### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Chapter 321, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 3 and to read as follows: 4 Establishment of community inpatient drug "§321treatment centers. There shall be established a community 5 inpatient drug treatment center for each senatorial district of 6 7 the state by 2010, under the direction and administration of the director. Any community inpatient drug treatment center may be 8 9 integrated and operated concurrently with any state hospital. 10 Each center shall be located in the area of the district 11 comprising the majority of that district's aggregate population, 12 and shall provide for the inpatient treatment of persons for 13 drug abuse." SECTION 2. Chapter 353, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 14 15 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 16 and to read as follows: "§353- School lecturing as condition for paroles. - 6 county of Maui to hire regionally designated detectives to focus
- 7 on criminal cases involving unlawful methamphetamine
- 8 trafficking; provided that the detectives shall be hired from
- 9 another county and shall rotate to other counties every twelve
- 10 months or less.
- 11 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the county of
- 12 Maui for the purposes of this Act.
- 13 SECTION 9. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 14 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 15 SECTION 10. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
- 16 provided that sections 5, 6, 7, and 8 shall take effect on July

Adds substances used to produce methamphetamine to the list of controlled substances. Appropriates funds for county detectives investigating methamphetamine cases.
