, convention markets.'

"Mr. President, I think it is unfair and irresponsible on the part of someone to use one month's experience of the hotel room tax to make these statements. If this year's figures are firm, and the committee has just taken a look at what January looks like for passenger arrivals, Westbound, for the month of January which represents approximately 75 percent of the arrivals in Hawaii, we are already ahead of last year's level and last year, 1986, we had 319,000 visitor-arrivals which was a downturn from the previous year, 1985, when we had 363,000 visitor-arrivals in January. If we use last year's figures to tell us what kind of year we're going to have this year, 1987, if we use the figures for the first month of 1987, will be an even better year than 1986 despite the 5 percent hotel room tax.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

department ...' and 'Any officer questioned
shall reply to such question upon the
following day, unless the Senate shall grant
a definite extension of time for replying.'

"Mr. President, I asked the attorney
general of the State of Hawaii to respond to
the following question: Are the Hawaii Life
and Disability Insurance Guaranty
Association and the Hawaii Insurance
Guaranty Association required to comply
with the provisions of Chapter 92, Hawaii

"Mr. President, at this time it gives me great honor and pleasure to introduce four gentlemen who have done something very, very special for this community and I am going to be presenting them with a certificate for the Hawaii Vietnam Veterans Wall Committee.

"They are here representing the 150 people who helped with this and all the myriad of people in each community to which they have taken the wall. The wall is now in Hilo. It has been on Maui; it has been on our front lawn out here; it will then go to Kona and then to Kauai. I think they've done a wonderful thing for the community and they have started a healing process which has been long overdue."

Senator McMurdo at this time read from the Senate Certificate of recognition.

Senator McMurdo then introduced Mr. Tom Sterling Sr. from Portland, Maine, father of Mr. Tom Sterling.

Senator Cobb then added:

"Mr. President, I'd just like to speak on behalf of the resolution and pay tribute to the four gentlemen here today and to express my personal thanks as a Vietnam veteran for what they did in bringing the wall here.

"The wall in Washington can be viewed only by those who have the time, the money, the energy, and the wherewithal to go

there. To bring that wall here, I think, is a very valuable outreach because there are many citizens, as well as veterans, who don't have the resources to go all the way to Washington, D.C. to see it.

"It was an emotional moment for me in recognizing too many names on the wall and realizing that there were other names of people who had just joined our unit and who were killed in action and where we didn't have time to fully learn their names and, in many cases, didn't want to, knowing the odds against us, knowing that the average expectancy of a lieutenant in the field was six weeks. To have shared that and be able to share this moment with these gentlemen today is indeed a privilege and honor.

"On behalf of the Senate, I want to extend my personal thanks for all that they've done. Thank you, Mr. President."

At this time, all of the honorees rose to be recognized and were presented the Senate Certificate and leis by Senators McMurdo, Solomon, Young and Ikeda.

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:40 o'clock a.m., with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Chaplain (Retired) Ralph Willers, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The Chair announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Twentieth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Hagino introduced a group of 50 seventh grade students from Wahiawa Intermediate School and parents, Mrs. Kanja, Mr. and Mrs. Atkins, Mrs. Catignani, and Mrs. Hancock.

Senator Nakasato then introduced a group of 25 parents from the Honolulu District, Chapter One, Parents Advisory Council (on Education) and Ms. Sharon Tulba.

Senator Kuroda then introduced Dr. Masumitsu Oishi and his wife Haruko and Mr. Paul Yempuku as follows:

"Madam Vice President, Senators, ladies and gentlemen, we have present on the floor three individuals representing a newspaper institution, the Hawaii Hochi. The Hawaii Hochi is celebrating the 75th anniversary of its founding and I'd like to just share with you a little background. The Hawaii Hochi is usually known as an island Japanese-English newspaper.

"Few people know and remember that the Hawaii Hochi played a historically significant chapter in the struggle to protect the rights of the immigrant community. The Hawaii Hochi relentlessly pursued the need for an open society which culminated in the rise of the Japanese-Americans as a potent social, economic, political force in the development of modern day Hawaii.

"Few people are aware that in the early 1960's Hawaii Hochi was on the verge of bankruptcy due to declining readership and uncertain economic conditions of a daily language paper business, and we all know that the two local English newspapers underwent difficulty during that time too.

"The person who gave new life and vitality to the Hawaii Hochi was philanthropist Mr. Konosuke Oishi and his son, Dr. Masumitsu Oishi, owner and publisher of the Shizuoka Shinbun in Japan

and the benefactor of the present day Hawaii Hochi.

"The president of Hawaii Hochi, Mr. Paul Yempuku, is originally a Kahuku resident who went to Japan when he was six years old, graduated from Waseda University, returned after World War II joining the Hawaii Hochi staff in 1959 and, rising through the ranks, became president in 1967.

"Mr. Yempuku, with the support of Dr. Oishi, brought the Hawaii Hochi up to its present high stature and also began the publication of the Hawaii Herald, an all-English journal of Japanese-American culture and current events, and also the Aloha Paradise Guide, an all-Japanese tourist publication.

"To share a little information with you on the person who built and developed the Hawaii Hochi, Mr. Fred Kinzaburo Makino, we will be distributing a pamphlet to all Senators for your edification. We do have also, in addition to the certificate to Mr. Yempuku and Dr. Oishi, a certificate which is addressed to Mr. Fred Kinzaburo Makino. At the Saturday observation of the 75th anniversary this certificate was presented in all our behalf when the bust of Mr. Makino was unveiled at the Hawaii Hochi."

Dr. and Mrs. Masumitsu Oishi and Mr. Paul Yempuku rose to be recognized and were presented the Senate Certificate of recognition by Senator Kuroda. Senators A. Kobayashi and McMurdo presented leis to Dr. Oishi and Mr. Yempuku and Senator Hagino a corsage to Mrs. Oishi.

By unanimous consent, S.R. No. 19 was referred to the Committee on Transportation.

Senator Hee, chairman of the Committee on Judiciary, then requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing for the subjects listed on the agenda of the Senate Judiciary Committee's hearing notice for Saturday, February 21, 1987, and the Chair granted the waiver.

Senator Hee then rose on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Madam Vice President and members of the Senate, yesterday, at the joint hearing of the Committee on Agriculture and the Committee on Planning and Environment, the Department of Health in responding to the bill relating to open cane burning, it was found out through discussion with the lobbyist for HSPA and the Department of Health that an internal memo had been circulated by Mr. Paul Aki stating that cane burning and auto emissions were indeed the two highest pollutants.

"Without getting into the specifics of the memo and without discussing the merits or demerits of the statement, the action by the Department of Health appropriately demonstrates the kind of deeds perpetrated which has brought the Department of Health under scrutiny by the public and members of the Legislature.

"It was found out, Madam Vice President, that this kind of internal memo was never intended for the public and never intended for the consumption by the Legislators and the policymakers within the state.

"It would behoove our new governor, as we begin a new beginning, that he thoroughly look into the actions of the Department of Health and to either make these things public, internal memos, or respond to the public concern when these internal memos are made public by the media. It does the state government no good to hide or hide by not disclosing the nature and/or the merits of the memo, in this case being cane burning as a pollutant, by the chief enforcement officer.

"Thank you."

Senator Reed also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Madam Vice President, as you know, I represent neighbor islands and the problem that I'm having is increasing neighbor island participation in this process. The 48-hour notification makes it virtually impossible to follow through with that kind of participation.

"I'm receiving at least six calls a day from people who want to submit testimony and finding it virtually impossible to accommodate them. We're doing things like taking phone calls from people, taking testimony over the phone and typing it up for them and submitting it, but even doing that, the 48-hour notice is not sufficient to notify people who are very concerned about issues and give them a chance to prepare their testimony and return it to us in time -- much less make arrangements to be here to testify personally.

"I know that it's partly 'the nature of the beast,' but if I might just ask the chairmen, wherever possible and whenever possible, if additional notice beyond the statutory minimum could be provided, I would appreciate it and I'm sure that others who have constituents on neighbor islands would also appreciate it. Thank you."

Senator Cobb, on a point of parliamentary privilege, stated:

"Madam Vice President, on a point of parliamentary privilege and in partial response to the remarks of the previous speaker.

"If you'll look at the hearing notices attached to the Senate Order of the Day, you'll find that the notices extend all the way through February 24th, 25th and even through to the 26th and March 3rd and 5th.

"In many cases, chairmen, myself included, are trying to get out the hearing notices anywhere from five to seven days in advance and in some cases as much as weeks in advance. Just by way of example, we have completed virtually the entire agenda

of notices for your Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce all the way through the end of this month.

"As I look at this attachment to the Order of the Day, I find more and more chairmen doing that and except for added-on or deferred items to the agenda, as much as possible, I think the practice is being expanded beyond the simple 48-hour

minimum requirement. Thank you."

ADJOURNMENT

At this time, Senator Holt, chairman of the Committee on Tourism and Recreation, requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing on S.B. No. 631 and S.B. No. 899, and the Chair granted the waiver.

Senator J. Wong then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Madam Vice President, the state Department of Transportation has contracted a study to determine if some lanes can be reversed during the rush hours on the Likelike and Pali Highways. I've learned that the contractor selected will be an out-of-state firm of experts who will receive approximately \$115,000 and be given eight months to explain to the motorists of Windward Oahu, this honorable body, and the many Windward community volunteers who have spent hundreds of hours developing proposals to mitigate traffic congestion, what we already know about the contra-flow concept.

"Despite the results of a 1979 study which rejected contra-flow on both the Likelike and Pali Highways for safety reasons, we, that is, all the neighborhood boards on the Windward side from Laie to Waimanalo, Kaneohe business groups, Kailua Chamber of Commerce, Windward legislative delegations, and the thousands

of motorists who traverse these overcrowded routes on a daily basis, one of whom by the way is the newly appointed director of transportation, we all believe that a modified contra-flow lane is a valid solution.

"In fact, a proposal for a modified contra-flow plan or reversible tunnel system and other plans for Likelike Highway and Pali Highway was presented in detail to the Department of Transportation in March of 1986.

"We don't need another study, Madam Vice President. We don't need out-of-state experts coming here to gather existing data, compiled at the expense of taxpayers, consolidating that data and giving it back to us to review, for \$115,000. This would be a total waste of taxpayers' money, an insult to our intelligence and capability of finding creative solutions to our own unique problems.

"Madam Vice President, the preamble of our State Constitution reads in part: 'We reserve the right to control our destiny, ... and to preserve the quality of life that we desire.' That quality in this case, Madam Vice President, is immediate traffic relief, and I invoke this challenge to control our destiny on the state Department of Transportation, especially its division chief of highways and his engineers.

"Madam Vice President, the 1980 Legislature in its infinite wisdom and foresight appropriated funds for the construction of the now completed addition of a third lane on Likelike Highway from Kula Kolea Street to School Street in Kalihi. This completed project would become the first phase of a contra-flow system on Likelike Highway. As you know, Madam Vice President, the traffic signal at this intersection commences a daily bottleneck of Windward motorists. This same signal also acts as the starting gate for motorists because it controls traffic flow in the Kalihi area and is responsible for allowing our neighbors and friends of Kalihi an opportunity for access to Likelike Highway.

"Madam Vice President, the critical point of a contra-flow system is the crossover and cross-back area. The modified contra-flow plan presented to the Department of Transportation calls for a cross-back in the morning and a crossover in the afternoon to be located at the Kula Kolea intersection. At the opposite end on the Windward side, the morning crossover and the afternoon cross-back will be located at the Likelike-Kahekili intersection.

"Kaneohe has become a pass-through

community and even if construction of H-3 was started today it would take eight to ten years to complete. The Department of Transportation data on 24-hour trans-Koolau traffic indicates that in 1985, 96,778 vehicles travelled through the Koolau's. It is estimated that by the time H-3 is completed the traffic count will rise to 124,000 vehicles per day.

"It is astonishing to realize that the Department of Transportation wishes to conduct another expensive study on the very same solution for an aggravated and undiminished problem.

"Madam Vice President, the question I present to you is this: What do we do in the meantime during this interim period? I cannot begin to overemphasize the immediacy of this concern.

"The plain and simple fact is, we do not need more studies. We need traffic relief. We need contra-flow, and we need it now.

"I voiced these very concerns to the Department of Transportation in a letter dated September 3, 1986, and I received on September 26, 1986, a response relative to contra-flow based on the Department of Transportation's concern for safety. These concerns were: first, that the long distance of the contra-flow of six miles on Likelike would increase the probability of head-on collision; second, that a single outbound lane will induce motorists to violate no-passing restrictions to pass slow-moving vehicles thus endangering oncoming motorists; and, finally, problems would rise because stalled cars would be difficult to move from the contra-flow lane.

"An original meeting scheduled for February 4th, this year, was held on February 18th because the Department of Transportation officials failed to show up. In the rescheduled meeting between Department of Transportation officials, legislators and members of their staff which took place in my office, department officials were presented with sufficient evidence and facts that rebutted their three stated concerns. One, obviously, was the fact that during routine tunnel maintenance motorists are rerouted into a contra-flow mode from 9:00 in the morning to 3:00 o'clock in the afternoon, five days a week, until maintenance is completed. There has never been a stalled vehicle or a head-on collision during this period on record.

"Madam Vice President, if you want specific details of the modified contra-flow system I would be more than willing to provide them for you. I happen to believe that creativity is alive and well

in the Department of Transportation. I also happen to believe that a contra-flow system can and shall be developed in-house.

"The problem, from my viewpoint, is, what as legislators do we do to encourage, foster, and nurture creativity among bureaucrats? How do we unleash these powerful resources in order to break the traditional bureaucratic stigma?

"A Department of Transportation engineer as well as a constituent of mine, Paul Denis who is a realtor in Kaneohe, proposed a contra-flow idea to me. They both stated that a completely new fifth lane could be created in between the existing lanes by removing all of the medial strips and paving the strip of land in between the four lanes on either side of the tunnel. Then, Madam Vice President, contra-flow would occur only through the tunnel, a very short and safe length.

"In private industry, if division heads and engineers are unable to come up with creative solutions to solve problems they are replaced with younger, more competent, and positive thinking personnel who can generate creative solutions to problems in a much more timely manner.

"There is no doubt that the concept of a contra-flow system involves risk. For example, in a modified contra-flow plan for Likelike Highway, every possible risk has been addressed and appeased. The advantages outweigh by far the alleged disadvantages. Someone, somewhere and at sometime must make that decision, must take that calculated risk, must stick his neck out, and the time to make that decision is now, not two years from now.

"Madam Vice President, I have scheduled a meeting with the director of transportation for Friday, the 27th. The message I wish to get across to the Department of Transportation is very clear. We intend to do everything in-house, even to the point of stopping this new study, and push for the implementation of a pilot contra-flow system on the Likelike and Pali Highways (that's for Senator Hee). And, most importantly, we are not going to stop until an interim traffic relief plan becomes a reality.

"In conclusion, Madam Vice President, the Department of Transportation must realize that mitigating the traffic congestion for our Windward communities through the implementation of a contra-flow plan or system is not intended to jeopardize H-3. H-3 is not only the best alternative, it is the ultimate solution for our Windward traffic flow for at least the next 20 years beyond its completion. Only mass transportation will serve as the final

hope.

"Windward motorists have been held hostages far too long and I can guarantee you, Madam Vice President, we will not wait any longer for traffic relief.

"Thank you, Madam Vice President."

Senator Matsuura also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Madam Vice President, I also rise on a point of personal privilege relating to unfair and deceptive practices.

"What I thought was a Honolulu problem has moved to the Hilo area now. The problem is this.

"Many of the people who bought IBM computers thought they were buying IBM computers but had other things in the computers. Lot of parts that were in the IBM computer were made in Taiwan and Korea and were not IBM authorized.

"Many of the people who bought these computers bought IBM because it represents the highest standard in the computer industry. When they had problems, and would bring it back for repair hoping that IBM would at least stand by the warranty, they find that IBM would refuse because the equipment has been altered. The alteration is very simple. You just take out the card and put in another. The bad part of this whole situation that we have is that a person who buys an IBM-advertised equipment will never open up the chassis to see if it's an IBM equipment. Even if he did open the chassis, there is no way he is going to know if the computer cards were Korean-made or Taiwan-made or IBM-made.

"I called IBM several months ago because this problem existed here and because a few senators bought IBM computers. The Senator from Nuuanu actually analyzed his equipment and found out that there were a lot of non-IBM parts in his computer. The problem that we have is that when I called IBM they said that they cannot stand by the warranty. I said fine, then they asked, 'What's the problem?' ... I mean, how can we resolve this problem. They said, 'Buy from an authorized IBM dealer.' I said, 'I have the yellow pages right in front of me; tell me one company that is authorized by IBM to be their dealer.'

"I'm sure she was embarrassed when she looked at the yellow pages. There isn't a single IBM authorized computer store on Oahu. They do however have an authorized IBM typewriter dealership. This is the problem that we face today.

"I know that Senator Kobayashi has

introduced two bills addressing these problems, Senate Bill 469 and Senate Bill 1031, but I'm bringing this up primarily because I can't wait for the bills to pass. The problems are surfacing in Hilo. There are people in Hilo who bought IBM computers. I just want to let the public know that if they are having a lot of problems with their computers at least there is a law in the books that would protect them and it's in Chapter 481A-3, 'Deceptive trade practices. (a) A person engages in a deceptive trade practice when, in the course of the person's business, vocation, or occupation, the person: ... (5) Represents that goods or services are of a particular standard, quality, or grade, and that goods are of a particular style or model, if they are of another;'

"Mr. Public out there will never know whether their IBM computers were replaced with other non-IBM parts. There are some companies that will do this service, to tell you if it's IBM or not IBM, for a nominal charge of \$15 to \$25. I cite this law because I want the public to know that if they're having problems with their computer they have a means to fight back. Thank you, Madam Vice President."

Senator A. Kobayashi then added:

"Madam Vice President, I'd like to follow up on that same subject brought up by the previous speaker.

"The two bills that I introduced dealing with this problem -- one, asking that computer stores disclose when they do make changes in the computer; the second bill, extending the warranty if these changes have been made -- are in the Consumer Protection Committee. I'd like to thank the chairman for hearing those bills and being willing to pass them out.

"The warranty bill will be heard this Friday and I'd like to give notice to all the computer stores that if they do want to comment on it, this is their chance. The hearing is scheduled for this Friday at 2:00 o'clock, I believe. Thank you."

Senator Cobb then responded:

"Madam Vice President, in further response to the remarks of the two previous speakers, not only have the two bills been heard but the first of the two bills, that requiring full disclosure, has already been reported out favorably from your Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce by decision vote of the committee.

"The second bill is deferred one week with an intention to also report it out but to give the affected parties time to

comment. It will be taken up this Friday as one of the first items on the agenda and barring any unforeseen circumstances it is my intention as chairman to report that bill out, also.

"If the law is not considered strong enough at that point, I will then consider the additional redress of treble damages for any consumer who is affected by such a

fraudulent and deceptive business practice. Thank you."

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:28 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator George and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Tuesday, February 24, 1987.

He is making his visit to the last state, Hawaii, as part of an extended Pacific tour which includes visits to Guam, American Samoa, and the Northern Mariana Islands, as well as to Japan.

"He will be here until February 27 and will have occasion to visit a wide variety of Hawaii's art organizations, artists, legislators, state officials, and businessmen and women, as well as visiting the neighbor islands.

"Last night he was honored at a large poi supper at Atherton Halau of the Bishop Museum.

"Accompanying him is Mrs. Sarah Richards who is our director of the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts."

At this time, Mr. Hodsoll rose to be recognized and was presented a lei by

Senator Young.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 12 (S.C.R. No. 15):

By unanimous consent, action on Stand. Com. Rep. No. 12 and S.C.R. No. 15, entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION URGING THE GOVERNOR TO DIRECT THE ATTORNEY GENERAL TO APPEAL THE COURT'S DECISION IN PALILA V. HAWAII DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES," was recommitted to the Committee on Housing, Hawaiian Programs and Natural Resources.

Senator Matsuura then introduced to the members of the Senate Miss Susan Kobayashi, daughter of Senator Ann Kobayashi, who earned her degree in electrical engineering from Brown University in Providence, Rhode Island, and recently completed graduate studies at Keio University, Japan.

Senator Hee rose on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Madam Vice President, this morning the Judiciary Committee, as in the past ten days, has been convening at 9:00 a.m. and subsequently at 4:00 p.m. and in some cases adjourning at 11:30 and at midnight.

"This morning, we dealt with several bills dealing with judges, justices, confirmation, compensation, removal, nomination, retention, election, salary commission, retirement, disqualification, establishing a new circuit court in Kona, jurisdiction, and even establishing a Waikiki night court.

"The thrust of the discussion, Madam Vice President, is that the judiciary itself failed to appear, and with the exception of four or five bills, the sum testimony went something like this. It was written by Janice Wolf in three paragraphs of which two of the three paragraphs are of one sentence. One sentence statements.

"On Senate Bill 168, it was written in two paragraphs and the last paragraph consisted of two sentences. The last sentence said, 'Thank you for the opportunity to testify.'

"I call the attention of the members to this matter because it highlights the thoughtlessness of the chief justice (CJ). There was no House Judiciary Committee hearing at 9:00 a.m. so they could not have been there. There was no Ways and Means Committee meeting so they could not have been there. The question was, where were they? Where has the CJ been?

"While some may argue that he should not be here, that's okay. I can buy some of the merits of that argument. Nonetheless, where is Janice Wolf?

"The vast amount of criticism in the judiciary has been focused on the hind side of Mr. Tom Okuda but I wonder if the target should be where it really belongs. Mr. Okuda has been expressly told in no uncertain terms never to show up at the Legislature. On the other hand, where do you find Ms. Wolf? She's certainly not at the Legislature. What we had, instead, was an individual who has been on the payroll of the judiciary for less than six months, perhaps less than six weeks. Certainly, someone who, as far as the chairman of the Judiciary Committee is concerned, is not only unqualified but has no business representing the judiciary.

"It would behoove the judiciary, inasmuch as apparently the 48-hour agenda notices are not enough time, that they at least call me at extension 4276. And if they need the help of the committee which is already overworked, then we would make that opportunity available to the judiciary branch of government.

"In the future, if the chief justice feels, in his infinite wisdom, that his appearance, or those people who come before the committee to represent him, feels that this is all that is necessary, let me state emphatically that we will not hear bills on the judiciary if they so take the attitude that this is what is necessary in the body of the Senate.

"It will behoove the chief justice of this state to get off the stick and get moving because the criticism of the Senate has been that we do not take care of the important business.

"It has been the policy of the Judiciary Committee to hear as many bills as possible. I repeat that, as many bills as possible. Over 600 bills have been referred to the committee and we will make that bona fide effort to hear, if not all, most of those bills, and by the same token, I want to congratulate the Bar Association for coming forward and testifying on behalf of the judges. I want to congratulate and make mention of a former member of the Judiciary Selection Commission who came forward on a hearing notice.

"I also want to take this opportunity to point out that one of the problems we have in the judiciary, Madam Vice President, is that we are uncovering information like this which shows, as a result of one of the hearings, that our per diem judges, some of whom have absolutely no qualification that are standardized by the Selection Commission or any other body, have served the equivalent of 15 — 15 full-time district judges, 15 district judges — 3,511.45 days. The CJ has no response to this.

"Let me make this clear to everyone here that if the CJ apparently feels that this is not worth responding to, then, let no one criticize the Senate when it takes the action which will be reflected in the budget. Thank you."

Senator Yamasaki, chairman of the Committee on Ways and Means, then requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing for the subjects listed on the agenda of the Senate Ways and Means Committee's hearing notice for Friday, February 27, 1987, and the Chair granted the waiver.

Senator Chang, for the chairman of the Committee on Transportation, requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing on S.B. No. 1120, and the Chair granted the waiver.

Senator Kuroda then rose on an introduction and remarked:

"Madam Vice President, I rise to re-introduce a person. I am going to re-introduce Mark Inouye who is from Wheeler Intermediate School.

"It's really unfortunate that his classmates were not able to remain in the gallery to listen to the chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee pronounce his

frustrations in receiving testimony because this is the type of information that is of greater value to students. The students only had the opportunity to witness the Senate introduce people and I think it's Mark's responsibility to share with his fellow students the matter of what the Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman has stated. (Mark, CJ stands for chief justice. That's part of your homework.) Thank you."

Senator Cobb, chairman of the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce then requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing as follows:

"Madam Vice President, there may be some short form bills coming out for recommittal back after First Reading for the purpose of hearing with your Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce. I would simply like to ask the Chair for a waiver, if that happens."

and the Chair granted the waiver.

Thursday, February 26, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:43 o'clock a.m., with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend James Russow of Our Savior Lutheran Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator McMurdo who was excused.

The Chair announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Fifth Day.

On motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator Cobb and carried, and Roll Call vote having been requested, S.B. No. 251, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE HOLIDAYS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 16. Noes, 7 (Cobb, George, Henderson, Ikeda, A. Kobayashi, B. Kobayashi and Menor). Excused, 2 (McMurdo and Nakasato).

Senator Reed then rose on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Madam Vice President, as the chairman of the Judiciary Committee announced yesterday, we'll be hearing testimony tomorrow evening on capital punishment proposals, and in preparation for that public hearing I discovered an atrocity that I believe demands the censure of this body as well as the general public. What has angered me — and further victimized the parents of a little girl who was recently murdered in our community — is a coldhearted legalistic maneuvering of lawyers.

"Madam Vice President, I need to relate a nationwide practice to put this in proper perspective.

"A couple of weeks ago, '60 Minutes' did a story about Delta Airlines' attempts to discredit crash victims in an attempt to reduce the monetary award given to surviving family members. Delta's lawyers and insurance representatives, for instance, charged that a 28-year-old man killed in the crash was a homosexual. To counter the surviving parents' arguments that the young man was a successful entrepreneur who would have lived a long, profitable life, Delta claimed that due to his alleged homosexuality, he would have contracted AIDS and died in a very few years. The airline's hope, of course, was that the court or jury would return a small award.

"One other example was that of a young woman who was killed in the crash. To counter the surviving husband's lawsuit, Delta's lawyers tried to gather evidence supporting their argument that the couple fought continually, and that the woman cheated on her husband, and that they were about to divorce anyway.

"The goal, of course, is to try to make the point that the surviving family members didn't lose much anyway, so why pay them much?

"With all due respect to the ethical lawyers in our community, I'm afraid this type of legalistic character assassination

has become an accepted part of the profession. So accepted, in fact, that I wouldn't be discussing this slimy side of lawyering were it not for the fact that a new low has been achieved in Honolulu. What makes it even more outrageous is that the lawyers involved work for the government.

"To really appreciate this, try to imagine yourself the parent of a five-year-old girl. Five years old is the age where they're daddy's sweetheart, the age you sort of wish they'd stay at. Then imagine that your little five-year-old girl is kidnapped, sodomized, raped and strangled to death. You wake up for months, night after night, hearing your little girl call for you, crying for your help. Your mind endlessly shuffles through all the what-ifs -- What if I had done this, or not done that ... If only ...

"On the advice of counsel, you sue the city because you believe that the 45-minute delay between the time the police were notified and their arrival contributed to your daughter's death. Then you go about your business, trying to keep living -- day by day. Until Madam Vice President, you get this in the mail -- a countersuit filed by the Corporation Counsel accusing you of causing your little girl's death. Arguing to the court -- echoing Delta's tactics -- that if you had been a better parent, your little girl would still be alive today.

"In this countersuit delivered to the parents a week before Christmas, last year,

the Corporation Counsel argues that the death of the little girl was proximately caused by the negligence or other wrongdoing of the mother and father, by their failure to discharge properly their duty as parents and legal guardians, and goes on to argue to the court that if any judgment is to be found, let it be a judgment only against themselves.

"I'd like to serve notice to the Corporation Counsel that this type of tactic -- dredged from the legal cesspool available to all private lawyers -- should not be available to government attorneys. It's up to government to rise above the defenses employed by the private sector. It's up to government to protect our children, and help us seek justice when that protection fails. It is not government's function to pierce our hearts a second time. Lawyers who can't transcend the cesspool should remain in private practice. Thank you."

At this time, Senator Aki, chairman of the Committee on Housing, Hawaiian Programs and Natural Resources, requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing on S.B. No. 4, and the Chair granted the waiver.

Senator Cobb, for the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 65) recommending that Senate Bill No. 348, as amended in S.D. 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

On motion by Senator Cobb, seconded by Senator Blair and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 348, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RESPIRATORY CARE SERVICES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Senator Cobb, for the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 66) recommending that Senate Bill No. 1058 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

The Senate reconvened at 11:54 o'clock a.m.

Senate Bill No. 77:

Senator Cobb moved that S.B. No. 77 be recommitted to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, seconded by Senator Blair.

Senator Blair spoke on the recommitment of the bill as follows:

"Mr. President, first of all, I thank those of you who supported me on the bill.

"To complete the record on this bill, it was not my intent to do away with boxing although as has been alleged by some. However, if the present practices continue much longer, it may become my desire to do that. The Roman colosseum approach to entertainment must ultimately see an end.

"I'm moving for the recommitment because I'm not sure that this bill is the best way to approach the problem. Its genesis was in

the frustration from the fact that we as a society are not willing to be truly responsible to the young men who engage in this sport for our entertainment. We allow them to give up more than just the years of their youth to the sport.

"After consultation with our in-house expert, I now suggest a new approach. Rather than pushing this bill further, I'll be back next year with what I hope will be something that's acceptable to all of you: a percentage of the proceeds of any boxing card would be put into a fund for a long-term health insurance program so that we can mitigate the adverse consequences. I hope I will have support for that next year. Thank you very much, Mr. President."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried and S.B. No. 77, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BOXING CONTESTS," was recommitted to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

At 11:58 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:59 o'clock a.m.

Senator Holt rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, before I begin, I'd just like to read a letter that I received this morning. It says, 'Dear Senator Holt, Please do not allow others and Senator Dan Inouye to influence your thinking. There has to be more than location involved in Fort DeRussy when certain persons spend many thousands to promote one site. Their only interest should be a center, not location. DeRussy is the only site at which hotels are also feasible.'

"I won't go on to mention the person's name, but go on to say that the Committee on Tourism has just been through the harrowing experience of selecting a convention center site.

"As everyone knows, the selection is very unpopular with a vocal interest group which has threatened that construction of the convention center at the site as 'political suicide.' Nevertheless, the members of the Committee on Tourism, including the Senator who serves the district in which the site is located, overcame any thoughts of political disadvantage, and acted to further the public welfare by approving the site recommended by me, the chairman.

"Because of the courage of the members, I have a debt of gratitude to them and obligation to protect the committee's recommendation.

"What is troubling to me now is that I need not have put the members through the experience. The committee was not required to make any selection or take any other action concerning the convention center. For, Hawaii's senior Senator in Washington is going to choose the site for the people of the State of Hawaii.

"Just last evening on the news, the Senator questioned our decision in selecting a small portion of Ala Wai Golf Course as the site for a convention center. And it is my understanding that the Senator is in town for the purpose of meeting with the governor and the leadership of both houses to discuss site selection for the convention center.

"I have been very busy during the interim with my personal life and, also, the fish have been really biting in Kaneohe Bay. So, I am ignorant of the amendment to the U.S. Constitution which reserves to the U.S. Senate the right and power to select and plan and zone for convention center sites. I apologize to the members of the Committee on Tourism for this oversight.

"I am confident that the senior Senator will choose a site compatible with the generally recognized desire and need for a convention center to be 'in or near Waikiki.'

"The Committee on Tourism has selected a site, based on two studies which ranked Ala Wai Golf Course as No. 1, which meets these conditions and which, furthermore, will cost nothing to acquire and will not, I repeat, will not displace existing users, contrary to what is being said in the media.

"There is only one feasible alternative to the site selected by the committee and that is Ft. DeRussy. While the Ft. DeRussy site is better suited for marketing purposes, its acquisition will require the state in all

likelihood to pay a huge purchase price. In my opinion, a convention center at that alternative site is feasible only if state acquisition is guaranteed immediately and free of charge.

"I believe the Senate's position on the convention center site as expressed in Senate Bill No. 1192, S.D. 1, has been made with the best interest of the state foremost in mind, without consideration of the negative political consequences and with great fortitude and high principle.

"In recommending the site, I conferred with many different people that are very interested in a convention center and all, apparently, had concurred with different degrees of enthusiasm. I repeat, all those consulted concurred to my face. I will be disappointed, at the least, if I have been misled.

"Finally, I reiterate the committee's position on the convention center matter. Enough studies have been done to select a site. Every year in which the operation of the convention center is delayed results in a loss of \$130- to \$140 million to the state's economy. Delegation of the duty of selecting the site to another body is irresponsible, unjustified, unethical, and lacking in principle and fortitude. I believe that all members of the Senate will support the position that the convention center site should be done now.

"My personal position is that the Senate should not approve any legislation mandating further study, selection of a site by a commission or authority, or earmarking of some of the transient accommodations tax to a convention center fund, unless the legislation also includes the designation of a specific site. Thank you very much."

Senator McMurdo also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, may I respond to the remarks of the Senator from the Tourism Committee. I have to be brief, as you can see.

"As you all know, the Ala Wai Golf Course is not one of my favorite spots for a convention center, but at this point I realize and I'm disappointed that we are not going to look further at Fort Armstrong. However, I do realize, also, in talking to my colleagues that it is the disposition of the Senate to choose the Ala Wai Golf Course. Also, on further talking in the committee hearing the other night with committee members, and with other Senators, I've been assured that my grave concerns about traffic for the people of Moiliili and the surrounding areas will be carefully addressed; that the concerns of the golfers are also addressed. I note that two of the

people who signed the committee report are two of the most avid golfers, not only in the Senate but in the state. If they feel that the golf course can be properly handled I'm not going to argue with that.

"On the matter of Ft. DeRussy, I called Washington this morning and I talked to the House Armed Services Committee. I have been assured that they have not changed their stance of hanging on to Ft. DeRussy for the military. The statute in Congress which says that if it were to be sold it will be sold at fair market value still stands. So, I don't know why DeRussy could possibly be still under consideration. Thank you very much."

Senator Cobb also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in very strong support of your chairman on the Tourism Committee and the members who made the decision embodied in Standing Committee Report No. 21, in reference to Senate Bill 1192, S.D. 1.

"I'm in agreement with virtually everything in that committee report and I support the principles and the decisions that your Tourism Committee and its chairman made, 1,000 percent. I want to make it clear of my strong support for this position because I think the committee report and the embodying legislation accompanying it is sensitive, logical, comprehensive, and addresses the concerns of golfers as well as other elements in our community.

"The only point of reservation I would have was that there is not nearly enough of a dissertation on the subject of Ft. DeRussy. It's not only a matter that if Ft. DeRussy were chosen we would be facing a purchase cost at fair market value of anywhere from \$392- to \$500 million. Ft. DeRussy is also the home of the only Army corps dedicated solely to the defense of the entire Pacific area where, I would remind the members, each of our last three wars have started.

"To choose Ft. DeRussy in the face of a growing Soviet buildup in the Pacific would be nothing less than to put private profit ahead of military preparedness, and I'm not prepared to do that. There are a variety of other unresolved planning issues on Ft. DeRussy, including the horrendous traffic that is already at a state of grid lock all around that post.

"There are also the considerations involving the cost. The Senate Tourism chairman is absolutely correct when he points out that the cost of Ft. DeRussy would be horrendous. It is estimated to be at least \$500- to \$600 million, which if done would make it the largest capital

improvement project in the state's history.

"Mr. President, I've been a long-time supporter of Senator Inouye, and I'm not going to criticize him on the floor, but I would like to make this observation. The Senator has said he would leave the decision of a convention center to the Legislature and once that decision is made he'd support it, and it's been my understanding, all of these years, that is the principal reason why the funding at the federal level has been withheld on Ft. DeRussy in the meantime, pending a decision by the Legislature.

"I think the Senate is prepared to make that decision and I hope the other house is willing to concur. Once the decision is made, I would simply ask the good Senator to please stand by his word and acknowledge the decision made by the local Legislature.

"Finally, Mr. President, I'd like to thank Senator Holt for his courage, his compassion, and the brilliance shown in this committee report. I think this is a document that every member can support and I'll be willing to stand by him day or night against anyone to support the decisions and the prerogative to make a decision that's embodied in this report.

"I agree we don't need any additional studies. We have two studies already completed and more than sufficient information to make a decision. The time for studying is over; the time to act is now. Thank you."

At this time, the Chair introduced the Honorable Samuel Nunes, president of the Louisiana State Senate, and Mrs. Nunes.

"Mr. President, today, it is my distinct pleasure to introduce a colleague from Guam who has done much to improve the educational system of Guam. (Just as Senator Mizuguchi will do before the end of the session.)

"Mr. President, Senators, and guests, at this time, I would like to introduce the Honorable Franklin J.A. Quitugua, Speaker of the Senate of Guam. (Speaker Quitugua rose to be recognized.) Yes, I did say Speaker and I did say Senate. Just a word of explanation. In Guam it is a unicameral legislature and he is the Speaker.

"Accompanying the speaker is Mrs. Dolly Ching, senior vice president of the Bank of Hawaii. She was very recently promoted to this position. As I understand it, she is the first woman to be elevated to such a prestigious position in a major organization. (Mrs. Ching rose to be recognized.)

"Next to Mrs. Ching is Bob Bloom, vice president and regional manager of the Pacific Islands Division of the Bank of Hawaii. (Mr. Bloom rose to be recognized.)

"Mr. President, Mr. Speaker Quitugua has devoted his life to education and has served twice as chairman of the committee on education.

"Speaker Quitugua earned his bachelor of science degree in education in 1956 and his masters in secondary school administration in 1962 from Northern Arizona University. In 1975, he received a doctor of philosophy degree in educational administration from

the University of Oregon. His teaching experience started 30 years ago and he became a principal 24 years ago which, if my math is correct, means that he became a principal just six years after becoming a teacher.

"One of the first bills he introduced as a senator provided for an alternative education program with which we are all familiar with.

"During his term as chairman of the education committee, he increased funding for education by 40 percent during his two terms. Such impressive accomplishments are indeed worthy of our esteem and it is my privilege to present him to this body."

The honoree was presented a Senate Certificate by Senator Hagino and Senator Young presented him with a lei.

Senator Hee introduced Mr. Bud Pinkosh of Kailua and his son who were sitting in the gallery. Senator Hee added that "Bud Pinkosh is working for Representative Reb Bellinger. He at various times served as the president of the Chamber of Commerce and the Kailua Community Council. In short, when Bud speaks E.F. Hutton listens."

At this time, the Chair invited the Honorable Franklin J.A. Quitugua to the rostrum, escorted by Senator Young, and Mr. Quitugua addressed the members of the Senate as follows:

"Thank you very much, Mr. President.

"Mr. President, esteemed members of the Hawaii Senate, I'm overwhelmed. I really did not expect to be accorded this honor that you have bestowed on me this morning. I hope that when you visit Guam, which is only 6,000 miles away to the West, we accord you the same honor that you have given me. I appreciate this very much.

"I hope that in our relationship in the future that we will be working very closely as island residents, as people in the Pacific, in politics, in social as well as economic ... I hope that our island people can really be together as we move forward in this decade of the Pacific.

"Thank you very much for this."

THIRTY-FIRST DAY

Thursday, March 5, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:38 o'clock a.m., with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Sister Rose Lauren Earl of the Natural Family Planning Center, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirtieth Day.

And, since we have several Senators and several members of the House who bought IBM's and had a subsequent problem which was really the genesis of the bill in question that passed, I would like to take a very brief moment to present the original to the introducer of the bill, Senator Ann Kobayashi, and certified copies of the real thing to Senators Matsuura and Chang."

At 11:52 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:56 o'clock a.m.

Senator Hee then rose on a matter of record as follows:

"Mr. President, for the record, I would like the Clerk to note that the amended notice of public hearing for the Judiciary Committee, scheduled for 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., Friday, March 6, 1987, that the Senate drafts were not included on the agenda. The Judiciary staff has retyped the agenda to reflect that the same bills will be heard with the appropriate Senate draft number."

The Chair ordered the Clerk to so note the amended agenda.

Senator Aki, chairman of the Committee on Housing, Hawaiian Programs and Natural Resources, requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing on S.B. No. 1686, and the President granted the waiver.

Senator Menor then rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, as some of you know, I initiated a tour yesterday of the Halawa Medium Security Facility as the chairman of the Senate Corrections Committee. I conducted the tour because I had received information about certain structural and design problems at the facility. Moreover, I had also been informed about delays in

putting together the administrative and organizational plans which are needed before the facility can become operational by the scheduled opening date in July or August of 1987.

"With the indulgence of this body, I would like to very briefly summarize the findings of my tour, not only because I think these findings will be helpful in your budget deliberations but also because I think that the problems I am about to summarize are symptomatic of a much larger problem of mismanagement within the corrections area.

"I would like to assure this body that I am not rising to speak today for the purposes of grandstanding. Although I have felt frustration with the management of the corrections division over the past three years that I have served as chairman of the House and Senate Corrections Committees, I have never taken the opportunity to publicly comment on the legislative floor about my concerns because I wanted to give corrections administrators an opportunity to work things out. But yesterday, when I toured the facility, my frustration reached the boiling point.

"In terms of the structural and design problems, the Halawa High Security administrators who led us through the tour and who, in fact, may be administering the facility pointed out a number of flaws that could present security problems. For example, the guard stations in the residential modules which control the opening and closing of individual cell doors are left open and are not enclosed, which means that a guard, manning the station, could be overpowered by inmates who want to take control of the entire module.

"A second problem. The ceilings in some of these cells have trapdoors which could permit an inmate to hide contraband or climb into the ceiling to disrupt the electrical or plumbing system.

"Another problem. The cells, including those on the ground level, lack adequate security screens, which means that contraband could be snuck in to the inmates through the windows.

"Another problem. There are blindspots in a visiting area which would make it difficult for the guards to properly observe the activities of visitors.

"Another problem. There are overhead light fixtures throughout the facility which disruptive inmates can pull out and convert into weapons.

"I could go on and on about the facility's structural and design problems, but I have other concerns as well about the administration of the facility. Halawa

administrators informed me that there are administrative and operational problems which could preclude or delay the opening of the facility by August of 1987.

"For example, the reorganization plan which, for the information of this body, is a plan to set up the administrative team to operate the medium security facility is still being reviewed by the Department of Social Services and Housing (DSSH) and in fact has been the subject of review and revision for the past two and a half years.

"In addition, even after DSSH approves the plan, it is still going to have to be reviewed and approved by Budget and Finance and the Governor's Office. Once the plan is approved, job classifications for the administrative positions are going to have to be determined and approved by the Department of Personnel Services. Then the vacant positions are going to have to be advertised and filled. Based on the process that I have just described, I think you can see that there is going to be some time delay in terms of just getting the administrative team ready for the opening of the facility.

"Moreover, because corrections officials do not have an administrative team in place, important policies and procedures have still not been developed to operate the medium security facility. Furthermore, I have been informed that the activation team that will have the responsibility for monitoring the implementation and development of these policies and procedures is not even fully in place. There were supposed to be four members on that activation team. At present, only two people are serving on that team.

"I was also informed about possible understaffing problems. I had a conversation with the consultant who's been involved in the design of the facility, and I've also been in communication with the administrators from the Halawa High Security Facility. They indicated that, based on the executive budget, we may need an additional 51 positions to provide adequate security for that facility.

"In light of these real or potential problems, I am very skeptical about whether that facility is going to be ready for occupancy by the scheduled August opening date. I think we should be very concerned about any delays in the opening of the facility because as all of you know, the state is now under a consent decree which requires among other things, that the state move as expeditiously as possible to relocate inmates out of the Oahu Community Correctional Center to alleviate prison overcrowding.

"I also think that it's very unfortunate

that the state may have to make after-the-fact improvements to a facility that is near completion which could result in a greater expenditure of tax dollars than would have been required had the flaws been discovered earlier.

"All of the parties who participated in the tour yesterday, including the corrections administrator, recognized that these problems exist and have to be resolved. What is disturbing to me is not only that these problems exist, but the responses of the corrections administrator to these problems. For example, I take exception to the cavalier statement made by the corrections administrator that these problems could in no way have been identified during the planning and design process.

"It should be pointed out that the state has already committed and expended close to \$2 million in planning and designing that facility. In my opinion, it is inexcusable that such serious and obvious design flaws could not have been discovered during the planning and design process. Moreover, had corrections officials been in consultation with the Halawa High Security administrators, some of whom will be involved in the administration of the medium security facility, during the earlier stages of the planning process, all of these problems could have been identified much sooner.

"What I am especially concerned about is the fact that despite denials from the corrections administrator that he had any knowledge about these problems prior to yesterday, I have been informed that he knew about these problems as early as two months ago. At that point, the corrections administrator should have come forward, as any competent administrator would have, to inform the Legislature about the problems and recommend solutions. Had that been done in this particular situation, we as legislators would not be in the position that we find ourselves in now, of having to resolve these problems as a legislative body within a very short time period when important deadlines and the close of the legislative session are rapidly approaching.

"I recognize that the creation and establishment of a new Department of Corrections may partially resolve what I really believe are management problems within the corrections area. However, I also firmly believe that the fundamental issue in the corrections area, no matter what management structure we adopt, is leadership. Therefore, I strongly urge the governor that if leadership cannot be provided within the existing management team, then he make the necessary administrative changes to insure that the kind of leadership that we need in the

corrections area is the kind of leadership that we will have now.

"Thank you very much, Mr. President."

Senator Cobb also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in response to some of the pressure lobbying tactics that have taken place with respect to Senate Bill 34, S.D. 1, providing for banks and other other financial institutions to be allowed to enter into the insurance business.

"In doing so, to make every member of the Senate aware of this, including, most importantly, the chairman and members of the Ways and Means Committee where the bill now rests after having passed your Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

"Mr. President, anyone has a right, and I emphasize the word 'right,' to express an opinion to favor or oppose a bill or an idea. But, when threats are made, I think that goes too far. And I would like to share with you and members of the Senate some of these threats. I'm going to name names, name companies and then I'm going to provide copies of this to any interested parties, including the lobbyist who is not involved personally but who has asked me for copies.

"The first is from a Mr. Eugene S. Wakai of Principal Mutual and the threat, which I'm sure other members have heard, is that 'if you vote to pass Senate Bill 34, I will not vote for you again for any office.' Now he has the right to say that, even though I want that threat shared publicly, but there's more.

"From a Shirley C. Wong of Principal Mutual Life Insurance Company, myself and several other members of the committee have received the following, the closing statement at the end of the letter opposing the bill ... again, which they have a right to favor or oppose ... and I quote: 'If you vote to pass this bill, you will no longer have my support or vote as well as the support of my clients. Let me make you aware that I do not have clients who live only in one district of this state. My clientele live throughout the State of Hawaii (and on all islands).'

"In response to this kind of despicable lobbying, Mr. President, we have written what I consider to be a reasoned and rationed letter of response and I would like to share that with you very briefly.

'Dear "so and so":

Thank you for your letter of (date) concerning Senate Bill No. 34, Relating to Banking. You may be interested to learn of several amendments to the bill that I

proposed in committee:

a) Provide that no financial institution may use funds on deposit as collateral for capitalization with which to form an insurance company.

b) No financial institution may utilize any degree of coercion to induce a customer to purchase insurance from the institution as a condition for the approval of a loan.

c) Any financial institution which sells insurance must be fully prepared to service the accounts thus established, and must employ qualified, licensed insurance agents for that purpose.

The genesis of Senate Bill No. 34 lay in comments made by various insurance company officials to the effect that the Legislature should enact laws agreeable to the insurance industry or it would pick up and leave Hawaii. In view of that uncompromising position, I find it appropriate to provide maximum stimulation and incentives to other companies such as banks, savings and loan associations, other financial institutions, and other interested companies to enter the insurance business in Hawaii.

I have never, and will not now, countenance such threats as above as a part of the legislative process.

I appreciate your past support and consideration, and I hope that this letter will help you to understand my thinking with respect to Senate Bill No. 34. The bill is intended neither to harm nor limit the functions of individual agents or responsible companies, but rather to foster business development, employment opportunities, and provide a greater range of choices for consumers in the purchase of insurance.

Sincerely, Steve Cobb, Senator.'

"Mr. President, most insurance agents that I know are friends and I have a very high regard for Mr. Steve O'Toole, their lobbyist. He has requested copies of the letters in question and I will be providing them to him.

"But I want to make it very clear at this point, I will not tolerate this kind of despicable, putrid, abhorrent, sleaze-bag, pressure-kind of lobbying, and when I get it, my reaction to threats like this is to support the bill more, not less.

"I want to put you and the members of the Ways and Means Committee on notice and on record today that Senate Bill No. 34 is now the number one priority of your Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce. It now rests in Ways and Means Committee.

"Thank you."

The Chair, at this time, made the following pronouncement:

"Members of the Senate, the Chair would like to request of all committee chairmen, with the weekend coming up, that as many of the bills that they intend to report out be taken to our Majority Research Office or to the Legislative Reference Bureau as soon as possible. We will ask the staff to stay over the weekend so that we can facilitate committee reports instead of waiting for the big rush on Tuesday.

"If possible, we'd like to see all chairmen bring down bills that they intend to report out — today, tomorrow, and even Saturday. We will hold the legislative backup staff here specifically for that purpose."

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:12 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator George and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Friday, March 6, 1987.

THIRTY-SECOND DAY

Friday, March 6, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:40 o'clock a.m., with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Father Colin J. Correa of the Co-Cathedral of St. Theresa and the Baby Jesus, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The Chair announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-First Day.

Senator A. Kobayashi, on behalf of Senator Young, also introduced Ms. Marguerite Simson, Ms. Terri McGraw and Ms. Agnes Conrad from the Foundation for Hawaii Women's History Week, who were present on the Senate floor.

Senator Yamasaki moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 358 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Mizuguchi and carried.

Senator Yamasaki then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of Russel S. Nagata as Comptroller, term to expire December 3, 1990, seconded by Senator Mizuguchi.

Senator Yamasaki then rose to speak in support of the nomination as follows:

"Madam Vice President, the Ways and Means Committee would like to recommend the confirmation of Russel S. Nagata, Governor's Message No. 97. We have received only favorable comments regarding this nominee. Thank you."

Senator Chang also rose to speak in support of the nomination as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I would also like to speak in favor of the nomination. I have had the opportunity to observe the nominee

in several contentious situations. He has always exercised sound judgment and evenhandedness in his actions. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 359 (Gov. Msg. No. 98):

Senator Yamasaki moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 359 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Mizuguchi and carried.

Senator Yamasaki then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of Yukio Takemoto as Director of Finance, term to expire December 3, 1990, seconded by Senator Mizuguchi.

Senator Yamasaki then rose to speak in support of the nomination as follows:

"Madam Vice President, we have also received favorable testimony regarding the nomination of Mr. Yukio Takemoto and the Ways and Means Committee would like to recommend a favorable vote on his confirmation."

Senator Mizuguchi also rose to speak in support of the nomination as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I would be remiss if I did not stand up and say a few words on behalf of Yukio Takemoto because it is in these halls that I met Yuki — he as chief clerk of Ways and Means and I as a legislative analyst with the Senate President.

"Seventeen years ago when I met Yuki, he was a modest, quiet, and very competent and knowledgeable individual. After serving the Senate, he took the high road and went to work for the Labor Appeals Board and the university, and I took the very low road and entered the political arena. After all these years, I've known Yuki to have developed very sound judgment. He is a fair individual with great integrity.

"As the Director of Finance, he will no doubt serve the general public effectively. His willingness to make the sacrifice demanded of a public servant is laudable and deserves the full support of this body. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 360 (Gov. Msg. No. 99):

Senator Yamasaki moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 360 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Mizuguchi and carried.

Senator Yamasaki then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of Richard F. Kahle Jr. as Director of Taxation, term to expire December 3, 1990, seconded by Senator Mizuguchi.

Senator Yamasaki then rose to speak in support of the nomination as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I speak in favor of the nomination of Mr. Richard F. Kahle. We all know Mr. Kahle as a former employee of the Legislative Reference Bureau who has done an outstanding job, especially in the field of taxation, bills relating to taxes. I'm sure he's going to be an outstanding Director of Taxation. We have received favorable comments regarding this nomination, and I urge everyone to vote for his confirmation. Thank you."

Senator Holt also rose to speak in support of the nomination as follows:

"Madam Vice President, notwithstanding the remarkably consistent opposition to every bill I have heard in the Tourism Committee earmarking funds from the transient accommodations tax, I urge all my colleagues to unanimously support Rick Kahle as Director of Taxation. Thank you."

Senator Chang also rose to speak in support of the nomination as follows:

"Madam Vice President, just a few words on behalf of Senator Holt, Senator Blair, myself, and all those who have served as Senate staff members in these halls over the past several decades. We can attest to Mr. Kahle's stringent enforcement of the bureau's policies and yet demonstrate his compassion whenever the policy seemed to work against the very needy and desperate staff members. So, on behalf of all of us, I would like to recommend his nomination. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura also rose to speak in support of the nomination as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I'm going to support this nomination although I just want this body to know that every major bill that I had on port issues have died, and every major bill about taxation that Senator Henderson introduced died, and now he is going to kill all our bills that go to the Ways and Means Committee. But even with all that, he has the character and the personality to withstand this body and I wholeheartedly support his nomination. Thank you."

Senator Hee also rose to speak in support of the nomination as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I am supporting Mr. Kahle because I understand he will take the high and courageous road in recommending a tax on military pensions, and I want to announce that I support courageous individuals."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

The Chair then asked the newly confirmed department heads, many of whom were sitting in the gallery, to rise and be recognized.

At this time, the following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Kuroda introduced Mr. Yoshio Kunugi, manager of the international relations division of All Nippon Airways; Mr. John Nugent, vice president of Global USA, chief lobbyist for ANA in Washington, D.C.; Mr. Y. K. Kobayashi, manager and locally based manager of ANA Hotels Hawaii; Mr. Masami Sakashita, assistant of ANA Hotels Hawaii; accompanied by Ms. Millie Ludwick, the Hawaii representative of ANA Hotels Hawaii, and stated:

"Madam Vice President, the gentlemen are here to again meet with state officials. Mr. Nugent is from Washington, D.C., and they continue to work on the possibility of attaining a regularly scheduled route to Hawaii. Presently, ANA has direct flights to Washington, D.C., and to Los Angeles, but this gateway City of Honolulu should be foremost as far as the next gateway city to the United States."

Senator Fernandes Salling introduced the winners of an essay contest sponsored by the Commission on the Handicapped and the AFL/CIO, who were present on the Senate floor, as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I would like to introduce the following people that you see on the floor, but before going through and naming each one, I'd like to explain to the body what they have been recognized for.

"Every year the Commission on the Handicapped, along with the AFL/CIO, sponsors an essay contest, and this year's theme, 'Workers with Disability, Success through Independence,' required the students to not only write the essay but to go out and research the subject of disability and how it affects people's lives. The students had to interview the people and

they had to learn for the first time to take time to meet and talk with these people. This gave these students the opportunity to see disabled people in a positive light as productive and independent taxpaying members of our community.

"The program is designed to bring an awareness to the students of the lives of these very special people, and with us on the floor are the winners of this essay contest. It gives me great pleasure to introduce the first place winner, Claire Futenma. Claire is a senior from Kapaa High School and she will be going to Colorado to participate in the national contest. The second place winner also hails from Kapaa High School, Sharolyn Kaui.

"At this time, I would like to introduce the teacher who was responsible for helping these two do so well in this contest, Josephine Sokei. And I do believe that Senator Menor may want to introduce the third place winner who comes from his district."

Senator Menor then introduced the third place winner, Kimberly Cassidy from Mililani High School, and her teacher Mrs. Kotake, and stated:

"Madam Vice President, it is an honor and a privilege for me to join in the congratulatory remarks made by Senator Fernandes Salling about our honorees. I would especially like to say to Kimberly that, as her Senator, I am speaking for this entire legislative body and the community of Mililani in expressing our pride in her achievement. I wish to thank all of the honorees for being here today."

At this time, the students and teachers rose to be recognized.

At 12:05 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:08 o'clock p.m.

Senator Kuroda then introduced Mr. Don Worobe from Pearl City, a very good friend and the Commander of the Hawaii Disabled Veterans Organization and one of the co-sponsors of this commendation.

Senator Nakasato then rose on a congratulatory note and remarked:

"Madam Vice President, I noticed this morning that the men of the Mizuguchi family made the news. While the good Senator went to bat for us against the Board of Education, his son Reid, who pitches for the Punahou School Baseball Team, had a perfect game yesterday against Hawaii Baptist Academy.

