A BILL FOR AN ACT

MAKING AN APPROPRIATION TO THE HAWAII CIVIL AIR PATROL.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Hawaii civil air
 patrol provides necessary disaster relief, search and rescue,
 homeland security, and medical emergency transport services to
 local and national organizations.

5 Since the early 1950s, the Hawaii civil air patrol has 6 provided tsunami warning services to the State. Once a tsunami 7 alert has been issued by the National Weather Service, the 8 Hawaii civil air patrol mobilizes and puts its aircraft in the 9 air, making repeated passes over beaches and coastal communities 10 using sirens and loud speakers to warn residents.

11 The legislature also finds that civil air patrol flies more 12 than ninety-five per cent of the nation's inland search and 13 rescue missions. Approximately one hundred people are saved 14 every year by civil air patrol volunteers. In July 2002, the 15 Hawaii civil air patrol was instrumental in locating a small 16 plane that went down on Maui.

17 The civil air patrol also plays a vital role in disaster 18 relief. Volunteer civil air patrol members fly disaster relief HB195 HD1 HMS 2007-1588



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officials to remote locations and support local, state, and
 national disaster relief organizations with experienced pilots
 and personnel. The civil air patrol transports time-sensitive
 medical materials, blood products, and body tissue.

Today, as a peacetime auxiliary of the Air Force, the 5 Hawaii civil air patrol remains an active volunteer organization 6 with approximately five hundred fifty members, including two 7 hundred cadets. The Hawaii wing has three primary missions: 8 search and rescue, aerospace education, and the cadet program. 9 10 It is also an active participant in counter-drug operations for the federal Drug Enforcement Agency, flying over one hundred 11 seventy-nine missions in 2003. 12

13 The legislature further finds that the Hawaii civil air 14 patrol depends on receiving state funding to defray its 15 operational expenses, but past budget restrictions have hampered 16 its ability to carry out necessary operations. A lack of 17 funding could result in:

18 (1) Termination of weekly tsunami watch patrols;
19 (2) Difficulties in notifying emergency personnel;
20 (3) Operations conducted at the expense of members; and
21 (4) A lack of training for airplane pilots.



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The purpose of this Act is to make an appropriation for the
 Hawaii civil air patrol to assist in defraying operational
 expenses.

SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$1 or so much thereof
as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 to complement the
\$50,000 offered for support by the department of defense for the
operational expenses of the Hawaii civil air patrol.

9 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of10 defense for the purposes of this Act.

11 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2007.
