## HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU TO STUDY RESPITE CARE POLICIES AND PROGRAMS IN OTHER STATES AND THE EXECUTIVE OFFICE ON AGING TO CONDUCT AN INVENTORY OF RESPITE CARE SERVICES IN HAWAII.

WHEREAS, family caregiver is the term used to refer to an 1 unpaid individual, including a family member, friend, or 2 neighbor, who provides full- or part-time care to another 3 individual in need and either lives separately from or with the 4 care recipient; and 5 6 WHEREAS, individuals who need the assistance of family 7 caregivers typically have complex, chronic medical conditions 8 and functional limitations; and 9 10 WHEREAS, it is estimated that fourteen to twenty-one per 11 cent of adults, or 126,598 to 192,390 individuals, in the State 12 provide regular care or assistance to another individual aged 13 sixty years or older; and 14 15 WHEREAS, family caregivers provide an invaluable service 16 and economic benefit to care recipients and State taxpayers by 17 way of deferred paid caregiving and institutionalization; and 18 19 WHEREAS, nationally, if the work of family caregivers had 20 to be replaced by paid home care staff, the estimated cost would 21 be forty-five to ninety-four billion dollars per year; and 22 23 WHEREAS, sustainable family caregiving depends on meeting a 24 family caregiver's own needs for support and respite care; and 25 26 WHEREAS, although there are different approaches to respite 27 care, the basic objective is to provide a family caregiver with 28 temporary relief from the responsibilities of caring for a care 29 recipient so that the family caregiver can attend to other 30 personal and professional obligations; and 31 32 WHEREAS, respite care can include a range of services such 33 as medical or social adult day care or a short-term stay in a 34
