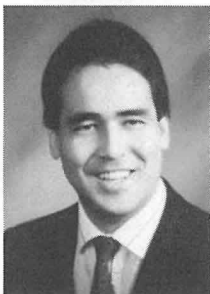

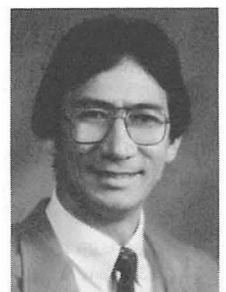

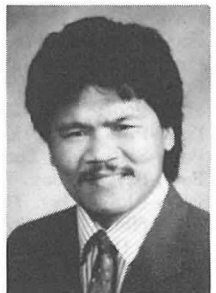

FIRST DAY

Wednesday, January 16, 1991

In accordance with the provisions of Section 10 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, the Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, was called to order at 10:00 o'clock a.m., by the Honorable Richard S.H. Wong, temporary chairman of the Senate.

At this time, the members of the Senate, guests and audience rose to sing the National Anthem and "Hawaii Pono" led by Senators Fernandes Salling and Solomon.

The Divine Blessing was then invoked by the Reverend Kenneth M. Newman, pastor of Hawaii Kai Baptist Church, who was escorted to the rostrum by Senators Ikeda, Tungpalan and Koki.

Nominations now being in order for a temporary clerk, Senator Mizuguchi nominated T. David Woo Jr., seconded by Senator Matsuura.

Senator Yamasaki moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator Levin and carried, and the Chair declared T. David Woo Jr. as Temporary Clerk of the Senate.

Senator Hagino then moved that a committee of three be appointed by the Chair as a Committee on Credentials to examine the certificates of election of the newly elected members of the Senate and to submit a report of its findings to the Senate, seconded by Senator George and carried.

The Chair thereupon appointed Senators Hagino, Aki and George to serve on such committee.

At 10:13 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 10:15 o'clock a.m.

Senator Hagino moved that Special Committee Report No. 1 be adopted, seconded by Senator George and carried.

The Committee was thereupon discharged with thanks.

The Chair, at this time, appointed Senators Blair, Chang and Iwase to escort Chief Justice Herman Lum of the Hawaii State Supreme Court to the rostrum to administer the oath of office to the newly elected members of the Senate.

The Senators escorted Chief Justice Lum to the rostrum and were thereupon discharged with thanks.

Chief Justice Lum administered the oath of office to the newly elected members of the Senate who were standing at their respective desks.

At this time, the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The Chair then introduced to the members of the Senate and guests the newest member of the Hawaii State Senate, Senator Randy Iwase.

Nominations for officers of the Senate being next in order, Senator Cobb placed in nomination the name of Senator Richard S.H. Wong for President of the Senate, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi.

Senator Ikeda moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator McCartney. The motion to close the nominations was put by the Chair and carried unanimously, and the Temporary Clerk was directed to cast a unanimous ballot for Senator Wong as President of the Senate.

The ballot having been so cast, Senator Wong was declared unanimously elected President of the Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991.

At this time, the President welcomed and introduced the following distinguished guests to the members of the Senate:

Maj. General Girard Seitter III, Commanding General, Tripler Army Medical Center, and Mrs. Seitter.

The President then addressed the members of the Senate and guests as follows:

"Members of the Senate,

"Thank you for reelecting me as your President. I am deeply honored and grateful for your support.

"My remarks today will be brief, very brief.

"To our guests, families and visitors here today, we in the Senate would like to apologize for any disappointment you may feel because of the curtailment of our traditional opening day celebrations. Many of you had expected the customary entertainment and party-making and we are sorry if we are not meeting your expectations.

"The Senate decided to keep today's program simple and low-key because of our sensitivity to concerns about the situation in the Middle East. We felt that the traditional merry-making would just not be appropriate at a time when people are apprehensive about the possibility of war. To those of you here with friends or family presently in the Middle East, our thoughts go out especially to you. May the Good Lord sustain you.

"The Minority Leader - Senator Mary George - and I have decided to forgo our customary opening day speeches. There will be other opportunities for us to speak out on the issues in the days and weeks ahead.

"Today, we just want to do our business and get on with the work of this 1991 Legislative Session.

"That said, let us proceed.

"Let us - all of us - pray for peace.

"Aloha, and God bless you all."

At 10:25 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 10:27 o'clock a.m.

The President then announced that nominations were in order for the office of Vice President of the Senate.

Senator Crozier placed in nomination the name of Senator James Aki for Vice President of the Senate, seconded by Senator Nakasato.

Senator B. Kobayashi moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator McMurdo. The motion to close the nominations was put by the Chair and carried unanimously and the Temporary Clerk was directed to cast a unanimous ballot for Senator Aki as Vice President of the Senate.

The ballot having been so cast, Senator Aki was declared unanimously elected as Vice President of the Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991.

## SENATE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions (S.R. Nos. 1 and 2) were read by the Temporary Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

S.R. No. 1, providing for the election of T. David Woo Jr. for Clerk, George M. Amimoto for Assistant Clerk, and Bienvenido C. Villafor for Sergeant-at-Arms, was offered by Senators Hagino and George.

On motion by Senator Mizuguchi, seconded by Senator Koki and carried, S.R. No. 1 was adopted.

The President thereupon administered the oath of office to the elected officers of the Senate.

S.R. No. 2, entitled: "SENATE RESOLUTION RELATING TO THE ADOPTION OF THE RULES OF THE SENATE," was offered by Senators Hagino and George.

On motion by Senator Hagino, seconded by Senator George and carried, S.R. No. 2 was adopted.

In closing, the members of the Senate and guests rose to sing "God Bless America" and "Hawaii Aloha."

#### **ADJOURNMENT**

At 10:35 o'clock a.m., on motion by Senator Solomon, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Thursday, January 17, 1991, observing a moment of silent prayer for peace in the Middle East.

## SECOND DAY

Thursday, January 17, 1991

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, convened at 11:35 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Stanley Amos of the Trinity Missionary Baptist Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chang and Holt who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the First Day.

At 9:44 o'clock a.m., on motion by Senator Solomon, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair to meet in Joint Session with the House of Representatives, in accordance with H.C.R. No. 1, to receive the Governor's state of the state address.

### JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives was called to order at 10:00 o'clock a.m. by the Honorable Daniel Kihano, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Munawwar Ali Khan (Moslem).

At this time, the Speaker welcomed and introduced the following distinguished guests to the members of the Sixteenth Legislature:

The Right Honorable Ratu Sir Kamisese Mara, Prime Minister of Fiji;

The Honorable Geoffrey Henry, Prime Minister of the Cook Islands;

The Honorable Herman T.F. Lum, Chief Justice, Supreme Court of Hawaii, and Mrs. Lum;

Mrs. Lynne Waihee, the First Lady of the State of Hawaii, who was presented a floral lei by Representative Apo;

Lieutenant General Claude M. Kicklighter, Commanding General, U.S. Army Pacific;

Lieutenant General Jack B. Farris Jr., Deputy Commander in Chief, U.S. Pacific Fleet;

Rear Admiral William A. Earner, Commander, Naval Surface Group, MIDPAC;

Rear Admiral William C. Donnell, District Commander, Fourteenth Coast Guard District; and

The Honorable Masaji Takahashi, Dean of the Consular Corps.

The Chair then appointed Senators Hagino, Aki and George, and Representatives Apo, Taniguchi and Anderson to escort the Honorable John David Waihee, Governor of the State of Hawaii, to the rostrum.

Senator Ann Kobayashi and Representative Rosalyn Baker presented Governor Waihee with a maile-ilima lei on behalf of the Senate and House of Representatives.

The Speaker then presented to the members of the Sixteenth Legislature and guests, the Honorable John D. Waihee.

The Governor addressed the Joint Session as follows:

"President Wong, Speaker Kihano, members of the Sixteenth Legislature, honored guests, ladies and gentlemen:

"Today, as we gather, our hearts are heavy, our country at war. Over 8,300 Hawaii-based military men and women are serving with thousands of our fellow Americans in the Middle East. It is right that we honor their sacrifice with a moment of silence. Let us bow our heads, and, in our ways, give a silent prayer for their safe return.

"Thank you.

"Four years ago I stood before you for the first time and declared our intention to be an activist state government, creating an economic and social environment right for our Pacific community entering the 21st century.

"Thereafter, we opened the doors and the minds of government to new partnerships and new approaches. As a result, the people of Hawaii have many new gains: universal access to health care insurance; the A+ afterschool program; a school superfund and the beginnings of school reform; a university system rated in the country's top ten in educational quality for the dollar; a comprehensive state housing program; tax reform recently referred to in the Wall Street Journal as 'dropping far faster than any state's'; land-banking and the best state endangered species propagation facility in America.

"We've worked hard at getting ahead.

"Today, I want to talk to you about staying ahead.

"We face heavy odds: federal deficits, a national recession, war, the threat of terrorism, energy instability, and military use of commercial aircraft. Any one of these conditions, while alarming, we would have managed as a tough task. Together, they may be the greatest threat to our economy in our state's history.

"The Federal Government faces a staggering 3.2 trillion-dollar national debt. To place that in context, on a per capita basis, Hawaii residents pay more for interest -- just interest -- on the national debt than they do in Hawaii state personal income tax.

"To avoid deeper debt, the Federal Government is increasing taxes, cutting services and mandating the states to do more with less federal help. The reality is that with problems as deep and wide as homelessness and pollution, Washington has no coherent domestic policy. In effect, they are passing us the buck, without giving us a buck to do it.

"We also face a national recession, the first in eight years. It has ravaged certain sections of this country. Some states, and we are one, have avoided its harsh grasp, but none will avoid its impacts.

"We are a world at war and with war comes increased stress on already burdened economic conditions. Despite the best of intentions, the national deficit will obviously increase. The instability of oil prices and supply has exacerbated the national recession, increased the cost of living and the price of travel. The military deployment of civilian aircraft affects all domestic carriers. The growing anxiety over international terrorism is affecting all

destinations, as consumers become increasingly concerned about security.

"As a result, Hawaii's tourism industry is suffering. Hotel occupancies are down, advance bookings have fallen off, and for the first time, group tours are cancelling. Fortunately, the eastbound travel market, especially from Japan, continues to be strong. Nonetheless, if present trends continue, we face even more severe consequences, including the possibility of employee layoffs.

"Furthermore, since tourism is our primary industry, the economic impact of the slowdown is already being felt in other sectors of our economy.

"The question we now face is how we respond to this set of challenges.

"Do we sit back and take what comes? Do we passively lower our goals as a society? Or do we take stock, take action and stay ahead?

"I propose we stay ahead. We do it with: (1) security to protect our people; (2) economic action to offset downturns and promote recovery; and (3) fiscal fitness so that we meet our people's needs with the resources that we have.

"To begin with, we must remember that we are all in this together. Nothing comes before the welfare and safety of our people. Nothing.

"Security measures are in place to protect the public. I will not apologize for inconveniences at airports or anywhere else. That's all part of tightening up.

"We are monitoring the flow of consumer goods to Hawaii. There is no shortage or anticipated shortage of any essential. Indeed, I would like to report an oversupply, not undersupply, of rice by our major supplier, California. You see one of their biggest customers, Iraq, hasn't placed any orders for a while. Folks, there is simply no reason to hoard anything.

"The flow of fuel to Hawaii remains steady and we are assured a solid 90-day supply. We wisely activated our emergency energy plan months ago, and although I hope never to implement its higher level actions, we are ready. I have instructed the State Energy Office to hold a news conference in the near future to update the public on the emergency energy plan.

"On the subject of military deployment of civilian aircraft, we will continue to monitor effects.

"Whatever transpires, prior actions we've taken to increase and diversify air service readies us for this situation. In the last four years we have increased the number of international carriers to Hawaii from 19 to 25. We are participating in air rights negotiations involving 13 different countries which have already given us 448,000 new seats from international cities in 1990 and 851,000 in 1991. No one will cut off our highways in the sky.

"Incidentally, while we are discussing the topic of our people's security, I believe that it is time to stop the proliferation of military-style assault weapons in our society. Before a tragedy occurs, I urge you to support the crimefighters' coalition on this matter.

"We must pursue measures that offset the downward turn of our economy and work toward Hawaii's economic recovery. The success of our state's economy is

fundamental to the success of everything we want to achieve as a society. We must build from our strengths:

- From an economy that over the last four years grew at an average rate which was 89% faster than the nation's.
- From the power of small businesses, where Hawaii ranked third in growth in the nation in 1989.
- From a very healthy job growth rate, 66% higher than the nation's from 1986 to 1989.
- From a 1990 unemployment rate that was the second lowest in the country.

"Yesterday's challenge was to improve our business climate. Today's challenge is to sustain a balanced economy. I call it staying ahead.

"The most basic need of our recovery strategy is to move quickly to revitalize our travel industry.

"Thus, I have already approved a 1.4 million-dollar four-week radio, direct mail and print media promotion campaign targeted toward our base market on the West Coast where we believe the quickest response is possible. The campaign will be equally funded by state and private industry and implemented as soon as prudently possible given our nation's wartime sensitivities.

"In addition, I will ask you for a special appropriation to fund major promotions in our big markets immediately when the war ends.

"While these countermeasures are absolutely vital to our present economic well-being, they are supplemental to our existing strategy of developing new markets. We must continue these efforts to ensure the long term vitality of our travel industry.

"Important to our tourism plant is the development of a Waikiki convention center. There is no better time than right now to review this project. If the present site is inappropriate for the center as legislated, we should consider expanding the site, making the center smaller or moving it. If the Aloha Motors site will meet our industry's needs, then so be it. In any event, it is time we make this project work or forget about it.

"Staying ahead means helping business stimulate business. It does not mean sending dollars out of our economy to be held in a trust fund in Washington, which is exactly what we are doing with the unemployment insurance tax. The Department of Labor tells me that our unemployment insurance fund is so strong right now it can sustain 12% unemployment for two solid years.

"This session I will again submit to you a proposal to reduce unemployment insurance costs and provide a job training fund. Let's keep our monies at home to stimulate our economy and benefit our businesses, especially small businesses, and workers.

"As we enter the final decade of this century, Hawaii must realize fully its potential as a center of Pacific trade, finance and commerce. Many sectors of our economy are ready to enter the exciting and challenging export market. To help Hawaii business work in the global marketplace, we are developing an international business center with data base services on trade which will be available to Hawaii businesses in the next few months.

"Our Office of International Relations will provide the leadership to ensure that 'thinking globally, acting locally'

is more than a slogan. The time has come to define international activities on our own terms.

"One bright spot in our present economic outlook is the construction industry. Staying ahead means priming its economic pump. By doing this we achieve the dual objectives of keeping people working and catching up on our much needed public infrastructure.

"For example, I have asked the Department of Education and the Department of Accounting and General Services to implement a year-round program for the construction and repair and maintenance of schools.

"Our housing program will continue at full speed, not only to meet the shelter needs of our people but also to stimulate construction.

"The improvement of our transportation facilities also must continue. Unfortunately, the Highway Revenue Task Force reports that in the last several years, costs have outpaced revenues, creating a need for more income for the highway fund.

"I will submit the recommendation of the task force to you for your consideration. I ask you to review this situation and consider whether an increase in the fuel tax is warranted.

"Energy is a concern for all of us. Today, it is no less basic to our survival than water.

"Recognizing this, we have initiated the approaches of integrated resource planning and demand-side management. We must consider all costs, including environmental and social, of each energy option. Through demand-side management, energy efficiency will be considered an energy option. It is well past time to reward conservation.

"In addition, we must continue our support of research and development of alternate energy resources. Geothermal energy remains an important option.

"On the policy level, we need to debate and decide whether alternate energy prices should be fixed to the price of oil. Is preservation of the environment and the reduction of reliance on oil worth the possible higher costs? For example, are we willing to guarantee our sugar growers a fixed price for energy production, regardless of the price of oil?

"Action is necessary at all levels.

"Staying ahead means staying fiscally fit as a state. During the last few years, with huge budget surpluses, maintaining fiscal fitness was an enviable task. Today, given our current economic condition, we are clearly in for diet and exercise.

"Last October, when the world seemed a lot simpler, the Hawaii State Council on Revenues estimated that state tax revenues would increase by 8.5% this fiscal year, 11% next fiscal year and 6.8% the following year. These revenue estimates, while healthy when compared to the rest of the country, were modest compared to the revenue increases we received in the recent past.

"Accordingly, we submitted a budget to you on December 27th that scaled down spending and proposed moderate increases for priority programs. What it cut most of all were spending expectations.

"Well, two weeks ago, prior to the outbreak of the war, the council revised downward the October revenue estimates. Based largely on the greater than anticipated

impact the national recession was having on our travel industry, the council indicated that tax revenues would be approximately 150 million dollars less for the biennium than predicted.

"Will even that conservative projection hold? Given our current state of economic flux, your leadership and I have our doubts, and thus, have taken the extraordinary action of asking the council to reconvene tomorrow and review their current estimates.

"Upon receipt of the revenue estimates, we will do the following:

1. Develop a new financial plan for the upcoming biennium. We have agreed with your legislative leadership to jointly develop this financial plan so that we may have common parameters in the preparation of the state budget.
2. Institute additional administrative spending guidelines for this fiscal year. We already have in place spending restrictions to promote efficiency and savings. These will be enhanced to create additional savings for this fiscal year; and
3. Submit for your consideration revisions to the state budget proposal that is presently before you.

"Our objective remains the development of a state budget that is disciplined yet focused on the priority needs of our state. To do this, we must be willing to reallocate existing resources from lower priority programs to higher priority ones. We must choose our goals and shape government to achieve them, not create government and then wend in our goals.

"Indeed, what better time than now to take a totally fresh look at how government can do better with the tasks it has at hand. We need to ask the question: Can we fundamentally shift the ways in which we approach and handle the jobs of state government in order to minimize the resources required. Thus, I have instructed the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs Director, Robbie Alm, to develop a 'Mini Hoover Commission' to oversee this important reassessment.

"In the days ahead you and I will have to make some tough choices as we pursue our people's agenda. Yet the choices we make today will make the difference tomorrow. These are some of the priorities I see:

"Education. You and I have made historic appropriations to public education -- a 54% increase in the last four years. We reached agreement on a competitive four-year teachers' contract, created the nation's first school facility superfund and made real progress in school repair.

"More than money, two years ago we called for a revolution in public education. Today we are in the middle of that revolution, and the rallying cry is ownership and results. The struggle will end when the schools are controlled by the people who use them, and our students are reaching the high standards we set for them.

"But have our actions and allocation of resources really supported the cry for ownership and results? I propose this course for public education.

"For ownership, we must begin by increasing flexibility. I propose taking the approximately 70 million

dollars a year now budgeted for a collection of some 40 programs which have been placed on the school system top-down over the years, and turning it over in lump sum to the Board of Education. No mandates, no strings, no sacred cows. Just allocate it towards reform and educational progress. New schools mean new schools of thought.

"In addition, we must make school/community-based management a success. We should increase incentive funding for SCMB schools. We need working, successful models in the community. When we have the quality, the quantity will follow. As was originally intended, special needs schools should be incorporated into SCMB and provided the widest array of services possible.

"We must test delivery systems for early childhood education, with the priority being for special needs school communities. Possible approaches include enhancing Head Start and expanding the open doors program.

"For results, I call for the creation of a Commission for Performance Goals. The commission would finally and firmly set the performance standards of achievement expected of all students. Curriculum can't be planned or resources prioritized without clear goals in place.

"Finally, as I said earlier with government as a whole, we must rethink the issue of governance in education. What we have structured for today was established for yesterday. As a result, public education does more hoop-jumping than any other unit of state government. As any significant change requires a constitutional amendment to be ratified by the voters, I call upon you to initiate hearings this session on all governance options. Let's air all the issues, finalize a proposal by next session, and put it before the voters in 1992.

"All of us took pride this fall when Money magazine found the University of Hawaii to be one of the top ten values nationally in public higher education. Its developing biotechnology program was cited by U.S. News and World Report as one of the four best in the nation, and its foreign language program was the first of three nationally to be designated as a national resource center for foreign language training.

"These achievements highlight the standing of our university system. We must continue to support and strengthen our statewide campuses and enhance our university's leadership role.

"We need your continued support of our comprehensive housing plan for both affordable ownership and rental housing. To leverage the contribution of the private sector, our package for home ownership includes a 400 million-dollar Hula Mae bond authorization.

"To stimulate rental housing, I am proposing 23 million dollars for elderly, special needs and low income projects; 8.5 million dollars for a new affordable project in Kakaako; 100 million dollars for rental housing bonds and 11 million dollars in rental assistance funds.

"Urban core rental housing is at the top of the state's priority list. We currently have over 900 such units under development. But it will take state, county and private sector partnerships to really do the job. We will submit to you this session a report identifying vacant or underutilized state lands which could be used for rental projects by government, or by the private sector working together with government. The state and city (I'm very pleased to have the Mayor here today) have already joined together in planning for a project at the Pawa Police Station site where at least 1,000 units could be built. That is the wave of the future.

"We must also view and act upon leasehold condominium conversion as an affordable housing issue. In an incredibly tight housing market, we want people who live in condominiums to enjoy the security of shelter. This may require unique solutions, and the guiding principle will be fairness to all involved. This will not be an easy task, but we cannot let that deter us. Lt. Governor Ben Cayetano has been working for many months on this issue, and we will be presenting our proposal to you in the days ahead.

"Homelessness is a national disgrace. In Hawaii there are perhaps 3,000 homeless families. Today, thanks to the state, counties and Homeless Concerns Advisory Committee, we house 250 families in ten facilities and have outreach services for another 500.

"Working with these groups, we have come up with a 12 million-dollar proposal for the homeless, as a catalyst for a public-private emergency housing program to shelter 500 more families in temporary villages on Oahu.

"These actions alone are not enough, when speculation has driven the cost of housing beyond so many peoples' reach. I will again propose an anti-speculation tax for your consideration. In addition, I propose that we work jointly with the counties and the private sector to seek ways to put investor-held condominiums, which are now vacant, back into the rental market.

"Ten thousand people have gotten health care coverage since Hawaii became the first state to offer universal health insurance. One of them is Mrs. Edith Gifford of Waiānae, who wrote and told us that her husband passed away and she had no medical benefits. With her new coverage she said, (and I quote) 'I will be able to sleep better knowing that I have a doctor or hospital to go to.'

"Mrs. Gifford, we will all sleep better knowing that.

"Despite our efforts, we see a health care crisis looming in the nation. To help avoid it here, we have created a blue ribbon committee, bringing together all sectors to improve the quality of our services in a more cost effective manner.

"I call for your special attention in the area of our state community hospitals. Our goal has always been to assure quality medical services statewide, especially in the otherwise underserved rural areas of our state; and for the most part, our state community hospitals have accomplished that result.

"Also, our community hospital system at one time achieved a good degree of economic self-sufficiency. However, in the recent past and for the foreseeable future, with the rising cost of medical care, our community hospitals will require additional subsidies. Furthermore, it is questionable whether our current system of managing hospitals is appropriate for these high-tech times. Therefore, I propose that this session we go beyond the concept of autonomy and explore new management models using the private sector as a resource to run our community hospitals. Likewise, we should continue to support the development of public/private joint ventures like the North Kohala Community Hospital.

"The key word in health care is prevention. We need to fight teen pregnancy, drug abuse, infant mortality and Aids. These are not merely goals of state government; they are goals of society.

"Among the forgotten people of this country are the mentally ill. In difficult economic times, their voice may be lost. As we rebuild this state's mental health system, I

call for your support of budgetary action which significantly strengthens treatment at the Hawaii State Hospital and community mental health centers statewide. I ask you to join me in July, as we open the doors of not merely a new building but a new day for mental health in Hawaii.

"As human services at the state level expand, so has the use of non-profit agencies to deliver these services. Like you, I've seen much of the good work first-hand. However with rapid growth has come concern for duplication and overlap. I call for a very careful review of the purchase of service process this legislative session, to ensure the system avoids duplication, cuts costs and enhances delivery of service.

"Last year, with your support we settled the longstanding disagreement over revenues due the Office of Hawaiian Affairs from the ceded land trust. This year I have submitted to you an action plan pursuant to Act 395, Session Laws of Hawaii 1988, to further address controversies under the Hawaiian Home Lands Trust, and the Public Land Trust.

"It calls for action to remedy historic controversies, basic to the fulfillment of the current and future obligations under both trusts. It sets in motion a process involving the people most affected by the trusts, as well as the leaders of this state. It notes clearly our collective responsibility to pursue action in federal arenas as well.

"The primary asset of the Hawaiian Homes Program is its land trust. Accordingly, I have directed the attorney general, the Department of Land and Natural Resources, the Office of State Planning, and Hawaiian Home Lands to immediately convene a task force to accelerate the process of clearing title and compensating the trust for illegal or improper withdrawals, transfers, takings or uses. This is not a task force to study the issue. There are over 13,000 acres of land claims. The assignment is to resolve these claims in creative ways to make the trust both whole and stronger.

"For past controversies involving individual beneficiaries, I propose a Board of Individual Claims Resolution. The board will provide a means for beneficiaries to bring past claims before a neutral body, without the costs and time delays associated with the judicial process.

"Even as we take these steps, there is much more to consider. The time has come to confront the issues of self-determination and governance as they affect the Hawaiian Home Land and Public Land Trusts. Should there be an elected Hawaiian Home Lands Commission? Should the two trusts be combined? Should there be a starting over, with a new sovereign entity created to represent the Hawaiian people, and administer both trusts?

"I ask you to consider these issues. Our vision of making things right means making things whole. The 21st century must have a place for Hawaiians and non-Hawaiians alike.

"This year we will take further strides to apply the old adage 'waste not, want not' to our lives. At a time when county landfills are overflowing, we propose statewide technical assistance for county recycling programs. Furthermore, we will propose a bill to transform state government itself from a huge waste generator to a recycling leader.

"For those times when systems break down and because the Coast Guard will no longer handle land-based spills, we propose beefing up our state Oil and Hazardous Waste

Emergency Response Team. I am also pleased to announce that this year we will break ground on construction of our own public health and environmental lab. Now when parents fear that their children have contracted leptospirosis from a swim in a stream, we will be able to test right here, not in Atlanta, Georgia. It could be a matter of life or death.

"In my 1990 state of the state address, I articulated the community's call to save the Heeia Wetlands. Today, I (join with Senator McCartney, Representative Tom and others to) happily announce that an agreement has been reached which will allow the Heeia Wetlands to remain undeveloped forever. We have saved Heeia.

"I also announce action to designate Mount Olomana a significant geological feature and unique site, to qualify it for protected subzone status within our conservation district, standing as a pristine symbol of the Windward side.

"I report to you that we have saved the ancient Hawaiian burial ground at Honokahua on Maui and are in the process of acquiring 5.5 additional acres at Makena Beach to add to the state park.

"On Kauai, we have acquired Brennecke Beach and given it to the county as a permanent public park.

"On the Big Island, we are creating a seven-mile coastal wilderness park through a series of actions including the condemnation and acquisition of Mahaiula and other purchases and exchanges.

"At my last 'Capitol for a Day,' the North Kohala community asked me to work with them to keep their coastline in open space. In December, my family and I visited this unique area. Today, I ask you to join the Kohala community (Senator Solomon) and me in saving as much of the North Kohala coastline as possible.

"And at long last and proudly, the sun is rising on the return of Kahoolawe (to the people of Hawaii).

"These are important actions. But more than going parcel by parcel, we must look at our conservation lands as one irreplaceable resource. So, I have instructed the Office of State Planning to identify valuable lands statewide to add to our conservation district, and the Department of Land and Natural Resources, with support from you, to strengthen the protection and management of these lands.

"The re-creation of our future is more important today than it was a scant year ago. Former Secretary of State George Schultz said: 'Start with the recognition that something profound has happened. This is a new epoch, that doesn't mean everything is different -- but it means all the important things are different.' The world, futurists have asserted, is entering an age of paradox.

"And that was before the war.

"More than anything else, the war has brought into sharp focus the questions we have about our future. Our future as an island state and as a people in a world that is profoundly different. We are caught up in the emotion of the day, and forget how well prepared we are for these tumultuous times.

"We are used to paradox. We call it diversity. Neither east nor west, part of America -- yet still an island people looking inward and outward at the same time. Pacific people carving out an international identity, and stubbornly guarding our values, traditions and quality of life.

"The world is swirling around us; events touching each of our lives. Nevertheless, we have a choice, the means and the will, to step boldly to re-create our future in the ways that we want it to be when this war ends. And this war will end.

"In these troubled times, when civilization shakes, it is the best time to put our beliefs to work. Our success depends on how swiftly we act, how boldly and creatively we venture, how far we reach out to each other.

"Let there be no mistake. This is our calling. There is great work to be done.

"Thank you."

Senate President Wong then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Governor Waihee, for your very frank and sobering remarks.

"You have pointed out the dilemma facing all of us state policymakers very clearly and very sharply. We appreciate your candor.

"The worldwide economic recession which has been spreading across the Mainland has finally reached Hawaii's shores. That, compounded by the devastating economic impact of the Middle East War, has severely affected our economic well-being.

"Recent world events remind us again of the interdependence of all humanity, and of how events on the opposite side of the world can have a profound impact on us here in Hawaii.

"With projected state revenues going down, we in the Legislature are going to be confronted with some very difficult choices. We will have to cut back on some very worthy programs because of the shortfall of funds. We hope to be able to work together closely with you and your administration in making the critical decisions, which will hopefully be wise, efficacious and compassionate.

"I must confess that it is not always easy to focus on our local fiscal problems at a time when men and women are confronting the perils of war. Our thoughts go out especially to those military personnel from Hawaii who are deployed in the Middle East - and to their families here at home who are anxiously awaiting their return. Our prayers are with them.

"In the meanwhile, we must carry on. For those of us in the Legislature, we have our work cut out for us. In addition to addressing our budgetary concerns, you have pointed out a number of areas where we need to pay special attention - education, the environment, economic recovery and growth, housing, health and human services. We stand prepared to work with you on dealing with these issues. On a personal note, I applaud your strong words against assault weapons. Let us do our best. Let us rise to the challenges before us.

"There being no further business, I hereby declare this joint session of the Hawaii State Legislature adjourned."

At 10:54 o'clock a.m., President Wong declared the Joint Session adjourned.

#### STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT

Senator Mizuguchi, for the Committee on Employment and Public Institutions, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1) recommending that H.C.R. No. 2, as amended in S.D. 1, be adopted.

Senator Mizuguchi moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.C.R. No. 2, S.D. 1, be adopted, seconded by Senator Crozier.

Senator Mizuguchi rose to speak in support of the resolution as follows:

"Mr. President, the yellow ribbon attached to the standing committee report on House Concurrent Resolution No. 2 signifies the import of this resolution and our feelings that we have for this resolution.

"Mr. President, I support -- and ask all members of this honorable body to support -- this resolution.

"This resolution declares that the Legislature unwaveringly supports the men, women and families of the United States armed forces participating in the Persian Gulf conflict.

"This resolution also extends to them our prayers for peace and the safe return of those in the conflict.

"As the resolution states, reasonable people can differ on the issues, but we should all agree that the men and women who risk making the supreme sacrifice deserve our support.

"It is especially appropriate for the Hawaii State Legislature to express its support because of the large number of personnel who were sent to the Gulf from installations here in Hawaii.

"Mr. President, let us hope that there will be an early conclusion to the war. In the meanwhile, we all want our sons and daughters in uniform to know that we are behind them all the way.

"Thank you, and peace, Mr. President."

Senator Solomon also rose to speak in support of the resolution and said:

"Mr. President, I speak in support of the previous speaker and would just like to add my remarks.

"No. 1, the democratic process allows for an expression of dissent. Although we know that there are many pros and cons about what is going on, especially in reference to the war with Iraq, there are those that oppose the USA going to war and there are those who agree. As for the preservation of freedom throughout the world, we should restrain such tyrants as Saddam Hussein.

"Mr. President, at this time I just would like to, for the record, state the positions of our congressional delegation in terms of their voting record on this serious matter. Our congressional delegation first voted for a more diplomatic effort before a commitment to war. They voted against giving the President the authority to use immediate force at his discretion. This was the resolution that was passed 53 to 46. Now that the war has been declared, our congressional delegation has passed the resolution supporting the efforts of our troops. Through the passage of this resolution, Mr. President, we also will be doing the same.

"This is a positive method of our democratic government. It allows diverse convictions, but when the majority prevails we join hands toward a common goal. A democratic government allows us to be against our government. However, true Americans should not be pro-enemy.

"Mr. President, I too would urge the members to support this resolution."

Senator Matsuura also added his support and remarked:

"Mr. President, I also stand in support of the resolution. I just want to make a comment that reflects my appreciation to Israel which is restraining from attacking in retaliation of attacks on them. I just want to put in the record that this body truly appreciates the action that Israel has taken. It is very hard to be an innocent bystander, get attacked, and not retaliate. I don't know what else Saddam Hussein has in store to lash

against Israel to draw them into the war. Knowing of the history of the people of Israel for what they suffered under Hitler, they have every right to retaliate instead of just taking it. By not retaliating, Israel has won. I don't know what future attacks Israel is going to encounter, but I just wanted the citizens of Israel to know that we appreciate the action the leaders of Israel have taken in restraining and holding back their forces for the benefit of peace in the Gulf. Thank you very much."

Senator Cobb also supported the resolution and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the resolution.

"It makes a notable distinction and I think a very important one of preserving the right of freedom of people to criticize the war by urging that they not criticize those who fight in it; that it's okay to disagree with the war policy, that's a part of our freedom, even though that war is undeclared, not to criticize the warriors who have to do the fighting.

"I can remember coming home as a Vietnam veteran three weeks after myself and three other GIs spent an hour and a half talking to a six-year-old Vietnamese boy out of using a hand grenade. Yet, we were condemned as baby killers. Nothing could be further from the truth.

"It is, in fact, very important that our soldiers, sailors, airmen and marines, both men and women, recognize the warmth and support of the American people when they come home.

"There remains one other unaddressed issue in this resolution, Mr. President, and that is that sooner or later we as a nation are going to have to help solve the problem of Palestine; that the Arab nations are going to be required to recognize the existence of Israel with secure borders and at the same time Israel is going to need to recognize the right of the Palestinian people to form their own nation with mutual respect for each other. If we fail to address that, then, Mr. President, our children and our grandchildren will still be fighting in the Middle East because after Saddam Hussein there will be another leader to rise on the tide of resentment that exists in the Middle East. We've already seen a Nasser; we've seen Ayatollahs; we've seen a Saddam Hussein try to take advantage of this. Others will be doing the same, unless and until that problem is also addressed. But in no way would I attempt to link the solution of Palestine to what is happening now. That is a separate issue that needs to be addressed for our collective future -- their's and our's.

"I urge the adoption of the resolution, and thank the members for expressing their support. Thank you."

Senator Crozier added his support as follows:

"Mr. President, I speak in favor of the resolution, and I salute anyone who has taken any position on this war. I salute those individuals who have taken the time to try to understand why we are in Iraq and Saudi Arabia because only through dialogue can democracy function.

"I would like to share just one point which I feel has not been discussed much in the media or in different dialogues that many of our leaders have talked about. That point is, many people say this war is over oil. Yes, Mr. President, this war is over oil. OPEC no longer functions. OPEC no longer can strangle the world because nations like Saudi Arabia and Kuwait did not stay within their quotas ... to the late 1970s and 1980s. They continued to over-pump so that our nation could have oil. We have an obligation to come to their defense because, can you imagine if the oil crisis of 1973

continued until today. In '73 I think oil hit \$38 a barrel. Imagine what our economy would have been like for the last 17 years if we have had to pay that. Saudi Arabia came to our rescue. Kuwait came to our rescue. We have a moral obligation to come to their defense.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator McMurdo supported the resolution and added:

"Mr. President, I support this resolution very strongly. I would only add one remark and that is for those who are hurt and puzzled by the fact that this country has gone to war should go back and read the history on World War II. Read especially about Prime Minister of England Neville Chamberlain and what happened when he met with Hitler in 1938 and tried to appease him. There are at least two countries -- Czechoslovakia and Poland -- that are still not really free because of those actions. It is impossible to appease people like Hitler and Saddam Hussein.

"I urge everybody to vote for this. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 2, S.D. 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION DECLARING THE LEGISLATURE'S UNWAVERING SUPPORT FOR THE MEN AND WOMEN OF THE UNITED STATES ARMED FORCES AND THEIR FAMILIES DURING THE CONFLICT IN THE PERSIAN GULF," was unanimously adopted on a rising vote.

At 11:53 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:56 o'clock a.m.

## THIRTEENTH DAY

Monday, February 4, 1991

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, convened at 11:35 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Julia McKenna Ritchie, Ministry for Divine Harmony, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Aki, Chang, Koki and Nakasato who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twelfth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Crozier introduced the Honorable Baboo Wickramarante, Honorary Consul of Sri Lanka, and said:

"Mr. President, this morning I would like to share with my colleagues that today is the 43rd anniversary of Sri Lanka's independence from British colonial rule and we have with us Mr. Baboo Wickramarante.

"Prior to Sri Lanka having its own name, it was known as Ceylon. Today, across the world while many nations are struggling with sovereignty -- the Baltic states trying to break away from Russia and deciding their own future, right here in our own state Hawaiians are trying to have the ability to determine their own future, it is good to look at a nation like Sri Lanka which is steeped with tradition, culture and law.

"One of the best examples of Sri Lanka is ... I guess it was about 10 years ago ... they wanted to put in an irrigation system to bring the water from the wet side to the dry side and they looked at all the topographic maps and then started to build this massive irrigation system which ran hundreds and hundreds of miles. Come to find out, as they started to dig the trenches for the irrigation system, they discovered an irrigation system that was over two thousand five hundred years old. Their culture had already designed the system so that, of course, immediately expedited the digging of the irrigation system. But the point I am trying to make is, many of the countries, many of the states today are steeped in their own culture and their way of resolving problems. It would behoove all of us to respect every ethnic group's right to self-determination and to set their own course.

"Sri Lanka now has the second highest literacy rate among the Asian countries, behind Japan.

"At this time, I would like to introduce Mr. Baboo Wickramarante."

Mr. Wickramarante who was seated on the floor of the Senate rose to be recognized. He was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Crozier and a lei by Senator Ikeda.

"For those of you planning committee hearings, I ask that you schedule the lower numbered bills first. Please, and I repeat, please do not schedule hearings on higher numbered bills until they have been printed and made available to the public. Thank you."

Senator Blair at this time said:

"Mr. President, I would like to go on record as thanking your staff for what must have been a herculean effort over the weekend. I think its a tremendous benefit to the committees and I would like to express that."

The Chair thanked Senator Blair for his remarks.

#### MISCELLANEOUS COMMUNICATION

Misc. Com. No. 4, from the Historic Hawai'i Foundation dated February 4, 1991, transmitting the "Main Street Hawai'i 1990 Annual Report," was read by the Clerk and was placed on file.

Senator Solomon rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, both the State Constitution and the statutes give the Office of Hawaiian Affairs and the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands the right to revenues from certain public lands. OHA is entitled to 20 percent of the revenues from the use and disposition of ceded lands, and the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, 30 percent of the proceeds from the use of public lands leased for sugar cultivation.

"The 1990 Legislature realized that no mechanism existed to insure the fair evaluation of ceded lands and leased sugarcane lands so that the Office of Hawaiian Affairs and the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands would get fair entitlements. Especially when the lands are conveyed among state agencies, the value of the lands are grossly misrepresented. In many instances, the

Department of Land and Natural Resources has transferred lands to the Housing Finance and Development Corporation, especially those in Lahaina, for a nominal fee such as \$1.00, thus depriving the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands of substantial entitlements.

"Mr. President, this report (holds up report) was submitted to the 1991 Legislature. It is a study of revenue and entitlements to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands. And needless to say, Mr. President, if I had known this at the time I was a member of the Housing and Hawaiian Programs Committee, I would have never agreed to transfer the lands over to HFDC unless this issue of proper compensation to DHHL and OHA had been resolved.

"The auditor of the State of Hawaii in the February 1991 report, which I have referred to, has found the Department of Land and Natural Resources, which is responsible for administering public land trusts, has not met the trust obligations. The Department of Land and Natural Resources has sold, literally, Mr. President, sold sugarcane lands without resolving the issue of entitlements and without fully informing DHHL of significant land transactions. In appraising the value of these lands DLNR has not been consistent. The department has not carried out the statutes requiring it to plan for future uses of its land nor has it consulted with other agencies about potential conflicts in land use between such purposes as housing and agriculture.

"Mr. President, at this time I'd like to recommend to my colleagues, especially to the chairman of the Housing and Hawaiian Programs Committee as well as the chairman of Planning, Land and Water Use Management Committee, that perhaps these two committees should consider a moratorium on all land transactions concerning ceded and sugar lands until these issues are resolved. Thank you."

Senator Crozier also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I'd just like to thank the good Senator from the Kohala Coast in bringing up some valid points. I'd just like to let her be aware that she has my full support in this issue.

"Mr. President, the reason why any lands that are in sugar are either, when they're sold or when they're rented or when they are leased, whatever happens to the lands, the 30 percent carries over is because I put in an amendment in the State Constitution in 1978 to make sure that Hawaiian Home Lands would continue to be a participant in the revenue flow. It is something that I helped create, it was my amendment, and I chose to make this my special project. I will continue to bird-dog this issue to make sure that the native Hawaiian community gets the fair revenues from the lands that the state has control of. Thank you."

Senator Solomon then continued:

"Mr. President, I know that this is a point of personal privilege and I don't intend to debate the issue but I'd like to thank the previous speaker for his remarks. However, I think what this report brings out is the fact that the 'aina' was never appraised. So the statute may say 30 percent, but my question is 30 percent of what? I think that these are the issues that have to be resolved this session.

"The report cited that the 'aina' in Lahaina which was turned over, approximately 1,222 acres, is valued at \$39 million. And this is just a pedestrian off-the-street



appraisal. There has been no official appraisal. So I would like to go back to my previous remarks that this issue should be studied by both the Housing and Hawaiian Programs Committee and the Committee on Planning, Land and Water Use Management to make sure that the appraisals are official and professional so that the Office of Hawaiian Affairs and the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands receive fair entitlements. Thank you."

"Mr. President, your Committee on Executive Appointments held a hearing on January 30th to review the qualifications of Mrs. Crandall. Forty-eight persons submitted testimony, all of which favored her confirmation.

"Mrs. Crandall has served two years in private practice and five years as hearings officer for the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs. For the past three years, Mrs. Crandall has served as Commissioner of Securities and overseen the Business Registration Division of the DCCA.

"Comments consistently emphasized Mrs. Crandall's personal and professional demeanor and high ethical standards, judicial temperament and manner, competence, keen intelligence, thoroughness, fairness, patience and timeliness, and consensus-building abilities.

"Mrs. Crandall has committed herself to public service, and may continue that service with honor and distinction as a judge on the Circuit Court.

"Your committee on Executive Appointments has reviewed her qualifications, heard entirely favorable public testimony, and recommends confirmation of this appointment by the full Senate.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Cobb added his support of the nomination and said:

"Mr. President, I've had the opportunity to work with Ms. Crandall for many years while she's been a member of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, and found her to be an outstanding representative of the department.

"In addition, I might point out this nomination is possible due in large part to the wisdom of women voters who in the last election rejected a proposed amendment which would have required ten years of legal practice or experience prior to elevation to the circuit court. That was an issue that came out only during the course of the 1990 election. And I think this particular nomination and confirmation by the Senate demonstrates the wisdom of not imposing artificial requirements for members of the legal profession just based on gender. I commend this action to the members of the Senate because had that amendment passed there might have been some difficulty in moving this nomination forward. But we have an opportunity today to vote on an outstanding nominee for the circuit court without that kind of hindrance.

"I urge an 'aye' vote by every member of the Senate. Thank you."

Senator Blair also supported the nomination and remarked:

"Mr. President, I'd like to correct the record, the nominee meets the ten-year licensure requirement for a circuit court judgeship. I know because when I started practicing law in 1981 she had the office next to mine. Secondly, the bill that we passed last year, Senate Bill 103, dealt with district court judgeships. It proposed that

the five-year licensure requirement for district court judgeships under Article VI, Section 3, be raised to ten years. It wouldn't have affected this nomination, even if it had been ratified. I want to be sure the record is clear on those points."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Matsuura rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I hate to sound like a broken record, but I've always admonished the news media to report the news as it happens. Walter Cronkite had established his reputation on this point. He never created the news.

"There is an article this morning in the Advertiser and it's titled 'Bill calls for Oahu N-Plant. Considered as alternative to geothermal.'

"I'm just going to read the beginning portion of that article so that I can point out my objections to the article. The news article reads:

'Just when you thought geothermal power was the alternate-energy hot potato, state Sen. Tony Chang has introduced a bill to authorize development of a nuclear power plant on Oahu.

'While some snicker and dismiss it as a way-out idea, Sen. Richard Matsuura said he'll give Chang's bill a public hearing (and this is where the objectionable part comes in) and suggested it might be used to leverage support for geothermal in a lesser-of-two-evils choice for environmentalists.'

"I never said that and I even never suggested that because a statement like that will create an atmosphere of furor and that's exactly what happened! I've been getting a lot of phone calls.

"The intent of hearing this bill is to hear the pros and cons of the nuclear plant as a source of electrical power. Many of you know that countries like France produce 95 percent of its electrical energy from nuclear power. France also provides electrical power to adjoining countries like Italy. As far as the United States is concerned, one of the major sources for increase in electrical power has been nuclear. When it comes to firm power, one must understand that there are pluses and minuses for each of the energy sources. If you are talking firm power, you're looking basically at four fuels. One is nuclear; second is coal; third is oil; and fourth is geothermal.

"Some of the people are concerned about the global warming. If you're concerned about global warming, nuclear and geothermal are answers to that problem because they don't burn. However, it has some negative aspects. I want to make it very clear to the public that it was never my intent, as expressed in the paper, to 'leverage' one against the other. I have always been a proponent and supporter for geothermal energy because I firmly believe that of the four fuel sources geothermal has the least impact on the environment.

"I hope that in the future when the news media report news that they report the news as accurately as they can, and never create news to create confrontation. Thank you very much."

At 11:43 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:45 o'clock a.m.

Senator Holt then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, several days ago we both received a letter signed by the leaders of certain organizations who actively support the concept of land use initiative. As you may recall, one of the issues cited in the letter was a question of your motives, Mr. President, in referring Senate Bill No. 374 to the Committee on Planning, Land and Water Use which I chair. The other issue concerned my ability or lack of it as a committee chairman to carry out my duties and responsibilities in a fair and objective manner.

"For the record, Mr. President, I would like to read to you and the rest of the body a portion of that letter:

'When you and other leaders of the Democratic Party pledged last May to give this bill a hearing, we did not believe that you would allow it to have a mock hearing by a committee chairman who is caught in a conflict of interest that dooms the bill to certain death.'

"Is this not, Mr. President, a vicious and personal attack on our moral character and integrity? Does it not, Mr. President, describe you as a liar, which I know you're not, and me as someone who is easily compromised? I think it does, Mr. President, and I resent it on a personal as well as a professional basis.

"I would like to remind our accusers, Mr. President, that as elected officials we are required by the State Constitution to take an oath of office (Article XVI, Section 4), and in that oath we solemnly swear or affirm that we will faithfully discharge our duties to the best of our abilities. I take this oath very seriously, Mr. President, because it represents my personal pledge to the people of this state that I will fulfill the people's faith and trust to the very best of my ability.

"In addition, Mr. President, the State Constitution also reminds us that, and I quote: 'The people of Hawaii believe that public officers and employees must exhibit the highest standards of ethical conduct and that these standards come from the personal integrity of each individual in government.'

"For the record, Mr. President, I have discussed this aspect of the State Constitution with Mr. Dan Mollway, executive director of the State Ethics Commission. Mr. Mollway essentially agrees that with the exception of the financial disclosure requirement and the adoption of the code of ethics by the Legislature, elected officials are expected by the people to conduct themselves in an honorable manner.

"In my thirteen years as an elected representative of the people, Mr. President, I have lived by these constitutional requirements and the trust of my constituents and colleagues. I also believe, Mr. President, that this is the primary reason for the reassurance and support that I have received from the general public and the members of this body as a result of the attack on my integrity.

"In closing, Mr. President, I would also like to comment on the editorial I am sure most of you have seen in yesterday's edition of the Honolulu Advertiser regarding my alleged conflict of interest. According to the Advertiser, the existence of a conflict depends on, and I quote, 'whether a reasonable person might think so.' The editorial goes on to say that 'we think so.'

"As I stated earlier, Mr. President, I believe that the State Constitution appropriately addresses these matters by properly relegating the primary responsibility to the



individual in question. As for the Honolulu Advertiser's suggestion of a reasonable person test, I wholeheartedly agree that this is a valid concern for any public official or employee. When the Advertiser or any other publication appoints itself as that reasonable person, however, it essentially abandons its objectivity. I find it rather ironic, therefore, that the Advertiser can chastise public officials for not being fair and objective when they themselves choose not to be.

"I also received the facsimile from these organizations, dated yesterday, on a related matter, Mr. President. These organizations requested a meeting with me, with the media present, to discuss the referral of Senate Bill 374 to your Committee on Planning, Water and Land Use. Our response to them, Mr. President, was that all matters related to the bill referral process should be addressed to you.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

The Chair responded:

"The Chair would just like to clarify the point that was raised about referrals. All communications that are forwarded to the Senate are referred to the appropriate committees.

"In this case with this particular measure, dealing with land use and zoning, the President's office felt that it was properly referred to the Committee on Planning, Land and Water Use Management which deals with zoning and land issues. Secondly, that it was properly referred to our Committee on Transportation and Intergovernmental Relations which handles all matters pertaining to the counties. And thirdly, since the bill deals with election matters, if the bill should be moved for further discussion that it be moved to the Judiciary Committee.

"The Chair finds that it was a proper referral which has not been challenged to this date. Therefore, it is very proper for the matter to be referred to the Committee on Planning, Land and Water Use Management and the Committee on Transportation and Intergovernmental Relations."

Senator Fernandes Salling also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"In all fairness to Senator Holt it should be pointed out to those very same accusers that it's been conveniently forgotten that this bill was referred to the Committee on Transportation and Intergovernmental Relations first; thereafter to the Committee on Planning, Land and Water Use Management which is chaired by Senator Holt. And the third referral after it passes or doesn't pass the two joint committees would be to Judiciary.

"It is the responsibility of the chair of the first committee to schedule a hearing on this measure. And I would like to make it very clear that at no time has Senator Holt hesitated to hear this bill. In fact, the hearing has been scheduled for next week Wednesday in the auditorium and we're very anxious to proceed and air the issues on this very controversial matter.

"I believe it is important to clarify this and it is irresponsible for anyone to imply that a referral to Senator Holt's committee would essentially deny them a hearing on this bill."

Senator Matsuura also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I just want to remind this body that a similar measure was introduced last year. It was referred to my committee and also to the Judiciary Committee. In both cases, it didn't have enough votes to pass the measure out of the committee. Thank you."

Senator Cobb then rose on a point of information and remarked:

"Just a point of information, Mr. President.

"The commitment that was made last year, did that include a committee hearing and a floor vote or only a committee hearing on the measure?"

The Chair asked:

"You're referring to the Democratic Convention?"

Senator Cobb answered: "Correct."

The Chair answered:

"The discussions with the various groups involved with this issue, the agreement was made that should we be returned as presiding officers of the Senate, both Representative Kihano and myself, that we would have a hearing, only."

Senator Cobb continued:

"Thank you, Mr. President. That will be a separate matter later on to address various mechanisms for floor votes, but I won't raise that issue here in respect to the committee process and the fact that the Senate is already organized."

The Chair answered:

"The issue that's being discussed was an agreement with the parties involved that it be only relegated to the position of a hearing, and not necessarily a vote on the floor of the Senate."

At this time, Senator Tungpalan introduced her friend Mrs. Shoemaker and a group of young women from Kalakaua Intermediate School accompanied by Mr. Shoemaker.

## ADJOURNMENT

At 11:55 o'clock a.m., on motion by Senator Solomon, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Friday, February 15, 1991.

Friday, February 15, 1991

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, convened at 11:35 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

Senator McCartney, on behalf of Senator Koki and himself, introduced Mr. Fred Shiroma, also seated in the gallery, their intern from the Agricultural Leadership Foundation of Hawaii. Mr. Shiroma is a banana farmer from Luluku in Kaneohe.

**Wednesday, February 20, 1991**

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, convened at 11:35 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Allan Lee, United Church of Christ, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Chang who was excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twentieth Day.

Senator Solomon rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, your Committees on Science, Technology and Economic Development as well as Planning, Land and Water Use Management had a public hearing to receive testimony and to discuss Senate Bill 1233, Relating to Income Tax Surcharge. Mr. President, as you know, I represent the West Hawaii District, North and South Kohala, as well as East Maui. My constituents are very much in support of a bill such as this, and I would like to speak on behalf of my constituents and on behalf of this bill.

"Mr. President, the adoption of this bill will be the result of a cooperative effort between the administration and the Legislature to resolve the problems of speculation and foreign investment. Together with Act 213, Session Laws of Hawaii 1990, providing for the withholding of tax on capital gains on the sale of real property, this bill will provide some mitigation on speculative investment in Hawaii of residential real property and of property which is later reclassified for residential purposes such as conservation and agricultural lands.

"The intent, Mr. President, of this bill is to slow down speculation, if not stop it, in residential or potential residential areas. Residential real property is the focus of this bill because this is where our residents are hurting the most.

"This bill exempts developers from the surcharge. Thus, Mr. President, the first sale of any interest by a developer of a developed land or condominium apartment would be exempt under this bill. There are eleven exemptions in this bill, including sales due to military orders or business reassignment, sales for purchase of another home, condemnation, leasehold conversion and the like.

"With the passage of this bill, those investors wishing to invest in Hawaii will be those interested in a longer investment run than may now be the case. Therefore, this bill should not defeat the state's intention of stimulating economic growth and encouraging business development through the infusion of investment capital in the state.

"Let me remind you, colleagues, that in 1973, 1974 and 1975 similar bills were introduced in the Legislature, but failed. It was then ten years before we realized that we are still facing a problem in the price of homes available in Hawaii.

"Beginning again in 1987, bills were introduced attacking this issue. Must we wait another ten years before action is taken while the prices of homes rise even higher?

"There can be no question that speculation is occurring in this state and that it is having an undesirable effect on land prices. This bill is but one way to get a handle on this problem.

"The one state with capital gains tax, Vermont, and the one study on that state's experience concludes that in Vermont this tax coupled with other controls probably reduced land speculation. This is what I am looking for and asking for.

"There is no emotion involved in this solution. As you know, the Legislature has been reviewing the alternatives. In the last session and in this session, we have considered a number of initiatives to control speculation, such as the 'use-it-or-lose-it' bill, the disclosure bill, and a bill to withhold taxes for property sales made by non-residents. This bill is yet another tool developed to meet the recurrent problem that faces Hawaii.

"Because the impact of this tax is neither draconian nor difficult to understand, I believe that it will accomplish its purpose to slow or stop speculation and will not be a drag on the economy as would many other bills being considered by the Legislature this session.

"Colleagues, let us take this initiative and help those of our constituents who do not qualify for affordable housing, who are now the new workforce and who otherwise must move to the mainland to own a home because they do not make enough income to buy a home in Hawaii. I am asking the chairmen of both committees to please take this into consideration, especially the crises that I am now facing in West Hawaii when our land, one acre is going for a million dollars.

"These are realities. These are the pragmatics of Hawaii we live in today, and I'm asking for your consideration on these bills that are before your committee. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, since this bill was heard in my committee and that of the Planning, Land and Water Use Management Committee, I think I should explain the intent of this measure.

"As the previous speaker said, we have passed some measures in curbing speculative buying. We passed the disclosure bill, the 'use-it-or-lose-it' bill, and we have also passed a bill that withhold tax due from non-residents selling their real estate property.

"Let me explain what this bill does. When a person buys a property and sells it within a period of one year,

he pays a 45 percent surcharge on the capital gain. If you hold it for up to two years, it is a 25 percent surcharge, and up to the third year it is a 12 percent surcharge. This surcharge is for residents, foreigners, everybody.

"Now, let's look at the impact. Let's take, for an example, a woman that owns a small piece of property next to the Ala Wai. She wants to build but she doesn't have the capital so let's say she contacts Dillingham Corporation. Dillingham then decides to go into partnership and then builds a condominium. This lady who owns the property and the developer then sells it to ABC Realty Company who sells the individual units in the condominium. If ABC Realty sells all the units within the first year, they're going to lose 45 percent of their capital gain. Who will build housing units with this law in the book?

"The question that you have to ask is, in a free market situation is speculation something bad? Are investors to be penalized? It is these investors who are making these housing developments to take place.

"Ask any banker, any businessman, any economist, and they'll tell you that the reason why Hawaii's economy is healthy is because of these investors that come to Hawaii. Do we want to give them the message that we don't want them to come to Hawaii to invest? You will be giving a negative report to them. If this bill passes, we need to examine the impact of this bill further. Thank you."

Senator Solomon then continued:

"Mr. President, I know that a point of personal privilege is not really for the purpose of debate, but I just felt compelled to make a response to the previous speaker's remarks.

"I can appreciate the Senator's concerns in terms of investors and speculation because no one knows that better than I do, as I represent the West Hawaii area. I would like to remind the Senator that the reason the bill has a three-year period is for this purpose. I don't want to get too involved in this, but the three-year period was chosen in the bill to slow down the rapid spiralling prices that happens when sales occur and recur in a short period of time. And I think that this is the issue that we're talking about in terms of speculation -- the spiralling cost of the 'aina.' And one just has to be reminded of the two large pieces of land in Mahiula which the state was interested in. You all read in the newspaper that it went from \$10 to \$17 to \$30 million in just one day.

"So, I think that the purpose of this bill really is to try to bring to the attention of the Legislature that this is a very, very serious problem, to bring to the attention of this body that something definitely has to be done. Because what we're interested in is securing those investors or entrepreneurs who are very serious when they come to Hawaii and make these kinds of investments.

"I do not consider this a bad bill. I consider this a stepping stone, as a bill that could be worked through the process, possibly this session and perhaps lead to something that is more palatable to all of us involved. I just would like to remind the two committee chairmen that this is a bill that is of great importance to my constituency. An average working person cannot even buy a home now in West Hawaii, North and South Kohala.

"So this is the reason for me bringing this matter up on a point of personal privilege. Thank you."

At 11:55 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:56 o'clock a.m.

At this time, Senator Koki introduced to the members of the Senate Ms. Leinaala Drummond, member of the Maui County Council, seated in the gallery.

Senator Tungpalan, on behalf of Senators Mizuguchi, Iwase and herself, then introduced a group of third and fourth grade students from the Hawaiian Language Immersion Program of Waiiau Elementary School and teacher Miss Noe Yong. (The students rose to be recognized and gave a recitation in the Hawaiian language for the Senators and guests.)

At this time, the Senate President made the following observation:

"Members of the Senate, you are reminded that Friday is the first lateral deadline. Senate bills must be reported out to the final committee by Friday in order to remain under active consideration. Hopefully, we can accomplish this without having to stay too late in session on Friday evening.

"Committee chairs are asked to get their committee reports drafted and circulated for signatures as early as possible. All Senators are requested to make themselves available over the next two days to sign committee reports.

"Please get the committee reports down to the Clerk's office as early as possible so that we can avoid the last minute logjam that occurs in our Printshop. Your cooperation will be appreciated. Thank you very much."

#### **ADJOURNMENT**

At 11:59 o'clock a.m., on motion by Senator Solomon, seconded by Senator Koki and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Thursday, February 21, 1991.

been an exciting period for the Hawaiian Home Lands Commission and the beneficiaries. Much of their agenda, which had been started throughout the years, are finally moving under her leadership and I expect to continue helping her move the agenda so that more people are able to get their homes.

"Thank you very much, Mr. President."

"The Chair would also like to thank Hoaliku for her commitment and also to point out that Hoaliku Drake is a long time resident of the Waiānae Coast. We are very proud of her work and we wish her well."

At 11:43 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:58 o'clock a.m.

At this time, Senator Blair rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I would like to thank the members of this body for their passage of House Concurrent Resolution No. 2, S.D. 1. I had intended to do it on that day but as a matter of personal privacy I decided not to. Circumstances have changed and I think it's now appropriate for me to do so.

"Before proceeding, I'd like to read briefly from the pertinent portions of that resolution, quote:

'... we must join together as one society and support the courageous and steadfast members of the Army, Navy, Air Force, and Marine Corps who risk making the supreme sacrifice to achieve world peace; now therefore,

'BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, the Senate concurring, that the legislature declares its unwavering support for the men, women, and families of the United States Armed Forces participating in the conflict in the Persian Gulf, and extends to them its prayers for peace and the safe return of our loved ones;'. (Pause.)

"In particular, I would like to thank Senators Mizuguchi, Solomon, Matsuura, Cobb, Crozier and McMurdo who added their own remarks to the record. (Pause.)

"I apologize to the members for being emotional on this. At the time, I considered making some comments on the floor because I did appreciate it. I have a cousin who is a Marine helicopter pilot. (Pause.) Excuse me.

"This subject does not come up without my becoming somewhat emotional and so I reserved comment at that time. But I do at this time want to because circumstances have changed somewhat. A new element has been added to the debate and I want to go on record as thanking my colleagues for adopting that resolution.

"So that we have the time frame correct, I note that it was on January 29th of this year that we adopted that resolution. Approximately two weeks later and because of the reservation requirements of the Hawaii Newspaper Agency we can understand with some degree of certainty that this occurred on or about the 15th or 16th of February. One of our colleagues reserved space with the Hawaii Newspaper Agency -- full-page advertising space. I'm not sure if its the 15th or 16th and I'm perfectly willing to be corrected if those dates are wrong. They also require 48 hours advance delivery of camera-ready copy, so we know that approximately on February 19th the camera-ready copy was also delivered to the Hawaii

Newspaper Agency. Again, if I'm incorrect on the date I would be more than happy to be corrected.

"On approximately the same day, it's not clear whether the delivery was made to the Clerk's office or the Hawaii Newspaper Agency first, a resolution, Senate Resolution 19, was submitted to the Clerk's office. Before submittal to the Clerk's office this resolution was not circulated among the members of the Senate for co-signatures. The introducer, surprisingly, had nothing to say at the time of the adoption of the previous resolution which, as far as I can determine, is on the same subject matter.

"Of course, we all know what happened on the 21st. We were told and the public was told, and I quote:

'..., if you're like me, you're frustrated and angry that Hawaii's congressional and state leadership has failed to adequately give voice to our support for our troops and President.'

