A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The spirit of internationalism has been the
- 2 foundation for a myriad of activities in business, government,
- 3 education, and culture, as well as personal ties between our
- 4 citizens and those from many other nations, especially the
- 5 Pacific-Asian region.
- 6 Establishing an office of international affairs will
- 7 strengthen these ties and the cooperative relationships between
- 8 the State and countries throughout the world. An office of
- 9 international affairs will coordinate the international
- 10 activities of the various state agencies to maximize the use of
- 11 resources and avoid duplication of efforts. The office will
- 12 coordinate and focus the State's international efforts, heighten
- 13 public awareness of the importance of Hawaii's role in the world
- 14 market, and propose new programs to achieve our international
- 15 goals.
- 16 The new global economy demands that we establish Hawaii as
- 17 a community of lifelong learners, where children build a strong
- foundation in internationalism during the K-12 years, and where HB1547 HD1 HMS 2007-1978



- 1 flexible, responsive, and continuing education and training are
- 2 available to meet the challenges of the global economy and are
- 3 available to all of Hawaii's adults.
- 4 However, little effort has been made to bring resources,
- 5 plans, and programs together and in line with any form of a
- 6 larger vision for Hawaii, within the context of a rapidly
- 7 globalizing world. Globalization refers to the increasing
- 8 integration of economies and societies around the world, enabled
- 9 by human innovation and technological progress. It has set in
- 10 motion the means by which goods, services, ideas, and capital
- 11 can flow relatively freely across national borders. It has not
- 12 only enabled new types of activity, but it has also empowered
- 13 individuals and small businesses to undertake economic activity
- 14 that previously was reserved for large multinational firms.
- 15 While it has increased a whole range of opportunities for those
- 16 with minimum means, ability, and willingness to participate in
- 17 this new global economy, it has also created major challenges.
- 18 For young people graduating from high school or college, this
- 19 means that they now have to compete for jobs globally.
- The legislature recognizes that to advance global
- 21 competitiveness through education, there needs to be
- 22 coordination among the State, counties, educational

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- 1 institutions, and private agencies on international affairs, as
- 2 well as a central point of accountability and a leveraging of
- 3 resources.
- 4 Section 201-17, Hawaii Revised Statutes, established the
- 5 office of international affairs to carry out various
- 6 international responsibilities and duties, but left out
- 7 education and training as a means to prepare Hawaii for a
- 8 globalized world. It also did not specify that the office of
- 9 international affairs would be the coordinator on international
- 10 matters for the State. And finally, it did not provide funding
- 11 for the office to carry out its broad mandate. This Act
- 12 remedies those problems.
- Besides citizen ambassadors of goodwill, the governor and
- 14 legislators are often called upon to represent the State in
- 15 receiving diplomats and foreign dignitaries. Diplomacy and the
- 16 ability of lawmakers to properly receive foreign dignitaries
- 17 help to develop international relations with other countries. A
- 18 protocol fund is necessary to help legislators properly receive
- 19 diplomats and foreign dignitaries in developing better relations
- 20 with other countries.
- 21 There are a number of factors, including our location,
- 22 multicultural and ethnic population, and an environment

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1	conducive	to discussion and negotiation, that support Hawaii as
2	a center i	for international conferences. In addition, Hawaii is
3	currently	facing a transportation crisis and is in dire need of
4	exploring	transportation options and learning from other
5	countries	the best practices in this field. An international
6	symposium	on freeways and tollways will bring together freeway
7	and tollwa	ay operators, transportation practitioners and
8	researchei	es specializing in freeway, HOV, and tollway
9	operations	s. The objectives of the symposium are to:
10	(1)	Research the practice of freeway and tollway
11		operations;
12	(2)	Discuss the status of public-private partnerships in
13		<pre>freeway development;</pre>
14	(3)	Identify innovative strategies and techniques to
15		improve the proactive management and control of
16		traffic on highways and freeways; and
17	(4)	Explore the potential benefits of using managed lanes
18		tolling or road pricing technologies, and other

- 3 The purpose of this Act is to:
- 4 (1) Expand the duties of the office of international
- 5 affairs to play a critical and needed role in
- fostering, coordinating, and creating international
- 7 programs and policies to improve and enhance the
- 8 State's role in international affairs;
- 9 (2) Expand the role of the office of international affairs
- 10 to include the facilitation, coordination, and
- promotion of educational relationships and exchanges
- with other countries through collaboration with and
- funding of existing international programs and
- 14 organizations;
- 15 (3) Clarify the office's position as the central point of
- accountability in international affairs;
- 17 (4) Establish a legislative protocol fund; and
- 18 (5) Bring the Second International Symposium on Freeways
- and Tollways to Hawaii in 2009.
- 20 SECTION 2. Chapter 21, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended
- 21 by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to
- 22 read as follows:

