<u>H</u>.B. NO. <u>1221</u>

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AGRICULTURE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The cost of feed for livestock production in
- 2 Hawaii can comprise up to seventy per cent of total production
- 3 costs versus close to fifty per cent for mainland producers.
- 4 Within the past year, two egg farms and one dairy farm have gone
- 5 out of business due to production cost increases largely
- 6 attributed to the rising cost of feed for livestock animals.
- 7 Currently, another dairy farm and another egg farm are
- 8 threatened by closure. Such closures increase the State's
- 9 dependence on imported foods.
- 10 Closure of local dairies and egg farms also means that
- 11 children and adults throughout the State will no longer have the
- 12 option of selecting fresher, locally produced milk and eggs.
- 13 This Act will create a dairy and egg farm revitalization
- 14 and food security program to administer and disburse funds to
- 15 qualified dairy and egg farms who apply for and receive, if
- 16 properly documented, a reimbursement for up to fifty percent of
- 17 each farm's feed expenses. Feed expenses shall not include the

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- 1 cost of transportation to Hawaii. The maximum amount of feed
- 2 expenses for each farm shall not exceed fifty per cent of feed
- 3 expenditures incurred in 2006. This financial support will
- 4 serve a public purpose by enabling the dairy and egg industries
- 5 to stabilize their operating costs.
- 6 Milk and eggs provide essential nutritional needs to
- 7 consumers. The perishability of these food products make these
- 8 products susceptible to spoilage, which can cause food-borne
- 9 illnesses to the consuming public. Without these local
- 10 industries, all milk and eggs would need to be imported into the
- 11 State, incurring up to ten days of shipping before being offered
- 12 to the consumers. Increased shipping time decreases the
- 13 expected shelf life of fresh milk and eggs.
- 14 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
- 15 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$3,300,000, or so
- 16 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2008-2009, and
- 17 the sum of \$3,300,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for
- 18 fiscal year 2009-2010, to be disbursed to qualified producers of
- 19 milk and eggs for the cost of feed for dairy cows or egg laying
- 20 hens, and for the administrative costs of the program.
- The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 22 agriculture for the purposes of this Act.

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SECTION 3. As used in this Act: 1 "Administrative costs" means costs associated with 2 3 reviewing, approving and recording expenditures and completing any reporting requirements associated with the grant program. 4 "Administrative costs" shall not exceed .3 percent in any year 5 within the two year period. 6 "Qualified producer" means any individual or organization 7 that at the time of application for and disbursement of funds 8 under this Act is in the business of producing milk from a herd, 9 located in Hawaii, of not less than fifty cows, or producing 10 eggs from a flock, located in Hawaii, of not less than 3,000 11 12 birds. "Eggs" means chicken eggs, uncooked in shell. 13 "Milk" means the lacteal secretion, practically free from 14 colostrums, obtained by the milking of healthy cows normally 15 produced or marketed through the channels of the fluid milk 16 17 trade. SECTION 4. Funds shall be disbursed, subject to review and 18

approval after submittal of an application accompanied by

documentation of costs of animal feed for dairy cows or egg

21 laying hens.

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JUSTIFICATION SHEET

TITLE:

A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURE.

PURPOSE:

To create a dairy and egg farm revitalization and food security program.

MEANS:

General fund appropriation.

JUSTIFICATION:

There are currently five dairies and six egg farms of significant size, with combined gross annual revenues of \$26.4 million. These dairies and farms pay taxes, employ scores of individuals, provide open space for the public, and most importantly contribute to Hawaii's food security by providing a fresh, safe, and reliable source of food products. At the present time, there are two dairy farms and an egg farm threatened by closure, due primarily to the high cost of feed. Current costs relating to feed alone can comprise up to 70% of a dairy or egg farm's total production costs. During the past year, Hawaii has lost two egg farms and one dairy farm due to rapidly escalating production costs. Such closures increase the state's dependence on imported foods and threaten the state's ability to provide basic foods such as eggs and milk in the event of natural disasters or disruptions in transportation.

This program is to provide financial support through a reimbursement program for dairy and egg farmers in order to reduce the harmful impact of the high cost of feed. The support is for the cost of the feed only. Recipients of the subsidy will be required to identify and separate out

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the transportation component of the cost of feed. This program has been proposed for feed only in order that the support not discourage the development of an in-state animal feed producing industry.

The reimbursement has been established at 50% of an eligible dairy or egg farm's feed costs using 2006 as the baseline year. The percentage was established as a means to provide financial stability to the most producers at the lowest cost to the state. It is expected that the program will allow the remaining dairy and poultry farmers to sustain their operations.

Impact on the public: The program will cost
the State \$3.3 million each year for two
years.
