# THIRTY-THIRD DAY

#### Monday, March 18, 1991

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, convened at 11:35 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Dale Vallejo-Sanderson, Kailua Christian Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chang, Ikeda, Nakasato and Reed who were excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Second Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Tungpalan introduced Mr. Santiago Joab, director of land and natural resources on the Island of Pohnpei of the Federated States of Micronesia, who was seated in the gallery.

Senator A. Kobayashi, on behalf of Senator Donna Ikeda, introduced Joy Ishimoto and Shannon Toguchi, students from Niu Valley Intermediate School who are spending the day at the Legislature, visiting and working in Senator Ikeda's office, also seated in the gallery.

Senator McMurdo then recognized and introduced the delegation from the Honolulu Armed Services YMCA who were seated on the floor of the Senate as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure today to present this certificate, recognizing the services of the Honolulu Armed Services YMCA.

"The Honolulu Armed Services YMCA, serving Hawaii's military community since 1917 through times of peace and times of conflict, has once again been available to serve the military, especially the thousands of young enlisted personnel and their dependents based in Hawaii during Operation Desert Shield and Operation Desert Storm.

"In meeting its goals of excellence and service directed toward the continuing and vital need to reduce the stress and isolation of military life, to enrich the lives of military families and to strengthen the bond between those in uniform and civilians, the Honolulu Armed Services YMCA offers complete and comprehensive individual and family support, education, and recreation programs at seven locations, with an administrative, professional and clerical staff of 100.

"Under the direction of Martha Burchell, board chairman Norborne Clarke, and a committed volunteer board of management, the Honolulu Armed Services YMCA has formed 'Operation Rainbow' to respond to the increased need for services during this time of conflict.

"The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, expresses gratitude for the services given the community by the Honolulu Armed Services YMCA and congratulates it for its superlative efforts in aiding our military families.

"I would like to introduce to you the various officers and staff of the Armed Services YMCA of Honolulu: Mr. Norborne Clarke, chairman of the board of management; the Reverend David Kennedy, headmaster of St. Andrews Priory, who is the chairman-elect of the board; Ms. Martha Burchell, executive director of the Armed Services YMCA; Lt. Gen. Jack Ferris, Deputy U.S. CINCPAC, who is the 1st vice chair of the Armed Services YMCA; Ms. Marilyn McCormick, secretary of the board and member of the executive committee. Not present today but an equally hard working and important member is Mr. Pat Southern who is the associate executive director for programs."

All of the honorees rose to be recognized and Mr. Clarke was presented the Senate certificate of recognition by Senator McMurdo. Senators Fernandes Salling, A. Kobayashi, Solomon, Cobb and Hagino presented the leis.

At 11:44 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

Senator Crozier then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I stand to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, in a couple of weeks there will be a showing of Judy Garland's movie, 'The Wizard of Oz.' I'd like to just share ... this is going to be a while, I'm leading up to something so please bear with me. For those of you who are impatient, sorry.

"But anyway, Mr. President, in the movie, 'The ... we all watched it as kids and we Wizard of Oz.' always thought it was a children's story but, I think it's really a satire on the political process. You know, how Dorothy gets caught up in a windstorm and she ends up in the Land of Oz. She has dreams; she has hopes that someday she'll be able to go home but, in the meantime, she meets up with the good witch of the North (and that represents the people, the electorate), I think it was, who gives her a pair of red shoes and these red shoes are

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magical red shoes. <u>These shoes represent power or</u> elected office.

"The lion is looking for courage. Here in our political process, we need to have the fortitude to stand by our principles and convictions. The scarecrow is looking for a brain ... that's education in the political realm ... we need more education. And the tin man is looking for a heart, or compassion. And we always need that. We need more compassion for our fellow men.

"But anyway, Dorothy and her friends go on and they finally get to the Wizard of Oz, and the Wizard tells them that he doesn't believe them and they have to pass one more test to prove that they are sincere. So they are told by the Wizard that they must destroy or kill the Wicked Witch of the West. And they go out there and the Wicked Witch, I think, burns the scarecrow, and Dorothy throws some water on the Wicked Witch and she melts away.

"So, just like Saddam Hussein, he was just a paper tiger. He made a lot of noise, but in the end he was nothing. And that's just how the world is.

"In a couple of weeks, you will be able to see 'The Wizard of Oz' and you'll never be able to watch it as little children anymore. You'll never be able to appreciate the fantasy of the Wizard of Oz. You're going to look at it from a political standpoint.

