FIRST DAY

Wednesday, January 15, 1992

In accordance with the provisions of Section 10 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, the Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, was called to order at 10:00 o'clock a.m., by the Honorable Richard S.H. Wong, President of the Senate.

At this time, the members of the Senate, guests and audience rose to sing the National Anthem and "Hawaii Ponoi," led by Senator Malama Solomon.

The Divine Blessing was then invoked by Father Bernard J. Eikmeier, Ewa Catholic Church, who was escorted to the rostrum by Senators Aki, Crozier and Koki.

The President then directed the Senate Clerk to call the Roll. The Clerk called the Roll showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Reed who was excused.

At this time, the President welcomed and introduced the following distinguished guests to the members of the Senate and guests:

The Honorable Frank F. Fasi, Mayor, City and County of Honolulu, and Mrs. Joyce Fasi;

The Honorable Linda Crockett Lingle, Mayor, County of Maui; and

The Honorable JoAnn A. Yukimura, Mayor, County of Kauai.

The President then addressed the members of the Senate and guests as follows:

"Governor Waihee, Lieutenant Governor Cayetano, Distinguished Guests, Ladies and Gentlemen: "Greetings and best wishes to all of you!

"It is with deep emotion that I stand before you today. After the Legislature adjourned last year, I did not think that I would be back here in this historic Capitol chamber.

"Still, it is good that we are back because it helps us to reflect upon our past accomplishments. We can see what we've done that's been positive and where we've fallen short of our goals. Still, it is not enough to look back, we have to look forward to the challenges awaiting us. We must be prepared to be innovative and creative, to seek new solutions to old problems.

"Last year on opening day, we were in a somber mood because of the imminent outbreak of Operation Desert Storm. Our traditional festivities had been cancelled and we were all anxious for the future. This year, even with the successful conclusion of the war, the future is still uncertain. We meet again today in a somber mood.

"Our session is a subdued one. However, in future years, it is my earnest hope that the Legislature will be able to once again convene in the midst of the traditional pageantry and flowers. That is an important part of our heritage, reflective of Hawaii's history and culture.

"The international order is changing. The cold war is coming to an end. And, while we are all hopeful about the prospects for world peace, the peace dividend is regretfully not materializing. The world is in the midst of an international recession, and Hawaii is being affected by it.

"We have a serious budget problem confronting us this year. The Council on Revenues has revised its revenue projections downwards, resulting in a \$94.4 million loss of revenues in fiscal 1992 and a \$152.8 million loss in fiscal 1993, this is a total of \$247.2 million less than what the Council had projected last September.

"The governor has indicated that it is his intent to accelerate state spending on long-needed capital improvement projects to help stimulate the economy. He hopes by this means to mitigate the revenue loss projected by the commission. I support him in this effort. Such a move is useful in keeping our economy healthy. It will help in increasing tax revenues. And, it will also help in getting advantageous bids for state public works projects.

"To be sure, accelerated capital spending will be just one approach in dealing with our statewide economic problems.

"With limited resources, some hard decisions are going to have to be made. We in the Legislature will have to take a close look at the state budget and at all the spending requests we'll be getting. We may find it necessary to say 'no' to many worthwhile programs. I pray we will be able to make our decisions in an enlightened, compassionate and thoughtful manner - to do the best for our people within the limits of our resources.

"My allotted time to speak today is limited so I will not dwell at any length on specific issues. I've stated my views in the past and I will continue to speak out in the days and weeks ahead.

"My fellow Senators, I call on each and every one of you to put forth your best effort this session. I look forward to a productive session, one in which all of you will contribute in large measure towards its success.

"Let us begin. Thank you very much."

Senator George, Minority Leader of the Senate, then responded as follows:

"Mr. President, Colleagues, Distinguished Guests, Friends:

"We said our goodbyes to this chamber twice last year -- and here we are ready to repeat our valedictory speeches today. And we can do it all over again next week, when the governor reports to us on the State of the State. Four farewells --

"Maybe this deja vu recurrence is trying to tell us something -- that we shouldn't have left this building at all. Or maybe the building is just resonating the voice of the people who sent us here, the people who have been trying to tell us that they don't find our exodus necessary, or even marginally desirable.

"I think all of us are aware of a growing mood of discontent out there. It's not just the 'throw the bums out' constituents whose voice, and whose numbers, stays pretty constant no matter what bums have currently occupied their attention. It's a new breeze that's ruffled constituent feathers not just in our own backyard but across the country.

"The people in our representative democracy are telling us they want a better handle on our actions. They want to hold us on a shorter leash, as it were. That's why there is such a strong sentiment for the initiative. That's why the contagious legislation of the nineties is the proposal for term limitation.

"Do you get the feeling that the people out there don't trust us? Do you get the message that they think we've forgotten why they sent us here?

"If we allow the embellishment of this Capitol to take on gargantuan life of its own, we have forgotten.

"If we compete with our small businesses instead of providing them with a better business climate, we have forgotten.

"If we fund commercial baseball training facilities and a computer scoreboard it takes a small army to operate, while severely cutting the education budget, we have forgotten who sent us here, and why.

"If we use bookkeeping tricks to obscure the real cost of a project, we have forgotten.

"If we promote the International Space Year and don't find space for Hawaii's homeless, we have forgotten.

"If we spend half a million on new state office furniture, and build a palatial new courthouse, and don't fund a sorely needed shelter for battered women, we have forgotten. "And finally, if we persist in viewing citizen participation in government as a spectator sport, we really have forgotten why we're here and who sent us.

"We should look in the mirror each morning and remind ourselves that we were elected, not anointed, and that we're here to do the people's business. The days when state capitols were three days away by muleback are gone. The people are no further away than our phones, our faxes, and our cellulars. And they expect to share in the process of decision-making.

"We've got to welcome the public back.

"We're leaving this Capitol to remove the asbestos. Let's also work this session to remove the procedural barriers which insulate us from the people who have sent us here. We've got to lower the drawbridge on our concrete fortress down the block to let in the public, to consider new ideas, to reconsider old ones, and to promote a fuller, freer, and more open debate of the issues.

"The most effective charitable organization is the one that gives the most of each dollar to those in need, and spends the least on self-perpetuation. While I'm not suggesting we view ourselves as a charity, we ARE spending someone else's money.

"I suggest we spend a lot less of it on bureaucracy, and a lot more on the problems we were sent here to solve: better education, affordable housing, transportation and economic development. These are the basic needs government was created to meet. And they are the primary reasons we were elected to this Senate. If we have forgotten ... I can assure you the people haven't.

"Mr. President, your loyal opposition remembers. And we stand before you today ready and willing to work with you to show the people of Hawaii that their senators remember what they elected us to do."

At this time, the President introduced Ms. Ksenia Bogolepova from Moscow, Russia, to the members of the Senate. Ms. Bogolepova attends Kalaheo High School on a student exchange program. She was seated on the floor of the Senate as the guest of Senator Cobb.

The President also introduced his 5-month-old daughter, Kourtney Hi'ilani Lai Ming Wong.

At 10:31 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

At this time, Senator Crozier rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I may be meandering for a bit so just bear with me.

"I have a book in front of me and it's titled 'The Boston at Hawaii.' It was written by Lucien Young, a lieutenant, and are observations and impressions of a naval officer during the 14-month stay on the islands on a man-of-war. It was published in 1893.

"Mr. President, today is the 99th anniversary of the disembarking of the U.S. Marines onto Hawaiian soil in preparation for the overthrow of Queen Liliuokalani. The overthrow took place the next day. And as Congress debated in the later years ... in the 1898s ... should they receive the republic into the United States, they had to rely on books, newspaper articles, letters and 'what-have-you' ... they did not have CNN news like we had during Desert Storm ... not even Dan Rather or radios so the message took a long time to get anywhere so they relied on people like Lt. Lucien Young for information.

"I just want to touch on just a few points as we get ready to think about Queen Liliuokalani and the overthrow -- the 99th anniversary which takes place tomorrow. Some of the comments he made about King Kalakaua and also Queen Liliuokalani, understanding that the Civil War was about 24 years old, the South was still reeling from the carpetbaggers and the anger that they had against the Northerners and how they had placed Blacks into power in the South. One of the observations of Lucien Young who tries to continually say that he is impartial but he alludes that Kalakaua, and I quote: 'Kalakaua's only a high chief and no way related to the extinct royal family and was reputed to be the illegitimate son of a Negro cobbler who had immigrated to the islands from Boston.' You know, it's just a stage to get Congress to understand that they were dealing with second class individuals; not necessarily citizens but individuals.

"He goes on to talk about how in 1887 when they rewrote the Constitution and were able to give more power to those individuals in Hawaii who were American citizens, let me quote: 'Instead of the nobles being appointed by the crown, they were chosen by a special electorate composed of citizens possessed of an annual income of at least \$600 or an unencumbered property to the value of \$3,000,' which practically gave the whites the choice of one-half of the legislature. Can you understand why the Native Hawaiian community was quite upset when they lost all of their power and influence? "Well, the book goes on and maybe tomorrow afternoon, if I feel driven, I will take more of your time but I would just like to remind my colleagues and you, Mr. President, that 4:00 o'clock today will be the 100th anniversary when the troops marched off the boat, down King Street, right across in front of the palace, and Queen Liliuokalani stood on the balcony to watch a battalion of artillery, companies of blue jackets and she saw their presence. The Americans had been involved in manipulating the Hawaiian Government for over 20 years ... this was not something new. They treated Hawaii as like how we treat some of our South American countries today ... the 'banana republics.'

"Anytime we wanted something done, we just unloaded our troops and marched around and intimidated the Queen. So, today is a day of reflection, Mr. President. Even more so tomorrow when the actual anniversary of the overthrow took place.

"I would just like to say that I am introducing legislation to have some kind of recognition next year of the 100th anniversary of the overthrow of Queen Liliuokalani. Mr. President, I am here wrestling with the term. What do we call the overthrow? How do we title it? Do we call it a celebration? I don't think so. I don't think the Hawaiian people would like to celebrate the overthrow. Do you know that half of the people in Hawaii were not born here? Half of the population, the residents, were not born here so half of those people have no idea who Queen Liliuokalani was unless they walked by the statue. The other half, I daresay 47 percent, know that Queen Liliuokalani was overthrown. Lucky if 3 percent know why she was overthrown. So as the Native Hawaiians and Hawaiians strike up for sovereignty, how can they get anywhere without support of all of the people

"Mr. President, I think next year should be the year of educating the residents of Hawaii to understand why the Hawaiian people are presenting their claims. I am putting a bill in to do just that, sir, so that we can have some kind of a way to react to the Native Hawaiians', I think, legitimate claim for more self-determination or, if you want to use the word, sovereignty."

Senator Matsuura also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, this is in continuation of the previous speaker's remarks.

"I think what happened a hundred years ago is a reflection of a wrongful decision and act. The decision that took place after the overthrow was even worse because what Congress did was take the worst land in Hawaii at that time and gave it to the Hawaiian people. Look at the Hawaiian home land on Molokai. Right now that land on Molokai appears productive, primarily because of the reservoirs and the water lines that have been put in. Look at the Hawaiian home land in Panaewa, the lava lands, any land that couldn't grow a single crop was given to the Hawaiian people. I agree with the previous speaker in that there was a great injustice that occurred many years ago. Thank you."

Senator Cobb also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege on an entirely different subject.

"The reason for my rising is not to say 'I told you so' but to offer some observations and, perhaps, solutions to the fact that we are here when we really don't need to be.

"Back in 1990, I introduced Senate Bill 2461, relating to the State Capitol, which declared that it is not necessary to remove undisturbed asbestos, declaring inappropriate the plans to evacuate the Capitol, cancelling the move, and in effect saying encapsulate it rather than to remove it.

"And as I look at the price tag of this move and all of the other ancillary things that are being done, the price tag today is, at a minimum, twice the dollar amount that it cost us to build the original State Capitol in the first place. It was built for a cost of \$32 million. The price tag is now \$64 million for this move and, I understand, DAGS is still coming in for more money.

"I received one of these little 'just say no' flyers not to regalize the State Capitol and the \$64 million figure here is already obsolete, it will be more. This Majority Caucus took a position similar to mine last year but by then the horse had left, the barn door was closed, and the move was on the way.

"I would just like to quote from the bill and then raise what I think may be a possible solution. The bill itself stated that 'efforts to remove asbestos insulation may actually do more harm than good. As a recent symposium at Harvard University pointed out that asbestos removal creates a higher concentration of the deadly airborne fibers because contaminate procedures are seldom efficient enough to keep the fibers from escaping. In fact, the federal Environmental Protection Agency encourages school districts to keep intact asbestos in place. Inspecting it every six months to determine if it is in good condition and recommending repair, removal or enclosure only if it is damaged or disturbed.' It then goes on to say 'the state should not succumb to fiber-phobia and remove all asbestos when removal could be at best expensive, unnecessary and at worst could result in conditions more hazardous for employees upon their return.'

"The point that I was trying to make then and repeat now is that if you encapsulate asbestos even in an air conditioning system, as long as it remains undisturbed, it is a safer procedure and far less expensive and time consuming than going through the complete removal because the fibers once disturbed and removed are so finite and so small as to be virtually undetectable; as to be virtually impossible to filter out; and that the fibers themselves will remain for years in an enclosed area even after a so-called total removal has taken place. In fact, an editorial in the September 19, 1989 Honolulu Star-Bulletin pointed this out and used the actual phrase 'fiber-phobia.'

"Mr. President, I have learned through years of experience to question and oppose projects that seem to start off on an innocent basis yet have a life of their own. One example is the stadium, another example is the fixed I predicted on the floor of the Senate two guideway. years ago the guideway will cost at least double what the original amount that we voted on. This project has a life all its own and I will be discussing that in further detail later in the session. I use that only as an example that this move in the Capitol, originally, when the bill was presented for hearing we were told would be between two and three years. Then it became three to four years; now it's at least five years. The Legislature will be lucky, I predict, to be back in the Capitol by the end of this century. We may make it by 2001. But it is not just a point to criticize, Mr. President, because a lot of what's being made as a partisan issue was not the case in 1990. Some who are complaining now were silent then. But I think some positive solutions need to be considered. First is a complete review of all the money to be spent and to cut out anything that is not absolutely necessary in this

move and I would include in that cameras to monitor movements to and from the bathrooms. I don't understand any rationale or logic for that and yet it's an extremely expensive device to put in. Second is to encapsulate rather than remove asbestos, thus, enabling us to move back in approximately two years or less.

"Mr. President, I can understand and sympathize with many of the criticisms that are being made but rather than take a negative approach I think it's incumbent upon us to be as positive as we can to recognize that there are other ways in dealing with an asbestos problem, to cut the amount of money that is being spent, and to move back as quickly as possible. And in that vain, I urge the relevant committees to seriously consider it because I think five to seven years or longer is simply too long. \$64 to \$80 million is simply too much and the inconvenience that we would ask our public to go through during this time period is too unbearable. Thank you."

The Chair responded:

"Members of the Senate, just one comment from the Chair. I just want Senators, individually, to examine how they voted on the appropriations for the Capitol renovation when it was before this body. I think after that we can go on and we can offer suggestions.

"But, I do want to remind members of this body to reexamine their positions taken when the appropriation measures were first proposed."

Senator Blair also rose on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, on a point of personal privilege on the point that you just raised. I'm wondering if the inference is that you're recommending that we vote against the budget if we dislike one item in the budget?

The Chair answered:

"I think, basically, that's an individual decision one has to make but what I have heard so far has been sort of negative and I think contrary to the decision of this body at the time of approving the appropriations to have the Capitol work done after years of delay and vacillation. We made a decision, and the Capitol renovation project is proceeding on the basis of that decision.

"In answer to your question, directly, I think that it's up to each and every individual to decide for himself or herself if he or she feels that aggrieved by the action taken then by all means vote 'no' on the budget ... if that is his or her inclination. That is my answer, Senator."

Senator Levin then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"In the news this morning, the Republican Party is questioning my residence in the First Senatorial District. The request is apparently being made to you, Mr. President, and to the attorney general to investigate. If appropriate, Mr. President, I would like to ask you to please accept that request because an investigation will show that, in fact, I do live in my legislative district and this issue can be put to rest quickly. If the Republican Party had contacted me I could have given them this information too but they did not choose to ask me.

"For the record, I do own a house in Hilo outside of my district. About three years ago, when our tenant moved out, my wife moved into the house to make repairs and to fix the place up. She has made a lot of sacrifices over the years to allow me to continue in public service and when she decided to stay there longer than expected, I could not object. When I am home, I spend the week in my apartment and on some but not all weekends, I stay in the house. My one and only residence is my rented apartment and that apartment is at 77 Keokeao Loop in the First Senatorial District.

"I would welcome your efforts or those of the attorney general or anyone else to verify this matter so that my constituents and colleagues can be assured that there is no legitimate basis for questioning my residence. Thank you, Mr. President."

The Chair responded:

"Senator Levin, as far as the Chair is concerned, we have not received the request as yet but we will abide by your request."

Senator B. Kobayashi also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I'd like to correct a matter for the public record. I have before me a copy of the morning newspaper in which the Senate President is quoted as follows: 'Wong scolded his colleagues, saying those who voted for the \$10 billion budget last year should not cast stones. Sen. Russell Blair asked Wong, "Is the inference that if we dislike one item in the budget, we should vote against the whole budget?" Wong said, "yes," if one dislikes that one item intensely enough.'

"I also happen to have before me a rough copy of yesterday's proceedings in which the Chair is quoted as not having said 'yes.' I would make this unofficial and rough copy of the transcript from yesterday available to members of the Senate but I assure you that the Senate President is not quoted as having said 'yes' in response to Senator Blair's question. Thank you very much."

Senator Crozier also rose on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, yesterday, I read from the book written by Lucien Young who was a lieutenant on the 'Boston' and the title of the book was 'Boston at Hawaii.' He talks about the history of Kalakaua and Queen Liliuokalani and primarily the overthrow. Today is the actual date, the 99th anniversary of the date of the overthrow of Queen Liliuokalani. I won't go into a long dissertation but I would just like to show my colleagues or read from this book so that my colleagues can understand the flavor of the documents that the congressmen were reading in Washington when they were talking about annexation because Kuykendall had not written his book yet, which all of us had to read in Hawaiian 101. They read the 'Boston at Hawaii.' I will just jump through this and just make some observations so that we can understand how the congressmen thought.

"Lt. Young characterizes the hula and King Kalakaua and quote, 'He would have songs chanted by the native women at the great functions of the court which was simply exhaultations of his power to employ and to gratify the baser passions and wherever his train of attendants sang obscene songs and danced lewd dances.' This thing goes through the whole book in that tone. Any opportunity Lt. Young had to take King Kalakaua down or Queen Liliuokalani further down he did.

"Yesterday, I talked about how in 1887 in the 'Bayonet Revolution' how the mostly haole American merchants forced the king to re-write the constitution, whereby, only citizens who possess an annual income of \$600.00 or unencumbered property of a value of \$3,000 could vote, which practically gave the whites choice of half the legislature. And imagine how many Hawaiians were not allowed their right to participate, their right to vote. He glorifies that in the book. He thought that was the right thing to do. The pagans had no right to vote, just the men of finances, the men of wealth under the American or Western concepts.

"He also slurs Queen Liliuokalani and talks about her character. 'She was addicted to the grossest social vices while her amours were open, flagrant and notorious. When not under the gaze of her Christian friends, she delighted to take part in just such debaucheries as savage orgies as her royal brother Kalakaua had so frequently indulged in before her.' He also refers to her ethnicity. He implies that she may not have been pure Hawaiian.

"He's talking about Kalakaua and the relationship between the Kamehamehas and let me quote, 'The reason for this was due to the fact that Liliuokalani was not a Kamehameha but only a sister of Kalakaua and granddaughter, if she may be legitimate, of the first man who was hanged for murder in the Hawaiian Islands. And if not legitimate, as claimed by a great number of the residents of Hawaii, she was only a daughter of an American Negro cobbler named "Blossom."'

"Mr. President, this goes on and on and on all the way through the book and continues to attack their characters.

"I talked about, yesterday, how they marched through the streets and in here he refers to the palace square. The palace square is that area right outside the palace grounds where the Hawaiian Electric building is today.

"The book goes on to say, 'The political agitation and uneasiness was so great that during the entire stay of the "Boston" in those waters it was impolitic for her to leave the harbor of Honolulu except on two short occasions and as a reminder of the force constantly present, a battalion of troops was landed once a week and was marched through the streets to the old baseball grounds for drills.'

"In other words, the Hawaiian government and the Hawaiian people for 20 years, not only from the 'Boston' but for every other ship that came in, made a point to march their troops around Honolulu. Just to let the people of Hawaii know that even though they were still a nation, they were at the whim of the United States.

"Queen Liliuokalani makes a speech the evening before the overthrow and Lt. Lucien Young describes her condition when she made the speech and states, 'Her manner and general appearance was such as to convince me that I was right in the opinion that I had formed that she was reading her proclamation, namely, that she was under the influence of some intoxicant rather than a mere excitement. This opinion was brought out later in the day when a very high and distinguished official who had been near her person all afternoon said to me "We have at last induced her to postpone her coup and if she had not been full of gin we would have accomplished it long ago."'

"Mr. President, you can see over and over again this is the way the Hawaiians were viewed by Lt. Young and he tried to convey that message to the congress. I guess it had an impression.

"But let me talk about the final act or the reason for the overthrow. There were three reasons. One, that she had passed two bills - one was to allow opium houses in Hawaii and the other was to allow for lottery to be legalized in Hawaii. But the most important one was the constitution. She tried to impose a new constitution. The one thing that really upset them was that all the whites should possessing voting rights be theretofore disenfranchised except those married to native women. In other words, six years prior to that the Hawaiians were disenfranchised and she was now trying to allow the Hawaiian people to vote and when they were disenfranchised six years ago, for a white man to become a citizen of Hawaii all they had to do was be here for one year. Just one year and say that they support the king or queen and they could vote, yet, denying the Native Hawaiians who had been here since antiquity the opportunity to participate. So she was just trying to right a wrong.

"Today we reflect on the 99th anniversary of Queen Liliuokalani and, Mr. President, I would like my

colleagues and everyone else to think about that. I am an American and I'm proud to be an American, but a wrong was done and we need to correct that wrong. Thank you."

Senator Solomon also rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I also rise to speak on a point of personal privilege and this is in support of the remarks of the previous speaker.

"Mr. President, I would like to remind my colleagues that the overthrow of the Hawaiian kingdom was an illegal act of American aggression against the Hawaiian people. The Hawaiian people were stripped of their civil rights and the problem we are confronted with today, Mr. President, is how will these issues be clarified and rectified.

"After much research, we have come to know that when Queen Liliuokalani abdicated her throne, this was her personal decision. She never once, never once, Mr. President, gave up the civil liberties of the Hawaiian people. The point being that the overthrow was an act of American aggression. It was an act of American imperialism and it was not due to the incompetence of the alii as portrayed by the many readings as reiterated by the previous speaker. These are the issues, Mr. President, that we hope to resolve and I am proud that this Legislature is moving in this direction.

"We, Mr. President, passed the right to sue legislation. We have set up the native claims board to rectify claims against the State of Hawaii. We are now looking at Hawaiian entitlement legislation to rectify our ceded land issues as well as to clarify what is owed the Office of Hawaiian Affairs as well as the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands. We are now in the federal level looking at the issue of sovereignty and trying to clarify what is meant by the Hawaiian trust in terms of violation and the fiduciary duty. Also to clarify these fiduciary duties with regard to the state's obligation as well as the Federal Government's.

"Mr. President, we live in exciting times for the Hawaiian people and it is my hope that we, this Legislature, stand firm - 'onipaa' - and steadfast so that we can within our tenure here try to rectify and resolve these problems. Thank you very much."

Senator Cobb also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege. The subject again is asbestos because there was a media report last night that I saw on television that indicated that two out of the three firms doing asbestos repair work or removal were in bankruptcy and, yesterday, I said this thing has a life of its own. I'd just like to share with my colleagues another example.

"In 1990 the Legislature appropriated \$1.6 million to complete a survey of state buildings to determine where there was asbestos. Unfortunately, a number of our state departments failed to report all of the facts and, during the survey and its report being made afterwards, it was discovered that some departments had failed to include all of the buildings in their inventory on their list so an amendment was needed to increase the scope of the survey and the amount to be paid and an additional \$61 thousand had to be appropriated for that purpose.

"I am quoting from the report on the asbestos surveys of state-owned facilities by the Department of the Attorney General, State of Hawaii. I would further note, Mr. President, that firms that are involved in asbestos removal or repair definitely have a vested financial interest because it's more expensive, more time consuming and more profitable for them to remove asbestos than it is to encapsulate it. Yet, most of the ships from the WW II mothball fleet that have asbestos had an encapsulation process done to prevent further damage or spillage or danger. Encapsulation involves a plastic-like spray which works quite well in the air-conditioning, ventilation systems as well as the gun turrets and other areas that are subject to considerable stress and vibration.

"Throughout all of this, it appears that the remarks vesterday concerning whether or not we should vote 'yes' or 'no' on any one item if taken to its logical extreme would mean anytime any Senator has a disagreement with any one item in the budget that Senator should vote 'no' and I've always taken a different approach that, generally, you try to look at the budget as an overall document. Does it go in the right direction, are there more things you support than oppose and does the appropriation really mean something? If an appropriation means nothing, in terms of executive flexibility, then I think it's incumbent upon us to oppose it if we oppose that philosophy. On the other hand, if there are more things in the budget that an individual supports or if we have a budget like was done in 1979 where it was divided into parts 'A' and 'B' then it is quite worthy of support because then the Legislature has very clearly prioritized what ought to be spent, what ought not to be spent, or what is discretionary and left the discretionary part only to the governor. In 1979 when the budget was passed, all items in part 'A' were mandatory and no item in part 'A' could be cut unless the part 'B' funds were totally eliminated. It took a long time to achieve that but it was a workable document.

"If, on the other hand the Senate President truly wants us to be so discriminating as to pick out one item in the budget and vote 'no' that's all too easy to do. I prefer not to take that approach. But when it comes to the continual appropriations, and I can pretty well rest assured that we are going to be asked to spend more money on this move this year, perhaps, it would be best to put that as a separate item due to its controversy and due to the previous remarks and then let us vote that issue up or down. Thank you, Mr. President."

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:01 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Solomon, seconded by Senator George and carried, the Senate adjourned until 9:30 o'clock a.m., Tuesday, January 21, 1992.

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives was called to order at 10:05 o'clock a.m.

The Chair then appointed Senators Hagino, Aki and George and Representatives Apo, Taniguchi and O'Kieffe to escort the Honorable John D. Waihee, Governor of the State of Hawaii, to the rostrum.

Senator A. Kobayashi, on behalf of the Senate, and Representative Baker, on behalf of the House of Representatives, presented Governor Waihee with maile and ilima leis. The Speaker then presented to the members of the Sixteenth Legislature and guests the Honorable John D. Waihee, Governor of the State of Hawaii.

The Governor addressed the Joint Session as follows:

"President Wong, Speaker Kihano, Members of the Sixteenth Legislature, Honored Guests, Ladies and Gentlemen:

"Aloha!

"Five years ago, I asked you to dream with me of bold and creative ideas which would propel our state on its journey into tomorrow. I asked you to stretch your imagination and go for the best.

"We did just that, turning dreams into activism and reform on the pressing issues of the day.

"Today, I ask you to take pride in the dreams that we have realized, and not lose faith in those which remain elusive -- to continue the hard task of striving for goals that are difficult.

"We convene now in the first month of the Year of the Family. We know that families are feeling the squeeze all across this country: national unemployment rates more than twice the Hawaii average, the worst national growth rate since the Great Depression, what Washington columnist David Broder recently called 'The Economic Devastation of State Government.' If you could sell doom and gloom as a product, we could balance our trade deficit tomorrow.

"The issues are jobs, housing, health, education and quality of life.

"I propose a course of action based on spending smart, thinking creatively, leveraging community partnerships, and using the mind and muscle of the total community to build homes, keep us healthy, empower our schools and nurture our environment.

"We begin by dealing with economic realities. From the standpoint of state budgeting, I believe that if we invest in needed CIP projects today, we will, in turn, generate needed revenues for important programs tomorrow. I want to thank President Wong for his support of this concept.

"Therefore, we have instituted an accelerated capital improvement program for \$1.9 billion worth of projects to be constructed over the next 18 months. Furthermore, 1 challenge the private sector to help us secure another \$500 million of construction activity. Together, we can bring construction activity up to the \$2.4 billion level we achieved in 1991. By doing so, we can prime the economic pump, meet important social goals, and stabilize state revenues.

"When speaking of economic realities, we cannot avoid a discussion of the renovation of this Capitol. Well, these are the painful facts: no doubt, parts of this building are contaminated and the asbestos must be removed. Leaving the asbestos in place is not cost-effective. As pointed out in the Attorney General's asbestos litigation report, it costs \$5 thousand just to change light bulbs in this chamber because trained asbestos workers have to do it. Incidentally, the blackout this morning was, on the other hand, not connected to the Capitol renovation.

"Currently, \$47 million have been appropriated for this project, and given the realities of these times, we intend to complete the necessary renovations without additional

appropriations. We also intend to recover these costs through litigation and we will get back here for good, as soon as we can.

"The recession has been a major test of our economic policies, and on the whole, I believe, the results show the wisdom of our planning. But this is no time for complacency. We must continue to support tourism, our single biggest revenue generator and, at the same time, broaden our economic options by strengthening other industries.

"For tourism, we must pay attention to market and product. We must continue an aggressive marketing posture in an increasingly competitive world. Our travel mix today is more diverse than ever, with the continental U.S. providing about 65 percent of our market, Japan about 20 percent, and a rapidly increasing share from new markets like Europe, Australia and other Asian nations. In 1991, we added five new routes to and from Japan, representing 700,000 more international seats to Hawaii.

"Has our market strategy worked? Last August, when every other comparable travel destination was still in the post-war doldrums, Hawaii had recovered.

"Equally important is the product. Simply defined, the product is our people, our culture and our land. It is everything that makes Hawaii, Hawaii.

"How do we protect and, better yet, enhance that product? We do it with programs like the Waiaha Foundation, which keeps workers in tune with their culture and environment. We do it by introducing new types of tourism, like eco-tourism -- or what I call the 'Hawaii Watch' program -- which brings people here who want to rough it a little and improve our environment.

"Last week, Senator Mike McCartney, chair of the Senate Education Committee, suggested to me that if our schools are to achieve education excellence, we must chart a course that emphasizes the '3 R's': reform, restructuring and resources. I agree and here is what I propose.

"If we are truly committed to the reformation of our public school system, then we have to both empower our local schools and insist on excellence.

"The first cornerstone of reform is the implementation of school/community based management (SCBM) which places responsibility for the direction and operation of each school with school-level professionals and parents. Educators there need to innovate, participate in decision making, and in turn, be held accountable for meeting the educational needs of their students.

"The second cornerstone of reform is just as important. We must create a results-driven educational system.

"Unfortunately, by its very nature, our public education system is geared toward managing, evaluating and reporting educational activities rather than educational results. If educational reform is to be meaningful, we must change from a system of activity management to one of quality control. In short, we need clear measures of educational performance. How else will we be able to give our local schools the authority they need? The twin of empowerment is accountability.

"In order for school reform to succeed, there is no question that we must restructure the way we service, operate and govern our schools. "Here in Hawaii, we may be the only state in the country that is attempting to simultaneously restructure three levels of public education.

"First, after three years of implementing SCBM, it is clear that our present system is not designed to fully support it. For example, in his conversation with me, Senator McCartney observed that: 'If we truly believe that our schools will become the focal point of the D.O.E. and our community, then why can someone make more money the further you get away from the true focal point -- the students?' 'And why is it that state and district office personnel have greater access to xerox machines, supplies and materials than teachers in the field?' These are critical questions.

"We need different policies if we are serious about empowering our local schools. Here are a few proposals:

"Regarding Personnel Policies: I believe that the highest paid administrators in our system without the title of superintendent should be our school principals; likewise, teachers who enjoy teaching and do it well should be able to realize their full economic potential and still remain in the classroom; furthermore, hiring decisions for these positions should be made at the local school level, with appropriate safeguards to protect against abuse or unfairness, using the broadest pool of qualified applicants.

"These ideas are not new. All parties agree they have merit. So today, I call upon all stakeholders, especially our collective bargaining representatives, to work with us to accomplish these changes. In doing so, let me make clear that I am not ready, as some in our community, to say that unions have no role in our public schools. However, just as we must change our public school system to meet the realities of changing times, we must - for the sake of our children - also be willing to change our collective bargaining practices as well.

"Regarding Resource Allocation Policies: With the monies you have provided, much has been done to improve local school facilities. I know because I have seen these improvements for myself. However, I have also seen necessary but minor repairs left unattended for irritatingly long periods of time.

"To help rectify this problem and strengthen the concept of local school governance, I propose an appropriation of \$2.3 million to establish a school based R&M program. These monies are to be allocated to all 235 schools statewide, with each school receiving at least \$8 thousand to a maximum of \$20 thousand. These funds will be exempted from state bidding requirements and are to be used under the principal's direction.

"Second, we must move on administrative restructuring. I ask for your support of Superintendent Charlie Toguchi and the Board of Education as they implement project <u>Ke Au Hou</u>, which is intended to reallocate resources outward and use central staff personnel to support the educational programs at the local schools.

"Third, we are all well aware that our current system of educational governance diffuses and dilutes responsibility. As a result, accountability is muddled between the Board of Education, the Legislature and the Executive.

"In our efforts to develop new industries, we have increased the number of captive insurance companies from two to 22, added 11 new sporting events, and in February, will break ground on a new film studio at Diamond Head.

"Our high tech industry took a significant leap forward recently with the opening of the first facility in the Maui Research and Technology Park. With the development 75 percent leased and filling fast, more facilities in the planning stage, and the state's own Maui Research Technology Center to open within a few weeks, the future of high tech on Maui looks extremely bright.

"By the way, as a result of our \$10 million investment in the park, a \$19 million 'super computer' image information center is being developed. The center will be open to researchers from throughout the country and will play a major role in international research.

"Our initiatives to develop new markets for our agricultural products resulted in state and private agencies jointly participating in the world's largest food trade show -- ANUGA -- in Cologne, Germany, last year, which is anticipated to result in more than \$4 million in new business annually.

"In addition, the International Business Center of Hawaii which opened last September, has served more than 150 businesses with trade counseling and trade financing, and is helping to make Hawaii truly an international center for commerce.

"These trade activities will become increasingly important at a time when the Asian-Pacific arena is expected to flex its economic and industrial muscle. That, according to Bank of Hawaii's 1991 Annual Economic Report, 'will produce growth in Hawaii that is likely to be much broader and more sustainable than the intensely resort-focused developments of the late 1980s.'

"Over the past several years, we've worked hard to improve the business climate in Hawaii. Last year, Hawaii employers saved a total of \$75 million, through the reduction of our unemployment insurance taxable wage base and lower employer contribution rates due to the solvency of the Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund. If low unemployment rates continue through 1992, employers should receive an additional \$80 million reduction.

"This year, we will work with businesses to focus on worker safety programs. Today, I want to acknowledge two construction companies -- Black & Beatch and Hawaiian Dredging -- who, in their work on the AES cogeneration plant, implemented a safety and health program which cut their workers' compensation costs by 80 percent, saving an estimated \$1 million in premiums. Safe working conditions and profits go hand in hand.

"Clearly, as a nation and a highly vulnerable state, we are way behind the energy security curve. Our actions must be redoubled. We must provide for Hawaii's future needs by exploring both demand-side and supply-side actions.

"As you know, our experience with geothermal development on the Big Island suffered a setback last year. But we have taken sound measures to ensure the safety and health of our citizens. Satisfied, we remain determined and committed to the development of geothermal to fill the critical energy needs of the Big Island.

"Together, we have made some real gains in education over the last five years. We began school/community based management, created a school superfund, increased teacher salaries by over 50 percent, and initiated or substantially augmented a wide range of education-related programs. "Yet with all this growth and investment, why do we hear parents and educators voicing discontent? Because I believe, as so aptly stated by Lieutenant Governor Cayetano, chair of the Task Force on Education Governance that: 'Our current top-down highly centralized, overly bureaucratized system has distanced our people from their schools, while simultaneously becoming less able to address our education needs.'

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"No doubt, a public school system that provides equal educational opportunity has been one of the most enduring commitments of the people of Hawaii. Ours is a unique statewide system--the envy of most states across this nation.

"Nonetheless, that very scope of administration has sometimes clouded our vision of what public education is all about. We need to remind ourselves that the mission of our public schools is not about the preservation of an institution but about educating our children.

"Many proposals have been advanced. Personally, I prefer an appointed school board. I believe that this alternative, like the UH Board of Regents, has the advantage of focusing on policy issues instead of administrative matters, and the potential for attracting the best talent in our community. Another alternative that has merit is a network of elected district or county boards to represent local concerns with an appointed board to set statewide policies and performance standards. However, any proposal that would clarify the current situation is preferable to the present system.

"Last session, you established the Task Force on Education Governance. The task force has done yeomen's work on this issue and even now is preparing to take its proposals out for further public input. I, like you, await their results. I hope that you will see fit to incorporate their recommendations into your legislative time table.

"In any event, I strongly urge that at the very least we deal with the policy governance issue this session and present a constitutional amendment to the voters for ratification in the 1992 general elections.

"The supplemental budget we submitted to you in December requests an additional \$20 million for education. Most of those funds are needed for current services. Today, I ask you for another \$14 million to be used to reduce class size, expand computer education and further enhance the quality of public education.

"I know that there isn't an elected leader in this room who would fail to support programs that clearly enhance quality public education. In the last five years, we increased funding for education by 70 percent. Our 1991-93 biennium budget appropriates about \$1.3 billion to the Department of Education. This represents a 21 percent increase over the prior 1989-91 biennium. In the last year, the publication <u>State Policy Reports</u> ranked us the fifth highest state in the nation in increased rate of spending for education.

"Yet I am compelled to raise a voice of caution. Too often, we have tried to effect educational improvements only by asking for new monies. We must also be willing to reallocate resources from lower priority programs to higher priority ones. Since my first state of the state address, I have challenged our school authorities to do this. Furthermore, a primary reason for calling for flexible funding, like we did with last year's \$70 million lump sum appropriation, was to allow priorities to be set by those directly involved with the individual schools. However, for the most part, we continue to treat

educational reform as a budgetary add-on after the status quo has been funded.

"To facilitate the prioritization process and support the empowerment of local schools, I have asked the Director of Budget and Finance to submit for your review a breakdown of the Department of Education's budget, displaying how many dollars have been allocated to each individual school. If we are serious about SCBM, we ought to know how much of our resources are reaching our local schools.

"Actually, the concept of school-by-school budgeting is not new. Then Representative Norman Mizuguchi proposed it in 1977 and it was adopted by the Legislature in Act 10 of that session. I suggest that we may want to do that again.

"We are all too well aware of the enormity of our facility problems faced by our public schools. Therefore, in addition to providing needed appropriations for new construction, we must at the same time seek alternatives to just building more schools each year to keep up with the growing enrollment.

"One attractive alternative is the year-round, multitrack system used extensively in other states with similar facility shortages. Indeed, here in Hawaii, the year-round school at Waihee is a success. Well, it is time to extend that alternative to other communities in this state, like West Hawaii where Senator Malama Solomon and her constituents want to develop two multi-track, year-round schools.

"Yes, my friends, if we want educational excellence, we must be willing to commit ourselves to reform, restructuring and resources.

"Thanks to Speaker Kihano and all of you, in the Year of the Family, Hawaii has become a national leader in human resource programs. Representative Pat Schroeder, the chair of the U.S. House Select Committee for Children, Youth and Families, earlier this month held up our Healthy Start Program as a model for all. National leaders look at our state as having the most advanced health care system in the country. A+, our literacy program and Ask-2000 have also received considerable national attention.

"The Year of the Family means stronger children, ready for school, ready to learn and ready to grow. That's the first national education goal.

"Our Zero to Three project is the first federally approved state plan of its kind and ensures that infants and toddlers with special needs have access to high quality early intervention services.

"An educator once said that there is no such thing as an at-risk child, there are only at-risk families. Our Healthy Start program conducts screening and services to help 2,400 families statewide realize their full potential in giving their children the best possible start in life. I propose that we expand the Healthy Start program. To do that, we are requesting an appropriation of \$4 million: \$2 million to restore the cuts made last session and \$2 million for expansion.

"Healthy children need early immunization. Yet only 68 percent of our kids get their shots by age two. I propose a partnership with insurance companies, physicians, and private agencies statewide for every infant and toddler in Hawaii. I am asking for \$1 million for vaccines, and \$600 thousand for outreach services, public education and weekend and evening clinics. "In 1989, we proposed early childhood education for all of our children by the year 2000. We are rapidly moving on that goal. Through federal, state and private programs, approximately 74 percent of our children are already getting pre-school education. That in itself is a remarkable fact. Furthermore, because of your high levels of funding for early childhood development, we are eligible for an additional \$2.8 million in federal Child Care and Development Block Grant monies beginning in 1992, and I will ask for your support in securing these funds.

"The Year of the Family means reforming policies and services to meet family needs. Two exciting and dynamic programs are worth your special attention and support. One reforms policy. The other reforms service delivery. Both support families.

"In November, Hawaii became one of seven participating states in the National Policy Academy on Families and Children. Our agenda is to pull together the very best minds from all sectors to look at family strengths, elements essential to quality of life, and create a framework for policy reform.

"We must also reform the way we deliver family services. We are asking you for \$860 thousand for our family center demonstration project, operating at four community based centers across the state.

"The Year of the Family means increased family learning, with the library at the center of family education and self-learning. Happily, I announce that our renovated and expanded state library at the corner of King and Punchbowl Streets will reopen as a center of learning this spring. Over 65,000 people use one of our 49 libraries in any given week. We offer the only system in the world with direct on-line microcomputer access to its database holdings, weekly preschool toddler hours to ready our youngsters for school, and on February 29, with the dedication and opening of the Kailua-Kona Library, the first drive-through library service. For our libraries, we are requesting nearly \$2 million in supplemental funds for expanded services, equipment and books.

"From the First Lady, this reminder for everyone. Take the extra time to visit the library with your children and read with them every night at home. Ten minutes a day can change a lifetime.

"The Year of the Family means dignity and independence. Welfare and unemployment ought not be a place families go for good.

"Five hundred forty-four Oahu families have enrolled thus far in our Jobs Program. We are working with them on individualized needs like skill training and child care, which are transitional to employment. Retention is high and progress is gradual. Most importantly, the reports I get are that when people see options to the cycle of poverty and see hope for themselves and their children, they want to make it like everyone else. They want up and out for good. Later this year we open our Maui Jobs Program, with Kauai and the Big Island part of next year's federal and state request.

"While we are talking about families, the time has come to heed the call of the abused and the battered by taking action to end domestic violence. While we are on the subject of violence, let us finish our work to stop the proliferation of military-style assault weapons in our society.

"The Year of the Family means having the healthiest families in America. The federal government must

address health care reform in partnership with states, and Hawaii has become and will continue to be a major influence in this critical national debate.

"I can tell you that while other states are talking about what could happen to their peoples' health if they reformed their systems, Hawaii can talk about what has happened to improve peoples' health as a result of our action:

- The lowest rate of infant mortality and the lowest rate of preventable deaths from chronic diseases in the country.
- Our secret weapon, primary care -- early, timely and less costly -- reducing the very expensive inpatient care time to between half and two-thirds of the national rate.
- A private and public partnership which offers universal access to health care insurance and translates into health care costs for small businesses which are among the lowest in the nation.

"Yet, strong as it is, our system cannot stand still. Our community hospitals are running in the red. Grass-roots plans for new management models on Maui and the Big Island are underway. I renew our call for new systems with the dual goals of containing costs and providing service to everyone, rural and urban, rich and poor.

"Federal mandates, utilization rates and inflation have turned medicaid into a budgetary Pacman for every state in America. Expenditures for medicaid here have grown at a rate of 16 percent during the last two years. This translates into a deficit of \$54 million for this fiscal year and a projected \$78 million for the next.

"We are proposing administrative actions to save \$34 million of projected increases by the end of the next fiscal year. These actions include restructuring programs and recapturing a greater portion of federal funds for services.

"We need to take control of rising costs, before medicaid absorbs even more resources from other priorities, like education and housing.

"In the field of mental health, we have gone from neglect to respect. Hawaii's per capita spending on mental health has nearly tripled since 1986.

"We have opened a new facility at the Hawaii State Hospital. But we are not finished. We need three more years of continued support for the state hospital and for community-based services. Our supplemental budget contains \$8 million for mental health priorities. Our goal is accreditation for our hospital and our community centers, because accreditation establishes, without question, that Hawaii has met the national standards for sound and competent care.

"As Hawaii's population grows older, we are faced with the deep concerns of long-term care. This isn't an elderly issue. It's a family issue. That's why we call our initiative the Family Hope Program.

"Families facing the need for long-term care have two choices, highly priced private care or medicaid. As a result, people are turning to medicaid, and costs are soaring.

"We have made real progress in developing a long-term care service model for Hawaii. However, a key element is missing in our financial plan. We need to work on an agreement with the federal government not to penalize us for taking the lead on this issue. Therefore, we must pursue federal approval to reallocate medicaid funds into a state plan, which in turn will help finance long-term care. Second, we are pursuing a federal partnership and resources for a state demonstration project that will implement and test the recommendations of the Long-Term Care Financing Advisory Board. These critical and timely actions are necessary to pave the way for a longterm care financing system that will serve all our seniors and their families.

"For families facing traffic congestion every day, we are dedicated to completing projects like Kalanianaole road widening -- six lanes wide from Kahala to Hawaii Kai -- by late 1993; and H-3 construction remains on schedule.

"However, we can only widen and build so many roads, so Honolulu's rapid transit program is very important. I want to express my personal thanks to the City Council and you for supporting rapid transit, and to our federal delegation for its work in securing a \$618 million commitment toward the system's completion.

"We are all concerned about the system's cost. Fortunately, the recently passed Federal Intermodal Surface Transportation Act allows states to pursue the federal funds that are not used by other states by September of 1992. I have instructed the DOT to apply for these funds, for rapid transit. There are certainly no guarantees, but this additional source may make it possible to shorten the length of time the county needs the mass transit surcharge tax.

"Also, to further address the impact of costs on Hawaii residents, this session we will address the regressivity of the surcharge tax by submitting a bill to improve the offsetting income tax credit.

"No issue is more pressing in Hawaii today than housing. In the last decade, the number of homeless families, rent, and the cost of housing have all dramatically increased. The concurrent rise in all three is no coincidence. They are interrelated. To resolve one area is to ease the pressure in another.

"With your support last year, we moved on homelessness as no other state has done, with a funding level 300 percent over the national average, and in spite of receiving less than one-half of our share of federal dollars. You see, in Washington, D.C., they think it's paradise out here and that we don't have any homeless families.

"Some say society can be judged by how it assists and cares for its neediest citizens. I want to tip my hard hat to Senator Mike Crozier and to all of you for what we have done so far, especially that day last summer when we hammered nails and built model homeless shelters in front of the Capitol. It dawned on me then, and is well worth remembering that, however complex life gets, we live in an extraordinary place with unique and wondrous ways of doing things.

"We have hardly been alone. The people of Haleiwa welcomed our first Weinberg Village for 50 families, and Oceanic Properties is building it. With help from AMFAC, we expect to break ground on our village in Waianae for another 60 families this month. Villages in Malaekahana and Ewa should follow shortly.

"Through the Shelters-Without-Walls Program, the community of Hawaii Kai is already housing 51 families and Waimanalo has found shelter for another 40 families.

"Let me relate an incident to you that numbers don't cover. Last December, we were able to help a Sand

Island couple move into a house for the first time in six years. Their four young children, who had literally been born and raised on the beach, were happy beyond words. Human service providers were moved to tears as they watched the children on their hands and knees touching the carpet and staring in wonder at the stove -- things we all take for granted. The family was overwhelmed by the love shown by their neighbors.

"That's what our homeless program has been all about. And so I say to you, the City Council, the churches, the Weinberg Foundation, a host of government agencies and the good people of Hawaii, we have made a good start, and we will carry on. Thank you for your support.

"The homeless debate has legitimately raised questions about rental shortages.

"From 1980 to 1990, the average monthly rent for a single-family home on Oahu increased from \$660 to about \$1560 -- an increase of 137 percent. At the same time, rental vacancy rates have dropped as low as 1 percent and demand is continuing to outstrip supply.

"Therefore, I am proposing that the state increase its assistance to the three 'players' capable of increasing our inventory of affordable rentals--government, the non-profit community, and private developers.

"In the past, the federal government provided substantial grants to states to construct and maintain rental housing. This is no longer the case. In addition, changes to the federal tax laws have reduced the incentive to invest in rental housing. Therefore, we must fill that vacuum with direct subsidies and look for other ways to make investments in rental housing attractive.

"I propose an additional \$63 million in direct subsidies, which combined with other forms of assistance will provide over 2700 units in the next two years.

"Too often, military and civilian residents are competing for the same rental units. Thus far, the federal government has not been as successful as it would like in getting the private sector to develop units on federal land. To relieve the competition, I will submit a bill to allow HFDC to participate in Section 802 housing construction of rental units on federally controlled lands.

"I also ask your support in encouraging the federal government to continue the low-income housing tax credit which is scheduled to expire in six months. This tax credit, along with the state's tax credit which you approved three years ago, has resulted in 461 private units with another 175 more units scheduled for the upcoming year.

"Though few in number, and hampered by a lack of resources, the non-profit community plays an important role in providing housing, especially for those citizens who need the most assistance. And as Representative Virginia Isbell and her Housing Committee have so aptly pointed out, their efforts can be strengthened by the establishment of a Rental Housing Trust Fund. Thus, I propose we appropriate \$5 million from the general fund for 'seed money,' then dedicate the income from the conveyance tax to this fund as a permanent source for grants and loans to build, preserve and rehabilitate affordable rental units.

"Interim construction financing is critical to a project's start-up, yet is difficult to obtain at reasonable rates. Therefore, I propose that we restructure the state's rental assistance program to free up approximately \$50 million now obligated, and use that sum to leverage, or 'blend' with the proceeds of revenue bonds to establish a \$100 million Rental Housing Interim Financing Revolving Fund. The fund will provide low interest interim construction financing to developers, non-profit organizations and governmental agencies for the building of affordable rentals.

"Until supply catches up with demand, rental prices will continue to be high. To provide immediate relief, I propose an increase in the renters' tax credit, from \$50 to \$85 per qualified resident.

"With both rents and the cost of housing rising dramatically in recent years, a highly speculative market only adds fuel to the fire. Consequently, I again ask you to support an anti-speculation tax.

"In 1988, we launched a private and public sector initiative to build affordable homes across the state. We set a dual-sector goal of 61,000 affordable units by the year 2000. In the last five years, the state Land Use Commission has opened up 12,615 acres of land for housing, representing over 51,000 homes, nearly 30,000 of which are affordable.

"If we were to break ground on all of those projects today, we would be half way to our goals. If we were to break ground, we would have homes for 51,000 families. If we were to break ground, we would have nearly 30,000 homes to fill our affordable housing needs. If we were to break ground, we would provide not only homes, but jobs for our construction workers.

"Well, where are the houses you ask, and so do our families. Tied up in 'processing' and 'financing', we are told. Yet, what we all know is that you cannot build houses with excuses. Let's build them with action.

"First, to make even more land available for housing, today I announce that as a part of the five-year boundary review process, we plan to open up an additional 5000 acres statewide in areas where infrastructure construction will be the easiest.

"Second, I propose time-is-money legislation which will require an even more expedited approval process of 60 days at the state Land Use Commission for private sector affordable housing projects. The legislation will also propose expedited processing at the county level, with the goal of 60-day processing unless the counties adopt their own fast-track processing.

"Third, while permanent mortgage financing is readily available at reasonable rates, interim construction financing is not. It's time to break the log jam. Today we can do it, for I have received commitments from the Bank of Hawaii, First Hawaiian Bank (in alphabetical order), and the State Employees' Retirement System to provide funds for interim construction financing for private projects. Together, they will leverage a hefty \$300 million to stimulate immediate development.

"Fourth, we need to stimulate quick starts by developers and to reduce purchase prices, I propose that an excise tax exemption be given to the builders of the first 10,000 new affordable homes constructed by December 31, 1993.

"Fifth, we recognize that our 60 percent affordable housing formula depended on a robust market for high end homes. To adjust to today's market, we will temporarily offer greater flexibility to implement the policy. We have met with members of the Land Use Research Foundation -- the developers' representatives -and others, reaching a consensus on several options to meet our requirements.

"Finally, private developers have told me that the necessary ingredients for a successful rental housing program are land, infrastructure, financing, and processing; and, because there are few things I like more than a good challenge, let me make one. Today, I offer to any developer an excellent three-acre parcel of land -- the former Pohukaina School site -- with all the infrastructure. And since it is in Kakaako, I can guarantee you quick processing and access to all our financing tools. Your job is to build good, reasonably priced rental housing on it. The only requirement is that first preference for tenants will be families referred by the Hawaiian Homes program. That's the challenge. Show me your stuff. Thank you, Representative Hagino, for the idea.

"Last year, I submitted to you an action plan to resolve controversies relating to the Hawaiian Home Lands Trust. We knew that the plan would be the beginning of action, not the resolution itself. Now, with your help, we are in the midst of taking unprecedented steps that will shape the future of the Hawaiian Home Lands program.

"For example, last year, I established a task force to resolve land claims, to clear title and to propose compensation for wrongful or improper withdrawals, transfers, takings or uses of the Hawaiian Home Lands Trust.

"The first proposal will be submitted to you this session. We propose a back rent payment of \$12 million. This will cover the land claims that have been verified so far. Obviously, the task force will continue its work until all compensation due has been paid. Our proposal seeks authorization to exchange lands. Hawaiian Home Lands needs to receive lands that are more easily developed for its beneficiaries -- buildable lands for actual houses now.

"Further, more resources are needed if we are going to place native Hawaiians on their own homesteads. Accordingly, I am requesting an additional \$25 million of capital improvement funds, for a total of \$38 million in fiscal year 1993. This will make available over 1000 homes and lots, including 400 homes at the Keystone development in Nanakuli. Also, I am asking the state Land Use Commission and HFDC to promote Hawaiian Home Lands as an offsite option to fulfill affordable housing requirements.

"Finally, taking care of past wrongs is an important obligation, not only on the part of the state, but of the federal government as well. It is disturbing, and dangerous, that in addition to blocking every effort made by our congressional delegation to assist native Hawaiians, federal officials are now denying that they had any trust responsibility prior to statehood.

"We have catalogued the wrongs committed by the federal government under its watch, and they are grievous and undeniable. Most of the land claims we labor to address today were committed prior to 1959. Other wrongs continue to this very day. Two examples are the permanent reservation of trust lands without any compensation or land exchange at Lualualei, and the discriminatory denial of federal dollars to Hawaiian Home Lands that are available to every other public housing agency. I have directed the Office of State Planning and the Attorney General to do whatever is necessary to finally hold the federal government accountable for these claims.

"While we are on the subject of federal responsibility, it is important for us to remember that this trust was established in 1921 by federal law. Now, 71 years later, I have a message for the folks back in Washington: It's time to get serious about what you started. In 1983 the federal/state task force ordered by the U.S. Department of the Interior recommended that the federal government and the state each provide \$125 million to Hawaiian Homes. Well, here in Hawaii, although it has been difficult at times, we have invested over \$167 million and are working on more. Mr. Federal Government, where is your share? It is now past time to stop finger pointing from the sidelines and do what is right. Match or better us, dollar for dollar for native Hawaiians on Hawaiian lands.

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"The preservation of our environment compels action from everyone immediately, because time is not on our side. That is why we teamed up with the federal government and Nature Conservancy' to produce 'Hawaii's Extinction Crisis.' It is our call to action and makes everyone a steward of the land.

"In the past, we joined together with communities across this state to preserve our natural heritage: the Heeia wetlands, Mount Olomana, the Honokahua burial grounds, the West Hawaii coastal wilderness, Makena Beach, the waterfront park, Kahoolawe, and our mauka watersheds, to name a few.

"Today, as stewards, we expand our call to action.

"Last year, you enacted laws for natural area partnership and forest stewardship programs which made it possible for private landholders and the state to jointly manage important private reserves. As a result of your action, we now have three new agreements to protect dryland and tropical rainforests. Because of this success, I am requesting \$500 thousand on top of \$300 thousand already appropriated for next year to expand this program to other unique habitats.

"In addition, I believe that protection of these private lands, as well as our state natural area reserves, should have a reliable source of funding. Therefore, I will submit for your consideration a bill for the permanent funding of up to \$4 million annually for these programs. Appropriately, the source of these funds will be revenues generated from leases of state lands.

"Also, I ask your support for an additional \$600 thousand this year to halt the invasion of non-native plants and animals into our natural reserves.

"We must expand our vision of stewardship. Let me illustrate: The 'Kokia Cookei' became extinct in its natural home on Molokai. All that was left was a cutting which had been grafted to a related plant on Oahu. To me, that is as near to total annihilation as a living thing can come. From this one graft came many, and with extraordinary pride we brought it home to Molokai and replanted it. Really, a miracle when you think about it.

"Last Friday, I visited the Lyon Arboretum in Manoa. It is an Eden in our urban backyard. There I saw a tissue bank where slivers of rare and endangered plants are preserved for future propagation. I can think of no venture more important than banking such plants, while we work to protect and nurture them in the wild. To do this I request an additional \$500 thousand, for tomorrow's miracles.

"We all know that Hawaii is a center of nature's creativity. Now we must make it a center of conservation research and training. I ask you to support the University of Hawaii's supplemental request for conservation biology, research and training. I know what scientists and citizens can do when they put their heads and hands together to solve problems to protect the environment. Let us learn how to replenish our lands, protect them from non-native species and then teach the

world. Let us make our university a leader in the science of biological conservation.

"Conservation and community education go hand in hand. I ask you to support a special \$1.4 million 'Aina Hoomalu' interpretive program for parks of distinction where residents can go to get in touch with what is really important.

"Even God's greatest creatures need our help. As you know, last week under my direction, the Attorney General sought and received a temporary restraining order to protect the state mammal, the Humpback whale, from vessels which disturb its migration through our waters. Make no misake. Habitats on land and sea must be protected and will be protected by this administration.

"I have a theory about the people of Hawaii. It may have something to do with our distance from everyone else and our closeness to one another. We are not, and never have been, a people to get caught up in the malaise of the times.

"I was reminded of this by Gladys Brandt, who spoke at Hawaii Remembrance Day during the Pearl Harbor Commemoration. As only someone with her grace and candor could do, she reflected that the people of Hawaii, unlike most of the United States, did not react with mistrust and suspicion for each other during World War II, even though the war came into our homes. 'With few exceptions,' she said, 'we affirmed our belief in the bond of community.'

"That message from the very hard times of the '40s applies to us today. Make no mistake. So much has changed. These are the '90s: the days of empowerment, not paternalization; the days of supply-side management not demand-side marketing; but this is still a time everybody knows nobody can do it alone.

"For all the diverse and conflicting opinions in this room, we are bound by that principle -- by that bond of community -- and we must put it to work. It's a cliche when you say it, but it works when you do it.

"Let us not get trapped in the vise between doom and gloom. At a moment when the world seems to care less, let us care more; let us come together with our neighbors, provide for our families, build for our children and believe in our dreams.

"It is our tradition. It is our future.

"Thank you."

Senate President Richard Wong then rose and stated:

"Governor Waihee, thank you very much for sharing with us some of your views. I have been in this building for a little while and I have heard a lot of state of the state speeches. This is probably the longest, but I must say in all honesty, one of the more significant. It has been a very moving kind of experience for people who have been around this building for any length of time. Thank you.

"In a brief hour and twenty minutes, you have gone over the gamut of what is most important to Hawaii, namely, your mention of the family, about the health of the people of this state, about the shelter for the people of this state, and about the educational needs for our young people for Hawaii's future.

"I think you said it very uniquely ... citing someone who said it a long time ago, that a government or its leaders will be judged by their caring about the least members in their midsts, in terms of providing for themselves. Certainly, your agenda, ambitious as it is, will demand our attention.

"Again, Governor Waihee, I want to take this opportunity to thank you for a most moving speech. We here in Hawaii are truly unique and, hopefully, we will be able to take care of our own. Won't we, Malama?

"If there be no further business by the members of this Joint Session, I declare this Joint Session adjourned."

At 11:15 o'clock a.m., the President declared the Joint Session adjourned.

Senator Cobb rose on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege. I'll defer to the Senator from Waikiki on what happened to the convention center. However, I would like to rise on expressing my concern about what happened with the elevators yesterday.

"I know that the access for the public is severely restricted here. Yesterday, two of the four elevators were down -- one for loading and the other for repair. The line for the elevators on the ground floor extended all the way out to the sidewalk and the average wait was half-anhour or more to get an elevator.

"I think, Mr. President, we should adopt a policy, in a positive vein, that says there will be no repair of elevators during normal working hours. That, can be done after hours. And there should be no loading or a monopolizing of an elevator during the same time period. If there are shelves or other things that need to be loaded, it should be done after normal working hours because the number of elevators we have in the State Office Tower, four, is almost half the number that we had in the State Capitol, and when something happens as it did yesterday that provides even more of a restriction on the public access to

various parts of this building. So, I hope the Senate leadership takes it under advisement and adopts a policy, in concert with the House leadership, that maximizes and keeps free the elevators during normal working hours. This will be especially critical when we have a large public hearing. It's difficult for the public to find parking; it's difficult for the public to get over here; and I don't think we should be doing anything to make it more difficult for them to get up and down this building. Thank you."

Senator Solomon also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, in today's Advertiser editorial section, there is an article that says, 'Schools - Good staff reassignment plan.' I would like to quote from it so that my colleagues will have an idea as to what I am speaking about.

"It says, 'One of Hawaii's most radical education reforms would take little new money but could make a world of difference. It would reassign 1,000 of the Department of Education's state and district workers to direct school support. The schools, especially the teachers, would dictate how these folks spend their time, either at the schools or at nearby "support centers."'

"It also goes on to say, Mr. President, that this recommendation is a result of 'Project Ke Au Hou,' devised by Superintendent Charles Toguchi.

"Mr. President, I would like to remind you, as well as the rest of my colleagues, that when I had the privilege of chairing the Senate education committee in 1983, we advocated a very strong position on deployment. I would like to, at this time, Mr. President, commend the Department of Education as well as those serving as advisers for 'Project Ke Au Hou' that it took them only nine years, nine years, Mr. President, to finally see the light.

"Also, Mr. President, I still to this day do not know what these 1,000 persons are doing, nor do I, Mr. President, to this day, have any idea as to why the majority of these bodies are making anywhere between 38 to 48 thousand dollars a year. (Senator Yamasaki interjected: 'More.') Thank you, I'm being conservative. But in those days, 1983, that was the pay scale.

"I would like to thank our then Ways and Means chair, Senator Yamasaki, who took a very strong position but we remained in deadlock with the House Finance Committee, if you recall. We went into conference and we had to extend the conference about three to four days trying to communicate this position to the House. I'm hoping that in this session Senator McCartney will follow the lead that we had set back then and perhaps we could make this a reality in seeing whether or not these persons could possibly be deployed back into the classrooms or at least communicate to this body as to what these persons are doing and whether or not we are getting the best for the dollars that we are investing. Thank you very much, Mr. President."

Senator B. Kobayashi also rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, on the same subject, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"I'd like to remind everyone that things are not always what they seem. The good Senator from the Big Island noted that these positions will be re-deployed for direct school support. I would underline that support might not mean that these positions will be going back to the classrooms and so this is something that we have to monitor. The full scope of the allocation and the exact nature of the allocation have not yet been made. It is hoped that many of these allocations will indeed go beyond direct school support to actually going back into the classrooms as the previous speaker has said but we don't know that for sure right now. Thank you."

Senator Crozier also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, two points. First, to compliment the Senator from the Big Island for bringing up the history of the concerns she just expressed. To illustrate to those people who want to have term limitations, Mr. President, the Senator from the Big Island was able to bring up the history to this body and to remind us of what has transpired and that it took so long for it to happen. Had we a two-term limitation here, she and almost everyone else in this body would not be here so we would not have remembered the work that had been done in the past. I think it's important for the people trying to chase incumbents out of office to understand that it is important to have people around who can bring up the past and remind us of such.

"The other point I would like to talk about, since the Senator from Waikiki is not here, is the demise of the convention center. I would just like for those people who supported the convention center to take heart. It only took nine years for the Board of Education or the superintendent with his Ke Au Hou project to make a change. It only took seven years to build a bridge over Wahiawa reservoir, where the good Senator from the North Shore represents, and I think it was in 1986 that we celebrated the 100th anniversary of the Statue of Liberty. Mr. President, for your information it took 25 years to build the Statue of Liberty. Not so much the construction but one of the big arguments was where it should be placed. They chose many different islands; they had funding problems and all of that. I think we have been with the convention center for 12 years so we are still ahead of schedule, we still have 13 years to have something in place. Thank you."

Senator Fernandes Salling, on a point of personal privilege, said:

"Senator, I hope it doesn't take 13 years or nine to refurbish the Capitol." (Laughter.)

Senator Cobb, on a point of personal privilege, then stated:

"Mr. President, I can't resist on the refurbishing of the Capitol so I will check with the bookies in Chinatown and Senators here, House members, and people in DAGS. I think the break even point for bets, even money, will be seven years or longer. So it's a very close bet whether we make it by the end of the century."

Senator Matsuura then rose to inquire:

"Mr. President, my neighbor over here has a big map and I don't know why these maps are on his desk so I would like to request that he enlighten me as to why they are there. Would he do me the pleasure so I do not have to ask him?"

The Chair posed the inquiry to Senator Holt and Senator Holt responded:

"Mr. President, I kind of anticipated our Senator from Waikiki rising on a point of personal privilege.

"On a light note, so that the press does not misinterpret me like they did when I talked about wrestling, putting me on the front page, I just wanted to let my colleagues know that ... it's pretty sad that the convention center did not develop like we had planned and a lot of you followed me down the path and you still continue to support me and I thank you for that ... however, I want to remind people that I still have the Ala Wai Golf Course design in case anybody is interested. (Laughter.) Senator McCartney told me that the Minami Golf Course cost \$140 million but this one, three years ago, would have cost us \$10 million if Robert Trent built it and the convention center would have been free via the tourist tax. If anybody wants to see it I still have it. I haven't framed it yet.

"Just to inform everyone, I talked to Senator Nakasato this morning before I decided to say anything and he said to go ahead and make a comment if I wanted to that the Governor spent \$500 thousand for the Market Place and I want to make sure that everyone remembers that. Thank you."

At 11:45 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:46 o'clock a.m.

Senator Matsuura rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, one thing I learned about being in the Legislature is that you have to learn how to count. The second thing is that you don't write bills that may affect the news media. This year I did one of the 'no-nos' and it's Senate Bill 2357 which calls for a correction of false published statements. Yesterday, there was an article in the Hawaii Tribune - Herald about this bill and my being the author.

"I don't want to take too much time to read everything here but it says, 'Matsuura wants law requiring corrections. Media attorney says the proposal is unconstitutional.' And I quote further:

'Portnoy said courts have found that the present checks and balances are critical to preserving democracy and to allow the media to continue to investigate, criticize and debate issues.

Portnoy said the part of the bill about a determination of falsity that precludes a monetary judgement has been proposed before, but he has never before seen any attempts to tell newspapers what to print.

"There's not a court decision in the country that gives someone the right to tell a newspaper what to print," he said.

"That is arrogance that's pretty incredible," Portnoy said.

'Portnoy predicted that if the bill were to become law, there would be no stories written about the workings of government because any sources intimidated into recanting statements would trigger the forced printing of a correction.

'Portnoy also wondered how an opinion, such as in an editorial, could be determined as false.

'Matsuura said the bill was prompted by a situation where the newspaper printed "totally false" information about him involving a land-use matter and later used the topic for an editorial. A subsequent correction was unsatisfactory, he said. When the newspaper encouraged him to write a letter to the editor, a state planning official responded instead, but the last three paragraphs of the letter pertaining to Matsuura were not printed.

'Though he was told the letter was shortened because of space, Matsuura declined to write a letter himself because he didn't want to appear as if he were complaining.' End of the newspaper quote.

"Mr. President, I want to correct the perception as to why I introduced this bill. I agree with Mr. Portnoy a hundred percent that there should be investigations, truth should be printed, everything. I have no objections to that. There is only one reason for my introducing this bill. If for some reason there are false statements, inaccurate statements, erroneous materials printed, then, I say give the person to whom the errors were being made a chance to correct those statements.

"There are many instances where erroneous statements have been made. I've experienced two. There was an editorial on the local radio station here saying that we as Hawaii legislators were crooked ... that we were corrupt! We corrected him but he continued to air the same erroneous editorial. The editorial was picked up by a House member and he tried to explain that some of the Senators were corrupt and all that ... and of course nobody listened to him, and the California-Hawaii Commission bill passed. The House member then took that editorial and sent it to a Republican California assemblyman. Unfortunately, that assemblyman did not verify the information and went on the floor and made a major attack on the integrity of the Hawaii State Legislature.

"It's amazing what a single erroneous radio editorial in-Hawaii can do because it resulted in all of the Republican measures to be killed in California. I had NBC and ABC news call me but, fortunately, none of the Hawaii television stations carried this story. It's interesting that the California assemblyman who said all the bad things about the Hawaii legislators on the assembly floor later apologized. He said, 'I'm very, very sorry.' He said that of all the years that he served in the legislature, that was the most regrettable thing that he had done and doesn't know how he could correct his erroneous and Mr. President, you too had regrettable statements. reacted to his floor speech in the California assembly because I saw the letter that you wrote to the California legislature.

"This is is the kind of problem S.B. 2357 is addressing. Something that the news media created that is totally erroneous that can trig er a detrimental effect in terms of our relationship with t California legislators.

"Now, the newspaper article that they talk about in the Tribune - Herald actually started with a news article in the Advertiser titled, 'Land-use bills differ over "open" space district.' The reporter wrote, 'Golf courses. Matsuura's bill would allow golf courses and driving ranges as permitted uses in the open district and also in the agricultural district with a state special use permit.'

When this article came out I called the supervisor and told him that I never mentioned that golf courses will be allowed on the new agricultural land with a state special use permit. A few days later, there was an editorial with my picture on it and it said '... But the Senate bill would too easily allow golf courses in the new open district. It also would allow golf courses on agricultural district land by special permit. Both would be missteps.'

"This time I called the publisher of the paper. The publisher said to write a letter to the editor to correct the error. I called Harold Masumoto and asked him to write a letter to the editor to explain and clarify the error they had printed.

"Harold's letter, and I'm not going to read all of it, but this is, in part, his letter to the editor, the last few paragraphs and it reads:

'To the contrary, golf courses are not an automatically permitted use in either bill. Further, Senator Matsuura's bill specifies that golf courses are not allowed in the agricultural district after July 1, 1993, which by implication also means that golf courses shall not be allowed by special permit. In addition, at the Senate hearing, Senator Matsuura clearly stated that it was not his intent to have golf courses considered as an "unusual and reasonable" use in the agricultural district.

'These bills are more complicated than most, and multiple sections of the bills must be read to understand their full intent. All in all, there are more similarities than differences between the two bills and Senator Matsuura's bill strongly protects agricultural lands. It is in the other sections that there are differences between the bills.'

"Mr. Masumoto gave me a copy of the letter he sent to the editor. Guess what portion of the letter was deleted in the newspaper -- the paragraphs that would have corrected the initial erroneous statement. That's what S.B. 2357 is trying to prevent. I believe that the media should be protected by the First Amendment, but, in the event that there is a reporter and an editor who want to create news rather than to report the news, because the newspaper business is profit driven to sell newspapers, this bill will at least provide a check to ensure that the news media will verify their sources and correct if any errors are made to protect everyone.

"I have immunity to say whatever I want to say here at this time as a Senator. However, I am not going to be irresponsible by saying things that are false to hurt a person. I don't think that was the intent of the power that was given to us and our forefathers saw the value of the First Amendment to make sure that the media is protected.

"I have great respect for the media and I'm not attacking the media. I'm just asking that if there comes a time that an error is made, at least, give the person a chance to correct it. Thank you, Mr. President."

The Chair then responded:

"Senator Matsuura, I think the intent is that the introduction of the bill is merely the presentation of an idea which, hopefully, will be discussed. That's basically what you are saying, that if in the headlines of today's paper they print that Dickie Wong has done something wrong, that the retraction should come as soon as possible and should be printed in a comparable space. Is that what you are talking about? This issue has been discussed before." Senator Matsuura responded:

"Yes, exactly. That's what the bill does. The retraction has to be on the same page as the article appeared."

The Chair continued:

"So the intent of the bill is really that if they say today in the Advertiser or the Bulletin, as an example, that Dickie Wong did something wrong and they found out afterwards that it wasn't so then there should be some compelling reason for the media to make every attempt to correct it by placing the correction in an appropriate place where the greatest number of people can see a retraction if that is what happened. Isn't that basically what the bill says?"

Senator Matsuura interjected:

"Absolutely. I'm not talking about minor errors like printing my name as Ricardo or I am chairman of such and such committee. I'm not talking about those kinds of errors. I'm talking about major errors."

Senator George interjected:

"Mr. President, as a frivolous sidebar to the remarks of the previous speaker. From time to time I have to remind myself that it's usually not considered judicious to argue with anybody who buys ink by the barrel. And the corollary to that is that it's also not judicious to argue with anybody who can put a four-lane freeway through your bedroom."

The Chair responded:

"Sometimes we all wish too as politicians that the ink was invisible."

At 12:00 o'clock noon, the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:01 o'clock p.m.

Senator Matsuura then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, last week I mentioned about a newspaper article that was directed toward Senate Bill 2357. Now, this past Sunday there is an editorial, a large editorial, perhaps the largest editorial I've seen in the Hilo Tribune - Herald. I want to read the editorial into the Senate Journal because I'm not going to correct any of their incorrect statements. I hope that all the people of Hawaii will read the Senate Journal. Let me read it so you will understand what I'm trying to address in S.B. 2357. The article reads:

'Blatant attempt to cow isle press

'Barely a month ago, this country celebrated the bicentennial of the Bill of Rights. Already, the First Amendment to the Constitution has come under attack in Hawaii from a legislative bill introduced by Big Island State Sen. Richard Matsuura.

'Not that the First Amendment has never been challenged before over what, perhaps, are very valid issues. It has, and it's stood the test of time. But Matsuura's proposal reflects more of personal frivolity, or vendetta, than a philosophical or jurisprudential difference with the Bill of Rights.

'Under the guise of seeking corrections in the newspapers or the broadcast media, the bill actually would give politicians the right to dictate what to print in the papers or what to broadcast on radio and television. So far, only Deng Xiaoping, Fidel Castro and a few other dictators have such a right.

'If the bill becomes law, the newspapers, for example, would have to print a corrected statement from a politician without changes -- unless the changes are approved by the public official. The printing would have to be in the same place in the newspaper but in twice the space of the original statement. Inexplicably, the bill would apply to editorials and letters to the editor in which opinions are expressed. Under the protection of the First Amendment, Matsuura's bill would be unconstitutional.

'As the Honolulu-based media law attorney, Jeffrey Portnoy, succinctly summarized, the bill is an arrogant "attempt in legislative form to intimidate the media about writing a story about public officials." Undoubtedly it would have a chilling effect on stories about government affairs because any sources intimidated to recant statements could force the newspapers to print a correction.

'As the senator ought to know, it is the general practice of all mainstream newspapers in the United States to print corrections of factual errors. As a matter of policy, the Tribune-Herald publishes corrections of errors in fact that have been printed in the newspaper and will make the corrections as soon as possible after the error is brought to the attention of the editor. We have printed most corrections in a specific space on Page 2. Some have been printed in other pages, including the front page. This correction policy is working out well.

'Matsuura has explained that the bill was prompted by an incident in which he could not get a satisfactory correction printed in a Honolulu newspaper about a "totally false" story relating him to a land-use deal. (I don't know what he's talking about. I don't have a land-use deal.) But he also said he declined to accept an offer from the newspaper that he write a letter to the editor to explain his position because he did not want to appear to be complaining.

'Now he seems to have a change of heart and is making a big fuss through a legislative measure.

'It is not only unconstitutional in trying to tell the press what to print, it also is a repugnant, self-serving attempt to exert interference in the operation of a private business by requiring a newspaper to print the corrections in certain size and position. In short, it's a blatant attempt to cow the press in Hawaii.

'It would be a waste of precious time for the rest of the lawmakers to consider this frivolous measure. The quick way to deal with it is to chuck it.

'Matsuura would serve the interests of his constituents better by applying his talents to solving real problems such as housing, energy and financial aid to the counties than by attempting to rectify his personal problems by using his power as a legislator.'

"Mr. President, this bill has not been scheduled for a hearing yet. I told the Hawaii Tribune - Herald editor that for a bill to become law is very difficult. Very few bills actually make it to the end unamended. This bill, I'm sure, will be amended in the final form. The amendment could be that both parties would have to agree as to what is printed in the papers or the space may be the same. I don't know what amendments will be made.

"I want to clarify my position for the record. I'm not angry with the news media. I'm <u>really</u> not angry with the news media. They are some of my favorite people.

"I believe in the First Amendment! I'm totally for it! However, I don't like to be associated with Deng Xiaoping and Fidel Castro. I've never said that S.B. 2357 will apply to the letters to the editor. That is ridiculous! I'm not arrogant! I'm not the kind of person who intimidates. Believe me, I don't have a land-use deal! I don't have a land-use deal to correct! I don't have a change of heart. My stand is still the same. I'm not trying to rectify a personal problem and God knows I work hard and I try to do my best as a State Senator. Thank you very much."

Senator Koki also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I have opposed using electronic voting machines during our election process. I have already cited numerous problems that I won't go into. To give a little background, I called several companies that produced voting equipment and materials to learn about the pros and cons of electronic voting machines. One of them was Sequoia Pacific. They sold us our present system and they also build and sell electronic voting machines. They were adamant that our present system was the best system for us. Our hardware needed upgrading if we wanted to get our results faster and that could be done for under \$500,000. Sequoia Pacific said they would love to sell us \$10 million worth of electronic voting machines but went on to list many reasons why we should simply upgrade our present system.

"Sequoia Pacific was not pursued to put in a bid to convert us to an electronic voting system. The Lt. Governor's office claimed Sequoia Pacific was biased because they supplied the ballots for our election and had an interest in not seeing an electronic voting system installed in Hawaii. Sequoia Pacific was not the only election firm to advise against an electronic system for Hawaii.

"Despite the multitude of reasons why an electronic system was not best for Hawaii, the Lt. Governor's office got approval from the Legislature to go ahead. Shouptronics was selected as the vendor. I checked on Shouptronics and informed the Senate and the Lt. Governor's office that Shouptronics was not substantial enough for us to commit ourselves for the next ten to twenty years. If they were to go out of business the integrity of our entire system would be in jeopardy. Despite this information, Shouptronics was the vendor the Lt. Governor worked with to convert our election system. Apparently, during the implementation stage, the Lt. Governor's office determined that Shouptronics was not qualified and sought another vendor. Sequoia Pacific was that vendor. The new RFP was designed in a way that Sequoia Pacific's electronic machine has the inside track. The very firm that insisted that the electronic voting machine was not for us.

"Shouptronics, obviously very disappointed, has charged that the new RFP contains flaws that contradicts FEC standards. I spoke to a Shouptronics official last week and he told me that the state is requiring information that could be used by the election administrator to alter the results of the election. I requested that he give me the details, in laymen's language, the portion of the RFP that contradicted FEC standards and how this then could be used to alter the results of the election.

"The official says that we are a unique state where the election observer and the administrator of the election are the same body. I am not accusing the Lt. Governor's office of any deliberate wrongdoing. But the way our electronic system is run, the potential of irregularity and fraud is apparent to all. We need to take steps to separate the observer and the administrator. Thank you."

The Chair then made the following observation:

"Members of the Senate, all senate bills have been printed, distributed to members, and were made available to the general public yesterday. Referrals, attached to today's order of the day, are complete. The last senate bill introduced was Senate Bill No. 3486."

Senator Blair then rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"On a point of personal privilege, Mr. President, I wish to extend, on behalf of all of the members, our thanks to your staff for their hard work in completing the referral sheets so quickly and the Print Shop staff for completing the printing so expeditiously. Thank you."

ADJOURNMENT

Senator Crozier, chairman of the Committee on Housing and Hawaiian Programs, and members of the committee, having requested a waiver of the 48-hour Notice of a Public Hearing on S.C.R. No. 24, the President granted the waiver.

Senator Cobb then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, yesterday, I received a memo on the securing of the Punchbowl entrance to the Senate parking lot in the Capitol building. I find it odd that this memo would come out the day after a court injunction was granted, at least for 10 days, halting all construction on the Capitol. But I think it would have been better if some advance notice had been given of this closing because I, like other Senators, attempted to use the Punchbowl entrance to come to work and found it closed with no advance notice, no sign on the road, no posting, no indication at all that it was closed until you came right up to the entrance where there was some yellow tape indicating that the gate was down.

"I think, Mr. President, until the injunction is resolved I question why this entrance should be closed and I think anytime in the future when an entrance or egress is to be closed or altered, that advance public notice would be most helpful, not only to members of the Legislature but members of the public who would be using it. Such was not the case.

"Second, Mr. President, I received a letter from the Hawaii Academy of Plaintiffs' Attorneys concerning the CAIR auto insurance reform proposal that is before the Legislature. In the letter, signed by Mr. Robert Toyofuku, they had checked with many sources in the private sector and the Insurance Division of the DCCA regarding a possible pull-out by USAA auto insurance. I was informed of that possible pull-out or pending pull-out while attending a State Farm reception at the Ala Moana Hotel. The reason I am raising this is it goes to the issue of truth in lobbying because Mr. Toyofuku's letter makes it emphatically clear that there is no such contemplative pull-out by USAA. Therefore, I think it's incumbent upon the opponents, more specifically State Farm, to either verify this pending pull-out or to retract such allegations; but we as Legislators can only rely on the

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truth of what is told to us by lobbyists and when that information is false I think it needs to be called to account publicly and the issue resolved before we make decisions. That's why I'm doing so today. Thank you."

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT

Senator Crozier for the Committee on Housing and Hawaiian Programs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1603) recommending that S.C.R. No. 24, as amended in S.D. 1, be adopted.

Senator Crozier then moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.C.R. No. 24, S.D. 1, be adopted, seconded by Senator Fernandes Salling.

Senator Solomon then rose to speak in support of the resolution as follows:

"Mr. President, I would like to include as part of my support of the resolution, the remarks that were made by Mrs. Hoaliku Drake, chairman of the Hawaiian Homes Commission. As you know, we did have a hearing yesterday and I feel that her remarks are befitting in support of the resolution. I will not go into detail as to her remarks, being that we will be holding a press conference shortly after the session, but I would like to submit Mrs. Drake's testimony as my own for the record.

"Mrs. Drake's remarks to the Senate Committee on Housing and Hawaiian Programs, public hearing of January 29, 1992, are as follows: 'The purpose of the resolution is to urge the President and the Congress of the United States to honor and fulfill the Federal trust obligations to native Hawaiians, the beneficiaries of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act, 1920, as amended ("HHCA").

'From the beginning of its enactment until Hawaii was admitted into the Union, the HHCA was a Federal law. The Governor of the Territory of Hawaii was an appointee of the President of the United States; and the Territory itself was under the administration of the U. S. Department of the Interior. Title to Hawaiian home lands vested in the United States.

'Upon statehood, the State of Hawaii entered into a compact with the U. S. and assumed the duties of management and disposition of Hawaiian home lands. The State of Hawaii further agreed to adopt the HHCA as a provision of the State Constitution. The applicable law states in part:

"As a compact with the United States relating to the management and disposition of Hawaiian home lands, the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act, 1920, as amended, shall be adopted as a provision of the Constitution... [Section 4, Admission Act of March 18, 1959, Pub. L. No. 86-3, 73 Stat. 4]"

'The State and its people reaffirmed this compact by adding another provision to the Hawaii State Constitution whereby they accepted specific trust obligations relating to the management of Hawaiian home lands imposed by the federal government:

"The State and its people do hereby accept, as a compact with the United States, or as conditions or trust provisions imposed by the United States, relating to the management and disposition of the Hawaiian home lands, ... the State and its people do further agree and declare that the spirit of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act looking to the continuance of the Hawaiian home projects for the further rehabilitation of the Hawaiian race shall be faithfully carried out. [Hawaii Const., Art. XI, Sec. 2 (1959), renumbered Art. XII, Sec. 2, (1978). (Emphasis Added.)]"

'The trust responsibilities assumed by the State of Hawaii are clear and have been reaffirmed in court decisions. The Hawaii Supreme Court in <u>Ahuna v.</u> <u>DHHL</u>, 64 Haw. 327 (1982), concluded that the State of Hawaii assumed a fiduciary obligation upon being admitted into the Union as a state.