"Reid Mizuguchi had a perfect game going — he gave no hits, struck out eight batters, gave no walks — and this was done in five innings. The score was 12-0; he faced a minimum of 15 batters, 3 batters each inning for five innings — a tremendous achievement. And, he also made two hits to contribute to the winning cause.

"I just want to congratulate the Senator and his son."

Senator Holt then added:

"Madam Vice President, I hope the Senator can throw a perfect game against the Board of Education." (Laughter.)

At this time, Senator Mizuguchi rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Madam Vice President, I am now known as Reid Mizuguchi's father.

"Madam Vice President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"Distinguished members of the Senate, in today's morning newspaper 'Requests for future cuts infuriates school board.' In last night's evening news of the Board of Education meeting, it was not 'Entertainment Tonight' but there are some inexplicable terms and intemperate remarks made by Board of Education members about the members of the Legislature, specifically from the state Senate. So, today, I would like to set the record straight and bring you up-to-date on the specific issue at hand as it relates to the Department of Education budget.

"As you are well aware, we are in the process of reviewing and formulating a budget for this next fiscal biennium. Based on the instructions by our knowledgeable chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, Senator Yamasaki, we found that the Department of Education was asking for 16 million more dollars to their request for this next fiscal biennium. So with that thought, I issued a letter to Superintendent Charles Toguchi, a former colleague of ours, and I'd like to read this letter into the record. It states:

'Dear Charlie,

We need your help quickly on a key budgetary matter.

As you know, the budgetary guidelines issued to our committee on Ways and Means require us to stay within the ceiling represented by the amount of the executive budget plus the governor's supplemental budget. This means that in providing for your recommended supplemental budget, we are limited to

\$33,252,425 for the fiscal biennium, the total funds which you indicate are available after reallocation of current resources in the amount of \$13,052,425 and the addition of \$20,200,000 from the governor's supplemental allocation.

Therefore, I am asking you and your staff to rework the budget and to limit the program adjustments to the \$33,252,425 available for the biennium. (And this is a key statement that I'd like to read into the record.) Perhaps, at some later time, the funds will be available to accommodate all or most of your department's supplemental requests, but for now, we have to work under the foregoing constraint.

We are fighting a deadline, and also I am asking that we receive your supplementary schedule by noon on March 4.'

"Madam Vice President, subsequently, because the Board of Education was meeting on the 5th, a letter was sent by Senator Yamasaki and myself to bring forward those changes no later than 12:00 noon today.

"That is the background of our particular request.

"The issue at hand is that Governor Waihee, in attempting to give greater flexibility to the Department of Education, said that he would give the department \$20 million if it could come up with an additional \$10 million, and in that initial reallocation process the department came up with \$13 million, matched by \$20 million from the executive to give us a grand total of \$33 million.

"Today, after receiving two memos from the Department of Education which included numerous changes, requests, and insistence that we add on another \$16 million to this budget, bringing this budget to a grand total of \$49 million.

"I think that the major issue that we want to dispel here is that the board does not have the ultimate spending authority. It is the Legislature that has this spending authority and it is our power and our prerogative to request for an updated and very, very good information so that we, in turn, can make some wise decisions about a very important issue as it relates to public education for our children.

"Not only do I feel an anger about the board's misinterpretation about their role and responsibility, but I find it inexplicable that they would discredit the fine work of our chairman of the Ways and Means Committee. His unquestionable integrity, knowledge, and the years of service has served us well as our fiscal leader in this

particular body.

"They have also, again, challenged the commitment of members of the Senate that we are not committed to providing for first-class education for our children in our public schools.

"So it is with these statements, Madam Vice President, that I want to set the record straight and that these public outbursts will not deter your Senate Education to work very hard with Senator Yamasaki to come up with an appropriate budget for the Department of Education.

"Thank you."

Senator Hee then responded to the previous speaker's remarks as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I would like to make some comments regarding the previous speaker's remarks on the Department of Education.

"Madam Vice President, it seems that this is that time of the year in the legislative session when the horns come out of the Board of Education and the crying towels proceed to follow the horns. I would like for you and the members to understand that our Board of Education has been published in this morning's Advertiser with saying, and I quote Reverend Aiona who said,

'... Looking this over, I'm really getting pissed off. It happens all the time. ... All these politicians shooting their mouths off about improving quality education — it's not going to happen. A lot of our programs end up in half-assed ways.'

"I also would like to quote the board chairman who said,

'I'm not sure they're giving me an open hand, ... Or if they are, four fingers are missing and one of them is sticking up.'

"This speaks for the Board of Education.

"As a member of the Education Committee since the first year of my election to the House, the scenario has never changed. The board members, with few exceptions, have gotten re-elected, and the crying towels and the programs with the 'politicians shooting their mouths off' and the reverend getting quote 'pissed off' unquote have remained the same.

"The Board of Education seems to be of the mind that innovations can only occur with more money; that innovations cannot occur by cutting back; that innovations cannot occur by reallocating resources, by redeploying personnel; and that each and every time innovations have been requested they have come from the legislative

Education Committees.

"I point out in fact that at the Education hearings last year, chaired by the now superintendent and former Senator Charles Toguchi, the committee was lied to by the former personnel director who has since become the head civil servant in the personnel department of the Department of Education; that the personnel director when then superintendent Francis Hatanaka indicated that they could not reallocate resources; that they could not redeploy personnel.

"For example, we will be facing shortly a massive continuation of the exodus of not only teachers but educational officers (EO), that is to say, the principals and vice principals presently working for the Department of Education. They are, as a rule rather than the exception, about the same age or have about the same amount of years and are now looking for retirement.

"We know this will happen and yet, year after year, the board has refused, steadfastly refused, to take this problem head on to make necessary adjustments. For example, schools with less than 100 students, do not need a principal who gets paid \$40,000 or can that principal be redeployed into another position and that school be annexed, as it was in the old days, the good old days by the way, to the larger school? Can that principal be removed and two guidance counselors be put in to the benefit of the direct communication between student and counselor, or should that continuation of the EO with \$40,000 to \$45,000 to \$50,000 remain with the school with less than 100 students to play catch in recess, to hang the clothes when he can get away? And this is not a single school, this is statewide.

"In our own homes, when money becomes tight, we begin to shut off lights; we begin to shut faucets; we begin to look at innovative ways like replacing a conventional light bulb with a fluorescent light bulb. This is not new. So rather than the board continue to get quote 'pissed off' unquote and accuse the programs as being quote 'half-assed' unquote, I suggest they look inwardly because this is not new, and for the board to look innovatively. For example, the chairman of the Board of Education testified against a contract for the superintendent ... testified against a contract, which would not have precluded the board from summarily firing someone with just cause, just as a football coach can be summarily fired with just cause. What this would have done was to finally give stability to the Board of Education and the Department of Education; to have finally sent a message to the board and the people and to the students that your superintendent has a contract; that your superintendent

will be there to make tough decisions.

"The chairman whose one finger is left sticking in the air, in my view, has left it sticking to the public. The chairman and the board have cut their OJT program, on-the-job training for EO's, the educational officers. We will be faced with an exodus of retirees, principals, and because of that the Department of Education has accelerated the SAT program whereby teachers can take the test and qualify and become certificated to be principals. Once that has happened, they must go through OJT, on the job training. For that to occur, they must go through that program and only then can they become principals in the Department of Education. So, what has the innovative Board of Education done with respect to OJT? They have cut the supplemental program by 33 percent.

"Now somebody explain to me whose finger is pointing at whom. It is clear to me when one talks about innovation, it doesn't come by wetting a leather collar and letting it dry and squeeze your neck until you die. So, I would encourage this board to put that other finger down with the rest and to clench that fist and make hard decisions which need to be done, and only because of a different policy by the Senate chairman on Education was the board afforded the opportunity to look inwardly and to make those cuts.

"My goodness, innovation occurred with the Judiciary this year by not affording them that same opportunity. And innovation occurred with \$14 million, saved by looking inwardly and making those necessary cuts, even with adding magnetometers and x-ray machines for security.

"These things can be done inwardly and I suggest, rather than trumpeting the news to the media to infuriate the public, that the responsibility be placed exactly where it should be — that's on the Board of Education."

Senator Solomon rose in support of the previous speakers and remarked:

"Madam Vice President, when I was the former Education chairman, the bill had come to the committee to consider doing away with the elected school board and to consider an appointed school board. At that time, your Committee on Education deliberated over the issue. We met with the Board of Education, we met with the administration, and the committee had come to the conclusion that we needed a memorandum of understanding so that both the administration and the Board of Education, as well as the legislative body, would have a clear understanding as to what is their jurisdiction and their prerogative.

"At that time, Madam Vice President, it was discussed in great length and it was decided that these areas would be agreed upon and this memorandum would have been forthcoming. Unfortunately, we never received that memorandum of understanding from the Board of Education.

"It concerns me when elected officials act very irresponsibly and that we as the public begin to question the integrity of that particular public officer. And this is why I had recommended, as chairman of the Education Committee, that we try to work out our differences and come up with a memorandum of understanding, instead of destroying the elective process in which I strongly and firmly believe that the people of this state have a right to participate to determine the educational futures of their young people.

"But after these kinds of remarks that were made in the paper, I find it very discouraging that at one time I had such great confidence in the Board of Education; that we could work out our differences to come up with an understanding so that we have a clear understanding of jurisdiction in reference to our public responsibilities, have just been shattered.

"So, Madam Vice President, I would strongly recommend that the chairman of the Education Committee could re-review this. I know that there is a bill pending, questioning whether or not we should have an elective school board or an appointive school board. But, before we make any rash decision, I would like to make a strong recommendation to the chairman of the Education Committee to try to establish this understanding as to what our jurisdictions are and what are our prerogatives, and to be sure that once this is agreed upon we remain within these jurisdictional areas.

"Thank you very much."

Senator Mizuguchi then added:

"Madam Vice President, there were terms used about cuts and I want the members to know that this \$16 million is new money. We're not cutting anything out of the

existing school budget. I want to make that clear. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura rose in response to the previous remarks and said:

"Madam Vice President, I just want to mention that my colleague from Kaneohe had to use all of those words, 'half-ass,' 'pissed off,' etc. I want the Journal to reflect that those words had to be entered to express the Senator's feelings. However, we are entering those words in our Journal with grave reservations because it does not measure up to a standard of maturity. Those kinds of language should not have been used by a member of the board. Thank you."

Senator Hee then added:

"Madam Vice President, it should be noted for the record that the words reflected by me were the exact quotation of those people charged with the education of our young people and, that, in and of itself, speaks for the quality of some of those members of the board if this is the way that they feel best in their responsibility to better the education system. Thank you."

Senator Cobb also rose to remark as follows:

"Two observations, Madam Vice President. Today's debate might do something to enhance the verbal skills of our students if it's widely published. A very wise man once said, 'If you're not part of the solution, you're part of the problem.' I think those that are complaining about the problem, particularly on the board, ought to be looking in the mirror. Thank you."

At this time, Senator Yamasaki, chairman of the Committee on Ways and Means, requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing on S.B. No. 1746, and the Chair granted the waiver.

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:30 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator George and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Monday, March 9, 1987.

Senator Matsuura then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of Suzanne D. Peterson as Chairman of the Board of Agriculture, term to expire December 31, 1990, seconded by Senator Aki.

Senator Matsuura spoke in support of the nomination as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor and support of the nominee. I just want the body here to know that Suzanne Peterson is able and willing to lead the blue and the green revolution for the State of Hawaii. Thank you."

Senator Reed also spoke in support of the nomination and said:

"Mr. President, as you know, it was my request last Friday that the vote on this nomination was deferred.

"I wanted to first have the opportunity to talk to the nominee about two issues of extreme concern to the people of Molokai: First, the state's eradication of 9,000 cattle when only two were found to be TB infected; and, secondly, I introduced a bill to establish a revolving loan fund to help create jobs for 56 percent of the people of Molokai who are dependent on some form of welfare assistance.

"In speaking against the agricultural loan portion of my proposal, a Department of Planning and Economic Development representative said it was unnecessary because the Department of Agriculture has lots of money for loans.

"When Suzanne Peterson learned I had caused the vote on her nomination to be deferred, she came to see me. She assured me that she agrees that the bovine TB problem was mishandled by the state and that she will work with me to try to help those ranchers who have been hurt. She confirmed that there is \$10 million available for ag loans and gave her personal commitment to spend time with me on Molokai to make sure that everybody who wants to farm will be aware of the ag loan program and will know what is required to get the money.

"As a result, Mr. President, I will support the nomination of Suzanne Peterson. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

At this time, Senator Yamasaki, chairman of the Committee on Ways and Means, requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing for the subjects listed on the agenda of the Senate Ways and Means Committee hearing notice for Tuesday, March 10, 1987, and the President granted the waiver.

Senator Matsuura then spoke in testimony of the late Richard A. Kawakami, Speaker of the House of Representatives, as follows:

"Mr. President, I would like to say a few words in tribute to a friend, the late Representative Richard Kawakami.

"I guess all of you know that Richard and I are perhaps the most popular moviegoers, as far as the state Legislature is concerned. We always went to the movie at 10:00 p.m. and always ended up at Like Like (Drive Inn Restaurant) for coffee.

"Today, I would like to share with you some of my experiences with Richard.

"When I went to the House in 1980, one of my friends in Hilo told me one of the first things I should do was to get to know Richard Kawakami because he is a very good legislator and he will teach you how the legislature works.

"I remember one night over coffee, I asked Richard, I said, 'Look, I'm a freshman legislator. I have the chairmanship of Ocean Resources, and you were chairman of the powerful Land Use and Economic Development Committee for 14 years, now, you're vice chairman of Agriculture.' I asked, 'Do you have some kind of secret strategy?' Then, as usual, Richard laughed and said, 'Someday you'll learn.' And in the same tone, he told me, 'Dick, I have a good idea, there's a fish called anguila' This is where Richard and I became friends.

"It was common knowledge in the House that Richard and I had the 'junkiest' car. When Richard's front door collapsed, he had the 'junkiest' car, so that's one of the reasons why you always saw us at all the fund raisers and the movies.

"I still remember Richard reassuring me, 'Dick, don't worry about our junk cars, the people in Honolulu don't know who you and I are.' He said, 'The people in Hilo know that you're not that poor.'

"There's a saying that goes -- that only by sharing and giving does one truly possess what one has. And this is a real classic example of Richard because he is one person who helped everyone who was in need of a helping hand.

"Richard Kawakami had visions. He had great dreams, practical dreams. Some of those dreams are reality today because I know of them. Others are in bill form; others are yet to be introduced.

"I think that within a decade, Richard may be forgotten, but, as far as I'm concerned, I will always remember him when I see geothermal resource being harnessed to power Oahu. When I see the fruit trees and the winter vegetables growing on the slopes of Waimea and being shipped to the West Coast, I will remember him.

"I will remember Kawakami when I see all the fishes -- mullets and mahimahi growing in tanks along the oceanside. I will remember Kawakami when I see the silver cities for senior citizens patterned after the kibbutz in Israel.

"I'm going to miss him because he has planted a lot of seeds, I mean, a lot of seeds. I'm going to miss him because he's not going to be around to water and 'hohana' these plants.

"I know we all are going to miss him and to that end I just want to say to a friend, 'na ma stae!' (Aloha!)

"Thank you very much, Mr. President."

Senator Fernandes Salling also spoke in testimony of the late Richard Kawakami and said:

"Mr. President, I'd like to add a few words on behalf of my Kauai colleagues and those who served with the Speaker, Richard Kawakami.

"Richard will be remembered not only because of all of the things that he has done which were extolled by Senator Matsuura, but also because all of us from Kauai feel that he was a very good person, a really nice man.

"He was, to me, always reasonable when we dealt with issues from Kauai and though we had our differences we somehow were able to overcome them easily because he had such a good sense of humor and he seemed to be able to keep everything in

perspective.

"I know that the people back home right now and that his friends everywhere are grieving for him, and we will suffer his loss very deeply but he won't be forgotten because of the kind of person that he was and always will be.

"I would like to ask the members of the Senate to honor him in a small way, if I may, Mr. President, by making the motion to adjourn at the proper time."

The Chair responded: "Yes, at the proper time."

Senator Cobb then added his remarks:

"Mr. President, I'd like to rise in brief tribute to our friend and colleague, Richard Kawakami, having served with him for six years in the House and having grown with him together while there, while we've been serving with you in that body.

"I remember on the day of the state of the state address when we as a body, the Senate went over to the House, I showed him a cartoon that I later gave to you where a bedraggled old senior senator was saying to two young freshman senators, 'You people are senators? Heck, I have cigars older than you.' And Richard looked at me and he laughed when he saw that and he said, 'I tell you what, Steve, I'll give you all our cigars.'

"That was the humor of Richard Kawakami that always shown forth and, yet,

when he gave his opening day speech, he set forth a dream which I hope his colleagues in the House, as well as us, can hope to achieve.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Kuroda also added his remarks as follows:

"Mr. President, I'd like to add a few words with regards to our friend, the departed Dick Kawakami.

"Dick and I had in common, graduating from the same high school, Mid-Pacific Institute, and like Senator James Aki, we are the three from the school in the Legislature.

"I'd like to also share with you what I get teased about, which is, Joe Kuroda and his camera. I'm very pleased that I had the opportunity to take a picture of him and a beautiful cake that his staff prepared for him on his birthday, February 22nd, and which I just sent to him. I hope that it adds to the memorabilia of Dick Kawakami. Thank you."

THIRTY-FIFTH DAY

Wednesday, March 11, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:37 o'clock a.m., with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Yoshikazu Saito of Pearl City Hongwanji, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Holt who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Fourth Day.

The following introductions were made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Matsuura, on behalf of Senators Solomon and Henderson and himself, introduced a group of students from the Big Island, participants of the Legislative Experience Program, and their teachers, Mr. Herbert Zane and Ms. Natalie Yokoyama.

Senator Ikeda introduced Melvin Huang and Eric Gulbrandsen, 8th grade students from Niu Valley Intermediate School, participants in the social studies program, "A Day at the Legislature."

Senator Blair then introduced Miss Mimi Pang, student from McKinley High School, and her teacher, Miss Carol Yamada, as follows:

"Mr. President, it's a distinct honor for me this morning to introduce Miss Mimi Pang, a very special student, and Miss Carol Yamada, her teacher. This introduction is made on behalf of Senator Mizuguchi, chairman of the Education Committee, Mimi's senator, Senator Mary Jane McMurdo, as well as her teacher's senator, Senator Kuroda.

"First, I'd like to tell you a little bit about a program which was sponsored by the National Institute of Health (NIH) and was funded by the Howard Hughes Medical Institution and several major pharmaceutical companies. It's called the Centennial Scholar Program and takes outstanding students, one from each state, to go to Washington, D.C., and Bethesda, Maryland, to visit with NIH personnel and see some of the projects that are being carried out by NIH.

"Miss Pang and Miss Yamada left on February 28th and returned on March 3rd. While on the East Coast, they met the NIH scientists, including a number of Nobel laureates and saw the projects that NIH is

undertaking in areas such as AIDS research. At this point, I think Mimi probably knows more about the current state of AIDS research than anybody else in the State of Hawaii.

"The goal of the Centennial Scholar Program was, by showing these students what is being done in research and how exciting the research in the bio-chemical field is, to encourage our brightest students to pursue careers in research medicine and life sciences.

"These students, someday, will be unleashing the potential of the healing arts. They will be slowing down the aging process, and in their studies of the brain, they will be showing us the models for future generations of computers. While we in the Legislature think that we are at the cutting edge of society's development, compared to the bio-medical scientists, we are sometimes decades behind. A case on point is that right now we are talking about funding in vitro fertilization, this is old news to the bio-medical scientists.

"Hawaii was entitled to send one student to the Centennial Scholar Program and that one student, I am happy to say, is a McKinley student. The NIH Centennial Scholar from Hawaii is Miss Mimi Pang. (Miss Pang who was present on the Senate floor rose to be recognized.)

"And, of course, we all remember the one or few teachers along the road who made a particularly good impression and helped us in our career choices. The NIH recognizes the importance of the science teachers in bringing out the best in their students and preparing them to assume their role in our future as a society and so they also recognize the Centennial Teacher. From Hawaii, Miss Mimi Pang's teacher who joined her on the tour, is Miss Carol Yamada. (Miss Yamada, accompanying Miss Pang, also rose to be recognized.)

"Although McKinley is perhaps best known for its math team, the students obviously excel in all of the sciences and some credit must go to the administration of the school. We have in the gallery, Mr. Richard Sakamoto, principal of McKinley High School."

Miss Mimi Pang and her teacher, Miss Carol Yamada, were presented the Senate Certificate of recognition and leis.

At 11:46 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

"Madam Vice President, this legislation is unnecessary and would undermine the effectiveness of the grand jury. It takes several cases for the grand jury to become familiar with the process and to cut the period of service from one year down to six months, would slow the process with no result in benefits.

"This bill will also require that the grand jury counsel be present in the grand jury room at all times which is unnecessary since he or she is available immediately adjacent and, as a result, this would encourage an adversarial type of setting which is not what the grand jury is supposed to be. I urge its defeat."

Senator Hee then spoke in support of the measure and said:

"Madam Vice President, Senate Bill 561 will now, once and for all, require accountability to the grand jury on behalf of them having an attorney present.

"At the present time, in grand jury proceedings, the prosecutor is the only attorney in the grand jury room. Therefore, it creates an unfair advantage given to the prosecutor during the proceedings, particularly when grand jury members have sought legal advice.

"In testimony to our committee, it was said that in some cases the grand jury members have asked the prosecutor for advice. By law, the grand jury is provided legal counsel. Heretofore, the counsel has, as a rule rather than the exception, stayed outside of the grand jury room, in some cases, conducting other kinds of private business.

"The counsel retained by the grand jury is from an attorney pool, and the attorneys

have, as a rule rather than the exception, stayed outside and conducted other business and made themselves 'available' should there be any questions.

"In researching this measure, it became clear that the grand jury should have, readily available at their disposal, their own counsel. That is what the law provides.

"In further researching this bill, we found that those attorneys who serve as grand jury counsel get paid \$236 a day or the equivalent of a district court judge. There's absolutely no excuse that the grand jury counsel should not be required to sit in the proceedings regardless of whether the grand jury has a question or not.

"This bill proposes to mandate that the counsel shall be at all times in the grand jury proceedings. It will mandate, and by that mandate, reflect that the prosecutor will no longer have what has been perceived as an unfair advantage.

"I urge all members to vote in favor of this bill."

Senator Reed, in support of the measure, remarked:

"Madam Vice President, just by way of explanation, this bill will simply provide a vehicle for the Department of Health to take action against people who know they are AIDS-infectious and are knowingly exposing other people.

"The Department of Health director, just this morning, told me of another case of that going on in our community and apparently that is not illegal and this bill would at least give the Department of Health authority to get those kinds of people off the street."

Senator Hee then rose to ask if the chairman of the Committee on Health would yield to a question.

The Chair posed the question and Senator B. Kobayashi having answered in the affirmative, Senator Hee inquired:

"Madam Vice President, will you ask the chairman on Health why it would be a felony 'C' for anybody who was tested positively for AIDS? Is it the chairman's position or the committee's position that that person sought the disease?"

Senator B. Kobayashi answered:

"Madam Vice President, the original bill indicated a class C felony. That bill has

been amended so that the class C felony is no longer in the bill. It would not be a class C felony under S.D. 1. Rather, the idea was to structure the bill toward public health and allow the Department of Health to quarantine such an individual. The bill was structured away from a criminal sanction so the class C felony is no longer a part of the bill."

Senator Hee further inquired:

"Madam Vice President, would you ask the chairman on Health how this AIDS victim would be quarantined by the Department of Health?"

Senator B. Kobayashi answered:

"Presently, there is authorization within the Department of Health for quarantine of those with infectious diseases. And so, we have a number of instances already where quarantine has been done for such things as tuberculosis and various other diseases. We have state facilities, for instance, for tuberculosis."

Senator Hee continued to inquire:

"Did the Department of Health testify that they have a facility or an institution where AIDS victims would be quarantined and, if so, how would the family of the victim and the victim himself be compensated with respect to earning a living and taking care of his or her family, if the case may be?"

Senator B. Kobayashi answered:

"The Department of Health does not have a facility to quarantine AIDS victims and there is no expectation that such a facility would be constructed for that exclusive use.

"As to the question of how that victim would provide for his livelihood, I'm sorry I can't really answer that.

"At this point, it is considered that if that person is knowingly transmitting the disease, that person does represent a health hazard and, as such, I think it would be reasonable to expect a quarantine or some sort of method to minimize or eliminate that public health hazard."

Senator Hee continued:

"Madam Vice President, would you ask the chairman how the Department of Health would go about to draw a conclusion that this person knowingly spread the infectious AIDS antibody?"

Senator B. Kobayashi answered:

"Madam Vice President, the department would have to assume that the person who

knowingly has AIDS, and perhaps involved in certain sexual practices or certain drug related practices, would be knowingly transmitting the disease. We have cases on record of individuals who are known to themselves to be a carrier of AIDS who have engaged in such practices — not in Hawaii, I might understand, but in the U.S."

Senator Hee continued:

"If that is the case, Madam Vice President, would you ask the chairman why he doesn't make it a law for people who have AIDS not to engage in sexual activity?"

Senator B. Kobayashi replied:

"Madam Vice President, this bill would have a similar effect with the quarantine."

Senator Hee, speaking against the measure, then remarked:

"I know of no other disease where it is a law to prohibit one from sexual activity, Madam Vice President. I don't know that this is a priority or that the Department of Health will go around checking into bedroom windows, and for these reasons I will vote against this bill."

Senator Reed then rose to say:

"Madam Vice President, I would like to clarify and explain what's going on.

"There have been several documented cases in Honolulu of people who have been tested by the Health Department or by their own physicians, who are known to be AIDS-infectious. Either they have tested positive to the AIDS test and have the antibody or have the virus in the body, or have actually developed the full-blown AIDS and have been counseled by their doctors to stop engaging in sexual activities that will spread that virus, and they have refused to do so.

"The most blatant examples are prostitutes, male prostitutes, who are working in Waikiki who know they have either the AIDS virus in their body or already have AIDS, both of which are infectious, and are refusing to quit working as prostitutes because either they're drug addicts or they simply need the money.

"This is not a quarantine of AIDS victims. This is a quarantine, giving the Department of Health the ability to get people off the street who know that they are transmitting a deadly virus and refuse to stop doing that."

Senator Hee responded and said:

"Madam Vice President, as far as I know, there's a law against prostitution. If AIDS victims are knowingly prostituting

themselves on the streets of Waikiki, then there is correct statutory enforcement on the books. And if the police want to go after these people, then by all means I have no problem with that because that would relate to the law against prostitution.

"I think there is a serious problem we're dealing with here — AIDS with respect to treating them differently. And the draconian measure of the original bill which would make it a penalty, a class C felony, represents the attitude of apparently the Department of Health.

"I think this bill does nothing but undermine the human dignity of society and, as far as I am concerned, it means absolutely nothing because unless the Department of Health would now enter into the AIDS enforcement bureau, it gives them, as far as I am concerned, no basis for enforcing this statute, should it become law."

Senator B. Kobayashi then remarked:

"Madam Vice President, for the record, I should like to note that the Department of Health was not the original introducer or the creator of this bill. Thank you."

Senator Cobb then rose on a point of parliamentary privilege and said:

"Madam Vice President, in the committee report, and I state this more as a matter of drafting rather than as a criticism, in the first full paragraph it says, 'The purpose of the bill is' I think when there is a substantive change as has taken place in this bill, the correct reflection should be: 'The purpose of this bill was to make it a class C felony ...' and then to indicate not only the change but the reasons therefor. I think that would have prevented some confusion.

"I don't offer that as any sort of criticism but only as a matter of drafting style. Thank you."

Senator Hee then remarked:

"Madam Vice President, I just want to note for the record that the discussion which has been ongoing with respect to this bill, if the members will look on the bill itself on line 10, it doesn't say sexual activities. It says, '... knowingly exposes another person to the AIDS virus'

"Now, if a victim of AIDS kisses another person, would that not, as far as the statutory language, expose to another person regardless of whether the virus is 'reasonably likely.'

"I think that is the nature of this bill and I think it's overly broad. If they want to go after the Johns or the women who are

carrying AIDS, we have that statutory strength. If they want to quarantine these victims of AIDS, then they should have the means upon which compensation should be rendered through the department.

"This is a very dangerous kind of Band-Aid approach to a very serious problem in our society.

"Thank you."

Senator Reed further remarked:

"Madam Vice President, the bill says that any activity '... which has scientifically been identified as one by which the virus is reasonably likely to be transmitted ...' was very clearly spelled out by departments of health all over the United States. They would certainly not be at this time, as far as scientific knowledge goes, kissing, but there are several different types of activities that are known to be likely to be spreading it and among them not only sexual activity but also donation of blood that one knows to be contaminated, as another example.

"So there are examples right here in Honolulu of people who are not just 'hookers,' but another example a doctor told me about is a patient that he knows of who knows that he is AIDS-infectious and is angry about it and has told the doctor that he will not use condoms, he will not refrain from sex. His intent is to 'expose as many people as possible before I die.'

"What we're talking about is a small minority of people who are not AIDS victims — they are criminals. And society has a right to defend itself against somebody who wants to shoot you with a handgun or to expose you to a deadly virus, a virus for which there is no cure."

Senator Hee responded and said:

"Madam Vice President, with respect to the previous speaker, I have no differences with respect to society protecting itself. Society should not protect itself based on demons created by fear. There are scientists and there are people who claim to be scientists and of whom have legions of people who would have you believe that AIDS is transmitted by mosquitoes.

"This bill simply mandates ... gives the statutory strength to the Department of Health to carry out something they have no reasonable means to do so.

"If someone is going to make a statement on AIDS then make the statement. If someone wants an individual infected with AIDS to stop sexually transmitting the disease, then say so.

"This bill has no statutory strength as far

as it's written, and I think it is a bad policy and a bad statement on society and it undermines the fabric upon which we live. Thank you."

Senator McMurdo rose to speak against the measure as follows:

"Madam Vice President, while I am in favor of the Legislature's making the decision for a site, I am not in favor of this site.

"As you know, both Ft. DeRussy and the Ala Wai Golf Course are in my district. Both of them I cannot condone for use as sites because of the concerns of the residents and because of the traffic and the overcrowding. Neither one of them is suitable for a convention center site.

"I don't believe that this bill, although it does address traffic concerns to a certain extent ... let me give you an example. It talks about a bridge across the Ala Wai into

the convention center site. That certainly is far more preferable than going on University Avenue, but it does not address how they're going to get the trucks and the exhibits in. There's nothing to show how you're going to get those from the freeway into this convention center site, and you simply cannot dump any more traffic into the McCully-Moiliili area.

"Furthermore, we have all heard the golfers' concerns and, while there is in the committee report and in the bill some concern for the golfers, I'm not sure they're really convinced on this.

"Back again to the Legislature's choice of a site, I believe that is our prerogative but I don't believe that there's been enough study on this. The two studies on which this bill is based, the Parnell Kerr Forster study and the Legislative Reference Bureau study, neither one of them addressed the social cost, the social impact. Neither one of them addressed the traffic study. They made no EIS and very little was done, especially in the Ala Wai site, to talk to the residents there.

"I also feel that we should have, in preparing to choose a site, looked further than trying to find a convention center site which would 'be within walking distance of the present hotels.' I feel it very unfortunate that not any study was done to show that if you were talking about a new industry site, such as in the area between Kewalo Basin and Honolulu Harbor, that in that case you would be talking about bringing far greater economic benefit to the state and to the tourism industry. If you were looking at an area in which further hotels, further restaurants, or further businesses could be put on state-owned land and without any kind of impact on a residential area, this would bring great economic benefit.

"I hope that the members of this body will consider this — how important it is to make these kinds of studies before we make this kind of decision.

"I will be voting 'no' on this bill. Thank you."

Senator Holt then spoke in support of the measure and said:

"Madam Vice President, I rise to speak in favor of Senate Bill 1192, S.D. 2.

"This bill establishes the primary market orientation of the convention center. It selects a small portion of the Ala Wai Golf Course for the convention center. It creates a Hawaii Convention Center Authority to operate the center; appropriates monies for the center; and appropriates monies to mitigate the adverse effects resulting from the center, which

includes an appropriation to begin the rebuilding of the remaining portion of the golf course.

"Senate Standing Committee Reports 21 and 585 contain sufficient and worthy justification for the selection of a small portion of Ala Wai Golf Course as the site for the convention center and rejection of the other candidates. I would like to summarize the major points and add others.

"The convention center must be orient to other visitor markets because of its high construction costs. Because of the high cost, maximum return to the public must be the primary objective. The convention center, as proposed in this bill, would satisfy this requirement, attracting an additional 130 to 140 million dollars annually into the state economy.

"Aside from this important economic factor, however, the proposed orientation of the convention center will not preclude its use for civic and other local activities which may require such a facility. More realistically, however, for local needs, this area can and should be accommodated at the Blaisdell Center. The present orientation of this facility is primarily toward the local community and it is particularly well suited for this purpose. This factor is recognized in Senate Bill 1192, S.D.2, and funds are further provided to enhance the Blaisdell Center for local needs and activities.

"If, on the other hand, the state were to specify a mixed use orientation for the convention center, it would be in direct competition with the Blaisdell Center. To maintain self-sufficiency, much less profitability, is extremely difficult for a performing arts and exhibition facility in Hawaii. Competition between a new mixed use convention center and Blaisdell Center would adversely affect the taxpayer. One of the facilities, most likely the older Blaisdell Center, will have its business siphoned up to the other and the city will have to increase general fund subsidies.

"After establishment of a market orientation, assessment of existing circumstances, and evaluation on an objective and forthright basis, a small portion of the Ala Wai Golf Course is the most logical choice for the convention center. The site has four major advantages. Of primary importance is the fact that existing activity will not be displaced. The 120 acres remaining after construction of the convention center can and will be rebuilt into a challenging, beautiful and safe 18-hole golf course.

"Taking land from the course has been a highly emotional issue and I can only repeat what I have publicly stated previously, if

the remaining 120 acres cannot be rebuilt to a course equal or better than the existing course, I would recommend rejection of the Ala Wai Golf Course to my colleagues.

"Second of importance, the site is owned by the state and no monies need to be spent on land acquisition. This fact alone will save a tremendous amount of public monies and time necessary to start development of the facility. While the state needs a convention center, we cannot afford to spend hundreds of millions or even tens of millions of dollars for land alone and wait from five to ten years to merely gain title for a site which has never been ranked above the Ala Wai Golf Course on a purely objective basis.

"Third of importance, it is marketable to out-of-state conventioners because of its proximity to Waikiki where lodging accommodations and amenities appealing to visitors are concentrated. More importantly, the site is within walking distance of many hotel rooms, restaurants, and shops, and for this reason it would be much more attractive to convention planners. A small portion of the Ala Wai Golf Course is the most marketable of the sites owned by the state. We cannot for the public interest select a site less marketable.

"Lastly, the combination of the market orientation and proximity to Waikiki will not result in a large volume of vehicular traffic. Most conventioners will walk to the center. A small volume of vehicular traffic movement will be in the Waikiki to mauka direction, and disturbance to local communities on the outskirts of the site should be minimal.

"In response to the previous speaker's remarks, it is the Senate's intent to address the concerns of the Moiliili, McCully, and Kapahulu residents by utilizing the provisions of Section 8(c)(3) on page 10 of the bill to provide the funds necessary to minimize community impact in the surrounding area, and I'll read that section. It says: 'Grants-in-aid or appropriations to other public agencies for off-site improvements which are legislatively declared as necessary to establish, mitigate the adverse effects caused by, or improve the operational efficiency or effectiveness of, the convention center.'

"The House of Representatives and others, it appears, are advocating the position of establishment of a commission to select the site for the Legislature. Madam Vice President, this is wrong. We in the Legislature have been elected to make these types of decisions. We cannot delegate this matter to a commission over which we have no control for the expediency of escaping political pressure. Delegation of our authority would also, I wish to remind my

colleagues in the Senate and the House, reopen consideration of our sites.

"The makeup of the commission could consist of powerful outside forces which would sway the selection on a less than honorable or open basis. Shirking our duty would be embarrassing and unjustifiable before the public. Surrendering to the manipulations of special interests with ulterior motives which do not have the public good at heart and implicit admission of our lack of fortitude. We cannot allow this to happen. We are bound by the public trust; therefore, we must act in accordance with their interest in mind. We must stand strongly united behind Senate Bill 1192, Senate Draft 2.

"I urge all my colleagues to support this bill. Thank you."

Senator Cobb also spoke in support of the measure and said:

"Madam Vice President, since mine is one of three pictures along with that of the previous speaker circled in red on the walls of the Ala Wai Golf Club, I would like to add a few remarks in support of what he just said.

"If we are to abrogate our decision-making responsibility to a commission, not only will it be the subject of a special interest decision, not only would it mean that the commission could be picked in favor of a certain site or a certain orientation, but it would be a total abrogation of our legislative responsibility.

"The time for studying is over. We've had two studies already. The commission would only constitute an out-of-government type of study and then recommendation. The time for studying is over. The time for action is now.

"Thank you."

"I know that people are under the impression, as I was, that if the arresting officer does not show up at the hearing, the case is automatically dismissed. But this is obviously not true. It does not seem equitable to, on the one hand, create additional punishments for the traffic court defendant who doesn't show up, without, on the other, providing for the dismissal of a case if the arresting officer doesn't show up. Therefore, Mr. President, I'm voting against this bill and I would ask my colleagues to reconsider their support of this measure. Thank you."

"Mr. President, I'll be voting for this bill but I wanted to share with the members of the Senate some correspondence we had on an identical and previous measure from sometime ago to indicate the reason for my signature 'with reservation.'

"The first is a letter from Donald Bremner who was then serving in 1983 as the executive vice president of the Waikiki Improvement Association. He says, and I quote in a letter, 'If the bill would make the police office culpable under the law, then it would eliminate effective enforcement of the present law. In addition, it would provide a prostitute with leverage when the prostitute and a customer come into a difference of opinion, say about a stolen wallet or other valuables. The prostitute under the proposal would then be able to threaten the customer with prosecution if the customer complained about the theft. And we oppose the bill for these reasons.'

"The prosecuting attorney's submitted language, or testimony, at a similar time, although they were in favor of the concept of the bill, they point out that if both the John and the prostitute were charged for the same prostitution offense, each could, in certain circumstances, claim the Fifth Amendment. But right now, to say anything that might tend to incriminate themselves, the state would be unable to prove its case against either person.

"Mr. Bremner further followed with some additional communication on the same subject saying, 'If the bill became law and it made policemen prosecutable, the police enforcement agent against prostitutes would be non-existent since an officer would be asked to break the law to enforce it.' While understanding these problems, I nevertheless support the concept that both parties should be equally culpable, but I hope these concerns are addressed in the other house. Thank you."

Senator Hee, also in support of the measure, remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the measure. This bill effectively allows the police department to shift the focus from the 'hooker' to the 'hookee.' (Laughter) And from the looks of the way the voting is going tonight, it looks like I might be the 'hookee.'

"Nonetheless, Mr. President, this bill allows the police to set up sting operations and/or go after the John's. It will allow the

police to go into that area called Waikiki of which 100 percent of all the John's are tourists. It allows us to effectively upgrade the quality of tourism in Hawaii. Thank you."

At that time, Representative Carol Fukunaga said, 'Richard, your bill has united all of the water agencies against that bill.' It was intended to do just that and that was the beginning of my involvement. Richard's involvement in the water code started ten years prior to that and if you read the water code, you will see his handiwork, his ideas and concerns in this water code.

"Today, I would like to read the last paragraph of the Senate committee report. I would like to read this and point out that this paragraph was written by staff members who were very close to Richard, and one of them was Mrs. Mona Sakata Ho of Senator Yamasaki's staff because Richard used to kid around with her a lot. At this time, I would like to read that paragraph:

'Finally, the Committee on Ways and Means recognizes and pays tribute to the late Richard A. Kawakami, Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Fourteenth Legislature of Hawaii, for his contribution in laying the basic foundation for S.B. No. 1307, S.D. 2, relating to the

State Water Code. As Chairman of the House Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Affairs Committee from 1971 through 1980, Richard A. Kawakami laid the basic foundation for S.B. No. 1307, S.D. 2. As Speaker of the House, he personally asserted his strong conviction and desire and immediate enactment of the water code. His vision and foresight of a state water code on behalf of all the people of Hawaii is truly appreciated, and your committee acknowledges Speaker Richard A. Kawakami's years of dedicated service and contributions. He was a good and wise man.'

"Thank you very much."

"Mr. President, in that case, I will rise to speak in favor of this bill with some very strong reservations based on my undying faith in the chairman of Ways and Means. Although the bill calls for a one dollar appropriation, I have some very strong reservations about both offices inasmuch as, as long as I have been here I haven't been able to figure out what those two offices do, what they stand for, what kind of functions they perform and if, in fact, they really are necessary as part of the governor's cabinet office.

"It would seem to me much more appropriate if these two offices were either dealt with as Senate Bill 220 calls for or redeployed in other state departments.

Because, however, of my faith in the Committee on Ways and Means, I will yield to the recommendation and hope that in the end result these two offices receive no pay raise.

"Thank you."

Senator Reed rose to speak against the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, this is a well intended but misguided idea. Senate Bill 1147 would establish a review commission to decide whether certain campaign practices are or not unfair. In the first place, this legislation is unnecessary. The civil courts already provide protection and remedy via libel and slander suits. It is also important to note that the commission, as proposed by this bill, would be appointed by the governor. The commission members would therefore be expected to referee a campaign between a gubernatorial candidate and the incumbent governor who appointed them to the commission.

"It's easy to foresee such a committee responding negatively to the campaign accusations well within the bounds of free speech. To establish a politically aligned commission to decide what can and cannot be said during a campaign could become a form of government censorship. I'm voting against this bill."

Senator Cobb then spoke in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of

this bill and do so very strongly as a recent witness of an active bystander in the last election in which an active smear was conducted.

"If you read the bill, two members of the commission, at least two members, would be members of the minority party and if other parties qualify they would also be eligible. But I think we need to take some strong steps to discourage the kind of smears that we had in 1986.

"If anything, 1986 will go down in Hawaii history as the year of the smear and I hope we don't see such a spectacle in the future. Any steps that we can take that are constitutional to prohibit or discourage such practices, I think we should be willing to do so. Elections and campaigns should be decided on the issues not on the innuendos against any particular candidate. Thank you."

Senator Hee also spoke in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, as the chairman of the primary committee on this bill, I rise to speak in favor of it, particularly on page 9, section 11 of the bill, which says, 'The commission shall hold a public hearing within twenty-four hours of its decision to hear a complaint, or as soon thereafter as reasonably possible.' This section is specifically there because of the Sunday press conference by the candidate that is behind of which the candidate that is ahead has no means to respond by Tuesday's election.

"This bill sets forth once and for all that these willy-nillies, as I called them in the committee, will rear their ugly heads every two years between June and November will now answer within 24 hours and the commission will make their findings public. Thank you."

Senator Henderson then asked the Chair if the chairman of the primary committee would yield to a question. The Chair posed the question and Senator Hee having answered in the affirmative, Senator Henderson inquired:

"As I understand this bill, it has a commission that is in place 365 days a year for how long their appointment is. Is that correct?"

Senator Hee answered:

"That may be an amendment by the second committee. That was not the intention of the primary committee."

Senator Henderson further inquired:

"I understand that this commission will

have a staff that will be employed without regard to Chapters 76 or 77? Is that correct?"

Senator Hee answered:

"That is correct."

Senator Henderson continued to inquire:

"What is this staff to do when we're not having an election?"

Senator Hee answered:

"As I indicated earlier, when it left the primary committee, this commission was to exercise its jurisdiction during campaigns."

Senator Henderson continued:

"Why wouldn't this be a proper function of the Ethics Commission?"

Senator Hee answered:

"During the testimony from the Campaign Spending Commission, it was mentioned that perhaps the Campaign Spending Commission should be involved. The problem with the Ethics Commission is, as presently under law, the Ethics Commission's proceedings are in confidence. What this bill set out primarily to do was to respond within 24 hours of the last minute smear charges which occur on a Saturday or Sunday before Tuesday's election, to deal with it swiftly to come up with a conclusion of fact, and if there is no basis for the alleged smear, to make them public."

Senator Henderson continued:

"Mr. President, will you ask the chairman why couldn't the court system do that?"

Senator Hee answered:

"Because the courts don't as a habit respond within 24 hours."

Senator Henderson continued:

"If we passed a law to ask them to do that, couldn't they?"

Senator Hee replied:

"After we pass this law, we won't need to pass that law."

Senator Henderson, against the measure, then remarked:

"My problem with this bill, Mr. President, is that we are creating another agency that is going to be inactive except during elections, and it seems to me that to hire a staff and to have people sitting around waiting for somebody to smear somebody

else doesn't make any sense.

"It would seem to me this could be handled better, either having the Ethics Commission handle this matter or have the courts on an expeditious basis address these problems. It seems to me that we're creating another big agency for a bureaucracy to try and correct something that could be addressed in another way.

"I would say that this bill doesn't make any sense; that there are other ways that this could be addressed. I would urge a 'no' vote on this issue. Thank you."

Senator Hee then rose to respond:

"Mr. President, let me remind the members on this floor that this bill and its intent, as far as I'm concerned, is solid. It sets forth a commission to respond immediately to last minute smears that always occur during campaign seasons.

"As originally intended, this campaign commission would only have been functioning during campaign seasons. If the previous speaker has a problem with a full-time commission, then I would suggest that the members on this floor can reflect those feelings in the House."

Senator Cobb further remarked:

"Mr. President, before the year of the smear last year, a commission of this kind may not have been justified. After that experience, I think there's one heck of a justification, and I hope that it will have a deterring effect on any future campaigns like we saw last year. I urge every member to support this bill. Thank you."

Senator Chang also spoke for the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I would just like to note that, by the provisions of the bill, there is no requirement that year round staff be employed. The provision merely permits the commission to employ or contract, as the commission may see fit, 'necessary staff for the performance of its functions' and 'the commission may dismiss any person or terminate the contract at its pleasure.' It is perfectly plausible that the commission will employ staff only during the period in which it finds its performance necessary."

Senator Henderson responded and said:

"Mr. President, I would suggest that I have never seen a government agency or department that didn't hire staff when they had the opportunity to do so."

And the testimony concluded: 'The public's response is very clear — they want an elected board.'

"Mr. President, I think the issue is anything but clear. People are very concerned about the condition of our public schools and the quality of our children's

education. People are also concerned about the lack of continuity in the executive leadership of the Department of Education. The board has been replacing superintendents of education every two years. This provides for no continuity in leadership and this extends to the district and even the school level since all administrative positions — including principals — are approved by the board. As a result, morale is at a new low in our schools.

"If we are to truly strive for excellence in education, we must re-examine our governing structure. This commission is an excellent way to get an overall, objective view of the pros and cons of alternative educational structures. I look forward to receiving the commission's recommendations with enthusiasm and commend the chairman of the Education Committee for his wisdom."

MATTERS DEFERRED FROM EARLIER ON THE CALENDAR

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 581 (S.B. No. 1727, S.D. 2):

Senator Yamasaki moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 581 be adopted and S.B. No. 1727, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Mizuguchi.

Senator Ikeda rose to speak against the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, the Department of Health is taking the position that those who do not support fluoridation are either ill-informed or anti-fluoridation fanatics. As a result of my questions regarding fluoridation, I've been bombarded with informational packets and visits from representatives of the Department of Health, determined to inform me on the issue. I've read the information and conducted additional research on my own. I feel I am well informed and yet I still have many serious concerns which I feel have not been adequately addressed, and I would like to share those concerns with the members of the Senate.

"One of my greatest concerns, Mr. President, is that we do not know how fluoride will react with other chemical and mineral elements already in our water. In fact, we don't even know with any certainty what other kinds of chemicals or what quantities are in our water. I am extremely concerned about the reaction between fluoride and one of the many chemicals, especially pesticides, which have been discovered in our water to date. And I am not reassured by the health director's statement that since other areas with fluoridated water also have pesticide contamination, we need not worry about possible adverse effects.

"Given the Department of Health's past record, I have no confidence in their ability either to detect chemicals in our drinking water or to analyze the reaction between different chemicals in our water, or to accurately predict the cumulative effect of those chemicals in our bodies.

"I would like to remind this body that just a few weeks ago this state was in a furor over the use of tributyltin butyl paint on the hulls of Navy ships in Pearl Harbor. I have been told that neither the tin, which helps to bond the paint, nor the butyl, a synthetic rubber in this paint, has toxic qualities, but that each paint also contains a poison which is the active ingredient in retarding barnacle growth. One of these paints is tributyltin butyl fluoride, and oxidation of

the butyl will allow trace amounts of fluoride to seep into our ocean. The amount is very small but it is enough to harm marine life and, subsequently, the use of this paint has been banned in different countries and harbors around the world.

"Mr. President, I find it ironic that we protest the use of this paint by the Navy and yet the amounts of fluoride, which would run off into our ocean from fluoridated water, could have a far greater impact on our delicate ocean environment than the slow seepage of fluoride from the paint on Navy ships.

"We also need to consider the people who are highly sensitive to fluoride and would have a reaction even to the point seven (.7) parts per million level planned for our water. We simply do not have sufficient data to know how serious their reaction would be to fluoridated water. The proponents of fluoridation say that these allergic type reactions have not been substantiated, but this does not mean that they do not exist. Anyone who has ever been to an allergist, as I have, knows that their methods are often less than precise, and we have heard from several dentists who have seen severe reactions to fluoride and have warned against fluoridated water for that reason.

"Finally, Mr. President, I am concerned about the removal of the referendum section of the bill. Senate Draft 1 would have allowed each community to express its feelings on fluoridation through an official voting process. This has been deleted, however, in favor of a mail ballot system, public meeting or other unspecified method of assessing public sentiment. Any method beside the referendum vote will only create a questionable set of statistics. It is my understanding that, under the mail ballot system, one ballot would be sent out with each water bill. This would mean only one vote per household in spite of the number of registered voters residing there, even if it were a condo with hundreds of residents.

"Furthermore, no matter what method is used to assess public sentiment, there is no established procedure in this bill for taking public sentiment into account. The director of health is given the discretionary power to approve or disapprove fluoridation plans submitted by the water authorities, but there are no guidelines specifying what will be considered in making those decisions. Since the title of this bill is, 'Relating to Required Fluoridation of Water Supplies,' I wonder if the director even has the authority to not fluoridate any water supply, especially since there is nothing in this bill which clearly states that if the people of any county, municipality, or community reject fluoridation that the director will not mandate fluoridation of their water supply.

"I would also like to point out that even the Board of Health, when considering this issue, was deadlocked on the vote and that the chairperson broke the tie in favor of fluoridation. So obviously, Mr. President, this is not a cut and dried question.

"I would like to make it clear that I am not against the use of fluoride but that there are other alternatives to fluoridating the water supply. I use a fluoride toothpaste, myself, and always made sure that my children took fluoride tablets even as an additive to their milk when they were babies. But those decisions were mine alone. There was no 'Big Brother' government mandating the care of my family's health.

"I think that if the Department of Health is truly concerned about the condition of our children's teeth, then it should make dental health a top priority and institute a major nutritional dental care campaign. I would far rather spend additional funds on dental health, including the free distribution of fluoride tablets, vitamins or whatever, than to so drastically invade the individual rights of our citizens by mandating fluoridation of their water supply.

"This is definitely an issue that the people themselves should decide. Freedom of choice is the bottom line. Mr. President, I urge you and my colleagues to join me in voting 'no' on this bill."

Senator B. Kobayashi, in support of the measure, remarked:

"Mr. President, I would agree with the previous speaker that the majority of the people should decide. It has been our intention and that of the Department of Health that a majority of people of the general public would have their majority views followed as to whether their water would be fluoridated or not. It is still that intention.

"I would make a commitment to this body that should we move this bill over, we will go into conference committee because, number one, the House drafts are quite different from ours, and number two, the committee chairman on the House side on Health has said that he would go into conference.

"With that assurance, I would say that I would not move a bill out of conference which does not contain in the bill itself, not in the committee report, a clear statement that the majority of the general public of a given water area would be able to decide whether their water is fluoridated or not.

"As to the other comments made by the previous speaker, let me review briefly some of the material that we have about

fluoridation.

"First of all, fluoridation is common in the United States. Approximately 120 million people in the United States drink fluoridated water from a public water system. Of the 50 largest cities in the United States, 41 of those cities have publicly fluoridated water systems. These cities are of immense size and just for examples they include: New York City; Chicago; Philadelphia; Detroit; Dallas; Baltimore; Washington, D.C.; Miami; Indianapolis; Seattle; San Francisco; Denver; a great many cities.

"Several cities amongst the largest 50 in the United States do not have fluoridated water. The most obvious to many of us would be Los Angeles and San Diego. Both do not have fluoridated water systems because both get much of their water from the Colorado River which has naturally fluoridated water.

"The point, nonetheless, is that this idea of fluoridation is not an experiment. It is common throughout the United States and it is common amongst millions and millions of people and not just for a few years. Fluoridation is something that has occurred in the United States starting in the '40's and was in vogue beginning in the '50's. Many of the cities that I named had their waters fluoridated in the '50's and in the '60's, so they have had decades of experience with fluoridated water and throughout the United States the various concerns about the dangers of fluoridation have not been shown.

"I would note further that fluoridation is endorsed by a very large number of organizations which represent what I think would be a credible source of guidance and recommendation. They include: The American Academy of Allergists, The American Academy of Pediatrics, The American Association of Dental Schools, The American Cancer Society, The American Dental Association, The American Dental Health Society, American Diabetes Association, American Heart Association, American Legion, American Nurses Association, American Medical Association, American Pharmaceutical Association, American Public Health Association, and many others.

"In Hawaii, virtually all of these counterpart organizations on the Hawaii State level have made similar endorsements and we have had distributed, at least to committee members and certainly available to anyone else, a list of those organizations for you.

"I would note that the question of safety has been brought up many times and let me read a couple of comments to you. This is from 'Consumer Reports' that made a

specific two-article attempt to shed light on this issue. 'Consumer Reports' states: 'The simple truth is that there's no scientific controversy over the safety of fluoridation. The practice is safe, economical, and beneficial.'

"We have statements from U.S. Surgeon General C. Everett Koop, that says, 'No sound evidence exists which shows that drinking water with various concentrations of fluoride found naturally in public water supplies in the U.S. has any adverse effects on general health.' And he further makes a comment that, 'No studies show that drinking water with added fluoride has adverse impact on general health.' Recently, U.S. Surgeon General C. Everett Koop stated that as a reaffirmation of his statement, 'I urge all health officials and concerned citizens to join me in this commitment and in the task of achieving water fluoridation for all community drinking water supplies which lack the fluoride content needed for prevention of dental caries.'

"I would note that we have a statement here from a representative of the U.S. Public Health Service: 'Numerous studies have shown that consumption of fluoride in community water supplies at the level recommended for optimal dental health has no harmful impact on humans. For generations, millions of people have lived in areas in the United States where fluoride is found naturally in the drinking water in concentrations as high or higher than recommended to prevent dental caries. Extensive research conducted among these groups confirms the safety of fluoride in the water supply. Because there is no difference between fluoride which is present naturally and that which is added to the water supplies, residents of communities which fluoridate their water can be assured of its safety.'

"Further, the most prestigious American medical journal, the 'New England Journal of Medicine,' has reported that fluoridation is safe and I quote: 'Fluoridation of community water supplies is safe, practical, economical and beneficial, costing about 10 to 40 cents a year, per capita.'

"In the report done by the 'Consumer Reports,' they go over a number of claims regarding fluoride, and a few which you might have heard about talk about fluoride as a poison. The 'Consumer Reports' claim that this is not valid. The claim about fluoride causing birth defects is also refuted. The claim that fluoride contributes to heart disease is refuted. A claim that fluoride is mutagenic — causes genetic changes — is refuted. Another claim that fluoride causes allergic reactions is refuted.

"I might note that the American

Academy of Allergists supports fluoride and states: 'There is no evidence of allergy or intolerance to fluoride as used in the fluoridation of communal water supplies.'

"In another statement, the Department of Health has stated that there had been no cases of allergic reactions to fluoride reported amongst the 100 million persons in the U.S. who consumed fluoridated water. Further, 'No allergy has been reported amongst people in contact with sea water which contains approximately 1.4 parts per million fluoride.'

"I would note that sea water contains approximately 1.2 to 1.4 parts per million of fluoride and that the question of seepage of city water into this very large base, I think, is not of concern because that sea water is already fluoridated and to a much greater degree than would be found in our drinking water. In effect, the sea water would be diluted by water containing less fluoride than sea water itself contains.