"Mr. President, when I read that I was so incensed that I was glad that I was not in this chamber at the time or I might have done something that I would have cause to regret. Fortunately, I have had time to cool off in the intervening 24 hours. But I don't think it's fair or appropriate for one of our colleagues to publish comments like that about us. Comments which are both slanderous and, based upon our previous resolution, patently untrue. I'm deeply offended by that advertisement. It was done in such a blatantly manipulative way that it would be amusing if it were not so grotesque.

"It's not the first time a Senator put his political career ahead of his relationship to his colleagues, but I will not allow the Senator from the Second Congressional District to climb into Congress on the shoulders of my cousin and the hundreds of thousands of other men and women from our nation who are over there without his hearing a very loud protest from me.

"Thank you."

Senator Reed also rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege in response to the previous speaker. Perhaps because he's upset about the issue, I find it difficult to understand his objection.

"I supported the previous resolution but chose not to speak on behalf of it because it failed to adequately express what is my wholehearted support for not only the troops but also the reason that they are there, the U.S. and the U.N. policy. I felt that it was inadequate in terms of giving voice to the full support the people of Hawaii have for the troops and the purpose that they are in the Persian Gulf, and therefore exercised my right and my freedom to express my opinion with a follow-up resolution and an ad asking the people of Hawaii to attempt to push for its passage.

"I am disappointed the previous speaker takes offense at it, and assert my right as a state Senator and as an individual to express, as fully as possible, the will of the people and my own perspective on this issue. Thank you."

Senator McMurdo also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, on the same subject, my only reaction to the ad was one of sadness that my colleague who put it into the paper did not see fit to ask me if I would be willing to sign that resolution. And I felt as if that was a

slap in the face because I feel equally as strongly as he does about this issue, and really would like to have seen the other resolution go further but I didn't do anything about it. He did.

"I would like to have had the privilege of signing that rather than answering the phone from people who only leave their phone numbers, so that I can get back to say that I not only support the troops but I also support the President as Commander in Chief and support the vote of Congress on this, too.

"Thank you."

Senator Cobb also rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, first of all, to speak in support of what the Senate Judiciary chairman was saying; second, to disclose for the record that I am on 24-hour alert orders now, and that one phone call can send me to the Persian Gulf. This is something I would not shirk or duck or seek to evade in any way, shape or form. And third, when I receive those phone calls I personally resent not being asked to sign such a resolution, because from previous wars I know what it means to lay it on the line, and I know what it means to lose ten out of twelve of your closest friends, some of who died in my arms.

"And I think if we're talking about support of the troops, we're going to have an opportunity to further debate that issue on the floor of this Senate when the 21-age drinking bill comes up and we will be asked to pass judgment as to whether or not we can send our young men and women to the Persian Gulf to risk their lives for this country and not be able to come home and have a drink of beer within the borders of this country.

"When we talk about support of the troops, Mr. President, let's be realistic, let's be up front, and let's at least extend the courtesy that if a resolution as this is going to be promulgated that we also be given the courtesy of either signing it or not signing it. And I was not afforded that courtesy.

"Thank you."

Senator Reed responded:

"Mr. President, this is an issue that runs a bit deeper than maybe what we're getting at, and I'm not talking about the war issue or support of the troops which I welcome the opportunity to debate today or in the future. What I find irksome about this discussion is the criticism of my failure to solicit your signatures on this resolution. I apologize to anybody who is sincerely hurt by my failure to solicit your signature. But I'd like you to understand that I don't ask for your signature on a single bill that I introduce. I don't ask for any signatures on a single resolution that I introduce.

"I am a member of a minority in this Senate. And if any of you don't understand, being a member of the minority in this Senate teaches one what it would be like to be black in America a hundred years ago, or a black in South Africa today. There is a prejudice and a discrimination against anybody who is a member of a minority in this body, whether you want to admit it or not. This is evidenced by a variety of factors including the fact that bills are not passed in this body on the basis of merit. They are passed on the basis of party affiliation. I consider it discrimination that is greatly offensive. And as a result, part of my behavior is to be independent, to act independently, to not ask for your assistance, to not ask for your signatures. And for anybody that that offended or in any way slighted, I

apologize. But you must understand that the way you function in this Senate is different than the way I function.

"Thank you."

At 12:12 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:16 o'clock p.m.

The Chair then interjected:

"Members of the Senate, the Chair would like to request that this matter be put aside until a more proper time during the session."

At 12:17 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:19 o'clock p.m.

Senator Solomon, the Majority Floor Leader, then interjected:

"Mr. President, I realize that you did make a request of the body to put aside the matter until a later time but members do feel that on this point of personal privilege they would like to express their viewpoints on remarks that have been made. We are requesting from the floor to be allowed to continue the discussion."

The Chair answered:

"The Majority Floor Leader's comments are correct.

"Before the Chair recognizes Senator Crozier, the Chair would like to ask all Senators to please refrain from being personal in your comments."

The Chair, then recognized Senator Crozier to rise on a point on personal privilege.

Senator Crozier remarked:

"Mr. President, thank you very much. I will try to refrain from being personal and would like, at this time, to take us back into history.

"Mr. President, after World War II Senator Joe McCarthy, the red-baiter, was the individual who ruined many people's lives because he tagged on the word 'communist' or 'red' or 'pinko' or what have you. He made wild accusations and the public believed Senator Joe McCarthy. Many great individuals were ruined.

"This also happened right here in Hawaii during the late '40's, early '50's to individuals who were accused of being communists. A dummy organization was created by influential people in Hawaii. That organization was called 'IMUA.' IMUA was a radio program scheduled to be heard every afternoon around 4:30 to 6:00 o'clock, somewhere in that time frame. They used to give out distorted information, constantly distorting the facts, so that the whole population believed. They heard these lies often enough; the lies became reality. Some of you people may know individuals who were ruined because of that kind of McCarthyism.

"Mr. President, for those who do not know history are doomed to repeat it or feel the brunt of the same type of shenanigans that are being played today. Now we have creative ways of getting our messages out. We create dummy organizations ... non-profit organizations ... and under the guise that they are public announcements or public information pieces, the people can say whatever

they want to say. They can't be held liable because it's the non-profit organization that will be held liable. You can't be accused of anything because it's a non-profit organization. They don't have to be accurate because they won't be, and because they just continue to get their misinformation out and the people will believe them.

"Mr. President, you, yesterday, were the emissary from the Hawaii Senate at the funeral services of Lance Corporal Frank Allen. You took the time to salute Hawaii's first fallen hero. We in the Senate appreciate that, Mr. President. You showed that we are supporting our troops. You showed that we are supporting our President.

"I demand an apology from the Senator from Maui who has published this inaccurate information. Or, if he does not want to do it, maybe the non-profit organization that has paid for the ad should send us an apology. Thank you very much."

Senator Reed, on a point of personal privilege, responded:

"Mr. President, I rise in response.

"The previous speaker, who in the first place does an incredible outrage by suggesting that my expression of my support for the President and the U.S. policy and the troops as put forth clearly in advertisements, yesterday in the Star-Bulletin and today in the Advertiser, by likening that free expression of my opinion as McCarthyism is absolutely off-the-wall. And to suggest that the comments that were made in that message were inaccurate is so completely false that it is he who owes me an apology and not the reverse.

"To underscore just how off-the-wall his comments were, I think perhaps he has been too busy chairing the Committee on Housing and Hawaiian Affairs to pay attention to ...."

Senator Hagino, Majority Leader, interjected:

"Point of order, Mr. President. I believe the speaker is going beyond the personal privilege."

The Chair responded:

"Senator Reed, will you stop from personal attacks on any Senator."

Senator Reed answered:

"Yes, Mr. President, I'm simply responding in like manner point by point. If it appears that I'm responding on a personal level, it's because the previous speakers have attacked me on a personal level.

"To underscore just how completely off mark the comments were, he said that the message that I had put forth in the two newspapers was paid for by a dummy organization that I'm hiding behind to protect myself and shield myself from any lawsuits charging slander. The fact of the matter is, the ad was paid for by myself. The ad so stated. No organization was listed. It was paid for by Rick Reed. I stand behind the comments that were made. It was a true expression of the opinion of the majority of the people in this state and it is my opinion and I stand behind it."

Senator Cobb, also on a point of personal privilege, said:

"Mr. President, very briefly in response to some of the previous statements made.

"First of all, I think it should be noted that two of the phone calls that I received relative to the resolution, one before and one after the ad, asked me why I had not signed it or if I had signed it. And I had to explain that I was not afforded the opportunity or the courtesy to sign it.

"The second point in dealing with Republican bills, I'd like to go on record again and remind this body that among the very first bills that ever came out of the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce which I chaired beginning in 1979 were Republican bills. And that broke the tradition that had existed up until that time of either not hearing or not passing Republican bills. I further note that the Judiciary chairman and a number of other chairmen in the Senate today have scheduled for hearing a very significant number of Republican bills, and I have not yet seen any pattern of discrimination against bills introduced by Republicans.

"It has always been my practice to consider bills on their merits and I can remember the surprise of some former Republican Senators when their bills were reported out, not for second reading and transmittal to another committee but for third reading and passage on the floor. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura also rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, my comment is basically that when we present facts or information to the public it should be accurate. Let me just give you an example.

"I sat through the hearing on the semi-automatic gun control bill. One of the comments made by one of the testifiers was that we went to the rifle range for a demonstration. Later, there was an attempt by the National Rifle Association to display the various semi-automatic guns at the state Capitol. They were denied permission to do that.

"When we had the hearing in the auditorium, the police had the semi-automatics there on display. One of the comments made was, why was it that the people against gun control could not show their guns to the legislators, yet, at the public hearing, there were guns on display. I asked the Senate President, 'Why the discrepancy?' And his remark to me was that there is a strict procedure to bring guns for display to the Capitol. If you want to bring them to the Capitol you must get the approval from the Police Department and the Capitol security chief. That fact was told to the organizer of the gun display and that person knew of that procedure. Yet, the public was never made aware that they were denied by the Police Department to bring their guns to the Capitol. As a member of this body listening to testimony, it made you look bad. However, that group could have gotten that permit and could have told us that they tried to get the permit from the police but were denied because of security and liability reasons. It was not because we were prohibiting them.

"These are the kind of facts that are important to disclose. You have to tell the truth. Let the facts be known and don't make us look bad ... as though we're trying to favor one group. I think that it is important that when we address the public, we give them the truth and nothing but the truth. Thank you."

Senator Reed responded:

"Mr. President, I must apologize for this continued debate. I'm as tired of this as anybody else.

"I agree with the previous speaker, the Senator from the Big Island, that what we need to do when we address the public is to tell the truth. The first thing you have to do before you can tell the public the truth is have the facts, and I would like to take this opportunity to give the Senator from the Big Island the facts.

"Yes, indeed, there is a procedure required to be allowed to bring weapons into any public building. The people who were opposed to Senate Bill 1843 that would ban certain semi-automatic weapons followed that procedure to the letter. They got permission along every single step and, at the very last, the Department of Public Safety informed them that despite the fact they had followed all the procedures, despite the fact that there's no law against it, we are saying you cannot bring weapons in. That is exactly what happened. The truth was told."

Senator B. Kobayashi, also on a point of personal privilege, then said:

"Mr. President, politics today is often a matter of imagery and impressions. I would like to go on record to state that for me some of the recent newspaper articles or newspaper items do not reflect my impression and my image of what the Hawaii State Legislature and what the Hawaii State Senate did in fact do and did in fact stand for. Thank you."

At this time, Senator Crozier requested the Chair for the inclusion into the Senate Journal of his eulogy for Lance Corporal Frank Allen, delivered on February 21, 1991, on behalf of the Hawaii State Senate, and the Chair so ordered.

The eulogy reads as follows:

"Hana, young Frank, Mr. and Mrs. Allen, family members and friends, on behalf of Senate President Richard Wong and members of the Hawaii Senate, I bring you our heartfelt condolences.

"The Saudi Arabia-Kuwait war is five weeks old and today we gather here to lay to rest, Hawaii's first fallen warrior, Marine Lance Corporal Frank Allen.

"You may ask why L.Cpl. Allen? A young man with a young wife and child, who had an opportunity for a bountiful future in America that was limited only by the limitations he imposed on himself, had to sacrifice his life? You may ask why L.Cpl. Allen, when there are more than four hundred thousand other members of the armed forces in the war zone, had to be the one?

"The answer may be simple and a matter of fact. A war is being fought. L.Cpl. Allen is a marine. It was his duty to fight and, if necessary, to die.

"Or the answer could be a rationalization of the circumstances of the presence of the American and coalition forces gathered together to protect, defend, and free from bondage the Saudis and Kuwaitis.

"We can define the arguments of why America had to participate and send its finest into the throes of battle. We can describe the long economic ties America has had with both Saudi Arabia and Kuwait. Since 1981, the last oil crisis that the United States and the world had to struggle through, it was Saudi Arabia and Kuwait who were willing to over-pump their allotted quotas the OPEC nations had set. Thereby, at the chagrin of Saddam Hussein, kept the price of oil reasonable and readily available to allow the United States to have and maintain the greatest economic recovery in its history. Had oil not been plentiful and economical to drive the engines of our

economy, we would not have been able to maintain the quality of life that we have been blessed with in the decade of the 1980's.

"The tyrant, the dictator, the bully of Baghdad, Saddam Hussein, the leader of Iraq, once the richest country in the Middle East is now struggling under financial ruin because of his eight-year war with Iran and spending every extra penny on armaments, attacked our friends and allies to punish, pillage and oppress them.

"The United States had no recourse but to assemble its forces from the fruited plains of Kansas, from the forests of Germany, and from the shores of Hawaii to the desolate, harsh environment of the Saudi desert to act as a protective shield for her friends and allies.

"Marine L.Cpl. Frank Allen's role was the traditional role expected of a marine. He was the tip of the lance that America has thrust into the desert night to repel the oppressive army of Iraq out of Kuwait.

"We may also accept the death of L.Cpl. Frank Allen as old men and young wives have had to accept the death of fallen heroes from the beginning of time. It has always been the role and duty for the brave young men, those in the early bloom of their lives, to be burdened with the role of the protector. It is they who have so much to live for, who must for the good of the family, the island or the country, be willing to forsake the loving arms of their wives, the laughter of their children, the camaraderie of their friends, the prosperity of their nation, and be willing to dutifully step forward into 'HARMS WAY.'

"The United States broke away from England because men with a sense of duty and obligation sacrificed their lives to establish the freest nation in the world. It took America's finest young men who felt duty bound to save the Union from disintegration because of the Civil War. America's youth were called up again and again to stand boldly against the tyrants of the 20th century. Kaiser Wilhelm of Germany in World War I, Hitler in World War II, the Korean War and Vietnam, and now the latest tyrant, the belligerent, maniacal Saddam Hussein has forced the young men and women of the world to come to the aid of free people.

"Each time young men, men with young families, men with dreams and aspirations, men of moral fiber and strength of character, men with an obligation to duty were and are now willing to make the ultimate sacrifice for the 'COMMON GOOD.'

"My father had a very simple guiding principle he tried to instill in his children and I feel L.Cpl. Frank Allen exemplifies what my father meant when he used to say, 'Do your duty to your family. Do your duty to your country. Do your duty to your God. Do your duty first. Do your duty second. Do your duty always.'

"L.Cpl. Allen, you have done your duty well."

At 12:31 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:32 o'clock p.m.

At 12:33 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Solomon, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate stood in recess until 5:00 o'clock p.m.

Senator Solomon rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I would like to speak in support of an article that appeared in the editorial section on February 21st, Thursday, in the Advertiser, and it reads: 'Bishop Estate Condo reform stand questioned.'

"Mr. President, I feel compelled to speak because I am a native Hawaiian and I feel that the article has stated the issue quite well. I'd like to quote from the article. It says:

'Bishop Estate's special situation as a trustee of Hawaiian ali'i lands and benefactor of Kamehameha Schools for Hawaiian children is well appreciated in this community.

'But the estate has prospered despite the earlier law allowing homeowners to buy the land under single-family houses. It will remain the state's largest private landholder even if the Legislature extends that right to thousands of residents of all races, including Hawaiians, who own leasehold condos.

'Besides, the land under most leasehold condos, some 80 percent, is owned by others, mostly non-Hawaiians. So this issue is bigger than the Bishop Estate.'

"Mr. President, I feel and I agree that the trustees have a right to lobby strongly seeking to kill the legislation or to shape it in ways most favorable to the estate. But playing the racism card in this debate benefits neither the estate nor the community in which it will live after all this passes.

"As a native Hawaiian, I feel strongly that although many injustices have been committed against the Hawaiian community and the Hawaiian people in terms of the disposition of the 'aina' I feel that this condominium reform bill is not a racial issue. Instead, it is a constitutional issue as to whether or not a land owner has rights to his property or to her property and to do with it as he or she wishes.

"Thank you."

Senator McMurdo also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I would like to thank the former speaker for speaking out on this subject. I think the air does need to be cleared. Thank you."

Senator Reed also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, as a Senator whose district boasts a higher than average per capita presence of native Hawaiians, I'd also like to add my voice to the comments of the previous two speakers.

"This leasehold question is not a racial issue. Whichever side you take on the leasehold issue, it is simply a question of land ownership.

"I would also like to thank the Senator from the Fifteenth District who spoke out at last Saturday's hearing on the leasehold issue when, strangely enough, the person who is now complaining that this is being made into a racial issue, the Bishop Estate trustee Mr. Stender, is the one who initiated the issue of racism.

"In his prepared text before your Committee on Housing, Mr. Stender wrote and said to the committee members, quote: 'We have been cautioned that it would not be wise to make this a racial issue. That to do so would be unsettling to our community. That to heed this caution would be to turn our back on the lessons of our history.' And he proceeds to make it a racial issue.

"It is not a racial issue and I'm very glad that members of this body have spoken up to set the record straight. Thank you."

Senator Cobb also on a point of personal privilege then added:



"Mr. President, rising on the same point and speaking in strong support of the remarks of our Majority Floor Leader. I think it needs to be made very clear that any proposed legislation would not be designed to help foreigners, speculators, investors or anyone except the owner-occupant, and as I see it being crafted in the Senate, it is designed with a very careful regard to the rights of the landowner or the lessor, even including a residual buy-back provision for or a continuing payment every time a unit is sold.

"I further think that Kamehameha Schools could be doing much more for native Hawaiian children by having a Kamehameha School on each of the neighbor islands, which is not the case today. Only one out of 11 applicants who apply is ever admitted to Kamehameha Schools.

"And having gone through numerous and lengthy leasehold negotiations, myself, I'm very familiar with the fact that when the initial land reform law for single-family residents was passed, during the negotiations involving Kahala, it was pointed out that the estate was getting a one to three percent rate of return on land that was held in lease whereas with a diversified portfolio and a tax exemption for capital gains they could get a 9 to 15 percent rate of return.

"So I agree with and I thank our Majority Floor Leader for her remarks and would like to add my own support as an extension of those remarks. Thank you."

Senator Reed again rose on a personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, after serious reflection and prayer upon what transpired here last Friday, I'd like to make a few brief remarks which I hope will reduce feelings of animosity or bitterness between the members of the Senate and myself.

"First, I'd like to apologize to each and everyone of the members of this Senate who feels that my ad made them look less patriotic than I. That was not my intent, nor do I consider myself more patriotic than any member of this Senate.

"Second, I'd like to apologize to the members for not asking them to sign my resolution. This was due in part to my spur of the moment decision to introduce the resolution and in part to my over-sensitivity at being a member of the minority.

"I'd also like to clarify something that I believe is at the root of the members' consternation, certainly at the root of the consternation expressed by the Senator from the Sixteenth District.

"When the Senator rose to speak during the session last Friday, I failed to grasp the import of his listing of dates and newspaper advertising deadlines. When I read the Advertiser the following morning I realized that the Senator was accusing me, as the Advertiser put it, quote: 'of arranging to run the ad, suggesting a lack of support for my resolution several days before I introduced the resolution and without letting my colleagues react to it or have a chance to sign it.' Mr. President, this was certainly not the case. And since the Senator prefaced his remarks with the comment that if he were wrong concerning the dates he would welcome a correction, I am now making that correction.

"After House Concurrent Resolution No. 2 was passed, I continued to be bothered by its language and its failure to express support for the President and U.S. policy to use force to reject Iraqi troops from Kuwait. On Friday,

February 15th, I decided to introduce the resolution expressing support for the troops and the President and the U.S. policy. The resolution was written and introduced late that afternoon. Over that weekend, I decided to ask the public to encourage quick passage of the resolution.

"On Monday, February 18, I contacted Stan Souza of the Hawaii Newspaper Agency (Mr. Souza's phone number, by the way, is 525-7659) to place a full-page ad. It was my first contact with the HNA concerning placement of the subject ad. The ad appeared in the Star-Bulletin and the Advertiser on Thursday and Friday, respectively, of that same week, just three days after I first contacted the HNA about the possibility of reserving space to place an ad.

"I regret that I missed the Judiciary chairman's point when he spoke on the floor. I hope the facts, as you now know them, dispel any concern that I arranged to run the ad before I introduced the resolution in a manipulative attempt to make it appear that no other member of this Senate shares my views on the war in the Gulf.

"If I had indeed done what the Senator accused me of doing, I would deserve a lot worse than the criticism I got on Friday. However, since that was not the case, since the criticism levelled at me was rooted in misunderstanding -- I would be justified in requesting an apology. But I won't. I'm willing to let go of my anger at being falsely accused, and move on. Hopefully, by informing the members of the chronology of events, I will relieve them of the anger that is rooted in misunderstanding.

"Finally, I'd like to humbly offer a proposal for a united statement. I propose that another member of the Senate introduce a resolution in support of our President, troops and the Gulf effort. The resolution that I had originally introduced could even be copied verbatim and introduced anew, I hope, with the signatures of all members of the Senate. I would then be willing to raise the money necessary to place a full-page ad in the newspapers with the new resolution and a headline, quote: 'Saddam Hussein, the people of Hawaii as represented by their State Senators fully support our President, troops and the Gulf effort.'

"Passage of such a resolution, Mr. President, would not mean the HCR 2 was bad. Rather, it would simply be an attempt to make it clear that our support of our troops extends to the leader of those troops, President Bush as the Commander in Chief, and to the just cause for which those troops are fighting.

"Mr. President, whatever anger we may have should be directed at Saddam Hussein, not at each other. So I ask my colleagues to please consider my proposal with the aim of sending a clear message of support to our President and troops by the week's end.

"These remarks will be circulated this afternoon to all members in the form of a memo.

"Thank you very much."

The Chair at this time responded:

"Thank you, Senator Reed, for your remarks. The Chair would also like to thank all Senators for their cooperation on the way in which they handled themselves this past Friday.

"The Chair would also like to point out that we have a war in Saudi Arabia and we do not need a war right here in our chambers."

Senator Tungpalan also rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege on two points.

"First of all, as to the matter of Mr. Oswald Stender and his comments at a legislative leasehold hearing. I'd like to say, on behalf of parents who are of Hawaiian ancestry and who look forward to that day when their children may be educated at the Kamehameha Schools, I think that his views on the subject are well illustrated in this Sunday's Advertiser. I don't think his intention was to be racist or racial in any manner or form. However, people may read into this matter whatever may be the case. I hope that you will also have the opportunity to take the time to read that article.

"On the second matter, as far as the placement of the ad, the Senator from Maui said that he was able to get his ad in within three days. Perhaps, HNA has different policies for placing ads in the paper because I had attempted last week to place an ad in the paper and I was told that I needed five days. I had called four days ahead of time and they did not allow me to put the ad in the paper. So, maybe in this town it counts to be part of the minority for some things.

"Thank you."

Senator Blair also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I would be remiss if I did not thank the Senator from Maui and Molokai for the clarification with respect to the support that members of this body have with respect to various aspects of current foreign policy. I'm glad that it is now clear that we are all in support of our soldiers, equally.

"With respect to the timing issue, I will discuss that privately with the Senator because my own information is somewhat at variance with his and I don't necessarily want to dwell on that aspect of it. But I think the main point is that I very much appreciate his remarks regarding the clarification that he made, and I thank him for it."

Senator McMurdo then said:

"Mr. President, I would like to speak on a point of personal privilege to thank the Senate Minority Floor Leader for his apology and to say that I will be happy to accept it. Thank you."

Senator Reed then added:

"Mr. President, to follow up on the point of personal privilege, partly because the Judiciary chairman said that his information is at variance.

"The reason I gave Mr. Souza's phone number is so that anybody who has heard any information varying or differing from the facts that I presented is free to call him. For other comments, not only was the Advertiser willing to accept the full-page ad on three-and-a-half-day's notice, it was not camera-ready. I called Mr. Souza on Monday morning and said, 'I've got an ad that I've written; will you accept it; can we get it in this week and it's not camera-ready.'

"So, whatever the reason, the Advertiser was willing to accommodate me on very short notice and anybody who has a reluctance to accept my word for it need only call Mr. Souza."

Senator Tungpalan answered:

"Mr. President, to continue my point. Perhaps in the future I'll have the Senator from Maui and Molokai place my ads. Thank you."

At 11:50 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:55 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

Senator Reed rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, as you know, I was harshly criticized by members of this body for unilaterally introducing a resolution in support of our President, troops and U.S. policies in the Gulf. Yesterday, in good faith I put the ball back in my critics' court. I proposed that if this Senate is serious of wanting to pass a resolution expressing support for the U.S. policy, then let's do it together.

"Mr. President, would you yield to a question?"

The Chair having responded in the affirmative, Senator Reed inquired:

"Since this is the last day of the session before the five-day recess I'd like to know today, now, whether the Senate is going to accept my challenge?"

The Chair answered:

"I can say this, Senator Reed, so far, to date there has been no resolution introduced on the particular subject matter that you mention. I feel that it's the prerogative of any Senator to introduce one on an individual basis if he or she so chooses."

Senator Reed continued:

"Mr. President, does that mean that as far as you know the majority is not going to take the initiative to introduce a resolution expressing support for the U.S. policy?"

The Chair responded:

"As of today, there has been no resolution introduced regarding that subject matter."

Senator Reed continued:

"Mr. President, I was attacked last Friday for not inviting other members of this Senate to sign a resolution expressing support for the President and troops and U.S. policy in the Gulf. Yesterday, I stepped back and said, 'If you're sincere, if you really do want to join me in expressing support for U.S. policy in the Gulf, then let's introduce a new resolution together as a body.' But if indeed there is not an acceptance of my proposal, then it seems to me that there's no sincere interest in making such an expression of support. So I have no option but to conclude that the extremely harsh criticism I received last week was a smoke screen meant to hide from the public the fact that most members of the Senate do not want to pass a resolution supporting the President and the U.S. policy in the Gulf."

"As to the members of the public who viewed and were misled by TV coverage last night of my remarks yesterday, I'd like to assure them that I have never apologized for my resolution or my ad in support of our President, our troops and our policy in the Gulf. Since this body is not going to take the initiative to accept my proposal and introduce a resolution that we can all support, I will re-introduce Senate Resolution 19 this afternoon and circulate it for signatures."

"Thank you."

The President then stated:

"The Chair would like to make two comments. One, the conclusions that you reached are your own. Second, that any member of the Senate is privileged to introduce a resolution and he or she has a perfect right to ask anyone of this august body to sign that resolution. So I think the duty lies with you if that's what you so prefer."

Senator Cobb then said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege now in direct response to the previous remarks."

"The previous speaker came to my office yesterday and asked if I were willing to introduce such a resolution. I said, 'Yes, but I would defer to the Senator from Waikiki,' who is not present at the present time, and it was my understanding that she was going to be working on such a resolution. I'm, therefore, surprised by the remarks that were just made saying that no one in the Senate is interested in introducing such a resolution."

"I made very clear to the Senator from Maui, my position on any such resolution would be in favor of support of the policy as long as the policy is very clearly spelled out. I would not favor a nuclear attack or B-52 strike on Baghdad or the indiscriminate killing of civilians, but as long as we clearly spelled out what the policy would be I would have no trouble supporting it and would, in fact, be willing to either co-sponsor or introduce a resolution. I deferred to the Senator from Waikiki because of her long military experience."

"I'm a little taken aback and surprised by the remarks today, but I'm sure the Senator from Maui can verify everything I have said is correct, including the visit to my office and the terms in which the discussion took place in the outlining of the resolution."

"I would hope that if a resolution is not forthcoming from the Senator from Waikiki that the Senator from Maui would take into account these specific policy concerns that I raised in direct discussion with him in my office yesterday and would be including that in any resolution to be circulated in the Senate."

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Iwase then rose to remark:

"Mr. President, I'd like to rise on a point of personal privilege."

"Mr. President, it is with some reluctance that I would want to comment on the remarks made by the Senator from Maui. I did not. I've sat here through two debates, if you'd call them debates, about this issue."

"My district includes a lot of service people who are either presently in the Gulf area or may soon be going to the Gulf area. What is disturbing now to me is the implication that if we do not introduce a resolution worded as proposed, that there is a reluctance to support the American policy in the Persian Gulf. And nothing could be further from the truth."

"I supported and voted for the House concurrent resolution which I think adequately and strongly expresses the view of this body and the state House of Representatives of the American efforts in the Persian Gulf. We have also contributed to the Ohana Fund and I doubt that there is any Senator who does not have a yellow ribbon on the door of their office to express their concern for the welfare of the troops in the Persian Gulf."

"We can all be linguists and argue about how to say a certain point. I think what is forgotten by all the linguists is that we have said as a body, the state Legislature, that we support the efforts of the American forces in the Persian Gulf. If it is not said in a manner which is appropriate to individuals, then I am sorry, but it should not be implied in any way, shape or form that that reluctance to support particular language is a reluctance to support the efforts of the American forces in the Persian Gulf. And I would resent such an implication. I have supported it; this body has supported it; the state Legislature has supported it; the state House of Representatives has supported it."

"Finally, I would like to add that I doubt if there is anyone in this body who does not have family members or friends or children of friends who are in the Persian Gulf. We are all sensitive to this situation. I hope that the enactment of the House concurrent resolution would have emphasized that point and I hope that we would stop being linguists."

"Thank you."

Senator Crozier also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I support the President of the United States. I support the Congress and I support our troops in Saudi Arabia and Kuwait. I think they're doing a magnificent job.

"Mr. President, I will not be intimidated to sign a resolution by anyone who has enough money to continually put ads in the paper so that he can portray himself as an individual above the rest of us. I will not be manipulated nor will I support any action that will allow this process to be manipulated.

"Thank you very much."

Senator Reed then rose to respond:

"Mr. President, nor will I be intimidated by loud voices from behind.

"The fact of the matter is that there is a truth here that is being obscured. The reality is that House Concurrent Resolution No. 2, which was passed by this body, expressed support for the troops, but consciously omitted any expression of support for the U.S. President or the U.S. policy of using force to eject Iraq from Kuwait. That is a debate that was discussed here both in the House and in the Senate privately. It is also a debate that was discussed on the floor of the U.S. Congress. Those who oppose the war effort, who oppose the President and the U.S. policy, wanted to be able to put forth a resolution that expresses support for the troops but stops short of expressing support for the U.S. policy in the Gulf. That is a reality. That is the difference between the resolution which was passed by this body and the resolution that I have proposed that this body introduce."

Senator Matsuura, also on a point of personal privilege, then said:

"Mr. President, when this discussion took place on Friday, I had not looked at the ad. The Senator from Maui must understand that when that ad was put in the paper, everyone of us received phone calls ... everyone ... I don't think there was an exception. In fact, one caller called and said that he doesn't agree with the Senator from Maui on all his issues, but on this issue agrees with the Senator and, therefore, asked me to support his resolution.

"The basic thing this body is objecting to is that the format of the ad gave the public a perception that we were not supporting his resolution. No one was given an opportunity to sign that resolution. The truth is that everyone supports the President's action. People who called me to tell me to support his resolution may think that I don't support the President. I do wholeheartedly support the President. That's where, I think, the objection has arisen from this body.

"This body, basically, looks at things with some measure of trust. What is the motive? The Senator from Maui explained the timetable of the resolution and the newspaper ad and I'm not questioning him on that. But, when people call every one of us in a way that question our loyalty in support of our President and our troops, that's where the objection comes about. That's why the chairman of Judiciary made his comment, and that's why the other objections arose. It's a matter of trust; and was the intent and motive of the resolution and ad truly honorable?

"He mentioned about being a Republican. I can assure you, in this place it doesn't matter whether you're a Republican or a Democrat. It's a matter of trust. Do you do things in terms of embodying the feelings of this body? That's the important thing. Perhaps this is why you're not getting the support that you are asking for. This kind of trust you don't just get it on a silver platter, you have to be deserving of that trust.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Reed responded:

"Mr. President, in response to the previous speaker, the comment that has been made in the past and most recently by the previous speaker is that somehow it doesn't matter what party one belongs to in this body is a fallacy that deserves at least a brief response.

"In the last five years, less than one percent of the bills enacted into law in this state were introduced by Republicans. There is no chairmanship held by a Republican in this body. So to suggest that it doesn't matter what party that you belong to, that we all get equal treatment, is simply a fallacy.

"The ad that I placed in the newspaper did not in any way say that the Senators in this body did not support my resolution. It simply said here are the names and phone numbers of all of the Senators in the state, please call them and urge them to pass this resolution as quickly as possible. And if anybody is offended by the suggestion that they don't support it when in fact they do want to support it, as I have said, I will re-introduce it today; I will circulate it for signatures and everybody has a chance to support it unanimously, and this debate will come to an end."

Senator Cobb then said:

"Mr. President, some of the previous remarks have prompted a further response that I had not planned to make.

"I recall at one point sitting in your office and watching a very large blackboard as you organized the Senate and divided everything half-half, and half the chairmanships went to Republicans and half the chairmanships went to Democrats. It was called a coalition. It happened this decade, not so long ago; perhaps a little before the time of the Senator from Maui but everything was split right down the middle. There was some criticism from both sides, but it worked. For two years things functioned.

"I think it's improper and wrong to say that Republicans have never been chairmen or to imply that that could never happen again. Presumably, the Democrats were able to organize and since that time we've not had a coalition, but the possibility is always there.

"I want to add one other thing to the comments from the Senator from the Big Island who spoke on the matter of perception. I was under the impression that since the Senator from Waikiki was working on a resolution of this sort, according to the information I received from the previous speaker, that that was going to be the resolution that was going to be introduced and circulated. Having heard nothing further and having discussed the matter even with him this morning, that impression will remain until such time as he gets up again and says that he is going to take the lead and do it himself. If that's the concern, I'd be happy to do it and take the lead but I was deferring to the Senator from Waikiki, and I will continue to do so until I hear to the contrary from her.



"But I think the perception of a lack of patriotism is the unfortunate by-product of this whole thing and I can assure you, as one who is potentially awaiting orders although I doubt now that they'll come. I don't think anyone in this body is lacking in support either of our actions or of our troops in the Persian Gulf regardless of our personal feelings on this, and that we would all like to see it ended as soon as possible and have those soldiers and sailors and airmen and marines come home as soon as possible and be reunited with their families.

"Thank you."

Senator McCartney also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I have sat here for the last couple of days listening to the remarks of the Senator from Maui. I just want to go on record to say that the district that I represent has many marines and many people who are in the Persian Gulf right now. It's an insult to us to say that we don't support the troops, we don't support the President's policy -- we do.

"I want to go on record to say that war is a very serious thing. People are putting their lives on the line, and here we are in the Senate chamber playing politics with people's lives and with war. I resent the Senator from Maui for doing that. I agree with the Senator from the Big Island who said that we have to question his motives, and your word is your bond in this place. If we don't have your word, you don't have a bond.

"I would just like to go on record to say that, Mr. President. Thank you."

Senator Ikeda also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, like the previous speaker, I have sat here over the previous few days not saying anything, primarily because like the chairman of the Judiciary Committee, I find this to be a very sensitive topic. It is difficult to talk about it without getting emotional, but I have just about had it.

"War is a terrible thing. Nobody chooses to be there. Nobody wants it. I would never question the patriotism of any member of this body, knowing full well that this is something that is very difficult to discuss. I don't hesitate to tell you that I don't hesitate to sign or refuse to sign any resolution that is brought to me, depending upon how I feel about its content. I want to make it very clear that I support the troops and I do not separate the President from the troops because he is their leader and ours. I support their efforts.

"But I will not be coerced into signing any resolution just to make that point clear because one person in this body finds this situation, this war, something to capitalize on.

"I feel for every mother who has a son there. I can relate to their pain and anguish.

"I think we should be ashamed of ourselves for having let this debate go on this far just so that somebody can get a piece of cheap publicity.

"Thank you."

The Chair then made the following observation:

"Members of the Senate, the Chair has usually allowed debates like this to continue, but at this point the Chair

wants to make one last comment and hopefully that that will be the end of it today.

"Again, the Chair will mention that as of today we have not received any resolution dealing with the subject matter that was discussed on this floor today.

"As a matter of a point of personal privilege, I've always allowed Senators to express themselves in a very far reaching range. I think now's the time for us to say that those Senators that wish to introduce such a resolution, they are privileged to do so; secondly, they are privileged to seek other co-signers; and, thirdly, certainly it's every right of every Senator to introduce her or his resolution pertaining to any particular subject matter.

"I hope this will end the matter and we can continue with the business of the Senate."

### ADJOURNMENT

At 12:17 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Hagino, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Wednesday, March 6, 1991.

At 11:49 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:51 o'clock a.m.

Senator Matsuura rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, the Senator from Nuuanu just came over and he wanted to inform me that the 'unagi' bill had died and he wanted to depict its death by showing me his tie -- picture of a 'unagi' that has the teeth of a moray eel. I just want this body to know that his tie does not reflect in any way what the 'unagi' really is.

"On a more serious note, Mr. President. One of my objections, and I hate to criticize the news media, but for some reason I always get misquoted ... this article on LESA came out in the Sunday paper.

"One of the things that is bad about reporting inaccurately is that after the public reads an article like this, they'll call and ask, 'Why are you putting golf courses on agricultural land?'

"After the first article came out, I called the supervisor of the writer and I went into great detail explaining the LESA bill. I informed him that both the administration bill and the bill that I had worked on do not, repeat, do not allow golf courses on agricultural land, if the LESA bill passed. I explained in detail the differences between the administration bill and the Senate bill. However, both the administration and the Senate bills are the same when it came to golf courses. There is NOT a permitted use of agricultural land in both bills. He said he would correct it.

"This morning, there was an editorial on this issue. I thought they had corrected the error as an editorial with my picture in it and I thought this was great. But, as I kept reading it, I was shocked. The editorial said the Senate bill will allow golf courses on agricultural land with a special use permit. I want the public to know that that is incorrect!

"I don't know how to correct these inaccuracies in the newspaper, but I think that it's their responsibility to correct the error. I don't consider myself a writer, but as a writer of children's books I create the story. News reporters are not supposed to be my kind of a writer.

They are not supposed to create stories. They have to report the story as it happens; it's not their job to create stories. What the public reads, especially when I'm quoted, they have to be accurate because it's hard to change people's perception once they read it in the newspaper, especially twice.

"So I just want to make my concern known to the news media. Thank you very much."

The Chair then interjected:

"Senator Matsuura, for your information, I want you to know you're not the only one that is misquoted. In fact, there is an article in this month's 'Honolulu Magazine' which says that I was the introducer of a bill to allow golf courses on ag land, and nothing could be further from the truth. I want to assure you that you're not the only one that has this kind of a problem."

#### ORDER OF THE DAY

##### RE-REFERRAL OF SENATE BILL

The Chair re-referred S.B. No. 1613 to the Committee on Ways and Means.

At 11:48 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:49 o'clock a.m.

At 11:51 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:52 o'clock a.m.

Senator Solomon then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, your Committee on Ways and Means held a hearing to discuss the \$6 million appropriation that was requested by the visitors' industry and during that committee hearing we were presented with some information titled 'Strategic Benefits of Hawaii Tourism Advertising on National Network Television.' According to that information:

'At the end of 1989 there were 92.1 million U.S. households with television sets. That means that 98 percent of all homes in America has at least one TV set.

'These TV households represent 235 million people, 77 percent of whom are 18 years old and older.

'The average number of TV usage hours has remained steady over the last several years.' (I'm quoting this, Mr. President, from the information that was presented to the Ways and Means Committee.) In 1988-89 the figures were 7 hours and 2 minutes.

'Contrary to popular belief, all income levels are heavy users of television. Households of income of \$40,000 or more view television 48 hours a week. Upper income households of \$60,000 or more view

television only 2 hours or less a week. The target audience for the \$6 million expenditure would be visitors in households with income of \$45,000 or more.

'There is no advertising medium available that can reach as many people in Hawaii's target as television.'

"And of course, they go on to give us the numbers which are quite impressive:

'These efforts pale when they are compared to the reach of television,' (and they are comparing now, newspaper advertising, magazine advertising with television advertising and says) 'the average network spot reaches 14 percent of all Americans or about 35 million people.'

"The reason I bring this to the attention of my colleagues is because I was very, very disappointed with the script that was attached to this Strategic Plan that we are asking the citizens of Hawaii to fund. I would like to go over this script with you which says:

DR. MARIE JONES, Ph.D., BEHAVIORAL PSYCHOLOGY - Routine behavior can lead to severe anxiety and often depression.

THE NEIGHBORS - They went where?

(HAWAII MONTAGE) - Bob & Ellen bicycling, kayaking, running toward the beach, dancing and laughing at a luau, Bob chasing Ellen with a toy shark on beach.

(PSYCHOLOGIST FALL OVER)

ANNOUNCER - This year, come to life in Hawaii. (Bob & Ellen dancing on top of a reef in the sunset.)

THE MOTHER-IN-LAW - I hope they bring me back a grass hula skirt and a coconut bra.'

"Now, I find this quite offensive. I find it offensive, Mr. President, to the point where I called the Ethnic Studies Department of the University of Hawaii. I asked them to give me a simple definition of what is meant by 'ethnic stereotyping.' And this was the response: 'A stereotype is the over-simplified opinion, usually referring to an ethnic/racial group, issues or events. Or for a race "exaggerated generalization" usually of ethnic/racial/gender groups.'

"Mr. President, I'm urging my colleagues, when we do consider this budget item, that we seriously reconsider that portion of the script: 'I hope they bring me back a grass hula skirt and a coconut bra.' I feel that the native Hawaiian culture is much more sophisticated than this stereotype oversimplification.

"I'm hoping, Mr. President, that we have evolved, in terms of our image, which is projected to the world.

"I was hoping that perhaps we could become more creative and try to emphasize the positive aspects of our tourist industry such as the promotion of cross-culture communication, i.e., communication across cultural boundaries which could be international among different ethnic/cultural groups within a nation.

"Mr. President, I'm hoping that as we deliberate on these appropriations that perhaps your Committee on Tourism as well as your Committee on Ways and Means could possibly meet with the industry to discuss the kind of image they are selling to the rest of the world. I really feel that we deserve better representation.

"Thank you very much."

At this time, Senator Tungpalan made the following introductions to the members of the Senate:

Senator Tungpalan introduced to the members of the Senate Mrs. Kate Bowdish, Ms. Sharon Warner, Ms. Mary Ferguson, Ms. Alice Kamaiopili, Ms. Kathy Wayne, Ms. Elmira Smith, Ms. Edna Haun, Mrs. Margeen Kawasaki and son Daniel, of the Pearl City Kai Adventure Tour who were accompanied by Mr. Cirio Tungpalan, her husband.

Senator Tungpalan said: "I'm really happy to have these women here, especially since many of them come from the peninsula area and several of them have spouses serving in the armed forces. One of them is Kate Bowdish. Kate's husband is serving our country in Saudi Arabia. I know that all of the Senators here join me in congratulating her for being such a wonderful and supportive wife in keeping the home fires glowing and bright as her husband serves our country so ably together with all the others."

At 12:02 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:04 o'clock p.m.

Senator Tungpalan then recognized the Pearl City High School Band as follows:

"Mr. President and honored colleagues, this morning, on behalf of Senators Mizuguchi and Iwase, it gives me a great deal of pleasure to present to you the world class band of Pearl City High School who are seated in the gallery.

"And seated with us here in the Senate chamber are: Ms. Susan Tsunoda, president of the Pearl City Band; Mr. Mike Nakasone and Mr. Thomas Kamisato, bandmasters, who have put together a band that rivals no other; and at the helm of our school and doing a very good job is school principal Gerald Suyama.

"These young ladies and gentlemen have served Hawaii well throughout the United States and Japan as ambassadors of our country as well as our state. They have marched their way into the hearts of spectators at the Rose Bowl and Macy's Thanksgiving Day parade. Most recently, they represented us at the Midwestern International Band and Orchestra Clinic where they were given the most prestigious time slot of the concert.

"They were, I am told, given something like five standing ovations on their last number. I don't think there was a person sleeping in the audience because of the thunderous applause after each presentation. The audience, I understand, had never listened to an equal to

these young men and women, and that really makes me so very proud. I can't say enough about them, especially because I have known so many of them since their childhood. It's just amazing how they've grown up to be so wonderful and so very talented. I do wish you all the very best and that you continue in your careers and your endeavors.

"On behalf of the Senate, we want you to know you have really made us very proud.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

All of the honorees rose to be recognized. Senator Tungpalan presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and a lei to Mr. Suyama; leis were also presented to the honorees seated on the chamber floor.

Senator Mizuguchi then added:

"Mr. President, like the previous speaker, I would like to welcome the Pearl City High School Band. We are proud of their accomplishments over the years. 1. The current minimum wage of \$3.85 places those wage earners below the federal poverty guideline.
2. Raising the minimum wage will not increase the rate of unemployment. Despite what the business community predicted three years ago when the minimum wage increased from \$3.35 to \$3.85, the unemployment rate in our state dropped from 3.9 percent in January 1988 to less than 3.0 percent by December 1988.
3. Raising the minimum wage puts more money into the pockets of those most likely to spend it on the basic necessities of life thereby infusing more money into the business community.

"In consideration of the current economic conditions and the plight of small business, Senate Bill No. 1535 has paced the rate of growth for the hourly wage over a three-year period so as to give smaller businesses a chance to plan on these increases.

"I believe the Committee on Employment and Public Institutions has addressed the concerns of both employee and businessperson in a thoughtful and reasonable manner. Responsible action dictates a raise in hourly wages so that our citizens will be able to maintain their lives in a productive and dignified manner. Mr. President, I hope you and other Senators will agree and join me in support for Senate Bill 1535. Thank you."

"Senator Solomon, the policy of the Senate has been to allow members of the Senate to stand on a point of personal privilege on any subject they choose."

Senator Solomon continued:

"Thank you, Mr. President."

"I would like to state for the record, just to clarify my remarks, especially for Mr. Gene Cotter, that my remarks were focused on cultural communication as well as the defining of stereotyping and so on. I do have a Ph.D. in anthropology, and I feel well qualified in making those kinds of statements. Maybe this will make Mr. Cotter feel better."

"Secondly, I would like to remind Gene Cotter and those of HVB that in the preamble of the Constitution that each one of us stood up to swear to uphold upon our assuming our Senate positions says that '... we reserve the right to control our destiny, to nurture the integrity of our people and culture, and to preserve the dignity of life that we desire.'"

"HVB's opinion, as Cotter said, is '... to be effective, advertisements must appeal to the prospective visitors' perception of Hawaii' without regard to the true Hawaiian culture."

"I hope, Mr. President, that HVB will start to read the Constitution before making remarks such as this because as far as I am concerned they haven't done their homework as to what Hawaii is all about."

"Thank you very much."

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of Senate Bill 121, S.D. 1, which makes it easier to introduce evidence of a child's nonattendance at school and allows the chief family court judge to open certain family court proceedings which involve serious offenses. These are two separate matters.

"The first part of this bill is designed to help the courts intervene when a child's school attendance is so bad that the court's assistance is necessary to keep the child from abandoning their education. This situation is often symptomatic of other problems which need to be addressed. This bill will help the courts and schools act quickly and will benefit the child.

"The second part of the bill allows the senior family court judge to hold open family court proceedings in certain serious offenses. This is appropriate because there are occasions when a juvenile is not waived to adult court even though very serious offenses were involved. In those cases, the community needs to understand why the juvenile has not been waived and that the handling of the case and the disposition is appropriate. In these few cases, the interest of the community outweighs the child's interest in a closed proceeding.

"For these reasons, I urge my colleagues to vote in favor of Senate Bill 121."

"There are some in our community who feel that we should not fingerprint minors. Your Committee disagrees. We think it is better for both the minor and society, that the minor's first contact reflect society's serious interest in their future conduct.

"Another benefit of having minors in the fingerprint identification system is that there is a better chance of early intervention if there is any further criminal behavior. Too often, we fail to treat a minor's actions seriously enough and they think the system can be beaten and needn't be taken seriously. The consequences are bad for society, but even worse for a young adult who got further involved in criminal behavior before society intervenes with the full force of the adult criminal laws. We do a disservice to the child when we don't take their behavior seriously at an early stage. By fingerprinting these children, we treat them seriously and make it more likely that any future contact will occur sooner, when the chance of rehabilitation is greater.

"For those reasons, I urge all of my colleagues to vote for this bill, which benefits the children and society."

"Furthermore, these unwarranted, additional burdens, unfairly discriminates against one particular segment of the industry, thereby placing them at an unfair competitive marketing disadvantage, inasmuch as these burdens are not imposed upon other segments of the industry.

"Therefore, I believe that the bill should be amended to delete SECTION 6 in its entirety, or in the alternative that the language 'door-to-door' be deleted from SECTION 6.

If we want our children to have a healthy future, we have to take steps now to separate our children from cigarettes. This bill attempts to do that and I urge all members to vote for it."

"Mr. President, on our calendar today are two bills concerning lava victims. I want to thank Senator Crozier, chairman of the Housing Committee for, first, introducing these bills; second, for his work on them; and, most of all, his sensitivity to the needs of the community which is uniquely within my district.

"The bill we just approved unanimously sets aside a parcel of ceded land for Hawaiians who were displaced by the ongoing volcanic eruptions which have destroyed Kalapana.

"The bill now before us is different. It sets up a loan program of low interest loans for self-help home construction. The homes could be built on the ceded land parcel that we just talked about, but they also could be built anywhere else.

"I believe this kind of program would be extremely welcomed in my district. However, I also believe that it should be open to people of all races, not restricted to Hawaiians only. The loan program is not directly related to nor dependent on ceded lands or revenues owing to the Hawaiian people, but rather should accommodate all victims of the tragic destruction that has befallen about 180 families of various ethnic backgrounds.

"I will be voting for this bill, Mr. President, as I hope my colleagues will, but it is also my hope that

consideration will be given to modifying the bill as it passes through the legislative process to include as many of the families as might choose to avail themselves of this chance to get some relief from the natural disaster that befell them through no fault of their own. Thank you."

Senator Crozier also supported the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I would just like to make a few comments.

"Both Senate Bills 1383 and 1435 complement each other. It's a package. And the reason why I passed these bills out ... I guess ... let me go back from the start. I, wisely or foolishly, had this campaign slogan 'Count on Crozier.' Well, the native Hawaiians from the Kalapana area counted on me. They came to me and asked for help. Anybody else from Kalapana could have come to ask me for help, but they didn't come. My door is open. And if on the House side others are included, I have no problem with that. I make myself available to all people. Thank you."

"In recent years ever since Hurricane Iwa, the Big Island and other islands of the state of Hawaii have suffered the impact of ciguatera poisoning caused by a variety of reef fishes (kahala, roi, kole, etc.), with ulua (jack) being one of the major causes in recent years. The reef fishermen and families relying on fish as a source of protein have felt the impact of ciguatera poisoning. It is also becoming a major problem that is spreading to the mainland states as fish consumption increases along with exportation of reef fishes. Just recently, 22 out of 22 people eating po'ou (rose colored wrasse) in a restaurant came down with ciguatera fish poisoning of which 13 were hospitalized with cardiac symptoms. These fishes were caught by commercial fishermen from the Big Island who unknowingly sold their contaminated fishes to various commercial outlets.

"Let me digress a bit and explain ciguatera. It is fish poisoning caused by a variety of polyether chemical compounds of which ciguatoxin is the most toxic.

"When eating a fish contaminated with ciguatoxin or its related polyethers, three main clinical symptoms occur:

- 1- gastro-intestinal - diarrhea, vomiting and nausea.
- 2- neurological - temperature reversal (hot feels cold and cold feels hot), tingling sensations around the mouth, hands and feet (parathesia).
- 3- cardiovascular changes - (slow or rapid and irregular heart beat) as observed recently with 5 patients eating the contaminated po'ou.

Other symptoms are muscle and joint pains along with general weakness which may persist for many months. Currently, there is no real cure for ciguatera poisoning, thus making prevention extremely important.

"The Department of Pathology has presented a bill (S.B. 1896) for an extensive study of the major ciguatera problem on the Big Island. They hope to examine the conditions over a period of time to determine the factor(s)

that cause ciguatera poisoning to flare up. These conditions would include the water condition and the nutrients therein, the different species of algae causing the bloom of *Gambriodiscus toxicus*, a microorganism producing ciguatoxin), the various species of fish associated with ciguatera and at what month of the year they are most toxic. Some of these data are available but more needs to be done in order to determine the cause of ciguatera poisoning.

"The testing system devised by the Department of Pathology is now in the hands of a private enterprise and kits to test fishes should be forthcoming. However, the Department of Pathology is continuing to prepare and further optimize the kits on an experimental basis. These kits are available for the public but not for the commercial industry.

"The uncomfortable and often long lasting symptoms of ciguatera poisoning as well as the economic stability of the fishing industry rely on much research and comprehension of the cause of this poisoning. As long as questions exist out there in the reef, ciguatera outbreaks will remain unanswered and periodic toxicity outbreaks will occur, leaving many people at risk to the effects of ciguatera poisoning."

"I rise to speak in support of Senate Bill 818, S.D. 1, which proposes to grant public employees the right to three months of unpaid parental leave for the birth or adoption of a child.

"The women of this Senate and state join me in expressing our thanks to the Employment and Ways and Means chairs for moving this measure and bringing it before us. People should not be forced to choose between work and family. We have a tradition of supporting children and family in our culture, but not fully supporting them in our social policies. When we compare this country with other industrialized nations, the United States ranks poorly in several key indicators of children's and families' quality of life. American parents join those families in only two other nations in the world in having to choose between their newborn or newly adopted children or their jobs. In the United States 39 states and two territories already have some form of parental/family leave policies. This bill will make Hawaii the 40th state with a similar family leave policy.

"The Legislative Reference Bureau analyzed this important issue at great length in a 1989 study. The LRB's conclusion was, 'It would be feasible for the Legislature to mandate employers statutorily to grant employees a parental leave to care for a newborn child.' Even at the national level, the United States Congress determined last year that the entire nation could afford a family leave and passed the 'Family and Medical Leave Act.' The bill was, unfortunately, vetoed by President Bush.

"The bonding of a child to its parents is an essential first step to healthy emotional growth. Family leave for workforce parents gives time for the bond to form and develop and strengthen. Currently, most working mothers can take six weeks of paid temporary disability after the birth of a child. An additional time of unpaid leave with a guaranty to job security is an essential step in resolving one of the many dilemmas faced by employees with family obligations -- do you take time off to care for your child and in so doing, risk losing your job? Or do you sacrifice the emotional needs of the child and your family for job security?

"For these reasons, I urge this body to support the passage of this very important legislation. Mahalo."

Senator McMurdo rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak against this bill.

"I never thought that I would ever rise to speak against any initiative bill that came on the floor of this Senate, but I feel that this bill is only an illusion of initiative. It's so emasculated that I would call this a 'hushpuppy' bill.

"For those of you who do not know what a hushpuppy is, down in the deep South when they have a fish-fry and usually ... this was really in the old days ... everybody would be gathered at the fish camp, including all the men who had been hunting rabbits and they'd have their hounds there, and the children would be there, and the

minute the cooks started to fry the catfish the smell would attract the dogs so the cooks used to dip into the batter and fry them into little balls. They'd throw these to the dogs and they'd say, 'Now, you hush, puppy.' And that's exactly the way I feel about this bill.

"I think this is a hushpuppy that's been tossed to the people of this state who really treasure and value their democratic process of the indirect initiative.

"Those who have done Poipu; those who have done the Date-Laau initiative, those who have done the Ft. DeRussy initiative; the Hapuna; the Sandy Beach; will not be satisfied with a hushpuppy. They want the whole meal. Thank you very much."

Senator Chang then rose to speak in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to correct the good Senator from Waikiki. This is not the first time she has stood in opposition to an initiative bill. When I served as chairman of the Judiciary Committee, I advanced to the floor of the Senate a bill that she took umbrage with, if she will recall.

"I believe that the present chairman of the Judiciary Committee has done a good job in forming what I think is a vehicle for discussion. I think that there are many concepts we've entertained over the last several weeks that are worthy of further discussion, and I think that these concepts are contained in vehicles that are now advancing to the House for their ideas, their thoughts, their responses.

"So with respect to the specifics and details of the present bill, I think that there is less to be objected to at this time and that we should wait until the final formulation and compromise has been developed before we apply any kind of pejorative to the vehicle that we have today. Thank you."

Senator McMurdo responded:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak to the previous speaker's remarks.

"Compromise is one thing, but emasculation is another. And you're right, the bill that the good Senator put in when he was Judiciary chairman was almost as bad as this one. Thank you."

Senator Blair rose to speak in support of the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the bill.

"I, of course, had the opportunity to write the committee report and I trust that most of the members will have read it so I won't repeat it. I went into great detail as to why I think this is an excellent bill.

"This is not a new idea. I floated this bill when I was a member of the House six years ago. At that point ... I believe it was six years ago ... a freshman Senator came over and testified against the bill, manifesting the same all-or-nothing attitude that we've heard spoken here on the floor today. It's too bad that bill didn't pass six years ago because it would have provided a vehicle for the public to present an initiative on that subject matter. Under the terms of the bill six years ago, we would have a floor vote in both chambers or, in the alternative, it would be on the ballot for the public.

"It's unfortunate that some people denigrate efforts at compromise. It's unfortunate that some people have an

all-or-nothing attitude. And I think that people who have an all-or-nothing attitude, at some level of their psyches, prefer to be on the losing side and feel themselves virtuous rather than achieve some compromise which meets the legitimate needs of all parties. That's an unfortunate psychological profile for a legislator.

"In any event, Mr. President, we have to recognize that the opponents of initiative raised some good points. We are, in fact, a very small and heterogeneous population. The possibility exists that an initiative could be quite divisive within our community in some circumstances. The balance that's achieved by this bill is an important one. It preserves for the Legislature its rights to intervene completely and with all of its powers if it chooses to do so.

"What we've been criticized for over the 17 years that I've been here, Mr. President, is not any issue that we've had a floor vote on. At least there's been no procedural concern addressed. Some may disagree with the particular vote. Where we've been criticized from a process perspective, and initiative is an attempt to address problems in process not in substance, has been where we have a chairman decide an issue, such as your present chairman of the Judiciary Committee's unilateral decision not to hear a death penalty bill, or in other circumstances where it's been the decision of a committee not to report a bill to the floor, and the public believes that the committee position does not reflect the sentiment of the entire Senate. It's been those instances, where there's been conclusory action before a bill reaches the floor, that we've been criticized on a process basis. This bill addresses those process concerns absolutely. It's not half-a-loaf on the process issue. The public will have the opportunity for us to vote up, down, or sideways on the floor and if we choose not to, then the matter goes onto the ballot for the public to address the policy issues.

"I take offense that anyone would characterize this as a hushpuppy or an emasculation. I think it is a very important bill. What this bill will do is provide us with some experience with the initiative process, so that the next constitutional convention will not be dealing with the issue in an abstract form and talking about California. We will have actual experience in our home state. I think it's unfortunate for anyone to say that that isn't important. Thank you."

Senator McMurdo then remarked:

"Mr. President, it's unfortunate that our honorable chair of the Judiciary Committee could not have kept his remarks as eloquent as his committee report, but has to stoop to personal slurs. I might add that this particular Senator has certainly changed his tune when it comes to initiative because, before, he voted unanimously for a solid bill which has the support of the people."

This bill recognizes the right of emergency service workers and health care workers who perform what are usually life saving procedures for a patient to be advised of that patient's HIV status, in cases where their

exposure to blood or bodily fluids was to a degree capable of transmitting the HIV virus.

"I urge my colleagues to vote for this bill as a way to encourage health care workers and emergency service workers to make every effort on behalf of all patients. They are truly performing a heroic task, as the HIV virus is now present in approximately 1% of our population. They deserve our complete support and this bill gives it."

Unfortunately, it is increasingly difficult to find managers, coaches, instructors, umpires, organizers and referees in part because of concern for their personal assets if a child is injured and files suit. Another problem is the cost to the children and their families to participate. A big part of the participation fees are used to pay for liability insurance. This cost sometimes prevents children from participating.

"This bill does not grant absolute immunity. In instances where the adult volunteer engages in acts which create a substantial risk of actual harm, they will still be

liable. However, there have been unfortunate instances where the normal and inevitable risks of athletic competition are the basis for suits against volunteer coaches, managers, instructors and umpires. Even just the risk of such cases is effecting insurance rates and the participation of volunteers and children.

"Your Committee has amended the bill to include a repeal after three years. This will coincide with the general review of the 1986 tort law amendments. At that time, we will see if this bill accomplished its intended purpose. If so, it can be reenacted as permanent legislation.

"I urge my colleagues to support youth sports activities in our state by voting in favor of this bill."

What we are doing is following the example of the Federal District Court and charging a single fee up front, instead of nicking the parties for numerous smaller amounts throughout the litigation. It is simply a more efficient way to do business. For that reason, I urge the members of the Senate to vote aye on Senate Bill 125."

"I handled civil, criminal and family court trials over the last ten years and believe that the stakes in family court are higher than in either criminal or civil court. Family courts must deal with the break up of the family, our most important social unit. If you want to appreciate a judicial burden, you should observe our family court judges as they determine who will have custody of a child or whether a child will be put into a foster home. These are decisions which require our best minds and our best hearts. The wisdom of Solomon was, you will recall, demonstrated in a family law case. Therefore I think it is imperative that we recognize the importance of our family courts and elevate these courts to the same classification as the courts with civil cases above \$5,000 and criminal cases that involve possible incarceration. For that reason, I urge the members to support Senate Bill 139, S.D. 2."

"Mr. President, I would like to speak in favor of this bill

"Hawaii is unique because it is the only state in the union which has had a state fish, which everybody remembers. They may not be able to pronounce it but they know what it is, and for the last year we have been bereft because we have had no state fish at all. The passage of this bill would rectify this pitiful situation. This fish which is the little fish with the longest name is renowned in song and story and dance and it's known all over the world. I urge my colleagues to vote for this. Thank you."

Senator Crozier also spoke in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, thank you very much for giving me this opportunity to share a few thoughts with you on this cute little fish.

