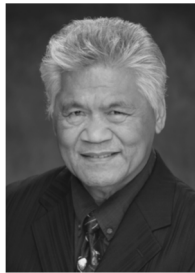

FIRST DAY

Wednesday, January 19, 2022

In accordance with the provisions of Section 10 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, the Senate of the Thirty-First Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2022, was called to order at 10:05 a.m., by the Honorable Ronald D. Kouchi, President of the Senate.

Ms. Tamlyn Kurata, from the Office of Senate President Ronald D. Kouchi, offered a moment of contemplation, after which the members of the Senate rose for the singing of the National Anthem and "Hawai'i Pono'i" by Ms. Malia Kaai-Barrett.

The Chair stated:

"Before we proceed further, I would like to note for the record that the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic qualifies as a 'catastrophic disaster' as defined in Senate Rule 38.5 and there is 'good cause' for authorizing Senate members to continue participating in any meeting of members via virtual attendance as set forth in Senate Rule 38.5 until further notice."

The Roll was then called showing all Senators present, with Senators Chang, Dela Cruz, Ihara, Keith-Agaran, Keohokalole, Rhoads, and Shimabukuro present and participating via videoconference.

The President then addressed the members of the Senate as follows:

"I was disappointed that we were unable to have the gallery full this morning and have friends and family on the floor. I was looking forward to drawing the energy from those in attendance to help inspire the remarks I'm offering today, but I am pleased to report to each and every one of you, the energy that you brought to the floor today was invigorating. I am amazed at how ready you are to do the work that is before us and that you have found the way to seek what are our opportunities and not be stymied by the disaster that has befallen us for the last two years. I am so optimistic about what we are going to achieve together by just seeing how you carried yourself here on the floor before we even started. Now, in the Senate, I view my job as your president to help you achieve your goals, so I'm going to give a few brief remarks at the 30,000-foot level because I don't want to take away from any committee chair going into the details of the hard work that you have been putting in during the interim in preparation for this session, and I look forward in working with you as we continue to share with our state the specificity of your goals, the programs that you've been working on, and how they're going to benefit the lives of the people of Hawai'i.

"The one thing that we all know is true: with all of the problems that we were trying to tackle pre-COVID, COVID has only made them worse. We were trying to deal with mental health issues, and in my district on Kaua'i, we had high per-capita suicide rates. But, in the pandemic, being cooped up, being locked down, not having social interaction and contact, stress of the inability to pay bills and support our families has

only added more stress, and we need to support mental health services, and I know Chair San Buenaventura is working diligently in that area. Senator Baker, over the years, has been a champion in that area. So I look forward in working with you as we continue to address the mental health issue.

"Homelessness, which was a highlighted problem, has only gotten worse and, again, with Senators San Buenaventura and Chang, we'll continue to work in this area. And I'm not going to get into the specifics of going forward, but I do want to say Ohana Zones work. We wound up giving latitude to partner with counties and other private organizations because the homeless situation on each island and each different region called for different solutions, and we did not have a one-fits-all, and so I look forward for us committing resources and funds to continue to address the issue.

"Affordable housing: so many people now want to come to Hawai'i and work remotely. The average cost of a home is a million dollars now, and we need to make sure that our residents have homes that they can afford. We're incredibly concerned, as I talked with Senator Kidani, in retaining teachers; the cost of a home has been one of the major impediments to that retention. Firefighters, police officers: they're making almost \$70,000 a year, and so we need to look at housing in the 100 to 120 percent or 140 of median just to retain our first responders, nurses, and teachers because if they can't buy homes, then they need to compete for million-dollar houses, which are out of their reach, and I look forward to working with Senator Chang in this area.

"When I look straight ahead, a recent birthday boy, Mike Gabbard—you know, there's been many articles; we need to continue to work on the farm-to-school, farm with the hospitals, and farm-to-prisons to support our agricultural industry and have better choices, healthier options on the plates of our students and for those in our hospitals while supporting our agricultural industry.

"Senator Dela Cruz has tremendous ideas about how we're going to work for diversifying our economy. With the broadband money from the federal government, it will create opportunities, and we cannot squander this once-in-a-lifetime chance to improve the connectivity for everybody in the State of Hawai'i, to give equal educational chances for every child here. With Senator Kidani, I'm so confident that we've got a great Education chair, with Senator Kim, the Higher Ed chair.

"While all of those problems are important, while the Senate is concerned in raising the minimum wage, the thing that keeps me up at night is the educational or learning loss that will have a generational impact, potentially, on these young people who will not be able to achieve the goals that they dreamed about because their educational opportunity did not allow them to succeed, and they will see a lost income over their whole working career. And so we need to make sure that we can deliver that education and have college and community college and vocational avenues available for these young people to succeed.

“So, those are the 30,000-foot issues. Those are some of the problems that we’re going to be dealing with. I look forward to working with you to get there. But I also want to be sure that we’re not missing some of what may seem like a small issue but are critically important. I read the article in *Civil Beat*, and they quoted Senator Acasio on the Ma’i Movement and a bill that the Women’s Caucus—or legislation (there’s more than one bill)—in trying to get feminine hygiene products in all of our schools. Since the article appeared yesterday, I’ve received several emails, and some of them have shown me the studies where, of the people surveyed, half of the respondents have missed class because they would not go to school because they did not have the proper feminine hygiene products. And it breaks my heart to read that they’re using leaves, newspaper, and other materials. And if we work so hard to get the devices, and we work so hard to get the connectivity, and we work so hard to train and compensate the teachers fairly, it’s all lost if they’re not going to school. And so this is something that I’m going to work with the Women’s Caucus on; this is something that is important to me. And there was a seventh-grade teacher quoted in the article. She’s a teacher at Chiefess Kamakahelei Middle School, which is less than 10 minutes from my house, and what struck me is the quote, ‘If we have to make a decision between buying food for the family or getting the right products for the teenager, then the food will win.’ And that should not be a choice that our people have to make. We need to ensure that we’re giving them every tool to allow them to succeed.

“So, I look forward, as we begin Day 1 of 60, to work with each and every one of you for the betterment of the people of the State of Hawai’i. Thank you.”

At this time, the President called on Senate Minority Leader Kurt Fevella.

Senator Fevella rose to present the following remarks:

“Thank you, Senate President. I’ll just start off: Governor Ige, Lieutenant Governor Green, Senate President Kouichi, Vice President Kidani, distinguished guests, family and friends, members of the viewing public, on behalf of the entire Senate Minority Caucus, I say a warm aloha and good morning to all of you. I want to thank my Heavenly Father for the many blessings that he has bestowed upon me and my family. I come from the community of ‘Ewa Beach, where I love to surf and I have the great opportunity of being here. I want to say a big mahalo to my constituents of Senate District 19 for giving me the opportunity to serve them. Mahalo for voting for me, representing our awesome community of ‘Ewa Beach.

“I was blessed to be raised in a loving, supportive family thanks to my parents. They worked very hard to provide for me and my family. They instilled the values and principles that I carry with me today. My father, who is still with us, along with my wife, DonnaLee, and my daughter, Abigail, constantly remind me to never forget the working-class families like us. Many of these families live paycheck to paycheck and face ongoing battles to make ends meet. It hurts me to see many families struggling—financially, mentally, psychologically, and emotionally. I can very much relate to their pain, because I see that the pandemic is not one of the biggest challenges that we face this legislative session. As the Senate Minority Leader, my passion is to help advance economy equality for our struggling families.

“I stand ready, as I always have, to reach across the aisle to work with my colleagues to support reasonable living wages, to boost the economy on our hard-working families. The last time we raised the minimum wage was in 2018, which is now \$10.10 per hour. The time has come for change.

“In order to support an increase in the minimum wage, we have to make sure that our hospitality industry is on a good path

to recovery so that we can be strong in our economy. Thanks to my mom, who’s no longer with us, I learned that she valued of her work in the hospitality industry. Going forward. I will continue to be a strong advocate for our number one industry. A lot of people are saying that that’s not our number one industry. Right now, it’s reversed. Agriculture was our number one industry back in the day, and now hospitality is here. If we do not make the industry strong, then it’s hard to get our economy moving forward and try to get our farms and our agriculture up to par.

“As a product of our public school system, and as a parent of a daughter who attends James Campbell High School—go, Sabers—I have firsthand experience in volunteering and working with the schools in my district. So whether it’s a problem at our public schools or at the university system (which you know that I’m passionately trying to beef up University – West O’ahu [go, Westside]), going forward, know that I will strive to make things better for our children.

“With respect to specific legislation, the Senate released priorities for our 2022 session. One of the Senate’s priorities and first areas of focus is to address the affordable housing shortage and providing great access to affordable housing for Native Hawaiians. This is one of my highest priorities. One of the bills that I have introduced will allow local families who are renting an affordable housing unit to save for and live in home of their own.

“And, finally, I’m hoping that, this session, we’ll be able to help law enforcement, use the latest technology to locate and respond to explosions caused by illegal use of fireworks and, of course, firearms.

“In closing, at the end of the day, when I stand and sit in my office, looking out the window, looking over to the statue of Queen Lili’uokalani, it reminds me of why I’m here. She improved the quality of life for our families and our constituents and advocate for what’s right for our people. Because all of what is said and done, the community is, to me: God, Family, Community, and the People of Hawai’i. It is who we represent here.

“When I came here—and this is straight from my heart, not from the book—when I came here, each and every one of you, through the Senate President, Vice President Kidani, Senator Dela Cruz, Senator Kim, constantly guide me, and Senator Breene (God rest his soul) always gave me the opportunity to come to their office, ask questions. I sat down with them and they were always willing to share. If we are going to show anybody in this State that we can work together as one people in this building, reaching across the aisle because I—the Minority, with you—the Majority, it doesn’t make no sense at the end of the day if we can’t and the people suffer.

“Senate President, you moved me today, along with Senator Acasio, because those things really matter. Having families that cannot go to school for education because their children don’t have the proper feminine hygiene is very serious. People don’t realize it. Mental health issues which people don’t take seriously enough. We don’t share it because Hawaiians, growing up, it was taboo to talk about mental illness in the family. I brought this up when we had the rallies, Senator Baker having this discussion in the Health committee. I’ll let you guys know this issue means a lot to me because, when we were growing up, we didn’t know what was wrong with my mom. It took years and years until she found a doctor, only to find out that her menopause was causing her mental illness. So we had to go from there, she had to do the surgery she needed to get on the path of recovery. But because nobody knows about these things, we always thinking that they acting, ‘Oh, they are not depressed, they joking,’ and then they kill themselves. These are

serious things that we need to take very seriously—houselessness, mental illness—going forward.

“Thank you again, Senate President. Thank you, my colleagues. I’m willing to work with you and I look forward to an awesome session. Take care, God bless. Mahalo.”

The Chair made the following comments:

“On behalf of the entire Kaua’i Senate delegation, we wish our best to the entire minority delegation.

“Before moving on, I don’t like writing down what I talk about, and I got a little emotional at the end. And as a good politician, I remembered to talk about the young lady who’s a constituent in my district, and realized I didn’t talk about Nikki-Ann Yee who, with her two sisters, have brought the program to Hawai’i and have been the driving force for the six schools that are piloted here, including Chiefess Kamakahelei on Kaua’i. And I really wanted to acknowledge Nikki because she and her two sisters are all granddaughters of Wadsworth Yee, who served in this very body and sat in this chamber, and I appreciate everything that she and her sisters have done, and I’m sure that their grandfather, if he were here, would be very proud of the accomplishments of his granddaughters.”

At this time, Senator Gabbard extended happy birthday wishes to Senator Rhoads, whose birthday was that day. Senator Gabbard noted that the toffee had been delivered and that he hoped he had not burned that batch.

The Chair extended additional happy birthday wishes to Senator Rhoads, and jokingly commented that he could see why Senator Rhoads had previously made such an effort to recognize Senator Gabbard's belated birthday—so he would not be forgotten today.

The Chair then made the following announcements:

“The five bills per day limit is in effect for the remainder of the bill introduction period, and the deadline to submit bills to the Clerk's office is 5:00 p.m. each day.

“Immediately following our floor session today, the governor will be giving his State of the State address at 10:00 a.m.”

At 9:37 a.m., on motion by Senator DeCoite, seconded by Senator Fevella and carried, the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair to meet in Joint Session with the House of Representatives, in accordance with House Concurrent Resolution No. 2, to receive the Governor's State of the State Address.

JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Thirty-First Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2022, was called to order at 10:01 a.m. by the Honorable Scott K. Saiki, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

The Speaker stated:

“The Senate President and I extend our warmest aloha and welcome to the Governor of the State of Hawai'i, the Honorable David Ige.”

Governor Ige presented the State of the State Address remotely from the Governor's Ceremonial Room as follows:

“Good morning and aloha. Before I begin my formal remarks, I wanted to make a few comments. In normal times we would gather together in the House chambers for the State of the State address. We would have family, friends, former governors, and community leaders, and have opportunities to acknowledge and thank the many people who have helped us along the way. Because of the pandemic, they cannot be here in person, but I wanted to take a moment to express my appreciation for their partnership during this crisis. All of them have answered the call to serve the people of Hawai'i: Speaker Scott Saiki, Chair Sylvia Luke, and all the members of the House; Senate President Ron Kouichi, Chair Donovan Dela Cruz, and all the members of the Senate; First Lady Dawn Amano Ige, Lieutenant Governor Josh Green, Dr. Libby Char, and all the members of my cabinet; and Mayors Rick Blangiardi, Mitch Roth, Mike Victorino, and Derek Kawakami, and former mayors Kirk Caldwell and Harry Kim. I also want to

thank the business community: the visitor industry, including hotels, airlines, and attractions; the Hawai'i Restaurant Association; the Hawaii Business Roundtable, and all the chambers of commerce; and our nonprofit partners who delivered help and services to support so many in need. And there are so many others, too many to name, but I wish I could thank you all. Please know that all of your efforts are very much appreciated by me.

"We've endured tremendous hardship over the last two years. Throughout the pandemic, we've sacrificed, delayed, or canceled so many of life's cherished milestones: weddings and graduations, first birthdays, and holiday gatherings. We've had to face shutdowns, restrictions of all kinds, and two variants that have changed how we deal with the coronavirus. And the fight is far from over, but I'm proud of the way that we, as a community, have responded to the pandemic. Our nurses, doctors, and healthcare professionals have worked endless shifts to provide quality care and keep our families healthy. Our teachers and principals have gone above and beyond to make sure students have the opportunity to learn despite the many challenges. Our public employees on both the county and state levels have worked together to ensure that we keep everyone safe. And you have done what you've had to do to protect all of us: by getting vaccinated and conducting your daily lives responsibly.

"This pandemic is redefining us as a generation in the same way that the Great Depression, Pearl Harbor, and the Vietnam War shaped their generations. Events and history have a way of repeatedly testing us. Each generation must find its own strengths, its own answers, and its own path forward. In many instances, we've had to choose between what is best for ourselves as individuals and what is best for us as a community. As a state, we've never been one to take the easy path. Instead, we choose to do the right things for the right reasons. Last week, we celebrated Martin Luther King Day. He said, 'The time is always right to do what's right.' In Hawai'i, we have a name for this: *pono*, or righteousness—an idea so important that it's imprinted on our state seal. *Ua Mau ke Ea o ka 'Āina i ka Pono*: the life of the land is perpetuated in righteousness.

"We have much to do this session. I have three goals this year: to continue to steer us through the pandemic, to strengthen our families and communities, and to move toward full economic recovery. With your help, I know we can accomplish all three.

"I believe everything begins with keeping us healthy and safe. Over the last seven years, we focused on modernizing our telehealth infrastructure, providing health services to underserved populations, and strengthening mental health services. In response to the pandemic, we moved quickly to take immediate action to protect our health, provide health care for another 110,000 residents under our Medicaid program (a 34 percent increase since the start of the pandemic), and make sure that everyone had good healthcare coverage. At the same time, we distributed critical medical supplies, including PPEs, test kits, vaccines, and medicines, to protect the elderly, rural communities, as well as the entire state. I deeply appreciate the thousands involved in this task, whose scale and complexity rivals anything we've ever done statewide. Vaccinations have proven to be our strongest weapon against the coronavirus; in all, we've provided more than two and a half million shots at hundreds of clinics across the state. Needless to say, this effort remains ongoing, but the virus has been relentless in exposing gaps in our healthcare infrastructure, including critical shortages of doctors and nurses.

"To address these concerns, we're asking the Legislature to fund the expansion of the University of Hawai'i's doctor residency program. In this way, we can increase the number of doctors doing their residency on the neighbor islands from only

five to fifty. More importantly, the numbers tell us that most young doctors end up practicing where they do their residency. We're also asking for funding to strengthen the university's nursing program and add more clinical instructors at our community colleges. We want to add 39 lecturers across multiple campuses to handle the increased demand for nursing programs. In addition, a new \$3.7 million, federally funded project will improve access to health information, especially for underserved communities. The project will train and employ high school and undergraduate students to be health and digital 'navigators' in 50 libraries across the state. These navigators will help individuals access telehealth services and find information on the coronavirus and other health topics.

"COVID outbreaks in Oahu Community Correctional Center made it clear that we also need to strengthen the medical facilities in our prisons to protect the health of our inmates, staff, and the general public. Our plans to relocate OCCC to Halawa will create a modern facility better suited to support the behavioral, mental health, and medical needs of its population. In our current budget request, we've also asked the Legislature for \$45 million to build a consolidated healthcare unit at Halawa that will allow us to deliver medical and health services there. Clearly, the coronavirus has shown us how persistent and adaptive it can be, as we've seen with the Delta and Omicron variants. Even as we learn how to better protect ourselves, we need to remain vigilant.

"While we work to maintain our health, we must also strengthen our families and communities. To do that, we must first help struggling families—to *malama pono*, make things right for them. It means making sure that they can secure the very basics of food, shelter, and jobs. That's why our Department of Human Services developed online applications for SNAP benefits (formerly Food Stamps) and added 32,000 additional families during the pandemic. As many faced job losses, we provided \$6.6 billion in unemployment benefits, allowing those out of work to continue to receive essential income for their families. The pandemic also caused many workers to lose long-held jobs and pursue new career paths. To help them, the Department of Labor is rolling out the Hawai'i Career Acceleration Navigator, with its one-stop, online hub to help unemployed workers with new career and training opportunities.

"The pandemic also highlighted the need for child care for working families and how it is essential for many to continue to hold jobs. To help them, the state's Child Care Program office is distributing nearly \$80 million to support access to child care and provide much-needed relief for young families. These funds will support childcare businesses weathering the challenges of the pandemic and can be used for personnel costs, training, rent, mortgage, utilities and supplies, or equipment related to COVID-19.

"To assist renters and homeowners, we provided \$260 million in emergency rent and mortgage assistance to ensure that no family would be evicted because of the pandemic. Meanwhile, the Hawaiian Homes Commission postponed mortgage payments and provided its beneficiaries with rent and utility assistance. The state is also working closely with the counties to increase the number of affordable rentals on all islands. These projects include rentals in Mō'ili'ili, Downtown, or Chinatown on O'ahu and more than a thousand affordable rental units across the neighbor islands since we took office.

"Two years ago, the Legislature created Ohana Zones. Working with the counties, we've opened 20 sites across all islands that provide a wide range of services for individuals and families. These projects have assisted over 5,500 homeless individuals statewide, with more than 1,300 placed directly into permanent housing. By increasing funding for the homeless by

68 percent since taking office, we've assisted more individuals to not only find temporary shelter but to lift them out of the vicious cycle of homelessness. And our proposed infrastructure development in West O'ahu will allow us to greatly increase our inventory of affordable homes, including those for teachers.

"But the biggest factor affecting home ownership in Hawai'i is supply. That's why we set out to build 10,000 new homes by 2020—and we did it! We also expect to build another 3,000 homes by the end of this year.

"We can strengthen our communities in another way, too. Given the recent revenue projections, we're asking the Legislature to return some of those dollars back to taxpayers. We want to issue refund checks of \$100 for every taxpayer and for each dependent. For a family of four, that means an extra \$400. In this way, we'll also inject \$110 million back into our economy, giving it a boost as well.

"No community can be strong without taking care of their keiki, our future. Empowering our schools and enriching Hawai'i's community of lifelong learners have always been among our top priorities. That's why I've asked legislators to restore funds taken away from our schools during the pandemic for programs so important to our children's learning and for the upkeep of their classrooms. This includes funds to take care of those who teach our students and to support the development of new teachers, especially in areas of chronic shortages such as Hawaiian immersion and special needs. That's also why safely reopening schools was one of our top priorities after the pandemic hit. We knew that children learned best when they are physically in the classroom, but that wasn't possible during the early days of the shutdown. Our schools and teachers had to literally reinvent education overnight. Virtual classrooms became a necessity, but we also learned that they could supplement in-person classes and provide opportunities that would not otherwise be available. That's why we're supporting the expansion of virtual classrooms and the Hawai'i Virtual Learning Network. If a school on Moloka'i can't provide a class on physics, why should a student there be denied the opportunity to learn? We've talked a long time about distance learning, but more as an alternative to the traditional classroom. The pandemic made us realize that we could use virtual classrooms to ensure that every student has every opportunity to learn no matter where they live.

"Using the federal Governors' Emergency Education Relief Fund, we're also empowering schools and teachers to innovate and create projects to recover learning lost due to the pandemic. We dedicated \$5 million for UH to launch Hawai'i Online Portal for Education, which is developing curricula for distance learning and additional training for teachers. The projects include everything from STEM education to agriculture. One of these projects is Ka'ū Dream, a place-based, community-focused education initiative on Hawai'i island. Educators and the community have worked together to align the curriculum to career and business opportunities in Ka'ū. They created enhanced learning activities that will engage and inspire students beyond graduation. This community-led initiative is a model for building thriving communities across the state.

"And it's time to retool our underutilized community resources. For generations, our public libraries, like the one in Pearl City, have been quietly supporting our students and communities. We want to reimagine how we use those facilities. We want Pearl City to be the role model for other libraries across the state, a place where groups can meet and exchange ideas. We want them to house early learning centers as well as gathering places for our kūpuna, and we want to equip them with the latest technologies, where the community can learn, create, and enrich their lives. Reimagine, if you will, Pearl City Library becoming a beehive of activity as a community-based learning center.

"There have been a lot of things we've had to postpone because of the pandemic. One of the most important was our proposal to create a universal preschool system in Hawai'i. We can't leave it there, because research tells us that early learning is crucial in preparing our children for school and life in general. We will continue to nurture our early learners through our community-based centers, but let's work together to take the next step to provide preschools for every child in Hawai'i.

"The real balancing act during the pandemic has been between the economy and our health. The fact is that keeping us safe—and making Hawai'i a safe place to visit—is an essential step to restoring our visitor industry, reviving our small businesses, and re-energizing our economy. We ordered a mandatory quarantine for all transpacific travelers to slow the spread of COVID-19 in Hawai'i, and our Safe Travels program for pre-travel testing and vaccine verification still remains the only program of its kind in the country. At the same time, we worked hard to keep insurance rates down for small businesses even as unemployment ballooned. And as the economy recovers, we'll continue to make sure that our small businesses are brought along with the rising tide through programs that expand our locally produced goods and services, support business innovations, back local manufacturers, and fund low-interest, small business loans.

"With federal funds, the state is also helping small businesses through digital marketing and e-commerce initiatives, assisting more than 500 companies with training and virtual marketing events. Hawai'i also became one of the safest locations to film during the pandemic as our film office worked with producers and unions to create a plan with strict COVID protocols to resume filming here. People all over the world can now watch *NCIS: Hawai'i* as well as *Magnum P.I.*

"We also know that keeping up is not good enough to be competitive; we must stay ahead of the game. That's why we're proposing to fortify the Hawai'i Tourism Authority and the Hawai'i Convention Center, support Hawai'i Small Business Innovation Research projects, and provide fuel for our business accelerator programs and manufacturing assistance grants. We'll also launch a \$56 million State Small Business Credit Initiative to provide capital for local start-up tech companies.

"One of government's primary roles is to provide a strong and reliable infrastructure to support economic growth. Our visitor industry cannot exist without reliable airports. Our stores cannot operate without efficient roads and harbors to transport goods and services. During an economic downturn, public works projects not only build critical infrastructure, but they also provide a shot in the arm to business, labor, and the economy. For the last two years, Hawai'i's construction industry has led the state's economic recovery, thanks in large part to our investment in public infrastructure. Those investments help stabilize the local construction industry and, with a record bond sale of \$1.88 billion, this trend will continue. In addition, an estimated \$2.8 billion from the federal infrastructure law is expected to further boost the development of transportation, clean energy, and our internet capacity.

"And government, too, needs to upgrade and reinvent itself. That is one of the most important tasks we've been doing over the last seven years: modernizing government operations across all agencies; transitioning from antiquated, paper-based systems to computerized ones; modernizing our tax and payroll system; and transforming walk-in services to convenient virtual centers. And we're asking the Legislature to help us make government more efficient by replacing a statewide accounting system that hasn't been updated in the last 50 years. Whether it's filing tax returns or seeking a birth certificate, our goal has centered around creating greater efficiency, a larger return on taxpayer dollars, and better service to the public.

"We cannot be a strong state without protecting the resources upon which we depend; that is also a part of being pono and making things right. At the heart of these resources is our natural environment. In Hawai'i, we're no strangers to the need to protect these islands. There's a reverence for the 'āina that goes beyond issues of sustainability. That's why we've always been so protective of the environment. As an island community, we see the impacts of climate change and global warming more intensely. In 2015, three Category 4 hurricanes approached Hawai'i for the first time in recorded history. In 2018, torrential rain in Hanalei dropped more than 49 inches in 24 hours, setting a new U.S. record. Last year, the worst drought in decades on Maui County drove thousands of invasive axis deer into Kahului. And severe drought on Hawai'i island fueled the Mana Road wildfire, among the largest ever. We know that the climate crisis is real but, by working together, Hawai'i has become a world leader in actions to fight the climate crisis. Hawai'i was the first state to set a goal of 100 percent renewable energy by 2045, with 12 other states now following our lead. Hawai'i was also the first state to commit, by law, to the goals of the Paris Agreement. Still, experiencing first-hand the severe impacts of climate change, we know that net-zero carbon emission is not good enough. That's why Hawai'i became the first state to commit to a net-negative goal by 2045 to capture more carbon than we produce. We'll do that by protecting our oceans, expanding our native forests, and supporting sustainable agriculture.

"Again, my thanks to our legislators for making all of this happen, but we need to continue this good work. We need to retire Hawai'i's last coal plant this year, establish a rebate for working families to buy electric cars, expand the State to Farm program to support local farmers, and move forward with the Royal Kunia Agricultural Park to encourage food self-sufficiency. Creating a more sustainable lifestyle is all part of being good stewards of these islands. So is protecting them from harm.

"The recent events at the Navy's Red Hill facility alarmed and shocked everyone. We've met with Navy leaders and let them know that their first job is to ensure that our drinking water stays safe and clean. Draining the fuel tanks at Red Hill is a good first step, but we must work to find long-term solutions. National security cannot come at the expense of our people's health. I believe we can protect both national security and public health, but it will take determination and the collaborative efforts of everyone.

"In the first year of the pandemic, we were forced to cut over a billion dollars from the budget, with every state agency scrambling to find new ways to continue to provide essential services to our residents. More than that, we faced the prospect that it would take the economy decades to recover. Describing our financial prospects back then as 'bleak' would be an understatement. But we took the hard and necessary steps to address the very thing that threatened the life of our economy: the pandemic. Many wanted us to immediately fix the symptom of the problem, the devastated economy, but we needed to balance that with putting people's health first. As painful as it was, it was the right remedy for the long term—to make things pono. When things seemed to get better, we tempered our optimism, and we continue to do so with economic, as well as health, issues.

"As you heard last month, we now expect a positive balance in our budget of more than a billion dollars. Tax collections have jumped by an astounding 27.3 percent over last year's totals—that's a direct reflection of the rebound in visitor arrivals, increased consumer spending, and the growing strength of our local businesses. We have a chance to restore painful cuts that we've made over the last two years, to repay outstanding loans, and to replenish various state funds, including loans to

the unemployment trust fund, the state's depleted rainy day fund, and cuts from our schools and state agencies that provide essential services to our people. In other words, we have a chance to safeguard our future and our children's future. When we face another catastrophic emergency, will we be prepared to deal with it? For the first time in a long time, we have the resources to take care of both our immediate and long-term needs. We can rebuild the solid fiscal foundation that we created before the pandemic.

"We also have a chance to pursue new initiatives, including the development of an all-inclusive broadband infrastructure. If the pandemic has taught us anything, it's about the crucial role that the internet plays in all of our daily lives. That's why we're leveraging state resources to maximize federal funding for broadband and proposing the largest investment in technology in our state's history, a total of more than \$400 million. We're calling it Apakau Ka La, 'spreading of the sun's rays.' It is critical infrastructure for the future connecting all the main Hawaiian islands. This initiative will not only close the digital divide between the haves and the have-nots but strengthen us as a community. We also recently launched the Affordable Connectivity Program, which extends federal emergency broadband benefits to those who would not otherwise be able to afford internet service. It's estimated that more than 100,000 Hawai'i families will be able to qualify for internet services under this program. More than that, we have a chance to lift every business and every family with this incoming tide—to take everyone with us, whether we're talking about business growth, career opportunities, health care, housing, or education—because in spite of the strengthening economy, there are still many businesses on the brink of failure and many families who are struggling to make ends meet. We cannot leave them behind. As a community, it's not in our nature to leave them behind. The tide is rising, and it should lift all of us.

"Hawai'i is unique: our geography, our people, and our history. As the only island state in the nation and as an amazing multicultural community, we celebrate our diversity. This distinction is at the heart of how we govern. There's no one-size-fits-all way of governing. That's why we're a government 'of the people, by the people, and for the people'; that's not just a cliché but a recognition that our government should reflect and respond to that diversity. This is also what has directed and shaped my decisions. It's also been one of my greatest challenges.

"There's a popular local saying: 'Keep the country, country.' In an era that is propelling us through unprecedented changes and challenges, how do we keep Hawai'i, Hawai'i? How do you sustain and nurture what makes us, us? How do you do that, even as we must change to meet the times? How do you make things pono for everyone? Like our response to the pandemic, there is no easy answer, but I believe it lies somewhere deep within all of us who call Hawai'i home. It lies in our willingness to share—to give, even when we have very little to give. It is tucked deep within our desire to lift and lighten the burden of others. It's our deep-seated belief that we're part of a greater 'ohana and that we have a responsibility to our community. We are all connected. It's taken generations, stretching back to those pathfinding sea-voyagers, to create this amazing and wonderful sense of community. There are some who fear that we're in danger of losing it through the many changes that we've endured; I am not one of them. From my vantage point, I see a Hawai'i that remains strong and true to itself. I see families come together even when they cannot physically get together. I see a generation reaching down to take hold of a younger one, and the young reaching up for guidance from their kūpuna—something we've always done here in the islands. I see a Hawai'i that has been tested and tested over and over again during this pandemic. We may have bent, but we did not break. I believe in Hawai'i, in its people and its purpose.

When we work together, we can do great things, like those I've talked about today, to help all who are struggling to make ends meet, whether it's \$100 or \$400; to provide child care for working parents and preschools for every child in Hawai'i; and to create a broadband network that includes everyone in every community all across the state. I am proud of the work that we do, and I am proud ... proud to be your governor. For all that you do and all that you are, my thanks and deeply felt aloha. Mahalo."

Senate President Ronald D. Kouchi then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Governor. I appreciate the emotion at the end of your speech and underscores your commitment. Based on the remarks last week in both the House chamber, where we are today, and the Senate chamber, we have many shared goals, and the Legislature looks forward to working together with you in an effort to deliver what is pono for the people of Hawai'i and make sure we lift up everyone in the state. On Wednesday, the Speaker said from this rostrum he supports an \$18 minimum wage. Today, the Senate is holding a hearing on a bill that would raise the minimum wage to \$18, and I believe we're taking a bold first step to deliver on that promise."

At 10:40 a.m., President Kouchi declared the Joint Session adjourned.

FIFTH DAY

Wednesday, January 26, 2022

The Senate of the Thirty-First Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2022, convened at 11:32 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present, with Senators Chang, Gabbard, Keohokalole, Moriwaki, Rhoads, Shimabukuro, and Taniguchi present and participating via videoconference, and with the exception of Senator Ihara who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fourth Day.

The following messages from the Governor (Gov. Msg. Nos. 501 to 589) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

Friday, January 28, 2022

The Senate of the Thirty-First Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2022, convened at 11:33 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present, with Senators Chang, Gabbard, Keohokalole, Moriwaki, Rhoads, and Shimabukuro present and participating via videoconference.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifth Day.

At this time, Senator Dela Cruz introduced staff members of the Committee on Ways and Means who were seated in the gallery: budget section staffers Colin Peros and Kekahi Haina; and bills section staffers Duncan Osorio, Samantha Magbulos, Esera Vegas, Chris Shellko, Carlos Pena, Mary Deneen, and Vanessa Arce. Senator Dela Cruz then recognized Lena Alubaidi, a budget section staffer who had offered a moment of contemplation prior to the Senate's floor session.

The Chair commented, in good humor, that the members would challenge Senator Dela Cruz to buy them dinner or lunch if he was afraid of spending money on his colleagues.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT
AND
THIRD READING

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2002 (S.B. No. 2018):

Senator Dela Cruz, for the Committee on Ways and Means, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2002) recommending that S.B. No. 2018 pass Third Reading.

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2002 be adopted and S.B. No. 2018, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Taniguchi rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Senate Bill 2018 proposes to incrementally increase the minimum wage from the current \$10.10. I just wanted to thank all my colleagues for their support over the last three years. I appreciate that you have all joined me and the Committee on Labor to try to pass a meaningful increase every year of those three years. I know some of you have concerns with the current bill, but I was happy that you raised them with me and that we could discuss them fully. While I appreciate the concerns, I am hopeful that we will finally be successful this session.

"In recent years, we have passed measures to benefit employers and to keep them in business. We are working this year to further assist them by keeping an increase in their unemployment tax rates to a reasonable amount. It is time we provide help to the thousands of struggling low-wage earners in our state. I urge you to vote in support of Senate Bill 2018.

"Mr. President, I have additional comments on this bill which I would like to have inserted in the Journal. Thank you."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Taniguchi's additional remarks read as follows:

"The Regular Session of 2022 will be the fourth consecutive year that the Hawaii State Senate is strongly advocating for a meaningful increase of the State's minimum wage, currently set at \$10.10 per hour. That amount as set forth in Section 387-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, has not changed since January 1, 2018, when the final increase of the minimum wage took effect as established by the enactment of Senate Bill 2609, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, on May 23, 2014 as Act 82, Session Laws of Hawaii 2014.

"According to a December 2021 report issued by the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism, as of 2020, a single adult with no children in the City and County of Honolulu, County of Hawaii, County of Maui, and County of Kauai, needed to earn an hourly wage of \$18.35,

\$14.78, \$17.84, and \$19.33, respectively, to be able to meet basic needs and be economically self-sufficient.

“The recent increases in the annual rate of inflation to levels not seen in forty years, has further increased Hawaii’s high cost of living. The rise in the cost of living, combined with stagnant wages, have contributed to the increase in asset limited, income constrained, and employed (‘ALICE’) households in Hawaii whose financial hardships have been exacerbated even further by the long-term disruptions caused by the coronavirus disease 2019 pandemic.

“Senate Bill 2018 proposes to incrementally increase the minimum wage from the current \$10.10 per hour to \$12.00 per hour beginning October 1, 2022; \$15.00 per hour beginning January 1, 2024; and \$18.00 per hour beginning January 1, 2026.

“The proposal is straight forward and not complicated by including other issues in the same measure. Getting to \$18.00 per hour will be a significant help to wage earners. I strongly urge my colleagues to vote in support of Senate Bill 2018.”

Senator Fevella rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“We know that this is a controversial bill; we’ve been seeing it all over the news, and it’s really with a lot of mixed emotion. I’m a big supporter of small businesses. My family and I pretty much eat at every single small business restaurant from here to Mākaha.

“2018 was the last time the minimum wage was raised at \$10.10. Many were okay at \$10.10 in 2018. A Living Wage report completed in 2020 concluded \$18 per hour was needed to meet the basic needs, yet the price of food and gas continues to rise. One job should be enough for the quality of life of our hardworking families.

“The proposed first increment of the minimum wage increase is not \$18 as reported in the news around this island. The media is also reporting that the Legislature is also not considering the people this proposal will impact, or the social and economic challenges, which is just not true.

“Going forward, the first increment is \$12 in October. This increase is long overdue. I know this because of working with the City, back in the day. I used to make only \$21,000 to \$24,000 a year. Yet SNAP increased more frequently time after time. I don’t want to say ‘year after year,’ but, in time, SNAP benefits increase. Section 8 applicants continue to get government assistance. Social Security benefits went up to deserving people and was well-justified. But no one got upset regarding these SNAP, Section 8, and Social Security increases, especially during the pandemic. It was justified due to rising costs, but there are mixed reaction with the minimum wage increase. But when I go to restaurants, the minimum-wage workers always express thanks to my colleagues, to my family, and everyone who supports this bill. They thank us when I walk into the restaurant for standing for them because since 2018, food prices have continued to rise and we have been working on increasing the minimum wage since 2003.

“The reason why I say this—in my community and most of your communities—it is the same thing. Some of these families have to work two to three jobs, work on holidays, their birthdays, everything that you can think of to survive in the State of Hawai‘i. Did you know that minimum-wage workers, all the workers, are required to have a drug test for their jobs, but did you also know that no drug testing is required to receive government assistance? Is that fair?

“So, again, here we are with this bill. (Sorry, I’m kind of getting a little bit emotional because there are a lot of

misinformed statements reported in the media by opponents of this bill.) But we have way more minimum-wage workers today in the State of Hawai‘i than we have small businesses. A lot of small businesses do not, Senate President, have workers, yet they are saying this measure is not fair to the small businesses and the economy and will cause inflation in the State of Hawai‘i. I don’t know what world they are waking up in. Inflation is here—it’s been happening during the whole pandemic period. So when they want to come down and talk about me being, as a Republican, siding with my Democratic colleagues, my support has nothing, nothing, to do with parties. This bill is for the people of Hawai‘i who are suffering and have to work three jobs. So if they think that’s the problem then they’re sadly mistaken. Senate President, like I said, I’m willing to work with everybody, but this bill has nothing to do with a party—Democrat, Green Party, Blue Party, whatever—it’s for the people of Hawai‘i, and I want the people out there to know that, that what we do here and what we’re doing here today is for the people. But, again, I urge my colleagues here today in the Senate and the colleagues in the House to please support this most decent increase for our hardworking families of Hawai‘i. Thank you, Senate President. God bless.”

The Chair remarked:

“Thank you, Senator Fevella, for having the courage to stand on your convictions as each and every one of us do on every vote we take.”

Senator Riviere rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I don’t think raising the minimum wage is controversial, in general, these days. I think there’s broad support raising the minimum wage. I think the question is, is \$18 within four years the appropriate increase, and I must argue it is not. And it’s for that reason I’m going to have to vote against this measure today. I would consider something more modest. I think we know the arguments—I don’t need to regurgitate all of those—but I would note that my daughter, my 18-year-old daughter, she got a job last year working at an acai bowl shop part-time; she was making \$10 an hour. Quickly, they saw that she was worth something and they wanted to encourage her to stay, so she got a pay raise to \$12, and she’s very well-respected at that place. When she came home from college for the Christmas break, they were glad to take her in and give her all the hours that she could work. My 18-year-old daughter does not have any obligation to raise a family or try to survive, and I think it’s really important that we recognize there’s a gigantic difference between a living wage and a minimum wage. So, again, not to recreate and reargue everything; I think we already have our positions and our understandings.

“I want to give a specific example of what this impact will do to a business, a typical business in my district. We don’t have a single Walmart or Home Depot or any of those large employers in our district. My district is all small businesses, except for maybe some of the organizations out in Lā‘ie, some of the church-based businesses. So what does this mean? I talked to a landlord the other day about the impact to his business, and he said, ‘All of my businesses that rent from me, we’ve had to defer our pay, so you know the story about the COVID impact,’ he said. But here’s the thing: some of his tenants make maybe only \$40,000 a month—that’s the gross receipts. And I think this is really the important issue that we’re talking about for the defense of small business: if a business makes forty grand a month as their total revenue, if their rent is \$5,000 a month, if their cost of goods is approximately half of the revenue and—if you know business—you know that you basically double your product costs. So if they buy it at \$20,000, they sell it at \$40,000. So \$40,000 minus \$20,000 minus the rent (\$5,000), they’re down to \$15,000. But they need employees. An employee at minimum wage right now is \$1,750

a month. Their health care is \$500 a month. Their unemployment, insurances, Medicare and such is another \$175. A minimum-wage employee right now is \$2,500 a month. In order to staff your store to be open long enough to sell enough product to make \$40,000 a month, you need probably four employees to cover all the shifts. So your employee wage right now, at minimum wage is, if you're employing four people, about ten grand. Twenty plus five plus ten, you're at \$35,000. Okay, well, great: the owner, this wealthy owner, now has five grand left to pay himself, pay his own bills, to pay the utilities, pay whatever taxes are related, cleaning, packaging, everything else that goes into the cost of a business. So, we're talking about raising it to \$18, and four years will come very quickly. That \$10,000 of labor would now be worth \$16,000. There's not enough money left! These businesses will be wiped out! Those people who were barely getting by on the minimum wage are now not even going to have those jobs. Our mom-and-pop stores are going to be crushed or, what will happen is, there will be no Joe's Coffee Shop—it'll all be Starbucks because Starbucks has the corporate pockets to avoid the middle man; the owner, the entrepreneur, will not be there. So you'll have corporations running everything; there's going to be nothing left of the small business. We're already known as a difficult state for business, and while I have great empathy for people who are barely getting by, minimum wage, adjusting it, is not the solution to improving our economy in this state. So for these reasons, I must stand in opposition. Thank you."

Senator Rhoads spoke in support of the measure as follows:

"It is a tricky issue in many respects, but I would point out that the minimum wage in 1968 was, in inflation-adjusted terms, the highest it's ever been, and if it was still at that level that it was in 1968, it would be \$24 an hour. This is the national wage, not ours. Hawai'i's has traditionally been higher because of our high cost of living. I share some of one of the previous speaker's concerns about raising the wage very quickly, but I do think we need to get back to at least to the point we were more than 50 years ago. I'll just repeat that if we had the same minimum wage we had in 1968, it would be \$24 an hour now. Mahalo."

Senator Acasio rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I'm proud to be part of this esteemed body today, passing this vital legislation to increase the minimum wage for Hawai'i's workers. It's long overdue, and the time is now. This is a bipartisan effort; as my colleague from 'Ewa said, if prices are going up for everything, then wages must also go up so our neighbors, families, and friends can buy what they need not just to survive but thrive in the islands.

"Just last month, a report by the state Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism found that over 34 percent of couples with two children had incomes below the self-sufficiency standard, and 50 to 80 percent of single adults with children had incomes below self-sufficiency standard. Just think about that for a moment because we all know families who are struggling just to barely survive. If we truly care about our keiki, we must raise the minimum wage. This same government report found that a single adult with one child needed an hourly wage of \$25 to \$32 just to meet basic needs, and a couple with two children needed a combined hourly wage of \$35 to \$40 to meet basic needs. So this legislation raising the minimum wage to \$18 an hour over four years is a start, but by no means is it enough to truly be a living wage in Hawai'i, and a living wage should be our ultimate goal. This means lessening the burdens of workers and their families by providing things like free preschool or early childhood education; by subsidizing childcare and afterschool programs, which we do; by lessening the costs of health care and health insurance. We can and must do this because one job should be enough.

"I understand that raising the minimum wage will be challenging for our small-business owners. The same is true in my area of representation. I truly empathize with them as they are struggling to survive as well. I have two responses. First, it is imperative that we in government must also continue to step up to help our small local businesses in any way we can with things like tax breaks and other incentives. We have many tools at our disposal, and we must work with local businesses to help them because they, too, are our neighbors, families, and friends. Secondly, as consumers, we must shop at our local businesses and support them with our dollars and support our workers so that money continues to circulate in our communities rather than become extracted by corporations. We can do this, and we must also, in that sense, put our money where our mouth is. Mahalo."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2002 was adopted and S.B. No. 2018, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MINIMUM WAGE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

And Ezra, serving in his capacity as a state representative—we did have some disagreements on

policy, but he was never disagreeable, and he will sorely be missed by the people of Kaua’i and the people of the State of Hawai’i.”

"I would like to speak to correct my previous vote in committee. I do have reservations, but I absolutely support the intent of this measure to have utmost safety for our keiki in vehicle transportation. The concerns that I do have are generally around the fines—and increase in fines for the infraction—seems to be also based around poverty and for those already stretching with limited resources or without means to have proper childcare restraints, and there are other ways to approach this issue as well. I just also wanted to say that there is some lack of clarity around the age of the two-year-old versus their size in regards to the restraint, so mahalo for allowing me to speak on this in reservation."

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"My concern is also about the increase in fines. I don't think this is the vehicle to tax families, especially where there is no written testimony of the need to increase fines. Thank you very much."

Senator Fevella rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"I had a pretty big daughter when she was growing up. She didn't fit in a lot of the standard car seats and, at the time, they didn't have the type of booster seats they have now. And going forward, in my community, we hand down or give away or trade with families in need of car seats. For example, at the Waianae Comprehensive Health Center, they're always giving out car seats and boosters because the community can't afford it. Having these fines—and I understand the reason for it, but it

would only hurt the community and the people who are in the greatest need of assistance. Thank you, Senate President."

Senator Lee rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I appreciate the comments from colleagues; I just note that Hawai'i has among the most dangerous roads of any state in the country, with more fatalities and injuries and so forth. This is a measure recommended by medical experts and our law enforcement, and the fines, to which I think folks have raised some issue, only apply in repeat-offender situations; they're not intended to penalize anybody. Thank you very much."

Of those 708, only 36 have been able to find a place to live as of the date of the hearing that the Judiciary committee heard this bill. So this is a real problem if the aid that we’re giving as a government to people can’t be used because they can’t find anybody to take the money; that at least partially defeats the purpose of the aid that we’re trying to give people who are struggling to get by with affordable housing. So that’s it; thank you very much, and I support the bill. Mahalo.”

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“As the chair of Judiciary has pointed out, there is a huge problem when over 690 households could not use the rental vouchers that we have given them. We need the use of these vouchers to be able to transition the homeless over into affordable housing. We already know that there’s already a problem with affordable housing, but this transitory need that is not being served because landlords are refusing to accept these vouchers is causing a strain on our homeless population and our homeless shelters, and, as such, hopefully, by passage of this bill, we will ease at least 690 households into not using our homeless services. Thank you.”

Unfortunately, I didn't have, but Public Safety did and fulfilled that need.

"This morning, when I returned to the Capitol, I noticed that this woman was on the grassy area across from the corner of Beretania and Punchbowl, and so I stopped into Sergeant-at-Arms office, and I spoke with Park and explained to her the situation—that the woman was still there. So Park, being the good soul and resourceful, called some of the agencies here in Honolulu. (Had I been on Maui, I could've made those calls myself, but I didn't know who to call here in Honolulu.) And hopefully, when the respondents came, the woman will take the assistance and either return to the hospital or to a safe place.

"I just wanted to rise on a point of personal privilege just to note how wonderful staff we have and agencies around who can come to the aid at 8:00 at night and later, this morning, to try to help someone in need when we find them on the steps of our building. Mahalo."

The Chair recounted Senator Baker's comments for those who had not heard her clearly, and expressed his appreciation, on behalf of the Hawai'i State Senate, to Senator Baker, Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms Park Kaleiwahea, and the Department of Public Safety sheriffs for their prompt response and the humanity they had exhibited in assisting that individual.

S.B. No. 312, S.D. 1:

Senator Rhoads moved that S.B. No. 312, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keohokalole.

Senator Rhoads spoke in support of the measure as follows:

“Just wanted to quickly read the proposed amendment, and this is for the Hawai‘i State Constitution: ‘The freedom of speech shall not include the expenditure of money to influence elections.’ As many of you know, since the *Citizens United* case about 10 years ago at the federal level, millions of dollars of

often unaccounted-for dark money has poured into the system. While this amendment—if it’s approved by the Senate and the House and the voters of the State of Hawai‘i—will not have any immediate effect, it certainly sends the message to the federal government that we think the *Citizens United* decision is untenable, has led to money just washing over the political system in ways that are detrimental to the measures we pass, detrimental to the way American democracy has functioned for a long time. So with my support, I hope we move this forward. Mahalo.”

Senator Kim rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“Madam President, I also voted ‘with reservations’ in committee, and I wanted to explain my vote. It’s not that I disagree with what is being asked in the question itself; I am concerned because this is the constitution and, as the chair of the committee had said, that this would have no immediate effect and it sends a message. I don’t believe we should be using our constitution to send messages—I think our constitution is a very sacred document, and we have to take it very seriously and shouldn’t be using it for symbolic reasons, and that is why I’m voting with strong reservations. Thank you.”

Senator Fevella rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“I also rise to voice my reservations, and I would like to insert comments into the Journal as my own as stated by my colleague from Kalihi Valley. Thank you.”

The Senate of the Thirty-First Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2022, convened at 9:09 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

On March 4, 2022, DAGS Comptroller Curt Otaguro announced that, due to declining positive COVID-19 case counts and COVID-19 hospitalizations, all state-maintained facilities would be open to the public from March 8, 2022.

"Therefore, while the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic continues to qualify as a 'catastrophic disaster' as defined in Senate Rule 38.5, at present there is no 'good cause' for authorizing Senate members to continue participating in any meeting of members via virtual attendance as set forth in Senate Rule 38.5 until further notice. So, the summary is, all members are required to be in-person attendance for committee meetings and floor sessions."

Mister President, this bill could not be here, ready to cross over to the House, without their commitment."

"I speak in favor of SB2269 to repeal the authorization of the Governor to negotiate for the development or expansion of private in-state correctional facilities and a prohibition for the establishment of private correctional facilities in this state. The recommendation by the committee that a prison constructed by a private entity be owned and operated by the Department of Public Safety and any contractual agreements by the Governor take into account the concerns raised by the ACLU, Community Alliance on Prisons and many others. In a review of for profit prisons, the U.S. Office of the Inspector General found that overall for-profit prisons are less safe and less secure than government run ones. There is greater oversight by in-state prisons than those in privately operated ones. It is for those reasons I support this bill."

"SB2667 SD1 will extend the deadline for Hawaii Housing Finance and Development Corporation to renegotiate an existing, or issue a new, ground lease for the Front Street

Apartments affordable housing project before the corporation's requirement to initiate condemnation proceedings is triggered by five years.

“Mr. President I’d like to reiterate my remarks on a similar bill from a previous session as my comments have not changed.

“I have supported every measure that has come before us to curb the consumption of alcohol and save lives from DUIs. But this bill lowers the blood alcohol from .8 to .5.

“I must agree with some of the testimony that this measure cast too wide a net on criminalizing behavior of normally responsible drinkers.

“I didn’t realize that .5 = 3 alcoholic drinks that a 160lb.-180lb man would need to drink in 1 hour.

“But it would be 1 glass of wine for a 100lb-120lb woman like me.

“So, Mr. President, I could be charged for a DUI if I had 1 glass of wine while you could drink 2.5 glasses and not be charged.

“More accidents occur by non-drinking drivers due to speed, distractions, and texting than by a driver who has had 1 glass of wine. Any one of you could be severely punished and labeled with a DUI for having 1 drink and tested .5.”

“The rural classification is hardly used in this state. It is used on some of the neighbor islands, but has not yet been used on this island. The purpose for ‘rural’ is to parse in between ‘agriculture’ and ‘urban.’ We have conservation, agriculture, rural, and urban classifications. Presently, rural designation allows lot sizes of a half-acre, which is about 22,000 square feet. This measure would reduce the size of the lots down to about 11,000 square feet, which is, for all intents and purposes,

more of an urban classification. So, I do not support the erosion of the rural district classification. I think we could use it more often, but lowering the lot size is not going to help our planning. Thank you.”

Senator Kanuha requested that remarks regarding the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Kanuha’s remarks read as follows:

“Mr. President, I rise in strong support of S.B. No. 2922, S.D. 2.

“Colleagues, with the severe housing shortage in the State of Hawai‘i, our focus has been on the development of new housing projects as well as reviewing the current permitting process. While development is a key part of the solution, we should also examine all of our options to determine policies to help increase Hawai‘i’s stock of housing units, including reviewing and updating current zoning and land-use restrictions.