'The Supreme Court of Hawaii also said that in the years preceding Hawaii statehood, the United States Government served as trustee with respect to Hawaiian home lands and the native Hawaiian beneficiaries of those lands.

'The Federal-State Task Force on the HHCA in 1983 reported many instances in which breaches occurred during the Territorial period. Hawaiian home lands were made available for public use by Federal and Territorial agencies through executive actions that were not authorized by the HHCA. Hawaiian home lands under the management of the Territorial Commissioner of Public Lands were even sold to private parties, without legal authorization and without compensation to the Hawaii Home Lands Trust.

'A prime example of Hawaiian home lands illegally set aside by executive order is that of the Lualualei lands. A total of 1,356 acres of prime land were taken from the Trust. A legal determination by the Federal District Court has prevented the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands from asserting its claim, but the moral issue remains: the obligation of the Féderal government to make the Trust whole requires replacement or compensation for the lands taken.

'In addressing land controversies affecting the Hawaiian Home Lands Trust, the Land Claims Task Force formed by Governor Waihee adopted these guiding principles in recommending remedies:

(1) The federal government is responsible and should compensate the trust for illegal or improper withdrawals, transfers, dispositions and associated uses of Hawaiian Home lands that occurred after the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act was enacted in 1921 and that accrued until statehood in 1959.

(2) The state government is responsible and should compensate the trust for illegal or improper withdrawals, transfers, dispositions and associated uses of Hawaiian home lands that occurred after statehood.

(3) The state government will take responsibility for remedying post-statehood circumstances of illegal or improper withdrawals, transfers, dispositions and associated uses of Hawaiian Home Lands that were initiated before statehood.

State remedies will not include compensation owed to the trust for such illegal or improper dispositions and uses before statehood. The state may hold the federal government responsible for certain post-statehood circumstances.

(4) Compensation owed to the trust from the state government for illegal or improper withdrawals, transfers, dispositions and associated uses of Hawaiian Home Lands may be, for example, in the form of cash, land, services, capital improvement projects, or combinations thereof.

'The land claims were discussed in testimony provided to the Interim Joint Committee on the Governor's Action Plan on November 19, 1991. In particular I invite your attention to the testimony given by the third panel, which discussed Federal issues.

'On a more timely basis, concern has been expressed as to the Bush Administration's intent to freeze or cut back on domestic programs as implied in the President's State of the Union speech last night. There is the concern that the target of such cuts could well be programs that benefit native Hawaiians and funding of infrastructure for Hawaiian home lands.

'A well-documented case can be made to prove the absence of Federal aid and support to the Hawaiian Homes program as well as inaction and neglect in the management and disposition of trust lands during the Territorial period.'"

Senator Crozier also rose to speak in support of the resolution and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the resolution and my only comment is when the governor goes to Washington, D.C., I hope that this action by the Senate and, hopefully, the House will be able to touch the Congress of the United States and be a contributing factor in their supporting the Hawaiian Homes Commission. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan also supported the resolution and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this resolution.

"Congress in 1921 had the right idea in passing the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act. It's too bad they set aside the wrong lands.

"Here are the facts. Only 20% of the inventoried lands were awarded because these were the ones that could be used for homes or farming. The remaining 80% are in remote areas without water, roads or utilities. Our congressional delegation has done a yeoman's job in trying to get monies for these programs but we need the help of the President and Congress.

"I surely hope that the President will follow through with his statement in his State of the Union address that, 'Whatever programs Congress creates, Congress should pay.' We are waiting for that to happen. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1603 was adopted and S.C.R. No. 24, S.D. 1, entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION URGING THE PRESIDENT AND THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES TO HONOR AND FULFILL THE FEDERAL TRUST OBLIGATIONS TO NATIVE HAWAIIANS," was unanimously adopted, with the exception of Senators Holt, Mizuguchi and Reed who were excused.

Senator McCartney then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, throughout the week, members rise to speak on points of personal privilege and a lot of times the remarks are negative - what's bad about government; who's doing what to whom and what's wrong. We stand up and we make a lot of points and the press always picks up on the negative. Whenever they print stories about us (and I talked to my friend Senator Matsuura) the big stories are the negative stories and the good things that we do are printed in the back of the newspaper. Maybe we can do a little bit to help change some of that behavior. Maybe, every Friday, we should make the time for point of personal privilege a time when members can stand up and talk about what's good in government, the good things that are happening in the Senate. Good things are happening in government because they are happening and we just need to highlight those things. What I would like to do today is to share one incident that happened to me today.

"We talk about our public schools and everyone is down on our public schools. We talk about how we have to 'blow up' the system and, yes, Mr. President, we need to reform and restructure our public schools, but, we do have good public schools. I just came from Heeia Elementary School where they gave out awards to their outstanding students. It was a neat program where they recognized all of the outstanding students in each class, in the middle of year, recognizing good behavior of students and recognizing their contributions to good citizenship in the school and it was such a positive experience.

"I just want to share with the body that many good things are happening in our public schools and we can be part of them but that doesn't mean that we can't work harder to improve them.

"I hope that in the future, on Fridays, we share good things with the press and the public so that not everything is negative because it isn't negative in this state and in our government. I am proud to say we are doing good things in the Senate. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I believe that the suggestions of the previous speaker are very good.

"I would like to say that I read this article (in 'Ka Leo O Hawai'i') about Leslie Wilcox. I was impressed with Leslie's background. I want to congratulate Leslie Wilcox, who does a fantastic job of being the anchorwoman (of KGMB Channel 9 News). I would like to commend her for what she has accomplished. Thank you."

Senator Crozier also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I would like to be part of this old tradition that is about a minute and a half old about saying good things about people. For me, I would just like to say, 'Senator Reed, it's good to have you back.' That's the whole thing; it's just that ... good to have him back." Senator Koki also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I'm not going to continue the trend of saying nice things about people.

"Mr. President, the CAIR coalition has put out some information regarding the problems and their proposed solutions of our automobile insurance problem. And the Hawaii Plaintiffs' Association put out a brochure countering some of the claims of CAIR association.

"It says, myth No. 1, CAIR has said that 28% of Hawaii's accident victims qualify to sue and virtually all of them do. This statement is false. They go on and say that the Honolulu Police Department reported 40,000 accidents' in 1990 and data from the Hawaii State Judiciary shows that only 928 suits were filed; therefore, it's really only a 2.6% rate. You know, this is a really ridiculous use of statistics.

"No-fault was supposed to take lawyers out of the loop, allowing only about 10% of the injured parties to qualify to sue. One of the most important advantages of nofault, keeping attorneys out of the process 90% of the time, is currently destroyed by the threshold that we have because 28% of injured parties qualify to sue. This is real typical of attorneys as HAPA avoids the real issue and focuses on grammatical errors to give a false picture.

"Myth No. 2. CAIR stated that the number of auto accidents in Hawaii is decreasing but auto insurance rates are way up. They counter this by reporting that the number of major accidents in Hawaii was 16,000 in 1977, 26,000 in 1988, so they claim that there has been a dramatic increase in the number of accidents. Well, the data that CAIR took was from 1988 to 1991. Another thing is that they compared it with the number of accidents per 1000 drivers. Obviously, if there are more drivers you are going to have more gross accidents. Another deceptive use of statistics.

"CAIR has stated that the fact is there are only about a dozen companies left that will even offer auto insurance in Hawaii. HAPA states that this is false. There are over 120 companies that offer and sell auto insurance in Hawaii and they obtained this from the Insurance Division of DCCA. One hundred and twenty companies are required to offer auto insurance but only a dozen are willing to sell it and it shows that these twelve companies sell over 90% of the auto insurance in Hawaii.

"This morning, HAPA dropped off a correction on their brochure. They said that they made a typographical error and it says, 'Due to a typographical error there was a misprint contained in the binder distributed at Monday's informational meeting. The error is located on page 3, paragraph "f." The error is on the very last line. It says, 'Your UM policy to make up the difference ...' It should have read, 'Your UIM coverage will make up the difference.'

"Again, this is typical of attorneys. He focuses on his typographical error and not his more important distortion of facts. HAPA has only served to reinforce people's views of plaintiffs' attorneys that they are deceptive and sneaky."

Senator Blair responded:

"Mr. President, for the record. When I was practicing law, I was a defense attorney and so I assume the previous remarks do not pertain to me. However, if the members of the Senate wish, to debate the issue of automobile insurance law amendments on the floor, we should refer the subject matter to the committee as a whole and take up the debate. I'm not suggesting that. I'm suggesting that, if this continues, that's where we are headed. I hope we will not continue the charges and countercharges. Let's not debate matters that have been referred to committee, at great length, on the floor. Thank you."

The Chair answered:

"I think that will have to be left at the discretion of the Chair. As you know, as a matter of past practice, we have allowed a great deal of latitude in the discussion of ideas via personal privilege. At times we've bent the twig to its breaking point. But, again, I am certainly aware of what you have suggested and we will try not to encourage the continuation of debate on the floor on issues which are still pending in committees."

Senator Koki rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I had the opportunity over the weekend to read the Star-Bulletin and the headline said, 'Hundreds scramble for Waikele homes.' It shows a picture of a portion of the 1500 people that stood in line all night for a chance to buy one of 216 townhouses.

"Our housing situation is not only a crisis, it is scandalous. When I see a picture like this I imagine a country in which a famine is going on and people lining up to get food and when the food line is opened pandemonium breaks out and the weak get trampled on.

"Let me read a portion of the article. It says here, 'Roger Resuello ended up with his lucky No. 7 but he was thrown off his wheelchair when the crowd raced to form a line yesterday for applications for Parkview and Ho'okumu townhouse projects in Waikele, near Waipahu. "I wasn't hurt," said Resuello, "just shaken up."'

"Our housing policy does not give enough incentive to produce the amount of housing we need, consequently, what we pass off as affordable is really laughable. 'The project began taking applications at 8 a.m. today for 216 units that range in price from \$79,500 for a 650-squarefoot, two-bedroom, one-bath apartment to \$183,400 for an 830-square-foot, two-bedroom, two-bath apartment.' A 600 square feet two-bedroom apartment for \$80,000 is really not a good deal. Most people's living rooms are bigger than that. Eight hundred and thirty square feet apartment for \$183,000, is that a good deal?

"Many in government are blaming this situation on greedy developers but the real culprit is our land-use policies and an intolerable development and permit process. The administration has demanded that 60% of a project to be affordable, the developers must use the other 40% to pay for the development cost. Is it any wonder that development is low and the supply is getting worse?

"Housing should not be treated so differently from other products. We are in a free enterprise economy and if we want affordable housing we need to have a good supply of land available and enough incentive to producers to provide housing. Anytime government overregulates and gets involved too much as in Russia and other communist or socialistic states, housing shortages occur and quality is poor.

"Mr. President, our government policies have rationed affordable housing to a fortunate few and we demean our citizens by having them line up like desperate people for the few homes that become available. If we can't change the big picture right away, we can at least preserve the dignity of our people by offering them a system that won't force them to stand in line all night.

"Mr. President, will you yield to a question?"

The Chair responded in the affirmative and Senator Koki asked:

"Mr. President, do we have a bill that will allow developers to sell condos through a lottery?"

The President answered: "Yes, we do."

Senator Crozier also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, my comments are not to rebut the good Senator from Kaneohe but to complement and shed some new light on the matter. There is no argument to the situation where hundreds of people line up for just a few apartments; it's intolerable. There are many culprits. Many of the land-use policies we have today were put there long ago to protect what we thought were important ... to protect the sugar lands, pineapple lands, to protect the environment. They've all been institutionalized. Maybe it's time to dismantle some of those protections with some kind of balance.

"Also, other issues that drive the cost of housing up is the price of money. I think the governor talked about how the retirement system in the State of Hawaii is going to participate in interim financing and if anybody's been involved in construction, it is that construction monies is It's easier for a homeowner to get their the key. financing through Fannie Mae, Freddie Mae, Hula Mae, but to get the construction going is important. Our state retirement system is participating ... I wish we were the first state to do that but California was the first to do it. Their state retirement system is putting up \$225 million for construction financing for entry level homes. This will relate to starting of about 7,500 new homes for people in California. I don't know the exact number, I think our number is \$100 million so if that can translate to possibly in excess of 2,500 new homes for entry level that would take some of the relief off of these long lines.

"Another aspect that is driving the cost up, and I think everybody will agree with me, is that Hawaii is a paradise that is why we all live here and that is why everyone else wants to come. We've had foreigners buying into Hawaii ever since Captain Cook arrived ... especially starting in the 1970s when the Canadians and the oil sheiks found such good deals in Hawaii and bought up quite a bit of Then in the 1980s the Australians and Japanese land. We are started to accelerate the amount of purchases. now in a lull. I can foresee the rest of the Asian countries, including South America, both sides of the Pacific Rim, in the 1990s buying up more land in Hawaii. Maybe it's time that we said foreigners or aliens cannot buy land in Hawaii for residential purposes but you can come here and buy land for hotels and what have you because you stimulate the economy. But when they come to buy residences or buy properties just where our people used to live, they take that out of our stock and it's time that we stop that. I have introduced a bill for that very purpose and I will be having a hearing on that and maybe the good Senator from Kaneohe will support me on that matter. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I would like to add my perspective to this and I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"Twenty-two thousand seven hundred native Hawaiians are still waiting for homes. Perhaps the good Senator from Kaneohe, being of the same party as our President, could communicate to him this need. There are many Hawaiians who remain homeless and I'm sure if we can get them their Hawaiian homes it would alleviate the need for the state to carry the burden by themselves. Thank you."

Senator Koki responded:

"I don't want to belabor this and I take all of the comments and I'm not going point by point but one of the things that I really agree on is that Hawaiian homes should have really been solved a long time. "For me to get to the President of the United States is very remote but for the people in this body to get to our governor is much better and I think if we can spend \$75 million for a judiciary building and we can spend sixty something million dollars to renovate our Capitol, can't we really find the will and the resources to start developing on our own rather than saying, 'Hey, let the federal government do it.'"

Senator Blair then interjected:

"Mr. President, I notice that the Senator from Kaneohe is wearing his track shoes today. I'm wondering if you could ask what he's running for." (Laughter.)

Senator B. Kobayashi also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, on the housing issue I will agree with the good Senator from Kaneohe that government cannot solve everyone's problem, particularly in this case of housing where we have a ratcheting up of prices and an expectation of a certain level of, shall we say, profit whenever housing is developed. We have a very limited amount of financial resources and right now our housing development office, HFDC, Housing Finance and Development Corporation suggests that we need subsidies in the range of \$36,000 to \$60,000 per unit in order to develop a typical \$120,000 low rise rental unit for a typical family of four making approximately 60% of the medium income. It would be good if state government could afford to subsidize each unit to the tune of \$36,000 to \$60,000 per unit but we cannot do so. And so we must I think balance what we give out in money with what we do in terms of change of law and change of priority.

"The governor's state of the state message indicated that there should be reconsideration of the 60% quota for affordable housing that was imposed just last year or the year prior. And the same state of the state message indicated that the governor was supporting a move to free up some 5,000 acres for the purpose of adding to the housing stock. These I think are steps in the right direction. The question that might be asked is whether 5,000 acres is all that we can do and whether we can go even further in trying to limit some of the government restrictions on housing.

"Eventually, I think, we will have to live with the fact that we've gotten into this mess over many years through many miscalculations such as the imposition of 60%affordable housing quotas. And there is no simple nor quick way that we can resolve the housing problem. Nonetheless, I think that if we take a multi-pronged approach, continue to spend some monies on housing, continue to attack the questions of government intervention, we might eventually make the housing picture at least more optimistic for those in the future. Thank you."

Senator Chang also on a point of personal privilege said:

"Mr. President, having substituted for the Senator from Kaneohe in joining the Republican hierarchy in greeting the President and Barbara Bush, I feel obligated to convey his concerns to the President on his behalf." (Laughter.)

Dear Senator Koki:

It came to my attention on Friday afternoon (1/31) that you called my (and HAPA's) credibility into question in a floor speech at session. My credibility is important to me and I have always tried to be forthright, accurate and fair in all my dealings, including those with legislators. Consequently, I feel compelled to respond by this letter.

The materials to which you referred were distributed only to members of the Senate and House Committees on Consumer Protection and the Judiciary as part of the informational briefing we held on Monday, January 27. As you know, you were invited but did not attend. After the briefing, I gave copies to the Senate President and Senator Yamasaki for their information.

All of the information contained in the materials was researched and checked. I stand by its accuracy. Since the materials were distributed to legislators, I was particularly careful about the facts contained in them. When two of your colleagues raised some issues at the briefing, I immediately checked and responded to them to clarify any misunderstanding or misinterpretation there might have been.

Although you did not attend the briefing, I believed that I had cleared up any misunderstanding you may have had in our telephone conversation we had on Thursday afternoon (1/30). In that conversation, I indicated to you my sources, my interpretation of the remarks made by C.A.I.R., and explained why I felt it was necessary to rebut them. It is my distinct recollection that, during that telephone conversation, we discussed your interpretation of the comments and our differences of opinion.

Accuracy is important to me and, if I am incorrect or inaccurate, I would be the first to admit it and make sure that accurate and correct information is provided. I have been and am always available to answer any questions or clarify any point that I make on behalf of HAPA. If our telephone conversation did not clear up any misconceptions you still have, I apologize. However, although we may differ on some of the issues, I am confident that the facts I have presented are indeed accurate.

RST:jb cc: All Senators"

Senator Levin also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, Senator McCartney asked us a few days ago to try to be positive during this part of the session, but I believe he limited his request to Fridays and today is not Friday. So, I must rise to insult one of our colleagues, if the Chair will permit, by simply saying, 'Senator Reed, you would make an excellent attorney.'" (Laughter.)

The Chair called on Senator Reed for a response and Senator Reed replied:

"Mr. President, thank you. It would be an insult were I not to consider the source so I thank you for the backhanded compliment and I also would like to let any of my colleagues who are indeed lawyers know that I have a long list now of people who want me to represent them. Since I'm getting calls to that effect and, of course, can't represent them, if anybody wants to have any clients referred, please let me know."

Senator Crozier rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, in this morning's Advertiser there is a cartoon caricature of me. I don't mind the cartoon and the issue but I wish the cartoonist had made sure, before he drew the caricature, to have taken a better look at me because I swear the character really was Senator Dennis Nakasato." (Laughter.)

Senator Nakasato responded:

"Mr. President, that calls for a challenge. I challenge him to losing weight." (Laughter.)

Senator Solomon also rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, just some brief remarks on a point of personal privilege.

"Although we agreed not to carry on any lengthy points of personal privilege messages, I cannot help but express the disappointment upon receiving notice from our governor in Washington, via the media, of the negative reaction by the Interior Department on the question of whether the U.S. government has a trust relationship with native Hawaiians and thus be obligated to help develop Hawaiian home lands. I will be preparing a lengthy point of personal privilege message on this issue.

"I think it's ironic, as we go upstairs to meet in joint session for the purpose of enjoying and listening to the remarks of Nobel Peace Laureate Archbishop Desmond Tutu, our federal government cannot see their way clear, Mr. President, see their way clear to allow this bill to be introduced and become law so these issues can be settled in court. The Hawaiian community has been asking for this opportunity since the overthrow of Queen Liliuokalani.

"For the Hawaiian community, today, this is a very solemn occasion. As I have said to the media, we will continue to fight, Mr. President. Other alternatives will be explored and we are going to exhaust every possibility before we concede to the federal government on this issue of trust relationship. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I would like the remarks of the previous speaker entered into the Journal as though they were my own. Thank you."

At 10:53 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair to meet in Joint Session with the House of Representatives, in accordance with H.C.R. No. 70, to welcome The Most Reverend Desmond M. Tutu, Anglican Archbishop of Cape Town, South Africa.

JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Sixteenth Legislature was called to

order at 11:02 o'clock a.m. by the Honorable Daniel K. Kihano, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Speaker Kihano then stated:

"Members of the Legislature, the purpose of this Joint Session is to honor the 1984 Nobel Peace Laureate, The Most Reverend Desmond M. Tutu, the Anglican Archbishop of Cape Town."

At this time, the House Clerk was directed to read the special certificate of the Sixteenth Legislature honoring and commending Archbishop Desmond Tutu.

Speaker Kihano then presented The Most Reverend Desmond M. Tutu to the members of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii as follows:

"On behalf of the members of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, I would like to present The Most Reverend Desmond M. Tutu, Anglican Archbishop of Cape Town. To express greetings in his own language: 'Sau-bon-ah baba Tutu nin-jani.' My friends, I present to you, Archbishop Tutu."

Senator Fernandes Salling and Representative Young then presented Archbishop Tutu with leis, on behalf of the Senate and the House of Representatives.

The Most Reverend Desmond Tutu addressed the members of the Sixteenth Legislature as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, thank you very much indeed for this distinct honor of addressing a joint session of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii -- a truly momentous occasion! And I learned it was arranged that you would move out of your normal Capitol building so that it would be easy for me to walk across from the Cathedral to come here.

"It is one of those oddities that I can have the privilege of addressing such an august body in a foreign country. It cannot happen even now in my own country. And just in case I ended up falling ... ahead, it is always good for me to remember some of the things that have happened to me. Recently, we went to West Point, the military academy, and at the end of our visit the cadets said they wanted to present me with a cap. The cap which they gave me did not fit me. Now, a nice wife would have said, 'Well, the cap is too small.' My wife, just to keep me in order, said, 'His head is too big.'

"But seriously, I know that this honor has been bestowed on us not for any personal achievement -- it is something that has been given to me in a representative capacity. It is to honor all of the very many stalwarts of our struggle for justice, for peace, for reconciliation, for togetherness in our country. And one of the great privileges that I have had has been to come to gatherings and say, I know that in this one instance, I know I can speak without sounding presumptuous. I can speak knowing that I speak without fear of contradiction; that I speak on behalf of millions. I speak on behalf of millions in one instance of saying thank you. Thank you to all those who have supported our struggle. Thank you for your love. Thank you for your prayers. Thank you for those of you who have, in the anti-apartheid movement, supported the imposition of sanctions because I want to assure you that especially those economic sanctions have helped us to come to the point we have reached in our country.

"Namibia has become an independent country because of the effectiveness of sanctions that stopped South Africa from continuing to fight in Angola. Sanctions have been effective. Nelson Mandella and others are out of jail today because of the effectiveness of sanctions many of you have supported to be imposed on the government of our country.

"Our political organizations at home are now free to operate legally because of sanctions and we are at the threshold of exhilarating developments. Yes, there are many hiccups. The hiccups of the violence happening in our country. But I want to say to you that the victory for the forces of good, of justice, of honesty, of love, of freedom -- that victory is your victory as well. You have a substantial part in the freedom that is coming to South Africa and, so, Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, very, very distinguished ladies and gentlemen, members of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, I want to When we celebrate our issue an invitation to you. freedom in South Africa, a freedom when black and white will be able to live together as God intends us to live, we want to invite you to come to South Africa and we will be able to say to you when you arrive -- Aloha!

"Thank you very much."

The Speaker then introduced the following distinguished guests, accompanying Archbishop Tutu: Mrs. Leah Nomalizo Tutu, wife of Archbishop Tutu; Mr. John Allen, aide to Archbishop Tutu; The Very Reverend H.T. Knight, Dean of St. Andrew's Cathedral; and The Right Reverend Donald P. Hart, Episcopal Bishop of Hawaii. Leis were presented to them by Senators McMurdo and Solomon, Representatives Hagino and Isbell.

The Speaker then said:

"The Most Reverend Desmond M. Tutu is in Hawaii under the auspices of The Peggy Kai Memorial Speaker Fund of St. Andrew's Cathedral.

"I would like to say that it is really an honor for us to have Archbishop Tutu with us here this morning. We feel honored that he had made some time to visit us here this morning."

Senate President Wong then stated:

"Archbishop Tutu, Mrs. Tutu, it is indeed a pleasure and honor to have the opportunity to meet you and hear from you. In great anticipation of your visit by all members of the Legislature, particularly the Senate -- I must pass this on to you, Archbishop Tutu -- this morning we finished our Senate business in record time, five minutes, because nobody wanted to miss the opportunity of meeting you in person.

"At this time, the Speaker and I would like to present you with certificates of recognition from the Senate and from the House of Representatives, Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii."

The certificates were then presented to Archbishop Tutu by President Wong and Speaker Kihano.

President Wong then said:

"Archbishop Tutu, thank you very much for allowing us the opportunity to meet you."

At 11:21 o'clock a.m., President Wong called a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The Joint Session reconvened at 11:33 o'clock a.m.

President Wong then continued:

"At this time, on behalf of the Senate, Mr. Speaker, I would like to thank you and the members of the House, in

particular Representative David Hagino, for allowing the Senate to be a part of this truly memorable occasion. We appreciate this opportunity to share the very deep feeling we have for Reverend Tutu here in the Senate, along with the whole world.

"Again, Mr. Speaker, Representative Hagino, on behalf of the Senate, thank you very much for having us be a part of this event. Mahalo!

"If there be no further business, I hereby declare this Joint Session adjourned.

"Thank you very much."

At 11:35 o'clock a.m., the President declared the Joint Session adjourned.

SIXTEENTH DAY

Friday, February 7, 1992

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 11:44 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Hal Weidner, Spiritual Life Center, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Koki, Nakasato and Wong who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifteenth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Ikeda introduced the Reverend Douglas Olson and Mrs. Ivy Olson as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure to have some very distinguished guests this morning. I would like to tell you a little bit about them.

"As you recall, last year the governor's proposal to place cabins, which he called his homeless villages, in our communities created quite a controversy and, at that time, many of us objected to the fact that the community was not involved in the decision-making. Well, as we deliberated over this plan and tried to come up with one that was more suitable to our needs as well as to those of the homeless families, we came across a program that was already in existence.

"Three years ago, Ivy Olson, with the assistance of the congregation of Calvary-By-The-Sea Lutheran Church, created a program to assist homeless people. It is called 'The Angel Network.' It started off modestly with Ivy and Doug providing shelter in the their own home for up to twelve homeless people. But there were so many more who needed help so the congregation of Calvary-By-The-Sea Lutheran Church took up the cause to locate and place and subsidize these families. 'The Angel Network' has become a very important role model for the state in its efforts to shelter the homeless. It was also a major contributing factor in persuading the Honolulu City Council to allow the Hawaii Kai community to develop their own alternative to the governor's homeless village program.

"By example, 'The Angel Network' has proven that caring people can make a significant difference in alleviating the problem of homelessness in Hawaii.

"Mr. President, recently, 'The Angel Network' held their first formal fund raiser and I have to tell you that I was most impressed by the success stories of some of the people who have been helped by Ivy, Doug and Calvary-By-The-Sea Lutheran congregation. There are people who are now on their feet and who are very successful business people in the community and I'm sure they're giving back as much as they have received.

"It gives me great pleasure, Mr. President, to introduce to you and this honorable body the Reverend Doug Olson and Ivy Olson.

"Also with them is Mr. Scott Kimsey who has been described by the Olsons as 'Mr. Do-It-All,' big brother, and board member of 'The Angel Network.'"

The honorees rose to be recognized and were presented leis by Senators A. Kobayashi, George and McCartney. Reverend and Mrs. Olson were presented the Senate certificate of recognition by Senator Ikeda.

Senator Tungpalan introduced Ms. Kinau Kamali'i who was seated in the audience.

Senator Reed introduced Mr. Buck Joiner, a resident of Kihei, Maui, who was also seated in the audience.

"Mr. President, I know this is Friday and I know that we wanted to start a wonderful tradition but I hope that you will allow me a few remarks because my heart is heavy and I know my colleagues will understand. "I was disappointed, along with several others, about the remarks made by Mr. Timothy Glidden of the Department of Interior at the meeting in Washington, D.C., over our Senator Inouye's bill to allow lawsuits.

"Mr. President, Congress has long recognized that the native Hawaiians are an indigenous group, no different than Indians or any other aboriginal group. Senator Inouye said at the hearing yesterday, 'We are not chartering unexplored territory when we talk about trust and when we talk about the body of law that defines the status of the native people of this country. We are now being asked to distinguish the body of law that affects the native people of the United States from those legal artifices that are being constructed to defend against any role by the United States in assisting the native people of Hawaii. It is an argument and a distinction that, in my view, the United States in all clear conscience cannot and should not make.'

"Mr. Glidden's remark is a glaring example of how past administrations have treated and ignored the rights of native Hawaiians. The recommendation of the Native Hawaiians Study Commission by our many people who were sent there, Kinau Kamali'i for one, were disregarded and trampled. It is fine to make statements that we support the return of Kahoolawe during election year. It is fine to say that we recognize native Hawaiians and their presence here as indigenous people but it is quite another thing when representatives of our national government speak against such obligations and trusts after the election is over.

"How long do we have to stand this kind of 'b.s.'? We're sick and tired! I implore our colleagues on the Republican side of this chamber to join with us and petition both the President and Congress to change the route and the way things have been going on. Thank you."

Senator Solomon also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, speaking in support of the previous speaker.

"'Every action of our lives touches on some chord that will vibrate in eternity.' This was said by Edwin Hubbell, chaplain, 1814-1880.

"Mr. President, just in follow-up, this is the day that the Hawaiians got 'bushwacked.'

"Thank you,"

Senator B. Kobayashi also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, keeping up with the short tradition of saying something good on Friday.

"A couple of days ago, on Wednesday, three of us went to a conference and not knowing fully what to expect we did not know that it was going to be so impressive. It was really a 'knock your socks off' type of event.

"Here in Hawaii we had representatives from 33 or 35 states looking over the Healthy Start program, a Hawaiideveloped child abuse prevention program. These representatives from these many states came to learn more about our system and in so doing hoping to duplicate a healthy start program in their own states, if at all possible.

"Two things that were most impressive. For one, this many individuals came and also that along with them

came several of the national leaders on child abuse prevention. Representatives were in the audience from the U.S. Advisory Committee on Child Abuse and Neglect and also from the National Committee for the Prevention of Child Abuse. It should be noted that Healthy Start received awards and accolades from the previous groups that I mentioned, and also from the U.S. Congress, in particular the chair of the U.S. House Select Committee on Children, Youth and Families, Congresswoman Patricia Schroeder from Colorado. It also received attention and praise from the American Medical Association and the American Academy of Pediatrics and, so, it is a very highly regarded program.

"Secondly, it seems often that we don't recognize programs in our own back yard and I'm not sure that this body has ever fully recognized the fact that this program had a very obscure start in 1985, seven years ago, from a line item that was introduced and pushed by the one person whose name is Senator Yamasaki and since then that program has grown both in stature and in recognition. I think that this is something good that can be said this Friday.

"We have a program that is nationally regarded that has received the praise of many of the most respected leaders and groups in the child abuse and prevention field and with a little luck this program may be duplicated elsewhere. Part of the announcement that we heard on Wednesday was that the Ronald McDonald Children's Charity has pledged a million dollars over the next three years to be contributed to the National Committee for the Prevention of Child Abuse to help duplicate our Healthy Start program across the nation. It was in part through the generous support of Maurice Sullivan of Foodland Super Markets that the million dollars have been made available.

"So, good news for Friday. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator McMurdo also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, 1 would like to add a little further to what Senator Kobayashi has been saying. We had a hearing in the afternoon because we were overlapping with what was going on downtown and they asked if we could move our bill on Healthy Start until about 3:00 o'clock. Sure enough, at 3:00 o'clock we were visited by the president (not Bush), this very nice lady who was president of this organization on child abuse, and several attendees of the forum. Also, Linda Coble came in to testify. There was not one testimony against the Healthy Start bill and I would like to thank Senator Yamasaki and Dr. Calvin Sia for their wisdom in realizing how important this was going to be for our future.

"There is one thing that came out in the hearing which I thought was particularly interesting and that is, although Healthy Start does not have a substance abuse component, they have found out that the families with whom they have dealt that there has been a significant drop in those who abuse substances.

"Thank you very much."

The Chair, at this time, interjected:

"Senators, you are not limited to saying good things only on Fridays. You can say it everyday."

Senator Reed also rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

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"Mr. President, I would like to follow-up on the comments earlier relative to the outlandish remarks that were received from some federal bureaucrats yesterday.

"Any suggestion by Washington bureaucrats that the federal government has no obligation to native Hawaiians is offensive to all of us. Offensive to anybody who knows the facts and history. Obviously, we must continue a bipartisan non-partisan attack and effort to enlighten those in Washington. This is not a new dilemma. In 1976, George Helm, Francis Kauhane and other Hawaiian activists who were protesting the bombing of Kahoolawe went to Washington during President Carter's administration and were unable to get a meeting with any top level people that included President Carter's people as well as our congressional delegation. George Helm came back furious about it, saying that 'No one in Washington even knows native Hawaiians exist.' Obviously, our congressional delegation has not made Hawaiian rights a high priority. So this is something that we must keep pressure on and we must not allow the bureaucrats in Washington to maintain a stance of no responsibility. We must also not allow this issue to become one where we point fingers at Washington and attempt to suggest that that is where the entire fault lies. Obviously, there is ignorance and apathy there that we must correct. The pressure must also be applied here at home and we must keep it at both levels."

Senator Cobb, also on a point of personal privilege, stated:

"Mr. President, just on a point of historical fact, while President Carter was elected in November of 1976 he was never in office until January 20, 1977. There was no Carter Administration in Washington in 1976.

"Secondly, I'd like to point out (I was discussing this with my colleague to my left) that during my recent travels in Siberia I encountered a rather obscure Eskimo tribe in the far reaches of the Yakut region of Eastern Siberia. They had petitioned the government in Moscow for the right to control their own lands and had been given that right, including the severance tax on oil and the right to manage their own affairs, and set up whatever they wanted including gambling or anything else. It strikes a rather responsive chord to what a number of our American Indians are doing in Minnesota and other areas, even if in some cases they are challenged by state governments. They are the indigenous people; they have the right to do that just as our native Hawaiians have a right to do that. And if it takes some head-pounding on the bureaucrats in Washington, regardless of party, I think we should be doing it."

Senator Reed responded:

"Mr. President, just for the sake of correcting the record.

"George Helm's trip to Washington was indeed in early '77. I thank the Senator for the correction."

Senator Holt rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, could the Clerk enter the personal remarks of the Senator from Kohala and the Senator from Pearl City-Waipahu as those of my own?"

The Chair so ordered.

HOUSE COMMUNICATION

On motion by Senator Solomon, seconded by Senator Reed and carried unanimously, the Clerk was authorized to receive the House communication transmitting the House bill relating to the authorization of funds for the expenses of the Legislature prior to 12:00 o'clock midnight. In consequence thereof and subsequent to its recessing at 12:18 o'clock p.m., the Senate took the following action:

MISCELLANEOUS COMMUNICATION

Misc. Com. No. 3, dated February 10, 1992, a report to the Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature, Regular Session of 1992, from the Ad Hoc Committee on the Qualification of Senator Andrew Levin with Exhibits I to VI, was read by the Clerk and was placed on file. (See ATTACHMENT "A")

Senator Koki rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, two short points.

"Last week, I spoke against HAPA's criticism of the auto insurance reform package and, although I stand by every word that I said, there were two words that I used that were judgmental words. Being a follower of Him who has said, 'Do not judge, lest ye be judged,' I would like to take back the two words, 'sneaky' and 'deceptive' and humbly apologize to HAPA for those two words.

"My second point of personal privilege, Mr. President, is about our helmet law. I've been getting several calls about that bill and I got a real interesting call from a good friend of mine, former Representative Ed Bybee. He said that riding a bike with a helmet actually may be more dangerous because it would limit your peripheral vision and limit your hearing. So, he challenged me to drive my car with the helmet on and I accepted.

"Mr. President, now do you see why I have problems with attorneys? He states a crazy premise that helmets may make driving a motorcycle more dangerous and I accept his even crazier challenge. My peripheral vision was not hindered at all. My hearing was not appreciably hindered. I drive with my windows up so a bike rider actually hears more than I hear. There is really just one objection that I would have to wearing a helmet. (Senator Koki put on a maroon-colored helmet.) It's the way I look. Dorky, yeah?" (Laughter.)

Senator Fernandes Salling, chair of the Transportation Committee, responded:

"Mr. President, I thought the Senator from Kaneohe looked great in it. I think he should wear it everyday and report to us at the end of the session just what the peripheral vision is like, and any other problems he might have encountered here on the floor with that helmet on."

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Senator Matsuura added:

"Mr. President, as an additional comment, talking about the hearing. I've always wanted to pass legislation to ban the use of Sony Walkman on your ear while you are driving. That bill never passed. But you can imagine the difference between having a Walkman and a helmet. Thank you."

Senator Cobb, on a point of personal privilege, then stated:

"On that very subject, in response to the Senator from Hilo, I recall a Transportation Committee hearing when then Senator Cayetano was the chairman of that particular committee and there was a bill to prohibit people from wearing Walkmans or ear pieces while driving and our distinguished Minority Leader asked the question, 'Do we prohibit deaf people from driving?' The answer was 'no.' Whereupon, the chairman said, 'Thank you, Mary, you saved us a lot of trouble.' And that was the reason why."

Senator Nakasato, on a point of personal privilege, then said:

"Adding on to Senator Koki's trial with the helmet. The preferred type of helmet that the motorcycle guys use is like the Darth Vader type helmet now. That helmet is very, very restrictive. You can't hear a thing and you can't see anything. Maybe that is what Mr. Bybee was speaking about. We use that helmet when we race cars and that helmet is very, very restrictive. There is a big difference with that helmet."

Senator McCartney, also on a point of personal privilege, stated:

"I hope to see the Senator from Kaneohe wearing that helmet when he walks door-to-door in his newly reapportioned district."

Members of the Senate:

Your Ad Hoc Committee on the Qualifications of Senator Andrew Levin hereby submits this report for adoption by the Senate.

The purpose of this report is to respond to a letter from Mr. Jared Jossem, chairman of the Republican party of Hawaii. Although news accounts of the letter appeared on January 17, 1992 and the letter is also dated that same day, it was not actually received by the Senate until January 31, 1992. A copy is attached as EXHIBIT I. The letter raises questions as to whether Senator Levin resides in the first senate district which he represents.

The issue posed for determination for this Committee is whether Senator Levin is a resident of the first senate district. The constitution requires that he be a qualified voter of that district. To be a qualified voter, he must be a resident of that district.

Briefly, the background of this matter is that on October 11, 1991, State Representative Whitney Anderson wrote a letter to the Department of the Attorney General requesting an opinion on this issue. Pursuant thereto, the attorney general issued a response letter and a copy is attached as EXHIBIT II.

On January 17, 1992, when these matters came to light, Senator Levin spoke on the floor on a point of personal privilege stating that: (1) he and his wife own a house in Hilo; (2) his wife resides in that house; (3) he resides in a rental apartment in the first senate district; (4) he spends most of his time home in his apartment; and (5) his only residence is his apartment. A copy of the senate journal proceedings is attached as EXHIBIT III. That afternoon and without yet having received Mr. Jossem's letter, the President directed sua sponte that research and an investigation be undertaken.

For further clarification and verification in response to Mr. Jossem's letter, Senator Levin submitted a written letter dated February 3, 1992, a copy is attached as EXHIBIT IV. The election section of the Office of the County Clerk for the County of Hawaii provided a copy of Senator Levin's voter registration form, which confirms that he is a registered voter in the first senate district. See EXHIBIT V. He does not claim a home exemption for the house in Hilo owned jointly with his wife. The exemption is claimed only by his wife. See EXHIBIT VI.

Under Article III, Section 12 of the State Constitution, the senate is to judge the qualifications of its own members. Article III, section 6 requires that the senator be a resident of the State, the age of majority, and a qualified voter of the senatorial district to which elected. Section 11-13, Hawaii Revised Statutes, on voter registration, considers residency as where the person's habitation is fixed and to where he intends to return whenever he leaves.

In view of the foregoing, and upon the consideration and deliberation by the Committee on this matter, the Committee finds that Senator Levin is in compliance with the requirements for legal residency in the first senate district, and concludes that he is qualified to serve as a senator representing that district.

The Committee recommends adoption of this report and that this report be entered into the Journal of the Senate upon its acceptance.



Re: Legislator Residing In a District Other Than One in Which He/She Was Elected

This memorandum is in response to your letter of October 11, 1991, in which you requested an opinion as to whether an individual may continue to serve as a state senator or representative if that individual moves and resides in a district other than the one from which the individual was elected, and secondly, if the individual were disqualified from holding office how would such a vacancy be filled. More specifically, you asked whether a person may serve as a state senator or representative in a district other than one in which he or she claims a home owner's tax exemption.

We conclude that there would be serious basis for challenging a legislator's continued eligibility as a state senator or representative if he or she claimed a home owner's tax exemption for a home located outside the district from which he or she was elected.

Article III, section 6, of the Hawaii State Constitution provides:

No person shall be eligible to serve as a member of the senate unless the person shall

> have been a resident of the State for not less than three years, have attained the age of majority and be a qualified voter of the senatorial district from which the person seeks to be elected. No person shall be eligible to serve as a member of the house of representatives unless the person shall have been a resident of the State for not less than three years, have attained the age of majority and be a qualified voter of the representative district from which the person seeks to be elected. (Emphasis added.)

Thus in order to serve as a member of the senate or house of representatives an individual must be a qualified voter in the senatorial or representative district which the individual seeks to represent.

Pursuant to section 11-12, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to vote in a particular district an individual must be a resident of a precinct within that district. Section 11-12 provides in pertinent part:

No person shall register or vote in any other precinct than that in which the person resides except as provided in section 11-12. (Emphasis added.)

Section 11-13, Hawaii Revised Statutes, describes the various tests for determining an individual's residency for election purposes. In Attorney General Op. No. 86-10, we stated that "residence when used in defining electoral rights has been said to be essentially synonymous with 'domicile', which denotes a permanent, as distinguished from a temporary dwelling place."

Under section 246-26, Hawaii Revised Statutes, a home owner's tax exemption is available only for the taxpayer's principal home. It would appear that a state senator or representative seeking such an exemption for a home located in a district other than the one from which he or she was elected is indicating an intention to establish residence other than in the district he or she represents.

Based on the foregoing we would conclude that a state senator or representative claiming a home owner's tax exemption in a district other than the one to which he or she was elected has in fact indicated an intention to establish residence outside the district to which he or she was elected and, therefore, would be ineligible to maintain office.

As to your second question of how such a vacancy would be filled, Article III, Section 5 of the Hawaii State Constitution and Sections 17-3 and 17-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, would be applied. Essentially, the governor would fill the vacancy for the unexpired term with an appointee who is a member of the same party or non-partisanship as the individual being replaced.

DRAFT OF REMARKS - POINTS OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE, 3RD DAY, JANUARY 17, 1992

Senator Levin rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"In the news this morning, the Republican Party is questioning my residence in the First Senatorial District. The request is apparently being made to you, Mr. President, and to the attorney general to investigate. If appropriate, Mr. President, I would like to ask you to please accept that request because an investigation will show that, in fact, I do live in my legislative district and this issue can be put to rest quickly. If the Republican Party had contacted me I could have given them this information too but they did not choose to ask me.

"For the record, I do own a house in Hilo outside of my district. About three years ago, when our tenant moved out, my wife moved into the house to make repairs and to fix the place up. She has made a lot of sacrifices over the years to allow me to continue in public service and when she decided to stay there longer than expected, I could not object. When I am home, I spend the week in my apartment and on some but not all weekends, I stay in the House. My one and only residence is my rented apartment and that apartment is at 77 Keokeo Loop in the First Senatorial District.

"I would welcome your efforts or those of the attorney general or anyone else to verify this matter so that my constituents and colleagues can be assured that there is no legitimate basis for questioning my residence. Thank you, Mr. President."

Dear President Wong:

Thank you for sharing with me a copy of Mr. Jared Jossem's letter to you dated January 17, 1992. Thank you also for agreeing to investigate his charges as I requested when they were first publicized.

The documents Mr. Jossem provided you are accurate to the best of my belief, but his typewritten set of statements and questions contain several inaccuracies. Allow me to respond to them.

I have represented the First District in either the House or the Senate since 1981. It is also correct that my wife and I own a home in the Second Senatorial District.

I also own a condominium unit in the First Senatorial District with my parents (Apartment 501, 2405 Kalanianaole Street, Hilo.) My parents own a life estate in that condominium unit and I own the remainder interest. (The condominium happens to be on leasehold land, although I do not think that is relevant to the issues here.)

My parents live in that condominium unit, and have since approximately 1976 when it was first purchased. I have never lived in that unit, nor have I ever claimed to. There was a time when my wife and I rented a separate unit in the same condominium, and that was our residence for a substantial period of time, but my parents live in unit 501 and, as I said before, I have never claimed that unit as my residence.

Because my parents own and live in that First District condominium unit, they claim it as their principal residence and obtain a homeowner's exemption as a result. Further-

more, my father is 80 years old and my mother is 79 years old, and therefore they claim a double exemption as senior citizens.

In paragraph 3, Mr. Jossem raises questions about my residence going back to the year 1981. To respond, I will go back even a year further. In 1980, I decided to run for the First District House seat. I moved into a rental in Hilo in the First District and resided there during the summer and early fall. Around October, I rented a house in Kurtistown and lived there until the end of 1984 or early 1985. My wife moved with me to Kurtistown, but she did not want to be in an isolated area, especially because I was in Honolulu so much. We had rented out the house we own in Hilo (at 1626 Waianuenue Avenue) in 1981; sometime after the tenants moved out, she went back to live in that home. We had a homeowner's exemption on that house from the time we purchased it in the mid-1970's and we never cancelled the homeowner's exemption. In 1984, I realized that we had improperly claimed the homeowner's exemption for the calendar year 1981, because we had rented out the house to another party. I wrote to the County of Hawaii Finance Director and informed him of the error. The Tax Office, in turn, responded that I owed back taxes for 1981 and for 1982, 1983, and 1984 as well, because the break in residence in 1981 meant that we had to file a new homeowner's exemption request in order to get the tax break. Although I disagreed with that ruling, and appealed the case to the Tax Court, the Court ruled in the County's favor, and the back taxes were paid.

In 1984 or early 1985, my wife and I moved to a house in the First District, at 2296 Kalanianaole Street in Hilo. We lived in that house until 1986, when we moved into a condominium unit at 2405 Kalanianaole Street, the same building (but a different unit) as is occupied by my parents. We lived in that unit in 1986 and 1987 and part of 1988, when the unit was reclaimed by its owner. We then moved to a different unit in the same building and lived there for part of 1988 and 1989.

During those years, neither my wife nor I claimed a homeowner's exemption on the house we owned on Waianuenue Avenue, because neither one of us resided there. State of Aswaii Sixteenth Tegislature The Senate

In 1989, the second condominium unit which we had rented was reclaimed by its owner.

When we were forced to vacate that apartment, my wife moved back into the home we owned on Waianuenue Avenue. She has resided there since 1989, and has rightfully claimed a homeowner's exemption effective the 1990 tax year. I moved into a studio apartment in the First District at 77 Keokea Loop. I have resided in that unit, as a tenant, since approximately August 1989.

With respect to Mr. Jossem's four questions, then, I would summarize as follows. I do not live in the one-bedroom apartment with my parents, nor have I ever claimed to do so. My parents do not share the apartment with me, and they are rightfully taking a homeowner's exemption on their residence. The Hilo house is not vacant; my wife lives there all the time. I go back and forth, but make it a point not to stay at Waianuenue Avenue for more than 2-3 nights a week. The only Code-A-Phone my wife or I have ever owned is on my law office number at 116 Kamehameha Avenue in Hilo, where no one lives and where no one has ever claimed any residency.

I hope that the above is comprehensive enough to fully explain my residence from 1980 to the present. If it is not, or if there are any questions I can respond to, I would be very pleased to meet with you in any forum that you deem appropriate.

Thank you for taking on this task.

"Last year, I had the honor of presenting Dr. Anding with a Senate certificate commemorating the first anniversary of the re-unification of Germany.

"Dr. Anding was recently one of the distinguished keynote speakers at the dedication ceremony at Honolulu Community College to mark the new Berlin Wall Freedom Monument. The creation and presentation of this monument from a three-ton piece of the Berlin Wall was a momentous occasion and an eminent reminder of the struggle that the people of the Federal Republic of Germany have overcome.

"Dr. Anding, we are honored by your presence. May I ask the Deputy Consul of the Federal Republic of Germany to rise and be recognized."

Dr. Anding, who was seated on the floor of the Senate, rose to be recognized.

Dr. Anding then presented the President with a remnant of the Berlin Wall and a book that describes the Federal Republic of Germany. The President presented Dr. Anding a gift from the Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature.

Senator Solomon then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, last week's hearing on the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act in Washington, D.C., served to make us all aware again of the federal government's failure to conform to the clear mandate of Congress in enacting the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act.

"The Bush administration has stated its position to be that no trust relationship was ever established by the Act. As can be seen from Hawaii's position as expressed by Attorney General Price, the Bush administration's position is simply not supportable as a matter of law or reason.

"Without doubt, the federal government has present obligations under that Act both as to the payment of money and as to the return of lands to the benefit of native Hawaiian people.

"This issue is a microcosm of something far more pervasive to the well-being of Hawaii and all its people. Not only does the federal government have obligations and duties to the native Hawaiians by congressional mandate, but it has a continuing and essential obligation to the state by the terms of the 10th Amendment to the United States Constitution to avoid transgression of state sovereignty.

"The federal government has failed in its obligation to the people of Hawaii to refrain from interference in the powers reserved to them by the Bill of Rights.

"We who are on the firing line in protecting and maintaining state sovereignty are well aware that there has been an incredibly rapid erosion of state sovereignty in the recent past.

"I need only mention as a clear example the horrendous issue of unfunded mandates. Already medicaid expenditures account for an average of 14 percent of the 50 states' budgets ... that's 14 percent, Mr. President, of those budgets over which the federal government has assumed complete control. Other areas of eroding state power are readily apparent in agriculture, banking, taxation, transportation, education, etc. ... where the U.S. government has exercised federal power in derogation of state sovereignty.

"Anthony Lewis of the 'New York Times' has characterized the contemporary centralization of state powers by the federal government as 'state-ism,' and he correctly, I think, draws a parallel with the breakdown of existing governmental structures in Russia and Eastern Europe as, in part, a reaction to such 'state-ism.'

"We are living in perhaps the most revolutionary period in world history in the last 150 years. George Kennan has stated that the changes now occurring in world affairs are certainly as, or more, significant as those of 1917 or 1848. Old patterns of thought won't do.

"A new paradigm is needed. In Hawaii that paradigm will question why a huge percentage of our lands must be committed to the control of the federal government for the purposes of national security when certainly there is not now, nor can we reasonably anticipate, an issue of world military confrontation.

"Hawaii, as a state which maybe is the clearest example of the usurpation of state sovereignty by the federal government, should take the lead in organizing the various states by conference, compact, or convention to cause the creation of a new paradigm by which federal/state powers may be re-ordered by the restoration of state control over that which are properly matters of state sovereignty.

"I call on the governor, as well as yourself, Mr. President, to effectively organize the full power and resources available to you and to him, both legal and political, to cause the prompt return of all lands being held or obtained by the federal government under an outdated concept of national security. Much of such lands so returned will be, of course, Hawaiian home lands and can be developed for the benefit of the native Hawaiian people notwithstanding the Bush administration's demonstrated disregard of its obligations to them.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Iwase also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I'd like to join in the comments of the previous speaker and ask that it be incorporated as my own. I would also like to add a few comments in that regard.

"Speaking not just about the state but also the county governments, I can recall sometime back in the late 1980s as chair of the council's budget committee, trying to find \$15 million in lost funds because the federal government had eliminated grants-in-aids. I do not recall if any of that money was ever returned to the city government in some other form but I do know that it was sucked away by the federal vacuum cleaner.

"I think the point that we are trying to make here, Mr. President, to the administration in Washington: 'Stop the preaching and stop the philosophizing. If you have a program which is a worthy program, implement it, using your funds and using your personnel. If you require the assistance of state governments or county governments, fund it; help us pay for it. We who sit in Hawaii as state officials, those who are in the counties, we have our own goals, we have our own programs, and we have our programs to try to meet the unique needs of the people who live here, and we do not need to be hampered by programs and philosophies issued ten thousand miles away in Washington, D.C., without the accompanying funds.'

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Cobb also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I sympathize with the remarks of our Majority Floor Leader and when the debate comes on the helmet law, relative to sovereignty, I will ask that they be incorporated as my own just as I did on the DUI law, that we are in fact reacting to federal mandates. We are losing our freedom, slowly, bit by bit. States are losing their sovereignty; counties are losing their rights; we as individuals, very slowly, but inexorably are losing our freedoms. It's not only a case of the federal government failing to live up to its original commitment and mandate, it's also a case of the federal government mandating the states to do things or withholding funds and imposing financial penalties for the failure to do so.

"Thank you."

Senator McMurdo also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"I would like to talk about the helmet bill which Senator Cobb preempted me on. That's okay. I'd like to make some remarks and expound on the ones that were made the day before yesterday by my colleagues, one from Kailua and the other from Kalihi, relating to the bill on motorcycle helmets, and also to address Senator Cobb's concerns.

"The good Senator from Kailua was right when he said his peripheral vision was not hindered at all when wearing a helmet. According to the requirements of the U.S. Department of Transportation motorcycle helmet standard, the helmet must provide peripheral vision clearance of 210 degrees for the wearer. Now, those of you who understand peripheral vision know that it is only 180 degrees, so, the safety margin is built into the helmet.

"As for the Senator from Kalihi's concern on interference with critical hearing, the DOT stated, and this was also verified by Morgan Keane who is a motorcycle rider herself and a member of the safety helmet coalition, any sound loud enough to be heard over the noise of the motorcycle and the wind will be loud enough to be heard inside the helmet.

"Mr. President, from 1968 to 1977 when we had the all-rider safety helmet law, there were less than 10 fatalities per year. However, since the repeal of this law, the fatality rate has nearly tripled. In addition, the repeal has cost the people of Hawaii over \$3 million every year in medical and disability related costs and nearly 80% of these costs are passed on to the public through increases in health and auto insurance charges and premiums. These figures are based on the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration report.

"Also, one of the concerns and one of the arguments presented by those who do not want to ride with helmets and who fight against the mandatory law is that motorcyclists are just hurting themselves. Why not leave them alone? They are not just hurting themselves, they are hurting taxpayers as well. The issue of the individual liberty versus the public good was clearly examined in an exchange of articles in the American Journal of Public Health in 1981 and the issue was also fought out in court in a case in Massachusetts which challenged the constitutionality of the motorcycle helmet use law. A

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lower court wrote an opinion which the United States Supreme Court upheld in 1972.

"The opinion reads in part: 'While we agree with the plaintiff that the act's only realistic purpose is the prevention of head injuries incurred in motorcycle mishaps, we cannot agree that the consequences of such injuries are limited to the individual who sustained the injury. The public has an interest in minimizing the resources directly involved. From the moment of injury, society picks the person up off the highway; delivers him with unemployment compensation, if after recovery he cannot replace his lost job; and if the injury causes permanent disability, may assume the responsibility for his and his family's subsistence. We do not understand a state of mind that permits plaintiff to think that only he himself is concerned.' This is <u>Sargent v. Sargent</u>, U.S. Supreme Court, 1972.

"An important, but certainly not an overriding consideration, is that if Hawaii does not adopt an all-rider helmet use law by September 30, 1993, which is the beginning of fiscal year 1994, a portion of our federal highway construction dollars will be redirected. Based on Hawaii's 1992 formula, one-and-a-half percent in fiscal year 1994 would total \$1.1 million and, for succeeding years, a 3% reduction would total \$2.3 million. This, at a time when we are talking rapid transit?

"Also, I would like to say to the good Senator from Kahala, maybe we don't like being mandated but it's a fact, and right now since it is a fact, maybe we better accept it and save the money.

"There is also a \$62 million grant which - if we pass a helmet bill now - we will get a bigger share of that pot, but, the more states who come into line with the federal government, the smaller the pot will be in ensuing years.

"Mr. President, I was informed that night before last we had another critical head and facial injury to a motorcyclist not wearing a helmet. How many more of these injuries and disabling accidents can we endure? During the four-year period, from '86 to '89, 61% of the motorcycle related fatalities resulted from head injuries. During the period, from '86 to '88, 78% of moped related fatalities resulted from head injuries. This year, according to the police, we have had seven traffic fatalities on Oahu; four of these were pedestrians, the other three were motorcyclists with no helmet.

"I would like to see my colleagues think about this in the ensuing weeks. Thank you, very much."

Senator Blair also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, on a point of personal privilege, I am tempted to say, 'I told you so.' We are now debating bills before they are reported out of committee. But since that is the will of the Senate, I would like to address the topic raised by the previous speaker.

"Some of you may remember that I have introduced legislation to require driver licensing for mopeds. I am very concerned for the safety of people riding two-wheeled vehicles on the highway. I do, however, have one problem, as yet unresolved, with the motorcycle helmet law. I mention it now only so that the bill's proponents will be prepared to address the issue when the bill comes up for third reading.

"If we accept the proposition that the fact that individual conduct imposes a cost on society is a sufficient justification for society to ban the particular conduct, where exactly do we draw the line? The consumption of alcohol and the consumption of cigarettes also result in easily quantified cost to society. Will we then ban the sale of cigarettes? Ban the sale of alcohol? For that matter, there are certain quantifiable costs attendant to eating red meat at McDonald's more than once a week. Are we going to get into regulating diets as well?

"I raised the question, perhaps, to a logically absurd point; but the point nonetheless needs to be addressed before I am asked to accept the argument that private conduct, because it imposes cost on society, should be subject to government regulation; I'd like the proponents to be able to draw a clear, bright line for me so that I will know I am not on a slippery slope to 'big brotherhood.' Thank you."

Senator McMurdo responded:

"Mr. President, just one comment to the previous speaker. Let's hope that when he's on that slippery slope he has his seat belt fastened!"

Senator Reed also rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I too was wanting to resist this topic until the bill was before this body. But since we're into the discussion, an issue that we should consider is the larger one of whether or not we have a right to outlaw risky behavior. Senator Blair touched upon that when he mentioned the high-risk nature of alcohol and tobacco. Use of alcohol and tobacco is risky behavior that has a far-reaching economic impact on the rest of society in terms of health care, work loss, etc. In a larger sense, diet can also represent risk. People are doing far more harm to themselves through what they eat, and we pay far motor in related health costs than as a result of motorcycle-related injuries.

"To take it even further, if indeed we are to outlaw risky behavior, then we should make the NFL and AFC flag football leagues because tackle football is very dangerous and even with the gear that is worn people get hurt. So if we want to outlaw risky behavior and make it a law as to what people can or cannot do, then let us Perhaps we should also make outlaw tackle football. professional boxers wear headgear and surfers surf with square-nosed surfboards because those pointed surfboardssure are dangerous. One thing after another, and it is indeed in the field of 'big brother,' be it the federal level or the state level, when we begin to dictate what type of risky behavior is allowed and what type of risky behavior is not allowed. What we get down to is a person's basic right to choose what kind of risky behavior you want to engage in or not. We tend to discriminate against those in the minority, such as those who ride motorcycles, and therefore have very little political clout. To me this is objectionable for those philosophical and other reasons. Thank you."

Senator Cobb, again, rose to state:

"Yes, Mr. President, while the debate or discussion today \dots ."

Chair interjected:

"It shouldn't be a debate but"

Senator Cobb continued:

"It's turning into one which I think is a good thing. We don't have enough of it here on the floor. Too often we pass things with very little public discussion, very little thought, very little self-examination and I think this is a good and healthy thing. I only touched on motorcycle helmets as an example of our loss of individual and collective freedom. I'm glad other Senators took up the cudgel and wanted to discuss it in more detail and did so.

"But George Santayana said it and bears repeating: 'Those who forget history are condemned to repeat it.' Are we forgetting that in the 1920s when alcohol was banned in the United States that gave rise to the likes of Al Capone and gangsterism, nationwide, and the Mafia came about as a result.

"Banning a behavior that is risky has been proven in history not to work! The great American example of prohibition proves that. We had an amendment to the federal constitution to ban the importation, consumption, sale and distribution of alcohol in the United States. It failed! And so we had another amendment to the United States Constitution to repeal that.

"We talk about choice. Mr. President, the remarks of the chairman of the Human Services Committee illustrate classically that when it comes down to the bottom line, whether it's on helmets or whether it's on 21-age drinking, it is very clearly, indisputably a case of federal blackmail. Even though blackmail is a dirty word. It is without a doubt federal blackmail and we're being asked to react to it.

"When it comes to the concept of choice, Mr. President, we support choice. I think a majority in this body support choice for women on the right of abortion; on the right of what to do with their own bodies. That is a personal decision, even though in the eyes of many in our society that results in a death. That is an element of choice that we at least in the Majority support and I know that there are differing opinions on the floor of the Senate and I respect those opinions. We support choice for women; we support choice for native Hawaiians; we support the right of Hawaiians to petition the federal government and we are doing so now.

"So where do we draw the line on choice? I think the Judiciary chairman raised a very valid consideration. Where do we draw that line on this slippery slope of risky behavior where the government tells us what we can or cannot do, based on the ancillary cost of that behavior. I think that is highly germane and I, like him, am going to be listening very carefully for the answers. Thank you."

The Chair then remarked:

"Before we go any further, one correction, Senator Cobb. I just want you to understand that the point of personal privilege is not for the purpose of debate. Whether or not the Senators had a great deal of debate is really not the question. The use of personal privilege has been given tremendous latitude within the Senate. That has been my personal philosophy. All I want is to remind you that at no time has the Senate not welcomed debate on a measure that is pending on the floor for a vote. I want to make that very clear."

Senator Cobb responded:

"Thank you, Mr. President. In brief response, I will correct the word 'debate' to 'discussion.' I think it's too seldom that we have open discussion that really gets as far-ranging as this and I think that it's a healthy thing once in a while. Thank you."

Senator Chang also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I had not planned to participate in this discussion but the mention of personal diet in relation to

social burdens prompts me to respond. Certainly, if this discussion is prolonged, it will keep me from lunch and thereby relieve me of any guilt in relation to social burdens. (Laughter.)

"I want to remind the Judiciary chairman that the slippery slope of distinctions is indeed a very dangerous area and I certainly hope he remembers the responsibilities involved when he considers the matter of firearms that look dangerous but are not necessarily so. (Laughter.)

"I fully agree with the Senator from St. Louis Heights that this involves more than social burden. It is a matter of federal blackmail.

"I would like to request, on a matter of personal privilege, that the chairman of the Transportation and Intergovernmental Relations Committee contact both the Council on State Governments and the National Conference of State Legislatures. These organizations have been very much bothered by the entry of the federal government into mandates and preemptions and there is an advisory council on intergovernmental relations that may offer us guidance in this area.

"Thank you."

Senator Holt also on a point of personal privilege then stated:

"Mr. President, speaking on personal privilege, and since there has been a lot of discussion about the helmet law, I decided that I would go and ask some experts about what they thought and so I went to my father who has a 41 Harley-Davidson and those Indian types where they used to shift with the hand. Since my father used to race at Kahuku, I asked him what he thought about the helmet law and he said, 'The only reason (for helmets) is because they don't know how to drive.'" (Laughter.)

Senator Crozier then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, originally, I was going to get up and share with the members that today is Abraham Lincoln's birthday and I was going to read the Gettysburg Address but I don't think I'll do it. But I do think it's appropriate that we do reflect on him and remember the great thoughts and laws that he put into place and some of the human endeavors that he outlawed, like slavery.

"The reason I wanted to talk about Abraham Lincoln is because he was the greatest Republican that they ever had. He was the apex of the Republican Party. They are on the down side now, I don't know how far down but they can come back.

"What I'd like to do ... I'd just like to salute the Senator from the Kaneohe area. The area where the Koolaus stand like a sentinel to catch the clouds that pour in from the realm of 'kanaloa' from the ocean and capture the raindrops to make those lands green so that people can be nourished and the beauty can be appreciated by all. The other day, the good Senator talked about the problem in Waikele where the people were being battered around trying to get in line for the homes and he mentioned a bill and the bill is House Bill 664, relating to sale to owner-occupants, which would allow optional lotteries. Well, we've taken his thoughts to heart; I've talked with the chair of the House conference committee and we will be bringing the bill back to the but I would like to thank the good Senator from Kaneohe for his efforts."

Senator Koki also rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I would like to commend the chairman of the Senate Housing Committee for responding to a real public concern so this will prevent decent people from having to stand all night for a house. I want to thank him for giving me advice on who to contact to get the sufficient support that is necessary to put a bill like this through.

"I just also want to comment that being that Abraham Lincoln was probably one of the first Republicans and for us to have reached our apex at its very beginning is really not correct. We have not yet begun to fight!"

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:22 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Solomon, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Thursday, February 13, 1992.

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TWENTIETH DAY

Thursday, February 13, 1992

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 11:35 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Lieutenant Carol Psaute, The Salvation Army, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Nakasato and Wong who were excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Nineteenth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Hagino introduced Mr. Newton Sue, former Acting Auditor, Office of the Auditor, as follows:

"Mr. President and members of the Senate, it is difficult to speak the praises of someone whose expertise in verbal communication has long been acknowledged. However, despite any limitations on my part, I am sure that our honoree, Newton Sue, will not hold it against me if I am less articulate than he is.

"Newton was born and raised in Hilo; graduating from Hilo High School and going on to the University of Hawaii. As a student, he wrote for the 'Hilo Tribune-Herald' and 'Ka Leo O Hawaii,' the University of Hawaii newspaper. He received his bachelor's degree in political science from the University of Minnesota. He served in the United States Army from 1954 to 1957 during the Korean War.

"During the early 1960s, he worked in Los Angeles for the Department of Defense in industrial security. At the urging of former Big Island State Senator Stanley Hara, Newton returned to the islands to work as the senator's administrative assistant where he gained valuable insight into the Legislature and legislators, which made his association with them so effective.

"Having been with the Office of the Auditor for 24-1/2 years, Newton retired in December of 1991. He has won much respect for his contributions to that office, serving as analyst, section administrator, assistant auditor, deputy auditor and, for the last three years, as acting auditor.

"In 1950 the Constitutional Convention set up the Office of the Auditor. The first auditor was approved in 1965. Newton joined the office in 1967 and as an analyst worked on early audits that set the tone of that fledgling office. As a supervisor, Newton oversaw progress evaluations and audits, legislative relationships and responses to legislative session requests. As a deputy auditor, he managed a staff of 27 that issued approximately 20 to 25 reports a year. He was responsible for the adoption of generally accepted government auditing standards which brought the auditor's office into the mainstream of his profession. Most recently, he gained attention for his candid comments regarding the erosion of the Legislature's control over state funds.

"Mr. President and fellow Senators, I know that you all join me in wishing Newton Sue a happy and pleasurefilled retirement and extend our best wishes as he continues with his following of the Hilo High School basketball team of which he is so fond. "I have it on good authority that Newton not only is fluent in Cantonese and collects Chinese books but he is also a gourmet cook. I also understand that since he is retired, he is looking for ways to supplement his fixed income; that he would like to use his culinary skills by doing catering for fund-raisers.

"Members of the Senate, Mr. Newton Sue. Accompanying Newton is his wife Stephanie."

Mr. and Mrs. Sue rose to be recognized. Mr. Sue was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Hagino and Senator Ann Kobayashi presented him a lei.

Senator Solomon then introduced Professor Albert Wendt as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure today, on behalf of the Women's Caucus, to introduce a very esteemed person who is visiting Hawaii from the Pacific. Before going any further, I would like to introduce him with this introduction.

"At a time, Mr. President, when corruption and mistrust of leaders and institutions are prevalent in the world today and truth appears as an elusive luxury, we must look to our artists and poets for the truth.

"With this, Mr. President, I would like to present to this body, Professor Albert Wendt, a native of Western Samoa, who is perhaps the most renowned and influential Pacific island writer recognized as a voice of the Pacific islands."

Senator Solomon yielded the floor to Senator Fernandes Salling and Senator Fernandes Salling read:

"And, whereas, Professor Wendt's literary accomplishments include four novels: 'Sons for the Return Home,' 'Pouliuli,' 'Ola,' and 'Leaves of the Banyan Tree' which won the New Zealand Wattle Book of the Year Award; collections of short stories: 'Flying-Fox in a Freedom Tree,' 'The Birth and Death of a Miracle Man,' and 'Lali'; and two volumes of poetry: 'Inside Us the Dead' and 'Shaman of Visions'; and

"Whereas, Professor Wendt's 'Sons for the Return Home' and 'Flying-Fox in a Freedom Tree' were made into feature films with the former selected for Hawaii's first International Film Festival."

Senator Fernandes Salling yielded the floor to Senator Ikeda and Senator Ikeda continued:

"Whereas, Professor Wendt has held several prestigious positions in higher academe in the Pacific including the chair of Literature at the University of South Pacific, director of the University of South Pacific Centre, and the chair of Literature at the University of Auckland, becoming the first Pacific islander to hold a chair at a New Zealand university."

Senator Solomon then interjected:

"At this time, Mr. President, we have asked our esteemed Minority Leader to present Professor Wendt a hala lei. The hala lei is very significant to all peoples of Polynesia and especially to the Hawaiian people because the hala was used for writing and for the making of our beautiful tapas.

"I would now like to introduce Professor Albert Wendt who is accompanied by his companion Rena."

Professor Wendt and his companion rose to be recognized and Senator George presented him with the hala lei.

Senator A. Kobayashi then continued the recognition of Profession Wendt as follows:

"And, whereas, Professor Wendt has been teaching and encouraging artists and writers through his many workshops and has been the impetus for the emergence of literature among Pacific islanders."

Senator A. Kobayashi yielded the floor to Senator McMurdo and Senator McMurdo concluded:

"Be it resolved by the Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, that it recognizes Professor Albert Wendt as the leading Pacific island writer and expresses its gratitude for his efforts in teaching, encouraging, and inspiring young writers in the Pacific islands."

Senator Solomon then continued:

"Mr. President, we will be presenting Professor Wendt with two certificates, one from the Senate and one from the House, in recognition of his tremendous contributions. In closing, Mr. President, artists and poets are the last repository of public trust and I think it would inspire us all to look to them for inspiration. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura then rose to state:

"Professor Wendt, this is the first time in my experience in the Legislature where all the ladies of the Senate present very glowing remarks to an honoree and I want you to know that all the male Senators extend to you their congratulations because we are all very proud of your accomplishments."

Senator Matsuura then introduced Mr. Al Harrington who was seated in the audience.

Senator Chang, on the recognition of Mr. Newton Sue, said:

"Mr. President, on behalf of all of those who have served as interns with the Office of the Auditor, I would like to extend our congratulations and best wishes to Mr. Newton Sue and wish him all our best in his future endeavors. If his cuisine will resemble his analyses, then I'm sure that the dishes he produces will be complex, pungent and appetizing, all at the same time."

At 11:51 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:55 o'clock a.m.

Senator Chang then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, the Reverend Rubon Creel passed away on February 9th of this year. After serving 20 years in the United States Air Force, Reverend Creel became a minister in 1953. He served the people of Hawaii. He founded the Afro-American Ministerial Alliance, the Gospel Music Times radio program, and the Trinity Missionary Baptist Church.

"Mr. President, I ask your permission to have entered into the record the Senate's expression of sympathy to the family of the late Reverend Creel."

The Chair so ordered.

The expression of sympathy to the late Reverend Creel reads:

"The Senate of the State of Hawaii extends its deepest sympathy to the family of the late Reverend Rubon Creel.

"After serving 20 years in the United States Air Force, Reverend Creel became a minister in 1953 to serve the people of Hawaii. He founded the Afro-American Ministerial Alliance, the Gospel Music Times radio program, and the Trinity Missionary Baptist Church.

"Reverend Creel was a graduate of Chaminade University in Hawaii and was very active in civic community affairs. He supported the passage of the Martin Luther King holiday and commission, and was an active member of the Afro-American Leadership Conference.

"The Reverend Creel passed away on the 9th of February 1992.

"The Senate of the State of Hawaii recognizes the contributions of the late Reverend Creel and offers its heartfelt condolences to his family."

Senator Holt also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I would just like to read into the record some words of University of Hawaii President Al Simone dated March 6, 1986 when he wrote me a letter after the Legislature passed the autonomy bill, one of the most significant pieces of legislation that the university's had. "I quote, 'In giving us this flexibility, you expect quality, trust, cooperation, accountability, responsibility and integrity, I could not agree with you more. You know I will work my hardest to be sure that the university performs on all of these dimensions.'

"I just want to state into the record that President Simone kept his promise, as you know. All of these flexibility measures that we did pass, none of us seemed concerned about giving them that autonomy that we had some six years ago.

"On another point, I just wanted to state that there's been some rumors that Senator Mizuguchi's going to be the next president of the university and I just confirmed that during the recess when Senator Matsuura shook his hand and I heard that Senator Matsuura's going to be the new dean of the College of Business." (Laughter.)

Senator Mizuguchi then responded:

"Mr. President, for the record, those are strictly rumors."

Senator Matsuura also responded:

"Mr. President, I have put in an application for the dean of the college of earth, wind and fire which covers everything." (Laughter.)

TWENTY-FIRST DAY

Friday, February 14, 1992

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 11:35 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Joseph Grimaldi, St. John Vianney Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Koki and Mizuguchi who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twentieth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator McCartney introduced Mr. Steven Maharey as follows:

"Mr. President, on behalf of Senator Crozier, it gives me great pleasure to introduce Mr. Steven Maharey. Mr. Maharey is a member of the Parliament of New Zealand and is on a 30-day visit of the United States as a guest of our government. He has been to various states and is ending his tour in Hawaii. Please welcome Mr. Steven Maharey who is seated in the audience."

Senator McCartney also introduced Ms. Linda Moriarity of the East-West Center who accompanied Mr. Maharey to the Legislature.

Senator Crozier added his remarks to welcome Mr. Maharey and said:

"Mr. President, I, too, would like to welcome Mr. Maharey and extend greetings from all of the people of Hawaii.

"Mr. President, I was fortunate enough to spend some time in New Zealand with the Office of Maori Affairs and, while there, I used to watch the parliament in session. I spent an hour or so everyday watching the parliament function and attended their committee hearings. I don't recommend that we function the same way that they do, Mr. President, because, even though the most gracious and courteous people on this planet live there, when the parliament meets their behavior is quite wild and woolly. To the point where, even you, Mr. President, it would force your hair to turn black. (Laughter.)

"But one thing that may be of interest to us. The parliament in New Zealand meets for about an hour, once or twice a week, with the ministers of the different departments. The ministers have to come before the parliament to answer any questions. Maybe we could steal that idea and have our governor and his cabinet come before us. Maybe every Friday, since we are supposed to have positive thoughts. I submit it for something we can consider.

"Thank you."

Senator McCartney then rose to state:

"Mr. President, I would like to second that recommendation that we have a question and answer period with our governor and his cabinet. We could have a good discussion and we should assign Senator Solomon as liaison to coordinate that great activity. And it would be great to ask Rex Johnson why he took the job with the Department of Transportation. That could be the first question.

"Thank you."

Senator Hagino then introduced Mr. E. George McMahon of the Queen's Counsel and the deputy clerk of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia. Mr. McMahon was accompanied by his wife Louise.

Senator Blair rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak as a matter of personal privilege on the story in today's paper, 'July trials granted in DUI cases.' It's reported in the paper that Justice Padgett '... found no evidence the Legislature intended the 1991 law to be applied retroactively.' I disagree and urge the members to review their Senate Journal for day three of the Special Session at page 5.

"There are eleven paragraphs. I won't read all eleven paragraphs but it starts, 'As a technical matter, I'd like to address the issue of jury trials in DUI cases.' There are subsequently eleven paragraphs precisely on that point culminating with the following: '... the change in §291-4 penalties was made to eliminate the jury trial right in order to provide for a more expeditious resolution of DUI cases now pending and in the future. Retrospective application was intended and is the only interpretation that fully effectuates the policy of avoiding jury trials in most DUI cases.'

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Cobb, also on a point of personal privilege, said:

"Mr. President, since the esteemed Judiciary chairman mentioned my name and handed me the report, I note it is usually the practice of the Senate that the longer the report the more thorough the explanation and the less controversy there is on the bill. A colloquial way of saying this is, 'The longer the explanation, usually, the less hair you find on the measure.' In this case, however, I find, one, a long report and, two, quite a bit of hair, and one, two, three, four, five w/rs. So, this goes contrary to the normal Senate practice of long reports usually being free and clear. Nevertheless, I've signed it free and clear because I like the idea of referendum but I'm not the last Senator, there is still one more to sign and if this particular Senator should show up, I will be happy to circulate it to him.

"This bill reminds me of the Christmas carol committee report I can recall coming out of the consumer protection committee one time. There were five - '1 do not concurs'; four - free and clear; three - falling birds; twowith reservation; and 'a mynah bird in a papaya tree.' Hopefully, this one will have clearer sailings. It's the gun bill.

"Thank you."

At 11:52 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

Tuesday, February 18, 1992

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 11:43 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Dr. Bill Godwin, Pastor, First Baptist Church, Ewa Beach, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Aki who was excused.

"In our discussions this morning, Mr. President, we touched upon your illustrious history with the United Public Workers.

"Dr. Deng is accompanied today by U.S. Escort Interpreter Phillip Huang."

Dr. Deng Xue-Liang, seated in the audience, rose to be recognized.

Senator Solomon introduced members of the Big Island Game Breeders Association, who were seated in the audience, as follows:

"Mr. President, today is a very auspicious day because the House has agreed to hear our cruelty to animals bill to decriminalize cockfighting in the State of Hawaii.

Senator Ikeda rose to speak against the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak against this bill.

"Mr. President, I have some reservations about this bill. I believe the intent is good, however, I've run into some instances where students have been called into family court and charged with being absent from school, only to find that the records kept were not accurate. In many cases, student help is enlisted to do attendance records and they sometimes make mistakes. Also, letters requesting leaves of absence are sometimes misfiled even after they have been approved.

"In one instance, for example, a special ed student was given authorization to be absent from school for two weeks in order to go with her parents on a trip. A letter was sent to the principal and it was verified and the consent given. When the child returned to school, the child was penalized for having been absent without approval, even though the parent had sent in a letter. The parent was not aware that the child was being disciplined for being absent until quite sometime later. This had a very detrimental effect on the child and I just feel that there has to be some way to determine that these records are accurate, rather than just accepting them on face value.

"I realize that school personnel do not want to go down to the courts for these hearings but I think that it's part of their duty so I'm voting against this bill.

"Thank you."

Senator Blair spoke for the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I speak in support of the bill. While the facts reported by the previous speaker may be real, I think their recitation is misplaced in a speech against this bill.

"This bill provides that the custodians of the records do not have to go down to the court personally. Certified records can be admitted to establish a prima facie case.

"In the situation that the previous speaker was addressing, the custodian of the records would only testify that the records being submitted are kept as a regularly conducted activity of the Department of Education. The custodian's presence would not resolve the concern. After the certified records are introduced, establishing the prima facie case, the shift of the evidentiary burden is slight. Upon the credible sworn testimony of the student, which contradicts the substance of the records, the teacher might very well still be needed by the state in order to prove the student's nonattendance.

"While there may occasionally be a record-keeping problem, any such problem will not be exacerbated by the passage of this bill. This bill saves personnel time that's being wasted. Even more importantly, it speeds up the disposition by the family court. That acceleration of the process benefits the child. Delaying the disposition of these cases only exacerbates the underlying attendance problem. I urge, notwithstanding the prior speaker's expressed concern, that members vote 'aye.'"

Senate Ikeda responded:

"Mr. President, what concerns me is that if a person in charge of these records is not present they can't be questioned as to its validity and having a certified copy signed by the principal and the teacher doesn't necessarily give the child or his or her representative the opportunity to challenge the correctness of the records. That is the reason why I'm voting against the bill."

By unanimous consent, action on Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1788 and S.B. No. 1843, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIREARMS," was deferred until Wednesday, February 19, 1992.

Senator Solomon then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, just a short point of personal privilege.

"Last week's discussion, in reference to the changing paradigm in the world, we looked at what was and is happening in Russia and throughout Europe. We know that the world is looking at governance in a different way and, of course, how this would affect their own societies.

"Mr. President, an ambitious and very well-organized political effort, generated from the Big Island for the purpose of repealing 'haka moa' -- cockfighting -- in the Legislature was launched in 1972.

"I will be distributing to my colleagues interesting articles put together at that time by the 'haka moa' or the gamecock association which today is known as the Big Island Game Breeders Association.

"Mr. President, Dr. Donald D. Kilolani Mitchell of Kamehameha Schools, a very renowned scholar in Hawaiiana, especially of games played in pre-Captain Cook days, quoted from David Malo, the Lahainaluna teacher of the last century, said that cockfighting was a very fashionable sport with the ali'i and that multitudes of people attended the fights with much betting going on. Dr. Mitchell said that betting was a great impetus in Hawaiian games, 'They loved to bet.' "Mr. President, the reason I am bringing this up is to reestablish cockfighting as a Hawaiian cultural sport. In reference to the front page of the document, then police captain Clarence Rosehill, who was interviewed at that time, admitted that which is applicable today, that the real issue then of those bills, and the bills of the same substance which will be heard in the House today, is not gambling but that of cockfighting as a cultural sport and whether or not we are going to be able to allow this sport in the State of Hawaii.

"The document continues - 'Picture this imaginary scene: A group of tourists sits expectantly on the lawn of a large Waikiki hotel watching them fuss with two gamecocks.'

"The point is cockfighting. You know that everybody is struggling for money this session and this would be an excellent source of revenue for the counties. We are considering a bill, which would allow the counties to be able, if they so desire, to have pari-mutuel betting, or to have cockfighting, and also horse racing which I am very much interested in supporting.

"But cockfighting, Mr. President, is definitely a cultural sport of the Hawaiian people that goes way back and continues today. The ancient Hawaiians were so impressed by the bravery, tenacity and unyielding character of the 'moa kalala,' or warrior gamecock that they reflected its splendor in their royal clothing and war costumes. Of course, the beautiful feathers of the gamecocks adorned their 'mahiole' or helmets.

"I'm trying to encourage all of us to broaden our perspectives here in a changing world so that we may be able to look more positively and with cultural significance as to the issue of cockfighting.

"Thank you very much."

Senator Matsuura also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I would first like to do a 'show and tell.'

"Many of you have asked me about 'noni' so instead of my trying to describe the fruit I have brought one here to show you (held up the fruit for all to see). This fruit, for some reason, has a lot of medicinal properties. When I lived in India, I used to send to a friend in Kyoto any fruit that the wild animals did not eat. He found some tremendous medicinal properties in all of them. The chairman of the Ways and Means Committee is 'the' specialist in making 'noni' juice. He makes more 'noni' juice than anyone I know and gives them to people who are affected with cancer. I supply him the fruits and he supplies people with the juice and the results have been phenomenal.

"I have sent this fruit to about five laboratories and have asked them to examine it for medicinal properties. For some reason, it seems to cure or to retard cell division for people who have cancer. It also lowers high blood pressure. This fruit appears like a miracle fruit. I think we may have a new industry in Hawaii with this medicinal plant.

"I would like to share with you the second 'show and tell.'

"We made a major breakthrough two weeks ago with slant drilling. (Framed photograph of the slant drill held up by Senator Matsuura.) This breakthrough opens up a new industry because, with this technology, we can drill through sand, through cinders, through hard rock and even through lava tubes. The applications are numerous. As an example, we can drill through the land and come out at a certain depth of water or water temperature that will be the optimum water temperature to grow different fishes such as mahimahi. We are now in the process of growing sturgeon in Hawaii. We met last week with some Russians and they are going to give us sturgeon hybrids to grow in Hawaii for the production of caviar.

"Here is another photo of the drill bit. This is a 4-inch drill bit and we have put a 26-inch rimmer to rim the hole from a 4-inch hole to a 26-inch hole. We can go up to 42 inches and I can assure you, someday, we are going to circulate the water in the Ala Wai Canal using this technology.

"Now, Mr. President, comes the main event. People tell me I'm crazy to attack and that I should take the advice of the Minority Leader and not attack the news media who buys ink by the barrel. However, I'm going to ask that this article from the Hawaii Tribune-Herald be placed in the Senate journal. At least the chairman of the Judiciary Committee reads the Senate journal.

"You have been reading the newspaper articles about our travels. There was a large, front page article in the Star-Bulletin and in the Advertiser. If I was a professor in journalism, I would give both articles very good marks - 'A' for the Star-Bulletin and 'A' for the Advertiser. However, the Tribune-Herald article is biased because it appears to be targeting me. The article reads in bold letters: 'Matsuura leads isle legislators in travel.' This is on the front page. And it says, 'The state senator visited five states, Saipan and Japan.'

"I agree with the First Amendment and the freedom of the press. The news media is more powerful than all of us put together. Because they have the eyes and ears of the public, they have the divine responsibility to report the news accurately.

"With that, I want to rest my case for today. Thank you."