"Mr. President, five, six years ago, seven years ago, I forget when, we went through the whole experience of choosing a fish. Many fishes ran for the position of state fish -- the 'humuhumunukunukuapuaa,' the 'aweoweo,' the 'manini,' what else, all kinds of other fishes. One of the most important fishes that symbolizes what Hawaii represents or is was left out.

"Mr. President, I was the supporter of the lowly 'akule.' The akule is just a mackerel and under the strain of fishes, the swordfish, which some people think is the alii's fish; other people think the aweoweo is the alii's fish. Everybody wants to relate to the alii's fish. But I thought it would be appropriate that we dedicated a fish that the working man looked on for sustenance as the state fish.

"However, minds greater than mine rejected my thoughts. They didn't realize that it is one of the cheapest fishes that people can get today. They don't realize that many of our people educate their kids by catching akule. Lot of people get their recreation by doing down to the piers or going down to the bays and throwing their hooks off the shoreline or the piers and have that entertainment. But that's all been forgotten. And that's all fading as we evolve into a new society.

"But, Mr. President, I have to say the people of Hawaii chose the humuhumunukunukuapuaa as the state fish, so who are the supporters of the akule? Me and my wife and my two kids. Nobody else wanted to back us up. But we're team players and we went along with supporting this fish. However, we didn't concede until the humuhumunukunukuapuaa came on the radio in a song and taught the little children of Hawaii how to say his name. But the thing is, the person or the fish's voice is identical to the good governor upstairs. I think our governor should be the state fish -- the voice, anyway.

"With that, I ask all the guys who support the akule to cast their votes for the humuhumunukunukuapuaa. Thank you, Mr. President."

The Chair responded:

"Senator Crozier, your comments sound a little fishy to me."

Senator Matsuura then said:

"Mr. President, if the state fish was to be judged on taste, the chairmen of the Ways and Means Committee and the Science and Technology Committee would have submitted the name of another fish. However, since a bill died, all of you can vote for this fish now. Thank you."



Senator McMurdo then remarked:

"Mr. President, can you imagine what the tourists who come to our fair city would think if the good Senator from the Big Island's nominee had won. They'd go, ughhh!"

Senator Matsuura responded:

"Mr. President, we were going to nominate the 'manini.'

Senator Tungpalan spoke in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this measure.

"We allowed this measure to come before this body at this time to enable people in our community to have a chance to give input. They have decisively, and this is why the measure is before us. I fully concur and urge all of you to vote for this measure. Thank you."

Senator Fernandes Salling moved that S.B. No. 1297, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Aki.

Senator Cobb spoke against the bill as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak against this measure, and in doing so I'd like to preface my remarks by saying that there are no good guys or bad guys on this issue. There are good people sitting here with a difference of opinion on how best to resolve this, and as I note the sign in your office it says in effect, I appreciate the difference in opinion because without it my opinion will have no meaning. So I am about to experience the difference today, perhaps on the short end, but I would like to share my concerns with the members of this body on this particular bill.

"Mr. President, one of the first duties of any officer in any of the branches of the armed services -- in fact, duty No. 1, which was just reiterated in the recent conflict is to take care of our men and women who serve under us. That duty is implanted and pounded into us from the very beginning, from the time we learn how to be an officer.

And usually through the process of career progression, those officers who fail to live up to that standard are weeded out. I've met a few who haven't and I've helped weed out a few who haven't. But it's more than just a duty or discipline. It's a way of life. It means, in effect, you do not sleep until your men sleep. You do not take food or shelter until they have food or shelter. You do not take any comfort until they have it first.

"And looking at a bill like this, Mr. President, I would be remiss if I did not speak out on behalf of those young enlisted men and women who will be adversely affected by it and who already have been.

"The public radio on the day of the returning veterans from the Persian Gulf stated that the first thing those veterans wanted was a cold beer in Waikiki. If we follow, literally, the dictates of the law, all of those under the age of 21 could not have that cold beer in Waikiki.

"Speaking from experience, there are three things that any soldier in combat misses the most and they're things we take for granted -- a hot shower, a cold beer and a toilet that actually flushes. And until you miss those things you really don't appreciate how much they mean. I remember that day I came back from Vietnam my father thought I was crazy because I spent half an hour flushing the toilet, just to watch it work because it had been almost a year since I'd seen something like that. Our troops coming back today are doing exactly the same thing.

"Now, the radio report said that the very first thing they wanted was that cold beer in Waikiki and several Senators corrected me and said, 'No, there are other things,' but on a family TV station all you can mention is a cold beer in Waikiki.

"Mr. President, I don't think people realize that the average age of soldiers in Vietnam was 19 and the average age of most soldiers, male and female, in the Persian Gulf is between 19 and 20, particularly for the young enlisted people. Ironically, one of the former female prisoners of war was due to celebrate her 21st birthday on returning home. So she was old enough to fight for her country, to lay her life on the line for our country but not old enough to have a drink within its own borders, legally.

"And that's my problem with this particular bill. Because if we truly support our troops we should be making at least two exceptions to this 21-year-old drinking age. One, we should be exempting all military bases and clubs. Otherwise, United States Department of Defense regulation states that the state law applies and no one under the age of 21 can drink legally on a base or in a club. Two, we should exempt only those members of the military service under 21, either in uniform or with a valid ID card, rather than exempting all people under 21.

"There are several reasons why I feel this way and I'd like to share them with members of the Senate today. First, to exempt all of those under 21 would fail to recognize that those who've chosen to join the military have made a commitment, have accepted a level of responsibility, and have said they're willing to place their lives on the line in our defense. Simply because a person is of military age is not sufficient reason to allow drinking. Two, the military already has a very strict and comprehensive program on alcohol and drug abuse education and very strict discipline which is imposed on any member who abuses alcohol or drugs. They have an ongoing education program on both alcohol and drug abuse in every branch of the military service, and it seems to be working very well.

"During the course of the hearing on this bill, I asked the Honolulu Police Department if they had any accident statistics on military personnel and within a week after the hearing I received a written reply in the negative. They do not. They do not keep such separate statistics. DUI enforcement efforts have been stepped up since 1986 when we first passed the 21-year-old drinking age with a five-year sunset.

"In addition, Mr. President, I have received from military personnel a series of petitions against the continuation of this law. I would like it inserted into the Journal and I will do so by reading it. The contents of the petition received primarily from lower ranking enlisted men and officers of all branches of the armed services of whom approximately 20 to 25 percent are veterans of the Persian Gulf. And these petitions have been received in the last 24 hours in my office. Quote:

'We the undersigned members of the United States Military Forces due hereby petition our Commander in Chief to urge repeal of Public Law 98-363 (1984) which establishes a minimum national drinking law of 21 years of age under penalty of loss to any state not complying of 10 percent of its federal highway funds and which public law forced the State of Hawaii to enact a 21-year-old drinking law (Act 342), and which when combined with 10 USC 2683 prohibits any soldier stationed in Hawaii and under the age of 21 from having any alcoholic beverage, either on or off post, even when awaiting transfer to a war zone.'

"The five petitions that I've received so far contained an average of 20 names per page and over 95 percent of the soldiers, sailors, airmen and marines who were presented with this petition voluntarily signed it.

"Mr. President, it seems hollow to me to say we support our troops and hear the rhetoric from Washington about supporting our troops and yet deny them the basic right of being able to have a legal drink within the borders of our state or our nation after what they have been through. Keeping in mind that all the time they were in Saudi Arabia they could not have a drink. And when they liberated Kuwait they could not have a drink because those are Moslem countries. And when they returned to this country, if they're under 21 they legally cannot have a drink.

"If anything, Mr. President, I think Hawaii should be taking the lead in asking Congress to change this unjust law and to that purpose I have introduced Senate Resolution No. 51 and Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 58 in the Senate asking Congress to change the law with respect to members of the military under the age of 21 for the purpose of being able to legally drink within the borders of the United States.

"The sad truth, Mr. President, is that we're doing this, continuing the 21 age drinking law, primarily for the money because 10 percent of our highway funds would equal approximately \$9 million. And the spokesman from the Department of Transportation was very upfront when he came in to testify and acknowledged this. He said, 'We need the money.' The sad thing is that for the money, we are willing to continue the forfeiture of a basic right of those who have fought to defend our country and to serve it in time of war.

"It's an irony that the sunset occurred this year, in the very same year as the conflict in the Persian Gulf because when we first passed this back in 1986 Vietnam was but a distant memory. You and I and others have had long discussions, Mr. President, on how life is not fair. And this is a classic example of where old people like us make decisions; the young people pay for those decisions or

suffer the consequences of them. Men and women older than us have made decisions about peace and war and life and death, and men and women younger than us have put their lives on the line because of it. And yet we do not allow them, legally, to celebrate with a drink of alcohol when they return.

"All these celebrations that are taking place, for anyone under the age of 21 breaks the law. Do we condone that in the name of celebration? I hope not.

"I think, Mr. President, we should be taking the lead not only in asking Congress to change this law but setting an example to say that 'yes' we want not only to support our troops, we want to make this single exception.

"I just received a communication from Aloha Airlines which says, 'Aloha joins the statewide Aloha R&R team.' The company's two airlines are taking 50 percent off their coach fares for men and women in uniform and their families as part of Hawaii's statewide Aloha R&R Mahalo program. Beginning March 15th, Aloha Airlines and Aloha Island Air will offer a military fare of \$35.95 per segment, available on every flight the carriers operate. All U.S. active and reserve military personnel and their immediate families are eligible for this offer.

"Mr. President, this kind of program illustrates not only support for the returning troops but also indicates very clearly that an exception as I have described could be very easily enforceable by means of either a uniform requirement or an ID requirement, both of which they have, and by limiting it to military bases, and to military operated clubs.

"I would hope, Mr. President, that we could take that course. We have time. I don't think the state will live and die over the question of \$9 million. But I hate to see us doing this to our young people primarily for the sake of money. Thank you."

Senator Fernandes Salling rose to speak in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this measure.

"While I can understand and to a certain extent sympathize with some of the arguments that the previous speaker has said here today on the floor, I must remind my colleagues that the two basic reasons for passing this bill five years ago still remain today and, that is, primarily, the fact that we wanted to raise the drinking age to 21 to try to save lives. I consider that a legitimate reason.

"The second reason is still in effect, that if we did not raise it we would lose federal funds. Although I don't condone this sort of federal blackmail, it's a reality that we have to face especially today when we're looking at a serious deficit in our state highway fund, and having to look at an increase in raising fuel taxes, vehicle weight taxes, registration fees.

"I'd like to think also, and I say this without taking anything away from what the good Senator has said, is that a lot of our armed forces members may take more relief in the kind of relief that we've passed here today for them rather than a six-pack of beer. The relief that we afforded them with respect to their income taxes, allowing also some exemptions for certain types of fees and deadlines for state agencies while serving in the Gulf

"With all of that in mind, I ask members to please pass this bill. The reasons for its passage five years ago still

are good reasons today, and I urge you to vote 'yes.' Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 1297, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LIQUOR," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, 2 (Cobb, McMurdo). Excused, none.

At 3:37 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 3:40 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 740:

On motion by Senator Ikeda, seconded by Senator Iwase and carried, S.B. No. 740, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INSURANCE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none. Excused, none.

S.B. No. 1757, S.D. 1:

Senator Ikeda moved that S.B. No. 1757, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Iwase.

Senator Ikeda supported the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

"As you know, the attorney general has been conducting a study, an ongoing investigation of gasoline pricing in Hawaii. In his September 1990 preliminary report he found the following: First, the gasoline markets in Hawaii are highly concentrated. Second, barriers to the entry of new competition are extremely high at the refinery, terminal storage, and retail outlet levels of the markets. Third, demand for gasoline in Hawaii is highly inelastic. Fourth, historically, wholesale gasoline prices in Hawaii have been above those in competitive markets by an amount substantially in excess of the price of transportation between those markets and Hawaii.

"He has tentatively concluded after these findings that there are four probable causes and these are: the exchange agreements used by the incumbent oil companies, the control of storage facilities by the incumbent oil companies, and the control of retail outlets by the incumbent oil companies, as well as the limited size of the Hawaii market.

"I would like to put emphasis on the third of the four probable causes, the control of retail outlets by the incumbent oil companies. This is what we have seen happening over the years. There's no doubt that the facts show that the numbers of independent gasoline dealers have steadily declined. We have seen their numbers reduced from roughly 600 in 1979 to less than 300 today. Mr. President, given the fact that it's fairly obvious that we lack a competitive environment in this state as far as gasoline pricing is concerned, the only thing that we can do is take steps to keep this business from becoming a total monopoly. And that's basically what this bill does. It doesn't change what has already occurred - it only helps to retain the status quo. We may need to do more once the attorney general completes his study. I therefore urge all of you to vote for this bill. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 1757, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROHIBITION AGAINST RETAILING

OF MOTOR FUEL BY REFINERS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, 2 (Crozier, George). Excused, none.

S.B. No. 1861, S.D. 1:

Senator Ikeda moved that S.B. No. 1861, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Iwase.

Senator Fernandes Salling rose to speak against the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak against this bill.

"Though I know that the intentions of the introducer of the bill were good, I think the bill creates a lot more problems than it solves.

"This bill deals primarily with the uninsured motorists and it allows for, in cases where there's a child below say the age of 18 living at home and has a bad driving record ... it allows the parent who pays the premium on the car that this child drives, to elect not to cover this child under their no-fault policy. For whatever reason this certain child may decide to drive the car when the parent isn't at home, and if that child should get into an accident, the parent would be responsible and liable for all of the damages because of no coverage.

"It encourages something that we've all been working very hard to try to get a grip on and try to prevent and that is the numbers of uninsured motorists on the road today. We have approximately 134,000 cars out of the 800,000 or so automobiles in the state that are uninsured today. This is the result that I see from a measure that came from a sincere effort to solve a problem. But as I said before, it creates a lot more problems that we will find difficult to deal with. I just gave one example but there are many more that came up earlier.

"I would like to think that we will be taking a better look at the no-fault insurance in the future, looking at the reasons why we have such high premiums. And that if we do this, we hold off in passing this measure and take it up at that time, should we decide as a body to look further into this problem of high premiums for no-fault automobile insurance.

"For those reasons and many more, I urge the members to vote against this measure."

Senator Ikeda spoke in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this measure.

"Mr. President, this measure is by no means perfect, but it does address a problem that exists today. Most people are not aware of the fact that if you have a family member living with you who happens to have a poor driving record, who happens to get points because of an accident or DUI or speeding ticket or whatever, when your insurance for your car comes up for renewal you are subject to a surcharge. And in many instances, depending on the reason for the surcharge, the premium can then become quite expensive and sometimes out of the reach of the person having to pay it.

"For example, a mother has a son living at home, and he doesn't necessarily have to be under the age of 18, he can be an adult and be 30 years old but living in her home. He happens to get into an accident and happens

to have this on his driving record. Because he lives in the same home with his mother, his mother's car insurance premium will then be surcharged because of his record.

"All this bill does is allows that mother or that person to take this option to exclude her son or family member from coverage on her car. The downside of this is that if she does take this option and if he drives the car and gets into an accident, there will be no insurance coverage. Now, it may seem like it may cause as much of a problem as it resolves. However, the only other option at this present time that that mother has is to either have her son voluntarily turn in his driver's license and not drive at all or make him move out of her home.

"Another example is that of a husband and wife living in the same home. The husband gets a DUI. The car insurance is surcharged. The only way that the wife can avoid paying the surcharge is to divorce the husband and make him leave their home, or he has to give up his driver's license.

"In many instances it's not easy to give up a driver's license because people's jobs depends on having a license. So we are just trying to address this dilemma in the best possible way that we can. It is not mandatory. I might stress, again, that it is an option. At least it would give people the option of not having to have their relative move out of the house in order to avoid paying higher premiums or becoming uninsured motorists in order to avoid higher premiums. Thank you."

Senator Fernandes Salling then said:

"Mr. President, I don't want to belabor this but I do have to raise this point. I think that option would be exercised by people who can barely afford to pay what the insurance commissioner advises us is now the annual average premium for basic no-fault which is \$700. So it's those poor people, and they're going to elect to take that option because they can't afford to pay that surcharge which will then lead to the result that I pointed out earlier -- a lot more uninsured motorists out there on the road and no assets because these are poor people who will be held responsible if there are any injuries to anyone should an accident occur.

"For those reasons, I urge the members to please vote against this bill."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 1861, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INSURANCE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 21. Noes, 4 (Fernandes Salling, Reed, Solomon, Tungpalan). Excused, none.

S.B. No. 1156, S.D. 1:

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 1156, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLE INSURANCE," was recommitted to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Business Regulation.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 614 (S.B. No. 1287, S.D. 2):

By unanimous consent, Stand Com. Rep. No. 614 and S.B. No. 1287, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE GENERAL APPROPRIATIONS ACT OF 1989," were recommitted to the Committee on Ways and Means.

On motion by Senator Yamasaki, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi and carried, S.B. No. 732, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none. Excused, none.

S.B. No. 1843, S.D. 1:

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 1843, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIREARMS," was recommitted to the Committee on Judiciary.

At this time, the Chair remarked on the action taken on S.B. No. 1843, S.D. 1, as follows:

"For the record, the Chair would like to make a few remarks concerning the recommitment of S.B. No. 1843, S.D.1.

"One of the reasons for the recommitment is because a number of Senators, myself included, do not agree with the legal interpretation expressed in the accompanying Standing Committee Report No. 822. According to the committee report the state Constitution precludes the Legislature from prohibiting any firearm unless that firearm is found to be 'excessively lethal.'

"I do not believe that the state Constitution imposes any sort of 'excessively lethal' test. Many of my Senate colleagues agree with me. We feel that, under the circumstances, it would be better to recommit this bill rather than pass it and, in doing so, imply that the committee report is being endorsed by the Senate.

"Personally, I am in favor of banning - or at least - regulating the private possession of assault weapons. I believe the Legislature has the power to pass such legislation.

"To summarize, Standing Committee Report No. 822 expresses a legal interpretation which is subject to disagreement among legal authorities. At this time, the Senate is not taking any position as to the legal merits of this interpretation. By recommitting the bill, we want to make it clear that Standing Committee Report No. 822 does not represent the official position of the Senate."

#### RECONSIDERATION OF ACTION TAKEN

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 717 (S.B. No. 430, S.D. 2):

Senator Yamasaki moved that the Senate reconsider its action taken earlier on the calendar on Stand. Com. Rep. No. 717 and S.B. No. 430, S.D. 2, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi and carried.

Senator Yamasaki then moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 717 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi and carried.

On motion by Senator Yamasaki, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi and carried, S.B. No. 430, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO A MOBILE THERAPY TEAM PROGRAM FOR INFANTS AND TODDLERS WITH DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none. Excused, none.

Senator Reed then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"I'd like to express my dissatisfaction with the policy of recommitting bills based on discussions behind closed doors in the Majority caucus. This is not a criticism of anybody or any individual but rather an expression of disappointment that we don't allow public discussion on issues of importance.

"Let me use one bill as an example. Senate Bill 34, Standing Committee Report 470, having to do with juvenile waiver, is a very important issue in this community. In the last ten days I've gotten over 200 phone calls from people who are supporting removing the age in the juvenile waiver law.

"Let me briefly give you a couple of examples of why this is important. The most publicized case recently has been that of a 15-year-old who shot three people in a parking lot. This juvenile had been arrested 58 times. One of the people he shot died as a result of the shooting and, yet, if that person is convicted of murder, the worst punishment he'll get is a couple of years in a juvenile facility.

"Another example that I experienced while I was in the Prosecutor's Office was that of a 15-year-old who had been sentenced to a juvenile facility. I think he had 80-some arrests. He was going to spend the rest of his juvenile age, until the age of 18, in a juvenile facility. He broke out of the facility and went to a school, I think it was in Pearl City, went into a classroom and sodomized and raped the teacher in front of all her third grade students. When he was busted later he laughed at the cops and told other people that he knew that he couldn't get any more severe punishment than he already had. He was already being incarcerated for the rest of his juvenile age and, as a result, he broke out simply to, as he said, have some fun before he turns 16, and at which age he could be treated as an adult.

"The Senate Judiciary Committee did a very good job of making the best bill out of this particular issue. Here is one which would have removed the arbitrary setting of an age. It would give the discretion to the judge so the judge could make a decision based on the arrest record of the juvenile and the crime he's presently charged with, and then decide whether that person should be tried as an adult or remain in the family court.

"If any of the members of the Majority had problems with the particular bill, I would have liked to have heard and I'm sure the public would have liked to have heard those objections. I believe we should have kept the bill alive so that we could make modifications in it during the course of the rest of the session.

"But the policy of making these decisions without the benefit of the public knowing the justification is not appropriate. Hearing these kinds of concerns, I don't think is appropriate. Thank you."

Senator McCartney also rose to speak on a point of personal and said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege. I'd like to set the record straight and get this issue over with once and for all.

"This afternoon in the sports page there's another article on the sports arena. What disappoints me is that now they're using the Legislature and the sports arena as a reason for the Rainbows not getting an NIT berth. I don't think that that's appropriate and we're taking the matter very seriously here.

"I would like to say for the record, Mr. President, that I am a paid booster of the Rainbow basketball program. My family has been committed to that program ever since I've been born. They've been participating in that program and I'm not against the arena on campus or against the basketball program.

"What I think we need to do as policymakers, Mr. President, is prioritize our needs. Given the state of the economy right now, I don't think the taxpayers of this state can afford to spend \$45 million on a 8,000-seat arena when our school system is falling apart. Are we ever going to accomplish our goal of building an educational system second to none if our priorities are mixed up? And that's all we're saying, Mr. President, we have to spend taxpayers' money efficiently and

effectively, and the mission of the University of Hawaii is to educate our students and to provide educational opportunities for Hawaii's people.

"When you look at campuses like the Windward Community College, the Maui Community College, the College of Education, and at West Hawaii (I went there last week) the nursing class has a lab in the men's bathroom ... now, where are our priorities? Our priorities have to be for education first. We're going to have to bite the bullet and make some tough decisions and that's all we're saying.

"I don't appreciate the athletic program using the arena as an excuse for not getting a bid to the National Invitational Tournament. I think they had better look in the mirror first before they start blaming us. Thank you."

Senator McMurdo also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to support the former speaker. I have really been saying hurray to him for having the guts to say he was going to put a stop to the \$32 million for that sports arena when we have health and human services programs, education, of which he is the chair, programs like that which are going begging. I'm right with you and I'll stick with you all the way on that one. Thank you."

Senator Holt also rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, I'm rising on point of personal privilege also on the same subject in support of the previous two speakers. Just a couple of facts for the body here.

"Number one, that U.H. did not finish high enough in the WAC playoffs to receive a NCAA tournament bid. Secondly, although they had a 16 and 13 record, they did not have a strong enough power rating. And as an NIT officials said, 'It's the ranking system that takes into consideration such factors as winning percentage against Division 1 opponents, strength of schedule and number of home games.'

"Although I support the university's athletic program as Senator Solomon, the previous Higher Education chairman, has in the past year in the lots of financial support, I think that this sour grapes attitude as reflected in public statements by Coach Wallace really has no place in this community and no place in these halls. Thank you."

Senator Koki also rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege to add my voice in support of Senator McCartney.

"A lot of my constituents are really concerned about the appalling condition of the Windward Community College. And it's a very right stand that the Senator is taking that we cannot be looking at athletics at this point in time when the educational system and the facilities are just in such deplorable condition. It really is incredible. So I just want to commend the Senator for taking his position."

Senator Blair also rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise also on a point of personal privilege.

"I'd like to thank the Senator from Maui and Molokai for his kind remarks with respect to Senator Iwase and my effort on the bill. I hope he won't be so pessimistic as to give up hope on it. The reason for the recommittal was simply so that we could attempt to address the issue in somewhat broader terms by providing, perhaps, more sentencing options for longer terms under the family court jurisdiction which might then weigh in the balance as to whether or not a waiver would occur in a particular instance.

"If I can find an appropriate title in the work that the House is doing at this hour, we will have the matter before us again this session. If not, we will have it before us in a broader context again next year and, hopefully, in the process we will make a good bill even better. But I do thank him for his kind remarks."

Senator Cobb, on a point of personal privilege, said"

"Rising on the same point, Mr. President, on a point of parliamentary privilege. I think it would help when bills are recommitted, if there is a House companion that that be either provided at the time or shortly thereafter so that members could understand the various reasons for committals. I think a lot of the recommitments that did take place were for precisely that reason and it would help considerably. In fact, very few bills that I can recall were recommitted directly as a result of caucus discussion. Usually we have a discussion out here as well."

Senator Solomon also on a point of personal privilege remarked:

"Mr. President, speaking in support of the previous speaker.

"As the Majority Floor Leader, I did make that recommendation and I was informed by the Senate Clerk that it was not the policy of the President that they are to announce whether or not bills are recommitted because the House vehicles have come over."

The Chair responded:

"That is correct."

The Chair then said:

"Members of the Senate, it's been a very long day. Thank you very much for your cooperation. We got through in record time. I think this is the first time in our history that we are out of this chamber at 4:00 o'clock and that is because the Senators should be commended.

"Also, I'd like to thank the Vice President for his able stewardship in my absence."

#### ADJOURNMENT

At 4:05 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Solomon, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate adjourned until 10:30 o'clock a.m., Wednesday, March 13, 1991.

Honorable Legislators:

Both personally and officially as District Superintendent, the chief executive officer of the United Methodist Churches of the Hawaii District, I would like to urge your support of SB 1811 and HB 1264, identical forms of proposed legislation to extend legal protection regarding non-discrimination with respect to sexual orientation in matters pertaining to employment.

The United Methodist Church's Social Principles states: "We insist that all persons, regardless of age, gender, marital status, or sexual orientation are entitled to have their human and civil rights ensured."

It is also highly significant, I believe, that when one of our pastors made an informal poll of a considerable proportion of all United Methodist clergy in the Island, he found overwhelming personal support for the intent of the bills.

Finally, I wish to make clear my unqualified personal position in support of this legislation. While Americans may well differ on the appropriateness of homosexual practice, just as we do on heterosexual practice, in matters pertaining to sexual orientation there seems no reputable scientific evidence on which to base withholding support from the intent of these bills.

I hope the people of Hawaii can count on your enactment of these bills into law.

The United Church of Christ has historically stood for civil rights. Because we believe that there will no "kinder, gentler nation" without full civil rights for all our citizens, I am asking your support for SB 1811 and the companion Bill HB 1264, entitled, Relating to Employment.

Our national church bodies, our Hawaii Conference, and my personal position is that discrimination in employment based on sexual orientation is a violation of a person's civil rights. Just as it is wrong to discriminate against a person in employment on religious grounds, it is also wrong to discriminate against a person based on sexual preference.

The issue is clear: civil rights in employment. Dear Members:

I write to you out of my concern for the passage of HB No. 1264 and SB No. 1811 - Relating to Employment. They specifically address discrimination in employment on the basis of sexual orientation.

The State of Hawaii is long overdue in stating its opposition to this kind of discrimination. These bills provide just and fair protection for a portion of our population which now is subject to discriminatory practice. Homosexuals are most severely affected, causing them to have diminished opportunities for employment and thus all the extenuating problems which hinder them from being fully productive citizens. Discrimination of this kind is a form of institutional oppression directed at loyal, law-abiding citizens. These bills can remedy that situation by clearly eliminating "sexual orientation" as a reason for denying employment. Safeguards for illegal activity, as for any other person, are sufficiently included in these bills.

The Episcopal Church is on record, through resolutions passed at several of its National General Conventions, expressing "its conviction that homosexual persons are entitled to equal protection of the laws with all other citizens, and calls upon our society to see that such protection is provided in actuality." (1976 C-109)

I urge you to act on behalf of the people of our State who suffer from this discrimination and make this State one in which all people have the opportunity to be contributing members.

Thank you for your consideration of my letter and these important bills.

Dear Representative Bainum:

Thank you for your letter of February 4, 1991, in which you requested information about the position of the Church on House Bill No. 1264 and Senate Bill No. 1811 relating to non-discrimination in employment on the basis of sexual orientation.

First, it is important for me to make clear the moral stance of the Church as it relates to homosexuality. In doing so, I quote from the U.S. Catholic Bishops' Pastoral on Moral Values (November 25, 1976):

"Some persons find themselves through no fault of their own to have a homosexual orientation. Homosexuals like everyone else, should not suffer from prejudice against their basic human rights. They have a right to respect, friendship and justice. They should have an active role in the Christian community.

"Homosexual activity, however, as distinguished from homosexual orientation, is morally wrong. Like heterosexual persons, homosexuals are called to give witness to chastity, avoiding with God's grace, behavior which is wrong for them just as non-marital sexual relations are for heterosexuals...."



The Church cannot and does not condone homosexual or bisexual activity (nor does it condone heterosexual activity outside of marriage). It firmly supports, however, the concept that all human beings have basic human rights and that these rights must be respected and honored by all other persons and by all institutions.

One of the basic human rights is the right to work. Work is central to personhood in our society. It is why workers should be treated with dignity and why work should contribute to the common good. To discriminate against a person in employment on the basis of sexual orientation violates the basic right of that person to work and to be a contributing member of the society of which he or she is a member. Unfortunately, discrimination in employment on the basis of sexual orientation does occur. Therefore, it is entirely reasonable to extend public policy (which presently prohibits discriminatory practices relating to employment on the basis of race, sex, age, religion, color, ancestry, handicapped status, marital status or arrest and court record) so as to prohibit discriminatory practices in employment on the basis of sexual orientation.

I hope this letter adequately responds to the questions you raised in your letter.

Senator Tungpalan then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, something is amiss in our parking lot. This morning I was able to greet my sister who is with us from California and, unfortunately, when we went back to the car we found that she had been ticketed. It appears that when she got out from the right hand side of the car she followed the arrow and she placed her coins, all \$2 worth, into the meter. When we came back the ticket was there. It appears that she should have followed the arrow that was on the left hand side of her car.

"When I approached the parking meter attendant, he told me this happens every day. In fact, he said that even if we had a permit to park and we parked without displaying the permit on our dashboard we're also ticketed for that. He mentioned that one of our former colleagues, who's now a department official, had received a ticket yesterday even though he was permitted to use that space.

"What is even more alarming is at times we have visitors come in and use our parking spaces when we are away from the Capitol. And to have these people ticketed is really an affront, not to mention this one occasion where I had gone to have my car serviced and had used one of those models that the service station allowed me to have in place of my car and that was ticketed.

"I think we need to review the parking situation, especially in view of the fact that when we move over to the new state building there will be even fewer parking spaces.

"Anyway, that's something I think perhaps the good Senator from Kauai will be able to review after I introduce a resolution looking into the matter.

"I also have some good news. As I mentioned I do have my sister from California. She's here to attend the wedding of my nephew. She's also a former classmate and roommate of our distinguished colleague from Kohala. I'd like at this time for all of you to greet my sister Yvonne Peterson from California."

The Chair then responded to the situation presented by Senator Tungpalan by requesting the Senate Clerk to look into the matter and to contact the Department of Accounting and General Services.

Senator Holt also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, yesterday we had a little bit of discussion on the University arena and I noticed, this morning, we didn't get any press. Obviously, they don't support our position.

"However, for the body's information I went back to my office last night and did a little bit of homework and I'd like to share the information that I have found with the body, especially the Committee on Ways and Means.

"Last year we inserted a sum of money for the arena, a 10,000-seat arena, but, quietly, a proviso was also inserted into the budget which a lot of people really don't know about. I'll read it for you, a portion of it, anyway. It says:

'Provided that the general obligation bond appropriation for the special events arena and athletic support facilities on the Manoa campus shall be used to plan' (It doesn't say construct, it says shall be used to plan.) 'for a seating capacity of 10,000 seats as referenced in the UHNNP Facility Alternative Study, dated November 1989.

'Provided further that the UHM parking structure, phase II project, proceed without delay' (Mr. President, without delay, that's important.) 'and shall be coordinated with the special events arena project, such that parking facilities be available prior to the completion of the arena.'

It's very explicit and that's in Act 299, Section 233B, that the parking facilities for the arena be completed prior to the completion. To date, we have not received any requests from the administration or the university for the construction monies for the parking facilities. Yet, we are moving ahead on deliberating and debating the merits and demerits of building an arena.

"This little proviso, I think, is something that the Ways and Means Committee, the chairman especially, should take to heart because it is something that we passed last year. It does have force and effect of law. Unless we receive a request from the administration in the amount

think we can proceed along the lines that the coach wants us to.

"Thank you."

Senator Solomon also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, also rising on the point of personal privilege and in support of the previous speaker's remarks.

"Mr. President, as the chair of the Higher Education Committee last session, I want to inform the body that I was very much surprised when I read the proviso. I did not have any knowledge as to how that proviso was put in as part of the budget document.

"I, like the previous speaker, urge the chairman of the Ways and Means Committee to please look into the situation and advise us on this matter.

"Thank you very much."

## THIRTY-FIRST DAY

Thursday, March 14, 1991

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, convened at 11:35 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend C. Eugene Phillips, Mililani Baptist Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Nakasato and Wong who were excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirtieth Day.

The following introductions were made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Levin, on behalf of Senator Matsuura, Senator Solomon and himself, introduced four Big Island athletic directors who are visiting the Capitol to lobby for various athletic programs - Jim Bertilacci, Walter Kanda, Ken Yamase, and Ron Furukawa.

Senator Matsuura, on behalf of Senator Solomon, Senator Levin and himself, introduced a group of 16 students from Hilo, Konawaena, Kau and Kohala High Schools, participants of the Hawaii District Legislative Experience Program. The students were accompanied by faculty advisors, Fumitake Asano of Hilo High School and Faith Ciriako of Konawaena High School, and Helen Kobayashi of the Hawaii District Office.

Senator Ikeda introduced her student "shadows," Brett Kawada and Brandy Kaneshiro, from Niu Valley Intermediate School.

Senator Ikeda then honored the late Dr. John Bystrom as follows:

"Mr. President, today we are honoring Dr. John Bystrom who passed away on January 4th of this year.

"Twenty years ago, University of Hawaii Professor Dr. John Bystrom turned an unwanted piece of space junk into PEACESAT, the educational satellite linking people around the Pacific. The acronym PEACESAT stands for Pan Pacific Education and Communications Experiments by Satellite, and the earth bound part of the system is based in Hawaii at the university.

"In 1976, the Honolulu Star-Bulletin editorial suggested that Dr. Bystrom be nominated for a Nobel Prize or another top award for his accomplishments.

"Dr. Bystrom kept track of the satellite since it was launched from Cape Kennedy in 1966 when he was in Washington, D.C., as assistant to the Secretary for Health, Education and Welfare. By 1969, the \$7 million weather satellite anchored over Christmas Island had served its purpose and would no longer be used. But Dr. Bystrom had an idea to give the satellite new life. He successfully fired up the state Legislature and Governors John Burns and George Ariyoshi to fund PEACESAT. A base was needed and equipment and more. The National Aeronautics and Space Administration which had put up the satellite still provides time each week at no charge.

"By today's high tech standards, PEACESAT is primitive, but it works. It worked then and it still does, linking students, teachers, doctors, clergy and others on Pacific Islands and their ideas. Dr. Bystrom called it the 'Model T' of communications.

"I think that Dr. Bystrom is best described by his friend Elizabeth Kunimoto who wrote: 'Dr. Bystrom was the ultimate educator whose heart, mind and body worked in unison to reach out to a student body in a classroom as big as our world. He was a creative person. He not only taught but listened to others and learned from them, from statesmen to students and the many friends of his four sons. He empowered and ennobled others by embodying the concepts of PEACESAT, mutual respect, sharing of information, collegiality. His spirit is very much alive today in PEACESAT.'

"Mr. President, with us this morning to honor the late Dr. Bystrom is his widow, Mrs. Ann Bystrom. With her is Mr. Robert Maker, her brother. Also, in the gallery, are her sisters, Mary Maker and Ardis Maker."

Mrs. Bystrom, together with her brother and sisters, rose to be recognized. Mrs. Bystrom was presented the Senate certificate of recognition of the late Dr. John Bystrom by Senator McCartney and a lei by Senator Matsuura. Senator George presented a lei to Mr. Maker.

At 11:46 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:51 o'clock a.m.

Senator McCartney, on behalf of Senators Nakasato, Koki and himself, welcomed and introduced a group of students from Okinawa who are here on a student exchange program.

Senator Hagino then made the following introduction:

"Mr. President and fellow Senators, it is indeed an honor and privilege to introduce a fellow Senator. With us in the gallery is Senator Jeton Anjain who is a member of the Nitijela (Parliament) of the Republic of the Marshall Islands. Also in the gallery are: Mayor Edison Anjain of Rongelap Atoll; Ms. Almira Matayoshi, a victim of nuclear testing; and Mr. Elbow Lokobowl, also a victim of nuclear testing.

"Mr. President, the delegation is enroute to Washington, D.C., to testify in support of the U.S. Congressional Resolution for Humanitarian Assistance to Rongelap Island.

"We are also in the process of circulating a Senate concurrent resolution for signatures which reiterates Hawaii's understanding of and sympathy for the trials and problems of the Rongese people who have been in exile now since 1986, and it also urges our Washington representatives to support the Congressional Resolution for Humanitarian Assistance on their behalf."

Senator Anjain and his delegation rose to be recognized.

Senator Cobb then remarked:

"Mr. President, in reference to our visitors from the Marshall Islands, I would like to not only commend them for their efforts but also bring to the attention of the Senators, the terrible suffering that is taking place there, in Hiroshima, and in Chernobyl as a result of having the nuclear genie come out of the bottle. And that anything we can do to get away from reliance on that kind of energy as well as reliance on that kind of strategic defense is something very much in our national interest to pursue

and I wish them all the luck in the world in Washington and will be happy to support them. Thank you."

Senator Holt introduced "a gracious lady who happens to be a terrific salmon fisherman, a UH football booster, and who also happens to be my mother," Mrs. Frances Holt.

His department handles so many controversial issues and at the hearing held on his nomination, there were people from both sides ... business as well as environmental proponents, opponents, ... came to show their respect and support for Bill Paty. Another plus for this man is that he knows that dinosaurs on conservation land in Manoa Valley should become extinct. (Laughter.)

"I urge your support. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura also rose to speak in support of Mr. Paty and said:

"Mr. President, I would, if I could, let Mrs. Paty come down to the floor, take my mike and tell us if he is really that perfect or not. Today, I feel a little intimidated. The last time I stood up in support of a nominee there was an editorial in The Hawaii Tribune-Herald criticizing me for trying to increase the nominee's salary three times. So today I'm going to make myself very clear so there will be no misunderstanding. I know Mr. Bill Paty is worth three times more than what he's being paid. I'm not trying to increase his salary. He's going to have to live with his present salary but he is truly worth three times his salary.

"I am in support of this great man. Thank you very much."

Senator Solomon also supported the nominee and remarked:

"As you know, Mr. President, over one-third of all state forest land is in my Third Senatorial District. I have to admit and say that since Mr. Paty has been the DLNR chairman, it is the first time that the public has had so much access to DLNR and Mr. Paty has made himself available.

"What the chair of the Executive Appointments Committee has said is true about our forest land and our recreation land ... we do have a lot of conflict in use and conflict among the community and we need a mediator. Bill Paty has done an excellent job in doing just that. I urge your support of his appointment. Thank you."

Senator McCartney also supported the nominee and stated:

"Mr. President, I would like to echo the comments of the previous three speakers and to also thank Mr. Paty. He was very instrumental in working with our community to save the Heeia Wetlands.

"For the record, I want to say that it was his idea to work on the land exchange where we could find a win-win situation between the landowner and the people of our community. I would like to thank you, Mr. Paty, for making that possible."

Senator Fernandes Salling added:

"Mr. President, I would just like to say to Bill, it was a pleasure serving with you at the ConCon and it's been a pleasure working with you here in the Legislature. Yes, your department surely does deal with a lot of problems and I notice a little bit more white hair, Bill."

Senator Hagino also supported the nomination and said:

"Mr. President, I would like to echo the comments of the previous speaker. Many of the headaches that you face, Bill, were caused by the '78 Constitutional Convention. I would like to commend you on your fine work and wish you the best of luck. Thank you."

Monday, March 18, 1991

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, convened at 11:35 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Dale Vallejo-Sanderson, Kailua Christian Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chang, Ikeda, Nakasato and Reed who were excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Second Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Tungpalan introduced Mr. Santiago Joab, director of land and natural resources on the Island of Pohnpei of the Federated States of Micronesia, who was seated in the gallery.

Senator A. Kobayashi, on behalf of Senator Donna Ikeda, introduced Joy Ishimoto and Shannon Toguchi, students from Niu Valley Intermediate School who are spending the day at the Legislature, visiting and working in Senator Ikeda's office, also seated in the gallery.

Senator McMurdo then recognized and introduced the delegation from the Honolulu Armed Services YMCA who were seated on the floor of the Senate as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure today to present this certificate, recognizing the services of the Honolulu Armed Services YMCA.

"The Honolulu Armed Services YMCA, serving Hawaii's military community since 1917 through times of peace and times of conflict, has once again been available to serve the military, especially the thousands of young enlisted personnel and their dependents based in Hawaii during Operation Desert Shield and Operation Desert Storm.

"In meeting its goals of excellence and service directed toward the continuing and vital need to reduce the stress and isolation of military life, to enrich the lives of military families and to strengthen the bond between those in uniform and civilians, the Honolulu Armed Services YMCA offers complete and comprehensive individual and family support, education, and recreation programs at seven locations, with an administrative, professional and clerical staff of 100.

"Under the direction of Martha Burchell, board chairman Norborne Clarke, and a committed volunteer board of management, the Honolulu Armed Services YMCA has formed 'Operation Rainbow' to respond to the increased need for services during this time of conflict.

"The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, expresses gratitude for the services given the community by the Honolulu Armed Services YMCA and congratulates it for its superlative efforts in aiding our military families.

"I would like to introduce to you the various officers and staff of the Armed Services YMCA of Honolulu: Mr. Norborne Clarke, chairman of the board of management; the Reverend David Kennedy, headmaster of St. Andrews Priory, who is the chairman-elect of the board; Ms. Martha Burchell, executive director of the Armed Services

YMCA; Lt. Gen. Jack Ferris, Deputy U.S. CINCPAC, who is the 1st vice chair of the Armed Services YMCA; Ms. Marilyn McCormick, secretary of the board and member of the executive committee. Not present today but an equally hard working and important member is Mr. Pat Southern who is the associate executive director for programs."

All of the honorees rose to be recognized and Mr. Clarke was presented the Senate certificate of recognition by Senator McMurdo. Senators Fernandes Salling, A. Kobayashi, Solomon, Cobb and Hagino presented the leis.

Senator Crozier then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I stand to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, in a couple of weeks there will be a showing of Judy Garland's movie, 'The Wizard of Oz.' I'd like to just share ... this is going to be a while, I'm leading up to something so please bear with me. For those of you who are impatient, sorry.

"But anyway, Mr. President, in the movie, 'The Wizard of Oz,' ... we all watched it as kids and we always thought it was a children's story but, I think it's really a satire on the political process. You know, how Dorothy gets caught up in a windstorm and she ends up in the Land of Oz. She has dreams; she has hopes that someday she'll be able to go home but, in the meantime, she meets up with the good witch of the North (and that represents the people, the electorate), I think it was, who gives her a pair of red shoes and these red shoes are

magical red shoes. These shoes represent power or elected office.

"The lion is looking for courage. Here in our political process, we need to have the fortitude to stand by our principles and convictions. The scarecrow is looking for a brain ... that's education in the political realm ... we need more education. And the tin man is looking for a heart, or compassion. And we always need that. We need more compassion for our fellow men.

"But anyway, Dorothy and her friends go on and they finally get to the Wizard of Oz, and the Wizard tells them that he doesn't believe them and they have to pass one more test to prove that they are sincere. So they are told by the Wizard that they must destroy or kill the Wicked Witch of the West. And they go out there and the Wicked Witch, I think, burns the scarecrow, and Dorothy throws some water on the Wicked Witch and she melts away.

"So, just like Saddam Hussein, he was just a paper tiger. He made a lot of noise, but in the end he was nothing. And that's just how the world is.

"In a couple of weeks, you will be able to see 'The Wizard of Oz' and you'll never be able to watch it as little children anymore. You'll never be able to appreciate the fantasy of the Wizard of Oz. You're going to look at it from a political standpoint.

"Now, why do I bring this up? Well, Mr. President, last Friday the great commentator or reporter from the Star-Bulletin who's won numerous prizes and is potentially a Pulitzer prize winner, Richard Borreca, wrote quite an article and he talked about the future of the Green Party. I can remember standing on the railing a couple of months ago with a group of reporters, and I think Mr. Borreca was one of them, and I told them, you know, if ever the Democratic Party loses its vision I would like to become part of the Green Party because I believe in the goals of the Green Party. I believe that this is the only party that looks at the planet earth. All other parties look at their own localities and try to solve the problems within themselves but the Green Party takes on the community of the planet. So I said that I want to be a part of them because they list environment, first. They also list peace and nonviolence and that's the kind of things that I'm interested in. They also have education and concerns for indigenous people. These are issues that are important to me. So I was excited that somebody was trying to do something.

"Just like Dorothy, the lion, the tin man, and the straw man, they were excited because somebody told them there was hope -- go to the Wizard and you will find your dreams will come true, your aspirations will come true. But along the way, they had to confront the Wicked Witch of the West.

"Now, Mr. President, along the way Senator Mike Crozier will have to confront a person from the West. In Friday's article, the organizer for the Green Party, Linda Martin, said: 'I will be looking hard for a resident of Sen. Crozier's district who is willing to give this legislative tyrant and mouthpiece of the landowners a run for his money.'

"How ironic, Mr. President, I saw the Green Party as the party of hope, as the party to bring the world community together and, lo and behold, before I can have my red shoes, the same shoes that Dorothy had on to make her dreams come true, the shoes that have the power, this woman wants to take away those red shoes from me.

"What I'm trying to say is, no matter how we perceive we're doing good, someone else perceives that we're not doing good. In the end, the Wizard of Oz turns out to be a nothing. But he makes Dorothy and her friends realize that in order to attain the goals they want they have to do it themselves.

"So, I'd like to just say, Mr. President, I wish the Green Party well, but it's time for them to watch the movie, 'The Wizard of Oz,' and analyze who is leading them. Do they have someone who's just out to take away shoes from others who are in office now and not really committed to making the original intent of the Green Party?

"Thank you very much."

At this time, Senator Wong rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"This Saturday (March 16, 1991) in the Star-Bulletin, on the front page, a headline read: 'Wong, Peters buy luxury condo units; Other powerful figures get in on the ground floor in Makiki.'

"Mr. President, I do own a condominium at 1015 Wilder. That part of the story is true. I did buy a unit back in 1989 and I disclosed this on my financial disclosure form in 1989. There's nothing secret about this purchase.

"However, Mr. President, what I'm upset about is the story's inference that I got the unit because of political or preferential treatment. This is not true. After most of the units had already been sold, there were only a few left. Jeff Stone, president of Stone Realty, who was handling the sales, suggested to my wife who is also his sister that she should consider buying one. After weeks of deliberation, it was only then that my wife and I decided to buy a unit on an equal basis of 50 percent each. The point is, I was not one of the advance buyers. I came in late, after the advance buyers had picked the more desirable units. I got no special deal, no special treatment because of my political position.

"As for the other prominent people who had also bought units in the project, I did not know they had done so until after I saw them around the parking lot or in the common areas. I did not know that Representative Peters was going to be one of my neighbors. I certainly was not the one who recommended that he buy one. Neither did I recommend to any other people who were mentioned in the article, Walter Dods of First Hawaiian Bank, Jack Seigle of Starr Seigle McCombs Inc., and Andy Ing, former state lieutenant governor. There was no attempt on my part to convince these people that they should buy units at 1015 Wilder.

"What really grates me, Mr. President, is that the Star-Bulletin story also inferred that I was dodging the reporters because I did not want to comment on this story. This is absolutely untrue. I was around the Capitol all week last week. They saw me around. They could have asked me at any time. I understand that Richard Borreca only came to my office on Friday afternoon, and this is after I had met him in the parking lot of Iolani Palace that morning prior to the session.

"I believe in fair treatment, Mr. President. I think they should have made more of an effort to come and see me before doing the story.

"The story I am telling you has an irony in that my unit is number 204 of a 12-story building. And as we all know, in the pricing of condominiums, units at the bottom start at the lowest possible price and rises as you go up into the building. I have a modest unit, certainly not one that I would call a luxury unit.

"Mr. President, I've been in the Senate a long, long time. This is the first time that any inference has been made upon my person that I have used my political muscle to get a deal. And I want to say for the record, I do not appreciate this.

"Thank you very much."

"Behind every great man is a great woman and I'd like to introduce at this time Mrs. Gwen Phibbs, wife of the president. Accompanying Dr. and Mrs. Phibbs is Caroline Dunn who is the director of alumni relations.

"Also accompanying Dr. Phibbs is Bill Kaneko, an alumnus of Puget Sound. Bill is an outstanding state planner and is a tremendous advocate for civil rights for all minorities. Last but not least is Scott Higashi, an outstanding student of the University of Puget Sound.

Senator Ikeda rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I was watching the news on Channel 4 yesterday afternoon and I was astonished to hear that according to the director of the Department of Health, Dr. John Lewin, the superfund bill which we passed last year is so flawed that it would be virtually impossible to enforce. Oil spills, in particular, were cited in that report.

"Dr. Lewin was commenting on the pre-enforcement provision in the law which mandates that clean-ups begin and be completed prior to any court action being allowed. This provision, as you know, was the major disagreement between the department and those potentially affected by the law. And it was Dr. Lewin who strenuously argued to not weaken this provision. His insistence was the primary reason that the negotiations ended up in an impasse, and also the reason why, as chair of the committee, I then moved to agree to the House draft of the bill and then moved for its passage.

"Now it appears that the administration has had a major change of heart and feels that this provision can be compromised without jeopardizing their ability to enforce any environmental clean-up. That's fine. I don't know what brought this about. However, I don't think that it is fair to justify this compromise by denigrating the actions taken previously by this Legislature in establishing superfund legislation.

"I find this to be totally unbelievable after all of the negotiations and work that was done last year, and I certainly question Dr. Lewin's integrity at this point.

"Thank you."

## THIRTY-SEVENTH DAY

Friday, March 22, 1991

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, convened at 11:38 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Father Franklin Pao of St. Louis School after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Mizuguchi who was excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Sixth Day.

Senator McMurdo then introduced her "very dear friends from Texas," Elladean Chambers, who was a sorority sister, and husband Chuck. The Chambers and their friends, who were seated in the gallery, are participants of an elder hostel program at the University of Hawaii.

Senator McMurdo also introduced Dr. Donniss H. Thompson, who was seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Today, it gives me great pleasure to present this particular certificate of appreciation to a very outstanding woman.

"Dr. Donniss H. Thompson, long recognized as a major force in the organization and promotion of women's athletics in the State of Hawaii, is honored for her outstanding contributions to sports, academics, and the community. Her distinctive career in Hawaii began in 1961 as a health and physical education professor at the University of Hawaii at Manoa.

"As part of her classroom teaching, Dr. Thompson introduced progressive and innovative programs into the curriculum, and encouraged students to organize and supervise athletics-related community activities.

"After serving as the interim director of women's athletics for three years, Donniss then became the women's athletic director at the University of Hawaii in '76. During her tenure, Dr. Thompson set new standards for excellence within the athletic department and the University, and shaped the program from one that was virtually nonexistent to one that now receives national and international recognition. Most notably, Dr. Thompson

coached a world-class women's track team at the University of Hawaii.

"In 1981, Dr. Thompson was appointed by Governor Ariyoshi to serve as the superintendent of the Department of Education. Dr. Thompson's vision and leadership provided the foundation for the establishment of many important programs.

"In addition to her many years of public service with the Department of Education and the University of Hawaii, Dr. Thompson has been active in numerous and diverse community service programs. Some of the organizations for which she has selflessly volunteered include the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Governor's Interim Commission, the State Commission on Civil Rights, Advisory Committee to the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights, the American Cancer Society, Kapiolani Medical Center for Women and Children, the YWCA, the Honolulu Meditation Center, and the U.S. Council Sports Committee.

"Dr. Thompson has been recognized by her peers, community organizations, and the government for her never-ending enthusiasm and compassion, her progressive ideas, and her selfless dedication to everything she undertakes. She is a true leader, and her talents are greatly appreciated by all who know her.

"It gives me great pleasure to introduce our honoree, Dr. Donniss H. Thompson. Next to Donniss is Kalani Dapitan. This young gentleman is Dr. Thompson's Godson and he is a student at Iao Intermediate School on Maui. And next to him is Mr. Artie McNair, who has been a close friend and companion of Dr. Thompson since 1962. He is a retired U.S. government employee."

Dr. Thompson rose to be recognized and was presented the Senate certificate of appreciation by Senator McMurdo. Senator Iwase presented her with a lei. Mr. McNair and Kalani also rose to be recognized and were presented leis by Senators Ikeda and Tungpalan.

Senator McMurdo also introduced a group of friends of Dr. Thompson who were seated in the gallery: Jan and Charlie Dapitan, parents of Kalani; Marsha and Kenneth Joiner; and Fay Kennedy Bailey.

But she did mention that some ads were a little on the 'coconut bra' side; and in fact, you know, it's no wonder that people were asking her, 'What, you have cars in Hawaii? You mean you don't travel in canoes?'

"So, we can do a better job, I think, of promoting commercials like the one that encourages employers to

give their employees time off and perhaps even like the one my daughter said she saw on American Airlines. Before landing in Honolulu, they had a five-minute presentation of what Hawaii was all about. She said that was very representative of Hawaii. I'd like to commend the media campaigns that put together the American Airlines ad as well as the other one encouraging employers to give their workers time off. In fact, it did get one worker here. My sister, you recall, was here last week. She had heard one of those ads and she got on the airplane. She told her employer, 'You know, I'll be a more productive citizen.' It did work at least for our family. Thank you very much."

Senator Cobb, also on a point of personal privilege, said:

"Mr. President, if there's anything that the HVB and other lobbyists should have learned by now is that 'coconut bras' and plastic dinosaurs do not go over very well in the Senate. And please, I urge them to keep that in mind in the future. Thank you."

Mr. Rick Klemm, 1991 chairman of public relations for HST, and the public relations representative for HSPA; and

Mr. Jack Kong, secretary-treasurer of HST.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Ninth Day.

Senator McMurdo introduced the following cadets of the Junior ROTC Programs of Hawaii, seated in the gallery, who were selected for the 1991 Spring Camp Daedalaen Award: Jerry Agustin of Farrington High School; Eric Marshall of Leilehua High School; Scott Mallon of Konawaena High School; Loren Aquino of McKinley High School, Corey Wardell of Roosevelt High School; Beverly Gaboya of Waianae High School; Daniel S. David of Kailua High School; Steve Smith of Radford High School; Daniel S. Ryan of Kamehameha Schools; and Allen Alford and Allen P.A. Alford of Damien High School. The cadets were accompanied by Mr. Hank English and Major Gary Danio, ROTC instructor at Farrington High School.

Senator McMurdo said that the cadets will be flying gliders, and receive hands-on experience at Dillingham Airfield as part of this youth aviation education program and will be taken on a tour of the 15th Air Base Wing at Hickam Air Force Base, Pacific Air Force Command, and the Hawaii Air National Guard.

Senator Solomon then recognized and introduced Mr. Kenneth F. Brown, seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure, today, to present a Senate certificate honoring Kenneth F. Brown. I would like to read the certificate because the words are very meaningful.

'Kenneth F. Brown, a native son and lifelong resident of Hawaii, has devoted his life to serving his community in a number of important roles including state Senator (1968 to 1974) and chairperson of the boards of Queen's Medical Center, the Pacific Ocean Research Foundation, and the Bishop Museum. He was named Outstanding Businessman of 1983 and Hawaii's Humanitarian of the year, characterized as a "Living Treasure" by the Honpa Hongwanji Mission, and received the Na Po'okela Award. But perhaps Mr. Brown's greatest achievements have come through his efforts, as a practicing ambassador of Aloha, to (in his own words) "forge a dynamic and yet coherent harmony in today's contentious world."

'Kenneth F. Brown will retire from the Board of Governors of the East-West Center in June 1991 after nine years of exemplary service. The Senate of Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, expresses deep appreciation and gratitude to Kenneth F. Brown for his lifetime of service to the people of Hawaii, and wishes him happiness and fulfillment in all his future endeavors."

Mr. Brown, accompanied by his wife Joan, rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate. Leis were presented to Mr. and Mrs. Brown.

Senator Solomon continued:

"Mr. President, as you know, doing business in Hawaii has changed quite dramatically. We are moving away from the philosophical spirit of Aloha as we move into the year 2000. The Hawaiian spiritual values such as 'lokahi,' such as 'laulima,' such as 'hoowai,' which means to enrich all of those around us, are essential. So essential, Mr. President, that the Hawaii State Legislature did pass a bill encouraging all of us to remember these spiritual values as we conduct our legislative affairs as well as we conduct our commercial business in the State of Hawaii.

"Accompanying Kenny Brown are his dear friends and, of course, all of you know who they are. But in my mind, Mr. President, these three individuals possess and continue to practice those spiritual values in their own respective fields: Aunt Gladys Brandt, an educator and former chairman of the University of Hawaii Board of Regents; Mr. Keiji Kawakami, retired businessman of family-owned Iolani Sportswear, who, in presenting the image of the aloha shirt, I'm sure is responsible for Aloha Friday in the State of Hawaii; and of course, our chief judge of the Intermediate Court of Appeals, Judge James Burns."

Mrs. Brandt, Mr. Kawakami and Judge Burns all rose to be recognized and were presented leis by various Senators.

Senator McMurdo, in observance of Doctors' Day, March 30, 1991, and throughout the year, introduced a group of Hawaii doctors representing the Hawaii Medical Association as follows:

"The Sixteenth Senate, Regular Session of 1991, salutes Hawaii's doctors for their tremendous efforts and results in continuing to keep Hawaii the healthiest State in the Union and congratulates them on their special day.

## FORTY-FIRST DAY

Monday, April 1, 1991

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, convened at 11:35 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Ms. Patricia Mumford, Executive Director, Hawaii Council of Churches, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fortieth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Solomon recognized and introduced Mr. Hung Wai Ching as follows:

"Mr. President, it is my privilege, on behalf of the Women's Caucus, to welcome members of the 442nd Veterans Club today. We will be presenting them with a Senate certificate congratulating them on their 48th anniversary. But before we do that, I would like to recognize and honor a gentleman who has done so much to foster racial harmony in Hawaii and who is considered as 'Father of the 442nd Combat Team.' I would like to ask Mr. Hung Wai Ching to please stand to be recognized."

Mr. Ching, who was seated on the floor of the Senate, stood to be recognized.

Senator Solomon continued:

"Mr. President, there is a World War II story about two soldiers of the 298th Infantry, one a Hawaiian and the other a Nisei, sitting in a machine gun pit on an Oahu beach, waiting for the Japanese invasion of Hawaii. After a long wait, the Hawaiian turns to the Nisei and blurts out the question which has bothered him: 'Eh, if dey come, who you going shoot? Dem or me?' To which the Nisei answered for all Japanese-Americans: 'Who you t'ink, stupid? Me just as good American as you! (Prologue of "Ambassador in Arms" by Thomas D. Murphy.) The Japanese Pearl Harbor attack thrust upon Japanese-Americans everywhere the battle to fight against doubt, distrust, fear and outright prejudice by fellow Americans.'

"Yet, four and a half years later, on July 15, 1946, the 100th/442nd Combat Team was the only American military unit to march down Constitution Avenue to the White House where it was awarded its seventh Presidential Unit Citation. President Harry S. Truman told the Nisei soldiers: 'You fought for the free nations of the world.... You fought not only the enemy, you fought prejudice, and you have won!'

"The one person, more than anyone else, responsible for this remarkable change of events, and who was directly involved in assisting the Nisei to convincingly answer the question 'Who you going shoot?' is one that we honor today, Mr. Hung Wai Ching.

"One year before the Pearl Harbor attack, Hung Wai Ching organized the Committee for Interracial Unity representing the FBI, Army and Navy intelligence and community leaders, designed to preserve harmonious relations between the various racial groups in Hawaii in the event of hostilities with Japan. Soon after the Pearl Harbor attack, Hung Wai was appointed to the morale

division of the military governor's office, a morale and intelligence liaison between Hawaii's martial law government and the civilian community, and Hung Wai served as civilian advisor to then FBI Chief Robert Shivers and Army G-2 Colonel K.J. Fielder.

"Through his morale division capacity, Hung Wai was able to meet with President Roosevelt and Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt during the early days of the war, where he assured them of the loyalty of Hawaii's Japanese population and pleaded that they not be evacuated and interned like the tragic mistake of the West Coast evacuation/internment.

"Six weeks after the Pearl Harbor attack, all Niseis in the Hawaii Territorial Guard were discharged solely because of their ancestry. Hung Wai met and encouraged 160 of these former University of Hawaii students to volunteer their services to the military governor of Hawaii to organize into a non-combat labor battalion known as the 'Varsity Victory Volunteers' (VVV). For almost one year after February 1942, the men of the Triple V swung hammers, picks and sledgehammers performing work vital to the military defense of Hawaii with the Army Engineers at Schofield Barracks. They were under the command of Captain Richard Lum, Lieutenant Thomas Kaulukui, Lieutenant Frank Judd and Supervisor Ralph Yempuku.

"This was the time when no Nisei could enter the military service because the War Department had reclassified their draft status from 1-A to 4-C ('enemy alien'). Hung Wai Ching was convinced that the only sure way the Nisei could ever convincingly prove their loyalty to America was to be accepted for military service and to be permitted to fight for, and even die, for their country.

"In December 1942, Assistant Secretary of War John J. McCloy visited Hawaii on a military inspection trip, and Hung Wai was assigned to escort him around. Hung Wai made sure that McCloy witnessed the Triple V men cracking rocks up at the Kolekole Pass rockcrusher and heard the story of the VVV. One month later in January 1943, the War Department ordered the reopening of military service to Niseis and issued the call for Nisei volunteers to form the now famous 442nd Regimental Combat Team.

"The story of the 100th/442nd Combat Team, the most decorated military unit of World War II, has been told and retold many times, and I'm sure many, many more times. But Hung Wai Ching made it his personal mission to assure that the Nisei soldiers were given every fair opportunity to prove their loyalty through dedicated military service to their country.

"After the war was over and the boys came home, Hung Wai approached community leaders to establish scholarship funds and foundations to solicit education scholarships for those who wanted to continue their education, and he found job opportunities for returning veterans who wanted work. It is no wonder that Hung Wai Ching was one of the very first to be accepted as an honorary member of the 442nd Veterans Club.

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure, again, to introduce our honored guest, Mr. Hung Wai Ching."

Mr. Ching, again, rose to be recognized.

