Tuesday, March 22, 1994

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1994, convened at 11:33 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend George Crisp, Wahiawa United Methodist Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Nakasato who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Third Day.

MESSAGES FROM THE GOVERNOR

The following messages from the Governor (Gov. Msg. Nos. 273 to 287) were read by the Clerk and were placed on file:

Gov. Msg. No. 273, informing the Senate that on March 18, 1994, he signed into law House Bill No. 3322 as Act 2, entitled: "MAKING EMERGENCY APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE PAYMENT PROGRAMS."

Gov. Msg. No. 274, dated March 2, 1994, transmitting a report prepared by the Department of Health pursuant to Act 211, SLH 1993, on the Autonomy Pilot Project.

Gov. Msg. No. 284, dated December 15, 1993, submitting a report of approval granted for the expenditure of non-general fund receipts exceeding appropriations to the Department of Public Safety (PSD 420 - Corrections Program Services [CPS], Federal Fund), pursuant to Act 289, Section 157, SLH 1993.

Gov. Msg. No. 285, dated December 13, 1993, submitting a report of approval granted to the Department of Health to delegate and transfer funds to the Department of Accounting and General Services, pursuant to Act 289, Section 126, SLH 1993, to remove ACM from Boys' Kitchen, repaint water reservoirs and the demolition of building no. 1 at Waimano Training School and Hospital.

Gov. Msg. No. 286, dated December 3, 1993, submitting a report of all expenditures as of November 30, 1993 for interest and principal on general obligation bonds and bond underwriter fees, pursuant to Act 289, Section 119, SLH 1993.

Gov. Msg. No. 287, dated December 3, 1993, transmitting a report on the pension accumulation, minimum pension, pensioner's bonus, and social security expenditures of the Employees' Retirement System as of November 30, 1993, pursuant to Act 289, Section 121, SLH 1993.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Senator Levin, for the Committee on Human Services, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2544) recommending that H.B. No. 3157 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

On motion by Senator Chang, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3157, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COMMUNITY-BASED CARE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Senator A. Kobayashi, for the Committee on Executive Appointments, presented a report (Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 2545) recommending that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of CLAUDIO R. SUYAT for Chairperson of the Hawaii Paroling Authority, in accordance with Gov. Msg. No. 162.

In accordance with Senate Rule 36(1), action on Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 2545 and Gov. Msg. No. 162 was deferred until Wednesday, March 23, 1994.

Senators Levin and Ikeda, for the Committee on Human Services and the Committee on Ways and Means, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2546) recommending that H.B. No. 3160, H.D. 2, as amended in S.D. 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Senator Chang, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 3160, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING EMERGENCY APPROPRIATIONS FOR CHILD FOSTER CARE PAYMENTS," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, March 24, 1994.

ADVISE AND CONSENT

MATTER DEFERRED FROM THURSDAY, MARCH 17, 1994

Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 2534 (Gov. Msg. No. 164):

Senator A. Kobayashi moved that Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 2534 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator McCartney and carried.

Senator A. Kobayashi then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nominations to the Board of Directors of the Hawaii Hurricane Relief Fund of the following:

HARRIET AOKI and JAMES STONE, terms to expire June 30, 1995; and

JANIS C. AKUNA, JOSEPH KEIFER and WAYNE J. YAMASAKI, terms to expire June 30, 1997,

seconded by Senator McCartney.

Senator A. Kobayashi then rose to speak in support of the nominees, as follows:

"Mr. President, I'd like to thank the members of this commission for agreeing to serve. They have a tough job ahead of them and I know the public will be watching and hoping that there will be a prompt and inexpensive solution to our problem. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, none. Excused, 2 (Holt, Nakasato).

Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 2541 (Gov. Msg. No. 173):

Senator A. Kobayashi moved that Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 2541 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator McCartney and carried.

Senator A. Kobayashi then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of COLLEEN K. HIRAI for 20th Judge of the Circuit Court of the First Circuit, for a term of ten years, in accordance with the provisions of Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution, seconded by Senator McCartney.

Senator A. Kobayashi rose in support of the nomination and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the nomination of Colleen Hirai.

"The hearing for Colleen Hirai was a rather emotional one. Those who remember 'Shadow' Hirai could feel his presence in the room. It was apparent from the quantity of testimony we received from the legal community that Ms. Hirai is well-liked and respected by all of her peers, even those who have worked in an adversarial position to her.

