A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AQUATIC RESOURCES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECT	ION 1. (a) The legislature finds and declares that:
2	(1)	Fishing in Hawaii is a tradition woven into our island
3		communities and local cultures that have been passed
4		down for generations;
5	(2)	Fishery resources need to be adequately monitored and
6		managed based on sound science;
7	(3)	Communities that rely on Hawaii's ocean resources are
8		disenfranchised with the current administrative rule-
9		making process used to develop fishery management
10		policies;
11	(4)	The current rule-making process has not required the
12		department of land and natural resources to
13		demonstrate a scientific need prior to establishing
14		new prohibitions or limitations on fishing in public
15		fishing areas and to fully engage impacted communities
16		and user groups early in the policy development phase;
17		and

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1	(5)	A clear policy is required that ensures that a
2		documented transparent process that uses peer-reviewed
3		science and empirical Hawaiian science, and allows for
4		public participation and input in policy development
5		throughout the board of land and natural resources
6		policy-making process, is used, especially prior to
7		the adoption of any board of land and natural
8		resources rules.
9	(b)	The purpose of this Act is to:
10	(1)	Require the department of land and natural resources

- (1) Require the department of land and natural resources to demonstrate a scientific need for and to fully engage impacted communities and user groups early in the policy-making phase prior to establishing new prohibitions or limitations on fishing in public fishing areas;
- (2) Establish a fishery policy advisory task force to review the current department of land and natural resources rule-making process and develop recommendations for changes and improvements; and
- 20 (3) Make an appropriation for operations of the fishery21 policy advisory task force.

1	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 190, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
2	amended by	y adding a new section to be appropriately designated		
3	and to rea	and to read as follows:		
4	" <u>§19</u>	0- Fishing prohibition or limitation; based on		
5	scientifi	c information; closed area regulation. No fishing rule		
6	that becor	mes effective and is implemented after January 1, 2007,		
7	shall prol	hibit or limit fishing for aquatic life, as those terms		
8	are define	ed in section 187A-1, in any areas open to public		
9	fishing u	nless:		
10	(1)	The proposed fishing prohibition or limitation has		
11		been developed through a community-based ahupuaa,		
12		moku, or community-based subsistence management		
13		program previously established;		
14	(2)	The proposed fishing prohibition or limitation has		
15		been through a thorough review and analysis of		
16		available peer-reviewed, scientific information,		
17		including traditional Hawaiian and local fishers		
18		knowledge that clearly demonstrates a correlation		
19		between existing fishing practices and a specific		
20		conservation problem;		

1	(3)	Other conservation measures, including but not limited
2		to sizing, seasonal closure periods, bag limits, and
3		equipment limitations have been considered; and
4	(4)	It has been determined that enforcement of existing
5		regulations will not adequately provide for
6		conservation and management of the affected stocks of
7		targeted fish.
8	Any rule	that closes an area to public fishing shall:
9	(1)	Include specific measurable criteria to determine the
10		conservation benefit of the closed area on the
11		affected stocks of fish, including:
12		(A) The identification of specific species to be
13		protected, including current stock assessment,
14		where available, of the species as they occur
15		throughout their range;
16		(B) The historic and current fishing effort,
17		including numbers of fishers, hooks, and soak
18		time on the targeted species;
19		(C) The historic and current extraction rate,
20		including data on fish caught and released or
21		damaged, of targeted species;

1		(D) Other environmental and nonfishing use factors
2		that may be contributing to the current condition
3		of the targeted species, where available; and
4		(E) A scheduled review of the continued need for the
5		closed area is at least once every three years,
6		with a report to the legislature and public;
7	(2)	Cover an area that is no larger than can be supported
8		by the best available peer-reviewed scientific,
9		traditional Hawaiian and local fishers information;
10		<u>and</u>
11	<u>(3)</u>	Set a date when the fishing prohibition or limitation
12		of the area shall be extinguished; provided that the
13		closed area restriction may be reimposed after twelve
14		months, in accordance with the requirements of this
15		section."
16	SECT	ION 3. (a) There is established the Hawaii fishery
17	policy adv	visory task force to identify and recommend to the
18	legislatu	re revisions to the current Hawaii administrative
19	rules, tit	tle 13 (department of land and natural resources),
20	subtitle 4	4, fisheries regulations, that ensures the use of the
21	best avail	lable peer-reviewed science and public participation

- 1 and input on all proposed rules or amendments to existing rules
- 2 prior to adoption by the board of land and natural resources.
- 3 (b) The task force shall consist of thirteen members:
- 4 (1) Two members to be designated by the Alii Holokai Dive Club;
- (2) Two members to be designated by Pacific Islands
 Fisheries Group;
- 8 (3) Two members to be designated by the Association of 9 Hawaiian Civic Club's Ocean Resources Committee;
- 10 (4) One member to be designated by the Northwestern
 11 Hawaiian Islands Bottomfish Hui;
- (5) One member to be designated by the Kewalo KeikiFishing Conservancy; and
- 14 (6) Five members to be appointed by the governor, without 15 regard to section 26-34, Hawaii Revised Statutes.
- The task force shall select a chairperson from among its
 members. The number of members necessary to constitute a quorum
 to do business shall consist of a majority of all members of the
 task force. When a quorum is in attendance, the concurrence of
- 20 a majority of the members in attendance shall make any action of
- 21 the task force valid.

1 The task force may request assistance from the department 2 of land and natural resources, attorney general, and other appropriate state agencies in fulfilling the purpose of the task 3 force. The task force may also request assistance from federal 4 fishery agencies and organizations, the public, and other 5 6 states. 7 The members shall not receive compensation for their services but shall be reimbursed for expenses, including travel 8 9 expenses, incurred in the performance of their duties under this 10 part. The task force shall: 11 Review the current department of land and natural 12 (1)13 resources rule-making process regarding fisheries; 14 (2) Report its findings and recommendations, including proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than 15 twenty days prior to the convening of the regular 16 session of 2008. The recommendations shall contain 17 18 detailed rationale for implementation; and 19 (3) Cease to exist on June 30, 2008. 20 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 21 22 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 for the

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- 1 fishery policy advisory task force to carry out its
- 2 responsibilities, including contracting for consultant services
- 3 and studies.
- 4 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 5 land and natural resources for the purposes of this Act.
- 6 SECTION 5. This Act shall not supersede or affect any
- 7 rules in effect on December 31, 2006, or any designated
- 8 community based subsistence fishing area established pursuant to
- 9 section 188-22.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes.
- 10 SECTION 6. New statutory material is underscored.
- 11 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
