A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TOURISM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Act 357 of 1989 was meant to initiate a study 2 of the carrying capacity of the State to the year 2010 in light 3 of visitor and resident population projections. The study may 4 have included, but was not limited to: infrastructure, social 5 issues, economic issues, environmental issues, and safety 6 issues. 7 The purpose of Act 357 of 1989 represents the ongoing 8 importance for integrated study, planning, and development from 9 which Hawaii residents may benefit. Specifically, city, county, 10 and state government plans and developments must cooperate to 11 solve tourism and residential issues including infrastructure, social issues, economic issues, environmental issues, and safety 12 13 issues. 14 Since tourism is a primary economic pillar in this state, a 15 master plan utilizing reliable and cooperative intergovernmental and interdepartmental studies and plans that respond to the 16 17 actual carrying capacity of the state is necessary to support 18 tourism and residential issues. The purpose of Act 357 was to

3	The purpose of this Act is to initiate a State plan to
4	support tourism and residential issues around the carrying
5	capacity of the State. Specifically, to initiate a "Tourism
6	Master Plan of 2007" with which the city, county, and state
7	government uses as a central mechanism for plans and
8	developments to address and solve tourism and residential issues
9	including infrastructure, social issues, economic issues,
10	environmental issues, and safety issues.
11	SECTION 2. Tourism Master Plan of 2007 task force;
12	establishment; membership; appointment; compensation; duties.
13	(a) There is established a Tourism Master Plan of 2007
14	task force to review the Hawaii state plan and other fundamental
15	components of community planning. The task force shall consist
16	of fourteen members as follows:
17	(1) Two members from each house of the legislature,
18	appointed by the presiding officer of each house;
19	(2) A representative of the governor appointed by the
20	governor;
21	(3) The five directors of the departments of business

economic development and tourism, commerce and



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1		consumer arrairs, rand and natural resources,			
2		transportation, and the state office of planning			
3		or the directors' designees;			
4	(4)	Two members from the University of Hawaii's			
5		school of urban and regional planning to be			
6		appointed by the president of the University of			
7		Hawaii; and			
8	(5)	The departmental director of each respective			
9		county's planning department or agency or the			
10		director's designee.			
11	(b) The	state office of planning shall assist the task			
12	force in perfo	rming its duties as required under this Act,			
13	including the	compilation of the report and plan mandated by			
14	sections 3 and	4 of this Act, respectively. In carrying out its			
15	duties under t	his Act, the task force may also request staff			
16	assistance fro	m the department of budget and finance; department			
17	of business, economic development, and tourism; department of				
18	transportation	; department of land and natural resources; and			
19	other appropri	ate state and county agencies including the budget			
20	and fiscal ser	vices department, community services department,			
21	environmental	services department, Honolulu fire department,			
22	parks and recr	eation department, planning and permitting

- 3 (c) The members of the task force shall select the
- 4 chairperson of the task force and shall be reimbursed for
- 5 expenses, including travel expenses necessary for the
- 6 performance of their duties.
- 7 (d) The task force shall review, solicit input on, and
- 8 develop recommendations to create the Tourism Master Plan of
- 9 2007 to ensure its relevance as a guide for the future long-term
- 10 development of the State, and report to the legislature and the
- 11 governor on creating the plan. The task force shall also submit
- 12 recommendations that include, but are not limited to:
- 13 (1) Whether the goals, objectives, policies, and
- 14 priorities for the State as envisioned in the
- 15 Hawaii state plan and the quality growth policy
- developed pursuant to chapter 223, Hawaii Revised
- 17 Statutes, are in need of amendment;
- (2) Whether the existing bases for determining
- 19 priorities and allocating limited resources, such
- as public funds, services, human resources, land,
- energy, water, and other resources, and improving
- coordination of federal, state, and county plans,

1		policies, programs, projects, and regulatory
2		activities are adequate and if not, a
3		recommendation on how to improve them;
4	(3)	A listing of Hawaii's inherent economic assets
5		and how best to utilize those assets to define
6		Hawaii's role in global economy;
7	(4)	How to forecast tourism related vocational needs
8		within the State and direct the education and
9		training of Hawaii's workforce to ensure that
10		Hawaii residents learn marketable skills in
11		secondary school, university, and adult training
12		programs;
13	(5)	The development of a framework to ensure that
14		traffic congestion, pollution, and other adverse
15		effects caused by population and economic growth
16		are mitigated;
17	(6)	An assessment of the tools needed for the private
18		sector to better compete in the global economy
19		and the means to improve Hawaii's balance of
20		trade by increasing exports and reducing imports
21		and whether these tools would have any adverse

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1	economic or environmental impact on the State and
2	its residents; and
3	(7) How best to engage the community in a public
4	discussion to achieve a consensus on the State's
5	preferred future, and coordinate the actions
6	needed to sustain a growing and vibrant economy
7	while maintaining a high quality of life for all
8	residents and visitors.
9	The task force shall develop criteria or benchmarks as
10	necessary to assist in the development of measuring incremental
11	compliance with task force recommendations enacted into law or
12	adopted as policies by governmental agencies and in guiding
13	budgetary priorities.
14	SECTION 3. Report. The office of planning shall submit
15	the task force report on its recommendations to the legislature
16	no later than twenty days before the convening of the regular
17	session of 2008.
18	SECTION 4. Tourism Master Plan of 2007. (a) After
19	receipt of the task force's report, the office of planning shall
20	prepare the Tourism Master Plan of 2007. The plan shall be
21	prepared to define and implement state goals, objectives,
22	policies, and priority guidelines using sections 226-3 to 226-27

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- 1 as guiding principles. The office of planning shall seek input
- 2 from all state departments. The office of planning shall also
- 3 solicit public views and concerns in preparation of the plan and
- 4 shall incorporate all or a portion of the recommendations
- 5 reported by the Tourism Master Plan of 2007 task force.
- 6 The plan shall serve as quidelines for funding and
- 7 implementation by state and county agencies.
- 8 (b) The office of planning shall submit the sustainability
- 9 plan, and any implementing legislation, if any, to the
- 10 legislature no later than twenty days before the convening of
- 11 the regular session of 2009.
- 12 (c) The office of planning shall update the plan every ten
- 13 years and report to the legislature.
- 14 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
- 15 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$54,000, or so much
- 16 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, and the
- 17 same sum, or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 18 2008-2009, for the creation of a Tourism Master Plan which
- 19 utilizes available, reliable, and cooperative intergovernmental
- 20 and interdepartmental studies and plans that respond to the
- 21 actual carrying capacity of the state in order to support
- 22 tourism and residential issues.



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1 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department

2 of business and economic development for the purposes of this

3 Act.

SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2007.