“Historically, agriculture has been a default land use classification—throughout Hawai‘i Island we have seen large swathes of lava fields and other lands not-suitable zoned for agriculture, while the State Rural District—which includes just 0.3% of all lands in the State—has been severely underutilized. With the proposed statutory change to permit no more than one house per one-quarter acre on lands zoned as rural, greater utilization of the State Rural District will distinguish rural communities and subsistence farms from commercial agricultural lands, allow for better protection of productive agricultural lands, and establish more available land for housing in the State.

“Consequently, there is a need to redefine and expand the Rural District to improve land use management of existing rural settlements and infrastructure. As the measure requires the Office of Planning and Sustainable Development (OPSD) to conduct a study to refine Rural District policies and make recommendations to facilitate the reclassification of lands from the State Agricultural District to the Rural District, S.B. No. 2922, S.D.2. is the first step towards statutory changes to existing land-use policies.

“Therefore, colleagues, I urge you to support S.B. No. 2922, S.D. 2, as I firmly believe that authorizing higher population density in the Rural District will in turn increase housing supply throughout our State, as well as reduce the overall cost of housing for moderate- and low-income working class ‘ohana throughout Hawai‘i.”

Senator Acasio rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"I want to start by acknowledging my colleagues for the much-needed interest they're taking in energy matters. We're at the point where the low-hanging fruit has pretty much been picked, and we are left with far more challenging decisions about how to meet our energy needs in ways that both avert climate disaster and decrease our dependence on imported fuels. My colleagues behind this measure are to be commended for the amount of time and energy they put into examining these issues. I also commend them for the critical thinking that they bring to that examination. Now that we are all more focused on the difficult choices that have come from weaning ourselves off fossil fuels, we have to remind ourselves of why we are doing this to begin with. It is **not** just to become less dependent on imported oil. As the first state to declare a climate emergency, we have also made the commitment to drastically reduce our carbon emissions.

"Substituting the practice of burning oil with the practice of burning wood chips or, even worse, refuse-derived fuel, does not get us to where we need to go. The fantasy that Hawai'i is going to generate enough wood resources needed to fuel biomass plants has been exposed as a fallacy through the recent PUC proceedings. The only business model that brings the cost of these schemes anywhere close to affordable, once huge swaths of standing trees already providing a valuable carbon sequestration service have been decimated here, is the continual import of outsourced materials such as refuse-derived pellets or wood chips from elsewhere in the world. As policymakers, we have come to the point where the term 'renewable' no longer serves us in our decision-making. This is especially true to the extent that this term has been co-opted and redefined by the lobbyists working for the waste-to-energy industry. Trash is not a renewable resource. Biomass is only a renewable resource if it gets replanted at the same level it is consumed, which is currently not happening anywhere on the planet. And even if that were the case, the carbon footprint required to grow, harvest, and ship and transport biomass fuels makes the overall process a huge greenhouse gas emitter.

"This bill is part of a raft of bills that aim to substitute Hawai'i's dependency on imported oil with a dependency on imported biomass and a commitment to continue generating obscene amounts of waste. Hawai'i cannot afford to do either. We must take our cue from the recent position taken by the Biden administration under the advisement of the world's foremost thinkers on the subject of energy and climate. In the recent White House publication on the *Indo-Pacific Strategy of the United States* released February 2022, it states, 'We will incentivize clean-energy technology investment and development, seek to drive energy-sector decarbonization, and foster climate-aligned infrastructure investment.' The term that is being used to guide federal energy policy is 'decarbonization.' This means no reliance on biomass, no reliance on waste. Let's work together as policymakers moving forward to follow this lead and bring Hawai'i into the 21st century. Senate Bill 2510 as currently written represents a regressive energy policy, and for this reason I cannot support it. Thank you, Mr. President."

"Instead, Senate Draft 2 creates a 12-member working group to assess feasibility, delaying yet again the collection and analysis of much-needed data we need today. I hope these concerns will be addressed as the bill moves forward. Thank you."

groundbreaking legislation. I want to direct the attention of everyone here to the bill's commendable purpose, which is to keep construction materials that are reusable as construction materials out of the landfill and in the economy. If you don't understand the nexus between climate and resource consumption, please take your time to research it or at least put your faith in people who have been studying this for decades. In order to avoid a climate disaster, we must wean ourselves from fossil fuels, but we must **also** stop consuming the world's resources at the current fevered pitch.

"The whole point of Senate Bill 2662 is that a large percentage of construction debris is useful as construction material. Estimates vary, but it is well beyond 25 percent. This bill was exceptional as written. It requires those handling these materials to set aside at least 25 percent of their recovered materials for reuse and recycling; that leaves a full 75 percent for anything else, including the production of gaseous fuel. There is no need to undermine the purpose of the bill or corrupt the meaning of the word 'recycling' to allow for the production of gaseous fuel. Resource destruction is not recycling—the cycle ends when the fuel is burned. This bill was meant to make sure that anything useful as construction material stays in the economy as such.

"I would like to point out that, on the EPA website, in reference to this particular subject, it says, 'Does EPA consider burning for energy recovery to be waste minimization?' And the answer is, 'Recycling activities closely resembling conventional waste treatment activities (such as burning for energy recovery) do not constitute waste minimization.' And for this reason, I cannot support the bill as amended. Thank you."

"First, finding physicians willing to administer medical aid in dying is often difficult because of Hawaii's shortage of physicians, especially on the neighbor islands. Secondly, Hawaii's waiting period is the longest of all of ten medical-aid-in-dying states and the District of Columbia who have approved medical-aid-in-dying.

"This measure amends the Our Care, Our Choice Act to address these two problems by authorizing advanced practice registered nurses, in addition to physicians, to practice medical aid in dying in accordance with their scope of practice and prescribing authority. It also authorizes psychiatric mental health nurse practitioners and clinic nurse specialists, in addition to psychiatrists, psychologists, and clinical social workers, to provide counseling to qualified patients. Finally, this measure reduces the mandatory waiting period between oral requests from 20 to 15 days and provides an expedited pathway for those terminally ill individuals not expected to survive the mandatory waiting period.

"Please join me in supporting this measure. Mahalo."

"One of the main reasons I'm voting against this bill is because the current version of this bill leaves a blank the number of miles from the shoreline for offshore wind turbines. Scott Glenn, of the Hawaii State Energy Office, recently submitted testimony supporting my position that there needs to be more discussion on this before passing a law to set a

minimum setbacks for offshore wind turbines. I understand we are all eager to go 100 percent clean energy by 2045, but we're not considering all of the environment impacts. Think about the land base or what's happening with the turbines we have onshore. Here, there are noise complaints from neighboring residents concerned regarding the impacts to view planes, loss of wildlife, and the environment that are occurring on land. Offshore wind turbines in Hawai'i waters will also hurt our fishery industry: impact them by restricting zones where they can and cannot fish.

"And then the platforms and safety concerns: I'm not sure if everybody understands how these blades are being made. We have no place to dispose of the windmill blades after 20 years. Wind turbine blades now can't be recycled. It has to go into a landfill, which we do not have and will have to ship it off island. Currently, wind turbine blades are piling up in landfills, who are searching for ways to deal with them as they reach the end of their lives.

"But what about the potential risk of displacing and altering the behavior of marine mammals, fish, and seabirds? I'm not sure if you realize how big the wind turbine platform is. The platform is bigger than this building—all the way to the House, maybe even bigger—on the platform. And why are we going to go ahead and put all this renewable energy equipment where we can see them across the street from my house, right out there on the shore. A five-miles or twelve-miles restriction should not even be considered. Going forward with this would be devastating to our land and natural resources. Devastating to our fish, marine mammals, and people who use the ocean for wildlife, and for just recreation—who will have to deal with many new restrictions.

"I know in previous Energy, Economic Development, and Tourism committee hearings, we talked about turbines. Turbines should not be considered any kind of renewable energy because it's not hundred percent renewable. What is used on turbine is oil for lubrication. You are not going to be able to use water to lubricate it. You need oil, grease (all non-portable, all nonrecyclable), all of this other stuff that comes with windmills. And now you're going to put it on the ocean?

"So let's go back in history when the Kahuku windmills caught on fire. Firefighters couldn't go out and put out the fire. Why? Because of the chemicals of those batteries. Now we want to put the same batteries with chemicals floating atop the ocean. None of these offshore wind turbines will connect to land. They'll connect to a floating vessel out on the ocean, collecting renewable energy, and then shipped to shore. We have better renewable technology that we learned from other countries and we can learn from one of our islands that Senate President is from which has no windmills. Why, when we come to our island of O'ahu, everything is on my side of the island, and then they want to do all the pilot projects on my side of the island. And then when it comes to natural resources, we forget about all the heavy fishery and the people who are out there, living off the land. If this wind turbine fall apart in the ocean, it will come to all of our shores. It will hurt the fishery on all of our shores, not just 'Ewa Beach. We are talking all the islands will pay for this cost of disposing of these batteries and blades. So thank you again, colleagues; thank you, Senate President. I'm voting 'no' on this bill because it's not a good bill. Thank you."

Senator Riviere rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Our colleague from 'Ewa Beach and I are very, very much united in our concerns about wind energy. I am voting in support of this measure because I do think it would be appropriate to limit where they can be, and while the numbers are blanked out now for the minimum distance, I would

encourage that in the final form they go back to '12 miles or more offshore.' It's a separate question on whether or not we should even have wind turbines because I share much of the concerns previously described. But, if they're going to be here, they certainly should not be in our state waters, and we should not allow the federal government to impose its will against the will of the people of Hawai'i. So, if the federal government through BOEM, the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management, determines that it doesn't matter what the people of Hawai'i think—we're going to have wind energy—then we, at least, should limit where they can put them and not allow them to interconnect if they go against the wish of the people. So I support the bill to the extent it creates an appropriate and distant minimum siting. Thank you."

Senator DeCoite requested that remarks regarding the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator DeCoite's remarks read as follows:

"I am voting in opposition to this bill because it does not specify how far offshore these wind turbine projects will be. It is unclear what the impacts will be on our coastal shorelines and our marine ecosystems. We need to be certain that these offshore wind turbine projects will not have a negative effect on our marine environment.

"In 2003, Act 90 was signed into law. This Act required certain agricultural lands managed by the Department of Land and Natural Resources be transferred to the Department of Agriculture. Unfortunately, it is now 2022 and over half of lands leased or available to be leased for ag will not be transferred to DOA pursuant to Act 90 because DLNR and the Board of Land and Natural Resources have not agreed to several land transfers.

"SB 2068 is a solution that will conclude the legislative intent of Act 90 by empowering local ranchers and agricultural lessees to strengthen local food production, food sustainability, and land stewardship.

"The state has fallen short of its goals to double food production; SB 2068 will give cattle ranchers the financial flexibility they need, and the expertise of DOA, a more suitable ag focused entity to ensure long-term viability and success of Hawaii's local ranching and food production industries.

"DLNR already has too many priorities to manage.

"Ranchers have been waiting almost 20 years to get the relief they need to support cattle production. The state claims to support agriculture but transferring these agricultural lands to DOA is a simple solution that has yet to be fully implemented.

"DLNR and DOA can work together as state agencies to meet their specific missions, but agriculture lessees need appropriate terms to thrive and these lease terms are available through DOA.

"To meet the state's goals of supporting agriculture and protecting the environment, ranchers and other farmers can and should be empowered to play a role as responsible land stewards."

Instead the Kauai Regent will be a hold over. They were also not able to get 3 qualified candidates for the Student Regent.

"The CAC is mandated to send at least 3 names for each vacancy to the Governor, but due to lack of qualified candidates they have sent 3 names that also appeared for other candidates. For example, if there were 3 vacancies, they should have a total of 9 names but instead it might be just 6 names as one name could appear for all three vacancies. The AG has recently provided an opinion that clarifies that names can be repeated for various seats it must be in addition to 3 different names.

"There are very few boards that have a nominating council. The other one is the Procurement Policy Board nominating committee which is also before us today SB2383 to be eliminated as well for similar reasons. The only difference is that the CAC is in the Constitution and the Procurement Policy Board nominating committee is in statute. Thus, the same support should be given to this measure as for SB2383. Mahalo."

The constitution also states that the Legislature can enact laws governing UH that have statewide concern. UH's payroll is the single largest fixed expense.

"The issue of tenure is not new. Senators and Representatives before me have tried unsuccessfully to make updated and meaningful changes to the practices. Keep in mind that tenure was created to protect academic freedom for professors. And I support this right, but tenure today is embraced as an assurance of life-time employment.

"UPHA has launched attacks that this bill will eliminate tenure, but it does not. The SD1 and the current SD2 does not do that. In fact, the SD2 directs the Board of Regents to discuss and adopt the recommendations of the BOR's Permitted Interaction Group (PIG) Task group; Direct the UH President to consult and confer with the faculty union and appropriate funds to restore UH funding to pre-pandemic levels.

"Regent Jan Sullivan-former UH Regent Chair, member and chair of the Regents Permitted Interaction Group (PIG) published an OP ED article on tenure that appeared in the Honolulu Star Advertiser, I quote:

Our Tenure Task Group was comprised of 4 Regent Board members, 4 UH administrators including a chancellor, vice chancellor, dean, and vice president, as well as the head of the faculty union. All members, with the exception of the faculty union rep., agree with the group's recommendations (not to eliminate tenure) but to guide the future use of tenure at the university.

The group recommended that these changes occur moving forward, and that they not affect existing tenured employees.

People who are threatened by change live in a vacuum. In today's world threats to that status quo are met with alarmist tactics aimed at getting people riled up. This has become an ugly business. I write this to lay down the facts and set aside the rhetoric to give this discussion the proper context. The people of Hawaii deserve nothing less.

"To magnify what Jan says about alarmist tactics, UPHA's recent letter to their members they say: 'This bill is an attempt by Sen. Kim, to interject the legislature into the constitutionally established role of the UH Board of Regents by taking away their exclusive jurisdiction over the internal structure, management and operation of the UH-thereby granting themselves as the governing body over the Board of Regents' This is alarmist-not only is it not true-this measure was proposed by the Board of Regents PIG.

"They go on to say: 'On the surface, the revised version of the bill appears to be benign by making minor concessions to certain classifications of UH faculty' Now this is a true statement, but they go to say 'This is nothing other than a veiled attempt for the Legislature to trump the authority of the Board of Regents'.

"Again, this bill is benign and directs the Board of Regents to discuss and adopt the recommendations of the BOR's Permitted Interaction Group (PIG) Task group and restores funding."

Senator Taniguchi rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“Floor Amendment 3 addresses sister-state and sister-city relations in House Concurrent Resolution 32. The sixth ‘Be it resolved’ in the resolution calls for cutting off any existing relations with Russian or Belarusian provinces or cities. Currently, the State of Hawai‘i does not have any sister-state relations in Russia, but we believe the City and County of Honolulu has a sister-city relation with a city in Russia.

“International sister-state relations are not completely government-to-government activities. They are meant to be individual-elected-official-to-elected-official relations and ultimately citizen-to-citizen relations. That is at the heart of these relationships.

“Floor Amendment 3 encourages continued efforts to work for peace and to promote international goodwill through sister-state and sister-city relations as a way to counter the national Russian government’s current war policies in Ukraine. I ask for your support for this amendment.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 3 was put by the Chair and carried.

At this time, Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

"Colleagues, each year, the chairs of the Senate and House Education committees designate a week during which we invite teachers, students, and education professionals to the Capitol to be recognized during floor presentations and education-related events. This week marks our 2022 Education Week. But, as was the case last year, limited public access to the Capitol and to the

Senate floor required us to do things differently once again. Instead of public and in-person presentations, our honorees are receiving their official Senate congratulatory certificates by mail along with a program booklet that you have on your desk and a small makana. In this case, a Senate lapel pin is the small makana. It's included to further express our recognition, admiration, and gratitude for their achievements and for their contributions to educational excellence in our schools.

"Let us be clear: the fact that we are not able to recognize our honorees in person does not in any way diminish their awesome accomplishments. Indeed, the fact that they were able to do the things they did and carry on in an ambitious, orderly, and professional manner despite the tremendous challenges faced in pandemic mode speaks volumes about their capabilities; their focus; and their stick-to-it, can-do approach to their task at hand. For this, they deserve perhaps even greater praise. Their determination has been truly inspiring.

"This week, we recognize teaching excellence, student achievement, and campus leadership. Those we honor are just a few of the thousands who are involved in the total Department of Education effort in our state. We must never forget how important education is in building successful futures for our keiki, their families, and our communities. Education is and can be a great equalizer. As chair of your Committee on Education, that inspires my work every day.

"Mr. President and colleagues, you have each received a program booklet for Education Week 2022. I urge you to read about the exceptional people we recognize this year and take to heart their focus and dedication. Today, we will pay tribute to teachers of excellence. Mahalo to my fellow senators for their participation in this week's program.

"Each year, the state Department of Education solicits nominations for classroom educators to be honored as Teachers of the Year. One teacher is selected by a committee from each of the state's school complex areas and one from public charter school campuses. Our teachers are—along with healthcare workers and first responders—true heroes in the way they have adapted to the new rules of behavior brought on by the pandemic. These are the 2022 Teachers of the Year from our neighbor islands. I call on Senator Acasio to begin our presentations."

Senator Acasio rose to present the following remarks:

"Mr. President, I am pleased to recognize Whitney Aragaki from Waiākea High School. Whitney is Teacher of the Year from the DOE's Hilo-Waiākea complex. She was also designated the Teacher of the Year for the State of Hawai'i for 2022 and is also a finalist for National Teacher of the Year honors.

"Whitney is a Waiākea alum who returned to her alma mater, where she is a tenth-grade biology and advanced placement environmental science teacher. Whitney was previously honored as a 2019 and 2021 state finalist for the Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching. She serves as lead teacher for the Waiākea High Public Services Academy and in numerous other capacities on campus as an inspirational leader for her colleagues and her students.

"We congratulate Whitney Aragaki and wish her well as she competes for national honors. I call on Senator Kanuha to continue our program."

Senator Kanuha rose to present the following remarks:

"Mr. President, I am honored to acknowledge 'Aina Akamu, a resident of Senate District 3, as the Teacher of the Year from the Ka'ū-Kea'au-Pāhoa complex. 'Aina is a teacher at Ka'ū High School and Pāhala Elementary School, where he serves as

a career and technical education teacher and Early College coordinator.

"In his CTE role, he blends academic and technical skills with a focus on easing his students' way into the labor market. His hands-on instruction guides students through a diverse range of studies, including engineering, construction, culinary arts, agriculture, and entrepreneurship.

"We are indebted to 'Aina for his devotion to the diverse futures of his students, and congratulate him for having received this recognition. Senator Inouye has our next presentation."

The Chair made the following comments:

"Before recognizing Senator Inouye, I just wanted to say: Senator Kanuha, I had the opportunity to hear 'Aina present at a conference, and all of these accolades are well-deserved and he was outstanding. He received a standing ovation from the people in attendance."

Senator Inouye rose to present the following remarks:

"Mr. President, John Capdepon is the 2022 Teacher of the Year for the Honoka'a-Kealakehe-Kohala-Konawaena complex. John is a teacher at Honoka'a Elementary who moved several years ago to Hawai'i island from Japan, where he taught English.

"Over the past six years, he has been a dedicated advocate for the Honoka'a community and, among other things, assisted the school in applying for and receiving several grants to create an on-campus garden and a burgeoning garden program at the school. John has taken to heart the concept that schools form a vital bond among students, teachers, their families, and their communities—and everyone benefits from this mutually supportive dynamic.

"Congratulations, John Capdepon. Mahalo for your service and your invaluable contributions to the Honoka'a 'ohana. Now I call on Senator Kidani."

On behalf of Senator Keith-Agaran, Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

"Mr. President, on behalf of Senator Keith-Agaran, who is unable to join us today, I have the honor to introduce to you the Maui District Teacher of the Year. As Senator Keith-Agaran would say: *Maui nō ka 'oi!* It is my privilege to recognize Lisa Yamada, selected by her peers as 2022 Teacher of the Year from the Baldwin-Maui-Kekaulike complex.

"Lisa has been teaching third grade at Wailuku Elementary since 2010. After graduating from the UH Maui College of Education, she began teaching after overcoming tremendous challenges as a single mother of three young daughters. Lisa is open about being a survivor of domestic violence and assault, and she believes her experiences have helped her to become not only a stronger person but a better teacher as well. Over the years, Lisa has held leadership positions with HSTA. She wants to share this recognition with those who have supported her along her journey, acknowledging the award—in her words—as a 'well-woven quilt of love and determination.'

"Lisa has been a tremendous asset to Wailuku Elementary, and we are grateful for her dedication to the teaching profession. Let me now turn over the floor to Senator Baker."

Senator Baker rose to present the following remarks:

"President and colleagues, the Teacher of the Year from the Hāna-Lāhaināluna-Lāna'i-Moloka'i complex area is from Lāhaināluna High School: William Tatro. William left a career on Wall Street to become an educator. He currently serves as an on-campus scholars teacher and junior class advisor. As an educator, he has felt a deep sense of pride in observing students

as they explore their creativity and discover those 'aha!' moments through their educational journey. Lāhaināluna, which is proudly in my Senate district, currently boasts a hundred percent graduation rate, which is a point of pride near and dear to his heart and to all of us.

"Mahalo, William, for the perspective you bring to the Lāhaināluna campus, the oldest school west of the Rockies, and for your love of teaching. And now I would like to call on Senator Kidani to continue our presentations."

On behalf of Senate President Kouchi, Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

"Mr. President, with your consent and on your behalf, I would like to acknowledge the Teacher of the Year from among your Garden Island teacher corps. She is Theresa Malone of Kalaheo Elementary School in the Kapa'a-Kaua'i-Waimea complex. Theresa teaches fifth-grade students, focused on finding innovative ways to infuse critical thinking and inquiry through blended learning. In an effort to connect with her class, she has integrated daily morning meetings with students to empower their voices and lead conversations on their own interests and studies. We are so proud to have her talents and passion as a part of the teacher corps on Kaua'i, and I look forward to what she has on her agenda next."

And can we all give our Teachers of the Year applause? And, other senators, we will get to the Teachers of the Year—your honorees—tomorrow as our 2022 Education Week citations continue. The Senate is proud to honor Ashley Ito-Macion, a second-grade teacher at Kanoelani Elementary School in the Pearl City-Waipahu complex area. In response to the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic, our Teacher of the Year established the Hawaii Distance Forum, a dynamic educational platform dedicated to breaking down walls of vulnerability, building community, and shoring up teacher voices. More than 1,200 teachers shared lesson plans and participated in collegial training programs, which Ashley updates and maintains daily in support of Hawai‘i’s educators. Ashley’s desire to address educational needs and foster support and connection for both teachers and students has been especially welcomed during the stressful months dealing with the pandemic. We are so grateful for her initiative and talent that have helped the Kanoelani campus thrive. Mahalo nui, Ashley Ito-Macion. I’d like to now turn the program over to Senator Kim.”

Senator Kim rose to present the following remarks:

“Teacher of the Year Jim Kunimitsu, from the Campbell–Kapolei complex, is a fifth-grade teacher at Pohakea Elementary. Now, I know what you’re saying—Pohakea is in Senator Fevella’s district, but I get this honor because Jim is in my Senate district.

“Jim has been a dedicated public school educator for more than a dozen years. His passion for teaching is manifested in ways that he helps his students to find joy in learning. His path to teaching was inspired by the tremendous example set by his parents, both of whom are retired teachers. He attributes his success to the support he has received from his family and a wide circle of friends, colleagues, teachers, and mentors who have been an integral part of his growth.

“Mahalo to Jim Kunimitsu for his excellent work and sustained commitment to our students and his communities. And now I turn it over to Senator Shimabukuro.”

Senator Shimabukuro rose to present the following remarks:

“Teacher of the Year from Nānākuli–Wai‘anae complex is Wendy Gumm, a passionate grade three special education teacher at Nānāikapono Elementary School. Wendy was inspired to become a teacher thanks to the example of her grandmother, who was a proud educator for 40 years. She loves to see the growth of her students as they overcome their challenges and to see them improve their math and reading skills. Wendy believes that their school’s success is attributed to the caring, ‘ohana-focused atmosphere and the commitment of school staff to provide the highest quality education to their students. Senator Keohokalole will now continue our program.”

Senator Keohokalole rose to present the following remarks:

“It is my honor to acknowledge a Windward District Teacher of the Year. She is Miyuki Sekimitsu, a third-grade teacher at Kāne‘ohe Elementary in the Castle–Kahuku complex. Although she resides in Senator Ihara’s district, I have the honor to introduce Miyuki, whose school is located in my district.

“Miyuki has a strong commitment to providing a well-balanced, hands-on classroom environment. She focuses on cultivating meaningful relationships with students, families, and the local community that promote social, emotional, and academic growth for her students. She is an enthusiastic lifelong learner who has taken advantage of a variety of professional development opportunities.

“Miyuki’s six years at Kāne‘ohe Elementary have endeared her to colleagues and students alike, and we are grateful for her commitment to teaching. I now yield to Senator Rhoads.”

Senator Rhoads rose to present the following remarks:

"I am very pleased to recognize another Windward District teacher: Richard Lau, Teacher of the Year from the Kailua-Kalāheo complex. Richard is a veteran DOE professional who has spent most of his career at Kalāheo and, as noted, in this case, Richard resides in District 13 (the beautiful area I represent) but makes the trip for his work through the Ko'olaus to Kailua.

"Richard is currently student activities coordinator and advisor to the student council. His recent work has been especially helpful in implementing more than a hundred virtual and in-person student activities to address the social and emotional needs of students during distance and hybrid learning. A few years ago, he also established the Kalāheo High School Transition Center for new students and families in partnership with the Mark Takai Transition Center Network.

"Richard is one of many dedicated education professionals whose work is invaluable to the successful functioning of the multiple parts of our school system, and we extend a mahalo and congratulations for this latest honor. I'd like to ask Senator Misalucha to continue. Mahalo."

Senator Misalucha rose to present the following remarks:

"Trisha Gibson has been both a general and special education teacher for nearly 20 years. She is currently the academic coach for 'Aiea Elementary School and was selected Teacher of the Year from the 'Aiea-Moanalua-Radford complex. And, again, she commutes to 'Aiea from Senator Moriwaki's district, where she resides.

"While she has worked in a broad variety of roles over the years, Trisha notes that teaching and advocating for students with disabilities has been one of the highlights of her career. She believes all students should have opportunities to grow, learn, and participate in their school communities.

"Trisha is also grateful to be able to learn and network with other education leaders through personal and professional development opportunities, school and complex initiatives, and school service projects.

"Mahalo to Trisha, whose students are the fortunate beneficiaries of her solid commitment to teaching. I now turn the floor to Senator Dela Cruz."

Senator Dela Cruz rose to present the following remarks:

"I am so pleased to acquaint you with Dr. Jeni Nishimura Miyahira, Teacher of the Year from Mililani High School in the Leilehua-Mililani-Waialua complex. Dr. Miyahira is a curriculum coordinator at Mililani. She is acutely aware that it can often be difficult to support teachers in ways that align with practices that meet diverse school, complex, and state goals. With that in mind, Dr. Miyahira has focused on providing personalized professional development courses for her colleagues, a point of pride she considers one of her greatest accomplishments. Dr. Miyahira is also a lecturer for Early College opportunities at Leeward Community College. That program allows students to find a direct pathway to the University of Hawai'i System by completing college credits by the time they graduate from high school.

"Mahalo, Dr. Miyahira, for your work on behalf of fellow teachers and your students, and congratulations. I will now yield to Senator Ihara."

Senator Ihara rose to present the following remarks:

"Mr. President, Hawai'i's public charter schools have become a well-established and invaluable education resource for Hawai'i students because they offer educational choices, innovative curricular materials, and operate with substantial

flexibility. The 2022 Charter School's Teacher of the Year, Dr. Cara Chaudron, is in her seventh year of teaching sixth-grade math at the School for Examining Essential Questions of Sustainability, also known as SEEQS for short. Dr. Chaudron was blessed to be raised in a family that loved both teaching and learning. During her own student experience, she discovered that she sometimes needed a little time to get through some of the work, and she learned to become her own advocate for that accommodation. This is one of the reasons she is invaluable at SEEQS as she uses her own experience to work with each student to discover what their needs are and how to access their learning. Active listening, meeting students where they are, providing a safe space for them to learn, and empowering them to make their own inquiries and explorations fills Dr. Chaudron's days with energy and excitement.

"Congratulations and a big, big mahalo for Cara Chaudron. Mr. President, Senator Chang will make the next presentation. Thank you."

Senator Chang rose to present the following remarks:

"Teacher of the Year in the Farrington-Kaiser-Kalani complex this year is Wendy Shigeta from Hahaione Elementary School. During her tenure as an educator for more than three decades, Wendy has worked as both a teacher and school counselor. She served a term as the Hawaii School Counselor Association president several years ago and was named Hawaii School Counselor of the Year in 1995. Recognizing her teaching excellence, she received the Thomas Okamura Outstanding Teacher Award in 2000. At Hahaione, she is currently student services coordinator and student council advisor. Wendy comments that she has always viewed education as the foundation for our young people. She is justifiably proud that she has been able to contribute to strong foundations during her lifelong career commitment.

"Congratulations, Wendy Shigeta, Teacher of the Year! I now yield to Senator Moriwaki."

Senator Moriwaki rose to present the following remarks:

"It is my distinct honor and pleasure to acknowledge Corrie Izumoto from Kawanakoa Middle School as the 2022 Teacher of the Year for the Kaimuki-McKinley-Roosevelt complex. Corrie taught on the mainland and in Belgium before moving to Hawai'i many years ago. She has been a special and general education teacher for 10 years in various Hawai'i elementary and middle school grades and currently teaches grade six English at Kawanakoa. She now serves as advisor for the student council, drama and dance clubs, as well as taking on additional responsibilities as student activities coordinator. Corrie has become an invaluable asset to the school community, and I must say that I know firsthand of her commitment and passion to teaching our students because she does work with us, and she is the better half of my office manager, Charles, so I know that she works very hard.

"So, congratulations, Corrie. I'm very proud of you, and I'm very confident that we will be hearing more good things from you and Kawanakoa in the years ahead. I now turn the floor back to Senator Kidani."

Senator Kidani rose and stated:

"Thank you, colleagues. We have so far recognized just 17 of the several thousands of public school teachers in our state who each day go above and beyond to guide our youngsters, strengthen our families, and invest in successful communities. As I have said many times, they are superheroes, much like our healthcare workers and first responders, and we are so very grateful for their service. We will continue with our 2022 Education Week presentations tomorrow. Mahalo."

The Chair led the members in a round of applause for the recognized teachers.

The Chair then announced that there would be a leadership meeting immediately following adjournment.

At this time, Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

"I am pleased to continue with our Education Week program, during which we recognize excellence in teaching, scholarship, and campus leadership. Today, we extend our mahalo and congratulations to Hawai'i's Milken Foundation Educator. We will also recognize two science and math teachers who have received national recognition, and three outstanding Hawai'i school administrators.

"The Milken Educator Awards program, which was launched by the Milken Family Foundation in 1987, has been described as 'the Oscars of Teaching' by *Teacher* magazine. It is, perhaps, an overused characterization but nonetheless pretty accurate. The dramatic surprise announcements of winners, arranged at school assemblies, really are a surprise to the recipient—one of the coolest events I have had the privilege of attending. Seventy-nine Hawai'i teachers have received the awards, along with a total of \$1.9 million in cash prizes, since 1990. To recognize our Milken Educator today, I call on Senator Moriwaki."

Senator Moriwaki rose to present the following remarks:

"I am very honored to acknowledge the outstanding contributions of Michelle Le Iwasaki, Hawai'i's Milken Foundation Educator for 2022, who lives in the heart of our dynamic Kaka'ako district. Michelle is a National Board Certified Teacher and academic coach at Kalihi Kai Elementary, one of the excellent elementary schools in Senator Wakai's district.

"As an academic coach, Michelle has developed long-term solutions to support and serve her kindergarten, first-, and fifth-grade students. When Kalihi Kai partnered with Turnaround Arts in 2015, Michelle led the arts integration strategies into the school curriculum. The program had a profound impact on improving student performance in language arts, math, and science. Our honoree also conducts bimonthly classroom observations for her grade levels, shares data with teachers to help them elevate their instructional practices, and conducts walkthroughs and observation opportunities for new teachers.

"Michelle is among 60 nationwide nominees for the Milken Award for 2021-'22 and the only Milken Educator Award winner from Hawai'i. The award comes with an unrestricted \$25,000 cash prize to recognize her excellent work on behalf of our keiki. The Milken Award sends a strong message to teachers: we recognize you, we value you, we thank you. And so do we in the Senate—a warm aloha and mahalo to Michelle Le Iwasaki from all of us who value what you contribute to our keiki and our state. Mahalo. I now turn it back to Senator Kidani."

The Chair commented:

"Before turning it back to you, Senator Kidani, just editorial correction: as Senator Kidani said in her opening remarks, there's been over \$1.9 million awarded to teachers here in Hawai'i. Senator Moriwaki said, 'The only Hawai'i teacher (the only Hawai'i teacher **this** year) to get the Milken Award.' There's certainly been many others, as pointed out by Senator Kidani."

Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

"Previous Hawai'i Milken Educator Award winners have selected Jenna Oskey as a Milken Teacher of Promise. The award annually recognizes teachers who showcase educational excellence and the highest qualities of a professional educator during their first four semesters in the classroom and who demonstrate tremendous promise at the onset of their teaching careers.

"Jenna is a special education teacher at Kanoelani Elementary School, a truly excellent campus in my Senate district. Her demonstrated leadership and desire to cultivate student learning in a digital environment has helped guide her veteran colleagues through the challenges of the pandemic. Not only has she shown her ability to adapt to the changing times, but she has also become a respected leader who has proven how she can advance school goals and practices with new technologies. Mahalo, Jenna, for your dedication to the teaching profession. We look forward to sharing more of your accomplishments in the years ahead."

Senator Kidani continued:

"I will continue with campus leadership. Campus leadership is very critical to school, teacher, and student successes this year. We join professional organizations in congratulating three outstanding administrators. I will now call on Senator Chang to begin our next series of awardees."

Senator Chang rose to present the following remarks:

"The Hawai'i Association of Secondary School Principals has selected Dr. Reid Kuba as the Hawaii State Principal of the Year for 2022. Dr. Kuba is principal at Jarrett Middle School in Senator Ihara's district (named for our colleague from the Windward side). I am pleased to count him as a resident in my district.

"Dr. Kuba proudly notes Jarrett Middle School as the only middle-level school on O'ahu to perform above their academic and low socioeconomic status potential for the past five years. The school's evolution is a testament to the supportive and nurturing environment among Jarrett's broader community. Dr. Kuba also notes the many challenges that students and parents have navigated throughout the pandemic, including a lack of access to technology, language barriers, and other communication difficulties. With his guidance, the school community was able to effectively integrate health and safety messages across the campus in alignment with the school's mission and vision.

"We appreciate Dr. Kuba's leadership in the trying circumstances of the past two years. His work benefits the extended school community of teachers, students, and families. I turn now to Senator Nishihara."

Senator Nishihara rose to present the following remarks:

"Our next honoree was selected by the National Association of Elementary School Principals as a National Distinguished Principal. She is Lisa Ann Higa, principal at Nānākuli Elementary School in Senator Shimabukuro's district. Lisa Ann commutes to work from my Senate District 17.

"In a diverse, multicultural school with nearly 86 percent of students identifying as Native Hawaiian, Lisa Ann has been a steadfast advocate for Native Hawaiian students and families, partnering with them to promote Hawaiian culture within the school community. She has championed whole-child initiatives to better support student needs as a way to address academic disparities through collaborative leadership and evidence-based practices based in culture and compassion. Thanks to Principal Higa's efforts, Nānākuli Elementary is noted for launching the first pre-K pilot program within the complex that focuses on establishing clear foundations for academic numeracy and literacy.

"We are grateful for Principal Higa's immersion into the community environment in Nānākuli and wish her well for more successes in the years ahead. Now, let me turn the program over to Senator Gabbard for our next presentation."

Senator Gabbard rose to present the following remarks:

"The total administrative team is important to campus leadership successes, and so the professional organization that recognizes principals also honors assistant principals as well. This year, we extend congratulations to Jacob Kardash, selected as Hawai'i Distinguished Assistant Principal.

"Vice Principal Kardash is a constituent of my district, a former science teacher who now serves as vice principal for Mililani Middle School. As an educator and administrator, he shares that the safety and wellbeing of everyone on campus is his top priority, helping them navigate the challenges of the pandemic and continuing to thrive in its wake. In the past five years, Jacob realized a professional goal in his education career by establishing an international partnership with several public and private schools in Japan. With the support of the nonprofit Hawaii Global Education Foundation, Mililani Middle students are able to travel abroad to visit their sister schools, offering immersive opportunities to further their studies and intercultural explorations.

"Mahalo to Vice Principal Jacob Kardash for his fine work, past and present. Mililani Middle School is fortunate to benefit from his initiatives and leadership. Senator Keohokalole continues with our next presentation."

Senator Keohokalole rose to present the following remarks:

"The Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching is one of the nation's most prestigious education honors. The growing impact of technology has continued to transform our education system, making STEM knowledge an essential tool for the advancement and success of today's students. Recipients of this award receive generous funding from the National Science Foundation as well as an opportunity to participate in discussions on STEM and STEM education priorities to develop essential curricula.

"Our first Presidential Award winner is Wrayna Fairchild, who lives on the windward side in my district but is a teacher at Voyager Public Charter School in Senator Taniguchi's district. Teaching took Wrayna around the globe before she moved to Hawai'i. For the past four years, she's been an enthusiastic and inspirational teacher of students in grades kindergarten through six at Voyager Public Charter School. She is passionate about providing opportunities for her students to learn through design thinking and the natural environment. She is a lifelong learner herself and thrives on new learning opportunities, routinely developing her knowledge and skill sets through numerous cohort and fellowship programs.

"Voyager has provided the perfect environment for Wrayna Fairchild's expansive vision and teaching talents. Her Presidential Award is well-deserved. Senator Rhoads has our next presentation."

Senator Rhoads rose to present the following remarks:

"A second Presidential Award was announced for a Hawai'i teacher this year; it went to Crystal Doi. At the time of her nomination for the award, Crystal was teaching at Nu'uuanu Elementary School, where she founded and ran the school's STEM curriculum for all grades, kindergarten through grade five. Now at Kapunahala, Crystal teaches grade-six math and science, and I'm sure she is a welcome addition to students and fellow teachers with her singular focus on STEM education.

"By the way, it's not all math and science for Crystal. While at Nu'uuanu Elementary, she also served as the teacher coordinator for the school's gardening and nutrition program, "ĀINA in Schools," which was founded by renowned Hawai'i musician Jack Johnson. Thank you, Crystal, for sharing your talents to the betterment of our schools and communities. I yield the floor to Senator Kidani."

Senator Kidani rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, colleagues, for your participation in our Education Week presentations. The wealth of talent and dedication to Hawai'i's future that we share this week are truly remarkable. We will hear more during tomorrow's session. Mahalo."

"Thank you, Mr. President, and mahalo for your commitment to this annual recognition of excellence in our schools. Today, we will tell you about some students who have distinguished themselves during the year. They are just a few of the several thousands of young people who each day go above and beyond during the year to accomplish remarkable things.

"You may recall that Prudential Financial has been a regular supporter of young people who create and carry out meaningful community service projects that really do help others. Here is Senator Moriwaki to highlight one young woman."

Senator Moriwaki rose to present the following remarks:

She established a nine-episode cybersecurity course, CyberSafety 101, and made it available on her website and YouTube. She also partnered with local nonprofits AARP Hawaii, the Lanakila Senior Center, and local senior care homes throughout the state to offer the course as well as more than 40 other digital resources in the community. Through her initiative, Esther aimed to educate older adults about cybersecurity threats such as phishing, malware, and viruses in an effort to fight cybercrime, and encourage seniors to live a healthy digital lifestyle. She has continued exploring digital solutions by co-founding a coding club at Punahou, where members can help her with projects such as Cyber Safe Seniors.

"We applaud Esther's initiatives and wish her well as she pursues her education goals. Our next presenter is Senator Nishihara."

Senator Nishihara rose to present the following remarks:

"Hawaii's LifeSmarts program gives students a real-life experience in personal finance, health and safety, the environment, and technology, along with consumer rights and responsibilities. The LifeSmarts program was created by the National Consumers League and is sponsored in Hawaii by the state Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs in partnership with the Hawaii Credit Union League. LifeSmarts is a free educational program that prepares students to enter the real world as smart consumers by teaching them the skills they need to succeed in a modern global marketplace.

"Three teams from two O'ahu schools emerged as winners in this year's 18th annual statewide competition. I am so pleased to note that first- and second-place honors went to teams from Waipahu High School.

"The first-place finishers in Waipahu Team #3 were Ross Cadelina, Estefany Bayudan, Isabella Delos Santos, and Keziah Ancheta. The team will represent Hawaii at the National LifeSmarts competition in Washington, D.C.

"In second place, Waipahu Team #1 included Vianne Jazmine Acdal, Serenity Kalai, Colby Macapagal, and Hunter Von Tungeln.

"Both of these outstanding teams are coached by Cindy Takara, who has done a remarkable job in a variety of student activities for many years at Waipahu High School. Most of the competitors are pictured in the Education Week program booklet. We offer our congratulations to everyone who contributed to the success these young people have enjoyed. Senator Chang has more about LifeSmarts. Thank you."

Senator Chang rose to present the following remarks:

"I join Senator Nishihara in congratulating the top teams in the LifeSmarts program, and I am so pleased to note that third place went to a team from Kalani High School. Team members include Caity Achay, Elena Terebenkov, Allison Vuong, Brandon Tran, and Phuong Huynh. To them and their coach Mike Zane, our best wishes and congratulations. We are also grateful to DCCA and the Credit Union League for all of the hard work that goes into organizing and staging this kind of competitive program. I turn now to Senator Fevella."

"The American School Counselor Association recognizes counseling professionals in elementary, middle, and high schools throughout the United States for their devotion to the academic and career success of their students as well as their social and emotional wellbeing. "Last month, Nicole attended the 2022 School Counselor of the Year ceremony in Washington, D.C., where she and other committed school counselors were celebrated. Congratulations, Nicole Blomberg, for this well-deserved honor. I yield the floor to Senator Dela Cruz."

“Mahalo, colleagues. We are recognizing educators this week for their accomplishments that demonstrate outstanding dedication to their chosen profession. We all benefit from their commitment and are grateful for the opportunity to share their stories. Beginning our presentations today on the last day of this week, Education Week, I call on Senator DeCoite.”

Senator DeCoite rose to present the following remarks:

“Each year, the *School Library Journal* and Scholastic celebrate extraordinary K–12 library professionals with their School Librarian of the Year award. Honorees are distinguished by their accomplishments and use of technology to engage students in a wide range of literacies. Librarian of the Year for Hawai’i is Diane Mokuau from Moloka’i High School. I should note, Mr. President, that this award was announced a year ago, but it was too late for us to include Diane in the Education Week honors in 2021. I should also note that this is truly a big deal: Diane is one of only two librarians selected for this honor nationwide.

“Diane has been a dedicated leader at Moloka’i High for the past two decades, serving not only as the school librarian but also as the district’s curriculum coordinator and union representative. She has received notable recognition over her illustrious career, including a 2016 Golden Key Award from the Hawai’i Association of School Librarians. In 2019, Diane was named NEA Foundation Hawai’i Teacher of the Year. Diane was the first National Board Certified Teacher librarian on Moloka’i. Our honoree has always tried to create a safe and welcoming environment for students, families, and community members. She loves creating meaningful connections through reading and special events such as book fairs, poetry slams, author visits, and ‘ohana nights. As a national award recipient, Diane appeared on the cover of the April 2021 issue of *School Library Journal*. The award included a \$2,500 cash prize, digital and print resources, and a collection of books for the school library, and an additional gift of one book for every student at Moloka’i High.

“Congratulations to Diane; we are so grateful for your work that benefits our students and the Moloka’i community. Here is Senator Dela Cruz to continue our presentations.”

Senator Dela Cruz rose to present the following remarks:

“The National Blue Ribbon Schools program was established in 1982 to recognize the state’s top performing public and non-public schools across the country who have successfully closed achievement gaps in English and math as measured by state assessments. Three Hawai’i campuses earned distinction as

Blue Ribbon Schools this year, and I am pleased that one of them is in my district.

“We salute Major Sheldon Wheeler Middle School, located at Wheeler Army Airfield just outside of Wahiawā. Wheeler Middle School exceeded statewide averages in English language arts and math by more than 15 percentage points in the selection year. A first-time Blue Ribbon School, Wheeler Middle attributes its academic success to a dynamic and adaptive school culture shaped by the administrative team led by Principal Brenda Vierra-Chun. The school includes a highly transient military student population, with 97 percent of students coming from military families, which can sometimes be very challenging. Principal Vierra-Chun and her team have successfully met academic and social-emotional wellbeing goals to earn this singular honor.

“Congratulations to Major Sheldon Wheeler Middle School, another Blue Ribbon School of excellence in our public school network. I yield to Senator Taniguchi.”

Senator Taniguchi rose to present the following remarks:

“Big congratulations to my alma mater, Mānoa Elementary School, a U.S. Department of Education National Blue Ribbon School, led by then-principal Ryan Kusuda at the time of nomination. Under his leadership, math and English scores improved significantly over the evaluated time period, far exceeding statewide averages in English language arts by more than 20 percent and in math by 26 percent.

“Now led by Principal Jason Okamoto, Mānoa Elementary School is a vibrant campus due to a diverse range of enrichment opportunities, including the gifted and talented program, an active student government, and an award-winning robotics program. Mr. President, I should note that Mānoa Elementary was also named a Blue Ribbon School in 1986, and so there’s a long tradition of excellence at this legacy public school. Another key to success is that the Mānoa Association of Parents & Teachers has provided strong support and resources to keep parents and students engaged with the greater community.

“We are proud of our schools in the valley and expect to hear more of their successes in the years ahead. I now yield to Senator Rhoads.”

Senator Rhoads rose to present the following remarks:

“Colleagues, Ma’ema’e Elementary School is a first-time National Blue Ribbon School this year. The campus is a consistent top-performing public school and earned its current accolades by improving English language arts assessment scores by more than 18 percent and scores in math by 27 percent. Ma’ema’e attributes its academic success to an innovative and nurturing school culture as well as their focus on technology. With a goal of nurturing 21st century learners, Ma’ema’e has been able to encourage critical thinking skills related to information, media, and digital technology. The systems in place have helped to improve an already-strong foundation of parent engagement and community support to new levels of success. Campus leadership is provided by Principal Lenn Uyeda, and we are grateful for the school’s whole-campus and community commitment to excellence. I would like to yield the floor to Senator Kidani. Mahalo.”

Senator Kidani rose and stated:

“Thank you, Senate President, colleagues. Can we please give a round of applause to all of our awardees today? Mr. President, as you can imagine, the challenge for Education Week each year is not being able to acknowledge the full scope of teacher, student, and campus leadership accomplishments. As noted, our honorees this year represent just a few of the

dedicated educators and students who work so hard on our behalf to create Hawai‘i’s futures.

“Good news about our public schools is reported almost daily by the media. We relish the attention they bring and, as keepers of the budget, we try to commit sufficient resources to make sure our education leaders are able to do more and to do it better. Mahalo for your participation again this year, colleagues and Senate President. We look forward to the time ahead when we can congratulate and express our thanks to our honorees once again in person. Mahalo.”

Wednesday, March 23, 2022

The Senate of the Thirty-First Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2022, convened at 11:48 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The Senate of the Thirty-First Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2022, convened at 11:37 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

At this time, Senator Baker reminded the members that the Women's Legislative Caucus's Easter basket drive was underway and that they were hoping to collect baskets for women who were moving from shelters into their first house or apartment. Senator Baker noted that the baskets would be made available for pickup on April 7th and that her office would be happy to store any baskets until then. Senator Baker commented that she had picked up enough items for two baskets and that her office was on their road to getting something that would be very helpful for some disadvantaged women in the community. Senator Baker then expressed her appreciation for the members' participation.

Senator Taniguchi noted that that day marked the opening of the celebration of the 175th anniversary of Washington Place and that there had been a ceremony that morning at which fourth-grade groups from three different schools had danced the hula, along with a number of fourth-grade classes throughout the state. Senator Taniguchi commented that a number of former governors and first ladies had been in attendance, including Governor Ariyoshi and his wife, Governor Waihe'e, Vicky Cayetano, and Governor Abercrombie and his wife, and that it had been a very nice ceremony. Senator Taniguchi then noted that two Senate staff members, Jacob Aki and Roth Puahala, had also participated and had done a very good job.

FORTY-SECOND DAY

Friday, April 1, 2022

The Senate of the Thirty-First Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2022, convened at 11:40 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present, with the exception of Senators Ihara and Misalucha who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-First Day.

At this time, Senator Shimabukuro acknowledged a group of students seated in the gallery who had participated in the statewide Rapid 'Ōhi'a Death Outreach program, which seeks to protect and promulgate the healthy growth of the endemic 'ōhi'a lehua. Senator Shimabukuro then introduced Kailee Lefebvre, who was also present in the gallery, noting that Ms. Lefebvre had helped train each of the students about the 'ōhi'a struggles, allowing them to engage the Legislature in their desire to ensure the robust growth of 'ōhi'a in their own futures and beyond.

Senator Taniguchi welcomed teachers and students participating in the day's 'Ōhi'a Warrior Legislative Workshop, which included Mānoa Elementary School fifth graders in Lisa Secreto's class. Present with Ms. Secreto in the gallery were student teacher Sydney and students James Alipio-Gerry, Abigail Alo, Judah Althof, Zane Dalgamouni, Matisse Esparza-Queloz, Jayzen Ichiyama, Madison Garcia, Olivia Liu, Xavier Mals, Miriya Matsumoto, Ethan Moszkowicz, Teheira Pimental, Wyatt Robinson, Tuialofa Scanlan, Brycen Sogawa, Venice Sueblinvong, and Marnie Ushijima.

Senator Keohokalole noted that the Coordinating Group on Alien Pest Species and the Rapid 'Ōhi'a Death Outreach team had worked to bridge the gap between Hawai'i's legislature and students across the state by engaging the students in a real-life experience advocating for a bill to designate 'ōhi'a lehua Hawai'i's state endemic tree. Senator Keohokalole then recognized the motivated Aloha Ambassadors from Kāne'ohe Elementary School. Present in the gallery were Aloha Ambassador club advisor Kumu Kathy and third-, fourth-, and fifth-grade students Aezyn Asia, Abigail Fong, Akio Hayashi, Paige Pana, Georgia Pakele, Cade Yamada, Olive Dumaran, Kahea Nalu'ai, Makalehua Pelletier, Avalon Spencer, Isabela Duenas, and Tatiana Pana.

Senator Shimabukuro thanked her staff for presenting the workshop, and the teachers and students for their monumental efforts in recognizing and protecting 'ōhi'a lehua as a culturally significant icon of Hawai'i. Senator Shimabukuro commented that S.B. No. 2059, which had been introduced by Senator Inouye of Hawai'i island, had successfully navigated through both the Senate and the House and was expected to cross over back to the Senate the following week. Senator Shimabukuro noted that this was quite an achievement by the young guests in the gallery, and thanked everyone for their work.

Senator Lee introduced members of his staff who were seated in the gallery: office manager Matt Prellberg, Katie Pacheco, Haley Yoshioka, and Rosario Joaquin.

Senator Keohokalole recognized Christy Martin, administrator of the Coordinating Group on Alien Pest Species, who was present in the gallery. Senator Keohokalole noted that Ms. Martin was his former boss, as his first job out of law school was with the Coordinating Group on Alien Pest Species. Senator Keohokalole then introduced former Department of Agriculture director Scott Enright as well as former Senate colleague and current United States Representative for the

second congressional district Kai Kahele, who were also seated in the gallery.

On behalf of Senate President Kouchi, Senator Kanuha introduced members of Senate President Kouchi's family from Seattle. Present in the gallery were Valerie Kato, her husband Kelly Berry, and their twin sons, Masa and Takeshi Berry. Senator Kanuha noted that April was Child Abuse Prevention Month, and that they were all wearing blue today.

Mahalo.”

