#### THIRTY-SECOND DAY

#### Friday, March 16, 2018

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2018, convened at 11:35 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chang, English, Harimoto, Kahele, and Tokuda who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-First Day.

At this time, Senator Nishihara welcomed visitors from the YMCA of Honolulu, including president and CEO Michael Broderick and members of his staff, who were seated in the gallery.

Senator Kim recognized and honored Gustav H. Webling Elementary School on the occasion of its fiftieth anniversary, and presented the following remarks:

"Mr. President, education has always been a priority for me, and I attended public schools throughout my life. During my school years, I was encouraged and motivated – as many of you were – by our teachers, our counselors, and our coaches. Therefore, it's a pleasure to recognize the individuals and institutions that have shaped our lives and so many of our island children's lives, and have developed outstanding citizens and contributors to our nation and state. I speak of our public schools and, today, we honor one school that is celebrating 50 years of educating our children, and that school is Gustav H. Webling Elementary School.

"Now, Webling Elementary, for those of you who don't know where that is, sits in Halawa Heights, and began as a twobuilding school on February 26, 1968. If you can, picture 300 students temporarily housed at 'Aiea Elementary School, walking from 'Aiea Elementary to their new school, with the fourth- and fifth-graders walking and the younger children riding the bus. Today, it is a school that houses three classroom buildings, two portables, a cafeteria, an administration building, and a play court. And from 18 faculty and staff, there are now 50 full-time faculty and staff. Our principal, Chad Matsuda, his faculty, and staff look after nearly 500 students in their care. They provide a challenging and meaningful, safe, educational environment for their students with emphasis on academic achievement, leadership skills, character education, and cultural pride. But while much has changed during the past half-century, the commitment of Mr. Matsuda and his faculty and staff has remained undiminished by time, and we honor them today for their service, their dedication, and their professionalism. On the fiftieth anniversary of Gustav H. Webling Elementary School, I invite my colleagues to join me in congratulating principal Chad Matsuda. Up in the gallery is his parent-community network coordinator, Christine Haramura. We thank her for being part of the educational community that provides an enriching environment for the children of Hawai'i, and we look forward to your celebration in the next several months that you'll be having for the fiftieth anniversary."

At 11:40 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

At this time, Senator Shimabukuro announced that the YMCA had invited the legislators to a luncheon in Conference Room 309 from 12:30 p.m. to 1:30 p.m. that afternoon.

Senator Baker announced that the Women's Legislative Caucus would be holding their annual Easter basket donation drive to benefit clients at the Institute for Human Services, The Salvation Army, and the Windward Spouse Abuse Shelter, and encouraged the members to participate.

Senator Baker continued to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Members, this morning, we heard House Bill 2739, which is the medical aid in dying bill, and I want to give a shout-out, not only to the committee members, who sat with me through the entire hearing – and it was actually much shorter than last year's – but to the Clerk's office, all of the staff, and Sergeant-at-Arm's staff for helping us to bring people into the hearing room in an orderly manner. We had a time keeper from Clerk's staff who was very diligent about making sure that the timer was activated for each testifier who spoke for two minutes and then we were able to move on to the next testifier. We really couldn't have had a productive hearing, in my view, if we hadn't had all of the support from our agencies: Sergeant-at-Arms and Clerk's office as well as SMA. So thank you all very much on behalf of the Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health. Mahalo."

Senator Ruderman rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"I'm a few days late in saying this, but on Monday night, we had our second occasional Music Night here at the Capitol, and in addition to thanking everybody who took part in it – including our distinguished senator from Waikīkī – I particularly want to thank the Sergeant-at-Arms office for staying late on several nights and making that all happen. I know you guys worked extra for it; thank you very much. Mahalo to everybody who joined us."

Senator Kidani announced that Education Week would take place the following week, with floor presentations honoring Teachers of the Year, exceptional student science-technology teams, community service-minded students, and the 2018 School Counselor of the Year; as well as other activities to welcome early education advocates, public charter schools, and the annual Friends of the Library of Hawai'i book sale.

The Chair remarked:

"I, too, strongly believe that the cornerstone of a strong democracy is the ability to express a dissenting opinion and being unafraid to do it in a public place. Several years ago, it seemed pervasive throughout the state that it was to come and be as unruly and rude as you could be and try to intimidate others into silence, and so I can't underscore the words of the CPH chair to our staff, to her, and to the members of the committee for the way in which you conducted the hearing. Also, while I know, Chair Baker, you were in the room conducting the hearing, as I walked outside, we had the sheriffs department; while present, they were present in an inoffensive manner as to not heighten anything. I wanted to express my thanks to the sheriffs department as well, for working with our staff and our members to ensure that anyone from the public was able to get here and be unafraid to express their opinion on the bill before the committee today, and commend each of you on a job well done. So, thank you very much to all of you who were involved."