The text of the Tribune-Herald article by Dave Smith follows:

"Matsuura leads isle legislators in travel

"The state senator visited five states, Saipan and Japan

"Trips to Japan, Saipan and the East Coast of the mainland helped state Sen. Richard Matsuura top the list of Big Island legislators with tax-paid travel expenditures last year.

"According to recently released legislative travel summaries, travel costs for the state Senate last year amounted to \$143,930, with another \$78,054 for perdiem out-of-state expenses.

"Members of the state House of Representatives spent \$171,000 on out-of-state travel, a reasonable amount according to House Speaker Daniel Kihano.

"Sen. Andy Levin (D-Kona, Ka'u, Puna) was second on the travel list of Big Island senators with trips to Florida twice, Canada, Minnesota and Washington D.C. and Rhode Island, as well as a trip that took him to California, Montana and Washington.

"Levin's travels made him the 10th most active Senate traveler. The third Big Island Senator, Malama Solomon, spent \$9,903 for a trip to Japan to visit Tokai universities to 'work out programs of mutual interest' with the University of Hawaii, according to the travel summaries.

"Matsuura (D-Downtown Hilo, Waikea) made trips to California and Nevada, South Carolina, Saipan, Florida and New Jersey, Japan, and another trip to Nevada. The cost to taxpayers amounted to \$l4,267.92. That put him seventh in the top 10 travel spenders in the Senate, which was led by Senate Vice President James Aki (D-Nanakuli, N. Kauai) who spent \$22,500 for trips that twice included Japan as a destination.

"Much of the legislators' travel was to legislative conferences or to areas with 'sister' state or similar relationships.

"Matsuura's biggest trip involved attending a Global Business Opportunities Convention in Osaka. On that trip he reported also visiting Sapporo to view organic agricultural pest control. The trip cost taxpayers \$2,609 for airfare and \$1,820 for per-diem expenses.

"Levin, who heads the senate's Health Committee, said today that he is a member of two national organizations of state legislators, and most of the trips involved attending the groups' national meetings, sometimes to make presentations on Hawaii's health situation. Levin also accompanied former Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis on a trip to British Columbia in Canada to look at health systems there.

"Levin said a primary focus of the trips involved health insurance matters.

"'As health chair and liaison to health matters for the Ways and Means Committee, I've never been involved in a matter so in the forefront of national issues like health insurance,' he said.

"Exact figures for the members of the Big Island House delegation were unavailable. None of the Big Island representatives were reportedly in the top five in the House, however.

"The top House globetrotter was Rep. Marshall Ige (D-Kaneohe) who spent just over \$10,000 for trips to Orlando and Fukuoka, Japan."

Senator Blair also rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege. I have a grievance against one of my colleagues who, on the floor of the Senate, induced me into paying an entrance fee and running in the Aloha Run with the hope of being rewarded with an extravagant trophy. I understand that the trophy was given to a person who didn't even qualify under the criteria stated on the floor of the Senate, inasmuch as he has never been elected to public office. Furthermore, he didn't even beat my time.

"The problem was, Mr. President, that when I got to the finish line, I looked around for Senator Mike McCartney and he wasn't there. I couldn't find another elected official so, since I left my car back at the Capitol, I started jogging back. Apparently, they all came in sometime later and had some sort of a ceremony at which they gave away the trophy. So, I would like to ask you, as the President of the Senate, to instruct Senator McCartney to abide by the contract that he entered into when he induced me to spend \$25.00 and one hour and fifteen minutes and thirty-three seconds of my time and recover the trophy from a non-elected official who is wrongfully possessing it even as we speak. (Laughter.)

"Thank you."

Senator Crozier also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege, basically, to file the same complaint.

"Mr. President, the Senator from Kaneohe is a good friend of Carol Kai and when they set up the starting line, he gave each of us a different color for where we would start from. I was given the beige color. The beige color meant that I had to start at the end of the line so, naturally, I was put at a disadvantage. But I have overcome obstacles in the past so I knew I could overcome that one. But as the race started, the Senator from Kaneohe worked out a deal with the good Senator from Waianae who is not here today. He instructed the Senator from Waianae to employ a blocking technique where the Senator and 100 of his supporters in lavendercolored shirts got in front of me and refused to allow me to accelerate.

"I agree with the Senator from Manoa. I could have won but with all the disadvantages, Senator McCartney should take back the trophy and maybe we can do it again next year or whatever but the Senator has to rectify the situation."

Senator McCartney, on a point of personal privilege, responded:

"Mr. President, first, I would like to say that the race was great, yesterday. There were 31,000 people involved. I did not see Senator Blair. I expected that he would be behind me and I don't have eyes behind my head.

"But it was a good race and the trophy was given to a gentleman who beat Mike McCartney and Keith Kaneshiro and Arnold Morgado. He 'spilled his guts out' and he did a great job and ran the race in an hour and twenty-two minutes. That was the official time we got and I presented the trophy to him in front of everybody in Aloha Stadium.

"The winner of that trophy is sitting in the audience -University of Hawaii President Albert Simone."

President Simone stood to be recognized.

Senator McCartney continued:

"Mr. President, if Senator Blair really does have a time faster than President Simone, and because Senator Crozier has some grievances, I would like to recommend that you keep the trophy until we have a grievance match or grudge match. I recommend that we have a one mile, four-lap race around Cooke Field involving you, Senator Crozier and Senator Blair, to be held on the day you all agree on. We will get the media out there and whoever wins can have the trophy. Is that okay?"

Senator Blair responded:

"I'm not sure that a sprint competition is appropriate. I would prefer a longer distance but I'm willing to negotiate."

The Chair then interjected:

"President Simone, we did a good job yesterday. I'm sorry that I had to drop you off at Pualoa Road." (Laughter.) Senator Koki also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"By the way, how do you like my tie? I've noticed Senator Crozier casting a very envious eye toward it but it's my valentine's gift so I have to display it. My point today is a topic that's really opposite of what valentine's day seeks to enforce.

"Violent killings that are going on and labeled as manslaughter are really skyrocketing. Let me read an article in the Advertiser:

'The 5-month-old daughter of a man charged with killing her was treated for numerous injuries and put in a foster home before she was returned to her parents and fatally assaulted,

"... the civilian husband of a Navy enlisted woman, admits he struck his daughter several times "because he was frustrated due to the heat and because he had earlier gotten into an argument with a co-worker,"

'The trial brief ... tells a tragic story of Brittaney being returned to her parents' custody even though her father was, according to a social worker who visited the Greens' home, "a time bomb ready to explode."

'The brief says Brittaney suffered for much of her short life,

'... a bone scan showed old, healing fractures on two of her ribs and a recent fracture to her right elbow.

'Tripler doctors concluded the rib and arm injuries were not accidental.'

"We are seeing a rise of men terrorizing women and children. A couple of years ago two marines raped a 17year-old girl, strangled her and ran her over with their car.

"Men are killing their wives or girlfriends at a rate of one a month. Child abuse is resulting in the deaths of many children. I am not opposed to spanking -- I want to go on record that I spank my children. But to beat them to the point of breaking bones and even killing them is a huge leap from spanking.

"These killers pick on the weak and defenseless. How much more defenseless than a 5-month-old child. These killers are escaping proper punishment because they are usually charged with manslaughter. Manslaughter is a Class B felony -- ten years in prison -- and offenders are usually let out a lot sooner. The two marines were convicted of manslaughter and got the maximum term -ten years. Had the girl lived and they were charged with rape they would have gotten 20 years. Where is the justice and equity in that?

"Use a gun to rob a bank and you can get 20 years, but kill a helpless person and you get only 10 years. We have got to put more value on the lives of these victims who are mostly women and children. In a way these victims of manslaughter are worse off than victims of cold-blooded murder. These victims are usually tortured by threats and extreme physical violence for a long period of time.

"I introduced a bill last year to raise manslaughter to a Class 'A' felony -- that will increase the prison time from ten years to twenty years.

"The law enforcement community supports this change. The public supports this change. Mr. President, I want to enlist your support to see to it that this bill at least gets heard this year. I would like to enlist the support of my colleagues to see to it that this bill is enacted into law."

Senator Tungpalan also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege also.

"There are times when many of us may overlook the overwhelming support wives give to husbands. I know of one woman who has chaired a number of charitable organizations whose duties have included being a chauffeur to future vice presidents of a major institution, whose warmness as a hostess is well-known in the state and nationally, and who is really a breath of fresh air when she can have a chance to get one. I know her personally as a friend and as a constituent of many good projects. She testified before my committee once to disallow 17 acres of tennis courts from being constructed on the exterior of Diamond Head.

"And, as I said, there are times that we've missed these really poignant moments when women are there quite silently to buttress not only their husbands but their community and I'd like to take this time to recognize this woman today. She is Carolie Simone.

"Thank you."

The Chair then made the following comments:

"Members of the Senate, at this time the Chair would like to make a few comments.

"Recent news stories indicate that an audit of the Legislature's accounts was due on January 15 and that for some reason this audit is late. The inference, of course, is that the Legislature is therefore in the dark as to the status of its own accounts.

"These news stories are incorrect. They are based on an erroneous reading of last year's legislative expense bill and bills for the last 15 years.

"The bill says, 'Before January 15, 1992, the Senate and the House of Representatives shall have their accounts audited and a full report of such audit shall be presented to the Senate and to the House of Representatives of the Legislature convening on January 15, 1992.'

"Somehow the press has interpreted this to mean that the audit was supposed to have been submitted on January 15.

"Wrong!

"The correct interpretation of the law is that at the end of the interim <u>prior</u> to the convening of the 1992 legislative session on January 15, the Legislature is supposed to have its books audited.

"This audit covers the period up to the end of the interim, which is January 14. In our present expense bill it is spelled out that because by constitution the Legislature will convene on the third Wednesday in 1993, which is January 20th, the interim period for our audit will end on January 19, 1993.

"When completed, the audit is then submitted to the Legislature which convened on January 15. The audit is now being performed.

"There is nothing unusual going on. The language in the legislative expense bill is the same language used for the past 15 to 20 years. The performance of the audit is the same as has been done in prior years. There is no big exposé!

"As President of the Senate, I just want to set the record straight -- the audit is being performed as scheduled, nothing is being stalled, there is no delay, there is no impropriety, there is no laxity.

"I've been President for 14 years and I take my responsibilities as President of the Senate very seriously. It has always been my policy to see to it that the Senate books, accounts, expenditures are all in order.

"I want to reassure all of you that this is the case."

Senator B. Kobayashi introduced Miss Dori Takata, Miss Carole Ann Kennedy and Miss Sarah Lee, seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

Senator B. Kobayashi continued:

"Mr. President, we also have with us first runner-up Miss Carole Ann Kennedy. Carole Ann is a senior at Punahou School and was also named Top Scholar of the Year. She is the daughter of Joel and Ann Kennedy (many of us know Joel Kennedy from his many years of experience at the Legislature). We extend to Carole Ann our congratulations."

Senator B. Kobayashi continued:

At this time, Senator Solomon rose to state:

"Mr. President, I would like to pose a question to the chairman."

The Chair asked if the chairman of the Judiciary Committee would yield to a question and Senator Blair having answered in the affirmative, Senator Solomon asked:

"Mr. President, in terms of this bill, being that I do represent a large contingency of hunting clubs throughout my Third Senatorial District, how would this bill affect. their hunting rifles?"

Senator Blair, chair of the Judiciary Committee, replied:

"Mr. President, it would depend on the particular rifle that was being used. If they were, for example, using a rifle with a 30-round clip it would affect them in that they would have to get rid of the clip. Going beyond the clip to the actual rifle, there are certain rifles and carbines that would become unavailable for purchase and which people may now be hunting with. They would continue to be allowed to hunt with those rifles. They would not, however, be able to purchase, sell or transfer those rifles. The proposition of being able to hunt with existing weapons is not affected. The committee was aware that a number of people hunt, not merely for sport, although that's important for some people, but even for the family's meals. Existing weapons are not banned and among weapons not covered there's a range of weapons that are suited for hunting. The list of weapons in the bill is a tiny percentage of the weapons available for hunting, sport shooting and self-defense.

"For the most part, people will not be affected, even those few who are currently using these weapons for hunting purposes."

Senator Solomon' then said:

"Thank you, Mr. President. In that case, I will be in support of this bill."

Senator Holt, in support of the measure, said:

"Mr. President, speaking in favor of the bill with reservations.

"Very briefly, I don't believe that the bill will stop the illegal importation of guns that are coming into the state and that there are a lot of law-abiding citizens out there who own guns and we hope that it doesn't affect them too much. Thank you."

Senator Crozier rose to speak in favor of the bill and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to say that after last year's experience, as we moved the bill through the process, many of us took a lot of heat and then in the final moments the bill was pulled back. At this time, I will be voting 'yes' for this bill but as it moves through the process, I still reserve the right to change my mind. Thank you."

At 12:10 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:11 o'clock p.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

At this time, Senator Wong rose to inquire:

"Mr. President, will the chairman of the Judiciary Committee yield to a question?"

The Chair posed the question to the chairman of the Judiciary Committee and Senator Blair having answered in the affirmative, Senator Wong asked:

"Mr. Chairman, am I to understand that under this bill the existing statutes pertaining to sawed-off shotguns, Saturday-night specials, blackjacks, switchblade knives and electric guns will still remain in effect? This bill will not affect those statutes presently on the books?"

Senator Blair answered:

"That is my understanding. There is a strong constitutional presumption of validity attached to anything the Legislature enacts. This bill does not amend any of the statutes that you referenced in your question. It would not affect the presumption of constitutionality which will continue to attach with full vigor to all statutes previously enacted."

Senator Wong then said:

"Mr. Chairman, thank you for the response.

"Mr. President, I am going to vote in favor of the bill."

Senator Crozier rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"While we were in recess, there were occurrences of Chinese aliens trying to get to the shores of Hawaii and California. The press considers them as aliens trying to ... I don't know, they kind of paint a picture that the Chinese are trying to sneak into America. "In my opinion, Mr. President, I don't think they're trying to sneak in. Any captain of any ship knows that when they have to come into a harbor they have to notify the harbor officials for entry and for them to just pull right in shows that they are trying to do more than just sneak in. If they are trying to sneak in, the captain could have stopped off at Hanauma Bay and told those people to dive off and swim in, in the dead of night, something like that. But, they are not doing that, they are coming straight into the port.

"Mr. President, what's going on? The Haitians had their boat people. They didn't try to sneak in, they just came right into port. The Vietnamese went to Taiwan; they went to the Philippines; they went to Hong Kong; 1 think, they even went to Malaysia to try to escape the tyranny of their country. Is this what's happening now? That the Chinese are trying to escape the tyranny of mainland China and in desperation, instead of choosing other countries to go to where they are not protected by any kind of civil rights ... maybe they're saying, 'Eh, let's go ahead and try to get to America.' Because, once they are on these shores they would have some kind of redress.

"Mr. President, I would like to ask the press reporters, be it the newspapers or television stations, to take a look at this and find out what we are dealing with. Are we dealing with people who are opportunists or are we dealing with political or economic refugees? I think it's an important issue that we have to resolve, not only here in Hawaii, but, maybe the whole West Coast.

"America is a land of the free. I hope we get to resolve this problem of the Chinese as soon as possible. Thank you."

Senator Blair, in support of the bill, responded:

"Mr. President, briefly in response, we did think this through thoroughly. I would like to assure the previous speaker of that.

"Far from disenfranchising people, it does just the opposite. This re-enfranchises them. Under the current

system, when a reapportionment occurs, people end up being represented by people they never had an opportunity to vote for or against. In some cases, going as long as six years without that opportunity. There are extreme examples and, under the 1991 plan, I am a classic extreme example. But I assure you it is not justified solely on extreme circumstances. Other senators, Senator Reed and Senator Nakasato will also be representing constituencies, the majority of which never had the opportunity to vote for or against them. All holdover senators, to some degree, are inheriting their constituencies. What this bill does is to enfranchise the electorate by allowing them the opportunity to vote for the people who will represent them. It does not do anything in the way of shortening terms after an election. It simply means that, in the year 2000, those senators running will know, and the voters who will be electing them will know, that they are seeking an office which has a term of only two years. Thank you."

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill, with reservations. I would like to start by thanking both chairmen for reporting the bill out; it is a difficult issue. I urge my colleagues to vote 'yes' on this matter. It is the only vehicle left by which we can in any way help the people of the Puna district who are living in the vicinity of geothermal development. But, I want to speak with reservations because it is so important that this bill be meaningful before it comes up for a final vote. In its present form it would be of very limited value, if any at all.

"I do not have the verbal skills to express the pain and anguish the people of Puna have lived with over the past months, especially those who were forced out of their homes when there was a geothermal blowout in June. These people fear for their lives and their fear is very genuine. They fear for the lives of their children. Although I cannot express it as well as they and I cannot convey the anguish, I do want to at least make sure that my colleagues know that it exists.

"There is a tragedy going on in that district. I'm not referring to the geothermal drilling itself because, I think, only time will tell us whether that was a wise or foolish decision, but I am referring to the human tragedy, the destruction in the faith of government. The erosion of the trust in government to meet the most basic obligations -to keep people safe and secure and healthy in their own homes. At this point, the state's experts have said that we have not done that. We have not kept people safe and secure prior to this time, and the state's experts have questioned whether we are even doing it now.

"I recognize that the train has left the station. I hope that at least we can help the people who are tied to the tracks in front of that train, through no fault of their own. I do urge a 'yes' vote on this. Thank you."

However, I would like to bring to his attention a lament that I have on this mullet bill.

"The mullets, the 'anae,' our ocean-going mullets, come to our shores to spawn from November 1st to March 30th. As long as I can remember, the 'kapu' season or off-limits season was from December 1st to February 28th because this is when the bulk of the schools of mullet came to spawn although some came later and some sooner but that is the season when the mullets arrive.

"The legislatures of the past have passed laws to protect the mullet stock for the people of Hawaii so that they could catch and enjoy the sport of fishing for mullet.

"I would like to remind many of my colleagues, those over the age of 35, when they used to see many of the mullet fishermen out at Kuliouou or right outside of Ala Moana Beach Park and down Kaneohe Bay with their throw nets spending their day, sometimes with their children, teaching them the traditional way to fish for mullet. You could see the shimmering of the mullets, which is called 'mizu shiru' in Japanese, when you go out there to throw your net. This popular 'throw net' of today was brought to us by the Japanese.

"The regulations on the sport of mullet fishing have been gradually changed by our Legislature because of the evolving mores of our times. The steady changes in our Hawaiian culture are making Hawaii become more like Los Angeles. For that reason I will vote against this bill.""

Senator Koki also rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I don't want this state to become like Los Angeles so I'm going to vote against this bill."

On motion by Senator Yamasaki, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2229 was adopted and S.B. No. 2423, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DISPOSITION OF THE TRANSIENT ACCOMMODATIONS TAX REVENUES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

THIRD READING

MATTERS DEFERRED FROM THE AFTERNOON CALENDAR

S.B. No. 2264:

Senator Blair moved that S.B. No. 2264 be recommitted to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Senator Holt.

Senator Blair then explained:

"Mr. President, it appears that this is a matter which will have to be left to the next constitutional convention."

The motion was then put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2264, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE III, SECTION 4, OF THE HAWAII CONSTITUTION, TO ESTABLISH LEGISLATIVE TERM LIMITS," was recommitted to the Committee on Judiciary.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2201 (S.B. No. 2361, S.D. 2):

Senator Ikeda moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2201 be adopted and S.B. No. 2361, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Iwase.

Senator Solomon then rose to inquire if the chair of the Committee on Consumer Protection and Business Regulation would yield to a question. The President posed the question to the chair and Senator Ikeda having answered in the affirmative, Senator Solomon then stated and asked:

"Mr. President, in the committee report it states in paragraph 17 that the bill advocates for a 15% fees and rate reduction; however, that the insurance company can, in fact, get around this if they can show insolvency. Mr. President, to my knowledge, and this is what is addressed to the chairman, that the insurance companies have come to the hearings during the committee public hearings and have stated that they are showing hardship when it comes to the no-fault insurance. As a matter of fact, I think there were some dollar quotes like spending \$1.19 for every dollar collected.

"So, how does the chairman envision that the consumer will be assured of the 15% reduction?"

Senator Ikeda answered:

"Mr. President, losing money doesn't mean that you're insolvent. And I believe that the language in this bill goes as far as we can take it in order to withstand a challenge in court. The constitution is very clear. It upholds the standard of a fair and reasonable return. Now, if this bill passes and becomes law, the companies must be able to show that they will become insolvent. The burden of proof falls on the companies. They must produce facts to show potential insolvency. Only then will the insurance commissioner have to grant them any increase."

Senator Fernandes Salling also rose to inquire if the chair of the Consumer Protection Committee would yield to another question. The President posed the question to the chair and Senator Ikeda having answered in the affirmative, Senator Fernandes Salling asked:

"As a follow-up to Senator Solomon's inquiry, so then there is, my understanding from what you have said, no guaranteed 15% reduction. Is that correct?"

Senator Ikeda answered:

"No, that is not correct. I think someone wise once said that there are only two things guaranteed in life -death and taxes. And I don't believe this bill fits into either category. It comes as close to a guarantee as possible, as legally possible, that there will be a reduction in rate." Senator Fernandes Salling, speaking against the measure, then stated:

"Mr. President, just a statement that, based on my reading of the exception to the 15% roll-back or reduction, there is no guaranteed 15% reduction, as I read it because the companies are allowed to show that if it affects their solvency or if they can show, quite simply, financial hardship, then they would not have to comply to the 15% reduction. Therefore, how can there be any guaranteed 15% reduction?

"And, just to once again summarize the point raised by Senator Solomon, when you have all of the automobile insurance companies coming to a hearing and at that point already stating that they are losing money, you know very well that they will state the same to the insurance commissioner and, therefore, the result will be no 15% reduction, in my opinion. Thank you."

Senator Ikeda then asked:

"Mr. President, was that a question?"

The President answered:

"That was a statement.

"Thank you, Madam Chairman."

Senator Matsuura then rose to state:

"Mr. President, you can understand my dilemma. I have to be at my fund raiser in two minutes but I know you will not excuse me.

"As a member of the Committee on Consumer Protection, I had a lot of concerns regarding this measure, so what I did was I addressed these questions and concerns to the insurance industry. I asked them: 1) Is the 15% premium reduction guaranteed? 2) What benefits are being reduced because whenever you are going to stabilize the reduced premium, something has got to give? 3) Are attorney's fees being regulated? 4) How does the bill control medical costs? 5) Does this bill regulate the insurance companies who refuse to renew policies? 6) Does this bill regulate insurance company actions or surcharges? 7) Does this bill allow a family to buy insurance at affordable rates even if one member of the drivers is a bad risk? 8) What happens to a bad driver who wants insurance?"

Senator Solomon rose on a point of order and inquired:

"Mr. President, point of order. Is the Senator speaking for or against the bill?"

Senator Matsuura responded and continued:

"Mr. President, I'm speaking for the bill.

"Nine, what benefits will this bill bring to the people of Hawaii?

"The reason why I'm reading all these questions is because the answers the insurance industry gave me satisfied my concerns. I want all of the answers given to me inserted in the Journal."

Senator Matsuura's questions and insurance industry answers on S.B. No. 2361, S.D. 2:

"1. Q. Is the 15% Premium Reduction Guaranteed?

A. Yes. The bill says:

- 1. Freeze all auto insurance premiums as of March 1.
- 2. Freeze to last 3 1/2 years until 12/31/95.
- 3. On 1/11/93, all auto insurance premiums will be reduced 15% from those on file.
- 4. This reduction applies across the board, to all lines, including BI, PIP, PD, UM, UIM, Comprehensive, and Collision, even though there were no changes to the law affecting PD, comprehensive, and collision.
- If the rate reduction is so onerous that a company may go insolvent, then the company can ask for relief. <u>This language is stronger than the</u> language in the tort reform act of 1986.
- 6. No insurance company asked for relief from the 1986 tort reform act.
- 7. After a closed claims study, the Commissioner will review the situation.
- 2. Q. What benefits are being reduced?
 - A. Some benefits are increased, others are adjusted.
 - PIP. Minimum required is increased from \$15,000 per person to \$25,000 per person.
 a. More coverage (optional) is available.
 - BI. Minimum required is reduced from \$35,000/unlimited to \$10,000/\$30,000.
 a. More coverage (optional) is available.
 - 3. UM. Minimum required to be offered is increased from \$35,000 to \$50,000.
 - 4. UIM. Minimum required to be offered is increased from \$35,000 to \$50,000.
 - Stacking of UM or UIM is banned.
 The right to sue in tort continues for persons who have serious and permanent injury. The \$8,300 dollar threshold is repealed.
- 3. Q. Are attorney's fees being regulated?
 - A. 1. In BI, attorneys generally collect 33% 50% of the injured person's award. The injured person is responsible for the legal costs.

This bill does not regulate the BI attorney's fees.

2. In PIP, the law allowed the claimant attorney's fees whether or not the claimant won the case.

This bill changes that to say that the claimant can get attorney's fees only if he gets a decision which is more favorable than the original offer made by the insurer.

- 4. Q. How does the bill control medical costs?
 - A. For the first time, health care providers will be limited on the amounts they can charge for services involving auto accidents. They must follow the workers comp fee schedule and also be subject to frequency guidelines. If they want to exceed the fee schedule, they just go through a peer review procedure.
- 5. Q. Does this bill regulate the insurance companies who refuse to renew policies?
 - A. Yes. This bill says that an insurer's nonrenewals cannot exceed 2% of its total policies in force. This is the New York rule, where it is working well.

In exchange, the take-all-comers provision is repealed. That provision, found in only 2 states, tends to inhibit competition, thereby discouraging price reductions.

6. Q. Does this bill regulate insurance company actions or surcharges?

- A. Yes. Under this bill, no surcharge is allowed for failure to maintain no-fault insurance unless the insured had been convicted of driving without insurance in the previous 3 years.
- 7. Q. Does this bill allow a family to buy insurance at affordable rates even if one member of the driver is a bad risk?
 - A. Yes. Under this bill, the insurance company and the insured can agree that a named driver shall be excluded from coverage.
- 8. Q. What happens to a bad driver who wants insurance?
 - A. He will probably need to go to the JUP, which will have assigned risks for such persons. In order to come out of the JUP, that person must become a 'clean risk.' A clean risk is defined as a person who, for 12 months, has not been involved in an accident as a driver, has not received more than 3 points, and whose license has not been revoked or suspended.
- 9. Q. What benefits will this bill bring to the people of Hawaii?
 - A. 1. This bill will stop skyrocketing auto insurance costs.

2. It will speed claims payments to injured victims.

3. Dramatic increases in the number of minor injury accident lawsuits will be curbed.

4. This bill will try to stop the 'hit me, I need the money,' and 'sue now, pay later' attitude promoted by trial attorneys.

promoted by trial attorneys. 5. This bill means faster payments to victims, fewer lawsuits, and lower insurance rates.

6. This bill will still provide prompt and fair compensation to injured persons.

7. This bill will save the State Government large sums because it will reduce the need for courts, juries, and arbitrators to handle unnecessary lawsuits."

Senator Koki also rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I wish to speak in favor of this bill.

"You know, for companies like State Farm and other insurance companies, we're not talking about small insurance companies, for them to be insolvent ... first of all, I don't think they can show that they are insolvent. Secondly, even if one of these companies were to be insolvent there are a whole bunch of other insurance carriers out there who will write auto insurance. When I used to own a carpet business I would love to have other companies declare insolvency so that carpet buyers could come to me to buy their carpets. So a company for example like State Farm would do a tremendous amount of business if another firm decided that they were insolvent and not sell auto insurance. So the market is going to go where the insurance rates are the least. And so, in order for the fear of no rate reduction to come about, the entire auto industry would have to say that they're insolvent. And that I can safely say is impossible.

"I have also been getting a lot of communications from constituents complaining about the cost of auto insurance. This bill addresses the issue of cost and fairness. This bill seeks to enact the spirit of no-fault insurance. When people get into accidents, the insurance carriers will pay for health care and lost wages without the interference of attorneys that drive up the cost. Auto insurance has been turned into a feeding trough for a segment of our society, particularly attorneys and non-traditional medical care givers. And so this is why I want to encourage my colleagues to vote for this bill which will give protection to auto drivers and a rate reduction which we sorely need. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan then rose to speak against the measure and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. President. I rise to speak against this measure.

"This bill will really hurt the consumer. It limits the wrongly injured person's rights to receive full medical coverage and lost wages if that person's injury is not permanent and serious. This means you have to be dead, lose a limb, be badly scarred, lose a baby, or have the permanent loss of a body, organ, member, function or system to pass the threshold.

"If you were brain dead as a result of an accident you would qualify.

"I simply can't sit here and accept kicking out of our system 90% of the people of our state, especially those who are hit and injured through no fault of their own.

"Let's look at the child who's hit by a drunk driver. If he or she isn't seriously or permanently injured that liability of this drunk driver is limited under this measure and reduced, by the way, from the current \$35,000 level to \$10,000. As such, this child will only be able to receive \$10,000 for bodily injury. This bill will without doubt raise the rate of our HMSA, Kaiser medical insurance premiums and not to mention medicaid.

"Just a few weeks ago we pumped into our medicaid system \$74 million because it was bankrupt. Get ready to infuse more money if this verbal threshold remains at this There aren't any other states with a verbal level. threshold like this. I know of only one jurisdiction that has this serious and permanent threshold. That's Ontario. But the big difference between Ontario and our system here in Hawaii is that Ontario has a socialized medical system and Hawaii doesn't. This means that even if injured people can pass the rigid threshold in Ontario, they still qualify for medical care because of their socialized system. This will not be the same for Hawaii's seriously injured citizens. Once they don't qualify, and perhaps as many as 95% won't make it past the threshold, they will be able to collect only up to \$25,000 in medical care and lost wages. Why? Because this measure will limit the medical coverage under nofault to \$25,000 for nine out of ten claimants who are seriously or permanently injured because you must be both to qualify. This means that they may either not seek medical care because they have no insurance; turn to HMSA or Kaiser benefits which will raise the rates for these premiums and it will sock it to the employers. Let's make no bone about that. Or, they could turn to welfare and medicaid.

"And everyone in this state is being asked to take on these risks because they're being promised the 15% reduction. Let's not try to deceive the people of the State of Hawaii. The fact is the 15% reduction is not mandatory. When I chaired the Committee on Labor in the House in 1983, I had a ban, a moratorium on workers' comp rate increases and I didn't give an out to the insurance companies. Just as sure as I'm here today they would have taken that out.

"I want to point out to you that I believe that we should have a mandated fee schedule and frequency guidelines because we did that in workers' comp, and just as in workers' comp the no-fault problem is indeed also with abusers in our medical providers system. The only problem is that it requires \$400,000, and Mr. President, I hope you give this bill that is coming from the House a referral to Ways and Means because I want to see the \$400,000 put into that bill. If we're going to ask the insurance commissioner to come up with a medical fee schedule and a frequency guideline, then by golly let's give her the money to do the job.

"Let's be honest with the drivers in our state. Let's require better disclosures from the insurance companies and ways the consumers can reduce their premiums by adjusting their deductibles. I heard from one individual last night who said that he's going to save \$250 a year on his policy simply because he's adjusting his deductible policy.

"Let's tell the individual who's driving a 20-year-old car that he can save a bundle by dropping collision/comprehensive coverages on that old car. If he gets into a collision, it's going to be totaled by the insurance adjuster, anyway. Let's allow individual policies to be written up separately and tailor-made.

"Right now, I was told by my insurance carrier that even if I had to carry one coverage on this car that I lease, because of the leasing obligations, I have to carry them on all three other cars that we own. Why is that? Why couldn't I tailor it to meet the obligations of my lease agreement without having to carry that high coverage on all the other cars.

"Let's clamp down on the abusers in the system by vigorously opposing fraudulent claims. I'm told that three out of four claims in the system get settled by the insurance companies. Let's give people a choice as to whether they want this option on their premiums and let's get it in writing that insurance companies will contribute their share of this bill by a 15% reduction.

"Thank you."

Senator Iwase spoke in support of the bill and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the bill. I would like to commend the chair of the Consumer Protection Committee for the work that she put in and I would also like to commend the previous speaker, Senator Tungpalan, for her compassionate statements in support of her position. I think she has stated it often and stated it well.

"But I think it is important for us today in looking at this law to step back somewhat in time and to look at what the Legislature was looking at some 20 years ago and the evils they sought to correct some 20 years ago when they enacted this radical -- at that time, radical -no-fault law. And I want to quote just briefly from the Senate standing committee report:

'We have tried to stop the use of fault concept to profit some and to mulct the public. Our attempt here has been to attack the single area of court litigation which is the most costly to the public -- the need for and the cost of auto liability insurance.'

"They looked at the tort law, its involvement with auto insurance, and they made a decision. They had a choice back then. They had before them the Haldi study which called for total abolition of tort involvement in motor vehicle insurance claims. But in reviewing the situation, they chose instead to adopt a partial abolition of tort liability in the area of motor vehicle use and, to read from the conference committee report, 'some of the circumstances under which a person retains the right to sue are: (1) if he dies in a motor vehicle accident; (2) if he sustains significant permanent loss of, or the loss of use of, or function of any part of his body; (3) if he sustains permanent and serious disfigurement; (4) if the operator who injures him is engaging in criminal conduct; (5) if he is entitled to no-fault benefits exceeding his PIP coverage; and (6) if he is entitled to no-fault benefits exceed the limit set by the commission.'

"Some of this is in controversy today because one of the proposals in the bill before us is a verbal threshold which eliminates the medical threshold.

"When the Legislature set the medical threshold, and back then it was \$1500, their intent as set forth in the committee report was to insure that 90% of the claims are paid, that only 10% of those injuries for claims were eligible to go to court. And so they set this limit. The Legislature also created the Office of the Insurance Commissioner, and they instructed that office to review the claims and what was filed by the insurance companies to insure that the medical rehabilitation limit was sufficient to cover 90% of the claims so that 90% of the claims would not go to court.

"It was not the intent of the Legislature 20 years ago, Mr. President, to disregard, disregard the harm caused by auto injuries. Their goal was to provide a fair system, a fair system of reparation, quick reparation. And that is what they did. Somehow, the system went askew. In 1985, they fooled around with the medical rehabilitation limit, and things started to happen. No longer were we looking at a 10% window. The PIP, personal injury claims severity rose after they fooled around with the medical rehabilitation limit and the means of calculating It rose after 1985. After 1985, the bodily injury it. claims severity rose. Between 1980 and 1989, Hawaii bodily injury claims for 100 paid claims increased 108.7%, and Hawaii is a state with a high medical threshold. In that same period, states with verbal thresholds experienced a rise of only 6.7%.

"Also, it must be pointed out that since 1985, particularly since 1985, Hawaii's auto insurance cost has risen faster than the consumer price index. We have one of the highest auto insurance premium costs in the country. What we have before us today, Mr. President, is a situation which faced the Legislature back in 1973 -- high insurance cost, lawsuits being filed, a 10% window being exceeded, 90% of the claims not being covered -- and we are looking at a way to try to restore the balance, to pursue the goal the Legislature sought some 20 years ago.

"This measure is not intended to hurt people. This measure is intended, as the 1973 Legislature intended, to help people who are in auto accidents to get quick coverage without having to resort to law suits and to see their premium costs reduced, and if they rise, it rises at a stable rate that we can live with; not some 40% increase because insurance companies may be losing money.

"We are looking at all of that and we have a lot of factors plowed into the bill, all of which, all of which are necessary if we are to see a meaningful reduction in the premium cost of auto insurance which affects not one, not two, not a thousand, not five thousand, but every driver who's insured in the State of Hawaii, and we have 800,000 cars.

"Thank you, Mr. President, and I would like to ask my colleagues to support this bill."

Senator Blair also spoke in support of the bill as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor but with reservation.

"It was stated earlier that there is nothing certain but death and taxes. Certainly, this bill has been taxing and it may also be dead since a House bill on the same subject has already crossed over. Nonetheless, we will be voting on it and establishing a Senate position. In establishing that Senate position, I want it to be clear that I have reservations about one aspect of this bill.

"In addition to the old saying about death and taxes, there's another adage that says there is no free lunch. My concern with this bill is that it has been sold to the public as a free lunch, that we can deliver a reduction in premiums because we're going to get rid of some bad people who are bleeding that money out of the system. At best, that is only partially true.

"When I was practicing law I was a defense attorney, I have seen enough abuse of the system to primarily. know that there is reason to fight hard for reform. I commend the chair of the committee for her vigor in that regard. However, I also know that there are difficulties, sometimes, when seriously injured people do not have adequate access to attorneys. I also know that, for some injured people, this bill will mean a reduction in their benefits. Some of the savings, if such savings are in fact realized, will come from that reduction in benefits. Some of the savings will result from medical costs being shifted over to the medicaid system, the medicare system or to health insurance paid for by employers. While it appears that we will benefit the public by reducing their auto insurance rates, some of that will be paid out of the same pockets in expenses for other insurances or taxes.

"I think we have to be careful about selling this as a pain-free method of putting more money into the pockets of consumers. This does not do that and, if we sell it on that basis, we're not being entirely honest. We have to recognize that there will be some pain associated with this bill, as well as some benefit.

"No one thinks that they're going to be in an accident. They always look at it in terms of having to pay for auto insurance. But we should realize that we may be in an accident, and that we will need to call upon the insurance policy. We're also consumers at that end of the transaction.

"Senator Iwase made a very good point with respect to when the system went awry. It was, I felt, a good system up until 1985. If we really want to correct it, without over-reacting, we should seriously consider simply going back to the 10% - 90% division that existed in the law up until 1985. I urge that the Senate not lock itself into a verbal threshold that is so strict it could exclude seriously injured persons. Truly injured persons having to face an insurance company need the benefit of counsel.

"While I support this bill I do not support the precise terms of the verbal threshold that's embodied in the bill. I think we should just undo the mistake we made in 1985. That would truly be appropriate reform in this area. Thank you."

Senator A. Kobayashi also spoke in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I will be voting for this bill but, in voting for it, I must first express my concern about the bill.

"My bottom line has always been rate reduction for the consumer and I feel that this bill may not achieve that. I have a couple of suggestions that I hope will be incorporated into any kind of future legislation, such as having the loss of benefits section 'drop dead' if there is at least a 15% reduction, or language such as to having to 'pay at the pump' type insurance go into effect, if there is not at least a 15% rate reduction.

"I feel that we need these strong assurances of rate reductions because we have not seen it in previous times. When the seat belt law passed, there was a reduction in accidents, however, our insurance rates did not go down. When the DUI law was strengthened, there was a reduction in accidents but our rates did not go down. When the Chief of Police of Honolulu instituted strong enforcement of our speeding laws, there was a great reduction in accidents, and yet our rates did not go down. So, I really do need those assurances, although I will be voting for this bill in the hope that these kinds of assurances and promises will be written into the bill. I will be looking for them in future legislation. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan again rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President. I rise again to answer some of the questions that were raised during the floor speeches by the previous speakers.

"First of all, you know, when you look at the bill, what I'm really confused about is people saying that we're supposed to be reducing cost. I'm sort of confused. The bill seems to be explicit in what it's saying the verbal threshold is and they enumerated points that's included in the measure and yet in the committee report it does the exact opposite.

"I think, with the verbiage that it is not the intent of your committee to bar or to exclude people with serious back or neck injuries from pursuing compensation, you know, in fact, this is exactly what will be happening. I gave the insurance commissioner a call this morning and I asked for the number of 'soft tissue' accidents in this state which occurred in a year, and she said it's about 60%. If indeed we meant to include the back and neck injuries, which comes to about 60%, then how is it that the proponents of this measure say that we are going to exclude 90% of the people. It just doesn't jibe.

"The other consideration, too, is that there are individuals who will not be profiting or not be pocketing a 15% reduction. The elderly who don't own cars and children will not be profiting by this measure and yet they will be affected if this measure passes in this form.

"Now, just how is this that? Well, if an elderly gets hurt in the crosswalk and is not seriously and permanently injured, that elderly person will be able to collect only \$25,000 in medical benefits. The bill as originally envisioned, when it was drafted by our former legislators, did not want to preclude people from getting medical care. It was never the presumption that someone be left without the means to receiving medical care. And that I think is the big difference between this measure and the measures that came before legislators twenty some years ago.

"I would be voting 'yes' if it were not for the verbal threshold. I have to pay \$3,500 a year in policy premiums and, by golly, it's tiring, especially with the salary we make it's very difficult to meet our expenses yearly.

"I'm asking the chair of the committee, who did work diligently on this together with the members of the committee, to consider altering the verbal threshold when we deal with the House measure."

Senator Koki, in support of the measure, stated:

"Mr. President, I rise in response to some of the points that were brought up.

"I think by trying to recapture the 10% that are able to sue by moving, as in the original plan to move the dollar threshold, we've got a group of consumers that are welleducated by now, with the attorneys advertising. So, the amount of the 10% that will sue, I believe, will sue for a much higher amount as the verbal threshold moves up. It's very important, I think, that we stick with a verbal threshold and not a dollar threshold.

"Attorneys are oftentimes good at bringing up isolated cases that would cause a door to be wide open for all types of litigation. I can understand the concern of some of the people that may fall through the crack but we don't ban cars because there are a lot of people dying from accidents with cars.

"Ninety-seven percent of our population have health care insurance. Now, the amount of people that may, and we don't even know that they will fall through, exhaust their \$25,000 PIP will not bring a catastrophe to our health care system. Thank you."

Senator McCartney rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this measure.

"There has been a lot of tough discussions today and a lot of good debate. It's a very complex issue and I think that we all agree that there is a problem out there and how we solve the problem is what we are debating.

"There is no question that the no-fault system is broken. It's broken and it needs repair. I, as the education chair, I'm getting more calls about insurance reform than I'm getting about education reform and I can tell you it's a big issue out there.

"In my opinion, the system was designed to create a symbiotic relationship between all the different players in the system, all the different entities, but what we have today is a parasitic relationship, and the no-fault system today is known as the 'your fault' system. Everybody is blaming everybody else and I want to give you an example of an accident that I got into that illustrates what I think is one of the big problems and what's wrong with the system.

"A couple of years ago, I was driving on the highway when I decided to make a lane change to my left; I didn't see the car behind me; I ran right into the car and a woman hit me. It was my fault. I went up to the woman and I apologized. I told her I was sorry. That day, I saw my attorney, a friend of mine, and he told me, 'What did you do? Why did you tell her you were sorry?' I said, 'Because, I was wrong.' And he said, 'Don't tell the person sorry.' I said, 'I'm going to call her up to see how she's doing.' And he told me, 'No, don't do that. You're going to get sued. You want to get sued?' I answered, 'No.'

"You know, Mr. President, that illustrates what's wrong with the system. If the system makes people not want to deal with each other, not want to talk with each other, and puts people into that box, then you've got to

tell me something is wrong with the system and it needs to be fixed.

"In my mind, every interest group is jockeying for position on this bill. Whether you are an insurance company or a plaintiff's attorney or defense attorney, whether you are in medical practice, whether you are an auto repair mechanic, you all have to give. Everybody has to give up something, if the consumer is going to gain. That is what I believe this bill does, Mr. President. It's a good bill, it does that, it's the first step in that direction. Granted, we need to find balance and there's a lot more discussion that needs to take place.

"I want to commend the chair for taking a position and moving the bill forward. We all need to work together to find that product and that balance so that we can come up with a bill that we will be proud of and can take back to our districts. Some hard decisions still have to be made but I think this bill is on the right track and it's a good position to start out on the Senate side.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Fernandes Salling also rose to speak against the bill and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak against the bill for various reasons. Primarily because I think it's being portrayed out there as a tort reform bill that will result in lower cost to the people of the State of Hawaii, which I disagree that it will because of the problems as I will state as clearly and simply as I can.

"But, before I get to that point, I just want to comment on what Senator Koki has said. I don't think you have to worry about the attorneys in this situation because by changing it to the verbal threshold stand, you are really allowing for more jobs for attorneys because they are going to have to go to court now to determine, in a summary judgment proceeding, whether or not the person who is injured qualifies under this bill for no-fault benefits because that's how the verbal threshold works.

"While I'm on the subject, just to elaborate on it a little more. The court, with the help of the attorneys, in a summary judgment, is going to have to determine if the injury is serious and permanent. There's a major change there. In the old law we had it as serious with a medical rehabilitative limit, dollar limit, in there so at least you had two ways of approaching the problem when deciding whether or not this person could qualify under no-fault benefits.

"Now, you have to take it to the courts to determine if it's serious and permanent or unless death, of course, that needn't be decided in the courts, but as far as dismemberment, significant disfigurement ... what is significant disfigurement? Loss of a fetus, I suppose that is pretty simple. Permanent loss of a use of body organ, member, function or system, that's for the court to decide in a summary judgment. So, the attorneys will be involved. We haven't taken them out of this at all. They'll be there. As far as whether or not it's going to contribute to a higher cost, I can only assume that it probably will. But that's one of the problems that I see with the verbal threshold.

"Some of the other states have in certain things such as fractures. I asked myself, 'Okay, what can the lay person out there identify with some sort of injury that will not be covered under this verbal threshold? What kind of injury is not serious and permanent and results in significant disfigurement?' "Take for example, you're riding in a car and there's a child there and you get into an accident and the child's kidneys are somehow injured. You rush him to the doctor, and there we have another problem because you want the best doctor and with these caps you may not be able to get the best unless you pay for it because the insurance company may say we're only paying \$50.00. This doctor charges \$100.00, but you want the best so you're going to pay the extra \$50.00 or you're going to have your HMSA pay for it which really then comes out of your pocket anyway. So, you take the child in and the doctor says he can make some repairs to the kidney but the child is going to have to come back every five years and have to be on the dialysis machine.

"From my reading of this, that child does not qualify for these no-fault benefits because it is not a permanent loss of use of a body organ member function and it's not serious and permanent. It wouldn't qualify under significant disfigurement. That, I would imagine, would be a burn.

"So, there are real problems here with the verbal threshold but, of course, what happens is then you take it to court and in a summary judgment proceeding, and believe me, people cannot represent themselves, I would not recommend that anyway, not because I'm an attorney, but they can't in a summary judgment proceeding. I think it's much too difficult for them and it's rather complicated. So that is one of the problems there.

"I mentioned earlier about the medical caps. Now, maybe others may not have problems with that but Senator Tungpalan mentioned earlier that if we're going to tie this in to how it's being handled with the workers' comp, well, there are big problems there. They haven't really quite gotten a handle on that and so I see the same kind of problems appearing here, if we are going to tie the caps into the system that they are using with workers' comp.

"In addition to that was what I mentioned earlier. The fact that if you want the best for your family member, and the cap precludes you from that, it's going to come out of your pocket one way or other so this is an area that needs to be worked on to prevent anyone from getting the best kind of medical treatment that they should be entitled to when they are in an automobile accident and they are injured.

"I would be the first to vote in favor of this bill if all of those problems were addressed, and if there was in fact a 15% guaranteed reduction. I have a lot of problems with this bill because of that and because it's being portrayed as 'you will get a 15% reduction.' Many calls are coming into my office to vote for this bill because they want their 15% reduction in rates and that is just not the case.

"The bill states that the 15% reduction will occur, unless the insurer files a petition and shows that it will seriously undermine the solvency of the insurer. I think what Senator Ann Kobayashi raised to deal with that is a very good idea which I hope the committee will take into consideration and that is that if in fact we can't get a 15% reduction, for whatever reasons, then let's kick-in --'pay at the pump.' Which would cover, by the way, everybody in the state at affordable prices. Something to that effect, some sort of measure so that we can put ourselves in a situation where we can go back and say we are working on insurance reform that will result in a reduction in your rates.

"For what it's worth, I'll just end by saying that I have to purchase insurance for my cars by March 6. Royal Insurance, I guess, insurers the state. I have no idea what's happening with them so I went through the insurance commissioner's report, the latest, that was handed to us, 1991, and I checked off all of those that sell insurance, motor vehicle insurance, and of course shopping around as everyone should and I found ... this is a list (held up list) of all of those that sell motor vehicle insurance in the State of Hawaii. Some people have told us that only twelve do, but this is the list of those that sell it in the State of Hawaii.

"I have found the range from the lowest of 207.00 and the highest of 1.057.00 in just the basic no-fault premiums. I don't know what accounts for this kind of extreme range in premiums for automobile insurance and I don't know why these companies are in here saying that there are losing money when some can offer basic no-fault at 207.00. We really need to get down to it.

"I don't think that this bill is the way to do it. I ask that the chair of the committee take into consideration all of the points raised today by those of us who are not in favor of the measure, and some of the really good suggestions raised by other Senators such as Senator Ann Kobayashi and Senator Blair. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura again rose to speak in favor of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, in support of the bill, the major thing, the questions I asked the insurance industry and the insurance industry answers, I must admit, satisfied some of the doubts that I had and that's why I'm voting in favor of the bill.

"The other major concern that bothered me was the cost relating to legal expenses, the cost involving the plaintiff's lawyer and defense lawyers. When I was told that the total dollar amount that the insurance companies pay to the medical doctors and the hospital, was equal to what is paid the plaintiff's lawyer and the defense lawyer, that's when I figured we must do something to curb this cost. If I were in the insurance business, I would rather give the money to the injured person rather than to the lawyers. Hopefully, this measure that we are addressing will do just that. We must care for injured persons and keep them out of litigation.

"I would like to congratulate the chair of the Consumer Protection Committee because she has looked into and addressed the problem of uninsured motorists. Twenty to 25% of those persons driving out there don't have any auto insurance. The committee passed out three bills addressing the problem of uninsured motorists. Thank you."

Senator Solomon rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, as I said earlier, I'll be voting against the bill.

"In response to the previous speaker's remarks about uninsured motorists, the problem is that the uninsured motorist is not even mentioned in this vehicle. If in fact it is such a big problem, which we all know it is, I was hoping that that issue would have been mentioned in this bill. Unfortunately, it was not. I feel that it would be inappropriate for me to be speaking in reference to the uninsured motorist when it's not even mentioned in this bill or how the committee is going to address that problem. It's a bill that is not before this body's consideration.

"However, I would like to reiterate the problems that I see and this is from all of the other previous speakers' remarks. I think the bottom line, Mr. President, is that

those of us who are opposing the measure, we would feel more comfortable if there was a guaranteed 15% reduction. We are not guaranteed that in this bill, and no matter how the issue is debated back and forth, the bottom line is that there is a way that the insurance companies can get around it. Whether it be insolvency or whatever it may be, the bottom line is that they can get around it and this is why I am opposed to this bill.

"The other issue, Mr. President, is the verbal threshold, people are talking about internal injuries, so on and so forth. The bottom line is, Mr. President, you get one broken leg, you get zero dollar recovery; you get two broken legs, you get zero dollar recovery; you get one dislocated spinal disk, zero dollar recovery.

"The previous speaker is talking about providing these medical costs and benefits to the consumer but this bill does not provide that.

"The other issue, Mr. President, is that insurance is big business in the State of Hawaii. We have approximately 265 insurance companies and, the Senator from Kauai has shown us the list which I'm sure we've all received. Of 265 insurance companies we have only one carrier that is based in the State of Hawaii. The rest are based out-of-state. We are talking about an industry that boosts over \$265 million.

"Another point, Mr. President, I guess the reason why I am really 'kanalua' about this is that the insurance companies have a very poor reputation in dealing with the Legislature. We dealt with them on the issues of workers' comp and it was quite obvious that if we did not have the power of the state fund there would have been no reductions.

"The other issue, Mr. President, is the reductions that we were promised when we passed the seat-belt legislation. What in fact happened, Mr. President, is that the consumers didn't receive a 10% reduction, they received a 12 to 15% increase on personal injury rates.

"The other issue, Mr. President, is how the insurance companies operate. We just finished a mandatory fiveday recess during which time I held community meetings throughout my district. I even had representatives from the insurance companies giving their perspective on the CARE package. Bottom line, Mr. President, a lot of my constituents said, 'Senator, the rates have already gone up.' So, even if we mandate a rollback to 15%, the rates have already been increased to compensate for that.

"I think, Mr. President, these are the kinds of issues that we should be concerned with in terms of how the insurance industry is dealing with the situation. I know it's not appropriate to talk about legislative vehicles that are not before us but we did have another vehicle that would have cut across all of this. I think previous speakers have mentioned it and requested looking at other ways of seeking insurance reform. I am for insurance reform. I represent the Third Senatorial District that has the lowest salaries per capita. Majority of my people are making \$22,000 annually. For them this is big stuff and for those of them that have to drive several miles to get to work, we are forcing them, Mr. President, through backing up a bill like this, to violate the law by not taking no-fault insurance. We are passing laws in this Legislature that are self-defeating, because if these laws worked, we wouldn't have all of these violations. In my mind, if you look at the total package that we have before us today, we will be forcing even more people to violate the law. The unfortunate part is that there is collusion out there.

"In terms of cost, as it was mentioned by previous speakers, who's going to compensate for these medical problems that cannot be taken care of under this bill. I heard things like HMSA is going to raise rates, so is Kaiser.

"Mr. President, I want to commend the committee on an outstanding job it did in trying to bring these facts to us so we can discuss them, but the bottom line remains that we have other legislative vehicles and other ways of looking at this problem that, maybe, were not available in 1973.

"In closing, Mr. President, I would like to again reiterate that I am against this bill because there is no guarantee that there is going to be a 15% rollback or whatever the chairman has stated in her report. Also, the verbal threshold has not included on how it would deal with 'Sam Average' on the street. I feel the consumer is going to be on the losing end.

"Thank you."

Senator Ikeda then rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

"A lot has been said about this issue. I might add that we worked long and hard on it. Yes, this is a tough bill, it's a strong bill, it's also a very fair bill and I resent the fact that people would infer that it's perpetrating a fraud on the public.

"That 15% reduction is in this bill and if this bill became law in its entirety that 15% reduction would go into effect with a three-and-a-half year freeze on rates. The language is strong. In fact, in some instances, stronger than language we have used in other bills which have become law. For example, when we passed tort reform, the language regarding insolvency wasn't even as stringent. If there were moratoriums placed on rates in the past that were not challenged for being unconstitutional, that may be the only reason why they passed muster. This is no different.

"I don't think that it's our intent to put anybody out of business. Certainly, it isn't mine.

"We need a reduction and a stabilizing of rates, and I might emphasize stabilizing because I think it has become a problem because of the fact that rates have jumped 20 to 40% in a year. We just can't allow this to continue. We have to put a stop to this. People are hurting. In order to do it we had to come up with something to reform the current system. And there were several things that we looked at, several jurisdictions that we studied.

"It is very clear to me that there are two things that are very necessary to bring about reform and they are in this bill. The two major things that are necessary in order to bring rates down are: 1. a change in the threshold. The dollar threshold is not working. Today, you can run your bills up to \$8,300 and you're in the game. You see an attorney before that and he'll tell you to come back when you have \$8,300 worth of medical bills.

"There are mills set up today, attorney to medical practitioner (and I'm not going to name them, they know who they are) and they work the system. They meet that threshold, they get those bills up to \$8,300 and then they go in and negotiate settlement. Yes, you may not see an increase in court cases because the majority of them are settled. But with every settlement, with every dollar that goes out, that increases your insurance premium and that's the kind of thing we need to put a stop to.

"I feel for the lady who called me up, who is retired and living on a fixed income, who suddenly sustains a \$94 increase in premium. Ninety-four dollars is a lot. It means a helluva lot to a person in a situation like that. And there is no reason why a person like that who has a clean driving record, no accidents for 20 years or so should have to bear the brunt and the burden of this additional cost because of a few who have found a way to beat the system and make some easy money.

"The other thing that we needed besides a verbal threshold was a medical fee schedule because it's fairly evident, and the statistics show that medical costs have escalated a lot faster and a lot higher than the consumer price index.

"So with these two coverages in place, Mr. President, we felt that we had the makings of good reform. People would like you to focus on the extreme cases, a person being seriously injured and not being compensated by the system. The fact is that 66% of the total dollars paid out under all auto coverages, that's bodily injury liability and personal injury protection -- 66% of that money goes towards sprains and strains -- 66%. Less than 4% of the injuries in accidents can be attributed to serious injuries, injuries that really need to be compensated.

"I think that this bill is aimed at that 66%. It's not the great majority who end up in the hospital with bills that they can't pay. In fact, the great majority end up with extra dollars in their pockets and with them plaintiffs' attorneys who make a helluva lot of money in the process.

"Maybe, after this bill passes, those attorneys won't be able to afford those TV ads or the 30 to 40 thousand dollars that they pay for those ads in the yellow pages. Maybe that's good because I, for one, am sick and tired of having to pay my premium bills to support this kind of fraud on the system.

"I want rates to go down. More than that, I want them to stabilize. I don't want to see people hurt. I think a previous colleague has said there is no free lunch, that this is being sold as a free lunch. I don't think sol! I think this is a serious attempt to reduce rates. It's a serious attempt to help the majority of the people out there who are good drivers. Who do obey the laws. Who are very careful and yet get hit with these astronomical increases in insurance premiums just because a few benefit unjustly from the system. That's what we're after -- those who are ripping off the system!

"You talk about people getting zero dollar recovery. Well, that's if you feel that everybody ought to recover by being able to sue.

"This bill increases personal injury protection from \$15,000 to \$25,000. Twenty-five thousand dollars should be more than adequate to take care of the sprains and strains and cover the medical costs of any injury that isn't serious or permanent. Currently, the average payment for personal injury protection cost is around \$4,000. So even the current \$15,000 minimum is much higher than the average cost of treatment. But by raising it to \$25,000 we are taking care of those that might need the additional medical help.

"I think this is a good bill. It's tough. Everybody has to swallow a little. Medical people have given up something by agreeing to be regulated by a medical fee schedule similar to the workers' comp fee schedule, which is already in place. The insurance companies have said that with a tough verbal threshold, they can reduce bodily injury liability costs by 22%. With a medical fee schedule, they can reduce personal injury protection costs by 15%. By reducing the bodily injury liability coverage from 35,000 unlimited, which happens to be the highest limit in the 50 states, reducing it to 10,000 per person, and 30,000 per occurrence, will result in a 21% reduction in rates. Eliminating the stacking of uninsured motorist and underinsured motorist coverages will give you a minus 16%. Total it all up, Mr. President. It's going to differ in each case. However, I have some examples which were taken from the Hawaii Academy of Plaintiffs Attorneys' illustrations. In each case the bottom line savings differ, but in each case, there is more than an 11% reduction and in some cases, a 15% reduction in rates.

"I must congratulate the people who worked very hard on this bill. I congratulate my colleagues, especially my committee members; more so, I think I congratulate the plaintiff attorneys. This is only round one, as they've noted. But if we can't pass good reforms to our insurance law, we won't be able to get rates down and they come out the winner. It's the people who lose."

Senator Fernandes Salling, again, rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, after listening to all of the comments made by the previous speaker, now I'm beginning to wonder whether or not we really need a bill. I think that the insurance companies are making money hand over fist here in Hawaii, looking at these kinds of rate schedules.

"I think they should use some of the premium money that we are paying to them now, those high premium costs, to have them pay to advertise the premium rates in all the newspapers so the people of Hawaii can shop around for the best rates. And I think we should be enforcing the law that is already on the books, which the insurance companies don't tell their customers about and some of them don't even bother to afford to their customers, and that is that you can take a deductible on your personal injury protection up to \$500, which will reduce your insurance rates by at least 20% or more, the same idea as the deductible that you are now allowed to take on your collision insurance, which as all of you know who have collision insurance is where you pay a lot of money and when you take a high deductible you are then able to reduce those rates substantially. I think maybe we should advertise it and make the public aware of what the existing situation is today and perhaps you don't need this bill."

Senator Tungpalan, against the measure, added her remarks as follows:

"Mr. President, I want to reflect on this personal injury protection cost which the chair of Consumer Protection says averages to \$4,000. You know, people can fool with figures easily to come up with the right conclusion, if they so choose. However, let's look at what she's trying to have us really not see and that is, unfortunately, that there will be serious cases that will require more than \$25,000. So what do we do with individuals who are in the high risk category like students at the University of Hawaii who are hit, who are in need of care, and yet have no medical insurance. They will fall on the state's medicaid system. What do we do about the elderly who, also because of their limited income, cannot afford to have the best medical coverage? They will also need our help.

"You know, it's easy to say, 'Yes, personal injury protection comes to an average of \$4,000,' but that's everybody in the system. I, myself, two years ago was injured when I was hit and 'creamed' and sandwiched between two cars. My van took three weeks to be fixed. It came to a cost of \$10,000, but because I'm not an abuser or user of the system my medical bills totaled under 100. Now, my 100 is factored into that average that she came out at 4,000. So you get a low of a 100and you get a high from someone who really sustained a serious injury, you're going to come out with a low PIP average. So let's not fool with statistics or figures. Let's look at what we're doing here.

"Some of you might think, 'Oh boy, we're beating this like a dead horse.' Well, why? It is because we care. And you know, I resent the fact that tribute is being paid to plaintiffs' attorneys. Hey, give us some credit, that we're willing and able to make decisions here on what is best for the people who sent us here. That we're not bought by anybody. I'm not in anybody's pocket. As far as I'm concerned I have clean hands. I'm not an abuser or user of the system. Yes, I do carry a lot of coverage because I'm afraid I need the protection. And that is exactly what insurance is -- protection.

"You know, I know that I'm voting right on this issue, and not because some plaintiff attorney told me to vote this way. I'm voting because I am trying to protect the rights of my citizens and I would do no less for each and everyone of you here today. So I'm voting against this measure."

Senator Blair, in support of the measure, again rose and stated:

"Mr. President, very briefly, I would like to dispel any inference that I was referring to the chair of the committee when I said this bill has been sold as a free lunch. I was referring to people outside of the Senate. As I indicated earlier, I will be voting in favor of the bill. I do appreciate the very hard work of the committee members and the chair. The fact that I may not be willing to go quite as far as some does not mean that I fail to appreciate the work that was done. Thank you."

Senator Chang then rose to speak in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I have been a supporter of and beneficiary of the privilege extended by the Majority caucus of the Senate, to the chairs of the various committees, to take legislative vehicles over to our colleagues in the lower house for discussion purposes. I therefore will vote for the bill on this basis, although there are several elements in the proposal that raise concerns for me. Consequently, I also reserve judgment on the final product until the discussions have been completed and the appropriate vehicle is before us. Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi also rose to support the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, I'm voting for the bill because I believe this bill is a starting point for negotiations. The negotiations have yet really to begin. We were told, for instance, that the verbal threshold concept on this bill was based on the New York law. The New York law which we were handed last night includes five items which are currently in the Senate draft of the bill, but also four other items. They include, a fracture, a permanent consequential limitation of use of a body organ or member, significant limitation of use of a body function or system and, lastly, a medically determined injury or impairment of a non-permanent nature which prevents the injured person from performing substantially all of the material acts which constitute such person's usual and customary daily activities for a specified 90-day period.

"I think that the verbal threshold as contained in the Senate draft of the bill is a very, very tough verbal threshold. But, given the New York example, there is still a lot of negotiating that is yet possible on a verbal threshold. I would imagine that we would see some change, perhaps, in the verbal threshold in keeping with the negotiations as they proceed. Thank you."

The motion was then put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2201 was adopted and S.B. No. 2361, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NO-FAULT INSURANCE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 20. Noes, 5 (Solomon, Fernandes Salling, Tungpalan, McMurdo, Wong, R.).

Senator Reed then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise on a brief, related point of personal privilege, and I apologize for my voice. I'm not feeling well today which also may account for the fact that I need to ask this question.

"Mr. President, did this honorable body actually vote in favor of term limitations for the mayor but voted against term limitations for itself?

"I will yield that to the chairman."

Senator Blair responded:

"Mr. President, I'll take that as a question being posed to the chair. I will respond that the Senate did vote in favor of allowing the electorate to make a term limit decision with respect to the mayors. The bill, with respect to the Legislature, was recommitted."

Senator Reed continued:

"Well then the answer to my question is 'yes.' The body as a whole did vote hypocritically in favor of limiting the term of the mayor and did, behind closed doors in caucus, decide to kill the bill.

"To me, the Senate should be embarrassed to pass a bill that allows for limiting the terms of the mayor and kill in caucus a bill that would limit the terms of legislators including yourselves.

"I would like to ask the chair of Judiciary Committee to reconsider his recommittal of Senate Bill 2264 and bring it back out now for a vote on the floor and have a roll call vote to see exactly what has happened."

The President called on Senator Blair for a response and Senator Blair answered:

"Mr. President, I appreciate the support from my colleague in the Minority party but I won't be making a decision to reconsider.

"In any event, there are very substantial differences between term limits for the executive branch and term limits for the legislative branch. While some may choose to view the two measures together, it was never my intent that the two be considered in unison. They were never considered in unison by me. The fact that they met different fates does not take anything away from the merits of allowing people to consider term limits for the county executive branch, just as we have limits for the governor."

Senator Reed then continued:

"Mr. President, I certainly respect anybody's views even when they differ from mine. I happen to support

term limitations for all elected officials at all levels, and I respect anybody who disagrees with that. But I do think that it is, regardless of any fine line that we can draw between the county level and the state level, it is hypocritical for the Senate to pass out a measure that allows limiting the terms of the mayor and then kill in caucus the bill that would limit the terms of the members of this body. So, regardless of the fine line, I do believe it is hypocritical. I don't see how the public can see it any other way and, therefore, I don't understand why you're not embarrassed.

"I would like to respectfully repeat my off stated request that these kinds of issues be debated publicly rather than in caucus. Thank you."

Senator Chang, on a point of personal privilege, said:

"Mr. President, with all due respect to the Senator from West Maui, it is a bit presumptuous to surmise and speculate as to what occurred within the Majority caucus or in the mind of the subject matter chairman. I will note that the term limitations, the years of the term limitations varied between the two proposals and it's entirely possible that the subject matter chairman wanted to have the opportunity to harmonize those proposals. In any case, it's quite presumptuous to allow conjectures to the reasons why the subject matter chairman chose to recommit the bill."

Senator Reed responded:

"Mr. President, so as not to go down in history as being presumptuous, I would like to ask the chairman of the Judiciary Committee if he would yield to a question?"

The Chair posed the question to the chair of Judiciary Committee and Senator Blair having answered in the affirmative, Senator Reed asked:

"Mr. Chairman, what prompted your decision to recommit the bill that would have limited terms of legislators?"

Senator Blair answered:

"Fundamentally, I think it's not a matter that is going to be resolved at the legislative level. It's going to be resolved by a constitutional convention. A constitutional convention is probably a more appropriate forum because it is a more objective forum. In any event, there was not sufficient support to go forward with it."

Senator Reed then continued:

"Translated, does that mean that in caucus you did not have the votes to have the bill passed on the floor?"

Senator Blair answered:

"I'm not sure that I would use precisely those words. I don't believe there was the two-thirds necessary. I think that this issue is one that will be better resolved, in terms of determining the appropriate number of terms that would be allowed and other points, in a constitutional convention. It might be possible to get a two-thirds vote, but only for a bill that is too watered-down to be meaningful.

"A meaningful bill on legislative term limits is going to require a constitutional amendment that is generated by a constitutional convention, rather than a constitutional amendment that is generated by a legislative body."

Senator Chang then said:

"Mr. President, I want to corroborate that the subject matter chairman did refer it to a constitutional convention, at which point I then turned to the Senator from Kauai and mentioned how intriguing it would be to see her again at such a setting."

Senator Levin also responded and said:

"Mr. President, I too would like to respond on that point briefly. Our colleague from Maui has referred to term limitations of 'the' mayor, the implication being that we're speaking about the incumbent. I think that unless the incumbent plans to stay in office until the age of 90 or 95 the bill will not affect him anyway. The point is that we are passing a law that would apply to any person who holds the position of a mayor. The executive position having the power that it has warrants a different vote than a term limitation on legislators. Thank you."

Senator Reed in response remarked:

"Mr. President, just briefly to follow up the previous speaker. Actually, if I said 'the' mayor, actually I did not have Mayor Fasi in mind. I was talking about 'the mayor' in a generic sense.

"I actually had reservations about the bill and, in fact, signed initially 'WR' on it because I felt that it was hypocritical. I saw that bill first and thought there was no bill that was still alive that would have limited senators' terms. When I subsequently saw that there was another bill that would have limited our terms, the chairman allowed me to change my 'WR,' since there was consistency there.

"I also have reservations about the term limitation bill for mayors because to me it is a home rule issue. For instance, the counties of Maui and I believe Kauai and the Big Island have term limitations, I believe, of two, full four-year terms as a limit, which I'm in favor of, and I think the City and County of Honolulu would be better served with that kind of a limitation.

"I don't believe it is our place to put forth that kind of a measure, but as long as there was consistency I was willing to go along with it. And so I'm disappointed that the consistency has been lost with the recommittal of the bill that would have limited the terms of senators. Thank you."

ADJOURNMENT

At 6:19 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Solomon, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Wednesday, March 4, 1992.

TWENTY-SEVENTH DAY

Wednesday, March 4, 1992

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 11:41 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Wallace Ryan Kuroiwa, Nuuanu Congregational Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Nakasato and Reed who were excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Sixth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Crozier introduced Mr. Pat Halley, seated in the audience, as follows:

"Mr. President, today I'd like to take the opportunity to introduce an individual who has been sent here by Mr. Paul Tsongas who, as you know, is a presidential candidate. Although I'm not endorsing any candidate at this time I would like to compliment Mr. Tsongas for realizing that Hawaii needs to be considered and by him sending a staff person is more than just a symbolic statement -- Paul Tsongas thinks Hawaii is important. When you put your money where you mouth is, that's the best example of all.

"Mr. Pat Halley is here, of course, to button-hole anyone possible he can to talk to supporting the Tsongas campaign. He also has a book called 'A Call to Economic Arms' that he is passing out. Members, if you see him in the halls and he comes up to you, show him your aloha spirit and give him a second or two of your time to share his thoughts with you.

"At this time, I'd like you to recognize Pat Halley."

Senator Iwase then recognized Mr. Robert K. Bratt, Administrator of Redress, Office of the U.S. Attorney General, as follows:

"Mr. President, before I introduce our honoree, there is someone I'd like to introduce to this body.

"I'd like to read an article from the local newspaper which appeared a few days ago under the title 'An Apology and a Check Atone for an Injustice': 'James Watanabe, yesterday, discovered that nine months can encompass a lifetime. Early last summer, the Aiea resident didn't think anything would come of filing an application for federal reparations. But, yesterday, the Aiea resident found himself holding a framed letter of apology and a U.S. Treasury Department check for \$20,000. The letter written on White House stationery was signed by George Bush. As he looked at the letter and check, Watanabe shook his head. "I didn't believe it would happen," he said.'

"Mr. President, 50 years ago a terrible injustice was inflicted upon innocent Japanese Americans who were locked up in prison, solely on the basis of race. It is to the credit of this great country that this wrong was recognized, was admitted to, and efforts were undertaken to rectify that wrong. Through long hours and hard work, Mr. Robert Bratt who is with us today and Mr. John Dunne who unfortunately cannot be here have been the instruments of justice. Through their tireless efforts, through their commitment, and through their compassion, people like Mr. Watanabe have come to believe that justice can happen in America. Through their efforts, the important healing process has begun for thousands of Japanese Americans here in Hawaii and throughout this country.

"Mr. President, it is my privilege and honor to present to this honorable body the Administrator of the Federal Office of Redress Administration, who recently received the Senior Executive Presidential Meritorious Rank Award for his outstanding performance, Mr. Robert Bratt. Thank you, Mr. Bratt."

Mr. Bratt, seated on the floor of the Senate, rose to be recognized. Mr. Bratt was presented the Senate certificate of recognition by Senator Iwase. Senator Ann Kobayashi presented him a lei.

Senator Iwase continued:

"Sitting in the audience, joining Mr. Bratt, is Ms. Tink Cooper who is legal counsel for the Office of Redress Administration."

Ms. Tink Cooper rose to be recognized.

Senator Iwase then yielded the floor to Senator Crozier and Senator Crozier then remarked:

"Mr. President, on your behalf, I have the pleasure and privilege to introduce three individuals whose collective efforts contributed to rectifying the wrong committed by the federal government fifty years ago and to enable individuals, who otherwise may be forgotten, to qualify for benefit payments.

"It was fifty years ago that President Franklin Roosevelt issued an executive order authorizing the relocation of persons of Japanese ancestry from the so-called critical areas for national security reasons. This was a dark day in American history as the integrity and loyalty of individuals were questioned solely on the basis of race.

"More than fifty years later Congress enacted legislation to rectify the errors of fifty years ago. The legislation signed by President Reagan provides among other things monetary compensation for affected individuals.

"The affected individuals numbered more than a hundred thousand people. On the West Coast, people of Japanese ancestry were relocated to internment centers in various parts of the country.

"The relocation of people in Hawaii was on a lesser scale and with less publicity. The affected people in Hawaii can be categorized as follows: (1) those individuals and their families who were sent to internment centers on the mainland; (2) those individuals who were interned at the Honouliuli and Sand Island detention centers; and (3) those who were mandated to vacate their homes but not detained in any center. It is that group of individuals belonging to the third category who are the beneficiaries of the efforts of the individuals honored this morning.

"The legislation providing for the reparation payments was the basis for redressing the wrongs. Still to be determined was the extent of the federal government's culpability and eligibility of individuals for compensation.

"The eligibility of individuals detained in centers was easily ascertained and these individuals were readily accommodated. The eligibility of individuals mandated to vacate their homes, but not detained, was not so simple.

"In 1991 Robert Bratt (Mr. Bratt sitting there) of the Office of Redress Administration acting on a lead provided by Mr. Bill Kaneko, president of the Honolulu Chapter of the Japanese American Citizens League, solicited the assistance of Pam Funai, a graduate student who was working on a term paper relating to the detention centers at Honouliuli and Sand Island, to seek other incriminating documents. Her success in this endeavor extended the eligibility list for reparation payments for an estimated 200 to 500 people.

"Pam, on behalf of the State Senate, we would like to present a certificate of recognition for your successful effort on behalf of the people of Hawaii.

"A second phase of this endeavor to make reparation payments a reality was to inform the individuals who were eligible for reparation payments and to inform and assist them to satisfy the requirements of the Office of Redress Administration. In this phase, Mr. Masanori Matsuda, a long time resident of Waianae and member of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission, played a key role. His assistance to those relocated from Lualualei Valley was invaluable. Mr. Matsuda, thank you, and we would like also to present you with a certificate of recognition.

"Last, but not least, I would like to recognize Mr. Bill Kaneko for his contributions in this effort. He was the inspirational leader who motivated and coordinated the efforts of the various individuals contributing to this effort to rectify the errors of fifty years ago.

"Miss Funai and Mr. Matsuda, will you please stand to be recognized."

The honorees, seated on the floor of the Senate, rose to be recognized. They were presented the Senate certificates of recognition and leis.

Mr. Bill Kaneko, who was seated in the audience, also rose to be recognized.

Senator Cobb then added his remarks as follows:

"Mr. President, rising to speak in support of the recognitions being given today. We found in several meetings of the Western Legislative Conference that many of our colleagues, particularly from California, Idaho, Colorado and Arizona, did not fully Wyoming, understand the travesty of justice that had happened in World War II, and many of them were opposing openly the redress that was so long overdue our citizens, so I think the information that has been shared today, the information that has been given through research, and the success that has come about ought to be shared with those legislators through the American Legislative Exchange Council and other channels so that more Americans can fully understand the wrong that was done and how long it has taken to redress this grievance.

"I thank you all for your efforts. Thank you."

The Chair made the following comments:

"Members of the Senate, the Chair would be very remiss if I did not personally thank Mr. Masanori Matsuda for informing my family that we may be able to qualify.

"And I would also be remiss if I did not introduce my mother who is sitting in the audience.

"Also in the audience is Mrs. Clara Matsuda, wife of Masanori Matsuda, and Mr. Bill Kaneko, one of our honorees."

Mrs. Lillian Aki, Mrs. Clara Matsuda and Mr. Bill Kaneko stood to be recognized.

At 11:54 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:01 o'clock p.m.

Senator Tungpalan then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I would like to highly commend the Honolulu Advertiser for their astute analysis of the no-

fault insurance reform issue, which appeared in this morning's paper. They succinctly express the problem that was brought up on the floor on Tuesday.

"I quote from the editorial: 'The policy question is whether lower premiums would be worth the sacrifice of some current consumer benefits.'

"The editor recognizes that it's necessary to take some time to analyze this data. But the more succinct point that he made was that it's hard information that we need in order to make this analysis. For the past two weeks, I have been asking the insurance companies to provide me with that data. I'd like to see their reserves. I'd like to see what is being made out there as far as investment income is concerned. I'd like to see what their losses are.

"Right now, everything that we've had before us is data that they have provided but it's not the total picture.

"I think this is such an important issue that we ought to take it to all the islands and have hearings like we did on several other bills that were of major significance. Let's take a holistic approach in insurance reform.

"'Lawmakers should get the data from insurers and take the time to digest the actuaries' analysis, even if it means postponing auto insurance reform another year,' said Gerry Keir of the Advertiser. It's naive to say we must trust the insurance companies when they say they are going to give us the 15% reduction.

"It only reminds me of my experience when I was chair of labor in 1983. At that time, they lobbied me persistently about the need for a study on workers' compensation. They said if the Legislature studied workers' comp they would accept a moratorium for two years on rates. At that time, they received a premium increase on workers' comp rates by 29% with a swing of 25% attached to it. Some companies like the roofing industry had a 54% increase. What did that mean in terms of consumers having to purchase roofs? It meant that they had to pay \$3,000 more for that roof, just simply because of this insurance raise. It was really astronomical and the Legislature did the right thing. We had a moratorium which the insurance companies said they would abide by.

"I had allowed that measure to go forward and it went to the governor's office. In another measure, a concurrent resolution, we placed monies for a two-year study and both measures went to the governor's office. But, lo and behold, during the time that those measures reached the governor's office, the insurance companies were there lobbying to have the moratorium measure killed. If I didn't anticipate that and I didn't require that in writing, today, we wouldn't have had a moratorium. We would not have had all these years without rate increases in workers' compensation. What saved the day was the fact that I had said to the insurance companies, you must place that in writing and it was that piece of paper which stipulated that they would abide by the moratorium, if a study had been passed that made us have a moratorium.

"There is no guarantee, there is no free lunch, that's all true. We have got to get things down in black and white, unfortunately. More than that, we need to do things with facts; hard facts, before we swing the pendulum much, much too far.

"We need reform. We need to reduce premiums. Let's do it with the facts before us. Thank you."

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Sam Domingo, Trinity United Methodist Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators George and McMurdo who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Ninth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Koki introduced Mr. Jim Meyerhoff, seated in the audience, "a good friend of mine who moved from Hawaii to live in the State of Washington."

Senator Chang introduced Mr. Santos Olikong and Mr. Nathaniel Waena, seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, I have the honor of introducing two distinguished guests. Our first guest is Mr. Santos Olikong, Minister of State for the Republic of Belau. He is the former Speaker of the House of Delegates of the Palau National Congress, and the former president of the Pacific Islands Development Bank with headquarters in Guam. Welcome to our chambers, Mr. Olikong.

"Our second guest is Mr. Nathaniel Waena, a member of the Parliament of the Government of the Solomon Islands. He has enjoyed an extensive political career and formerly occupied the highest civil servant position in the Solomon Islands as the permanent secretary for the government.

"These two distinguished gentlemen are in Hawaii to attend the second Pacific Islands Area Seminar sponsored by the Office of International Relations for the State of Hawaii and the Association for Communication and Transcultural Study, an innovative program at Tokai University in Honolulu. The topic of this year's seminar is 'Human Resources Development.' Hawaii's relationship with the Pacific islands is of extreme importance and it is only through this type of interaction that our mutual interests will continue to develop."

Mr. Olikong and Mr. Waena rose to be recognized and were presented leis by Senators A. Kobayashi and Ikeda.

Senator Chang also introduced Mr. Isaka and members from the staff of Tokai University, Honolulu, seated in the audience, who accompanied the visitors from the Pacific islands.

Senator McCartney first introduced Adrian Aiu, Sheri Nozawa and Leah Suifanua, students from Kahuku High School, who were seated in the audience. The students are spending the day at the Senate working with Senator McCartney.

Senator McCartney then introduced Dr. Patricia W. Nishimoto, seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure to introduce an individual here with us today. She is a nurse and we all know that nurses play a big role in our lives. They are a big part of the medical care providers in our system.

"I think it's kind of ironic that we're here today to recognize Dr. Nishimoto because this past summer when I had the opportunity to visit the Marshall Islands, on the return flight to Hawaii, a young girl was brought on the plane and she was strapped to a special stretcher for the flight. The young girl, throughout the flight, screamed and yelled in pain. It was quite sad. There was a doctor and her family beside her on the plane.

"I asked the stewardess about the girl and was told that she had a brain tumor, cancer in her brain. The stewardess then explained to me how difficult it is for many of these families from the Pacific islands to have to leave their homes and fly all the way to Tripler to get their families taken care of. She told me, many times when they get to Tripler it's almost too late.

"The young girl and Tripler hospital came to mind because, today, we're recognizing a nurse who works at Tripler Army Medical Center. She happens to take care of cancer patients that come all the way from the different Pacific island entities.

"Mr. President, the American Cancer Society annually presents the Lane W. Adams Award to only 20 nurses, nationally, for outstanding service in treating cancer patients. Our special nurse today is Dr. Pat Nishimoto of Tripler Army Medical Center, a recipient of the Lane W. Adams Award for 1993.

"Dr. Nishimoto works very hard in bridging the gap in the cultural differences between nurses and their patients from the Pacific islands. She brings families together and tries to make them feel a little bit more comfortable while they're here for treatment.

"On behalf of the Senate, I would like to thank Dr. Nishimoto for her outstanding service in the practice of nursing and extend our congratulations to her for receiving the Lane W. Adams Award from the American Cancer Society.

"At this time, I'd like to introduce Dr. Pat Nishimoto.".

Dr. Nishimoto stood to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and lei by Senator McCartney.

Senator McCartney also introduced Mr. Jim Nishimoto, husband of Dr. Pat Nishimoto, a good friend and member of Senator McCartney's staff; Mrs. Florence Nishimoto from Maryland, mother-in-law of Dr. Nishimoto; a group of patients and staff members from Tripler Army Medical Center; and a group of nurses from the community; all of whom were seated in the audience.

Senator Crozier, in recognition of Dr. Nishimoto, stated:

"Mr. President, I would like to say a few words about Dr. Nishimoto. I would also like to congratulate her for being recognized by the American Cancer Society.

(Senator Matsuura held up the article.) Later, there's a correction to that front page article printed on an inside page and the correction (held up article of correction) you can hardly see it from where you're sitting. It's right over here and it reads: ' ... a judgment for matter of dismissal.' The correction says that he was not fired because of his violation of the state whistleblower law. The correction is relatively small. You'll never find it if you weren't really looking for it.

"I hope someday this 'ma'ke-die-dead' bill will rise again like the 'unagi' bill. Thank you."

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THIRTY-FIFTH DAY

Tuesday, March 17, 1992

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 11:37 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Robert Lott, Hawaii District United Methodist Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Reed who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Fourth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Fernandes Salling introduced a group of Kauai students, representing Kapaa, Kauai and Waimea High Schools, who are on a visit to the State Legislature, accompanied by their teachers and chaperones: Mr. James Kawamura, Ms. Gwen Hayashi and Ms. Janice Nitta.

Senator Nakasato introduced a group of students from Kalihi Uka Elementary School: Stephanie Ramelb, Michelle Ducusin, Janice Pagba, Jamie Retutal, Myron Castro and Jonathan Subia; accompanied Ms. Therrin, their teacher.

Senator McCartney introduced three students from Kahuku High School: Julie Smith, Kara Craver-Jones, and Vilayrack Inthasone, who are spending a day at the Legislature.

Senator McMurdo, in recognition of St. Patrick's Day, made the following introduction and stated:

"The top o' the mornin' to you, Mr. President.

"Before I introduce our honored guests, I would like to thank all of you who are participating today, who have your green and have the happy, wonderful spirit of the Irish when they're in a good mood and had enough to drink!

"I also wanted to point out to you all that the man who is giving the \$50.00 gift certificate for lunch or whatever you and your staff want to do - that is if you win first prize - is Don Murphy. There is a picture of him in this morning's paper, preparing some of the 500 pounds of corn beef he plans to serve today.

"Mr. President, the people we are honoring today, and one in particular, have really been so much behind the spirit of St. Patrick's Day, that sure I thought it would be fittin' and proper if we gave the chief one a certificate of appreciation for his four years of hard work in judgin'.