"Now, why do I bring this up? Well, Mr. President, last Friday the great commentator or reporter from the Star-Bulletin who's won numerous prizes and is potentially a Pulitzer prize winner, Richard Borreca, wrote quite an article and he talked about the future of the Green Party. I can remember standing on the railing a couple of months ago with a group of reporters, and I think Mr. Borreca was one of them, and I told them, you know, if ever the Democratic Party loses its vision I would like to become part of the Green Party because I believe in the goals of the Green Party. I believe that this is the only party that looks at the planet earth. All other parties look at their own localities and try to solve the problems within themselves but the Green Party takes on the community of the planet. So I said that I want to be a part of them because they list environment, first. They also list peace and nonviolence and that's the kind of things that I'm interested in. They also have education and concerns for indigenous people. These are issues that are important to me. So I was excited that somebody was trying to do something.

"Just like Dorothy, the lion, the tin man, and the straw man, they were excited because somebody told them there was hope -- go to the Wizard and you will find your dreams will come true, your aspirations will come true. But along the way, they had to confront the Wicked Witch of the West.

"Now, Mr. President, along the way Senator Mike Crozier will have to confront a person from the West. In Friday's article, the organizer for the Green Party, Linda Martin, said: 'I will be looking hard for a resident of Sen. Crozier's district who is willing to give this legislative tyrant and mouthpiece of the landowners a run for his money.'

"How ironic, Mr. President, I saw the Green Party as the party of hope, as the party to bring the world community together and, lo and behold, before I can have my red shoes, the same shoes that Dorothy had on to make her dreams come true, the shoes that have the power, this woman wants to take away those red shoes from me. "What I'm trying to say is, no matter how we perceive we're doing good, someone else perceives that we're not doing good. In the end, the Wizard of Oz turns out to be a nothing. But he makes Dorothy and her friends realize that in order to attain the goals they want they have to do it themselves.

"So, I'd like to just say, Mr. President, I wish the Green Party well, but it's time for them to watch the movie, 'The Wizard of Oz,' and analyze who is leading them. Do they have someone who's just out to take away shoes from others who are in office now and not really committed to making the original intent of the Green Party?

"Thank you very much."

At this time, Senator Wong rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"This Saturday (March 16, 1991) in the Star-Bulletin, on the front page, a headline read: 'Wong, Peters buy luxury condo units; Other powerful figures get in on the ground floor in Makiki.'

"Mr. President, I do own a condominium at 1015 Wilder. That part of the story is true. I did buy a unit back in 1989 and I disclosed this on my financial disclosure form in 1989. There's nothing secret about this purchase.

"However, Mr. President, what I'm upset about is the story's inference that I got the unit because of political or preferential treatment. This is not true. After most of the units had already been sold, there were only a few left. Jeff Stone, president of Stone Realty, who was handling the sales, suggested to my wife who is also his sister that she should consider buying one. After weeks of deliberation, it was only then that my wife and I decided to buy a unit on an equal basis of 50 percent each. The point is, I was not one of the advance buyers. I came in late, after the advance buyers had picked the more desirable units. I got no special deal, no special treatment because of my political position.

"As for the other prominent people who had also bought units in the project, I did not know they had done so until after I saw them around the parking lot or in the common areas. I did not know that Representative Peters was going to be one of my neighbors. I certainly was not the one who recommended that he buy one. Neither did I recommend to any other people who were mentioned in the article, Walter Dods of First Hawaiian Bank, Jack Seigle of Starr Seigle McCombs Inc., and Andy Ing, former state lieutenant governor. There was no attempt on my part to convince these people that they should buy units at 1015 Wilder.

"What really grates me, Mr. President, is that the Star-Bulletin story also inferred that I was dodging the reporters because I did not want to comment on this story. This is absolutely untrue. I was around the Capitol all week last week. They saw me around. They could have asked me at any time. I understand that Richard Borreca only came to my office on Friday afternoon, and this is after I had met him in the parking lot of Iolani Palace that morning prior to the session.

"I believe in fair treatment, Mr. President. I think they should have made more of an effort to come and see me before doing the story. "The story I am telling you has an irony in that my unit is number 204 of a 12-story building. And as we all know, in the pricing of condominiums, units at the bottom start at the lowest possible price and rises as you go up into the building. I have a modest unit, certainly not one that I would call a luxury unit.

"Mr. President, I've been in the Senate a long, long time. This is the first time that any inference has been made upon my person that I have used my political muscle to get a deal. And I want to say for the record, I do not appreciate this.

"Thank you very much."

# ADJOURNMENT

At 12:14 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Solomon, seconded by Senator Koki and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Tuesday, March 19, 1991.