"I might note also that one of the most fluoridated of normally consumed items in the world is tea. We probably have our share of tea drinkers here in Hawaii, and tea drinkers have not been found to have had any adverse effects to fluoride.

"Let me further assure people that we have found support about no allergic reaction to fluoride from the American Academy of Sciences and the World Health Organization.

"In another statement here from the Department of Health, we have this: 'In communities fluoridated for many years there is no record of an increase in allergic reactions. Even in cities with naturally fluoridated water in excess of the recommended amounts, allergies are not more prevalent. There has been no cases of sensitivity confirmed amongst the 120 million persons in the United States who consume fluoridated water. No allergy has been reported amongst the millions of tea drinkers in England.'

"I would note for the record that we have heard a good many claims relating to fluoridation of water and dental damage, bone damage, cancer, genetic mutations, heart disease, AIDS, allergies. I believe that these are reports that represent people's truest beliefs. Nonetheless, good, sound, scientific evidence and all available information suggests that these reports are not consistent with what we generally know about fluoride amongst the millions and millions of people who daily consume fluoridated water in the United States.

"In conclusion, I would say that we have for many years talked about fluoridation; we have talked about its advantages and

disadvantages. I would suggest that the advantages are a decidedly 'A+' in terms of cost, in terms of safety, and in terms of benefit to the people of Hawaii. The concerns related to whether fluoridated water should be imposed, I think, touch a very sensitive nerve in any democracy and it has been largely through the urgings of the Department of Health and in particular its director, Dr. Jack Lewin, that the amendment was originally added to allow for public sentiment to guide or not guide the fluoridation of water.

"Dr. Lewin has had an unusual experience in a prior job. He was medical director of the Navajo nation when approximately a quarter of a million Navajo people had their public water supply fluoridated. That experience, he said, led him to believe that fluoridation is safe. I would, therefore, urge all members to vote in support of this bill. Thank you."

Senator Cobb, speaking against the measure, remarked:

"Mr. President, I'm going to be voting 'no' on this bill although I have remained silent publicly up until this point, but I would like to outline very briefly some of the reasons why and express concerns in the event we should see this measure again.

"First of all, is the reason that is stated on page 2 of the committee report that the bill was amended 'by deleting public referendum as a method of assessing public sentiment in support or opposition to fluoridation, based on a recommendation of the Department of Health, and has provided for greater flexibility in making this determination.'

"One of the previous speakers mentioned that if a postcard or mail ballot was conducted on the basis of water meters then a condominium would receive only one such ballot. I frankly resent that. I live in a condominium with over 450 residents and for us to have our vote diluted that way, regardless of how they wanted to vote, would not be an exercise in democracy.

"If we're talking about an exercise in democracy, Mr. President, there is no substitute for a referendum vote. We as Senators are not elected based on a mail ballot sent to our addresses or sent to our water meters. We're elected in an election.

"I think it is way out of line; in fact, very surprising that the Department of Health has threatened publicly to go ahead and fluoridate water if this bill is not passed. I think that's an irresponsible statement and I call upon them to retract that threat, publicly, because the decision of whether or not to fluoridate our water supply properly rests for the legislative body. And I don't

think any department should be making statements or threats like that and I am appalled that they've done it and I publicly call upon them to retract that threat.

"Second, the House draft does not have referendum either, so despite the assurances of the chairman, my concern is that if a referendum is not clearly provided for in either House draft it may not be added in a conference committee.

"Mr. President, we very often complain about the lack of voter participation. I think one of the reasons for that lack of participation is the lack of referendum issues on the ballot, and I would like to see more issues decided by referendum so that we will remember that our ultimate power comes from the people and that they should have a right to decide a question such as this.

"Who are we to say, 'we know better,' and to impose this, regardless of how people feel, regardless of the amount of information, regardless of the number of distinguished and prestigious scientific organizations that tell us that fluoridation is good. I think that the people ultimately have the right to decide.

"Unless a clear statement in the bill, not the committee report, mandating a referendum is included, I cannot support this measure. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator McMurdo, in support of the measure, remarked:

"Mr. President, two quick remarks because I see the clock is moving on.

"First of all, on page 4 where it discusses the various ways in which the public can express itself, it talks not only about the water bill and the ballot of the community and by public meetings, it also says, '... or by any method which would reasonably reflect the sentiments of the area or subdistrict.'

"Now, nobody in this Senate or even in this Legislature is any stronger for the IRR than Mary Jane McMurdo, and I think you all know that, but I do not see that this precludes using the referendum. I think it has added some other ways, and the Senator of the Health Committee has said that they would see that the referendum was put back in the bill and I would urge a 'yes' vote on this. Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi then replied:

"Mr. President, for the record, I am told that the final version of the House bill on this subject does include county referendum. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and Roll Call vote having been requested, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 581 was adopted and S.B. No. 1727, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REQUIRED FLUORIDATION OF WATER SUPPLIES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Cobb rose to speak against the measure as follows:

"Very briefly, Mr. President, aside from the moral considerations on this, I think something that members of the Senate are not really aware of is when greyhound dogs are raced, in choosing the candidates to race the losers are put to death. Only one out of fifteen dogs ever goes beyond being one-year-old in order to race, according to the information I've received from many sources on the Mainland.

"I think it puts us in a position of barbarians to sanction something like this. It's an extreme cruelty to animals to say that only one dog out of fifteen would ever grow to be a racer. It makes us superior to be spectators in a colosseum, and that's one of the reasons I can never support legislation like this. I urge the members of this body to vote this bill down."

Senator Reed also spoke against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, in testimony before the Senate Judiciary Committee, the lobbyist for those wanting the license to operate off-track wagering in Hawaii said that they would agree to set aside money to help defray the cost of treating those who become addicted to gambling. I suggest that to approve an activity that will require funds to treat those of our residents who become addicted to that activity is irresponsible and ridiculous."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and Roll Call vote having been requested, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 708 was adopted and S.B. No. 537, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OFF-TRACT WAGERING," having been read throughout, failed to pass Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Reed rose to speak against the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, I believe that this debate over lottery hinges on a question that, although quite simple, is easy to ignore. The fundamental question is this: Will gambling help or hurt the majority of our people? The only honest answer is that gambling is not a good thing.

"Gambling can be addictive. States that have lotteries spend an increasing portion of the take on gambling addiction counseling and treatment. A lottery takes money from those who can least afford it, money that might otherwise be used for food and health care.

"Gambling causes people, especially the young, to believe they can succeed in life by relying on luck, rather than self-improvement. I also share law enforcement's traditional opposition to a lottery. The experience of other states indicate that lotteries lead to an increase in crime.

"The primary point I wish to make is this. If there is to be a lottery, it should not be government-run. If the state sponsors a lottery, government will be promoting and encouraging gambling. The spectacle of state government producing newspaper, radio and TV ads encouraging people to spend their money on lottery tickets is absurd.

"The efforts of law enforcement, parents, and educators to instill in our children the understanding that we must work for what we want will be continually and persuasively undermined by a government public relations program urging people to gamble.

"The theme of lottery advertising would be that you can get rich without ever having to study or work again for next to nothing, if you're willing to take a chance. This is hardly a solid foundation on which to build a better Hawaii.

"On the one hand, through its laws and law enforcement, through anti-gambling legislation being passed by this body today, government transmits the message that gambling is bad. A state-run lottery will transmit the opposite message that gambling is good.

"Government has to decide — do we want to encourage or discourage gambling? It is unrealistic and hypocritical to think that we can have it both ways."

Senator Blair, in support of the measure, remarked:

"Mr. President, I have previously voted against bills for a state lottery; but, because of the inclusions of items 2, 3 and 4 in the committee report which fairly address the concerns that Senator Reed has raised, what we have here is an experiment in tax exportation. It will, to that degree, be a benefit to the citizens of Hawaii. In any event, it is only for a limited duration that this measure will be in effect and, during that time, provision has been made for a very detailed socio-economic study.

"If experience proves that we're not successful in exporting the tax burden through this measure, we will have the opportunity to evaluate very good data and make an informed judgment when the state lottery is up for sunseting. I think it's a good experiment and urge all of my colleagues to vote 'aye.'"

Senator Menor then spoke against the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I strongly believe that the only reason why the state should adopt a lottery is as a revenue-raising measure and not for the purposes of promoting gambling for its own sake.

"Given what I think should be the function of a state lottery, I believe that a lottery is unnecessary at this time because there appears to be adequate sources of revenue to cover important state programs and services.

"I would also like to point out that the hotel room tax which the Legislature adopted last year will generate additional revenue. Moreover, we made certain changes to the liquor tax laws during the previous session which should generate an additional \$15 million. In addition, the state administration has been optimistic about revenue forecasts and, in that regard, tax collections should be adequate. Furthermore, we also have a surplus in our state treasury which the Legislature can always tap in the event of revenue shortfalls.

"In my opinion, if revenues do in fact prove to be inadequate in the future to fund needed services and programs, then at that time the Legislature can take up the issue of a lottery and consider its adoption. However, to adopt the lottery at this time would, I believe, be premature and, as a result, I would encourage my colleagues to vote 'no' on the lottery bill."

Senator Henderson also rose to speak against the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, if we want to raise revenue for the State of Hawaii, this is

probably the most inefficient, by all means most inefficient way to raise revenue. This is a very expensive proposition.

"We're committing a million and a half dollars for start-up costs to experiment. The amount of revenue this thing will raise is probably only \$10- or \$20 million, at best. We could raise the general excise tax a quarter of one percent, and raise \$40- or \$50 million without any additional cost. So, if we're doing this to raise revenues, then this is the wrong way to go. We have the mechanism in place that won't cost us anything to raise additional revenue through the general excise tax.

"Second point. For the state to encourage our public to gamble is unconscionable. The only way you can make a lottery work is to promote it, and to promote this concept to ask the people to spend their hard-earned dollars to gamble on a get-rich-quick scheme is unconscionable. This to me, Mr. President, is a cruel hoax on the people of Hawaii. I urge you all to vote 'no.'"

Senator George also spoke against the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I have perhaps a unique experience that I'd like to share with my colleagues. I lived for 16 years in a country where gambling was permitted — this kind of gambling. I know from personal observation who gambles.

"It is a way of balancing the budget on the backs of the poor. I can testify to that aspect. In response to the Senator from the Sixth District who would support it because it would provide needed revenue, I couldn't support it even on that basis because it would be balancing the budget on the backs of the poor."

Senator Yamasaki then spoke in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I speak in favor of Senate Bill 711 — natural. (Laughter)

"Mr. President, lottery is now operated in at least 22 states in the Union which includes Arizona, California, Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Idaho, Illinois, Kansas, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Montana, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, and Washington, also the District of Columbia, our nation's capitol, and also in Canada, Ontario, and Quebec.

"Colorado Governor Richard D. Lamm is quoted in the 'Lottery Journal' and says: 'Colorado lottery has been well run and has provided substantial funding for state building projects, parks and recreation. The lottery supplies money for almost all of the capital construction and the conservation

trust fund which uses money for parks and recreation.'

"Connecticut Governor William A. O'Neill says lottery is a success because it has reaped monetary rewards and will continue to be a source of revenue in the future. A lottery will transfer at least \$190 million to the general fund and is an efficient operation. He says the image of lottery is one of competence, success and integrity. A positive image of the lottery is maintained by the state legislature's scrutiny of the potential negative effects it may have on Connecticut residents. Under legislative mandate, the governor must commission a study on the effects of legalized gambling on the citizens of the state every five years. The first study, five years ago, indicated no negative effect. There is a current study underway and expects the study to be positive under irreproachable standards.

"Delaware Governor Michael Castle says the Delaware lottery is an important source of revenue for the state and provides the citizens with enjoyable recreation. It provides the state with a significant amount of revenue, more than \$16 million that it would otherwise not have. He says, 'Anytime you can raise money and not tax the people, it is an obvious plus.' Delaware is a state with about a 600,000 population.

"Illinois Governor James R. Thompson is proud of his state's lottery because it has grown to provide more revenues for Illinois schools. The huge success of the lottery prompted reorganization and on March 27, 1986, he issued an executive order creating a department of lottery and appointed Rebecca Paul as the department's first director. In 1985, \$587 million were awarded to lottery winners and profits of \$517 million were added to the state general fund. In addition, the governor reported that \$61 million in commissions were paid to small businesses and public confidence in its ethics and honesty will continue and is a successful program of economic development.

"Governor Terry Branstad of Iowa says the Iowa lottery has a positive image with the citizens of Iowa and it has provided money to encourage economic development across the state and has been managed most efficiently, and it has a reputation as being above board and honest. A 'gamblers anonymous' service was created with lottery funds to prevent any negative influence the lottery may have on Iowa citizens.

"Massachusetts has the most successful lottery in the country, according to the state's Governor Michael Dukakis, and is a boom to the state's economy. The positive impact of the lottery is its impact on organized crime in Massachusetts. The

governor's office expresses optimism that the lottery has made a dent in illegal games, and if the state did not have a lottery, the illegal market will be getting the money that is now used for much needed state's infrastructure improvements.

"New Hampshire's sweepstakes is the grand-daddy of all modern lotteries in North America, having started in 1963. Governor John Sununu says he is pleased with what it has done in providing funds in an effective way to raise funds for the educational community.

"Washington State Governor Booth Gardner says the four-year record of the state's lottery stands on its own as a source of income of more than \$280 million to the state's general fund, and it does not adversely affect the social fabric of the state and is an acceptable way for the public to spend discretionary income and have fun.

"The foregoing, Mr. President, is a brief report on the successful operation of lottery in the United States.

"The 'National Economists' in a recent article stated that there may be a downturn in the national economy by 1990. Therefore, Mr. President, it becomes necessary for the State of Hawaii to have other sources of revenue to sustain our island economy with expenditure demands which is growing larger and larger each year.

"We, the members of this Senate, have requested all kinds of appropriations to be made in this session. We have collective bargaining before us and expenditures of this state is going to increase each year. Therefore, Mr. President, we need to have some source of cushion for the coming years ahead, up to 1990, if we are going to sustain the kind of expenditure that is expected from the members of this Senate.

"Mr. President, I urge this Senate to go on record to support this lottery measure as provided for in Senate Bill 711. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 711 was adopted and S.B. No. 711, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE LOTTERY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

"Mr. President, it is with great reluctance that I move to recommit this bill. It's obvious to me what the results will be. Nonetheless, I feel compelled on behalf of the respondents who have taken great time and effort in trying to put together what I feel anyway is the best bill relating to capital crimes that has yet been produced.

"It is also that I feel some debt of gratitude to the many people who responded, from one district alone, on their own volition. I have in front of me responses from all of the respondents who responded in the affirmative on capital crimes.

"These are the respondents that responded in the negative (held up a few responses).

"While it is not to say that these people should decide the laws of this state, it is to say that we know what these people think with respect to capital crime.

"I would be remiss if I did not publicly thank these people, as well as many others who have called to support and to oppose this measure. And I would be remiss if I did not publicly extend my appreciation to my staff who took into consideration every concern by members of the Judiciary who had a concern, who took into the time and labor to put in what we feel is the best bill which would prevent capricious mistakes which could occur, which may have occurred in the past, and which we think would minimize the efforts to occur in the future, should this bill have become law.

"I am greatly sorry that this bill would not move forward, if nothing else for the sake of debate; that this bill would move forward, if nothing else for the sake of discussion in the other house; if for no other reason than to stand up and be counted on this issue. Nonetheless, I respect the apparent vote which would have defeated this measure. Therefore, Mr. President, I

reluctantly request this bill be recommitted at this time."

Senator Solomon, in support of the measure, remarked:

"Mr. President, this Senate Bill addresses a wrong which has been long overlooked in the State of Hawaii.

"Following the overthrow of the Hawaiian government, and the establishment of a United States Territory to govern Hawaii, the United State Congress recognized the need for the rehabilitation of the Hawaiian people who had been dispossessed of their lands. So, in 1920, the Hawaiian Homes Act was passed in Congress for this purpose. However, previous governors of Hawaii, as well as the Hawaiian Homes Commission itself, have allowed the use of Hawaiian Homes lands for the benefit of the general public with little or no reimbursement to the Native Hawaiian beneficiaries of the Act. Two examples of this lack of adequate

monitoring of the lands which were set aside by the Act, and the use by the U.S. Navy of a vast acreage of Luualalei Valley on Oahu with no rent to the Hawaiian Homes Commission and its beneficiaries.

"The United States government has not taken action to compel compliance with the requirements of the Hawaiian Homes Act until the Federal-State Task Force on the Hawaiian Homes was set up and reported on these problems in 1983. This task force recommended and urged that federal and state statutes be enacted to enforce the private right of action under the Hawaiian Homes Act. Senate Bill 1320 is an important step in that direction.

"Senate Bill 1320 provides that Native Hawaiian and Hawaiian individuals and organizations have a right to sue and obtain relief as beneficiaries similar to the right which beneficiaries have under private trusts. Beneficiaries of private trusts are able to recover damages from the trustees where there has been a breach of fiduciary duties. Hawaiians have not had that right of recovery as beneficiaries of trusts explicitly set up for their benefit. Hawaiians remain the only native Americans who do not have the right to sue and recover for breaches of duty.

"This bill has been long in coming. It was passed by the 1986 Legislature and vetoed by the governor. This present bill answers the questions raised last year by the governor, that is, that there be safeguards against frivolous claims.

"I urge my fellow Senators to vote in favor of this bill."

Senator Solomon, in support of the measure, remarked:

"Mr. President, this bill will address an injustice which has not been corrected since the Great Mahele. Following the 1850 Great Mahele, the 1852 Kuleana Act was passed to allow native tenants living on the land to claim their home sites and the areas where they cultivated their subsistence crops. These kuleana were typically about one acre in size, located alongside a stream and elsewhere to allow for the cultivation of taro and other subsistence crops. In earlier days, a frequent way to take over a kuleana was to prevent access to the parcel or to encroach on and simply take over the parcel.

"Even with the Kuleana Act, fewer than 3,000 persons out of approximately 80,000 persons were able to claim and receive their kuleana.

"Present statutes in the Hawaii Revised Statutes (Section 532-15, HRS) allow a kuleana which is not claimed by the heirs of the original grantee to revert to the owner of the ahupua'a. This has created inequities over the years where heirs of the original grantees were not notified of the claim against their ancestors' land, and thus lost their interest in the kuleana to the ahupua'a owner. This bill repeals Section 532-15, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

"In its place, this bill will allow these traditional and historic parcels of land to become part of a land trust to be administered by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs for the benefit of native Hawaiians and Hawaiians. This will allow the kuleana to be administered for the benefit of many Hawaiians until such time as the legal heirs are located or come forward to claim their traditional rights.

"I strongly urge the Senators to vote for this bill."

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:42 o'clock a.m., with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Ms. Roberta Williams of the Honolulu Baha'i Community, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Kuroda who was excused.

The Chair announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Sixth Day.

The following introductions were made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Chang introduced Miss Stacy Sakamoto, "a former legislative intern who has gone on to become a media star ... who will be covering the Legislature for the duration of the session while her colleague Elisa Yadao joins the crew of the Hokule'a on its next voyage."

Senator Matsuura introduced Mr. Yukio Nishimoto, a constituent from Hilo, and Ms. Beatrice Aparicio from Colombia, South America, accompanied by Mrs. Linda Fritz McKenzie and her daughter Jeni.

Senator Mizuguchi introduced Mr. Earl Arruda of HSTA and Dr. Loretta Krause, principal of University High School.

Senator Mizuguchi, preface to the introduction and presentation of the 1987 outstanding teachers and principals, stated:

"Madam Vice President, seated on the floor with us are some outstanding educators in the State of Hawaii and 1987 is not only the Year of the Hare, according to Senator Chang, but it will be the year for education. (Isn't that correct, Chairman Yamasaki?)

"Present on the floor with us are six outstanding teachers and two outstanding school principals. In the Senate President's opening day remarks he talked about the importance of the individual school and the importance of our teachers and principals in that particular school to make education excellent for our students."

Senator Matsuura presented Ms. Esther Kodani, the Big Island teacher of the year, as follows:

"Whereas, Ms. Kodani's commitment to developing a positive self-concept in every child and to helping them succeed in school is recognized by her peers and many parents and her teaching effectiveness and concern for her students have been clearly identified, therefore, parents frequently request that their children be placed in her classroom; and

"Whereas, known as a thinker and doer, Ms. Kodani is highly respected by many for her professional judgment, her active involvement in professional improvement activities, and her continued efforts are building positive teacher-parent relationships;'

"For these reasons Ms. Kodani is recognized as the 1987 Hawaii District Teacher of the Year."

The honoree rose to be recognized. Senator Matsuura presented her with the Senate Certificate and Senator Henderson with a lei.

Senator Yamasaki presented Mrs. Daphne O. Sing, the 1987 Maui District Teacher of the Year, as follows:

"Madam Vice President, Mrs. Sing has been a teacher for 16 years at Baldwin High School on Maui, her alma mater, where she is presently the student activities coordinator. She is a graduate of Brigham Young University, Hawaii campus, and is actively involved in professional community organizations, educational and civic service groups and participates in many student related activities Hawaii."

The honoree rose to be recognized and Senator Yamasaki presented her with the Senate Certificate and lei.

Senator Fernandes Salling presented Ms. Liela Nitta, 1987 Kauai District Teacher of the Year, as follows:

"Madam Vice President, Liela Nitta, the 1987 Kauai District Teacher of the Year, teaches the 9th and 10th grade physical science classes and the 11th and 12th grade chemistry classes at Kapaa High and Intermediate School.

"Liela graduated from Baldwin High School on Maui, went on to earn a bachelor of science in botany from the University of Washington in Seattle and later completed two master's degrees from the University of Idaho.

"Liela worked for the Hawaii State Department of Education for 12 years and her students and colleagues attest to her dedication, hard work, interest, and supportive efforts in providing Kapaa High School students with a top quality science program."

The honoree rose to be recognized. Senator Fernandes Salling presented her with the Senate Certificate and Senator Aki with a lei.

Senator Hee presented Ms. Carol Au Devenot, the 1987 Windward Oahu District Teacher of the Year, as follows:

"Madam Vice President and members of the Senate, it is a pleasure and privilege to introduce the 1987 Windward Oahu District Teacher of the Year Ms. Carol Au Devenot.

"Carol is a food science teacher who authored the curriculum and she is very concerned that the Department of Education is thinking of removing that food science credit as a science requirement and by way of introducing Ms. Devenot I want to be sure that the Department of Education is fully informed.

"Ms. Devenot has been a teacher for 17 years and has outlasted four different principals at Kalaheo High School. I had the privilege of teaching there at one time although we did not know each other. She is dedicated to that school as evidenced by her residence in Waikiki.

"Ms. Devenot was born and raised in Kaimuki and is a product of the public education system, a graduate of Kaimuki High School. She is very concerned about our alienated students which is good news because, likewise, the chairman of the Education Committee is very concerned about."

The honoree rose to be recognized. Senator Hee presented her with the Senate Certificate and Senate J. Wong with a lei.

Senator B. Kobayashi then introduced Ms. Betsy F. Young, the 1987 Hawaii State Teacher of the Year, as follows:

"Madam Vice President, it is my pleasure to introduce Betsy Young.

"Betsy is a fourth grade teacher and grade level chairman at Liholiho Elementary School, a school I attended.

"Betsy has been teaching for 25 years and is remarkably an active person in professional and community activities. She has been a teacher of teachers in conducting professional teacher workshops. She has received a number of fellowships and scholarships. This year Betsy has the very

high honor of being selected the 1987 Hawaii Teacher of the Year and will represent Hawaii in the National Teacher of the Year ceremonies. I know Hawaii will be well represented."

The honoree rose to be recognized. Senator B. Kobayashi presented her with the Senate Certificate and Senator Cobb with a lei.

Senator Menor then introduced Miss Amy Kawamura, the 1987 Leeward Oahu District Teacher of the Year, as follows:

"Madam Vice President, Miss Kawamura is a social studies teacher at Waipahu High School and is being commended for her outstanding contributions to the youth of our state.

"In recognition of her achievements the Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii would like to commend her and present her with the Senate Certificate."

The honoree rose to be recognized. Senator Menor presented her with the Senate Certificate and lei.

Tuesday, March 24, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:40 o'clock a.m., with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Joanne Stearns of the Church of the Holy Nativity, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator R. Wong who was excused.

The Chair announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Seventh Day.

Senator Cobb introduced Sherrie Lynn Sawa from Mililani High School and Stephanie Morgan from Wheeler Intermediate School, students observing the legislature process.

Senator Chang introduced Mr. Earl Anzai, the chief counsel for the Senate Committee on Judiciary, his daughter Miki Anzai and her friend Jennifer Mahle.

Senator Kuroda introduced Kumiko (Hosaka) and Masatoshi Sakuramoto from Fukuoka, Japan.

Senator Kuroda also introduced Mr. David Ishii, Mr. Masayoshi Yashima, Mr. Al Ogata and Miss Lorraine Daos, who were present on the Senate floor, as follows:

"Madam Vice President, Senators, ladies and gentlemen, I take great pleasure this morning to introduce a young man of Hawaii, born and raised in Lihue, Kauai, who is a success story of the professional golf tour. Although most of his golf successes have been in Japan and against Asian competition, David Ishii has held his own against American and European professional golfers. His greatest success was his

victory at the first Kapalua Open on Maui in 1982.

"David is a 1973 graduate of Kauai High School and has been a golf student of golf professional Toyo Shirai since the age of five. Attending the University of Houston on a scholarship, he won the All-American Collegiate Invitational twice against such golfers as current pros Andy Bean, Scott Simpson and Curtis Strange.

"In 1980, David competed in his first Japan tournament and finished tenth. This success led to a degree of confidence in 1986 which helped him win the Shunichi Ground Crown's Tournament, which has a prestigious tradition similar to the Augusta Masters — \$95,000 is one heck of a money for an Island boy to win in four days.

"David is here today after competing in the Honda Classic in Florida two weeks ago and also competing in golf tournaments in Hawaii before he leaves for Japan a week from now to compete against the Asian pros.

"David's success story is not complete if we do not mention the Pearl Country Club. The Pearl Country Club is owned by the Honda Kaihatsu Kogyo. To you and me it's the 'Honda Motors' people.' David is the golf pro at the Pearl Country Club and it is through the Honda Kaihatsu Kogyo Company President Tsugio Ogata that David's golf door to Japan was open.

"Today, on the floor with David is Mr. Masayoshi Yashima, the general manager of Pearl Country Club who has been here since November, 1985. The Pearl Country Club sponsors the Pearl Open which is held in February of each year. This tournament brings to Hawaii 90 Japanese pro golfers and 20 Japanese amateurs. The local pros and the local amateurs also participate. The Pearl Open is of great importance to Hawaii because of the many tourists it attracts and since it precedes the Hawaiian Open.

"Also here to be recognized is Mr. Al Ogata, the assistant general manager to Mr. Yashima. Al is a retired Army sergeant, born and raised in Honolulu and was the interpreter for the commanding general at Fort Shafter. He has been a valuable link between Hawaii and Japan, especially through the efforts of Hawaii's Pearl Country Club.

"At this time, ladies and gentlemen, I'd like to introduce our Island boy success, David Ishii and his fiancée, Lorraine Daos, who is from Kauai."

Mr. Ishii, Miss Daos, Mr. Yashima and Mr. Ogata stood to be recognized and were

presented with leis by Senators Kuroda, Ikeda and A. Kobayashi.

At 11:54 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:57 o'clock a.m.

At this time, Senator Blair, on behalf of the members of the Senate, extended Happy Birthday wishes to Senator Kuroda who was then given a lei by Senator Fernandes Salling.

Senator Hagino introduced the Honorable Irving Stolberg, Mr. Earl Mackey and Mr. William Pound, who were present on the Senate floor, as follows:

"Madam Vice President and fellow Senators, on behalf of Senate President Wong, I'd like to introduce the Honorable Irving Stolberg, Speaker of the House, State of Connecticut. He is also the president of the National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL).

"Accompanying Speaker Stolberg is Mr. Earl Mackey, executive director of the NCSL, and Mr. William Pound, director of the Denver Office of the NCSL."

The gentlemen rose to be recognized and were presented with leis by Senators Fernandes Salling, McMurdo and Solomon.

At 11:59 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:03 o'clock p.m.

At this time, the Chair invited the Honorable Irving Stolberg to the rostrum and he addressed the members of the Senate as follows:

"Madam President, distinguished members of the Senate, it's an honor to stand here before you today. I must admit, I'm somewhat bemused. I'm not sure which the longer distance is, the distance from Connecticut, five or six thousand miles all the way to Hawaii or, spiritually, the distance from the House chamber to the Senate chamber. As a Speaker of the House, I know that there are some differences that sometimes exist between the two chambers, but today it's wonderful to be here before you and bridge both those distances.

"As president of the National Conference of State Legislatures, it is an honor to represent you and your colleagues from the 49 other states, and all of the staff that do so much work for us and for the citizens of our states and our legislatures.

"These are exciting times. They are times when we're re-examining the role, the function, the duties of the federal government and state government and local government, when we're re-examining the roles of the private sector and the public sector and, indeed, it's wonderful to share this period of time with you.

"Let me suggest that whatever the distances are, whatever the miles are, whatever the differences in our histories, all of us, as legislators, have a particular commitment to the people's interest in these times. I would hope that we could work together; we could learn from each other.

"I know you are awaiting the budget from the House. We were just in the House chamber. I had the opportunity to chair our finance committee before becoming Speaker of the House and the processes are indeed important ones. This is one of the most exciting periods of time and places here in Hawaii to be. The combination of development and the need for preserving both the physical and cultural resources that are so rich in these Islands are a challenge that will demand from you wisdom and leadership.

"I wish you the best in your deliberations in the remainder of this session and I hope, if any of you are able to, you can join us at our conference meetings. Our annual meeting of the National Conference of State Legislatures will be in Indianapolis, Indiana, the final week of July this year. If you are able to, we would benefit from your presence at that meeting and I hope you could see what progress being made in many of the other states is.

"Again, Madam President, thank you for the opportunity to be with you. I wish you the best of luck in your deliberations. Mahalo."

Senator Hee then introduced the "Hawaii Family of the Year" as follows:

"Madam Vice President and members of the Senate, I would, at this time, like to recognize the 'Hawaii Family of the Year.' I will do so with the following remarks which have been submitted as part of the Senate Certificate:

"Whereas, the Rantas and their children have always assisted, have always been involved with community service and church activities, and in assisting friends and neighbors in less formal ways; and that the Ranta family has also pursued and achieved personal goals having helped eight children graduate from high school, five of whom also graduated from college, and having their youngest still in elementary school; and

'Whereas, members of the Ranta family have self-sacrificed and cared for each other, displayed a pride in themselves and demonstrated concern for their community which exemplifies the idea of characteristics of family life; and

'Whereas, the selection of the Ranta family as a Hawaii family of the year is appropriate, well-deserved and could not have been bettered;

'Now therefore, be it resolved by the Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature, that this body congratulates and commends the Ranta family for its selection as the 'Hawaii Family of the Year.'

"Madam Vice President, I present to you the 'Hawaii Family of the Year' - Mr. Roger Ranta, father, Mrs. Judy Ranta, mother, and their children, Christopher, Helena and Keicha. Their daughter, Maggie Dumlao, and son-in-law, Guy Dumlao, are sitting in the gallery. Accompanying the family is Ms. Patti Lyons of the Child and Family Service."

The honorees rose to be recognized and were presented the Senate Certificate of recognition by Senator Hee and leis by Senators A. Kobayashi, Hagino, Solomon, Menor and Chang.

Wednesday, March 25, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:40 o'clock a.m., with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Dean Okimura of the Koboji Temple, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Aki, Matsuura and Mizuguchi who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Eighth Day.

The following introductions were made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Solomon, on behalf of the Higher Education Committee, introduced Dr. Yoshitsugi Hokama and Dr. Arwind R. Diwan, outstanding faculty members from the John A. Burns School of Medicine, University of Hawaii, as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure to recognize, first, Dr. Yoshitsugi Hokama. (Dr. Hokama stood to be recognized.)

"Dr. Hokama was born in Kohala, Hawaii, educated at Pahala High School, the University of Hawaii, and the University of California, Los Angeles.

"He has been a Professor of Pathology at the John A. Burns School of Medicine for more than 20 years where he has been an extremely effective educator. He is internationally recognized as an authority in the field of immunomodulators and ciguatera; author of more than 200 scientific articles, abstracts, and chapters in books; and has generated more than a million dollars in research grants.

"Dr. Hokama recently developed a rapid test for ciguatera fish poisoning which will have a major beneficial impact on public health and the fish industry of Hawaii."

Senator Solomon continued:

"Mr. President, the second professor that I would like to present is Dr. Arwind R. Diwan. (Dr. Diwan stood to be recognized.)

"Dr. Diwan, Associate Professor of Tropical Medicine at the School of Medicine, was born in India, is now a citizen of the U.S., and a resident of Hawaii since 1968.

"Dr. Diwan is an effective instructor and researcher in virology, immunology, and

epidemiology. His research resulted in the testing of premariage and pregnant women for rubella (German measles) antibodies by the state Department of Health. His serological survey for polio, measles, mumps, and rubella antibodies among Hawaii's school children led to a state law requiring children entering public schools in Hawaii to have a valid immunization history.

"Dr. Diwan's studies have helped in the prevention and control of hepatitis B in Hawaii and he is currently actively involved in epidemiological studies of AIDS in Hawaii.

"Dr. Diwan has also served in numerous community service organizations relating to public health."

The honorees were presented the Senate Certificate of recognition by Senator Solomon and Senators A. Kobayashi and Young presented them with leis.

Senator Solomon then introduced Mr. Paul Sheriff as follows:

"Mr. President, Mr. Paul Sheriff was selected by the Hawaii Jaycees as one of the state's 10 most brightest and interesting individuals destined to be named Hawaii's Outstanding Young Person of 1987.

"Paul is a graduate of the University of Oregon majoring in anthropology/oceanography, was an inter-collegiate wrestler for three years, and an Eagle Scout of the Order of the Arrow.

"Due to an unfortunate automobile accident during his senior year in college, he was paralyzed from his waist down. In spite of these adversities, he started his own business called 'Rolling Thunder,' manufacturing of clothing for the physically disabled.

"Paul Sheriff has also created specialized equipment for the handicapped, is a motivational speaker and a counselor of wheelchair patients, and was named recently as Employer of the Year for Small Business for hiring handicapped people."

Mr. Sheriff who was present on the Senate floor was presented with the Senate Certificate of honor by Senator Solomon and a lei by Senator Fernandes Salling.

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:46 o'clock a.m., with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Sister Mary Jo McEnany of the Benedictine Monastery, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The Chair announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Ninth Day.

The following introductions were made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Hagino introduced Adam Borello from Leilehua High School and Chris Quetevis from Wahiawa Intermediate School, students observing the legislative process.

Senator J. Wong, on behalf of Senator Hagino, introduced a group from the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints of Laie as follows:

"Madam Vice President, the Youth of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints are here for a service project connected with their 1987 youth conference.

"The workshops they participated in during the conference, Madam Vice President, covered physical development, personal development and career development. The theme of the conference is 'Lean on Me,' and this week they learned to lean on each other, their advisors and their friends.

"Incidentally, Madam Vice President and members of the Senate, the conference has been dedicated to the memory of Simote Iloa who was the president, leader and role model of all the young men in the state. Father Iloa died this past Saturday at Sacred Falls in Punaluu doing what he did best, helping someone in need. The group is here to let us know that as the future generation they support us and want us to know that we can lean on them.

"Madam Vice President, accompanying the group are four adult advisors: Don and Debbie Hartman, Harvey Alapa and Sharon Walker.

"I would like, at this time, to ask the entire group to please stand and be recognized.

"At the appropriate time, Madam Vice President, they would like to sing a song for us and the title of the song is 'I am a Child of God.'"

Senator Hee, on behalf of Senators J. Wong and George and himself, introduced a group of 38 students from St. Anthony's School in Kailua, accompanied by their teachers, Mrs. Eleanor Gonzales and Miss Kim Denton.

Senator Kuroda introduced a group participating in the Japan-America Goodwill Karate Tournament as follows:

"Madam Vice President, there will be a Japan-America Goodwill Karate Tournament on Sunday and the co-chairman of that tournament is Senator Mamoru Yamasaki.

"It's my pleasure to introduce the attractively attired group of people from Japan and mainland United States. The group will be visiting Punchbowl this afternoon and will conduct a ceremony to honor the war dead and will visit Col. Ellison Onizuka's grave.

"On Sunday, they will be conducting a karate exhibition at Halawa gym and this karate exhibition is the contact-type karate so it is definitely different and more exciting than the motion-type.

"Madam Vice President, I'd like to introduce the founder and the prime mover behind the karate efforts in Japan, Professor Katsuo Yamamoto. Professor Yamamoto, whom we met before, is world renowned. He is the first person who has actually performed karate, real karate, with a live tiger.

"From the United States, Montgomery, Alabama, is Master Hiroyuki Koda. Professor Yamamoto and his disciple, Mr. Koda, have been successful in generating interest in karate in the United States. Mr. Koda has been a prime mover on the Mainland and has brought with him the red-attired group from the United States."

Professor Yamamoto, Master Koda and the group from the United States and Japan all rose to be recognized.

Senator Ikeda introduced Mrs. Mary Grefe, who is a good friend, her husband Roland, son Roger and his wife Barbara and their children, Lisa and Brian.

Senator Matsuura, on behalf of Senators Solomon and Henderson and himself, introduced Mr. Bob Souza and his associates, who are papaya growers and packers.

Senator Menor introduced Robin Ascher and Paige Patterson, students of Wheeler Intermediate School, observing the legislative process.

Senator Menor also introduced the finalists of the 1987 Hawaii Junior Miss Pageant, who were present on the Senate floor, as follows:

"Madam Vice President, at this time, it also gives me great pleasure to introduce not just one, but four outstanding, bright and talented young women who are finalists and who placed in the recent 1987 Hawaii Junior Miss Pageant.

"The accomplishments of these young women are by no means small achievements, given the fact that much was involved in attaining these particular honors and recognition. For example, the Senate Certificates that we're going to be presenting these young women indicate that all of the contestants went through detailed evaluations which covered scholastic achievement, creative and performing arts, physical fitness, poise and appearance, and judges' interviews.

"In addition, these certificates indicate that the very fortunate individual who was selected as Hawaii's Junior Miss for 1987 will now compete in America's Junior Miss Pageant in Mobile, Alabama.

"The winner of the 1987 Hawaii Junior Miss Pageant is Carol Mitsuko Koizumi.

"Carol is currently a senior at St. Andrew's Priory and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kotaro Koizumi of Mililani. Among her honors and awards, she has been selected to 'Who's Who among American High School Students,' won the Presidential Academic Fitness Award, and is a member of the Select Senior Advisory Board for St. Andrew's Priory School. Carol has tremendous future career hopes and intends or hopes to attend either the University of Washington State or Brigham Young University to major in pre-med.

"The first runner-up is Tanya Paul. Tanya is currently a senior at Mililani High School and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Paul. She is currently the student body vice president, a National Merit semi-finalist, and belongs to the Hawaii Youth Symphony. Tanya hopes to attend Stanford University and major in engineering.

"The second runner-up is Lynn Takeshita. Lynn is currently a senior at Iolani School and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Winfred Takeshita of Pearl City. She has been recognized on the Iolani School Headmaster's List, is the senior class vice president, and a Senior Prefect. Lynn hopes to attend Santa Clara University to major in business and psychology.

"Finally, the third runner-up, Cheryl Yonamine. Cheryl is currently a senior at Pearl City High School and the daughter of

Mr. and Mrs. Noboru Yonamine. She is the school band president, a member of the National Honor Society, and on the staff of the school newspaper. She hopes to attend Carlton College and major in communications.

"Senator George will introduce the fourth runner-up to this body."

Senator George then introduced Stacy Loui, the fourth runner-up of the 1987 Hawaii Junior Miss Pageant, as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I think there ought to be some acknowledgement that the Windward side also grows pretty young women.

"It's my real pleasure to introduce to you Stacy Loui who is the fourth runner-up in this particular contest.

"I have to share some of the pleasure in introducing Stacy with Senators Blair and Menor because she goes to Iolani and these gentlemen are, of course, graduates of that distinguished academic background.

"Stacy is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Maynard of Kailua. She's a member of the Iolani Headmaster's List; she is a member of Quill and Scroll and the sweetheart of the Key Club. She enjoys writing for the school newspaper, finds relaxation through playing the piano and clarinet; she sews, she bakes and she listens to classical music. She hopes to go to Stanford University and major in pre-law."

Senator Menor then introduced Mr. Ed Day, chairman of the 1987 Hawaii Junior Miss Pageant who accompanied the young women.

FORTY-FIRST DAY

Monday, March 30, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:44 o'clock a.m., with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Daniel Nebres of the Cosmopolitan United Church of Christ, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fortieth Day.

The following introductions were made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Ikeda introduced a class of 4th grade students of Holy Trinity School and their teacher Mrs. Barbara Dunn, parents and chaperones.

Senator Matsuura introduced Ms. Zula Austerman and Mr. Reginald Oka, friends of the Watumull family.

Senator Matsuura then introduced Mrs. Ellen Jensen Watumull and Mr. and Mrs. David Watumull as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure to introduce to this honorable body the Watumull family.

"About a month ago, I went to a ceremony at Paradise Park in Puna and the ceremony was in regards to the Watumull family giving seven of their lots in Paradise Park to those families that lost their homes because of the lava flow in Kalapana.

"After the seven lots were given, the caretaker who's been working for the Watumull family all his life said, 'Well, that's it, we'll now retire to have lunch.' David said, 'No, there's just one more lot to be given.' The caretaker looked at his sheet and said, 'No, that's it.' David said, 'No, there's one more.'

"They drove another block and to the surprise of this caretaker who has never ever owned a piece of property in Hawaii, David handed him the deed for one acre.

"For this noble deed this body gave the Watumull family a certificate of recognition. At the ceremony when I gave the Senate Certificate to David, he received the certificate as if I was giving him the Nobel Prize. He was very humble and very appreciative.

"The thing that intrigued me was that

here's a man that is a very special person. I wanted to know what made David so great so I did a little research and I found, perhaps, one of the answers why David is such a perfect person. It is because of his mother and father.

"Let me just briefly cite from the December 1947 'Reader's Digest' article some of the accomplishments of the Watumulls, especially Mrs. Watumull. Very few people get written in the 'Reader's Digest.'

"Mrs. Ellen Jensen Watumull was born in Portland and attended Reed College, and those of you who know that college certainly know that you've got to be a valedictorian to go to Reed College. Ellen Jensen and Gobindram J. Watumull were married in 1922 and, at that time, because she married a foreigner, she had to forfeit her United States citizenship.

"Mrs. Watumull worked real hard with the League of Women Voters in Hawaii for women of Asian parentage to have the Cable Act amended, enabling American-born women including those of foreign descent to retain their American citizenship regardless of their husband's nationality, and was the first woman to be naturalized when the law was changed, regaining her citizenship back on May 5, 1931.

"Mrs. Ellen Watumull, in partnership with Goma her husband, helped develop a small bazaar into a prosperous department store chain, at the same time bringing up a family of three children — Lila, David and Radha.

"And sharing her husband's dream to help India to progress to nationhood like the United States, the desire to help stop the plagues of cholera, malaria, dysentery, which kill five to six million people a year in India, and sharing her husband's convictions that India's salvation lay in industrialization, she and her husband in 1942 established the Watumull Foundation which now derives its income from an endowment and contributions from the Watumull family.

"They began to make their dream a reality by sending to the United States highly qualified Indians, mature men and women, able to absorb the most up-to-date techniques in such matters as controlling epidemics, preventing infection in mothers and babies, canning food, building machines, and so on.

"The longest journey for the Watumull

family began in 1917 when David's father came to Hawaii and that was the first step he took in this long journey of the Watumull family.

"I can go on and on and tell you all what the Watumulls have done. I worked in India (and I know) they have done a lot even in that country.

"I just want to end my recognition to them by reading a proverb, an Indian proverb, which states: 'The two hardest things in the world to do are to give of one's earnings and to find a home in another country.' The Watumulls have certainly done that.

"I have also mentioned that it is only by giving and sharing do you truly possess what you have.

"The Watumulls are indeed very rich because they have just done that — sharing and caring for the needy.

"It is a tremendous privilege and honor to introduce to this honorable body Mrs. Ellen Jensen Watumull, her son, Mr. David Watumull, and his wife Sheila."

The Watumulls rose to be recognized and were presented the Senate Certificate of recognition by Senator Matsuura and leis by Senators A. Kobayashi, Mizuguchi, Holt and Yamasaki.

"I've been impressed with all my dealings with Winona since she has been in this position. She has conscientiously and carefully answered all questions and anything which was directed toward her in the department.

"I would like to read a few of the remarks which were in the testimony from innumerable people:

'She has provided sound leadership in helping us to clarify issues, develop carefully delineated strategies in obtaining realistic results while building and reinforcing effective approaches toward problem-solving of sometimes discouraging proportion. More than a manager, Mrs. Rubin is an effective leader who, rather than simply exercising power, has the unique ability to inspire and empower others to effective leadership.'

'I have observed her ability to listen effectively to people who are concerned about different sides of issues to bring parties together to work on common goals and to articulate clear visions for the future that inspire action.'

'I was able to observe her quiet but firm management style in dealing with complex human problems. She demonstrated good sensitivity to problems associated with poverty but clearly held students, parents and even teachers accountable for their role in helping to educate students.'

"When she was executive director of the Queen Liliuokalani Children's Center:

'Her ability to de-escalate tense human conflict situations and offer viable solutions has won the respect of colleagues and other community leaders.'

"And I reiterate, Mr. President, all those who testified were in favor of Winona Rubin's nomination to this position, and all wrote most eloquently, and I would like to add my recommendation that the Senate consent to this nomination. Thank you."

FORTY-SECOND DAY

Tuesday, March 31, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:37 o'clock a.m., with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend J. Douglas McGlynn of St. Mary's Episcopal Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators George, Holt and McMurdo who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-First Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Henderson introduced Mr. Wayne Hoeft from Los Angeles, California, the Kiwanis Governor of the California-Nevada District, Mr. Tom Fitzgerald from Kihel, Maui, the Lt. Governor of the Hawaii District, Division 22, and 12 members representing the Kiwanis California-Nevada District with their wives and other Kiwanis members from Hawaii.

Senator Chang, on behalf of the Senate Committee on Business Development and Pacific Relations, introduced Mr. Terrance Ing from Singapore, an advertising sales manager who represents Medpro Pacific, the leading publisher of medical journals and medical resource materials in Asia.

Senator Fernandes Salling, on behalf of Senator Aki and herself, introduced a group of nine senior citizens representing the nine senior centers for the Island of Kauai, who are at the Legislature to lobby and discuss the concerns of the elderly. They were accompanied by Ms. Ellie Lloyd, director of the County of Kauai Office of Elderly Affairs, Ms. Kealoha Takahashi, program specialist, and Ms. Charlyn Nakamine, program assistant.

Senator Mizuguchi introduced Scott Coleman and Gay Mikasa, students from Aiea High School, who were present on the Senate floor, as follows:

"Mr. President, it is always nice to read and to hear about the accomplishments of our young high school students and to recognize them accordingly. This morning, I have the great pleasure to introduce two of Aiea's finest. They are scholar-athletes from Aiea High School.

"The first is Scott Coleman. He is a senior and the captain of the boys swimming team. In the 1987 swimming championships, Scott not only clearly defended his state titles in the 50 and 100 yards freestyle

competition, but he also set state records in the process.

"The second outstanding athlete is Gay Mikasa. Gay is presently a junior and the captain of the girls swimming team. In the 1987 swimming competition, Gay won first finishes in the 50-yard freestyle and the 100-yard butterfly events throughout the OIA West Division championships, OIA championships, and state championships.

"Also accompanying Gay and Scott is the swimming coach at Aiea High School and the proud father of Scott, Mr. Hugh Coleman."

Gay Mikasa, Scott Coleman and Mr. Coleman rose to be recognized and were presented the Senate Certificate by Senator Mizuguchi and leis by Senators A. Kobayashi, Ikeda and Blair.

Senator Mizuguchi also introduced Mr. and Mrs. Gary Mikasa, parents of Gay Mikasa, and Mrs. Beatrice Coleman, mother of Scott Coleman, who were sitting in the gallery.

Senator Ikeda introduced the 1987 State Champion Boys Basketball Team from University High School as follows:

"Mr. President, as an alumna of University High School, it gives me great pleasure this morning to present to this honorable body the 1987 State Champion Boys Basketball Team from University High School.

"I'd like to add that when I went to school the Junior Bows also excelled in basketball. However, at that time in those ancient days, we played only in the junior league. We weren't allowed in the senior league. So it's a pleasure to know that the school is doing so well in athletics and I'd like to recognize them at this time.

"With us this morning is Michael Ah Sam. He is the only senior on the team and he is also the captain. Next is James Williams who is the ILH Player of the Year and made first state team, and Brad Stewart who was also named to the first state team.

"The two fellows who worked probably the hardest to put this whole thing together are the coach, Mr. Bobby Au, and assistant coach, Mr. Randy Canencia."

The honorees rose to be recognized and were presented the Senate Certificate and leis by Senator Ikeda.

Senator Ikeda also then recognized the rest of the team members and manager,

FORTY-FOURTH DAY

Thursday, April 2, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:42 o'clock a.m., with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Peter Salmas of the Saints Constantine and Helen Greek Orthodox Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The Chair announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Third Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Chang introduced representatives from the St. Francis Home Care Services, who were present on the Senate floor, as follows:

"Madam Vice President, it is my great pleasure to present a certificate today to the St. Francis Home Care Services, recognizing the pioneering efforts of St. Francis Home Care Services in Hawaii.

"The St. Francis Home Care Services began in Hawaii on April 2, 1962 as one solution to rising medical costs and as an alternative to institutionalization. Through home care services, a patient receives quality and professionally supervised care from family or friends in his or her home at considerably less cost than if cared for in a hospital or nursing home.

"As today is Thursday, April 2, and is the 25th anniversary of the founding of St. Francis Home Care Services in Hawaii, we have asked several administrators and representatives of the hospital to be with us today: Sister Maureen Keleher, president of St. Francis Hospital; Ms. Charlotte Dennis, director of home care services; Mr. Wally Wake, coordinator of St. Francis Hospital; and Mr. Vincent Lee, assistant administrator for the medical center."

The honorees rose to be recognized and were presented with the Senate Certificate by Senator Chang.

Senator Henderson introduced Miss Diane Vey from Kona, Hawaii, president of the Island Hotel Association. Miss Vey was at the Legislature representing the Big Island Business Council, accompanied by Mr. Clem Judd.

Senator Ikeda, on behalf of Senators Cobb and B. Kobayashi and herself, introduced 140 students of the Kaiser-Kalani Interaction Council, representing their grade level in their school student council,

who were at the Legislature learning about the different branches of government. They were accompanied by various principals: Mrs. Lum from Koko Head Elementary School, Mrs. Lau from Wailupe Valley School, Mr. Blitman from Hahaione Elementary School, Mr. Pangilinan from Aina Haina School, and Dr. Noda from Kahala Elementary School.

Senator Reed introduced Mr. David Foster from Molokai who was at the Legislature to testify in one of the hearings.

Senator Menor introduced members of the Aloha Medical Mission, who were present on the Senate floor, as follows:

"Madam Vice President, it gives me great pleasure to introduce to this honorable body several individuals who are members of the Aloha Medical Mission. The Aloha Medical Mission is basically an outstanding organization that has devoted a lot of time and effort to providing free medical services and care to the needy in the Philippines.

"During the past few years, the Aloha Medical Mission has sent physicians from Hawaii to the Philippines to provide this kind of medical care to the needy and most recently, as the certificate that we will be presenting to them indicates, they went to the Philippines in December 1986 to the Bacolod Negros Occidental Province where they donated medical and hospital supplies, provided health education services, trained local doctors, and even rendered free medical services to the needy who do not have access to or who cannot afford professional health care.

"So, it is basically for these accomplishments, these contributions, that these particular physicians and volunteers are being honored today.

"They would like to continue their outreach effort. They would like to go back to the Philippines once again during the coming year to continue to provide those very important services and if at all possible, if their fund raising permits, they would also like to expand their efforts beyond the Philippines and go to places in the Pacific Basin such as, Tonga, Samoa and Palau, and in Southeast Asia where there are also many areas that are in desperate need for this kind of medical care from competent and qualified physicians that we have in Hawaii.

"So, in that regard, they are also going to be having more fund raising activities and, for the information of this body, they have one scheduled for May 9 at the Halekulani

Hotel, and if anybody here would like to participate in that you can always contact my office.

"I would like to introduce several of the leaders and participants in this medical mission: Dr. Ramon K. At 12:06 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:13 o'clock p.m.

Senator Matsuura rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Madam Vice President, I rise on a point of personal privilege in regard to the sale of Coconut Island.

"Let me give you a brief history.

"Several weeks ago a House bill came from the House with an appropriation to purchase Coconut Island. Your Committee on Agriculture, Energy and Ocean Resources passed on the bill with an appropriation of \$8 million to the Committee on Ways and Means. The chairman of that committee also had a hearing and in the decision-making \$8 million was appropriated.

"At that time, the chairman said that we should go and take a look at Coconut Island. I think there were about six of us that went on the tour. And at that time, it appeared to me that Coconut Island would be an ideal place as a marine laboratory for our high school, intermediate and elementary school students.

"As all of you know, we are surrounded by the ocean and yet our children are nearly illiterate when it comes to the potential of what the ocean can be for food, for energy, and for the minerals that it can provide.

Coconut Island would be a perfect place to provide this marine laboratory. There's no other place that we could find that can provide this natural reef ocean environment.

"Looking at Coconut Island's resource, you can also see the possibility of bringing students from the Mainland and the foreign countries to mingle with our students. The potential was so great that all of us on that tour figured that this is a good purchase for the state, so it was a deep surprise and great disappointment that another investor from Japan opted to offer another half a million dollars to purchase it.

"Yesterday, I was trying to get hold of the potential buyer to advise him that it would be an unwise move, primarily because Coconut Island is in a conservation district. I don't know to what use the Japanese investor is going to put Coconut Island to, but if they're going to use Coconut Island for the tourists or use Coconut Island for some of the executives from foreign countries to enjoy, I wanted him to know that the need is greater, as far as Hawaii is concerned, for our children and marine education.

"I'm speaking against the purchase primarily because the need for the people of Hawaii is so great. I don't mind foreign investors coming to buy our hotels but when there is a natural resource as good as Coconut Island for the people of Hawaii, for the children of Hawaii, I think it is very unwise to offer a half million dollars more to purchase it.

"I want the people who purchased it to know ... and I don't blame them because I'm sure they looked at it purely from an investment point of view and it is a good purchase. But, there is the other side. It is in conservation, and we all know that in conservation districts you have to go through a conservation district use application before you build anything.

"I was really disappointed that Coconut Island was sold and if I was to point a finger, maybe I would point the finger at the realtors because the realtors knew that the State of Hawaii was definitely interested in purchasing Coconut Island for the people of Hawaii.

"Thank you very much."

Senator Mizuguchi also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Madam Vice President, as we in the State Senate prepare to deck the Senate draft of the state's next biennium budget tonight, I believe it is imperative that we correct a misunderstanding of the Senate's position on the public schools' budget.

"It was reported in this morning's Honolulu Advertiser on page A-16, the headline reading: 'Senate preserves school funds, scraps "matching funds" plan,' that the Senate had dropped the Governor's 2-for-1 incentive plan while appropriating about the same overall amount as the governor had proposed. While I can easily guess how the newspaper came to this conclusion, as a matter of fact, this is not the action being taken by either the Senate Committee on Education or the entire Senate. Governor Waihee's 2-for-1 incentive plan still lives in the Senate.

"In his original proposal to allow the Department of Education another \$20 million, the department reexamined its existing programs and reallocated \$13 million. The governor assigned the \$20 million to the budgetary subprogram identified as 'state administration,' EDN 303.

"This was the most reasonable and logical thing to do at the time as no one knew then how DOE would propose to use \$30 million. EDN 303 was a convenient place to show the \$20 million pending the superintendent's recommendations.

"During your committee's budget hearings, the superintendent did present his new program proposals. Upon careful deliberation by both your Committee on Education and your Committee on Ways and Means, a large majority of these proposals were accepted and assigned to the appropriate budget subprograms from which they would be expended. To have left the program appropriations in EDN 303 would have been inconsistent with the concepts of program budgeting.