"This is a certificate observing St. Patrick's Day (and I may run out of Irish brogue any minute):

"Whereas, St. Patrick's Day has been observed in America since colonial times, where the first such celebration was held in Boston in 1737 and where the Friendly Sons of St. Patrick held their first celebration in Philadelphia in 1784; and

"Whereas, St. Patrick's Day is observed on March 17th each year with music, pageantry, dancing, parades and eatin' throughout this country of ours; and "Whereas, the wearin' of the green on St. Patrick's Day has been traditional for this occasion to indicate that the green stands for nature and hope; and

"Whereas, St. Patrick's Day in the Senate has been observed for the past four years with a door-decorating contest for all Senators and staff and all members were encouraged to the wearin' of the green; and

"Whereas, this fun day enables the members and staff in the Senate to take a breather from an overwhelming legislative schedule, to share and enjoy the pleasures of living in Hawaii by observing this occasion;

"Be it resolved by the Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, that St. Patrick's Day be observed on March 17, 1992, in the Senate to honor all ye Irish people-atheart, with special tribute to the patron Saint the Honorable Mike O'Kieffe for his continuing contribution to the event and to ye young judges: Tom O'Kamura, Paul O'Shiro and Duke O'Bainum; now, therefore,

"Be it further resolved that all members and staff of this honorable body, 'Surin' would be fittin', if all were wearin' o' the green on this St. Patrick's Day.'"

"Thank you."

Senator Crozier then added:

"I would like to join in and say a few words. You know, Mr. President, everyone in Hawaii thinks that I'm Portuguese and I've given up fighting the issue. When I go to heaven, and I already prayed to the Lord, He will let me sit in the Portuguese section. However, while I'm on this earth I'm half-Irish. That's my white blood. Since I'm half-Irish, I try to find out as much as I can about Irish history.

"I was fortunate enough to be in New Zealand in October. On my visit, I was taken to an area that used to be a gold-mining area and was told that the Irish were brought to New Zealand to be miners. They worked in the mine fields and did whatever they do down there in the gold mines. And you gotta understand, the Irish were always split. They had the greens and the oranges but they worked together in the mines. However, they refused to be buried in the same cemetery when they died. You had the right footers and the left footers. The right footers were Protestants and they had their own cemetery. The left footers were the Catholics and they had their own cemetery. I guess it was when you step into heaven with your right foot you were a Protestant and with your left foot you were a Catholic.

"So even today, you know, our legislators, as the judges walk around they'll see that fight continuing amongst the greens and the oranges. I know the fight will continue but after they cross that threshold into heaven they can become friends. The McGeorges and the McMurdos can become one and they can visit me in the Portuguese section.

"Erin go brah!"

Senator Blair then added:

"Mr. President, I particularly notice Senator Chang's attire today. The last time I saw him dressed like this, he and I were working at a gas station many years ago.

Which happens to remind me of a story about how helpful Irishmen can be. And in light of the very helpful Irishmen who are our honorees today, perhaps I should tell it, perhaps I shouldn't, but I will.

"It seems that a few years back the IRA got tired of buying their gasoline at retail prices and they decided to buy their own gas station. Of course, word quickly went out that no one should come to the gas station to buy gasoline. A visiting American tourist pulled in one day and said to the attendant, 'You know I've been having some trouble with this car, I think I need some oil.' The attendant glared at him and said, 'We don't sell oil here. I think you've come to the wrong place.' The American then asked, 'Well, can I get some gasoline.' The attendant answered, 'We don't sell petrol here. I think you've come to the wrong place.' The American, out of exasperation and somewhat in anger, said to the Irishman, 'What the hell can you do?' The Irishman smiled and said, 'Be happy to blow up your tires for you.' (Laughter.)

"In light of that, I hope that these friendly Irishmen will not blow up too many Senate bills. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura also rose to state:

"I want to say a few words too, Mr. President.

"I want to pose a question to the Minority leader, if I may, Mr. President. Would she yield to a question?"

The President having posed the question to the Minority leader, and the Minority leader having answered in the affirmative, Senator Matsuura asked:

"Captain Cook who discovered Hawaii, was he green or was he orange?"

Senator George responded:

"I'm afraid to answer that. I think I better defer to the good Senator."

Senator Blair interjected:

"I'm the good Senator, I'll be happy to answer. (Laughter.)

"At the end of a long voyage in a small boat, I'm sure he was green." (Laughter.)

Senator Matsuura continued:

"Then I just want all the legislators that have Hawaiian blood to know that they are green because their ancestors ate Captain Cook."

Senator Solomon responded:

"Mr. President, I was going to refrain from making any remarks until the end of today's session when I make the motion to adjourn the session; however, I cannot help myself now after the previous speaker's remarks about the eating of Captain Cook.

"In a very serious note, the Hawaiians did not eat Captain Cook. I will be very happy at a later date to take it up with the good Senator from the Big Island and he and I could discuss the matter and I will explain what actually went on."

Senator George then asked if the author of the resolution would respond to an inquiry.

The Chair posed the question to the Senator from Waikiki and Senator McMurdo having answered in the affirmative, Senator George asked:

"Can the good Senator indicate to me when the judging of the doors is to take place? And when the announcement of the winners will take place?"

Senator McMurdo responded:

"I don't know, it's up to the good judges to make that decision. But I assure you it will be before the media goes to bed because we'd like to see their names in the paper."

Senator George continued:

"And one would hope photographs of the marvelous works of art that I've seen around the halls.

"I just want to assure my colleagues that they need not fear from competition by me. I had a door which was decorated so splendidly, so spectacularly well that without a doubt it would have captured the first prize in this particular contest. Unfortunately, someone has decided that it was so beautiful it should not be in contention and removed it so I now have a blank door, which is, I feel, only fair because it would have won first prize in the orange contest, I'm sure."

Senator Koki also rose to remark:

"Mr. President, I would like to make a little comment and address our good Senator from Waikiki.

"As I was getting dressed this morning, my wife was appalled at the color of my shirt. I told her there's a contest going on and this is really an Irish green. Is this an Irish green?"

Senator McMurdo answered:

"'Is an Irish green if I ever saw it."

Senator Koki continued:

"If you saw how my office is decorated you'd think that we're Irishmen and I don't know if there are any Irish people in my office. But, if we don't win, next year I'm going to wear orange." (Laughter.)

Senator Mizuguchi then rose to state:

"Mr. President, I know this is St. Patrick's Day and I know that the Senator from Nuuanu is a fashion-setter in the Senate, but will you ask the Senator from Makakilo, 'Where does his shirt start and his tie end?'"

Senator Crozier responded:

"Mr. President, this is all I had. Just to get into the spirit of it you know to salute the University of Hawaii and this is a tie my daughter bought for me from Goodwill. This is a typical Irish uniform."

Senator McMurdo interjected:

"Mr. President, that's a shanty Irish tie."

The Chair then said:

"Senator Crozier is a leprechaun, we all know that."

Senator Cobb then rose to state:

"That shirt matches almost exactly the shorts worn the other year by Senator Levin, on display right there (Senator Levin's desk).

The Chair then said:

"Senator Levin, I've been observing that wonderful work of art that drapes your desk."

Senator Levin then rose to state:

"Mr. President, I rise to a point of personal privilege.

"As everyone of course remembers, I am the defending champion in the St. Patrick's Day annual door decoration contest and I have already been instructed that I must yield the perpetual trophy to the judges for them to award this year.

"I want you to know, Mr. President, that I approach this day with very mixed emotions. It has been a great year and I will try to be gracious in yielding the crown. But I want to inform the younger folks who are around here, those starry-eyed 'wanna bes' who seek the title, who hope to use this as a stepping stone to fame and glory, that one year ago I too was naive. The year did begin glamorously and I thank the judges for recognizing our entry. But how long can you stand the constant adulation and the pressure to be a role model for one's peers. It gets to you after a while. It's lonely at the top, Mr. President.

"I know that you perhaps alone might understand this a bit, given the position that you've held as President but of course the rest of our colleagues cannot possibly imagine what it is like. You cannot go anywhere without being recognized. You're sought after for speeches and for appearances, and is it for your mind? No! It is for your shorts. The pressure shows in my hairline. My friends became embarrassed, I gather, the feeling of inferiority, I suppose, and then you wake up one day and you're alone, it's all over. You've been used and now you're being thrown away on the trash heap of history.

"I know I must sound bitter but I thought I was a worthy champion and yet there is always a young gunslinger out there, a Crozier, a Nakasato, who wants to try to make their reputation by proving they're better than the champ.

"And what about all the promises that were made a year ago, Mr. President? There's no march down the runway; there's no Bert Parks singing a song; there's no gold watch. The recording contract, well, there was recording but being simply in the choir singing behind Carolyn Sapp was hardly what I expected. And the worst part, Mr. President, is that I realized that my career peaked too soon. Like a Mickey Mantle or a Hank Aaron, I became too old too soon. They fought to make a hundred thousand dollars, now people are making millions.

"Last year this was my prize (held up trophy). This year, a \$50.00 gift certificate. But that's all right I'll be brave, I'll return to the drab existence of a mere Senator and be one of you all again.

"To usher in my life as a civilian, as a token of my appreciation, there will be some green ice cream being served in the Majority caucus room after session.

"Thank you."

Senator McMurdo then said:

"Mr. President, may I ask that the good Senator who won last year with those shorts (yuk!) if he would mind giving the perpetual trophy to the judges so that we can march on. I think maybe the good Senator at the front desk here would like us to get down to some kind of business besides monkey but 'merci.'"

Senator Holt also added his remarks:

"Mr. President, I stand to join the conversation. Just to put a little damper on things today, since there are a lot of greens over here in the State Office Tower, I would like to make an announcement that Senator Yamasaki says that there is no green in his Ways and Means Committee. Thank you."

The Chair then said:

"I would like to assure the visiting students that we don't do this everyday. We do work occasionally here in this body."

"I would like to preface your introduction, Senator McMurdo, by saying that we had a thorough discussion with each of the gentlemen before us on the floor. Usually we don't invite the members of the other legislative body over to see us. They may start to like it over here a little too much. However, these gentlemen have all assured us that they are going to stay where they are. They are not seeking higher office. Is that correct, gentlemen?"

Senator McMurdo interjected:

"Mr. President, that is the only condition upon which I asked them to be judges."

Senator McMurdo then introduced the judges of the St. Patrick's Day door decoration contest: the Honorable Mike O'Kieffe, chief judge; the Honorable Paul O'Shiro, second judge; and the newest member, the Honorable Duke O'Bainum, lieutenant of the judges, the 'gopher.'

Senator Chang then interjected:

"Mr. President, just a brief request. Inasmuch as the chairman of the Ways and Means Committee says there are not enough resources to go around, I notice that the shorts are my size. May I have them?"

The Chair answered:

"I noticed that you were eyeing them from the time you walked into this chamber. That belongs to the champion."

All of the gentlemen rose to be recognized and were presented St. Patrick's Day hats, pins and leis by Senators A. Kobayashi, Tungpalan and Solomon.

At 12:03 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:06 o'clock p.m.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Senator Mizuguchi, for the Committee on Employment and Public Institutions, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2306) recommending that H.B. No. 3122, H.D. 2, as amended in S.D. 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

On motion by Senator Solomon, seconded by Senator George and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3122, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHARGES TO INMATE ACCOUNTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Senator Blair, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2307) recommending that H.B. No. 2410, as amended in S.D. 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Senator Solomon, seconded by Senator George and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2410, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GUARDIANSHIP," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, March 19, 1992.

Senator Matsuura then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"Whenever my name comes out in the newspaper, I'm going to run the Matsuura press called 'The Senate Journal.'

"Let me reiterate that the articles that came out today, I have no complaints. I thought they were very accurate and well-written. However, there is one thing that I want to correct regarding Mr. Takemoto's comments.

"What happened was that there are two documents that are critical to the public hearing that is going to occur tomorrow. One was a 1985 study, 'Telecommunication Master Plan for the State,' and the other, a 1989 study, 'An Evaluation of the PBX and Selex Solutions.'

"According to the article today, Mr. 'Takemoto said he didn't know of the 1989 study until Matsuura requested it, and said his office was delayed in delivering it to Matsuura because a copy of the report could not be found until this weekend.'

"The knowledge of the existence that 1989 study was from a letter that Mr. Takemoto wrote to Mamoru Yamasaki dated February 10 and he states that in 1989 the state conducted its own evaluation of the PBX and Selex solutions and decided against getting into the telephone business at that time. Mr. Takemoto also wrote a similar letter to me on February 12th with the same language that they did that evaluation study between the Selex and PBX. Again, he wrote to me on February 13th saying that the state conducted its own evaluation of the PBX and Selex solutions. After getting three letters from Mr. Takemoto stating the existence of the 1989 study that made them decide to go with the Selex system, that I wrote to him on February 24th requesting for a copy of the study. I will read a portion of my letter to Mr. Takemoto: 'In your letter February 12, 1992 and February 13, 1992 addressed to me, you mention that in 1989 the state conducted its own evaluation of PBX and Selex solutions and decided against getting into the telephone business at that time. Please send me right away a copy of the 1989 evaluation study that was done." That was my first letter. I followed it with four other letters requesting that that report be sent to me right away. That report finally came to me yesterday at exactly 3:30 p.m, twenty-one days later.

"What he quoted in the article is incorrect. He knew of the existence of this study on February 10th because he wrote three separate letters, referring to that 1989 study. Senator Holt, rising on a point of personal privilege, then asked if the previous speaker would yield to a question. The President posed the question to Senator Matsuura and the Senator having answered in the affirmative, Senator Holt asked:

"I'm asking a question in regards to a memo that I received as a member of your committee regarding a nondisclosure agreement that Hawaiian Tel has presented to yourself and to the members of the committee, and if we want information on the breakdown of costs of the telephones that we have to sign a non-disclosure agreement. Is that correct?"

Senator Matsuura answered:

"That is correct. Mr. Takemoto's letter to me states that the state bought the telephones at a sole source price of \$165.00 per telephone. The bid price for the same instrument was \$66.76. There was a \$100.00 difference between the bid and sole source price of those telephones. I wanted a cost breakdown of the \$100.00 from the telephone jack in my office to my desk. I wanted to know why it was so expensive. When I wrote to Mr. Takemoto, he said that this question should be referred to GTE. wrote a letter to GTE asking them for a breakdown of the cost from my office telephone jack to my telephone. The GTE representative said that they have the cost breakdown which they are willing to show me. However, before they can show it to me, I gotta sign this nondisclosure agreement. In other words, if I sign this document, there is no way I can talk to anyone about the subject matter again. I called the Senate Majority attorney and I asked him, 'Should I sign?' He said, "Don't sign it because once you sign it you can't even discuss the matter with your staff.' I refused to sign it."

Senator Holt then continued:

"In follow-up, Mr. President, regarding the memo from the chairman and the non-disclosure agreement. I have a problem with that. I've been here 14 years and I would think that the Legislature, having appropriated those public monies, is entitled to whatever information is requested, not only as a representative of the taxpayers but also as a customer. We are entitled to that information as to how much we are spending for the telephones. I think that it's pretty appalling. That's all. Thank you."

The Chair then interjected:

"It's my understanding, Senator Matsuura, that you will be having a hearing tomorrow?"

Senator Matsuura answered:

"Yes, Mr. President, the hearing will be at 3:00 p.m. tomorrow. Questions will be asked for the reasons for going sole source. There are studies that the state, the University of Hawaii and the Judiciary have conducted that recommend that the state should proceed immediately with its own PBX system. The University of Hawaii study recommended that they should go with a PBX system. The Judiciary also did a study and their report also indicated that they should go with the PBX system. The 1985 detailed study shows that the state should have gone with its own PBX system. But for some reason, the state went sole source on the Selex system. Since going sole source and having paid an extra \$100.00 per telephone is difficult to explain to the public. When the state bought it from NTI there was one price. When the state bought the terminals through Hawaiian Tel there was an additional \$88.00 difference in price. Why go through GTE and get the identical thing, for \$88.00 more? We're talking about large quantities of terminals. I would like to get

information as to the price difference but I may have to sign the non-disclosure agreement to get that information.

"The reason GTE says that I gotta sign this nondisclosure statement is because they feel that selling telephones is not a regulated activity of GTE; it's unregulated. If they tell me their profit margin, etc., it puts them at a disadvantage in future bids. My response to that is that we have already bought the telephones. A difference of \$100.00 between sole source and bid price from the same company appears very excessive. That's the reason why I want the information to explain to the public."

The Chair interjected:

"Very simply put, the advice from our attorney is that you should not sign that agreement if you intend to proceed with the hearing tomorrow. No member of the committee should be required to sign the agreement, I agree with you. But, the advice of our attorney, I am told, was that your committee people shouldn't sign."

Senator Matsuura responded:

"But, if anyone wants to sign, they are free to do so and GTE will bring the documents to your office for you to sign. They will then provide you with the cost breakdown of the \$100.00. However, you cannot share that information with anyone else who has not signed the non-disclosure document."

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:19 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Solomon, seconded by Senator George and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Wednesday, March 18, 1992.

THIRTY-SIXTH DAY

Wednesday, March 18, 1992

Senator Matsuura then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"I owe my good friend the Senator from Kalihi and all the Hawaiians an apology for my remarks about Captain Cook.

"This is an explanation for my comment yesterday. When all of you were talking about green blood and orange blood, etc., I made a stupid comment about Captain Cook.

"What made me think about that comment was the incident I experienced in 1953 when I was on my way to ROTC summer camp, Camp Gordon, in Augusta, Georgia. On the train from Chicago to Atlanta, Georgia, I met a Hawaiian on the train. He and I became good friends. We had to catch a bus from Atlanta to Augusta so we got our luggage and we ran to the taxi stand. A taxi came by and the driver was black. As soon as he pulled up, we put our luggage in the cab. He asked us to wait. He asked me whether I was white or black. I said I was white. He asked me to wait and said I couldn't get into his cab. I asked why and he said he could only take black passengers. He explained that a white driver could take a black or white passenger. I told him, 'Nah, nah, nah, nah, nah, I'm not white, I'm black.' The Hawaiian guy was dark so he could have passed for black. The driver said he could not take a chance because if I happen to be white, he would lose his license. The cab driver went and got the train conductor from the terminal. He was white. He looked at me curiously but asked the Hawaiian, 'What kind of blood do you have?' My friend said he has white man's blood. The conductor looked at my friend and asked him what he meant. My friend said, 'My ancestors ate Captain Cook.'

"That is how I remember the history about Captain Cook. I thought I should explain that.

"Anyway, this whole true story has a tragic ending because we had to wait for a white driver to arrive and that took a few minutes and we missed our bus to Augusta, Georgia."

Senator Fernandes Salling responded:

"I think maybe one way of putting to rest the question of who ate Captain Cook is for Senator Eloise Tungpalan, myself and Senator Solomon to start making arrangements for 'kalua Matsuura.'"

Senator Matsuura answered:

"Taste's pretty good!"

Senator Cobb then added:

"I can't resist, when I came in I heard the voice of the great Matsuura.

"I remember about 14 years ago I had a run-in with the then Speaker of the House Henry Peters and I had to remind him finally on the floor of the body that the dispute really started 200 years ago when his ancestors started eating my ancestors and I thought it was time that it came to a stop. But I think if we're going to have a 'kalua Matsuura' we should invite the distinguished Representative from Nanakuli to attend to sample the wares and see whether or not it passes muster."

Senator McMurdo also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege to announce the winners of yesterday's door decoration contest very quickly. "Representative Mike O'Kieffe brought around the judges resolution yesterday. They sort of gave us a bottle of wine because they thought my office had really worked, but it wasn't really a prize.

"The grand prize went to Senator Koki's very fine team; first prize to Senator Nakasato's team; second prize to Senator McCartney's team; third prize to Senator Mizuguchi's team; fourth prize to Senator Iwase's team; and honorable mention went to the 'Best Political Statement,' none other than our distinguished Senator who claims to be Irish-Portuguese-Hawaiian and whatever else, Senator Crozier. Thank you."

Thursday, March 19, 1992

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 11:45 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Dale Burke, Christ Lutheran Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Aki, Fernandes Salling and Nakasato who were excused.

Senator Reed said, "They are here lobbying for funding for a cafeteria at Princess Nahienaena Elementary School."

Senator Crozier introduced Mr. John Clark of New Zealand as follows:

"Mr. President, this morning I am extremely proud to introduce a gentleman who allowed me to work under his tutelage in the Office of Maori Affairs or the 'Manatu Maori' during my six-week stay in New Zealand last October. You have heard some of my stories of New Zealand since the session began.

"I traveled throughout the country and learned how the Maoris are struggling to resolve some of their problems. Some of which are very similar to the problems of the Hawaiians here - land problems, leasehold. Where Bishop Estate is trying to save their lands from 55-year leases, the Maoris have leases that are set in perpetuity so that will take a long time for the lands to come back.

"When I was talking to the gentleman this morning he asked me, 'Mike, when you tell your New Zealand stories, does anyone listen?' I told him that one way that I do it is to invite people to my office, lock the door and force them to listen. The other way is for me to grab hold of the mike on the floor so everyone would listen.

"Seriously, Mr. President, when I left New Zealand they gave me this 'pounamu' stone carved in the shape of a 'patu' or club. A club could be used to pound fish or abalone or it could be used as a war implement and me being a peace-loving person I'd never think of it in that vein.

"I am honored to introduce John Clark and ask that he stand to be recognized."

Mr. Clark, seated in the audience, rose to be recognized.

Senator Blair then said:

"Mr. President, on a point of personal privilege or perhaps a point of inquiry, I was wondering if Senator Chang would yield to question?"

The Chair posed the inquiry to Senator Chang and he responded:

"May I hear the question, Mr. President?"

Senator Blair asked:

"Mr. President, I look around and I see many of my colleagues dressed in such well-known brands as Brooks Brothers, Georgio Armani and Yves St. Laurent. But I was wondering, where does one go to obtain a jacket by the designer 'Cable Ship Charles L. Brown?'"

Senator Chang responded:

"Mr. President, ordinarily I would not yield to a question of that kind but inasmuch as my colleague from Makiki has a great need for sartorial splendor, I will pass on a hint.

"My couturier's name is Charles Schulz. He draws a comic strip, and upon proper application, the good Senator from Makiki can also obtain a Charles Brown blazer. Thank you."

Senator McCartney then said:

"Mr. President, just a point of inquiry.

"I know one of Charley Brown's nicknames is 'Blockhead' so if you could just clarify that I would appreciate it."

Senator Chang answered:

"This is correct, Mr. President, although in local society the term is 'chiburu.'"

Senator A. Kobayashi also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, yesterday, Senator Solomon and I were not at session because we were at the hearing of the Executive Appointments Committee. During session, yesterday, I understand the winners of the St. Patrick's Day door decoration contest were announced and there was not a single female name on the list. We wondered why and then we concluded that it was because they were all male judges.

"It just doesn't seem fair because Senator Blair always gets noted as being well-dressed because his collar is always well-buttoned and his tie is always in place. Senator Crozier is always noted as the most creative dresser because of his shirt and tie combinations. Senator Chang always gets noted as being a fashion plate. So all the men are winning all the awards. I hope next year some of the women can be considered when these contests are going on.

"Thank you."

The Chair interjected:

"I would like to mention that Senator Iwase has on 'white' because he's clean."

Senator McMurdo rose to respond:

"Mr. President, I would like to address the remarks of the previous speaker.

"I think that one of the reasons that the judges didn't pick any of the women, except yours truly, is that with the exception of, I believe, the Senator in the magenta dress (Senator Tungpalan) there, I don't recall that there were many artistic or creative or different doors by any of the other females. And, of course, as for the good Senator over there (Senator George), her's was stolen so that eliminated her. I think that's what it is, but we will speak to the judges. The big reason there aren't any women judges is that there were no women over there (in the House), when we originally started, that you could attach the 'O' to. Perhaps we'll see what we can do."

Senator A. Kobayashi in response then said:

"Mr. President, perhaps if we did have a female judge then they would see the female point of view, which is always the problem. The female would be able to see the artistic nuance that is in the door decoration. Thank you."

Senator McMurdo answered:

"Mr. President, the thing that I want to say is that most of the doors weren't done by the men, the male Senators. The decorating was done by their female staff, who, as you know, does all the work anyway."

Senator Matsuura also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, on a point of personal privilege. I would just like to make a few comments.

"I know that the judges were very biased because the good Senator (Crozier) here had the Irish 'unagi' on his door and he didn't win. His poster provided knowledge in that Irishmen and Europeans ate as much 'unagi' as the Japanese, Koreans and Chinese. However, I never heard of green 'unagi' before! Must be a new specie called 'Anguilla Irishcrozierancea.'

"Seriously, Mr. President, I want to speak regarding the public hearing that we had yesterday. There was a very nice article about the hearing in this morning's paper. I gotta congratulate the reporter. This article was well-written. If I were a professor, this would have gotten an 'A+.'

"One of the things I learned investigating the GTE sole source contract is that I discovered a very interesting fact regarding sole source contracts and other contracts. There are two legitimate ways in awarding a state contract without going through the bid process.

"The first way is how it was done with the state Selex system. It went as a sole source to GTE Hawaiian Tel for \$3.7 million. The second way in which the state gives constracts is through consultant contracts. These consultant contracts can go to a firm stating that that company is the only company that can provide the service, whatever it is.

"An example of the latter contract is one that was given to Robin and Deckerman. My knowledge of this contract came in one of the correspondence from Mr. Takemoto to me. Contract No. 29095 awarded to Robin and Deckerman was for \$80,000. DAGS sent a copy of that contract to me. However, what they failed to send to me was an amendment to that contract. That amendment has the same contract number. This contract jumped from \$80,000 to \$212,275.00 just by an amendment.

"The problem with this procedure is that you can have a sole source, just like Robin and Deckerman and the amount of the contract can be increased to any dollar level with amendments. I don't know if this practice of adding amendments is applicable to the bid process. I hope not!

"I'm citing these examples so all of you who are chairman of different subject areas can take a look at some of the sole source and consultant contracts because through the amendment process the initial dollar figure can be accelerated to very large amounts. I just want to share with you what I have found out.

"The thing that bothers me is, here is a company that started out with a \$80,000 contract and within ten months goes up to \$212,000. I examined the scope of work of this so called consultant contract. Any number of companies in Hawaii could have done this work. I asked the consultant who was at the hearing, 'Has your company bid for any of the contracts that go out on bid?' He said, 'Yes.' They bid on nearly all of the telecommunication contracts. I asked him if his company was ever awarded any of the contracts and he said 'no.' Nevertheless, this company (Robin and Deckerman) has received three consulting contracts from the State of Hawaii.

"The sole source contract amount for the Selex system started at \$3.7 million. It's over \$9 million now. There are other higher costs to the Selex system. The basic telephone line that you have in your office is costing the taxpayers \$9.83. However, the features on your phone such as mute, auto dial, speed call, conference, ring again, IC 10, the taxpayers are paying \$14.30 per month per phone. The basic telephone line cost \$9.83, plus \$14.30 for all the features. I don't know how many of you use the features on your phone but we are stuck with it for the next three years.

"The other thing that is really kind of hard to understand is that some of you are going to see all of these unused telephones in your offices during the interim because all your staff have private lines. The reason why you can't disconnect them is because if you do it will cost the taxpayers about \$170.00 to disconnect the phone and \$170.00 to re-connect the line when we meet again in January. So when you add up the costs, it's better to just pay the monthly phone bill. We're stuck with this unreasonable contract.

"With that, Mr. President, thank you very much."

Monday, March 23, 1992

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 11:38 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Elder Paul Martin, President, Afro-American Ministerial Alliance, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chang, Ikeda, McMurdo and Wong who were excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Eighth Day.

Senator Solomon then rose to honor and introduce the Beamer 'Ohana and yielded the floor to Senator George who began to read the certificate honoring Helen Desha Beamer and the Beamer 'Ohana.

Senator George said:

"Mr. President, I have a distinct honor this morning of beginning what I believe will be a general expression of jubilation. I'd like to read part of the statement honoring the Helen Desha Beamer and Beamer 'Ohana, as you can see very, very definitely present with us.

"'Whereas, the State of Hawai'i now celebrates the Year of the Family that focuses on all that a family can contribute to the life of our Hawai'i Nei by perpetuating and sustaining an ea or spirit that nurtures, instilling the capacity for responsibly undertaking and encouraging the development of an individual's diverse skills and talents that may enhance the quality of all of our lives; and,""

Senator George then yielded the floor to Senator A. Kobayashi who followed with:

"'Whereas, in each family there are the <u>kupuna</u>, who by their own distinguished example and witness, inspire their <u>keiki</u>, <u>mo'opuna</u> and <u>'ohana</u> to take delight in their cultural heritage and, in turn, teach their children to teach their children the legacies of their forebearers; and,'"

Senator A. Kobayashi then yielded the floor to Senator Solomon who continued:

"'Whereas, the late Helen Kapuailohia Desha Beamer, the eldest daughter of Isabell Hale'ala Miller and George Langhern Desha and wife of Peter Carl Beamer, was a supremely gifted composer, <u>kumu hula</u> of the first rank and fine coloratura, fluent in the Hawaiian language and steeped in the cultural lore and mores of the Hawaiian people, composed an extraordinary wealth of <u>haku mele</u> and choreographed classic expressions of <u>hula</u> that inextricably intertwine a profound Hawaiian <u>Aloha</u> for place and people with depth and grace; and,

"'Whereas, the Beamers raised five children including Milton Ho'olulu, Francis Kealai'inohopono, Harriet Kekahiliokalani Leilehua, Peter Carl Kaleika'apunihonua and Helen Elizabeth Kawohikukapulani and taught them to take pride in their heritage that, in turn bore fruition in that they all became talented musicians, singers, composers and dancers; and,

"'Whereas, Helen Desha Beamer, "Sweetheart Grandma" as she was affectionately named by her grandchildren, passed on to her daughter, Helen Elizabeth Kawohikukapulani, the <u>Hula</u>, and daughter-inlaw, Louise Leiomalama Walker Beamer, the fine points of the Hawaiian dance and song enabling Aunty Lou to become a master teacher for a long number of years; and,

"'Whereas, "Sweetheart Grandma" in turn, passed on to her <u>na</u> <u>mo'opuna</u>, Helen Ka'aloehukaipua'ena "Sunbeam" Desha Beamer, Edwin Mahi'ai Copp Beamer, Winona "Nona" Beamer and Flora Leiomalama "Tita" Beamer Solomon and Cleighton Keolamaikalani Desha Beamer, <u>na mana'o</u> to become stellar performers and interpreters of Hawaiian song and dance and all of whom are now justly recognized as living treasures held in public esteem for their own prowess and expertise; and,"

Senator Solomon then yielded the floor to Senator A. Kobayashi who followed with:

"'Whereas, the <u>mo'opuna</u> of Helen Desha Beamer further inspired a younger generation of talented Beamers that include contemporary artists Keola, Jr. and Kapono a well as Gaye, Malama Solomon, and fifth generation Kumu Hula Hulali Solomon, who carry on the traditions of a highly creative <u>'Ohana</u> of outstanding proponents of all that is best in Hawaiian chant, dance and song; and,'"

Senator A. Kobayashi yielded the floor to Senator Fernandes Salling who continued with:

"'Whereas, the "Songbook of Helen Desha Beamer," edited by Marmionett Leilehua Magoon Ka'aihue and lovingly assisted by Gaye and Mahi Beamer, is a wonderful invaluable compilation of compositions, and anecdotal and photographic records of a bygone era that preserves an important legacy in Hawaiian music for all to enjoy and use; and,'"

Senator Fernandes Salling yielded the floor to Senator Tungpalan who followed with:

"'Whereas, the generosity and patronage of Princess Abigail Kinoiki Kekaulike Kawananakoa and the A. K. Kawananakoa Foundation insure the preservation of the lifetime contributions and work of the late Helen Desha Beamer; the songbook serves as an important resource for generations to come and is underscored by the special spirit of "Sweetheart Grandma" that embodies the spirit of aloha i kekahi i kekahi or genuine respect for all people regardless of race, class or origin - Ua ola 'o ia i loko o kana mau mele - She lives on through her songs; now, therefore,

"Be it resolved by the Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992 that it recognizes the extraordinary musical and dancing talent of Helen Kapuailohia Beamer and expresses gratitude for her gift of the supremely talented Beamer <u>'Ohana</u> which has for generations provided pleasure and happiness through cultural renditions; and,

"'Be it further resolved that this certificate be presented to Mahi Beamer, grandson of "Sweetheart Grandma," who is the steward of the musical talents of the Beamer <u>'Ohana</u> and who has been the leader in the dissemination and perpetuation of the cultural legacy of Helen Desha Beamer; and,'"

Senator Tungpalan yielded the floor to Senator Solomon and Senator Solomon concluded:

"'Be it further resolved that certificates also be presented to Helen Elizabeth, Louise, "Sunbeam," "Nona," "Tita," Keola Jr., Kapono, Gaye, Hulali, Malama, Marmionett, and Princess Abigail.' "Mr. President, at this time, I'd like to introduce the historian of the Beamer 'Ohana, my uncle Mahi. (Uncle Mahi stood to be recognized.)

"We will be presenting certificates to those family members who have been instrumental in carrying on the wonderful legacy of our Beamer 'Ohana - my grandma Louise Leiomalama Beamer, my uncle Keola Beamer, my mama 'Tita' Beamer, my auntie 'Sunbeam' Helen Beamer, and uncle Sonny Beamer, my auntie Marmionett Ka'aihue, my cousin Gaye Beamer, my cousin Kapono Beamer who will be receiving the certificates for Keola Jr. as well as Auntie Nona, and my sister Hulali."

All of the honorees, seated on the floor of the Senate, stood to be recognized and were presented the Senate certificate and leis.

Senator Solomon thanked the Senate Women's Caucus for sponsoring the certificate honoring the Beamer 'Ohana, and recognized and introduced the following family members and friends who were seated in the audience: Miss Laurie Wong of Andrew's Restaurant who provided the food for the family reception; Gard Kealoha who wrote the certificate; auntie Miriam and uncle Buddy Desha; nephews Alana and Mauloa; dad Randy Solomon; auntie Martha Beamer; auntie Lei Becker; cousin Gannar Dahlberg; uncle Merv Thompson; auntie Miki Beamer; grand-aunt Virginia Harrison; auntie Tita Elizabeth Spellman; auntie Maka Ka'aihue; Jim Bartel, a family friend and representing the Kawananakoa Foundation; Hanapau and Nathan Napooka; Kawiki Aqui; Sam Kaha'anui; and Boyce Rodrigues.

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 2430 (Gov. Msg. No. 214):

Senator A. Kobayashi moved that Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 2430 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Hagino and carried.

Senator A. Kobayashi then moved that the Senate consent to the nomination of ROBERT G. KLEIN for Associate Justice to the State Supreme Court, for a term of ten years, in accordance with the provisions of Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution, seconded by Senator Hagino.

Senator A. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the nominee and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the nomination of Robert G. Klein to the State Supreme Court.

"The hearing on the appointment of Judge Klein to the Supreme Court went on for nearly three hours. The room was filled with people testifying in his favor, and although they were asked to summarize or to just stand and say that they stood by their testimony, it still took nearly three hours for everyone to say what they had to say, which was all wonderful. So today, I'm not going to repeat all those wonderful things that were said about Judge Klein, such as, that he is the best circuit court judge, and that having him on the Supreme Court would be a great plus not only for the Judiciary, but for the entire State of Hawaii.

"Today, I'm going to tell you about another side of him, such as, he knows how to pitch a softball a certain way, and even got me to pitch the ball that way so it reached the catcher, which I've never done before. Also, after the birth of his baby, he took leave to help his wife take care of their baby. Even today, he has the night shift and he gets up to help change the baby's diaper and to help with feeding the baby. He is this kind of a person.

"The night before his hearing, while most people are quite nervous about their upcoming hearing as they just don't know what to expect, rather than preparing his statement and going over his previous cases, he was at home making baby formula. He is just such a wonderful person. He'll make a wonderful judge because he is such a good human being.

"I urge your support of Judge Klein's nomination to the Supreme Court."

Senator Solomon also rose to support the nominee and remarked:

"Mr. President, I too speak in support of the nominee.

"Mr. President, the thing that impresses me most about Judge Klein is that even when controversial issues were brought before the committee he answered with ease and stood firm. We Hawaiians refer to that as 'onipaa,' which means 'stood steadfast.'

"Judge Klein has had 20 years of professional law experience in various positions in both the public and private sectors which has exposed him to the many facets of legal implications.

"I am impressed by the endorsements of his peers who cite his many outstanding judicial attributes. He is known for his fairness, impartiality, and objective interpretation of the law. As one of his supporters said, 'In Judge Klein's court even the losers have always felt as if they had been given a fair shake.'

"Also, Mr. President, we need a judge who is sensitive to what is happening in today's changing world, ... a judge who understands Hawaii's cultural diversity. I feel confident that Judge Klein will fulfill these needs with ease and trust.

"Judge Klein, I feel will be an asset to the Hawaii State Supreme Court, and it gives me great pleasure, Mr. President, to urge my fellow colleagues to vote 'yes' on this nominee. Thank you."

Senator Blair also spoke in support of Judge Klein and said:

"Mr. President, I also rise in favor of the confirmation of Judge Klein.

"I understand that Ron Moon is also a very good softball player and I'm wondering if that is one of the criteria that's being used by the Judicial Selection Committee. Whether it is or not, it is widely recognized in the bar, bordering on universally recognized in the bar, that Judge Klein is not only as hard working as any judge who's ever served at the circuit court level, but also is quick to separate the wheat from the chaff on any issue that is presented to him. The gain of the Supreme Court is certainly going to be the loss of the Circuit Court, but I think we all have to put our best people in the highest positions and we're certainly doing that in confirming Judge Klein to become Justice Klein. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura added his support and said:

"Mr. President, I also rise to speak in favor of this nominee. Any person who can teach Kobayashi to pitch deserves to be on the Supreme Court and any person who teaches her to catch a fly ball should be the next CJ.

"Seriously, Mr. President, although I do not sit on the confirmation committee I am one of the most strongest critics against lawyers but, I must admit, when I met Judge Klein I was totally impressed. Here is an individual, I know, was raised with love and affection. I wish his parents were here today because I would have loved to meet them. Anyone could see that a person with Judge Klein's character has been influenced by wonderful parents.

"I examined Judge Klein's background, both legal and personal. He has a terrific background! More than anything else this individual has 'heart.' He excels in good common sense, fairness and justice. I really was impressed!

"Thank you."

Senator Reed also supported the nominee and stated:

"Mr. President, I also rise to add my comments in support of the nominee. I have never played softball with Bob Klein nor have I ever sampled his baby formula, but I have had the unique opportunity of defending myself about ten years ago on a week long trial before Judge Klein. I found him to be fair, firm, and with enough courage to be decisive, and have watched him closely because of that contact with him then.

"Over the years I have watched his courtroom decisions, those that have been publicized, and have been consistently impressed with that; his willingness to take a stand to interpret the laws he sees it into and to voice that opinion despite whatever controversy might be attached. "I find him to be a highly intelligent and very wellqualified judge and, certainly, he would be a credit to the State Supreme Court. I wish him well."

Senator B. Kobayashi also added his support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the nominee.

"Some of the things that we heard about the nominee were as mentioned -- support for him because of fairmindedness, integrity, hard work. People mentioned that Judge Klein was always prepared; that he was quick in turning around decisions which was certainly helpful to the bar here. It seems that in 14 years on the bench he's had many opportunities to make all kinds of controversial decisions, but during this time has had very good reviews by his fellow attorneys who say that they appreciate appearing before him. A comment was made that he was perhaps the best motions judge that people have seen in the First Circuit, and that he has during this time acquitted himself well in a variety of cases that have stretched from complex to controversial.

"I think that we can be assured that Judge Klein will serve well in our State Supreme Court. Thank you."

Senator Cobb then added:

"Mr. President, speaking in support of the nominee.

"I'm going to be voting for Judge Klein although I have to acknowledge that I don't agree with all of the decisions, particularly the one on the right of initiative which I did consider to be a right. It was in county charters, but unfortunately not provided for in the state law.

"I think one of the differences that we look at and why I have chosen to vote for the nominee is not only the record that was cited in terms of his actions as a motions judge and his compassion but the carry-over effect that a sitting judge does not really have an opportunity to display his philosophy, judicial philosophy, as does a Supreme Court Justice. And unless you have a long record of case decisions you do not really have an opportunity to examine that philosophy. But as some of my colleagues have mentioned previously, his caring, his compassion, his concern for the little person in court, his ability and willingness to make a decision quickly and stand by that decision, I think, augers well for the future in terms of judicial philosophy.

"And when we look at nominees to the Supreme Court I think we need to be concerned with that because of what's happened on the national level and the sudden turn to the right of the U.S. Supreme Court, so much so to the point now that a woman's right to choice is now threatened nationally. So I think it is highly relevant for members of the confirming body to look at the potential philosophy of the nominee. And the background and character of this nominee, I think, have impressed me to the point where I'm quite willing to support him and I only wish that I had the opportunity to meet with him personally and discuss softball and other things before this confirmation. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator A. Kobayashi, at this time, introduced Judge Robert G. Klein and Mrs. Klein who were seated in the audience.

Senator Matsuura rose to speak in support of the bill and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of this measure. However, I would like to request that GTE Hawaiian Tel purchase their 911 equipment through a bid process rather than sole source.

"The reason I am making this request on the floor is that I didn't think it was appropriate to put this request into the resolution nor into the committee report. History dictates that we end sole source telecommunication procurement in Hawaii by the State of Hawaii!

"Back in the '70s GTE Hawaiian Tel was found guilty in an anti-trust action in the United States District Court. In the '80s GTE Hawaiian Tel purchased, through noncompetitive procurement, hundreds of millions of dollars worth of equipment. One notable equipment was the GTD-5 central office switching equipment. Unfortunately, this equipment was a poor choice. GTD-5 is no longer being made. What makes this not okay is that the ratepayers in Hawaii paid for the hundreds of millions dollars worth of purchases from GTE Hawaiian Tel. GTE Hawaiian Tel bought all of the equipment from GTE on the mainland, their main company, by sole source and not through competitive bidding.

"In the 1990s, state procurements of communication services and equipment have followed the same pattern, sole source contracts. So it goes back to the '70s, to the '80s and into the '90s, and we are still following the same pattern, no competitive bidding.

"A case in point. The state bought two identical telephones -- one cost \$167.00 and the other \$67.00. The difference is that the \$167.00 telephone was purchased through sole source and the other at \$67.00 on a bid process, the difference of \$100.00.

"The reason why I'm asking that Hawaiian Tel go through the bidding process on their 911 equipment is because there is an array of 911 equipment that is available. Most of the states have the 911 system so I know there is a variety of equipment available. GTE Hawaiian Tel should look for the best equipment at the lowest price because we, ratepayers, are going to pay for it. That is the reason I am insisting that the telephone company be encouraged to go through the bidding process to purchase the 911 equipment."

Senator Cobb, in support of the bill, said:

"Mr. President, speaking in support of the bill with reservations.

"I am familiar with the fact that back in the 1980s there was a problem with GTE equipment. At that time, I don't believe Hawaiian Tel was owned by GTE or its subsidiary. But in deference to the remarks of the chairman and previous speaker, I think if there is going to be a request for bid it ought to be built right into the bill. In fact, any telecommunications service, paid for by the taxpayers, should be subject to public bid. It's nice and I agree with the philosophy to request bids but I think bid should be a matter of mandate, not a request, not a persuasion, not by asking. Given the history of what's happened on this subject recently, I feel very strongly we should be moving emphatically in the direction of requiring bids in all cases.

"Thank you."

Senator Holt then rose on a point of inquiry as follows:

"Mr. President, will Senator Matsuura yield to a question?"

The Chair having posed the question to the Senator and Senator Matsuura having answered in the affirmative, Senator Holt asked:

"Mr. President, I would like to know if the Senator from Hilo has received phone calls from Russell Okata, Dolly Ching or Tom Enomoto in the last couple of days?"

Senator Matsuura answered: "No."

Senator Holt continued:

"Mr. President, the reason I ask is because the Advertiser has been running a series of articles on power in politics in Hawaii and, yesterday, I read that they referred to Russell Okata as Russell Nakata; this morning's paper, there is a picture of Doris Ching of the University of Hawaii instead of Dolly Ching of the Bank of Hawaii; and they had a picture of Tom Enomoto of HVB instead of Tom Enomoto of DURA.

"I would suspect that they would be calling the Senator from Hilo to revive the newspaper bill relating to corrections."

Senator Matsuura responded:

"Are you trying to get me into more trouble with the media?

"In response to the question, Mr. President, I think that the Advertiser should get a picture of the Senator from Kalihi as one of the 'powers.' I know where the real power in the Senate is and I think his picture should be there. Thank you."

Senator McCartney rose to comment:

"Mr. President, on a point of personal privilege (I just cannot resist a comment), it just goes to show how much the Advertiser knows."

Senator Tungpalan rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, it's really unfortunate, when I picked up the paper this morning and read about major archaeological sites in the H-3 path, that I found out that the Department of Transportation, it seems, is willing to sacrifice a heiau. They are saving the male heiau but they are saying that the woman's heiau can be placed on the sacrificial altar because there isn't a way to save both sites. The commentary here is that I just hope that Dr. Barry Nakamura, who brought this to everyone's attention, won't have a single hair misplaced by his employer, the Bishop Museum, because of the courageous stand that he took this morning.

"Protecting Hawaii's historic sites is a bread and butter issue for Hawaii because tourism is dependent on having unique cultural sites such as these heiaus to bring people to our islands. When are we going to recognize that fact? Maybe Senator Solomon will be able to speak a little bit more about this subject because when you pick up magazines such as the 'Holiday Travel' magazine that I subscribe to, you notice HVB really praising the charms that these sites have. The allurement of Hawaii is because of these really unique archaeological finds. The heiaus, Kamehameha's birth site on the Big Island, the Kane heiau, and the Kukui pahu heiau are all sites that, believe it or not, are being threatened right now by development. I'm happy to say that at least the governor and some senators here, as well as representatives and corresponding committees on the House side, want to save these areas because we recognize the unique relationship they have to our tourist industry.

"We all recognize that without tourism we will be really hard put to fund the programs in education, to give homes to the homeless, to allow our people to have jobs, because it does have a multiplying effect when people come here and spend money and because we do see and reap the benefits. So why is it that we have to read from the Advertiser a statement along these lines that it's not important to save these sites.

"I visited maybe six or seven heiaus throughout all of our island chain and I have yet to see a woman's heiau. I'm just so stunned that people in this state don't recognize this as a major significant find. Well, I want to thank Dr. Barry Nakamura for his posture and his courage and let me tell you, next year we will be back to investigate the Bishop Museum if a single hair on his head is misplaced or if he is fired. Thank you."

Senator Solomon also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, also on a point of personal privilege and in support of the previous speaker's remarks.

"As you know, I serve as your budget liaison for the Committee on Tourism and Recreation, where we are very concerned that our tourists' visits are getting shorter and shorter. We have come to the conclusion that perhaps our tourist industry is not offering our visitors enough of a variety of things to do.

"In the March edition of 'Holiday Travel' magazine, an excellent 22-page article offers a detailed perspective of what today's tourist is looking for in Hawaii. The article highlighted the importance of our historical sites. This is not anything new to us. I think this Legislature has been in constant turmoil over how to provide an acceptable balance between development and preservation of our historical sites. It is obvious that we have much work to do in order to restore and sustain our cultural and historical integrity. The article states, '... it's not always easy for visitors to tell the islands real culture from kitschy imitation.'

"We should all accept the challenge and responsibility to preserve what we know is real, not just for the malihinis but also for the kamaainas. The article continues, 'Hawaiians themselves are no longer resigned to being trivialized, if they ever were ... Hawaiians have resurged as the fastest growing ethnic group in the state. Whether pure Hawaiian or part, they have also regained pride in their culture and history.'

"Mr. President, we live in a very exciting time. We have the knowledge and the resources to make a difference. We no longer can make excuses when golf course developments are threatening heiaus or when highway developments are bulldozing valuable historical sites. A close look at the history of development on this island makes us realize that this is no longer the way to go. We need to take advantage of the opportunity to save what is left of our ancient cultural sites, particularly on Oahu, where we must act quickly to save what is left.

"In preserving our past, we preserve opportunity for Hawaii's future, ... for our children to experience their cultural heritage and for our visitors to enjoy a broader range of activities."

Senator Tungpalan then responded:

"Mr. President, in light of this need to preserve our historical sites, your Senate Committee on Culture, Arts and Historical Preservation will be having a hearing tomorrow night at 7:00 p.m. in Kohala to do just that -to preserve the Mo'okini heiau and Kamehameha's birth site.

"Believe it or not, there are individuals who reside in our state who are saying, 'Why should we preserve the Kamehameha birth site? Who was he?'

"This is blasphemy when you consider that he is the only Hawaiian who happens to be in the Statuary Hall in Washington, D.C. He's actually the only king. And we need to not only save that area but we need to look at the Mahukona site that is really being threatened right now with development.

"Oftentimes we find ourselves trying to rush in and manage a crisis, as we did with Honakahua. We had to dip into our land banking budget and come up with \$6 million to save that area from being destroyed. There were thousands of burials there and they were unique burials because you had alii buried with commoners. We had to pay \$6 million to remove the development from that area and put them up higher. Now we are faced with the same situation in North Kohala where there is a developer, a Japanese developer, who, believe it or not, owns these precious historic sites. He owns that area near the Kamehameha birth site; he owns the area near the heiau. He is willing to commercialize these areas for his advantage so he can make a pretty buck. Should we stand by and allow this to happen? I say, 'No.'

"I hope that we have the courage to move forward a bill this session to make this a state monument. This is the bill that will be heard tomorrow. It's a big bill because it's saying just that. We believe in putting our words into action by passing a bill to the governor and he says he is committed to pass it into law.

"I hope that the reporters in the area will be there to cover this issue so they can see just what is happening to historic sites like this. It's nice to write articles for the HVB; it's nice to give them \$6 million dollars but if we, on the other hand, are going to just sit by and allow our historic sites to be paved over and have resorts placed on our heiaus then, by golly, there really isn't much that we are really doing here, let me say.

"I'll be very disappointed if a bill doesn't move this session to protect these very treasured sites. Thank you."

Senator McCartney also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I would just like to briefly speak on a personal privilege.

"For the record, I want to commend the chairman of the Culture, Arts and Historic Preservation Committee for having the courage and vision for telling it like it is. Maybe it does make people feel uncomfortable but those are the facts and the issue in North Kohala is a serious one that needs to be addressed and I commend the chairman for going to the community to have a hearing.

"As one Senator, I support the chairman on those efforts.

"On the issue of H-3, it is a sensitive issue but I think we need to move sensitively on it and not just pave over that site and I think the Department of Transportation and the state, including the governor, should get involved and take a look at and see whether the facts are really there because it's very, very important. I don't think anybody is saying that we are using this as a maneuver to stop H-3 but I think we need to be sensitive to Hawaii's past, Hawaii's culture and Hawaii's heritage.

"We are not like the rest of the 49 states. We do things differently here in Hawaii and it's something that we can all be proud of, and I just want to again commend the chairman for taking that stand."

FORTY-FIRST DAY

Wednesday, March 25, 1992

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 11:40 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Allan W.H. Lee, United Church of Christ, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Ikeda, Koki, McMurdo and Nakasato who were excused.

At 11:43 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:44 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fortieth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Fernandes Salling recognized and introduced Jay Munechika, Jack Munechika and Marc Torres, Kauai Boy Scouts, as follows:

"Mr. President, I'm really pleased today to have on the floor with us three outstanding Boy Scouts from the Island of Kauai. Jay and Jack Munechika and Marc Torres passed a real life test of their emergency first aid skills when they saved the life of 17-month-old Yusuke Mizutani on January 27, 1992. Yusuke, I understand, is related to the Munechikas.

"Jay, Jack and Mark demonstrated great maturity and strong presence of mind as they followed proper emergency procedures that they had learned in Boy Scouts to assist baby Yusuke, who had suffered a febrile seizure and had stopped breathing. I understand that he had a very high fever that night and just stopped breathing, and this was rather late in the evening and the boys were at home when they heard the commotion. They were called in and took immediate action. They averted the tragedy by calling 911 for help, which I might point out that it was a good thing that they were able to save the baby's life because the ambulance got lost. Anyway, by taking turns and using rescue breathing techniques, calming excited relatives, reverting to back blows and the Heimlich maneuver when it appeared that rescue wasn't working, and returning to and breathing continuing with the breathing assistance until the baby responded appropriately, in effect saving the life of 17month old Yusuke Mizutani.

"At this time, I would like to introduce Jay Munechika, Jack Munechika and Marc Torres. Please stand to be recognized."

The young gentlemen rose to be recognized and were presented the Senate certificate of recognition and leis by Senators Fernandes Salling, A. Kobayashi, Solomon and George.

Senator Fernandes Salling also introduced Kauai Councilman Joe Munechika and his wife Judy, parents of Jay and Jack Munechika, and Mrs. Marla Torres Lam, mother of Marc Torres, who were seated in the audience.

Senator Tungpalan then introduced Leiko Kurosawa and Chiho Bauske, co-captains of the Pearl City High School Girls' Varsity Softball Team and coach Wes Uyehara as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great honor to present the 16th Annual High School Athletic Association Nissan State Softball Championship Team from Pearl City High School, and these are all girls. You know, this past week we confirmed a new State Supreme Court justice and one of the tributes that was paid to him was the fact that he knew how to play baseball. I hope we don't have to wait that long to get a woman on the Supreme Court, but we do know that we have the talent to be on the court just because you know how to play baseball, at least that's a beginning.

"Here with us today on the floor is their coach, Wes Uyehara, and team co-captains, Leiko Kurosawa and Chiho Bauske. Please rise to be recognized for your outstanding achievement."

The honorees rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and leis by Senators Tungpalan, Iwase and Mizuguchi.

Senator Tungpalan also introduced team members, coaches, and parents who were seated in the audience: team members - Jennifer Au Hoy, Bernice Herodies, Teri Ann Kekona, Bridgette Kong, Sara Lacar, April McCue, Loren Okinaka, Jennifer Ono, Kristin Quitoriano, and Brandee Uniate; coaches - Keoki Nakashima and Gary Iwatani; and parents - Warren and Lenora Okinaka, Glen Kong, Dennis and Marilyn Au Hoy, and Sandra Lacar.

The Chair then said:

"Coach McCartney, do we ask to challenge the Pearl City High School Girls' Varsity Softball Team?"

Senator McCartney responded:

"Mr. President, it is an honor to have the Pearl City High School champions here. We congratulate all of them!

"I do not dare have the Senate softball team with our coach Senator Iwase attempt to challenge the champions. We're having a hard enough time beating President Simone's team. We would be embarrassed to play in Rainbow Stadium in front of 4,000 fans.

"Mr. President, I want to add a personal note that my wife played in the girls' softball championship tournament back in 1979 for University High. She was selected the most valuable player for that tournament as a pitcher.

"I know how difficult it was for all of you to have made it to where you are, and I want to congratulate all of you.

"Mr. President, I don't think we would stand a chance in a challenge. I'd rather we take our chances with President Simone's team."

Senator Matsuura then introduced Mr. and Mrs. Carl Okuyama, visitors from Hilo, who were seated in the audience.

Senator Crozier then introduced Mr. Chris McDonald of the Office of Maori Affairs, New Zealand. Mr. McDonald was invited by Senator Crozier to spend six weeks as an intern in his office.

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 2431 (Gov. Msg. No. 216):

Senator A. Kobayashi moved that Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 2431 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Hagino and carried.

Senator A. Kobayashi then moved that the Senate consent to the nomination of CORINNE K.A. WATANABE for Associate Judge of the Intermediate Appellate Court, for a term of ten years, in accordance with the provisions of Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution, seconded by Senator Hagino.

Senator A. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the nominee and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the nominee.

"There was a tremendous outpouring of support for Corinne Watanabe from people in the community, from the staff of the department of the attorney general, from the public defender's office, department heads and prosecuting attorneys. There were so many people who came forth to express their praise of Corinne Watanabe.

"It can all be summed up best if I read parts of the attorney general's testimony, and I quote: 'Corinne will easily make the transition to the bench because she is a fine lawyer. She possesses a deep strength of character and personal integrity, and has the fortitude to make the tough decisions. She is exceptionally bright and extremely talented as a writer. She is as knowledgeable about the laws of Hawaii as perhaps anybody in this

state. And last but not least, she has an inordinate amount of good old common sense.'

"His last statement is one I would like to echo as words of my own. Warren Price said, 'I can think of no one better suited to represent our state appellate judicial system.'

"Mr. President, I urge all of my colleagues to support Corinne Watanabe, gubernatorial nominee to the Intermediate Appellate Court. Thank you."

Senator Solomon also rose to speak in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, speaking in support of the previous speaker's recommendations, I also would like to add my support and to urge all of my colleagues for positive consideration of the nominee.

"Corinne Watanabe has excellent academic credentials. She received many honors as an undergraduate at the University of Hawaii and at Baylor Law School.

"Numerous testimonies cite her intelligence, understanding of the law, analytical fairness, and impartiality. I was very much impressed with her long service in the attorney general's office where she served as legal counsel to many state departments, boards and commissions. She has had considerable exposure to the innumerable facets of law. I feel, Mr. President, that she would make an excellent judge. Thank you."

Senator Hagino added his support of the nominee as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the nominee.

"Before I start, at the risk of sounding crude, I'm sorry that the Boy Scouts left because I was eating a breath saver before you called me and just before I stood up I kind of swallowed my breath saver. Before I'm through with my speech I may need their services.

"Today, I feel as proud as an expectant father but before the rumor starts I wish to reiterate that my wife is not expecting, but I am proud today. The reason why I'm proud is that Corinne Watanabe is before the Senate for confirmation to the Intermediate Appellate Court. I also was present at the hearing for her confirmation last week and the attorney general, during his presentation, mentioned that one of Corinne's characters was that she has displayed good Wahiawa common sense, and I agree.

"I've known Corinne since high school, and this is not hindsight, but, even way back then anyone who knew her also knew that she displayed qualities of a person that would be extremely successful in any undertaking she chose. Corinne's scholastic record was outstanding and she certainly left her mark at Leilehua High School.

"With all modesty, Mr. President, I too left my mark at Leilehua High School, but that was because I blew up the chemistry lab. And I can see Corinne and her sister laughing and they're probably now saying, 'Oh, so he was the one.' Mr. President, in Corinne we will be getting the very best of her class and, believe me, her class had a lot of cream in it.

"Others will probably speak, or have spoken, about her legal abilities and her competency but I would like to highlight two aspects of her to give us an insight about her character.

"Corinne grew up in the pineapple country of Wahiawa. Her father Keiji worked for Dole Pineapple Company. I don't know his title but when I was working there he was known as one of the big bosses and because of that he certainly could have used his influence to get any of his children the easy jobs during the summer, jobs such as a radio dispatcher. A dispatcher was one who would wait for the pineapple trucks to come in and would staple a shipping tag to the bin and the bin would then be moved on to a bigger trailer truck. I'm sure her father could have probably gotten her that job, or for any of her sisters or brothers, because I certainly saw a lot of supervisors' sons get those jobs. On rainy days they didn't even get out of the building because they would just open the window and attach the tag on to the bin. Those were some of the easy jobs that she could have easily gotten.

"I was fortunate to work my eight summers at Dole, at one time or another with Corinne and her sisters, picking pineapples during the hot summer months. Her brothers also worked in the pineapple fields, picking pineapples. This may not seem like much, but to me it tells a lot about the character of the Amemiya family. Picture yourself being sixteen years old and having to work in this very physical and demanding job. So don't tell me that Corinne's not tough. She certainly is. What she learned there, she will carry through the rest of her life.

"The second point I want to bring out about Corinne is that she is a product of our public schools. I'm proud to admit that I am biased for public schools. Corinne, her brothers and her sisters all went to public schools. In fact, last week I bumped into Corinne at a honors band concert that was held at Leilehua High School and she was there to support her daughter who was a representative of Mililani High School.

"Last night at a function that I attended, I talked to several Whitmore seniors who were entertaining at one of the social events of the year. They wanted me to convey to Corinne their support and their congratulations, and to also express how proud they were of her.

"Mr. President, I think I'd better stop because I'm running out of superlatives and I do want to save some because I honestly feel that Corinne will be before us in the near future again.

"I do want to repeat that, today, all of Wahiawa -- to be more specific, Whitmore Village -- is bursting with pride. So, if I may, Mr. President, to Corinne, on behalf of Gladys Kamisato, Mrs. Nonaka, Betty Ufano, Mrs. Harada, Mr. and Mrs. Tamondong and all the people of Whitmore Village and Wahiawa, in anticipation of your confirmation, want to wish you congratulations and good luck!

"I urge all my colleagues to vote in favor of Corinne Watanabe."

Senator Chang also rose to support the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I presided over the hearings when Corinne Watanabe was nominated as attorney general for the State of Hawaii and, based on the information that was presented to the Senate at that time, I can personally attest that Corinne has the character, temperament and qualifications to be a very good judge.

"I rise today as the closest calabash cousin to certain families in Wahiawa, Haleiwa and Waialua. On behalf of the Matsumotos, Teranishis, Saifukus, Nishimuras, Fukunagas and Nakaharas, we'd like to wish the nominee success in her new endeavors. Thank you." Senator Iwase, at this time, rose to request that he be excused from voting on the nominee (his sister-in-law), and the President so ordered.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 18. Noes, 1 (Reed). Excused, 6 (Cobb, Ikeda, Iwase, Koki, McMurdo, Nakasato).

Senator A. Kobayashi then rose to introduce the Honorable Corinne K.A. Watanabe, seated in the audience, accompanied by her husband and children, mother, and members of her family.

Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 2432 (Gov. Msg. No. 217):

Senator A. Kobayashi moved that Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 2432 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Hagino and carried.

Senator A. Kobayashi then moved that the Senate consent to the nomination of KAREN N. BLONDIN for 15th Judge of the Circuit Court of the First Circuit, for a term of ten years, in accordance with the provisions of Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution, seconded by Senator Hagino.

Senator A. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the nominee and stated:

"Mr. President, the very same day we had the hearing for Corinne Watanabe, we had another lengthy hearing for Karen Blondin. There were over 80 people who sent in testimony supporting her nomination, and I am speaking in support of the nomination.

"Of all the testimonies given, and I have gone through all of them again, there is one testimony from Gerald Sekiya which I would like to read from because it sums up best what everyone else said, and I quote: 'Ms. Blondin was appointed by the court annex arbitration program as an arbitrator in a tort case I handled approximately two years ago. Upon her appointment as an arbitrator in our case, I was initially concerned about Ms. Blondin's apparent lack of experience in personal injury matters and in litigation of tort cases. However, her handling of the situation as an arbitrator was superb. As you may be aware, serving as an arbitrator is very similar to performing the duties and the role of a judge. Our office found her to be very professional, qualified, diligent, conscientious, and to have the kind of demeanor we seek in our judges. Although this experience with her as arbitrator in our case may be considered a limited one, I felt and continue to feel that it serves as a very reliable basis for assessing that Ms. Blondin has the makings and qualifications to become a good trial judge.'

"These very same sentiments were expressed time and time again and, in this large folder of testimonies, Warren Price came forward, the public defender, the prosecutor, and attorneys from all over the state, all attesting to Karen Blondin's fine qualifications and how they know that she will become a very good judge in the circuit court.

"I urge all of you to vote 'yes.' Thank you."

Senator Solomon also supported the nominee and remarked:

"Mr. President, I too would like to support the previous speaker's remarks in urging my colleagues to vote 'yes' on the nominee.

"As you know, Mr. President, we had many testimonies presented in reference to Karen Blondin as to her inadequacy in trial experience and, at that time, the committee did mention that the Judiciary Committee has a resolution to look into the matter in terms of criteria for future judiciary selection concerns. Also, Mr. President, many testimonies, by a wide array of legal minds, did indicate that trial experience is not a compelling criteria. I'm hoping that the Judiciary Committee would seriously take that into consideration, in reference to how we can clarify this matter.

"Mr. President, I feel quite confident that Karen Blondin as the State Ombudsman and as a deputy attorney general has had considerable experience in legal analysis and decision-making. She is said to have done an admirable job in these capacities and is cited for her intelligence, diligence, and objectivity.

"I believe that she would be an asset to the State Judiciary and I am in favor of her confirmation. I urge all my colleagues to support the nominee. Thank you."

Senator Iwase also supported the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the nomination.

"I was watching a debate a couple of weeks ago and a presidential candidate once said of an incumbent of a national office that that person had no core. I'd just like to say that having served as Karen Blondin's supervisor, she is an individual who has a 'core.' She has heart; she has compassion; she has integrity; she works with diligence; she is fair; she cares and she is committed to public service.

"I too sat at the nomination hearing and heard people talk about the trial experience factor. And while I respect the opinion of those who took that point of view, I would hope that in deciding whether or not an individual should be a judge, we would be something more than mere technicians or public accountants, adding up various sterile points, and look at the core of an individual to determine if that person in the long run, over the course of time, would be a good, fair, compassionate judge to the people of this state, and I think Karen Blondin would represent that.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator McCartney also supported the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I too rise to speak in favor of the nomination and I would like to echo the words of the previous speakers. I'd like to speak on the issue of trial experience because I share the concerns of the other two speakers.

"I don't know if trial experience is a necessary criteria to evaluate whether an individual is able and capable to serve on the bench, and I look to the issue of a coach and a player. It doesn't mean that a good coach is necessarily a good player or a good player is necessarily a good coach. We have some fine coaches in all different professional sports who are not good players but they are excellent coaches. I think the same applies to judges and I think that it might even be a benefit that this individual does not have the trial experience and will not come in with some of the biases that people who practice in the courtroom may. I think we need to look at the individual. I think very strongly that Karen has a strong content of character; she has integrity; she has a commitment to fairness; she is intelligent.

"I think, most importantly, she has a sensitivity to Hawaii and what Hawaii is all about; what our unique cultural diversities and heritage are about, and she will take that to the bench. I think that that is something we all can put our hats on and support her on. I wholeheartedly support her confirmation and wish her all the best after that. Thank you."

Senator Chang added his support as follows:

"Mr. President, having presided over many hearings on the qualifications of judicial nominees, my views on the subject of character, temperament and qualifications for judges are already on the record. I could not summarize those views better than my colleagues from Mililani and Kahaluu so I won't reiterate those views today. I just want to add to the qualities that they have described of the nominee. I have worked with her while she has been the ombudsman for the State of Hawaii and find that she brings discipline and diligence to her work. She's very good in factual inquiry, has a strong sense of fairness and strength of mind, resilience and balance, all of which makes her a great judge. I join my colleagues in supporting this nomination. Thank you."

Senator Holt also supported the nomination and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the nominee.

"I have before me a letter I just received from a Howard Chong Jr. I believe he is the former Republican Party chairman locally. One of the statements in his letter says, 'I fully understand this is a political appointment and for my Democrat friends a most difficult one to vote down.' And he goes on in opposition to the nomination.

"I take exception to the statement that I just read. Just to let people know that I'll be voting with a clear conscience, not because the nominee is a woman, though I'm proud of that fact and that we'll have another female judge on the bench; I'm voting for her not because she's local, having been born and raised in Hawaii, though I'm very proud of that; I'm voting for her not because she is part-Hawaiian, though I'm very, very proud of that; I'm voting for her with a clear conscience that this is not a political appointment but rather a vote for our judicial system which needs a balance that an able and sensitive Karen Blondin will bring to the bench.

"I urge all of my colleagues to vote in support of this nomination."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 20. Noes, 1 (George). Excused, 4 (Ikeda, Koki, McMurdo, Nakasato).

At this time, Senator A. Kobayashi introduced the Honorable Karen N. Blondin who was seated in the gallery, accompanied by her parents and friends.

At this time, Senator McCartney rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I just want to rise on a short point of personal privilege, and speak very briefly on the subject of education.

"We have many things that need to be done in our educational system in order to improve the quality of our children's education. I still believe that we work on the 3 Rs -- reform, restructure and provide resources into the system. We just received the completed report of the Governor's Task Force on Educational Governance which has been submitted to all of us for review and comments. As chair of the Education Committee, I would welcome any recommendations, comments and/or feedback that you might have and I believe we will have the opportunity for dialogue with the Lt. Governor and members of the task force in the future.

"Publicly, for the record, I want to say that I think the task force did a good job. They held hearings statewide and got a lot of input, created a lot of debate and discussion and, I believe, the proposal is a solid foundation for us to work off of. It has been a lightning bolt that has sparked a lot of enthusiasm here at the Legislature and people are focusing in on education. I want to commend the task force for that. I think the ball is now in our court and we need to make some very, very tough decisions.

"There's been a lot of controversy evolving, in terms of unions and what their stands have been, but it's been healthy and good for the people. The bottom line in whatever decision we make, students and kids have to come first.

"I want to commend one of the unions for taking a very good stand, a positive stand, as indicated in their newsletter the other day. Some people in our business community have been saying that unions are a barrier, well, if you will look at the HGEA monthly newsletter the headline says, 'We support reforms.' It was one of the best articles I have seen put together supporting schoolcommunity based management (SCBM) and reform in education. I think they should be commended for that. They've taken a bold step to move forward, rather than I want to commend the HGEA for being resistant. moving forward on that and they need to be recognized. think that we need to work more closely and I collaboratively because the issue is not how we are going to stand up and knock each other down. The issue is how we are going to work together collaboratively to find solutions.

"If we believe in SCBM and want people to work collaboratively at the school level, we must not start fighting each other and start taking strong positions and start knocking each other down -- we have to work collaboratively. I think we all need to keep that in mind.

"I just wanted to put that on the record and to share those thoughts with you of something good that is going on out there in education. Thank you."

Senator Chang then rose on a point of parliamentary inquiry as follows:

"Mr. President, following the request of the Senator from Kahaluu to think good thoughts on the last day of the week, inasmuch as tomorrow is a holiday and Friday is a recess, I guess today is the good thoughts day so I rise on a point of parliamentary inquiry.

"Earlier, Mr. President, you had asked the Senate Clerk to note my 'presidence.' My question to you is, is that a permanent or temporary appointment?"

The Chair responded:

"Senator Chang, that was the farthest thought in my mind. So, I stand corrected."

Senator Levin also rose on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I also rise on a point of personal privilege.

"A brief question for Senator McCartney. In his earlier remarks he indicated that being a good coach does not necessarily mean being a good player and vice versa. I'm wondering whether he was insulting Senator Iwase and Senator Crozier's playing ability or their coaching abilities?"

FORTY-SECOND DAY

Monday, March 30, 1992

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 11:40 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Dan Smith, St. Christopher's Episcopal Church, Kailua, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chang, Fernandes Salling, Holt, Ikeda, Mizuguchi and Nakasato who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-First Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator McMurdo, in honor of "National Doctors' Day" and "Doctors' Day in Hawaii," introduced Dr. Stephen J. Wallach, Dr. Paul A. DeMare and Mrs. Maureen Lau of the Hawaii Medical Association (HMA), as follows:

"Mr. President and members of this honorable body, and on behalf of Senator Andrew Levin, it gives me a great deal of pleasure to introduce to you our honored guests: Dr. Stephen J. Wallach, president, HMA; Dr. Paul A. DeMare, president, Honolulu County Medical Society; and Mrs. Maureen Lau, past president, HMA Auxiliary.

"Mr. President, the President of the United States signed a proclamation establishing March 30 as 'National Doctors' Day' in recognition of the valuable contributions physicians have made to the nation and continue to make daily.

"In Hawaii, today, March 30, has been proclaimed 'Doctors' Day in Hawaii' by Governor John Waihee. As a matter of fact, our honorees have just arrived from the governor's office, where they witnessed the signing of the proclamation by the governor. Mr. President, we have observed this event every year as a tribute to all doctors for their role as physicians in caring for the sick, advancing medical knowledge, and promoting improved public health.

"Also, Mr. President, we have in the gallery other members of this distinguished party. These people have taken valuable time off today to be able to witness and participate in these ceremonies in the governor's office, the Senate chamber and the House chamber. As I call your name, please stand to be recognized: Dr. Carl Lehman, president-elect Honolulu County Medical Society; Mrs. Susan Fuu, treasurer and publicity chairperson, HMA Auxiliary; Ms. Jan Estioka, director of communications, HMA.

"Mr. President, I won't read the entire certificate but just portions of it:

'Whereas, approximately 586,000 physicians in 37 specialties practice medicine in the United States today, each play an important role in meeting America's need; and

'Whereas, Doctors' Day was first observed on March 30, 1933, by the Georgia State Legislature on the occasion of the first use of ether anesthesia in surgery and by a native Georgian, Dr. Crawford W. Long, "the object to be the well-being and honor of the profession, its observance demanding some act of kindness, gift or tribute in remembrance of the doctor"; and

'Whereas, in November 1990 the President of the United States signed a proclamation designating March 30th as National Doctors' Day and the governor of the State of Hawaii has annually proclaimed March 30th as Doctors' Day in Hawaii since 1988, and it is appropriate to continue that observance; now, therefore,

'Be It Resolved by the Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii that the National Doctors' Day and Doctors' Day in Hawaii be observed on March 30, 1992, in Hawaii to honor physicians in Hawaii and in the United States for their invaluable contributions in caring for the sick, advancing medical knowledge and promoting public health.'"

The honorees, seated on the floor of the Senate, stood to be recognized and were presented the Senate certificate of recognition by Senator McMurdo. Senators Tungpalan, Solomon and Levin presented the leis.

Senator A. Kobayashi then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"Yesterday, I was astounded by reading an article in the Sunday paper that made all kinds of innuendos, inferences, and accusations. These were statements made by political insiders or legislative insiders, whoever they may be, that the work of our committees is tied to reorganization, specifically the work of the Science and Technology Committee, that it is being tied to reorganization. And I thought, this is just so absurd, so ridiculous. I was mentioned in that article and that is why I am speaking.

"First of all, I have not been seeking votes for the Senate presidency. We have a Senate president. We've had a good one for the past many years and we hope to have the same president for the next ten years.

"Also, they tried to pit me, I guess, against the Senator from Aiea, which is another real obnoxious thought. It's hard for me to find the correct words to use for this type of political insider. I do have a lot of respect for Mr. Dooley who wrote the article, but I wish he would check the credibility of his informant. The Senator from Aiea and I have been friends since before I became a senator, and I've never stood in his way. I've never tried to thwart his efforts. And in support of that Senator, I sit on his Committee on Employment, and I would like to say that I doubt that any of his legislation, any work he is doing is tied to reorganization. But that is what is being inferred by these people.

"Because these political insiders have reached such a ridiculous conclusion, and I feel they may reach the same type of conclusion as to the work being done by the Executive Appointments Committee, I'd like to say that the confirmation of Levinson, the confirmation of anyone else is not tied to the organization of the Senate.

"I wish these political insiders would just leave us alone. Our committee can get our work done without them meddling in it. We work with the public and we listen to the public. We share their concerns and we do not listen to the so-called political insiders. Thank you."

The Chair interjected:

"Before proceeding, the Chair would just like to make one comment.

"I too would like to take exception to the story just on one basis. Thank you very much for the kind words, Senator Kobayashi. There have been discussions about myself that my retirement has already been planned for. I don't want to disappoint anyone but the three individuals mentioned in the article, when the rumors first appeared, came to see me and told me, 'Dickie, I wish you would really stay.' I looked at them and said, 'Stay where? I'm in my place.' They said, 'We wish you will seek reelection.'

"I want to make that very clear, for the record, so that it's not misconstrued anywhere."

Senator Matsuura also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I also rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"Let me first diverse a little here. I want to make a public announcement regarding the use of Bentlate.

"Today I found out that Bentlate, a systemic fungicide that has been used throughout the United States, has a detrimental effect on certain plant species. For some reason, this systemic fungicide disintegrates and produces a gaseous material which affects the roots of vegetables and flowering plants.

"Bentlate was a very good systemic fungicide. You put it on the plant, the plant absorbs it and it protects the plant from the fungus disease.

"Unfortunately, once Bentlate goes into the soil it remains there and it does have a lasting residual effect. I want the public to know, those of you who are farmers, that if you have used Bentlate on your plants and it got into the soil and you're replanting because your plants have died, take the precaution and plant cucumbers first because the cucumber is a very good indicator plant of the residual effects of Bentlate. It will tell you within a month or so whether or not you have the residual effect of Bentlate in the soil.

"Now, I want to continue where the Senator from Manoa left off.

"I went back to Hilo this weekend and I was surprised when some of my constituents asked if I was doing something illegal by being tight with AT&T. Strange as it may seem, nobody focused on the sole source telephone contract. All the questions that were directed to me were toward my association with AT&T and one of the questions that they posed to me was, was I straight? I assured one of my constituents that if I was not straight I would have been leveraged by now.

"The strategy to detract from the main issue of the nonbid phone contract probe is brilliant. One can talk about the reorganization, my association with AT&T and so on, except for one thing, and that is, truth and honesty always prevails in the end. Civilization would have been exterminated if that was not so.

"The GTE Hawaiian Tel employee who said that Matsuura is real tight with AT&T, asserting that I was helping AT&T to compete with GTE Hawaiian Tel in the telephone service in Hawaii, is telling a very big lie to mislead the people of Hawaii. The GTE employee knows that even if AT&T wanted to come into Hawaii and provide the telephone service the Federal Communications Commission rules and regulations would never allow it, never. And that is a quotable statement -- never!

"Regarding telephone equipment. Back in the '80s the state did buy GTE equipment and was criticized for that. They bought the GTD-5 switching equipment from GTE. That equipment had a lot of problems and the state bought it at a fairly high price. The people of Hawaii paid for that faulty equipment and the ratepayers were really upset. GTE no longer manufactures switching equipment. They're out of it. So that assertion I'm trying to help AT&T with the equipment purchase is another lie because GTE doesn't make switches anymore and AT&T sells its equipment through a local distributor.

"This diversion tactic that somebody seems to be spreading is absolutely erroneous. I'm sure they will send out allegations, but let's stick with the real issue and problems here.

"The real issue is sole source non-bid contracts and the amendments to their non-bid contracts. The state spent developing over \$440,000 in statewide а telecommunications system. Budget and Finance even did an in-house study with all their experts and their recommendation was to have our own telecommunications system. However, at the 11th hour when all the bid documents were prepared, a decision was made to go non-bid to GTE. The bid proposal invited everybody to participate, including GTE with their extended Sentrex system, the PBX system, everybody was going to be asked to bid and come up with a price. At that point, everybody would have sharpened their pencils. But just before the bid goes out, the decision is made to go sole My question is, 'Why?' Who m Nobody is willing to say, 'It's me.' source. Who made that decision? They all point at Dr. Norman Okamura. He is the one that agreed to the telephone prices. He's the one that agreed to the price of the telephone line. He is the one that agreed to have GTE wires in this building. He agreed to all of these things.

"Mr. President, I've written to Dr. Okamura to appear in my hearing. I called him two times today because if all the people are saying that he is the bad guy, I want to question him. I want to ask him why?

"The cheapest telephone the state bought is for \$165 under the non-bid contract. When the same telephone was bought on a bid proposal, it went down from \$165 to \$66. I asked why the \$100 difference? GTE replied, 'The \$66 price did not include labor, freight, taxes and extended warranty.' I checked. The \$66 included taxes and it also included freight and profit. The phones came with a two-year warranty guarantee.

"The state paid for a microwave system that connected all the islands. It was operational since 1989. Since April of 1991 we could have put all the inter-island calls on that microwave system. It would have saved the state a lot of money. It has not been connected as yet. I asked, 'Why?'

"I think we have a bad contract and until I am able to talk to Dr. Okamura, I may never get an answer. In examining the contract, I couldn't find a termination clause, which is a standard clause in every state contract. That clause is missing. We're stuck for five years with this contract. This contract was signed in January of 1990. We're stuck until December 31st of 1994.

"The only company that has testified in opposition to all of the resolutions is GTE Hawaiian Tel. Why would they object to an audit? They have never been audited for seven years. Maybe we are being overcharged. I don't know. I'm not pointing at Hawaiian Tel GTE as a

culprit because they supplied whatever the state wanted. I just want to make sure that whatever we wanted and got was really something that we needed and made some economical sense.

"This concludes my argument, but just be aware of other diversionary attacks that may pop up. Concentrate on the sole source contracts with amendments because that thing needs fixing! Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Cobb also on a point of personal privilege stated:

"Mr. President, two comments. One, in deference to the remarks of the Senator from Manoa, to paraphrase a passage from <u>Romeo and Juliet</u>: 'The more a person speaks as an insider, usually the further outside the real spectrum they are.' Second, in response to the remarks of the Senator from Hilo, I think the only way the taxpayers will ever really be fully protected in this issue of telecommunications is, one, to require that all public contracts be subject to bid and, two, be subject to audit on a periodic and recurring basis. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator A. Kobayashi then rose to state:

"Mr. President, I would like to express appreciation and thanks to the many people who will be serving on these boards and commissions. They volunteer their time and their energy and we certainly owe them a debt of thanks. "Mr. President, I don't know if any of these individuals are in the audience. If they are will you please stand. I know we have one standing over there, Ben Villaflor, to the Hawaii Boxing Commission. Thank you."

Senator Solomon rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, there was an article that appeared in the New York Times National, Tuesday, March 24, 1992, and I'll be circulating the article for my colleagues to review.

"It says here: 'U.S. ADDS PROGRAMS WITH LITTLE REVIEW OF LOCAL BURDENS.' 'In 1990, 20 New Mandates,' Mr. President, were passed and signed into law by the President of the United States.

"The article reports that 'Against the background of a stubborn recession and mounting fiscal distress in the country, the Federal Government continues to create or expand domestic spending programs with little or no review of the financial burdens they will place on state and local governments, public policy analysts say.

'In 1990 alone, the year the recession began, President Bush signed 20 bills into law, ordering programs that the National Conference of State Legislatures says will cost state and local governments billions of extra dollars, primarily for health care, the environment and Social Security payments for public employees.

'Some mandates, like the Americans With Disabilities Act, were enacted without any reliable estimates of the cost to state and local governments. The legislation, which requires businesses and state and local governments to provide the disabled with equal access to services, employment, buildings and transportation systems, is now expected to cost them millions of dollars annually to comply.

'The most expensive regulations for any state involve Medicaid, the Federally subsidized health-care program for low-income people that will cost \$38.3 billion for the states to finance this year.'

"As you well know, Mr. President, your Ways and Means Committee has been struggling with the state budget. We are in the predicament of trying to find dollars to fund a \$44 million budget request for this program. The article goes on:

'The next most expensive mandates involve environmental laws, primarily water purification, which will cost state and local governments \$32 billion a year by 1995.

'No one can reliably estimate the cost of complying with many such programs, and Congress is required to make only preliminary estimates on some of the bills it considers. But analysts say no Federal law provides for complete reimbursement of any mandated program, and some legislative analysts estimate the burden to local governments of such spending at scores of billions of dollars.'

"In conclusion:

'Pessimism is widespread. Three-quarters of the states and more than a third of the nation's cities report worsening fiscal problems this year, and many governors and mayors are saying the problems will linger or worsen over several years even if the economy recovers quickly.'

"The article's sub-headline states, 'U.S. Adds to Mandates Without Review of Cost.' It gives the position of President Bush on mandates. He said in his State of the Union message to our country: ""We must put an end to unfinanced Federal Government mandates," Mr. Bush said. "These are the requirements Congress puts on our cities, counties and states without supplying the money. And if Congress passes a mandate, it should be forced to pay for it and balance the cost with savings elsewhere."' However, analysts have reported that this in fact is a blatant lie. The article further states, '... the President has done little to curb the flow of federal mandates. Nor, ... has he acted to provide more financing for those bills he has signed into law.'

"Mr. President, they say President Bush has shown zero leadership, and I quote: "President Bush has provided zero leadership in this area of nation-state relationships," said Joseph F. Zimmerman, professor of political science at the State University of New York in Albany and the author of two new studies on the relationship between the states and the Federal Government.'

"The article continues: 'Of the 125 mandate-laden bills that have been introduced in Congress this session, more than half deal with health care and criminal justice, which are the two fastest growing segments of state budgets, said Martha A. Fabricius, a policy analyst with the National Association of State Budget Officers who has been monitoring this legislation. She said that more than 20 of the most expensive bills had been introduced by the Democratic leadership.

'If enacted, the bills would force most states to raise taxes or reduce existing services'

"Mr. President, we are now considering a resolution, S.C.R. No. 54, which I'm hoping the chairman of the Ways and Means Committee would allow us to adopt and perhaps you, Mr. President, will consider establishing an interim committee to deal with the rising mandate costs and the United States Congress' shortcomings in providing states with the necessary means to finance and administrate existing and new federally mandated programs.

"Thank you."

Senator Reed, also on a point of personal privilege, said:

"Mr. President, I'd like to follow up on a matter of personal privilege in line with the comments of the previous speaker.

"I think that it is necessary to also point out once again that this problem is a bipartisan one. The Democraticcontrolled Congress for years has been a big part of the problem. And it's a serious one that overrides all consideration of politics or even who's to blame. The national debt in our country is probably the most serious problem that confronts all of us and the previous speaker hit on a few of them.