Senator Solomon continued:

"We must remember that the 'political revolution of 1954' was made possible because the late Governor Jack Burns worked up a strong Democrat Party from a nucleus of returning war veterans. The rest is well-known history, Mr. President. Much of this could not have happened had the Niseis not been given the chance to fight for and to even die for their country. That chance was realized because the right man was in the right place at the right time.

"Such is part of the rich legacy we have inherited from the man we recognize and honor today."

At this time, Senator Lehua Fernandes Salling was called to read the special message from Governor John Waihee as follows:

"Mr. President, fellow Senators, it gives me great pleasure to read this message from Governor John Waihee.

'The political triumphs in the last three decades in Hawaii are deeply rooted in the accomplishments of the Varsity Victory Volunteers Labor Battalion, and the courage and heroism of the 100th Battalion and the 442nd Regimental Combat Team. For Hawaii's Nisei soldiers, just being accepted in a combat role was an achievement in civil rights. They established an unbeatable record in both the European and Pacific conflicts, paying the price of admission to full citizenship in blood. Those were the triumphs in democracy destined to serve as a guide to the people of the islands never to surrender despite the odds.

'Today, the 442nd Hawaiian Glee Club joins the Senate in acknowledging the tremendous contributions of the men of the Triple V, the 100th Battalion and the 442nd Regimental Combat Team. Also to be credited, once again, is Mr. Hung Wai Ching who helped organize the Victory Volunteers and the AJA units that sprang from their leadership.

'The example of those who battled prejudice during the war years remains a moving force. New population groups have come to the islands and are struggling for acceptance. Fortunately, they will have the benefit of those who went before them.

'Let us all recognize the contributions of our AJA heroes and the powerful influence for equality for which they fought.

'John Waihee, Governor.'

Senator Ann Kobayashi then rose to read the congratulatory Senate Certificate to the 442nd Veterans Club on its 48th Anniversary, signed by all members of the Senate, as follows:

'The 442nd Regimental Combat Team formed in March of 1943, served with distinction on the battlefields of Italy and France and became the most decorated unit of its size in the United States Army, receiving seven Presidential Unit Citations and numerous individual medals. Upon discharge from the Army, members formed the 442nd Veterans Club and dedicated themselves to community service.

'The 442nd Veterans Club is celebrating its 48th anniversary and the Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, congratulates each and every member for his continued and exemplary service to his community, his state and his country.'

"Thank you."

Senator Solomon then continued:

"Mr. President, we have here with us today, Mr. John Tsukano, author of 'Bridge of Love,' a book on the 442nd Regimental Combat Team. He would like to present this book to Governor Waihee. Since the Governor could not be here, Mr. President, Mr. Tsukano would like you to accept the book for the Governor."

Mr. Tsukano, who was also seated on the floor of the Senate, presented his book to the Senate President.

Senator Solomon, on behalf of the Women's Caucus, also introduced Mr. Harold Fukunaga, president of the 442nd Veterans Club, who was also seated on the floor of the Senate, and presented him the congratulatory Senate certificate. (Senator Solomon said, 'Incidentally, he is the proud father of Representative Carol Fukunaga.')

Senator Solomon then presented the 442nd choral group under the leadership of president Yoshi Shibuya and choral leader Jane Ueoka and said, "This group is made up of 442nd veterans and their wives and they provide entertainment to various community organizations as a community service."

The 442nd choral group, seated in the gallery, then entertained the Senators and guests with a rendition of two songs.

Senator Solomon continued:

"Mahalo nui loa for that wonderful 'Go For Broke.'"

"Mr. President, Laurence Fuchs, author of the historical 'Hawaii Pono,' attributes the shaping of the post-war modern-day Hawaii to four influencing factors: (1) the public school system of Hawaii; (2) the recognition of labor unions; (3) the resolution of the 'Japanese loyalty' question; and (4) the emergence of the two party political system in Hawaii.

"Mr. President, may we have all the Senators honor the veterans of the 100th/442nd Combat Team for their many, many contributions and honor the memory of their fallen comrades with a standing ovation."

The members of the Senate then rose on a standing ovation in their honor.

Senator Solomon acknowledged the contributions of Senators Matsuura, Holt, A. Kobayashi, McMurdo and Tungpalan and the assistance of Dr. Ryoji Namba and Mr. Alvin Shim for organizing the tribute and hosting the luncheon for Mr. Hung Wai Ching and the 442nd Veterans Club.

At this time, Senator B. Kobayashi recognized and introduced Dr. Carlyle Guerra de Macedo as follows:

"Mr. President, today, we have on the floor with us one of the leading world figures in public health. Dr. Carlyle Guerra de Macedo is here to deliver the prestigious Ira Hiscock Public Lecture at the School of Public Health, University of Hawaii. The topic for his lecture will be 'Health in a Turbulent Society -- Emergency and Disaster Health Services.'

"Dr. de Macedo is one of the world's foremost scholars and administrators and authors in the field of public health, specializing in health planning, population, and economic and social development. Educated in Brazil, Chile, and the United States, Dr. de Macedo lectures throughout the Americas, is active in several medical societies, has received numerous awards recognizing his

outstanding achievements in public health, including decorations from Guatemala, Brazil, Peru, Colombia, and Spain. Since 1983, Dr. de Macedo has been Director of the Pan American Sanitary Bureau, Regional Office for the Americas of the World Health Organization, and is stationed in Washington, D.C.

"Members of the Senate, please recognize Dr. Carlyle Guerra de Macedo.

"Accompanying Dr. de Macedo is the Dean of the School of Public Health, Dr. Jerrold Michael."

Dr. de Macedo, accompanied by Dr. Michael, rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator B. Kobayashi.

Senator McCartney introduced Mr. Tom Rosser, "a friend, community advocate and leader, a member of the Kaneohe Neighborhood Board, who has fought long and hard to preserve and protect Kaneohe Bay."

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, convened at 11:39 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Julia McKenna-Dubin of the Ministry for Divine Harmony, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Mizuguchi and Wong who were excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-First Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Levin introduced a group of members from the Kalihi/Palama Health Clinic's Health Care for the Homeless Project: Dr. Margaret Copi, psychiatrist; Diane Roth, psychiatric nurse practitioner; Linda Patterson, R.N., Diane Stephens, social worker; Beth Giesting, executive director; Michael Dempsey, project director; and Bruce Kitchener, patient.

Senator Reed introduced: Mr. Howard Kihune, chairman of the Maui County Council; Mr. Joe Tanaka, Maui County Council member; and Mr. Miles Inokuma, deputy county clerk, County of Maui; all of whom were also seated in the gallery.

Senator Nakasato introduced his student "shadows," Dawn Tsuha, Kyung Kim, Michele Smith and Kerem Esteban, eighth grade students from Moanalua Intermediate School, seated in the gallery.

Senator Yamasaki, on behalf of Senator Aki, introduced a group of fifth grade students, seated in the gallery, from Nanaikapono Elementary School and their teacher, Mr. Clinton Hirai, who was a former Ways and Means Committee staff member.

## ORDER OF THE DAY

### MISCELLANEOUS COMMUNICATION

Misc. Com. No. 8, from the Honorable George J. Mitchell, Majority Leader, United States Senate, dated March 26, 1991, acknowledging receipt of S.R. No. 55, expressing support for the nomination and confirmation of Patricia Saiki as administrator of the Small Business Administration, was read by the Clerk and was placed on file.

Senator Crozier rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, this year in the Governor's state of the state address he talked about reaching out to help the

homeless. He considered the homeless problem a major social problem that the whole state had to rally around and help try to resolve. He put in two key pieces of legislation. One, to construct homeless shelters across the Island of Oahu to react so that our homeless can find some kind of adequate shelters. We all remember that in the last, I guess, 15 days we had a lot of rain, at least ten of the 15, and the homeless were out there all ten days. He also put in another piece of legislation so that non-profit organizations could get involved to help service the homeless.

"It's one thing to just create homeless shelters and then let the people of the homeless move in there. We tried that experiment with Maile land -- not in your district, Mr. President. Without the proper supervision, it didn't take those people who moved into the Maile land to destroy the complex. We needed to bring in professional non-profit organizations to run the place and today the Maile land is an example that many non-profit organizations go to and see how they can manage homeless shelters.

"Anyway, Mr. President, what the Governor is trying to do is to create homeless shelters where there will be a holistic approach so that when we create these shelters we create a very simple structure, just a one-room structure where the families, these homeless families, and I have to reiterate families, would move in to. And while they're there they would get the necessary social services like health care; also have guidance in employment skills; guidance in crisis management ... many of these people are in the homeless situation because they did not know how to react to crises. They also need to have guidance in the management of their finances. But we need to do that in a holistic approach.

"Another key thing is, with these non-profit organizations, when they have the homeless sites prepared they will have security so that tenants can feel safe within that environment; so that we can make sure that the laws of the land are being obeyed; so that we can also feel the neighbors of these homeless shelters can feel safe that there is somebody out there making sure that they are not threatened.

"Over this weekend, the Advertiser has written articles. On Saturday they talked about some legislators with the 'NIMBY' mentality, not wanting to have any homeless shelters in their district, and they focused on the House. They didn't talk about the members of the Senate. This morning's editorial page, they had a big editorial about the 'NIMBY' mentality and there was also a big cartoon. And that's a realistic concern.

"We all come here; we all want to do good for the state; we want to make social changes so that everyone can prosper in Hawaii but at the same, as elected officials, we also fear the ramifications of the voters who choose to put us into office.

"Mr. President, I'd just like to share with my colleagues that I'm taking a very bold and daring step and I don't know what the consequence is going to be. I hope the consequences turn out to be positive for my political career.

"Last week in the newspaper there were 51 sites recommended for potential homeless shelters and of the 51 there are five in the 23rd Senatorial District, the district that I represent. And of those five, I personally had recommended four of the five. As the chair of the Housing and Hawaiian Programs Committee who is responsible for the homeless legislation I felt that I could not ask anyone of my colleagues to accept a homeless

shelter in their community unless I was willing to make that same sacrifice.

"Of the four sites that were chosen or that I recommended, the Kahe powerplant area is one because there's big acreage over there. Another site is near the deep draft harbor called Camp Malakole, a former military reservation; and also an area down in the Ewa area. The prime location that I have suggested is Fort Barrette.

"For my colleagues who don't know where Fort Barrette is, it is at the base of Makakilo, across the highway from the new Kapolei villages. It is an old military Navy installation where they used to have these gigantic 16-inch guns. It's been abandoned for many years. They City has had control of this property for over 20 years. For the oldtimers who remember that Mayor Fasi wanted to make a zoo out of that parcel, nothing ever became of it. In that parcel, there are five buildings already in place. These are giant buildings; they were great warehouses before. I have suggested that we use that as a homeless shelter. First, because it's close to the bus route. You cannot have a homeless shelter stuck out in the 'kuahiwi' where people cannot get to the bus line. They need transportation. It's about a half a mile away from a school site, so the young children can have access to schools. It is also close to a community so that they can have interaction; they're not isolated; they're not branded as homeless people so they can fit in. They can partake in little league, bobby sox, and soccer like all the other kids, because these programs are dedicated to families.

"I would hope that my constituents share the same concerns that I have because when we see the homeless down at Kahe Park or we see them down in Maile Beach Park or down at Mokuleia Park, we see them down at Kualoa, Waimanalo, Ala Moana Park, Sand Island ... those families were not born there, they originally came from some community. They originally came from Makakilo, from Ewa Beach, from Waipahu, or Hawaii Kai or Kaneohe. They came from somewhere. I think all of us have to be willing to take the political risk to resolve these problems.

"So I ask my colleagues to share with me and when an area is chosen in your district please reach out and help the homeless and try to share with your constituents that we all have to take some of the burden, even our constituents.

"Thank you very much, Mr. President."

**Wednesday, April 3, 1991**

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, convened at 11:40 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by President Roy Machado of Honolulu Hawaii West Stake, Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Holt and Wong who were excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Second Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Iwase introduced Miss Sharon Keiko Kadoyama, the 39th Cherry Blossom Festival queen, who was seated on the floor of the Senate with her court, as follows:

"Mr. President, a couple of days ago, through the good graces of the Women's Caucus we were treated to a visit by the 442nd Veterans Club. Senator Iwase also introduced Ms. Frances Hashimoto, the general chairman of the 50th Annual Nisei Week Japanese Festival of Los Angeles, who was also seated in the gallery.

Senator Nakasato introduced his student "shadows," Ali Loveless, Brandon Onishi and Anthony Villalon, eighth graders from Moanalua Intermediate School.

Senator McMurdo then rose to recognize and introduce members of the Oahu Neighborhood Boards as follows:

"Mr. President and members of this honorable body, on behalf of fellow Senators and former neighborhood board members, Mike McCartney, Ann Kobayashi, Eloise Tungpalan and Dennis Nakasato, it gives me a great deal of personal pleasure to introduce to you today some of the chairmen and chairwomen, members and commission members of the Oahu Neighborhood Board.

"Mr. President, for 15 years the neighborhood board system on Oahu has provided residents the opportunity to become actively involved in their communities, and among those who have participated in the success of the neighborhood board system are your five Senators and 16 Representatives who have served on neighborhood boards and, hopefully, we continue to contribute to the community.

"Mr. President, there are 30 neighborhood boards on Oahu and these boards are made up of 438 dedicated citizens who give unselfishly of their time, their energy and their knowledge to improve the quality of life in their neighborhoods and in this city and in this state. This morning we have on the chamber floor the following people representing all the chairpersons and members of the boards.

"Mr. Ken Stevens is the chairman of the Conference of Oahu Neighborhood Boards, which is a recently formed organization of all of the neighborhood board chairs. We're looking for great things from you besides home rule and the things you've already done. We welcome Mr. Stevens.

"Next, Ms. Debbi Glanstein, who is the co-chair of the Conference of Oahu Neighborhood Boards. Debbi has been with the neighborhood board system since its inception and was first a part of the neighborhood commission staff, and whether she's on the board or off the boards she's always worked with them. She also was a very competent member of my staff for two years.

"Next, Mr. Paul Chang, chairman of the Neighborhood Commission.

"Last, but certainly not least, we have Mr. Willie Espero, executive secretary of the Neighborhood Commission.

"Also, Mr. President, we have in the gallery the chairmen and chairwomen and members of the various neighborhood boards. These people have taken off valuable time today to be able to meet and talk with their respective Senators and Representatives at the luncheon which will follow the session. I would like to introduce

you to all the chairpeople of the boards who are present in the gallery.

All rose to be recognized.

Senator McMurdo continued:

"The wonderful thing that has come from the legacy of the neighborhood boards is that we now have a very strong cadre of citizens who are acquainted with the way the City Council and the Mayor's office works and the way the Legislature works. This makes for much more informed citizens and for much stronger citizen participation, and it's a real strong part of democracy."

Mr. Stevens, Ms. Glanstein, Mr. Chang and Mr. Espero, who were seated on the chamber floor rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator McMurdo. Leis were presented to them by Senators McMurdo, McCartney, A. Kobayashi and Tungpalan.

Senator Cobb then remarked:

"Mr. President, the Senator from Waikiki failed to mention that she started her political career by serving on the neighborhood board and perhaps the first rule of politics, and I've seen it many times at the many neighborhood boards I go, is 'Thou shalt covet thy neighbor's seat.' Thank you."

Senator McCartney then rose to add:

"There's another special group of people that I know all of you up there would like to recognize because if it wasn't for their hard work all the business of the neighborhood board would never get taken care of and that's the Neighborhood Commission staff. Will you please stand and be recognized because if it wasn't for you all our hard work would not be recognized. Thank you."

The commission staff, seated in the gallery, rose to be recognized.

Senator Tungpalan also added:

"Mr. President, I also want to add my tribute to the members of the Pearl City Neighborhood Board. I had worked alongside of them 12 years ago and I want to pay a special tribute to one particular individual, Mr. Albert Fukushima."

Mr. Fukushima rose to be recognized.

Senator Tungpalan continued:

"Albert, I believe, started with the original board 15 years ago. As the chairman of the neighborhood board in 1979, we had to work on the development plans for our area. Of course, we know these development plans are well respected by both the City Council and the Mayor of Honolulu. It was Albert who helped me to synthesize and

analyze and understand all of the comments that were necessary to give the right input to the Council and to the Mayor, and it is to you that I owe a debt of gratitude for allowing me to understand the process a little better. When I am confronted with similar bills before me in the Senate, as it was in the House, I remember and recall those tedious hours when I worked on them with you and the rest of the board during those days in 1979. So, to you, I thank a million times for the patience and the guidance and I will always be in your debt for that.

"To the rest of the members, I know that often times people have joked about how, you know, this is a springboard for political service here on this level or in the council and that it should be. I think this is the best place to learn what politics is all about because you really have your finger on the pulse of the community.

"I encourage all of you who seek to run for higher office some day to make yourself available during this process and let's enter it in the fair fashion that all of my colleagues here have participated in the past years and I encourage you to be more actively involved in this legislative process as the years go on.

"Thank you again and my aloha to all of you."

Senator A. Kobayashi also rose to add her acknowledgement and said:

"As a former member of the Manoa Neighborhood Board I would like to add my thanks to all the neighborhood board members.

"Neighborhood boards present such a great forum for all the residents of the community where we have a chance to interact with the police department, the fire department, members of the City, presenting concerns and finding solutions to all problems. And I'd really like to thank all of the members of the neighborhood boards. You put in so much time and dedication and we all want to thank you."

Senator Nakasato also rose to state:

"Mr. President, I also would like to add my thanks to the neighborhood board members. They give so many hours of aloha, free time, for the good of our community.

"In Neighborhood Board No. 16, we have an especially hard working individual, Mary Rose McClelland. She gives countless hours trying to solve the problems that we have in the Upper Kalihi Valley area, and one of the problems we have right now is the proposed contra-flow to come down Kalihi Valley, but we in Kalihi Valley oppose the contra-flow. We're trying to work together with the proponents to resolve the problem.

"Again, to all you members, thank you very much."

Senator McMurdo again rose to state as follows:

"Mr. President, I am an alumnus of the McCully/Moiliili Neighborhood Board, but I worked very closely with three boards -- the Waikiki No. 9, McCully/Moiliili No. 8, and Diamond Head/St. Louis Heights No. 5 and would like to ask members of those boards to please stand to be recognized. Thank you."

Senator Koki also rose to add his appreciation as follows:

"Mr. President, I would also like to add my comments to the appreciation that I have for the neighborhood boards. They really work a lot and the Windward community neighborhood boards are especially very

active. We as elected officials really appreciate the kinds of input that they have and as has been referred to, they really serve for love. They don't get paid. We, as elected officials, are paid to be good and I'm afraid they're good for nothing. No! (Laughter.)

"I really appreciate the kinds of service and the time that you put in and thank you very much."

Senator Chang rose to recognize the members of the neighborhood boards in Nuuanu Valley and said:

"Mr. President, it would be remiss of me if I did not introduce the members of Neighborhood Boards 12, 13, 14 and 15, all of whom are very concerned about the possibility that there might be contra-flow through Nuuanu Valley. Please rise and receive our appreciation."

The Chair then interjected:

"Fellow Senators, we've had a lot of introductions. The Chair would like to welcome all of our special guests here today, especially the neighborhood board members and the Cherry Blossom Festival delegation. We thank all of you for your contributions to our state.

"The Chair would also like to recognize the neighborhood board from the farthest area, Waianae Neighborhood Board: John Q. Adams, Peter Apo Sr., Chuck Armstrong, Donna Broome, Rory Horning, Linda Kaleiwahea, Mary McKellar, Albert Silva, Neddie Nunuwa-Waimau and May Wright."

Senator McMurdo then recognized and welcomed state Representative Les Ihara, standing in the gallery, who organized the visit of the neighborhood boards.

At 12:05 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

**MATTER DEFERRED FROM

S.B. No. 952, S.D. 1, H.D. 1 (Hse. Com. No. 410):

On motion by Senator Mizuguchi, seconded by Senator Crozier and carried, the Senate disagreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 952, S.D. 1, and requested a conference on the subject matter thereof.

In accordance therewith, the President appointed Senators Mizuguchi, chairman, Kobayashi, A., and Koki as managers on the part of the Senate at such conference.

#### APPOINTMENT OF CONFeree

H.B. No. 1453, H.D. 2, S.D. 1:

The President appointed Senator Solomon as an additional manager on the part of the Senate at the conference to be held for the consideration of amendments proposed by the Senate to H.B. No. 1453, H.D. 2.

Senator Koki rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I wish to rise on a point of personal privilege.

"I'm sure all of you were sent a copy from the Shoup Corporation, makers of the electronic voting machine that we are considering buying. They responded to a letter that I circulated regarding some problems that I believe that the R.F. Shoup Company has. It talked about the couple of counties in which I pointed that the problem there was a Republican inspired conspiracy ... those no-good Republicans ... apparently they are the same everywhere. I wonder what kind of reason Shoup would have given had this been a Republican state?

"The main thing that I pointed out was the dependability of the R.F. Shoup Corporation and the article that I circulated, the news article from Santa Fe, New Mexico, said that we can't depend on the R.F. Shoup Corporation to do this quickly and efficiently. Within the letter of the R.F. Shoup Corporation they said, 'Call these people, these are satisfied customers.' So I decided to call one. She was from San Juan, New Mexico. Her name was Carol Bandy, and she gave me a good background of Shouptronics in New Mexico. Shoup had, apparently, a monopoly in the State of New Mexico. A law was enacted that qualified only the Shoup machine. Consequently, the cost of replacement parts was very high since they had a monopoly in the state. A move was made to amend the law and now two companies qualify and she says that the cost of the Shoup parts has come down.

"I asked Ms. Bandy regarding the reliability of service. She also stated that she was not happy with the service that Shoup Corporation has been giving. She says they've really not been reliable and timely manner.

"R.F. Shoup claims that they've installed 10,000 machine since 1983. At about \$5,000 a machine, this amounts to about \$6 million worth of business a year and if you add a couple of million dollars for replacement parts, you're talking about a company that does about \$8 million a year. That is not a large company. That's a very small company, considering that they're operating within the entire United States. I know many people who are in relatively small businesses and do more business than that.

"If we buy 1,100 machines we will have over 10 percent of all the machines Shoup has ever sold. Another

thing is that Shoup will have a monopoly in this state. The entire industry is very, very small because Shoup, up to last year, has sold more machines than any other company. It is an industry that is in its infant stages right now. We need to wait and let the industry grow and perfect itself. And currently we are not in the best financial shape and there are more pressing needs to address presently.

"I'm not saying that we shouldn't have electronic voting machines. I'm just saying we shouldn't have it now. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura, also on a point of personal privilege, said:

"Just for the record, Mr. President, we had a large group of students visiting from Hilo and Waiakea High Schools but because of the long introductions they had to leave. I did not have the chance to introduce them but I would like the record to note that they were here. Thank you."

Senator Cobb also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, because of the length of the announcements involving the neighborhood boards, I didn't want to bring it up at the time, but in view of yesterday's announcement from the Housing chairman relative to homeless facilities in our various neighborhoods, one of our neighborhood boards, in particular Kaimuki Neighborhood No. 4, had taken a position earlier before this whole issue arose, relative to a park located at 16th Avenue and Claudine Street in my particular Senatorial district.

"The park is under consideration for transfer between the city and the state, and the only conditions attached to the transfer are (1) that it be kept in park use and (2) a possible nursery use be allowed; that no other use should be permitted.

"The neighborhood board at its last meeting, less than ten days ago, reaffirmed this position, not specifically excluding any other use but saying it would a deception to have another use suddenly imposed after the original terms and conditions had been established.

"So without taking a specific position on the question of any homeless facility anywhere, including my own district, I think its important that as we encourage the development of our neighborhood boards we also give full faith and credence to what they say and to any conditions that they attach in recommending a transfer of property between the state and the city or for detailed land use. Every year, as you know, the Oahu Neighborhood Boards do get involved in the development plans and a review thereof, and some of those meetings can be quite contentious. When they do arrive at a consensus, I think it is very helpful for them to be listened to by both the state and the city.

"Thank you."

### RE-REFERRAL OF HOUSE BILL

The Chair re-referred H.B. No. 1226, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, to the Committee on Transportation and Intergovernmental Relations.

Senator Reed rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I'm sure that most of my colleagues saw the front page of the Advertiser this morning with a headline 'Ouch! Tax hike coming?' The lead paragraph reads as follows: 'Hawaii could see a new \$250 million-to \$300 million-a-year excise tax imposed by the counties under a surprise proposal approved yesterday by the state House Finance Committee.' The story goes on to say, 'If the entire Legislature goes along with the idea, taxpayers could one day end up paying a total general excise tax of 5.5 percent.'

"Mr. President, I urge my Senate colleagues to reject this tax increase proposal. It is inappropriate for a variety of reasons. First, and I welcome a correction if I am wrong on this point, I don't believe that this tax increase proposal even received a public hearing this year. Even more importantly, it is outrageous to increase the tax burden on a people already over-taxed. Let's not forget that Hawaii has been singled out nationally as a tax



hell. Further, this tax is regressive, hurting most those people least able to afford it.

"The clamor for more tax revenues is itself perplexing. What happened to the \$700 million tax surplus we had last year? Where did that money go? If we really are short of funds ..."

Senator Yamasaki, on a point of order, interjected:

"Mr. President, I believe that this subject matter is not before us at this moment. We will have ample time to debate on this issue at a future date."

Senator Reed then said:

"Mr. President, as a point of personal privilege, I believe I have the latitude to express my views on this issue prior to a conference committee meeting. May I continue?"

The Chair interjected:

"Senator Reed, the chair of the Ways and Means Committee has indicated that he has arranged a hearing on this matter. It is not before this body at this time so if you'll keep your comments as brief as possible the Chair will allow you to speak on your point of personal privilege."

Senator Reed then continued:

"Thank you, Mr. President.

"If we really are short of funds, let's look a little closer to home before we so casually dump a 25 percent tax increase on the people of Hawaii. Let's direct the governor to stop expanding state government. State government has grown nearly 20 percent in the past five years. During that same period county government grew by less than 10 percent; the federal government by less than 3 percent. My guess is if we cut by half the number of state employees on the public payroll, the state government would run just fine. Let's forego the unnecessary and expensive move out of the Capitol building and forget about expensive renovation of this building.

"Finally, Mr. President, if there really is a desperate need for more tax dollars, elected officials should lead by example. Last year the governor took in \$5 million in campaign contributions, all tax free. Congressional candidates received nearly \$4 million, tax free. If politicians paid taxes on political contributions, just the top five money raisers in last year's elections would have contributed about a half million dollars in taxes. If the politicians want more money to spend, let it come from their own pockets.

"I urge my Senate colleagues to just say 'no' to the House proposal to increase the general excise tax -- no new taxes."

Senator McMurdo also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I too read the morning paper and on page A3 there's a story today about leasehold. 'Isbell rattles the chains on lease issue. Says Gov. Waihee and legislative leaders should "get off their duffs."'"

"The chairman of the House Housing Committee passed out a bill on leasehold yesterday. I want to commend her for this courageous action against pretty tremendous odds. I have been increasingly upset about what has happened with this so-called leasehold reform movement. And I

have watched with dismay the things that have happened to the people who want and need leasehold reform so desperately as they have testified in front of both committees.

"As you know, Mr. President, I serve on the Senate Housing Committee. I hate to feel that I am supporting the House Housing Committee chair against our own committee chair, but as in this article, he says, '... the bills are flawed.' and '... needs much more work ....'

"I would urge our Housing Committee chair to reconsider his statements and try to work with the House Housing chair on reaching some kind of compromise, some kind of relief on this leasehold reform. We cannot duck this forever.

"Maryland realized a long time ago that this is an archaic practice. The sad part about this is that the Governor said earlier, yes, there would be a lease reform bill. The Lt. Governor worked very, very hard to get a bill that might be acceptable and there's been a lot going on this session. Let's not turn this into a 'shibai.' That is what I am afraid is happening.

"Thank you."

Senator Crozier also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I had not planned on making any comments even while the good Senator from Waikiki/McCully spoke. However, when she alluded to using the language or the word 'shibai.' To the newcomers to Hawaii who don't know what 'shibai' means, 'shibai' is just a play or an act on a Japanese Kabuki stage which was very popular in the old plantation days. It's not a serious activity. It's just like a movie. Well, this issue is too important to treat it like a 'shibai.'

"The Senate sent over a bill to the House believing that both the lessees and the lessors would come out in a positive position. However, the House has amended the bill and gutted all of those features and again put the lessees in a positive position and the lessors in a negative position.

"I salute the chair of the Housing Committee in the House because she's one of the few individuals in the Legislature who can speak Hawaiian. I salute her for her courage. She represents a district that has a lot of Hawaiians. And for her to take the position to take away the legacy from the Hawaiians, she must truly believe in that cause, so I appreciate her courage to try and get some kind of resolution through.

"However, Mr. President, I too believe in the rights of property owners and many of my colleagues here right in the Senate believe that the property owners have rights. And until they present some type of legislation where the property owners are cared for, we will not succumb to the taking of lands just so that one side of the issue wins. Both parties, the lessees and the lessors, will have to come out as winners.

"I appreciate my colleague's concerns. However, this is too serious to call it a 'shibai.' Too much is at stake.

"Thank you very much."

At 11:50 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:00 o'clock p.m.

At this time, Senator Cobb, also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I'd like to stand on a point of personal privilege to comment on some of the previous remarks.

"When the leasehold reform bill passed the Senate, it did so as more than a vehicle. I think it created a win-win situation and I supported the bill not just in concept but in detail because I think it offered a solution for both sides. I'm hopeful that something can be worked out this session. Even if it's not finalized, it can be made effective in July of 1992 so as to compel or help move the parties together.

"I think it's a very serious effort because the Senate did affirmatively act on a condominium leasehold bill and for the first time in our state's history, condominium leasehold legislation has now passed each house of this Legislature, albeit in different forms.

"I represent a lot of lessees. I'm a lessee, myself. But as I look at the bill that came out of the Senate, I think it offers the prospect of win-win for both sides and respects the rights of both sides and creates obligations for both sides. Just because the House takes a different approach should not doom the bill. It's going to be a very lively conference and I for one would love to sit on it even if I was a fly on the wall. But I think the possibility now exists to finally achieve some meaningful leasehold legislation for condominiums on a fair approach that has been taken.

"On the subject of taxes, Mr. President, I would just like to note that if all of the proposals go through this year, by 1992 Hawaii's excise tax will have risen from 4 to 6 percent. That's because in October of 1992 the half percent excise tax must be enacted by the counties for mass transit for the City and County of Honolulu and for infrastructure improvements for each of the counties of the neighbor islands.

"In addition to that, the House is now proposing a one percent excise tax increase on top of that, plus, we have the equivalent of almost a half percent with the gasoline tax that's been added on and the other user fees that are being passed on. The minimum the tax would be in calendar year 1992, if all of these proposals were enacted, would be 5-1/2 percent. The net effect would be much closer to six percent.

"So without addressing any specific bill that's going to be pending, in deference to the comments made by the Ways and Means chairman, I think it is advisable, Mr. President, that we look at the total picture, some of which the Senator from Maui covered. But the broad picture of what's going to be coming by 1992 is much more severe in terms of its potential impact on our middle and lower income taxpayers. I think it's important that we remember that an excise tax is the most regressive kind of tax we can get into. And let's look at the big picture when we consider the tax burden of our people.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator George also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Thank you, Mr. President.

"You know, from time to time when the Minority Floor Leader rises on a point of privilege it is indeed a point of personal privilege. He has a good many personal opinions and a strong political philosophy. In this particular case, I would like to make it very clear that the

Minority Floor Leader speaks with the enthusiastic concurrence of the Republican caucus.

"From time to time the Republicans have spoken in support of residual taxing power for the counties. I think, probably, in order not to be accused of speaking out of two sides of our face, it's important to realize that when we talk about enabling legislation that's one thing. In this particular case, although it has been called enabling legislation, the counties would have to raise the tax. In effect it's mandatory because, absent the funds from the TAT, where else are the counties going to get the money to provide the services that their charters require them to provide? So I would not perceive this as enabling legislation to let the counties raise their taxes by one percent. It would be mandatory and we would then be responsible for laying more taxes on people who are our constituents, who are already among the most heavily taxed people in the United States.

"Thank you."

Senator Solomon also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I'd like to thank the Republicans for their concerns. I have to agree with the chairman of the Ways and Means Committee. I think that the bill has a long ways to go in terms of conferencing on the items. I'm very certain that the Ways and Means Committee will take all of this into consideration as we deliberate this bill.

"Thank you."

Senator Holt also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, speaking on a point of personal privilege, and since we've had discussion on two very important issues that are not before us I thought I'd take the time to talk about another important issue that's also not before us.

"I'm not a wrestling fan by any means. I'm a boxing fan. I know who Ben Villaflor is. But I do know who Hulk Hogan and the Ultimate Warrior are. About a month ago Sgt. Slaughter had to battle Hulk Hogan and he lost the championship to Hulk Hogan. And it was announced that Sgt. Slaughter was coming to town to meet the Ultimate Warrior. I have three little boys who are very strong wrestling fans; they've got wrestling buddies all over my house; they've got little wrestling items that they play with every day.

"I got in my car on the day that they announced the ticket sales would go on and, because we figured they'd be sold out, I drove down to Blaisdell and stood in line to get good seats and I paid \$20 a piece for them. And for the last month I've been reminded every day by my three little boys, 'Don't forget, dad, we're going to go and watch the Ultimate Warrior wrestle Sgt. Slaughter.'

"That event happened on Tuesday night. When we got to the arena there were long lines of people and kids, especially, buying Ultimate Warrior souvenirs, you name it. Lots of money was spent by a lot of people. Then at 7:30 when the events were to begin, they announced that the Ultimate Warrior was not going to be on the slate that evening; that he was in Japan and he got hurt -- to the dismay of thousands of little youngsters. There was a lot of boos.

"But, basically, the reason I bring this up is because I took it kind of personally. I hoped that what happened to Ultimate Warrior was really true; that something did

occur and it was not a fraud of any sort. I have asked the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs to look into the matter and to investigate the situation. I have asked Senator Ikeda to consider amending the bill to regulate wrestling in Hawaii like we do boxing, to protect the interest of the consumers, including three little ones like mine, and just in case Tom Moffatt decides to bring Hulk Hogan to town.

"Thank you."

Senator Nakasato then introduced a group of 5th and 6th grade students, accompanied by their teachers and chaperones, from the Farrington complex schools who are on a tour of the Capitol and to observe the Legislature in session. The teachers and/or chaperones representing the schools are as follows:

## FORTY-FIFTH DAY

Friday, April 5, 1991

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, convened at 11:37 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Sister Roselani Enomoto, Sisters of St. Joseph, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Fourth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Iwase introduced a group of 5th grade students from Kipapa Elementary School of Mililani and their teachers, Ms. Laura Sakai, Ms. Linda Sato and Ms. Susan Kam, niece of Senator Matsuura, all of whom were seated in the gallery.

Senator Matsuura, also on behalf of Senator Levin and Senator Solomon, introduced Mr. Elmer Vierra from the Big Island, seated in the gallery.

Senator Solomon then introduced Mr. Jim Lawrence, Hawaii Food Drive chairman for 1991, and Mr. John White, president of the Foodbank, who were seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, you assigned me to be the Senate coordinator of the Food Drive and I am very pleased and very happy to be able to make a presentation to Mr. Jim Lawrence, vice president of marketing for PRI, who is the Food Drive chairman for 1991, and Mr. John White, president of the Foodbank. But before I introduce them, Mr. President, I would like to make a few remarks.

"As you know, Governor Waihee proclaimed March as Hawaii Foodbank Month. From March 25th to April 6th there was a very ambitious food drive.

"Lynne Waihee, honorary chairperson of the 1991 Statewide Food Drive, in her message urging support for the drive, stated that there are more than 15,000 homeless and as many as 6,000 to 8,000 individuals, 50 percent of whom are children, that go without some meals every month. The goal for this year's drive is 300,000 pounds which can be used to prepare nearly a million meals.

"Much of the Foodbank stock comes from the supermarkets and the wholesalers in the form of damaged goods, dated and hard-to-move items. The food drive attempts to fill in where there is a shortage.

"Of course, you know the Foodbank is a statewide program with outlets in each island.

"Mr. President, I was told that cash would be more effective because the bank can purchase whatever items are needed at lowest price possible. This is why I recommended to my fellow colleagues that, instead of collecting food items, we would take up a donation of \$25 per Senator to be able to present to Mr. Lawrence and to Mr. White today.

"I'm very, very happy, though, that Senator Blair and Senator Fernandes Salling also donated some food items so we put some of the items on display, hoping that it's going to pyramid to the sky to meet the goal of 300,000 pounds of food for the State of Hawaii.

"Mr. President, I would like to present Mr. Lawrence with checks totalling more than \$600 that was collected and that is because we were able to solicit donations from some of the lobbyists here in the Legislature. And this is to put all lobbyists on notice that the Senate will be collecting donations to the end of the session. So, if any of you know those lobbyists lobbying you in your respective committee and they would like to make a contribution of \$25 to the Foodbank, on behalf of their company or on behalf of your committee, please feel free to accept and to send the check to my office. Thank you."

Mr. Lawrence and Mr. White rose to be recognized and were presented the checks to the Foodbank by Senator Solomon.

Senator McMurdo then rose to introduce her guests from Washington, D.C., Colonel (Retired) Willie Ochs and wife Betty, and Colonel (Retired) George Daoust and wife Lucy.

At 11:46 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

At this time, Senator Crozier rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I just got the April issue of 'Ka Wai Ola O OHA' newspaper. That is the Office of Hawaiian Affairs newspaper. An article in that paper revisits the 1978 Constitutional Convention and they quote comments made by delegate Jim Shon. I bring this up because it's good for us, all of us individually, to occasionally go back and reflect where we came from, what our beliefs were so as we evolve, and we all do evolve, we need to go back and look at the tapestry that set us in motion or the beliefs that we had.

"Since the leasehold conversion issue is so important and the idea of taking lands, I would just like to read this into our Journal so that someday when our good colleague from the other side does read about it he'll see where he used to be. I'm just quoting the newspaper, sir. I'm not ad-libbing at all. I'm quoting the article and it says:

'During the debates, delegate Jim Shon expressed his support for Hawaiian access rights and Hawaiian values more eloquently than most when he quoted a speech by a 19th-century native American Indian which was addressed to the non-natives who wanted to purchase the land he lived on:

"Our land is more valuable than your money. It will last forever. It will not even perish by the flames of fire. As long as the sun shines and the waters flow, this land will be here to give life to men and animals. We cannot sell the lives of men and animals; therefore we cannot sell this land. It was put here for use by the Great Spirit and we cannot sell it because it does not belong to us. You can count your money... but only the Great Spirit can count the grains of sand and the blades of grass of these plains. As a present to you, we will give you anything we have that you can take with you, but the land, never."

"I think it's good for all of us to reflect on those concepts, especially our colleague in the House of Representatives.

"Thank you very much."

Senator Solomon also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I'd like to remind my fellow colleagues that last session we did pass a bill requesting the United States of America to recognize their obligations in dealing with the native Hawaiian people in the State of Hawaii.

"I just received through the mail, Mr. President, an essay that examines the American annexation of Hawaii. It is titled 'American Annexation of Hawaii: An Example of the Unequal Treaty Doctrine.' It was printed in the Connecticut Journal of International Law, Volume 5, Number 2, Spring 1990.

"Mr. President, I would like to quote and to discuss some of the issues. I will be forwarding a copy to each and everyone of my colleagues. I think that this is a very impressive, informative document and I think it's timely since we are considering creating what we call international law or international mediation centers to be situated here in Hawaii. We have passed in previous sessions budget appropriations to make this possible.

'The purpose of this essay is to consider the question of the legal validity of the annexation treaty between the United States of America and the Republic of Hawaii of June 16, 1897 ....'

"Mr. President, the essay discusses international concepts such as aggression: 'The major task of international law has always been to maintain peace and stability in the global community. For centuries nations have based their conduct on the respect for territorial and political integrity.' As you know, Mr. President, this is what the native Hawaiian people have been advocating for the past hundred years.

"The essay goes on to explain 'The concept of nonaggression as one of the seven fundamental principles of contemporary international law. In order to demonstrate that the United States of America violated the principle of international law regarding Hawaii, one needs to engage' ... and this is violation regarding the overthrow of the Hawaiian kingdom ... 'one needs to engage in an empirical study to show that aggression had already found the sanctions of law long before January 16, 1893, when "over 160 U.S. marines landed in peaceful Honolulu armed with a Gatling gun, Howitzer cannons, double cartridge belts filled with ammunition, carbines and other instruments of war" with the aim of overthrowing the legitimate ruler of Hawaii, Queen Liliuokalani.' The essay goes on to examine the planning and preparation of the war of the aggression against Hawaii by the United States.

"First, Mr. President, 'It is necessary to mention here the names and identity of the two individuals who were the heads of the missionary party. One was Lorrin Thurston, grandson of Asa Thurston; and the other was Sanford B. Dole, son of Daniel Dole, both descendants of the early American missionaries. By 1882, Lorrin Thurston had already discussed the matter of Hawaii's takeover and annexation with American officials. One of them was the U.S. Secretary of the Navy who assured Thurston that the Arthur Administration would favourably consider the takeover of Hawaii.'

"The essay goes on, Mr. President, to explain the different steps that were involved in the forming of the provisional government, and it goes on to explain '... the lawless occupation of Honolulu under false pretexts by the United States forces, ....'

"In an effort to restore the Queen and her Hawaiian Kingdom, President Cleveland had made these remarks to the Congress, and Mr. President, I'd like to read the speech to enlighten my colleagues. President Cleveland in

his remarks, in what we consider now a remarkable address said, 'Therefore the military occupation of Honolulu by the United States ... was wholly without justification, either as an occupation by consent or as an occupation necessitated by dangers threatening American life and poverty .... She [Queen Liliuokalani] surrendered, not to the Provisional Government, but to the United States. She surrendered, not absolutely and permanently, but temporarily and conditionally until such time as the facts could be considered by the United States.' To this day, Mr. President, these facts have never ever been considered.

"It goes on to say that Dole was very concerned about these remarks so they decided to develop a strategy to wait till Cleveland was no longer in office and to seek the alliance of President McKinley who they felt they could convince quite easily to proceed with the annexation of Hawaii to the United States. The essay goes on to explain steps and what was done to achieve that.

"This essay, Mr. President, states that with the annexation treaty that was approved by President McKinley as well as the Congress of the United States, '... the United States violated Article 1 of the Treaty of Friendship, Commerce and Navigation of 1849 which called for peace and friendship between the two nations on the basis of mutual respect between sovereign and independent nations. The Hawaiian annexation was implemented by a Joint Resolution of Congress on July 1898. The Hawaiians were never asked if they wanted to become a territorial part of the United States.'

"Mr. President, 'The United States not only committed a breach of obligation under its Treaty of 1849 with Hawaii and violated the customary international law, but also committed "a crime under international law" by planning and initiating the conspiracy of using force against the independent nation of Hawaii through its official representatives. As a result, the status of the so-called Dole Government of 1894 was arguably illegal and it did not, therefore, have the proper authority to enter into any kind of treaty with a foreign power.'

"And now this document moves on, Mr. President, to the historical concept of self-determination. So I'd like to remind my colleagues here that the 'The political etymological meaning of self-determination is the right of individuals to govern themselves, to become the masters of their own destinies. Self-determination, above all, concerns the right of individuals "to identify themselves with the virtuous." The question of self-determination arises when the political status of a given territory, as well as its economic, social and cultural development are infringed. The principle of self-determination, moreover is no longer confined solely to colonized peoples. In such cases, in order to apply this right, the "selves" in an independent territory must be ruled against their will or without consent.' This, in fact, Mr. President, is what happened to the Hawaiian people.

"The essay goes on to bring us up to the present day Hawaii. It says, 'Today, Hawaii has become economically dependent upon the United States. Hawaiian people have lost their self-sufficiency and have almost been forced to become dependent upon imported food because of the manipulation of land use and fishing and the impact of massive immigration. ... The traditional Hawaiian concept of owning land is ignored' (in today's Hawaii) 'while a major portion of the land is investor owned. ....'

"The lives of the Hawaiian people are also continuously threatened indirectly by the presence of American nuclear arms. Hawaii has been turned into the "Pacific Fortress of the United States" with

Hawaiian mountains and valleys being filled with nuclear and non-nuclear weapons.' The Island of Kahoolawe has been used exclusively for military training and bombing even though the island has been proven over and over to be of great spiritual and archaeological value.

'This brief picture of Hawaii cannot, of course, adequately describe a century of change. Nevertheless, it helps to demonstrate a pattern consisting of a blatant disregard for the economic, social and cultural rights of the Hawaiian people by the government of the United States. This is clearly a violation of the laws enumerated in the three International Bill of Rights. Above all, the United States has not only violated Hawaiian sovereignty through its initial annexation, but is continuously violating the rights of Native Hawaiians to exist as a separate ethnic and racial entity. ....'

"I'd like to mention to my fellow colleagues of Article 27 of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, which states: 'In those States in which ethnic, religious or linguistic minorities exist, persons belonging to such minorities shall not be denied the right, in community with the other members of their group, to enjoy their own culture, to profess and practice their own religion, or to use their own language.'

"Mr. President, I cannot understand why we have our Hawaiian groups lobbying this Legislature for programs such as the Hawaiian Immersion Language Program in the schools.

"I cannot, Mr. President, understand why is it that we continue, continue to regurgitate these documents dealing with trying to create an action plan to address controversies under the Hawaiian Home Lands Trust and the Public Land Trust. Mr. President, why can we not come up with positive alternatives in trying to resolve these disputes.

"Frankly, Mr. President, this is by no means the end of the road of an examination of these issues within an international law context. The question rests with the people of this great nation and especially with us here in this Legislature to try to see how we can develop alternatives and political remedies to help us resolve the issue of Hawaiian sovereignty, the issue of Hawaiian self-determination.

"I submit for this body's consideration that perhaps we could resort to the following measures to pursue these legitimate claims within the arena of international concerns. The stages are as follows:

1. To pursue negotiations with the U.S. Federal Government for increased autonomy, in terms of the Hawaiian community;
2. To petition the United Nations General Assembly's Committee on Colonialism;
3. To seek the creation of an international awareness of regarding the historic and continuing violation of Hawaiian rights; and
4. To explore non-violent and peaceful movements inside Hawaii to create internal pressure on the government.

"In conclusion, Mr. President, since the days that I served as trustee in the Office of Hawaiian Affairs until today, I've always believed the Hawaiian people themselves need to develop their own proposals on how to deal with their future, how to articulate them with greater authority.



"These matters, Mr. President, cannot be settled in the courts. These matters have to be settled by the native Hawaiians community and amongst themselves.

"Mr. President, the Hawaiians need to address such questions as how can democratic values be reflected in the governmental system when the native Hawaiian population represents only a minority of voters? To what degree can traditional laws, customs and land use patterns be resurrected to its full strength?. These are just some questions, Mr. President, that seem very superficial but are very deep from within.

"Mr. President, we will still be considering various bills regarding native Hawaiian issues in conference committees and I urge the subject matter committee chairmen, as well as the Judiciary and Ways and Means Committees, to look at these bills, to become sensitive to these issues on self-determination and the issues on how the Hawaiian people can resolve their problems. For myself, Mr. President, I do not see the courts as an answer.

"Thank you very much."

Senator Matsuura also rose on a point of personal and said:

"Mr. President, may I be permitted to continue the discussion of the previous speaker.

"I have been helping the Hawaiian homesteaders to start farming enterprises. I worked in Hoolehua teaching them to grow watermelon, in Panaewa growing orchards. I often wondered, why the Hawaiian Home Lands were always the worst kind of land, and I just couldn't understand why they didn't have some of the nice sugar land or some of the nice pineapple land. I went back into the history to see what happened in Congress when they set aside these lands for the Hawaiians. I realized that any land that had any possibility of growing any crop was excluded from being given to the Hawaiian people.

"Congress did make a mistake! They made a mistake by putting a small patch of good agricultural land down in the Windward Oahu side but that was ultimately eliminated by Congress. When you look back into history, the Hawaiian people were treated unfairly. That, I can attest to; I've worked on those lands.

"Thank you very much."

Senator Fernandes Salling also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, might I also be allowed to add to the discussion, on a point of personal privilege.

"A week ago, members from the Hawaiian community of Kau came to my office and brought up the issue that I had thought had been resolved eight years ago, the Kaulana boat ramp. It appears that today the circumstances have changed and the fishermen who had said that they needed this boat ramp to be built by the DOT with federal funds are no longer there.

"These native Hawaiians are presently going around the halls and trying to meet with the Governor and have been in discussion with Senator Akaka's office to once and for all turn this piece of property back over to the Hawaiian Home Lands. I don't know whether or not they will succeed but I would urge that if they do come to see you for help that you do assist them in doing this. As I stated, according to what they have said, the reasons for this boat ramp being built no longer exist today.

"This was a controversy that stirred up all kinds of emotions and problems in the Kau community and I see this as something happening once again and on the verge of this kind of activism there, only because we persist in building something that is no longer needed. And in exchange for this what we have given the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands for these lands to build the ramp is a total of \$50,000. It's created so many problems. I don't think it's necessary today to build the ramp. If you can assist them in helping to overturn this decision and restore the land back to the department, I urge all of my fellow colleagues to do so.

"Thank you."

Senator Levin also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, if I may follow up on those last remarks by the Senator from Kauai.

"As a representative for the Kau District, Senator for the First District, I share her views and would join her request to all our colleagues. Thank you."

At 12:15 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:18 o'clock p.m.

At 12:19 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Solomon, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate stood in recess until 4:30 o'clock p.m.

Senator Reed rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in opposition to the bill.

"This bill would allow \$6 million to be spent on an advertising campaign to lure more visitors to our islands. I recognize and appreciate the value of the visitor industry. But if we are truly short of funds, we must be

careful to spend tax dollars only where absolutely necessary.

"I voted for this appropriation a few weeks ago when it appeared the industry was actually in trouble. But now that the war is over, I believe the emergency in the industry is over as well. As many industry spokesmen assert, Hawaii's visitor industry is already on the rebound. The Hilton Hawaiian Village senior vice president says his hotel's occupancy is beginning to climb again and that business will be back to normal by August. The Hilton vice president says, quote, 'I think we're through the valley; I think the swells are up on the horizon.' Outrigger Hotels Hawaii says that their business is still 15 percent below last year's, but that its own advertising campaign is beginning to pay off with increased bookings.

"United and Japan Airlines both report increased bookings. A spokesman for Japan Airlines says that Japanese visitors should be arriving in force for a series of Japanese holidays beginning at the end of the month. A JAL spokesman said business from Japan will return to normal by June. Pleasant Hawaiian Holidays reports that bookings last month ran 10 percent above 1990 levels during the last week of March.

"The bottom line, Mr. President, is that the visitor industry in Hawaii is going to rebound to previous levels this summer without the infusion of tight tax dollars.

"The three Kihei parents whom I introduced to you this morning are asking for some security-related measures at the Kihei Elementary School. They are asking for a few thousand dollars. They want an intercom system that connects the buildings on campus to the administration office. They've been told there isn't enough money. They're asking for some exterior lighting around the campus for the safety of students and teachers after dark. They've been told there isn't enough money. They're asking for a sprinkler system to allow some grass to grow to keep the dust down on campus. They'd like some ceiling fans to keep the temperature in the classrooms and the cafeteria below 90 degrees. They've been told there isn't enough money.

"I've been trying for five years to get a \$15,000 ceiling fan in the cafeteria on Molokai at the Kaunakakai School.

"Services statewide have been cut for family and youth services, ostensibly because there isn't enough money.

"This is \$6 million, dollars that are sorely needed elsewhere in our state. I'm voting against this appropriation for an industry that will rebound on its own without the people's \$6 million.

"Thank you."

"In addition, at the hearing, I requested the Honolulu Police Department to provide any accident data they had on the subject of military fatalities due to drunk driving. Per letter from the chairman dated March 5, 1991, to me, the chairman states and I quote, 'Per your request made during the TIP hearing on February 26, 1991, Capt. Duncan of the Honolulu Police Department (HPD) has informed me that the HPD does not keep records on the number of military personnel involved in motor vehicle accidents.'

"The net result, Mr. President, is that we are forfeiting a right for military personnel despite the reduction in the number of accidents that they have experienced over the last ten years. That right being to drink liquor within the borders of the country they are defending. So the one remaining reason that we're doing this, at least as far as the military personnel are concerned, is for the money -- the 10 percent of federal highway funds, the federal blackmail that was passed in the decade of the 1980's that requires states to have a 21-age drinking bill or forfeit the 10 percent of their federal highway funds.

"The record is now very clear, not only does the HPD not keep accident data, not only has the number of military deaths declined in the last ten years, but the one remaining reason why this could be done as it applies only to military personnel is for the money.

"It's for those reasons and the reasons I cited in the remarks I incorporate from my previous stand against this bill that I will be voting 'no.' Thank you."

"The Kaimuki Neighborhood Board has now gone twice on record, very firmly, as to the intended uses of that park and has reaffirmed its position in terms of the permissible uses of that park. So I find this particular statement in the committee report to be an error."

"My feeling is, in speaking in support of the bill, that if we don't want to have to go through this kind of battle every year with the executive power to withhold the transfer of funds, then we should be serious about amending Chapter 37 to seriously reduce or even eliminate this kind of authority. Otherwise, this will be a perennial annual battle of the budget. The last time this happened, I believe, was in 1980 and the Legislature had an extension of more than one week in order to accomplish a sufficient degree of legislative oversight and control in the budget.

"So if the real solution is to address the problem of withholding and transferring under Chapter 37, then Chapter 37 ought to be amended rather than stating in a committee report what our frustrations are, which I strongly agree with in terms of what the chairman and the committee have said.

Senator Chang rose to speak in support of the measure and stated:

"Mr. President, your Committee on Agriculture and Environmental Protection has reported H.B. 972, S.D. 1, 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Longline Fishing.' The bill has several different elements contained within the provisions, including provisions relating to length of gear, number of gear to be contained within vessels, and the boundaries within which or without which such gear may be utilized.

"All of these different elements were incorporated into the bill so as to give your conference committee the opportunity to explore variations and alternatives that will ultimately reconcile and resolve the conflicts that are occurring in the ocean today.

"However, because not all of the interests have been addressed or identified, your committee was unable to devise a precise formula that would resolve the problem. Thus, your committee decided to establish a pattern, an arrangement of elements which would give your conference committee the widest possible flexibility in reconciling the House and the Senate versions.

"For instance, this present draft refers to gear consisting of main lines, each over 15 miles in length. That number, 15 miles, is not a precise or conclusive number which your committee identified as being the solution to the problem but merely a number that would give your conference committee flexibility in negotiating.

"To sum up, Mr. President, this draft is a conference vehicle, a negotiation vehicle, and does not represent the ultimate position of the Senate with respect to House Bill 972, House Draft 2.

"Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi also rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I'd like to speak in favor of the bill with great reluctance.

"This bill sends a wrong signal and in its present form is repugnant to what I think should be done with longline fishing. Longline fishing, I believe, should be regulated. It poses a great problem in our fishing community today, and it's a problem that needs resolution quickly.

"This particular vehicle is the only legislative vehicle available to us to limit or regulate longline fishing and for that reason I believe this bill should go forward. Nonetheless, it should be regarded as only a negotiating position and not the position of a large number of individuals on this floor.

"Thank you."

Senator Chang then added:

"Mr. President, the committee realizes that there will be a variety of concerns with respect to the elements contained in the bill and I would encourage any Senator who receives communications of concern from constituents or other affected communities that they should feel free to refer those calls to me and I will be sure to communicate the posture of the Senate and of the committee on the bill so as to allay their concerns.

"Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan also in support of the measure then said:

"Mr. President, may I have the words of the Senator from Kaimuki incorporated into the Journal as though they were my own. Thank you."

The Chair so ordered.

## FORTY-SEVENTH DAY

Wednesday, April 10, 1991

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, convened at 11:37 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by President James Hallstrom, Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, Kaneohe Stake, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Aki, B. Kobayashi, Koki, and McCartney who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Sixth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator McMurdo introduced members of the Kaimuki High School Band, who were seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President and members of this honorable body, it gives me a great deal of pleasure today to introduce you to members of the fabulous Kaimuki High School Band. The band is under the direction of Keith Higaki who is the bandmaster.

"The band has performed in numerous community sponsored activities such as the Aloha Week parade, Kaimuki Business and Professional Association's Christmas parade, and the OIA Band Festival, annually. However, it achieved a most memorable distinction when it performed in the Freedom Bowl in Anaheim, California. This past December, the 68-member band performed and received the superior award in concert and won excellence in field and concert in their category, and also captured the grand champion trophy for best overall concert band.

"Band drum major Tanuomaaleu Ah You has the distinction of winning first place in the most outstanding drum major category. I would like to especially recognize Tanu. This remarkable and outstanding student is also the senior class president at Kaimuki High School.

"Mr. President, it is my pleasure to introduce to you the following members of Kaimuki High School: Mrs. Thelma Nip, principal; Mr. Keith Higaki, bandmaster; and Mr. Lester Nakaichi, band booster president.

All rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator McMurdo. Senators A. Kobayashi, Solomon, Fernandes Salling and Cobb presented the leis.

Senator Mizuguchi then introduced Mr. Wally Yonamine, also seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, today, it is my pleasure and privilege to introduce one of the finest and greatest athletes that the State of Hawaii has produced. That one individual is Wally Yonamine.

"Wally Yonamine was born on the Island of Maui and after graduation from Senator Nakasato's alma mater, Farrington High School, he played a year in the professional football league for the San Francisco 49ers, but an injury sent him into baseball. Following a brief stint in the Pacific Coast League, he took his aggressive style of play to the ball fields in Japan. There he became known as an oriental Jackie Robinson.

"Yonamine was the first American to play a significant role on a Japanese team after World War II. While breaking the color line, Robinson suffered indignation and bigotry and so did Wally Yonamine in the early years as a Yomiuri Giant. A man with lesser talent, lesser fortitude and lesser determination would have packed his bags and returned to Hawaii but not Wally Yonamine.

"His accomplishments for himself, his family and for the State of Hawaii really look like a 'wall of fame.'

"It is really my pleasure to introduce a great athlete, a great individual, Mr. Wally Yonamine. He is accompanied by his proud son and daughter-in-law, Paul and Linda Yonamine."

Mr. Yonamine rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Mizuguchi and a lei by Senator A. Kobayashi.

Senator Mizuguchi then requested the Chair's approval to have the text of the Senate certificate honoring and commending Wally Yonamine inserted into the Senate Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The certificate reads as follows:

"In the course of a lifetime, it is only rarely that we are privileged to encounter an individual who is possessed of the skill and drive which has characterized the life and times of Wally Yonamine.

"As it is with individuals of outstanding talents, the special contribution that Wally Yonamine was to make was evident from his youth when he led the Farrington Governors to their first Interscholastic League of Honolulu football championship in 1944.

"Like many young men of the time, Wally Yonamine bypassed the collegiate experience to honorably serve his country in the Army of the United States of America. Hardly taking time to catch his breath after being discharged in 1947, Wally Yonamine signed with the San Francisco 49ers and became the first American of Japanese ancestry to play professional football in the All America Football Conference.

"Wally Yonamine's athletic career was interrupted for a second time when he sustained a wrist injury. But like a true champion, he did not let this stop him from exploiting his other athletic abilities in baseball. After playing for the San Francisco Seals' Salt Lake City farm team where he managed a .350 batting average, Wally Yonamine earned an opportunity to play baseball in Japan.

"Once there, Wally Yonamine took Japanese baseball by storm by transforming the game with his hard-driving aggressive style of play which included drag bunts, hook slides, and stealing home.

"Wally Yonamine's years in Japanese baseball are the stuff record and sports history books are made of. Part of his catalogue of achievements include eight league championships in twelve years of play, the MVP award in 1957, a career batting average of .311, and being chosen for seven league all-star teams. Coaching and team management highlights include a league championship with the Chunichi Dragons in 1974.

"Wally Yonamine's long and eventful career has maintained a level of excellence that most only dream of. Throughout all of these many triumphs he never

forgot his home and has been one of Hawaii's most illustrious ambassadors of sportsmanship and good will.

"It is for these reasons that the Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991 is pleased to extend to Wally Yonamine its deep and sincere good wishes for his continued health and prosperity, and its pride and respect for all of his tremendous achievements in football and baseball which will be a source of admiration and inspiration for all of us for generations to come."

Senator Matsuura then added his comments:

"Mr. President, I don't think people realize that Wally Yonamine was the Lou Gehrig and Joe DiMaggio of Japan. There is one person that Wally had a great impact on and his name is Sadaharu Oh. Today, he is the Babe Ruth of Japan. He holds the record for most home runs. When Sadaharu was a little boy, Wally was a very prominent baseball player, Sadaharu and a whole bunch of kids wanted to get the autographs of the players but because Sadaharu was so little he was unable to get any autographs. The other bigger boys got all the autographs. But Wally spotted this young, little boy who got no autographs. He went over and he gave Sadaharu his autograph and this little token of gesture of love was what sprung Sadaharu to wanting to become a professional baseball player in Japan.

"I don't know if Wally remembers me but I remember him because when I was in Waialua there was a professional football team called the Hawaiian Warriors, and their headquarters was right next to my house. When I first met Wally ... I don't want to embarrass him but ... I saw him in the community bathhouse of the plantation. The thing that impressed me about Wally was the size of his leg, especially his calf. I never saw anything as big as his and that impressed me.

"I was just a high school senior when the Waialua Plantation Co. had a senior league basketball team and I was made the manager of the plantation team. Wally Yonamine came to one of our games and he played for us. I can still remember, just a few seconds before half-time, Wally got the rebound and whipped the ball, full court. I wish I can say that the ball went into the basket but he threw it too hard. Just to tell you about the 'powerness' of this individual. He's was just incredible.

"If we're going to have a baseball team or any kind of basketball team I want him on our side. Thank you."

Senator Chang, together with Senators Mizuguchi, Hagino, Cobb and Ikeda, introduced the following honorees and awardees of the Small Business Administration of Hawaii, seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, it's my honor this morning to present the honorees and awardees recognized by the United States Small Business Administration. The administration annually recognizes members of the business community who have contributed to the improvement of Hawaii's small business climate.

"Pearl Jean K. Kamalu is the owner of K & S Backhoe Service, which engages primarily in heavy equipment rentals, demolition, excavation, and hauling services for general contractors on Oahu.

"Beginning in 1986, at the age of 22, she transformed a broken-down backhoe into a thriving business within five years. She now employs seven people and owns a fleet of trucks and heavy equipment. She has a reputation for

providing quality one-time services at reasonable prices to general contractors.

"May I introduce the Small Business Young Entrepreneur of the Year, Pearl Jean K. Kamalu."

