A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I
2	SECTION 1. (a) The legislature recognizes that a
3	coherent, comprehensive, and sustainable early learning system
4	is necessary to promote the healthy development and school
5	readiness of Hawaii's young children from birth to age five. An
6	early learning system is the prerequisite for the fulfillment of
7	Act 51, Session Laws of 2004, the purpose of which is to provide
8	a road map for public education to guide and prepare our
9	children to take on their civil roles in society. The early
10	learning system should involve high-quality, public and private
11	programs that are responsive to the cultural needs and diversity
12	unique to Hawaii.
13	The legislature finds that significant milestones have
14	already been achieved thus far in the promotion of young
15	children's development and school readiness through both public
16	and private efforts. More recent efforts include:
17	(1) Act 259, Session Laws of Hawaii 2006, the four-fold
18	purpose of which included:

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1		(A) The establishment of an early learning
2		educational task force to develop a plan for an
3		early learning system;
4		(B) The enhancement of junior kindergarten services;
5		(C) The expansion of head start program services; and
6		(D) The expansion of the department of education's
7		families for R.E.A.L. parent-child interaction
8		program;
9	(2)	Act 219, Session Laws of Hawaii 2004, which
10		established a junior kindergarten in public elementary
11		schools, the intent of which was to implement a
12		flexible, developmentally-appropriate program for
13		children who are ineligible for kindergarten;
14	(3)	Act 13, Session Laws of Hawaii 2002, with which the
15		State adopted the definition of school readiness as,
16		"young children are ready to have successful learning
17		experiences in school when there is a positive
18		interaction among the child's developmental
19		characteristics, school practices, and family and
20		community support." This definition later spearheaded
21		the development of the Hawaii preschool content

standards with accompanying family and community

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1		guidelines, and the Hawaii state kindergarten
2		readiness assessment and transition to kindergarten
3		protocols;
4	(4)	The establishment of the pre-plus initiative in 2002
5		to finance the development of preschool classroom
6		facilities on public elementary school campuses, thus
7		increasing the availability of early education
8		opportunities for four-year-old children with high
9		needs; and
10	(5)	Act 77, Session Laws of Hawaii 1997, which established
11		the interdepartmental council, four county-level
12		community councils, and a corporation to facilitate
13		the implementation of a coordinated system of early
14		childhood education and care services.
15	Howe	ver, the legislature finds that clarification of the
16	following	terms remains necessary:
17	(1)	"Early childhood education", which currently means
18		programs designed to support young children's healthy
19		development and learning and success in school,
20		through developmentally-appropriate and culturally-
21		responsive instructional practices that adhere to the

quality components of standards, curriculum,

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1		assessments, and transitions. Programs may include
2		both center-based preschools as well as family-child
3		interaction learning models; and
4	(2)	"Child care", which currently means the supervision
5		and responsibility for the well-being of a child over
6		a period of time.
7	(b)	The legislature also finds that, according to an
8	interim r	eport submitted by the early learning educational task
9	force, sk	illed and knowledgeable early childhood education and
10	care prac	titioners are an essential key to quality. But to be
11	able to s	ucceed, practitioners must have access to education and
12	training	opportunities and receive equitable compensation and
13	opportuni	ties.
14	The	task force noted five key elements to proactively
15	increase	early educator capacity, as follows:
16	(1)	Expand the availability and reach of scholarship, with
17		state-funded financial aid, to support early childhood
18		educators in completing college degrees and early
19		childhood education-related coursework;
20	(2)	Expand distance learning options for all early
21		childhood educators;

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(3) Expand offerings of early childhood education-related
	college courses and community-based training to meet
	the needs of early childhood educators, junior
	kindergarten teachers, and kindergarten teachers who
	are currently in the workforce;

- (4) Establish a mentoring and coaching program, in conjunction with early learning programs, to improve quality in early childhood programs statewide, beginning with a focus on programs for four-year-olds; and
- 11 (5) Establish a recruitment and retention initiative to

 12 attract new entrants to the early childhood field,

 13 encourage practitioners to improve their

 14 qualifications, and entice highly-qualified early

 15 childhood educators to remain in Hawaii's early

 16 learning community.

The legislature finds that an effective incentive program can be designed based on the model used for the annual incentive pay awarded to licensed teachers who receive national board certification.

(c) The legislature finds that according to a 2006 juniorkindergarten pilot program evaluation report commissioned by the

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- 1 Hawaii educational policy center, additional funding is needed
- 2 for junior kindergarten to enhance professional development,
- 3 modify classroom environments, and assure appropriate student-
- 4 to-teacher ratios according to national standards. These
- 5 provisions would further the intent of Act 219, Session Laws of
- 6 Hawaii 2004, to offer a quality educational program to four-
- 7 year-old children born after August 1 and before December 31,
- 8 who are ineligible to enter kindergarten.
- 9 (d) The pre-plus initiative successfully constructed an
- 10 additional seventeen early childhood classrooms that can serve
- 11 over three hundred fifty children with high needs. However, the
- 12 legislature finds that there is still an insufficient supply of
- 13 classrooms for early childhood programs statewide.
- 14 (e) Therefore, the purpose of this Act is to:
- 15 (1) Enhance the supply and quality of early childhood
- 16 education programs that serve three- and four-year-old
- children on public school campuses by establishing an
- 18 early childhood educator incentive program to, among
- other things:
- 20 (A) Support the licensure and professional
- 21 development of early childhood educators and
- administrators in the private sector;

1		(B)	Provi	ide wage subsidies for private early
2			chil	dhood educators who do not have a teaching
3			lice	nse recognized by the Hawaii teacher
4			stand	dards board but are working toward licensure;
5			and	
6 ,		(C)	Enco	urage better program alignment and
7			arti	culation among private preschools and family-