"The basic problem is that the U.S. government takes in in taxes about a trillion dollars a year and spends about 1.4 trillion dollars a year. We're spending 400billion a year more then we're taking in. And it's a problem that transcends just politicians. The problem is that at both the state level and the federal level the politicians are afraid to cut back on pork and other kinds of expenditures, and afraid to tell the American public the truth about our economic plight. This overspending has put us in debt to the tune of four trillion dollars, which means that every man, woman and child in our country now owes \$16,000. The national deficit and debt threaten to destroy this country. What we're doing is forcing our children and their children to pay in the future for our overspending today. This is an emergency that demands drastic, courageous steps. Thank you very much."

Senator Koki also rose on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I wish to rise on a point of personal privilege. My point wasn't going to be what the previous speakers have discussed but I'd like to see just no new federal mandates, period.

"The topic that I want to talk about is auto insurance reform. The Insurance Commissioner has confirmed that our auto insurance firms are not making money. If they're not making money, how can they reduce premiums. We need meaningful reform in order to do that and the House bill that we just heard yesterday does not qualify as a meaningful reform. In fact, it seems like a plaintiffs' attorney wrote much of it.

"Three major reforms that are necessary are verbal threshold, elimination of stacking, and a medical fee schedule. Only the medical fee schedule is in the House version and the House version of the fee schedule may not yield meaningful savings.

"Other provisions of the House bill mandate what is already available in terms of deductibles. Some provisions actually increase the cost to insurance companies by adding paperwork and meaningless notification to consumers. The House bill is not serious about auto reform. Auto insurance rates are much too high in Hawaii. A friend from Washington state pays 40% less premiums than I do. We can't take incremental approaches that seek just to stabilize rates. We need reform that reduces our rates.

"The insurance companies have come up with a reform package that will reduce rates. They are in the best position to determine what they need to reduce rates. Lawyers and legislators do not know how to run an insurance business. We don't know how much monetary savings different reforms produce. Whether we like it or not the insurance companies know their business best and they are best able to determine what is the best in terms of savings. Many don't trust insurance companies, so that is why we have a insurance commissioner. Very few businesses have a state watchdog looking over their shoulders. If they start to make windfall profits, we will know, and we then can take other measures.

"But knowing the nature of free enterprise, if auto insurance becomes profitable there are over 100 insurance companies that will jump in and provide competitive rates. The reason very few are in it now is because it is not profitable. With the high premiums that we are paying, somebody is making a lot of money and the insurance commissioner verifies that it is not the insurance companies.

"Our constituents want lower premiums and they want it now. Those that are making a good deal of money want as little reform as possible. Most people want insurance to protect themselves from devastating medical bills and lawsuits. They don't want to make money beyond that. Let's get back to what insurance is all about -- protection, and not a means of getting injured and hitting the jackpot. Thank you." Senator Tungpalan also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege also.

"I appreciate the comments of the previous speaker. Unfortunately, I wish that were the case. Somehow I don't think that we are getting all the information. In fact, I think more needs to be done as far as disclosure is concerned regarding what the insurance companies are making. I'm very happy that the chair for Consumer Protection in our Senate got us together with the insurance commissioner and with the analyst who reviews insurance rate filings. In one particular set of rate filings, that of State Farm, I noticed that there was a particular line within the rate filings that didn't really declare all of the reserves that were being set aside for injuries that occurred when a person is in an auto accident. What it led me to believe was that if we're not sharp enough, you're right, if we're not sharp enough, if we don't have the kinds of analysts that can really crunch the numbers, we can be taken in by these rate filings that appear to be showing losses. Unfortunately, my opinion is, we're getting ripped off by the insurance companies, plain and simple.

"When I looked at the rate filings, what I saw was that they were hiding the reserves and turning it around as losses. They merged bodily injuries together with property damages and reserves. Property damages came to \$4 million, bodily injuries to \$7 million and the total loss came to \$15 million, so when we subtracted it out it looked like there was something like \$3.8 million in reserves that could be reinvested for profits but considered by the insurance commissioner as losses.

"So what does that mean? Well, for example, suppose you're in a car accident and something flies in your eyes and you go to a doctor and get that eye washed, a claim of \$48.00 generated from this accident goes to the insurance company, which then puts aside something like maybe \$20,000 for a claim on that accident because they believe that this is a potential loss to their company. It's In some companies it's called called incurred loss. incurred but not reported. In any instance, this is the reserve. It is not really something that is spent out of their pockets. You have something like \$3.8 million in that line alone that was put aside for reserves for accidents, but actually those monies were not spent. But when it gets reported to the commissioner it appears on the loss side. So they turned that \$3.8 million which they use for investment into a loss.

"When you realize that this is what is presented to the insurance commissioner as proof for their losses, they are then able to get increases like 19% the year before and 22% the year after, strictly on things that are projected losses or reserves. Now, that appears like a rip-off to me. There should be some cap to that reserve. In other lines of insurance, as in casualty, there are caps to reserves that are set aside for injuries or for catastrophies that occurred but did not fully get settled. And I think there should be a cap on reserves of this nature and I hope we can entertain the Senate Committee on Consumer Protection to look into this.

"Maybe that's where we can start, in having people realize that there are going to be watchdogs in the Consumer Protection Committee and in the insurance commissioner's office, to make sure that what is being put aside for reserve are adequate reserves but not reserves that are exorbitant and high and really rip off the system and rip off the people of our state. "I'm with you. I'd like to make sure that companies work efficiently. I'd like to make sure that they get the monies necessary to do the job, but I also want to make sure they're not ripping off the people of Hawaii. Right now, the way the present system stands, I'm afraid that's just what's happening."

Senator Koki, in response, stated:

"Mr. President, just a short response.

"You know, \$3.8 million, even if we were to just eliminate that is really not going to make much of a dent in our premium rates. And even if we were to say that was excessive, again, even half of it, it's still not going to be a considerable amount. We need to recognize that we do need to have reserves and if that's the problem, what we need to do is keep getting on the insurance commissioner, if they are not watching it properly. But certainly the concept of how to eliminate exorbitant lawsuits, exorbitant medical fees and things of that nature really needs to be addressed and not just trying to lay it at the blame of some book work. Thank you."

Senator Solomon, on a point of personal privilege, said:

"Mr. President, also on a point of personal privilege.

"I've been quite concerned about some points of personal privilege, those expressed the other day by the Senator from Hilo and the remarks that were just made by the Minority today. Perhaps, Mr. President, the Senate should reconsider using their subpoena power so that we can get the kind of information we once did in the heptachlor situation when we were not able to get information. I think that a lot of the insurance pilikia is a result of the Senate not knowing what the real numbers are.

"I'm thinking, Mr. President, that perhaps we should establish an investigative committee over the interim. A good case in point was made yesterday by the Senator from Hilo in regards to his pilikia in getting the information regarding our telephone and bids.

"You know, Mr. President, I've been worried about this. Even in the Ways and Means Committee as we've been going through our hearing process, I've noticed a tremendous deterioration of responsiveness on the part of our state departments. Even when we're dealing with Hawaii's fiscal crisis and your committees have been working conscientiously to recommend reductions as requested by our chairman of Ways and Means, we find that there is a reluctance in the departments to share information with us in terms of where we can look to make those cuts. We need to know what we are looking at in terms of real numbers, Mr. President. These are the kinds of issues I've seen evolving this session. It has resulted in a lot of frustration for the Senate.

"I think that this lack of information is prevalent in our Consumer Protection Committee as well as in our Committees on Science and Technology, Ways and Means and Education. There is a reluctance of the bureaucrats to share the information with us. My feeling is that if that's how they want to play the game, so be it. But, we have alternatives.

"I'm thinking, Mr. President, that perhaps leadership should get together and consider using our subpoena powers and getting information and numbers so we can make the proper decisions that benefit the people of this great state of ours. Thank you." Senator Matsuura also on a point of personal privilege then said:

"Mr. President, I was not going to speak today, but the Senator from Kohala brought up an issue that I need to share with the rest of the body. There is a lot of truth in what the previous speaker mentioned. I'll just share an example of what has transpired.

"Well, I asked for the equipment inventory list from Hawaii Inc. and they gave me three lists of equipment. It's very frustrating when you get three different sets of equipment lists that you can't really follow in sequence. So I asked for the invoices because I figured if I got the invoices at least I know what was purchased, when it was purchased, etc. So finally, I did get an invoice. Here is the invoice.

"The description of the item purchased says, 'GTE.' I don't know if Hawaii Inc. bought GTE for 19,500 bucks because that's all it says, there's no description, no quantity of equipment that was bought. It's just blank, for 19,500 bucks.

"I wanted to find out who bought this unknown item. The invoice is signed by the executive director of Hawaii Inc. Where did this money come out of? It came out of the ICSD budget. Why would the executive director sign for something that is not in his program area? When you look at what they bought for 19,500 bucks. It's blank!

"This is the first invoice I've ever seen in my life where there's nothing -- no quantity, nor description of the items bought. They can't find the invoices.

"I'm not trying to create problems. All I want is an accountability of what is happening. I can't visualize a large company like GTE sending an invoice with absolutely blank description and show only the money amount.

"Before I sit down, Mr. President, I want to thank you for the beautiful resolution you prepared for Al Harrington. I was fortunate to attend the last performance of Al Harrington and I was truly touched. There was an outpouring of love from the waiters, the cooks and everybody that were there, including family members. That is the first time I learned about Al Harrington's personal life. He comes to perform for us free every year, but I didn't realize that at one point in his life he had five mortgages. He had the IRS at his door trying to evict his family from his house. Nevertheless, he recovered from all this, paid back everybody, and found a niche in Hawaii. Al has done so much for Hawaii. Had I known that he had all these problems, I would have offered my help too.

"Listening to the people proves that Al Harrington has touched a lot of people. Al Harrington and Danny Kaleikini are true living examples of the spirit of aloha. If these kinds of people ever run for elected office, I'm gonna vote for 'um. Thank you."

At 12:11 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:17 o'clock p.m.

Senator McCartney also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, just a brief point of personal privilege.

"I just want to commend the chairperson of the Committee on Culture and the Arts for taking some swift

and bold action on the H-3 issue and looking at the problem. I noticed on the news that she went out there and looked at the site. There was also an article in the papers.

"I think because of that, everybody is looking at the issue in a more sensitive light. Nobody, again, is trying to stop the construction of H-3. We're trying to make sure that it's done correctly with the right sensitivity that people in Hawaii should project in that realm.

"I appreciate the actions of the chairperson of the Culture, Arts and Historical Preservation Committee and I think she should be commended for it. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan, again, rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I'd like to rise on a point of personal privilege.

"I am very thankful for those comments, Senator. I also would like to thank Barry Nakamura who I feel has very unselfishly given of his time to bring this matter to the attention of everyone. What will emanate from this whole cause will be that in the future we will look at who owns the information that is procured through contracts from individual companies or organizations like Bishop Museum. If it's paid by the state through our coffers, should we own that information, or is it solely the responsibility of DOT or whoever is requesting that information to be able to dispose of that information the way they seek?

"For example, where Bishop Museum was contracted by the Department of Transportation, is it solely the information of the Department of Transportation or does the information regarding these sites belong to the state as a whole? This is something I'd like to have our Legislature discuss in the future.

"I think this is a matter that is of importance and we should discuss this further. You will see more legislation emanating as a result of the cause that Barry has brought to us. Thank you."

Senator Blair also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, on the last point, just a reminder to members that if they're concerned about whether documents are public documents, you can write to the Office of Information Practices and receive a response from them. Thank you."

Senator Holt also on a point of personal privilege said:

"Mr. President, just on a brief point, since we're talking about Bishop Museum. Yesterday, my wife went to the museum for about ten minutes and someone broke into her car along with five other cars. I just thought maybe the chairman could find out if their security was working or just directing traffic yesterday. And my boy wants his baseball cards back. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan responded:

"Senator, that's very important and I'll be sure to mention it to Mr. Duckworth.

"My car was there and I wonder why they overlooked my car? (Chair: "Because they had security officers around.) I didn't have any baseball cards, that's why."

The Chair then made the following observation:

"Senator Matsuura, with reference to Al Harrington, I just want to tell you that I owe a debt of gratitude to Senator Malama Solomon. I heard it was a very nice affair.

"As you know, Al is part of this Senate family, he's always been part of our entertainment troupe. I can remember, just to add to your story, that Al comes from a place called Halawa Housing, which at one time was a very rough and tough place. He wasn't known as Al Harrington then, his name was Al Taa. He went on to Punahou School where he was an all-star athlete. His mother remarried and he became Al Harrington. He subsequently went on to Stanford University.

"His life is quite a story. You are perfectly correct, he is quite an individual."

FORTY-FOURTH DAY

Wednesday, April 1, 1992

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 11:14 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Elder Joel K. Kauihou, Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chang, Cobb, Mizuguchi, Nakasato and Wong who were excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Third Day.

The following introduction was then made by Senator McMurdo to the members of the Senate:

"Mr. President, it's my honor and pleasure today to be able to present one of the most outstanding men in our state. I would like to just stop and explain to the gentlemen over there that we have several hearings that are going on and we are meeting a little early. It's not because you're sitting up there that all of the Senators are not here at the moment!

"Anyway, to continue, I'd like to introduce you to our honored guest Dr. Livingston M.F. Wong. Dr. Wong is accompanied by Sister Beatrice Tom, chief executive officer of St. Francis Medical Center, and son Livingston Wong Jr. who is an attorney. (All stood to be recognized.)

"Also, Mr. President, we have in the gallery other members of this distinguished party. These people have taken valuable time off today to be able to witness and participate in this auspicious ceremony. As I call your name, please stand to be recognized: Mrs. Linda Wong, wife of Dr. Wong; Mr. Herbert Yee, transplant coordinator, St. Francis Medical Center (SFMC); Ms. Haunani Nakaahiki, heart transplant coordinator, SFMC; Ms. Carolyn Albee, bone marrow transplant coordinator, SFMC; Ms. Sara Ishimoto, donor coordinator, Organ Donor Center of Hawaii; Mr. and Mrs. Walter Freitas, director, Organ Donor Center of Hawaii; and Mr. Eugene Tiwanak, vice president, SFMC.

"Mr. President, we are honored to have in our presence today Dr. Livingston Wong, a distinguished physician, who has been a pioneer in medical care in Hawaii, particularly in the very specialized area of organ transplants. He has been a leader in the field of successfully transplanting kidneys, heart, bone marrow, lung, liver, and pancreas.

"I would like to add that Dr. Wong, when he believes in something, is willing to come up and talk about it and that's what he did last year in the Health and Human Services Committee, about trying to get heart transplants for Medicaid patients. That I thought was very, very fine because we don't have many people who will do that.

"We are particularly proud of Dr. Wong, because he is one of many of our local boys who has made good. He belongs to at least twelve professional organizations and has been from time to time, clinical instructor in surgery, associate clinical professor, associate professor, and clinical professor of surgery at the University of Hawaii. His honors and distinctions include Alpha Omega Alpha, Hawaii Medical Associations' 'A.H. Robins Outstanding Physician of the Year Award,' 1976; 'Ten Who Made a Difference in Hawaii' by the Editors of the Star Bulletin, 1990. "And the reason we are honoring him is because:

'Whereas, organ transplantation is one of the miracles of the twentieth century attesting to the tremendous advances in medical research and technology; and

'Whereas, successful programs in organ transplantation have been established for the people of Hawaii at St. Francis Medical Center, the only State Health Planning and Development Agency approved organ transplant facility in the state; and

'Whereas, in Hawaii, organ transplantation was pioneered through the efforts and dedication of a team of local physicians led by Dr. Livingston M.F. Wong and which culminated in the first successful organ transplant of a kidney at St. Francis Medical Center in 1969; and

'Whereas, to date, more than six hundred kidney transplants have been performed and forty each year are now being planned; and

'Whereas, in 1978, Dr. Wong also performed the first bone marrow transplant procedure in Hawaii which provided new hope for those individuals suffering from leukemia and aplastic anemia; and

'Whereas, since that time, more than fifty bone marrow transplants have been performed in Hawaii; and

'Whereas, a successful heart transplant was accomplished in 1987 by Dr. Wong and the Hawaii heart team and thirteen more heart transplants have since been performed; and

'Whereas, Dr. Wong has led the way in establishing the Hawaii Bone Marrow Registry and the Hawaii Organ Procurement Organization in order to insure the availability of donors for Hawaii residents needing transplants and has made significant contributions toward making Hawaii's transplant programs nationally recognized and assuring that they meet professional medical requirements and standards; and

'Whereas, Dr. Wong is continuing his organ transplant leadership with lung, liver, and pancreas procedures now being anticipated in Hawaii; and

'Whereas, Dr. Wong, who graduated from Maryknoll High School and the University of Hawaii, obtained his medical degree from the University of Oregon Medical School, and conducted his residency at the Boston City Hospital and the Massachusetts General Hospital, has been a pioneer in medical care in Hawaii and has brought national and international honors to the State of Hawaii; now, therefore,

'Be It Resolved by the Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, that the many achievements of Dr. Livingston M.F. Wong are duly recognized and that Dr. Livingston M.F. Wong is hereby congratulated and honored, and offered gratitude and thanks for his leadership and commitment to caring for the health of the people of Hawaii.'"

Senator B. Kobayashi rose to add:

"Mr. President, Dr. Wong is also known to some of us as the medical director for the Emergency Medical Services Training Program when it had first begun in Hawaii. Prior to Dr. Wong's intervention, Hawaii had an ambulance service that some characterized as 'the race car driver program' -- rush to the scene; do whatever first aid you can; rush back. Dr. Wong helped with the training of our emergency medical personnel so that substantially more effective medical intervention could be applied on the scene thus preventing needless injury and death to our emergency medical victims.

"Thank you."

Senator Blair rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I apologize for being late to the session. Your Judiciary Committee had a hearing on the chicken fighting bill. I know the bill is a matter of general interest to the members of this body; so, if I may be permitted, I would like to disclose the outcome of the deliberations.

"The principal arguments by the bill's proponents were based on preservation of the Hawaiian culture. Therefore, your committee decided that chicken fights which are sanctioned by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs will not be covered under the penal provisions on cruelty to animals.

"Thank you and happy April 1st."

Senator McMurdo also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, today, making a round of all of your offices are the people who are members of the Committee on Welfare Concerns. The reason they are around here is because last week an incredible thing happened in the House Finance Committee. One of the Senate bills on 'Jobs,' which is also an important bill for poverty-stricken people, had an amendment added to it which would freeze our general assistance and our AFDC (Aid to Families with Dependent Children).

"Your Senate Committee on Health and Human Services, when confronted with the proposition from the Department of Human Services, that in order to help on the budget that we drop our money that we pay from 62-1/2% of the federal poverty level back to 60% of the federal poverty level, the chair and other members of the committee made it very well and loudly known that we weren't going to do any such thing; that the Senate Health and Human Services Committee, particularly, has fought for the past six years and finally was able to get it raised 2-1/2%. Now, we shouldn't be so darn proud of 62-1/2% when you get right down to it. We're talking about a state in which food, shelter, clothing, gasoline, everything is higher than practically any other place in the country, and yet we're content and we crow because we now are giving general assistance at 62-1/2% of the federal poverty level.

"The bill in the House the other day included a measure which would not roll this assistance back to 60% but which would freeze it at 1991 levels. What this is going to mean was amply demonstrated today. All of you who have not been to your offices will receive this morsel of food (held up tray of food). This is done to demonstrate just how much food you can expect to have for life if you too were buying food on this poverty level.

"Included here is an apple with a big chunk out of it; half a cheese sandwich, and remember cheese comes through the Surplus Food Act so they don't have to pay for that; one-half of an egg; four ounces of milk which would only come up at the most to this first notch on this cup (demonstrated with cup). "Ask yourselves, how you would like to have your children having to eat a diet which at a 100% of poverty level they would get two slices of toast with a teaspoon of butter, 2.6 ounces of cereal, 2 ounces of milk and a cup of orange juice. But at our current level they would get one-and-a-third slices of toast with two-thirds of a teaspoon of butter, 1.7 ounces of cereal, 1.3 ounces of milk. You all know that in an 8-ounce cup there are 8 ounces so we're talking about going this far down in the cup (demonstrated with cup). By the way, there is no milk for supper; you get two-thirds of a cup of orange juice.

"If you had a 100% you would get a whole cheese sandwich, two-thirds of a hard-boiled egg and 4 ounces of fruit. As it is, you get two-thirds of the cheese sandwich, less than one slice of cheese. You get 4 ounces of milk and less than half of a hard-boiled egg. At supper you would get a cup of chili with 4 ounces of ground beef, 4 ounces of tomatoes, 2.8 ounces of beans. I presume you would have the same recipe but you only get two-thirds cup. Now visualize just what that looks like to growing children. Even if supplemented by rice. It's not very much and there are no seconds.

"I could go on and on and on on this. I urge all of you to look at this. At this point the Senate position has been against tinkering with this, so that we are not going to take this budget cut or all of these budget cuts and take it out on the poorest and most helpless segment of our society.

"I hope you will stick with me on this and I hope you enjoy your lunch. Thank you very much."

At 11:28 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

Thursday, April 2, 1992

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 11:39 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Daiva Dasa, ISKCON Hawaii, Inc., Hara Krishna, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Koki who was excused.

This year's Cherry Blossom queen and her court are:

"Queen Lesli Lynn Yoshida, who is from my Senatorial district. Lesli is a 1984 graduate of Mililani High School. Lesli's diverse interests include traveling, working with children, meeting new people, jogging and bicycling. Her parents are Patricia and Hugh Yoshida, and I'm sure Mr. Yoshida is known to many of us -- he being the legendary football coach from Leilehua and presently with the University of Hawaii;

"Princess Tracy Eiko Omori, who worked for the Senate Ways and Means Committee and who, I understand, is a great admirer of Senator Mike McCartney. That admiration was clearly demonstrated in my office when I mentioned his name. I think she's still recovering. Her parents are Susan Omori and the late Edward Omori. Tracy is a graduate of Pearl City High School;

"Attendant Amy Misao Imamura, who is a 1987 graduate of Pearl City High School. Her parents are May Iwamura and the late Ronald Imamura;

"Attendant Wendy Shigeko Shintani, who is also a graduate of Pearl City High School, 1986. Her parents are Jim and Jane Shintani;

"Attendant Ann Shoko Tomatani, who is a 1985 graduate of McKinley High School. Her parents are Fushio and Kakuko Tomatani.

"Miss Congeniality, Pamela Leiko Hashimoto, who is a 1985 graduate of Kaiser High School. Her parents are Jane Hashimoto and the late Paul Hashimoto. "Members of the Senate, before adjourning, I'd like to say a few words not as a matter of personal privilege but on a matter of policy in the Senate.

"We have been receiving calls from the general public with reference to travel. First, I want to make it very clear, for the record that as President of the Senate I have always encouraged travel. I wish more Senators would take advantage of it. I think the experience is a good one. I think fellowship with other legislators, getting information from other jurisdictions and understanding their kinds of situation is important for Hawaii.

"Second, as far as mode of transportation, as President, I have always stated that Senators are entitled to travel first class. That is to say they are authorized to do so. That policy has not changed. Contrary to what may have been said around this building, the policy remains the same.

"Third, with reference to approval of travel, that is the sole responsibility of the President of the Senate. He approves all amounts, per diem and transportation costs. I want to make that very clear.

"We have been trying to deal with the calls to my office as best as we can to explain this to the general public.

"Most importantly, sometime this afternoon you will be receiving a memo from the President's office which is based on a situation which I think is real and which is related to the state budget. The memo is very simple. It makes no mention of any change of policy on being entitled to a first-class ticket to travel, but it does state that since we are asking departments and other agencies to cut their budgets then we should have to seriously look at cutting our own. We in the Senate should not be immune to the fiscal constraints that other state agencies are feeling. For that reason, the memo states that out-ofstate travel for the Senate is being suspended while we determine where internal cost savings can be made. I want this to be part of the record and, more importantly, again, my apologies to the general public, we will try to get the message out as quickly as we possibly can, but perhaps the media can get this message out for us."

"Unfortunately, the confirmation process of Judge Levinson was not a simple one and I'd like to apologize to him and his family for any grief that they have encountered, which I'm sure they did. However, we were receiving negative phone calls and letters before the confirmation hearing and immediately after the hearing. Actually the easy way out would have been to confirm him right away, but when have we ever taken that easy way out. We are here to serve the public. We're here to follow through on concerns and not just cast aside citizen complaints. We're here to make sure that nominees, especially those nominees who are appointed to our highest court are individuals who are not only legally qualified but who also care deeply for Hawaii.

"Everyone agrees that Judge Steven Levinson is a highly intelligent man. That was said over and over in testimony and in follow-up letters. He knows the law and he loves the law. Like our other supreme court nominee, Robert Klein, this man, Judge Levinson, has heart. He is a good human being. Like all of us, he doesn't like criticisms but he is not afraid of it. He admits mistakes and he learns from them. All of these human qualities, together with his outstanding judicial qualities, will make him a great supreme court justice.

"I urge confirmation of Judge Steven Levinson."

Senator Iwase also rose to support the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the nomination of Judge Steven Levinson to the State Supreme Court. The accolades he has received from all segments of the legal community attest to the character and superb qualifications of Judge Levinson.

"Mr. President, in supporting Judge Levinson I do wish to note a rather curious editorial which appeared in yesterday's Star-Bulletin, entitled 'Judgeship choices are a system's poor results.' Of course, we do not know who wrote the editorial because the writer has hidden behind the corporate name of the newspaper. We do not know if the writer ever attended any of the Senate hearings we conducted; whether the writer spoke to the Star-Bulletin court reporters about the judges so that the writer could make an informed and intelligent decision; whether the writer has a competent network of information; whether the writer, to borrow from an old Beatles song, 'is nothing more than a fool on the hill.'

"To the writer's credit, either because of a scintilla of honesty or a pound of ignorance, the writer reveals the true motive of the editorial. The writer has a favorite candidate who was not selected. Because the Star-Bulletin's candidate was not chosen the editorial concludes, regarding the selection process, 'Those who participate in it must do better next time to put the

public's interest ahead of their own political and personal agenda.'

"First of all, Mr. President, I find it curious that given this newspaper's spotty history throughout this century on progressive human rights, people oriented legislation, that it should now profess to champion the public's interest.

"Secondly, I would remind the writer of the editorial that the people of this state did not anoint the Star-Bulletin to select our judges - wisely so. In our Constitution it is left to a body of 9 individuals - 4 lawyers and 5 lay people - to undertake that task. It is an insult to 9 unpaid individuals that the Star-Bulletin would accuse each one of them of improper motives because the Star-Bulletin's candidate was not selected.

"Mr. President, we have before us the name of Judge Steven Levinson. I do not know this man. I never had a case against this man. I never appeared in his courtroom. We have sat through the process in this Senate. I have read all of the material, pro and con, sent to us on Judge Levinson, and I will vote for this good man. My high political and personal agenda is to vote for highly qualified individuals to serve on the bench. That is in the highest public interest. That is what my vote represents today. I don't know whose interest the Star-Bulletin speaks for but based on this paper's editorial history it speaks for the public interest only by chance.

"Judge Levinson, Mr. President, will make an excellent Supreme Court justice.

"As for this editorial, to borrow from Edgar Allen Poe, 'It is nothing more than a liquid mass of odious putrescence.'

"Thank you."

Senator Blair also rose to speak in support of the nominee and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the nominee and concur with the remarks of the previous speaker whose eloquence I cannot hope to match. The only thing that I would add is that, unlike the previous speaker, I was once on the opposite side of a case with Steve Levinson when he was in private practice. That experience makes me all the more assured that we are doing a very good thing today if we confirm him.

"I know several hundred lawyers in this town, personally. There are probably well over a thousand with whom I've had some degree of professional contact. By reputation, I guess I know a clear majority of them. Based on my experience and information, the Judicial Selection Commission and the governor could not have, in the entire membership of the bar of the State of Hawaii, found a candidate more worthy of our support than is Judge Steve Levinson.

"Thank you."

Senator Chang also stood to speak in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I participated in the confirmation hearing on Judge Levinson's nomination to the circuit court, and my recollection of the information gathered by the Judiciary Committee at that time leads me to conclude that we have an eminently qualified nominee to the Hawaii State Supreme Court.

"I want to congratulate the nominee for being a very intelligent, a very scholarly, and a very qualified nominee, for offering himself, as talented as he is, for public service, and subjecting him to the caldron of public scrutiny that only we as elected public officials can understand. So this morning I'd like to add my accolade to the nominee for his public service and his sacrifice, and congratulate him on his nomination. Thank you."

Senator Cobb also rose to support the nominee and stated:

"Mr. President, just to go on record. When there were questions raised about the nominee I called him personally and he spent an hour on the phone answering in great detail all of the questions that had been raised and that I had raised, and I find this attitude of being totally forthcoming, very direct, very honest, very detailed in his response, to be a trait of Judge Levinson.

"I think he is strongly deserving of elevation to the Supreme Court because I think he represents the new breed of thinking. It says, 'You go out and you answer every question that's put in detail and then let people decide.' He's done that. I for one have had all of my questions answered and I urge my colleagues to join in support of Judge Levinson.

"Thank you."

Senator Reed added his support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to add my voice in support of the nominee.

"Steven Levinson will be a scholarly addition to the Supreme Court. I'm convinced that he is a man of integrity and intellectual honesty. I'm also convinced that, if ever confronted with a choice between what is politically correct and what is legally correct, Judge Levinson will not for a moment hesitate to stand up for and indeed fight for that which is legally correct.

"I'm confident that Steve Levinson will be an excellent member of the Supreme Court. He has a political and intellectual independence, borne of intellectual integrity, and he has my full support."

Senator Holt also added his support of the nominee and remarked:

"Mr. President, speaking in support of the nominee.

"I had an opportunity to meet with him yesterday and, having not known the individual before, found him to be uniquely qualified, very friendly. I knew he had the legal qualifications but I wanted to find out what else he's made of and I asked him what his other interests were. He's very active in Hawaii Speech League and has been in the debate arena for quite some time and I guess his favorite pastime now is collecting videos. I asked him if he had the 'Silence of the Lamb' yet and he said, 'No.' I told him he can borrow mine anytime. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 21. Noes, none. Excused, 4 (Kobayashi, B., Levin, Wong, R., Yamasaki).

At this time, Senator A. Kobayashi introduced Judge Steven Levinson, Mrs. Levinson and their children who were seated in the audience.

RE-REFERRAL OF HOUSE BILL

The Chair re-referred the following House bill that was received:

Senator McCartney then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"I know it's Friday and we are supposed to talk about good things and I am going to talk about things that are good.

"I read the editorial in this morning's Advertiser which is titled, 'School reform - Legislature dropping the ball?'

"I would like to assure my colleagues that what is good is that we are not dropping the ball. We are working very hard and diligently to bring about school reform and bring about a bill and product that we can all be proud of.

"Let me just say for the record, Mr. President, that it's easy to throw stones but the key is, we all have to work together. The focal point that we need to focus on are the children of the state and we need to make decisions based on what is in their best interest. In no way have we dropped the ball. The Senate is working hard on a bill right now that is very comprehensive in reform and it goes broad-base across all spectrums.

"The proposal that the Advertiser supports, in my mind, drops the ball because it is not comprehensive. It only focuses in on the Board of Education and only reforming the Board of Education. That will not solve improving the quality of education in our schools. They want to put three proposals on the ballot and let the voters decide in the primary election which proposal is good and then put it on the ballot in the general election.

"Mr. President, as policymakers, as lawmakers, it is our duty and responsibility to share our vision with the public, enact it into laws and ask them to ratify it. That is what we are working on. We are not going to throw something out there and pass the buck to the voters. We are going to make the tough decisions that need to be made in order to support the vision of our schools.

"Those three proposals have three different impacts on the schools and if we don't know what we want to happen in the schools how can we put three proposals up there. I don't think that's a wise proposal. I don't think it's good public policy.

"Our reform package, Mr. President, starts from the schools, not from the top down, like this proposal talks about. Our proposal says reform starts at the schools. And how do we create a system that support the schools, the teachers, the principals and the school communities, working together collaboratively to meet the needs of the child.

"In our bill we look at it very comprehensively. We look at the Board of Education, redefining their role and responsibility, taking away their management power and giving that to the schools. Taking away their management power and giving it to the schools, Mr. President! That is school-community-based management and participation.

"We are also looking at reforming what the role of the Legislature is. If we are going to make the schools step forward, all the groups - the Legislature, the Board of Education, the Department of Education, the unions, the bureaucracies - we all need to take a step back if schools are to move forward in student achievement. That is what we are doing in this bill, Mr. President.

"We have the Legislature looking at lump-sum budgeting. We have the Legislature putting in assessment mechanisms. We are telling the schools, if we are going to give you money directly and give up some of our control over method and means in order to achieve greater policy results, then we want some accountability and some outcomes and we want some results. We are putting in mechanisms, Mr. President, that will provide for those outcomes and results to be used as monitoring devices for us. So we want accountability.

"We are looking at the collective bargaining laws to see how we can restructure that. We are looking at the powers of the governor as to whether he should restrict money from education unilaterally - no!

"We are also looking, Mr. President, at a very comprehensive bill that looks at sunsetting all the rules and laws on education and instead of putting the burden on the schools to justify their existence, our bill puts the burden on the bureaucracies to justify their existence as to why they should control schools. I think, Mr. President, this is a bill that the Senate can be proud of and the Legislature can be proud.

"In no way are we dropping the ball on education. We are carrying that ball proudly and moving forward and when this bill comes to the floor on Tuesday, I hope that we can discuss and debate it. There may be things in the bill that aren't perfect but we need to continue to work together collaboratively to see this product to its final form.

"With that, Mr. President, I would like to thank you for allowing me to share the good news of the day."

Senator Blair also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, briefly, I concur with the remarks of the previous speaker. I had the opportunity to sit in on a hearing of the Education Committee, not as a member but because of the constitutional amendment provision on the agenda I was privileged to sit in and watch the committee in action. I found that far from dropping the ball, the Education Committee has a better grasp on this issue than any member of the media that I have talked to or heard or read.

"Furthermore, the proposal, championed by the Advertiser, for three constitutional amendments on the primary election ballot in a run-off, with the winner moving on to the general election ballot for ratification, appears to me to be in violation of Article X, Section 5 of our State Constitution. I would hate for us to work hard, establishing school reforms, and then have our decision appealed to Justice Levinson and the other members of the Supreme Court for the final determination. I think we should be careful before we endorse the run-off proposal of the Lieutenant Governor and the Advertiser because of concerns in the area of Article XI, Section 5.

"Thank you."

Senator McMurdo also on a point of personal privilege stated:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"I would like to address the remarks of the first speaker and say that there is a substantial number of people on this island who do not feel that being allowed to make a decision on a ballot on an issue of great importance is what you call 'passing the buck.' Where I come from, we call it initiative and referendum."

Senator Chang also stood on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, I glanced at the press release issued by the chairman of the Committee on Judiciary and, following the urging of my colleague from Kahaluu in thinking good thoughts, I would like to congratulate the chairman of the Committee on Judiciary for his reincarnation. Thank you."

Senator Koki added his remarks on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege in support of our Senator from Kahaluu.

"When you sit on these hearings, particularly when you are chairing it and knowing the background that Senator McCartney has, and the amount of time that he has spent in looking this over and then for a newspaper to go and endorse a very simplistic plan of putting three alternatives is really, really shortsighted. I think that is one of the services that the media does to the electorate, of trying to get them to think that they are participating in it but when you typically have people who are elected to study the issues, to really struggle over, and it's so tempting for a politician to do what is publicly popular. So I want to state my support in encouraging the Senator from Kahaluu to stick to his guns because I, for one, have full confidence in his ability and the ability of the entire education committee, and in our ability to look over the issue and finally vote on it. Thank you."

Senator Solomon also spoke on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, also on a point of personal privilege in response to the previous speakers.

"Mr. President, in fairness, I would like to commend the Lieutenant Governor and the task force. I think they did a tremendous job coming up with these recommendations.

"The Lieutenant Governor did report to your Committee on Education that it was up to the committee as well as this esteemed body as to whether we would like. to put the proposed three amendments on the ballot. In response to the editorial in the Advertiser, whatever the media chooses to do with the information, so be it.

"But, again, I would like to commend the task force. I think they did a tremendous job with a controversial issue. They had a very difficult time in dealing with the issues. They did admit that many of the responses to the public survey were confusing and made it difficult to separate the information and categorize the responses according to subject matter. These categories need to be comprehendible to the Legislature this session so that we could look at the document, discuss those considerations and come up with a reform package which would be meaningful to everyone in the State of Hawaii.

"I am confident that we are moving in that direction. I clearly see, as your former education chairman, the issues of governance and of fiscal accountability and management. We had a lot of difficulty in separating the two areas as they affect governance. The task force admitted that they had a lot of difficulty in trying to separate the two issues because of the conflict between our state's highly centralized fiscal management in our budget proceedings and the issue of autonomy in hiring and firing personnel."

At 12:16 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:17 o'clock p.m.

Senator Crozier then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, in this morning's newspaper there is an article about the Senators being told to 'stay home' and is written by Andy Yamaguchi. First of all, I would like to compliment Mr. Yamaguchi on the style of writing and the accuracy of his comments and the neutral position that he took and just wrote the facts. In that sense I would like to compliment him.

"I was interviewed both by the Advertiser and the Star-Bulletin. I haven't read the Star-Bulletin but I'm sure they will do just as good a job as the Advertiser did with their accuracy.

"The point I would like to talk about is where I am discussed when I took a six-week practicum exercise to New Zealand. Mr. Ian Lind of the Hawaii Monitor made the comment that, let me quote, and this is where the whole thing started from: 'Crozier in effect granted himself a full scholarship to underwrite his degree program.' That's a conjecture that Mr. Lind made. I would like to respond to the whole of education and as I do I would just like to quote from Darrick Bach who was the president of Harvard University and his quote is quite famous, I'm sure you've heard it, Mr. President, 'If you think education is expensive, try ignorance.'

"Mr. President, when I got elected to the Legislature, you know, I paid my dues in life. I went to high school, fooled around in college for awhile, didn't do much, raised a family, went to war and all of that just like everybody else but then I got elected to a position of responsibility. I've done a lot a reading on my own so I think I understood the issue, understood the matters before the people and how to conduct myself. I think I've conducted myself properly. But along the way I brought a certain agenda with me through my life's experiences but I also knew that I fell short in other areas and I thought it would be prudent upon myself to foster more education so that as I sit down and make policy decisions, I sit down as a more enlightened person. My first attempt in improving my education is when I went to the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard for a threeweek program. I was the first legislator from Hawaii to attend that course. Only senior executives from around the nation and legislators attend the course. It is paid primarily through their governments. I asked, at that time Speaker Henry Peters, if I could go. He had more of a myopic attitude or parochial attitude and said I didn't need to go, but, I pestered him and pestered him and finally I convinced him that maybe I could improve my lot if I attend the course.

"Mr. President, I learned. I learned quite a bit. The next session, to the speaker's chagrin, I voted against more of the majority bills than any other individual, including the Republican Party. But to my saving grace, the bills that I voted against were ultimately vetoed by the governor. I told the speaker, 'I told you, I told you those bills weren't good.' But that is something that I got from the educational experience.

"I then went on to go after my bachelor's degree at West Oahu College attending classes during session, at nights, Saturday mornings. I went to school (I'm not tooting my horn but I need to tell this story). One of the courses that I took there was on constitutional law and in that class we had a case study, <u>Midkiff v. Hawaii</u> <u>Housing Authority</u>, the supreme court case where they found the Land Reform Act of 1967 constitutional. We had to study that. "So now that we have been debating the bills on land reform for condominiums, kept bringing up the same arguments for the single family dwellings. They were trying to put a square peg in a round hole. And I learned from that experience why I have this position today. It's because, based on that ruling based on the constitution, that can happen. I got that from school. I got that from my education.

"Now I was in this public administration program. It's a certificate program, all post-graduate work with about 20 students in the class. Almost every individual in that class works or serves in the city or state government. The governor sends his people to that program. The mayor sends his people to that program. The board of water supply sends people to that program, also the fire I thought I gained a lot from that department. experience, Mr. President. One of the issues that we worked on was taxation. We are supposed to know taxation but in reality, Mr. President, unless you sit down and take classes or do self-reading, most people don't understand taxes. I gained from that. Look at the types of legislation I have introduced on taxes. My taxation legislation will make the Chamber of Commerce feel very satisfied and even the Small Business Association would like the things I have put in.

"I also had a class on Chapter 91, Rule Making. We have to deal with that all the time. I sat down and had to go through an exercise to fully understand Chapter 91. I've improved myself because of that. The list goes on and on.

"We talked about economics. I learned from that, Most of the stuff I knew but I learned more everytime I sat in class and when I sat there I sat with bureaucrats, people from all aspects of government. I learned from them, my schoolmates, not only from the instructors. It's quite a learning experience.

"Now, part of the deal was that I had to do a practicum. Mr. President, I could have chosen to go to work for the Department of Transportation right here on Oahu. I could have chosen to work for the Department of Health. I could have chosen to work for the City and County of Honolulu. Can you imagine as a Senator walking into one of those organizations and telling somebody, 'Okay, you tell me what to do.' What kind of impact would that have? Do you think they would really treat me as an intern? No, I would have had some kind of special treatment and it would not have been fair to me or fair to the department that I had to serve.

"Mr. President, I chair the Housing and Hawaiian Programs Committee and you've been in some of our hearings. You've seen how disheveled some of those hearings get.

"I wanted to take advantage of this opportunity, as a policymaker, and try and do something in the realm of the Hawaiian area. 1993 is the year of the 100th anniversary of the overthrow of Queen Liliuokalani. Right now the governor is before Congress with the Hawaiian Home Lands issues. The Office of Hawaiian Affairs is still struggling with the settlement with the State of Hawaii. The discussion of sovereignty continues. All of these arguments at the fore, where do these arguments end up with the Legislature. The first gate is the Committee on Housing and Hawaiian Programs. I have to deal with all of these issues. I felt that since I must take this practicum, why not go and work with another native Polynesian group and see how they are handling their problems. We have the Office of Hawaiian Affairs but I went to work for the group called 'Manatu Maori' in New Zealand which is very similar to the Office of

Hawaiian Affairs. It's now called the Ministry of Maori Development and based in Wellington.

"I served there for six weeks, Mr. President. I learned a lot. I will not go through all the different details of the things that I did learn and I've already implemented some of the aspects. First of all, my committee used to be on TV and in the news all the time. Why? Because I was a great statesman? No, it is because of the disruptiveness in the committee hearings. It was a hard committee to handle. Mr. President, not too many of us volunteer for the Hawaiian Affairs Committee and one of the reasons is because it is so disruptive.

"What I learned down there is I learned that the Maori people when they function they function in the Maori culture. They are not allowed to be abrasive. When they discuss matters they have to use logic and eloquence to convince the people around them. Sad to say, many times we here in Hawaii disregard logic and eloquence and we just depend on emotions. As I analyzed them what I saw was that they stay within the Maori context by having the symbols of their culture present at all times. You have these woodcarvings and they talk about their gods and deites and their culture. They have speeches on their ancestors, the mountains, the place and people. Everything is kept within the Maori confine and they are very civil in their meetings. That is what I try to do in my committee.

"Mr. President, the reporters don't even show up at my committee any more because the meetings are moving so smoothly. Everyone is conducting themselves like polished individuals. There is no name-calling, no rancorous outbursts. All of that has changed. Where did I learn that from? I learned that from my practicum in New Zealand.

"I also learned many other things and instead of going through all of the details, Mr. President, if anyone is interested, I have a copy of my paper that I sent to you as part of my trip report out of state which is the same document used for the public administration program. All of the points are in here; it's public record. If anyone is interested and would like to have a copy, please, get a copy.

"I would just like to quote Professor Dick Pratt when he made a note to me after he had graded my paper: 'Mike, I'm pleased at the way you have used this time. Thanks for taking this as seriously as you have. Expect that more persons than yourself will benefit from the work.'

"Mr. President, I know the Hawaiian people have benefited from the experience that I have had in New Zealand. I know the people of Hawaii have also benefited from that experience.

"Let me close with the thought, once more, of president Bach: 'If you think education is expensive, try ignorance.' I'm not ignorant anymore. Thank you."

Senator Reed also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"I commend the previous speaker for his interest in continuing his education and I'm sure that there has been a lot of growth as a result of that and I haven't read the news stories of it. My only hunch is that taxpayers would be concerned about that kind of thing and, if such travel were being financed by taxpayers. I would share that concern and oppose it.

"That is similar to a topic I'd like to follow up on.

"I had to leave yesterday and didn't hear the President's comments relative to first-class travel. I would just like to briefly share my thoughts on that. I didn't realize that that was occurring. I didn't realize that that was an option or perk available to legislators. I think that it reveals a consciousness that is not acceptable. With the new supreme court justice here, I'd like to also express the fact that the chief justice of the supreme court travels first-class and has publicly expressed his opinion that is something that is important to maintain because of the stature of the Judiciary. I think that's nonsense, and I'm sure my opinion is shared by the vast majority of the people of Hawaii.

"We are public servants. If for any reason a public servant wants to travel first-class on state business, then I think we should have a policy that he or she should pay out of his or her own pocket for the upgrade required to travel first-class. It is a long way to go from here to Washington, D.C., or here to L.A. or wherever somebody has to go on business, and that is legitimate state expense, but any flight expense beyond the cheapest available coach ticket should come out of an individual's pocket, not the taxpayer's.

"Thank you very much."

Senator Cobb also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise on personal privilege and followup on the remarks of the Senator from Makakilo to address very directly my travel to what used to be the Soviet Union. In fact, I had wanted to go last August, two days after the coup started. The Senate President would not allow me.

"It turns out that one of my friends in Moscow was the commanding officer of one of the regiments on the other side of the barricades surrounding the Russian White House. He then, on the third day of the coup, took his entire regiment over to the side of President Yelstin and the democratic forces, and in fact helped break the back. of the coup.

"The newspaper is taking a very myopic view when they ask, 'What's the benefit to Hawaii?' Let me share with you.

"I was given tours of military facilities and was asked to witness the destruction of atomic weapons in the Soviet Union. A hundred of those weapons were formerly aimed at this state, now being destroyed. It's not being done as part of any international agreement, this is being done unilaterally on the part of the Russian government and the other republics. Kayakistan, Belarus and Ukraine have all stated they want to be nuclear free by 1994 -- ahead of us in the destruction of weapons. To remind our people here, a number of those weapons in the past have been aimed at this state because of our military facilities. They made it very clear to us that they'd rather trade and educate and communicate, rather than fight. It is in our interest, both state and national interest, to help them achieve that goal, rather than to go back to a former Soviet system that they had.

"The most dangerous thing in the world is a hungry and desperate people in possession of more than 30,000 nuclear weapons, and that's what they have. To have direct and indirect benefits in terms of economic, in terms of trade, travel and tourism is a result of our growing contacts with Russia and the other Republics of the Commonwealth. Increased communication has already started. Four of their Republics are now preparing proposals for transmittal through me to the School of

Travel Industry Management for tourism development guidance. They recognize our university as being one of the premier leaders in the world in this area, and they are very interested in taking advantage of this resource.

"The peace dividend also applies. People don't realize that citizens in Japan may now visit the Northern Territories of the Kurile Islands Russia occupied, without visas. Soon it is expected that two of the four islands will be returned unconditionally and the other two were promised at a later date. These discussions came about based on testimony and supporting directly, documentation that I and others provided before the Foreign Relations Committee of the Supreme Soviet when there still was a Soviet Union. I think it is in our national and state interest to have a peace treaty signed between Russia and Japan so that they can get on with the business of trading and exchange of people, goods and ideas. All of that contributes to peace in the Pacific.

"People don't realize that aside from Alaska, Hawaii is the state closest, physically, to Russia. We're world's apart. Why? Because of a lack of communication up until this point.

"There are already over fifteen Hawaii businesses that are now in business or preparing investments in Russia directly as a result of my trip, if they want to quantify. But I don't think you can quantify any legislative travel solely on the basis of what is the dollar benefit back to the state. In a week a delegation of Soviet merchants, Russian fishermen and others will be in Honolulu for a series of meetings on the sale of tuna to American tuna packers, as well as a variety of other economic activities. These are just some of the beginning benefits and there are many more.

"The Russian ruble is not yet fully convertible on the international market. That is changing. My prediction is that it will be convertible in the mid-term future.

"I prepared a detailed five-page report, submitted it to the Senate President, on each of my travels. I'm surprised no one in the media read it or quoted from it. I also made five other trips to Russia at my own expense. I intend to make more. I have no apologies to make.

"I've used, whenever possible, upgrades from previous trips, including personal travel to help lessen the expense to the state and that is a continuing practice on my part. Sometimes the only reservation available is first-class but when it's possible I either go business or coach. And I will continue to do so.

"I invite anyone here or outside to come and see me and ask me about any of the benefits that are now going on or about to happen between us and all of the Russias of Asia.

"One last fact. Many of us here think that Russians are predominantly white, Slavic and orthodox. In 1990 white Russians became a minority in their own country. They have over 75 different minorities and over a hundred languages and sub-language groups. They have much of a minority situation as we do and I think it benefits us all when we get closer -- in terms of economics, trade, travel and tourism.

"Thank you."

Senator Holt also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, on a point of personal privilege on a different subject matter -- procedural issue.

"In support of the Senator from Kahaluu, this morning the Advertiser's editorial speaks to a special session, in fact supports a special session. We are only on our 46th day, we still have a lot of time left. If anybody's been around this place, that's a lot of time.

"I would hope that if by chance we get to the 60th day and have to extend for school reform, that the Advertiser will support such an extension. They'll be 'slam dunking' in their field of dreams. Thank you."

However, there's a whole section being added here on dishonored checks. That section has been put into various other bills without success, then it appears here as an error. Because of this process, I'll be voting against the bill not because of its content but because of the process. Thank you."

Senator Blair, in support of the measure, responded:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the bill.

"The amendment on checks, while it may appear to be substantive, is included under the portion of the title of the bill dealing with correcting errors. This was inadvertently deleted from Article 3 of the Uniform Commercial Code, when that article was recently amended. It was a non-uniform provision within the generally uniform code. Apparently, when the article was revised or updated, they forgot to retain this non-uniform portion. It was clearly an error.

"I have clarified with the Legislative Reference Bureau that, since the matter was erroneously deleted, it does constitute an error which, upon a legislative finding of error, can be included in this bill. Thank you."

Senator Fernandes Salling then rose to inquire if the chairman of the Judiciary Committee would yield to a question. The Chair posed the question and the chairman having answered in the affirmative, Senator Fernandes Salling asked:

"Mr. President, as I understood from the speaker to my left, Senator A. Kobayashi, this provision was proposed in different bills and got defeated. I'm kind of curious now and a little bit confused as to whether or not it was inadvertently admitted and, therefore, that was the reason for placing it in here, or was it considered in other bills and voted down and all of a sudden now it's coming up again and being reinserted in this bill which normally is just dealt with to do housekeeping?"

Senator Blair answered:

"If you're asking me to clarify the remarks by Senator Kobayashi, I would do so only with the caveat that I'm not privy to her thoughts. My understanding is that this bill was heard only once in any committee. What Senator Kobayashi may have been referring to was that, once the error was discovered, people were looking around for a bill which could be utilized as a means of addressing the erroneous deletion. That may have been the reference to the other bills. But, I don't want to put words into the mouth of another Senator. I will defer to Senator Kobayashi to answer your question. Thank you."

Senator Fernandes Salling continued:

"So to the best of your knowledge you were not aware if this measure was being proposed in different bills and had been defeated. Is that correct?"

Senator Blair answered:

"I'm only aware that it was brought to me as an error and suggested that it might be included in this bill. I checked the legislative history and checked with the LRB as to the appropriateness of its inclusion. I was convinced, after my review of the legislative history, that the deletion was an error. I was told by the Legislative Reference Bureau that, so long as there was a legislative finding that found that the material was erroneously deleted in the previous update of the Uniform Commercial Code, this was an appropriate bill to reinsert erroneously deleted material back into the statute."

"This bill, Mr. President, has ten of the fourteen recommendations that the Governance Task Force has put on the table. It's a bill I think we can all be proud of. It has systematic and comprehensive restructuring of the educational system and what it does, Mr. President, is to take a look at the role and responsibilities of the Board of Education, the Department of Education, the unions, the bureaucracy, the Legislature and the governor, and asks them to give up control over methods and means in order to achieve greater policy results at the school level.

"What we're saying, Mr. President, is that we support school empowerment, we trust people at the school level by making the school the focal point, and that's what this bill does. In other words, Mr. President, this bill has no sacred cows. This bill eliminates over-regulation, red tape and excessive bureaucratic controls that the schools are now under.

"It's a bill that I think is a good start. We still have a long way to go. We're going to go to conference and continue our dialogue with the House. Hopefully, the governor will get involved and all the different entities. I think that at the end of the session we will come out with a legislative educational reform package that we can all be proud of.

"I hope that we all work together in the Senate to find some common ground on this as we move forward with the House. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Mizuguchi also rose to speak in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill and to commend the chairman of our Education Committee for advancing the discussion of educational reform and restructuring.

"I believe that 1977 was the last year when major reform of the Hawaii public schools was advanced. In 1977, the philosophy of the importance of each individual school to plan and budget for special needs monies was

put in place. This year, we have a greater opportunity to restructure and reform our public school system.

"In support of this measure, Mr. President, I would like to have the article from the Sunday Star-Bulletin and Advertiser, entitled, 'School boards need overhaul, report says, Educators call nation's educational governance ineffective' inserted in our Journal. In this article, various prominent scholars from Harvard and Stanford are recommending a total overhaul of the system, including the establishment of new local boards to oversee family, health and other non-educational children's issues currently overwhelming schools. As Harold Howe, senior lecturer at the Harvard Graduate School of Education, says in the article. We recognize that what kids learn is often affected by other things outside the school. Kids have a lot of needs not being met and someone in town has to do it.' The thought here is first, we need to define the mission of our public school system and decide what important disciplines should be taught in our schools. We need to reduce the burden and overload in our schools and find other community resources to assist our students in their educational pursuits.

"School boards need overhaul, report says

"Educators call nation's educational governance ineffective

Washington - The nation's school boards, which oversee the education of 47 million children, are consumed with trivial administrative decisions rather than setting educational policy, according to a stinging report by prominent educators released yesterday.

The first extensive look in recent times at America's school governance structure recommends a total overhaul of the system, including the establishment of new local boards to oversee family, health and other non-educational children's issues currently overwhelming schools.

The existing school boards would be linked to the proposed child service boards, according to the report, which was funded by the Twentieth Century Fund with some assistance from the Danforth Foundation. It also recommends that in big cities a mayoral appointment system replace elected school boards.

'We are recommending a special local affairs board for non-school affairs,' said Harold Howe, senior lecturer at the Harvard Graduate School of Education. 'We recognize that what kids learn is often affected by other things outside the school. Kids have a lot of needs not being met and someone in town has to do it.'

Michael Kirst, Stanford University professor of education, said America's decentralized system of 15,000 school boards employing 2.7 million people is unique in the world. He said the system was organized between 1850 and 1900, when the country was largely rural and school systems far smaller and less complex. Now, he said, one recent survey of West Virginia school boards showed that only 3 percent of all decisions focused primarily on education policy.

'The system was set up for a different era,' Kirst said. 'It doesn't fit the times. We need to be looking at the big picture' and establishing new methods of teaching and new standards.

Thomas Shannon, executive director of the National School Boards Association, strongly disputed the report's conclusions that the boards should be selected and operated differently. He said he agrees that state regulatory obstacles should be lessened, however, and said other recommendations are already being implemented. 'The bottom line is: There is nothing new in this report.'

Kirst disagrees. He said school boards in several states have gone into state receiverships because of mismanagement, and others are plagued by patronage problems. Because some cities elect their board members to represent individual wards, they often care more about 'getting resources, jobs and contracts to their ward' than about educating students, he said.

In New York City school board elections, the voter turnout has dipped as low as 7 percent. The report recommends that where elections do occur, they be invalidated if less than 20 percent of potential voters turn out.

'There has been a history of school boards being more preoccupied with politics than education,' said Robert Wagner, past president of the New York City Board of Education and one of the 19 business leaders, educators and civic leaders involved in the report. 'Unless we fix the school board structure,' he said, 'all the talk about school reform won't happen.'"

Senator B. Kobayashi also rose to speak in support of the measure and stated:

"Mr. President, I'd like to speak in favor of the bill and commend the Education chair for coming forth with this effort which is a major effort toward school reform.

"Many people have suggested that this bill does not do enough because it does not address any major changes in the Board of Education. The bill proposes that the Board of Education still be elected but that its powers and responsibilities be limited to those of policy, such as the setting of goals and standards, as opposed to getting involved in the implementation and management of these policies and goals.

"The bill also has the school superintendent still appointed by the board, but for a limited term of three years.

"These changes are not significant and because of this some people seem to be disappointed. I would note that educational reform at the very top does not always mean educational improvement at the level of the student. It is at the level of the classroom where the students are that educational reform really has or should have an impact. This bill addresses the questions put forth by the educational governance task force having to do with streamlining and decentralization of the school system. It is through this means that we hope to change and improve what happens to students within the classroom. This, I think, is the real arena for educational reform.

"This bill is a step toward conference committee. The House has a very different stance which I think puts us in

a good negotiating position to discuss many of the issues brought up by the educational governance task force and also several other issues to be raised by the House. Thank you."

Senator Cobb also rose to speak in support of the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the bill and taking upon the remarks of the previous speaker, the Senator from Kahala and Kaimuki.

"I had signed the bill 'with reservation' because I didn't feel it went far enough. However, I recognize this is a step towards conference and I support and trust the chairman sufficiently to say, take the latitude that you need in conference committee to hammer out a good proposal with meaningful changes and bring it back. This is a very important bill and I would not want to do anything to impede its passage.

"I note that the present elected board, as it is constituted, in the survey by the governor's task force only had the support of 8% of the population in the respondents' poll which was conducted by that task force. So I know that there is a lot of support out there for very significant and meaningful changes, not only at the top but how things are done in the classroom, and how the money gets spent, and where the responsibility is.

"I commend the chairman for his efforts and wish him all the best in conference. Thank you."

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, again, I will be voting for his bill with reservation. I'm very happy to see that the committee has moved more toward the middle road here, but I would be more fully in support of this bill if the mandated roll-back was made more specific and it contained provisions by pay-at-the-pump funding.

"You could hardly design an auto-insurance system worse than ours.

"Under the current system, about 40 cents of every auto-insurance dollar goes toward selling policies or administering claims, not for fixing cars or compensating the injured.

"A sensible, efficient program would save in two ways: It would, first, all but eliminate sales costs and, second, all but eliminate legal fees.

"Why sell insurance one policy at a time when we require everyone, by law, to have it? Imagine the added cost if we had to sell Social Security insurance one policy at a time. Or if we outlawed the sale of group health insurance.

"More than 15 cents of each auto-insurance dollar is spent signing people up. (And lots of people don't sign up, pushing onto the rest of us the cost of any damage they do.)

"Everyone should be covered automatically. Autoinsurance 'premiums' should be added to the cost of gasoline. You would be fully covered, after a deductible. Collecting the premiums automatically this way would save a fortune in selling and administrative costs. It would end the problem of people driving uninsured, and there would be a lot less suing going on, because we would stop spending billions of dollars and clogging the courts to decide who was at fault.

"As Senator Daniel Moynihan wrote years ago, 'The courts are overwhelmed, swamped, inundated, choked, in a futile quest to carry out a mundane mission -- deciding who hit whom on the highway when every day there will be thousands and thousands of such events -- we are sacrificing the most precious of our institutions: the independent judiciary.'

"Pay-at-the-pump no-fault auto insurance is an idea whose time has come. I urge my colleagues to consider this important concept.

"So I'll be voting with reservation. Thank you,"

Senator Ikeda, in support of the measure, said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

"Very briefly, we took the suggested wording on the rate freeze and roll-back from the insurance commissioner. In making the revision, a typographical error was made. A '3' was placed where a '5' should have been and so it appears as though we have reduced the period of the rate freeze to December 31, 1993. I want to assure you that this is a typographical error. The intent was to continue with the 3-year freeze, and we will take care of that in conference. Thank you."

Senator Fernandes Salling also rose to speak in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I will also be voting in favor of this bill with reservation. I do so because I have seen that the Consumer Protection Committee has really come a long way in developing a tort reform bill, but I believe that it needs to go further. I believe very strongly that what we need to be able to take home is a guaranteed reduction in our insurance premiums.

"I also ask the committee in their deliberations in conference to reconsider decreasing the liability amount. That is where those people who are seriously injured can be adequately compensated and although I believe you've reduced it by ten thousand rather than more (I may be wrong, you might want to correct me on that), it's still a reduction and in the end I would hate to see for us to have to pay for reduced insurance premiums by taking out of our pockets and, for example, paying for it with money that we would have to use to pay for higher medical insurance coverage. I urge the committee to keep in mind the benefits to the injured party because in the end if we're going to come out with a reduction in insurance premiums we want to maintain the benefits that they are entitled to today."

FORTY-EIGHTH DAY

Wednesday, April 8, 1992

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 11:40 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Bishop Patrick K. Kanekoa, The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chang, Crozier and Wong who were excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Seventh Day.

Senator B. Kobayashi then made the following introduction to the members of the Senate:

"Mr. President, tomorrow, April 9th, is the 30th anniversary of the recognition of the Diamond Head State Monument. On April 9, 1962, in acknowledgment of the vision and dedication of citizens and organizations concerned with the growth in development and environmental degradation around Diamond Head, Governor William F. Quinn set aside public lands within and around Diamond Head for a monument. He did this in Executive Order 2000.

"The recognition of Diamond Head is merely a reflection of the grandeur of one of Hawaii's most recognized landmarks. Subsequent to this event, the Legislature in 1965 established the Diamond Head State Monument pursuant to Act 249, Session Laws of 1965. And, again, in 1975 included in the monument adjacent lands for the protection of the monument.

"The 30th anniversary recognition of the Diamond Head State Monument is an appropriate time to recognize certain individuals who were key to that significant event.

"We have on the floor with us some of those individuals. It is with pleasure that I ask you to recognize former Governor William F. Quinn. (Governor Quinn stood to be recognized.) With Governor Quinn are three women, long active with the Outdoor Circle, who helped bring about this achievement and who have been stewards of our environment and of Diamond Head --Mrs. Alice Woolaway, Mrs. Luci Phaltzgraff and Mrs. Cynthia Marnie.

"Joining them in the gallery are: Mrs. Allan Davis and Mrs. Betty Crocker; Mr. Alan Voronaeff of the Kapiolani Park Preservation Society; and a supporter of the Diamond Head State Monument and organizer of this event, Mrs. Michelle Matson."

Former Governor Quinn, Mrs. Woolaway, Mrs. Phaltzgraff and Mrs. Marnie stood to be recognized and were presented the Senate certificate of recognition by Senator B. Kobayashi and leis by various Senators.

Senator A. Kobayashi then stood to introduce Mr. Tom Heinrich as follows:

"Mr. President, seated in the audience today is a staff attorney who formed a 'revolutionary committee' among our staff members, some of whom are Charlotte Nekota, Sally Preston, Ruth Itamura, Ann Yamamoto, Karen Nakasato, Celeste Nip, Mike Imanaka, Marc Matsuura, Lacene Terri, Steffiny Masada, and several others. He is Tom Heinrich. Today is Tom's birthday, and I would like to ask Tom to stand to be recognized." At 11:48 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

Senator Ikeda then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"I didn't want to prolong yesterday's session, particularly because it went so long, but I have to tell you that the headline in the Tuesday's Advertiser, 'Guards go free despite jail sex charges,' really bothered me. I think it's wrong that this kind of activity is going on and its even worse that these people are charged with criminal behavior yet none of them have been prosecuted.

"It seems to me that this on-going occurrence has been quietly swept under the rug. I have to ask, 'Does the system feel that women prisoners have no rights and guards are free to take advantage of them? Is this why this whole situation is being ignored?' If that is the case, what is it saying about our society and about our feeling about women in general?

"Sexual misconduct by a guard is a crime by allowing guards to get away with this. The system is saying to women in general that it's alright to abuse women because women don't count. Society treats them and regards them as second class citizens. We must not allow this perception to continue and go unchallenged.

"Mr. President, we have done a lot in this Legislature as well as through the Women's Caucus to call attention to crimes against women. I don't think we should shirk our responsibility now. I don't think that because these women happen to have committed a crime against society and are incarcerated that they deserve any less justice than anyone else. I think that this grave injustice must be corrected and it should be done now.

"Since an administrative investigation is obviously inadequate, then perhaps a criminal investigation should be conducted. I don't think that we should sit here and allow this to go unnoticed.

"I want to know who these people are. I want to know what happened to them. I want to know if they are still in the system and if they are still working as guards. And if they are, where are they and in what capacity. I want to know who's monitoring their current behavior as well as their future behavior and, more so, I want to know why they can commit a crime and get away with it.

"Mr. President, I'm going to ask the chairmen of the appropriate committees, the Committee on Judiciary and the Committee on Public Institutions, to look into this matter and to report back to us and, if necessary, Mr. President, that we take stronger action on our own rather than allow this behavior to continue.

"We've been warned by a front page story. We should not allow the issue to be buried even though the session might end. Thank you."

Senator Solomon, also on a point of personal privilege, said:

"Mr. President, on a point of personal privilege, rising to speak in support of the previous speaker. I would also encourage the committees on Public Institutions and Judiciary to investigate the matter and perhaps be able to report back to the Senate body as to the allegations and investigation.

"Thank you."

Senator Fernandes Salling also rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, I too rise to support the previous speakers' request to look into this serious matter."

Senator Matsuura also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"I just want to add that this is not only of interest to the women, it is also involves all of the men to at least find out what happened. Thank you."

Senator A. Kobayashi also rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I would like to thank the Senator from Hawaii Kai for bringing up the issue and bringing it to the forefront. I know we will all be supporting her efforts."

Senator McMurdo also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I would like to add my support. I feel exactly the same way as the Senator from Hawaii Kai does. All of us do. I think this is very important."

Senator Tungpalan also rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I do wish to add my support also to the effort to look into the matter that was brought forth by the Senator from Hawaii Kai. It seems as though we are targets not only for the destruction of our heiaus, as it seems to be the case in Halawa, but also as we are dealt with in criminal matters.

"Let's hope that in the end, when we look at the tally of bills that pass, it will not reflect that this Legislature is in like mind with some of the matters that we have seen reported in the paper yesterday.

"Let us show them that we stand firm against violence in our homes, against violence in the work place and this certainly is one of the tributes I think we can add to the body of knowledge and the body of laws that will be passed this year."

Senator McMurdo then rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"I wonder if the President would ask Senator Tungpalan to get a new microwave oven or at least let the smoke go toward Senator Iwase's office, the next time this happens, or cook brownies." Senator Tungpalan responded:

"The temperature in my room is very hot. There are several issues, unfortunately, which have caused me to have a rise in temperature and I hope that it cools down, Senator, so won't be getting anymore heat from my room. Thank you."

Senator McCartney rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I too rise to support the Senator from Hawaii Kai on the issue of the women's prison. Wrong is wrong and right is right and we have to get to the bottom of this moral issue and I want to commend the Senator for taking a stand."

Senator Cobb also rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, rising in support of the remarks of the Senator from Hawaii Kai, I rise on point of personal privilege on an entirely different matter that has been in the press.

"On the subject travel, repeatedly the press has asked, 'What are the economic benefits in flying off to Russia?' My prediction is we will get back ten dollars or more in less than two years for every dollar that has been spent.

"Very briefly, I would like to share with my colleagues some of the hard evidence of on-going economic development already taking place between Hawaii and Russia.

"First example is a sample of diamond film technology on a computer hard disc from the Kurchatov Atomic Energy Institute in Moscow, Russia. What they do is take artificial diamonds and they've invented the technology for this, taking artificial diamonds, crushing them to a thin micron level film which is used to superharden almost any instrument such as a computer disc here (held up disc) or ball bearings or surgical instruments, a whole variety of other applications for business use, will in effect enable continuous acquisition or access of a hard disc on a computer for over a hundred years. It will multiply by 500 the lifetime of a surgical instrument. It will multiply by over 100 the life of a ball bearing. While they have the patent, they offer this, and I have a fact sheet on this for any Senator or member of the media who's interested, from Professor Rizantsev who is the head of that particular division of the institute who invented the diamond film technology.

"I've taken this fact sheet and the information they've provided and sent it to over 100 companies in Hawaii and over 200 on the mainland. A number have already contacted the Kurchatov Institute and placed orders. Their savings on this will be quite substantial even though it's impossible to quantify the business savings at this point in time.

"In addition, a group of local investors is being formed to be on the ground floor for food and other investments in many of the republics. Service is going to be starting from Hawaii with exports not only to Moscow and the university but parts of Siberia. There is establishing now a computer modum network for ordering products directly from Hawaii. Also, with excess to the entire Russian 'E' mail system.

"A number of U.S. automakers are going into five republics. A joint radiation study is going on in Minsk, Belarus, Russia, involving Hawaii and mainland companies. A needs assessment is being conducted to order such items as used agricultural machinery, used baking equipment, silos and even hamburger grinders. Local businessmen, including three who are either Chinese or Hawaiian, have called my office in the last five days contacting me on how to order tuna from the Russians and I put them in touch with the Russian counsel general in San Francisco. These are local businessmen. Ruble conversion is now being developed and refined here in Hawaii.

"The value of just some of these projects is already estimated to be over \$1 million and there is much more to come.

"What I don't like to see is an attempt to quantify the value of every trip because many trips are made for information. But you gather data for use in subsequent legislation here in Hawaii. So in many cases, a dollar value cannot be put on a trip but since it was made an issue, in my particular case, I am willing to respond in detail.

"Finally, I would like to read a very brief editorial because some of the comments I have heard say, 'Ignore what they are doing. Ignore the problem over there and take care of our own.' Mr. President, I wish our local media had the courage to write an editorial like this in the Albuquerque Journal. Since it is brief I would like to share it with members of the Senate:

'A bipartisan delegation that included Sen. Jeff Bingaman returned last week from the former Soviet Union with a frightening vision. But the key man in any effort to stabilize a volatile situation seems too near-sighted to exert the necessary leadership.

'The United States spent trillions to fight the Cold War, a sacrifice made willingly in the face of a formidable, but predictable enemy. In the aftermath, the former Soviet empire splinters into a number of armed camps each of which, though less formidable, is far less predictable. Some have nuclear weapons or expertise in their design.

'Unless we can muster the will to spend a few billion more, the United States could look back on the Cold War years with nostalgia.

'But President Bush is undercut on the left and right by rivals who demagogue against spending any money abroad when people are out of work here.

'Bush should ignore the snipers, get his mind off November and get the voters' eyes on the future. Another putsch by Russian hardliners is not going to put workers back on the line at GM. A series of regional brush-fire wars that could escalate out of control won't make the homeless less cold at night.

Policies that ease the shaky republics over the hump, let seeds of freedom and free markets take root and grow into trade partners instead of partners in enmity could create jobs and secure an era of peace. Exercise leadership and the election will take care of itself.'

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Thursday, April 9, 1992

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 11:42 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Bruce Craft, St. John Lutheran Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Chang who was excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Eighth Day.

Senator B. Kobayashi then rose to introduced a group of representatives from Troop 10, Boy Scouts of America, as follows:

"Mr. President, Troop 10, Boy Scouts of America, is celebrating its 75th anniversary, making the troop the longest, continuously active Boy Scout troop in the Aloha Council, State of Hawaii. The troop was organized in 1917 by Mayor Charles S. Crane who served as scoutmaster until 1945 when he was succeeded by scoutmaster Masao Miyamoto, a member since 1925. Mr. Miyamoto has served as scoutmaster until this year.

"Throughout the 75 years, the troop has seen many individuals come and go but one of the constants has been its 'home' in Kaimuki in the so-called 'bowl,' an abandoned, roofless, stone reservoir behind the Kaimuki Fire Station. In this 'bowl,' Troop 10 has nurtured over 1,600 boys during its many decades of active public service.

"With us on the floor are some individuals from Troop 10. I would like to introduce: Mr. Masao Miyamoto, scoutmaster emeritus; Mr. Gordon Wong, new scoutmaster; Mr. Robert Fujimoto, president of the Aloha Council, Boy Scouts of America; Mr. Robert Toyofuku, executive director of the Pacific Law Institute, and Bishop Estate trustee, former Chief Justice William Richardson, alumni of Troop 10; and Mr. Eric Girndt, Eagle Scout of Troop 10."

Senator Kobayashi also introduced the following individuals, seated in the audience: Gary Shiraishi, president, Troop 10 Parent/Scouters Guild; Alice Watanabe, troop committee member; Walter and Evelyn Girndt, parents of Eagle Scout Eric Girndt; Thomas Yee, Eagle Scout of Troop 10, and parents Edward and Florence Yee; Douglas Tsuruda, assistant scoutmaster and alumnus of Troop 10; and alumuni of Troop 10: Robert Nunokawa of the Kaimuki Lion's Club, official sponsors of Troop 10, and Bert Komenaka, member of the Parent/Scouters Guild.

"Throughout the years, Troop 10 and the Boy Scouts of America have contributed a great deal to the community and I think that we owe these gentlemen, parents and scouts a round of applause.

"I would add that I was a former member of Troop 10 and had the opportunity to see the likes of former councilman George Akahane when he had Democratic party tendencies; Abe Aiona, long-time police chief from Maui and now a trustee of OHA; Joe Ono, county prosecutor of the Big Island; and Dr. Richard Mitsunaga, practicing pediatrician. Troop 10 people are here and there and everywhere." Senator Nakasato then introduced Dole Intermediate School students Vantha "Van" Saopeng and Lilian "Lilly" Augustin, participants of the Career Shadow Program.

MISCELLANEOUS COMMUNICATION

Misc. Com. No. 5, from the House of Delegates, Commonwealth of Virginia, dated April 2, 1992, transmitting House Joint Resolution No. 62 of the General Assembly of Virginia, requesting that state legislatures apply to Congress for proposal of a Constitutional amendment providing power to the President for a lineitem veto of appropriate measures.

Senator Iwase then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, over the past several days both daily newspapers have run front page stories about the travel policy of the State Legislature. There has been a great adverse public reaction to that policy.

"It would be easy to ignore this controversy as being contrived. What we cannot ignore is that it has been a spark which has touched off a maelstrom of discontent.

"It is a fire storm which will not be extinguished by speeches or memorandums justifying that policy.

"I believe that it is a manifestation of public frustration that is not limited to Hawaii. It is on a national and even on an international level. Its causes are rooted in fear fear that we have lost control over events; fear that the problems which confront us today will not be resolved; fear, to paraphrase a poet, that we are not the captain of our souls or the master of our fate. Mr. President, I think we are all aware, today, that there is a malaise of the spirit, a great uncertainty about our future and the kind of life we will have. In his book, 'Why Americans Hate Politics,' E.J. Dionne wrote: 'If Americans had come to hate politics it was because politics no longer seemed to offer them a way out of this trap.'

"He wrote further: 'Politics has stopped being a deliberative process through which people resolved disputes, found remedies and moved forward.'

"And he finally observed: 'To restore popular faith in the possibilities of government, government must be shown to work.'

"Mr. President, I know that this body will not dismiss the public's anger over this issue as a mere complaint over a travel policy which will go away by simply changing the policy. The issue should not be where we've gone as Senators, but rather where we're going as a society.

"Mr. President, none of us here ran for office to fly on airplanes. We ran for a number of positive reasons but I am sure that among them was a belief that we could make a difference; that we could advance and improve the quality of life for all of our citizens. We share with our constituents a serious concern over such issues as the rising drug problem, a rising cost-of-living which demands two working parents and which results in latchkey families. We are concerned about the rise in the number of homeless families. We share a concern over whether or not we can or will bequeath a better future to our children.

"Abraham Lincoln once said that the 'dogmas of the quiet past are inadequate for the stormy present.' Mr.

President, it is incumbent upon us to deal with the issues which buffet our state. All of us who collectively serve in all levels of government must demonstrate that government does work, that there is a way out of this trap, that remedies will be found and that we will move forward. It is a responsibility we cannot escape. It is a responsibility which we must meet. Perhaps if we succeed in this difficult journey we will then reinstill, at that point in time, in the public, in the words of a writer that 'politics is a noble profession and constitutes public service in its finest sense.'

"Thank you."

Senator Holt also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, over the last few weeks the news media has focused a large amount of time and effort on out-ofstate travel by legislators. Unfortunately, however, the so-called news reports seem to have taken a negative turn.

"In this morning's edition of the Honolulu Advertiser, for example, an editorial on this matter compared travel by legislators as a scandal similar to the U.S. House bank scandal. As far as I'm concerned, Mr. President, these kinds of tactics by the news media amounts to nothing more than manufacturing news through sensationalism.

"If the fair reporting of news was foremost in their mind, Mr. President, all state-funded travel by first-class, including the governor, his department heads, the president of the University of Hawaii, the superintendent of education, and the members of boards and commissions should have been reported individually and accurately.

"It should be pointed out very clearly, Mr. President, that legislators are not the only state employees who are authorized to travel on first-class.

"Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I believe I have been a recipient of unfair coverage as how I was never in Japan, never in Florida. It really grieved me to see my name placed under banner headlines as being the biggest spender of these trips so I felt it incumbent to visit the Star-Bulletin and take action against making what was incorrectly reported correct. And I think when we feel in this government that we are being dealt with in an unfair manner it is our responsibility to bring it before the public and to let them know that this is not the case.

"Unfortunately, my child was hurt in the process. On Saturday we came to my office to review my bills. He came with me because I had been at hearings and meetings till late at night during the whole week and I had not seen him during the entire week. So I asked him that morning, 'Would you like to come with mommy and stay with me in my office while I worked?' He accepted that challenge. For a 10-year-old, sitting in an office isn't about the best thing on their list of things to do, but he came.

"While he was in the office he received a phone call from an irate women who had said, 'Tell your mommy to take coach next time. Don't ride first-class. I'm really appalled that she spent \$16,000 traveling on our taxpayers fund.' My son said, 'Wait a minute, my mommy has

never been to Japan. My mommy has never been to Florida. I don't know what you're talking about.' And she said, 'You're a liar. You get that through your head. You're a liar.'

"Mr. President and my fellow colleagues, that is what really upset me most. Not so much that there was an error in the paper, not so much that they were willing to correct it but that people out there really believe what is printed in the paper. They believe. This is the gospel truth.

"That a little child, 10 years old, was manufacturing a lie. I mean, I used to think that out of the mouths of babes come the truth. But it's really out of the mouths of other things, I guess, and maybe newspapers are at the top of the list for some people that is why we have to be sure that when reporting goes on in this state it has to be accurate. It shouldn't be at the whim of somebody who has to meet a deadline. It has to be accurate because it affects the lives of individuals.

"It was at that point that I asked myself, 'Is it worth it?' Is is worth it to see, ahh, my most precious son hurt in a process where I believe ... you know I've really been above board ... I've tried not to take junkets, I've turned down trips to Japan. Every year I've been offered a trip to Japan, I've never been to Japan. I've never even been to Florida. I don't even go on junkets. And to have this turned around on that day at that minute, that was a very sad realization of the power of the press. And yes indeed people have said don't argue with people who buy ink by the barrel. I did. I went to the editor and I spoke to him and he was kind enough to write a correction on the front page. He was kind enough to make that inaccuracy accurate.

"The editor of the Star-Bulletin came to my office and spent four hours with me apologizing to my son, apologizing to every member of my family who was there, my daughter was also there. He took the time to do that. I think that's heroic. I think that's really stellar performance on the part of a newspaper to do that.

"We were also thrown some barbs on Channel 5. I called Bob Reese who had made statements that we were living off state funds and we weren't doing our jobs. I told him, 'Hey, listen, get the facts straight before you make these kinds of statements.' He was kind enough to extend an invitation to his program on Channel 5 to the Senators who were incorrectly targeted on his program that night.

"What I see happening in today's world is that the journalists, of this state at least, are accepting the responsibility to report accuracies and when it is inaccurate, they are placing it on the front pages, they are giving time on TV channels, and that is what has to be done.

"As to the matter of how we should fly, I have already taken a position. You can say it as eloquently as you want, but the bottom time line is if we are going to ask people of this state to tuck in their belts then we ought to do it too. We're not higher than they are. Thank you."

Senator Cobb also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, rising on the same point, yesterday, I gave a detailed report on some of the economic benefits of going to Russia. I think one other point needs to be made.

"Last year's travel was on last year's budget but is being reported this year. This year there is a budget shortfall and I think if anything, we should be setting the example by cutting, by going coach or business whenever possible. If we're asking other state agencies to take a 7% cut we should be willing to do the same and I hope that is reflected in the overall travel plans, my own included, that are coming up later this year.

"And as I pointed out further, I've been to Russia and the other republics seven times, five times at my own expense. The knowledge that I acquired was used to lessen the cost to the state, as a result, and that knowledge was acquired on private travel at my own expense.

"Thank you."

Senator McCartney also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"I would like to support the Senator from Mililani. I thought he made some very good points on the issue that there are many important issues facing the people of Hawaii today -- education, housing, the budget. And this session we need to exert our leadership to solve these important problems and we cannot get side-tracked.

"Mr. President, I was disturbed the other day when I read in the newspaper that some say that traveling firstclass is a privilege earned by elected officials. Mr. President, I say, 'No.' That is not a privilege and many of us do not feel that we've earned that. It is a <u>privilege</u>, Mr. President, to be elected by the people of this state and it's a privilege that I take seriously and responsibly and do my job to the best of my ability. We have been given this responsibility to raise money and to be held accountable for how it's used. It's taxpayers money and therefore we must be responsible to those who give us this privilege.

"On the issue of first-class travel, Mr. President, the people have spoken. It's their money and I believe we must acknowledge this fact and I will adhere to their terms and I think in the future we need to be receptive and responsive to that.

"Mr. President, let's put this issue to rest, let's moveforward on the bigger issues facing the people of Hawaii -- education, housing, the budget. And like the Senator from Mililani has said, let's work together to make a difference; to focus on Hawaii's future and move forward. That's what we got elected for and that's a privilege the people of Hawaii gave us.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator McMurdo also rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"The irony in the correction by the newspaper on the Senator from Pearl City meant that those of us who had been in Saturday's paper were again repeated in Monday's paper. They didn't just correct the incorrect edition. They ran it in both editions so those people who did not see it on Saturday were sure to see it on Monday!

"I think that it's high time that, if the Senate puts this behind them the media should too. This whole thing has been blown out of proportion. "Let me give you one quick example. The other night the Star-Bulletin had a huge headline about the ozone, that the depletion is happening faster and that we are in real danger. But did the Star-Bulletin follow-up with any story about the fact that this state was the first one to put in a CFC bill? Or did they say that we passed one the other day on the floor? We have passed two of those this year. Now it's up to the House and I have been talking to the people over there begging them to please put that bill through because it is urgent.

"Now if the papers are going to castigate us for something like that (the first class) then I think the least that they can do is print things of this order which are good and are far-reaching and are extremely important.

"Thank you."

Senator Crozier also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, this issue about travel, I guess the spotlight has been on my forehead and the glare has been hitting the rest of you in the eyes. What I did, I did alone. I take the consequences alone. When I have talked to people I have never once referred to anybody else. That's my issue, I have to live with it.

"I tried to explain my position last Friday, to you and the body and also to the general public, hoping that I would get some kind of comments made in the press. Well, I wasn't successful. Nothing was written about the comments I made last Friday. I thought it was well thought out but I got nowhere.

"Today, Mr. President, I am only talking to you and my colleagues. I don't expect the press to write anything.

"What I want to say is that people have asked me how come I haven't responded. Why am I not making some kind of reply? I tried and tried, that didn't work. I took the position, there is no sense shouting now in this maelstrom. Nobody cares. The press has sent out a clear message, I can't deny the arguments they presented. They presented it in a clear manner but the public has been so outraged that they are not ready to listen to me. I have a message to tell them but they don't want to hear it yet. So when they are ready ... I've already talked to one of the newspapers, I'm putting in a point of view so that I can get my story out there so they can understand that when it comes to first-class travel, I just will have to be taken to the woodshed, that's it. I did it, that's it. John Sununu went to the woodshed. Plenty other guys went to the woodshed, okay, so I gotta go.

"But the point about the exercise that I did in New Zealand, the point where I worked with the Maori people, the many benefits that were gained from my experience have all been lost. That, Mr. President, I need to convince the people of Hawaii that every minute that I spent in New Zealand had a direct benefit to the committee that I chair. Had a direct benefit to the Hawaiian people of this state. Has a direct benefit to the people of Hawaii.

"Hopefully, when these articles are published maybe some people can understand what I tried to do and what I tried to accomplish. Thank you very much."

The Chair then said:

"Before the close of discussion on the issue, I must remind my colleagues -- and I speak to you as your President -- that the granting of trips is the sole responsibility of the President. I don't want you to forget that. That should be mentioned if questions should occur. The President gives the final approval for all Senate trips. I do have the power to say 'yes' or 'no.'"