"One further point, Madam Vice President, -- and my primary point with regard to the Senate's position on the education budget. The 1987 Senate has funded public education at an even higher level than has ever been proposed or approved in the history of this state. While the governor infused additional funds in his 2-for-1 incentive, we have not only accepted the challenge of the incentive, but have also managed to find another \$6.2 million in general funds to public education.

"I firmly believe that the Senate has, indeed, renewed its commitment to an excellent school system by putting the bucks where our commitment is. I look forward to the passage of the Senate draft of the next operating budget and I hope that there is now a correct understanding of what comprises the Senate draft.

"Thank you."

Senator Kuroda then rose on a point of

inquiry as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I would like to ask the chairman of the Agriculture Committee who previously spoke on the subject of Coconut Island, in his words he says that it was a good buy or it was a good project, is this something that is already a foregone conclusion? Because, I believe that if we pursue the idea, if we pursue the matter of meeting with the potential buyer, and of course the realtor, I think the State of Hawaii has enough muscle to protect itself and achieve the purchase of Coconut Island for our own use. Would you like to comment on that?"

Senator Matsuura answered as follows:

"Madam Vice President, the information that I have is that the sale has been consummated. As far as the use is concerned ... this is one of the reasons why I wanted the buyers to come to the Capitol to at least explain to us what was their intention of the purchase. I was hoping that maybe we could discourage them from purchasing Coconut Island.

"If their intent is to do exactly what I mentioned about using it as a marine laboratory for educating the young people not only in Hawaii but throughout the world, I would give them a Senate Certificate for their noble deed. But if it is for a tourist oriented money-making kind of thing or for exclusive use for some executives, then I say that our use, our need for the state is far greater than what they intend to do.

"We have an alternative. We can condemn the land but there is some tax advantage for the purchasers.

"I was hoping that they would at least come to the Capitol to discuss the purchase but since they didn't come, this is the means that I'm using to convey to them the feelings of the people of Hawaii because that resource is needed for educating our children.

"This is one purchase the people of Hawaii didn't want to be consummated. They can buy the hotels, I have no problems with that. But Coconut Island is something special. And it really should be left for the people of Hawaii to enjoy and to benefit.

"The ocean resource is immense. I mean, our kids don't really know a thing about what the ocean offers; the potential that rests down there. Coconut Island is a good place for a beginning because we do have the Hawaii Institute of Marine Biology over there. It is an ideal place for kids to get firsthand touch experience with the ocean resource.

"I used the word was because it's been

consummated. I'm hoping that they will retract the purchase. If they can retract, it will be tremendous because the state can then purchase it. Thank you."

Senator J. Wong also on a point of personal privilege stated:

"Madam Vice President, I would like to echo the concerns of my dear friend and colleague, the chairman of the Agriculture Committee. I would like to also give my fellow colleagues some background on the purchase of Coconut Island, being that it is in the 8th Senatorial District.

"Although the purchase has gone through, I think really the most important thing that we must consider at this point is, how do we proceed to mutually cooperate with the new owners. At one point and time prior to the sale, there was some talk about condemnation, a friendly condemnation, but there's some problems there. Presently, the island consists of approximately 24 acres and 11 of those acres are occupied by the University of Hawaii.

"There is no record or ownership deed on file stating that the state owns that portion where the facilities are located at this time. Even if we did go through a friendly condemnation, I think that friendly condemnation would probably turn into an adverse condemnation because the only document on the ownership of Coconut Island comes from a 1962 attorney general's opinion and, legally, that could be challenged by the former owners of the island.

"The point that I'm trying to make is that the remarks of the chairman of the Agriculture Committee have a lot of merit. We do have in our district the potential of one of the world's finest marine laboratories, but there is also an overall master plan that is being developed for the Kaneohe Bay area. And I'd like to mention that King Intermediate School sits right on the coast there and we are, during the interim, looking at the possibility of introducing a lot of curriculum into King Intermediate that is going to address some of the concerns that Senator Matsuura has brought out.

"The point that I would like to make, Madam Vice President, is that it may well be that we had \$8 million to spend for the island but the maintenance of that island is something that we have to look at also. It cost the present owners about \$250,000 just to maintain that 12 acres. So, in the long run it may be that it might work out in the best interest for us in that sense.

"I have made contacts with the representatives of the owner and when he gets back sometime at the end of this month

we'll be sitting down to go over some of the plans that he has for that island, and have some assurances, and I'm not speaking on behalf of the owner but he does have the intent of supporting the University of Hawaii program on that island and, perhaps, you know, even making monetary donations to bring that portion of the island up to the potential that it has.

"The University of Hawaii has neglected some of the maintenance on that 11 acres that they occupy at this point. So, Senator Matsuura, there is a ray of hope, and being that it is in my district, I assure you and my fellow colleagues that I will do everything possible in bringing them here to discuss their plans and, also, developing a future relationship that is a win-win situation for all of us. Thank you."

Senator Cobb, also on a point of personal privilege, responded and said:

"Madam Vice President, I'd like to thank both Senators Jimmy Wong and Matsuura for the discussion on the Coconut Island issue. I too hope that it can be a win-win situation and not an example of where private profit would triumph over public good.

"I would hope very sincerely that the research facilities will be employed by the new owner and that the public purpose of that could obtain not only for the university but for students at King Intermediate and all of the people of Hawaii.

"In another matter, Madam Vice President, I noted the demise of the bill on fluoridation in the House of Representatives and I was privileged last night in a neighborhood board meeting to have a considerable discussion with several members of the House to the point where their concerns about referendum on the subject of fluoridation was that some counties do not have a referendum.

"I would just point out to every member of the Senate that we do have a referendum in the state any time we adopt an issue amending the constitution, and that every single constitutional amendment is subject to referendum vote, not just of one county, not just of one area but of all areas. And since counties are the creature of the state and can be changed by the state, it is certainly within the power of the state to mandate that any county or water district or other area have a referendum.

"I know this issue will be before us in the future, but I wanted to make very clear the sentiments in terms of the rights, prerogatives, and powers of the state and the fact that we have a referendum every single time we amend the constitution of the state."

At 12:30 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator George and carried, the Senate stood in recess until 9:30 o'clock p.m., tonight.

"Mr. President, the 1987 Humanitarian Award of the American Red Cross, Hawaii Chapter, honors Princess Pauahi Bishop.

"Mr. President, a humanitarian is defined as a person promoting human welfare and social reform.

"The goodness of Pauahi's humanitarianism is that she gave the Na Poe O Hawaii (the people of Hawaii) a means to promote their own welfare and social reform. She gave them the opportunity for education — something which cannot be taken away.

"Her farsighted munificence, through the Kamehameha Schools and auxiliary programs has touched thousands and thousands of people throughout our great state. Yes, Pauahi presented, especially to the Hawaiians, opportunities for economic gains. But more important, she gave them inspiration for cultural appreciation and perpetuation, spiritual enlightenment, and creativity — tools to broaden their spectrum for a more meaningful life.

"She instilled in the Hawaiians, like mothers of all cultures, a feeling of moral obligation on the part of their children to excel in education as well as in other endeavors. I feel that perhaps her gift of education has set the pace of our current emphasis of the importance of education in the State of Hawaii. The Legislature has certainly been agreeable to this tenet by agreeing to expend large amounts of funds for the advancement of people through our educational systems.

"Our value of the humanitarianism of Pauahi is its perpetuity. It is for us living today to make sure that the gift be used in the best and efficient manner currently and in the future. I think this is the greatest challenge from our good humanitarian.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Chang, on behalf of the Committee on Business Development and Pacific Relations, introduced the Honorable Aiulupo Palemene, Honorable Timu Lafaele, Honorable Toi Aukuso, Honorable Leauepe Taoipu, Honorable Taua Latu, and Honorable Vailolo Felipo (not present), who are members of Western Samoa's parliament, as follows:

"Mr. President, in 1962, three years after Hawaii became a state, Western Samoa became the first Pacific Island nation to gain full independence. That's why a large contingent of Western Samoans have been visiting Hawaii for the past few days. They are trying to learn from Hawaii's successes and failures and also hope to convince executives and entrepreneurs that their islands offer potential for economic development.

"Western Samoa is taking deliberate steps and making a concerted effort to encourage foreign investment, privatize some government functions and promote economic diversity. Their effort says a lot about the determination and spirit of Pacific islanders to shape their own destinies.

"The group will be touring the Iolani Palace and its grounds and the State

Capitol. Tomorrow they will join their families and supporters in celebrating the 25th Anniversary of Western Samoa's independence."

All of the gentlemen rose to be recognized.

"She has demonstrated her commitment to public service and has proven repeatedly that she has the necessary balance of administrative skill, political awareness and compassion to make an effective and significant contribution. Her achievements have and will continue to go to the benefit of not only the native Hawaiian community, but all of the people of Hawaii, as well.

"It is for these reasons that I wholeheartedly support the appointment of Ilima Piianaia as the chairperson of the Hawaiian Homes Commission. Thank you very much."

Senator Aki also rose to speak in support of the nomination as follows:

"Mr. President, at the public hearing everyone spoke in support of the nominee. I wish to point out that this is the first time that I can remember that an appointee to the important position as chairperson of the Hawaiian Homes Commission did not receive a single negative comment. I believe that this speaks very well for the chairperson, Ilima Piianaia, and we shall see much progress in her department in the years ahead.

"I urge all members to vote in favor of her confirmation."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, none. Excused, 1 (Menor).

At this time, Senator Young recognized Ms. Piianaia who was sitting in the gallery.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 951 (Gov. Msg. No. 91):

Senator Aki then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of William W. Paty Jr., as Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources, term to expire December 31, 1990, seconded by Senator Solomon.

Senator Aki then rose to speak in support of the nomination as follows:

"Mr. President, Mr. William Paty has won the support and admiration of the people of Hawaii. He has served our community well in the past, and I'm confident that he will serve our state equally well in the future. I urge all members to vote in favor of the confirmation."

Senator Hagino also rose to speak in support of the nomination as follows:

"Mr. President, I first met Mr. Paty about ten years ago in 1978. At that time, we were organizing for the Constitutional Convention (Con Con) and when his name came up as the possible president, I was very much against his being the president. In fact, I was going to speak against his being the president but after talking to him and John Waihee, who was a Con Con delegate, I decided to change my mind and I voted in favor of Mr. Paty. In fact, I spoke in favor of his nomination.

"Now, nine years later, I am again honored and privileged to speak on behalf of Mr. Paty. I think his greatest characteristic is his ability to work with people, both in the upper echelon and the lower echelon. I think the governor has paid him a supreme compliment in appointing him to head the task force that would hopefully save the Waialua Sugar Company.

"So again, I'd like to ask all my colleagues to vote unanimously for Mr. Paty. Thank you."

Senator Kuroda also rose to speak in support of the nomination as follows:

"Mr. President, I had the pleasure of meeting Bill Paty 16 years ago when I ran for the Senate for the first time and Mr. Paty was the manager of the Waialua Plantation Company. He is the first plantation manager whom I met who had given me the kind of positive image which negated all my thoughts of plantation managers, having been raised on a plantation myself.

"In addition, I'd like to share information and explain that Mr. Paty is a disabled veteran of World War II, someone who heroically parachuted into Europe, got hurt, and was medically retired as a captain. Very few notices are provided of the individuals who have fought so bravely in Europe who are not Niseis, and he is one who we should recognize for his heroic efforts.

"I also rise to speak in support of him irregardless of the Department of Land and Natural Resources' position on Diamond Head Crater golf course. Thank you."

Senator Mizuguchi also rose to speak in support of the nomination as follows:

"Mr. President, Bill Paty's educational background, his experience as manager of Waialua Sugar Company, and president of the recent Constitutional Convention are reasons why he is eminently qualified for this particular position.

"Having worked so closely with Bill in the past, I know that he is a man who possesses sound judgment, good character, and a

strong sense of integrity. I ask all members of the Senate to support his nomination. Thank you."

Also, there has been a number of concerns arising out of not having a certified pathologist do the autopsies for Maui and also for other counties. These concerns have gone back to the 1960's. Some of the concerns have to do with the cause of death not being adequately known; hence, preventive measures perhaps not being taken by members of the medical community.

"For the record, there are presently three

certified pathologists on the County of Maui. The bill would not change the current status as to who is the coroner, since that is already part of state law and has been such at least since 1943. It would simply say that the coroner, in appointing a person to do the autopsy, would have that performed by a certified pathologist.

"We will take safeguards if necessary to further strengthen language regarding the may language to make it a permissive, rather than a mandatory, requirement of counties. Thank you."

"I hope those two concerns are addressed in conference because I think the thrust in the direction of the bill on elections is to maximize voter participation, not to disenfranchise."

"The president of the university commented that the UH will be one element of the community who will suffer a negative ripple effect if this measure is passed. The president testified that if the minimum wage is increased, 500 students employed at the university would be laid off unless an additional \$1.4 million is appropriated by the state to cover the next two years for the cost of employing students at the university."

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, the Senate Committee on Higher Education submitted a budget which fully meets Governor Waihee's challenge as stated in his state of the state message as well as the objectives in our majority package. In response to the governor's challenge the committee recommended for funding numerous enhancements to services which are consistent with the vision for a Pacific university and the University of Hawaii's strategic plan.

"In the evaluation of the university's reallocations and supplemental adjustment the overriding concern was the need to achieve a reasonable balance between the needs and directions of the major components of the University of Hawaii at Manoa, University of Hawaii at Hilo/West Oahu, the community colleges and systemwide support. The committee recommended that budget adjustments conform more closely to the following percentage distribution of current services as reported by President Simone:

- 66% UH-Manoa;
- 20% Community College;
- 7% UH-Hilo; and
- 7% Systemwide Support.

"Upon review of the budget the committee found that in the University of Hawaii's administration's proposed reallocation and supplemental adjustments, Manoa would, in fact, receive 75 percent of total program improvements. It was the recommendation of the Committee on Higher Education, as reflected in its budget adjustments, that a more equitable percentage of the budget be reallocated to the other university units.

"The committee also felt the supplemental budget did not fully address issues and problems of the Community Colleges and University of Hawaii at Hilo as mentioned in the university's testimonies for these programs. As a result the committee's recommendations reflect additional funding for the following:

- Basic Education;
- Library Support;
- Instructional Support;
- Clerical Support;
- Outreach Assistance; and
- Computer Support.

"The criteria used in adjusting the budget was to enhance the services required for basic undergraduate education since 75 percent of the student body is involved with undergraduate education. The budget

reflects this emphasis on basic undergraduate education by the funding of student service programs, conversion of lecturers to faculty positions, adding faculty positions for understaffed units, and hiring more faculty for basic core courses.

"The committee recommended that the university implement the first phase of the merger of the undergraduate agriculture instruction program of the College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources, University of Hawaii at Manoa, with the College of Agriculture, University of Hawaii at Hilo. This first phase will be accomplished by utilizing joint appointments of faculty strengthen the research capabilities of the Hilo faculty, completing an addition to the present research center, constructing greenhouses, and providing funds to equip and maintain the laboratories.

"The committee believed that the Mauna Kea access road and the installation of an electrical and communications system to the summit of Mauna Kea supports more than higher education objectives and should have been under the scrutiny of the Department of Transportation and the Department of Accounting and General Services.

"The Center for Hawaiian Studies was recommended for design and construction by the committee. The committee believed that the Hawaiian Studies Program has waited long enough for recognition and we cannot see any reason to delay the construction of the center any longer. The committee further believed that any Hawaiian Studies facility at Manoa should house undergraduate and graduate programs and that the undergraduate program should also be developed in Hilo and broadened to include Hawaii and Pacific Island Studies.

"Finally, the committee believed that an instructional facility should be built in West Hawaii to meet the community demand for educational training. Funds were recommended in the biennium for the facility to include classrooms, library, offices and kitchen facilities for the Culinary Arts program.

"The Committee on Higher Education believes the operating and capital improvement budgets as adjusted by the committee reflect the direction in which the University of Hawaii should be headed. We believe it is already an excellent educational institution and the recommended adjustments are intended to keep the University at the forefront of research while at the same time, strengthen the basic educational base that is so essential to a sound higher education institution."

Senator Mizuguchi also spoke in support

of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I'd like to voice my strong support for this bill.

"We can be especially proud of the support that we are giving to the public school system through this budget. It represents the largest financial commitment that we have ever made to education.

"Credit should begin with the governor who offered the innovative incentive plan of providing two new educational dollars for every dollar in Department of Education reallocation. That incentive plan showed that there are resources in the department that can be put to better use.

"Almost all of the additional general fund resources that are being provided — over \$26 million more than the executive budget — will be applied to those programs which will be of direct benefit to schools, classrooms and students. The school children of Hawaii will be the deserving beneficiaries of this budget.

"I would like to thank the members of our Education Committee for their participation and my special thanks go to the chairman of the Ways and Means Committee for the solid support he has given to education.

"We can all be proud that the Senate has led the way in making a renewed and higher commitment to the public school system. By making that commitment, we are saying that quality education is attainable and the children of Hawaii deserve it. Thank you very much."

Senator Holt also spoke in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, very briefly in support of the measure. In this budget is funding for tourism marketing and promotion and I would just like to comment in support of what the Ways and Means Committee chairman and the committee have done in support of the subject matter's recommendations.

"The amounts of monies that we have included in this budget proposal, \$15.6 million for the first year and \$15.6 million for the second year, will make Hawaii probably number one in all the states for tourism marketing and promotion.

"I'd just like to thank the chairman of Ways and Means Committee for moving this recommendation ahead to conference with the House. Thank you."

"Mr. President, as I indicated earlier, before this bill was rolled to the end of the calendar, I will vote 'no.'"

Senator Hee then asked if the chairman of the Committee on Transportation would yield to a question. The Chair posed the question and Senator Fernandes Salling having answered in the affirmative, Senator Hee inquired:

"Will this bill affect the deputies, as articulated in the language of the bill, that being second deputies of the Department of Transportation?"

Senator Fernandes Salling answered:

"As I understand it, yes, it will."

Senator Hee further inquired:

"Are there vacancies which presently exist at the first deputy level in the Department of Transportation?"

Senator Fernandes Salling answered:

"To the best of my knowledge, I believe there may be two or three vacancies at the first deputy level."

By unanimous consent, action on H.B. No. 817, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, was deferred to the end of the calendar.

House Bill No. 842, H.D. 2, S.D. 1:

Senator Chang rose on a point of parliamentary privilege regarding the measure and stated:

"Mr. President, the bill before us has a Senate companion bill and that companion bill had been referred to your Committee on Business Development and Pacific Relations. A hearing was held on the Senate companion bill and no one appeared. The Senate bill was therefore held in committee for further study. Subsequently, the House bill crossed over and was not referred to your Committee on Business Development and Pacific Relations but instead was referred to your Committee on Ways and Means and now appears before us today for final passage.

"To my mind, this is a circumvention of the legislative process established by our arrangement and agreement, established in January 1987. However, substantial sums of money are involved for the industry, the insurance industry, and it is too late at this time to establish obstacles for further consideration of this proposal.

"Therefore, your Committee on Business Development and Pacific Relations has not chosen to request the Committee on Ways and Means to recommit the bill. However, and in subsequent discussions of this proposal, your Committee on Business Development and Pacific Relations would request that the committee members and the chairman be involved in the discussion and review, and hopefully reach agreement on the appropriate disposition of the measure. Thank you very much."

At 2:01 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 2:09 o'clock p.m.

By unanimous consent, action on H.B. No. 842, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, was deferred to the end of the calendar.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1021 (H.B. No. 586, H.D. 1, S.D. 2):

Senator Henderson, in support of the measure, said:

"Mr. President, the chairman of the Agriculture, Energy and Ocean Resources Committee has explained to me the 200-pound limitation on algae, so it's fine with me."

The motion was put by the Chair and

carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1021 was adopted and H.B. No. 586, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AQUACULTURE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Hee rose to speak against the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I'll vote 'no' on this bill simply because the governor has ample flexibility to recruit and hire whomever the governor wants for special projects or unique projects and events such as the America's Cup, if that is deemed important by the chief executive.

"What this bill does would be to, among other things, recruit someone, then exempt that person from civil service coverage to make that person now eligible for work compensation, unemployment insurance and other kinds of fringe benefits.

"The governor has ample flexibility by contract and should pursue that means, and not come with this vehicle to broaden his, or in this case, his reach, so I will vote 'no.' Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1499, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PUBLIC OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Hee).

House Bill No. 1587, S.D. 1:

On motion by Senator Nakasato, seconded by Senator B. Kobayashi and carried, H.B. No. 1587, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WORKERS' COMPENSATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, 2 (Hee and Henderson).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1090 (H.B. No. 220, S.D. 1):

Senator Yamasaki moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1090 be adopted and H.B. No. 220, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Mizuguchi.

Senator Cobb rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this measure and in doing so, I'm very cognizant of the committee report which has six 'noes' and four 'WR's' on it.

"But more to the point, Mr. President, I'm cognizant of the fact that in the nine years I've been privileged to serve as chairman of your Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, throughout that period of time, the medical community, in general, and physicians, medical doctors, in particular, have opposed virtually every alternative form of insurance for other health care providers and all those who oppose it are medical doctors. They have opposed it for chiropractors, naturopaths, osteopaths, even for psychiatrists. They've wanted it all to themselves.

"I would like to read to you and the members of the Senate a letter I received from William Tsushima, Ph.D., of Straub Clinic and Hospital, and then discuss a few of the issues that Dr. Tsushima raises in this letter in terms of the equality, the democracy and the justice of health care.

'Since 1968 under Worker's Compensation, the term "physician" has included medical doctors, osteopaths, dentists, optometrists, chiropractors and naturopaths. House Bill 220 proposes that psychologists be included so that their services to injured workers can be more readily provided.

'Psychologists perform several important functions for the injured

worker: diagnosis and rehabilitation of brain injured persons, treatment of chronic pain disorders, alleviation of anxiety disorders following work accidents like falling, explosions and electrocutions, and perhaps most important of all, encouraging emotionally disturbed injured workers to return to work.

'Those who oppose this bill appear to cite (1) possible increasing cost and (2) the lack of medical training among psychologists.

'Legislators have been provided some HMSA data that suggest psychologists cost more than psychiatrists. The data, which only provide costs per patient, are highly deficient and misleading, as they do not take into account different disorders and different services provided. Using only cost per patient as a criterion, one would conclude neurosurgeons and heart surgeons are more costly (ergo more inefficient?) than neurologists and cardiologists.

'In any event, given the total picture, mental health costs have always been miniscule. Data from health insurance programs which permit the independent practice of psychologists indicate mental health bills comprise 1% to 3% of the total medical costs. In 1986, HMSA's payments to psychologists were less than 1% of the total paid for medical expenses. Furthermore, psychologists have produced data that suggest inclusion of mental health benefits decrease overall medical utilization and costs (since many overusers of medical care have a primary emotional problem).

'Psychologists indeed are not medical school graduates, but neither are the other "physician" providers under workers' compensation law. We see no data indicating that those who are not M.D.'s mistreat or injure their patients, as some seem to fear. In fact, over the past 15 years, psychologists have practiced independently with HMSA and CHAMPUS patients without any recorded incident of mistreatment of an unrecognized medical illness.

'House Bill 220 will allow injured workers greater accessibility to psychologists if and when they develop serious psychological problems.'

"Recently, Mr. President, members of this body received a lobbying packet against the passage of this bill from the Hawaii Medical Association, and it alluded to their respect of the tradition of law and the legislative process and the tradition of Hippocrates going back 2,500 years.

"I found this to be an extremely self-serving document, Mr. President, because when I looked at the data that were cited by the opponents of this measure, I agreed with the psychologists that the presentation of it was extremely misleading. That data, highlighted on pink sheets, which every Senator presumably received, broke down the percentage of total cases, the average visits per case, the average benefit costs per case, and the percentage of cases reaching the \$500 maximum. What it failed to point out as a percentage was most revealing and that was the per capita cost of psychologists versus psychiatrists, depending on their caseload.

"That critical data was omitted from this presentation, and computing it on a percentage basis, I find that the cost of psychologists is lower, not higher, than that of psychiatrists, which is the very argument the medical community has used against this bill.

"Mr. President, we have deferred another matter which I would like to call to the members' attention, and that is House Bill 211, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Medical Malpractice Insurance.'

"In this, the medical community is asking that we exempt their self-insurance company, MIEC, from the requirements of the insurance roll-backs scheduled to take effect on October 1, 1987 and October 1, 1988. That's a perfectly understandable request since they have only one insurance company and it's a doctor-owned, supposedly nonprofit, insurance group.

"But consider, if you will, Mr. President, the other hypocrisy of the positions as outlined on these two bills. One, their argument against any kind of justice or equality in terms of health care providers as contained in the argument against House Bill 220, and on the other hand, their request for an exemption from the insurance roll-backs contained in House Bill 211, H.D. 1, S.D. 1.

"In short, Mr. President, they want it both ways. They want to deny medical equality; they want to deny those who are licensed and recognized by the state the same rights they have as health care providers and at the same time they want an exemption for their insurance. I find that utterly unconscionable.

"More to the point, Mr. President, House Bill 220 was precisely the same bill that the Senate passed last year and that the previous governor vetoed. In the previous governor's veto message, there was a promise of a cost analysis and case study to be conducted during the interim with a report back to the Legislature. I recall that veto message very clearly because this

Senate then took action to unanimously override that governor's veto, and did so by a vote of 25 to nothing, as one of three bills that we overrode the governor's veto on last year.

"That promise, Mr. President, of cost analysis remains to this day a promise unfulfilled. I have asked for it and I have not received it. So what are we to do in the case of psychologists because of a promise unfulfilled. Vote them down to support medical tradition? Vote them down to support 2,500 years of Hippocratic oath? Vote them down and wait another year for another study when the case has clearly been made it is not going to cost more? Vote them down because while we insist they be licensed and regulated and trained in clinical psychology, we are not willing to give them the same credence when it comes to the health care provision of insurance?

"If we vote down House Bill 220, ladies and gentlemen, that is precisely what we're doing. We have an issue here of fundamental justice and fundamental equality before this Senate. That if we require people to be licensed and trained then we should also be willing to provide for them the same level of recognition in terms of insurance that we provide for osteopaths, chiropractors, naturopaths and optometrists, none of whom are graduates of an accredited medical school unless accreditation is granted by the American Medical Association.

"That is the issue before us on this bill, Mr. President.

"I strongly urge the members to reconsider and support House Bill 220. Thank you."

Senator Yamasaki also spoke in support of the measure and stated:

"Mr. President, during the course of our public hearing, the director of the Department of Labor came before the committee and provided testimony in regard to this bill.

"The department said that the federal law refers to 'clinical psychologists' while the California law requires psychologists to have at least two years of clinical experience in a recognized health setting and, in addition, requires appropriate medical collaboration when requested by the employer. These requirements were apparently included as a means of cost-containment.

"We also received, during the course of the hearing, a copy of the California law passed in 1977 which provides that this bill, in addition, include licensed psychologists with a doctorate degree in psychology and

either two years of clinical experience in a recognized health setting, or meeting specified standards as being within the definition of physician for such purposes, and would require that when treatment or evaluation for an injury is provided by a psychologist provision be made for appropriate medical collaboration upon request of the employer or the insurer.

"Mr. President, the bill before us this afternoon provides that psychologist means a licensed clinical psychologist with a doctorate degree in psychology and who either has at least two years of clinical experience in a recognized health setting, or has met the standards of the National Register of Health Service Providers in Psychology. When treatment or evaluation for an injury is provided by a psychologist, provision shall be made for appropriate medical collaboration when requested by the employer or the insurer, as provided by rules adopted in conformance with chapter 91.

"Mr. President, the federal law and also the California law provide this type of definition for a psychologist under the workers' compensation law, therefore, Mr. President, I urge members of this body to consider this. We are complying with the federal law, and also we are in conformance with the California law and that this is a much more palatable bill than we had in the previous session.

"Thank you."

Senator Chang then rose on a point of information and said:

"Mr. President, would the chairman of the subject matter committee or the chairman of the second committee know what the prospects of this bill entering conference would be and the prospect of the bill subsequently being returned to this body for final vote?"

The Chair posed the question and Senator Cobb interjected:

"Mr. President, on last year's referral, this bill did come to your Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, however, in this particular case the House bill did not. I have no way of knowing exactly what the prospects are for a conference. I do know that it's an improvement over even last year's bill which we passed and which makes it very clear that in accordance with the federal standards a psychologist with a M.A. degree cannot practice clinically. But I have no way of knowing precisely what the conference is, I would have to defer to your chairman on Ways and Means."

The Chair then posed the question to the chairman of the Ways and Means

Committee and Senator Yamasaki answered:

"Mr. President, I have no way of determining what the fate of this bill might be in conference."

Senator Nakasato then responded:

"Mr. President, there is only one vehicle. The Senate version of the bill died in Ways and Means. This is the only vehicle right here."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1090 was adopted and, Roll Call vote having been requested, H.B. No. 220, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WORKER'S COMPENSATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 15. Noes, 10 (Aki, George, Henderson, Ikeda, A. Kobayashi, B. Kobayashi, Matsuura, Menor, Reed and Solomon).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1093 (H.B. No. 1138, S.D. 1):

Senator Yamasaki moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1093 be adopted and H.B. No. 1138, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Mizuguchi.

Senator McMurdo rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I have had the chance to look this bill over and talked to somebody and I'm voting 'aye' on it."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1093 was adopted and H.B. No. 1138, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DAMS AND RESERVOIRS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1095 (H.B. No. 1421, H.D. 1, S.D. 1):

Senator Yamasaki moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1095 be adopted and H.B. No. 1421, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Mizuguchi.

Senator McMurdo spoke in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I am reluctantly voting 'aye' for this measure. As you know, I thought the original appropriation was large and when the second one came back in, it was even larger than the first. The project

has changed and keeps growing and growing. Since the chairman of the Tourism Committee put it very firmly that this will be the last time any money will be coming from the Legislature for this particular project, as I said, I am reluctantly voting 'aye.'"

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1095 was adopted and H.B. No. 1421, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE KALAKAUA AVENUE SAFETY AND BEAUTIFICATION PROJECT, OAHU," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

House Bill No. 1740, S.D. 1:

Senator Yamasaki moved that H.B. No. 1740, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Mizuguchi.

At 2:32 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 2:43 o'clock p.m.

Senator Aki then rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, because of the concerns raised by the members of the Senate during last night's caucus, I have been in contact with my counterpart in the House and he has reassured me that this matter will be brought to conference and that he has grave reservations about the artificial reefs in the bill."

Senator Hagino spoke for the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, I'm going to vote for this bill but with great reluctance. As the previous speaker mentioned, I am concerned about the inclusion of artificial reefs and I also hope, in conference, the language about other uses of a similar nature will be taken out. If that's done then, hopefully, I will vote for it. Thank you."

Senator Blair, in support of the bill, said:

"Mr. President, I'm voting for the bill and I like the artificial reefs. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1740, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LANDS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

House Bill No. 1357, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

Senator Aki moved that H.B. No. 1357, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Solomon.

Senator Hee rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I'm speaking against this bill.

"This bill should have come to the Committee on Judiciary. It changes the procedures of the judicial system. It puts new language in the adjudicatory process. It speaks directly to the supreme court. This bill impinges on First Amendment rights of native Hawaiians. This bill is probably unconstitutional; probably will, if tested, be thrown out (of court).

"This bill, in short, circumvents and guts the judicial process and leads one to believe that an appeal process would be intact relative to the state Supreme Court overturning a decision rendered through a public hearing process.

"Mr. President and members, there should be no surprise, this is a yearly 'save the geothermal' expression.

"Let me state at the outset as I do every year, I have no personal bad feelings about the industry and in fact I think that it is a good industry whose potential is limitless. Nonetheless, we are here to protect a process and what this would do is remove the evidentiary hearing; would remove the adversary nature of a contested case proceeding and in its place insert a second public hearing.

"Mr. President and members, this bill would preclude a process like I have here on my right, which is a contested proceeding of the Molokai cattle case. Without this, Mr. President and members, without this documentation I could not be in court today. Without this, Mr. President, I would have said and I did say at the public hearing that my cattle have no tuberculosis; that I'm willing to slaughter my herd — cut their rib cages open with a chain saw, pull out their lungs, throw 'um on the table and tell Calvin Lum to open 'um up. No tuberculosis, give me your house. Tuberculosis, I give you my house.

"That is the nature of a public hearing. There is no evidentiary proceeding; no cross-examination proceeding; no rules upon which the supreme court could make a recommendation relative to an appeal.

"What we have today, Mr. President, as a result of this contested case proceeding is that regardless of the fact that my herd has been depopulated, I'm still in court today. And, believe me, I'm not in court by choice but because I have to be.

"In short, that is what a contested case proceeding protects — the right to a day in court.

"By gutting out the contested case proceeding, Mr. Matt Goodbody, a state Supreme Court staff attorney, whom I wrote to and who replied in a memo to me dated March 31, 1987, I quote on page 3:

'There is no denying that the contested case procedure under the Hawaii Administrative Procedure Act is tried and tested. And it is thorough. All kinds of issues can be fully tried in an adversary, contested case hearing, so that when an appeal is eventually taken to the Supreme Court, just about every issue connected with that geothermal permit will already have been fully litigated. Thus almost everything can be finally determined by the Supreme Court on that first appeal.'

'To complicate matters, if the bill is passed, it might be argued by someone that, because the Legislature has deliberately eliminated a contested case hearing in geothermal matters and has not specifically authorized separate court actions, the Legislature thereby implicitly intended to forbid subsequent litigation.'

"I will not be so bold as to say that the proponents are really trying to fool us; that they really know that this could not occur. But, apparently, the Supreme Court staff attorney would be, in his letter to me.

'... if in connection with a particular permit application a claim is raised by an opponent raising genuine conflicting evidence on a crucial factual issue (particularly if the factual issue involves the credibility of witnesses) and if the agency's rules do not allow for cross-examination in such circumstances, then it may well be, as suggested in your letter, that the claim could not be adequately litigated at the public hearing.'

"That is to say (and I am quoting here, Mr. President), '... at a public hearing anyone could get up and say anything, at anytime, for any reason, without cross-examination relative to the nature of the authenticity of that person and of that information that person may espouse.'

"You ask, and I quote again, Mr. President, Mr. Matt Goodbody in his letter, 'You ask whether the elimination of a contested case hearing would entail

elimination of cross-examination of witnesses. It would, unless the agency's rules provided otherwise.'

'Finally, with reference to the standards of review on pages 8 and 9 of the bill, which are copied from the Hawaii Administrative Procedure Act, you ask "how the Supreme Court could realistically find anything clearly erroneous without the cross-examination, qualification of expert witnesses, and other safeguards which would be present in a contested case hearing (and not in a public hearing)?" I think you have put your finger on the advantages and completeness of a contested case hearing.'

"Admittedly, Mr. President, this letter did not specifically address the bill before us. However, without question, the letter did address the bill in its intent, relative to replacing a contested case proceeding with a public hearing.

"Mr. President and members, I have in my hand an article written by 'The Honolulu Advertiser,' when its then reporter was Gerald Kato, and that article spoke relative to the supreme court which revoked two developers' shoreline permits. While this article did not speak to a geothermal permit procedure, this article did speak to a contested case procedure and in it the title was 'Supreme Court revokes two developers' shoreline permits.' This article is written as a result of a contested case proceeding by native Hawaiians of the organization Hui Ala Loa when condominiums were proposed at Kawakiu Bay.

"I would like to quote a part of the article by Mr. Kato where he said: '... instead, the commission granted the permits and added conditions that the developers follow-up with archaeological survey and excavation of sites. "We hope that imposing these self-serving conditions without requiring a hearing to review the additional study and survey by the commission is in error, Associate Justice Wakatsuki said."

"As a result of the developers not following their own recommendations as stipulated in the contested case proceeding, the supreme court revoked the permits.

"Clearly, Mr. President and those of you who will vote for the bill, do so with full conscience that while you may advocate geothermal development, in this process, the advocacy also extends to the circumvention of a fundamental procedure in the judicial system of the bedrock of the adjudicatory process and will only add to more court costs when this bill, should it pass, be taken and ruled on as unconstitutional.

"Again, I have no ax to grind with the

geothermal developers, in fact, I support the projects because of the limitless potential. On the other hand, of greater importance to me is upholding the institution we represent, the judicial system we live within and, equally important, the right of those who choose to dissent regardless of whether we agree. And in this case, Mr. President and members, that right is being exercised by native Hawaiians.

"Thank you."

(Memorandum dated March 31, 1987 to Senator Clayton Hee from Matt Goodbody, Supreme Court Staff Attorney, re: S.B. 1196, S.D. 1, is quoted in its entirety:

'I am submitting this memorandum in response to your letter of March 27, 1987, in which you raise a number of questions about the elimination of contested case hearings in geothermal permit cases, as proposed in S.B. 1196, SD 1. Although that particular bill seems dead, you are apparently asking me about it because of its relevance to the companion House bill, HB 1357, HD 1.

'I will try to assist you with a full response to your questions, with the understanding that my legal analyses and conclusions cannot be binding on the Supreme Court or any other judges of the Hawaii court system. As you know, judges can only decide cases and legal issues when they properly come before their respective courts; and of course only the five justices of the Supreme Court can decide any issue definitively. The Judiciary as a branch of government cannot itself render a legal opinion outside a proper court proceeding.

'At the same time, I do speak for the Judiciary Administration, in the sense that the Judiciary Administration takes the position that amendments to appeals statutes should clarify, when not obvious from their context, the standards and procedures to be applied by the appellate courts. Sometimes appellate standards and issues are obvious from the context of an appeals statute (for example, in the Environmental Impact Statement statute, where the issues are clearly set out elsewhere in the statute). However the Judiciary opposed the initial draft of S.B. 1196 because the bill left much procedural uncertainty as to what the Supreme Court was expected to do when reviewing a geothermal appeal. I spoke on behalf of the Judiciary Administration in opposing the initial draft, and I also spoke for the Judiciary in indicating that the Judiciary no longer opposed the bill after changes were made in Senate Draft 1 and the changes were illuminated by the committee reports.

'You further enquire whether my informal memorandum of March 12, 1987 represented my personal opinion or the opinion of the Judiciary. Most of it was my personal opinion. My opinion had been solicited by committee staffers and so I gave an informal opinion.

'However I did speak for the Judiciary Administration to the extent that I indicated that the Judiciary is not opposed to the bill as modified in Senate Draft 1 and as clarified in the committee report.

'I also spoke for the Judiciary in indicating that we take no position on the question of whether the bill should ultimately be enacted so as to eliminate contested case hearings in geothermal cases. That is a policy determination for the Legislature. So long as the bill clarifies appellate procedures, the Judiciary is unopposed to the bill, but it should be made clear that the Judiciary is not an actual supporter or proponent of the bill. The Judiciary has not given its imprimatur to the bill. So long as the bill spells out appellate procedures, we do not oppose it, but we are in no position to defend the wisdom or overall soundness of the bill.

'Please note that the Judiciary had not been consulted about the initial draft of the bill. We were consulted only after we filed written objections: At the Capitol, in the hours prior to my testifying on the bill, its proponents argued vigorously to me that the bill was extremely important for the economic welfare of the State, and asked me whether modifications of the bill might satisfy the Judiciary's basic objections. I had to make a decision on behalf of the Judiciary. I concluded that the Judiciary should not reject the possibility of ameliorating amendments, and I so indicated at the public hearing.

'Before taking your specific questions in order, I would like to first generally address what I see as your underlying concerns about eliminating contested case hearings.

'There is no denying that the contested case procedure under the Hawaii Administrative Procedure Act (HAPA) is tried and tested. And it is thorough. All kinds of issues can be fully tried in an adversary, contested case hearing, so that when an appeal is eventually taken to the Supreme Court, just about every issue connected with that geothermal permit will already have been fully litigated. Thus almost everything can be finally determined by the Supreme Court on that first appeal.

'On the other hand, proponents of S.B. 1196 argue vigorously that permits should be issued more expeditiously, that contested case hearings literally add years to the permit process, that the public's interest in developing energy resources and economic growth outweighs other considerations.

'The bill proposes a shorter public hearing procedure under which certain types of claims might not be capable of adequate litigation at the ordinary public hearing, for example, certain claims of violations of personal rights where an adversary proceeding might be necessary. The unstated assumption of the bill is that those issues which cannot be litigated adequately at a public hearing might be raised in subsequent, separate court cases seeking to set aside the permits (such as independent actions in Hawaii State Circuit Court or United States District Court seeking injunctive or declaratory relief). The proponents of the bill apparently realize that there might be additional litigation, but still believe it is better to get the permit expeditiously, subject to the possibility that a separate court action might ultimately result in revocation of the permit after the fact. In other words, they believe getting the permit quickly is the most important thing, even though there may be an element of risk, as opposed to the situation where the Supreme Court has definitively affirmed the issuance of a permit after a full-blown contested case hearing.

'To complicate matters, if the bill is passed, it might be argued by someone that, because the Legislature has deliberately eliminated a contested case hearing in geothermal matters and has not specifically authorized separate court actions, the Legislature thereby implicitly intended to forbid subsequent litigation. However if this theory were advocated by the administrative agency and the energy developers, the theory might backfire, and the courts might throw out the whole geothermal permit procedure as unconstitutional on the ground that adequate relief is not available for purposes of litigating those types of personal rights requiring adversary proceedings. (It would be possible to clarify this potential problem by amending the bill or committee reports to state that the remedy by way of appeal is not the exclusive remedy for setting aside a geothermal permit in those situations where a public hearing fails to provide an adequate forum for litigation of a particular claim; and to further provide that in such situations appropriate actions for injunctive and declaratory relief would not be barred. However the Judiciary takes no position on whether

this potential problem should be dealt with. As stated earlier, the Judiciary's only position on this bill is that appellate standards and procedures should be spelled out.)

'For example, if in connection with a particular permit application a claim is raised by an opponent raising genuine conflicting evidence on a crucial factual issue (particularly if the factual issue involves the credibility of witnesses), and if the agency's rules do not allow for cross-examination in such circumstances, then it may well be, as suggested in your letter, that the claim could not be adequately litigated at the public hearing. A separate court action might be necessary to determine the issue.

'To be practical, I doubt that many geothermal appeals will involve genuine disputes as to crucial facts. Usually such permits involve situations where there already are elaborately documented surveys and where all the relevant facts are easily verifiable from the document submitted by the applicant.

'As you may know, two geothermal appeals are due to be argued before the Hawaii Supreme Court on April 22, 1987. Those appeals involve claims of first amendment freedom of religion rights. I am not certain whether those particular claims could have been adequately presented at a public hearing as proposed under SB 1196. Some constitutional claims can be determined without an elaborate adversary proceeding. Others may require adversary hearings.

'To turn now to your specific questions, you first enquire about the elimination, at page 6, line 20 of SB 1196, SD 1, of the phrase "applicant has demonstrated by a preponderance of the evidence." I do not know why that phrase was eliminated. My personal opinion is that the elimination makes no real difference, because section (h) on p. 9 requires "reliable, probative, and substantial evidence" to support the agency decision. That standard is clearly defined in the case law and is not inconsistent with the "preponderance of the evidence" standard.

'You ask whether the elimination of a contested case hearing would entail elimination of cross-examination of witnesses. It would, unless the agency's rules provided otherwise. The agency could provide in its rules that in certain situations cross-examination would be permitted. The agency could also provide for rebuttal in certain situations.

'You ask, "If there is no adversarial proceeding would not the record to be

reviewed consist mainly of statements made at the public hearing?" It would depend in part on what the agency's rules provide. Presumably the initial detailed documentation in support of the application would also be made part of the record. Written memoranda from applicants and any responses from opponents might also be made part of the record if permitted under the agency's rules.

'You ask me to "explain the effect of the word 'substantial'" on page 8, line 20 (I believe you mean line 16) "as it clarifies the term 'rights of the appellants.'" The phrase "substantial rights" is copied directly from the Hawaii Administrative Procedure Act. The phrase has been applied in many cases by appellate courts, and although I don't have a watertight definition, I think it is fairly clear that it means legal rights that have substance, as opposed to trivial or insubstantial rights.

'Finally, with reference to the standards of review on pages 8 and 9 of the bill, which are copied from the Hawaii Administrative Procedure Act, you ask "how the Supreme Court could realistically find anything clearly erroneous without the cross-examination, qualification of expert witnesses, and other safeguards which would be present in a contested case hearing (and not in a public hearing)?" I think you have put your finger on the advantages and completeness of a contested case hearing. But in fairness to the other side, there are at least some things that can be decided by an appellate court even if there is no cross-examination and no expert witnesses (assuming that the agency's rules do not allow for cross-examination and expert witnesses). There may be constitutional and statutory violations that can be determined, as a matter of law, on the basis of undisputed facts in the permit application (for example, there may be a question whether the type of development proposed is a "geothermal" development within the meaning of the statute; or there may be a question whether Hawaiian Homes Lands can legally be used for geothermal development, etc. etc.). There can be many legal issues that can be determined by an appellate court as a matter of law, on the basis of undisputed facts, without necessity for resolution of any factual issues. I think the proponents of the bill believe that there rarely are any genuine factual disputes in geothermal appeals.

'As for application of the "clearly erroneous" test to factual evidence, the appellate court can reverse if it is left with "the definite and firm conviction that a mistake has been made," even though there may be evidence in support

of the agency decision. But admittedly, as discussed above, if an opponent should raise a genuine factual question on a material issue, and if the agency's rules do not allow for cross-examination, it may be impossible for that issue to be fully litigated at the public hearing. There may then have to be a separate "collateral attack" on the permit in a separate court proceeding, as discussed above.

'The bill's supporters, as I understand it, apparently believe that in the great majority of instances a full contested case hearing will be unnecessary. Also, please note that the bill and its committee report leave open the possibility that the agency's own rules could permit cross-examination and expert witnesses and so forth.

'In conclusion, as indicated earlier, the Judiciary has not sponsored this legislation and is not a proponent of the bill. The Judiciary believes it is the responsibility of the proponents to demonstrate to you that the bill is sound. It is true that the Judiciary no longer opposes the bill, so long as appellate standards are spelled out as they are in S.B. 1196, S.D. 1. However, the Judiciary takes no position on the ultimate policy question whether it would be wise to eliminate contested case hearings in geothermal cases.

'I hope this somewhat lengthy response casts light on the questions raised in your letter.'

Senator Matsuura spoke in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, the previous speaker quoted a lot of statements made by Mr. Goodbody and I will be the first to agree with all the statements he made. The reason is because Mr. Goodbody was reacting to House Bill 1357, H.D. 1.

"It is for this very reason that the Senate came up with Senate draft 1, to address all of the concerns that the previous speaker mentioned. We made certain that some of these provisions would be included in the Senate draft so if you were to read on page 10, the eight items to be included in the public hearing and I'm not going to read all of that, but there are eight items that must be included in the public hearing.

"One of the reasons for this measure is that it is a policy decision. In the states of California, Oregon, Nevada, Utah and New Mexico where geothermal energy resources are available, there is no such thing as a contested case.

"We, in Hawaii, have tried to encourage

the development of geothermal resources. Unfortunately, the developments have been delayed primarily because of some of these contested cases. We are five years down the line and we are still in court.

"We are trying to change the contested cases in terms of adding another public hearing but you must understand the procedure as it is today — you have an application; then a public hearing; you have mediation if you don't agree with it; another public hearing; then you have the decision by the administration; then if you appeal the decision, you go to the supreme court. There is ample time in which one can express his concerns.

"I personally feel that this measure is a good measure, primarily as it is written in the committee report on page 3; that this has already been done ... information that was obtained in public hearing has been brought up on appeal. So it's not that we are doing something that we're circumventing that procedure.

"So with all of those comments, I urge the members to vote in favor of this measure. Thank you."

Senator Blair also spoke against the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak against this bill. In doing so, I'd like to point out that the remarks of Senator Hee, quoting from Mr. Goodbody's letter, apply equally to the Senate draft because the amendments which remove the contested case hearing remain in the Senate draft 1.

"Once the contested case hearing is taken out, we have the risk of arbitrary findings of fact. These arbitrary findings could cut either way, either in favor of the developer or against the developer. In many cases, the developer has the burden of establishing certain facts before he can proceed.

"We shouldn't look at this bill just in terms of geothermal development. In fact, if you go back to where all of this contested case hearing came up, it came up because the developers were tired of all the people showing up before the Land Use Commission and they wanted a contested case hearing because they thought it would expedite matters. Often we find that when we try to do substantive things by amending the procedure, it comes back to haunt us.

"I'm afraid that the proponents of this bill will see it come back to haunt them when, in response to community efforts, arbitrary findings are made by the hearings officers which make it impossible for the permit to be granted. On appeal, the proponent will find that he has no factual record to present to an appellate court.

"We shouldn't look at this as a bill either for development or against development. We should look at it as a bill, despite good intentions, sets up a procedure which appears to grant a right of review by the Supreme Court but limits that right of review to matters other than factual questions. Once it goes up, there won't be a record for the finding that the facts as found by the county commission are clearly erroneous. You won't have a complete review process, so I would urge the members to vote against the bill and keep the procedures that we have. Thank you."

Senator Hee then added:

"Mr. President, just a short response to my good friend Senator Matsuura, and that is that with all due respect to his testimony today, there's no question in my mind that page 10 and page 11, those eight articles upon which he referred to (and if any of the members have their bill in front of them), there is no provision for cross-examination, no provision for evidentiary proceeding other than the written transcripts of the public hearing which in and of itself is not sufficient to be ruled on by appeal by the Supreme Court.

"In fact, let me restate that Senator Blair is precisely correct because in the response of the attorney general against the petitioners in the Molokai cattle case, Article No. 34, the attorney general specifically rebutted according to the contested case proceeding, and that is to say, the attorney general said, 'One of the treaties is introduced by the petitioners themselves during the contested case stated the following opinion.'

"It's not important what the opinion was. What is important is to say that the government in this case heavily relied on the cross-examination and evidentiary proceeding of the contested case, and that in the response to the judge at the appeal, the attorney general repeatedly referred back to the contested case.

"For example, 'Since many of the petitioners in the contested case have never had their cattle tested for bovine tuberculosis, ...' etc, etc.

"Without this proceeding, I'm certain and I'm convinced that the staff attorney of the Supreme Court is correct. And although I did not call the staff attorney in the last 24 hours, I doubt very much that this opinion has changed. Thank you."

At 3:05 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 3:13 o'clock p.m.

Senator Chang then spoke against the bill as follows:

"Mr. President, I will be voting against this bill. Although I recognize the good intentions of all of the parties working on this measure, the innovation and value of their approach recommended in the Senate draft and the tremendous economic benefits to be derived from geothermal development, I fear that the proposal is yet deficient and will result in record insufficient for adequate judicial review and, perhaps more importantly, will result in a process that will actually lengthen future disputes.

"If this bill does pass, I would urge the proponents to continue to refine this measure and clear these deficiencies. Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi also spoke against the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, the concern for public hearing versus contested case raises in my mind the possibilities such as this. It would seem that a person might be able to contend in a public hearing without cross-examination that the person's freedom of religion were being compromised and that that person's freedom of religion had to do with the Goddess Pele of the volcano. The person's standing with regard to this matter might be fully accepted by someone who knows that person well, but for people who did not know that person well that might be called in question.

"Without a contested case hearing, it seems to me, you would not have a good basis to understand the nature of this person's religious belief and the nature of this person's religion. So, I would suggest that we could get into a situation in which perhaps an unusual claim might be made in a public hearing that could not be fully resolved later on down the road without some sort of cross-examination.

"I should also point out on another matter that we already have a very unusual situation in which a decision from the county level goes directly to the State Supreme Court. If this procedure is used in a good many other cases, it would set, I would think, an uncomfortable precedent in which the whole court process, that of review and appeal, would be shortcircuited.

"I would ask members of this body to consider that, perhaps, we might be able to devise other means by which this very long contested case process could be shortened by some sort of batching process of issues, by some sort of consolidation of issues so that in certain circumstances they might go to a contested case but in certain other circumstances they might not.

"I would call for some sort of thought in this direction for the purposes of reexamining the issue during another year. Thank you."

Senator Solomon, in support of the bill, said:

"Mr. President, I am going to vote in favor of this bill, with reservation.

"I believe this bill is an improvement of Senate Bill 1196, S.D. 1, however, even if in its present form it still leaves unanswered questions as to if constitutional claims can be determined without an elaborate adversary proceeding.

"The elimination of a contested case hearing would entail the elimination of cross-examination of witnesses unless the agency's rules provided otherwise and could provide in its rules that in certain situations cross-examination would be permitted. The agency could also provide for rebuttal in certain situations."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried and, Roll Call vote having been requested, H.B. No. 1357, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONTESTED CASES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 15. Noes, 10 (Blair, Chang, Cobb, Fernandes Salling, Hee, Holt, B. Kobayashi, McMurdo, Menor and Yamasaki).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1123 (H.B. No. 37, H.D. 1, S.D. 2):

Senator Hee moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1123 be adopted and H.B. No. 37, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Menor.

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, should this bill become law, the native Hawaiians can begin to sue for the bill we just passed.

"This bill, Mr. President, like the bill before us, goes to the bedrock of civil rights by those people who were here long before any of us. It insures, Mr. President, that these native Hawaiians, some of whom have been aggrieved through many procedures, will have their right to redress.

"Like the bill which preceded us, Mr. President, this bill would allow that native Hawaiian to do it. Unlike the bill before us, this bill will allow the native Hawaiian to do it in a court of law.

"While recognizing the concerns of the

attorney general relative to the amount of which the state may be liable to pay, it creates an interesting dichotomy by number one, should not the state reconcile its negligence to the native Hawaiian versus how much should the state in money reconcile the aggrieved party.

"To deal with that manufactured demon of the attorney general, this bill sets forth an arbitration and mediation procedure of which the total sum awarded by the arbitrator or subsequently by the judge would be paid according to policy set forth by the Legislature, and compensation under this bill could be allowed through land or money.

"Mr. President, this bill is a compromise bill which we trust will be taken to conference and would set forth the reconciling of negligence on behalf of the state. It is not by any means the perfect bill, Mr. President, and concerns have been risen relative to a contingent waiver regarding the payment or partial payment or structured payment thereof. These and other matters raised in the caucus will be deliberated in conference. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1123 was adopted and H.B. No. 37, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RIGHT TO SUE BY NATIVE HAWAIIAN AND HAWAIIAN INDIVIDUALS AND ORGANIZATIONS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Matsuura).

MATTERS DEFERRED FROM EARLIER ON THE CALENDAR

House Bill No. 211, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

Senator Cobb moved that H.B. No. 211, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Blair.

Senator Cobb rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, this particular bill, House Bill 211, was deferred to make a point which was alluded to in my previous remarks with respect to House Bill 220. At this time, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the members of the Senate, all of them, for their vote on House Bill 220 because when I stood on that bill I was aware that we did

not have sufficient votes to pass it.

"Your willingness to listen, your compassion, your understanding, your support, your willingness to change minds right here on the floor illustrated the value of debate and made me extremely proud to be a member of this body. For that, I want to say thank you, personally, from the bottom of my heart, even to those who voted 'no.'

"Mr. President, I am reminded of a sign in your office that says in effect, 'thank you for having a different opinion,' because without the contrast my opinion would have no meaning. So to every member of this Senate, Mr. President, my sincere thanks.

"The bill before us provides not only for the exemption for MIEC but requires the filing of a full disclosure report as to what the rates would have been and that information will be made available to the insurance commissioner and to interested parties. Accordingly, I feel comfortable in recommending passage of the bill and urge all members to vote 'aye.' Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 211, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MEDICAL MALPRACTICE INSURANCE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

House Bill No. 817, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 817, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SALARY LEVELS OF DEPUTIES TO DEPARTMENT HEADS," was recommitted to the Committee on Ways and Means.

House Bill No. 842, H.D. 2, S.D. 1:

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 842, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," was recommitted to the Committee on Ways and Means.

ADJOURNMENT

At 3:26 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator George and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Tuesday, April 7, 1987.

FORTY-SEVENTH DAY

Tuesday, April 7, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:45 o'clock a.m., with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Chaplain Lewis Wilder of Wheeler Air Force Base, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Aki, B. Kobayashi and R. Wong who were excused.

The Chair announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Sixth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Holt introduced Mr. Joe Sciolla from Boston, Massachusetts, "a roommate for three years at Harvard University."

Senator Hagino introduced Rebecca Smith and Sheri Britich, students from Kahuku Intermediate School, observing the Legislature.

Senator Henderson introduced Mr. Joe Garcia, former State Representative from the Big Island, and Catherine Harast, Joyce and Norb Brusky from Puna, and Irene Hughes from Kona, members of the education committee of the Silver Legislature, a mock legislature for senior citizens.

