### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE ALOHA STADIUM.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Aloha stadium, 2 located on one hundred four acres in the Aiea area of Oahu, has a rich and varied history, serving as the venue for numerous 3 4 sporting, music, and other events, and has played a central role 5 in the lives of many of the State's residents. However, the 6 legislature further finds that it is an incontrovertible fact 7 that the useful life of Aloha stadium, which first opened on 8 September 12, 1975, is drawing to an end. In the Aloha stadium planning study final report published on December 22, 2005, the 9 study described various large sections of the stadium as being 10 11 "constructed with structural steel, in particular, a weathering 12 type of structural steel. This steel was purported to be 13 resistant to corrosion after an initial, dense, stable rust 14 layer develops on the surface. This dense, stable layer of rust 15 is often called a 'protective patina' in the technical and 16 marketing literature for this type of steel. However, it was 17 later learned that weathering steel is sensitive to salt-laden 18 air environments like Hawaii. In such environments, the HB LRB 07-1163.doc

    protective patina does not stabilize but instead continues to
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    corrode." A ten-year corrosion abatement program was started in
    1985 and completed in 1995, costing $80,000,000. However, the
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    structural certification performed in 1995 did not examine wind
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    loads on the structure. Therefore, the structural safety of
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    Aloha stadium under wind loading is unknown.
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         The study also reported a plethora of issues that need to
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    be addressed concerning structural safety and general conditions
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    including:

7		Americans with Disabilities Act provisions;
8	(13)	Resurfacing of asphalt parking lot;
9	(14)	Replacement of technologically obsolete scoreboard;
10	(15)	Replacement of field lighting and associated
11		transformers and lighting control system that are
12		nearing their useful lives;
13	(16)	Upgrading existing fire alarm systems; and
14	(17)	Replacement of parking lot lighting transformers.
15	The	2005 study also identified a host of capital
16	improveme	nts to Aloha stadium that, if all the identified
17	capital i	mprovements are implemented in the near future and a
18	systemati	c, cyclic capital improvement program is adhered to
19	throughou	t its remaining life, would extend the useful life of
20	the stadi	um twenty to thirty years. The anticipated cost for
21	the initi	al improvements needed is \$99,200,000 with an

1 additional \$115,400,000 anticipated to be expended for ongoing 2 maintenance over a twenty year period. 3 Both the State and the city and county of Honolulu have 4 consistently focused on new development in the Ewa and West Oahu 5 areas. As population and infrastructure begin to reach a 6 critical mass on the west side of Oahu, it would become more and 7 more appropriate for a new stadium to be located on the Ewa 8 plains or central Oahu. 9 The purpose of this Act is to require the governor to 10 direct the department of land and natural resources to dispose 11 of the Aloha stadium and arrange for the acquisition of land in 12 the Ewa plains or central Oahu on which a new stadium may be 13 constructed. 14 SECTION 2. (a) The governor shall direct the department 15 of land and natural resources to: 16 (1)Dispose of the Aloha stadium and the surrounding land 17 upon which the stadium is situated that are a part of 18 the Aloha stadium, by any appropriate method, 19 including sale, lease, or exchange of land;

Acquire suitable and adequate lands in the Ewa plains

or central Oahu upon which a new stadium may be

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1		constructed, by any appropriate method, including	
2		purchase, lease, or exchange of land; and	
3	(3)	Ensure that the proceeds of the sale, lease, or land	
4		exchange of the Aloha stadium and surrounding lands in	
5		paragraph (1) are to be applied to the purchase,	
6		lease, or land exchange of suitable lands in paragraph	
7		(2).	
8	(b)	The department of land and natural resources shall	
9	begin plans to implement the disposition of the Aloha stadium		
10	and the identification and acquisition of replacement lands for		
11	the construction of a new stadium immediately. The department		
12	shall submit annual written progress reports to the legislature		
13	twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session until		
14	the Aloha stadium is finally disposed of and new lands are		
15	finally acquired.		
16	(c)	The Aloha stadium authority shall fully cooperate with	
17	the depar	tment of land and natural resources to carry out the	
18	purposes	of this Act. The duties, responsibilities, and	
19	functions	of the Aloha stadium authority shall not be affected	
20	in any wa	y by the implementation of this Act.	

SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
