A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Voting is an essential part of democracy, as 2 citizen participation in elections is vital to the health and 3 well-being of a representative form of government. The 4 legislature finds that the problems Hawaii has experienced in 5 the past with an inadequate number of election workers during 6 election days contributes to voter frustration and makes the 7 voting process a negative experience for new voters. 8 Other states face similar difficulties in recruiting 9 sufficient numbers of precinct officials. According to the Hawaii office of elections, approximately three thousand five 10 11 hundred poll workers are needed statewide to run an election. Should the numbers of precinct officials continue to dwindle in 12 13 future elections, Hawaii's lack of election workers may further 14 contribute to voter apathy and indifference. 15 The legislature finds it is important to increase the

number of precinct officials who are willing and available to

work on election days. The purpose of this Act is to recruit

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1 eligible high school students to work at election sites during

2 election days.

3 SECTION 2. Section 11-72, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

4 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:

5 "(b) In assigning the precinct officials, the following

6 criteria shall be followed:

7 (1)The precinct officials shall be registered voters of 8 the precinct in which they serve; but if qualified 9 persons in the precinct or representative district are 10 not readily available to serve, they may be chosen 11 from without the precinct or representative district, 12 or if qualified persons either in or without the 13 precinct or representative district are not available 14 to serve, the chief election officer may designate 15 precinct officials who are not registered voters if 16 the persons so designated are otherwise qualified and 17 shall have attained the age of sixteen years on or 18 before June 30, of the year of the election in which 19 they are appointed to work; provided that, 20 notwithstanding the provisions of this paragraph, a 21 high school student who is enrolled in a civics or 22 other appropriate instructional program approved by

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1		the department of education and receives class credit
2		for working at an election site during an election
3		shall qualify as a precinct official;
4	(2)	The chief election officer may designate more precinct
5		officials than are needed in order to create a pool of
6		qualified precinct officials who may be assigned to
7		fill vacancies or to perform their duties as needed in
8		any precinct;
9	(3)	No parent, spouse, reciprocal beneficiary, child, or
10		sibling of a candidate shall be eligible to serve as a
11		precinct official in any precinct in which votes may
12		be cast for the candidate; nor shall any candidate for
13		any elective office be eligible to serve as a precinct
14		official in the same election in which the person is a
15		candidate. No candidate who failed to be nominated in
16		the primary or special primary election shall be
17		eligible to serve as a precinct official in the
18		general election next following; and
19	(4)	The chairperson of the precinct officials shall be the
20		first named precinct official on the list prepared by
21		the chief election officer. The remainder of the
22		precinct officials shall be apportioned as follows:

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1	(A)	The total votes cast, except those cast for
2		nonpartisan candidates, for all of the following
3		offices that were on the ballot in the next
4		preceding general election shall be divided into
5		the total votes cast for all the candidates of
6		each party for these offices: president and
7		vice-president, United States senator, United
8		States representative, governor and lieutenant
9		governor, state senator, and state
10		representative;
11	(B)	If a party's proportion of votes cast exceeds
12		fifty per cent, its share shall be one-half of
13		the precinct officials. The remaining one-half
14		shall be divided among the remaining parties in
15		proportion to their respective total of votes
16		cast for the offices set forth in subparagraph
17		(A);
18	(C)	In the case of the above division resulting in
19		parties having fractional positions, a whole
20		position shall go to the party with the larger
21		number of votes cast: and

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1	(D) Newly qualified parties may be assigned up to ten
2	per cent of the total positions available at the
3	discretion of the chief election officer."
4	SECTION 3. The department of education shall require, as
5	part of a civics or other appropriate instructional course at
6	each public high school in the State, that students who qualify
7	to be precinct officials work as precinct officials during
8	election days for class credit. The department shall adopt
9	rules pursuant to chapter 91 to carry out the purposes of this
10	Act.
11	SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored.
12	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
