A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I
2	SECTION 1. (a) The early learning educational task force,
3	established by Act 259, Session Laws of Hawaii 2006, was
4	assigned the following task:
5	The task force shall develop a five-year plan with
6	annual increments for a coherent, comprehensive, and
7	sustainable early learning system that shall ensure a
8	continuum of quality early learning opportunities for
9	young children in the State from birth up to age five,
10	and which maximizes public and private resources.
11	Among the guiding principles for the design of an early
12	system is the following statement regarding workforce
13	development:
14	Skilled and knowledgeable early care and education
15	practitioners are an essential key to quality; they
16	must have access to education and training
17	opportunities and receive equitable compensation and
18	opportunities to succeed.

1	The	task force noted five key elements to proactively
2	increase	early educator capacity, namely:
3	(1)	Expand the availability and reach of scholarship, with
4		state-funded financial aid, to support early educators
5		in completing college degrees and early childhood
6		education-related coursework;
7	(2)	Expand distance learning options for all early
8		educators;
9	(3)	Expand offerings of early childhood education-related
10		college courses and community-based training to meet
11		the needs of early educators and junior kindergarten
12		teachers who are currently in the work force;
13	(4)	Establish a mentoring and coaching program, in
14		conjunction with early learning programs, to improve
15		quality in early childhood programs statewide,
16		starting with a focus on programs for four-year-olds;
17		and
18	(5)	Establish a recruitment and retention initiative to
19		attract new entrants to the early childhood field,
20		encourage practitioners to improve their
21		qualifications, and entice highly-qualified early

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              educators to remain in Hawaii's early learning
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              community.
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         (b)
              The legislature finds that an effective incentive
    program can be designed based on the model used for the annual
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    incentive pay that is awarded licensed teachers who receive
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    national certification.
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         The legislature also finds that according to a 2006 junior
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    kindergarten pilot program evaluation report commissioned by the
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    Hawaii educational policy center, additional funding is needed
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    for junior kindergarten to enhance professional development,
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    modify classroom environments, and assure appropriate student
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    teacher ratios according to national standards. These provisions
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    would further support the intent of Act 219, Session Laws of

    Hawaii 2004, to offer a quality educational program to those
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    four-year-old children born after August 1 and before December
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    31, who are ineligible to enter kindergarten.
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         The legislature also finds that there is an insufficient
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    supply of classrooms for early childhood programs statewide and
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    that the pre-plus initiative successfully constructed an
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    additional seventeen early childhood classrooms that will serve
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    over three hundred fifty disadvantaged children.
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The purposes of this Act are to:

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1	(1)	Enhance t	he quality of early education programs
2		serving t	hree- and four-year-old children by:
3		(A) Esta	blishing an early educator incentive program
4		to:	
5		(i)	Support the professional development and
6			licensure of early childhood educators and
7			administrators in the private sector;
8		(ii)	Encourage better program alignment between
9			private preschool programs operating on
10			public elementary campuses and the
11			elementary school program;
12		(iii)	Provide wage subsidies for licensed private
13			early childhood educators to continue their
14			employment in a preschool aligned with a
15			public elementary school for a minimum of
16			three years; and
17	(2)	Enhance t	he quality of the junior kindergarten program
18		by:	
19		(A)	Reducing the student-to-teacher ratio per
20			four-year-old classroom to meet national
21			standards;