"One of Colleen's friends of many years sent testimony that I'd like to share with you. This person says: 'Colleen is a warm, thoughtful and generous person. She's a good listener and loyal confidant. She always makes an effort to get together even during her most hectic schedules. She's very focused and devotes her entire energy to fulfill her goal. She is meticulous and rarely overlooks any detail. Her integrity is beyond question. In addition, Colleen treats people decently and, of course, everyone with respect. She also cares about the development of and improvement of the Hawaii Bar and generously devotes what little free time she has to participate in continuing legal education workshops and serving on the Supreme Court Committee of Bar Examiners and its subcommittee. With regard to family life, Colleen is what I call a "prize child" and, likewise, her family, her husband, mother, grandmother, cousins and extended family are very important to her.'

"Because of these many attributes, I urge confirmation. I would like to add that I know 'Shadow' is up there watching today. He was always proud of his only child and we're also very proud of her.

"Thank you."

Senator Reed, rising in support of the nominee, then added:

"Mr. President, Colleen Hirai is a former deputy prosecutor and is a woman. I urge your support."

Senator Matsuura also rose in support and stated:

"Mr. President, I knew 'Shadow' Hirai very well. If what people tell me is true, a person's character and what he or she becomes is molded from birth to about 5 years of age, then I know that 'Shadow' has done a fabulous job in raising a child who now stands before us to be confirmed as a circuit judge. I want to congratulate 'Shadow' for doing such a wonderful job.

"Thank you."

Senator Holt, rising in support of the nominee, also added:

"Mr. President, even though I'm quite a few years younger than you, I had the distinct pleasure of serving with you and Senator Ann Kobayashi, I believe, when 'Shadow' Hirai, Colleen's father, was Clerk of the Senate.

"Speaking in support of the nomination of Colleen, I have known her for a number of years, not quite as well as I knew her dad because her dad was a very, very strong Asahi baseball supporter. I was one of the few non-Japanese, I believe, to play and I was quite fortunate to be on their baseball team. 'Shadow' Hirai was its biggest sponsor, with Angel Maehara, Eddie Hayashi and the group, and we used to go to Japan all the time on an exchange program with the Japanese baseball teams.

"The Asahi legacy carries on with Colleen Hirai, and I believe she will be an excellent nominee and an excellent person for us to confirm and will serve the community well. I urge all my colleagues to vote in support. Thank you."

Senator Fukunaga also rose in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I would like to add my comments in support of this nominee.

"I think it's kind of fitting that the Senate computer system has been named 'SHADOW' in recognition of the former Senate Clerk's most notable talents -- he 'saw all' and he 'knew all.' I'm sure that Colleen will bring many years of distinction to his notable legacy.

"Thank you."

Senator Chang, also rising in support of the nominee, then added:

"Mr. President, I, like Senator Norman Mizuguchi, Senator Ann Kobayashi, Senator Holt and Senator Fukunaga, once served in the Legislature as a staff member. We knew 'Shadow' and recognized him as a devoted public servant. We are now public servants and realize that the commitment and service that we pour into our public lives and duties require the support and the guidance of a spouse. With all due respect to the accolades that have been paid to our dear friend Seichi today, we should acknowledge that the judge who stands before us is the product of a mama as well and, to Mrs. Hirai, I think we all owe a debt of gratitude and recognition. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, none. Excused, 1 (Nakasato).

Senator A. Kobayashi then presented Ms. Colleen Hirai as follows:

"At this time, Mr. President, I introduce to you and members of the Senate Colleen Hirai, our new circuit court judge, her husband, her mother and other family members who are seated in the gallery." (Ms. Hirai and her family rose to be recognized.)

Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 2542 (Gov. Msg. No. 174):

Senator A. Kobayashi moved that Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 2542 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator McCartney and carried.

Senator A. Kobayashi then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of DAN T. KOCHI for 21st Judge of the Circuit Court of the First Circuit, for a term of ten years, in accordance with the provisions of Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution, seconded by Senator McCartney.

Senator A. Kobayashi rose in support of the nominee and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the nominee.

"One of the positive aspects of the Senate's confirmation of judges is the public hearing process at which time the public can testify either for or against the nominee. I feel it is the duty of the committee to treat all testimony equally and with serious consideration.

"Although nearly all the testimony was in support of Dan Kochi, there was a group of attorneys who did raise some concerns, so it was appropriate to defer decision-making until those concerns were addressed. After speaking with the president of that group, the committee found that there was nothing specific and no documentation to deny confirmation.

