HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING SUPPORT FOR MALAMA O KAMALI`I MAKAMAE IN ITS EFFORTS TO DEVELOP CARE HOME FACILITIES FOR ENDANGERED YOUNG CHILDREN FROM LOW-INCOME HOUSEHOLDS, INCLUDING NATIVE HAWAIIAN CHILDREN AT HIGH RISK.

WHEREAS, Malama O Kamali`i Makamae (Protect and Honor Our 1 Precious Children), a nonprofit organization, was organized for 2 the purpose of helping children from low-income households, 3 including but not limited to native Hawaiian children by 4 5 developing and operating state of the art care facilities throughout the State of Hawai'i for children in imminent danger 6 of their physical, emotional, mental, social, and educational 7 well-bring, the missing link in behalf of preserving our Na 8 Kamali`i O Hawaii Nei; and 9

11 WHEREAS, the "Senate of the Twenty-second Legislature of 12 the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2004, the House of 13 Representatives concurring," passed the Senate Concurrent 14 Resolution (SCR) 189, "that the Legislature encourages the 15 support of Malama O Kamali`i Makamae in its efforts to develop 16 state of the art care home facilities for needy children of 17 Hawaiian ancestry who are thirteen years old or younger;"; and 18

19 WHEREAS, the State's Foster Care system, Human and Social 20 Services, Child Protective and Welfare agencies are still 21 suffering from a case-overload syndrome; and 22

WHEREAS, we still experience tragic scenarios despoiling our children, and we must now add other innocent children to our statistics of having been lost in the State's protective, welfare, education, community and faith-based systems, as a total societal failure to 10-year old Alexis of Puna, Hawaii, 5year old Talia Williams of Oahu and the latest two infant tragedies and the 11-year old several maltreatment cases; and 30



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WHEREAS, such traumas to survivors are categorical indicators to physical, emotional and mental scarring, which 2 3 adversely affect their growth & development, behavioral and 4 learning abilities; and 5 WHEREAS, Malama O Kamali`i Makamae's care facilities will 6 7 provide a wellness refuge for them to begin to feel safe, 8 promote health and nutrition and being an overall healing journey in their short and/or long-term care needs in the 9 Hawaiian cultural Hanai `Ohana style project; and 10 11 12 WHEREAS, due to the shortage of qualified state child care workers, too many children are neglected and fall through the 13 cracks of the Child Protective & Welfare systems, and still 14 15 there are insufficient emergency care facilities to meet the growing need of very young children in imminent danger in their 16 17 present living environment; and 18 WHEREAS, Hawai`i's children of Hawaiian ancestry are at 19 high risk of falling into the behavioral, lifestyle, and 20 substance abuse patterns of their adult family members or other 21 22 care givers, and are also at imminent risk for their health, safety, well being, and economic status in their present 23 environment, which would affect their ability to grow, develop, 24 25 and learn; and 26 WHEREAS, the Kamehameha Schools' Ka Huaka`i Native Hawaiian 27 Educational Assessment (2005) stated that academic disparities 28 are pronounced in rural regions with high concentrations of 29 30 Native Hawaiians, and with a more rapid escalating rate of special education referrals than that of their peers (18.5% or 1 31 32 of every 5 Native Hawaiian students); and 33 34 WHEREAS, Native Hawaiian youth have a higher rate of depression (34.5%) and are more likely to attempt suicide 35 (22.6%) than their peers; and 36 37 38 WHEREAS, a study conducted by the National Center on Addiction and Substance Abuse at Columbia University (CASA) 39 found that "the child welfare agencies devoted most of their 40 resources to investigation, foster care and permanent custody 41 decisions while provisions of services to prevent the recurrence 42 43 of child abuse/neglect was a lower budget priority"; and 44



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2 WHEREAS, the CASA study "found six critical weaknesses that 3 gobble child welfare officials' efforts to protect the child" 4 and also "noted that the child's development needs should take 5 precedence over the timing of parental recovery"; now, 6 therefore,

8 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 9 Session of 2007, the Senate concurring, that the Legislature 10 urges support of Malama O Kamali`i Makamae in its efforts to 11 12 develop and operate state of the art care facilities for endangered young children from low-income households, including 13 14 Native Hawaiian children at high risk, which was a need recognized by the Joint House-Senate Task Force on Ice and Drug 15 16 Abatement in 2004 to develop a drug endangered child protection 17 program; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature recognize that significant benefits would be achieved by requesting the Child Care and Welfare Service agencies of the department of human services to partner with Malama O Kamali`i Makamae, as a pilot project and model, to assist these agencies with the overload of emergency care and other social and educational services to aforesaid children ages zero to thirteen years; and

27 ⁻ BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature recommends the child care and welfare service agencies of the departments of 28 Human Services and Health to add Malama O Kamali`i Makamae to 29 their lists of authorized "Diversion Services", "Community-Based 30 Care Service" providers, and partnering with Malama O Kamali`i 31 Makamae for cost effective savings to the State's expenses, as 32 indicated in the Department of Human Services' Financial 33 34 Expenditure Report FY 2002-03; and 35

36 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature supports Malama 37 O Kamali`i Makamae's provision of needed services to Hawai`i's 38 young children through the House and Senate 2007 Grants-in-Aid 39 (GIA) program relating to child endangerment and abuse 40 prevention programs; and

42 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 43 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the directors of the 44 Departments of Human Services and Health, the Deputy Director of



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1 the Department of Human Services, the Governor and the Lieutenant Governor of the State of Hawai'i, and the President 2 3 of Malama O Kamali`i Makamae. 4