Senator Riviere rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I respect the comments of the previous speaker regarding the D.C. situation; however, my preference would be that the residents, maybe, that we consider them becoming part of Maryland as opposed to a new state. So, I’m going to be voting in opposition to S.C.R. 195. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I rise in support of the resolution that Senator Rhoads authored, and I just wanted to ask that the words of that senator be inserted into the Journal as my own. (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.) I used to work in D.C. as well. Mahalo.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.C.R. No. 195, entitled: “SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION URGING MEMBERS OF THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO ENACT FEDERAL LEGISLATION GRANTING STATEHOOD TO THE PEOPLE OF WASHINGTON, D.C.,” was adopted, with Senator Riviere voting “No.”

"The proposed S.D. includes an amendment that would extend the state earned income tax credit. Your Committee is requesting a waiver to hear the proposed draft and meet the single referral deadline."

Senator Dela Cruz announced that the Committee on Ways and Means would be holding a public hearing on the measure the following morning at 10:40 a.m. in Conference Room 211 and via videoconference.

Senator Baker reminded the members that the Women's Legislative Caucus hoped they were filling their Easter baskets so that the Caucus could provide them to the various agencies that help women and children. Senator Baker noted that a couple baskets had come to her office, and that if members would like the baskets out of their offices, they could bring

them to Room 230, where they would be gotten out the door on April 7th.

Senator Kim rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"There is no shortage of tough issues, and this body especially has certainly worked on and embraced a number of tough issues and looking at the best interest of our state. House Bill 2024 is certainly one of those very tough issues that we need to deal with and not just ignore it. As the Senate passed out Senate Draft 1, it's in the Ways and Means committee, and we are continually working on it. As I said, the bill is a work in progress—it is not a perfect bill—there are a lot of moving parts to it. And so we are consistently working on it to see that we can come up with a reasonable and a workable proposal, and so it really bothers me that the governor, last night in an interview, came out and talked about how the bill would kill astronomy because, certainly, S.D. 1 shows that this body is really concerned about astronomy and how it is important to our state.

"I would like to remind this body that it was the governor who placed the moratorium on Mauna Kea that caused a lot of the community concerns and the problems that we are now experiencing with the observatories and the astronomy program. Also, it was the governor who signed the letter to the Board of Regents—and the regents asked him to do it—so that they could delay adopting the administrative rules, which, again, led to some of the concerns that is going on with the community.

"I would like to also point out that never once since we got this measure has the governor reached out to this body, reached out to me—has never given us any suggestions, did not put in any testimony. And so, certainly, we need to work together. I've reached out with the House; I've reached out to the working group, reached out to the observatories, with UH: we've been working on this measure. And so the governor has been silent, and that's fine. If you want to be silent on it, it's okay. But then to come out and to then criticize us and saying we're killing astronomy, I think that he needs to step up and he should contact us, and if he has a proposal, I'm more than open to it—I've been very open to all the suggestions, read all the testimonies and taking that into consideration. And so I challenge the governor to work with us so we can find and craft something because if we do nothing, I believe that the protests will continue and that we are not going to resolve anything. Thank you, Mr. President."

"The first concern is a track record that shows G.M. 685 takes positions against conservation in favor of development. After my interview with said G.M., I remain highly concerned with his lack of knowledge of the precautionary principle and, more importantly, the public trust doctrine, which is a constitutional priority that this position is entrusted to uphold and to dutifully apply.

"Secondly, I want to give voice to individuals who have reached out to me directly expressing their concerns and sharing their personal experiences but aren't at liberty to be public with these concerns. The words they used to describe the experience of working with the nominee were, 'silencing of opposing viewpoints,' 'bullying,' 'aggressive behavior,' and even 'harassment.' In addition to the workplace safety issue these concerns raise, we must ask ourselves how such tendencies would impact the Board's productivity.

"The nominee's likely confirmation today leaves me hoping, now that these concerns have been voiced, that G.M. 685 will take them to heart as he engages with fellow colleagues and the public to fulfill the important fiduciary responsibilities of this position. Mahalo."

In order for the bill not to be vulnerable to a dormant commerce clause challenge, we would like to add the words, 'or is' to the revision as follows, 'It shall be unlawful for any person to import into, export from, sell in, harvest from, or offer for sale in the State any coral product; provided that the coral product is an endangered species or is native to Hawaii.' Thank you."

SECTION 1. House Bill 1539, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, section 5, is amended to read as follows:

“SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.”

H.B. No. 1600, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

Senator Dela Cruz moved that H.B. No. 1600, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Dela Cruz then offered the following floor amendment (Floor Amendment No. 5) to H.B. No. 1600, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 1600, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, is amended by deleting SECTION 3 found at page 1, line 8, to page 65, line 7, and inserting in its place a new SECTION 3 to read as follows:

“SECTION 3. APPROPRIATIONS. The following sums, or so much thereof as may be sufficient to accomplish the purposes and programs designated herein, are hereby appropriated or authorized, as the case may be, from the means of financing specified to the expending agencies designated for the fiscal biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023. The total expenditures and the number of positions in each fiscal year of the biennium shall not exceed the sums and the position ceilings indicated for each fiscal year, except as provided elsewhere in this Act, or as provided by general law.*

SECTION 2. House Bill No. 1600, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, is amended by deleting SECTION 4 found at page 66, line 1 to page 109, line 6, and inserting in its place a new SECTION 4 to read as follows:

SECTION 4. Part III of Act 88, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, is amended as follows:

1. By adding nine new sections under the heading “ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT” to read as follows:

“SECTION 6.01. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for strategic marketing and support (BED100), the sum of \$200,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for international sister state relations with Hawaii's sister states in Japan; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 6.02. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for Hawaii technology development corporation (BED143), the sum of \$3,500,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 shall be expended for various grant programs and \$1,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the state match to establish the Hawaii office of naval research grant program; provided further that the moneys provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that any moneys that remain unencumbered on June 30, 2023, shall lapse on that date.

SECTION 6.03. Provided that out of the American Rescue Plan Act appropriations for the Hawaii community development authority (BED150), the sum of \$13,874,350 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for infrastructure upgrades at Kalaeloa, Oahu, for needy families.

SECTION 6.04. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for Hawaii housing finance and development corporation (BED160), the sum of \$300,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the purposes for which the rental housing revolving fund was established; provided further that the moneys appropriated shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that any moneys that remain unencumbered on June 30, 2024, shall lapse on that date.

SECTION 6.05. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for Hawaii housing finance and development corporation (BED160), the sum of \$10,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the purposes of establishing an equity program to address the high, unmet demand of for-sale units by Hawaii residents, specifically those residents earning more than eighty per cent and up to one hundred twenty per cent of the area median income; provided further that the moneys appropriated shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that any moneys that remain unencumbered on June 30, 2024, shall lapse on that date.

SECTION 6.06. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for Hawaii housing finance and development corporation (BED160), the sum of \$5,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the purpose of providing, in whole or in part, loans to nonprofit community development financial institutions and nonprofit housing development organizations for the development of affordable homeownership housing projects; provided further that the moneys provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that any moneys that remain unencumbered on June 30, 2024, shall lapse on that date.

SECTION 6.07. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for agricultural resource management (AGR141), the sum of \$26,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended to repair and expand the spillway associated with the Wahiawa irrigation system and to bring the spillway into compliance with all relevant dam safety requirements and to acquire a fee simple interest in the spillway associated with the Wahiawa irrigation system; provided that the terms of sale shall be conditioned on an appraisal of the property pursuant to section 171-30, Hawaii Revised Statutes; provided further that the moneys provided for in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that all moneys from the appropriation that are unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

SECTION 6.08. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for general administration for agriculture (AGR192), the sum of \$100,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the agriculture workforce development program for agriculture licensure, credentials, and certificates; provided further that the department of agriculture shall partner with the department of education and the university of Hawaii community colleges in creating a pipeline for non-credit courses at the community colleges; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 6.09. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for fisheries management (LNR153), the sum of \$1,327,059 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the payroll and operational costs of the division of fisheries management; provided further that the department of land and natural resources shall continue to work with the department of agriculture on a pilot program at Wahiawa reservoir to implement Act 223, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund June 30, 2023.”

2. By adding after the new SECTION 6.09 added by item 1 of this section, a new subject heading entitled “EMPLOYMENT” and a new section to read as follows:

SECTION 6.10. Provided that out of the American Rescue Plan funds appropriation for office of community services (LBR903), the sum of \$2,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for emergency food assistance programs in each county as follows:

(1) City and county of Honolulu - \$1,220,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023;

(2) County of Hawaii - \$400,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023;

(3) County of Maui - \$260,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023; and

(4) County of Kauai - \$120,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023;

provided further that funds shall only be awarded to The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) of the Food and Nutrition Service of the United States Department of Agriculture-approved programs; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.”

3. By adding after the new SECTION 6.10 added by item 2 of this section, a new subject heading entitled “TRANSPORTATION FACILITIES” and a new section to read as follows:

“TRANSPORTATION FACILITIES

SECTION 6.11. Provided that out of the special fund appropriation for highways administration (TRN595), the sum of \$2,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the coordinated removal of albizia and other invasive trees that potentially threaten the public roadways and utility infrastructure on public and private land; provided further that the funds are matched on a two-to-one basis from a public utilities source; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.”

4. By adding after the new SECTION 6.11 added by item 3 of this section, a new subject heading entitled “ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION” and a new section to read as follows:

“ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

SECTION 6.12. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for LNR – natural and physical environment (LNR906), the sum of \$144,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023, including two permanent full-time equivalent (2.0 FTE) cultural resource specialist III positions, shall be expended for the Kahoolawe island reserve commission; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.”

5. By adding three new sections under the heading “HEALTH” to read as follows:

“SECTION 8.01. Provided that of the special fund appropriation for Hawaii health systems corporation – regions (HTH212), the sum of \$35,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for operating costs, including costs associated with four hundred forty full-time equivalent (440.0 FTE) pre-existing positions, for the Oahu region.

SECTION 8.02. Provided that of the American Rescue Plan Act appropriation for Hawaii health systems corporation – regions (HTH212), the sum of \$20,218,840 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the Oahu region.

SECTION 8.03. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for state laboratory services (HTH710), the sum of \$14,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for planning, design, repairs, renovation, and modernization of existing laboratories; provided further that the funds provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.”

6. By adding four new sections under the heading “SOCIAL SERVICES” to read as follows:

“SECTION 9.01. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for homeless services (HMS224), the sum of \$2,567,200 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for one permanent full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) program specialist V position (SR24) and for the establishment, implementation, and administration of two homeless triage center pilot programs that serves as a crisis assessment and management center; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 9.02. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for Hawaii public housing authority administration (HMS229), the sum of \$1,500,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended by the Hawaii public housing authority to support the state rent supplement program; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 9.03. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for Hawaii public housing authority administration (HMS229), the sum of \$25,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended to rehabilitate, remodel, renovate, and repair at least two hundred fifty housing units; provided further that funds provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

SECTION 9.04. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for general administration – DHS (HMS904), the sum of \$15,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the ohana zones pilot program established pursuant to Act 209, Session Laws of Hawaii 2018, as amended by Act 128, Session Laws of Hawaii 2019, including expenses relating to staffing, facility construction, provision of services, and administrative costs; provided further that the funds provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.”

7. By adding forty-five new sections under the heading “FORMAL EDUCATION” to read as follows:

“SECTION 17.01. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for school-based budgeting (EDN100), the sum of \$461,289 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for workforce development opportunities in career and technical education programs, including five permanent full-time equivalent (5.0 FTE) positions to be housed within the office of the superintendent; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.02. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for school-based budgeting (EDN100), the sum of \$1,850,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended to provide increased custodial services during the summer months; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.03. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for special education and student support services (EDN150), the sum of \$7,148,647 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for special education and student support services, including eighteen permanent full-time equivalent (18.0 FTE) registered professional nurse V positions; provided further that the department of education shall establish licensed practical nurse and registered nurse positions in the school list of approved positions that may be purchased by principals for school level services; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.04. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for special education and student support services (EDN150), the sum of \$103,163 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the development, maintenance, and enhancement of alternative learning programs, including one permanent full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) educational specialist III position to support the state alternative learning programs through collaboration with complex area superintendents and school

principals to develop and implement plans for alternative learning programs, facilitation of the guidance committee, coordination of professional development and workforce development opportunities, and the collection of data for reporting purposes; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.05. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for special education and student support services (EDN150), the sum of \$1,278,590 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the high core alternative learning program to support the implementation of alternative learning programs for students who demonstrate academic, behavioral, and social-emotional challenges, which requires additional support services within a smaller learning setting that individualize academic interventions, behavior supports, and workforce development opportunities, including eleven and one-half permanent full-time equivalent (11.5 FTE) positions; provided further that the funds be directly allocated to the Leilehua-Mililani-Waialua complex area within the department of education's 18863 budget program account; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.06. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for instructional support (EDN200), the sum of \$560,154 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the department of education to develop a statewide kindergarten readiness assessment pursuant to Act 210, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, and section 302A-1165, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to the legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2023; provided further that the department of education shall submit the statewide kindergarten readiness assessment and data findings on the implementation results to the legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2023; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.07. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for instructional support (EDN200), the sum of \$103,163 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the coordination and support of the Perkins V federal career and technical education program with workforce development programs; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.08. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for instructional support (EDN200), the sum of \$1,200,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the grow our own teachers initiative; provided further that of the general fund appropriation, \$300,000 shall be prioritized for candidates who teach Hawaiian immersion or comply with the requirements set forth in the memorandum of understanding between the department of education and the university of Hawaii for the grow our own program; provided further that any funds unexpended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.09. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for state administration (EDN300), the sum of \$16,134,014 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that any moneys that remain unexpended or unencumbered on June 30, 2024, shall lapse on that date.

SECTION 17.10. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for school support (EDN400), the sum of \$6,364,830 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended within four complex areas; Kauai; Maui (Molokai); Hawaii island (Honokaa-Kealahou,

Kohala, Konawaena); and Leilehua-Mililani-Waialua for the purpose of a pilot greenhouse(s) for sustainability and agriculture training, including robotics and other agricultural technology training; provided that, to the extent practicable, the greenhouse(s) shall be adjacent to agricultural production centers and shall develop capacity for future farming and farmers; provided further that the moneys provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that any moneys that remain unexpended or unencumbered on June 30, 2024, shall lapse on that date.

SECTION 17.11. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for school support (EDN400), the sum of \$1,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended to provide menstrual products free of charge to all students on all public school campuses; provided further that any funds unexpended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.12. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for school support (EDN400), the sum of \$6,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 shall be expended for an agriculture innovation center on Kauai; provided that moneys provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

SECTION 17.13. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for school support (EDN400), the sum of \$15,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 shall be expended for the purpose of securing a maintenance base yard; provided further that the moneys provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

SECTION 17.14. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for school support (EDN400), the sum of \$45,500,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 shall be expended for centralized kitchens on Oahu for the farm-to-school program; provided that the moneys provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

SECTION 17.15. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for school support (EDN400), the sum of \$2,500,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 shall be expended for the purpose of securing and renovating a permanent facility for the Papahāna o Kānoa alternative learning center; provided further that the moneys provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

SECTION 17.16. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for school support (EDN400), the sum of \$8,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 shall be expended for the Center for Workforce Excellence; provided that the moneys provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

SECTION 17.18. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for school support (EDN400), the sum of \$453,940,455 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall not lapse at the end of the year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that any moneys that remain unexpended or unencumbered on June 30, 2024, shall lapse on that date.

Provided that of the general fund appropriation for public libraries (EDN407), the sum of \$1,933,365 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 shall be expended for various repairs and maintenance including but not limited to roofing, paving, window tinting, and other improvements and maintenance; provided further that the moneys provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

SECTION 17.20. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for school facilities agency (EDN450), the sum of \$2,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 shall be expended for the plans, designs, construction, and renovation of preschool facilities; provided further that the moneys provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

SECTION 17.21. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for school community services (EDN500), the sum of \$200,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 shall be expended for adult workforce readiness programs, including for two permanent full-time equivalent (2.0 FTE) workforce development coordinators positions for McKinley community school for adults and Waipahu community school for adults; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.22. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for charter schools commission and administration (EDN612), the sum of \$97,202 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended to hire one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) position to ensure compliance by public charter schools with this Act and Title IX of the federal Education Amendments of 1972, as amended; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.23. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for university of Hawaii, systemwide support (UOH900), the sum of \$983,847 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended by the Hawaii P-20 partnerships for education office; provided further that the Hawaii P-20 partnerships for education office coordinates statewide workforce development initiatives, aligns education pathways with state departmental employment needs, and regional economic development and career opportunities, including programs in the department of education, the university of Hawaii, the department of labor and industrial relations, the department of human resources development, and the department of business, economic development, and tourism; provided further that Hawaii P-20 partnerships for education office shall submit a report to the legislature of the coordination, alignment, shared metrics, and resulting impacts of statewide career technical education, college and career readiness, college and career pathways, workforce development, and training opportunities no later than thirty days

prior to the convening of the regular session of 2023; provided further that the funds provided in this section not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.24. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for university of Hawaii, Manoa (UOH100), the sum of \$381,767 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended to increase the State's capacity to train new nurses and project future nursing workforce needs; provided further that no funds provided in this section shall be expended unless the nursing program at the university of Hawaii, west Oahu is first reinstated; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.25. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for university of Hawaii, Hilo (UOH210), the sum of \$532,150 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended to increase the State's capacity to train new nurses and project future nursing workforce needs; provided further that no funds provided in this section shall be expended unless the nursing program at the university of Hawaii, west Oahu is first reinstated; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.26. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for university of Hawaii, community colleges (UOH800), the sum of \$2,542,572 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended to increase the State's capacity to train new nurses and project future nursing workforce needs; provided further that no funds provided in this section shall be expended unless the nursing program at the university of Hawaii, west Oahu is first reinstated; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

Provided that of the general fund appropriation for university of Hawaii, community colleges (UOH800), the sum of \$2,650,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the early college program; provided that the early college program shall target at-promise youth with a focus on career and technical education and workforce development; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

Provided that of the general fund appropriation for university of Hawaii, community colleges (UOH800), the sum of \$4,800,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the Hawaii promise program; provided that Hawaii promise program scholarships shall cover not more than ninety per cent of unmet needs; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for university of Hawaii, systemwide support (UOH900), the sum of \$800,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the university of Hawaii community design center to conduct a study to create an inclusive and fair criminal legal system devoted to restoration and healing, particularly addressing the disparate challenges facing Native Hawaiians, Pacific Islander communities, and people of color in the criminal legal system; provided that in developing the Hookeaulike plan, the community design center shall work with the department of public safety, other state law enforcement, the department of human services, the department of the attorney general, the judiciary, the county police departments, county prosecuting attorney offices, the Hawaii paroling authority, and community stakeholders; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for university of Hawaii, systemwide support (UOH900), the sum of \$1,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the university of Hawaii community design center to develop a master plan that identifies the priorities for physical improvements for the department of education school campuses; provided that in developing these school campus plans, the community design center shall work with the department of education; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.40. "House Bill 2471 is an effort to help employers by amending the definition of 'adequate reserve fund' to exclude the times of record high unemployment rates from the calculation of rates. The effect of this will result in an average savings of \$365 per employee in 2023 and an average savings of \$668 per employee for 2024. In combination with last year's \$747 million unemployment insurance loan repayment by the State to the federal government, the primary purpose of this bill this year is to keep employers in business and to help them survive the last two years of struggle. I urge my colleagues to vote in support of House Bill 2471. Thank you."

"Colleagues, this House measure, as amended by the Senate, will raise the minimum wage in increments until it reaches \$18 an hour in 2026 and would eliminate our current tip credit in two increments. This bill is part of a package of bills which help employers **and** workers. As I mentioned earlier with House Bill 2471, last year we appropriated \$747 million to pay back our federal unemployment insurance loan. In normal times, this would have been paid back by employers through increased unemployment insurance taxes. The governor also authorized an additional \$100 million into the UI Trust Fund to prevent the loss of a federal employer tax credit which would have significantly raised the FUTA (Federal Unemployment Tax Act) taxes for our employers.

"This year, House Bill 2471 would adjust the experience rating to exclude the period of record high unemployment from the rate calculation for the next eight years. This would mean hundreds of dollars of savings in unemployment insurance taxes per employee for our employers.

"So, colleagues, if anyone tells you that the Legislature did nothing for employers and only helped minimum-wage workers, then you must tell them that they are not correct. Some of the same people may tell you that increases in the Senate version of House Bill 2510 are too fast and should be more gradual. Most of these same people have been fighting any increase in the minimum wage for years. They have successfully delayed efforts to raise the wage twice in the last three years, with the pandemic stopping efforts in 2020.

"A DBEDT study in 2019 indicated that \$18 per hour was what a person would need to survive in Hawai'i. If this bill passes, it will still take seven years since that study to reach \$18 per hour, and things have definitely gotten even worse for our lowest-paid workers with the pandemic. We really must act now. I urge my colleagues to vote in support of House Bill 2510, Senate Draft 1. Thank you."

Many deep-water coral native to Hawai'i grow very slowly and are facing unprecedented stressors, including acidification, warming oceans, overfishing, and pollution. The prohibition of the sale, import, harvest, and export of coral products will put an end to this archaic trade in coral. Without the prohibitions in House Bill 1988, Senate Draft 3, Hawai'i's black coral is subject to commercial harvesting by any person with a \$100 commercial marine license and relies on self-reporting without any verification. This measure will further efforts to protect Hawai'i's coral reefs, and I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting this measure. Mahalo."

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"While I fully support the need to protect our coral reefs, I want our body to understand the consequences of what has passed previously. When I was growing up, the law was, and it still is, that black coral is the Hawai'i state gem, and it was promoted as such to all the tourists in Waikiki. And so a number of us, myself included, inherited black coral jewelry, which we have now, because of our promotion, have made endangered. As this bill progresses, I request our colleagues to understand that maybe it's about time we recant making the black coral as the Hawai'i state official gem so that we don't promote it, and we

preserve it. And secondly, that we look into the fact that a number of us have inherited coral because it was promoted as such, and there should be some kind of exclusion for those of us who went on the bandwagon at a time when we were promoting Hawai'i. Thank you very much."

Senator Chang rose to request that remarks in support of the measure with reservations be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Chang's remarks read as follows:

"I vote to advance this measure with reservations because I am concerned about impacts this bill will have on existing owners and retailers of corals harvested legally prior to this bill taking effect.

"In particular, I am concerned about locally owned shops which harvested or acquired coral in compliance with all legal requirements at the time. It would be unfair to change the rules on them when they bore the burden of legal compliance at the time. Additionally, nonprofit organizations and individuals own corals they acquired legally, and they would no longer be able to sell them. One possible solution would be to extend the effective date to give owners and retailers of corals time to lawfully sell their products. Another possible solution would be to exempt the sale of corals that were legally harvested before Endangered Species Act restrictions took effect."

Senator Acasio rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"Colleagues, when the state declared a climate emergency, it gave many people devoted to this issue hope that the state and we, as legislators, would be taking meaningful action to mitigate the impacts of climate change. As originally written, H.B. 1800 represented meaningful action—it was co-introduced

by 23 of our House colleagues and drew widespread support from climate focus groups. The current language, while it continues to have meaningful input, removes details on specific targets and goals, which I believe are imperative in this climate emergency. The time for action is now. Thank you."

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Kim). Noes, 1 (Fevella).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3963 (H.B. No. 2024, H.D. 1, S.D. 2):

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3963 be adopted and H.B. No. 2024, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Inouye rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“Astronomy is on my island and in my district. I share these comments as chair of the Committee on Water and Land. We all know that humankind has been fascinated by the heavens and the study of the universe since the earliest of times. We know that Hawai‘i is one of the best places in the world for the study of astronomy. After years of study and proposals in the early to mid-20th century, it came to pass that Mauna Kea was chosen as the ideal location for large-scale and world-class astronomy. Over the course of more than 60 years, the observatories have made Mauna Kea the most scientifically productive site for astronomy worldwide. We should relish in the fact that our astronomical facilities are a world-class center of study and research supported by numerous international partners and research facilities all over the world. The research conducted on Mauna Kea is purely scientific in nature and dedicated to better

understand the universe around us. Mauna Kea has the best combination of topography, climate, minimal light pollution, and a clear elevation in which to conduct astronomical research and observation.

“We cannot let our world-class status in the scientific community be compromised by a poorly crafted bill such as H.B. 2024, House Draft 1; it may cripple, if not end, our very prestigious and productive astronomy industry. While the present draft of H.B. 2024, Senate Draft 2, does a better job than the H.D. 1 version by including language like declaring that astronomy is a policy of the state and allowing the University of Hawai‘i to have jurisdiction over 550 acres of land surrounding the observatories, managing the summit, Summit Access Road, and the Hale Pōhaku facility, this bill still needs more work. The State of Hawai‘i needs to do everything possible to keep our world-class astronomy industry firmly grounded on the top of Mauna Kea. A few suggestions that need to be made in order to assure the long-term survival of astronomy on Mauna Kea is to change the governance model so that each and every observatory has a vote at the table along with the other members of the commission as outlined. The governance model will also need to be amended to fix the timeline of land transfer and extend that out to at least 2026 or longer if required. Issues requiring the powers of authority need to also be addressed as well as the revenue requirements for the self-sustaining clause in the bill. We need to remind ourselves that astronomy in Hawai‘i supports the employment of at least 1,313 residents and had a total impact of \$221 million in 2019.

“Astronomy is far-reaching not only to the stars but also on the ground. Just this past weekend, I was thrilled to see children, teens, and adults become excited about astronomy on a TV news report showcasing the open house of the University of Hawai‘i’s Institute for Astronomy in Mānoa. Some of these children and teens may grow up to be astronomers, and also, some are already in colleges throughout our country and the University of Hawai‘i. And, indeed, Ms. Onodera, in my district, graduated in astronomy, moved to Mauna Kea, and is now employed in the prestigious level on Haleakalā. We cannot and should not cheat them out of a possible future in Hawai‘i if we cannot continue having a world-class center of astronomy as we do now on Mauna Kea.

“Mr. President, I am convinced that the people of Hawai‘i support astronomy in a huge way. The bottom line is that astronomy needs to be saved—the successful implementation of this governance model will require resolution of several outstanding issues. These include Part II, Section 5, Senate Draft 2 calls for the transfer of all rights, powers, functions, and duties of the University of Hawai‘i with respect to the non-astronomy lands transferring to July 1, 2023, to the new authority. This transfer in July 2023 is not feasible given that the new authority will not yet be stood up or independent. Plus, UH still has obligations under its CDUPs, the master plan, CMP, and rules with respect to the 10,000 acres, which are non-astronomy lands that need to be worked out with DLNR and the authority. This should be changed to ‘July 1, 2026,’ to align with the three-year transition period. Section 3(b)(1) of S.D. 2 provides that the authority will be the principal authority in conjunction with the DLNR for the management of the state-managed lands within the Mauna Kea conservation lands. Clarification is needed regarding the powers of the authority as principal authority versus the statutory and regulatory powers of DLNR and the Board of Land and Natural Resources. For example, DLNR is the entity that would approve the sublease from UH to the new authority as well as UH’s comprehensive management plan (which is the CMP), which is currently in the process of being updated, and any subleases issued by the authority. How does this legislation impact DLNR’s role and jurisdiction? Also, S.D. 2 does not address the applicability of

DLNR's sublease requirements, such as whether the authority will be required to have a management plan similar to UH's.

"I make my support known for H.B. 2024, S.D. 2, Mr. President, with the hope that the bill can be further amended in conference to create a better bill for our world-class astronomy industry and for the people, our children, in Hawai'i. Therefore, Mr. President, I will support H.B. 2024, S.D. 2. Mahalo."

Senator Fevella rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I have very mixed emotions, colleagues, because we're talking about astronomy, but we're also talking about desecration and mismanagement. This is a bill that is trying to level the playing fields on both sides.

"I am against TMT and I'm always going to be against TMT. Whatever telescopes for astronomy is on the mountain, we will review the extension of their leases. But having so many people oppose the construction of TMT, approximately 1,600 people, and due to nearly 50 to 60 years of desecration on that mountain, the protection of Mauna Kea means more to the people than looking into the stars, depending on who you talk to. But I am for this bill. My colleague worked very hard on it, but I don't agree on everything. But if this goes to conference and there is an attempt to push for the construction of TMT, I am voting against this in conference. I just wanted to let you know I support the bill in its current form, but if it changes in any way, I'll vote it down in conference."

Senator Kim rose to request that remarks regarding the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Kim's remarks read as follows:

"Rise in Support.

"The Senate is continuing to refine and develop HB 2024 to balance the interests and concerns of our Native Hawaiian community to properly steward a cultural treasure with the interests of the State through the University of Hawaii ('University') to continue its world class science-based education and academic research unit in astronomy at Mauna Kea. In collaboration with the Higher Ed Chair, these proposed amendments are reflective of the discussions that we've had with various community groups, stakeholders, and from the testimonies submitted.

"Thus, Senate Draft 2, is a significant improvement over Senate Draft 1. Senate Draft 1 addressed very real concerns regarding the potential demise of astronomy at Mauna Kea caused by the whole sale replacement of the University with the newly created Mauna Kea Stewardship Authority. But as noted, it was still a work in progress."

"We have listened to reasonable suggestions expressed on many sides of the current controversy regarding this potential demise. The proper care and management of the mountain involves many agreements and contracts with several organizations, employees, contractors, and funding from the National Science Foundation, as well as, arrangements with foreign countries. As a premier world class academic research center, we were faced with how the newly created authority could quickly jump in to manage these agreements and contracts and prevent uncertainty and disruptions from arising that could place in jeopardy the relationships developed since the 1960's with the University's scientific and research partners.

"Senate Draft 2 is an improvement over Senate Draft 1 in that the new draft creates 'joint oversight' of Mauna Kea between the University and the newly created authority. The responsibilities to manage the mountain will be bifurcated or

split between the two entities. The new authority will manage approximately 9,450 acres on the mountain, while the University will manage the Astronomy Research Lands comprised of the Astronomy Precinct, Halepohaku complex and the Mauna Kea access road, or approximately 550 acres. The existing 1968 and 1999 State Leases between the State Board of Land and Natural Resources and University (expiring in 2033) will be kept in place. The University, as Lessee under the State Leases, will sublease to the authority within a year of its operational formation lands totaling approximately 9,450 acres, which we have labeled as the Mauna Kea Conservation Lands. The authority will be charged to properly conserve, protect, and manage the public uses of the Mauna Kea Conservation Lands. At the same time, the University will be solely responsible to care for and manage the Astronomy Research Lands.

"The 'joint oversight' structure addresses the perceived threat to the future of astronomy in our State, through a collaborative sharing of management duties and responsibilities between the authority and the University of Hawaii.

"The current administrative organization under the aegis of the University of Hawaii at Hilo will be kept in place, and will continue to service the operational and staff needs of both the new authority and the University thereby, avoiding any additional costs associated with creating a new organizational structure or two separate administrative structures.

"Our goal in Senate Draft 2 was to develop a management structure from a practical standpoint that would be workable while balancing the diverse interests in the conservation, protection, and regulating of current and future uses of Mauna Kea. Senate Draft 2, like Senate Draft 1, provides for an audit to be done in 2029.

"The refinement of Senate Draft 2 continues to strive for the best balance of interests on Mauna Kea. We realize that each side may not be satisfied with the joint oversight model we are proposing, but unfortunately there is no perfect solution to this controversy. Each side must be willing to compromise. A shared responsibility model accomplishes that."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3963 was adopted and H.B. No. 2024, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MAUNA KEA," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Acasio, Ihara, Rhoads, San Buenaventura). Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3964 (H.B. No. 2108, H.D. 1, S.D. 2):

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3964 be adopted and H.B. No. 2108, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"As my colleagues well know, digital currency is growing in popularity and acceptance worldwide; however, there is very little regulation of the industry here in the United States. The Division of Financial Institutions of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs and the Hawaii Technology Development Corporation are currently conducting a two-year sandbox program to study digital currency transactions that allow companies to conduct digital currency transactions without obtaining a money transmitters license. House Bill 2108, Senate Draft 2, establishes a licensing program that will replace the Digital Currency Innovation Lab. This measure will establish a program for licensure, regulation, and oversight of digital currency companies to ensure that the necessary

consumer protections are adhered to. Please join me in supporting this measure. Mahalo.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3964 was adopted and H.B. No. 2108, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SPECIAL PURPOSE DIGITAL CURRENCY LICENSURE,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

And, hopefully, with this passage, we can fix the system and prevent child abuse in the future. Thank you.”

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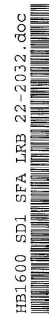



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FORTY-NINTH DAY

Thursday, April 14, 2022

The Senate of the Thirty-First Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2022, convened at 11:38 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present, with the exception of Senators Acasio and Fevella who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Eighth Day.

At this time, Senator Rhoads recognized the Honorable Mark E. Recktenwald, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, State of Hawai'i; the Honorable Sabrina McKenna, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, State of Hawai'i; chief administrator of the courts Rod Maile; and Brandon Kimura from the judiciary, who were present in the gallery.

Senator Kanuha introduced Martha Saenz from Denver, Colorado, the National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL) state liaison for Hawai'i and associate director for the Quad Caucus and Women's Legislative Network at NCSL. Senator Kanuha invited the members to stop by for lunch in Conference Room 325 to greet Ms. Saenz at 12:00 noon that afternoon.

“Ms. Park-Hoapili received her bachelor of arts degree in political science from the University of Hawai‘i at Mānoa and her juris doctor degree from the William S. Richardson School of Law. She has served on the Board of Bar Examiners of the Hawai‘i Supreme Court since 2013, and has been president of both the Hawaii Women’s Legal Foundation and Hawaii Women Lawyers.

“After having reviewed the testimony, all of which was in support of her confirmation, and other materials submitted to the committee and having examined the appointee in a hearing, your Judiciary committee finds that Shellie Park-Hoapili is well-qualified to serve as district court judge of the First Circuit, and recommends that the Senate consent to the appointment. Mahalo.”

She has also been a kokua kanawai for two probate court judges, evaluating the need for a conservator or guardian to be appointed to protect individuals.

“Judge Shaw received her bachelor of science degree in business administration in accounting from the University of Nevada, Las Vegas. She later received her masters of business administration from Stetson University School of Business concurrently with her juris doctor degree from Stetson University College of Law.

“After having reviewed the testimony, which was overwhelmingly in support of her confirmation, and other materials submitted to the committee and having examined the appointee in a hearing, your Judiciary committee finds that Natasha R. On motion by Senator Dela Cruz, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran and carried, H.B. No. 1539, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE SAFETY OF JUDICIARY PERSONNEL,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, none. Excused, 2 (Acasio, Fevella).

H.B. No. 1600, H.D. 1, S.D. 2:

Senator Dela Cruz moved that H.B. No. 1600, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Mr. President, I’d like to begin by thanking you and the Senate leadership, the Senate subject-matter committee chairs for their leadership and for assisting the Ways and Means committee in addressing the restoration and fiscal sustainability efforts reflected in the State’s supplemental budget. The Senate continues to make prudent and strategic decisions to ensure the economic vitality of our state. The dedication and diligent efforts to identify opportunities for strategic additions, restorations, consolidations, and reductions across the 20 state departments were instrumental. Your recommendations to the Ways and Means committee have made it possible for the Senate to pass a sustainable supplemental budget that creates a more efficient state government, addresses the needs of our most vulnerable residents, and stabilizes essential services and programs while incorporating strategies to improve the State’s credit rating and borrowing power.

“With a brighter economic forecast, we were able to appropriate funds for many one-time, non-recurring large expenditures such as repairs and maintenance, construction projects, land acquisitions, and paying down the state’s unfunded liabilities including debt service, the Employees’ Retirement System, and replenishing the rainy day fund. We invested strategically in initiatives that have been longstanding issues for the state, such as Hawai’i’s housing shortage; the need for more comprehensive health and well-being services for our keiki, kūpuna, and those with disabilities; supporting small business and the diversification of our economy; and creating pathways for a skilled workforce and the development of higher-wage jobs. All these efforts are reflected in the budget appropriations across the state departments and are intended to make a way for Hawai’i’s families to remain here in the islands for generations to come.

“Numerous Senate bill priorities with appropriations were migrated into the state budget to solidify their implementation. Funding for construction of thousands of Hawaiian homesteads (Senate Bill 3359), affordable and public housing projects (S.B. 2372 and S.B. 2588), and homeless support and triage services (House Bill 2512) were included. A greater focus on developing Hawai’i’s workforce and training needs was accomplished through the appropriations that will increase the Department of Labor, the University of Hawai’i, and the Department of Education’s ability to collaborate, coordinate, and amplify their education and training efforts (Senate Bill 3374 and House Bill 1561). Their collective energies will provide Hawai’i’s K–12, post-high, and adult learners with the opportunities to earn licensures, credentials, and certifications that will lead to employment in hard-to-fill jobs in office administration, agriculture, teaching, human services, and healthcare (House Bill 2220), engineering and information technology right here in Hawai’i and specifically within state government. Allocations were provided to the Department of Accounting and General Services for centralization and digitization of 11 state department records and documents (S.B. 3282), which will reduce the costs for document storage and ensure that those teleworking will have secure online access to essential documentation. The Office of the Attorney General received funding for its critical law enforcement efforts to combat sex and human trafficking (in S.B. 2930), fraud, white-collar crime, and public corruption (S.B. 2930). Salary differentials for hard-to-fill positions were addressed this session for teachers, social workers, archaeologists, and deputy attorney generals (S.B. 2819 and S.B. 2820).

“There are so many more noteworthy priorities that were addressed in this year’s supplemental budget, such as HTDC’s grants to include funding for accelerator programs; manufacturing and small business loans; modernizing the state’s

aging digital infrastructure and Department of Health laboratories (found in H.B. 2515); providing funds for required federal match for broadband infrastructure; the coordination of trauma-informed care for statewide programs and services; reducing the pipeline to prison and recidivism; funding for menstrual equity (found in S.B. 2821); farmer supports to control axis deer and feral animals; increased security for state parks, harbors, and the community colleges; study and abatement of coastal erosion (found in H.B. 2229); and funds for post-high scholarships and student mental health services. All that in mind, I’d like to thank the subject-matter chairs for the countless hours spent meeting with departments and the Ways and Means team, as well as scrutinizing and asking critical questions on hundreds of budget requests. Your good work is reflected in the Senate draft.

“The Senate’s approach to balancing the budget included considering the Council on Revenues’ forecast; allocating federal funds from the American Rescue Plan Act; restoring critical defunded positions and programs and services that were reduced during the pandemic; funding non-recurring, one-time costs; vacancy reductions to limit the growth of government; meeting the maintenance of effort federal requirements; and, finally, covering the costs for the Senate priorities.

“Numerous federal requirements, restrictions, and limitations were placed on how ARPA funds could be spent by the state. The maintenance of effort requirement presented the greatest challenge for drafting a balanced budget. Your committee worked diligently, especially with the Education chairs and the Higher Education chairs to meet the proportional maintenance of effort funding requirements established under ARPA. Many hours were spent to ascertain accurate appropriations to the University of Hawai’i, the Department of Education, and all other state departments. The federal maintenance of effort requirements mandate that the State provide proportional funding in fiscal years 2022 and 2023 to elementary and secondary education and higher education as compared to the overall state budget averaged over fiscal years 2017, ’18, and ’19. According to B&F, these averaged proportional allocations are 6.49 percent and 32.04 percent for higher education and lower education. Higher education encompasses the University of Hawai’i, while lower education comprises DOE minus the libraries and early learning. We present a budget that is sustainable, ensures economic stabilization, and meets the federal requirements for the maintenance of effort.

“In conclusion, I’d like to thank the members for their hard work, and I’d like to thank and acknowledge everyone’s efforts, time, and dedication, as well as the efforts and hard work of the vice chair and his team for putting together the CIP budget. Lastly, I’d like to thank the Ways and Means budget staff for their hard work and extended hours in helping shape the Senate draft. They’re here today: committee clerk Dane Wicker; budget chief Stacy Ferreira; budget analysts Colin, Parker, Kekahi, Keahi, Ann, Kathy, and Ford; legislative assistants David and Reggie; and our office manager, Dot. Also, who helped the Ways and Means committee is our bills section—bills chief Duncan Osorio and his team: Chris, Sam, Carlos, Esera, Mary, and Vanessa, if you can please rise and be recognized. Thank you.”

Senator Keith-Agaran rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I just wanted to add my thanks to the members as well as to yourself, especially to the committee clerks and the staff of the Senate who helped provide the information that we needed to fashion the CIP budget. Although my staff decided they did not want to come down, I wanted to recognize them: Robert Nishimoto and Danielle Evangelista, who did a lot of the yeoman’s work on the CIP budget as we go into conference.

And I urge all my colleagues to please vote in favor of the Senate Draft 2.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 1600, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, none. Excused, 2 (Acasio, Fevella).

H.B. No. 1570, H.D. 1, S.D. 2:

Senator Baker moved that H.B. No. 1570, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“Colleagues, this measure is a response to the increase in youth vaping that we’re seeing here in Hawai‘i. Electronic smoking devices that feature tobacco products, including menthol, are a gateway to cigarettes and other substances. The sale of candy-like flavored tobacco products that are mislabeled as nicotine-free entice young people to start using these harmful products, which can lead to addiction and cause damage to their developing brain. Flavored tobacco products also increase an individual’s risk for dual use of vaping and combustible cigarettes. Many electronic smoking devices contain the addictive chemical nicotine, and this is particularly troubling because now there’s a synthetic nicotine that is not tobacco-derived but is just as addictive and harmful. Youth electronic-smoking-device users are four times—four times—more likely to become regular cigarette users. In 2020, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention announced that nearly half of Hawai‘i’s high school students and three in ten of middle school students in Hawai‘i have tried e-cigarettes.

“This measure will prohibit the sale or distribution in Hawai‘i of all e-liquid flavored tobacco products, including products with menthol, and prohibit the mislabeling of products as nicotine-free. This measure will help deter the e-cigarette use among our youth, and it is especially important that this measure move forward because there are other folks out there who are preying on our young people to try to get them addicted to a life of e-cigarette use and health damage. Please join me in supporting this important health and consumer protection measure. Mahalo.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 1570, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE YOUTH VAPING EPIDEMIC,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22; Ayes with Reservations (San Buenaventura). Noes, 1 (Riviere). Excused, 2 (Acasio, Fevella).

H.B. No. 1775, H.D. 2, S.D. 3:

On motion by Senator Dela Cruz, seconded by Senator Rhoads and carried, H.B. No. 1775, H.D. 2, S.D. 3, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CIVIL RIGHTS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, none. Excused, 2 (Acasio, Fevella).

The Senate reconvened at 12:09 p.m.

The Chair made the following announcement:

“For the duration of the 2022 Conference period, conferees will be named and revised in accordance with the Action Sheet Reports on the Capitol website, and said actions will be reflected in the Journal.”

Senator Kidani expressed her happiness at seeing her colleagues dressed in purple and joining the community to celebrate Purple Up! Day. Senator Kidani explained that each year, the month of April is designated as the Month of the Military Child, and that on one day in April, purple is worn to highlight the commitment to serving military families and their keiki in Hawai‘i schools. Senator Kidani then noted that the official programs in the public school systems have been a true success story, receiving input from the Military Interstate Children’s Compact Commission and the Joint Venture Education Forum. Senator Kidani further noted that school communities benefit from the experiences and perspectives military students bring to their campuses and that by extending the spirit of aloha to everyone who might otherwise be considered an out-of-town student, everyone grows and learns. Senator Kidani clarified that there were 56 public schools on O‘ahu that were on the Department of Education’s list of military-impacted schools—schools that have significant numbers of military dependent students on their campuses. Senator Kidani disclosed that there were eight public schools in her Senate district and that all eight were on the list. Senator Kidani reminded the members that during Education Week, they had extended Senate congratulations to one of these schools in Senator Dela Cruz’s district, Major Sheldon Wheeler Middle School at Wheeler Army Airfield, which serves a student population with about 97 percent military dependent enrollment. Senator Kidani observed that Wheeler Middle School was a true success story, designated one of three Hawai‘i Blue Ribbon Schools that year, a perfect example of how everyone thrives when they focus and work together. Senator Kidani concluded that as the Education chair, she appreciated the opportunity to recognize the Month of the Military Child, and extended a mahalo to her colleagues for joining to observe Purple Up! Day 2022.

HRS § 171-4.5(a) and (d).

The Committee consists of eight members appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate from a list of nominations submitted by the 'Aha Moku councils (Councils) of each island. HRS § 171-4.5(b). There is no formal structure for the Councils. According to rules adopted for the Committee,¹ within the physical geography of each moku, communities and residents select their moku representative(s) according to the desirable leadership qualities and/or traditional 'ike that align the needs of that moku. AMAC Rules § 2-4(a).²

In developing the list of nominees for each Committee representative the executive director of the Committee, Leimana DaMate, consulted with each of the island Councils to have them provide two names for the Governor's consideration.³ The list of the current Council representatives is attached as Attachment 1.

Ms. DaMate indicated that each of the islands have their own protocols on how their structure is set up. The people of each island select their ahupua'a and moku representatives. The moku representatives select, from among themselves, the names to send to the Governor as nominees. Once selected, Ms. DaMate collects the requests and submits the list of potential nominees to the Boards and Commissions office. The list that Ms. DaMate compiled this year is attached as Attachment 2. We were not able to determine what process the island Councils used to determine who they put on the list of potential nominees.

The email that questions the process by which the nomination list was created is purportedly from the island Councils for the islands of Kauai, Maui, Molokai, and Lanai. See Attachment 3. They are challenging the nominations, primarily because the names have not

¹ The rules are titled "Final Rules of Practice and Procedure Department of Land and Natural Resources 'Aha Moku Advisory Committee'" (AMAC Rules) were effective on October 20, 2016 and can be found here: http://www.ahamoku.org/wp-content/uploads/2016/12/FINAL-AMAC_Admin_Rules_effective.102016.pdf. There does not appear to be any statutory authority for the Committee to adopt rules nor are there citations to authorizing statutes. It is unknown what the legal effect of these rules are.

² There is some conflict on Molokai and Maui as to which is the "true" Council for those islands. The executive director of the Committee explained that she deals with the Council that has been chosen by the communities and residents of each moku rather than the councils headed by Walter Rite and Keaumoku Kapu, being Molokai and Maui respectively, because those council members were appointed by Rite and Kapu and not by the residents and communities.

³ According to Ms. DaMate, on Molokai there is no island "Council" per se. Instead there is a "kupuna council" that is selected by the people and who serve the same function as the island Council. Although named differently, this is consistent with the other councils as they are all made up of kupuna.

RE : Nominees to the 'Aha Moku Advisory Committee

The question you asked was whether the identification of the nominees for the 'Aha Moku Advisory Committee (Committee) was done through a proper process. We believe that the correct process was followed to come up with the list of potential nominees for the Committee from which the Governor could choose.

The purpose of the Committee is to advise the chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources on various issues. These issues, enumerated in Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) section 171-4.5, are:


- (1) Integrating indigenous resource management practices with western management practices in each moku;
- (2) Identifying a comprehensive set of indigenous practices for natural resource management;
- (3) Fostering the understanding and practical use of native Hawaiian resource knowledge, methodology, and expertise;
- (4) Sustaining the State's marine, land, cultural, agricultural, and natural resources;
- (5) Providing community education and fostering cultural awareness on the benefits of the aha moku system;
- (6) Fostering protection and conservation of the State's natural resources; and
- (7) Developing an administrative structure that oversees the aha moku system.

Our opposition to these appointments is based on the Governor's violation of Hawai'i Revised Statutes, § 171-4.5(b) which specifically requires that the AMAC members "be appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate from a list of nominations submitted by the *aha moku councils of each island*," (emphasis added). The names that the Governor put forth did not come from a list of nominations from our respective island councils.

It is troubling to us that since 2017, the Governor has repeatedly submitted names that have not come from our 'Aha Moku island councils. We have come before the legislature every year to testify and point out this discrepancy and each time the Governor has not remedied the problem. No due diligence has been employed from the Governor's office to confirm that the nominees submitted to the legislature accurately reflect the wishes of the island 'Aha Moku Councils.

We also question the delayed numbering of these legislative bills which prevented appropriate public notice and hindered participation by the public in testimony and comment. These actions compromised our constitutional rights to due process. For these reasons we must protest and object before the full Senate meets to confirm these illegal appointments to the AMAC.

We urge Governor Ige to withdraw the names of the prospective AMAC appointees for Kaua'i, Maui, Lāna'i, and Moloka'i.

Furthermore, we ask that remedial steps be taken to avoid these occurrences in the future. We believe that part of the solution would include strong censure or termination of AMAC Executive Director Leimana DaMate and that a formal investigation of her activities by the Hawai'i State Ethics Commission be conducted. Pursuant to the Final Rules of Practice and Procedure for the Department of Land and Natural Resources 'Aha Moku Advisory Committee (2016), the AMAC Executive Director may not independently make ad hoc decisions on behalf of the different island 'Aha Moku Councils. Under paragraph (j) of Section 1-12 of the rules, the Executive Director must consult with the island po'o for each island, who in turn must consult with their respective island 'Aha Moku councils when inquiring on island-specific issues. We continually experience the unwarranted interference of Ms. DaMate in the internal affairs of our island 'Aha Moku Councils. Rather than providing a supportive role to the work of our existing long-standing island councils, she has the propensity of ignoring our councils in favor of forming her own. In this manner, Ms. DaMate has successfully avoided bringing forth our input to the State Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR). We believe DLNR has also been complicit in enabling Ms. DaMate to operate in this manner as a rubber-stamp for its decisions.

To Senate President Kouahi and Members of the Hawai'i State Senate:
We, the members of the 'Aha Moku Island Councils for the islands of Kaua'i, Maui, Moloka'i, and Lāna'i oppose the illegal appointments of Walter Rawlins (Moloka'i representative) under GM 718, Robert Lu'uwai (Maui representative) under GM 719, Llewellyn Kaohelaubi'i (Kaua'i representative) under GM 723, Winifred Basques (Lāna'i representative) under GM 724 to the State 'Aha Moku Advisory Committee (AMAC). Joining our objections are Maui County Councilmembers Kemi Rawlins-Fernandez of Moloka'i and Shane Sinenci of Maui, whose communities were heavily involved in the lawful selection process and presently are disenfranchised by the unlawful appointments.

This severely hampers the purpose of 'Aha Moku which is to advise DLNR on matters such as:

- Integrating indigenous resource management practices with Western management practices in each moku;
- Fostering the understanding and practical use of Native Hawaiian resource knowledge, methodology, and expertise; and
- Sustaining the state's marine, land, cultural, agricultural, and natural resources.

For the record, the 'Aha Moku Council of Kaua'i submitted the name of Teddy Blake for its AMAC representative. While Teddy Blake recently passed away, there was no effort to consult the Kaua'i island council to submit a new nomination. We would like to clarify that Llewellyn Kaohelaui'i's name was not submitted by the Kaua'i Island 'Aha Moku Council. In 2017, the name of Kamealoha Hanohano Smith was submitted. (See link to letter). In lieu of Teddy Blake's passing, we re-submit the name of Kamealoha Hanohano Smith as the Kaua'i Island AMAC nomination.

In 2017, the 'Aha Kiole o Moloka'i submitted three names for the Governor's consideration: Walter Rite, Jr., Mac Poepee, and Malia Akutagawa. (See link to letter). These names still stand for the 'Aha Kiole o Moloka'i and our island council has repeatedly submitted these names each year since. Since that submission, our island council reaffirms the nominations of Walter Rite, Jr. and Malia Akutagawa. Mac Poepee has since declined to serve as a nominee to AMAC due to his current workload and kuleana. Further, while the 'Aha Kiole o Moloka'i does not have any personal conflict with Mr. Walter Rawlins, he has not participated in our island 'Aha Moku council, nor has he been a community voice for mālama 'āina stewardship on our island. 'Aha Moku O Maui, Inc. submitted names of AMAC nominees Kyle Nakanelua, Michelle Ho'opi'i, and Ke'eumoku Kapu to the Legislature on August 29, 2017 in testimony to the Senate WTL Committee (See link to letter) regarding the inappropriate selection process which violated the rules set forth in Act 288 (2012). In this testimony, 'Aha Moku O Maui noted that the list of names had been previously submitted to the Governor without acknowledgement. 'Aha Moku O Maui urged the Governor to retract the erroneous nomination of Richard Ho'opi'i, who was not submitted by the island council. This same error or malfeasance has occurred again with the proposed appointment of Robert Lu'uwa'i, whose name does not appear on the list submitted by the island council. Additionally, there was no support for this candidate from the Hawaiian Civic Clubs of Maui island nor any other Native Hawaiian Organization (NHO) on Maui.