2	affairs.	(a) There is established a legislative protocol fund
3	to be adm	inistered by the legislature.
4	(b)	Appropriations made by the legislature shall be
5	deposited	into the fund.
6	<u>(c)</u>	The fund shall be used to entertain and provide gifts
7	to visiti	ng international dignitaries and government officials."
8	SECT	ION 3. Section 201-17, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
9	amended t	o read as follows:

12	of busine	ss, economic development, and tourism, an office of
13	internati	onal affairs.
14	(b)	The office shall:
15	(1)	Develop policies that promote and strengthen relations
16		with other countries in the areas of international
17		business, economy, culture, education, and the arts;
18	(2)	Develop policies that promote transportation between,
19		and tourism with, other countries;
20	(3)	Develop and promote international telecommunications
21		and high technology exchanges;

1	(4)	Encourage the development of international sister-city
2		programs, pairing Hawaii cities with cities around the
3		globe for artistic, cultural, economic, educational,
4		and faith-based exchanges;
5	(5)	Develop and promote Hawaii as the economic, trade,
6		commerce, transportation, banking, [and] tourism,
7		regional headquarters, and international conferences
8		hub of the [Pacific; Asia-Pacific region;
9	(6)	Develop an international affairs and peace education
10		curriculum that includes studies of international
11		affairs and peace initiatives and takes a proactive,
12		strategic approach to the development of policies that
13		promote the prevention of national and international
14		conflict, nonviolent intervention, mediation, peaceful
15		resolution of conflict, and structured mediation of
16		conflict; [and]
17	(7)	Provide for exchanges of individuals between Hawaii
18		and other nations to develop international and peace-
19		based initiatives [+];
20	(8)	Be the State's central point of contact and
21		accountability in international affairs and serve as

the State's advocate for a global orientation;

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1	<u>(9)</u>	Inventory existing international programs and develop
2		a web-based information portal to make this
3		information available to the public;
4	(10)	Encourage the attraction of international conferences
5		to be held in Hawaii;
6	(11)	Encourage the development of international programming
7		and content on local radio shows and a dedicated
8		public access channel for international programs and
9		issues;
10	(12)	Facilitate an international educational links program
11		by increasing collaboration and coordination of
12		international, educational, business, and community
13		organizations and providing funding for activities
. 14		that shall include but not be limited to:
15		(A) School excursions from Asia to Hawaii schools,
16		targeting middle and high-school students from
17		Japan, Taiwan, Korea, Philippines, and China with
18		special focus on Hawaii's sister-states, using the
19		department of business, economic development, and
20		tourism and its overseas offices to market school
21		excursions to Hawaii and match these overseas
22		school visits with Hawaii schools;

1		(B)	Study abroad programs, targeting middle and high-
2			school students from Hawaii's schools, using the
3			department's overseas offices and focusing on
4			Hawaii's sister-states that match Hawaii schools
5			with overseas schools for school-to-school visits
6			and hosting. The office shall fund, and
7			encourage funding sources both public and private
8			to help finance the studies abroad; and
9		<u>(C)</u>	Teacher exchange programs through which teachers
10			from Hawaii and abroad exchange a period of time
11			in teaching. The office shall fund and encourage
12			funding sources both public and private to help
13			finance teaching abroad;
14		<u>and</u>	
15	(13)	<u>Faci</u>	litate an international leaders program by
16		<u>faci</u>	litating the collaboration and coordination of
17		inte	rnational, educational, business, and community
18		orga	nizations and funding activities that shall
19		incl	ude but not be limited to:
20		<u>(A)</u>	International conferences for high-school
21			students involving international organizations

1		such as the East West Center and the Pacific		
2		Asian Affairs Council;		
3	(B)	Adopt-a-school programs partnering international		
4		companies and organizations schools for cultural		
5		and educational enrichment; and		
6	<u>(C)</u>	School competitions to become a high-school		
7		fellow at international agencies' programs.		
8	[(c) Notw	rithstanding any other law to the contrary, if any		
9	of the respons	ibilities or duties of the office of international		
10	affairs under	this section overlap with the responsibilities or		
11	duties of anot	her agency or authority under this chapter, the		
12	office of inte	rnational affairs shall have exclusive		
13	jurisdiction a	nd authority over those responsibilities and		
14	duties.]"			
15	SECTION 4	. There is appropriated out of the general		
16	revenues of th	e State of Hawaii the sum of \$531,000 or so much		
17	thereof as may	be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 and the		
18	sum of \$518,00	O or so much thereof as may be necessary fiscal		
19	year 2008-2009	for the hiring of an executive director and		
20	administrative assistant for the office of international affair			
21	and for operating and program expenses.

- 1 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 2 of business, economic development, and tourism for the purposes
- 3 of this Act.
- 4 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
- 5 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$50,000 or so much
- $\mathbf{6}$ thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 to bring
- 7 the Second International Symposium on Freeway and Tollway
- 8 Operations to Hawaii in 2009 and to begin preliminary planning
- 9 for the 2009 conference.
- 10 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the University of
- 11 Hawaii at Manoa, college of engineering, for the purposes of
- 12 this Act.
- 13 SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 14 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 15 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2007.
