A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TECHNOLOGY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Technology is the key to success in today's 2 economy. Schools, businesses, and state and local governments 3 are constantly looking for ways to offer quicker and more efficient services to students, residents, and visitors through 4 5 the Internet, to the extent that Internet services have rapidly 6 become a part of everyday life. However, despite all the 7 technological advances being made, not everyone has the same 8 access to such technology and services. 9 The legislature finds that a statewide network will be a 10 strategic investment in the people of the state. A statewide 11 system will provide the necessary infrastructure to bridge the 12 digital divide that prevents many individuals and families from 13 enjoying opportunities generated by the Internet because they 14 cannot afford the cost of wireless Internet access. of access to the Internet limits educational and job 15 16 opportunities and participation in many aspects of modern 17 society and eventually will lead to segments of the population

constantly lagging behind their technologically advanced peers.



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- 1 Offering affordable Internet access services statewide is an
- 2 essential element of a long-term strategy to invest in the
- 3 state's workers, residents, and most importantly, the future of
- 4 Hawaii's children.
- 5 The purpose of this Act is to establish a task force to
- 6 study the feasibility of providing statewide Internet access and
- 7 direct the Auditor to develop a Hawaii statewide Internet access
- 8 plan for the development of a high-speed, Internet broadband
- 9 system.
- 10 SECTION 2. (a) There is established the Hawaii statewide
- 11 Internet access task force in the office of the auditor for
- 12 administrative purposes only. The task force shall be comprised
- 13 of the following:
- 14 (1) Four members of the senate appointed by the president
- of the senate;
- 16 (2) Four members of the house of representatives appointed
- 17 by the speaker of the house of representatives;
- 18 (3) A representative of the governor appointed by the
- 19 governor;
- 20 (4) The director of the department of business, economic
- 21 development, and tourism, or the director's designee;

1	(5)	Two members from the University of Hawaii's school of
2		information and computer sciences to be appointed by
3		the president of the University of Hawaii;
4	(6)	The superintendent of education, or the
5		superintendent's designee;
6	(7)	The president of the Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii;
7	(8)	A member of the public utilities commission appointed
8		by the chair of the commission;
9	(9)	Four members who shall represent the city and county
10		of Honolulu, and the counties of Kauai, Maui, and
11		Hawaii, each appointed by the respective county mayor
12	(10)	Six members representing the technology and
13		communications industries, and community development
14		and human and social services organizations, of whom
15		three members shall be appointed by the president of
16		the senate, and three members by the speaker of the
17		house of representatives; and
18	(11)	A representative of the incumbent local exchange
19		carrier selected by the incumbent local exchange
20		carrier.
21	(b)	The members of the task force shall select the

chairperson of the task force and shall be allowed expenses,

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- 1 including travel expenses, necessary for the performance of
- 2 their duties.
- 3 (c) The task force shall:
- 4 (1) Study other state or municipal governments that
- 5 have installed high-speed, Internet access systems;
- 6 the types of services offered by such systems; the
- methods of financing such systems; and the number and
- 8 types of subscribers of the services offered;
- 9 (2) Evaluate the feasibility of the development,
- implementation, and operation of a network to provide
- 11 high-speed Internet access statewide, as well as
- 12 leasing facilities to independent service providers;
- 13 (3) Determine the viability of providing low-cost, high-
- 14 speed Internet access to households, businesses, and
- outdoor areas statewide; and
- 16 (4) Research the most current and future Internet access
- technologies, such as, but not limited to, Wi-MAX.
- 18 (d) The task force shall submit a report of its findings
- 19 and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the
- 20 legislature and to the auditor no later than twenty days prior
- 21 to the convening of the regular session of 2008.

1	(e)	After reviewing the task force's report, the auditor	
2	shall pre	pare a Hawaii statewide Internet access plan for the	
3	developme	nt of a high-speed, Internet broadband system. The	
4	plan shall include:		
5	(1)	Recommendations on the types of facilities and the	
6		amount of bandwidth that should be installed, and the	
7		timing and placement of such facilities;	
8	(2)	Estimates of the potential cost of installing and	
9		maintaining a high-speed, Internet broadband system	
10		and potential financing mechanisms; and	
11	(3)	The feasibility of partnerships with private-sector	
12		Internet service providers to provide Internet access	
13		statewide.	
14	The auditor shall solicit public comments when preparing the		
15	plan and shall incorporate all or a portion of the		
16	recommendations reported by the Hawaii statewide Internet acces		
17	task force. The auditor shall submit the Hawaii statewide		
18	Internet	access plan to the legislature no later than twenty	
19	days prio	r to the convening of the regular session of 2009.	
20	(f)	The Hawaii statewide Internet access task force shall	
21	cease to	exist after June 30, 2009.	

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- 1 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 3 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 for the
- 4 purposes of supporting the work of the Hawaii statewide Internet
- 5 access task force established in section 2.
- 6 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the office of the
- 7 auditor for the purposes of this Act.
- 8 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
- 9 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 10 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2008-2009 for
- 11 creating the Hawaii statewide Internet access plan.
- 12 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the office of the
- 13 auditor for the purposes of this Act.
- 14 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2034.

Statewide Internet Access Task Force; Plan

Description:

Establishes a statewide Internet access task force to study the feasibility of creating a statewide Internet access network. Requires the Auditor to develop a plan for a high-speed Internet access system. (HB310 HD2)