In 2021, the 'Aha Moku Council o Lāna'i submitted two candidate names for the Lāna'i representative to the AMAC. Their names are as follows: Anthony Pacheco and Cheleigh Claraball. (See link to letter). Since that submission, our island council reaffirms the nomination of Anthony Pacheco. Cheleigh Claraball, due to accepting greater personal kuleana, is no longer able to include her name as a nomination. While Hawai'i Island supports Charles Young under GM 722, we would like to reiterate that we are aligned with our fellow Island 'Aha Moku Councils in their concerns that Hawai'i Revised Statutes, § 171-4.5(b) has been violated. It is important that the Governor adhere to the law in selecting nominations from the 'Aha Moku Island Councils. It has been an exhausting process for our island councils to continually do damage control and testify before the legislature for repeated malfeasance on the part of the Governor's office in violating the AMAC nominations and appointments process pursuant to Hawai'i Revised Statutes, § 171-4.5(b). We urge the senate to take appropriate actions as recommended above to remedy this ongoing problem.

Working together with the family court, they were able to clear years of backlogged adoption cases and remodel the system to greatly expedite the processing of paperwork and scheduling of adoption hearings.

"Ms. Shikada had been working in the Family Law Division for 10 years when she was asked to head the newly created Felix Unit. The purpose of forming the unit was to assign a deputy attorney general whose primary focus was to work with the Departments of Education and Health and the federal court on achieving substantial compliance with the consent decree. Her new assignment resulted in her transfer to the Education Division in 1999. Ms. Shikada served as supervisor of the Education Division from 2003 until April 2021, when she was asked to be the first deputy attorney general.

"While Ms. Shikada received mostly positive testimony, questions were raised by credible testifiers as well. I support Ms. Shikada's nomination, and I also challenged her to make the most of her time in the position to address the legitimate concerns that have been raised in the confirmation process. Mahalo."

"Why I think she'll be so good in this job is because of her heart. When we had a large food drive at Aloha Stadium, and four kūpuna who could not drive, caught the bus, and asked to get their food distribution, they were told—and I guess there were health and sanitary reasons that they could only give them into the trunk of the car and not hand them food, and they were denied food at that food giveaway. Her husband, Charlie, was half of a quite popular show at the time, and they reached out. They turned out to be four kūpuna from Senator Gabbard's district, and Stephanie coordinated with Senator Gabbard and his office and made sure that those four kūpuna got the food that they needed and they deserved. With a heart like that for the people of Hawai'i, I'm confident that you'll do a great job. Thank you, Stephanie."

Second, it does not ban fundraising events during one-chamber special sessions; the only thing I can think of would be the Senate Judiciary confirmation hearings, where it's only the Senate coming into session. So, the S.D. 1 did ban fundraising events during any special session of the Legislature, just not one-chamber special sessions. Third, it bans all fundraising events, even the stew-and-rice, \$25-and-below events. It's a reasonable draft. I think we should adopt it: it's an important step forward and it brings us in line with the 28 other states who have restrictions on fundraising during sessions. Finally, the bill takes effect on January 1, 2023. Considering that our regular session is almost over, that also seems reasonable. Mahalo."

FIFTY-FOURTH DAY

Friday, April 22, 2022

The Senate of the Thirty-First Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2022, convened at 12:13 p.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present, with the exception of Senators Ihara and Keohokalole who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Third Day.

At this time, Senator Taniguchi noted that the date was “four, two, two, two, two,” and that Governor Ige had proclaimed the day Frank De Lima Day in Hawai'i. Senator Taniguchi then introduced Franklin Wilcox Napuakekaulike De Lima, who was seated in the gallery. Senator Taniguchi commented that Mr. De Lima was of Portuguese, Spanish, Irish, Scottish, English, Chinese, and Hawaiian descent, and that he has truly been one of Hawai'i's treasures and “certainly our favorite Portagee.” Senator Taniguchi observed that Mr. De Lima's ability to write and produce a song or a skit on the spur of the moment was the stuff of genius. Senator Taniguchi noted that Mr. De Lima was being honored that day not only for his years of making Hawai'i laugh and smile but also for his service to the community, including administering the Frank De Lima Student Enrichment Program, through which he has been traveling for years around Hawai'i to various schools to perform motivational speeches for young people. Senator Taniguchi expressed congratulations to Mr. De Lima, and led the members in a round of applause. Also present in the gallery were Dr. Stephen Arnold, who was accompanied by his staff and whose suggestion it had been to honor Mr. De Lima; and Howard Higa, owner of TheCab.

Senator Misalucha noted that it was National Volunteer Week before recognizing recipients of the Community Heroes Award who were seated in the gallery: Larry Veray of Pearl City and Karen Higa of 'Aiea. Joining them were Ms. Higa's husband, Lester, and granddaughter Parker; Keone Kealoha, executive director of Kanu Hawai'i, partner of in the Community Heroes Award; and last year's Community Heroes awardee Claire Tamamoto. RECONSIDERATION OF ACTIONS TAKEN

S.B. No. 172, S.D. 1 (H.D. 1):

Senator Dela Cruz moved that the Senate reconsider its action taken on April 8, 2022, in disagreeing to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 172, S.D. 1, seconded by Senator DeCoite and carried.

Senator Dela Cruz then moved that the Senate agree to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 172, S.D. 1, seconded by Senator DeCoite.

Senator Dela Cruz noted:

“Your Committee on Ways and Means requests to move to agree as the measure was returned to the Senate with a clean date.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 172, S.D. 1, and S.B. No. 172, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GRANTS,” was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Monday, April 25, 2022.

S.B. No. 3134, S.D. 2 (H.D. 1):

The President discharged all conferees on the part of the Senate at the conference to be held for the consideration of amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 3134, S.D. 2.

Senator Inouye moved that the Senate reconsider its action taken on April 14, 2022, in disagreeing to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 3134, S.D. 2, seconded by Senator DeCoite and carried.

Senator Inouye then moved that the Senate agree to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 3134, S.D. 2, seconded by Senator DeCoite.

Senator Inouye noted:

“The House amendments do not change the bill language considerably, and there is an effective date; there’s no reason to disagree.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 3134, S.D. 2, and S.B. No. 3134, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PAYMENT OF DEBT SERVICE ON THE TURTLE BAY REIMBURSABLE GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS,” was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Monday, April 25, 2022.

S.C.R. No. 90 (H.D. 1):

Senator Gabbard moved that the Senate reconsider its action taken on April 20, 2022, in disagreeing to the amendments proposed by the House to S.C.R. No. 90, seconded by Senator DeCoite and carried.

Senator Gabbard then moved that the Senate agree to the amendments proposed by the House to S.C.R. No. 90, seconded by Senator DeCoite.

Senator Gabbard noted:

“The amendments strengthen the intent of the measure.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.C.R. No. 90, and S.C.R. No. 90, H.D. 1, entitled: “SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION URGING MARINE CORPS BASE HAWAII TO UPGRADE THE CAPACITY OF ITS SEWAGE TREATMENT PLANT AND REDUNDANCY OF THE COMPONENTS TO ENSURE THAT FINAL EFFLUENT QUALITY IS IN COMPLIANCE WITH STATE PERMITTING REQUIREMENTS,” was placed on the calendar for Final Adoption on Monday, April 25, 2022.

At this time, Senator Gabbard rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Mr. President, colleagues, staff, and guests: on this auspicious day, we are celebrating two important events—Earth Day and happy Aloha Hemp Friday. For Earth Day, as I finish my 13th year as your Environment committee chair, I want to mahalo each of you who have helped over the years to basically keep paradise paradise. We still have much work to do, so let’s continue trying our best to mālama ‘āina. If you haven’t already,

and if the spirit moves you, for you tree huggers, I hope that you’ll go outside in your backyard and embrace your plumeria or papaya tree, or maybe take a stroll down the beach at sunset or even around your neighborhood and appreciate the natural beauty that surrounds us. So, Happy Earth Day; mahalo ke akua.

“And as far as happy Aloha Hemp Day, for those of you who don’t know or don’t remember, a bit of hemp history. It was in 1999: Act 305 was enacted in Hawai‘i, establishing a hemp research project on a small plot in Wahiawā that lasted three years. Hemp shampoo maker of Alterna Professional haircare products funded the project with a \$200,000 grant, and the results of the project found that the Chinese variety of hemp seed was the best for Hawai‘i. Governor Cayetano declared December 14, 1999, as Industrial Hemp Day, and marked Hawai‘i as the first U.S. state to plant industrial hemp seed since World War II. There’s an old saying about the wheels of government turning painfully slowly, and we’ve come a long way since then. In 2014, the federal Farm Bill included a provision to allow the growing of industrial hemp for research purposes as long as it’s connected to a university or department of ag. We’ve gone from 8 licensed hemp farmers in 2018, to 50 in 2020, to 91 USDA-licensed hemp growers as of December 2021. So, although our Hawai‘i hemp industry is still in the process of successfully growing, we’re hopeful the future will bring bountiful harvest of this remarkable plant. Fellow hempsters: don’t forget, immediately following session, we’ll meet in the Rotunda with our House hempsters for a group photo. Mahalo, and hemp hemp hooray!”

The Chair then made the following announcement:

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 4060 (Gov. Msg. No. 754):

Senator Baker moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 4060 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Chang and carried.

Senator Baker then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of NAOMI KUWAYE to the Public Utilities Commission, term to expire June 30, 2028, seconded by Senator Chang.

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"Ms. Kuwaye graduated from the University of Hawai'i with a degree in journalism and political science. She then received a juris doctor with a certificate in environmental and national

resources law from Lewis & Clark Northwestern School of Law located in Portland, Oregon. Her background experience and commitment to public service qualify Ms. Kuwaye for appointment to the Public Utilities Commission. She has over 30 years of experience practicing law, specializing in environmental and natural resource law, real estate development, telecommunications law, public utilities, and administrative law.

“Ms. Kuwaye has worked with Ashford & Wriston, LLP, since 2012. She has gained considerable experience and knowledge in the regulatory aspects of electric and telecommunication industries, and has worked on principal market rate authority and transmission cases before the Public Utilities Commission, which has resulted in the establishment of new policies. She also recognizes and supports the State’s energy policies and goals. She is familiar with the oversight and administrative role of the Public Utilities Commission, the regulatory responsibilities that the commission is required to fulfill, and the importance of balancing various interests from different perspectives. Ms. Kuwaye is familiar with the scope of review and procedural requirements of the Public Utilities Commission, and her insight and knowledge will be beneficial in light of the many complex dockets that the PUC must review. Ms. Kuwaye has also served as chair, vice chair, and program chair for the Natural Resources Section of the Hawaii State Bar Association, has been invited to speak and serve as a panelist on a number of issues involving land use, government, boundary issues, Clean Water Act compliance, critical habitat, and endangered species issues. She has broad and extensive knowledge of public utilities law, and I believe she will be an invaluable complement to the expertise of the other public utilities commissioners. I ask all of my colleagues to join me in support of Ms. Kuwaye. Mahalo.”

Senator Fevella rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“I want to request the previous speaker’s words (Senator Roz Baker from South and West Maui) to be inserted into the Journal as my own. (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.) And the reason I want to say this, Senate President, is because I wasn’t there for the vote. I went down for the rally on the minimum wage bill. I didn’t have to cast my vote, but I asked questions of the nominee, and she answered the questions correctly and was very informative. The reason why I had questions in the beginning of this nomination is because of certain projects that she worked on as the attorney. She was hired to do a job. It doesn’t show that she supported it or she was against it. She just did her job, like anybody else that has a job that they have to do. Sometimes they don’t want to do it, but they’re hired to do it, and that’s why I have a lot of respect for this nominee. For these reasons, I also ask my colleagues to support her nomination. Thank you.”

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

“I agree that Ms. Kuwaye is highly qualified. My concerns deal with a pending petition in front of the PUC. My opposition stems only for this one petition; it bothers me that she is unwilling to recuse herself for this pending petition. If she was willing to recuse herself for that, then I would wholeheartedly support it, but when she told us in the committee hearing of all of what she has done for Hu Honua, and she is going to be sitting in judgment of that pending petition, then I do have a problem with that, and I do have a problem with whether or not any decisions by the PUC will then be tainted by that potential conflict of interest. For that sole reason, I stand in opposition.”

Senator Inouye rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“I request that the comments of the Maui senator of District 6 be inserted into the Journal as if it was my own. Mahalo.” (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

Senator Kim rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Mr. President, I’d be remiss not to speak up. Ms. Kuwaye worked for me, came to me when I was in the City Council. I was a zoning chair, and she came to me as an intern, and she did such a great job that she ended up volunteering for no pay. Then we ended up hiring her as a part-timer, and then a full-time. During her time, I was doing land use and zoning, and she became interested in that area, went on to law school, got her degree, and the rest is history. I have every confidence with Naomi and my relationship with her as far as her credibility, her ethicalness, I think is certainly and need not be spoken about, but I assure all of you that you might be surprised what she will do—she will do the right thing—and I believe if she feels she needs to recuse herself, she will do so when the time is there. And so I have every faith in her, and I urge my colleagues to support her nomination. Thank you.”

Senator Riviere rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

“I feel very strongly with everyone else that she is eminently qualified for this position, but I do share the senator from Big Island’s concern about the potential for recusal on some big cases. Her track record is well established. There may be many opportunities where people are contesting or petitioning for her recusal, and that has the potential of bogging down the proceedings on numerous cases. For those reasons, I must vote in opposition. Thank you.”

Senator Acasio rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

“Please insert into the Journal the comments from the senator from the North Shore. I am also very concerned about the potential for slowing down the process because the intervenors do have the right to request recusal, and looking into that, we already have the process going slow enough. Also, the concern that if one is recused because of conflict of interest or even the appearance of conflict of interest, within our community, for trust in government and trust in the process, it just kind of breaks that down a little bit, but also we have, then, only two PUC commissioners, and that’s difficult if they have opposing viewpoints. So, thank you very much.”

Senator Kidani rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“I’d like to request that you insert the comments of the senator from Maui into the Journal as if they were my own.” (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Keohokalole explained that Ms. Arita-Chang was another hero of the State of Hawai'i and that she had done incredible work on communications for the Department of Health related to Red Hill as well as the vaccination plan that was rolled out with the Department of Health last year. Senator Keohokalole clarified that all of the graphics the members had seen on social media to help convey what was going on around the vaccination plan was due to Ms. Arita-Chang's work. Accompanying Ms. Arita-Chang was her husband, Dan Kouchi.

Senator Misalucha rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"I've always been envious when Senator Kidani makes this kind of announcement, so I hope that you would indulge me. Congratulations to the Pearl City champions, the Chargers, who swept the Nānākuli Golden Hawks last night, 25–21, 25–18, 25–19, to win the 2022 Oahu Interscholastic Association Division II boys volleyball championship at a packed and very loud Jim Alegre Gymnasium at Radford High School. Congratulations—go, Chargers!"

The Chair replied that he had caught the end of the match, and it had been so noisy he had thought it was a sold-out college match.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"So, last time when I gave my remarks, we were wearing the masks, and it's hard to give a 50-page speech wearing your mask, so what I'm going to do is, I'm just going to give some highlights and then written remarks and I'll share it with the members.

"Mr. President, working with the committee, members of the Senate, and the House of Representatives, we have shored up the largest budget surplus in the history of the State of Hawai'i,

and we ask for your support of the Senate's conference position in the supplemental budget. I want to give a big mahalo to Finance chair; I appreciate her ability to see the big picture and understand the inner workings of government and how it operates. We met almost every day for three weeks, hours on end, discussing all of your priorities, all of the House's priorities, all of the Legislature's priorities, our communities' priorities, the administration's priorities to develop a sound budget—a complete budget. But to just demonstrate how she understands the inner workings of our government, just look at what she was able to do when implementing the restaurant card during COVID and our conversations about that and how we can make sure we help small business. Another example of her understanding is when she volunteered to work at the unemployment office to process claims. I know the COVID committee, when we went to the Convention Center, we would see her working, and we all appreciate the effort that she brought there.

“Working closely with House Finance, the Senate put together a budget that aims to make progress to make programs and services whole again after budget reductions over the last two years. Special attention was paid to providing salary differentials for hard-to-recruit and -retain state positions. In addition, making available workforce development education and training opportunities to ensure that the state government employment and public service remained competitive and sought-after career choice. We have worked countless hours to craft a budget that ensures that our government will continue to serve the people of this great state with fiscal sustainability and fidelity. With increased revenue collections coupled with the reality that our communities are still rebounding from record job losses, business closures, and the need to secure affordable housing and health care, we have been vigilant to assemble a budget that is fiscally prudent yet courageous in addressing numerous one-time expenditures for sorely needed repairs and maintenance in our schools, hospitals, parks, highways, and other government facilities. We are boldly moving forward with infusing large appropriations toward mental health services, dental care, child welfare safeguards, Kupuna Care and caregiver programs, and affordable home and rental projects across the state.

“The Senate conference position of supplemental budget for fiscal years '22 to '23 puts forth a state budget total of \$7.4 billion in general funds and \$15.7 billion in all means of financing in fiscal year '22, and \$8.7 billion in general funds and \$16.9 billion in all means of financing for fiscal year '23. The House Bill 1600 includes the base budget for the executive branch for fiscal year '21 from Act 88, Session Laws of Hawaii; incorporates many of the governor's supplemental budget requests; restores many general funded positions; and utilizes surplus funds on one-time expenditures that will not require year-after-year funding.

“As a result of passage of House Bill 1600, our great state will benefit in the following ways:

“For agriculture: \$650,000 for rabies quarantine; \$425,000 for invasive pet species, such as coffee berry borer beetle, spittlebug, and Japanese beetle, mainly impacting two industries—coffee and ranching; \$26 million to upgrade the Wahiawa Dam and spillway and purchase land at fee simple interest; \$660,000 for aquaculture development, including four permanent positions and operating expenses; \$1.5 million for security services to address trespassing, abandonment of vehicles on agricultural land, and other security issues on vacant land; \$800,000 for ungulate fencing for local farmers primarily on neighbor islands; \$550,000 for improvement of Menhune Ditch; \$800,000 for irrigation management; \$1.5 million for accelerator awards to support startup companies; \$225,000 to fund one economist position and two surveys to double local

food production with the USDA; and \$800,000 for a pesticide disposal program.

“For culture and arts: \$500,000 for a creative grant program for the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts, \$200,00 for an artist fellowship program, \$2 million to support the mission of 'Iolani Palace, \$10 million for Bishop Museum for capital improvements, and \$7.5 million to support programming and operations of the Bishop Museum.

“For economic and workforce development: \$660,000 to cover the costs of moving expenses for DBEDT's offices, \$160,000 in state matching funds for the Business Development & Support Division to apply for federal grants of \$800,000 to support eligible small business concerns, \$490,000 and seven new positions for the Hawaii State Energy Office to support renewable energy projects across the state, \$1.5 million for accelerator awards to support startup companies, \$1 million for Manufacturing Assistance Program award, \$1.5 million for Hawaii Small Business Innovation Research grants, \$1 million in state matching funds for Naval Research grants, \$2.3 million to establish a Carbon Smart Land Management Assistance Pilot Program and Hawaii Air Noise and Safety Task Force, \$13.8 million for electrical infrastructure upgrades to Kalaheo, \$450,000 for one-stop workforce information for workforce development, \$5.2 million for seven positions for high school and post-high school internships across state departments, \$321 million for unemployment benefit payment program to increase unemployment benefit payments, \$150,000 to fund five positions for Office of Community Services to administer grant-in-aid awards, and \$2 million for emergency food assistance programs.

“For education: \$32.5 million for teacher differentials to address several areas, including hard-to-staff concerns in certain geographical locations, special education, and Hawaiian language immersion; \$6.3 million to furnish and equip new classrooms across the state; \$118,000 and one position for alternative learning center in Nānākuli-Wai'anae; \$2.8 million to add twenty-one positions to establish a new nursing section to coordinate and provide clinical supervision for schools; \$332,000 and two positions for Hawai'i State Teacher Fellows Program, which looks to build and empower teacher voices and perspectives; \$1.1 million to increase Indexed Complex Area Administration program for classroom supplies, instructional materials, materials and resources for professional learning and communities, and technology to provide equity to access to students; \$600,00 for Grow Our Own Teacher stipends; \$1 million for the pilot special education teacher mentor program; \$1 million to deploy sensor network in air-conditioned classrooms to optimize classroom air conditioning; \$1 million to install security cameras at eleven libraries; \$750,000 for public libraries to purchase digital and physical materials; \$2 million to provide menstrual products at schools; \$3 million to convert 40-year-old barcode system to RFID technology for our libraries; positions and \$200,000 for workforce development coordination at McKinley and Waipahu Schools for Adults; \$250,000 for education programs for incarcerated women; \$2 million for charter school teacher differentials; \$850,000 for the Wai'anae fish hatchery program; \$98,000 for one position for charter schools to ensure civil rights compliance; and \$130 million for the repricing for contracts for our educators.

“At the University of Hawai'i: \$7.2 million and \$800,000 in funds for UH Mānoa and UH Hilo athletics, \$1.7 million to expand JABSOM's graduate residency program to neighbor islands, \$86,000 for Hawai'i Institute of Marine Biology, \$1.8 million for additional nursing and clinical instructors, \$580,000 to improve the Ernst Theatre at UH Mānoa, \$660,000 and four positions to address teacher shortage in Hawai'i, \$190,000 and two positions for an aviation program at UH Hilo,

\$2.9 million and fourteen positions for 'Imiloa immersion program at UH Hilo, \$836,000 and three positions for the Maui Food Innovation Center, \$390,000 and eight positions for the Culinary Institute of the Pacific at KCC, and \$1.5 million and seven positions for computer science engineering positions for the IT internship program at UH Mānoa and UH Hilo.

"For our natural resources protection and management of the environment: \$3 million for public lands management operating expenses, nearly \$900,000 and seven new land agent positions across the state, \$1.8 million in additional funds for first responders overtime helicopter contracts and repair of firefighting equipment for the native resources and fire protection program, \$350,000 in additional funds for Rapid 'Ōhi'a Death, \$1.5 million in additional funds for Hawaii Invasive Species Council, \$1.2 million and three positions for axis deer mitigation, \$454,000 in salary increases for seventeen senior historic preservation positions for recruitment and retention to ensure SHPD gets the help it needs, \$615,000 for Historic Preservation to handle anticipated workflow accompanying incoming infrastructure of federal funds, \$50,000 for the creation of a rustic parking area and trail maintenance at Maunawili Trail, \$400,000 for KIRC, \$2 million for security services at critical infrastructure locations, \$290,000 and twelve positions for the marine security division to provide additional protection for Hawai'i's beaches and wildlife, \$500,000 for Maalaea Harbor, \$4 million for Honokohau Small Boat Harbor wastewater infrastructure, \$2 million for trail cleanup and restoration, \$72,000 and two cultural resource specialist positions for KIRC, and \$200,000 for the Aha Moku Advisory Committee.

"For government operations: \$3.3 million for retainment and pay differential for the attorney general's office; \$1.6 million to revitalize the statewide career criminal and victim witness program; \$115,000 and three positions to establish victim witness support team to assist victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, and human trafficking; \$1.6 million to establish a new office for human trafficking abatement; \$6.7 million to modernize the aging keiki database for the keiki support enforcement services division; \$33 million to leverage federal funds to expand broadband deployment; \$335 million to restore prefunding of other post-employment benefits; eight positions and \$547,000 for the division of vocational licensing to improve processing of licensure applications; \$100,000 to establish one threat assessment planner for the Office of Homeland Security; \$645,000 to clear foliage around the State Veterans Cemetery; \$125,000 to obtain excavator and utility tractor for our State Veterans Cemetery to assist with burial and groundskeeping duties; restoration of \$5 million to our major disaster fund; \$396,000 for contracts, electricity, travel, and transportation for our National Guard; \$35 million for plans, design, and construction and equipment for infrastructure for HI-EMA.

"For health and human services: \$5 million for COVID-19 testing; \$16 million for HHSC; \$500,000 for needs and site assessment for a new Kona hospital; nearly \$9 million for the Maui Health System; \$16 million for HHSC Oahu Region; \$540,000 and eight positions, including three clinical psychologists and three psychiatrists, for adult mental health outpatient; \$3.5 million for Hawai'i State Hospital forensic building operations; \$14 million for Hawai'i State Laboratory for modernizing our existing lab facility; \$60,000 to restore funding for one communication access specialist, whose primary responsibility includes credential signing, language interpreters, and communications access for our state programs and services; \$1.2 million for ambulances for Hawai'i County; \$1.6 million for Maui and Kaua'i emergency medical services; \$280,000 and five positions for Office of Long-Term Care Ombudsman; \$2.6 million for kupuna programs; \$1.5 million for aging and disability resource centers across our state; \$200,000 for one program specialist for Office of Language

Access; two additional social worker positions for child protective services programs; \$3 million in operating and twenty-five positions to implement a childcare subsidy program within the department statewide for eligible low-income families in addition to \$7 million to assist families with childcare payments; \$2 million to fund a database and wage subsidy for early learning educators; \$450,000 to fund maintenance and repair as well as services to transfer youth to mental health residential programs; \$400,000 for sex trafficking victim support services; \$1.8 million for the exit and retention bonus payment program to help families successfully exit the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families program; \$6 million for TANF program to procure innovative afterschool services; \$2.5 million for the department's response to COVID-19 and ongoing pandemic activities; nearly \$6 million to expand postpartum coverage from two to twelve months for Med-QUEST patients to increase lifesaving screening services; and \$26 million to provide adult dental benefits to Med-QUEST patients under Option 2, including both cleaning and treatment services.

"For housing: \$500,000 in additional funds for rental assistance services program, \$10 million for lift of federal fund ceiling increase for rental assistance services, \$4 million for Temporary Assistance for Other Needy Families, and \$24 million to fund additional housing subsidies of up to \$500 per month for TANF and TAONF program participants who are participating in the First-to-Work Program.

"For Native Hawaiians: \$10 million for Native Hawaiian housing activities; \$1 million to fund twenty positions important to land leases, loans, and fiscal services; and \$35 million for planning and development for Hawaiian homesteads.

"For public safety: \$320,000 to add six clinical psychologists to provide evening and weekend psychology services for inmates suffering from mental health crisis, \$870,000 to add seventeen registered nurses to expand 24-hour nursing services to five correctional facilities, and \$626,000 for Crime Victim Compensation Commission.

"For transportation: \$17 million to revitalize the Wiki Wiki bus program to provide efficient and safe transportation; \$1.2 million for routine maintenance at Lihue Airport; and \$2.3 million to pay for increased costs of utilities at Kahului, Molokai, Lanai, and Kapalua Airports.

"For our harbors: \$1.2 million to pay for debt service increases for the Johnson Controls energy-saving lease financing agreement; \$1 million for increased costs for utility security services and maintenance at the Honolulu, Kalaheo, Barbers Point, Hilo, Kawaihae, Kahului, and Kaunakakai Harbors.

"And for our highways: \$2 million for invasive species removal focusing on albizia trees, \$195,000 for repair and maintenance of street lights and upgrades to LED in Hawai'i County, \$10 million to fund stored property and debris removal to clean up unauthorized encampments on state lands and to store important belongings, \$800,000 for repair and maintenance for smart traffic controllers to continue Intelligent Transportation System initiative, and \$800,000 to purchase a mobile scanner to help with property damage and natural disaster assessment and mitigation.

"In closing, I'd like to thank the members of the Ways and Means committee, all the members of the Senate, the Senate leadership, and the committee chairs for their hard work. I'd like to acknowledge again the House members and the Finance chair for their hard work, their effort, their time, and dedication, as well as the efforts and hard work of our vice chair, who handled the CIP. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"It's been over two decades since the Medicaid dental benefits have been eliminated from Medicaid, and I really thank WAM chair, WAM committee in finally funding what has long been needed for those in ALICE families and, not only that—the investment in early childhood education. This budget is finally putting us back on track into the safety and health of our ALICE families, so thank you very much."

Senator Fevella rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"I just want to thank the Ways and Means committee chair and even Finance committee chair and her vice chair. Since I've been here, I've seen a lot of things being done here, and the difficult task is balancing our budget and getting our budget out, not only for the programs that we are so blessed to have, but just keeping Hawai'i moving—going forward. So, I want to just add additional comments to the Journal, if I could, Senate President."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Fevella's additional remarks read as follows:

"I am grateful for the inclusion of Capital Improvement Project funds in the State Budget for Senate District 19: \$6 Million for James Campbell High School; \$152,408 for Ewa Beach Library; \$75,000 for West Oahu Regional Transportation Improvements; and over \$1,385,000 in grant-in-aid funds for community projects for the benefit of resident of District 19."

"I will continue to work diligently to advocate for our community of 'Ewa Beach. I will look to find solutions and ideas to keep 'Ewa Beach safe and to have a better quality of life for everyone. I remain committed to public service and protecting our community."

The Chair made the following comments:

"I would also like to extend my thanks to the Ways and Means chair, the vice chair, members of the Ways and Means committee, all of the committee chairs. I think that the Ways and Means chair did a great job in communicating with all of the committee chairs in listening and addressing your priorities and community concerns. Certainly, too, his staff and all of the support staff would put in long hours to make sure that we could get the budget document prepared and here today before us for the final vote."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 209-22 was adopted and H.B. No. 1600, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

At 10:30 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 10:35 a.m.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 102-22 (S.B. No. 3048, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Chang moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 102-22 be adopted and S.B. No. 3048, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Kanuha.

Senator Dela Cruz then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 9) to S.B. No. 3048, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1:

SECTION 1. Senate Bill No. 3048, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by amending page 4, lines 11 through 16, to read as follows:

"SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$1,594,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 for computer software and hardware; information technology improvements; videoconferencing improvements; and scanning and digitization equipment, services, and warranties."

SECTION 2. Senate Bill No. 3048, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by adding a new section beginning at page 5, line 1, to read as follows::

"PART V

SECTION 8. From the American Rescue Plan funds appropriation for disease outbreak control (HTH131) as appropriated in House Bill No. 1600, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, the sum of \$5,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the procurement of rapid antigen tests to detect coronavirus disease 2019, with preference given to procuring such tests that have received emergency use authorization from the United States Food and Drug Administration, and that were developed in the State of Hawaii."

SECTION 3. Senate Bill No. 3048, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by adding a new section beginning at page 5, as appropriately placed to read as follows:

"PART VI

SECTION 9. In accordance with article VII, section 9, of the Hawaii State Constitution, and sections 37-91 and 37-93, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the appropriations contained within this Act will cause the state general fund expenditures for fiscal year 2022-2023 to exceed the general fund expenditure ceiling by \$213,189,484, or 2.10 per cent. The general fund expenditure ceiling will be exceeded for the following reasons:

- (1) The appropriations made in this Act are necessary to serve the public interest; and
- (2) The appropriations made in this Act meet the needs addressed by this Act."

SECTION 4. Senate Bill No. 3048, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by renumbering sections 8, 9, and 10 as sections 10, 11, and 12, respectively.

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Floor Amendment No. 9 be adopted, seconded by Senator Chang.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"Your committee on conference is requesting for this floor amendment to insert an appropriation of \$1,040,000 for equipment, improvements, and digitization for HHFDC."

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 9 was put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Dela Cruz then moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 102-22 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Chang and carried.

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 3048, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE FUNDS," was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Thursday, May 5, 2022.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 116-22 (H.B. No. 2512, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator San Buenaventura moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 116-22 be adopted and H.B. No. 2512, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Chang.

Senator San Buenaventura then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 10) to H.B. No. 2512, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 2512, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, is amended by changing the reference from section 46-1.5(5)(B), Hawaii Revised Statutes, to section 46-1.5(5)(D), Hawaii Revised Statutes, on page 4, line 10.

Senator San Buenaventura moved that Floor Amendment No. 10 be adopted, seconded by Senator Kanuha.

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“This floor amendment just fixes a typographical error that was inadvertently placed in the C.D. 1.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 10 was put by the Chair and carried.

Senator San Buenaventura then moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 116-22 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Kanuha and carried.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 2512, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OHANA ZONES,” was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Thursday, May 5, 2022.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 175-22 (H.B. No. 1800, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Gabbard moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 175-22 be adopted and H.B. No. 1800, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Wakai.

Senator Dela Cruz then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 11) to H.B. No. 1800, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1:

The sum appropriated shall be expended by the Hawaii state energy office for the purposes of this part.”

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Floor Amendment No. 11 be adopted, seconded by Senator Gabbard.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“Your committee on conference is requesting for this floor amendment to insert appropriation language for \$350,000 into the energy security special fund for the Hawaii State Energy Office to analyze pathways and to develop recommendations for achieving the state’s economy-wide decarbonization goals, as required in section 4 of this bill.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 11 was put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Dela Cruz then moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 175-22 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Gabbard and carried.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 1800, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CLIMATE MITIGATION,” was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Thursday, May 5, 2022.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 202-22 (H.B. No. 2424, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator San Buenaventura moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 202-22 be adopted and H.B. No. 2424, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Kanuha.

Senator San Buenaventura then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 12) to H.B. No. 2424, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 2424, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, is amended by adding a new section at page 10, line 12, to read as follows:

“SECTION 7. If any provision of this Act, or the application thereof to any person or circumstance, is held invalid, the invalidity does not affect other provisions or applications of the Act that can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Act are severable.”

SECTION 2. House Bill No. 2424, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, is amended by renumbering sections 7 and 8 as sections 8 and 9, respectively.

Senator San Buenaventura moved that Floor Amendment No. 12 be adopted, seconded by Senator Kanuha.

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“Mr. President, your conference committee just wishes to add a severability section to House Bill No. 2424.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 12 was put by the Chair and carried.

Senator San Buenaventura then moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 202-22 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Kanuha and carried.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 2424, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD WELFARE SERVICES,” was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Thursday, May 5, 2022.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 217-22 (S.B. No. 2218, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Gabbard moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 217-22 be adopted and S.B. No. 2218, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Dela Cruz then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 14) to S.B. No. 2218, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1:

SECTION 1. Senate Bill No. 2218, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by amending section 1, page 2, lines 1 through 4, to read as follows:

“Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to establish a five-year food hub pilot program under the department of agriculture and appropriate funds for the program.”

SECTION 2. Senate Bill No. 2218, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by amending section 4, page 5, line 18 through page 6, line 4, to read as follows:

“SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$1,500,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 for the establishment of a five-year food hub pilot program, including the awarding of grant moneys to qualifying food hubs.

The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of agriculture for the purposes of this Act.”

SECTION 3. Senate Bill No. 2218, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by deleting section 5 on page 6, lines 5 through 14.

SECTION 4. Senate Bill No. 2218, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by deleting section 6 on page 6, lines 15 through 19.

SECTION 5. Senate Bill No. 2218, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by renumbering section 7 as section 5.

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Floor Amendment No. 14 be adopted, seconded by Senator Gabbard.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“Your committee on conference is requesting for this floor amendment to remove the appropriation language of \$750,000 in general obligation bonds and to move it to general revenue appropriation for the grants program. This would be a total of \$1.5 million for the Department of Agriculture food hub pilot grants program.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 14 was put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Dela Cruz then moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 217-22 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Gabbard and carried.

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 2218, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO A FOOD HUB PILOT PROGRAM,” was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Thursday, May 5, 2022.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 236-22 (S.B. No. 514, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 236-22 be adopted and S.B. No. 514, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Dela Cruz then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 13) to S.B. No. 514, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1:

SECTION 1. Senate Bill 514, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, section 6, is amended to read as follows:

“SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2022; provided that section 3 of this Act shall apply to taxable years beginning after December 31, 2020.”

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Floor Amendment No. 13 be adopted, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“Your committee on conference is requesting for this floor amendment to effect the taxable year to ‘after 2020.’ The bill currently reads as ‘2021.’”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 13 was put by the Chair and carried.

“Mr. President, I rise in support of this measure, which requires the University of Hawaii to establish K-12 expanded teaching cohort programs in each county for students who are pursuing undergraduate degrees in education. Due to a variety of factors, Hawaii has long suffered from a shortage of qualified public school teachers. Recent data reflect another long-term trend: teachers leaving Hawaii or resigning for other non-retirement reasons has outpaced retirement as the top reason for attrition in the last three years. During the 2020-2021 school year, seven hundred seventy-one teachers resigned for non-retirement reasons, compared with six hundred seventy-four in 2019-2020 and seven hundred fifty-five in 2018-2019. In total, 1,199 teachers separated from the Department of Education in the 2020-2021 school year, compared to nine hundred sixty-one in 2019-2020.

“Anecdotally, the teacher shortage is more acute for our rural and neighbor island communities. The University of Hawaii needs to be the foundation for ‘growing our own’ educators. But the University of Hawaii System does not offer a sufficient number of classes required for students majoring in education and pursuing undergraduate degrees, especially on the neighbor islands. Expanding the pipeline to ‘grow our own’ educators for the State builds capacity on all islands, including the neighbor islands where shortages are most severe, and provides residents with an opportunity to remain in Hawaii and support local communities. As the University of Hawaii serves as a major pipeline to produce teachers for the State, this issue is a matter of statewide concern pursuant to article X, section 6, of the Hawaii State Constitution.

“This measure is important to support aspiring teachers—especially on the neighbor islands—by expanding course availability throughout the UH system. I encourage my colleagues to join me in supporting this important bill.”

“Mr. President, I rise in support. This bill is an administration measure and the draft before us contains much of what the Governor proposed to clarify some of the language of the existing statute. The Governor recognizes substantial public dissatisfaction with the unprecedented use of Chapter 127A authority by the current administration for a health emergency rather than the usual natural disasters where such powers were used in the past. This pandemic has raised questions about how our existing emergency powers statute operates, especially as the COVID-19 emergency stretched out beyond the periods that in the case of a natural disaster would have been finished. The breadth of the emergency proclamations led to the shutdown of Hawaii’s economy, resulting in a lot of hardship for both residents and local businesses. The virus’ unpredictability led to the perception of ever-changing protocols and unclear direction. Even as public parks, businesses, and restaurants were allowed to be re-opened, Hawaii remained in a state of emergency. With this came the suspension of access to public records, among other suspension of Hawaii laws. No other state suspended its entire public records law. Doing so did not protect either public health or public safety and fostered an expanded backlog on an already onerous process. This draft also includes important limitations that the legislature, as a co-equal branch of government and the representatives of the communities that sent us to the Capitol, added as necessary checks on the Governor’s authority to issue and re-issue emergency proclamations. The draft before us sets an appropriate balance of deference to the Governor’s initial determination while allowing the public’s representatives the opportunity to intervene when the emergency has waned in our collective view. Mr. President, SB3089 SD2 HD2 CD1 clarifies the emergency powers afforded to the governor in Hawaii Revised Statutes Chapter §127A and ensures the public will not be subject to

continuing restrictions far beyond what is required to address the specific and identified event requiring an emergency proclamation. Further, this bill authorizes the legislature and county councils to terminate a state of emergency by an affirmative two-thirds vote. Maintaining a system of checks and balances is a fundamental tenet of our democracy that prevents the concentration of power, often seen as the root of tyranny. Any one individual should not have unilateral authority to suspend laws indefinitely without a mechanism for public input and review. I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting this measure.”

"Mr. President, I rise in support. This bill is the legislature's effort to address the longtime issue of salary compression, which perhaps most notably affects the educators in the Hawaii State Teachers Association. Hawaii teachers are paid according to a step schedule that, in theory, reflects their years of service. However, in the past decade or so, step increases have been stalled several times due to economic downturns and most recently, the pandemic. Approximately 8,700 teachers, librarians, and counselors suffer from salary compression, making the same amount as their colleagues with far less experience.

"This issue of underpayment extends beyond our educators and affects members of many unions across the state. Although historically the delay in raises was due to a lack of available funds, there is presently no timeline requirements for negotiating new or implementing already agreed upon salary provisions in a union contract. This means that employer-union contracts may be agreed upon with no solid plans for the employer to carry out the terms, effectively nullifying the negotiation.

"SB2707 SD1 HD1 CD1 will ensure that union members can collectively bargain salary increases and implement the negotiations in a timely manner. The 121,000 union members in Hawaii are the backbone of our economy and granting their long overdue salary increases shows we value their contributions to our state. "Visitors to my island who could not spend nearly \$1000 on a week-long car rental turned to our nascent public transportation system, ride-sharing apps and taxis, or even rented moving vans to get around. On Maui, rental cars remain essential to most visitors. Many of the island's popular hiking spots, beaches, and natural attractions are either remote or inaccessible by bus.

"With no reliable island-wide public transportation system that can take you from Kapalua to Hana, a continuously limited stock of rental vehicles due to supply chain interruptions, and far less ride sharing options than Oahu, Maui became a ripe

environment for peer-to-peer car sharing to emerge and thrive. These increasingly popular car sharing programs fill the consumer's need for a reasonably affordable yet flexible transportation option, while allowing locals to rent out their cars and make an extra buck. However, these programs are presently unregulated in Hawaii. The bottom line may be appealing to visitors, but the industry's lack of oversight puts both the driver and owner at an increased risk of deceptive trade practices.

"Mr. President, as was the practice with other peer-to-peer product sharing rental companies, startups, websites, and apps that came before, it is the legislature's responsibility to protect consumers from potentially predatory businesses or unchecked bad actors.

"Therefore, HB 1971 HD2 SD1 CD1 authorizes and regulates these popular peer-to-peer car sharing programs by imposing the general excise tax and rental car surcharge tax on peer-to-peer shared cars and requiring lessors to register with the Department of Taxation. By subjecting peer-to-peer car sharing programs to the same taxes as existing rental car companies, we are offsetting the wear and tear on our roads and highways with a deposit into the state's coffers. Additionally, the programs increase access to affordable rental cars and draw more working-class families to our islands, further stimulating our economy. Please join me in supporting this measure."

Senator Moriwaki rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"I support those who don't want persons jailed if they are too poor to pay cash bail, but I oppose mandating judges to release defendants over a broad swath of non-violent offenses. The judges make their decisions and, under Chapter 804, they are required to evaluate all factors in determining the amount of bail and the conditions of release.

"Advocates point to the 2017 Criminal Pretrial Task Force recommendations enacted under Act 179 in 2019. This was prior to the COVID-19 pandemic. The attorney general reminds us the Criminal Justice Research Institute was to evaluate the effectiveness of Act 179 reforms as to whether they increased our safety **and** maximized release of those who posed no danger or flight risk. Before jumping the gun, why not gather data and establish policies that work to achieve Act 179's objectives?"

"In other words, H.B. 1567, C.D. 1 is premature. Many of those who steal from and accost or taunt our residents, workers, and visitors, especially in Waikīkī, if released, may well go on to commit violent crimes. Ninety-four percent of crimes committed in Waikīkī are so-called non-violent. They include larceny, burglary, harassment, auto theft. This measure would require judges to release such offenders.

"Criminals target Waikīkī because they know visitors are unlikely to come back and testify against them. Criminals target businesses because they know employees cannot pursue them for shoplifting. Police in my district complain about their 'frequent flyer' problem, meaning they charge and arrest repeat offenders only to see them back on the streets 48 hours later. Already, judges frequently release non-violent offenders on their own recognizance. This measure will exacerbate the problem of habitual non-violent criminals by removing a needed judge's discretion. Judges should be able to evaluate all factors on a case-by-case basis to determine whether a person is a danger to the community, will be a risk of appearing in court, or will re-offend once released. This bill will also remove the prosecutor's ability to leverage drug offenders into treatment programs. The jail capacity problem shouldn't be addressed by forcing judges to release criminals to free up jail space or save

money. For these reasons, I will vote 'no' on this measure. Thank you, Mr. President."

"Colleagues, I oppose this bill because Hawaii gun laws are already one of the strictest in the nation. This bill will inconvenience only law-abiding citizens, and not criminals. This bill will make law-abiding citizens—criminals."

This means is bans new technology without even trying to regulate it. You put a lot of exception on other new technology—with the drones flying all over the place by allowing time limits and other kinds of restrictions. But then what about our fishermen, who now are getting up in age, who may be disabled, and now with the use of drones they can go back out there with their family and probably fish for ulua?"

"I know there are a lot of mixed feelings about this measure. But why are we limited the use of a new technology. We should be open-minded to new technology, that includes rules and regulations. Instead this measure bans drones without even trying to regulate it. I understand there are some who don't follow the rules, and they fly drones over people surfing, above boats, and above people using the beach. But there are a lot of other things that people don't follow the rules, but we don't ban them, outright? So I oppose this measure because we are going to ban some people that are using this new technology to provide food on the table for their family. Is this what we want to do? Are we going to continue to ban these things? Then, if we're going to do that, then we should ban long-line fishing; we should ban deep-sea trawling that destroys our reefs and damages our environment. We would need to ban a lot of stuff. Instead, we are going to ban drones because a few individuals are inconvenienced because the fishing lines are going to cross over their swimming area or their boating area. We need to have

restrictions and have laws to restrict the use of drones in certain area and not ban them. I'm totally against this bill. Thank you."

Senator Inouye rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

"Mr. President, speaking in favor of SB 2065 CD1. With the advent of drone fishing, there have been complaints by the fishing community on how this technology is being a nuisance to traditional fishers as well as presenting new risks to marine ecosystems.

"Drone fishers use their unmanned flying machines to scout, photograph, transport bait, weights and hooks on long lines attached to traditional rod and reel setups.

"SB 2065 CD1 was drafted to prevent added disruption to ocean ecosystems and to make sure remote lines do not interfere with other users in the ocean."

"Mr. President, I rise in support of this measure that establishes the Pulehunui Community Development District under the Hawaii Community Development Authority. Creating this dedicated development district—close to the existing National Guard facility and including portions of the former Puunene Naval Air Station (and later Puunene Airport)—allows the area to qualify for federal funding, specifically USDA Rural Development grants, that can ease the local public's financial burden of development for the State agencies—including the Department of Land and Natural Resources, Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL), and the Department of Public Safety, and perhaps, the Judiciary—who have an interest locating facilities on those lands.

"The Pulehunui Master Plan is a project roughly ten years in the making and started with Maui's need to address the severe overcrowding and infrastructure issues that plague the Maui Community Correctional Center (MCCC). MCCC sits on the old Maui County jail site that was originally built in 1907. The present location was chosen before this portion of Wailuku was redeveloped as housing over the last forty years—hundreds of residential units are now a stone's throw away from the 7-acre site that has limited room for expansion.

"The public lands in Pulehunui were identified as an optimal area to build a new jail. However, installing sewer, water and power infrastructure for one site is a costly endeavor with little opportunity for a return on investment. Developing the land in Pulehunui would harness the area's strong potential for DHHL's

Maui operations, and increased growth and provide significant opportunities for other state and county projects in the vicinity.

"Developing this area will serve the Valley Isle's long-term public, business, and industrial needs and I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting this measure."

It is because we need to, first, remember that hemp is not pakalolo—marijuana. There is a flyer you have on your desk [*holds up flyer*] from me. The reason why I share this document with you is because I want you to know about the different uses of hemp. A lot of you do know here about hemp because I got educated from you. This is not pakalolo. This is not marijuana. And you cannot get high.

"The reason why I want to push this as much as we can push it, and why I really support this bill, is because I believe totally in my heart that hemp will be the next industry for agriculture. Back in the day, tourism was strong and people also moved here because of our agriculture. Now, we can have tourism still continue to strive and be strong, and revive our agricultural industry with hemp. Hemp is not only going to be able to clean and not contaminate the soil, one acre of hemp cultivation will only take three months to harvest. We can have four harvesting cycles each year—four. The hemp industry can survive by producing building material, like wood and lumber and even cement that does not give off heat and gases that we want to avoid during construction. And then we would be viable in our state with hemp products and not only we can be viable in our own state not only when we always talk about 'product of Hawai'i,' but we can be strong enough that we'll be able to use these products in our affordable homes, in our building out and everything that we need, and we can use them in here, in Hawai'i, with our own product.

"So, again, colleagues, I know this is a great bill, and I'm glad to have your support, but, again, we need to—Senator Gabbard always said, 'Let's get hemp.'"

Senator DeCoite rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"In the present form, this bill will destroy our hemp industry for the reasons my colleague across the aisle has stated. This is why this bill has come to our attention: that it will not help the farmers that are producing hemp because, in its present form, the fact that the Department of Ag has not set the rules. The federal government has given them leeway to legalize what we could do with hemp and the production of hemp. It has allowed the industry to diversify ag, and if we want to talk about minimum wage and increase, this type of industry will provide the increase for agriculture and provide those high-end jobs. In its present form, this bill would put those hemp farmers out of

business, but for the reasons that my colleague across the aisle has stated, this is the reason why we need to have this bill changed, and a floor amendment should have been put down today by both the House and Senate. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Taniguchi rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Colleagues, this bill incrementally raises the minimum wage over the next few years from the current \$10.10 per hour until it reaches \$18 per hour in January 2028. This bill also includes provisions to make the state earned income tax credit fully refundable and permanent. With our state Senate advocating strongly for meaningful minimum wage increases over the past four years, I'm very pleased that this measure is finally poised for passage. A higher minimum wage is long overdue and will greatly assist working families and enhance the overall quality of life here in Hawai'i. The addition of provisions to make the state earned income tax credit fully refundable and permanent is an added bonus to this bill and complements the minimum wage increase. The EITC is presently a nonrefundable tax credit, which means that households can only use this tax credit to reduce their income tax liability. By making this credit refundable, this bill would enable Hawai'i households with the lowest incomes and little or no tax liability to make full use of this tax credit.

"This measure is part of a package of bills over the last two years that helps both employers and employees. In 2021, we appropriated over \$740 million to repay our federal unemployment insurance loans and alleviate a significant increase in the federal unemployment insurance tax for Hawai'i's employers. This session, the Legislature also passed a bill to statutorily adjust the unemployment experience rating, which will result in significant savings in unemployment insurance taxes for employers. House Bill 2510, Conference Draft 1, along with Senate Bill 3289 (the Hawai'i Saves bill) make up a third component of this multifaceted approach aimed at assisting both employers and working families throughout the State of Hawai'i. I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting House Bill 2510, Conference Draft 1. Thank you."

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I ask that the words of my colleague from Mānoa be inserted into the Journal as if they were my own. Thank you." (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

Senator Keith-Agaran rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I wanted to commend the Labor chair for the work he's done this year on this bill and on other measures, and I have some written remarks I'd like to submit into the Journal."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Keith-Agaran's additional remarks read as follows:

"I rise in strong support of this measure, Mr. President. During the pandemic, we made adjustments to our unemployment compensation law to assist our business community and this year will be making further changes to how rates will be applied coming out of the pandemic economic turndown. The legislature also made the initial payment on the loan that was required to maintain the solvency of our unemployment trust fund—something that normally would be the obligation of all businesses operating in our state. This session, we are taking action on behalf of the workers and employees in our community as well. The cost of living in the State continues to rise while the minimum wage hasn't been adjusted to a level that is necessary to offset the higher cost of living. This bill, by staggering Hawaii's minimum wage increases to \$18.00/hour and making the State earned income tax credit refundable and permanent, will foster economic stability. This measure is a downpayment on addressing Hawaii's wage shortage issue and will have a significant and beneficial impact for Hawaii's families. I encourage my colleagues to support this measure."

Senator DeCoite rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I wish that the words of the chair from Labor be inserted into the Journal, and I wish to insert comments in the Journal also. Thank you."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator DeCoite's additional remarks read as follows:

"Raising the minimum wage is no simple feat. I understand the cost and toll this will take on our businesses, especially our small businesses, across the state as they are already facing higher operating costs.

"I also understand the plight of our working families, just trying to make ends meet.

"It is my hope that this bill is the compromise that we need; raising the minimum wage, adjusting the tip credit and making the Earned Income Tax credit permanent."

Senator Acasio rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I would like to submit the written remarks of the Labor chair as if they were my own and also add additional comments."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Acasio's additional remarks read as follows:

"I'm proud to be part of this esteemed body today, passing this vital legislation to increase the minimum wage for Hawai'i's workers and making the earned income tax credit refundable and permanent. This bipartisan accomplishment is long overdue.

