HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING HAWAII'S CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION TO LEGISLATE A REDUCTION IN FEDERALLY REGULATED FEES OR AN EXEMPTION FROM FEDERAL STATUTES FOR TRANSPORTATION COSTS FOR LIVESTOCK FEED TO HAWAII.

WHEREAS, Hawaii's livestock industry faces numerous 1 challenges that creates obstacles towards obtaining a strong 2 diversified livestock and agricultural products industry in the 3 State; and 4 5 WHEREAS, according to the Department of Agriculture, in 6 2006, locally produced eggs represented approximately thirty-7 three per cent of the total eggs sold in the State, and 8 approximately thirty to thirty-five per cent of the milk 9 consumed in the State was locally produced; and 10 11 WHEREAS, within the past year, two egg farms and a dairy 12 13 farm have closed in Hawaii, and a dairy farm and another egg farm are now threatened with closure; and 14 15 WHEREAS, one of the challenges the livestock industry faces 16 is the rising cost of feed for livestock; and 17 18 WHEREAS, due to its location and relative isolation, Hawaii 19 is dependent on overseas shipping for a majority of its food and 20 food production, thus, livestock farmers rely on imported feed 21 from the mainland; and 22 23 WHEREAS, local poultry farmers have indicated that the 24 total cost of grain or feed for their livestock amounts to 25 seventy per cent of the cost to produce one dozen eggs, with 26 fifty per cent of that cost attributed to the transportation 27 expenses for the feed; and 28 29 WHEREAS, furthermore, with increased United States 30 Department of Agriculture regulations on agricultural products, 31

1 livestock farmers are forced to buy and use high-protein feed 2 from the mainland to feed their livestock because grains, such 3 as corn, are too expensive to grow locally in Hawaii in the 4 massive quantities that are required by livestock farmers; and 5

6 WHEREAS, the high transportation costs for feed is a 7 perennial problem for livestock farmers and the cost of 8 importing feed grains from the mainland adds more than \$100 a 9 ton to the expense; and

WHEREAS, a reduction in federally regulated fees or an exemption from federal statutes, such as the Jones Act, will financially assist livestock farmers with their feed requirement costs, enable them to remain in business, and allow them to continue to provide fresh meats, dairy, and egg products for local consumption; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 18 Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 19 Session of 2007, the Senate concurring, that the members of 20 Hawaii's Congressional delegation to the United States Congress 21 are requested to assist in the longevity of a diversified 22 livestock industry in Hawaii by legislating a reduction in 23 federally regulated shipping or transportation fees for 24 livestock feed or an exemption from federal statutes relating to 25 livestock feed shipping and transportation costs from the 26 mainland to Hawaii; and 27

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this
Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the members of Hawaii's
Congressional delegation to the United States Congress.
