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A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EMERGENCIES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 201B, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by adding two new sections to be appropriately
3	designated and to read as follows:
4	"§201B-A Tourism emergencies. (a) If the board
5	determines that an adverse effect on Hawaii's tourism industry
6	resulting from world conflict, terrorist threat, natural
7	disaster, or the outbreak of disease regardless of when or where
8	occurring, may result in a substantial interruption of commerce
9	of the State of Hawaii and adversely affect the welfare of its
10	people, it shall submit a request to the governor to declare
11	that a tourism emergency exists.
12	(b) Upon declaration by the governor that a tourism
13	emergency exists pursuant to subsection (a) the authority may
14	develop and implement measures to respond to the tourism
15	emergency.
16	§201B-B Tourism emergency trust fund. (a) There is
17	established outside the state treasury a tourism emergency trust
18	fund to be administered by the board as trustee, into which
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1	shall be deposited the revenues prescribed by section
2	237D-6.5(b). All investment earnings from moneys in the trust
3	fund shall be credited to the tourism special fund.
4	(b) Moneys in the trust fund shall be used exclusively to
5	provide for the implementation of emergency measures to respond
6	to any adverse effects on the tourism industry resulting from
7	world conflicts, terrorist threats, natural disasters, or the
8	outbreak of disease that may result in a substantial
9	interruption of commerce of the State of Hawaii and adversely
10	affect the welfare of its people, pursuant to section 201B-A.
11	(c) Use of the trust fund, consistent with subsection (b),
12	shall be provided for in articles, bylaws, resolutions, or other
13	instruments executed by the board as trustee for the trust
14	fund."
15	SECTION 2. Section 201B-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
16	amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
17	"(a) Except as otherwise limited by this chapter, the
18	authority may:
19	(1) Sue and be sued;
20	(2) Have a seal and alter the same at pleasure;
21	(3) Make and execute contracts and all other instruments
22	necessary or convenient for the exercise of its powers



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1		and functions under this chapter; provided that the
2		authority may enter into contracts and agreements for
3		a period of up to five years, subject to the
4		availability of funds; and provided further that the
5		authority may enter into agreements for the use of the
6		convention center facility for a period of up to ten
7		years;
8	(4)	Make and alter bylaws for its organization and
9		internal management;
10	(5)	Unless otherwise provided in this chapter, adopt rules
11		in accordance with chapter 91 with respect to its
12		projects, operations, properties, and facilities;
13	(6)	Through its executive director represent the authority
14		in communications with the governor and with the
15		legislature;
16	(7)	Through its executive director, provide for the
17		appointment of officers, agents, and employees,
18		subject to the approval of the board, prescribing
19		their duties and qualifications, and fixing their
20		salaries, without regard to chapters 76 and 78 if
21		there is no anticipated revenue shortfall in the



1		tourism special fund and funds have been appropriated
2		by the legislature and allotted as provided by law;
3	(8)	Through its executive director purchase supplies,
4		equipment, or furniture;
5	(9)	Through its executive director allocate the space or
6		spaces which are to be occupied by the authority and
7		appropriate staff;
8	(10)	Engage the services of qualified persons to implement
9		the State's tourism marketing plan or portions thereof
10		as determined by the authority;
11	(11)	Engage the services of consultants on a contractual
12		basis for rendering professional and technical
13		assistance and advice;
14	(12)	Procure insurance against any loss in connection with
15		its property and other assets and operations in such
16		amounts and from such insurers as it deems desirable;
17	(13)	Contract for or accept revenues, compensation,
18		proceeds, and gifts or grants in any form from any
19		public agency or any other source, including any
20		revenues or proceeds arising from the operation or use
21		of the convention center;



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1	(14)	Develop, coordinate, and implement state policies and
2		directions for tourism and related activities taking
3		into account the economic, social, and physical
4		impacts of tourism on the State and its natural
5		resources infrastructure; provided that the authority
6		shall support the efforts of other state and county
7		departments or agencies to manage, improve, and
8		protect Hawaii's natural environment and areas
9		frequented by visitors;
10	(15)	Have a permanent, strong focus on marketing and
11		promotion;
12	(16)	Conduct market development-related research as
13		necessary;
14	(17)	Coordinate all agencies and advise the private sector
15		in the development of tourism-related activities and
16		resources;
17	(18)	Work to eliminate or reduce barriers to travel in
18		order to provide a positive and competitive business
19		environment, including coordinating with the
20		department of transportation on issues affecting
21		airlines and air route development;