"Just last year, a report by the state Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism found that over 34 percent of couples with two children had incomes below the self-sufficiency standard, and 50 to 80 percent of single adults with children had incomes below self-sufficiency standard. Just think about that for a moment because we all know families who are struggling just to barely survive. If we truly care about

our keiki, we must raise the minimum wage. This same government report found that a single adult with one child needed an hourly wage of \$25 to \$32 just to meet basic needs, and a couple with two children needed a combined hourly wage of \$35 to \$40 to meet basic needs. So this legislation raising the minimum wage to \$18 an hour over six years is a start, but by no means is it enough to truly be a living wage in Hawai'i, and a living wage should be our ultimate goal. This means lessening the burdens of workers and their families by providing things like free preschool or early childhood education; by subsidizing childcare and afterschool programs, which we do; by lessening the costs of health care and health insurance. We can and must do this because one job should be enough.

"I understand that raising the minimum wage will be challenging for our small-business owners. The same is true in my area of representation. I truly empathize with them as they are struggling to survive as well. I have two responses, and it is imperative that we in government must also continue to step up to help our small local businesses in any way we can with things like tax breaks and other incentives. We have many tools at our disposal, and we must work with local businesses to help them because they, too, are our neighbors, families, and friends. Secondly, as consumers, we must shop at our local businesses and support them with our dollars and support our workers so that money continues to circulate in our communities rather than become extracted with corporations. We can do this, and we must also, in that sense, put our money where our mouth is. Mahalo."

Senator Fevella rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"In 2020, we tried to pass a minimum wage bill about two years ago. Senator Taniguchi, the chair of the Senate Labor committee: I have a lot of respect for this man. Senator Taniguchi worked hard, and tirelessly with the House and continued to work on this bill to the draft we have today. He knows this because I shared this with him—I totally support him, and I support this bill. I was not happy with other portions of the bill. I wanted the \$18-an-hour to come a little sooner, but we cannot have everything. You've got to compromise and that's what I learned here. You've got to also always have aloha for one another. By going forward with this measure, others will have a better quality of life. But we also need to continue to understand that there are people who work every day at minimum wage, and especially those who work as waitresses and waiters who work hard for tips and then have to give back \$1.50 tip credit per hour starting in 2028 out of their check. I mean, it's great we are supporting a minimum wage bill, but, like I told him, if I had my way, the tip credit would not be included because we know, in the visitor industry, not every visitor learns and knows how to tip. I'm not going to say what nationality, but it is unfortunate because our minimum wage earners work hard. And then the restaurants who hire them should not even bother with the \$1.50 tip credit, because if you are the face of the company, that's your wait staff. So, again, colleagues, and again, thank you, Senator Taniguchi, for working very hard on this measure. I am really proud to support this bill. Thank you, Senate President."

Senator Riviere rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"I'm in full support of the earned income tax credit; I think that's well-received and will have very positive effects for those who will benefit from it. My reservations are that I think we're still putting the hurt on small business. I am glad that we are raising the minimum wage, but I have always said that I thought that it was too much, too fast—that has been my objection. This version does take a little bit longer to get there, so from the side of a small business, I think this is somewhat easier for them. So my support is there; my reservations are that I hope that we can

consider the impacts on the small businesses, and let's keep a keen eye on that over the next couple years and make sure that we do what we can to support mom-and-pops and our local entrepreneurs. Thank you very much."

Senator Nishihara rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"I stand in strong support of this bill, and I'd like have the comments of the senator from Mānoa to be entered as my own. Thank you."

The Chair noted, in good humor, that years from now, people would think the members were not very original: "everybody wrote the same speech."

The Chair then made the following comments:

"I would also like to extend my thanks to the Labor chair and the hard work he's put in over the last four years in finally getting here and, based on the Minority Leader's remarks, I would also like to extend my congratulations to him for leading a successful bipartisan effort in making this happen."

"Therefore, colleagues, I urge you to join me in supporting the passage of S.B. 2076, S.D. 2, H.D. 3, C.D. 1., to ensure that all residents of Hawai'i have equitable access to affordable, high-speed broadband connectivity."

"While original versions of this measure included more robust funding for a broader array of initiatives, I believe our \$2 million commitment to the Department(s) of Business, Economic Development and Tourism and Land and Natural Resources is a great first step towards providing funding to local nonprofits that will in turn, improve food sustainability, economic development, mitigation of tourism impacts and cultural training, as well as empower the repatriation and reburial of Native Hawaiian iwi kūpuna.

"For many years, our State has been considered the 'invasive species capital of the world,' as we have seen staffing issues and lack of funding that prevented the Department of Agriculture from effectively securing our points-of-entry. Back home on the island of Hawai'i, we have seen first-hand the devastating impacts of invasive pests such as coqui frogs and coffee berry borer, as well as invasive pathogens such as coffee leaf rust and rapid 'ōhi'a death. During the years of 2011-2015, the University of Hawai'i Economic Research Organization estimated the pest impacts cost to the State as a total of \$83 million, demonstrating the vulnerability of our unique island ecosystems.

"In 2017, the Hawai'i Invasive Species Council (HISC) adopted the Hawai'i Interagency Biosecurity Plan, which addresses key biosecurity areas including pre-border, border, and post-border prevention over a ten-year implementation period. To supplement HISC's plan, Mamalu PoePoe (MMPP) established as a five-year collaborative program within HISC and the Department of Land and Natural Resources to promote interagency collaboration between State and Federal partners to detect and prevent the introduction of invasive species through our ports of entry. The highly successful MMPP has demonstrated the need to continue monitoring efforts not only at airports, but also at our seaports; however, the continued operations and expansion of MMPP requires an additional funding commitment by the Legislature.

"Therefore, I stand in support of S.B. 3379, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1., which demonstrates our commitment to biosecurity in Hawai'i, as well as represents a positive step towards further protecting and preserving our State's unique ecosystem for the benefit of generations to come."

Throughout Kona and Ka'u, we have seen this issue exasperated by large distances between population centers and health care facilities, as well as understandable unwillingness of providers to relocate to rural and remote communities—communities that often have limited access to medical, mental health and oral health services.

“Thus, as it is the inherent responsibility of the Legislature to provide equitable, quality access to health care resources for all residents living within the State, I firmly believe that S.B. 2624, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1. is a positive step in the right direction. With the ongoing deployment of broadband infrastructure to our most rural communities, our ability to provide telehealth services at community health centers or in the home will be key to improving the health of patients and their families through increased access to qualified, specialized health care providers, as well as cost-savings to the entire health system by avoiding emergency department or hospitalization costs. As prescribed in the bill, the newly formed telehealth and rural health care pilot program(s) will increase provider adoption of telehealth, support health care workforce development, and encourage providers to prioritize rural, medically underserved areas.”

Senator Keohokalole rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President and colleagues, this measure includes a \$328 million appropriation to settle the *Kalima* case with approximately 2,300 Native Hawaiian claimants. I say '2,300' although there were initially 2,700 claimants who joined the suit 23 years ago, and that's because 400 of them have passed on since this suit began, and although their families may receive something, they will see no redress. And although we all know what this suit is about, I do think it is important in this historic moment in this historic year to make it clear why we are here, and that's because when the federal government passed the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act in 1920, it did virtually nothing to implement it for the next 40 years and, instead, diluted the trust of much of its best lands with the help and in concert with the territorial government and counties. Then, in order to be admitted into the Union in 1959, the State promised to take on the responsibility of administering the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act, and that's because the federal government, recognizing their own inaction, basically said, 'People of Hawai'i, if you'd like to become a state, take on Hawaiian home lands, and you're in.' And in 1959, we agreed, and for the next 30 years, the State of Hawai'i did almost nothing to make good on that promise. That changed in the '90s, when Governor Waihe'e and this legislature finally committed significant resources for development and set up a process for Hawaiians on the waitlist to file claims to obtain redress for those 70 years of broken promises. And what of that process? Well, beneficiaries were asked to make claims and then, again, nothing happened. Think of how frustrating it is to be promised something, then be told, 'We broke the promise, so here's a process we'll set up to make you whole,' and then later be told, 'Never mind; we changed our minds and we're not going to do anything to make this right.'

"So these Hawaiians finally sued under what we now know as the *Kalima* case. And the majority of the case has been not about whether the State is liable; it's been about how much the State is liable for. And with today's \$328 million settlement, we now know. And I hope that today's action can bring this issue to a close with the claimants who are still with us today. For each one, this is a monumental opportunity to provide a better future for themselves and their families, which was the aim of Prince Kūhiō 102 years ago. It is time. And I have to say, I am proud that, as stewards of the public trust, this year, we in the Legislature can finally put this case behind us and that, with the combined actions that we are taking for the Hawaiian community, send a clear message that we intend to make good on our commitments and that we will no longer sweep the lingering issues of the past under the rug but will instead engage and proactively work to solve problems and move forward in the best interest of our entire community. And so I'm grateful to you, my colleagues, and our friends from the House, for finally making good on this promise in this year, where so much has been accomplished for the benefit of the Hawaiian community. And I'd like to take this moment to say special thanks to the attorney general's office, Holly Shikada and Craig Iha; to the Speaker of the House; and to our WAM chair for their individual hard work on making this historic action possible. Mahalo."

Senator Kanuha rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, may I have the words of the previous speaker entered into the Journal as if it were my own?" (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

"It is my hope that this bill will help us address claims against the state in a timely manner, saving us cost and by addressing these claims in a more judicious timeframe will benefit both sides of the claim."

"Mr. President, I stand in support of this measure. As you know, every year it is the duty of this body to consider and approve any moneys used for judgements against or settlements by the state arising from legal claims against it. Although I am saddened to see once again that the State has had to settle or accept adjudicated liability for a variety of claims against the Department of Public Safety totaling more than \$6 million, I am satisfied that the state Attorney General's office is performing its functions carefully and with the best fiscal interests of the state in mind. In particular this year, I am encouraged to note that the state has, after more than two decades of litigation and appeals, entered into an historic settlement agreement with the

class-action plaintiffs in the *Kalima* case, who brought suit against the state for damages arising from non-performance by the state in its duties to beneficiaries of the Hawaiian Homestead Act. The \$328 million appropriated for this settlement will benefit approximately 2,700 claimants in a manner that was carefully overseen by the state court and agreed to by the Attorney General. I urge my colleagues to support this measure in the spirit of righting historic wrongs, and with the hope that our state will fulfill its responsibilities in the future."

Senator Fevella rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"I also want to insert comments of my colleague from Kāne'ohe's into the Journal as my own. Thank you." (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 44-22 was adopted and S.B. Senator Nishihara moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 124-22 be adopted and H.B. No. 2171, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Fevella rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Colleagues, I support the consolidation of the state criminal law enforcement investigation functioning underneath the state department as a new Department of Law Enforcement. This is long overdue, and should have been consolidated long ago. When I first got here, colleagues, I wanted to have the sheriff's patrol all the state highways instead of being at the airport and in the courts. That was my way of trying to find another way for sheriffs to assist and work with HPD.

"So, it's not replacing and it's not assisting; it's working with HPD. I want to get that straight because some of my constituents thinking that we're trying to replace HPD, and we're not; they do a great job. But now, this measure is important for Public Safety to streamline communication, reduce duplication and for the call center operations to be under the uniform standard of law enforcement services. I would like to thank my House colleagues and the Senate colleagues, and especially the chair of the Public Safety committee, Senator Clarence Nishihara. I want to also thank the attorney general, Holly Shikada, and the head of Sheriff Division, Billy Oku, for working on this and for updating me on how this thing was going. I am glad we are trying to do something different, and right now, we know HPD is short and we're having a hard time with recruitment. We want to burden and blame HPD for

everything that is not getting done, but if we can work together as law enforcement agencies, we can do a great job going forward. So I ask my colleagues to work together and support this bill. Thank you. Thank you, Senate President.”

Senator Nishihara rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“I’d like to thank the WAM chair for helping move this bill along as well, and with the support of director of Public Safety and his agreement that we would not try to get everything into the bill but at least get the department set up, which is important to get the rest of it going. The other parts of the bill, I think, next year, they can probably get the bulk of it done, but I think it’s a good first step in finally looking at Public Safety and splitting it into two parts: corrections and law enforcement. I think it’ll do a lot of good going forward. I think it’ll improve morale as it moves forward for the members in Public Safety as a whole. I might have some additional comments I’d like to put into the Journal as well.”

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Nishihara’s additional remarks read as follows:

“This bill will establish a new department of law enforcement to consolidate and administer the crime enforcement and investigations function of the department of transportation, certain investigations of the attorney general, functions of the office of homeland security, and current investigations functions of the department of public safety.

“Rename the department of public safety as the department of corrections and rehabilitation to administer the corrections, rehabilitation, reentry and related functions currently assigned to public safety. Establish a training center within the department of law enforcement. Transfer employees, equipment, policies and procedures, guidelines, materials. Establish positions for the departments and appropriate funds for the department of law enforcement.

“It will begin the process with one full time permanent director, one full time permanent deputy director and other support positions, with \$900,000 for fiscal year 2022-2023. The statewide law enforcement training center complex will be effective January 2, 2023. The director of corrections and rehabilitation and personnel will be effective on January 1, 2023.

“This bill will with the establishment of two departments, separates the mission of Public Safety into a more effective provider of services.

“The future of the new departments hopefully will deliver greater supervision and accountability to the public.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 124-22 was adopted and H.B. No. 2171, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY,” passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Inouye moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 138-22 be adopted and S.B. No. 2510, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Wakai.

Senator Acasio rose to request that remarks in opposition to the measure be entered into the Journal.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Acasio’s remarks read as follows:

“To the extent that the impetus for the bill comes from concerns over the closure of firm generation capacity on Oahu and the islands, I confirm that I understand such concerns and encourage my colleagues to work with each other and the appropriate state agencies, such as the PUC, to address it in ways that are themselves appropriate for this body.

“Clearly part of addressing such concerns is an unbiased assessment of the degree to which they are overblown. This body has received extensive testimony from professionals working in the energy industry and actively engaged in developing and implementing state energy policy stating that the alarmism attached to SB2510 is, to some degree, overblown. HNEI, as well as the state energy office, past and present members of the Public Utilities Commission and the Consumer Advocate have all expressed the point of view that there is no need for the legislature to intervene and grant itself the authority to dictate how utilities and their regulators will handle the state’s transition to clean power sources.

“If we are to heed the advice of Hawaii’s leading energy policy experts, and arrive at the conclusion that there is no cause for alarm, then it is reasonable for the legislature to take a more conservation approach. I find the course of action recommended by HNEI, which expressed a counter-concern that a ‘legally-binding fixed minimum percentage of renewable energy from firm generation may be overly prescriptive, not yield optimal solutions, and likely slow Hawaii’s clean energy transition’ to be reasonable. Requiring state agencies engaged in policy making aimed at implementing Hawaii’s renewable energy goals to place increased value on renewable sources that can be relied on to provide power on demand, regardless of time of day or weather conditions, makes sense. Had SB2510 been revised to require this and similar measures I would favor it; but, as is, I must vote against it and encourage my colleagues to do the same.

“While ensuring that utility customers have their needs met as the state decarbonizes its energy portfolio does require the utilities to pay greater attention to the benefits of so-called ‘firm renewable energy sources,’ there is no need for lawmakers to dictate how this will be done.

“Having established that support for SB2510 is driven by an overblown concern about the electric utilities’ ability to meet future demand, it is important to draw attention to the very real concerns of establishing a precedent that will allow the legislature to change laws via concurrent resolution. This means the legislature can amend SB2510 in the future without the governor’s approval, making the provision that allows for it unconstitutional, which, in turn, compels the governor to veto the bill. I find it troublesome that my colleagues are not equally concerned about the impacts this will have on disrupting the current balance of power between Hawaii’s branches of government.

“In conclusion, I will draw attention to the power SB2510 grants the legislature to postpone the deadline for transitioning from fossil fuels by a set of consecutive concurrent resolutions that could delay it until 2045. Setting the constitutionality concerns raised previously aside, granting the legislature the power to do this creates an extraordinary incentive for the corporations profiting from Hawaii’s oil-dependency to corrupt Hawaii’s political processes in their favor. Our system is not well prepared to deal with the pressure this will create.

“For the reasons outlined above, I vote in opposition to SB2510 and encourage my colleagues to do the same.”

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"In 1991, the State created the first and only energy functional plan. At the time, it was needed to transform to renewable energy, not to save the planet but to save Hawai'i from the handcuff of imported oil when there was a recent utility-scale renewable technologies like solar. Our residents are still afflicted by the dependence on fossil fuel, with rising electricity and gas rates. HECO predicts 20 percent increase in costs. KIUC: zero percent increase due to the plans they implemented over the last few years. The International Energy Agency (IEA) predicts continued rise in the cost of oil—double from a year ago.

"In 2015, the Legislature chose to impose a mandate of 100 percent renewable portfolio standards on electric utilities. There was no study; there was no plan. Yet, at the same time, it was visionary, and it brought new investments, jobs, and clean green energy to reduce emissions. Unfortunately, there was a loophole that still allowed fossil fuel to be burned.

"On New Year's Eve, O'ahu faced an energy shortfall, with the utility calling for conservation of energy—the only measure they could implement to prevent the island from a blackout. On September 1st, 20 percent of our firm, lowest-price reliable energy will be shuttered, and dozens of promising intermittent renewable energy projects promised to replace it on O'ahu and other islands have found notices of force majeure and unknown installation dates. Just yesterday, HECO and the PUC issued a joint letter to Mayor Victorino informing him that two of HECO's largest firm fossil fuel generators will be forced into retirement in just a few years with no replacement of generation in sight. Some will say you can smart-grid your way to reliability. While a smart grid is important, it is merely a way for the utility to communicate with its generators and consumers, especially the customer-owned intermittent rooftop solar generators. It will help to shore up system reliability, but a reliable grid is still dependent on a firm energy source to always be able to provide that reserve energy capacity when needed.

"We are faced with an energy crisis, one that is negatively affecting our residents' pocketbooks and potentially affecting our ability to receive safe and reliable energy. This measure is a planning and policy measure that is commencement of an updated energy plan to proactively avoid the crisis we are facing at this moment. We should have done this at least in 2015, when we passed the 100 percent RPS law. This measure is not a mandate to the PUC; it is a policy and planning document. It states goals—no more fossil fuels past 2045—to close any further loopholes. A reliable grid needs diversification of renewable energy in both firm, which is always available, and intermittent, which is weather-dependent technology. In order to truly displace fossil fuels, we'll need at least one-third of our renewable generation to come from a reliable firm generation. This percentage was based on the KIUC vision of their grid in 2025 to replace fossil fuels. This percentage is based on the U.S. Energy Information Administration, which states that an energy reserve margin of reliable energy capacity is necessary to keep the lights on. This independent body analyzes and disseminates impartial energy information to promote sound policymaking for energy. HECO's annual report filed every year states that a 30 percent energy reserve margin of energy capacity is needed on each island to provide reasonable reliability reserve, an actionable measure itself on a pass/fail basis to this target in their Adequacy of Supply report. And we cannot be overly dependent on one source of any technology, whether it be fossil fuel, firm renewables, or intermittent renewables, so this bill sets a limit on the percentage of any one technology, with the exception of geothermal. But, as we have seen with the closure of the coal plant, we need to stay flexible in our policymaking, so this bill

allows for future changes in those policy goals to allow for the Legislature to make these goals through the adoption of a concurrent resolution or any disputes by agencies to be appealed to the governor. S.B. 2510 is a measure to support if you want to reduce carbon emissions, make the state more energy independent, spread jobs and economic growth, keep the lights on, and eliminate fossil fuels.

"Some would say that the bill restricts competition. No, the bill encourages more types of technologies to be considered, including firm and intermittent on all islands instead of the trajectory of only intermittent. Some would say it would hamper clean energy progress and is difficult to implement. The Kaua'i plan is 22 percent solar and 11 percent biomass and 37 percent hydroelectric, which runs 24 by 7, and only 10 percent fossil fuel. Firm renewables is more reliable than intermittent. They state Texas grid outage was due to firm being down, but intermittent wind was also down, and they didn't have enough reserve margin on the grid. Some will say that the bill will increase volatility and cost. Kaua'i predicts no cost increase. This bill is about getting rid of fossil fuel, which has volatility and cost.

"Again, the HECO reserve margin of 30 percent of reliable grid substantiates the need for firm renewables; otherwise, we will keep fossil fuel instead. When people ask again about why do we need these percentages, House Bill 1800, which we just amended today on the floor, has 50 percent reduction in carbon from 2005 levels for all industries with no warning to any industry, not just the electrical industry. It establishes a goal for statewide greenhouse gas emissions limit to be at least 50 percent below 2005 levels by 2030 and at the same time as the HSEO do a study to analyze pathways to develop recommendations on achieving goals for \$350,000 for the study. That's the same thing with S.B. 2510: set the goal while continuing to study how we can achieve it. Mahalo."

Senator Wakai rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I'd like to ask that the previous speaker's words be entered into the Journal as my own and also make a few other comments. (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

"Members, we're on a short timeline to get renewable energy on the grid due to lawmakers in 2022 mandating a shutdown of the coal plant. We did so because of assurances by advocates that it was feasible to do so by this time. Lawmakers were sold on a bold idea to have Hawai'i be the first state in America to ban burning by coal. Press releases went out to pat ourselves on the back. Now, two years later, we see the folly of creating policy based on press release.

"It became apparent a year ago that we didn't have enough renewable projects lined up to fill that 20 percent gap that the coal plant fills. The fallback plan a year ago was to burn oil, and then power them in batteries. When the supply chain took away the batteries, we had a huge problem. Now, the PUC is suggesting that we use diesel generators to prepare for this lack of capacity. Yes, that's right: we're preparing to burn more oil, and ratepayers are going to foot the bill for this lack of foresight. The coal plant is still burning, yet we already have threats of blackouts. All of us recall on New Year's Eve, HECO asked us to conserve power.

"S.B. 2510 gets us to a better place, steps that should have been taken years ago. There is so much on our legislative docket. So much of our renewable energy future depends upon NIMBYs and other obstructionists hijacking our progress. Residents don't want wind in Kahuku; they don't want PV in Nānākuli; they don't want offshore wind; they don't want biomass. When it comes to energy, the public is really good at

defining what it doesn't want; what we need to start defining is what we want.

"As the date chases this 100 percent RPS, we cannot leave the public facing potential blackouts. Lawmakers, through this bill, 2510, are helping to set the reset button this year. To be effective in accomplishing Hawai'i's laudable achievements, we need to plan to identify what specific time-bound steps need to happen and ensure we find the balance between intermittent and firm renewable projects. Policy by press release is in our rearview mirror. The road ahead has to be paved with good legislation, as you see in 2510. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Fevella rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"The reason why I rise with reservation on this bill is because we know we need to have renewable energy other than from fossil fuel. But there is a need and a want, but to what extent? We need to be smarter. We need to do better. And we need to do better research, because we can stop and have all uses of fossil fuel eliminated, but end up having this whole island with windmills, but to what cost to the environment? We can have these huge wind turbine platforms, but to what cost to the environment? So we're going to have windmills and renewable energy, but no human beings, no wildlife, and nothing to eat. We need to be smart. There is technology out there that other countries are using it, but we're not. So we can do better and, like I said, I am for getting off of fossil fuel, but to what extent? Thank you, Senate President."

"Mr. President, I rise in strong support of HB1517, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1.

"For many years, coffee has been our State's flagship crop, with more than ninety per cent of Hawai'i's coffee farms located on Hawai'i Island. As determined by a recent United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) report, the estimated value of our State's green coffee crop in the 2021-22 season is \$113,013,600—not accounting for upstream and downstream revenue in terms of value-added products and ancillary businesses.

"Currently, Hawai'i law requires that only ten per cent of coffee products originate in the geographic area indicated, which has directly damaged and degraded the reputation of world-famous Hawai'i grown coffees. Without strong protection of its name, downstream stakeholders—rather than our local farmers—have reaped the economic benefits of the fame of Kona and Ka'u coffees.

"Since I was elected in 2018, the Legislature has considered a variety of measures aimed at increasing the State's labeling requirement from 10% to 51%, with local farmers, roasters, producers, and other industry stakeholders unable to come to a consensus on the most appropriate approach. Opponents to the proposed 51% labeling requirement have raised concerns with unintended consequences that may present for Hawai'i's coffee growers, as well as the State's economy if the policy is enacted. However, the State has not yet conducted an economic impact study to examine impacts from the perspective of coffee industry stakeholders located within the physical boundaries of the State.

"Therefore, I strongly believe that HB1517, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1 is an excellent first step at addressing this long-standing issue, as we hope to equip the State with valuable information to enact policies that will empower small, local farms to market their product at its full value."

lapse if not encumbered by June 30, 2024. Mr. President, I urge my colleagues to support our keiki and support this bill.”

Senator Kim moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 234-22 be adopted and H.B. No. 2024, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Kim rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Mr. President: *mutual stewardship*—great buzzwords, but what does it mean? So I looked it up. *Mutual* is defined as ‘a partnership based on mutual respect and understanding.’ *Stewardship* is defined as ‘the job of supervising or taking care of something, such as an organization or property.’ *Mutual stewardship*, therefore, is a partnership based on mutual respect and understanding for the responsible stewardship of our public lands. Easier said than done.

“Mr. President, it appeared unlikely that this mutual stewardship concept would work when I was tasked with this bill over seven weeks ago. Opponents and proponents on governance of Mauna Kea and the future of astronomy were just too far apart. I was told we should just kill the bill because it was just too polarized. And so I challenged myself, and instead of asking, ‘How can no can?’ I asked, ‘Why can’t we?’ Why can’t we respect the culture and the ‘āina and still have a world-class astronomy program at the University of Hawai‘i? I was surprised that the brilliant minds at the university and the leadership did not read the tea leaves and put together a working group prior to this to avoid what we, the Legislature, had to do.

“I began with the belief that we can. See, I learned my Hawaiian values and love of Hawaiian storytelling from my Kumu Auntie Maiki Aiu. She instilled in me the need to perpetuate and respect our host culture. In fact, on Opening Day 39 years ago, she visited me and reminded me of the responsibility to perpetuate the values she taught. But I also believe in the science of astronomy. So did our Hawaiian ancestors, who were keen observers of the world around them and applied the skill to the sky as well as to the earth. They developed systems for agriculture and navigation which used the motions of the celestial bodies as a calendar and map. Like many peoples around the world from ancient times, Polynesians have been guided by the stars. The constellations move in predictable rhythms across the sky with mathematical precisions unchanging over the course of many human lifespans.

“Mr. President, the conference committee chose to work mutually toward mutual stewardship, recognizing that the status quo will ultimately create a greater divide. C.D. 1 incorporates most of our changes in our Senate Draft 1 and in Senate Draft 2. Most importantly, we retained the declaration that astronomy is a policy of the State and confirmed that with language that states, ‘The authority shall develop, negotiate, execute agreements that promote astronomy.’ This includes education, training, employment, and professional development opportunities for state residents. It goes even further to include \$350,000 to UH Hilo ‘Imiloa Center for K–12 public education programs in astronomy-related fields of learning. It also states, ‘It shall include observing time of not less than 7 percent that the university giving priority of the observing time to Hawai‘i students.’

"All of this would be done by the Mauna Kea Stewardship and Oversight Authority, an 11-member authority. It gives University of Hawai'i Board of Regents a seat on the authority. It gives the observatories a seat. It gives two Native Hawaiians of traditional and customary practices seats, the mayor of the Hawaiian Island a seat, plus six others. It requires that at least three members must be residents of the County of Hawai'i. The authority must establish offices at UH Hilo or elsewhere on Hawai'i island. It provides a framework for astronomy-related development on Mauna Kea to include a set of principles of returning the lands used for astronomy research to their natural state whenever observatories are decommissioned or no longer have research or educational value. These are just some of the highlights of this 50-page bill.

"Mr. President, know that all comments and emails submitted were read, and I tried to incorporate or address them into the drafts. I believe this mutual stewardship can and will work. Of course, it will depend on the human aspect of mutual respect and rest with the authority members, which is why we spent so much time on its makeup. The Senate will be tasked with confirming the members in the near future, and it will be our responsibility to confirm the inaugural set of members on the authority to provide this mutual and balanced governance. Mr. President, I'm proud to say that the House and Senate conferees managed to craft this bill with mutual understanding and respect for both sides of the issue and did so with no drama. I thank the members of the conference committee in the House and the Senate and the staff and all those who assisted in the process—it was the work of many hands. I urge my colleagues to support this bill. Mahalo."

Senator Inouye rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"There are many things that are still wrong with this bill. However, in the interest of time, I will only mention a few.

"The objective of this bill is to create the new Mauna Kea Stewardship and Oversight Authority with the responsibility to govern and manage the entire mountain, including astronomy at its summit. The creation of a new authority to assume jurisdiction over Mauna Kea is redundant. The current management and stewardship of Mauna Kea is already set in place through the University of Hawai'i and the Center for Mauna Kea Stewardship.

"People I talked to at the University of Hawai'i tell me there are problems with the five-year transitional timeline which forces UH to turn over the management of Mauna Kea to the new authority. With this comes complications such as having the university 'legally required to comply with all obligations' of the current lease and not being able to do anything else while serving as a 'lame-duck landlord.'

"UH is concerned with upcoming lease re-negotiations in 2034 after the current lease runs out. They are rightfully worried about the future of astronomy and the fate of its sublease partners, which consists of all the observatories presently on the summit, including the future of the proposed and approved Thirty Meter Telescope. What is to become of them?

"Doug Simons, the current director of astronomy, tells me that:

HB2024 CD1 would impact the TMT project's vested rights in terms of its land authorization and permit. The current Thirty Meter Telescope sublease issued by UH guarantees site control for TMT through 2033 and commits UH to use its best efforts to secure a new general lease so that a new sublease can be issued. Pursuant to the bill, UH would no longer be involved and the authority would issue a new lease to TMT no sooner than July 1, 2028, if it decides to do so. That would require the

authority to organize itself, create rules and processes, negotiate lease terms, and resolve any legal challenges. Similarly, the current CDUP for the project, issued to UH, would have to be replaced by a new permit or permits from the authority following the establishment of rules and processes and the resolution of any contested cases and judicial appeals.

"As one writer in a recent *Hawaii Tribune-Herald* letter stated, 'I am writing to express my horror and amazement that the Trojan Horse bill known as House Bill 2024 is under serious consideration for passage.'

"Mr. President, colleagues, this bill is a Trojan horse, indeed.

"After UH loses their original lease in 2033, upon which TMT and the other observatories are sublessees, astronomy will be back at square one, starting all over again. The costly setback for astronomy, Hawai'i's economy, and jobs related to the industry will probably be too much to bear.

"It's sad to say the loss and the hard work of the late Board of Regent Barry Taniguchi and the late Dr. Don Hall, one of the first directors of astronomy, whom I have worked with as a councilmember on my island in the '80s.

"There is no assurance that the new Mauna Kea Stewardship and Oversight Authority will guarantee that TMT, the University of Hawai'i, and other observatories will get new long-term leases. There will be too much politics involved in the new approval process. At that point, or maybe even earlier, TMT will likely give up and move away from Hawai'i.

"This bill will be the demise of a promising new world-class telescope that will complement the world-class observatories we already have.

"The casualty list will be long:

"The demise of our \$221 million a year astronomy industry. Astronomy itself brings in at least \$110 million annually to our state, \$68 million in labor income, and \$10 million in state tax revenues, according to a report today in the *Honolulu Star-Advertiser* by one of Hawai'i's most brilliant tech journalists.

"The decimation of astronomy will contribute to the loss of many jobs, not only in astronomy, but also in education, high tech, industry, and many support services, some of them small businesses, and the economic benefits to my island and the state.

"The demise of astronomy will also mean lost opportunities for future and the 'spillover effects' astronomy brings to our fragile economy: knowledge, expertise, and technology benefits.

"The ramifications of this bad bill will resonate throughout the worldwide astronomy, business, and scientific communities, even though the bill does declare 'support of astronomy to be a policy of the State.' How much of a commitment to astronomy do we truly have?

"The new authority will have to give equal or maybe even greater weight to the ecology and environment of the mountain, its natural resources, restricted access, human activities, traditional cultural practices, and more.

"DLNR brought up several concerns, including unclear oversight legal framework, unclear financial sustainability, and redundant managerial planning that are part of the bill's flaws. The restrictions on astronomy and the associated leases are a problem, as well as limitations on commercial use. And I totally agree as the chair of the Water and Land committee.

"In the end, the DLNR believes that Mauna Kea lands should remain protected under the present conservation district rules

under the oversight of the Board of Land and Natural Resources.

"Mr. President, these are just some of the major concerns I have about H.B. 2024, C.D. 1. Surely there are many more issues surrounding this bill, including the fact that we have to appropriate more than \$14 million for the creation of a new authority, micromanage observatory viewing time, among numerous legal concerns brought up by the attorney general's office, the potential political process in the nomination to board appointees, and much more.

"I must ask you, is Hawai'i as committed to astronomy as this bill would like you to believe?

"We must not let our highly respected, world-class astronomy industry wither and die due to short-sighted legislation such as this. Astronomy's contribution has remained steady in Hawai'i over the past decade. It is a reliable economic generator for Hawai'i, especially when compared to weather- and pest-prone agriculture and pandemic-afflicted, price-sensitive tourism. The stars and mostly good weather are always here, and astronomy can be here to support us in Hawai'i for generations to come.

"Colleagues, it's time for us to make a statement and stand up for astronomy and not allow H.B. 2024, C.D. 1 to pass. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Fevella rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"Colleagues, my 'ohana and I support this measure. But if we had our way, we would remove every single telescope on that mountain. But it's not our choice, and it's not the way we're going to do it. We need astronomy in Hawai'i. There are some of my colleagues who have misrepresented the purpose of this bill by saying we're trying to do away with astronomy. Fifty years of desecration under the management of UH that includes the contamination of our water sources, oil spills, and hydraulic spills. You name them. This was previously reported by Carroll Cox many times. But what I'm saying about Mauna Kea is it is a sacred, spiritual place for the people of Hawai'i. It's a place that reflects who we are and it defines our unique cultural inheritance.

"Colleagues, this bill is so complex and we're not going to agree on everything. To all my colleagues in the House, colleagues in the Senate, and I want to thank Senator Kim for talking with me throughout the process of this bill. Senate President and colleagues, we talked over, over, and over. It's not what a lot of people wanted in the bill, but we talk about education. During the 50 years this telescope was there, education was never a priority until we wanted to shut it down. Until we had the defenders out there, defending and protecting the mountain. All of a sudden, this was a great opportunity for our young astronomers to get their education. Not true. Why? Because the University of Hawai'i and their astronomy program is obsolete. So, again, with this bill, some of the old telescopes up there can be used. If not, they're going to decommission them, but can be used for educational process. What I like about this bill is it is going to insist on what the working group agreed to and put together. Of course, I cannot forget to thank the working group for putting its recommendation together.

"So, why is it important to have the Stewardship and Oversight Authority of Mauna Kea lands? It is because they're going to ensure that these things are processed and done rather than 50 years of lip service. Yes, astronomy, they bring a lot of money, but how many of our kids here—all of you raise your hands—went up to the observatories, had a great time camping, or had a good time at the observatory? Nobody that I know. And nobody that I know in Hilo. So, this measure will prioritize and change the dynamics and change the University of Hawai'i's

role of mismanaging that mountain for decades. And you want to talk politics? That's how they got the mountain: because it was a political move.

"So now that we have something that is workable, people still are saying that this is not good. Yes, it is not what we want at every level. It is not what my family wants. As I said, if we could have our way, that mountain would go back to its natural state. But astronomy is striving in Hawai'i, and it's very vital and important for our kids to learn that so they can stay here at home, go to school, have a great job, and we can start to prioritize astronomy for our keiki and not just foreigners. When they talk about jobs, none of my family members in Hilo had any jobs up there in constructing the telescopes. It was the Canadians. So we have to get the fact right when we talk about jobs and sustainability for Hawaiians. Yes, astronomy is key, and I support Senator Kim and my colleagues in the House and the Senate on this bill. But we still have a lot of work to do. It's a work in progress, and the working group did a great job in organizing this effort. So, again, colleagues and Senate President, I'm going to end with that. But, like I said, astronomy can strive only when the people of Hawai'i are totally involved, not left out. Thank you, Senate President."

Senator Riviere rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I just want to thank the chair of Higher Ed for pulling together all the parties to work for a compromise solution. This is a really complicated issue. It's very emotional on all sides, and I just think the chair should be acknowledged for the great work she did in finding a way forward. I believe this mustn't necessarily be the end, but I think it's a step forward for reconciling all of the complexities of this question. Thank you."

The Chair expressed his thanks to the Higher Education chair.

Senator Fevella rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Sorry, colleagues, I'm a little bit emotional. I also want to insert into the Journal my colleague Senator Donna Mercado Kim's comments into the Journal as my own because I could not have articulated as good as she did. But I love her for that and she did a good job, so can I insert those comments into the Journal?" (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

Senator Kim rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I want to make remarks on the opposition that was stated. I want this body to know that we met with the UH president, and he did not oppose this current draft. To my knowledge, I have not received any opposition from the University of Hawai'i. Also, we addressed the written comments from the attorney general, from DLNR. Also, that the observatories, we received written support of this draft: except for the University of Hawai'i's observatories, all the other observatories did, in fact, write—not all of them, a majority of them—wrote in support. In fact, I heard verbally and in a letter from TMT that said that if we didn't do this mutual stewardship, then, eventually, they would leave Hawai'i because they do not want to be in conflict with the indigenous people; they do not want to be in conflict with the community, and that, eventually, it's not this bill that would kill astronomy, but it's the status quo. And so I just would like my colleagues to know that all effort was placed into this for a balanced approach. Thank you."

Senator Acasio rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"Colleagues, if we consider the incredible complexities in the history of Mauna Kea and the complexities in the perspectives

of our diverse community, we will understand that there are a multitude of layers to this decision before us, both seen and unseen. My decision today to vote in opposition is not simple. It is based on due diligence, lots of research, hours of discussion with many community members, community stakeholders, and rights holders. It is based on trust in the process and also in my intuition.

"I would like to continue in this discussion to acknowledge the diplomacy of those in the working group and their willingness to step forward and come to the table, to take cracks from community members and friends and family, again, because of those deep complexities and layers. I would like to acknowledge the chair of Higher Education because she sets an example as well in this same diplomacy—not fear-based politics—and she is an example in her deliberations around this in terms of reading the testimony, doing the research, reaching out, being open. She's an excellent example of leadership. Within this context, it's also very important to acknowledge all of the efforts put toward mutual understanding, relationship-building, consensus-making as these are huge and historical gains in civic discourse. There's a lot of healing and exposure around this extremely important topic by all sides and all involved. So, again, mahalo to the working group for their hours of meeting, time spent in research, deliberations, in the community—their work is invaluable.

"While I truly believe that the process that has brought this bill to us today to decide on is valuable and has huge implications for healing and shifting our state policy and issues surrounding land management into the future and in a direction that considers both the needs of the stakeholders and rights holders in our entire community, I do maintain a vote in opposition to the measure before me. I will be honest with this body: there are so many layers to this decision. I will be honest with my colleagues, with my constituents, with the people of Hawai'i—I am kānalua on this measure before us. It's not as simple as a 'yes' or a 'no,' and yet, 'reservations' does not begin to clarify the complexities into a single vote. I am confident that both chambers will pass this measure, and I am hopeful and confident that the continued process of this same civic discourse and future management will continue and we can implement the concerns of all stake- and rights holders for the future of Hawai'i. Thank you."

Senator Keohokalole rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, if this bill is a Trojan horse, then I'm afraid to report that Troy is already on fire. Doing nothing commits us to the status quo, which is an inevitable conflict that continues to hang over the mauna. And status quo right now has the TMT and the future of astronomy in Hawai'i on life support. I cannot promise that this bill fixes the conflict, but I can tell you that doing nothing right now fixes nothing, so I ask you to support the bill. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 234-22 was adopted and H.B. No. 2024, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MAUNA KEA," passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 249-22 (S.B. No. 3289, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Taniguchi moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 249-22 be adopted and S.B. No. 3289, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Kanuha.

Senator Taniguchi rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Fellow senators, this Senate bill establishes a state-facilitated payroll deduction retirement savings plan. The plan will be available for private-sector employees in Hawai'i who do not have access to employer-sponsored retirement plans. Nearly two out of three Hawai'i employers do not provide retirement plans for their workers. This measure will affect more than 200,000 Hawai'i workers who are currently without an employer-sponsored retirement plan. Hawai'i residents with insufficient retirement savings are projected to cost state taxpayers between \$1 billion to \$2 billion during the next 15 years.

"The Senate version of this measure called for an automatic enrollment or opt-out of all workers. Low-income and younger workers are three times more likely to participate in an employer's retirement plan if it has an automatic enrollment feature. Automatic enrollment is recognized to be the best practice for maximizing employee participation. While we are disappointed that the Senate's automatic enrollment feature was not included in Conference Draft 1, I am pleased that the House Finance chair has been able to include an incentive for workers to enroll in the plan. Although the conference draft requires employees to opt in, or elect to participate in the retirement plan, it provides up to \$500 in matching funds to the first 50,000 covered workers who participate in the program for 12 consecutive months after initial enrollment.

"Colleagues, this retirement savings program is a visionary approach to helping Hawai'i's residents plan for retirement. This is a long-term project that will benefit working families as they experience compounded savings growth over the next 15 to 20 years. The program will need to be tweaked in the years to come, but the program's basic structure will be in place, and it will provide retirement security for a large majority of Hawai'i's workers. I urge you all to vote in support of Senate Bill 3289, Conference Draft 1. Thank you."

No. 205, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, entitled: “SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES’ DIVISION OF BOATING AND OCEAN RECREATION, IN CONSULTATION WITH THE KANEHOE BAY REGIONAL COUNCIL, TO CONDUCT A STUDY OF COMMERCIAL ACTIVITY ON KANEHOE BAY AND DEVELOP A PLAN TO REDUCE THE AMOUNT OF NON-PERMITTED COMMERCIAL ACTIVITY THAT IS OPERATING IN VIOLATION OF THE KANEHOE BAY MASTER PLAN,” was placed on the calendar for Final Adoption on Thursday, May 5, 2022.

At this time, Senator Kidani commented that, over the last several school days, students have been bringing home reminders to their families that this week had been designated Teacher Appreciation Week. Senator Kidani noted that for much of 2020, teachers had been critical in providing continuing education through remote learning, and that parents who had been home to monitor long-distance classwork had gained a new appreciation for the hard work teachers put in every day with their students. Senator Kidani further noted that teachers had had to adapt to technology, create new lesson plans, and find new ways to connect with students to make sure keiki continued to grow and thrive even under the most difficult of circumstances. Senator Kidani explained that when students returned to classrooms in 2021, prioritizing students’ welfare, health, and safety had been given added weight to teachers’ responsibilities. Senator Kidani commented that isolation, masking, and other safety protocols impacted students’ mental health, and test results showed that the turmoil of the last two years had taken its toll on student academic achievement, and that in these times of high anxiety, teachers have been threatened and suffered verbal abuse but continued to work even harder to help students catch up and persevere. Senator Kidani noted that, in many ways, teaching was the most important profession in society, and that teachers impart knowledge, inspire students to success, and build futures. Senator Kidani reminded her colleagues that they were obligated to respect teachers not only this week but every day of every week. Senator Kidani explained that, as chair of the Committee on Education, she was grateful to her colleagues for the investments in successful futures they had made in the

budget and in bills they had passed that day. Senator Kidani highlighted the importance of measures such as S.B. No. 2184, which would fund various aspects of digital instruction and learning, and S.B. No. 2819, which would finally amend statute to assure that teachers were fairly compensated and duly rewarded for professional development initiatives that ultimately benefit students. Senator Kidani noted that the members had had an historic opportunity to support the public education system that year, and that she believed they had done so while addressing many other critical needs to build a better Hawai‘i.

Senator Nishihara reminded the members that May 13th would mark the end of the Senate’s Foodbank drive.

The Chair extended his thanks to Senator Nishihara for coordinating the drive on behalf of the Senate.

Senator Nishihara noted that his staff would continue to collect items for the drive up until May 13th.

The Chair announced that the leadership meeting scheduled for immediately after adjournment had been canceled in lieu of a potential lunch that would be provided by several colleagues.

The Chair then made the following comments:

“To each and every one of you and to all of your staff, to all of our support agencies’ staff: I can’t express the gratitude and appreciation that I’ve had as you have practiced safety protocols and tried to ensure that we would not be affected by COVID in a way that disrupted our ability to do our business, and as we have finished the 59th legislative day and come to this conclusion, the second announcement is, on Thursday, for Sine Die, in the Senate chamber and gallery, we will have a mask-optional policy for the last day.”

At 12:44 p.m., on motion by Senator DeCoite, seconded by Senator Fevella and carried, the Senate adjourned until 10:00 a.m., Thursday, May 5, 2022.

SIXTIETH DAY

Thursday, May 5, 2022

The Senate of the Thirty-First Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2022, convened at 10:11 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Ninth Day.

At this time, Senator Shimabukuro introduced Hawaiian Homes commissioner Patty Kahanamoku-Teruya, who was seated in the gallery. Also present in the gallery were Makana O Ke Akua director John Dudoit and other guests.

Senator Misalucha explained that they had felt it was important to have this elective to build a sense of belonging and a strong, positive self-identity. Senator Misalucha noted that this resolution had been passed by the Senate Education committee thanks to Senator Michelle Kidani and Vice Chair Donna Mercado Kim. Senator Misalucha then acknowledged the presence and outstanding work of the core group of students and advisors: students Raymart Billote, graduate of Waipahu High School, now a student at University of Hawai'i – West O'ahu; Jalen Espejo, student at Farrington High School; Allyza Espinosa, student at Roosevelt High School; Marissa Halagao, student at Punahou School; Mariah Ramo, student at Waipahu High School; Landee Resuello, student at Kamehameha Schools; and Lauren Watarida, student at Kapolei High School. Joining virtually was Caitlin Agnes, graduate of Kapolei High School, now a student at Temple University. Also seated in the gallery were advisors Dr. Amy Agbayani from the University of Hawai'i, emeritus assistant vice chancellor for student equity, excellence and diversity; Leon Florendo, president, Sariling Gawa Youth Council, and counselor, Leeward Community College Wai'anae Moku; Dr. Patricia Halagao, University of Hawai'i – Mānoa, chair, Department of Curriculum Studies; Norman Sales, teacher and strategic planner, Farrington High School; and Philippe Fernandez-Brennan, teacher, Roosevelt High School.

The Chair commented to Senator Taniguchi that, although Senator Gabbard had put a piece of toffee on everybody's desks, the Chair thought Senator Taniguchi's grandson would be a more appropriate recipient than Senator Taniguchi. The Chair noted, in good humor, that the members would be checking if the toffee actually got to Senator Taniguchi's grandson after the Senate adjourned.

Richardson School of Law and a doctor of philosophy from the College of Education. Senator Kim explained that Dr. Tochiki was very familiar with the issues and concerns facing the University, having served on the law school faculty in many capacities over the years, including assistant and adjunct professor, lecturer, associate dean for student services, and director of child welfare projects. Senator Kim further explained that Dr. Tochiki had also lent her legal experience to the judiciary as a law clerk, research analyst, and family court volunteer coordinator. Senator Kim noted that Dr. Tochiki has been the president and CEO of EPIC 'Ohana for the past decade, clarifying that EPIC is an acronym for "Effective Planning and Innovative Communication," and that the company provides management, leadership, and direction for more than 40 entities serving Native Hawaiian children. Senator Kim commented that Dr. Tochiki oversees a multimillion-dollar annual budget and nearly 100 full- or part-time employees statewide. Senator Kim related that Dr. Tochiki's experience in an administrative and educational background with the University and her work as a member of the faculty of the law school gave her a breadth and depth of knowledge that would hold her in good stead as a regent. Senator Kim concluded that the Committee on Higher Education was confident that Dr. Tochiki could contribute the ideas and know-how to strengthening the University governance and accountability while continuing to better the lives of those it serves.

Senator Kim then introduced Gabriel Lee, newly confirmed member of the Board of Regents of the University of Hawaii'i, who was also present in the gallery. Senator Kim noted that Mr. Lee would bring to his public responsibilities a distinguished career in the financial services industry. Senator Kim explained that Mr. Lee was an executive vice president of commercial markets for American Savings Bank and, prior to that, had been a vice president at First Hawaiian Bank and Bank of Hawaii. Senator Kim commented that Mr. Lee was an alumnus of Saint Louis School and the University of Hawaii'i, with a graduate education from Dartmouth College. Senator Kim noted that the University was a family affair for the Lees: Mr. Lee and his wife, Shirley, were both alumni of the school, and his daughter was a recent graduate of the law school. Senator Kim commented that Mr. Lee was active in the community through his service with the Boy Scouts of America, Aloha Council, and Diamond Head Theatre, as well as leadership positions with many prominent civic and philanthropic organizations. Senator Kim noted that the Committee on Higher Education believed that Mr. Lee's background in finance, strong leadership experience, and extensive record of governance and oversight in the nonprofit sector would bring a fresh perspective with a welcome source of expertise to the affairs of the University. Senator Kim concluded that Mr. Lee was a praiseworthy member of the Board of Regents, and she extended congratulations on behalf of the Higher Education committee.

At 10:30 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 10:42 a.m.

Senator Rhoads introduced the Student Association, or student government, of Kawanakoa Middle School. Senator Rhoads explained that these young people aspired to be future leaders of Hawai'i and that they were here to learn about civics and see government in action. Senator Rhoads clarified that that was not "government inaction" but rather "government in action." Present in the gallery were students Caden Camacho, Hudson Fukeda, Cayleb Huynh, Charlotte Jian, Karina Kim, Samson Kuang, Anuhea Leong-Wilkinson, Amy Liu, Ethan Mitchell, Kierra Pulsifer, Mischa Salvatera, Sadie Saoit, Marley Sekimoto, Haylee Sombatphibane, Maya Sukanuma, Aden Tran, Michael Vasconcellos, and Zachary M Yee; and advisor Corrie Izumoto.

The Chair commented that, since it was mentioned and would be part of the Journal forever, he would be remiss if he did not share that visual confirmation had been reported of Senator Taniguchi delivering the toffee to his grandson during the recess.

Senator Fevella rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Colleagues, we have repeatedly said the visitor industry is an important sector of Hawai'i's economy. The fact is it provides a significant share of the state tax revenues and provides employment opportunity with kama'aina families. There are also challenges associated with this industry. There are community concerns about the need to protect our cultural and our natural resources. The Hawai'i Tourism Authority has responded by changing course from a marketing focus to destination management and visitor education. This appropriation will help HTA with the ability to show progress on the implementation of the destination management action plan. Thank you, Senate President."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 253-22 was adopted and H.B. No. 1147, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Fevella rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"Colleagues, I support this measure because it'll help the taro farmers to increase their production of unprocessed taro by exempting the taro farmers from paying tax on their income. This tax exemption is a statement that we, as legislators, support native traditional food cultivation, that we support farmers, and that we support food security for Hawai'i's people. This bill will create economic incentives for taro farmers to build up their farming capacity, compete with imports, and reduce the cost of poi for our local families. This measure before us, Senate President and colleagues, is one that I really ask if we can show our support for our taro farmers. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 254-22 was adopted and H.B. No. 2466, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TARO," passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 255-22 (H.B. No. 2511, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Shimabukuro moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 255-22 be adopted and H.B. No. 2511, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Keohokalole.

Senator Shimabukuro rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"As the Wai'anae Coast legislator representing the region with the highest concentration of Native Hawaiians in the world outside of Ni'ihau, we have always felt like the forgotten people. Well, today is clear proof that the State has not forgotten the Hawaiians. The \$600 million into H.B. 2511 is the largest one-time infusion of state money to DHHL in history. Mahalo for showing our host culture that there is no Hawai'i without them. Thank you."

Senator Fevella rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"I'm in strong support of this bill, Senate President. This is a measure we always said here in the Legislature: we're putting our money where our mouth is by putting Hawaiians first, Hawaiian products first, and Hawaiian issues first. Every day we wake up, it is about a Hawaiian issue. Going forward, now we can level the playing field for the Hawaiians who have and the Hawaiians who have not in Hawai'i. This is a very important piece of legislation that is before us. I am so proud to be part of this body, to be part of this effort and to just be here. Senate President, I just thank you all, colleagues, and ask you to continue to support this bill. Thank you."

Senator Kanuha rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Kanuha's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise in strong support of H.B. No. 2511, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1.