RE-REFERRAL OF RESOLUTIONS

Senator Solomon's remarks on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Madam Vice President, in 1985-1986 the University of Hawaii received \$69 million in extramural funding to support research, training, and students. Of this sum, organized research units generated more than half or \$36 million. If we use the income multiplier of two (2), which is a reasonable figure, the initial injection of \$69 million extramural funds will have a total economic impact of \$138 million and the \$36 million generated by research will have an impact of \$72 million.

"During this period the state invested \$17 million in appropriated funds to support the organized research units. This means for each \$1 expended by the state, the research units generated \$2 in extramural funds for a total of \$3 worth of research and \$6 in economic impact.

"In addition, there is an indirect impact generated when research programs have achieved national or international prominence. For example, the outstanding Institute for Astronomy generated over \$80 million in initial capital investments and in

1986, \$9 million in operating funds and had over 110 Hawaii-based people.

"The new Keck Observatory has an initial capital investment of \$85 million and in 1986 operating funds of \$2.3 million and have 35 Hawaii-based people. This telescope will become operational in 1991.

"All in all expenditure of funds for research is a good investment for Hawaii.

"At this time, Madam Vice President, I would like to, as the chairman of the Higher Education Committee, thank the Ways and Means chairman for restoring the \$8 million for the Mauna Kea access road and I would like to turn over the foregoing information to the chairman for his deliberations in the forthcoming conference.

"Thank you."

FORTY-EIGHTH DAY

Wednesday, April 8, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:41 o'clock a.m., with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Chaplain Michael E. Reynolds, Major, U.S. Army, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The Chair announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Seventh Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Solomon introduced a group of ten students from Honokaa High School National Honor Society which included three foreign students, two from Colombia and one from Mexico, accompanied by Ms. Noreen Nagamine, their teacher/advisor.

Senator Ikeda introduced Aron Ashimine and Mark Lau, 8th grade students from Niu Valley Intermediate School who are participating in the "Day at the Legislature" program.

Senator A. Kobayashi, on behalf of Senator McMurdo and herself, introduced Ms. Susan Entz, Ms. Chris Chun and Ms. Kitty Dudley, as follows:

"Madam President, I would like to introduce three individuals who truly gave so much of their time and talent to the Ronald McDonald House which opened this past weekend.

"It really is a beautiful structure and a lot of people's time went into this house which will benefit many children and their families.

"This morning we have present on the Senate floor Susan Entz, who is president of the Friends of Ronald McDonald House, and sitting in the gallery we have Chris Chun and Kitty Dudley.

"I would like to read a portion of the Senate Certificate, if I may.

"To recognize the efforts of the many individuals, notably Susan Entz, president of the Friends of Ronald McDonald House; Chris Chun, executive director of the Friends of Ronald McDonald House; and Kitty Dudley, one of the original founders.

"The countless charitable organizations and the legion of volunteers who have contributed so much time and energy to the realization of their dream, and to convey our best wishes to Ronald McDonald House for a highly successful

program in the future, providing the much needed tender, loving care for children and their families at a time of stress and adversity."

The women rose to be recognized and were presented the Senate Certificate by Senator A. Kobayashi.

Senator Menor introduced Brian Clark, an outstanding student-athlete at Mililani High School, who was present on the Senate floor, as follows:

"Madam President, it really is an honor and privilege for me to be able to make a very special introduction this morning of an outstanding, young individual who, by his accomplishments in sports, has not only rewritten the record books in Hawaii State basketball, but also has carved for himself a place in Hawaii State basketball history.

"As many of you know, Brian Clark was literally a one-man scoring machine for the Mililani High School varsity basketball team. Because of that, he's really accomplished a tremendous amount in the area of high school basketball.

"For example, in the 1987 basketball season, Brian set a state scoring record for a single season of 434 points, the highest state single season scoring average of 28.9 points per game. For great basketball athletes like Senator Matsuura, he could confirm the fact that it's very tough to score on a game-by-game basis, 28.9 points a game. What makes his record even more remarkable is the fact that he sustained this throughout his entire varsity career. He holds the highest state career scoring average of 24.6 points per game and the overall total state high school career scoring record of 1,093 points.

"For his accomplishments, he has been selected by the Honolulu Advertiser and Star Bulletin as the Oahu Interscholastic Association (OIA), Western Division, Player of the Year, for the past two years. He has also been named to the newspapers' OIA Western Division All-Star Team for the past three years and to the All-State Basketball Team for the past two years.

"But, Brian's recognition goes beyond the State of Hawaii because he also was named the recipient of the Naysmith High School Basketball Player of the Year Award for the State of Hawaii, and this award is annually presented to the top high school player in each state of the United States. He has also been selected to the 1987 McDonald's All-American Basketball Team, which is comprised of 1,200 of America's finest basketball players.

"In addition, he maintains a 3.7 grade point average, renders community service as an Eagle Scout in the Boy Scouts of America and, in fact, he has been offered scholarships to a number of prominent universities such as, Yale, Stanford, Michigan State, University of Pennsylvania and Utah State."

Senator Menor also introduced Mr. James Albano, coach of the Mililani High School basketball team, who accompanied Brian.

The gentlemen rose to be recognized and were presented the Senate Certificate by Senator Menor and leis by Senators Ikeda and McMurdo.

Senator McMurdo introduced Ms. Jo DeMarets, Ms. Bobbie Lanceford-Naole, Ms. Chris Hugie, Ms. Diane Slurr, Mr. Phillip Norris and Mr. Tommy Broucek, who were present on the Senate floor, as follows:

"Madam Vice President, it's my great pleasure to honor some people who have done a great deal for the Children's Advocacy Center. There are any number of people who have helped, but there are two groups, in particular, that I would like to mention.

"Some are social workers from the Women's Correctional Facility and the other group is from the Rotary Club of Honolulu. I'm going to very quickly read the Senate Certificates, if you don't mind.

"In recognition of the volunteer efforts of the female inmates of the Women's Correctional Facility for undertaking a craft fair to raise funds for Hawaii's Children's Advocacy Center. It is particularly poignant that the women at the facility would wish to assist the sexually-abused children of our community, since many of them have been victims of abuse as children.

"Under the supervision of social worker, Jo DeMarets, and the leadership of Bobbie Lanceford-Naole, Chris Hugie and Diane Slurr, the women worked hard to get craft materials donated and learned new skills such as, sewing, knitting, ceramics and jewelry making in order to put on this craft fair.

"Through their efforts, they raised more than \$1,000 to assist the center and this money is being used for a child witness room in the Circuit Court building where children who are waiting to testify in criminal cases can have a pleasant and supportive environment which will, hopefully, decrease their anxiety.

"We feel it is particularly appropriate that women who are paying their debt to society for breaking the law and who

have themselves been victims are now turning their efforts to assisting these children.

"We applaud the women of OCCC and are pleased to have the community recognize the positive contributions they are making to our society."

"The second Senate Certificate is to members of the Rotary Club of Honolulu for working to make the Honolulu Children's Advocacy Center a reality.

"Wishing to become involved in a major project under past president, Phillip Norris, a committee, chaired by Tommy Broucek, has been meeting regularly to help all aspects of planning a center.

"Rotary member, Father David Kennedy, was instrumental in securing the second floor of a preschool owned by St. Andrews Priory to house the center. Rotary member, Rob Hale, president of Architects Hawaii, has been working with volunteer Rotary engineers and contractors on renovation plans to make this the best equipped and most pleasant program in the country for interviewing sexually-abused children.

"The Rotary members have been very generous with their time and money. They donated furnishings and after making an initial commitment of \$24,000, they are now working on a plan to raise additional funds and provide services needed for the renovations.

"The Legislature wishes to recognize the Rotary Club of Honolulu for entering into a partnership with Hawaii's Judiciary on behalf of our sexually-abused children. This is an excellent example of how segments of our community can join together to work for a common goal. It's only with their active support that the center is moving so quickly toward becoming a reality."

The honorees rose to be recognized and were presented the Senate Certificate by Senator McMurdo and leis by Senators Hee, Menor, Henderson, Fernandes Salling and Ikeda.

Thursday, April 9, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:48 o'clock a.m., with the President in the Chair.

Ana Recreation Department where he makes his living while he does his volunteer work with Little League baseball.

"Mr. Cy Livotti has been a Little League umpire for the past 28 years. He became the Western Region chief umpire in 1980 and has traveled to Canada, Guam, and Japan to conduct umpire clinics. He first came to Hawaii to conduct umpire clinics in 1978 and has been here the last five successive years, bringing Mike Wright to assist him.

"Mr. Bob Kawamoto, the chief administrator of the Hawaii State Little League, is a resident of Kaneohe who retired from his civil engineer position with the Board of Water Supply two years. He is now a full time volunteer for Little League baseball."

Messrs. Livotti, Wright, and Kawamoto who were sitting in the gallery rose to be recognized.

Senator Solomon then introduced a group of students from Kohala High School building and construction class, accompanied by Mr. Rodney Park. The students placed first in the Hawaii District competitions in building and construction.

FIFTIETH DAY

Friday, April 10, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:46 o'clock a.m., with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Father Gary Secor of St. John the Apostle and Evangelist Catholic Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Ninth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Mizuguchi introduced and welcomed 30 SLEP students from Aiea High School and their teachers: Mrs. Elvira Menor, aunt of Senator Ron Menor, Mrs. Flora Abe, and Mrs. Dalisay Galura.

Senator Aki introduced Kupuna Catherine Maunakea and Mr. George Edward Richardson, who were present on the Senate floor, as follows:

"Mr. President, members of the Senate, ladies and gentlemen, in this the 'Year of the Hawaiian,' I am pleased and honored to introduce two very special people of Hawaii who have enriched our lives and the State of Hawaii.

"First of all, I would like to introduce Kupuna Catherine Maunakea. Kupuna Maunakea's accomplishments during her long and active life would fill a book, and that book would be a history of Nanakuli and the Waianae Coast.

"Kupuna Maunakea's way of working is uniquely Hawaiian. It is filled with aloha, with forgiveness and with humbleness. Kupuna Maunakea, her husband and two of her five children moved to Nanakuli Hawaiian Homestead in 1931 on Haleakala Avenue, where she still lives today.

"Let me briefly list just a few of her activities over the years. She was a member of the University of Hawaii Extension Home Mothers Club. She was the first woman president of the Nanaikapono Elementary School PTA. She was a founding member of the Nanakuli Hawaiian Civic Club, a member of the Waianae Hawaiian Civic Club, a leader of the Girl Scouts Troop 88, organizer of the 4-H Club and the Teenage Canteen in Waianae. She organized the City and County Summer Fun program in Nanakuli, and is president of the Herbert K. Pililaau American Legion Auxiliary. She also helped Malia Solomon start the Ulumau Village at Ala Moana Park. She was a

seamstress and a volunteer worker for Aloha Week, and the list is just endless. I could continue, but I think this gives you an idea of Kupuna Maunakea's broad range of community concerns and activities.

"Over the years, she has always been willing to share her knowledge and skills. She has given numerous demonstrations, workshops and classes in Hawaiian quilting, holoku designing, Hawaiian medicinal herbs, haku lei making, limu preparations, Hawaiian salt making, Hawaiian language, and other 'namea Hawaii.'

"In recent years, Kupuna Maunakea has begun to put her knowledge into books. Last year, she published 'Lauhala Preparation and Simple Weaving.' For many years, she has written poetry and has composed more than 50 songs. She is now putting together her poetry and songs into a new book which, hopefully, will be published soon.

"Kupuna Maunakea's life is one that has enriched the lives of thousands of people. Her life will continue to serve as a model and as an inspiration for others in the future.

"Kupuna Maunakea, I want to thank you personally for all that you have given our community over the years, and I know my appreciation is shared by the Waianae Community and the members of this august body.

"The second person I would like to introduce is George Edward Richardson.

"I've heard many stories about this colorful and outspoken man — stories about the old days when Waipahu, Ewa and Waianae were still plantation towns, how he rode very impressively on his horse to all the Leeward Coastline farms, and as a grand marshal during our Kamehameha Day parades; also stories about his athletic abilities in baseball and other sports.

"George Richardson stands tall as a model for all the people of Hawaii. George Richardson learned at an early age the value of hard work and perseverance to succeed in life. He has been retired since 1960 and enjoys coming to the Legislature, especially on opening day. I might add that he was really excited about coming here today, also.

"George's community involvement began in 1924 and continues to this day. He remains an active member in many Hawaiian organizations. It is through these organizations George has touched and helped many Hawaiians and non-Hawaiians to make a better life for themselves.

"His outspoken remarks and vigilant

perseverance at many community meetings have left a lasting impression in the minds and ears of so many of us.

"I consider myself fortunate to know this fine man, and today I feel greatly honored to introduce him to this honorable body."

The honorees rose to be recognized and were presented the Senate Certificate by Senator Aki and leis by Senators Aki, Young and Ikeda.

Senator Hee delivered his congratulations and best wishes to Kupuna Catherine Maunakea and Mr. George Richardson in Hawaiian.

Senator Aki also introduced Kaye Stang, daughter of Kupuna Maunakea who was present on the Senate floor, and Mr. Richardson's sister, Anita Stibbard and her son, George Stibbard, his son and daughter-in-law, Pat and Pinky Richardson, and his granddaughters, Uluwehi Pena and Kaala Pat Jay, who were seated in the gallery.

Senator McMurdo introduced Auntie Aggie Cope, Ms. Myrtle Mokiao and Ms. Bella Oklinario, friends from Waianae.

Senator Kuroda introduced 45 students from Manana Elementary School in Pearl City, who were at the Legislature to observe the celebration of Father Damien's birthday and to meet the kupunas. They were accompanied by their teachers, Mrs. Jessie Yoda and Mrs. Charlotte Muraoka.

Senator Kuroda also introduced Mr. Tony Curtis, an actor-artist, who was present on the Senate floor, as follows:

"Some of you have read the article in the Honolulu Advertiser, Wednesday, April 8, about this actor-artist by the name of Tony Curtis, a beautiful man, not just handsome but beautiful.

"In that article, there is this description of the word that is used, 'shibui.' He used the word 'shibui.' In Japanese it means stringent, like the taste after biting into a half-ripe persimmon. To us in Hawaii, of course, a half-ripe mango, or in art circles, the fleeting moment of perfection, or in a more familiar island activity, the thrill of perfection as in balancing on a breaking, moving wave.

"Mr. President, when Mr. Tony Curtis and his guests were honored in the House of Representatives, they read a resolution and I would like to share our Senate Certificate with all those who are here to observe us honor Mr. Tony Curtis. It says:

'Senate Certificate to Tony Curtis, Artist and Actor.

'The name Tony Curtis conjures in our minds, heart and soul, the very epitome of MANHOOD; handsome, dashing debonair, captivating eyes, and the lean physique -- the envy of this physical fitness generation.' (Mr. Curtis, I want you to know we have a sex symbol. That's Senator Scotchy Henderson. He's planning to retire after this session, but he is our sex symbol.)

'Tony Curtis is known for his 150 major motion pictures spanning over 40 years. He is also an actor of great versatility, in complete command of his role, "and his riveting ability to capture in flickering lights upon the screen, the complete persona of every role he undertakes."' (We also have an actor here in the Senate. That's Senator Steve Cobb. He is a great "kabuki" actor, always trying to fool the other members of the Legislature.)

'Unknown to many is a Tony Curtis that has been sketching, painting, printing, and creating other works of art. Along with his more popular movie screen productions. The same inquisitive, perceptive and creative mind, heart and soul have been able to recapture on canvas, Mr. Curtis' visible memories of his adventures around the world.' (We too have artists on my left, the beautiful Senator Lehua Fernandes Salling, our pianist; our vice president, Senator Patsy Young, a poet. One other artist is Senator Yamasaki. He is the chairman of our Ways and Means Committee and he skillfully carves the budget.)

'The glamour of Hollywood stardom has left an indelible mark in his long and enduring profession. The least known of his many talents and yet most self-fulfilling is his zeal, dedication and excitement as an artist. To satisfy his interest and driving energies, he is spending considerable time in his studio in California and Hawaii. He has a long love affair with the God-given natural beauty of these islands.' (That reminds us of Senator Malama Solomon who's not here today, but she is one who continues to protect the environment which you cherish as you put on canvas.) 'He finds the natural brilliant colors, the blending of the rainbow of races provide an inspirational, spiritual and invigorating scenario for his expression through various art media that adds pleasure, excitement and aesthetic experiences in the lives of many people throughout the world.

'Along with two other Hollywood luminaries, Anthony Quinn and Red Skelton, Tony Curtis has drawn national attention to the high level of professional artists working and living in our island

community.' (In this Senate, we also have an Anthony Quinn. That's Senator Norman Mizuguchi. I happen to be the comic, Red Skelton.) 'In this peaceful serenity of sun-kissed beaches and swaying palms, Hawaii is a haven for art connoisseurs. The contribution of Tony Curtis lends credibility and high profile to the Culture and Arts of Hawaii.' (Before I read the final paragraph, I would like you to meet our Abraham Lincoln. That's Senator Clayton Hee.)

'On this occasion of the World Premiere Exhibition of his work at the Center Art Galleries in Hawaii, the State Senate congratulates and expresses best wishes to Tony Curtis in the 40 year collection of "his masterful drawings, paintings, and mysterious enigmatic assemblages."'

Accompanying Mr. Curtis was his son, Nicholas Curtis; Mr. Bill Mett, president of Center Art Galleries, Royal Hawaiian Center; Mr. Mike Patrick, marketing director of Center Art Galleries; and Miss Lynn Cooke, public relations coordinator of Center Art Galleries.

The group rose to be recognized and Mr. Curtis was presented the Senate Certificate by Senator Kuroda and leis by Senator Fernandes Salling, A. Kobayashi, George, McMurdo and Blair.

Senator Young introduced Jayleen Willis, Karen Runyan-Cole, Lisa Talaro, Carrie Nakasone, Randi-Ann Rodrigues and Angela Tackett, student observers from Ilima Intermediate School in Ewa Beach, who were accompanied by Mrs. Bontag and Mrs. Beamer, chaperones.

Senator Aki also introduced Mr. Henry Nakasobe, a good friend from Waianae.

At 12:09 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

Senator Hee then remarked:

"I realize that when the Journal is printed, there are times when the Journal Clerk will merely say that Senator Kuroda introduced Tony Curtis in our Journal. On motion by Senator Menor, seconded by Senator Hee and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1327, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO YOUTH CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Wednesday, April 15, 1987.

At 11:46 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:48 o'clock a.m.

Senator Yamasaki, for the Committee on Ways and Means, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1147) recommending that Senate Resolution No. 23, as amended in S.D. 1, be adopted.

Senator Yamasaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.R. No. 23, S.D. 1, be adopted, seconded by Senator Mizuguchi.

Senator Reed rose to speak against the adoption of the resolution and S.C.R. No. 18 as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I rise to speak against the adoption of this resolution with reluctance.

"I have always been deeply offended by any form of racism; I'm totally anti-apartheid. If divestment would work, I'd be championing the cause and speaking in favor of divestment wherever possible, but it is not working. It is having exactly the opposite effect. As made clear in a recent MacNeil-Lehrer segment updating the impact of divestment, it is leaving Blacks in that country with less power and therefore exacerbating the problem.

"The American companies divesting sell to executives in South African who support apartheid, thus making the situation entirely worse. So, with reluctance I'll vote against this resolution. In our attempt to show our support for those who are exploited and oppressed in South Africa, it increasingly appears that we may be unknowingly and unwittingly hurting the very people we want to help."

Senator Henderson also spoke against the adoption of the resolutions and said:

"Madam Vice President, I too oppose the adoption of these resolutions.

"Obviously, what will happen is that the American companies will divest themselves and they are divesting themselves. I don't think that because of the action as being taken by pension funds and university foundation monies and things like that is damaging the effort to have equality and democracy in corporate South Africa.

"What happens is that, take for example, General Motors — they have sold their South African operations to the management. The management is supportive of apartheid. They are not following the Sullivan Rule anymore.

"The same has happened with Kodak and IBM. GMAC's financial unit has just turned their operation over to their South African partner. So these actions really are detrimental to what we all want to see happen in South Africa.

"These are bad resolutions. It's bad policy. It's bad for a fiduciary to be forced to sell things which might be good for the long term interest of these companies, so I urge you to vote 'no' on these resolutions. It's bad policy. Thank you."

Senator Cobb spoke in support of the resolutions and remarked:

"Madam Vice President, I rise to speak in favor of these resolutions. In doing so, I am cognizant of the problems raised by the previous speakers, but I'm also extremely cognizant of the present administration policy. It's not working. It has not speeded up the end of apartheid, led it to its demise, led to its lessening. If anything, the oppression that exists today in South Africa is far greater than it was five years ago.

"Recently, the South African Government promulgated a new law that says that individuals cannot even demonstrate on behalf of those who are incarcerated as political prisoners. That is not a step forward, it is a gigantic step backwards.

"I would personally have reservations about the adoption of these resolutions had the Blacks, themselves, in South Africa not joined in support of divestment. It is precisely because those who are most oppressed, including Bishop Desmond Tutu, who have openly called for continuing divestment, recognizing that both constructive engagement and the intent of long-range application of the Sullivan principles have not worked to alleviate the detriments of apartheid.

"In that policy effort, if there had been a lessening of the evil effects of apartheid, I don't think these resolutions would be before us nor would they be before the University of Hawaii or a variety of other

organizations throughout the United States of America and other nations. But it is precisely because those who have suffered the brunt of oppression of apartheid, namely, the Blacks, and including one of the most distinguished spokesman, Bishop Desmond Tutu, who have called for further actions, including divestiture, that these resolutions are before us today.

"Accordingly, I would recommend the adoption of the resolutions even though I'm cognizant of the problems cited. Thank you."

Senator Hee also spoke to support the resolutions and said:

"Madam Vice President, as the author of the resolutions, I rise to speak in favor without any reservations whatsoever.

"Let me summarize by saying that this state, in and of itself, has gone through massive discrimination. We lived through a period when racism was rampant in Hawaii. I'm not sure if anyone here had they entered the University of South Africa could have gotten in. Certainly, those who would be characterized as non-whites.

"To say that this resolution defeats the purpose is to say then that the Congress through their resolutions and their actions have been anti-productive; is to say that the universities across the nation who have divested are being anti-productive.

"Perhaps what should be done are stiffer sanctions by the United States. To isolate the white regime away from the rest of the world, certainly, the democratic countries, and I urge the Senate members to adopt this without reservation. Thank you."

Senator Henderson then added:

"Madam Vice President, I'd just like to bring up one other point.

"I think when we heard testimony in the Ways and Means Committee on these resolutions, there was testimony from the leader of the largest Black nation in Africa, the Zulus, asking and pleading that we not adopt divesting legislation or resolutions. The leader of the largest Black nation in South Africa was opposed to this resolution and felt it was detrimental to the people that he is elected by the Zulu nation to represent, so I urge a 'no' vote."

Senator Yamasaki spoke in support of the resolutions and said:

"Madam Vice President, I rise to speak in favor of the resolutions.

"As the committee report indicates, the South African Government has been

discriminatory and their actions have proven that they will not provide the kind of human rights that all the people of the world seek.

"The Retirement System director also testified that, should we divest, the state will be losing approximately \$14 million in securities that they now hold in South African related companies.

"However, I believe that there are other opportunities for the state to invest because the State Retirement System has been making quite a bit of earnings through investments that they now hold. And I believe that investment in American institutions, American companies, would be much better for the benefit of American workers so that jobs for American workers can be provided through investment by the State Retirement System.

"Therefore, I urge members of this body to consider these resolutions as providing jobs for American workers. Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi also supported the resolutions as follows:

"Madam Vice President, for the record, testimony at our hearing also stated that the Zulu nation is virtually the only Black organization in South Africa that has taken the stand against divestment. Virtually all other Black organizations within South Africa and outside of South Africa have taken the divestment alternative. Thank you."

"Madam Vice President, last week Friday, an article appeared in the Hawaii Tribune Herald announcing Chris Hemmeter's plan to expand the proposed hotel resort development for Waikaloa.

"Madam Vice President, although I was not a part of the leadership who was privy to the presentation, I still in fact represent this area.

"I feel compelled to admit it is premature to say I am in favor or not in favor of the expansion. However, for the record, I am concerned as to the impact in terms of cost to the taxpayer in providing dollars to offset the impact of this project on surrounding public utilities and public services.

"In conclusion, Madam Vice President, it would behoove the county to work with the

developer to come up with a cost benefit analysis in terms of infrastructure needs, housing, schools, hospital, manpower needs, fire protection and so on.

"I feel that when a development of this magnitude is being considered, it is incumbent on leadership to be able to provide and meet the needs of the present community and the impact that that project would cause the surrounding communities so that we can meet the health, education, and public safety needs of the community.

"I needed to say that, Madam Vice President, because up to now I have not been able to do so. Thank you very much."

Senator Aki also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Madam Vice President, I would be remiss if I let this day pass without personally expressing my congratulations to Maryann Navarrete, the 1987 State Spelling Bee champion. Maryann, is an 8th grader from Nanakuli Intermediate School.

"I would like to extend our congratulations to Maryann and want her to know that all of us here in Hawaii also extend our best wishes to her in the Spelling Bee finals next month.

"Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi, chairman of the Committee on Conference of the Senate Committee on Health, then requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing on the bills listed on the agenda of said Conference Committee's hearing notice for Tuesday, April 14, 1987, and the Chair granted the waiver.

Senator J. Wong rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Madam Vice President, in Sunday's Advertiser, our good friend Jerry Burris wrote an editorial entitled, 'Planning amid the fusses.' 'For a place that puts so much emphasis on planning,' Jerry writes, 'Hawaii sees a remarkable amount of basic land use decision-making conducted in an atmosphere of crises.'"

"On behalf of my good friend and colleague from the 18th Senatorial District, I would like to point out an example of moment-to-moment politics, and as Jerry cites Coconut Island, Kaiser, Kakaako and Keehi Lagoon, today, the Senator from the 18th Senatorial District and myself would like to add three more — 14.4 acres of the Kapalama Military Reservation in Kalihi, Oahu; 13.34 acres of land at Makahuina Lighthouse near Poipu on Kauai; and 10.6 acres at Hawea Point near Kapalua on Maui. The Federal Government is putting these parcels on the auction block.

"I have checked on the sale of the aforementioned properties, Madam Vice President, based on the obvious fact that there is a dearth of prime rate property in Hawaii available for public use. It is unfortunate that the citizens of Hawaii and their state government do not learn of the availability of excess federal property until the U.S. General Services Administration declares it surplus. Furthermore, the State of Hawaii, at the present moment, has no right of first refusal on these surplus lands which, incidentally, include other valuable sites — Bellows Airfield and other beachfronts on all major islands, as an example.

"The all too cumbersome and time consuming process by which land is declared surplus puts the state in a severely disadvantaged position. To my understanding, when land is no longer needed by a branch of the military service, it is declared excess land. It is then offered to other military services for their use. If the other military services have no use for the property, it is referred to appropriate committees of the United States Congress. If it is declared surplus land by Congress, it

is then transferred to GSA for administrative disposition. GSA would then offer the surplus land to other federal agencies for possible use. If other federal agencies make no claim to the surplus land, it is then offered to the general public for sale. This entire process may take three to four years to complete.

"Madam Vice President, I might note that all federal land interests are vested in the U.S. Government, rather than in its individual agencies. Accordingly, no Defense Department component owns or leases any real estate; rather, each branch of the military service is assigned control over specific parcels as required.

"Madam Vice President, the State of Hawaii lacks basic rudimentary information concerning federal and military control over land in Hawaii. Such a lack of information is detrimental to the ability of the Legislature to make valid and informed decisions concerning the possible acquisition and use of public and private lands in Hawaii. At a minimal, there is a need to obtain answers to basic questions relating to land use in order to provide the context and framework for effective and efficient civilian planning here in Hawaii.

"The state stands to lose substantially should federal property, for example, Kapalama, Honolulu, be sold to private enterprise. If you would kindly notice on the handout I have prepared (and distributed) for you and my colleagues, this centrally located parcel could serve as an important facet for such future plans as a major rapid transit commuter terminal to link Windward motorists with the Honolulu transit system because Kalihi Street comes right into Likelike Highway, and Kalihi Street also can be extended through the military reservation in Kapalama, support facilities and additional space located near yacht berthing sites for the America's Cup proposal. (We just took a tour of that site on Friday.)

"Another example of what this property could be used for is to mitigate traffic congestion in the Sand Island area by merely extending Mokauea Street or Kalihi Street to Sand Island Access Road. And another proposal, perhaps in the future, could be a freight distribution center because the property is located in close proximity to Sand Island.

"I'd like to digress a little bit because we do have Senate Bill 1778 which relates to cargo distribution planning. It's in the Senate. I digress because I just want to make a point about why this piece of property is so important.

"It is estimated that 285,000 containers enter Hawaii annually. Currently, upon

reaching Honolulu Harbor and Sand Island, each container is pulled by tractors to various destinations scattered throughout our city and opened. By transporting them to break bulk facilities, these containers add to traffic congestion upon our highways sidestreets, constitute a needless consumption of energy, and substantially delay delivery of goods to their final destination.

"Centralizing the opening of containers and the distribution of cargo at, for example, the Federal Government's Kapalama property would result in reduction of total travel time on goods, mitigation of traffic congestion on public streets and highways, decreased energy and fuel consumption, more efficient use of existing facilities due to the fact that a central transportation facility requires less storage space for steamship operations. In general, Madam Vice President, centralized facilities would render a more efficient delivery system than currently exists. If Kapalama were sold it would preempt this option.

"As you can see, there is a myriad of planning potential surrounding the federally-owned properties and putting the land on the auction block severely hampers the state's efforts to provide the quality of life that is desirable for our people.

"Several years ago, the Reagan administration decided to sell federal land to pay down our national debt. Real estate in Hawaii is much more valuable than real estate in many of the other 49 states. There is a question of fairness and equity as it relates to our responsibility of mitigating our national debt. But that is not the subject of this discourse today.

"The scarcity of land for both civilian and federal military needs is well documented. Admiral Hays, Commander-in-Chief of the U.S. Pacific Command, stated in a letter to me, dated April 2nd, that the requirements for military land development have continued to increase, constituting the need for additional leased land. The reasons for the increased demand cited by Admiral Hays include the need for greater military housing development, training areas, and changes in military mission requirements.

"Doesn't it make better sense and logic, Madam Vice President, that the State of Hawaii and the Federal Government and the military get together to make better use of our scarce land, perhaps embarking on land exchanges that will accommodate each other's needs.

"In summary, Madam Vice President, I have written our Congressional Delegation urging them to prohibit the sale of the first-rate property and to provide the state with the first right of refusal with regards

to federal property in Hawaii. A Senate resolution is also forthcoming which will address these concerns and proposals raised today, and I ask your support and the support of the rest of my colleagues to save what really belongs to the people of Hawaii.

"Lastly, Madam Vice President, I thank you for allowing me to make this political fuss for what I feel is an important concern.

"Thank you."

RECONSIDERATION OF ACTION TAKEN

Senate Bill No. 774, S.D. 1, H.D. 1:

Senator Solomon moved that the Senate reconsider its action taken on April 9, 1987 to disagree to the amendments proposed by the House on S.B. No. 774, S.D. 1, seconded by Senator Blair and carried.

Senator Solomon then moved that the Senate agree to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 774, S.D. 1, and

that S.B. No. 774, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Blair.

Senator Solomon then spoke in support of the motion and remarked:

"Mr. President, we found that the House amendments were reasonable and agree with the intent of the legislation."

The motion was put by the chair and carried and the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 774, S.D. 1, and S.B. No. 774, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII," was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Thursday, April 16, 1987.

At this time, Senator Aki, chairman of the Committee on Housing, Hawaiian Programs and Natural Resources, requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing on S.R. No. 186 and S.C.R. No. 173, and the President granted the waiver.

Senator Cobb, chairman of the Committee on Conference of the Senate Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, then requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing on the bills listed on the agenda of said Conference Committee's hearing notice for April 15, 1987, and the President granted the waiver.

Senator Matsuura rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege in regard to the newspaper article in this morning's Honolulu Advertiser about our sergeant-at-arms, Ben Villaflor. I want to congratulate Ben for the beautifully written article about him. Mr. President, you made a very wise choice in 1979 in giving Ben the job as Senate sergeant-at-arms which was the beginning of his dream. I know that all of the Senators here concur with your decision.

"I'm sure that if Senator Tony Chang were to challenge the former junior lightweight champion to go 12 rounds with him that Ben will let Senator Chang win because Ben is such a wonderful and beautiful person.

"Congratulations, Ben, for a wonderfully written article."

The Chair then said, "When you have Senators like Hee and Chang, you have to have a Villaflor to help the President." (Laughter)

Senator Hee also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President and members, yesterday, the first shot was fired as we head into conference.

"This article appeared in the Star Bulletin: 'State stands to lose \$1 million in old traffic tickets,' and the shot was fired by A. Van Horn Diamond, Judiciary public information officer who said, 'The courts asked for more traffic bureau employees from the Legislature, but the Senate,' Mr. President, 'has apparently cut the money from the Judiciary budget.'

"He's right about us cutting money from the budget, but he's not right about the Senate being responsible for the predicament that the Judiciary is in with respect to the traffic violations bureau.

"Mr. President, as I know you would settle for nothing less, we have done some research because of the encouragement on behalf of Mr. Van Diamond and we find that in 1982 there were 79,000 outstanding parking tickets; 1983 - 46,000; 1984 - 29,000; 1985 - 73,000; and as the article said, in 1986 - 106,000.

"What we also know, Mr. President, is that during this time, when Judge Richard Lum was the administrative director of the courts, this was a priority and he made the collection the top priority by implementing a records management computer system to fully automate the court system in the judicial services branch. He also directed four bodies from the traffic violations bureau to implement this automation, as well as a lateral transfer of someone else away in order to cut the backlog. And up until 1985, the backlog had substantially decreased.

"With the new administration, which ousted Judge Lum, they scratched the records management automation only eight months after it started. However, the four bodies that were borrowed from the traffic violations bureau remained with the judicial services branch.

"What we know from the Judiciary budget, Mr. President and members, is that there are enough bodies around in the judiciary branch who could be doing this but who are doing other things, such as, in the civil documents processing division they have nine bodies and according to our budget people, they work the equivalent of a half a day but get paid for a full day.

"And we also know, Mr. President, from our computer printout, if you look at the yellow, those are not the vacancies, but this whole printout is a vacancies of the Judiciary today. Of these vacancies in 1986, 125 exist; in 1985, 15 still exist; 1984 and '83 four exist; and it goes back to 1976, 11 years ago, where there's still a vacancy which exists. Of this list, there are 70 vacancies which are in the District Courts and of the 70, 33 individuals could conceivably be doing the backlog of which

Mr. Van Diamond so eloquently stated when he placed the blame on the Senate.

"We know from the Bible written by Clinton Tanimura, Mr. President, as he stated on page 15 of the audit, 'Reallocations of positions are being improperly used on a regular basis as a means of granting promotion. And for the Judiciary, the responsibility of exercising centralized fiscal controls rest with the office of the administrative director.'

"What we have today in the Judiciary is an administrative director who has not been on for more than eight months and we have a public information director who has been on for less than four months.

"If this is the kind of irresponsible remarks that will represent the Judiciary as we go into conference, then I would hope that tomorrow's paper will give us more fodder to load our cannons with as we move into conference. I think this kind of eloquence on behalf of Van Diamond speaks for the Judiciary and I would encourage him to check the facts before he places blame on the Senate, of all places, Mr. President.

"Thank you."

Senator Cobb then interjected:

"Good morning, Mr. President.

"Since Senator Kuroda is quizzing the senators about a Senate jacket, I would like to join with him in quizzing the senators about a combat T-shirt for conference and will coordinate this with the military shop in Waikiki to get the appropriate attire for all of us in conference since it's very obvious we'll not only need it but it will distinguish the Senate from the House when the going gets tough. Thank you."

At this time, Senator Holt, chairman of the Committee on Tourism and Recreation, requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing for the resolutions listed on the agenda of the Senate Tourism and Recreation Committee's hearing notice for Wednesday, April 15, 1987, and the President granted the waiver.

Senator Holt then rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, I would like to apprise you and the rest of the members of the Senate on the status of our negotiations with the House conferees on the subject of a much needed convention center for this state.

"The Committee on Conference has met for the first time this morning with no results. The reason for this, Mr. President, is that the House conferees are not making a serious attempt to negotiate in good

faith. They are, instead, compromising the spirit and intent of the conference deliberations with procedural matters that have no significant bearing on the matter at hand.

"The major issue, as you are aware, Mr. President, is that of site selection. The Senate has agreed that this is legislative responsibility, while the House has chosen to delegate this responsibility to an authority. It is the belief of your conferees, Mr. President, that this issue must be addressed first before all other matters. The House conferees, however, only express a concern over a Senate provision in the bill which allows a supersession of zoning and other requirements which the Senate included at the request of the Honolulu City Council.

"For your information, Mr. President, this provision is similar to the provision the Legislature has adopted in the past in support of the Hawaii Community Development Authority, the Hawaii Housing Authority, hightech parks, deep draft harbors and Aloha Tower.

"This matter, Mr. President, has no bearing on the ultimate question of who picks the site. Instead, I view this as a deliberate attempt by the House to delay any further action on a convention center during this legislative session. Thank you.

Senator Cobb rose on a point of parliamentary privilege and said:

"Mr. President, in support of and extension of the remarks of the previous speaker and your chairman of the Tourism Committee, we find that the House is also using highly dubious procedural arguments to thwart the deliberations of a conference committee.

"We had an example of this yesterday on a bill relating to real estate where the House, although they acknowledged that the bill had a hearing, stated that some of the substance of the Senate position did not have a hearing. Mr. President, that makes negotiations in conference virtually impossible because we have no such rule in the Senate and having helped write the House Rules, while a member of the House, I'm sure they have no such rule, either. This, however, is a procedural device that's being employed apparently by more than one House chairman; hence, the remarks of the previous speaker allude to.

"In view of that, Mr. President, I think it's appropriate to point out that all of the House budget provisions that are contained in Senate draft 1 of the budget have not had a public hearing and, therefore, according to the logic of the House, however exotic that logic may be, all those provisions should be excised from the budget because according

to the House interpretation of hearings, those items have not been heard and therefore are not properly before a conference committee even though we put them in, even though it's the negotiating position of the Senate and, in fact, doing the House a big favor because the House was late decking their budget and two weeks late in getting it over.

"More to the point, Mr. President, the three items contained in Senate draft 1 of House Bill 410, relating to the insurance code, absolutely none of those had a hearing because it was the decision of the committee to add those items after the hearing, which is the proper function of any committee. Since the House logic says that we cannot discuss those items in conference, there's no need to meet on the insurance code, either.

"In fact, Mr. President, there are a whole variety of bills where items have been added by both bodies, after the hearing, generally either in response to the hearing or in response to a perceived problem. But now, according to the exotic logic of the House, those matters cannot and should not be discussions of a conference committee.

"I think it's time, Mr. President, we remind the House of Representatives that a conference committee is designed to resolve issues between the bodies. It is not a comfort station. Thank you."

At 12:20 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:24 o'clock p.m.

The Chair, at this time, made the following observation:

"Members of the Senate, before we escalate this confrontation with our colleagues across the hall, I would ask for patience of the members to give the leadership an opportunity to talk with the House about some of the concerns expressed this morning. Hopefully, we can operate in a different kind of atmosphere going into conference, as early as this evening, if possible.

"The Chair would appreciate holding back on the sizes of the shirts (laughter) and knapsacks and combat boots for a while."

Senator Cobb interjected:

"Mr. President, when Fletcher Christian was asked, in his mutinous behavior with Capt. Bligh, whether he would care to enlarge the entry, he replied in the affirmative. And then I think in the spirit of mutual cooperation in conference, I want to take this opportunity to publicly thank

the House for giving us a tremendous advantage with the House position that says, in effect, we cannot discuss a bill in conference if anything has been added on by the Senate after the public hearing.

"It means of course that next year's Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce will be sure to add at least one or more items to every House bill so that the only bills we can then discuss in conference will be Senate bills. But we don't have any such restrictions. So I want to convey my public appreciation to my House counterpart for giving us such a tremendous advantage. Thank you."

Senator Kuroda also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, due to the word escalation, I wish to escalate a matter which has nothing to do with the Senate and the House. I asked for a recess a while ago to ask whether the chairman of the Senate Tourism Committee had announced the public hearing this afternoon at 1:30 with regards to a proposal for a study to establish a Kaneohe Bay Authority.

"I think this is going to be a very important matter and I rise on a point of personal privilege because I believe that there is need to further look into this matter of Coconut Island.

"My research has shown that the buyer, although the good Senator from Kaneohe has mentioned that when this Coconut Island has been purchased, that the new buyer has good intentions and also to let the University of Hawaii continue using the island and, although he said that, my research shows that this particular gentleman is a speculator in Japan in real estate.

"Also, there's some questionable question about his reputation and so I think it is very proper that we continue to look into this matter and this hearing this afternoon should be of importance with regards to establishing an authority to oversee any activity within that particular bay.

"I am also aware that the chairman of the Agriculture Committee has a meeting on Saturday with the University of Hawaii and its proposal to continue using Coconut Island.

"It behooves all of us to keep our finger on the situation with regards to this particular issue. Thank you."

Senator Holt on a point of information

then said:

"Mr. President, on a point of information with regard to the previous speaker's remarks regarding the resolutions we'll be hearing this afternoon, it is not in response to the Coconut Island issue. It's an item that Senator (J.) Wong and myself have been discussing during the course of this session. It's actually because I want to section off portions of Kaneohe Bay just so I can go and fish.

"In reality, it is an item which discussion, I'm sure, will involve Coconut Island. Thank you."

Senator Kuroda then responded:

"Mr. President, I rise to respond to that statement just now. After speaking with the chairman of the Tourism Committee who is holding a public hearing, I went to the introducer of that particular resolution to confirm that this particular resolution, making a study for the establishment of a Kaneohe Bay Authority, would oversee any activity within Kaneohe Bay, and I would like to have the introducer confirm what he said to me."

Senator J. Wong answered:

"Mr. President, yes, it will be. The intent of the resolution is to oversee as much activity as we can in the bay."

The Chair then remarked:

"I've been Senate president for sometime now and that's the longest announcement of a meeting I've ever heard. I hope all of you will attend the hearing that will begin about an hour from now and voice your opinions, one way or another. The Chair will appreciate it."

APPOINTMENT OF CONFEREES

FIFTY-FOURTH DAY

Thursday, April 16, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:47 o'clock a.m., with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Wayne Gau of the Celtic Evangelical Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chang, Henderson, Ikeda and Nakasato who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Third Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Hagino introduced three members on the staff of the Congress of Federated States of Micronesia - Mr. Henry Asugar, chief clerk, Mr. Edgar Isaac, assistant director of administration, and Ms. Dimercy Siales, secretary to the Speaker, who are on a legislative training visit.

Senator Solomon introduced Mariana and Herbert Gotz, visitors from Stuttgart, West Germany, accompanied by her aunt, Heide Paik, who works in the Legislature.

Senator Solomon also introduced Mike Whitaker, a legislative intern from the University of Hawaii, assigned to her office, who was recently elected as one of the ASUH senators at the university.

Senator Menor introduced the Mililani High School Trojan Band and their director, Mr. Ron Hirai, seated in the gallery, as follows:

"Mr. President, it is with a great deal of pride that I introduce to this body the entire Mililani High School Trojan Band.

"I can say, having heard their performances and worked with the band in the past, that the band has and continues to have many talented musicians. Because of their outstanding performances they have received numerous honors, for example, several years ago the band participated in the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade and, also, the Rose Bowl Tournament of Roses Parade. In addition, this summer they are going to participate in the Festival of States Celebration which will be held in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, on July 6, 1987.

"The Trojan Band will be performing at 12:30 this afternoon in the Capitol rotunda."

Senator Hee introduced the Sunset Symphony Orchestra of Clarke County,

Nevada, as follows:

"Mr. President, speaking of bands, the Senate had a band last year composed of Benjamin J. Cayetano, Neil Abercrombie and Buddy Soares, and they're no longer with us. We are so grateful to have the Lt. Governor, via messenger, instruct me, Mr. President, to read the following message. So, for today, at least, our Lt. Governor is with us. I would like to read a message from the Lt. Governor to the Sunset Symphony Orchestra of Clarke County, Nevada.

"Contrary to popular belief, it was not Warren Price whom we heard this morning in Judiciary who brought the band to play for his entrance into the Judiciary Committee in full uniform.

"Lt. Governor Cayetano's message reads:

"It is a pleasure to extend my aloha and welcome to the Sunset Symphony Orchestra of Clarke County, Nevada, on the occasion of their visit to Honolulu, Hawaii. The Sunset Symphony has established for itself an enviable record in recent years for training young people in the fine art of music and sharing its talent with the people of other states and countries.

"As a student orchestra, the Sunset Symphony serves as a model for other schools to emulate both for the quality of its musical performances and for the dedication that its organizers and members put into their work.

"On behalf of the people of Honolulu, I commend the staff and members of the Sunset Symphony for their performance at the Blaisdell Concert Hall. I and many others in Hawaii look forward to following the success of the Sunset Symphony in years ahead."

"Mr. President and members, I would like to introduce Mr. Michael Allard, conductor of the Symphony, and Miss Theresa Rogers, the coordinator."

Mr. Allard, Miss Rogers and members of the Sunset Symphony rose to be recognized. Senator Hee presented the Senate Certificate of recognition to Mr. Ballard.

Senator Hee also introduced his cousin, Sharon Kajiware, and her children, Dale, Diana and Debra, visiting from Diamond Bar, California, her brothers, Garrett and Allan, and his sister, Carey Higa, who were sitting in the gallery. Senator Hee added: "I have not seen my cousin in 25 years. She was my babysitter, Mr. President, and she

came out of nowhere to see if it was really me, and it is."

Senator Holt introduced Mr. Ed Hogan as follows:

"Mr. President, on behalf of the Senate, I'd like to introduce a strong supporter of the Senate's position on the convention center at Ala Wai golf course. The Senate is pleased to recognize and commend Mr. Ed Hogan who is the owner of Pleasant Hawaiian Holidays, Hawaii's largest tour company.

"Having blocked out nearly 3 million room nights in 1987, Pleasant Hawaiian Holidays is the biggest single Hawaii customer of the Sheraton Hotels, Kelly Hotels, Hilton Hawaiian Village and Hyatt Regency Hotel. It is also the biggest customer of United, Hawaiian Air and Delta airlines on their West Coast to Hawaii routes.

"It is my privilege, on behalf of the Hawaii State Senate, to extend our heartiest mahalo to Ed Hogan for his outstanding contributions to Hawaii's biggest industry and recognizes him as 'Mr. Tourism Hawaii.'

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:50 o'clock a.m., with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Chaplain Jim Butt, Lieutenant, Pearl Harbor Naval Station, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The Chair announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Fourth Day.

The following introductions were made to the members of the Senate:

Senator McMurdo introduced the Dr. Frances Delany, Ms. Georgia Miller, Mrs. Martha Black, Ms. Jean Minton and Ms. Loretta Shuler as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I have a singular honor today in introducing to the Senate five individuals who are being presented with certificates of appreciation in recognition for their hard work, enthusiasm, and dedication to their respective communities. Each individual who will stand here today has contributed to the betterment of the quality of life in her community.

"These individuals have voluntarily given of much of their time to researching, organizing, managing, and fighting for issues that are important in the areas. These outstanding community members are recognized for their hard work, their commitment of the people of Hawaii in the betterment of life in the Islands and, individually, I would like to present and ask each in turn to stand and be recognized.

"First, Dr. Frances Delany. This Certificate of Achievement will go to Frances for her hard work, excellent management and leadership skills as chair of the Citizens to Save Ft. DeRussy Group. Dr. Delany spearheaded a grassroots effort to retain Ft. DeRussy as an open space. Several hundred volunteers collected over 37,000 signatures in a petition to place this issue on the November '86 ballot.

"Dr. Delany is an outstanding example as a leader in the Wakiki community. She also serves on the Wakiki Neighborhood Board and on her condo. Since she hasn't really lived here permanently but a few years, I'm sure that we will hear more and more of her leadership. (Will you join me in acknowledging Dr. Delany.)

"Second, we have Georgia Miller, also

from Waikiki. She's the president of the Wakiki Residents Association and has been for more years than she and I are going to tell you. She's secretary of the Waikiki Improvement Association and a member of the active Waikiki Neighborhood Board, as well as the editor of the Waikiki Business and Professional Women's Club newsletter.

"Through her involvement in the community, Georgia has dedicated her time to promoting better health, safety and noise control, crime control, improved planning and zoning measures, and a fight for open space in the Waikiki area. Ms. Miller is commended on her outstanding leadership contributions to both the residents and commercial needs of the Waikiki community. (Will you join me in acknowledging her, please.)

"Martha Black is an active participant in the state Water Code issue of Hawaii. She is also very involved in the community, serving on numerous committees such as, State Legislative Care for the AAUW (American Association of University Women), the steering committee of Common Cause, League of Women Voters, Hawaii Adult Education Advisory Council, Hawaii Art Education Association, Initiative Hawaii, Honolulu Media Council, and not only is she a member of the organizations but she is an active member.

"Martha Black has dedicated many years in efforts to the betterment of the quality of life for all Hawaiians. Most notably is the work she has recently done on the symposium on the Water Code and I believe that if it hadn't been for Martha's efforts the Water Code would not have done as well and moved as far in the Legislature as it has this year.

"In the balcony we also have people who came to see Martha honored — Muriel Seto from Hawaii's Thousand Friends, Susan Miller from the Sierra Club, Bob Black and his daughter Pam Wood, and Judy Givens who is a water attorney from Colorado and is very interested in what Martha has done.

"Jean Minton is another tireless community organizer and has advocated major legislative reform, especially in the line of time sharing and condo laws. She has addressed major problems confronting the Waikiki community, dedicated much of her time as a consumer protection advocate, and the legislation that she has urged and fought for has had a major impact on the citizens of Hawaii.

"Jean has been an inspiration to all who

come into contact with her. She has dedicated much of her efforts and time to the community and is committed to the betterment of all life for all Hawaii residents.

"I would like to add also that all these ladies are probably familiar to you because they spend a lot of time testifying in a lot of public hearings. (May we have a hand for Jean Minton.)

"And lastly, certainly by no means least, we have Loretta Shuler who was a nurse for 49 years and is an activist in the elderly community of Hawaii. She's made a large contribution to this community and has displayed genuine concern and exuberant energy in following issues and representing the senior citizens.

"Loretta has worked extremely hard; has inexhaustible enthusiasm and displays a genuine concern to those she represents. She is an excellent example of a citizen who can make a difference by becoming involved. (May we have a hand for Loretta.)

Senator Cobb added his remarks on the introduction of Ms. Jean Minton as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I'd like to add to the previous remarks because back in 1980-81 time frame when we were first considering time share legislation and the means to protect Waikiki residents without running afoul of the constitution, this lady (Jean Minton) whom we now call 'Ms. Condominium' was there with us all night for five nights in a row as your Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce wrestled with this problem.

"That's part of the reason the committee received the nickname 'the Sominex and samurai set' and she was there to see us every step of the way. And it's an honor for me to be asked to present a lei to her because she was here to be honored by this Senate even before Senator McMurdo was elected. She truly deserves the title 'Ms. Condominium.'

"If anything, Hawaii's condominium residents owe a tremendous debt of gratitude to Jean and her friends, her associates, and the ladies present today. I just want to take this opportunity to honor them and say mahalo. Thank you very much."

Senator Ikeda then introduced Mr. Sam Aranio as follows:

"Madam President, it gives me great pleasure this morning to introduce an outstanding individual and rather than botch it up I would like to read the certificate that will be presented to him.

(The Senate Certificate commends and recognizes Mr. Aranio for "his outstanding contributions to the music education of the past, present and future students of Niu Valley, and for enriching the lives of so many others by teaching his students to give the gift of music.")

"Madam President, this man devoted 24 years of his life to teaching music in the Niu Valley area and is really the driving force behind the excellent bands in that area and the students who have progressed to both the symphony and youth symphony and all other aspects of music.

"It gives me great pleasure to present to this honorable body, Mr. Sam Aranio. With him this afternoon is his lovely wife Doreen who has been an enthusiastic supporter and there at all of the fund raisers (for the bands), and the principal of Niu Valley Intermediate School, Mr. Eric Heu."

Mr. Aranio rose to be recognized, together with his wife Doreen and principal Eric Heu, and was presented the Senate Certificate of recognition by Senator Ikeda and leis by various Senators.

Senator Kuroda, for the Committee on Culture, Arts and Historic Preservation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1175) recommending that Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 66, as amended in S.D. 1, be adopted.

Senator Kuroda then moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1175 be adopted and S.C.R. No. 66, S.D. 1, be adopted, seconded by Senator Hagino.

Senator Kuroda spoke in support of the resolution as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I rise to speak in support of the resolution. Last week, the Senate adopted S.C.R. 17 and the House is acting on H.C.R. 100. The thrust of that resolution is to protect the outer slopes of Diamond Head. As we all know, the Land

Board granted a permit for a tennis complex to be built on the outer slope of Diamond Head and the resolution I just mentioned, which we adopted, proposes to protect the outer slope.

"That same resolution proposes to keep recreation in the inside to be 'passive' and your committee feels that the inside slope should be considered for more active recreation. That's the thrust of S.C.R. 17 and H.C.R. 100.

"The S.C.R. before us, S.C.R. 66, proposes to provide more active recreation. When the Legislature established the Diamond Head Monument State Park in 1976, it stated that it would like to increase public access and enjoyment of the monument, which is Diamond Head. That's what this resolution does because it asks the Legislative Reference Bureau to make a study with regards to a possible golf course in that crater.

"The original resolution asks for the DPED to make a study. DPED suggested that DLNR make a study, and since DLNR, is not too impartial, the committee decided to let the LRB make the study.

"And for the information of those who had expressed some concern, any reference to the Ala Wai Golf Course has been taken out of this resolution. This is in keeping with some thinking on the House side.

"This resolution, as I said, requests a study and if the golf course is built in Diamond Head it will then provide resident golfers another site within city limits. One of the things that this will do, if the golf course is built in Diamond Head, is to provide a better and nicer visual look of Diamond Head.

"I urge all my colleagues to vote for this resolution. Thank you."

Senator George rose to speak against the adoption of the resolution and said:

"Madam Vice President, I'm going to cast a 'no' vote on this resolution; something I rarely do on a resolution that asks for a study. But I think it's important for someone to say that the integrity of the interior of Diamond Head crater has been perceived for many years ... since I was back on the City Council ... as being kept in a natural state.

"Public participation in the recreational opportunities in the crater has been encouraged for a long time. But this has been perceived as walking through the crater, and looking at it. According to the environmentalists, the value of the crater is not to be beautiful, it is to be enjoyed because it is in its natural state, and I don't

think a golf course there would be an improvement of the natural state.

"We are losing the natural state, whatever that is, in a good many places in our Islands to these perceived beautification efforts. This is one of the places where we have gone on record as saying it ought to be kept in its natural state and I think we ought to do it.

"Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi also spoke against the resolution and said:

"Madam Vice President, I rise to speak in opposition and simply to say that I believe that Diamond Head Crater could possibly be used more extensively, but I would prefer a more diversified multiple use of the crater. I believe that the golf course would be a highly specialized use, used by only a few individuals.

"I would urge members to vote 'no' against the resolution."

Senator Cobb also spoke against the resolution and stated:

"Madam Vice President, I'm going to be voting 'no' on the resolution for several reasons.

"One, inside Diamond Head there's very little breeze and I don't think the resolution or the proponents or those who are seeking an additional golf course in the area have fully come to grips with that. Most golf courses that we have in Hawaii are open air and not in craters and provide quite a bit of tradewinds. If anyone's ever spent any amount of time inside Diamond Head Crater at mid-day, it's almost like being inside a wok. It's the next best thing to a pressure cooker. It is extremely hot.

"Secondly, there are a number of military facilities in Diamond Head and yet I don't see anywhere in the resolution that there is to be coordination with the existing National Guard facilities relative to the use or possible encroachment of a golf facility within Diamond Head.

"Third, I would agree with the comments of one of the previous speakers in terms of the development aspect.

"And fourth, I think although the House wants to divorce this from consideration of the Ala Wai golf course, this, in any other utilization of golf courses, would help to alleviate the situation for the Ala Wai golfers, while that golf course is under construction, if that particular measure is adopted.

"For each of these reasons, I think the

resolution ought to be expanded and without those kinds of provisions I would find it difficult to support it. Thank you."

Senator Kuroda then responded:

"Madam Vice President, I rise to rebut some statements made.

