HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

ENCOURAGING THE COUNTIES TO FORM PARTNERSHIPS WITH THE STATE AND PRIVATE SECTOR TO COVER HEALTHCARE INFRASTRUCTURE AND OVERHEAD COSTS FOR PRIMARY CARE AND SPECIALTY PHYSICIANS PRACTICING MEDICINE IN HAWAII'S RURAL AREAS.

WHEREAS, many rural areas of our state especially on our
 Neighbor Islands have been designated as health professional
 shortage areas by the federal government; and

5 WHEREAS, a designation as a health professional shortage 6 area may include places with large groups of people who face 7 economic, cultural or linguistic barriers to healthcare or where 8 there are too many people in that geographic area to be served 9 by the limited number of health professionals; and

11 WHEREAS, there is a critical shortage of all healthcare 12 providers on our Neighbor Islands as Hawaii rapidly loses 13 physicians who leave to practice on the mainland for more money, 14 and many who continue to practice in this state are aging and 15 close to retirement; and

WHEREAS, Hawaii physicians are overly burdened by medical
malpractice premiums that continue to rise sharply especially
for orthopedists, general surgeons, and
obstetrician/gynecologists; and

21 22 WHEREAS, other states offer physicians better 23 reimbursements that are adequate to sustain their practices; and 24

25 WHEREAS, local healthcare facilities are straining to 26 provide their physicians with fair and adequate wages in their 27 attempts to maintain services and retain necessary staff; and

1 WHEREAS, according to a study prepared by the accounting 2 firm Ernst & Young LLP, Hawaii hospitals spent \$228 million in unreimbursed funds to care for Medicare, Medicaid, and QUEST 3 patients in 2006; and 4 5 WHEREAS, some relief must be provided somewhere for 6 7 healthcare professionals to keep them practicing in Hawaii and to encourage them to practice in the areas of the state where 8 9 they are most desperately needed; and 10 WHEREAS, our community health centers provide some relief 11 for rural areas but a more comprehensive approach needs to be 12 established to provide primary healthcare services; and 13 14 WHEREAS, the State, counties, and private organizations 15 have the means to support medical operations in rural areas; and 16 17 18 WHEREAS, providing the necessary healthcare infrastructure and overhead costs for primary care and specialty physicians is 19 20 a viable means for reducing costs associated with practicing medicine; and 21 22 WHEREAS, state, county, and private partnerships formed to 23 provide these infrastructure and overhead costs in rural areas 24 would help to overcome geographic and economic barriers which 25 plague the Neighbor Islands and ease the critical healthcare 26 shortages they face; and 27 28 WHEREAS, only through such a healthcare cooperative venture 29 between the State, counties, and private entities will 30 independent healthcare providers be able to practice medicine in 31 rural areas of the state; now, therefore, 32 33 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 34 Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 35 Session of 2007, the Senate concurring, that the counties of 36 Hawaii are encouraged to form partnerships with the State and 37 private sector to cover healthcare infrastructure and overhead 38 39 costs for primary care and specialty physicians in Hawaii's rural, underserved areas; and 40