12	(2)	Enha	nce tl	he quality of the junior kindergarten program
13		by,	among	other things:
14			(A)	Reducing the student-to-teacher ratio per
15				four-year-old classroom to meet national
16				standards;
17			(B)	Providing for the professional development
18				of junior kindergarten administrators and
19				educators; and
20			(C)	Providing for developmentally-appropriate
21				classroom materials;
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1	(3)	Increasing the offering of college coursework to the			
2		early childhood education workforce by funding			
3		additional online and distance learning courses;			
4	(4)	Increasing the supply of suitable early childhood			
5		education facilities located on public school campuses			
6		through the continuation of the pre-plus initiative			
7		for classroom construction; and			
8	(5)	Strengthening and clarifying the interdepartmental			
9		council's role in the coordination of early childhood			
10		education programs at the school and complex levels.

12	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is			
13	amended by adding two new sections to be appropriately				
14	designated and to read as follows:				
15	" <u>§30</u>	2A - Early childhood educator incentive program.			
16	There is established an early childhood educator incentive				
17	program that shall be administered through a qualified nonprofit				
18	organizat	ion awarded through a competitive process. The			
19	University of Hawaii college of education shall award a				
20	nonprofit	organization a contract to administer a program with			
21	the follo	wing characteristics:			

1	(1)	The	administrator shall create a competitive award		
2		system for early childhood education programs that are			
3		will	ing to participate in the incentive program and		
4		beco	me aligned with a public school;		
5	(2)	<u>Earl</u>	y childhood education programs may receive up to		
6		\$	per designated employee per year for the		
7		foll	owing:		
8		<u>(A)</u>	Designation of one or more employees who do not		
9			yet have a license recognized by the Hawaii		
10			teacher standards board to teach in a Hawaii		
11			public school, who complete a state-approved		
12			program leading to licensure in early childhood		
13			education;		
14		<u>(B)</u>	Costs for the professional development of the		
15			designated employee or employees and pay for a		
16			wage subsidy of up to \$ per employee for		
17			up to five years following receipt of a license;		
18		<u>(C)</u>	Development of a memorandum of agreement with a		
19			public school, including charter schools, to		
20			develop a collaborative and seamless educational		
21			plan that would maximize continuity between the		

1		child's early education and public school
2		learning environment and curriculum;
3	<u>(D)</u>	Provision for the part-time assignment of the
4		early childhood education employee in the public
5		school as an assistant to regular teaching
6		faculty; and
7	<u>(E)</u>	Creation of opportunities for the movement of
8		participating personnel with the children as they
9		move from the preschool to the public school to
10		minimize disruptions and maximize the readiness
11		of children to enter public school, and the
12		readiness of the schools to receive them.
13	§302 A −	Early childhood education facilities;
14	identifying si	tes; inspections. (a) The department shall
15	identify unuse	d public school land or facilities for use by
16	state early ch	ildhood education programs. Suitable empty
17	classrooms, as	determined by the department, shall be prepared
18	and used for s	tate early childhood education programs; provided
19	that the class	rooms meet the licensing standards determined by
20	the department	of education and department of human services.
21	Priority shall	be given to land or facilities on sites with
22	sufficient spa	ce for three or more classrooms.

1 The department shall assist in the identification of (b) possible construction sites for the development of pre-plus 2 3 facilities. (c) All early childhood education program facilities shall 4 5 be open at all times to visitation and inspection by 6 representatives of the department of education, department of human services, and department of health, and by designated 7 8 representatives of the respective county fire departments. 9 The department may adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 (d) to effectuate this section." 10 11 PART III 12 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general 13 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 14 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 and the 15 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 16 2008-2009 for the early childhood educator incentive program. 17 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the University 18 of Hawaii college of education for the purposes of this section. SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general 19 20 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 21 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 and the 22 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year

- 1 2008-2009 for junior kindergarten faculty, faculty professional
- 2 development, and classroom materials; provided that the ratio of
- 3 students-to-faculty shall not be greater than national standards
- 4 for student age levels.
- 5 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 6 of education for the purposes of this section.
- 7 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
- 8 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 9 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 and the
- 10 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 11 2008-2009 for additional courses for early childhood education
- 12 teachers, including online and distance learning courses.
- 13 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the University
- 14 of Hawaii college of education for the purposes of this section.
- 15 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general
- 16 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 17 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 and the
- 18 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 19 2008-2009 for additional family-child interaction programs
- 20 located on public elementary school campuses.

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- 1 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 2 of health, family health service division, parenting support
- 3 programs, for the purposes of this section.
- 4 PART IV
- 5 SECTION 7. The director of finance is authorized to issue
- 6 general obligation bonds in the sum of \$ or so much
- 7 thereof as may be necessary and the same sum or so much thereof
- 8 as may be necessary is appropriated for fiscal year 2007-2008
- 9 for the plans, design, and construction of additional schools as
- 10 part of the pre-plus initiative.
- 11 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 12 education for the purposes of this section.
- 13 SECTION 8. The appropriation made for the capital
- 14 improvement project authorized in section 7 shall not lapse at
- 15 the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made;
- 16 provided that all moneys that are unencumbered as of June 30,
- 17 2011, shall lapse of that date.

- 19 SECTION 9. New statutory material is underscored.
- 20 SECTION 10. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2007.

Early Childhood Education; Junior Kindergarten

Description:

Establishes an Early Childhood Educator Incentive Program. Enhances the quality of the junior kindergarten program. Funds additional courses for early childhood educators. Increases the supply of suitable early childhood education facilities. (HB1722 HD1)