FIFTY-FIRST DAY

Monday, April 13, 1992

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 11:34 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Eijo Ikenaga, Honolulu Myohuji Mission, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Chang who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fiftieth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator McMurdo introduced Mrs. Helen H. Cole, Ms. Dion-Magrit Coschigano, Dr. Bruce Justin Miller and Mr. Jack Davidson as follows:

"Mr. President and members of this honorable body, it gives me great pleasure to introduce you to our honored guests. I have two honored guests in different fields but they have both served honorably and equally in the fields from which they are.

"First, Helen H. Cole, trustee emeritus, Historic Hawaii Foundation, and Ms. Dion-Magrit Coschigano, executive vice president of the Historic Hawaii Foundation, who is accompanying Mrs. Cole to this presentation.

"The second honored guest is Dr. Bruce Justin Miller. He is probably known very well to most of us around here as the director of the Sea Grant Extension Service of the University of Hawaii. (Stood to be recognized.)

"And last but not least, is Dr. Jack Davidson who is the director of the Sea Grant College Program. (Stood to be recognized.)

"Mr. President, Helen H. Cole, or Mrs. Allyn Cole Jr. as she is formally known, is a volunteer of tremendous heart. Presently, she is actively involved in six different organizations. Helen has said, 'All the volunteer hours spent have been fun and very rewarding.' In her past involvements, I find that she is the co-founder of Historic Hawaii Foundation and she was active with the Daughters of Hawaii, the Hawaii Museums Association and the Historic Preservation.

"Helen Cole has also been involved with the Girl Scout movement since 1925, when she joined a Girl Scout troop at Sacred Hearts Church on Wilder Avenue. While teaching in Honokaa on the Big Island, she became a leader of a Senior Girl Scout troop. Later, she became a board member of the Girl Scout Council of the Pacific.

"At the 75th Distinguished Alumnae Dinner held in November 1991 of the Girl Scout Council of Hawaii, Helen Cole was awarded the very prestigious 'Living Treasure Award.' This award is given to women who, although not currently active with Girl Scouts, have been involved with the Girl Scouts in some way throughout their lives. (And I would like to especially have Senator Bert Kobayashi take note that Girl Scouts can stay active for years too. We had a troop of Boy Scouts so we're not going to be outdone by them.)

"My next honoree is Dr. Bruce Justin Miller. He is director of the Sea Grant Extension Service at the University of Hawaii. He is accompanied by his boss, Dr. Jack Davidson, the director of the Sea Grant College Program. (Drs. Miller and Davidson stood to be recognized.)

"Mr. President, as you know, Act 77 was signed into law in 1989, the first piece of legislation in the nation to enact initial action to curb the effects of ozone depleting compounds, such as chlorofluorocarbons and halons. We have read and heard of the horror stories that these compounds are responsible for in a breakdown of the ozone layer. This is not only in the polar regions but also over Hawaii and other subtropical regions.

"One of the major players responsible over the years for advice, technical assistance, and the development of legislation has been Dr. Miller. I am extremely grateful for the work the University of Hawaii Sea Grant Program and he have done for the Legislature and the state. He has devoted much of his professional life educating the public and encouraging responsible public action on global issues, such as ozone depletion, greenhouse warming, preservation of natural species diversity, and world population stabilization, and assisting the state in developing legislation and educational materials on the environment."

Senator McMurdo presented the Senate certificates of recognition to the honorees and Senators Mizuguchi, McCartney, A. Kobayashi and Tungpalan presented the leis.

Senator McMurdo also introduced Mr. Scot Vogel of the Sea Grant Extension Service who was seated in the gallery.

Senator Nakasato, on behalf of Senators McCartney, Koki and himself, introduced the following special guests, seated in the gallery, from the Okinawa Prefectual Government: Vice Governor of Okinawa, Mr. Hirokazu Nakaima; deputy director Mr. Nobutaka Shinomiya; and Mr. Isao Shiroma, secretary to Vice Governor Nakaima. The gentlemen were escorted by Mr. Warren Higa, president of the 41,000-strong members of the United Okinawan Association.

"First of all, let it not be said that this body does not pass Republican bills. I thank the chairs of the Judiciary and the Labor and Employment Committees for seeing this bill through.

"Mr. President, this bill seeks to prevent employers from suing employees who desire to work for a competitor. Some employers keep employees from working for a competitor by requiring the employee to sign a non-competition agreement. Non-competition contracts have been typically used when a business is sold and the buyer does not want the previous owner to then use his newly found capital to go into competition with the new buyer. This is understandable. Non-competition contracts have also been used when the employee is given access to trade secrets or an exclusive territory, but some companies have been using these contracts on managers, sales people and, if you can believe, security guards.

"These are clear violations of trade restriction laws, but these employees do not have the resources to sue. Three salesmen were sued by their employer when they went to work for a competitor. Although the judge threw the suit out, it cost them \$45,000 in legal fees.

"This bill will make employers pay the legal fees if they lose, so they need to be well-advised to have a good case before suing. Thank you."

Those of us who make adamant statements are destined to revisit those same remarks from different perspectives.

"For the past six years I have had a 'romance with education,' attending the Program for Senior Executives of State and Local Government at the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University in 1985, returning to school to earn my bachelors degree in Public Administration in 1987 from the University of Hawaii at West Oahu, and now participating in the certificate program in Public Administration at the University of Hawaii at Manoa.

"All these courses were designed to make the student, including myself, a better and more sensitive and efficient public servant.

"When I applied to attend the certificate program, I had no qualms about government paying for my tuition and expenses because I have seen many government officials from around the world, both elected and appointed, being sponsored by their governments to attend the East-West Center. I have also seen it at Harvard, and have received invitations to attend a summer program at Princeton. The investment in education of their officials is an acceptable practice in many jurisdictions and nations.

"I was taken aback by the fire storm created by the publication of the Hawaii Monitor of my practicum and the editorial comment 'by requesting that the Senate pay the full costs of his air fare and lengthy per diem, Sen. Crozier in effect granted himself a scholarship to underwrite his UH degree program.' "Both daily newspaper editorials demanded that I return the money. My senate and home phones have been ringing constantly with people sharing their frustration and outrage.

"One phone call that had an enormous impact was on the evening of the breaking story. It was from my 15year-old nephew Kelly, who was heartbroken that I had done such a thing. I tried to explain to him, and he accepted my explanation but was still disappointed in his uncle.

"I sat down with the Star-Bulletin editor of the editorial page, John Simonds, and the full editorial staff to try and explain my side of the story. But to no avail. In their eyes I had no right to use taxpayers' money for my own self-improvement.

"The soul-searching was ongoing and I was wondering why this was happening to me. Everything I did was to better myself as a servant of the people. To be as informed, as sensitive, as accessible, and as astute a policymaker as I could be.

"I began to realize that the difference between my trip and my colleagues' trips was that theirs were strictly for senate business and I had commingled education and senate duties and had crossed the boundaries of acceptability.

"I had not broken any law nor had I broken any rule, however, I had broken the undefined public trust. In my zeal to be the best public servant I could be, I, like the quotation of Justice Brandeis was well-meaning, but without understanding. In other words, no matter how well-intended, I went too far. First, to fly first class, and second, to combine my educational requirements with committee work and expect the taxpayers to pay for it.

"I have decided to return the \$12,501.80 (Check No. 804 dated April 13, 1992, to Hawaii State Senate, /s/ Mike Crozier) to the Senate coffers immediately and apologize to the people of Hawaii for breaking their trust, to my colleagues for embarrassing them, and to family members, especially my wife Lynette who had to field much of the anguish along side of me.

"I hold no animosity to the Hawaii Monitor or any member of the press, nor do I hold any negative feelings to the many callers and letter to the editor writers. We live in a free society and it is this experience that proves that government is accountable to the people. In fact, although painful, I owe them a debt of gratitude.

"I would like to thank those who supported me, especially my wife Lynette. I would like to thank members of my family and certain friends who have given me short-term loans to pay back the state immediately and allowed me time to make a long-term financial loan.

"Thank you."

The Chair then remarked:

"Thank you very much, Senator Crozier.

"Members of the Senate, I attended the press conference this morning.

"Senator Crozier, again, I want to repeat, the authorization of your trip was approved by the President's office. That's where the responsibility for travel approval lies. The decision for you to repay the Senate was voluntary on your own part. The Senate has accepted your check. The books are closed. I hope the issue is now ended." Senator Cobb then rose on a point of parliamentary inquiry as follows:

"Mr. President, circulated and left on my desk, and I see it also on other senators', is a copy of a newspaper article, apparently from the Hawaii Tribune-Herald dated April 10, 1992, page 12, and its headline reads: 'Matsuura, why pull the bill?'

"I'm interested in this not just from the issue of geothermal, but to the larger question of procedure that it's been my understanding all along the prerogative of the chairmen in the Senate is to make the final decision or recommendation on a bill subject to the approval of the members.

"This article raises into question, then, at what point does the prerogative end? Does it end in committee? Does it end in caucus? Does it end on the floor of the Senate? Does it end after the bill has crossed over or where are the limits, if any, of the prerogative of the chair? Since the good Senator from the Big Island, chairman of the Science and Technology Committee, is quoted at length in this, perhaps the question could also be addressed to him, but I think it's a serious one that deserves full consideration and an answer because the issue that he has raised, I think, is very serious. Thank you."

The Chair answered:

"With reference to the chair, the policy of the Senate is the chairmen have the authority not to report a measure out. That has been past practice here in the Senate at least for the past 14 years."

Senator Cobb continued:

"Mr. President, what happens after a matter is reported out then? Is it the property of the Senate or does the chairman's prerogative still obtain to where an individual chairman may recommit a bill unilaterally once it has been reported out?"

The Chair responded:

"Parliamentary-wise, you are correct. Once reported out, the matter is before the entire body. However, in the caucus, the past practice of allowing chairman to withhold and recommit bills was continued. That is the past practice. And so as far as your question about where the jurisdiction lies, yes, once the bill leaves a committee, it is the province of the body. But we have in the past under allowed the chairs to say that they wanted to recommit a bill and the caucus has the chairs' prerogative to do so. A sufficient number of votes is needed in caucus to maintain that particular decision."

Senator Cobb continued:

"Yes, Mr. President, I just want to make sure my understanding of this is very clear that the chairman may decide to recommit or pull back a bill either in the caucus or on the floor and that decision is normally respected."

The Chair answered:

"That is correct."

Senator Cobb then thanked the Chair.

Senator Tungpalan also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I want further clarification on that too. Does this pertain to all matters or is there a final say if there are financial implications involved in that bill? Is the primary chair the responsible chair or the secondary chair, if there is financial implication?"

The President answered:

"Usually the primary chairman has that responsibility. If a bill doesn't clear that committee, it never gets to the money committee anyway. But in terms of financing the rules call for special consideration be given the money committee to make the determination."

Senator Tungpalan continued:

"Yes, so if the primary chair has taken a position against sending out a measure because that primary chair feels that it's not in the best interest of the state, can the secondary chair put that measure in a budget bill?"

The President answered:

"That might be possible, however, the rules also call for the fact that the chair of the second committee to consult with the primary committee."

Senator Tungpalan continued:

"And what if that was not done? What is the procedure then?"

The President answered:

"Then, to me, the jurisdiction of the measure lies with the primary committee and that the second committee should not do it without first consulting with the primary committee chair."

Senator Tungpalan answered:

"Thank you very much."

At 12:11 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:16 o'clock p.m.

Senator Blair then rose to speak in support of the appointment of Winthrop Scott Schaefer as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the governor's appointment of Winthrop Scott Schaefer to the State Emergency Medical Services Advisory Committee.

"'Scotty' has provided emergency medical care on Molokai for many years. He knows the needs of the front line personnel as well as anyone in our state. He is, also, a committed professional who has used his intelligence and experience to improve the emergency medical response services in other areas of Maui County and our state.

"'Scotty' has a tough job, as all emergency medical personnel do. There is the satisfaction of saving lives, of course. But there is also the heartbreak of responding to tragedy. Coming from the small and close community of Molokai makes the job more emotionally traumatic.

"An emergency response on Oahu rarely brings the response team into contact with a friend or an acquaintance. On Molokai, the probability is high that 'Scotty' and his co-workers will know the person they are desperately trying to save.

"Responding to the tragic airplane crash on Molokai was as emotionally difficult an assignment as any government employee in our state ever faced. Having to deal with that agony, in the immediate aftermath, tested the character and commitment of Molokai's emergency medical response personnel as few have been tested.

"There is, in this state, no one more qualified than 'Scotty' to express the sometimes harsh reality of emergency medical response at the meetings of the advisory committee. The governor has chosen wisely.

"I would be remiss, Mr. President, if I only mentioned 'Scotty's' professional qualifications. He could not meet the emotional demands of his job without the support of his wife, Lynette. Lynette is an Episcopal minister on Molokai. I believe she was Hawaii's first. 'Scotty' is blessed to have her strong spiritual support when he has to deal so directly and frequently with tragedy.

"'Scotty' and Lynette are, first and foremost, the proud parents of three great kids. Each of their children were adopted and faced special challenges in their young lives, but never were three children more fortunate in the parents that life selected for them. 1992 has been declared the year of the family and there is no family in Hawaii who better demonstrates the power of a family's love in meeting the challenges of life.

"Mr. President, I wish all of the members of this body could really know 'Scotty' and his family. I am so privileged and, therefore, ask my colleagues to enthusiastically applaud the governor's wisdom in nominating 'Scotty' to the State Emergency Medical Services Advisory Committee by their unanimous confirmation vote.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22. Noes, none. Excused, 3 (Iwase, Nakasato, Wong).

Senator Koki then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"Last week, a Star-Bulletin headline read, 'Voters would back tax hike for schools.' Tax hikes always put a drag on the economy but during a recession it can be disastrous.

"The problem with polls like this is that they do not give the public adequate information before they respond to the poll question. How many would vote for a \$50 million tax increase for mass transit? If we didn't have mass transit the \$50 million could go to the schools. How many would vote for a tax increase to spend \$75 million for a court house in Hilo? If we didn't build the unneeded court house, \$75 million could go to the schools. How many would vote for a \$64 million tax increase to renovate the Capitol? Again, \$64 million would be available to schools. The open ended contract to M&E Pacific that grew from \$150,000 to over \$51 million is probably only the tip of an iceberg, of which millions can be found to put to top priority projects.

"Why is the media setting the public up for a tax increase when what we need to do is reallocate our priorities? Instead of talking about tax increases, Hawaii which is one of the heaviest taxed state in the nation, needs tax relief. Thank you."

Senator Blair also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, on a matter of personal privilege also.

"I noticed in this morning's editorial that the Advertiser came down very harshly on Mr. Russel Nagata, our state's comptroller. I'd like the record to reflect that under Section 92F-13 that, when a request for a public document is made, the custodian of the record to whom the request is made has to balance the public interest in disclosure against the individual interest in privacy. That balancing test is central to an understanding of our law on disclosure of public records. "It would have been entirely appropriate for Mr. Nagata to refer the request for the document to the Office of Information Practices for a ruling on whether or not the name of the individual employee of the Bank of Hawaii should have been removed from the document before releasing it to the media. But, in doing so, Mr. Nagata would have denied the information to the media, perhaps for a substantial period of time. Instead, he balanced the interest of privacy and disclosure and excised a small portion of the document. Most of us are familiar with instances where names are blacked out of federal documents under the Freedom of Information Act. Mr. Nagata should have done the same and the technique he chose was overly broad in excluding the entire paragraph.

"However, we should acknowledge that the fundamental act of omitting the name of an employee of a private business was entirely appropriate under the law.

"I think the media is perhaps a little too anxious these days to find things to complain about in order to, I suppose, generate copy. I think they go too far in attacking Mr. Nagata by reference to forging documents. In fact, Mr. Nagata did them a favor by disclosing all of the pertinent facts in the document -- what institution, what interest rate -- without referring the matter to the Office of Information Practices. My understanding is he even disclosed to them available credit charge slips for a period of months, if not years.

"I think the disclosure was within the spirit of the Information Practices Act. While the removal of the individual's name from that document would have been better handled by excising only the name, Mr. Nagata's concern for individual privacy reflects the decision that we made in the adoption of Chapter 92F. He was merely balancing the public interest in disclosure against the privacy interest, as required by Section 92F-13.

"I want the record to reflect my beliefs in that regard. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, in continuation of the previous speaker, Senator Yamasaki and I have done a very intensive study of all of the state non-bid contracts. As far as an individual is concerned, in terms of honesty and forthrighteousness, Russel Nagata stands highest among many.

"I just want this body to understand that, in all of our examinations of all of these government documents, Russel Nagata has truly been a very honest person and the most cooperative.

"I stand with Mr. Nagata to let the public know that I sincerely hope that this incident will not affect his future career in whatever endeavors he may pursue. Thank you very much."

At 12:22 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:23 o'clock p.m.

Senator Holt also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, speaking on a similar editorial, just below Mr. Nagata's, I note that the media has mentioned that, quote: '... Then there is education reform, where the Legislature looks like it will be far too little.'

"Mr. President, I have a lot of confidence in Chairman Yamasaki of Ways and Means, Chairman McCartney of Education and Chairman Blair of the Judiciary Committee to put forth their best efforts on education reform in the next two weeks. I know the media has observed the good work of these chairmen over the years. I sincerely believe that the Senate has as fine a team as any, has done its homework and is prepared to tackle this tough issue. I think we should all support their efforts and have total confidence in their performance as they enter the conference committee playing field. Thank you."

FIFTY-THIRD DAY

Wednesday, April 15, 1992

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 11:44 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Jitsumyo Uyehara, Shingon Mission, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Aki and Chang who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Second Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Iwase introduced a group of students from Dusseldorf, Germany, as follows:

"This morning it gives me great pleasure to introduce some students who come to us from a country with which we have historical ties. As many of us know, Henry Burger put to music the beautiful words for 'Hawaii Ponoi' for our state anthem. He was the first director of the Royal Hawaiian Band and he was from Potsdam, Germany.

"This morning we have with us exchange students (I understand they learned some Hawaiian words today) from Dusseldorf, Germany, who are here as exchange students hosted by Mililani High School. In charge of the group, also from Germany, is Ula Schweer.

"Will the students from Dusseldorf please stand to be recognized."

The students and Ms. Schweer, seated in the audience, rose to be recognized.

Senator McCartney then introduced Ms. Kathleen Andrasick, Mr. Brad Denis and Mr. Richard Childers as follows:

"Mr. President, I know it's a very busy day for all of us and I appreciate the Senate giving me this opportunity to make this presentation. Before I introduce our guests, I would like to tell you a little story.

"We all know how tight the budget is this year and the tough decisions that we're going to have to make because of the lack of revenues. Everybody comes to us asking for money, and asking the state to solve all our problems. It's refreshing to have people who want to do things without asking for state money.

"A year ago, the people that I'm going to introduce came to see me. They wanted to get involved in education and wanted to get involved in inter-active media and put together a Hawaiian history curriculum that combines print, audio, video and computer graphics into a system that our children of Hawaii could use, taking all the materials that we have at the Bishop Museum, oral history from the kupunas, everything and put it into this package that our kids could use. So I asked them, 'How much money do you want? How much do you need?' They looked at me and answered, 'Nothing. We want your help and your support. We're going to do this with private sector money. We're going to put together a non-profit corporation. We're going to work with the support and help of Apple Computers. We're going to go out to the private sector and get money to help put this project together, which will help improve technology in our schools, improve student learning,' and really, I think, improve the quality of education. This is an excellent example of how private sector can get involved in our public schools and help, and not cost the state any money.

"At this time, I'd like to recognize three individuals who have been instrumental in moving this project forward: first, Kathleen Andrasick, who is a teacher from Iolani School, the educator and, I guess, the brains behind the project; Brad Denis from MVP Marketing. Brad is the person that goes out to the private sector and starts 'working' everybody, so he's the guy that puts the package together; and Richard Childers from Visualizations Inc., the technician who puts all the dreams and ideas into reality into the computer and packaging it.

"These individuals formed Hawaii Interactive and the chair for Hawaii Interactive is Rev. David Coons, Headmaster of Iolani School. Momi Cazimero is a member on the board, myself and a few other individuals.

"I just want to commend them because I think the private initiative is something that we don't recognize enough. We want to thank you for helping to improve the quality of education and wish you the very best."

Ms. Andrasick, Mr. Denis and Mr. Childers rose to be recognized and were presented the Senate certificate of recognition and leis by Senators McCartney, Fernandes Salling and Solomon.

Senator Reed then introduced Helen O'Connor as follows:

"Mr. President, a friend walked in who I'd like to introduce -- Helen O'Connor.

"Helen is involved with the Waianae Diet Program. She's the senior advisor with the diet program that had enormous success in helping native Hawaiians change their diet to one more closely in line with the original Hawaiian diet. The results have been really impressive. People who were diabetic and dependent on insulin have been able to throw out the insulin. The cholesterol levels have dropped significantly in even a three-week period, and participants have achieved significant weight loss. It's a life-saving program that is really beneficial to native Hawaiians. It's also a program that has never really gotten any kind of help from government, and this year there's an effort to provide money for the native Hawaiian diet program. It is presently in the OHA budget which is at risk, so Helen and Dr. Terry Shintani are here in an attempt to focus attention on this item in the budget with. hopes that the Senate would go along with the House in keeping that money in for a really worthwhile, life-saving, health preventive measure. Thank you."

CHANGE OF CONFEREES

S.B. No. 2253, S.D. 2 (H.D. 2):

The President appointed Senators Blair, Hagino, Holt, Iwase, Mizuguchi as additional managers and discharged Senator Solomon as a manager on the part of the Senate at the conference to be held for the consideration of amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2253, S.D. 2.

Senator Solomon then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, your Committee on Science and Technology will be considering S.R. No. 48, 'Requesting a Study of Hawaiian Electric Industries to Determine the Feasibility of Ratepayer Ownership and of the Impact of Diversification,' this afternoon.

"Because of the pervasiveness of this issue, Mr. President, the rolling blackout threatening my Third Senatorial District, especially in West Hawaii, and the recent articles in the newspapers, I feel compelled to rise on a point of personal privilege to make a report on the background of this diversification issue and the problems arising from regulated utilities and its ratepayers as a result of diversification. "As a general rule, it is bad practice for public utilities to diversify into fields unrelated to their unregulated activities. A majority of states refuse to permit such diversification. The burden of proof as to the propriety of such diversification is on the utility itself.

"HECO has yet to meet that burden.

"This is the factual background on HEI and HECO and its subsidiaries. In 1982, the PUC allowed HEI to be created subject to 24 conditions to protect utility corporate structure and HECO, HELCO, MECO ratepayers. In 1984, HEI Investment Corp. is created. In 1985, Hawaiian Electric Renewable Systems is created, based on a \$30 million wind farm. In 1985, Malama Pacific Corporation; in 1989, joint venture developments for approximately \$8.5 million. In 1986, the Hawaiian Tug and Barge, Young Brothers (HTB/YB) was purchased for \$18.7 million. In 1987, Hawaiian Insurance Group (HIG) purchased for \$23 million. And in 1988, American Savings Bank (ASB) purchased for \$115 million; and in 1990, the First Nationwide Hawaii Deposit and Bank acquisition.

"Electric sales growth in the early 1980s were flat because of the slow economy and high cost of oil. But by 1985, sales began to climb. By 1987, HECO knew it had to spend several hundred million dollars to build an additional power plant at Kahe, or purchase power from independent producers.

"Several major electrical outages occurred on Oahu: 1982 Hurricane Iwa; 1983 island-wide outage by fire knocked out Kahe Point lines; 1988 blackout caused by fatigue of Kahe transmission lines; and the last outage in 1991, again of Kahe transmission lines, is still being investigated by PUC.

"In 1982, HECO hired independent engineers to assess HECO's reliability and weakness. In 1984, the engineers recommended a second transmission corridor -- the 'southern line' -- to bring power from Kahe to the load centers throughout Oahu.

"This project, Mr. President, however, did not start until mid-1987, some three years later, and major capital funding of approximately \$100 million did not start until much later.

"Now in 1992, HECO is requesting rate increases of 7.5% for the Big Island, 21% for Maui, and 26% for Oahu. These increases will make Hawaii's rates the highest in the nation. Although these issues may appear unrelated to diversification, I want to now clarify some of the connections.

"There are three basic areas where diversification has direct impact on utility companies and their consumers: (1) Cross-subsidization from the utility companies to the non-regulated affiliated company; (2) Competition for capital between regulated and non-regulated companies; and (3) Cost of borrowing money.

"Cross-subsidization. Whenever a regulated utility is affiliated with a non-regulated company, crosssubsidization can occur, when utility ratepayers could pay expenses of the unregulated company, if these expenses are included as part of the regulated company's expenses. A good example: When HECO performs substantial administrative tasks for Hawaiian Insurance, American Savings Bank, and Young Brothers, which are all HEI's unregulated companies, they in fact can share the administrative costs.

"Distribution of administrative expenses was a heated issue in the PUC 1990 and '92 rate cases debates where

the PUC argued that the significant portion of administrative expenses should be paid by the unregulated HEI and not by the ratepayers of the regulated utilities (HECO, HELCO and MECO). This is a serious problem and needs to be addressed and resolved.

"Competition for funds between regulated and unregulated. Generally, funds come from three sources: loans, stock sales, and reinvested earnings. True, HEI has used stock sales and loans to purchase its diversified holdings and not fund directly from HECO. However, HECO's dividend payments to HEI have been used to pay HEI shareholders and because of HECO's profitability it attracts stock purchasers. If HECO were not profitable, potential shareholders would not buy stock and it would be difficult for HECO to get loans in the competitive market. Therefore, regulated HECO has become the backbone of all the <u>unregulated</u> diversification companies. HECO plans to spend \$1 billion in the next 5 years for improvement and \$600- to \$700-million will come from loans and stock sales from HEI.

"One negative concern arising from HEI's diversification was the directors' decision to buy Young Brothers, Hawaiian Insurance, and American Savings Bank and to delay for several years, the building of the southern transmission line here on Oahu. This delay resulted in outages and higher construction costs annually in extra operations, maintenance and fuel expenses.

"HECO's transmission system today is inadequate and does not meet its power needs and an additional \$5- to \$10-million now must be spent. HECO is passing these costs to the ratepayers, in requests for higher rates.

"The cost of capital. These delays are expensive and HEI must be faulted for delaying critically needed construction programs to meet power demands and utility's reliability. Now massive loans, \$600- to \$700-million for capital improvements must be made and these costs will be rolled into electricity rates and passed on to the ratepayers in the form of higher utility bills.

"Finally, in light of HEI/HECO's statements about public confusion, HEI should welcome, Mr. President, an opportunity to prove to the PUC and to the public that the diversification into fields unrelated to its regulated activities has been in the public interest. Consequently, there should be no objection on the part of HEI to have S.R. 48 being released.

"Thank you very much, Mr. President."

Senator Matsuura also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"I have good news! If you remember, I've been trying to get the state inter-island calls connected to the stateowned microwave system. I got a commitment that by July 1st of this year, the state will have most of our interisland calls transmitted through our state-owned microwave network communication system. This will save the state a lot of money. That's the good news for today. Thank you."

Senator McCartney also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a short point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, there's been a lot of negative publicity in the editorials of the papers about education and what we're doing, but, we believe we're on the right track. Maybe the editorial staffs are looking at the issue from their very limited perspective and I think many of us are looking at it from a broad base perspective, and sometimes it's helpful to look in the mirror to see what's going on and we have that opportunity to have that happen.

"The Education Commission of the States came to Hawaii to look at what was happening in educational reform. This morning your Committee on Education met with them and they submitted a report with recommendations that I would like to have inserted into the Journal.

"I must say that many of the things that we're doing in our Senate bill package on education are reflected in their recommendations. I feel confident that the Senate has moved in the right direction. It is supported by this 'look in the mirror' that I would like to insert into the Journal, Mr. President."

The Chair having so ordered, the introduction and recommendations from the "Report to the State Superintendent, Hawaii Department of Education," March, 1992, by the Education Commission of the States is attached as "Exhibit A."

The Chair, at this time, introduced former colleague and State Representative Mits Uechi, who was seated in the audience.

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:14 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Solomon, seconded by Senator George and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Thursday, April 16, 1992.

EDUCATION COMMISSION OF THE STATES

I. INTRODUCTION

During the week of January 27, 1992, Kay McClenney (Vice President of the Education Commission of the States) and Bob Palaich (ECS Director of Policy Studies) had an opportunity to visit the state of Hawaii and to learn in an intensive way about an array of efforts underway to improve K-12 public education in the state.

Our visit was in response to an invitation extended by State Superintendent Charles Toguchi, who requested that we undertake the following tasks:

- (1) To meet with a number of key people, in and out of the state Department of Education, to gain an understanding of their perceptions of the following: reform/restructuring efforts underway; progress being made in implementing those reform efforts; and obstacles or issues yet to be addressed;
- (2) To synthesize those discussions, identifying common themes, providing feedback as to where reform efforts appear to be "on target" and locating opportunities to make adjustments;
- (3) To place Hawaii reform efforts in the context of both current research and our experience in working with people in other states where similar restructuring and reform efforts are underway; and
- (4) To report our observations and our recommendations regarding education reform initiatives in Hawaii.

It should be noted that the visit and the report are not intended as a formal evaluation study but rather as the informal but informed observations of "critical friends." It was clear from the beginning and throughout the visit that Superintendent Toguchi was not seeking (and indeed would not welcome!) unquestioning affirmation of efforts currently underway; rather, he asked for objective appraisals, national context, and direct feedback.

A list of people with whom we met is included at the end of this report (See Appendix I). To each of them, we again express our thanks for sharing their time and their thoughts with us. Finally, we emphasize again that the Education Commission of the States exists to provide assistance to state leaders in their efforts to improve education. Should there be ways that we could be helpful in Hawaii, now or in the future, we hope you will call upon us.

V. RECOMMENDATIONS

- * Education initiatives in Hawaii have reached a juncture where it would be quite helpful to create a comprehensive "map" of the reform restructuring efforts. This would be an important first step in helping stakeholders to understand the pieces of the reform puzzle and how they work together to create a larger picture.
- * The timing seems right to plan now for a low-key "leadership summit." The purpose of such a meeting would be to review the restructuring "map" (above), to gauge progress to date, to identifying gaps and obstacles, and to move toward (a) a more coherent, systemic strategy and (b) a clear understanding among the parties as to their respective contributions to the overall strategy.
- * The upcoming work of the Performance Standards Commission provides an ideal opportunity to bring a strong, clear educational focus to the state's reform restructuring initiatives. In particular, the work of the Commission offers a way of creating a broadly-shared vision of (a) what students should know and be able to do and (b) what characteristics of schools and systems are most likely to support that desired learning. This can be effective, though, only if the Commission works very hard to counter the "top-down" traditions of the past, finding meaningful ways to

involve communities, parents, students and school personnel in the conversations. Ideally, this standard-setting process could be the vehicle for bringing the attention of the local SCBM councils to central matters of teaching and learning.

- * Pending these crucial conversations about student learning and performance standards, it may be prudent to in abeyance any major initiatives pertaining to curriculum, assessment and/or pedagogy. Since such efforts need to be linked to clear notions about desired student outcomes, premature initiatives might second-guess the conversation about standards. Furthermore, the commitment to decentralization and increased self-determination at the school level suggests that once there is agreement about statewide standards, most matters of curriculum and pedagogy (i.e., how standards are met) would be most appropriately determined school by school.
- * As previously noted, the School/Community-Based Management and Ke Au Hou initiatives represent bold attempts to dramatically alter the structure of the state school system. With SCBM now underway, we recommend (1) a formal endorsement of Ke Au Hou, with support for implementation and (2) a concerted effort to focus on alignment of Constitutional. policy and regulatory provisions. to ensure consistency in supporting system decentralization and increased flexibility and autonomy at the local school level. This continuing process of alignment may be facilitated by a comprehensive "audit" of policy, regulation and management procedures. The audit, building on and extending the work of the Governance Task Force, would seek to identify where there are still unclear roles and responsibilities, mixed or conflicting messages, torturous paths for decisionmaking, redundant checks and balances, and unnecessary bureaucratic controls.
- * At the same time, the Department of Education will urgently need to <u>continue redesign of the DOE "infrastructure" --</u> job descriptions. salary structure. staff development. information management. etc., etc. -- to support its new mission as a service and support organization.
- * While this alignment process is underway at the state level, it is important also to <u>build a constellation of support</u> around schools. Some elements of this effort are inherent in Project Ke Au Hou and deserve reinforcement. Additional attention might well be focused on:
 - providing increased time and resources for staff development at the school level
 - providing guidance for structuring the SCBM council conversations and providing additional resources for needed planning, training and development
 - Participants new to the SCBM process need some guidance regarding the key questions and issues that they should legitimately address: What is our role and mission? How do we work together? What new skills and knowledge do we need? How do we approach consideration of <u>educational</u> issues -- questions about student learning, teaching, assessment, accountability, the connection of school to home and community? How do we create a reasonable plan for our work?
 - developing "benchmarks" for the SCBM process

It could be very helpful for participants in the SCBM councils to have some sense of the "stages" through which they will progress, from "exploring" to "planning" to "implementing" change. Once the developmental benchmarks are defined, it is even possible that peers at the local level might design their own "performance assessments" to evaluate the work of the SCBM councils as well as the progress of school change.

In this connection, there may be some value in considering the concept of <u>school coaches</u> -- persons specially trained to serve as facilitator and "critical friend" over the long-term process of school change.

- * To help ensure that the reform/restructuring effort is sustained over time, the DOE should focus on the strategic development of a "critical mass" of successfully restructuring schools. People at all levels of the system naturally respond to success stories. In Hawaii, where change traditionally has been driven "from the top," the most compelling new success stories are going to be tales of accomplishment at the school/community level, with local testimony of support from the system. The most convincing "storytellers" will be local heroes and heroines -- principals, parents, teachers, students, community leaders. In the short run, developing critical mass may require focusing special support around a small number of schools. Competitive "challenge grant" programs are useful vehicles for moving toward critical mass.
- * To continue to build collaborative ties with key community partners in educational improvement and with other agencies serving children. The business community -- and in particular, the Hawaii Business Roundtable -- has demonstrated a sustained commitment to education. Given participation of the BRT in a "leadership summit" (above), there may be certain elements of a shared strategy of "next steps" that would be particularly amenable to leadership and sponsorship by the business community. For example, BRT leaders have recognized the crucial importance of training and development as people are asked to take on new roles in a restructured system. It might be appropriate, then, for the BRT to lead an effort to establish institutes for training school coaches, SCBM participants, teacher teams, and so on.

Finally, we acknowledge and commend the importance of modeling everywhere possible the values of flexibility, autonomy, empowerment -- and especially the focus on what is good for kids. Those values, if they serve as the screen for every policy, every regulation, every decision, every memo, will serve as a force which ensures Hawaii's place as a leader in American education reform.

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 2767 (Gov. Msg. No. 161):

Senator A. Kobayashi moved that Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 2767 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Hagino and carried.

Senator A. Kobayashi then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of KEITH W. AHUE for Director of Labor and Industrial Relations, term to expire December 5, 1994, seconded by Senator Hagino.

Senator A. Kobayashi then rose to speak in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the nominee, Keith Ahue.

"I would like to say that we can always judge a man by the comments and testimony of those who work with him. Testimony came in on behalf of the administrators and office heads of the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, and they said: 'Mr. Ahue has been in the position of director since December of 1991 and in that very short four-month period he has impressed and gained the respect of all the administrators and office heads in the department. As labor director he is committed to the department's primary responsibilities of protecting and promoting the employment security and quality of workplace for the people of Hawaii. To achieve these purposes he believes that both business and labor must work side-by-side for equitable solutions, rather than work against one another in divisive confrontation.' This, I thought, was the most impressive testimony given for Mr. Ahue.

"I urge support for his confirmation."

Senator Solomon also rose to speak in support of the nominee and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to support the previous speaker's remarks and to also encourage my colleagues for an affirmative vote.

"Mr. Ahue and I were classmates at Kamehameha Schools and I must comment that he was also a champion swimmer and as a student, industrious. I believe he would make an excellent department head and he is very experienced in labor issues. So with that, Mr. President, I would like to also encourage my fellow colleagues for a 'yes' on this confirmation."

Senator Mizuguchi also rose to speak in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the nomination of Keith Ahue.

"Everyone who has worked with Keith Ahue has been deeply impressed by this intelligence and his integrity. Because of my own experiences with Mr. Ahue this session, I can attest to the validity of both of these traits.

"Mr. Ahue has already appeared before me many times at hearings before my Committee on Employment and Public Institutions. Despite having only been with the Labor Department since December 1, 1991, Mr. Ahue has responded to all of my committee's questions thoughtfully and thoroughly.

"Moreover, during the instances when I have met with some of the Labor Department's division heads, I have found them to be equally impressed and respectful of Mr. Ahue and the way he has stepped right in and taken charge.

"As a deputy director at HGEA and then at the Department of Land and Natural Resources, Mr. Ahue was able to gain invaluable experience regarding the issues and concerns related to both labor and management. Thus, we find in Mr. Keith Ahue an individual with a wealth of experience and a uniquely well-balanced insight.

"Therefore, Mr. President, I strongly urge my colleagues to vote and confirm Keith Ahue as our next director of the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan also rose to speak in support of the nominee and stated:

"Mr. President, I also rise in support of this nominee. I've gotten to know Mr. Ahue as the chair of Culture, Arts and Historic Preservation. He appeared before my committee during his term as the deputy for DLNR. Also I've gotten to know him quite well as we journeyed through our Waipio meetings every month during the past year. I can speak of his diligence and his integrity and his willingness to work on behalf of the state and, without any reservation, I will be voting 'yes' on this nominee."

Senator Holt also rose to speak in support of Mr. Ahue and said:

"Mr. President, as a fellow 'Kamehamehaan,' I have to say a few words in support.

"Not only have I worked with him while he was at HGEA but, also, having chaired the land committee, I had the opportunity to work with Keith Ahue during his brief stint as the deputy director and found him to be a man of integrity and responsibility.

"I would also like to add to the comments of the Senator from the Big Island that Keith is an excellent water polo player too. Thank you."

The Chair then said:

"Anybody else from Kamehameha? I'm from Maryknoll High School but I'm going to vote for Mr. Ahue too."

Senator Cobb commented:

"It's just very fortunate that a qualified nominee like this does not come before the Senate during football season."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator A. Kobayashi then rose to introduce Mr. Keith Ahue who was seated in the audience, accompanied by a group of friends and members of his staff.

Senator A. Kobayashi then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of REX D. JOHNSON for Director of Transportation, term to expire December 5, 1994, seconded by Senator Hagino.

Senator A. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the nominee and remarked:

"Mr. President, at his confirmation hearing Rex Johnson said that he would like to continue the Department of Transportation's two major goals: No. 1, to promote economic development in the state by improving our airports, harbors and highways to meet the growing demands being placed on them; and No. 2, to reduce traffic congestion.

"With all of the testimony that came in before us, full of high praise for this nominee, there was no doubt that he will be able to accomplish whatever he sets out to do. Three individuals did attend the hearings to express their concerns about the research that is going on at Halawa Valley. Their views differed on the issue, but they all shared the opinion that Mr. Johnson was very open and receptive to their concerns. His openness, willingness to listen, and pragmatic approach to mediation and problem-solving have received very favorable comments from many sectors of the community. We are fortunate to retain Mr. Johnson's considerable talents in continued public service to the people of Hawaii.

"I urge his confirmation."

Senator George also rose to speak in support of Mr. Johnson and said:

"Mr. President, it gives me considerable pleasure to ask my colleagues to join me in voting for the confirmation of Mr. Johnson.

"I think the only question that may disturb me is why in heck he'd want it, what with the people mover and H-3 and rapid transit and boat launch ramps and some of the other things that appear to be occupying the first section of our newspapers and our six o'clock news these days. Maybe in this particular case, the 'H word' ought to be 'help' because he's going to need our assistance. I can assure my colleagues that whatever he needs in help, at least from my office, he's certainly going to get. I urge his confirmation."

Senator Tungpalan also rose to speak in support of the nominee and stated:

"Mr. President, my colleagues, indeed I'm very happy to be able to speak in favor of Mr. Rex Johnson for transportation director. As your chair for Culture, Arts and Historic Preservation this past year, I've been able to work with him very closely on that issue regarding whether or not there is a 'hale o'papa' and a 'luakini' in the path of H-3.

"I found Mr. Johnson to be open. I found him to be anything but an obstructionist, and that is very refreshing. He is so open that he's allowed me to continue my work this summer by reviewing all the field notes that have been taken or that have been written about H-3.

"It is without reservation that I speak on behalf of this man and, indeed, a pleasure to look forward to working with him as our transportation director."

Senator Fernandes Salling also added her support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I too rise to speak in favor of the nomination and perhaps suggest to Rex that maybe he should go back to school and get his degree in engineering also because he's doing such a wonderful job with respect to dealing with some of the more controversial problems.

"I might add that Rex did inherit a department that's been plagued with a lot of problems, primarily because of lack of financing. And we are fortunate now, with the monies that have been transferred from prior years from duty-free special funds and also the increase that we see in our revenue from the fuel tax, that we do have some money to fast-track a lot of these projects which are badly needed throughout the entire state. That is what Rex and his whole department is dedicated to doing this year and the years ahead is to get those projects moving while we have those funds before we lose any of them, because we are at that point with respect to many much needed projects. So, I too want to echo what the Senators have said, Senator Tungpalan and also Senator Kobayashi, that with respect to all of the problems facing the department he's been very open, he's been very accessible and very thoughtful in approaching solutions. I have every confidence in him that he will do the job for the State of Hawaii. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura also support the nomination and said:

"Mr. President, I too would like to extend my support to the great builder and dreamer and visionary. Not too many people have track records as Mr. Johnson. If you look at what he has accomplished in the past, it is very remarkable. Taking on the Department of Transportation's directorship calls for a challenge. Rex is always going to be stepping forward to lend his talents to doing something good for the State of Hawaii.

"I commend his personal dedication because I know that this kind of work does not really pay enough for the heartaches and headaches. The next thing he'll want to do is to become a politician and I think then you have achieved the ultimate. When you have the Republicans and the Democrats all supporting you, we all know that you're going to do a grand job and you've got all of our confidence and our support. We're not going to have too much money this year but maybe next year we might be able to help you out a little bit more. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Solomon also rose to speak in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I too speak in support of Mr. Johnson but on a humorous note.

"Mr. President, I will never forget when Mr. Johnson came to speak at the Big Island meeting when we were trying to resolve the Kawaihae Small Boat Harbor. I asked him several questions at that time and also asked, 'Well, Mr. Johnson, how are we going to bring all the community groups and everybody together?' And his response was, 'Well, Senator, it's like pushing elephants up a hill.'

"So with that, Mr. Johnson, keep on pushing and hope we get those elephants over the hill. Thank you very much."

Senator McMurdo added her support of the nominee as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of Rex. And if anybody can push those elephants, he can.

"I would also like to ask, 'Whose district does he live in?'"

The Chair responded:

"Kahoolawe."

Senator McMurdo then said:

"Oh, in Hilo."

Senator McCartney added his support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I stand to speak in favor of the nominee.

"I want to say that the nominee has come to our district, faced many tough issues and faced our community in the first week that he was on the job. We appreciated his candor and honesty. I think the words that describe you best are, 'your integrity' and that 'your word is good.' We know that you're going to do a good job for the people of Hawaii because you didn't need this job, but you took it because you're a true public servart. Thank you, Mr. Johnson, I support you wholeheartedly."

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the nominee. I see his wife Gigi sitting next to him and, actually, she just told me that if I don't have anything nice to say to shut up. But she's actually hoping that we vote him down because she still can't figure out why he took a huge pay cut from AMFAC to learn about heiaus.

"There's a lot of stories I can tell you about Rex. More recently, how my partner and I took a lot of money from him and Harold Masumoto on the golf course. But one of the more significant things that he's going to leave behind as HCDA director as he moves on to DOT, probably a legacy that he's going to share with Senator Blair, is the shoreline park that will extend all the way from Ala Moana in front of Kewalo Basin, along Kakaako Peninsula, over to the Honolulu Harbor. And I would just like to congratulate him and Senator Blair for that accomplishment.

"In closing, Mr. President, I just want Rex to know that I used whatever few chits I had left to get these people to say nice things about him. And since I owed, you owe me a big one next."

Monday, April 20, 1992

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 11:43 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Lieutenant Colonel Donald Taylor, Chaplain, Schofield Barracks Chapel Center, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chang and Mizuguchi who were excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Fourth Day.

"Mr. President, this morning, I am very proud to introduce to this body the national first place winner of MADD'S annual poster/essay contest.

"The national first place winner is Gabriella Ahmadia, age 11, of Waiakeawaena School in Hilo.

"As the first place winner in the Hawaii State content, Gabriella's essay titled 'Think and Drive,' was entered in the national competition and was selected as one of 21 national winners. She will receive a \$1,000 savings bond, and other awards as well as a trip to the awards ceremony in Houston, Texas, on May 7th for herself and one parent.

"Let me read her essay:

'Think and Drive

'One of my friends in my 5th grade class is a very sad girl. Jane's parents don't wake her up in the morning. She doesn't eat breakfast with her mom and dad. She eats with her aunt.

'When Jane goes off to school, her mom doesn't say, "Have a nice day." When Jane gets sick in school and has to go home, her aunt picks her up, not her parents.

'No one gets after her to do her homework. And at night, when Jane goes to bed her parents don't tuck her in.

Senator Cobb then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"I was planning to say this on Friday but that was a holiday so, in accordance with the good news policy initiated by our education chairman, I would like to share a little good news today, especially in view of some of the controversy that has taken place recently.

"I've been learning over the past few months, international business is a wondrous, fascinating way to get to know the world and at the same time to see how it works. The controversy when I indicated that I would gladly provide to businesses in the state \$10.00 for every dollar spent, which most businessmen tell me is a very good return on investment, I started doing a little preliminary research on what had been accomplished to date, as a result of my travels. At the time I was in the former Soviet Union, I had the opportunity to visit the Republic of Georgia and the Institute of Clinical and Experimental Neurology of the Department of Health of the Georgian Republic in Tbilsi, Georgia, initiated a study after our meeting on heart stress, radiation and other elements. I put them in touch with at least five medical groups, one in Hawaii, four on the mainland, plus two health food organizations here in Hawaii. Direct contact was made. A study was conducted and, just before I returned, the results of the study were forwarded to me and one of the executives, in fact the chief executive officer of a health food company, called me and told me that this study directly resulted in an order being received from Malaysia for \$100,000 in several increments; in another order from Singapore of \$6,500.

"I note with surprise the wondrous turn that international business takes in order for something like this to happen. So I did some further checking on it and it turns out that this study conducted in Tbilsi, Georgia, provided independent corroboration of some of the statements and studies that had been made here in the United States, and that when this kind of independent corroboration took place from Russia or a Republic of the Soviet Union, that alone convinced the people to make the order and the Hawaii companies were the direct beneficiaries of that.

"Now, if any member of the media wants the name and telephone number of the chief executive officer for verification of this fact, I will be happy to provide it. But I think a little good news is in order. I'm only sorry that it couldn't happen on Friday but that being a holiday I wanted to share this with the members of the Senate today.

"Mr. President, there will be much more to come. Thank you."

FIFTY-SIXTH DAY

Tuesday, April 21, 1992

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 11:41 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Mr. Tony Pelle, Baha'i Faith - Hawaii, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chang and Ikeda who were excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Fifth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator McMurdo introduced Mr. Herbert S. Coleman as follows:

"Mr. President, our guest today is a tireless worker and a champion of the elderly. Herbert S. Coleman crusaded as a selfless advocate who has been described by legislators and others in government as a 'master lobbyist' for a broad range of legislation which includes long-term care health insurance, tax relief for medical care and nursing homes, prevention of spousal impoverishment, subsidies and credits for caregivers, innovative community care, expansion of medicaid to home-bound patients, automobile insurance reform, and others.

"Mr. President, Herb Coleman happens to be an old and dear friend of mine and my first neighbor when I came to the islands in 1957. He was pretty great then so I'm not too surprised that he did turn out as one of ten 1992 recipients of the Thomas Jefferson Award, sponsored in Hawaii by the Honolulu Advertiser and, nationally, by the American Institute for Public Service. This award gives well-deserved public recognition to private citizens who have consistently and tirelessly given of their time and energy in service to others and who have exhibited outstanding leadership, but who are not generally recognized beyond their own immediate circles.

"Mr. Coleman was nominated for this prestigious award by the Founders Group of Kokua Council for Senior Citizens and by the local chapters of the National Association of Retired Federal Employees. He serves both organizations with distinction. He is a full-time radio spokesman for Kokua Council on radio station KHVH 'Viewpoint' program and an officer of Kokua Council since 1988. In addition, he has served on the Governor's Policy Advisory Board on Elderly Affairs; the Advisory Board, Honolulu Community Action Program; and the Long-Term-Care Financing Plan Advisory Board.

"At this time, Mr. President, I would also like to recognize Jane Coleman. As you know, for every good man - there is a good woman. I cannot thank Jane enough for her understanding, generosity and certainly for the giving of Herb's time to help all of us improve the quality of life in Hawaii.

"At this time, I would like to introduce our guests: Herbert S. Coleman, recipient of the Thomas Jefferson Award; Jane Coleman; and Ms. Loretta Schuler, past president of Kokua Council, 'Mistress Lobbyist,' and past recipient of the Jefferson Award."

Mr. Coleman, Mrs. Coleman and Ms. Schuler rose to be recognized. Mr. Coleman was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator McMurdo and Senator A. Kobayashi presented him a lei. Senators Mizuguchi and Hagino presented leis to Mrs. Coleman and Ms. Schuler.

Senator McMurdo also introduced Mrs. Shizuko Mukaida, Mrs. Ruthie Gray, Mr. Rod Newman, Mrs. Mary Frances Sutphen and Mrs. Susan Webb, seated in the audience, who accompanied Mr. Herbert Coleman.

Senator Crozier then introduced Mr. Joe Pacyao as follows:

"Mr. President, this morning I'd like to introduce a young man who, like a Jefferson awardee, has contributed much to the community of Makakilo. This past October, he was awarded the Makakilo Mahalo Award and that award is given to someone from the community who has given back to the community ten-fold.

"Mr. President, Joe Pacyao has been a leader in Makakilo in a way that you and I are quite different. You and I are out there making speeches, motivating people with our words and sometimes our action is limited, compared to the amount of words we use. Joe is quite different. Joe is a man of few words, but it's his actions that really count. Anytime the Mauka Lani Elementary School PTA, which he has served as president for about nine years or so, needed anything done, Joe would commit the group and he'd be the first one to show up to make it happen and the last one to leave to make sure that everything was tidied up.

"The computers in Mauka Lani Elementary School were donated by the PTA because of Joe's fund-raising ability. The bus routes in Makakilo have been re-routed because of the concerns of Joe. The 'ride and stride' which will take place this Sunday is a race for guys and gals on bicycles. The race starts from Barbers Point Industrial Park and then up a hill. Those who want to jog will jog and the walkers like me would just walk up the hill.

"Joe's been involved with 'ride and stride' and for just countless projects and programs. Joe's always been there. He's a very strong person in character and the people of Makakilo look up to Joe for leadership. And this would not have been possible without the support of his wife.

"At this time I'd like to introduce Mr. Joe Pacyao and his wife Jena. (Mr. Joe Pacyao and Mrs. Jana Pacyao stood to be recognized.)

"Mr. President, in the audience are the Pacyaos' two daughters, Leizel and Claudine Pacyao. Also, Stephanie DiGiulio of the Makakilo Monitor and Finance Factors, coordinator of the Makakilo Mahalo Award, and a special lady whom I am very honored to introduce, my wife Lynette."

Senator Matsuura then introduced Ms. Andrea Simpson and Mr. George Bates of Pacific Resources, Inc., as follows:

"Mr. President, on May 26, 1992, the Hawaiian Independent Refinery Inc., a subsidiary of Pacific Resources, Inc., will reach a milestone in its history, in its 20th anniversary of fulfilling the energy needs of Hawaii and the Pacific.

"Since ground was broken at Campbell Industrial Park in August of 1970, and the refinery was dedicated on May 26, 1972, during the two-decade history, the Hawailan Independent Refinery, Inc. has expanded its original capacity of 29,500 barrels to 95,000 barrels a day to meet the energy demands of our state's growing economy. Today, gasoline, diesel, fuel for jets and ships, propane, the feedstock for the Gas Company's synthetic natural gas utility service and other valuable petroleum products are produced here in the islands.

"This morning it is my great pleasure to present a Senate certificate to the company. To receive the certificate are Mr. George Bates, Senior Vice President of Petroleum Operations and Ms. Andrea Simpson, Vice President of Corporate Communications.

"We extend our congratulations and hope that we will be able to present you another certificate two decades from now. Thank you very much."

Senator A. Kobayashi then moved that the Senate consent to the nomination of FRANCES Q.F. WONG for 18th Judge of the Circuit Court of the First Circuit, for a term of ten years, in accordance with the provisions of Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution, seconded by Senator Hagino.

Senator A. Kobayashi then rose to speak in support of the nominee and stated:

"Mr. President, at the confirmation hearing of Judge Wong, it was really a very 'warm and fuzzy' kind of hearing.

"Many people came forward to testify in her favor. Frances Wong has been a Family Court judge for many, many years, dealing with divorces, custody cases, and abuse cases, and yet out of all the testimony just one was against her.

"Former Family Court Judge Betty Vitousek came to testify and she said and I quote: 'As a human being, she is a person of warmth, wit and wisdom. She has no false or superficial or devious standards in her agendas. She is a woman of deep integrity. She truly believes that all persons must be treated as equals without regard to their race, national origin, gender, education, religion, social or economic status, or other divisive designation. She lives -- and she judges -- by that code.'

"Those words made me really appreciate the fact that Judge Wong is willing to serve all these years in Family Court and she even looks forward to being appointed again, as a Circuit Court judge, possibly to the Family Court.

"Many members of the Family Court and many clients of the Family Court have said that although they're happy she's being elevated to the Circuit Court, they certainly will miss her if she's not at Family Court.

"I urge your confirmation of this nominee. Thank you."

Senator Solomon also rose to speak in support of the nominee and remarked:

"Mr. President, I support the previous speaker's remarks and rise to speak in support of the confirmation of Judge Wong.

"Mr. President, Judge Wong's story is the story of an 'American Dream.' She was born in Hong Kong of refugee parents who sacrificed so that Frances might receive the educational best that America has to offer, now, an esteemed member of our bar. I'm very confident that she will be an excellent judge. We could not ask for a better candidate."

Senator Cobb also rose to speak in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, rising to speak in favor of the nomination.

"I've been impressed with not only what I heard about Judge Wong, but a number of people have come to me, independently on their own, to extoll her virtues and explain some of her background and the compassion with which she's ruled. The only regret I have is she's not being appointed to the supreme court, and I echo the thoughts of the Women's Caucus that at least two or three good women ought to be on that court. And given the experience of Judge Wong and her willingness to serve I hope to see her on that court someday. Thank you."

Senator McMurdo added her support of Judge Wong as follows:

"Mr. President, I echo the words of the previous speaker and I think we will see her on the supreme court some day. She's been a really wonderful judge on the Family Court and she will be missed if she doesn't serve there. But I think she'll be good wherever she is."

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the nominees to the Burial Councils as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of all the nominees to the various burial councils throughout the State of Hawaii.

"Mr. President, as you know the ancient name for the people of Hawaii is 'na iwi o Hawai'i' or the bones of Hawai'i. These councils provide an invaluable service to the state in resolving the internment and burial of our 'na kupuna o Hawai'i.' The council has served as a means to provide a 'ala nui' for the 'na po'e Hawao'i,' or a pathway, so the people of Hawai'i can pay homage to those who have departed. Moreover, the burial councils' role serves as a reminder to all of us here today that we have many generations who have preceded us, and we have an obligation to eternalize their memory for the welfare and wisdom of our progeny.

"With that, Mr. President, I encourage all of my colleagues to vote in support of the nominees to the burial councils and to recognize their tremendous dedication and service to Hawai'i nei.

"Thank you."

MISCELLANEOUS MESSAGE

Misc. Com. No. 6, from the Wisconsin State Assembly dated April 14, 1992, transmitting Assembly Joint Resolution 27 requesting appropriate action by the Congress to propose an amendment to the U.S. Constitution prohibiting the physical desecration of the flag of the United States, was read by the Clerk and was placed on file.

Senator Holt, at this time, introduced to the members of the Senate a group of 9th, 10th and 11th grade students from Farrington High School and their teacher, Ms. Donna Adams, who were seated in the audience. Senator Holt said, "These students, who have just arrived in the state, are from the Philippines, Laos and Vietnam. They are in a program 'English as a Second Language."

Senator Koki then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, last week I rose on a point of personal privilege expressing fear of a tax increase during these difficult economic times. A tax increase is always bad for the economy. Many economists cite the tax increase a couple of years ago by Congress as the trigger that led to our current recession.

"At a time when Congress is considering a cut in the capital gains tax to stimulate the economy, our Senate is considering an increase in the capital gains tax. Many look at capital gains tax as a tax on the rich, so who cares? Let's not look at the individuals but the economic ramifications of capital investment. It is important to encourage capital investment because that is how capital and wealth are built. In a free market economy wealth is good because it expands the economy which produces jobs. When the economy is struggling, you don't increase

taxes on those who stimulate the economy because that will have a negative effect on the economy. We cannot afford to make a decision that will have negative long term effects for a short term solution.

"Even the Democrats in Congress are advocating a capital gains tax cut to stimulate our economy. There are many areas that can be cut to be able to fund necessary programs. There are many other areas that can be cut to be able to fund necessary programs -- we can save \$50 million by cutting mass transit alone.

"How can we advocate a tax increase while expanding a completely unneeded Department such as International Affairs?

"We need to operate like the real world. If a person's income drops, he must look at areas of his life style that he needs to cut back on and stop spending in those areas. We can't copy criminals, who instead of cutting back they go out and steal from someone else.

"The voters of Hawaii are sending a loud message -'Stop wasting our money and stop stealing from citizens.'

"That is what a tax increase means - stealing from the most over-burdened taxpayers and the most abused business community in the nation.

"Increasing taxes when the economy is slow is a sure fire means of delaying a recovery and we compound our problem in revenues in the years ahead."

Wednesday, April 22, 1992

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 11:42 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Mr. Arthur P. McKinlay, Stake President, The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Aki, Chang, Nakasato and Yamasaki who were excused.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Iwase introduced students: Travis Ortogero and Alan Aspinwall, who are members of the 'MathCounts' Team, seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, I would like to ask this body to honor two Mililani residents who add to the list of distinguished winners of the MathCounts competition. These two students will become members of the State of Hawaii team and will compete in the national finals in May in Washington, D.C.

"The first individual I would like to introduce is Travis Ortogero of Punahou School, who is the second place winner. (Travis Ortogero stood to be recognized.)

"The third place winner is Alan Aspinwall of Wheeler Intermediate School. (Alan Aspinwall stood to be recognized.)

"Also present on the floor is Mrs. Evelyn Cheong, coach of the MathCounts Team and a teacher at Punahou School. (Mrs. Cheong rose to be recognized.)"

"It is with great pleasure and my honor to introduce William Cobb, son of Senator Steve Cobb." (William Cobb stood to be recognized.)

Senator Iwase also introduced Ms. Sara Sincke, coach and social studies teacher of William Cobb.

Senator B. Kobayashi then introduced students Justin Valdez and Hannah Okamura, two other members of the MathCounts Team, who were seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, I would like to introduce two individuals, also part of the State of Hawaii MathCounts Team. "The other individual that I would like to introduce is Hannah Okamura, an 8th grader at Kaimuki Intermediate School, who placed fourth in the contest. (Hannah stood to be recognized.) She is coached by Ms. Jeanne Kurita who is seated in the audience. (Ms. Kurita rose to be recognized.)

"At this time, I would like to present Mr. V.G. Guinses. (Mr. Guinses stood to be recognized.)

"Thank you for coming to Hawaii to help us with our problems."

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, I serve as your budget liaison for the Ways and Means Committee with the Committee on Tourism and Recreation and I was simply astounded by this article that came out in the paper today (Honolulu Advertiser, April 23, 1992).

"Yesterday, officials of airlines serving Hawaii represented to tourism industry leaders that the airlines are suffering horrendous losses on Hawaiian routes and that the fault lies with Hawaiian tourism leaders and government, NOT with the airlines.

"The airlines contend there has been a fall-off in total demand for travel to Hawaii and that <u>Hawaii</u> must increase demand so that airlines may increase the fares to and from Hawaii.

"Everyone who flies to and from Hawaii will find it hard to believe that there has been a falloff in demand. The planes are full arriving and departing night and day. What's going on here?

"One thing I think is clear is that we are not getting correct nor complete information from the airlines. When they have given us profitability figures relative to Hawaii they conveniently fail to factor in the value of frequentflyer travel to the airline's total profitability.

"Hawaii is particularly attractive to people who are cashing in their awards. Therefore, a very large number of airline seats to and from Hawaii are filled by such travellers. It is disingenuous to say that these routes are unprofitable because of unpaid travellers and that, therefore, fares must be increased.

"Hawaii is the jewel for airlines offering frequent-flyer programs. But for having Hawaiian routes, the airlines' total revenues would be less.

"The airlines do us a real disservice unless they tell us the whole truth about fares and profits."

Senator Holt also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, speaking on a point of personal privilege in support of the previous speaker.

"Two points, Mr. President. The article also calls for a strong spokesman to look after tourism's needs at the cabinet level within state government. I think our director, Murray Towill, is doing a good job, as you and everybody here know. I don't think he deserves that kind of criticism.

"Secondly, I'm wondering whether the airlines are taking the offensive while they are negotiating their landing fees right now.

"Thank you."

"But far beyond even his considerable professional credentials, is the worth of the man, himself. Charlie Akama is known by everyone as a man who first is concerned with fairness and compassion. For that reason, Mr. President, there are many leaders in the labor unions who have vigorously supported Charlie's confirmation because they have experienced his objectivity.

Senator Chang then rose to speak in support of Charles Akama as follows:

"Mr. President, Mr. Akama will be sorely missed in these halls, certainly by me. He offered me guidance when I got involved in the perilous area of privatization and contracting out. He taught me a lot about Eddie Wasano's bill. I've carried the name Eddie Wasano in my mind ever since. That kind of institutional memory, Mr. President, will be valuable in providing service to the people of Hawaii on the Labor and Industrial Relations Appeals Board so I'm entirely confident that he is appropriately placed and will be of great service to the state in that capacity.

"Thank you."

Senator Cobb also rose to speak in support of Mr. Akama and said:

"Very briefly, Mr. President, in support of Mr. Akama. I'm honored to be able to support him not only as a constituent but as a person who has really served as a valuable adviser in so many areas, touching on labor, on human rights, other aspects of legislation that go far beyond his normal lobbying duties. We'll miss him around here.

"I keep smelling the good food that emanates from Senator Mizuguchi's office. We shall miss that also."

Senator Matsuura added his support of Mr. Akama as follows:

"I too rise to lend my support to Charlie Akama.

"When I first met Charlie I thought he was working for the ILWU. I get blamed for a lot of things around here but I have to share with you one thing. A lot of people associate me with the 'unagi' bill. The two persons most responsible for my push for the unagi bill have been the late Representative Richard Kawakami and Charlie Akama.

"I have great respect for any person, who, in the midst of all the opposition of the unagi bill, stood by me throughout the years in support of the unagi bill. We have not succeeded in passing the unagi bill but I hope we will someday. Perhaps we should refer the unagi bill to the Labor and Industrial Relations Appeals Board. I'm sure we'll have favorable reaction with Charlie Akama on the board."

Senator Holt also spoke in support of Mr. Akama and said:

"Mr. President, I also speak in support of Charlie Akama.

"My colleague next to me gets blamed for a lot of things. Charlie, you can blame him for telling a secret that everyone has not known all these years about the unagi bill -- that you're behind it.

"Mr. Akama's protege, Mr. Kunitake, is sitting out there next to Charlie. We know that Charlie has been giving him lessons because he will now have to follow in Charlie's footsteps.

"One thing I just found out, and the reason why Senator McCartney is smiling, is now that Charlie is leaving we have a better chance with the optional retirement plan. (Laughter.)

"Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan also in support of Mr. Akama's appointment then said:

"I've known Charlie Akama for about 19 years, both as an aide to the House Committee on Labor and during the four years I chaired the Labor Committee in the House. I will say that Charlie was there for those tumultuous times and his expertise certainly was of help to not only our committee but to the people of the state.

"Thank you, Charlie. I know you are moving on to help the people again but in a higher role at the Labor and Industrial Relations Appeals Board. Congratulations and good luck!"

Senator McCartney then added:

"Mr. President, I would like to have the Journal reflect the remarks of Senator Holt's as though they were my own. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22. Noes, none. Excused, 3 (Fernandes Salling, Ikeda, Nakasato).

At this time, Senator A. Kobayashi introduced Mr. Charles Akama who was seated in the audience with a group of friends.

The Chair then made the following observation:

"Members of the Senate, the budget bill is still tied up with a few items to be worked out. We may be able to give you an update during the 5:00 o'clock session.

"Second, with reference to non-fiscal bills, the filing deadline has long passed. However, we are now in communication with the House. We have not received word from the House as to what is to be the disposition of these bills. But I would like to encourage all of the committee chairs who have non-fiscal bills outstanding to continue negotiating with the House. Perhaps, sometime this afternoon we will reach agreement with the House clarifying and possibly extending the deadline for these bills.

"I would like to encourage all conference committee chairs of non-fiscal bills to continue their negotiations. For those who chair conference committees of bills with fiscal impact, please, by all means, continue your negotiations."

Senator Koki then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, the cost of building homeless cabins has revealed a major cause of our budget problems.

"It was estimated that it was going to cost \$13,500 per 150 square feet cabin. One hundred fifty square feet is 10 feet by 15 feet. These cabins are to be used for 5 years and then dismantled.

"We discovered that the actual cost is \$32,000 per cabin. That breaks down to \$213.00 per square foot. This does not include the cost of the land.

"These are supposed to be cabins clustered together in a way that would eliminate costly infrastructure. A developer can buy the land, build county standard roads and infrastructure, and a house for \$213.00 per square foot.

"The former homeless coordinator said, 'The fact that the estimates were low, we're willing to say we're sorry.'

"Thirteen thousand five hundred dollars for a 150 square foot cabin is not low. That is still high. If they

said in the beginning that they estimated the cabins to cost \$32,000, I don't believe we in the Legislature would not have supported the project. But the state went ahead and signed the contracts anyway.

"Is it any wonder that we are having budget problems?

"We cannot allow the administration to continue to have a blank check in running the homeless program. Because we gave the administration a blank check and because the cost is so high, we need to run an audit on the actual construction cost to see why these cabins cost more to build than regular homes.

"Thank you."

Senator Crozier also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I stand to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, in response to the good Senator from Kaneohe, I would like to compliment him on the role he has taken these past four years as the watchdog of the treasury, to making sure that the money is spent in a prudent way.

"I want to say that we are trying to rectify the homeless problem. We were all shocked. We had a hearing the other day, a joint hearing with the Housing and the Human Services Committees of the House and the Senate, and this is where we found out about the \$32,000 per unit. We were all shocked! Some of us are even embarrassed about the whole thing but we can't just not do anything about it.

"I salute the governor for taking swift action and shifting the program under the leadership of Mr. Mits Shito of the Hawaii Housing Authority. Mr. Shito as of April 1st began to investigate and to audit and to try and rectify the shortcomings of the homeless problem.

"Our homeless problem is too important to put aside. We cannot be lax in our responsibilities and I think Mr. Shito is on the right track."

Senator McMurdo also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege and pursue the thoughts of the two previous speakers.

"I have already commended both the governor and Mr. Mits Shito for the quick change that was made when the problem surfaced. I think it was made just in the nick of time. It was a very bad error, and very unfortunate but I have talked to some of providers like the Reverend Frank Chong for whom I'm sure all of us have the best of feelings and the greatest respect. They are all pleased that the homeless movement is on the right track again and they are backing Mr. Shito 100%. I share Senator Koki's concerns on this because it was a real shock but in the same story it did mention what Mr. Shito has been able to do with the same amount of money.

"I think it's good we got on top of this before it got worse.

"Thank you."

The Chair then made the following observation:

"Members of the Senate, I would like to take this opportunity to apologize to the chairman of our Judiciary

Committee. It seems that in my zeal to have a gun reform bill passed here in the Senate, I did broach the idea to several Senators that I was thinking about changing conferees. This created a very difficult situation for the chairman to negotiate with the House because once the word got out that I was hinting about a change, it made the position of the chairman much more difficult in dealing with his House counterpart. In spite of my 'big mouth' the chairman has come out with a finished product which I think the Legislature and the people of the state can live with.

"My apologies to the chairman."

At 12:29 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Solomon, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate stood in recess until 5:00 o'clock p.m., on a rising vote and a moment of silence, in memory of the late Ted Morioka, former State Representative.

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 2957 (Gov. Msg. No. 341):

Senator A. Kobayashi moved that Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 2957 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Hagino and carried.

Senator A. Kobayashi then moved that the Senate consent to the nomination of GAIL C. NAKATANI for 4th Judge of the Circuit Court of the First Circuit, for a term of ten years, in accordance with the provisions of Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution, seconded by Senator Hagino.

Senator A. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of Gail Nakatani for Judge of the First Circuit Court and stated:

"Mr. President, I speak in favor of the confirmation.

"Literally, there were about a hundred testimonies in favor of Gail Nakatani. There were few negative concerns and we did look into it very carefully but found that there were no reasons to hold up the confirmation of Gail Nakatani. She did come through with flying colors.

"Ms. Nakatani has been a fighter all her life. She comes from very humble beginnings in Pepeekeo on the Island of Hawaii. Her father, Shigemitsu Nakatani was with the ILWU and we were saddened at the hearing we found that he wasn't able to see how well his daughter has done, but we know that he's looking down from above and we know that he's very proud of her accomplishments. Because of her fine, outstanding qualities as an attorney we know that she will make an excellent circuit court judge and I urge her confirmation. Thank you."

Senator Solomon also rose to speak in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the nominee and to support the remarks of the previous speaker.

"It gives me great pleasure to ask my colleagues to vote in favor of this 'ohana' who comes from the Big Island and is truly a 'keiki o ka aina' story. Gail Nakatani has done very well and, of course, her family is very, very proud of the fact that she will be serving as a circuit court judge.

"Thank you."

Senator Matsuura also spoke in support of Ms. Nakatani as follows:

"Mr. President, I also speak in support of the nominee.

"Mr. President, very few people have stood in the ILWU soup line and Gail Nakatani is one of them. I

know she is proud to say that she stood in a soup line during the early years of the ILWU. Many people don't understand the upbringing of people that have grown up on sugar and pineapple plantations. She has the scars of working in the sugarcane fields and any person who loves spam as I do, and salami and the rice balls, and becoming a judge, she's got my vote. Thank you very much."

Senator Blair then rose to request a conflict of interest ruling from the Chair as follows:

"Mr. President, I request a conflict ruling in that the law firm in which my wife is a partner has represented Gail Nakatani in a civil matter?"

The President ruled that Senator Blair was not in conflict.

Senator Mizuguchi also rose to speak in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the nominee, Gail Nakatani.

"I am from the sugar plantation town of Pepeekeo, Hawaii. There are a lot of important people that have come from that community but I'm really happy for Gail because our families are very close and we have all heard about her father's work in trying to make Hawaii a much more better place for everyone. He worked very hard with the union during those very, very difficult times in Hawaii but, today, Hawaii is a place where all people can have equal access and equal opportunity for advancement.

"I would like to congratulate Gail and tell her all of the people of Pepeekeo are very happy for her appointment to the circuit court. Thank you very much."

The Chair remarked:

"Gail, I think you dad is a very happy man."

At this time, Senator A. Kobayashi introduced Ms. Gail Nakatani who was seated in the gallery, accompanied by her mother and a group of friends.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the confirmation.

"All of the testimony presented at the confirmation hearing of Paula Nakayama was positive. Ms. Nakayama will make an excellent circuit court judge because of her outstanding qualities and her experiences with the law firm of Shim, Tam, Kirimitsu. We're all delighted that she was selected and we're even happier that she made it through the confirmation process with such ease.

"I recommend her for confirmation."

Senator Solomon also rose to speak in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I speak in support of the remarks of the previous speaker and also in support of the nominee.

"When I had an opportunity to visit with Paula, she impressed me as being a person who is people oriented. I was very impressed when she talked about community issues with confidence. I'm very happy that she was appointed to the circuit court and urge all my colleagues to vote in the affirmative. Thank you."

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege. I feel very, very bad about getting up to make this speech and announcement today, but I feel compelled to do it.

"Friday night, Mr. President, the House and the Senate met on Senate Bill 2882 to try to come to an understanding and an agreement on the convention center bill and on the task force. And we did so. You know my feelings on convention centers. I was pleased with this bill because I thought that because we had opened it up to a statewide site selection that in that case I could feel free to vote for it, and also I was pleased about the task force. I won't get into all of those details now, but only to say that the important thing, as far as my voting for this bill, was that it was now a statewide selection plus the fact that anything that the authority did -- the Convention Center Authority -- would have to come back to the Legislature for approval.

"I left the room feeling pretty good about it, until I got up and saw the Honolulu Advertiser, Saturday morning. There is a statement in there by the chairman of the Convention Center Authority which, as far as I am concerned, blows the whole thing.

"The bill says the authority can look statewide for a site '... but chairman Donald Takaki said the focus remains in or near Waikiki, "close to where the hotel rooms are." Takaki said the authority has talked with First Development about linking up with their convention center project at the old Aloha Motors site. "It's the most logical site at this time, but it depends on whether we can structure something," Takaki said. He said the authority has talked to several other parties as well.'

"Saturday evening, he is a little softer in the Star-Bulletin. He says that this bill gives him more flexibility to choose a site. But again, he says the priority is to build something in Honolulu. A strong candidate is the City and County's project which is the Aloha Motors site.

"Now, these announcements about building in or near Waikiki were made immediately after the adjournment of the Conference Committee the other night. Furthermore, Donald Takaki came to a hearing in the Senate with a similar bill talking about statewide selection, and I heard him say, 'Well, we don't need to look around the state, we already know all the sites.'

"Now, Mr. President, I think this is the height of arrogance. I think it is the height of insolence, and although it pains me to do this I'm going to ask that Donald Takaki resign as the chair of the Convention Center Authority and let us put somebody in there who can be objective about this search.

"I hope that my colleagues will bear with me and maybe ask the same thing. Otherwise, I feel that, unfortunately, I will have to go down on the bill.

"Thank you very much."

Senator Matsuura also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"This morning I'm going to speak on behalf of the good Senator from Maui, chairman of Ways and Means. I think we owe the public, the taxpayers an explanation because both of us may have been responsible for this extension which we are experiencing now. An explanation is in order to the public as to why we have held our ground in trying to accomplish what we had started to do.

"It all started with a missing telephone light, and it's amazing what a request for a simple light can turn out to become. Through our inquiries and hearings, Senator Yamasaki and I introduced a number of resolutions that addressed some of our concerns. It addressed such topics as the sole source Selex contract with GTE, Hawaii Inc., the non-bid contracts, ERS retirement funds, reorganization of the Division of Finance, and so on. "Anticipating that some of these resolutions may never make it because all of these resolutions had to have the concurrence of both houses, the chairman of Ways and Means, as a backup position, included the language of these resolutions into the budget as provisos.

"Let me cite a few examples as to why we had taken such a hard stand in trying to implement some of our requests.

"As I have said previously, the state has spent over \$440,000 developing a statewide telecommunications system for the State of Hawaii. The University of Hawaii also did a study to determine whether to go with the PBX system or with the Selex system. The Judiciary did the same thing. All three studies indicated that they should go to the PBX system. But for some unknown reason, at the last minute, when all the bid proposals for the PBX system and also for the Selex system were to be advertised, the director of Budget and Finance decided to go non-bid on a Selex system. I have yet to find any document, no proposal whatsoever from GTE to the State of Hawaii for the Selex system.

"Now, without having a bid proposal, I don't know how they wrote the state contract up, but this is what happened.

"The next thing we did was to look into the contract itself. Was the contract favorable to the State of Hawaii or was it favorable to GTE? Was it a fair contract? It appears that the state bought a Toyota for the price of a Mercedes. The purchase of the telephone instrument was a good example. I showed you two identical piece of instruments and the cost difference was \$100.00. The only reason for the \$100.00 difference was that it went out on bid. How do you account for that extra \$100.00 when the instrument itself cost \$67.

"Your telephone that sits on your desk cost the State of Hawaii 750 bucks. I'm sure we could have gotten, on a volume purchase, a much better price had it been bid out.

"One of our jobs is to be responsible and to make sure that the taxpayers don't pay for any of these excesses. We looked at the contract and some of the prices that had been quoted by different vendors and we came up with our own study. Our study shows that the state could have saved 20% to 25% of the cost by going with the PBX system. The good thing about going with the PBX system is that the state would have owned the system in five years, contrary to what we have with the Selex system. It will always be owned by GTE. That's one example.

"The second example I want to cite is the toll charges. The toll charges for inter-island calls for the State of Hawaii for the month of February was \$50,448.25. Now, this is over and above the WATTS and flex line cost which we paid \$20,247.81.

"Some of you may remember three years ago, the state auditor made a study of the inter-island cost. The auditors have found in that investigation that GTE was getting about \$72 million in revenues for the inter-island calls. The operation cost was \$20 million. So, theoratically, there would be a net profit of about \$52 million. This study was done three years ago. I'm sure that the profit margin has increased considerably since that time.

"One may ask, what does that have to do with our Selex system. It has a major bearing in that in our contract, the Selex contract, it is specified that the state inter-island calls will be connected to the state-owned

microwave system as soon as possible. The state has its own microwave system. GTE has their own microwave system. Our microwave system is not fully utilized. The contract calls for the state inter-island calls be connected to our microwave system. This would have reduced one monthly bill by at least \$50,000 a month.

"The contract was signed on January 2, 1990. Our microwave system was operational in 1989. Why isn't it connected even today? Why? Well, if you're going to get \$50,000 extra a month, you wouldn't want to connect up either. The citizens of the State of Hawaii suffer because they are paying for the bill.

"Example three, this has to do with the video terminals. The ICSD staff had negotiated the price to buy these NTI video terminals. The price was negotiated but then all of a sudden the director of Budget and Finance says, 'You don't buy directly from the manufacturer but buy through GTE.' The cost is an extra \$70.' Now, \$70.00 per unit may not sound very much but the state has bought 750 units and the state was going to buy an additional \$2 million worth. Fortunately, that order is on hold right now because of the inquiries we have made. The sad part is that the purchase of these video terminals were made through Hawaii Inc.

"I don't remember putting any money into Hawaii Inc. to buy all of these video tex terminals. These funds were coming out of another budget line item through the Budget and Finance ICSD.

"I could go on and on and cite more examples but this is not the time or the place for that. All I wanted to do was to share with you and explain to the public as to why this extension of two days was necessary. I am hoping that we will end up having the appropriation to study and to evaluate the appropriateness of the selection process, decisions, contract negotiations and execution and project implementation of the sole source Selex contract. We are also asking, since GTE has never been audited for almost eight years, I think the PUC should open up a docket to look into their cost of operation. It could be that the ratepayers may have a reduction in their phone bill.

"The chairman of Ways and Means has also pursued to improve the procurement system. There are no state rules and regulations regarding procurement. Therefore, I can assure you that there have been no laws broken by anyone, no regulations or rules broken because there are none. This is one of the reasons the chairman of Ways and Means is quite adamant that we at least have some legislation to close these loopholes of sole source and the amendments that follow. I was literally shocked when I first found out about the number of sole source contracts and the amendments that followed these sole source contracts. This is one of the reasons why the good Senator from Maui, the chairman of Ways and Means has been quite adamant that we at least fix this flaw before the session ends.

"People have said many negative things about us but I can assure the public that Senator Yamasaki and I want nothing from this. The only thing we are looking for is that the taxpayers will gain in the sense that whatever the state purchases and whatever services that the state buys, that it be done in a very fair way and at the right price and service.

"We had to read about three feet of documents, staying up till 3 o'clock in the morning trying to gather information from our hearings, etc. It has been a monumental task. I want to go home myself. We're all tired and I know all of you have done a marvelous job of passing your bills in your areas of responsibility of which I am very grateful. However, this extension was necessary because of our concerns that have not been addressed to our satisfaction.

"So, in conclusion, the only thing I can give as good news to you is at least all of you have a light on your telephones. The House still does not have a light on their telephones.

"We apologize to you folks and to the public. I know all of you want to go home and I want to thank all of you for your understanding.

"Thank you very much, Mr. President."

Senator Koki also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I would like to speak in support of the previous speaker's remarks. As far as I am concerned, I am willing to stay here a lot longer, more than a couple of days, to get to the bottom of these things.

"You know, when you talk about homeless cabins going out at such ridiculous costs with non-bid arrangements, I think we should look at the emphasis. If the businesses that are out there are going to take the money if we are willing to give it, I think the emphasis on our audit and investigation should look at the state as the culprit.

"When you start reading about how the director of Budget and Finance has his hands everywhere -- he's also on the board of trustees of the Employee Retirement System -- we have well connected people that are making millions of dollars. I want to encourage the Senators that are responsible for taking the time and saying, listen, we got to put money in there for an audit, it will be money well spent. I just wish the emphasis would be looking at where the state has gone wrong.

"Thank you."

Senator McCartney also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I speak in support of the chairman of the Science and Technology Committee and as a member of his committee I would like to commend him for his efforts. I am proud to be a member of his committee and I think that he has made some in-roads in looking at correcting some behaviors and practices that need to be looked at. I commend you for that. Thank you for taking that stand."

Senator Cobb also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, rising to speak in support of the chairman of the Science and Technology Committee, I recall a few years ago we had legislation that required bids on virtually any dollar amount -- \$3,000 then \$4,000, \$5,000. I just wondered about the exceptions in other areas that were not covered by this bill or by that previous legislation.

"What's happened this session stands as a good case in point that there ought to be bids for all state contracts for any dollar amount over a threshold figure, whether it's \$10,000 or \$5,000 and that should apply without exception. But when you create exceptions, you create loopholes. You create situations such as we have now. So if it does mean staying extra time, I can only hope the House will begin to see the light but I support the chairman of the Science Committee in his endeavor to get this kind of audit done because I think the groundwork has been laid for a bid law without exception for any threshold dollar amount, \$10,000 or more."

Senator Ikeda also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, I too rise in support of the chairman of the Committee on Science and Technology. Frankly, I think that if he is being blamed for extending the session, it's a bum rap.

"I think that we have a duty here to not only handle what is presented to us as responsibilities as chairmen and members of committees but we also have a duty to follow our convictions. I believe that this is what the chairman is doing.

"Money for this kind of investigation is necessary and it should not be put in a position of being weighed against human services funding. I think that was very unfair. I think that if there is a cancer in the system, then certainly we should cut it out before it spreads. I commend the Senator for his courage and his efforts and I support him all the way. I think that it is high time that we get to the bottom of this whole situation. Get the facts and let the public know exactly what is occurring and, if it is wrong, then we should fix it.

"On the other matter regarding extending the session, I also want to thank the two chairmen because it has given this committee chair more time to work on what has turned out to be a very complex legal drafting job. And without the extra time, I'm afraid that we would not be able to do as credible a job on reforming the no-fault insurance law. We have used the time wisely and it is my hope that by this evening we will have a final product for you.

"Thank you."

At 12:13 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

At 12:15 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Hagino, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate stood in recess until 6:00 o'clock p.m.

The purpose of House Bill No. 3746 is to provide statutory guidelines for the issuance of driver's licenses to people with epilepsy. However, the Department of Transportation already has a Medical Advisory Board (MAB) which has guidelines to address driver privileges for persons with epilepsy. This bill would by-pass the MAB and its guidelines, setting a precedent for other exceptions to an established process for handling medical conditions.

For the foregoing reason, I am returning House Bill No. 3746 without my approval.

The Senate reconvened at 11:43 o'clock a.m.

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

The following Senate Concurrent Resolution (S.C.R. No. 256) was read by the Clerk and was disposed of as follows:

S.C.R. No. 256 "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION CALLING FOR A JOINT SESSION OF THE LEGISLATURE FOR THE PURPOSE OF APPOINTING THE LEGISLATIVE AUDITOR, THE DIRECTOR OF THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU, AND THE OMBUDSMAN," was offered by Senators Hagino and George.

Senator Hagino then moved that S.C.R. No. 256 be adopted, seconded by Senator George.

Senator Blair rose to speak in support of the resolution and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the resolution but with reservations. My reservations are not about any of the individuals. The three nominees are fully qualified to discharge the obligations of their respective offices and deserve our support. Rather, my reservations are with the process by which these positions are being filled, how they have been filled in the past and how they have not been filled in the past.

