A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FIRE SAFETY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- SECTION 1. Wildland-urban interface areas exist wherever 1
- 2 residential, industrial, commercial, or agricultural structures
- 3 are located within or adjacent to trees or other combustible
- 4 vegetation. Wildfires that have the potential to involve
- 5 buildings and wildland vegetation simultaneously are known as
- interface fires. As in many other locations around the world,
- the threat of interface fires and the economic and social impact 7
- 8 they cause is increasing in the state. Wildland-urban interface
- 9 fires present a unique set of challenges and obstacles that must
- 10 be addressed through practical, proactive, community-based
- 11 solutions.
- 12 The purpose of this Act is to require the state fire
- 13 council to set forth statewide fire protection requirements to
- 14 protect against wildland fires that may threaten lives, homes,
- 15 and businesses.
- 16 SECTION 2. Section 132-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 17 amended to read as follows:

1	"§132-3 Adoption of state fire code. (a) The state fire
2	council shall, after public hearings pursuant to chapter 91,
3	adopt prior to July 1, 1979, a state fire code setting forth
4	minimum requirements relative to the protection of persons and
5	property from fire loss. The state fire council shall meet
6	annually to review and amend the state fire code. The state
7	fire code shall set forth minimum requirements relative to the
8	protection of persons and property from fire loss, including
9	without limitation:
10	(1) [the storage, Storing, handling, and [use of] using
11	hazardous substances, materials, and devices; [and]
12	(2) [the control of] Controlling conditions hazardous to
13	life or property in the design, use, or occupancy of
14	buildings and premises $[\div]$:
15	(3) Safeguarding life and property from wildland fires and
16	related fire hazards;
17	(4) Preventing wildland fires and alleviating fire hazards
18	in wildland-urban interface areas;
19	(5) Identifying wildland-urban interface areas and
20	requirements for fire evacuation routes and community
21	alert systems;

1	(6) Identifying defensible spaces in wildland-urban
2	interface areas; and
3	(7) Assessing treatment programs to determine the
4	effectiveness of those programs in meeting prevention
5 .	objectives.
6	(b) The state fire code, insofar as is practicable, shall
7	complement, augment, and be consistent in form and language with
8	the building and other codes of the respective counties. Upon
9	adoption by the state fire council, the state fire code shall be
10	transmitted to the respective county councils which [may,]
11	shall, by ordinance, either enact its provisions or enact more
12	stringent provisions relating to protection of persons and
13	property against fire loss; provided that the county councils
14	may enact less stringent provisions with the prior written
15	approval of the state fire council. [The state fire council
16	shall meet annually to review and amend the state fire code.
17	(c) As used in this section, "wildland-urban interface
18	area" means a geographical area where urban structures,
19	including but not limited to residential, commercial, and
20	industrial structures, meet or intermingle with federal, state,
21	or other public or private lands that are undeveloped, other
22	than by transportation or utility infrastructure."

8	section 1	32-3, the state fire council shall serve as a focal
9	point thr	ough which all applications to the federal government
10	for feder	al grant assistance for fire-related projects shall be
11	made. Up	on the receipt of any such federal grants, the state
12	fire coun	cil shall administer those federal grants.
13	(c)	The state fire council may also:
14	(1)	Appoint advisory committees comprised of
15		representatives from each county fire department to
16		assist in drafting the state fire code and
17		coordinating statewide training, data collection, and
18		contingency planning needs for firefighters; and
19	(2)	Advise and assist the county fire departments where
20		appropriate, may prescribe standard procedures and
21		forms relating to inspections, investigations, and
22		reporting of fires, and may approve plans for

1	cooperation among the county fire departments[, and
2	may advise].
3	(d) The state fire council shall issue an annual report
4	and provide proposed legislation and recommendations for
5	appropriations to the governor and the legislature [with respect
6	to fire] by December 31 of each year. The report shall include:
7	(1) Fire prevention and protection[, life]
8	recommendations;
9	(2) Life safety[, and any] recommendations;
10	(3) Any other functions or activities for which the
11	various county fire departments are generally
12	responsible[+]; and
13	(4) A record of any federal grants applied for, received,
14	or expended."
15	SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
16	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
17	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
