HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH BRANCH, TO STUDY THE ROLE OF GESTATIONAL ENVIRONMENTS, GENTLE BIRTHING PRACTICES, ADULT WELLNESS EDUCATION, DOMESTIC HARMONY AWARENESS, APPROPRIATE AND SUFFICIENT TOUCH, AND THE PRACTICE OF HEALING BIRTH TRAUMA, AND THEIR CONNECTION TO PUBLIC POLICY CONCERNS SUCH AS SUBSTANCE ABUSE, ALCOHOLISM, DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, AND OBESITY.

1 WHEREAS, in memory of Hawaii residents Daysha Aiona Aka and 2 Sarah Marie Faye whose passions for life were cut short as 3 victims of domestic violence, the Legislature shares in the 4 public outcry regarding the need to educate, collaborate, and 5 develop strategies to address domestic violence; and 6

7 WHEREAS, the Legislature finds that societal issues such as 8 domestic violence, substance and alcohol abuse, and obesity, 9 involve important public policy concerns that require study and 10 deliberation in order to identify strategies to reduce their 11 prevalence in Hawaii; and

13 WHEREAS, it has been recognized that wellness education 14 teaches healthy development and peaceful coexistence of family 15 members and thus decreases incidences of substance abuse, 16 alcoholism, and domestic violence; and

18 WHEREAS, recent scientific findings in a variety of 19 disciplines have contributed to an emerging understanding of the 20 primal developmental needs of individuals from conception 21 through early infancy; and

WHEREAS, it is relatively well-known and accepted that the
health and well-being of an unborn child is linked to the health
and well-being of the mother; and

27 WHEREAS, it has been suggested that the experience of birth28 imprints the basic personality of a child; and

WHEREAS, it has been asserted that domestic abuse and 2 3 turmoil during the prenatal period, labor, birth, or in a newborn child's domestic environment can negatively impact the 4 5 child's development; and 6 7 WHEREAS, science suggests that appropriate and sufficient touch and human contact between an infant child and the child's 8 9 caregivers is integral to a child's healthy development; and 10 WHEREAS, the right of a woman to choose the course of a 11 prequancy also extends the right of a woman to choose where she 12 will labor and to give birth with qualified caregivers of her 13 choice; and 14 15 WHEREAS, it has been suggested that the increased incidence 16 of inducement and narcotic use during labor, as well as the 17 increase in surgical births, are related to an increase in pre-18 term births and long-term health conditions, including a greater 19 20 propensity to over use drugs throughout life, thereby indicating a need for consistent science-based protocols and policies in 21 22 this field; and 23 WHEREAS, the Legislature recognizes the positive impact of 24 trained birthing professionals and, in particular, birth doulas, 25 who are trained and experienced childbirth professionals who 26 provide continuous physical, emotional, and informational 27 28 support to the mother before, during, and just after childbirth; 29 and 30 31 WHEREAS, the Legislature acknowledges that a growing body of science from diverse fields supports further study of the 32 roles of gestational environments, gentle birthing practices, 33 34 adult wellness education, domestic harmony awareness, appropriate and sufficient touch, and the practice of healing 35 birth trauma, and the impact these practices may have on 36 reducing the occurrence of substance abuse, alcoholism, domestic 37 violence, and obesity; now, therefore, 38 39 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 40 41 Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 42 Session of 2007, the Senate concurring, that the Department of Health, Maternal and Child Health Branch, is requested to study 43 44 the roles of gestational environments, gentle birthing 2007-0304 HCR SMA-1.doc





practices, adult wellness education, domestic harmony awareness, 1 appropriate and sufficient touch, and the practice of healing 2 birth trauma, and the impact these practices may have on 3 reducing the occurrence of substance abuse, alcoholism, domestic 4 5 violence, and obesity; and 6

7 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Health, Maternal and Child Health Branch, is requested to report its 8 findings and recommendations, including any proposed 9 legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior 10 to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008; and 11 12

13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, the 14 Director of Health, and the Chief of the Maternal and Child 15 16 Health Branch.