"The process we are using needs to be corrected. We are treating these positions like patronage positions. Clearly these are not legislative patronage positions. These positions have such substantial responsibilities that we will be convening a joint session of the Legislature to fill them.

"I would like, in the future, when nominees are considered that there be a very elaborate process which reflects the public's interest in having the best qualified individuals selected. I hope that that process will include public hearings similar to, although not strictly analogous to, the advise and consent hearings that we hold for executive appointments.

"Having said that, however, I reiterate my opening remarks. The three individuals are fully qualified to discharge the responsibilities of the offices. I will be supporting the resolution for that reason. Thank you."

Senator Levin also rose to support the resolution and said:

"Mr. President, I would like to express the same support for the three individuals and the same concerns expressed by my colleague to my right and ask that his words be incorporated as my own."

Senator Tungpalan then rose to inquire:

"Mr. President, I wonder if the chairman of the Legislative Management Committee would yield to a question?"

The Chair posed the question to the chairman and Senator Hagino having answered in the affirmative, Senator Tungpalan asked:

"In the future do you suppose we could have a public hearing process to be able to let the public know of the fine qualifications of the candidates that we appoint?"

Senator Hagino answered:

"Mr. President, I can't speak for the future Legislature but I think we've set the record today and, hopefully, the Legislature will check back to see what procedure we adopted this session or spoke about regarding an open hearing. I certainly endorse the previous speaker's suggestion and hope for it to be incorporated.

"We did look back, to some extent, to see if there was a precedent and there being none this is how we did the hearing. Unfortunately, it fell short of some of the expectations of our members but, hopefully, we have set. the record today for future hearings."

Senator Tungpalan then said:

"Thank you. I appreciate that because we did have a chance to speak with one of the candidates who did very well in our caucus room. Unfortunately, I told her that the saddest part and the part that I regret was that we were not able to share the brilliance of this candidate with the rest of the people of our state. Hearing from you today I'm assured that we will be able to adopt a system whereby all of our candidates will have that opportunity to meet the public before our vote is taken.

"I do support all three candidates without reservation and with full support."

Senator Cobb also rose to speak in support of the resolution and remarked:

"Mr. President, rising to speak in favor of the resolution, although I had not intended to address the subject, a review of the history indicates that only on one occasion was there ever a public hearing and that was when a chairman of the Committee on Government Efficiency had numerous applicants for the job and the hearing was used in effect to sort out many of the applicants. There is no requirement in the law for a hearing but I think since we are in the business of making laws it would be appropriate for legislation to be introduced in a future session providing for the process of hearings and public input.

"I do not concur that this is just being treated as similar to a legislative patronage appointment because a full caucus was heard, discussion did ensue; the individual was questioned by a number of Senators, and that is taking the job far more seriously than would be the case in a regular patronage position which is an appointment made without any requirement for further review.

"However, I do share the concern about having the process clearly spelled out. And since this is a constitutional provision it would be quite appropriate for those of us in the Legislature in the future to address this in bill form.

"I want to indicate my support without reservation for all three."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.C.R. No. 256 was unanimously adopted.

At 11:50 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:55 o'clock a.m.

Senator Mizuguchi then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, we adopted the Senate Concurrent Resolution recommending appointments of three important individuals to our legislative service agencies and my point of personal privilege revolves around an article in this morning's paper headlined, 'State appointment holdup.'

"In this particular article the writers question the integrity of the legislative auditor. It seems that anonymous staffers, both former and current staffers, had complained about the high turnover and the management style of the auditor. Also in that article, it alleges <u>my</u> association with the legislative auditor.

"Mr. President, I believe this article is malicious and discriminatory.

"The real issue for all of us when we look at appointing a person to serve in our legislative service agency is one of qualifications, and Marion Higa is eminently qualified for this job. She has high professional standards. She is intelligent. She has integrity, and she has objectivity.

"All of us in the Legislature and the press and the media should be mindful that the three service agencies, the Legislative Reference Bureau, the Legislative Auditor, and the Ombudsman are service agencies to this Legislature, and certainly even to this hour there are staff members from the LRB and the auditor's office serving this particular Legislature in the House and Senate.

"I have respect for the work of Marion Higa because she also served on my committee when I chaired the Education Committee in the House and Senate. I have always been supportive of creating opportunities for women seeking to better themselves not only in government but also the private sector. I think Mrs. Higa is exceptional in this fact that she has qualifications. She has an ability to function under pressure. She is familiar with the legislative process, and she has great professional conduct. "It is truly a sad day when the media penalizes any individual for their association with a legislator and overlooks that individual's professional qualifications and conduct in their consideration of appointments.

"I, Mr. President, and the Senate, especially the Women's Caucus, have always been champions for women's rights and advancements of women in the workplace. To suggest, as this article implies, that women need to meet a higher standard for professional advancement in this state, Senators, this is 1992 and not 1940. You and I know that we have worked together to eliminate discrimination in the workplace, and we would not allow this to happen in the appointment of our own legislative auditor.

"Senators, we have a great opportunity to make a statement to all women in this state by appointing Marion Higa as the first woman legislative auditor in this state.

"In closing, Mr. President, I do support the nominations of Sam Chang for director of the Legislative Reference Bureau and Yen Lew for State Ombudsman. I support Yen Lew not because of his association with you, but because I believe that he is eminently qualified for that particular position. He is a prolific writer. I met Yen in 1968 when both of us served as staff in the Senate and I have always had much respect for Yen Lew. And that is the bottom line.

"All three individuals are qualified and the issue is not association, it is qualification. Thank you very much."

Senator Holt also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege on a related matter in the same article.

"I believe that my colleague next to me, Senator Matsuura's reputation somewhat has been maligned -- not the first time. I want to read what the article says, 'State Budget Director Yukio Takemoto is considered a political associate of Mizuguchi's, a connection that could explain why Sen. Richard Matsuura has insisted that any audit of the GTE Hawaiian Tel contract not be conducted by the legislative auditor's office.'

"Mr. President, I'm not sure who's responsible for this, but somebody is manufacturing the intentions of Senator Matsuura's inquiries, both the GTE audit and in the Marion Higa appointment. I've worked with Senator Matsuura for years and sometimes he gets me into a lot of trouble, but never have I known his intentions to be insincere. More importantly, always, and I repeat always, in the public interest. Thank you."

Senator Crozier also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, I had wanted to make some comments in the joint session but I know that it would be inappropriate so I'd like to at this time to say a few words about the three appointees. I support all three of them.

"I've gotten to know Mr. Yen Lew here at the Senate, and for the past four years I've depended on him for ways to figure how the process works so I can stay ahead of the rest of the pack, especially your pack, sir. He's been fair to me and he's' been able to show me different steps, all by the book, by the laws, and understanding the process better, so I think he can do well as an ombudsman. "Mr. Sam Chang is definitely an institution here. When we talk about the term limitations, one of the integral part of having people around is institutional history, and Mr. Sam Chang was here before I arrived and he's been very fair and the quality of his work and the work of his staff have been outstanding, so I support him.

"I also support Marion Higa. You know, the major function of the Legislature is to have oversight over the executive branch. And I've depended on Marion Higa for many years when she was staff and also as acting auditor. She has helped in the area of auditing OHA, Hawaii Housing Authority and HFDC. Those reports were brought to my committee and we've had hearings on those reports and they've helped us draft legislation to improve all three entities. This is a reflection on Marion Higa's quality of work and her commitment to the general public.

"For those reasons I am in support of all three of the candidates. Thank you."

Senator McMurdo also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"The three appointees are three of the most terrific people I've seen appointed since I've been in the Legislature. Perhaps it's because two of them, in particular, have been practically a part of my daily life since I've been in this Senate. Any time I've needed help Yen Lew has been there. Any time I needed to ask questions about procedures or some of the things that the previous speaker mentioned, Yen Lew has been there. And I realized when his name was brought up yesterday that it was like seeing part of the Senate history leaving, even though he's going to be in a new job and will be around.

"Sam Chang has always been a great help in getting legislation together ... his whole staff ... he has run a very good organization over there and I'm glad he's going to continue.

"As for Marion Higa, of the three I've known her the shortest time, but I must say that what I have seen this year, and her performance as legislative auditor, has been tremendous. She is so efficient, so helpful, and she is always willing to explain anything that you need to know about any of the audits. She's also tried to get them to us on time.

"Marion Higa, Sam Chang and Yen Lew are three bright and shining lights in the Legislature. Thank you very much."

At 12:05 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Solomon, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate stood in recess until 3:00 o'clock p.m., to meet in Joint Session with the House of Representatives, in accordance with S.C.R. No. 256 to appoint the legislative auditor, director of legislative reference bureau and the state ombudsman.

JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives, Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, was called to order at 3:13 o'clock p.m. by the Honorable Daniel K. Kihano, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

At this time, Representative Apo moved that Gerald Miyoshi be appointed Clerk of the Joint Session, seconded by Senator Chang and carried unanimously. Speaker Kihano then announced that the purpose of the Joint Session is to appoint the Legislative Auditor, the Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau, and the Ombudsman for the State of Hawaii, pursuant to Article VII, Section 10, of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, Section 23G-1 and Section 96-2 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes, respectively.

Representative Taniguchi then nominated: Marion Higa for the office of Legislative Auditor, for a term of eight years, commencing July 1, 1992; Samuel B.K. Chang for the office of Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau, for a term of six years, commencing July 1, 1992; and Yen L. Lew for the office of Ombudsman of the State of Hawaii, for a term of six years, commencing July 1, 1992, seconded by Senator Hagino and carried.

Senator Hagino moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Representative Taniguchi and carried.

Representative Taniguchi then moved that the House of Representatives of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii confirm the appointments of Marion M. Higa to the office of Legislative Auditor, Samuel B.K. Chang to the office of Director of Legislative Reference Bureau, and Yen L. Lew to the office of Ombudsman of the State of Hawaii, for the terms provided by law, as set forth in S.C.R. No. 256, seconded by Senator Apo.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 47. Noes, none. Excused, 4 (Fukunaga, Hagino, Ige, D., Tajiri).

At this time, Senate President Richard Wong assumed the rostrum.

At 3:16 o'clock p.m., the Joint Session stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Joint Session reconvened at 3:17 o'clock p.m.

The President then called for a motion by the Senate to confirm the appointments of the Legislative Auditor, the Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau, and the Ombudsman of the State of Hawaii.

Senator Hagino moved that the Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii confirm the appointments of Marion M. Higa to the office of Legislative Auditor, Samuel B.K. Chang to the office of Director of Legislative Reference Bureau, and Yen L. Lew to the office of Ombudsman of the State of Hawaii, for the terms provided by law, as set forth in S.C.R. No. 256, seconded by Senator Aki.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 21. Noes, none. Excused, 4 (Fernandes Salling, Koki, McMurdo, Nakasato).

The ballots having been so cast, Marion M. Higa, Samuel B.K. Chang and Yen L. Lew were declared unanimously elected Legislative Auditor, Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau, and State Ombudsman, respectively.

At this time, the President invited Mrs. Higa, Mr. Chang and Mr. Low to the rostrum.

The Speaker, on behalf of the Joint Session, then introduced newly elected officers: Marion S. Higa, the Legislative Auditor; Samuel B.K. Chang, Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau; and Yen L. Lew, State Ombudsman, who were extended congratulations and a round of applause.

At 3:21 o'clock p.m., the Speaker declared the Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives adjourned.

Senator Tungpalan introduced to the members of the Senate, "good friend and neighbor," Mr. Dan Boylan, who was seated in the audience.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 2227, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Elections.'

Senate Bill No. 2227 is an omnibus elections bill, the purpose of which is to increase voter participation and improve the administration of the election process. Some provisions of this bill accomplish this purpose and should be enacted. Unfortunately, however, other provisions severely hamper both the elections process and the jury selection process.

Purging the lists of registered voters after two consecutive election cycles instead of after one cycle as the law currently provides, will result in the retention of a substantial number of people who no longer reside in a precinct or the State and are thus unable to vote. This unnecessarily increases the cost of administering elections.

Disallowing the release of registered voter lists for use in jury selection will severely limit the Judiciary's ability to create a pool of qualified jurors. This limitation on creating a qualified juror pool will make it difficult for the Judiciary to provide a jury of one's peers or a jury containing a representative cross-section of the population.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 2227 without my approval.

Honorable Members Sixteenth Legislature State of Hawaii

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 2897, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Precursor Chemicals.'

The purpose of Senate Bill No. 2897 is to combine into one list all regulated precursor chemicals. In addition, the bill authorizes the disclosure of precursor chemical record information to county agencies as well as state and federal agencies.

To combine all regulated precursor chemicals into one list in part VI of chapter 329, Hawaii Revised Statutes, this bill will add to part VI the chemicals listed in part VII of chapter 329, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and repeal part VII. Part VII includes section 329-86(c), which imposes criminal liability for the unlawful distribution of precursor substances used for the manufacture of controlled substances. Since no corresponding provision is added to part VI, this bill will inadvertently decriminalize the presently unlawful distribution of precursor substances used to manufacture controlled substances.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 2897 without my approval.

Senator Solomon then rose to speak in support of the resolution and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of this resolution.

"Mr. President, last week's hearing on the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act in Washington, D.C., served to make us all aware again of the federal government's failure to conform to the clear mandate of Congress in enacting the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act.

"The Bush Administration has stated its position to be that no trust relationship was ever established by the act. As can be seen from Hawaii's position, as expressed by Attorney General Price, the Bush Administration's position is simply not supportable as a matter of law or reason.

"Without a doubt, the federal government has present obligations under that act, both as to the payment of money and as to the return of lands, to the benefit of native Hawaiian people.

"This issue is a microcosm of something far more pervasive to the well-being of Hawaii and all its people. Not only does the federal government have obligations and duties to the native Hawaiians by congressional mandate, but it has a continuing and essential obligation to the state by the terms of the 10th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution to avoid transgression of state sovereignty.

"The federal government has failed in its obligation to the people of Hawaii to refrain from interference in the powers reserved to them by the Bill of Rights.

"We who are on the firing line in protecting and maintaining state sovereignty are well aware that there has been an incredibly rapid erosion of state sovereignty in the recent past.

"Mr. President, I urge all my colleagues to vote in support of this resolution, and to remind them of the words of Anthony Lewis of the New York Times who characterized the contemporary centralization of state powers by the federal government as 'state-ism,' and he correctly, I think, draws a parallel with the breakdown of existing governmental structures in Russia and Eastern Europe as, in part, a reaction to such 'state-ism.'

"We are living in perhaps the most revolutionary period in world history in the last 150 years. George Kennan has stated that the changes now occurring in world affairs are certainly as, or more significant, as those of 1917 or 1848. Old patterns of thought won't do.

"A new paradigm is needed. In Hawaii that paradigm will question why a huge percentage of our lands must be committed to the control of the federal government for the purposes of national security when certainly there is not now, nor can we reasonably anticipate an issue of world military confrontation.

"Hawaii, as a state which maybe is the clearest example of the usurpation of state sovereignty by the federal government, should take the lead in organizing the various states by conference, compact, or convention to cause the creation of a new paradigm by which federal\state powers may be re-ordered by the restoration of state control over that which are properly matters of state sovereignty.

"Mr. President, this resolution will call on the governor to effectively organize the full power and resources available to him, both legal and political, to cause the prompt return of all lands being held or obtained by the federal government for the Hawaiian people. Mr. President, I remind you that this is an oft-stated concept where land must be kept for native people. Much of these lands will be returned and, of course, Hawaiian Home Lands can be developed for the benefit of native Hawaiian notwithstanding the Bush Administration's people demonstrated disregard of its obligations to them.

"I urge all of my colleagues to vote in the affirmative. Thank you."

Senator Holt, also in support of the resolution, said:

"Mr. President, I would like the Journal to reflect the remarks of the previous speaker as my own.

"Thank you."

The Chair so ordered.

Senator Blair rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I'd like the journal to record the reasons why I'll be voting against this bill. They are three in number. The first is that it combines statutory amendments with a proposed constitutional amendment. This creates difficulties for the governor in determining whether he can veto the bill. However, I note that the governor has had notice of this bill for ten days and has not, at least to me, expressed any concern. Nonetheless, for future reference, I urge members to not combine statutory and constitutional material.

"The second reason is that both ballot questions are compound, in one case dealing with gubernatorial appointment of the superintendent, and limiting the powers of the board to policies, goals and standards and, in the other, combining those two items with an appointed school board. It's going to be either a two-element compound question or a three-element compound question that is placed on the ballot in November.

"The electorate has previously rejected proposals for an appointed school board. When you give them two or three elements and they disagree with even one of the elements, there is a strong possibility that they will vote against the constitutional amendment. Therefore, by presenting it in a compound fashion, we've increased the chance that there will not be sufficient votes in November. For that reason, if we actually support those proposals, I think we've made an error.

"My third reason is the most important. The way this bill is structured fails to recognize the difference, constitutionally, between the role of the Legislature to propose constitutional amendments and the role of the electorate to ratify the constitutional amendments. Providing for the electorate to determine, in the primary election, which of two proposals will go on to the general election ballot interjects the electorate into the legislative role of proposing constitutional amendments. I believe this is constitutionally forbidden.

"There are, essentially, four ways to look at this constitutional issue. Four facets, if you will. First, this Legislature did not decide to put either proposal onto the general election ballot. Second, if the Legislature did decide to put them onto the ballot, Article XVII, Section 5 requires that both go onto the general election ballot. Third, Article XVII, Section 3 also requires that both be placed on the general election ballot. Fourth, this bill creates an unauthorized referendum process.

"As a result of this decision, this matter will probably go to the Supreme Court and we may not see it on the ballot in this form. My concern is that this bill will probably result in our coming back for a special session in order to do it correctly.

"In any event, I know the attorney general has opined that this is legal. This is not the first time the attorney general and I have disagreed and, like our other major disagreement, involving Article I, Section 17, I guess it will be up to the courts to decide who's right. But I want to record the reasons why I will be voting against this important and substantively appropriate bill.

"Thank you."

Senator McCartney rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise in support of this bill and would like to thank the previous speaker for his remarks.

"The Committee thoroughly reviewed those issues. We have an attorney general's opinion that I'd like to insert into the Senate Journal. And the attorney general felt comfortable with the bill and we will proceed on that. In fact, the conference committee did not make a final decision until the attorney general submitted a formal written opinion to us.

"Getting into the other merits of the bill, Mr. President, this is a good bill. This is educational reform. This is the first step that we took during conference committee to make major changes in the system. And on the issues of getting voters involved, if we believe in SCBM and if we believe in the public getting involved in our school system, and what greater way and better way to get them involved in a public referendum to make a decision on how the school board is to be structured. We're saying that it's their school system and we want them to be involved. That's what this bill does.

"This bill also restricts the governor's ability to restrict funds on education. He cannot just go unilaterally now and take money. He has to do it under two conditions: one, he has to do it when there is an anticipated revenue short-fall; and, two, he needs to give ten days' notice before doing so. That would give the Legislature an opportunity to decide if it wants to meet and go back into session to undo what he proposes to do.

"Finally and more importantly, we have a lump-sum budget provision to put into place and to put into motion a lump-sum plan, not to give money to the bureaucracy but to give money to students and schools and have direct expenditures going directly to them and not funnelled through the state bureaucracy.

"Mr. President, this is a good bill and I ask my colleagues to vote 'yes.'

"I thank the Judiciary chairman for his comments, although I disagree.

"Mr. President, I would like to submit the attorney general's opinion as part of the record. Thank you."

"This bill sends a clear message that this Legislature will not tolerate harassment. The first conviction for harassment could land you in jail for up to 30 days with a possible thousand dollar fine. Harass twice and you get a jail term for a year and a possible \$2,000 fine.

"Everyone has a right to live a life without harassment."

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the bill but only with substantial reservations. The reasons for my reservations are stated on page 2 of the conference committee report. "When the idea of a needle exchange program was first presented to the Legislature, it was sold as a balancing of interest. One-half of that balance was that it would cause a significant number of the drug abusers to go into rehabilitation programs. I'm distressed to see that it hasn't happened to the degree we were led to believe it would.

"I specifically refer to the last sentence on the first paragraph which reads, 'To significantly address the problem, however, your Committee finds that the sterile needle and syringe exchange program must be paired with a strong educational and counseling program. Accordingly, your Committee encourages all parties to look into the development of such a program.'

"I think it's unfortunate that at this stage we're still encouraging parties to look into the development of such programs. I'm distressed that the balance that we thought we would achieve has not yet been achieved. My support for this program is marginal at this point. I certainly hope that by making my concerns explicit I will be encouraging the Department of Health and others to work harder in this area.

"Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the bill and remarked:

"Mr. President, the committee report perhaps glosses over some of the actual counseling that is occurring in this program. There is counseling on site at every opportunity where there is needle exchange, both in terms of a live person there as well as printed material. There have been, because of these efforts, a good number of people who have sought more intensive, more expensive treatment programs, including residential treatment programs. It is these more expensive harder to find programs that are causing difficulties in the placement of these individuals coming to the needle exchange.

"For the most part these programs are in short supply statewide, but because the programs have, shall we say, such a selective clientele and the number of organizations offering these programs are limited, there has been in some cases the need to put needle exchange clients on a waiting list. It is for this reason that the committee report was amended, so as to explicitly require that the administration tell the Legislature, either in the annual budget or by separate appropriation bill, what the estimated funding would be in order to provide the substance abuse treatment programs needed for needle exchange clients. This we hope will help remedy the situation, by putting the Legislature directly on notice that further treatment programs are required and the extent to which dollars are needed to support these treatment programs.

"I would suggest that the needle exchange has come a long way in fulfilling its mission. It has not done everything it could but the continuation of the program, I think, is supported by virtually everyone. I believe we did not have any negative testimony in the subject matter committee on the needle exchange bill.

"For this reason I would ask my colleagues to support the program. Thank you."

"Mr. President, very briefly, I'd like to speak in support of the bill.

"First of all, I'd like to thank my colleagues on the Conference Committee for helping us craft this bill and putting it together and to thank the members of the Senate for their input because many people not on the Conference Committee also provided input.

"You know, Mr. President, when we first started this session I didn't think that we'd be here today when I talked about having a special session on education. I never dreamed that I would be here on the Senate floor talking about this reform measure that is so comprehensive and a bold step forward. This was our special session on education.

"Mr. President, it is clear that we did a good job on education this year. The educational reform package submitted by the Legislature this year is not the end but just the beginning. It clearly takes a bold step forward to empower schools to make the children the focal point of the system and the schools a focal point. It's a package we can be proud of that we can take back to our communities and say that we did not turn the clock back on reform, we moved forward.

"It's a comprehensive bill. Our package contains 14 different measures contained in this bill and other bills that clearly move to empower schools and move toward a new vision of educational reform.

"I think, Mr. President, this is an historic day for education because it's the dawn of a new era for education in Hawaii. I thank my colleagues for supporting this bill and urge all to vote 'yes.'

"Mr. President, I would like to have a copy of the letter that I sent to the PTSA inserted into the Journal for the record."

The Chair having so ordered, the letter to the Hawaii State PTSA dated April 28, 1992 is entered as Attachment "B."

Senator B. Kobayashi also rose to speak on the bill and stated:

"Mr. President, speaking in support of this bill.

"I think that the Education chair is to be commended for this effort and just persisting in what was many, many different drafts of this bill. I should note for the members' attention that among other things this bill specifies that certain provisions of Chapter 37 and Chapter 26, relating to Budget and Finance and to DAGS, respectively, will sunset unless the Legislature in 1993 specifically re-enacts or amends these particular chapters. This will help streamline the Department of Education, and certainly streamlining has been one of the themes of education reform.

"Other aspects of streamlining include the inventorying and reviewing of so-called add-on programs. The DOE, over many years, has had programs added on without necessary resources at times to support these add-on programs. The review of these add-on programs should hopefully more critically evaluate the benefits of some of these programs and, again, hopefully streamline them.

"In addition, the bill calls for support of Project Ke Au Hou which hopes to reduce the department from a threelayer system to a two-layer system. It has the potential of redirecting approximately 900 individuals currently serving in district and state offices toward the classroom level. We hope that this Project Ke Au Hou will be successful in doing so.

"Again, in keeping with the SCBM tradition, however, the Legislature has not selected which of these 900 people get designated to the schools. That will be made on a regional basis with participation from the schools by teachers and principals and also from the district offices. This decentralization will hopefully further add to the quality of education, and certainly the resources at the school level.

"For these and other reasons I would urge support of this bill. Thank you."

Senator Holt also supported the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, J would like to commend the chairman for his hard work on this bill and I also congratulate him on putting together the longest committee report I ever saw in 14 years. Thank you."

"We need to create opportunities for our next generation. We've done that at Kapolei. We've done that at Soda Creek, West Loch and other points. I think the marina is just an extension of that and I fully support that aspect.

"The other part about the surfing area that's going to be destroyed. No one's ever denied that there will be a surfing area destroyed but that surfing area is not a very popular surfing area. It has small waves. There is a more popular surfing beach called Cove's which is right down the road and HASEKO company has made sure that the primary surfing area will not been damaged.

"I ask my colleagues to support me on this resolution. Thank you."

Senator Yamasaki then moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 146 be adopted and H.B. No. 2454, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi.

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I'll be voting for his bill, but with grave reservation on one item. This is the item relating to the appropriation for the control of sharks in the State of Hawaii.

"Mr. President, I feel compelled to speak about this. As you know in the Hawaiian language the general term for shark is 'mano.' Ancient Hawaiians not only ate 'mano' they also used shark skin and teeth for making tools and other artifacts, and one of the very few surviving Hawaiian feather gods or 'aumakua hulu malu' has a mouth rimmed with shark's teeth. "Sharks have played a very important role in Hawaiian religion and among the ancient Hawaiian, innumerable lesser gods were many who appeared in the form of sharks. So, Mr. President, this is regarded as 'aumakua,' the family of personal gods whom the ancient Hawaiians look to as guardian spirits, protecting the various members of the 'ohana' or extended family.

"It is said that such a shark 'aumakua' helped its ohana by guiding fish into the nets and by protecting many family members whose canoes were swamped or capsized. Hawaiian proverbs and poetic sayings about sharks appear in 'Olelo noeau," a book compiled by Mary Kawena Pukui, one of the foremost modern translators and interpreters of Hawaiian lore.

"But besides that, Mr. President, there's been scientific data that supports theories. It seems clear that from these many sources that far fewer sharks are around today than there were a hundred years ago to probably play an important role today in the balance of marine life in the world's oceans. Sharks turn out to be very much of their own best control as many of the larger species feed on baby sharks both of their own and other species.

"In conclusion, Mr. President, it says, 'According to a survey of shark incidents in Hawaii from 1979 to 1990, a total of 85 reported incidents occurred, resulting in 36 fatalities. Many, 32, involved people engaged in some form of fishing - 18 fatalities; others, and 22 involved swimmers or waders - 9 fatalities. Still others, 18 involved people engaged in board surfing, body surfing, or riding air-mattresses - 4 fatalities. A few, 8, involved divers - 5 fatalities. Overall, despite the innumerous number of Hawaii residents and visitors engaged in marine sports and work, shark incidents have averaged around 1.5 per year in the last 40 years, compared with the average of around 28 attacks per year, worldwide.

"So with all of this kind of information, Mr. President, I feel uneasy as a Hawaiian in supporting an appropriation where we are arbitrarily going to go out and control sharks by killing them, without any real documentation of knowing if that particular shark committed that attack against an individual. And it is unfortunate that this item was included in the budget and didn't come over to the Senate as a separate bill. Perhaps if it did, maybe we'd not be considering that appropriation at this time. Thank you."

By unanimous consent, action on Conf. Com. Rep. No. 146 and H.B. No. 2454, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, was deferred until Thursday, April 30, 1992.

Re: Legislatively Proposed Amendments to the State Constitution

This is written to confirm our oral responses to the questions posed to us yesterday, concerning the propriety of a bill which solicits the input of the public to determine which of several alternatives should appear on the general election ballot as the Legislature's proposed amendment to the provisions of article X of the State Constitution relating to the selection of the members of the Board of Education and the Superintendent of Education. More specifically, we were asked

Whether the provisions of article XVII of the State Constitution which prescribe the manner in which the Legislature may propose amendments to the Constitution permit such a measure; and

More broadly, whether such a measure might not constitute an unlawful delegation of the Legislature's power to legislate.

While it is difficult to conclusively provide answers to the questions posed without a specific measure to review, for the reasons outlined below, if the measure were similar in approach and form to that proposed by the Lieutenant Governor as H.B. No. 2896, H.D. 1, S.D. 1 (hereinafter 'Lieutenant Governor's draft bill,' a copy of which is enclosed), we believe that the requirements of article XVII would be satisfied and that a court would uphold its propriety.

It is hornbook law that the method of amendment of a state constitution is most often determinable from the provisions of the constitution itself and that typically, if not universally, that method is prescribed in detailed provisions which are mandatory, exclusive and strictly construed. 34 Am. Jur. 2d, <u>Const. Law § 347</u>. In proposing amendments to a constitution, a legislature only has the powers specifically delegated to it by the Constitution and cannot simply assume that its plenary powers with respect to adopting statute laws continues. <u>Bourbon v. Governor of Maryland</u>, 258 Md. 252, 265 A.2d 477 (1970).

Article XVII prescribes how the State Constitution may be amended. Section 1 provides that revisions of or amendments to the Constitution 'may be proposed by constitutional convention or by the legislature.'

Section 3 provides how legislatively proposed amendments or revisions are to be made:

The legislature may propose amendments to the constitution by adopting the same, in the manner required for legislation, by a two-thirds vote of each house on final reading at any session, after either or both houses shall have given the governor at least ten days written notice of the final form of the proposed amendment, or, with or without such notice, by a majority vote of each house on final reading at each of two successive sessions.

Upon such adoption, the proposed amendments shall be entered upon the journals, with the ayes and noes, and published once in each of four successive weeks in at least one newspaper of general circulation in each senatorial district wherein such a newspaper is published within the two months' period immediately preceding the next general election.

At such general election the proposed amendments shall be submitted to the electorate for approval or rejection upon a separate ballot.

The conditions of and requirements for ratification of such proposed amendments shall be the same as provided in section 2 of this article for ratification at a general election.

Essentially, the section instructs the Legislature to follow the process for enacting statutes in all respects except that 10 days notice must be given to the governor before a vote on the final form of the proposal is taken (since the governor is unable to veto 'a proposal for amendment of the constitution,' article XVII, section 4), and two-thirds rather than a simple majority of each house's members must approve the proposal if the proposal is to be put on the general election ballot after only one legislative session.

As section 1 of the Lieutenant Governor's draft bill indicates, the objective of the measure was to put only one of several equally acceptable alternative amendments to article X of the State Constitution onto the general election ballot by relying on the public to indicate which of the various alternatives enjoys the greatest public support. The mechanism chosen for achieving this objective was to ask those persons participating in the primary election to select which of the various alternatives they most preferred.

To guard against exceeding the hornbook law with respect to legislatively proposed amendments to the Constitution cited above, the draft focuses on that provision of section 3 which instructs that proposals be adopted in the same manner as required for legislation, and makes the results of the survey held in conjunction with the primary election and multiple, alternative effective dates serve as the condition subsequent for determining which proposal should be placed on the general election ballot as the Legislature's proposed amendment to article X.

Our review of the case law indicates that a proposal such as this has not been the subject of judicial review. We are nonetheless comfortable with the Lieutenant Governor's draft bill because it uses methods previously used for legislation, i.e. alternative effective date provisions and objective external measures for determining which of the several effective date applies, and thus comports with 'the manner required for legislation' requirement of section 3, and does not otherwise contradict any other provision of that section. In our view, this draft is no different than a bill which anticipates that one of several outcomes may occur in the future, prescribes a course of action for each of them should any one occur, and identifies a condition or even which is to be used to determine which outcome has occurred and permit implementation of its corresponding course of action without further action by the Legislature.

In response to your second question, we appreciate that it is well-established that the Legislature's power to legislate cannot be unlawfully delegated: '[1] legislation may be held invalid if it empowers private persons to decide either what the law shall be or when a law shall be effective.' Singer, Sutherland Stat. Const. §4.11 (4th Ed). However, '"delegation of legislative authority to private parties may withstand constitutional challenge if sufficient safeguards exist to prevent an arbitrary concentration of power in persons or groups motivated by self interest."' Id. quoting from Humane Soc. of United States, New Jersey Branch, Inc. v. New Jersey State Fish & Game Council, 70 NJ 565, 362 A2d 20 (1976). In our opinion, the Lieutenant Governor's draft bill deals expressly with the first concern and avoids it, and should withstand constitutional challenge in the same manner described in New Jersey State Fish & Game Council.

In <u>Hyatt Corp v. Honolulu Liquor Commission</u>, 69 Haw. 238 (1987), our Supreme Court in passing acknowledged '[w]e are mindful that legislative grants of authority must be limited so as to ensure that "important choices of social policy are made by [the legislature], the branch or our Government most responsive to the popular will."' Under other circumstances, perhaps the method outlined in the Lieutenant Governor's draft bill might infringe upon this general principle because the Legislature's proposal would not have been the product of only its action. However, since the objective to be furthered by the principle of non-delegation is ensuring the 'popular will,' and here, the popular will is what would determine which of the equally acceptable versions of an amendment for article X appears on the general election ballot, we are again comfortable in concluding the the Lieutenant Governor's draft bill comports with the requirements of article XVII, section 3.

As noted during our discussions yesterday, we cannot guarantee that a court will agree with our conclusions. However, we believe the approach used in the Lieutenant Governor's draft bill is constitutional and are prepared to and confident that we will be able to persuade a court that this is the appropriate conclusion for it to reach as well.

Dear PTSA Members:

Thank you for expressing your opinion and concerns about the legislature's initiatives for educational reform. I believe that real and genuine reform will only come about when people like yourselves become involved and work together with policymakers to bring about change.

The educational reform package submitted by the legislature this year is not the end--but just the beginning of reform. It clearly takes a bold step forward in the effort to empower schools and make the children the focal point of the system. Continued efforts and attention must be paid to education throughout the next decade to bring about meaningful change. I believe that governance restructuring, in and of itself, will not achieve the policy results necessary to improve the quality of the educational system, but it will help to create the proper environment and infrastructure to support changes and improve student learning.

More importantly, we need to continue working on sharing our vision and changing people's attitudes and behaviors as they relate to students and education.

The legislature's reform package contained 14 initiatives which empower schools, and they are found in H.B. 2123, S.B. 2253 and H.B. 3493. Please refer to Conference Committee Report No. 78 for a comprehensive review of what the legislature has accomplished.

You made some points in your press release that I would like to address:

1. 'Failed in not giving schools or districts control over their building repair and maintenance programs.'

I believe this is not the case. We have clearly shifted the burden to the Department of Education and taken the first step to make DAGS a more service oriented agency. No longer will DAGS be able to set priorities and dictate repairs. It will ultimately be left to the schools. This is a major shift in policy.

2. 'Failed to find ballot options to change the state Board of Education that would decentralize decision making.'

Changing the BOE around in and of itself is not the answer and what happens at the school level is more important. However, we felt strongly that if we are asking parents in the community to get involved in the school, what better way to do so than to ask the voters of Hawaii how they want the system to run at the top level. The Governance Task Force on Education clearly stated that there is a lack of clear accountability in the system. This initiative places the accountability with the governor, so that he or she can be held responsible for what happens in education. There is no question that the voters have a choice and if they want it to remain status quo, they can do so by voting 'No' on the ballot or leaving it blank.

3. 'Should not let state Department of Education officials plan the system to give schools control over their whole operating budgets because the officials are "part of the bureaucracy . . . ".'

Developing operating budgets is very technical and someone needs to take the lead in moving the issue forward. More importantly, there is presently no plan or proposal to implement lump sum budgeting. Once a plan is submitted to the legislature, the public and parents will also have the opportunity to debate and discuss whether the plan actually reflects what needs to be done. Our proposal makes it very clear that lump sum budgeting must be for school and student allocations only and not the bureaucracy. You make a good point of having people outside the department participate in the development of the plan. This will be encouraged.

4. 'Should not endorse Project Ke Au Hou -- the DOE's planned reorganization -- because "Ke Au Hou does not change anything".'

Project Ke Au Hou is the mechanism to bring about internal reform within the bureaucracy. The whole thrust of the project is to:

- o Reduce the size of the state and district offices.
- o Shift state and district resources to the schools.
- o Provide schools greater flexibility in making site-based decisions.
- o Focus the role of the central office as a standard-setting, assessment and support structure for schools.
- o Promote collaboration and teaming as a norm to remove worker isolation and attain group results. ('Restructuring the Public School System for Our Children's Future,' page 6)

These five points highlight the goals of Project Ke Au Hou, and they basically support school empowerment and the decentralization of the bureaucracy. There is no question that Project Ke Au Hou, once implemented, will promote rather than hinder parental involvement.

5. 'Should restore the \$3.7 million request to reduce class size in grade three because children would benefit immediately.'

The legislature did act on class size and we provided \$1.9 million in flex money for the elementary schools. Furthermore, we provided \$1.4 million for additional CORE positions for the secondary schools to address the class size issue.

Again, we look forward to your continued involvement and active participation in the educational reform process, and we stand ready to work with you to meet our ultimate goal of educating our children.

SIXTY-THIRD DAY

Thursday, April 30, 1992

The Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 12:01 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by The Honorable Eloise Yamashita Tungpalan, Hawaii State Senator, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Sixty-Second Day.

ORDER OF THE DAY

MATTERS DEFERRED FROM WEDNESDAY, APRIL 29, 1992

There being no objections, the Senate took the following actions out of the Order of the Day in the sequence printed:

FINAL READING

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 146 (H.B. No. 2454, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Yamasaki moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 146 be adopted and H.B. No. 2454, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi.

Senator Cobb rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, earlier this session you indicated, if we had a disagreement with a bill, even if it were one item, that we should express that and if the disagreement was strong enough to vote 'no' on the entire measure. I recall that colloquy that we had when it came to the construction cost and renovation of the Capitol. For that reason I am rising this morning to speak against and to vote against the State budget for the following reasons.

"First of all, there is the transit item of \$53 million that is included in that document, or approximately \$53 million.

"We don't always do the popular thing, Mr. President. Two years ago 74% of the public favored a mass transit system. Today, 71% oppose it, according to the latest newspaper polls. When I voted 'no' two years ago, I was very conscious of that 74% being in favor of it, but I voted 'no' then on both the train and the tax. So it's not always the popular vote that we make. Just because public opinion has shifted does not mean necessarily that we should shift with the winds. But the reasons for opposing it today are even more compelling than was the case two years ago.

"The reason, Mr. President, is that there has not been provided any opportunity for us to have an up or down vote on the question of whether or not transit funding should continue. The only mechanism for this would be to have a motion of either approval or disapproval in form of either a resolution or a bill before this body for us to decide upon. At no point in time have we had or been afforded that opportunity.

"The Committee on Sensible Transit published a list recently where they said the majority of legislators would vote to oppose. I have no way of knowing that because that's their list, their publication, their source. But I think we should have been afforded the opportunity to review this entire project and vote on it as a separate issue. Unfortunately, we have not been afforded that right.

"Based on the earlier admonition that I had from the Chair, the only choice then is to vote 'no' on the entire document.

"Mr. President, I also feel that the money could have been better used elsewhere, in such areas as education, human services, and health services.

"And I would point out that the City's proposed mass transit is already changed and gone way over the original budget. I would like to read just very briefly excerpts of a letter sent to me on February 24th by COST or the Committee on Sensible Transit: 'Making the point that it is not a bad faith or breach of contract to repeal the onehalf percent general excise tax increase that was passed two years ago.'

"They go on to state, 'We would remind you that many of the changes that have occurred in the rail project since you voted for Bill 184. You voted then for a rail proposal far different from the one the City now has before you. In addition, the economic climate is now far weaker than what you had anticipated. In 1990 Hawaii was booming. Large year to year increases in state tax revenues could be taken for granted. Also in 1990, state legislators thought they were voting for a slim, non-intrusive monorail, running underground through town and into Waikiki. They believe that private contributions and the federal government would fund most, if not all, of its \$1.2 billion cost. They expected that the City might not really need the proposed one-half percent tax increase. Now in 1992 they or we are faced with the following: (1) A fullsize noisy 70 decibel train; (2) A train that will not go underground through town. It will skirt downtown and wall off the waterfront; (3) It will not go into Waikiki. The City has still not worked out how they will transfer riders there; (4) Tax collections are sliding and tourism is either in disarray or in decline; (5) The construction cost is not \$1.2 billion, it is \$1.7 billion, and cost overruns are still yet to come; and (6) There are no private contributors. Local taxpayers must fund it all.

"Quoting again, 'In short, if there is any bad faith and breach of contract, it is the promises of the City administration. They promised but they did not deliver.'

"In voting against the budget, Mr. President, I want to at the same time take the time to commend the chairman and members for their hard work, their diligence, their pursuit, and their restoration of so many vital areas in human services and education. They did face cuts. They did a yeoman's job. I'm not at all critical of that. In fact, I admire and support the work they did.

"But following the earlier admonition that we had on the floor of the Senate that if you feel so strongly on an issue that you cannot support the document you should articulate that and vote 'no' on the entire document. And that, Mr. President, is the reason I have outlined why I'm voting 'no' on the state budget. Thank you."

Senator McMurdo rose to speak in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I do not feel that I can vote 'no' on this because of all the health and human services and some of the other funding which is so critical. But, I am equally as concerned about rapid transit as the previous speaker, and I'd like to have the record reflect that if there were any way that I could vote against that part of the budget, it would be a resounding 'no.'"

Senator Blair also rose to speak in support of the bill and remarked:

Mr. President, like the previous speaker, I have been and remain opposed to the rapid transit system. However, I feel the issue is now properly before the City Council. Therefore, I will not vote against the budget in a symbolic gesture of continued opposition to one of the items therein."

Senator Reed also rose to speak on the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I have for days been considering voting against the budget for the same reason expressed by Senator Cobb. I have since decided that because there are many worthwhile expenditures in this budget, I will vote for the budget. But I do so with serious reservations and I'd like to articulate just a couple of them.

"I share the previous speaker's concerns relative to the rapid transit and, were we allowed a line item type of negative vote, mine will be cast against the public funding of rapid transit. I also voted against the measure that enabled the public funding of rapid transit two years ago.

"A second concern has to do with the expanding cost of government and what the governor calls his 'warm body' policy. We have a government that is growing by leaps and bounds without a reciprocal increase in the service provided our citizenry. In the six years that the governor has been in office, state government has expanded by 16,000 people. The budget that we are about to vote on increases that by nearly 2,000 positions. We are at a point, nationally and locally, where we need to be tightening our belts and not continuing to increase the number of people who eat at the public trough.

"I will vote for the budget because there's good in it. Even though I will not be here next year, I would ask that my colleagues begin now to stop our seemingly everexpanding government.

"Thank you very much."

Senator A. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I too have serious concerns about mass transit. However, I will be voting for the budget because of the hard work put in by our Ways and Means chairman, all the liaisons with the different committees and the subject matter chairs. There's a lot of good in this budget. I know many of us have serious concerns about mass transit but voting against the budget is not a good way to stop that train. Thank you."

Senator Holt also rose to support the bill and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of this bill.

"Mr. President, I would like to thank the chairman of the Ways and Means Committee and his counterpart in the House for their hard work on this bill.

"As all of us know, it is extremely difficult to reduce the state budget by any amount without taking a considerable amount of criticism from all quarters. But faced as these men were by a potential \$360 million deficit, they could have taken a politically expedient approach by approving a budget to satisfy all of the public's demands and thereby diverting all of the hard decisions to the governor. Instead, Mr. President, they courageously chose to make these decisions under extremely difficult circumstances.

"For the record, I believe that this document represents the best possible decisions that could be made in light of the state's financial condition and the increasing demand for public services.

"As a result, this budget is a bell weather of where we are and a barometer of what is to come. As an example, Mr. President, I would like to point to the \$28 million appropriation for moderate income housing at the old Kapiolani Community College site at Pensacola. In the eyes of the Ways and Means and Finance chairmen this project was more than a \$28 million cost item. They looked beyond the dollars, Mr. President, and saw the result of a unique partnership between the University, the HCDA, and the DOE, to address the need for moderate income public and faculty housing facilities, and at the same time the needs of McKinley High School, nearby residents, and the Kakaako Community Development District.

"As a result, the project will provide: 258 rental units for moderate income housing within the Kakaako Community Development District; an equal amount of 258 rental units for much needed faculty housing for the University of Hawaii; a new permanent facility for the community college employment training office program; an additional 40,000 sq. ft. of building space and parking facilities for McKinley High School; and an upgraded public recreational facility for nearby residents.

"This type of uncommon cooperation between the state agencies which results in exemplary solutions to common problems is superlative and must be recognized and encouraged, Mr. President. I congratulate both chairmen for recognizing this.

"For these reasons, Mr. President, I urge all my colleagues to join me in voting in favor of this budget. Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi then rose to speak in support of the bill and remarked:

"Mr. President, early this year I did not think this budget would be possible. I did not think that we could get out of this place with a budget that met many of our needs and still did not raise taxes. Somehow we have been able to do that. We have been able to do that in part because we have transferred some of our costs from this year to later years. That cost which has been transferred amounts to \$210 million because of changes in means of financing for the Department of Education construction fund and also the HFDC homes revolving fund. These changes as well as other sacrifices by other departments and very large cuts which were extremely painful allow us to pass this budget tonight.

"The budget we have before us is a blend of cuts where necessary, additions for certain extremely needed projects, and also some compromises which we all hope will prove out to be wise in the long run. We cannot forever count on plentiful resources to meet an ever expanding list of needs. But this budget does, in part, set the stage for what might be very lean years, including next year. It allows us a budget with a carryover balance that will hopefully keep our very good double A rating in tact. It will allow us to go into the next fiscal biennium with the opportunity to make additional changes where necessary and even to correct some of the cuts that we have made this year.

"In particular, I might make some comments about education since I am the education budget liaison. In lower education, the Senate position was originally to add back only \$7 million. We have in this budget added back over \$14 million, a very sizeable increase, and more than half way between where the Senate and House originally stood.

"In the University of Hawaii budget, we have a decrease of some \$8 million with very large and painful decreases mainly in the area of equipment and repair and maintenance. Fortunately, instructional positions have been spared and so the good work of the university, that of educating students, can continue hopefully with relatively little damage. Nonetheless, the university cannot forever forego repair and maintenance and cannot forego equipment. So this is an area in which I hope my colleagues would bear in mind the next time we see this budget, that we make amends where we have made cuts. and we be mindful that the continual erosion of programs cannot be allowed to continue without forcing the departments to make program changes. If these program changes are necessary, we must, I believe, shoulder part of the burden and responsibility and assist departments in making these changes.

"Mr. President, in conclusion, I think that this budget represents some of the best and worst in political decisionmaking. It required us to make some very deep cuts. It required us to cut programs that many of us feel very close to. This budget also required us to be responsible, to live within a very limited budget and try to prioritize amongst ourselves.

"This was a very difficult and quite unusual task, and I commend the chairman of Ways and Means for shepherding us through this process. I would think that under other leadership we would have been in much shakier ground. Nonetheless I think we have come through with a bare-bones budget that will hopefully serve us well in coming years. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura also rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I too am going to support the budget even though my dream has been deleted from the budget. I have to take my hats off to the chairman and the staff of Ways and Means because they were also involved in the investigatory work regarding some of the abuses on solesource. I can't see how they managed to put the budget together.

"I'm not a member of the Ways and Means Committee. I don't know how they worked on the budget and also worked with me on the other issues. I really commend the chairman and the staff because I'm really tired and I only worked on my bills. I don't know how they did it but my hats off to them. And I'm 16 years younger than the chairman.

"Thank you."

Senator Cobb then rose to add:

"Mr. President, I had not planned to rise a second time but I wanted to share a brief response that emerged during the course of further debate.

"Clearly, I support and admire the work of the Ways and Means chairman and all those who did participate in this document. But realistically speaking, Mr. President, the only way to stop the train at the state level is to stop the budget because it's included as a part of that document. We cannot just defer action to the city. We are policymakers also and we made the policy decision two years ago that allowed this to happen, that allowed this tax increase to take place this October. And we certainly have a right to review that decision.

"I have heard over and over again that the actions of one Legislature are not binding on another and that should apply in the case of the train as well. And there will be a tax increase this year because of our inaction, unfortunately, in not reviewing and having a stand up or down vote and possibly to leading the funding for this train.

"Mr. President, I think there is something fundamentally and terribly wrong with our political system. It does not provide for or allow a public vote as a separate item on an issue of this level of public concern. At no point during this session have we been afforded the opportunity or allowed the privilege of voting on this issue up or down as a separate issue.

"And my prediction is, if we were afforded that opportunity it would probably not pass in the Senate. And given the level of public concern out there, I think we should have had that opportunity. We have not. It's a sad thing. Because of so much good work that's done on the budget, the only specific reason that I am forced to vote 'no' is because of the inclusion of this train and the colloquy that took place earlier in this session between us that said very clearly that if you feel so strongly on an issue vote down on the entire bill.

"Mr. President, I hope in the future we will be afforded the opportunity to vote 'yes' or 'no' on a specific item rather than being forced to vote against an entire bill because of one item contained in it.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 146 was adopted and H.B. No. 2454, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 83 (S.B. No. 1843, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Blair moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 83 be adopted and S.B. No. 1843, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Holt.

Senator Chang rose to inquire if the chair of the Conference Committee would yield to a question. The Chair posed the question and Senator Blair having answered:

"If it is of a technical nature, I may have"

The Chair said:

"Yes, maybe."

Senator Chang then stated:

"Thank you, Mr. President.

"From the committee report, there's no discussion as to whether the weapons or firearms considered in the bill were found to be 'excessively lethal'"

Senator Blair responded:

"In fact, I would direct your attention to page 2 where it says, 'In doing so, the Conferees were not guided by and did not apply the interpretation of Article I, Section 17, which was reflected in the Senate's position. In fact, your Conferees' specifically decline to make a finding that the weapons which are covered by this bill are or are not 'excessively lethal' as that term is used in Committee of the Whole Report No. 5, from Volume 1 of the proceedings of the 1950 Constitutional Convention."

Senator Chang continued:

"A reading of the bill indicates that you could have a semiautomatic 22-caliber pistol capable of receiving a detachable magazine and possessing a barrel shroud and be classified as an assault pistol. Is that correct?"

Senator Blair answered:

"I noted that your described weapon met criteria No. 3. I wasn't sure what the other criteria met would be, from among these on the list."

Senator Chang continued:

"A detachable magazine which attached to the pistol outside of the pistol grip."

Senator Blair responded:

"Having a detachable magazine, per se, wouldn't be one of the criteria. If the detachable magazine attached outside of the pistol grip, that would be criteria No. 1, which in addition to the shroud being criteria No. 3, would qualify it as an assault pistol."

Senator Chang continued:

"And that assault pistol would be prohibited under the terms of this bill?"

Senator Blair answered:

"Yes, but only with respect to new acquisitions. Those which are currently registered and lawfully owned could continue under their present ownership without any sanctions applied."

Senator Chang continued:

"In contrast, a 45-caliber pistol or a 44-magnum pistol which did not otherwise possess the characteristics described in this bill would not be prohibited?"

Senator Blair answered:

"That is correct."

Senator Chang continued:

"And this would be the case even where the 45-caliber pistol and the 44-magnum pistol possessed a greater range, a greater penetration, or a greater rate of fire than the prohibited 22-caliber pistol with the characteristics that I have described before?"

Senator Blair responded:

"That is correct. There's nothing in the bill concerning the size of the round, the caliber, that the weapon fires. There is nothing specifically with relationship to the weapon's discharge rate and my understanding is that all semiautomatics are able to fire at approximately the same rate of speed. There is nothing in the bill with respect to penetration."

Senator Chang further asked:

"Is it your statement then that penetration and range are not significant characteristics considered by this bill?"

Senator Blair answered:

"I suppose it depends on which side of the gun you're standing. (Laughter.)

"I'm sorry, withdraw the previous comment.

"They're not reflected in this bill."

Senator Chang then said:

"Thank you very much, Mr. President."

Senator Blair, in support of the measure, said:

"Mr. President, on behalf of the conferees on this bill, although I may be out of order, I'd like to present you with a token of our appreciation for your efforts. This gift is less than 50 ounces and shorter than 12 inches. It does not have a silencer, although we diligently sought to find one which had a silencer attached. In any event, while it's being delivered by the Sergeant-at-Arms, I would like to note that there are some errors in the committee report which reflected an earlier draft proposal offered by the House in the course of the negotiations. I would request that certain corrections be noted in the Senate Journal so that people are not misled by reading the committee report.

"The bill is, however, correct with respect to any of the differences between the bill and the committee report. And with your permission I would like to have these remarks inserted in the Journal."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Blair's remarks follow:

"Mr. President, as Chair of the Senate conferees, I request that the following corrections be noted in the Senate Journal regarding Senate Conference Committee Report No. 83, S.B. 1843, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1.

"Paragraph number 7, on pages 3 and 4, should read as follows:

(7) The limitation on the size of detachable ammunition magazines was amended to "grandfather" existing magazines with a capacity of less than [twenty] <u>twenty-one</u> cartridges for a period of [one year,] two years, if they are owned by the owners of registered [pistols.] <u>firearms</u>. The penalty provisions, therefore, will apply during that time only to persons who have a detachable magazine of greater than [nineteen] <u>twenty</u> round capacity or who are not the legal [owner] <u>owners</u> of a registered firearm into which the magazine will fit. It should be noted that, in order to have this grandfather effect apply, the owners of [the] carbines and rifles with magazines which are capable of use with a pistol and whose capacity is greater than ten rounds will be required to register their firearm,... even if registration is not otherwise required. This grandfather clause will permit owners of [pistols with a magazine capacity] <u>magazines with a capacity</u> [between eleven and nineteen rounds] greater than ten and less than twenty-one rounds which are designed for or capable of use with a pistol to modify, or cause to be modified, their magazines, and will also permit firearms manufacturers and aftermarket suppliers to meet the demand for magazines with a maximum capacity of ten rounds.'

"The bill is clear. However, the committee report reflected an earlier draft proposal offered in the course of the negotiations. I apologize for any confusion. Thank you."

"The phrase 'or withhold such life prolonging procedures' was inadvertently deleted.

"Thus, at page 5, on lines 10 through 13 inclusive, the bill provides that the absence of a selection on the sample form would result in the decision to use or withhold life sustaining procedures being made without reference to the durable power of attorney.

"I should also note that the double negative on page 3, lines 2 and 3, is awkward. The section can be better understood if read:

'(c) A durable power of attorney for health care decisions shall be presumed not to grant authority to decide [that] whether the principal's life should [not] be prolonged through surgery'

"Thank you, Mr. President, for allowing me to make this clarifying entry into the Journal."

Senator Tungpalan rose to speak against the bill and said:

"Mr. President, because of the lack of clarification, I feel that I must vote 'no.' Where life is concerned, I certainly want it to be clear, crystal clear, that people who are dying should be given the opportunity to have water, food and such. I'll be voting 'no' because it's not clear. Thank you."

"Mr. President, we've had so much information and discussion about non-negotiated contracts and example after example have hit the front pages and right here on the floor with GTE and others that it is time that we do intervene and take drastic action.

"I like some of the language in the bill, especially on page 15 where the advertising for bids is required; and page 16 where it says, 'No expenditure of public money for services and supplies where the sum to be expended is more that \$15,000, or for construction where the sum to be expended is more than \$35,000 shall be made except under contract let after public advertisement, in the manner provided by law, except: ...' and they list a whole bunch.

"The one that really strikes me as very positive is on page 17, No. 6: 'When the purchasing authority: (A) Determines that it is for a purchase that does not admit of competition; and' (this is the great part) '(B) Notifies the legislature in writing of such determination not less than: (i) Fifteen days' and so on. At least they're notifying the Legislature, and that's very positive.

"But on the down side, Mr. President, and this is the point I was pondering. Going back to page 5, and it talks about 'Multi-step sealed bidding; receipt, handling and evaluation of unpriced technical offers. Unpriced technical offers shall not be opened publicly but shall be opened in front of two or more procurement officials. The offers shall not be disclosed to unauthorized persons. Bidders may request nondisclosure of trade secrets and other proprietary data identified in writing.' It goes on to determine who can participate. If you put in a bid, the procurement officer must in writing tell you if your offer is considered acceptable, potentially acceptable or unacceptable.

"Then, where the problem arises is on page 6 under section 103-K1, and it says, 'The contracting officer may initiate phase two of the procedure if there are sufficient acceptable unpriced technical offers to assure effective price competition in phase two without technical discussions. If the contracting officer shall issue an amendment to the invitation for bids or engage in technical discussions as forth in section 103-K1 and 103-G1 (2).'

"The point I'm trying to make, Mr. President, is that they set up a criteria, if there's three people bidding for the job and they can get the rating of (1), acceptable, so you can participate; (2) you're potentially acceptable, that is being reasonably susceptible to be being able to being made acceptable; or (3) unacceptable. Now, when it's time for the contracting officer to continue the negotiation, the contracting officer must only deal with those companies that got the rating of (1) or (2). Those who got the rating of (3) have been eliminated and that sounds good. However, the contracting officer has the

right to change or amend the invitation for bids. In other words, they can amend the criteria, that's my impression. I may be wrong. So what this is doing is setting us up for a lawsuit. If I get excluded because I'm unacceptable then you as a contracting officer changed the rules on me. I should be allowed back in but the way the bill is written right now it says I cannot get back in. I guarantee you, the first bidder that's excluded by this section will be in court to sue for being excluded.

"So I have grave reservations about this. It may jeopardize the bill but I think it's necessary that we move forward because of so much grief and so many issues that have come before us. For that reason I'll be supporting the bill."

Senator Matsuura also in support of the bill then said:

"Mr. President, the Senator from Makakilo is correct in terms of some of his reservations. Let me assure you that this section has been written primarily to address some of the shortfalls of the procurement process. As all of you know, we have no laws, no rules or regulations relating to procurement and this is the first attempt to address that deficiency.

"As the good Senator mentioned about some of his concerns, I want all of you to know that Section 2, which is from page 1 to page 13, all of that section comes into effect July 1st of 1993, so we will get a chance to take a look at this section in the next legislative session, that's in 1993. So it doesn't take effect till July 1st of 1993.

"The good Senator also mentioned about the good features. All of the good features that he mentioned are included in Section 3, so with that I strongly recommend that we pass this bill. Thank you very much."

Senator McMurdo rose to speak in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, after much deliberation about this bill, I will be voting for it. This bill mandates the Convention Center Authority to search statewide for an appropriate convention site and then to report back to the Legislature. The Legislature must approve any action which is taken. I think these are good steps.

"But I am, as I did the other day, serving notice to the Convention Center Authority and, particularly, chairman Donald Takaki, that a good faith effort must be made to carry out the intent of the bill. I expect Mr. Takaki to comply not only with the letter of the law but with the spirit of the law.

"My constituents from Waikiki, Moiliili and Ala Moana will be watching this authority like a hawk, because we all want a win-win solution which would be satisfactory not only to those in the tourist industry but also to those who reside in the area of the convention center.

"I also would like to remind Mr. Takaki that other commissions, who've ignored the wishes of constituents, have done so at their own peril. A classic example was a recent fiasco with the Veterans War Memorial Commission, and we have taken legislative action tonight to straighten out that mess. This is a kind of blessing which Mr. Takaki cannot ignore.

"I hope that my colleagues will bear out this watchfulness to be sure that this bill is complied with in full. Thank you very much."

Senator Cobb also rose to speak in support of the measure and stated:

"Very briefly, Mr. President, speaking in support of the measure. One item of the bill that did concern me and I would like to express as a reservation is the continuing ability of this authority to condemn land. Fortunately, the conferees have built into it a requirement for legislative approval and it's because of the good work of the chairman and the Conference Committee members in addressing this and other concerns that I am supporting the bill.

"But it would seem to be patently unfair for the authority to have the ability to go in and condemn land for an owner or developer that has already put a lot of effort into a convention center site of their own, has gone through the entire approval process, has received that approval from the City and County of Honolulu and suddenly to have their land condemned and their site taken away from them at what would be considerably less than what their investment would be, even though it could be determined to be fair market value. But because it has the redeeming feature of legislative approval of such an action, thus, coming back here, I think the bill is worthy of support and I will be voting for it."

Senator Crozier rose to speak in support of S.B. No. 2868 and related bills, S.B. No. 2867 and H.B. No. 2505, as follows:

"Mr. President, I'm speaking in favor of the bill, and my comments will not only be for this bill but for the following bill, Senate Bill 2867, and also House Bill 2505 which we have already passed.

"Mr. President, the three bills and many other bills that have come out of the housing package this year continue the process of trying to deliver housing for people. With Act 15 and the creation of HFDC we were able to begin to provide housing in the affordable market range for our people. Then we made an attempt to attack the homeless problem.

"The one leg of this stool that was missing was trying to resolve the shortage of rental units in Hawaii and this bill goes right to the heart of that.

"Senate Bill 2868 creates a rental housing trust fund. This housing trust fund will create rental units for those who make below 60% of median income. Mr. President, this is a product of the House of Representatives Housing Summit that they had this summer. It was put together by many community individuals from across the state with the House of Representatives and they worked very hard to do this. There's \$15 million in here to be used for grants or loans to help provide low-income rental units. It's a fantastic bill.

"The next bill S.B. 2867 creates interim construction loan financing. And this bill, Sir, was put together by the governor's office and HFDC. It will make interim construction financing available. Interim construction financing is hard to come by now not only here in Hawaii but across the nation. So making money available for rental units will create opportunities so that we can have more vacancies. Now our vacancy is down about 2%. In other words, there are people out there watching the obituary column to see who died so they hope they can move in to the apartment.

"It's been quite a year. The House worked hard. The governor and his people worked very hard to put a package together. The role that the Senate played was after they had taken all the great ideas, you know there's no other ideas left for us to take. So what we did, we played the role of the honest broker; in other words, looked at the different bills and tried to mesh the best of the bills together. And I think we've done that. We were able to create a coalition from the governor, from the House of Representatives and the Senate and the community to put a package together that will truly help the people of Hawaii. "For example, House Bill 2505 streamlines the process for developers who normally have to wait 7 years to go through the government process. This, if everything works out, will streamline it to 2 years; in other words saving tons of money so that the developer can get the homes to the people in a lot faster time.

"Mr. President, I am personally proud and I thank all my committee members for supporting me and also the Senate who allowed the committee to have the flexibility to mesh these bills together so that we can deliver housing for our people.

"Thank you very much."

Senator B. Kobayashi also rose to support the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to support the words of the previous speaker.

"The Senate Housing chairman has done a commendable job in shepherding these two bills which contain \$40 million of funding and also over 20 other bills. The previous speaker mentioned the streamlining bill. This by itself is a remarkable bill because by December of 1994 the counties will, hopefully, have streamlined their process so that all permits will be approved or not approved within 18 months, and the state will have a process of approving permits within 6 months.

"These bills along with others such as, mortgage insurance, with funding of \$5 million, a number of other bills having to do with incentive programs for renters, all add up to a very large and very productive package for housing.

"I think the big winner here this year is rental housing, clearly, a priority of our Housing chairman, and also rental housing for low and moderate income residents and rental housing which seeks to give preferences, in many instances, to non-profit agencies.

"Another further emphasis in several of these bills is the building of multi-unit type projects. All in all, a very large and productive package, and I think a very good commendable effort. We have a lot more to do and I think we'll try to do more next year. Thank you."

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JOHN WAIHEE, Governor of Hawaii, pursuant to the power vested in me by Section 10 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, do hereby extend the Regular Session of 1992 of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii for a period of one hour following 3:00 a.m., April 30, 1992.

Senator Crozier rose to speak in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I hear the murmurs of pleasure when I stood up, especially from the gentleman to the right. He's so excited to hear me speak again. But I will keep it short.

"I speak in support of this bill and the following bill, S.B. 2638.

"Mr. President, both of these bills deal with HFDC's master housing developments, one on the Big Island, Kealakehe, and also Lahaina on Maui. HFDC is trying to build affordable houses on state lands or ceded lands. The one in Kealakehe is on ceded land and the one in Lahaina is also ceded land which was used for sugar. Therefore, there are some entitlements with them. Entitlements to OHA. OHA gets 20% of the revenue and Hawaiian Home Lands gets 30% of the revenue.

"For the last four years, the executive branch and the entitlement recipients have not been able to find a negotiated settlement. It took the Legislature to finally step in and bring some kind of resolution to this problem.

"These bills, what they do, first of all, allow for an appraisal to take place. After the appraisal has taken place then each of the entitlements get their money. If they cannot be paid off at the time of transfer from DLNR to HFDC, then they collect interest. The land is there to for residential purposes, but at some point in time HFDC may change the use of this land, maybe to commercial or to golf courses, and it's incumbent upon the State of Hawaii to recognize that the entitlement of the native Hawaiian people should be recognized. And what we've done is to allow for a mechanism so that these entitlements can come back into play. They will receive a share of the revenues after -- let me repeat, after -- after the annual debt service has been paid, because we need to allow HFDC to participate. They have to sell the land then OHA and DHHL do not get as much.

"When the debt service is paid, then there's 1% that goes to administration cost, and after that the entitlement takes place. We look forward to a very generous income stream down the line from the commercial properties. This way the general public can get their homes that's been tied up for four years. We couldn't make any headway. We're going to make the headway now. Also the entitlements can produce a lot more money than they're getting now. They're getting pittance for those lands, Mr. President. In fact, in Kealakehe I don't think OHA is getting anything for the land, but we're going to make the lands work. OHA and Hawaiian Home Lands will start to get some kind of income stream so they can produce more houses for their people.

"I am very excited about this and I hope my colleagues support this. Thank you."

Senator Solomon also support the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I also speak in support of this bill.

"Mr. President, although I would have liked to have seen more flexibility as part of the negotiation in terms of the settlement and entitlements issue, as to both organizations being able to take proportionate shares in our 'aina' or land, as opposed to just cash transactions. I've always felt very strongly about that and I just would like to express those reservations that I have although I do support the formula and I commend the committee. know it was a very, very difficult transaction, but I think that all of us and, if my colleagues did not have the opportunity to see what has happened with the Hawaiian entitlements and what the Office of Hawaiians is now experiencing, I think that maybe we should be more sensitive in helping the Office of Hawaiian Affairs as well as DHHL in giving them that flexibility if their beneficiaries feel more comfortable in looking at the entitlements and the settlement in taking their proportionate shares in the 'aina' as opposed to the cash dollars.

"I would like to urge the chairman of the committee as well as those conferees that were the managers on behalf of the Senate to possibly look at that for the upcoming entitlements which we will be looking at again next year. Thank you."

FINAL READING

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 161 (S.B. No. 2361; S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Ikeda moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 161 be adopted and S.B. No. 2361, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Iwase.

Senator Ikeda rose to speak in support of the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, I never thought we'd get here.

"I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

"Your Committee on Consumer Protection and Business Regulation has presented to this body four bills which make up our comprehensive package of reforms to the nofault law. Two of these bills specifically address the uninsured motorist problem. They are S.B. 2306, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, which permits the counties to levy a \$100 penalty on any vehicle registration if the vehicle is uninsured. It also establishes a data base system which will identify and locate vehicles that are uninsured. This bill, if enacted, will go into effect January 1, 1993.

"And S.B. 2258, C.D. 2, which will allow the police to tow and impound an uninsured motor vehicle. Proof of insurance is required before the vehicle is released. These bills will certainly have a positive impact on the problem of uninsured vehicles and will ultimately reduce the number of uninsured cars on the road. The other two bills, this bill, and H.B. 3974, C.D. 1, which we passed earlier, represent a coalescence of approaches and alternatives to reduce and stabilize the cost of no-fault insurance.

"In order to reform the present system, we took the law back to its original intent, which was to eliminate 90% of the accident claims from the tort recovery system. We, hope to accomplish this by modifying the formula by which the medical rehabilitative threshold is calculated. The threshold will be \$10,000 for the first year or until such time as the insurance commissioner determines otherwise.

"We have also eliminated the concept of stacking, a concept introduced by the courts, by providing that it be offered only as an option and with higher coverage limits.

"Mr. President, we believe that we have an obligation to keep premium costs as low as possible since insurance coverage is mandatory. We have, therefore, made adjustment to the minimum mandatory coverages and instituted a medical fee schedule. Surcharging by insurance companies for not having no-fault insurance will no longer be permitted unless the person has been convicted of that offense in the past three years.

"In addition, Mr. President, we are granting an amnesty period of six months following the effective date of this act to encourage people to get their cars insured.

"Most importantly, we are mandating an immediate rate freeze and beginning January 1, 1993, a 15% rate reduction. The insurance commissioner will then be responsible for monitoring the effects of these changes and recommend further reductions in rates and/or changes to the law. The commissioner will also have the power of prior approval over any future rate increases.

"This bill also prohibits collusion between health care providers and attorneys by giving RICO, the Regulated Industries Complaint Office, the power to investigate and refer any violations to the appropriate regulatory body for disciplinary action.

"Mr. President, our primary goal throughout these deliberations has been to craft a law which will meet the needs of the consumer and I believe that this goal has been reached. This effort reflects more than a year's work, which included trips to other jurisdictions. It also represents a team effort by the committee, especially the conferees. These bills reflect the ideas and hard work of each and every member of the Conference Committee.

"I want to thank my vice-chair, Senator Iwase, who also served as legal counsel and as a stabilizing force in deliberations. He and Senator Matsuura authored the bills addressing the uninsured motorist problem. My thanks also to Senator Koki who worked on the prohibiting of collusion provision, and to Senator McCartney, who, despite the burdens of his arduous task reforming education, was there to lend support to the entire effort and developed the language that links these two bills.

"Recognition and gratitude should also be given to my House counterpart, Representative Hirono and her committee, who worked diligently to produce a fair and comprehensive package.

"Mr. President, some people may feel that this effort doesn't go far enough and others will feel that we did too much. I want to tell you that we moved with caution and restraint trying to balance the concerns of all involved. And I strongly believe that the people of this state will ultimately benefit from our efforts. Thank you."

Senator McCartney also rose to speak in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the measure.

"I would like to commend the chairman for moving forward with the bill, making some tough and difficult decisions, listening to members, and putting together a package that brings about reform in the no-fault insurance problem.

"You know, Mr. President, the doctors, the lawyers, the insurance companies, all took a step back in this bill in order for consumers to take one step forward. This bill is balanced, it's fair, it's equitable, and without doubt, Mr. President, the consumers clearly win.

"I urge my colleagues to support the bill. Thank you."

Senator Solomon also supported the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I will be voting for this bill and I want to commend the chairman and committee for their hard work. I know many compromises were made and met in an effort to bring about tort reform that would benefit the consumer. However, Mr. President, should this tort reform not benefit the consumer, that we would take definite action to be sure it occurs.

"We have many unanswered questions, Mr. President, that needs to be answered. Like, how much money would be needed to fund the data base to track the uninsured motorist? In fact, Mr. President, the chairman mentioned rates in terms of increases. What about rates in terms of decreases? I think that these are all issues that need to be discussed in the future. I am hoping, Mr. President, that the chairman, as well as her committee members, will be taking that into consideration and will be able to provide those answers to us in the upcoming session. Thank you very much."

Senator Iwase also supported the bill and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the bill.

"I would also like to join the Senator from the Windward side in commending the chair. This was a very complex bill. It required the balancing of many interests, meeting the demands of many factions. The work of both Senator Ikeda and Representative Hirono was commendable. Without their efforts this bill could not have proceeded.

"With respect to the comments of the previous speaker, I think those comments are well taken. The bill itself does provide that the insurance commissioner will continue to monitor the operation of this act during the next year to look at whether or not rate reductions can continue, whether adjustments have to be made, whether any other amendments to the law should occur, and to recommend those amendments. This is not the end of the no-fault issue. It is the beginning; it's a new beginning and it is a hope that through a concerted effort over a period of time we will not only get back to but maintain the 90-10 goal which was sought in 1973 when the Legislature enacted this law.

"Again, I would commend the work of the chair of the Consumer Protection Committee. Thank you, Mr. President."

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR

Gov. Msg. No. 365, dated April 30, 1992, transmitting the Executive Order providing for a further extension of the Regular Session of 1992 of the Sixteenth State Legislature, as follows:

"EXECUTIVE ORDER

WHEREAS, Section 10 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii provides that an extension of not more than fifteen days of any session may 'be granted by the presiding officers of both houses at the written request of two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled or may be granted by the governor'; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to said Section 10 of Article III, the Regular Session of 1992 of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii has been extended; and

WHEREAS, the Governor has been requested to grant a further extension and it appears that such a further extension is necessary;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JOHN WAIHEE, Governor of Hawaii, pursuant to the power vested in me by Section 10 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, do hereby extend the Regular Session of 1992 of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii for a period of one hour following 4:00 a.m., April 30, 1992.

RECONSIDERATION OF ACTION TAKEN

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 139 (H.B. No. 602, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Yamasaki moved that the Senate reconsider it action taken earlier on the calendar on Conf. Com. Rep. No. 139 and the H.B. No. 602, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, seconded by Senator Solomon.

Senator Blair rose to speak against the reconsideration of action as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak against the motion to reconsider.

"House Bill 602 is a very good and important bill, for the institutions of the Senate and the Judiciary. We did the right thing in passing it and would be making a big mistake if we were to reconsider the action taken.

"The importance of this bill has to do with two elements in particular. One addresses a situation that has developed over the years. District court judges, usually four, sit more or less permanently as circuit judges. They are replaced at the district court level by per diem judges. The consequences of this are and have been detrimental to the constitutional process of judicial selection. I'm not the first chairman of the Judiciary Committee to notice this. I recall Senator Hee, when he was chairman, bringing this to our attention.

"This situation must be understood in terms of the judicial selection process. When per diem judges are selected, the Judicial Selection Commission does not submit a list of names. The chief justice of the Supreme Court, acting on unilateral discretion, chooses individuals to be per diem judges. They serve at the district court level and replace district court judges who serve at the circuit court level. The problem is compounded because we have district court judges, serving at the circuit court level, who were not appointed by the governor and were not advised and consented to by the Senate. This fundamentally is in contravention of the way that the selection of judges is structured in our Constitution. It undercuts the role of the Senate, as well as the role of the governor.

"In short, the process of moving the per diem judges in at the bottom and pushing everybody up results in a great deal of discretion being given to the chief justice and diminishes the roles of the Senate, the Judicial Selection Commission and the governor in the process of selecting judges.

"This bill attempts to address that situation in a manner that is not too aggressive. It merely asks the chief justice to submit a plan to us next year, at the beginning of our budget cycle, on how we can reduce the use of per diem judges to a minimum. I do believe that there will always be a need for some per diem judges. It's just that it's gotten out of hand. If this is accomplished in the next budget cycle, it will free up money that is currently being used for per diem judges to fund some of the circuit court positions which are authorized in this bill.

"The process of pushing the per diem judges in at the bottom will be reversed. We'll be adding circuit court judges, who will go through the appropriate Judicial Selection Commission process, the gubernatorial appointment process, and have the advise and consent by the Senate. In doing so, the circuit court judges will be properly appointed; the district court judges will stay in the district court, and we won't need to utilize per diem judges to the extent that we currently do.

"In anticipation of this taking place, the bill provides authority for an additional number of circuit court judges. When you look at that section of the bill, Section 3, it looks like a dramatic increase in the number of circuit court judges. The reason for that is that we already have, earlier this year, provided for the 18th judge in a separate bill which the governor has signed. This year's judiciary budget, I believe, provides for the 19th and perhaps the 20th judge. The removal of the per diem money in the next budget cycle should fund at least the 21st through the 23rd judge. So while it looks like we have greatly increased the number of judges at the circuit court level, it really isn't as dramatic as it appears.

"The thrust of this bill is to restructure the system so that we play our proper role, the governor plays his proper role, and that the citizens of the state get the judicial system which our Constitution provides for.

"The only other element of this bill which may have created even the slightest controversy is with the provision which provides that jury trial for drunk-driving cases can be heard at the district court level, as well as the circuit court level. There's been a great deal of discussion about DUI cases in the Senate. I have advocated that we not have jury trials for drunk-driving cases. I have not pursued that position in this bill. It does not reflect any desire to do away from jury trials for drunk-driving cases. Quite the contrary, it explicitly provides for jury trials at the district court level. It simply gives the flexibility to the judiciary to have these trials at either level.

It is unfortunate that we don't have enough money to fund our judicial system at a level that allows us to have trials set expeditiously. I recognize that the needs for housing and the needs for education preclude our doing that this year. I think, however, we have to recognize that when we have a system that does not set cases expeditiously, problems are compounded. In most litigation situations, somebody has an incentive to delay. Somebody doesn't want the day of reckoning to arrive. If we build delay into the system, the ability of the parties to settle the cases is impaired. Settlements have a tendency to occur on the eve of trial, for the same reasons of human nature that causes us to be here today. It's not much different in the litigation process. So, as a much different in the litigation process. consequence of our underfunding the judiciary because we need to prioritize, we have increased incentives for parties to delay the process of settlement. This results in further clogging the trial calendars. This bill doesn't resolve the problem, but it is hoped that it will help to prevent it from becoming a lot worse.

"I urge the members to support the need for a relatively efficient judicial system which reflects the Constitution and which reflects our role in advising and consenting to judicial appointments at the circuit court level and the governor's role in making those appointments, and the role of the Judicial Selection Commission. We should not reconsider the action taken on this bill. It is a good bill.

"Thank you."

Senator Cobb then rose on a point of information as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of information.

"In view of the preceding remarks by the Judiciary chairman I would like to hear the reasons for or why this bill is being reconsidered in its action."

Senator Yamasaki, in support of the reconsideration of action taken, stated:

"Mr. President, speaking in favor of the reconsideration of the bill.

"Mr. President, I think that the number of new judges that are requested in this bill, 8 circuit court judges and one in the appellate court, amounts to approximately \$1.5 million or more for the next session of the Legislature, and I think it's premature for us to authorize the positions now when we are in a serious economic situation. I think that we ought to have the judiciary come before us and request for the additional positions next session so that we can seriously consider their request and tell us how they plan to place the new judges in the circuit court of the State of Hawaii.

"I think that we are jumping the gun right now in trying to establish positions when we don't have the full program before us and how the judiciary is going to accommodate this request that individual proponents are pushing for. I think that this is really premature. I think that we ought to give serious consideration during the next session."

Senator Fernandes Salling, speaking in support of the reconsideration of action taken, stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the previous speaker.

"But, first of all, I would like to say thank you to Senator Blair for his reconsideration of the jury trial issue and that I agree that he did take care of that matter in this bill by providing that it be handled in the district court or the circuit court.

"But speaking in support of the previous speaker, the issue really here is one to do with money. As I understand the original request from the judiciary was for two positions, two circuit court positions I believe, and one intermediate appellate court position, and so what we have before us now is a bill requesting 7 circuit court positions and one intermediate appellate court position, which would require additional facilities, additional staffing, bailiffs, all sorts of other things that come along with circuit court judges. Thank you."

Senator Blair then responded:

"Mr. President, I would like to clarify a couple of points.

"The reason the chief justice does not request the additional positions is because he's happy the way things are. He gets to appoint, without the Judicial Selection Commission limiting his discretion, the per diem judges. He's not among those whose constitutional role has been undercut by this process. We are. If we wait for him to take care of the situation that increase the discretion of the chief justice, we may have a very long wait. It will be a very unsatisfying wait for those who appreciate the role of the Senate in the advise and consent process. I hope that we will not wait for the chief justice to correct the situation; because, if that's the case, we may have to continue the excessive funding of per diem judges, in lieu of filling our own role as the Constitution mandates it, for a long time.

"With respect to the issue of whether there will be facilities for these judges, I repeat what I stated previously. We're not talking about new judges to the extent that's been suggested. The new judge positions are actually in the current per diem budget, for the most part. What we're talking about here is replacing per diem judges. Per diem judges don't hold their judicial sessions on the street corners. They use court rooms. When we replace those per diem judges with circuit court judges, the space that is being utilized by the per diem judges is freed up. The system, instead of being pushed up from the bottom, will be pushed down from the top so that everything is corrected to the way the Constitution intended it to be. Those perceived problems are not in fact actual problems.

"Again, I urge the members not to reconsider their action. Thank you."

At 4:09 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 4:16 o'clock a.m.

Senator Fernandes Salling again rose to speak in support of the reconsideration of action and stated:

"Mr. President, initially, I think what the Senator was trying to do as he had indicated to us earlier on in the session was to find a way to deal with the backlog created by the supreme coult decision that stated that jury trials would be required for DUI cases and there is a large backlog of cases there. By adding the provision in this bill stating that the district courts now can handle these jury trials and, yet, rather than adding positions to the district court the Senator has added 7 more positions to the circuit court. It's my belief that in order for us to efficiently handle this large backlog in the district court that we're going to have to have the use of some of those per diem judges who do float, and when they float they're using the facilities that are already there, that are provided for those district court judges already in place.

"And, whereas, with respect to providing new positions and new circuit court judges, I just don't see how we can do that without providing those judges a courtroom, a bailiff, a secretary, a clerk, all of the things that the circuit court judges have today in order to deal with the backlog and that is a problem. And to deal with it as the Senator has wanted to in the district court and concurrently in the circuit, but I believe primarily it would be that way in the district court, I once again restate that I think it's necessary for us to either add more positions to the district court and talk about the process of confirmation in that manner, or leave it at status quo and use the per diem district court system as it operates today and let the supreme court know that this is the kind of practice, however, that we will not tolerate in the future and that we must be able to deal with the caseload in both the circuit court level and the district court level in the proper manner, which is not through the use of the per diem judges.

"But I really firmly believe that in order to effectively deal with that huge backlog of DUI cases and to do it in the manner that is being suggested in this bill, we are going to have to use those per diem district court judges, and without having to provide those facilities and spend the kind of money which we don't have immediately because of the floating of these judges. In the alternative, rather than add, as I said earlier, 7 new circuit court judges to perhaps add the two or three or four new district court judges.

"I just felt that that was something that needed to be clarified when I thanked the Senator for agreeing to accept the position of the supreme court with respect to jury trials being required for those who have been charged with driving under the influence."

Senator Matsuura, on clarification, said:

"Mr. President, sometimes you have to have nonlawyers to understand this issue so I'm going to take a stab at this and anytime I say something incorrect that you disagree with maybe you can correct me.

"It appears to me that this legislation will allow at the district court level to do the DUI cases. Right now, it is only at the circuit level. In both the district and circuit courts you do the DUI cases with jury trial. I understand that to be the fact. Is that correct? All right. That's one.

"The second point is in terms of the money. It appears that there is (I'm just going to use some figures here) \$1.5 million in the budget, and that amount of money is presently being used to hire per diem district court judges to do whatever court cases there exist. What the bill does is increase the number of circuit court judges. The reason for doing this is that at least in the circuit court, the judges go through a selection committee procedure and they come to our Senate body for confirmation. Presently, the CJ can appoint the district court judges by himself and himself only. There's no confirmation. It is the same with the per diem judges. He can appoint them as he likes. Is this correct?"

Senator Blair then responded:

"Mr. President, with respect to district court judges, the chief justice does select them but he selects them from a list that is submitted by the Judicial Selection Commission. His discretion is circumscribed with respect to district court judges.

"With respect to per diem judges, the chief justice's discretion is not limited to a list submitted to him by the Judicial Selection Commission.

"I'd also like to clarify something else. I don't want to give the members the impression that the chief justice is against this bill. The chief justice recognizes that we're not doing things the way the Constitution says we ought to do them. I don't speak for him -- but he is as concerned about the Constitution as anyone else in this state. He has dealt with judicial appointments in this fashion because of the exigencies of the circumstances. We have allowed the situation to come about, so I don't want to cast the chief justice as a Machiavellian figure who is taking advantage of a system of his own creation. He is trying to accommodate the demands for trials as best he can. In the course of doing so, serendipitously, he has come to have more of a role than was envisioned by the drafters of the Constitution. His enhanced role may take away some of the incentive to change things. But I don't mean to portray him as being against this bill or in favor of the status quo. I think that would be an injustice to him

"One other point of clarification. The suggestion was made that we ought to be putting these positions at the district court level. We accomplished that. You will recall that I described how per diems go in at the bottom. They push the district court judges up to the circuit court level. By the new judges in at the circuit court level, we can return the four district court judges, who are now serving as acting circuit court judges, to the district court. By filling the slots at the circuit court level, we are moving four district court judges back where they constitutionally belong. It's true we are creating additional circuit court judges, but there's plenty of work for them to do. They're just doing the circuit court judges. So this bill is not loading the wrong level of the system. We're loading the correct end of the system. In doing so, we're re-balancing the system. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura then continued:

"I just have one question for the chairman of Judiciary.

"When it comes to the money part, are we going to be committed for more money next year?"

Senator Blair answered:

"Mr. President, it's very complex in the sense that there are efficiencies that are attendant to having full time judges that you don't have with per diem judges. On the other hand there are efficiencies in terms of the pay associated with the per diem judges and some of the flexibilities. So it's difficult to say how the cost will offset each other. I cannot tell you exactly that we will save money or that it will cost us money but the difference will be marginal. That's my impression.