"With regards to a statement made that only a few individuals will benefit from a golf course, we need to be reminded that there are fewer individuals who relish this natural state in Diamond Head, and if made into a golf course there will be more than a few people who will be enjoying the use of Diamond Head. Right now, Diamond Head Crater is enjoyed by only those who go into the crater and walk up the trail to the crest. The view is beautiful from the crest. But, as one enters that tunnel, the feeling of disappointment immediately hits that person. I think we should beautify the inside of the crater.

"With regards to the heat, the so-called heat in Diamond Head, I think that we'd like to have the person who mentioned the heat in Diamond Head to go to Aliamanu Crater. Aliamanu Crater is enclosed. Within that crater are 3,000 residents, military residents, and I've gone into that crater and it's enclosed and it's not as hot as one would think it would be. Nor would Diamond Head be so hot as to have golfers suffer.

"With regards to the matter of imposing on the military community, the National Guard is a tenant, just as the FAA is a tenant of the State of Hawaii within Diamond Head.

"And for the information of the previous speaker, the proposed golf course would be built around existing facilities. Thank you."

Senator Cobb then responded:

"Madam Vice President, since my remarks were taken into account on rebuttal, I have to point out in response, Aliamanu Crater which is primarily in military housing has one of the highest rates of air-conditioning use in the entire State of Hawaii. It is precisely because of the heat contained inside of there that so many units have air-conditioning, far above what the normal average is for Hawaii.

"Secondly, in terms of tenants, it's true that both the National Guard and the FAA are tenants. Yet, if this resolution is adopted and they would be thrown out as tenants, there's going to be a relocation cost. There's going to be a decrease in military preparedness. There's going to be an impact on federal aviation operations. I think each of those things need to be taken into account in the study; yet, nowhere do I see any of those items addressed in the

resolution.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.C.R. No. 66, S.D. 1, entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING A STUDY OF THE EXISTING AND PLANNED USES OF LEAHI INTENDED TO ENHANCE CULTURAL AND RECREATIONAL ENJOYMENT BY THE PEOPLE, INCLUDING AN EVALUATION OF THE FEASIBILITY OF INCREASING PUBLIC USE AND ACCESS BY DEVELOPING A GOLF FACILITY WITHIN THE CRATER," was adopted on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

RE-REFERRAL OF SENATE RESOLUTION

The Chair re-referred S.R. No. 106, jointly to the Committee on Human Services and the Committee on Education.

Senator Aki, chairman of the Committee on Conference of the Senate Committee on Housing, Hawaiian Programs and Natural Resources, requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing on S.B. No. 242, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, and the Chair granted the waiver.

Senator Hee rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Madam Vice President, this morning the daily newspaper was kind enough to give the Judiciary on both houses an ample spread, although the cartoon certainly doesn't befit me. I would like at this time to respond to some of the remarks to set the record straight as we move into the budget proceedings.

"First of all, let me commend the Advertiser for bringing this to the public's attention. The timing is without question the appropriate although perhaps this should have been done earlier. Rather than refute some of the remarks, let me respond to some which stretch the imagination of truth.

"The editors initially started by saying: 'Equivalent legislation originally introduced in the Senate was referred to as many as five committees. That was an obvious kiss of death, since time was bound to be too short for each of the panels to take its turn holding the necessary hearings.'

"I must commend the Advertiser for knowing that in detail. But on the follow-up to that, there were many House bills which may have had as many as five referrals, and let me recite them: House Bill 903, House Bill 904, House Bill 909, House Bill 918, House Bill 919, House Bill 920, House Bill 921, House Bill 922.

"For the record, each of those House bills moved out of the Senate. They were either agreed upon by the House or we stand ready to go to conference. There seems to be quite a lot of this editorial designed around Senate Bill 767, the administrative director of the courts.

"As you know, members, on March 20, 1986, the Report of the Citizens' Panel on Judicial Administration in the State of Hawaii concluded its reports of which recommendations were made. There were not any legislators as a member of this body. They were: David L. Fairbanks, former president of the Bar Association, Mrs. Dorothy Lum, Mr. Herbert Cornuelle, Judge Masato Doi, Judge Daniel G. Healy, and Dean Jerome Harrison, special counsel to the panel and Dean of the University of Hawaii Law School.

"Suffice to say, in these recommendations was a report of consultants to Hawaii, The Commission of Judicial Administration, The Institute of Judicial Administration, One Washington Square Village, New York, N.Y. It was the consultants of the Institute of Judicial Administration which made the recommendation to this panel, to wit, and I will read: 'Immediate action. Appoint a former judge from either the Supreme Court, Intermediate Court of Appeals or the Circuit Court as the administrative director of the courts.' That was the consultants' recommendation. That was the recommendation adopted by the panel. It's from that recommendation that Senate Bill 767 was born. It is from this independent panel that Senate Bill 767 is now in conference.

"And for the record, that bill was changed because when we had a hearing on the bill, the Hawaii Bar Association asked that the Senate Judiciary Committee consider amending the panel's recommendation to the degree that we also include administrators who may have comparable experience and allow for other people with comparable experience to apply for this important job. The House did not agree; they went strictly by the independent consultant.

"Any attempt to characterize Senate Bill 767 as a legislative attack on the Judiciary is irresponsible because the consultant's report speaks for itself.

"Let the record speak for the Judiciary with its own words that the administrative director of the courts is a line officer position. It is comparable to a department head in a line position in the executive. It is not comparable to an executive administrator, under the governor, who serves as coordinator.

"The administrative director of the courts is the heart and soul of the Judiciary, inasmuch as the chief justice has chosen not to speak for it. This position is an exempt position. No recruitment was conducted on this position. The current incumbent was appointed by the CJ, effective 9/1/86. Prior to that, the current incumbent was the CJ's law clerk, and prior to that, the

current incumbent graduated from the University of Hawaii Law School, and prior to that, the current incumbent was a newspaper reporter.

"Let me for the record state, when we look at the budget which will be conferred on, the difference between the House position and the Senate position is less than one percent for FY '88. The difference between the House position and the Senate position for FY '89 is little larger than 1.5 percent. What we're speaking about is a 51 million dollar budget, which when the House did their deliberations through lump-sum appropriations and the Senate did their deliberations through line-item appropriations, we came out with \$600,000, or one percent for '88 and a difference of a little over \$1 million or a little greater than one and one half percent. Any characterization by the newspaper to state or imply that such close proximity on two widely different ways of doing the budget may not be in fact accurate.

"There is no one here more committed to rebuilding the institution, but to rebuild that institution will take, obviously, a lot of work. There's no one here who believes more strongly than I that part of rebuilding that institution requires several changes and we have, for the record, looked at all aspects of the Judiciary.

"We know, for example, that part-time judges, per diem judges, are serving one out of three district court cases. What is a per diem judge? A per diem judge is an attorney. A per diem judge is handpicked by the chief justice of this state. A per diem judge does not, I repeat, does not, go through a Judicial Selection Commission proceeding. However, we know that some per diem judges have chosen to apply for district court judges and have been turned down. The selection commission turned them down, and they continue to serve as a handpicked member of the chief justice of the Judiciary. We know that the longest judge serving in the district court today is a per diem judge who has served for 24 years. This state is 28 years old. An attorney has been serving as a judge for 24 of the 28 years that this state has been a state. While I make no bones about trying to characterize any person as incompetent, I do question that if this person is so great and is so good, why isn't he a judge?

"To rebuild the Judiciary means to either ask these questions, or in the eyes of others, turn your back on these questions. We choose to do the former.

"We will be having a conference on the Judiciary, my understanding is this evening. I hope the reporters are there. And I look forward, quite frankly, to defending the Senate's position because it is a sound

position, Madam Vice President. We will give the bar yet another opportunity and anyone else who chooses to come forward, as the editorial asks, to defend the Judiciary on Wednesday when we will take up every resolution referred to the committee. That is yet another opportunity. Perhaps at that time others may feel differently, beginning with our daily newspaper.

"Thank you."

Senator Kuroda, chairman of the

Committee on Culture, Arts and Historic Preservation, requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing on H.C.R. No. 5, H.D. 1, and the Chair granted the waiver.

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:42 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator George and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Tuesday, April 21, 1987.

FIFTY-SIXTH DAY

Tuesday, April 21, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:41 o'clock a.m., with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Chaplain Johnnie D. Ward, Captain, Hickam Air Force Base, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Ikeda and Nakasato who were excused.

The Chair announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Fifth Day.

Senator Mizuguchi introduced a group of 100 fourth and fifth grade students from Pearl Ridge Elementary School in Aiea and their teachers, Mrs. Betty Inobe, Mrs. Judith Kurimoto and Mrs. Elaine Toguchi.

Senator George introduced the six women from Kailua United Methodist Church, on a tour of the Capitol and observing the session of the Senate.

Senator Cobb introduced Lt. General William H. Schneider, Deputy Commander-in-Chief, United States Army Pacific Command, seated on the Senate floor, as follows:

"Madam Vice President, on behalf of all members of the Senate, I'd like to make a special introduction today and then present a certificate to a man who has been with us now for some time.

"General William H. Schneider has been Deputy Commander-in-Chief and Chief of Staff, United States Pacific Command, since June 1984, after having commanded the 25th Infantry Division since August 1982, and has been nominated by President Reagan to become Commanding General, Fifth United States Army, Ft. Sam Houston, Texas.

"General Schneider has been a dedicated community citizen deeply involved in civic activities, serving as vice chairman of the Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii and was a liaison of the Armed Services Committee and Military Affairs Council of the chamber, and an official to the Hawaii Military Week '87 Committee; member on the executive committee of the Aloha Council of the Boy Scouts of American and the Hawaii Advisory Committee for the Girl Scouts of America; and a member of the Pearl Harbor Rotary Club.

"On behalf of the Senate, I would like to express our appreciation to Lt. General

William H. Schneider for his many contributions to the military and civilian community in Hawaii, and bid him warmest aloha and best wishes as he leaves to assume his new duties.

"Ladies and gentlemen, I'd like to ask General Schneider to please stand and be recognized. We also have accompanying the general the better half of the Army family, Mrs. Barbara Schneider."

General and Mrs. Schneider rose to be recognized and were presented the Senate Certificate and leis.

Senator McMurdo added her remarks as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I also would like to acknowledge the splendid contributions of General Schneider to the community-at-large by his encouragement of better relations between members of the Armed Forces serving here in Hawaii and our civilian populace. He unselfishly devoted countless hours to volunteer activities which have brought members of Hawaii's military and civilian communities working together to improve the quality of life in our state.

"I know that Bill and Barbara are going to be missed by the many friends they've made in the five years they've been stationed in Hawaii. I wish them aloha and bon voyage!"

Senator Kuroda also added his remarks as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I also would like to rise to say a few words of welcome to General Schneider.

"I had the pleasure of knowing General Schneider when he was Colonel Schneider and commanded the Field Artillery in Schofield. He left Hawaii when he was promoted to brigadier general. He came back to Hawaii as a two-star general when he took over the command of the 25th Infantry Division, and I recall the day he and I both stood on Senator Hagino's Wilson Bridge in Wahiawa, along with the other public officials, and because it took so long for that bridge to be built, we both were so pleased when it was completed.

"It was my pleasure, at that time, to learn that he was going to get his third star and then assigned to be the Deputy CINCPAC at Camp Smith. And as Senator Cobb mentioned, he may add a fourth star in the future as he becomes Commanding General of the Fifth Army in Ft. Sam Houston,

Texas.

"And let us all recall that we were successful in convincing Washington to add the fourth star to the position at Ft. Shafter which is now the Western Command, and perhaps one day we may again see General Schneider return to Hawaii, perhaps in the fourth star position at Ft. Shafter. Who knows what the future holds for General Schneider in other activities to come.

"Thank you."

Senator Cobb then interjected:

"Madam Vice President, to elaborate a little on some of the previous remarks, although a corps command is a three-star command it is one of the most treasured commands in the entire United States Army. There are only six Army Corps and for any officer to be selected to command a corps is indeed a very unique honor and privilege and, having command at that level, it obviously puts the man who commands such a unit very much in the running for a fourth star and I would echo Senator Kuroda's comments about hoping to see General Schneider back here as the USARPAC commander some day.

"In addition, I might add that Senator Kuroda failed to mention that General Schneider is a pretty mean golfer, as well."

Senator J. Wong also added his remarks as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I would be remiss not saying a few good words on behalf of the general. I've been chairman of the Military Committee for a short time and I just want to express my gratitude to the general.

"During the short time that I have been chairman, the deep and warm and sincere relationship that has developed surely magnifies his temperament and personality and I hope that he returns to Hawaii soon."

Senator Matsuura then said:

"Madam Vice President, I also want to make a few comments. I walked in late and I didn't realize that General Schneider was leaving Hawaii. I am wondering, maybe, if we should consider introducing another resolution. Give him the fourth star and ask Congress to keep him in Hawaii. Thank you very much."

Senator Kuroda introduced Senator John Coolahan of the Maryland Legislature and his wife, who were sitting in the gallery, and said, "They are here visiting their son who is a lieutenant in the Air Force. Senator Coolahan is a colleague of our former Senator John Leopold. Senator Leopold is now serving his second term as a senator in

the State of Maryland, and he is known for what he was known here in Hawaii, going house-to-house, knocking on doors, which is a rarity on the Mainland."

Senator Chang then introduced the Miss Chinatown Hawaii Beauty Pageant queen and her court, who were seated on the Senate floor, and members of the Honolulu Chinese Jaycees as follows:

"Madam Vice President, to celebrate the Year of the Rabbit, the Honolulu Chinese Jaycees have once again selected five young Chinese women as outstanding representatives of their community and heritage, as part of the annual Miss Chinatown Hawaii Beauty Pageant.

"Miss Chinatown Hawaii and her court symbolize the beauty and dignity of Chinese traditions in Hawaii, the dynamic talents of their peers, and the revitalized energies of the Chinatown community.

"May I at this time present Miss Chinatown Hawaii and her court: Miss Chinatown, Christine Lai Shan Fong; First Princess, Lisa Lei-Lan Wong; Third Princess Kimberlee Shui Nin Chun-Ming; and Fourth Princess, Tracy Maile Lin Hung Chung. Also with us is Dr. Philip Chang, president of the Honolulu Chinese Jaycees.

All of the young ladies and Dr. Chang rose to be recognized and were presented the Senate Certificate and leis.

Senator Chang also introduced Calvin Hsia and Bretton Au who were sitting in the gallery to accompany the pageant queen and her court, and Mr. Stephen Kau "who has already been designated a Chinese Living Treasure although he is yet of tender years."

Senator McMurdo then introduced Mrs. Yukiko Elaine Takata of Moiliili Community Center, seated on the Senate floor, as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I have a certificates which I would like to present today to Mrs. Yukiko Elaine Takata, better known as Yuki. I think it's very rare when you find someone who has devoted so much of her life to one community center.

"Yuki Takata, as executive secretary for Moiliili Community Center, has dedicated 39 years of her life as a loyal, conscientious employee as well as a dependable and supportive friend. Yuki has been a significant part of the Center, which provides our community with numerous services, classes and programs.

"Yuki's spirit and dedication exemplifies tremendous pride in one's employment and quality of life, and her exceptional contribution to the Moiliili Community

Center and the community-at-large will be endearingly remembered throughout the years to come.

"On behalf of the Senate, I would like to express our deep appreciation and admiration to Mrs. Yukiko Elaine Takata.

"Thank you."

The honoree rose to be recognized and was presented the Senate Certificate by Senator McMurdo and a lei by Senator Menor.

Senator McMurdo also introduced Mr. Ken Takata, husband of the honoree, and Nancy Marker, Nora Furuno and Edith Wilhelm of Moiliili Community Center.

Senator McMurdo also introduced Miss Emily Willing, seated on the Senate floor, as follows:

"Emily Willing has been a volunteer coordinator and chair of the Advisory Board for Operation Network, organized by Chaminade University, Moiliili Community Center and the city's Park and Recreation Department, is a community service program which represents the best of human endeavor, striving for the betterment of our society through development of our youth.

"Miss Willing with conviction and determination has conquered the challenges of her diverse role as a community volunteer, single parent, a fully employed woman in the workforce.

"With great privilege and appreciation, on behalf of the Senate, Miss Emily Willing is recognized for her invaluable contributions to our community."

The honoree rose to be recognized and was presented the Senate Certificate by Senator McMurdo and lei by Senator Blair.

Senator McMurdo also introduced Mr. Neil Yamashiro of the McCully Community Center, seated in the gallery with the ladies from the Moiliili Community Center.

Senator Fernandes Salling introduced Mr. Danny Kaleikini as follows:

"Madam Vice President, it's my privilege today to honor a man who really needs no introduction, who's sitting here on the chamber floor, one of Hawaii's own and one of our best. Before asking him to stand to be recognized by this body, I should like to read some of his accomplishments which I might add is quite impressive.

"Danny Kaleikini is the paramount Hawaiian entertainer, having risen from humble beginnings to his present enviable position as headliner at the prestigious

Kahala Hilton Hotel. Danny has demonstrated not only a God-given talent, but has nurtured that talent through perseverance and hard work, and shared that talent to help develop many of Hawaii's young entertainers.

"He not only gives wholeheartedly of himself on stage, but also devotes his time and talent to the various charitable organizations throughout the State, including the Danny Kaleikini Foundation, founded by Mr. Kelikini for which he serves as president; and through his numerous contributions to Hawaiian Civic Organizations, he was awarded the distinction of 'Outstanding Hawaiian of the Year' in 1971 by the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs.

"In recognition of his many contributions of time and talent to the Variety Club, he was recently asked to include his handprints in cement at the King's Village Celebrity Circle.

"Danny's personality and genuine aloha not only touches the hearts of the people of Hawaii, but also throughout the world, affording him the opportunity to be the first foreigner invited to perform at the Thirteenth Annual Hiroshima 'Peace Music Festival' in July of 1986; and his participation in the Tokyo International Song Festival earned him the first place trophy for best song and best entertainer.

"Among his many activities, he is also an avid golfer and sportsman, official greeter for the Hawaiian Open since 1972, sponsors a softball team and plans to paddle as part of a nine-man team in the Molokai to Oahu outrigger canoe race in celebration of the Year of the Hawaiian this year.

"Besides his many charitable and sports activities Danny Kaleikini has been invited to sit on numerous corporate boards in the State of Hawaii, being the first Hawaiian to be asked to serve on several of these corporate boards.

"On behalf of the Senate, I would like to extend fondest aloha and congratulations to Danny Kaleikini for his contributions to the entertainment industry, the community, and to the State of Hawaii, as he celebrates his twentieth year with the Kahala Hilton Hotel."

Senator Solomon added her remarks as follows:

"Madam Vice President, to echo the previous speaker's remarks, I too would like to congratulate Danny Kaleikini for this honor. I do this, Madam Vice President, with a warm feeling of aloha because the Beamer-Solomon family and Danny Kaleikini go way back, especially in the field of

entertainment.

"My sister and I used to dance on Danny Kaleikini's luau shows and this is how we worked our way through college. So, Danny, whenever I hear 'Milolii' or 'Hene hene Kouaka', I think of you. So, aloha and mahalo. Thank you, Madam Vice President."

Senator Matsuura then said:

"Madam Vice President, I don't know if people in the audience and fellow colleagues know that two classmates of Danny's class of 1955 at Roosevelt High School are right on the floor -- Senator Ann Kobayashi and former Narcissus Queen, Jade Sen.

"I just wanted to inform the crowd here that there are a lot of stars in that class of 1955. Congratulations, Danny! You're really the best. Thank you."

Senator A. Kobayashi added:

"Madam Vice President, I would just like to add that we also have another classmate here -- Alan Ling who is also a staff member.

"Danny, our entire class is really proud of you and your many accomplishments. Thank you."

Senator Chang added his remarks as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I would be remiss if I did not share a few words with the boy from Papakolea, representing that area in my district.

"First, I'll preface Senator Holt's remarks by warning you that he will challenge you, on behalf of the Senate canoe paddling club, to a race in the Molokai Channel.

"Senator Matsuura has already stolen my thunder with the mention of the famous or infamous class of 1955, but I do want to note that Danny has been designated Hawaii's first Ambassador of Aloha by the former Governor Ariyoshi and has performed all over the world, and in this regard has developed a language facility that we could well use. Danny, next time we need Japanese translation, please assist Senator Kuroda. Thank you."

Senator R. Wong added his congratulatory remarks to Danny Kaleikini as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I'd like to say a few words about Danny. When I first met Danny, I was working in a Waikiki nightclub called the Korean Village. That must have been in 1957, if Danny can remember that far back.

"I used to sit around the Market Place and

people used to talk about this young Hawaiian boy from Papakolea who blew a nose flute, and to be quite honest with you, I didn't know what a nose flute was. I thought you played the flute with your lips. It was a very unique experience and the discussion in the Market Place went something like this: 'Oh, the guy Kaleikini, yeah, he's okay but he nevah goin make eet.'

"I am proud to say, Madam Vice President, that we all know of Danny's success and it came after a lot of difficult work. We know that he spent many, many years at his home down in a place called Kahala, I think, and he's been there for quite a long, long time.

"I've known a few musicians in my time and there is one quality Danny has I'd like to share with you that I think all of you can understand why and it is that when Danny performs, he performs with a great amount of aloha and you kind of get involved.

"But I think much more important is what his peers think about him. And if there is one good and wonderful thing about this wonderful person, it is that I have yet to find a musician in this town who said that Danny Kaleikini 'talks stink' about anybody. I think that to me in entertainment, after all is said, is certainly an accomplishment. Danny, aloha, we love you."

Senator Holt also congratulated Danny Kaleikini as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I would be remiss if I did not make a few comments.

"Late last night Senator Fernandes Salling informed me that Danny was going to be here and asked me if I could say a few words. And the first thing that came to mind was, first thing this morning I was going to make some phone calls to some of his friends and ask them if they had anything nice to say about Danny Kaleikini. Well, I'm still waiting for them to call me back. (Laughter.)

"Senator (Ann) Kobayashi talked about the class of '55. We're still proud of you; I was only in preschool. (Laughter.)

"People have forgotten, on a serious note, how long ago it was when Danny started at the Kahala Hilton. At that time Hawaiian music, genuine Hawaiian music, was falling really out of sync with what was happening in the entertainment field. Hawaiian music was at its lowest ebb. It took someone like Danny with the courage and dedication to try and bring Hawaiian music back, and he ventured over to Kahala Hilton and as we can see today, 20 years later, he's been very successful in preserving Hawaiian music.

"Not only has he done a lot for Hawaii in

the field of music, he's done a lot for the community, participating in lots of charitable events. And I only have one request, Madam Vice President, at this time, if you could please appoint him to be a conferee on Senate Bill 1192. He is, and with all due respect to the people from Moiliili and McCully, he is a strong supporter of the Senate's position on a convention center at Ala Wai.

"Mahalo, Danny, for coming down. Thank you very much."

Senator J. Wong also added his remarks and said:

"Thank you, Madam Vice President. I'd also like to express some of the sentiments of the previous speakers, but would like to express one particular characteristic of Danny and that's his perseverance.

"I always remember a story about Danny. When he first got started he went to the bank to get a loan for I don't know what it was — a guitar or some musical instrument — and he was turned down. But perseverance is the key in his life and the fact that he has achieved the great excellence that he has in the business and entertainment industry.

"I'd like to express my aloha and mahalo to you, Danny, and especially your perseverance on the golf course because I remember playing with him, Madam Vice President, and he was the guy that carried me through the golf course throughout the game. Thank you, mahalo!"

Senator Aki then said:

"Madam Vice President, I just wanted to also express the love and aloha that we have for Danny Kaleikini, especially those of us who live on the Leeward side of the Island, along the Waianae Coast.

"I would like to say that Danny has never forgotten his roots. He has a lot of 'ohana' and family and friends all over the Islands and in the Leeward Coast, and Danny has returned quite regularly to our community to help in our Veterans Day parades and all the special events.

"Danny, thank you very much for all the kokua and support you have given us. Thank you very much. Mahalo."

The honoree, accompanied by his wife Jackie and brother John, rose to be recognized and was presented the Senate Certificate by Senator Fernandes Salling. Senator Solomon presented him with a lei and Senator Holt a lei to Mrs. Kaleikini.

At 12:13 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

"The nomination has been submitted to the secretariat of the World Heritage Committee in Paris, France, for consideration through a process that would leave the inscription of this historical site to the World Heritage List this fall. There are currently 247 sites around the world on this list.

"The reason I bring this to the Senate's attention is that we did pass a resolution in 1984 that the Pu'uhonua be included on the list.

"Part of the study conducted to the nomination of the Pu'uhonua O Honaunau National Historic Park reads as follows:

'This area, formerly known as the City of Refuge National Park, includes sacred grounds where vanquished Hawaiian warriors, non-combatants and kapu breakers were granted refuge for secular authority.

'The park bears a unique or exceptional testimony to a civilization which has disappeared, an outstanding example of a type of building of architectural ensemble which illustrates a significant state in history and is directly or associated with "idees oubliées" of outstanding universal significance.'

"The park superintendent, Mr. Jerry Shimoda, has expressed his gratitude and appreciation to my fellow colleagues in supporting the resolution that he believes helped get our park on the list.

"Madam Vice President, I'm very pleased with this and would like to recommend that maybe our Senate Judiciary Committee chairman should activate the Pu'u honua O Honaunau for purposes in response to the article that appeared in the Advertiser.

"Thank you very much."

Senator Hee responded:

"Madam Vice President, must be my cue. If the Pu'u honua was activated, I'd be one of the first recipients to take refuge, no doubt."

Senator Holt, chairman of the Committee on Tourism and Recreation, then requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing on Gov. Msg. No. 264, and the Chair granted the waiver.

FIFTY-SEVENTH DAY

Wednesday, April 22, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:47 o'clock a.m., with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Chaplain (Lt. Col.) Kenneth L. Alexander of Fort Shafter, Office of the Chaplain, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Sixth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Chang introduced Mr. Robert G. Reed III, representing Hawaiian Independent Refinery, Inc., who was present on the Senate floor, as follows:

"Mr. President, it is my pleasure to recognize a unique corporate contributor to our state and to the entire Pacific. Hawaiian Independent Refinery, Inc. (HIRI) is celebrating its 15th anniversary and the following accomplishments.

"It is a major supplier of energy to Hawaii consumers, the U.S. military, and the Pacific. Its vast Hawaii-produced oil stockpiles provide a hedge against international energy crises. As an international citizen, HIRI spreads Hawaii's dynamic business potential throughout the Pacific, and as a responsible corporate citizen, HIRI generates 1,260 jobs in the state, gives generously to the PRI Foundation and spearheads water conservancy technology for crude oil refining.

"As a wholly-owned subsidiary of Pacific Resources, Inc., HIRI stands as an example of Hawaii's ability to lead in the international economic market, and offers expanding opportunities in science and technology for all of Hawaii's future.

"Accepting the Senate Certificate on behalf of HIRI is Mr. Robert G. Reed III, chairman of the board of Pacific Resources, Inc."

Mr. Reed rose to be recognized and was presented the Senate Certificate by Senator Chang.

Senator Chang also introduced Ms. Andrea Simpson, vice president of communications at Pacific Resources, Inc., and Ms. Susan Kusunoki, supervisor of governmental activities at Pacific Resources, Inc., who accompanied Mr. Reed and were sitting in the gallery.

Senator J. Wong introduced Mr. Bill McRae, engineering manager at Rockwell International, Southern Regional Office, Huntsville, Alabama, and Mr. Bud Brux, systems engineer at Rockwell International in Long Beach, California, and said:

"Mr. President, this afternoon we'll be having an informational briefing on a new concept called the 'SYNCHTRANS' in mass transportation. With us today is the inventor of the system, Mr. Bill McRae, and his good friend and colleague, Mr. Bud Brux. They'll be here to brief us on 'SYNCHTRANS.'"

Senator J. Wong also introduced Lance Tominaga, a journalist student at the University of Hawaii, assigned to the Legislature to observe the duties and responsibilities of a legislator.

Senator Cobb, at this time, added his remarks on the introduction of Mr. Robert Reed as follows:

"Mr. President, it's always a pleasure to welcome visiting dignitaries, especially so today when I'm pleased to look at my boss. I wanted to ask for a conflict ruling before I elaborated on what I'd like to say in addition that more than just the economic development aspect of Hawaiian Independent Refinery and over and above acquisition of Shell Oil stations here.

"I think the members of the Senate should be made aware of just how much of a contribution Pacific Resources, Inc. makes in terms of energy independence or a lessening of our dependence on Arab oil not only in the refining process, not only in heat pumps, not only in solar panels, but in a variety of other ways. The steps are very important. Some are large, some are small, but it's a very significant contribution that's being made to lessen wherever possible our dependence in foreign sources of fuel.

"I think, Mr. President, that is extremely good for America and I just wanted to take this opportunity to publicly say mahalo to Mr. Reed. I don't have an opportunity to do that very often. Thank you."

At 11:55 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

FIFTY-EIGHTH DAY

Thursday, April 23, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:54 o'clock a.m., with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend David Schiewek of the Hawaii Church for the Deaf, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Fernandes Salling, Holt and R. Wong who were excused.

The Chair announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Seventh Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Kuroda introduced a group of students from Leeward Oahu as follows:

"Madam Vice President, there are 30 students at the Capitol today, 15 of them are in the House, representing Campbell and Nanakuli High Schools, and 15 are in the Senate, representing Pearl City, Waipahu, and Waianae High Schools. The students are here under the sponsorship of Senate Vice President Young, Senators Aki, Menor, Mizuguchi and myself.

"Accompanying the students are Mr. Stan Tsukamoto from Waipahu High School, Mrs. Linda Tanaka from Waianae High School, and Miss Joanne Abe from the Leeward District Office."

Senator Kuroda also introduced Robert Nelson who is with Belt Collins & Associates and "who has an interest in the proposed Diamond Head golf course."

Senator Kuroda also introduced Captain (Ret.) George Roberts, seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Madam Vice President, this morning we have the honor of recognizing someone who has served our country and the State of Hawaii for many, many years. He is Capt. George Roberts, United States Army, Retired, who is the director of the Hawaii District, United States Customs Service.

"As you are all aware, customs activities are very important to the United States and especially to this entry state of Hawaii. Capt. Roberts has been very helpful to residents and as well as non-residents as they come through United States Customs Service.

"Capt. Roberts is a young 79-year-old. The mandatory retirement age for federal

workers used to be 70. He is one of those who challenged that and the United States Government then recognized that there are individuals who are good workers beyond the statutory mandated age and he is one of those who has proven and continues to prove that one can really provide services to government and the people, regardless of age.

"Capt. Roberts is also recognized as the commanding officer of the MP Company in which one 'Billy Club' Wong served in the period around 1959. 'Billy Club' Wong got his name because as a National Guard MP (military policeman) he worked and served with the military personnel and worked the streets of Hotel Street. The active military personnel hesitated to take action on certain individuals and along came Richard 'Billy Club' Wong, Senate President Wong, who used his billy club to get the sailors in order. And here's the commander who knows our 'Billy Club' Wong, Senate President.

"At this time, I would like to introduce Captain George Roberts." (Capt. Roberts rose to be recognized.)

Senator Chang introduced a group of seven exchange students from the Hiroshima YMCA in Japan, accompanied by Mrs. Sakae Fujii, coordinator, and said: "They were here for eight months and will be returning to Japan next month. They have been participating in the YMCA International Business School program."

Senator Ikeda then introduce Reid Mizuguchi, the 1987 ILH Baseball Player of the Year, as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I have a very special introduction to make this morning. Most of you know about my very short career as a softball player with the House of Representatives team. Well, I want to announce that I am officially retired now, but I still take a great interest in the game, as well as in baseball, especially when teams like Kaiser are in the forefront. However, today my introduction is for a competitor.

"Today, we are honoring someone who has achieved a very special place in Hawaii high school sports. He is the 1987 ILH Baseball Player of the Year — Reid Mizuguchi.

"Reid has proved to be an anomaly in this age of sports specialization. In the midst of designated hitters and pinch-hitters and pinch-runners, he shines not only as a consistent and effective pitcher, winning five of six games in the regular season, but

also is an outstanding batter with 37 hits in 21 games and a batting average of .529.

"Reid is remarkable as a batter. He hit safely in all of Punahou's regular season games. His coach, Pal Aldridge, commented that he had never seen a more dominating hitter in the league. He said, and I quote, 'It's hard to find a guy who can really light up this league. He just dominated the offensive game.' Eric Texidor, St. Louis' baseball coach agreed, although from the point of view of an opponent. He said, 'He tore us up in all three games. We don't know how to pitch to him.'

"What makes Reid so distinctive as a ballplayer is that he has also excelled as a pitcher. He pitched a no-hitter during the regular season against Hawaii Baptist, and just yesterday led his team to victory in the first round of the state tournament.

"At this time, it gives me great pleasure to introduce to this honorable body the ILH Baseball Player of the Year, Reid Mizuguchi. With Reid, this morning, is his mother, Harriet Mizuguchi. And coincidentally, his father happens to be here also, State Senator Norman Mizuguchi."

The honoree, who was present on the Senate floor, and his parents rose to be recognized and were presented the Senate Certificate of recognition by Senator Ikeda and leis by various Senators.

Senator Mizuguchi then acknowledged the introduction and said:

"Madam Vice President, I just want to thank Senator Ikeda for bringing my family to the State Senate. It's been a while since I've seen them. Thank you very much, Senator Ikeda."

At 12:09 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

Senator Solomon rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"At this time, Madam Vice President, I'd like to thank the Hawaii Tribune Herald for giving credit to Representative Andy Levin for saving the irradiation plant facilities for the papaya industry.

"As you well know, Madam Vice President, this is a very controversial issue on the Big Island and being that I was not on that particular committee, I would like to thank the Senate, Senator Chang as well as Senator Matsuura and of course Senator Yamasaki, for their participation in working and trying to work out a reasonable solution in trying to help save our papaya industry in the Big Island and throughout the State of Hawaii.

"It just irritates me when I read this kind of articles in the newspaper, giving credit to Representative Andy Levin whom we all know, Madam Vice President, killed the bill for the irradiation facility. Although the Representative says in the article that he is still opposed to irradiation he feels more comfortable with the compromise position that was reached.

"Thank you, Madam Vice President."

Senator Matsuura also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Madam Vice President, I also would like to make a comment on the irradiation facility.

"As all of us know, in the proviso it requires an EIS, an environmental impact statement. I know of no other state or the Federal Government requiring an EIS. If we in the Senate totally agree to doing an EIS first, prior to the construction of that facility, I just want to put in the record, the Journal, that as sure as I am standing here this afternoon, the EIS will trigger the very thing that I have been always cautious about and that is a contested case, because an EIS will require a public hearing and from there you'll have a contested case, Chapter 91, and this irradiation facility would become in limbo again for at least one year.

"So, I just want to put in the Journal that this EIS has been put in the proviso as a delay tactic. Now I'm thinking like a lawyer — the lawyer that wants to stop the project. I just want the record to note that I am predicting this to happen, even if the EIS shows a totally negative impact.

"Thank you, Madam Vice President."

RECONSIDERATION OF ACTION TAKEN

Senate Bill No. 1325, S.D. 1, H.D. 1:

Senator Aki moved that the Senate reconsider its action taken on Thursday, April 9, 1987, on S.B. No. 1325, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, seconded by Senator Blair.

Senator Aki explained:

"Madam Vice President, the House measure has removed unnecessary language. They set an effective date to the repeal of this measure."

The motion to reconsider the action was put by the Chair and carried.

On motion by Senator Aki, seconded by Senator Blair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 1325, S.D. 1, and that S.B. No. 1325, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LANDS," was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Friday, April 24, 1987.

Senator Cobb then rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Madam Vice President, I had intended to be at a press conference this morning called by my colleague, Senator Mary Jane McMurdo, but an Army physical at Tripler held me up, and while many of us who have been donating blood involuntarily here in conference committee, I'm doing the same thing with the United States Army. In this case, almost a pint's worth at Tripler, and I was unable to join Senator McMurdo at the press conference but I would like to add my remarks to hers in that conference very briefly, if I may.

"I am happy to join my colleague, Senator McMurdo, in sharing this important and timely information about pending Congressional action relating to Fort DeRussy.

"The detailed report of the House Armed Services Committee, which drew upon the hearings conducted here in the recent past, makes it clear that in the view of the committee, and in the view of Senator McMurdo and myself also, that the powerful Appropriations Committee include from the U.S. Congress their statement that there is no surplus land at Fort DeRussy.

"The reasons are easily stated: The needs of the United States military forces, which by law and tradition include all active duty components, the reserves and the retired, more than fully utilize the Fort DeRussy area. Moreover, there is a continuing need for a military recreational area in the Pacific, and in recognition of the fact that the military personnel can be posted to distant locations for long periods, and thus need and deserve such a recreational area

for gathering with families and friends when time and duty permit.

"I observe also that the committee report deals with conflicting legislation of the past, establishing that, for once and for all, Fort DeRussy is an essential Department of Defense element.

"This is good news, for it will enable the Army to get on with upgrading and improving Fort DeRussy with planned landscaping, building maintenance, and force structure enhancements. You and my colleagues may be certain that the Army will continue to be a good host for the thousands who utilize the area, be they military or civilians, all enjoying this open and green space in Waikiki.

"I might also add for the record that I have received communication to the effect that Congressman Ronald Dellums who is the chairman of the Subcommittee on Facilities has corresponded with the Army asking why they have not proceeded ahead with planned improvements and further construction that's already in the pipeline and has been in the pipeline for a number of years. And we expect such further improvements to begin based on the inquiry of the House Subcommittee chairman of the United States Congress.

"Thank you."

At this time, Senator Chang, on behalf of the chairman of the Committee on Transportation, requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing on H.C.R. No. 60 and any other House concurrent resolutions as may be referred to the committee this afternoon, and the Chair granted the waiver.

At 1:02 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 1:04 o'clock p.m.

Senator Hee, chairman of the Committee on Conference of the Senate Committee on Judiciary, requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing on S.B. No. 787, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, S.B. No. 769, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, and S.B. No. 255, H.D. 1, of said Conference Committee's hearing notice for Thursday, April 23, 1987, and the Chair granted the waiver.

Senator McMurdo also rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Madam Vice President, Senator Cobb mentioned the press conference that I had this morning which was about the just released HASC report, which was based on the hearings they had here in December and what their findings and conclusions were. I

think it's important for the City of Honolulu and the State of Hawaii to realize that the committee is adamant about seeing the property at Fort DeRussy remain in open space for the use of not only the Armed Services, but for the general populace. Also, the report recommends the Army continue its beautification of DeRussy. They have designated DeRussy as the primary Pacific Armed Services Recreation Center. This is the only one in the entire Pacific area.

"The wording which they put in the Defense Authorization bill referring to no-sale of Fort DeRussy and designating it as the primary Pacific Armed Services Recreation Center was upheld by the entire

House Armed Services Committee, unanimously, and will go to the floor of the House approximately the first week in May.

"One more thing, for anyone who would like to see the full report, I have copies in the office. I have distributed some to committees who are interested in the DeRussy matter and if anybody else wants to see it, you're welcome to it. Thank you."

FIFTY-NINTH DAY

Friday, April 24, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:46 o'clock a.m., with the President in the Chair.

Senator J. Wong introduced Mr. Leonard Peters, a good friend and neighbor, who is an active participant in community affairs.

Senator Menor introduced his aunt, Lolita Mabini, from Waialua.

Senator Young introduced Anna Pellman, Andrea Wilkerson and Vanda Morris, students at Ilima Intermediate School in Ewa Beach, accompanied by their teacher/advisor, Ms. Debbie Ray, who are at the Legislature observing the legislative process.

Senator Chang also introduced Mr. George Mason, representing "Pacific Business News," who was present on the Senate floor, as follows:

"Mr. President, it is our pleasure to recognize Pacific Business News (PBN) in its 25th year of operation as a unique contributor to the fourth estate and to business dynamics in the State of Hawaii.

"PBN has grown to its current circulation of 13,000 subscribers and produces a major business exposition, 13 annual special editions on topical business matters, and various professional publications. PBN has faithfully reported the tremendous transitions from the Big Five pocket plantation economy to our status as a dynamic Pacific force. We know that PBN will be there every Monday to report on our progress in the years to come.

"Accepting the Senate Certificate on behalf of PBN and its employees is Mr. George Mason."

Mr. Mason rose to be recognized and was presented the Senate Certificate by Senator Chang.

Senator Cobb introduced Mr. George Washington Holeso, who was present on the Senate floor, as follows:

"Mr. President, it's indeed an honor and a privilege to make this introduction today of a man who has done much for our community.

"If you drive up 16th Avenue in Kaimuki, going up to Wilhelmina Rise, you get about two blocks beyond Waialae Avenue and look to your right, you will see a park. Up until a few years ago, that open air park was largely neglected by the city. We all know the problems the city has had with park maintenance. Mr. Holeso got involved and adopted this park. Today, there is a spot of beauty just before you come to the wilderness area by the watershed of Wilhelmina Rise. It's something that all of the residents and especially the neighbors enjoy, and it's for that and a variety of other reasons that we honor Mr. Holeso today.

"I should point out, Mr. President, Mr. Holeso once ran against me when I was running for the House of Representatives, and during the course of the campaign at a public meeting he gave a song and dance that I've yet to see equalled anywhere in the world. It was incredible. One of the people said, 'Okay Cobb, top that.' Mr. President, no way.

"Mr. Holeso spent many years with the Army and is now involved in a variety of community activities from being a scout troop committeeman, scoutmaster, district commissioner and, presently, is a unit commissioner of the Aloha Council.

"He has truly gained the respect, the affection and the gratitude of his fellow citizens for the time and effort he has devoted to the betterment of our community.

"Accompanying Mr. Holeso is his wife, Violet, and guests of his, Mr. Paul J. Lau, who has spent over 65 years with the Boy Scouts of America and is a graduate of McKinley High School, Class of 1922, a junior-senior citizen at age 85, and he is accompanied by my good friend, Ms. Alice Luke, a Chinese-Hawaiian entertainer."

"Mr. President, I am rising to speak in favor of Warren Price, the next attorney general for the State of Hawaii.

"Members, I've never seen, and probably never will see in my lifetime, David Schutter and the prosecutor, Chuck Marsland, agree on anything, so either says that we are doing without question the right thing, or we're doing without question the wrong thing. I suspect, though, that members of the bar of the heavyweights who have all come to testify in support of Warren Price substantiates the Judiciary Committee's recommendation to the Senate that we are doing, indeed, the right thing.

"Warren, through the course of this session, has displayed himself to be very independent, much like the members of the Senate are. That speaks to his credit and

an example is his unwavering stand on the 'Hawaiian right to sue' on which he and I have vastly different positions. But it does, in my opinion, speak to his credit even though with this particular issue I think there's still room to move and we are making every effort.

"Warren Price, without question, will be an attorney general who, unlike others in the past, came from the private sector. Quite frankly, as far as I am concerned, he could take this job or leave it, which to me indicates his desire to serve the public interest.

"We have the potential to confirm an individual who would display leadership, perhaps unlike that which has been displayed in the past, and I wholeheartedly support Warren Price to be the next attorney general and endorse his confirmation."

The Chair then commented on a brief observation:

"I've been around the building for a little while and I happened to just pass the hearing on the confirmation of Mr. Price. It's the first time that I've seen a nominee attend the hearing draped with a red carnation lei. I thought the reason was because people were happy, but I found out later that the reason is that they were giving him credit for even showing up at one of Senator Hee's hearings."

Senator McMurdo also rose to speak in support of the nomination as follows:

"Mr. President, I would like to say that here is someone who came in and immediately was asked to work on a project as overwhelming as America's Cup. He has approached this with enthusiasm, with a positive attitude, with a tremendous amount of energy, with initiative and a great deal of sense. I would like to add my 'aye' to his nomination. Thank you."

Senator Cobb also rose to speak in support of the nomination as follows:

"Mr. President, I would be remiss in not speaking in favor of the nomination. Mr. Ulveling was once upon a time my immediate supervisor, or boss if you will, at Pacific Resources, Inc., and I found him to be tireless not only on the job, but in terms of innovation, looking for new and different ways of doing things.

"I think that's precisely the kind of leadership and the kind of philosophy we need in the Department of Planning and Economic Development, given its diversity. He brings a fresh, new, business-oriented approach to the department and I think that's extremely welcome, and I urge his confirmation in the strongest terms possible. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, none. Excused, 2 (Kuroda and Solomon).

Senator Chang then asked Mr. Ulveling, who was sitting in the gallery, to rise and be recognized.

Senator Hee then stated as follows:

"Mr. President, there were some technical changes that we have agreed to with the House."

The motion to reconsider the action was put by the Chair and carried.

On motion by Senator Hee, seconded by Senator Chang and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 1472, S.D. 1, and that S.B. No. 1472, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRUST ADMINISTRATION," was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Monday, April 27, 1987.

Senate Bill No. 767, S.D. 1, H.D. 1:

Senator Cobb then stated as follows:

"Mr. President, the decision on Senate Bill 526 was to go with the Conference Draft 1, to take out the word 'who' in the House draft of the bill. However, a review of the bill indicates that 'who' is in the spreadsheet only and not in the actual bill. Apparently, the spreadsheet is in error and the bill is all right and, therefore, it's okay to move to agree."

The motion to reconsider the action was put by the Chair and carried.

On motion by Senator Cobb, seconded by Senator Blair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 526, S.D. 1, and that S.B. No. 526, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GROUP LIFE INSURANCE," was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Monday, April 27, 1987.

Senate Bill No. 1289, S.D. 1, H.D. 1:

Senator Cobb moved that the Senate reconsider its action taken on April 9, 1987 on S.B. No. 1289, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, seconded by Senator Blair and carried.

Senator Cobb then stated as follows:

"Mr. President, we had disagreed in order to afford ample time to check with the insurance commissioner. He finds the House version acceptable and, therefore, there's no need to continue our disagreement."

The motion to reconsider the action was put by the Chair and carried.

On motion by Senator Cobb, seconded by Senator Blair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 1289, S.D. 1, and that S.B. No. 1289, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REAL ESTATE," was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Monday, April 27, 1987.

Senator Matsuura, at this time, presented a Senate Certificate honoring Senator Henderson as follows:

"Mr. President, I remember about a year ago you had a big box of aspirin and you threw it out when you found out that former Senator Cayetano and his group were

leaving. I don't know if you will need another box to address Senator Hee, but we have another one that is leaving and you may want to throw another box away before I read this resolution honoring Senator Richard Henderson.

'WHEREAS, RICHARD HENDERSON, a life-long resident of Hilo, Hawaii, a graduate of Punahou High School and University of Pennsylvania, Wharton School of Finance and Commerce; and

'WHEREAS, RICHARD HENDERSON, a Certified Public Accountant (youngest to be certified in Hawaii at that time) is a very prominent and successful businessman, is the President and Chief Executive Officer of Realty Investment Company, Limited, and Director of Hawaiian Electric Industries and Hawaiian Tug and Barge; and

'WHEREAS, RICHARD HENDERSON, in spite of his busy business life, has devoted much time to community services including involvement with the United Fund, YMCA, and various Chambers of Commerce; and

'WHEREAS, RICHARD HENDERSON has served in the Senate of the State of Hawaii since 1970, except 1979-80, was chairman of the Economic Development Committee and Minority Leader; and

'WHEREAS, SENATOR HENDERSON is quoted to be "good, solid, open, fair, attentive, prepared, soft-spoken, straightforward, smart but not a smart-aleck, represents the best of the old time solid Republican, a respected loyal opposition, and one of the best legislators" (?); and

'WHEREAS, SENATOR HENDERSON, 1st Senatorial District, will relinquish his seat at the end of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987; now, therefore,

'BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii that it respectfully extend to SENATOR RICHARD HENDERSON its sincere appreciation for his outstanding work during his tenure in the Senate of the State of Hawaii, express gratitude for his service to the Island of Hawaii and the State of Hawaii, wish him good health and best of everything for the future, and bid "Scotchy" a fond ALOHA!"

"Would you stand, Scotchy, to take the applause from your fellow colleagues.

"Before you make a speech, our Vice President will honor you with a lei and I will present the Senate Certificate."

Senator Henderson then rose and said:

"Mr. President, I'm touched, really. With all those nice words, I was reconsidering whether I should resign or not. But, really, this is not the last day and it's certainly been a privilege and pleasure to serve in this body. I look forward to seeing all of you in the years to come. Thanks a lot."

The Chair then made a presentation to Senator Henderson as follows:

"At this time, Senator Henderson, on behalf of the Majority in the Senate, I'd like to make a presentation. It's not an aspirin bottle.

"For the man in the Legislature, he's judged by the number of bills and resolutions he introduces and the number he passes. I have your record of introduction of bills since 1981, including 1987, and I'd like to make the presentation to you and I hope you don't take the votes personally. On all the measures, the vote was 20 'noes,' 4 'ayes' and 1 'excused.'

"I'd like to present that to you at this time. I'm sure you have something to say, Scotchy."

Senator Henderson replied:

"You know, I guess I've introduced a helluva lot of bills in this body and nothing much happens to them. Sometimes you guys steal them, though, and they eventually end up getting passed. I remember when I first started, I used to get my Democrat colleagues to introduce my bills for me because that's the only way things got moved around here. No, but this is a good body; it's fair and I appreciate being here. Thanks a lot."

Senator Hee then rose on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I would like to rise on a point of personal privilege. Being like Senator Matsuura, ahead of his own time, the Star Bulletin appeared on my desk this afternoon and on its second front page headline, 'Looks like fifth loss for Hawaiian right-to-sue,' it stated several assertions and objections by Mililani Trask, a native Hawaiian who has been one of the most vocal proponents.

"As I indicated earlier this week, we were trying to meet with Representative Levin and, in fact, did so to exchange information. I resent any implication on behalf of anyone that it was in violation of the Sunshine Law. In fact, those who called were notified of any meeting, so I want to set the record straight.

"On a larger matter, I want the Senate to

be rest assured that it is not the Senate that has been dragging its feet. In fact, it has been exactly the opposite. The Senate has been ready. We had put the public word out that we are waiting for the House. Although it looks like we may be on the last, as Hawaiians say, 'koni koni,' the throbbing heart, we may be winding down on the right to sue. Nonetheless, there is still some chance that it may resurrect itself as I thought it was going to do on Easter Sunday when we had the conversation with the governor.

"Let me state emphatically that the Senate will not agree to the House proposal. We will not agree that any right to sue will be limited to the Hawaiian Homes Commission, exclusively. In fact, if we pass a policy of the right to sue, we will pass a policy, not a narrowly focused, construed, so-called bill, a compromise, which will only allow the right to sue from this day forward. That would, in my opinion, express to the state that the Legislature endorses the idea that though Hawaiians may have been aggrieved in the past, it is a legislative policy that those grievances should not be addressed.

"Although we are counting down the last few hours, we have a legitimate compromise. It is a compromise that had been addressed by the former governor who vetoed the bill. It is a bill which, unlike the other five bills which died in the previous five years is, in my opinion, an underwriting program to address the damages. If the House is consistent to the degree that during the past five years they have passed a right to sue bill, then certainly this bill would do no greater quote damage unquote as is perceived by some. In fact, it is an inconsistency on the part of those members of the House who have voted in the past to support a right to sue bill and now turned their backs on a compromise version for the sake of what appears to be prolonging the death of this bill for this year.

"For the record, the majority of those members in the House who voted for the bill are still in the House, and I suspect that if this bill were given a free and full discussion of the members of the House, this bill would prevail. Thank you."

Senator Aki, chairman of the Committee on Housing, Hawaiian Programs and Natural Resources, requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing on H.C.R. No. 119, H.D. 1, and the President granted the waiver.

Senator Nakasato, chairman of the Committee on Labor and Employment, requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing on H.C.R. No. 269, H.D. 1, H.C.R. No. 7, H.D. 1, H.C.R. No. 220, H.D. 1 and H.C.R. No. 4, and the President

granted the waiver.

Senator Holt then rose on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I am rising on a point of personal privilege with the blessing of Senator Yamasaki and with the members' indulgence. I would like to inform the Senate on the status of our negotiations with the House concerning the convention center.

"House conferees still insist that an appointed authority designate the site for the convention center. As members of the Senate know, the position of the Senate conferees is that the site selection responsibility rests fully upon the Legislature. This responsibility cannot and should not be delegated to a body unaccountable to the electorate.

"House conferees are unwilling to discuss the basic question of who should pick the convention center site. Unless and until a solution to this question is reached, there is really no sense in discussing any other matter relating to the convention center.

"House conferees, at the table, have only focused on the social impact of a convention center. They have advanced the proposition that the social impact of a convention center should be known before a site is selected. They have not, and this is important, insisted that adverse social impacts, if any, be solved before the site is selected.

"The Senate proposal makes more than adequate provision for a social impact assessment. The Senate proposal makes the convention center enabling law effective on January 1, 1988, but the appropriation for the social impact assessment takes effect on July 1, 1987. Thus, the social impact assessment can be undertaken during the interim and the results transmitted to the Legislature during the Regular Session of 1988. If there are any substantial adverse impacts, the Legislature can enact mitigating measures.

"The social impact assessment is additional to the environmental impact statement which will be required for the convention center. An environmental impact statement, under Section 343-2, H.R.S., is required to 'disclose the effects of a proposed action on the economic and social welfare of the community.' The community, during preparation of the EIS, is given sufficient opportunity to review and comment on the proposed action.

"House conferees still insist, however, that the Senate's proposal is not enough. They maintain the position that adverse social impacts should be known before

action is taken.

"The House position is illogical and has no justification in light of the EIS requirement under existing law and social impact assessment provision of the Senate proposal. Their opposition to the Senate proposal is clearly a tactic to misdirect public attention from and delay a decision on the tough, basic issue of who should select the convention center site.

"When the convention center conference is stripped of the House's verbiage, charts, and irrational proposals, the major stumbling block to resolution of the issue becomes clearly and irrefutably revealed. The House is unwilling to make a decision.

"Senate conferees disagree strongly with the House position that an authority should designate the convention center site. The issue of site selection is controversial. No doubt members of the Legislature will feel political consequences from any decision made. Members of the Legislature, however, have been elected and are bound by duty, principle, and the faith of the electorate to make difficult decisions, not just the easy ones. The House proposes to delegate its duty to make a difficult decision in order to escape political pressure. The avoidance of the Legislature's duty in the manner proposed by the House would be embarrassing. Avoidance of the duty would be unjustifiable without a vote in public to clearly show that no majority exists on the Ala Wai site. Avoidance of the duty would promote public dissatisfaction with, and deteriorate public faith and confidence in the democratic system by acknowledgment of political paralysis. And, avoidance of the duty would be an admission of a lack of fortitude.

"The Senate, after objective, forthright, and comprehensive evaluation, has taken the courageous action of designating the convention center site. Derogation of the Senate and individual senators has been very vocal and extremely harsh. (Right now I'll show you a picture. You can all take a look at it later. We have our pictures — Senator Wong, Senator Cobb and myself, all red-circled, which is up at Ala Wai golf course for all the golfers to see.) Yet, the burden borne for the courage displayed is much lighter and much more honorable than the burden which accompanies avoidance of one's duty.

"I note that the House intends to send over four concurrent resolutions tonight to develop submerged lands in Keehi Lagoon. The proposals under the concurrent resolutions have not been accompanied by any study of their impact, feasibility, or even need. Incidentally, the total acreage that could possibly be developed by these resolutions is the equivalent of at least two

entire Ala Wai golf courses, or at least 300 acres.

"In contrast, the Legislature has received two studies on the convention center site. Both studies have selected the Ala Wai site as the best after consideration of many factors, including market, site adequacy, development cost, planning and land use, and local impact factors.

"The House position on social impact is also relevant to those concurrent resolutions. The Senate should adopt the concurrent resolutions only after their social impacts are assessed and known. Otherwise, the concurrent resolutions should not be approved, just as the House proposes disapproval of the Ala Wai convention center site because its social impacts are not known.

"The governor and House leadership have the weekend to prepare a social impact assessment on the development of Keehi Lagoon, so the Senate can make a decision on Monday. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Hagino, chairman of the Committee on Planning and Environment, requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing on H.C.R. No. 172, H.C.R. No. 173, H.D. 1, H.C.R. No. 221, H.C.R. No. 236, H.D. 1 and H.C.R. No. 267, and the President granted the waiver.

At 12:50 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:51 o'clock p.m.

At 12:53 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator George and carried, the Senate stood in recess until 9:00 o'clock p.m., this evening.

"During the past four years, General Lum has worked to improve the operational capacity of the State Civil Defense to a level where Hawaii has been evaluated as one of the three best state emergency management agencies in the nation.