"In 1920, the U.S. Congress passed the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act (HHCA), which set aside lands for Native Hawaiians to provide stability, financial equity, and economic

self-sufficiency for our State's host culture. However, since the enactment of the HHCA, the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) has been historically underfunded, and the State has struggled to award land or leases to beneficiaries.

"As outlined by Article XIII of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, the State has a fiduciary obligation to its HHCA beneficiaries. With an estimated 28,000 individuals currently on DHHL's applicant waiting list, many beneficiaries—including some of my own 'ohana—have regrettably passed away while waiting for the State to fulfill its obligation to them.

"This year's considerable budget surplus has presented us with a unique opportunity to set an important precedent that prioritizes the needs of our Native Hawaiian community. As our State currently faces an affordable housing crisis, this \$600 million infusion of funds will empower DHHL to develop home for kānaka maoli, while simultaneously providing other options such as mortgage down payment and/or rental assistance for beneficiaries on DHHL's applicant wait list.

"Thus, I strongly believe that H.B. No. 2511, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1 represents a historic commitment by the Legislature to the Native Hawaiian community and will result in transformative change for the future of our keiki. I look forward to working with DHHL to reaffirm our shared commitment to ensure Native Hawaiians can live and prosper in our State, as we work to further protect, preserve, and perpetuate the unique cultural history of Hawai'i."

Senator DeCoite rose to request that remarks in strong support of the measure be entered into the Journal.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator DeCoite's remarks read as follows:

"This unprecedented level of funding is a monumental step towards our commitment to Native Hawaiians and the Beneficiaries of the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands. It is my hope that the department works swiftly to utilize this funding in a way that will benefit the most of their beneficiaries to address the thousands on the waitlist.

"While these are monumental steps in addressing long-standing issues, there is still much more work to be done"

Senator San Buenaventura rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator San Buenaventura's remarks read as follows:

"I stand in strong support. Where Native Hawaiians comprise a significant portion of the homeless community, the moneys in this bill will significantly help this population as there is a correlation between the ability of the homeless to find permanent housing and the availability of affordable housing."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 255-22 was adopted and H.B. No. 2511, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF HAWAIIAN HOME LANDS," passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

At this time, Senator Keohokalole acknowledged the presence of two guests in the gallery, noting his belief that they were there to make sure H.B. No. 2511, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1 would pass. Seated in the gallery were Hailama Farden, president of the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs, and Tyler Iokepa Gomes, deputy director of the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, to whom the lāhui owed a great debt of gratitude for all of his hard work, effort, and, above all, trying.

H.B. No. 2512, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 2:

Senator San Buenaventura moved that H.B. No. 2512, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 2 pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Kanuha.

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"I rise in support of H.B. 2512, Ohana Zones. Mr. President, we passed the first Ohana Zones bill in 2018, a year infamous for the number of federal disasters that befell the state. On the last day of the 2018 session, May 3, 2018, we passed a \$100 million disaster relief bill to help Kaua'i, your island, and that afternoon, the first fissure opened up in Leilani Estates, my district—the start of a lava disaster that ended with 800 homes destroyed and thousands evacuated. In June that year, I begged the governor to sign the Ohana Zones bill, which would release \$30 million to create temporary homes, which could be used for all those evacuated on our islands. He refused. It took the administration a year to realize the benefits of the Ohana Zones program: the temporary shelters would wrap around services that refer the homeless to benefits and bridge homes that is available to them. By 2019, the increased services reduced the homeless population by 15 percent, and when the COVID-19 pandemic hit us in 2020, Ohana Zones moneys were available to create microshelters and pay for hotel rooms to reduce the congregate settings as a result. As a result, we had no case of COVID-19 infection in the homeless population that was housed in Ohana Zones settings.

"Mr. President, we started this session stating the state Senate's commitment to end homelessness. Ohana Zones funding is a start, but to truly end homelessness, we need to increase mental health treatment and provide housing affordable for those who work as clerks, cashiers, waiters, security guards, and it was heartbreaking when my committee went on a site visit to the HONUs at Wai'anae and Ke'ehi Lagoon in the interim, and we saw residents who had work dressing up to go to work, but they could not afford the rentals on O'ahu.

"So, I'm thankful not only for the passage of this bill but for the \$23 million in housing subsidies for the TANF families, the additional \$500,000 in rental assistance—these shallow subsidies prevent families on the edge from being homeless—and also the \$41.5 million to DHHL to develop rental housing because Native Hawaiians are disproportionately shown among our homeless population. These moneys, of course, are in addition to the millions in Housing First and in Rental Housing Revolving Fund that we provided. It will take more than money to end homelessness, but creating temporary housing is a first step, and I'm thankful to this body and the Ways and Means chair and the Ways and Means committee for making this first step possible. Thank you."

The Chair commented:

"I just have an addition to your remarks: on that last day of session, we also had appropriated \$18 million or \$23 million for East O'ahu, which had suffered significantly from the flooding as well, so we don't want to leave the Housing committee chair's district out of the remarks as they needed the help and they got the help from the Legislature."

Senator Fevella rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Colleagues, I support an extension of the Ohana Zone project because it addresses the need for housing of our houseless individuals. The governor's emergency proclamation of houseless waived a number of statutory provisions, for example, HRS Chapter 103D, our procurement code, and HRS Chapter 104, wages and hours of our employees of public works projects.

"I know by waiving certain requirements, this can result in significant savings in time and expenses to any affordable for projects for housing. But we must still recognize that there are certain requirements that should not be exempt. This is why I am pleased that the version of the bill before us has deleted from the list exemptions of Chapter 104. Why should we do these projects at the expense of our working people by exempting prevailing wages from these projects. And even though exemptions related to procurement code remains in the bill, I look forward to the opportunity to revisit this item in the future. Thank you, Senate President."

Senator Inouye rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"May I have the remarks of the senator of District 2 be entered into the Journal as if it was mine? Thank you." (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 2512, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OHANA ZONES," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

On motion by Senator Dela Cruz, seconded by Senator Gabbard and carried, H.B. No. 1800, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CLIMATE MITIGATION," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

H.B. No. 2424, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 2:

Senator San Buenaventura moved that H.B. No. 2424, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 2 pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Kanuha.

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"A student emailed me, asking what we were doing to stop child abuse, so it made me reflect on the substantive bills and budget we passed this year. This year was not only a banner year for Native Hawaiians and housing, but we also did a lot to support families and prevent child abuse. The media focused on H.B. 2424 as a legislator's silver bullet, and in many ways, it is. This bill does not attack the wrongdoers; the penal code, law enforcement will do that. With an unprecedented infusion of \$8 million in addition to the re-funding of vacant positions in the budget, this bill supports embattled social workers whose difficult duties require them to ensure that the children under their care remain safe. DHS has had a difficult time retaining these social workers and filling the 20 percent vacancy. To retain good social workers, H.B. 2424 increases their salary with pay differentials subject to collective bargaining and further allows DHS to provide incentives, like scholarships, to attract new social workers and investigators to fill the long-term vacant positions. H.B. 2424 also supports good resource caregivers, or foster parents. Therapeutic foster homes are few and far between because those resource caregivers care for the most traumatized, emotionally damaged children. This bill provides for incentives to recruit, vet, train, and provide continued support to resource caregivers so that these children need not be shuttled from home to home, nor have their siblings separated from them. Removing children from their homes should be the last resort as it further traumatizes them.

"To support good parents but whose addictions or circumstances, like working multiple jobs, may lead them to

neglect their children, we increase support for Family First programs. A benign bill, like S.B. 1137 we passed Monday, which increases the Spouse and Child Abuse Special Fund ceiling to \$5 million, actually goes a long way to getting matching federal funds to develop these Family First programs and keep a family intact but also ensure the safety of the vulnerable from domestic violence. S.B. 2641, which is a penal reform bill, also allows children to remain with women on furlough or in therapeutic programs. For families who are stressed and may slip into violence, a pilot program created in S.B. 3111, Family Resource Centers, guides them to available services and supports. To ensure that others are present to help care or keep eyes on our children, we passed an unprecedented budget allowance of \$100 million for child care and support for early childhood educators and a child wellness pilot program in S.B. 2857 we passed on Tuesday of over \$4 million. To ensure older children can safely remove themselves from abusive situations, we passed S.B. 3235, Safe Spaces for Youth, and allocated \$1 million in CIP in the budget for Hale Kipa, Pearl Haven youth emergency shelters and for sex traffic victims. To ensure that what we are doing is enough to stop abuse, H.B. 2424 has a working group chaired by nonprofits—not DHS—who deal hands-on with those accused of abuse and abused children, and they are empowered to report and recommend. We also passed on Tuesday S.C.R. 102 for the auditor to review DHS policies, procedures, and processes to ensure child safety.

"Colleagues, when people ask you what you did to stop child abuse this year, you can hold your heads up and tell them of all the bills we passed this year and that we've also put into place watchdogs—third-party nonprofits and the auditor—to ensure that the DHS programs we funded fulfill their purposes so that children like Ariel Sellers or Peter Boy Kema will be famous for what they have achieved as healthy adults and not because of the circumstances of their death. For all the above, I would like to thank again House Finance chair and Senate Ways and Means and what the supporters have done to make all of this possible. Thank you."

No. 3072, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII EMPLOYER-UNION HEALTH BENEFITS TRUST FUND INVESTMENTS," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

S.B. No. 3338, S.D. 2, H.D. 1:

Senator Taniguchi moved that S.B. No. 3338, S.D. 2, H.D. 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator DeCoite.

Senator DeCoite rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“As most of you know, Senate Bill 3338, Senate Draft 2, House Draft 1—the Kalaupapa Memorial funding bill—we will give approval for today, was proposed by Ka ‘Ohana O Kalaupapa. Ka ‘Ohana is a nonprofit Native Hawaiian organization that has been authorized by Congress to establish the Kalaupapa Memorial. They have been working diligently for nearly 20 years to see this memorial come to life. I think all of us at the Legislature know how hard they have worked to get this bill passed.

“The representatives of Ka ‘Ohana attending today are in the gallery and holding up photographs of their descendants or other past Ka ‘Ohana leaders who have passed away. We have:

- Charmaine Woodward, president of the ‘Ohana and the great-granddaughter of Kalaupapa David Kamahana, who had a successful business at Kalaupapa, and his wife, Alana Ahlo;
- Charmaine’s son Nainoa is here today as well, if you’ll please rise;
- Also attending with Charmaine are her parents, Margaret Wong and David Wong, the grandson of David Kamahana and Alana Ahlo;
- Valerie Monson, a founding member of Ka ‘Ohana, who is serving as the executive director;
- Kehaulani Lum, a member of the ‘Ohana board and memorial committee—she’s the great-great-niece of Kalaupapa artist and musician Henry Nalaeleua;
- Wally Inglis, a founding member of Ka ‘Ohana and guardian of close friends of Bernard Punikai’a, whose idea led to the organization of Ka ‘Ohana O Kalaupapa;
- Hitoshi Hida, retired architect of G70 International, who imagined the design of Kalaupapa Memorial and the meaning behind the interlocking circles; and
- DeGray Vanderbilt, a founding member of Ka ‘Ohana and the member of memorial committee who serves as the legislative liaison.

“I want to thank all of you, and I also want to thank DeGray, who’s been pounding on everybody’s door, even when we’re like, ‘We got it, DeGray.’ So I want to thank you. Also want to send out a big mahalo to Senator Taniguchi’s office and Tom and everybody from his staff who has been working hard on this as well as the chair from Senate Ways and Means, Senator Donovan Dela Cruz, and the chair of the Finance committee, Sylvia Luke, as well as my colleagues on both sides of the chambers to support this bill. Mahalo, Senate President. Mahalo, thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“I had the pleasure, when I first started in the Legislature, of representing Moloka‘i and Kalaupapa: wonderful, wonderful people. And although there’s tragedy in their history, with people populating the island after being thrown off of ships and people not understanding that the disease of leprosy could be—or Hansen’s disease, as it’s called today—could be cured. But the folks at Kalaupapa persisted. They had a wonderful, thriving village there, a wonderful place to get liquid refreshment, and, of course, they participate in our electoral process. So I’m so

glad that we are finally recognizing some of that wonderful history and the people who gave their lives on that island to make sure that it could continue to live and thrive and be a vibrant part of our community. I appreciate all the folks at Kalaupapa. I’m glad I had the opportunity to represent you and, of course, you’re in great hands with Senator DeCoite. Mahalo.”

Senator Taniguchi rose to request that remarks in strong support of the measure be entered into the Journal.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Taniguchi’s remarks read as follows:

“I strongly support the passage of Senate Bill 3338, S.D. 2, H.D. 1 to appropriate \$5,000,000 in general revenues for the design, planning, and construction of the Kalaupapa Memorial.

“In the late 1800s, leprosy, now known as Hansen’s disease, was little understood and believed to be a highly contagious, incurable disease. As a result, individuals diagnosed with the disease were often isolated from their families and communities to remote settlements, resulting in the deprivation of fundamental civil liberties such as the right to work, travel freely and see loved ones, vote, and raise families of their own.

“In Hawaii, the Legislature passed a law in 1866 that resulted in the designation of Kalawao County on the island of Molokai as the site for isolating Hansen’s disease patients, where individuals who were seriously affected by the disease could be quarantined. During the following century until the law’s repeal in 1969, approximately 8,000 men, women, and children were separated from their loved ones and forcibly relocated to isolation on Molokai’s Kalaupapa peninsula, often for the remainder of their lives.

“Many of these individuals are left out of the history of Kalaupapa today, as less than 1,000 of the persons who died at Kalaupapa still have a marked grave that can be identified. More than 7,000 lie in unmarked graves, and their names are no longer part of the landscape where they lived together and built a community under the most difficult of circumstances.

“The Memorial would serve as a commemorative tombstone for these thousands of people, more than 90 percent of whom were Native Hawaiians, to ensure that their names are not forgotten, but are honored as an integral part of the history that they helped to create. The Kalaupapa Memorial will restore these names to their family histories, to the history of Kalaupapa, and to the history of Hawaii.

“The Memorial is intended to serve as a place of healing and reconnection for the families and their descendants; and as a place of reflection and learning for all persons who visit the site and experience the compelling elements of the history of Kalaupapa -- the enduring strength, resilience, and humanity of its people; the beauty of its natural setting on the north coast of Molokai; and its geographic isolation.

“The United States Congress passed The Kalaupapa Memorial Act that was signed by President Barack Obama in 2009, authorizing Ka ‘Ohana O Kalaupapa (founded in 2003) to establish the Memorial. Since that time, the ‘Ohana has been involved in federal and state compliance processes; assembled a strong Memorial Committee that created an engaging and meaningful design; compiled the names of nearly 8,000 people who were sent to Kalaupapa; and developed a fundraising strategy.

“The Memorial design concept is composed of two circles: the Mauka circle representing the 8,000 people with Hansen’s disease who were sent away to the isolation of Kalaupapa; and the Makai circle representing the families who were left behind. The two circles are juxtaposed together at the middle to

reconnect those who had been separated forever. Suggestive of an embrace, a stone wall will surround most of the Mauka circle and have inscribed onto it all of the names of the Kalaupapa residents.

"I wish to acknowledge the many persons who submitted written and oral testimony in support of Senate Bill 3338, including Kalaupapa residents and their descendants who shared the stories of their relatives and stated the need to honor their sacrifices by remembering their names.

"I also wish to acknowledge the sustained efforts of the leadership and members of Ka 'Ohana O Kalaupapa, including long-time President (2009-2021) Clarence 'Boogie' Kahilihiwa – a Kalaupapa patient resident who passed away on March 5, 2021 at age 79; Director Valerie Monson; and especially Director and Secretary DeGray Vanderbilt, who championed the idea and coordinated the advocacy necessary with the members of the Hawaii State Legislature to realize the creation of the Kalaupapa Memorial.

"I strongly urge my colleagues to vote in support of Senate Bill 3338, S.D. 2, H.D. 1."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 3338, S.D. 2, and S.B. No. 3338, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE KALAUPAPA MEMORIAL," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

No. 2782, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT COST ITEMS," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

On motion by Senator Taniguchi, seconded by Senator DeCoite and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2790, S.D. 1, and S.B. No. 2790, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT COST ITEMS," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

S.B. No. 3048, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 2:

Senator Dela Cruz moved that S.B. No. 3048, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 2 pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Chang.

At this time, the Chair announced:

"Members, before getting to discussion and the vote, Senate Bill 3048 and Senate Bill 514 are going to put us over the spending ceiling. Therefore, by the Constitution, we identify with the language what we're doing by approving these bills, and it will require a two-thirds majority on each of these last two votes for the bills to be approved."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 3048, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE FUNDS," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

S.B. No. 514, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 2:

On motion by Senator Dela Cruz, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran and carried, S.B. No. 514, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE GENERAL FUND," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

The Clerk then announced:

S.R. No. 222 "SENATE RESOLUTION INFORMING THE HOUSE AND GOVERNOR THAT THE SENATE IS READY TO ADJOURN SINE DIE."

Offered by: Senator Kanuha.

On motion by Senator DeCoite, seconded by Senator Fevella and carried, S.R. No. 222 was adopted.

At this time, the Chair announced:

"Members, what we will do next, with the announced retirements of three of our members, is offer the Minority Leader an opportunity if he has closing comments; I will have closing comments, and then we will recognize our three retiring senators. We're going to go on the recognition by junior years of service to senior years of service, so when we get to that portion, we'll be recognizing Senator Nishihara first, Senator Baker second. We'll do Senator Taniguchi last because he has the largest crowd, and we'd like to keep the gallery full until we get to the end."

Senator Fevella rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Senate President, I have four bills on the 'non-fiscal consent' and 'fiscal consent' calendar and one bill on the 'non-fiscal ordinary' calendar on Tuesday, May 3, 2022, that I wish to enter comments in the Journal: Senate Bill 2819, S.D. 2,

H.D. 2, C.D. 1; Senate Bill 2821, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1; Senate Bill 3054, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1; House Bill 1982, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1; House Bill 2075, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1. Thank you, Senate President.”

Senate President Kouchi addressed the members of the Senate as follows:

“In closing, I’d like to say that the Majority Leader will be working with the Communications team and the Senate Vice President on the press release giving us a score as it relates to the Majority priorities, or the Senate priorities (I’m sorry, Senator Fevella, as you agreed with the priorities as they were laid out). So we’re going to have that issued, so I want to be clear that the remarks I’m about to give simply relate to me getting a copy of what I said on Opening Day personally, and so I’m going to give myself my own report card, so as you might imagine, I’m going to get a pretty good grade because I’m in charge.

“What I’d like to begin by saying is, to all of the members, myself included, we all deserve a big pat on the back. On the first four bills today, I thought we were running the Senator Fevella show as he got up in strong support of each of those items, but it goes to the bipartisan way that we have worked and to ensure that everyone’s voice matters; everyone’s voice counts as we do our work here in the Senate. And as we look at what is happening nationally and the divisiveness of the national politics in Washington, D.C., and we see the unrest and the war in Ukraine with the Russians, it is refreshing to be a role model to at least the citizens here in Hawai‘i about how we can work together and, through cooperation, what we can achieve.

“I’m proud today to have in the gallery my eldest son, Dan. He returned to Hawai‘i in 2019 and promptly made the front page of the *Star-Advertiser* by taking a job with the Hawaii Chamber of Commerce, and I was supposed to have killed the minimum wage bill for him. I am glad to report that we have succeeded in getting one passed. He got married in the end of March to a young lady from Maui who is now doing great work for the Department of Health and has been featured in many of the Red Hill comments from the Department of Health as we try to make sure that the drinking water is safe for the residents here on O‘ahu. Next to my wife, Joy, on the other side, is my younger son, Egan, who works quietly in the background on Kaua‘i, but he is married to a middle school teacher, and she is the middle school teacher who runs the Ma‘i Movement pilot project on Kaua‘i and the young woman who really educated me on the importance of the issue and why we need to do it. And then, certainly, my wife, Joy, in the middle of our two sons, who has been so supportive of me being here and allowing me to do this work.

“I had to add all of that in, Senator San Buenaventura, because you wiped out half of my speech, and I’m so glad that you did because I talked about homelessness, and I talked about how Ohana Zones would be a tool because of the flexibility in each county responding in an appropriate way for their county and not a cookie-cutter, one-size-fits-all solution and how we had to work on mental health services, and you’ve done a great job in articulating the work that we succeeded in doing here this past session. And I talked about affordable housing, and with the \$1 billion commitment to affordable housing, the Legislature has made a strong statement about trying to get more and more affordable units for our residents here.

“I talked about Farm to School, and in the budget we just passed was \$6 million to acquire an existing facility on the Mānā Plain that is on leased land by the ADC. They are creating a partnership with Waimea High School, where they will be able to, on this 10-acre site, have a lo‘i with taro and show cultural and traditional ways in which the Hawaiian community farmed. And they also have robotic equipment in the facility so

that we will be in the 21st century with robotic agricultural farming. And they have partnered with Kamehameha Schools Bishop Estate, and so they are looking at creating a model of how we work with the nonprofit and with all of the farming entities that are on the Mānā Plain to enhance our Farm to School program, to enhance our food security, and, ultimately, we will probably be coming forward for an appropriation to create a processing facility, where we’ll take all of the food that’s being grown on the Mānā Plain in West Kaua‘i and run it through the processing facility so that the students at Waimea High School will have an opportunity to learn about those jobs. And in that processing, you take the waste and you put it into a biodigester and create either feed for livestock or fertilizer, and you create energy to help pay the cost of operating the facility—a truly sustainable effort and community-based, and I’m excited about what is going to happen on the Mānā Plain.

“We talked about broadband and allowing our students to compete with anybody in the world, and with the \$109 million we have committed to broadband infrastructure projects statewide, this is going to be amazing, and I did say I had supreme confidence in the Education chair as to the commitment we have for education. One of the things that she’s worked tirelessly on and partnered with the Housing committee chair and the Ways and Means chair is to try and get more affordably priced units for teachers, and one of the biggest stumbling blocks we have in retaining teachers is having that ability for them to find housing that they can afford, and she has worked hard to make sure that there is money in there to pilot projects and develop projects that we are going to be able to offer to teachers. And, more importantly, obviously, is just to get them paid a fair salary, and she has done great work in trying to make sure that we have compensated teachers in a way that express how much we value them, how important they are, and we hope that they will have a long career in the Department of Education.

“I talked about the minimum wage, and I’m glad to see, Senator Taniguchi, in what appears to be your last session, that we were able to get it to the finish line. We’re going to get to \$18 by 2028. The earned income tax credit is part of the package, so that’s another little over \$400 a year to working families. The tax credit I never talked about because I never thought we had that much money; Senator Dela Cruz and Representative Luke, to have the program that will get a family of four earning \$100,000 or less another \$1,200 is an incredible way to try and assist working families here deal with inflation. I didn’t even use the word ‘inflation’ in my Opening Day remarks because inflation wasn’t even on the radar and what was about to happen in Ukraine.

“After talking aspirationally for a little while on that Opening Day, I said I’d like to come down from 30,000 feet and talk about something at the ground level, which was the Ma‘i Movement. There was an article on the previous Monday, two days before we opened, about the Ma‘i Movement. My daughter-in-law was quoted in the article, saying, if you needed to make a choice between food or feminine hygiene products, oftentimes, the food is what you purchase. And so I’d like to thank the Women’s Caucus—in particular, Senator Kidani, the Education chair, who shepherded the bill through on our side; Senator Acasio, who’s been championing this—and it has been an incredible journey for students from ‘Ilima Intermediate School who have been trying for three years to get this bill passed and for the first two years were told, in the COVID conditions we were in, that there was absolutely no money, and they never got a hearing on their bill. And to see the determination and the never-give-up attitude and for them to come back after two incredibly horrible attempts when they couldn’t get the hearing and to get the bill to the end: they were participating in the hearings virtually when they were virtual, and then they were here in person every step of the way,

including making sure we did our job last week Friday in conference committee, or they were going to let us know. And so I am just thrilled to death about what Senator Kidani was able to shepherd through with the help of Ways and Means Chair Dela Cruz on the Ma'i Movement bill.

"To each of you, members, and to our staff: when I was reflecting on what to say today, I realized that we have now run four totally different operational sessions of the Legislature. We came here in 2019, and we ran a traditional session. We got back in in 2020 and, all of a sudden, shut everything down and ended in a written-only session. We came back in 2021, and we did a virtual session with the building closed. And now this year: starting with the building closed and evolving with the building being open and running a hybrid system. It hasn't been easy, and to the committee chairs, who have adapted to make sure that the public could participate to the greatest extent possible in spite of the conditions that we faced, I applaud you. To all of the members who found the reason why it was going to work and not being members who were coming to work every day telling me why it can't work: I applaud you for your can-do attitude. To our staff, and especially the IT staff, and the constant changes that we were making and the preparation that they put in is incredible, and from the bottom of my heart and I know from my 24 colleagues, we really want to thank you for all of your efforts. And when you look at the final product, to Senator Dela Cruz, Senator Keith-Agaran: I have never achieved every single goal I've talked about before because we run into a problem and we run out of money. I never imagined that we'd have a billion-dollar commitment to the Native Hawaiian community here, but you found a way to make that happen. The various programs that are helping the ALICE families in our community, the commitment to pre-K, K-12, and higher education—this is the most amazing legislative session that I've participated in, and it surpasses anything that I've ever done on the County of Kaua'i, so I want to thank you for allowing me to work with each and every one of you and get this result for the people of Hawai'i, so give yourselves a big hand.

"Hope everybody has your tissue ready."

Senator Misalucha rose to request that, if it were possible, Senator Nishihara sit in the center of the chamber, in front of all of the members.

The Chair noted the arrangement of chairs and jokingly commented that the members apparently wanted to roast Senator Nishihara.

Senator Misalucha explained that Senator Nishihara could be appropriately honored this way, and the Chair clarified that Senator Nishihara would be allowed to return to his chair and microphone to give his remarks.

Senator Nishihara rose and approached the center of chamber, where he remained standing.

Senator Misalucha spoke on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"It is said that teaching is the greatest act of optimism. Teachers have this boundless capacity to always believe in the good nature of a human being. They invest time and energy into making a difference in the lives of their students and, sometimes, even if the outcome fails expectation, they do not give up—they move on and try again. Senator Clarence Nishihara, early in his life, chose teaching as a profession. He later became a principal and gave his all to this role. In other words: the dogged optimism of a teacher fuels his spirit.

"And when he went on to become a public servant as an elected state senator, he brought with him this sense of dogged optimism. Fortuitously, he landed in two committees where this

optimism was required. As the chair of Agriculture, he helped craft policies that would enable farmers and ranchers to provide food on our table. You need optimism in this industry, where farmers toil the land and plant the seeds despite the possible vicissitudes of weather or pestilence. Then, as chair of Corrections, Senator Nishihara brought optimism and focus on some of our citizens that society had almost forgotten. Throughout his years of service, Senator Nishihara has faced his fair share of outcomes that did not meet expectations, but he always rebounded and moved on to tackle the next big issue. People say Senator Nishihara has a heart of gold and the soul of a servant leader. He has served his district, Senate District 17, honorably and with distinction. Over the many years, he has been unselfish in sharing his wisdom and experience with the Senate and the greater community. So, on this day, the day of his retirement, we do not begrudge him the future bliss, the long days of summer throughout the year, and the many travels forthcoming, some to Las Vegas, that he is bound to do with his beautiful wife, Lynn, by his side. Well done, O good and faithful servant. Well done, Senator Clarence Nishihara."

Senator Misalucha requested that Senator Keohokalole accompany her in the presentation of lei and a certificate to Senator Nishihara.

Senators Keohokalole and Misalucha then presented lei and a certificate to Senator Nishihara, after which Senator Nishihara returned to his desk.

Senator Fevella rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Colleagues, when I first came here, there was something I wanted to take care of because on my side of the island, in 'Ewa Beach, we have a lot of people who are correctional officers, and who have general concerns for public safety. I have a lot of respect for Senator Nishihara because he always had his door open, especially his ear, and if you know me, I tend to talk a lot. Senator Nishihara opened his door, not only with his ear, and just sat there to listen, but he taught me a lot. He gave me the drive to be concerned about not only the adult correction officers, but also our inmates. I know a lot of people don't understand right now, and I know you've been hearing in the press about our concerns regarding a bail reform bill that would release nonviolent offenders, but regardless of what they understand, about this bill, I totally understand that we, as a legislative body, made the right decision. Speaking to Senator Nishihara about the law enforcement, how important this was for a lot of individuals that, even when I came here, I thought I could get the HPD patrol division to work with the sheriffs just like that, but it doesn't happen that way. But Senator Nishihara's knowledge and understanding and his willingness to teach me to have patience (which I don't have), we got certain things passed, and we accomplished a lot of things with the Public Safety committee for our inmates as well as our adult correctional officers. And so, on behalf of me and my family and my community, Senator Nishihara, we love you and thank you very much. We appreciate you."

The Chair presented the following remarks:

"I've been here for twelve years, and in my first two years, I was a member of the Agriculture committee that Senator Nishihara chaired, and in my second term, I was his vice chair on the Agriculture committee. In my third term, I served one year under him as the chair of the Transportation committee, so somebody apparently felt that he needed to supervise me, and I was always in one of my committee assignments with Senator Nishihara.

"What's significant about the time I served with him on the Agriculture committee is, the debate on genetically modified organisms was raging at its height in our communities across

the state. And someone who had a difference of opinion with Senator Nishihara decided to call the office and, when she got the recorder, leave a message that slurred his Japanese ancestry. But she also left her name on the message, and a few days later, when we sat in the hearing and she came up to testify and she identified herself, Clarence kind of chuckled and goes, 'Oh, you're the one,' and that's all he ever said, not in anger, nothing. He was a little surprised, I guess, that she was right there, and he handled it in such a classy way and totally defused what could have been a very—I don't want to use the word 'violent,' but certainly confrontational situation, and all the air went out of the room. Everybody relaxed, and she still disagreed with his position, but she was much more respectful and, to her credit, offered an apology for the remarks that she had made on the phone. But it's because of how Senator Nishihara handled the situation that she had a path forward to get the issue resolved that way.

"And so I've appreciated your friendship, Senator Nishihara, and working with you. I've appreciated the calamansi and limes that I received that not maybe all of you get, but it's sometimes nice to be the president. Best wishes in your next phase of your life, Senator Nishihara, and this is the time when you stand up and make your remarks."

Senator Nishihara rose to present the following remarks:

"My wife has been patiently waiting for me to give my remarks. Senate President and colleagues, as my time here in the Senate comes to a close, I've had time to reflect on what I would say as I exit this beautiful chamber for the last time. When I entered the Legislature after my retirement from the Department of Education, I could not have imagined I would still be here in this chamber 18 years later. Well, it seems like now is a good time to say goodbye.

"Seated up in the gallery this morning are my wife, Lynn; daughters, Joy and Julie; and my grandchildren Zachary and Hailey, who I previously introduced. They've had to bear with me over the last 18 years as I went about my duties as a senator representing Waipahu, Pearl City, Palisades, and Crestview/Seaview. Without the strong support and steadfast efforts of my loving wife and family, I probably would not have lasted this long in office. Constituents are, of course, very important, but not as important as your family. I also owe so much gratitude and thanks to my faithful office manager and friend over the past 18 years, Ms. Priscilla Kubota, who came out of retirement to work for me and has stayed with me through all my years in office. Thank you, thank you, Priscilla.

"With the upcoming elections, I can tell you that I will **not** miss the campaigning, fundraising, sign-waving, and all that comes with getting elected. To those running for reelection, I wish you all the best of luck and, hopefully, the good fortune of winning your reelection. To my fellow senators, colleagues, and friends, as well as the many staff from the Clerk's office, Sergeant-at-Arms, LRB, Majority Research Offices, as well as the IT: I will miss your friendship and thank you for making my job easier. I connected with all of you in whatever capacity you served in your offices. You all did your jobs efficiently to help me and the rest of us and, in doing so, helped the public in general receive the services that good government needs to provide and is expected to provide.

"As I bid you all a fond aloha, I wish to express what an honor and privilege it has been to serve my community and the people of Hawai'i for the past 18 years, and I hope that I was able to make a positive difference in the lives of those around me. It's been such a nice journey, filled with great moments and great friendships made along the way. I hope that people will look back and see me as one who always treated everyone fairly, with respect and kindness; one who always listened; was not afraid to make hard decisions based on what I felt was right;

and who always served with integrity and stayed true to character. Thank you all for everything you do and will continue to do for our people of this great State of Hawai'i. It is only through our love and support for one another that our Senate will remain as the strong institution that it is. Thank you and mahalo."

Senator Keith-Agaran rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"You know, it's strange to get up here; I didn't really prepare anything that I want to read because, all year long, as Roz kept talking about maybe leaving, I never really believed her. And it's because I've always seen Representative Baker, Senator Baker, in public service since I returned home to Maui. She's always been one of those constants that you see, and the thing about Senator Baker, Mr. President, is that, at one time, she has served every single community in our county. She was a senator in every district over all the different redistrictings that occurred during her time, and whichever community she served, she always put her heart into it. You can see that by the body of work that she leaves, not just in this body, but in her time in the state House and when she served at the county as a director under Mayor Apana. I think we'll all remember her service as both Ways and Means chair, she was chair of the Consumer Protection Committee, so she had earned the trust of the people that she served with throughout her entire tenure here. You know, the filing deadline, Roz, is not till ... So, things may happen; I know it won't, but I think I speak for everybody, at least in my community, and we really wish you a warm mahalo.

"I know when I first came into the Senate, I spoke to the former lieutenant governor and our former colleague from Hāna, and I asked them for advice, and they said, 'Well, Gil, you're married to a Texas girl—start from there.' And I kinda stumbled a few times, but I'm glad that you were always there to provide me the kind of counsel that my wife does. And for that, I think that's probably one of the best lessons that I had in serving with you because you were someone that I could trust; your word was good, and I knew that when you worked on something, that you did your homework, so if I got up to speak against one of your bills, I knew that it was coming back to me, and I think a lot of us have learned that.

"So, Roz, thank you for your time and service for Maui County, and I'm sure that whatever you do in the next couple years that you please enjoy it, and say hello to your sister."

Senator DeCoite rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"First of all, I want to insert the words of the prior speaker as if they were my own into the Journal. (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.) If I can, sir, I would like Senator Baker to come to the front so that the people can see you."

Senator Baker rose and approached the center of the chamber, where she remained standing.

Senator DeCoite continued:

"Of course, Senator Agaran knew that this was going to happen, that I would have a hard time speaking after he just basically said everything that has been said about you, so I'd like to start with: thank you for your service, Senator Baker. You represented us well when you were our representative on Moloka'i many years ago, and agriculture was at the top of your chain. As my dad would always say, 'How's that feisty lady doing in the Senate?' and I would always tell him, 'She's still kicking butt.' But I can tell you, Senator Baker, from the time that I've met you, you've always been there; you've always been responsive, and you've always addressed our communities, like you did just with Kalaupapa. I don't know how you've done it because I can remember the days when I'd

be sitting there and I'd be saying, 'How does she end up reading everything?' So I can appreciate the notes, as well as many of our colleagues here in this building today, but I can tell you, many of your constituents that you have served on Moloka'i, Lāna'i, East Maui, and now all of Upcountry Maui, they have been very grateful to you and everything that you have done, and I want to say this because when you first came back and we were at a gala on Maui, and my husband leaned over and my husband said, 'Thank you for supporting my wife,' and the response that came back, which earned me a few extra points, was, 'She's a diamond in the rough.' So every time I get to go home, I get to remind him that the diamond in the rough came on behalf of you, and it meant the world to me. I wish you well and, of course, as the other night that we had our dinner and we wanted to spend some time with you, we will be spending that time with you, also with your sister, and making our trip to come and visit. But what more can I say but, from the bottom of my heart, and on behalf of my family and all of the people that you have represented well: mahalo, mahalo, mahalo, Roz. Thank you."

Senator Keith-Agaran rose to request that he and Senator DeCoite be allowed to approach Senator Baker for the presentation of lei and a certificate.

The Chair assented, noting that Senators Misalucha and Keohokalole had felt comfortable in approaching Senator Nishihara without permission. The Chair added, "This must be 'marrying a Texas woman and the rules' thing!"

Senators DeCoite and Keith-Agaran presented a lei and a certificate to Senator Baker.

The Chair commented:

"For those of you who couldn't hear, Senator Keith-Agaran, in presenting the certificate, said, 'It's signed by 24 members because we didn't let her sign her own certificate.'"

Senator Baker returned to her desk.

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"I first came to realize the power of Senator Baker even before I became a legislator. When I was an attorney working for the middle class, working for the working poor, I realized one of her many bills, which was the payday loans bill, tried to help those who were being victimized by these 425 percent interest rates. It was her dogged determination that we finally passed it last year. But I remember, when I first got in on Opening Day, when the governor was being sworn in, and I approached her—and I know she didn't know who I was—but I asked her, 'Are you going to reintroduce that bill?' And at that time, she was saying, 'There's a lot of naysayers, so I don't know,' so I am so thankful that she has this dogged determination to see it through and that we finally were able to pass it for her. And I also want to point out that she, as being a Women's Legislative Caucus leader, has been a champion of women's rights and has been an outspoken champion when the rest of us are usually quiet, so I thank her for that. And if you noticed that the women in the room are wearing Roz red in honor of her. And so for all those reasons, I am going to be sorry to see her go, even though I'm just a freshman senator, because you have touched a lot of us. Thank you."

The Chair presented the following remarks:

"Senator Baker, I've known you since my years serving at the county level, but most of our bills in those days didn't get to the committees you were on, and when I first got here, I didn't serve on your committee, so it's after I became president I had a chance to work even closer with you. But when I did have issues in your purview and people from Kaua'i visit, you

always were gracious with your time to meet with my constituents to make sure that their time was well spent talking to somebody who actually knew what they were talking about and not their senator who was not on the committee.

"Senator San Buenaventura, I was walking by my television in the office one morning of conference week, and I did see the exchange between Senator Baker and an unnamed representative from Maui when the bill wasn't going to pass, and so I got to witness firsthand the passion that she brought in her advocacy for protecting the working people of Hawai'i and her advocacy in the cancer space as a cancer survivor and the causes that she has fought for. It's been an honor and a privilege for me, Senator Baker, to have been able to partner with you and work together with you on things that you have been passionate about, and wish you well in your future endeavors."

Senator Baker rose to present the following remarks:

"Colleagues, this is amazing—I didn't prepare anything because I didn't expect to be having the honor of responding. I've had the privilege and the pleasure serving in the Legislature, my community, and our state for 30 years, and I told somebody, 'I think that's long enough,' but maybe I'm having second thoughts. The thing I won't miss—and I think the neighbor-island legislators all will agree with me—is getting up either early on a Monday or in the middle of the afternoon on a Sunday, hopping on a plane, coming over here, getting a car at the airport, going to a hotel and staying there and trying to remember, 'Did you bring everything you needed to stay the week?' Sometimes the answer was yes and sometimes it wasn't. So I'm not going to miss that, but I will definitely miss all of you and the good work that we've all done together to solve the problems that we confront, whether we have to go and beg from the Ways and Means chair for a little bit extra for something going on in our district or whether it's working on the bills that are going to enable things to happen.

"It's been my honor and privilege to serve with each and every one of you, and I'm going to miss you all terribly, but I know that the state is in excellent hands because of all of the good work that's going to be done in this body. Although I don't know who my successor is going to be, you can be certain that if that successor deviates from what I think he or she ought to be doing, then I can pick up the phone or send them a text and make that point. But thank you so much for allowing me to be a part of this wonderful body, of serving on a number of committees. I served as chair of Ways and Means, and I was really happy to give that committee up; it's a lot of work and you can't make anybody happy, so my hat is off to Senator Dela Cruz for the good work that he and the committee and the vice chair, Senator Kidani, have done to try to make all of us and our constituents a little bit happier with some of the projects that are going to come to our district.

"Senate President, you have been an amazing leader. I am so honored to have served with you, beside you, to try to take care of some of the issues in our state. And I have to say that, with your leadership and the team that you've assembled—our staff, our Clerk, our Assistant Clerk, the Sergeant-at-Arms, all of the folks in SMA, every place else—we have a wonderful team here, and I think all of our communities can be proud of that. But, Mr. President, your leadership has been invaluable to me—to all of us—and I thank you for that.

"I will miss all of you. If there's ever anything I can do, if you ever need anything from Maui, just let me know. Majority Leader: you run a great caucus—thank you so much. Everything is right there; we know what's coming up; we appreciate that. Senator Fevella, you were one of the most reliable members of my committee, and I thank you so much for being there—even when we had to do it on Zoom, you joined us via Zoom—and you really made a difference. And I appreciate

your attention, your caring, and your willing to work with all of us. I could say that about just everybody in this room. Senator Chang: I hope when you get to Vienna, you'll have a chance to see all of the wonderful sights there. If I have the opportunity, I'd love to go visit my sister while you're there and enjoy that as well.

"To everyone in this body: you all are amazing, and you make such wonderful contributions. I've been around as long as Senator Ihara and almost as long as Senator Taniguchi (he's got a few more years on me), but we've seen such progress being made, and such care and concern for every aspect of Hawai'i is represented in this room. So thank you for allowing me to serve with you, to become friends with you, to have celebrated the good, the bad, and the ugly that sometimes happens. I will miss you all, and I hope I'll see some of you on Maui one of these days. You all have my cell number. I take texts and email, so please come join and continue to have a wonderful end of our session and the beginning of the next. Aloha."

Senator Ihara rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, on behalf of the Senate, Senator Kim and I would like to present a special certificate to our senior legislative colleague, the Honorable Brian T. Taniguchi, who's retiring at the end of this term.

"Mr. President, when I entered the Legislature 36 years ago, I met Representative Brian Taniguchi, who was already elected three times by voters in Mānoa, Mō'ili'ili, McCully—and the first time in 1980, 42 years ago. Back then, I thought Brian was a radical activist because, as a university senator, he had helped establish the ethnic studies program as a degree program, and it seemed radical back then. Besides a colleague, I knew Brian as an attorney, legal counsel, government relations adviser, and other roles in the private sector, but both Representative Taniguchi and Senator Taniguchi have strongly advocated in support of his community.

"Over his career, Senator Taniguchi's communities have included Mānoa, Mō'ili'ili, McCully, Makiki, Punchbowl, and Papakōlea. From his seats in both House and Senate, the Honorable Brian Taniguchi (it's his formal protocol name) initiated significant school, library, and community improvements, including a football stadium, a gymnasium, music facility, science and technology building, a library, to name a few.

"In the House, Representative Taniguchi served as majority leader in the 1991 and 1992 legislative sessions while I chaired the Intergovernmental and International Affairs committee. The following term, we kind of switched it a bit, and Brian chaired the committee and I became majority floor leader. While I served in leadership positions, Senator Taniguchi chaired the committees that had a strong partnership relationship with leadership: the Ways and Means committee, the Commerce and Consumer Affairs committee, and Judiciary committee. He also chaired the Committees on Higher Education and Labor and Culture and the Arts.

"Mr. President, while we served on few committees together, Senator Taniguchi and I have come from neighboring communities—Mānoa Valley and myself, Pālolo Valley. We both served on our respective neighborhood boards before entering office. We've allied on a super powerline proposal up the ridge between Mānoa and Pālolo Valleys, and we've partnered on dredging, flood control, and restoration projects in the Ala Wai Watershed.

"Before I give a critique of his character, I'd like to mention two legislative projects that Senator Taniguchi has spearheaded. In 1997, he founded the Hiroshima-Hawaii Sister State Committee that connected his Roosevelt High School alma

mater with a Hiroshima high school. And in 2006, Senator Taniguchi established in Hawaii Revised Statutes the Hawaii sister-state program to promote Hawai'i international social and economic relationships, which, until then, was only a departmental initiative. In 2008, Senator Taniguchi initiated the Art at the Capitol program to enable the public, once a year, to view hundreds of artwork in Capitol offices. Like many of his projects, Art at the Capitol was a response to a constituent inquiry about wanting to see the beautiful art in these legislators' offices.

"Rumor has it that during his UH senator days, Brian Taniguchi learned about working with others to get things done and began to focus on being always supportive of the community as a whole. But legend has it that a quote from his father found its way into the Taniguchi family dining room workspace, written on a Post-it Note (legend has it) that stayed on the wall for the duration. His father's quote was, 'Do one good thing every day.' And I see Brian has heeded that call, the call of his father to do one good thing every day.

"We'll probably meet in Senate session again before Brian officially retires on Election Day, but we believe it's fitting to acknowledge the legacy of his committed public service, performed by an advocate for the community, and for all people being treated with dignity, respect, and fairness. Brian, my friend and colleague, this chamber will miss your presence. We wish you the best and return you full-time to your family: life partner, Janice; daughter, Karli; son, Danny; and grandchildren, Roycen, Lucy, Hunter, and Leah. Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator Taniguchi."

Senator Kim rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, it's always difficult to say aloha to a colleague. In fact, you know what, Brian: I don't think you should be spared—you need to go up in front like everybody else."

Senator Taniguchi rose and approached the center of the chamber, where he remained standing.

Senator Kim continued:

"As I was saying, it's difficult to say aloha to a colleague, a friend, and someone who's served alongside you for so many years. I was elected to the House of Representatives in 1982, and when I got there, Representative Taniguchi had already been there for two years. I served with him until I left the House in 1985 for the City Council, and he finally left the House for the Senate in 1994. Of course, in 2000, I got elected to the Senate and, while I hate dating myself, only Les Ihara, Jr., Lorraine Inouye, and myself and Senator Taniguchi from the 2001 legislative session remain in this legislative body today. Now, Tanigooch, as he's often called, is retiring after devoting more than half his life—42 years—to faithfully and effectively serve his constituents and the people of Hawai'i.

"It seems like Brian had public service flowing in his veins virtually from small-kid time. He was elected as a senator to the Associated Students of the University of Hawai'i, where he helped lead the creation of ethnic studies as a degree program. He interned for Governor John Burns and was a law clerk for Judge Hiroshi Kato. As a member of the House of Representatives beginning in 1980 and then to the Senate in 1994, he and Senator Ihara thus remain the longest continuously serving members of the Senate—no small feat considering the turnover we've seen in the Legislature and local politics. His longevity is a testament to the respect and support he has commanded from his constituents for more than four decades and a reflection of the leadership and commitment he has demonstrated in representing his district.

"Brian's leadership and numerous committees, not to mention his civic contributions, form a legacy that is long and distinguished. His influence can be seen in legislation involving labor, public and higher education, government finances, transportation, consumer protection and commerce, and culture and the arts. Furthermore, he's been instrumental in securing projects benefiting his district, including a football stadium, new gymnasium with locker rooms, new music facility at Roosevelt High School, the science and technology building at Stevenson Middle School, the IDEA Center and covered play court at Noelani Elementary School, Manoa Valley Gym, the Manoa Library, and, more recently, he shepherded the minimum wage. Which one do you want to be named after you, Brian?"

"His work in the Senate has always been marked by insightful and quiet, forward-thinking proposals while he's been able to point out the broader implications of our legislative decisions. We are fortunate to have benefited by his wisdom and counsel. Besides his public service, Brian has enjoyed an equally illustrious career in the legal profession. This alumnus of the UH Richardson School of Law has been an attorney in private practice and legal counsel for financial institutions. Whatever his endeavors, public or private sector, Brian has never strayed from his commitment as a focused, devoted advocate for the greater good and his insistence that all people be treated with dignity, respect, and fairness.

"Now that he's leaving his legislative duties, we wish Brian and his wife, Janice, and his family many more happy, fulfilling years together in the company of your children and grandchildren. Retirement means you get to do all the things you couldn't do because of work, so enjoy your time and do whatever you like. Aloha, Brian; we will miss you, but not as much as you'll miss us."

Senator Ihara rose to request that he and Senator Kim be allowed to present a certificate to Senator Taniguchi, and the Chair assented.

Senators Kim and Ihara presented a lei and a certificate to Senator Taniguchi, after which Senator Taniguchi returned to his desk.

Senator Wakai rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"I call him Sensei—it's a play on words (Sen-ator Taniguchi being my mentor and teacher). When he was first elected in 1980, I was watching *Kikaida*. I had no interest in politics whatsoever, but, lo and behold, 42 years later, I get the honor of serving with this Japanese superhero. He is quite the action figure till today. We've had numerous opportunities to travel to Japan. I watched him bridge relations between Hawai'i, Japan, Philippines, India, and points beyond our shores. He is truly a global bridge-builder. Next week, in fact, he's going to sign a sister-school relationship between Noelani Elementary School and a school in Sakaimachi, Japan.

"I also admire his work on keeping arts and culture thriving in the state. He created the '1 percent for the arts' and protects that pot of money to ensure arts continues to define who we are in the state.

"Sensei: I have deep admiration for all that you have done for the people of this state. Enjoy your retirement, and thank you for molding Hawai'i into the special place it is today and into the future. Ganbatte."

The Chair presented the following remarks:

"Unlike Senator Kim, who met in November after the election, I came to work in the State Capitol in January of 1982 for Kaua'i representative Dennis Yamada, and my work in the policy room, which was part of the Majority Leader's office,

would bring Senator Taniguchi to check in with the attorneys as a young House member, and that's where I really first got to know him, and we both found out that we had a passion for baseball-card collecting. And we would have many conversations about what particular cards we had or what the treasured memory was associated with baseball cards, and it even made its way into a *Kauai Times* news story they did on me when I talked about, I'm not the only legislator with this passion; I know Representative Taniguchi, at the time in the state House, was passionate about this. And I have, through the years, come to lobby Senator Taniguchi in assignments that he has had: the County had bills there.

"When I got to the Senate and became president, one of the first requests I had was to have Senator Taniguchi be part of my leadership team. I valued the experience that he had in the Legislature and, certainly, his intellect and his strategic thinking. Ever since I've been president, he's been on the leadership team, and his counsel has been invaluable in helping me navigate the waters here at the state Senate, and so I am certainly going to miss working with him, miss hearing his counsel.

"But other than talking about minimum wage and Senate strategies, Senator Taniguchi and I really haven't had much to talk about lately. All he wants to talk about is grandchildren and how great that is, and I have nothing to say back to him. (Oh, yeah, my two sons are still there—they heard that.) So, to you, Senator Taniguchi: thank you so much for all of your service. Thank you for your friendship over the past 40 years—I truly value that—and I, like Senator Wakai, really would like to echo the contributions you've made in the area of the arts and your advocacy for the archives, your advocacy for 'Iolani Palace and Bishop Estate, and the support you had from the Ways and Means chair and vice chair. Those appropriations are going to be enjoyed by future generations of this state, and thank you for making sure that they will be able to enjoy that."

Senator Taniguchi rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you, everybody. I guess, like Roz, I wasn't planning to say anything because I wasn't sure what was going to really happen, so I need to make a motion to adjourn Sine Die.

"I did want to acknowledge people who have come to visit in the gallery. I've had a lot of good staff people over the years, and I'm very appreciative of all the work that they've done on my behalf because I couldn't have done it without their hard work. I have a campaign committee—members up there—most of them, at least 35-plus years have been with me, campaigning every time I had to go out and sign-wave, which I enjoy just as much as Senator Nishihara. I also have my family: my son, my daughter, my son-in-law, my daughter-in-law, my grandson Roycen—they've had to put up with me a lot. I'm not there a lot of times. Luckily, when my son was playing baseball, I was the Ways and Means chair, so I would set my hearings so that I could go to his games, so I got to do that.

"But I guess the person I really wanted to thank and acknowledge is my wife, Jan. She's the one who went to the, I guess was to UH Admissions or something, and she picked up the application for the Law School Admission Test. She said, 'Why don't you fill this out?' and then she also went to the law school and picked up the application form for the Richardson School of Law. So she's been the one, along with all my campaigns, who's taken leadership, who's directed a lot of the things that we do, and so I'm very thankful to her for all the things she's done for me, and I blame her for all the things that I've become. She's been the one who really has been behind me, and I appreciate that.

"All of my colleagues who are here, also my compatriots in the House: it's been real enjoyable for me, especially this

year—we got a lot of stuff done, finally. All of you have contributed to my ability to get things done, and I appreciate it very much. I was very scared when you called on Senator Kim to make remarks for me, but she and Senator Ihara are going to be the old-timers now, and I'm sure you're going to seek their counsel, Senate President, in the future.

