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WHEREAS, these unique lands may be designated as 1 "culturally valuable districts", which should be restored, 2 maintained, and protected as valuable state resources; and 3 4 WHEREAS, the identification and designation of culturally 5 valuable districts will help to ensure the perpetuation of 6 Hawaii's unique cultural traditions and legacy; now, therefore, 7 8 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 9 Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 10 Session of 2007, the Senate concurring, that the Legislature 11 supports the establishment of culturally valuable districts 12 13 throughout the state; and 14 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the boundaries of a culturally 15 valuable district follow natural monuments, ahupua'a, moku, or 16 other traditional land divisions, and may extend from the 17 highest reaches of the mountains to a designated distance beyond 18 the shoreline; and 19 20 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a culturally valuable district 21 may include one or more ahupua'a and all or part of any moku on 22 any island. 23 24 25 26