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1	(19)	Market and promote sports-related activities and
2		events;
3	(20)	Coordinate the development of new products with the
4		counties and other public sectors and private sectors,
5		including the development of sports, culture, health
6		and wellness, education, technology, agriculture, and
7		nature tourism;
8	(21)	Establish a public information and educational program
9		to inform the public of tourism and tourism-related
10		problems;
11	(22)	Encourage the development of tourism educational,
12		training, and career counseling programs;
13	(23)	Establish a program to monitor, investigate, and
14		respond to complaints about problems resulting
15		directly or indirectly from the tourism industry and
16		taking appropriate action as necessary;
17	(24)	Develop and implement emergency measures to respond to
18		any adverse effects on the tourism industry, pursuant
19		to section 201B-A;
20	[(24)]	(25) Set and collect rents, fees, charges, or other
21		payments for the lease, use, occupancy, or disposition



1		of the convention center facility without regard to
2		chapter 91;
3	[(25)]	(26) Notwithstanding the provisions of chapter 171,
4		acquire, lease as lessee or lessor, own, rent, hold,
5		and dispose of the convention center facility in the
6		exercise of its powers and the performance of its
7		duties under this chapter; and
8	[(26)]	(27) Acquire by purchase, lease, or otherwise, and
9		develop, construct, operate, own, manage, repair,
10		reconstruct, enlarge, or otherwise effectuate, either
11		directly or through developers, a convention center
12		facility."
13	SECT	ION 3. Section 237D-6.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
14	amended b	y amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
15	"(b)	Revenues collected under this chapter shall be
16	distribut	ed as follows, with the excess revenues to be deposited
17	into the	general fund:
18	(1)	17.3 per cent of the revenues collected under this
19		chapter shall be deposited into the convention center
20		enterprise special fund established under section
21		201B-8; provided that beginning January 1, 2002, if
22		the amount of the revenue collected under this



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1	paragraph exceeds \$33,000,000 in any calendar year,
2	revenues collected in excess of \$33,000,000 shall be
3	deposited into the general fund;
4	(2) 34.2 per cent of the revenues collected under this
5	chapter shall be deposited into the tourism special
6	fund established under section 201B-11 for tourism
7	promotion and visitor industry research; provided that
8	beginning on July 1, 2002[÷] <u>,</u>
9	[(A) Of] <u>of</u> the first \$1,000,000 in revenues
10	deposited:
11	[(i)] (A) Ninety per cent shall be deposited into the
12	state parks special fund established in section
13	184-3.4; and
14	[(ii)] (B) Ten per cent shall be deposited into the
15	special land and development fund established in
16	section 171-19 for the Hawaii statewide trail and
17	access program;
18	provided that of the 34.2 per cent, 0.5 per cent shall
19	be transferred to a sub-account in the tourism special
20	fund to provide funding for a safety and security
21	budget, in accordance with the Hawaii tourism
22	strategic plan 2005-2015; provided further that of the



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1		revenues remaining in the tourism special fund after
2		revenues have been deposited as provided in this
3		paragraph and except for the sum authorized by the
4		legislature for expenditure, funds shall be deposited
5		into the tourism emergency trust fund, established in
6		section 201B-B, to maintain the fund balance of
7		\$5,000,000; and
8	(3)	44.8 per cent of the revenues collected under this
9		chapter shall be transferred as follows: Kauai county
10		shall receive 14.5 per cent, Hawaii county shall
11		receive 18.6 per cent, city and county of Honolulu
12		shall receive 44.1 per cent, and Maui county shall
13		receive 22.8 per cent.
14	All	transient accommodations taxes shall be paid into the
15	state tre	asury each month within ten days after collection and
16	shall be	kept by the state director of finance in special
17	accounts	for distribution as provided in this subsection."
18	SECT	ION 4. In codifying the new sections added by section
19	1 of this	Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
20	appropria	te section numbers for the letters used in designating
21	the new s	ections in this Act.

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