Ms. Kamalu rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Chang and received a lei.

Senator Chang then introduced Mr. Samuel Slom and said:

"Mr. President, the next awardee is no stranger to the legislative halls. He is the Small Business Advocate of the Year. Samuel Slom is the president of Small Business Hawaii and SMS Consultants and has consistently sought to raise public awareness of the importance of small business through business associations, the media and the political arena. Under his leadership, Small Business Hawaii has become the leading advocate of more than 3,000 businesses in the State of Hawaii.

"He is a member of several governmental advisory councils and regularly testifies on legislative issues. He has given up professional careers and greater financial rewards to fulfill his commitment to promote small businesses. He continues to do extensive volunteer work and is also involved with the Winner's Camp project.

"May I introduce the Small Business Advocate of the Year, Samuel Slom."

Mr. Slom rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Chang and received a lei.

Senator Mizuguchi then introduced Mr. Leo Pambrun as follows:

"Mr. President, I guess I'll start off by offering congratulations and introduce Leo Pambrun for receiving the Veteran Small Business Advocate award.

"Leo Pambrun, a World War II and Korean War veteran, is the owner of DUKAY and has been a consultant for 22 years. He has helped numerous veterans and spouses start small businesses, assisting them in initial start-up, promotion, and marketing. He also helps those who failed in business assess the reasons for the failure.

"Using his knowledge on starting small businesses, he conducts Veteran's Employment Seminar programs focusing on small-business ownership opportunities for post-service employment for military personnel and their dependents.

"We in the Senate are very proud and privileged to congratulate and commend Leo Pambrun on receiving the Veteran Small Business Advocate award and wishes him success in his future endeavors."

Mr. Pambrun, seated on the floor of the Senate, rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Mizuguchi and received a lei.

Senator Hagino then introduced Mr. David Lee Onerheim as follows:

"Mr. President, it's my honor to introduce the Small Business Person of the Year. That person is Mr. David Lee Onerheim and he is president and owner of Color Dynamics, Inc., a company which paints, repairs, decorates, and weatherproofs buildings from the public

and private sectors. This award is given every year to the small business person who best exemplifies all that is good in business; not only from an economic point of view but a humanitarian one as well.

"What started in 1979 as a temporary means of financing his law school tuition has turned into a full-time, successful business for Mr. Onerheim. He started as a one-man painting contractor and soon realized that with hard work, vision and a positive attitude, he could succeed in business even without substantial start-up capital. He guaranteed his work, and as word of his performance spread, demand for his services grew steadily. The company now employs a full-time staff of 20 painters.

"Mr. Onerheim also gives back to the community by serving as a member of various business organizations and committees such as the Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii and the National Federation of Independent Business, teaching and offering assistance and advice to those wanting to start their own businesses, and supporting local charities and sport teams.

"At this time, Mr. Onerheim, will you please stand to be recognized."

Mr. Onerheim rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Hagino and received a lei.

Senator Cobb then introduced Ms. Haunani Apoliona as follows:

"Mr. President, on behalf of the members of the Senate, I'd like to introduce and recognize Haunani Apoliona who is receiving the Minority Business Advocate of the Year award. She is president of Alu Like, Inc., a private nonprofit, community-based advocate for native Hawaiians that provides various opportunities that enhance and ensure social and economic excellence.

"Haunani's professional and voluntary accomplishments epitomize the philosophy of public service and the belief that social and economic excellence can best be achieved when it incorporates the values of a proud heritage.

"Haunani actively supports funding for social and economic development programs and serves on the boards of various business and cultural organizations. She is also a well-known Hawaiian music composer and entertainer who has won Hoku Awards.

"Ms. Apoliona, will you please stand and be recognized."

Ms. Apoliona rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Cobb and received a lei.

Senator Ikeda then introduced Mrs. Lily K. Yao as follows:

"Mr. President, it's my privilege this morning to introduce the Woman in Business Advocate of the Year recipient, Mrs. Lily K. Yao.

"From the inception of Lily's career some 25 years ago, she has been an example to every woman who aspires to be successful. By setting goals for herself, determination and hard work, Mrs. Yao became the first woman to achieve management positions at Pioneer Federal Savings Bank and the first woman president and CEO of a major financial institution in Hawaii. She is also the first woman from Hawaii to sit on the board of directors of the Federal Home Loan Bank of Seattle.

"As a strong advocate for women in business, Mrs. Yao has served as a board member of the Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii, has lobbied for policies that enhance women's chances for successful entrepreneurship, and has participated in reviews of state laws which discriminate against women in business. Most recently she's demonstrated her commitment to women in business as a mentor in the voluntary SBA Women's Network for Entrepreneurial Training (WNET) program.

"Mrs. Yao's other commitments include serving as a director on the board of the Chinese Chamber of Commerce, Aloha United Way, Hawaii Joint Council on Economic Education, Chaminade Board of Regents and others.

"It gives me great pleasure at this time to introduce Mrs. Lily K. Yao."

Mrs. Yao stood to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Ikeda and received a lei.

Senator Chang then introduced Mr. Charles Lum, district director of the U.S. Small Business Administration, Ms. Lorinda Wong of Bank of Hawaii who assisted Mr. Lum organize the program, and families and friends of the honorees, all of whom were seated in the gallery.

Senator Tungpalan then introduced April Cadiz, the 1991 Hawaii State Spelling Bee Champion, as follows:

## FORTY-EIGHTH DAY

**Thursday, April 11, 1991**

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, convened at 11:35 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Pastor Darrell Rott, Seventh Day Adventist Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Ikeda, B. Kobayashi and McCartney who were excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Seventh Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Crozier introduced a group of 4th grade students from Holy Trinity School in Kuliouou and their chaperones: Mrs. Barbara Dung, Mrs. Carol Welhouse, Mrs. Barbara Corba, Mrs. Phyllis Hirakami and Mrs. Elizabeth Whittle. Senator Crozier singled out Mrs. Whittle as a very good friend who is like a sister to him.

Senator McMurdo recognized the Hawaii Civil Air Patrol as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure to present this certificate this morning.

"In a picturesque location nestled snugly in the central plains between the Koolau and the Waianae Mountain ranges is historical Schofield Barracks, home of the Army 25th Infantry Division (Light). At the foot of Kolekole Pass is situated 'Area X,' where during March nearly 600 JROTC and 50 Civil Air Patrol cadets do battle in a ritual that has become known as the Annual Joint JROTC Spring Encampment.

"The twelve respective JROTC cadet teams represented their high schools as separate entities, whereas, the Civil Air Patrol cadets came from around the state and were melded into a cohesive, competitive unit in two short days, 23-25 March 1991. The significance of the uniformity of CAP training and the cadet leadership, both locally and nationally, is a major factor in support of this short time integration. The Civil Air Patrol, an all volunteer auxiliary of the United States Air Force, numbers among its greatest assets its cadet program. The CAP Cadet Wing entered in this year's competition, like last year's unit, was made up of CAP cadets from Maui, Molokai, Kauai, the Big Island and Oahu. It was confronted with the unenviable task of defending the first ever first place win that last year's team earned under then CAP C/LTC Lane Martin.

"This year's team, under CAP C/LTC Sean Mattimoe was more than equal to the challenge, and by setting several new records in the eight areas of competition they accumulated a grand total of 1702 points out of a possible 2000, and finished 'Above All.' They finished first in Rope Bridging (a new team record); first in Rappelling (a new team record); first in First Aid (a new team record); first in Small Boat Operations (a new team record); first in Leadership Reaction; and first in the Obstacle Course.

"The Civil Air Patrol in Hawaii is under the command of Colonel John A. Parrish Jr., USAF (Ret.).

"The Hawaii State Senate congratulates the Civil Air Patrol for its great accomplishment in winning this difficult competition two years in a row, and in so doing

demonstrating excellence in the following leadership traits: decisiveness, judgment, enthusiasm, initiative and endurance.

"All the people in Hawaii can take great pride in these outstanding young men and women.

"Please join with me, ladies and gentlemen, in congratulating C/LTC Sean Mattimoe, C/LTC Shane Suganuma, and C/Major Rhyann Inouye."

All of the gentlemen, seated on the floor of the Senate, rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and leis.

Senator McMurdo also introduced Wing Commander Col. John Parish and Major George Mattimoe who were seated in the gallery.

Senator Chang then introduced two 5th graders from Nuuanu Elementary School, Christine Tome and Cassie Kunimura. Cassie is the niece of Senator Ann Kobayashi.

Senator Crozier, on behalf of Senator Aki, then introduced participants of the Waianae Chapter of the Tour De YEH as follows:

"Mr. President, we have a certificate commending the participants of the Waianae Chapter of the Tour De YEH (Youth Ending Hunger) and recognizing and encouraging the participants of the Tour De YEH II (Rights of the Child).

"Mr. President, last year on June 5th, seventy teenagers, ages 13-20, from around the world made history as they crossed the 3000-mile finish line of the first ever international bike tour to call attention to the fact that over 25,000 children throughout the world die every day due to hunger and hunger-related diseases.

"The bike tour was sponsored by the Youth Ending Hunger (YEH), the international student network of The Hunger Project, an international effort to end world hunger by the end of the century.

"The team from Hawaii consisted of eight riders, all of whom hail from Waianae, represented Hawaii in this historic accomplishment. The Hawaii participants shouldered a tremendous challenge, training 125-175 miles a week to prepare for this 3,000-mile journey. Mr. President, you gotta understand when they left Washington, D.C., they left an area which was fairly flat and wooded and they crossed over into the Great Plains of Middle America and they had to cross over the Rocky Mountains, and finally all the way over into Seattle. It took a lot of stamina. For them to stay organized and complete their task is outstanding.

"A Tour De YEH has been scheduled to take place in 1991 and will journey from San Francisco, California, to Washington, D.C., going the other way to raise money and the nation's consciousness about the fact that 27 children die every day in the United States from malnutrition and the lack of food.

"Mr. President, I'd like to ask my colleagues to join me in recognizing our honored guests today: Kathy Reynolds, coordinator; Eli Reynolds, who biked last year and will be doing it again this year; Robert Vasquez, who also biked last year and will be doing it again this year; and Mr. David Lexington, chaperone, who is very active in the hunger project. They are accompanied by Mrs. Leilani

Kamakaokalani, one of the kupunas from the Waianae Coast."

The honorees rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Crozier. Senators Crozier, Iwase, A. Kobayashi, McMurdo, Solomon and Tungpalan presented the leis.

Senator Fernandes Salling then introduced Mr. Toyo Shirai as follows:

"Mr. President, seated on the floor today are very special guests from Kauai. I'd like to introduce Mr. Toyo Shirai who is accompanied by his wife Yoshie.

"Toyo began his golfing career as a caddy at Wai'alea Country Club during the 1930's and went on to become the head professional at Wailua Golf Course from 1946 to 1979.

"During his career, Mr. Shirai exhibited extraordinary leadership ability and has improved the quality of life enjoyed by all citizens. He served as coach of the Kauai High School golf team which captured the Hawaii High School Athletic Association's State Golf Championship in 1978 and he received the Teacher of the Year Award from the Aloha Section of the Professional Golfer's Association of America.

"His involvement with the junior golf program has contributed greatly to the development of Hawaii's youth. Through him, our children have learned the values of hard work, dedication, perseverance and good sportsmanship, values that are important throughout a lifetime.

"The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii would like to extend a warm aloha to Toyo Shirai for his contributions to Hawaii."

Mr. Shirai and his wife Yoshie rose to be recognized. Senator Fernandes Salling presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and leis.

Senator Fernandes Salling also introduced Mr. and Mrs. Tom Tanaka, Mr. Bill Giese and Mr. Chuck Larson, friends of Toyo and Yoshie Shirai, who were seated in the gallery.

Senator Fernandes Salling then introduced Judy and Roger Peckenpaugh, seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, I'd like to introduce two people that couldn't make it here yesterday but we are fortunate that they could be here today. These are two people from Kauai that were recognized by the Small Business Administration for winning the Small Business Exporter of the Year Award for the State of Hawaii.

"Judy and Roger Peckenpaugh are the owners of Kauai Tropicals. The company was designed specifically for the propagation and cultivation of tropical flowers and foliage for export.

"Begun in 1984, Kauai Tropicals is directed toward U.S. and Canadian markets. The Peckenpaughs currently employ four full-time, two part-time, and various seasonal workers to keep up with demand. They are committed to making Kauai and the state the leading exporters of tropical flowers. They head agricultural organizations that promote tropical export business interests. They have formed a central marketing organization, which provides an export outlet for all of Kauai's flower growers, giving them the advantages of a cooperative.

"The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii extends its sincere congratulations and commendation to Judy and Roger Peckenpaugh."

The Peckenpaughs rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and leis.

Senator Fernandes Salling also introduced: Dillon Peckenpaugh, their son; Marlene and Arnold Townsend, parents of Roger; and a group of friends, all of whom were seated in the gallery and rose to be recognized.

Senator George then recognized and welcomed former colleague Bob Herkes who was seated in the gallery.

Senator McMurdo then introduced Mrs. Sylvia Levy as follows:

"Members of this honorable body, it gives me a great deal of pleasure to introduce to you today, Mrs. Sylvia Levy. Sylvia was a clinical professor at the University of Hawaii School of Public Health, where she taught public health planning.

"Since 1947, she has worked toward improving the state government's role in providing health care assistance to those in need. She started her career with the Department of Public Welfare and as a member of the state panel to review total disability claims. She also served as administrator of the Comprehensive Health Planning Office, Department of Health, and served as the executive director of the Mental Health Association of Hawaii.

"Mr. President, Sylvia Levy has served on numerous health related committees in the state and maintains memberships with the American Association of Public Administrators, the National Association of Social Workers, Hawaii Chapter, and the Hawaii Public Health Association.

"She is now semi-retired. But, as a famous baseball player once said, 'It's not over, till it's over.' Sylvia's retirement from government service is not quite over. Presently, she is the executive director of the Intercontinental Medical Services, Inc., and the administrative consultant with the Hawaii Medical Association for their Emergency Medical Services Program. In addition, during her spare time, Sylvia has been coming to the Capitol and helping our committee in various health related research work, which we deeply appreciate.

"Mr. President, please permit me to introduce Mrs. Sylvia L. Levy. She is accompanied by Ms. Chita Ugale, her secretary."

Mrs. Levy rose to be recognized and was presented the the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator McMurdo and Senator Levin presented her a lei. Ms. Ugale was given a lei by Senator Iwase.

At this time, Senator A. Kobayashi rose to personally introduce her niece Cassie Kunimura.

At 11:51 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:03 o'clock p.m.

## ADVISE AND CONSENT

Senator A. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of this confirmation.

"General Richardson is really an outstanding person. At his confirmation hearing, there were over twenty people speaking in his behalf. All of these people in their testimony stressed leadership. There were words such as outstanding leader, effective leader, a leader of all men. And many of the people testifying were friends since high school and college and they were still friends, and they had the greatest respect for General Richardson.

"I urge your support of this confirmation. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan also rose to speak in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, as a Senator of the Waiawa district which was heavily hit by last month's storm, I had a chance to work with Adjutant General Edward Richardson in addressing the damages, in hopes that we could prevent future occurrences. He took the time not only to detail what he envisions we should do for the area, he also had members of the Guard who are stationed at the Waiawa Camp notify the residents of the Waiawa area by going out and knocking on doors. When they found those areas vacated because they were uninhabitable, they traced the occupants to the hotels where they were situated. I find this indeed exemplary and the kind of a leader we should have in our state.

"As adjutant general, he will also be responsible for civil defense. I know that the people in Pearl City as well those people throughout the state will be in good hands with him there at the helm. Thank you."

Senator Solomon added her support of the nominee and stated:

"Mr. President, as a member of your Leadership Committee on Executive Appointments, I too was very much impressed with the testimonies that were presented in support of General Richardson. Most importantly, Mr. President, he is a 'keiki o ka aina' and comes from a family that has contributed much to the future, and the past, of the State of Hawaii. Thank you."

Senator Holt also added his support and said:

"Mr. President, I would just like to state that I have known the nominee for quite a number of years. He is a strong leader and is a great asset to our state. Also, he has an outstanding record of public service and I urge all my colleagues to support this nomination."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

At this time, Senator A. Kobayashi introduced Adjutant General Edward V. Richardson, who was seated in the gallery, accompanied by Mrs. Richardson and a group of friends and supporters.

Senator A. Kobayashi moved that Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 1210 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Hagino and carried.

Senator A. Kobayashi then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of Mario R. Ramil for Director of Labor and Industrial Relations, term to expire December 5, 1994, seconded by Senator Hagino.

Senator A. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of this nomination.

"The Department of Labor and Industrial Relations is a very difficult department to head, and we have an outstanding person who has the commitment, the dedication and the knowledge to lead this department in the right direction. It's not easy to handle the many concerns of the employees, the unions, as well as the business sector.

"At his confirmation hearing, there were representatives from all walks of life -- the business community, the union representatives and the employees. Many people from the department also came to testify in support.

"I urge your support of confirmation of Mario Ramil."

Senator Mizuguchi also rose to speak in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I too would like to add words of support for the nominee, Mr. Mario Ramil.

"As chairman of the Employment and Public Institutions Committee, I have worked very closely with Mr. Ramil and I have found him to be very helpful and very accessible, and he has, really, the people of the State of Hawaii in mind.

"This year, because of the support by both the House and the Senate and because of Mr. Ramil's leadership and the help of his staff, this Legislature has been able to provide for major reforms in unemployment compensation. At 11:22 o'clock a.m., on motion by Senator Solomon, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate stood in recess, subject to the call of the Chair, to meet in joint session with the House of Representatives, in accordance with H.C.R. No. 360, to greet the President of the Republic of Peru.

### JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives was called to order at 11:45 o'clock a.m., by the Honorable Peter Apo, Vice Speaker of the House of Representatives.

At this time a Certificate of Recognition recognizing and honoring President Alberto Fujimori of Peru was read by the Clerk of the House of Representatives.

The Vice Speaker then welcomed and introduced the family of President Alberto Fujimori and distinguished guests accompanying him to the members of the Sixteenth Legislature, as follows:

Mrs. Susana Fujimori, wife of President Fujimori;

Mrs. Lynne Waihee, First Lady of the State of Hawaii;

Kenji Fujimori, the President's son, and Sachie Fujimori, the President's daughter; and

Victor Joy-Way, Minister of Industry and Commerce; the Honorable Oswaldo Garcia, Congressman; Mr. Carlos Orellana, Press Secretary; and the Honorable Luis Coronado, Honorary Consul General of Peru to Hawaii.

The family and distinguished guests rose to be recognized and were presented leis as follows: Senator Hagino and Representative Taniguchi to Mrs. Fujimori; Representative Arakaki to First Lady Lynne Waihee;

Representative Kawakami to Kenji Fujimori; Senator Chang to Sachie Fujimori; Senator Fernandes Salling to Mr. Joy-Way; Representative Isbell to Congressman Garcia; Senator Ikeda to Mr. Orellana; and Representative Hirono to Honorary Consul General Coronado.

The Vice Speaker then welcomed the members of the Governor's cabinet and several of his key personnel.

The Vice Speaker then presented to the members of the Sixteenth Legislature and guests, the Honorable John D. Waihee, who then proceeded to introduce His Excellency Alberto Fujimori, the President of Peru, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, honorable members of the State Legislature, it is indeed an honor for me to join you this morning as we welcome to Hawaii one of this world's most inspiring leaders. We share much in common.

"First of all, Peru, like us, shares the Pacific Ocean. All of us are concerned about the affairs of the Pacific/Asian Rim and we have an opportunity this morning to hear from the leader whose country shares this ocean with us. We also, in Hawaii, have a heritage of people who have come to our shores from all parts of the world, seeking a better life for themselves and for their children and as a result of hard work and determination, have made that life possible.

"And in President Fujimori, we find such a story, when 57 years ago his parents emigrated from Japan to Peru and pursued a better life for their descendants and he, through his own initiative and through the hard work of the people and his supporters, rose to the very pinnacle of success in his country. Indeed, for those of us that are somewhat involved with politics, we can appreciate his campaign. You see, until he ran for president, he was not involved in politics at all, and I hear that in order to begin his campaign for the presidency, he started by raising funds with the selling of his truck and tractor, and then got out there and conducted a grassroots campaign that resulted in his receiving over 60 percent of the votes -- the largest majority ever for the presidency of Peru. So this is a man of inspiration who is leading his country during these challenging times to even greater heights.

"It is my privilege this morning, to introduce to you the product of humanity's greatest dreams -- His Excellency Alberto Fujimori, the President of Peru."

Senator Ann Kobayashi and Representative Clarice Hashimoto then presented President Alberto Fujimori with leis on behalf of the Senate and the House of Representatives.

His Excellency President Alberto Fujimori addressed the Joint Session as follows:

"When I arrived here I was told that I must make a small speech, but I don't speak English well any more, after twenty years of not speaking it. I studied at Wisconsin but laid off. I just talk in Spanish so please excuse me for my bad English.

"Honorable members of the Legislature, ladies and gentlemen, I am very happy of being here in this nice place of Hawaii. Unfortunately, making just a short stop of ten hours before returning to Peru, but I am very happy because I am very honored also of being received by the House of Representatives and the Senate as the President of Peru.

"As I was introduced, I am President of a country with real difficulties but, as you know, I was selected by many

people against all predictions. This election was possible because of the decision of the people. They wanted change. I found that, in fact, my message as with this name - '90 Change. And people listened to my words, listened to our objectives and plans. In fact, I should state I didn't have any party nor movement -- I was alone at first. But the people in Peru, as I suppose in many other countries, wanted new orientation. They wanted change. That's why this was possible -- becoming the President of Peru.

"We're making big efforts. I should say in some brief statement that we are in economical program with established objectives, a structural adjustment, and reinsertion in the international community. In the economical standpoint of view, we faced 50 percent of inflation each month before I took over the government and a big state management fiasco. And moreover, we were isolated from the international community. So we are working in these three areas in order to fight against poverty which is a very big problem in Peru -- poverty that covers many aspects of Peruvian life. And also against the internal insecurity and to solve a big problem which is also an international problem which is the narcotic traffic. So the task is a big, huge task, but we are with the decision to fight against all of these problems. Fortunately we have, in spite of the strong, hard issues, we have the support of the people. While working seriously, we want to change all of these situations, not in the short time, but in the middle of a long range program.

"I just came from Nagoya. I made a long speech while many South American representatives from all South American countries came to Nagoya in the meeting of international development. Back in South America, there is an orientation for this new trained world which was once the South American 'perestroika,' too.

"Finally, I want to say to all of you that I feel very honored, very happy of being received here, and thank you so much.

"Aloha."

Senate President Wong then rose and stated:

"Thank you, President Fujimori, for your remarks. We appreciate you taking the time from your very busy schedule to address the members of the Hawaii State Legislature. We are greatly honored by your presence.

"On behalf of the Hawaii State Legislature, I would like to present to you a small gift as a token of our respect and appreciation:

"I would also like, at this time, to call upon Senator Eloise Tungpalan and Representative Dennis Arakaki to present you with official certificates of recognition for your efforts and accomplishments in your country.

"I am advised that you have just arrived from a long trip from Asia and that you have an extremely tight schedule. While we wish that we can have the opportunity to meet with you personally to discuss matters of mutual concern, we know you have to proceed on.

"With that, thank you very much, President Fujimori, for being with us this morning."

Senator Tungpalan and Representative Arakaki then escorted President Fujimori from the podium to the departing area to enable them to proceed on with their schedules.

Senator Wong continued:

"There being no further business, I hereby declare the Joint Session of the Hawaii State Legislature adjourned."

At 12:04 o'clock p.m., the President declared the Joint Session adjourned.

The Senate reconvened at 12:24 o'clock p.m., with the President in the Chair.

## FIFTIETH DAY

**Monday, April 15, 1991**

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, convened at 11:38 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Lieutenant Troy Trimmer, The Salvation Army, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chang, Fernandes Salling, Koki, Matsuura and Solomon who were excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Ninth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Iwase introduced Sarah Jean Lee, Hawaii's Young Woman of the Year, seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, the Young Woman of the Year Program is a nationwide scholarship program established to recognize, reward and encourage excellence in American youth. Formerly known as the Junior Miss Program, the program was renamed Young Woman of the Year to more accurately focus on the achievements of outstanding young women.

"It gives me great pleasure today to introduce Hawaii's Young Woman of the Year Sarah Jean Lee. Sarah is the daughter of Lawrence and Adeline Lee and is a student at Waipahu High School.

"Some of Sarah's many honors and activities include: Waipahu High School student government president; national delegate, Distributive Education Clubs of America; Executive Women's International Scholarship, regional winner.

"The first runner-up, Edrienne Leolani Edwards, hails from the Island of Kauai, and could not be with us today. She was earlier presented a certificate by Senator Fernandes Salling. Senator Tungpalan will be introducing the second runner-up.

"At this time, Mr. President, I would like to introduce Sarah Jean Lee to be recognized. Sarah Jean, congratulations!"

The honoree rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Iwase and received a lei.

Senator Tungpalan then introduced Mahealani Cynthia Richardson as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure to introduce the second runner-up in the Hawaii Young Woman of the Year contest, Mahealani Cynthia Richardson.

"Mahealani is the daughter of Robert and Helen Richardson and is a student at the Kamehameha Schools. Some of Mahealani's honors and activities include the National Honor Society in 1989, 1990 and 1991, a Sterling Scholar Award nominee in speech and drama, and placed first in humorous interpretation during the state qualifying tournament. Mahealani likes to dance ballet, jazz and tap, sing in concert glee, and lead the drama club as president to provide fun and energetic outlet for her academic activities.

"Mahealani aspires to have a career in advertising and communications. Her college choice is the University of Pennsylvania and she was recently accepted to attend that fine university.

"Let's honor Mahealani Richardson."

The honoree rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Tungpalan and lei by Senator Crozier. Ms. Corlis Chang, chaperone, accompanied the young ladies.

Senator Tungpalan then introduced Mahealani's parents, Bob and Helen Richardson, and grandmother, Mrs. Shim, who were seated in the gallery.

Senator McMurdo then introduced members of the 25th Infantry Division, the "Tropic Lightning" Division, on the occasion of their 50th anniversary as follows:

"Mr. President and members of this honorable body, it gives Senator Gerald Hagino and me a great deal of pleasure to introduce to you, members of the 25th Infantry Division (Light) 'Tropic Lightning' on this the occasion of their 50th anniversary. The 25th Division, it can truly be said is Hawaii's own. This division was activated on October 1, 1941 at Schofield Barracks, Territory of Hawaii, from elements of the famous old Hawaiian Division, and from two Hawaii National Guard regiments. The guard units were the 27th and 35th Infantry Regiment and the 298 Infantry.

"The division had a distinguished service record including the battles of Guadalcanal, the Solomon Islands, and the Philippines during World War II. Six Medals of Honor were awarded to division soldiers during that war.

"In June 1950, hostilities began in Korea and the 'Tropic Lightning' Division was one of the first units sent to Korea under United Nations orders. For its role in Korea, the division received two Presidential Unit Citations of Korea. Thirteen division soldiers were awarded Medals of Honor.

"Again, when the Vietnam War began, the 25th Infantry Division met the challenge. During the Vietnam conflict, 21 Medals of Honor were awarded to our heroic soldiers from the division. During the recently completed 'Desert Storm,' elements from the division did participate in its successful operations.

"It may interest you to know that the shoulder patch of the 'Tropic Lightning' Division is the Taro Leaf reminiscent of its Hawaiian birth. The bolt of lightning symbolizes speed and an aggressive spirit. The red and gold colors are that of the late Hawaiian monarchy.

"Needless to say, in peace time, the 25th Division is renowned for its civic improvements projects in the surrounding areas, especially in Wahiawa. The division has also established orphanages in other countries.

"Mr. President please permit me to introduce to you members of the division on the chamber floor: Brigadier General Marvin L. Covault, Deputy Commander for Support; Command Sergeant Major Jan Schalavin, senior noncommissioned officer in the division; Sergeant Rodney Lewis, Division Noncommissioned Officer of the Year; Corporal Roland Mulgrave, who recently returned from 'Operation Desert Storm.'

"In the gallery are other members of the division, headed by Lt. Col. Richard D. Lyons."

All of the honorees rose to be recognized. Senator McMurdo presented General Covault the congratulatory Senate certificate. Senators A. Kobayashi, Ikeda, Tungpalan and George presented the leis.

Senator McMurdo also introduced members of the Military Assistance to Safety and Traffic Program (MAST) and said:

"Mr. President, we are, today, recognizing the National Department of Defense and the Hawaii Departments of Health, Human Services and Transportation for their efforts in furnishing military helicopters to transport the seriously ill and injured patients to comprehensive medical centers on this island.

"The U.S. Army 45th Support Group's 68th Medical Detachment has provided medical evacuation support consisting of helicopters, pilots, medical personnel and equipment. This program is known to all of you, I'm sure, as MAST. The MAST program has flown over 2,500 missions and transported over 2,000 patients on Oahu. Needless to say, the MAST program has been a most valuable and important public service to this community.

"For all that this program has done for us here, Mr. President, please permit me to introduce the representatives from MAST: Colonel Samuel L. Kendred, Commander, 45th Support Group, and Major Edward W. Rawls, Commander, 68th Medical Detachment, who are seated on the floor of the Senate.

"In the gallery, seated with Dr. Peter Sybinsky of the Health Department are Lt. Col. Tucker and other members of the MAST program."

The honorees rose to be recognized. Senator McMurdo presented the congratulatory Senate certificate to Colonel Kendred and Senators A. Kobayashi and Ikeda presented the leis.

Senator Hagino added his comments as follows:

"Mr. President, I would just like to echo the comments of the previous speaker. The Senators and audience have already heard the good Senator from Waikiki give a very impressive list of accomplishments of the 25th Infantry, and I'd just like to extend a warm thank you from the community. I think you realize how important you are to the community.

"I'm particularly proud of your community involvement with such projects as the collection of books and clothes that the Lions Club from Wahiawa has annually conducted and your part in having them transported to Korea for the orphans there. I'm particularly proud of the division's involvement with the schools they have adopted in the community. They have proved a very valuable resource to the schools. Thank you very much."

Senator Ikeda then recognized and introduced Captain Samuel Taylor, seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, as we all know, people make a community what it is and while all of us are proud of the communities we represent, there are certain people who stand out in their efforts to make our community and the world a better place. Captain Taylor is one of these people.

"Capt. Samuel Taylor served in the Coast Guard for 33 years. As a retired captain of the Coast Guard and a father whose children are now grown, Capt. Taylor

devotes his time to the children of Kamiloiki Elementary School. He protects them as a crossing guard, supervises them in their playground activities, and heads the school's junior police officers. He also tutors and encourages students who are having trouble with their school work. And it is this loving encouragement that fosters students to call him 'grandpa' or 'the captain.'

"I had the pleasure of speaking with Capt. Taylor earlier and he told me just how he got involved. He said that his neighbor's son came home a couple of times complaining about the fact that his lunch money had been taken. And so the neighbor, knowing that Capt. Taylor was retired, asked him if he wouldn't walk his son to school, which he obligingly did. After doing that for a period of time the teachers at Kamiloiki who are quite sharp noticed that he came in every morning and said to him, 'We could use some help. We notice you come to the school every day. How about staying a little while longer and helping out?' He obliged them and did.

"Five years ago, they needed a crossing guard and they asked Capt. Taylor. Of course, he again said that he would do the job. All of this time, he didn't realize that by taking the job of a crossing guard that he was going to get paid. He did all of these things out of the goodness of his heart and not for any kind of consideration.

"It's a great honor to introduce to this body this morning Capt. Samuel Taylor."

The honoree rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Ikeda and received a lei.

Senator Ikeda then recognized the Retail Merchants of Hawaii and introduced the representatives, seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, also part of a very integral part of our community are the Retail Merchants of Hawaii. They are a thousand-member strong trade association and they were established in 1901 by a handful of merchants who were the core of business at that time. Today, the Retail Merchants of Hawaii are a key industry in the State of Hawaii made up of small 'mom and pop' shops as well as many other diversified stores.

"One of the main functions of the organization is to play a role in prompting integrity and quality in business and ethics in commerce, community and consumer affairs. The retail industry has worked to enhance the quality of life and development of the community while being a conscientious member of our community.

"Three members of the association are here today to represent the Retail Merchants of Hawaii and I would like to introduce them. First of all, Colin Miyabara, chairman of the board. He is also the general manager of Honolulu Bookstores for the last 12 years, and his goal as chairman of the board is to provide service to the industry and the community.

"Barbara Mason is the 1991 Retailer of the Year. She is a former senior vice president of stores at Liberty House where she spent 23 years. Barbara came to Honolulu from New York where she was employed with Lord & Taylor, never to return. She has been here and spent the last 43 years in the retailing industry.

"Sharon Ro is the president of the Retail Merchants of Hawaii and the first female to serve as its executive. One of her main responsibilities is to oversee the programs of work of the organization which includes legislation, marketing and promotions, as well as program development for retailing. Sharon works to assist retailers

in conducting quality business and to enhance the quality of life in Hawaii by making a difference not just in retailing, but in all sectors of the community.

All of the honorees rose to be recognized. Senator Ikeda presented the congratulatory Senate certificate to Mr. Miyabara and all of the honorees received leis.

Senator Ikeda also introduced two members of the association, seated in the gallery: Mr. Sidney Kosasa, president of Thrifty Drugs of Hawaii (ABC Discount Stores); and Mr. Goro Arakawa, past retailer of the year and officer of Arakawa Store in Waipahu.

Senator Crozier then said:

"Mr. President, Goro Arakawa is truly a pillar of the Waipahu community. I have worked with him for quite a few years and we appreciate his service to the greater Waipahu community.

"And, Mr. President, Sidney Kosasa and I were neighbors. His son and I grew up together as little children and I probably learned my ABCs at your wife's knees, Mr. Kosasa.

"Remember, last year I asked for your support, as well as the support of other merchants in town, to remove zig zag paper from the shelves of your stores? Zig zag paper is the paper that is used to smoke pakalolo. Mr. Kosasa owns the ABC Discount Stores and when he received the letter of request, by that afternoon, every zig zag paper had been removed from the shelves of his stores. Thank you very much, Sir."

Senator Crozier then introduced Mrs. Emogene Martin and Mr. Fred Toupes of the Friends of Ewa, which is celebrating 100 years of plantation life in Hawaii Ewa Plantation Company and has a display on the chamber level of the state Capitol.

Senator Crozier, on behalf of Senator Aki, then recognized and introduced Master Joshua Oclaray and Fire Captain Ed Gabriel as follows:

"Mr. President, today, we have Master Joshua Oclaray, a second grader from Kamaile Elementary School, who has won a contest. It is for his achievements in the Fire Fighter's Safety Guide Contest which is a statewide competition, sponsored by the First Interstate Bank and coordinated by Captain Gabriel of the Honolulu Fire Department.

"Any student in grades one to six is eligible to participate in this contest. In other words, 150,000 young individuals are made aware of their responsibility in case of a fire. The purpose of the contest is to educate children about fire prevention and awareness. The contest involves a series of activities: Developing and preventing a fire safety plan for his/her home; solving mathematical problems, writing a creative essay relating to fire prevention and awareness; and completing five crossword puzzles relating to the subject. The home safety plans are assessed for completeness, neatness, and color effects. The mathematics portion, creative writing, and crossword puzzles are graded and rated by teachers.

"All of this came about because of Capt. Gabriel who started the program. He enlisted not only the Honolulu Fire Department but it is a concerted effort of the firemen from the Counties of Maui, Kauai and the Big island, DOE, the general community, especially the business community.

"At this time, I'd like to introduce Master Joshua Oclaray, the contest winner. With him are his parents

Michael and Juanita Oclaray and school principal, Michael Miyamura."

"I would also like to introduce Fire Captain Ed Gabriel who has taken much time and effort to coordinate the Fire Fighter Safety Guide contest."

The honorees rose to be recognized and Senator Crozier presented the respective congratulatory Senate certificates. Senators A. Kobayashi, McMurdo, George, Tungpalan and Yamasaki presented leis to the honorees, Mr. and Mrs. Oclaray and Mr. Miyamura.

Senator Crozier also introduced Assistant Fire Chief Henry Kaalekahi, Battalion Chief E. Suemoto and a group of firefighters from the Kakaako Fire Station who have assisted in the Fire Fighter Safety Guide contest. The gentlemen were seated in the gallery and rose to be recognized.

At 12:01 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

**Tuesday, April 16, 1991**

### ADVISE AND CONSENT

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1215 (Gov. Msg. No. 68):

Senator A. Kobayashi moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1215 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Hagino and carried.

Senator A. Kobayashi then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of George W. Sumner for Director of Public Safety, term to expire December 5, 1994, seconded by Senator Hagino.

Senator A. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this confirmation.

"George Sumner has been an administrator in the corrections system of many states for over 35 years. At his confirmation hearing we received testimony from governors, former governors, congressional people and heads of corrections departments of many different states singing high praises of George Sumner's abilities.

"There were many questions regarding his confirmation that came up during the hearing. However, these questions were more than adequately answered by Mr. Sumner. His responses were always fair and to the point, and we received enough information to know that Mr. Sumner would be the best person as head of our new Department of Public Safety.

"I told Mr. Sumner that one of his problems is that he doesn't use flowery words; he doesn't smile a lot; he



doesn't go around bragging about what he does. He just makes sure that the job gets done and he gets it done in the most efficient way possible. And that is why I urge your confirmation of this great man who I know will make our Department of Public Safety one we can all be proud of. Thank you."

Senator Mizuguchi also rose to speak in support of the nomination and said:

"Mr. President, I too would like to voice my support for the confirmation of George Sumner.

"As chairman of the Committee on Employment and Public Institutions, it has been my pleasure to work closely with Mr. George Sumner since his appointment last July and I have found him to be, indeed, possessing the highest level of expertise and professionalism that has distinguished his work in the field of corrections for the last 30 years.

"As we were assured in the many letters of recommendation from across the country which were submitted on his behalf, George Sumner is a strong leader whose work is characterized by a sincere sense of fairness and innovation. For example, he showed his sensitivity to the concerns of the native Hawaiian population by meeting with representatives of several Hawaiian agencies to discuss the needs of native Hawaiian individuals incarcerated or employed in the corrections system.

"In addition, Mr. Sumner addressed the problems of the use of force by individuals in the corrections field. This is an issue which has come to be a concern for all of us. Mr. Sumner met the issue by revising the policy regarding the issue of the use of force and by seeing to it that the staff was trained in the correct procedures in regard to the use of force.

"A few of his other efforts during the short time he has been here in Hawaii has been the implementation of a plan to satisfy requirements of the consent decree, development of plans for sex offender and substance abuse treatment, vocational education, correctional industries, and improvement of the case work process.

"Moreover, I have found him to be open to ideas that involve alternatives to incarceration.

"In closing, Mr. President, I also would like to acknowledge the work of our special master, Mr. Kip Kautzky, who laid the foundation for the prison reforms in the State of Hawaii. I'd like to thank him personally for the work that he did and I know that Mr. Sumner will continue in the best efforts to improve our correctional system in the State of Hawaii.

"I ask all my colleagues to support Mr. Sumner. Thank you."

Senator George also supported the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I would like to join the chorus of praise for George Sumner and ask my colleagues to vote favorably for his confirmation. I make particular reference to his thoughtful and rapid response to both community and institutional problems with the siting of the Women's Correctional Facility and the Youth Facility on the Windward side. He handled the problem expeditiously and well, and I think we're extremely fortunate to have him. He's a fine nominee. Thank you."

Senator Koki also rose to speak in support of Mr. Sumner and remarked:

"Mr. President, I too would like to add my voice of support for Mr. Sumner. He is very knowledgeable in the area of corrections and I really appreciate that. He's been very open and a willing person to work with.

"I want to add all of the previous comments to my comments that he's a very able and very capable person, and we are indeed fortunate in having him. Thank you."

Senator McCartney added his support as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the nominee.

"Mr. Sumner has worked very closely with our community and we really appreciate his efforts, especially the efforts echoed by the Minority Leader, Senator George.

"Also, I would like to say that he has an excellent track record and I think he's the best man for the job. I've worked with him on different problems within the women's prison and he's responded swiftly and effectively to the concerns that were brought up. I really appreciate that.

"I believe he'll do a good job. Thank you, Mr. President."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22. Noes, 1 (Reed). Excused, 2 (Holt, Matsuura).

Senator A. Kobayashi then introduced Director of Corrections George Sumner who was seated in the gallery with a group of friends and members of the corrections system.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1216 (Gov. Msg. No. 70):

Senator A. Kobayashi moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1216 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Hagino and carried.

Senator A. Kobayashi then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination Edward Y. Hirata for Director of Transportation, term to expire December 5, 1994, seconded by Senator Hagino.

Senator A. Kobayashi then rose to speak in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, this is another man who will work hard to get the job done. He also doesn't mince words. He just moves ahead and makes sure that his department is run efficiently.

"I've known him for many years and, in whatever capacity he has been asked to serve, he has always done an excellent job. He's in charge of all of our highways, our roads, our harbors, our airports. It's a tremendous job and through his past performance, we know he can do it in the next four years again.

"I urge your confirmation of Ed Hirata as Director of Transportation. Thank you."

Senator Fernandes Salling also spoke in favor of the nominee and remarked:

"Mr. President, I too rise to speak in favor of this nomination.

"Over the years, having worked with Ed, I have to say that I'm very impressed with Ed the man and Ed the director of our Department of Transportation.

"Ed has a unique kind of leadership that he's brought to this department. He's soft-spoken and, yet, I think if you ask anyone on his staff, he's pretty hard-driving when it comes to needing to get things done. But besides that, he combines this kind of leadership with a certain sense of his own brand of sensitivity to the community. This was well exhibited yesterday when we were on Kalaupapa where they were signing agreements on how to proceed with making the necessary improvements to the roads and to the airport. It was very impressive how he worked it all out with the community. I think that's Ed's approach.

"I've seen him at numerous hearings now and I think that one could take lessons from him on how to stay cool under the kinds of pressure and criticism that he's been having to endure as the head of this department.

"DOT, as we all know, has a lot of problems especially with traffic and throughout the islands this has been the number one complaint now for a lot of years. I think that Ed is probably the perfect person for this job, given the kind of person that he is. It could perhaps be best illustrated by what he likes to say to his staff at the end of a hard working day and that is, 'It's another fine day in paradise, isn't it?'

"I urge your unanimous support of Ed Hirata for Director of Transportation."

Senator Reed added his support as follows:

"Mr. President, I want to add my thoughts in support of the nomination as well.

"On Maui, people such as Councilman Wayne Nishiki and I often team up to catch Ed Hirata and oppose his position relative to the West Maui Airport or to demand some kind of quicker action than the department is able to deliver, and Ed consistently remains responsive and open and that attitude filters down to the rest of the department. Among all of the departments that I deal with on the state level, the DOT is the most responsive and the most open and I believe that comes from the top and so I, also, support the nomination."

Senator McMurdo also supported the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I have had quite a few dealings with Ed in the past seven years, it's been, and on issues of such vast interest to my community as the fight over the bridge up the Manoa-Palolo drainage canal or over University Avenue he has been very helpful.

"He also was responsive when we needed to have a small boat harbor advisory committee in the Ala Wai Harbor, which is one of many of the problems of my district ... around the boating community. Ed met with me and we got the group organized and I must say that they have been listening to the group, which is just great.

"I would also like to mention that I'm looking forward to working with Mr. Sumner because if the bills all go through the marine patrol will be under Public Safety, and that is of vital interest to that harbor down there.

"I urge all of you to vote for Mr. Hirata."

Senator Cobb added his remarks in support of Mr. Hirata and said:

"Very briefly, Mr. President, speaking in support of the nomination.

"I've served with Ed Hirata and under him in the Army Reserve. Not many people know that he is a former Army Reserve brigadier general. And the kind of leadership he exhibited there has been more than apparent in the Department of Transportation.

"I want to say for the record, I saw him at a meeting the other night in Aina Haina, literally, enduring two hours of complaints of residents. The Department of Transportation under Ed Hirata has done more listening and more responding to the residents of Hawaii Kai and Kalaniana'ole Highway in the last four years than has happened in the previous 40 years. And that's a tribute to Ed Hirata. A tribute to him being willing to lean over backwards to try and accommodate residents' concerns.

"As a representative of part of that area, I very much appreciate that and wish to publicly commend him for it. And as the previous speaker said, this kind of attitude reflects and flows from the top down.

"I strongly urge my colleagues to support Ed Hirata and with it a vote of thanks."

Senator George also spoke in support of the nominee and stated:

"Mr. President, as a charter member of the Ed Hirata Fan Club, I would like to remind my colleagues that until Ed sat in the chair he's sitting in now the history of transportation planning between the City and County of Honolulu and the state was, I think I could characterize it as a disaster. Ed is the one who's made the difference and we're lucky to have him. Thank you."

Senator McCartney also supported the nomination and said:

"Mr. President, Mr. Hirata has done an excellent job in working with our community also. I've sat with him through numerous neighborhood board meetings and, as you know, everybody is an expert on highways because we all drive so we all have the answers and he's very patient and listens to all the answers and solutions.

"Also, our community appreciates his taking a very tough stand on the issue of jet skis and commercialization in Kaneohe Bay. We appreciate his leadership in that area.

"Finally, I would like to point out something that he did just this last week. You know, in government a lot of times we hear about problems and concerns and all of us know that many of the calls and complaints we get are all negative, all those problems dealing with government. The Department of Transportation did something positive that needs to be publicly recognized and that is when we had the power outage. Ed, under your leadership you took charge and you opened up the contra-flow lanes very early in the afternoon, avoiding a major traffic tie-up and it's your leadership and your foresight that should be commended on that. We appreciate those kinds of actions out of the department.

"Mr. President, I wholeheartedly support this nomination."

Senator Koki added his comments in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, there's not much more to add than what has been said, but I also wish to publicly support this nomination. Ed Hirata has always been very

accessible and always willing to listen and so those have been the comments to Ed of the testimony thus far. The department as a whole has always been very responsive to our office so I want to wholeheartedly support Mr. Hirata for Director of Transportation."

Senator Ikeda also added her support and remarked:

"Mr. President, I'm going to be the fly in the ointment. I just want to say that I think that it's very opportune for Mr. Hirata to have his confirmation today and not next week. Next week begins a very auspicious time. Construction finally begins on Kalanianaʻole Highway. And after about a week of that I'm not sure that he would have the vote. So I'm pleased that it's taking place today.

"All kidding aside, I must say that over the years that I've had to work with Mr. Hirata we have not seen eye-to-eye on many, many things. In fact, we disagreed very openly on some things, but he has been responsive and he's always taken the other point of view into consideration. And he's also held the line when he felt that he was correct.

"We are in for some very trying times, at least for the next 18 months. Hopefully, not the whole three years, Ed, I'm counting on you.

"This man and his direction over the period of time can make a difference, I think, in terms of who comes back to this Legislature. So, we're counting on you, Ed. Thank you."

The Chair interjected:

"Do I understand that we are to defer this matter until April 16, 1992?" (Laughter.)

Senator Chang then said:

"Mr. President, I would be remiss if I did not join my colleagues from the Windward side of this island in commending Mr. Hirata for having engaged in a very delicate balancing act in addressing the traffic problems of our Windward residents and their desire to serge through the valleys of Kalihi and Nuuanu. And so on behalf of the Senator from Kalihi, I join with my colleagues in congratulating Mr. Hirata for a job well done. Thank you."

Senator Levin also added his support as follows:

"Mr. President, I would not normally get up in spite of my strong support for Mr. Hirata. My fear is that if nobody from Big Island gets up we may lose all our money. So may I please just add the support of the Big Island. Ed, please keep giving us our share. Thank you."

Senator Crozier then said:

"Mr. President, on behalf of the Leeward side of the island, I would like to just make a few comments about our nominee just so that it can go into the Journal. Mr. Hirata is already a legend for his duties as a general and as a Department of Transportation director, but, I think the most legendary part about you, Mr. Hirata, is having been the acting mayor. That is time you decided when we were going to celebrate Halloween. Remember those remarks? 'Halloween is tonight!'

"But seriously, Mr. President, the H-1 freeway has been relieved of traffic because of Mr. Hirata putting in shoulder lanes on both the right and left sides, so now instead of taking an hour and twenty-five minutes to get

to town in the morning you can do it in about an hour and five minutes. So that's a big improvement.

"He's also working with us to help clean the freeway. A section of the H-1 freeway happens to be the dirtiest freeway in the United States of America. Mr. Hirata and I have already pledged ourselves to make it the cleanest freeway in the United States.

"I support his nomination. Thank you, Mr. President.

Senator Tungpalan also spoke in support of the nomination and said:

"Mr. President, I just wanted to clarify one thing. I think that Mr. Hirata's efforts on behalf of the people on Leeward Coast were indeed quite swift, but it was at the behest of the people of this area. The shoulder lane, as you recall, was an initiative that came about as a result of many meetings with your department and also the lowering of the carpool lane to two has really worked effectively in our area. But again, that was at the behest of our people. So working together, we got the job done. Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, none. Excused, 2 (Holt, Matsuura).

Senator A. Kobayashi then introduced Mr. Hirata as follows:

"Mr. President, at this time may I introduce the great man, Ed Hirata, head of the Department of Transportation.

"I believe there are some supporters seated with him also. Would you stand to be recognized."

## FIFTY-SECOND DAY

Wednesday, April 17, 1991

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, convened at 11:43 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by President Aldous Paalani, Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, Honolulu Stake, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Holt, Nakasato and Wong who were excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-First Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator McCartney introduced Mr. Rodney Foreman, chair of the Hawaii State Teachers Association Negotiations Committee and teacher at Kaimuki High School.

Senator Ikeda introduced Mrs. Nalani Thompson and Mrs. Chiyoe Yonamine as follows:

"Mr. President, I have with us this morning two distinguished members of our community, people who have spent a great deal of time and effort volunteering, and I'd like to present them to the Senate.

"The first is Mrs. Nalani Thompson. She has dedicated her life volunteering her services to the Kalaniana'ole Athletic Club (KAC). Nalani became involved with the KAC when her four children, two boys and two girls, were active in KAC in sports. She was impressed with the good work KAC did with her children. She felt she should give something back to the club. That was 17 years ago, and Nalani is still at it.

"She serves as treasurer, director of the KAC Colt baseball team, basketball team, and assists with the soccer team. And she does all of this in addition to holding a full-time job.

"Nalani believes that children stay out of trouble by keeping busy. She feels that if she can keep just one child from going bad, all her efforts are worth it. Nalani takes a personal interest in the players and follows their lives even after they leave the league, and says it's especially nice to see former players come back to the club as coaches. Nalani's concern and enthusiasm toward the children of the KAC has earned her the nicknames of 'Auntie,' 'Mom,' or 'Mrs. T.'

"Today we present Nalani with a certificate to show our appreciation for her continued service and dedication to our community.

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure to introduce to this honorable body, Mrs. Nalani Thompson. With Nalani is her daughter Wendy Thompson. And in the gallery are some friends who came to cheer Nalani on, Diane and Gary Nakamura and Caesar Robeldo."

The honoree rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Ikeda and received a lei.

Senator Ikeda then recognized Mrs. Chiyoe Yonamine as follows:

"Mr. President, our second community worker this morning is Mrs. Chiyoe Yonamine.

"In 1978, while the youngest of her three daughters attended Hahaione Elementary School, Chiyoe began her work with the students at Hahaione Elementary School.

"As you know, Mr. President, one of the most difficult things to do is to find people who'd be willing to volunteer and help with things like traffic monitoring and working with the JPOs, and Chiyoe has dedicated the last ten years or so of her life doing exactly that. We have a very dangerous street on Hawaii Kai Drive. There's a curve and it's a blind curve and when the children have to cross the street to go to school, they really take their lives into their hands. But, Chiyoe for the last 12 years has been out there every morning and every afternoon, making sure that none of the children get hurt and get across the street in time. In fact, she was the very first traffic monitor in the state.

"Chiyoe also assists the students at Hahaione Elementary School as an adult supervisor during their lunch hour and recess period, in addition to working as an aide in the Hahaione's A+ after-school program. She believes every child is precious and she treats them all accordingly. In fact, when you talk to her, she'll even know who your children are and when they left the school. And many of them come back even now, after they've graduated from high school and some from college come and say hello to Chiyoe.

"It gives me great pleasure at this time to introduce to this body, Mrs. Chiyoe Yonamine. With Chiyoe in the gallery is Mrs. Carol Kaneshige, one of her dearest and oldest friends."

The honoree rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Ikeda and received a lei.

"We graduates of Kamehameha Schools, including not only myself, but also others who are politically involved with the Legislature as Senator Milton Holt, OHA trustee Clayton Hee, the Trask sisters, Haunani and Mililani, and the Lee Loys who are doctors and attorneys, owe a lot to Mrs. Brandt and Winona Rubin for helping set the direction of the Kamehameha Schools' curriculum from vocational to college preparation.

"This is what I like the most about Mrs. Rubin and I think this is reflected in her whole career. This is why I'm urging your support.

"She has the strength, dedication, and the commitment to excellence. She is able to work with all kinds of personalities and this ability was reflected when she was in charge of Alu Like and she was able to provide a very positive direction for that organization.

"Again, I'd like to urge all of my colleagues to vote for Mrs. Rubin. She brings great strength and feeling of aloha and most importantly, Mr. President, a love for Hawaii."

Senator McMurdo also rose to speak in support of the nominee and remarked:

"Mr. President, I first met Winona Rubin back in the '50's when her husband and mine were both on ROTC duty in the public schools here. The next time I encountered her was when we both came into the human services program at the same time. I'll try to compete, Winona. Maybe I'm singing in harmony -- I'm not sure.

"I found, as I took over the Human Services Committee that becoming familiar with all of those programs from the elderly, the welfare, the medicaid to the awesome task of coping with child abuse was not easy. I congratulate Winona for coming to grips with all of these problems during this period. She also supervised a reorganization, a computerization and a great move of a number of the services of the department.

"I wish her well as she continues in her activities and look forward to working with her. Thank you very much."

## FIFTY-THIRD DAY

Thursday, April 18, 1991

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, convened at 11:45 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Pastor Bob Coggins, Seventh-day Adventist Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Holt who was excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Second Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator A. Kobayashi introduced a group of 11th and 12th grade students from Lutheran High School and their chaperone Sandy Thompson, seated in the gallery.

Senator Ikeda then introduced Dr. Richard T. Mamiya as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure this morning to introduce to this honorable body a very distinguished person.

"Dr. Richard Mamiya has earned not only a distinguished and world renowned reputation as a pioneer in coronary bypass surgery, he is also a major philanthropist. He donates financially to many of Hawaii's non-profit organizations. His giving of himself professionally as well as socially is an inspiration.

"Born in Kalihi, Dr. Mamiya was raised in a one-bedroom house in Palama and attended Kalihi Elementary, Likelike, and Kalakaua Intermediate Schools, but after only three days at Farrington High School he was offered a baseball scholarship to St. Louis High School. He attended St. Louis then went on to the University of Hawaii where he was offered another scholarship. This time for football. During this period of his athletic career, he set a U.H. record passing 301 yards in a single game -- a record unbroken until 1984. This feat won him a place in the U.H. Hall of Fame.

"After graduating from St. Louis University Medical School in Missouri, he was a general surgeon until 1969 when he began a heart surgery program in Hawaii. Although coronary surgery had been pioneered by then, there were no standard procedures so Dr. Mamiya and his staff developed some new standards in the next decade or so. One of Dr. Mamiya's innovations was the multiple bypass operation.

"Dr. Mamiya has a long history of giving to community organizations in an unusual way. Financially, he literally gives back to organizations that have given to him. As a philanthropist, in his early 30's, he made generous donations to his parish, Holy Trinity. He made a large contribution to St. Louis High School for the school's building program. To his surprise, the school used the gift for a Performing Arts Center which was named after him.

"He has endowed a Chair for Human Development and Counseling at Punahou School and he set up the Richard T. Mamiya Charitable Foundation which is a family foundation. He has also generously donated funds to the American Heart Association, Blood Bank of Honolulu, Palama Settlement, Honolulu Academy of Arts, Bishop

Museum, Japanese Cultural Center, and Aloha United Way.

"Dr. Mamiya was named Humanitarian of the Year by the Hawaii State Chapter of the American Red Cross, and is truly an inspirational person in our community.

"Mr. President, members of the Senate, it gives me great pleasure to introduce Dr. Richard Mamiya."

Dr. Mamiya, seated on the floor of the Senate, rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Ikeda. Senator Tungpalan presented him with a lei.

At 11:50 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:54 o'clock a.m.

### ADVISE AND CONSENT

Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 1295 (Gov. Msg. No. 56):

Senator A. Kobayashi moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1295 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Hagino and carried.

Senator A. Kobayashi then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of Russel S. Nagata for Comptroller, term to expire December 5, 1994, seconded by Senator Hagino.

Senator A. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the nomination and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this nomination.

"Russel Nagata has a really great responsibility. He has to issue checks on time to those dealing with the state; and even after executing contracts and issuing payment, Mr. Nagata has to oversee the operation and maintenance of all state buildings.

"Ahead of him is the huge task of moving us all into the new state office building, and part of that task is meeting with the members of the House and Senate Women's Caucus this afternoon at 3:00 o'clock so he has a lot to look forward to this afternoon.

"He has been doing a great job and I know he will continue to do so, and I urge the confirmation of Russel Nagata as Comptroller."

Senator Mizuguchi also rose to speak in support of the nominee and remarked:

"Mr. President, I too would like to rise in support of the nomination of Russel Nagata.

"Over the years that I have known Mr. Nagata I have known him to be a very able and responsible administrator dealing in a very politically sensitive department. I know that Russel Nagata is committed like all of us to expeditiously plan, design and construct public facilities in our communities, and he is also for timely repair and maintenance of these respective facilities.

"While Mr. Nagata is not the inventor of the asbestos problem in the state Capitol, I know that he understands

the word 'accommodation' and the word 'compromise,' and that he will work very hard and diligently to try to meet the needs and concerns of all of the legislators as we relocate to the new office building and work on attendant problems such as parking and security.

"Mr. Nagata and his deputy Bob Takushi are outstanding individuals and they will lead the Department of Accounting and General Services over the next three years. I ask for your support. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan also supported the nomination and stated:

"Mr. President, I would like to add my support and rise to recommend to all of my colleagues here an affirmative vote for Mr. Nagata.

"Over the years, I have been really impressed with his responsiveness to legislative concerns. He will get it to us within an hour, if he can, and no delays are part of his agenda and this is really remarkable. Thank you, Mr. Nagata. You serve as an example of a good department head."

Senator Chang then added:

"Mr. President, I want to address a little known aspect of Mr. Nagata and that is his athletic ability. He is a skilled martial artist and as an expert he's learned to take on challenges and deal with them efficiently and effectively. More importantly, as an accomplished basketball player he knows the value of teamwork. His only shortcoming, Mr. President, is that I know of no virtues that adhere to his golf game. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator A. Kobayashi then recognized and introduced Mr. Russel Nagata who was seated in the gallery with deputy director Bob Takushi, a group of friends and members of his staff.

Senator Chang also introduced Mrs. Gwen Nagata, wife of Russel Nagata, who was also seated in the gallery.

Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 1296 (Gov. Msg. No. 69):

Senator A. Kobayashi moved that Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 1296 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Hagino and carried.

Senator A. Kobayashi then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of Richard F. Kahle Jr. for Director of Taxation, term to expire December 5, 1994, seconded by Senator Hagino.

Senator A. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this confirmation.

"Across the nation, the heads of state tax departments are always very conservative, very conscientious, hard working, efficient, and ours is no different. Rick Kahle is a very hard worker. He watches over our tax dollars to make sure that they're coming in at a good rate and that we're spending it at a good rate.

"One thing with Mr. Kahle, no matter what tax credit you introduce, he always says 'no.' I always told him that someday I'll find a tax credit that he would say 'yes'

to. I think that as soon as he hears the words 'tax credit,' Mr. Kahle starts shaking his head, 'no.'

"There is another side to Mr. Kahle. We all think of him as very conservative, very quiet. However, a couple of years ago during the interim, I did see him with this really funky, punk rock haircut, running through Manoa Valley. I think it's a rumor but I've heard that his idol is 'Conan the Barbarian.' He also, in case you haven't guessed, makes his own ties. One of his favorite colors, I take it, is purple. He also likes bright yellow flowers and red brocade. In fact, he has a nice shirt on today and I know he has another shirt that he will be showing us soon. Maybe you could show it to us now before we confirm you. (Laughter.)

"But, truly, this is a great man and I do urge your confirmation."

Senator McMurdo also rose to support the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, it's with pleasure that I'm going to vote 'yes' on this nomination today. I would like to tell you that when Rick was in the Legislative Reference Bureau, he was a great help to all of us. Since he's been in the tax department, although he doesn't like my tax credit bills, he, nevertheless, when one of my committee clerks called and asked him for information we needed for a bill said he would check into it and the next morning, bright and early, there was the fax answer awaiting us when we got to the office. Now, I think that's pretty quick. Anybody that I have ever known who had a tax problem, if they couldn't work with the people in the bureaucracy, have been able to get an answer from him.

"I would urge all of you to vote for him."

Senator Matsuura also supported the nominee and remarked:

"Mr. President, if anybody should vote against Richard, it should be me because he's the one that testified against most of my bills. I have to admit that Mr. Kahle is very consistent in his voting record.

"I speak in favor of Rick Kahle, primarily, because I think he has a job to fulfill. He tries to accommodate us in terms of accomplishing the big picture. The only bill he gave a positive supporting testimony was on the solar tax credit.

"Any time the Director of Taxation gives a favorable testimony, I keep it in my filing cabinet. Thank you very much."

Senator Tungpalan added her support as follows:

"Mr. President, I eagerly rise to also speak in favor of Mr. Kahle. This is another public servant who exemplifies the very best there is in our government.

"I wish to thank his wife for allowing him to serve. I know it's sometimes very abusive to have to withstand the pressures of saying 'no' to a lot of good measures that do somehow find their way on our desks. Because of people like you with the courage to have the foresight of the impact that such measures would have on our economy that we are not in the red. Thank you."

Senator Chang also added his support and remarked:

"Mr. President, I would like to express the appreciation of all the former Senate staffers for Mr. Kahle's assistance through the years, including the Legislative Reference

Bureau, and that includes Senators Holt, McCartney, Blair, Ann Kobayashi and myself. Thank you, Rick."

### RE-REFERRAL OF SENATE RESOLUTION

The Chair re-referred S.R. No. 35, S.D. 1, jointly to the Committee on Transportation and Intergovernmental Relations and the the Committee on Health and Human Services, then to the Committee on Legislative Management.

