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HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENTS OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES TO COLLABORATE AND APPLY FOR A FEDERAL TRAUMATIC BRAIN INJURY WAIVER.

WHEREAS, every year approximately 1.9 million people in the 1 United States experience traumatic brain injuries; and 2 3 4 WHEREAS, the physical consequences of a traumatic brain injury include impaired speech, vision and hearing loss, 5 headaches, muscle spasticity, paralysis, and seizure disorders; 6 7 and 8 WHEREAS, the cognitive consequences of a traumatic brain 9 injury include memory deficits, limited concentration, impaired 10 perception and communication, and difficulty reading, writing, 11 planning, and with judgment; and 12 13 WHEREAS, the psycho, social, behavioral, and emotional 14 consequences of a traumatic brain injury include fatigue, mood 15 swings, denial, anxiety, depression, lack of motivation, and 16 problems with interpersonal skills; and 17 18 WHEREAS, advances in neurosurgery and rehabilitation 19 therapy have dramatically increased the number of traumatic 20 brain injury survivors, but little has been accomplished to help 21 them adjust to their lives after experiencing a traumatic brain 22 injury; and 23 24 WHEREAS, there is a large community of individuals who are 25 affected by traumatic brain injuries in Hawaii; and 26 27 WHEREAS, the State lacks effective, affordable treatment 28 and rehabilitation programs and community support for these 29 individuals, their families, and their caregivers that could 30 facilitate their independent living; and 31 32 WHEREAS, in 1997, the Legislature passed Act 333, Session 33 Laws of Hawaii, establishing the Traumatic Brain Injury Advisory 34 Board to help the Department of Health develop and implement a 35



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comprehensive plan to address the needs of persons affected by 1 2 traumatic brain injuries; and 3 WHEREAS, in 2002, the Legislature passed Act 160, Session 4 Laws of Hawaii (Act 160), which recognized the needs of 5 individuals who suffer from the physical, cognitive, and 6 behavioral consequences of neurotrauma, which includes traumatic 7 brain injuries; and 8 9 WHEREAS, the Neurotrauma Special fund was established to 10 provide education, to help individuals and families identify and 11 obtain access to services, and to create a neurotrauma registry; 12 and 13 14 WHEREAS, while there was no specific provision in Act 160 15 to fund direct services to neurotrauma survivors, the Conference 16 Committee Report for Act 160 noted that the Department of Health 17 and the Neurotrauma Advisory Board would gather data to 18 determine the extent to which direct services could reasonably 19 be funded within the limits of the resources in the special 20 fund; and 21 22 WHEREAS, in 2006, the Governor vetoed a measure that was 23 passed by the Legislature that directed moneys from the special 24 fund be used by the Departments of Health and Human Services to 25 apply for a federal waiver; and 26 27 WHEREAS, if the Departments of Health and Human Services 28 apply for and receive a federal traumatic brain injury waiver, 29 the State would be able to match federal funds; and 30 31 WHEREAS, this federal revenue maximization would yield 32 approximately twice as much money for the provision of needed 33 traumatic brain injury services; and 34 35 WHEREAS, the Departments of Health and Human Services 36 should collaborate and apply for a federal traumatic brain 37 injury waiver; now, therefore, 38 39 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 40 Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 41 Session of 2007, that the Departments of Health and Human 42 Services are requested to collaborate and apply for a federal 43



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traumatic brain injury waiver no later than December 31, 2008; 1 2 and 3 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in formulating an application 4 5 for a federal traumatic brain injury waiver, the Departments of Health and Human Services are requested to consult with 6 7 community stakeholders, such as the Traumatic Brain Injury Advisory Board and the Neurotrauma Advisory Board, to determine 8 services that need to be included in the waiver; and 9 10 11 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Departments of Health and Human Services are requested to submit an interim report to the 12 Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of 13 the 2008 Regular Session, and a final report to the Legislature 14 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the 2009 15 Regular Session; and 16 17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the interim report include: 18 19 (1)A detailed time line for completion of the waiver 20 application; 21 22 (2) The number of individuals expected to be served by the 23 waiver; 24 25 The services that will be included in the waiver; and (3) 26 27 (4) A recommendation regarding whether the State's portion 28 of the waiver's financial commitment should be funded 29 exclusively by general fund appropriations or using 30 some portion of moneys from the Neurotrauma Special 31 Fund; and 32 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Departments of Health and 34 Human Services should include sufficient appropriations to meet 35 the financial requirements under the terms of the waiver in 36 their Executive Budget requests; and 37 38 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 39 40 Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Health,

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Director of Human Services, Chair of the Traumatic Brain Injury
Advisory Board, and Chair of the Neurotrauma Advisory Board.
