

THIRTY-FIRST DAY

Wednesday, March 15, 2023

The Senate of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2023, convened at 11:37 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present, with the exception of Senators Fukunaga and Ihara who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirtieth Day.

At this time, Senator Rhoads noted that the day marked Take Down Tobacco Day and that students from various schools and universities were visiting to observe the event. Seated in the gallery were students from Damien Memorial School, Highlands Intermediate School, Honoka'a High School, Kahuku High School, Kamehameha Schools Kapālama campus, Kamehameha Schools Hawai'i campus, Kaula High School, Leilehua High School, Mililani High School, Seabury Hall, and the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa.

Senator Gabbard introduced Fale Andrew Lesā, a city councilor for Auckland, New Zealand, who was present in the gallery. Senator Gabbard noted that Mr. Lesā had previously been a policy consultant for the Asian Development Bank and climate change specialist for UNESCO, and that his research on climate change had been published recently by Georgetown University. Senator Gabbard observed that Mr. Lesā is indigenous to Samoa.

Senator Chang introduced members of his staff who were seated in the gallery: intern Ella Matsui of the 9th Senatorial District, Kalani High School, and the Honolulu Youth Commission; and office manager Theresa Ng.

Senator Lee introduced Jen Wilbur, state director of Planned Parenthood and former longtime Capitol staffer, and other visitors from Planned Parenthood, who were present in the gallery.

Senator Kidani congratulated the Distinguished Principal, Outstanding Assistant Principal, Golden Key Librarian, Outstanding Library Services, and Counselor of the Year, and presented the following remarks:

"It is day three of our 2023 Education Week program, and I am eager to welcome our inspiring guests. The success of our students is a testament to the support they receive from their collective school community, and the awardees we are recognizing today demonstrate educational leadership in various capacities. From principals and assistant principals to librarians and counselors, their collective efforts are essential to establishing a healthy educational environment for students to thrive. To begin today's program, I would like to call upon the senator from District 17."

Senator Dela Cruz rose to present the following remarks:

"For our first Education Week presentation of the day, I would like to introduce the National Association of Elementary School Principals 2022 Hawai'i National Distinguished Principal, Aaron Tominaga.

"Each year, the District of Columbia Office of Overseas Schools and the U.S. Department of Defense Education Activity honors one principal from each state as the National Association of Elementary School Principals Principal of the Year winner. These educators are distinguished by their tremendous leadership, innovation, and dedication to their students, staff, and colleagues. Their guidance sets a foundation

of respect, inclusivity, safety, and kindness from which their community can thrive, making them invaluable in our schools.

"A dedicated Hawai'i DOE educator for 25 years, Principal Tominaga is currently in his fifth year as principal of Waipahu Elementary. In his role, he oversees a student body of 950 students; 95 percent are eligible for free and reduced-price meals, and nearly 50 percent of students are English-language learners. Principal Tominaga is credited with developing a comprehensive system to track and monitor English language arts and math progress to accelerate support for students. These needs are met through regular meetings between teachers and curriculum coaches, differentiated professional development for teachers, and classroom data sharing to track students' academic progress. This resulted in a significant decrease in at-risk students in both English language arts and math. In 2018, Principal Tominaga was a nominee for the Masayuki Tokioka Distinguished Principal Award. He is a passionate leader and a catalyst for change. His ability to unite students, staff, and teachers is truly remarkable and deserving of recognition.

"Colleagues, please join me in honoring the National Association of Elementary School Principals' 2022 Hawai'i National Distinguished Principal, Aaron Tominaga. I now return the floor back to the senator from Mililani."

Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

"Each year, the National Association of Elementary School Principals selects a cohort of assistant principals throughout the country to recognize in their National Outstanding Assistant Principal Program. The program is dedicated to promoting extraordinary educational leadership through their role as assistant principal. These educators are distinguished by their tremendous leadership, innovation, and dedication to their students, staff, and colleagues. I am honored to recognize, from my own district, the 2022 winner of the National Association of Elementary School Principals' National Outstanding Assistant Principal award, Stacy Kawamura.

"An educator of nearly 20 years, Ms. Kawamura served as vice principal of Waialeale Elementary for 7 years. She was instrumental in developing the school's national distinguished academy pathway, which began as an arts academy before expanding to include age-appropriate career and technical education courses aligned with Waipahu Complex's career readiness and establishing pathways to college. Ms. Kawamura helped establish Waialeale as the nation's first elementary academy pathway program, exposing primary school students to a variety of career opportunities and easing their transition to secondary schools. Ms. Kawamura now serves as the principal at Honowai Elementary, where she has led the school since May 2022.

"It is with great pride that we celebrate the National Association of Elementary School Principals' National Outstanding Assistant Principal awardee, Stacy Kawamura. I now yield the floor to the senator from District 13."

Senator Rhoads rose to present the following remarks:

"It is my pleasure to recognize Shelley Lau, the winner of the 2022 Hawai'i Association of School Librarians Golden Key Award. The Golden Key Award was established in 1979 to recognize a school librarian who has made significant professional contributions to the profession in Hawai'i and given notable service to the organization. Their mission aims to advocate excellence, facilitate change, develop and provide leaders in the school library media field through collaborative efforts, and to provide leaders and students with educational support and use of information technologies.