Senator Koki rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, earlier this week I saw a movie about how the El Salvador government was killing thousands of their own people. Every night we see on the news how thousands of Kurds are dying because of Saddam Hussein. But Mr. President, a much larger carnage is taking place around the world. This carnage is killing and injuring millions of people annually, and particularly in the third world countries. This carnage is being perpetuated by American multi-national tobacco companies. Of all the children alive today, 200 million will eventually die because of tobacco use.

"Cigarette sales in developed countries are declining by 2 percent a year. To make up for that they are pushing sales in third world countries and elsewhere. In the early '80s, African tobacco use went up 33 percent. Tobacco use in Latin America went up 24 percent. In Bangladesh, one of the poorest counties of the world, 50 percent of teenagers smoke.

"The growth of cigarette markets in developing countries is no accident. It is directly related to the billion dollar advertising campaigns of these tobacco companies. The Marlboro man rides billboards from Africa to Asia. The message is the same: 'Smoking makes you cosmopolitan, with it, successful.'

"Observers note that the problem is that U.S. manufacturers are not just exporting American cigarettes. They are exporting cigarette marketing. Experience shows in Japan, Korea and Taiwan that when U.S. style promotion and advertising is used, cigarette consumption increases dramatically, particularly among women and children. Teenagers are frequent targets for

advertisement and promotion. For example, a recent promotion in Taiwan gave tickets away to a teenage disco in exchange for five empty packs of Winstons. In Malaysia, Salem promoted a concert featuring teen music idols, Cindy Lauper and Tina Turner.

"Sports Illustrated had an advertisement for Camels with a familiar dapper looking camel in a tux. It tells you how to order a poster of the dapper camel. With the poster comes coupons for free Camels. One-third of Sports Illustrated readers are under 18 years of age. No one checks if the person writing in for free samples are adults or not. These merchants of death target the youth because that is where the growth is.

"Mr. President, did you realize only one new smoker in five begins smoking after age 21? In America alone some 6,000 children and teenagers must begin smoking each day just to maintain current sales level. Tobacco companies are legal drug pushers. They give samples away to get people hooked, just like a drug pusher does. They have the added advantage of being able to advertise and promote. It really is a drug pusher's dream.

"Cigarettes in third world countries are sold not only in packs but individually as well so they can gain access to every economic level. A person in Bangladesh smoking just five cigarettes a day must cut food purchases by 15 percent. A study comparison of cigarette brands in the U.S. and the Philippines show that the tar content of the Philippine cigarettes was 50 percent higher than comparable cigarettes marketed in the U.S. They are addicting these people by selling them one cigarette at a time. These tobacco promoters are without conscience.

"We are making gains in America because we have been battling these death merchants and we must not let up. We need to stop them from giving away free samples and stop their deceptive advertising that makes a vulgar and dangerous habit look sophisticated and acceptable.

"Thank you."

That office is principally an advocacy planning group, not an operational group. The adoption of the resolutions will leave unresolved the very large policy question of who will be in charge of the operations of the programs that are developed for early childhood development. And that, I think, is a policy issue this Legislature will have to come to grips with, certainly, within the next one to two years as the number of those programs increase and become operational, and then they come to us for funding, guidance, budget support, as well as legislative direction.

"So in voting for this, I want us to be cognizant of the future implications of such resolutions because early childhood development is a very important and emerging subject. And although Hawaii does not yet have mandatory kindergarten, this subject to insure that our children can keep up with the competitiveness in a global economy is going to become more and more important, and the need to address the operational aspects and control of early childhood development in terms of an agency will need to be addressed. Thank you."

I wanted this opportunity to thank Simone because he has visiting with us today two of his associates from the Federated States of Micronesia seated in the gallery. They are Mr. Kainer Tosie and Mr. William Touleng. Will you rise to be recognized by the Senate. Thank you for your visit.

"Also, Mr. Simone Kihleng, please rise to also be recognized. He is also from the Federated States of Micronesia."

Senator Chang added:

"Mr. President, I'd like to second Senator Tungpalan's introduction of Simone by pointing out that he was instrumental in developing the language contained in S.C.R. No. 1, S.D. 1, on page 9 of the Order of the Day which requests the Governor to initiate a discussion relating to the establishment of cooperative associations among Pacific Island states. It is the committee's intent that our Governor should initiate discussions with the Governor of Ponape and the Federated States of Micronesia for the purpose of developing these cooperative associations. Thank you, Simone."

Senator Cobb rose on a point of parliamentary inquiry as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of parliamentary inquiry.

"In Siberia there's a city known as Semipalatinsk which among other features has some wooden planks for sidewalks, much like old cities of the West. And our new Siberia further down the street on Beretania Street, in its

English translation, could be literally called a small part of the plank instead of Semipalatinsk.

"I've had inquiries from a number of Senators as to when, precisely, the move date is to take place. Assuming that members of this body have work obligations or travel commitments or educational requirements to meet, I think it would help if we were given a firm date to anticipate for moving in writing because much of the discussion on this move so far has been verbal. Much of the commitments have been verbal. Much of the timetables both for moving and returning have been verbal. I think to have it in writing with a firm date to be prepared to move and to actually carry out the move would be most helpful not only for myself but other members of this body. I would like to request that at the Chair's convenience. Thank you."

The Chair responded:

"Senator Cobb, for your information, the move will take place right after the adjournment of the session sine die. We do have a specific date. It's been suggested that the move take place in August, around August 19, but it will be done in the month of August."

Senator Solomon introduced Ms. Melody MacKenzie as follows:

"Mr. President, on behalf of Senator Anthony Chang, it gives me great pleasure to introduce two distinguished guests that we are honoring here on the floor today. I would like to read from the Senate certificates.

"First we would like to recognize Melody MacKenzie for her outstanding work to promote native Hawaiian rights:

'Ms. MacKenzie, a senior staff attorney for the Native Hawaiian Legal Corporation, a per diem judge for the State of Hawaii, and a kumu hula for Halaau Mohala Ilima, has been involved in native Hawaiian rights since the early 1980's.

'As a student of the University of Hawaii Richardson School of Law, Ms. MacKenzie and her classmates became involved in compiling a text of cases and statutes relating to native Hawaiian legal rights. This eight-year project, the Native Hawaiian Rights Handbook, analyzes the applicable statutory and case laws that would be most relevant to Hawaiian.

'Throughout Ms. MacKenzie's legal career she has continued to promote native Hawaiian rights as a serious field for practice. She has served as the executive director of the Native Hawaiian Legal Corporation, the editor-in-chief for the Native Hawaiian Rights Handbook, and has taught native Hawaiian rights classes.

'The Senate of the State of Hawaii recognizes and commends Ms. Melody MacKenzie for her dedication for native Hawaiians to be recognized as native people and extends its very best wishes for continuing success in her future endeavors.'

"At this time I'd like to ask Ms. MacKenzie to rise. Mahalo."

Ms. MacKenzie rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and lei by Senator Solomon.

Senator Solomon continued:

"Mr. President, at this time I would like to recognize our next distinguished guest and would like to commend and honor Mahealani Kamaau.

'Mahealani Kamaau, executive director of the Native Hawaiian Legal Corporation, was presented with this year's Liberty Bell Award, given by the Hawaii State Bar Association to a non-lawyer who has made significant contributions in a law-related field.

'Through her twelve years with the Native Hawaiian Legal Corporation and her intense dedication to many causes including her support of residents of Kalama Valley, Waiahole-Waikane, Ota Camp, Chinatown, and Niimalu-Nawiliwili, she has demonstrated her strong commitment to social justice and has made the struggle for Hawaiian rights her life's work, contributing countless hours working with the Hawaiian community, farmers, prisoners, and the homeless.

'Mahealani Kamaau also serves on the board of directors of the Native American Rights Fund and has been appointed by Chief Justice Herman Lum to the State Judiciary's Alternative Dispute Resolution Center. She is also a singer and a published poet.

'The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, commends and honors Mahealani Kamaau for her tireless efforts to strengthen Hawaiian rights and ensure social justice for all and wishes continued success in her endeavors.'

"Mahealani please rise to be recognized.

"On a personal note, Mr. President, I served with both of these women when I was a trustee of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs and can attest to the integrity of their outstanding work and, of course, in their countless hours and their contributions in the study and the furtherance of native Hawaiian rights that would be a continuing pursuit here in Hawaii."

Ms. Kamaau rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and lei by Senator Solomon.

#### ADVISE AND CONSENT

Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 1297 (Gov. Msg. No. 63):

Senator A. Kobayashi moved that Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 1297 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Hagino and carried.

Senator A. Kobayashi then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination John C. Lewin, M.D., for Director of Health, term to expire December 5, 1994, seconded by Senator Hagino.

Senator A. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this confirmation.

"Dr. John Lewin went through a lot, I must say, before his confirmation hearing. There were many concerns expressed and that's understandable because he runs the Department of Health which has close to 6,000 employees and their problems range from water quality to environmental quality control, so many diverse issues including the mental health hospitals and the state community hospitals. Yet, he has been able to come out ahead.

"There were many questions, many issues raised at his confirmation hearing but Dr. Lewin was able to answer all the questions very well. On the ones he was not able to answer, he provided answers to our committee at a later date.

"I know that Dr. Lewin will continue to move the health department forward and will continue to work on all of our problems including the funding for a state hospital which he has been doing this morning.

"Not once did he waver when all these questions concerning his confirmation were brought forth. Not once did he waver. Not once did he give up on continuing his work in his department.

"I urge you to confirm Dr. John Lewin. Thank you."

Senator Solomon also supported the nomination and remarked:

"Mr. President, as the previous speaker has indicated, there were times during the confirmation hearing that we had those who were not unhappy but concerned because Dr. Lewin has a certain style of leadership. I had to chuckle to myself about it because as I heard about the characteristics of his style, it kind of reminded me of me -- my style. So I said, 'No, no, no, Dr. Lewin is not abrasive he is action oriented.' So I think that once we were able to reconcile his leadership style, it was easy to see that he was effective and I would like to recommend the nomination of Dr. Lewin.

"I think, we can look forward to many new beginnings and hopefully many happy endings to a lot of our different health initiatives that we initiated throughout the State of Hawaii. I'm looking forward to working with him especially with regard to our new hospitals on the Big Island.

"So at this time, Mr. President, I'd like to urge all of my colleagues to support the nomination."

Senator McMurdo also supported the nomination and said:

"Mr. President, I couldn't be happier to recommend the nomination of Jack Lewin. From the first day I met him, which is some years ago now, I have been struck by

his positive, exuberant attitude and he's continued this for getting things done. As I said during his nomination hearing, he stumbled into a 'can of worms' over there and I think he has just done wonders.

"It gives me great pleasure to support his nomination today."

Senator George also spoke in support of Dr. Lewin and remarked:

"Mr. President, it appears to be a female trait to second the nomination of the nominee.

"The thing that moves me to request that my colleagues vote in favor of the nominee is an unusual combination of idealism and a conviction that anything is possible. When these two traits are harnessed to a conviction that things have to have a practical application then anything is possible. I urge his confirmation. Thank you."

Senator Levin also supported the nomination and said:

"Mr. President, from the other side of the gender gap, I would also like to express my very strong support for Dr. Lewin, and to thank Senator Kobayashi for moving this nomination to the floor.

"Rather than try to make any bad jokes about the fact that he never attends any hearings on time or never gets to a meeting when he's supposed to or he doesn't even finish his marathons on time, I would like to point out things that are already known that Dr. Lewin is a visionary; he is an activist; he is renowned nationally and internationally. We are very, very fortunate to have him as our health director.

"I'm pleased to have been able to work with him for the past years as Health chair and as the Ways and Means liaison. I urge his nomination be approved."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22. Noes, none. Excused, 3 (Ikeda, Matsuura, Wong, R.).

At this time, Senator A. Kobayashi introduced Dr. Jack Lewin, Director of Health, who was seated in the gallery.

Senator McMurdo also recognized and introduced Dr. Peter Sybinsky and Mr. Calvin Masaki, deputy directors of health, who were seated with Dr. Lewin.

Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 1298 (Gov. Msg. No. 254):

Senator A. Kobayashi moved that Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 1298 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Hagino and carried.

Senator A. Kobayashi then moved that the Senate consent to the nomination of Herbert K. Shimabukuro for Judge of the Circuit Court of the First Circuit, for a term of ten years, in accordance with the provisions of Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution, seconded by Senator Hagino.

Senator A. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the nomination and remarked:

"Mr. President, at the confirmation hearing for Judge Shimabukuro, I did not know him before this and I was very impressed with this man. He has done a wonderful job as district court judge.

"I was very impressed with the way he was brought up. He has really paid his dues to society and he's really given back to the community. His father was also the same way. His father moved here many years ago and worked for 20 years in the sugarcane fields of Kauai and then moved his family, which consists of ten children, to Oahu because he knew that educational opportunities were better here. He bought a farm and worked on it very hard to be able to provide for his family of ten. But no matter how busy his father was, his father always taught him these basic truths which is part of Judge Shimabukuro's life. He taught his son the things that are important -- obligation to others, respect for the land and its people, the importance of being honest, keeping your word and helping your friends and neighbors. This is the way Judge Shimabukuro was raised and this is what he believes in.

"I wish I could have met his father also, but his father passed away on the same day that Governor John Waihee named Judge Shimabukuro to the circuit court bench. I'm sure that Judge Shimabukuro's father knew of his son's appointment and I'm sure he is looking down now and feeling a lot of pride that his son will now be a circuit court judge.

"I urge your confirmation."

Senator Solomon also supported the nomination and said;

"Mr. President, I too would like to speak in support of the nominee. As a member of the Executive Committee I was very impressed with the judge's resume and, Mr. President, I think the most impressive part was the judge's community service. I can truly say he is a 'keiki o ka aina.' I recommend to my colleagues to vote in the affirmative. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 21. Noes, none. Excused, 4 (Cobb, Ikeda, Matsuura, Wong, R.).

Senator A. Kobayashi then introduced Judge Herbert Shimabukuro who was seated in the gallery with his wife Lillian, other members of his family and friends.

At 12:05 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:06 o'clock p.m.

Senator Solomon then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, on Friday, April 19th there was a very interesting viewpoint appearing in the Star-Bulletin. The article was entitled 'Stereotypes obstruct justice for battered women.' The reason I bring this article to the attention of my colleagues is that the Women's Caucus here in the Senate has been championing the crimes against women package.

"Mr. President, throughout my academic career as well as my career in leadership, I have always been very involved with championing the civil rights of the native Hawaiian, but it never dawned on me that various kinds of stereotypes existed pertaining to women.

"I would like to quote from the article, Mr. President, because I was really enlightened by this article. It talks about the different stereotypes and Laura Crites, the writer, mentions that basically there are five myths about women. And these five myths are so embedded in our psyche in terms of how we view each other, both males and females, that sometimes these myths have a way of obstructing justice.

"She compared the manslaughter conviction of February 8th of Alexander 'Boy' Carvalho for the beating death of his wife Cathie, the manslaughter conviction of August of Ben Bonifacio who strangled his wife to death two days after the restraining order against him had run out, with the more serious second-degree conviction in June of Stacy July who stabbed her husband to death after years as a battered woman.

'Some have said that this disparity in treatment of women and men charged with murder of their spouses is a result of the differences between state and federal court rules of evidence and can be corrected with legislative changes.'

And this is a very interesting point, Mr. President, because at this time this body is considering those changes. However, the writer continues:

'I am less optimistic. I think the problem is more deep-seated and lies in the differing expectations of appropriate behavior for women and men in our society -- in short, gender bias. This bias ... is influenced, if not directed, by myths and stereotypes about women passed down through the centuries in religious doctrines and literature. These stereotypes strongly influence the treatment of women in society in general, and in the justice system in particular.'

"She cites the five dominant myths that were identified by Juanita Williams in her book, 'Psychology of Women.'

'First is woman as Mother Nature, ordained by nature and her unity with mother earth to reproduce. This myth justifies woman's position in the home, ....

'Second is that of a woman as enchantress/seductress, luring men away from their holy mission. Through cunning and devious use of her sexual powers woman, otherwise powerless, brings down her prey, man.

'The third myth of woman as necessary evil is also ages old. Necessary as sex object and child bearer, the

presence of women is otherwise a burden which man must bear.'

and it goes on and talks about Eve, how she seduced Adam.

'The fourth myth is that of woman as a mystery.

'Sigmund Freud ... went to his grave bemoaning his inability to understand what he considered the riddle of femininity.

'The French feminist and philosopher Simone de Beauvoir discussed at length in her book "The Second Sex" how men have used the "women as mystery" myth to avoid responsibility for understanding and engaging with women on an equal basis.'

'The final myth is that of the virtuous woman.'

And this is the myth that I thought was the most interesting because as I've been following the convictions in the newspaper, I think this myth is the one that's the most profound.

'The ... virtuous woman ... is a faithful, loyal and submissive wife, a dedicated loving mother, a competent, diligent homemaker and an unquestioning supporter of the moral and religious values of her society.'

"This is the myth, Mr. President, that defense attorneys use the most.

'The task of attorneys defending men charged with violence against women is to prove that the victim was not the virtuous, moral, loving, submissive woman -- but rather, the victim was the man who had fallen prey to the evil influence of a cunning, nagging, unfaithful, seductive woman.' And she offers the following cases and points.

'Ben Bonifacio's attorney argued that his violence was a result of learning that his wife had been involved with another man.

"'Boy' Carvalho's attorney described how his client lost control and beat his wife to death after she accused him of having an affair.

'Segundo Matias was described as killing Lee Ann Kauhane after cracking under the force of her "evil smile."

"Mr. President, I find this outrageous.

"Then it goes on, Mr. President:

'Fair and just treatment of battered women in society and in the justice system will only come when the power and influence of these myths about women are raised to the conscious level of our thinking and consciously dispelled as destructive.'

"Well, I would like to tell each and everyone of my colleagues that this is deep-seated and it's going to take all of our efforts and energy to dispel it. Perhaps, the State of Hawaii, being that we have an aloha attitude in how we treat each other as human beings could become the leader in dispelling these stereotypes.

"Thank you very much, Mr. President."

Senator A. Kobayashi also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I support the words of the previous speaker. The Senator from Kohala pointed out the problem very well. The Women's Caucus has annually introduced legislation that will deal with this problem of violence and our Judiciary chairman did a very good job this year of trying to help us. He brought in all the different parties involved in this problem and tried to get them to come out with proper legislation.

"Our Ways and Means chairman and our House Finance chairman have agreed to fund a committee dealing with gender fairness and there is \$95,000 in the budget to provide support staff and equipment for this committee that will look into gender bias and fairness in our courts.

"It is hoped that this whole problem can be addressed no matter what legislation we introduce. There is an underlying problem. It's a cultural problem; it's a problem that's been around for so many years that it's become part of us ... you know, if a man comes home and a woman nags him, it's okay to hit her. This is a wrong attitude. If a woman gets raped, the first question is 'What was she doing out at night?' or 'What was she wearing?' So we have to overcome all of this, these stereotypes before our legislation can be successful. Thank you."

Senator Cobb also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, on an entirely different subject, today is the day we observe Earth Day and I would like to express the hope, since a number of measures are in conference, that we emerge and complete this session with some measures for the sake of the environment to protect it to include drift net fishing, long lines, and oil contamination, both recycled oil, pipeline oil, and new oil that is to be brought in.

"The environment is indeed fragile and I think the celebration of Earth Day helps demonstrate that, and while people observe it globally today, I hope we do our part this session to insure that we have taken adequate steps to help protect our environment as well. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan, on behalf of the Senators, extended Happy Birthday wishes to Senator Mary Jane McMurdo.

## STATEMENT OF OBJECTIONS TO HOUSE BILL NO. 275

Honorable Members  
Sixteenth Legislature  
State of Hawaii

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 275, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to the Western Interstate Commission on Higher Education.'

The purpose of House Bill No. 275 is to expressly state that a member of the Western Interstate Commission on Higher Education ('WICHE') does not hold a public office so as to permit legislators to serve as commission members.

Section 8 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii precludes legislators from holding all but three types of public offices of the State. The constitutional debates on that section indicate that the delegates did not intend to allow the Legislature to add to the list of offices excepted from the 'no other public office' disqualification imposed by Section 8. Accordingly, the amendment to section 310-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to be made by this bill is not a rightful subject of legislation.

For the foregoing reason, I am returning House Bill No. 275 without my approval.

## ORDER OF THE DAY

### ADVISE AND CONSENT

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1233 (Gov. Msg. No. 59):

"The testimony states: '... as director he initiated a strategic blueprint for the department which was designed from proved decision-making and program administration not only for the department and the executive branch but for state government in general. His management concepts emphasize foresight, goal setting, long-term planning and evaluation. Beyond his efforts to upgrade programmatic endeavors, however, has been his concern and interest in developing departmental personnel to their fullest potential. He has taken the time and the effort to motivate and encourage each of us to develop professionally and personally to contribute our best to our jobs and in our personal lives.'

"I thought that was very fitting testimony from those who associate and work with Mr. Takemoto. I think he is a fine man and I urge your confirmation."

Senator Solomon also supported the nomination and remarked:

"Mr. President, in support of the previous speaker, I too would recommend to my colleagues to support the nomination of Yukio Takemoto."

"At the hearing, the testimonies in support of Mr. Takemoto were very, very impressive. But, Mr. President, what's more important about Mr. Takemoto is that he has done an excellent job in bringing the neighbor island agencies, which normally feel isolated in dealing with state agencies, closer to his department in expediting issues on budget and finance. Thank you."

## FIFTY-SEVENTH DAY

Wednesday, April 24, 1991

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, convened at 11:46 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Bishop Larry Oler, Brigham Young University, Second Stake, Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Wong who was excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Sixth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Solomon introduced Mrs. Malia Thompson, her aunt, who is the wife of Bishop Larry Oler who delivered the invocation.

Senator Yamasaki, on behalf of Senators Solomon, Reed and himself, introduced Ms. Flo Nakama, Mr. Ed Ginoza and Mr. Maurice Morita, members of the Maui Division of the Hawaii State Teachers Association, who were seated in the gallery.

Senator Crozier then introduced Mr. Paul Campbell from Yakima, Washington, who graduated from Colorado College with his daughter Kimberly. Mr. Campbell and Kimberly Crozier, who were seated in the gallery, rose to be recognized.

Senator Reed introduced Ms. Tsulan Purdy, seated in the gallery, who is a teacher from Molokai, also with the Hawaii State Teachers Association.

Senator Blair then introduced a group of 9th and 10th grade students from McKinley High School, as well as their teachers Mrs. Jacquelyn Wesolosky, Mrs. Sophia Hu and Ms. Tine Thuener.

Senator Ikeda then recognized and introduced Mr. Craig Uyebara, seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure this morning to present to this honorable body the State Golf Champion. Craig Uyebara recently won the 27th Annual Hawaii High School Athletic Association State Golf Tournament at the Waiehu Municipal Golf Course on Maui. Currently a senior at Kaiser High School, Craig tied for second place in last year's state tournament, and won the Junior Golf State Championship in 1989. This year, after finishing the two-day 36-hole tournament, Craig and another golfer were tied for first place. Using his experience and outstanding golf skills, Craig persevered and won the individual title on the first playoff hole.

"Members of the Senate, it's my distinct pleasure to present to you Mr. Craig Uyebara."

"With us this morning is a gentleman who is responsible in part for Craig's success. We all know an outstanding athlete excels only with the support of a highly committed coach, and Bill has been such a coach. He's not only head coach of golf at Kaiser High School but since 1972 has been a head coach of track, football, soccer, golf and weight-lifting. Bill von Arnswaldt, will you please stand to be recognized.

"With Craig this morning is his mother Mrs. Maurice Uyebara. His dad couldn't be with us. Craig is very lucky. Every fortunate young person, a successful young person I should say, is usually backed by a very supportive family and Craig certainly has that. In the gallery with us this morning are Craig's grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Sakurai, also his aunt Joyce Nakamura and his cousins, Iris, Asao, Dale and Steven Watanabe."

The honoree rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Ikeda and received a lei.

Senator Cobb then recognized and introduced Mr. Kwaghfan Igber, seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, on behalf of all members of the Senate, I would like to introduce a very special young man who is with us today with his father.

"By way of background, he has come all the way from Nigeria to study in the United States and I know how difficult it is for foreign students to study in another country. In doing the same thing, myself, at Moscow University, I can appreciate ever more the language and the cultural differences, the differences in season and lifestyle, differences in relating to people, differences in just learning as well as being in an environment that is totally strange.

"Today's young man is an exceptional person who has literally overcome every conceivable odd. Mr. Kwaghfan Igber came to Hawaii from Nigeria and has distinguished himself both scholastically and socially as a full scholarship student at Lutheran High School.

"Now a senior, he has an accumulated 4.0 grade point average, is a member of the National Honor Society, has been named outstanding student in physics, chemistry, and Asian studies, and is listed in 'Who's Who Among American High School Students' as well as the National Talent Search Institute Data Base. A natural leader, he was named Most Outstanding in Leadership in Physical Education and has provided a strong, positive role model for his peers.

"Recently, Kwaghfan was selected by the Congressional Youth Leadership Council to represent Hawaii as a Congressional Scholar, and he has been invited to apply for admittance to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

"The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii congratulates Kwaghfan Igber on his many achievements and wishes him success and happiness in his future endeavors.

"Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, it is my distinct honor and privilege to introduce our young Congressional Scholar Mr. Kwaghfan Igber."

Mr. Igber rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate Certificate by Senator Cobb and Senators Tungpalan and McMurdo presented the leis.

Senator Cobb continued:

"Mr. President, one of the things that I would like to mention about Kwaghfan Igber is that he is living with his family on a temporary basis in Palolo Housing on Ahi Street. So if you look at the long odds this young man

has overcome, this is just another one of them and it's not a case where he has the money or the financial means to achieve what he has done. It's been, principally, his drive and the support of his family and is even a further tribute. I wanted to share this fact with the members of the Senate.

"Mr. President, Kwaghfan has prepared a set of remarks that I would like to circulate to every Senator, expressing his thanks and observations and I'd also like to ask the permission of the Chair to have this inserted into the Journal of the Senate.

"As the Senator from Hawaii Kai said, it's family support that counts so much, and with Kwaghfan is his father Joe Igber."

Mr. Joe Igber also rose to be recognized and was presented a lei by Senator A. Kobayashi.

The prepared remarks to Mr. Kwaghfan Igber reads as follows:

"Senate President, Senators, distinguished guests, ladies and gentlemen, I feel deeply honored and fortunate to be part of this memorable occasion. During my high school career, I was nominated on several different occasions to participate in both national and international scholastic events, but I would like to briefly share with you in summary my recent experiences in Washington, D.C., while attending the National Young Leaders Conference that took place in Washington, D.C., during the week of February 19-24.

"The first day was spent registering and getting acquainted with other students from different states all over the country. The second day was spent at the Department of State in a briefing about U.S. foreign policy and later at the Saudi Embassy. Much of the third day was spent at the Capitol building. While there we were taken on a guided tour of the building. After the tour we attended a few committee hearings. The highlight of the third day and perhaps the most important to me was meeting with Senator Akaka and having lunch with Patsy Mink who were both the representatives from my state. We spent the fourth day at the nation's Press Club. While there we listened to lectures given by five distinguished national journalists. The later part of that day was spent at the Smithsonian and the National Mall. On the fifth and last last of the conference we visited Arlington Cemetery and the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. We spent this day visiting other monuments and historic sites. While most of these events were carried on during the day you may wonder what we did during the evening. The evenings were spent at mock congress meetings. Mock congress was a simulation in which we attempted to introduce a bill and go through all the necessary process of passing that bill.

"Finally, I would like to conclude by thanking all the people who sponsored me and made this trip possible. Without them this unforgettable experience would not have been possible. Once again, I would like to thank the Senate, and all who have made this occasion possible. This goes a long way to demonstrating the true spirit of what the United States of America stands for, and I am proud to have taken part in this grand experiment. Thank you all."

"Matthew Adolpho is an exceptional person. I urge your support."

"One of the things that most touched and impressed me at the hearing about the nominees were their willingness to give of their time, and their hearts seem so open and so willing to come together on dealing with issues on the burial council. ## STATEMENT OF OBJECTIONS TO HOUSE BILL NO. 7

Honorable Members  
Sixteenth Legislature  
State of Hawaii

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 7, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Driver Education.'

The purpose of House Bill No. 7 is to delete the time restrictions of the motor vehicle driver education and training program operated by the Department of Education and to open enrollment in the program to public and private high school students.

Section 1 of Article X of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii prohibits the appropriation of public funds for the support or benefit of sectarian or private schools. In Spears v. Honda, 51 Haw. 1 (1968), the Hawaii Supreme Court considered but rejected the argument that the provision is not violated when funds are spent to defray costs incurred by private school students and not their schools. Accordingly, because House Bill No. 7 opens participation in the Department of Education student driver education program to private high school students, I believe it violates the Hawaii State Constitution.

For the foregoing reason, I am returning House Bill No. 7 without my approval.

Senator A. Kobayashi then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of Yukio Kitagawa for Chairman, Board of Agriculture, term to expire December 31, 1994, seconded by Senator Hagino.

Senator A. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this nomination.

"Mr. President, we have had many talks with Mr. Kitagawa. He knows our focus is on making agriculture the No. 1 industry in our state, equal to tourism, perhaps. I think this could be accomplished with the right focus and with aggressive marketing. We should be helping our farmers not just regulating them. We also should be helping the aquaculture industry, especially after the last flood. We should help the aquaculture farm on the other side of the island get back on its feet. We should also be supporting our coffee industry and supporting our milk industry, ensuring that we always have two milk-processing plants, not just one. I am sure that with Mr. Kitagawa's leadership, many of these could be

accomplished and we look forward to working with Mr. Kitagawa.

"I urge your confirmation."

Senator Chang also supported the nomination and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this appointment and confirmation.

"I have had the opportunity to travel throughout the state with Mr. Kitagawa and have watched him work with members of our agricultural community. I can say from personal observation that the farmers of our state know that Mr. Kitagawa has their best interest at heart. They feel that he's one of their own. He is, after all, from a rural community himself and I really believe that he has a feeling about him, a warmth that comforts the farmers and makes them comfortable that he will do his best for their interests. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura added his support and said:

I have known him for a number of years as a fellow resident of Wahiawa, as well

as in his professional capability. I have always held him in highest esteem and continue to do so.

"Personally, Mr. President, I would like to thank Mr. Kitagawa for his efforts in getting the livestock agriculture park moving. It has been talked about for many years and, hopefully, it will be implemented in the coming years.

"At this time, I would like to take this opportunity to express my absolute support for the confirmation of Mr. Yukio Kitagawa and ask my colleagues to join me in supporting him. Thank you."

Senator Solomon added her support and said:

"Mr. Kitagawa is a 'keiki o ka aina.' His record of public service is outstanding and has continued to this day.

"True, we have not always agreed with some of his positions as legislators, nevertheless, overall, we agree that it has been, for the most part, good for Hawaii. He, like all of us here today, in spite of and above all, is committed to what is best for Hawaii.

"I urge all of you to please vote in favor of Murray Towill because we will never find another person like him. Thank you."

Senator McMurdo added her support of Mr. Towill and said:

"Mr. President, I rise in support of this nomination.

"In all the years that I've been on the Tourism Committee, and although Murray is new as director he's been with the Business and Economic Development Department for quite a while, I have always found him easy to talk to. He will listen and he is responsive. I will back him fully. Thank you."

## FIFTY-NINTH DAY

**Friday, April 26, 1991**

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, convened at 12:10 o'clock p.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Nathan Mamo, St. John Vianney Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Eighth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Crozier introduced Mr. Roy Wickramaratna, "a close friend who is president of the Makakilo Community Association and a director of the Boy Scouts of America in Hawaii," and his brother Glenn who is visiting from Sri Lanka.

Senator Iwase introduced a group of 4th grade students from Kipapa Elementary School, their teachers: Mrs. Kan, Mrs. Dixon, Mrs. Markina and Mrs. Shimata, and chaperones: Mrs. Deveraturaoa, Mrs. Hettema, Mrs. Williams and Mrs. Baniaga.

Senator Koki then introduced Mr. Ronald Bright as follows:

"Mr. President, on behalf of Senators George and McCartney, it is an honor for me to introduce to this body a very special teacher. There are many things I could say about our honoree this morning.

"Through drama education, Castle High School teacher Ronald Bright has touched the lives of thousands of students, building confidence, character and self-esteem. He is considered an artist, humanist and educator who truly believes in human potential. He is able to get each student to 'reach a little higher and become the best that he or she can be.' He accepts all students, from the gifted and talented to the student with learning needs. He is regarded by the leaders of Thespian societies as one of the nation's top five high school musical theater directors. His productions have won national acclaim at the Annual International Thespian Society Festival.

"This summer the students of the Castle Performing Arts Center's Spring Musical 'Hello, Dolly!' have been invited to present their production, in its entirety, at the International Thespian Conference to be held on the campus of Ball State University in Muncie, Indiana. This musical is presently being performed at the Castle High School auditorium on three consecutive weekends and is truly superb!

"Ronald Bright was one of six Hawaii educators recently selected as a winner of the Hawaii Educator Award, funded by the Milken Family Foundation of Los Angeles. In March he received \$25,000 at a banquet in Los Angeles honoring outstanding elementary, middle and high school teachers nationwide. State Superintendent of Education Charles Toguchi presented the award.

"The banquet and awards presentation culminated a 3-day national educator awards retreat where teachers from across the country were recognized for their excellence.

"Mr. Bright truly personifies excellence in education. In 1976 he was honored as Hawaii's State Teacher of the Year, in addition to his many other tributes.

"The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, hereby congratulates Mr. Ronald Bright on winning the prestigious Hawaii Educator Award, commends him for his outstanding achievements in education, and extends best wishes for his continued success in the future.

"At this time I would like to ask Mr. Bright to please stand to be recognized."

The honoree rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Koki. Senator George presented him with a lei.

Senator McCartney in recognition of Mr. Bright added:

"Mr. President, I would like to echo the remarks of the previous speaker, Senator Koki. I would also like to share some personal remarks about Mr. Bright. I really don't know where to begin.

"Ron Bright is a man who has made a positive impact on many students and has turned around so many people's lives, including my own. He was one of my teachers at Castle High School. I know he was also a teacher of Charles Toguchi at Castle.

"A friend of mine who was heavy into drugs didn't go to school like he should. Mr. Bright got hold of him and changed that person's whole life and, today, that person is a success in our community.

"Mr. Bright, you really are a success. When we talk about teachers I think of you, and I look back at the students who you worked with. Every day when we used to go to the drama room or on those times that we used to go to your house, everybody would fight for your attention. You have that energy and enthusiasm and that love for the students and wherever you go and whatever you do they fight for your attention. They love you.

"Ron Bright is a man who has dedicated his life to teaching and to helping the students. I know he will continue to have that vision and foresight and continue to touch people's lives.

"Mr. Bright, from the bottom of my heart we appreciate you and we love you. Thank you."

Senator Hagino recognized the following individuals and organizations involved in the Hawaii Military Ohana Fund and stated as follows:

"Mr. President, it's my extreme honor to introduce our other guests on the floor with us today.

"Before I make my introduction, Mr. President, I'd like to take our members back to the beginning of the session, actually before the opening day ceremonies of the session. At that time, because of the impending possibility of a war in the Middle East, we made a very conscious decision to forego our traditional opening day ceremonies and asked the community and business people in our state to bear with us and honor our request that we tone down our opening day ceremonies and to also forego the traditional flowers and gifts that we normally receive.

"The business community did us one better, actually. They decided to try to start up a fund to help the families that were left behind, of the military service men and women that were serving in the Middle East. So they started a fund called the Hawaii Military Ohana Fund. The Legislature and government leaders were asked to

participate in this fund and I think it went beyond their wildest expectations.

"I would like, at this time, to honor the people who took a vital part in organizing and raising the money for this fund.

"Today, we have Mr. Tatsuya Minewaki, president of Foremost Dairies - Hawaii who is accompanied by Mr. Aki Ozaki, vice president, Cassandra Simmons and Bart Colucci. Mr. President, for special notation, I understand Mr. Minewaki is also going to be handing over to the fund a check in the amount of \$13,000 which will bring the fund total to over \$300,000. Mr. Minewaki deserves special recognition for that.

"We also have Ms. Pauline Worsham, vice president of community relations, Bank of Hawaii; Mr. Roy, chairman of the Military Affairs Council; Mr. Robert Robinson, president of the Chamber of Commerce; and Ms. Paula Helfrich, executive director of the Military Affairs Council.

"The Senators join me in thanking all of you for your hard work in making this a very worthwhile effort."

The honorees all rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and leis.

At 12:20 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

Senator Solomon then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I feel compelled at this time to report to you that your Senate committees were ready to deck our bills on Friday. I have attended numerous conference committee meetings, Mr. President, and I was shocked and embarrassed when we met with the House conferees and were politely informed, Mr. President, that they would deck their bills on Monday. I then checked with the Majority Leader and asked if there was any official documentation in that regard.

"Mr. President, on a point of information of the Chair, I would like to inquire if there is any official documentation sent over from the House requesting that we in the Senate had agreed to a change in the internal deadline?"

The Chair responded: "There is no such memo."

Senator Solomon continued:

"Mr. President, I find that embarrassing and appalling.

"Mr. President, all of your committees were negotiating in good faith. I sat in numerous conference committee meetings where the House indicated to us, 'Why rush? Why worry? We have till Monday to deck our bills.' We in the Senate continued to negotiate in good faith, Mr. President, because we have an obligation, an obligation to the State of Hawaii, to the people out there who are waiting for the outcome of many, many bills that they were so interested in.

"I was also appalled, Mr. President, by the blatant violation of rules that we had set up on how we would conduct our conference committees. We met with the House on the first pass. We threw our disagreements and agreements across. We came on the second pass. In many, many conference committees the Senate accepted the House amendments. The House accepted the Senate amendments. And then just in the last moment when we came to an agreement the House asked for reconsideration.

"Mr. President, how can we negotiate business in good faith if the House is unwilling to comply to the very rules that they themselves had agreed to? If that's the case, Mr. President, why have rules? Why have internal deadlines? And I'm speaking, Mr. President, I am speaking as the Majority Floor Leader in defense of the majority subject matter committees that got their work done on time. They've made concessions so that we could deck those bills on Friday.

"Mr. President, this cannot continue. We should have some kind of agreement, or at least the House should have the courtesy to notify us.

"The budget bill, Mr. President, was the only bill that we had an understanding that there was some 'pilikia,' we had no understanding on other bills.

"At this time, Mr. President, I'd like to make a recommendation for the President's consideration that all bills that were not decked on Monday should be killed. And this message should be sent to the House.

"Thank you very much."

Senator Cobb also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Briefly, with a certain degree of reluctance, Mr. President, I would like to rise on a point of personal privilege.

"What we have witnessed over the last week is sort of a recurring drama that happens virtually every year and is a classic example of negotiating under the Russian plan. And there are always three elements to negotiating under the Russian plan. One is to say, 'What's mine is mine; what's your's is negotiable. Come let us reason together.' The second is to make unreasonable demands. And the third is to always ignore deadlines. All three of those elements in classic form are available on a recurring basis again this year.

"I note that a petition is being circulated for an extension of the session, and it just seems to be a matter of routine that on the first Monday when we're due to adjourn in April that such a petition appears as if by rote from somebody's word processor. The wording is the same, only the date is changed. And I personally would like to express a degree of reluctance in signing such a petition since it seems to be done, one, on such a routine basis and, two, there's been no specific agreement as to whether or not all bills will be extended. There's been no official notice of that fact as alluded to by the Majority Floor Leader. And I think she is speaking for this member of the Majority, as well. And three, we seem to be losing sight of one of the most important elements of the legislative process and, that is, respect for deadlines which are followed only when it's convenient and which are changed also when it's convenient.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Iwase also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise in support of the statements made by the Majority Floor Leader.

"I'm the new Senator here. I'm a freshman and it's my first opportunity to observe the process. But I also recognize the importance of setting deadlines, setting rules, and abiding by them. The deadlines in this case compel all members of this body, as well as the House, to make decisions about the budget and about other bills. In that regard, those of us who sit on conference committees sit down in good faith, negotiate in good faith, secure commitments from the other side, and expect that those commitments be adhered to.

"We also expect that the rules of the game do not change. We don't change the rules in the middle of a football game. We don't go to the referee and say that the rules are now not first and 10 but first and 15. We do not have situations where like sands in the shifting

desert we change; we don't know what's happening out there. We have to have a level playing field.

"Because we have a continuation of this kind of shifting from the rules, we've run into some difficulties here. Because of that we are now faced with an extension of this Legislature, an extension which appears to be unpopular. I have received calls about it. And because of that too, we leave in the pike very important projects beyond courthouses on the Big Island, which are in the tsunami zone, school construction and improvement for our children, shelter for our homeless, and transportation improvements for those suffering through intolerable traffic congestion.

"Mr. President, I have before me the state of the state address by Governor Waihee. I have also before me a newspaper, Sunday's edition of the Advertiser which talks about the growing budget of the state and the city. The Senate has attempted to adhere to the state of the state address of Governor Waihee. We have moved forward to fund projects for the homeless, for transportation, for economic development, for the visitor industry. I do not recall seeing in this state of the state address as the No. 1 priority for the State of Hawaii a courthouse on the Big Island.

"We have also attempted, in the course of our deliberations, to recognize the need for economic stability. We have attempted to craft a capital improvement budget which will do just that. We seem to be running into some difficulty over some who wish to continually add to the capital improvement budget. I hope that we will not allow such projects to have other more important projects wither on the vine because of some building which may be located in a tsunami area.

"I would ask that all of those who are in deliberations come back to their responsibilities, come home to their responsibilities which I believe is economy and common sense.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator B. Kobayashi also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, I speak in support of the first speaker.

We have a bicameral legislature and so long as we have a bicameral legislature certain things must be abided to. One of the things that the Senate tried to do in good faith was try to adjourn on time as much as possible. That did not seem possible on Friday. Nonetheless, conferees were trying to finish up as many items as possible so that we would not have too many things potentially holding us up this week when we started today's session. The fact that there are a number of bills, non-fiscal bills, that are currently supposedly in conference and supposedly still alive increases the likelihood that there might be an adjournment for matters other than fiscal and budget items.

"I think that we should have a very clear understanding that we on the Senate side have proceeded in good faith, tried to accomplish the people's business and our business on time with a timely adjournment to the extent possible. The fact that the House seems to have had indications from their leadership that they had a second deadline which we were not aware of put your conferees at a disadvantage in terms of negotiation. And that disadvantage, I think, is something that we cannot tolerate. We have to have a level playing field not only in terms of the rules of the game but also the negotiation table. And if the negotiation tables are tilted toward one

side because of a difference of deadlines, I think this is a disadvantage in this case against the Senate.

"We should at this point ask the House and Senate leadership to get together to try to adjourn on time and proceed to have as clear as possible rules that are the same on both sides of the table. Thank you."

Senator McMurdo also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege on the same subject.

"When we began getting the feedback that the House had a different internal deadline, it was quite demoralizing to the staff who were working so hard to try to meet the deadlines which were set and for many bills that was Thursday not Friday, and that's where we were already hearing that oh, it didn't matter. Not only is this demoralizing to the staff, it sort of makes everybody wonder just what is going on.

"Over the weekend, I am sad to say that everywhere I went somebody came up and criticized the Legislature, Mr. President, not the House, the Legislature. So in effect the Senate, and those of us who had tried to get the job done as we were instructed to, and had agreed to, were tarred with the same brush. I think it's high time ... I've only been here seven years and I know there are many of you who've been in much longer and have never finished the session on time -- I think it's about time we took a good look at this and tried to meet on common ground to get this kind of thing settled. It costs money, it causes inconvenience, and it generally is not a very good way to do business.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Cobb again rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, historian George Santayana said it and Robert F. Kennedy often repeated it, 'Those who forget history are condemned to repeat it.' And I remember a long time ago in a different galaxy when as a freshman legislator you led me through the winter land of Siberia in the House, and that was the year when we had no CIP and no special authority of an operating budget. We went home, on time. And that event had a very salutary effect on future negotiations because after that event it was the rule, not the exception, to adjourn on time, and to adjourn with a budget and with a CIP.

"Now, if we look at the last ten years, eight out of those ten years we've had extensions. We have to look now for exceptions when we adjourn on time, and those are few and far in between.

"Mr. President, I for one am prepared to go home as soon as the remaining bills that have already been decked have been passed, even if that means no budget and no CIP. And if we do not pass a budget, the law very clearly states that the Governor has the authority to continue spending at the authorized levels from the previous Legislature. I think, Mr. President, an event like that would have a salutary effect and, after tonight, I for one will be prepared to make a motion to adjourn sine die, with or without a budget or CIP.

"Thank you."

Senator Yamasaki also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I would like to add my comments under the request for a point of personal privilege.

"This morning through KHVH I learned that the Speaker made a public announcement or was interviewed saying that the hang-up is on the \$74 million Judiciary project in Hilo. He also made a comment on the proviso that he has tried to tighten up on the flexibility that the administration has in the budget. He said that just as the governor needs flexibility he also needs the flexibility in running the state House; that he needs to transfer funds for research and if he cannot do it he would be hamstrung.

"I think that the House has broken the rules of the game. The Speaker had said that all releases on the budget would be done jointly, as we have done in the past. We in the Senate have kept a tight lip on what is going on. You know that the press has been coming after us to see what kind of progress we are making. We have said that we are moving along and that we think we can wrap up the budget, but, the House has broken the rules and all flood gates are now open.

"Thank you."

Senator Solomon then rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, rising to comment on the previous speaker's remarks.

"Mr. President, what I find frustrating is the Senate getting messages from the House through the media.

"Mr. President, did you receive any official word in regard to the previous speaker's remarks?"

The Chair answered:

"The response from the Chair is 'no.' We were not notified by the House."

Senator Solomon continued:

"Mr. President, I find this devastating. Devastating, Mr. President, to the point where I think we really have to think this over and come up with a response. I'm hoping that our leadership would get together. I'm hoping that the Majority Leader would see fit to reconvene the leadership to try to work out this situation with the House. I'm simply in shock about this information that has just been presented to us from the Ways and Means chairman. Thank you."

Senator Blair also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I agree with the previous speaker to the extent that there needs to be a meeting of the House and Senate leadership to discuss a number of matters, but I want to be sure that we don't paint with too broad a brush. With respect to the conference committees that I chaired my counterparts in the House did attempt in each instance to meet the deadlines as set. So, while there may be reasons to complain, we should be cautious not to use too broad a brush. Thank you."

Senator Cobb, on a point of information, asked:

"Mr. President, will we be having an evening session so that we can pass all remaining bills and be prepared to adjourn sine die?"

The Chair said:



"We will have an evening session."

Senator Reed also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, at the risk of changing the subject, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"Senate Rules, Rule No. 82 entitles questions to State officer, as I'm sure you're aware, Mr. President, this rule allows any member of the Senate to ask any question of any state officer and receive a response within 24 hours. And given the presence of Mr. Paty in the audience, I don't want to miss the opportunity. The rules require that I read the letter that will be delivered today to Mr. Paty:

'Dear Mr. Paty,

'Pursuant to Senate Rule No. 82, this is to request your answers to the following questions:

'No. 1, why have you not responded to my numerous requests for a copy of the Department of Land and Natural Resources investigative report concerning the Pacific Whale Foundation, and

'No. 2, when will a copy of that report be made available to me?

"I have several other comments that I did want to have incorporated in the Journal. I don't want to belabor the point, but I do want to stress that this was a very important measure and one that needs to be thanked so generously to all the members who worked so very hard on it.

"Aloha also is extended to all the members of the Women's Caucus for without their support we would not have this measure before us.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Cobb also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, except for the statement of being the Majority Floor Leader, I'd like to incorporate the Senator from the Third District's remarks as my own.

"I clearly recognize our responsibility that if we have an issue or dispute that cannot be resolved that we extend ourselves. But I think that it's been too much of a recurring pattern in the last ten years, eight out of ten, and this will make it nine out of eleven years that we have failed to adjourn on time and, thus, failed to respect the deadlines.

"I appreciate the sentiments and remarks of the Majority Floor Leader and as the other Senator who did not sign the petition would like to ask that her remarks so be incorporated. Thank you."

#### ADJOURNMENT

At 5:38 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Solomon, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Tuesday, April 30, 1991.

## SIXTY-FIRST DAY

**Tuesday, April 30, 1991**

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1991, convened at 12:00 o'clock noon with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Captain David Maack, Chaplain, United States Air Force, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Aki who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Sixtieth Day.

The soldier happens to be a woman, Private First Class Samantha Ditusa, who happens to be a Hawaii resident and who also happens to be in the gallery today.

"Private Ditusa is a 1989 Radford High School graduate, from your district, Mr. President. She celebrated her 19th birthday while serving in Saudi Arabia. Private Ditusa served in a Patriot Unit that so successfully shot down Scud missiles launched by Saddam Hussein.

"I speak for the entire Senate when I say, 'To you Samantha, we appreciate your courageous action on our behalf. We would like you to please stand and be recognized by the Senate."

Private Ditusa rose to be recognized and was greeted with a round of applause.

Senator Reed continued:

"Mr. President, Samantha is home on leave visiting family and friends. She'll return to Ft. Bliss, Texas, later this month, and may be one of those who is ordered to return to the Persian Gulf.

"With Samantha today are her father Sgt. 1st Class Salvatore Ditusa and her mother Margaret Ditusa, along with a family friend, Tripler Army Medical Center Provost Marshal Don Devaney."

Mr. and Mrs. Ditusa and Mr. Devaney rose to be recognized.

Senator Levin then recognized Miss Marla Wade as follows:

"Mr. President, many of us have student interns who work in our offices and they work on virtually a volunteer basis, supposedly about half time. I have been fortunate enough this year to have an intern who has worked on a volunteer basis, double time. Those who have had any dealings with my office know exactly how hard she's worked, sometimes seven days a week, sometimes 24 hours a day. We took an informal vote in my office and unanimously she was selected legislative intern of the year.

"I would like to present a certificate, if I may, on behalf of this body to Miss Marla Wade"

"Unless the House Republicans know more than us Senate Democrats, I feel that their comments were unfair



and inaccurate. I think our Ways and Means Committee chairman, speaking on a point of personal privilege yesterday for the first time in his 32 or 33 years as a legislator, gives you an indication that he has always dealt very fairly with his House counterpart. I think the statements by the Republicans were not necessary. The House members should be lucky that Senator Yamasaki, the chairman of Ways and Means, has not taken out his sword yet.

"On a brighter note, on behalf of all the members of the Senate, I would like to extend our best wishes to Big Island Senator Solomon and her future husband on their forthcoming marriage. Congratulations and best wishes to both of you!"

Senator Solomon also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Thank you very much, Senator Matsuura. I would also like to thank all of my colleagues for the 'bachelorette' party.

"On a more serious note, Mr. President, following up and speaking in support of the previous speaker. Your budget liaisons in the Ways and Means Committee feel that we have done our homework. We have dealt very fairly with the House and we're hoping that the House would see their way clear to come back to the negotiation table so that we can go home."

Senator Cobb rose on a point of personal and said:

"Mr. President, on a separate matter, Mr. President, we'll be approaching the subject of gun control next year. I noticed the sign posted next to your office quoted a man from the time of Abraham Lincoln that said, 'No man's life, liberty or property or assault weapon is safe while the Legislature is in session,' and on behalf of some of my colleagues I'd like to present the completely new 18th edition of 'Guns Illustrated 1986' to our Judiciary chairman.

"This has the original technical articles, complete illustrated catalogue of all current guns and accessories and up-to-the minute test reports. For the benefit of the attorney general, he can tell the attorney general this is the journal for gun buffs. And I wish our Judiciary chairman all the luck next year. He certainly has my support in reaching an amicable solution to the problem of gun control of automatic weapons. Thank you."

Senator Blair responded:

"Mr. President, if I may, I would like to pass this (catalogue) to my subcommittee chairman (Senator Chang) who will be holding the interim hearings." (Laughter.)

Senator Crozier also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, on behalf of the Senators and the staff, thank you very much for the party last night. I spent most of the evening talking to a number of Senate staff people and learned that they were very grateful to have the opportunity to serve the people of Hawaii for the past four months. They all feel that they made a contribution and they're proud that Hawaii is a little better place because of their experience. Thank you very much."

Senator Tungpalan also rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, also included in the headlines today was the issue about family leave. I did want to extend

my gratitude to the press. They covered it very well, especially the Advertiser and the Star-Bulletin.

"Without the help of our 'sixth column' we certainly wouldn't have gotten out the message for the need of this piece of social legislation and we are sincerely indebted. It shows that when we can work collectively things do get done. Thank you."

### STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT

Senator Blair, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1567) recommending that H.C.R. No. 85, S.D. 1, as amended in S.D. 2, be adopted.

Senator Blair then moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1567 be adopted and H.C.R. No. 85, S.D. 2, be adopted, seconded by Senator Holt.

Senator George rose to speak against the adoption of the resolution and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise in opposition to this particular resolution. I don't know that this isn't the absolutely flawless example of what we ought not to be doing. It has caused a lot of work on the part of a lot of people. It's so we had to cut down a tree because copies of this resolution have to go to the cast of the 'Field of Dreams' and the cast of 'Eight Men Out.' That's an awful lot of people. I don't know that any of them care what we do or what we think. It's a subject matter that's inappropriate and I for one think it makes us look silly.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Crozier spoke in support of the resolution and said:

"Mr. President, speaking in favor of the resolution.

"Mr. President, this resolution is very timely. For the last four days the media has been walking around the lanai looking for stories. They have asked us the same questions a thousand times, got the same answers. Their bosses are concerned that they have nothing to report. So a few wiser media types got hold of this resolution and made quite an issue of it. I'm sure they will benefit by their ability to dig up any kind of story. So just to keep the media happy and let them have something to do, I'm glad we have this resolution.

"Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan also spoke in favor of the resolution and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of this resolution.

"When we heard this in Judiciary, it wasn't a matter of whether or not this was something that had gone on in 1919. The time didn't matter. What was priceless was the fact that we stand here attempting to undo what was done to this individual. If you are a person or body that really considers civil rights and considers timeless quality of having the opportunity to be dealt with fairly, then this is a matter that should be taken up at this time.

"If we are a body that is resolute in its support of fair treatment to all regardless of their economic standing, then this is the resolution to take up today.

"Certainly, the fact that he was poor shouldn't have been a consideration, or the fact that he was perhaps duped into believing his superiors shouldn't be a reason for us to stand in the way of looking into a further investigation as to whether or not he was dealt with properly.

"I look at this issue as an issue where we can stand up for the rights of all individuals regardless of what side of the track or what side of the town they come from. This man was a very poor individual who trusted in his superiors, who trusted in his manager, who trusted in his players, went out and did his very best, and still got done in.

"I certainly am not going to stand here today and allow that to happen or continue to happen, so I will be voting 'yes' on this measure."

Senator Cobb also supported the resolution and said:

"Mr. President, I speak in favor of this resolution and in doing so note that there should be no time limit on righting a wrong. If the man was acquitted of all charges and that this resolution while it may be made fun of by the media, perhaps the same media overlooks the fact that this body also adopted a resolution, and I commend the Judiciary chairman for it as well as the other members, a resolution expressing its outrage for the young man who had suffered racial discrimination in officers training school in the Marine Corps.

"And I would further like to incorporate the remarks of the great lady from Pearl City as my own in support of this measure.

"Thank you."

Senator Blair added his support and said:

"Mr. President, I hadn't intended to speak on this House concurrent resolution but since it's been disparaged, as chairman of the committee, I rise to speak in favor of the resolution.

"It's very easy to look at the other chamber's priorities and disparage theirs when it doesn't match our own, but I think that's a practice we should avoid.

"With respect to this subject, it was of sufficient general interest that two movies were recently made about it and many thousands of Hawaii citizens attended those movies. Perhaps the history of baseball is irrelevant to the Senator from the Windward side. If so, certainly, I wouldn't argue that her priorities are wrong, only that she is dismissing important aspects of modern American life and history.

"Baseball is an important part of American life and Joe Jackson is an important part of baseball history. It's an area that deserves to be reviewed. Just as most of us are pleased that the world is now reviewing the fraud of Abner Doubleday's alleged invention of baseball, I think we'll all benefit if this aspect of baseball's history is properly recorded. But if other people think that's irrelevant, they're certainly free to vote against the resolution. Thank you."

Senator George then said:

"Mr. President, in response to the previous speaker, I do not perceive the matter as irrelevant to the American

way of life. I perceive it as irrelevant to our mission in this room. I agree in large measure with the House member who was quoted a couple of weeks ago in the press as saying that we ought to pay attention to the things about which we can make a difference. We really shouldn't meddle around in matters national or international, unless they have particular relevance to our own situation.

"I think if we want to right wrongs, there are other matters we might well take up. One might be correcting the dreadful reporting of Captain McVay that indeed has some ties to those of us who live in Hawaii. And there are other matters which do concern us.

"I feel that this is not a matter about which we can make a difference, nor should we spend our time, our staff time and our valuable resource on it.

"Thank you."

Senator Blair then responded:

"Mr. President, since the members of the Judiciary Committee are not members of the Ways and Means Committee, we had the time available to us to deal with matters that might not have been prioritized high enough to have been taken care of if we had adjourned on schedule. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. On motion by Senator Holt, seconded by Senator Chang and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 5 was adopted and H.B. No. 1952, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ACCESSORY USES ON AGRICULTURAL LANDS," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22. Noes, none. Excused, 3 (Koki, Mizuguchi, Nakasato).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 16 (H.B. No. 664, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 1):

By unanimous consent, action on Conf. Com. Rep. No. 16 and H.B. No. 664, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SALES TO OWNER-OCCUPANTS," was deferred until Friday, May 3, 1991.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 20 (H.B. No. 937, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1):

On motion by Senator Yamasaki, seconded by Senator Levin and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 20 was adopted and H.B. No. 937, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22. Noes, none. Excused, 3 (Koki, Mizuguchi, Nakasato).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 29 (H.B. No. 972, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Chang moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 29 be adopted and H.B. No. 972, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Levin.

Senator Matsuura rose to speak against the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, some of the concerns that I have is to clarify some of the language in the legislation. One of the concerns is the definition and the jurisdiction of state waters because when you read some of the existing

language in the statute, it reads: 'State marine waters shall be defined as extending from the upper reaches of the wash of the waves on shore seaward to the limits of the state lease power and management authority.'

"It goes on '... including the United States territorial sea, notwithstanding any laws to the contrary.' In another section of the statute, we have the definition of 'boundaries,' ... 'The State of Hawaii shall consist of all the islands together with their appurtenant reefs and territorial and archipelagic waters including Territory of Hawaii on the date of enactment of the Admission Act, except the atoll known as Palmyra Island, together with the appurtenant reefs and territorial waters but this state shall not be deemed to include the Midway Island,' and so on.

"I want to ask the chairman of the Agriculture Committee that when we talk about the jurisdictional power regarding this bill on the longline, are we limiting our jurisdiction to three miles seaward? If it includes the archipelagic waters, then it will have an extremely harmful effect on the commercial fishing industry."

The President asked if the chairman of the Agriculture and Environmental Protection Committee would yield to the question and the chairman responded in the affirmative and answered:

"Mr. President, I certainly share the concerns of the Senator from Hilo.

"As has been discussed, this bill has been an interesting proposal to work with. There are complex questions of state and federal jurisdiction. The bill was crafted in collaboration with many of the people who interact with the Western Pacific Fishery Management Council (WPFMC), including the director of the Board of Land and Natural Resources, Mr. Paty, and his deputy attorneys general, Mr. William Tam and Mr. Steven Michaels, all working together in order to produce a product that we believe threads the many fine lines that define state and federal jurisdiction.

"With respect to the claims of state jurisdiction, the state is certainly not prepared to concede any jurisdiction over waters that we have long claimed and asserted for ourselves, including archipelagic waters in the exclusive economic zone.

"What we are saying in this bill is that with respect to this very specific activity, that is to say longline fishing, we are definitely and immediately asserting jurisdiction over our territorial sea. And beyond that, working in collaboration with the federal government and with our state authorities establishing jurisdiction over longline fishing activity, prohibiting that activity in other kinds of waters but leaving the details of those prohibitions, the when and the where, to a collaborative effort between the state and federal governments.

"So in short answer to the question, Mr. President, we are not waiving jurisdiction in any archipelagic marine waters or exclusive economic zones, but we are asserting jurisdiction within our territorial sea for the purpose of regulating longline fishing."

Senator Matsuura then continued:

"So if the jurisdiction is three miles, that makes it even better as far as the bill is concerned.

"The other concern that I have is that this bill also mandated that whatever the WPFMC adopts as rules will automatically become a Hawaii state law. WPFMC membership is made up of residents of the State of

Hawaii, a resident of American Samoa, Guam and the Northern Marianas. They are all American citizens. When this council adopts a rule, what this bill does is automatically make the adopted rule to become law in the State of Hawaii. That's what it does.

"This is the first time that I know of when an agency, which is not a legislative body, enacts rules and automatically they become state law. It's comparable to our Land Board passing a rule and it automatically becomes state law. The WPFMC members who come from the trust territories, may have interests somewhat different from the State of Hawaii. So you may be adopting rules that may not be suited for the State of Hawaii. That's the second concern I really have.

"How do you resolve these kinds of problems? I was told that the WPFMC has already prepared and recommended rules that address the problem of longlines. Now, with the Secretary of the Interior to sign the rules, it should resolve the problem that we're facing today. I'm told that the Secretary will most likely sign it this month.

"My objection to this bill is that if that proposed rule is going to be adopted, why are we passing a bill that will further bring problems. If the council enacts some other rules and they become state law, why can't we just wait and see if the new adopted rules by this council is going to resolve our problem because they have already had public hearings; they have addressed the Kauai problem; they have addressed the Waianae problem. So now we're attempting to pass this legislation and further complicate the issue.

"I'll be voting 'no' on this measure."

Senator Chang then stated:

"Mr. President, in brief response.

"The issue of delegation of legislative authority was raised by the committee chairman for the Committee on Judiciary, and we did enter into discussions with the Office of the Attorney General. And as the Senator from Hilo correctly perceives this is another area of complexity. However, the two deputies that did work on the bill in collaboration with the Department of Land and Natural Resources are fully confident that the structure of the bill does not represent an improper delegation of powers. It does, however, represent what they believe to be a workable compromise between the issues of federal preemption and state delegation of powers.

"The operative provisions are that the state does prohibit longline fishing in these areas, but the details are to be worked out in collaboration between the State of Hawaii and the federal government. And so it's not so much the what and why, which has already been decided, but the where and when that will be decided by this collaborative effort.

"As to why we're passing the bill now, I want to point out that this proposal results from a very serious problem that occurs mostly in our near-shore waters, much of it off the Waianae Coast. The last report we have of violence was April 15th which is not that long ago, where a longliner attempted to ram a smaller boat and came away from that affray with some new puncture wounds and some new rifle puncture wounds in its shiny new hull. These kinds of incidents can't be allowed to go on, Mr. President. We have to take action now.