"In closing, I just want to reiterate my full support of Major General Alexis T. Lum, the Adjutant General for the State of Hawaii. As you know, under his continued leadership the Hawaii National Guard will prosper and continue to perpetuate its legacy of excellence. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Cobb also spoke in support of General Lum as follows:

"Mr. President, I've been very impressed with his performance over the years. Some facts came to my attention the day of the confirmation hearing when I learned that he will turn 60 in September and, unlike one of our Senators, I hope he opts not to retire and have a blue card, but would give a full four years' service because such a distinguished individual with the kind of background that he's exhibited and the performance to date warrants a full four years and I'm voting for his nomination.

Senator Blair moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1479 be received and placed on

file, seconded by Senator George and carried.

At 2:39 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 2:52 o'clock p.m.

FINAL READING

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 12 (S.B. No. 559, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Hee moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 12 be adopted and S.B. No. 559, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Blair.

Senator Hee, in support of the measure, stated:

"Mr. President, I appreciate your indulgence to take this bill out of order when previously the Clerk had said there were no final business. I appreciate the members' patience.

"The request is taken out of order because the bill that affects these people are here. While I realize that they would stay another three and a half hours, with your indulgence, I moved to pass this and I support this measure.

"Briefly, Mr. President, this bill is the fruition of two years of hard work on behalf of farmers in Waimanalo who at long last, after, in some cases, 40 years of month-to-month revocable permits in Waimanalo, allows these people, many of whom are native Hawaiians, all of whom with a few exceptions are born to this land to negotiate a long-term lease.

"Mr. President and members, this bill is significant in that it would allow the farmers, the bona fide farmers, to finally negotiate a 35-year long-term lease and, by that means, finally make it possible for them to use their land as collateral. It has been a long and hard and, certainly, persistent enduring commitment by these people to come to the Legislature and express themselves. Let alone, at the same time, farm the land and be productive members of our society.

"For these reasons, Mr. President, I would urge every member on this floor to cast an affirmative vote. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and Conf. Com. Rep. No. 12 was adopted and S.B. No. 559, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LANDS," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, none. Excused, 1 (Matsuura).

At this time, Senator Hee introduced the

Waimanalo farmers who were sitting in the gallery.

Senator Ikeda then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, Saturday's Star Bulletin, in its article regarding the conference on the convention center, quotes me as saying or writes about me thusly: 'Senator Donna Ikeda finally ended the discussion by saying that all the talk was "Bull (blank)" unless the House agree that it was the responsibility of the Legislature to "bite the bullet."' "

"Mr. President, that perturbs me. I think I said ... I made many points in the brief comments that I did make during the conference but I don't think that they can be summarized in that fashion, and I would like to take this opportunity to tell this body exactly what I did say.

"First of all, I noted that we discussed possible sites for the convention center for at least a year, and every site mentioned has met with opposition with the exception of Fort Armstrong because residents of the adjacent areas have objected to the convention center being built close to their neighborhoods.

"I noted that social impact is inevitable no matter which site is selected, unless it is in an area like Fort Armstrong, which is presently a dump. And the reasons, I reminded the House, the conferees, the reasons we're even considering building a convention center is because of the positive economic impact it will have on our economy. And we also know that in order to reap the economic benefits we anticipate that the convention center has to be built close to Waikiki.

"Then, I summed it all up by saying that the Legislature, therefore, has the responsibility to select the site and deal with the problems as they arise and if we're serious about building a convention center, then the conferees should accept the Senate version of the bill which was before them, and that if we really didn't want to build a convention center, then we should cut out the BS and go home.

"I admit, Mr. President, that I did say those words; they slipped out and for that I apologize if my language offended anyone. However, I think that given all the points that I did make at the time, the summation in the paper is clearly erroneous.

"I thank you for letting me clarify my remarks."

Senator Cobb, in support of the previous speaker's remarks, stated:

"Mr. President, there is a well-known cafe

or eating establishment in Washington, D.C., located approximately a block and a half from the Nation's Capitol. It is used by members of the opposition as a gathering place. In fact, it's located next to an establishment called 'The Loyal Opposition.'

"This establishment is named after a famous quote by President Teddy Roosevelt in a similar situation as was just alluded to. The name of the establishment, which has very good food, Mr. President, is 'Bull Feathers.'

"I would view the discussion on the convention center as being of vital importance and I think the Senator who previously spoke made some very excellent and telling points, and as all too often a case, where the substance of the message is overlooked to the form at the end of it. I think this is another case in point where her point of personal privilege was extremely well taken. Thank you."

Senator Chang then added:

"Mr. President, while we're on the subject of 'bull feathers,' I noticed a 'table' in the Star-Bulletin the other evening that describes the various measures that were alive, dead or in limbo. The publication suggested that a bill was before the Legislature to raise the salaries of legislators. Today's cartoon also found in the Honolulu Star-Bulletin suggests the very same thing.

"May I request the presiding officers of the Legislature to communicate with the editorial board of the Star-Bulletin and correct this misimpression that they must have in their minds about this subject and recommend that it not occur again. Thank you."

Senator Holt then said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of Senator Ikeda's comments.

"Senator Yamasaki and I were at the table when those statements were made. There was a lot said by Senator Ikeda during the conference which had a lot of merit that was not printed.. And to tell you the truth, I thought she was rather nice to the House. Thank you.

Senator Kuroda added:

"Mr. President, I think we're going to have to be very careful in what we say about these newspapers because if you look at this morning's newspaper, there is no mention of any legislative action, and there were reporters around the Capitol during the weekend and they did notice that we were working all the way up till 10:00 o'clock last night. But there was no

mention of the Legislature in the Advertiser and maybe they got cold feet. And if you keep talking about the Star-Bulletin, they will stop writing about you."

Senator Chang responded:

"Mr. President, I don't think I will enjoy any problem in that regard inasmuch as they have never written about me, anyway."
(Laughter)

Senator Hee then said:

"Mr. President, obviously, the members of the Senate are missing the point. If we spend more time with the wise one of the Senate, the chairman of Ways and Means, he has the answer why newspapers write what they do. I spent a lunch with him and he very concisely articulated the reason and the existence of newspapers.

"So, I'm rising on a point of inquiry; may be the good Senator would like to let us all know why newspapers write what they do, and it would solve a lot of misrepresentations and then maybe others would perhaps do what I do, don't read the papers." (Laughter)

Senator Henderson then said:

"Senator Hee can read, I hope."

Senator Hee responded:

"The only reason I can read, Mr. President, is unlike Senator Henderson, I haven't been here forever and it still gives me a little bit of a chance in life. But I see that the chairman of Ways and Means was going to take the mike, so I would like to yield to his wisdom at this time."

Senator Yamasaki then remarked:

"Mr. President, I learned way back when I was in high school that one of the primary aims in journalism is to create confusion. And, also, to create conflict between individuals as they write their stories; and also to name personalities because people like to read about people. Thank you."
(Laughter)

At this time, the Chair read to the members of the Senate a thank you letter from the Mrs. Mikie Hines, spokesperson of the Waimanalo Valley farmers for the passage of Senate Bill 559.

The Chair then made the following pronouncement:

"Members of the Senate, before we go into recess, the Chair would like, in all sincerity, to thank all of the Senators for their efforts the past few days. I think there is a light at the end of the tunnel. I

think if we can accomplish those things that are now presently moving toward completion. I think we're going to have a great session and I applaud all of you. Thank you very much for sticking with it no matter what the odds are. We're looking good!"

At 3:08 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator George and carried, the Senate stood in recess until 7:30 o'clock p.m.

Senator Ikeda rose to speak on the measure as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill, but I have some reservations.

"Madam Vice President, we have before us today the long-awaited revision of the insurance code. Our insurance laws have become convoluted, difficult to understand and inconsistent in some areas. Therefore, two years ago, the Thirteenth Legislature requested a study of the insurance code and asked for legislation to restructure and clarify the myriad provisions of our insurance laws. This bill is the outcome of those labors and I would first like to commend the new Insurance Commissioner for his hard work.

"However, there is at least one aspect of this bill which causes me great concern, and that is the recoupment of insurance guaranty association assessments.

"I would like to first review how the assessment process has worked in the past. Each insurance company pays a yearly assessment — currently 2% of its revenues — into one of the two insurance guaranty associations. This assures that if one of the member companies goes bankrupt, the policyholders of that failed company will not lose their insurance coverage. In addition, should more funds be required to cover losses, the association has the power to make intermediate assessments of the member companies. In the past, these assessments could be recovered by being included in the next rate-filing.

"However, during the 1986 Special Session on Tort Reform, the Thirteenth Legislature passed legislation mandating insurance companies to recoup all assessments paid into the insurance guaranty association funds — from their policyholders. Under the provisions of that bill, each company must charge each of its insureds for the recoupment of that assessment. This was apparently included as a compromise to protect the industry from the possible failure of companies due to tort reform.

"What may not be as easily seen is that this new arrangement could provide for double recovery by the industry. The companies first recoup their assessments from their insureds. But the guaranty associations also recover all or a portion of the losses through liquidation of the assets of the failed company. This is the second recovery. Any funds received from liquidation will remain with the guaranty association instead of being rebated to policyholders. Over time this could become a very substantial amount.

"What concerns me most about this system is that there is no public oversight of these funds. The guaranty associations' record are not open to either the public or the Legislature. Only the Insurance Commissioner can require reports or an audit of these funds, and, as he acknowledged during our recent deliberations in conference, he himself might never find out if the balance were excessive or funds misused. If this is true, Madam Vice President, then who determines whether these funds are being used properly and that policyholders are being given a fair deal?

"I do understand that this provision is not new and that it was added last year during the Special Session. I would like to make it clear that I did object to this provision at that time. My reservations regarding HB 410 stem from the fact that it should have also addressed this serious problem. However, conferees were continually reminded that this provision was part of the 'delicately-woven' tort reform agreement of '86, and were warned that if one section of

the agreement were changed, the entire agreement could unravel.

"Madam Vice President, I would like to know how long we must wait before addressing this problem. How long before we can touch the provisions of the 'Tort Reform of '86'? Are these provisions cast in concrete no matter what the impact? How long, before we take care of the consumers' concerns?

"Madam Vice President, I ask that my colleagues, as well as the Insurance Commissioner and the insurance industry, fully consider the seriousness of this situation and further request that this body address this problem during the next session."

Senator Cobb then rose to speak in response and said:

"Madam Vice President, I rise to speak in response and in doing so I note two items.

"If the Insurance Commissioner needs to find out about the fund balance, all he needs to do is ask. He has clear authority to do so. If he failed to ask, he would be negligent in the performance of his duties.

"Second, the Insurance Commissioner now has the authority to order a plan to be submitted on recoupment although there is no requirement for a prior approval of that plan.

"Third, in terms of the addressing of the tort reform law that was passed during the 1986 Special Session of the Legislature, as soon as the accident data is received from the first closed-claim study that is due in October of this year, legislative attention and action will begin to focus in that area because by then we will have relevant data in which to judge the effectiveness of the law and the need, if any, for further changes.

"Fourth, this bill has an effective date of July 1, 1988, which means that there will be further legislative oversight and review in the next legislative session, prior to its becoming effective in law. Thank you."

"Basically, Senate Bill 5 brings to a successful fruition many years of debate and discussion and the need for a separate Department of Corrections. In fact, the last time the state moved ahead to establish a new department was in 1959 under the Reorganization Act.

"Senate Bill 5 would separate the existing Corrections Division from the Department of Social Services and Housing and make the division the basis for a new department. The department will be focusing almost exclusively on correctional functions and programs. I firmly believe that this department will provide the sort of continuous and focused attention that is necessary in the corrections area, and also insure accountability on the part of one department and one department head for correctional matters.

"The consolidation of correctional programs under a smaller and more manageable department will also help the state in its efforts to comply with consent decree requirements. However, I'd like to point out that while we've taken, I think, a very significant step in creating a separate Department of Corrections, this is but a first step in the development of a comprehensive department.

"There are still several outstanding issues in the corrections area that need to be resolved. These include: whether or not the probation department should be transferred from the Judiciary to the new Department of Corrections, or whether in fact this department should become an umbrella public safety agency under which law enforcement functions, including the Sheriff's Office, would be consolidated. However, these issues can be resolved during the next session. What is most important for this session is that the state is finally taking a bold and long overdue step in creating a new department.

"Finally, I would also like to compliment the Ways and Means Committee, and in particular Senator Yamasaki, for developing a budget that is going to assist and ease the transitional period for the Department of Corrections. For example, the Ways and Means Committee appropriated \$720,000 to improve the Halawa Medium Security Facility to address some of the concerns

raised earlier in this session.

"The Legislature's budget in conjunction with Senate Bill 5 signals an optimistic future for corrections here in the State of Hawaii. Accordingly, I would urge my colleagues to vote in favor of Senate Bill 5. Thank you."

Senator Henderson also spoke in support of the measure as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I would just like to say that this has been a Republican position for many years and I'm glad we finally have come around to the right thought on this subject. Thank you."

were placed on the calendar for further consideration on Wednesday, April 29, 1987.

Senator Holt then rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked as follows:

"Just for a point of clarification for the record, I understand that the House conferees have already made press releases regarding the status of negotiations on the convention center and with Senator Yamasaki's blessings I'd like to say that the Senate went into conference with the Ala Wai site effective July 1 of this year to take immediate action. It came back to the table with Ala Wai and a Fort DeRussy trigger mechanism which would allow for questions to be answered regarding cost and availability of DeRussy.

"The House insisted that we do social impacts so the Senate proceeded to add provisions to address the social impact questions on Ala Wai. Fort DeRussy was also going to be under consideration and

notification was given to the governor that that site was available.

"All during this time, the House maintained their position on setting the issue, and just for clarification with regard to the House's final position tonight which is not my understanding over what was presented to the Conference Committee, but is being presented to the public, the House position is that they wanted to tentatively designate Ala Wai as the convention center site.

"Essentially what they were going to do was have studies done of five sites, including the Ala Wai, again, wanting to look at four sites that are unnamed, that was not identified to your conference committee. They wanted to do some EIS studies, market orientation analysis, and then proceeded to inform your committee that if the House did not choose a site, Ala Wai would be finalized, and that is the only information that was presented to your committee.

"In other words, if the House, based on the information that was provided to them next session, decided on a site, Ala Wai would no longer be the designated site.

"Basically, Mr. President, the House position was just buying time to pick the site. Once they picked the site, Ala Wai would cease to be the site selected by this Legislature.

"It appears to me, Mr. President, that this is nothing more than a smokescreen to escape public pressure for not selecting a site this session, and wanting to study this issue to death and further delay decision on this matter. I think it's not fair to the conferees who worked hard to try and come to a settlement on this issue. The indication is that the House is reporting to the public that they were willing to come and back off the authority position to agree on Ala Wai.

"This tentative designation doesn't make sense, and basically the Senate conferees thought that this was nothing more than a delay tactic to study the issue more. Basically, to allow the House who as of yet has not selected any site or sites, or named any site or sites, to go and study this issue during the interim and then come back next year, and then, maybe, Mr. President, maybe they'll pick a site.

"In the interest of the state and in the interest of the committee, your conferees felt that it's not fair to the conferees and to the Senate and to the people who put a lot of work into this matter that the House is taking a position which is not in the best interest of the state. And, I just want to make those statements for the record.

"Thank you."

Senator Cobb also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, today on the news there was an announcement that American Airlines had terminated its discriminatory mileage practices. When I say discriminatory, the kind of practices that required Hawaii residents or travelers to fly more miles to and from Hawaii in order to qualify for mileage upgrades than their counterparts on the Mainland. Within four hours of American Airlines' announcement, a similar announcement was made by United Airlines, ending their discriminatory practice, first, of requiring 75,000 instead of 50,000 miles for a free ticket, and second, ending their equally discriminatory practice of requiring 30,000 miles as opposed to 10,000 for an upgrade to first class.

"What the action of the two airlines has done is to restore the equality of Hawaii residents and travelers enjoyed prior to December 31, 1986, when there was no discrimination in terms of mileage travelled in order to receive an upgrade. It has made us equal with our fellow travellers on the Mainland.

"Mr. President, this is a tremendous victory not for me personally but for every consumer who is an air traveller and every Hawaii resident and every traveller to and from Hawaii. I want to express my personal thanks to all members of the Senate as the only legislative body in this state which took any kind of action against this kind of unequal treatment.

"I want to express my personal thanks on behalf of the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce and the members of the Senate, to our consumers and our air travellers who voted with their pocketbook, to end this kind of unequal treatment. And I want to express my personal thanks, as well, to the management of both American and United Airlines for seeing the light and changing their minds in the face of competition and in the face of a tremendous amount of public sentiment that said that what they did was not right or fair or just.

"It's not often, Mr. President, that the consumer wins a big one. Tonight, they did. Thank you."

Senator Henderson then rose on a point of information and asked:

"Mr. President, I would like to ask the Senator from the 18th District, does he mean that we do not have a convention center?"

The Chair posed the question to Senator Holt and he answered:

"Mr. President, unless the conferees in the House and the Senate can get together tomorrow and get closer to agreement and deck a bill which might be an additional extension that means ... (CHAIR: There might be a possibility.) that might be possible."

Senator Henderson further asked:

"You mean that there's no way at all we're going to have a convention center?"

The Chair responded:

"I think the chairman answered the question. If there is a possibility, it will be decked."

Senator Henderson continued:

"It requires a one-day extension."

The Chair responded:

"We will cross that bridge when we come to it, Senator Henderson."

At 2:11 o'clock a.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator George and carried, the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

SIXTY-SECOND DAY

Wednesday, April 29, 1987

The Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 10:40 o'clock p.m., with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Mr. James Brazil, Office of Senator James Aki, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The Chair announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Sixtieth and Sixty-First Days.

The following introductions were made to the members of the Senate:

Senator A. Kobayashi introduced Mrs. Kiyo Miyamoto from Maui, who was sitting in the gallery, and said: "She is a very good friend and a very hardworking woman who stays very late with us when the Ways and Means conference committee meets. She deserves a lot of thanks and appreciation."

Senator Hee then introduced Colbert Matsumoto and said:

"Madam Vice President, through the deliberations of the Judiciary Committee, many rumors have been spread regarding the influence behind the Judiciary budget and, contrary to popular views, it is not Earl Anzai. The real man behind the Judiciary Committee has come to witness the session, just as an arsonist goes to view the fire. I would like, at this time, to introduce the man behind the Judiciary budget, the man who will be back to take a forefront next year (he's pushing Earl Anzai on the side), he's Colbert Matsumoto."

Senator Kuroda then introduced former Senators: Lt Governor Ben Cayetano, Neil Abercrombie, Duke Kawasaki, Gerald Machida and Charles Toguchi; and Senate Sergeant-at-Arms Ben Villaflor, as follows:

"Madam Vice President, one is tempted to introduce the persons who are seated on the floor with us this evening as a motley crew of ex-senators, but inasmuch as they do occupy very important positions in the State of Hawaii, I don't think it's proper to do that. In light of the fact that we are short of time due to our long caucus and I did have a long introduction for you five gentlemen, I will cut it short by saying welcome back to you former senators.

"We do want to recognize the achievements of our former Senator Cayetano who is now our lieutenant governor; a 1957 graduate of Farrington High School; a boy from Kalihi, succeeding

in becoming an attorney, state representative, state senator, and now lieutenant governor. Congratulations and welcome back, Lt. Governor Cayetano!

"Then we have next to him, former Senator Duke Kawasaki, now deputy city managing director; also a son of Kalihi; someone who has been very outspoken in this Legislature, criticizing, especially, the two dailies and their monopoly; a champion of capital punishment. Welcome back, Duke Kawasaki!

"The next gentlemen, former Senator Charles Toguchi is a former school teacher who achieved the highest position in the Department of Education; someone who spent ten years in the state Legislature and has been very instrumental in developing the future of our children's education as chairman of the Committee on Education in both the House and the Senate. We're very proud to welcome back superintendent of education, former Senator Charles Toguchi.

"It says here, Senator Neil Abercrombie, doctor of philosophy. Welcome back, Dr. Abercrombie. Senator Abercrombie, as you are well aware, spent a few months as a member of Congress, representing Hawaii, and he did an excellent job in focusing attention of the nation on Hawaii. We thank you, Senator Abercrombie. He is now a special assistant to Superintendent Charles Toguchi. Welcome back, Senator Neil Abercrombie!

"We do want you four gentlemen to know that the decibel level of this chamber has decreased considerably with your absence, but welcome back.

"The next gentlemen is quiet but effective. Very effective on the golf course because he's taken a lot of my money on the golf course, former Senator Gerald K. Machida, now a member of the Hawaii Labor Relations Board; a Maui High School graduate; football star at the University of Hawaii; spent his career in the Legislature, since 1974, and chaired the agriculture, health, and labor and employment committees, and has been very instrumental in improving the welfare of the public employees. Please welcome former Senator Gerald Machida.

"The empty chair is not the absence of former Senator Buddy Soares, although he was invited, but someone of greatest importance in this chamber, the former Lightweight Champion of the World, our Sergeant-at-Arms Ben Villaflor. (The honoree took a seat with the former

senators.)

"We present to Ben this Hawaii State Senate Special Certificate (framed) honoring him. It includes a xerox copy of the Advertiser article on Ben Villaflor and his family, a well-deserved recognition. I might add that he was the number one assessor of the recent Leonard-Hagler fight because he predicted that if it went the distance, Leonard 'will win,' and he did."

Senate President Wong then added his remarks as follows:

"Madam Vice President, I'd like to say a few words.

"For one thing, in the past few months I've thrown away about three boxes of aspirin because I didn't think I needed them anymore. Before saying another word, I want to emphasize that the honorees here this evening are only here to be recognized and they are not here to speak on or enter into debates on the bills on the floor before us.

"I also want to indicate, Madam Vice President, that I've received two letters from organizations outside of this building. One, in particular, the Book Binding Association has complained most adamantly about the lack of business here in the Senate. It seems that our journal has decreased in pages by half.

"The Honolulu Paper Company has indicated that the paper bill from the Senate is quite low.

"Much more importantly, Madam Vice President, it is the people who make the tapes for recordings here at the Capitol that have complained the most. There has been a two-thirds drop in the recordings here in the Senate.

"And I did read an article that said thank goodness for Dickie Wong, they all are successful today ... and making five times the money that I do.

"But, I wish all of them well. I love them all. Have a good evening!"

The honorees rose to be recognized and were presented their Senate Certificates, respectively, by Senator Kuroda and leis by Senators Fernandes Salling, McMurdo, Solomon, Young, George, Ikeda and A. Kobayashi.

At 10:53 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

"Madam Vice President, this bill is a culmination of ten years of hard work by many individuals and I think it's appropriate that I at least give some history to this measure.

"The framework of this bill was really prepared by a number of people who have served on the Advisory Study Commission on Water Resources and I would like to read the names of these people into the journal. They are Susumu Ono, Hideto Kono, Kent Keith, Georgiana Padeken, Charles Clark, Leslie Matsubara, Kazu Hayashida, Bill Sewake, Bill Haines, Vince Bagoyo, Raymond Sato, Reuben Wong, Gregory Gomes, Charles Reppun, Dickie Nitta, James Nakatani, Fred Trotter, Yukio Naito, Professor Williamson B.C. Chang, Samuel B.K. Chang and Charles Nishimura. These were the original drafters of the water code bill. They actually provided the information on which the bill was drafted.

"There is another thing that I would like to put into the journal. There is one portion of the bill that was not prepared by the Advisory Study Commission on Water Resources. It is that portion prepared by the late Richard Kawakami's staff, perhaps Richard's best friends. They are Kevin Ebata, Neil Shigemura, Gail Sagara, Barbara Leong, Lorraine Koike and Mona Sakata Ho. I would just like to read that portion which they were responsible in drafting — the bill has been dedicated to the late Richard Kawakami:

'In enacting this legislation, the Legislature acknowledges the farsighted contribution of the late Richard A. Kawakami, Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Fourteenth Legislature, State of Hawaii, who as chairman of the House Water Land Use Development and Hawaiian Affairs Committee from 1971 through 1980, laid the foundation for the state water code. His visionary concern for the protection of Hawaii water resources for all its people pre-dated by many years, the 1978 Hawaii State Constitutional Convention Amendment to Article XI, Section 7, of the Hawaii Constitution, and the final report of the Legislature's Advisory Study Commission on Water Resources submitted in January 1985. The enactment of the state water code constitute a legacy from the late Speaker which will benefit not only the citizenry of today but the countless generations yet to come. The Legislature can find no greater or more precious monument to the memory of this wise and dedicated public servant than the passage of this act.'

"This is the language that was drafted by Richard's closest friends here in the State Capitol. There are others that I should also mention, Bill Paty and Manabu Togamori who have also contributed a lot to the drafting of the water code.

"I should also thank Senator Aki because, basically, the Senate bill passed over to the House first, but Senator Aki graciously consented that we hold back the Senate bill and we pass the House bill to honor Richard. So I want to thank Jimmy for being so generous because it was his bill that should have been passed.

"Of course, I must thank Senator Yamasaki (he's not here) ... but we did have a little impasse whereby the House wanted the county to come up with the water use development plan. We were mandating the county to do a plan but we lacked the funds to support it. I went to see Senator Yamasaki for some money. At first, he gave \$600,000 of GO money then a few days later, he called me up and said that he had

turned the GO bond into cash. He came up with \$600,000 of cash. Someday, I'm going to ask Senator Yamasaki if that money was part of the slant/drilling money that I did not receive. However, I feel very honored that he did transfer and did provide the needed funds to improve the water code bill.

"But I think the key to the passage of the water code ... the person that really deserves the credit for the passage is none other than the wife of the late Speaker because when we had this impasse on Friday, Representative Bertha Kawakami entered into the picture. She was determined that the state water code was going to pass this session and she came in and talked to both sides and really stayed with the negotiations although she was not a conferee. She did enter into the picture and really saw the bill through. She deserves the credit for the passage of the water code.

"This bill truly is a Kawakami bill because you have both the late Representative Richard Kawakami and the present Representative Bertha Kawakami working very hard for the passage.

"I really feel very honored to have been a part of this bill and, thanks to Bertha and Richard, we have a water code. Thank you."

Senator Aki also rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Madam Vice President, let the Journal also reflect that Senator Richard Matsuura was the co-sponsor of the Senate bill. But, more importantly, Madam Vice President, I think the Journal should reflect that without the leadership, hard work, and patience of Senator Matsuura I don't believe we would have a water code today.

"I think all of us here today and the people of Hawaii owe a deep gratitude to Senator Matsuura and all of those who worked on the water code. Thank you very much."

"Madam Vice President, it is with great reluctance that I'm asking as chairman of the committee to have this matter recommitted, not because of the intent but, rather, because there are some questions regarding the broad nature of the bill. Its intent is a noble one.

"This bill conforms and sends a message clearly from the Legislature that gifts to a legislator should be a matter of public record. However, in the caucus several members have brought to bear questions which, frankly, need to be addressed.

"I have a commitment from the chairman of the House Judiciary Committee, Representative Metcalf, that we will tighten up the language, take care of some of the ambiguity and bring this bill back in a much tighter framework in 1988. So I am asking that this matter be recommitted because of the overly broad nature of this bill whose spirit and intent is a noble one.

"Thank you."

Senator Hee, chairman of the Committee

on Conference, having requested a recommittal of Conf. Com. Rep. No. 69 and S.B. No. 576, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GIFTS DISCLOSURE STATEMENT," and the Chair noting that there no objections, so ordered.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 76 (H.B. No. 369, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1):

By unanimous consent, action on Conf. Com. Rep. No. 76 and H.B. No. 369, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, was deferred to the end of the calendar.

Senator Henderson rose to inquire if the chairman of the Committee on Conference would yield to a question. The Chair having posed the question and Senator Hee having answered in the affirmative, Senator Henderson asked:

"Madam Vice President, prior to this bill, what happens now to kuleana lands?"

Senator Hee answered:

"Madam Vice President, the kuleana lands now revert to the owner of the ahupua'a and in many cases what has happened in the past is you will have an isolated kuleana, for example, in the middle of a cane field owned by the, perhaps, one of the Big Five, Dillingham for example, in Kona. What happens is when the owners cannot be found is that, presently, the lands are escheated into the ahupua'a and are consumed by, in the case of Kona, one of the bigger landowners.

"In many cases, there is cane over the kuleana land because the nature of the land ownership of the Hawaiians, the diversity and the multiplicity of the owners is many times unknown and this bill addresses that concern by having the lands escheat to the Department of Land and Natural Resources.

"At such time that the Office of Hawaiian Affairs can come up with a plan that is approved by the State Department of Land and Natural Resources then the kuleana lands would revert to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, the duly formed body, to take care and be in charge of the Hawaiian and native Hawaiians."

Senator Henderson further inquired:

"Madam Vice President, are there some kuleana lands that are not owned by native

Hawaiians?"

Senator Hee answered:

"Madam Vice President, it was told to us that that possibility exists. However, no evidence was brought before the committee indicating that."

Senator Henderson remarked and further inquired:

"I think that there are a lot of kuleana lands that are not owned by native Hawaiians, Madam Vice President.

"My question is why shouldn't these lands, if they're going to escheat to somebody, why shouldn't they escheat to the state?"

Senator Hee answered:

"Madam Vice President, this bill provides that the lands would escheat to the state and not the owner of the ahupua'a.

Senator Henderson then asked:

"Yes, but don't they go to OHA?"

Senator Hee answered:

"It would go to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs at such time that the Department of Land and Natural Resources approves a plan regarding kuleana lands. Until that time occurs the lands would be escheated to the State of Hawaii."

Senator Henderson then responded:

"Madam Vice President, I agree with not having the lands escheat to the state, but I have some grave concern about the kuleana lands going to OHA and not to the State of Hawaii for all the residents of the State of Hawaii."

Senator Hee answered:

"Madam Vice President, as I said earlier, this bill provides that the lands would be escheated to the State Department of Lands and Natural Resources."

Senator Henderson then spoke against the measure and said:

"Madam Vice President, I understand in the bill that it's only there temporarily and eventually the lands are turned over to OHA. I don't see why kuleana lands should be turned over to OHA when it should be the property of all citizens of the State of Hawaii. I would urge a 'no' vote on this bill."

Senator Hee responded:

"Madam Vice President, it's a policy

question for the members of the Senate, the Minority Leader has made his position clear. Let's put it to a vote."

At this time, Senator Henderson rose to address the members of the Senate as follows:

"Mr. President, fellow members, ladies and gentlemen.

"It is indeed with mixed feelings that I rise to say goodbye to my colleagues in the Senate. My 17 years as the senator from the First District have given me a tremendous experience in state government, and they are years which I will always value. You know, the only other senator here today that was here when I was first appointed is our fearless chairman of Ways and Means, Senator Yamasaki. Now, I don't want to imply that Senator Yamasaki is as old as I am, but this to me signals that the

time has come to step aside and give someone else a chance to learn the way of politics, and to represent the people of this great state.

"Before I get around to the farewells, I would like to correct some of the impressions that have been created due to the news of my departure a few weeks ago.

"The first misconception was the flattering — if highly inaccurate — notion that somehow my departure signaled the decline, or even the demise, of the Republican Party in this state. Now while each of us would like to cherish the illusion of our own indispensibility, we all know very well that the world and the profession of politics and the institution of the Senate and the political party of our choice can get along very well without us very nicely.

"As you know, the number of Republicans in the Senate won't change when I leave — the governor is obliged to appoint a member of the Republican Party to take my place. So the quantity will be the same, and there are those, I understand, who hold that the quality might even be improved with my transfer to greener pastures.

"Speaking of Republican quantity, I was interested to read in one of Gregg Kakesako's pieces in the Star Bulletin that our numbers had decreased from four to five after the last election — an unusual arithmetical trick ... the GOP will take that kind of decrease any time we can get it. With creative mathematical maneuvers such as this, I'd like to encourage Gregg to leave journalism and become an accountant.

"Through my many years here I have witnessed many notable Republican measures become law. To list a few:

- A credit for the general excise tax on food and drugs,
- Raising the drinking age,
- Home rule issues,
- The creation of a separate department of corrections, and
- Judicial reform.

"Year after year these have all been included in our state GOP platform, and through our persistence we have converted enough members of your caucus to Republican principles to insure the success of these measures.

"Mr. President, the Republican caucus members will continue to be major contributors to the business of this Senate. I have great respect for their ability, their persistence in getting at the facts, and the

broad spectrum of experience and knowledge they have acquired.

"I commend to your special attention the unusual makeup of the Minority caucus. For the first time anywhere (as far as I have been able to determine) the majority of the Minority will be of feminine persuasion. I think this alone guarantees that Senate Republican input will be thoughtful, dignified, responsive, and generally a credit to the institution they serve.

"In parting, I would like to leave with you advice from my friend and mentor Doc Hill. When I first came to the Senate, he sat me down and said, 'Richard, there are three things you must always remember:

1. No matter what, the governor is always the governor.
2. Always play ball with the President of the Senate.
3. When in doubt — vote "no."

"I have followed those principles, my good President, throughout my 17 years here and I think that they have served me well.

"My friends, it has been a long and winding road. I have made many good friends in the Senate. We have had our agreements and disagreements, and I must confess that our differences of opinion are what provided me with the greatest challenge. Sometimes I persuaded you to see things as I saw them, and many times I didn't, but that is part of the business of politics. When I think back on my times here I will have fond memories, the fondest being the years of the coalition, where I learned my greatest lessons in politics.

"Finally, to the members of our Minority caucus — Mary, Ann, Rick and Donna — it has been a pleasure working with you. I realize at times it has been and will continue to be an uphill battle, but hang in there; remember, good things come in small packages.

"To all of you, good luck in all your future endeavors and much Aloha! Thank you very much."

Senator Yamasaki then rose to remark:

"Mr. President, as chairman of the Senate Ways and Means Committee, I would like to thank all of the subject matter committee chairmen and their members and also the Ways and Means Committee members for their participation in helping to provide a good Senate program in this year's session.

"I believe we have done a wonderful job for the people of this state — all of the people as well as for business. I think that

it was a great, great session and I would like to thank you all for the wonderful job that you have done to make this year's session one of the best.

"Also, to my staff of the Ways and Means Committee, I would like to thank them for their hard work during the entire budgetary process. Thank you."

At 3:40 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

"Mr. President, on behalf of Senator Yamasaki, I would like to thank all the members of the Senate for being patient and for bearing with us tonight. Your conferees on the convention center are ready to go home. Thank you."

The purpose of Senate Bill No. 349 is to amend section 26-13, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to require that the Director of Health have certain health-related qualifications. Specifically, the bill provides that the Director of Health must 'have a professional health background and full time experience of at least five years in community health care, public health administration, or related experience.'

From a policy viewpoint, this bill raises a number of serious questions.

To begin with, the bill runs contrary to a tradition in Hawaii, which is to have no rigid statutory qualifications for the Director of Health.

The Hawaii Board of Health is the oldest anywhere in the United States. When it was created in 1851, there were no statutory qualifications for the position of president of the board, the forerunner of the Director of Health. None were thought necessary. Not until a century later, did the legislature mandate health-related qualifications for the position. Act 292 of the Session Laws of Hawaii 1951 provided:

The president shall be a person who (1) has been or is eligible to be certified by the American Board of Preventive Medicine and Public Health, Incorporated, or (2) is (a) licensed to practice as a doctor of medicine or osteopathy in the territory and has successfully completed at least one year of graduate study

leading to a degree in public health, and (b) has had, during the ten years next preceding his consideration for appointment, at least six years of practical experience in public health work, including supervision or administration of such work, in communities of not less than 50,000 population, or in the United States Public Health Service as a commissioned medical officer.

Standing Committee Report No. 113 of the Senate Committee on Health on the bill that became Act 292 explained:

The purpose of this bill is to provide for the qualifications of the president of the board of health. Under existing law the president need not be a doctor of medicine licensed to practice in the Territory. Other qualifications are set forth which this Committee feels will insure that a well qualified man shall act as president of the board.

Act 292 was in force and effect from 1951 until its repeal in 1974 by Act 252 of the Session Laws of Hawaii 1974.

The reasons for the repeal are illuminating. The major reason was the belief that rigid statutory qualifications for the position of Director of Health were too restrictive and sometimes did not result in the appointment of the best qualified persons. Standing Committee Report No. 50 of the Senate Committee on Health, 1973 Senate Journal at 673, said: 'Your Committee believes that present requirements for the position of director restrict the choice to a narrow handful of persons and eliminate a larger group otherwise fully qualified to carry on this largely administrative task.' Standing Committee Report No. 469-74 of the House Committee on Public Health and Welfare, 1974 House Journal at 740-741, reported that 'under the present statutory requirements, very few persons in the State qualify for the position of director of health.' The same committee went on to say:

Your Committee feels that by amending the law to eliminate the present qualifications, more persons would be eligible for the position of director of health providing the appointing authority with a larger field from which to choose and the flexibility to make an appropriate choice. This would, in part, assure the department and the State of a qualified, responsive appointment to the position of director of health.

Thus, the tradition in Hawaii from 1851 has been to have no rigid statutory qualifications for Hawaii's top health officer. The only deviation from tradition

was the period 1951 to 1974, which, significantly, ended in repeal of the statutory qualifications.

It should be pointed out that many Mainland states do not have statutory qualifications for their top health officers. These states include California (Director of Health Services), Maryland (Secretary of Health and Mental Hygiene), Nebraska (Director of Health), South Dakota (Secretary of Health), Kansas (Secretary of Health and Environment), Delaware (Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services), Idaho (Director of Health and Welfare), and Alaska (Commissioner of Health and Social Services).

Also, it should be pointed out that the powers and duties of the Hawaii Director of Health do not require the Director to personally treat patients and diagnose illness. The Director has a well-trained staff to do those duties — and the Department of Health is the second largest department of state government in terms of numbers of personnel. What is needed is a good, capable, firm administrator at the top who is able to run a large department of state government. This was alluded to in 1973 when the Senate committee on Health noted that the position of Director of Health is a 'largely administrative task.' While it is certainly desirable for the appointing authority to consider the public health background of applicants for Director of Health, it should by no means be the sole or a statutory requirement for the position. That much tradition and experience have taught us.

First, this type of insurance is generally available already. This bill would require those insurers that do not offer this coverage to start offering optimal policies and some insurers may have to expand their coverage to meet the requirements of the bill. As an optional coverage, those electing to take the coverage would pay a higher premium; therefore, the additional cost of the policy would be borne by those electing to take the coverage. The intended desire of expanding coverage may therefore not be accomplished.

In addition I tend to sign Senate Bill No. 815 which requires an impact assessment of

all proposed mandated health benefits. Child health supervision services is specifically required as a part of this bill to be reviewed by the Legislative Auditor prior to the 1988 Legislature. It is therefore unnecessary to require such a benefit to be offered as an option now.

The purposes of Senate Bill No. 1068 are: (1) to temporarily transfer the Office of the Sheriff from the Judiciary to the Department of the Attorney General from the date of approval of the bill until June 30, 1988, when the Office of the Sheriff is to be transferred back to the Judiciary, and (2) to establish executive personal security officer positions within the Office of the Governor and the Office of the Lieutenant Governor, which could be filled without regard to chapter 76, Hawaii Revised Statutes, by the Governor and the Lieutenant Governor, respectively.

In addition to being ambiguous in several respects, i.e. impliedly repealing a part of section 28-11(b), Hawaii Revised Statutes, including seemingly redundant provisions, adding sections to the Hawaii Revised Statutes which appear to be surplusage in light of other general transfer of functions and personnel provisions of the bill, and lack of clarity as to who between the Department of the Attorney General and the Judiciary will be required to provide security services for the courts while the Office of the Sheriff is subject to the supervision of the Attorney General, Senate Bill No. 1068 imposes extreme administrative burdens upon the Department of the Attorney General and the Judiciary without any particular financial or staff support or assistance.

It is clear from the accompanying committee reports that the Legislature expects the Attorney General to actively supervise and control the management and operation of the Sheriff's Office while it is a part of the Department of the Attorney General, albeit for only a limited period of time. This bill makes the Attorney General responsible for the Office of the Sheriff to 'allow the legislature to review the effect of [the] legislation and find a permanent placement for the sheriff's office,' without any additional resources to assist the Attorney General in fulfilling this increased responsibility.

Throughout the legislative session, the Attorney General and other members of my Administration testified against allocating functions to the Department of the Attorney General which would distract and hinder it from improving its legal representation of the State.

I cannot help concluding that the additional responsibilities may seriously detract from the Attorney General's primary mission.

The purpose of Senate Bill No. 583 is to amend section 143-19, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to allow the respective counties to receive fifty percent of all penalties paid for dog license and control violations as partial compensation for the expenses incurred by the counties in enforcing chapter 143, which is entitled, 'Dogs: Licenses and Regulations.'

This bill would put into place an allocation of revenue which would not be cost effective. Currently, it is estimated that the annual revenue from dog license and control violations is \$21,000. It would cost considerably more to implement the revenue sharing called for by the bill. The bill is silent as to whether it is the judiciary or the executive branch which is to be responsible for making the disbursements to the county. If it is the latter, the funds would be deposited in the general fund of the State and would have to be appropriated annually to the counties and be counted toward the expenditure ceiling. It would be more efficient if the law could be read to authorize the judiciary to make the payments to the counties. But even under such an interpretation, the revenue sharing would not be cost effective. A special accounting mechanism would be required to administer the bill and it would require between six to eight months to modify the judiciary's accounting system in order to capture data necessary to make accurate disbursements to the counties.

Moreover, I have appointed a task force to study the issues of State and county responsibilities in order to allocate functions on a rational and efficient basis. I believe the revenue allocation made by Senate Bill No. 583 should be deferred so that the subject matter of the bill may be considered by the task force.

The purpose of Senate Bill No. 1176 is to permit the Board of Education, the employer of teachers, and the exclusive representative of teachers to negotiate matters relating to the classification and salary ranges of teachers.

Under our present collective bargaining in public employment law, chapter 89, Hawaii Revised Statutes, matters relating to classification and reclassification, and the

salary ranges for positions included in collective bargaining are not subjects which may be negotiated by the exclusive representatives of employees and their employers. This bill would carve out a limited exception to this prohibition. By its provisions, teachers, through their exclusive representative, could require their employer, the Board of Education, to relinquish what has been a management prerogative and negotiate with them on matters relating to these subjects.

Because the bill and its accompanying legislative committee reports do not elaborate or provide a basis for the exception from the collective bargaining limitation which teachers will enjoy, some question as to the bill's constitutionality vis-a-vis the equal protection clauses of the state and federal constitutions may arise. Although distinctions clearly may be made amongst persons who are similarly situated without violating equal protection, under the circumstances presented by this bill, it is difficult for me to understand the necessity for the exception which this bill makes. The stated underlying policies of our public sector collective bargaining law is 'to promote harmonious and cooperative relations between government and its employees and to protect the public by assuring effective and orderly operations of government.' I am not convinced that the exception for teachers which this bill makes is conducive to achieving that desired harmony and cooperation.

Imposition of progressive discipline usually requires more than the normal six months of probation, which each civil service employee must initially satisfactorily serve. Since House Bill No. 367 is applicable to all civil service employees, including probationary employees, these probationary employees would gain tenure simply because under the progressive discipline principle, the probationary period would expire. This would unduly restrict an appointing authority from justifiably dismissing a probationary employee, and render the existing distinction between probationary employees and members of the civil service meaningless. There would be no purpose for the statutorily fixed probation period specified in section 76-27, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

In concept, House Bill No. 421 appears as a cost/time effective mechanism by which all deeds and instruments are recorded in the Bureau of Conveyances. On the contrary, the identification of this "parcel identifier system" will, in essence, require a substantial amount of modification to the presently used data entry system. It is anticipated that such modification will require a substantial amount of moneys (no moneys were appropriated in this bill). It should be noted that tax map key numbers are subject to constant change due to subdivisions and consolidations. As a result, these "numbers" would have to be correspondingly updated, substantially increasing the workload of not only the Bureau of Conveyances but also all county real property tax offices.

Further, this bill fails to address whether or not those documents which have been filed since 1843 with the Bureau would be subject to implementation of a tax map key number.

I believe that it would be in the best interest of the people of the State of Hawaii that this bill not be adopted at this time.

The stated purpose of House Bill No. 380 is to provide an administrative procedure by which any person may appeal a determination that an environmental impact statement (EIS) is or is not required, as an alternative to seeking judicial appeal.

It appears to be the Legislature's understanding that the only means, presently, of appealing a determination that an EIS is or is not required is by resort to judicial appeal. Contrary to such understanding, each agency is required to environmentally assess projects proposed to it as a part of the agency's permit procedures. Administrative appeals can be taken in accordance with each agency's administrative appeal procedures, and then appealed judicially as provided in chapter 91, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

This bill engenders vagueness and ambiguity, as it is uncertain whether, and to what extent, an appeal to the Environmental Council is in lieu of or in addition to these existing agency appeal procedures.

Reference to 'judicial appeal under section 343-7,' Hawaii Revised Statutes, causes uncertainty. Section 343-7 is a statutes of limitations which limits the filing of legal actions concerning the determination that an EIS is or is not required to sixty days—it is not an appeal process per se. Section 343-7 can be considered a judicial appeal process only to the extent that such a legal action, concerning the determination that an EIS is

or is not required, would require the court to consider the administrative actions.

In addition, the bill may adversely affect the independent functioning of some agencies. It grants the Environmental Council unwarranted 'veto' power over other agencies. Further, under current law, some agencies must act on permit applications within a statutory prescribed time period. Despite the 30 day limitation placed in this version of this bill, it is nonetheless a time consuming process and this appeal could still endanger the ability of these agencies to act on permit applications within the statutorily prescribed time constraints, allowing permits to be granted without proper agency review merely as the result of lapse of time. This bill thus presents the potential disadvantages of multiple time consuming and expensive appeals.

However, neither the bill nor the pertinent legislative committee reports mention the intended consequences of a failure to identify the preparer of a will. The silence as to the consequences of the failure to identify the preparer of a will may result in wills being contested merely because the preparer failed to affix the required information. If the will is deemed invalid, the testator's intentions and dispositions will be frustrated by a technical requirement that has nothing to do with the substantive content of the will.

In view of the possible harsh consequences that could result from the failure to affix the required information about the preparer of a will, I believe that the bill should have expressly provided for the possible violation of the new requirements imposed by this bill. Preferably, the preparer of the will, not the testator, should suffer the consequences of a violation of the new requirements.

Further, by operation this bill would reach the anomalous result of entitling deceased persons to a pensioner's bonus, a result clearly unintended by the Legislature, and one that could result in a significant financial impact to the State of Hawaii.

In light of these discrepancies, and despite the worthy purpose of this bill, I have no choice but to return Senate Bill No. 1367 without my approval.

There are two problems with this bill. The first problem is a drafting error. Section 3 of the bill states that section 351-32, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended, to read as set forth, but the number and title of section 351-31 are set forth with the body of section 351-32. Although section 351-32 is technically amended to read as set forth with the wrong section number and title, the substantive amendments are clearly set forth.

The second problem with the bill is more substantive. Section 3 of the bills adds the crimes of negligent homicide in the first and second degrees to the list of crimes for which compensation may be paid. These crimes are defines in section 707-703(1) and 707-704(1), Hawaii Revised Statutes, as the killing of another person 'by the operation of a vehicle' in negligent or simply negligent manner.

The bill does not expressly repeal section 351-32(b), which provides as follows:

(b) For the purposes of this part, the operation of a motor vehicle, boat, or aircraft that results in an injury or death shall not constitute a crime, unless the injuries were intentionally inflicted through the use of such vehicle, boat, or aircraft.

The addition of negligent homicide is irreconcilable with the provision that operation of a motor vehicle, boat, or aircraft that results in injury or death is not a crime for the purposes of part III of chapter 351. The use of a vehicle is a necessary element of negligent homicide.

Furthermore, the addition of negligent homicide will be a great burden on the time and budget of the Criminal Injuries Compensation Commission. This will complicate the concept of compensating innocent victims of crimes with the mass problems created by automobile accidents and personal injury litigation. Since there is usually no-fault insurance available in excess of the \$10,000 limit on the Commission's awards, there does not appear to be a need to provide the relief of a Commission award.

The purpose of Senate Bill No. 767 is to specify that service as a circuit court or higher court judge or justice is a minimum qualification or a prerequisite for serving as the Administrative Director of the Courts.

Section 6 of Article VI of the State Constitution establishes the Office of the Administrative Director of the Courts. The section provides:

The chief justice of the supreme court shall be the administrative head of the courts. The chief justice may assign judges from one circuit to another for temporary service. With the approval of the supreme court, the chief justice shall appoint an administrative director to serve at the chief justice's pleasure.

The constitutional history to Section 6 indicates that drafters of our Constitution created the Office of Administrative Director of the Courts to assist the Chief Justice in discharging his duties as the head of a unified court system. It reiterates that the Administrative Director is to be appointed by the Chief Justice, and serve at the Chief Justice's pleasure. It also specifies that '[n]o attempt is made to define the duties of the administrative director since those are well-understood by the courts.' Standing Committee Report No. 37, I Proceedings of the Constitutional Convention of Hawaii 173-75 (1950).

Substantial authority established by the courts exists to support the proposition that a legislature, unless expressly authorized to do so, has no power to require additional or different qualifications for a constitutionally established office. Although Hawaii's Constitution does not itself specify the qualifications for the Office of the Administrative Director of the Courts which it establishes, nor specifically precludes the Legislature from enacting such qualifications, the constitutional history does suggest that the courts, not the Legislature, should set those qualifications.

An accompanying committee report indicates that this bill was passed by the Legislature to implement a recommendation included at pages 3 and 4 of the executive summary to the report of the consultants to the Hawaii Commission on Judicial Administration, dated March 20, 1986, which had been commissioned by the Citizens' Panel on Judicial Administration in the State of Hawaii. In its report, also dated March 20, 1986, the Citizen's Panel reiterated the consultants' recommendation, and also recommended the immediate appointment of a former circuit or higher court judge or justice to serve as Administrative Director of the Courts while legislation to statutorily effect that result was formulated. The consultants to the Citizens' Panel were recommended to the panel by the Institute of Judicial Administration, a nonprofit corporation founded in 1952 which has an established international reputation for providing assistance in areas relating to judicial administration, modernization, reform, and education.

It is not evident from the reports which were furnished to the Judiciary and the Legislature whether the constitutional concern outline above was considered in formulating the particular recommendation which this bill seeks to implement. Although a rationale to support the bill's constitutionality could probably be advanced, in my opinion, enactment of this bill would do violence to the basic doctrine of separation of powers underlying our State Constitution.

The stated purpose of this bill is to establish a one-gallon limit for the taking of sand, coral, or other beach materials for personal use, to permit the State or counties to undertake sand mining for the replenishment of public beaches, to eliminate state environmental projects in which governmental agencies clear sand from the mouths of drainage and stream channels, to prohibit the taking of sand and other materials from the Hakipu'u area, and to clarify the jurisdictional authority of the county governments within the shoreline setback area.

I concur with the purpose of House Bill No. 254, to clarify the jurisdiction between county agencies and the DLNR as it relates to the taking of sand, coral or coral rubble, rocks, soil or other beach or marine deposits from the shoreline area. The idea of clarifying the allowed exemptions for the taking of these materials as specified in section 1 of the bill is desirable. Prohibiting the taking of these materials seaward of the shoreline except after obtaining permit authorized under section 183-41 is also reasonable.

In section 3 of the bill, however, chapter 188 is revised to prohibit the taking of live coral in water less than 150 in depth except with a permit authorized under section 187A-6 and 183-41. It appears that only by satisfying both sections 183-41 and 187A-6 can a permit be obtained for dredging waters of less than 150 feet in depth. Section 187A-6 only allows for permits for taking aquatic life for scientific, educational or propagation purposes. Since live coral frequently occurs in close proximity to the other materials covered in

this bill, the bill seems to preclude any dredging water less than 150 feet in depth except for scientific, educational or propagation purposes. This is an unreasonable prohibition that could greatly hinder the maintenance, improvement or development of the state's maritime facilities. This prohibition appears to be an unintended consequence of this bill.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 4, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Elections.'

The stated purpose of House Bill No. 4 is to create the criminal offense of 'election smearing' and to establish a 'Fair Campaign Practices Commission.'

The concept of a Fair Campaign Practices Commission is a sound one. The very existence of such a body would be a significant deterrent to unethical, misleading, inappropriate and unfair tactics utilized in a campaign, and would thus be beneficial to the election process. Voters have the right not to be exposed to falsehoods and unwarranted personal attacks on candidates clouding the true issues during a campaign. It should be the goal of both the government and the candidates to have elections decided on the merits and on nothing else.

To be effective, a Fair Campaign Practices Commission must be able to act quickly in reaching decisions on complaints of unfair campaign tactics. To achieve this, the Commission must be able to gather information and testimony so a decision can be reached in time to benefit the election process. This is what is envisioned in Section 3 of House Bill No. 4. The apparent intent is that the Commission would act swiftly, uninhibited by the normal judicial process, and disclose its results.

As noble as the intent of House Bill No. 4 is, however, the inclusion of Section 1 criminalizing 'Election Smearing' creates a serious and troublesome flaw. The balance between free speech and the candidates' rights is a delicate one. On the one hand, hard fought campaigns and open debate and comment are good for the election process. On the other hand, protection must be afforded the candidates so that the issues do not become clouded for the voter. Section 1 of House Bill No. 4, while attempting to afford protection to candidates through the fear of criminal penalties, could act to seriously inhibit free and frank campaigning, and thus would defeat the overall objective of having the voters make their decisions on all relevant facts.

In the original version of the bill submitted by the Lieutenant Governor, there were no criminal penalties. The intent was that the mere disclosure that a campaign tactic was found to have been unfair would be a sufficient deterrent, and that there would be no chilling effect on free and open speech. I agree.

Criminalizing an unfair campaign statement or tactic could detrimentally affect the election process. With the possibility of criminal liability, information would probably be impossible to get by the Commission, and any information the Commission could get would most certainly not be with the speed necessary for the Commission to act effectively. Moreover, from the prosecution standpoint, involvement by the Commission could possibly, and perhaps probably jeopardize successful prosecution where witnesses may not have been afforded appropriate constitutional protections during the investigation by the Commission. Although the two sections of this bill were undoubtedly designed to compliment each other, the fact is they will work at cross purposes. The right of free speech and the need for open campaigning must outweigh any benefit that would be derived from creating a new crime of "election smearing".

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 4 without my approval.

The purpose of Senate Bill No. 559 is to grant long-term leases to current permittees of state agricultural land (other than agricultural park lands) in Waimanalo without recourse to public auction so long as the permittee qualifies as a bona fide farmer under section 171-68(a)(2)(3), Hawaii Revised Statutes.

While concerns of permittees regarding the uncertainty of their status on state agricultural land in Waimanalo is certainly understandable, this bill is not the proper remedy. There are clearly compelling arguments that the permittees should be afforded a remedy, but a remedy such as the one sought by this bill should be made on a statewide, and not a piecemeal, basis.

In addition, this bill allows lessees to renegotiate existing leases contrary to existing law. Again, while the concerns of the present lessees is understandable, the remedy sought in this bill is piecemeal and unsound from the perspective of statewide policy.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 1013, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Material and Labor Used on Public Works.'

The purpose of this bill is to amend section 507-17, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to require all persons who furnish labor or material for a public works project without an express or implied contract with the general contractor of the project and have not been paid, to provide written notice to the general contractor within ninety days of the date that the labor or material was last furnished.

The concern which prompted the Legislature's passage of this measure is a real one. General contractors who in good faith pay their subcontractors are oftentimes required to pay the same amount a second time when it turns out the subcontractor has not paid its suppliers. The unfairness of this situation is most obvious, and often occasioned because the contractor has no knowledge of whether the subcontractor has properly paid a supplier. It is the lack of knowledge that this bill seeks a remedy, and in turn remedy the unfair results that often occur.

However, the unpaid supplier is also an innocent party in such a situation, oftentimes not paid and having to resort to a lawsuit against the delinquent subcontractor, the contractor, and the bond. In most situations, the supplier of materials is the least able to afford such litigation, and is also perhaps less sophisticated in business and legal matters than the others involved.

This bill appears to attach a condition precedent to a supplier's right to sue — the ninety day notice which the supplier must give to the general contractor of a public works project. Apparently, if this notice is not given, the supplier is left without legal remedy.

Unfortunately, this is just the type of extra step that could easily be overlooked by a small business, which would be least prepared to lose its legal rights to be paid. If this bill had mandated that either the general contractor or the subcontractor dealing with the supplier must inform the supplier of the ninety day notice requirement, I would have been inclined to approve this bill. However, this bill could result in severe injustice to small business because of its technical nature, and it could result in abuses to small businesses, those who are least able to afford such loss.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 371, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Collective Bargaining.'

