A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that recruitment and retention of qualified teachers for Hawaii's public schools 2 continues to be a challenge for Hawaii's department of education 3 and charter schools, as well as the teacher education community. 4 5 The University of Hawaii's college of education plays a major role in the education of future teachers, continued professional 6 development of educators, and programs that lead to licensing, 7 8 certificate programs, mentoring of teachers, educational research, and policy studies. 9 The legislature further finds that the strategic plan of 10 11 the University of Hawaii at Manoa calls for an ongoing 12 commitment to public education in Hawaii.
- The legislature further finds that teachers have expressed
 great frustration with the implementation of and compliance with
 the No Child Left Behind Act. Since its enactment, there has
 been a significant amount of experience and analysis of the
 effectiveness of the No Child Left Behind Act approach to

. 1	assessments and standards. At the same time, many school
2	systems, including the Hawaii state department of education,
3	have sought to use nationally produced assessment instruments
4	that have not always met the needs of our communities. In fact,
5	our state, like many others, has not taken full advantage of the
6	flexibilities that are offered by federal law. It is also
7	apparent that referencing our standards requirements to a law
8	that may be modified or repealed may limit the State's options.
9	The legislature further finds that greater collaboration
10	between the University of Hawaii's many educational resources,
11	including the Hawaii educational policy center and the
12	department of education, will benefit all of Hawaii's students.
13	Specifically, this Act includes appropriations for the
14	following programs:
15	(1) Teacher education capacity (\$ for fiscal year
16	2007-2008, and \$ for fiscal year 2008-2009).
17	This appropriation for additional permanent positions
18	in the college of education allows the college to
19	accept more qualified students into teacher education
20	programs, thus increasing the number and quality of
21	locally trained teachers in shortage areas such as

1		mathematics, science, and, in keeping with the P-20
2		initiative, early childhood education;
3	(2)	Center on disability studies (\$ for fiscal year
4		2008-2009). The center on disability studies works
5		through training, research, and service to improve
6		quality of life for people with disabilities
7		throughout the state, and currently manages more than
8		eighty-eight faculty and staff members and fifty
9		projects with a budget of over \$15,000,000. To meet
10		federal grant requirements for institutional support,
11		the center requests two additional permanent faculty
12		positions. The center operates with only one general-
13		funded position. The additional positions will enable
14		the center to further expand its ability to obtain
15		additional grant funds and, therefore, its outreach to
16		the increasing numbers of persons with disabilities;
17	(3)	Funding for mentor teachers (\$ for fiscal year
18		2007-2008, and \$ for fiscal year 2008-2009).
19		Cooperating teachers/counselors and
20		observation/participating teachers in grades
21		kindergarten through twelve classrooms throughout the
22		state provide an essential service to the University

1		of hawaii coffege of education by supervising and
2		mentoring full-time student teachers and other
3		education practicum students in the field, as required
4		for licensure. Funding is requested to:
5		(A) More appropriately compensate mentor teachers for
6		the additional work they provide in developing
7		Hawaii's teacher workforce; and
8		(B) Put mentor compensation on par with other
9		institutions of higher learning in the state;
10	(4)	Funding for schools to apply to become professional
11		development schools (\$ for fiscal year 2007-2008,
12		and \$ for fiscal year 2008-2009). Schools may
13		compete for grants that address standards-based
14		learning, teacher preparation, and professional
15		development by placing faculty within the school to
16		work with future and current teachers;
17	(5)	Permanent special education faculty (\$ for fiscal
18		year 2008-2009). The State's need for more qualified
19		special education teachers is increasing. To fulfill
20		this need, the University of Hawaii college of
21		education requests funds to hire seven permanent
22		faculty and one full-time staff person in the special

1		education department. These positions are temporarily
2		being funded by the Hawaii department of education,
3		and if this funding were discontinued, it would
4		severely impact the college of education's ability to
5		produce qualified special education teachers;
6	(6)	Funding for the master of education in teaching
7		program, to be transferred from the department of
8		education to the University of Hawaii college of
9		education (\$ for fiscal year 2007-2008, and
10		\$ for fiscal year 2008-2009). The master of
11		education in teaching program is a two-year program
12		that includes two semesters of field experience in
13		grades kindergarten through twelve classroom settings.
14		During the fourth semester, teacher candidates work as
15		teacher interns, taking over a vacated department of
16		education teacher position and becoming the teachers
17		of record from January to the end of the department of
18		education calendar year. The college requests funds
19		to pay for the program's mentor teachers and to pay
20		for stipends to the student interns in both the
21		ongoing master of education in teaching program cohort

