11	SECTION 4. Section 712A-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

4	(c)	The manufacture, sale, or distribution of a controlled	
5		substance in violation of chapter 329, promoting	
6		detrimental drugs or intoxicating compounds, promoting	
7		pornography, promoting pornography for minors, or	
8		promoting prostitution, which is chargeable as a	
9		felony or misdemeanor offense, but not as a petty	
10		misdemeanor, under state law; and	
11	(d)	The attempt, conspiracy, solicitation, coercion, or	
12		intimidation of another to commit any offense for	
13	,	which property is subject to forfeiture."	
14	SECT	ION 5. Section 842-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
15	amended by amending the definitions of "organized crime" and		
16	"racketeering activity" to read as follows:		
17	""Organized crime" means any combination or conspiracy to		
18	engage in criminal activity as a significant source of income of		
19	livelihood, or to violate, aid or abet the violation of crimina		
20	laws relating to prostitution, gambling, loan sharking, drug		
21	abuse, il	legal drug distribution, counterfeiting, extortion,	

- 1 human trafficking, corruption of law enforcement officers or
- 2 other public officers or employers.
- 3 "Racketeering activity" means any act or threat involving,
- 4 but not limited to murder, kidnapping, human trafficking,
- 5 gambling, criminal property damage, robbery, bribery, extortion,
- 6 theft or prostitution, or any dealing in narcotic or other
- 7 dangerous drugs which is chargeable as a crime under state law
- 8 and punishable by imprisonment for more than one year."
- 9 SECTION 6. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
- 10 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
- 11 begun, before its effective date.
- 12 SECTION 7. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 13 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 14 SECTION 8. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