"In looking at the Atlantic and Gulf fisheries, similar federal councils in those areas had forwarded recommendations to the Secretary of Commerce. The

Secretary of Commerce failed to act in those instances and we cannot be fully confident that they recommendations of our Western Pacific Fishery Management Council will obtain a different result.

"So considering all of the different factors, your committee concluded that it was a very serious problem and it was very important to the State of Hawaii to assert jurisdiction in its own territorial seas and position itself to work collaboratively with the federal government in other kinds of waters.

"Thank you."

Senator Matsuura then added:

"Mr. President, there's one item that I left out.

"To resolve this longline problem one of the things that we can do would be to limit the number of commercial fishing permits. That means you limit the number of boats coming in to the State of Hawaii and using Hawaii as a base. The WPFMC is the best organization to regulate the number of fishing vessels coming to Hawaii. They're the best organization to resolve this fishing problem because in this industry you always have conflicts between the commercial fishermen and the recreational fishermen. These kinds of problems are best addressed by this council. Controlling of fishing gear by legislative measures is a mistake. I think we're going in the wrong direction. It's easier to let this council handle these kinds of problems. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan then rose to ask if the chairman of the Agriculture and Environmental Protection Committee would yield to a question. The Chair posed the question and Senator Chang having answered in the affirmative, Senator Tungpalan asked:

"Mr. President, on page 1, it states, 'It is unlawful to engage in longline fishing or to sell or offer for sale any marine life taken with longline fishing gear within the boundaries of the State's territorial sea.' Would this permit those who do catch through longline fishing to sell in waters or in areas outside of our area. In other words, one of the complaints that I've been getting from my constituents is that many of these fishermen do not sell here on our island or throughout the state. What they do is they pack the fish and they sell it in Japan or in other areas outside of our state. I was wondering if this language would prohibit them for doing that."

Senator Chang answered:

"Mr. President, if I understand the question correctly, the Senator is wondering whether products from ocean fishing activity could be sold without the state as well as within. And the answer is 'yes,' as is the case with most agricultural products -- macadamia nuts, coffee, sugar, pineapple, and the like. The producers are gatherers of these products make a market determination as to whether their produce will be directed."

Senator Tungpalan continued:

"If that is the case then you're saying to me that it is their option to either choose to do that or they must abide by our regulations here inasmuch as longline fishing is concerned.

"My point is this, I think we all recognize that fish is very costly on our market. It's not helping our market not to have the fish that are in our waters, and if we're going to allow for them to market this outside this state it will have a detrimental impact on our islands. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura then added:

"Mr. President, I just want to clarify the previous Senator's question.

"What is pending before the WPFMC is that when they restrict certain areas, such as around Kauai and Waianae from longline fishing, the fish caught in that restricted area can't be brought into the state. Even to transship you can't bring them into the State of Hawaii. What this rule does is to restrict the area in which you can use longline as a fishing gear. You can bring them into the state if the fish is caught outside of this area."

Senator Blair also rose to inquire if the chairman of the Agriculture and Environmental Protection Committee would yield to a question and the chairman having asked to hear the question, Senator Blair queried:

"Mr. President, I see a potential for conflict between paragraphs 'b' and 'c.' I think there's an easy way to resolve it and I want to be sure that the record is clear.

"To be more specific, paragraph 'b' makes it unlawful to engage in longline fishing in the territorial seas, which I understand is the three mile limit, and subsection 'c' adopts regulations promulgated by WESPAC. I can conceive of a possibility that WESPAC might adopt regulations which would allow longline fishing within the territorial seas of Hawaii. I want to make sure that paragraph 'b' would take precedence over paragraph 'c' in the event that rules adopted under paragraph 'c' allow longline fishing within the three mile limit."

Senator Chang answered:

"Mr. President, paragraph 'b' is a statement with respect to the territorial sea, and paragraph 'c,' subsection (1), is a statement of prohibition with respect to the state marine waters and those areas under the Western Pacific Council's jurisdiction."

Senator Blair then continued:

"Mr. President, I believe that the response is that the territorial seas are not a sub-section of the greater seas covered by paragraph 'c.' If that's correct, and I'm not sure it is, there would be no conflict between 'b' and 'c.'

"But since I'm not entirely convinced, I'd like the record to reflect that should there be any conflict between 'b' and 'c' it is my understanding in voting on this that 'b' would be paramount in any such conflict. I will yield to Senator Chang if he would like to clarify that further."

Senator Chang answered:

"The Judiciary chairman's understanding is correct, Mr. President."

Senator Reed also in support of the measure then said:

"Mr. President, your Committee on Agriculture and Environmental Planning exhaustively studied this particular issue, and I'm convinced that restricted longline fishing is positive both for our environment and for local fishermen. I urge my colleagues to support this measure."

Senator Holt rose to speak against the bill and said:

"Mr. President, speaking against the bill and speaking as a recreational fisherman.



"This bill will do nothing to resolve the conflicts between longline fishermen and local commercial and recreational fishing other than WESPAC has been able to accomplish so far. Thank you."

Senator Blair then added:

"Mr. President, I have one other matter that I'd like to try to create a legislative record on, in the event there is litigation on this in the future. It has to do with a question that was discussed earlier. My name came up along with that of couple of deputy attorney generals who've looked into this issue. It is to say whether or not, as a matter of law as well as a matter of policy, we should adopt rules and regulations promulgated by a federal entity as state law.

"From a policy perspective I'm troubled, but if it's legal I'll go along with it reluctantly, because of the need to preserve the fisheries of our state. I would, however, like to point out for the record that the language of the bill can be interpreted two ways. The specific language, and I'm speaking now in particular page 1, line 16, it talks about 'incorporates by reference the rules adopted by WPRFMC ....' It's not explicit that that's talking about future rules adopted by WPRFMC. In the event that a court reviews this in the future and comes to the conclusion that it would be unconstitutional for us to adopt by reference rules which were not currently in effect, because we thereby delegate our authority as a Legislature to another body not duly constituted, I hope that court will interpret this statute as limiting itself to those rules which have currently been adopted by WPRFMC and not future rules. There is no reason why such a construction would be inconsistent with the plain language of the bill.

"Thank you."

Senator Ikeda rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, on January 18 of this year Safeway Hawaii announced their decision to not stock Foremost milk in its stores. This move caused a great deal of concern because in 1982 when Safeway sought a license to distribute milk in Hawaii it stated that granting them a license would not affect the shelf space held or made available to locally processed milk. However, because Meadow Gold sells both mainland and island-fresh milk with no distinction between the two except for the island-fresh designation on some of the cartons, Safeway's policy does in fact reduce the availability of local milk to consumers.

"It was at this point that the Senator from the Sixth Senatorial District generated a resolution on this subject and the chair of the Committee on Agriculture arranged a meeting with Safeway to discuss the problem. I'm pleased to report that they have responded. I have here a copy of a letter that was addressed to Mr. Kitagawa, chairman of the Department of Agriculture and it reads:

'Dear Mr. Kitagawa:

Please accept my apologies for the delay in formally informing you of Safeway's decision to restock Foremost fluid milk in our stores. This letter is to let you know that we have reviewed our operations and have given preliminary approval to putting Foremost back in our stores.

You will be receiving a more formal letter from me outlining reasons for this decision.

Thank you for your understanding during this time. We look forward to working more closely with you in the future.

"I would like to congratulate Safeway for their responsiveness and sensitivity to this issue, and I hope that they will resolve the Big Island situation in like manner.

And I would like to ask the Department of Agriculture to increase their marketing of island-fresh products and inform and educate the consuming public to the fact that if milk isn't labeled island-fresh, it isn't.

At this time, Senator Nakasato, on behalf of Senators Koki, McCartney and himself, introduced Mr. Koichi Takakura of Okinawa who was seated in the gallery. Senator Nakasato said, "Mr. Takakura was introduced to the Senate five years ago and it was at that time that he started the construction of his dream project, a huge golf course in Okinawa that cost him over \$400 million with a \$70 million club house on three-and-a-half acres."

Senator McCartney then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I'd like to set the record straight again regarding the University of Hawaii on-campus arena issue. In this morning's sports page of the Advertiser the headline reads, 'Wallace "embarrassed" by 4,000-seat arena.'

"I want to read a few quotes that he made. He said the 'expansion may never occur. "Four thousand seats isn't enough for anybody," Wallace said. I said all along they would go with 4,000 seats. I'll not be around when they have 10,000 seats. I'll be too old.... They should have given the money to Windward Community College.... Anything less than 10,000 is an embarrassment.'

"He also said in another column that 'What we're talking about is just another Bloch Arena with a shiny roof.' He was fairly fumed and he said this is a 'glorified high school arena.'

"Also, in the Star-Bulletin this afternoon, he said that if we're going to build a 4,000-seat arena, don't bother. Instead of wasting the money on a small arena we should give it to Windward Community College.

"Mr. President, I just want to state for the record, I'm a Senator who's not embarrassed by what our Conference Committee has done. I'm proud of what they did, and I don't think it's an embarrassment. I think we took a very tough stand. We took care of education first. We took care of our priorities. We took care of Maui Community College. We took care of Windward Community College, the College of Education, the Hawaiian Studies building. I am very proud of what the conferees have done.

"I think his remarks are inaccurate, premature and uncalled for. I don't know where in the proviso language or any language in the budget where it specifies 4,000 seats. So he is totally inaccurate and wrong about that. I think what the conferees did was to try and find common ground on this issue, to find a win-win situation where we could take care of educational needs and still keep the arena alive. That is why the \$32 million is in place. We want to keep the arena alive. Nobody is killing the arena.

"He talks about a roof, a shiny roof. The roof was Stan Sheriff's idea to save millions of dollars. And if we go to this new design put up by the Tempcor Corporation, with an aluminum dome, we're going to save millions of

dollars, so we can put in more seats. So it's not a shiny roof and a glorified high school arena.

"Mr. President, I commend your conferees for taking a tough stand in supporting education and finding a win-win situation that would also keep the arena alive and to keep the issue going. They did an excellent job and they should be commended.

"The remarks by the basketball coach, in my mind, are way out of line and inaccurate, and nobody is talking about 4,000 seats. I just want to set that record straight.

"Thank you."

Senator Solomon also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, speaking on a point of personal privilege, in support of the previous speaker.

"Mr. President, I would like to remind the basketball coach that he should pay more attention to his win-lose record. Perhaps, that is what he should be embarrassed about.

"Thank you very much."

Senator McMurdo rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

"This bill, in effect, would limit the sale of tobacco products from vending machines. Only bars and other businesses, such as cabarets, that are off-limits to those under 18 years of age are permitted to dispense these products from vending machines under this bill.

"Mr. President, if anything else, this bill makes it more difficult for our youths to purchase cigarettes. As Dr. Lewin, our health director stated, a survey by the Health Department showed that 60 percent of our youngsters who smoke buy cigarettes from vending machines. In the April 21st Sunday Advertiser-Star-Bulletin, it was reported that a 15-year-old girl from Kaimuki Intermediate School buys her cigarettes from machines. I have here an article in which another young man who is a student at Kaimuki Intermediate, a 13-year-old, gets his cigarettes from vending machines.

"Mr. President, these numbers scare me! Especially, in light of the fact that the use of tobacco products is a serious public health problem and that as many as 390,000 Americans die each year from its use. The real tragedy of these deaths is the fact that there are hundreds of thousands of new smokers each year to replace those who have either quit smoking or have died. Ninety percent of these smokers are under 21 years of age and a large percentage are in their very early teens.

"The American Heart Association is appalled by the type of advertisement and promotion used by the tobacco industry to promote the sale of its product. Each year the tobacco industry spends more than \$3.3 billion to advertise and promote cigarettes, making this the most heavily advertised product in the United States. Mr. President, just think what a fraction of this amount could do to enhance the health and human services needs in this country.

"In addition, the association indicated that smoking, high blood pressure, and high levels of cholesterol in the blood are the three major, independent coronary heart disease risk factors. The former Surgeon General referred to smoking as 'the most important of the known modifiable risk factors for coronary heart disease in the United States.'

"In conclusion, Mr. President, for the reasons stated above, I urge my colleagues to pass Senate Bill 1567, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 2.

"I would like to add that in deference to the vending machine people, I went and talked to them and concluded that it would be a hardship on them had we made the bill effective as of the 5th of July. So Conference Draft 2, with the consent of the House, gives them now 14 months rather than 2 months, and they evidently felt that they could live with this.

"In passing this bill, we will not only be limiting the sale of cigarettes from vending machines but I dare say that we would be depriving the marketing and the sale of this product to children, minorities, women and the economically disadvantaged, and taking a positive step to

prevent smoking among the young people. Mr. President, 'Out of sight, out of mind.' I urge my colleagues to vote 'yes' on this bill."

Senator George rose to inquire if the previous speaker would yield to a question, and the Chair having posed the question and Senator McMurdo having answered in the affirmative, Senator George asked:

"Mr. President, maybe I should start off by saying I'm a non-smoker. I should further say I'm not only a non-smoker, I'm a reformed smoker. That's the worst kind, I think.

"I find on the first page of the bill toward the bottom, it says, 'The legislature finds also that there are areas from which minors are restricted, and therefore not allowed easy access.' I am a little troubled by this because I am not aware of any legislation which prohibits minors from going into bars in this state. Is the chairman aware of any law which restricts the entrance of minors to bars?"

Senator McMurdo yielded the floor to Senator Blair who responded:

"Mr. President, as chairman of the Judiciary Committee I could address that question.

"If an establishment chooses, on its own, to prohibit minors from entry; then they could have the cigarette machines in there. The Minority Leader is correct. There is no law which prohibits minors from entering bars or cabarets. The prohibition is on the sale of liquor to those minors.

"My understanding of the bill is that cigarette vending machines are prohibited, unless located in one of these bar-cabarets or any establishment for which the minimum age for admission is 18. That is not by way of legislative fiat, but through the management of the establishment. It would be up to them how they chose to handle it. Thank you."

Senator George continued:

"If I may, Mr. President, it seems to me that we're providing some feeling of security that minors will not have access to places where the restriction is for those under 18, but it's only fancied. I don't know of any establishments that are posted, and it seems to me that the reality of the situation would be that the franchisees, if that's what they're called, of the vending machines would then have to persuade bar owners to post 'Nobody under 18 allowed' in order to place their machine. It sounds to me sort of like cutting off the puppy dog's tail an inch at a time so it won't hurt so much.

"I would hate to give the feeling that we were really doing something with this if there is to be no practical effect. Perhaps either one of the two chairs can assure me that there will be some effort to secure posting of the premises."

Senator Blair then remarked:

"Mr. President, I believe some bars prohibit the entry of people under the age of 18. Perhaps they're not of the same nature as the bars that the Minority leader generally patronizes. Thank you."

Senator Cobb rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I will be voting against this bill and just for the record I would like to read into the record a

fax I received from the Hawaii Hotel Association. Quoting in part:

'First, many of our international visitors, particularly the Japanese, smoke more than the residents of Hawaii. They utilize vending machines more than residents since it is more convenient and less of a problem in understanding currency exchange rates.

'The paragraph most important, the bill uses the term bars. There is no reference in Hawaii Revised Statutes to this term. Chapter 281 on intoxicating liquor does not define bar. This chapter defines different licenses and refers to "Licensed Premises." Hotels would have little problem with this bill if bars mean licensed premise. However, if the term means something else, we may have considerable difficulties with the bill.

'We earlier wrote the chairs of the committees requesting clarification, however, no change has been made. Therefore, we urge your vote against this measure as drafted.

'Mahalo and Aloha, Clem Judd, President.'

"Mr. President, I think the fax has hit upon the problem in both respects: (1) the enforceability, and (2) the fact that many of our visitors from Japan who are used to purchasing their cigarettes and who do smoke, proportionately much more than the American population, are used to buying their cigarettes from vending machines. This is also true of visitors from Europe as well as other parts of the world. Unless a concerted public relations campaign is going to be conducted either at state expense or someone else's expense, it's going to be difficult to educate them in advance that that practice is not allowed in Hawaii, particularly making it difficult for them to purchase cigarettes from a vending machine during daylight hours when they're on tours and bars or other licensed premises are not open. Thank you."

Senator Reed rose to speak for the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the bill.

"Perhaps if the vending machines with cigarettes available were harder to find it would simply lend more credence to our image as a health state."

Senator McMurdo, in support of the measure, added:

"Mr. President, when it comes to the Japanese tourists looking for vending machines, that's a poor excuse for not passing a bill which may help prevent minors from getting hold of cigarettes.

"I did point out to the good Senator that people who come here as tourists very quickly learn that we have very liberal laws when crossing the street, and yielding to pedestrians, and that they quickly take advantage of that. And I don't remember ever being in any foreign country where you couldn't find out the laws on certain things. If you want to get cigarettes then you can follow the law.

"If there are problems with the definition, it seems to me that in the Liquor Commission there are laws regulating bars and cabarets. Bars without shows have to close at 2:00 o'clock. Cabarets can remain open until 4:00. I may not be completely correct in the way I've stated that, but I would still urge my colleagues to vote for this measure. Somewhere along the line we have to start taking a stand in tightening up so that we don't have a continuum of the kind of cases of lung cancer and emphysema which we are seeing now from generations which did not have this kind of support. Thank you."

Senator Chang also rose to speak in support of the bill and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to express my concern about the legislation and also express my appreciation to the subject matter chairman for acting after I expressed my concerns about the legislation.

"Basically, Mr. President, it has to do with the lead time that we're giving vending machine merchants about the state's plans in this area. I had inquired with vending machine companies and was told that these machines have a value of between three and four thousands dollars and have a useful life of five to seven years. Obviously, a machine purchased in 1990 would still have quite a ways to go before the value of its purchase is recovered.

"Be that as it may, the original legislation emerging from the Conference Committee provided no lead time at all to these merchants and upon being informed about these concerns, the subject matter chairman was good enough to go back into conference and attempt to put a lead time and period of notice for these merchants, and for that I'm very appreciative.

"My hope is that during the next year in a continued discussion with the various businesses that would be affected by the legislation that there may be some appreciation of a need to further refine the legislation and I would hope that the subject matter chairman would be open to these communications by the business community.

"As a small token of my appreciation for her attention, I'd like to point out that there is a definition of 'bar' in Chapter 328K which reads, it 'means a place devoted to the serving of alcoholic beverages for on-site consumption by patrons and where the service of food is only incidental to the consumption of such beverages. A food service establishment may contain a bar, but the term bar shall not include the dining area of a food service establishment.' This is found in Chapter 328K, titled 'Smoking.' Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator McMurdo then said:

"Mr. President, I would like to thank Senator Chang for those kind words and for the reference. We'll have to see that it gets to the Hawaii Hotel Association."

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill. It targets sex offenders and violent criminals by providing for the creation of a DNA profile, blood type and secretor database. It complements the current police databases of fingerprints and photographs.

"Let me explain by example. When the system is set up, people convicted of sex offenses and certain violent crimes will have samples of their blood and saliva taken, at a hospital or clinic. The sample will be catalogued by detailed blood type, secretor status and DNA profile. This information will then be available for the

investigation of future crimes. For example, the police can analyze a sample of a rapist's seminal fluid which was taken from a victim and match it against the data in their files. If the rapist was previously convicted of a covered offense, there will be a match. It may well connect the suspect to many previously unsolved crimes.

"We know that sex offenders are likely to repeat. Their victims are often highly traumatized by the attack, and sometimes very young. Fingerprints or reliable eye witness identifications are often not available. DNA pattern, blood type and secretor status testing are, however, usually possible. This bill gives the police a new weapon that will be very useful in solving sex offenses and violent crimes."

"Mr. President, with some hesitation I rise to speak on this measure. I'll probably be voting for it unless some compelling reason can be given in advance.

"Just by way of background, over the last four years I have twice requested a breakdown from the staff of the Ways and Means Committee, by memo addressed to the chairman, as to how much executive CIP is released every year versus how much legislative CIP is released every year, and that for an average of at least ten years so that we have some long range picture. Failing receipt of that information, I did some preliminary and I emphasize the word preliminary homework on my own.

"I have found, and I make this as a rather serious charge subject to rebuttal, that over the last ten years in excess of 90 percent of executive CIP is released and implemented. Less than 10 percent of legislative CIP is

ever released and implemented. In effect then, Mr. President, the net result of that is that CIP that we pass, based on input from our communities, based on the hopes of our voters, based on the good work and hard intentions of all legislators present, is in effect nothing more than a fraud perpetrated on the voters because less than 10 percent of it will ever be released.

"As I indicated earlier, that statement stands to be corrected, but corrected with facts, corrected with research, corrected in response to at least two memos over the last four years requesting this kind of information. As my own research has indicated, exactly the figures that I have given you, on average for at least the last ten years, if a person goes back and researches beyond the previous ten years you will find a more compelling ratio that a greater amount of executive CIP and a lesser amount of legislative CIP is ever released. The question then becomes, why should we continue this shell game. Why should we labor forth for three months to bring out a mouse when a mouse doesn't even have teeth? When a mouse doesn't even have language that says 'This project is considered essential and must be spent.' Budgetary process, unfortunately, as reflected in Chapter 37 in both the operating budget and in the capital improvements programs, allows so much discretionary spending as to be virtually meaningless.

"I hope, Mr. President, for a response, a factual response and an answer to the question and the charge that I have raised. Failing that, I want to make it clear that during the course of the session I felt it was important to proceed in an atmosphere of cooperation and not confrontation and therefore to participate in the drafting and the forwarding of relevant CIP documents, as well as other legislation, and I have done so. That still does not address the underlying problem that I have viewed and shared with my colleagues on a historical basis. Thank you."

#### **STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS**

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1459 (H.C.R. No. 332):

By unanimous consent, Stand Com. Rep. No. 1459 and H.C.R. No. 332, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REJECTING THE FEDERAL MANDATE THAT REQUIRES STATES TO REVOKE THE DRIVER'S LICENSES OF DRUG OFFENDERS OR SUFFER THE LOSS OF FEDERAL FUNDS," were recommitted to the Committee on Transportation and Intergovernmental Relations.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1568 (H.C.R. No. 147, H.D. 1):

Senator Crozier moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1568 be adopted and H.C.R. No. 147, H.D. 1, be adopted, seconded by Senator Fernandes Salling.

Senator Blair rose to speak against the resolution and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak against the concurrent resolution. First, let me say that I appreciate the impetus behind the resolution. 1993 looms very large in our future and it behooves us to treat it seriously. If this Legislature can note and take action on an injustice done against one 'shoeless' individual then we certainly would be remiss if we were not sensitive to the injustice done to hundreds of thousands of Hawaiians almost a hundred years ago. In that sense I very much support what I believe to be the spirit and support the chairman in that regard.

"The reason I can't vote for the resolution is because of certain provisions in it. I'll be specific. The second to the last paragraph says that the Legislature supports a particular non-profit group called 'The Hawaii Council for the Year 1993 and Beyond' in its efforts to promote and coordinate activities toward certain ends. The ends that are referenced talk about questioning, and I'm quoting from the resolution, 'questioning the present and future role of people of every race who today constitute the "Hawaii Society".' I think most of us will admit that that's a very broad and open-ended statement.

"Then it talks about encouraging 'the promotion of debate revolving around the future of Hawaii as a Pacific Island society, within or without the United States of America;'

"Those purposes trouble me because as a member of this body I'm sworn to uphold and defend the Constitution of the State of Hawaii and the United States of America. To me Hawaii has no future without the United States of America, only within the United States of America. I know the people in my district are content with being citizens of the United States and protected by the Constitution of the United States and have no desire

for any questioning of that status. Therefore, I can't vote for those provisions.

"I'm even more troubled when it's connected with a group called 'The Hawaii Council for the Year 1993 and Beyond' which the Legislature, by this resolution, specifically supports. To the best that I have been able to ascertain that group is interested in secession or at least some elements of that group appear to want to have Hawaii leave the United States of America.

"So the coupling of these provisions to me goes beyond merely saying that it's time to address the injustice that was done to the native inhabitants of the islands a hundred years ago, which debate I would very much like to see go forward. In fact, I would like to see some sort of a Hawaiian sovereignty over some lands. Other native Americans already have such status. But I think we go too far when we raise the specter of secession, which I think this resolution does. I think we go too far when we talk of our support of a new organization which has no track record that gives me any confidence and which includes, apparently, members who see the world in much different terms than I do.

"For those reasons, while I hope that between now and 1993 we will look towards a greater self governance by our native Hawaii population, I cannot support the resolution. Thank you."

Senator McMurdo also spoke against the resolution and said:

"Mr. President, I agree with the previous speaker that greater governance for the Hawaiian peoples, the native Hawaiian peoples, here is one thing. But the very idea or the very mention of the word secession is anathema to me as an American citizen, and as a legislator of the State of Hawaii which is a part of the United States, and therefore I will be voting against this resolution."

Senator George also spoke against the resolution and stated:

"Mr. President, it would be a betrayal of my constituency if I didn't agree wholeheartedly with a good many of the provisions of this resolution. I admire the thought that went behind it. I just think it leaves an enormous chasm and goes too far when it talks about separation from the United States of America. I am a citizen of the United States and I can't entertain the thought of even entering into debate about secession. Thank you."

Senator Koki added his remarks against the resolution and said:

"Mr. President, I would like to also register my concerns that the previous speakers have expressed. I would like to incorporate their objections as my own. Thank you."

Senator Cobb rose for the resolution and remarked:

"Mr. President, I will be voting for this premised on the understanding that the chairman of the committee in floor remarks is going to be expanding the groups participating in the debate so it does not appear as state sponsorship of only one group or organization.

"I think in the debate it raises a very interesting corollary. Over a hundred years ago this country fought a brutal civil war on the question of secession. And the question was decided that it is not possible to secede once having joined the United States of America. Over half-a-million Americans lost their lives. It's been our most

costly war in our entire history. But that should not preclude debate on the subject. And I know that debate is coming.

"An interesting corollary is that the other world super-power, the Soviet Union, is wrestling with precisely the same question. How to have a mechanism for succession for those nations or indigenous people who wish to secede from the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics. For them to have such a debate and for us not to allow it, I think, would be contradictory.

"More to the point, the date 1993 is going to bring forth a lot of memories, a lot of historical events being opened and we should at least be willing to listen and to accommodate. And I for one appreciate the willingness of the chairman to expand the group beyond that designated in the body of the resolution. And in accordance with that flexibility and willingness to listen and to accommodate I will be supporting this measure. Thank you."

Senator Iwase also rose to speak in support of the resolution as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the resolution.

"Some concerns have been expressed and I share those concerns, particularly that concern which relates to a focussing on a particular group. I will be supporting this resolution with the understanding that this resolution in no way is to be viewed as a statement of the Legislature's support for that particular group and its activities during the forthcoming year.

"In regard to the question of secession, I do not view the resolution as taking a position by the State Legislature to either urge or support in any other way express state support for the issue of secession. I have just finished reading a book on the American Civil War, 'Cry for Freedom' or something to that effect. Senator Cobb alluded to that civil war which was fought over a hundred years ago and cost more American lives than all wars up through the Vietnam War. And certainly the principle that you cannot secede from the Union has been established.

"I do believe, however, that discussion on the issue of secession and all other issues related to the development of the State of Hawaii through the 21st Century is a relevant topic to be taken up next year. And it is, I think, also an opportunity for the state and for the native Hawaiian population to look at an event which occurred a hundred years ago and to discuss it. It is perhaps a kind of catharsis for the population. If so, perhaps some good will come from that and perhaps we can move forward and create a better society for all of us.

"I will be supporting the resolution for the reason that it will allow for debate and discussion on a matter which is of concern to all of us today and which focuses on an event which occurred in the past. It is a sore which festers, continues to this day, and it must be addressed. It cannot be put away. It cannot be stuck under the rug. It has to be discussed. This provides an opportunity to do so.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Chang also supported the resolution and stated:

"Mr. President, I would like to echo the sentiments of the Senator from St. Louis Heights and the Senator from Mililani in supporting the resolution.

"One of the great operating concepts in our society is that of democracy, a concept that is derived from Ancient Greece. Another concept that emanated from Ancient Greece are the Socratic ideals, one of the being that an unexamined life is a life not worth living. I believe that this resolution furthers both those concepts; that is the democracy that serves our people so well, and the examination that we so sorely need in order to maintain that democracy. Thank you."

Senator McCartney also supported the resolution and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the resolution and I would like to echo the remarks of the previous speakers.

"In my mind, Mr. President, speaking as a non-native Hawaiian, I think that we need to address this issue. It's an issue that has been brewing and that we cannot ignore. As the previous speaker said, we cannot sweep it under the rug. We have to confront it as policymakers and it may make all of us feel uncomfortable as policymakers. It may make the entire state feel uncomfortable but it's an issue that we have to face and we have to address and if we do not I think the consequences will be worse than they are today. And I support the resolution and I think debate and discussion is the foundation of our democratic system and that we should promote it and not be afraid of it.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Crozier also spoke for the resolution and remarked:

"Mr. President, I speak in favor of the resolution, and I appreciate the concerns of my colleagues.

"Mr. President, this year is the bicentennial of the Bill of Rights. How sad we haven't given the Bill of Rights much consideration this year. America is the greatest nation in the world because of the Bill of Rights. It guarantees the right of every individual to the freedom of speech, privacy and so on. The Bill of Rights is there to protect the rights of the minority from the tyranny of the majority.

"Mr. President, this resolution although my colleague have concerns with that one group in there, I can recognize his concern, I think it's more important to get on with the debate. For the last hundred years, the Hawaiian community has grumbled about this. I guess the best word is 'namu namu.' They've always talked about it and they could never get past the overthrow. Maybe it's time that the rest of the community realize what they went through and what they have lost. And the only way we can have that is to have a full debate.

"Nowhere in this document says that we support secession. It talks about self-determination. Right now the Hawaiian Home Lands is controlled by the state government. Why, Mr. President, must we control Hawaiian Home Lands? That is a trust set up for the native Hawaiian people. Why can they not have self-determination and decide for themselves how Hawaiian Home Lands should be operated. Are we afraid of it? Are we so comfortable with our form of government, or are we so terrified that others will come up with valid arguments or concerns that we rather just say, 'Oh no, no, we know what's best and if we know what's best, the rest of you must follow along.' That is not how the democratic process works. We need to have dialogue with the community. I think it would be helpful.

"1993 will be the watershed year. I don't know what's going to happen but the future of Hawaii will make great strides or its direction may turn slightly for the better or for the worse, but we need to confront 1993 in its fullest.

"Regarding 'The Hawaii Council for the Year 1993 and Beyond,' recognized as the only organization interested in 1993 and the future of Hawaii and its governance, let me share with you that the Office of Hawaiian Affairs is already involved in this. I'm not trying to put this one organization above the others. It is just a player. The Hawaiian group called 'Kalahui' is already getting ready for 1993; so is the Hawaiian Civic Club; so is 'Pa Kaukau' and the list goes on and on and on about different Hawaiian organizations already getting set up for 1993. Maybe we should also invite in the children or the missionary societies, the descendants of the missionaries. They should also participate. And I think that the Pacific Club should play a role in deciding in 1993, and, definitely, the Hawaiian Sugar Planters Association has a legitimate role to be part of 1993; also maybe some corporate sponsors like Dole Pineapple, they should be part of this. It is open to all bodies, not just this one organization listed in here.

"With that, Mr. President, I ask my colleagues to support this resolution. Mahalo."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1568 was adopted and H.C.R. No. 147, H.D. 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING THE YEAR 1993 AS THE 100TH YEAR SINCE THE OVERTHROW OF THE INDEPENDENT NATION OF HAWAII," was adopted, with the exception of Senators Blair, George, Koki and McMurdo who voted "no."

#### MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR

Gov. Msg. No. 386, dated May 6, 1991, transmitting his statement of objections to House Bill No. 1183 which he has returned to the House of Representatives without his approval and which reads as follows:

#### STATEMENT OF OBJECTIONS TO HOUSE BILL NO. 1183

Honorable Members  
Sixteenth Legislature  
State of Hawaii

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 1183, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to the Department of Health.'

The purpose of House Bill No. 1183 is to impose a statutory duty upon the Department of Health to ensure that all citizens have access to a reliable telephonic system which responds immediately to emergency calls and which refers such calls to the appropriate police, fire, or emergency medical services.

The bill would require the Department of Health to oversee a system which responds to any type of emergency situation affecting either the police, fire or emergency medical services. The Department of Health, however, as a health agency, does not have any expertise in police and

fire departments dispatch operations. Accordingly, to require that the Department of Health assume the responsibility of a telephonic system directly affecting the daily operations of the police or fire departments, which are under county jurisdiction, would be inappropriate.

Moreover, the EMS-related calls on the current '911' system comprise only approximately 10% of all calls received. Therefore, although the EMS is a user of the '911' system, the primary use of the system is for police and fire department assistance, which are county functions.

Additionally, with the exception of Hawaii County, all counties have operating 911 emergency telephone systems. Each county is in the best position to assess its resources and requirements and, therefore, should be responsible for the development and operation of its own emergency telephone system.

Finally, without a qualifying definition of the word 'ensure,' the scope of the State's potential tort liability should the Department of Health fail to absolutely 'ensure' access to a reliable 911 emergency call system is unclear. Similarly, the use of the word 'reliable' in referring to a 'reliable telephonic system' without a qualifying definition is also troublesome, because the Department of Health has no control over the operation of the telephone companies and the county equipment and personnel necessarily involved in the operation of the emergency call system.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 1183 without my approval.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 31 (H.B. No. 1016, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Fernandes Salling moved that the Senate reconsider its action taken on May 3, 1991, on Conf. Com. Rep. No. 31 and H.B. No. 1016, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, seconded by Senator Tungpalan and carried.

Senator Fernandes Salling then moved that the Conf. Com. Rep. No. 31 be adopted and H.B. No. 1016, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Tungpalan.

Senator Fernandes Salling rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

"The bill before us upholds the basic fundamental principle that a person is presumed innocent until proven guilty. This bill allows for an administrative process which will remove drunk drivers from our highways in an

expeditious but fair manner. This bill will allow police officers to take away a person's license on the spot before he takes a breath or blood test. This bill, however, does provide that the determination that a person was driving under the influence be made within 30 days before his license is revoked, thereby providing an arrestee some minimum due process protection under the law. This bill, Mr. President, encourages people to take a breath or blood test by increasing the penalty for refusal to take the test from six months to one year.

"For these reasons, Mr. President, I urge my fellow colleagues to vote in favor of this bill."

Senator Matsuura also supported the measure and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise in support of this bill, but with the gravest, and I really mean gravest, reservation because I have a dilemma. Whether we pass this bill or kill this bill, the State of Hawaii will have the worst DUI law in the whole United States.

"Why? Because come July 1, 1991, the most important DUI provision in our state law will change. Today, if you are arrested for DUI, you have a choice -- submit to a blood test or a breathalyzer test. If you are indeed drunk, and if you fail the test, your driver's license will be revoked for 90 days. If you refuse to take either of the tests, you lose your driver's license for one year.

"All 50 states have this provision in their statutes. It is referred as implied consent. All 50 states agree that getting driver's license is a privilege, and not a right for every citizen. A few people object to this law because it infringes on our civil rights. Our laws favor the guilty by the mere fact that our laws are written to protect the innocent. It is better to let 10 guilty persons go free than to convict one innocent person. That is the basis of our criminal law today.

"We all know the biblical story of King Solomon. When two mothers claimed a child, King Solomon ordered the child to be cut in half, giving one-half to each mother. One Mother agreed; the real Mother said, 'No, give the child to the other.'

"Today, we live in the 20th century. We have the 'A,' 'B' and 'O' blood group tests. We have the Rh blood group test. We have a M-n blood group test to determine parentage. We don't have to cut babies in half. When it comes to rape cases, we have the deoxyribonucleic acid test to determine the guilty one.

"Today we have the breathalyzer test. We have the blood test. If a person is arrested for drunken driving, what better test is there to prove your innocence? If you submit to the test and is found negative, who in his right mind is going to try to convict you? No one! Nobody in his right mind, because that's the strongest defense you can get. So we're taking care of the innocent.

"The other alternative favors the guilty. Any lawyer would advise his client, arrested for DUI, to refuse to take the test after July 1, 1991. I have a brother who looks like me. If I am arrested and if I am really guilty, I am not going to take the tests because I am going to fail. I'll be a dead duck. If I don't take the test and if the police officer happens to misspell my name and just put one 'u' in spelling Matsuura, then I have a chance to beat the arrest. If I were arrested on Papio Street, rather than Ahi Street, I have a chance. If I had three other guys in my car, I have a chance because it will be four against one police officer. No person will take the test, especially if you have a prior drunk driving conviction.

"I would agree to letting the lawyers decide if a person is DUI or not, if the judiciary system can guarantee justice. Our present judiciary system can not guarantee justice because the lawyers are more interested in winning the court case and collecting their legal fees. However, if the judiciary system can guarantee me justice, that the guilty will indeed be found guilty, then I'd say, 'Yes, let the lawyers decide if a person is DUI or not.' In our legal system, our courts are just filled to capacity, so we must keep building these judiciary buildings. This DUI loop hole in the law will increase our court cases after July 1, 1991.

"As far as I am informed, the Attorney General, all the prosecuting attorneys, all the law enforcement agencies, the clergies, everybody I know and I have talked to many, favor retaining the implied consent provision. I doubt if anyone of us who have not lost their loved one, because of a DUI driver, can fathom the loss, the hurt and the feeling of despair, and the feeling of anger that we are doing this. It is useless to apologize after one has killed an innocent person.

"So I ask the public, maybe in vain, but if you drive, do not drink alcoholic beverages. If you drink alcoholic beverages, don't drive, because the life you may be saving may be mine, and I am not yet tired of living. Thank you."

Senator George rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I'm going to confess to carelessness and stupidity. I know the conference draft is not before us but I signed it free and clear. I was under the impression that we had fixed the provision that reinstated implied consent in our administrative revocations statute. Well, we fixed it; but we fixed it ....

"Since that time, I've had the opportunity to get an opinion which is going to prevail on me to vote against this because I don't think we have a very good situation anyway. Joe Cindrich who was with the National Highway Safety Administration (NHSTA) in the San Francisco office has opined that our administrative revocation proposal, as well as the old one, do not meet the federal criteria for funding that states are entitled to if they pass an adequate administrative revocation statute.

"So in a way I'm in a kind of a dilemma. I'm kind of frustrated. But I'll feel better, maybe sleep better if I vote 'no' on the measure. Thank you."

Senator Koki also rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise and speak against this bill.

"I recognize that we do need an administrative revocation bill. But quite frankly the people in my district are really quite fed up with the way we're handling what the attorneys' jargons are in due process that really favors the guilty, as in this case, this bill particularly does. I for one would like to represent my district and go with my previous speaker and vote 'no' on this bill."

Senator Blair rose to speak in support of the bill and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the bill but with grave reservations.

"We made a mistake in 1990, when we repealed Section 286-155. As a technical matter we still have implied consent under Section 286-151, but the action-

forcing provisions of the implied consent law, which repeal the license for failure to take the test, were in Section 286-155. That section was repealed as part of the admin revocation law in Act 188-1990.

"In 1990, all the signals from the law enforcement community were that we should vote for Act 188. But in retrospect, Act 188 should have retained 286-155. The situation that was created by Act 188 is not addressed in his bill. Frankly, there's nothing wrong with any of the provisions in this bill, so I'll be voting in favor of it. My problem is that this bill represented our last clear chance, short of a special session, to avoid the the one major negative impact of Act 188.

"Let me explain it a little bit for the benefit of those who don't appreciate what we did. I'll try to be brief because I'm not sure how germane it is to this bill other than some references on page 23, lines 13 to 23, changing from six months to one year the penalty for failure to take the test upon conviction.

"Prior to July 1st of this year, if you refuse to take the test, you lose your license for a year. It is completely independent of the disposition on the drunk driving charge. It's a completely separate basis for revocation.

"Come July 1, 1991, it will no longer be a separate grounds for revocation. If you refuse to take the test, you run a risk. If you are convicted of the underlying offense of drunk driving, you will have your license suspended.

"There are those who believe that this will cause people to take the test and that we'll have pretty much a status quo situation. I hope they're right, but I suspect they're wrong. After July 1, 1991, the refusal to take a breath or a blood test only results in an increased penalty if the state proves the offense of driving under the influence. The new law thus replaces the certain loss under the old law with a gamble that gamble may pay off. You can refuse the test and thereby deprive the state of the best evidence of your intoxication. If the loss of this evidence is fatal to the state's case, you win. If not, you suffer an enhanced penalty. However, even that enhanced penalty is less severe than the current penalty under implied consent because it lacks an absolute revocation.

"Some say that people won't take this gamble. They won't try to suppress the best evidence in hopes of getting off on the underlying offense. But I don't think we should be setting up a system which encourages depriving the state of its best evidence of intoxication in hopes of avoiding any penalty. If a person is stopped, they know they can withhold the best evidence of their guilt, and they also know that if they are nonetheless convicted there will be an enhanced penalty, so they'll have to make a judgment that they didn't have to make under the old law.

"Under the old law you knew, you don't take the test, you lose. Under the new law, you don't take the test, you may win, you may lose. I think that's an unfortunate change in the law. I wish we had utilized this vehicle to correct that situation. But since there's nothing wrong with the bill other than what it doesn't include, I reluctantly urge my colleagues to vote in favor of it."

Senator Iwase also rose to support the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I would like to join the previous speaker, the chairman of the Judiciary Committee, on his comments. I too would like to explain my vote.

"I will be voting in support of S.B. 1016 but like all previous speakers, with the exception of two others, with the greatest reluctance.

"Mr. President, we are all familiar with the results of traffic accidents caused by someone who is drinking while he is driving. We can recall deaths occurring on Kalanianaʻole Highway and other areas of the island.

"In my opinion, a person who is arrested for DUI is not deserving of our pity, our sympathy or even our friendship or goodwill. He or she is however deserving of due process of law. That means you have a fair hearing; that means there is a presumption of innocence until proven guilty.

"Under the present implied consent law, that individual is afforded the full panoply of due process protection. If that were not so, this implied consent law which is in all other states of the union would have been struck down by either the United States Supreme Court or the Hawaii State Supreme Court. It has not been so struck down.

"Unfortunately, on July of this year this law will expire in an untimely death and we have no option but to proceed with this administrative revocation bill because it does seek to address some issues under Act 188 which passed last year. It does not correct the implied consent revocation.

"It is my hope, for the sake of all who believe that we must act to prevent drunk drivers from hitting our roads and to bring them to justice when they are arrested and, if guilty, it is my hope that we will act, restore the implied consent law before July of this year. I do not think an extension of this session is warranted. I think we are all tired but certainly something in the nature of a special session may well be warranted.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator B. Kobayashi also rose to speak for the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor with grave reservations.

"Implied consent does not water in any fashion self-incrimination. As the previous speaker has noted, if so, implied consent would have been struck down earlier by some other court of our land. Implied consent however is a important part of a very difficult battle against drunk driving. Let me remind people that drunk driving is not just any ordinary, innocent event. Combined, all drunk driving cases cause more monetary damages (property loss, medical bills, work days lost, etc.) in the United States than all robbery and theft combined in the United States. Drunk driving causes more deaths in violent form than any other cause of death in the United States and causes more deaths than almost all medical or health causes of death.

"Our fight against drunk driving should be a total war against the evils that drunk driving causes upon our society. I for one am in support of strong drunk driving laws and I believe we are taking a step back when we approve this conference draft 1. Nonetheless, because the conference draft does amend certain technical aspects to the act that we passed last year, I will vote for it. Thank you."

Senator Ikeda spoke against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak against this bill.

"I share the dilemma of the Senator from Hilo however I don't share his conclusion. I'll put it in very simple terms.

"When I voted for the administrative revocation of licenses, I thought I was voting for something that really toughened laws against drunken drivers and I think a number of other people felt the same way. However, I feel that now with this loophole which was created by the accidental omission of implied consent, that we really are not solving anything by passing this bill and, therefore, I am voting against it."

Senator Reed rose to speak against the measure and stated:

"Mr. President, I also rise to speak against the bill for a couple of reasons.

"One, because it fails to put very necessary teeth in the implied consent aspect of the law into the Hawaii Revised Statutes, and also because I believe that if this Legislature were truly serious about combatting the problem of drunk driving that we would not allow this session to end without passing out a bill that truly does what's needed to impact on the drunk driving in the state."

Senator Blair then said:

"Mr. President, it's not often that my mind is changed on the floor but reflecting on what Senator Ikeda said and somewhat on what Senator Iwase said, it occurs to me that there is a possibility that we will be coming back to deal with this issue before July 1, 1991.

"As a procedural matter rather than in a substantive matter, if we keep the matter in conference committee and if we are called back at a later time to come out with a conference draft 2 which addresses the issue that I think the majority of us wish to see addressed, then the subsequent convening of this body, I believe, can be for a shorter time period. In light of that, it would be more expeditious if we had the matter in conference committee rather than to go into six readings. So, for procedural reasons, I will join with Senator Ikeda and urge my colleagues to defeat this matter so that we can take it up expeditiously before July 1st. Thank you."

The Chair interjected:

"As a matter of information from the Chair. The House has adjourned sine die. They have reconsidered action on this bill and have passed it. Therefore, it would be impossible for us to go back to conference. The House has passed conference draft 1 by a vote in the House. We either defeat it or pass it so let's go vote on it."

Senator Blair then rose on a point of parliamentary inquiry as follows:

"Mr. President, if we defeat it, notwithstanding the House having passed it, and are subsequently called back, would we be required to pass a remedial bill on this topic through six readings or could we reconsider and work out a conference draft 2 that is acceptable to both houses? Could the House reconsider its action on final reading, recommit the matter to conference committee, and report it out as a conference draft 2 without the formality of six readings?"

The Chair answered:

"On a matter of parliamentary procedure, the action has already been taken by the House and they have

adjourned sine die. We have one action remaining. If we fail to reconsider our action, the bill die."

Senator Cobb then interjected:

"Mr. President, in further response to the Chair's remarks addressing the question of parliamentary procedure, I believe a reconsideration must be affected in the next business or legislative day. The time for reconsideration has passed since the House has already taken final action on this and presumably any special session or reconsideration of this issue would take place beyond the timeframe just outlined, it would be very unlikely that reconsideration would be an allowable procedure and therefore six readings would be required."

The Chair answered:

"What would be required now would be a special session to meet the number of readings."

Senator Blair then continued:

"Mr. President, I do need a clarification.

"Then you're telling me that if we vote against the bill and defeat it and if we do come back into a special session it will require six readings in any event?"

The Chair responded:

"That is correct."

Senator Blair then said:

"In that case, Mr. President, I will withdraw my remarks and urge my colleagues to vote in favor of the measure. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 31 was adopted and H.B. No. 1016, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ADMINISTRATIVE LICENSE REVOCATION," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 21. Noes, 4 (George, Reed, Koki, Ikeda). Excused, none.

Senator Cobb then rose to state:

"Mr. President, in deference to the bill passed just before this one, if any member would like to see how bingo operates before the Governor signs this bill, the Hickam Officers Club which I don't believe is known as any kind of a den of iniquity has bingo every Tuesday or Wednesday night. I went out there a couple of weeks ago and saw over 500 people peacefully, lawfully enjoying bingo because it is a federal military establishment. Ninety percent of those present were families and they seem to be having a good time. Thank you."

Senator Fernandes Salling rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"With respect to the bill that just passed out of this hallowed halls, I would like to just take my colleagues back to the last three to four years. We've been dealing with a very tough issue -- how to get drunk drivers off the road and as quickly as possible. Because it's a tough issue we're going to have to face some difficult decisions as we have here tonight.

"Proponents of those who support administrative revocation essentially are asking that we take this out of the court system except for judicial review and handle it administratively. That through the experience throughout different states this has been shown to handle the problem of drunk drivers and to get them off the highways expeditiously.

"For the last two years, we have tried to balance what the proponents are saying as opposed to also people who feel very strongly about protecting other's civil rights. And in this case, the protection of, I believe, our fundamental principle that we are presumed innocent until proven guilty. And it's been tough and I share with some of you and understand your feelings about this. It's not only been tough, it's been confusing because we are dealing with a lot of technical and legal issues here in such a short time frame.

"I'd like to also point out that last year when this bill came up before us, the problem was that we could not provide due process within 30 days, which is what the Senate had proposed to do in order to implement admin revocation. It was said to us at that time that this would cause the bill to be defective, that they could not implement the procedure, and it was essentially a waste of time and hard work to get a good admin revocation bill on the books.

"I find it a bit ironic that this year, after a task force made up of all the proponents of admin revocation other than the House and Senate, never once was that raised as the problem. Instead, after conference committee, when both the House and Senate signed off on the conference draft, suddenly the allegation was that we had made a mistake and had created a huge loophole by repealing implied consent. Mr. President, that really is not so and I believe that the proponents are taking advantage of some statements that may have been made, some confusion here.

"The implied consent law on the books requires some kind of finding that you are driving under the influence. It requires by reasonable grounds by a police officer that you are driving under the influence. The implied consent law on the books is not an automatic revocation of a person's license for refusal. It is a revocation after a full evidentiary hearing to look into the grounds for which you were stopped by a police officer to see whether or not there were reasonable grounds that you were driving under the influence, before a license is revoked by a judge in a court of law. We have essentially provided for that in our bill.

"We also wanted to make it very clear to those out in the public that it's very important that they take the test. Therefore, we agreed to the amendment that we increase the fine from six months to a year. The Senate's last proposal to the House was that we increase this from two years and we also proposed a fine of up to \$5,000 should people refuse to take the test.

"Till this day, Mr. President, I have not been afforded or given any kind of data by the law enforcement agencies, by the Attorney General's office, by the House Judiciary, with respect to how many people are actually convicted under a higher burden of proof beyond a reasonable doubt without a test.

"I'm not here to argue for or against the test. As I've indicated to you, it is our intent that people take the test and I think we have reflected that intent by our last proposal that was given to the House on Friday. The point is merely that we are getting into very legal and technical grounds and, when you cut through all of that, what you have is an administrative revocation bill here

that will allow for a person's license to be revoked, taken away on the spot, before he takes a test. A test isn't all the evidence that is needed to convict. You have to have some evidence before you can stop a person to ask that person to take the test.

"I felt very strongly that these points should be made with respect to the bill, given all of the statements made here today, and that perhaps it might clear up some of the confusion or misleading by proponents for something other than what we have before us. I know that this is an issue that we are going to have to look at again because this is something that's very important to all of us, how to effectively deal with getting the drunk drivers off the road. But I feel very confident that what we have here is a bill that is going to do that and as I said expeditiously, while at the same time protecting the rights of people which is, basically, that they are presumed innocent until proven guilty. Thank you."

Senator Cobb also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, rising on a point of personal privilege, I would like to address what has now become a recurring problem but before doing so, rather than casting any blame or aspersion, I've learned that if you have a problem with relationships or have a problem with the system and you want to look for blame, the best place to do so is to begin by looking at a mirror. So, that's what I'd like to do today.

"I have participated and thus am equally and jointly responsible for the evolution of a system that in effect has prevented floor votes on many vital issues, has seen the evolution of a budget document that basically now has very little meaning because of Chapter 37, and over the last twelve years has seen us adjourn on time in only three of those twelve years. And I feel partially responsible for that and would like to make some observations as well as, hopefully, some constructive suggestions for change.

"Last November 20th I sent to every Democratic member of the Senate a series of proposals based on observation of other legislative bodies not only in the United States, in Eastern and Western Europe and the Soviet Union. I noted in that document that the European Parliament has a system that if 5 percent of committee members request a floor vote on an issue, it must be presented directly to the floor a vote by the full body. This has in general eliminated the problems and you have a clash of interest in a highly diverse political situation, for in Europe in which I might note obtains right here in Hawaii.

"In the Supreme Soviet of Russia 10 percent of the body can ask for a floor vote, any 10 percent, and get it. And it's almost an indictment on us that a greater degree of democracy is being practiced in Russia than it is in Hawaii. I recognize that this would impact on the power and the prerogative of a committee chairman.

"Mr. President, something needs to be done when so many of the issues of concern to so many of our people died early in the session with never a floor vote. My premise is that we are elected to vote on issues and we should be doing so, much more so than we are now.

"I've already touched on the budget and the CIP and the vagrancies of Chapter 37 and how that leads to all sorts of discretionary spending by the administration, most of which we never see until we read the variance report the following January.

"The third issue is perhaps most grating and that is our collective failure. It's not an individual failure or the

fault of any one committee or chairman. It's all of our fault. And that is the failure to adjourn on time. Looking back over the last twelve years, in the years 1979, 1983 and 1984 we adjourned on time. All other years, 1980, '81, '82, '85, '86, '87, '88, '89, '90 and '91, we have had extensions of the Legislature. Part of this may be a systemic problem; part of it may be a lack of regard of deadlines; part of it may be that there's no incentive to get out of here on time; part of it may be in the philosophy of the feeling that we saw expressed in our House counterparts near the end of Friday, last week, when they said, 'There's no real pressure to get out. There's no real deadline. We can take it beyond the following Monday.'

"Mr. President, we need to do one of two, possibly three, things to change this. Either amend the State Constitution to allow one house to adjourn without the consent of the other because right now we are literally tied to each other and neither house can adjourn without the consent of the other. Or, second, to begin to look at a system that would penalize us for failure to complete our work on time, either by withholding of pay or fines. And that may not be very popular.

"Mr. President, the track record of the last twelve years is not something that's very popular. Nine out of twelve sessions have resulted in extensions. That's not including special sessions. That's not including confirmation sessions. It is a systemic failure to adjourn on time.

"As I said, Mr. President, I bear equal responsibility for this and I accept it because I have participated in it. I have acquiesced in it. I've gone along with it. But I think the time has come to raise the issue and to say 'stop,' we need to look at another way of doing it and that we can do better. And I hope in the interim, Mr. President, we will be doing that and take a serious look at providing some real incentives to complete our work on time, to complete our work in a more public manner, and perhaps to build some accountability into the budget process, and some real meaning into the decisions that so many of us worked so hard on for three long months to accomplish. Thank you."

Senator Solomon, Majority Floor Leader, also rose to speak on a point of privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, as session draws to a close it is appropriate to pause and reflect upon our accomplishments and perhaps upon our failures.

"Although there are those who will look upon this session as one of few accomplishments and fewer milestones, I view this session as a window of opportunity. Opportunity, for during this session, for the first time, since I was elected to this generation of lawmakers, we have had to make do with a lot less.

"This session, instead of having money to freely throw at the problems of our state, we had to be innovative and creative in approaching these problems with solutions that will make the most of our constituents' tax dollars. We also realized that while we have talked about tax reform in the past, the 'reforms' we adopted benefited only a select few. As we read in the paper the other day, the poor and the very rich pay less in state taxes as a percentage of their income than the people in the middle income categories. In other words, the heaviest tax burden is being carried by the middle income taxpayer.

"Despite all the rhetoric of having adopted tax reforms in the past years, the number one concern of the people of this state is still taxes.



"Increasingly, we hear of island families who have decided to pull up roots and move to the mainland because it is too expensive to live in Hawaii. The high cost of housing, food, and everyday living is getting more and more difficult, especially for young people to remain here. Hawaii is becoming a place for the very rich and the very poor and the middle class majority that our forebearers left as a legacy to Hawaii's future is being assimilated into the American mainland.

"To lose the children of this 'aina' as they move out of state means we lose the bridge to the past and the multi-ethnic cultures that make Hawaii a unique place to live, the special place that is Hawaii. In losing this bridge to the past, and as our educated young people move out of state, we lose our greatest natural resource, brain power. Unquestionably, this 'brain power drain' over the long term will be destructive to Hawaii.

"As a result, over the past decade more and more people have turned to us to solve the problems of the day, not just the young but also the elderly, and as I stated earlier, the noncreative solution we have come up with was to appropriate money and hope the problem would be satisfied and go away. That has not been the case, having experienced a taste of public funding, they have come back for more and more. A case in point is the POS program which started with \$10 million in the first year and has since mushroomed to the point where this body has appropriated more than \$100 million for the purchase of services.

"In 1987, when the current administration came to office, it was fortunate that the federal income tax law was being changed, which resulted in a substantial windfall of revenues. The administration told us at that time because of the many unknowns about the revenue impact it was proposing to enact temporary credits and a phase in of rate reductions in the income tax. Since that time with the turn of events, those temporary credits became permanent and there was a slight lowering of the rates. It is called a credit to offset the 4% tax on food, a food tax credit and not a credit to offset the broadening of the income tax base.

"Mr. President, in my judgment, this body must focus on tax reform.

"Mr. President, with this mind, last year this Legislature had the chance to address these concerns regarding the tax burden of Hawaii's middle class. Senate Bill No. 2597 contained recommendations of the administration as adopted and modified by the Senate. The bill would have readjusted the income tax brackets and rates and increased the standard deduction to one-half of the federal level. The only provisions of that bill which survived the legislative process was an increase in the food tax credit and the merging of the food tax credit and the excise tax credit.

"Next year, we must continue to work with the respective subject matter committees of both House and Senate so as to complete the state income tax reform started in 1987, and provide the necessary relief to the middle class."

"Thank you."

Senator George, Minority Leader, then made the following closing remarks:

"Mr. President, just a few words on behalf of your Minority members, if I may.

"Because it looks as though we won't be meeting in this chamber for several sessions, any remarks we make today

are bound to be valedictory. Indeed, for some of us this may be the last meeting in this chamber -- ever.

"So it's going to be hard to fend off nostalgia as we say our goodbyes.

"On March 15, 1969, as a very green Honolulu councilman, I was a guest at the banquet that signaled the formal opening of this building. Twenty-two years ago -- that's really not so long, as buildings go. Heck, I have shoes older than this Capitol!

"It was quite an occasion. Everybody who was anybody was there in fancy wardrobe and high spirits for the feast. We were on the fifth floor, with white-clad tables surrounding the atrium square and squads of waiters poised to deliver several gourmet courses.

"Then it poured. I know a rain shower is supposed to be a good-luck Hawaiian blessing, but that deluge was heavenly over-reaction.

"So all the tables were hastily crammed under the overhang, and the guests sat down again in their dampened chairs.

"And it kept on raining. Hard. And the roof leaked. All over the white tablecloths, and the waiters, and the governor, and the soggy dinners, and the diners in their finery.

"Some of my old-timer colleagues may remember that dismal disaster. And my junior colleagues may note that the building still leaks, only it's asbestos coming down on our heads instead of honest rain.

"We'll be leaving it all behind sometime this summer -- goodbye to asbestos and disobedient elevators, to quadriplegic tables whose legs no longer support them, to air conditioning that offers two choices: sweaty or shivering.

"Goodbye to this gracious building.

"Now we have to begin sorting out our chattels; our souvenirs and our lists and our constituent files and our books and our piles and piles (and piles!) of the studies we've asked for plus the ones we didn't especially want. We'll finally have to start throwing things away.

"I have a suggestion. This will be a time for a fresh start. Can we use it as a time to evaluate our legislative process, to leave behind what doesn't work very well?

"A fresh start in a new place would be a nifty time to open our doors wider; to let the sun really shine on our activities. A fresh start would be an opportunity to take a commonsense approach to budget negotiations, so that we don't waste midnight hours chewing over items on which House and Senate are already fully agreed. A fresh start might persuade us to look at the legislative calendar, to reintroduce the old custom of floor amendments, and to institute a practice of joint House-Senate hearings when there is shared subject matter. So many possibilities!

"A fresh start might even coax us into changes in the autocracy of committee chairmanships. I think this change might be the one most applauded by the public we serve.

"Who knows, Mr. President, we might even be able to avoid institutionalizing our unfortunate custom of extending our sessions.

"Just let us know how your Minority members can help, Mr. President.

"Thank you."

Senator McMurdo also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I just want to say that I agree with the good Minority Senator that there are many changes that we could make, but there's one change I don't think any of us wants to make, at least the majority of people don't, and that is the wonderful way that Rick Perkins, our Majority attorney, has handled bills during this session and the previous session. It has been a real pleasure to work with him and the people in his office. I for one say, 'Don't change, Rick. We need you just the way you are.'"

"And while I'm passing out kudos, I would like to give one to the good Senator from Hilo with whom I've had many disagreements but tonight I understand he said he was going to make the best floor speech he'd ever made. I would like to tell you that I think you succeeded tonight. That was a terrific speech and I just wanted to thank you for it."

Senator Holt then remarked:

"Mr. President, I would be remiss if I did not, on behalf of the body, extend our appreciation and thanks to Kevin Kuroda and his Ways and Means staff. Despite the extension, I think they worked hard to represent the Senate negotiations. They did a lot of good for education and a job well done. Thank you."

At this time, the Chair asked Mr. Rick Perkins and Mr. Kevin Kuroda to rise to be recognized.

### SENATE RESOLUTIONS

The following Senate resolutions (S.R. Nos. 216 to 223) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

Senate Resolution:

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 1084, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to the Public Employees Health Fund.'

The purpose of Senate Bill No. 1084 is to authorize the trustees of the Public Employees Health Fund, at their option, to hire private counsel to serve as the Fund's legal counsel or rely upon the Attorney General to provide legal advice and counsel to them.

According to the accompanying legislative history, this bill was apparently prompted by concern that the Attorney General could encounter conflicts of interest in providing legal advice and counsel to the trustees and the Fund because he is also required to represent the Governor and the various cabinet level officers who employ the various members of the Fund. While I am not sure that I agree with the Legislature's conclusion, I do believe that existing law, namely, section 103-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, provides a means for the Attorney General and the trustees to address any actual conflict of interest situation which might arise in the course of the Attorney General's provision of legal services to the Fund. Accordingly, I believe this measure is not needed.

The purpose of this bill is to decriminalize airport rule violations, which are currently misdemeanors, making such violations punishable only by a fine not in excess of \$2,000. In contrast, a failure to comply with the statute itself, chapter 261, Hawaii Revised Statutes, remains a misdemeanor and subject to a fine and possible imprisonment.

Of concern is the basis for assessing different penalties for rule violations, vis-a-vis statutory violations. For example, airport security is covered by rule, not by statute. Under this bill, violators of airport security rules would be subject only to a maximum \$2,000 fine and would not be guilty of a misdemeanor, facing possible imprisonment. However, if an airport employee were to violate section 261-15.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, by failing to collect a \$10 registration fee, the employee could be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Removing the deterrent of criminal penalties, i.e., imprisonment, for airport rule violations, especially security violations, could jeopardize airport security and hinder the enforcement of the rules by the department. Hence, for certain types of rules such as security and safety, it does not appear rational to lessen the punishment for the violations of such rules, while retaining the harsher punishment for relatively minor statutory violations.