8	(F)	Promote the concept of a research cadre that will
9		be involved in development, documentation, and
10		dissemination of information about school
11		redesign, and contribute to a research database;
12		and promote and facilitate dialogue among various
13		school stakeholders with respect to the most
14		current research and understanding about school
15		redesign;
16	(G)	Foster communication among educators, decision
17		makers, and the greater community to advance
18		secondary school redesign; and
19	(H)	Assist schools in preparing grant applications to
20		advance redesign activities;
21 (8)	Cont	tinue to support the collaboration of the
22	Univ	versity of Hawaii college of education in filling

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1		the gap to produce highly qualified teachers. The
2		Teach for America program in Hawaii is a partnership
3		of the Hawaii department of education, the University
4		of Hawaii college of education, and the national Teach
5		for America program with support from the state
6		legislature, the governor's office, and private
7		foundations and corporations. The intent of the
8		program is to provide highly qualified teachers to
9		serve in high-poverty, high-need communities for
10		traditionally hard-to-fill areas such as mathematics,
11		science, and special education. These are areas that
12		the institutions of higher education in Hawaii have
13		been consistently unable to address. Teach for
14		America is currently recruiting teachers to fill
15		Hawaii vacancies. The college of education requests
16		funding to provide a masters of education in teaching
17		degree for newly-hired Teach for America teachers:
18		\$ for four positions for fiscal year 2007-2008,
19		and \$ for four positions for fiscal year 2008-
20		2009; and
21	(9)	Create a seamless career pathway from high school to

community college to completion of a baccalaureate

1	degree program, and prepare education assistants and
2	teachers to fill high-need areas. Leeward community
3	college and the University of Hawaii college of
4	education will work together to recruit, train, and
5	retain prospective education assistants,
6	paraprofessionals, and elementary and secondary
7	teachers by combining resources to reach out to
8	community members interested in pursuing a career in
9	education. Leeward community college will provide
10	education training resulting in an associate of arts
11	in teaching degree. The college of education will
12	accept Leeward community college associate of arts in
13	teaching degree holders into an upper division cohort
14	specially designed for associate of arts in teaching
15	graduates that will lead to state teacher licensure.
16	Courses will be delivered in Leeward communities
17	through face-to-face, distance learning, and/or hybrid
18	instruction. Leeward community college requests 2.5
19	FTE positions (\$ for fiscal year 2007-2008, and
20	\$ for fiscal year 2008-2009). The college of
21	education requests 3.0 FTE positions (\$ for

1	fiscal year 2007-2008, and \$ for fiscal year
2	2008-2009).
3	The legislature further finds that most reform efforts in
4	the United States have the benefit of a well-funded, independent
5	policy research institute to assist policy makers. The Hawaii
6	educational policy center, located at the University of Hawaii,
7	has provided valuable analysis in the past, but has not received
8	the financial commitment from the State to permit the level of
9	assistance needed by policymakers in the field of education.
10	In summary, the purpose of this Act is to provide funding
11	for key programs that will increase the capacity of the
12	University of Hawaii college of education to educate qualified
13	teachers, meet federal requirements for institutional support of
14	disability studies, and expand teacher professional development
15	and mentoring programs. This Act will also:
16	(1) Appropriate funds for the office of school redesign;
17	(2) Change the membership and reporting schedule of the
18	performance standards commission;
19	(3) Remove the reference to the No Child Left Behind Act
20	of 2001 and the grades currently being tested, in
21	anticipation of possible changes to the federal law;

1	(4)	Prov	ide for alternative assessments, including those

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- 1 provided that the board may review and modify the performance
- 2 standards, as the board deems necessary, to reflect the needs of
- 3 public school students and educational goals adopted by the

- 5 (b) The board shall appoint a performance standards review
- 6 commission, to be convened at the beginning of the 1997-1998
- 7 school year, and every four years thereafter, to assess the
- 8 effectiveness of the performance standards. The commission
- 9 shall include representatives of the Hawaii State Parent,
- 10 Teacher, Student Association; the Hawaii State Student Council;
- 11 the superintendent; the dean of the college of education of the
- 12 University of Hawaii; the executive director of the charter
- 13 schools administrative office; and the professional education
- 14 community. [The commission may request the assistance of such
- 15 department or school staff as may be necessary to facilitate its
- 16 review.] The commission shall be staffed by the Hawaii
- 17 educational policy center.
- 18 (c) The commission shall review the implementation of the
- 19 performance standards by the board and the schools to determine
- 20 whether the standards should be modified. In making this
- 21 determination, the commission shall seek public input by holding
- 22 public forums to discuss the implementation and effectiveness of



