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HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU TO STUDY OTHER STATES' ADULT PROTECTIVE SERVICES AND COMPARE THEM TO HAWAII'S ADULT PROTECTIVE SERVICES.

1 WHEREAS, the United States Senate Special Committee on Aging has estimated that up to 5,000,000 adults each year are 2 victims of neglect, exploitation, or other abuse; and 3 4 WHEREAS, other studies indicate that up to six per cent of 5 the national population of older adults has experienced some 6 type of abuse, neglect, or exploitation; and 7 8 WHEREAS, there is no national, uniform reporting system to 9 document the numbers of older Americans who experience abuse, so 10 the number of these individuals can only be estimated; and 11 12 WHEREAS, adult protective services are mandated for adult 13 victims of abuse in each of the 50 states and the District of 14 Columbia; and 15 16 WHEREAS, the eligible recipients of these services vary by 17 jurisdiction; and 18 19 WHEREAS, in most states, services are provided to any 20 vulnerable adult, while in other states the services are 21 provided only to individuals age 60 years and older or to 22 younger individuals with disabilities; and 23 24 WHEREAS, results of a recent Elder Abuse Incidence Study 25 shed light on a significant problem of elder abuse and neglect 26 among elders living in their own homes who have gone largely 27 unidentified and unnoticed; and 28 29 WHEREAS, the study noted that only one in five new 30 incidents of abuse, neglect, or self-neglect are reported to 31 adult protective services agencies; and 32

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WHEREAS, here in Hawaii, adult protective services provide 1 crisis intervention, investigation, and emergency services to 2 dependent adults who are reported to be abused, neglected, or 3 financially exploited by others or seriously endangered due to 4 self-neglect; and 5 6 WHEREAS, there are just over 84,000 elders who are 75 years 7 or older in Hawaii; and 8 9 WHEREAS, national estimates of the frequency of abuse 10 towards this population range from five to ten per cent, which 11 suggests that there may be 4,000 or more cases of abuse in 12 Hawaii each year; and 13 14 WHEREAS, however, the Department of Human Services 15 indicates that in 2006, it investigated 514 cases, which 16 17 suggests a large gap between those receiving services and those possibly experiencing abuse; and 18 19 WHEREAS, according to the University of Hawaii Center on 20 the Family, between 2000 and 2030, the number of adults in 21 Hawaii who will be 60 years and older will increase by 93.8 per 22 cent and those 85 years and older will increase by 174 per cent; 23 this, in turn, will result in a small proportion of children and 24 younger adults in relation to those 60 years and older; and 25 26 WHEREAS, Hawaii's adult protective services law has been 27 described in recent newspaper articles as one of the most 28 restrictive in the nation; and 29 30 WHEREAS, there has also been concern regarding whether any 31 changes to the current Adult Protective Services Law would 32 result in an increased case load and consequential strain on 33 case workers; now, therefore, 34 35 36 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 37 Session of 2007, the Senate concurring, that the Legislative 38 Reference Bureau is requested to study other states' adult 39 protective services and compare them to Hawaii's adult 40 protective services; and 41