The purpose of House Bill No. 2223 is to amend the statute of limitation provision of the State Tort Liability Act to provide that tort claims against the State by individuals under a legal disability will not be barred if brought within two years after the legal disability has ceased.

While the intent of this bill is admirable and remedial in nature, it also inequitably requires the State to litigate events which are distant in time and indistinct in memory. Too frequently critical evidence is lost with the passage of time. The truth, under such circumstances, is often unascertainable. The policy of the law for more than a century has been to protect the sovereign from such 'stale' claims. Such a fundamental departure from accepted public policy would allow the trials of important tort lawsuits to resemble more a game of chance than a struggle for truth.

In addition, the bill fails to define the term 'legal disability.' Without such a definition, the term may be interpreted in ways unintended by the Legislature or inappropriate in fact. An example of the former category would be to persons who live outside the jurisdiction of the State court system but who in fact are fully able to sue timely. An example of the latter category would be

prisoners, who under the law are guaranteed access to the courts.

Lastly, the bill is made retroactive without qualification. It, therefore, applies to cases currently pending trial in our courts as well as cases tried and awaiting decision. The risk to the State fisc is unquantified but is likely to be in the many millions of dollars. Accepting such an unquantified risk is simply not wise.

The purpose of Senate Bill No. 246 is to amend section 334-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to ensure that persons who are liable for the payment of expenses for care in psychiatric facilities and community mental health centers in State and State-funded facilities make reasonable efforts to utilize any available third-party insurance coverage to offset these costs. This bill will repeal the provision that requires the Director of Health to take into consideration the financial circumstances of the patient and the patient's family in determining whether to take collection action for treatment services rendered and that prohibits collection when it would tend to severely impact the patient's or the patient's family's financial circumstances. Further, this bill will retain the provision that the Director of Health may adjust the amount of any service-related liability, so that the charges imposed will not tend to make the patient or the patient's family a public charge or deprive them of necessary support.

Another bill passed during the Regular Session of 1991, House Bill No. 953, also will amend section 334-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes. House Bill No. 953 also will require every person, or that person's spouse, parent, or legal guardian, if applicable, who is liable for the costs of treatment services at psychiatric facilities or community mental health centers under the jurisdiction of the State or a county, or at psychiatric facilities or community mental health centers that derive more than fifty percent of their revenues from the general fund of the State, to make reasonable efforts to utilize any available third party coverage to offset these costs. However, unlike Senate Bill No. 246, House Bill No. 953 will retain the provision that requires the Director of Health to take into consideration the financial circumstances of the patient and the patient's family in determining whether to take collection steps for treatment services rendered and that prohibits collection when it would tend to severely impact the patient or the patient's family's financial circumstances. House Bill No. 953 further will omit the provision that the Director of Health may adjust the amount of any service-related liability, so that the charges imposed will not tend to make the patient or the patient's family a public charge or deprive them of necessary support.

Because House Bill No. 953 will retain the Director of Health's authority to consider the financial circumstances of the patient and family while Senate Bill No. 246 specifically will delete it, and because House Bill No. 953 will delete the Director's authority to adjust the amount of any service-related liability while Senate Bill No. 246 specifically will retain it, the two bills are irreconcilable and in direct conflict with each other. This conflict requires the veto of one or the other and I have decided to approve House Bill No. 953.

The purpose of Senate Bill No. 1089 is to exempt on-duty sheriffs and deputy sheriffs from parking meter and time restrictions. This is intended to facilitate performance of evictions and service of bench warrants in areas where the only available parking is metered.

While there is clearly a need to exempt individuals performing these types of law enforcement functions from parking restrictions, the bill is not drawn narrowly enough to limit the exemption to those whom the bill is intended to benefit. First, the Office of the Sheriff was abolished by Act 211, Session Laws of Hawaii 1989. Therefore, it is unclear to whom the exemption provided by the bill would apply. It may apply to public safety officers of the Department of Public Safety who perform the duties formerly performed by personnel employed by the Office of the Sheriff. It may also include private individuals who independently contract with the Department of Public Safety to serve civil process. In any event, the bill may exempt persons other than those it intended and thereby create an appearance of preferential treatment for certain individuals.

Even if the bill were clear as to whom it applied, however, it still fails to specifically state that it applies only to on-duty 'sheriffs' and 'deputy sheriffs.' It also does not specify whether the exemption applies only to official vehicles of the Department of Public Safety or whether it includes privately owned vehicles used for official purposes.

These omissions create the possibility, albeit inadvertently, that the privilege conferred by this bill will be used for unintended purposes. This, in turn, will again create an appearance of preferential treatment of certain individuals.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 359, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Divorce Proceedings.'

The purpose of House Bill No. 359 is to mandate that in contested divorce proceedings involving allegations of spouse abuse, the family court shall not require either party to participate in a mediation program. Although the intent of House Bill No. 359 to prevent spouse abuse victims from having to undergo mediation against their will is understandable, this bill raises the following concerns:

1. The extent of the problem is not clear. The committee report acknowledges that the family courts, in general, exempt battered spouses from mediation in divorce proceedings. According to the First District Family Court (FDFC), the judge in a particular divorce case would not require a spouse abuse victim to go through mediation unless it was deemed to be in the best interest of the victim. Therefore, it is not clear that women are being adversely subjected to mediation.
2. Under the provisions of this bill, the judge would be barred from requiring participation in any of the three components of the mediation program, including the educational and the screening components. According to the FDFC, the educational and the screening components often help the abused spouse in dealing with divorce and its aftermath without subjecting the victim to an undesirable one-on-one confrontation with the spouse abuser.
3. The bill stipulates that the family court judge can be barred from requiring participation in a mediation program based solely on an accusation of spousal abuse. According to the FDFC, this may lead to a proliferation of false accusations being made just to avoid the mediation process. This would not only circumvent the intent of this bill but it would also result in cases unnecessarily going to trial.
4. The best course of action may not be achieved. According to the FDFC, mediation for spouse abuse victims is not necessarily bad for the victim and, in some cases, is more beneficial for the

victim. If a spouse abuse victim is unaware of the benefits of mediation and refuses to go through mediation, the judge would be forced to have the case go to trial even though it may not be in the best interest of the victim.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 1016, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Administrative License Revocation.' I have discussed my concerns at some length below in the hope that the Legislature will take the opportunity to address them in the Special Session which is scheduled to commence on June 24, 1991.

As originally introduced, this bill, an Administration measure, and House Bill No. 608, a Judiciary measure, would have implemented the recommendations of the Task Force convened by the Administrative Director of the Courts, ('Director'), pursuant to Senate Resolution No. 188 which was adopted in 1990. As required by Section 13 of Act 188, Session Laws of Hawaii 1990 ('Act 188'), the Director, with the assistance of the Task Force, examined Act 188 to determine what additional provisions would be necessary to implement administrative license revocation.

The original version of House Bill No. 1016 contained the provisions recommended to reinstate the implied consent law sanctions which had been deleted without explanation by Act 188. The original version of House Bill No. 608 contained the provisions recommended to facilitate the procedural implementation of administrative license revocation. The two bills were combined by the House of Representatives and House Bill No. 1016 became the vehicle for adding the provisions recommended by the Task Force.

The version of this bill which emerged from Conference Committee and which was passed by the Legislature accomplished many of the recommendations made by the Task Force. They are as follows:

- (1) Reestablish a one year license revocation period for refusal to submit to a breath or blood test (assuming that the driver is also found to be under the influence of intoxicating liquor, an issue discussed below);
- (2) Require proof of financial responsibility after the driver's license is administratively revoked;
- (3) Consolidate the Notice of Administrative Revocation and the Temporary Permit issued to the driver to reduce paperwork;
- (4) Require the driver to surrender the Temporary Permit if the driver is convicted of criminal charges before the administrative proceeding is completed;
- (5) Permit the police, instead of the Director, to return the license if a breath or blood test indicates that the arrestee's blood alcohol concentration is below .10;
- (6) Preclude issuance of a Temporary Permit to a driver who is unlicensed or whose license has been suspended or revoked;
- (7) Authorize inclusion of administrative revocation decisions on the driver's traffic abstract; and
- (8) Preclude a stay of the administrative revocation pending the outcome of judicial review.

However, the final legislation failed to reinstate the most important sanction for refusal to take a blood or breath test: unconditional license revocation. This had been the law since 1967 but was effectively repealed by Act 188. Without the sanction of license revocation, many drivers will refuse to submit to a blood alcohol test because they know that their license can not be revoked unless they are found to have been under the influence of intoxicating liquor. Of course, it will be much more difficult to prove that fact because there will be no objective, scientific evidence.

Moreover, even if the license is revoked, the driver is still eligible for a conditional permit to drive to the same extent as a driver who takes the test and fails, another significant departure from the law in effect since 1967. In addition, failure to reinstate unconditional license revocation for drivers who refuse the test will cost the State \$262,000 per year for five years, or a total of \$1,310,000, in additional federal grants for alcohol countermeasures.

The final bill also failed to add several important procedural provisions recommended by the Task Force. First, the Task Force determined that administrative license revocation and criminal proceedings should be completely separate, as is the case in every other jurisdiction in the nation with an administrative license revocation law. This is based on the fundamental concept that while the administrative proceeding is intended to protect the public, the criminal proceeding is intended to punish the driver.

Separation of the proceedings was to be accomplished by provisions which would remove the prosecutor from the administrative proceeding while preserving the right of the prosecutor to pursue criminal proceedings. Accordingly, if the driver prevailed in the administrative proceeding, the prosecutor would not be able to appeal that decision but the decision would not preclude criminal prosecution.

In addition to its failure to amend Act 188 by adding these important provisions, this legislation compounds the problems created by Act 188's linkage of the administrative and criminal proceedings. The bill would not only prevent criminal prosecution where an initial paper review resulted in dismissal of the administrative proceeding but it would also make that review decision unappealable. As a result, the future course of all administrative and criminal proceedings could be determined without ever giving the prosecutor an opportunity to be heard.

The Task Force also recommended that administrative hearings be scheduled only for those drivers who want them instead of scheduling them for every driver as Act 188 requires. This provision is necessary because experience in other states has shown that only about twenty percent of drivers want an administrative hearing. Scheduling hearings for the remaining eighty percent will waste resources needed for those drivers who really want a hearing and may unduly delay completion of those hearings. This result is both contrary to the purpose of administrative revocation and unfair to drivers who wish to contest the proposed revocation. Unfortunately, due to a technical error in the bill, it is unclear whether the Director must schedule an administrative hearing for every driver or only for those who request one.

Finally, this legislation would make it possible for the driver to keep driving until the administrative proceeding is completed. Act 188 provided that the driver's Temporary Permit would be extended only if the Director or the prosecutor requested a continuance of the administrative hearing. The change made by this bill would give the driver considerable incentive to delay the proceedings, one of the problems which administrative revocation is supposed to solve. In addition, a technical error in the bill may prevent the Director from continuing an administrative hearing, even where there is good cause to do so.

The purposes of House Bill No. 1604 are to authorize the Governor to request the organization of one private nonprofit corporation, to be known as the Hawaii Educational Loan Marketing Corporation (HELMAC), for the acquisition of student loan notes held by local financial institutions pursuant to the federal Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended, and to authorize the Board of Regents of the University of Hawaii to develop real property and construct projects thereon.

I have serious concerns about the ambiguities in this bill. The Legislature stated in section 1 of this bill that 'no bonds or other obligations of HELMAC will constitute a debt, liability, or obligation of the State of Hawaii or of any agency or political subdivision thereof.' However, section 2 of this bill will amend section 309-1.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to delete the requirement in the current paragraph (3) (C) that the face of each obligation state that the obligations 'shall not constitute nor be deemed to constitute a general, limited, or moral obligation of the State of Hawaii, or any department, agency, or political subdivision thereof under any constitutional, statutory, or other construction.' Moreover, section 2 will also amend section 309-1.5 to provide that HELMAC shall be 'authorized and empowered to issue obligations pursuant to section 103 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended,' which excludes from taxable gross income the interest earned on state and local bonds, which are defined to mean obligations of a state or a political subdivision thereof. Therefore, the amendments made to section 309-1.5 appear to authorize HELMAC to issue bonds that are obligations of the State or a political subdivision of the State, contrary to the Legislature's stated belief in section 1 of the bill.

Furthermore, under current law the Board of Regents has the authority to develop real property and construct university projects thereon. Section 3 of this bill will, in effect, constrain the Board's existing authority by making the covered projects subject to additional prior authorization of the Legislature.

Involving parents in the education of their children is better left to sound and creative programs and policies of the Board of Education and the Department of Education.

However, because the Youth Development Project is not established by statute and is merely funded by appropriations, the transfer of the project can be accomplished by appropriating the funds to the Department of Human Services. The project does not have any state employees. Since the general appropriations bill for fiscal biennium 1991-1993 already reflects the transfer of the Youth Development Project to the Department of Human Services, enactment of this bill is unnecessary.

Moreover, this bill appears to circumvent civil service law. In addition to transferring the Youth Development Project, this bill also attempts to transfer the employees of the Research Corporation of the University of Hawaii (RCUH) involved in the Youth Development Program to the OYS, without loss of salary, seniority, prior service credit, vacation, sick leave, or other employee benefits or privileges. Furthermore, the bill stipulates that the RCUH employees may be transferred or appointed to a civil service position without the necessity of examination, provided that the employee possesses the minimum qualifications for the position. Consequently, not only does this bill sidestep the recruitment and classification process provided in chapter 76, Hawaii Revised Statutes (circumventing the principle of competition for the most qualified applicant), it would also appoint non-state employees into civil service positions. This goes beyond other grandfathering legislation that appoint state exempt hires into regular civil service positions.

Section 181 of the bill indicates that \$32,000,000 of the sums appropriated for capital improvement project item no. UOH 105-155 in Act 316, Session Laws of Hawaii 1989, as amended by Act 299, Session Laws of Hawaii 1990, are to be lapsed as of July 1, 1991, the effective date of the bill. Since the total sum appropriated for item no. UOH 105-155 is \$15,536,000, not \$32,000,000, I cannot determine whether the reference to UOH 105-155 is correct or whether the Legislature intended to lapse a different item for which a \$32,000,000 appropriation was made. In light of this ambiguity, I have reduced the '\$32,000,000' on page 341, line 22, to '0' to ensure the continued availability of the current appropriations for the capital improvement project item no. UOH 105-155 for the student services center at the University of Hawaii, Manoa.

The purpose of House Bill No. 600, is to streamline the jury selection process by eliminating the requirement for jury panels, and to eliminate jury exemptions for certain occupations.

While I am in agreement with the proposed amendments to Sections 612-17 and 612-18, Hawaii Revised Statutes, relating to jury panels, I am concerned about the impact upon the people of this State caused by requiring attorneys, department heads, elected officials, judges, ministers, priests, practicing physicians, dentists, members of the Armed Forces, police officers, and firefighters to serve as jurors. Jury service by such people may well cause serious hardship, injury, or damage to members of the public who rely upon them but who will be deprived of their services during the period of jury duty. A department head may be unavailable for important state functions, a medical doctor unavailable for life-saving treatment, or a priest unavailable for care critical to the spiritual well-being of his flock.

Act 366, Session Laws of Hawaii 1987, created two-year trial periods by prohibiting the claiming of exemptions during 1989 and 1990 in the First Judicial Circuit and during 1990 and 1991 in the other judicial circuits. However, as noted in the jury management study dated July 1990, '[a] local rule in the first circuit continued the exemptions for physicians, dentists, members of the armed forces, members of police and fire departments.' Consequently, I question how the trial periods could have resulted in any reliable conclusions that would justify the permanent deletion of the provisions allowing claims for exemption from jury service.

However, recognition was not given to the fact that an image associated with wine must be cultivated to establish any credibility in sponsoring an international wine conference. Hawaii is not noted for its wine consumption, and wine manufacturing in this State has not reached significant levels. Thus, sponsorship of an international wine conference as a means of positioning the State as an

'important Pacific-region meeting center' does not appear to be logical.

Any benefits provided to the visitor industry by the staging of an international wine conference will be incidental and cannot serve as a primary justification to support this measure.

Presently, the law requires the private offices of practitioners to seek review and approval from the State Health Planning and Development Agency (SHPDA) if they provide or perform certain types of non-bed services.

The amendment to the definition of 'organized ambulatory health care facility' in the bill would have been acceptable, had an accompanying bill, House Bill No. 627, also been passed by the Legislature. House Bill No. 627 would have preserved the statutory and legal requirements for certificate of need review and approval by SHPDA when private practitioners are providing or performing such non-bed services. Because House Bill No. 627 was not passed, the unintended effect of the House Bill No. 1707 would be to allow such non-bed services to be provided by private practitioners, without SHPDA review or approval, and to allow all costs related to the provision of such services to be passed on to the consumer. This unintended result would allow the unregulated proliferation of such services by private practitioners, thereby driving health care costs higher.

The following Rules shall be the Rules of the Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii.

**PART I. ORGANIZATION, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES**

**Rule 1. Organization**

When the Senate convenes, the President or the Vice-President, in the absence of the President, shall call the Senate to order and appoint a Committee of three whose duty it shall be to immediately examine the credentials of the members-elect of the Senate. If from the Committee report, it shall appear that a majority of the credentials are in order, the Senate shall proceed to organize and shall appoint a Committee of three to wait upon a justice of the Supreme Court, an Intermediate Appellate Court judge or a Circuit Court judge to administer the oath of office required by the Constitution. Such proceedings need not be on the day of convening in the Senate. In the absence of the President or Vice-President the Senate may elect a temporary Presiding Officer by a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

**Rule 2. Officers and Employees**

(1) The officers of the Senate shall consist of a: President, Vice-President, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and Sergeant-at-Arms, each of whom shall be elected by a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) The President and Vice-President shall hold their respective offices in accordance with Title 3, Hawaii Revised Statutes. Other officers and employees shall hold their respective offices and positions at the pleasure of the Senate, but a majority vote of the members of the Senate shall be required to terminate the office held by any officer of the Senate.

(3) The Senate, by a majority vote, may authorize positions from time to time as may be deemed necessary.

**Rule 3. The President**

It shall be the duty of the President:

- (1) To open the meetings of the Senate by taking the Chair and calling for the invocation.
- (2) When a quorum is present, to call for the reading of the Journal of the preceding day.
- (3) To maintain order in the Senate Chamber and to require proper decorum on the part of the members.
- (4) To announce the business before the Senate in the order prescribed by the Rules.
- (5) To receive and submit all matters properly brought before the Senate by the members, call for votes upon the same and announce the results.
- (6) To receive all communications, present them to the Senate and refer all bills and other matters to the appropriate standing committees.
- (7) To appoint all committees unless otherwise determined by the Senate.
- (8) To authenticate by signature, all acts and doings of the Senate which require authentication.
- (9) To make known rules of order when so requested and, subject to an appeal to the Senate, to decide all questions of order.
- (10) To issue warrants and when so directed by the Senate, to carry into effect its orders in the arrest of offenders, the summoning of witnesses, or other orders of the Senate.
- (11) To decide and announce the result of any vote taken.
- (12) To do and perform such other duties as are required by law or by these rules or such as may properly pertain to such office.
- (13) To clear the Senate Chamber of all persons, except its members and designated persons if there is a disturbance or disorderly conduct, or on motion duly adopted.
- (14) To control and have direction of the rooms, desks, passages, stairways, corridors, balconies, in and about the building set apart for the use of the Senate and all public property of the Senate. The President shall see that all officers of the Senate perform their respective duties, and may assign places to visitors and reporters. The President may admit

stenographers or other reporters, wishing to take down the debates, and assign them such places to effect their object as shall not interfere with the convenience of the Senate.

(15) To establish final dates for action on legislation, including, though not limited to the final date for introducing bills, the dates for the mandatory recess pursuant to Article III, Section 12, of the Constitution, the final date for third reading of Senate Bills, the final date for third reading of House Bills, the final date for approving Conference Committee agreements and drafts of bills, the final date for final reading of the General Appropriations Bill, and the final date for final reading of the Supplemental Appropriations Bill. The President shall coordinate the date for introducing bills and may coordinate with the Speaker of the House to establish the other final dates.

(16) To promulgate an administrative and financial manual of guides, the purpose of which is to establish uniformity in administrative practices and to ensure compliance with Senate Policies.

(17) To mediate and resolve differences between two or more standing committees on the same bill.

#### **Rule 4. The Vice-President**

In the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall exercise all the duties and powers of the President.

#### **Rule 5. President Pro Tempore**

(1) In case the President and Vice-President shall be absent at the hour to which the Senate had adjourned, the member of the majority party having the longest tenure in the Senate shall preside until a President pro tempore is chosen. If two or more members are equally qualified to preside, the eldest qualified member shall preside.

(2) The President pro tempore shall be invested with all of the powers and shall perform all the duties of the President. Whenever the President pro tempore is required to sign a bill or other instrument, the Clerk shall attach to such bill or other instrument a certificate stating that such President pro tempore was duly elected and is authorized to so sign.

#### **Rule 6. The Clerk**

It shall be the duty of the Clerk:

(1) To have charge of all records of the Senate and be responsible for the same. At no time shall the Clerk permit original documents to be withdrawn from the Clerk's keeping unless ordered by the Senate.

(2) To make a concise and complete memorandum of all petitions, motions, resolutions, amendments and other matters brought before the Senate. Such memoranda shall state the nature of the matter and the name of the introducer, and the date and day of the session on which the Senate considered the matter. The memoranda, together with other matters ordered to be placed therein, shall constitute the Journal, a copy of which shall be made available for inspection to any member upon request as soon as practicable. The Journal of each day shall be read the following day, immediately after the invocation. When such Journal is approved by vote of the Senate, it shall be entered by the Clerk in a book entitled "Journal of the Senate. Session of \_\_\_\_." (Giving the Year).

(3) Unless otherwise directed by the Senate, to read all bills, resolutions and other matters (if so required) to the Senate.

(4) To forward at once all letters, messages, communications and other matters to the proper parties.

(5) To immediately deliver to the Chair of the appropriate committee all petitions, resolutions, bills or other matters duly referred to such committee.

(6) To see that all bills and resolutions are properly engrossed and are correct and true as finally acted upon by the Senate.

(7) To draw on the state general fund for expenses of the session as shall be authorized by the Senate and approved by the Leadership Committee on Legislative Management.

(8) To pay all bills and accounts as shall be approved by the Leadership Committee on Legislative Management, or ordered by the Senate, and no others.

(9) To be responsible for the acquisition and distribution of all of the property of the Senate.

(10) To note all questions of order with the decision thereon, collect the same, and append them to the Senate Journal at the close of the session.

(11) To perform all other clerical duties and functions pertaining to the Office of the Clerk and as the Senate from time to time shall direct. The Clerk shall post the order of business in writing in a conspicuous place each day.

#### **Rule 7. Assistant Clerk**

The Assistant Clerk shall assist the Clerk in the performance of all duties and attend to such other duties as may be required when so directed by the President. In the absence of the Clerk, the Assistant Clerk shall perform all duties of the Clerk.

#### **Rule 8. Invocation**



Each day's sitting of the Senate shall open with an invocation.

**Rule 9. Sergeant-at-Arms**

It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to attend the Senate on every day of meeting; to maintain order among those present as spectators; to give notice to the Presiding Officer of the attendance of any person with communications or otherwise; to supervise the distribution of incidentals which require distribution among the members; to supervise, subject to the control of the President, the Senate Messengers; to attend upon committees if so requested; to serve all orders to process directed by the President or Senate; to make all required arrests of members or other persons, and to retain the same in custody; to have the charge and responsibility for the postal requirements of the Senate; and generally to execute all of the requirements of the President of the Senate.

**Rule 10. Responsibility of Officers and Employees**

The employees shall perform such duties as may be assigned by the President or prescribed by the Senate.

All officers and employees of the Senate shall be directly answerable to the President, and shall obey and perform all the President's orders and directions, subject to revision by the Senate. If required by the President, any officer or employee shall give a bond for the faithful performance of duties.

An oath of office shall be administered to each officer.

**Rule 11. Pay of Members, Officers and Employees**

(1) Each member of the Senate, upon being elected or appointed to office, shall receive as compensation such salary as prescribed pursuant to Article III, Section 9, of the State Constitution.

(2) The officers, except the President and Vice-President, and the employees shall receive compensation as the Senate shall fix.

**PART II. COMMITTEES****Rule 12. Committees: Types and Composition**

(1) Standing Committees: The membership of each Standing Committee and the respective Chair and Vice-Chair thereof shall be appointed by the President, subject to action by the Senate. The majority and minority parties shall be represented on all Standing Committees on such basis as prescribed by the Senate; provided that such basis be at least that of proportional representation. The nomination of the minority party members to all Standing Committees shall be made by the minority party.

(2) Leadership Committees shall consist of members drawn from the ranks of the Senate leadership.

(3) Special Committees shall consist of not less than three members each, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate and shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the specific matter referred. The Senate may establish investigative committees pursuant to Chapter 21, Hawaii Revised Statutes; such committees shall have such powers and be bound by such conditions as may be provided by law or by these Rules.

(4) Conference Committees shall consist of not less than three members each, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the matter referred.

(5) The Committee of the Whole Senate.

**Rule 13. Committee Chair and Vice-Chair**

The first person named on the Committee shall be Chair; the second member named shall be Vice-Chair. The Chair shall call meetings and preside.

**Rule 14. Committees: Control and Excuse from Membership**

Committees shall be under the control of and subject to the orders of the Senate, and shall faithfully carry out such orders. Any member may be excused from serving on any committee at the time of appointment, if already a member of four other committees.

**Rule 15. Standing Committees**

Standing Committees shall be appointed for each major subject matter area at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as possible, to serve during the Sixteenth Legislature. The major subject matter areas and the Standing Committees therefor shall be as follows:

**EDUCATION AND CULTURE**

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to promote the intellectual development and cultural enrichment of the community. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (1) Committee on Culture, Arts and Historic Preservation, whose scope shall be those programs relating to culture, arts and historic site development and protection.
- (2) Committee on Education, whose scope shall be those programs relating to lower education, the University of Hawaii and the community college system, continuing education and the public libraries.

#### **HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES**

This major subject area covers those programs which are intended to improve the physical and mental health of the people, and to promote social welfare services. The Standing Committee for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (3) Committee on Health and Human Services, whose scope shall be those programs relating to general health, maternal and child care, communicable diseases, dental health, medical and hospital services, mental health, mental retardation and hospitals, financial assistance, promotion of the general well-being of Hawaii's youth and elderly population, vocational rehabilitation and social welfare services.

#### **DEVELOPMENT AND GROWTH**

This major subject matter area covers those programs which relate to the economy, including tourism, adequate and affordable housing, and issues relating to the Hawaiian community. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (4) Committee on Science, Technology and Economic Development, whose scope shall be those programs relating to new industry development, capital attraction, financial and technical assistance to business, ocean resources, high technology, telecommunications, and the regulation of public utilities and carriers under the Public Utilities Commission.
- (5) Committee on Tourism and Recreation, whose scope shall be those programs relating to tourism, outdoor recreation, sports and athletics, state parks and beaches, recreational boating and Aloha Stadium.
- (6) Committee on Housing and Hawaiian Affairs, whose scope shall be those programs relating to housing development, leasehold, landlord tenant code, condominium property regime, Hawaiian Homes, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs and issues relating to the Hawaiian community.

#### **PLANNING, NATURAL RESOURCES AND ENVIRONMENT**

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to provide for prudent planning and use of land, water, and other valuable natural resources. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (7) Committee on Agriculture and Environmental Protection, whose scope shall be those programs related to agriculture, including aquaculture, fisheries, and mariculture, ocean mining, the water code, as it may relate to agriculture and the environment, environmental control, protection and health, and the development and promotion of Hawaii's relations with the Pacific region.
- (8) Committee on Planning, Land and Water Use Management, whose scope shall be issues relating to state planning, urban renewal, community development, the utilization of land and water resources, zoning and land use, coastal zone management, and land reclamation.
- (9) Committee on Transportation and Intergovernmental Relations, whose scope shall be those programs relating to air, water and surface transportation, relations among the federal, state and county governments, and matters of primary concern to the counties or to particular counties.

#### **JUSTICE, INDIVIDUAL AND PROPERTY RIGHTS, CIVIL LAW**

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to safeguard individual and property rights, protect consumers from fraudulent and deceptive practices, and improve the conduct of business affairs. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (10) Committee on Judiciary, whose scope shall be those programs relating to courts, crime prevention and control, criminal code revisions, statutory revision, judicial and legal questions, campaigns and elections, constitutional matters, programs of the Attorney General, Public Defender and of the Judiciary, and individual rights and civil liberties.
- (11) Committee on Consumer Protection and Business Regulation, whose scope shall be those programs relating to business regulation, occupation licensing, consumer protection, financial institutions, and insurance regulation.
- (12) Committee on Employment and Public Institutions, whose scope shall be those programs relating to government efficiency, public records, public purchasing and contracts, public officers and employees, labor, employment opportunities, labor-management relations, collective bargaining, public safety, corrections, military and civil defense.

#### **FINANCIAL PLANNING AND MANAGEMENT**

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to produce the efficient, effective, economical and equitable acquisition and utilization of financial resources. The Standing Committee for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (13) Committee on Ways and Means, whose scope shall be those programs relating to overall state financing policies, including taxation and other revenues, cash and debt management, and statewide implementation of planning, programming, budgeting and evaluation, government structure and finance.

**Rule 16. Standing Committees: General Responsibility**

On the bills referred to it by the President, the committee shall determine objectives, make program recommendations and, where appropriate, make expenditure recommendations. On bills that have been referred by the President to more than one committee, subsequent referral committees shall make no substantive change without prior written notice of such change to the first referral committee and consultation and coordination with that committee, via its chair, prior to the transmittal of the amended bill and committee report to the Clerk of the Senate for floor action. For those bills which require appropriations, the committee shall make expenditure recommendations consistent with the expenditure allocations established for the bills by the Standing Committee on Ways and Means, which shall make the final recommendation to the Senate. The members of the Standing Committee on Ways and Means designated as budget liaisons with the subject matter committees shall provide consultation and coordination assistance between the two committees. The Ways and Means Committee shall consult with the budget liaisons on all budget matters concerning the liaisons' respective subject matter areas.

**Rule 17. Committee on Ways and Means: Special Responsibility**

It shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means, in considering the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill, to determine for each fiscal year of the biennium the appropriate level of total expenditures and the level of expenditures for program areas. The Committee on Ways and Means member assigned as budget liaison to a Standing Committee shall make program expenditure recommendations after consultation with the Standing Committee chair. The budget liaison will make a good faith effort to coordinate and harmonize the policy and program recommendations of the subject matter committee with the fiscal and budgetary guidelines of the Committee on Ways and Means.

To the extent practicable, the Committee on Ways and Means shall arrange to make available to members of the Senate information regarding the contents of the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill during the 48-hour period prior to the passage of such bills on third and final reading.

In all other bills requiring appropriations, it shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means to inform the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates of the amount and type of financial resources available, and it shall review the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee to determine that the recommendation is consistent with the resources available.

In determining the amount and type of resources available for a bill requiring an appropriation and in reviewing the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee, the Committee on Ways and Means shall invite the recommendation of the chair of the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates. The recommendation shall be submitted through the Standing Committee's designated budget liaison.

**Rule 18. Leadership Committees**

Leadership Committees shall be appointed at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as possible, to serve during the Sixteenth Legislature. Because Leadership Committees have jurisdiction over issues of organizational and institutional interest to the Senate, their membership shall be drawn from the ranks of the Senate leadership. This will thus assure high-level consideration of these issues. The Leadership Committees of the Senate shall be as follows:

- (1) Leadership Committee on Legislative Management, whose scope shall be the operations of the legislative branch of government, the Rules of the Senate and those programs relating to the establishment and operations of legislative support agencies, such as the Office of the Legislative Auditor, the Ombudsman and the Legislative Reference Bureau. In the event of an electoral contest, it shall investigate and report upon the certificates of election of members.
- (2) Leadership Committee on Executive Appointments, whose scope shall be to review the background, character, experience, and qualifications of nominees for executive and judicial offices submitted by the Governor, and make appropriate recommendations to the Senate.

**Rule 19. Leadership Committee on Legislative Management: Special Responsibility**

The Leadership Committee on Legislative Management shall:

- (1) Make recommendations to the President on the procedures and manner in which the administrative and personnel operations of the Senate should be conducted.
- (2) Make recommendations on the expenses to be included in the appropriations bills providing for the expenses of the Legislature and procedures to ensure that the expenses of the Senate are in accordance with the appropriation acts providing therefor.

For administrative purposes, the committee may authorize the chair to perform such duties on its behalf as it may deem appropriate.

#### **Rule 20. Meetings of Committees**

Meetings, including decision-making sessions, of Leadership and Standing Committees shall be public provided that meetings in executive session may be allowed in such exceptional circumstances when committee discussion could unfairly damage the reputation of individuals or where there is a legal question concerning a bill. Notice of such meetings and decision-making sessions shall be publicly posted at least 48 hours prior to such meetings provided that the notice may be waived with the approval of the President upon good cause shown.

No committee shall sit during the time when the Senate is actually in session without first securing the approval of the President, except Conference Committees which may sit at any time.

As practicable, committees shall schedule their meetings at times and at places as are convenient for attendance by the general public, and in coordination with other committees of the House or Senate, shall endeavor to hold joint meetings and public hearings on matters of mutual interest.

The meetings of the Conference Committee shall be conducted as agreed upon by the members of the Conference Committee. Conference Committee meetings and decision-making sessions shall be public. Public notice of Conference Committee meetings shall be given to the extent practicable.

#### **Rule 21. Committee Reports**

(1) The Leadership and Standing Committees shall report from time to time upon all matters referred to them.

(2) Special Committees shall report upon matters referred to them within the time permitted in the appointment of the Special Committee unless further time is given by vote of the Senate.

(3) A Conference Committee shall not report upon the matter referred unless a majority of the members appointed by the President have concurred in the report.

#### **Rule 22. Committees: Factfinding and Content of Reports**

(1) Whenever any matter shall be referred to a committee it shall be the duty of the committee to make diligent inquiry into all of the facts and circumstances connected with the matter. If necessary, witnesses shall be summoned or subpoenaed, and everything shall be done to bring all facts pertaining to the matter before the Senate in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 21 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes. The President may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21, relating to the issuance of subpoenas, and the President, committee chair and other duly delegated members of the Senate may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21 aforesaid, relating to the administering of oaths, and the compelling of witnesses who have been subpoenaed to testify. All committee meetings held on matters referred to it by the Senate shall be open to the public unless otherwise ordered by the Senate or otherwise provided by these Rules.

(2) The report of the committee shall state findings of fact and conclusions based thereon, together with a distinct recommendation as to the disposal of that matter.

(3) A report upon a bill shall state clearly the amendments, if any, proposed. If a substitute bill for one or more referred to the committee shall be reported, such substitute bill shall agree with the subject of the bill or bills returned to the Senate.

(4) Whenever a committee fails to agree, the majority shall report and it shall be the report of the committee. The minority may report or simply write upon the report of the majority the words "I (or we) do not concur," signing the same. The final vote of each member of a committee upon any matter referred to it shall be recorded in the records of the committee.

#### **Rule 23. Committee of the Whole**

(1) The Senate from time to time may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole. Whenever any matter shall be referred to such committee upon the adoption of a motion to that effect, the President shall call some member to take the Chair (unless the Senate shall nominate a chair), which being done, the Senate then shall be in committee.

(2) The Clerk of the Senate shall act as Clerk of the Committee of the Whole without extra compensation, and shall make a careful record of the proceedings, which shall be filed as one of the records of the Senate.

(3) The committee, on motion, may rise and ask leave to sit at any future time.

(4) When a bill shall be referred to the Committee of the Whole, the bill shall be first read throughout by the Clerk, and then again read and debated by sections, leaving the preamble to be the last. All amendments, noting the page and line, shall be duly entered by the Clerk on a separate paper, as the same shall be agreed to by the committee, and so reported. When a bill is ordered into Committee of the Whole, such order may dispense with the reading of the whole bill before considering it section by section.

(5) In Committee of the Whole, the rules of procedure in the Senate shall be observed except that any member may speak more than once on the same subject, but no person shall speak a second or further time until others desiring to speak shall have had an opportunity, nor shall the motion for the previous question be allowed. A time limit for debate may be fixed by vote.

**PART III. SESSIONS; ATTENDANCE; NOMINATIONS****Rule 24. Meetings**

(1) The Senate shall meet for the transaction of public business every day, except Saturdays, Sundays, legal holidays and such other days as the Senate shall designate by motion or resolution duly adopted and entered in the Journal.

(2) The regular hour of meetings of the Senate is established at eleven-thirty o'clock a.m. but the hour of meeting, recess and adjournment for any day may be such as the Senate, by motion, shall decide from time to time.

**Rule 25. Attendance**

No member shall be absent from the sessions of the Senate unless given leave by the President or unless the member is sick and unable to attend.

**Rule 26. Extension of Session**

Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to extend any session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

"To the President of the Senate and the  
Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the House of Representatives of the \_\_\_\_\_ Legislature of the State of Hawaii, respectfully request an extension of \_\_\_\_ days of the \_\_\_\_ session of \_\_\_\_\_ of the \_\_\_\_\_ Legislature of the State of Hawaii."

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation extending the session for the number of days sought in the petition.

**Rule 27. Recessed Session**

Any session of the Legislature may be recessed by concurrent resolution adopted by a majority of the members to which each house is entitled. Each regular session shall be recessed pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Constitution for not less than five days at some period between the twentieth and fortieth days of the regular session.

**Rule 28. Special Sessions**

(1) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to call a special session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

"To the President of the Senate and the  
Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the House of Representatives of the \_\_\_\_\_ Legislature of the State of Hawaii, respectfully request that a special session of the \_\_\_\_\_ Legislature of the State of Hawaii be convened at \_\_\_\_\_."

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation convening the Legislature in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

(2) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled may petition the President of the Senate to call a special session of the Senate for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities established by Article VI, Section 3, of the Constitution. The petition shall read:

"To the President of the Senate

Your petitioners, members of the Senate of the \_\_\_\_\_ Legislature of the State of Hawaii, respectfully request that a special session of the Senate of the State of Hawaii be convened at \_\_\_\_\_."

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, the President of the Senate shall issue a proclamation convening the Senate in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

**Rule 29. Adjournments**

Meetings may be adjourned at any time. Unless otherwise specified in the motion, every adjournment shall be considered as being to the established hour of meeting on the following business day; but no adjournment shall be for more than three days, or sine die, without the consent of the House of Representatives.

**Rule 30. Motion to Adjourn**

A motion to adjourn is always in order, and shall be decided without debate. One motion to adjourn shall not follow another without intervening business.

A motion to adjourn without naming any time shall always be held as an adjournment to the regular hour of meeting of the next business day.

**Rule 31. Quorum**

For the transaction of business, a majority of the number of members to which the Senate is entitled shall constitute a quorum, of which quorum a majority vote shall suffice, but the final passage of a bill shall require the vote of the majority of the members of the Senate. A smaller number than a quorum may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members. For the purpose of compelling the attendance of absent members, a majority of the members present, by resolution, may direct the Sergeant-at-Arms to place the members who are absent under arrest and to return them to the Senate. Any warrant pursuant to such a resolution shall be issued in the name of the Senate and shall be signed by the member then presiding. For the purpose of ascertaining whether there is a quorum present, the President shall count the members present.

**Rule 32. Executive Session**

(1) If the Senate considers it necessary to act confidentially upon any communication from the Governor or upon any nomination or other matter, it may go into executive session.

(2) When any member desires to make known any matter to the Senate which the member deems should be confidential and private, the member shall communicate that desire to the President who shall decide whether the Senate shall go into executive session. The Senate may decide whether the matter communicated shall be kept secret.

**Rule 33. Clearing of the Senate**

(1) When acting upon confidential business in executive session, the Senate Chambers shall be cleared of all persons except the members of the Senate and such other persons as the presiding officer with the consent of the Senate shall deem necessary.

(2) The members, officers and employees shall keep the secrets of the Senate and any other person whose presence is permitted in executive session shall be sworn to secrecy.

(3) All confidential communications made to the Senate, and remarks, votes and proceedings thereon, shall be kept strictly secret by the members, officers and employees, as well as by such other persons as have been detained or permitted to attend upon the consideration of such matters, until the Senate, by resolution, takes off such seal of secrecy, or unless such matter be later considered in open session.

**Rule 34. Nominations; Appointments**

(1) When nominations, except those of justices and judges, shall be made by the Governor to the Senate, unless otherwise ordered, they shall be referred to the Leadership Committee on Executive Appointments within 5 legislative days of receipt of such nominations from the Governor. The final question on every nomination shall be "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?" which question shall not be put sooner than twenty-four hours from the time when the nomination is received, nor on the day in which it may be reported by a committee, unless by unanimous consent. Public hearings shall be held for all nominees prior to confirmation.

(2) The fact of a nomination, or its rejection or confirmation, need not be kept secret, but when the Senate or any committee thereof shall deem it necessary for good cause, all remarks, proceedings and votes thereon shall be kept secret.

(3) Consent to the appointment of justices and judges shall be pursuant to Article VI, Section 3, of the State Constitution.

**Rule 35. Meeting at Place Other than Capitol**

Whenever, for any reason, the Governor shall convene the Senate at any place other than the Capitol, it shall attend together with all of its officers at the time and place ordered.

**PART IV. ORDER OF BUSINESS****Rule 36. Order of Business: General**

After invocation, roll call and the reading of the Journal, the President shall call for business in the following order:

- (1) Messages from the Governor.

- (2) Reports and communications from the state officers.
- (3) Communications, bills, resolutions and other matters from the House of Representatives.
- (4) Concurrent and senate resolutions and introduction of bills.
- (5) Reports of Conference and Joint Committees.
- (6) Reports of Leadership Committee on Legislative Management.
- (7) Reports of Standing Committees.
- (8) Reports of other Leadership Committees.
- (9) Unfinished business, upon which the Senate was engaged at the time of its last adjournment.
- (10) The Order of the Day.
- (11) Petitions, memorials and miscellaneous communications.
- (12) Any miscellaneous business on the President's table.

**Rule 37. Order of Business: Special**

The Senate, by previous motion, may direct that any matter named shall be made a special order of business and that such special order shall take precedence of all business after the fourth order, or that it shall take any other position lower down on the calendar.

**Rule 38. Order of Business: Committee Reports and Gubernatorial Messages**

Reports from Conference or Joint Committees, and from the Leadership Committee on Legislative Management, shall be in order at all times after the second order of business, and, upon motion, messages from the Governor or from the House of Representatives may be received at any time. Without unanimous consent, however, such messages or reports shall not be in order for discussion when received, but shall be placed on the calendar as unfinished business.

**Rule 39. Order of Business: Order of the Day**

After the first seven orders of business (set forth in Rule 36), it shall be in order, pending consideration thereof, to move that the Senate proceed to dispose of the unfinished business or to the Order of the Day. If such motion be decided in the affirmative, such consideration shall immediately be taken up.

**Rule 40. Order of Business: Unfinished Business**

The unfinished business in which the Senate was engaged at the time of the last adjournment shall have the preference in the Order of the Day. Until the former is disposed of, no motion for any other business shall be received without special leave of the Senate.

**Rule 41. Order of Business: Questions on Priority**

All questions relating to the priority of business to be acted upon shall be decided without debate.

**PART V. BILLS; RESOLUTIONS**

**Rule 42. Bills: Introduction**

Any bill may be introduced on the report of the committee or by any member, except appropriation bills subject to the next paragraph and except short form bills which may only be introduced by the majority party leader or the minority party leader after appropriate consultation with committee chairs and other members of the Senate.

The Executive Budget, Judiciary Budget, Legislative Budget, General Appropriations Bill, Supplemental Appropriations Bill, Office of Hawaiian Affairs Budget, and bills for criminal injuries compensation, for claims against the State and for funding of collective bargaining agreements may be introduced only by the majority party leader or the minority party leader after appropriate consultation with committee chairs and other members of the Senate. Each member may introduce only one bill appropriating money for capital improvements projects in the member's district. The majority party leader and the minority party leader shall develop a policy governing individual member's introduction of bills intended to appropriate money or to authorize the issuance of state bonds.

All bills shall be introduced under the order of resolutions.

Bills which shall carry over from a regular session in an odd-numbered year to the next regular session shall retain the numbers assigned to them. The Clerk shall keep a record of the status of all bills in possession of the Senate at the end of the odd-numbered year session and shall publish the record of the status of all such bills prior to the convening of the next regular session.

Every bill introduced or reported out of any committee, which amends an existing section or subsection of the Hawaii Revised Statutes or Sessions Laws of Hawaii, shall set forth the section or subsection in full, and the matter to be deleted shall be enclosed in brackets and any new matter added to the section or subsection shall be underscored. However, a Supplemental Appropriations Bill need not conform to this rule or an amending bill where the intent and effect of an amending bill can be clearly identified and understood without repeating the entire section or subsection, in which case only the paragraphs, subparagraphs, clauses or items to be amended need be set forth as the President may allow. The President may allow additional exceptions to this rule.

No floor amendment to a bill shall be voted upon unless a copy of such amendment shall have been presented to the Clerk who shall prepare and distribute copies of the amendment to each member of the Senate present.

#### **Rule 43. Bills: Referral to Committee**

(1) Upon introduction all bills shall be numbered by the Clerk in numerical sequence, shall bear an identification as a Senate Bill, and shall pass first reading.

(2) Each such bill shall be referred by the President to one or more appropriate Leadership or Standing Committees for consideration.

(3) Each Leadership and Standing Committee shall consider the bills referred to it as expeditiously as may be possible.

(4) Bills introduced in short form.

(a) If a majority of the committee to which a short form bill has been referred determines that such bill should receive the further consideration of the same committee or another committee in the same or in an amended form, it shall report that fact to the Senate, together with its recommendation that either: (1) the bill pass first reading by title and be referred again to the same or another committee for further consideration, or (2) the bill in an amended form pass first reading by title and be referred again to the same or another committee for further consideration.

(b) The form of the committee report, upon reporting such a bill to the Senate recommending its passage on first reading without amendment and for referral again to a committee for further consideration shall be substantially as follows:

Your Committee on \_\_\_\_\_, to which was referred S.B. No. \_\_\_\_ entitled \_\_\_\_\_ begs leave to report that your Committee has considered such Bill and recommends that it pass First Reading by title and be referred to the Committee on \_\_\_\_\_ for further consideration.

(c) The form of the committee report, upon reporting such a bill to the Senate recommending passage on first reading in an amended form and for referral again to a committee for further consideration shall be substantially as follows:

Your Committee on \_\_\_\_\_, to which was referred S.B. No. \_\_\_\_ entitled \_\_\_\_\_ begs leave to report that your Committee has considered such Bill and is in accord with the intent and purpose of S.B. No. \_\_\_\_, S.D. 1, and be recommitted to the Committee on \_\_\_\_\_ for further consideration.

#### **Rule 44. Bills: Required Readings**

No bill shall pass the Senate unless it shall have passed three readings in the Senate on separate days. The President shall give notice in each instance whether it be the first, second or third reading.

#### **Rule 45. Bills: First Reading**

(1) The first reading of a bill shall be for information. If opposition be made to it, the question shall be: "Shall this bill be rejected?" which question may be debated. But no one shall speak more than once upon such question, except the introducer of the bill, who may close the debate.

(2) If the question to reject be negative, the bill shall go to its second reading without question.

#### **Rule 46. Bills: Second Reading**

A bill upon its second reading, may be read by its title only. It then shall be subject to a motion to commit. If it is not referred to a Leadership Committee, Standing Committee, or to a Special Committee, but is ordered to be considered in Committee of the Whole, a day for such consideration shall be determined by the chair of such committee. When the bill shall be reported from committee it shall take its place in the order of business for future consideration.

#### **Rule 47. Bills: Third Reading**

(1) No bill shall pass third or final reading in the Senate unless printed copies of the bill in the form to be passed have been made available to the members of the Senate for at least 48 hours. Form to be passed means the form in which a bill is to be (a) passed on third reading in the Senate, (b) concurred to by the Senate after amendments have been made by the House, or (c) passed by the Senate after a Conference Committee has agreed upon it.

(2) A bill on its third or final reading may be read by its title only, and the President then shall ask the Senate: "Shall this bill pass its third reading?" or "Shall this bill pass its final reading?" as the case may be. Upon the final passage of any bill, the Ayes and Noes shall be called. Such passage shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members of the Senate and the Ayes and Noes shall be entered on the Journal.



**Rule 48. Bills: Property of Senate**

All bills introduced in the Senate shall be deemed the property of the Senate and under its control unless they shall become law, however subject to the right of the House of Representatives to amend or to refuse to agree with the bills.

Any bill pending at the final adjournment of a regular session in an odd-numbered year shall carry over with the same status to the next regular session; provided that if such bill shall have passed third reading in the Senate in an odd-numbered session, it shall pass at least one reading in the Senate in the next regular session upon its return to the Senate from the House.

**Rule 49. Bills: Recall from Committee**

Twenty days after a bill has been referred to a committee, the same may be recalled from such committee by the affirmative vote of one-third of the members of the Senate.

**Rule 50. Matters Tabled**

When a bill or resolution or other matter has been laid upon the table, it shall not thereafter be taken from the table and be considered or restored to a place upon the calendar of the Senate without the consent of a majority.

**Rule 51. Bills: Amendments**

All amendments proposed to any bill shall be in writing, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and shall be sent to the Clerk's desk to be filed with the bill.

**Rule 52. Bills: Certification**

When a bill is passed it shall be certified by the Clerk who shall note the day of its passage at the bottom of the last page of the bill.

**Rule 53. Bills: Received from House of Representatives**

Whenever a bill which has finally passed the House of Representatives shall be certified to the Senate for its action, such bill shall be read three times before final passage, in accordance with the provision of the rules for the passage of bills introduced in the Senate.

**Rule 54. Bills: Transmittal to House of Representatives**

When a bill originating in the Senate shall have passed its third reading, or when a bill originating in the House which has been received from the House shall have been amended, or when a carry-over bill from an odd-numbered year originating in the House passes its third reading in the Senate in an even-numbered year session, such bill or such amended bill shall immediately be certified by the President and Clerk and sent to the House of Representatives for its consideration.

**Rule 55. Bills: Correction of Errors**

When a bill has passed both the Senate and the House of Representatives and an error in it is discovered prior to its having received the approval of the Governor, the bill may be returned by Concurrent Resolution to the House last considering the bill for proper correction.

**Rule 56. Bills: Order of Consideration**

(1) The Clerk shall send bills that have passed first reading to be printed immediately. When they have been printed and circulated to the members of the Senate, the President shall refer them to the various committees. When the committees have considered them and reported on them, the committees shall return them to the Clerk, and the Clerk shall place them in the Second Reading File. The Senate shall consider them in the order in which they appear in the Second Reading File.

(2) The Clerk shall arrange bills that have passed second reading in the order of their passage on second reading, regardless of the date of their reference to committee or the date of the committee report on them. The Clerk shall place them on the Third Reading File in the order in which they passed second reading and the Senate shall consider them on third reading in that same order. However, if the third reading of a bill is set for some particular date, that bill shall be removed from the Third Reading File.

**Rule 57. Bills: Special Order of Consideration**

All bills and other matters set for consideration on particular dates, shall be arranged in the order of the several votes making such assignments. A list shall be made of such special orders, and when the time for consideration arrives, such bills and other matters shall be considered in the order of assignment. If an adjournment shall be had before all of such special orders are disposed of, the remainder shall go over and come under the head of unfinished business on the following day, unless otherwise ordered.

**Rule 58. Resolutions and Motions: Form**

All resolutions shall be typewritten, dated and signed by the introducer, otherwise they shall not be considered. The Senate shall not introduce any congratulatory, commemorative or memorial resolution but shall express the sentiment contained in such resolutions by means of a suitable certificate. Motions and amendments may be verbal but shall be reduced to writing if requested by the President, and shall be read from the desk if so ordered.

**Rule 59. Motions: Second Required**

No motion shall be received and considered by the Senate until the motion shall be seconded.

**Rule 60. Motions: Disposition**

After a motion is stated or read by the President, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Senate, and shall be disposed of by vote of the Senate; however, it may be withdrawn by the movant at any time before an amendment has been adopted or before the decision on the motion if not amended.

**Rule 61. Motions Applicable to Pending Matters**

Whenever any bill or resolution or other matter shall be under discussion, the only motions relative thereto shall be:

- (1) To lay upon the table,
- (2) To postpone to a certain time,
- (3) To postpone indefinitely,
- (4) To commit, and
- (5) To amend,

which motions shall have precedence in the order named.

The first two motions shall be decided without debate and shall be put as soon as made.

When any of the motions shall be decided in the negative, they shall not be revived the same day relative to the main question under discussion. If all are negative as aforesaid, the only remaining question shall be as to the adoption of the bill, resolution or other main question.

**Rule 62. Matters Postponed Indefinitely**

When a question is postponed indefinitely, the question shall not be acted upon again during the session in which it was introduced.

**Rule 63. Motion for Previous Question**

The object of the motion for the previous question is to cut off debate. It shall always be in order. It shall require a three-fifths vote to carry it.

Whenever the motion shall be carried, the author of the resolution or introducer of the bill under discussion shall be permitted to close the debate, after which the main question, subject to Rule 61, shall be put. The author or introducer may delegate to another such right to close.

**Rule 64. Motion for Reconsideration**

(1) When a motion has been once made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall not be in order for any member who voted in the minority to move for a reconsideration thereof; but any member who voted with the majority may move to reconsider it on the same or the succeeding day of session, or, with the consent of the Senate, on any subsequent day and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions, except a motion to adjourn.

(2) When a motion for reconsideration has been decided by vote, that vote shall not be reconsidered.

(3) When a bill or resolution or other matter upon which a vote has been taken shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate, and shall have been transmitted to the House of Representatives, a motion to reconsider shall be deemed to include a request to the House to return the same. If not complied with by the House, then the vote on the motion to reconsider shall be set aside. If such motion shall pass, the Clerk shall promptly communicate to the House the request for return of the matter to be reconsidered.

**PART VII. PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS****Rule 65. Petitions, Memorials, and Miscellaneous Communications**

(1) Any person may petition the Senate. Petitions and other memorials, except as provided in Rule 58, shall be in writing, signed by the petitioners.

(2) All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the Senate or to the President and members shall be presented to the Senate by the Clerk.

(3) A brief statement of the contents of such petitions, memorials or other papers shall be made orally by the Clerk.

(4) Every such petition, memorial or other paper shall be ordered filed or referred to a committee, as of course, by the President, unless such action is objected to by a member at the time such petition, memorial or other paper is presented.

(5) No such petition, memorial or other paper shall be debated on the day it is presented, except with the consent of the Senate.

### **PART VIII. ORDER; DEBATE; VOTING**

#### **Rule 66. Questions of Order**

(1) A question of order may be raised at any stage of the proceedings, except during the calling of the roll when the Ayes and Noes are called for. Unless submitted to the Senate, such questions shall be decided without debate by the presiding officer, subject to an appeal to the Senate. Laying such appeal on the table shall be held as sustaining the ruling of the presiding officer.

(2) Any question of order may be submitted to the Senate for its decision.

#### **Rule 67. Debate: General Limitation**

No member shall speak more than twice, unless such member be the movant of the matter pending, in which case such member shall not be permitted to speak in reply until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

#### **Rule 68. Voting: Methods**

There shall be five methods of ascertaining the decision of the Senate upon any matter.

(1) First, by voice or raising of hands; Second, by rising; Third, by ballot; Fourth, by call of the roll of the members and a record of the Clerk of the vote of each; and Fifth, by unanimous consent.

(2) Whenever the Senate is ready to vote on any question, the President shall rise, and after stating the question, shall request all those in favor of the affirmative of the question to vote "Aye." The President then shall call upon all voting in the negative of the question to vote "No." The President then shall announce the result to the Senate.

(3) If any member shall doubt the result, as announced, the President again shall state the question and call upon the members to vote by rising in their places, and they shall remain standing until counted, and the result again shall be announced.

(4) The method of voting by ballot shall be as customary. The President shall appoint one or more tellers, or direct the Messengers to collect the ballots, which shall be counted by the Clerk, and otherwise prescribed by these rules, on motion, the Senate may vote upon any question by ballot.

(5) Whenever one-fifth of the members present shall request, the Clerk shall call the roll of the members of the Senate. Each member, when called, shall vote in a clear loud voice, "Aye," if voting in the affirmative, or "No," if voting in the negative. The Clerk shall record each vote and such record shall become a part of the Journal of the Senate. The President shall announce the results as above set forth.

(6) With the unanimous consent of the Senate, the President may direct the Clerk to record an "Aye" vote for each member of the Senate. If there is no objection, the Clerk shall so record the vote. If there is objection, the President shall ask for the names of the members voting "No" and order the Clerk to record no votes for them.

#### **Rule 69. Voting: Rights of Members**

(1) No member, on any account, shall refrain from voting unless excused by the President. A member may vote "Kanalua" the first time the member's name is called by the Clerk on any vote, but if the member votes "Kanalua" on the next call of the member's name, the member's vote shall be recorded as "Aye."

(2) The President may excuse a member who has a monetary interest in the question, or whose right to a seat in the Senate will be affected by the question, or whose official conduct is involved in the question. If a member thinks there may be a personal interest in the question, the member shall rise and disclose the interest to the President. The President then shall rule whether the member has a conflict of interest. If so, the member shall be excused from voting.

(3) Whenever the Ayes and Noes are called, no one, without unanimous consent, shall be permitted to explain a vote.

(4) After the announcement by the President of the result, no one shall be allowed to vote or to change a vote.

### **PART IX. DECORUM; DISCLOSURES; PUNISHMENT**

#### **Rule 70. Punishment of Members**

The Senate may punish a member for misconduct, disorderly behavior or neglect of duty by censure, or upon a two-thirds vote of all the members of the Senate, by suspension or expulsion of such member.

The President may appoint a Special Committee to investigate, hear and report upon the conduct of any member charged by the Senate for misconduct, disorderly behavior or neglect of duty. Any member so charged by the Senate shall be informed in writing of the specific charge or charges made against the member and have opportunity to present evidence and be heard in the member's own defense. Following its investigation and hearing the Special Committee shall file its report with the President setting forth its findings and recommendations.

In the event the committee recommends censure, suspension or expulsion, the President shall present the report of the committee to the Senate for its consideration and decision. The Senate, by a majority vote, may censure a member or, upon a two-thirds vote of all the members of the Senate, suspend or expel a member.

**Rule 71. Decorum: Transgression of Rules**

If any member transgresses the rules of the Senate, the President, or any member, may call such member to order, and, when so called to order, immediately shall sit down. The President then shall decide the question of order without debate, subject to an appeal to the Senate.

The President may call for the sense of the Senate on any question of order.

**Rule 72. Decorum: Address**

When any member is about to speak, such member shall rise from the member's seat and address all remarks to the President. While speaking, the member shall confine all remarks to the question under debate, shall refer to other Senators by title only (e.g., "Senator from the \_\_\_\_\_ District"; "The Chair of the Committee on \_\_\_\_\_"; "The Majority Leader,") and not by name and shall avoid personalities.

**Rule 73. Decorum: Person Called to Order While Speaking**

Whenever any person shall be called to order while speaking, such person shall be deemed to be in possession of the floor when the question of order is decided and may proceed with the matter under discussion.

**Rule 74. Decorum: Presence in Senate**

No person shall sit at the desk of the President or Clerk, except by permission of the President, nor shall any person, other than a member, officer or permitted employee or person, sit in the main Senate floor area during any of the sessions of the Senate.

**Rule 75. Decorum: Conduct in Session**

When the President is putting any question or addressing the Senate, no one shall walk out of the room or across the floor. When a member is speaking, no one shall entertain a private discourse, nor shall anyone pass between the member speaking and the Chair.

**Rule 76. Decorum: Disorderly Conduct in Session**

If, during any session of the Senate, any member should behave in a disorderly manner the President shall order the member to be seated and preserve the peace. If such member then shall persist in disorderly conduct, the President shall order the Sergeant-at-Arms to remove the member from the Senate and the member shall not be permitted to take a seat during the remainder of that day's session, except upon satisfactory pledge given to the Senate for future good behavior.

For the punishment of any person not a member, the provisions of Section 18, Article III, of the Constitution shall govern.

**Rule 77. Decorum: Recording of Debate Called to Order**

If any Senator is called to order for words spoken in debate, upon the member's demand or on that of any other Senator, the words objected to shall be taken down in writing and noted by the Clerk, and, if required, shall be read for the information of the Senate.

**Rule 78. Decorum: Smoking**

No member or other officer shall smoke within the Senate Chamber during any of the meetings of the Senate unless authorized by the President.

**Rule 79. Decorum: Solicitation Prohibited**

An officer or employee of the Senate shall not solicit subscriptions, for any purpose, from any other officer or employee thereof, nor from any Senator. Nor shall any person be permitted to solicit or receive subscriptions of contributions for any purpose on the floor or in the lobby of the Senate or in any Senate office.

**Rule 80. Disclosures**

Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission of the State of Hawaii, a disclosure of the member's private financial interests, as prescribed by law. Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission any change in such financial interests.

If a legislative matter which affects a member's interests arises before the member has made a disclosure to the Ethics Commission, the member shall disclose orally such interest to the Senate before voting. The member then shall immediately make the written disclosure required by law and the Rules of the Senate.

Any member who has filed a disclosure as required by this Rule need not make a further oral disclosure on the Senate floor of any interest so filed.

**Rule 81. Violating Confidence**

If any matter covered in Rule 33 or 34 shall be disclosed by any Senator, the Senator shall be liable to censure, or, by a two-thirds vote, to suspension or expulsion from the Senate. If an officer or other person authorized to hear such matter shall disclose the matter, such officer shall be dismissed and such other person shall be liable to punishment for contempt comparable to the punishment provided for by Section 18, Article III, of the Constitution and in the manner as therein prescribed.

**PART X. QUESTIONS TO STATE OFFICERS**

**Rule 82. Questions to State Officers**

Any member of the Senate may ask any question of any state officer relating to the officer's respective department reducing such questions to writing, over the member's signature, reading the same before the Senate, and furnishing the officer with a copy of such written question. Any officer questioned shall reply to such question upon the following day, unless the Senate shall grant a definite extension of time for replying.

**PART XI. AMENDMENT, SUSPENSION AND  
INTERPRETATION OF RULES**

**Rule 83. Amendments; Suspension**

(1) No rule of the Senate shall be amended or rescinded nor shall any new rule be adopted, without one day's notice of such change. Any such action shall require a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) Any rule may be suspended for a particular purpose with the unanimous consent of the Senate.

**Rule 84. Parliamentary Procedure**

Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedures, 1989 edition, where not inconsistent with the Rules and practices of the Senate, shall govern.