"The dedicated librarian of Aina Haina School since 2010, Ms. Lau previously served as the webmaster for Hawai'i Association of School Librarians, and taught online professional development courses on eBooks for Department of Education educators. Ms. Lau led numerous conferences, elevating the profession and uplifting her colleagues in the pursuit of educational excellence. She has been an invaluable resource who is committed to the profession, and is credited with nurturing and inspiring many school librarians throughout her illustrious career. An alumna of the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa Library & Information Science Program, she has also attended many of their courses to share insights about her role as an elementary school librarian and has offered her expertise as a cooperating librarian for students completing their school library practicum.

"It is a privilege to recognize Shelley Lau as the winner of the 2022 Hawai'i Association of School Librarians Golden Key Award. I now yield the floor to the senator from District 9. Mahalo."

Senator Chang rose to present the following remarks:

"I am honored to acknowledge another exceptional librarian whose commitment to education and remarkable leadership are deserving of recognition: the 2022 Outstanding Library Service awardee, Joanna Dunn—please stand.

"Formerly known as the Outstanding School Administrator Award, the Hawai'i Association of School Librarians' Outstanding Library Service Award recognizes an individual's role in developing successful school library programs in Hawai'i. Individuals may be legislators, community leaders, parent volunteers, teachers, business leaders, or retired educators in addition to school administrators. This award aims to broaden the spectrum of awardees who have made significant contributions to Hawai'i library services, literacy, and education.

"A public school educator of over 30 years, Dunn has dedicated her life to education. She has served Hawai'i's keiki for over three decades as a teacher, technology coordinator, and resource teacher. Throughout her teaching career, she has touched the lives of countless students at 'Aiea and Waipahu High Schools, Pope Elementary School, as well as the Office of Curriculum and Instructional Design. Committed to educational excellence and providing students with the best learning environment possible, Dunn has been the educational specialist for Library Media Services in the Office of Curriculum and Instructional Design for the past eight years. As such, she works to promote and support innovative school library media programs and services as a valuable resource for students and teachers.

"Colleagues, please join me in celebrating the 2022 Outstanding Library Service awardee, Joanna Dunn. I now turn the floor over to the senator from District 19."

Senator Aquino rose to present the following remarks:

"It is with great pride that I acknowledge an individual whose support for students is paramount: the American School Counselor Association's 2023 School Counselor of the Year, Shely Chang.

"The American School Counselor Association's School Counselor of the Year award recognizes counseling professionals in elementary, middle, and high schools throughout the United States for their devotion to the academic and career success of their students, as well as their social-emotional well-being. Honorees are selected on the basis of extensive criteria including the development of creative counseling innovations and programs, leadership skills, and contributions to academic improvement.

"Ms. Chang has been a dedicated school counselor at Ka'imiloa for the past 18 years. She is committed to promoting programs and activities focused on students' health and wellness, as well as the collective school community. She is a former Peer Mediator Advisory member and serves on the Ka'imiloa Student Council Advisory and Ho'okui after-school enrichment program. Ms. Chang is a member of both the American School Counselor Association and the Hawaii School Counselor Association, and her tremendous efforts helped Ka'imiloa receive RAMP recognition as a school who is committed to delivering comprehensive, data-informed school counseling programs aligned with the American School Counselor Association's National Model framework. Beyond the classroom, Ms. Chang helps to plan many school activities and events, gathering faculty, students, and their families for assemblies, career days, parent nights, and fall carnivals. She cares deeply about her school community and is passionate about nurturing and supporting her students.

"Please help me recognize our deserving School Counselor of the Year, Shely Chang. I now return the floor back to Senator Kidani."

Senator Kidani rose and stated:

"In addition to these extraordinary awardees, I would also like to recognize Principal Laura Ahn of Niu Valley Middle School, who was unable to join us here today. Principal Ahn received the prestigious Hawai'i Association of Secondary School Administrators' 2022 Hawai'i State Principal of the Year award. She helped to reset the culture at Niu Valley Middle School with a focus on professional development and systems dedicated to student success. Her efforts have uplifted the students, faculty, and staff, allowing the school community to truly thrive. Senate President, may I request that her name be entered into the Senate Journal along with the other awardees today? (The Chair so ordered.)

"Colleagues, today's honorees demonstrate the transformative power of leadership in our educational community. Their support nurtures and empowers our young people, inspiring them to strive not only in their academic efforts, but to care for their mental and emotional health as well. These leaders are invaluable to our community, and I know we are all deeply grateful for the work they do and their commitment to our keiki.

"I look forward to returning tomorrow to celebrate some of the exceptional student honorees joining us here for day four of our Education Week program. Senate President, I now yield back to you."

Information helps you to see that you're not alone. That there's somebody in Mississippi and somebody in Tokyo who all have wept, who've all longed and lost, who've all been happy. So the library helps you to see, not only that you are not alone, but that you're not really any different from everyone else. There may be details that are different, but a human being is a human being.