"The committee unanimously supports confirmation because Dan Kochi has served the people of Hawaii well as a deputy attorney general, deputy director of the Departments of Transportation and Land and Natural Resources, the Office of State Planning and also as a commissioner of the Public Utilities Commission.

"Mr. Kochi has degrees in both engineering and the law. He is a man of principle, integrity and fairness and, with his private practice experience and government experience, he is an excellent choice for the circuit court and I urge confirmation. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura also rose in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I also rise to speak in support of the nomination.

"You're not going to find too many people coming up for judgeship that have an engineering degree besides a law degree. Dan has served in so many capacities that his knowledge would be very broad. One of the things that I expect of him is honesty and using good common sense. I am sure that he qualifies in both aspects. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, none. Excused, 1 (Nakasato).

Senator A. Kobayashi rose to remark:

"Mr. President, unfortunately, Dan Kochi is not present in the gallery. To show his dedication, also, and we know this man is very hardworking, Dan Kochi is delayed in a Public Utilities Commission hearing and is not able to be here today. We offered to defer his confirmation but he said to carry on and that he appreciates the support. Thank you."

Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 2543 (Gov. Msg. No. 175):

Senator A. Kobayashi moved that Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 2543 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator McCartney and carried.

Senator A. Kobayashi then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of GREG K. NAKAMURA for 1st Judge of the Circuit Court of the Third Circuit, for a term of ten years, in accordance with the provisions of Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution, seconded by Senator McCartney.

Senator A. Kobayashi rose in support of the nomination, as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the nominee.

"Retired Judge Shunichi Kimura arrived very early for Judge Nakamura's hearing because he did not want to miss testifying in support of Judge Nakamura. I'd like to read from his testimony.

"Judge Shunichi Kimura says: 'Judge Nakamura's legal work has earned him the deserved reputation of being: (1) A careful and competent legal researcher and writer; (2) A judge with substantial private practice experience and general legal practice; (3) A patient and fair judge with appropriate judicial temperament; and (4) A diligent judge who willingly works long hours. Judge Nakamura is also known for his community contributions. He continues to serve as a mock trial judge, volunteered

on Kauai after Hurricane Iniki and continues to serve as a court annexed arbitrator even after appointment to the bench. He is a former JC and accommodates requests for presentations about the law and court.'

"We received similar testimony from numerous attorneys and from many residents of the Big Island where Judge Nakamura is truly well-loved and respected. I urge confirmation. Thank you."

Senator Solomon also rose in support and said:

"Mr. President, supporting the previous speaker's remarks and in support of the nominee, I would like to have Judge Kimura's remarks incorporated as though they were my own. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura rose in support of the nominee and added:

"Mr. President, Judge Nakamura is one person that has such a great reputation in Hilo. People who grew up with him all swear that this individual has the highest level of integrity and honesty and, talking to him, I know he has great common sense. We are very fortunate in Hilo to have Judge Nakamura as our circuit judge. Thank you very much, Mr. President."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, none. Excused, 1 (Nakasato).

Senator A. Kobayashi then introduced Judge Greg Nakamura, seated in the gallery, together with Mrs. Nakamura and members of his family. (Judge Nakamura and his family rose to be recognized.)

At 11:52 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

Senator Tungpalan then rose on a point of personal privilege, as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to report to you about our proceedings at the Honoka'a Ho'oponopono session.

"On Saturday, March 19, 1994, approximately 50 individuals gathered for a Ho'oponopono session at Kalemela Church in Honoka'a. The session was called to resolve concerns which had mounted since the ka'ais were found missing from the Bishop Museum last month. The traditional nakoa warriors stood guard while Kekuhi Kanakaole Kanahale sang a welcoming chant honoring the Liloa. The Ho'oponopono session followed a pikai cleansing ceremony. Ho'oponopono practitioners Abbie Napiahi, Maile Akimsu, Sonny Kinney, Arthur Holt, assisted by Kahuna Lapa'ao, Butch Richards, conducted the session.

"Everyone shared their heartfelt testimony. The meeting focused on the whereabouts of the ka'ais, and all present felt relieved when it was reported that the ka'ais were safe in Waipio Valley and being cared for by a kahu. A deep spiritual bonding united the gathering and resolved the concerns of all present. It was determined

that an effort be made to carry the feelings of the ohana to the descendants of Liloa who could not be present at this particular session. A meeting for this purpose will be scheduled on Prince Kuhio Day at 12:00 o'clock this Friday at the Aiea Heiau.

"Thank you, Mr. President, for giving me the opportunity to work with the concerned citizens on this matter."
