

SIXTY-FIRST DAY

Tuesday, April 30, 1991

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, convened at 12:00 o'clock noon with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Captain David Maack, Chaplain, United States Air Force, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Aki who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Sixtieth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Reed introduced Private Samantha Ditusa as follows:

"To the members who haven't seen the May issue of 'Life' magazine yet. It's an interesting one. The May issue of 'Life' magazine is headlined 'The 200 Year War to Liberate the Military.' It's an article about American women in combat and features a photograph of a soldier behind a 50-caliber machine gun. The soldier happens to be a woman, Private First Class Samantha Ditusa, who happens to be a Hawaii resident and who also happens to be in the gallery today.

"Private Ditusa is a 1989 Radford High School graduate, from your district, Mr. President. She celebrated her 19th birthday while serving in Saudi Arabia. Private Ditusa served in a Patriot Unit that so successfully shot down Scud missiles launched by Saddam Hussein.

"I speak for the entire Senate when I say, 'To you Samantha, we appreciate your courageous action on our behalf. We would like you to please stand and be recognized by the Senate."

Private Ditusa rose to be recognized and was greeted with a round of applause.

Senator Reed continued:

"Mr. President, Samantha is home on leave visiting family and friends. She'll return to Ft. Bliss, Texas, later this month, and may be one of those who is ordered to return to the Persian Gulf.

"With Samantha today are her father Sgt. 1st Class Salvatore Ditusa and her mother Margaret Ditusa, along with a family friend, Tripler Army Medical Center Provost Marshal Don Devaney."

Mr. and Mrs. Ditusa and Mr. Devaney rose to be recognized.

Senator Levin then recognized Miss Marla Wade as follows:

"Mr. President, many of us have student interns who work in our offices and they work on virtually a volunteer basis, supposedly about half time. I have been fortunate enough this year to have an intern who has worked on a volunteer basis, double time. Those who have had any dealings with my office know exactly how hard she's worked, sometimes seven days a week, sometimes 24 hours a day. We took an informal vote in my office and unanimously she was selected legislative intern of the year.

"I would like to present a certificate, if I may, on behalf of this body to Miss Marla Wade"

Senator Chang, on behalf of the Chair and Senator Fernandes Salling, introduced Mr. John M. Tuhaika who is the clerk of the National Parliament of the Solomon Islands. Mr. Tuhaika comes from the Island of Honiara.

"Mr. President, I read in the front page of the Advertiser comments made by the House Republicans that said, 'House Republicans called a news conference to protest the extension of the session and chastised the Senate for waiting too long to begin hardball budget negotiations.'

"Unless the House Republicans know more than us Senate Democrats, I feel that their comments were unfair

and inaccurate. I think our Ways and Means Committee chairman, speaking on a point of personal privilege yesterday for the first time in his 32 or 33 years as a legislator, gives you an indication that he has always dealt very fairly with his House counterpart. I think the statements by the Republicans were not necessary. The House members should be lucky that Senator Yamasaki, the chairman of Ways and Means, has not taken out his sword yet.

"On a brighter note, on behalf of all the members of the Senate, I would like to extend our best wishes to Big Island Senator Solomon and her future husband on their forthcoming marriage. Congratulations and best wishes to both of you!"

Senator Solomon also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Thank you very much, Senator Matsuura. I would also like to thank all of my colleagues for the 'bachelorette' party.

"On a more serious note, Mr. President, following up and speaking in support of the previous speaker. Your budget liaisons in the Ways and Means Committee feel that we have done our homework. We have dealt very fairly with the House and we're hoping that the House would see their way clear to come back to the negotiation table so that we can go home."

Senator Cobb rose on a point of personal and said:

"Mr. President, on a separate matter, Mr. President, we'll be approaching the subject of gun control next year. I noticed the sign posted next to your office quoted a man from the time of Abraham Lincoln that said, 'No man's life, liberty or property or assault weapon is safe while the Legislature is in session,' and on behalf of some of my colleagues I'd like to present the completely new 18th edition of 'Guns Illustrated 1986' to our Judiciary chairman.

"This has the original technical articles, complete illustrated catalogue of all current guns and accessories and up-to-the minute test reports. For the benefit of the attorney general, he can tell the attorney general this is the journal for gun buffs. And I wish our Judiciary chairman all the luck next year. He certainly has my support in reaching an amicable solution to the problem of gun control of automatic weapons. Thank you."

Senator Blair responded:

"Mr. President, if I may, I would like to pass this (catalogue) to my subcommittee chairman (Senator Chang) who will be holding the interim hearings." (Laughter.)

Senator Crozier also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, on behalf of the Senators and the staff, thank you very much for the party last night. I spent most of the evening talking to a number of Senate staff people and learned that they were very grateful to have the opportunity to serve the people of Hawaii for the past four months. They all feel that they made a contribution and they're proud that Hawaii is a little better place because of their experience. Thank you very much."

Senator Tungpalan also rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, also included in the headlines today was the issue about family leave. I did want to extend

my gratitude to the press. They covered it very well, especially the Advertiser and the Star-Bulletin.

"Without the help of our 'sixth column' we certainly wouldn't have gotten out the message for the need of this piece of social legislation and we are sincerely indebted. It shows that when we can work collectively things do get done. Thank you."