"In any event, the way this bill is structured, that decision will be made next year when the report comes back from the chief justice. It will point all of these considerations and decision will be made in the course of the next biennial budget, not by the Judiciary Committee but by the Ways and Means Committee, with full authority and discretion to do what the fiscal situation at that time requires or allows. "I hope things will be less bleak but I can't count on it. I certainly don't want to set up a system that presumes a surplus."

Senator Tungpalan then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"Before this session closes, I would like to express my hope that the work that we have done in preserving our cultural sites will continue. I think it's vitally important that the interim period be used to strengthen the Legislature's capacity to deal with these major issues. I have come to realize that we need more time to pay attention to how we contract for the services of private organizations, how we monitor their fulfillment of their contract obligations, how accountable they are in carrying out the people's business and more. During this session we have deliberated seriously about the state contracts. This will continue to be the case in the area of historic preservation.

"I am announcing at this time that the Senate Committee on Culture, Arts and Historic Preservation will undertake some interim work focusing first on contracts that the state has struck with the Bishop Museum, especially with respect to their H-3 archaeological survey.

"I realize now that the controversies that we have been faced with this session are related in part to problems of contract administration. And I have requested that certain materials be furnished concerning these contracts and am in the process of researching the applicability of federal laws in this area. Whatever the case, I would like to say that as a policy matter these materials should be made available as public funds are involved.

"Thank you, Mr. President, for allowing me this opportunity for a point of personal privilege."

At this time, the President delivered the following closing remarks:

"Members of the Senate,

"Our work is done. The hour is late.

"This 1992 Legislative Session is drawing rapidly to a close.

"The session has not been an easy one. In the face of declining state revenues, we had to make some drastic cuts in the budget. Tough choices were taken, tough decisions were made. Many worthwhile programs had to be cut back. However, we were able to provide some \$16

million in supplemental funding for education, which was one of our top priority concerns this year.

"Despite some problems, I think the record of this Legislative Session is one of solid accomplishments.

"We've passed no-fault car insurance reform which will hopefully reduce insurance premium costs for our people.

"We've moved forward with legislation on educational reform and governance. The Legislature is committed to improving public education in Hawaii and this is a major step in that direction.

"We've banned assault handguns, for which I am personally very gratified. Again I must thank the chair of the Judiciary Committee for a job well done.

"We've passed a good package of housing bills, with particular emphasis on meeting Hawaii's need for affordable rental housing.

"We've passed legislation to address the fuel oil crisis on the neighbor islands by setting up a mechanism for them to use environmentally safer fuels. On a personal note, I think this crisis underscores the need for us to develop indigenous energy sources - such as geothermal as well as the need to develop the means to transmit that energy between the islands.

"I could go on about our accomplishments but, at this late hour, I'm sure you don't want to hear me talk.

"Senators, I just want to say thank you. Believe it or not, I've enjoyed working with you during the course of this session. As always, you are a big part of my life. I feel a lot of aloha for all of you. For those of you who are running for re-election, my very best wishes for your success. You have all tried to serve your constituents conscientiously and to the best of your ability. They will be well served to return you back here next year.

"When that time arrives, I'll look forward to seeing you again from the vantage point of this podium . . . not!

"Senators, all kidding aside, good night. Go home. Rest up. Drive safely. Aloha."

Senator George, Minority Leader, then responded as follows:

"On Opening Day -- in the grand building up the street -- I remarked about growing public discontent with government, and with those of us who are part of the system.

"I mentioned the new breeze that's ruffling constituent feathers all across the country, not just in our own back yard.

"It's been three and a half months since that opening ceremony, and my mail and my phone calls and my faxes tell me that there hasn't been any big increase in the number of happy campers out there.

"And the media and the surveys show that it's still a national sentiment. Politicians are just plain not going to win many popularity contests this year.

"It's too early to grade this session -- many of us will get our report cards in November. But it may be useful to remind ourselves that much of what we did this session was in response to intense pressure from the public. What happened with education is perhaps the best example. "Perhaps the only reason we didn't respond to the current 70% negative rating on Honolulu transit is that the ball is now in the city's court, and it's up to them to decide whether or not to proceed with the project.

"It's also interesting to note that we gave the budget much closer scrutiny, not just because people were watching, but because we had a lot less to spend. We should remember that careful oversight is our job -- no matter who is watching or how much money there is.

"All things considered, there are signs that incumbency may be turning from a solid advantage to a precarious liability.

"We don't need to quote Lincoln to be reminded that government belongs to the people.

"It's theirs, and if we don't meet their standards, they're going to want it back.

"Aloha. May we all fare well."

Senator Matsuura then rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, many of the people are wondering whether you and Senator Yamasaki will be coming back. But let me just make one point. I think that in the history of Hawaii if there ever was a need for a leader in the Senate, this coming session is the year, and I hate to say this, but your service is needed so you cannot retire! Senator Yamasaki has served 35 years. I don't know how he survived this long. I'm already tired after 12 years. I've seen him work and, I'm telling you, I'm very impressed. I'll come and campaign for both of you. We hope that both of you would at least consider taking out nomination papers because, I am telling you, Senator Dickie Wong, the state and the people of Hawaii need that leadership now and that goes for Senator Yamasaki. I say that from the bottom of my heart. I know the rest of the Senators here all agree with me because nobody wants to be president."

The Chair responded:

"The foregoing was a paid political announcement."

At the same time, the proposed standard for admissibility of these statements -- whether 'the general purposes of the rules of evidence and the interests of justice will be served' -- is so vague that it will be very difficult for our judges to consistently and fairly apply it, especially since the legislative history does not explain what this standard is intended to mean.

The purposes of Senate Bill No. 2229 are to permit evidence of prior bad acts committed by the same defendant against the same victim in prosecutions of certain offenses against the person and certain domestic violence offenses, to require notice of intent to use this type of evidence, to neutralize gender terms in Rule 404, Hawaii Rules of Evidence, and to require the Revisor of Statutes to compile commentary to the proposed amendments.

While it appears that there is a need to clarify the circumstances in which evidence of prior acts of violence by an accused against the same victim should be admitted at trial of an assault or domestic violence offense, this bill may cause more evidence to be excluded than is currently being admitted. First, there is a conflict within the bill which makes it unclear whether the prior act must have been committed within a specified period of time prior to the charged offense or not.

Second, if there is a time limit, some evidence which is currently admissible will be rendered inadmissible even if the prior act was committed just one day outside of the time limit. While the age of a prior act is one factor to consider in assessing its admissibility, it simply can not be said that evidence which is admissible one day is absolutely inadmissible the next.

Third, the bill requires the proponent of prior act evidence to notify the opposing party of the proponent's intent to offer the evidence. While this appears only fair, it likely will apply only where the evidence is offered against the accused. If the accused intends to offer evidence of prior acts against the victim, it appears that the accused will be able to do so under a portion of the bill which does not require prior notification. Applying the notice requirement unevenly will disturb the delicate balance between the rights of victims and those of the accused.

The purposes of Senate Bill No. 3145 are to amend section 134-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to limit the circumstances in which a person may be charged with the possession, use, or threatened use of a firearm in the commission of a felony, to resentence defendants already convicted under section 134-6(a) to conform their sentences with the provisions of this bill, and to require offenders against whom charges are now pending under section 134-6(a) be sentenced pursuant to the provisions of this bill if they are later convicted.

The amendments proposed by this bill are intended to address an unforeseen consequence of the amendments made to section 134-6 by Act 195, Session Laws of Hawaii 1990. Act 195 established a class A felony for the possession, use, or threatened use of a firearm in the commission of a felony. Creation of this offense was intended to recognize and deter the heightened danger presented when a firearm is involved in the commission of a felony such as burglary.

However, it was not intended to permit charging of a separate felony for use of a firearm where the underlying felony involves a firearm and is classified as a felony for that reason alone. Otherwise, the involvement of a single firearm would, in effect, be counted twice: once in the definition of the underlying felony and a second time in defining the separate felony.

Unfortunately, Senate Bill No. 3145 goes too far in its attempt to solve this problem, because it is overbroad. It will exclude as underlying felonies even those which are classified as felonies regardless of the involvement of a firearm. For example, if a public servant such as a teacher is threatened, a class C felony offense is committed. If the teacher is threatened with a firearm, this conduct should separately be sanctioned as a class A felony. However, this bill would make that impossible.

Senate Bill No. 3145 also requires that its provisions be applied retroactively, a requirement that raises constitutional and legal difficulties. The retroactivity provision is similar to that which is found in Act 188, Session Laws of Hawaii 1975, by which the courts were given discretion to resentence pre-Penal Code offenses according to the provisions of the Penal Code. Although there are no cases upholding a challenge to Act 188, the Hawaii Supreme Court has indicated that retroactive,

ameliorative legislation may violate the constitutional separation of powers by impinging on the executive power to pardon convicted offenders. This bill is drawn further into doubt by the fact that it mandates resentencing of convicted offenders whereas Act 188 made resentencing discretionary.

Moreover, it will be very difficult for the courts to retroactively apply the provisions of Senate Bill No. 3145. The bill will require defendants to be resentenced or sentenced, as the case may be, to the underlying felony even where it is not clear what that felony is. For example, there may be one or more felonies which could be charged for the underlying conduct, some of which would be excluded by this bill, others which would not. If the underlying felony has not been charged and is not specified in the indictment for the class A felony, it will be impossible for the court to determine how to apply the provisions of Senate Bill No. 3145.

Finally, even if the courts are able to determine that the underlying felony is one which is excluded by the provisions of Senate Bill No. 3145, the mandatory resentencing provisions, combined with the blanket exclusion of certain offenses, will provide undeserved sentence reduction in some cases. For example, a defendant who commits terroristic threatening against a public servant, and is therefore guilty of a class A felony, but also uses a gun, will receive the same sentence as another defendant who is charged with class C felony terroristic threatening only because a gun was involved, even though the former is clearly more culpable than the latter.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 1926, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Civil Rights.'

The bill, laudable in purpose, seeks to establish a private right of action for enforcement, by equitable remedy, of provisions of the State Constitution, and to provide for the award of attorneys' fees to prevailing parties in such suits.

However, under present law, suits for equitable relief to restrain action that is illegal under the State Constitution are already permitted as a matter of state equity practice. A wide variety of other remedies, for example, suits for Administrative procedure Act, chapter 91, Hawaii Revised Statutes, suits before the Civil Rights Commission pursuant to chapter 378, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and suits for damages under chapter 661 (the Hawaii Little Tucker Act), chapter 662 (the State Tort Liability Act), and chapter 673 (the Native Hawaiian Trusts Judicial Relief Act), Hawaii Revised Statutes, and other state laws, as well as the common law, provide a vast array of judicial vehicles for holding state and local officials accountable for their actions under the color of law. Enactment of the provisions of this bill, therefore, while laudable in purpose, is not necessary in light of other available remedies, and, indeed, could prove disruptive of remedial schemes that have been carefully tailored both as to forum and scope.

Another major flaw in this legislation is that, by relying on the language of 42 U.S.C. § 1983, and incorporating the caselaw applicable to that statute, the bill would potentially render state and local officials personally liable for attorneys' fees awarded when they, even in good faith, enforced a state law or a local ordinance that was later found to be unconstitutional.

Third, as presently drafted, the bill raises serious doubts whether it would open the State to suit in the federal courts where immunity from suit otherwise would lie under the Eleventh Amendment. Under present law, state officials cannot be held to account in a federal court upon claims for equitable relief that seek solely to redress violations of state law. This principle of federal jurisdiction exists to preserve the sovereignty of the States, and to prevent federal judges, who have no necessary duty to account to the people of the state in which they sit, from rendering binding decisions on questions of state law. As now written, however, House Bill No. 1926 does not clearly limit the suits it authorizes to the state courts. As such, the bill is flawed.

In addition to the foregoing, this bill poses grave policy problems, apart from questions of legality. While it is clearly wrong when meritorious state constitutional claims cannot be litigated because a citizen cannot obtain access to legal counsel, House Bill No. 1926 adopts a standard for awarding fees that not even the Congress has adopted when authorizing fee-shifting against the United States. To require the taxpayers to pay attorneys' fees in a suit where a state law is struck down as unconstitutional, even when executive branch officials, in good faith, seek to defend an act of the Legislature which in turn was passed in good faith to remedy an important public problem, is, in my judgment, inappropriate. As written, moreover, the bill makes no distinction between a wealthy corporation, which would bring suit regardless of the availability of fee-shifting, and a poor individual, who cannot otherwise gain access to the courts. Indeed, it is not altogether clear that requiring the public to pay over potentially large attorneys' fees will lead to stricter enforcement of civil rights. State judges, being only human, may take into account the fact that their pronouncements on the law may carry with them a hefty attorneys' fee bill for the taxpayer and may be more reluctant to expand the reach of the State Constitution than if, as at present, each side is required to bear its own attorneys' fees. Finally, while fee-shifting in cases arising under the Hawaii Constitution's analogues to the federal Bill of Rights may be appropriate, the bill would make suits under any of the extensive, and often detailed, provisions of the Hawaii Constitution, eligible for fees. Little study has been made of the potential effect of feeshifting in these latter sorts of cases, and, in light of the potentially large effects this bill portends for the treasury, the bill is unacceptble in its present form.

The purpose of House Bill No. 3666 is to amend section 601-7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, relating to the disqualification of judges. The bill will disqualify a judge where a reasonable person would find an appearance of impropriety' and will provide for disqualification on the basis of personal bias or prejudice simply by the filing of any party's, or that party's attorney's, affidavit with the clerk of the court stating that the judge before whom the action or proceeding is pending has a personal bias or prejudice against the party or in favor of an opposing party. Additionally, this bill will allow parties or their attorneys in civil actions or proceedings to disqualify a judge by filing an affidavit with the clerk stating that the judge has a personal bias or prejudice against the party's attorney or in favor of an opposing party's attorney. Although this bill will require that both types of affidavits state facts and reasons for the belief that such bias or prejudice exists and that the affidavits be made in good faith, a legislative committee report indicates that it is the Legislature's express intent that no judicial determination be made as to whether the affidavits conform to those standards.

While the text of section 601-7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, has not and does not provide explicitly for any judicial review of the affidavit which is required for the disqualification of a judge, the long-standing practice of the courts in applying section 601-7 has been to require judicial review of the affidavit. Hawaii's appellate courts have, for years, reviewed such determinations by the lower courts.

This amendment to section 601-7 precludes the court from continuing this long-standing and prudential practice, and instead permits parties to litigation or their attorneys to exercise a peremptory challenge of the assigned trial or motions judge. Such a practice will only encourage 'judge shopping' and may present opportunities for serious delay in the calendaring of trials and hearings in the circuit and district courts of the State. These administrative ramifications might be especially serious for the neighbor island courts where only a single judge or a very limited pool of judges is available.

The original purpose of House Bill No. 2312 was laudable in that it was intended to prohibit the defacing of temporary motor vehicle number plates by making any defaced temporary number plates invalid and by imposing a fine up to \$500 for the preparation of an invalid temporary number plate and the operation of a motor vehicle with an expired or invalid temporary number plate.

Unfortunately the bill, as enacted, is extremely vague and unclear and does not appear to further the legislative intent behind the bill.

For example, the statutory scheme established by the bill creates two separate offenses: (1) the preparation of an 'invalid' temporary number plate by a dealer; and (2) the operation of a motor vehicle with an expired or invalid temporary number plate. With regard to the latter offense, the bill places an unwarranted burden on a vehicle operator who, under the bill, is presumed guilty, and is initially subject to a fine for merely operating a motor vehicle with an 'invalid' temporary number plate that a dealer, and not the operator, defaced in violation of the statute. Under the bill, a temporary number plate is 'invalid' only if the 'dealer,' rather than the vehicle owner or operator, includes any unauthorized information on the temporary number plate. However, it is the vehicle owner who must go before the court and effectively prove his innocence before the fine can be 'apportioned' to the dealer, who is the only one who can make the temporary number plate 'invalid,' by including unauthorized information on a temporary number plate. As a result, this proposed statutory scheme clearly punishes the wrong party and fails to place the responsibility for the violation on the only party who can invalidate a temporary number plate, the dealer.

Additionally, the bill may be ineffective because it does not clearly define what constitutes 'information,' and does not proscribe the defacing or the inclusion of advertisements or other wording on the temporary number plates by anyone other than the dealer. Also, because temporary number plates are only 'invalid' if prepared by a 'dealer,' operators could subvert the bill's provisions by simply claiming that they, and not the dealer, defaced the temporary number plate, thereby avoiding the proscription of the statute and avoiding the making of the temporary number plate invalid, thus avoiding the imposition of any fines. Consequently, the bill may not be enforceable and may not prevent the inscribing on the plate of the types of material intended to be prohibited by this bill.

House Bill No. 3642 is not a bill to cover the expenses of the Legislature nor a bill recommended by the Governor to immediate passage, but it was passed on April 29, 1992, prior to the passage on April 30, 1992 of House Bill No. 2454, the supplemental appropriations bill. Meanwhile, the appropriation of state funds for the catastrophic and traumatic emergency response program for the fiscal year 1992-1993 is apparently unwarranted in view of the approximately \$40,000 in state funds currently appropriated for this program for the fiscal years 1991-1992 and 1992-1993 and unexpended by the Department of Health.

However, the funds to hire a master contractor are not in the Department's budget and this bill does not contain any appropriation to do so. In addition, this bill conflicts with the provisions of Senate Bill No. 3371, which designates the Department of Public Safety as the lead agency for the treatment of sex abuse offenders. Senate Bill No. 3371 was also passed during the 1992 regular session and was enacted as Act 164 on June 8, 1992.

This bill also excludes the Department of Human Services from the provisions of chapters 42D, 102, and 103, Hawaii Revised Statutes. Although the problem of domestic violence and sexual assault is important, the problem is not so severe as to exempt the Department of Human Services from the normal bidding process. In addition, the provision in this bill allowing an unsuccessful applicant for a contract to seek resolution of the unsuccessful applicant's disappointment through a private nonprofit mediation organization is inappropriate and is an infringement on the ability of the executive branch to implement programs for which it is responsible.

If the Director of Finance is to loan the proceeds to the Housing Finance and Development Corporation, the Department of Budget and Finance does not presently have a loan program in place to administer these funds.

The purpose of House Bill No. 3851 is to provide assistance to foster parents by:.

- 1. Affording foster parents with the rights, responsibilities, and expectations of state agency volunteers;
- Prohibiting insurance companies from considering a policy holder's foster child differently from the policy holder's natural or adopted child for purposes of determining premium rates on homeowners or

renters insurance and from considering a policy holder's acceptance of the placement of a foster child in the household as a use of the family dwelling for a business purpose;

- 3. Creating a demonstration project to provide respite care to foster parents on Oahu; and
- 4. Creating a program to provide child care for foster patents to enable the parents to attend foster care training or business meetings.

However, the classification of foster parents as 'volunteers' could have a significant adverse financial impact, because as 'volunteers' they would be afforded tort liability coverage and worker's compensation coverage. Usually, state volunteers work a set schedule of hours at state facilities and under the direct supervision of a state employee. In contract, foster parents will perform their services in their own homes, twenty-fours of every day, without direct supervision. Thus, foster parents will have twenty-four-hour tort liability and workers' compensation coverage, unlike other volunteers as well as employees.

In addition, the Legislature failed to appropriate any funds for the respite care demonstration project or the child care program and the Department of Human Services (DHS) has expressed concerns over its ability to fund these programs without any appropriations. Due to the tremendous growth in welfare and medicaid program expenditures, DHS's ability to identify program savings for fiscal year 1992-1993 is severely limited. Furthermore, a recent decision of the Hawaii Supreme court ruled that persons who have blood-related children placed in their homes are entitled to foster care board payments. DHS estimates that an additional \$3,000,000 will be required to continue to provide foster care services to the same number of children. The additional amount of \$3,000,000 is not provided in the supplemental appropriations bill for fiscal year 1992-1993. Consequently, it appears that DHS will be unable to implement the respite care demonstration project or the child care program.

If the owner fails within thirty days of notification to surrender the registration certificate and license plates or to submit proof of no-fault insurance, the county director of finance is obligated to notify the county police department that the vehicle is to be cited and towed and stored at the owner's expense. A vehicle will be considered abandoned if not redeemed by its owner.

This bill imposes recordkeeping and notice requirements on the county directors of finance and also requires county policy departments to target uninsured motor vehicles. However, no appropriation is made for these functions. Section 5 of Article VIII of the State Constitution requires that the State share in the cost of new programs imposed on any political subdivision. Therefore, this bill is in violation of that constitutional requirement.

The purpose of House Bill No. 2683 is to amend Act 293. Session Laws of Hawaii 1991, which established a Department of Environmental Protection (DEP). This bill will change the date by which the Governor must submit the organizational and functional plan for the DEP from thirty days before the 1992 regular session to sixty days before the 1993 regular session; require the Governor to appoint a management team to work on the details of creating the new department so that the DEP will be operational by January 1, 1994; require the Governor to report to the Legislature at least sixty days before the 1993 regular session on the work of the management team; require that a budget request for the new department be included in the next biennial executive budget request; and change the date of repeal of Act 293 from July 1, 1992 to July 1, 1993.

My administration does desire to continue the discussion concerning the DEP to strive for consensus concerning the new department's functions and organization. We prefer that the work of the DEP Task Force created by Act 293 continue.

Unfortunately, the bill in its final form has two major flaws. First, the bill requires extremely detailed administrative transition work before the organization and function of the department have been agreed upon and For example, the bill requires timeestablished. consuming administrative detail work to the extent of reworking position descriptions, developing accounting and fiscal controls, and establishing a personnel record Second, the bill provides no funding to system. accomplish this detailed transition work. In establishing the Department of Public Safety, the Legislature first specified the programs to be included and then appropriated \$400,000 for a transition team by Act 211, Session Laws of Hawaii 1989.

The foregoing problems are intensified by the uncertain future of the new department. The bill provides that the new department will be repealed should the Legislature fail to establish the department's powers and duties in 1993. It is difficult to commit extensive unbudgeted effort to working on the details of a department which not only lacks defined functions or organization but which may also expire in a year.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 2683 without my approval.

The purpose of House Bill No. 3342 is to add a new chapter to the Hawaii Revised Statutes to provide for the management and control of nonpoint sources of water pollution, such as runoff from a field. The bill authorizes the Director of Health to address nonpoint source pollution in a variety of ways, including by making rules, developing plans, and promoting studies. Among other things, the bill authorizes the director to inspect buildings, areas, and records and to conduct tests. The bill imposes civil penalties of up to \$10,000 for each day of violation of rules adopted under the new chapter.

Unfortunately, the bill defines 'nonpoint source pollution' or 'NPSP' incorrectly. Earlier drafts of the bill defined 'nonpoint source pollution' to mean 'water pollution that does not originate from a single identifiable source,' but the bill as passed defines 'nonpoint source pollution' by copying from the federal definition of a 'point source,' which means .'any discernible, confined and discrete conveyance, including but not limited to any pipe, ditch, channel, tunnel, conduit, well, discrete fissure, container, rolling stock, concentrated animal feeding operation, or vessel or other floating craft, from which pollutants are or may be discharged.' The result is that the bill does not authorize the Director of Health to do what the Legislature intended. One specific consequence of the incorrect definition is that the Director of Health will lack the legal authority to spend funds under this chapter for the management and control of actual nonpoint source pollution.

Chapter 342D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, provides adequate authority for much of what the bill covers. Chapter 342D 'water pollution' generally and is not limited to point source water pollution. For example, section 342D-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, defines 'water pollution' very broadly and without regard to whether it originates from a point or nonpoint source. However, the enactment of this bill with its incorrect definition of 'nonpoint source pollution' may result in confusion and may hinder current water pollution law enforcement efforts.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 1526, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Public Utilities.'

This bill is intended to exempt persons providing shares telecommunication services in hotels and hotelcondominium complexes from regulation by the Public Utilities Commission (PUC).

The quality of telecommunications services provided to the visitor industry and the impact such services may have on economic development are important considerations. Due consideration, however, must also be given to the impact of this bill on the quality and cost of local telephone services, the current regulatory environment, as well as the provisions in the bill itself.

Without question, the telecommunications industry has experienced major changes in the last decade. While these changes have brought about new services and benefits, the changes have also been a source of regulatory concern.

The Legislature has recognized the need for this State to garner the benefits of the changes in the telecommunications industry while still allowing the State to maintain a degree of regulatory oversight. This recognization is plainly evidenced by the provisions in section 269-16.9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, enacted in 1990. A key feature of section 269-16.9 is that it empowers the Public Utilities Commission with the discretion to exempt a telecommunications provider or service, in whole or in part, from regulation by the Commission where such an exemption is warranted after consideration of certain specified factors. This bill, however, accords a full regulatory exemption to certain persons without consideration of factors such as the impact of the exemption on the quality and cost of local telephone service, or other policy and regulatory objectives.

Section 269-16.9 also allows the Commission to reassert jurisdiction over exempt providers where such regulatory action is warranted by the circumstances. This bill does not provide such an avenue should future circumstances warrant regulatory action.

At this time, the Commission is in the process of preparing rules to implement section 269-16.9. Moreover, the Commission has opened a docket to investigate the appropriateness of proposed tariffs focusing on the specific persons and services addressed by this bill.

I believe the provisions of section 269-16.9 and the current efforts of the Commission should not be set aside at this time.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 2770, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Contractors.'

The purpose of Senate Bill No. 2770 is to regulate underground storage tank (UST) consultants and contractors. The bill would prohibit any person from performing underground storage tank work unless acting under the direct supervision of a geologist or a licensed engineer or architect who agrees in writing to be accountable for the work. The bill amends chapter 444 (titled, 'Contractors'), Hawaii Revised Statutes, administered by the Contractors License Board of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, but provides for rules to be promulgated by the Department of Health.

The Department of Health lacks the resources and expertise to promulgate rules regulating contractors. In addition, although a geologist or a licensed engineer or architect may oversee and take responsibility for UST work, currently, geologists are not licensed or regulated by the State. There is no evidence that all geologists can be held accountable to supervise and answer for the UST It is also probable that significant problems of work. insurance availability and affordability would be encountered the by responsible professionals. Considerable difficulties would be encountered in implementing and administering this bill.

I share the Legislature's view that further protection is needed for the persons who engage the services of UST contractors and consultants, and for the general public in assuring the soundness of underground storage facilities. However, the provisions of Senate Bill No. 2770 would create unnecessary difficulties and administrative conflicts in attempting to achieve this goal and, particularly with regard to oversight and responsibility by geologists for UST work, the protection may be illusory.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 2770 without my approval.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 2571, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Public Contracts.'

House Bill No. 2571 was enacted to improve and update the State's procurement law. It seeks to establish a fairer, and more equitable procurement law, and to increase efficiencies and accountability by utilizing provisions from the American Bar Association's Model Procurement Code as well as implementing some of the recommendations contained in the study of the State's procurement system which was initiated by my Administration and conducted with express appropriations therefor by Lallatin and Associates.

I welcome and wholeheartedly embrace the objectives of this bill. A comprehensive analysis and revision of our public procurement laws, practices, and procedures are long overdue and must be undertaken. Some of our laws have been with us, virtually unchanged, since their adoption in 1909.

To allow government and ultimately each member of our community to enjoy the benefits that today's marketplace of technologies is capable of providing, our laws must be made more precise so that we will continue to have confidence that 'competition,' the essence of public procurement, will secure not only the lowest price but also the product or service we want and need. To secure the marketplace's confidence in our public procurement practices and procedures, our laws must, as this bill does, provide for an appeal process, a compliance monitoring process, and a system of recordkeeping and documentation that capitalizes on the powerful data management and retrieval processes available to us today. This bill recognizes the need for flexibility to encourage competition and maximize effeciency and economies. I applaud the Legislature for recognizing these needs and acting to obviate or attain them.

To successfully accomplish all of this, however, we must proceed with a complete plan. No matter how wellintended, a short-range approach could be disastrous to the management of government services. It would be a critical mistake to develop a statewide procurement code that was based on anything less than a comprehensive view.

Accordingly, I cannot foresee anything other than gridlock resulting from the requirement that the Attorney General review every procurement, not <u>every contact</u>, of the executive branch of state government for compliance with the public procurement laws, and those of the Legislature, Judiciary, and all of the counties as well, should they make a similar request. I cannot imagine that any time a department or agency needed to obtain a pencil or a paper clip that it must obtain the approval of the Attorney General. This, however, is what the result would be if this bill were to become law.

I have equally strong reservations about the wisdom of imposing criminal sanctions for 'violations' of our procurement laws when the operative standards which our public servants must observe are described as 'does not admit of competition,' 'sole source,' 'not practicable or practicable but not advantageous' and the like. These very terms have had varying definitions over the years and yet this bill would impose a criminal penalty on an honest civil servant who followed a possibly incorrect interpretation. Because of this, we should not be surprised if formerly conscientious public servants suddenly are reluctant to exercise executive initiative and refuse to acquire the products and services that government needs to operate. This would clearly be understandable.

While the bill is a well-intended attempt at modernizing our public procurement laws, it is incomplete, and thus clearly misses the mark. It creates more ambiguities than it resolves. Further, no time is afforded us to develop and promulgate a myriad of administrative rules and dayto-day procedures needed to achieve the efficiencies and economies we seek. It is simply unworkable.

The system we devise must be responsive to the needs of all of our public agencies at both the state and county levels. It will not serve us well if it is merely a reaction to a particular procurement project that fell short of the mark and captured yesterday's headline. We have suffered too long under short-term 'fixes.'

It is also critical that consideration be given to the concerns of all of our state and county agencies and that each of them be allowed to participate in developing the procurement system that they will be responsible for implementing. None of that occurred in the formulation of this bill. Indeed, the counties, which will be affected perhaps even more so than the State, were not involved in any significant way during the legislative process.

Because I believe in the long run a more comprehensive approach will prove to be the wiser tact, I must reject this attempt at improving our public procurement system. However, the fact that this bill will not be enacted does not mean our combined efforts to improve the current system will be equally mired. Efforts are already underway to achieve our mutually held objectives. The Department of Accounting and General Services has developed a new administrative directive which tracks the provisions of section 3 of this bill. With more complete instructions than section 3 provides, the administrative directive describes when a procurement is exempt for purposes that do not admit of competition and when it is not. The different types of services to be procured by this exception are identified.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 271 without my approval.

This bill, laudable in purpose, seeks to encourage the development and application of environmentally sound conservation practices in the use of timber by requiring the publishers of newspapers in Hawaii with a circulation of 25,000 or more per day to utilize newsprint containing a percentage of recycled materials.

As legislation which is addressed solely to one segment of the media, however, this bill raises significant constitutional questions that warrant more careful debate and fact-finding prior to the enactment into law of a measure of this kind.

Given the importance of the constitutional questions underlying the unique treatment accorded to the print media by this bill, a prudent exercise of my constitutional responsibilities warrants a veto of this bill, with the hope that the Legislature, in a future session, will again be able to turn its energies to the subject of this bill. Specifically, I return this bill without my approval so that the Legislature, should it choose to take up this matter in the future, may make specific findings related to the standards set forth in the line of United States Supreme Court cases exemplified by <u>Minneapolis Star & Tribune</u> Co. v. <u>Minnesota Commissioner of Revenue</u>, 460 U.S. 575 (1983).

In particular, it would be helpful for the Legislature to make specific findings concerning any 'special characteristic of the press,' as that term is used in the <u>Minnesota Star</u> case, which, in the Legislature's judgment, could sustain legislation of this type in the face of questions concerning its validity.

In the meantime, it would be my hope that the print media, and all other businesses, make all feasible efforts on a voluntary basis both to use recycled print materials and to facilitate the recycling of materials which they produce.

The purposes of House Bill No. 2391 are to amend chapters 341 and 343, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to require the Director of Environmental Quality Control to review environmental impact statement (EIS) documents to identify issues to agency review and to monitor agency participation in review; to make each EIS address the cumulative impacts of proposed action; to require that environmental assessments (EAs) be performed for proposed uses within special management areas, as defined in section 205A-22, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and for any proposed use that may hurt critical habitats designated under the federal Endangered Species Act of 1973 (Public Law No. 93-205); to provide for dispute resolution regarding EAs; to authorize the Environmental Council to make rules to assist the Office of Environmental Quality Control (OEQC) in developing procedures for written comments on EAs and for dispute resolution, to help OEQC publish a periodic guidebook to explain the EIS process.

While the bill has many worthwhile features and while environmental review is important, the bill creates a significant risk of delaying projects indefinitely. The bill provides that any person who has commented in writing on an EA may appeal an agency determination of whether an EIS is required. This is an extremely dramatic change of existing law and practice and essentially gives standing to virtually every member of the public to challenge and potentially delay any decision made.

Compounding this is the fact that this bill does not specify when the dispute resolution procedure can or should be initiated, and the bill does not state how the use of that procedure relates to the existing section 343-7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, which limits the time within which lawsuits must be brought. My concern is that a person invoking this dispute resolution option might postpone indefinitely a final determination of the adequacy of a given EA because of the absence of time limits regarding the start, execution, and termination of the dispute resolution option. While it is important to properly assess projects, it is also important to come to decisions in a timely manner.

The purposes of House Bill No. 2614 are to identify and evaluate support services that are presently available to domestic violence victims, taking into account the different needs of the people on each of the islands, to identify the gaps in these services, and to make recommendations for the development of a model in each county that will assist victims in obtaining the support services necessary to make the transition from the abusive situation and that will assist victims in dealing with the apprehension and prosecution of their abusers.

While the need of domestic violence victims for services ranging from intake evaluations, referrals to shelters and other transitional programs, and support in making the transition back to a safe and healthy living situation can not be underestimated, this need is already clear from studies already completed and underway.

The Office of State Planning conducted such a study pursuant to Act 361, Session Laws of Hawaii 1989. That study, submitted in 1991 to the Legislature, developed a statewide plan for controlling violent behavior and included a review of existing statutes and proposals for new legislation, programs, and research.

In addition to the study conducted by the Office of State Planning, Act 258, Session Laws of Hawaii 1991, appropriated \$50,000 to the Hawaii Sate Commission on the Status of Women to conduct a study on domestic abuse for the purposes of disseminating information about abuse and the resources available to the victims of abuse, examining the causes of domestic violence and abuse, and recommending solutions to the problem of domestic abuse. The Commission is currently in the process of carrying out the provisions of Act 258.

In light of these studies, it is more than apparent that there is an ongoing need for services to the victims of domestic abuse. Rather than conducting further studies, the limited resources we have available should be channeled to providing these services. This is particularly true in light of the current economic condition of the state which dictates that resources must be allocated carefully to avoid duplication. For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 2614 without my approval.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 3215, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to State Buildings Violating Fire Codes.'

The purposes of this bill are to include state facilities under the jurisdiction of the respective county fire departments and to give the respective county fire departments the authority to inspect state facilities and, when a violation is not corrected within ten days, to impose an administrative fine of up to one hundred dollars each day until the violation is corrected.

Several concerns are raised by this bill. The first is that the State is not wilfully neglecting its duty to correct

fire code violations and should not be dealt with in a punitive manner by the respective county fire departments. Indeed, the State has a record of commitment to working cooperatively with the counties in resolving fire safety problems in state facilities. The imposition of punitive measures against the State will not accelerate the process of correcting fire code violations. All efforts should be directed at improving conditions, not punishment for problems.

Second, the bill raises a question of whether the respective county fire departments will consistently apply each county's fire code standards on a statewide basis during their inspection of state facilities. There are presently four separate county codes involved, and varying degrees of interpretation and enforcement within these codes. The likelihood of differing standards in the various counties is significant, which could result in enormous additional costs and an inability to plan for fire safety on a statewide basis.

Third, this bill ignores the fact that under present law the county fire chiefs are already empowered and indeed mandated to make annual inspections of all schools and prepare a report of any areas where a building is found to be unsafe. See, Section 132-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes. Even with this existing authority, it appears that the county fire departments do not have the capacity to fulfill present responsibilities, and this bill would simply add to this problem without accomplishing the objective of improving fire safety.

Fourth, the bill does not address the notification process associated with a fire safety inspection. For example, in a recent inspection of Honolulu schools, many schools did not receive a copy of the fire inspection report after the inspection, and were unable to correct fire code violations in a timely manner as a result.

Finally, the bill does not address the problem of reasonable time for correcting fire code violations. For example, presently the Department of Accounting and General Services is responsible for repairing and maintaining the Department of Education's schools. The period of time needed for obtaining the Department of Accounting and General Services' approval and for scheduling and performing the work necessary to correct the fire code violation frequently exceeds the time provided in the fire inspection report. Consequently, this bill will subject the State to daily fines of up to one hundred dollars that may amount to large sums of money during a period when severe budgetary constraints are being imposed, and all this will occur without a corresponding improvement in fire safety.

Although this bill is certainly well intended, in light of the sheer magnitude of claims that may result there are serious concerns about the State's and the counties' ability to implement the requirements of this bill. We can expect potentially thousands of claims for small amounts, given the types of situations out of which interest payment claims would arise, e.g., per diem and travel payment adjustments, mileage reimbursements, authorized excess hotel cost reimbursements, and the manner in which these requests are currently processed. No funds have been appropriated to process or pay these interest claims, and state and county accounting systems could quickly become overwhelmed.

In my view, it would be more expeditious and economical to address this concern by including them in the amounts which public employees currently receive for per diem, and travel, mileage, and excess hotel cost reimbursements.

Section 106-23, Hawaii Revised Statutes, established the State Surplus Property Revolving Fund, into which all proceeds from the public sale of surplus state property and handling fees collected from state agencies for the storage or disposal of surplus state property shall be deposited. The legislative committee reports on earlier drafts of the bill indicated the intent to have the proceeds of the sales authorized by this bill deposited in the State Surplus Property Revolving Fund. However, the bill as passed by the Legislature requires that the proceeds of the sales be disposed of pursuant to section 106-22, which requires the deposit of the proceeds to the credit of the general fund or a special fund, not the State Surplus Property Revolving Fund. Consequently, this bill appears to render section 106-23 unnecessary, a result that the Legislature does not seem to have intended.

The Comptroller presently has the power to sell surplus state personal property. It is his intent to bid or auction this property as is intended by this bill.

In such a situation it could be argued that this bill divests HLRB of jurisdiction and that any HLRB decision rendered after the ninety-day period is void.

Clearly, it is no uncommon for the State to use land originally condenmed for a park for a school, and vice versa.

On a practical basis, this bill would place an undue burden upon the State and counties by requiring them to find 'heirs, residual beneficiaries, successors, or assigns' of original landowners if the original landowners have died. Moreover, the original landowners or their successors would be unjustly enriched because this bill requires that the land be sold back at the same price originally paid by the State or counties, regardless of whether the land had appreciated in value.

While the objective of this bill is to be praised, the bill raises numerous concerns. First, no appropriation is made to implement this bill which will take significant funding. Moreover, the financial impact of this bill apparently is understated, particularly in view of a recent Department of Health survey that indicated that nearly twice as many emergency hire employees than were previously estimated would participate in the Health Fund programs. Second, there is no provision in the bill or other appropriation for the increased operational needs and costs of the Health Fund to implement this bill.

Third, the requirement that after July 1, 1993, allemployees must pay in advance the employee's share of insurance premiums would create two payment schemes: continuation of the payment in arrears through payroll deductions for employees hired prior to that date and prepayment for employees hired thereafter. Fourth, there is an internal conflict in the language describing persons included and excluded from eligibility, particularly as affecting teachers. Finally, given these current economic times, it is imprudent to mandate a new program without an appropriation, and this bill inappropriately assumes an appropriation will be made in the next biennium.

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treatment, or a priest unavailable for care critical to the spiritual well-being of his flock.

Moreover, the exemptions from jury service are optional. Those individuals who may claim an exemption, but who desire to serve on a jury, may choose to serve on a jury instead of claiming the exemption if they anticipate that their schedules and responsibilities will be able to accommodate their service on a jury.

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RULES OF THE SENATE

of the

SIXTEENTH LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII

(1991-1992)

The following Rules shall be the Rules of the Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii.

PART I. ORGANIZATION, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

Rule 1. Organization

When the Senate convenes, the President or the Vice-President, in the absence of the President, shall call the Senate to order and appoint a Committee of three whose duty it shall be to immediately examine the credentials of the memberselect of the Senate. If from the Committee report, it shall appear that a majority of the credentials are in order, the Senate shall proceed to organize and shall appoint a Committee of three to wait upon a justice of the Supreme Court, an Intermediate Appellate Court judge or a Circuit Court judge to administer the oath of office required by the Constitution. Such proceedings need not be on the day of convening in the Senate. In the absence of the President or Vice-President the Senate may elect a temporary Presiding Officer by a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

Rule 2. Officers and Employees

(1) The officers of the Senate shall consist of a: President, Vice-President, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and Sergeant-at-Arms, each of whom shall be elected by a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) The President and Vice-President shall hold their respective offices in accordance with Title 3, Hawaii Revised Statutes. Other officers and employees shall hold their respective offices and positions at the pleasure of the Senate, but a majority vote of the members of the Senate shall be required to terminate the office held by any officer of the Senate.

(3) The Senate, by a majority vote, may authorize positions from time to time as may be deemed necessary.

Rule 3. The President

It shall be the duty of the President:

- (1) To open the meetings of the Senate by taking the Chair and calling for the invocation.
- (2) When a quorum is present, to call for the reading of the Journal of the preceding day.

(3) To maintain order in the Senate Chamber and to require proper decorum on the part of the members.

(4) To announce the business before the Senate in the order prescribed by the Rules.

(5) To receive and submit all matters properly brought before the Senate by the members, call for votes upon the same and announce the results.

(6) To receive all communications, present them to the Senate and refer all bills and other matters to the appropriate standing committees.

- (7) To appoint all committees unless otherwise determined by the Senate.
- (8) To authenticate by signature, all acts and doings of the Senate which require authentication.

(9) To make known rules of order when so requested and, subject to an appeal to the Senate, to decide all questions of order.

(10) To issue warrants and when so directed by the Senate, to carry into effect its orders in the arrest of offenders, the summoning of witnesses, or other orders of the Senate.

(11) To decide and announce the result of any vote taken.

(12) To do and perform such other duties as are required by law or by these rules or such as may properly pertain to such office.

(13) To clear the Senate Chamber of all persons, except its members and designated persons if there is a disturbance or disorderly conduct, or on motion duly adopted.

(14) To control and have direction of the rooms, desks, passages, stairways, corridors, balconies, in and about the building set apart for the use of the Senate and all public property of the Senate. The President shall see that all officers of the Senate perform their respective duties, and may assign places to visitors and reporters. The President may admit

stenographers or other reporters, wishing to take down the debates, and assign them such places to effect their object as shall not interfere with the convenience of the Senate.

(15) To establish final dates for action on legislation, including, though not limited to the final date for introducing bills, the dates for the mandatory recess pursuant to Article III, Section 12, of the Constitution, the final date for third reading of Senate Bills, the final date for third reading of House Bills, the final date for approving Conference Committee agreements and drafts of bills, the final date for final reading of the General Appropriations Bill, and the final date for final reading of the Supplemental Appropriations Bill. The President shall coordinate the date for introducing bills and may coordinate with the Speaker of the House to establish the other final dates.

(16) To promulgate an administrative and financial manual of guides, the purpose of which is to establish uniformity in administrative practices and to ensure compliance with Senate Policies.

(17) To mediate and resolve differences between two or more standing committees on the same bill.

Rule 4. The Vice-President

In the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall exercise all the duties and powers of the President.

Rule 5. President Pro Tempore

(1) In case the President and Vice-President shall be absent at the hour to which the Senate had adjourned, the member of the majority party having the longest tenure in the Senate shall preside until a President pro tempore is chosen. If two or more members are equally qualified to preside, the eldest qualified member shall preside.

(2) The President pro tempore shall be invested with all of the powers and shall perform all the duties of the President. Whenever the President pro tempore is required to sign a bill or other instrument, the Clerk shall attach to such bill or other instrument a certificate stating that such President pro tempore was duly elected and is authorized to so sign.

Rule 6. The Clerk

It shall be the duty of the Clerk:

(1) To have charge of all records of the Senate and be responsible for the same. At no time shall the Clerk permit original documents to be withdrawn from the Clerk's keeping unless ordered by the Senate.

(2) To make a concise and complete memorandum of all petitions, motions, resolutions, amendments and other matters brought before the Senate. Such memoranda shall state the nature of the matter and the name of the introducer, and the date and day of the session on which the Senate considered the matter. The memoranda, together with other matters ordered to be placed therein, shall constitute the Journal, a copy of which shall be made available for inspection to any member upon request as soon as practicable. The Journal of each day shall be read the following day, immediately after the invocation. When such Journal is approved by vote of the Senate, it shall be entered by the Clerk in a book entitled "Journal of the Senate. Session of _____" (Giving the Year).

(3) Unless otherwise directed by the Senate, to read all bills, resolutions and other matters (if so required) to the Senate.

(4) To forward at once all letters, messages, communications and other matters to the proper parties.

(5) To immediately deliver to the Chair of the appropriate committee all petitions, resolutions, bills or other matters duly referred to such committee.

(6) To see that all bills and resolutions are properly engrossed and are correct and true as finally acted upon by the Senate.

(7) To draw on the state general fund for expenses of the session as shall be authorized by the Senate and approved by the Leadership Committee on Legislative Management.

(8) To pay all bills and accounts as shall be approved by the Leadership Committee on Legislative Management, or ordered by the Senate, and no others.

(9) To be responsible for the acquisition and distribution of all of the property of the Senate.

(10) To note all questions of order with the decision thereon, collect the same, and append them to the Senate Journal at the close of the session.

(11) To perform all other clerical duties and functions pertaining to the Office of the Clerk and as the Senate from time to time shall direct. The Clerk shall post the order of business in writing in a conspicuous place each day.

Rule 7. Assistant Clerk

The Assistant Clerk shall assist the Clerk in the performance of all duties and attend to such other duties as may be required when so directed by the President. In the absence of the Clerk, the Assistant Clerk shall perform all duties of the Clerk.

Rule 8. Invocation

Each day's sitting of the Senate shall open with an invocation.

Rule 9. Sergeant-at-Arms

It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to attend the Senate on every day of meeting; to maintain order among those present as spectators; to give notice to the Presiding Officer of the attendance of any person with communications or otherwise; to supervise the distribution of incidentals which require distribution among the members; to supervise, subject to the control of the President, the Senate Messengers; to attend upon committees if so requested; to serve all orders to process directed by the President or Senate; to make all required arrests of members or other persons, and to retain the same in custody; to have the charge and responsibility for the postal requirements of the Senate; and generally to execute all of the requirements of the President of the Senate.

Rule 10. Responsibility of Officers and Employees

The employees shall perform such duties as may be assigned by the President or prescribed by the Senate.

All officers and employees of the Senate shall be directly answerable to the President, and shall obey and perform all the President's orders and directions, subject to revision by the Senate. If required by the President, any officer or employee shall give a bond for the faithful performance of duties.

An oath of office shall be administered to each officer.

Rule 11. Pay of Members, Officers and Employees

(1) Each member of the Senate, upon being elected or appointed to office, shall receive as compensation such salary as prescribed pursuant to Article III, Section 9, of the State Constitution.

(2) The officers, except the President and Vice-President, and the employees shall receive compensation as the Senate shall fix.

PART II. COMMITTEES

Rule 12. Committees: Types and Composition

(1) Standing Committees: The membership of each Standing Committee and the respective Chair and Vice-Chair thereof shall be appointed by the President, subject to action by the Senate. The majority and minority parties shall be represented on all Standing Committees on such basis as prescribed by the Senate; provided that such basis be at least that of proportional representation. The nomination of the minority party members to all Standing Committees shall be made by the minority party.

(2) Leadership Committees shall consist of members drawn from the ranks of the Senate leadership.

(3) Special Committees shall consist of not less than three members each, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate and shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the specific matter referred. The Senate may establish investigative committees pursuant to Chapter 21, Hawaii Revised Statutes; such committees shall have such powers and be bound by such conditions as may be provided by law or by these Rules.

(4) Conference Committees shall consist of not less than three members each, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the matter referred.

(5) The Committee of the Whole Senate.

Rule 13. Committee Chair and Vice-Chair

The first person named on the Committee shall be Chair; the second member named shall be Vice-Chair. The Chair shall call meetings and preside.

Rule 14. Committees: Control and Excuse from Membership

Committees shall be under the control of and subject to the orders of the Senate, and shall faithfully carry out such orders. Any member may be excused from serving on any committee at the time of appointment, if already a member of four other committees.

Rule 15. Standing Committees

Standing Committees shall be appointed for each major subject matter area at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as possible, to serve during the Sixteenth Legislature. The major subject matter areas and the Standing Committees therefor shall be as follows:

EDUCATION AND CULTURE

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to promote the intellectual development and cultural enrichment of the community. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (1) <u>Committee on Culture, Arts and Historic Preservation</u>, whose scope shall be those programs relating to culture, arts and historic site development and protection.
- (2) <u>Committee on Education</u>, whose scope shall be those programs relating to lower education, the University of Hawaii and the community college system, continuing education and the public libraries.

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

This major subject area covers those programs which are intended to improve the physical and mental health of the people, and to promote social welfare services. The Standing Committee for this major subject matter area shall be:

(3) Committee on Health and Human Services, whose scope shall be those programs relating to general health, maternal and child care, communicable diseases, dental health, medical and hospital services, mental health, mental retardation and hospitals, financial assistance, promotion of the general well-being of Hawaii's youth and elderly population, vocational rehabilitation and social welfare services.

DEVELOPMENT AND GROWTH

This major subject matter area covers those programs which relate to the economy, including tourism, adequate and affordable housing, and issues relating to the Hawaiian community. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (4) Committee on Science, Technology and Economic Development, whose scope shall be those programs relating to new industry development, capital attraction, financial and technical assistance to business, ocean resources, high technology, telecommunications, and the regulation of public utilities and carriers under the Public Utilities Commission.
- (5) <u>Committee on Tourism and Recreation</u>, whose scope shall be those programs relating to tourism, outdoor recreation, sports and athletics, state parks and beaches, recreational boating and Aloha Stadium.
- (6) <u>Committee on Housing and Hawaiian Affairs</u>, whose scope shall be those programs relating to housing development, leasehold, landlord tenant code, condominium property regime, Hawaiian Homes, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs and issues relating to the Hawaiian community.

PLANNING, NATURAL RESOURCES AND ENVIRONMENT

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to provide for prudent planning and use of land, water, and other valuable natural resources. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (7) Committee on Agriculture and Environmental Protection, whose scope shall be those programs related to agriculture, including aquaculture, fisheries, and mariculture, ocean mining, the water code, as it may relate to agriculture and the environment, environmental control, protection and health, and the development and promotion of Hawaii's relations with the Pacific region.
- (8) Committee on Planning, Land and Water Use Management, whose scope shall be issues relating to state planning, urban renewal, community development, the utilization of land and water resources, zoning and land use, coastal zone management, and land reclamation.
- (9) Committee on Transportation and Intergovernmental Relations, whose scope shall be those programs relating to air, water and surface transportation, relations among the federal, state and county governments, and matters of primary concern to the counties or to particular counties.

JUSTICE, INDIVIDUAL AND PROPERTY RIGHTS, CIVIL LAW

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to safeguard individual and property rights, protect consumers from fraudulent and deceptive practices, and improve the conduct of business affairs. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (10) Committee on Judiciary, whose scope shall be those programs relating to courts, crime prevention and control, criminal code revisions, statutory revision, judicial and legal questions, campaigns and elections, constitutional matters, programs of the Attorney General, Public Defender and of the Judiciary, and individual rights and civil liberties.
- (11) <u>Committee on Consumer Protection and Business Regulation</u>, whose scope shall be those programs relating to business regulation, occupation licensing, consumer protection, financial institutions, and insurance regulation.
- (12) <u>Committee on Employment and Public Institutions</u>, whose scope shall be those programs relating to government efficiency, public records, public purchasing and contracts, public officers and employees, labor, employment opportunities, labor-management relations, collective bargaining, public safety, corrections, military and civil defense.

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to produce the efficient, effective, economical and equitable acquisition and utilization of financial resources. The Standing Committee for this major subject matter area shall be:

(13) <u>Committee on Ways and Means</u>, whose scope shall be those programs relating to overall state financing policies, including taxation and other revenues, cash and debt management, and statewide implementation of planning, programming, budgeting and evaluation, government structure and finance.

Rule 16. Standing Committees: General Responsibility

On the bills referred to it by the President, the committee shall determine objectives, make program recommendations and, where appropriate, make expenditure recommendations. On bills that have been referred by the President to more than one committee, subsequent referral committees shall make no substantive change without prior written notice of such change to the first referral committee and consultation and coordination with that committee, via its chair, prior to the transmittal of the amended bill and committee report to the Clerk of the Senate for floor action. For those bills which require appropriations, the committee shall make expenditure recommendations consistent with the expenditure allocations established for the bills by the Standing Committee on Ways and Means, which shall make the final recommendation to the Senate. The members of the Standing Committee on Ways and Means designated as budget liaisons with the subject matter committee shall consult with the budget liaisons on all budget matters concerning the liaisons' respective subject matter areas.

Rule 17. Committee on Ways and Means: Special Responsibility

It shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means, in considering the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill, to determine for each fiscal year of the biennium the appropriate level of total expenditures and the level of expenditures for program areas. The Committee on Ways and Means member assigned as budget liaison to a Standing Committee shall make program expenditure recommendations after consultation with the Standing Committee chair. The budget liaison will make a good faith effort to coordinate and harmonize the policy and program recommendations of the subject matter committee with the fiscal and budgetary guidelines of the Committee on Ways and Means.

To the extent practicable, the Committee on Ways and Means shall arrange to make available to members of the Senate information regarding the contents of the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill during the 48-hour period prior to the passage of such bills on third and final reading.

In all other bills requiring appropriations, it shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means to inform the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates of the amount and type of financial resources available, and it shall review the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee to determine that the recommendation is consistent with the resources available.

In determining the amount and type of resources available for a bill requiring an appropriation and in reviewing the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee, the Committee on Ways and Means shall invite the recommendation of the chair of the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates. The recommendation shall be submitted through the Standing Committee's designated budget liaison.

Rule 18. Leadership Committees

Leadership Committees shall be appointed at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as possible, to serve during the Sixteenth Legislature. Because Leadership Committees have jurisdiction over issues of organizational and institutional interest to the Senate, their membership shall be drawn from the ranks of the Senate leadership. This will thus assure high-level consideration of these issues. The Leadership Committees of the Senate shall be as follows:

- (1) Leadership Committee on Legislative Management, whose scope shall be the operations of the legislative branch of government, the Rules of the Senate and those programs relating to the establishment and operations of legislative support agencies, such as the Office of the Legislative Auditor, the Ombudsman and the Legislative Reference Bureau. In the event of an electoral contest, it shall investigate and report upon the certificates of election of members.
- (2) Leadership Committee on Executive Appointments, whose scope shall be to review the background, character, experience, and qualifications of nominees for executive and judicial offices submitted by the Governor, and make appropriate recommendations to the Senate.

Rule 19. Leadership Committee on Legislative Management: Special Responsibility

The Leadership Committee on Legislative Management shall:

(1) Make recommendations to the President on the procedures and manner in which the administrative and personnel operations of the Senate should be conducted.

(2) Make recommendations on the expenses to be included in the appropriations bills providing for the expenses of the Legislature and procedures to ensure that the expenses of the Senate are in accordance with the appropriation acts providing therefor.

For administrative purposes, the committee may authorize the chair to perform such duties on its behalf as it may deem appropriate.

Rule 20. Meetings of Committees

Meetings, including decision-making sessions, of Leadership and Standing Committees shall be public provided that meetings in executive session may be allowed in such exceptional circumstances when committee discussion could unfairly damage the reputation of individuals or where there is a legal question concerning a bill. Notice of such meetings and decision-making sessions shall be publicly posted at least 48 hours prior to such meetings provided that the notice may be waived with the approval of the President upon good cause shown.

No committee shall sit during the time when the Senate is actually in session without first securing the approval of the President, except Conference Committees which may sit at any time.

As practicable, committees shall schedule their meetings at times and at places as are convenient for attendance by the general public, and in coordination with other committees of the House or Senate, shall endeavor to hold joint meetings and public hearings on matters of mutual interest.

The meetings of the Conference Committee shall be conducted as agreed upon by the members of the Conference Committee. Conference Committee meetings and decision-making sessions shall be public. Public notice of Conference Committee meetings shall be given to the extent practicable.

Rule 21. Committee Reports

(1) The Leadership and Standing Committees shall report from time to time upon all matters referred to them.

(2) Special Committees shall report upon matters referred to them within the time permitted in the appointment of the Special Committee unless further time is given by vote of the Senate.

(3) A Conference Committee shall not report upon the matter referred unless a majority of the members appointed by the President have concurred in the report.

Rule 22. Committees: Factfinding and Content of Reports

(1) Whenever any matter shall be referred to a committee it shall be the duty of the committee to make diligent inquiry into all of the facts and circumstances connected with the matter. If necessary, witnesses shall be summoned or subpoenaed, and everything shall be done to bring all facts pertaining to the matter before the Senate in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 21 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes. The President may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21, relating to the issuance of subpoenas, and the President, committee chair and other duly delegated members of the Senate may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21 aforesaid, relating to the administering of oaths, and the compelling of witnesses who have been subpoenaed to testify. All committee meetings held on matters referred to it by the Senate shall be open to the public unless otherwise ordered by the Senate or otherwise provided by these Rules.

(2) The report of the committee shall state findings of fact and conclusions based thereon, together with a distinct recommendation as to the disposal of that matter.

(3) A report upon a bill shall state clearly the amendments, if any, proposed. If a substitute bill for one or more referred to the committee shall be reported, such substitute bill shall agree with the subject of the bill or bills returned to the Senate.

(4) Whenever a committee fails to agree, the majority shall report and it shall be the report of the committee. The minority may report or simply write upon the report of the majority the words "I (or we) do not concur," signing the same. The final vote of each member of a committee upon any matter referred to it shall be recorded in the records of the committee.

Rule 23. Committee of the Whole

(1) The Senate from time to time may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole. Whenever any matter shall be referred to such committee upon the adoption of a motion to that effect, the President shall call some member to take the Chair (unless the Senate shall nominate a chair), which being done, the Senate then shall be in committee.

(2) The Clerk of the Senate shall act as Clerk of the Committee of the Whole without extra compensation, and shall make a careful record of the proceedings, which shall be filed as one of the records of the Senate.

(3) The committee, on motion, may rise and ask leave to sit at any future time.

(4) When a bill shall be referred to the Committee of the Whole, the bill shall be first read throughout by the Clerk, and then again read and debated by sections, leaving the preamble to be the last. All amendments, noting the page and line, shall be duly entered by the Clerk on a separate paper, as the same shall be agreed to by the committee, and so reported. When a bill is ordered into Committee of the Whole, such order may dispense with the reading of the whole bill before considering it section by section.

(5) In Committee of the Whole, the rules of procedure in the Senate shall be observed except that any member may speak more than once on the same subject, but no person shall speak a second or further time until others desiring to speak shall have had an opportunity, nor shall the motion for the previous question be allowed. A time limit for debate may be fixed by vote.

PART III. SESSIONS; ATTENDANCE; NOMINATIONS

Rule 24. Meetings

(1) The Senate shall meet for the transaction of public business every day, except Saturdays, Sundays, legal holidays and such other days as the Senate shall designate by motion or resolution duly adopted and entered in the Journal.

(2) The regular hour of meetings of the Senate is established at eleven-thirty o'clock a.m. but the hour of meeting, recess and adjournment for any day may be such as the Senate, by motion, shall decide from time to time.

Rule 25. Attendance

No member shall be absent from the sessions of the Senate unless given leave by the President or unless the member is sick and unable to attend.

Rule 26. Extension of Session

Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to extend any session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

"To the President of the Senate and the

Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the House of Representatives of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawaii, respectfully request an extension of ____ days of the ____ session of ____ of the ____ Legislature of the State of Hawaii."

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation extending the session for the number of days sought in the petition.

Rule 27. Recessed Session

Any session of the Legislature may be recessed by concurrent resolution adopted by a majority of the members to which each house is entitled. Each regular session shall be recessed pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Constitution for not less than five days at some period between the twentieth and fortieth days of the regular session.

Rule 28. Special Sessions

(1) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to call a special session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

"To the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the House of Representatives of the Legislature of the State of Hawaii, respectfully request that a special session of the Legislature of the State of Hawaii be convened at

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation convening the Legislature in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

(2) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled may petition the President of the Senate to call a special session of the Senate for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities established by Article VI, Section 3, of the Constitution. The petition shall read:

"To the President of the Senate

Your petitioners, members of the Senate of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawaii, respectfully request that a special session of the Senate of the State of Hawaii be convened at _____ "

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, the President of the Senate shall issue a proclamation convening the Senate in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

Rule 29. Adjournments

Meetings may be adjourned at any time. Unless otherwise specified in the motion, every adjournment shall be considered as being to the established hour of meeting on the following business day; but no adjournment shall be for more than three days, or sine die, without the consent of the House of Representatives.

Rule 30. Motion to Adjourn

A motion to adjourn is always in order, and shall be decided without debate. One motion to adjourn shall not follow another without intervening business.

A motion to adjourn without naming any time shall always be held as an adjournment to the regular hour of meeting of the next business day.

Rule 31. Quorum

For the transaction of business, a majority of the number of members to which the Senate is entitled shall constitute a quorum, of which quorum a majority vote shall suffice, but the final passage of a bill shall require the vote of the majority of the members of the Senate. A smaller number than a quorum may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members. For the purpose of compelling the attendance of absent members, a majority of the members present, by resolution, may direct the Sergeant-at-Arms to place the members who are absent under arrest and to return them to the Senate. Any warrant pursuant to such a resolution shall be issued in the name of the Senate and shall be signed by the member then presiding. For the purpose of ascertaining whether there is a quorum present, the President shall count the members present.

Rule 32. Executive Session

(1) If the Senate considers it necessary to act confidentially upon any communication from the Governor or upon any nomination or other matter, it may go into executive session.

(2) When any member desires to make known any matter to the Senate which the member deems should be confidential and private, the member shall communicate that desire to the President who shall decide whether the Senate shall go into executive session. The Senate may decide whether the matter communicated shall be kept secret.

Rule 33. Clearing of the Senate

(1) When acting upon confidential business in executive session, the Senate Chambers shall be cleared of all persons except the members of the Senate and such other persons as the presiding officer with the consent of the Senate shall deem necessary.

(2) The members, officers and employees shall keep the secrets of the Senate and any other person whose presence is permitted in executive session shall be sworn to secrecy.

(3) All confidential communications made to the Senate, and remarks, votes and proceedings thereon, shall be kept strictly secret by the members, officers and employees, as well as by such other persons as have been detained or permitted to attend upon the consideration of such matters, until the Senate, by resolution, takes off such seal of secrecy, or unless such matter be later considered in open session.

Rule 34. Nominations; Appointments

(1) When nominations, except those of justices and judges, shall be made by the Governor to the Senate, unless otherwise ordered, they shall be referred to the Leadership Committee on Executive Appointments within 5 legislative days of receipt of such nominations from the Governor. The final question on every nomination shall be "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?" which question shall not be put sooner than twenty-four hours from the time when the nomination is received, nor on the day in which it may be reported by a committee, unless by unanimous consent. Public hearings shall be held for all nominees prior to confirmation.

(2) The fact of a nomination, or its rejection or confirmation, need not be kept secret, but when the Senate or any committee thereof shall deem it necessary for good cause, all remarks, proceedings and votes thereon shall be kept secret.

(3) Consent to the appointment of justices and judges shall be pursuant to Article VI, Section 3, of the State Constitution.

Rule 35. Meeting at Place Other than Capitol

Whenever, for any reason, the Governor shall convene the Senate at any place other than the Capitol, it shall attend together with all of its officers at the time and place ordered.

PART IV. ORDER OF BUSINESS

Rule 36. Order of Business: General

After invocation, roll call and the reading of the Journal, the President shall call for business in the following order:

(1) Messages from the Governor.

- (2) Reports and communications from the state officers.
- (3) Communications, bills, resolutions and other matters from the House of Representatives.
- (4) Concurrent and senate resolutions and introduction of bills.
- (5) Reports of Conference and Joint Committees.
- (6) Reports of Leadership Committee on Legislative Management.
- (7) Reports of Standing Committees.
- (8) Reports of other Leadership Committees.
- (9) Unfinished business, upon which the Senate was engaged at the time of its last adjournment.
- (10) The Order of the Day.
- (11) Petitions, memorials and miscellaneous communications.
- (12) Any miscellaneous business on the President's table.

Rule 37. Order of Business: Special

The Senate, by previous motion, may direct that any matter named shall be made a special order of business and that such special order shall take precedence of all business after the fourth order, or that it shall take any other position lower down on the calendar.

Rule 38. Order of Business: Committee Reports and Gubernatorial Messages

Reports from Conference or Joint Committees, and from the Leadership Committee on Legislative Management, shall be in order at all times after the second order of business, and, upon motion, messages from the Governor or from the House of Representatives may be received at any time. Without unanimous consent, however, such messages or reports shall not be in order for discussion when received, but shall be placed on the calendar as unfinished business.

Rule 39. Order of Business: Order of the Day

After the first seven orders of business (set forth in Rule 36), it shall be in order, pending consideration thereof, to move that the Senate proceed to dispose of the unfinished business or to the Order of the Day. If such motion be decided in the affirmative, such consideration shall immediately be taken up.

Rule 40. Order of Business: Unfinished Business

The unfinished business in which the Senate was engaged at the time of the last adjournment shall have the preference in the Order of the Day. Until the former is disposed of, no motion for any other business shall be received without special leave of the Senate.

Rule 41. Order of Business: Questions on Priority

All questions relating to the priority of business to be acted upon shall be decided without debate.

PART V. BILLS; RESOLUTIONS

Rule 42. Bills: Introduction

Any bill may be introduced on the report of the committee or by any member, except appropriation bills subject to the next paragraph and except short form bills which may only be introduced by the majority party leader or the minority party leader after appropriate consultation with committee chairs and other members of the Senate.

The Executive Budget, Judiciary Budget, Legislative Budget, General Appropriations Bill, Supplemental Appropriations Bill, Office of Hawaiian Affairs Budget, and bills for criminal injuries compensation, for claims against the State and for funding of collective bargaining agreements may be introduced only by the majority party leader or the minority party leader after appropriate consultation with committee chairs and other members of the Senate. Each member may introduce only one bill appropriating money for capital improvements projects in the member's district. The majority party leader and the minority party leader shall develop a policy governing individual member's introduction of bills intended to appropriate money or to authorize the issuance of state bonds.

All bills shall be introduced under the order of resolutions.

Bills which shall carry over from a regular session in an odd-numbered year to the next regular session shall retain the numbers assigned to them. The Clerk shall keep a record of the status of all bills in possession of the Senate at the end of the odd-numbered year session and shall publish the record of the status of all such bills prior to the convening of the next regular session.

Every bill introduced or reported out of any committee, which amends an existing section or subsection of the Hawaii Revised Statutes or Sessions Laws of Hawaii, shall set forth the section or subsection in full, and the matter to be deleted shall be enclosed in brackets and any new matter added to the section or subsection shall be underscored. However, a Supplemental Appropriations Bill need not conform to this rule or an amending bill where the intent and effect of an amending bill can be clearly identified and understood without repeating the entire section or subsection, in which case only the paragraphs, subparagraphs, clauses or items to be amended need be set forth as the President may allow. The President may allow additional exceptions to this rule.

No floor amendment to a bill shall be voted upon unless a copy of such amendment shall have been presented to the Clerk who shall prepare and distribute copies of the amendment to each member of the Senate present.

Rule 43. Bills: Referral to Committee

(1) Upon introduction all bills shall be numbered by the Clerk in numerical sequence, shall bear an identification as a Senate Bill, and shall pass first reading.

(2) Each such bill shall be referred by the President to one or more appropriate Leadership or Standing Committees for consideration.

(3) Each Leadership and Standing Committee shall consider the bills referred to it as expeditiously as may be possible.

(4) Bills introduced in short form.

(a) If a majority of the committee to which a short form bill has been referred determines that such bill should receive the further consideration of the same committee or another committee in the same or in an amended form, it shall report that fact to the Senate, together with its recommendation that either: (1) the bill pass first reading by title and be referred again to the same or another committee for further consideration, or (2) the bill in an amended form pass first reading by title and be referred again to the same or another committee for further consideration.

(b) The form of the committee report, upon reporting such a bill to the Senate recommending its passage on first reading without amendment and for referral again to a committee for further consideration shall be substantially as follows:

Your Committee on _____, to which was referred S.B. No. ______ begs leave to report that your Committee has considered such Bill and recommends that it pass First Reading by title and be referred to the Committee on ______ for further consideration.

(c) The form of the committee report, upon reporting such a bill to the Senate recommending passage on first reading in an amended form and for referral again to a committee for further consideration shall be substantially as follows:

Your Committee on _____, to which was referred S.B. No. _____ entitled ______ begs leave to report that your Committee has considered such Bill and is in accord with the intent and purpose of S.B. No. ____, S.D. 1, and be recommitted to the Committee on for further consideration.

Rule 44. Bills: Required Readings

No bill shall pass the Senate unless it shall have passed three readings in the Senate on separate days. The President shall give notice in each instance whether it be the first, second or third reading.

Rule 45. Bills: First Reading

(1) The first reading of a bill shall be for information. If opposition be made to it, the question shall be: "Shall this bill be rejected?" which question may be debated. But no one shall speak more than once upon such question, except the introducer of the bill, who may close the debate.

(2) If the question to reject be negative, the bill shall go to its second reading without question.

Rule 46. Bills: Second Reading

A bill upon its second reading, may be read by its title only. It then shall be subject to a motion to commit. If it is not referred to a Leadership Committee, Standing Committee, or to a Special Committee, but is ordered to be considered in Committee of the Whole, a day for such consideration shall be determined by the chair of such committee. When the bill shall be reported from committee it shall take its place in the order of business for future consideration.

Rule 47. Bills: Third Reading

(1) No bill shall pass third or final reading in the Senate unless printed copies of the bill in the form to be passed have been made available to the members of the Senate for at least 48 hours. Form to be passed means the form in which a bill is to be (a) passed on third reading in the Senate, (b) concurred to by the Senate after amendments have been made by the House, or (c) passed by the Senate after a Conference Committee has agreed upon it.

(2) A bill on its third or final reading may be read by its title only, and the President then shall ask the Senate: "Shall this bill pass its third reading?" or "Shall this bill pass its final reading?" as the case may be. Upon the final passage of any bill, the Ayes and Noes shall be called. Such passage shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members of the Senate and the Ayes and Noes shall be entered on the Journal.

Rule 48. Bills: Property of Senate

All bills introduced in the Senate shall be deemed the property of the Senate and under its control unless they shall become law, however subject to the right of the House of Representatives to amend or to refuse to agree with the bills.

Any bill pending at the final adjournment of a regular session in an odd-numbered year shall carry over with the same status to the next regular session; provided that if such bill shall have passed third reading in the Senate in an odd-numbered session, it shall pass at least one reading in the Senate in the next regular session upon its return to the Senate from the House.

Rule 49. Bills: Recall from Committee

Twenty days after a bill has been referred to a committee, the same may be recalled from such committee by the affirmative vote of one-third of the members of the Senate.

Rule 50. Matters Tabled

When a bill or resolution or other matter has been laid upon the table, it shall not thereafter be taken from the table and be considered or restored to a place upon the calendar of the Senate without the consent of a majority.

Rule 51. Bills: Amendments

All amendments proposed to any bill shall be in writing, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and shall be sent to the Clerk's desk to be filed with the bill.

Rule 52. Bills: Certification

When a bill is passed it shall be certified by the Clerk who shall note the day of its passage at the bottom of the last page of the bill.

Rule 53. Bills: Received from House of Representatives

Whenever a bill which has finally passed the House of Representatives shall be certified to the Senate for its action, such bill shall be read three times before final passage, in accordance with the provision of the rules for the passage of bills introduced in the Senate.

Rule 54. Bills: Transmittal to House of Representatives

When a bill originating in the Senate shall have passed its third reading, or when a bill originating in the House which has been received from the House shall have been amended, or when a carry-over bill from an odd-numbered year originating in the House passes its third reading in the Senate in an even-numbered year session, such bill or such amended bill shall immediately be certified by the President and Clerk and sent to the House of Representatives for its consideration.

Rule 55. Bills: Correction of Errors

When a bill has passed both the Senate and the House of Representatives and an error in it is discovered prior to its having received the approval of the Governor, the bill may be returned by Concurrent Resolution to the House last considering the bill for proper correction.

Rule 56. Bills: Order of Consideration

(1) The Clerk shall send bills that have passed first reading to be printed immediately. When they have been printed and circulated to the members of the Senate, the President shall refer them to the various committees. When the committees have considered them and reported on them, the committees shall return them to the Clerk, and the Clerk shall place them in the Second Reading File. The Senate shall consider them in the order in which they appear in the Second Reading File.

(2) The Clerk shall arrange bills that have passed second reading in the order of their passage on second reading, regardless of the date of their reference to committee or the date of the committee report on them. The Clerk shall place them on the Third Reading File in the order in which they passed second reading and the Senate shall consider them on third reading in that same order. However, if the third reading of a bill is set for some particular date, that bill shall be removed from the Third Reading File.

Rule 57. Bills: Special Order of Consideration

All bills and other matters set for consideration on particular dates, shall be arranged in the order of the several votes making such assignments. A list shall be made of such special orders, and when the time for consideration arrives, such bills and other matters shall be considered in the order of assignment. If an adjournment shall be had before all of such special orders are disposed of, the remainder shall go over and come under the head of unfinished business on the following day, unless otherwise ordered.

PART VI. RESOLUTIONS; MOTIONS

Rule 58, Resolutions and Motions: Form

All resolutions shall be typewritten, dated and signed by the introducer, otherwise they shall not be considered. The Senate shall not introduce any congratulatory, commemorative or memorial resolution but shall express the sentiment contained in such resolutions by means of a suitable certificate. Motions and amendments may be verbal but shall be reduced to writing if requested by the President, and shall be read from the desk if so ordered.

Rule 59. Motions: Second Required

No motion shall be received and considered by the Senate until the motion shall be seconded.

Rule 60. Motions: Disposition

After a motion is stated or read by the President, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Senate, and shall be disposed of by vote of the Senate; however, it may be withdrawn by the movant at any time before an amendment has been adopted or before the decision on the motion if not amended.

Rule 61. Motions Applicable to Pending Matters

Whenever any bill or resolution or other matter shall be under discussion, the only motions relative thereto shall be:

- (1) To lay upon the table,
- (2) To postpone to a certain time,
- (3) To postpone indefinitely,
- (4) To commit, and
- (5) To amend,

which motions shall have precedence in the order named.

The first two motions shall be decided without debate and shall be put as soon as made.

When any of the motions shall be decided in the negative, they shall not be revived the same day relative to the main question under discussion. If all are negative as aforesaid, the only remaining question shall be as to the adoption of the bill, resolution or other main question.

Rule 62. Matters Postponed Indefinitely

When a question is postponed indefinitely, the question shall not be acted upon again during the session in which it was introduced.

Rule 63. Motion for Previous Question

The object of the motion for the previous question is to cut off debate. It shall always be in order. It shall require a three-fifths vote to carry it.

Whenever the motion shall be carried, the author of the resolution or introducer of the bill under discussion shall be permitted to close the debate, after which the main question, subject to Rule 61, shall be put. The author or introducer may delegate to another such right to close.

Rule 64. Motion for Reconsideration

(1) When a motion has been once made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall not be in order for any member who voted in the minority to move for a reconsideration thereof; but any member who voted with the majority may move to reconsider it on the same or the succeeding day of session, or, with the consent of the Senate, on any subsequent day and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions, except a motion to adjourn.

(2) When a motion for reconsideration has been decided by vote, that vote shall not be reconsidered.

(3) When a bill or resolution or other matter upon which a vote has been taken shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate, and shall have been transmitted to the House of Representatives, a motion to reconsider shall be deemed to include a request to the House to return the same. If not complied with by the House, then the vote on the motion to reconsider shall be set aside. If such motion shall pass, the Clerk shall promptly communicate to the House the request for return of the matter to be reconsidered.

PART VII. PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS

Rule 65. Petitions, Memorials, and Miscellaneous Communications

(1) Any person may petition the Senate. Petitions and other memorials, except as provided in Rule 58, shall be in writing, signed by the petitioners.

(2) All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the Senate or to the President and members shall be presented to the Senate by the Clerk.

(3) A brief statement of the contents of such petitions, memorials or other papers shall be made orally by the Clerk.

(4) Every such petition, memorial or other paper shall be ordered filed or referred to a committee, as of course, by the President, unless such action is objected to by a member at the time such petition, memorial or other paper is presented.

(5) No such petition, memorial or other paper shall be debated on the day it is presented, except with the consent of the Senate.

PART VIII. ORDER; DEBATE; VOTING

Rule 66. Questions of Order

(1) A question of order may be raised at any stage of the proceedings, except during the calling of the roll when the Ayes and Noes are called for. Unless submitted to the Senate, such questions shall be decided without debate by the presiding officer, subject to an appeal to the Senate. Laying such appeal on the table shall be held as sustaining the ruling of the presiding officer.

(2) Any question of order may be submitted to the Senate for its decision.

Rule 67. Debate: General Limitation

No member shall speak more than twice, unless such member be the movant of the matter pending, in which case such member shall not be permitted to speak in reply until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule 68. Voting: Methods

There shall be five methods of ascertaining the decision of the Senate upon any matter.

(1) First, by voice or raising of hands; Second, by rising; Third, by ballot; Fourth, by call of the roll of the members and a record of the Clerk of the vote of each; and Fifth, by unanimous consent.

(2) Whenever the Senate is ready to vote on any question, the President shall rise, and after stating the question, shall request all those in favor of the affirmative of the question to vote "Aye." The President then shall call upon all voting in the negative of the question to vote "No." The President then shall announce the result to the Senate.

(3) If any member shall doubt the result, as announced, the President again shall state the question and call upon the members to vote by rising in their places, and they shall remain standing until counted, and the result again shall be announced.

(4) The method of voting by ballot shall be as customary. The President shall appoint one or more tellers, or direct the Messengers to collect the ballots, which shall be counted by the Clerk, and otherwise prescribed by these rules, on motion, the Senate may vote upon any question by ballot.

(5) Whenever one-fifth of the members present shall request, the Clerk shall call the roll of the members of the Senate. Each member, when called, shall vote in a clear loud voice, "Aye," if voting in the affirmative, or "No," if voting in the negative. The Clerk shall record each vote and such record shall become a part of the Journal of the Senate. The President shall announce the results as above set forth.

(6) With the unanimous consent of the Senate, the President may direct the Clerk to record an "Aye" vote for each member of the Senate. If there is no objection, the Clerk shall so record the vote. If there is objection, the President shall ask for the names of the members voting "No" and order the Clerk to record no votes for them.

Rule 69. Voting: Rights of Members

(1) No member, on any account, shall refrain from voting unless excused by the President. A member may vote "Kanalua" the first time the member's name is called by the Clerk on any vote, but if the member votes "Kanalua" on the next call of the member's name, the member's vote shall be recorded as "Aye."

(2) The President may excuse a member who has a monetary interest in the question, or whose right to a seat in the Senate will be affected by the question, or whose official conduct is involved in the question. If a member thinks there may be a personal interest in the question, the member shall rise and disclose the interest to the President. The President then shall rule whether the member has a conflict of interest. If so, the member shall be excused from voting.

- (3) Whenever the Ayes and Noes are called, no one, without unanimous consent, shall be permitted to explain a vote.
- (4) After the announcement by the President of the result, no one shall be allowed to vote or to change a vote.

PART IX. DECORUM; DISCLOSURES; PUNISHMENT

Rule 70. Punishment of Members

The Senate may punish a member for misconduct, disorderly behavior or neglect of duty by censure, or upon a twothirds vote of all the members of the Senate, by suspension or expulsion of such member.

The President may appoint a Special Committee to investigate, hear and report upon the conduct of any member charged by the Senate for misconduct, disorderly behavior or neglect of duty. Any member so charged by the Senate shall be informed in writing of the specific charge or charges made against the member and have opportunity to present evidence and be heard in the member's own defense. Following its investigation and hearing the Special Committee shall file its report with the President setting forth its findings and recommendations.

In the event the committee recommends censure, suspension or expulsion, the President shall present the report of the committee to the Senate for its consideration and decision. The Senate, by a majority vote, may censure a member or, upon a two-thirds vote of all the members of the Senate, suspend or expel a member.

Rule 71. Decorum: Transgression of Rules

If any member transgresses the rules of the Senate, the President, or any member, may call such member to order, and, when so called to order, immediately shall sit down. The President then shall decide the question of order without debate, subject to an appeal to the Senate.

The President may call for the sense of the Senate on any question of order.

Rule 72. Decorum: Address

When any member is about to speak, such member shall rise from the member's seat and address all remarks to the President. While speaking, the member shall confine all remarks to the question under debate, shall refer to other Senators by title only (e.g., "Senator from the ______ District"; "The Chair of the Committee on _____"; "The Majority Leader,") and not by name and shall avoid personalities.

Rule 73. Decorum: Person Called to Order While Speaking

Whenever any person shall be called to order while speaking, such person shall be deemed to be in possession of the floor when the question of order is decided and may proceed with the matter under discussion.

Rule 74, Decorum: Presence in Senate

No person shall sit at the desk of the President or Clerk, except by permission of the President, nor shall any person, other than a member, officer or permitted employee or person, sit in the main Senate floor area during any of the sessions of the Senate.

Rule 75. Decorum: Conduct in Session

When the President is putting any question or addressing the Senate, no one shall walk out of the room or across the floor. When a member is speaking, no one shall entertain a private discourse, nor shall anyone pass between the member speaking and the Chair.

Rule 76. Decorum: Disorderly Conduct in Session

If, during any session of the Senate, any member should behave in a disorderly manner the President shall order the member to be seated and preserve the peace. If such member then shall persist in disorderly conduct, the President shall order the Sergeant-at-Arms to remove the member from the Senate and the member shall not be permitted to take a seat during the remainder of that day's session, except upon satisfactory pledge given to the Senate for future good behavior.

For the punishment of any person not a member, the provisions of Section 18, Article III, of the Constitution shall govern.

Rule 77. Decorum: Recording of Debate Called to Order

If any Senator is called to order for words spoken in debate, upon the member's demand or on that of any other Senator, the words objected to shall be taken down in writing and noted by the Clerk, and, if required, shall be read for the information of the Senate.

Rule 78. Decorum: Smoking

No member or other officer shall smoke within the Senate Chamber during any of the meetings of the Senate unless authorized by the President.

Rule 79. Decorum: Solicitation Prohibited

An officer or employee of the Senate shall not solicit subscriptions, for any purpose, from any other officer or employee thereof, nor from any Senator. Nor shall any person be permitted to solicit or receive subscriptions of contributions for any purpose on the floor or in the lobby of the Senate or in any Senate office.

Rule 80. Disclosures

Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission of the State of Hawaii, a disclosure of the member's private financial interests, as prescribed by law. Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission any change in such financial interests.

If a legislative matter which affects a member's interests arises before the member has made a disclosure to the Ethics Commission, the member shall disclose orally such interest to the Senate before voting. The member then shall immediately make the written disclosure required by law and the Rules of the Senate.

Any member who has filed a disclosure as required by this Rule need not make a further oral disclosure on the Senate floor of any interest so filed.

Rule 81. Violating Confidence

If any matter covered in Rule 33 or 34 shall be disclosed by any Senator, the Senator shall be liable to censure, or, by a two-thirds vote, to suspension or expulsion from the Senate. If an officer or other person authorized to hear such matter shall disclose the matter, such officer shall be dismissed and such other person shall be liable to punishment for contempt comparable to the punishment provided for by Section 18, Article III, of the Constitution and in the manner as therein prescribed.

PART X. QUESTIONS TO STATE OFFICERS

Rule 82. Questions to State Officers

Any member of the Senate may ask any question of any state officer relating to the officer's respective department reducing such questions to writing, over the member's signature, reading the same before the Senate, and furnishing the officer with a copy of such written question. Any officer questioned shall reply to such question upon the following day, unless the Senate shall grant a definite extension of time for replying.

PART XI. AMENDMENT, SUSPENSION AND INTERPRETATION OF RULES

Rule 83. Amendments; Suspension

(1) No rule of the Senate shall be amended or rescinded nor shall any new rule be adopted, without one day's notice of such change. Any such action shall require a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) Any rule may be suspended for a particular purpose with the unanimous consent of the Senate.

Rule 84. Parliamentary Procedure

Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedures, 1989 edition, where not inconsistent with the Rules and practices of the Senate, shall govern.