"You know, I'm leaving with a lot of mixed feelings and emotions. I'm going to miss the work and miss working with all of you. I do have that; I will miss that very much. Exchanging ideas, working with constituents, trying to resolve problems for our state—it's been important to me. Anyway, I'm going to miss that, so I appreciate that. Also want to acknowledge Senate President; he's always been good to me. He's backed me up all the way on a lot of things that I didn't think he would. He's been solid for me all the way, and I appreciate that very much. Anyway, just want to say thank you to all of you—trying to keep it really short, so I'll cut it off here. Thank you."

The Chair announced:

"For our guests in the gallery, we've come to the end of our agenda. Traditionally, the House and Senate check on each other and see where we're at in finishing and, when we can, we jointly sing 'Hawai'i Aloha.' So we are going to recess now, as it appears we may be ahead of the House, and see if the House would like to recess to sing 'Hawai'i Aloha' and, if we do that, upon its conclusion, we will come back. We will take one more motion to adjourn, and that will be it. So if you're here watching the session, you can feel free to leave. For those of you who are here for one of the members, if you'll patiently wait till we get back, then there'll be an opportunity to have some photographs taken when we return. So we'll walk over there quickly and see where the House is at, and then we will return to adjourn."

At 12:17 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:28 p.m.

Senator Fevella rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"I apologize, colleagues; I lost my place. I just wanted to close today, not only to acknowledge the sacrifices of my wife, Donnalee, and my daughter, Abigail, for allowing me to be here and serve our great community of 'Ewa Beach. I just want to thank Senate President, first of all, for his leadership; Vice President Senator Kidani; Senator Dela Cruz, Ways and Means chair; and Vice Chair Senator Keith-Agaran.

"When I got here, I said that I was going to work across the aisles and come here with a feeling of love and aloha, not knowing that we were going to be saying aloha to three of our colleagues today. I already said as much as I could say about the Honorable Senator Nishihara. I want to say something about Senator Baker. When I first came here, she tried to teach me in the most gentle way she could by telling me, 'What's the question? What's the question?' Oh, I had to learn quick when I showed up in Senator Baker's class—I mean, I'm sorry, her committee. I love her. Senator Baker, because you were patient with me, taught me, and allowed me to be me in your committees. I know I was new and still was learning. The scoldings were good because we learn. And I learned quickly in Senator Baker's committees. One of the most memorable moments for me was during Zoom meetings. I was trying to be here for all of my colleagues in every single committee and every single conference. It was during one special occasion—not one day, but two days, because I have it on recording. Senator Baker said that I was her favorite Republican senator. And I tell you, my heart was so big, so bright, I even went back, turned in my chair and said, 'Do you have this recording?' It meant a lot to me that my colleagues here, all of you, going

forward, that we can work together, reaching across the aisles with love and aloha.

"With Senator Taniguchi, I first reached out his staff—(looking at Senator Taniguchi's staff in the gallery) I love you all. When my wife and I came to the Senate, his office was one of the first (along with the Sergeant-at-Arms, too) to reach out to my office and really talked story with my wife, made her feel welcome. And then, when Christmastime, somehow, somewhere, I became the volunteer of being Santa Claus. I don't know how it came around; my wife was part of their Christmas planning committee. So I played Santa Claus. But that's where I met a lot of Senator Taniguchi and his staff. I thank him for hiring one of the best representatives that 'Ewa Beach ever had, and that's Paul Oshiro. I want to thank you for that. Paul Oshiro. 'Ewa Beach, baby.

"But, what I learned the most from him was on compromising and being willing to get something done. While I was so proud to stand next to him on this minimum wage bill, no matter what the opposition was, no matter what people were saying about us in the paper, I remain steadfast because my community needed this minimum wage increase. Sitting with him, talking to him, and he knows I didn't want to give in. But he said, we need to do this for the people of Hawai'i. And I agreed. Thank you for your leadership. Thank all of you for your leadership; thank you all, my colleagues, for your leadership. But most of all, Senator Taniguchi: four more years. Four more years. Love you all, God bless and Aloha."

The purpose of this bill is to have the University of Hawaii (UH) and the Hawaii Broadband and Digital Equity Office (BDEO) jointly convene a working group to determine an appropriate governance structure to implement, operate, and maintain broadband infrastructure in the State. For fiscal year 2022-2023, BDEO is appropriated \$360,000 to fund three full-time administrative positions, and UH is appropriated \$200,000,000 in federal moneys for planning and implementation of a statewide broadband initiative.

While the bill as a whole has merit, I object to the \$200,000,000 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023, funded through moneys from the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA), Pub. L. No. 117-2, to be used for planning and implementation of a statewide broadband initiative, designated in section 4 on page 6, line 19, of the bill. The appropriation of \$200,000,000 in ARPA funds to UH appears to be redundant with the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Funds (CSFRF) and Capital Projects Fund appropriation for the broadband initiative in the Department of Budget and Finance's budget. Further, because many of the requirements for the initiative will be capital improvements in nature, these funds will not count towards meeting UH's "maintenance of effort" (MOE) based on U.S. Department of Education guidelines for ARPA's Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief MOE compliance – higher education capital improvement funding is specifically ineligible.

The appropriation will also limit the Administration's ability to balance out fiscal year 2022-2023 appropriations and expenditures to ensure compliance with the MOE requirements.

Section 16 of Article III of the State Constitution provides that, "[e]xcept for items appropriated to be expended by the judicial and legislative branches, the governor may veto any specific item or items in any bill which appropriates money for specific purposes by striking out or reducing the same." Because of the foregoing objections, I have taken the following action pursuant to my line item veto authority:

Stricken out the \$200,000,000 appropriation made from ARPA moneys for fiscal year 2022-2023 in section 4 on page 6, line 19, of the bill, to be used by UH for planning and implementation of a statewide broadband initiative, and changed the amount to \$0.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 2076 with the appropriation made from ARPA moneys for fiscal year 2022-2023 totaling \$200,000,000 stricken from the bill.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 1600, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to the State Budget."

The purposes of this bill, the Supplemental Appropriations Act of 2022, are to adjust and request appropriations for the fiscal biennium 2021-2023 to fund the operations and capital improvement projects of the Executive Branch agencies and programs.

While the bill as a whole has merit, I object to the following appropriations for the reasons indicated:

Appropriations in this bill that are funded by the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund (CSFRF) of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA), Pub. L. No. 117-2, § 9901, 135 Stat. 4, 223 (2021) (American Rescue Plan funds), need to be reprioritized due to (1) an over appropriation of the American Rescue Plan funds; (2) additional funding needed by the Department of Education (DOE) and the University of Hawai'i (UH) to meet the federal Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund (ESSER Fund) Maintenance of Effort (MOE) proportional funding requirements; and (3) replacement

funding for the appropriations impacted by my veto of House Bill No. 1147.

The amount of American Rescue Plan funds appropriations made in this bill (twenty-two appropriations) and in Senate Bill No. 2076 during the 2022 regular session plus the American Rescue Plan funds appropriations made in various acts during the 2021 regular session, and American Rescue Plan funds allocations made by me pursuant to chapter 29, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and section 67 of the General Appropriations Act of 2021, Act 88, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, total \$1,746,037,985, an amount that exceeds the State's American Rescue Plan funds allocation of \$1,641,602,610 from the U.S. Department of the Treasury by \$104,435,375.

Under the federal ESSER Fund's MOE requirements pursuant to the ARPA, the State must maintain a proportional level of funding for the DOE and UH (calculated separately for each) for fiscal years 2021-2022 and 2022-2023 relative to the State's overall spending level for fiscal years 2021-2022 and 2022-2023 that is greater than or equal to the average of the State's proportional level of funding for the DOE and UH relative to the State's overall spending for the three prior fiscal years. Failure to meet the federal ESSER MOE requirements may have adverse consequences on the State's receipt of federal ESSER education moneys. In this instance, while the DOE received additional general funds for specific purposes, I understand that the DOE may not be able to fully expend these moneys in fiscal year 2022-2023 to meet its proportional percentage. Further, I understand that insufficient general funds were provided to the UH to meet its proportional percentage for fiscal year 2022-2023.

Additionally, with my veto of House Bill No. 1147 due to the violation of the prohibition against "gut and replace" actions during the legislative process, the vetoed American Rescue Plan funds will be used in part to provide funding for the Hawaii Tourism Authority and the Convention Center.

Based on the above, I object to the following American Rescue Plan funds appropriations in the bill:

1. The \$660,000 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for BED 100 - Strategic Marketing and Support, for office renovation expenses, designated in section 3, item A-1, on page 2, line 8, of the bill.

2. The \$50,000 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for BED 105 - Creative Industries Division, for Creative Labs on the Neighbor Islands, designated in section 3, item A-2, on page 2, line 18, of the bill.

3. The \$13,874,350 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for BED 150 - Hawaii Community Development Authority, for infrastructure upgrades for Kalaeloa, designated in section 3, item A-23, on page 7, line 22, of the bill.

4. The \$35,000,000 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by American Rescue Plan funds, for LBR 171 - Unemployment Insurance Program, for costs related to the Unemployment Insurance call center, designated in section 3, item B-2, on page 8, line 41, of the bill.

For the following two general fund appropriations, I object to the acquisition, upgrade, and operation of the Wahiawa Irrigation System and Lake Wilson reservoir without doing proper due diligence. A project of this nature is a major undertaking that poses significant legal, regulatory, and financial burdens for the State. As I understand neither the Department of Agriculture nor the Department of Land and Natural Resources has done any due diligence work that would be a prerequisite for undertaking a project such as this. Consequently, it is unclear if sufficient funding is provided to acquire the designated parcels; repair and expand the spillway to bring it in compliance with dam safety requirements; operate the dam and irrigation system; and operate and maintain the Lake Wilson reservoir area. Further, there is no clear framework as to the responsibilities of the Department of Agriculture, the Agribusiness Development Corporation, and the Department of Land and Natural Resources with respect to operating and maintaining the Wahiawa Irrigation System and Lake Wilson reservoir. For these reasons, I am reducing the appropriations to provide sufficient funding only for due diligence work such as a feasibility assessment study/preliminary design report, survey and planning, environmental impact statement preparation, and other due diligence costs.

Of the total \$29,616,732 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by general funds, for AGR 141 – Agricultural Resource Management, \$22,500,000 for the upgrade of the Wahiawa dam and spillway and purchase of fee simple lands, and \$500,000 for additional operational support and maintenance, totaling \$23,000,000, in section 3, item A-13, on page 4, line 36, of the bill and \$22,500,000 of the \$26,000,000 amount in the proviso in section 6.1 of Act 88, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, as added by section 4(1) on page 64, line 3, to page 65, line 2, of this bill.

2. The \$800,000 appropriation of the total \$3,811,324 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by general funds, for AGR 161 – Agribusiness Development and Research, for irrigation management, designated in section 3, item A-14, on page 5, line 10, of the bill.

For the following general fund appropriation, I object to the expenditure of moneys to the Hawaii Emergency Management Agency for infrastructure, construction, design, equipment, and site plans for the First Responder Technology Campus. I understand that planning and permitting for the Campus is still in its initial stages. Further, a master plan must be prepared in order to subdivide the Campus to make possible participation

and development of the facilities by non-State agencies. It appears highly unlikely that these steps can be completed before funding for the project lapses on June 30, 2024. Additionally, it is unclear why development funding for the Campus is being provided to the Hawaii Emergency Management Agency as it is a potential occupant of the Campus, not the agency responsible for developing the Campus.

1. The \$35,000,000 appropriation of the total \$51,680,292 appropriation for fiscal year 2022-2023 funded by general funds, for DEF 118 – Hawaii Emergency Management Agency, for infrastructure, construction, design, equipment, and site plans for the First Responder Technology Campus, designated in section 3, item I-24, on page 51, line 20, of this bill and described in the proviso in section 18.3 of Act 88, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, as added by section 4(23) on page 81, line 14, to page 82, line 3, of this bill.

For the following general obligation bond fund appropriation, I object to the expenditure of moneys to the Hawaii Technology Development Corporation (HTDC) for plans, design, and land acquisition for the First Responder Technology Campus and Cybersecurity Data Center, Oahu. For the reasons noted above, I believe that additional land acquisition for the Campus is premature. According to the draft environmental impact statement prepared for the Campus, development is planned to take place in six phases over the next fifteen years. The initial phase, which is programmed for fiscal year 2023-2025, is estimated to cost \$100,000,000-\$150,000,000 and will involve construction of a roadway into the existing Campus property along with drainage and utilities in preparation for the full Campus buildout in subsequent phases. Additionally, it is unclear why the HTDC is acquiring a parcel of land classified as conservation.

We note that this amendment does not fall outside the scope of the subject of the bill as expressed by its title, "Relating to the State Budget." However, this amendment fundamentally changes the original bill's general purpose, which was to appropriate moneys for capital improvement projects.

The existing maximum lease term incentivizes established farmers to expand their operations to larger properties and supports the growth of new farmers by making affordable lots available for lease. There are currently 243 interested farmers seeking to lease the State's limited agricultural park lands. The lease extension provided by this bill could potentially allow current lessees to remain on the land indefinitely through unlimited extensions in thirty-year increments, precluding others from having a fair opportunity to seek and enjoy this public benefit.

The purpose of this bill is to amend the procedure by which the Governor selects and appoints the representative of labor on the Hawaii Labor Relations Board (HLRB), which is composed of three members who represent management, labor, and the public. Section 89-5(b)(2), Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), currently allows the Governor to appoint the labor representative from a list of three nominees submitted by mutual agreement from a majority of the exclusive representatives of the collective bargaining units.

This bill amends section 89-5(b)(2), HRS, to require the Governor to appoint the single nominee selected by a simple majority of the exclusive representatives of the collective bargaining units as the representative of labor on the HLRB. The bill also provides that if the Governor fails to appoint the person within twenty days after the exclusive representatives submit the name of the person to the Governor, then the exclusive representatives shall transmit the person’s name directly to the Senate for confirmation.

This bill is objectionable because it is silent on whether or not the confirmation by the Senate effectuates an appointment without any further action by the Governor, creating ambiguity in the appointment process.

This bill is also objectionable because of the cost of a potential special session. This bill is silent on what would happen if a vacancy in the position of the representative of labor occurs when the Senate is not in session. For this provision to be implemented when the Legislature is not in session, when the exclusive representatives submit to the Governor their single nominee, the Governor either would have to convene a special session of the Senate or would have to make an interim appointment of the representative of labor pursuant to Section 6 of Article V of the Hawaii Constitution and submit that person’s name for confirmation during the next session of the Senate.

Furthermore, this bill is objectionable because it diminishes the Governor’s authority to select the labor representative to the HLRB by requiring the Governor to appoint the single nominee selected by the exclusive representative of the collective bargaining units instead of from a list of three nominees.

The purpose of this bill is to permit the State’s Medicaid managed care and fee-for-services programs, health insurers, mutual benefit societies, and health maintenance organizations to cover telephonic behavioral health services when: (1) telehealth services are technologically unavailable at the time the patient is scheduled to receive a behavioral health service; (2) the behavioral health service is a medically necessary covered health care service; and (3) the health care provider has provided the patient with an in-person behavioral health service within the twelve months preceding the telephone service. Also, the bill clarifies that telephonic services do not constitute telehealth.

This bill is objectionable because there is a potential for a negative impact on the well-being of individuals who need behavioral health services. Although the bill clarifies when telephonic services may be covered, and provides guidance to health insurance providers, the final bill may be interpreted to strictly limit insurance coverage for telephonic services. Specifically, health insurance providers may use the provision to restrict or exclude coverage of telephonic services unless the service meets the three criteria listed in the bill, whereas the current law does not have a restriction. This bill would then have the unintended consequence of restricting access to necessary behavioral health services, inconsistent with the goal of promoting continued broad access to behavioral health services for individuals in remote areas, or individuals without access to technology. Vetoing this bill will allow for additional discussion and clarification on a bill in the next session that would align with expanding access to behavioral health services, with a workable framework for health insurance providers.

The purposes of this bill are to expand the investigative powers and responsibilities of the Department of Human

Services (DHS) Child Welfare Services Branch to include inspection of families who have adopted or taken guardianship of former foster children, establish a Malama Ohana working group to recommend transformative changes to the child welfare system, and appropriate funds for contracted services to support and monitor families receiving permanency assistance for former foster children.

This bill is objectionable because it seeks to monitor and investigate families that have adopted or taken guardianship of former foster children and who receive permanency assistance for that child, in ways that would violate the Constitutional rights of those families. The monitoring would include unlimited investigations of these families if at any time there had been a complaint filed with DHS about that family, without regard to the merits of the complaint, and regardless of whether or not the complaint was ever substantiated. These investigations would be allowed for the length of the child's minority, even when the Family Court found the legal relationship to be in the best interests of the child and approved the adoption or other permanent legal relationship between the child and the family. The objection is that this bill will expand the State's duties to monitor and interfere with permanent family relationships in a way that will violate the Constitutional rights of those families, without any evidence of harm or threatened harm to the child that is in the family. It would allow overreach by the State to interfere with safe, stable families, and allow the DHS to monitor and surveil families that have adopted or taken guardianship of former foster children, so that the families can never live free of government intrusion in their lives, a right which all other families take for granted.

Although the trauma experienced by the community over the loss of a former foster child is real and cannot be dismissed, the solution cannot and should not violate the constitutional privacy rights and basic dignity of every family that has taken in and provided love and stability to a former foster child. For example, the expanded authority to DHS could be used by a child's abusive biological parent to initiate unwarranted and repeated investigations of the child's new family, in an effort to disrupt the child's adoptive home, thereby preventing the child from ever feeling safe and stable in their new home.

In addition, the amendment of the bill in conference committee, without the opportunity to obtain public input, by adding a large, well-funded working group to recommend transformative changes to the child welfare system is subject to challenge. The working group would have twenty-one members and be co-chaired by two identified members who are vendors that contract with DHS to provide services to DHS clients. Another twelve members would be members of or be designated by one of these co-chairs. One co-chair would be the executive director of Effective Planning and Innovative Communications, Inc. (EPIC 'Ohana) or their designee. The other co-chair would be the executive Officer of Hale Kipa, Inc., or their designee. Both EPIC 'Ohana and Hale Kipa, Inc. are vendors that contract with DHS to provide services to DHS clients.

Four members of the working group would be members of "Na Kama a Haloa", which is a program or project of EPIC 'Ohana. Eight members of the working group are meant to represent different constituencies of the Child Welfare Services branch including foster youth, birth parents, and resource caregivers. All eight of those members would be identified by Na Kama a Haloa. In total, thirteen of twenty-one members of the working group would include five members who are part of Epic 'Ohana, including a co-chair, and an additional eight members who are identified by Epic 'Ohana or its associated program, Na Kama a Haloa.

Having two-thirds of the working group comprised of contracted vendors or their designees is especially problematic

because the bill specifically exempts the members of the working group from chapter 84, HRS. Chapter 84, HRS, creates standards of conduct that are normally in place to prevent conflicts of interest and promote public transparency and accountability. This means that the majority of the working group, who will be making recommendations about the services DHS provides to its clients will have a current financial interest in the provision of those services, and will be exempted from the ethics standards that prohibit financial conflicts of interest.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 2424 without my approval.

The purpose of this bill is to create stronger economic incentives for new taro farmers, improve the livelihoods of existing taro farmers, and reduce the cost of poi for local residents.

This bill is objectionable because it is not an effective way to achieve the bill's purpose of helping taro farmers by lowering cultivation and production costs through the proposed exemption as a way to reduce the cost of poi for local consumers. The bill's exemption would not apply to "bulk buyers or shippers of raw or value-added taro products, supermarkets, or big box stores" (see bill at page 5, lines 10-12). This was apparently to limit the exemption to taro farmers in the cultivation and production of unprocessed taro, and not to allow retailers and wholesalers to claim the exemption on retail sales of poi and taro products. However, the wording of the bill will still allow certain retail sellers such as drug stores, convenience stores, and restaurants to also claim the exemption from a general excise tax (GET). The exemption will give these retailers a commercial advantage over supermarkets and big box stores that are not entitled to claim the exemption. A more effective way to help taro farmers and avoid the unintended tax benefit to just certain retailers, would be through the provision of direct grants to taro farmers as opposed to the GET exemption in this bill.

Section 39A-317, which is in part X of chapter 39A, provides that "no authorization shall be made for a period exceeding five years of its enactment." This bill attempts to extend the bond authorization lapse date beyond five years in violation of section 39A-317, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

This bill is objectionable because while the bill's purpose to protect the consumers' privacy and confidentiality is admirable, the enforcement mechanism provided in the bill appears to be problematic. Specifically, the bill requires the Office of Consumer Protection (OCP) to bring actions to enforce violations through the Attorney General, thereby depriving OCP of its independent authority under section 487-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), to initiate actions for the violation of laws enacted for the purpose of consumer protection. In addition, it is not clear whether a consumer would retain the right to file a claim for an unfair and deceptive trade practice under chapter 480, HRS, for a violation of the prohibitions or requirements set forth in the bill. The lack of clarity may inadvertently and undesirably deter consumers from filing their own claims against direct-to-consumer genetic testing companies under chapter 480, HRS.

This bill is objectionable because it imposes a new admissions requirement on the University of Hawaii (UH), which will be applicable to all campuses. As written, this bill would require that applicants for admission have successfully completed a world language, fine arts, career and technical education, or computer science class. This requirement would effectively preclude many adults from entering the UH Community College system. Approximately one-third of all community college applicants are over the age of 25 and would not have met the proposed admissions requirement. In addition, UH's Community Colleges work hard to provide opportunities to those who did not complete high school. The new admissions requirement set forth in this bill would create a barrier to public higher education that could impact thousands of potential adult learners.

Furthermore, this bill diminishes the power of the Board of Education (BOE) to formulate statewide educational policy, as established by Section 3 of Article X of the Hawai'i Constitution. The BOE already has a policy regarding high school graduation requirements; under the constitution, any revisions to those requirements should be made by the BOE, and not by the Legislature.

The purpose of this bill is to amend section 11-118.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to provide that a constitutional ratification question printed on a ballot must be "simple, concise, and direct to the extent practicable." This bill also amends section 602-5(a), Hawaii Revised Statutes, to authorize the Hawai'i Supreme Court to issue, upon a written request by the Senate President and/or the Speaker of the House of Representatives, a written opinion (1) stating whether a proposed constitutional amendment and the corresponding constitutional ratification question are "simple, concise, and direct to the extent practicable" and (2) if they are not, providing a detailed and specific explanation of the reasons for the court's conclusion. The Supreme Court is to respond within fifteen days of the date of the written request and its opinion shall not be appealable.

This bill is objectionable because it raises a separation of powers issue with respect to the Legislature and the Judiciary. See *Schwab v. Ariyoshi*, 58 Haw. 25, 564 P.2d 135 (1977) (the doctrine of separation of powers prohibits any branch of government from unduly interfering with the constitutional functions of the other branches). Also, this bill is objectionable because it authorizes the presiding officers of the Legislature to request that the Hawaii Supreme Court issue an improper advisory opinion (1) stating whether a proposed constitutional amendment and the corresponding constitutional ratification question are "simple, concise, and direct to the extent practicable" and (2) if they are not, providing a detailed explanation of the reasons for the court's conclusion. Advisory opinions generally do not have a detailed factual record or the benefit of prior legal analysis or advocacy from adverse interests regarding the issues that a proposed constitutional amendment often presents. Further, insofar as this bill requires that the Supreme Court respond to the Legislature within fifteen days of the Legislature's written request, it does not afford the Supreme Court with reasonable time to fully consider and research a proposed amendment and issue its opinion, which will not be appealable.

The purposes of this bill are to diversify the State's renewable energy profile and reduce the State's reliance on fossil fuels by requiring (1) the Office of Planning and Sustainable Development (OPSD) to update the state energy plan; and (2) to amend the economy and energy plans in the Hawaii State Planning Act to, among other things, require a minimum of 33.33 percent of renewable energy to be generated by firm renewable generation on each island, and to limit the percentage of any one type of renewable energy source to 45 percent of all generation for each island, except for geothermal energy. The bill provides that the percentages may be updated by concurrent resolution.

This bill is objectionable because without robust factual support or comprehensive cost analysis it prematurely establishes arbitrary percentages that will render at least the County of Kauai out of compliance due to that county's advancements in promoting solar energy. Fixing numerical limits that do not consider the different circumstances on each island is problematic. The bill also pits different renewable technologies against each other based upon a dichotomy between firm and intermittent energy sources that is becoming obsolete. As a result, it imposes additional regulatory obstacles that may impede opportunities to find a more cost-effective mix of renewable technologies or to develop new innovative technologies that do not fall within the definition of firm power. The attached "Summary: Estimated current compliance with the requirements of SB2510, by island" summarizes some of my concerns.*

Additionally, the bill appears to supersede a Public Utility Commission's stakeholder-based process to update energy-efficiency portfolio standard framework, which has been in effect since 2012, in favor of a new process with OPSD as the single decision-maker and an appeal to the Governor's Office. In addition, the bill misuses chapter 226, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), which function is to establish state goals and objectives, in an effort to create a regulatory scheme that would be more appropriately created through chapter 269, HRS, which currently provides a statutory framework for renewable portfolio standards.

Further, Section 14 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i states in relevant part: "[n]o law shall be passed except by bill." An amendment to statutory provisions is a law that requires the passage of a bill. Accordingly, an attempt to amend provisions in the bill by adoption of a concurrent resolution would likely be found legally invalid for not meeting the requirement under Section 14 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i.

The purposes of this bill are to expand the Renewable Energy Technologies Income Tax Credit (RETITC) to include new categories of renewable energy technology systems that are eligible for the RETITC and to impose caps on the amount of credit that may be claimed by a taxpayer and the total amount of tax credits for certain renewable energy technology systems that may be claimed in a taxable year. The bill would apply to taxable years after December 31, 2021.

This bill is objectionable for several reasons. First, this bill has a significant administrative flaw in that it creates an aggregate \$20 million cap without designating a certifying agency to ensure that the aggregate cap is not exceeded. Further, the bill requires tax credits to be prorated if the cap is exceeded, but because the tax credits are processed when received, taxpayer's claims for credit after the cap is exceeded will have to be denied, prorated, or adjusted due to the aggregate cap having been exceeded, and those taxpayers may incur a tax liability with penalties and interest. The uncertainty about whether a credit will actually be available when claimed could have a chilling effect on the willingness of the public to install new renewable energy systems. Second, while the measure attempts to define what a "system" is for purposes of calculating the credit, the Department of Taxation has indicated a problem with calculating the allowable credit for "storage systems" because it is to be calculated based on output as opposed to storage capacity. Finally, even though the bill's intention appears to incentivize installation of firm renewable energy systems and long-duration renewable energy storage systems, it retroactively applies to the entire tax year of 2022. As a result, the bill would allow a taxpayer who already installed a renewable energy technology system before the enactment of this bill to also receive the tax credit, thus failing to incentivize installation of additional systems.

This bill is objectionable because data collected by DHHL indicate that less than one-half of one percent of pastoral and agricultural homestead applications, and less than four percent of residential homestead applications, were submitted by beneficiaries who previously held a lease, and the majority of those were made to a family member without remuneration. Only a small number of applicants had transferred their lease for a fee or other personal gain and then applied for a subsequent lease. The bill therefore would not have an appreciable impact on other waiting list applicants' ability to receive homestead lease awards. The additional restrictions imposed by this bill could have unintended consequences for other beneficiaries. Further, DHHL's administrative rules already prioritize for new lease awards, those applicants who have not previously held homestead leases.

The purposes of this bill are to require the employer to initiate negotiations on repricing of classes within a bargaining unit within thirty days of the employer's receipt of the exclusive representative's written request to negotiate and to establish that an employer's failure to initiate the requested negotiations within such time frame or the parties' failure to reach an agreement within ninety days of the exclusive representative's written request to negotiate or by January 31 of a year in which the collective bargaining agreement is due to expire, whichever is earlier, constitutes an impasse to which the impasse

procedures in section 89-11, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), shall apply.

This bill is objectionable because it creates a very short timeline within which to negotiate and agree on repricing. Because repricing is a highly technical and often contentious matter, this bill may result in inability to reach agreement within the new timelines, thus necessitating a resolution of an impasse by an arbitration panel. Mandating unresolved repricing requests to the impasse procedures would jeopardize an employer's ability to create and maintain a pay structure and pay relationships that are equitable for all classes of work by evaluating jobs based on a consistent set of criteria. If multiple arbitration panels make repricing determinations, there will no longer be a consistent application of repricing criteria.

This bill undermines the current classification and pricing system, eliminates the employer's discretion in repricing matters, and will lead to costly arbitration. An arbitration panel, which might lack the necessary repricing expertise, could render a decision that could impact not only the classes of work for which negotiations had been demanded, but could also impact other related classes of work, thereby significantly altering and potentially weakening the current system of job evaluation and pricing relationships.

The existing negotiated repricing process already provides the unions with the opportunity to submit negotiated repricing requests, and they can also choose to submit these requests to arbitration in accordance with section 89-11, HRS, in its current form without this bill.

Additionally, while current impasse procedures under chapter 89, HRS, are lengthy, expensive, and unpredictable, they only occur every few years. Such would not be the case with this bill.

Finally, the bill is not clear on when the repricing requests may be submitted, or who would pay any additional arbitrator's fees.

proven expertise in as many of the following fields as possible, including education, workforce development, critical industries to the State, emerging fields, energy, advanced manufacturing, health care, business, technology, entrepreneurship, real estate, finance, or organizational management[;]" and (2) clarify that the understanding of best practices, one of the existing minimum qualifications, should come through "organizations such as the National Association of State Boards of Education or similar organizations[.]"

This bill is objectionable because it poses a threat of corporatizing public education, undermining deeper public educational goals, and devaluing professional expertise in education and childhood development. Industry-track academies and Career and Technical Education programs are already present and thriving in our public schools, due to collaboration between educators and the private sector. These programs demonstrate that workforce development does not require changing the professional composition of the Board of Education (BOE). Section 3 of article X of the Hawaii Constitution provides, in pertinent part, that the BOE "shall have the power, as provided by law, to formulate statewide educational policy[.]" Decisions about Hawaii's education system should be made by professionals with experience and expertise in developing life-long learners. I believe that diversifying the BOE is important in creating a statewide school governance structure, but the diversity of backgrounds in this bill is unbalanced and does not include other important backgrounds such as culture, arts, international education, parents, and even student representation. Additionally, experts in the private sector fields referenced in this bill may not have the experience and expertise needed to make nuanced policy decisions around standards, curriculum-development, and teacher training.

Furthermore, this bill undermines the autonomy and decision-making power of this office. The bill requires the BOE to collectively have knowledge, experience, and proven expertise for thirteen areas, where only eleven positions are available. Education is only one of the thirteen areas listed in the bill; the other twelve areas of expertise are corporate-focused and unrelated to the oversight of a statewide public education system. Compliance with this bill would virtually guarantee that educational experts will be far outnumbered in the BOE's composition and could be excluded from consideration for appointment altogether.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 2824 without my approval.

It requires the Department of Agriculture (Department) to: (1) create a statewide soil health assessment; (2) provide farmers with education and technical assistance; (3) establish standards that apply to the Program; and (4) subject to available funding, issue financial incentives to implement farm management practices.

This bill is objectionable because the Department does not possess the elements of a science-based soil management and education program. The bill does not provide the resources or guidance to create what would amount to a new division within the Department. Senate Bill No. 2056, which this Legislature passed in the 2022 Legislative Session, and which I enacted as Act 189, requires the Office of Planning and Sustainable Development, along with the Department, to undertake a soil classification study for the future regulation of agricultural lands. That study should be completed before a bill such as this is enacted. In addition, improving the capacity of existing programs such as the Greenhouse Gas Sequestration Task Force, which was established by Act 15, Session Laws of Hawaii 2018, and the initiation of the Hawaii Carbon Smart Land Management Assistance Pilot program in Senate Bill No. 3325, which this Legislature also passed this session, and which I enacted as Act 185, will lead to better outcomes.

The purpose of this bill is to amend chapter 127A, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), to: (1) clarify that powers granted for emergency purposes shall not be construed as permitting actions inconsistent with the State Constitution; (2) provide for greater clarity and specificity regarding the scope of suspensions of law; (3) require that Hawaii's emergency management system include coordination between state and county emergency management functions, where appropriate; (4) add the definition of the term "severe warning" in section 127A-30, HRS; (5) authorize the Legislature, by an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, to terminate a state of emergency, in part or in whole, declared by the Governor, but to also authorize the Governor to re-declare the existence of a state of emergency that has been terminated;

and (6) clarify the legal framework governing the extension and termination of emergency periods.

This bill is objectionable because a premature termination of a state of emergency will create an impossible situation where county mayors will have to rely on their limited emergency powers to respond to an emergency without State assistance. This latter situation, if allowed, could jeopardize federal assistance, which generally requires the State to provide assistance before counties receive federal assistance. Additionally, because the county mayors lack the authority to suspend state laws, their emergency responses during a local state of emergency are still confined by state laws, including the laws that regulate driver's license expiration dates and gun registration deadlines. A gubernatorial state of emergency needs to be in place to suspend state laws that may affect counties' ability to effectively respond to emergencies. A premature termination of a state of emergency may significantly impede counties' emergency management capabilities.

The authority given to the Legislature in the bill to terminate a state of emergency would severely interfere with the Governor's duties and legal obligations to provide for the public health, safety, and welfare by limiting the Governor's ability to determine the duration of a state of emergency or disaster within the State if the circumstances giving rise to the state of emergency continue.

The purposes of this bill are to (1) require any electronic audio or visual recording of a board meeting to be maintained indefinitely as a public record on the board's website or an appropriate State or county website, even if written minutes of the meeting are posted; (2) require that the written minutes contain time stamps linked to the recording, if the meeting was recorded; and (3) repeal the option for boards to provide recordings with accompanying written summaries with time stamps in lieu of written minutes.

This bill is objectionable because it ultimately reduces public access to timely information regarding board actions by eliminating the incentive, under current law, for boards to record their meetings. Under current law, if a board records its meeting, it has the option to post the recording together with a document summarizing the meeting discussions and containing time-stamps for each discussion item, or the board can prepare

and post written minutes. If the board records the meeting to aid in the preparation of written minutes, the board is not required to retain the recording once the written minutes are posted.

Recordings consume considerable data storage space and most boards share a limited amount of data storage space on their department's website. This bill would require a board to maintain the recordings indefinitely, make the recordings publicly available on the board's website, and would also require the board to prepare and post written minutes containing time stamps linked to the recordings. The new requirements under this bill would discourage rather than incentivize boards to record their meetings. The unintended result of this bill would be delays in posting of written minutes, particularly for boards with a small staff or for boards with no staff and only volunteers.

Finally, this bill is an unfunded mandate as it will result in increased personnel costs to comply with the new requirements, increased data storage and website configuration expenses to store all the recordings indefinitely, and the potential for increased litigation expenses relating to the indefinite period of the recording retention requirement as well as accessibility claims under the Americans with Disabilities Act about the format of the recordings posted on State websites. These anticipated increased agency costs were not funded in this bill.

This bill has an effective date of January 1, 2023; provided that, if this bill becomes an act, on December 31, 2027, the act shall be repealed and section 237-23, Hawaii Revised Statutes, shall be reenacted in its previous form.

This bill is objectionable because it may lead to undesirable consequences that go beyond the intended purpose of the bill, which is solely to exempt certain nonprofit organization fundraising income from the general excise tax (GET). The Department of Taxation notes that the bill will have the unintended consequence of making certain types of income currently exempt from the GET, such as passive income, subject

to tax. Thus, enacting this bill would negatively impact the general public, public entities, and nonprofit organizations.

Moreover, the Department of Taxation estimates that this measure will result in a general fund decrease of \$1,400,000 in fiscal year 2022-2023; \$3,500,000 in fiscal year 2023-2024; \$3,600,000 in fiscal year 2024-2025; \$3,600,000 in fiscal year 2025-2026; \$3,700,000 in fiscal year 2026-2027; and \$3,800,000 in fiscal year 2027-2028.

This bill is objectionable because it will have a significant adverse impact upon government agency operations. The full waiver of search, review and segregation fees for virtually all records requests acts as a disincentive for records requesters to narrow the scope of their requests, thus resulting in the consequential increase in overbroad requests. Agencies, the majority of whom do not have dedicated personnel responding to records requests, will be vulnerable to UIPA lawsuits, which will increase costs to government agencies through awards of attorneys' fees and costs to plaintiffs filing those lawsuits. As a result, agencies may be forced to prioritize responding to records requests over the agencies' primary functions. Eleven government agencies testified with concerns or in opposition to this bill due to the adverse effects of the waiver of search/review and segregation fees upon agencies.

Furthermore, there is no funding allocated to lead these working groups, support their work, and produce annual reports to the Hawaii Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation Commission. Neither the Department of Transportation nor the Hawaii State Energy Office has the additional resources to support these working groups. Implementation of this bill will have a negative fiscal impact on these agencies.

The bill does not contain any standards and the Hawaii Wing - Civil Air Patrol is ineligible for a grant under the standards for grants made to private organizations by the Legislature in chapter 42F, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), as there is no record of the Hawaii Wing - Civil Air Patrol having applied to the Legislature for a grant, and it is not incorporated under the laws of the State. Even if the Legislature intended for the Department of Defense to procure the services by contract, it does not appear that any exception to the requirements of chapter 103D, HRS, exist under these circumstances.

**RULES OF THE SENATE
OF THE
THIRTIETH LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII**

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PREAMBLE

The members of the Senate do hereby reaffirm the Senate's dedication to upholding the Constitutions of the United States and the State of Hawai'i, to providing for openness and fairness in all of its proceedings, and to promoting collaboration and consultation in its committee work.

The Senate stands as a people-oriented institution that serves all of the people, whatever their background or persuasion. The Senate works for the public good and strives to give every person an equal opportunity to realize his or her highest potential. The Senate's organized debate and deliberative consideration of issues shall be open to the public.

**RULES OF THE SENATE
OF THE
THIRTIETH LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAI'I**

The following Rules shall be the Rules of the Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i.

PART I. ORGANIZATION, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES**Rule 1 Organization.**

(1) When the Senate convenes in the first Regular Session of each Legislature, the member from the First Senatorial District shall act as temporary chair, call the Senate to order, appoint a temporary Clerk and a Committee of three whose duty it shall be to immediately examine the credentials of the members-elect of the Senate. If, from the report of the Committee, it shall appear that a majority of the credentials are in order, the temporary Clerk shall call the roll.

(2) The temporary Chair shall then appoint a Committee of three to wait upon a justice of the Supreme Court, an Intermediate Appellate Court Judge or a Circuit Court judge to administer the oath of office required by the Hawai'i State Constitution. After the oath has been duly administered, the Senate shall organize.

(3) When the Senate convenes in any succeeding Sessions of the Legislature, the President or the Vice-President, in the absence of the President, shall call the Senate to order.

Rule 2 Officers and Employees.

(1) The officers of the Senate shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Sergeant-at-Arms, and Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms, each of whom shall be elected by a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) The President and Vice-President shall hold their respective offices in accordance with Title 3, Hawai'i Revised Statutes. Other officers and employees shall hold their respective offices and positions at the pleasure of the Senate, but a majority vote of the members of the Senate shall be required to terminate the office held by any officer of the Senate.

(3) The Senate, by a majority vote, may authorize positions from time to time as may be deemed necessary.

Rule 3 The President.

It shall be the duty of the President:

- (1) To open the meetings of the Senate by taking the Chair.
- (2) When a quorum is present, to call for the reading of the Journal of the preceding day.
- (3) To maintain order in the Senate Chamber and to require proper decorum on the part of the members.
- (4) To announce the business before the Senate in the order prescribed by the Rules.
- (5) To receive and submit all matters properly brought before the Senate by the members, call for votes upon the same and announce the results.
- (6) To receive all communications, including but not limited to, Governor's messages, budget messages, and Judiciary communications, present them to the Senate and, unless otherwise provided in these Rules, refer these and other matters to the appropriate standing committees.
- (7) To appoint all members of committees unless otherwise determined by the Senate.
- (8) To authenticate by signature, all acts and doings of the Senate which require authentication.
- (9) To make known rules of order when so requested and, subject to an appeal to the Senate, to decide all questions of order.
- (10) To issue warrants and when so directed by the Senate, to carry into effect its orders in the arrest of offenders, the issuance of subpoenas requiring the attendance of witnesses and subpoenas duces tecum requiring the production of books, documents, or other evidence, in any manner pending before the Senate, or committee, as the case may be, or other orders of the Senate.
- (11) To decide and announce the result of any vote taken.

- (12) To do and perform such other duties as are required by law or by these rules or such as may properly pertain to such office.
- (13) To clear the Senate Chamber of all persons, except its members and designated persons if there is a disturbance or disorderly conduct, or on motion duly adopted.
- (14) To control and have direction of the rooms, desks, passages, stairways, corridors, and balconies, in and about the building set apart for the use of the Senate, and all public property of the Senate. The President shall see that all officers of the Senate perform their respective duties, and may assign places to visitors and reporters. The President may admit stenographers or other reporters, wishing to take down the debates, and assign them such places to effect their object as shall not interfere with the convenience of the Senate.
- (15) To establish final dates for action on legislation, including, though not limited to the final date for introducing bills, the dates for the mandatory recess pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Hawai'i State Constitution, the final date for third reading of Senate Bills, the final date for third reading of House Bills, the final date for approving Conference Committee agreements and drafts of bills, the final date for final reading of the General Appropriations Bill, and the final date for final reading of the Supplemental Appropriations Bill. The President shall coordinate the date for introducing bills and may coordinate with the Speaker of the House to establish the other final dates.
- (16) To mediate and resolve differences between two or more standing committees on the same bill.
- (17) To administer oaths to elected officers of the Senate who are not Senators and to witnesses who are compelled to testify under oath before the Senate or a committee thereof; provided that the President may appoint a designee to administer oaths as the President deems necessary.
- (18) To disperse information to all members relating to the President's nominations and appointments to boards and commissions on a monthly basis.

Rule 4 The Vice-President.

- (1) The Vice-President and the President shall prepare and administer a budget for the Senate.
- (2) Except as otherwise provided in the Senate Rules, the President and Vice-President shall oversee permanent support staff of the Senate who are not directly employed or supervised by an individual Senator.
- (3) In the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall exercise all the duties and powers of the President.

Rule 5 President Pro Tempore.

- (1) In case the President and Vice-President shall be absent at the hour to which the Senate had adjourned, the member of the majority party having the longest tenure in the Senate shall preside until a President pro tempore is chosen. If two or more members are equally qualified to preside, the eldest qualified member shall preside.
- (2) The President pro tempore shall be invested with all of the powers and shall perform all the duties of the President. Whenever the President pro tempore is required to sign a bill or other instrument, the Clerk shall attach to such bill or instrument a certificate stating that such President pro tempore was duly elected and is authorized to so sign.

Rule 6 The Clerk.

It shall be the duty of the Clerk:

- (1) To have charge of all records of the Senate and be responsible for the same. At no time shall the Clerk permit original documents to be withdrawn from the Clerk's keeping unless ordered by the Senate.
- (2) To make a concise and complete memorandum of all petitions, motions, resolutions, amendments and other matters brought before the Senate. Such memoranda shall state the nature of the matter and the name of the introducer, and the date and day of the session on which the Senate considered the matter. The memoranda, together with other matters ordered to be placed therein, shall constitute the Journal, a copy of which shall be made available for inspection to any member upon request as soon as practicable. The Journal of each day shall be read the following day. When such Journal is approved by vote of the Senate, it shall be entered by the Clerk in a book entitled "Journal of the Senate. Session of . ." (Giving the Year).
- (3) Unless otherwise directed by the Senate, to read all bills, resolutions and other matters (if so required) to the Senate.
- (4) To forward at once all letters, messages, communications and other matters to the proper parties.
- (5) To immediately deliver to the Chair of the appropriate committee all petitions, resolutions, bills or other matters duly referred to such committee.
- (6) To see that all bills and resolutions are properly engrossed and are correct and true as finally acted upon by the Senate.
- (7) To draw on the state general fund for expenses of the session as shall be authorized by the Senate and approved by the President.
- (8) To pay all bills and accounts as shall be approved by the President or the President's designees, or ordered by the Senate, and no others.
- (9) To be responsible for the acquisition and distribution of all of the property of the Senate.
- (10) To note all questions of order with the decision thereon, collect the same, and append them to the Senate Journal at the close of the session.

(11) To perform all other clerical duties and functions pertaining to the Office of the Clerk and as the Senate from time to time shall direct. The Clerk shall post the order of business in writing in a conspicuous place each day.

Rule 7 Assistant Clerk.

The Assistant Clerk shall assist the Clerk in the performance of all duties and attend to such other duties as may be required when so directed by the Senate. In the absence of the Clerk, the Assistant Clerk shall perform all duties of the Clerk.

Rule 8 Sergeant-at-Arms.

It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to attend the Senate on every day of meeting; to maintain order among those present as spectators; to give notice to the Presiding Officer of the attendance of any person with communications or otherwise; to supervise the distribution of incidentals which require distribution among the members; to supervise, subject to the control of the President, the Senate Messengers; to attend upon committees if so requested; to serve all orders or process as directed by the President or Senate; to make all required arrests of members or other persons, and to retain the same in custody; to have the charge and responsibility for the postal requirements of the Senate; to refurbish furniture; to oversee and conduct office and building maintenance; and generally to execute all of the requirements of and be answerable to the President of the Senate.

Rule 9 Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms.

The Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms shall assist the Sergeant-at-Arms in the performance of all duties and attend to such duties as may be required when so directed by the President. In the absence of the Sergeant-at-Arms, the Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms shall perform all duties of the Sergeant-at-Arms.

Rule 10 Responsibilities of Officers and Employees.

The employees of the Senate shall perform such duties as may be assigned by the President or prescribed by the Senate.

All officers and employees of the Senate shall be directly answerable to the President and, upon the President's consultation with the Vice President, shall perform all the President's orders and directions, subject to revision by the Senate and to confidentiality guided by standards of professional conduct. Employees under the supervision of a Senate member shall be directly answerable to the Senate member.

An oath of office shall be administered to each officer by the President.

Rule 11 Majority and Minority Party Organization and Staff.

(1) Members of the majority and minority parties may adopt rules of procedure and administration for their respective caucuses. The rules shall not be inconsistent with the Rules of the Senate, and any such rule of procedure for the caucus shall not be enforceable on the floor of the Senate.

(2) The establishment and staffing of the majority and minority staff offices shall be subject to budgetary constraints in the budget for the Senate that is prepared and administered under Rule 4.

Rule 12 Pay of Members, Officers and Employees.

(1) Each member of the Senate, upon being elected or appointed to office, shall receive as compensation such salary as prescribed pursuant to Article III, Section 9, of the Hawai'i State Constitution.

(2) The officers, except the President and Vice-President, and the employees shall receive compensation as the Senate shall fix.

PART II. COMMITTEES

Rule 13 Committees: Types and Composition.

(1) Standing Committees: The membership of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the President subject to action by the Senate. The respective Chairs and Vice Chairs of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the President, subject to action by the Senate. The majority and minority parties shall to the extent practicable be represented on all Standing Committees on a proportional basis or on such basis as may be prescribed by the Senate.

(2) Leadership Committees shall include majority and minority members drawn from the ranks of the Senate leadership.

(3) Special Committees shall consist of not less than three members each, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate or provided by these Rules, include a member or members of the minority party, and upon consultation with the Majority and Minority Leaders, shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the specific matter referred. The Senate may establish investigative committees pursuant to Chapter 21, Hawai'i Revised Statutes; such committees shall have such powers and be bound by such conditions as may be provided by law or by these Rules.

(4) Conference Committees shall consist of not less than three members each and be managed by the Chair of the Standing Committee having primary responsibility of the subject matter to be resolved, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate. The members of the Conference Committee shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the matter referred. The President may discharge a Conference Committee only upon concurrence with the Majority Leader.

- (5) The Committee of the Whole Senate.

Rule 14 Committee Chairs and Vice Chairs.

The first person named on the committee shall be the Chair, and the second member named shall be Vice-Chair. The Chair of committees shall call meetings and preside. If a chair so requests, the vice chair shall call the meeting and preside.

The purview of the Vice Chair of the Committee on Ways and Means includes the Capital Improvement Project Program Budget for the State of Hawai'i.

Rule 15 Committees: Control and Excuse from Membership.

Committees shall be under the control of and subject to the orders of the Senate, and shall faithfully carry out such orders. Any member may be excused from serving on any committee at the time of appointment, if already a member of four other committees.

Rule 16 Standing Committees.

Standing Committees shall be appointed for major subject matter areas at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as possible. The Standing Committees and their areas of jurisdiction shall be as follows:

(1) Committee on Agriculture and Environment (AEN). The purview of this committee includes agriculture and aquaculture, including mariculture; population; environmental quality control and protection, including litter control, recycling, wastewater treatment, endangered species, invasive species and hazardous waste.

(2) Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection (CPN). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to business regulation, professional and vocational licensing, consumer protection, financial institutions, insurance regulation, public utility regulation, telecommunications regulation, the landlord tenant code, condominium property regimes, and leaseholds.

(3) Committee on Education (EDU). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to early childhood learning, early education, including the Hawai'i P-20 Initiative, public schools, continuing education, and the public libraries.

(4) Committee on Energy, Economic Development, and Tourism (EET). The purview of this committee includes programs relating to energy, energy resources, including the development of alternative energy resources, and to programs related to economic development, including but not limited to authorities and corporations administratively attached to the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism unless the authority or corporation is within the purview of another Standing Committee pursuant to this Rule, other emerging industries development, financial and technical assistance to business, film and digital media production, astronomy, space exploration and aerospace development, biochemistry, biomedicine, biotechnology, other scientific research and development activities, recreation, including commercial ocean recreation activities, sports and athletics, and the Aloha Stadium; and those programs relating to tourism, including but not limited to the Hawai'i Convention Center, Hawai'i Visitors and Convention Bureau, and the Hawai'i Tourism Authority.

(5) Committee on Government Operations (GVO). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to state government operations policy, including government efficiency, The Procurement Code, and state facilities unless the state government operations policy, including government efficiency, departmental procurement, and state facilities is within the purview of another Standing Committee pursuant to this Rule; implementation and innovation of technology, including but not limited to storage, transmission, processing, and telecommunications; and programs and issues addressed by the State's Chief Information Officer and the Office of Enterprise Technology Services, including any boards, commissions, committees, and councils addressing technology issues.

(6) Committee on Hawaiian Affairs (HWN). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to Hawaiian affairs, including but not limited to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, Hawaiian home lands, sovereignty, and burial councils.

(7) Committee on Health (HTH). The purview of this committee includes general health, maternal and child health, communicable diseases, dental health, medical and hospital services, mental health, developmental disabilities, and hospitals.

(8) Committee on Higher Education (HRE). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to the University of Hawai'i, the community college system, private higher education bond financing, and other education matters relevant to higher education, but excluding the Hawaii P-20 Initiative.

(9) Committee on Housing (HOU). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to affordable and public housing, urban renewal, community development, housing development, and the housing of, or sheltering of, the homeless.

(10) Committee on Human Services (HMS). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to public assistance, Medquest, youth services, day care programs under the Department of Human Services, vocational rehabilitation, long term care, promotion of the general well-being of Hawai'i's youth, families, elderly population, and services relating to homelessness.

(11) Committee on Judiciary (JDC). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to the courts, crime prevention and control, including juvenile justice matters, criminal code revision, statutory revision, campaign spending and elections, ethics, constitutional matters, the Attorney General, Public Defender, and Judiciary, and individual rights and civil liberties.

(12) Committee on Labor, Culture and the Arts (LCA). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to public officers and employees, labor, employment opportunities and training, labor-management relations, collective bargaining, the Employees' Retirement System, and the Hawai'i Employer-Union Health Benefits Trust Fund; and programs relating to international affairs, international relations, foreign policy issues, and foreign relations; and culture and the arts in the State.

(13) Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental, and Military Affairs (PSM). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to public safety, corrections, the narcotics division, the sheriffs division, civil defense, disaster readiness, state building code; and county and federal relations, and matters of concern to the counties; and military and veterans' affairs.

(14) Committee on Transportation (TRS). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to air, water, and surface transportation, and transit-oriented development as it relates to transportation projects.

(15) Committee on Water and Land (WTL). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to state planning, historic preservation, sustainability, land and water management, forest management and reserve, coastal zone management, land reclamation, naturally occurring fisheries, ocean resources, state parks and beaches, management areas, including ocean recreation management areas and small boat harbors, and transit-oriented development as it relates to land use.

(16) Committee on Ways and Means (WAM). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to overall state financing policies, including revenue enhancement, taxation, other revenues, and cash and debt management, statewide implementation of planning, programming, budgeting, and evaluation, and government structure and finance.

