HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES TO COLLABORATE AND APPLY FOR A FEDERAL TRAUMATIC BRAIN INJURY AND NEUROTRAUMA WAIVER.

WHEREAS, every year, approximately 1.9 million people in 1 the United States experience traumatic brain injuries; and 2 3 4 WHEREAS, the physical consequences of a traumatic brain injury include impaired speech, vision and hearing loss, 5 headaches, muscle spasticity, paralysis, and seizure disorders; 6 and 7 8 9 WHEREAS, the cognitive consequences of a traumatic brain injury include memory deficits, limited concentration, impaired 10 perception and communication, and difficulty reading, writing, 11 planning, and with judgment; and 12 13 WHEREAS, the psychological, social, behavioral, and 14 emotional consequences of a traumatic brain injury include 15 fatigue, mood swings, denial, anxiety, depression, lack of 16 motivation, and problems with interpersonal skills; and 17 18 WHEREAS, advances in neurosurgery and rehabilitation 19 therapy have dramatically increased the number of traumatic 20 brain injury survivors, but little has been accomplished to help 21 them adjust to their lives after experiencing a traumatic brain 22 injury; and 23 24 25 WHEREAS, there is a large community of individuals who are affected by traumatic brain injuries in Hawaii; and 26 27 28 WHEREAS, the State lacks effective, affordable treatment and rehabilitation programs and community support for these 29 individuals, their families, and their caregivers that could 30 facilitate their independent living; and 31 32



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1 2 3 4 5 6	WHEREAS, in 1997, the Legislature passed Act 333, establishing the Traumatic Brain Injury Advisory Board to help the Department of Health (DOH) develop and implement a comprehensive plan to address the needs of persons affected by traumatic brain injuries; and
7 8 9 10 11	WHEREAS, in 2002, the Legislature passed Act 160 (Act 160), which recognized the needs of individuals who suffer from the physical, cognitive, and behavioral consequences of neurotrauma, which includes traumatic brain injuries; and
12 13 14 15 16	WHEREAS, the Neurotrauma Special Fund (Neurotrauma Fund) was established to provide education, help individuals and families identify and obtain access to services, and create a neurotrauma registry; and
17 18 19 20 21 22 23 24	WHEREAS, while there was no specific provision in Act 160 to fund direct services to neurotrauma survivors, the Conference Committee Report for Act 160 noted that the Department of Health and the Neurotrauma Advisory Board would gather data to determine the extent to which direct services could reasonably be funded within the limits of the resources in the Neurotrauma Fund; and
24 25 26 27 28 29	WHEREAS, in 2006, the Governor vetoed a measure that was passed by the Legislature that directed moneys from the Neurotrauma Fund be used by DOH and the Department of Human Services (DHS) to apply for a federal waiver; and
29 30 31 32 33	WHEREAS, if DOH and DHS apply for and receive a federal traumatic brain injury waiver, the State would be able to match federal funds; and
34 35 36 37	WHEREAS, this federal revenue maximization would yield approximately twice as much money for the provision of needed traumatic brain injury services; and
38 39 40 41	WHEREAS, DOH and DHS should collaborate and apply for a federal traumatic brain injury and neurotrauma waiver; now, therefore,
42 43 44	BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2007, the Senate concurring, that DOH and DHS are HCR65 HD1 HMS 2007-3227

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requested to collaborate and apply for a federal traumatic brain 1 injury and neurotrauma waiver no later than December 31, 2008; 2 and 3 4 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in formulating an application 5 for a federal traumatic brain injury and neurotrauma waiver, DOH 6 and DHS are requested to consult with community stakeholders, 7 such as the Traumatic Brain Injury Advisory Board and the 8 Neurotrauma Advisory Board, to determine services that need to 9 be included in the waiver; and 10 11 12 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that DOH and DHS are requested to submit an interim report to the Legislature no later than 20 13 days prior to the convening of the 2008 Regular Session, and a 14 final report to the Legislature no later than 20 days prior to 15 the convening of the 2009 Regular Session; and 16 17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the interim report include: 18 19 20 (1) A detailed time line for completion of the waiver application; 21 22 (2)The number of individuals expected to be served by the 23 waiver; 24 25 (3) The services that will be included in the waiver; and 26 27 28 (4) A recommendation regarding whether the State's portion of the waiver's financial commitment should be funded 29 exclusively by general fund appropriations or using 30 some portion of moneys from the Neurotrauma Fund; and 31 32 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that DOH and DHS should include sufficient appropriations to meet the financial requirements 34 under the terms of the waiver in their Executive Budget 35 requests; and 36 37 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 38 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Health, 39 Director of Human Services, Chair of the Traumatic Brain Injury 40 Advisory Board, and Chair of the Neurotrauma Advisory Board. 41

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