- 1 the performance standards. The commission shall submit a report
- 2 of its findings and recommendations regarding the effectiveness
- 3 of the standards and the need for modification of the standards
- 4 to the board and the legislature prior to the convening of the
- 5 1999 regular session. The board shall consider and implement
- 6 the modifications beginning with the 1999-2000 school year.
- 7 (d) Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the
- 8 department shall establish procedures and guidelines for, and
- 9 shall expand, its statewide assessment program to include norm-
- 10 referenced testing in the same grades as required by [the]
- 11 federal [No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 (Public Law 107 110)]
- 12 standards-based [assessment (grades 3 through 8 and one grade in
- 13 high school) in reading and math, using the most appropriate
- 14 nationally normed test.] assessments.
- 15 (e) The department shall work with the University of
- 16 Hawaii and other educational organizations to develop
- 17 alternative assessment tools, including the use of portfolios
- 18 that may be used as part of the University of Hawaii's admission
- 19 standards, performance-based assessments that provide
- 20 alternatives to the multiple-choice formats to schools and
- 21 students, and assessments that measure the academic growth of
- 22 students while at a school. The department and the University



of Hawaii shall report annually to the legislature on the 1 2 progress of the development of these alternatives." 3 SECTION 3. Section 304A-701, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows: 4 "[+]§304A-701[+] Hawaii educator loans; eligibility; 5 amounts[-]; forgiveness. (a) There is created the Hawaii 6 educator loan program to be administered by the University of 7 Hawaii, [to provide financial support to students who complete] 8 9 the purpose of which is to: 10 Provide recruitment incentives for students to enroll (1) in state-approved teacher education programs; and 11 Provide a retention incentive for teachers who have 12 (2) graduated from a state-approved teacher education 13 14 program and who agree to teach in the Hawaii public 15 school system. Eligibility shall be awarded by the university to students on a 16 17 competitive basis. 18 The amount [to be loaned to a student] of any recruitment incentive loan shall be determined by the board of 19 regents based on need for financial aid and proof of acceptance 20 into a state-approved teacher education program at the 21 university. The maximum amount of loans that a student may 22

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- 1 receive under [this] the Hawaii educator loan program shall be
- 2 an aggregate amount equivalent to tuition payments and costs of
- 3 textbooks and other instructional materials necessary to
- 4 complete a state-approved teacher education program.
- 5 (c) Any loan provided under this section shall be eligible
- 6 for loan forgiveness as provided under section 304A-702."
- 7 SECTION 4. Section 304A-702, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 8 amended by amending subsection (d) to read:
- 9 "(d) If a loan recipient subject to this section fails to
- 10 teach in the Hawaii public school system for a minimum of [ten]
- 11 six consecutive years from the loan recipient's original date of
- 12 employment with the department of education $[\tau]$ or a charter
- 13 school, excluding sabbatical and other forms of temporary leaves
- 14 of absence, then the loan recipient shall repay any remaining
- 15 loan balance at the rate of ten per cent simple interest."
- 16 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
- 17 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 18 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 and
- 19 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 20 year 2008-2009 for the University of Hawaii to carry out the
- 21 purposes of this Act, including the hiring of necessary staff;

19	SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of the general

21	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 and	
22	the same	sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal



- 1 year 2008-2009 for the operations of the teacher cadet program,
- 2 including recruitment, retention, training, and teacher support.
- 3 The sums appropriated shall be deposited into the Hawaii
- 4 teacher cadet program fund for the purposes of this Act;
- 5 provided that the Hawaii Alliance for Future Teachers match the
- 6 amounts as provided in section 302A-401.5, Hawaii Revised
- 7 Statutes.
- 8 SECTION 8. There is appropriated out of the general
- 9 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 10 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 and
- 11 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 12 year 2008-2009 for induction teacher mentoring for newly
- 13 licensed teachers and licensed teachers who are new to Hawaii
- 14 based on a fifteen-to-one teacher to mentor ratio.
- 15 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 16 of education for the purposes of this Act.
- 17 SECTION 9. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 18 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 19 SECTION 10. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2020.

Report Title:

Teacher Recruitment and Retention; Appropriation

Description:

Changes the membership and reporting schedule of the performance standards commission. Provides for alternative assessments, including those based on the academic growth of students. Clarifies the dual purposes of the Hawaii Educator Loan Program. Appropriates funds to the Hawaii Educational Policy Center. Appropriates funds for various programs to increase the capacity of the University of Hawaii (UH) College of Education to educate qualified teachers; meet federal requirements for institutional support of disability studies; and expand teacher professional development and mentoring. Appropriates funds for the Office of School Redesign. (HB1014 HD2)