Rule 17 Standing Committees: General Responsibility.

(1) General Responsibility. On the bills referred to it, the committee shall determine objectives, make program recommendations and, where appropriate, make expenditure recommendations. For those bills which require appropriations, the committee shall make expenditure recommendations consistent with the expenditure allocations established for the bills by the Committee on Ways and Means, which shall make the final recommendation to the Senate.

(2) Subsequent referral committees; prior concurrence. On bills that have been referred to more than one committee, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, the subsequent referral committee shall make no substantive change, except changes which affect the subject matter over which the subsequent referral committee has primary jurisdiction, without prior written approval of the preceding referral committee chair having primary jurisdiction over the subject matter affected by the change.

Rule 18 Committee on Ways and Means: Special Responsibility.

It shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means, in considering the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill, to determine for each fiscal year of the biennium the appropriate level of total expenditures and the level of expenditures for program areas.

To the extent practicable, the Committee on Ways and Means shall make available to members of the Senate the contents of the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill during the 48-hour period prior to the passage of such bills on third and final reading.

Concerning all other bills requiring appropriations, it shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means to inform the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates of the amount and type of financial resources available, and it shall review the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee to determine that the recommendation is consistent with the resources available.

In determining the amount and type of resources available for a bill requiring an appropriation and in reviewing the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee, the Committee on Ways and Means shall invite the recommendation of the chair of the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates.

Rule 19 Leadership Committees.

Leadership Committees, upon consultation and agreement with the Majority and Minority Leaders, may be appointed by the President at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as necessary. A leadership Committee on Legislative Management, upon consultation and agreement with the Majority and Minority Leaders, may be appointed by the President to perform the duties and responsibilities of the Committee as may be provided by law, or to make recommendations to the President on issues of Senate policy. Because Leadership Committees have jurisdiction over issues of organizational and institutional interest to the Senate, their membership shall include members drawn from the ranks of the Senate Leadership, thus assuring high-level consideration of these issues.

Rule 20 Special Committees on Accountability.

The President may appoint a Special Committee on Accountability which shall conduct informational briefing on matters referred to it by Senate Leadership or investigate matters referred to it by single house or concurrent resolutions. The committee shall be composed of not less than five members, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and include a member or members of the minority party. The President shall appoint the committee's vice chair, who may change from time to time, to represent the standing committee having primary jurisdiction over the subject matter referred to the special committee.

Each Special Committee on Accountability shall terminate at the end of the calendar year in which it was appointed, unless otherwise specified. All requirements of standing committees shall apply to the committee.

Rule 21 Meetings of Committees.

Meetings, including decision-making sessions, of leadership committees appointed by the President, and Standing Committees shall be public provided that meetings in executive session may be allowed in such exceptional circumstances when committee discussion could unfairly damage the reputation of individuals or where there is a legal question concerning a bill.

Notice of meetings shall include the number and title of the bills or resolutions, and brief descriptions and committee referrals of each of the subject matters to be covered. The notice for the first Senate meeting on a measure shall be filed at least 72 hours before the meeting and at least 48 hours before any subsequent meeting. The notice for any meeting to be held on the first work day of the week shall be filed no later than 4:00 p.m. on the last work day of the prior week.

These notice requirements may be waived with the approval of the President upon good cause shown. The 72 hour notice requirement is waived for the initial decision-making meeting for short form bills and informational briefings.

No committee shall sit during the time when the Senate is actually in session without first securing the approval of the President, except Conference Committees that may sit at any time.

As practicable, committees shall schedule their meetings at times and at places as are convenient for attendance by the general public, and in coordination with other committees of the House or Senate, shall endeavor to hold joint meetings and public hearings on matters of mutual interest.

The meetings of a Conference Committee shall be conducted as agreed upon by the members of the Conference Committee. Conference Committee meetings and decision-making sessions shall be public. Public notice of Conference Committee meetings shall be given to the extent practicable.

Rule 22 Decision-Making by Committee.

(1) The chair of a standing committee may commence a decision-making meeting and open discussion on matters referred to the committee without a quorum; provided that the decision-making by the committee on matters that are referred to it shall be conducted with a quorum of the committee present. A quorum shall be a majority of the membership of the committee.

(2) A favorable vote of a majority of the members present at a decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum is required to report a matter out of committee. A member voting "with reservations" shall be counted as a favorable vote.

(3) The presence of a quorum and the final vote of each member who is present at the decision-making meeting of a standing committee shall be recorded by the chair or by a member of the committee designated by the chair. This record shall be attached to and shall be a part of the report of the standing committee.

Rule 23 Public Hearings on Bills.

(1) Subject to this rule, the selection and scheduling of a bill for public hearing shall be at the discretion of the chair of the committee having jurisdiction over the bill.

(2) The chair's determination that a bill will have a public hearing shall be final notwithstanding the opposition of a majority of the members of the committee.

(3) At the written request of a majority of the members of the committee, the chair shall schedule a bill for public hearing.

(4) If a bill:

(A) Has been referred to more than one standing committee and at least one committee hearing is required for passage of the bill out of the Senate;

(B) Contains any significant or substantial amendment made by a committee other than the last standing committee to which the bill has been referred; and

(C) The public has not been provided with an opportunity to submit testimony on the significant or substantial amendment;

then, prior to reporting the bill out of the last standing committee, the last standing committee to which the bill was referred shall hold a public hearing to provide the public with the opportunity to testify on the bill.

Rule 24 Committee Reports.

(1) The leadership committees as may be appointed by the President and Standing Committees shall report from time to time upon all matters referred to them.

(2) Special Committees shall report upon matters referred to them within the time permitted in the appointment of the Special Committee unless further time is given by vote of the Senate.

(3) A Conference Committee shall not report upon the matter referred unless a majority of the members of each house appointed by their respective presiding officer have concurred in the report.

Rule 25 Committees: Fact-finding and Content of Reports.

(1) Whenever any matter shall be referred to a committee it shall be the duty of the committee to make diligent inquiry into all of the facts and circumstances connected with the matter. If necessary, witnesses shall be summoned or subpoenaed, and everything shall be done to bring all facts pertaining to the matter before the Senate in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 21 of the Hawai'i Revised Statutes. The President may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21, relating to the issuance of subpoenas, and the President, committee chair and other duly delegated members of the Senate may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21 aforesaid, relating to the administering of oaths, and the compelling of witnesses who have been subpoenaed to testify. All committee meetings held on matters referred to it by the Senate shall be open to the public unless otherwise ordered by the Senate or otherwise provided by these Rules.

(2) The report of the committee shall state findings of fact and conclusions based thereon, together with a distinct recommendation as to the disposal of that matter. A report recommending a measure for passage shall clearly state the legislative intent and purpose of the measure.

(3) The report shall also include the identity of organizations or titles of individuals representing organizations who submitted testimony on legislation for, against or comments only on the measure. A summary of any individual or individuals who submit testimony as private citizens shall also be provided.

(4) A report upon a bill shall state clearly the amendments, if any, proposed. If a substitute bill for one or more referred to the committee shall be reported, such substitute bill shall agree with the subject of the bill or bills referred to the committee.

(5) The committee shall report whenever a majority of the members present at the decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum is in favor of reporting the bill or resolution out of the committee. The report, after being made available, for review by the members of the committee, and after subsequent revisions thereto, if any, shall be the final report of the committee. The final report of the committee shall be attested to by the signature of the chair on behalf of the members of the committee. The action of the committee on the bill or resolution or any amendments thereto, if any, and the final vote of each member of the committee recorded by the chair or the chair's designee at a decision-making meeting shall not be changed in the review of the report, unless the change is made at an open decision-making meeting conducted with a quorum of the committee present. The minority of the members present at any decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum may report.

Rule 26 Committee of the Whole.

(1) The Senate from time to time may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole. Whenever any matter shall be referred to such committee upon the adoption of a motion to that effect, the President shall call some member to take the Chair (unless the Senate shall nominate a chair), which being done, the Senate then shall be in committee.

(2) The Clerk of the Senate shall act as Clerk of the Committee of the Whole without extra compensation, and shall make a careful record of the proceedings, which shall be filed as one of the records of the Senate.

(3) The Committee, on motion, may rise and ask leave to sit at any future time.

(4) When a bill shall be referred to the Committee of the Whole, the bill shall be first read throughout by the Clerk, and then again read and debated by sections, leaving the preamble to be the last. All amendments, noting the page and line, shall be duly entered by the Clerk on a separate paper, as the same shall be agreed to by the committee, and so reported. When a bill is ordered into Committee of the Whole, such order may dispense with the reading of the whole bill before considering it section by section.

(5) In Committee of the Whole, the rules of procedure in the Senate shall be observed except that any member may speak more than once on the same subject, but no person shall speak a second or further time until others desiring to speak shall have had an opportunity, nor shall the motion for the previous question be allowed. A time limit for debate may be fixed by vote.

PART III. SESSIONS; ATTENDANCE; NOMINATIONS

Rule 27 Meetings.

(1) The Senate shall meet for the transaction of public business every day, except Saturdays, Sundays, legal holidays and such other days as the Senate shall designate by motion or resolution duly adopted and entered in the Journal.

(2) The regular hour of meetings of the Senate is established at eleven-thirty o'clock a.m. but the hour of meeting, recess and adjournment for any day may be such as the Senate, by motion, shall decide from time to time.

Rule 28 Attendance.

No member shall be absent from the sessions of the Senate unless given leave by the President or unless the member is sick and unable to attend.

Rule 29 Extension of Session.

Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to extend any session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

“To the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, respectfully request an extension of _____ days of the _____ session of _____ of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i.”

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation extending the session for the number of days sought in the petition.

Rule 30 Recessed Session.

Any session of the Legislature may be recessed by concurrent resolution adopted by a majority of the members to which each house is entitled. Each regular session shall be recessed pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Hawai'i State Constitution for not less than five days at some period between the twentieth and fortieth days of the regular session.

Rule 31 Special Sessions.

(1) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to call a special session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

"To the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the House of Representatives of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, respectfully request that a special session of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i be convened at _____."

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation convening the Legislature in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

(2) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled may petition the President of the Senate to call a special session of the Senate for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities under Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawai'i State Constitution. The petition shall read:

"To the President of the Senate

Your petitioners, members of the Senate of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, respectfully request that a special session of the Senate of the State of Hawai'i be convened at _____."

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, the President of the Senate shall issue a proclamation convening the Senate in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

(3) A meeting of the Senate may be convened at any time for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities under Article III, Section 12, of the Hawai'i State Constitution, by a petition submitted to the Clerk of the Senate signed by a majority of the members to which the Senate is entitled. In such meeting, the Senate may organize itself, choose its officers, and adopt rules for its administration. The petition shall read:

"To the Clerk of the Senate

The petitioners, members of the Senate of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, shall convene a meeting of the Senate of the State of Hawai'i at _____.

The meeting of the Senate shall be held for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities under Article III, Section 12, of the Hawai'i State Constitution to organize itself, choose its officers, and adopt rules for its administration.

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the Clerk of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by a majority of the members to which the Senate is entitled, the Clerk of the Senate shall issue a notice of the meeting for the time and place sought in the petition.

Rule 32 Adjournments.

Meetings may be adjourned at any time. Unless otherwise specified in the motion, every adjournment shall be considered as being to the established hour of meeting on the following business day; but no adjournment shall be for more than three days, or sine die, without the consent of the House of Representatives.

Rule 33 Motion to Adjourn.

A motion to adjourn is always in order, and shall be decided without debate. One motion to adjourn shall not follow another without intervening business.

Rule 34 Quorum.

For the transaction of business, a majority of the number of members to which the Senate is entitled shall constitute a quorum, of which quorum a majority vote shall suffice, but the final passage of a bill shall require the vote of the majority of the members of the Senate. A smaller number than a quorum may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members. For the purpose of compelling the attendance of absent members, a majority of the members present, by resolution, may direct the Sergeant-at-Arms to place the members who are absent under arrest and return them to the Senate. Any warrant pursuant to such a resolution shall be issued in the name of the Senate and shall be signed by the member then presiding. For the purpose of ascertaining whether there is a quorum present, the President shall count the members present.

Rule 35 Executive Session.

- (1) If the Senate considers it necessary to act confidentially upon any communication from the Governor or upon any nomination or other matter, it may go into executive session.
- (2) When any member desires to make known any matter to the Senate which the member deems should be confidential and private, the member shall communicate that desire to the President who shall decide whether the Senate shall go into executive session. The Senate may decide whether the matter communicated shall be kept secret.

Rule 36 Clearing of the Senate.

- (1) When acting upon confidential business in executive session, the Senate Chambers shall be cleared of all persons except the members of the Senate and such other persons as the presiding officer with the consent of the Senate shall deem necessary.
- (2) The members, officers and employees shall keep the secrets of the Senate and any other person whose presence is permitted in executive session shall be sworn to secrecy.
- (3) All confidential communications made to the Senate, and remarks, votes and proceedings thereon, shall be kept strictly secret by the members, officers and employees, as well as by such other persons as have been detained or permitted to attend upon the consideration of such matters, until the Senate, by resolution, takes off such seal of secrecy, or unless such matter be later considered in open session.

Rule 37 Nominations; Appointments.

- (1) Nominations made by the Governor and removal of the chief legal officer of the State which require the advice and consent of the Senate, and appointments which require the confirmation or consent of the Senate shall be referred to the standing committee having jurisdiction within five legislative days of receipt of the nomination or appointment. The standing committee to which a nomination, removal of the chief legal officer or appointment is referred, shall report to the Senate with a recommendation to advise and consent, confirm, or reject on or before the fifty-ninth day of the session.
- (2) Except for the appointment of a justice or judge, a nomination or appointment made by the Governor which is received by the Senate after the forty-first day of the session of the Legislature shall be returned to the Governor without action, unless a confirmation or consent is required to further a public purpose which cannot be satisfied by an interim appointment. Notice of this rule shall be given to the Governor not later than the twentieth day of the session of the Legislature.
- (3) The final question on nominations made by the Governor shall be: "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?"
- (4) The final question on the removal of the chief legal officer of the State shall be: "Will the Senate advise and consent to the removal of the chief legal officer of the State?"
- (5) The final question on appointments made by the Governor which require the confirmation or consent of the Senate shall be: "Will the Senate confirm (or consent) to this appointment?"
- (6) The final question on nominations, removal of the chief legal officer or on appointments shall not be put sooner than twenty-four hours from the time when the nomination or appointment is received, nor on the day in which it may be reported by a committee, unless by unanimous consent.
- (7) Public hearings shall be held for all nominees, for the removal of the chief legal officer of the State, and for all appointees prior to confirmation or consent by the Senate.
- (8) Consent to the appointment of justices and judges shall be pursuant to Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawai'i State Constitution.

Rule 38 Meeting at a Place Other than the Capitol.

Whenever, for any reason, the Governor shall convene the Senate at any place other than the Capitol, it shall attend together with all of its officers at the time and place ordered.

Rule 38.5 Virtual Attendance During Catastrophic Disasters.

- (1) During a period of catastrophic disaster, the President may authorize, for good cause, any meeting of members of the Senate to be conducted at which one or more members participate through virtual attendance.
- (2) A member participating through virtual attendance shall be considered present and in attendance as if the member were physically present, including but not limited to, for determining a quorum pursuant to Senate Rule 22 and Senate Rule 34.
- (3) In ascertaining whether a quorum is present, the presiding officer or chair shall count the number of members in physical attendance and those members, including the presiding officer or chair, participating by means of virtual attendance.
- (4) "Catastrophic disaster" means a severe or prolonged natural or human caused occurrence including, but not limited to, world conflicts, terrorist threat, national or global economic crisis, natural disaster, outbreak of disease, or any other event or occurrence that severely threatens or negatively impacts life, health, welfare, property, infrastructure, the environment, and financial security of the State.
- (5) "Virtual attendance" means participation in a meeting of members of the Senate using telecommunications technology, video-conferencing technology, or other electronic or digital means of communication that allows any member who is authorized or required to be at the meeting to:

- (A) Authenticate and verify each participating member and the vote made by each member;
- (B) Simultaneously hear or read the comments of every member who is duly recognized by the presiding officer or chair;
- (C) Vigorously participate in debate with other members as if they were physically present; and
- (D) Send and receive documents and other material that are used or referred to in the meeting;

provided that if equal access of a member via virtual attendance is interrupted, the meeting shall be recessed until such time as equal access by all members is restored.

PART IV. ORDER OF BUSINESS

Rule 39 Order of Business: General.

After roll call and the reading of the Journal, the President shall call for business in the following order:

- (1) Messages from the Governor.
- (2) Reports and communications from the state officers.
- (3) Communications, bills, resolutions and other matters from the House of Representatives.
- (4) Concurrent and senate resolutions and introduction of bills.
- (5) Reports of Conference and Joint Committees.
- (6) Reports of the Leadership Committee on Legislative Management.
- (7) Reports of Standing Committees.
- (8) Reports of other Leadership Committees.
- (9) Unfinished business, upon which the Senate was engaged at the time of its last adjournment.
- (10) The Order of the Day.
- (11) Miscellaneous communications.
- (12) Any miscellaneous business on the President's table.

Rule 40 Order of Business: Special.

The Senate, by previous motion, may direct that any matter named shall be made a special order of business and that such special order shall take precedence of all business after the fourth order, or that it shall take any other position lower down on the calendar.

Rule 41 Order of Business: Committee Reports and Gubernatorial Messages.

Reports from Conference or Joint Committees, and from Leadership Committee on Legislative Management, shall be in order at all times after the second order of business, and, upon motion, messages from the Governor or from the House of Representatives may be received at any time. Without unanimous consent, however, such messages or reports shall not be in order for discussion when received, but shall be placed on the calendar as unfinished business.

Rule 42 Order of Business: Order of the Day.

- (1) All floor votes on legislation will be posted on the order of the day.
- (2) After the first seven orders of business set forth in Rule 39, it shall be in order, pending consideration thereof, to move that the Senate proceed to dispose of the unfinished business or to the Order of the Day. If such motion be decided in the affirmative, such consideration shall immediately be taken up.

Rule 43 Order of Business: Unfinished Business.

The unfinished business in which the Senate was engaged at the time of the last adjournment shall have the preference in the Order of the Day. Until the former is disposed of, no motion for any other business shall be received without special leave of the Senate.

Rule 44 Order of Business: Questions on Priority.

All questions relating to the priority of business to be acted upon shall be decided without debate.

PART V. BILLS

Rule 45 Bills: Introduction.

Any bill may be introduced on the report of the committee or by any member, except appropriation bills subject to the next paragraph, and except short form bills which may only be introduced by the majority leader or the minority leader after appropriate consultation with committee chairs and other members of the Senate.

The Executive Budget, Judiciary Budget, Legislative Budget, General Appropriations Bill, Supplemental Appropriations Bill, Office of Hawaiian Affairs Budget, and bills for criminal injuries compensation, for claims against the State and for funding of collective bargaining agreements may be introduced only by the President. Each member may introduce only one bill appropriating money for capital improvements projects in the member's district. The majority leaders and the minority leader shall develop a policy governing introduction by individual members of bills intended to appropriate money or to authorize the issuance of state bonds.

Bills, which shall carry over from a regular session in an odd-numbered year to the next regular session, shall retain the numbers assigned to them. The Clerk shall keep a record of the status of all bills in possession of the Senate at the end of the odd-numbered year session and shall publish the record of the status of all such bills prior to the convening of the next regular session.

Every bill introduced or reported out of any committee, which amends an existing section or subsection of the Hawai'i Revised Statutes or Session Laws of Hawai'i, shall set forth the section or subsection in full, and the matter to be deleted shall be enclosed in brackets and stricken and any new matter added to the section or subsection shall be underscored. However, a Supplemental Appropriations Bill need not conform to this rule, nor an amending bill where the intent and effect of the amending bill can be clearly identified and understood without repeating the entire section or subsection, in which case only the paragraphs, subparagraphs, clauses or items to be amended need be set forth as the President may allow. The President may allow additional exceptions to this rule.

Rule 46 Bills: Referral to Committee.

(1) Upon introduction, all bills shall be numbered by the Clerk in numerical sequence, shall bear an identification as a Senate Bill, and shall pass first reading.

(2) The majority research office shall make recommendations to the majority leadership on the referral of each such bill to appropriate Leadership or Standing Committees.

(3) Each such bill shall be referred by members of the majority leadership appointed by the President, to one or more appropriate Leadership or Standing Committees for consideration.

(4) Any referral may be reconsidered by the President upon written request of any chair who is aggrieved by the referral made within three working days. The President shall decide the request for reconsideration within a reasonable time, which decision shall be final. No request for reconsideration shall be considered if the timing of the request would have the effect of killing a bill or resolution.

(5) Any proposed senate draft that makes major amendments or wholesale changes that could affect the referral of the bill shall be submitted to the President for review and if the President deems it appropriate, the bill may be re-referred as determined by the President. The President's determination of any proposed re-referral shall be made within twenty-four hours of receipt of the proposed senate draft.

(6) Each Leadership and Standing Committee shall consider the bills and other matters referred to it as expeditiously as may be possible.

Rule 47 Bills: Required Readings.

No bill shall pass the Senate unless it shall have passed three readings in the Senate on separate days. The President shall give notice in each instance whether it be the first, second or third reading.

Rule 48 Bills: First Reading.

(1) The first reading of a bill shall be for information. If opposition be made to it, the question shall be: "Shall this bill be rejected?" which question may be debated. But no one shall speak more than once upon such question, except the introducer of the bill, who may close the debate.

(2) If the question to reject be negative, the bill shall go to its second reading without question.

Rule 49 Bills: Second Reading.

A bill upon its second reading may be read by its title only. It then shall be subject to a motion to commit. If it is not referred to a Leadership Committee, Standing Committee, or Special Committee, but is ordered to be considered in Committee of the Whole, a day for such consideration shall be determined by the chair of such committee. When the bill is reported from committee it shall take its place in the order of business for future consideration.

Rule 50 Bills: Third Reading.

(1) No bill shall pass third or final reading in the Senate unless copies of the bill in the form to be passed have been made available to the members of the Senate for at least 48 hours. Form to be passed means the form in which a bill is to be (a) passed on third reading in the Senate, (b) concurred to by the Senate after amendments have been made by the House, or (c) passed by the Senate after a Conference Committee has agreed upon it.

(2) A bill on its third or final reading may be read by its title only. Upon the final passage of any bill, the Ayes and Noes shall be called. Such passage shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members of the Senate and the Ayes and Noes shall be entered on the Journal.

(3) All bills, except on first reading, shall be identified by title on the Order of the Day before consideration by the members unless waived by the President.

Rule 51 Bills: Property of Senate.

All bills introduced in the Senate shall be deemed the property of the Senate and under its control unless they shall become law, subject however to the right of the House of Representatives to amend or to refuse to agree with the bills.

Any bill pending at the final adjournment of a regular session in an odd-numbered year shall carry over with the same status to the next regular session; provided that if such bill shall have passed third reading in the Senate in an odd-numbered session, it shall pass at least one reading in the Senate in the next regular session upon its return to the Senate from the House.

Rule 52 Bills: Recall from Committee.

Twenty days after a bill has been referred to a committee, the same may be recalled from such committee by the affirmative vote of one-third of the members of the Senate.

Rule 53 Matters Tabled.

When a bill or resolution or other matter has been laid upon the table, it shall not thereafter be taken from the table and be considered or restored to a place upon the calendar of the Senate without the consent of a majority.

Rule 54 Bills: Amendments.

(1) All amendments proposed to any bill shall be in writing, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and shall be sent to the Clerk's desk to be filed with the bill.

(2) The fundamental purpose of any amendment to a bill shall be germane to the fundamental purpose of the bill.

(3) The Clerk shall prepare and distribute copies of any proposed floor amendment to each member of the Senate present.

(4) A floor amendment shall be deemed pending only after its proponent has been recognized by the President and its adoption has been properly moved and seconded.

(5) A floor amendment that relates to a different subject, is intended to accomplish a different purpose, incorporates any other bill pending before the Senate, or would alter the nature of the bill as reported, is not germane and shall not be considered by the Senate.

(6) An amendment to a floor amendment that is not germane to both the floor amendment and the bill as reported shall not be considered by the Senate.

Rule 55 Bills: Certification.

When a bill is passed it shall be certified by the Clerk who shall note the day of its passage in the journal along with a record of the ayes and noes.

Rule 56 Bills: Received from House of Representatives.

Whenever a House bill which has passed Third Reading in the House of Representatives shall be certified to the Senate for its action, such bill shall be read three times before final passage, in accordance with the provision of the rules for the passage of bills introduced in the Senate.

Rule 57 Bills: Transmittal to House of Representatives.

When a bill originating in the Senate shall have passed its third reading, or when a bill originating in the House which has been received from the House shall have been amended, or when a carry-over bill from an odd-numbered year originating in the House passes its third reading in the Senate in an even-numbered year session, such bill or such amended bill shall immediately be certified by the President and Clerk and sent to the House of Representatives for its consideration.

Rule 58 Bills: Correction of Errors.

When a bill has passed both the Senate and the House of Representatives and an error in it is discovered prior to its having received the approval of the Governor, the bill may be returned by Concurrent Resolution to the house last considering the bill for proper correction.

Rule 59 Bills: Order of Consideration.

(1) The Clerk shall ensure that bills that have passed first reading are made immediately available. When the bills have been made available to the members of the Senate, the Majority Leadership, appointed by the President, shall refer the bills to the various committees. When the committees have considered the bills and reported on them, the committees shall return the bills to the Clerk, and the Clerk shall place the bills in the Second Reading File. The Senate shall consider the bills in the order in which they appear in the Second Reading File.

(2) The Clerk shall arrange bills that have passed second reading in the order of their passage on second reading, regardless of the date of their reference to committee or the date of the committee report on them. The Clerk shall place them on the Third Reading File in the order in which they passed second reading and the Senate shall consider them on third reading in that same order. However, if the third reading of a bill is set for some particular date, that bill shall be removed from the Third Reading File.

Rule 60 Bills: Special Order of Consideration.

All bills and other matters set for consideration on particular dates, shall be arranged in the order of the several votes making such assignments. A list shall be made of such special orders, and when the time for consideration arrives, such bills and other matters shall be considered in the order of assignment. If an adjournment shall be had before all of such special orders are disposed of, the remainder shall go over and come under the head of unfinished business on the following day, unless otherwise ordered.

PART VI. RESOLUTIONS; MOTIONS**Rule 61 Resolutions and Motions: Form.**

All resolutions shall be typewritten, dated and signed by the introducer, otherwise they shall not be considered. The Senate shall not introduce any congratulatory, commemorative or memorial resolution but shall express the sentiment contained in such resolutions by means of a suitable certificate. Motions and amendments may be verbal but shall be reduced to writing if requested by the President, and shall be read from the desk if so ordered.

Rule 62 Motions: Disposition.

After a motion is stated or read by the President, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Senate, and shall be disposed of by vote of the Senate; however, it may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before an amendment has been adopted or before the decision on the motion if not amended.

Rule 63 Motions Applicable to Pending Matters.

Whenever any bill or resolution or other matter shall be under discussion, the only motions relative thereto shall be:

- (1) To lay upon the table,
- (2) To postpone to a certain time,
- (3) To postpone indefinitely,
- (4) To commit or recommit, and
- (5) To amend, which motions shall have precedence in the order named.

The first two motions shall be decided without debate and shall be put as soon as made.

A motion to recommit will require a floor vote.

When any of the motions shall be decided in the negative, they shall not be revived the same day relative to the main question under discussion. If all are negative as aforesaid, the only remaining question shall be as to the adoption of the bill, resolution or other main question.

Rule 64 Matters Postponed Indefinitely.

When a question is postponed indefinitely, the question shall not be acted upon again during the session in which it was introduced.

Rule 65 Motion for Previous Question.

The object of the motion for the previous question is to cut off debate. It shall always be in order. It shall require a three-fifths vote to carry it.

Whenever the motion shall be carried, the author of the resolution or introducer of the bill under discussion shall be permitted to close the debate, after which the main question, subject to Rule 63, shall be put. The author or introducer may delegate to another such right to close.

Rule 66 Motion for Reconsideration.

(1) When a motion has been once made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall not be in order for any member who voted on the side that did not prevail to move for a reconsideration thereof; but any member who voted on the prevailing side may move to reconsider it on the same or the succeeding day of session, or, with the consent of the Senate, on any subsequent day and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions, except a motion to adjourn.

(2) When a motion for reconsideration has been decided by vote, that vote shall not be reconsidered.

(3) When a bill or resolution or other matter upon which a vote has been taken shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate, and shall have been transmitted to the House of Representatives, a motion to reconsider shall be deemed to include a request to the House to return the same. If not complied with by the House, then the vote on the motion to reconsider shall be set aside. If such motion shall pass, the Clerk shall promptly communicate to the House the request for return of the matter to be reconsidered.

PART VII. PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS**Rule 67 Petitions, Memorials, and Miscellaneous Communications.**

- (1) Any person may petition the Senate. Petitions and other memorials, except as provided in Rule 61, shall be in writing, signed by the petitioner.
- (2) All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the Senate or to the President and members shall be presented to the Senate by the Clerk.
- (3) A brief statement of the contents of such petitions, memorials or other papers shall be made orally by the Clerk.
- (4) Every such petition, memorial or other paper shall be ordered filed or referred to a committee, as of course, by the President, unless such action is objected to by a member at the time such petition, memorial or other paper is presented.
- (5) No such petition, memorial or other paper shall be debated on the day it is presented, except with the consent of the Senate.

PART VIII. ORDER; DEBATE; VOTING**Rule 68 Questions of Order.**

- (1) A question of order may be raised at any stage of the proceedings, except during the calling of the roll when the Ayes and Noes are called for. Unless submitted to the Senate, such questions shall be decided without debate by the presiding officer, subject to an appeal to the Senate. Laying such appeal on the table shall be held as sustaining the ruling of the presiding officer.
- (2) Any question of order may be submitted to the Senate for its decision.

Rule 69 Debate: General Limitation.

No member shall speak more than twice, unless such member be the mover of the matter pending, in which case such member shall not be permitted to speak in reply until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule 70 Voting: Methods.

There shall be five methods of ascertaining the decision of the Senate upon any matter.

- (1) First, by voice; Second, by raising of hands; Third, by rising; Fourth, by call of the roll of the members and a record of the Clerk of the vote of each; and Fifth, by unanimous consent.
- (2) Whenever the Senate is ready to vote on any question, the President shall rise, and after stating the question, shall request all those in favor of the affirmative of the question to vote "Aye." The President then shall call upon all voting in the negative of the question to vote "No." The President then shall announce the result to the Senate.
- (3) If any member shall doubt the result, as announced, the President again shall state the question and call upon the members to vote either by rising in their places, and they shall remain standing until counted, or by raising their hands and the result again shall be announced.
- (4) The President shall, when one-fifth of the members present so request, and may, when one member so requests, allow a roll-call vote. Clerk shall call the roll of the members of the Senate. Each member, when called, shall vote in a clear loud voice, "Aye," if voting in the affirmative, or "No," if voting in the negative. The Clerk shall record each vote and such record shall become a part of the Journal of the Senate. The President shall announce the results as above set forth.
- (5) With the unanimous consent of the Senate, the President may direct the Clerk to record an "Aye" vote for each member of the Senate. If there is no objection, the Clerk shall so record the vote. If there is objection, the President shall ask for the names of the members voting "No" and order the Clerk to record no votes for them.

Rule 71 Voting: Rights of Members.

- (1) No member, on any account, shall refrain from voting unless excused by the President. A member voting "with reservations" shall be counted as a favorable vote. A member may vote "Kanalua" the first time the member's name is called by the Clerk on any vote, but if the member votes "Kanalua" on the next call of the member's name, the member's vote shall be recorded as "Aye."
- (2) The President may excuse a member who has a monetary interest in the question, or whose right to a seat in the Senate will be affected by the question, or whose official conduct is involved in the question. If a member thinks there may be a personal interest in the question, the member shall rise and disclose the interest to the President. The President then shall rule whether the member has a conflict of interest. If so, the member shall be excused from voting.
- (3) Whenever the Ayes and Noes are called, no one, without unanimous consent, shall be permitted to explain a vote.
- (4) After the announcement by the President of the result, no one shall be allowed to vote or to change a vote.

PART IX. DECORUM; DISCLOSURES; PEER REVIEW; PUNISHMENT**Rule 72 Misconduct; Procedure; Peer Review.**

No member of the Senate shall be subject to a charge for misconduct, disorderly behavior, or neglect of duty unless the person making the charge shall have first given notice of the charge to the President and to the member being charged.

Upon receipt of the charge, the President shall attempt to resolve the matter in an administrative proceeding. If the matter cannot be resolved administratively, the President may appoint a Special Committee to be chaired by the Vice-President or such other member as the President may designate to investigate, hear and report upon the conduct of the member charged for misconduct, disorderly behavior or neglect of duty. Any member so charged shall be informed in writing of the specific charge or charges made against the member and have opportunity to present evidence and be heard in the member's own defense before the Special Committee. Following its investigation and hearing, the Special Committee shall file its report with the President setting forth its findings and recommendations.

If the committee recommends dismissal of the charge or charges, the President may dismiss the charges without further hearing, or the President may present the report of the committee to the Senate for its consideration. The Senate, by a majority vote, may dismiss the charge or charges against the member without a hearing.

If there is no dismissal of the charge or charges, or if the committee recommends censure, suspension or expulsion, the President shall present the report of the committee to the Senate for its consideration and decision. The member who is charged, shall be informed in writing of the presentation of the charge or charges of the committee report to the Senate and be given an opportunity to be heard in the member's own defense. The Senate, by a majority vote, may dismiss the charge or charges without a hearing, or with notice and an opportunity to be heard in the member's own defense, censure a member or, upon a two-thirds vote of all the members of the Senate, suspend or expel a member.

At any stage of the charge against a member, the member shall have a right to be represented by a person or persons of the member's own choosing.

Rule 73 Decorum: Transgression of Rules.

If any member transgresses the rules of the Senate, the President, or any member, may call such member to order, and, when so called to order, the member immediately shall sit down. The President then shall decide the question of order without debate, subject to an appeal to the Senate.

The President may call for the sense of the Senate on any question of order.

Rule 74 Decorum: Address.

When any member is about to speak, such member shall rise from the member's seat and address all remarks to the President. While speaking, the member shall confine all remarks to the question under debate, shall refer to other Senators by title only (e.g., "Senator from the _____ District"; "The Chair of the Committee on _____"; "The Majority Leader,") and not by name and shall avoid personalities.

Rule 75 Decorum: Person Called to Order While Speaking.

Whenever any person shall be called to order while speaking, such person shall be deemed to be in possession of the floor when the question of order is decided and may proceed with the matter under discussion.

Rule 76 Decorum: Presence in Senate.

No person shall sit at the desk of the President or Clerk, except by permission of the President, nor shall any person, other than a member, officer or permitted employee or person, sit in the main Senate floor area during any of the sessions of the Senate.

Rule 77 Decorum: Conduct in Session.

When the President is putting any question or addressing the Senate, no one shall walk out of the room or across the floor. When a member is speaking, no one shall entertain a private discourse, nor shall anyone pass between the member speaking and the Chair.

No one shall cause any annoyance or disturbance on the Senate floor by use of sound-emitting electronic devices such as cell phones or pagers.

Rule 78 Decorum: Disorderly Conduct in Session.

If, during any session of the Senate, any member should behave in a disorderly manner the President shall order the member to be seated and preserve the peace. If such member then shall persist in disorderly conduct, the President shall order the Sergeant-at-Arms to remove the member from the Senate and the member shall not be permitted to take a seat during the remainder of that day's session, except upon satisfactory pledge given to the Senate for future good behavior.

Rule 79 Decorum: Recording of Debate Called to Order.

If any Senator is called to order for words spoken in debate, upon the member's demand or on that of any other Senator, the words objected to shall be taken down in writing and noted by the Clerk, and, if required, shall be read for the information of the Senate.

Rule 80 Decorum: Smoking.

No member or other officer shall smoke anywhere within the capitol.

Rule 81 Standards of Conduct.

(1) Members should conduct themselves in a respectful manner befitting the office with which they as elected officials have been entrusted, respecting and complying with the law and acting at all times in a manner that promotes public confidence in the integrity of the Senate.

(2) Members should not lend the prestige of public office to advance the private interests of themselves or others; nor should members convey or permit others to convey the impression that they are in a special position to unduly influence pending public business before them.

(3) Members should treat their fellow Senate members, staff, and the general public with respect and courtesy, regardless of political or religious beliefs, race, ethnicity, sex, sexual orientation, or physical disability.

(4) The legislative duties of members as prescribed by law and these Rules should take precedence over all of their other business or professional activities. Members should freely and willingly accept certain restrictions on their business activities and professional conduct that might be considered burdensome by an ordinary private citizen, and should perform the duties of elected office impartially and diligently. To the greatest extent reasonably possible, members should:

- (A) Refrain from allowing family, social, business, or other relationships to unduly influence the member's legislative conduct or judgment.
- (B) Refrain from showing bias or prejudice, including but not limited to bias or prejudice based on political or religious beliefs, race, ethnicity, sex, sexual orientation, or physical disability, in the performance of their official duties.
- (C) Exercise patience, tolerance and courtesy to all those with whom they deal with in an official capacity, and require staff and others subject to their direction and control to maintain similar standards of conduct, fidelity, and diligence inherent in public service.
- (D) Exercise the power of appointment impartially and on the basis of merit, refraining from making unnecessary appointments and approving compensation of appointees beyond the fair value of services rendered.
- (E) Afford to every person who wishes to participate in the legislative process the opportunity to be heard according to established procedures.
- (F) Consider at all times whether their conduct would create in reasonable minds the perception that their ability to carry out legislative responsibilities with integrity and independence is either questionable or impaired.
- (G) Refrain from using, or permitting the use of, the privileges and prestige of their public office to derive undue personal, professional, or financial benefits for themselves, members of their families, or others with whom they maintain personal, business, or professional relationships.
- (H) Refrain from engaging in financial and business dealings that involve them in frequent transactions, or continuing business or professional relationships, with those persons likely to derive benefits from public financial matters either pending or already deliberated and voted upon by the Senate, to the extent that such conduct may reasonably be perceived as personal exploitation of their public office.

Rule 82 Decorum: Solicitation Prohibited.

An officer or employee of the Senate shall not solicit subscriptions, for any purpose, from any other officer or employee thereof, nor from any Senator. Nor shall any person be permitted to solicit or receive subscriptions or contributions for any purpose on the floor or in the lobby of the Senate or in any Senate office.

Rule 83 Disclosures.

Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission of the State of Hawai'i, a disclosure of the member's private financial interests, as prescribed by law. Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission any change in such financial interests.

If a legislative matter which affects a member's interests arises before the member has made a disclosure to the Ethics Commission, the member shall disclose orally such interest to the Senate before voting. The member then shall immediately make the written disclosure required by law and the Rules of the Senate.

Any member who has filed a disclosure as required by this Rule need not make a further oral disclosure on the Senate floor of any interest so filed.

Rule 84 Violating Confidence.

If any matter covered in Rule 35 or 36 shall be disclosed by any Senator, the Senator shall be liable to censure, or, by a two-thirds vote, to suspension or expulsion from the Senate. If an officer or other person authorized to hear such matter shall disclose the matter, such officer shall be dismissed and such other person shall be liable to punishment for contempt comparable to the punishment provided for by Article III, Section 18 of the Hawai'i State Constitution and in the manner as therein prescribed.

Rule 85 Conflicts of Interest.

(1) No member shall vote on any legislation if the member has a direct financial interest in the legislation, unless the member is part of the class of people affected by the official action based upon the member's profession, trade or business; provided that this rule shall not apply to votes on the recommendations of a committee when a member has disclosed a potential conflict. For the purposes of this rule, a "direct financial interest" means that the legislation affects the legislator's personal business, property, or financial interest.

(2) If a member is uncertain as to whether a conflict of interest exists, the member may request a ruling from the President by giving notice and disclosing the direct financial interest to the President prior to voting. When making a determination in cases where a portion of a measure may place a member in a conflict of interest, the President shall give due consideration to the context of that portion as it relates to the overall purpose of the measure. If the President determines that a conflict exists, the President shall excuse the member from voting.

PART X. QUESTIONS TO STATE OFFICERS**Rule 86 Questions to State Officers.**

Any member of the Senate may ask any question of any state officer relating to the officer's respective department by reducing such questions to writing, over the member's signature, reading the same before the Senate, and furnishing the officer with a copy of such written question. Any officer questioned shall reply to such question upon the following day, unless the Senate shall grant a definite extension of time for replying.

PART XI. AMENDMENT, SUSPENSION AND INTERPRETATION OF RULES**Rule 87 Amendments; Suspension; Violations.**

(1) No rule of the Senate shall be amended or rescinded nor shall any new rule be adopted, without one day's notice of such change. Any such action shall require a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) Any rule may be suspended for a particular purpose upon a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(3) Any violation of these Rules shall be referred to the President for appropriate action.

Rule 88 Parliamentary Procedure.

Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedures, 2010 edition, where not inconsistent with the Rules and practices of the Senate, shall govern.

PART XII. MISCELLANEOUS POWER**Rule 89 Legal Action.**

Except in legal proceedings where the Senate of the State of Hawaii is named as a defendant, the President shall obtain written consent of a majority of the members to which the Senate is entitled prior to undertaking any affirmative legal action taken on behalf of the Senate, such as the filing of a lawsuit or amicus curiae brief or intervening as a party to a lawsuit.

Rule 90 Administrative and Financial Manuals.

The Senate shall adopt by majority vote an administrative and financial manual of guides, the purpose of which is to establish uniformity in administrative practices and to ensure compliance with Senate policies.

Rule 91 Decorum; Disrespectful Conduct During Session by Non-member.

If, during any session of the Senate, any non-member should behave in a disrespectful or disorderly manner the non-member shall be subject to arrest and removal from the Senate Chamber by the Sergeant-at-Arms or by any other law enforcement officer of the State, as directed by the Sergeant-at-Arms. Any removal of a non-member by the Sergeant-at-Arms and its personnel shall be restricted to removal of the non-member from the Senate Chamber and through non-physical means, whenever possible. Once a non-member is removed from the Senate Chamber, the Sergeant-at-Arms shall relinquish control of the non-member to the Department of Public Safety or other law enforcement officers of the State.

For the punishment of a non-member, the provisions of Article III, Section 18, of the Hawai'i State Constitution or section 710-1078, Hawai'i Revised Statutes, pursuant to Act 204, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012, shall govern.

Rule 92 Issuance of the Senate Pin.

- (1) The Senate pin is a symbol of service in the Senate and provides a common bond among current and past members.
- (2) The President may choose to commission and present the Senate pin to current or past members.
- (3) The Senate pin presented under this Rule shall only be worn by current or past members to whom it was presented.
- (4) The Senate pin shall not be presented to an individual or representative acting on behalf of any current or past member.

(5) If the Senate pin presented under this Rule is lost, destroyed, or rendered unfit for use without fault or neglect on the part of the current or past member to whom it was furnished, the President may replace the Senate pin upon request.

Rule 93 Committee on the Declared State of Emergency

When a state of emergency has been declared by the Governor, the President may appoint a Committee on the Declared State of Emergency which shall investigate or conduct informational briefings on matters relating to the State's emergency response. The committee shall be composed of not less than five members, unless otherwise ordered by the President, who shall appoint a chairperson from among the members. The committee shall include a member or members of the minority party.

Any member of the committee may ask any question of any state officer appearing before the committee relating to the officer's respective department, the department's role in the emergency, and its emergency response. Any member of the committee may also submit written inquiries by reducing the member's questions to writing, over the member's signature, reading the same before the committee, and providing the officer with a copy of such written questions. Any officer questioned in writing shall reply to such question upon the following day, unless granted an extension of time in which to reply by the committee.

31st LEGISLATURE, REGULAR SESSION OF 2021 JOINT HOUSE and SENATE COMMITTEES ON CONFERENCE PROCEDURES

Due to the extraordinary circumstances surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic, the Senate and the House have agreed to the following special procedures for all 2021 Regular Session Committees on Conference. These Conference procedures are not meant to establish any precedent and shall only be effective from 8:00 a.m. on Monday, April 19, 2021, until 9:00 p.m. on Friday, April 23, 2021.

1. Definitions

For purposes of these procedures:

"Chairs" refers to all of the designated chairs and co-chairs of a Conference Committee.

"Conference Committee" refers to the conference of the House Committee and the Senate Committee assigned by their respective chamber to resolve the differences between the House and the Senate over a particular measure.

"Lead chair" refers to the chair of the House Committee or the Senate Committee who is listed first on the Action Sheets, as provided by the respective chamber.

"Lead committee staff" refers to the staff of the lead Chair from the chamber from which the measure in conference originated.

"Managers" refers to all members of the House and Senate assigned to a Conference Committee.

2. Conference Committee Scope and Amendments

The authority of the Conference Committee shall be limited to resolving differences between the Senate and House on a measure.

- a. With the exception of the Executive Budget, the Judiciary Budget, and the Budget of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, a Conference Committee shall not amend a measure by inserting any unrelated or new subject matter.
- b. To assure the integrity of individual measures, the merging of two or more distinct but related measures into one encompassing measure shall not be allowed.

3. Conference Committee Meeting Times and Places

Conference Committee deliberations shall take place only between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m.

A Conference Committee shall meet in the conference room assigned or reserved, pursuant to the Room Scheduling Procedures and Guidelines, as attached.

- Senate Conference Committee managers may attend conference meetings in the conference room assigned or reserved pursuant to the attached Room Scheduling Procedures and Guidelines, or virtually using videoconference technology pursuant to the attached Remote Participation Procedures and Guidelines. Senate lead chair shall attend conference meetings in the conference room assigned or reserved.
- House Conference Committee Chairs and managers are required to attend conference meetings in the conference room assigned or reserved. House members are not permitted to participate remotely.

4. Initial Public-Meeting Notice

The electronic signatures of all chairs shall be obtained before the notice of an initial meeting is posted or distributed. Prior to offering the initial meeting notice for signatures, the chairs shall consult with one another on the information to be included in the notice.

Chairs shall provide at least 24-hour public notice of the first meeting of the Conference Committee and are strongly encouraged to provide more than 24-hour notice if at all possible. Written notices shall be submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House

Sergeant-at-Arms for official postings on the Legislature's website. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.

5. Notice of Subsequent Meetings

- a. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting but the lead chairs of both chambers agree to meet again before 9:00 pm on the same day, the lead chairs of both chambers shall publicly announce at the meeting the time and place at which the Conference Committee will reconvene. Written notice of the reconvening of the Conference Committee on the same day is not required to be distributed. However, written notice containing information on the subsequent meeting shall be submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official posting as soon as possible. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.
- b. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting but the lead chairs of both chambers agree to meet on another day, the lead chairs of both chambers shall publicly announce at the meeting the date(s), time(s), and place of the subsequent meeting(s), and submit written notice to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official posting. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.
- c. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting and the date(s), time(s), and place of future meetings are not publicly announced at that noticed meeting, chairs shall ensure that a written meeting notice, signed electronically by the lead chairs of their respective chamber, is submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official posting at least 24 hours in advance of the next meeting of the Conference Committee.

6. Attendance at Meetings

- a. To convene the initial conference committee meeting only the lead House and Senate chair must be present. All other conference committee managers, especially any co-chair, should attempt to be present.
- b. Once a conference has been opened, reconvening of any subsequent meeting of a conference committee shall require the following:
 - i. For the Senate, the lead chair or a co-chair must be present.
 - ii. For the House, the lead chair must be present.
 - iii. All other conference committee managers, especially any co-chair, should attempt to be present at the convening of and during each meeting.
- c. For decision-making at a meeting, a quorum must be present. "A quorum shall be a majority of the House Committee managers and a majority of the Senate Committee managers and shall include the lead House and Senate chair and majority of the chairs of the Conference Committee for their respective chamber." See Section 9.a of the "Procedures." The lead House and Senate chair of the conference committee must be part of this quorum.
- d. For a measure with fiscal implications, approval must be given by the chair representing the House Finance Committee and Senate Ways and Means Committee prior to the decision-making on the measure.

7. Conference Discussion

Except as authorized by the respective chairs, only the respective chairs may speak during conference. All other managers or other authorized persons shall be recognized by their respective chairs before speaking on any issue.

8. Decorum in Conference Committee Meetings and Courtesy to the Public and to the Managers

- a. Managers shall respect the differing views of other managers and conduct themselves in a courteous manner.
- b. Chairs shall ensure that meetings convene and reconvene at scheduled times. If none of the chairs of one of the Committees are present within 15 minutes of the scheduled meeting time, the chairs of the other Committee shall contact the absent chair.
- c. If none of the absent chairs are present within 30 minutes of the scheduled meeting time, the chairs present shall inform the managers and members of public present that the Conference Committee cannot be convened or reconvened, and that, pursuant to 5.c of these Committees on Conference Procedures, a 24-hour advance notice shall be provided for a subsequent meeting of the Conference Committee.

9. Decision-making Meeting

The decision-making meeting of a Conference Committee shall comply with the following open meeting provisions:

- a. A quorum of the Conference Committee shall be present for the decision-making meeting. A quorum shall be a majority of the House Committee managers and a majority of the Senate Committee managers and shall include the lead House and Senate chair and majority of the chairs of the Conference Committee for their respective chamber.
- b. To report a measure out of Conference Committee in amended form, Conference Draft (CD), a majority of the quorum of managers for each respective chamber shall vote in favor of the proposed amendments.
- c. The lead chair (or the lead chair's designee) representing their respective chamber shall call the roll and be the recorder of the quorum and the votes on that measure for that chamber. (Sample attached).

- d. If, after naming a Conference Committee on a measure, the Conference Committee managers representing the chamber from which a measure originated agree to the amendments made by the non-originating chamber, only a quorum of those representing the originating chamber shall vote on the agreement at a duly noticed meeting. For example, if after naming a Conference Committee on a House measure, the House managers of the Conference Committee decide to agree to the amendments in the Senate draft (SD) of the measure, then only the House managers of the Conference Committee shall vote on the measure, returning it to the House in its SD form. For such action, only a quorum of the Conference Committee managers representing the chamber from which the measure originated need to be present. The "Record of Votes of a Conference Committee" sheet detailing the votes of the managers of the originating chamber shall be filed with the appropriate chamber without a Conference Committee Report.

10. Conference Committee Reports

- a. A majority of the House and Senate chairs, respectively, of a Conference Committee shall attest to the action of the Conference Committee by physically signing the Conference Committee Report on behalf of their respective managers; provided that no Conference Committee Report concerning a measure with fiscal implications shall be reported out of a Conference Committee without the physical signature of the chair (or the chair's designee) of each fiscal committee to which the measure is referred. The "Record of Votes of a Conference Committee" sheet detailing the votes of the managers of the Conference Committee shall be attached to the report as a part thereof.
- b. All House measures reported out of Conference Committee shall be filed with the House Chief Clerk, and likewise all Senate measures shall be filed with the Senate Chief Clerk. A document filed in the originating chamber shall be deemed simultaneously filed in the other chamber. Only the original Conference Committee Report, with the attached Record of Votes, and the Conference Draft of the measure shall be required for filing.
- c. If the Conference Committee votes to report the measure out, the Committee must file a Conference Committee Report and Conference Draft with the appropriate chamber's Chief Clerk.

11. Decision-making Deadlines

On the deadline nights for Final Decking of both non-fiscal and fiscal bills:

- a. Conference Committees shall conclude their negotiations by **6:00 p.m.** to allow adequate time for final preparation of the bills and Conference Committee Reports.
- b. To provide all chairs with ample opportunity to review and sign the Conference Committee Reports before filing, all Conference Committee Reports shall be available for review and signature by **9:00 p.m.**
- c. All Conference Committee Reports and Conference Drafts of measures shall be filed with the respective Chief Clerk by **11:30 p.m.**

12. Electronic Transfer

Should a Conference Committee for which the vehicle is a Senate bill decide to use a proposal drafted by the House, the House chair shall have the House proposal electronically transferred to the appropriate Senate office so that the Conference Draft can be prepared. The converse shall apply to House bills with proposals drafted by the Senate that the Conference Committee agrees to.

13. Exceptions to these Deadlines and Procedures

Exceptions to these deadlines and other procedures may be made only with the advance written approval of both the Senate President and the House Speaker.
