### ACT 073 S.B. NO.<sup>840</sup> H.D. 1

### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO KIKALA-KEOKEA.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 The legislature finds that the destruction of SECTION 1. 2 Kalapana by lava flow displaced a tightly knit community with a 3 truly Hawaiian lifestyle. In 1938, the United States Congress enacted, the Kalapana Extension Act (16 U.S.C. 396a), providing 4 that native Hawaiian residents of the area were to be provided 5 with leases for homesites and that fishing was to be permitted 6 7 only by native Hawaiian residents of the area or adjacent 8 villages, and by visitors under their guidance.

9 The continuation of the unique way of life of the Hawaiian
10 residents of Kalapana was disrupted by volcanic eruptions and
11 lava flows that began on January 3, 1983, destroying one of the
12 last Hawaiian settlements on the island of Hawaii.

13 The legislature recognized this tragedy by enacting Act 14 314, Session Laws of Hawaii 1991, as amended (Act 314), 15 authorizing the department of land and natural resources to 16 negotiate long-term leases with qualified, displaced Kalapana 17 families to maintain their heritage in the Kikala-Keokea

homestead area adjacent to Kalapana-Kapoho beach road. The site
allows the Kalapana families to develop the land in a manner
that will enable them to continue their traditional way of life
by raising small animals, planting sustenance crops, growing
herbal medicines and gathering additional food resources from
the nearby ocean and uplands.

7 Act 314 also stipulated that the department of land and 8 natural resources or its designated agency subdivide and create 9 a residential subdivision in the Kikala-Keokea homestead area 10 that will be exempt from all statutes, ordinances, charter 11 provisions, and rules of any governmental agency relating to 12 zoning and construction standards for subdivisions, the 13 development and improvement of land, and the construction of 14 units thereon; provided that it meets the minimum requirements 15 of health and safety.

Prior to the expiration of Act 314, the department of land and natural resources entered into lease arrangements with forty-eight families who met the eligibility criteria set forth under the Act. However, there are nineteen remaining lots which were not leased prior to the expiration of Act 314.

21 The purpose of this Act is to authorize the department of 22 land and natural resources, subject to specific criteria and

2	nineteen	lots at Kikala-Keokea.
3	SECT	FION 2. The department of land and natural resources
4	may negot	iate and enter into long-term leases of sixty-five
5	years in	duration, subject to renewal by mutual agreement, with
6	persons w	who have attained the age of eighteen years, and meet
7	the following criteria:	
8	(1)	Residents of Kalapana who have been living in Kalapana
9		continuously for not less than six months at the time
10		of their application;
11	(2)	Previous residents of Kalapana who resided within
12		Kalapana continuously for not less than six months; or
13	(3)	Descendants of those residents of Kalapana who were
14		dispossessed or displaced as a result of the volcanic
15		eruptions on the island of Hawaii that began on
16		January 3, 1983.
17	SECT	ION 3. In awarding a lease to a person meeting the
18	eligibility requirements of section 2 of this Act, the	
19	department of land and natural resources shall give priority to	
20	the following:

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1	(1)	Persons who were previously awarded a lease under Act
2		314, Session Laws of Hawaii 1991, but did not execute
3		a lease;
4	(2)	Persons who were dispossessed or displaced as a result
5		of the volcanic eruptions on the island of Hawaii that
6		began on January 3, 1983, who do not have any other
7		residential property interest;
8	(3)	Persons who have no immediate family members who have
9		executed a lease under this Act or under Act 314,
10		Session Laws of Hawaii 1991;
11	(4)	Persons who have not executed a lease under this Act
12		or under Act 314, Session Laws of Hawaii 1991; and
13	(5)	Heirs of a person who was eligible for a lease under
14		section 2 of Act 314, Session Laws of Hawaii 1991.
15	For t	the purpose of this Act:
16	"Hein	rs" includes persons, including a surviving spouse or
17	reciprocal	l beneficiary, who are entitled under the statutes of
18	intestate	succession to the property of a decedent.
19	" Imme	ediate family members" includes grandparents, parents,
20	siblings,	spouse, reciprocal beneficiaries, children, and legal
21	guardians.

1	SECTION 4. The lands eligible for long-term residential		
2	lease negotiation under this Act are limited to those lands		
3	described in section 3 of Act 314, Session Laws of Hawaii 1991,		
4	for which a lease was not executed prior to the expiration of		
5	Act 314, Session Laws of Hawaii 1991.		
6	SECTION 5. Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary,		
7	including chapter 171, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the department		
8	of land and natural resources may negotiate and enter into lease		
9	agreements in accordance with the provisions and limitations of		
10	this Act; provided that the authority to initially execute a		
11	lease agreement granted by this Act shall expire:		
12	(1) When all nineteen leases have been negotiated and		
13	recorded in the bureau of conveyances for all parcels		
14	meeting the criteria in this Act; or		
15	(2) One year after the effective date of this Act;		
16	whichever comes first.		
17	SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