There are three purposes of this bill. First, the bill amends section 89-6(c), Hawaii Revised Statutes, by changing the name of public employees bargaining unit 10 from 'non-professional' to 'institutional, health and correctional workers.' Second, the bill requires a hearing before the Hawaii Labor Relations Board for decertification petitions, filed on or after March 15, 1987. Currently, the Board's rules require a hearing on bargaining unit determination petitions, only if a Board investigation indicates a hearing is necessary. The hearing is intended to ensure that at least thirty percent of the unit sign the petition. Finally, the bill clarifies section 89-9(d), Hawaii Revised Statutes, to permit public sector collective bargaining on the procedures relating to promotions, transfers, suspensions, demotions, discharges, and other disciplinary actions and layoffs.

There are a number of serious problems with this bill. First, the amendment to section 89-7 does not differentiate between 'representation' and a 'decertification' election. The former involves a possible change in the bargaining unit representative. The latter involves an election to decide whether to have any union representation at all. There is no apparent reason to require a hearing for decertification petitions, but not for representation petitions. The committee reports do not help in determining whether these procedures are applicable to all types of elections.

Second, House Bill No. 371 provides only for the negotiation of procedures relating to layoffs, suspensions, demotions, discharges, and other disciplinary actions. However, paradoxically, Conference Committee Reports on this bill state that the committee sought to 'allow bargaining on the substance as well as procedures' relating not only to layoffs, suspensions, demotions, discharges, and other disciplinary actions, but examinations, hiring, and promotions as well. If the language of the conference committee reports were followed literally, it would imply that the Legislature intended to repeal these management rights, despite the bill's statutory language to the contrary. The problems very likely cannot be remedied by interpretation to the

satisfaction of all concerned. For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 371 without my approval.

approval, House Bill No. 2, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to the State Budget.'

The purpose of this bill is to appropriate funds for the fiscal biennium July 1, 1987, to June 30, 1989, for the operating expenditures of the various agencies in the executive branch of the State, other government programs, and capital improvement projects. While the bill as a whole has merit, I object to the following appropriations for the reasons indicated:

1. The \$22,000 portion of the general fund appropriation for the fiscal year 1987-88 for defense (DEF 110 on page 54) designated in section 228 of the bill (on page 154) to be expended for research and improvements to support and enhance the tsunami warning system, and requiring the counties to provide matching funds. To the extent that this constitutes a mandate to the counties pursuant to Section 5 of Article VIII of the State Constitution, this appropriation is unenforceable under section 306 of House Bill No. 2.

2. The \$575,000 portion (for fiscal year 1987-88) of the general fund appropriation for Grants-in-Aid to Counties (SUB 101 on page 64) designated in section 275 of the bill (on page 176) to be for the Maui Youth Theater. The expending agency or county responsible for disbursement of the funds for the Maui Youth Theater is not identified. Furthermore, the requirements of chapter 42, Hawaii Revised Statutes, have not been satisfied.

3. The \$50,000 portion (fiscal year 1987-88) and \$50,000 portion (fiscal year 1988-89) of Grants-in-Aid to Counties (SUB 101 on page 64) designated in section 277 of the bill (on page 176) to be expended by Oahu Neighborhood Housing Services, Inc. for operations. The expending agency has not been identified and cannot be assumed since SUB 101 includes all four counties of the State.

4. The \$20,000 portion (fiscal year 1987-88) of Grants-in-Aid to counties (SUB 101 on page 64) designated in section 278 on page 176 to be expended to develop and maintain a juvenile data collection/retrieval system for the County of Maui. The expending agency has not been identified and cannot be assumed since SUB 101 includes all four counties.

5. The following appropriations for purchases of service and grants-in-aid have not satisfied the requirements of chapter 42, Hawaii Revised Statutes:

(i) The \$250,000 portion of the general fund appropriation for fiscal year 1987-88 for performing and visual arts (AGS 881 on page 50) designated in section 212 of the bill (on page 149) to be expended for

grants-in-aid.

(ii) The \$100,000 portion of the general fund appropriation for fiscal year 1987-88 for performing and visual arts (AGS 881 on page 50) designated in section 212 of the bill (on page 149) to be expended for grants-in-aid.

(iii) The \$10,000 portion (fiscal year 1987-88) and the \$10,000 portion (fiscal year 1988-89) of the general fund appropriation for performing and visual arts (AGS 881 on page 50 designated in section 211 of the bill (on page 149) to be expended for purchase of service.

(iv) The \$78,204 portion (FY 1987-88) and \$82,114 portion (FY 1988-89) of the general fund appropriation for private housing development and ownership (SOC 225 on page 31) designated in section 94 of the bill (on page 103) to be expended for purchase of service for private housing development and ownership.

(v) The \$250,000 portion (FY 1987-88) and \$250,000 portion (FY 1988-89) of the general fund appropriation for services to individuals and families (SOC 111 on page 30) designated in section 91 of the bill (on page 102) to be expended for purchase of service.

(vi) The \$100,000 portion (FY 1987-88) and the \$100,000 portion (FY 1988-89) of the general fund appropriation for private housing development and ownership (SOC 225 on page 103) designated in section 94 of the bill (on page 103) to be expended for purchase of service.

(vii) The \$40,000 portion (FY 1987-88) and the \$40,000 portion (FY 1988-89) of the general fund appropriation for planning, program development and coordination of services for the elderly (GOV 602 on page 33) designated in section 102 of the bill (on page 106) to be expended for purchase of service.

(viii) The \$85,000 portion (FY 1987-88) and the \$85,000 portion (FY 1988-89) of the general fund appropriation for community based services for mental health (HTH 401 on page 26) designated in section 65 of the bill (on page 91) to be expended for purchase of service.

(ix) The \$150,000 portion (FY 1987-88) and the \$189,000 portion 9FY 1988-89) of the general fund appropriation for community based services for mental health (HTH 401 on page 26) designated in section 65 of the bill (on page 91) to be expended for purchase of service.

(x) The \$55,000 portion of the general fund appropriation for fiscal year 1987-88 for community based services for mental

health (HTH 401 on page 26) designated in section 65 of the bill (on page 91) to be expended for purchase of service.

(xi) The \$175,000 portion (FY 1987-88) and the \$175,000 portion (FY 1988-89) of the general fund appropriation for community based services for mental health (HTH 401 on page 26) designated in section 65 of the bill (on page 91) to be expended for purchase of service.

(xii) The \$66,400 portion (FY 1987-88) and the \$62,400 portion (FY 1988-89) of the general fund appropriation for health education (HTH 908 on page 29) designated in section 84 of the bill (on page 99) to be expended for purchase of service.

(xiii) The \$50,000 portion of the general fund appropriation for fiscal year 1987-88 for chronic diseases (HTH 151 on page 23) designated in section 54 of the bill (on page 89) to be expended for purchase of service.

(xiv) The \$41,334 portion of the general fund appropriation for fiscal year 1987-88 for office of community services (LBR 903 on page 12) designated in section 38 of the bill (on page 82) to be expended for grants-in-aid.

(xv) The \$42,000 portion (FY 1987-88) and the \$44,000 portion (FY 1988-89) portion of the general fund appropriation for office of community services (LBR 903 on page 12) designated in section 39 of the bill (on page 82) to be expended for purchase of service.

(xvi) The \$75,000 portion of the general fund appropriation for fiscal year 1987-88 for office of community services (LBR 903 on page 12) designated in section 38 of the bill (on page 82) to be expended for grants-in-aid.

(xvii) The \$100,000 portion (FY 1987-88) and the \$105,000 portion (FY 1988-89) of the general fund appropriation for office of community services (LBR 903 on page 12) designated in section 39 of the bill (on page 82) to be expended for purchase of service.

There may be appropriations to other organizations which do not satisfy the requirements of chapter 42. Funding allocations for these appropriations will be restricted and/or withheld, as appropriate, during the budget implementation should this be confirmed.

6. Sums for certain capital improvements projects listed in Part IV, section 280, of House Bill No. 2 were not included in the related appropriations in Part II of House Bill No. 2. These projects are described as follows:

(i) \$600,000 in fiscal year 1987-88 for

improvements to Puainako Extension Roadways and Saddle Road, Hawaii (page 226, lines 12-17) which was not appropriated under item 26 (TRN 511, page 17).

(ii) \$300,000 in fiscal year 1987-88 for Haleakala Highway (page 231, lines 5-8) which was not appropriated under item 27 (TRN 531, page 18).

(iii) \$300,000 in fiscal year 1987-88 for Mokulele Highway (page 231, lines 9-11) which was not appropriated under item 27 (TRN 531, page 18).

(iv) \$650,000 in fiscal year 1987-88 for X49 State Highways, Safety Improvements at various locations including drainage, Kauai (page 233, lines 13-20) which was not appropriated under item 30 (TRN 561, page 18).

7. Appropriations were made in section 280 of the bill for certain special-funded highway projects out of general obligation bond proceeds. This is an inappropriate use of general obligation debt. The projects inappropriately funded are described as follows:

(i) \$500,000 in fiscal year 1987-88 for Kamehameha Highway Improvements, Mililani Towards Waiawa (page 222, lines 5-10), currently appropriated under item 25 (TRN 501, page 17).

(ii) \$100,000 in fiscal year 1987-88 for Interstate H-1, Pearl City On-Ramp Acceleration Lane, Oahu (page 222, lines 11-16), currently appropriated under item 25 (TRN 501, page 17).

(iii) \$150,000 in fiscal year 1987-88 for Moanalua Road, vicinity of Waiua Interchange, Oahu (page 223, lines 5-9), currently appropriated under item 25 (TRN 501, page 17).

(iv) \$500,000 in fiscal year 1987-88 for Kamehameha Hwy, Lehua Avenue to Moanalua Road, Traffic Light Improvements (page 223, lines 10-14), currently appropriated under item 25 (TRN 501, page 17).

WHEREAS, certain appropriation items in House Bill No. 2 are unacceptable to the Governor of the State of Hawaii;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JOHN WAIHEE, Governor of the State of Hawaii, do hereby issue this proclamation, giving notice of my plan to return House Bill No. 2 to the Legislature with my objections, as indicated, to certain appropriation items listed therein, as provided by said Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii.

RULES OF THE SENATE
of the
FOURTEENTH LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII

The following Rules shall be the Rules of the Senate of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii.

PART I. ORGANIZATION, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

Rule 1. Organization

When the Senate convenes, the President or the Vice-President, in the absence of the President, shall call the Senate to order and appoint a Committee of three whose duty it shall be to immediately examine the credentials of the members-elect of the Senate. If from the Committee report, it shall appear that a majority of the credentials are in order, the Senate shall proceed to organize and shall appoint a Committee of three to wait upon a justice of the Supreme Court, an Intermediate Appellate Court judge or a Circuit Court judge to administer the oath of office required by the Constitution. Such proceedings need not be on the day of convening in the Senate. In the absence of the President or Vice-President the Senate may elect a temporary Presiding Officer by a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

Rule 2. Officers and Employees

(1) The officers of the Senate shall consist of a: President, Vice-President, Clerk, Assistant Clerk and Sergeant-at-Arms, each of whom shall be elected by a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) The President and Vice-President shall hold their respective offices in accordance with Title 3, Hawaii Revised Statutes. Other officers and employees shall hold their respective offices and positions at the pleasure of the Senate, but a majority vote of the members of the Senate shall be required to terminate the office held by any officer of the Senate.

(3) The Senate, by a majority vote, may authorize positions from time to time as may be deemed necessary.

Rule 3. The President

It shall be the duty of the President:

- (1) To open the meetings of the Senate by taking the Chair and calling for the invocation.
- (2) When a quorum is present, to call for the reading of the Journal of the preceding day.
- (3) To maintain order in the Senate Chamber and to require proper decorum on the part of the members.
- (4) To announce the business before the Senate in the order prescribed by the Rules.
- (5) To receive and submit all matters properly brought before the Senate by the members, to call for votes upon the same and announce the results.
- (6) To receive all communications and present them to the Senate and to refer all bills and other matters to the appropriate standing committees.
- (7) To appoint all committees unless otherwise determined by the Senate.
- (8) To authenticate by signature, all acts and doings of the Senate which require authentication.
- (9) To make known rules of order when so requested and, subject to an appeal to the Senate, to decide all questions of order.

(10) To issue warrants, when so directed by the Senate, to carry into effect its orders in the arrest of offenders, the summoning of witnesses, or other orders of the Senate.

(11) To decide and announce the result of any vote taken.

(12) To do and perform such other duties as are required by law or by these rules or such as may properly pertain to such office.

(13) To clear the Senate Chamber of all persons, except its members and designated persons if there is a disturbance or disorderly conduct, or on motion duly adopted.

(14) To control and have direction of the rooms, desks, passages, stairways, corridors, balconies, in and about the building set apart for the use of the Senate and all public property of the Senate. The President shall see that all officers of the Senate perform their respective duties, and may assign places to visitors and reporters. The President may admit stenographers or other reporters, wishing to take down the debates, and assign them such places to effect their object as shall not interfere with the convenience of the Senate.

(15) To establish final dates for action on legislation, including, though not limited to the final date for introducing bills, the dates for the mandatory recess pursuant to Article III, Section 12, of the Constitution, the final date for third reading of Senate Bills, the final date for third reading of House Bills, the final date for approving Conference Committee agreements and drafts of bills, the final date for final reading of the General Appropriations Bill, and the final date for final reading of the Supplemental Appropriations Bill. The President shall coordinate the date for introducing bills and may coordinate with the Speaker of the House to establish the other final dates.

(16) To promulgate an administrative and financial manual of guides, the purpose of which is to establish uniformity in administrative practices and to ensure compliance with Senate Policies.

(17) To mediate and resolve differences between two or more standing committees on the same bill.

Rule 4. The Vice-President

In the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall exercise all the duties and powers of the President.

Rule 5. President Pro Tempore

(1) In case the President and Vice-President shall be absent at the hour to which the Senate had adjourned, the member of the majority party having the longest tenure in the Senate shall preside until a President pro tempore be chosen. If two or more members are equally qualified to preside, the eldest qualified member shall preside.

(2) The President pro tempore shall be invested with all of the powers and shall perform all the duties of the President. Whenever the President pro tempore is required to sign a bill or other instrument, the Clerk shall attach to such bill or other instrument a certificate stating that such President pro tempore was duly elected and is authorized to so sign.

Rule 6. The Clerk

It shall be the duty of the Clerk:

(1) To have charge of all records of the Senate and be responsible for the same. At no time shall the Clerk permit original documents to be withdrawn from the Clerk's keeping unless ordered by the Senate.

(2) To make a concise and complete memorandum of all petitions, motions, resolutions, amendments and other matters brought before the Senate. Such memoranda shall state the nature of the matter and the name of the introducer, and the date and day of the session on which the Senate considered the matter. The memoranda, together with other matters ordered to be placed therein, shall constitute the Journal, a copy of which shall be placed on the desk of each member on the following session day or as soon as practicable. The Journal of each day shall be read the following day, immediately after the invocation. When such Journal is

approved by vote of the Senate, it shall be entered by the Clerk in a book entitled "Journal of the Senate. Session of ____." (Giving the Year).

(3) Unless otherwise directed by the Senate, to read all bills, resolutions and other matters (if so required) to the Senate.

(4) To forward at once all letters, messages, communications and other matters to the proper parties.

(5) To immediately deliver to the Chairman of the appropriate committee all petitions, resolutions, bills or other matters duly referred to such committee.

(6) To see that all bills and resolutions are properly engrossed and are correct and true as finally acted upon by the Senate.

(7) To draw such drafts on the state general fund for expenses of the session as shall be authorized by the Senate and approved by the Committee on Legislative Management.

(8) To pay all bills and accounts as shall be approved by the Committee on Legislative Management, or ordered by the Senate, and no others.

(9) To be responsible for the acquisition and distribution of all of the property of the Senate.

(10) To note all questions of order with the decision thereon and collect the same and append them to the Senate Journal at the close of the session.

(11) To perform all other clerical duties and functions pertaining to the Office of the Clerk and as the Senate from time to time shall direct. The Clerk shall post the order of business in writing in a conspicuous place each day.

Rule 7. Assistant Clerk

The Assistant Clerk shall assist the Clerk in the performance of all duties and attend to such other duties as may be required when so directed by the President. In the absence of the Clerk, the Assistant Clerk shall perform all duties of the Clerk.

Rule 8. Invocation

Each day's sitting of the Senate shall open with an invocation.

Rule 9. Sergeant-at-Arms

It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to attend the Senate on every day of meeting; to maintain order among those present as spectators; to give notice to the Presiding Officer of the attendance of any person with communications or otherwise; to supervise the distribution of incidentals which require distribution among the members; to supervise, subject to the control of the President, the Senate Messengers; to attend upon committees if so requested; to serve all orders to process directed by the President or Senate; to make all required arrests of members or other persons, and to retain the same in custody; to have the charge and responsibility for the postal requirements of the Senate; and generally to execute all of the requirements of the President of the Senate.

Rule 10. Responsibility of Officers and Employees

The employees shall perform such duties as may be assigned by the President or prescribed by the Senate.

All officers and employees of the Senate shall be directly answerable to the President, and shall obey and perform all the President's orders and directions, subject to revision by the Senate. If required by the President, any officer or employee shall give a bond for the faithful performance of duties.

An oath of office shall be administered to each officer.

Rule 11. Pay of Members, Officers and Employees

(1) Each member of the Senate, upon being elected or appointed to office, shall receive as compensation such salary as prescribed pursuant to Article III, Section 9, of the State Constitution.

(2) The officers, except the President and Vice-President, and the employees shall receive compensation as the Senate shall fix.

PART II. COMMITTEES**Rule 12. Committees: Types and Composition**

(1) **Standing Committees:** The membership of each Standing Committee and the respective Chairman and Vice-Chairman thereof shall be appointed by the President, subject to action by the Senate. The majority and minority parties shall be represented on all Standing Committees on such basis as prescribed by the Senate; provided that such basis be at least that of proportional representation. The nomination of the minority party members to all Standing Committees shall be made by the minority party.

(2) **Special Committees** shall consist of not less than three members each, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the specific matter referred. The Senate may establish investigative committees pursuant to chapter 21, Hawaii Revised Statutes; such committees shall have such powers and be bound by such conditions as may be provided by law or by these Rules.

(3) **Conference Committees** shall consist of not less than three members each, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the matter referred.

(4) **The Committee of the Whole Senate.**

Rule 13. Committee Chairman and Vice-Chairman

The first person named on the Committee shall be Chairman; the second member named shall be Vice-Chairman. The Chairman shall call meetings and preside.

Rule 14. Committees: Control and Excuse from Membership

Committees shall be under the control of and subject to the orders of the Senate, and shall faithfully carry out such orders. Any member may be excused from serving on any committee at the time of appointment, if such member is a member of four other committees.

Rule 15. Standing Committees

Standing Committees shall be appointed for each major subject matter area at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as possible, to serve during the Fourteenth Legislature. The major subject matter areas and the Standing Committees therefor shall be as follows:

EDUCATION AND CULTURE

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to promote intellectual development and cultural enrichment of the community. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (1) Committee on Culture, Arts and Historic Preservation, whose scope shall be those programs relating to culture, arts and historic site development and protection.
- (2) Committee on Education, whose scope shall be those programs relating to lower education, continuing education and public libraries.

- (3) Committee on Higher Education, whose scope shall be those programs relating to the University of Hawaii and the community colleges.

HEALTH

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to improve the physical and mental health of the people. The Standing Committee for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (4) Committee on Health, whose scope shall be those programs relating to general health, maternal and child care, communicable diseases, dental health, medical and hospital services, mental health, mental retardation and hospitals.

HUMAN AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to ensure adequate income, housing and employment for individuals and families, to encourage the development and growth of industry, to promote improved employment conditions for government employees and to promote, enhance and conserve energy and energy-related natural resources. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (5) Committee on Agriculture, Energy and Ocean Resources, whose scope shall be those programs relating to agriculture, water resources for agricultural use, aquaculture, energy development, conservation and utilization; and marine and ocean resource development.
- (6) Committee on Business Development and Pacific Relations, whose scope shall be those programs relating to industrial and product promotion, new industry development, capital formation, financial and technical assistance to business, telecommunications and the development and promotion of Hawaii's relations with the Pacific Region.
- (7) Committee on Housing, Hawaiian Programs and Natural Resources, whose scope shall be those programs relating to housing, urban development; Hawaiian Homes and the Office of Hawaiian Affairs and the utilization of land and water resources.
- (8) Committee on Human Services, whose scope shall be those programs relating to financial assistance, to the promotion and general well-being of Hawaii's youth and elderly population, vocational rehabilitation and social welfare services.
- (9) Committee on Labor and Employment, whose scope shall be those programs relating to employment opportunities, labor-management relations, and to those programs relating to public employment concerning employee pay and benefits, employee recruitment, classification and training, career development, employee performance, employment conditions, standards of conduct for public employees and collective bargaining.
- (10) Committee on Planning and Environment, whose scope shall be those programs relating to state planning, environmental quality control and protection, environmental health and coastal zone management.
- (11) Committee on Public Utilities, whose scope shall be those programs relating to the regulation of public utilities and carriers under the jurisdiction of the Public Utilities Commission.
- (12) Committee on Tourism and Recreation, whose scope shall be those programs relating to tourism, outdoor recreation, state parks, recreational boating and Aloha Stadium.

HUMAN RIGHTS AND JUSTICE

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to safeguard individual and property rights, protect consumers from fraudulent and deceptive practices, promote public safety and improve the conduct of business affairs. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (13) Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, whose scope shall be those programs relating to the protection of the consuming public, business and trade regulation, regulation of financial institutions, insurance regulation and professional and occupational regulation.
- (14) Committee on Corrections, whose scope shall be those programs relating to adult and juvenile corrections and the functions and activities contained within the Correctional Master Plan, public safety, the construction of correctional facilities and the management of such programs. The scope shall also include programs relating to parole, adult and juvenile community correctional services, half-way houses, rehabilitation, and other pertinent matters.
- (15) Committee on Judiciary, whose scope shall be those programs relating to courts, crime prevention and control, criminal code revisions, the rules of the Senate, judicial and legal questions, constitutional matters, programs of the Attorney General and of the Judiciary, individual rights and civil liberties, Public Defender and other pertinent matters referred to it by the Senate. In the event of a contest, it shall investigate and report upon the certificates of election of members. The committee shall consider all petitions and other matters relating to elections and returns referred to it by the Senate and report thereon.

GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS AND INTERGOVERNMENTAL RELATIONS

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to promote government efficiency and effective cooperation and coordination among the various levels of government. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (16) Committee on Government Operations, whose scope shall be those programs relating to government personal property management, archives, government communications, relations among the federal, state and county governments, matters of primary concern to particular counties and the promotion of efficiency and economy in government.
- (17) Committee on Military and Civil Defense, whose scope shall be those programs relating to military and civil defense.

TRANSPORTATION

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to facilitate the physical movement of people and goods into and from the State and from place to place within the State. The Standing Committee for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (18) Committee on Transportation, whose scope shall be those programs relating to air, water and surface transportation.

LEGISLATIVE SUPPORT

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to provide to the legislature effective support for the accomplishment of legislative objectives and to promote understanding of the legislative process. The Standing Committee for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (19) Committee on Legislative Management, whose scope shall be those programs relating to the establishment and operations of legislative support agencies, such as the Office of the Legislative Auditor, the Ombudsman and the Legislative Reference Bureau.

FINANCIAL PLANNING AND MANAGEMENT

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to produce the efficient, effective, economical and equitable acquisition and utilization of financial resources. The Standing Committee for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (20) Committee on Ways and Means, whose scope shall be those programs relating to overall state financing policies, including taxation and other revenues and cash and debt management and statewide implementation of planning, programming, budgeting and evaluation.

Rule 16. Standing Committees: General Responsibility

It shall be the duty of each Standing Committee to conduct systematic review of those portions of the state budget, program and financial plans, and variance reports dealing with, and to consider all laws, bills, resolutions, petitions, reports and other matters relating to, those programs over which the committee has responsibility.

It shall examine such portions of the Executive Budget, the General Appropriations Bill and the Supplemental Appropriations Bill relating to the programs over which it has responsibility, and it shall recommend the programs and the levels of program expenditure to be included in the General Appropriations Bill or Supplemental Appropriations Bill. The level of expenditure, in the aggregate, for any program area shall be consistent with the expenditure allocation established for that program area by the Standing Committee on Ways and Means, which shall make the final recommendation to the Senate.

On other bills referred to it by the President, the committee shall determine objectives, make program recommendations and, where appropriate, make expenditure recommendations. On bills that have been referred by the President to more than one committee, subsequent referral committees shall make no substantive change without prior written notice of such change to the first referral committee and consultation and coordination with that committee, via its chairman, prior to the transmittal of the amended bill and committee report to the Clerk of the Senate for floor action. For those bills which require appropriations, the committee shall make expenditure recommendations consistent with the expenditure allocations established for the bills by the Standing Committee on Ways and Means, which shall make the final recommendation to the Senate, after consultation and coordination with the chairman of the subject matter committee.

It shall also be the duty of each Standing Committee to review the implementation of those programs over which the committee has responsibility. In its review, it shall determine the extent to which program objectives are being accomplished and legislative policies executed, recommend the study of program issues and the conduct of program analysis. It shall recommend amendments to appropriation acts and such policies as may be appropriate to improve the planning, programming, budgeting, implementation and evaluation of programs to the Standing Committee on Ways and Means, which shall make the final recommendation to the Senate.

Rule 17. Committee on Ways and Means: Special Responsibility

It shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means, in considering the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill, to determine for each fiscal year of the biennium the appropriate level of total expenditures and the level of expenditures for program areas. The committee shall inform each Standing Committee of the allocations made to each program area over which the Standing Committee is responsible for budget and program review. The Committee on Ways and Means shall receive the program expenditure recommendations of the Standing Committee and shall review the recommendations to determine that, in the aggregate, the expenditure recommendations are consistent with the allocations made to the program area. In determining the allocation to be made to a program area and in reviewing the recommendations of the Standing Committee, the Committee on Ways and Means shall invite the participation of the chairman of the Standing Committee responsible for the program area. After review of the recommendations of the Standing Committees, the Committee on Ways and Means shall be responsible for preparing the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill in a form appropriate for consideration by the Senate.

To the extent practicable, the Committee on Ways and Means shall arrange to make available to members of the Senate information regarding the contents of the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill during the 48-hour period prior to the passage of such bills on third and final reading.

In all other bills requiring appropriations, it shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means to inform the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates of the amount and type of financial resources available, and it shall review the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee to determine that the

recommendation is consistent with the resources available. In determining the amount and type of resources available for a bill requiring an appropriation and in reviewing the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee, the Committee on Ways and Means shall invite the participation of the chairman of the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates.

Rule 18. Committee on Legislative Management: Special Responsibility

The Committee on Legislative Management shall:

(1) Make recommendations to the President on the procedures and manner in which the administrative and personnel operations of the Senate should be conducted.

(2) Make recommendations on the expenses to be included in the appropriations bills providing for the expenses of the Legislature and procedures to ensure that the expenses of the Senate are in accordance with the appropriation acts providing therefor.

For administrative purposes, the committee may authorize the chairman to perform such duties on its behalf as it may deem appropriate.

Rule 19. Meetings of Committees

Meetings, including decision-making sessions, of Standing Committees shall be public provided that meetings in executive session may be allowed in such exceptional circumstances when committee discussion could unfairly damage the reputation of individuals or where there is a legal question concerning a bill. Notice of such meetings and decision-making sessions shall be publicly posted at least 48 hours prior to such meetings provided that the notice may be waived with the approval of the President upon good cause shown.

No committee shall sit during the time when the Senate is actually in session without first securing the approval of the President, except Conference Committees which may sit at any time.

As practicable, committees shall schedule their meetings at times and at places as are convenient for attendance by the general public, and in coordination with other committees of the House or Senate, shall endeavor to hold joint meetings and public hearings on matters of mutual interest.

The meetings of the Conference Committee shall be conducted as agreed upon by the members of the Conference Committee. Conference Committee meetings and decision-making sessions shall be public. Public notice of Conference Committee meetings shall be given to the extent practicable.

Rule 20. Committee Reports

(1) The Standing Committees shall report from time to time upon all matters referred to them.

(2) Special Committees shall report upon matters referred to them within the time permitted in the appointment of the Special Committee unless further time is given by vote of the Senate.

(3) A Conference Committee shall not report upon the matter referred unless a majority of the members appointed by the President have concurred in the report.

Rule 21. Committees: Factfinding and Content of Reports

(1) Whenever any matter shall be referred to a committee it shall be the duty of the committee to make diligent inquiry into all of the facts and circumstances connected with the matter. If necessary, witnesses shall be summoned or subpoenaed, and everything shall be done to bring all facts pertaining to the matter before the Senate in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 21 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes. The President may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21, relating to the issuance of subpoenas, and the President, committee chairmen and other duly delegated members of the Senate may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21 aforesaid, relating to the administering of oaths, and the

compelling of witnesses who have been subpoenaed to testify. All committee meetings held on matters referred to it by the Senate shall be open to the public unless otherwise ordered by the Senate or otherwise provided by these Rules.

(2) The report of the committee shall state findings of fact and conclusions based thereon, together with a distinct recommendation as to the disposal of that matter.

(3) A report upon a bill shall state clearly the amendments, if any, proposed. If a substitute bill for one or more referred to the committee shall be reported, such substitute bill shall agree with the subject of the bill or bills returned to the Senate.

(4) Whenever a committee fails to agree, the majority shall report and it shall be the report of the committee. The minority may report or simply write upon the report of the majority the words "I (or we) do not concur," signing the same. The final vote of each member of a committee upon any matter referred to it shall be recorded in the records of the committee.

Rule 22. Committee of the Whole

(1) The Senate from time to time may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole. Whenever any matter shall be referred to such committee upon the adoption of a motion to that effect, the President shall call some member to take the Chair (unless the Senate shall nominate a chairman), which being done, the Senate then shall be in committee.

(2) The Clerk of the Senate shall act as Clerk of the Committee of the Whole without extra compensation, and shall make a careful record of the proceedings, which shall be filed as one of the records of the Senate.

(3) The committee, on motion, may rise and ask leave to sit at any future time.

(4) When a bill shall be referred to the Committee of the Whole, the bill shall be first read throughout by the Clerk, and then again read and debated by sections, leaving the preamble to be the last but all amendments, noting the page and line, shall be duly entered by the Clerk on a separate paper, as the same shall be agreed to by the committee, and so reported. When a bill is ordered into Committee of the Whole, such order may dispense with the reading of the whole bill before considering it section by section.

(5) In Committee of the Whole, the rules of procedure in the Senate shall be observed except that any member may speak more than once on the same subject, but no person shall speak a second or further time until others desiring to speak shall have had an opportunity, nor shall the motion for the previous question be allowed. A time limit for debate may be fixed by vote.

PART III. SESSIONS; ATTENDANCE; NOMINATIONS

Rule 23. Meetings

(1) The Senate shall meet for the transaction of public business every day, except Saturdays, Sundays, legal holidays and such other days as the Senate shall designate by motion or resolution duly adopted and entered in the Journal.

(2) The regular hour of meetings of the Senate is established at ten o'clock a.m. but the hour of meeting, recess and adjournment for any day may be such as the Senate, by motion, shall decide from time to time.

Rule 24. Attendance

No member shall be absent from the sessions of the Senate unless given leave by the President or unless the member is sick and unable to attend.

Rule 25. Extension of Session

Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to extend any session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

"To the President of the Senate and the
Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the House of Representatives of
the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawaii, respectfully request an extension of _____
days of the _____ session of _____ of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawaii."

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by
two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President and the Speaker of the
House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation extending the session for the
number of days sought in the petition.

Rule 26. Recessed Session

Any session of the Legislature may be recessed by concurrent resolution adopted by a
majority of the members to which each house is entitled. Each regular session shall be recessed
pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Constitution for not less than five days at some period
between the twentieth and fortieth days of the regular session.

Rule 27. Special Sessions

(1) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of
Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the
House to call a special session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

"To the President of the Senate and the
Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the House of Representatives of
the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawaii, respectfully request that a special session
of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawaii be convened at _____."

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by
two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President of the Senate and the
Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation convening the
Legislature in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

(2) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled may petition the President
of the Senate to call a special session of the Senate for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's
responsibilities established by Article VI, Section 3, of the Constitution. The petition shall read:

"To the President of the Senate

Your petitioners, members of the Senate of the _____ Legislature of the State
of Hawaii, respectfully request that a special session of the Senate of the State of Hawaii
be convened at _____."

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by
two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, the President of the Senate shall
issue a proclamation convening the Senate in special session at the time and place sought in the
petition.

Rule 28. Adjournments

Meetings may be adjourned at any time. Unless otherwise specified in the motion, every
adjournment shall be considered as being to the established hour of meeting on the following

business day; but no adjournment shall be for more than three days, or sine die, without the consent of the House of Representatives.

Rule 29. Motion to Adjourn

A motion to adjourn is always in order, and shall be decided without debate. One motion to adjourn shall not follow another without intervening business.

A motion to adjourn without naming any time shall always be held as an adjournment to the regular hour of meeting of the next business day.

Rule 30. Quorum

For the transaction of business, a majority of the number of members to which the Senate is entitled shall constitute a quorum, of which quorum a majority vote shall suffice, but the final passage of a bill shall require the vote of the majority of the members of the Senate. A smaller number than a quorum may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members. For the purpose of compelling the attendance of absent members, a majority of the members present, by resolution, may direct the Sergeant-at-Arms to place the members who are absent under arrest and to return them to the Senate. Any warrant pursuant to such a resolution shall be issued in the name of the Senate and shall be signed by the member then presiding. For the purpose of ascertaining whether there is a quorum present, the President shall count the members present.

Rule 31. Executive Session

(1) If the Senate considers it necessary to act confidentially upon any communication from the Governor or upon any nomination or other matter, it may go into executive session.

(2) When any member desires to make known any matter to the Senate which the member deems should be confidential and private, the member shall communicate that desire to the President who shall decide whether the Senate shall go into executive session. The Senate may decide whether the matter communicated shall be kept secret.

Rule 32. Clearing of the Senate

(1) When acting upon confidential business in executive session, the Senate Chambers shall be cleared of all persons except the members of the Senate and such other persons as the presiding officer with the consent of the Senate shall deem necessary.

(2) The members, officers and employees shall keep the secrets of the Senate and any other person whose presence is permitted in executive session shall be sworn to secrecy.

(3) All confidential communications made to the Senate, and remarks, votes and proceedings thereon, shall be kept strictly secret by the members, officers and employees, as well as by such other persons as have been detained or permitted to attend upon the consideration of such matters, until the Senate, by resolution, takes off such seal of secrecy, or unless such matter be later considered in open session.

Rule 33. Nominations; Appointments

(1) When nominations, except those of justices and judges, shall be made by the Governor to the Senate, unless otherwise ordered, they shall be referred to appropriate Standing Committees, within 5 legislative days of receipt of such nominations from the Governor. The final question on every nomination shall be "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?" which question shall not be put sooner than twenty-four hours from the time when the nomination is received, nor on the day in which it may be reported by a committee, unless by unanimous consent. Public hearings shall be held for all nominees prior to confirmation.

(2) The fact of a nomination, or its rejection or confirmation, need not be kept secret, but when the Senate or any committee thereof shall deem it necessary for good cause, all remarks, proceedings and votes thereon shall be kept secret.

(3) Consent to the appointment of justices and judges shall be pursuant to Article VI, Section 3, of the State Constitution.

Rule 34. Meeting at Place Other than Capitol

Whenever, for any reason, the Governor shall convene the Senate at any place other than the Capitol, it shall attend together with all of its officers at the time and place ordered.

PART IV. ORDER OF BUSINESS**Rule 35. Order of Business: General**

After invocation, roll call and the reading of the Journal, the President shall call for business in the following order:

- (1) Messages from the Governor.
- (2) Reports and communications from the state officers.
- (3) Communications, bills, resolutions and other matters from the House of Representatives.
- (4) Concurrent and senate resolutions and introduction of bills.
- (5) Reports of Conference and Joint Committees.
- (6) Reports of Committee on Legislative Management.
- (7) Reports of other Standing Committees.
- (8) Unfinished business, upon which the Senate was engaged at the time of its last adjournment.
- (9) The Order of the Day.
- (10) Petitions, memorials and miscellaneous communications.
- (11) Any miscellaneous business on the President's table.

Rule 36. Order of Business: Special

The Senate, by previous motion, may direct that any matter named shall be made a special order of business and that such special order shall take precedence of all business after the fourth order, or that it shall take any other position lower down on the calendar.

Rule 37. Order of Business: Committee Reports and Gubernatorial Messages

Reports from Conference or Joint Committees, and from the Committee on Legislative Management, shall be in order at all times after the second order of business, and, upon motion, messages from the Governor or from the House of Representatives may be received at any time. Without unanimous consent, however, such messages or reports shall not be in order for discussion when received, but shall be placed on the calendar as unfinished business.

Rule 38. Order of Business: Order of the Day

After the first seven orders of business (set forth in Rule 35), it shall be in order, pending consideration thereof, to move that the Senate proceed to dispose of the unfinished business or to the Order of the Day. If such motion be decided in the affirmative, such consideration shall immediately be taken up.

Rule 39. Order of Business: Unfinished Business

The unfinished business in which the Senate was engaged at the time of the last adjournment shall have the preference in the Order of the Day. Until the former is disposed of, no motion for any other business shall be received without special leave of the Senate.

Rule 40. Order of Business: Questions on Priority

All questions relating to the priority of business to be acted upon shall be decided without debate.

PART V. BILLS; RESOLUTIONS**Rule 41. Bills: Introduction**

Any bill may be introduced on the report of a committee or by any member, except appropriation bills subject to the next paragraph and except short form bills which may only be introduced by the President of the Senate or the minority party leader after appropriate consultation with committee chairmen and other members of the Senate.

The Executive Budget, Judiciary Budget, Legislative Budget, General Appropriations Bill, Supplemental Appropriations Bill, Office of Hawaiian Affairs Budget, and bills for criminal injuries compensation, for claims against the State and for the funding of collective bargaining agreements may be introduced only by the President of the Senate or the minority party leader after appropriate consultation with committee chairmen and other members of the Senate. Each member may introduce only one bill appropriating money for capital improvement projects in the member's district. Individual members shall not introduce any other bill which is intended only to appropriate money or to authorize the issuance of any state bonds.

All bills shall be introduced under the order of resolutions.

Bills which shall carry over from a regular session in an odd-numbered year to the next regular session shall retain the numbers assigned to them. The Clerk shall keep a record of the status of all bills in possession of the Senate at the end of the odd-numbered year session and shall publish the record of the status of all such bills prior to the convening of the next regular session.

Every bill introduced or reported out of any committee, which amends an existing section or subsection of the Hawaii Revised Statutes or Session Laws of Hawaii, shall set forth the section or subsection in full, and the matter to be deleted shall be enclosed in brackets and any new matter added to the section or subsection shall be underscored. However, a Supplemental Appropriations Bill need not conform to this rule or an amending bill where the intent and effect of an amending bill can be clearly identified and understood without repeating the entire section or subsection, in which case only the paragraphs, subparagraphs, clauses or items to be amended need be set forth as the President may allow. The President may allow additional exceptions to this rule.

No floor amendment to a bill shall be voted upon unless a copy of such amendment shall have been presented to the Clerk who shall prepare and distribute copies of the amendment to each member of the Senate present.

Rule 42. Bills: Referral to Committee

(1) Upon introduction all bills shall be numbered by the Clerk in numerical sequence, shall bear an identification as a Senate Bill, and, unless they are short form bills, shall pass first reading.

(2) Each such bill shall be referred by the President to one or more appropriate Standing Committees for consideration.

(3) Each Standing Committee shall consider the bills referred to it as expeditiously as may be possible.

(4) Bills introduced in short form.

(a) If a majority of the committee to which a short form bill has been referred determines that such bill should receive the further consideration of the same committee or another committee in the same or in an amended form, it shall report that fact to the Senate, together with its recommendation that either: (1) the bill pass first reading by title and be referred again to the same or another committee for further consideration, or (2) the bill in an amended form pass first reading by title and be referred again to the same or another committee for further consideration.

(b) The form of the committee report, upon reporting such a bill to the Senate recommending its passage on first reading without amendment and for referral again to a committee for further consideration shall be substantially as follows:

Your Committee on _____, to which was referred S.B. No. _____ entitled _____ begs leave to report that your Committee has considered such Bill and recommends that it pass First Reading by title and be referred to the Committee on _____ for further consideration.

(c) The form of the committee report, upon reporting such a bill to the Senate recommending passage on first reading in an amended form and for referral again to a committee for further consideration shall be substantially as follows:

Your Committee on _____, to which was referred S.B. No. _____ entitled _____ begs leave to report that your Committee has considered such Bill and is in accord with the intent and purpose of S.B. No. _____, as amended herein, and recommends that it pass First Reading in the form attached hereto as S.B. No. _____, S.D. 1, and be recommitted to the Committee on _____ for further consideration.

Rule 43. Bills: Required Readings

No bill shall pass the Senate unless it shall have passed three readings in the Senate on separate days. The President shall give notice in each instance whether it be the first, second or third reading.

Rule 44. Bills: First Reading

(1) The first reading of a bill shall be for information. If opposition be made to it, the question shall be: "Shall this bill be rejected?" which question may be debated. But no one shall speak more than once upon such question, except the introducer of the bill, who may close the debate.

(2) If the question to reject be negative, the bill shall go to its second reading without question.

Rule 45. Bills: Second Reading

A bill upon its second reading, may be read by its title only. It then shall be subject to a motion to commit. If it is not referred to a Standing Committee, or to a Special Committee, but is ordered to be considered in Committee of the Whole, a day for such consideration shall be determined by the chairman of such committee. When the bill shall be reported from committee it shall take its place in the order of business for future consideration.

Rule 46. Bills: Third Reading

(1) No bill shall pass third or final reading in the Senate unless printed copies of the bill in the form to be passed have been made available to the members of the Senate for at least 48 hours. Form to be passed means the form in which a bill is to be (a) passed on third reading in the Senate, (b) concurred to by the Senate after amendments have been made by the House, or (c) passed by the Senate after a Conference Committee has agreed upon it.

(2) A Bill on its third or final reading may be read by its title only, and the President then shall ask the Senate: "Shall this bill pass its third reading?" or "Shall this bill pass its final reading?" as the case may be. Upon the final passage of any bill, the Ayes and Noes shall be called. Such passage shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members of the Senate and the Ayes and Noes shall be entered on the Journal.

Rule 47. Bills: Property of Senate

All bills introduced in the Senate shall be deemed the property of the Senate and under its control unless they shall become law, however subject to the right of the House of Representatives to amend or to refuse to agree with the bills.

Any bill pending at the final adjournment of a regular session in an odd-numbered year shall carry over with the same status to the next regular session; provided that if such bill shall have passed third reading in the Senate in an odd-numbered session, it shall pass at least one reading in the Senate in the next regular session upon its return to the Senate from the House.

Rule 48. Bills: Recall from Committee

Twenty days after a bill has been referred to a committee, the same may be recalled from such committee by the affirmative vote of one-third of the members of the Senate.

Rule 49. Matters Tabled

When a bill or resolution or other matter has been laid upon the table, it shall not thereafter be taken from the table and be considered or restored to a place upon the calendar of the Senate without the consent of a majority.

Rule 50. Bills: Amendments

All amendments proposed to any bill shall be in writing, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and shall be sent to the Clerk's desk to be filed with the bill.

Rule 51. Bills: Certification

When a bill is passed it shall be certified by the Clerk who shall note the day of its passage at the bottom of the last page of the bill.

Rule 52. Bills: Received from House of Representatives

Whenever a bill which has finally passed the House of Representatives shall be certified to the Senate for its action, such bill shall be read three times before final passage, in accordance with the provision of the rules for the passage of bills introduced in the Senate.

Rule 53. Bills: Transmittal to House of Representatives

When a bill originating in the Senate shall have passed its third reading, or when a bill originating in the House which has been received from the House shall have been amended, or when a carry-over bill from an odd-numbered year originating in the House passes its third reading in the Senate in an even-numbered year session, such bill or such amended bill shall immediately be certified by the President and Clerk and sent to the House of Representatives for its consideration.

Rule 54. Bills: Correction of Errors

When a bill has passed both the Senate and the House of Representatives and an error in it is discovered prior to its having received the approval of the Governor, the bill may be returned by Concurrent Resolution to the House last considering the bill for proper correction.

Rule 55. Bills: Order of Consideration

(1) The Clerk shall send bills that have passed first reading to be printed immediately. When they have been printed and circulated to the members of the Senate, the President shall refer them to the various committees. When the committees have considered them and reported on them, the committees shall return them to the Clerk, and the Clerk shall place them in the Second Reading File. The Senate shall consider them in the order in which they appear in the Second Reading File.

(2) The Clerk shall arrange bills that have passed second reading in the order of their passage on second reading, regardless of the date of their reference to committee or the date of the committee report on them. The Clerk shall place them on the Third Reading File in the order in which they passed second reading and the Senate shall consider them on third reading in that same order. However, if the third reading of a bill is set for some particular date, that bill shall be removed from the Third Reading File.

Rule 56. Bills: Special Order of Consideration

All bills and other matters set for consideration on particular dates, shall be arranged in the order of the several votes making such assignments. A list shall be made of such special orders, and when the time for consideration arrives, such bills and other matters shall be considered in the order of assignment. If an adjournment shall be had before all of such special orders are disposed of, the remainder shall go over and come under the head of unfinished business on the following day, unless otherwise ordered.

PART VI. RESOLUTIONS; MOTIONS

Rule 57. Resolutions and Motions: Form

All resolutions shall be typewritten, dated and signed by the introducer, otherwise they shall not be considered. The Senate shall not introduce any congratulatory or memorial resolution but shall express the sentiment contained in such resolutions by means of a suitable certificate. Motions and amendments may be verbal but shall be reduced to writing if requested by the President, and shall be read from the desk if so ordered.

Rule 58. Motions: Second Required

No motion shall be received and considered by the Senate until the motion shall be seconded.

Rule 59. Motions: Disposition

After a motion is stated or read by the President, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Senate, and shall be disposed of by vote of the Senate; however, it may be withdrawn by the movant at any time before an amendment has been adopted or before the decision on the motion if not amended.

Rule 60. Motions Applicable to Pending Matters

Whenever any bill or resolution or other matter shall be under discussion, the only motions relative thereto shall be:

- (1) To lay upon the table,
- (2) To postpone to a certain time,
- (3) To postpone indefinitely,
- (4) To commit, and
- (5) To amend,

which motions shall have precedence in the order named.

The first two motions shall be decided without debate and shall be put as soon as made.

When any of the motions shall be decided in the negative, they shall not be revived the same day relative to the main question under discussion. If all are negative as aforesaid, the only remaining question shall be as to the adoption of the bill, resolution or other main question.

Rule 61. Matters Postponed Indefinitely

When a question is postponed indefinitely, the question shall not be acted upon again during the session in which it was introduced.

Rule 62. Motion for Previous Question

The object of the motion for the previous question is to cut off debate. It shall always be in order. It shall require a three-fifths vote to carry it.

Whenever the motion shall be carried, the author of the resolution or introducer of the bill under discussion shall be permitted to close the debate, after which the main question, subject

to Rule 60, shall be put. The author or introducer may delegate to another such right to close.

Rule 63. Motion for Reconsideration

(1) When a motion has been once made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall not be in order for any member who voted in the minority to move for a reconsideration thereof; but any member who voted with the majority may move to reconsider it on the same or the succeeding day of session, or, with the consent of the Senate, on any subsequent day and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions, except a motion to adjourn.

(2) When a motion for reconsideration has been decided by vote, that vote shall not be reconsidered.

(3) When a bill or resolution or other matter upon which a vote has been taken shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate, and shall have been transmitted to the House of Representatives, a motion to reconsider shall be deemed to include a request to the House to return the same. If not complied with by the House, then the vote on the motion to reconsider shall be set aside. If such motion shall pass, the Clerk shall promptly communicate to the House the request for return of the matter to be reconsidered.

PART VII. PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS

Rule 64. Petitions, Memorials, and Miscellaneous Communications

(1) Any person may petition the Senate. Petitions and other memorials, except as provided in Rule 57, shall be in writing, signed by the petitioners.

(2) All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the Senate or to the President and members shall be presented to the Senate by the Clerk.

(3) A brief statement of the contents of such petitions, memorials or other papers shall be made orally by the Clerk.

(4) Every such petition, memorial or other paper shall be ordered filed or referred to a committee, as of course, by the President, unless such action is objected to by a member at the time such petition, memorial or other paper is presented.

(5) No such petition, memorial or other paper shall be debated on the day it is presented, except with the consent of the Senate.

PART VIII. ORDER; DEBATE; VOTING

Rule 65. Questions of Order

(1) A question of order may be raised at any stage of the proceedings, except during the calling of the roll when the Ayes and Noes are called for. Unless submitted to the Senate, such questions shall be decided without debate by the presiding officer, subject to an appeal to the Senate. Laying such appeal on the table shall be held as sustaining the ruling of the presiding officer.

(2) Any question of order may be submitted to the Senate for its decision.

Rule 66. Debate: General Limitation

No member shall speak more than twice, unless such member be the movant of the matter pending, in which case such member shall not be permitted to speak in reply until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule 67. Voting: Methods

There shall be five methods of ascertaining the decision of the Senate upon any matter.

(1) First, by voice or raising of hands; Second, by rising; Third, by ballot; Fourth, by call of the roll of the members and a record of the Clerk of the vote of each; and Fifth, by unanimous consent.

(2) Whenever the Senate is ready to vote on any question, the President shall rise, and after stating the question, shall request all those in favor of the affirmative of the question to vote "Aye." The President then shall call upon all voting in the negative of the question to vote "No." The President then shall announce the result to the Senate.

(3) If any member shall doubt the result, as announced, the President again shall state the question and call upon the members to vote by rising in their places, and they shall remain standing until counted, and the result again shall be announced.

(4) The method of voting by ballot shall be as customary. The President shall appoint one or more tellers, or direct the Messengers to collect the ballots, which shall be counted by the Clerk, and the results announced by the President. Unless otherwise prescribed by these rules, on motion, the Senate may vote upon any question by ballot.

(5) Whenever one-fifth of the members present shall request, the Clerk shall call the roll of the members of the Senate. Each member, when called, shall vote in a clear loud voice, "Aye," if voting in the affirmative, or "No" if voting in the negative. The Clerk shall record each vote and such record shall become a part of the Journal of the Senate. The President shall announce the results as above set forth.

(6) With the unanimous consent of the Senate, the President may direct the Clerk to record an "Aye" vote for each member of the Senate. If there is no objection, the Clerk shall so record the vote. If there is objection, the President shall ask for the names of the members voting "No" and order the Clerk to record no votes for them.

Rule 68. Voting: Rights of Members

(1) No member, on any account, shall refrain from voting unless excused by the President. A member may vote "Kanalua" the first time the member's name is called by the Clerk on any vote, but if the member votes "Kanalua" on the next call of the member's name, the member's vote shall be recorded as "Aye."

(2) The President may excuse a member who has a monetary interest in the question, or whose right to a seat in the Senate will be affected by the question, or whose official conduct is involved in the question. If a member thinks there may be a personal interest in the question, the member shall rise and disclose the interest to the President. The President then shall rule whether the member has a conflict of interest. If so, the member shall be excused from voting.

(3) Whenever the Ayes and Noes are called, no one, without unanimous consent, shall be permitted to explain a vote.

(4) After the announcement by the President of the result, no one shall be allowed to vote or to change a vote.

PART IX. DECORUM; DISCLOSURES; PUNISHMENT

Rule 69. Punishment of Members

The Senate may punish a member for misconduct, disorderly behavior or neglect of duty by censure, or upon a two-thirds vote of all the members of the Senate, by suspension or expulsion of such member.

The President may appoint a Special Committee to investigate, hear and report upon the conduct of any member charged by the Senate for misconduct, disorderly behavior or neglect of duty. Any member so charged by the Senate shall be informed in writing of the specific charge or charges made against the member and have opportunity to present evidence and be heard in the member's own defense. Following its investigation and hearing the Special Committee shall file its report with the President setting forth its findings and recommendations.

In the event the committee recommends censure, suspension or expulsion, the President shall present the report of the committee to the Senate for its consideration and decision. The Senate, by a majority vote, may censure a member or, upon a two-thirds vote of all the

members of the Senate, suspend or expel a member.

Rule 70. Decorum: Transgression of Rules

If any member transgresses the rules of the Senate, the President, or any member, may call such member to order, and, when so called to order, immediately shall sit down. The President then shall decide the question of order without debate, subject to an appeal to the Senate.

The President may call for the sense of the Senate on any question of order.

Rule 71. Decorum: Address

When any member is about to speak, such member shall rise from the member's seat and address all remarks to the President. While speaking, the member shall confine all remarks to the question under debate, shall refer to other Senators by title only (e.g., "Senator from the _____ District"; "The Chairman of the Committee on _____"; "The Majority Leader,") and not by name and shall avoid personalities.

Rule 72. Decorum: Person Called to Order While Speaking

Whenever any person shall be called to order while speaking, such person shall be deemed to be in possession of the floor when the question of order is decided and may proceed with the matter under discussion.

Rule 73. Decorum: Presence in Senate

No person shall sit at the desk of the President or Clerk, except by permission of the President, nor shall any person, other than a member, officer or permitted employee or person, sit in the main Senate floor area during any of the sessions of the Senate.

Rule 74. Decorum: Conduct in Session

When the President is putting any question or addressing the Senate, no one shall walk out of the room or across the floor. When a member is speaking, no one shall entertain a private discourse, nor shall anyone pass between the member speaking and the Chair.

Rule 75. Decorum: Disorderly Conduct in Session

If, during any session of the Senate, any member should behave in a disorderly manner the President shall order the member to be seated and preserve the peace. If such member then shall persist in disorderly conduct, the President shall order the Sergeant-at-Arms to remove the member from the Senate and the member shall not be permitted to take a seat during the remainder of that day's session, except upon satisfactory pledge given to the Senate for future good behavior.

For the punishment of any person not a member, the provisions of Section 18, Article III, of the Constitution shall govern.

Rule 76. Decorum: Recording of Debate Called to Order

If any Senator is called to order for words spoken in debate, upon the member's demand or on that of any other Senator, the words objected to shall be taken down in writing and noted by the Clerk, and, if required, shall be read for the information of the Senate.

Rule 77. Decorum: Smoking

No member or other officer shall smoke within the Senate Chamber during any of the meetings of the Senate unless authorized by the President.

Rule 78. Decorum: Solicitation Prohibited

An officer or employee of the Senate shall not solicit subscriptions, for any purpose, from any other officer or employee thereof, nor from any Senator. Nor shall any person be permitted to solicit or receive subscriptions of contributions for any purpose on the floor or in the lobby of the Senate or in any Senate office.

Rule 79. Disclosures

Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission of the State of Hawaii a disclosure of the member's private financial interests, as prescribed by law. Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission any change in such financial interests.

If a legislative matter which affects a member's interests arises before the member has made a disclosure to the Ethics Commission, the member shall disclose orally such interest to the Senate before voting. The member then shall immediately make the written disclosure required by law and the Rules of the Senate.

Any member who has filed a disclosure as required by this Rule need not make a further oral disclosure on the Senate floor of any interest so filed.

Rule 80. Violating Confidence

If any matter covered in Rule 32 or 33 shall be disclosed by any Senator, the Senator shall be liable to censure, or, by a two-thirds vote, to suspension or expulsion from the Senate. If an officer or other person authorized to hear such matter shall disclose the matter, such officer shall be dismissed and such other person shall be liable to punishment for contempt comparable to the punishment provided for by Section 18, Article III, of the Constitution and in the manner as therein prescribed.

PART X. QUESTIONS TO STATE OFFICERS**Rule 81. Questions to State Officers**

Any member of the Senate may ask any question of any state officer relating to the officer's respective department reducing such questions to writing, over the member's signature, reading the same before the Senate, and furnishing the officer with a copy of such written question. Any officer questioned shall reply to such question upon the following day, unless the Senate shall grant a definite extension of time for replying.

PART XI. AMENDMENT, SUSPENSION AND INTERPRETATION OF RULES**Rule 82. Amendments; Suspension**

(1) No rule of the Senate shall be amended or rescinded nor shall any new rule be adopted, without one day's notice of such change. Any such action shall require a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) Any rule may be suspended for a particular purpose with the unanimous consent of the Senate.

Rule 83. Parliamentary Procedure

The Manual of Legislative Practice as laid down by the 1979 edition of Mason's, where not inconsistent with the Rules and practices of the Senate, shall govern.
