## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENTS OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES TO COLLABORATE AND APPLY FOR A FEDERAL TRAUMATIC BRAIN INJURY WAIVER.

1	WHEREAS, every year approximately 1.9 million people in the
2	United States experience traumatic brain injuries; and
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4	WHEREAS, the physical consequences of a traumatic brain
5	injury include impaired speech, vision and hearing loss,
6	headaches, muscle spasticity, paralysis, and seizure disorders;
7	and

9	WHEREAS, the cognitive consequences of a traumatic brain
10	injury include memory deficits, limited concentration, impaired
11	perception and communication, and difficulty reading, writing,
12	planning, and with judgment; and
13	
14	WHEREAS, the psycho, social, behavioral, and emotional
15	consequences of a traumatic brain injury include fatigue, mood
16	swings, denial, anxiety, depression, lack of motivation, and
17	problems with interpersonal skills; and
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19	WHEREAS, advances in neurosurgery and rehabilitation
20	therapy have dramatically increased the number of traumatic
21	brain injury survivors, but little has been accomplished to help
22	them adjust to their lives after experiencing a traumatic brain
23	injury; and
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25	WHEREAS, there is a large community of individuals who are
26	affected by traumatic brain injuries in Hawaii; and
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28	WHEREAS, the State lacks effective, affordable treatment
29	and rehabilitation programs and community support for these
30	individuals, their families, and their caregivers that could
31	facilitate their independent living; and
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WHEREAS, in 1997, the Legislature passed Act 333, Session 1 Laws of Hawaii, establishing the Traumatic Brain Injury Advisory 2 Board to help the Department of Health develop and implement a 3 comprehensive plan to address the needs of persons affected by 4 5 traumatic brain injuries; and 6 WHEREAS, in 2002, the Legislature passed Act 160, Session 7 Laws of Hawaii (Act 160), which recognized the needs of 8 individuals who suffer from the physical, cognitive, and 9 10 behavioral consequences of neurotrauma, which includes traumatic brain injuries; and 11 12 WHEREAS, the Neurotrauma Special fund was established to 13 provide education, to help individuals and families identify and 14 obtain access to services, and to create a neurotrauma registry; 15 16 and 17 WHEREAS, while there was no specific provision in Act 160 18 to fund direct services to neurotrauma survivors, the Conference 19 Committee Report for Act 160 noted that the Department of Health 20 and the Neurotrauma Advisory Board would gather data to 21 determine the extent to which direct services could reasonably 22 be funded within the limits of the resources in the special 23 fund; and 24 25 WHEREAS, in 2006, the Governor vetoed a measure that was 26 passed by the Legislature that directed moneys from the special 27 fund be used by the Departments of Health and Human Services to 28 29 apply for a federal waiver; and 30 WHEREAS, if the Departments of Health and Human Services 31 apply for and receive a federal traumatic brain injury waiver, 32 the State would be able to match federal funds; and 33 34 WHEREAS, this federal revenue maximization would yield 35 approximately twice as much money for the provision of needed 36 traumatic brain injury services; and 37 38 WHEREAS, the Departments of Health and Human Services 39 should collaborate and apply for a federal traumatic brain 40 injury waiver; now, therefore, 41 42 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 43 Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 44 2007-2168 HCR SMA.doc



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Session of 2007, the Senate concurring, that the Departments of 1 Health and Human Services are requested to collaborate and apply 2 for a federal traumatic brain injury waiver no later than 3 December 31, 2008; and 4 5 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in formulating an application 6 for a federal traumatic brain injury waiver, the Departments of 7 Health and Human Services are requested to consult with 8 community stakeholders, such as the Traumatic Brain Injury 9 Advisory Board and the Neurotrauma Advisory Board, to determine 10 services that need to be included in the waiver; and 11 12 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Departments of Health and 13 Human Services are requested to submit an interim report to the 14 Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of 15 the 2008 Regular Session, and a final report to the Legislature 16 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the 2009 17 18 Regular Session; and 19 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the interim report include: 20 21 (1)A detailed time line for completion of the waiver 22 application; 23 24 The number of individuals expected to be served by the 25 (2) waiver; 26 27 (3) The services that will be included in the waiver; and 28 29 (4) A recommendation regarding whether the State's portion 30 of the waiver's financial commitment should be funded 31 exclusively by general fund appropriations or using 32 some portion of moneys from the Neurotrauma Special 33 Fund; and 34 35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Departments of Health and 36 Human Services should include sufficient appropriations to meet 37 the financial requirements under the terms of the waiver in 38 their Executive Budget requests; and 39 40 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 41 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Health, 42

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Director of Human Services, Chair of the Traumatic Brain Injury
Advisory Board, and Chair of the Neurotrauma Advisory Board.