1		(B) Providing for developmentally appropriate						
2		classroom equipment and materials;						
3		(C) Providing for the professional development						
4		of junior kindergarten administrators and						
5		educators; and						
6	(3)	Increasing the offering of college coursework to the						
7	early childhood education workforce by funding							
8	additional online and distance learning courses; and							
9	(4) Increasing the supply of suitable early childhood							
10		facilities located on public elementary campuses						
11		through the continuation of the pre-plus classroom						
12		construction initiative.						
13		PART II						
14	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is						
15	amended by adding two new sections to be appropriately							
16	designated and to read as follows:							
17	" <u>§</u> 302	2A - Early educator incentive program. There is						
18	establishe	ed an early educator incentive program that shall be						
19	administered through a qualified nonprofit organization awarded							
20	through a competitive process. The department of education							
21	shall award a nonprofit organization a contract to administer a							
22	program with the following characteristics:							
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1	(1)	The administrator shall create a competitive award					
2		system for early education schools that are willing to					
3		participate in the incentive program and become					
4		aligned with a public school;					
5	(2)	Early education schools may receive up to \$					
6		per designated employee per year for the following:					
7		(A) Designation of one or more employees who do not					
8		yet have a license recognized by the Hawaii					
9		teacher standards board to teach in a Hawaii					
10		public school, who agree to complete a prescribed					
11		program of state-approved professional					
12		development courses leading to licensure in					
13		elementary education with an early childhood					
14		endorsement, and who further agree to continue to					
15		be employed in a early education workforce					
16		incentive program preschool, or aligned public					
17		elementary schools for no less than three years					
18		following the receipt of a license; and					
19		(B) Costs for the professional development of the					
20		designated employee or employees and pay for a					
21		wage subsidy of up to \$ per employee for					
22		up to five years following receipt of a license;					

1	(C)	Development of a memorandum of agreement with a
2		department or public charter school to develop a
3		collaborative and seamless educational plan that
4		would maximize continuity between the child's
5		early education and public school learning
6		environment and curriculum;
7	<u>(D)</u>	Provision for the part-time assignment of the
8		early education employee in the public school as
9		an assistant to the regular teaching faculty; and
10	<u>(E)</u>	Creation of opportunities for the movement of
11		participating personnel with the children as they
12		move from the pre-school to the public school to
13		minimize disruptions and maximize the readiness
14		of children to enter public school, and the
15		readiness of the schools to receive them.
16	<u>§302A</u> −	Early childhood education facilities;
17	identifying si	tes; inspections. (a) The department shall
18	identify unuse	d public school land or facilities for use by
19	state early ch	ildhood education programs. Suitable empty
20	classrooms, as	determined by the department, shall be prepared
21	and utilized f	or state early childhood education programs;
22	provided that	the classrooms meet the licensing standards
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    determined by the departments of education and human services.
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    Priority shall be given to land or facilities on sites with
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    sufficient space for three or more classrooms.
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         (b) The department shall assist in the identification of
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    possible construction sites for the development of pre-plus
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    facilities.
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         (c) All early education program facilities shall be open
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    at all times to visitation and inspection by representatives of
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    the departments of education, human services, and health, and by
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    designated representatives of the respective county fire
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    departments.
              The department may adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91
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    to effectuate this section."
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                                 PART III
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         SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
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    revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of $ , or so much
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    thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, and the
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    same sum of $
                       , or so much thereof as may be necessary for
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    fiscal year 2008-2009, for the early educator incentive program.
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         SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
    revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of $ , or so much
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    thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, and the
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- 1 same sum of \$, or so much thereof as may be necessary for
- 2 fiscal year 2008-2009, for the junior kindergarten faculty and
- 3 professional development and classroom materials; provided that
- 4 the ratio of students to facility shall not be greater than
- 5 national standards for student age levels.
- 6 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
- 7 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$, or so much
- 8 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, and the
- 9 same sum, or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 10 2008-2009, for additional early education courses for teachers.
- 11 SECTION 6. The sums appropriated in sections 3 to 5 shall
- 12 be expended by the department of education for the purposes of
- 13 this Act.
- 14 PART IV
- 15 SECTION 7. The director of finance is authorized to issue
- 16 general obligation bonds in the sum of \$, or so much
- 17 thereof as may be necessary, and the same sum, or so much
- 18 thereof as may be necessary, is appropriated for fiscal year
- 19 2007-2008, for the plans, design, and construction of additional
- 20 schools as part of the pre-plus initiative.
- The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 22 education for the purposes of this Act.



1	SECTION	8.	The	appropriation	made	for	the	capital

- 2 improvement project authorized in section 7 shall not lapse at
- 3 the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made;
- 4 provided that all money from the appropriation is unencumbered
- 5 as of June 30, 2011, shall lapse of that date.
- 6 SECTION 9. New statutory material is underscored.
- 7 SECTION 10. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2007.
