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1 2 WHEREAS, the material and nonmaterial costs and sacrifices of deploying Hawaii National Guard members to Irag have been 3 significant, as evidenced by lost lives, combat injuries, 4 psychic traumas, disruption of family lives, financial hardships 5 for individuals, families, and businesses, interruptions of 6 careers, and damages to the fabric of life in many Hawaii 7 communities; and 8 9 WHEREAS, more than three thousand United States military 10 service members have been killed in the war in Iraq, fourteen of 11 whom were from Hawaii, and countless others have been maimed and 12 wounded; in addition, several hundred thousand Iraqis have been 13 killed; and 14 15 WHEREAS, the majority of Americans would like to see 16 withdrawal of United States troops from Iraq, but there is, to 17 date, no exit strategy; now, therefore, 18 19 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 20 Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 21 Session of 2007, the Senate concurring, that Hawaii's 22 congressional delegation, the Governor, and all elected 23 officials in the State of Hawaii are urged to support the 24 implementation of the Iraq Study Group's recommendations, 25 including: 26 27 The President and the United States Congress are 28 (1)requested not to make an open-ended commitment to keep 29 large numbers of American troops deployed in Iraq; 30 31 (2) The President and the United States Congress are 32 requested to change the nation's military priorities 33 in Iraq from active combat to missions involving 34 35 volunteer service training, equipping, advice, and support; 36 37 The President and the United States Congress are (3) 38 requested to seek to complete all missions in Iraq by 39 the end of the first guarter of 2008; and 40 41 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the President and the United 42 States Congress are requested to redirect the financial 43 44 resources used to prosecute the war on Iraq to address urgent HCR LRB 07-0829.doc
