A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MAKUA VALLEY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the continued use of 2 Makua Valley along the leeward coast of Oahu by the United 3 States Army for live-ammunition field exercises has had devastating effects on the environment and local residents. 4 5 The use of Makua Valley by the Army was granted initially in May, 1943 by the territorial government of Hawaii under 6 7 Revocable Permit No. 200. On August 15, 1964, President Lyndon Johnson signed Executive Order No. 11166 which set aside a major 8 9 portion of the training area to the federal government. 10 remaining portion was leased to the federal government by the 11 State for sixty-five years, ending in 2029. 12 Makua Valley has been used extensively since 1943 as a 13 live-fire area and has been subjected to air bombing, ship to shore firing, amphibious operations and live-firing of all 14
- infantry and artillery weapons. The use of live-ammunition has caused wild fires that threatened more than thirty endangered species of plants and animals that are native to Makua Valley.
- 18 The explosiveness of live-ammunition also threatens ancient



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- 1 cultural sites and has resulted in unexploded ordinance left in
- 2 the valley that may eventually cause serious injury or death to
- 3 residents when part of the valley is returned to the State in
- 4 2029.
- 5 The purpose of this Act is to require the State to revoke
- 6 or renegotiate the terms of the permit allowing the United
- 7 States Army to use Makua Valley to prohibit the use of live-
- 8 ammunition and toxic or hazardous chemicals in their field
- 9 exercises.
- 10 SECTION 2. The department of land and natural resources,
- 11 with the assistance of the attorney general, shall revoke or
- 12 renegotiate Revocable Permit No. 200 entered into with the
- 13 federal government, on or about August 17, 1964, to prohibit the
- 14 United States Army from using live-ammunition, including toxic
- 15 or hazardous chemicals, in field exercises in Makua Valley on
- 16 the leeward coast of Oahu.
- 17 For renegotiation purposes, the department may issue new
- 18 permits, or issue new leases with the federal government to
- 19 utilize other state lands to meet the needs of the United States
- 20 Army; provided that any new permit or lease shall not allow the
- 21 use of live-ammunition, including toxic or hazardous chemicals;
- 22 provided further that any permit renegotiated pursuant to this



- 1 Act shall be subject to legislative approval by concurrent
- 2 resolution.
- 3 SECTION 3. The department of land and natural resources
- 4 shall submit a report on the status of any revocation or
- 5 renegotiation of the permit under this Act, as well as any
- 6 findings and recommendations, to the legislature twenty days
- 7 prior to the convening of the 2008 regular session of the
- 8 legislature.
- 9 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
- 10 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$, or so much
- 11 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, for the
- 12 purposes of this Act.
- 13 SECTION 5. The sum appropriated shall be expended by the
- 14 department of land and natural resources for the purposes of
- 15 this Act.
- 16 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
- 17 provided that sections 4 and 5 shall take effect on July 1,
